HISTORY OF THE FORT SMITH-OKLAHOMA CONFERENCE

The Ft. Smith-Oklahoma Conference, as it has Christened itself, has had a varied history. The Ft. Smith part was organized into a separate conference out of the North Arkansas Conference in the year 1881. There had been Methodist Protestants in this section of Arkansas before the Civil War. The first president of the Ft. Smith District, Rev. Clark Mason, lies buried on the Fayetteville circuit. Some splendid work was done by such men as Mason, Stumbaugh, Bartholomew, Mackey, Wilson, Jacobs and a host of others. The only charter members now alive are Rev. R. R. Nichols, of Denning, Ark., and Rev. T. E. Lewis, of Ft. Smith, Ark.

The Oklahoma part of this new conference has had quite as varied a past. The first district of the present State of Oklahoma to be organized was the northeastern part, known as the Indian Mission Conference, which was organized about the year 1887. W. Brother S. J. B. Tinsell was a leading man in this conference. Shackleford is probably the only charter member alive. later the Oklahoma Conference, the Southern Oklahoma, the Chickasaw Mission, and later the Choctaw Mission, was organized. Among the leading men in these districts were B. L. Hancock, J. E. Bounds, B. J. Doughty and a host of others. These Oklahoma districts were merged by the General Conference in 1908.

The General Conference of 1916 recommended the merging of the Oklahoma and Ft. Smith districts, which was done in a splendid and harmonious session at Shiloh, near Mansfield, Ark., November 1-4, 1917.

There is a splendid outlook for this division of our Great As I think of the apple-crowned hills of Arkansas, the prize fruit country of the Union, with the beautiful little city of Fayetteville setting like a pearl among the Ozarks, I say, "Lord,

help us to measure up to the opportunity in this section."

Then I hie away to the westward across the great Arkansas River Valley, most fertile of the regions of the Southwest, with Ft. Smith, the giant young metropolis, setting midway between Kansas City and the Gulf, bidding fair to dispute with any the kingdom of the Southwest. I find also in this section gas, oil, coal, timber and cotton, the fleecy staple that has made man rich in a single year. In this section are Miami, the prince of mining towns, where we have a mission; Tulsa, the chief of oil towns, whose growth and wealth are marvelous; Oklahoma City lies just to the west of this region, and not even Kansas can rival the wheat fields and alfalfa meadows of Central Oklahoma. To the west are cattle-raising sections, with their fertile river valley; to the south is Lindsey, the greatest broomcorn market in the world, surrounded by fertile river valleys, with wealth of natural resources.

What is the spiritual outlook? We have some eleven or twelve young men just entering our ranks, and as I looked into their faces a few days ago I said, "The destiny of the Methodist Protestant Church is safe in your hands." We have in all some sixty ministers on our rolls, and I believe in them and they believe in the church of mutual rights.

Many splendid movements are being set on foot and you will hear ere long from the Ft. Smith-Oklahoma Conference. People are beginning to demand a right to exercise their intelligence in church affairs as well as in other lines of human endeavor.

Rev. M. L. Mathews served as president of the Ft. Smith-Oklahoma Conference from November, 1917, to November 1920. Under the wise and untiring efforts of President Mathews, the conference made great progress, as is shown by the annual reports of 1917-1920. Since the uniting of the conferences E. W. Mackey, Rev. J. A. Phipps and Rev. G. O. McMillan have served as secretaries, and Rev. John A. Moody and Rev. J. A. Phipps have served as conference stewards.

At the November, 1920, conference the following officers were elected: O. W. Milburn, president; M. L. Mathews, treasurer, and G. O. McMillan, secretary.

At the October, 1921, conference the following officers were elected: M. L. Mathews, president; G. O. McMillan, secretary, and R. Underwood, treasurer. This conference reported 1100 conversions and 750 additions to the church during the year just closed, with twenty students in Westminster College.

At the sixth annual session the following officers were elected: John W. Quaid, president; G. O. McMillan, secretary, and A. J. Rhoten, treasurer. Six young men and four young women volunteered for the ministry and other Christian service at this conference. Reports show over 900 conversions and 484 additions. A healthy increase on all lines is shown and no charge was left unsupplied.

The Sixth Annual Sesssion of the Ft. Smith-Oklahoma Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church met this, the first day of November, 1922, at the Methodist Protestant Church, Denning, Arkansas, with President M. L. Mathews in the chair.

The opening service began at 10 A. M. After singing and prayer by Rev. A. J. Rhoten, the president read a Scripture lesson from John X and offered prayer. He then declared the conference open for business.

The secretary called the roll of ministers and licentiates. He then called the roll of Taymen, and, by motion, they were seated as delegates. (See roll of Laymen.)

The president then read a list of committees. (See Committees.) After which he gave the committees some instructions as to their duties.

The 11 o'clock hour having arrived, Dr. Thomas H. Lewis, president of the General Gonference, was introduced, and proceeded to address the conference on "Doing and Teaching in the Ministry."

After the recess for lunch, the conference was again called to order, and the devotional service was conducted by Rev. R. Underwood.

Owing to the fact that some of the conference members had not arrived, the regular order of the day was changed, and the conference took recess for committee work.

At 3 P. M. the conference was again called to order, and Rev. G. O. McMillan addressed the conference on books that should be read by workers, and also suggested that each pastor read the church paper.

By motion, the Committee on Assessments was asked to include in the Annual Conference budget the sum of \$50, to be collected and paid out as other funds are, the same to be used in defraying a part of the expense of holding a Young People's Conference in April or May by Dr. A. G. Dixon and his workers.

A motion was made to lower the General Conference budget from \$5,500 to \$2,000. After a lengthy discussion, the motion was tabled in order to hear a partial report from the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders.

The Committee on Itinerancy and Oders made a partial report.

The motion to lower General Conference budget was again called for, and carried by a vote of 22 to 6.

Mr. Harold Singer, secretary Oklahoma Christian Endeavor

Union, was then introduced to the conference and given an honorary seat.

By motion conference adjourned.

At the evening service Dr. T. H. Lewis preached an inspiring sermon.

SECOND DAY

The second day of the conference having been set apart for a young people's program, the president of the Young people's work, Rev. G. O. McMillan, took charge.

Mr. Clyde Parham led the devotional service, followed by a

short address by the president.

Oklahoma Field Secretary of the Christian Endeavor Union, Harold Singer, was introduced and made an inspiring address on Christian Endeavor. His message was timely and will bear fruit.

Dry J. E. Butler, financial agent of Westminster College, then addressed the young people on the importance of Westminster

Following Dr. Butler's address, reports were received from the College. different charges concerning the work of the young people. Many and varied were the reports, but all showed optimism and high praise for the work of the young people of the conference.

By motion, G. O. McMillan was elected as president of the Denominational Young People's Work by acclamation.

The conference then took recess and the young people's program was continued.

Dr. Crates S. Johnson, of St. Joe, Ind., was introduced and addressed the conference on "The Organized Sunday School."

Rev. M. L. Mathews made an appeal to "Use Your Young People or Lose Them."

A conference period was then held and many questions asked and many helpful suggestions made.

The conference adjourned subject to the call of the president.

EVENING

At 7 o'clock in the evening a song and prayer service was held. Then followed a short address by Ivan R. Wilson on "Why I Entered the Ministry." His message was to the point and inspiring.

Dr. Crates S. Johnson made an address on "What Shall I Do With the Claims of the Lord Jesus on My Life." At the close of the address a decision service was held, and ten young people volunteered for life service.

THIRD DAY-MORNING

Conference opened with devotional service led by W. H. Harrison. President Quaid took the chair, the roll was called and some corrections made.

By motion, the names of J. G. Cravens and J. H. Stacy were transferred to the unstationed list.

By motion, R. Underwood was recommended to Kansas City University, to the Board of Education for aid, and to all concerned as a promising young minister and a Christian gentleman.

The minutes were read and adopted.

REPORT OF PRESIDENT OF YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK. A.

During the year the Young People's Work has gone forward in some places, while in others the work has failed to come up to the standard.

A number of new Sunday Schools have been organized, and some others have adopted progressive methods.

Several new C. E. Societies have been organized, and some of those already organized have disbanded for lack of interest and leadership.

Assisted by Dr. Crates S. Johnson and others, we held Young People's Conferences at Alex, Quinton, Tipton and Prague. These conferences were very well attended and did much good. Plans were made to visit Cauthron, Paw Paw, Dill and some other points, but conditions were such that we could not make these points. In August I visited Daylight and Brady and was met by a responsive people.

I attended the State Sunday School Convention at Tulsa, Okla.,

the State C. E. Convention at Ponca City, Okla., and the District

C. E. Convention at Durant, Okla.

About twenty young people have volunteered for Life Service during the year, some of them for the ministry. Each pastor should look after and counsel with these young people and help them in any way needed.

I would suggest:

1. That we make more of our Young People's Day in the Annual Conference, and send one or more of our young people from each work to sit through conference at next session.

2. That we give more attention to the organized class of work, the departmental grouping of the Sunday School and graded

Christian Endeavor.

3. That we plan to send a number of delegates from each work to the State Conference to be held in April or May by Dr. A. G. Dixon and his workers.

4. That each pastor hold decision services during the year, at which time he shall give the young people an opportunity to enlist

for Christ and the Church in the ministry and mission fields.

In closing may I suggest that we pray constantly that the Lord of the Harvest will send more laborers into His harvest.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT. C.

To the Ft. Smith-Oklahoma Annual Conference. I wish to submit my report for the conference year of 1921-22.

The year has been filled with its joys and sorrows, with its

many hard-fought battles and its splendid victories.

During the year we have had more than 900 conversions, and a net increase in membership of nearly 500. Twelve new churches have been organized, and there are ten local preachers and two exhorters in the district.

The young people's work has grown and prospered, and I think

a close analysis of the finances will show a gain for the year.

Personally I have preached 305 times during the year, engaged in six revival meetings, in which there were about 100 conversions, and I have traveled about 9,300 miles during the year. The total salary received from the conference was \$1,069.

Two of our ministers have fallen before the great reaper, Death, during the year, Rev. M. D. Armstrong, of Cement, Okla., and Rev. W. A. Foster, of Crasses, Ark.

December 15 I appointed Rev. H. W. Kelly pastor of Idabel

Station; November 1, I appointed Rev. L. M. Curtner pastor of Lincoln; on March 15, I appointed Rev. A. E. Gammage pastor of Mansfield and two churches on Cauthron charge; December 1, I appointed J. A. Moody pastor of Mt. Hope Church; October of this year I gave J. E. Warren a transfer to the Texas Conference, and gave certificates of standing to J. A. Adams and T. Lawrence.

- I desire to make the following recommendations to the conference:
- 1. That suitable memorial services be held for our deceased brethren.
- 2. That pastors' characters shall be subject to failure to pass in case they fail to collect their conference claims.
- 3. That the goals of 25 new churches and 2,000 conversions be our aim for this year.
