#### HISTORY OF THE FT. SMITH-OKLAHOMA CONFERENCE

The Ft. Smith-Oklahoma Conference, as it has christianed itself, has had a varied history. The Ft. Smith part was organized into a separate conference out of the North Arkansas Conference in the year 1881. There had been Methodist Protestants in this section of Arkansas before the Civil War. The first president of the Ft. Smith District, Rev. Clark Mason, lies buried on the Fayetteville circuit. Some splendid work was done by such men as Mason, Stumbaugh, Bartholomew, Mackey, Wilson, Jacobs, and a host of others. The only charter members now alive are Rev. R. R. Nichols of Denning, Ark., and Rev. T. E. Lewis of Ft. Smith, Ark.

The Oklahoma part of this new conference has had quite as varied a past. The first district of the present State of Oklahoma to be organized was the northeastern part, known as the Indian Mission Conference which was organized about the year 1887. W. B. Tinsell was a leading man in this conference. Bro. S. J. Shackleford is probably the only charter member alive. A little later the Oklahoma Conference, the Southern Oklahoma, the Chickasaw Mission, and later the Choctaw Mission was organized. Among the leading men in these districts were: B. L. Hancock, J. E. Bounds, B. J. Doughty, and a host of others. These Oklahoma districts were merged by the General Conference in 1908.

The General Conference of 1916 recommended the merging of the Oklahoma and Ft. Smith districts, which was done in a splendid and harmonious session at Shiloh, near Mansfield, Ark., November 1-4, 1917.

There is a splendid outlook for this division of our Great Church. As I think of the apple-crowned hills of Arkansas, the prize fruit country of the Union, with the bautiful little city of Fayetteville setting like a pearl among the Ozarks, I say, "Lord, help us to measure up to the opportunity in this section."

Then I hie away to the westward across the great Arkansas River Valley, most fertile of the regions of the Southwest, with Ft. Smith, the giant young metropolis, setting midway between Kansas City and the Gulf, bidding fair to dispute with any the kingdom of the Southwest. I find also in this section gas, oil, coal, timber and cotton, the fleecy staple that has made man rich in a single year. In this section are Miamii,

the prince of mining towns, where we have a mission; Tulsa, the chief of oil towns, whose growth and wealth are marvelous; Oklahoma City lies just to the west of this region, and not even Kansas can rival the wheat fields and alfalfa meadows of Central Oklahoma. To the west are cattle-raising sections with their fertile river valley; to the south is Lindsey, the greatest broomcorn market in the world, surrounded by fertile river valleys with wealth of natural resources.

What is the spiritual outlook? We have some eleven or twelve young men just entering our ranks and as I looked into their faces a few days ago I said, "The destiny of the Methodist Protestant Church is safe in your hands." We have in all some sixty ministers on our rolls and I believe in them and they believe in the church of mutual rights.

Many splendid movements are being set on foot and you will hear ere long from the Ft. Smith-Oklahoma Conference. People are beginning to demand a right to exercise their intelligence in church affairs as well as in other lines of human endeavor.

Rev. M. L. Mathews served as president of the Ft. Smith-Oklahma Conference from November, 1917, to November 1920. Under the wise and untiring efforts of President Mathews, the conference made great progress as is shown by the annual reports of 1917-1920. Since the uniting of the conferences E. W. Mackey, Rev. J. A. Phipps and Rev. G. O. McMillan have served as secretaries; and Rev. John A. Moody and Rev. J. A. Phipps have served as conference stewards.

At the November, 1920, conference the following officers were lected: O. W. Milburn, president; M. L. Mathews, treasurer; and G. O. McMillan, secretary.

At the October, 1921, Conference the following officers were elected: M. L. Mathews, president; G. O. McMillan, secretary; and R. Underwood, treasurer. This confrence reported 1100 conversions and 750 additions to the church during the year just closed, with twenty students in Westminster College.

# JOURNAL

The Fifth session of the Fort Smith-Oklahoma Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant church met this 19th day of October, 1921, at Quinton, Oklahoma. Conference opened at 10:00 a.m. with devotional service led by Rev. L. M.. Curtner. The President, Rev. O. W. Milburn then declared the Conference open for business.

Th roll was called noting those present. The secretary also called the roll of "Our Honored Dead," and some minor corrections were made.

By motion, the name of Rev. D. S. Stephens, D.D., L.L. D. was transferred to the roll of our honored dead.

By motion the name of Rev. J. W. Bridges was dropped from the official roll.

By motion, Rev. H. C. Hopkins was made Supernumerary to Prague Circuit.

The President then asked the Secretary to read the names of the Committees. See Report A.

Dr. T. H. Lewis, President of the General Conference, arose and suggested some points of order and law in connection with Conference organization.

After some announcements by chairmen of Committees, the Conference took recess for preaching Conference sermon by Rev. M. L. Mathews, who preached an inspiring sermon from Rev. 6:2.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 1:30 p. m., the Conference was called to order by President O. W. Milburn, and Rev. J. W. Copeland led in the devotional service.

The President then called for a verbal report from each pastor in the conference, as to number of conversions, number of additions to church, and amount paid on budget for the year. The following pastors from the following works reported as follows:

The committee on Credentials made a report. See Roll of Laymen.

The President read his Annual Report. See Report C.

The Conference entered into a discussion of the Budget,
led by Dr. George H. Miller. Many good suggestions were offered for raising the finances of the church, one of the best
being the weekly offering plan:

At 4:00 p. m., the Conference Secretary introduced Rev. A. G. Dixon, D.D., who made an inspiring address on the Sun-

day School and Young Peoples work. He suggested the following books for special help for those who are working with the young:

'The Coming School of the Church" by Chalmers.

"How to Run a Little Sunday School" by Ferguson.

"How to Run a Sunday School" by Lawrence.

These books can be secured by any one from the Methodist Protstant Book Concern, at Baltimore, Md., or Pittsburgh, Penn.

Conference adjourned with prayer.

At the evening hour Dr. Thomas H. Lewis, President of the General Conference made an address on the importance of the individual co-operating with the entire denomination in carrying out the program of the church. His thought suggesting that when one part of the body was affected, that the whole body suffered.

#### SECOND DAY—MORNING

The Conference was called to order by Dr. T. H. Lewis, President of the General Conference, who read a Scripture lesson and offered prayer.

The roll was called and the minutes of the preceeding days' sessions were read.

The committee on Credentials made a partial report.

At 9:15, the business of the hour was dispensed with and Rev. A. G. Dixon, D.D., Secretary of the Board of Young Peoples work, made an address on "Sunday School Evangelism."

Dr. T. H. Lewis was then given an opportunity to speak, and he presented some matters for the consideration of the Conference and they were acted upon by the conference.

By motion the Sunday Schools were asked to make an offering-during the year to the Old Peoples Home at West Layfayette, Ohio.

By motion the President was authorized to appoint one member of the Conference as a special representative of Education and Young Peoples work, and one as special Missionary representative, who will be responsible for special Educational and Missionary programs directed through the General Boards and held in the Conference. Rev. G. O. McMillan, of Hugo. Okla., and Rev. M. L. Mathews, of Idabel, Okla., were appointed as such representatives.

By motion the Conference ordered the sending of two delegates to a general meeting to be held in Pittsburg, Penn., in May, 1922. Rev. M. L. Mathews and Mr. W. J. Whiteman were elected as such delegates.

By motion, the Conference voted its full approval and appreciation of the present plans of the Gneral Conference in a full time traveling President of the General Conference on the present salary.

By motion one day of the Annual Conference is to be designated as Young Peoples day, at which time a program of special interest for Sunday Schools and Christian Endeavor Societies is to be rendered.

The conference took recess for preaching. Dr. George H. Miller, Secretary of the Board of Education, made a very splendid address on "Christian Education". He was followed by Dr. J. C. Williams, Chancellor of Kansas City University, who spoke of the very promising outlook for that institution.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The afternoon session was devoted to Young Peoples work. Many helpful talks were made by both ministers and laymen. It was very encouraging to note that the Christian Endeavor Societies of the Conference had made a net increase in Societies of 28, and a net increase of membership of 953. A number were inspired to help make the coming year one of greater activity in young peoples work.

Rev. M. L. Mathews made an appeal for Conference aid and co-operation in assisting our young people while in school preparing for life-service.

At 3:30 Dr. Charles H. Beck, Secretary of the Board of Home Missions, gave an inspiring address on the needs of the Conference. He laid stress on the whole time service of the pastor, and the full support of the pastor by the church.

The committee on Itinerancy and Orders made a partial report. See Report D.

By motion, the Conference amended the report of the committee on Itineracy and Orders, relative to their action on J. W. Browers, and ordered that because of his ability, service

in the past, and his location in the Conference, that he be ordained at this Conference.

Conference adjourned with benediction by Rev. J. H. Brewer.

#### THIRD DAY-MORNING SESSION

Conference opened with devotional service led by Rev. C. T. Simmons, who read from Malachi, third chapter and offered prayer.

The President then took the chair, and ordered the minutes read and the roll called.

By motion, the names of M. C. Rhea and T. M. Prescott, were dropped from the conference roll.

The committee on Literature and Perodicals made a report. See Report G.

The committee on Temperance made a report See Report H

The hour arived for the discussion of the Evangelistic campaign, and Evangelist Adams led in the dsicussion He was followed by Rev. J. H. Brower and others.

By motion, L. E. Melson, A. A. Pettigrew, Leonard Murphy and Melvin D. Parks were recommended to the Board of Education as suitable persons to receive aid from the Board while in College.

The committee on Official Character made a report. See Report E.

The eleven o'clock hour having arrived, Rev. J. W. Browers of Dill, Okla, was introduced, and he preached an inspiring sermon, using for a text, "Be Filled With the Spirit." At the close of his sermon Mrs. Brewer, in a few well chosen remarks, urged the ministers to preach the whole truth in all places.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The conference was called to order by the President, and Rev. B. S. Fulsom led in the devotianal service.

The committe on Education made a report. Report I.

The committee on Official Character asked permission to read again, their report so that other names might be added.

The conference Trasurer made a report. Report J.

The hour arrived for the election of officers for the ensuing year. By motion, the conference ordered nominations by ballot. The President appointed as tellers Leroy Simmons, Robert E. Lee and R. Underwood.

The ballots were cast, and the count showed that the following brethren had been voted on: M L. Mathews 23 votes, O. W. Milburn 10 votes, B. A. Thompson 10, G. O. McMillan 2, J. A. Moody 1. There being no majority for any one named the president ordered another ballot.

A motion lost to authorize the Secretary to cast the entire vote of the conference for M. L. Mathews for President, so the ballots were prepared and resulted in the election of Rev. M. L. Mathews for President.

Robert E. Lee R. Underwood and G. O. McMillan were placed in nomination for Secretary. G. O. McMillan having received a majority vote was declared elected.

In nominating a Conference Treasurer, R. Underwood, J. A. Moody, A. J. Rhoten, G. A. Harmon, O. W. Milburn and G. O. McMillan, all recived some votes. R. Underwood received a larger vote than any other so by motion, the Secretary was authorized to cast the entire vote of the Conference for him as Treasurer, which he did.

By motion, the President was instructed to nominate six persons to be voted on as Standing District Committee. He named the following Brethren, who were elected by the conference: Revs. C. T. Simmons, B. A. Thompson, W. R. McElvany and Messrs. W. J. Whiteman, L. E. Bacher and J. N. Willey.

Rev. M. L. Mathews was elected Trustee of the Watalula Camp Ground.

Rev. G. O. McMillan was elected President of the Denominational Young Peopples work of the conference and Mr. Robert E. Lee was elected Secretary.

By motion the conference ordered four laymen to sit with the President as Stationing Committee. The following laymen were elected on this committee: C. F. Shackleford Robert E. Lee, G. A. Harmon and R. J. Allison.

The retiring President then called all the newly elect-

ed officers to the front, introducing them, and asked the cooperation of the conference members in their behalf, he then offered prayer for them and asked the newly elected President M. L. Mathews to take the chair.

President Mathews in a few well chosen words asked the harty co-operation of every one in carrying out a great program for the ensuing year, suggesting in his talk some of the things that should be done.

Rev. J. W. Copeland arose and suggested that we pray for the salvation of two thousand souls in the conference this year, and that we raise the conference budget in full. This suggestion was adopted by motion.

By motion the selection of a place for the meeting of the next Annual Conference was made the order of the day. Comanche, Haworth, and Denning were placed in nomination which resulted in a majority, later made unanimous, vote for Denning, Ark.

My motion O. W. Milburn was rleased from the Stationing Committee, and M. L. Mathews was chosen instead.

J. A. Moody was appointed by the President to serve on the Committee on Assessments.

By motion the President was asked to appoint two laymen to assist the Pastor on the Pulpit Committee. W. Gann and Carl Wright were appointed on said committee.

Conference took recess for supper.

# REPORT OF PRESIDENT OF DENOMINATIONAL YOUNG PEOPLES WORK. F.

As President of the Denominational Young Peoples Work, I beg leave t submit the following report:

For lack of finances I have been unable to visit many of the churches of the District, but have tried in a very small way to inspire by letters to the Pastors and leaders, to greater activity among the young people of the church. The results of these activities have not been as great as they should have been, but the reports will show that there has been some good accomplished. I have had the splendid co-operation of some of the Pastors and laders in the work, and the reports of the different churches will show a greater increase in Christian Endeavor work than any previous year in the history of the Conference.

One year ago, there were only 9 C. E. Societies in the Conference, with a membership of 215. At this time we are able to report 37 Societies, with a membership of 1168. Last year we had 40 Sunday Schools with an enrollment of 2544. This year we have 41 Schools, with an enrollment of 2389.

Assisted by Dr. and Mrs. A. G. Dixon, Dr. Forelines and others, we held four young peoples rallies, which were very well attended, and resulted in great good to the communities in which they were held, besides there were several young people enlisted for Life Service in the work of the church.

I should like to make mention of the men and women who have done so nobly with the work this year but space in this report forbids. May I suggest a few things that we undertake for the ensuing year?

1. Let's have a Christian Endeavor Society in every Methodist Protestant church in the Conference before the year ends.

- 2. Let's quit allowing a few from other denominations in the community in which our church is located, dictate to us the kind of Sunday School literature we should use, and instead, have a Methodist Protestant Sunday School in a Methodist Protestant church using Methodist Protestant literature. As long as we allow "Union" Sunday schools take the place of our own in our own churches, we will never gain the respect that we deserve.
- 3. Let us observe the four special days, Rally Day, Educational Day, Children's Day and Easter. These are special days that have been set apart by the denomination for the training of the young in our church, and is one great blessing to any church. It takes time and patience to get up the programs, but we have neglected already too long, to be about our Master's business in training the young under our care. They are the only hope of the church for the future. If we neglect them we die. If we train them we will live and take our place among the other denominations.
- 4. I suggest a budget of not less than two hundred dollars for the young peoples work for the year 1922. And may I further suggest, that we not only assess that amount, but that we collect it so that the young peoples work will not be handicapped for lack of finances.
- 5. I suggest that the second day of our Annual Conference be devoted to young peoples work. This will give each pastor an opportunity to get help with some of his problems and will also give to our young people a chance to visit our Conference sessions.

May I suggest in closing this report that we pray also, for the work of the church the coming year, more and more, that many of our young people will enter the Masters harvest field that is already white, and carry on the great work that is so needed at this time.
