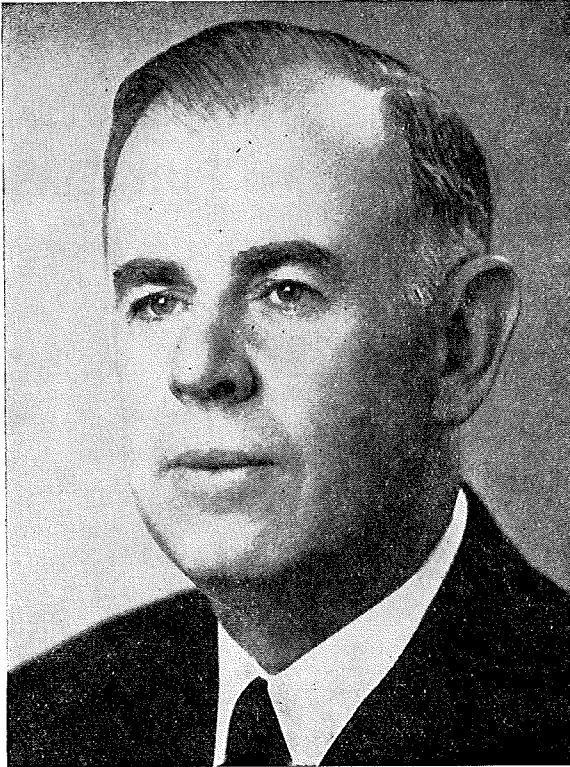

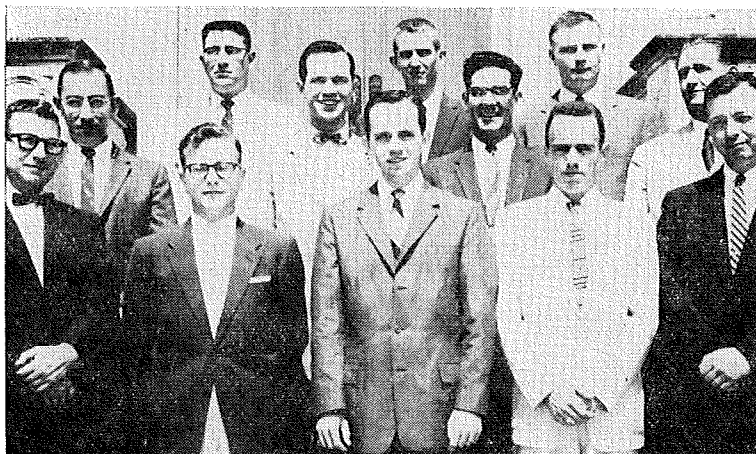

CONFERENCE MINUTES

Tuesday 9:30 a.m. — June 3, 1958

Conference Organized: The One-Hundred Fifth Session (20th of the United Church) of the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church was convened at First Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas, on June 3, 1958 at 9:30 a.m. Bishop Paul E. Martin, Resident Bishop, announced Hymn No. 402, "And Are We Yet Alive", which was led by Dr. Glen Johnson, Director of Music, Lover's Lane Methodist Church, Dallas, Texas. J. M. Hamilton led in prayer.

Roll Call: The Secretary, J. Ralph Clayton, nominated the following tellers: Gerald K. Hilton, John P. Miles, George Wayne Martin, Fred L. Arnold, Jr., and W. Darrel Bone.

Secretary Nominations: The Secretary, J. Ralph Clayton, nominated Charles W. Richards as Journal Clerk, Charles W. Baughman as Secretary of Roll and Records and Kenneth L. Spore as Secretary of Ministers Service Records.

Host Pastor: Dr. E. D. Galloway, Host Pastor, set the bar of the Conference as the front section of the Sanctuary and moved that the printed program be the program of the Conference.

Conference Nominations: Dr. Arthur Terry, Secretary of the Cabinet, made the nominations for Boards, Commissions, and Committees and they were elected.

Standing Rules: Dr. K. L. Spore presented a proposed amendment to Article 7, Section 2, of the Articles of Incorporation of Camp Tanako. T. T. McNeil presented a proposed new Standing Rule to be numbered 19. James E. Major presented an amendment to Standing Rule #17.

Pastor Host, E. D. Galloway, presented Mayor Floyd Housley, a fellow Methodist, who gave welcome to the Conference. Bishop Martin responded with words of appreciation on behalf of the Annual Conference to First Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas.

District Superintendent's Report: Dr. E. C. Rule, Chairman of the Cabinet, read the composit report of the District Superintendents. Bishop Martin expressed grateful appreciation for this exceptionally fine report.

Nomination: Dr. J. Kenneth Shamblin nominated Andrew Christie as a member of the Board of Education and he was elected.

Indroduction of Guest and Friends: Dr. E. D. Galloway presented Don Waddell, Chaplain John Albright, and Dr. Marshal T. Steel.

Conference Relations: Joe R. Phillips, Jr. stated that the Committee on Conference Relations reported nothing against the character of the ministers. The report was adopted.

Town and Country Commission: Report #1 of the Town and Country Commission was read by Clyde T. Parsons, Secretary. James E. Major, C. Ray Hozendorf, Fred L. Arnold, Jr., W. Darrell Bone, and H. R. Parrish spoke to the report and it was adopted.

Minutes: The Conference Secretary read the names of the nominations for the Committee on Minutes and they were elected.

Recess: Bishop Martin called a recess to precede the Service of Commemoration.

Announcements: Announcements were made following the recess.

Service of Commemoration: The Service of Commemoration was conducted by J. D. Montgomery, R. B. Moore, Sr. brought the message. The Holy Communion was administered by Bishop Martin, E. D. Galloway, the Cabinet and J. M. Hamilton. Bishop Martin announced that the

offering left at the Communion Rail would be used for a ministry to the poor in India. The Conference was adjourned for lunch by Dr. E. D. Galloway.

Wednesday — 8:30 a.m. June 4, 1958

Conference Opened: Bishop Martin called the session with Hymn No. 533 "O God Our Help In Ages Past". R. B. Moore, Jr. then gave the devotional, "I Believe in God." Hymn No. 76 "There's A Wideness In God's Mercy."

Committee on Minutes: Bro. Doss reported the minutes to be in order.

Nominations: Dr. E. C. Rule asked the Conference for the privilege of waiting until after the appointments are made before nominations for the committees on Property and Location, and Ministerial Qualifications are read. This motion was made and passed.

Visitors: Dr. Cecil Culver presented the following visitors: Dr. and Mrs. L. E. Douglas, Mr. and Mrs. Coy Whitten, Dr. A. W. Martin, Mr. and Mrs. K. K. Carithers and Dr. H. A. Davis.

Bishop Paul E. Martin spoke of his appreciation for genuine consideration given him and Mrs. Martin during his illness.

Publishing House Representative, Miss Lucille Tison spoke of added space and facilities and services of the Dallas Methodist Publishing House. She then presented a check for \$4,061.42 as our share of the profit from book sales. This money can only be used for distribution to our retired ministers or their widows.

Christian Literature: Vernon Chalfant presented the excellent features of Together magazine commending its use on the "All Family Plan" by a greater number of our churches. His report was adopted by the conference.

Board of Ministerial Training: Dr. Fred R. Harrison, Chairman, and R. B. Moore, Jr., Secretary, presented Report No. 1. The class of 12 new men were Admitted on Trial. Those advanced in their various classes were approved. The classes were elected to Deacons and Elders Orders. The class was admitted by Bishop Martin into Full Connection. The names of those certified for Full-time, Part-time, and Student Supply Pastors were read and approved. The names of those certified to administer the sacraments and perform the marriage ceremony were read. The report was adopted. A resolution to be proposed and entered in the Conference Journal concerning Coy E. Hays was approved.

Conference Greetings: Greetings to the conference were received from W. I. Small and Alva C. Rogers.

Philander Smith College: Dr. M. Lafayette Harris, President of Philander Smith College, presented an appeal for greater financial assistance for the Development Program now under way. Bishop Martin commended the fine presentation and the excellent work being done there.

Recess: A 15 minute recess was observed.

Visitors: Dr. Cecil Culver presented the Reverend Otto Teague, Dr. and Mrs. Wm. E. Trice and the Reverend Raymond Franks. Bishop Martin presented the Reverend Joseph D. Thomas who performed the marriage of Bishop and Mrs. Paul E. Martin.

Board of Education: Dr. J. Kenneth Shamblin and Charles W. Richards presented Report #1 of the Board of Education. Roy E. Fawcett, Executive Secretary, spoke to the report explaining in detail the Area Emphasis using a brochure entitled "Go Teach." He spoke also of the Pastor's School and the Family Life Conference. Dr. Wm. E. Trice, University Church, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, spoke concerning the urgency of Christian Education in our day. The report was adopted with a motion that Dr. Trice's message be mimeographed and made available

to every pastor. It was passed. Report #2 on Higher Education was read. Louis Edrington, John B. Hefley and Dr. Marshall T. Steel spoke to the report and it was adopted. A. W. Martin spoke movingly about the Wesley Foundation in the state colleges.

Visitors: Alfred Doss presented these guests: Dr. E. T. Wayland, Mrs. Marshall Steel, and the Rev. J. L. Pruitt.

Standing Rules: J. Ralph Clayton presented the Standing Rule changes, a new rule #18, and a resolution amending the rules of the Conference Camp. All these were passed.

Episcopal Resolution: Dr. Arthur Terry presented a resolution asking that Arkansas be made an Episcopal Area of itself and be presented to the Area Committee at the next Jurisdictional Conference for their action. The Resolution was adopted.

Board of Conference Claimants: Roland Darrow presented the Report #1 of the Board of Pensions and it was adopted.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. M. E. Scott read the report of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service and it was adopted.

Board of Missions: Rufus Sorrells, Chairman, and Braska Savage gave the report of the Board of Missions and stated that it would be mimeographed and placed in each local church. The financial report will be filed. In emphasizing support of the Rio Grande Conference, Dr. Francisco CruzAedo, President of Lydia Patterson Institute, El Paso, Texas, spoke. Mrs. J. Russell Henderson spoke to the report urging enlistment and support of young missionary personnel. Bishop Martin spoke of the importance of supporting this Institute. The report was adopted.

Visitors Presented: Alfred Doss presented as visitors Dr. J. T. Harris, Chaplain Howard Cox, the Reverend Bates Sturdy, Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Watson, and Dr. and Mrs. J. K. Saunders.

Board of Hospitals and Homes: C. Everett Patton and Virgil Bell presented their Reports #1 and 2 and they were adopted. The Rev. Bates Sturdy, Chaplain at Booneville, spoke of his appreciation for our support, of the great opportunity for service there, and asked our prayers. Dr. Connor Moorehead gave the report of The Methodist Children's Home.

Board of Evangelism: H. O. Bolin, D. Mouzon Mann, and H. R. Holland presented Reports #1, 2 and 3 of the Board of Evangelism promoting a vigorous program of evangelism in the ensuing year. Wayland and Miss Jeanie Mason, of Methodist Information, who gave her report. Ewing T. Wayland, Editor and Business Manager of the Arkansas Methodist, gave his report. These reports were adopted.

Board of Lay Activities: Roland Shelton and T. A. Prewitt gave the report of this board including nominations. Roland Shelton spoke to the report and it was adopted.

Board of Christian Social Relations: Charles Baughman and Charles Ramsay presented the report of this board and it was adopted.

Town and Country Commission: Report #2 of this commission was given by James E. Major and the report was adopted.

Visitors Presented: Bishop Martin presented Dr. Ronald Meredith.

Announcements: Announcements were made by Bishop Martin.

Adjournment: The session was adjourned with the Doxology and Charles W. Richards pronounced the benediction.

Thursday — 2:30 p.m. — June 5, 1958

The Presiding Officers: Dr. A. G. Walton was the presiding officer for this session and it was opened by the Reverend J. T. Harris with prayer.

Methodist Headquarters Corporation: Dr. Roy E. Fawcett gave the reports of this Corporation and it was adopted.

Historical Society: Stanley T. Baugh presented the report of the Historical Society and it was adopted.

District Conference Journals: George C. Bailey gave the report and it was adopted.

Southern Methodist University: Dr. Richard Bush brought news and greetings from Perkins and S.M.U. which were well received.

Trustees of Camp Tanako: Dr. Fawcett and J. Edward Dunlap gave this report. Brother Dunlap spoke to the report urging greater financial support and the report was adopted.

Television, Radio and Film Commission: The Rev. A. C. Caraway gave the report. Wm. O. Byrd, Chairman, presented Robert B. Moore, Jr., who gave a report on "Talk Back", which is a T.V. program to be presented in the fall. The report was adopted.

Western Methodist Assembly: Dr. Roy E. Fawcett presented the report calling attention to a leaflet outlining the program at Mt. Sequoyah this summer and it was heard with interest.

Arkansas Council of Churches: Robert Scott, Secretary of the Arkansas Council of Churches, gave a detailed account of the activities of the Arkansas Council of churches which was well received.

Board of Ministerial Training: Report #2 was given by Dr. Fred R. Harrison and John B. Hays setting out the policy under which its Board shall conduct its business. The report was adopted.

Adjournment: The session was adjourned with a prayer by Brother W. S. Cazort.

Friday — 8:30 a.m., June 6, 1958

Session Called to Order: Bishop Martin called the session to order by singing Hymn No. 378, "Walk In The Light." The Reverend Howard Williams gave the devotional message "I Believe In The Holy Spirit." Hymn No. 180, "Breath On Me Breath Of God" was sung. Bishop Martin commended the three ministers who have given the morning devotionals for their exceptionally fine messages.

A Resolution: Dr. Wm. E. Brown submitted a resolution asking those ministers who will move to preach in their old charge on Sunday following the Annual Conference, plan to move on the following Thursday, and to accept no salary for services beyond May 31st.

World Service and Finance: Dr. Wm. E. Brown, Secretary, presented the report and Virgil Keeley spoke to the report. It was discussed, amended and adopted.

Conference Statistician: L. W. Averitt presented Fred Gantt, his able assistant, and then gave his report which was commended and accepted by Bishop Martin.

Invitation to the Conference: The Reverend E. D. Galloway invited the conference to return to First Methodist Church, Hot Springs, next year and it was accepted.

A Resolution Concerning Bishop Martin: Dr. Aubrey G. Walton presented a resolution requesting Bishop and Mrs. Martin to take a long and much needed vacation following the North Arkansas Annual Conference. It was enthusiastically received and adopted.

Commission on Minimum Salary: The Reverend W. R. Burks presented the report. Rev. A. C. Carraway spoke to the report and it was adopted.

Conference Trustee Report: The Rev. A. C. Carraway and George Reutz presented the Trustee's Report which was adopted with a commendation from Bishop Martin.

Ministerial Training Resolution: Clint Burleson presented a resolution asking the Judicial Council for a declaratory statement concerning Para. 341 of our Discipline. This clarification will be necessary before this Board can do its work properly. The resolution was passed. Dr. Fred Harrison emphasized the Special Offering for Ministerial Training and Bishop Martin encouraged the conference to lift this important matter up before our people.

Recess: A 20-minute recess was declared.

Committee on Christian Vocations: The Reverend Virgil Bell read the report. Dr. Fred R. Harrison spoke to the report and it was adopted.

Special Offering: A special offering was taken for the Reverend and Mrs. Howard Childs who will go to Scotland where he will work on his PHD Degree at Edinburgh.


Nominations: Dr. Arthur Terry gave additional nominations for various committees and they were elected.

VI. Reports

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORT

To Bishop Paul E. Martin and the members of The One Hundred and Fifth Session of The Little Rock Annual Conference of The Methodist Church:

We, your District Superintendents, rejoice with you and the members of our churches in The Little Rock Conference, in another year of significant progress in the promotion of the cause of Christ and His church.

In making this report, we are conscious of the fact that great a man and woman, Bishop and Mrs. Martin, are entitled to much credit for the spirit of this Conference. By their continued interest in persons and their growth and welfare and by their deep spirit of devotion to Christ and His church, they give strength to us and to our people and strengthen every cause.

The "Tell Arkansas About Christ" emphasis has been the significant movement of the year. It's worth can not be measured in numbers, though they are significant, but in the quickening of the life of the Church. However, the report of the additions is significant, for the statistician will report 2243 new members added to our roll and 2691 added by transfer of membership from other Methodist Churches. Our total membership is reported at 85,524.

You will be asked to make the emphasis for this year, "Teach Arkansas About Christ," and that will be no less evangelistic in it's total results than this year's program. We now have 54,710 pupils enrolled in our church schools. There are 5180 officers and teachers. We report a total enrollment in our Church Schools of 59,890. One feature of that enrollment is the report of 10,025 enrolled in Vacation Church Schools. We have no way of giving you the report on our youth assemblies and camps, but one of our most valuable agencies for Christian Education is in Camp Tanako and it's youth program. Great credit for the strength of our Church School work is due to the leadership of Dr. R. E. Fawcett and his co-workers on the Board of Education staff, the Reverend John Hassler and Mrs. Marie Tucker.

Through the work of our Board of Missions, the Reverend David Bauman, of Gujarat Conference, India, was with us for series of institutes that did much to stimulate missionary interest. The mission study courses were conducted in most charges and were well attended. Then, we remind you that through our conference missions program, many congregations have been given help in building new churches and parsonages. They, with the One Thousand Club, have pioneered in promoting new work, and their sustenance program enables many small and weak charges to have a ministry.

During this year there have been significant changes in our college program and administration. Dr. Marshall Steel has come back to his home state to be president and Dr. Matt Ellis, after years of great accomplishment, has returned to a teaching position as head of the philosophy department. Our Churches are looking toward an even greater Hendrix College. Many of our charges have already assumed the one dollar per year for the support of Hendrix; others are moving toward the goal. But may we remind you that even the full one dollar per year per member will not meet the need. We call for increased giving by individuals as an investment in the leadership of the Church of tomorrow.

The Wesley Foundation program has also made significant progress. New Property has been acquired at the University of Arkansas. A new foundation building is under construction at Magnolia. Property has been acquired and plans drawn for a building at Arkadelphia for Henderson State Teachers College. Many congregations have already included this cause in their budgets.

This year we have another good financial report. The total raised for all purposes is \$3,769,120. Of this amount \$564,735 goes for the

benevolent causes of the Church, \$78,624 being for the Arkansas Methodist Children's Home and \$31,229 for Hendrix College. We have also in this total \$207,994 for our World Service and Conference Program. We have built new churches and educational buildings or acquired new property at a cost of approximately \$1,800,000 and 8 new pastor's homes have been built at a cost of \$113,000, making a total spent for buildings and improvements of \$1,913,000.

We rejoice in the growing appreciation of the Every Member Canvass program. Under the leadership of the Reverend James Major, this movement is opening the way to a better and more really spiritual support of our work. This year 101 charges have had a canvass at one or more churches; 58 others have not yet reported, seventeen of these are working but have not completed the canvass. At present the total subscription reported to this year's budgets is \$1,737,452 and the director believes the final report will go well beyond \$2,000,000. We believe this report is a tribute to the efficient and devoted service of our pastors and to the loyal and faithful and consecrated members of congregations.

JOINT COMMISSION OF THE ARKANSAS METHODIST AND THE LOUISIANA METHODIST

The Joint Commission of the ARKANSAS METHODIST and THE LOUISIANA METHODIST met at the First Methodist Church, Little Rock, February 12, 1958, 12:30 P.M. with Dr. Aubrey G. Walton, Chairman, presiding. Those present included Aubrey G. Walton, Virgil D. Morris, Ewing T. Wayland, Golder Lawrence, Joe S. Pierce, J. G. Moore, C. Ray Hozendorf, Miss Jeanne Mason, O. C. Landers. Bishop Paul E. Martin and E. T. Wayland were guests.

After discussion of various matters of business, the Commission voted to make the following recommendations to the three Annual Conferences of the Area.

(1) That the circulation campaign for 1959 be January 11-18 and that the same general plan of circulation that has been used be employed.

(2) That the campaign goal for 1959 be 40,000 for the combined publications with a quota for each charge of one subscription for each 9 members.

(3) That the subscription price for both publications be continued at \$2.00, provided that the church which sends in a subscription list representing one-third of the membership of that church as reported in the last journal be given a special rate of \$1.50.

(4) That the Little Rock, Louisiana and North Arkansas Conferences' Commissions on World Service be requested to apportion the same amount for the **Arkansas Methodist** and The Louisiana Methodist as was apportioned the past year.

(5) That the sincere appreciation of this commission be expressed to those who have contributed in various ways to the publications during the past year.

(6) That the back page arrangement be continued on the same basis as at present.

(7) That Rev. Ewing T. Wayland be appointed as editor and business manager of the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist.

(8) That Miss Jeanne Mason be continued as director of the Methodist Information for the Arkansas-Louisiana Area.

(9) That the executive committee be authorized to act for the commission in such matters which in its judgement may need action between now and the next meeting of the commission.

COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Christian literature is that literature that reflects the spirit and teachings of Jesus Christ. Thus, the measure of all literature in the Christian field is the Bible. Any literature that represents teachings or a spirit contrary to the spirit and teachings of the Bible must be recognized as an instrument of the Devil and an enemy of the Church of Jesus Christ.

The avalanche of obscene and trivial literature that floods our news stands is reason for alarm and concern to every Christian. The Church

has a responsibility to openly oppose the sale and reading of such publications, but it has a far greater responsibility to God for the reading, preaching and teaching of the Word of God, the Discipline of The Methodist Church, The Book of Worship and The Methodist Hymnal. Too often the Bible is judged by secular literature instead of the Bible judging secular literature and becoming the standard and measure for all other.

We wish to make as a part of this report an expression of our appreciation to Dr. Ralph D. Stoodly and the General Commission of Public Relation and Methodist Information for their continued support of \$500 to the Methodist Information Fund of our conference.

We are happy to report that the Arkansas Methodist has the largest circulation in its history. All six districts in the Little Rock Annual Conference have reached their quota.

The improved methods in communication makes it all the more imperative that the Church be sensitive to every means of media available to spread the "Good News of Jesus Christ."

The Methodist Church through its Publishing House has the right literature for any and all needs of the local church. We urge its use to the best advantage. Our age is an age of inquiry and information. Our people must be informed. They must be inspired and challenged. They need to know how. We have the literature that will do this. We must get it to them.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

During the Conference Year 1957-58, the Conference Board of Christian Social Relation, operating in its first year as a combined board, participated in the following projects:

1. Sent two young people to the Youth School of Alcohol Studies:

Miss Mary Ruth Price of Dumas, winner of the 1957 Temperance Essay Contest; and Miss Ethel Lu Teague of Arkadelphia, Conference MYF Chairman of Christian Citizenship.

2. Sent two delegates to the Adult School of Alcohol Studies: Rev. Cagle E. Fair, and Rev. Allen E. Hilliard.

3. Sent four District Directors to the Stillwater Briefing Conference sponsored by the General Board of Temperance: Rev. Charles Baughman, Rev. John Miles, Rev. Ed Dunlap and Rev. Cagle Fair.

4. Sent two delegates to the Washington Seminar on Legislative and Political Action: Rev. Charles Ramsay and Rev. John Miles.

5. Sponsored the Temperance Essay Contest for youth.

6. Worked with a committee from the North Arkansas Conference and with representatives from other denominations in planning for an interdenominational foundation on civic and moral problems.

In accord with the quadrennial emphasis on the local Church and the pressing need for the local church to be active in the solving of social and economic problems, we intend to carry out a systematic plan for organizing a Fifth Commission on Christian Social Relations in the local churches of our conference. This systematic effort will begin this year in the following manner.

1. By requesting each District Superintendent to choose three local churches in his district where in his judgment an effective Commission on Christian Social Relations could be organized and where the pastor is interested in cooperating with this Board in their establishment.

2. By organizing three teams of three members each from the membership of this Board to work with the District Directors of Temperance in each district in the organization of an effective commission in this area in those churches selected by the District Superintendents.

3. By training the personnel of these three teams at the Jurisdictional Briefing Conference on Christian Social Relations to be held at Mt. Sequoyah July 8-11, 1958.

4. By furnishing these teams with filmstrips, charts, and handbooks to assist them and by paying for their transportation in connection with this effort.

It is our hope that in this way, over a period of years, we will be able to have a commission on Christian Social Relations functioning effectively in each local church of our conference.

We request that until there is a functioning Christian Social Relations Commission in each church that each District Superintendent request the selection of one or more interested persons in each local church to represent this concern; that this selection be made as soon as possible after conference adjourns and that the names of these individuals be given to the District Director of Temperance in his district.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

The Methodist Church is investing much personnel, significant money, and widespread concern in meeting the real emergency it faces in the critical shortage that exists for qualified personnel in virtually all its vocational fields.

The church needs people to do its job. An equally important need is that young people be given help in finding their way into a church vocation if that is where God wants them to serve. Successful enlistment of a person for a church vocation meets both needs at the same time.

The Interboard Committee on Christian Vocations declares a belief in the "potential sacredness of all useful work." Yet we feel its is legitimate for us to insist that whereas church vocations are not necessarily more Christian than non-church vocations, they are, at present, at least, far more urgent and a young Methodist has a far greater Christian duty to consider the need for persons in the church vocations than the so-called secular fields.

Your Commission on Christian Vocations feels that its primary task and emphasis should be at the present time the enlistment and encouragement of dedicated young people in church vocations.

To do this task, the following five point program is submitted.

1. A central index file of all youth dedicating themselves to full-time vocational service in the church be maintained by the office of the Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education.

2. The commission recognizes the necessity of giving helpful encouragement regularly and often to the youth who have indicated a desire to enter a church vocation. Members of the Commission hope to help in this follow-up program. Pastors, parents and workers with youth are urged to counsel with these youth in their churches. A helpful procedure is outlined by the Interboard Committee on Christian vocations on follow-up of those dedicating themselves to church vocations.

3. An adult workshop on church vocations to be held this fall shall include district superintendents, ministers and laymen who work with youth on Conference, district and sub-district level, representatives of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and members of the Commission on Christian Vocations.

4. A committee on Christian Vocations (par. 145 Discipline) shall be organized in each local church.

5. (a) We request our ministers to preach on church vocations, urging our youth to dedicate themselves to Christian service through the church.

(b) We urge our ministers to counsel and encourage parents to cooperate and to understand youth's decision to enter church vocations.

(Thirdly)—The one-acre of ground, upon which the Fairview Church on the Springhill Circuit stood. Your Board of Trustees authorizes the Springhill Quarterly Conference to sell the same, and, furthermore, directs that the proceeds from which sale be applied on the parsonage of the Springhill Charge.

Your Board of Trustees now want to officially confirm such action.

Your Board of Trustees desires to state that all transactions and payments relative to the Episcopal Residence in Little Rock have been duly made and are in order.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

The work of your Board of Education for the year just closed may be summarized in a single statement as a program to reach more people with better Christian teachings.

As in the past, a major interest has been the building of Church School membership and attendance. We have sought at all times to keep before our people the importance of reaching the largest possible number of those for whom the Church school has opportunity and responsibility. Pastors' reports indicate an enrollment of 59,890 and an average attendance of 31,405 as over against 59,566 and 31,373 respectively, a year ago. One of our most serious membership problems has been in the area of decreasing population where most of our losses have been inevitable. We are grateful that we have not suffered over-all losses, but are by no means happy that our gains have been so small.

Much time and attention have been given to the training of leadership — still a crucial problem in most local situations. It has been our goal to make an appropriate training opportunity available for every church in the Conference. That we have made progress in the reaching of this objective is evidenced by the fact that we have had 30 sub-district and local church schools, offering 95 units of study, reaching 140 churches, with an enrollment of 1952 and 1543 recognition cards issued. We have given much attention to the informal type of training, in the local churches and on the District and Conference levels.

We have had representation at the Mt. Sequoyah Leadership School as well as other Jurisdictional and state training enterprises. It was our privilege to cooperate with the Schools of Instruction for Commission Chairmen sponsored by Bishop Martin and the participating General Boards.

We note with appreciation the wide-spread interest in church school buildings, and doubt if there has been a similar period of expansion of space and equipment in the history of the Conference. While buildings and equipment are not the complete answer to our educational needs, they do afford a greatly enlarged opportunity to do the type of work that needs to be done.

Our program for the year ahead is outlined by the steps toward the objectives of the Area Emphasis planned and promoted by the three An-

nual Conferences under the leadership of Bishop Martin. Briefly, they are as follows:

1. The re-appraisal of the objectives of Christian education in the local church.
2. Functioning Commission on Education in every local church.
3. The discovery, enlistment, and training of needed workers.
4. A virgorous program of building Church School membership agencies.
5. Full cooperation with other Conference Boards and agencies.
6. Strengthening of the program for more effective home and church cooperation.

Dr. M. Lafayette Harris presented the Expansion Program of Philander Smith College stating the pressing need for \$300,000 to complete the first phase of the program, and requesting that these needs be presented to the Annual Conference. The Board voted approval recommending the observance of Race Relations Sunday and a minimum goal equal to 10c per member to be received on Race Relations Sunday for this expansion program.

Conference Staff:

We have elected Roy E. Fawcett as Executive Secretary and John W. Hassler Director of Youth Work, and request Bishop Martin to appoint them to these offices. We have elected Mrs. John L. Tucker as Director of Children's Work and Louis W. Averitt as voluntary Director of Adult Work.

As a Conference Board, we wish, first of all, to record our appreciation of the services and leadership given to Hendrix College by Dr. Matt L. Ellis, and of the development and expansion program that came about under his direction. During his tenure in office, notable progress has been made in the building of its physical facilities while its scholastic standing has continued at the high level for which it has been nationally known. We are grateful that Dr. Ellis is continuing his relationship as the head of a department and that the administration is to have the benefits of his wise and constructive counsel.

Your Conference Board is also grateful for the new leadership, and pledges to Dr. Steel its whole-hearted cooperation and support. With his board contacts over the Church, and with his established position of leadership within Arkansas Methodism, we are confidently looking forward to the continued growth of the College and to the maintenance of the high standards that have brought it to its unique position among the small colleges of the Nation.

The Conference Board stands ready to cooperate with the State-wide Commission on Higher Education, in the cultivation of good public

relations and in the promotion of the needed program of expansion and development.

But however strong and skilled the leadership, this is a task that calls for the whole-hearted support of Arkansas Methodism, if these high hopes are to become a reality. To that end, we recommend as follows:

1. That pastors and lay workers be on the alert to locate and enlist the kind of students that will maintain the high tradition of the College for scholastic and leadership abilities for which it has become nationally known.
2. Commending those churches, both small and large, that have reached the \$1.00 per member for the College and 30 cents per member for Wesley Foundation work, we urgently recommend that we strive to achieve these minimum amounts as the over-all Conference goal for the quadrennium, with the expectation that they will be reached in full by the end of the present quadrennium.

We recommend the election of these Trustees of Hendrix College as nominated by the Executive Committee of the Board, terms expiring in 1964.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Your Conference Board of Evangelism wishes to make the following report of its activities during the 1957-58 Conference Year:

1. An all out effort was devoted to the "Tell Arkansas About Christ" movement to the end that every district in the Conference conducted a complete survey, carried out evangelistic missions, held preaching revivals and sought by every means possible to win persons to Christ and His Church.
2. Sought to deepen the spiritual life of the membership of the churches by prayer retreats on a state-wide, district and local church basis.
3. Planned a School of Evangelism for young preachers in January at Monticello A. and M. College.
4. Worked with the Television, Radio and Film Commission in preparation of the Television program on the 250th Anniversary of Charles Wesley.
5. Led out in the State-Wide Evangelistic Rally on February 28 with Dr. Pierce Harris as the speaker.

Your Conference Board of Evangelism makes the following recommendations to the Annual Conference concerning our participation in the Quadrennial Emphasis on the Local Church:

1. That the Annual Conference enthusiastically support the Current Year of Expansion which ends in March of 1959, by using every facility to expand through the establishment of new churches; new church schools; new groups of evangelistic visitors; new prayer groups; and new redemptive fellowship groups in homes;
2. That the Annual Conference undergird the Bible Emphasis adopted by the General Conference by encouraging the reading of the Bible by individuals in the homes; by evangelistic Bible rallies in districts and in local churches, by Bible institutes and Bible study groups in local churches; and by the distribution of the Scriptures to the unchurched;
3. That the Annual Conference respond to the challenge of the General Conference to make the year beginning in March of 1959 the Year of Enlistment, and authorize our Board of Evangelism to work toward the end that every district be enlisted; every Church be enlisted; every Church member be enlisted:
 - For a deeper faith in God and in Jesus Christ
 - For a more compassionate love as the means to win men to the way of Christ

- For a greater concern to reach the unchurched people everywhere
- For a complete dedication of life to Christ
- For a vital experience of the presence of God
- For a greater zeal to establish the Kingdom

We purpose to enlist every unenlisted person for the Church and the Kingdom, to enlist every professing Christian for deeper loyalty to the faith.

Your Board also recommends:

1. That a state-wide Conference on Evangelism be held in cooperation with the North Arkansas Conference October 27-28.
2. That the Board of Evangelism and the Television, Radio and Film Commission work together in producing a Television Program telling the Methodist Story.
3. That the Board of Evangelism, the Town and Country Commission develop a program of evangelism for town and country churches in an effort to strengthen the small church and to recruit and train young ministers in conducting revivals.
4. That three Prayer Retreats be conducted in each district during the year, one for lay men, one for lay women and one for preachers, with each group planning and conducting the retreat.
5. That each local church in the Conference make provision for a delegate to the Methodist Convocation on Loyal Church Evangelism, July 3-6, in Washington, D.C., and that the Board of Evangelism pay the expenses of the elected officer and allocate \$150 to each district to help with the expenses of the District Superintendent, the District Secretary and a layman.
6. That we continue the policy of planning United Evangelistic Missions in two of the districts during 1958-59 Conference Year and that the Monticello and Pine Bluff Districts as the participating districts.
7. We urge every district to send representatives to the South Central Jurisdictional Conference of Evangelism to be held on Mt. Sequoyah August 4-7. Expenses are being provided to take care of District Delegates.
8. That every church promote the World Wide Church Attendance Crusade from January to Easter and that the District Superintendents ask for weekly reports.
9. That the "Hour of Evangelism" be continued as a part of our Annual Conference Program with Bishop Martin selecting the preacher.

We recommend that the World Service and Finance Commissions of the two Conferences request the conferences to grant authorized representatives of Hendrix College, and the established Wesley Foundations under the supervisions of these conference, the right to solicit funds for their respective institutions.

GROUP INSURANCE COMMITTEE

Report No. 1

We your Committee on Group Insurance offer the following recommendations for the ensuing year:

1. The policy shall remain with the same company, the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.

2. The premium shall be \$1.93 per month, per thousand dollars of insurance. This premium includes payment for double indemnity in case of accidental death. Of this amount the church served by the insured shall pay \$1.23, while the insured shall pay \$0.70.

3. The premium payments shall not be accepted for a shorter period of time than three months, while we earnestly urge the payment of a full year's premium in advance where possible.

4. The period of grace for non-payment of premiums shall be thirty (30) days pass the date of the premium due.

5. The Conference Treasurer shall be the treasurer for the group.

6. We commend the Conference Board of Conference Claimants for the way they have paid the premiums each year for a \$1,000 policy for each member of our conference who is in the retired relationship. We urge them to continue this gracious gesture.

7. We respectfully urge the district superintendents of the various districts to consider the premium payments of this insurance as part of the normal allocations to the churches over which they have jurisdiction, and that they make every reasonable effort to have the churches meet their part of the premium payment.

8. The plan as accepted by the Annual Conference shall be mandatory for the persons serving under appointment of the Bishop.

GROUP INSURANCE COMMITTEE

Report No. 2

We, your Group Insurance Committee, do recommend that the American Hospital and Life Insurance Company be retained as the insurers for our Annual Conference. We recommend the following plan to be accepted for the ensuing year:

I. Benefits

1. Room \$10.00 per day; 1-35 days each entry.
2. Incidental expense up to \$200.00 per entry, plus 75% of next \$5,000.
3. Surgery up to \$200.00 per entry.
4. Maternity benefits of \$150.00.
5. Other benefits as listed in policy.

II. Premiums

1. Payable quarterly in advance to the conference treasurer, with payments for full year urged where possible.
2. Grace period for payment of premiums, 31 days.
3. Premiums shall be: Minister \$31.92; Minister and Dependent \$83.40; Minister and two or more Dependents \$114.12 per year.

III. Particulars

1. All ministers serving appointment under the Bishop are eligible.
2. This insurance shall be mandatory for the minister and optional for the family.
3. Health questions will not be asked those applying for the insurance during the meeting of the Annual Conference. However, after the session has closed, health questions will be asked of all applicants.

IV. Recommendations

1. We strongly urge that every minister where possible shall include his family in this plan.
2. We urge all churches to cooperate with their ministers in the payment of the premiums of this insurance, and suggest that they pay at least 50% of the premiums. We urge the district superintendents to encourage the churches to do their part in caring for these premiums.
3. The Conference Treasurer shall be Treasurer to handle the funds of this committee.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The Conference Board of Lay Activities seeks to deepen the spiritual life of the lay members of the church and to cultivate among them an increasing loyalty and interest so that they may become an active working force in each local church.

Christian stewardship is being emphasized and, as a result, laymen are giving more of their time, talent and material possessions than ever before. It is also promoting a fine spirit of good fellowship essential in every church.

In personal evangelism, under the direction of the pastor and church lay leader, many new members have been secured through a well organized visitation program.

Increased interest is being shown each year in the lay speaking program. Certified lay speakers are available in every district. Observance of Laymen Day during the past year exceeded that of any previous year.

Continued support is being given in connection with the Every Member Canvas Program so that every financial obligation of the church may be paid in full.

The School of Instructions under the leadership of Bishop Paul E. Martin in each district on the Every Member Canvas Program was most beneficial as our financial reports will show. We recommend the continuance of this program so that the church may more nearly meet the needs now present.

The Conference Board of Lay Activities voted to purchase stewardship films up to \$500.00 to be used in Stewardship Training Sessions, Methodist Men and Official Board Meetings and others where interest is manifested.

Prayer retreats were held in most of the district for the first time and, although the number attending was not as expected, the results were most encouraging. We plan a much larger program for the coming year.

We recommend continued support of the 1000 Club so that as new churches are organized, they may be given financial assistance as funds are available.

More emphasis will be given to the organization of Methodist Mens Clubs throughout the conference. Our goal is one in every church. In the Hope District there is a district organization of Methodist Men chartered by the General Board of Lay Activities. It offers each year two \$300.00 scholarships to young Methodists who reside within the district and have offered themselves for full time Christian service to the Methodist church. These scholarships are financed by voluntary contributions from member clubs amounting to \$2.00 for each active member.

The Board will continue to carry out the program of lay activities outlined by the General and Jurisdictional Boards and cooperate with all conference boards in their plans for service in the work of the church.

We nominate Roland M. Shelton for Conference Lay Leader and T. A. Prewitt as representative on the Town and Country Commission. Lay Leader for district and associate district lay leader are attached and is a part of this report.

Financial statement as of June 1, 1958, showing receipts and disbursements, is also attached and is a part of this report.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARIES

We, your Commission on Minimum Salary, present the following as the Minimum Salary Program for our Annual Conference.

1. That the Commission on Minimum Salary be composed of one minister and one layman from each district of the Conference, and including representatives for city, urban, village, and rural churches. Such commission shall elect annually a president, vice-president and secretary to perform the usual duties of such offices. These officers shall also compose the executive committee of the commission. The Conference Treasurer shall serve as the treasurer of this business. The expense of this commission shall be a priority claim upon the fund. Whenever a vacancy occurs on the commission between sessions of the Annual Conference the vacancy shall be filled by the Superintendent of the district involved.

2. That the minimum salary of the pastors of this Conference be set at \$2400 for married men and \$1800 for single men. There shall be no distinction made between conference members and full-time approved supplies in the benefits of this fund. That only approved pastors or supplies enrolled in approved Supply Courses who are accepted as such by this or some other Annual Conference shall be eligible as claimants on this Fund; provided further that in the case where both a man and his wife serve as pastors in this Conference, whether on the same charge or otherwise the provision of the 1956 Discipline, Par. 1618-3b, with respect to years of service for our pension program, shall apply.

3. That the minimum salaries as herein set forth shall include all funds received by the pastor except missionary and education funds. No claimant shall receive from this fund more than \$900.00 in any one Conference Year, except in clearly necessitous cases as hereinafter provided.

4. A Charge whose Pastor receives Minimum Salary Funds may have a Travel Expense Fund for the Pastor; provided, that the Charge does not reduce the salary now being paid the Pastor, and, provided that the Charge's Travel Expense Fund does not exceed at any time 50% of

the Pastor's salary. We encourage churches to provide travel expense fund for the beneficiaries of this fund.

5. There shall be set aside an amount equal to 10% of the previous year's receipts by the commission to be used for necessitous cases arising during the current year. Any amount of the 10% remaining at the close of the Conference Year will revert to the general funds of the Commission.

The District Superintendent of any person seeking assistance as a necessitous case shall make application in writing to the Commission giving the reasons in detail as to why the applicant is a necessitous case.

No man shall be eligible for assistance as a necessitous case who is not at the time eligible for assistance from the minimum salary fund.

No man shall receive, as a necessitous case, more than 25% of the total amount set aside for necessitous cases for that year.

6. That the commission herein constituted shall make an apportionment to all charges of the conference, an amount equal to 3% of such cash salary, provided that the pastor in each charge shall be required to assume one-third of his charges apportionment. The District Superintendent and all other members of the conference serving in special appointments within the United States shall also be required to contribute to the Fund an amount equal to 1% of their cash salaries. In the case of a pastor or special appointee where no parsonage or living quarters are provided a 15% exemption from his salary shall be allowed in computing his salary level through the provisions of this plan.

7. That the apportionment to the charges shall be regarded as on a par with, and shall be paid proportionately with the other items of ministerial support as required in Par. 823 of the 1956 Discipline. Payments shall be made to the Conference Treasurer and receipts issued therefor. The funds shall be kept in a bank approved by the Conference. The records of payments to this fund shall be published annually in the Conference Journal.

8. That the commission shall make a distribution of funds monthly, with the exceptions below (line II), provided, however, that no payments shall be made to any pastor except with the written approval of his District Superintendent; and further that no distribution shall be made to any pastor who has failed to pro-rate the various ministerial claims, as per Par 823 of the 1956 Discipline, or whose charge has failed to make the every-member canvass for ministerial support as per the Disciplinary plan; and provided further, that nothing shall be distributed to cover the failure of any Church to meet its own salary estimate excepting in emergency cases as may be deemed by the commission.

When and if any charge benefiting from this fund proposes to reduce its pastor's salary below the claim as given in the Statistician's report for the year immediately preceding it, the charge shall consult with the commission via the District Superintendent concerned; otherwise, its pastor will be rendered ineligible to receive any benefits under the provisions of this plan.

In the event that any charge fails or declines to set a definite figure for pastoral support, as required in Par. 824 of the 1956 Discipline, such charge shall thereby be disqualified for receiving aid from this Fund.

The Disciplinary requirements, as to the Conference Course of Study for approved supplies, as set forth in Par. 320 of the 1956 Discipline, shall be considered as prerequisite for participation in the benefits of this plan for full-time accepted supplies.

9. Pastors and churches to become eligible to receive Minimum Salary Aid must meet the following requirements:

a. Submit a budget planned by the Commission on Stewardship and Finance of said charge, or by the Official Board of said charge, to be adopted by the Official Board; such budget to be sent to the District Superintendent before Conference.

b. Conduct an Every Member Canvass, such Every Member Canvass to be fully approved by the Conference Director of the Every Member Canvass.

c. Each church and pastor must contribute to the Minimum Salary Fund according to the scheduled percentages.

e. Charges must seek to become self-supporting and required to increase the support of their pastors by not less than \$100.00 per year.

The District Superintendents must send to the secretary of the Minimum Salary Commission the following information concerning each Minimum Salary charge immediately on adjournment of Annual Conference.

a. A certified list of such pastors with earnings and requested aid.

b. A copy of the proposed budget adopted by these respective charges or churches with total pledge secured.

e. Information as to whether these respective charges and churches have complied with the requirement of taking an Every Member Canvass, fully endorsed by the Director of the Every Member Canvass.

Any exceptions to these requirements must be recommended by the Bishop and the Cabinet.

10. That in the event that the income of the Fund shall be insufficient to meet the claims upon it, as determined in Par. 2 of this plan, each claimant upon the Fund shall benefit in his proportional share of the available net income.

11. That it hereby be made a part of this plan that our Conference cooperate to eliminate the various factors contributing to inadequate salaries and ministerial inefficiency, in the following ways:

a. By combining churches into circuits or by constituting "larger parishes" where advisable so that each pastor will receive the minimum support.

b. Using more lay preachers who earn the major portion of their livelihood from an occupation.

c. By encouraging charges to bring their level of support to the established minimum.

d. By kindly applying the action of the General Conference in Pars. 377, 378, 379 of the 1956 Discipline, which recognizes the inter-relationship of ministerial support and ministerial efficiency.

e. By using the utmost care in licensing persons to preach, in admitting candidates to the status of approved supply, and in maintaining high standards of qualifications for admission into the conference.

12. That District Superintendents and pastors shall be charged with the responsibility of bringing this program to the attention of Official Boards, Quarterly Conferences, and District Conferences throughout the coming year.

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING

We, your Board of Ministerial Training, submit the following report which, when adopted, shall become the policy under which the Board shall conduct its business. It is understood that there shall be nothing in this policy which shall in any way supersede the paragraphs in the 1956 Discipline (669-674) which direct the program of the Board of Ministerial Training.

The Board of Ministerial Training shall receive its support from the following sources:

1. The Ministerial Training Special taken in November.
2. Annual request made of the World Service Commission.
3. From gifts, bequests, and interest on invested funds.

The funds of the Board of Ministerial Training may be expended in the following ways:

I. SUPPLY PASTORS:

A. To offer aid to Approved Supply Pastors by paying fees connected with the course of study.

B. To offer help for Approved Supply Pastors attending the summer supply schools at Perkins School of Theology. Such aid shall consist of books and supplies not to exceed \$15.00 and a travel allowance not to exceed .02c a mile one round trip.

C. To assist with a sum not to exceed tuition and fees in a college for undergraduate work. Each man must complete the course of study within eight years.

II. UNDERGRADUATE STUDENTS:

A. To offer loans and scholarships to undergraduate students who meet the following requirements:

1. Hold a Local license from one of the Districts of the Little Rock Conference or is in line to receive a license to preach at the next District Conference after having been recommended by the Quarterly Conference of a local Methodist Church.

2. Maintain from the beginning of his sophomore year a grade average sufficient to insure graduation from the college they are attending.

3. File with the Registrar of the Board the following forms:

a. Permanent record forms

b. Health record

c. A college transcript at the end of each semester

d. A request for loan properly filled out and recommended by a District Superintendent.

e. Supply information required by the Board or its committees in order to determine need for the loan.

f. A signed note promising to repay the loan if the recipient fails to complete necessary training to become an effective member of the Little Rock Annual Conference. The loan shall bear interest at the rate of 4% per annum from the date of issue. In no case shall the Board be excused from making every reasonable effort to reclaim those loans due because of failure of the recipient to fulfill the requirements of the loan. Except in unusual circumstances, the recipient shall be expected to return to the conference within one year of graduation or completion of his formal training. Military service as a Chaplain or service under the direction of the General Board of Missions shall be considered service to the Little Rock Annual Conference.

4. Requests for loans shall be in the hands of the Registrar of the Board not later than August 15th and Dec. 15th.

5. The amount of aid received shall be fixed annually by the Board.

6. The loan may be repaid by one year of service for each maximum year of aid received or its equivalent.

7. Each Student receiving aid must be enrolled as a full-time student and must carry at least 12 semester hours to qualify.

8. These loans shall be awarded on a basis of need as determined by the Board after consultation with such persons as the Board deems necessary.

III. SEMINARY STUDENTS:

A. There shall be set aside annually from the funds of Board a sum of \$400.00 as a gift to the scholarship fund at Perkins School of Theology, S.M.U.

B. The Board shall offer loans and scholarships to men in Seminaries of the Methodist Church approved by the University Senate who are preparing for pastoral work in the Little Rock Conference. These loans and scholarships shall be subject to the conditions listed in section II, Provided, however, that the benefits under this section may not be considered until needs under sections I & II have been met.

IV. The Board shall be allowed to reimburse its members for reasonable expenses incurred in the service of the Board.

V. To Provide proportionate share of the expense of the Arkansas Pastor's School.

VI. To provide administrative funds. It is understood that all officers of the Board shall serve without remuneration for their service.

VII. To provide special schools as the board shall deem necessary after consultation with the Bishop and His Cabinet.

VIII. To assist conference men who wish to attend supply school, sum not to exceed \$33.00 per year and travel of .02 cents per mile one round trip.

6. Registrar in charge of Seminary Students
7. Secretary

The executive committee of the Board shall be composed of the elected officers of the Board. The committee shall be empowered to approve loans and scholarships in extreme cases where it shall be deemed unadvisable to call the full board into session.

The Registrar of the Board shall be responsible for all records re-

quired by the policy and the Discipline of the Methodist Church. He shall have to assist him the registrar stated above.

MEETING OF THE BOARD

The Board shall meet in full session in the spring and fall to approve loan and scholarship applications and review the work of the men under its jurisdiction.

The Board shall be in session at the seat of the Annual Conference during the meeting of the Conference.

The Board shall meet at the call of the Chairman to consider important items from time to time during the year.

The Registrar of the Board shall arrange to meet with the men in the course of study in the spring before the Annual Conference.

QUALITY OF WORK AND RESPONSIBILITY OF MEN UNDER THE BOARD

The Board shall continually encourage the District Committees on Ministerial Training to carefully examine the candidates for the ministry as required by the Discipline with special reference to abstaining from the use of tobacco.

All men in the course of study shall be expected to present themselves before the Board of Ministerial Training during the Annual Conference unless excused in writing by the District Superintendent from the Little Rock Annual Conference. They shall be expected to appear on the floor of the conference during the reading of the report of the Board in order that the members of the conference shall have opportunity to see them and further that any errors presented in the report about their records may be called to the attention of the conference.

In all matters pertaining to the training of our ministry the Board shall expect the highest standards to be preserved.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the request for clarification read as follows: "The Little Rock Conference respectfully requests the Judicial Council of The Methodist Church to clarify the relationship of Paragraph 341 to Paragraph 432, Sections 1 through 7

TO WIT: Can Section 7 of Paragraph 432 (appointment to attend school) be considered as having met the requirement of two years of service while on trial under the supervision of a District Superintendent."

BOARD OF MISSIONS

Report No. 1

Your Board of Missions makes the following recommendations:

1. That each local church consider the asking for World Service and Conference Benevolences as a God-given opportunity for them to expand the horizons of their efforts and truly become a part of the Church Universal, thereby sharing in the extending of the Kingdom of God to the futhermost corners of the earth. Surley we shall make sacrificial efforts to meet these askings, and where possible we shall claim for ourselves the glorious satisfaction that comes from going beyond them.

2. That there be no faltering in the continuing Advance made possible by the generosity and sacrificial giving of our people to the General Advance Specials Fund. Let special attention be given to the four fields of service known as the Lands of Decision. These lands are: the Belgian Congo, Bolivia, Korea, and Sarawak. Our church has an opportunity such as it has never had before, and may never have again, to get into these lands with an effective program that could do much toward bringing His Kingdom in. Let there be a minimum of one such Advance Special in every local church. The conference Executive Secretary of our Board has a sixteen millimeter film available for your use without charge with the title, "The Lands of Decision". This will be a great help in promoting the program. Let us use it.

3. That the Alaska Methodist College be supported in an ever increasing way through the National Advance Specials, along with the other National causes supported by the people called Methodist. We note with pride the fact that Dr. W. A. Woodcock has gone from the First Methodist Church of Hot Springs to become the Medical Director of Maynard-McDougal Hospital in Nome, Alaska.

4. That the districts and local churches of our conference consider, prayer-fully the great responsibility that rests upon them to support the work with our Latin American constituency in the Rio Grande Conference and our Indian-American brothers in the Indian Mission Conference. That this conference correlate its efforts with the decision of the last Jurisdictional Conference and assume the responsibility of raising \$8,000 for the Rio Grande Conference and \$3,000 for the Indian Mission Conference during the conference year before us. That the amount of this total to be raised by each of the districts be determined by the Bishop and his cabinet at their earliest convenience. That the Conference Board of Missions then lend every effort to the promotion of this worthy cause throughout the conference. Further, that the local churches be as liberal as possible in their support of the Lydia Patterson Institute in El Paso, Texas. Let this support be through scholarships or other gifts. The Conference Board of Missions is forwarding a gift of \$500.00 to this institute out of its funds for the year 1958-59.

5. The Conference Board of Missions plans to organize and promote caravans and tours through the Rio Grande Conference and the Indian Mission Conference, and urged district or local church organizations to promote such trips where possible. An informed church is always more willing to share in the missionary program.

6. That every charge plan and have a church-wide school of missions within the charge or local church, using the current mission study book, "Methodism In Alaska and Hawaii" as a guide. The month of January is recommended for this school.

7. That October be designated as "World Outlook Month" with the purpose of increasing the number of subscriptions to our general missionary education magazine.

8. The Commission on Missions on the local church level be organized of missionary-minded personnel with the most effective person available as its chairman. Let it be a must that the chairman attend the workshop for local chairmen on Mt. Sequoyah, August 22-24.

9. That every missionary secretary along with other designated personnel attend the Jurisdictional Missionary Conference on Mt. Sequoyah, August 19-22. That one youth from each district attend this meeting, preferably the district chairman of Christian Outreach. The Conference Board of Missions will supply \$25 scholarships for each of these youth attending.

10. We recommend that the Every Member Canvass Program be continued on an Area-wide simultaneous basis, under the direction of the Bishop and District Superintendents with the Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission as the Conference Director. Be it further recommended that no salary supplementation funds be allowed from our funds to any charge that does not have the acknowledgement of this director that their every member canvass has been properly carried through. That every reasonable effort be made to help and encourage the individual charges to raise their salaries so that more missionary funds be directed to the building of new churches were needed.

11. We commend the Little Rock District on its organization and use of a District Board of Missions and we earnestly urge that each district perfect a district organization that could best meet its individual needs. We further urge that the districts under the leadership of their superintendents, and with the cooperation of the Conference Board of Missions strive to meet as many of their individual needs from within their own district as possible, thus releasing more funds for use in those sections where the need may be more pressing, and the available resources not as great.

12. We praise the work of the "1000 Club" and urge its continued and even expanded use in promoting the building of new churches.

13. We urge each district superintendent and local pastor to use the facilities of the Executive Secretary of Town and Country work and

of the Conference Board of Missions, to study the desirability of establishing second or additional of our Board to every such worthy project.

14. We earnestly and respectfully request the Commission on World Service and Finance to give the Board of Missions every possible consideration in making available financial support to carry on the missionary program of the Conference. We pledge ourselves to do the best we can to place these funds where they will do the greatest good toward building the Kingdom. The disposition which we have made of the funds entrusted to us is attached hereto and is a part of this report.

We honor their memory and pay tribute to their record of service.

Your Board of Pensions has paid more than \$95,000.00 to our claimants this past year. We have a responsibility to eighty retired ministers, 98 widows, and three children. This responsibility totals more than 2,567 years of service.

During the past ten years, we have increased the rate of payments per service year for our claimants by \$15.00. This year we have established the rate per service year at \$48.00 for regular claimants and 70% of this rate for the widows and approved supplies. We have requested the same rate of assessment for the churches, namely, 15% of the amount established in the charge for the salary of the pastor.

Your Board of Pensions has been investigating the matter of securing hospitalization insurance for our claimants. We have discussed this matter with insurance companies in this state and have asked the General Board of Pensions to help us. We hope to have some definite action upon this idea in the near future. We then shall plan to assist our claimants in carrying this kind of protection so sorely needed by them.

By courtesy of the General Board of Pensions, we have for free distribution a little booklet entitled, "Preparation for Retirement." We recommend this as good reading and excellent help.

We recommend Sunday, March 15, 1959, be observed as Retired Ministers Day and that all churches participate in honoring this day with some tribute to the work of our retired ministers and by receiving a free-will offering which shall be used for special help for these worthy persons.

Our pensions funds paid to our claimants shall be disbursed on a monthly basis by our Conference Treasurer upon the order of the Chairman of the Board of Pensions. Pay dates shall be the first day of each month.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE CAMP

Camp Tanako

Camp Tanako is rapidly becoming the center of the summer activities of the Conference program. Interest has grown until there is a greater demand for dates than the time limit permits. Last season, the Camp served twenty-five different groups, totaling a little less than two thousand, with between seventy-five and one hundred in daily attendance.

In its physical development, the Camp continues to grow in accordance with the over-all plan under which improvements were begun. Buildings have been provided for the comfortable housing of the caretaker and his family, the cafeteria staff, and for one-hundred-fifty campers. The unique chapel has been completed and furnished, and will soon be in use for a second year. Valuable equipment has been added recently to facilitate kitchen and cafeteria services, as well as for the more adequate and efficient care of the grounds. Progress has been made in conserving and beautifying of the grounds, but much landscaping remains to be done before the site is brought to its fullest possibilities in terms of attractiveness and beauty.

A splendid couple is in year-around charge of buildings, equipment, and grounds, with the necessary additional help for maintenance and the further improvement of grounds and property.

For the past two seasons, and again for the one now beginning, we have had the services of a skilled public school administrator in complete charge of the summer operations of the Camp. He and his competent staff are always on the alert for the best interests of campers and guests.

The most immediate financial need is the retirement of a \$15,000.00 indebtedness, payable \$5000.00 annually, plus interest. When this debt has been retired the Board will revert to further needed building and improvement of grounds and property.

A word of appreciation is in order for the splendid board that directs the program of the Camp. No Conference agency has a membership more willing to share of time and services than those who constitute the personnel of this Board.

Again, you are extended a cordial invitation to visit the Camp and see its possibilities, and make use of its facilities during the camping season just ahead, and which we hope in the near future to extend to a longer period of time.

We recommend that the financial policy be:

- a. The same percentage from Conference apportionments (7.9%) as last year.
- a. Permission from the World Service Commission to request local churches to include the Camp in their budget, and where this is not advisable, the privilege of asking for a free-will offering on Sunday, April 26, or as near thereto as practical.

We recommend the passage of the following resolution:

Be it resolved that Article VII, Section 2, of the Articles of Incorporation be amended to read:

poration of the Little Rock Conference Methodist Camp be amended by adding "the Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission", immediately following "the Conference Missionary Secretary".

We, your Annual Conference Television, Radio, and Film Commission submit the following report.

1. We express hearty thanks to Bishop Paul E. Martin, the District Superintendents, the Pastors, the Hendrix College Choir, the Methodist Children's Home, and all other who helped to make our December telecast of "The Charles Wesley Hymn Festival" a real success. Deep appreciation goes to Station KATV for contributing the air time and the technical assistance of their excellent staff.

2. We wish to express our gratitude to the Winfield Memorial Methodist Church, Little Rock, and to First Methodist Church, Pine Bluff, for the ministry of "The Methodist Hour" telecast Sunday Morning during much of the Conference Year.

3. In spite of the fact that many churchmen seem to think that T.V. will go away if we ignore it, religious hucksters are capturing vast audiences by means of television. We believe that it is high time that Arkansas Methodism awoke to the tremendous responsibility we have to use this new medium.

4. In this connection, we especially use enthusiastic participation in the new series of public service programs produced by General TRAFCO. These program, entitled "Talkback", should open new avenues of contact between the church and community.

5. We are happy to announce that, in cooperation with the North Arkansas Conference TRAFCO, "The Methodist Hour" will return to television this fall. Using a new format, the "Church By The Side of the Road" will be produced from the studios of KATV on Sunday afternoons. Every effort will be made to tie the viewer into the local Methodist Church in his community.

6. We request that the Commission on World Service and Finance allocate the sum of fifteen hundred dollars to Conference TRAFCO to underwrite the Methodist Hour Program. A similar amount is being requested by the North Arkansas TRAFCO.

TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

Report No. 1

The Conference year 1957-1958 has been another fruitful year for the work on your Town and Country Commission. The past year has been a growing concern across the conference for the rural church, more thought being given to its problems and a greater willingness to share in order to see it prosper. These are signs of promise and are heartening to those engaged in the work of the Commission.

The following are only a few highlights of the year's work:

1. Again, the Executive Secretary gave leadership to the Simultaneous Every Member Canvass with more rural churches participating than the year before.

2. Held a State-Wide Town and Country Convocation on the Hendrix College Campus in conjunction with the North Arkansas Conference.

3. Eighteen pastors attended the Town and Country Church Seminar at the University of Arkansas. Five pastors attended the Church and Community Workshop at Emory University.

4. The Lord's Acre Program was presented to ten congregations, all of which plan to use the program this year.

5. Several rural Methodist communities won honors in the Rural Community Improvement contest this year, with Good Hope community in Bradley County winning second place in state competition.

6. The Camden District was organized into four Group Ministries.

7. In cooperation with the Cabinet and the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service a Standard for Parsonages has been developed.

8. In addition to the above, the Commission has shared in the promotion of the Conference program in the small church through the office of its Executive Secretary.

Encouraged by the response to its work, your Town and Country Commission makes the following recommendations:

1. That the Simultaneous Every Member Canvass be continued as a regular part of the Conference program.

2. That more rural churches employ the Lord's Acre program as a means of teaching Christian stewardship, financing buildings and equipment, and raising Advance Specials.

3. That rural pastors encourage their people to participate in the Rural Community Development Program sponsored by the Agricultural Extension Service of the University of Arkansas, the Arkansas Council of Churches, the Arkansas Power and Light Company, and the Arkansas Press Association.

4. That District Conferences on Rural Life be held with the purpose of developing cooperative procedures between the church and social and governmental Agencies which serve rural life.

5. That each District begin its plans to send a delegation to the National Methodist Town and Country Conference, to be held in the summer of 1959.

6. That we give whole-hearted support to the plan for rural evangelism, proposed by the Board of Evangelism.

7. That we cooperate fully with the Board of Education in its efforts to extend the emphasis on Christian Education to every church in the conference.

8. That the Standard for Parsonages being prepared by the Cabinet, the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the Town and Country Commission, be adopted as the Conference standard.

9. That the membership of the Commission be extended to include the five members at large (as provided in Paragraph 1231, Section 1 of the 1956 Discipline) and the Cabinet be requested to make these nominations.

10. In order to finance this program, we request the Commission on World Service and Finance to grant \$10,000.00. We are asking the Woman's Society of Christian Service for \$1,000.00.

The Commission has elected James E. Major as Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission and we request Bishop Paul E. Martin to appoint him to this office.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

The Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Little Rock Conference has had a most gratifying year in many respects.

An increasing number of women have taken advantage of Mission School, Workshops, Retreats, Camp, experiences and Officer Training Days to better equip them for effective service in the Woman's Society.

Last Fall a prayer retreat was held in each district, for Spiritual Life Secretaries and others, in cooperation with the Board of Evangelism's program, "Tell Arkansas About Christ". As a result of these, more prayer groups have been organized and more interest and emphasis has been placed on Bible reading, prayer, and daily devotions in the homes. This year we are planning a Conference wide prayer retreat to be held at Aldersgate Camp, October 28-30.

Our promotion workshops on the work of the Woman's Society, and featuring new methods and techniques were held on a Conference level, then in each District last October and November. These were well attended and new interest in the work of the Woman's Society was created, with a better understanding of the total program of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and its relations to the Local Church.

Our Secretary of Christian Social Relations attended a Seminar at the United Nations in October. Many of the societies have observed United Nations Day with a program of information and interest. In a study of the text, "In Every Place a Voice", our part in the ecumenical movement was explained, also, emphasis placed on the individual's part in helping to bring about peace and justice toward all people. In the study of the text, "Christ the Church, and Race", our women found in these times of stress and controversy, a better understanding of the race issue and how to meet the problems which confront us with Christian attitudes and love.

We share with other denominations in our state in the support of a Narcotic Education Director and also serve on the Board of Christian Social Relations in our Conference and local churches.

Our work with children, youth and students, in our Conference has progressed. We emphasize that a mission course be taught in each local

church for children and youth, and cooperate with the Board of Education and the Commission on Christian Vocation in providing a National for the summer camps.

We have also cooperated in the church wide study, "Lands of Decision", in the local churches. We are planning for a tour for the young people of our Conference, to the United Nations and Washington D.C. in November in cooperation with the Board of Education and Board of World Peace.

Our work with the Town and Country Commission continues and we seek to aid in the cultivation of our rural churches in any way we can.

The 76 units of the Wesleyan Service Guild have enjoyed a very fruitful year with 5 new Guilds organized this year and a total membership of 1754.

Thirty-five women from our Conference attended the Assembly of Methodist Women in St. Louis May 6th to 9th, and 39 members of the Wesleyan Service Guild attended the week-end of the 9th to 11th.

Here we were confronted with a great challenge for each of us when we were brought face to face with the changing patterns in our world today; The rise of Nationalism in many countries, the stress and strain in our own country as we seek to know our place and responsibility in this changing world, the role of the church in the world, and the changing role of the missionary. As we studied our Witness and our Mission under the theme, "Christ's Message for Today", we could not but come back more aware of our mission, more dedicated to the cause of Christ and more ready to witness in His name in every area of our lives.

We do not have our final reports on membership for the year, but from two period reports we had received 647 new members into our Society this year, 12 new district members making a total of 124 district members. Three of our districts remain fully organized, Arkadelphia, Camden, and Little Rock. Monticello has 9 unorganized churches where there was 16 last year, Pine Bluff has 20 where there were 12 last year, and Hope has 27 where they had 47 last year. So we are gradually working toward 100% organization in our Conference. That means a Society or district member in every church in the Conference.

Our financial report shows an increase over last year's report and we hope to make even greater gains in the coming year. Our pledge to Missions to the Division this year was \$77,400. We have paid on this pledge \$79,030, on appropriations which includes youth and children's funds, \$82,943.05; total sent the Division, \$94,090.77; total received from the Districts, \$107,348.23; raised and spent on local church and community work, \$61,293.82.

We give thanks to each of the local societies and each of the members of the Woman's Society for the things accomplished in our work this year. Thanks, also, to each of the local ministers, District Superintendents, and our Bishop for their loyal cooperation and backing in our work. And we pray that our spirit of cooperation and mutual interest in the work of spreading the Gospel to the remotest and to the least may continue to grow until we may realize "The Spirit of Christ for all of Life" in our world.

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

Report No. 1

We, your Commission on World Service and Finance, submit the following report:

1. The amount apportioned to this Annual Conference by the General Commission on World Service and Finance is \$102,462.00.

2. The amount apportioned for Conference Work is the same amount \$102,462.00.

3. Combining these apportionments for General and Annual Conference Work, we have a total of \$204, 924.00.

4. We recommend the sum of \$750.00 for Area Expense, concurring in this with a request from the Bishop and his Cabinet.

5. Concurring with a request from the Bishop, we recommend the allotting of an amount of \$300.00 from the District Superintendent's Fund for the expenses of the District Superintendents to the Area Conference.

6. The amount apportioned for the Little Rock Conference for the General Administration and the South Central Jurisdictional Annual Budget is \$9,207.00. General Administration — \$4,615.00; the South Central Jurisdiction — \$4,592.00.

7. The amount apportioned for the Episcopal Fund is to be an amount equal to two percent of the cash salaries of the Pastors for the current year.

8. We recommend that the Treasurer be authorized to pay \$15.00 for membership in the Methodist Historical Society of the Conference and the National Methodist Historical Society, also that the Treasurer pay the expense for securing the photos of the Class on Trial and of each minister who retires.

9. We authorize the Treasurer to co-operate with the First Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas, and to pay the proper official of said Church any deficit in Conference entertainment expense.

10. At the suggestion of the Board of Education, we recommend the Fourth Sunday in September as Church School Day and authorize the Church School Day Askings of \$7,000.00, and urge all our churches to co-operate.

11. We endorse an offering in November, to be known as the Ministerial Training Special Offering, to be used in ministerial student loans and scholarships, and in the support of the Arkansas Pastor's School. We urge every church to make a generous response. We, furthermore, urge all the churches to respond to the program as outlined by the General Conference to increase the contribution to at least \$1.00 per member for the cause of Higher Education, and 30 cents per member for Wesley Foundation.

12. Concurring with the request of the Board of Pensions, we recommend that Veterans Day be observed with an offering by all churches on Sunday, March 15th.

13. We urge our churches to continue their support of Camp Tanako. Concurring with the request from the Camp Board, we are urging all churches to either include the Camp Program in their Annual Financial Budget or to make the fourth Sunday of April as Camp Sunday, at which time a free-will offering may be made for this project.

14. Your Commission nominated Rev. Louis W. Averitt as Conference Treasurer and recommends that his salary be set at \$5400.00 to be paid out of the Conference Administration Fund. Also, we recommend \$1200.00 for office and secretarial help, \$625.00 for office rent and \$1800 for house rent, all of these items to come out of the Conference Administration Fund except \$600.00 which will come from the Conference Group Insurance Fund.

15. Your commission concurs in the request of the Bishop and his cabinet and recommends that \$600.00 per year be paid to the Statistician out of the Conference Administration Fund.

16. We recommend a charge of 3% of all funds handled by the Conference Treasurer, excepting the Conference Claimants and Superannuate Endowment, and this money derived from these charges to be set up as a Conference Administration Fund, in accordance with the Conference Standing Rule.

17. The amount apportioned to the Annual Conference for the Inter-denominational Co-operation Fund is \$3,654.00.

18. The commission recommends that the percent of 10% of all pastor's cash salaries be apportioned for the District Superintendent's Fund.

19. The commission further recommends that the amount of \$3,259.00 be apportioned to the Annual Conference for the Methodist Television Ministry.

20. Upon the suggestion of the Conference Statistician and the Conference Treasurer and with the approval of the Bishop and his Cabinet, the Commission recommends that the following items: — Episcopal Area Expense, Methodist Information, Inter-denominational Co-operation, Methodist Television Ministry, General Administration Fund, the Arkansas Council of Churches, and Jurisdictional Fund be combined in the Conference Reports under the head of Connectional Items. (This is to simplify the handling of these items in the Conference Reports and the journal.)

21. The commission recommends that the following payments be made out of the Emergency Fund as set up in our Conference Apportionments:

Social and Economic Relations	\$ 300.00
State Council of Churches	500.00
World Peace	300.00
Television Ministry	1500.00
Historical Society	100.00

22. **District Superintendents' Salaries and Expense and Utilities.** The District Superintendents shall receive an annual salary of \$7700.00 paid monthly. For travel expense, they shall receive an additional amount of \$2500.00 paid monthly to the superintendents to be used at the discretion of the superintendents, individually; also, an amount of \$800.00 for utilities.

23. **Utilities for pastors.** Each charge is requested to designate the cost of the parsonage utilities as a part of the assessed salary, thus exempting the cost of the utilities from the income tax claims. It is understood that this amount, the total salary, is subject to the percentage levied against pastors' salaries.

24. We call to your attention the matter of Christian Wills Promotion and urge that both District Superintendents and Pastors make this program known to our people. This is an opportunity to extend ones influence and Christian Service to the evangelizing of the world down through the ages. Materials may be ordered from the Department of Wills, Bequests, and Gifts of the Council of World Service and Finance, 740 Rush Street, Chicago, Illinois.

25. We approve the request of the Conference Board of Missions for permission to promote the raising of the sum of \$8,000.00 for the Rio Grande Conference and the sum of \$3,000 for the Indian Mission Conference during the Conference Year 1958-59.

TERRY M. ARMSTRONG

Rev. Terry M. Armstrong was born in White County, near Armstrong's Springs, Oct. 5, 1884. He was admitted into the Little Rock Conference on Trial in 1907 and assigned to Swan Lake circuit, thus beginning a long and useful ministry. On October 2, 1907 he was married to Clara Parker, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Parker of Saint Charles, Arkansas. He served the following appointments: Swan Lake circuit, 1907-09; Star City, 1909-11; Hampton, 1911-13; Bengin 1913-15; Okolona 1915-18; Hazen-DeValls Bulff, 1918-24; Lewisville 1924-26; Fairview Texarkana, 1924-28; Lewisville 1929-31; Waldo 1931-34; Glenwood, 1934-36; Sherrill-Tucker, 1936-38; Norphlet, 1938-39; Okolona, 1939-43; Blevins 1943-45; Sheridan, 1945-47.



He retired in 1947 and went to Nashville, Arkansas to make his home with a daughter, Mrs. Boyd Tackett.

Brother Armstrong and His faithful wife who preceeded him to the grave by some ten years, reared a large family. They served the church through a long period and knew what it meant to sacrifice and toil for little of the world's goods.

There was something magnificent about the relationship of Brother Armstrong and his people. They loved him with a warm devotion. He was known as "a man's man." His men loved and followed his leadership with love and loyalty to the Master whom they all served.

This writer loved Brother Armstrong. He was the first Methodist minister I knew, on coming to Arkansas and entering the Little Rock Conference in 1923. Through the years, our friendship never lagged. He was genuine. He loved his church and His God.

His funeral was held from the Lewisville Methodist church, by Rev. Wm. E. Brown; assisted by David Hankins and O. E. Holmes.

SETH KEENER BURNETT

Rev. S. K. Burnett was born Jan. 23rd, 1872 at Lagrue Springs, Ark., just a few miles North of Arkansas Post, the son of Nathaniel Seth Burnett, and Eliza Caple Burnett. A short time after his birth his mother became widowed she moved with her family to Saline County and made her home with her father, Caples, a pioneer family of the Sardis community. Here Brother Burnett grew to manhood, obtaining his education at the near-by schools of Briant and Benton.

He was converted in early youth and joined the Methodist Church. Thus began a long life of growth in Grace and the knowledge and love of God, and Christ Jesus His Son.



While a student in Hendrix College he was licensed to preach at Marvin's Chapel in Saline county in 1895. He served as supply the Lonoke Circuit in 1900. While serving this circuit he visited a preacher friend, Rev. F. P. Doak on the Dalark Circuit where he met a Miss Georgia Patterson, a daughter to an old pioneer family of Dallas County. He was married by Bro. Doak to Miss Patterson June 26th 1901. For fifty seven years Sister Burnett walked by his side, sharing the ups and downs, the joys and delights of a Methodist preacher's life.

In the fall of 1901 Brother Burnett was admitted to the Little Rock Conference on trial at which met at Hope, Ark. His first appointment was Antoine Circuit. While pastor of this circuit he had the pleasure of taking five young men with him to the District Conference which met at Old Columbus, Hepstead County, where they were licensed to preach on Saturday, July 16th, 1903. These five young men were: E. J. Slaughter, Henry H. Griffin, H. E. Van Camp, E. A. McMillian, and J. D. Baker, the writer of this article who is the only one of the company living today. He was ordained Elder at the session of the Little Rock Conference which met in Camden in fall of 1905, Bishop Chas. B. Gallo-way presiding.

Among the other appointments served by Brother Burnett, were: Park Ave. Hot Springs, Benton, Huttig, Ashdown, DeQueen, Stamps, Pullman Heights, Hot Springs, Lonoke, Bauxite-Sardis, Glenwood and Gillette. Due to bad health he retired in 1941. He then make his home in Hot Springs. Soon after retirement his health became so much improved that he was able to take work in a limited degree. He was appointed to a newly formed charge, Fountain Lake, near Hot Springs, then Tigert Memorial, Hot Springs. His last charge was Piney Grove, while pastor of this church for five years he completed the beautiful brick church which stands to day as a monument to his faithful service.

During these years of service as a supply to these churches he suffered many afflictions. In 1954 he had to retire from any further active service, he place his membership in the Grand Ave. Church at Hot Springs. Here, he continued to worship as often as possible.

Through fifty seven years I have followed and have been interested in the life and work of this, my friend. He was more than an ordinary preacher. He loved the Methodist Church, and was zealous in its every cause. He never failed to bring up every financial obligation laid upon him and his charge. He was a good shepherd to his people. He visited from house to house as he promised to do as he stood at the bar of the Conference and took upon himself the vows of a Methodist preacher. He was strongly evangelistic in his preaching and hundred were saved because of his faithful gospel preaching. This writer had the privilege of many, many visits with him in his home. He often told me of his strong Faith in God, and that his love for God and all mankind grew stronger as the days passed. In every relation he gave himself fully to the best as a "Good Minister of Jesus Christ".

While visiting his son in Dallas last fall he became ill and had to be returned to Hot Springs, he lingered a few days and on January 29th, 1958, his pure spirit returned unto God who gave it. His life's work had been well done. He had walked faithfully with God. Were we able to pierce through the mist between earth and heaven, we might hear him paraphrasing an old verse of song we often sing, shout from the Glory-Land to us below,

"When I've been here ten thousand years,
Bright shining as the sun,
I've no less days to walk with God,
The Walk has just begun,"

Brother Burnett leaves beside his widow, one daughter, Mrs. Purify Gill of Little Rock, one son, Rowland, of Dallas, Texas, five grand children and a host of other relatives.

His funeral was held at Grand Ave. Church, Hot Springs, by his pastor, assisted by Rev. T. T. McNeal, his district Superintendent, with prayer by Brother Roy Farr. His body was laid to rest in the Memorial Park Cemetery a few miles west of Hot Springs.

JOHN T. RODGERS

On Thursday, July 25th, 1957, a little plot of ground, chosen by him long ago, received the body of J. T. Rodgers, who was for fifty years a minister in the Methodist Church. Born in Georgia in 1859, his parents came to Arkansas before the war between the states, and for nearly a century Arkansas was his home.

As a young man he was impressed with a sense of the call to the ministry. However, after graduating from the University of Arkansas, he entered business and public life. For a time he represented Jefferson County in the Arkansas State House of Representatives. At another time he was collector of internal revenue. Then in middle life he came into a deep religious experience and gave himself to the ministry of Christ in the service of the Methodist Church. He was admitted to the Little Rock Conference on trial in 1907. The worth of his labor is attested by the fruit of his service on Roe Circuit, St. Charles Circuit, at Murfreesboro, Highland in Little Rock, Lockesburg Circuit, Bauxite, Hamburg, Lonoke, Stamps, Stephens, Bearden, DesArc, DeValls Bluff.



In his ministry he was dominated by the evangelistic passion. His pulpit ministry was characterized by a deep understanding of the Bible, it's teaching presented logically and forcefully. He had a command of good, pure, easily understood words. His care for the Church was personal, he had a consuming desire to help people in living well as Methodist Christians. His whole ministry was based on his faith in Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord.

He was a man who set highest values on the virtues which make for worthy living. He never looked down on any man, and to no one did he yield because of position or power. He was never awed by the outward attributes of possession or place. He walked surely in the conscious dignity of his Christian manhood. He was always ready to look any man eye to eye and declare the truth as he believed it.

He was a good Churchman. He saw the weakness of the Church as a human institution, but he saw, too, the strength of the Church because God is in her life. It was to him the bride of Christ. He held a high stand and for it's ministry. He was loyal to it's program. Sometimes he was restlessly impatient in the desire for it's growth. Every person who knew him well was certain of his love for the Church. It was the object of his unceasing care.

His life span covered the most creative years in our history. He could remember the closing days of the war and the terrible days of reconstruction. In his youth the great Western Frontier was being pushed back. He lived through the financial dislocations of the latter nineteenth century. He was a man in public life when the Spanish-American War raised the United States to the position of a world power. In his ministry the first World War was fought, then he lived to see the second World War and the unsolved problems it left. He had seen the county

he loved grow from a vast land of untouched resources and sparse population to a day when a large population and diminishing resources demand care in their exploitation. He had seen the inventions of man make the world a physical neighborhood. He had seen the practice of agriculture move out from the mule and bull tongue plow to the great machines of today. He had seen the development of vast corporations and huge plants bring an era of closely dependant economic life to the western world. He had seen the Church, divided before he was born, reunited. And in all these changing events he moved as a man conscious of his own responsibility as citizen and man, and as minister whose gifts had been laid at the feet of Christ who loved him and gave himself for him.

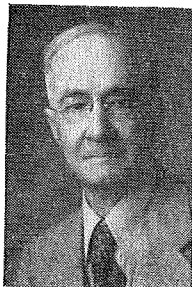
He was first married to Miss Mattie Foster of Rison, who died in early life. He was then married to Miss Alice Lesli of DeWitt. Some years after her death Miss Leona Stephenson, of St. Charles, became his wife. No woman could have been a more devoted wife, nor could any have given themselves to the work of a pastor's wife with greater ability and devotion. She survives him. A brother, Rowland Rodgers; Lee, a son; Mrs. Pauline Hale, a daughter; J. T., a grandson also survive him.

The funeral service was held in DeWitt Church on the afternoon of July 26th, 1957, and was conducted by Dr. Arthur Terry, The Reverend Curtis Williams and E. C. Rule, his district superintendent.

JOSEPH BENTON SIMS

Rev. Joseph Benton Sims who was born February 16, 1863, joined the North Texas Conference, on trial, in 1894 and was admitted into full connection in 1896. He was ordained a deacon in 1896 and an Elder in 1898. He was transferred to the Little Rock Conference in 1908. Since his retirement in 1926, he had been living, for the most part in New Mexico and California and was in California at the time of his death, which occurred on August 5, 1957 at Colton, California. He was buried at Colton, California.



Bro. Sims served fourteen years in the North Texas Conference and Eighteen years in the Little Rock Conference. His appointments in Texas were: Mt. Vernon, 1894-5; Salt Hill and Bryson, 1895-97; Rhome, 1897-99; Avord, 1899-1900; Fruitland, 1900-01; Rhome, 1901-04; Elmo, 1904-08. His appointments in the Little Rock Conference were: Wilmar, 1908-11; McGehee, 1911-14; Mena, 1914-16; DeValls Bluff and Hazen, 1916-19; Mineral Springs, 1919-22; Huttig, 1922-23; Thornton, 1923-25; DeLight, 1925-26.

Bro. John L. Hoover has been asked because of his long association with Bro. Sims to supply a paragraph touching the personal life and character of this good man. He writes as follows:

"It was my privilege to know Brother Sims as early as November 1908, for it was at that time he was seeking readmission and I asked to be admitted on trial in the Little Rock Conference. After that for almost twenty years he and I were associated together in the work of the Kingdom. He made a deep impression upon my life and no doubt powerfully affected what future success I enjoyed as a Methodist preacher. Physically, he was of small stature and I have carried to this day the conviction that he was one of the gentlest, the most self retiring, and the most genuinely sane religious man I have known in life. He was not an outstanding pulpiteer in

the common acceptance of the term. But he had a great experience of the Almighty Saviorhood of Jesus Christ in his heart and he carried a sense of moral indebtedness to proclaim that testimony to lost men. In fine, he had a great experience of God and knew how to tell it effectively. He assisted me when I was young in the ministry in a number of revivals and I was always able to report — "We had a good meeting." I know of no one of whom it may be more fittingly said

"Servant of God, well done!
Thy glorious warfare's past
The battle's fought, the race is won
And thou art crowned at last."

JOHN LEIROY TUCKER

John Leiroy Tucker was born at Prairie Dell, Texas, October 3, 1895. He united with the Methodist Church at Prairie Dell in 1910. Tucker, all in the Little Rock Conference, were as follows: Roe Circuit, 1926-28; Des Arc, 1928-30; Hazen-DeValls Bluff, 1930-32; Bauxite-Sardis, 1932-34; Pullman Heights, Hot Springs, 1934-36; Supernumerary Relationship, 1936-37; Bearden, 1937-39; Vantrease Memorial, El Dorado, 1939-40; Dermott, 1940-42; Hamburg, 1942-46; Highland, Little Rock, 1946-49; DeQueen, 1949-52; Smackover, 1952-55; Jackson Street, Magnolia, 1955-56; Almyra, 1956-57.



On December 26, 1928, John L., and Miss Marie Votaw, of Roe, were married. Theirs was a beautiful and devoted companionship, and inspiration to all who had the privilege of knowing them.

Their only daughter, Leah Doloris, now Mrs. Charles Watson, lives in Little Rock with her husband and daughter, Leah.

John Tucker is survived, also, by his mother, Mrs. M. M. Spiars of Temple, Texas, three brothers, Claude Tucker, Waco, Texas, W. H. Spiars, and Allen Spiars of Los Angeles, California and three sisters; Mrs. Ann Fitzgerald, Dallas, Texas, Mrs. Frank Rodgers, Temple, Texas, and Mrs. George Szoke, Los Angeles, California.

Our brother was educated in the public schools of Granger, Texas and in Southern Methodist University. He served in the United States Army overseas, in World War I, was wounded in battle, in the Orgonne Forest. Before entering the pastorate, he served a time as Y.M.C.A. Secretary in Pine Bluff and as Associate Pastor of the First Methodist Church, Pine Bluff.

Brother Tucker was an active member of several Masonic bodies, both of the York Rite, and the Scottish Rite. He was a Knight Commander of the Court of Honor in the Scottish Rite, and a Past Master of Arkansas Research Lodge of Master Masons in Little Rock.

John Tucker was active in the conference affairs of his church and rendered great service as a member of the Conference Board of Educa-

tion, Evangelism, Temperance, and Missions, and of the Board of Trustees of Camp Tanako.

This noble and worthy soul, our beloved brother passed to his eternal reward at 6:00 p. m., Sunday, June 16, 1957. He had been stricken that morning during Sunday School, in Almyra, at the church of which he was pastor.

Services were held for him at the church in Almyra, at 10:00 a. m., Tuesday, June 18, 1957, by E. Clifton Rule, His District Superintendent assisted by Arthur Terry and Kenneth L. Spore, superintendents respectively of the Little Rock and Monticello Districts. Burial by Turpin Funeral Service of Stuttgart, was in Shady Grove Cemetery, near Clarendon.

John Leiroy Tucker was a man of great strength of character and indomitable courage. The right was the law by which he lived. All whose lives were touched by his, are better because he lived so well. His standards for things moral and spiritual were very high. All who knew him admired and loved him for the good man that he was and the loyal friend he could be. This present writer counts it among his richest treasures that have been his, in this life, that for some 30 years John Tucker was his friend. Our associations were deep and inestimable in masonry, in the church, and in our personal lives.

JAMES ARTHUR GINNINGS

James Arthur Ginnings, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Ginnings, was born November 12th, 1880, at Bright Star in Miller County, Arkansas. All of his boyhood was spent on the farm between Bright Star, Arkansas, and Bloomburg, Texas. On March 14th, 1900, he was married to Lorena Puckett and in 1902, at the Texarkana District Conference, he was licensed to preach in the Methodist Church.

Brother Ginnings continued to farm near Bright Star and preached wherever and whenever he could find a congregation until 1922. He preached in homes, school houses, under brush arbors, and in local churches as a local preacher until the year 1922 when he joined the Little Rock Conference on trial. He was ordained deacon November the 21st, 1926, at the Annual Conference held at Warren, Arkansas, under Bishop Hiram Abiff Boaz. He was ordained elder Nov. 13th, 1932, at the Annual Conference held at Texarkana under Bishop Hoyt M. Dobbs. All of his formal education was through the correspondence schools.

His first appointment was in 1922 when he was sent to the Fouke Circuit in Miller County. At that time he owned his home and farm and he and Mrs. Ginnings had seven children. They sold their home and farm and moved their family to Fouke. Within the next twenty years he served charges at Fouke, Doddridge and Winthrop in Arkansas, and Redwater, South State Line and Wood Street in Texas. Fourteen of this twenty four years were spent as pastor of the Fouke Circuit, where he returned several times and where he was pastor when he retired in the fall of 1946.

At the time of his retirement Brother and Mrs. Ginnings had eight children, all of them were married and away from home and they moved to 1105 Cleveland, in Texarkana, where Mrs. Ginnings still resides.

Brother Ginnings continued to conduct funerals, perform weddings, and preach on many occasions until his health began to fail. On Tuesday, January the 18th, 1958, after about two years of continued illness he went to his final reward.

It was my high privilege to be his pastor for the last five and one-half years of his life. It is the feeling of many people of The Four States Area, that no single person has had so much religious influence on the lives of the people of this area as did Brother Ginnings. After the merger of the three Methodist churches in 1939, he

served the following charges in the Little Rock Conference: Morning Star, Lonsdale, Couchwood Circuit, and the Hot Springs Circuit.

He was in poor health for the last fifteen years of his life but kept on preaching until he was forced to retire in 1953. His last work was the Hot Springs Circuit. He was a hard worker, an humble, sincere servant of the Lord. He was able in prayer and had a happy knack of getting along with people. He reared his children around the family altar and saw to it that they were regular attendants at Sunday School and church. His salary was always small but with it he managed to give his children the educational advantages of which he himself had been deprived.

He died quietly at his home in Hot Springs on Nov. 2, 1957. His funeral service was held on Nov. 3, 1957 in the Methodist church at Bismarck, Ark., Rev. Clyde Parsons, pastor of the Oaklawn Methodist church, officiating assisted by the Rev. Robert Beasley and the writer of this memoir. A great concourse of friends, including his ministerial brethren of the Methodist and other denominations, overflowed the church onto the church grounds. He was greatly beloved by all.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Dora Lee Burroughs of Morrilton, Ark., one daughter, Mrs. Eva Bray, Hot Springs, Ark., three sons, O. D., Little Rock, Willie of Mt. Pine, and Arthur of Morrilton, by eleven grandchildren and six great-grand children.

MRS. B. F. SCOTT

Jennie May Pritchett, daughter of James Parham and Emma Rebecca Shepherd Pritchett, was born July 26, 1869 near Macon, Georgia. Having lost all of their worldly possessions in the war between the states, her parents moved to Arkansas when she was six months old and settled in Saline County near Benton. She came from a family of devout Christians who served as leaders in the religious life of the Community in which they lived. It was therefore in keeping with the logic of events that she gave her heart to God at an early age. The home of her parents was always open to ministers, and she grew up with a feeling of reverence and respect for the ministry.

On November the 30th, 1890 she was married to the Rev. Benjamin Franklin Scott in Salem Church, near Benton. Dr. Andrew Hunter, one of the great leaders in the early days of Methodism in Arkansas, performed the ceremony. To this union were born five children, four of whom survive. They are Mrs. R. W. Griswold of Malvern, Mrs. Allie Mae Cupp of Camden, B. F. Scott, Jr. of El Dorado, and Miss Ethel Scott of Camden. Another daughter, Mary Emma Scott, died July 28, 1915 when only nine years of age. Mrs. Scott is also survived by seven grandchildren, and 16 great grandchildren.

For forty one years she served faithfully with her devoted husband in the several pastorates to which he was assigned in the Little Rock Conference. The Church was always the first concern of the lives of Brother and Mrs. Scott. She was always ready to assist him wherever she could be of service, often accompanying him on the rounds of his circuit. She loved life and she loved people, and always listened with patience and deep concern to those who came to her with their troubles.

She loved her parsonage homes, and with her loving touch could transform the humblest house into a home where her husband and children could be happy.

When her husband retired from the ministry in 1931 they came to Camden to make their home where they lived happily until his death. They continued to take an active part in the Church. She especially loved the work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and in 1951 was awarded a life membership. She was a member of the Kate Steel Bible Class of First Church, Camden, and attended as long as her health permitted. Even though she was totally deaf for the last ten years of her life, and was gradually going blind she continued to attend Church services until a few months before her death. She could not hear the minister's voice or see the congregation, yet she was glad to be in God's house, and her presence was a great inspiration to her pastor, and to

all the members of the congregation. She died quietly, as she had lived, December 24, 1957 having reached the age of 88 years, 4 months and 28 days. Her funeral service was conducted in the First Methodist Church in Camden by Dr. W. Neill Hart. Her body was laid to rest beside her husband's in Greenwood Cemetery.

MRS. LEONARD L. WOZENCRAFT

Martha Jane Shankle was born in White County, Arkansas, April 19, 1866, the daughter of John Shankle and Mrs. Hester Ann White Shankle. Her father died when she was quite young, and her mother, with four children moved to Dallas County, to make their home with relatives. Martha Jane attended the rural schools, to which she had access. On March 18, 1888 she was married to a young school teacher, Leonard L. Wozencraft. Come two years after their marriage Mr. Wozencraft answered the call to the ministry, and joined the Little Rock Conference. After six and a half years, in which he served at Bryant, Mablevale, and England, Arkansas.

Four children were born to this union, all of whom survive. They are Winfred L. Hester N. (Mrs. Sam Abernathy), Mamie (Mrs. Filmore Taylor), and Lennie L.

After the death of her husband, Mrs. Wozencraft moved to the home of his mother, Mrs. William Wozencraft, near Holly Springs, Arkansas. There she reared and educated her children. She was active in all Community affairs. She taught a class of young people at Mt. Olivet Church for many years. She came to Camden in 1941, and made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Sam Abernathy.

Mrs. Wozencraft lived for sixty years after her husband's death. During that time she remained true to the ideals and purposes to which they had together dedicated their lives. She remained active in body and mind almost to the very end. Five years ago she undertook the task of cleaning up the Mt. Olivet cemetery, where her body now rests. Four years ago she became greatly interested in the cancer drive, and participated actively in it. She was devoted to her Church. She held her membership in Sardis Church, near Sparkman, but after moving to Camden, she participated actively in the work of the First Methodist Church here. She was a member of the W S C S, the Kate Steel Bible Class, and was regularly at Church until her strength no longer permitted.

About two weeks before her death, Mrs. Wozencraft said to her daughter, "I am tired," and went to bed to await the time of her departure Thursday afternoon November 14, 1957 at the age of ninety one she fell asleep. Funeral services were conducted from the First Methodist Church, Camden, on Saturday, November 16, by The Rev. Claude R. Roy and the writer.

In addition to the two sons and two daughters mentioned above, she is survived by one brother, J. T. Shankle of Holly Springs, Arkansas, eight grand children, and eleven great grandchildren.

CAUGHEY E. HAYES

Caughey E. Hayes, son of Reverend and Mrs. T. W. Hayes, was born March 8, 1875, and died in Little Rock November 23, 1957.

For over forty years Mr. Hayes was a prominent figure in the activities of the Little Rock Annual Conference. He was one of the best known and most loved laymen in the Conference. He was elected Chairman of the Sunday School Board at the 1916 session of the Conference and served continuously through 1933, for a total of eighteen years. When the Sunday School Board became the Conference Board of Education,

he was continued at its Chairman. Mr. Hayes was elected delegate to the General Conference in 1921 and in 1925. He was an alternate in 1933. In 1921 he led the lay delegation.



Mr. Hayes was more than a mere Chairman, for he took an active interest in all the work of the Boards in which he served. In 1920, when the proposal was made to place a rural worker in the field and the Board had no funds to finance this work, Mr. Hayes underwrote the cost of this forward movement. The late F. T. Fowler was selected to head this project.

Mr. Hayes was elected Conference Treasurer in 1916 and served continuously through 1951, for a total of thirty-five years. For many years he served without financial compensation. Mr. Hayes served his local church, Winfield Methodist Church in Little Rock,

with a staunch devotion, able leadership and sacrificial spirit that caused him to be known as "Mr. Winfield."

X. Miscellaneous

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

1. Nominations. The District Superintendents shall nominate all members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees except as otherwise provided.

2. Conference Program. The program for the session of the Annual Conference shall be arranged by a Planning Committee at least thirty days before the convening of the session and published in advance of the session. This committee shall be composed of the Bishop, the Secretary of the Conference, the Statistician, the Treasurer, the District Superintendents, the Pastor-host, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference President of the W. S. C. S., the Conference President of the M. Y. F., the Chairman of all Boards, Conference Corporations, Commissions and Committees, and the executive officers of all boards or commissions having such officers, and anyone else whom, in the judgment of the Bishop, should be called in, in any year. This Committee shall provide for all preaching, inspiration and anniversary services, of the Annual Conference sessions. The program thus arranged, may be revised by Conference action.

3. Financial and Statistical. (1) The District Superintendents shall furnish the statistician with all assessments and acceptances of the pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the meeting of the Annual Conference. These figures shall be official. (2) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars, with no column for cents. (3) Each pastor shall report to the Conference Treasurer and turn in his statistical report to the statistician at a date set by the cabinet. (4) The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be June 1st to May 31st, and all salaries and connectional askings of the Churches shall be paid on this basis."

4. Memoirs. There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased Clerical Member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, name of children, charges served and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with his memoir. The memoirs of the wives or widows of clerical members of the Conference shall be published in the Journal. The names of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs the passing of any person whose memoir should appear in the Journal.

5. Administrative Fund. The Commission of World Service and Finance shall recommend an assessment for a Conference administrative fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expense of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this fund. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the fund. Payments from the fund shall be made only on vouchers signed by the secretary of the Conference; provided that this rule does not relate to the salary and expenses of the Treasurer of the Conference.

6. Conference Treasurer. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall

assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer on recommendation of the World Service Commission, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.

7. Number of Districts. There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Conference.

8. District Fund. The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall report to the district conference, annually, showing receipts and disbursements.

9. Reports and Resolutions. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the Journal shall be typewritten in triplicate on special forms furnished by the Conference, and obtained from the Conference Secretary or Statistician.

10. Membership of Historical Society. The Historical Society shall be composed of ten members, one of whom shall be the Conference Secretary. In addition to the duties outlined in the Discipline, the Society shall secure a group picture of each class admitted on trial for publication in the Journal; and also two small pictures of each clerical members at the time of his retirement.

11. District Conferences. There shall be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline and one additional members from each pastoral charge, provided, however, in charges of more than five hundred members there shall be one additional members for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.

12. Lay Members. Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the Pastor-host of the Annual Conference at least fifteen days before the session of the Annual Conference.

13. Board Service. No person may be nominated to serve on the same conference board for more than two consecutive quadrenniums, and may not be nominated to serve on more than one board at the same time. District Superintendents may not serve on Conference Boards, except as provided in the Discipline or by specific conference action. A person failing to attend a board of which he is a member, in a quadrennium may be continued only by special board action. The rule applies to the following boards: Educations, Missions, Temperance, Evangelism, Ministerial Training, Hospital and Home, Christian Literature, The Bible Board, and such other boards as the Annual Conference may direct.

14. Inter-Board Committee. There shall be an Inter-board Committee composed of the Presiding Officers of the following boards and agencies: the W.S.C.S., the M.Y.F., the Committee on Christian Vocations, Camp Tanako, the Town and Country Commission, the Arkansas Methodist, the Board of Lay Activities, Missions, Temperance, Education, Evangelism, Ministerial Training, Conference Claimants, Hospital and Homes, and other such boards, and officers as the Conference may direct to have such duties as the Annual Conference may from time to time prescribe.

15. Entertainment. The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the retired ministers shall be entertained from the entertainment fund. Each member of the Conference, both clerical and lay, in attendance shall pay \$1.00 registration fee to the entertain-

ment fund, and all offering unless otherwise specified shall go to the fund. The entertainment fund shall be administered by the Pastor-host or such person or persons as he may appoint, reporting in the next session of the Annual Conference.

16. Conference Expense. Registration fees and the offerings at the public services in the session of the Annual Conference shall be used to defray the expense of the session, and that any deficit remaining be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund, and the Conference Treasurer shall pay the same.

17. Pastor's Traveling Expense. After the Fourth Quarterly Conference of a charge has set the minimum salary of a pastor for the ensuing year, the Quarterly Conference may set the traveling expense fund for the pastor in an amount not to exceed \$600 per year for each pastor and associate pastor assigned to a pastoral charge; provided, however, that charges of more than one church may allow an additional \$300 travel expense per each additional church. A salary may not be lowered to initiate an expense fund or to increase an existing expense fund.

18. Copies of Reports for District Superintendents. Upon adjournment of each Annual Conference, each Board and Commission shall provide each member of the cabinet with a copy of the report adopted by the Annual Conference.

19. Amendments. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.
