STANDING RULES

1. *Nominations.* The presiding elders shall be a standing committee on nominations, and shall nominate all members of the quadrennial boards and annual committees; also the Conference Treasurer.
2. *Undergraduates.* Undergraduates who remain in the same class more than two successive years will be discontinued or located unless they are in school. Extraordinary circumstances and a two-thirds vote of the Conference will be necessary to override this rule.
3. *Conference Program.* The pastor-host of the Conference, the presiding elder in whose district the Conference session is held, and the chairman of the Committee on Evangelism, shall constitute a Committee on Conference Program. This committee shall arrange, not less than sixty days before the Conference meets, for all preaching or other inspirational services, and select the speakers for each service. The program made by this committee shall be subject to revision as the exigencies of any situation may require or the Conference direct.
4. *Conference Treasurer.* The Conference shall elect quadrennially a Conference treasurer who shall give bond to the Board of Trustees in such sum as the Conference may determine, and who shall receive and disburse such funds as the Conference may direct. The premium on the treasurer's bond shall be paid out of the Conference expense fund.
5. *Auditing Accounts.*—The books of the Conference treasurer and of the treasurer of each Conference Board shall be audited annually within sixty days after the adjournment of the Conference session, by a qualified public accountant, such accountant to be employed by the Secretary of the Conference and paid out of the Conference expense fund. The reports of the accountant shall be filed with the Conference Secretary, and the results thereof published in the Conference Journal.
6. *Financial and Statistical.*
 - (1) All assessments for Conference claims and all reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars with no columns for cents.
 - (2) Each pastor shall settle with the Conference treasurer, and turn over his statistical reports with the treasurer's receipt attached, the first day of the Conference.
 - (3) The presiding elder will furnish the statistical secretary with all assessments on pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the annual Conference meets.
7. *Conference Claimants.* The Board of Finance shall co-operate with the Board of Trustees in securing homes for Conference Claimants and additional donations to the Conference Superannuate Endowment Fund. Such homes and funds shall be held in trust by the Board of Trustees.
8. *Memoirs of Preachers' Wives.* Memoirs of preachers' wives who have died shall be read at the Memorial session of the Conference and published in the Conference Journal, and preachers' wives shall be invited to take part in the Memorial session.
9. *Conference Expense Fund.* The Budget Committee shall make an assessment for a Conference expense fund to cover the cost of all clerical work necessary in preparing Conference records, printing and distributing the Conference Minutes, for preserving Conference records and documents, and all legitimate expenses incurred by the Conference Secretary and the Conference Treasurer in carrying out the orders of the Conference. The Conference Treasurer shall be custodian of this fund which shall be paid out on the order of the Conference Secretary.
10. *Reports and Resolutions.* All reports, resolutions and other papers intended for publication in the Conference Minutes shall be typewritten and in triplicate.
11. *History Commission.* There shall be a self-perpetuating History Commission composed of five clerical members of the Conference, one of whom shall be the Secretary of the Conference, whose duty it shall be to collect and preserve biographical data of clerical members of the Conference, data of all kinds that promise to be of historical interest and value, the Conference records, and other documents of historical value. The Commission shall make a quadrennial report to the Conference at the session next following the General Conference.
12. *Lay Representation.* Lay representation in District Conferences shall consist of four members elected by the Quarterly Conference of each pastoral charge. Alternate delegates shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference.
13. *Repealed.* All actions and parts of actions of the Conference, which may be construed as standing rules, which were taken prior to the annual session of 1928, and which are not contained in, or are in conflict with the foregoing rules are hereby repealed.
14. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided that the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing a day before the vote is taken.

Dobbs presiding. The Bishop conducted devotional services. The roll of the conference was called and the roll was perfected by substituting alternate lay delegates for principals. C. J. Greene was elected Secretary, and Clem Baker, A. J. Christie and Claude R. Roy, Assistant Secretaries, and R. E. Fawcett, R. A. Terry, F. R. Harrison and A. W. Hamilton, Assistant Statistical Secretaries. C. E. Whitten was elected a year ago Statistical Secretary for the quadrennium.

Time of Sessions.—The time of meeting and adjourning of the Conference sessions was made 9 a. m. and 12:30 p. m., respectively.

Jarrell of the General Hospital Board, Dr. M. P. Wood of the Methodist Benevolent Association and Dr. J. M. Williams, Rev. A. F. Skinner, Rev. J. W. Workman, Rev. H. K. Morehead, and C. O. Hall, all of the North Arkansas Conference.

Rural Life Commission.—The Commission on Rural Life made its report and the report was adopted.

Night Session.—A motion was adopted that when we adjourn, we adjourn to meet at 7 p. m.

Rural Work.—It was announced that S. T. Baugh, Extension Secretary of the Board of Christian Education, would be given the first fifteen minutes of the night session to present his work.

To Visit Hendrix College.—A motion carried that the Conference accept the invitation of Hendrix College to attend the dedication of the Science Building at 10 o'clock Saturday morning.

Addresses Conference.—Dr. M. P. Wood spoke on the Methodist Benevolent Association.

Afternoon Preacher.—It was announced that J. L. Cannon would preach at 3 p. m.

Adjournment.—The doxology was sung and the Conference adjourned with thee benediction by Dr. W. W. Benson of the New York Conference.

FIRST DAY—WEDNESDAY EVENING SESSION

REPORT OF BIBLE BOARD

The Depository in Little Rock, sponsored by the Southwestern agency, Dallas, Texas, with Reverend D. H. Colquette, as agent, has this year distributed over 45,000 volumes; around 25,000 volumes have been given to drouth sufferers.

The calls for donations this year are very heavy. The law, in our state, requiring Bible reading in all tax supported schools has created a big demand for Bibles. Many volumes of embossed scriptures are being placed with the blind.

Recommendations

1. That Reverend D. H. Colquette be appointed agent of the American Bible Society.
2. That this body endorse heartily the efforts of the Society to reach the people with God's Word.
3. That inasmuch as Sunday, December 6th, Universal Bible Sunday, comes in this Conference session, some Sunday in December be set aside as Bible Sunday, and that the pastors of this Conference cooperate with our Conference agent in calling attention of their congregations to the fact that the Bible is fundamental in all work and programs.
4. That this Conference cooperate with him in distributing the Bible among the people.

for cultivation purposes. There will be a study book for the January-February period. Samples of all literature will be sent out for Stewards' Meetings and Institutes. Previously this literature has been supplied only on orders, but this year it will be sent direct to pastors without orders, but this will not be done with the Study Book, which will be shipped only on orders from pastors. The first delivery will be two weeks after Conference adjournment, and the second early in January. Pastors are requested to be ready for the literature and to use it wisely.

Your Commission on Benevolences recommends:

(1) That, in view of the urgent appeal, approved by our Bishops, for a freewill offering, November 29 or December 6, to which an immediate response was impossible on account of our Conference session, we urge pastors and people to keep this appeal in mind when considering the claims of Kingdom Extension so that offerings to meet the crisis may be more prompt and liberal.

(2) That the cooperation of the Board of Lay Activities be accepted and Lay Leaders be urged to effectuate the plans of the Conference in presenting these financial interests.

(3) That the attention of pastors and official boards be directed to the law in the Discipline requiring that when collections are budgeted the distribution should be prorated and money collected for Benevolences should not be used for any other purpose.

(4) That an Executive Committee of the Commission on Benevolences be constituted and that it shall consist of the Conference Executive Chairman, the Secretary-Treasurer, and three others so selected by the Executive Chairman as to require a minimum of time and expense in attending meetings, and the Committee shall meet quarterly on the call of the chairman.

(5) That pastors be requested to report quarterly to their presiding elders the amounts pledged and paid on both Benevolences and Kingdom Extension, and the presiding elders be requested to report the same in tabular form quarterly to the Executive Committee.

Report No. 1

The consolidation of Boards by the General Conference at Dallas and the consolidation of College by the Conferences in Arkansas, coinciding in time, promise results for the Church if the spirit and objectives of both are fully realized.

Whether these results are large or small depends upon the thoroughness with which these consolidations are organized and worked out in the next two years down through the District and Quarterly Conferences and in the local Church.

Accordingly the Conference hereby authorizes the Board of Christian Education to give special emphasis to this cause by effecting the most thorough organization of the work throughout the Conference, including the local Church.

To make the plans of the Board effective, the Conference calls upon the Bishop, presiding elders, pastors, church officials and colleges to co-operate whole-heartedly to the end that our Church in Arkansas may become a model to the entire Church in the field of Christian Education.

Report No. 2

For the sake of economy we are confining our report to recommendations which have to be passed upon by this Conference.

Recommendations

1. That the money received by the Board of Christian Education from Conference Assessments this year be distributed as follows:

41.18% for Conference Promotion.

58.82% for the Colleges.

2. That the Commission on Budget be requested to make the following apportionment for the Board of Christian Education next year: \$8,000.00 for schools and colleges; \$5,600.00 for Conference Promotion; \$1,136.00 for the Pastors' School, and that the income from the apportionment for schools and colleges be apportioned to the two colleges by the Finance Committee of the Board of Trustees.

3. That increased interest be placed upon the Christmas Offering for our Orphanage in all our Church schools and Young People's organizations.

4. That Sunday School Day and Young People's Anniversary Day be observed in all our Churches and that our goal for Sunday School Day be placed at \$5,000.00 and our goal for Young People's Anniversary Day be placed at \$1,300.00.

5. That we commend the work being done by our student pastor at the State University, express our Conference appreciation for same, regret that our finances are such that we cannot at present make any appropriation for his support, and go on record in expressing the purpose of our Conference to resume our share of the support of this work as soon as our finances permit.

6. That we adopt the following resolutions: "Whereas, there is being made today an insistent demand on both Hendrix and Galloway Colleges for student help, and, since this student help cannot be given unless the Colleges can secure it from sources outside of their regular income, therefore, we request of the Conference the authority for appointing a committee headed by our Executive Secretary to work in collaboration with a like committee from the Colleges and that this joint committee be instructed, authorized and empowered to make a study of this matter and to execute such plans as may be deemed best in securing the scholarships."

7. That each Presiding Elder's District be requested to raise at least \$200.00 as a scholarship for the School of Theology of Southern Methodist University.

8. That in our Conference Promotion the approach to the Local Church be made through the Local Church Board of Christian Education and that in all phases of our Promotion Work the interest of our schools and colleges be made as definitely a part of our work as the interest of the church school and young people's organization.

9. In keeping with the recommendation of our General Board we place our major emphasis as follows, for the next Conference year:

(1) Organization and cultivation of Local Church Boards of Christian Education.

(2) Making the school and college an integral part of our unified educational program.

(3) Promotion of our Home and Foreign Mission Special.

(4) Membership increase, or reaching the unreached.

(5) Promotion of our own Methodist Literature.

(6) Rural Church Promotion.

10. For Trustees of the Trinity College System we nominate the following for election by the Conference: Rev. F. A. Buddin, to succeed himself, for a six year term, as Conference Trustee; Mr. V. D. Hill, to succeed himself, for a term of six years, as Alumni Trustee; Mr. Geo. W. Donaghey, to succeed himself for a term of six years, as Trustee at Large; Dr. C. M. Reves, to fill the unexpired term of Dr. W. C. Martin, as Conference Trustee; Mr. E. D. McQuiston to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Vernon L. Thompson, as Alumni Trustee.

11. We nominate Dr. J. L. Cannon to succeed himself as the Little Rock Conference representative on the Board of Trustees of Southern Methodist University.

12. We have elected the following and recommend their appointments to the office indicated: S. T. Baugh, Extension Secretary of the Board of Christian Education; Clem Baker, Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education. We have elected the following to serve without salary: Miss Fay McRae, Conference Director of Children's Work; Harold D. Sadler, Conference Director of Young People's Work; C. K. Wilkerson, Conference Director of Adult Work.

13. We recommend the following appointments: Professor Emory University, R. C. Rhodes; Vice-President and Professor Hendrix College, C. J. Greene; Student S. M. U., R. W. Menard.

14. We have elected the following, as members of our Conference Board representatives on joint boards and committees:

(1) Pastors' School—Paul W. Quillian, C. J. Greene, H. H. Griffin, Clem Baker, J. C. Glenn.

(2) Joint Committee with Board of Missions—C. E. Hayes, O. C. Landers, Clem Baker.

(3) Trustees of Western Methodist Assembly—A. C. Millar, Mrs. H. King Wade, Carl Hollis.

(4) Joint Committee with Board of Church Extension—R. E. L. Bearden, J. J. Tibbits, Miss Roxie Deal.

15. For your information, we give the following salaries paid by our Board this year: Executive Secretary, \$3,400.00; Extension Secretary, \$2,700.00; Office Secretary, \$1,020.00. Our expenses for the year have been around \$1,000.00 more than our income. We have, therefore, reduced our budget for the next year so as to keep within our expected income and repay the deficit for this year.

16. We submit herewith our treasurer's report which was prepared before the opening of Conference. We request permission to have our treasurer bring this report down to date after he has received the report from the Conference Treasurer, so as to show the actual financial status of our Board at the close of business for this Conference Year. This can be done in time to be turned over to our Conference Secretary by Sunday night.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF FINANCE

Report No. 1

In view of the inability of the Methodist Benevolent Association to secure contracts with a sufficient number of conferences to take over our group, and in view of the discontinuance of our group plan with the Central States Life, and realizing the need of some protection for our preachers and their families, a plan has been formulated, to be known as the Little Rock Annual Conference Orphans' and Widows' Benefit. This plan proposes not only to include the preachers and their families, but the laymen as well. We have given the plan careful thought and due consideration.

We therefore recommend:

1. The organization and adoption of the Little Rock Annual Conference Orphans' and Widows' Benefit, as will be subsequently outlined in a separate report.

2. We nominate as members of the Board of Managers and recommend the election of the following: James Thomas, John C. Glenn, John A. Henderson, C. E. Hayes, and Leland Clegg, the first three named constituting the executive committee of the Board of Managers.

3. In addition to the afore-named, we recommend that the Presiding Elders of the several districts in our Conference be ex-officio members of the Board of Managers.

4. That our preachers and laymen cooperate whole-heartedly in

the inauguration of this movement, which will be a God-send to many of our preachers and their families and afford needed protection for many of our brethren.

Report No. 2

The General Conference of 1930 authorized the continuation of the Superannuate Endowment movement through the quadrennium of 1930-34, and that our Board of Finance in St. Louis, be charged with the direction of this continued effort, looking to the completion of the special effort during this period.

This continuation of effort will be similar to what the movement has been previously; that is, without exacting from the church such attention as will disrupt her regular program. It is expected, however, that every church, having an unpaid quota balance, will make a real effort to pay its adjusted quota.

It was further provided that the Presiding Elders, during the Conference year of 1930-31, should have the Quarterly Conferences adjust the unpaid quota balances of all charges and send reports on all adjustments to the General Board of Finance in St. Louis.

We recommend:

1. That the Little Rock Annual Conference designate May as "Superannuate Endowment Month" and that the Presiding Elders and Pastors keep this month inviolate for the purpose of raising the Superannuate Endowment Fund.

2. That we respectfully ask our Presiding Elders to provide in the programs of their respective district conferences an opportunity for the Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment to speak in behalf of this worthy cause.

3. That we also request the Presiding Elders and Pastors to complete the adjustment of quota balances throughout the Conference on or before May 1, 1932.

4. That, upon recommendation of and nomination by the General Board of Finance, we request our Presiding Bishop to re-appoint Reverend J. C. Glenn as Conference Director for 1931-32, who shall serve in connection with his regular appointment.

5. That the changes in charge and district boundary lines made by the Bishop and his Cabinet be published in our Conference minutes or else reported to the General Board of Finance by the Secretary of the Cabinet.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON GROUP INSURANCE

During the session of our Annual Conference, which met in Pine Bluff, November 12-16, 1930, a resolution was formally passed requesting and authorizing our Bishop, Hoyt M. Dobbs, to appoint a committee of five with power to act at its discretion and to cooperate with similar committees of other conferences for the purpose of forming a connectational group system for the benefit of the entire body of the ministry of the church. It being understood that this group insurance system was to be operated by the Methodist Benevolent Association on its plans and system, as outlined in its "Ideal Group Plan."

The committee, as appointed by the Bishop, met immediately following our conference for organization and the consideration of the group plan, as outlined by the Methodist Benevolent Association.

Due to the inability of the association to induce a sufficient number of the Annual Conferences to cooperate, the group system which they proposed was dropped and their proposal to our conference withdrawn. But your committee considered other possible plans for group insurance, finally entering into a contract with the Central State Life Insurance Company, which took over the assets and liabilities of the Old Home Life Insurance Company of Little Rock. We were compelled to discontinue this group insurance contract with the Central States Life at the end of the six months' period, which ended November 11, 1931. Several of the members of the group were unable to pay their premiums, and a still larger number of our younger pastors did not enter into the group at the beginning.

We have closed up the matter and have made adjustments with all pastors whose premium payments covered one year. There is no outstanding indebtedness, so far as a group plan for 1930-31 is concerned.

In view of the inability of the Methodist Benevolent Association to take over our group, and in view of the discontinuance of our Group insurance with the Central States Life, we, your committee, make the following recommendations:

1. That a conference Benevolent Association be organized, to be known as the Little Rock Annual Conference Widows' and Orphans' Benevolent Fund. The details and plans for such organization to be presented and acted upon early during our present conference session.

2. And that the Board of Managers for this association be nominated by our Conference Board of Finance and elected by the annual conference, the details of which shall be presented by a group that has been studying the problem for some weeks.

We kindly request the Bishop and the Conference to accept this as our final report and beg to be discharged, there being no further work to be done.

REPORT OF HOSPITAL BOARD

It was a privilege to have with us Dr. C. C. Jarrell, General Secretary of our General Hospital Board and a source of satisfaction to hear his good report. Last year Barnes Hospital, St. Louis, completed a \$750,000 surgical building which has a \$400,000 endowment. Our hospital at Lexington, Ky., is erecting an unusually fine building to cost \$500,000 as a memorial to his mother by Mr. H. L. Ott. Duke University has opened its great medical center, combining the Medical College and Hospital, costing \$400,000 with a 6,000,000 endowment. At Savannah, Ga., a hospital, to be known as the Warren A. Candler Hospital, has been acquired. Its value is \$400,000, and is expected to become an important medical center. With limited means our General Board is promoting every worthy hospital enterprise, and could do vastly more if it had funds.

As our Golden Cross contributions go to the Tuberculosis Hospital

and Sanitarium at Tucson, Ariz., we are especially gratified to learn of its progress and fine management. We regret that our contributions have been so meager, and urge our pastors to present the Golden Cross and undertake to create interest and secure larger funds. This collection interferes with no other and makes a strong appeal to a certain class of people. To prosecute our Golden Cross campaign we nominate for director ----- and suggest that the district directors give him hearty cooperation.

As our last General Conference approved a movement to establish a Connectional Sanitarium at Hot Springs, a city peculiarly suited to an enterprise of that kind, we are keeping that objective in mind and shall undertake to start a movement when conditions seem favorable.

As the next session of the Methodist Hospital Association is to meet, next spring in Memphis, we have elected as our delegates to that Association Mrs. H. King Wade, J. D. Hammons, and A. C. Millar.

Realizing the great need of continued study of this most important topic, we recommend that the program of Stewardship education be continued along the same lines as last year, and recommend September as the month of special emphasis upon the Christian doctrine of self-denial in the interest of the sacred causes of our Church as represented in the Benevolence and the Kingdom Extension Offering. We therefore recommend that we promote lay programs, the distribution of literature, Stewardship study in Pastors Schools and Adult Bible Classes, and in Standard Training Schools. That April and May of the remaining years of the quadrennium be designated for special Stewardship emphasis.

Benevolences

We recommend a more intense effort on the part of our layman looking to the full collection of these sacred funds, and urge every District, Charge and Circuit Lay Leader together with the respective Boards, to co-operate fully in securing pledges for the Benevolences and to labor zealously for the full collection of same. We are fully persuaded that an every member canvass should be made for the Benevolences as soon after the adjournment of the Conference as possible, thus eliminating a possible conflict with the canvass for Kingdom Extension causes. We urge every

Layman, to make it possible to attend the missionary institutes held in the interest of the Kingdom Extension causes, as well as urging them to take active part in securing pledges for same.

Men's Work

We urge our Pastors and Lay Leaders to study more closely the needs of spiritual culture and development among our men, and to co-operate in plans that will promote helpful activity on the part of all of our men of the Churches throughout the Conference to the end that we as a Church may harness this great man power for the Kingdom of God, that plans for more fellowship among our men be worked out and made operative wherever possible, as well as planning study of those spiritual truths that will be helpful in our great work.

Spiritual Life

We as Laymen wish to assume our part in the program as set out by the Commission on Spiritual Life, and we call upon all the laymen of this Conference to deepen their own Spiritual experience by prayer, Bible study, worship, service and such other activities in the work of the Kingdom as will best serve humanity and the Great Teacher who went about doing good, thus assisting them to acquire a greater spiritual experience as Christ's followers.

Laymen's Day

We concur in the plan of the General Board for observance of Laymen's Day, using as the theme for 1932 "THE IDEAL LAYMAN," and we request the Conference to designate the second Sunday in June for this observance, and we request the co-operation of the Presiding Elders with the District Lay Leaders in making this observance worth while to our entire Conference.

Lay Speaking

Recognizing the importance of Lay speaking in promoting and carrying out the entire program of the Church, we recommend an intensive program of lay speaking throughout the Conference, and call attention to the various lay leaders, District, Charge and Circuit, as well as all Pastors to the importance of the Kingdom, and we urge the use of lay speakers wherever and whenever same can be done to advance the interests of the Kingdom of God.

Pastor's Salaries

We feel a deep interest in the matter of reducing salaries in the smaller town and city churches and in the Circuits, and as members of the great rank and file that are called upon the pay these items of expense, we wish to caution the Boards of Stewards against too drastic reductions in the salaries of pastors in the class of churches named. We are of the opinion that reduction might be made in overhead items rather than in salaries of Pastors who are receiving compensation in the sum of less than \$3,000.00, or even of that amount.

Methodist Layman

We recommend the Methodist Layman for the men of the Church, and particularly for Boards of Stewards, and we urge our Pastors and Lay Leaders to put forth a greater effort to secure the widest circulation possible, setting as a goal "one copy to every Steward and Layman in the Conference."

MINUTES LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE

Delegate to the Missionary Council

Believing that the best interests of the Missionary cause and of the Kingdom as a whole can be served through a thorough knowledge of the Missionary plans and program, we recommend that this Conference elect some outstanding Layman to the Missionary Council as a delegate from the Board of Lay Activities to the end that our laymen may have a keener insight into this great program, and we nominate G. W. Pardee as such delegate, and ask that the Conference approve this selection.

In Appreciation

We wish to record our appreciation and love and our esteem for all our Bishops, Presiding Elders and Pastors and we pledge to them our loyal support in all their labors for the Church.

Conference Lay Leader

We nominate G. W. Pardee of Little Rock as Conference Lay Leader for the coming year and request that he be elected.

Member Board of Managers of Pastor's School

We nominate J. S. M. Cannon of Little Rock as a member of the Board of Managers of the Pastor's summer school and request that he be nominated.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

We note with pleasure the ever increasing value and practical application of Church School publications. While communications in our hands disclose a slight decrease in the number of periodicals sent out, there is no occasion for discouragement. We note with appreciation the high type of character of our General Organ, the Christian Advocate, and commend it to all our laymen as one of the best church publications in any land.

We also note the continued progress of the publishing depart-

ment of our publishing house and that the patronage of its book department upon the part of our laymen is increasing.

From the Publishing House revenue for the current year has been set aside \$100,000.00 for distribution among our Conference claimants. For this we are much gratified.

We also commend the Missionary Voice and the Methodist Layman as a challenge to our spiritual growth and comprehension. We have also had before us a report of the Arkansas Methodist Commission and from this report we note the hopeful outlook for the paper. The editor of our paper, Dr. A. C. Millar is standing faithfully and sacrificially in his place and bearing the burden in a heroic way.

We find that there must be a more wholehearted response in support of our Conference Organ in the matter of securing arrears on subscriptions and new subscribers. Under provisions for operation the coming year it is hoped that our pastors and laymen will respond fully to the needs of the paper. We urge that special emphasis be given to this interest under the thirty and ninety day proposition submitted to the pastors:

The subscription price has been reduced, until March 1, to \$1.50, on account of the decreased price of all commodities, and efforts should be diligently made to put on a subscription campaign during the fall and early winter. Consequently, responding to the request of the Arkansas Methodist Commission, we pledge ourselves to push the campaign for the Arkansas Methodist, and in order that it may have be in the hands of our people throughout the year and that it may have the benefit of early collections while our people have some money, we ask all pastors who do not move to make their subscription canvass within thirty days after Conference adjourns and all other pastors to make their canvass within ninety days.

We submit the following recommendations:

1. We approve the editorial work and management by the editor, Dr. A. C. Millar.
2. We recommend the appointment of the present commissioners to succeed themselves.

ARKANSAS METHODIST ORPHANAGE REPORT

We have read with care the report of Dr. James Thomas, Superintendent of our orphanage. We are glad to state that our people, generally, are supporting this Christ-like institution with much enthusiasm. Our preachers, without exception, are interested in and loyal to our home.

We wish to give our hearty expression of confidence in and appreciation of the untiring efforts and efficient administration of Dr. James Thomas, our able superintendent. His report discloses the fact that the orphanage is entirely out of debt and, at the end of the fiscal year, October 1, 1931, had a cash balance on hand of \$987.61.

Eleven of the children have been placed in, what the Board of Trustees believes to be, good homes, and one is now a student of Hendrix College. Seven children have been received into the home during the year. Up to the present time, our Board of Trustees has placed 513 children in good homes, and the records prove that they have made the minimum of mistakes.

A careful study of the report of the Superintendent further indicates that economy has been the keynote and they have curtailed expenses wherever possible and practicable.

We recommend the adoption of the following items:

First, that we accept and approve the report of the Board of Trustees, as submitted by Dr. James Thomas, superintendent.

Second, that our Conference recommend an assessment of five thousand dollars for the ensuing year for the home.

Third, that Sunday, December 20, 1931, be designated as Arkansas Methodist Orphanage Day and that all pastors, Sunday School superintendents, presidents of Women's Missionary Societies, and other church leaders be urged to support this Christ-like movement and that the offering be sent to Dr. James Thomas, Superintendent-Treasurer. In case of two-point charges and circuits, we suggest that they begin early in December, in order that every congregation may be given an opportunity to share in this most helpful enterprise.

Fourth, that we extend to "Mother Steed" our heart-felt thanks and deep appreciation of the wonderful work she has done and is now doing.

Fifth, that we express our love and our appreciation of the services of Reverend Roy E. Fawcett, pastor of our home for orphans.

REPORT OF RURAL CHURCH COMMISSION

Report No. 1

We, your Commission on the Rural Church work, have interpreted our task to be the promotion of all phases of our Rural Church work, including evangelism, cultivation, extension and conservation.

We have co-operated with your Conference Commission on Evange-

lism in promoting a Conference-wide Rural Church evangelistic campaign. In doing this we selected a Director for each District and assisted such Directors in holding District set-up meetings at which time plans were made in each District for holding revival meetings in all country churches using volunteer service. The results of this evangelistic campaign have been gratifying. We call special attention to the circuit-wide evangelistic campaign held on the Pine Bluff Circuit during which time eight revival meetings were held simultaneously; to a central meeting on the Austin Circuit all churches co-operating; to some fine meetings in the Texarkana District.

We have felt that any constructive program of rural Church work should be based upon a knowledge of the actual conditions and needs of our rural Churches. Hence we have attempted this year to make a careful survey of just as many churches as we could reach. In this phase of our work we have used Rev. S. T. Baugh, our Conference Extension Secretary.

In order that each District might have more careful supervision we have organized District Rural Church Commissions to co-operate with your Conference Commission. In no case have we undertaken work in Districts except under the supervision of the District Commission. Your Commission held a meeting November 16, 1931, at which time we heard the annual report of your Extension Secretary, and give you herewith a summary of his accomplishments.

He has worked principally in five Districts. They are the Pine Bluff, Arkadelphia, Little Rock, Prescott, and Texarkana. He has visited 56 circuits, 283 active churches and 80 abandoned churches. He has represented your Commission in 40 Quarterly Conferences this year. He reports 58 churches in this territory with no Sunday School; 188 churches where the young people are not organized; 223 churches where the women are not organized; 197 churches needing repairs and 229 churches needing repainting. He has located 80 abandoned churches within these five Districts. Of this number something like 30 churches have been reopened this year with regular preaching services, and Sunday Schools organized in some of them. He has traveled 24,000 miles this year trying to encourage and help our country people.

In addition to this field of work, your Extension Secretary has compiled a report of every Circuit visited with the result that we now have on file a complete description of 350 country churches with recommendations as to what steps should be taken in regard to each of these churches. Upon this information we feel that our Conference is now ready to make intelligent plans for conserving our rural territory. We doubt that there is any other Conference in Southern Methodism possessing such valuable information as is now in the hands of your Rural Church Commission.

Your Commission believes that our Pastors' School offers a priceless opportunity for helping our rural pastors. We have therefore insisted that strong courses in rural Church work be put in the Pastors' School program and have assisted in making it possible for all rural pastors to attend who would avail themselves of this privilege.

Our country people are discouraged. Our first task must be to bring them to see the importance of the country church and its contribution to the building of the Kingdom. The glory of Methodism has been and still should be in her ministry to our rural population.

The position of the rural preacher must be magnified. Heroism is not

dead. When our people from Bishop down to the humblest member come to think, speak and act as though they actually believe it is just as honorable and just as much a mark of success to be sent to a country circuit as it is to be appointed to a station, we believe that our best qualified men will be found accepting the opportunity to work in the country. A few of our best equipped young men are already showing the way.

We must again take for our goal the old Wesleyan motto: "The World is My Parish." Instead of serving charges we must conquer areas. Instead of ministering to a given number of Church members, we must seek to reach the last man, woman and child for whom we are responsible. Instead of counting in dollars and cents the loss or gain that may come from some neglected country church, we must think in terms of immortal souls that may be lost or won to the Kingdom of God. To this end we recommend:

First, that our Presiding Elders regard their appointments not to so many charges but to a geographical area with the avowed purpose of seeing that not one soul within that territory is left without a shepherd.

Second, that immediately after Conference the Presiding Elder assign to some pastoral oversight all churches and communities where we have a responsibility, and not already provided for, so that there shall be left no one acre of "No Man's Land" within any District.

We believe that in the last analysis our rural Church work depends upon our rural pastors. We therefore recommend:

(1) That the utmost care be given in the selection of a pastor for each rural charge.

(2) That long term rural pastorates be encouraged among both people and preachers.

(3) That our people be led to a more adequate support of our rural pastors.

(4) That provisions be made for all rural pastors to attend the Pastors' School.

(5) That Rural Pastors' Institutes be held in each District.

Since our principal source of financial support of your Rural Church program, including the salary and traveling expenses of your Extension Secretary, is the fourth Sunday missionary offering from the Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues, we recommend that more careful attention be given to this offering in all our churches.

We recommend further that this Rural Church Commission be continued throughout this Quadrennium. That we ask the Board of Christian Education to nominate, and Bishop Dobbs to appoint Rev. S. T. Baugh Extension Secretary for another year. That our survey of rural Church conditions be continued until all rural Churches in the Conference have been reached. That this Commission be authorized to call together a group of rural pastors for the purpose of preparing a Rural Church Program of Work to be submitted to all Districts in the Conference for the guidance of rural pastors. That our town and city churches be asked to give an evening service for the presentation of an illustrated lecture on the condition and needs of our rural Churches in Arkansas. That steps be taken as speedily as possible for conserving the results of our survey through the holding of rural Church institutes, Cokesbury Schools, organizing the Women and Young People, improving physical property, beautifying church grounds and other ways as opportunity may afford.

Finally we wish to record our conviction that all signs point to a new

day in our rural Church work in Arkansas, and not the least among the encouraging signs is the fact that our Bishop and Presiding Elders have appointed this Commission and are giving this subject much of their valuable time.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE DIRECTOR OF SUPERANNUATE ENDOWMENT

Due to the fact that the general commission on Benevolences has requested the secretaries of the various boards to take not more than five minutes this year representing their work at the several annual conferences, in order to give the representatives of the commission ample time to represent the benevolences, the General Board of Finance is not sending a special representative to our conference this year.

The total amount paid this year by the General Board of Finance for the support of the Claimants of Southern Methodism is \$312,806.16. The permanent endowment is now \$6,150,000.00.

That you may know the growth of the Little Rock Annual Conference Superannuate Endowment fund that is being handled by the Board of Finance, I quote from the official Communication of Dr. Luther E. Todd, our general secretary to the Conference Board of Finance, of which I am chairman, "The Little Rock Conference fund, as of March 31, 1931, aggregated \$56,553.05. The income therefrom for the fiscal year, ending March 31, 1931, totaled \$3,064.98.

The standing of the Little Rock Annual Conference on special effort quota payments is most gratifying. We stand sixteenth in the line of conferences of Southern Methodism, which means that we are in a group representing the high standing on quota payments. The original quota assumed by our Conference was \$245,938.20. Of this amount, \$107,396.09 had been paid, as of March 31, 1931.

We earnestly pray for your continued support and co-operation as we endeavor to lead our Conference in this worthy movement.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE Report No. 1

We beg to make the following report and recommendations concerning questions of vital importance to the social fabric of our life:

1. Prohibition: The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has never wavered in its stand on the liquor question. The utterances of our last General Conference were plain and vigorous in regard to the repeal and enforcement of the 18th Amendment. And this Board urges our pastors

and people to make every effort to defeat the active work for the repeal of this amendment by:

(a) Refusing to support any candidate for public office, either national or state, who favors either the repeal or amendment of the 18th amendment.

(b) By using legitimate means in our power to enforce all laws in our communities.

2. Divorce: The growth of the divorce evil in America is alarming and the action of our last Legislature in making our state a competitor for easy divorce is to be deplored. We urge our people to assist in every effort for its repeal.

3. Gambling: Each session of our Legislature is besieged by lobbyists favoring race track gambling. Let our people begin now to warn our candidates for our lawmaking body that they will not tolerate this iniquitous institution.

4. Race Relations: The fact that two distinct races live side by side in our communities makes race relationship an ever present problem. We urge our people to take a definite stand for justice toward both races, especially the more unfortunate.

5. Economic Conditions: Unemployment is one of our major national problems. Recognizing that this situation comes from unstable economic conditions we urge patience and charity during these uncertain times, and recommend that employers and employes, alike, in the terms of the prophecy Amos, "Let justice well up as waters and righteousness as a never-ending stream."

6. World Peace: The hope of a warless world is both scriptural and practical. Let our Church unreservedly support every means designed to bring about a settlement of national disputes by means other than resort to arms.

7. We further recommend that Dr. A. C. Millar, who has served so steadfastly in his relationship as President of the Anti-Saloon League, be retained in this position.

8. We also recommend that Rev. J. H. Glass be appointed Assistant Superintendent of the Arkansas Anti-Saloon League.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' BENEFIT FUND

1. This organization shall be known as the Little Rock Conference Widows' and Orphans' Benefit Fund, and shall be under the control of a Board of Managers consisting of five (5) members who shall be elected annually by this Conference on nomination of the Board of Finance; provided that each Presiding Elder in the Conference shall be an ex-officio member of the Board of Managers, the Board of Managers for the ensuing year to be composed of the following named persons: Dr. James Thomas, President; Rev. John, C. Glenn, Vice-President; Rev. J. A. Henderson, Rev. Leland Clegg and C. E. Hayes. Only male members of the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, including itinerant preachers are eligible for membership in the Widows' and Orphans' Benefit Fund, Provided, however, that the members of any preachers' family 15 years of age or over, shall be eligible for membership therein.

2. The officers of said organization shall be a President, Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by the Board of Managers, provided, the Secretary-Treasurer shall not be a member of the Board of Managers. The President, Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer shall constitute the Executive Committee, who shall have general supervision of the organization in conformity with the rules and regulations governing same.

2. To become a member of the Widows' and Orphans' Benefit Fund,

an initial payment of \$3.75 shall be made and no further payments shall be required until an assessment is made to cover a death benefit.

4. When a member of the organization for any reason ceases to be a member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in the Little Rock Conference, or transfers his membership from the Little Rock Conference, he shall forfeit all rights in the Fund, and in case of his death his beneficiary shall have no recourse against said Fund.

5. Whenever a death occurs among the members of the Fund in good standing, the Secretary-Treasurer shall immediately pay the beneficiary of the deceased member, as shown in the application, a sum equal to \$1.00 for each member in good standing at the time of said death; and the Secretary-Treasurer shall immediately levy an assessment against each member of \$1.25 to cover said benefit and the expenses of handling same.

6. It shall be the purpose to keep in reserve at all times sufficient funds with which to pay three death benefits. After the membership has passed 1000 the benefits in each case shall be not to exceed \$1,000.00. When the surplus has accumulated to the amount of \$4,000.00 an assessment may be omitted by order of the Board of Managers and the Executive Committee.

7. After a member shall become delinquent in the payment of three (3) assessments, he shall be dropped from membership but may be reinstated by paying all back assessments and furnishing a certificate of good health satisfactory to the Executive Committee.

8. No age limit shall be prescribed, but the applicant must sign the application in person, and must make affidavit that he is in good health at the time of making same; provided, that this restriction shall not apply to preachers formerly insured under the contract providing for group insurance.

9. The Secretary-Treasurer of the Fund shall keep a complete record of all members in good standing, also of receipts and disbursements, and shall make a report on the first of each month to the Executive Committee and the Board of Managers of said Fund. The Secretary-Treasurer shall give bond with a Surety Company in such sum as may from time to time be determined by the Board of Managers of said Fund, the premium to be paid from the expense fund.

10. These regulations may be amended by resolution offered by a member of the Board or by a member of the Fund, one months' notice of such resolution to be given at a regular meeting of the Board of Managers before such vote can be had, and may be adopted by a two-thirds majority of the members present and voting.

SIXTY-FIVE YEARS AGO

(Arkansas Gazette, December 3, 1866)

Hon. Andrew Hunter, who has been elected United States Senator, for the term of six years from the 4th of March next, is well known in every portion of the state, as he has been for the last quarter of a century, as a minister of what is now known as the Methodist Episcopal Church. Feeling the great necessity of sending the very best man to represent them in the Legislature, the vote of the Senatorial District, composed of Dallas and Calhoun Counties, prevailed upon him to represent them in the Upper House of the General Assembly, and he was accordingly elected to office at the last general election. In the organization of the Senate he was chosen as presiding officer. When his name was first put in nomination for that position, at his earnest solicitation it was withdrawn, but afterwards he was again placed in

nomination. His great natural abilities, and dignity of character, are universally conceded, and in manner he is the very impersonation of the suaviter in modo, and altogether a man who could represent our state in the Senate of the United States in a highly creditable manner. Mr. Hunter has not yet accepted the position to which he has been elected. That he will consent to do so is the universal wish of our people. At this particular juncture of our affairs he could, in the position for which he has been chosen, accomplish great good for our state.

CONSTITUTION

We, J. A. Henderson, James Thomas, W. C. Martin, J. A. Sage and L. B. Leigh, and our successors, desire to form a corporation, and for that purpose adopt the following constitution.

First. The name of the said corporation shall be, The Board of Trustees of the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Second. The object of the corporation shall be to receive, hold and administer all moneys, funds and property, real and personal, that may from time to time come into its hands by donations, gifts, devise, bequests, or otherwise, for any of the uses, purposes and needs of the Little Rock Conference, particularly funds and property for the use of superannuated preachers of said Conference.

Third. Said Board is authorized to place at interest any and all funds that may come into its hands for the use and benefit of said Conference, and shall make a full and complete report of its acts and doings in that behalf to the annual meeting of said Little Rock Conference for approval, showing disposition of the interests and funds received provided always, the Board shall carry out the wishes of the donors of said funds or property.

Fourth. That the vacancies in said Board shall be filled by said Little Rock Conference, but in the interim such vacancies may be filled by the remainder of said Board and the persons so appointed shall hold office until the next meeting of said Conference.

Fifth. That the regular meeting of said Board shall be on the first day of the annual session of said Conference, and at the same place as the Conference is held. The first meeting shall be on the fifth day of March, 1899, at the city of Little Rock. Provided also: The President of the Board may call a meeting of the Board when deemed necessary.

Sixth. That the officers of said Board shall consist of a President, Secretary and Treasurer; who shall be elected every two years, provided those elected at the first meeting shall hold until the regular annual meeting.

Seventh. Four members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Memoirs

ANDREW JACKSON EWING

Andrew Jackson Ewing was born on April 3, 1860, in Nashville, Tennessee. On reaching maturity he moved to the state of Kentucky, where he met and married his late wife, Mrs. Ellen Estes Ewing, the nuptials taking place at Adairville, Kentucky, on the 23rd day of March, 1882.

In 1884, a little more than two years after his marriage, he was duly licensed to preach by the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at the Russellville District of the Louisville Annual Conference, having been recommended by the Quarterly Conference of the Sharon Circuit. In the year 1886 he was admitted on trial into the Louisville Conference and on the 7th of October, 1888, he was elected to deacon's orders and ordained such. Shortly after this he transferred to the Illinois Conference, where three years later he received elder's orders. He served in this conference for a number of years except for brief intervals of forced rest due to a failing voice.

In 1911 he transferred to the Little Rock Conference, where he served with honor and distinction Bright Star, Richmond and Swan Lake Circuits and Huttig. In 19... he asked this Conference for superannuate relation which was granted in love and in token of his years of service as an itinerant in the Methodist ministry.

Upon receiving this last relation from his church he moved to Mena, Arkansas, where he had accumulated some property. His years as a resident of Mena are marked with the loving care which he tendered his invalid wife, who preceded him in death by two years, and unfailing loyalty to his church. His last thoughts were on the church and his last service was rendered for the church. On Sunday, January 18, 1931, he taught his large and loyal Sunday school class. At the morning worship service he led a great congregation to the very throne of God with his prayer. After his noon meal he betook himself to his living room, where he read the Christian Advocate until he fell asleep to awake no more in his home in Mena, but in the mansion which his Savior had prepared.

Funeral services were held in the Methodist church in Mena, conducted by the Rev. C. N. Smith and his pastor, Rev. Arthur Terry. He was laid to rest with the rites of the Masonic fraternity. Brother Ewing was the last of his line, but he left a host of friends who loved him dearly and mourn his passing.

REVEREND CHARLES AUGUSTUS FULLER.

Charles Augustus Fuller was born August 2nd, 1857, in St. Thomas, Canada. He was left an orphan at an early age, being reared by his grandparents, who were noble people with high ideals and exalted principles. A very ambitious boy, he worked and went to school in order that he might be prepared for the responsibilities of manhood. In 1875 he became connected with a Canadian railroad and remained in the employ of the company for seventeen years. Shortly after this, he came to Arkansas and became a bricklayer,, which trade he had learned as a side-line during his connection with the railroad.

He was married to Miss Mary Ann Wilkerson in 1877, to which union was born nine girls. He was converted and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in 1912. In the same year he was licensed to preach and was admitted into the Little Rock Annual Conference on trial. During his active ministry, he served the following charges: New Edinburg, Hot Springs, Buena Vista, Malvern Circuit, Hamburg Circuit, Prescott Circuit, Sheridan Circuit, Mt. Ida Circuit, and DeQueen Circuit.

Following a breakdown in health the early part of 1924, his name was placed on the Honor Roll, and he sustained the relation of a superannuate until he was translated in May 2, 1931.

His first wife passed away during the early part of 1925. On October 26, 1926, he was married to Mrs. Rebecca Sheffield of Pine Bluff. They made their home in Pine Bluff until his death, occupying one of the superannuate homes.

He is survived by his widow and five children; Mrs. J. F. Smith of Pine Bluff, Arkansas; Mrs. Frank Dobbins of Los Angeles, California; Mrs. E. K. Hale of Tampa, Florida; Mrs. O. B. Gibbs of Los Angeles, California; Mrs. W. E. Wildermuth of Columbus, Ohio.

One of God's faithful servants has entered the haven of rest, prepared for those who have been faithful, even unto the end.

Truly, we can say of him, "Well done, good and faithful servant. Thou hast been faithful over a few things. I will now make thee ruler over many. Enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

REVEREND AUGUSTUS CLAYTON GRAHAM

Born in Walker County, Georgia, January 10, 1859, Rev. A. C. Graham came to Arkansas with his parents in his infancy, landing at Austin, then moved to Faulkner County, near Conway. Educated in the common schools and in Quitman College; taught school for some time. He was converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, under the ministry of Rev. A. C. Ray, in 1879. Married Miss Cora Baugh, near Searcy, March 5, 1884, Rev. Z. T. Bennett officiating. One daughter was born to them and died in girlhood.

He joined the White River Conference at Paragould in 1888. Travelled the following charges: Marion Circuit, 1889-1890; St. Francis Circuit, 1891-1892; Augusta Station, 1896-1897; Brinkley Circuit, 1898; Cotton Plant and Howell, 1899; Auvergne and Weldon, 1900-1901; Po-cahontas, 1903-1904; transferred to Little Rock Conference, 1904. He was ordained deacon in 1890, elder, 1892.

Served as chaplain, Arkansas penitentiary, 1907-1908; later was chaplain of the Confederate Home, near Little Rock. For a number of years before his death he was in the supernumerary relation in the Little Rock Conference, giving attention to his private business interests.

The deceased devoted 16 years to pastoral work, serving stations

and circuits in the old White River Conference, then a few years to the chaplaincy of the State Penitentiary and the Confederate Home, thus ending his effective ministry, spending the balance of his life in retirement in Little Rock.

He died at his home in Little Rock, August 19, 1931, six months after the death of his wife. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. C. D. Meux, pastor of Capitol View Church. The remains were laid to rest in the Pleasant Valley Cemetery, near Naylor. This cemetery and the church lot were donated by the mother of the deceased more than 50 years ago.

JOHN HUGHES GOLD

John Hughes Gold was born in Montgomery County, Tennessee, November 9, 1839, and died at his home in Washington, Ark., September 6, 1931, age 91 years, 9 months, 27 days. Brother Gold was baptized in infancy by Rev. John F. Hughes for whom the child was named. At the age of twelve years Brother Gold was received into the church on profession of faith.

We do not know when Brother Gold was admitted on trial in the conference but we learn from his family that he was on a pastoral charge near McMinville, Tennessee in 1861. He joined the Confederate army of Tennessee, 48th regiment, Quarles Brigade and served in the army till the close of the war. After the close of the war he served the following charges in the Tennessee Conference: New Providence, McMinville, Lawrenceburg, Lynchburg and Dover. How long he continued in the ministry at this time we are not informed. He soon found himself heavily involved in debt and by reason of these obligations which he saw no way of meeting in the ministry, he located for a time and taught school at Clarksville, Tenn.

In 1882 he came to Arkansas, likely by transfer from Tennessee, and was appointed to Bartholomew circuit in the Little Rock Conference. Consecutively thereafter he served the following charges in this conference: Mount Pleasant circuit, El Dorado, Washington, Center Point, Mineral Springs, and Buena Vista.

In 1895 he bought a home in Washington with a little farm attached and settled there. We are not informed whether he located at this time but it is probable that he did. He went into the mercantile business. In 1918 he was readmitted into the Little Rock Conference by reason of the fact that he had spent most of his life as an itinerant preacher and now that age had come upon him, his brethren felt that he should have some consideration from the conference. He was placed immediately upon the superannuate list of ministers where he remained until death called him to his reward.

Brother Gold is remembered not so much as an outstanding preacher nor yet as an administrator in matters pertaining to the church. He is remembered for his excellent qualities of character. He was named Gold and fittingly so for he was that through and through. Brother Gold was the friend of young preachers. He had a habit of writing their names in a book he kept, and in his secret prayers calling these names over before the Lord. More than one preacher now attributes his success to this habit of the old saint. It is just like God to richly reward such praying with large answers in giving young preachers power with God and the people. May we have more superannuated preachers who write the names of our boys in their prayer books.

REVEREND PHILLIP CONE FLETCHER

Reverend Phillip Cone Fletcher was born at Mt. Jackson, Virginia, February 9, 1871. His father was Lemuel Fletcher, who descended from the Fletchers of England and Switzerland, including the DeStaels and Nechars who belonged to the nobility of Switzerland. He was a collateral descendant of Rev. John Fletcher, one of Wesley's co-workers in the founding of Methodism. The mother of Phillip was a daughter of Major Joseph Blackwell Smith and Jane Towson Smith. His mother was a descendant of Sir Sidney Smith of England and Sir Walter Anderson of Wales.

Young Fletcher was educated in the public schools of Virginia, also at Beuna Vista Academy, Bethel Classical and Military College, Randolph-Macon College and Chicago University. He joined the church on November 19, 1882, when he was but a lad. He was licensed to exhort at Fredericksburg, Virginia, February 17, 1890, Rev. Dr. R. R. S. Hough being the presiding elder and Rev. Dr. Isaac W. Canter being the pastor. He was licensed to preach at Rome, Georgia, on September 28, 1891, and on November 1, 1894, he was admitted into the North Georgia Conference, Bishop Atticus G. Haygood presiding.

Young Fletcher's first appointment as an itinerant preacher was Siloam Springs, Arkansas, December 9, 1894. Bishop Haygood, who presided over the Arkansas Conference that year, made the appointment. Rev. V. V. Harlan was the wise and helpful presiding elder.

Dr. Fletcher preached his first sermon at Rome, Georgia, on July 12, 1891, from Hebrews 13:14. His last sermon was preached at San Antonio, Texas, on January 25, 1931, from I Cor. 12:31.

The appointments of Dr. Fletcher were as follows: Siloam Springs, Arkansas Conference, 1 year (1894-1895); Central Church, Ft. Smith, Arkansas Conference, 4 years (1895-1899); Eureka Springs, Arkansas Conference, 4 years (1899-1903); Union Street, Alameda, Pacific Conference, 1 year (1903-1904); Central Church, Fayetteville, Arkansas Conference, 4 years (1904-1908); First Church, St. Louis, St. Louis Conference, 1 year (1908-1909); Mt. Auburn, St. Louis, St. Louis Conference, 3 months (1909); Winfield, Little Rock, Little Rock Conference, 4 years (1909-1913); First Church, Texarkana, Little Rock Conference, 4 years (1913-1917); First Church, Little Rock, Little Rock Conference, 9 years (1917-1926); Laurel Heights, San Antonio, West Texas Conference, 4 years (1926-1930); Presiding Elder, San Antonio District, West Texas Conference, 3 months 1930-1931).

Many hearts were saddened last February, when news came in the secular press of the death of Reverend Phillip Cone Fletcher at San Antonio, Texas. His intimate friends were not greatly surprised, because they knew that for many years Dr. Fletcher, having submitted again and again to major operations, was making a heroic struggle for life. Indeed, in recent years, it was only his indomitable spirit that kept him going. Born in Virginia sixty years ago, of a distinguished family, educated in Randolph-Macon College, he entered the ministry in 1890. Being a man of sweet spirit, and having the gift of friendliness, he had as many personal friends as any pastor who ever served in Arkansas. This caused him to officiate at innumerable weddings, funerals, and other public functions. Under his care, churches always grew and prospered. While he was irenic, yet he was fearless in denouncing wrong. A rare and radiant soul, he was a veritable prince among men. Married in 1895 to Miss Emma Jackson, of Virginia, he leaves her and a host of relatives and friends to mourn his going.

Funeral services were held at San Antonio, Texas, at the Laurel Heights Methodist Church, Sunday, February 22, three P. M., by Bishop

Sam R. Hay, Dr. T. J. Session, pastor of the Woodlawn Methodist Church, and Dr. H. Bascom Watts, his successor as pastor of Laurel Heights, and Dr. Cullam H. Booth, pastor of the Treb Baker Methodist Church, after which the remains were shipped to Little Rock, Arkansas, and, on Tuesday a beautiful service was held in First Church, Little Rock, of which he was pastor for nine years, in charge of Dr. W. C. Martin and Reverend John C. Glenn.

At the time of his death, Dr. Fletcher was presiding elder of the San Antonio District of the West District Conference, and was also the beloved president of the San Antonio Protestant Ministers' Alliance.

After the death of her husband, she continued to struggle on with the education of her children as best she could, till that task was done. Then she moved back to Dalark where she could be with and near her brothers and other relatives who had meant so much to her.

Mrs. L. M. Powell was the kind of wife and mother that has made the Methodist Parsonage immortal. A pure diamond has been plucked from our Methodism to grace the crown of the living Christ.
