REPORTS OF BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND COMMISSIONS

REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMISSION OF THE ARKANSAS METHODIST AND THE LOUISIANA METHODIST

The Joint Commission of the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist met at the First Methodist Church, Little Rock, March 5, 1953, with Dr. Aubrey G. Walton, Chairman, presiding. Those present included Bishop Paul E. Martin, Editors E. T. and Ewing T. Wayland, J. Frank Warden, J. W. Watson, W. M. Womack, Joel Cooper, C. W. Richards, Robert P. Sessions, Aubrey G. Walton, E. V. Markham, Arthur Terry, R. R. Branton, R. L. Johns, O. C. Landers, Fred Schwendimann, and Virgil Morris.

The Editors gave general statement and recommendations, along with statement of financial condition of the publications. The Commission was greatly encouraged by the reports.

After full discussion of various matters presented the Commission voted to make the following recommendations to the Annual Conference of the Area:

- (1) That Dr. E. T. Wayland and Rev. Ewing T. Wayland be appointed with annuity to share jointly the responsibility as editors and business managers of The Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist.
- (2) That there be allowed **The Arkansas Methodist** and **The Louisiana Methodist** the same apportionments from the conference benevolences of the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences. It was noted that the Louisiana Conference had set up its apportionment on an annually increasing basis for the current quadrennium, \$2,000, \$3,000, and \$4,000.
- (3) That the campaign goal for 1954 be 35,000 for the combined publications, with a quota for each pastoral charge of one subscription for each nine members.
- (4) That the conference adopt the same general plan for the Circulation Campaign as used last year, and that the date of the compaign be January 10-17, 1954.
- (5) That the individual subscription price be continued at \$2.00, but that a subscription price of \$1.50 be authorized where the Official Board of a church enters into a contract, agreement, or arrangement to send the paper into, as a minimum, the homes of every contributing family of the church; and further that the editors be authorized to enter into contract, agreement, or arrangement with the Official Board of a church, or responsible parties of a District or Sub-district, for local publicity on the back page of the publication.
- (6) That the Executive Committee be empowered to act for the Commission in the interim except as herein otherwise stated.

We your Board of Christian Literature, submit the following report: The church through the press, radio, television and its many publications must endeavor to enlighten the people in the great truths of the Christian Religion.

Our Methodist Publishing House offers an unlimited selection of good literature for all age groups. We are fortunate to have through this literature, the products of the great minds of our day. Too, we would call your attention to the many books of the greater minds of our time, such as: "How To Believe", Dr. Ralph W. Sockman; "The Sacraments In Methodism", Robert W. Goodloe; "Knight of the Burning Heart", a biography of John Wesley by Leslie F. Church.

We believe the church through its Committees on Christian Literature should screen the News Stands of their town to make courteous recommendations to the operators in discouraging the display of certain lude and obscene publications.

Of the 50 million children and youth in the United States we are told that 20 million never receive any religious instruction. 35,000 per year are sent to an institution for delinquents. Therefore we recommend that every pastor seek to place in each home the Arkansas Methodist, The Christian Advocate, The Upper Room, The Voice, The Shepherds, etc. "The family that prays together stays together" certainly can be made a living slogan with the return of family devotions so ably assisted by The Upper Room. The Voice supplies pertinent data on the deadly liquor traffic as so ably mentioned by the Board of Temperance.

A year ago it was necessary to increase the subscription rate of The Arkansas Methodist from \$1.50 to \$2.00, yet in Arkansas we secured a similar subscription list to the all time high of last year. In Louisiana that list was increased approximately 1,000. All key personnel are to be commended for this splendid record. Your attention is called to a special rate whereby the local church may secure the last page of The Methodist solely for its purposes. The Editors would be happy to have you make inquiry.

Recognizing the importance of a ministry that is well informed in a rich, deep knowledge of God, as well as, on the issues of our day; and also a laity that has the knowledge and understanding to cope with the problems of this present day society, we urge you to "study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth".

In addition to the above we are able to pay, this year, retired ministers for all approved years of supply work before being admitted on trial, at the rate of 70% paid for conference membership service. We have also set aside \$1500 to care for the emergency needs of Claimants. We recommend that the Table of Percentage remain the same for the ensuing year, as follows:

This Board urges that we make every effort to raise the rest of this endowment during this second year of extension of this campaign, since the money is badly needed to keep pensions for our retired claimants and widows in line with their needs. We believe that active participation in the observance of Retired Minister's Day, in each pastoral charge, would bring to the attention of our people the fine service rendered to our Churches by these retired ministers. It would also give each church an opportunity to know what their needs are and allow them to share in a free-will offering to increase our payments to them.

Minimum and Disciplinary Rates

Our minimum rate is \$35.00 per service year and our disciplinary rate is \$44.00 per service year; therefore, pensions to claimants have not kept pace with the raising of salaries to men in the active ministry. The above suggestions are made that we may be able to pay the disciplinary rate one year hence, since we anticipate a heavier service year load.

BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS Report No. 2

We submit the Claimant Roll, including superannuated preachers, widows of preachers and dependents of deceased ministers, showing the amount allocated to each Claimant.

The appointments are made on an equity basis, being determined by the years of service rendered. Apportionments to widows being on the basis of 70% of that which their husbands would receive per year of service, for the actual time of service rendered while she was his wife.

Dependent children's claim is determined by multiplying the father's approved years of service by one-fourth of the annuity price, provided that in no case the total annuity claim on the children exceed the annuity claim of the deceased father.

This year we are paying \$33.00 per year of service to retired ministers and \$23.10 to claimant widows. This annuity rate includes the distribution of Endowment invested by the General Board.

We indicate below years of service and amount allocated for distribution to claimants for the ensuing year, by the Little Rock Conference and other Conferences under divided annuity.

The Conference Board of Claimants has authorized the Conference Treasurer, Fred Gantt, to distribute the Funds to the Claimants on July 1, 1953, October 1, 1953, January 1, 1954, and April 1, 1954, paying one-fourth of the allocation at each time.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

The General Conference of 1952 set forth the task of this commission in paragraph 643, section 2 as follows: "It shall be the duty of this commission (a) to cooperate with the Inter-board Committee on Christian Vocations, and with the Committee on Christian Vocations, and with the Committee on Christian Vocations in every local church; (b) to promote among youth and adults a philosophy of Christian vocation that recognizes the potential sacredness of all useful work and all opportunities for Christian life service; (c) to organize a program for presenting to youth and adults the opportunities and claims of the pastoral ministry and other church vocations; (d) to take into account the basic interests and aptitudes of youth and adults and inform them of the necessary preparation for specific church vocations; (e) to keep accurate and useful records of each youth who has indicated an interest in church vocations from the time of his first committment until he is appointed to full time work in the church, or until such time as responsibility for him is accepted by the proper Annual Conference board or commission."

These purposes found expression in various kinds of activity during the past year. Every pastor was urged to organize the committee on Christian vocations in the local church and to present frequently the opportunities for Christian service through church related vocations. A vocation clinic was held in the Camden District under the direction of the Rev. James Upton of Hendrix College. The training course, "Choosing a Vocation", has been taught in several churches and in our assemblies. Pastors were urged to preach on the call to full-time Christian service and to send the names of anyone making decisions to the commission. The opportunity to make vocational commitments was presented in nearly all our youth camps.

In planning for the coming year your commission would make the following suggestions:

- 1. That we promote through our preaching and teaching the "philosophy of Christian vocation that recognizes the potential sacredness of all useful work and all opportunities for Christian Life service."
- 2. That committees on Christian vocations be organized in every church according to the plan suggested in the Discipline, paragraph 246, section 4. And that the name of the chairman of that committee be sent to this commission.
- 3. That every minister inform and train himself to more effectively counsel with his youth regarding church related vocations.
- 4. That we support the plan of the commission to have a Conference on Christian Vocations this year.
- 5. That every minister secure a free copy of "Methodist Service Projects" from Richard Belcher, 1001 Nineteenth Ave. South, Box 871, Nashville 2, Tenn. This is a directory of vocational opportunities offered by the Methodist Church.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

To the Bishop and Members of the Little Rock Conference: Brethren:

The District Superintendents are glad to make report of the achievements of this Conference year now closing. In almost every item being reported an increase is shown over previous years. It is possible that the overall report shows an unprecedented year of growth. 983 infants have been presented by parents or guardians for baptism and children, youth and adults receiving Christian baptism number 1486. Received from preparatory membership and on profession of faith and vows 2708; our membership total is now 91,417.

During the year, our Church Schools have shown an increase in enrollment in every Division including a substantial increase in the number of our Youth. Our Conference is at the top in the Jurisdiction in its Training Program, Church School Day offerings have been increased over the previous year and average attendance is up approximately 500 per Sunday.

There are 45 chartered groups of Methodist Men with a membership of 2747. The estimated value of our Church buildings is \$10,404,106, and parsonages valued at \$1,321,156. We have paid for buildings and improvements \$1,169,496. Much of this money has gone into new buildings, parsonages, educational plants, and churches. Dr. Francis A. Buddin of the Little Rock District leads all other districts in money expended on buildings. The total for the Little Rock District is \$531.31. The Pine Bluff District is second with \$183,664. The Conference has raised \$500,143 more for buildings than for the previous year. We should like to name all the new building projects but space would not permit. First Church, Little Rock, has done the most magnificent job of any of us but others have done as well proportionately. It has been an era of home-base building for Methodism in the Little Rock Conference. Our pastors have been paid \$557,518 during the year and \$54,250 has been paid into the district superintendents' fund. The Episcopal Fund is in full and \$75,600 has been paid on the Conference Claimants Fund.

This Conference accepted an increase of \$35% on World Service and has overpaid it. We have an increase of \$34,171 over last year. We have paid \$14,667 for General Advance Specials, \$10,148 for Week of Dedication, \$12,605 for Conference Advance Specials, and the Woman's Societies of Christian Service have paid \$86,250 during the year to their District and Conference Treasurers. Our Wesley Foundation Fund for Fayetteville has been more than 2/3 paid and it is expected that our share of this most worthy undertaking will be met in full within a short time. Churches of the Little Rock Conference report that \$88,351 has been paid to the Hendrix Endowment Campaign; \$39,066 was raised for our Childrens' Home, and for the Retired Ministers Endowment \$51,847.65 during this year, for a total of \$251,698.03.

From a financial standpoint, for all purposes we have raised this year \$2,942,341 or \$585,812 more than during last year, and we thought that was a record.

It is our opinion that more people are attending church and church schools than ever before. The Church School, WSCS, Youth Organizations, Methodist Men, our great Church in all its phases of work seems filled with the Spirit of enthusiasm, cooperation, and determined effort for Christ and his Church. The wonderful leadership we have had at the heads of all departments and the spirit generated by our Bishop has helped us to follow HIM whose we are, and His spirit which guides us as we labor for Him.

REPORT NO. 1 OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Program: Grateful for the accomplishments of the year now closed, we, your Board of Education, look to the year ahead with the following recommendations:

- 1. That we continue to stress the building of both the membership and attendance of our Church schools, and that we take seriously the minimum goal of 70% of church membership accepted by this Episcopal Area as the Church school goal for the quadrennium.
- 2. That we give special attention to organizing new schools in industrial and urban areas into which so many people have moved in recent years.
- 3. That we join in the quadrennial emphasis on an enlarged and aggressive program to reach more youth and that we consider the placing of a full-time Director when a suitable person and funds are available.
- 4. That we continue to seek and develop needed leadership both for the local church, and for district and Conference responsibilities.
- 5. That we give emphasis through-out the year to evangelism and to training the membership and church loyalty.
- 6. That we continue the cultivation of the World Service causes through the Church school.
- 7. That we join the Town and Country Commission in a renewed and more aggressive program for meeting the needs of the rural church.
 - 8. That we evidence our interest in higher education.
 - a. by encouringing a more adequate support of Hendrix College, and by counseling Methodist students to go there for their undergraduate work.
 - b. By calling attention to the opportunities which S.M.U. affords for graduate work, particularly for ministerial training in the Perkins School of Theology.
 - c. By cooperating with the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and other possible agencies, in a study of ways and means of strengthening the student program on the campuses of Statesupported schools.
- 9. That we cooperate with the Commission in a program of vocational guidance, with particular reference to full-time Christian Service.
 - 10. That we seek to build more Christian home and family life.
- 11. That we give attention to,—and follow where practical,—the church calendar of special days and occasions, e. g. Rally Day, Promotion Day, pre-Eeaster emphasis on Evangelism, and National Home and Family Week.
- 12. That we seek to make available the needed financial resources for a comprehensive Conference program:
 - a. By requesting of the World Service Commission the maximum available from the Conference apportionments.
 - b. And by requesting that the goal for Rally Day be continued at \$5,100.00.

Conference Staff: We nominate Roy E. Fawcett as Executive Secretary of the Board and request the Bishop to appoint him to this office.

We nominate Mrs. W. F. Bates as Conference Director of Children's Work; Miss Dot Baber as Conference Director of Youth Work; and Roland M. Shelton as voluntary director of Adult Work.

Other Nominations: Board of Managers of Pastor's School: Roy E. Fawcett, Kenneth L. Spore, R. B. Moore; Committee on Certified Directors of Christian Education: Elmer L. Thomas, Margaret Marshall, George G. Meyer; Trustee of Camp Tanako: Kenneth L. Spore; Board of Directors of Wesley Foundation: Representatives of Board of Education, George G. Meyer, E. D. Trice; Campus-Church representatives: One adult and one student from each campus-church community receiving support from Wesley Foundation Funds. These representatives to be selected by the Wesley Foundation in each local situation.

Student Center at Fayetteville: We approve the request from Central Church, Fayetteville, for the appointment of a joint committee composed of representatives from the two Annual Conferences, the student body, and Central Church, this committee to be given authority to alter, or to change completely, as they may see fit, the building plans for the student center. We nominate as Conference representatives on this committee, M. W. Miller, and Roland M. Shelton. We recommend, also, that the Executive Secretaries of the two Conferences be ex-officio members of this committee.

REPORT NO. 2-A OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Hendrix is a proud member of the group of colleges of liberal education in America which are engaged in the endless search for programs and methods to develop enlightened minds and stable character. The sixty-ninth year of the service of the college to the church and to the state closed May 31st, 1953.

Enrollment for the year was 454, four less than in the preceding year. In the group were 63 ministerial students and, in addition, 37 other life service persons. Twelve denominations were represented among Hen-

drix students, but 81.28% of the total group were Methodists. The senior class this year numbered 73.

Student achievement was continued to reflect the quality of the Hendrix program. Awards and appointments won in national competition with students from other institutions have opened opportunities for several graduating seniors to continue their work in the best graduate schools of our country.

Religious life and emphasis at the campus give appropriate expression to the basic purposes of Hendrix. The annual Religion and Life Week services were of high order. Chapel programs, morning watch services, regular meetings of the Hendrix Christian Association, retreats and special events such as the North Arkansas Conference Youth Rally in March between the company of the March between the conference and the conference of the conference March have given our campus life, under leadership of students, faculty and visitors, significant experiences in worship and inspiration. Many lay students with definite plans for life work in other professions have helped in giving leadership in these activities.

We rejoice that the \$600,000 Campaign for the support of faculty salaries is moving toward successful completion. This undertaking, in which gifts are matched dollar for dollar by the General Education Board of New York, expresses the loyalty and devotion which so many friends have for Hendrix.

Trustees assumed leadership in the drive and chose Mr. J. T. Thompson of Little Rock as their chairman of the Campaign Committee. Under son of Little Rock as their chairman of the Campaign Committee. Under his leadership, arrangements were made for a rally in Hulen Hall on September 22. Two hundred eighty-five persons, ministers and laymen, representing every county in Arkansas attended this significant meeting and heard the inspiring addresses by Bishop Paul E. Martin and Dr. Marshall T. Steel. Returning home, these friends assembled groups all over the state; objectives were assumed and solicitation began. Today we can report in total subscriptions \$257,848.36, of which cash receipts amount to \$135,577.81. When we remember that the benefits to the college are double this amount, and the General Education Board has already paid \$130.000, the report is indeed gratifying already paid \$130,000, the report is indeed gratifying,

Arkansas Methodists are greatly indebted to Mr. J. T. Thompson who for weeks and months away from his business gave virtually all of his time in this important work. Trustees as a group have shown their loyal interest, both by their generous contributions and by influencing friends in their communities to help in this effort to strengthen the college. For such devotion we are most grateful.

We express our lasting appreciation also to Bishop Paul E. Martin and to all district superintendents and pastors whose effective assistance makes possible this encouraging report. A large number of laymen have also worked hard and long that this undertaking might be a success. We strongly urge that all districts and churches reach their acceptances in pledges and cash in the Campaign and that our leaders emphasize the importance of collecting in full all unpaid pledges, so that there may be no question about our meeting by December 31, 1954, the conditions of our contract with the General Education Board of New York.

We strongly recommend the observance of Methodist Student Day in every church. The Department of Loans and Scholarships in the General Board of Education depends on our gifts collected this day to extend help to able and consecrated students who are definitely interested in the program of the church. For the last two years Hendrix has had only two National Methodist Scholarship students; we should have many more than this number each year, but appropriations can not be made from the Nashville office until our Conference increases its annual contribution to the fund. We heartily commend to churches and individuals the establishment of scholarships at the college for the aid of capable and deserving young people who are not able to attend Hendrix.

The time has come for Methodists to rally to the support of the

colleges of the church. These institutions which have done such great service in past years now face increasingly strong competition from generously supported institutions of the state, difficult problems caused by the military program of our country, and budget difficulties which result from the financial pressures of this critical period. Hendrix belongs to the Methodists of Arkansas and every effort should be made to help people of our church to develop pride of ownership in their college. The General Conference has recommended a minimum goal of fifty cents per church member in support of schools and colleges and we urgently ask that our Conference move toward this objective. Our record for the last few years has remained stationary at twenty-six cents per member; we have never gone above that figure. Thirty-three Annual Conferences of the church in 1952 did more; sixteen of these have exceeded the goal of fifty cents per member. There are encouraging signs that we will move in this direction. The November Special offers great possibilities for us, and we urge pastors to stress this plan of annual giving. We recommend that November 15-22 be the week of special emphasis in 1953.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

The statistical report reveals that 5,870 persons united with the churches in the Little Rock Conference during the conference year of 1952-1953. Of this number 2085 came by vows, while 3,785 came by transfer.

Our Conference Board sponsored two United Evangelistic Missions during the year. The first was held in the Camden District, Dr. Connor

Morehead District Superintendent and Fred Schwendimann, District Secretary of Evangelism. This mission resulted in more than 400 commitments for Christ and his Church. One of the interesting features of this mission was the combining of the missionary emphasis with the evangelistic effort. An offering was taken on the last night of the mission for our work in Alaska, and more than \$3,300 was given to the missionary work. On Sunday afternoon a rally was held in Camden, First Church, at which time Bishop Martin inspired the large crowd with a great message.

Our second mission was held in the Little Rock District, H. O. Bolin District Secretary of Evangelism and Dr. Francis A. Buddin District Superintendent. A total of 466 Commitments were made for Christ and his Church. A great rally was held on Sunday morning in Robinson Auditorium at which time Bishop Bascum Watts brought a stirring message.

The Board of Evangelism feels that these two missions were a great success. We are grateful to the district superintendents and district sercetaries of evangelism for their fine leadership. We are happy that Bishop Martin reveals such a deep interest in the cause of evangelism having shared in both of our rallies.

We appreciate the fact that two of the members of our Conference, Dr. Connor Morehead and Dr. Neill Hart were chosen by the General Board of Evangelism to participate in the Cuban Mission held early this year.

The Board paid the expense of several of our men to the Spiritual Life Mission held in Washington, D. C. last fall. This proved to be a rich and rewarding experience. We hope to have a spiritual life mission in our Conference sometime in the near future.

During the conference year just ahead of us we plan to promote two evangelistic missions; one in the Arkadelphia District and the other in the Hope District.

We are providing \$150 for each of the districts of the conference to be used in sending persons to the World Convocation of Evangelism which will be held in Philadelphia, June 26-28.

We pledge our co-operation in our Sunday School and "Church Attendance Program", beginning January 1, and continuing through Easter Sunday, April 18. We will gladly share with the Board of Education in placing stress upon work with our youth, and the Board of Lay Activities in developing a finer Christian stewardship in our people.

We wish to express our appreciation for the growing interest in evangelism. Our ministers have given of their time and talents in our missions in a most sacrificial manner. Our lay ministers have gladly gone from house to house inviting others to come with them to Christ and his Church.

We thank God for his continued blessings, and through the help that comes from hi mwe hope to see even greater achievements in the work of evangelism in the future. To this we make the following recommendations:

- 1. That district-wide evangelistic missions be held during the year in the Arkadelphia and Hope Districts.
- 2. That all churches of the conference, as far as possible, practice all methods of evangelism in reaching people for Christ and his church.
- 3. We are thoroughly convinced that a combination of visitation and pulpit evangleism will work under all circumstances, we therefore, suggest that the combination of these methods be practiced in rural situations as well as in town and city churches.
- 4. We recommend that district-wide meetings be called for the primary purpose of emphasizing the program of evangelism and making definite plans for same. Not only preachers but interested lay people might be invited to attend these meetings.
 - 5. We recommend that our Conference through its Board of Evange-

lism co-operate to the fullest extent with the General Board of Evangelism in its plans with regards to a world-wide emphasis on the matter of evangelism.

- 6. We recommend that all of our pastors organize and use to the fullest extent their commissions on membership and evangelism. The General Board of Evangelism has designated the magazine entitled "Shepherds" as the official organ of the commission. We further recommend that each member of the commission be supplied with a subscription to this magazine.
- 7. We request that the Commission on World Service and Finance appropriate to the evangelistic program the same amount of money as that received last year.

The achievements of the past year cause us to thank God and take courage, but we are expecting even greater success during the year that is immediately ahead. It is our prayer that the tide of evangelism will continue to rise and that ever increasing numbers shall be won for Christ and his Church.

Your Board is always open to suggestions. We will appreciate any new ideas from any source that will help to advance the cause of evangelism in our Conference,

GROUP INSURANCE COMMITTEE

Report No. 1

We, your committee on Group Insurance, offer the following recommendations for the ensuing year:

- 1. The premiums shall be \$1.93 per thousand dollars of insurance. Of this amount the church served by the insured shall pay \$1.23 while the insured shall pay 70c.
- 2. The premium payments shall not be accepted for a shorter period of time than three months, while we earnestly urge the payment of a full year in advance.
- 3. The period of grace for non-payment of premiums shall be thirty (30) days past date of premiums due.
- 4. The Conference Treasurer shall be the treasurer for the Group Insurance Committee.
- 5. We, your committee, strongly urge that every person eligible for this insurance plan to become a part of it, especially the men who are coming into the Conference on trial and as accepted supplies.

GROUP INSURANCE COMMITTEE

Report No. 2

We, your Group Insurance Committee, do recommend that the American Hospital and Life Insurance Company be maintained as the insurors for our Annual Conference. We recommend that the following plan be accepted for the ensuing year:

I. Benefits

- 1. Room \$7 per day, 1-35 days each entry.
- 2. Incidental expense up to \$100.00.
- 3. Surgery, up to \$150.00 per entry.
- 4. Maternity benefits allowed after first nine months.
- 5. A maximum of \$15 will be payable for emergency care or treatment within 24 hours of an accident, in or out of the hospital.
- A maximum of \$1500 is allowed on the actual expense involved in any Poliomyelitis case involving any insured minister or his dependents.

II. Premiums

- 1. Payable quarterly in advance to the Conference Treasurer.
- 2. Grace period of 31 days.

3. Ministers and Dependent 18.48 63.36

Minister & 2 or more dependents 87.96

III. Particulars

1. All ministers serving appointments are eligible with their families.

2. 75% participation of eligible group is required by the Conference.

3. Health questions will be asked of applicants and their dependents who make application for the insurance.

IV. Recommendations

1. We recommend that this insurance plan be made mandatory for all ministers serving appointments under the Bishop. We strongly urge that every minister where possible shall include his family in this plan.

2. We urge all churches to cooperate with their ministers in the payment of the premiums for this insurance and suggest that they

pay at least 50% of those premiums.

3. The Conference Treasurer shall be the Treasurer to handle the

funds of this Committee.

4. Any minister who is already participating in any other Hospitalization plan with any reputable Company acceptable to the Insurance Committee will be considered to have met the mandatory requirement of this insurance plan.

The plan invites persons to join by signing a membership card and paying \$10.00 to the Conference Treasurer, and \$10.00 thereafter when called upon by the Board of Lay Activities provided no member be called upon more than three times during the Conference Year, nor more than ten times during the quadrennium. The funds collected will be used to assist newly organized churches. We urge pastors and laymen alike to join in this movement.

We pledge our continued support to our Bishop, District Superintendents, and pastors and commend them for their fine leadership.

We nominate as Conference Lay Leader Roland M. Shelton and T. A. Prewitt as our representative on the Town and Country Commission for 1953-54.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

We give sincere thanks to Bishop Paul E. Martin, the District Superintendents, pastors and members of the local churches throughout the Little Rock Conference for their cooperation and growing interest in the cause of Temperance and Sobriety.

It is increasingly plain that the liquor traffic has had its best days. It has so flagrantly abused its license that America is now prepared to reject it completely. We have the organization, the program, and the power in our hands to rise up and destroy it. Many people in all walks of life are coming to believe that the tide has turned, and that victory for true temperance only awaits the courage and the aggressiveness of the Methodist ministry and people to turn our faith and convictions into a mighty force for public and private righteousness.

Under the leadership of our General and Jurisdictional Boards of Temperance, and with the counsel and suggestion of Bishop Paul E. Martin, your conference Board has made progress in the year just closed. In keeping with paragraph 1541, section 3, of the 1952 Discipline, our District Superintendents have nominated and our Bishop is to appoint a Secretary of Temperance for each District in the Conference. Their names will appear in the 1953 Journal in connection with special appointments of the respective Districts. Temperance speakers appeared on the programs of the District Conferences and received wholehearted support by all in attendance. Temperance films have been shown in many of the churches throughout the Conference. Temperance sermons have been preached and Commitment services were conducted with the results that many of our members gladly signed pledges of total abstainence. We sent to many of our national and state representatives resolutions that would support and encourage their efforts toward legislation for curtailing the liquor traffic and its vicious propaganda. We have had encouraging replies of appreciation from the lawmakers in Washington and in the Statehouse in Little Rock. We have a Ten Point program toward which we are striving during this Quadrennium, some of which has already been accomplished. We are indebted to all who have joined heart and hand in these victories.

We offer the following recommendations for the year just ahead of us:

- 1. That two representatives are being sent to each of two schools for study: "A Youth School of Alcoholic Study" at Illinois Wesleyan University, Bloomington, Illinois, June 15-19, and "An Adult School of Alcoholic Studies" at Central College, Mt. Vernon, Iowa, June 29-July 3. The following have been nominated by our Board and approved by Bishop Martin as our representatives from this conference: Samuel Teague as a representative of our youth, and the Reverend Barry Baily to attend the Youth School; and Mrs. E. D. Galloway and the Reverend David Hankins, Jr., to attend the Adult School. In October of 1953 there will be a great Citizenship Convocation in Washington, D. C., to which will go the Chairmen of the Conference Board of Temperance and all District Secretaries of Temperance throughout the Nation. It is expected that the College of Bishops along with representatives of Church Boards and other leaders will attend. On the closing night of the Convocation a meeting will be held in Congressional Hall at which time Bishop G. Bromley Oxnam will give the principal address, and a leader in the national administration will appear on the platform. This meeting has been planned (1) to share a full briefing of the extension of our program to the local church; (2) to formulate plans for a larger and more effective commitment day service which will come this year on the first Sunday in December; (3) to coordinate current campaigns for making "Christmas Christian"; (4) to save American lives by eliminating alcohol from office parties, highway outlets, and service installations. We expect to send our Chairman and our Six District Secretaries of Temperance to this meeting.
- 2. Early in the new Conference year we plan District Seminars on Temperance, and our Bishop and members of the Cabinet are cooperating wholeheartedly with us. Those who attend the above mentioned schools and meetings, a representative from the Conference Board of Lay Activities, a member of the General Board of Temperance, perhaps Dr. Hooton himself, will be speakers during the Seminars. We urge the cooperation of all of our people in these District Meetings.

3. We again request our District Superintendents to give our Conference Temperance Board a place on the agenda of the District Conferences. It is suggested that it will give dignity and prestige to the cause of Temperance if they will kindly place this item on the printed

program.

- 4. We again urge that Temperance courses be taught in our training schools, youth camps, and assemblies, and in the local churches throughout the Conference, and that the annual Temperance Sunday be an opportunity for church school teachers to make the cause of Temperance more effective; that our pastors preach temperance sermons and show temperance films in their churches. On that Temperance Sunday opportunity should be given for an offering for the support of the Arkansas Temperance League.
- 5. We have at this session of the Conference free copies of the Voice, official organ of the General Board of Temperance. We urge that our laymen and preachers obtain a copy of this publication, and subscribe to the same.
- 6. We urge our people to continue to protest beer advertising over radio, television ,on billboards and magazines, and to urge the passing of laws prohibiting the liquor traffic from conducting its objectionable programs, teaching our children to drink.
- 7. We call attention to General Conference legislation and urge loyalty to the program of the church in creating local temperance committees in the local church as contained in paragraph 246 of the 1952 Discipline. Our pastors and lay leaders should know that the Chairmen of this important committee becomes a member of the official Board and Quarterly Conference. He should also be elected as one of the members at large on the Commission on Education.

- 8. We have resolutions prepared which will be presented at this session of the conference demanding respect for laws protecting service men against invasion from the Liquor traffic, and urging the Secretary of Defense to exclude tax free alcoholic beverages from the armed forces at home and abroad; to President Eisenhower, for his example in prayer, church support, and total abstainence. There is also a resolution urging public officials to refrain from the use of intoxicants, to concel the liquor license recently obtained by the Capitol Hill Club, to forbid the use of alcohol in any government building, and to discourage the perious practice of office drinking parties at Christmas or any other time.
- 9. We request that the Commission on World Service and Finance give us the same percentage of support for the coming year as was last year.

We request adequate support of our Board and the temperance forces to procure temperance instructions in schools, and effective local option in every community.

10. We are fortunate this year to have as our Temperance speaker Dr. G. Lemuel Fenn, pastor of the First Methodist Church, Tulsa, Okla., who is a member of the General Board of Temperance, and the Chairman of the Southern Central Jurisdiction of the Board of Temperance. Dr. Fenn will meet with our Conference Board of Temperance and the District Secretaries of Temperance at 2:00 P. M. this afternoon. We shall hear him sympathetically and prayerfully.

MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSIONS

Your Conference Board of Missions recommends:

- 1. That District Missionary Institutes be planned and promoted in cooperation with each District Superintendent, District Missionary Secretary, and the District President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service.
- 2. That the Board of Missions, in cooperation with Bishop Paul E. Martin and the District Superintendents, bring a missionary from one of the foreign fields into the Conference for a month to speak in local churches and at district meetings to promote missionary education.
- 3. That the month of January be designated as Missionary Education Month when the Church Commission on Missions, the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the Commission on Education join in conducting a "Church-Wide School of Missions" with a goal of "A School of Missions in every Charge in January", using Bishop Gerald Kennedy's book, "Heritage and Destiny".
- 4. That the month of November be set as "World Outlook Month" to secure an enlarged number of subscriptions to our General Missionary Education magazine.
- 5. That the Conference Board of Missions assume responsibility in promoting the Convocation on Urban Life within the Conference and we nominate Aubrey G. Walton, Mrs. E. B. Matkin, John L. Hoover, C. Ray Hozenhorf, and Arthur Terry to the Sub-Committee on Urban Life and request Bishop Martin to appoint them.
- 6. That World Mission Specials, Kenai, Alaska Specials, the "1000 Club", and Overseas Relief Specials be emphasized throughout 1953-54.
- 7. That consideration be given to the possibility of holding Institutes with other Boards and Agencies on Evangelism, Education, Stewardship and Missions.
- 8. We nominate C. Ray Hozendorf Conference Missionary Secretary and request that the Bishop appoint him to that office.
- 9. Your Conference Board of Missions operates on a policy of allocating one-third of the money received to Church Extension and two-thirds for Salary Supplementation and operation, appropriating only that amount on hand at Annual Conference, thus operating on a cash basis. We recommend that this policy be continued.
- 10. This Board has the responsibility of administering the funds of the "1000 Club". We recommend the following procedure:
 - 1. That only new church organizations that have begun the first unit of their building program since General Conference in May 1952 are eligible.
 - That application for aid be made on the forms used for applying for a donation from the Conference Board of Missions.

REPORT OF THE LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Beginning June 1952, new goals were set before the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild. These goals, spiritual growth, widening fellowship, a World Church, Peace, Missions, and Discipleship all present a pattern for our work here at home and around the world.

Our total membership is 12,121 including the Wesleyan Service Guild. We have 213 societies and 25 district members.

Our financial pledge to the Woman's Division of Christian Service was slightly overpaid this last year and a total of \$79,849 was sent through our Conference Treasurer to the Division. \$76,403 of this was on appropriations. Money raised and spent for Local Church Activities was in excess of the amount sent to the Division.

We support Orlene McKinney in Mexico; Wanda Stahley in India and have at this time one rural worker and another such worker coming to our Conference June 1st. We have two urban workers and the Directors of Aldersgate Camp.

We share in the support of a Narcotic Education Director, student work on the college campuses, and Fellowship Team Training Laboratory.

We have in our Conference a Student Loan Fund supported by local societies, from which selected youth may secure a substantial sum of money for their junior and senior years in college. These students must be life service volunteers.

To assist in keeping before our youth the great need and opportunities for life service, we sponsor annually a Missionary Tour. This means that we make it possible for at least twenty-five young people to visit our institutions and projects. This year, they were taken to Nashville, Tennessee, and to Kansas City, Missouri, where we have Scarrit College and National Training College. We feel this is one of the best means for recruiting new workers.

Our schools of missions, in the Jurisdiction, Conference, District and sub-district levels: our World Friendship Workshops for youth and the cooperation with the Board of Education in the Institutes for Children's Work, all afford our women opportunities for Missionary Education of highest quality. Our Conference was represented at the World Mission Conference and Annual Meeting of the Woman's Division at Buck Hill Falls, Pennsylvania, this spring.

Evangelism was a major emphasis at our Conference and all District meetings this spring, and we shall continue to emphasize this during the coming year.

TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

Statistics will show that the Little Rock Conference is predominantly rural. 68% of the 475 churches are in the open country; 16% in towns less than 1000; and 4% in towns under 2,500; or a total of 88% of all

churches in the Conference in towns of 2,500 or less. This means that we must study the rural church, concern ourselves about it, and plan a dynamic and intelligent program of service with their cooperation to meet the needs. No church stands still, and the rural church lives in the existing society and must meet the needs of that society.

Because of the limited funds of the Town and Country Commission we cannot assume the task of planning a thoroughgoing rural program on an over all Conference level. Therefore, we recommend that each District, through the District Superintendent, the pastors of the churches involved, and the leaders of these churches initiate programs to help all rural churches to serve the Methodist constituency adequately.

- The first step we recommend is to study the needs of the rural areas.
- 2. That natural areas be determined and the leaders organize for service.
- 3. That the District Staff, and the Conference Leadership, when needed, develop plans to meet the needs discovered, and that a District Committee on Rural Work be organized.
- 4. The Group Ministry Plan is recommended as the framework through which the natural areas may work.
- 5. We recommend that Rural Life Institutes be planned to help give the rural church a sense of belonging, or not going it alone, with leadership from the Boards of Education, Missions, and Evangelism, and the Woman's Society of Christian Service, as well as such community agencies as Agricultural agents, Home Demonstration agents, Welfare and health agencies.
- 6. We recommend the Town and Country Development program to all rural churches as a means of self evaluation and urge participation in it.
- We recommend that great emphasis be given to the Lay Speaking program, and that each Quarterly Conference certify qualified lay speakers.
- 8. We suggest that the District Superintendents and District Stewards find ways to provide funds for the promotion of rural work in the District
- 9. We respectfully ask the Bishop to emphasize the importance of this work,
- 10. We request the Commission on World Service and Finance to give us the same apportionment for another year.
- 11. Clyde T. Parsons is nominated as Executive Secretary and Bishop Martin is requested to appoint him to this office.

REPORT OF CAMP TANAKO

We are glad to report progress in the development of Camp Tanako during the Conference year now closing. We have added a 20,000 gallon storage tank and extended the necessary water lines over the grounds, constructed the Faye McRae Library, a camp store, two adjoining concrete tennis courts for general recreational activities, built a swimming beach, hard-surfaced the road within the camp grounds, and improved the athletic field. Considering the fact that during much of the time it has been necessary to work with a small force in order to keep the

over-head cost at a minimum, we feel that the results of the year's building have been encouraging.

The Board has employed as camp architect, one of our own fine laymen, Mr. Charles Carter, to direct the planning and building program. Under his competent supervision, the Board is seeking to do longrange planning in the laying out of the grounds, and with brick and concrete, to build with such permanence that the structures placed on the grounds may normally be expected to be in service for many years to come.

An experienced executive of a strong insurance firm has personally checked our properties, and is giving the Board good coverage at a minimum cost. We have also taken the necessary steps to have our acreage included in the fire-prevention program of the National Forestry Service so that we now have this added protection against possible fire hazards.

The Health Department is rendering a fine service by keeping the lake shore and grounds sprayed to safeguard against mosquitoes and other disease spreading insects. At our request, the Department analyzed the drinking water, and has inspected the grounds and buildings in the interest of general health conditions.

We wish more people could see first-hand the possibilities which the location affords. We hope that it may me possible for many who have not been on the grounds to pay the Camp a visit some time during the camping season.

We recommend the following financial policy:

1. The same apportionment from World Service as last year (8%), for which request is hereby made.

- 2. Where practical the Camp be included in the local budget, the amount to be raised by special offering or otherwise as deemed best, and that churches not including the Camp in the budget take a special offering on the 4th Sunday in April or as near thereto as practical.
- 3. Continued encouragement of gifts from churches, groups and individuals.

COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

The Methodist Church in the United States has a very serious respon-The Methodist Church in the United States has a very serious responsibility for the establishment of world peace, for its members sit in the seat of great power. We are citizens of a most influential nation, whose foreign policy is determined by our votes. We are Protestants and as such constitute the dominant religious group in the nation and in Congress. As Methodists we are the largest single Protestant group, one which is well organized and has a statement on war and peace approved by its General Conference.

What are we doing in the Little Rock Conference to fulfill our part of this responsibility? What are we doing as ministers? As laymen? It is clear that we are not doing enough. By our apathy and neglect we allow the unenlightened and the unconverted to determine the course of history.

Our Beliefs

We note and oppose those forces in American life which would retreat to isolationism. Fearful of imagined interference in our domestic affairs, contrary to the United Nations Charter itself, these advocates of a policy of "going it alone" undermine United States leadership in the councils of the nations. Every new obstacle in the search for peace and security is invoked by the opponents to weaken support of the United Nations. Misinformation and unjustified fears confuse and discourage a public not yet sufficiently armed with specific knowledge to combat them.

The primary function of the United Nations is to transfer the settlement of disputes from the battlefield to the processes of discussion, mediation, arbitration, conciliation, and eventually law. In spite of the difficulties persistent efforts should be made to secure the cessation of hostilities in Korea and Indo-China. We assert our faith that such cessation will be shortly obtained. A genuine over-all settlement will probably require a greater willingness on the part of the United States, as well as on the part of the Soviet Union and the Peoples Government of China, to explore a broad political settlement in the Far East. Such a settlement will include the question of membership of the Peoples Government of China in the United Nations, as well as the question of the future of Formosa, and the rearmament of Japan.

The responsibilities in Korea accorded us by the United Nations test our courage, our wisdom and our capacity for consultation. Notice, advice, consultation are the minimum demands of collective action.

The contribution of the United States to the budget of the U.N. is a minute fraction of our total budget. We favor increased rather than reduced American contributions to the U.N. While supporting the principle, now adopted by the U.N., that the United States contribution to the regular budget shall not exceed one-third, we believe that the U.S. could and should make larger voluntary contributions to the U.N. technical assistance and other special programs.

We call for a bold world program of economic aid and technical assistance to combat hunger, disease, and illiteracy to be channeled mainly through the United Nations. Such a program should be divorced from military and strategic considerations. During the last three years the U. S. and the U. N. have made only a beginning in the technical assistance field. We advocate the establishment of an International Development Authority under the U. N. charged with the duty of promoting world development toward overcoming starvation, preventable disease, and illiteracy, and toward raising the standard of living of disadvantaged people.

As a minimum, we urge the United States Congress to extend the Reciprocal Trade Program beyond its expiration date of June 1953. In addition, we favor the further reduction of tariffs and removal of other restrictive trade barriers. With nations that are economically developed, we should heed in so far as possible their pleas of "trade, not aid". Reducing trade barriers is a world problem.

We support the continuing efforts of the United Nations to promote human rights by every possible means, including the drafting of covenants for ratification by Member states. We urge ratification of the genocide convention pending now for two years before the United States Senate. We likewise urge United States adherence to the U. N. Convention on the political rights of women. We support U. N. inquiry into forced labor as an instrument of controlling political opposition.

We are opposed to the Bricker Constitutional amendment that would curb the power of the President to make executive agreements or limit the power of the President to make executive agreements or limit the power of the President and the Senate to make treaties. Not only would these admendments hamper the capacity of the President and the Senate to protect the rights and liberties of American citizens and our national interests, but provisions of these proposed amendments would limit effective U. S. participation in the United Nations.

We deplore reliance upon military strength and military alliances instead of the power of right and the reign of law. Fifty billion dollars for military expenditures with all the attendant threats to the security of other nations through the development of atomic and hydrogen bombs, the attempt to adopt universal military training here as well as the maintenance of air bases in all parts of the world, the increasing military influence in our schools, colleges, and scientific research institutions—all these are further indications of a change of emphasis from mediation, negotiation and diplomacy to an increasing reliance upon force or threat of force for settling differences with other nations.

We reiterate our determined opposition to universal military training. We view with apprehension the growing dependence upon armaments for achieving full employment. We encourage the Department of Commerce, the Department of Labor, business and labor organizations to intensify their studies devoted to the complex problems of conversion to an economy based upon production for civilian needs.

Our Program of Action

We submit the following items as our Little Rock program for the Conference Year of 1953-54 and ask your approval of it: (1) The establishment of peace committees in local churches. (2) The mailing of materials to these committees which will give them guidance in their work. (3) The holding of district workshops for the training of members of local church committees. (4) The sending of delegates from this Conference to important national meetings for their training and inspiration, such as the National Study Conference on World Order of the National Council of Churches in Cleveland in October and a South Central Jurisdiction Seminar at the United Nations. (5) The holding of at least one meeting of the Conference Peace Committee during the Conference year. (6) The appropriation by the Annual Conference of enough money to make these actions possible.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Report No. 1

Whereas the General Conference of The Methodist Church of 1952 advocated and instituted a program of promotion in Stewardship of Possessions for Methodist people everywhere.

Therefore, in compliance with the church-wide program of Stewardship the Commission on World Service and Finance of the Little Rock Conference makes the following recommendations to the Conference:

- 1. That the Little Rock Conference employ a Director of Stewardship whose duties shall be (1) to set up and promote a program of Stewardship and Tithing throughout the Conference, (2) to promote financial campaigns in local churches of the Conference to raise funds for buildings or for local church budgets.
- 2. That this program of Stewardship and the work of the Director of Stewardship be set up and be under the direction of a Conference Committee on Stewardship and such committee to be constituted as follows:

5. That each local church in the Little Rock Conference which uses the services of the Director of Stewardship in a fund-raising campaign pay to the Conference General Administration Fund an amount equal to 1% of the total pledged in same campaign. If and when it is deemed advisable that the Director of Stewardship render services outside the boundaries of the Little Rock Conference, the per cent to be paid shall be 2%. All expenses in the local Church campaign including traveling, entertainment and other expenses of the Director shall be borne by the local church.

- 6. All money accruing in the Conference General Administration Fund from the Financial Campaigns in various local churches is to be equally divided by the Conference Treasurer and returned to the funds from which loans were made to secure resources for the instituting of said program. This money is to be returned to these funds until local loans are refunded.
- 7. We recommend further that the Director of Stewardship be duly appointed by the Bishop upon nomination of the Committee on Stewardship and election by the Conference.
- 8. Finally, it is the opinion of the Commission on World Service and Finance that in the very near future, if not the first year, that the entire annual financial program of said Committee on Stewardship will be fully covered by the various campaigns in local churches. In addition, it is felt that the added incomes for the various phases of the Kingdom's Program in the Conference will more than justify such a program.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Report No. 2

Recommendations to the Little Rock Conference by the Commission on World Service and Finance pertaining to the Conference Unified Treasurer:

Whereas at the 1952 session of the Little Rock Annual Conference, resolutions were adopted authorizing the employing of a Unified Conference Treasurer, with an added stipulation that the Treasurer live in Little Rock.

Furthermore the Conference, acting upon the recommendation of the Commission on World Service and Finance, elected Fred Gantt to said position. At the time of his assuming office, Mrs. Gantt was seriously ill and upon the doctor's advice, the Commission on World Service and Finance, after consultation with the Cabinet and The Conference Board Chairmen, granted Mr. Gantt permission to retain for the rest of the conference year, his home in Texarkana, which was his place of residence at that time.

Furthermore the condition of Mrs. Gantt throughout the year and at the present time is such that their moving to Little Rock is still unwise.

We, therefore, recommend to the Little Rock Conference that Mr. Gantt be permitted to continue in the office of Conference Treasurer and to retain his residence in Texarkana until such time as he can move to Little Rock, without endangering the health of his wife.

We, furthermore, recommend that the salary of the Conference
Treasurer be increased to \$5000.00. Both present salary and increase is to
be paid out of Conference Expense Fund as originally authorized in the
1952 resolutions calling for the election of a Unified Conference Treasurer.

When and if this increase in salary is authorized, the Commission on World Service and Finance recommends specifically that the Conference Treasurer be required to give full time service to said office, and that he be not otherwise gainfully employed. Also that monthly reports be made to all Conference Boards and that a quarterly report be sent to the Arkansas Methodist and that the Conference Treasurer attend meetings that require the presence of the Treasurer with his traveling expenses to come out of the Conference Expense Fund.

The Commission on World Service and Finance pledges its co-operation to Mr. Gantt and to the various Boards and interests of the Conference to make the work of the Conference Treasurer as efficient as possible.

We, your Commission on World Service and Finance, submit the following report:

1. The amount apportioned to this Annual Conference by the General Commission on World Service and Finance is \$75,898.00.

2. The amount apportioned for Conference work be the same amount, \$75,898.00.

3. Combining these apportionments for General and Annual Conference work, we have a total of \$151,796.00.

4. We recommend the sum of \$750.00 for Area expense, concurring

in a request from the Bishop and his cabinet.

- 5. Concurring with a request from the Bishop we recommend the allotting of an amount of \$300.00 from the District Superintendent's Salary Fund, to defray the traveling expenses of the District Superintendent's tendent to the Area Conference.
- 6. The amount apportioned for General Administration and the South Central Jurisdiction annual budget is \$7,797.00. General Administration \$3,062.00, the South Central \$4,735.00.
- 7. The amount apportioned for the Episcopal Fund is to be an amount equal to two per cent of the cash salaries of the pastors for the current

8. Your Commission concurs with the action of the Conference in continuing for another year the Superannuate Endowment Fund campaign and urges each church to reach its quota within the year.

- 9. We recommend that the Treasurer be authorized to pay \$15.00 for membership in the Methodist Historical Society of the Conference and the National and International Methodist Historical Society; also that the Treasurer pay the expense for securing the photos of the class On Trial and each minister who retires.
- 10. We authorize our Treasurer to cooperate with First Church, Little Rock, and to pay the proper official of said church any deficit in Conference entertainment expense.
- 11. At the suggestion of the Board of Education, we recommend the Fourth Sunday in September as Church School Day and urge all our churches to cooperate.
- 12. We call attention to the campaign for Hendrix College Endowment, urging all churches to continue the campaign until the total goal is achieved.
- 13. We recommend the sum of \$10,000.00 for Ministerial Education and the Pastor's School, conducted each year at Hendrix College.
- 14. We urge our churches to continue their support of Camp Tanako. Concurring with the request from the Camp Board we are urging all churches to either include the Camp program in their annual financial budget or to take the fourth Sunday of April as Camp Sunday at which time a free-will offering may be made to this project.
- 15. Your Commission desires to express its appreciation for the work being done in the Area office of Methodist Information and hereby recommends the continuation of the appropriation of \$1000.00 to promote the same.
 - 16. Your Commission nominates Fred Gantt as Conference Treasurer

and sets his salary at \$5000.00 per year and \$600.00 per year for office expense.

- 17. Your Commission concurs in the request of the Bishop and the cabinet and recommends that \$300.00 per year be paid to the statistician out of the Conference Expense Fund and that this provision be retroactive for 1952-53.
- 18. We recommend a charge of 3% on all funds handled by the Conference Treasurer, excepting Conference Claimants and Superannuate Endowment, and this money to be set up by Treasurer as Conference Administrative Fund, in accordance with the Conference Standing Rules.
- 19. The amount apportioned to this Annual Conference for the Inter-denominational Cooperation Fund is \$2,449.00.
- 20. The Commission recommends that the percent of 10% of all Pastor's Cash Salaries be apportioned for the District Superintendent's Fund.

COMMISSION ON EPISCOPAL RESIDENCE

Two years ago the two Arkansas Conferences passed identical resolutions authorizing and directing the Commission on Episcopal Residence to sell the Episcopal Residence at 205 Colonial, Little Rock, and invest the proceeds in more suitable property. The resolution also authorized and directed the Trustees of the Little Rock Conference in whom title to such property is vested to execute any and all deeds of conveyance and such mortgages and notes that may be necessary in the acquisition of such other property.

While we did not make a full-time job of carrying this mandate out during the first year, yet considerable time and energy were spent in looking at numerous houses none of which seemed to meet the requirements any better or as well as 205 Colonial.

One year ago the two Conferences were kind enough to give us another chance and after two or three meetings of the Commission it was decided that in order to come nearer to getting the kind of Episcopal Residence we would like to have, we should buy a lot and build it. We think we were fortunate to find a lot in a good neighborhood not too far away from the center of this rapidly growing city. It is located at 3909 South Lookout on a ridge overlooking the Arkansas River. It is 100 feet front by 294 feet deep.

The lot cost \$6500.00 and Bishop Martin let us have \$600.00 from the Ark.-La. Area to make the down payment and Mr. and Mrs. Ed L. Gaunt, from whom we bought the lot, gave us 90 days within which to pay the balance.

Then the real work started. Desiring to build it as nearly as possible like Bishop and Mrs. Martin wanted we asked them to take the lead in the plans. They were most cooperative and when the plans were completed, we accepted the bid of General Contractor, John L. Ulmer, as the one which looked like the best.

Then the question of finances came up, which was answered as follows:

We believe that we have reached our objective which was to build a home in which the Martins would be comfortable and happy, and we are confident that all of you join us in harboring the hope that they are permitted to live in it from here on out.

SPECIAL SESSION

LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCE

DECEMBER 11, 1952

LAKESIDE METHODIST CHURCH PINE BLUFF, ARKANSAS

Conference Organized—A Special Session of the Little Rock Annual Conference was called to order at 9:30 o'clock Wednesday morning, December 11, 1952 by Bishop Paul E. Martin. Hymn number 162 "O for a Thousand Tongues" was sung, after which prayer was offered by J. A. Wade. Hymn number 213 "My faith looks up to Thee" was sung.

Roll Call—The Secretary, R. B. Moore, perfected the roll.

Conference Welcomed—Bishop Paul E. Martin presented Otto W. Teague, host pastor, who spoke some words of welcome and presented Mr. Leslie Helvie, General Superintendent of the Church School of the Lakeside Church, who welcomed the members of the conference and visitors.

Purpose of the Session—Bishop Martin stated the purpose of the Special Session of the conference.

Transferred In—The transfer of Dempsey Gene Salter from the Southwest Texas Conference, and James E. Hull from the Alabama Conference were announced.

Elected Elders—Fred R. Harrison, chairman of the Ministerial Training and Qualifications Committee, recommended that Dempsey Gene Salter and James E. Hull be elected to elders orders. They were elected. This was done as a courtesy to the men and conferences named, in order that these men might be available for immediate service in the Chaplaincy in the Armed forces.

Transferred Out—Dempsey Gene Salter was transferred to the Southwest Texas Conference and James E. Hull was transferred to the Alabama Conference.

Conference Board of Trustees—J. E. Cooper brought a report from the Conference Board of Trustees and offered a resolution originating in that board.

Telegram to Bishop W. C. Martin—Bishop Paul E. Martin announced that Bishop W. C. Martin had been elected President of the Federal Council of Churches meeting in Denver, Colorado. The Secretary was instructed to send a telegram to Bishop W. C. Martin bearing the interest and appreciation of the Little Rock Conference in this high honor which had come to him.

Advance Special—Arthur Terry, chairman of the Joint Committee on Advance and Commission on Promotion and Cultivation, and C. Ray Hozendorf, Secretary, brought the report of the Committee. Arthur Terry spoke to the report.

Dr. D. P. Murphy, of the General Board of Missions (Executive Secretary, Section of Church Extension) also spoke to the report.

Connor Morehead, Superintendent of the Camden District, who was a member of the Evangelistic Mission in Alaska last Spring, spoke about our work there.

Bishop Martin spoke of his personal experiences in some of the Mission Stations in India and Alaska. The report was adopted.

Stewardship—Bishop Martin presented Mr. Roland M. Shelton, Conference Lay Leader, who gave the report of the Jurisdiction Committee on Stewardship and spoke to the report.

Texas Conference Lay Leader—Mr. Pat Thompson, Lay Leader of the Texas Conference was presented. He spoke on Stewardship.

Hendrix College—Bishop Martin presented Mr. J. T. Thompson, who brought a report on the \$600,000 campaign for Hendrix College.

Adjournment—The morning session was adjourned to meet again at 1:45 P M

Afternoon Session

Called to Order—The Afternoon Session was called to order and hymn number 249 "I Love to Tell the Story" was sung, after which Dr. J. M. Workman led the conference in prayer.

Committee on Courtesies—Guests, new members of the conference, institutional representatives were presented

Resolution—A. J. Christie submitted a resolution for the Board of Missions.

Trustee of Conference Board Elected—Mr. Gus Orr was nominated by E. D. Galloway to fill the unexpired term of the late Dr. Rowe Smith on the Conference Board of Trustees. He was elected.

Deaconess—Miss Margaret Marshall spoke on the work of the deaconesses, calling the attention of the conference to the new personnel of the Deaconess Board of the quadrennium.

Board of Education—E. C. Rule, Chairman of the Board of Education, presented the report of the Board of Education with recommendations for the work in the field of education for the quadrennium. Roy E. Fawcett, Executive Secretary of the Little Rock Conference Board of Education, spoke on the goals and purposes in the program for the quadrennium.

Hendrix College.—Dr. Matt L. Ellis, president of Hendrix College, was presented. He spoke briefly about Hendrix and its work.

Committee on Minutes—Fred R. Harrison and C. R. Hozendorf were nominated and elected to serve with the secretary, R. B. Moore, to perfect the minutes of the Special Session.

Nominations—Connor Morehead, secretary of the Cabinet, nominated those necessary to complete the committee on Advance in compliance with the Discipline as follows: Mrs. H. King Wade, E. R. Vansickle, Mrs. L. B. Tooley, J. H. Hutchinson, Jerry L. Patterson and Mrs. E. B. Matkin.

Evangelism—Cecil R. Culver, executive secretary of the conference board of evangelism, presented the recommendations and goals of evangelism for the quadrennium. It was adopted.

Committee on World Service and Finance—A. C. Carraway, secretary of the commission on World Service and Finance for the conference brought the report of that commission. W. Neill Hart, chairman, spoke to the report. It was adopted.

Adjournment—Bishop Martin closed the Special Session with a statement summarizing the goals and objectives for the quadrennium and those things held up by the session. He pronounced the benediction.

ARKANSAS-LOUISIANA AREA PROGRAM FOR 1952-56

Recommendations prepared by the Area Council in session in Little Rock, October 14-15, at the First Methodist Church and approved at the Special Session of the Little Rock Conference in Pine Bluff, Arkansas, December 11, 1952.

Stewardship

- 1. February, in each year of the quadrennium, be designated as the month of tithing emphasis in every church or charge in the area, preceded by proper promotion and cultivation.
- 2. We promote financial Stewardship among all our people with the following aims:
 - A. Enroll a minimum of one tither for every ten Methodists in each local church, and in addition, one proportionate giver in some other, preferably larger, proportion in accordance with income.

- B. Secure at least 75% of the active members of each local Church as pledges to the financial program of the church and to raise the level of giving on the part of those now already pledging.
- C. Give special attention to the study and practice of financial Stewardship among our children and youth.
- D. Promote a study of the mechanics of tithing among all income groups of the Church.
- 3. We organize Methodist Men's Groups in all three conferences as requested by the General Board of Lay Activities.
- 4. We ask the Board of Education to reactivate our teachers qualified to teach financial stewardship and to offer courses or training on financial Stewardship.
- 5. A sound financial plan be prepared for every church based on regular, systematic and generous giving by every member. We recognize the high value of the Farrow Plan and recommend its use where practicable.
- 6. We encourage circulation of the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist, our excellent church papers.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1-Conference Promotion

Briefly summarized, we recommend the goals recently set by the Area Council, as our Conference objectives for the rest of the conference year and the quadrennium. These objectives are as follows:

- 1. That we take seriously the reaching of 70% of church membership as the church school goal for the current quadrennium and that a corresponding effort be made to build up the average attendance.
- 2. That an appropriate type of leadership training be made available to every church in the Conference.
- 3. That special attention be focused on the reaching of more youth for whom our churches are responsible.
- 4. That emphasis be placed on evangelism and church loyalty, and that our workers cooperate fully in the church-wide effort to reach more persons for Christ and the church.
- 5. The continuation of the missionary emphasis both in the matter of instruction and giving.
- 6. That the church school cooperate with other agencies in the task of building more Christian home and family life.

Report No. 2—Hendrix College

We commend Hendrix College as an integral part of Methodism's program of Christian Education for the State, and request the fullest cooperation in its program of student enlistment, and in the financial campaign now in progress.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE DEACONESS BOARD

At the General Conference of 1948 a committee was set up to study the organization and work of the deaconess in the Methodist Church. As a result, the work and membership of the Conference Deaconess Board has been enlarged. The membership included the active deaconesses in the conference, the members of the cabinet, ministers of each local church employing deaconesses, four representatives of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, one representative from the Commission on Christian Vocations, and one representative, not a deaconess, from the local board of managers of each project within the conference where deaconess live or are employd. Retired deaconesses shall have honorary membership.

The duties of the board are to hold an annual meeting, elect officers, work through an executive committee, and promote the cause of the deaconess work in the conference. It shall report to the Annual Conference, the Jurisdiction Deaconess Association, and the Commission on Deaconess Work.

This board will be organized after the selection of the representatives on the call of the Bishop.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

The Little Rock Conference Commission on World Service and Finance in Session at Pine Bluff, Thursday, December 11, 1952, makes the following recommendations to the Conference for its approval:

- 1. That the Little Rock Annual Conference authorize the continuation of the policy—granting the Conference Treasurer the authority to set aside an amount of 3% of all funds paid to the Conference Treasurer, with the exception of the Conference Claimants Fund, this per cent set aside to constitute the Conference Administration Fund.
- 2. That the Conference Treasurer be authorized to pay to the Historical Commission of the Conference an amount up to \$300.00 to defray the expenses of securing and printing of historical data of the Conference.
- 3. That the Conference Treasurer be authorized to set up a fund to \$2000.00 for the Centennial Pageant Committee of the Conference, such pageant is to be presented during the next session of the Little Rock Annual Conference in Little Rock and the Conference Treasury is to be reimbursed from proceeds of offering or ticket sale for such an amount or for such an amount that is available from such receipts.

- 6. We recommend above all that as ministers and laymen we practice the holy habits and completely surrender our lives to Him that we may live like our Christ and be a flaming evangel for Him.

Memoirs

MRS. HERSTON P. HOLLAND

She was a wife, loyal and blessed and true. She was a mother, intelligent, strong, devoted, tender. She was a pastor's wife, steady, faithful, self-forgetful and consecrated. In each of a widening series of relationships she lived well and made her life a source of blessing to those who knew her. Then on the late evening of February 16, 1953, her spirit deserted the earthly tabernacle in that experience we mortals call death, but which in our moments of faith and vision we know is going home.

Marie Belk Holland was born in Bowling Green, Kentucky, September 29th, 1911. Her parents, Robert and Lucy Belk, were members of the Baptist church and on her conversion in childhood she became a member of that church. On December 23rd, 1930, she was united in marriage with Herston R. Holland, who at that time was a young Arkansas school teacher. She united with the Methodist Church in which her husband was an active member. Then she stood with him as he was licensed to be a preacher in that Church and as he began to give his service to the church as a minister of the gospel. In 1938 she went with him as he joined the Little Rock Conference and they became itinerants

wholly engaged in the service of the church.

For fifteen years Marie Holland made a part of an effective team who served with great fruitfulness where they were appointed. She was not the sort of person to make herself prominent, except in service. She had a worthy place in the work of the churches they served, and made her Christian life count significantly. CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

- 1. Nominations. The District Superintendents shall nominate all members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees except as otherwise provided.
- 2. Conference Program. The program for the session of the Annual Conference shall be arranged by a Planning Committee at least thirty days before the convening of the session and published in advance of the session. This Committee shall be composed of the Bishop, the Secretary of the Conference, the Statistician, the Treasurer, the District Superintendents, the Pastor-host, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference President of the W. S. C. S., the Conference President of the M. Y. F., the Chairmen of all Boards, Conference Corporations, Commissions and Committees, and the executive officers of all boards or commissions having such officers, and anyone else whom, in the judgment of the Bishop, should be called in, in any year. This Committee shall provide for all preaching, inspirational and anniversary services, of the Annual Conference session. The program thus arranged, may be revised by Conference action.
- 3. Financial and Statistical. (1) The District Superintendents shall furnish the statistician with all assessments and acceptances of the pastoral charges not less than sixty day before the meeting of the Annual Conference. These figures shall be official. (2) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars, with no column for cents. (3) Each pastor shall report to the Conference Treasurer and turn in his statistical report to the statistician at a date set by the cabinet.
- 4. Memoirs. There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased Clerical Member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, names of children, charges served and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with his memoir. The memoirs of the wives or widows of clerical members of the Conference shall be published in the Journal. The names of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs the passing of any person whose memoir should appear in the Journal.
- 5. Administrative Fund. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall recommend an assessment for a Conference administrative fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expense of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this fund. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the fund. Payments from the fund shall be made only on vouchers signed by the secretary of the Conference; provided that this rule does not relate to the salary and expenses of the Treasurer of the Conference.
- 6. Conference Treasurer. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the Conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer on recommendation of the World Service Commission, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.
- 7. Number of Districts. There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Conference.

- 8. District Superintendents' Salaries and Expenses. The District Superintendents shall each receive an annual salary, paid monthly, equal in amount to the average salary of the pastors receiving the ten highest salaries. For travel expense they shall each receive an additional amount of 20% of the salary, but not more than \$1200 per year, paid monthly to the superintendents, to be used at the discretion of the superintendents, individually. All money paid the pastors, referred to in this rule, except house rent and travel expense, shall be counted as salary for the purposes of this rule. The district stewards of each district shall appropriate money for office, secretarial, and other expenses of their superintendent, except salary and travel expense, and allocate the same to the several charges. The World Service Commission shall work out the details of this program in keeping with the provisions of this rule and make an assessment on several pastoral charges sufficient to pay the superintendents and other expenses of the program; this assessmennt to be paid by the charges bearing a percentage relationship to the salary of the principal pastor of each charge.
- 9. District Fund. The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall report to the district conference, annually, showing receipts and disbursements.
- 10. Reports and Resolutions. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the Journal shall be typewritten in triplicate on special forms funrished by the Conference, and obtained from the Conference Secretary or Statistician.
- 11. Membership of Historical Society. The Historical Society shall be composed of ten members, one of whom shall be the Conference Secretary. In addition to the duties outlined in the Discipline, the Society shall secure a group picture of each class admitted on trial for publication in the Journal; and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his retirement.
- 12. District Conferences. There shall be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline and one additional member from each pastoral charge, provided, however, in charges of more than five hundred members there shall be one additional member for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.
- 13. Lay Members. Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the Pastor-host of the Annual Conference at least fifteen days before the session of the Annual Conference.
- 14. Board Service. No person may be nominated to serve on the same conference board for more than two consecutive quadrenniums, and may not be nominated to serve on more than one board at the same time. District Superintendents may not serve on Conference Boards, except as provided in the Discipline or by specific conference action. A person failing to attend a board of which he is a member, in a quadrennium may be continued only by special board action. The rule applies to the following boards: Education, Missions, Temperance, Evangelism, Ministerial Training, Hospital and Home, Christian Literature, The Bible Board, and such other boards as the Annual Conference may direct.
- 15. Inter-Board Committee. There shall be an Inter-board Committee composed of the Presiding Officers of the following boards and agencies: the W.S.C.S., the M.Y.F., the Committee on Christian Vocations, Camp Tanako, the Town and Country Commission, the Arkansas Methodist,

the Board of Lay Activities, Missions, Temperance, Education, Evangelism, Ministerial Training, Conference Claimants, Hospital and Homes, and other such boards, and officers as the Conference may direct to have such duties as the Annual Conference may from time to time prescribe.

- 16. Entertainment. The Conference shall meet on a self entertainment plan, except that the retired ministers shall be entertained from the entertainment fund. Each member of the Conference, both clerical and lay, in attendance shall pay \$1.00 registration fee to the entertainment fund, and all offering unless otherwise specified shall go to the fund. The entertainment fund shall be administered by the Pastor-host or such person or persons as he may appoint, reporting in the next session of the Annual Conference.
- 17. Conference Expense. Registration fees and the offerings at the public services in the session of the Annual Conference shall be used to defray the expense of the session, and that any deficit remaining be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund, and the Conference Treasurer shall pay the same.
- 18. Amendments. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.
