The Centenary Celebration

A notable feature of the hospitality of Lakeside Church, the host of the Conference at its 1930 session, was the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the organization of the first Methodist Church in Pine Bluff. The event took place in the evening of November 11, the day before the regular opening of the Conference. A committee of which Mr. H. C. Couch was chairman decided upon the general plan of the celebration. It had two main features, a parade and a play. The play was written by Mrs. C. W. Turpin of Nashville, Tennessee, the episodes being suggested by Miss Vivien Hill, of Hendrix-Henderson College, who also directed the preparation of the play. The players were students of Hendrix-Henderson.

The parade, starting at the Lakeside Church, was led by the Shrine band, members of the city police department, and an American Legion float, fittingly commemorating Armistice Day. The parade had twenty floats all arranged to be authentically historical. The Hendrix-Henderson band was a feature of the parade.

The play was given at the Saenger theater. There were three episodes; the first, life in an early settler's home; the second, a religious service conducted by Mahlon Bewley in a cabin home; the third, the first Annual Conference in Arkansas, held at Batesville in 1836.

The celebration was a marked success as an entertainment, a stimulant to historical interest, and as an inspiration to share the spirit of devotion and courage that characterized our early religious leaders.

MINUTES LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE

STANDING RULES

1. *Nominations.* The presiding elders shall be a standing committee on nominations, and shall nominate all members of the quadrennial boards and annual committees; also the Conference Treasurer.

2. *Undergraduates.* Undergraduates who remain in the same class more than two successive years will be discontinued or located unless they are in school. Extraordinary circumstances and a two-thirds vote of the Conference will be necessary to override this rule.

3. *Conference Program.* The pastor-host of the Conference, the presiding elder in whose district the Conference session is held, and the chairman of the Committee on Evangelism, shall constitute a Committee on Conference Program. This committee shall arrange, not less than sixty days before the Conference meets, for all preaching or other inspirational services, and select the speakers for each service. The program made by this committee shall be subject to revision as the exigencies of any situation may require or the Conference direct.

4. *Conference Treasurer.* The Conference shall elect quadrennially a Conference treasurer who shall give bond to the Board of Trustees in such sum as the Conference may determine, and who shall receive and disburse such funds as the Conference may direct. The premium on the treasurer's bond shall be paid out of the Conference expense fund.

5. *Auditing Accounts.* The books of the Conference treasurer and of the treasurer of each Conference Board shall be audited annually within sixty days after the adjournment of the Conference session, by a qualified public accountant, such accountant to be employed by the Secretary of the Conference and paid out of the Conference expense fund. The reports of the accountant shall be filed with the Conference Secretary, and the results thereof published in the Conference Journal.

6. *Financial and Statistical.*

(1) All assessments for Conference claims and all reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars with no columns for cents.

(2) Each pastor shall settle with the Conference treasurer, and turn over his statistical reports with the treasurer's receipt attached, the first day of the Conference.

(3) The presiding elders will furnish the statistical secretary with all assessments on pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the annual Conference meets.

7. *Conference Claimants.* The Board of Finance shall co-operate with the Board of Trustees in securing homes for Conference Claimants and additional donations to the Conference Superannuate Endowment Fund. Such homes and funds shall be held in trust by the Board of Trustees.

8. *Memoirs of Preachers' Wives.* Memoirs of preachers' wives who have died shall be read at the Memorial session of the Conference and published in the Conference Journal, and preachers' wives shall be invited to take part in the Memorial session.

9. *Conference Expense Fund.* The Budget Committee shall make

an assessment for a Conference expense fund to cover the cost of all clerical work necessary in preparing Conference records, printing and distributing the Conference Minutes, for preserving Conference records and documents, and all legitimate expenses incurred by the Conference Secretary and the Conference Treasurer in carrying out the orders of the Conference. The Conference Treasurer shall be custodian of this fund which shall be paid out on the order of the Conference Secretary.

10. *Reports and Resolutions.* All reports, resolutions and other papers intended for publication in the Conference Minutes shall be typewritten and in triplicate.

11. *History Commission.* There shall be a self-perpetuating History Commission composed of five clerical members of the Conference, one of whom shall be the Secretary of the Conference, whose duty it shall be to collect and preserve biographical data of clerical members of the Conference, data of all kinds that promise to be of historical interest and value, the Conference records, and other documents of historical value. The Commission shall make a quadrennial report to the Conference at the session next following the General Conference.

12. *Lay Representation.* Lay representation in District Conferences shall consist of four members elected by the Quarterly Conference of each pastoral charge. Alternate delegates shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference.

13. *Repealed.* All actions and parts of actions of the Conference, which may be construed as standing rules, which were taken prior to the annual session of 1928, and which are not contained in, or are in conflict with the foregoing rules are hereby repealed.

14. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided that the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing a day before the vote is taken.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE JOURNAL

Seventy-Seventh Session

FIRST DAY—WEDNESDAY MORNING SESSION

Conference Opened.—The Little Rock Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, met in its seventy-seventh session in the Lake Side Methodist Church in Pine Bluff, Arkansas, at 8:30 a. m., November 12th, 1930, with Bishop Hoyt M. Dobbs presiding. The Bishop led the devotional services using the first Psalm as the Scripture lesson, and, assisted by the presiding elders, administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

Secretaries.—The roll of the Conference was called. C. J. Greene was elected Secretary, Clem N. Baker, A. J. Christie and Claud R. Roy, assistant Secretaries, Roy Fawcett Statistical Secretary, and T. M. Lee, J. D. Rogers, Neill Hart, A. W. Hamilton, Coy Whitten, Arthur Terry and D. T. Rowe, assistant Statistical Secretaries.

Bar.—A line running across the auditorium even with the inner end of the middle aisle was made the bar of the Conference.

Conference Sessions.—A motion carried to hold the Conference sessions from 8:30 a. m. to 12 m., and from 1:45 to 2:45 p. m. until further ordered.

Welcome.—Mr. Verginius Mead, chairman of the Board of Stewards of Lakeside Methodist Church, spoke words of welcome to the Conference to which the Bishop responded in behalf of the Conference.

Board of Christian Education.—A resolution was passed fixing the number of members of the Conference Board of Christian Education at twenty-two.

Diamond Jubilee.—The Conference's participation in celebrating the Diamond Jubilee of the Publishing House was made the order of the day at 10 o'clock Thursday.

Introduced.—The following were introduced: Dr. R. S. Satterfield, of the Oklahoma Conference; Dr. O. E. Goddard of the General Board of Missions; Rev. J. T. Ditterline, Rev. W. C. House, and Dr. W. P. Whaley, all of the North Arkansas Conference; Judge J. G. Barnett, representing the General Hospital Board; Dr. J. H. Reynolds, President of Hendrix-Henderson College; Dr. G. T. Rowe, of Duke University; Dr. George Sexton, President of Centenary College; Dr. Horace M. Whaling, Vice-president of Southern Methodist University; and Dr. Holmes, Pastor of the Ohio Street Baptist Church in Pine Bluff.

Rural Church.—A resolution was adopted requesting the Bishop to appoint a committee of seven to cooperate with a similar committee of

the North Arkansas Conference in studying the problems of the rural Church.

Number of Districts.—A resolution was adopted requesting the Bishop to appoint a committee of five to cooperate with a similar committee from the North Arkansas Conference in studying the question of reducing the number of presiding elders' districts in the two conferences.

Boards and Committees.—The presiding elders made their report nominating the annual and quadrennial boards, commissions and committees and the report was adopted.

Leave.—Rex B. Wilkes was granted leave of absence for the rest of the day to attend a funeral.

Address the Conference.—The following addressed the Conference: Dr. O. E. Goddard, representing the Board of Missions; Dr. J. H. Reynolds, representing the General Board of Christian Education; Dr. Horace M. Whaling, representing Southern Methodist University; Judge Fred T. Barnett, representing the General Hospital Board; Dr. Goddard, representing the Benevolent Board; Dr. George Sexton, representing Centenary College; Dr. R. S. Satterfield, representing the Methodist Benevolent Association.

Press Representative.—O. L. Walker was elected press representative.

Group Insurance.—A resolution was adopted requesting the Bishop to appoint a committee to look into the group insurance offered by the Methodist Benevolent Association. The Bishop appointed J. H. Glass, J. C. Glenn, C. J. Greene, Clem Baker, and Fred G. Roebuck.

Pageant.—A motion carried directing the Secretary to make some record in the Conference Journal of the celebration of the centenary of Methodism in Pine Bluff.

Conference Preacher.—The Committee on Evangelism announced that Dr. Gilbert T. Rowe would preach each afternoon at 3 o'clock and each evening at 7:30.

Adjournment.—The Conference adjourned with the benediction by Rev. W. B. Hubbell, president of Folsom Training School, Smithville, Okla.

FIRST DAY—WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Conference Opened.—The Conference met at 1:45 with Bishop Dobbs in the chair. A hymn was sung and W. R. Harrison led in prayer.

No Further Roll Call.—A motion carried that further calling of the roll be dispensed with and that Presiding Elders furnish the Secretary with the names of any alternate delegates to be substituted for principals.

Addresses the Conference.—Reverend W. B. Hubbell, of the Oklahoma Conference and Principal of the Folsom Training School, was introduced and spoke on the work and needs of that school.

Questions 21 and 23.—Under questions 21 and 23 the names of the following superannuates were called, most of those present made their reports, their characters were passed, and they were referred for the superannuate relation: J. REPORT OF BIBLE BOARD

We, your Committee on Bible Cause and Institutional work, beg to submit the following report:

For 114 years the American Bible Society has gone steadily forward with the work of making the Bible more easily and more widely available for missionaries and for the people they serve. Again the distribution has passed the eleven million mark. It is particularly cheering to note the advance of the distribution of Scriptures in foreign lands. Even in China, torn asunder by civil war, there comes the report of an increase in circulation of more than a half million volumes.

In our own great southwest the work of Bible distribution has advanced in a marvelous way. In the Ozark Mountains of Oklahoma and Arkansas, the oil fields of the four states that constitute our agency, as well as at the ports of entry on the Gulf, our representatives have held forth the Word of God. The total distribution in this agency was almost 420,000 volumes. When it is remembered that this distribution of Scripture has gone to those who need it most, the immigrant, the poor, the sick, and the blind, the missionary value of the work is all the more enhanced and realized. Special emphasis has been made upon placing the Bible in Bibleless homes, chiefly in Southern Louisiana and along the Mexican border. It is a blessed satisfaction to know that in thousands of homes today the Bible is being read for the first time.

We call the attention of pastors to the observance of Universal Bible Sunday, which is the second Sunday in December. Let us all take advantage of this occasion to direct the attention of our people to the important place which the Scriptures occupy in the Christian faith, as well as the basic work which the American Bible Society is carrying on.

The work in our own Conference in charge of Reverend D. H. Colquette, agent, who maintains a Depository in Little Rock for the convenience of our state, has gone steadily on. To this date this year the distribution runs around 30,000 volumes. Special attention has been given to the poor and needy, those in hospitals and prisons.

We recommend:

First. That we co-operate with the Society in putting the Bible into the hands of the people.

Second. That we observe Universal Bible Day, the second Sunday in December or as near thereto as convenient.

Third. That Rev. D. H. Colquette be appointed Agent of the American Bible Society and Superintendent of Institutional Work for the ensuing year.

Fourth. That we co-operate with him with our means, used books, good magazines and religious periodicals.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION**Report No. 1**

Dear Brethren:

Your Board of Christian Education has elected the following officers: Chairman, C. E. Hayes; Vice-chairman, Paul Quillian; Secretary, E. C. Rule; Treasurer, A. B. Simmons.

We have elected Clem Baker Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education and request his appointment as Conference Secretary of Christian Education.

We have studied the report of the Board of Thirty, herewith attached, and unanimously recommend its adoption.

Report of the Board of Christian Education on the papers resubmitted to it, namely its own report No. 1 and the substitute offered for this report.

We, your Board of Christian Education, report that we have studied in conference with Bro. R. H. Cannon, both papers recommitted to us at Thursday's session. We, as a Board, Bro. Cannon concurring, recommend the adoption of the original paper with the following resolution coming from the Board of Christian Education, as a part of our Report No. 1, along with the original paper.

Resolution

Whereas, certain loyal friends of our college are desirous that the question of the name of our unified college system be carefully reconsidered to the end that the name chosen may be as nearly unanimously agreeable as possible to all interested groups,

We, therefore, respectfully request the Board of Trustees to receive further suggestions from all interested groups and carefully con-

sider them in restudying the question of the name of our unified college system.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF THIRTY FOR NORTH ARKANSAS AND LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCES

Dear Brethren:

We entered this Conference year under instructions from you to do three things, as follows:

(1) To further unify our Methodist educational work in Arkansas—under a new corporation called the Arkansas Methodist Educational Corporation.

(2) To conduct a financial campaign for our two Colleges.

(3) To secure the standardization of Galloway College as a standard senior woman's college, at as early a date as possible.

We herewith report upon our endeavors to carry out your instructions.

(1) It was contemplated that this unifying of our Methodist educational work in Arkansas was to be accomplished by turning over to the Arkansas Methodist Educational Corporation the properties and the control of our two Colleges and the surrender of the charters of Hendrix-Henderson College and Galloway College.

Early in the year a committee of this Board was appointed to find the necessary legal steps, looking to carrying out your will. After careful study and after advice from trustworthy legal counselors, this committee reported that the surrender of both charters was unwise until certain legal difficulties could be cleared up.

It was unwise because such a step must be safeguarded against any breach in our relationships with the General Education Board which, in the past, has dealt so generously with us. Their good will for us has manifested itself in gifts totaling \$550,000.00. Surely our relationship with them is deserving of most careful consideration and safeguarding.

It was unwise because of the possibility of jeopardizing certain valuable interests involved in wills and gifts already made to the existing institutions.

Because of these facts, this Board attempted to carry out the spirit of your mandate to unify our educational work by the measures proposed later in this paper.

(2) The financial campaign for our Colleges was put on with the following results:

For Galloway College, there was secured pledges of \$170,000.00; for Hendrix-Henderson College, pledges were secured of \$78,322.50; undirected pledges were secured to the amount of \$24,454.50; making a grand total of pledges received during the Campaign, \$272,777.00.

When we include the conditional gifts that Hendrix-Henderson has collected since January 1, together with the amount received in pledges through the campaign, we are glad to report that there has been added to the productive endowment of Hendrix-Henderson College the sum of \$400,000.00, and that her building fund has been increased to \$50,000.00.

(3) The Executive Committee has studied the problem of stand-

ardizing Galloway College from every angle, and has reached certain definite conclusions in which the whole Board unanimously concurs, namely,

That Galloway can no longer continue to exist as an unstandardized four-year College. The decline in attendance at Galloway has been largely due to this unfortunate state of affairs.

That we do not see any chance of standardizing Galloway as a senior college in the near future.

Therefore, standardization as a junior college is absolutely necessary in order to keep faith with our students and to preserve the valuable contribution which Galloway has made and is making to the Christian womanhood of our State.

But careful study and extended conferences with Galloway's friends and alumnae convince us that standardizing as a junior college would be disastrous, unless the degrees and credits of past students and graduates are safeguarded, and unless future plans for the institution are made an integral part of our Methodist educational program.

The recommendations which this paper contains are, therefore, the result of prolonged and careful study, and are the fruit of much conference with the most loyal and devoted friends and leaders of both institutions. We believe that they offer a permanent solution to our problem. We believe that they safeguard the vital values in the contributions made by both Colleges to our Church's educational program. We believe that they will establish the unity toward which the Church has been working for four years, that they will promote economy, and will serve to unify our Church behind a sane, businesslike program. We believe that they will complete the task to which the Church committed itself four years ago, and will justify all the work and the sacrifices of the four years.

We therefore recommend their adoption by the Conferences.

1. That Hendrix-Henderson and Galloway Woman's College be made one institution to be operated at Conway as a Standard Senior Co-educational College and at Searcy as a Standard Junior College for Women;

2. That the institution be named Trinity College and that that part of the institution now known as Galloway Woman's College be named Trinity Woman's College;

3. That the two colleges have one executive and one financial administration;

4. That the Alumnae of Galloway Woman's College and the Alumni of Hendrix-Henderson College be Alumnae and Alumni of Trinity College;

5. That for the present there be two charters, the present Galloway charter and the charter hereto attached as Appendix A for the Co-educational College, and that the Board of Trustees named in the latter Charter function as the Board for both Colleges—this to continue until the Board has had time to look into all legal and other matters and finds it advisable to operate both colleges under one charter;

6. That in keeping with former Conference action the funds of one college be not used to maintain the other or to pay the debts of the

other, and that as far as is possible the assets of one college be not made liable for the obligations of the other;

7. That the policy in administering the two colleges be, through contacts between the two student bodies to develop a sense of unity and of common interest;

8. That it be understood that in making Galloway a Standard Junior College of the Institution, this action does not preclude her becoming a Senior College of the Institution.

9. That in the administration of the two colleges the Trustees will have the executive officers to advise Freshman and Sophomore girls to attend the Woman's College; where, however, such girls are proposing to attend a co-educational college, they shall be solicited for the senior college;

10. That we continue the same basis of distributing conference money between Hendrix-Henderson and Galloway Woman's College that was used last year, namely, that the North Arkansas Conference pay to the Woman's College \$5,000, and that the Little Rock Conference pay \$5,000, and that the balance go to the Co-educational College;

11. That the Charter of the Arkansas Methodist Corporation be surrendered;

12. That we, as a body, constituting a Board of Trustees authorized by Conference action be now dismissed and excused from further responsibilities;

13. That this Annual Conference hereby authorizes its Board of Christian Education to serve as an ad interim committee representing this annual conference with full power to act for the Conference on any recommendations of the Board or Boards of Trustees herein constituted for charter or other changes that said Board or Boards may deem wise;

14. That the Board or Boards of Trustees here constituted are authorized to take such steps as they may deem wise in securing additional funds, provided, that when their plans involve a general campaign they shall first submit them to the Annual Conference Boards of Christian Education for approval;

15. That the Board or Boards of Trustees here constituted be ordered to organize and assume their duties and responsibilities as soon as possible after the adoption of this paper by both Annual Conferences, and by or before January 1st, 1931. Mr. H. C. Couch shall convene the Board for its first meeting.

16. That you approve the following nominations and elect these persons Trustees for the Board or Boards here constituted:

APPENDIX A

Be It Resolved by the Board of Trustees of Hendrix College, that the Charter of Hendrix College be amended to read as follows, to-wit:

PROPOSED AMENDED CHARTER

Article I

Name

Section 1. This institution shall be designated and known as Trinity College.

Location

Section 2. Its legal situs and principal office shall be Conway, Faulkner County, Arkansas.

Purpose

Section 3. The purpose of the corporation shall be, (1) to own and operate a co-educational college at Conway, Arkansas, and such other schools, academies, and colleges at Conway or elsewhere as may be deemed advisable. (2) To carry out the plans past and future of the Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Arkansas for the development of Christian Education through this institution.

Article II

Trustees

Section 1. The college shall be under the direction and control of a Board of twenty-seven trustees, whose election shall conform to the law of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, as to church member-

ship. Eight trustees shall represent the North Arkansas Conference, eight the Little Rock Conference, five the Alumni Association of the college and six shall be trustees at large.

Section 2. The following are named as members of the Board of Trustees, each trustee to serve for the number of years opposite his name and until his successor is elected and has accepted.

Section 3. Conference trustees and trustees at large shall be nominated by the Executive Committee of the Board and alumni trustees shall be nominated by the Alumni Association of the college.

Section 4. Each Annual Conference will elect its own trustees and both Conferences shall elect all alumni trustees and all trustees at large. The regular term of a trustee shall be six years and until his successor is elected and has accepted, except that the members of the Board named above shall serve for the term indicated opposite their names.

Section 5. If an Annual Conference declines to elect a trustee as

nominated it shall be the duty of the respective nominating authorities as above provided to send in other nominations until election is had.

Section 6. Vacancies occasioned by death or resignation shall be filled in the manner described above for electing a successor to a trustee whose term has expired.

Section 7. The Board of Trustees shall have power to sue and be sued; to borrow money and to give security therefor; to contract and to be contracted with; to make and use a common seal and to alter the same; to buy, sell, and mortgage property, or bequest; to enter into co-operative relations with other educational institutions; to loan its funds, to buy and sell stocks, bonds, debentures, and other securities; to erect buildings and equip same; to receive money subject to annuity; to operate and maintain said institution or institutions of learning and to do all things necessary for efficient management; to confer customary degrees; and to establish, acquire and manage other schools, departments or colleges subject to the approval of the annual conferences.

Section 8. The Board shall be charged with the government of the institution and with the appointment of its officers and instructors and with fixing their compensation, but may delegate such powers as they see fit to the President and the faculty.

Section 9. The Board of Trustees shall elect an Executive Committee of such number and for such term as the Board may deem wise and shall delegate to said committee such powers as said Board may choose.

Section 10. The Executive Committee shall organize and hold meetings for the transaction of business, and in the interim of the meeting of the Board shall, in harmony with the policy of the Board, control the College and report its actions to the Board, but it shall not buy or sell real estate except as authorized by the Board.

Article III

Alumni

Section 1. The Alumni of Hendrix College, the Alumni of Henderson-Brown College, and the Alumnae of Galloway Woman's College are alumni and alumnae of Trinity College.

Article IV

Quorum

Section 1. Twelve members of the Board shall constitute a quorum and a majority of those present shall be empowered to transact business, provided that at least nine votes shall be required to pass any measure.

Article V

Officers

Section 1. The officers of the Board shall be a president, a first vice president, a second vice president, a secretary and a treasurer. Neither the secretary nor the treasurer need to be members of the Board.

Section 2. Their term of office shall be three years, but an officer shall serve until his successor is elected and qualified.

Section 3. The officers of the Board shall perform the duties usual to said officers and such other duties as the Board may require.

Article VI

Amendments

Section 1. Whenever the Trustees desire to amend the charter or to change the name of the College, they may do so at any regular meeting called for that purpose; provided, that a majority of all the trustees shall consent to such a change, and provided also that no such change shall be made at a called meeting unless due notice of such meeting and the intention thereof are given to the several trustees at least ten days before the meeting.

Section 2. No amendment of this charter shall be effective until ratified by the Little Rock and the North Arkansas Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, or their successors.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Report No. 2

The Board of Christian Education has received reports from the old Board of Education, Sunday School Board and Epworth League Board, and has organized so as to perpetuate the work of these Boards and preserve all their distinctive work and eliminate all overlapping, and made plans to the best of our ability to carry out the new unified program of the Church. The financial affairs of all three of these Boards have been properly wound up, and all balances on hand are being transferred to the Board of Christian Education.

We recommend to the Little Rock Annual Conference:

1. That each Presiding Elder's District be requested to raise at least \$200.00 as a scholarship for the School of Theology of Southern Methodist University.

2. That Dr. Paul W. Quillian, Dr. C. J. Greene, Rev. H. H. Griffin, Rev. Clem Baker and Rev. J. C. Glenn be appointed to be members of the Board of Managers of the Arkansas Pastors' School. We request the Board of Lay Activities to appoint one member, and the Board of Missions to appoint two members to said Board. That the date and place of the Pastors' School be left to the Board of Managers.

3. Mr. C. E. Hayes, Mr. O. C. Landers and Rev. Clem Baker constitute a Committee to work with a similar Committee of the Board of Missions in correlating and unifying the programs of the two Boards.

4. That Dr. A. C. Millar and Mrs. H. King Wade be appointed Trustees of the Western Methodist Assembly.

5. That Rev. R. E. L. Bearden, Prof. J. J. Tibbits and Miss Roxie Deal be appointed a Committee to serve with a similar Committee of the Board of Church Extension to serve as a Joint Committee on Church Architecture.

6. That Sunday School Day offerings and fourth Sunday Mission-

ary offering be sent to our Conference Treasurer, Mr. C. E. Hayes, Box 118, Little Rock, Arkansas.

7. That Race Relations Day be observed in each Church on the Sunday nearest Lincoln's birthday and that any offering taken on that day be directed to Arkansas Haygood College.

8. That the Sunday nearest Armistice Day be observed as Peace Sunday.

9. That the third Sunday in June be observed as College Day and that an offering be taken on that day to be used in the employment of worthy ministerial students in the rural sections of our Conference during the vacation period.

10. That the General Board of Christian Education appropriate \$5,000.00 for Galloway Woman's College for debt retirement purposes, this amount to be matched dollar for dollar by Galloway Woman's College.

11. That our Board co-operate with the Arkansas Methodist Rural Life Commission in making a study of the rural problems of the Church in our State.

12. That your Board of Christian Education be authorized to use such means as may be necessary to bring its budget income at least up to the amount of the income of the three merged Boards last year.

13. That we continue our policy of promoting the Christmas offering for the Orphanage.

14. That Epworth League Anniversary Day continue to be promoted in each Church in the Conference and that an offering be taken on that day for the support of our Young People's work.

As a matter of information we wish to advise the Conference that your Board in planning the work for the new year has taken the following action:

1. We have turned all funds of the Board over to our one Treasurer, Mr. A. B. Simmons, and have adequately bonded him for same, also the depository.

2. That the general line of Epworth League work formerly supervised by our Joint Field Worker, Rev. S. T. Baugh, will be directed by the Epworth League Conference President and the Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education in counsel with the Conference Epworth League Cabinet.

3. We have placed the Young People's work in strictly rural sections of the Conference under the supervision of the Extension Secretary.

4. That our Summer Assembly will be enlarged to include all phases of work coming within the Young People's Section of the local Church and that the Assembly will attempt to meet these various needs.

5. It is our plan that the work formerly carried on through District Secretaries of the Epworth League will be hereafter carried on through District Directors of Young People's work who will look after the Epworth League work in connection with the promotion of the total program of Young People's work in the District.

6. We have elected Miss Fay McRae Conference Director of Chil-

dren's Work, and Rev. Harold D. Sadler Conference Director of Young People's Work, both of whom are to serve on a volunteer basis.

We ask that the following appointments be made: Dr. C. J. Greene, Professor of Hendrix-Henderson College; Dr. R. C. Rhodes, Professor of Emory University; Rev. M. T. Workman, Professor of Vanderbilt University; Rev. Marshall T. Steel, Student in Union Theological Seminary; Rev. Kenneth L. Spore, Student in Vanderbilt University; Rev. Virgil Morris, Student in Southern Methodist University; Rev. R. W. Menard, Student in Southern Methodist University; Rev. Clem Baker, Conference Secretary of Christian Education.

We have elected Rev. S. T. Baugh Conference Extension Secretary and ask that he be appointed to this place.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

We, your Committee on Evangelism, beg to submit the following report:

First. We rejoice in the evangelistic note sounded by our last General Conference at Dallas, Texas, and the spirit in which our pastors have responded to the call. There are more pastors holding their own revivals and doing their own evangelistic work than ever before in recent years. This is as it should be. There will always be a place for men who do distinctive evangelistic work but all of our pastors should be evangelists.

For the past three quadrenniums our great emphasis has been on enlarged building programs and increasing the material resources of the church. CONFERENCE BOARD OF FINANCE

Report No. 1

To the Little Rock Annual Conference:

Dear Brethren:

The General Conference authorized the continuation of the Superannuate Endowment Movement and that the Board of Finance in St. Louis be charged with the general direction of this continued effort and have the power to project such plans as are necessary for its on-going.

This continuation of effort will be similar to what the movement has been previously; that is, without exacting from the church such attention as will disrupt her regular program. It is expected, however, that every charge, having an unpaid quota balance from this cause, will make a real effort to pay its adjusted quota.

It is urged that the first Quarterly Conferences of the Conference year 1930-1931 take up the adjusting of the quota balances of the charges. If any charge cannot pay its unpaid balance, as it is at that time, its Quarterly Conference may reduce said balance to an amount it can and will pay within four years (at least one-fourth annually) and these adjustments be reported to the Board of Finance, St. Louis, Missouri, on forms furnished by the Board.

Also at the first Quarterly Conferences of the ensuing year an opportunity should be given to the charges that have paid in full or overpaid their original quotas to approve additional quotas for payment during the ensuing quadrennium.

Those charges which have unpaid balances (as adjusted) or charges which voluntarily assume new quotas, and which use the budget system in their local financing, may include in their annual budgets the amount they wish to pay to this cause; and the charges which use this plan should pro rate to this cause its portion of the total sum collected and remit same promptly to the Board of Finance, Security Building, St. Louis, Missouri.

Any pastor so desiring may have the privilege of applying on his charge's unpaid balance (as adjusted) or his charge's voluntarily assumed new quota any contribution which he may secure for the Superannuate Endowment on the Annuity Plan.

1. Bearing in mind these facts, we recommend that the Little Rock Annual Conference designate May as "Superannuate Endowment Month" and that the pastors and Presiding Elders keep this month inviolate for the purpose of raising the Superannuate Endowment Fund.

2. We kindly urge our Presiding Elders, in District Stewards Meetings, in Quarterly Conferences and in the month designated for raising of quotas, to urge our pastors and laymen to give their faithful support to this continued effort for Superannuate Endowment; and when making their reports to the Annual Conference on the results of the year's work, they include what has been accomplished in their respective districts during the year.

4. We recommend the appointment of Rev. J. C. Glenn as Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment.

5. We respectfully ask the Presiding Elders to provide in the programs of their respective District Conferences an opportunity for the Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment, or a member of the Conference Board selected by the Executive Committee, to speak in behalf of the cause.

6. We also request that pastors and Presiding Elders report promptly to our Conference Director any changes in the charge or district boundary lines.

7. We recommend the appointment of Rev. J. H. Glass as Commissioner for Superannuates.

8. We recommend the continuance and extension of the group insurance, looking toward some kind of plan whereby every prospective claimant may be insured.

REPORT OF THE HISTORY COMMISSION

The Conference History Commission was created in 1908 to collect and preserve the Conference documents. It was authorized to fill its own vacancies, and it was directed to report its work quadrennially at the session of the Conference next following the meeting of the General Conference.

Four years ago we reported that we had some volumes of Conference Journals which we do not now have. The fire proof vault space in Hendrix College being limited, those manuscript journals which were duplicated in printed form were left in the Library and were destroyed in the fire that burned the college building.

Through the kindness of Dr. W. C. Martin we have recently received from Mr. W. P. Field the first manuscript volume of the Conference Journal and Minutes which covers the period from 1854 to 1865.

We now have for the first time since the History Commission was created 22 years ago, the complete record of our Conference Sessions from its organization in 1854 down to and including 1929. There are four volumes in manuscript and six volumes that are printed and bound.

We also received from Mr. Field through Dr. Martin some valuable productions by Dr. Andrew Hunter. They are, The Early History of Methodism, The Introduction of Methodism in Arkansas, Recollections of the General Conference of 1844, and an extended account of the religious experience of Dr Hunter. All these documents are in fire proof vaults in the main building of Hendrix-Henderson College.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE HOSPITAL BOARD

Your Conference Hospital Board begs to report as follows:

1. *General Work.* Substantial progress has been made during the past year in the development of the Hospital program of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, as shown by the Report of Dr. C. C. Jarrell, General Secretary, to the Annual Conferences. Our newly-opened Methodist Hospital at Fort Worth, Texas, is one of the greatest hospital structures in the nation, being ten stories in height, with a bed capacity of 405, and having cost to date \$1,250,000.00. A new building costing \$500,000.00 is being completed at Barnes Hospital, and its surgical ward will receive an endowment of \$450,000.00. A new building costing \$300,000.00 is under construction at Good Samaritan Hospital at Lexington, Kentucky, as a result of the generous gifts of Mr. H. L. Ott and his mother. A new hospital is being erected at Elkin, N. C., which will be the property of the Western North Carolina Conference. The new Duke Hospital and Medical College at Durham, North Carolina, represents an investment of \$4,000,00, and will have an endowment of \$6,000,000.00.

Large gifts amounting to \$400,000 have been made to our Southern Methodist Hospitals during the past year. The amount of the Golden Cross Enrollment during 1929 was \$90,000, and by increasing this amount our people can largely increase the amount of charity work of our hospitals. The free service of our dozen Methodist Hospitals reached the astonishing total sum of nearly a half million dollars during the past year.

2. *New Legislation.* Under the legislation of the last General Conference, the District Golden Cross Director is made a member of the District Conference, and the Church Golden Cross Director is made a member of the Quarterly Conference. We urge the appointment of wide-awake District Directors by the Presiding Elders, subject to confirmation by the District Conference, and the appointment of live Golden Cross Directors in the local Churches by the pastors, subject to confirmation by the Quarterly Conference. Golden Cross funds raised in our Conference are to be sent to the Conference Treasurer, who shall remit these amounts monthly to the Treasurer of the General Hospital Board, who shall forward the funds thus raised to our Southern Methodist Hospital and Sanatorium at Tucson, Arizona.

3. *Hot Springs Sanatorium.* Your attention is called to the fact that the last General Conference respectfully considered the memorial adopted by the Little Rock Conference at its last session respecting the founding of a connectional hospital and sanatorium at Hot Springs, Arkansas, and directed the General Hospital Board to study the situation during the quadrennium and take such steps as might be necessary looking to the establishment of such an institution. We are glad to report that the General Hospital Board is entering upon this study and investigation with diligence, and your Conference Board is hereby pledging its co-operation with the General Hospital Board in this worthy undertaking.

4. *Golden Cross Director.* Your Board hereby places in nomination for Conference Golden Cross Director for the new quadrennium, J. L. Dedman, and asks that the Conference ratify this nomination.

5. We further recommend that Dr. A. C. Millar be elected as a delegate to the next annual meeting of the General Hospital Board and the Methodist Hospital Association.

REPORT OF BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Your Conference Board of Lay Activities reports as follows:

General Conference Legislation

Attention is directed to some changes made by the last General Conference in the organization and program of the Board.

1. The scope of work is enlarged to include "Training of Church Officers" in co-operation with the Board of Christian Education.

2. The Charge and Church Lay Leaders and the Chairman of the Stewardship Committee are made members of the Quarterly Conference, being elected by that body.

3. The District and Associate District Lay Leaders are members of the District Conference.

4. The District Board of Lay Activities is required to meet with the District Stewards in the interest of benevolences and to plan the work of the year.

5. The Board of Stewards is made responsible for the work of Lay Activities in the Charge and the local Church under the direction of the pastor and Lay Leaders.

Stewardship

We recommend that the program of Stewardship education be continued along the lines used the past quadrennium: Stewardship revivals, sermons, lay programs, pageants, the distribution of literature, Stewardship study classes in Pastors' Schools and Standard Training Schools.

The Benevolences

Following instructions of the General Conference, the Board will continue to promote full payment of the benevolences, under the direction of the Commission on Benevolences. Some measure of success has attended our efforts along this line in the past, and we urge all our laymen to co-operate earnestly in plans that may be outlined and adopted for this work.

The Methodist Layman

We recommend the Methodist Layman not only as an official organ of the Lay Board, but also as a religious magazine for the men of the church and in particular for the Board of Stewards. This paper will prove valuable to Stewards in giving them ideas of how best to serve at their appointed tasks. We urge Pastors and all Lay Leaders to secure the widest circulation possible for this paper, setting as a goal one copy to every Steward and Lay Leader in the Conference.

Men's Work

We urge our Pastors and Lay Leaders to study the needs of the men of the local congregation for spiritual culture and development, and to co-operate in plans that will promote helpful activity on the part of all the men of the churches.

Laymen's Day

We concur in the plan of the General Board for the observance of Laymen's Day, using as the theme for the day, "The Way to Spiritual Power," and the Conference is asked to designate the Second Sunday in June, 1931.

Spiritual Life

The Laymen wish to assume their part in the program of the observance of the nineteen hundredth anniversary of Pentecost. We pledge the Lay organization to assist Presiding Elders and Pastors in bringing about a higher spiritual life in the Conference.

In Appreciation

We wish to record our esteem and love for all our Bishops, Presiding Elders and Pastors and pledge to them our loyal support in all their labors for our church.

We nominate G. W. Pardee, of Little Rock, for Conference Lay Leader for the coming year.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE**Report No. 1**

To the Bishop and Members of the Little Rock Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South:

Dear Brethren:

We submit for your consideration, the following report as touching our publishing interests for the fiscal year:

We are happy to report that the improvements in our Sunday School literature are being made without any increase in price.

We find the Christian Advocate is meeting a real need in our Church but it gives us keen regret to state that Lamar & Whitmore, Agents, inform us that this valuable periodical continues to show a considerable loss to our Publishing House. They point out to us, and wisely, that the only remedy for this is to secure a larger increase in the number of subscribers. We earnestly request our pastors and lay members as well, to join in a unified campaign to increase the subscription list during the ensuing year.

The Cokesbury Press, of which we may be justly proud, has issued many valuable books during 1930, by authors of national and international reputation, which have met with a gratifying reception from not only our own membership, but the reading public as well. Our Publishing House now ranks among the leading publishers of religious and devotional books, not only in our own country, but in the world.

We wish to call your attention to the fact that the prices at which books and Sunday School literature are sold by our own Publishing House as compared with those charged by other publishers, are appreciably lower on almost every item; we therefore kindly urge our people to show our House the worthy deference in making purchases for these items. Lamar & Whitmore, Agents, have also informed us that the total sales for the past year were \$1,931,298.05.

It gives us further joy to report that the Book Committee has appropriated the sum of \$100,000.00 for the benefit of claimants on the Conference funds. This is \$40,000.00 increase over the appropriation for the first year of the last quadrennium.

Let us continue our loyal support to our own Publishing House in order that the prosperity of our House and its present fine standing in the financial world may be sustained.

Report No. 2

To the Bishop and Members of the Little Rock Annual Conference:

Dear Brethren:

The total sales of our Publishing House for the past year approximate two million dollars with a net profit of \$180,000.00, a little more than \$100,000 of which is distributed among our superannuates.

We direct your special attention to the Christian Advocate, our

general organ, which now has a circulation of 14,000. We suggest that all our pastors urge that the official boards of all our local churches take this publication. We are gratified at the increasing patronage of the Missionary Voice, having a present circulation of 70,000.

The Epworth Era has now 70,000 on its subscription list.

Our Methodist Layman is another of our very important publications, full of information and inspiration especially for our laymen.

The Arkansas Methodist is in a better financial condition, taken all together, than that of a year ago.

During the year, \$3,834.50 has been collected on the building fund, most of which was paid to Brother Galloway as salary. The paper is better off by approximately \$7,000. In our real estate we now have an equity of \$12,000, and only \$9,000 due on it. After the next payment thereon is made, which will soon be due, our equity will be \$15,000 in this property with a balance of \$6,000 due of the purchase money.

The paper owes the bank \$5,800, and Dr. A. A. Millar \$6,115.

By January 1 the total liabilities will be approximately \$16,000. The present subscription rate of \$2.00 for the paper we recommend and any other regulations relative thereto to be directed by the editor and the commissioners.

The present moral condition of our country and the unwholesome influence of much of the secular press make it urgently necessary to give our fullest support to our religious press. It is here that our people may secure an intelligence of religious and moral truth that will enable them to be securely grounded upon a safe, civic and religious basis.

We urge that special emphasis be given the coming year to the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the Arkansas Methodist with special emphasis laid upon the enlargement of its circulation, and that we heartily respond to the intensive campaign for cultivation in the field of religious literature ordered by our General Conference.

We submit the following recommendations:

1. We approve the editorial work and management of Dr. A. C. Millar and recommend his re-appointment.
2. In order to liquidate the balance of indebtedness on the purchased property for the Arkansas Methodist we recommend a continuation of the assessment as for the year past, in a sum in accordance with the Conference recommendations.
3. We recommend the appointment of the present Arkansas Methodist Commission to succeed itself.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

I will make my report not only for this year but will include as a matter of history some of the results of the quadrennium. During the past four years Missionary Institutes have been held in each district each year. The attendance of both pastors and lay workers has been gratifying. We have tried constantly to lay emphasis on the importance of the cultivation of the missionary mind and spirit in our people. Mission study classes have been held each year in most charges in the conference. I think it can properly be said that missions are in a flux. The appeals of fifty or even twenty-five years ago will not suffice today. We are seeking new motives for missionary endeavor. I think those who are to guide us in the future missionary work and who are to set the type and spirit of our people in our local congregations, should be those who are studying missions.

It has been a pleasure to work with the presiding elders and pastors in this essential work. They have as a whole cooperated most beautifully and loyally. To name those who have been thus loyal would almost exhaust the conference roll. For the second time the Monticello district, Rev. J. C. Glenn, P. E., was the first district not only in the Conference but in the entire Church to reach the goal for which it started. There are forty-six charges with a larger offering than last year. The Little Rock district, Dr. James Thomas, P. E., has the largest plus per cent of its goal. The Camden district, Dr. J. J. Stowe, P. E., is a little less than \$1,000.00 short of its goal. The amount received by districts is as follows:

This makes a total of missionary maintenance for the quadrennium of \$106,833.57. This amount as we know is over and above the benevolences. The amount raised in the North Arkansas Conference during the same period was \$56,717.33. This makes a grand total of \$163,550.90 received on this fund from Arkansas Methodism during the quadrennium. During the past six years I have also been Centenary treasurer for the two Conferences in Arkansas. I have received approximately \$84,000.00 Centenary money. This makes a grand total of both funds of \$247,550.90 during the period or an average of \$41,000.00 per year.

I am in hearty accord with the plans of the General Board of Missions not to have full-time Conference missionary secretaries during the coming quadrennium. However, the situation facing our missionary program is a most serious one and will require the hearty cooperation of Presiding Elders and pastors. Unless this is done there is danger ahead to our missionary program. Great achievements have been reach-

ed and our great Church will certainly not do less than we are now doing in our missionary operations. I close the quadrennium in this field with thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father that I have had some part with you in this most essential work of the Kingdom.

Expense: Office and traveling, \$516.66; salary (8 months) \$2,666.64.

To the Bishop and Members of the Little Rock Conference.
Dear Fathers and Brethren:

The Board of Trustees begs to submit to you through the Superintendent, Dr. James Thomas, their annual report for the year closing October 1, 1930. The year has been a successful one. We have had our usual experiences. We have lost two of our little boys by death, J. E. Smith and O'Dell Mabrey, both about six years of age.

We had at the beginning of the year 43 children. We have placed in good homes 20. Murry Davis and Grace Ward, having reached the

age and finishing their public school education, left the Home, thus making a total of 24 members of our family to leave the Home during the year. We have received 17 during the year and now have a total of 36 in the Home. To this date, we have placed 502 children in the best homes we could procure.

We give you the financial statement with much pleasure. We urge our brethren to see to it that the Christmas offerings this year will even surpass what they have been before. We enter enthusiastically into another year of work with this Christ-like institution.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

Dear Brethren:

We have met and elected the following officers: W. R. Jordan, chairman; Fred R. Harrison, secretary, and W. C. Hilliard, treasurer.

Prohibition is the settled policy of this republic. It was decreed by the will of the American people, evidenced by the adoption of the Eighteenth Amendment to the Constitution by the favorable action of forty-six of the forty-eight states, with speed and unanimity more marked than in the case of other constitutional changes. Prohibition was hard won. It came into being, like all notable reforms, through effort and conflict. Public sentiment was slowly, but surely crystallized against the saloon and the liquor traffic as enemies of the home and of the church.

Today there is a serious challenge to prohibition as a principle and policy. Prior to the ratification of the Eighteenth Amendment, all forces working against the liquor traffic and its allied evils were ceaseless in their programs of educating the people in the cause of temperance. When prohibition became an integral part of our national Constitution, the temperance forces seemed to abandon their educational efforts against the liquor traffic. Today the church and other temperance forces must renew the crusade and educate the people, especially our present generation which is ignorant of the evils of the saloon. In order that our people may renew their loyalty to the cause of temperance, we urge that our pastors inform themselves and preach more often upon the evils of drink. We call upon our Presiding Elders to appoint a District Board of Temperance and Social Service in accordance with Paragraph 522 in our Book of Doctrines and Discipline, and we urge our pastors to appoint a Committee of Temperance and Social Service in each local congregation in line with Paragraph 523 of our Book of Doctrines and Discipline. We also call upon our pastors and people to interest themselves in the program conducted by the General Board of Temperance and Social Service at Mt. Sequoyah each summer.

We urge upon all members personal observance of the law. We firmly set our faces against any secession from the constitutional out-

lawry of the liquor traffic. We urge our people to elect public officials who believe in enforcement, "not only because prohibition is the law, but because it ought to be the law."

We commend our denominational papers for their continued interest in the cause of temperance, for unbiased and correct information on the subject, and urge our members to subscribe to these papers.

We also commend the Arkansas Anti-Saloon League for its fine work of education, and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union for its persistent labors.

As representatives from our Conference on the Anti-Saloon League Board of Arkansas, we recommend the following: Dr. A. C. Millar, W. C. Hilliard, Lawrence Wilson, W. J. Whitesides, W. R. Jordan, Fred R. Harrison, and Mrs. B. J. Reaves.

We call upon our pastors and people to work for the cause of World Peace, keeping in mind the words of our Master, "Those who take up the sword shall also perish with the sword."

The "pagan views of marriage and divorce," frequently advocated by popular speakers and writers, are influencing our people and should be counteracted by sound teaching in the pulpit, school and church press, because the Christian home is fundamental and must be preserved. To secure and maintain such homes it is necessary to impress upon parents the importance of carefully instructing their children in the sacredness of the marriage relation, the holy purpose of marriage and the high duty of living a clean and normal sex life.

We urge upon our preachers and members the obligation of voting in all elections and the payment of poll taxes to insure this privilege.

We call upon our pastors in communities of large negro population to work with the pastors of the C. M. E. Church in creating sentiment among the respective groups for improved recreation and health needs of our colored people.

In view of the fact that during the present year there has been a larger number of lynchings than in any year since the World War, we urge our ministers and people to give their serious consideration to this deadly and dangerous evil, and to exert their influence to overcoming this evil in their respective communities.

CONSTITUTION

We, J. A. Henderson, James Thomas, W. C. Martin, J. A. Sage and L. B. Leigh, and our successors, desire to form a corporation, and for that purpose adopt the following constitution.

First. The name of the said corporation shall be, The Board of Trustees of the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Second. The object of the corporation shall be to receive, hold and administer all moneys, funds and property, real and personal, that may from time to time come into its hands by donations, gifts, devise, bequests, or otherwise, for any of the uses, purposes and needs of the Little Rock Conference, particularly funds and property for the use of superannuated preachers of said Conference.

Third. Said Board is authorized to place at interest any and all funds that may come into its hands for the use and benefit of said Conference, and shall make a full and complete report of its acts and doings

in that behalf to the annual meeting of said Little Rock Conference for approval, showing disposition of the interests and funds received provided always, the Board shall carry out the wishes of the donors of said funds or property.

Fourth. That the vacancies in said Board shall be filled by said Little Rock Conference, but in the interim such vacancies may be filled by the remainder of said Board and the persons so appointed shall hold office until the next meeting of said Conference.

Fifth. That the regular meeting of said Board shall be on the first day of the annual session of said Conference, and at the same place as the Conference is held. The first meeting shall be on the fifth day of March, 1899, at the city of Little Rock. Provided also: The President of the Board may call a meeting of the Board when deemed necessary.

Sixth. That the officers of said Board shall consist of a President, Secretary and Treasurer; who shall be elected every two years, provided those elected at the first meeting shall hold until the regular annual meeting.

Seventh. Four members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Memoirs

REV. COLUMBUS O. STEELE.

Rev. Columbus O. Steele died at Hot Springs, Arkansas, April 15, 1930. At the time of his death he was the oldest member of the Little Rock Conference in point of years, lacking only a few months of being 92 years of age. He was born in the state of Tennessee, November, 1928, where he grew to manhood and entered the ministry of the Methodist church. He was licensed to preach in 1857 and was admitted on trial in the Memphis Annual Conference at its session held in October of that year. He was transferred immediately to the Ouachita Conference (now the Little Rock). He attended the session of that Conference which was held in the city of Little Rock in November following, and was appointed to the White Sulphur Springs circuit. He gave about twenty-five years of active service in this Conference, serving a number of leading charges with great acceptability and occupying a place in the front rank of the members of the body. Sometime about the year 1879 or 1880 he was transferred to the Pacific Conference where he spent about twenty years or more in efficient service. He returned to the Little Rock Conference in 1901, but after nearly four years of service in this his old home Conference, he returned to the Pacific Conference on account of the health of his wife, who died in California. After spending two more years in the Pacific Conference he returned to his home Conference and was appointed to Stephens where he spent four happy and fruitful years and where he closed his active ministry. At the session of the Conference held in 1911 he asked for and was granted the superannuate relation, after having spent fifty four years in the active work of the ministry. Few men have labored so long and so well.

It would be difficult even to imagine a character in which the highest and truest ideals of that ministry were more perfectly exemplified than they were in the life and character of this good man. His life was without spot or blemish. He was deeply and intensely spiritual. He gave himself wholeheartedly to the work of the ministry. His sermons were worthy to have been chosen as models. He was an ideal pastor. Wherever he labored the people loved and honored him. His ministry was fruitful in the conversion of sinners and in the perfecting of the saints. Truly he was "a good minister of Jesus Christ."

After the death of his second wife, and about the time of his final return to Arkansas, he was happily married to his third wife, a woman of rare beauty of life and character who proved a most congenial and helpful companion for him in his declining years. She preceded him by some two years to the heavenly home and his last days were full of loneliness and pain. The comrades of his early ministry had all gone

before him. The younger men, most of whom had come into the Conference while he was in California, had never known him at his best. Under such conditions it was not strange that he grew lonesome and homesick for Heaven.

He leaves three living children: R. M. Steele of Miami, Fla.; C. O., Jr., of New York; and Mrs. Eugenia Marlott, Oakland, Cal. A beloved daughter, Mrs. Fred Gray of Hot Springs, died several years ago. A granddaughter, the daughter of Mrs. Gray, tenderly ministered to him during the closing days of his life.

Not long before his death he wrote: "Three fundamental facts stand out very prominently in my experience. First, the genuineness of my conversion; second, my specific call to the ministry; third, the fruits of my labors which have not been in vain."

He was buried from the First Methodist Church in Hot Springs, the funeral service being conducted by the pastor, Rev. Dr. J. D. Hammons, assisted by Rev. J. H. Glass and by several others.

A little more than fifty-three years ago, in the old Methodist church at Hope, he received the writer of this memoir into the church and he now counts it a sacred and blessed privilege to pay this imperfect yet loving tribute to his memory.

REV. ROBERT WILLIAM McKAY.

Rev. Robert William McKay, one of the most widely known and highly esteemed members of the Little Rock Conference, died at his home in Cabot, Arkansas, August 21, 1930, after a lingering illness of more than six years.

He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. McKay, and was born in Yorkville, S. C., March 29, 1864. When he was about six years of age his parents moved to Arkansas and established their home on a farm near Cabot where they reared a large family of sons and daughters. There Robert William grew to manhood. When about fifteen years of age he was converted and joined the old historic Mt. Tabor church, known as "the mother of preachers" because so many preachers have gone out from it. When about twenty years of age he was licensed to preach by the quarterly conference of the Austin Circuit, Rev. C. C. Godden being the presiding elder at that time. Soon after being licensed to preach he was appointed to supply the White River Circuit which he served two years, 1885 and 1886. At the close of his first year of service as a supply pastor he was admitted on trial in the Little Rock Conference at the session held in Arkadelphia in December, 1885. For nearly forty years he devoted himself whole heartedly and continuously to the work of an itinerant Methodist preacher. In the summer of 1924, while serving as presiding elder of the PineBluff District, his health became impaired and after a brave but futile effort to continue his work he was compelled to surrender. He was a man of iron will and heroic spirit and for six long years he waged a courageous fight against the ravages of that dread disease, tuberculosis. After spending more than a year in the State Sanatorium at Booneville he was sent home to die.

Generous friends came to his financial assistance and helped him to buy a comfortable home at Cabot where under the constant care of his faithful and beloved wife he lingered for more than four years until the end came.

It is impossible to give within the limits of this memoir a worthy estimate of his personal character, or of the elements of strength and power which placed him in the very front rank of the ministry. It is enough to say that his ministry was always acceptable and efficient. He served a number of the leading charges and districts of the Conference with marked acceptability and success.

For many years he was an active and influential member of each of the three boards of college trustees and also a member of one or more of the important quadrennial boards of the Conference. His life was literally absorbed in the work of the Little Rock Conference and his devotion and interest in this work made of him an efficient leader and a most helpful counselor. Even after he was confined to his bed and unable to take any active part in the work of the Conference he maintained a lively interest in all Conference matters. As a Conference we shall miss his wise counsels and inspiring and able leadership.

While serving his second pastoral charge, Stuttgart, he was happily married to Miss Mary Francis Morgan, of Arkansas County, June 14, 1888. Four daughters and one son were born to them, all of whom with their mother are still living. He leaves also his honored father and mother, both of whom are past ninety years of age, one brother and five sisters.

The writer of this imperfect memoir had known and loved him for forty-five years. We joined the Conference together and our acquaintance formed at that time soon grew into a very intimate friendship which became more and more intimate and sacred with the passing years. I loved him as I have loved but few men. He was a good man, true, honest and clean in every fiber of his being. He was ready for the final summons and longed for it to come. The news of his death which reached me a few minutes after his departure, came to me as I lay on a sick bed following a long and serious illness from which I have but partially recovered. It was impossible for me to comply with his request that I should assist Dr. James Thomas in the funeral service, but in much bodily weakness and pain I have written this imperfect yet loving tribute to his memory.

REV. W. F. LASETER

William F. Laseter was born in Pike County, Georgia, May 25, 1853, and died in Little Rock, Arkansas, at the home of his son, Roy M. Laseter, June 22, 1930.

Brother Laseter spent his youth and early manhood in the state of Georgia, and came to Arkansas in 1898. Having been a member of the Methodist Church since childhood, and a local preacher since his early manhood, he felt a call to the active itinerancy soon after coming to this state. He was admitted on trial into the Little Rock Annual Conference

in 1900 and was appointed to the Sheridan Circuit where he spent four years. In 1904 he was appointed to Redfield Circuit; 1905 to Swan Lake station; 1906 to Rison Circuit; 1907-8 to Gillett Circuit; 1909 to Snyder Circuit; 1910-11 to Mablevale; 1912-15 to Austin Circuit; 1916 to Patmos Circuit; 1917 to Princeton Circuit. At the Conference of 1918 he took the appointment which he held for nearly 12 years, that of superannuation. He was a model superannuate, true to the church which he loved and deeply interested in her program to the very end. Not in the slightest would he ever interfere or dictate policies to his pastor. If he could be of service he was always ready.

Those who were closest to him knew him to be a man of strong character, one whose faith never wavered and to whom convictions meant much more than diplomacy. For that reason it was never difficult to learn where he stood on matters pertaining to morals. He was a desirable citizen, a good preacher, a faithful pastor and a devoted husband and father. He was the type that Jesus called "the salt of the earth, the light of the world." He was the type of man the psalmist had in mind, "He shall be like a tree planted by the rivers of water, that bringeth forth his fruit in his season; his leaf also shall not wither, and whatsoever he doeth shall prosper." He was one of the men to whom we are indebted for the church and civilization. He is gone but his life and works shall abide in the life of his children and many of his parishioners.

He is survived by J. R. Laseter, Powder Springs, Ga., and Roy M. Laseter, Little Rock, Ark., sons; Julia C. Laseter, Rockford, Ill., and Mrs. J. R. Pounds, Gadsden, Ala., daughters; J. L. Laseter, Waco, Tex., a brother. May his mantle fall not only upon his sons and daughters, but upon the many to whom he ministered.

The writer conducted his funeral from the Asbury Methodist Church, assisted by Dr. James Thomas and Rev. J. H. Glass. The pallbearers were (active members of the Little Rock Conference): H. D. Sadler, C. N. Baker, C. D. Meux, Robert Beasley, O. L. Walker; honorary, W. R. Harrison, W. R. Richardson, S. W. Rainey. His remains were placed in Roselawn Park to await the resurrection.

REV. HUGH REVELY.

Hugh, son of Hugh and Mary Elizabeth Revely, was born near Jackson, Tennessee, January 8, 1856, and died in Florida, March 4, 1930.

Of the early life of Brother Revely, little is known to his brethren of the ministry. When he was licensed to preach we are uninformed. But he was one of that group of men who knocked at the doors of the Little Rock Conference when it was called in session at El Dorado, in 1903. He was admitted on trial at that time and was regularly advanced in his courses of study along with the writer for four years and completed the courses with him in 1907. All the others lost time for one reason or another.

His ministerial appointments were Oak Hill, El Dorado Circuit, Mt. Ida, Hamburg Circuit, New Edinburg, Rowell, Maumelle and Oak Hill, Bright Star, Cherry Hill and Tomberlin.

He was superannuated in 1916 and moved to West Texas where he served as a supply pastor for a time. Leaving Texas in 1925, he went to Florida where he continued to preach for a year when his health utterly failed and he went to the Penney Farms of that state and was very happy in his location till his death.

While pastor at New Edinburg he married Mary Marks. No preacher ever had a more faithful and devoted wife. By a former marriage he was the father of four children who with his last wife survive him. They are respectively, Joseph, of Little Rock, Ark., Minnie Hale of Altus, Ark., Lawson, of San Antonio, Texas, and James, of Little Rock.

The ministry of Brother Revely was fruitful in conversions and additions to the church. His life was spent for the church which he loved with a passion. His fields of labor were large, for the most part, and the remuneration small. But that did not daunt him. He was not seeking an easy place, else he would never have joined the Conference.

On the evening of his death he sang aloud—"God Will Take Care Of You." It was his faith. He would die singing it out. Having concluded this hymn, his wife was reading aloud to him from his Bible when she detected a scarcely audible grasp and quickly turned to his bed. His spirit was gone.

Hugh Revely was "a good man, full of faith and of the Holy Ghost."

REV. JOHN C. McELHENNEY.

John Calvin, son of Jack and Amaretta Steel McElhenney, was born in Anover, Cleveland county, Arkansas, August 15, 1861, and died in Little Rock, Arkansas, October 26, 1930, age 69 years.

He was educated in the White Hill Academy and while his studies did not take a very wide range while he was a student, yet he received a very liberal education for a man of his day. It must be recalled that boys and girls born in Arkansas in 1861 had very little opportunity to be educated in so far as schools were concerned. The main business of the men of those years was to fight their northern neighbors in order that a few men of the south might hold on to their slaves. So that whatever of educational advantages came to young McElhenney were such as an impoverished country, torn by strifes engendered in war, could furnish.

After leaving school young McElhenney taught school for a number of years, and otherwise employed his time in useful labors in the community where he lived. He was never "triflingly" employed at any time.

On December 1, 1888, he married Miriam Rogers of Pine Bluff, Ark., and settled in that city with his wife. His life in this city of his choice was so fine and even that it was not necessary to make him the subject of headlines in the newspapers. To him were born five children, namely: Forest, Fern, Johnnie, now Mrs. C. E. Smith of Pine Bluff, Hazel, now Mrs. C. A. Edwards of Pine Bluff, and Dale.

In June of 1911 the wife of this good man went to her reward in

the home of the good. It was like a bolt of lightning hurled against a stately oak. John McElhenney was never the same any more. But far from allowing this tragedy to darken his life, he was rather sweetened by it. There came into his soul a hope in Christ that had not been there before.

In 1912 he was admitted on trial in the Little Rock Conference, and three years later, into full connection in that fellowship. His ministerial appointments were respectively, Hamburg Circuit, Eudora, Watson, Arkansas and Southern Camps, and Snyder.

In 1921 his health became critical and it was necessary for him to take the superannuated relation and go to the hospital. It proved to be the end of his labors. He was never able to take up work any more.

As his brethren knew him, the outstanding quality of his life was purity. He was careful, courteous, kind, gentle and loved everyone he knew, and prayed for people he never saw. He won his way into the hearts of his people by the goodness of his life as well as the truth and power of his messages. We may say of him as Luke says of Stephen, "He was a good man full of faith and of the Holy Ghost." These are the qualities that will save the world if it is ever saved at all. Whether it be church or state, if they be not led by men of this type, both alike are doomed to go on the rocks. There is no substitute for goodness in any thing.

REV. JOHN H. McKELVY

Rev. John H. McKelvey, son of Rev. William and Loula (Spain) McKelvy, was born December 11, 1859, in Moulton, Ala., and died at his home, 2516 Maple Street, Little Rock, Ark., Oct. 29, 1930. Brother McKelvy came to Arkansas in early life engaging in agriculture until he answered the higher call to the ministry. That he should become one of God's evangelists is not surprising as he was following in the footsteps of his father.

He served eleven years as a supply before joining the itinerant ministry. He entered the Little Rock Conference on trial, at Prescott, in the year 1894. He was received into full connection two years later at Camden, obtaining his Elder's orders at Little Rock in 1898, Bishop Morrison presiding.

The charges he served are as follows: Spring Hill Ct., one year; Genoa Ct., two years; DeAnn Ct., two years; Oak Hill Ct., one year; Hickory Plains Ct., one year; Des Arc Ct., three years; Carlisle Ct., two years; Bryant Ct., three years; Dalark Ct., two years; Cedar Glades Mission, four years; Princeton Ct., two years; Leola Ct., one year; Washington Ct., two years; and Keo and Tomberlin one year.

After his superannuation in 1922 he served five years in the Batesville District, North Arkansas Conference, supplying the Strangers' Home and Desha Works. Brother McKelvey was a courageous, earnest, and deeply spiritual minister, never compromising with wrong. He went forward without hesitancy, preaching, teaching, visiting from house to house, touching men of all classes and blessing lives everywhere.

He came to a beautiful sunset, his last days being rich in faith, great

in hope and full in loving ministry. He often spoke of being ready to answer the call, of his assurance of a rich inheritance and the glory that awaited him. He was truly a benediction to those who were privileged to be with him in his declining days. He suffered long, never complaining, only thinking of the comfort of others. His first wife died several years ago and he had married again.

He is survived by his wife, a son,, A. C. McKelvy of Bloomburg, Texas, and a daughter, Mrs. May Mason of Vivian, La. The funeral was held Friday, October 31, 1930, at Henderson Church. The Rev. J. H. Glass and the writer were in charge.

She was educated in the public schools, Henderson-Brown, State Teachers, and Peabody Colleges.

She was a teacher by natural gift as well as by training. She entered the teaching profession after finishing school. Nearly her entire teaching experience was in the Benton schools where she won a lasting place in the lives of parents and children. Her influence in the town of Benton was quiet but strong and abiding. She will live on in the lives of that community.

She, being the oldest, helped very materially in shaping and edu-

cating the other children in the Scott home. She led and they followed in the noble teaching profession. The Scott home has always stood for the highest and noblest ideals, these, backed by the precept and example of Mary, their eldest, enabled them possibly to shape the destinies of their children in a way that could not have been without the strong backing that she gave.

In September, 1925, she became the wife of Dr. Alonzo Monk. Many people thought she had made a mistake in marrying a man considerably older than herself, and that happiness would not ensue. As in her other life choices she knew her own mind and heart. The writer had ample opportunities to be convinced that Dr. and Mrs. Monk were happily married. They made no mistake. It was a short but beautiful blending of two great lives. They were as devoted to each other as could be. She never recovered from the fearful shock of his sudden going after three and a half years of happy wedded life. She lived only a year and a half after he went.

Scott, Cline and Monk! Three names in Arkansas Methodism of abiding interest. Mary Scott had the blood of the first two in her veins, with her life blended with the latter. Benton and Saline county will always be better because of the Scotts, Clines and Monks. And so will Christianity and the Methodist Church. When only a country boy, the writer came under the influence of the Scotts. They were T. D., Frank, Sole, and Uncle Patrick Scott. These men all touched my early life and helped me wonderfully. Then came the Clines, when I went away to school. Mrs. Monk was the granddaughter of Reverend J. M. Cline. She is the niece of Dr. John W. Cline, for more than 30 years a missionary to China, and nearly half the time president of our great University of Soochow. And then came the Monks, the peers of any and everywhere. Dr. Monk was one of Methodism's greatest preachers. This no one will deny. All who are in position to know are proud of the Scotts, Clines and Monks as Arkansas families.

Mary never knew anything but to be a Christian. She became a member of the Methodist Church at the age of six. She loved the church and the work of the church. Her's was the old type of Methodist orthodoxy. She considered things once wrong are still so. Time with her could not make them right for the practice of Christians. She stood by old time Methodist teaching.

The writer of this brief sketch moved into the local parsonage at Benton to serve as pastor during the vacation period of the pastor. We had anticipated sweet fellowship with Mrs. Monk as one of the few whom we personally knew in the church. But it was not to be so. She had been in the hospital and under the care of the doctors for some weeks but had returned home and was pronounced better, and thought to be on the road to recovery. A turn came for the worse about the time we went into the parsonage, and we were never permitted to see her. The summons came for her to move into the Heavenly Home. She met death unafraid on the morning of the 23rd of June, 1930. The writer, assisted by Dr. W. C. Martin and Rev. J. W. Mann, conducted her funeral in the Benton Church in the presence of a large congregation of relatives and friends. Her body rests on a beautiful hill in the Pine Crest Memorial Park half way between Benton and Little Rock in the

Collegeville community, within a few hundred yards of where her sainted grandfather, Reverend J. M. Cline, lived and preached more than 50 years ago.

There were eight children in this home—including three step-children of a former marriage of Brother Poynter. One child, Rose Poynter, died in May, 1922. Her other surviving children are Mrs. J. W. Graves, Mrs. W. E. Gilmore, Mr. L. D. Poynter, all of Pine Bluff; Mrs. L. C. Smith of Stephens. Her step-children who survive are Mrs. J. M. Henry of Redfield, Mrs. Ben Watson and Mr. R. S. Poynter of Pine Bluff.

For several months Mrs. Poynter had been in failing health, and made a trip to the Pacific coast in hopes that the change of climate would effect a change. She returned later to her home on West 17th, Pine Bluff, where she remained until a few days before her death. She was removed to the Davis hospital where she passed away on the morning of January 20, 1930. Funeral services were held at Hawley Memorial Church the afternoon of January 21, conducted by Rev. L. W. Evans, Rev. J. A. Coleman, Rev. J. L. Cannon and the writer. Her spirit lives with her risen Christ in His Eternal Kingdom and her body sleeps in beautiful Graceland at Pine Bluff.

All of Brother Brewster's children are members of the church, several of them active members of the Lakeside Methodist Church.

As another evidence of his devotion to the church, he gave the beautiful chimes of the organ of the Lakeside Methodist Church to the memory of his deceased wife and deceased children.

On October 26, 1929, he laid down the burdens of this life to inherit that life incorruptible that fadeth not away. On a quiet Sunday afternoon on October 27, in the Lakeside Methodist Church in the presence of his loved ones and a large company of friends, his funeral was held by the writer and the Rev. L. E. N. Hundley.
