PROCEEDINGS

WEDNESDAY EVENING, 7:30 O'CLOCK

Conference Opened. The ninety-first session of the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church (which was the sixth session of the United Church) convened at the First Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas at 7:30 o'clock, Wednesday evening, November 8, 1944, with Bishop Paul E. Martin presiding. The congregation stood and sang the National anthem after which hymn No. 402, "Are We Yet Alive," was sung. Rev. H. B. Vaught led in prayer. Rev. Fred R. Harrison, secretary of the last session of the Conference, called the roll. Rev. Fred R. Harrison was elected secretary of the Conference with Rev. Roy E. Fawcett and Rev. John B. Hefley assistant secretaries, Rev. R. B. Moore, Journal clerk, Rev. C. E. Whitten, Statistician, Rev. T. T. McNeal, assistant statistician, Rev. Chas. H. Giessen, roll clerk with Rev. Claude Roy assistant, and Rev. S. T. Baugh, editor of the Conference Journal.

Service of Commemoration. The Rev. John L. Hoover conducted the service of commemoration beginning with hymn No. 521, "It Singeth Low In Every Heart," after which the responsive reading, page 591, (First Reading) was read. After the Gloria Patri and Anthem by the choir of First Church, Dr. C. M. Reves read the Second Lesson, John 14:1-14, after which Rev. Fred R. Harrison read the names of those who had died during the year: Rev. Jesse W. Berry, Rev. B. Frank Scott, Rev. Jerome J. Colson, Rev. Walter W. Christie, Rev. Walter W. Nelson, Dr. J. Lewis Cannon, Dr. Charles Jerome Greene, and Dr. J. Daniel Hammons; Mrs. John R. Rushing, Mrs. R. W. McKay, Mrs. Andrew Soule Scott, and Mrs. W. R. Richardson. Hymn No. 518, "Servant of God, Well Done!" was sung. The Rev. Fred G. Roebuck delivered the commemoration meditation, after which the doxology was sung.

The Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. Bishop Paul E. Martin, assisted by the District Superintendents, Rev. John L. Hoover, Rev. Fred G. Roebuck, and Rev. Hal H. Pinnell administered the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper in an impressive manner.

THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 9

The Conference Convened. Bishop Paul E. Martin opened the Conference at 9 o'clock. Hymn No. 23, "Come Thou Fount" was sung, after which Rev. J. A. Henderson led in prayer. Bishop Martin delivered a helpful message on the text "All things work together for good to those who love the Lord." The devotional was closed with Hymn No. 213, "My Faith Looks Up To Thee."

Gavels. Bishop Martin expressed appreciation of the gift of a gavel presented by Rev. Coy E. Whitten. The Bishop spoke of another gavel which was presented to him by Rev. and Mrs. O. P. Kiker, Wichita Falls, Texas. The wood is from yellow poplar in the door-jam of the original Rehoboth Methodist Church, West Virginia, built in 1784. The handle of the gavel is from a reed organ which has seen more than 100 years of church service.

Committee on Courtesy. The Rev. J. E. Cooper, secretary of the Cabinet, nominated Rev. Alfred H. Freeman, Rev. Hal Pinnell, and Rev. J. M. Hamilton to serve as a committee on courtesies. They were elected by the Conference.

Hosts Of The Conference. Rev. Hal Pinnell was recognized by the chair and presented Rev. J. E. Cooper, Rev. J. D. Baker, Rev. B. F. Fitzhugh, Rev. S. K. Burnett, pastors of the churches of Hot Springs, who had worked together in making preparations for the entertainment of the Conference. He presented Mrs. Paul E. Martin, wife of the Presiding Bishop, to the Conference. Rev. Hal Pinnell presented Mrs. F. M. Wil-

liams, long an active and valued member of First Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas who brought an address of welcome from Hot Springs Methodism. Bishop Martin responded.

Methodist Publishing House. Dr. C. M. Reves read a letter from the Methodist Publishing House conveying their appreciation of the support of the Conference and the desire for the continuation of service to the Conference. Dr. Reves presented Miss Vera Siegel who represented the Publishing House. Miss Siegel urged the members of the Conference to visit the book room. Bishop Martin earnestly urged the preachers to avail themselves of this opportunity to buy new books, and use them in preparation of their sermons.

District Superintendents' Character Passed. Bishop Martin called the name of each District Superintendent and their character was passed.

District Superintendents' Reports. Rev. J. E. Cooper, secretary of the Cabinet, read the composite report for the District Superintendents. The Superintendents were asked to stand and the Bishop presented them to the Conference. They were J. E. Cooper, C. M. Reves, Arthur Terry, W. Neill Hart, J. L. Dedman, Van W. Harrell, Andrew J. Christie.

Gift to Dr. C. M. Reves. Dr. W. B. Slack presented a gift, a beautiful traveling bag, to Dr. Reves in appreciation from the pastors of the Little Rock District for his faithful and sympathetic leadership during the past six years.

Pastors' Character Passed. The names of the pastors were called and their character passed.

Gift to J. L. Dedman. Rev. Alfred Freeman presented a check to Rev. J. L. Dedman, retiring District Superintendent, on behalf of the ministers of the District.

Nomination For Boards, Commissions and Committees: Rev. J. E. Cooper, secretary of the Cabinet, read the nominations for Boards, Commissions, and Committees and they were elected.

Transferred Out. Bishop Martin announced that Rev. Fred G. Roebuck had been transferred to the North Arkansas Conference.

Goals And Objectives. Bishop Martin presented Rev. Fred G. Roebuck who read the report of the committee on Goals and Objectives for the new year. The report was adopted.

REPORTS OF BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND COMMISSIONS

ARKANSAS METHODIST COMMISSION

To The Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences:

The Arkansas Methodist Commission, comprising equal membership from the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences, submits the following report (See Financial Statement from November 1, 1943, to October 15, 1944) and makes the following recommendations for the ensuing year, in accordance with decisions reached in the annual meeting of the Joint Commission on October 19, 1944:

1. (a) That we again record our sincere thanks to Dr. E. T. Wayland for his services as Editor and Business Manager and to the helpful staff of assistants working with him, viz., Miss Annie Winburne, Mrs. E. T. Wayland, Rev. H. O. Bolin, Jimmie Ricks and Nancy Penix and express grateful appreciation to Dr. Forney Hutchinson and Dr. A. H. Rapping for their regularly contributed articles and to Dr. W. P. Whaley for his helps on the Sunday School Lesson.

(b) That we note with gratitude the high-level circulation figure of the Arkansas Methodist and the excellent financial condition of the paper as evidence of editorial efficiency and sound business management and as demonstration of the reiterated purpose of the ministers and membership of the Church in Arkansas to maintain a worthy church press.

2. That Dr. E. T. Wayland be re-elected as Editor and Business Manager of the Arkansas Methodist.

3. That the Annual Conference adopt as their plan for the Annual Circulation Campaign the plan in operation last year, as recorded in the Annual Conference Journals, with the change of date for the campaign to December 31, 1944, to January 7, 1945, and certain other minor changes to accommodate to current need.

4. That there be allowed for the Arkansas Methodist the same apportionments for the ensuing year as were granted by the Conference during the year now closing.

5. Whereas the blanks for pastor's report to the Annual Conference do not give place for reporting the number of subscribers to the Arkansas Methodist, we recommend that the Statistical Secretary be authorized to set aside a column, unused in this area, for that purpose and that the office of the Arkansas Methodist be asked to furnish the number of subscribers for the charges this year.

WHEREAS the present emergency needs of the American Bible Society and the increased responsibility for post-war reconstruction in its specialized field will call for a substantial increase in its budget,

AND WHEREAS the Society is the agency through which the Methodist Church and other denominational bodies do the major part of their Bible work at home and abroad,

AND WHEREAS the Society must look to the churches for funds to meet its unparalleled present and future opportunities,

BE IT RESOLVED

THAT the Little Rock Conference pay its usual amount to the Society and that each church of our Conference be urged to give generously to the American Bible Society both for its increasing regular budget and its War Emergency Budget.

THAT the needs of the Society be commended to the generous consideration of those administering special funds for the war emergency program.

THAT each individual church be urged to set aside Sunday, December 10th, on which the place of the Bible is duly emphasized and the responsibility of the church in Bible distribution is clearly laid upon the conscience of the people.

THAT all of our people be urged to take part in the National Bible Reading plan to be carried on from Thanksgiving Day to Christmas Day.

BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS**Report No. 1**

In behalf of our claimants, we are very grateful to this Conference for the splendid response which has enabled us to provide a more liberal annuity for all our claimants. This Conference has made excellent advancement this quadrennium toward this worthy objective. This year your Board is paying \$15.00 per service year to retired ministers. This is the result of your loyal and sympathetic support of this cause, and it is most gratifying.

Throughout the year your Board has attempted to keep in touch with our Claimants and in several cases we have provided needed medical and hospital assistance out of our emergency fund.

In compliance with Par. 1613 (10) of the 1944 Discipline, we recommend the setting aside of an amount equal to 5% of our Conference income as a reserve fund "in order to stabilize the annuity rate payable in the Conference." This to continue until a reserve fund equivalent to 25% of the average annual income for the past five years has been accumulated.

We further recommend that an amount equal to one-half of one per cent, ($\frac{1}{2}$ of 1%), of the cash salary paid the pastors be set aside for the General Board of Pensions, as per the recommendation of the Jurisdictional Conference, for a stabilizing fund to become operative at the next General Conference.

We recommend compliance with the request coming from the Historical Society for a picture of every retired Minister.

Although the demands upon your Board next year will be greater, we have a reasonable assurance that the income from the same percentage as that of the year now closing will be sufficient to maintain the standard of \$15.00 per service year. This will be made possible because of the increase in salaries next year. Therefore, we most respectfully request the same percent in each bracket as that of 1944.

BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS

Report No. 3

(Apportionments)

We submit the honor roll, including Superannuate preachers, widows, of preachers and Dependents of deceased ministers, showing the amount allocated to each Claimant. We have adhered to the ruling of the 1944 Discipline, allocating the funds on an equity basis, giving to the Widows an apportionment on the basis of 70% of that which their husbands would receive per year of service, widows service years determined by the actual years they lived with their husbands during active ministry. Dependent Children's claim, is determined by multiplying the father's approved years of service by one-fourth of the annuity rate, provided that in no case the total annuity claim of the children exceed the annuity claim of the deceased father.

Your Board is pleased to report that the graduated scale of payment by Charges to the Claimant fund, with the raise of 1% voted by the Conference last year, has made it possible for us to pay \$15.00 per service year to Preachers, and \$10.50 to Widows, as compared to \$12.00 per service year to Preachers, and \$8.40 per service year to Widows, last year.

We indicate below, years of service, amount paid to claimant by General Board, and amount distributed by this Board.

The Conference Board has authorized the Treasurer, Otto W. Teague, to distribute the Conference Funds, November 10, 1944, and April 10, 1945, paying half of the allocation at each time.

OLD BOARD OF EDUCATION

As we come to the close of the quadrennium and the first year of the service of our new Executive Secretary, we are glad to report a good and helpful year in the promotion of our Conference program of education. As in all other phases of church work and Kingdom building, we have had our share of the difficulties, but even so, we have occasion for gratitude when we review the results of our year's work.

Children's Work. Attention has been given to the promotion of Children's work through one Conference-wide and a number of District workers' meetings. Where possible and practical, we have included children's workers' courses in our training schools, and have otherwise sought the training of workers through informal conferences and by personal contacts. Reports show that a total of 89 Vacation Church Schools have been held during the year, with almost 4,000 children in attendance.

With the resignation of our Director, Miss Fay McRae, we have been without a Conference supervisor since August 1st. We express to Miss McRae our sincere gratitude for the devoted and zealous service she has given to this great cause during the past seventeen years. It is the thought of the Board that this vitally important position shall not remain permanently vacant.

Youth Work. Our Youth Division has been quite active as evidenced by the program promoted by the Conference and District officers. Including adult workers, the Senior-Young People's Assembly had 304 in attendance, from 86 churches. Three Christian Adventure camps had a total of 494 intermediates and workers, from 96 different churches. The sum of \$2091.00 was raised on the Youth Fellowship Fund, with 115 churches participating. We have cooperated with the North Arkansas Conference in reviving the State Methodist Student Movement, and in the holding of the conference near the close of the last school session. Since the summer assemblies, we have held four Epworth Training Conferences, with an enrollment of 230 youths and workers, from 22 churches.

Adult Work. We have been unable to give any special emphasis to adult work as such. However, we have provided a number of training schools and classes appealing to adult interests, and arranged two series of Bible Conferences, only one of which we were able to carry through.

Leadership Training. With 54 churches participating, we have had 1307 enrolled in local schools and training classes, with 722 credits issued. Including Pastors' School, the Young People's Assembly, and the Mt. Sequoyah Leadership Schools and Conferences, we have had a total of 1840 enrolled in our training program and 1238 credits issued.

Fourth Sunday Program and Offerings. We have sought to promote the missionary interest and spirit by mailing out regularly materials for the service and reports of the offerings.

Ministerial Education. We have assisted in the raising of the February Special for the training of our young ministers and in the promotion of the summer school for pastors.

We, your new Board, begin our work with faith and confidence in the cause which you have elected us to represent and to direct for the quadrennium. We ask your full support as we work together for the achievement of this vitally important task.

Conference Staff. We have elected Roy E. Fawcett Executive Secretary and request the Bishop to appoint him to this office. We have elected C. Ray Hozendorf Conference Director of Youth Work, and Dr. Matt L. Ellis, Director of Adult Work.

Division Work. We shall endeavor to promote the work of the three divisions of the Church School through the training of leaders, and with appropriate Conference, District, and local church programs for each group.

Wesley Foundation Work. We pledge ourselves to the support of the Wesley Foundation Work in state supported schools within the bounds of our Conference, at the State University, and to the student program of our own Hendrix College, recommending that there be a closer contact between local churches and students in these higher institutions of learning.

Pastors' School. We nominate to serve on the Board of Managers of the Arkansas Pastors' School: Aubrey G. Walton, Alfred H. Freeman, J. L. Dedman, Mrs. T. S. Lovett, Roy E. Fawcett, C. M. Reeves, C. R. Hozendorf. Cabinet Representative, Arthur Terry.

Church School Day. We recommend that Sunday, April 15, be designated as Church School Day with the same goal as of last year, \$3600.

Philander Smith College. We commend Philander Smith College for negroes. We believe that its work merits the confidence and support of our people.

Southern Methodist University. We acknowledge a debt of gratitude to Southern Methodist University for the excellent service it is rendering to this Jurisdiction, and recommend a continuation of the ministerial scholarship there. We nominate Dr. E. C. Rule to succeed himself as Trustee of Southern Methodist University.

Western Methodist Assembly. We would call attention to the leadership programs at Mt. Sequoyah and would recommend an increased attendance on the part of Conference, District, and local church workers. We nominate Mr. J. D. Reynolds of Camden as Trustee.

Crusade for Christ. We heartily endorse the Crusade for Christ and commit ourselves to the realization of its five objectives.

Appropriations. We request the World Service Commission to continue the same appropriations to this Board as of last year.

During the year now closing, the Conference has contributed \$11,544.-

.72 to the College budget. Of this amount \$7,670.76 came from Conference Benevolences and \$3,883.96 from the Hendrix ministerial special.

We make the following recommendations:

1. That the Commission on World Service allocate to the College the same amount, on a percentage basis, as of last year.
2. That, due to the Crusade for Christ in the early part of the new year, we join with the North Arkansas Conference in the taking of the Hendrix Ministerial Special offering on Sunday, May 27th, allocating \$5000 to the College and \$3000 to ministerial education. This is with the understanding that after this year, we shall come back to the regular time for the presentation of this cause.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Report No. 1

We, your Conference Board of Evangelism, have met and have organized with the following officers: Kenneth L. Spore, President; Virgil D. Keeley, Vice-president; John L. Tucker, Recording Secretary and Treasurer. We have elected John M. McCormack to the office of Conference Secretary of Evangelism, to serve in connection with his other assignment, and respectfully request the Bishop to appoint him to that office. We have made provisions for an executive committee, composed of the officers of the Board; the Conference Secretary of Evangelism; and four others to be selected after conference. We have instructed our president, Kenneth L. Spore, to represent our board on the Commission on Town and Country Work.

We have nominated Coy E. Whitten, Neill Hart, H. O. Bolin, Hal Pinnell, E. O. Galloway, C. B. Wyatt, and L. O. Lee, as members at large on our board, and respectfully request the Conference to elect them.

We request the World Service Commission to grant us a small increase in our apportionment if at all possible, in order to finance a larger program, entailing an expenditure of around \$3,200. The reports of the pastors will show an encouraging picture as to our achievements in the evangelism field the past year, however, there is much more to be done.

We regard our radio program of the past year as having been a successful beginning, and are making arrangements for the continuation of the same, to be under the general supervision of the President, the Secretary-treasurer, and the Conference Secretary of Evangelism.

In keeping with the recommendations of the Jurisdictional Board of Evangelism, we offer the following recommendations:

1. That a survey of all communities in our Conference be made in order to build a definite responsibility list for our respective churches.
2. That training classes for church membership for all ages of our people be conducted in all our churches.
3. That we plan and execute campaigns of Visitation Evangelistic, in which both preachers and laymen will be used in all our church communities and in unchurched areas.

4. That a well planned revival meeting be held in every church and in the unchurched areas throughout the Conference.

We call attention to the fact that the recent Jurisdictional Conference made provision for an Executive Secretary of the Jurisdiction, among whose functions is to give leadership in the Evangelistic Program, and that Dr. Paul Womeldorf has been elected to that office. We urge the widest possible cooperation with his program.

We believe that everything possible should be done to make all our church homes truly Christian, and urge our preachers to promote the establishment of family worship and the use of the Upper Room and Tidings.

We regard it a high privilege to cooperate in so epochal a movement as the "Crusade for Christ" and will do everything possible to help make our State-Wide Rally at Little Rock, November 21, our District Rallies in January, and the program in the local churches the success they should be.

We are filing our financial report with the secretary of the Conference for publication in the Journal.

COMMITTEE ON GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Your committee is aware that the times through which we are passing are unusual, and that the Church faces a crucial period, made so by the stupendous tasks ahead, and the overwhelming opportunities for making her influence felt in a world of war and reconstruction. We must, therefore, plan a program adequate to the needs of the people whom we serve, and all for whom we are responsible throughout the world.

We therefore recommend the following:

I. Evangelism

1. That the Conference Board of Evangelism shall be active in the promotion and supervision of a challenging program which will reach every charge.

Evangelistic Goals:

- (1) A substantial increase in attendance at public worship services.
- (2) Daily devotions and family worship in every Methodist home.
- (3) A special season for intensive cultivation in Evangelism in each Church.
- (4) Each Church should have a definite goal to be reached by profession of faith.

II. Education

1. That we keep central in all of our work the appeal to the great motive power of Christian faith and love.

2. That we unite our efforts with other promotional agencies for a more effective rural program in unchurched or otherwise needy areas.

3. That we lend a new emphasis to the central place of the Bible as the text book of Christian life and work.

4. That we give full support to promoting the offering for Hendrix College and ministerial education, for the Arkansas Methodist Home and for Church School Day.

5. That a comprehensive training program be carried on in all churches where practical.

6. That the Pastors' School be attended by all pastors.

7. That we share fully in the Crusade for Christ, with particular emphasis on increased Church School enrollment and attendance.

8. That we give special attention to the cultivation and enlistment of proper young persons for full time Christian Service.

III. Missions and Church Extension

1. That schools of missions and study classes be promoted in each church, using the textbook, "Christ After Chaos."
2. That the opportunity for using the fourth Sunday to promote missionary knowledge and lift World Service Giving, be kept ever before us.
3. That every pastor and pastoral charge assume responsibility for at least one Extension Church School and preaching appointment.
4. That each District have a definite program for establishing a Methodist Church in new territory, and lend financial assistance as needed.
5. Inasmuch as a larger portion of the twenty-five million dollars to be raised in the Crusade for Christ is to be used for missions, we dedicate ourselves to the goals of both home and foreign objectives.

IV. Women's Work

1. That there be a Woman's Society of Christian Service in each Church.
2. That all women of the Methodist Church be in a W. S. C. S.
3. That there be a Wesleyan Guild for employed women, in every society.
4. That every society pledge its full cooperation to the Crusade for Christ.

V. Lay Activities

1. That the Conference Board of Lay Activities promote the program of the General Board which includes: Christian stewardship, Christian fellowship, personal evangelism, lay speaking, adequate Christianizing of personal and community life.
2. That members of Boards of Stewards be trained through specific and practical methods to carry on the business and religious program of the Church. Classes under the leadership of the Pastor and Charge Lay Leader, as part of the regular monthly meetings of the Board, have proved effective.
3. That Laymen's Day as fixed by the General Conference on the fourth Sunday in February be observed, using lay speakers in every church.
4. That laymen be organized in each church or charge for fellowship and for effective work in all programs of the year.
5. That the Crusade for Christ engage all our powers throughout this quadrennium, so that the objectives of the five-pointed program will be realized.

VI. Methodist Youth Fellowship

1. That Commissions carry on an active program in their respective fields in each local church of the Conference.
2. That we set a goal of \$2000.00 for the Methodist Youth Fund, with a paid pledge from every church.
3. That the Youth Fellowship participate in the Crusade for Christ, by:
 - (1) Continuing the crusade for a new world order to insure lasting peace.
 - (2) Helping to raise the \$25,000,000 for missionary reconstruction.
 - (3) Actively working in the church-wide evangelistic campaign.
 - (4) Enlisting in the church-wide program of stewardship cultivation.
4. That greater emphasis be given to the volunteer service of the Methodist Youth Fellowship, stressing commitment to full-time Christian Service.
5. That the importance of student work be stressed:
 - (1) That pastors in local churches write letters to the student and to the pastor of the student church.

- (2) That Student Recognition Day be observed in each local church.
- (3) That the Secretary of Student Work in the W. S. C. S. keep in constant contact with students.
- (4) That the home church help the student realize his relation to the church in the college community.

VII. Methodist Publications

1. That, in view of the urgent need for full publicity for the Crusade for Christ throughout the quadrennium, as well as other church interests, we give special emphasis to the Arkansas Methodist Circulation Campaign, December 31 through January 7, and that the goal be one subscription for every seven active members in a charge.

2. That we emphasize the circulation of the Christian Advocate and The World Outlook.

3. That the Upper Room and other devotional literature be regularly made available to our people.

VIII. Hospitals and Homes

1. That there be Golden Cross directors in each charge.

2. That we pledge ourselves in full cooperation to the efficient operation of a Methodist Hospital in Arkansas.

3. That December be observed as Arkansas Methodist Home for Children month, with a generous Christmas offering.

IX. Finances

1. That it shall be the goal of each District to accept and pay the full askings on Benevolences and World Service.

2. That each local church be urged to increase the acceptances and make early payments on Benevolences and World Service.

3. That a thorough study be made of paragraphs 261 through 267 in the Methodist Discipline on finances.

4. That the Conference put forth every effort toward reaching the financial goal set in the Crusade for Christ.

X. Hendrix College

That the Little Rock Conference in cooperation with the North Arkansas Conference keep active the agitation for a much needed chapel on the Hendrix campus and move steadily toward the erection of a suitable building.

XI. Conference Council

1. That there be a conference council composed of representatives of each board and committee in the Conference, and that quarterly meetings be held in order that there may be closer cooperation and coordination between the various interests of the Church.

XII. Episcopal Residence

1. That the Little Rock Conference in cooperation with the other conferences of the area make definite plans toward the purchase of an Episcopal Residence for the Arkansas-Louisiana area.

XIII. Crusade For Christ

1. That the Little Rock Conference in recognition of the spiritual and economic needs of the nations of the earth and that Christianity lives and expands only when world vision is constantly before its eyes—and that the church will soon face the opportunity of a thousand years:

HISTORICAL SOCIETY

We, your Historical Society, make the following Quadrennial report:

We have secured for the Conference some valuable historical documents which have been placed in the vault at Hendrix College for safe-keeping. A History of Methodism in Camden, prepared by Kenneth L. Spore, is a valuable addition to our files. A History of Methodism around Prescott, prepared by S. T. Baugh, is likewise valuable. An old Class Meeting record of early Church life in Columbus, Arkansas, is a valuable addition to our files.

We have out lines in a number of places in the Conferences which should provide valuable books, pamphlets, papers, and other historical material some time in the future if we but patiently pursue efforts to secure them.

Valuable records are lying around in every District and in many cities unprotected from the ravages of fire. If destroyed these can never be replaced. Looking to a more careful provision for safeguarding these priceless historical documents the last session of our Conference adopted a Resolution as follows: Resolved, "That all District Conference Journals be deposited in a fire-proof vault in the community where the District Superintendent lives." We trust this is being complied with.

Your Society is affiliated with the Jurisdictional Historical Society, which is in process of organization, with Dr. Umphrey Lee as President.

We recommend that each District Conference elect a District Historical Society to be auxiliary to the Conference Society in gathering historical material.

We further recommend that all retired members of the Little Rock Conference furnish this Society with a photograph of himself not smaller than 3x4 inches made by a good photographer; and that in the future when a member of the Conference retires he comply with this request.

THE OLD BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Report No. 1

The old Board of Hospitals and Homes reports that the funds for the purchase of the Ozark Sanatorium have been secured. And that the Hospital has been contracted for by the Board of Trustees appointed at the last Annual Conference. The Methodist Home in Little Rock submits the following report

At the beginning of the year, we had twenty-three children in the Home. The number has varied from that figure to thirty-one, and is now twenty-eight. The number of admissions to the Home is affected by many varied circumstances which can not be enumerated here.

The question which we have been facing throughout the year is that of a future policy and expansion plan for the institution. At the Annual meeting of the Board of Trustees in October, a committee was appointed to make a thorough study of the present situation as well as the future plans and policy for the work of the Home.

Until this committee has made its report, no detailed statement can be made. We think we can assure you, however, that your Board, through this committee, will bring to you plans and policies that will be worthy of our great church.

Whatever plans may be worked out, in fact our whole course of future action will depend entirely upon your cooperation and support. If you are sympathetic, interested and enthusiastic in your presentation of the work to your people, there is no doubt but that the response will be whole-hearted and the support adequate to meet our needs. Give to your membership the opportunity to do what they individually are willing to do. The measure of your interest and the generosity of our people will determine the extent of participation our Methodism will have in child welfare work in Arkansas.

We respectfully request the same Conference support which has been accorded us the past quadrennium. We ask full cooperation in the Annual offering at Christmas time.

We nominate Dr. Connor Morehead, Dr. C. M. Reeves, Rev. Harold D. Sadler, Rev. J. L. Dedman, Dr. T. E. Fuller and Mr. Geo. H. Burden, as trustees for the ensuing year, and respectfully request their election by this Annual Conference.

NEW BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Report No. 1

The Board of Trustees created by resolution of the Little Rock Annual Conference in session at the city of El Dorado in November, 1943, for the purpose of acquiring the property of Ozark Sanitorium at Hot Springs, Arkansas, submits the following report:

Pursuant to the said resolution and the authority granted therein your Board proceeded to inaugurate a campaign within the Conference to raise funds with which to acquire the hospital property. Our goal was set at an amount sufficient to pay the agreed purchase price and leave a surplus of \$75,000.00 to be used for making repairs and improvements and for operating capital. While the goal, at this time, has not been reached in full a sufficient amount has been received to justify the Board in exercising its option to purchase. The Board has, accordingly, made a contract with the owner of the property under which the owner has agreed to sell and the Board has agreed to purchase all of the property of Ozark Sanitorium, including equipment and transfer of water rights, for a consideration of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars to be paid in full upon approval of title and delivery of proper deed and bills of sale.

WHEREFORE, your Board asks that a permanent organization be set up for the purpose of holding title and for the management, control and operation of the hospital.

Report No. 2

Whereas, The Board of Trustees elected by this Conference at its annual session in 1943 for the purpose of acquiring the property known

as Ozark Sanitorium at Hot Springs, Arkansas, has this day reported that a contract of purchase has been entered into with the owner of the said property for a consideration of One Hundred Thousand (\$100,000.00) Dollars to be paid upon proper transfer of title; and in the report has asked that a permanent organization be created for the purpose of holding title and for the management, control and operation of the hospital;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED:

First: That the Little Rock Annual Conference does hereby accept ownership of the hospital property effective upon transfer of title to the Trustees hereinafter named;

Second: The name of the hospital shall be **METHODIST HOSPITAL OF ARKANSAS**;

Third: That the following be, and they are hereby, elected members of and shall, during their respective terms of office, constitute the Board of the Methodist Hospital of Arkansas: Homer M. Adkins, E. Clifton Rule, Aubrey Walton, Carl Hollis, and Don Harrell who shall serve for a term of one year or until their successors have been elected; B. T. Fooks, Connor Morehead, Kenneth L. Spore, E. M. Sharp, and Ernest Powledge who shall serve for a term of two years or until their successors have been elected; Dr. J. M. Proctor, Thomas W. Stone, Mrs. H. King Wade, J. L. Dedman, and H. F. Trotter who shall serve for a term of three years or until their successors have been elected. Hereafter Trustees to fill the position of members whose terms expire shall be nominated by the Board of Trustees and shall be elected by the Annual Conference each for a term of three years; provided, however, that the Conference may require the Board to nominate more than one person for each position to be filled. Due regard to geographical sections of the Conference shall be given in the selection of Trustees. The Board of Trustees, at its first meeting after adjournment of the Annual Conference each year, shall elect its own Chairman, vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer and such other officers as may be necessary in the proper management and control of the Hospital.

Fourth: The legal title to the Hospital shall be in the Board of Trustees hereinbefore named and their successors in office.

Fifth: The Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and directed to proceed immediately to incorporate the said Hospital under the laws of the State of Arkansas, and are empowered to adopt a constitution and by-laws for the proper and orderly operation and control of the Hospital and to include therein such provisions as may be desirable or required, not inconsistent with this resolution.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

We rejoice in the evidence of growing interest and zeal among laymen of the Little Rock Conference in the total program of Methodism. Work in local churches and in Districts has been commendable during the year and three important Conference meetings have been held.

On February 2, the Laymen's Conference at First Church, Little Rock, at which all Districts were represented, gave us opportunity to discuss, led by members of our own group: The Layman's Duty and Privilege in The Crusade For A New World Order; Layman's Day—What It Is and Why It Is; The Week of Dedication and Our Part In It; Juvenile Delinquency—What We Can Do To Help Youth; Stewardship And World Service; Our Opportunity In Neglected Areas of Our Conference.

The Board met in Little Rock September 8. Special attention was given to three important changes in the chapter of Lay Activities approved by the 1944 General Conference: 1. District and Associate District Lay Leaders are now to be elected by the Annual Conference; each is to have "not less than two or more than four" Associate Lay Leaders. 2. The Board of Stewards, which is "the Board of Lay Activities" for the local Church is now required to elect a Stewardship Committee for the local Church. 3. "The pastor shall report the name and address of the Charge Leader to the District Lay Leader."

At this meeting, the Board voted unanimous approval of plans of the Trustees named at El Dorado last November to purchase the properties of the Ozark Sanatorium and Bath House as the Methodist Hospital. And we pledged full cooperation and support to Bishop Ralph Magee, Director of the Crusade for Christ, and to his staff, as they lead our Church toward the realization of the great objectives in the five-point program during this quadrennium.

The Annual meeting of our Board which the Discipline provides shall be held in connection with the Annual Conference session was a luncheon meeting on Thursday, November 9th. It was followed by a general meeting for laymen, delegates and visitors, at which addresses were made by Dr. James W. Workman, Associate Secretary of the Board of Lay Activities; and Dr. J. Manning Potts, Associate Director of the Crusade for Christ. Dr. Workman spoke also at the luncheon, reporting on work of the General Board in many Conferences of our Church in continental United States.

Matt L. Ellis was nominated for Conference Lay Leader. Fred Gantt was elected Vice-chairman, and J. S. M. Cannon was elected Treasurer.

We recommend:

1. That renewed emphasis be given to Christian Stewardship, looking toward 1947 which has been designated as "Stewardship Year" in our Church.

2. That Layman's Day, officially fixed as the 4th Sunday in February, be observed on a Conference-wide basis this year with a Lay speaker in every church.

3. That we repledge our purpose to support the full program recommended by the General Board of Lay Activities, which includes Christian fellowship, personal evangelism, the circulation of church papers and other Christian literature, adequate support of the ministry, the Benevolences, sound church finance in the local church, attendance upon the worship services, the training of Boards of Stewards, the Christianizing of personal and community life.

4. That there be an organization of men in each church in the Conference to promote this program.

5. That we stress the effort to make our Methodist men informed and intelligent laymen by the use of valuable literature distributed by the various Boards of our church.

MINISTERIAL SUSTENTATION FUND

We, your Commission on Ministerial Sustentation, submit the following as the amended plan for the incoming year:

I. Commission

1. On nomination of the Superintendent of each of the several districts, the Annual Conference shall elect quadrennially one lay member from his district and one preacher to serve on this Commission. The District Superintendent shall be ex-officio members.

2. The Commission shall elect its own chairman and such other officers as its needs may require.

3. The Commission shall meet annually at least one month before Conference at the call of the chairman, and at such other times and places as needs may require.

II. Beneficiaries

1. Beneficiaries under this plan shall be those ministers serving charges under the appointment of the Bishop, including those on trial, in full connection, and supply preachers who meet disciplinary requirements for supplies.

2. The minimum salary fixed for these shall be \$1,000.00. The Commission will match dollar for dollar as far as its funds permit, any increase paid by any charge over and above the average paid by such charge for the three fiscal years ended in 1940, 1941, and 1942, up to the minimum fixed for the group to which the pastor belongs.

III. Raising Funds

1. For the purpose of meeting the requirements set forth in the preceding paragraph, an apportionment of 1 per cent shall be made on all preacher's salaries of \$1,000.00 or more, upon the whole salary and upon all charges paying such salaries.

2. The Treasurer elected by the Commission shall be the one to receive and disburse funds accruing from this source, provided, funds shall be paid only on certification of the District Superintendent of the beneficiary.

3. District Superintendents shall report to the Commission the names of beneficiaries and the amount of aid given. The Treasurer shall keep an itemized account of the benefits paid out and report same to the chairman of this Commission as soon after the session of the Annual Conference as possible.

4. Any part of this plan may be amended at any session of the Conference on recommendation of the Commission, or on motion from the floor of the Conference.

BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSIONS**Report No. 2**

We rejoice in the increased giving for World Service. We look hopefully toward the future as we are realizing, more and more, that our people are accepting their askings and so many of the churches are paying the total amounts.

Our hearts should be stirred as we look out upon the field and realize the wonderful opportunity that confronts our church in the immediate future. More and more our people are coming to appreciate the missionary cause. Wherever our boys have gone they have found that the missionary had already been there and made it easier on our army to "take over." Many men will come home from the war-torn countries to be strong advocates of the missionary movement. They have seen with their own eyes some results achieved by those who have been laboring through the years.

The Board is interested in the rural problem and is seeking some way to find a solution.

We would suggest that the District Superintendents and pastors give special emphasis to this problem in their several districts.

We recommend our editors of periodicals and literature and suggest that our pastors make larger use of this valuable means of educating our people.

We also recommend our department of Visual Education. Their films and still pictures can be used to great advantage and at little cost if organized on a district or Conference basis.

We urge that our pastors organize Mission study classes using the adopted text this year, "Christ After Choas."

We look forward to the Crusade of Christ and urge our people to cooperate in every phase of its activities.

The Board wishes to recognize the splendid work of the Little Rock Methodist Mission Board. They are sponsoring activities in five areas of the city. Emphasis, at the present time, is being placed upon the organization and promotion of week day schools of Religious Education in each of the areas. The work has gone forward this year under the untiring and consecrated leadership of the late Dr. J. D. Hammons and the present Deaconess, Miss Margaret Marshall. One item that deserves special notice is that \$25,000 has been given this Board by the Woman's Division of Missions and Church Extensions to be used in an expanded program.

The Board recommends J. F. Taylor as Conference Missionary to jails and hospitals.

1. Recommended that \$300 be given Arkansas City Church.
2. Recommended \$400 be granted the Morning Star Church, Arkadelphia District.
3. Recommended that \$200 be granted Glenwood on condition that said church raise a like sum for improvement on the church.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

1. Drunkenness is steadily increasing in Arkansas and throughout the nation, wherever liquors are sold openly. The liquor "termites" are weakening the very foundations of homes, churches, and the nation itself. Drs. Haggard and Jellinek, of the Yale University School of Alcohol Studies state in their book "Alcoholic Explored," there are now 13,000,000 women and 27,000,000 men drinking liquors in America.—40,000,000 total. Among these are 600,000 to 2,500,000 CHRONIC ALCOHOLICS—hopeless drunkards; and to the ranks of these victims of alcohol are being added 40,000 to 60,000 each year. The situation is tragic—a menace to every phase of American life.

2. One of the great PUBLIC HEALTH problems in America now, is ALCOHOLISM. When the SOURCE of some dread disease is discovered, immediate action is taken to destroy the source. Alcoholism is a disease—a HORRIBLE disease—which destroys body, mind and soul. The Christian conscience DEMANDS the complete extermination of the foul, disease-breeding traffic in alcoholic liquors. Every Christian should feel a burning hatred against it and help to destroy it.

3. Both juvenile and adult delinquency have reached an alarming stage throughout the nation, including Arkansas. Crime is increasing, and MUCH of the crime is caused by liquors. And J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the F. B. I., states that "... a creeping rot of moral disintegration is eating into our nation." What a challenge to every decent man and woman, especially to Christians!

4. Drinkers in America spent for liquors last year SIX BILLION DOLLARS—\$46.00 for each man, woman and child in the country—\$16,438,000 for each day in the year. CRIME caused by liquors cost the nation SIX BILLION MORE. These enormous sums stagger the imagination. At \$1,000,000 per year, it would require 12,000 years to pay what the booze racket cost America in one year—1943. And we sing "God Bless America!"

5. Drinkers in Arkansas spent for liquors last year, nearly \$29,000,000 and AUTO accidents caused by liquors cost the state \$1,500.00 plus. CRIME caused by liquors cost the state \$30,700,000 plus. These three items alone total more than \$60,000,000. The WETS "holler" much about the REVENUE they pay. But each \$1.00 of "revenue" from liquors cost above \$19.00.

6. Twenty county-wide local option elections have already been held since Act No. 1 became effective, January 1, 1943, and eighteen of them voted DRY. Besides, several townships and towns have voted dry. Other such campaigns are being planned.

7. We urgently recommend that our pastors preach against drinking and against the entire "liquor racket." We urge all members of our churches to abstain from drinking beer, whiskey, wine, etc., and from buying it or selling it, and from renting property for the manufacture or sale of it. We urge them to prayerfully work for the extermination of the traffic in beverage alcohol, for it is an enemy of the individual, the home, the church, the nation, and of God.

8. We recommend that our pastors and people cooperate vigorously in local option election campaigns in their counties, etc. Local leaders who want to start such campaigns should write to the Anti-Saloon League of Arkansas, Donaghey Building, Little Rock, who will furnish petitions, helps, etc., and work with you in planning and carrying through such undertakings.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

We, your Commission on World Service and Finance, submit the following report:

1. The amount apportioned to this Annual Conference by the General Commission on World Service and Finance is \$42,166.

2. We recommend that the apportionment for Conference Work be the same, \$42,166.

3. Combining these apportionments for General and Conference Work, we have a total of \$84,332.

4. The amount apportioned to this Annual Conference for the Crusade for Christ is \$217,975.

5. The amount requested by the Bishop and his Cabinet for Episcopal Area expense is \$500, in which request we concur.

6. The amount apportioned for General Administration is \$1,386.

7. The Annual apportionment to this Conference for the South Central Jurisdiction Annual Budget is \$1,530 with the request that two years apportionment be paid in the year 1944-45 making the first annual payment \$3,060. We concur in this request and have authorized the

Conference Treasurer to make these payments in the manner most convenient to the situation.

8. Table A shows the share of the Crusade for Christ, the Episcopal Area expense, the Jurisdictional Budget, and the General Administration Funds which is apportioned the various Districts, on the basis of membership valued at 25 per cent and ministerial support and benevolences valued at 37½ per cent.

These apportionments are made on the data contained in the 1943 Journal, and we recommend that the apportionments to the various charges be made on the same basis.

Gentlemen:

Herewith for your approval I submit my report on the books of the Arkansas Methodist for the period begun October 30, 1943, and ended October 15, 1944.

Inasmuch as the only records of the office consist of the cash book, I have limited this report to an accounting of the recorded cash receipts and disbursements, together with a condensed balance sheet set up from the audit report of October 31, 1941.

A comparison of income, expense and assets for the past three years reflects the following substantial improvements in the position of the Arkansas Methodist:

During the year, U. S. War Bonds in the sum of five thousand dollars have been purchased, and have been verified during this examination.

Repairs and additions to the property at 1018 Scott St., Little Rock, Arkansas, have been made during the year aggregating \$1,536.12, which might properly have been treated as additions to the capital account. During the preceding period a total of \$862.70 was similarly expended on improvements. This property should in the future produce a fair return on the investment. On the balance sheet both the land and the buildings are listed at the figures placed by the appraisers secured by your Commission on April 12, 1941.

The management does not treat thirty-day accounts payable as liabilities, nor thirty-day accounts receivable as assets; and I have, therefore, disregarded them in the preparation of this balance sheet. I have, however, verified that all salaries and printing bills have been paid to date.

In verification of disbursements, I have examined stubs of check books, all cancelled checks and invoices. Checks are found to be properly drawn, signed and endorsed. In verification of receipts I have examined all duplicate receipts in the office. All recorded receipts have been properly accounted for.

RESOLUTION ON DIVORCE LAW

Whereas the ninety-day divorce law for the dissolution of marriage, the basis of the home, ordained of God in the beginning as basic to the life and happiness of a human race, is destructive of the divine purpose of that Holy Institution; and,

Whereas this immoral law has subordinated character and Holy purpose to the baser and material instincts of mankind, thus making a covetous law of man antagonistic to a decree of God; and,

Whereas this law debase the public conscience and brings our State into disrepute abroad; and,

Whereas both the safety and sanctity of marriage may be insured by requiring at least five days public declaration of intention to marry before the issuance of a license to contracting parties;

Now therefore, be it resolved by the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church now in session at Hot Springs, Arkansas, on this 10th day of November, 1944;

First: That we respectfully urge the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas to be convened in January, 1945, to repeal outright the ninety-day residence required for parties seeking divorce, and substitute in lieu thereof the minimum requirement of at least one year's bona fide residence within this state before a court may have jurisdiction in divorce cases;

Second: That we respectfully urge the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas to be convened in January, 1945, to enact a law requiring five days public declaration of the intention to marry before a license may be issued to the contracting parties. That such notice of intention be filed with the officer, who, under the law, is authorized to issue marriage license in this state;

Third: That copies of this Resolution be sent to Governor Homer M. Adkins and the Honorable Ben Laney, Governor Elect, and with the re-

quest that they incorporate these legislative reforms in their messages to the next General Assembly;

Fourth: That copies of this Resolution be furnished the press, and the Secretary of this Conference be directed to send a copy thereof to the Honorable J. B. Shaver, Lieut. Governor, and to the next Speaker of the House of Representatives, when elected;

Fifth: That the Lieut. Governor and the next Speaker of the House of Representatives are both requested to read this Resolution to their respective Houses in session and refer the same after reading, to the proper Committees of such Houses.

Memoirs

J. W. BERRY

J. W. Berry was born October 12, 1859 at Blountsville, in Sullivan County, Tennessee, the son of James Allan and Patricia Crumbly Berry. He passed to his eternal reward on June 19, 1944. His funeral was held in the Methodist Church in Gurdon, Arkansas on June 20, 1944, and burial was in the Gurdon Cemetery. The funeral was held by Rev. Kenneth L. Spore, pastor at Camden and friend of the family, assisted by Rev. J. L. Dedman, Superintendent of the Camden District, Rev. P. J. Crowder, pastor of the Beech St. Baptist Church, Gurdon, and Rev. M. D. Williams, pastor of the Presbyterian Church of Gurdon.



At the age of seventeen years, Jesse Berry joined the Methodist Church in Tennessee and shortly thereafter entered Hiwassee College, a small Methodist College at Hiwassee, Tennessee. He worked his way through College and was licensed to preach at sometime during his College career, perhaps in 1878. After finishing College, he taught one year in North Carolina before coming to Arkansas. During this time he married a young lady there. To this union was born one son whom they named Brunner for his father's College President. The mother passed away after the birth of her son. Dr. and Mrs. March of Fordyce reared Brunner Berry. The Marchs lived formerly at Chidester in the bounds of Brother Berry's first pastoral charge.

He came to Monticello, Arkansas early in 1882 and supplied the pulpit at Monticello Station for some months that year, during the absence of the pastor, Rev. S. G. Colburn who was on some kind of mission out of the country. After the return of the pastor, the young preacher taught a school in the County near Monticello until the convening of the Little Rock Annual Conference at Hope, November 22, 1882.

He was admitted on trial at Hope in November 1882. His classmates were George W. Logan, Nathan T. Holcomb, Thomas A. Hearn, Moses B. Hill, Amos P. Few, Alonzo M. Robinson, Edwin L. Beard, Nathan E. Bragg, Samuel H. Parker, and J. B. Thomas, all of whom preceded him into the great beyond. He was admitted into full connection at the Annual Conference in Arkadelphia early in December 1885, having been ordained a local deacon by Bishop A. W. Wilson, at Hope in 1882. The class in which he was admitted into full connection was composed of J. T. Rascoe, A. O. Evans, A. M. Robinson, A. West, A. S. Scott, O. H. Keadle, and F. H. Redwine, besides himself. He was ordained an elder by Bishop J. S. Key at Camden in 1888. His classmates at that time were Joseph A. Baker, W. A. Freeman, J. Y. Christmas, W. W. Mills, and J. T. Rascoe.

His appointments were the Ouachita Circuit (1882-83), Lewisville Circuit (1883-85), Arkansas City (1885-86), Toledo Circuit (1886-88), White River Circuit (1888-90,) Chapel Hill Circuit (1890-91), Nashville Circuit (1891-93), Amity Circuit (1893-95), Atlanta Circuit (1895-97), Grady Circuit (1897-98), Hot Springs Circuit (1898-1903), Dalark Circuit (1903-07), Okolona Circuit 1907-09), Emmett Circuit (1909-10),

Gurdon (1910-11), Waldo (1911-12), Washington Circuit (1912-15), De-Light (1915-16), until at the Conference of 1916, at Malvern, he, because of failing health, took the Supernumerary relationship.

As a supernumerary preacher he lived at Okolona from 1916 until 1919 when he moved to Gurdon. He lived at Gurdon as a supernumerary from 1919 until 1921 when he superannuated. He lived at Gurdon, as a retired minister, from 1921, until his death, twenty three years later. The pastors at Gurdon during the years of his retirement there were, W. W. Nelson, O. L. Walker, J. W. Rogers, J. M. Hamilton, J. H. Cummins, C. E. Whitten, M. T. Workman, Rex B. Wilkes, Kenneth L. Spore, A. C. Carraway, R. L. Long, and John W. Mayne, to all of whom J. W. Berry was a loyal and helpful friend and supporter. He rendered every service to the Church through all those years of retirement that his ever feeble health would permit.

J. W. Berry married Miss Jane Elizabeth Jack, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. S. W. Jack of Magnolia, Arkansas on December 13, 1885. To this union were born five sons and two daughters. The sons are Jesse Wellborn and Earl Eugene of Gurdon, Paul Jack of Camden, Harold, at present a sergeant in the U. S. Army stationed in Hawaii, and Allan Douglas, now a lieutenant in the U. S. Navy stationed at present in Memphis. The daughters are Mrs. G. A. Brown (Ruth Marie) of Gurdon and Mrs. E. Y. Hill (Catherine Fay) of Okolona. All the children, together with their saintly mother, survive him.

BENJAMIN FRANKLIN SCOTT

1864-1944

Rev. Benjamin Franklin Scott passed to his Heavenly reward about 5:30 P. M. Saturday, May 6, 1944, at the great age of eighty years, one month and nineteen days, having been born on March 17, 1864.

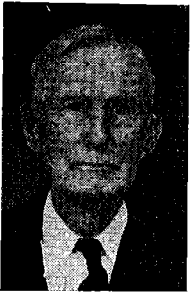
He was born near Salem Campground in Saline County of noble Methodist heritage, the son of Patrick Scott and Jane Nelson Scott.

He was of a large family, having had six brothers and two sisters, all of whom save two, preceded him into the Great Beyond.

B. F. Scott was licenced to preach in the early months of 1886 and preached his first sermon on Easter Sunday, April 25, 1886, at Altus, Arkansas, while a student in Central Collegiate Institute, the forerunner of Hendrix College. Easter Sunday did not fall again on April 25 until 1943. A fitting observance of the 56th Anniversary of the preaching of his first sermon was held on April 23, 1943, in the First Methodist Church, Camden.

He was admitted on trial in the Little Rock Conference at Little Rock, December 7-12, 1887. His class was composed of John W. Cline, George S. Sexton, J. M. Pinnell, J. L. Johnston, R. J. Raiford, G. W. Rice, and B. A. Few, besides himself. All except John W. Cline have preceded him to that Land beyond the River. He was ordained a deacon and admitted into Full Connection at Pine Bluff, December 4-9, 1889 with the same men and one other, C. A. Bayliss. He was elected and ordained elder at Magnolia, December 7-11, 1892. His classmates at that time were George S. Sexton, K. W. Dodson, C. W. Drake, W. F. Evans, G. S. Turrentine, Edward Rushing, and A. S. Scott. He was the oldest member, save one, of the Little Rock Conference at the time of his passing.

On November 30, 1890 he was married to Miss Jennie Mae Prit-



chett, who survives him. To this union there were born five children. Mary Emma died at the age of ten. The surviving children are: Mrs. R. E. (Ruth) Griswold of Malvern, Mrs. Allie Mae Cupp of Houston, Texas, Benjamin Franklin II of El Dorado, and Miss Ethel Scott of Camden.

B. F. Scott served 44 years in the active ministry in the Little Rock Conference. His charges were as follows: Wattensas Circuit; Hamburg Circuit; Dallas Circuit; Genoa Circuit; Rocky Comfort Circuit; Oak Hill Circuit; Hickory Plains Circuit; Roe Circuit; Sherill Circuit; Rison Circuit; Kingsland Circuit; Sheridan Circuit; Magnolia Circuit; Junction City Circuit; Wesson Circuit; Waldo Circuit; Leola Circuit; Sparkman Circuit; Columbus Circuit; Park Avenue Church, Hot Springs; Strong Circuit; and Kingsland Circuit.

At the Annual Conference of 1931 at First Church, Little Rock he retired from the active ministry and moved the following week to Camden where he made his home, with his good wife, until the day of his translation. His presence for these twelve and one half years in Camden was a joy and benediction to all who came in contact with him. He was indeed an "Assistant Pastor" from the day of his arrival in Camden until just two days before he went Home. He visited the sick, the shut-ins, and the sorrowing. He preached in several pulpits of the city, and often in our own. He frequently conducted the Mid-week service, and taught the Baracca Men's Bible Class. He assisted regularly in the administration of the Sacrament and attended practically all worship services held in the church up to and including the last Wednesday night he was on earth. He lived in Camden longer than any other Methodist minister, except Wm. P. Ratcliffe, and for more consecutive years than any other. His influence for good in Camden only the immortal ages can tell. In the humble judgment of the writer of this imperfect tribute, the influence of no Methodist preacher has been greater in this fair city which loved him so for the one eighth of a century that he lived here.

Many people have said to him, "He was the most Christlike man I ever knew." Surely no man ever loved his Christ and his Church more than did B. F. Scott.

WILLIAM WALTER CHRISTIE

William Walter Christie—Born August 31, 1866, near Magnolia, Arkansas and united with the Methodist Church at Christies Chapel in July 1878. This was the Atlanta Circuit and from this charge he was licensed to preach at Atlanta in June 1891. He was admitted into the Little Rock Conference December 9, 1892 at Magnolia and for forty-seven years he was a faithful member of the Conference. He retired from active service in the Conference at Warren, Arkansas in November, 1939.



In 1892 he served his first charge, Little Prairie Mission in Arkansas County—2 years. April 24, 1895 he was married to Miss Jennie E. Almond of near Arkansas Post in Arkansas County. They were married in DeWitt, the county seat.

Brother and Sister Christie had no children, but were the foster parents of two, Hudson George, a son, and Mary Lee Mickle, a daughter. Both children live near the Christie Homestead and with whom Mrs. Christie is making her home. No son or daughter could have been more devoted to parents than these two have been to their foster father and mother. May God bless and keep them.

Brother Christie received eighteen appointments during his forty-seven years in Little Rock Conference. He served Redfield—3 years; Mabelvale—4 years; Austin—4 years; Tiller—1 year; Pine Bluff District—3 years; Crossett—1 year; Lockesburg—4 years; Murfreesboro—4 years; Foreman—1 year; Sherill and Tucker—2 years; Emmett—4 years; Junction City—2 years; Henderson Chapel—1 year; Strong—1 year; Horatio—4 years; Hampton—3 years; and Eudora—3 years.

No man among us was more faithful to his task than was Bro. Christie. He loved the Lord and his Kingdom with all his being. He believed in and loved his church and gave himself to it. Brother Christie loved his friends and he had many because he was a friend to the end of his life.

It was my good fortune to be with Bro. Christie and in all my associations with him I did not hear him speak a harmful word of anyone. He did not spend his time in gossip.

So careful was he in plans for life, he had selected the Scripture he wanted for his funeral service. It was from Paul's Letter Timothy, "I have fought a good fight, finished my course and kept the Faith." No Text was more fitting for his life, because he finished his life true to God, to the Church and to his friends.

On March 18, 1944 the writer assisted the Pastor, Rev. J. W. Nethercut, in the church where Bro. Christie gave his life to Jesus Christ and in the charge where he gave God and the Church his service in helping build Christ's Kingdom here on earth. We felt then, as now, we were laying to rest one of God's Noblemen. He sleeps in the family lot near the church he has loved all his life.

May God's Grace meet all Mrs. Christies' needs in this day of sorrow and may God give this world more men like W. W. Christie, is my prayer.

CHARLES JEROME GREENE

Charles Jerome Greene was born July 23, 1867 in Barnwell, South Carolina on the farm of his father, a Confederate soldier who lost a leg in the battle of Harper's Ferry. Dr. Greene was the main help of his afflicted father and had to get his early training thru self education. With only nine months of formal training he was, however, granted a teacher's license and taught in his local school. Later he taught in Texas where he had gone for his health.



He married Miss Euella Pettus of Okolona in 1892. Graduating from Arkadelphia Methodist College in 1894, he taught at Mineral Springs, Arkansas and Quitman, Arkansas. He entered the Little Rock Conference in 1895 and served Prescott, Arkansas and Fordyce, Arkansas churches. Previous training was in Vanderbilt University in 1899-1902.

From Fordyce he entered in 1904 the Hendrix College faculty as head of the English department. In 1906 he became Vice-President and in 1910, Dean of the College. He served as President in 1920 during the absence of Dr. J. H. Reynolds.

Dr. Greene served as Secretary of his Conference twenty-six years and was made emeritus secretary in 1940.

He was a lover of nature, was an expert hunter and gardner. Dr. Greene believed there was good in every man and he sought to develop this asset. As a result hundreds of former students have called him their Spiritual Father.

Dr. Greene was an active citizen, having served as Alderman of his ward in Conway. He was chief charter member of the Conway Kiwanis Club. He was a Royal Arch Mason. He taught for years the large Men's Bible Class of the Conway Methodist Church. He retired in 1941 from active work. Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Irma Frances Funk Greene; a son, Captain Charles Jerome Greene, Jr., of the U. S. Marines; Miss Katherine Greene of Conway; and a brother, G. M. Greene, Barnwell, South Carolina.

Dr. Greene was a delegate to the General Conference of the Southern Methodist Church held in Atlanta, Georgia, in 1918.

He was given his doctor's degree by Hendrix College.

The memorial service for Dr. Greene was held in the Conway Methodist Church and his body was laid to rest in Oak Grove Cemetery, Conway. Dr. C. M. Reves, Superintendent of the Little Rock District of the Methodist Church, gave the memorial address. We quote a passage from his address:

"Whosoever would become great among you shall be your minister and whosoever would be first among you shall be your servant."

Jesus taught by His words and by His example that greatness is a matter of service. He declared that the greatest living is that which looks toward making life better for others. And such has been the life of this one whom we honor today.

Of course you cannot adequately characterize Dr. Greene's religion without the use of the term mystical. He was in the truest and best sense a mystic, a mystic as John and Paul and Francis of Assisi and Wesley were. He was a man who knew God and walked with God and talked with God. He was the kind of Christian for whom life is a continuous Emmaus road. That last stanza of the hymn which the choir sang so beautifully a few moments ago and which is so appropriate at his funeral service, says,

"So shall it be at last in that bright morning,
When the soul waketh and life's shadows flee
O in that hour, fairer than daylight dawning,
Shall rise the glorious thought, I am with Thee."

But that "glorious thought" has been his day by day, his whole life through. I have gone to his home at an early hour on a late spring or summer morning to find him at work in his garden, "amid the mystic shadows and the solemn hush of nature newly born," and I have had him say to me, "God still walks in gardens in the cool of the day."

He was pre-eminently a teacher. It is true that he was a great preacher, but he did his best work, his most lasting work, as a teacher. And nowhere did his spirit of service shine more gloriously than in his teaching. For one thing, there was his devotion to his teaching. Called to preach, trained for the work of the ministry, and already a successful pastor, he left the active ministry forty years ago to teach in Hendrix College, and once he had decided to teach, nothing could turn him aside from teaching. He might have filled the greatest pulpits in our Methodism, he might have written the books of poetry and fiction for a nation to read. But to teaching and to teaching alone he gave himself, saying as did Paul, "This one thing I do." What a tribute is his noble example to the profession of teaching!

It was as a teacher of literature that he did his work, and he was a marvelous teacher in this subject. But he taught much more than literature to all who sat in his classes and came under his influence. He taught his students how to live. He gave them out of books and out of his own great life the Christian philosophy and inspired them to live it. And all over Arkansas today—indeed all over the world—you can find men and women who are living gloriously because they had Charles Jerome Greene as their teacher in college.

Dr. Thornburgh Workman, in his lines entitled "To a Maker of Men" and dedicated to Dr. Greene, says this most impressively:

"You were the first who ever made us feel
How blithely Browning took his leave of earth,
How making much of life makes naught of death,
And death so scorned becomes a second birth:-
All this without one word of comment, too
You spoke his lines; you loved them; they were you.

"You heard the homesick heart of every youth
Because you loved and lost a youth your own;
You sensed that in us which is more than mind;
Believed it into being. You made known
To each his higher part and potency.
You set us toward the best that we could be.

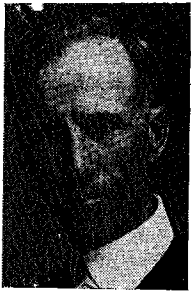
"You fixed in every firmament a star;

JOHN LEWIS CANNON

On July 2, 1944 in the town of Foreman, Arkansas Dr. John Lewis Cannon passed to his reward. He retired from the active ministry in 1940 because of ill health, after thirty-six years of service.

Born on a farm near Lockesburg, Arkansas, he enjoyed the free, wholesome life of the country boy of that day. The country church was the center of community life during his early years and when but a boy, Dr. Cannon united with the Methodist Church at Old Gravelly Point which was established by pioneer Methodists about 1850. Influences and recollections of those early days made an impact on his character and future course of life that proved to be a stabilizing force throughout his career.



Descended from a long line of ministers and Methodists, it was but natural, as he grew up that his thoughts should turn toward the ministry. His great grandfather, John Cannon, donated the land for the first Methodist camp ground in Spartanburg County, South Carolina. The beautiful brick church that marks the site of the old camp ground still bears the Cannon name. His maternal great grandfather, Archelaus Turrentine, was among the first pioneer Methodist preachers in Arkansas. One of his daughters became the wife of Judge T. G. T. Steel and the mother of Revs. W. A. and E. R. Steel, both honored members of the Little Rock Conference for many years. A son, George Turrentine, himself a local Methodist preacher, was the father of Rev. Archelaus Turrentine who served for nearly half a Century in the Little Rock Conference. Mary Turrentine, sister of Arch, was married to John Cannon and became the mother of seven sons, of whom Dr. John Lewis Cannon was the third. Four of these sons became preachers and three of them members of the Little Rock Conference. The other, George N. Cannon of Stephens, Arkansas, has been a local preacher of great influence for more than forty years.

Dr. Cannon was graduated from Southwestern University, Georgetown, Texas, in 1903. He was married soon after to Annie Turrentine,

and in the fall of the same year united with the Little Rock Conference. His first charge was the Arkansas City Circuit which then included the town of Dermott, McGehee, Tillar, Dumas, and some other country churches. He never ceased to love this section of Arkansas and some of the friendships made on this first charge were very dear to him all the remainder of his life. He served Hunter Memorial Church, Little Rock; Monticello; Camden; and the Texarkana District. From there he went to Arkadelphia where he served for nine consecutive years. From Arkadelphia he went to First Church, Pine Bluff; Hope, Prescott, DeQueen, and College Hill, Texarkana where he closed his active ministry.

In championing any cause which he believed to be right, he was utterly fearless. He never sought a neutral course in any of the many activities that marked his course. He was always actively on one side or the other. He was strong in debate in any controversial question that arose. His interest in the cause of education was his one great passion. A charter member of the Board of Trustees of Southern Methodist University, he served in that capacity until his retirement from the active ministry. He made a lasting contribution to education while stationed in Arkadelphia. He gave freely of his time to work in Henderson Brown College and made substantial cash contributions in aid of this school. It was while he was stationed here that this school conferred upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity. When assigned to any place where a church building project was under way or contemplated, he at once entered enthusiastically into the work. If he faced a church debt, he at once began to organize for reducing or paying off such debts.

Dr. Cannon is survived by his widow, Mrs. Annie Turrentine Cannon of Foreman; two daughters, Miss Evelyn Cannon of Foreman, and Mrs. A. W. Brooks of DeQueen; a son, Captain John Lewis Cannon, Jr., a chaplain in the United States Army stationed in the Southwest Pacific; two grandchildren, John Lewis Cannon III, and Margaret Lynn Cannon, who are with their mother, Mrs. Oramae Cannon, of Little Rock. Four of his brothers survive; George N. Cannon of Stephens; T. E. Cannon of Foreman; Rev. R. H. Cannon of Portland; and J. S. M. Cannon of Little Rock.

Many will rise up and call him blessed. "They shall abundantly utter the memory of his great goodness, and they shall sing of his righteousness." Truly, "The righteous shall be in everlasting remembrance." The influences of a life like his can never die. We loved him, but we have lost him for a while. With confidence we look forward to a day when the broken links of love, friendship, and fellowship shall be reunited in bonds never to be dissolved.

JACOB DANIEL HAMMONS

Jacob Daniel Hammons, son of Jacob A. and Jane Goodman Hammons, was born at Hammons ville, White County Arkansas, on December 15, 1879. He was converted at an early age and joined the Methodist Church. In 1895 he entered Hendrix College to prepare for the ministry and was graduated from this institution in 1899 with the

Ph. B. degree. Following his graduation he was appointed to the Alpine and Marfa charge in the New Mexico Conference and that fall he was admitted on trial into that Conference. In 1901 he entered the theological department of Vanderbilt University where he was a student for two years.



After leaving the seminary he was transferred to the Little Rock Conference, and it has been in this Conference that he has lived and worked all of his years with the exception of one pastorate at Helena, 1911-1915, in the White River and North Arkansas Conferences. The records show that he was ordained deacon in 1901 and elder in 1903. The appointments which he has held are as follows: Hunter Memorial, 1902-5; England, 1905-7, Crossett, 1907-9; Pine Bluff District 1909-11; Helena, 1911-15; Winfield

Memorial, 1915-19; First Church, Texarkana, 1919-25; First Church, El Dorado, 1925-29; First Church, Hot Springs, 1929-34; Little Rock District, 1934-38. At the expiration of his four years on the Little Rock District he was appointed vice-president of Hendrix College and sustained this relationship until his death.

In 1918 he was given the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity by Hendrix College. He was a member of the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in 1930, 1934, 1938, and served in the Uniting Conference at Kansas City in 1939. For many years he has been a trustee of Hendrix College and a member of the General Board of Missions of the M. E. Church, South. At the time of his death, he was chairman of the Board of Missions of the Little Rock Conference, chairman of the City Board of Missions of Little Rock, chairman of the Inter-Racial Commission of Little Rock, and chairman of the Arkansas Methodist Commission.

Dr. Hammons was married to Miss Ruth Scales, November 22, 1911, at Pine Bluff, Arkansas. To them was born one son, John William, a member of the Little Rock Conference and a chaplain in the Navy.

Few men have lived better and wrought more efficiently and constructively in the Little Rock Conference. Richly endowed in intellect and personality, he added to his native ability what education and training give and put to use in the Kingdom of God the full power of his consecrated manhood. A great preacher, a devoted pastor, an executive of unusual ability, an aggressive and far-seeing leader, he steadily climbed from the smallest pastorates to the places of largest responsibility, and always and everywhere he was outstandingly successful.

But it was in the realm of character that he was greatest. The secret of his success was his manhood. The dominant fact of his life was his religion. It was this that made him a minister; it was this that gave color and character to his ministry; it was this that made him the friend and helper of his fellow man; it was this that gave strength and courage and hope and joy to his life; it was this that sustained him in all his trials and brought him at last to a triumphant end.

Seemingly in good health and while very active in his work, he was stricken suddenly and died a few hours later. His funeral service was conducted at the First Church, Little Rock, by the writer, Bishop Paul E. Martin, Rev. Connor Morehead, Rev. W. B. Slack, and Rev. Curtis Williams, and his body was laid to rest in Bellwood cemetery at Pine Bluff.

Do spirits such as his come at death to be forever soulless dust?

Has he ceased to live? Reason says, No. Love says, No. And God says, No. We have a faith which sees where eyes see not, which hears where ears hear not, which feels where hands feel not, and this faith declares,

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

1. **Nominations.** The District Superintendents shall be a standing committee on nominations and shall nominate all members of the quadrennial and annual boards, commissions and committees except where they are otherwise provided for.

2. **Conference Program.** The pastor-host of the Conference, the District Superintendent in whose district the Conference session is held, the chairman of the Commission on Evangelism and the chairman of the several Conference Boards shall constitute a committee on Conference Program. This committee shall arrange, not less than sixty days before the Conference meets, for all preaching, inspirational and anniversary services and select the Conference preacher. As far as possible it shall publish at least one month before Conference, the hours to be set apart for special services. The program made by this committee shall be subject to revision as the exigencies of any situation may require or the Conference direct.

3. **Financial and Statistical.** (1) All Conference assessments and all reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars with no columns for cents. (2) Each pastor shall settle with the Conference Treasurer and turn over his statistical reports not later than the first day of the Conference, provided this report must correspond with the Treasurer's report. (3) The District Superintendent shall furnish the Statistical Secretary with all assessments and acceptances of pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the meeting of the Annual Conference and these figures shall be accepted as official.

4. **Memoirs of Laymen and Preachers' Wives.** Memoirs of preachers' wives shall be read at the Memorial Service of the Conference and published in the Conference Journal, and preachers' wives shall be invited to take part in the Memorial Session. Names of deceased laymen who have been active in the Annual Conference or served on Conference Boards to be printed in the Conference Journal.

5. **Conference Expense Fund.** The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall make an assessment for a Conference Expense Fund to cover the cost of all clerical work necessary in preparing Conference records, printing, and distributing the Conference minutes, for preserving Conference records and documents, for auditing accounts, and all legitimate expenses incurred by the Conference Secretary and the Conference Treasurer in carrying out the orders of the Conference. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of this fund which shall be paid out on the order of the Conference Secretary.

6. **District Superintendents' Salary.** In each district the District Superintendent's salary shall be estimated and apportioned to the several charges by the District Stewards under the chairmanship of the District Superintendent in a meeting called for that purpose early in the Conference year.

7. **District Expenses.** The District Stewards shall also estimate and apportion to the several charges an amount necessary for district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a Treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and shall distribute same on order of the District Superintendent. The Treasurer shall make an annual report to the District Conference showing receipts and disbursements.

8. **Reports and Resolutions.** All reports, resolutions and other papers intended for publication in the Conference minutes shall be type-written and in triplicate.

9. **Historical Society.** There shall be a Historical Society composed of the present members of the History Commission, the Secretary of the Conference, and additional members nominated by the Cabinet and elected by the Conference. It shall be the duty of the Society to collect and preserve biographical data of clerical members of the Conference, data of all kinds that promise to be of historical value and interest. Such material to be deposited in the vault of Hendrix College, Conway, Arkansas. This Society shall make a quadrennial report to the session of the Conference next following the General Conference.

10. **Lay Representation.** In addition to those members provided for in Paragraph 542 of the 1939 Discipline of the Methodist Church, each pastoral charge shall, upon nomination of the pastor, elect either at the annual meeting or at the Quarterly Conference, one representative to the District Conference; **provided**, that in charges of more than 500 members, one representative shall be for each additional 500 members or major fraction thereof. Alternate lay delegates shall be elected in the same manner as the principal.

11. **Lay Members.** Lay members to the annual conference shall be elected annually.

12. **District Conferences** shall be held annually in each district.

13. **One District Superintendent** may serve on each of the major Conference Boards. No member of the Conference shall serve on more than one major Board, provided that this rule shall not apply to those Boards and Commissions appointed by the presiding Bishop, nor to ex-officio members.

14. **District Committees on Qualifications of Local Preachers.** The District Committee on qualifications of local preachers to be nominated by the District Superintendents and confirmed by the Annual Conference shall consist of three traveling elders serving on the District.

15. **Audit.** The audit accounts of all funds as provided for in Paragraph 801 of the Discipline shall be done by certified public accountants sufficiently in advance of the Conference session to have its report published in the Conference Journal.

17. **Amendment.** These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.
