Clergy session approves candidates

The Clergy Session has approved six new clergypersons for full connection and ordination in the Annual Conference.

Donna Hendricks, Martha Taylor, and Garry Teeter were welcomed as new deacons, while Michael Blanchard, David Ruehr, and Katie Pearce entered as new elders.

For the ordinands, the Clergy Session vote marks the end of a long journey toward full connection. The Rev. Blanchard sees it as both a humbling and an empowering change.

"I'm humbled by the affirmation of my call by the churches I have served and by the Annual Conference," he said. "I'm ready to be sent out to the local churches wherever God

might lead us."

For deacon Rev. Gary Teeter, ordination reminds him that everyone is called by God.

"For the past 30-plus years I

have been engaged in ministry, and for the past 20 years in pastoral counseling," he said. "For me to be ordained as a [See CLERGY, page 2]

New Day, New Church: CCORR internal monitoring report

To get a head start on our new ministry model (outlined on p. 72 of the Pre-Conference Journal) the Commission on Religion and Race membership was assigned to two each (boards, agencies, committees, commissions) and other related groups to conduct an Internal Monitoring Report. This year, the following groups were selected: Status and Role of Women, Review and Research, Board of Ordained Ministry, Committee on Nominations, Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, Equitable Compensation, Committee on Finance and Administration, United Methodist Women, Board of Laity and Board of Global Ministry. The Commission received eight of the 10 reports returned, with no report from the Board of Laity or Board of Global Ministries.

Here are results compiled from the eight reports returned: Total Membership: 155. Total Lay membership: 88. Total Clergy membership: 67. Total female membership: 77. Total male membership: 78. Total White membership: 138. Total African-American membership: 16. Total Hispanic membership: 1. Percentage of ethnic membership of the eight is about 10 percent. For 2014-15, eight new groups will be selected to be monitored for inclusiveness.
