# **PROCEEDINGS**

# WEDNESDAY MORNING, 10:00 O'CLOCK

Conference Organized—The Ninety-seventh session of The Little Rock Annual Conference of The Methodist Church (the twelfth session of the United Church) was convened at the First Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning, June 7, 1950. Bishop Paul E. Martin called the conference to order and Hymn No. 402, "And Are We Yet Alive," was sung. O. E. Holmes led the conference in prayer. Hymn No. 244, "My Hope Is Built," was sung. R. B. Moore, Secretary of the conference, asked that clerical and lay members sign slips passed to them that an accurate check of attendance might be made. The Secretary asked the conference to elect the following assistants: S. T. Baugh, Journal Editor; Mark F. Vaught, Journal Clerk; J. Ralph Clayton, Roll Clerk; and Clem Baker, Assistant Secretary in Charge of Service Records. They were elected.

Judicial Council Ruling—Bishop Martin announced the ruling of the Judicial Council regarding the case of W. D. Golden, stating that such ruling fully restores W. D. Golden to his conference relation in cluding the restoration of his lost year of service.

Board and Committee Nominations—Connor Morehead, Secretary of the cabinet, presented the cabinet's nominations to fill vacancies in the boards, committees, and commissions of the conference and they were elected. He offered a resolution from the cabinet calling for a committee to be constituted which would correlate and classify memorials to the General Conference. The resolution was adopted. Nominations for the membership of the committee were made and they were elected.

Bar of Conference Defined—Francis A. Buddin, Pastor-Host to the conference, was recognized by Bishop Martin. He presented Eugene A. Matthews, Chairman of the Board of Stewards of the First Methodist Church of Hot Springs, who extended to the conference the welcome of the churches and the community of Hot Springs. Dr. Buddin then defined the Bar of the Conference and offered a motion that the printed program, provided upon registration, be the program of the conference. The motion was passed.

Resolution—A. J. Christie read a resolution which would amend the Standing Rules of the conference, relative to the number of districts, and it was placed on the table for the required twenty-four hour period.

District Superintendents Reports—Each District Superintendent presented a report of the year's work for his district, as follows: Arkadelphia, R. B. Moore; Camden, Connor Morehead; Little Rock, E. C. Rule; Hope, E. D. Galloway, Monticello, T. T. McNeal; and Pine Bluff, J. L. Dedman.

Communications—Bishop Martin read to the conference communications from J. M. Workman and James E. Major.

Special Report—Mrs. E. D. Galloway officially presented the report of the Commission on Uniting the Conference of Arkansas and printed copies of the report were passed to members of the conference. Clem Baker moved to waive a reading of the report on the floor of the conference and the motion was passed. The report was laid on the table for the required twenty-four hour period.

Western Methodist Assembly—Elmer T. Hook, Superintendent of the Western Methodist Assembly at Mt. Sequoyah, was presented to the conference and he spoke briefly regarding the program and facilities at Mt. Sequoyah.

Announcements—The times and places for the meetings of various boards and committees were announced.

Motion—Francis A. Buddin moved that C. Ray Hozendorf be the local press representative of the conference and he was elected.

Service of Commemoration—Bishop Martin announced that the hour had arrived for the Service of Commemoration. The service was conducted by Kenneth L. Spore, assisted by Otto W. Teague. R. B. Moore read the names of those being memoralized. The commemoration message was delivered by Dr. W. B. Selah.

The Holy Communion—Following the Service of Commemoration Bishop Martin, assisted by Dr. W. B. Selah, Kenneth L. Spore, Otto W. Teague, and the District Superintendents, led the conference in the Holy Communion Service. A Love Offering for Rev. and Mrs. James Major was received in the service. The benediction was given by Bishop Martin and the session was adjourned.

# THURSDAY MORNING, 8:30 O'CLOCK

Conference Opened—The Conference was convened at 8:30 o'clock and the devotional period was under the leadership of Bishop Paul E. Martin. The Hymn No. 268, "Are Ye Able," was sung. Roland E. Darrow led the conference in prayer. The Hymn No. 337, "Saviour Like A Shepherd Lead Us," was sung. Bishop Martin directed a meditation after reading from the Twenty-eighth Chapter of the Gospel According to St. Matthew.

Conference Called to Order—Bishop Martin called the conference to order and heard the approval of yesterday's minutes from Alfred Doss, representing the Committee on Conference Journal.

Committee On Courtesies—Francis A. Buddin presented to the conference the following visitors: Rev. D. L. Dykes, Rev. Cecil Culver, Rev. Henry Goodloe, Rev. Elmo Thomason, Rev. Coy Whitten, Rev. Virgil Hanks, and Rev. E. B. Williams, members of the North Arkansas Conference; and Dr. C. G. Melton, a layman of Fayetteville. They were extended the courtesy of the conference.

Town and Country Commission—Ed Dunlap presented Report No. 1 of the Town and Country Commission and it was adopted. Report No. 2 of the commission, in the form of a resolution, was presented and the resolution was adopted.

Committee On Conference Relations—M. W. Miller reported that the District Superintendents judge all pastors to be blameless in their characters and official administrations, with the following exceptions: Hal H. Pinnell has surrendered his credentials and withdrawn from The Methodist Church under complaint; and that Jeff Paul is under charges, pending trial. This section of the report was adopted. The request of John William Hammons for an honorable dismissal from the Little Rock Conference in order to unite with another denomination was presented and recommended. The conference granted his request. The committee reported that the following will be superanuated at this session of the conference: R. H. Cannon, George Townsend, and George W. Robertson.

Board of Conference Claimants—Clem Baker presented Report No. 1 of the Board of Conference Claimants. Otto W. Teague presented Reports Nos. 2 and 3 of the board, the same being filed for record with the Secretary. O. A. Graves and Bishop Martin spoke to the reports. The reports were adopted.

**Resolution**—A. J. Christie presented, in a second reading, the resolution, presented at Wednesday's session, relative to the number of dis-

tricts of the conference. Without debate the motion for its adoption prevailed.

**Board Of Evangelism**—Clinton Atchley presented report No. 1 of the Board of Evangelism, the treasurer's report being filed for record with the Secretary. The reports were adopted.

Board Of Missions And Church Extension—C. Ray Hozendorf presented the report of Board of Missions and Church Extension. Mrs. E. D. Galloway and Arthur Terry spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

Visitors—Bishop Martin presented to the conference Rev. J. J. Stowe, a member of the East Oklahoma Conference. He also presented Dr. Paul D. Womeldorf, Executive Secretary of the South Central Jurisdiction, and he briefly addressed the conference.

**Resolution**—R. B. Moore presented a resolution setting the date of June 22nd as the deadline on materials to be published in the Conference Journal and it was adopted.

Communication—Bishop Martin asked the Secretary to read a letter from J. A. Newell. The conference authorized the Secretary to respond and to write letters of greetings to all members of the conference who are absent.

**Special Committee**—Fred R. Harrison presented the report of a special committee relating to a full-time conference treasurer. The report was adopted.

**Special Report**—Arthur Terry presented a report of a special committee on equities in merged district properties. On the motion of Connor Morehead the report was filed for record with the Secretary.

Board of Education—George Meyer presented Report No. 1 of the Board of Education. Neill Hart spoke to the report, presenting Mrs. W. F. Bates, Conference Director of Children's Work, Miss Emogene Dunlap, Conference Director of Youth Work, Roland Shelton Director of Adult Work, and Roy Fawcett, Executive Secretary of the Board of Education. The report was adopted.

Recess—The conference was recessed by Bishop Martin for an interval of ten minutes.

### REPORTS OF BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND COMMISSIONS

#### JOINT COMMISSION OF THE ARKANSAS METHODIST

The Joint Commission of the Arkansas Methodist met at the Albert Pike Hotel on April 20, 1950: Dr. Aubrey G. Walton, Chairman, presided at the meeting. Those in attendance were J. S. M. Cannon, Fred W. Schwendimann, Arthur Terry, Aubrey G. Walton, R. Burney Wilson, John Bayliss, W. Glenn Brunner, J. G. Moore, C. M. Reves, J. W. Workman, E. T. Wayland and Ewing T. Wayland. The absence of J. L. Hoover, O. C. Landers, Joe Pierce, and R. J. Rice was noted.

Fred Schwendimann was elected Acting Secretary.

Dr. Wayland reported on the circulation campaign and financial condition of the Arkansas Methodist. Reports show sound financial condition, and the goal reached in circulation.

After full discussion of various matters presented, the Commission voted to make the following recommendations:

- 1. That the present subscription price of \$1.50 per year for the Arkansas Methodist be continued.
- 2. That Dr. E. T. Wayland and the Rev. Ewing T. Wayland be appointed with annuity to share jointly the responsibility as editors and business managers of the Arkansas Methodist.
- 3. That there be allowed for the Arkansas Methodist for the ensuing year the same percentage apportionment by the Commission on World Service and Finance that was allowed last year.
- 4. That the subscription goal for the circulation of the Arkansas Methodist be fixed at 25,000 for the ensuing year. And that the quota for charges be one subscription for every 7 active members.
- 5. That the Conference adopt as its plan the same general method used last year in the circulation campaign; and that January 7 through January 14 be set apart for the circulation campaign.

The executive Committee was authorized to act for the Commission until the next annual meeting, or until a special meeting is called, should one be deemed necessary.

The Committee on Christian Literature is requested to recommend that each Annual Conference set up a joint committee to study the advisability of having a retail outlet of Methodist materials in Little Rock, or a central location; the joint commission to make proper contacts and report to the Annual Conferences for final disposition of the question.

### BIBLE BOARD

We the members of the Bible Board believe that the success of spreading the Christian message is greatly determined by the number of volumes of Scripture that are made available to the people. We feel that we must get this Book to those who do not have it and create within the hearts and minds of those who do have it a new love and appreciation.

The American Bible Society has done a wonderful work during the past year, The Society supplied the United States alone with 4,727,626 volumes and about twice this number was made available to other countries of the world. This Committee whole-heartedly commends the work of the Society.

The American Bible Society is assuming responsibility for sending 30,000,000 volumes to Japan this year. General MacArthur says, "The

Bible is the essential Book in helping toward the moral and spiritual recovery of Japan."

The Society is doing a tremendous amount of work in Mexico, Argentina, Uruguay, Brazil, Germany, Korea, and Russia.

Therefore be it resolved:

1. That the Little Rock Annual Conference pay its usual 1.25% to the American Bible Society.

That the pastors urge their people to become members of the American Bible Society at a minimum cost of \$5.00 per year.

- 3. That the pastors urge their people to take an active part in the National Bible Reading Plan from Thanksgiving to Christmas. We further recommend that the pastors lead their people in setting up a year round Bible Reading Program, and that the Open Bible be found in every church sanctuary of the Little Rock Annual Conference.
- 4. That each pastor lead his people in the observance of Bible Sunday as one of the great days of the Christian calendar.

The Upper Room should be on the center table of every Methodist living room. Every pastor would serve best by preaching occasionally on Christian Literature. When we sell our friends good books we are letting them have choice bargains for their money.

We wish to commend the capable editors of our church papers. The Arkansas Methodist certainly has no superior publication in its field in Arkansas. The Sunday School lessons printed therein are worth many times the subscription price of the paper.

Our pastors are to be commended for their campaign for subscriptions to the Arkansas Methodist. And next January we will do an even better job.

#### BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS

### Report No. 1

Your Board is happy to report that it is again able to distribute \$29.00 per service year to retired ministers; 70% of this amount to widows of ministers and 50% of this amount to Special Claimants. In addition to the above we have set aside \$1,000.00 to take care of emergency neeeds of claimants. Due to the generous support of our churches we are able to do this in spite of the fact that the 2% the pastors paid last year to the current fund, has, in accordance with your action last Conference, been applied to the Endowment Fund. This amounts to around \$8,000.00 this year.

#### Endowment Campaign

Our treasurer's report will show a creditable amount already paid by our churches and almost 100% paid by our pastors on the Retired Ministers Endowment Campaign to raise \$400,000.00 for this purpose in this quadrennium. And in this connection we call attention to the fact that this campaign is to be closed out in four years, and not to drag on and on into another quadrennium, which will doubtless be facing campaigns for other causes.

From the increasing interest in the cause during recent months your Board is encouraged to believe that the full amount will be paid within the alloted time.

We sincerely thank our Bishop, our District Superintendents, our pastors and laymen for their loyal support of this cause.

We are especially endebted to Rev. Otto W. Teague, who still serves us so efficiently as Treasurer, though not now a member of the Board.

We respectfully ask for the same per centage as that of last year which is as follows:

to \$500 an amount equal to 7% of pastor's salary 501 to \$1000 an amount equal to 1001 to \$1500 an amount equal to 10% of pastor's salary 1501 to \$2000 an amount equal to 10% of pastor's salary 2501 to \$3000 an amount equal to 11% of pastor's salary 2501 to \$3000 an amount equal to 12% of pastor's salary 3001 to \$3500 an amount equal to 13% of pastor's salary 3501 and up an amount equal to 14% of pastor's salary

### BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS

#### Report No. 2

We submit the Claimant Roll, including superannuated preachers, widows of preachers and dependents of deceased ministers, showing the amount allocated to each claimant.

The apportionments are made on an equity basis, being determined by the years of service rendered. Apportionments to widows being on a basis of 70% of that which their husbands would receive per year of service, for the actual time of service rendered while she was his wife.

Dependent children's claim is determined by multiplying the father's approved years of service by one-fourth of the annuity rate, provided that in no case the total annuity claim on the children exceed the annuity claim of the deceased father.

This year we are paying \$29.00 per year of service to retired ministers and \$20.30 to claimant widows. This annuity rate includes the distribution to claimants by the General Board from endowment at the rate of \$1.33 per service year to the ministers and 93c per service year to the widows.

We indicate below years of service and amount allocated for distribution to claimants for the ensuing year, by the Little Rock Conference and by other Conferences under divided annuity.

The Conference Board of Claimants has authorized the Treasurer, Otto W. Teague, to distribute the Conference Funds to Claimants on July 1, 1950, October 1, 1950, January 1, 1951, and April 1, 1951, paying one-fourth of the allocation at each time.

#### COMMITTEE ON CHISTIAN VOCATIONS

The Committee on Christian Vocations agrees with Bishop W. C. Martin that "The Methodist Church does not have an adequate supply of trained and competent ministers, and the present information indicates that the shortage is increasing and will continue to increase.

We also agree with Harold W. Ewing, Secretary of the Inter-board Committee on Christian Vocations, "There is need for workers in every area of functional skill through the church. The adults must prepare the atmosphere in church and home which will be conducive to youth

volunteering for the great service through the church.'

This year a conference on Christian Vocations was held at Aldersgate camp near Little Rock and numbers of persons are on our volunteer service lists. Hundreds of youth have gathered at our assemblies amps during the year. At our new Conference Camp at Hot Springs which will be operated for the first time this summer, many will make decisions for full time Christian service. Believing that our camps and assemblies are our chief agencies for providing opportunities toward making decisions, we urge the Conference to give full support to them, both in getting our youth to the camps and in providing adequate facilities for them when they get there.

Your committee on Christian Vocations is working on plans to promote a state-wide Conference on Christian Vocations to be held this

fall.

In the third year of the Advance for Christ the emphasis will be upon the ministry of the church. We therefore recommend that Christian Vocational Clinics be held on District and Sub-District levels wherever possible and that the ministry be represented in Vocational Days held in public schools.

We recommend that there be organized in each church a life service group for those who have already made decisions and that each pastor secure a copy of Methodist Service Projects, 1950, prepared by the Interboard Committee on Christian Vocations, Nashville, Tennessee.

Rev. James Upton and his group from Hendrix can furnish much valuable help with life service conference on any level, local, District

or Conference.

The following materials are available for pastors who wish to promote service decisions: A new pamphlet, "Counseling For Church Vocations", available July 1, at 25c, film strips such as "What Is Your Life", "Where Are You Going", and "A Look at the Ministry", as well as the manual on Methodist Service Projects.

We are now working to get a complete list of all our young men and women who have made decisions for full time Christian Service. These decisions should be reported to this committee or to Mrs. Edward W. Harris, Secretary of Missionary Personnel.

### BOARD OF EDUCATION

Believing that our General Board of Education has been moving in the right direction, your Conference Board has sought to cooperate in the realization of all of its major objectives. Continuing to follow this sane leadership, it is our purpose to give emphasis to:

- 1. Increasing Church school enrollment and attendance.
- 2. The enlistment and training of leadership.
- 3. Reaching Church school members for Christ and the church.
- Missionary instruction and encouragement in the taking of the Fourth Sunday offering.
- Enlistment for full-time Christian service through cooperation with other Conference agencies working at the enlistment program.

**Age-Group Work:** We now have a part-time Children's Director, a full-time Youth Director and a voluntary Adult Director. Under their leadership, we shall endeavor to formulate programs consistent with opportunities presented and the resources available.

Ministerial Training: Though no longer primarily responsible for this phase of training, the Board is vitally concerned with all matters that have to do with a better training ministry, and will readily cooperate with the Conference Board of Ministerial Training at all points where the two Boards are jointly responsible.

Southern Methodist University: We commend Southern Methodist University for its fine contributions to the Jurisdiction which it serves. We call special attention to the Perkins School of Theology so rapidly becoming one of the great seminaries of the nation and recommend it to all ministerial students who are looking toward seminary training.

**Philander Smith College:** Philander Smith College for negroes is a Methodist institution doing excellent work under capable and trained leadership. We commend it as worthy of the confidence and financial support of all who are interested in a better relationship between the races.

Mt. Sequoyah: Mt. Sequoyah is another Jurisdictional institution doing good work in the training of local church leaders. We urge the full use of quotas granted to the Conference for its summer program.

The Conference Camp: We are happy that our Conference Camp is opening, even though on a limited scale, for its first summer program. The Board of Education pledges full cooperation with other Conference agencies working to make this meet a long-felt need of all age-groups for such a training agency.

Board of Managers of the Pastors School: We nominate W. Neill Hart, Ralph Clayton and Roy E. Fawcett to serve as the Board of Education representatives.

### Report No. 2A — Hendrix College

This mid-century year finds Hendrix College in excellent condition, but we are aware of critical challenges that confront the small church college in these days. Hendrix must find additional sources of income, or curtail its activities and reduce its program, or face serious deficit. The General Conference in 1948 recommended the raising of a sum that will average 50 cents per member per year for educational institutions of the church. Such a program applied to Hendrix by Arkansas Methodists would mean adequate finance for all Hendrix undertakings.

State institutions of higher learning are receiving more generous appropriations than they have ever had, making possible salary adjustments and enriched offerings. Arkansas Methodists must consider the challenge which this presents. Hendrix must have the necessary support which will make possible her continued position as a leader among col-

leges of this area.

The college has done excellent work during the school year that has just closed. Campus morale has been most satisfying and we are glad to report an excellent "spiritual climate" at Conway. There were 63 ministerial students at Hendrix last year, and closely associated with these young men were 38 young women who have dedicated their lives and talents to types of Christian service other than the ministry. The influence of this group on the campus throughout the year was most wholesome, and they gave special leadership to college activities during Religion and Life Week in the fall and during Holy Week in the spring. They also do a great deal of off-campus work, in the local churches, and on fellowship teams in many churches of the state.

The response to the November Special for Hendrix College and Ministerial Education is gratifying and we strongly urge greater emphasis on this most essential program. We also call upon all pastors to observe Methodist Student Day; Since June 11 is Conference Sunday this year, let us use some other Sunday in June for this cause. Although Arkansas Conferences have contributed very little to this fund, scholarships have been allotted by the National Office to Hendrix students without discrimination. Next year however the number will be reduced from six to three unless there is better response from our state. Every church will want a part in assisting worthy and able students who show a vital concern for the church program.

Eight trustees shall represent the North Arkansas Conference, eight the Little Rock Conference, five the Alumni Association of the College, twelve shall be trustees at large, and three members ex-officio: the resident Bishop of the Area, the Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education of the Christian Education of the North Arkansas Conference, and the Executive Secretary of the Board of the Little Rock Conference. The Annual Conferences are empowered to increase or otherwise change the number of trustees at large, upon recommendation of the board of trustees; provided, that a majority of all the trustees shall consent to such a change and that no such change shall be made without due notice of such meeting and the specific intention thereof given to the several trustees at least ten days before meeting."

#### Report No. 3—Wesley Foundation Work

The Conference Board of Education has been having some part in the promotion of the Wesley Foundation program among students in state supported schools as well as our own church college. However, the funds available have been barely more than nominal and by no means in keeping with the needs and opportunities presented by the thousands of Methodists Students attending these institutions of higher learning.

We endorse the proposed program of establishing a student center for the University of Arkansas, and recommend that our Conference, acting jointly with the North Arkansas Conference, accept the offer of Central Methodist Church, Fayetteville, to donate the building now used as the sanctuary, and that we assume the raising of \$25,000.00 as our share of the amount needed to recondition the building and make it available for that purpose.

We recommend that steps be taken to raise the above amount on a quota basis as set by the World Service Commission.

#### BOARD OF EVANGELISM

### Report No. 1

Your Board met early in the year and outlined a splendid program which we have followed consistently. Evangelism is the heart of The

Methodist Church and we are striving to give it the rightful place in our Conference.

We had six ministers from this Conference to attend the School of Home Visitation Evangelism which met in Philadelphia last November. Some eight thousand members were added to the church during this school.

In order to further the work of evangelism in every district of the Conference, for the coming year, we make the following recommendations:

- 1. Give evangelism an important place at the Annual Conference session and have the Conference adopt in broad outline a great program of work.
- 2. Maintain a budget that will provide for the proper evangelistic activities on Conference and district levels throughout the year.
- 3. As soon as possible, after the Annual Conference session, spend at least one full day on the year's program of work in the Conference. Also meet at least one full day with the bishop, the district superintendents, and the district secretaries of evangelism in planning the "what, how, when, and where" of evangelism in the Conference.
- 4. Set goals early in the year, in line with suggested rations and in co-operation with the district superintendents and the bishop.
- 5. Carry out the programs of the General and Jurisdictional Boards of Evangelism.
- 6. Train ministers and laymen in visitation evangelism on district and sub-district levels, and assist in opening new churches and Sunday schools.
- 7. Hold spiritual life retreats on Conference and district levels—at least one overnight session—both for ministers and laymen.
- 8. Promote simultaneous evangelistic campaigns and preaching missions in the district and sub-districts and on city and county levels.
  - 9. Promote evangelistic and devotional literature in every way.
  - 10. Use Audio-Visual aids and radio in every possible way.
- 11. Co-operate with other groups in the Conference and in other denominations that are like-minded in promoting the Kingdom evangelistically.
- 12. Work out a program of evangelism for the local church for winning, training, and assimilating persons for Christ and His Church. Do all that is possible in carrying out this program through District Secretaries of evangelism and local church Committees on Membership and Evangelism.
- 13. Each centerally located town church investigate the possibilities of opening and strengthening country churches. One town church in our Conference has used laymen to go out and teach and conduct services which resulted in the reviving of all the country churches in the country. They are now being served by a local preacher who is employed full time in business. Once each quarter the town church has "rural church night", with the country churches having charge of the evening services. A rural preacher brings the message and the rural people make up the choir. This has created a great spirit of Christian fellowship between town and country churches. We hope that each town church will give its support to any abandoned church in the country where it is located. No greater evangelistic work can a church do than this.
- 14. We request Bishop Martin to appoint Rev. R. E. Simpson as Conference Evangelist.
- 15. We recommend that the pamphlet "Preview of Methodism Advance" be used extensively under the direction of the District Superintendent and the District Director of Evangelism.

Be it Resolved: That this Board go on record as favoring a full time Conference Director of Evangelism.

We recommend that Golden Cross Funds be handled on district basis

and be administered by a committee of three, of which the District Superindent shall be one.

- 1. We nominate Fred R. Harrison as Conference Director of Golden Cross and earnestly request that Bishop Martin appoint him to this office.
- 2. We nominate the Rev. J. L. Dedman and H. D. Sadler to the Board of Methodist Children's Home to succeed themselves; their term to expire in 1953. S. T. Baugh to succeed Paul Galloway, term to expire 1952.
- 3. We recommend the election of Dr. L. E. Drewrey in the place of Dr. T. E. Fuller, deceased, the term to expire in 1951.

#### REPORT OF HOSPITAL TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees of the Methodist Hospital of Arkansas, Inc., submits the following report to the Board of Hospitals and Homes of the Little Rock Conference.

In 1945 an amount of \$138,930.89 was raised with which to purchase the hospital at Hot Springs, and since that time additional amounts have been raised through Golden Cross donations, as follows:

Original donations for purchase of the hospital and Golden Cross donations, amounting to \$230,014.74, were used to purchase the hospital at a cost of \$100,000.00 and to reequip and redecorate the hospital.

The following losses were sustained during operation of the hospital:

It was found that it would be impossible to operate a hospital of this size without sustaining a loss each year because of the tremendous overhead, which would have taken care of a much larger hospital, although we have had an average occupancy of approximately 88% until the latter part of the past year.

It was originally thought that the interest of the Conference would be such that a sufficient amount of money could be raised with which to enlarge the hospital, so that it might be put on a paying basis, but this interest did not materialize.

After very serious consideration of future possibilities, the Board of Trustees of the hospital decided that the only solution to the problem confronting them was a sale of the hospital and its equipment before losses being sustained absorbed the assets.

On December 13, 1949, a special session of the Little Rock Conference was called to meet in Little Rock, Arkansas, to consider this problem and the following resolution was submitted and adopted by the Conference:

BE IT RESOLVED by the Little Rock Methodist Conference that:

The request of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Hospital of Arkansas, Inc., for permission to negotiate and consummate the sale of the Methodist Hospital at Hot Springs at the best price obtainable, or close it if found necessary, is hereby adopted.

The Board of Trustees are instructed to pay out of the building fund the amount due architects for drawing plans for a new hospital and return balance of building fund on a percentage basis, if requested by donors within thirty days after sale, if found legally possible.

In the event of sale of hospital, the Board of Trustees are authorized to pay all debts and obligations of the hospital and to refund his contribution to any donor who requests it within thirty days after sale, if

such procedure is found to be legally possible.

The Board of Trustees are instructed, after paying all obligations and debts of hospital and making all refunds required, to divide balance of proceeds of sale equally between the Little Rock Conference Methodist Camp and the Little Rock Claimants Endowment Fund.

The Board of Trustees are authorized, if found necessary, to file a petition in Chancery Court of Garland County, in its name and in the name of the Little Rock Conference, for an order of direction and approval, by said court, of sale of the property by the Trustees, and for approval of the distribution of the proceeds of sale.

Following action and authorization by the Conference, a group of doctors and businessmen in Hot Springs were contacted, and sale of the hospital was consummated, becoming effective June 1, 1950. Sale price of the hospital was \$100,000.00 cash, which was paid in full, and purchase of all inventory of the hospital amounted to \$8698.20, for which a 90 day note was accepted.

The Golden Cross Fund will be increased as balance of last Golden Cross donations are received; also, an additional amount is to be received as the hospital's apportionment from World Service which may amount to around \$3,000.00.

The liabilities of the hospital, as far as were known, are as follows:

The above amounts have all been paid, leaving the hospital entirely out of debt, as far as is known, although undoubtedly, a few hundred dollars of local bills may yet come in to be paid.

The total cash assets of the hospital to date amount to \$64,096.55, as for as is known, and note of \$8698.20 for inventory, or total of \$72,794.75.

Accounts receivable in the amount of \$7,389.52 are due the hospital. However, from this amount is to be deducted \$591.42, which are Golden Cross accounts, and the hospital reports that they consider \$2,759.55 of the total amount uncollectable, leaving an amount of \$4,038.55 which

should be collected and which will be added to the above remaining assets of the hospital.

Resolution adopted by the Special Conference on December 13, 1949, states that the Board of Trustees "return balance of building fund on a percentage basis, if requested by donors within thirty days after sale, if found legally possible."

It also states that "the Board of Trustees are authorized to pay all debts and obligations of the hospital and to refund his contribution to any donor who requests it within thirty days after sale, if such procedure is found to be legally possible."

Date of sale is to be considered as of June 1st. Therefore any requests for return of building fund or donation on original purchase of hospital must be made in writing to B. T. Fooks, Chairman, Board of Trustees, Methodist Hospital of Arkansas, Camden, Arkansas, before July 1st.

Donations will be returnd on the basis of the balance now on hand in proportion that that amount bears to the original donation of \$138,930.89.

No church is entitled to a refund of the amount given by its members but will be made directly to the donor upon his request.

We would like to call attention to the fact that donors requesting refund must make payment of income tax on amount returned, as he deducted this amount as donations from his returns when gift was made.

Authorization for return of gift applies only to those who made gifts to original fund for purchase of the hospital and not to those who donated for furnishing of the hospital. Neither does it apply to Golden Cross funds or special gifts.

As it was not considered necessary by the purchasers of the hospital that the legality of the sale be passed on by the Chancery Court of Garland County, the legal aspect as to the return of donations to donor was not ruled on. We respectfully request that the Conference give the Board of Trustees of the hospital a ruling as to whether, under the discipline of The Methodist Church, money may be returned to donors.

The Board of Trustees wishes to express its appreciation to the Rev. R. E. Simpson, who, as Superintendent, has faithfully supervised the work of the hospital during the past few years; also, to Dr. Francis A. Buddin, Golden Cross Director for the past year.

To Bishop Martin and Cabinet, as well as all pastors and laymen in the Conference who have so faithfully supported the Board in its work, we wish to express our appreciation.

Although there has been a substantial loss in the overall operation of the hospital, we believe that the good it has accomplished in Golden Cross services and charity rendered since its purchase has far exceeded the loss. The money donated for purchase and through Golden Cross has served a most worthy purpose and will continue to do so.

Purchase of the hospital by a group of doctors, surgeons and businessmen of Hot Springs, having the financial backing to enlarge the hospital so that it may give its greatest service, will realize in full the ambitions held by our Conference for establishment and successful operation of a Protestant hospital in Hot Springs. Each and every donor may in the future feel a sense of pride in the successful operation of this institution.

As Chairman of the Board of Trustees, I want to express my personal appreciation to all members of the Board who have given of their time, efforts and money unstintedly in order to preserve the assets of this institution.

At the beginning of the Conference year, we had 46 children in the Home. During the year, five have beene placed back in private homes and five additional children have been accepted. The total number ministered to during the year is 51. The number now in the Home is 46.

We now have four new buildings completed and occupied. We have no indebtedness against the property. Our most pressing need is for additional buildings. With a good Christmas offering again this year, we will be able to erect another cottage next year and pay all present maintenance costs. The present value of land and all improvements is \$260,000.00.

Having completed fifty years of progress, we now enter upon the second half of our first century with bright prospects for continued expansion and greater service to needy and neglected children.

With the meeting of this Conference, terms of the following Board members expire: Rev. J. L. Dedman and Rev. H. D. Sadler. We recommend their election to succeed themselves, their terms to expire in 1953. We recommend the election of Dr. L. E. Drewrey in the place of Dr. T. E. Fuller, deceased, the term to expire in 1951. Stanley T. Baugh in place of Paul V. Galloway, transfered, term to expire in 1952.

The same appropriation as that granted last year is requested.

The financial statement attached is compiled from the May 25, 1950 audit of our accounts, made by Frank L. Eaton & Co., C. P. A. The Treasurer is bonded in the sum of \$25,000 with the Aetna Casualty Co., of Hartford, Connecticutt.

The Board of Missions and Church Extension will meet annually at the time of the session of the Annual Conference with the Executive Committee being authorized to handle emergencies in the interim.

The District Superintendents are asked to present their requests for salary supplementation to the Board in writing on the forms provided by the Board.

### Woman's Society of Christian Service

At mid-quadrennium, the Little Rock Conference Society is moving well toward the achievement of the Division goals for the quadrennium.

The financial goal of one third more for appropriations within the Division, has been met and overpaid slightly, during the past fiscal year. The total sent to the Division amounts to \$60,285.57, with \$54,500 credited to appropriations.

887 members have been added during the year.

The Conference has laid great stress on the training of leadership at all organizational levels, but particularly at the local church level. A state wide seminar, training women for service to the community, the local church and the nation was held at Aldersgate Camp last fall.

The society is sharing financially and otherwise, in the fellowship Team Laboratory effort being sponsored by the Town and Country Commission this summer. One of the life service girls is graduating in June, and will likely be appointed to work under the Woman's Division.

The Conference supports Orlene McKimmey in Mexico, and shares in the support of Virginia Guffey, social worker at the State Sanitorium, Martha Greene, worker with students with Arkadelphia First Church, and May Wilhelm, narcotic education worker with the Department of Education in Arkansas. In addition to the workers, we have three rural workers (one being assigned to the Camden District in September), one urban worker, and two workers at the Aldersgate camp. There are two retired missionaries and one retired deaconess living within our Conference.

The home-going of Mrs. Jack Taylor in March of this year brought release from a long illness, during which she was a complete invalid. Most of the time of her illness was spent in the devoted care of the Methodist Hospital in Hot Springs. The Conference Secretary, custodian of the Taylor Endowment Funds, paid for her care and hospitalization, \$2,229.50. A complete statement of the status of these funds will be found in the Conference Journal as a supplement to the financial report of the Society.

#### BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

We, your Board of Temperance, make the following suggestions and recommendations:

- 1. This has been one of the most successful years in the long history of the temperance cause in our Conference. Temperance sermons have been preached, monies have been raised, commitment folders have been signed, and temperance referendum petitions have been signed in many of our churches.
- 2. Representatives of this Board were given places on the programs of the District Conferences to pesent the temperance cause and challenge our people to the fight for sobriety. As a result of this cooperation, and with the help of the Arkansas Temperance League and of our sister churches amongst other denominations, several municipalities and counties in our conference and state have voted dry this year. Methodism has entered prayerfully into the fight to vote Arkansas dry in 1950.
- 3. Our Chairman, Rev. J. L. Tucker attended the national meeting of the Presidents of the Annual Conference Boards of Temperance in Washington, D. C. during the week of April 24th. Many helpful and forward looking proposals for the cause of temperance were brought back from that meeting and are becoming a part of the policies and program of our conference. The results of the meeting of the South Central Jurisdiction, held in connection with the general meeting, in Washington, have been sent by this Board to 227 preachers and other leaders of the Little Rock Conference.

We offer the following recommendations, in keeping with the Washington meeting and the General Board policies, and pray for their adoption:

(1.) We respectfully request the Commission on World Service and

Finance to increase our percentage to two percent, in order that there may be more adequate funds to carry out the enlarged program.

(2.) We urge the cabinet to fill vacancies on this board by the very best men available in the interest of effectiveness, harmony and vigorous

action on behalf of this long neglected cause.

- (3.) We again urge that each district set up a well organized Temperance Committee, and that the Chairman of this Committee be the District Director of Temperance, to assist this board and the District Superintendent to promote the cause in the District. Also that each pastor set up a temperance committee in each church of his charge to assist him in promoting the cause of temperance in the local community. We should all be reminded that the Discipline requires us to maintain a vigorous education program also on the problems of narcotics, debasing amusements, bad literature and gambling, and that the objective is to create and maintain an informed and vigorous interest in public morals.
- (4.) We urge careful planning for commitment Sunday, that a sermon on temperance be preached in every church and that people be given full opportunity to sign commitment folders. We recommend that an offering be taken on that day to be divided equally between the Conference Board of Temperance and the Arkansas Temperance League. In keeping with a suggestion of Bishop Martin and the action of the Washington meeting of Board Presidents, this Board has ordered one sign board, at \$25.00 each, to be placed in each district of the conference We suggest that youth organizations in local communities promote these temperance sign projects.
- (5.) We urge all pastors to encourage the people to secure poll tax receipts before October 1, so they will be qualified to vote on November
- (6.) We are greatly indebted for Dr. Hooton's presence and message. We are fortunate to have the President of our General Board of Temperance, Bishop Martin, to lead us in the temperance program of our Conference and State.

# TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

#### Report No. 1

- 1. We call attention to the National Town and Country Conference to be held in Sioux City, Iowa, July 21-24, 1951. We plan to have a delegation from the Little Rock Conference and will announce plans for securing this delegation in due time.
- 2. We extend the services of the Town and Country Commission to assist in supplying the pulpits of supply pastors who will be attending the school for them at Perkins School of Theology this summer.
- 3. The Town and Country Commission is sponsoring a project this summer which is an entirely new undertaking for an annual conference. At Camp Aldersgate July 10-15 we will hold a Fellowship Team Training Laboratory. Our goal is 8 young people and 2 adults from each district. This group will be divided into terms of four youth and one adult to work in colored winds abundant the group will be divided in the four population of the work in selected rural churches under the supervision of trained leadership for the period of one week. These teams will then return to their respective districts to work in rural areas strengthening the total youth program of our church. We think this is a forward move in our conference and will make the Youth Caravan idea serve in the rural areas of our own conference. We seek the active support of all pastors and all district superintendents in securing the best possible youth of our conference to train for this work.

4. In the past the Town and Country Commission has been greatly handicapped in that we have had no regular income. We have requested to be included in the conference budget for the sum of \$1,000.00 a year. We trust this request will be granted and thus open the way for the commission to be of greater service to the conference.

#### BOARD OF TRUSTEES

We, your Board of Trustees, submit the following report. We have

had before us requests from District Superintendents as follows:

- 1. From the Arkadelphia District, asking that the proceeds of the sale of the old parsonage property of the old Couchwood Circuit, now Rockport charge, be equally divided between the four churches constituting the old Couchwood charge, namely, Rockport, Butterfield, Magnet Cove and Morning Star. This request is the result of action by a recent session of quarterly conference of the present Rockport charge embracing the first three of the churches named above, with the knowledge and consent of the church at Morning Star, now on the Tigert-Morning Star charge. The proceeds of sale above referred to amount to \$1431.50. Since new parsonage property is now owned by each charge to which the above named churches belong, and said proceeds are not needed for parsonage purposes, we recommend the granting of the request.
- 2. We had also a request from the Superintendent of the Camden District asking authorization for your Board to execute a deed confirming sale and transfer of title to the abandoned church site in the town of Wesson, Union County. Such sale was authorized at the conference session of 1948 (see Journal of that year). The proceeds, amounting to \$50.00, are to be allocated to the Pleasant Grove Church, which is the nearest Methodist church to the town of Wesson, and which is now the church home of many of the former members of the Wesson Church. We recommend compliance with the request.
- 3. We also had a request from the Superintendent of Monticello District, the Rev. T. T. McNeal, for authorization of this Board of Trustees to execute a quit claim deed to certain land adjacent to the property of thee long-since-abandoned Bethel M. E. Church, South, in Ashley County. Due to an error in the recorder's office a cloud rests upon the title both of the church and that of the holder of the adjacent property. Mutual quit-claim deeds are to be executed, clearing each title. Request is further made that authorization be granted to sell the said

abandoned Bethel church property, the proceeds to be allocated to Camp Keener in the Monticello District.

We so recommend.

Your Board of Trustees has a balance in the State National Bank of Texarkana, Arkansas, as of June 2, 1950, of \$73.19.

The Board has elected Herschel Richert as superintendent of construction and request that the Bishop appoint him to this office. G. H. Cook, a layman, has been named as his assistant.

We again urge, therefore, that all of our ministers give this theme a large place in their preaching, that our district superintendents and pastors see to it that a committee on World Peace shall be set up in every congregation, and that all of the people be given an opportunity to study carefully this question of such great concern to all mankind, and to help create a will to peace on the part of the citizens of all nations. We also earnestly request that whenever possible, institutes and Conferences be planned for the consideration of World Peace.

#### THE ARKANSAS METHODIST

Herewith for your approval I submit my report on the books of the Arkansas Methodist for the period ended December 31, 1949 consisting of operations since Oceober 1, 1948 or for fifteen (15) months.

In as much as the only records of the office consists of the Cash Book I have limited this report to an accounting of the recorded receipts and disbursements, together with a balance sheet as of December 31, 1949.

A comparison of the operating statements for the past five years reflects the following improvements in the position of the Arkansas Methodist for periods ending with October 1945, October 1946, October 1948, which are for 12 months, and for September 1947 which is for 11½ months and for December 31, 1949 which is for 15 months.

It will be noted that during this period, income from subscriptions has increased \$1,613.00 this year in comparison with the previous year. During the past five years income from subscriptions has increased \$9,750.00 or nearly fifty per cent.

Advertising has increased \$1,083.00 in comparison with the previous year.

Rental income has increased \$1,114.00 in comparison with the previous year.

Gross income has increased 5,591.00 during the past 15 months in comparison with the previous period of 12 months.

Expenses have also increased \$12,247.00 during the past 15 months in comparison with the previous period of 12 months. Expense items for this period carry two subscription campaigns including salaries and other items incidental to the longer period of operation.

In analyzing the deficit for the period of this audit it should be borne in mind that the expense for the months of October, November and December 1948 was paid from balances from the preceding fiscal year and not altogether from the receipts during the period covered in this audit.

Real Estate owned is shown on the Balance Sheeet at the figures placed by the appraisers secured by your Commission on April 12, 1941. The property was subsequently improved and there has been a very substantial enhancement in the market value of the property.

The Real Estate and Improvements are carried on the books at \$6,000.00. This property is easily worth  $2\frac{1}{2}$  to 3 times the amount carried, in the opinion of several real estate men.

Insurance is carried on the building in the sum of \$10,000.00 and on the furnishings in the sum of \$1,000.00.

During the period under examination the sum of \$582.94 has been added to Capital Assets under Equipment and Office Furnishings. No appraisal of the property was attempted.

The management does not treat 30 day accounts payable as liabilities, nor are 30 day accounts receivable considered as assets, and I have therefore, disregarded them in the preparation of this report.

An audit has been made of the cash receipts and disbursements of the Little Rock Conference, Board of Conference Claimants, Methodist Church, for the period May 21, 1949, through May 25, 1950 and report thereon is herewith submitted.

Examination was made of the receipts and disbursements as recorded in the Treasurer's cash journel, and comparison made with the receipt

books, bank statements and cancelled checks. The signature, endorsements and amounts on cancelled checks were examined and compared with the cash journal procedure. The balances of cash on deposit with the Worthen Bank and Trust Company, Little Rock, Arkansas and the Simmons National Bank, Pine Bluff, Arkansas, as of May 25, 1950, \$39,999.58 and \$36,877.93 respectively, as reflected by the cash journal are in agreement with the amounts certified directly to us by officers of those depositories. Also, the fact that the World Service Commission is indebted to the Board of Conference Claimants in the amount of \$5,000.00 was confirmed by Mr. C. E. Hayes, Conference Treasurer.

In preparing the Statement of Cash Receipts and Disbursements (SCHEDULE 1) the churches contributions to the Endowment Fund and the pastors contributions based on their 1949-50 salaries were listed as income to the Endowment Fund and all other income was considered to be income of the Claimant Fund. Although the disbursements included expenses incurred in the operation of the Endowment Fund, all disbursements were considered as disbursements of the Claimant Fund pending action of the Board of Directors as to which or what portion of these expenses are to be charged to the Endowment Fund.

The Reconciliation of Bank Balances with Fund Balances (Schedule 1) indicates that a transfer of \$215.39 from the Claimant Fund Bank Account to the Endowment Fund Bank Account would be necessary to bring

the bank balances into agreement with the fund balances.

On the basis of this examination it appears that all funds have been properly accounted for and that the cash receipts and disbursements listed in Schedule 1, of this report are true and correct.

We your Commission on World Service and Finance, submit the following report:

1. The amount apportioned to this Annual Conference by the General Commission on World Service and Finance is \$56,221.00.

2. We recommend that the apportionment for Conference work be the same \$56,221.00.

3. Combining these apportionments for General and Annual Conference work we have a total of \$112,442.00.

4. The amount requested by the Bishop and his Cabinet for Episcopal Area expense is \$750.00 in which request we concur.

5. The amount apportioned for General Administration and the South Central Jurisdiction annual budget is \$6,030.00.

6. The apportionment for the Episcopal Fund is to be an amount equal to 1% percent of the cash salaries of the pastors for the current year.

8. We continue C. E. Hays as Conference Treasurer and recommend that his salary be \$100.00 per month and that he be allowed \$100.00 per month for Bookkeeping. These amounts shall be retroactive, covering the conference year just closing. We nominate Fred Gantt as Assistant Treasurer.

9. We recommend that the Treasurer be authorized to pay \$15.00 for membership of the Methodist Historical Society of the conference in the National and International Methodist Historical Society.

10. We recommend that an amount not to exceed three percent of all funds be handled by the Treasurer, except conference claimants Endowment funds be set aside for Conference administration expense.

# Memoirs

#### MARSHALL OLIVER BARNETT

Marshall Oliver Barnett was born June 5, 1868, in Posey County, Indiana, and died in Pine Bluff, Arkansas, November 5, 1949. Brother Barnett's parents died while he was yet an infant and, being bereft of parental care and guidance, his early life was beset by many difficulties and hardships. His opportunity for obtaining an education was meagre. But he seized and treasured every such opportunity and by dint of hard labor, patience, and sacrifice, he found some



hard labor, patience, and sacrifice, he found some compensation for the denials growing out of his unfavorable early environments. He was cared for by his father's brother for a few years, but upon the death of the latter, he and his only brother who was killed in a storm about 1900 came to Arkansas and settled in Grant County. Very early in life he joined the Methodist Church and later felt the call for a dedication of his life to the ministry and was licensed for such service at Sheridan, Arkansas, about the turn of the century. He was admitted on trial to the Little Rock Annual Conference November 22, 1900, at Hot Springs. Two years later he was admitted into full connection and ordained a deacon at the session of the Annual Conference which met

in Benton. On December 12, 1904, he was ordained an Elder at Texarkana.

From 1900 to 1942 Brother Barnett gave forty-two years of active service to his church. Those years were packed with spiritual significance. The following charges were served by him: Rowell Circuit, 1900-1901; Roe Circuit, 1901-1904; Swan Lake Station, 1904-1905; Redfield Circuit, 1905-1906; Macon Circuit, 1906-1910; Douglas and Grady, 1910-1912; Carr Memorial, Pine Bluff, 1912-1915; Okolona, 1915-1916; Star City, 1916-1920; Humphrey and Sunshine, 1920-1921; Murfreesboro and Sweet Home, 1921-1922; St. Charles, 1922-1923; Sheridan and New Hope, 1923-1924; Altheimer and Wabbaseka, 1924-1927; Hamburg, 1927-1928; Hazen and DeValls Bluff, 1928-1930; Glenwood and Roseboro, 1930-1931; Huttig, 1931-1933; Grady-Gould, 1933-1937; Good Faith - White Hall, 1937-1938; Montrose and Snyder, 1938-1944. It is worthy of note that thirty years of the forty-four given by Brother Barnett (two of which were after his retirement in 1942) were spent in the Pine Bluff District where he was principally reared and licensed to preach. That is a mark of distinction which few of us enjoy.

I do not think I am chargeable with exaggeration in saying that everybody loved Marshall Barnett who knew him. He was so winsome in personality, so gentle in his general bearings, so kind and reassuring in his approaches that his very presence drove fear and doubt away and induced a sense of spiritual calmness and serenity. Large was his influence, and rich was his contribution to those whom he served and chanced to meet in the rounds of life.

Brother Barnett was twice married. First, to Miss Martha Jane Wallace on November 20, 1890. To this union a daughter was born, who died in infancy. Mrs. Barnett died at El Dorado July 8, 1933. His second marriage was to Miss Grace Koen of Pine Bluff on June 18, 1934. She survives him. He is also survived by Earl Barnett, a son whom he legally adopted in October, 1930.

The funeral was held at Lakeside Methodist Church in Pine Bluff

by the writer, assisted by Rev. Kenneth L. Spore, Rev. Clem Baker, and Rev. Otto Teague. His body lies in Graceland Cemetery awaiting the Grand Convocation of the Saints.

Mrs. Margaret Elizabeth Thornburgh Workman, a deeeply consecrated Christian woman, and wife of Dr. J. M. Workman, answered the call, "Come up a little higher," on July 6th, 1949, at her home in Conway, Arkansas. She was born in Powhattan, Lawrence County, Arkansas, April 6th, 1872, the daughter of George and Carrie Self Thornburgh. Educated in the public schools of Walnut Ridge and Little Rock, Arkansas. A graduate of Galloway's Woman's College of Searcy, in its first class in 1892.

On February 15th, 1949, Dr. and Mrs. Workman celebrated their 56th wedding aniversary. Mrs. Workman is survived by her husband, James Mims Workman, three sons, Rev. Mims Thornburgh Workman, Rev. James Warthen Workman, and Rev. George Bell Workman; three daughters, Mrs. Herman Randolph (Mary) Hampton, Miss Elizabeth Workman and Mrs. Joe Allen (Lucibelle) Markham. Two ministers among her ten grand children and one great grandchild.

Mrs. Workman organized and conducted the first vesper service ever held at Henderson Brown College. From her life a spiritual influence was given that did much in the spiritual development of the students who came to the campus. This influence had much to do with the organization of the "Life Service Band" for young ministers and full time Christian workers in the college and gave vital spiritual influence to the organizations of the Young Woman's Christian Association and the Young Men's Christian Association groups. Among the young men and women who loved her best she was known as, "Mom Workman." She was called upon for much personal counselling and spiritual guidance.

Her influence extended far beyond the circles of the college campus and the pastoral charges that she and her good husband served. She became the embodiment of the spiritual life in the Woman's Society of Christian Service, having served as Spiritual Life Leader for the Conference for a number of years.

In my judgment no other one person has had influence upon more lives of young men and women for decisions to the ministry and full time Christian work than she, not to mention her influence upon her own sons and daughters and grandsons and granddaughters. Her life was lived in terms of Eternal Values; her passing in no sense has ended that living. Her life lives on not only by its impact on the lives of those with whom she lived and labored, but in the lives of those who now serve. She is not dead, but, "Alive forevermore." "This is the victory that overcometh the world."

A quiet and beautiful funeral service was held in the sanctuary of the First Methodist Church in Conway, 3:00 P. M., Friday, July 8th, 1949, with the pastor, Rev. Allen D. Stewart in charge, assisted by Bishop Paul E. Martin, Dr. C. M. Reves and Dr. E. Clifton Rule. Her body was laid to rest in the Thornburgh Family plot, Mt. Holly Cemetery, Little Rock, Arkansas.

### MRS. SUSIE FELTON DICKERSON

### MRS. JOHN FALL TAYLOR

Mrs. John Fall Taylor was born Lida Dean Smith, October 6, 1870, in Frankford, Missouri. She was the oldest daughter of Dr. Ferdinand Smith and Lucy Garnet Smith.

At the age of sixteen years, her father moved his family to an Arkansas farm near Grannis, which was home for many years to the family. After Dr. Smith's death, Mrs. Taylor remained in the home and cared for her invalid mother.

In 1914 Miss Lida was married to the Rev. John Fall Taylor, who was lovingly known throughout Methodism as "Brother Jack".

Mrs. Taylor spent many years serving as the wife of an itenerant Methodist preacher and in each parsonage home there was room and a welcome to orphaned children and to weary travelers. She knew the trials of and the demads upon a circuit rider's wife and was a true helpmeet to her saintly husband.

In 1934 Brother Jack and Mrs. Taylor chose to make Malvern their permanent home where they lived at 611 East Page until Mrs. Taylor's death. Just one year after the passing of brother Taylor in 1945, Mrs. Taylor suffered a fall which resulted in a broken hip, and a long confinement in the Methodist Hospital in Hot Springs, Arkansas. In March 1948 she suffered a stroke of paralysis which left her helpless, at which time she was taken again to the Methodist Hospital where she remained until her death March 25th, 1950.

In Brother Taylor's memoir, the Rev. John L. Hoover wrote, "A study of the appointments (of Brother Taylor) would indicate something of the consecration and devotion of this great man of God. Without exception, they were "hard works" as we say. He not only went to them uncomplainingly but joyfully." And we add that Mrs. Taylor went with Brother Taylor, feeling that God had given her this work to do.

Out of their meager salaries the Taylors accumulated a fund which was given for Missions and which is administered by the Womans Society of Christian Service to the Little Rock Annual Conference. The Womans Society of Christian Service counted it their joy to minister to Mrs.

Taylor through the months of her illness and to see that every care

was taken for her comfort.

Mrs. Taylor is survived by one brother, Ferdinand Smith of Clayton, Oklahoma, and one sister, Mrs. James P. King, of Marietta, Oklahoma, a large number of nephews and nieces and a host of friends who call her blessed.

The funeral services was conducted at Malvern, Arkansas, March 28th, 1950, by the Reverend R. B. Moore, superintendent of the Arkadelphia district and assisted by Mrs. T. W. McCoy, of Benton, Arkansas, who represented the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Little Rock Annual Conference.

Interment was in Malvern.

### MRS. ANNIE E. CANNON

Annie Elizabeth Cannon was born at Rosedale, Howard County, Arkansas, November 29, 1875; died March 30, 1950, being in her seventy-fifth year. She was the daughter of Daniel and Betty Holmes-Turrentine. She was married to John Lewis Cannon at her home at Hereford, Texas, to which place her parents had moved in 1896. The marriage took place in June, 1903, soon after her husband's graduation from Southwestern University at Georgetown, Texas. The young couple returned at once to Arkansas and settled at Stamps, from which place her husband supplied Walnut Hill Circuit till conference. The conference met that year at El Dorado, at which session her husband was admitted on trial and sent to Dermott and Dumas as his first appointment. Thus began her life as the wife of a Methodist itenerant, whose faithful companion and helpmeet she was through thirty-six years of active service. In every community where she lived her life was one of unselfish service and gentle ministries, whether in the church, her home, or as neighbor and friend of all in the community.

She was the mother of four children, three of whom survive her, and mourn her departing—Miss Evelyn Cannon, Foreman, Ark.; Rev. John L. Cannon II, Tom Ball, Texas; and Mrs. Frances Brooks, of De Queen, Arkansas.

After her husband's retirement in 1940, with him she went to Foreman, Arkansas, where he had purchased a home in which they were to finish out their days. She identified herself at once with the church and the community. After her husband's death in 1944 and his burial in Foreman, the town and the people came to seem more like home than ever, and she was content to live and work among them to the last. Funeral services were conducted from the Methodist Church in Foreman under the direction of her pastor, the Rev. Jeff Paul, assisted by Rev. R. H. Cannon. She had lived to a good old age, and had filled the years with steadfast loyalty and faithfullness to Christ, her church, her family, her neighbors and friends. We confidently expect to meet her among the hosts of the redeemed at the great home-coming beyond this "vale of tears."

### CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

- 1. **Nominations.** The District Superintendents shall be a standing committee on nominations and shall nominate all members of the quadrennial and annual boards, commissions and committees except where they are otherwise provided for.
- 2. Conference Program. A Program for the session of the Annual Conference shall be arranged by the following Planning Committee not less than 30 days before the Conference convenes: The resident Bishop, the District Suprintendents, the pastor-host, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference President of the W.S.C.S., Chairman of the major Boards, Committees and Commissions, the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education, the Conference Missionary Secretary, and the Conference Secretary of Evangelism. Early in the Conference year the Committee may request the resident Bishop to select a Conference preacher, and arrange for all preaching, inspirational and anniversary services. This Conference program shall be published in advance of the convening of the Annual Conference. The program made by this Committee shall be subject to revision as the exigencies of any situation may require or the Conference direct.
- 3. Financial and Statistical. (1) All Conference assessments and all reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars with no columns for cents. (2) Each pastor shall settle with the Conference Treasurer and turn over his statistical reports not later than the first day of the Conference, provided this report must correspond with the Treasurer's report. (3) The District Superintendent shall furnish the Statistical Secretary with all assessments and acceptances of pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the meeting of the Annual Conference and these figures shall be accepted as official.
- 4. Memoirs. All memoirs of members of the Conference shall contain date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, names of children, names of all charges served, and place of burial. A small picture of each member of the Conference shall be printed with his memoir. Memoirs of preachers' wives shall be published in the Conference Journal. Names of deceased laymen who have been active in the Annual Conference or served on Conference Boards be printed in the Conference Journal.
- 5. Conference Expense Fund. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance shall make an assessment for a Conference Expense Fund to cover the cost of all clerical work necessary in preparing Conference records, printing, and distributing the Conference minutes, for preserving Conference records and documents for auditing accounts, and all legitimate expenses incurred by the Conference Secretary and the Conference Treasurer in carrying out the orders of the Conference. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of this fund which shall be paid out on the order of the Conference Secretary.
- 6. District Expenses. The District Stewards shall also estimate and apportion to the several charges an amount necessary for district expenses, except District Superintendents' Travel Expense. The District Stewards shall elect a Treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and shall distribute same on order of the District Superintendent. The Treasurer shall make an annual report to the District Conference showing receipts and disbursements.
- 7. Reports and Resolutions. All reports, resolutions and other papers intended for publication in the Conference Journal shall be type-written in triplicate on special forms furnished by the Conference Secretary.

- 8. Historical Society. There shall be a Conference Historical Society, composed of the members of the old History Commission, and new members added, as of 1943. The Secretary of the Conference shall be a member of the Society. Any vacancies occurring, other than the shifting of a Conference Secretary, shall be filled as provided in Rule 1. It shall be the duty of the Society to collect and preserve biographical data of clerical members of the Conference, and other material that promises to be of historical value and interest. Such material to be deposited in the vault of Hendrix College, Conway, Arkansas. All District Conference Journals and records shall be deposited in fire-proof vaults in the city where the District Superintendent resides. This Society shall make a quadrennial report to the session of the Conference next following the General Conference.
- 9. Number of Districts. There shall be six (6) Districts in the Little Rock Conference.
  - 10. District Conferences shall be held annually in each district.
- 11. Salaries and Expenses. The World Service Commission shall set the salaries and travel expenses of the District Superintendets as provided in the action of the Little Rock Conference taken at the 1949 session. (Page 63 of 1949 Journal).
- 12. Lay Representatives. In addition to those members provided for in Paragraph 667 of the 1948 Discipline of The Methodist Church, each pastoral charge shall, upon nomination of the pastor, elect either at the annual meeting or at the Quarterly Conference, one representative to the District Conference; provided, that in charges of more than 500 members, one representative shall be for each additional 500 members or major fraction thereof. Alternate lay delegates shall be elected in the same manner as the principal.
- 13. Lay Members. Lay members to the Annual Conference shall be elected annually.
- 14. Limits. No member of the Conference shall serve on more than one of the following major Boards: Conference Claimants, Education, Evangelism, Hospitals and Homes, Missions and Church extension, and Temperance. One District Superintendent may serve on each of the major Conference Boards. Effective at the Annual Conference of 1948, not more than one-half of the members of any quadrennial board, commission, or committee shall be re-elected, or reappointed, to the same board, commissions, and committee. Thereafter one-half of all such boards, commissions, and committees shall be changed every four years. No person shall serve on any such board, commission, or committee in more than two consecutive quadrenniums. Any member of any Board, Committee or Commission failing to attend at least one meeting of said Board, Committee, or Commission in a period of twelve calendar months may be continued as a member only upon special request from such Board, Committee, or Commission. Vacancies shall be filled as provided in Rule 1.
- 15. District Committee on Qualifications of Local Preachers. The district Committee on qualifications of local preachers shall consist of three traveling elders in the District.
- 16. Audit. The audit account of all funds as provided for in paragraph 722 of the 1948 Discipline shall be done by certified public accountants sufficiently in advance to have its report published in the Conference Journal.
- 17. Amendment. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.
