STANDING RULES

1. *Nominations.* The presiding elders shall be a standing committee on nominations, and shall nominate all members of the quadrennial boards and annual committees; also the Conference Treasurer.

2. *Undergraduates.* Undergraduates who remain in the same class more than two successive years will be discontinued or located unless they are in school. Extraordinary circumstances and a two-thirds vote of the Conference will be necessary to override this rule.

3. *Conference Program.* The pastor-host of the Conference, the presiding elder in whose district the Conference session is held, and the chairman of the Committee on Evangelism, shall constitute a Committee on Conference Program. This Committee shall arrange, not less than sixty days before the Conference meets, for all preaching or other inspirational services, and select the speakers for each service. The program made by this committee shall be subject to revision as the exigencies of any situation may require or the Conference direct.

4. *Conference Treasurer.* The Conference shall elect quadrennially a Conference treasurer who shall give bond to the Board of Trustees in such sum as the Conference may determine, and who shall receive and disburse such funds as the Conference may direct. The premium on the treasurer's bond shall be paid out of the Conference expense fund.

5. *Auditing Accounts.* The books of the Conference treasurer and of the treasurer of each Conference Board shall be audited annually within sixty days after the adjournment of the Conference session, by a qualified public accountant, such accountant to be employed by the Secretary of the Conference and paid out of the Conference expense fund. The reports of the accountant shall be filed with the Conference Secretary, and the results thereof published in the Conference Journal.

6. *Financial and Statistical.*

(1) All assessments for Conference claims and all reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars with no columns for cents.

(2) Each pastor shall settle with the Conference treasurer, and turn over his statistical reports with the treasurer's receipt attached, the first day of the Conference.

(3) The presiding elder will furnish the statistical secretary with all assessments on pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the annual Conference meets.

7. *Conference Claimants.* The Board of Finance shall co-operate with the Board of Trustees in securing homes for Conference Claimants and additional donations to the Conference Superannuate Endowment Fund. Such homes and funds shall be held in trust by the Board of Trustees.

8. *Memoirs of Preachers' Wives.* Memoirs of preachers' wives who have died shall be read at the Memorial session of the Conference and published in the Conference Journal, and preachers wives shall be invited to take part in the Memorial session.

9. *Conference Expense Fund.* The Budget Committee shall make an assessment for a Conference expense fund to cover the cost of all clerical work necessary in preparing Conference records, printing and distributing the Conference Minutes, for preserving Conference records and documents, and all legitimate expenses incurred by the Conference Secretary and the Conference Treasurer in carrying out the orders of the Conference. The Conference Treasurer shall be custodian of this fund which shall be paid out on the order of the Conference Secretary.

10. *Reports and Resolutions.* All reports, resolutions and other papers intended for publication in the Conference Minutes shall be typewritten and in triplicate.

11. *History Commission.* There shall be a self-perpetuating History Commission composed of five clerical members of the Conference, one of whom shall be the Secretary of the Conference, whose duty it shall be to collect and preserve biographical data of clerical members of the Conference, data of all kinds that promise to be of historical interest and value, the Conference records, and other documents of historical value. The Commission shall make a quadrennial report to the Conference at the session next following the General Conference.

12. *Lay Representation.* Lay representation in District Conference shall consist of four members elected by the Quarterly Conference of each pastoral charge. Alternate delegates shall be elected by the Quarterly Conference.

13. *Repealed.* All actions and parts of actions of the Conference, which may be construed as standing rules, which were taken prior to the annual session of 1928, and which are not contained in, or are in conflict with the foregoing rules are hereby repealed.

14. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided that the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing a day before the vote is taken.

FIRST DAY—WEDNESDAY EVENING SESSION

Conference Opened.—The eighty-second session of the Little Rock Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, met in the First Methodist Church in El Dorado, Arkansas, November 6, 1935, at 7:30 p. m., with Bishop John M. Moore presiding. The Bishop conducted devotional services, emphasis being given to singing from the new hymn book. W. C. Watson led in prayer, and the Bishop spoke on the meaning and significance of an annual Conference, and of the relation between a minister and the people.

Secretaries.—The roll of the Conference was called, C. J. Greene was elected Secretary, Clem Baker, S. T. Baugh, Otto Teague, and C. R. Roy, assistant secretaries; C. E. Whitten, Statistical Secretary, and A. W. Hamilton, A. C. Carraway, and A. J. Christie as his assistants.

Time and Place.—The time for the meeting and the adjourning of Conference sessions was fixed at 8:30 a. m., and 12:00 m., respectively. The pillars supporting the gallery were made the bar of the Conference.

Boards and Committees.—The Presiding Elders made their report, nominating the annual committees and persons to fill the vacancies on the quadrennial boards, and the report was adopted.

Introduced.—The following were introduced: Drs. C. T. Tally, a recent transfer, W. P. King, Editor of the Christian Advocate, and W. M. Alexander, of the General Board of Christian Education.

Welcome.—Mayor George Crosby, representing the City of El Dorado, Dr. David Shepperson, representing the local Ministerial Alliance, and C. T. Tally, pastor host, delivered addresses of welcome, and the Bishop responded.

Board of Finance.—J. C. Glenn announced that M. W. Miller, Secretary of the Board of Finance, would receive money intended for that Board.

Transferred.—The Bishop announced the transfer of J. C. Glenn to the Southwest Missouri Conference, and his appointment as presiding elder of the Kansas City district, and a resolution was adopted expressing appreciation of him and his work and commending him to the people of his new field.

Leave.—J. M. Workman was granted leave of absence for Thursday.

Announcement.—The Committee on Public Worship announced that Dr. Walter Anthony would preach at 3 p. m., and at 7:30 p. m., Thursday.

Adjournment.—The doxology was sung and the Conference adjourned with the benediction by J. C. Glenn.

SECOND DAY—THURSDAY

Conference Opened.—The Conference met at 8:30 with Bishop Moore in the chair. The Bishop conducted devotional services, W. C. Hilliard, and later, W. W. Christie, leading in prayer. Again large use was made of the new hymn book, the Scripture lesson being taken from it and a number of hymns were sung, some of which had been read and commented upon by the Bishop. He said his example was a suggestion for pastors to train their people to appreciate the wealth of worship material in the book.

BIBLE BOARD REPORT

Your committee on the American Bible Society is pleased to make the following report on the work of the Society during 1934, the 119th year of the Society's continuous effort in encouraging a wider circulation of the holy Scripture.

During the year 1934 the American Bible Society distributed more than 7,400,000 volumes of Bibles, Testaments, Gospels and other Portions. Of this approximately 3,300,000 volumes were distributed abroad. The radical revaluation of the dollar abroad—although met in part by emergency measures—added further limitations to the already reduced appropriations and affected circulation in several countries. In Peru and Ecuador a large gain occurred. In China the number of entire Bibles circulated by all Bible distributing agencies was again greater than ever. In the United States the distribution of entire Bibles increased nearly one-third over 1933. During the 119 years since its organization, the American Bible Society has put into circulation approximately 261,250,000 volumes of Scripture, and the grand total of Scripture translations has reached 954 languages and dialects. Worthy of special mention is the Society's work for the Blind which began in April, 1835. During the 100 years that have elapsed, it has supplied to the Blind over 115,000 of the bulky and expensive "embossed" Scripture volumes in 25 languages and systems in its home and foreign fields. In 1934, there were distributed in the United States, 5,000 embossed volumes. At Christmas, 1,517 copies of the Society's small volume of Scripture Passages were given to pupils in 36 schools for the Blind.

Of particular interest to us is the work of the Society in the Southwestern District. The Secretary, Rev. J. J. Morgan, reports for the year in his area a gain of 41% in the distribution of complete Bibles and a gain of 19.7% in New Testaments distributed. His donations to the missions and charitable institutions and to the unfortunate individuals—the poor, the prisoner and the blind—amounted to 40,565 volumes.

Your committee respectfully presents the following resolutions:

WHEREAS, the work of the American Bible Society is of recognized value to the Christian Church, be it resolved:

First: That we heartily endorse the American Bible Society in its purpose of making the Bible more widely and easily available;

Second: That we endorse the celebration this year of four hundred years of the printed English Bible, recommending:

(a) That our people seek to give fresh attention to the reading and study of the Scripture under the guidance of the pastors and with the aid of suitable literature;

(b) That our people be encouraged to hold suitable anniversary observances December 8th in every church and Sunday school, endeavoring, in concert with other churches in the community or separately, to make possible the possession of a Bible by every home.

CENTENNIAL COMMISSION

Your Centennial Commission representing the two Annual Conferences, having carefully considered the questions which led to its formation, submits the following suggestions in harmony with the plans approved last year:

Because 1936 is the one-hundredth year since the Arkansas Conference was organized at Batesville and because of the agreement that the fiftieth anniversary of the founding of Hendrix College should be continued jointly with the Centennial Celebration, and, further, because it is the desire of our leaders that Evangelism be promoted and stressed, we submit the following recommendations:

1. That, at the Christian Education Institutes which are usually held soon after the Annual Conferences adjourn, all of the plans and objectives of the Centennial Commission be presented so that throughout the year, they may be kept in mind and constantly emphasized

2. That the Institutes to be held under the direction of the Board of Missions early in the year be so planned as to command the ablest speakers possible, especially speakers who will concentrate the thought of the Church upon the supreme place of Evangelism in Methodism; and that the Conference Committee on Evangelism co-operate with the Board of Missions at these Institutes in making Evangelism outstanding and a source of inspiration; and that these Institutes be followed by great Centennial messages on Evangelism in all local churches under direct leadership of the presiding elders. In larger churches special evangelistic programs using distinguished speakers should be carried out by pastors helped by the Committee on Evangelism. The whole program should be designed to present to the minds of all our people the Evangelistic Mission of historic Methodism and to impress them with the need and desire for a gracious and sweeping revival in every charge in the State. Your Commission is having a popular booklet prepared on Arkansas Methodism by Dr. Elmer T. Clark, to be sold at these Institutes at a low price with the view of having them used in study classes in the local churches under the direction of the Board of Education.

3. That the Presiding Elders be requested to schedule their District Conferences consecutively so that one or more outstanding men may be brought to the State to give great addresses on Methodism at each District Conference. It is requested that Bishop John M. Moore be one of these speakers and that Dr. J. M. Williams, chairman of the Committee on Education of the Centennial Commission, be given a place on the programs.

4. That the Pastors' School at Conway for 1936 be known as the Centennial Pastors' School; that its program center around the great fundamental principles of Methodism; and that some outstanding speaker be engaged to deliver a series of strong addresses on the prominent phases of Methodism.

It is recommended that a great pageant be the climax of the Pastors' School and that, if possible, this pageant be repeated at strategic centers. Arrangements are in progress for writing this pageant, and

representatives of Hendrix College have graciously consented to put it on at Conway.

It is further recommended that the Young People's Assemblies that meet at Conway prepare and put on a Centennial Pageant as a principal feature of their program, and that they have a special Centennial speaker.

We are informed that, at their annual meetings in the spring, the Woman's Missionary Societies of the two Conferences will, in joint session, have a Centennial Pageant portraying the history of their work; and we heartily commend this purpose and promise full co-operation in any way that they may desire.

If it can be done, we suggest that abridged pageants may be prepared for use in the smaller churches, possibly with local talent and with a touch of local color.

The whole purpose of these pageants is to attract the attention of large groups and give them a vivid and unforgettable picture of the History of Methodism so that old and young alike may be impressed with the achievements of the past and be led to undertake even greater things in the future.

5. That, in view of recent General Conference legislation merging the three Boards concerned with Christian Education and also in view of the unifying of college education in our state, the Conference Board of Education and the Education Committee of this Commission, of which Dr. John M. Williams is the chairman, use every possible means to present to our church members the unified program of Christian Education; that they encourage our young people to realize the three-fold objectives of education, the perfecting of body, mind and spirit, and that special efforts be made to realize the central objectives of recent legislation, that is, the creation of a very intimate relation between the local churches and our own Hendrix College so that there may be a strong practical and spiritual tie binding them together.

Two features of the Hendrix semi-centennial have been completed. The college now comes to the third element: namely, its forward movement to equip itself in buildings and to supplement its present endowment. We commend this to the serious and sympathetic attention of Methodism in Arkansas.

It is the desire of your Commission to make clearer and stronger in the minds of our people the reasonableness and the necessity of education that is wholly under the dominance of the Christ spirit in all the relations of life with a view to producing better people in the Church and of winning the unsaved to accept Jesus Christ as Savior and Master. While, in presenting the achievements of Methodism, the essentials of doctrine and policy may not be ignored, it should be understood that the great underlying purpose of this movement is to challenge our people to more heroic and sacrificial living. It is hoped that nothing may be permitted which can be interpreted as carrying the implication of denominational vanity or rivalry; but that Methodism may be presented simply as one of the great movements of Christianity intended to carry out the Master's command to evangelize all people. In other words, the proposed celebration should be inspired by the purest Christian spirit and the holiest motives.

6. Because this program cannot be effectuated without cost, your Commission again requests each Annual Conference to include in its askings \$1,000 for this year.

CENTENNIAL COMMISSION.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Report No. 1

Upon its own initiative your Board wishes to warn the Conference of what may become a serious situation at Hendrix College. The remarkable achievements of the college during the depression have misled our people into thinking that the college is rich and that the Church does not need to do anything for it. Upon its own responsibility this Board devotes its first report to arouse the Church to the dangers in the situation. Let facts speak for themselves:

1. The Conference in unifying their higher educational work on one campus doubled the burden upon Hendrix College, requiring twice the faculty, the income, the physical plant and endowment.

2. This burden was rolled on to the college just as we entered the depression when the Church felt itself unable to do anything to help the college bear the burden. On this account the Trustees have not called upon our people for any aid.

3. In this situation the college turned to the Foundations in New York, the General Education Board, the Carnegie Corporation and the Juilliard Foundation. Happily the Foundations afforded temporary relief by providing some \$300,000 for buildings and about \$25,000 a year for increasing the professorships required by the action of the Conferences in their unifying program. The Church has done nothing to aid in this advance.

4. The danger to Hendrix and therefore to the Church is that the Foundations are withdrawing this temporary aid to the salary budget and are throwing it back upon the Church. The faculty cannot bear it because their salaries have been cut deep. The whole rich program is at stake. What will this Conference do about it?

5. Hendrix College by this temporary aid and by the brilliant work of the faculty has taken a national position. The issue before us is whether the college will lose this proud place of service.

6. Your Board says, "No, we must not back down. Methodism never retreats." Let us sound the note, "Forward march."

7. Accordingly, your Board recommends that this Conference hereby record its high appreciation of the great service of the Foundations in coming to our rescue in a financial crisis, that it pledge to the Board of Trustees its loyal support in meeting the crisis, that we recommend that the program of temporary relief and of doubling the physical plant and endowment be made an integral part of the Centennial Celebration and that as an evidence of the Conference's deep concern, it direct its Board of Christian Education to act as its agent in collaborating with the Board of Trustees in working out and in putting into operation ways and means of financing both the temporary and permanent needs of the college.

REPORT OF BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Report No. 2

Your Board of Christian Education had before it President J. H. Reynolds with his report of Hendrix College; Dr. J. M. Williams with his report as Extension Professor of Hendrix College; Dr. W. W. Alexander, representing the General Board of Christian Education, together with the reports of the Treasurer and all the members of the staff of the Conference Board. Based upon these reports we believe that our Conference, both in the College Division, and in the Local Church Division, has had a highly satisfactory year.

We make the following recommendations:

1. That College Week be observed in each local church in the Conference, and that a free-will offering be taken to be used for a scholarship fund for ministerial students, and the President of Hendrix College and the Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education be responsible for the administration of this fund.

2. That we heartily recommend the plans of the Arkansas Centennial Commission and pledge the support of this Board to this program.

3. That ever increasing interest be placed upon the Christmas Offering for the Orphanage to the end that every church school in our Conference share in this worthy cause.

4. That Young People's Anniversary be observed on the day set apart for that purpose and that an offering for the support of our Young People's work be taken in every Church upon this occasion.

5. That the Conference set \$3,000.00 as its goal for the Church School Day Offering.

6. That this Conference approve the plans of the Board of Managers of the Arkansas Pastors' School to make the 1936 session an outstanding feature of the Centennial Celebration. We are asking again that our Presiding Elders serve as an Enrollment Committee to cooperate with the Board of Managers in securing the attendance of every pastor in the Conference.

7. We recommend the election of the following trustees for Hendrix College: Mrs. W. P. McDermott and I. Lynn Smith to succeed themselves; and J. L. Longino to fill the unexpired term of Dr. Morgan Smith.

8. We recommend the election of Dr. J. L. Cannon to succeed himself as the Little Rock Conference representative on the Board of Trustees of Southern Methodist University.

9. We recommend the election of Mr. John H. Hollis to succeed Mrs. H. King Wade, resigned, as the Little Rock Conference representative on the Board of Trustees of the Western Methodist Assembly.

10. We recommend the following appointments: Professor Emory University, R. C. Rhodes; Vice-President and Professor, Hendrix College, C. J. Greene; students Duke University, John William Hammons and R. E. L. Bearden, Jr.; Student in Southern Methodist University, Louis William Averitt.

11. We have appointed the following members on various committees and joint commissions: With the Board of Missions, Leland Clegg, C. K. Wilkerson, Clem Baker; With the Board of Church Extension, Arthur Terry, C. M. Reves and Fred G. Roebuck. Board of Managers for the Arkansas Pastors' School, Leland Clegg, Clem Baker, S. T. Baugh, Kenneth Spore and R. E. Fawcett. Joint Commission with North Arkansas Conference on Wesley Foundations, R. B. Moore, Leland Clegg, Clem Baker.

12. The Executive Committee of the Board is to be composed of: Leland Clegg, R. B. Moore, C. K. Wilkerson, Clem Baker and from three to seven others to be selected by the above mentioned members.

13. We have elected, with the approval of the Bishop and his cabinet, C. A. Overstreet and J. S. M. Cannon to membership on this Board.

14. Your Board has pledged itself to put its chief emphasis upon the development of Christian Education in our Rural Churches this year.

15. We have asked the Conference Commission on Budget to make the following apportionments for the Board of Christian Education: \$6,242 for Hendrix College; \$6,242 for Conference promotion; \$750.00 for Pastors' School.

16. We have elected Rev. Clem Baker as Executive-Extension Secretary and request the Bishop to appoint him to this office. We have elected Miss Fay McRae as Director of the Children's Division; Rev. Arthur Terry, Director of the Young People's Division; and W. E. Silliman, Director of the Adult Division.

17. Finally, we want to thank the members of this Conference for the splendid cooperation given our total program the past year and to pledge to this Conference our very best efforts in carrying on an even greater program during the ensuing Conference year. The report of the treasurer of the board, with the auditor's approval, is attached.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

Your Conference Board of Church Extension submits the following report:

With the funds at our disposal, we have been able to give aid to only a few applicants during the past year. At our last annual meeting, we were indebted to the General Board in the sum of \$357.85 for money advanced to the Conference Board to cover appropriations made in 1934. This sum was repaid at the beginning of this year.

Since that time the Board has donated \$110.00 to Winthrop Circuit, to aid in the erection of a Parsonage, and the sum of \$450.00 to aid in rebuilding the Church at Huttig, which was destroyed by fire early in the year.

Your Conference Board now has in existing loans the sum of \$3,615.00, of which principal sum the amount of \$1,472.13 has been repaid, leaving a balance outstanding of \$2,142.87. There is now in the hands of the Treasurer, available for appropriation as loans, the sum of \$686.17.

After paying its obligations incurred in 1934, there remained in the hands of the treasurer for appropriation as donations, the sum of \$647.68. Deducting the grants to Winthrop and Huttig, also the ex-

penses of Treasurer to General Board meeting, amounting to \$25.00, there was left of the 1934 receipts the sum of \$62.68.

To this sum we add the receipts for the year 1935, amounting to \$1,166.77, giving us a total sum available for appropriation as donations, \$1,229.45.

The work of the General Board of Missions as reported to your Board, while not satisfactory, is a considerable improvement over a year ago and we are happy to know that all of the Conferences from whom we have heard are reporting additional collections on the benevolences which will help us in some measure to carry out the plan of the Board of Missions for a forward movement.

We had before us Dr. Grover Emmons, representing the Board of Missions, and enjoyed him very much and we take this opportunity to thank the Board for sending him to us.

Dr. A. C. Millar was before us and read the report of the Centennial Commission, which we heartily approved and enter into it with all of the vows at our command.

We have been studying the program of the Missionary Council to be held in Washington on January 7-9, and in addition to our accredited delegates, the Chairman of our Board, Dr. W. C. The receipts as recorded in the books are verified with the deposits as shown by the bank statements. The disbursements are verified and found to be correct. As a whole, the system employed is good and is accurately maintained. In my opinion, all receipts and disbursements are properly recorded.

We are happy to state that the Orphanage continues to stay on a strictly cash basis. For this achievement, we are indebted to the splendid management of our helpers, Mrs. S. J. Steed, Matron, and others at the Home, as well as to the advice of our Board.

At the beginning of the year, we had 31 children. During the year we have received 13, and have had 11 to leave us, and now we have a colony of 33. Up to the present time, we have placed 540 children in good homes throughout the United States.

Our children all attend Sunday School and Church services regularly at Highland, where we have the pastoral oversight of one of the most sympathetic and helpful pastors that the church has to give, in the person of Rev. O. L. Cole.

I feel that our endowment is steadily increasing. Including the proceeds from an estate which I have been working on for more than a year, we have approximately ten to twelve thousand dollars. I have several more sums in the offing which I hope to be able to close out in the course of time.

Recommendations

1. We request that you recommend to the Conferences to give us the same assessments this year as they did last year, to-wit: \$5,000.00 each, with whatever scale the Budget Committee makes in all of the askings.

2. We request that the Conference give us the Christmas Offering to be taken on the Sunday nearest Christmas Day—in stations it will be on December 22, and on the circuits, it will be started on that Sunday and closed out as quickly as possible. We earnestly beg our pastors to give every person an opportunity to give, as we are dependent almost wholly upon the Christmas Offering, which your Trustees think should be carried through the two Conferences, thus giving all of our people at both services on Sunday, December 22nd, an oppor-

tunity to give to this cause. We sincerely hope that the offering will be much larger this year than last. Unless it is much larger, we will suffer.

3. We recommend that the Boards of Christian Education accept, as they have heretofore done, this undertaking as a part of their work and that Brother Ira A. Brumley of the North Arkansas Conference and Brother Clem Baker of the Little Rock Conference, assist us as they usually do in this connection. If they do, nothing but success will follow.

4. We are convinced that the time has come when we might put forth some kind of an effort to raise funds for endowment for this institution because of its popularity with our people and we recommend that you authorize us without any general campaign to continue to secure endowment during the coming year. You will rejoice to know that we are already getting, as shown in this report, some gifts to this endowment fund and we feel now quite sure that we can raise a considerable sum if our brethren will take hold of the proposition.

REPORT OF THE LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, 1934-1935

Constitution

We, J. A. Henderson, Chairman, James Thomas, Secretary-Treasurer, and J. A. Sage and P. W. Snodgrass, and our successors, desire to form a corporation, and for that purpose, adopt the following constitution:

First. The name of said corporation shall be, The Board of Trustees of the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Second. The object of the corporation shall be to receive, hold and administer all moneys, funds and property, real and personal, that may from time to time come into its hands by donations, gifts, devise, bequests, or otherwise, for any of the uses, purposes and needs of the Little Rock Conference, particularly funds and property for the use of superannuated preachers of said Conference.

Third. Said Board is authorized to place at interest any and all funds that may come into the hands for the use and benefit of said Conference, and shall make a full and complete report of its acts and doings in that behalf to the annual meeting of said Little Rock Conference for approval, showing disposition of the interests and funds received, provided always the Board shall carry out the wishes of the donors of said funds or property.

Fourth. That the vacancies in said Board shall be filled by said Little Rock Conference, but in the interim such vacancies may be filled by the remainder of said Board and the persons so appointed shall hold office until the next meeting of said Conference.

Fifth. That the regular meetings of said Board shall be on the first day of the annual session of said Conference, and at the same place as the Conference is held. The first meeting shall be on the fifth day of March, 1899, at the city of Little Rock. Provided also: The President of the Board may call a meeting of the Board when deemed necessary.

Sixth. That the officers of said Board shall consist of a President, Secretary and Treasurer; who shall be elected for two years, provided those elected at the first meeting shall hold until the regular annual meeting.

Memoirs

JOSEPH C. JOHNSON

Joseph C., son of John C. and Susan Elizabeth Johnson, was born in Chapel Hill, Ark., February 22, 1876, and died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Vivian Ripley, in El Dorado, Ark., June 28, 1935; age 59 years, 4 months, 6 days.

Joseph C. was converted under the ministry of Rev. J. F. Taylor in 1892, and joined the Methodist Church. It was one of the best day's work Jack Taylor ever did. Brother Taylor has brought into the church many valuable lives. But not one of all his long ministry ever reflected greater honor upon the ministry of this country prophet than has Joseph C. Johnson.

At Rock Hill, Ark., Joseph C. was called to the ministry, and licensed to preach by the late T. H. Ware, Presiding Elder of the Texarkana District, in 1910. It was one of the best day's work T. H. Ware ever did. And so the honor is distributed. But there was in the life of Joseph C. Johnson, soul enough to go round. He blessed every life he touched.

In November, 1910, Joseph C. was admitted on trial in the Little Rock Conference at its session at Prescott, Ark., Bishop J. H. McCoy presiding. It was one of the best day's work Bishop McCoy ever did when he brought into the active ministry of Methodism this strong, loyal soldier of Jesus Christ.

The list of his appointments runs as follows: Umpire, Eagle Mills; Mt. Ida; Patmos; Prescott Circuit, Strong; El Dorado Circuit, Bryant; Hickory Plains; Prescott Circuit, Bingen; Rowell; Taylor; New Edinburg; Leola; Buckner; Kingsland; Cherry Hill, and Princeton, where his health broke, and he had to resign his work, after preaching his first sermon there at the beginning of this past conference year.

Joseph C. is survived by his wife, Mrs. Emma R. Johnson; three daughters who are respectively, Agnes, now Mrs. Pagan, of Strong, Ark.; Estalene, now Mrs. Harrison, of Bastrop, La., and Vivian, now Mrs. Ripley of El Dorado, Ark. Besides these members of his own family, he is survived by one sister, Mrs. Lela Luttrell, of Eagletown, Oklahoma; a brother, J. W. Johnson, of Antlers, Oklahoma; and a half sister, Mrs. Frank Helms, of DeQueen, Ark.

Funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church of El Dorado, by the Presiding Elder of the deceased, Rev. R. E. Fawcett of Arkadelphia, assisted by Dr. C. T. Tally, pastor of the church, and a number of the brethren.

There are a few things I must say about Joseph C. Johnson. No one can glance at the list of the appointments which he served for twenty-five years, and conclude other than that Joe was built of the stuff they make heroes of. And yet for a quarter of a century he moved up and down this conference from the mountains to the rivers, and

from the rivers to the ends of the earth, preaching the gospel of the Son of God, and never lost heart, nor complained that his task was hard. A study of conference minutes reveals the fact that he moved almost every year. How he ever did it, and kept a sweet spirit, is more than has been written up in the books.

He won the confidence of the people to whom he ministered. The record of his life reveals the fact that he succeeded himself a time or two, going back to some former charge, and doing good work. He was twice pastor of Prescott Circuit. This could never have happened had Joe been a quarrelsome, indifferent disposition.

Joe Johnson was a gentleman from head to foot. He would go to the poorest charge in the conference without a whimper. But he saw no need for anybody making an attempt to put a heavier load upon him than the situation justified. If anybody undertook that sort of thing, he did not go very far with it before he found that he was trifling with the wrong man. All of us admired this courage in Joe Johnson, and loved him all the more for the man he was. Not only so, but the man who attempted to oppress Joe Johnson as he wrought out his heavy tasks in the church, soon found that his stock was below par, and that he had lost ground that would be regained with difficulty.

Finally, Joe Johnson was a real soldier of Jesus Christ. No enemy ever caught him off his guard. He put on the whole armor of God and kept it on. These were the weapons God gave him for the war he enlisted in, and he took them on to heaven with him. We have lost a faithful man, a strong preacher, and a dependable friend.

EDGAR MALONE PIPKIN

Edgar Malone, son of Mr. and Mrs. D. G. Pipkin, was born in Nevada County, Ark., August 22, 1857, and died at his home in Arkadelphia, Ark., September 6, 1935; age 78 years, 14 days.

The early life of Edgar Pipkin was spent on his father's farm, where Edgar was born. Educational advantages were meager for anybody in Arkansas during those years. Schools were few and far between. The war between the States came on while Edgar was a little child. But he listened to all the discussions back and forth as to the justice of the Southern cause in that memorable contest. These things sank down in Edgar Pipkin's heart where they remained to the day of his death.

After the close of this war, Daniel Pipkin began to cast about for a school in which to educate his children. There were none. Together with his neighbors, he decided to build one, and gave the land upon which was erected a first-class high school which was named Columbia Institute. Edgar Pipkin was one of the earlier students. He was also for a time matriculated in Gordon Academy, a school built near El Dorado, which took the name of Thomas R. Gordon, its founder and first president. Gordon was a classmate of the late Chancellor Garland, of Vanderbilt University fame. These early schools created in the mind of young Pipkin a deep desire to know what the schools contained, and while he was yet a young man, he matriculated in Vanderbilt University, from which institution he graduated in 1880, with the degrees of A. M. and B. D. So that we may regard Edgar Pipkin as the best equipped preacher in the Little Rock Conference back in those earlier years. He set the pace.

He served for a time as Bible Agent for the American Bible Society. His work in this field was of a high order.

When Arkansas Woman's College was founded in Little Rock, and its board of trustees wanted a suitable man for president, they drafted young Pipkin for the task. It was through no fault of his that the experiment came to grief.

When Arkadelphia Methodist College was founded, and they needed a well equipped man in its faculty, they too drafted Edgar Pipkin.

As a preacher Edgar Pipkin had few equals, and no superiors in the state. His messages showed wonderful depth. He never preached a sermon that showed lack of preparation. But he was never any preacher for fools. For this reason he was not as popular as some men who get front page newspaper notoriety. But if one wanted the truth of our religion Edgar Pipkin had it for him. I never heard him approximate a failure in the pulpit in my long acquaintance with him.

In the earlier years of his ministry, he married Ella Jewel, one of the sweetest and most thoroughly polished women that ever graced a parsonage home. She was born in a parsonage and knew what was needed to make a parsonage. You may find homes blessed with more wealth, but you will never find a home that possessed more real culture and came closer to the Divine ideal than the Pipkin Parsonage. This statement I make with full knowledge of what I am saying. The children who grew up around the Pipkin altar reflect nothing but credit upon the father and mother. On completing their educational work, most of them graduating from the best universities in the world, the children have largely taken to educational work as their calling. But no matter what they do, they carry with them into it the thoroughness of their father, and the ideals of their mother.

Does it seem strange to you that not one of the Pipkin children has ever ceased to put the emphasis upon Christian ideals? Some of old Samuel Wesley's children were a disgrace to any city. I have read of the families of other preachers that came to grief. But the Pipkin family do not belong to that class. There is no finer tribute that can be paid to the life of the father and mother than the character and quality of the children they bear. A prophet may preach like a bishop, and write like a poet, but if his own children fall below the father's preaching in their living, then that preacher must fall into the class with an old priest "whose sons made themselves vile and the father restrained them not."

Edgar Malone Pipkin had the courage of a prophet. He never feared any person but God. The story is told of an experience he had on a railroad train back in the old saloon days. A man came aboard a crowded passenger train drunk and using all sorts of profane and unallowable speech. Young Pipkin remonstrated with him. The fellow grew worse. Young Pipkin arose to his feet, and told the man to desist. A word or two passed, and something heavy hit the floor like the falling of an ox. It was the bruised face of the drunk man. Up he came again, more abusive than ever, and made a dash at his assailant. By this time all eyes were turned upon the preacher who had taken off his coat. Down went the drunk man with a fall that sobered him a little. "Get up now and apologize to these ladies for your conduct, or leave the train," thundered the preacher. The fellow made an attempt, and left the coach. We are liable to need more men of the Pipkin variety before we have lived long under Arkansas' new liquor administration laws.

Dr. Pipkin was a great student, a great preacher, a great presiding elder; a great teacher; a great husband; a great father and a great friend. May the peace of God abide with his sons and daughters always.

PAUL Q. RORIE

Paul Q., son of T. O. and Mary F. Rorie, was born near Athens, Ga., September 6, 1882, and died at his home in Stuttgart, Ark., August 12, 1935; age 52 years, 9 months, 6 days.

Paul was educated in the high schools of the various places throughout the state where his father in his earlier years served as pastor, and in Hendrix College, Henderson-Brown College, and Emory University. He graduated from the latter two institutions.

In 1907, he married Miss Esma Trigg, of Arkadelphia, Ark., and settled there for a time, and practiced law. Paul had every qualification that a young man ought to have to make a successful lawyer. He was in dead earnest about the things he worked at, and he was honorable to the last degree. But a lawyer he was not to be. God intervened in the case, as He did in the case of Jeremiah, and made a prophet out of the young man. From early childhood the thing had been in the mind of the young man. At first he was rebellious against the task. He very well knew from the experiences of his father what it meant to be a real Methodist preacher. He would have to be one in reality, or none at all. No Rorie ever did anything by halves.

How it came about, we are uninformed. But in 1909, he was licensed to preach by the late T. D. Scott. Scott left a burning fire wherever he went, and enough men called into the prophetic office to keep the fires burning. In 1912, Paul was admitted on trial in the Little Rock Conference, and never did young preacher stand trial among us to better advantage. He seemed to think his main mission was to enable people to find the way of salvation, and walk therein. During his first year as pastor of one of the smallest churches in Little Rock, he received 152 people in the church. This was his ambition everywhere.

It would be interesting to trace his record of revivalism throughout his ministry. But space and time forbid. He was not one of those men who are interested in one phase of the church's program alone while all the rest is neglected. If you doubt his ability as a man able to lead his people to build wisely and well, look about you. Every brick and particle of mortar, furniture, or fixture, you may see upon these grounds was placed here under the ministry of Paul Q. Rorie. Not only so, but they were paid for under his ministry. If it be urged that "he had a wonderful opportunity," it ought to be replied that others had as good an opportunity in this field as Paul had, and not only did not pay for the things built under their ministry, but borrowed part of their salaries at banks from time to time, and all their conference collections for as long as two years at a time, and got themselves advanced on the report "everything in full, Bishop," while some other preacher was left to sweat blood and sell it to save the local churches. Paul was not made of this sort of stuff. He believed in paying as you go.

Paul was a good pastor. He was ready to "give his life for the sheep." Whenever he saw dangers that threatened his flock, and the communities in which he ministered, he opened his mouth and challenged these evils as if to a duel. When he was pastor in this city, the criminal class for a time seemed to get the upper hand and were a nuisance by day and a menace by night. Somehow it got hold of Paul, and going to his church, he met a large crowd of men, called them into conference on Sunday morning, headed up the movement, and drove the "baser sort" out of town before night. It was better than some David vanquishing a giant. With a cowering pulpit, ever-doers will always "wax worse and worse" no matter who is governor.

Dear Paul. We had but one. Your like never come in droves. When the evil one grows bold, and dangers lurk without, within, we

shall miss you. When the flock is torn by ravening wolves; when liquor and lust are seated upon twin thrones of power, ready to take off the heads of all opposing forces, hand us your mantle out of the burning heavens and the sword with which you fought, and teach us, Paul, how to be good soldiers of Jesus Christ.

Paul leaves his noble father, blessings on him; one sister, Mrs. Ruth Phillips, of Arkadelphia, a brother, T. O. Rorie, Jr., of the West Texas Conference, his faithful wife and two children to mourn his going.

Goodbye, Paul; see you in the morning.

H. L. SIMPSON

H. L. Simpson was born in California December 21, 1877, and died in a hospital in Hot Springs, Ark., April 16, 1935; age, 57 years, 3 months, 27 days.

The Simpson family moved to Arkansas when Harry was quite young, and settled in the mountains east of where Mena now stands, in the village of Cherry Hill. Here Harry grew to manhood, receiving such educational advantages as that country offered at the time.

Harry never had the advantages of a college education. But with a strong body, and a clean mind, he made such use of books as to become very liberally educated for the tasks of his day. His preaching revealed the fact that he was reading the best books of the day, and using what he read to wonderful advantage.

In 1898, he was licensed jointly with his elder brother, John Simpson, to preach in the Methodist Church. In 1902, he was admitted on trial in the Little Rock Conference. The minutes show that he spent 33 years as a pastor in his conference. His tasks were never easy. No preacher who is any part of a success ever has such a work in our conference as that. His remuneration was small, his road long, and often rough. But much of the time, on foot, he measured it off, and reached his appointments on time.

Harry Simpson was of a happy disposition. He turned his hardships into jokes and laughed about them. He created this sort of spirit in those to whom he ministered. He literally cleared the skies for them.

In September, 1900, he married Miss Ionella Philpot, of Cherry Hill. To this union were born ten children, nine of whom survive the father. His children are a credit to any parsonage home, and to Methodism.

His last appointment was Prescott Circuit to which he reported soon after the conference adjourned last fall, and took up his duties with faith and dispatch. He had widely separated appointments. He had no conveyance. But with a courage that nothing was able to shake, he took up his duties and never missed an appointment save for high waters that made it impossible for him, or anybody else to travel.

But before the winter was all gone, he began to show signs of disease and weakness. At last he consulted a physician, and the doctor marveled that the man lived to get home. Aggravated by toil the disease had gone too far. So the great body that ought to have lasted a hundred years had worn itself out in thirty-three. Very reluctantly he submitted to the inevitable. I visited him, and found him hopeful and jovial. But it was plain for me to see that our friend was gone. I talked to his wife, and found that she also suspected just what I feared. May the God of all grace give comfort and assistance to his widow and children.

DAVID D. WARLICK

David D., son of Phillip and Jane Warlick, was born in Asheville, North Carolina, February 14, 1852, and died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Mary Gore, in Ladonia, Texas., October 8, 1935; age 83 years, 7 months, 24 days.

David was the son of a farmer, and finding educational opportunities very limited, he early began a process of self-education which went on to the end of his life. He never had the privilege of attending college anywhere. The war between the States, reconstruction, and depression which is always sure to follow every war, practically shut David Warlick out of school.

When young Warlick was seventeen years of age, his father moved with all his family to Alabama, where David worked for a time as a clerk in a mercantile establishment. But his health became critical under the confinement of his work, and he was forced to give it up.

In 1884 he married Mary Frances McCary, of Harpersville, Ala., and that same year he was licensed to preach, and assigned to the Ohatchee Circuit, near Gadsden. Thus was begun a work which reached across more than fifty years. With him at all times it was a work of God and what he did in anything was done in response to "The High Calling of God, in Christ Jesus."

In 1885, he took no work, but went to Florida instead, seeking health for his wife, whose condition in point of health became quite alarming at that time. But in 1886, he joined the Texas Conference, and was sent to Lyons Station. In 1889 he came to Arkansas, and was sent by the Little Rock Conference to Cherry Hill Circuit, east of where the city of Mena now stands.

There are grounds for believing that he was of a restless, pioneer disposition. In 1891 he transferred to the Oklahoma Conference and was assigned to a charge twelve miles from where Oklahoma City now stands. In 1892 he transferred to the Florida Conference, and was assigned to Emporia charge. In 1893 he was transferred to what is now the North Arkansas Conference, and accepted the task of Financial Secretary of Hiram & Lydia College, of which the late Dr. I. L. Burrow was president. This place he filled for four years. The next move he made was to Coal Hill, Arkansas, which he served as pastor for one year. In 1898 he was transferred to the Little Rock Conference again, and assigned to New Edinburg for two years. But there was one problem he could not solve and serve charges that paid him less than three hundred dollars some years. But he was of stern, determined stuff, and he made up his mind to solve this problem. So he moved his family to Arkadelphia, where was located one of Methodism's best colleges, settled there, and put his children in college as certain other men did back in those years. Here he remained, doing such work as the church undertook for the charges in that territory. All his children graduated from Henderson-Brown College, along with the children of A. Turrentine, E. M. Pipkin, and others. Such achievements come only to the great. Such tasks are accomplished by heroes alone. Frequently the daughters of these men had but one dress that anyone of them could afford to appear in company in, and one daughter would wear it at the morning hour to church, another would wear it to Epworth League, and another would wear it to church at night. But will not such memories of hardships drive the children away from the church and alienate them from the faith? Some would take those steps. But not these. I have preached in towns where live the children of preachers who drew five dollars where David Warlick received one, and the children of those better paid preachers never so much as darken a church door even when

the Bishop preaches in their communities. The preacher who can do a task like that and hold his children true to the church and the Son of God, smotherers a gaint larger than Goliath whom the Son of Jesse slew, and sets the armies of the Israel of God to singing a new song.

The daughter of David Warlick while looking through the well-worn pages of his Bible, came upon the following statements written on a fly leaf at the end of Revelations: "I am old. I have preached all my life the things taught in this book. They are my meat and drink in old age. They tell me of my home to which I shall go in a few days. There is no good thing in me; but Jesus died for me and in Him I trust, a sinner saved by grace." The following tribute was written by his youngest daughter, Mrs. Vincent Carr, of Lubbock, Texas: "Though separated from his associates during his active days, his love and regard for those he had known remained deep and true, and he spoke often of a happy meeting in the other world when the time should come to depart. He was the most unselfish character I have ever known. The older he grew, the sweeter he became."
