STANDING RULES

1. *Nominations.* The presiding elders shall be a standing committee on nominations, and shall nominate all members of the quadrennial boards and annual committees; also the Conference Treasurer.

2. *Undergraduates.* Undergraduates who remain in the same class more than two successive years will be discontinued or located unless they are in school. Extra-ordinary circumstances and a two thirds vote of the Conference will be necessary to override this rule.

3. *Conference Program.* The pastor-host of the Conference, the presiding elder in whose district the Conference session is held, and the chairman of the Committee on Evangelism, shall constitute a Committee on Conference Program. This committee shall arrange, not less than sixty days before the Conference meets, for all preaching or other inspirational services, and select the speakers for each service. The program made by this Committee shall be subject to revision as the exigencies of any situation may require or the Conference direct.

4. *Conference Treasurer.* The Conference shall elect quadrennially a Conference treasurer who shall give bond to the Board of Trustees in such sum as the Conference may determine, and who shall receive and disburse such funds as the Conference may direct. The premium on the treasurer's bond shall be paid out of the Conference expense fund.

5. *Auditing Accounts.* The books of the Conference treasurer and of the treasurer of each Conference Board shall be audited annually within sixty days after the adjournment of the Conference session, by a qualified public accountant; such accountant to be employed by the Secretary of the Conference and paid out of the Conference expense fund. The reports of the accountant shall be filed with the Conference Secretary, and the results thereof published in the Conference Journal.

6. *Financial and Statistical.*

(1) All assessments for Conference claims and all reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars with no columns for cents.

(2) Each pastor shall settle with the Conference treasurer, and turn over his statistical reports with the treasurer's receipt attached, the first day of the Conference.

(3) The presiding elders will furnish the statistical secretary with all assessments on pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the annual Conference meets.

7. *Conference Claimants.* The Board of Finance shall co-operate with the Board of Trustees in securing homes for Conference Claimants and additional donations to the Conference Superannuate Endowment Fund. Such homes and funds shall be held in trust by the Board of Trustees.

8. *Memoirs of Preachers' Wives.* Memoirs of preachers' wives who have died shall be read at the Memorial session of the Conference

and published in the Conference Journal, and preacher's wives shall be invited to take part in the Memorial session.

9. *Conference Expense Fund.* The Budget Committee shall make an assessment for a Conference expense fund to cover the cost of all clerical work necessary in preparing Conference records, printing and distributing the Conference Minutes, for preserving Conference records and documents, and all legitimate expenses incurred by the Conference Secretary and the Conference Treasurer in carrying out the orders of the Conference. The Conference Treasurer shall be custodian of this fund which shall be paid out on the order of the Conference Secretary.

10. *Reports and Resolutions.* All reports, resolutions and other papers intended for publication in the Conference Minutes shall be typewritten and in triplicate.

11. *History Commission.* There shall be a self-perpetuating History Commission composed of five clerical members of the Conference, one of whom shall be the Secretary of the Conference, whose duty it shall be to collect and preserve biographical data of clerical members of the Conference, data of all kinds that promise to be of historical interest and value, the Conference records, and other documents of historical value. The Commission shall make a quadrennial report to the Conference at the session next following the General Conference.

12. *Lay Representation.* Lay representation in District Conferences shall consist of four members elected by the Quarterly Conference of each pastoral charge. Alternate delegates shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference.

13. *Repealed.* All actions and parts of actions of the Conference, which may be construed as standing rules, which were taken prior to the annual session of 1928, and which are not contained in, or are in conflict with, the foregoing rules are hereby repealed.

14. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided that the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing a day before the vote is taken.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE JOURNAL

Seventy-Sixth Session

FIRST DAY—WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION.

Conference Opened.—The seventy-sixth session of the Little Rock Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, met in the Methodist Church in Prescott, Arkansas, at 9 a. m. Wednesday, November 20th, 1929, with Bishop H. A. Boaz, presiding. The Bishop conducted devotional services, reading and expounding a part of the fourteenth chapter of John.

Secretaries.—The roll was called, C. J. Greene was elected Secretary, Clem N. Baker, A. J. Christie and Fred R. Harrison, assistant secretaries. R. E. Fawcett was elected Statistical Secretary, and C. E. Whitten, M. W. Miller, R. H. Cannon, J. G. Gieck, Neil Hart, J. D. Rogers and R. E. Simpson, assistant Statistical Secretaries.

Time and Place.—The time for the meeting and the adjourning of the Conference were fixed at 8:30 a. m. and 12 M. The main floor of the auditorium was made the conference room.

Press Reporter.—Rex B. Wilkes was elected press reporter.

Alternates Seated.—The following alternate delegates were seated: Mrs. Rex B. Wilkes in place of L. R. Wilcoxon; Mrs. W. S. Anderson in place of Mrs. H. T. Rucks; W. H. Harper in place of Mr. R. Davidson, all of the Monticello District. Mrs. W. R. Boney in place of Custer Steel in the Texarkana District.

Address of Welcome.—Hon. H. B. McKenzie delivered an address of welcome and Bishop Boaz responded on behalf of the Conference.

Introduced.—The following were introduced: Dr. J. E. Crawford, Stewardship Secretary of the Board of Lay Activities, Dr. O. E. Goddard of the General Board of Missions, Rev. T. A. Hearn of the China Conference, Dr. W. P. Whaley and Rev. J. J. Galloway of the North Arkansas Conference, and Rev. R. A. Teeter, whose transfer from the North Arkansas Conference the Bishop announced.

Boards and Committees.—The presiding elders made their report nominating the annual boards and committees and persons to fill the vacancies on the quadrennial boards, and the report was adopted.

Word From Absent Members.—Letters were read from J. H. McKelvy, W. R. Richardson and E. R. Steel, who are physically unable to be present. The Conference stood and was led by A. C. Millar in fervent prayer for members whose absence is deeply felt.

Greetings and Love.—The Conference directed the Secretary to send greetings and love to all absent superannuate members and Dr. J. E. Godbey of Kirkwood, Mo., many years a leading member of the Conference.

Leave of Absence.—J. A. Sage and T. M. Armstrong were granted leave of absence to conduct a funeral.

Orphanage Board Reports.—James Thomas read the report of the Orphanage Board. Pending the adoption of the report, H. D. Sadler, pastor of the church which the Orphanage group attends, Mrs. S. J. Steed, matron, seven inmates of the Home, and the Little Rock Conference members of the Board who were present, were presented, and Brother Sadler and Mrs. Steed spoke briefly. Mrs. E. H. McMurray sang, "Arkansas Methodists to the Rescue" and the Conference members and visitors pledged themselves to do their best to take a generous Christmas collection for the Orphanage. The report was adopted.

Order of the Day.—A motion was carried that immediately after Question 6, 8, 9 and 10 were answered the Conference should proceed to the election of delegates to the General Conference.

Fraternal Messenger's Report.—The report of J. J. Stowe, fraternal messenger to the Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, was read.

Memorial to General Conference.—A memorial to the General Conference pertaining to the report of the Committee on unifying the educational work of the Church was read and referred to the Committee on Memorials to the General Conference.

Amend Standing Rules.—A proposed amendment to the standing rules was read, and a motion carried to make consideration thereof the order of the day at 9 o'clock Friday morning.

Request Bishop's Return.—A resolution was read requesting the return of Bishop Boaz to this Episcopal Area for next year, and the resolution was referred to the Committee on Memorials to the General Conference to be put into proper form.

Question 21.—The call of question 21 was resumed, and the names of J. J. Stowe and James Thomas were called, their characters passed, and they made their reports.

Adjournment.—The Committee on Evangelism announced that Dr. O. E. Goddard would preach at 3 p. m. and 7:30 p. m., and the Conference adjourned with the doxology and the benediction by Dr. J. E. Crawford.

SECOND DAY—THURSDAY MORNING SESSION

Conference Opened.—The Conference met at 8:30 a. m. with Bishop Boaz presiding. The Bishop conducted devotional services, W. C. Martin leading in prayer.

Minutes Approved.—The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Introduced.—W. C. Martin, a recent transfer to this Conference, was introduced.

Roll Called.—The names of members who were absent the first day were called, and a motion carried that the Conference dispense with further calling of the roll.

Fraternal Message.—A. C. Millar introduced a resolution proposing to send a fraternal message to the State Baptist Convention in session in Hot Springs and the resolution was adopted.

Question 6.—Under question 6, Who are admitted into full connection, the names of the following were called, their characters passed, they had passed the examining committee, they were recommended by the Committee on Admissions, they made their reports, and they were elected to deacons order: Robert S. Beasley, W. R. Burks, Fred R. Harrison, J. D. Montgomery, Claude R. Roy, Harold D. Sadler and John G. Gieck. E. B. Adcock passed the examining committee and was recommended for admission into full connection, being already a deacon.

Remain In Class.—R. W. Menard and David A. Weems being in school and not being before the Committee, they remain in the class of the second year. Jefferson W. Smith not being before the Committee remains in the class of the second year.

Admitted Into Full Connection.—Those who were recommended for admission into full connection were called before the chancel, the Bishop propounding to them the disciplinary questions to which the applicants gave satisfactory answers and by vote of the Conference, E. B. Adcock, Robert S. Beasley, W. R. Burks, Fred R. Harrison, J. D. Montgomery, Claude R. Roy, Harold D. Sadler and John G. Gieck were admitted into full connection.

Introduced.—Rev. A. W. Martin of the General Sunday School Board and Mr. R. E. Houston, evangelistic singer, were introduced.

Question 8.—Under question 8, Who are re-admitted, the name of C. L. Williams was presented and by vote of the Conference he was re-admitted.

Supernumerary.—The name of C. L. Williams was referred for the supernumerary relation.

Question 9.—Under question 9, who are received by transfer from other conferences, the Bishop announced the transfer of V. W. Harrell, a deacon, from the Central Texas Conference, and D. T. Rowe, in the class of the third year, from the North Arkansas Conference.

Question 10.—Question 10, Who are received from other churches as traveling preachers, was asked, and the answer was, no one.

Alternate Seated.—W. E. Williams, an alternate from the Camden District, was seated in the place of C. A. Overstreet.

Order of the Day.—The order of the day having been reached, the Conference proceeded to the election of delegates to the General Conference. A motion carried that after the election of delegates, the Conference should elect three clerical and three lay alternates. A motion carried that any ballot not having the full number of those to be voted for should be counted illegal.

Ballots Cast.—The following tellers were appointed: Clerical, J. M. Hamilton, Kenneth L. Spore, O. E. Thomas, S. T. Baugh. Lay, W. R. Boney, Noel Martin, A. P. Steel, Mrs. Rex B. Wilkes. The members of the Conference then cast their first ballot.

Addresses Conferencee.—Dr. J. Walter Mills of the Texas Conference, representing the General Board of Finance, addressed the Conference.

Report of Board of Lay Activities.—The report of the Board of Lay Activities was read, Dr. J. E. Crawford spoke to the Conference and the report was adopted.

Introduced.—Dr. O. F. Sensebaugh of the Southern Methodist University School of Religion, and Dr. H. M. Whaling, Vice-President of the Southern Methodist University, were introduced.

Elected.—The tellers reported that James Thomas, J. J. Stowe and A. C. Millar had been elected clerical delegates to the General Conference and G. W. Pardee, lay delegate. The second ballot was then cast.

Report of Board of Education.—The Board of Education read its report No. 1, which was discussed and adopted.

Introduced.—Mr. C. K. Wilkerson, recently employed by the College Board of Thirty, as Field Representative, was introduced.

Tellers' Report.—The tellers' report showed that on the second ballot there was no clerical delegate elected. Carl Hollis, J. P. Womack, Mrs. F. M. Williams and J. H. Waters were elected lay delegates.

Afternoon Session.—A motion carried that when we adjourn we ad-

journal to meet at 2 o'clock to finish the election of delegates and alternates to the General Conference. A motion carried that at the afternoon session a specialist in rural Sunday School Work, who is visiting the Conference, be heard.

Adjournment.—The doxology was sung, and the Conference adjourned with the benediction by Dr. J. M. Workman.

SECOND DAY—THURSDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Conference Opened.—The Conference met at 2 p. m. with Bishop Boaz in the chair. The Bishop conducted devotional services, Rev. J. M. Hughey of the North Arkansas Conference leading in prayer.

Minutes Approved.—The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

Tellers Report.—The tellers reported that there was no election on the third ballot and the fourth ballot was cast.

Memorial to General Conference.—A memorial to the General Conference asking that the Conference presidents of the Woman's Missionary Societies be made ex-officio members of annual conference was referred to the Committee on Memorials.

Address the Conference.—Rev. A. W. Martin of the General Sunday School Board, and Rev. C. W. Lockey, Sunday School Extension Secretary of the Texas Conference, addressed the Conference on Rural Sunday School Work.

Tellers Report.—The tellers reported that on the fourth ballot Clem N. Baker had been elected a clerical delegate, and W. R. Boney alternate lay delegate. The fifth ballot was cast.

Resolution.—A resolution pertaining to advertising books on card playing and Church papers was referred to the Board of Christian Literature.

Leave of Absence.—M. W. Miller was granted leave of absence on account of sickness.

C. C. Neal Speaks.—Dr. C. C. Neal of the Arkansas Haygood College spoke of his college and its needs, and a contribution of \$100.01 was made for the college.

Tellers Report.—The tellers reported there was no election of the clerical delegates. C. F. Elza and Noel Martin were elected alternate lay delegates. The fifth ballot for clerical delegates was cast.

J. F. Simmons.—J. F. Simmons, Conference Missionary Secretary, made his report.

Tellers Report.—The tellers reported that J. A. Henderson had been elected clerical delegate.

Alternates.—On the first ballot for alternate clerical delegates, J. C.

Glenn was elected, and on the second ballot, C. J. Greene and J. W. Workman were elected.

Conference Board of Trustees Report.—James Thomas read the report of the Conference Board of Trustees.

Board of Missions Report No. 1.—The Board of Missions made its report No. 1, and pending the adoption of the report, Dr. O. E. Goddard spoke, and the report was adopted.

Question 44.—Question 44, Where shall the next Conference be held, was asked. Lakeside Church in Pine Bluff was nominated and unanimously elected.

Question 21.—Under question 21, Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration, the names of J. C. Glenn and J. W. Workman were called, their characters passed, and they made their reports.

Adjournment.—A motion carried that the Conference adjourn. The Committee on Evangelism announced that Dr. O. E. Goddard would preach at 7:30. The Conference adjourned at 4:20 with the doxology and the benediction by A. C. Millar.

THIRD DAY—FRIDAY MORNING SESSION

Conference Opened.—The Conference met at 8:30 a. m. with Bishop Boaz presiding. A. C. Miller conducted devotional services.

Minutes Approved.—The minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

Actions Reconsidered.—The action of the Conference in referring C. L. Williams for the supernumerary relation was reconsidered. A motion then carried to refer his name for the superannuate relation.

Floral Offering.—A motion carried that the Conference authorize B. F. Fitzhugh to send flowers to J. W. Mann and J. R. Dickerson, who are at home sick.

Annual Committees.—The Committee on Conference Relations, District Conference Journals, The Western Methodist, and the Committee on Memorials, being omitted in the Presiding Elder's Appointments in the earlier part of the session, were nominated and elected.

Order of the Day.—A motion carried to defer the Order of the Day until 10 o'clock.

General Conference Memorials.—The Committee on General Conference Memorials made its report as follows:

1. On uniting the North Arkansas and the Little Rock Conferences. The Committee concurred, but the Conference voted adversely.
2. The proposed Memorial making the Conference Presidents of the Woman's Missionary Society and the Conference Lay Leaders ex-officio members of Annual Conference was concurred in.

The Conference amended the proposed memorial so as to include Presidents of Conference Epworth Leagues when eligible, and the Conference concurred in this memorial.

3. The Memorial pertaining to the unifying of the educational work of the church was concurred in and the Conference approved the memorial.
4. A Memorial pertaining to revising the Hymn Book was reported non-concurred. A substitute motion to concur was carried.
5. A Memorial pertaining to the use of tobacco was reported non-concurred. A substitute motion was made and a substitute to the substitute. A motion then prevailed to lay all matters pertaining to the subject on the table.

Personal Privilege.—Paul Quillian and F. C. Cannon spoke on matters of personal privilege.

Order of the Day.—The Order of the Day having been reached, the proposed change in the standing rules affecting the salaries of preachers was taken up. After being discussed, a substitute motion was offered and a motion then prevailed to lay both motions on the table.

Conference Treasurer's Reports.—The Conference Treasurer read his report.

Addresses the Conference.—Rev. J. L. Lyons, representing the General Hospital Board, addressed the Conference.

Memorial to General Conference.—A Memorial on the Financial System of the Church and other matters was referred to the Committee on Memorials.

Addresses the Conference.—Rev. H. M. Lewis, Student Pastor of the the University of Arkansas, and Dr. H. M. Whaling of the Southern Methodist University, addressed the Conference.

Afternoon Session.—A motion carried that when we adjourn we adjourn to meet at 2 o'clock for an afternoon session of one hour.

The Committee on Evangelism announced that Dr. O. E. Goddard would preach at 3 o'clock.

The doxology was sung and the Conference adjourned with the benediction by A. J. Ewing.

THIRD DAY—FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Conference Opened.—The Conference met at 2 p. m. with Bishop Boaz in the chair. The Bishop conducted devotional services, W. T. Wilkinson leading in prayer.

Minutes Approved.—The minutes of the morning session were read, corrected and approved.

Resolution on Rural Church Work.—A resolution was passed looking to an improved rural church program.

REPORT OF BIBLE BOARD

Dear Brethren:

The American Bible Society is a missionary agency for the distribution of the Word of God. It is carrying on its work in the United States, Latin America, the Near East, the Far East, Europe, Africa and in many islands of the sea. It has translated the old Bible into 169 languages and parts of the Bible into 684 other tongues, making 853 languages in all. It distributed over eleven million volumes the past year. It does not print the Bible for profit. Bibles are now sold for as little as forty-five cents, New Testaments for a nickel, and portions of the Scripture for one cent each; and copies are given away to individuals, institutions and organizations not able to pay. The Bible for the blind can be purchased for fifty cents a volume and the whole Bible for \$5.50. It does its distribution through agency secretaries, colporteurs, voluntary workers, pastors and other religious workers. It receives contributions to carry on its work from at least forty-four denominations. Our own church comes third in the amount contributed. The society is in need of larger financial support in view of the great demand for the Bible, especially in China. It had to reduce its budget eighty thousand dollars in 1929, to keep within the anticipated receipts.

We must not undervalue the importance of the society. It comes to our aid in times of floods, cyclones and other disasters. It backs us up in our missionary efforts at home and abroad. It is often the forerunner of the missionary in his efforts to Christianize a people. In fact, its work is essential to the whole Christian enterprise.

Therefore, we recommend as last year:

First, that we, as pastors, cooperate with our agencies in the distribution of the Scriptures, and that our presiding elders give the matter attention in the District Conferences.

Second, that our churches observe one Sunday in the year as Bible Sunday.

Third, that the Rev. D. H. Colquette be reappointed agent of the American Bible Society.

We also call attention to our depository in charge of Brother Colquette at Little Rock, where Scriptures can be had at the same prices as in New York City.

To the Bishop and Members of the Little Rock Annual Conference:

Dear Brethren: We rejoice in the continued growth of our general publishing interests and feel that we have occasion for gratitude for the splendid business administration that has made possible the achievements of the year just closed. The total sales for the year were \$1,966,927.36, showing a net profit of \$176818.67, and an increase in profit of \$46,232.22 over the previous year.

After reviewing the year's work, the Book Committee felt justified in making an appropriation of \$105,000.00 for the benefit of our Conference Claimants. The appropriation of this year makes a total of \$300,000.00 for the present quadrennium, the largest amount ever contributed by the Publishing House for a quadrennium.

In view of the fact that all accrued profits go to our worthy worn-out veterans of Southern Methodism, and as a matter of denominational pride, we should give our moral support and patronage to our own publishing house.

We wish to direct your special attention to the Christian Advocate, our general organ; The Methodist Layman, The Missionary Voice and The Quarterly Review. We earnestly request our pastors to give their hearty support in an effort to increase the circulation of these valuable church-wide publications.

With reference to our conference organ, The Arkansas Methodist, we wish to state that after considering the reports of the Arkansas Methodist Commission and the Editor and Commissioner, we find that the past year has been an exceedingly difficult one, both for the Editor and Commissioner, but they have worked hard and we commend their efforts. The circulation of 12,000 as reported last year, has been maintained, but many are delinquent because the circulation campaign was too long delayed by many pastors. The Reverend J. J. Galloway, Commissioner, worked faithfully on circulation and debt. When the influence of the political campaign is considered, the circulation is good. During the last two months he has secured in pledges about \$9,000.00. As all debts amount to approximately \$28,000.00, it will be necessary to raise about \$20,000.00. This amount has been provided for and will be collected.

The present moral condition of our country and the influence of the secular press are such that more than ever before do we need our church papers. Unless our people read our church papers they will not understand nor appreciate the great programs of our church. It is therefore highly important that all pastors create a deeper interest in the reading of genuinely Christian literature.

We submit the following recommendations:

1. We approve the editorial work and management of Dr. A. C. Millar and recommend his re-appointment.
2. We need the funds provided by the assessments not merely to maintain the paper, but to help meet the purchase price of the real estate; hence, we ask for the continuance of the assessments, and their increase if possible.
3. We request the appointment of the Reverend W. C. Martin of the Little Rock Conference to take the place of the Reverend E. R. Steel, whose ill health makes it impossible for him to render active service.
4. We recognize the good work done by many of our pastors and in view of the fact that only the pastors can successfully promote the circulation and the further fact that the campaign should be made early in the year in order that the church may get the full benefit of its influence, we earnestly request that the pastors pledge themselves to put on a vigorous campaign for the circulation of the paper during January, February and March, and endeavor to complete the same by May. Last year the paper suffered severely because of the postponement of the campaign. We ask that during the campaign period each pastor preach on the value of Christian literature and urge their people to put the denomination paper into every home.
5. We have fixed the regular price of the paper at \$2.00, and \$1.50 in clubs of ten or more, and we authorize pastors to give as a premium with every subscription the Arkansas Farmer, a 16-page, twice-a-week agricultural journal, for a year. We also still offer as a premium the Travel-Accident Policy for an additional payment of 75 cents with every subscription of \$2.00, or 90 cents when the subscription price is less than \$2.00. This policy in the Continental Life Insurance Company pays \$10,000.00 for death of insured under certain circum-

stances, and is good for one year. Every one should have it, because the danger of accident is now very great, and this is a fine policy at a low price. This can be had for all persons between 10 and 70 years of age who are not blind or crippled.

6. That we adopt cash in advance policy for subscriptions.

CHARTER OF THE ARKANSAS METHODIST EDUCATIONAL CORPORATION

Know All Men By These Presents:

That Jake Bateman, W. R. Boney, James A. Buchanan, R. H. Cannon, Charles T. Coleman, H. C. Couch, W. C. Davidson, J. J. Galloway, Mrs. James Graham, J. D. Hammons, J. J. Harrison, Mrs. F. V. Holmes, R. W. Huie, George W. James, L. B. Leigh, W. H. Matthews, R. C. Morehead, Paul W. Quillian, W. C. Ribenack, Paul Q. Rorie, Joe T. Robinson, Wyatt Sanford, William Sherman, S. G. Smith, E. R. Steel, W. R. Stuck, James Thomas, Charles L. Thompson, F. M. Tolleson and R. E. Lee Wilson, as trustees of the Little Rock Annual Conference and the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, have associated themselves together for the purpose of founding and maintaining institutions of learning in the State of Arkansas, and have adopted the following articles of association:

Article 1. The name of the corporation shall be the Arkansas Methodist Educational Corporation.

Article 2. The legal situs and principal office of the corporation shall be in Little Rock, Pulaski County, Arkansas.

Article 3. The purpose of the corporation shall be the advancement of Christian education in the State of Arkansas under the direction and control of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Article 4. The corporation shall be under the direction and control of a board of thirty trustees, whose election shall be in conformity with the disciplinary requirements of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, as to church membership. The regular term of a trustees shall be six years. The persons named above shall constitute the first board

of trustees, and shall serve until January 1, 1930, and until their successors are appointed as follows:

The North Arkansas Conference upon the nomination of the executive committee of the Board of Thirty, shall elect nine trustees, who shall reside within the bounds of the North Arkansas Conference, three to serve two years, three for four years and three for six years, from January 1, 1930; likewise the Little Rock Conference, upon the nomination of the executive committee of the Board of Thirty, shall elect nine trustees, who shall reside within the bounds of the Little Rock Conference, three to serve for one year, three to serve three years, and three to serve five years.

"The Alumnae Association of Galloway Woman's College shall nominate two trustees to serve for two years; the Alumni Association of Henderson-Brown College shall nominate two trustees to serve for four years, and the Alumni Association of Hendrix College shall nominate two trustees to serve for six years. The names of these trustees shall be submitted to the two Annual Conferences meeting in November, 1929, for election. The 24 trustees above will select six trustees at large, two to serve for one year, two for three years and two for five years. These six trustees shall serve until the fall of 1930, when their names will be submitted to the two Annual Conferences for election.

Thereafter, vacancies will be filled as follows:

Vacancies in the Alumni trustees at regular biennial intervals shall be nominated and elected in like manner as above. Vacancies in the Alumni trustees group occurring at other times shall be filled upon the nomination of the Alumni Association, of which the retiring trustees was a member.

Trustees at large and Conference trustees shall be nominated by the Board of Thirty.

Each Annual Conference shall elect its own trustees and both Conferences shall elect all Alumni trustees and all trustees at large. Trustees shall serve until their successors are nominated and elected.

If an Annual Conference declines to elect a conference trustees as above mentioned, it shall be the duty of the Conference Board of Education to send in other nominations until elected. If an Annual Conference declines to elect a trustee at large or an Alumni trustee, it shall be the duty of the respective nominating authorities as above provided to submit other nominations until elected.

Article 5. The Board of Trustees shall manage and control the affairs of the corporation. The Board shall select one of its members as president, one as vice president, and shall also select a secretary and a treasurer, neither of whom need be a member of the Board. The Board shall have power to adopt by-laws to govern its actions, and may change them at pleasure. The Board of Trustees may fix the place of its meetings, and 16 members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction or business.

Article 6. The Board of Trustees shall be charged with the government of the institutions established by its agency, or under its control, and shall appoint all officers and instructors therefor, and fix their salaries or compensations; but the Board may delegate their pow-

ers of government to the president and faculty of any such institution.

Article 7. The Board of Trustees may appoint an executive committee to serve during the interim between the meetings of the Board, and may delegate to the committee such powers as the Board may deem advisable.

Article 8. The corporation shall have power to acquire, establish, merge, control and manage institutions of learning, including universities, colleges and academies, and branches thereof, and may locate them at such places in the State of Arkansas as the Board of Trustees, under the advice and subject to the approval of the Conferences, may determine. The corporation shall have the power to confer honors, degrees, diplomas and certificates in the names of the respective institutions.

Article 9. The Board of Trustees shall proceed as expeditiously as practicable to carry into effect the action of the two Annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Arkansas, taken on the 28th day of February, 1928, and the action of the Board of Thirty appointed by said Annual Conference to acquire the properties and the control of the institutions of Hendrix College, Henderson-Brown College and Galloway woman's College, and to consolidate at the present site of Hendrix College as one co-educational collegiate institution of learning under the name of Hendrix-Henderson College, and to continue under its present name, Galloway Woman's College as a college for women; and the Board is hereby empowered to do and perform all acts and things necessary to accomplish the will and action of said Conferences with respect to unifying the ownership and control of said institution.

Article 10. The corporation shall have power to sue and be sued; to contract and be contracted with; to make and use a common seal, and to alter the name at pleasure; to buy and sell property, real, personal and mixed, and to take and hold property by gift, conveyance, devise or bequest; and it shall have the power to enter into co-operative relations with other educational institutions for the establishment and maintenance of such departments or schools as they may agree to correlate, and to make rules for the government of such departments and schools.

Article 11. The corporation shall have power to borrow money and to give securities therefor. It shall also have power for investment purposes, to loan its funds, on such security as the Board of Trustees may deem sufficient, and to buy and sell stocks, bonds, debentures and other securities.

Article 12. If the corporation, through its Board of Trustees, shall merge two or more institutions of learning, the Board of Trustees shall designate the name of the merged institution. The Alumni of the respective institutions shall be the Alumni of the merged institutions.

Article 13. This corporation shall be deemed in law, as it is in fact, the legal successor of Henderson-Brown College, Hendrix College, and of Galloway Woman's College, and of any college, academy or institution of learning it may acquire.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

We have received the report from the Board of Thirty and transmit to you the following recommendations which are approved by us.

1. That in order to help qualify Galloway for immediate membership in the North Central Association we recommend that beginning with the Fall of 1930 from funds collected for Education, \$5,000.00 be given by the Little Rock Conference, and \$5,000.00 be given by the North Arkansas Conference to Galloway Woman's College.

Provided that Galloway shall receive one half of the money collected on the assessment but in no case shall the appropriation for Galloway Woman's College be less than a total of \$10,000.00 from the two Conferences.

2. That in order to secure the funds needed for Galloway Woman's College and Hendrix-Henderson College, the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences authorize the Board of Trustees to conduct a campaign for such sums as the Board may deem adequate to meet the needs of both Colleges, to fix the time for the campaign, to organize it, to employ workers, and to provide for the financing of the same. These colleges will need a minimum of a million dollars if they are to meet fully the demands of the Church upon them.

3. Feeling that it is necessary in initiating our common Educational program that there be bodies empowered to act for the Annual Conferences, we request each Annual Conference to give its Board of Education as an ad interim Committee full power to act for the Conference on any recommendation or request of the Board of Thirty involving any legal, charter or other steps or changes necessary to carry out the policies of the Conferences touching our Unified Educational Program.

4. That the Conference request the Churches to release for such time as may be needed such Pastors as the Board may need for field work during the campaign. This campaign will be under the direction of a Committee of which Bishop H. A. Boaz, Harvey C. Couch, J. J. Harrison, J. M. Williams and J. H. Reynolds will constitute the nucleus; other names will be added. In addition there will be a large State Committee.

5. Deeming these steps necessary in order to carry out the instructions stated and implied as given by your bodies at recent sessions, we now ask the Conference to join us in calling upon all alumnae and alumni of our colleges to assist in bringing our plans to a successful conclusion. To effect such a united effort, and to gain right of way for our program with assured success, we ask the help and leadership of our Bishop with that of all Pastors and Presiding Elders, and we pray the co-operation of the entire Church. While the Board does not plan an every-member canvass, they do expect the whole machinery, power and influence of the Church to be unreservedly and whole heartedly given to the campaign.

Looking toward those things which are before us, with the help of Almighty God, with one heart and a common purpose, in union and in strength, let us provide for our youth in Arkansas so as to assure them

of educational efficiency and assure our Church of a leadership equipped for every good word and work.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 2

President Reynolds of Hendrix-Henderson and President Williams of Galloway Woman's College have reported. They have nearly 500 students and are going forward with plans to enable them to more adequately meet the needs of their students and more efficiently serve Arkansas Methodism.

Dr. Sensabaugh and Dr. Whaling of Southern Methodist University have been with us. The school of theology is doing splendid work but is sadly handicapped with a lack of funds for scholarships. To meet the urgent needs of this situation, we are asking that our Conference commit itself to raising next year seven scholarships of \$200. We ask that the Conference instruct the presiding elders and the Conference Secretary of Education to make plans and raise this fund.

We ask that our Conference observe Christian Education Day on the second or third Sunday in June and on that day, an offering be taken for strengthening the department of religious education in Hendrix-Henderson and Galloway Woman's College.

We recommend that you request the General Board of Education to make an appropriation of \$1500.00, for the support of our student pastor work at the State University.

Your attention is again called to the law requiring two years of college work for admission into the Annual Conference. We urge that you be very careful in admitting men who do not meet this requirement.

We ask that you approve the selection of Dr. Paul W. Quillian to attend the meeting of the Southern Methodist Education Association to be held at Memphis in February.

We nominate Dr. J. L. Cannon to be Conference Secretary of Education.

Pursuant to your authorization, we have received and approved the charter for our educational institutions, written and given to us by your Board of Thirty.

The report of your Treasurer has been received and is also given below, attached to this report.

We have received the following nominations for membership on the Board of Trustees for our educational institutions as provided by the new charter. They are approved by us.

For one year term: Mr. Charles T. Coleman, Mr. W. R. Boney, Rev. R. H. Canon.

For three year term: Mr. J. J. Harrison, Rev. James Thomas, Mr. L. B. Leigh.

For the alumnae of Galloway Woman's College for two year term: Mrs. Zalinda Harison, Mrs. Vera E. Reinhard.

REPORT OF THE HOSPITAL BOARD

Dear Brethren:

At the last session of our Conference, Dr. F. W. Brandon, assistant secretary of our General Hospital Board, whose recent untimely death we lament and whose memory we honor, assured us of the interest of that Board in our cherished purpose to secure a connectional sanatorium at Hot Springs National Park, Arkansas. In harmony with his expression, Dr. C. C. Jarrell, the efficient and progressive secretary, this year visited Mt. Sequoyah and Hot Springs and conferred with our Conference Board and representatives of Hot Springs, approved our purpose and confirmed our hopes; therefore, we have submitted, through the Committee of Memorials, a memorial asking for substantive action by our General Conference.

We have received the Report of the General Board which recites a record of signal achievement for our whole Church in this rather recent field of service. We rejoice over the substantial evidences of divine approval of our belated but now vigorous efforts to carry out our Master's command to heal the nations physically as well as spiritually.

It was a profitable pleasure to have before the Conference and our Board, Rev. J. L. Lyons, Superintendent of our Southern Methodist Hospital and Sanatorium at Tuscon, Arizona, our first definite effort to help those who are afflicted with the "White Plague." While yet in its incipency, this beneficent institution is self-supporting and is rendering a Christly service to many of our own people. As our own state has had representatives there and as any of our families may unexpectedly require its treatment, we feel under obligation to continue to direct 80 per cent of the funds collected in our Conference during Hospital Week, which includes the second and third Sundays in May, and, in order to stimulate interest both in his work and promote the observance of Hospital Week and Golden Cross enrollments, we cordially invite him to visit our Conference, and we urge our pastors to open the way for him.

We have re-elected Rev. O. L. Walker, Conference Golden Cross Director, and request our presiding elders and pastors to cooperate with him in his worthy activities.

Your Board accepts membership in the Southern Methodist Hospital Association and appoints A. C. Millar to represent the Board at the next meeting, and O. L. Walker as his alternate.

Recognizing in the Baptist State Hospital at Little Rock a worthy cause of a great denomination in our own territory, where our own Church at present has no such institution, and learning that last year 120 Methodists were treated as charity patients at a cost of nearly \$5,000, we express our appreciation of its fine service to these sufferers of our own household and suggest that this great Protestant hospital in our midst deserves the encouragement and patronage of our people who are within reach of its facilities.

Regretfully accepting the resignation of Mrs. H. King Wade who

REPORT OF HOSPITAL-PRISON MISSION BOARD

To the Bishop and the Members of the Little Rock Annual Conference:
Dear Brethren:

We, your Board on Hospital-Prison Mission Work, beg to submit the following report:

This is our second report to the Little Rock Annual Conference, as our Board was formally organized in December, 1927. We rejoice in the good work of our superintendent in this needy field of worthy endeavor. The Board employed the Reverend D. H. Colquette to give as much of his time as possible to this special field of activity. During the year, he has visited a number of towns, made visits to prisons, hospitals and alms houses; attended a number of conferences, speaking briefly on his work; and has held religious services from time to time at various institutions to which he went.

He has also started libraries in several of the penal institutions and a number of good books and helpful magazines have been added.

The aim of the Hospital-Prison Mission Board, through Brother Colquette, is to minister unto the threefold nature of the inmates of the several penal and charitable institutions of Arkansas. Our Conference is the pioneer of this work in Southern Methodism. We are grateful for the cooperation of friends and institutions in this our second year of active work.

Growing out of the conditions above mentioned, and in view of the wide field to be covered, we make the following recommendations:

1. That each pastor pledge himself to cooperate in a whole-hearted way with the Board and superintendent in making this work a great success during the coming year.

2. That the Reverend D. H. Colquette be reappointed superintendent, with the assurance that the Conference will heartily back him in his work and that each presiding elder voluntarily support the work in the amount of \$50.000, or more if it is possible for him to do so.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

To the Little Rock Conference of the M. E. Church, South.

Dear Brethren:

In submitting its report, the Board of Lay Activities wishes to call attention to the commendable progress made during the year in the work of Laymen throughout the church as evidenced by reports received from the office of the executive secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities.

Methodist Layman

We renew our confidence in, and appreciation of, the Methodist Layman as one of the most valuable publications of the church, and urge concerted efforts on the part of both pastors and laymen to the end that the paper may have the widest possible circulation in this conference.

Layman's Day

We recommend that all churches observe Layman's Day on, or as near the first Sunday in June as practicable, with a service that shall bring before the general congregation the objects, aims and purposes of organized Lay work.

The Benevolences

With pastors and presiding elders, we rejoice in the fine showing made throughout the conference in the collection of the benevolent as-

sessments for the past year. It is our earnest desire to stimulate increased interest among all the laymen of the church to greater efforts in aiding pastors and presiding elders in the collection of these claims. We heartily concur with our General Board in its efforts to more thoroughly acquaint laymen with the purposes for which these funds are used. We most earnestly recommend that pastors encourage their lay leaders to renewed efforts in educating the congregation along these lines.

Christian Stewardship

We most heartily endorse the policy of including courses on Stewardship in the pastors schools and standard training schools. We point with satisfaction to the fact that approximately one hundred credits have been issued in our conference during the year on this subject. We recommend that special attention be given to the formation of stewardship classes in Sunday Schools running through a full quarters work. For this course, we most heartily recommend as a text, "THE STEWARDSHIP LIFE", by Dr. J. E. Crawford, which text has been approved by the General Sunday School Board.

Laymen's Course In Bible and Christian Service

We recommend the efforts of the General Board, in connection with the Sunday School Board, to develop a laymen's course in Bible and Christian Service and pledge our cooperation.

Wesley Brotherhoods

Our confidence in the Wesley Brotherhood as an effective agency for the promotion of Christian living among our men, has not abated, even though the progress has seemed slow. Pastors and Lay Leaders are urged to study the needs of their local churches and wherever deemed advisable, organize the Brotherhood.

A Spiritual Movement

Realizing that outward activities can be truly vitalized only by spiritual forces within, we appeal for cultivation of a deeper spiritual life on the part of our laymen. We recognize the great needs of personal evangelism that faces the church, and see in the growing policy of educational methods and personal activities and the enlistment of individual members in personal evangelism, one of the great movements in the church today. We pledge ourselves to foster this policy in every possible way, believing that we will thereby hold our laymen to the attainment of the highest ideal of life and service.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF MISSIONS**Report No. 1.**

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

Your Board of Missions desires to report upon the larger aspects of Missions before entering upon a consideration of our own conference missionary work.

The coming year marks the close of the first quadrennium of the new missionary policy of our Church, which provided for an intensive period of cultivation in January and February and a free-will missionary offering. The results of this policy are well known. It freed our Church of a crushing burden of debt. It stopped the annual deficits in our missionary budget. It enabled us to send out a corps of new missionaries to fill up the ranks which had been depleted. It saved our missionary work in the hour of seeming disaster. At the same time it has stimulated the missionary spirit and increased the missionary knowledge of the Church in a remarkable degree. During the quadrennium we will have placed more than 400,000 missionary books in the homes of our people, who do not, we fear, buy many religious volumes. This record is unapproached by any other denomination in the nation and will surely result in a deepening of spiritual life. The same could be said of the work of the district missionary institute, the schools of missions, and other features of the new policy.

This policy has laid work upon us all. Some have felt it to be irksome. But it has advanced the Kingdom of the Lord throughout the world and we are ready to gird our loins again in the supreme endeavor.

Your Board of Missions, therefore, proposes the following resolutions for your consideration and adoption:

1. We are grateful to God for the success of the Missionary cultivation movement during the past three years, and we congratulate and thank the presiding elders, pastors and people whose self-sacrificing work make such success possible.

2. We accept \$34,000, for the Love Gift as our part of the million dollar Maintenance Fund.

3. We elect the Reverend J. F. Simmons by request of the General Board of Nashville, Director of this Movement.

4. We elect the Reverend J. F. Simmons, Missionary Secretary of the Little Rock Conference and request the Bishop to accept him.

5. We pledge our hearty support to the movement during the coming year, pledging ourselves to work heartily for the success of the study period and to endeavor to raise the full share of our conference assessment in the free-will offering.

6. We respectfully ask our presiding elders to hold their missionary institutes, provided for in the Discipline, early in January, to make them wholly and distinctly missionary, and to name the exact dates and places for these institutes before the adjournment of this Conference.

Second, we call attention of the Church, ministry, laity and its constituency, to the free-will offering for the Maintenance Fund, which under the order of the General Conference, is taken in January and February.

Third, we urge that Missionary Voice Day be observed in every charge and that the week following Voice Sunday, the pastors and the Missionary Committee work in conjunction with the Woman's Missionary Society in a house to house canvass for the Missionary Voice with

the desire to put this valuable missionary journal into every Methodist home.

Fourth, in this report, we would suggest to our brethren to continue the work of educating our people until all of the conference claims are paid 100 per cent. If this can be accomplished, we will have our Conference on a sound basis.

Fifth, we appoint James Thomas and J. Frank Simmons to represent this Board on the Joint Commission on Rural Work.

Sixth, we recommend to the Bishop the appointment of the Reverend J. F. Taylor as District Missionary for the Texarkana District, and Jeff Smith for the Camden District. We nominate Rev. J. D. Hammons, D. D., clerical and W. R. Boney, Layman, for membership in the General Board of Missions.

REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

I will give my report under two general divisions:

I. Missionary Cultivation.

(1) Missionary institutes were held in all the districts with great enthusiasm and permanent results. Very few pastors in the whole Conference failed to attend these institutes. Large delegations of lay workers from most all the churches and charges in each district were present and revealed a keen interest in the missionary program of our Church. Every one of the presiding elders were whole-hearted in their support and co-operation. Without this help from the elders neither the cultivation nor the financial success could have been attained. The essential need and effectiveness of the presiding eldership is thrown in bold relief in such a program as we have.

(2) More mission study classes were held this year than ever before in our Conference. The pastors gave orders for 3,200 of the "Methodist evangel." This part of the work strikes at the real heart of the need of our Church. The mountain of missionary ignorance and indifference among too large a number of our membership is yet to be blasted by missionary information. This is a slow process but in the end large permanent results will be had.

(3) There has been a large increase in the number of mission courses given in connection with and through our Standard Training Schools. Such courses as "The Missionary Message of the Bible", "Missions in a Changing World", "Methodism and World Service", (a Cokesbury Course), "The Stewardship Life". The demand for mission courses is on the increase which is a healthy sign. A larger use is being made of the advantages offered by the General Board of Missions in the correspondence courses in missions which it offers. It also maintains a circulating library which is being used by many pastors. A large number of credits were issued from the secretary's office this year in the Local Church Department of the Enlarged Plan of Missionary Education.

II. Missionary Offerings.

It was a great pleasure to note how the people responded to the leadership of the presiding elders and pastors in the financial results. For the first time in the history of the Conference and I think in the history of the whole Church, we have an offering from every charge in the Conference. This shows a fine spirit of loyalty to our Church, both by the pastors and their people. Three districts—Camden, Little Rock and Monticello—more than reached their goals in the offering. Five districts—Arkadelphia, Camden, Monticello, Pine Bluff and Texarkana—have a larger total offering than last year. There are 77 charges in the Conference that have a larger offering than last year. I believe that this is a larger per cent of charges in this group than in any other conference in the connection. There are 12 charges with an offering the same as last year.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Dear Brethren:

During the year just closing, the number of Standard Training schools held was 36. This was an increase of 14 over the number held last year. In addition there were 40 Cokesbury Schools held. During the year three new experiments in Training Work have been tried out in this Conference. The first was a District-wide Extension Standard School held in the Monticello District. The second was a group of Standard Training Classes held simultaneously in the Camden District and another group held in Texarkana District. The third experiment was a District-wide Cokesbury Training Program held in the Prescott District. All these experiments proved so successful that we recommend their continuation.

The two sources of income for your Board are the Sunday School Day offerings and Conference Assessments. The income from Conference Assessment is \$208.00 less than last year. However, for the first time in its History, our Conference has paid in full its Sunday School

Day apportionment. This has helped to overcome the deficit caused by the decrease in amounts received from Conference Assessments. The Arkadelphia, Little Rock, Prescott, Monticello and Pine Bluff Districts paid their apportionments in full on the Sunday School Day offering with enough over to cover the small deficit in the other two districts. The District raising the largest amount over its apportionment was the Prescott District with Bro. J. A. Henderson as Presiding Elder and Mr. W. A. McKeowen as District Secretary.

Two Hundred and Seventy six schools have sent in \$8,098.00 for the Dual Mission Fund, representing an increase over last year of 34 participating schools remitting, an increase over last year of \$138.00. The increased number of participating schools reveals a growing interest in our Sunday School Extension Program under the capable leadership of Bro. Baugh. A large share of the credit for our splendid showing on Sunday School Day and Dual Missions must be given to our Presiding Elders and District Secretaries, who have given diligent attention to both of the causes.

We have elected the following to represent this Board on Joint Committees and Commissions:

With the Board of Education—F. A. Buddin.

On Board of Managers for Pastors' School—Paul W. Quillian.

With the Church Extension Board—J. L. Dedman.

On Rural Church Commission—C. E. Hayes.

Our Conference Superintendent is an ex-officio member of each of these committees and commissions.

Your Board plans to give special attention to the interpretation and placing of the new programs of work during the first half of the new Conference Year.

We had with us Rev. A. W. Martin from the General Sunday School Board and Rev. C. W. Lockey from the Texas Conference to confer with us with reference to our Rural Program.

We make the following recommendations for the following year for your approval:

First—That we make the one big objective of the year, the enlistment of 25,000 new pupils in our Sunday Schools.

Second—That we set as our goal a minimum offering of \$5,000.00 at Christmas Time for the Orphanage.

Third—That the same askings as last year be granted us by the Budget Commission.

Fourth—That the names of Sunday School Superintendents of the various charges in our Conference be published in the Conference Journal.

Fifth—We have elected Rev. S. T. Baugh as Extension Secretary and request that our Bishop appoint him to this position.

Sixth—We have elected Rev. Clem Baker as Conference Superintendent of Sunday School work and request that the Bishop appoint him to this position.

BOARD ON TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

Report No. 1

We, your Board, beg leave to make the following report:

The results of nearly ten years of national prohibition of the liquor traffic confirm the faith in the policy that had grown up in the minds of the friends of true temperance through 50 years or more of prohibition

by local and state elections. The power of the liquor traffic in creating appetites, corrupting morals, in controlling elections, and those elected, has been broken, if not destroyed. The best information available indicates that drinking and drunkenness under prohibition has been reduced from 75 to 90 per cent as compared with conditions under the saloon. Reports from colleges and schools and from other sources best acquainted with conditions among our youth now and then indicate that despite all the efforts being made to make our youth believe that everyone must drink to keep up with the times, these youths themselves are becoming more and more disgusted with such drinking as does exist and are gladly observing the prohibition laws.

We call the attention of our constituency to the report made by the Associated Press of July 28th, 1929, to the effect that the leading wet organization, the Association against Prohibition Amendment, has announced the employment of "371 writers and artists" with Irvin S. Cobb as Chairman, in its fight to destroy prohibition. We interpret this to mean that these "writers" are men and women who are engaged to write articles for newspapers and magazines denouncing prohibition and members of the staff of news-gathering agencies who are to furnish the newspapers with "news" stories unfriendly to the cause of prohibition similar to the "news" stories recently filling the press about alleged prohibition killers. These "artists" we understand to be cartoonists who are to furnish the press with cartoons ridiculing prohibition and prohibition leaders. We ask the Constituency of our Churches to accept what they see in the magazines and newspapers, whether cartoons, articles, or so-called "news" stories, as simply propaganda of the wet organization and to hold these magazines and newspapers which dish out such stuff as organs of the out-lawed liquor traffic.

We warn our people against being influenced by the attacks now filling our newspapers aimed to curtail the influence of our dry leaders. Our Anti-Saloon League is under special attack because of its effective fight for prohibition and they do not spare even the W. C. T. U.

We congratulate our Nation on the fact that its Chief Executive, President Herbert Hoover, not only observes these laws himself, but exerts the powerful influence of his office in a quiet, dignified, yet effective manner to secure the observance and enforcement of these laws. The result are apparent to the informed in most every nook and corner of our Nation.

We congratulate our Ambassador to Great Britain, General Charles Dawes, for the courageous stand he has taken before all the world in observance of the National policy. We say to our Constituency everywhere that there are millions of our best American Citizens who gladly observe our dry laws and are proud that we have them in spite of the effort made through the public press to convince them to the contrary. Except with a small per cent of the so-called upper class and most of the under-world, America is dry personally and politically. Those who violate these laws are encouraged by the wet leaders to flaunt their violations as defiantly as possible before the public. Let our people not be misled.

We wish to commend our denominational papers for giving space to

such information. We wish to commend our Editors for the Temperance Lessons in our Sunday School literature.

We wish to commend the Arkansas Anti-Saloon League in its splendid work of education along the line of Temperance and urge all our Preachers to give Brother Lossinger, the Superintendent, or his representatives an opportunity to speak to their congregations.

In order to counteract the poisonous effect of the false propaganda and that our people may have the truth, we recommend:

That our pastors inform themselves and preach upon this subject far more often than they are doing.

We recommend that A. C. Millar, B. A. Few, J. F. Simmons, A. E. Jacobs, W. C. Hilliard, and Levi Wilcoxen represent this Conference in the Anti-Saloon League Board of the State of Arkansas, and that the Board of Finance appropriate \$200.00 for the use of our Board.

will protect our people from the exploitation of the Holy Sabbath for commercial purposes. While we are opposed to any union of Church and State, we do claim the right of Churches and affiliated organizations to protect the morals of our people by any legitimate means available and to elect officials committed to such program.

Realizing the influence of example, we call upon all our ministers and members to abstain as far as practicable from all amusements and pursuits that violate even the spirit of the true observance of our Holy Sabbath and we suggest that our preachers on appropriate occasions preach upon the obligation of Christians to keep the Sabbath Day Holy.

CONSTITUTION

We, J. A. Henderson, James Thomas, R. W. McKay, J. A. Sage and L. B. Leigh, and our successors, desire to form a corporation, and for that purpose adopt the following constitution.

First. The name of said corporation shall be, The Board of Trustees of the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Second. The object of the corporation shall be to receive, hold and administer all moneys, funds and property, real and personal, that may from time to time come into its hands by donations, gifts, devise, bequests, or otherwise, for any of the uses, purposes and needs of the Little Rock Conference, particularly funds and property for the use of superannuated preachers of said Conference.

Third. Said Board is authorized to place at interest any and all funds that may come into its hands for the use and benefit of said Conference, and shall make a full and complete report of its acts and doings in that behalf to the annual meeting of said Little Rock Conference for approval, showing disposition of the interests and funds received provided always, the Board shall carry out the wishes of the donors of said funds or property.

Fourth. That the vacancies in said Board shall be filled by said Little Rock Conference, but in the interim such vacancies may be filled by the remainder of said Board and the persons so appointed shall hold office until the next meeting of said Conference.

Fifth. That the regular meeting of said Board shall be on the first day of the annual session of said Conference, and at the same place as the Conference is held. The first meeting shall be on the fifth day of March, 1899, at the city of Little Rock. Provided also: The President of the Board may call a meeting of the Board when deemed necessary.

Sixth. That the officers of said Board shall consist of a President, Secretary and Treasurer; who shall be elected two years, provided those elected at the first meeting shall hold until the regular annual meeting.

Seventh. Four members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Beacuse Hot Springs National Park, Arkansas, is, on account of its thermal and radio-active waters, recognized by the Federal Government and the medical profession as the greatest health resort in the world; because it is visited continually by vast multitudes, not merely of people from our own Southland but from the very ends of the earth, in search of health and rest; and because many in these multitudes need and would patronize a great sanitorium under distinctively religious and Protestant auspices, this city, strategically located at the geographical center of Southern Methodism, is a tremendous potential asset to the denomination that can and will utilize its unrivaled God-given resources;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Little Rock Annual Conference in session at Prescott, Arkansas, November 20-25, 1929, that we hereby memorialize our next General Conference to authorize and instruct our General Hospital Board to study the situation at Hot Springs National Park, Arkansas, and, as soon as conditions justify the undertaking to enterprise such a sanatorium as shall adequately represent our Church in its relation to this marvelous opportunity to co-operate with God in Christ's plan for the physical and spiritual health of humanity.

Revision of the Hymn Book

WHEREAS, the present music editions of our Methodist Hymnal in their arrangement make it difficult in attempting to sing and learn new melodies with the music on one page and the words often on the opposite page, we suggest and ask that authority be given our Hymn Book Commission at the proper time to order the publication of the book in a music edition with the words of each hymn placed within the musical staff and on the same page.

Revising Paragraph 44

We, the members of the Little Rock Annual Conference in session at Prescott, Arkansas, November 22, 1929, memorialize the General Conference to change Paragraph No. 44 of the Discipline so as to include the President of the Conference Woman's Missionary Society, the Conference Lay Leader, and the President of the Epworth League Conference, when eligible, as members of the Annual Conference.

Unified Financial Plan

The Little Rock Annual Conference hereby memorialize the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, to be held in Dallas, Texas, in May, 1930, to create a Special Committee of the General Conference to work out a unified financial plan along the following plan:

FIRST, The General Conference authorize an unified budget for the entire church, excepting items which shall be mentioned subsequently. The size of the budget for the operation of church enterprises to be determined by the anticipated income of the church through the regular assessment levied against or handed down to the several Annual Conferences.

SECOND, That the General Conference do not authorize any special or popular church-wide campaigns except as provided for in paragraphs 5 and 6.

THIRD, That the General Board of Finance continue under its present form or organization for the purpose of building up a general endowment fund for aged pastors and widows of deceased ministers and others. The General Conference to levy an assessment against the several Annual Conferences for an amount sufficient to cover the operating expenses of said Board.

FOURTH, That the General Hospital Board operate on the same general plan as indicated in Paragraph No. 3.

FIFTH, That the General Conference authorize the continuance of the Mission Special, but under a different title and plan. Let it be made a special under the title of "The World Advance Program" and that a popular campaign be put on during any sixty-day period from January 1st, to June 30th.

SIXTH, That the General Conference authorize the continuance of our Religious Educational Programs as now conducted by the Sunday just their expenditures and programs so as to operate within their income adopted by the General Conference for the approval of said Boards.

SEVENTH, That the General Conference Boards be required to adjust their expenditures and programs so as to operate within their income.

EIGHTH, That Question 31 in our Quarterly Conference Report be amended so as to include the Superannuates, making it homogeneous. That items under question 31, for ministerial support would be as follows: Presiding Elder, Pastor in Charge and Pastor Emeritus or Superannuate.

NINTH, That the General Conference urge every church to pay one-twelfth of its entire budget monthly, with the exception of the "World Advance Program," and the correlated religious educational programs which may be authorized by the General Conference and that this amount be paid in cash.

Unified Educational Program

WHEREAS: For a number of years the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has been enriching and expanding its program of enterprises and activities; and

WHEREAS: This expansion has increased the number of Boards

and agencies charged with responsibility for promoting various aspects of the program of the Church, and

WHEREAS, The expansion of the activities of these several Boards and agencies has led to much overlapping and duplication of work in the local church with a consequent added burden upon the leadership, confusion in program, and added financial responsibilities; and

WHEREAS: The most serious results of this overlapping and duplication are to be found in the educational efforts to the local church, and

WHEREAS: The demands of our modern life are such that the church shall conduct her work in harmony with tested business and educational principles and shall strive for business efficiency in the administration of her work; and

WHEREAS: The General Conference of 1926, meeting at Memphis, Tennessee, recognizing the need for the reorganization of certain agencies dealing with the work of the local church, appointed a Commission to work out a simplified plan of reorganizing the educational work of the local church so that it could all be brought into one organization; and

WHEREAS, Said Commission has spent three years of careful study and has published a plan based upon the needs of the local church which plan has been given large publicity, both by distribution of pamphlets and in the Church press;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Little Rock Annual Conference in session at Prescott, Arkansas, November 20th-24th, 1929, that we approve in principle the report of the Commission and memorialize the General Conference of 1930 to adopt the report of the Commission more effective; that we urge the election of the Board of Christian Education as provided for in the report of said Commission and grant to said Board large powers of discretion in working out the merger of the several Boards being absorbed in the new organization and that all details of the administration of education in the local Church be left for the determination of the Board in the light of conditions as they exist at the present time;

RESOLVED, SECOND, That we request the General Conference to empower the Board to be elected to make distinction in legislation between churches of various sizes in the matter of administration and supervision of its educational program.

RESOLVED, THIRD, That the delegates elected by this Conference are urged to give their support to the report of the Commission with such modifications as in their judgment will make more effective the plan of reorganizing the educational work of the local church.

RESOLUTIONS

Requesting the Return of Bishop Boaz

WHEREAS, the present session of the Little Rock Annual Conference and the approaching session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference to be held at Russellville, November 27th-December 1st, will complete the quadrennium of Bishop H. A. Boaz's services as presiding officer of these Conferences; and

WHEREAS, he has manifested an uniformly gentlemanly and

Christian attitude in conducting the multitudinous and trying duties of his position, including the responsibility of making so many appointments; and

WHEREAS, he has shown himself to be a fellow preacher with us; not an autocrat in his dealings with us; not cold and formal but friendly and companionable; not secluded and hard to approach but ever among us as a good brother; and

WHEREAS, he has given himself without stint to the entire program of the Church, setting an example of punctuality, indefatigable toil and Christian spirit; and

WHEREAS, under his splendid leadership, the Little Rock Annual Conference has made progress along all lines of Church endeavor, the total increase of payment of Conference Claims during this quadrennium being no less than a hundred thousand dollars; and

WHEREAS, we feel that under Bishop Boaz' administration much greater progress can be made during the next four years; and

WHEREAS, our Church is in the period of transition with reference to its educational problems throughout the Church in general and in the Little Rock Conference in particular;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we hereby express to Bishop Boaz our appreciation of his uniform courtesy, fairness and interest in all of our pastors, lay members and churches.

SECOND, that we request the College of Bishops, if consistent with their views of the policy of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, to return Bishop Boaz to this Conference for another quadrennium;

THIRD, that a copy of these resolutions be sent to the Secretary of the Committee on Assignments of the College of Bishops, a copy given to Bishop Boaz and copies be furnished the Arkansas Methodist and the (Nashville) Christian Advocate.

THEREFORE, Resolved by the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in session at Prescott, Arkansas, that the Congress of the United States be respectfully requested to amend the preamble to our constitution, placing the name of God therein, and submit the same to the legislatures of the several states for ratification.

RESOLVED, further, that a copy of this resolution be sent to each membtr in Congress of Arkansas.

WHEREAS: There is an ever increasing demand on the circuit preacher which has increased his expenses until it works hardships on him and his family; and

WHEREAS: There is a desire on the part of this Conference to remedy this condition,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: 1. That the presiding elders be directed to appoint early in the ensuing year a committee on boundaries in each district.

2. That these committees be instructed to make a careful survey of the circuits in the district, and recommend consolidation or merging to such an extent, if possible, that each resulting circuit will be able to pay not less than twelve hundred dollars for the support of the pastor.

3. That where a circuit is unable to pay twelve hundred dollars for the support of the pastor, it be designated as a mission circuit and the Board of Missions be so advised.

4. That the Board of Missions be asked to provide funds to support such missions not to exceed twelve hundred dollars for the pastor, this to include the amount raised on the charge.

5. That the Bishop and his Cabinet be urged to form these charges, as recommended by the District Conferences so far as it may be expedient, at the next session of the Annual Conference.

Memoirs

REV. JOHN R. RUSHING.

Rev. John R. Rushing was the son of Mr. and Mrs. B. B. Rushing, and was born in Ouachita County, Arkansas, Feb. 1st, 1855. He finished his course on earth Dec. 29th, 1928. He was married to Miss Laura Ella Burleson, Dec. 26th, 1875. Six children were born to their union, all of whom died in childhood save one, Dr. Henry C. Rushing, of Mena, Arkansas, who was the joy and comfort of his father in his declining years. He is also survived by his wife; one brother, Mr. A. S. Rushing, of El Dorado, Arkansas; one sister, Mrs. W. H. Willis, of Chidester, Arkansas, and a large circle of near relatives and friends.

He was reared in a Christian home and was converted and joined the Methodist church when about 19 years of age. He was licensed to preach at some time during the year 1886, Rev. John J. Jenkins, of blessed memory, being his Presiding Elder at the time. At the session of the Little Rock Conference held in Pine Bluff in 1889, Bishop Hendrix presiding, he was admitted on trial in the traveling connection. His first charge was Portland and Parkdale. The other charges served by him during the thirty-two years of his active ministry were, in the order named, Buckner, Hillsboro, Buckner, Carolina, Hickory Plains, Asbury, Little Rock, Washington, Princeton, Foreman, Stephens and Waldo, Park Avenue, Hot Springs, Huttig, Horatio, Carr Memorial, Pine Bluff, Mena, Emmett, and Murfreesboro.

At the close of the conference year of 1921 he was granted a superannuate relation since which time he and his wife have made their home at Mena, Arkansas, which place is also the home of their son. For two years after his superannuation he served a small charge near Mena as supply pastor.

Brother Rushing was a genial, warm hearted, lovable man; a good preacher, and a faithful and highly acceptable pastor. He was always loved and honored by the people whom he served. His ministry was fruitful in the conversion of sinners and the edification of believers. He was greatly beloved by his brethren of the conference. He had not been able to attend a session of the conference during the past few years but his brethren held him in loving remembrance, and feel a deep sense of loss in his death.

The final summons came suddenly. He had gone to the County Court House in Mena to officiate at the marriage of two of his friends, and just as he was ready to begin the marriage service he sank unconscious to the floor and died in a few moments. Like Enoch, "He walked with God and was not, for God took him."

REV. ROBERT J. RAIFORD.

After many years of great bodily affliction and almost constant suffering our beloved friend and brother, Rev. Robert J. Raiford has entered into rest. He was born March 25th, 1851; was gloriously converted Sept. the 8th, 1871, was licensed to preach April 27th, 1884. His first marriage was to Miss Minnie Thompson, in Calhoun County, Arkansas, in the year 1872. Two children were born to this union, John and Oscar. His wife died in 1882 and in 1884 he was married to Miss Elizabeth Robinson, of the same county. Six children were born to their union—William, Lottie, Nettie, Norman, Benjamin and Verda. Only four of these children lived to witness the death of their father. They are Oscar, of Mineral Springs, Arkansas; William and Benjamin, of Magnolia, Arkansas, and Nettie, (Mrs. James Gantt) of Texarkana, Texas.

His second wife died in the year 1907 and on Jan. 20th 1909, he was married to Miss Annie Elizabeth Tucker of Hamburg, Arkansas, who cared for him tenderly and skillfully during the long years of his illness, and who still lives to cherish his memory.

He was admitted on trial in the Little Rock Annual Conference at the session held in the city of Little Rock in 1887; was ordained a local deacon by Bishop Key in 1888; and was ordained an elder by Bishop Duncan in 1891. His active ministry covered a period of only 18 years, as he was placed on the supernumerary list at the Conference session of 1905 and on the superannuated list a few years later, which relation he continued to sustain to the conference to the close of his life.

Following the retirement from the active work he established his home at Magnolia Arkansas where he continued to live until some four years ago when he moved to Texarkana where he finished his earthly pilgrimage Feb. 5th, 1929. While living at Magnolia he was quite active for many years in supplying needy churches and charges in that session of the state. The people of Magnolia and of Columbia County showed their high appreciation of him by electing him as their County Treasurer, which important office he filled for four years with credit to himself and satisfaction to the citizens.

Bro Raiford was a warm hearted, sweet spirited, lovable man. Best of all he was genuinely and fervently religious. His ministry was fruitful in the conversion of sinners and the edification of believers. He lived the religion which he preached and all who knew him felt the impress of his earnest and unselfish spirit.

His final passing was peaceful and triumphant. He had longed to "Depart and be with Christ." He knew that he had come to the end of the journey and with his wife and all of his living children about him, and his mind perfectly clear he breathed his last as sweetly as an infant might fall asleep in its mothers arms.

We carried his body to Magnolia where he had lived so many years, and where he was known and loved by so many people. A large company of sorrowing friends came to the church that they might look once more on his familiar face and do honor to his memory. The writer of this memoir, who had known and loved him for more than forty years, conducted the funeral service, in which he was assisted by brothers Freeman,

Hoover, Armstrong, Holland, and Baker, after which the Masonic fraternity bore his body to the grave, where the beautiful and impressive burial ritual of that order was read and his mortal remains committed to the grave. His body rests in that beautiful old cemetery where sleep the bodies of Charles B. Brinkley, James R. Harvey and a great company of God's saints. His brethren of the Conference cherish his memory and expect to meet him again.

REV. ALONZO MONK.

Rev. Alonzo Monk, D. D., of the Little Rock Conference, and for nearly a half century one of the towering ministers of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, ascended on January 11, 1929, from his home in Benton, Ark.

Dr. Monk was a son of Rev. Francis Marion Monk and Margaret Henderson Monk. He was born at Sparta, Bienville Parish, Louisiana, April 25, 1852. At the early age of six he united with the Methodist church. He joined the Little Rock Conference, at DeWitt, Ark., in 1872, and was an active itinerant minister for 55 years. In 1927 he was granted the superannuate relation.

Dr. Monk had a remarkably rich and distinguished ministry. He occupied many of the great pulpits of Southern Methodism, and was a tower of strength. He possessed the personality, the voice, the flashing eye, and the natural eloquence of the orator. His language was chaste and beautiful. He had the tread of a king. Erect and impressive, commanding and sure, he inspired a following. In his palmy days he was in constant demand for sermons, addresses, lectures, weddings, funerals, and special conference occasions. He was a master of assemblies. Aristocratic, autocratic and imperious, seemingly, he was withal a man of tender heart and beautiful soul. His ideals were lofty and no stain ever rested upon his ministerial escutcheon.

Dr. Monk rose rapidly to prominence as a minister. After serving a large circuit as his first appointment, he was, in 1876, stationed at the Spring Street Church, Little Rock—now the Winfield Church—where he remained for a full quadrennium. From Little Rock he was sent to Camden, Ark., where he had a highly successful ministry. Then he was transferred to Tuscaloosa, Ala.; thence to First Church, Anniston; thence to Central Church, Memphis—now St. John's Church; thence to Mulberry Street Church, Macon, Ga.; thence to Centenary Church, Chattanooga; thence to Court Street Church, Knoxville; thence to St. Mark's Church, Atlanta; thence to First Church, Fort Worth; and thence to Broadway, Louisville, Ky. His ministry at these great churches drew vast crowds and his fame as a "pulpit giant" went abroad.

In 1909, Dr. Monk transferred back to the Little Rock Conference where his ministry had begun. He was assigned to the Little Rock District, where he served—in all—seven and half years. He swept over his "ecclesiastical territory" like a meteor across the sky. His very name drew a large hearing. He served Central Church, Hot Springs—now First Church—and spoke to "the ends of the earth" from that famous pulpit, where later his eloquent son, Dr. Marion S. Monk, ministered for

a full quadrennium. After serving the Arkadelphia District of the Little Rock Conference, he was pastor for four years at First Church, Hope; thence he went to Lonoke; thence to Fairview, Texarkana, and thence to Benton, in which little city he "waited to hear the rustle of an angel's wing."

Dr. Monk was married in 1877 to Miss Elizabeth Wilkinson Carl—a woman of distinguished family and rich intellect and fine culture. After these two had walked arm in arm through the Garden of the Years for nearly five decades, the "helpmeet indeed" ascended on October 4, 1924. Of this happy union five children were born. Norman Monk died at the age of 17. He is survived by three distinguished sons—Attorney Carl Monk of McAlester, Okla.; Rev. Alonzo Monk Jr., a general evangelist of Southern Methodism, whose headquarters are Dallas, Tex., and Rev. Marion S. Monk, pastor of the First Methodist Church, Monroe, La. One daughter also survives, Mrs. Era Monk Bryan, wife of Rev. Gid J. Bryan, pastor of First Church, Gatesville, Tex.

On September 4, 1925, Dr. Monk was married to Miss Mary Scott, of Benton, Ark., a product of one of the best families of the state. Into his last years she brought love and tender ministries. She survives him, as do eight grandchildren, a sister, and three brothers.

The writer's close association with Dr. Monk for a long term of years enabled him to get an insight into his soul. I walked with him and talked with him in his hour of joy and sorrow, pleasure and pain, gain and loss. I was with him when his Gethsemane came. I knew his heart-language. I could interpret his dominant emotions. I was in position to understand his viewpoints and outlooks. In his death, Methodism has lost one of her greatest sons and mightiest gospel preachers. He hated shams and despised intrigues. He seemed never to have learned the way of circumlocution.

Bishop H. A. Boaz—his warm friend of the years—delivered a Masterly funeral message at Benton on January 14, to a great concourse of people. Preachers from all over the Conference gathered to honor his character and ministry. Rev. J. Wayne Mann, presiding elder of the Arkadelphia District, presided and read the Old Testament Scripture. Prayer was offered by Rev. J. J. Stowe, D. D., of the Camden District. Prayer was also offered by the venerable Dr. W. M. Hayes. At the grave at Little Rock, Bishop Boaz and Dr. Thomas officiated.

REV. A. G. CASON.

About nine o'clock in the evening of June 27, 1929, Rev. Albert Galatin Cason came to the end of his earthly pilgrimage at the home of his daughter, Mrs. G. C. Jones, in Watson, Arkansas.

He was born in Yazoo City, Mississippi, January 12, 1856. In early manhood he moved to Ashley County, Arkansas, where he continued to live until he became a member of the Little Rock Conference. He was married to Miss Callie Berry, of Fountain Hill, Arkansas, December 14th, 1879, who with six children survives him. The surviving children are three sons, E. M. and Jack of Fountain Hill and V. C. of Little Rock; three daughters, Mrs. A. L. Campbell, of Monticello, Mrs. G. C. Jones, of

Watson; and Mrs. W. D. Prickett, of Round Lake, Miss. One fine manly boy, William, gave up his life "Somewhere in France" and the tidings of his death cast a shadow over the cheerful, sunny spirit of the father which was never wholly lifted on earth. May we not cherish the hope that the shadow is gone now as he dwells with "Bill" in the light of eternal day.

He was licensed to preach in the year 1886 and for nearly twenty years he rendered faithful and efficient service as a local preacher, occasionally serving as a supply on small circuits adjacent to his home. At the session of the Conference held at Arkadelphia in 1909 he was appointed to supply the Atlanta circuit which he served three years. His work as a supply pastor was so highly acceptable and efficient that at the Conference of 1911, held at Fordyce, he was admitted on trial in the traveling connection. The action of the Conference in admitting him when he was 55 years of age was most unusual but was due to the fact that he had rendered such long and efficient service as a local preacher, and also to the high esteem in which he was held by the members of the body. Two years later he was duly admitted into full connection and for ten years following his admission on trial he rendered faithful and efficient service in the pastorate, serving Strong circuit one year; Buena Vista four years; Magnolia circuit one year; Edinburgh circuit one year; Swan Lake one year; Rolla one year, and Fountain Hill one year. At the session of the Conference held in 1921 he was granted the superannuate relation which he sustained until his death.

After his superannuation he bought a home in Monticello where he was living when called by death to the home on high.

In his death our Little Rock Conference has lost one of its truest and worthiest members. He was a good man and a faithful minister of the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. He was a man of strong convictions, positive character, and unswerving fidelity. He loved the Lord fervently and the Methodist church passionately. He knew and loved the doctrines and polity of his church. He did not boast, or dispute, about these things but his own mind and heart found rest in them, and his life was greatly enriched by them.

The final summons came to him suddenly and without warning. He was visiting his son-in-law and daughter in their home at Watson and when the family retired at night he remarked that he was not sleepy, and would sit on the porch for a little while. In a few minutes his daughter heard him struggle and when she reached him he was dead. His loved ones and friends know that he was ready to meet his Lord with joy and gladness. His body rests in the old burying ground at Flat Creek, near Fountain Hill, and we confidently believe that his redeemed spirit is at home with God.

The writer of these lines had known and loved him for nearly thirty years and there is a deep sense of loss in his heart as he closes this imperfect sketch of his life, and tribute to his memory.

MRS. A. J. EWING.

Mrs. Ellen Estes Ewing was born near Lebanon, Tennessee, August the 22nd, 1855. In early childhood her family moved to the state of Kentucky where she grew to womanhood and was married to Rev. A. J. Ewing March 25rd, 1882. Six years later brother Ewing was admitted on trial in the annual conference and after spending some twenty-three years in school and pastoral work in Kentucky and Tennessee he was transferred in 1911 from the Tennessee to Little Rock Conference, of which body he is still an honored and beloved superannuated member.

Sister Ewing was a true itinerant in spirit and practice. She shared with her husband the hardships and privations of the traveling ministry without murmuring or complaint. She loved the work of the church was especially active in the work of the Womans Missionary Society. She read with her husband the entire course of study required of Methodist preachers, and was exceptionally well informed touching both the doctrines and polity of her church, and the current events in the life of the church in her own time.

She was a woman of very pronounced views and positive convictions. She believed that the law of tithing was still in force and she was always careful to set apart at least one tenth of her income for the causes of the kingdom of God. Her opinions and ideas were so definite and positive that those who did not know her intimately some times thought that she was lacking in the grace of forbearance and charity, but those who really knew her knew the kindness of her heart, and the genuineness of her love to God and to all good people.

Having no children of her own her heart was especially tender towards the young people and the children. She loved them always and was loved and honored by them in every place where she was known.

It was my privilege to be associated with brother and sister Ewing, as their presiding elder, during the last year of their active service and I can never forget how courageously and beautifully she approached the dreaded ordeal of superannuation. Both were well advanced in years and broken in health so they quietly stepped out of the ranks of the active workers and found a little home in Mena, Arkansas, among kind and appreciative friends, where they have lived for the past eight years.

On Nov. 21st, the very first day of the new conference year, sister Ewing passed to her eternal home in the city of God. I wonder how many others will follow her from our ranks before the circle of the years runs its course? May we, like her, be ready when the summons comes.

Besides her sorrowing husband she leaves an only sister, Mrs. M. M. Worldly, and two brothers, D. D. and J. G. Estes, to mourn her loss. They "know where to find her."

MRS. MARTHA ALICE ROBERTSON

Martha Alice, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Caruth, was born in Washington, Ark., March 8, 1864, and died at the home of her son, Glenn Caruth Robertson, in Texarkana, Ark., January 4, 1929—age 64 years, 9 months, 26 days. Mrs. Robertson was the second child in a family of ten children, and is survived by only two of them, who are respec-

tively, Mrs. T. O. Owen, wife of our pastor at Bauxite, Ark., and Mr. Hugh Caruth, of Nashville, Ark.

You cannot appraise at its proper value any life, unless you know in some measure the history of the family out of which it sprang.

The home of W. H. Caruth was inwrought as a household word in the memories of all pioneer preachers of Southwest Arkansas. His home was their home, and many weary prophets have found an oasis of rest and refreshment under the roof of this good man. Thus his children came to know intimately all the great preachers of the state, and many beyond the borders of the state. Brother Caruth was Superintendent of the Sunday school at Washington for twenty years, saw much service on the board of stewards, and was chairman of that board for many years. Martha Alice used to say of her father and mother that they "cast their bread upon the waters," and it returned unto them in the shape of preacher sons-in-law. In such a home Martha Alice grew to womanhood. Her education fitted her for the best society in the state, or out of it. She was educated in music, and was one of the best choir directors that ever worked in the church of the great southwest.

In 1885, Martha Alice was married to Rev. A. M. Robertson, and later on plunged with her husband into the work of the ministry of her church. It is impossible to think of the life of the one without the other. For while her husband gave himself to preaching, and the tasks of the ministry of his day, Mrs. Robertson busied herself in other tasks as important as was the work of preaching. She sought out young people, made friends with them, and literally lead hundreds of them into active Christian service. She may well be designated the first director of Religious Education the church had in the southwest. She was that without knowing it. That was before religion, or education either, became so technical.

To this union were born two sons, who still live, and they are respectively, Mr. Glenn Caruth Robertson, of Texarkana, Ark., and Mr. Hugh Winfield Robertson, of New York City. Both the sons were highly educated and are a monument to the Christian home out of which they came.

In the spring of 1919, Mrs. Robertson lost her husband after the brief illness of one week. This was the severest blow that ever came to this faithful heart. But she lived through it all, and came back stronger than ever in the faith by which she had lived.

It is with women as it is with men, some have five talents, others two, others one, and some apparently, none at all. Mrs. Robertson had five talents, and the Vineyard would have done better if the Lord had made it eleven long time ago. She had literary gifts which were rare, and these she indulged much to the delight of a wide circle of readers. She wrote short stories of a high order. The last few years of her life were employed in creating a book of these which she had named—"Cutting Wisdom Teeth." It was to have been a book of short stories of her life as the wife of a minister in Arkansas. We are all poorer because her untimely death came before this task was finished.

The sickness and death of Mrs. Robertson came as a shock to the hundreds of boys and girls whom she had lead into the church. Time had scattered us all over several states. But of all that group whose lives

had been touched by hers, there was not one who did not receive the news of Mrs. Robertson's death with a pang. She was our friend. She loved us when we were young people, and had sympathy for us in all the problems of our lives.

But the weary heart had worked a long time. The tired brain must rest. So with great peace of mind, while her lips still moved in declaration of the goodness of God, on January 4, 1929, the white soul slipped away to God from whence it came. Funeral services were conducted by Dr. F. M. Freeman, pastor of the First Methodist Church, of Texarkana, assisted by the other resident pastors of the city, and the frail body was laid to rest in the cemetery by her husband, in Texarkana.

MRS. ELLA CATHERINE PIPKIN

Mrs. Ella Catherine Pipkin, daughter of Rev. Horace and Mattie Powell Jewell, was born in Camden, Ark., September 17, 1862, and died at her home in Arkadelphia, Ark., June 7, 1929—age 66 years, 8 months, 20 days.

In order that you may have some adequate appreciation of Ella Catherine, it will be necessary to take you back a generation, and acquaint you with the home out of which she came. Her father was an itinerant Methodist preacher for 62 years. He came to our state from the Memphis Conference in his early ministry, and was the first station preacher in the city of Monticello, in the year 1855. From that date to the day of his death in 1917, the name of Horace Jewel is so inwrought in the history of Arkansas Methodism, that you would have little of value left, if you should leave out the record of his great life.

The biggest thing he ever did was to marry Mattie Powell, of Camden, Arkansas. Mattie Powell was one of those unusual spirits; deeply spiritual, a graduate of one of our Kentucky colleges and possessed of an air of refinement which made her the center of any circle in which she chanced to be thrown. To such a union, Ella Catherine was born. We are now prepared to expect just any thing, since the preacher's children are said to be the worst that grow up in any community.

One of the first experiences which came into the life of Ella Catherine was the early death of her mother. This occurred while Ella was a little school girl twelve years of age. Get the picture. An itinerant minister, subject to the ministerial appointment of his church, with two little motherless girls, idols of his heart, on his hands. How it came about, I was not informed. But both Ella Catherine and her younger sister, Nann, were placed in the home of the late E. H. McDaniel, of Arkadelphia. He looked after the comfort, health, and education of the little girls. No one has yet told half of the beautiful story of the life of E. H. McDaniel. No one ever will.

The next glimpse we get of Ella Catherine, she is a college girl in the city of Little Rock. Here she matriculated in the one-time famous Warner Academy, a college for girls. In this she was very fortunate, for Mrs. Warner was the most remarkable woman in the educational life of the state at that time. She was the only lady in the state, so far as my knowledge goes, upon whom the degree of LL. D. was ever conferred.

From this history making institution, Ella Catherine Jewell graduated with the degree of A. M. and was almost immediately elected to a place in the faculty of the school and placed in charge of the departments of Mathematics and English.

In 1884, she was married to Rev. E. M. Pipkin, pastor of First Church Pine Bluff. With all the arder of her soul, she believed in the ministerial calling, and set herself to the task of building the parsonage home of her husband.

To this union were born eight children, seven of whom survive, and constitute one of the most remarkable families to be found any where. They are respectively, Edgar, a prominent lawyer of Helena, Ark.; Jewel, now Mrs. E. P. Lindsay, of Pine Bluff; Mrs. Ruth P. Suits, of Altimer; John G. of Little Rock; Alice, now Mrs. Henry P. Owen, of Newport; Ella, now Mrs. Croker, of Arkadelphia, and Dr. Charles W. Pipkin, of Baton Rouge, La. All the children received a college education, and some of them have won distinction in the field of university work.

In 1914, Mrs. Pipkin moved with her husband and the younger children to Arkadelphia, where a home was bought for the family, and where they have lived ever since. Mrs. Pipkin identified herself with the best life of the town, the college, and the church. She taught the adult women's Sunday school class so long and so well that it is now difficult to get any body else to undertake it. She was so intimately connected up with the devotional life of the Missionary Society, that even this band of consecrated workers now feel as if they are bereft of the shepherdess.

It would be difficult to say in what virtues Mrs. Pipkin excelled. She had them all. But if I may point out a few of her outstanding qualities, let me place at the head of the list—

1. Poise. She never lost her head about anything. Others might get excited over certain matters in the ongoing of life. Not so with her. She was born within the sound of the artillery of the battle of Jenkins Ferry, and reared during the dark days of reconstruction, when men's hearts were failing on every hand. But she kept her poise.

2. Mrs. Pipkin was an ideal mother. She knew the hearts of the children, and anticipated the very drift of their thought. Her children went to her with their problems, and so did her husband. She had help for them all, and room for all in her great soul.

3. She was the most outstanding woman in the church of Arkadelphia. This would have been true had she lived in any other city in the state. And the thought that comes to me is, how shall we ever get on without her. And yet we must submit—

"God doeth all things well,

We say it now with tears.

But we shall sing it with those we love

Through the bright eternal years."

Mrs. Mattie J. Biggs, widow of the late Rev. J. A. Biggs of the Little Rock Conference, was the daughter of J. H. and Sarah E. Dorsey,

of Howard County, Arkansas. She was born September the 27th, 1856; married to Rev. J. A. Biggs, October the 18th, 1874. For more than forty years she was the wife of an itinerant Methodist preacher whose labors extended over a large territory in Arkansas and a number of charges in Texas—her husband having spent several years as a member of the West Texas Conference. She was a good woman and until disabled by serious chronic disease she was active in the work of the church, and in the care of her home. While not confined to her bed she had been a constant sufferer for many years before her death which occurred at the home of her son, Mr. H. W. Biggs, at Clarksville, Arkansas, February the 25th, 1929. The circumstances of her death were very sad as she died from severe burns received when her clothing caught fire from a gas heater which she was trying to light.

She leaves two children, the son referred to above, and one daughter, Mrs. Olivia Brown, of San Antonio, Texas. Two sisters, Mrs. J. H. Skinner of Cove, Arkansas, and Miss Sallie Dorsey of Mena, Arkansas, are the only near relatives who survive her. She had outlived nearly all of her immediate family and friends and doubtless found that she knew more people in heaven than she knew on earth at the time of her departure.

Her body was brought to the home of her sister at Cove, Arkansas, where her funeral service was conducted by this writer and her remains buried in the cemetery at that place. Doubtless her storm tossed soul has entered the eternal harbor of rest and peace.

Reports of the audits were sent in as follows: Sunday School Board, Ralph Thomas, auditor: "I have verified the report of the Little Rock Conference Sunday school Board and find it correct." Board of Missions, Orphanage Board, Board of Trustees, Mr. R. G. McDaniel, auditor of each report: "I have examined the report of the treasurer and find it correct." Board of Finance, Board of Lay Activities, Church Extension Board, Epworth League Board, Conference treasurer, Hospital-Prison Missions Board, Board of Education, Mr. A. B. Simmons, auditor. In transmitting his reports Mr. Simmons writes:

"As a general rule the different treasurers have their accounts in good shape. Owing to the few number of checks and deposits received by the Board books have not been kept, but they have made out their reports from the check stubs and duplicate deposit slips. I have checked these deposit slips and cancelled checks and find practically all correct as shown in the "minutes."

"I would suggest that some of the treasurers be a little more particular with their bank accounts. If they would get a check book with three checks to the page they could keep their deposits right on the check stubs and it would be much easier to check at the end of the year and also would be easier for them to make out their reports to conference."
