PROCEEDINGS

OPENING SESSION WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

4:30 o'clock

Conference Opened. The fifth session of the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church (which was the ninetieth session since the organization of the Conference in the former M. E. Church South) convened at the First Methodist Church in El Dorado at 4:30 P. M., Wednesday, November 10, 1943, with Bishop Charles C. Selecman presiding. The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was impressively observed with Bishop Charles C. Selecman in charge. The District Superintendents assisted in the service.

EVENING SESSION

Organization. The evening session opened with the singing of hymns number 402, "And Are We Yet Alive," and number 67, "A Mighty Fortress Is Our God." An Anthem was given by the splendid choir of the First Methodist Church. Bishop Selecman led in prayer. Bishop William C. Martin, a former member of the Little Rock Conference, now the presiding Bishop of the Omaha Area, brought a forceful message on the subject, "Christ Holds Life Together." Following the sermon Bishop Selecman called the conference to order. Fred R. Harrison was elected Secretary and announced that the list of assistants would be read Thursday morning. Bishop Selecman expressed his appreciation of the gift of a beautiful ivory and teakwood gavel presented by El Dorado friends. J. E. Cooper presented names to be added to committees and boards. Alfred Freeman, Pastor-Host introduced Mayor R. C. Bodenhamer who welcomed the Conference to El Dorado. The Bishop called on Leland Clegg to make response. The printed Conference program was adopted subject to any necessary changes. It was voted to have the first ballot on general Conference delegates at 9:30 Thursday morning. Bishop Martin pronounced the benediction.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 11

The Conference Convened. Bishop Selecman opened the Conference with the morning worship at 8:30 A. M. Hymn No. 245 was sung. The Bishop read I Peter 2, and H. B. Vaught led in prayer. The Bishop made helpful comments on the scripture. Hymn No. 267 was used.

Memorial Session. The order of the day for the Memorial service having arrived, the Bishop asked W. C. Watson, Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs to preside. Rev. John L. Hoover led in prayer. Hymn No. 521, "It Singeth Low In Every Heart," was sung. Dr. Watson read a brief passage from the 11th Chapter of Hebrews, and spoke briefly about the deceased brethren. It was announced that Rev. M. K. Rogers, Rev. E. R. Kelley, Rev. H. H. McGuyre, and Dr. James Thomas, and the following ministers' wives, Mrs. D. H. Colquette, Mrs. F. N. Brewer, Mrs. George W. Robertson, and Mrs. T. W. Nunn have died during the year. Hymn No. 525, "I Will Sing You A Song," was sung.

Assistant Secretaries Nominated and Elected. Assistant Roy E. Fawcett; Journal Clerk, Robert B. Moore; Editor of the Journal, Stanley T. Baugh; Staff Assistants, Claude Roy and John D. Hefley. Statistician, C. E. Whitten with T. T. McNeal, and A. W. Hamilton assistants. Roll Clerk Charles H. Giessen. Tellers, Clerical, Mark Vaught, George G. Meyer, R. O. Beck, Harold H. Pinnell, W. D. Golden, and Rufus Sorrells. Lay, T. W. McCoy, T. A. Prewitt, E. G. Powledge, W. W. Taylor, J. T. Thompson, I. A. Blakely, and W. R. Boney. The Rev. J. D. Montgomery

was appointed Secretary for the Ministerial Tellers, and Alton Raney for the Lay Tellers. A motion was made and passed that defective ballots would be void. C. M. Reves made a motion that J. S. M. Cannon, J. L. Hoover, and W. C. Watson be appointed a Committee to present a resolution on the Repeal of the Chinese Exclusion Act as part of the observance of Armistice Day. The motion was passed. A motion was passed that the Conference conform to the recommendation of rule 3, section 2, and that three alternates be elected. It was determined that two clerical and two lay delegates be elected to the General Conference and four delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference with three alternates.

Bar Of The Conference. The Rev. Alfred Freeman, host of the Conference made the motion making the Bar of the Conference the center and right sections of pews inside of the balcony posts, which motion was passed.

Readmitted. The Rev. I. A. Love was readmitted to full connection in the Conference.

Resolution. The Rev. S. T. Baugh submitted the following resolution, "That a small picture of each member of this Conference who died during the year be printed in the Conference Journal along with his obituary. Resolved further that this practice be continued from year to year. Signed by S. T. Baugh, Otto W. Teague, Fred R. Harrison, and H. B. Vaught. The resolution was adopted.

Report No. 1 Of The Board Of Education. Report No. 1 of the Board of Education was read and adopted.

Transfer Announced. The transfer of the Rev. Forrest Dudley to Center, Texas, in the Texas Conference was announced by Bishop Selecman.

General Board Of Education. J. Fisher Simpson addressed the Conference as the representative of the General Board of Education, Nashville, Tennessee.

Lay Ballot. The first lay ballot was announced with no election. The second ballot was taken for two delegates.

Hendrix Dinner. Fred R. Harrison announced that the dinner for graduates, former students, and friends of Hendrix College would be held at the Garrett Hotel at 6:00 P. M.

Executive Session. An Executive Session for the purpose of attending to all matters of ministerial character was ordered to be held at the First Presbyterian Church at 2:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon. The following were appointed door keepers, R. E. Simpson, C. Ray Hozendorf, and George E. Reutz.

World Service Commission. Dr. Ezra Cox, representative of the World Service Commission was introduced. He addressed the Conference and urged acceptance of a full allocation for World Service where possible.

Clerical Ballot Report. The first clerical ballot was reported with no election. Second ballot was ordered.

Lay Ballot Report. The lay ballot was reported, Dr. Matt L. Ellis and J. S. M. Cannon were elected. The laymen were ordered to vote for four delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

Chaplains Presented. Bishop Charles C. Selecman invited Bishop William C. Martin to take the Chair and to present to the Conference the Chaplains who were present. Each Chaplain, Jerry Dean, John G. Geick, and Rolland Darrow spoke of their work and experiences making more real and significant this Armistice Day occasion. Ensign Richard Perdue of the United States Navy, formerly President of the Little Rock Conference Youth Fellowship, was introduced.

Clerical Ballot Report. The second clerical ballot was reported with no election. A third ballot was ordered.

Resolution. The resolution in regard to Chinese Citizenship was presented by J. S. M. Cannon, as ordered by an earlier motion. Copies of this resolution were ordered by the Conference to be sent to Generalissimo Chiang-Kai-Shek, the United States Senators from Arkansas, and to President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

Clerical Ballot Report. The third clerical ballot was reported with no election. Fourth ballot was ordered.

Lay Ballot Reported. The third lay ballot was reported with Mrs. H. King Wade elected. The fourth ballot was ordered.

Resolution. Dr. J. D. Hammons offered a resolution requesting the permission of the Jurisdictional Conference for the Little Rock Conference to unite with the North Arkansas Conference.

Hymn No. 253, "Take The Name Of Jesus With You," was sung.

The Rev. Forrest Dudley was invited to the platform and pronounced the benediction at 12:30 o'clock.

EXECUTIVE SESSION—THURSDAY, 2:30 O'CLOCK P. M.

Devotion. Hymn No. 416, "Blest Be The Tie," was sung after which Dr. J. M. Workman led in prayer. Hymn No. 249, "I Love To Tell The Story," was sung.

Clerical Ballot Report. Clerical Ballot No. 4 was reported electing Dr. C. M. Reves delegate to the General Conference. Clerical Ballot No. 5 was ordered.

Dr. S. H. C. Burgin. Bishop Selecman announced that Dr. S. H. C. Burgin, a life time friend and fellow minister, died October 9th. The Bishop spoke briefly of his personal loss in the death of his friend.

Report Of Trial Committee. Bishop Selecman announced that the trial Committee in the case of the Rev. Clem Baker found him guilty of the charges presented and set his penalty at suspension from his ministerial functions for a period of three years. The complete file of papers concerning this case were given to the Conference Secretary for filing.

Clerical Ballot Reported. Clerical Ballot No. 5 was reported with no election and another ballot ordered. Ballot No. 6 was reported, Arthur Terry was elected delegate to the General Conference. Ballot No. 7 was ordered. The report of Ballot No. 7 revealed that Homer T. Forte was elected delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference. The 8th Ballot was ordered.

Greetings Ordered. The Conference ordered the Secretary to send greetings to Dr. John W. Cline who was reported to be enroute home from China on the steamship Gripsholm. Also messages of greeting and love were ordered sent to W. W. Christie, J. R. Dickerson, C. J. Green, and M. K. Irvin.

Ballot Report. Clerical ballot No. 8 was reported with no election. The benediction was pronounced by Dr. J. M. Workman.

FRIDAY MORNING, 8:30 A. M.

Conference Opened. The Friday morning session was opened at 8:30 with Bishop Charles C. Selecman presiding. Hymn No. 236, "Saviour More Than Life," and Hymn No. 435, "I Am So Glad That Jesus Loves Me," were sung. The Bishop led in the responsive reading, "The Lord's Day," Page 595 in the hymnal. Hymn No. 393, "Safely Through Another Week," was sung after which Dr. E. T. Wayland led in prayer. Hymn No. 311, "Come, O Thou Traveler Unknown," was sung. Bishop Selecman read a passage from the Fourth Chapter of Luke and commented briefly. To close the morning devotional the Conference joined in the

prayer, "Let the words of my mouth and the meditations of my heart be acceptable in thy sight, O Lord, my strength, and my Redeemer."

Audit Committee. Fred R. Harrison made a motion that a committee be appointed to audit the minutes of the session and to report to the Conference in order to save time. The motion was passed. R. B. Moore, S. T. Baugh, and Fred R. Harrison were appointed, after which S. T. Baugh reported that the minutes up to the present session had been read and found to be correct.

Resolution. Dr. W. C. Watson presented a resolution, "The Little Rock Conference deeply appreciates the high quality of leadership of Bishop Charles C. Selecman has provided the Church in all the various areas of its life and work.

This is still far below the needs of our Claimants and below what this great Conference will eventually provide.

Support for our Claimants should keep pace with the advance in support of all other Kingdom interests.

Your Board therefore most respectfully requests this Conference to accept a one per cent increase in all brackets in the apportionment for

BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS

Report No. 3

We submit the honor roll, including Superannuate preachers, Widows of preachers and Dependents of deceased ministers, showing the amount allocated to each claimant. We have adhered to the ruling of the 1940 Discipline, allocating the funds on an equity basis, giving to the widows an apportionment on the basis of 70% of that which their husbands would receive per year of service, widows service years determined by the actual years they lived with their husbands during active ministry.

Your Board is pleased to report, that the graduated scale payment by Charges to the Claimant fund, with the raise of 1% last year has made it possible for us to pay \$12.00 per service year to Superannuates, and \$8.40 per service year to Widows, as compared to \$10.00 to Superannuates, and \$7.00 to Widows, last year.

We indicate below, years of service, amount paid to Claimant by General Board, and the amount distributed by the Conference Board. The Conference Board has authorized the Treasurer, Otto W. Teague, to distribute the Conference Funds, November 10, 1943, and April 10, 1944, paying half of the allocation at each time.

Report No. 1

Promotional Work

The members of the Conference are aware of the fact that events of the past year have faced your Board with an administrative situation which has been difficult. We have not all been in agreement as we have met the changing situation. But, if we know our hearts, we have all had a mind to serve the best interests of the Conference and of the Church. We appreciate your confidence and support, as always, but more especially through the trying times of the past months.

May we all be reminded that we serve One in whose calling we dare not look back but always must face the future's task and opportunity.

Conference Staff. We have elected Roy E. Fawcett, Executive Secretary, and request the Bishop to appoint him to that office. We have elected C. Pastors' School. We nominate to serve on the Board of Managers of the Arkansas Pastors' School: E. Clifton Rule, C. M. Reves, Kenneth L. Spore, Arthur Terry, Roy E. Fawcett, John B. Hefley, S. C. Dugger, Mrs. A. R. McKinney, Mrs. T. S. Lovett, J. D. Hammons, O. E. Holmes, and Aubrey G. Walton.

Church School Day. We recommend that Sunday, April 2, be designated as Church School Day with a goal of \$3600.00.

Philander Smith College. We appreciate the fine work being done by Philander Smith College, one of our own Methodist Colleges for negroes, in Little Rock. We commend the college to our negro friends and its needs to all our people.

Report No. 2

Hendrix College

Due to its participation in the Government Training Program and to an encouraging increase in attendance of young women, all of the facilities of Hendrix College are being used to good advantages. The combined student enrollment taxes its physical plant.

The Little Rock Conference through its benevolences has contributed \$7123.70 to the college budget, and has received from the February Special, \$6473.12, making a total of \$13,596.82 contributed to the College for this Conference year.

Bishop Charles C. Selecman, and the ministers of the state, at the Pastors' School last year, suggested a campaign to build on the campus of the college, a chapel worthy of our faith and edequate to the need for a plan of Worship on the campus. Plans have been developed for the promotion of this campaign and will be presented to you under a separate report.

We make the following recommendations:

1. That the Commission on World Service allocate from the Conference, the same amount for Hendrix College as was set apart last year.

2. That the Ministerial Education Fund again be combined with the Hendrix College Special and that February 1-13, 1944, be set aside by the Methodists of Arkansas for raising \$5,000.00 for Hendrix College and \$3,000.00 for Ministerial Education in each Conference.

3. That whatever adjustment of our normal program is necessary in order to cooperate with the Chapel Campaign, be authorized.

4. That the following be elected to the Board of Trustees of Hendrix College:

E. C. Rule of Pine Bluff to succeed himself, term to expire 1949.

Wallace Townsend of Little Rock to succeed J. J. Harrison, deceased, term to expire 1948.

R. T. Steel of Conway to succeed himself, term to expire 1949.
G. DeMatt Henderson of Little Rock to succeed himself, term to expire 1949.

Connor Morehead of Little Rock to succeed James Thomas, deceased, term to expire 1946.

COMMISSION ON EVANGELISM

Report No. 1

The world is passing through a crucial period. True Christianity is at low tide. Hate and war are in the saddle and are riding madly across the earth. Physical forces and materialism are now lifted up in the hearts and minds of men, and nations. Since this is true, on a larger scale than ever before, it is time for the church to repent of her sins and gird herself with strength and call men and nations back to God. Evangelism is the need and opportunity of the hour. Your commission, therefore, calls upon our ministers and laymen to join with us in faith, prayer, and cooperation for a great crusade for a mighty moral and spiritual awakening.

We had hoped that it might be possible to place in the field a full time conference director of evangelism who would devote all of his time and energies to this most vital and needy cause. Due to a shortage of preachers, however, it becomes necessary for us to forego this for a time. We make the following recommendations:

1. That the evangelistic spirit and fervor be the predominate note of all our preaching. Our Sunday evening services especially should be conducted with the thought of calling our membership to prayer and of going out to the community to challenge people to Christ and the church.
2. We urge our pastors to cooperate with our Bishop and the Superintendents in having proper representation at our conference and district rallies on evangelism early in the year. Evangelistic schools, retreats, and institutes should be held in each charge and church, where possible.
3. Each charge should have a well organized committee on evangelism. Well planned revivals should be conducted in each church under leadership of this committee. This committee should increase the regular attendance at all our worship services.
4. We are now planning a weekly radio program on evangelism which will be announced a little later, when definite schedule and arrangements are completed. We urge the cooperation of all our leaders in this.
5. As a goal towards which to work, we urge that we strive for at least an eight percent increase in additions on professions of faith.
6. Our station pastors should cooperate with our district superintendents in afternoon preaching services on nearby charges on Sundays. Let them also offer themselves for revival meetings. All abandoned churches should be reclaimed and preaching services become regular in them again.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE

7. We urge again that all our people conduct worship services in the home and that our pastors give encouragement and direction to this.

8. Visitation and personal workers campaigns should be held in all our charges.

9. We recommend the election of J. L. Hoover to a place on the commission to take the place of Clem Baker.

COMMITTEE ON GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Your committee appreciates the unusual times and conditions through which we are passing and feels that an intensified (exhilarated) effort should be put forth in the Little Rock Conference, to carry forward a program adequate to the needs of the people, whom we serve, and all for whom we are responsible throughout the earth.

We therefore recommend the following:

I. Evangelism

1. That the Annual Conference Commission on Evangelism shall be recognized as the legal body to conserve, coordinate, promote, and supervise the evangelistic program of the Conference, and that they receive the full cooperation of all boards and commissions.

Evangelistic Goals:

- (1) A large increase at public worship services.
- (2) Family worship daily in every Methodist home.
- (3) Special revival services in each church.
- (4) An increase of 8% by professions of faith added to each church.
- (5) That evangelism be the dominant note in our ministry this year.

II. Education

1. That all agencies of the church in all programs for the year strive to lift our work through appeal to the great motive power of Christian faith and love.

2. That we extend our work for establishment of new schools and unchurched areas.

3. That we lend a new emphasis to the central place of our Bible as the text book of Christian life and work.

4. That we give our full energies to promoting the offering for Hendrix College and ministerial education; for the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage and for Church School Day.

5. That a comprehensive training program be carried on in each church.

6. That the Pastors' School be attended by all preachers; and that all charges be represented in Youth Assemblies.

7. That we continue promoting the goals and ideals which we have established in the Education Advance, particularly in increased enrollment and attendance.

8. That each pastoral charge have a class in the study of the Discipline taught by the pastor.

III. Missions And Church Extensions

1. That schools of missions and study classes be promoted in each church, using Bishop Francis J. McConnell's book, "The Church After The War."

2. That the opportunity for using the Fourth Sunday to promote missionary knowledge and lift World Service Giving, be kept before us.

3. That every pastor and pastoral charge assume responsibility for at least one Extension Church School and preaching appointment.

4. That each District have a definite program for establishing a Methodist Church in new territory, and lend financial assistance as needed.

IV. Woman's Work

1. That there be a Woman's Society of Christian Service in each church.
2. That all women of the Methodist Church be in a W. S. C. S.
3. That efforts be made to keep all women connected with their organizations who are in defense areas and other new surroundings.
4. That strong emphasis be placed on District organization.

V. Lay Activities

1. That the Methodist men be organized in each church or charge.
2. That every Methodist man be enlightened, inspired, and actively engaged in the work of his church.
3. That laymen be used in serving churches where circuits are combined, and other special needs are to be met.

VI. Methodist Youth Fellowship

1. That sub-district and District organizations be perfected wherever possible by calling into service the key young people in each pastoral charge.
2. That Epworth Training Conferences and schools be held wherever practical.
3. That the Youth of the church be given an opportunity to cooperate in the Crusade for a new World Order.
4. That a minimum goal of \$2000.00 be set for the Methodist Youth Fund.

VII. Christian Literature

1. That the goal for the Arkansas Methodist be one subscription for every seven active members of each church—with full cooperation with Dr. E. T. Wayland and his staff.
2. That increased emphasis be given to the circulation of the Christian Advocate and The World Outlook.
3. That the Upper Room and other devotional literature be regularly made available to our people.

VIII. The Arkansas Methodist Orphanage

1. That we pledge ourselves in loyalty to the newly elected Superintendent, Honorable J. S. M. Cannon, in carrying forward an enlarged program for the needy children of Arkansas.
2. That we set our aim for the largest Christmas offering in the history of this worthy Institution.

IX. Finances

1. That it shall be the goal of each District to accept and pay the full askings on Benevolences and World Service.
2. That each pastoral charge shall cooperate fully in all special offerings which shall minister to the spiritual needs of a war-torn world.
3. That some plans be worked out for making provisions for the needs of the retired Supply Preachers.

X. Hendrix College Chapel

1. That the Little Rock Conference in cooperation with the North Arkansas Conference give its unstinted support to whatever plans may be adopted, for the erecting of a much needed chapel on the Hendrix campus.

XI. Crusade For A New World Order

1. That our Methodist people be informed as to the part they can and should play in creating sentiment, and moulding influence for a just and durable peace—this may be done by pulpit utterances, and by placing literature for their use.

2. That representative people be urged to attend the state-wide meeting to be held in Little Rock, January 17, and that we pledge to Bishop Charles C. Seelman, our full cooperation in this matter.

HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Orphanage

Report No. 1

At the present time, twenty-three children are being taken care of in the Home. Our efficient matron, Mrs. Lane, has carefully safeguarded the health of the children, so that we have had very little sickness in the Home this year. In an equally efficient way, Mrs. Lane has looked after the moral and religious training of the children. We are greatly indebted to her for the fine way the affairs of the Home are being taken care of.

In the middle of the year, our former Superintendent, Dr. James Thomas, because of failing health, had to relinquish his post with the Orphanage. His long services as Superintendent of the institution gave evidence of his devotion to the duties of his administration. His passing a few weeks later took from the Orphanage one who had been identified with it from its organization.

To fill the vacancy caused by his resignation, Dr. E. T. Wayland, Editor of the Arkansas Methodist, was prevailed upon to serve, pending the election of some one to take the place of Dr. Thomas. Dr. Wayland generously gave his time to the work and is due the thanks of the Conference for the service rendered by him.

At a called meeting in September, the Board of Trustees elected Mr. J. S. M. Cannon as Superintendent, effective November 1st, 1943. It was understood that his full time should be devoted to the work of the Orphanage. He entered upon this work Nov. 1st, and has been greatly strengthened by the many expressions of confidence and trust by the brethren of the two Conferences.

The finances of the Orphanage are in better condition than ever before in its history. At its regular meeting in October, the Board set aside \$8,000.00 to become the nucleus of a New Building Fund. A greatly enlarged program of services is contemplated by the Board, and efforts are now being made to meet the increased demands which no doubt these times are going to create for the services which we may be able to render.

Recommendations

Your Board recommends that every effort be made to have the Christmas Offering taken in every church. Promotion of this offering should begin as early after Conference as possible. The success of our enlarged program will depend largely on how well the churches respond to this opportunity.

It is further recommended that a Director of the Christmas Offering be appointed in each local church.

Dr. Conner Morehead, Dr. C. M. Reves, and Rev. Harold Sadler have been elected as ministerial members of the Board of Trustees. The personnel of the Board has been enlarged to include two Laymen from each of the Conferences, and Dr. T. E. Fuller and Geo. Burden have been elected as Lay members of the Board. Their names, together with the Ministerial members named above, are presented to this Conference for its confirmation.

We thank the members of this Conference for their past loyalty and support, and hope the new administration may enjoy your continued cooperation and loyalty.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES**Report No. 1**

Your Conference Board of Lay Activities submits the following report:

It is the purpose of the Conference Board of Lay Activities to support the program recommended by the General Board of Lay Activities, whose quadrennial committees include groups which consider the following:

1. **Christian Stewardship.** We believe no other word expresses the meaning of Christian experience as completely as the word, "steward". A continuous and effective program for the cultivation and promotion of Christian stewardship should be in progress on a church-wide basis.

We heartily endorse the campaign led by our Bishop in this area last September and we believe a great deal of good was accomplished in every district of our Conference. We believe continued emphasis should be forcefully given to the Christian stewardship of life, time, talents, and possessions as the rule and practice of life.

2. Men's Work. While "Methodist Men", the significant new movement for laymen of our Church, has not been given great emphasis in our Conference, we do have a number of live and active men's groups promoting fellowship, serving the boys in uniform, and extending the influence and strength of the Church at home and abroad. We strongly recommend that every Church in the Conference have a group of organized men.

3. Benevolences And Christianizing Personal And Community Life. What wonderful words these are! The work of this Committee of the General Board includes World Service and Conference Benevolences, the Crusade for a Christian world order, Week of Dedication (February 27-March 5, 1944), Christian Influence in the Community, and Temperance.

We glory in the challenge of these big problems and we pledge full co-operation in all of them. We rejoice in the gains in Conference Benevolences and in World Service this year. Reports encourage us for future work.

In the field of Christian Influences in the Community, the Board of Lay Activities in unanimous resolution heartily commends Governor Homer M. Adkins, great Methodist layman, for his courageous Christian action against gambling in our State.

4. Evangelism, Christian Fellowship, Lay Speaking, Laymen's Day.

Observance of Laymen's Day has growing significance in Methodism and last year was closely coordinated with the Week of Dedication. We recommend that the Churches of our Conferences again follow, wherever practicable, the plan of the General Board and fix Sunday, February 20, 1944, as Laymen's Day, and that plans be made early to provide materials and to secure speakers for this occasion.

World Communion Sunday, October 3, 1944, will again afford us an opportunity to participate in the program for the Fellowship of Suffering and Service, the Committee on Overseas Relief, and the Committee on Chaplains and Camp Activities. We urge careful preparation for the observance of this day.

Lay speaking can mean a great deal more in our Conference, and especially in these days of great shortage of man power.. Many of our consecrated laymen should rise to the need of the hour and aid with emergency tasks. We hope a large number of our men will make their services available under the guidance of the District Superintendents.

Thousands of families and individuals are uprooted in this day of rapid change. The opportunity to practice Christian fellowship has probably never been greater than at the present time. With the increased opportunity there is proportionately greater obligation. And not only is it our privilege to meet strangers in our midst; we heartily endorse and pledge our support to the Home Visitation Evangelism Program of our Church.

5. Sound Church Finance And Adequate Support Of The Ministry.

We rejoice in the encouraging reports which have been presented to the Conference concerning the liquidation of debts on church property. The day is not far distant when we shall be able to say that all church property in the Little Rock Conference is free of debt. We urge persistent and tireless effort until this end is reached.

We commend to every Methodist the prayerful consideration of his Minister's support. Financial aid to underpaid and retired ministers receives our wholehearted endorsement.

6. **Training Official Boards, Circulating Church Literature.** We are greatly pleased with the report of the condition of the Arkansas Methodist. It is our purpose to lend our full support to the Annual Campaign to place this Conference Journal in every Methodist home in the Conference. When conditions of publication warrant, we shall work for the increased circulation among our people.

During the past year the Board has purchased a hundred copies of Schofield's, "The Methodist Church", for each of five districts in our Conference. We believe one of the most worthwhile activities in which we can engage is a systematic study of our Church—its history, organized machinery and its many-sided program of service. We are in hearty accord with the recommendation of the Committee on Goals and Objectives that Discipline Study be organized in every church in our Conference.

Since the program of the Annual Conference is each year so crowded that there is not sufficient time to give adequate consideration to laymen's work, we strongly recommend that there be held at a date as soon after Annual Conference as practicable a meeting of the Board of Lay Activities for the purpose of drawing up plans for the Church year. We insist that these plans include a Laymen's Conference to which each charge could send lay delegates who would join in an effort to come to grips with problems with which we are challenged.

We recommend that at the next Annual Conference on the afternoon when the ministers are holding their executive session, the laymen meet also in executive session to receive reports and to plan programs of work.

We report the resignation of Mrs. R. A. Thomas as Secretary-Treasurer of the Board and express sincere appreciation for her years of efficient and loyal service. Mr. J. S. M. Cannon has been elected Treasurer of the Board, and the Board has voted that the Office Secretary of the Board of Education, when named, will be asked to serve as Secretary of the Board of Lay Activities.

We nominate Dr. Matt L. Ellis for Conference Lay Leader and Fred Gantt for Associate Conference Lay Leader.

ARKANSAS METHODIST COMMISSION

To the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences:

The Arkansas Methodist Commission, comprising equal membership from the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences, in accordance with decisions reached in the annual meeting of the Commission on October 21, 1943, submits to the participating conferences for their consideration the following report for the conference year 1942-1943, together with recommendations for the ensuing year.

The Arkansas Methodist has registered another high year as an increasing asset to the Church and righteousness in the state. Through the continued cooperation of the ministers and church membership of the two conferences, the Circulation Campaign of January, 1943, maintained the circulation figure of fifteen thousand subscribers to the paper. A comparison of the financial reports of the paper for 1941, 1942 and 1943, reveals the gratifying achievements of good business management, supported by loyal cooperation on the part of the constituency. Never in its long and honorable history has the Arkansas Methodist been in such a favorable financial condition as now.

We make the following recommendations:

1. That ministers and churches of the two conferences again express to Rev. E. T. Wayland their sincere appreciation for his skillful management of the finances and for his able and efficient work as Editor of the Arkansas Methodist, and that we likewise record our thanks to the Rev.

H. O. Bolin, Dr. W. P. Whaley, Dr. Forney Hutchinson, Miss Fay McRae, Miss Annie Winburne and Mrs. E. T. Wayland for their excellent services as editorial assistants.

2. That the Rev. E. T. Wayland be reelected as Editor and Business Manager of the Arkansas Methodist.

3. That the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences adopt as their plan for the annual Circulation Campaign the plan heretofore used with such noteworthy success in achieving the present circulation, with such minor modifications and adaptations as are required to meet current needs.

Arkansas Methodist Circulation Campaign

1. That January 9-16 be fixed as Arkansas Methodist Week for the annual state-wide simultaneous Circulation Campaign, for the Arkansas Methodist.

2. That Bishop Charles C. Selecman, as in the past two years, give general leadership to the Circulation Campaign in the state, and that he appoint, at this Conference, a District Director of the Arkansas Methodist Circulation in each District to assist him and the District Superintendent in promoting the work.

3. That the District Superintendent and the District Director appointed by the Bishop give direction to the Circulation Campaign within the District.

4. That the Pastor and a Church Director, appointed by him, direct the Campaign in the local church, and that a complete canvass of the homes of the membership of our church be made during Arkansas Methodist Week for new subscriptions and renewal of subscriptions to the Arkansas Methodist.

5. That the Circulation Campaign in the local church be completed within the eight days set by the Annual Conferences for that work, where at all possible.

6. That each Pastor, on blanks to be furnished, make a report to the District Superintendent and to the office of the Arkansas Methodist on Monday, January 17th, of the results of the Campaign in his charge.

7. That the Arkansas Methodist, in the last week of January, as for the last two years, carry a full report by Districts and Charges of the results of the Campaign throughout the state, with additional reports in following weeks to include the results of any follow-up work necessary to complete the Campaign in the local church.

8. That a quota of one subscription for each seven active members be assigned to the Districts, and that this total accepted by the District be apportioned to the Charges of the District, on the same basis, at the post-conference Set-up Meetings.

9. That the subscription price of the Arkansas Methodist remain at one dollar and twenty-five cents per year.

BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

Report No. 1

We rejoice in the increased giving for World Service. We note the increase in this Episcopal area and are humbly grateful that the Little Rock Conference has been responsible for nearly one-half of the increase.

We rejoice even more in the new spirit of missions. We are becoming conscious of the fact that America needs a great mission movement to save our national existence. As we take a leading role in the Council of Nations, we must also take the leading part in carrying the gospel into the borders of all the earth. The only gospel that is big enough to

bind the nations into a unit is the gospel of Jesus Christ. If the Christian Church fails the world today, we have no hope.

We should be stirred to the largest activity when we realize the possibility in China alone. A nation with one fifth of the world's population, now led by two of the world's greatest Christians, who by precept and example, are trying to lead the people into the acceptance of the principles of the gospel. General Chiang Kai-Shek said recently to a conference of Christian Missionaries, "You are comrades working with us to save our people and to build a new nation."

Then there are the teaming millions in Africa and India, not to speak of the doors opened in South America by the Good Neighbor Policy, and the widening fields of Russia as she opens her arms to a World Alliance of Christian Nations.

We are deeply concerned about our rural problem. We have too long assumed that the country people are religious. The facts in Arkansas are: in the country, only twenty-three percent of the people belong to the church while in the city, fifty-three percent belong to the church.

The Board feels that we have done little to solve a rural problem. We ask your counsel and prayer in helping to find a solution. We would suggest that the District Superintendents and pastors give special emphasis to this problem in their own districts. There is a feeling that the right kind of district organization will do much toward the solution. Could not pastors and churches take responsibility for certain rural areas?

We recommend our editors of periodicals and pamphlets for the fine literature they are giving us and suggest that our pastors make larger use of this valuable literature.

We also commend our department of Visual Education. Their films and still pictures can be used to great advantage and at little cost if organized on a district or Conference basis.

We suggest that our pastors preach often on the theme of "World Missions". The hour lends itself to such themes.

Let our pastors organize Mission Study Classes. Or, if preferred, organize forums on world problems. Our Study Book on "The Church After The War" lends itself to such forums.

We need to continue emphasis on the Fourth Sunday. Our Mission Board issues valuable literature for use in the Fourth Sunday program. It should be made a great educational feature of our religious education program.

We further recommend that our Churches take notice of the many Mission Specials offered by our General Board and that the pastors cooperate in placing these "Specials" wherever practical.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

The liquor traffic continues its devastating march across the state—and nation. It is taking an increasingly heavy toll—physically, economically, morally and spiritually. Juvenile delinquency is increasing at an alarming rate, much of it caused by beer, whiskey, etc.

It is now clearly seen that the liquor crowd are, with increasing boldness, and IN DESPERATION, trying to contravene the will of the people and break down the law. They are using all possible means—however DIRTY—trying to prevent the holding of local option elections. In spite of their "smart" tricks, nine county-wide elections have been held, all of them voting DRY by BIG MAJORITIES. EIGHTEEN TOWNSHIP elections have been held, SIXTEEN of them won by the drys. Ten TOWNS have voted, seven of them won by the DRYs. The WETS have won two townships, three towns and three PRECINCTS. Forty local options altogether, of which the drys were successful in thirty-two.

We recommend:

1. That temperance teaching be stressed in every department of the Church School—if possible, a unit of study.
2. A study class for Church School teachers for the study of the nature and effects of beverage alcohol.
3. That our ministers preach on temperance occasionally, and that temperance leaflets be distributed in the church.
4. That we urge the signing of the TOTAL ABSTINENCE pledge.
5. That we continue to give support to all local options election campaigns.
6. That we commend the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and the Anti-Saloon League, and ask our pastors and people to cooperate with these great Christian organizations.
7. That we commend and thank the Arkansas Baptist, the Arkansas Methodist, and also the Arkansas Gazette for their support of the temperance cause.
8. That we again most heartily commend and thank our Governor for his efforts to have all laws enforced in this state.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

We, your Commission on World Service and Finance, submit the following report:

1. The amount apportioned to this Annual Conference by the General Commission on World Service and Finance is \$42,603.15.

2. We recommend that the apportionment for Conference Work be the same, \$42,603.15.

3. Combining the apportionments for General and Conference Work, we have a total of \$85,206.30.

PLAN FOR MINISTERIAL SUSTENTATION FUND

We, your Commission on Ministerial Sustentation, submit the following as the amended plan for the incoming year:

I. Commission

1. On nomination of the Superintendent of each of the several districts the Annual Conference shall elect quadrennially one lay member from his district and one preacher to serve on this Commission. The District Superintendents shall be ex officio members.

2. The Commission shall elect its own chairman and such other officers as its needs may require.

3. The Commission shall meet annually at least one month before Conference at the call of the chairman, and at such other times and places as needs may require.

II. Beneficiaries

1. Beneficiaries under this plan shall be divided into two groups, such grouping being determined by the relation to the Conference sustained by each, as follows: (a) Members of the Conference and those duly admitted on trial and serving under appointment from the Bishop; (b) Supply preachers who meet all disciplinary requirements for supplies.

2. The minimum salary fixed for each group, respectively, shall be \$1,000.00 and \$800.00. The Commission will match dollar for dollar as far as its funds permit, any increase paid by any charge over and above the average paid by such charge for the three fiscal years ended in 1939, 1940 and 1941, up to the minimum fixed for the group to which the pastor belongs.

III. Raising Funds

1. For the purpose of meeting the requirements set forth in the preceding paragraph, an apportionment of 1 per cent shall be made on all preacher's salaries of \$1,000.00 or more, upon the whole salary and upon all charges paying such salaries.

2. The Treasurer elected by the Commission shall be the one to receive and disburse funds accruing from this source, provided, funds shall be paid only on certification of the District Superintendent of the beneficiary.

3. District Superintendents shall report to the Commission the names of beneficiaries and the amount of aid given. The Treasurer shall keep an itemized account of the benefits paid out and report same to the chairman of this Commission as soon after the session of the Annual Conference as possible.

4. Any part of this plan may be amended at any session of the Conference on recommendation of the Commission, or on motion from the floor of the Conference.

MEMORIAL TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE

No. 1.

Whereas, the union of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church was consummated upon the compact in which the Jurisdictional Conference was the essential feature and upon the Plan of Union in which it was fundamental in the principle and the structure of the Plan, and

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE

Whereas, the Jurisdictional Conference has constitutional standing and clearly defined constitutional rights, powers and duties which cannot be ignored without violating the compact, and

Whereas, the General Conference and the Jurisdictional Conference of 1940 did not work out, set up, and provide for the Jurisdictional Boards and Agencies and their support, by which the rights, powers and duties of the Jurisdictional Conference could be exercised and carried on as required under the constitution, therefore,

Be it resolved, that the Little Rock Conference hereby memorialize the General Conference and the South Central Jurisdictional Conference to take such action and make such provision in law and finance as will enable this Jurisdictional Conference to exercise its constitutional powers and discharge its constitutional duties as set forth in the constitution, Section IV, Article V, 1 & 3; that the union as planned be thereby put into full effect, and

Be it further resolved, that the delegates to the General and Jurisdictional Conferences from the Little Rock Conference be hereby requested and urged to use their influence and continued efforts to the consummation of the will of this Conference as expressed in this resolution and memorial.

No. 2.

We the members of the Little Rock Annual Conference in session at El Dorado, Arkansas, November 10-14, 1943, memorialize the general conference of The Methodist Church meeting at Kansas City, Missouri, April 26, 1944, to clarify the provisions of the discipline in regard to the duties, responsibilities, and scope of authority of the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial qualifications.

First, paragraph 456 and 466 seem to indicate that the entire matter of any change in the conference relationship must come through a recommendation from the committee on conference relations and ministerial qualifications, but paragraph 465 seems to place the authority in the hands of an executive session of an annual conference.

Second, paragraph 229 seems to provide for the time of inactive service of a minister whose health is impaired, or other equally sufficient reasons is unable to perform the regular duties of a minister prior to age 65; paragraph 230, Article 1, seems to indicate that a man may retire at any age, while paragraph 232, Article 3, infers that a man may receive his annuity claim only after he has attained the age of 65 years.

The very word retirement suggests that a man is through and can never become active again, while supernumerary relationship provides for inactive service as long as it is justified with the privilege of returning to the active service. Paragraph 1318, Articles 1, 2 and 3, defines retirement and provide for annuity payments prior to age 65 under certain conditions within the Illinois corporation, but no such regulation is provided for those conferences within the bounds of the Missouri corporation. We feel that the confusion and conflict within the above paragraphs in the 1940 Discipline need to be clarified.

Memoirs

JAMES THOMAS

Rev. James Thomas, son of Stimson J. and Mary P. Thomas, was born in Chambers County, Alabama, April 8, 1860 and died at his home in Little Rock, Arkansas, July 10, 1943.

Dr. Thomas came to Arkansas in 1887 and located in Henderson Valley in the mountains west of Hot Springs, where he taught a private school for four years. He engaged some in the practice of law during this time, having been admitted to the bar in the circuit court at Hot Springs. He was licensed to preach in 1890 and for a part of that year served as a supply. He was admitted on trial into the Little Rock Annual Conference at Arkadelphia in 1891. He was admitted into full connection and ordained deacon by Bishop Keener at Hot Springs in 1893 and was ordained elder by Bishop Haygood at Lonoke in 1895. He retired at the conference session held at Hot Springs in 1942.



He was married to Mrs. Ella Hayes McRae, December 31, 1891. She passed away September 11, 1922. On October 1, 1923, he was married to Miss Julia Baldauf, who survives him. He is also survived by two stepdaughters of his former marriage:

Miss Fay McRae of Little Rock, and Mrs. N. J. Gantt, Jr., of Pine Bluff.

Funeral services for Dr. Thomas were held from his home, 1907 Broadway, Little Rock, July 12, 1943, conducted by Dr. W. B. Slack, pastor, Winfield Memorial Church, Little Rock, assisted by Dr. C. M. Reves, District Superintendent, Little Rock District, Dr. W. C. Watson, Little Rock, Rev. S. T. Baugh, Prescott, and Rev. Harold D. Sadler, DeQueen. Burial was in the family plot in Oakland Cemetery, Little Rock.

The ministerial career of James Thomas, which covers more than a half a century, includes the following appointments: Malvern Hill, Hot Springs, 1890-94; Winfield Memorial, Little Rock, 1894-98; Presiding Elder, Little Rock District, 1898-1900; Winfield Memorial, 1900-02; First Church, Texarkana, 1902-06; Commissioner, Hendrix College, 1906-09; First Church, Texarkana, 1909-13; First Church, Pine Bluff, 1913-14; Commissioner Hendrix College, 1914-18; Presiding Elder, Little Rock District, 1918-22; Centenary Secretary, 1922-24; Commissioner Hendrix College, 1924-26; Presiding Elder, Little Rock District, 1926-30; Presiding Elder, Pine Bluff District, 1930-32; Presiding Elder, Little Rock District, 1932-34; Superintendent, Arkansas Methodist Orphanage, 1934-43. It will be noted that previous to 1934, Dr. Thomas had served as head of the Orphanage since 1923 in connection with his other appointments.

This long list of conference assignments fail to describe the various activities and divergent paths of service which engaged the attention of this great Christian statesman. As was said of him upon another occasion, "His versatile mind and heart led him into many avenues of service for his church. His life extended far beyond the borders of his state." We can list only a few of his outstanding achievements:

He was founder and builder of First Church in Texarkana, having been sent there at the conference session held at Benton in 1902. He

arrived in Texarkana without even a parsonage home for his family. He had no members, no church organization and not even a foot of land upon which to build. Two years later the beautiful edifice, which stands today, had been built, paid for, dedicated and had entertained the annual conference session of 1904. Thus the accomplishment of a task which would have defeated any ordinary man, raised the star of James Thomas into ascendancy, power and influence in his church and even in the affairs of state. He served this great church for two quadrenniums and his genius for organization and direction placed it in the front rank of its sister churches.

At the close of his first quadrennium in Texarkana, he launched forth into another pioneer enterprise which was to more firmly establish him as a matchless leader of men and of movements. It was at the conference session at Warren in 1906 that he was chosen by Stonewall Anderson, then President of Hendrix College, to lead in securing the first permanent endowment for that institution. In three years time he raised, single-handed, the enormous sum of three-hundred thousand dollars. It is noteworthy to remember that this feat was accomplished when higher education was yet in its infancy in Arkansas and that the Panic of 1907 took place while he was in the midst of this campaign. For this meritorious service rendered the cause of education, Hendrix College conferred upon James Thomas the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity. He was also made a member of the Hendrix Board of Trustees which position he held until his passing. In 1914 he was made Chairman of this board and held this position for seventeen years.

The pioneering spirit of James Thomas led him to join with other Methodist leaders in the founding of the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage. He served as a trustee of this institution from its beginning and became the Superintendent in 1923, serving for twenty years without one cent of salary. He delighted to refer to the fact that this was his labor of love and that the Orphanage was closer to his heart than any work he had ever done. He was reluctant to give up this task and it was only after he became confined to his room and he saw that the institution might suffer without a guiding hand that he tendered his resignation, which took place only a few weeks before his death.

His genius for planning and organizing together with his ability to raise funds attracted the leaders of the Southern Methodist Church and in 1910 he was made a member of the General Board of Church Extension and served in this capacity for thirty-three years, being the oldest member in point of service.

Dr. Thomas was vitally interested in the publication of the Arkansas Methodist and for more than twenty years he was a member of its Commission. At one time his name was security for more than eight thousand dollars of the paper's indebtedness in order to save it from being forced to suspend publication and become lost to the church.

In 1899, Dr. Thomas was instrumental in organizing the Board of Trustees of the Little Rock Conference, which was an effort to look after the pensioning of retired ministers and their widows. He served from the organization of this board until his death as its secretary-treasurer.

He lent his great talents to the missionary causes of the church and gave many years as Missionary Secretary of the conference on a voluntary basis. For more than twenty years he was secretary-treasurer of the conference Board of Missions.

James Thomas was five times elected a delegate to the General Conference and several times as an alternate delegate. He served in the sessions of 1906, 1922, 1926, 1930, 1934 and the special session of 1924.

He twice represented his church at Ecumenical Conferences: at London in 1901 and Atlanta in 1931.

His position as a churchman placed him high in the affections of the people of the state and he was recognized as a great citizen. He became the confidant and counselor of many of Arkansas' Governors. These great men realized his worth and called him to places of responsibility and honor. At various times and in the midst of a busy and fruitful ministry he served upon the boards and commissions of the following state institutions: Arkansas Penitentiary, School for the Blind, Deaf-Mute Institute, the Confederate Home and the State Hospital. He was also recognized as a business executive of great magnitude and was sought as an associate by leading business men of the state. He was a member of the directorates of three well established business firms at the time of his death.

The bare recital of the foregoing facts gives us a pen picture of a many-sided and majestic character and at once pronounces James Thomas one of the greatest figures ever to live and serve within the State of Arkansas. He was a great preacher. His sermons were of a deep human interest type and he always drew a large hearing. He always spoke out of the Word of God but it was always addressed to the hearts of the people and for that reason he was marvelously effective in his pulpit ministrations. On his feet in full tide of speech he literally compelled attention and drove home his propositions with the forces of a pile-driver. His very tone held the quiver of power and his every golden sentence was surcharged with the faith and fervor of his great soul. He was greatest as a pastor. He was a veritable shepherd of the flock of God. To his door a path was beaten by both small and great, Senators, Governors, Judges, men and women of all ages and stations in life came to him for counsel and sympathy and to lay bare their very souls in the serene confidence that all they committed to him would be kept inviolate. In all, white and black, rich and poor alike felt the comforting power of his words and the touch of his beneficent hand.

It was in his hotel room at Hope during the session of the conference of 1937, that he requested this writer to prepare his memoir. He then revealed the plans he had made for his funeral and then with the inevitable twinkle of his eyes so familiar to those intimately associated with him, he remarked "I do not expect to live more than thirty years longer and I want everything ready." Then he dismissed the subject with directions that his memoir should contain only the main events of his life, as a matter of history, and that no eulogy be given. Our debt to him is so heavy and our affections so deep and boundless, and his life so long and fruitful, we cannot refrain. We feel sure that from the Spirit World he has smiled his forgiveness as he was always so willing to do while in the flesh. He realized that the glory of the late afternoon had come and that the twilight could not be far away. After a long distinguished career and a colorful life, James Thomas went to meet God unafraid.

HENRY H. MCGUYRE

Rev. Henry H. McGuyre, son of Thomas Polk and Amanda Adams McGuyre, was born in Cook County, Texas, January 5, 1872, and died in a Little Rock hospital, April 15, 1943. He was educated in the public schools and at Texas Christian University. In 1900 he was married to Miss Mamie Sanders in the State of Oklahoma. She lived only a few years. To this marriage three children were born, two of whom survive: Mrs. E. L. Crossett of Pine Bluff, Arkansas, and Mrs. C. R. Taylor of Dallas, Texas. On June 16, 1910, he was married to Miss Donna Eason of Lonoke County, who survives him, together with a son, James, of Foreman, Arkansas, and a daughter, Mary, of the home.



Funeral services for Brother McGuyre were held from Henderson Church, Little Rock on the afternoon of April 17, 1943, conducted by Dr. C. M. Reves, District Superintendent of the Little Rock District, assisted by Dr. W. C. Watson, a former Presiding Elder and close personal friend. Burial was in Edgewood Cemetery, North Little Rock, Arkansas.

Henry H. McGuyre was licensed to preach at eighteen years of age and came to Arkansas from Oklahoma in 1903. Before entering the itinerant ministry he served the Hickory Plains Circuit as supply from 1905-08. He was admitted on trial into the Little Rock Annual Conference at Little Rock in 1908. He was admitted into full connection and ordained deacon by Bishop Candler at Hot Springs in 1912. He was ordained elder by Bishop Morrison at First Church, Little Rock in 1914. His appointments as a member of the conference are as follows: Austin Circuit, 1908-10; Bryant Circuit, 1910-12; Mabelvale-Primrose, 1912-16; Henderson Church, Little Rock, 1916-18; Carr Memorial, Pine Bluff, 1918-21; Rison, 1921-23; Bearden, 1923-24; Stephens, 1924-27; Capitol View, Little Rock, 1927-28; Washington-Ozan, 1928-31; Foreman, 1931-34; Mena, 1934-38; Henderson Church, Little Rock, 1938-43.

Henry McGuyre came from rugged pioneer stock. It is worthwhile to note here that he was a great-nephew of Archibald Yell, Governor of Arkansas, who lost his life leading his regiment at Buena Vista in the Mexican war, and that his father was a Confederate soldier. This spirit characterized his life and ministry. He was ruggedly honest and sincere in all his dealings and so systematic in his private affairs that when the end came, he owed not any man. In his pastorates, Brother McGuyre looked after every interest of the church and was so democratic and brotherly that people of other communions loved and admired him. He was a lover of youth and could easily bridge the gap of years that lay between and become one of them in the work of the church. He was not afraid to stand for the right and loyalty to friendship was one of the cardinal virtues of his life. From the fixed purposes of his life he was never deflected and from God's service his heart never felt the slightest alienation. Above all else his was a warm sympathetic heart in which the fires of God's love were kept burning. His implicit confidence in humanity kept bitterness out of his heart. He saw the beautiful and the lovely things of life and he heard the call of God in the voice of every man.

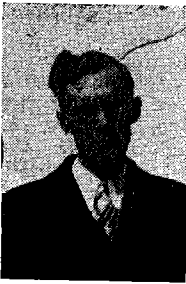
He was once the pastor of this writer and we will always remember how human and interesting his sermons were and how his congregation delighted to hear him preach. His life was rich in Christian experiences and his preaching reflected what he had felt and seen. Quick at repartee and with a keen sense of humor, Henry McGuyre was extremely popular with his fellow ministers. A brilliant conversationalist and an

affable companion he was rich in his personal contacts and was never among strangers nor was his life one bit lonely. In the midst of a busy pastorate he was stricken and carried to a hospital. After giving instructions about things to be done in his absence, Henry McGuyre closed his eyes upon things of earth to open them in the presence of God. The work of his life was upon his mind and the peace of God was in his heart. A valiant soldier of the Cross has gone Home.

M. K. ROGERS

Rev. Moses Key Rogers was born in Dallas County near Fordyce on January 12, 1875. He was the son of D. N. and Mary Rogers who reared a large and influential family. The atmosphere of this home was positively religious and gave expression to rare personality values. Three sons of this family became ministers of the gospel. Brother Rogers was licensed to preach at the age of 21 and served for a time as an effective



local preacher. In the fall of 1900 he was admitted on trial in the traveling connection and for forty years he gave himself diligently to the labors of a Methodist preacher. Each personality seems to have its own mark of distinguishment. Some distinguish themselves by their eloquence, some by their power of logic, some by this or that outstanding achievement. To one who knew Key Rogers intimately, his very name has become a synonym of loyalty and faithfulness. He was righteously persistent in his Christian endeavors, and at the same time, one of the most patient men I have ever known. He was genuinely devoted to his work and esteemed his call as a minister as the promptings of the Eternal.

He accepted his assignments as a challenge from God and gave himself in a deathless abandon in order to realize the last vestige of possibility inhering in his responsibility. He was a true man and had his soul been turned inside out not one stain would have been found on it.

He was married to Miss Georgie Souter, November 27, 1901. To this union six children were born, four daughters and two sons: Miss Virgie E. of Wilson, Mrs. Jessie Lee Mitchell of Sheridan, Misses Rena Mae and Nellie George of Hughes, Archie M. of St. Louis, Missouri, and Joseph Key of Tuscon, Ari. These reflect in their own characters the noble qualities of their saintly father.

Brother Rogers during a ministry of forty-two years served the following charges: Bright Star Ct., Magnolia Ct., Hampton Ct., Smack-over Ct., Hamburg Ct., New Edinburgh Ct., Rison Ct., Center Point Ct., Princeton Ct., Bradley and Taylor, Mabelvale, Atlanta Ct., Carthage Ct., Grady and Gould, Sheridan, Tillar-Winchester, Wilmar Ct., Montrose-Snyder, Arkansas City-Watson, Leola and Friendship. One familiar with the appointments of Little Rock Conference knows that, for the most part, these were "hard works". But this faithful servant of God was able to add something to the spiritual experiences of those to whom he was sent and at the same time by dint of hard labor secured means both for the subsistence and education of his children.

The world is richer because this man lived in it. May the mantle of his noble qualities fall upon some one inwardly worthy to carry it.

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

1. **Nominations.** The District Superintendents shall be a standing committee on nominations and shall nominate all members of the quadrennial and annual boards, commissions and committees except where they are otherwise provided for.
2. **Conference Program.** The pastor-host of the Conference, the District Superintendent in whose district the Conference session is held, the chairman of the Commission on Evangelism and the chairman of the several Conference Boards shall constitute a committee on Conference Program. This committee shall arrange, not less than sixty days before the Conference meets, for all preaching, inspirational and anniversary services and select the Conference preacher. As far as possible it shall publish at least one month before Conference, the hours to be set apart for special services. The program made by this committee shall be subject to revision as the exigencies of any situation may require or the Conference direct.
3. **Financial and Statistical.** (1) All Conference assessments and all reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars with no columns for cents. (2) Each pastor shall settle with the Conference Treasurer and turn over his statistical reports not later than the first day of the Conference, provided this report must correspond with the Treasurer's report. (3) The District Superintendent shall furnish the Statistical Secretary with all assessments and acceptances of pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the meeting of the Annual Conference and these figures shall be accepted as official.
4. **Memoirs of Laymen and Preachers' Wives.** Memoirs of preachers' wives shall be read at the Memorial Service of the Conference and published in the Conference Journal, and preachers' wives shall be invited to take part in the Memorial Session. Names of deceased laymen who have been active in the Annual Conference or served on Conference Boards to be printed in the Conference Journal.
5. **Conference Expense Fund.** The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall make an assessment for a Conference Expense Fund to cover the cost of all clerical work necessary in preparing Conference records, printing, and distributing the Conference minutes, for preserving Conference records and documents, for auditing accounts, and all legitimate expenses incurred by the Conference Secretary and the Conference Treasurer in carrying out the orders of the Conference. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of this fund which shall be paid out on the order of the Conference Secretary.
6. **District Superintendents' Salary.** In each district the District Superintendent's salary shall be estimated and apportioned to the several charges by the District Stewards under the chairmanship of the District Superintendent in a meeting called for that purpose early in the Conference year.
7. **District Expenses.** The District Stewards shall also estimate and apportion to the several charges an amount necessary for district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a Treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and shall distribute same on order of the District Superintendent. The Treasurer shall make an annual report to the District Conference showing receipts and disbursements.

8. **Reports and Resolutions.** All reports, resolutions and other papers intended for publication in the Conference minutes shall be type-written and in triplicate.

9. **Historical Society.** There shall be a Historical Society composed of the present members of the History Commission, the Secretary of the Conference, and additional members nominated by the Cabinet and elected by the Conference. It shall be the duty of the Society to collect and preserve biographical data of clerical members of the Conference, data of all kinds that promise to be of historical value and interest. Such material to be deposited in the vault of Hendrix College, Conway, Arkansas. This Society shall make a quadrennial report to the session of the Conference next following the General Conference.

10. **Lay Representation.** In addition to those members provided for in Paragraph 542 of the 1939 Discipline of the Methodist Church, each pastoral charge shall, upon nomination of the pastor, elect either at the annual meeting or at the Quarterly Conference, one representative to the District Conference; **provided**, that in charges of more than 500 members, one representative shall be for each additional 500 members or major fraction thereof. Alternate lay delegates shall be elected in the same manner as the principal.

11. **Lay Members.** Lay members to the annual conference shall be elected annually.

12. **District Conferences** shall be held annually in each district.

13. One District Superintendent may serve on each of the major Conference Boards. No member of the Conference shall serve on more than one major Board, provided that this rule shall not apply to those Boards and Commissions appointed by the presiding Bishop, nor to ex-officio members.

14. **District Committees on Qualifications of Local Preachers.** The District Committee on qualifications of local preachers to be nominated by the District Superintendents and confirmed by the Annual Conference shall consist of three traveling elders serving on the District.

15. **Audit.** The audit accounts of all funds as provided for in Paragraph 801 of the Discipline shall be done by certified public accountants sufficiently in advance of the Conference session to have its report published in the Conference Journal.

17. **Amendment.** These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.
