War, as relief worker Dan West ladled rations of powdered milk to refugees, he realized that this simple form of aid would never be enough. After returning to the United States, West formed an organization dedicated to ending hunger permanently. Five years later, on June 18, 1944, the first shipment of dairy cattle left the United States bound for Puerto Rico in what would become a campaign that would change the lives of millions.

**NOW:** Heifer International is a nonprofit, humanitarian organization dedicated to ending hunger and poverty and caring for the Earth. Heifer currently provides livestock, trees, seeds and training in environmentally sound agriculture to families in more than 30 countries, including the United States.

HOW WE WORK: Heifer partners with community groups to form development plans and to train beneficiaries in animal well-being, agroecology, water quality, gender equity and community development, among other topics. The training enables them to care for livestock, grow crops sustainably and further lift themselves out of poverty.

**OUR STRATEGY:** Heifer's recipients agree to share one or more of their animals' offspring and the training they receive with others in need in what Heifer calls Passing on the Gift<sup>®</sup>. This unique development tool multiplies the benefit of the original gift and allows recipients to become donors. Heifer partners are also taught to prevent overgrazing, collect manure for organic fertilizer, plant trees and manage resources for long-term success.


