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

CONFERENCE MINUTES

Tuesday, 9:00 A.M. - May 31, 1960

Conference Organized: The One-Hundred Seventh Session (22nd of the United Church) of the Little Rock Conference of The Methodist Church was convened at First Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas, on May 31, 1960, at 9:00 a. m. Bishop Paul E. Martin announced hymn number 402, "And Are We Yet Alive," and led the Conference in a Service of Worship, using Responsive Reading 22nd Sunday, 1st Reading, and ritual prayers found in our hymn book, reading an editorial found in The Arkansas Methodist, and then hymn number 4, "O Worship the King" was sung.

Roll Call: The Bishop called on J. Ralph Clayton, Conference Secretary, to take the roll. Nominated as tellers are the following: Robert Johnson, Eugene Gilliam, Clyde Swift, Gerald Fincher, Richard Poss and Darrell Bone.

Nominations: The Secretary, J. Ralph Clayton, advised the Conference that he did not wish to be considered as Secretary for the ensuing quadrennium. In the light of this fact, Bishop Paul E. Martin called for nominations for position of Secretary of the Conference. Dr. J. Kenneth Shamblin nominated Reverend James E. Major. Reverend D. Mouzan Mann nominated Joe R. Phillips, Jr. Motion was made by W. D. Golden that nominations be closed, seconded and passed. The vote was taken and Rev. James E. Major was elected as Secretary of the Conference. D. Mouzon Mann moved that it be a unanimous vote, it was seconded and passed.

Bar of the Conference: Dr. Fred R. Harrison set the Bar of the Conference as the main part of the Sanctuary back to the archways.

Conference Statistician: Rev. R. B. Moore nominated Fred Gantt as Statistician of the Conference. He was elected.

Methodist Publishing House: Thomas Cherrington, representative of the Methodist Publishing House, reported on work of the Methodist Publishing House, described four books, and presented a check to Bishop Paul E. Martin in the amount of \$3,667.72 as the share of the Little Rock Annual Conference in the sales of the Methodist Publishing House. This profit in turn is to go to the Retired Ministers. Bishop Martin presented the check to Rev. Roland Darrow, Chairman of the Board of Pensions.

Secretary Nominations: James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference, nominated Woodrow W. Smith as Journal Clerk, Harold K. Davis Secretary of Rolls and Records, and Kenneth L. Spore as Secretary of Ministers Service Records, Harould Scott assisting Dr. Spore until he is able to perform this work.

Pastor Host: Dr. Fred R. Harrison, Pastor Host, presented the Chairman of the First Methodist Church Official Board, Mr. Cooper B. Land, who gave the Conference a gracious welcome to Hot Springs and the First Methodist Church. Bishop Martin responded, calling attention to the many fine improvements made since the last Annual Conference session.

Agenda: Dr. R. B. Moore moved that the printed program be the agenda for the Conference, and the motion passed.

Greetings: The Conference Secretary was instructed to send greetings to the following persons who because of illness were unable to be present: Dr. K. L. Spore, Carl Hollis, Mrs. Jess Hamilton, Mrs. Robert

Beasley, and Mrs. T. S. Lovett. Bishop Martin led the Conference in a prayer in their behalf.

Cabinet Nominations: T. T. McNeal presented the report of the Cabinet as a nominating committee and the nominations were accepted by the Conference. He asked further that the District Committee on Church Location and Extension members be allowed to be appointed after appointment had been made. It was moved and passed. T. T. McNeal moved that these appointments be properly mimeographed and made available to the members of the Annual Conference. The motion passed. Bishop Martin asked consent of the Conference for the approval of the appointment of Dr. Wm. E. Brown to the position of Executive Secretary of the Arkansas Christian, Civic and Moral Foundation. Approved.

Committee on Conference Relations: Joe R. Phillips reported that their Committee found nothing against the character of the ministers. The report was adopted.

District Superintendent's Report: Dr. W. Neill Hart, Secretary of the Cabinet, read the composite report of the District Superintendents. It was adopted. Bishop Martin commended the laymen and ministers of the Conference as well as the Superintendents for their loyal support of the program of the Church and making this splendid report possible.

Town and Country Commission: C. Ray Hozendorf, Clyde T. Parsons, presented the report of the Town and Country Commission. Mary Joyce Horton reported on her work as Rural Worker in the Camden District. C. Ray Hozendorf commended James E. Major for his fine work as Executive Secretary of this Commission. Ed Hollenbeck spoke on the Methodist Council in Saline County. Woodrow Smith, pastor of the Mabelvale Church, spoke to the worth and effectiveness of the Every Member Canvass Program. Palmer Garner, Pastor of the Trinity Methodist Church, spoke to the value of the Lord's Acre Program. The report was adopted by the Conference.

Insurance Committee Report: Rufus Sorrells submitted Reports #1 and #2 without reading, since they appeared exactly as recorded in the 1959 Conference Journal. The reports were adopted. Bishop Martin spoke to encourage the churches to take out the insurance coverages on their ministers.

Visitors: Visitors were presented to the Annual Conference by R. B. Moore, Sr.: Dr. J. Cammel English, The Reverend John Albright, The Reverend Elmo Thomason, Chaplain and Mrs. Winslow Brown, Dr. and Mrs. Fred Roebuck, The Reverend Arnold Simpson, The Reverend Oland Fendley.

Announcements: Announcements were made by Dr. Fred R. Harrison in regard to the minister's wives luncheon and the Communion Service,

Recess: Bishop Martin called a recess to preceed the Service of Commemoration.

Service of Commemoration: The Commemoration Service was conducted by S. T. Baugh, assisted by R. B. Moore, Jr. Rev. Otto W. Teague brought the message of Commemoration. Bishop Martin announced that the offering would be used for the relief of those who had suffered recent disasters in the Republic of Chile, to be distributed through the Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief. The Communion Service was led by Bishop Paul E, Martin.

The service was closed with a benediction by Dr. James Workman at 12:30 p. m.

Wednesday, 8:30 A.M., June 1, 1960

Conference Opened: Howard Correll led the Conference in a song fest. Bishop Martin introduced Rev. Stanley T. Baugh who brought the devotional message.

Infant Baptism: Rev. & Mrs. George Stewart presented their son, James Allen, for Infant Baptism. Bishop Martin and Rev. Aubrey Walton officiated.

Report of the Committee on Minutes: Alfred Doss reported that the minutes of the Conference were in order.

Greetings: The Conference Secretary was instructed to send greetings to Mrs. W. O. Tisdale and Rev. A. C. Rogers.

Roll Call: The Secretary completed the Roll Call.

Report from General Conference: B. T. Fooks and Marshall T. Steel: Mr. Fooks introduced the lay and clerical delegation: Mrs. M. E. Scott, Rev. E. D. Galloway, Dr. Robert B. Moore, Dr. Kenneth L. Spore (Absent Dr. Steel made the report of the Conference. Bishop Martin expressed appreciation of the report and assured the Conference that every Church in Methodism had a fair hearing at the General Conference. Now we Methodists are one people. In connection with the General Conference report Rev. E. D. Galloway announced that Bishop Martin is the new Chairman of the General Council on World Service and Finance, and expressed appreciation of Bishop Martin's leadership.

Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications: Fred R. Harrison and R. B. Moore, Jr. gave the report of those who are recommended for admittance on Full Connection. After asking the Disciplinary questions, the Conference voted to admit them. Bishop Martin presented the class to the Conference.

Those recommended for Admission on Trial were named, commended by their District Superintendent, and were admitted.

Those recommended for election to Elder's Orders were named and elected.

Those recommended for election to Deacon's Orders were named and elected.

The Board requested that the orders of other churches be recognized for a group of four men and one woman. It was approved.

Those recommended for Full-Time Supply Pastors were read and approved.

Those recommended for Part-Time Approved Supply Pastors were read and approved.

Those recommended as Student Approved Supply Pastors were read and approved.

Those recommended to be eligible to administer the Sacraments were read and approved. $\begin{tabular}{ll} \hline \end{tabular} \label{table_eq}$

The Status of Undergraduates in the Course of Study was read and approved.

The Status of Supply Pastors in the Course of Study was read and approved.

Clint Burleson, Secretary of the Board, read Report #2, regarding policy matters of the Board.

Fred R. Harrison spoke to the report. It was adopted,

Presentations: Rev. W. O. Byrd presented Mrs. Adell Phillips who will be leaving for La Paz, Bolivia, where she will work in the Field of Elementary Education under our Mission Board.

Bishop Martin recognized W. O. Byrd for a word of personal privilege.

Recess: Bishop Martin called for a 20 minute recess.

Called to Order: The Conference was called to order with the singing of "I Love to Tell the Story."

Resolutions: James R. Scott presented a resolution to the members of the Conference for study prior to its presentation Thursday morning.

Board of Hospitals and Homes: C. Everette Patton and Virgil Bell presented the report of the Board. Chaplain Bates Sturdy, Chaplain at Booneville Sanitorium, spoke of his ministry there and of his appreciation for the support his work is receiving there. Bishop Martin commended Brother Sturdy for the commendable job he is doing. Dr. Connor Morehead spoke to the report concerning the Children's Home expressing appreciation for the support given the Methodist Home and the 92 children served there this year. Dr. L. E. Drewery of Camden, a Trustee of the Home, also spoke to the report with special emphasis on the needs of our Senior Citizens. The report was adopted.

Philander Smith College: Dr. LaFayette Harris, President, expressed appreciation for the support given the college. During the past 3 years two new dormitories, a Student Union, Library and Fine Arts building have been constructed. He stated the need for \$200,000 to complete this building program. His message was well received.

Standing Rule: Standing Rule #10 was presented by Stanley T. Baugh. Standing Rule #18 was presented by Roland Darrow. They were placed on the table to be considered Thursday. Joe R. Phillips requested a mimeographed report of the changes in Standing Rules.

Western Methodist Assembly: E. A. Kaetzell, Director, presented the work and program of the Assembly, stating that 8 new housing units, all air conditioned, have been constructed this year.

Methodist Headquarters Corporation: Dr. Roy E. Fawcett read the report of the Methodist Headquarters Corporation and called attention to the financial report which would be filed with the Secretary. The report was accepted.

Camp Tanako: Roy E. Fawcett and Edward Dunlap presented the report of the Camp. It was adopted.

Committee on Episcopal Residence: Joe T. Thompson presented the report of the Committee and it was adopted.

Bishop Holt - 50th Anniversary of his Ministry: Dr. E. C. Rule moved that the Bishop and the Secretary of the Conference be instructed to send an appropriate expression to Bishop Holt. It was seconded and passed.

Announcements: James Robert Scott announced that the Wesley Society would meet at 5:30 p.m., Thursday, at Grand Avenue. James Major announced the Town and Country Dinner at Grand Avenue Wednesday evening at 5:30. Other announcements were made by E. D. Galloway.

Visitors: A. W. Martin, George Meyer, Ralph Hillis, Henry Hern, Don Lou, George Lux.

Adjournment: The session was adjourned with the Bishop leading in the singing of the Doxology, and the benediction was given by George Meyer.

Wednesday, 2:00 P.M., June 1, 1960

Session Opened: The afternoon session opened with the singing of the hymn, "Amazing Grace," and W. T. Bone led in prayer.

Deaconess Board: The Conference Secretary read the report of the Deaconess Board. It was adopted.

Board of Education: J. Kenneth Shamblin, Chairman, and Charles Richards, Secretary, presented Report #1. Mrs. J. L. Tucker, Director of Children's Work, Mrs. Robert Regnier, Director of Youth Work, and W. D. Elliott, the new Conference Youth Director, were presented. Roy E. Fawcett spoke to the report. It was adopted.

Report #2 was presented by L. W. Ederington, Chairman, and John B. Hefley, Secretary, of the Commission on Higher Education. Dr. Marshall T. Steel spoke to the report and presented Mr. Gene Williams. The report was adopted.

Bishop Martin recognized Mouzon Mann for a personal privilege. He spoke of the outstanding work of Mr. L. W. Ederington as leader of the Commission on Higher Education. He moved an expression of appreciation by a standing vote. The Conference so voted.

Report #3, concerned with the Wesley Foundation, was presented by J. Kenneth Shamblin and Charles Richards. Speaking to the report were: Lawrence Bearden, a student at Southern State College; John Alston, and E. D. Galloway. It was adopted.

Presentations: R. O. Beck presented Mr. Harold Richardson, Director of Wesley Foundation at Arkansas A & M College.

Announcements were made by E. D. Galloway.

Adjournment: The session closed with prayer by George Tanner.

Thursday, 8:30 A.M., June 2, 1960

Conference Opened: Bishop Martin opened the Conference by leading in the singing of the hymn "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord." The devotional message was brought by H. O. Bolin. The Service of Worship was concluded by the singing of hymn "O Where Are Kings and Empires."

Minutes: The minutes of the Conference were approved.

Board of Pensions: Roland Darrow presented the report of the Board. John B. Hefley presented an amendment to the report of the Board of Pensions and moved its adoption. C. Ray Hozendorf seconded the motion. J. E. Dunlap spoke to the amendment. After considerable discussion and questions, W. D. Golden moved the previous question on the amendment. The amendment passed. The report of the Board was then passed.

W. S. C. S.: Mrs. Alvin Stone, Conference President, read the report of the Woman's Society of Christian Service. After reading of the report, Bishop Martin had Mrs. M. E. Scott, immediate past president of the Conference W.S.C.S., and Miss Mary Joyce Horton presented to the Conference. The report was adopted.

Board of Missions: Rufus Sorrells and Braska Savage presented Report #1 of the Board of Missions. Bryan Stephens, Conference Secretary of the Board of Missions, spoke to the importance of churchwide study of Alcohol. A copy of the text, Stumbling Block, by Douglass Jackson, was presented to the Bishop. It was autographed by the Chairmen of the Conference Boards of Missions, Education, Social and Economic Relations and by the Conference President of the W.S.C.S., symbolizing this cooperative interest in this year's study.

Roland Shelton spoke to the report relative to the work of the Dis-

trict Board of Missions and Church Extension in the Little Rock District. He encouraged the organization of such a Board in every District. D. Mouzon Mann spoke relative to the organization of new churches sponsored by established churches. The report was adopted, Braska Savage read Report #2 of the Board. It was adopted.

Announcements: Rufus F. Sorrells announced that Mrs. Harris, representative of the Conference Insurance Program, is in the basement. Ed Dunlap also made an announcement.

Personal Privilege: James R. Scott moved that appropriate memorial be placed in the Conference minutes expressing sympathy to the family of David M. Hankins on the loss of their son, David M. Hankins, III.

Recess: Bishop Martin called for recess.

Reconvening: Bishop Martin reconvened the Conference by leading in the hymn "My Faith Looks Up To Thee."

Commission on Promotion and Cultivation: In the light of the illness of Kenneth Spore, Chairman of the Commission, C. Ray Hozendorf read the report of the Commission. Dr. E. C. Rule spoke to the report and it was adopted.

Greetings: Bishop Martin asked the Conference Secretary to send greetings to Henry A. Stroup, a retired member of the Conference.

Board of Evangelism: W. D. Golden, Chairman of the Board, and Herston Holland, Secretary of the Board, presented the report of the Board. Howard Williams, Executive Secretary of the Board, spoke to the report. The report was adopted. Immediately after its adoption Bishop Martin led the Conference in prayer as requested by the Chairman of the Board of Evangelism.

Board of Christian Literature: Alfred DeBlack and Elbert B. Jean presented the report of the Board. The report was adopted.

Arkansas Methodist and Methodist Information: Dr. Aubrey Walton made the report of the Joint Commission of the Arkansas Methodist and Methodist Information. Dr. Ewing T. Wayland, editor and business manager of the Arkansas Methodist, spoke to the report. He expressed appreciation for Aubrey Walton's 16 years of service to the Arkansas Methodist during which time he has given distinguished leadership to our church paper. Dr. E. T. Wayland, former Editor of the Arkansas Methodist, was presented to the Conference. Methodist Information is now being held in the hands of the editor of the Arkansas Methodist. After the Jurisdictional Conference more definite arrangements for this service will be made. The report was adopted.

Presentation: The Bishop presented the wives of ministers to the Conference.

Board of Lay Activities: Roland M. Shelton and Paul Jones presented the report of the Board. The report was adopted.

Board of Christian Social Relations: James R. Scott and David M. Hankins, Jr. presented the report of the Board and it was adopted.

Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas: Dr. Wm. E. Brown, Executive Secretary of the Board, presented the report. He recognized the members of the Board who were present. His report was well received and was accepted.

TV. Radio and Film Commission: A. C. Carraway read the report in the absence of W. O. Byrd, Chairman. The report was adopted with appreciation for the leadership he has given to the Commission.

Standing Rule: Standing Rule #10 asked to be amended by Stanley T. Baugh. The motion passed.

Adjournment time: R. B. Moore, Sr. moved that time be extended to complete the business of the morning. It was seconded and passed.

Standing Rule: An amendment to Standing Rule #18 was presented by Roland E. Darrow. Elbert B. Jean presented an amendment to the proposed change in Standing Rule #18 (money received from this source to be disbursed 50% to Conference Claimants and 50% to Minimum Salary Fund). After considerable discussion, question was called. The amendment lost. The principal motion was presented and after discussion was adopted.

Organization of Boards: The conveners were named by the Secretary. They are to meet for organization at 3:00 o'clock this afternoon.

Announcements: Harold K. Davis and Stanley T. Baugh made announcements.

Presentation: Mr. Foster, a representative of CROP, was presented to the Conference.

Visitors: Rev. Raymond Franks, and Rev. and Mrs. Carithurs were presented to the Conference.

Adjournment: After the singing of the Doxology, Reverend Carithurs pronounced the benediction.

Friday 8:30 A.M., June 3, 1960

Conference opened: Bishop Martin opened the Conference with the hymn, "O For A Thousand Tongues to Sing". The devotional message was given by the Reverend C. R. Andrews. The service was closed with the singing of "O Master, Let Me Walk With Thee".

Appreciation: Bishop Martin expressed appreciation to the men who had led in the morning devotionals, Mr. and Mrs. Correll and Mr. Ellis, for their services to the Conference.

Director of Christian Education: Mrs. John O. Alston was presented to the Conference by Dr. J. Kenneth Shamblin, Chairman of the Board of Education, and Consecrated by Bishop Paul E. Martin as a Director of Christian Education.

Committee on Minutes: The Minutes were announced as correct by Alfred Doss.

Mrs. Christie: Bishop Martin announced to the Conference that Mrs. Christie is better this morning. She became ill during the Service of Ordination Thursday night. He also expressed appreciation for the service of A. J. Christie in the Cabinet. He substituted for Dr. Spore who was ill.

Commission on World Service and Finance: Virgil D. Keeley and Otto W. Teague presented the report of the Board and the apportionments for the quadrennium. It was adopted. Bishop Martin commended the Little Rock Conference for its generosity in World Service.

Telegram: Bishop Martin read a telegram of greetings to the Conference from Bishop M. W. Clair, Jr. and J. Otis Erwin, Secretary of the Center West Conference. Dr. E. Clifton Rule moved that the Bishop and Secretary send greetings in return.

Treasurer and Statistician: Louis W. Averitt gave the report. He presented Fred Gantt, Conference Statistician. The report was accepted.

MCOR Offering. Bishop Martin read a telegram regarding the destruction in Chile and a special offering was taken for this emergency cause. The offering totaled \$281.30.

Nominations: T. T. McNeal, Secretary of the Cabinet, read some additional nominations. They were elected.

Board of Pensions: John B. Hefley reported to the Conference on repairs to the Brewster Memorial property. This was the reason no check came from this rental property to the Board of Pensions this year.

Minimum Salary: W. R. Burks and A. C. Carraway presented the report of the Commission. The report was adopted.

Conference Trustees: A. C. Carraway and George Reutz presented the report of the Conference Trustees. It was adopted.

Commission on Christian Vocations: Virgil C. Bell read the report of the Commission. Dr. Harrison spoke to the report. It was adopted. VI. Reports

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To Bishop Martin and members of the One Hundred and Seventh Session of the Little Rock Annual Conference of The Methodist Church:

It is with genuine pleasure that we report the work of our Conference for the past year. Though there has not been any one special emphasis this year, as in some previous years, yet the reports of the ministers will reflect solid achievement along all lines and outstanding work in some Pastors have been faithful and devoted. Laymen and women have had vision and courage. Churches have grown and many people have been won for Christ.

In our 374 organized churches in the Conference, 2,302 persons have joined the church on profession of faith; and 2,723 added by transfer of church membership, making a total of 5,025 additions for the year. 712 infants have been baptized, so that we now have in the Conference 83,983

full members and 4,328 on the preparatory church rolls.

Statistics for our educational work reveal that we have 346 church schools, with 5,156 officers and teachers, 58,321 members, and an average attendance of 30,698 for the year. It is encouraging to note that there has been a substantial increase in the number of young people attending the Sunday Evening Fellowship; and also a sizeable increase in the number attending vacation church schools — more than ten thousand enrolled this year.

Also encouraging is the substantial gain in both our women and our men's organizations. We now have 212 active organizations of the Woman's Society of Christian Service with 11, 948 members. This year they raised \$63,853 for local work and paid to their Conference treasurer \$103,022, an

increase of \$3,721 over the previous year.

The work of The Methodist Men also shows a good increase both in number of organizations and enrollment. We now have 63 organized

groups with 3,509 members.

We can well be proud of the financial achievements of the Conference this year. A prominent business leader recently said, "The Church today must use sound business principles, for the Church today IS big business."

Certainly our statistics bear out the truth of this statement. In the Little Rock Conference we have church property valued at \$19,278,325, an increase of more than three million dollars over last year. Add to this parsonages and furnishings valued at \$2,324,544 and other property worth \$877,309, we have the astounding total of \$22,480,178 — approximately twenty-two and a half million dollars worth of property owned by the local churches in the Little Rock Conference.

Our continued emphasis on Christian stewardship and the Every Member Canvass is paying good dividends not only in increased budgets in the local churches but also in better support of our Conference and world-wide program. The amount of money raised by our churches is very encouraging, with substantial increases all along the line: World Service, \$211,216; General Advance Specials, \$54,952; Week of Dedication, \$11,876; Fellowship of Suffering and Service, \$8,952; Race Relations, \$5.486; Church School Day, \$7,417; Ministerial Training, \$12,095. The total raised by our churches for all purposes this year was \$4,150,453. We agree that this is not only "Big Business;" it is the Lord's business — and that is always big.

Since the future of any organization depends upon its interest in, and care for, the oncoming generation, it is here that we find great encouragement and hope, especially in the heightening interest in our college students.

Hendrix College, under the able leadership of Dr. Marshall Steel, has enjoyed one of the best years in its history. Enrollment this past year reached 607, one of the all-time highs. The solid support by the Conference is reflected in the fact that \$51,996 was paid to the College this year on the \$1.00 per member program, as against \$38,784 last year, an increase of over thirteen thousand dollars. Even more remarkable perhaps is the fact that the people of Arkansas have shown their faith in the College by pledging more than a million dollars to its expansion program.

Progress has been made also in the care of our Methodist students in other colleges through the Wesley Foundation. We now have lovely buildings at both Southern State and Henderson State Teachers College. Competent, well-trained directors are giving full time to the student work and carrying out a well-rounded program of Christian activities for all of our Methodist students. Plans are materializing for a building at Monticello, and later one at the University Medical Center in Little Rock.

Genuine interest also continues in our Arkansas Methodist Children's Home. This year our Conference raised \$71,536 for the support of this Christ-like institution.

The Arkansas Methodist has had another fine year with 23,200 subscriptions. Every district in the Little Rock Conference exceeded its

quota this year.

Since our State has been losing population and the national trend from the country to the city has also affected Arkansas, we rejoice in the good work being done by our Town and Country Commission and its program to strengthen our rural churches. If a church cannot be made bigger, it can always be made better.

We also rejoice that three new churches were organized this year: St. Paul's in El Dorado, St. Mark's in Camden, and Trinity in Warren. St. Paul's, organized this year, already has over two hundred members.

We are deeply grateful for the good work of the past and we look

hopefully to the future.

Certainly words cannot express the sincere appreciation we have for the able leadership which has been given to us in the Little Rock Conference by Bishop and Mrs. Paul E. Martin. No area in Methodism has been as fortunate as we. For four quadrenniums they have led us in a full program of Christian work giving wise and tactful leadership to every phase of the program of the Church. Their warm, personal interest in every minister and his family, every church and its problems, and every cause of Christ, will always be a source of genuine inspiration and strength to all of us who are now privileged to work with them.

These have certainly not been easy days. Perhaps no time is ever easy. Every age brings its peculiar problems and difficulties; yet the Church has always gone steadily forward, so it is with confidence and courage that we face the future. "Lead on, O King Eternal, the day of march has come; Henceforth in fields of conquest Thy tents shall be our home . . . Lead on, O King Eternal. we follow, not with fears, for glad-

ness breaks like morning wher-e'er Thy face appears."

JOINT COMMISSION OF THE ARKANSAS METHODIST AND THE LOUISANA METHODIST

The Joint Commission of the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist makes the following recommendations to the three annual conferences of the Area in matters concerning the Arkansas Methodist, The Louisiana Methodist and Methodist Information.

(1) That the 1961 Circulation Campaign for the Arkansas Methodist

and The Louisiana Methodist be January 8-15 and that the same general

plan of circulation that has been used be employed.

(2) That the campaign goal for 1961 be 45,000 for the combined publications with a quota for each charge of one subscription for each seven members.

(3) That the subscription price of the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist be continued at \$2.00 per year, provided that a church which submits a subscription list equal to or greater than onethird of the number of its membership as reported in the last conference journal be given a special rate of \$1.50.

(4) That the back page arrangement be continued on the same basis

as at present.

- (5) That the World Service and Finance Commissions of the North Arkansas, Little Rock and Louisiana Conference each appropriate from their conference benevolences the sum of \$4,600 for the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist, and that the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences each appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for Methodist
- (6) That the sincere appreciation of this commission be expressed to those who have contributed in various ways to the publications during

the past year.
(7) That Dr. Ewing T. Wayland be appointed as editor and business

manager of the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist.

That the executive committee be authorized to act for the commission in such matters which in its judgment may need action between now and the next meeting of the commission.

(9) That if and when Arkansas becomes a separate Episcopal Area, that the members of the Joint Commission of the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist representing the two annual conferences in Arkansas be designated Commissioners on Methodist Information with responsibility for this program in Arkansas.

COMMITTEE ON CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

We, your Committee on Christian Literature, along with others, realize and appreciate the freedom which we have in this country. Freedom can be one of the greatest blessings of life provided it is understood and used properly. We are deeply grateful for the fact that we enjoy the Freedom of the Press. We are also aware of the fact that this is one freedom which has been abused in many different ways. It has been used by some to exploit the minds of people. Proof of this fact is the abundance of filthy and degrading literature which we find not only at the news stands but also in some book stores. We realize how difficult it is to discover the source from which such literature comes and also to take the necessary steps to prevent such from falling into the hands of people. We are grateful for every effort being made not only by the Church but also by other interested groups to check the flow of filthy literature which we believe is a contributing factor in the moral bankruptcy of so many people.

We appreciate the work being done by The Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas with Dr. Wm. E. Brown as Executive Director in regard to the matter of obscene literature. We believe that the facts presented in the pamphlet sent out by this organization should receive much emphasis from those of us who are privileged to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ.

We are happy to report that the response to our Church publications, the Arkansas Methodist and Together Magazine, has been very good. We hope and pray that we may use every means possible to alert our people to the dangers of obscene and degrading literature, but to warn people of a danger is not enough. We should be prepared to make available to them the kind of literature which will enable them to fill their minds with the truth. Jesus said, "Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free." Only as we and our people know the truth can we hope to experience the kind of freedom that will help us to live the abundant life.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL RELATIONS

In the area of Peace we are concerned that our people have given over to a fatalistic indifference to those things that make for peace. We have put our trust in the deterrant power of massive retaliation, giving no credance to the repeated warnings that nuclear war, even as retaliation, is unthinkable. It is unthinkable precisely because such a war would render the planet Earth unfit to sustain life. We must, therefore, turn our thoughts toward the reaching of realisic agreements to end the testing and production of nuclear arms. We must, moreover, address our most earnest efforts to the effective resistance of aggression and to the elimination of those things which invite and cause aggression. We must assist all peoples in the achievement of self-determination and work together as brothers in the total struggle to develop the technical, economic, and cutural life of all those for whom Christ died. We recognize that the United Nations is and can be an effective channel through which the Governments of the world can resolve many of our problems, and therefore, we pledge our continued support.

In the Area of Human Relations, we believe that it is necessary and

helpful to re-commit ourselves to the following:

God is a universal, righteous, loving Father with all men standing equally before his judgment and mercy. The nature of the love which should be manifested by a Christian is determined by the nature of God as revealed in Jesus Christ. This love has been given to all, "while we were yet sinners," without discrimination as to worthiness; righteousness, color, race, social or economic status, cultural attainment, or any other "condition", whereby we men are prone to distinguish currely attainment. "condition", whereby we men are prone to distinguish ourselves. When we deny this inclusive love to, or for, any of our neighbors, we are in Sin and rebellion against God and make full fellowship with Him impossible. Therefore, our decisions concerning present-day race relations are basically related to our eternal salvation.

The Church is the instrument of God's purposes. Its fellowship is inclusive of all those who know and serve Christ as Lord and Savior. It is neither possible nor desirable that all Christians worship in the same local church at the same time and place. It should, however, always be possible for any two or three or more Christians of any color, status, or condition, to find in their hearts the possibility and desire to come together any time, any place, in the name of their Lord and worship Him in spirit and in truth. Surely He will fulfill His promise to be in their

midst.

We confess with sorrow that our practice has not been faithful to the Scriptural teaching, the true nature of the Church, nor our own pronouncements. Like Paul, we must say, "I can will what is right, but I cannot do it. For I do not do the good I want, but the evil I do not want is what I do." If our confession is honest, and our spirit one of true repentance, we will also be able to say, "Wretched man that I am! Who will deliver me from this body of death? Thanks be to God through Jesus Christ our Lord!"

The call of God is a single one to witness to the transforming power of love in all human relations, although our immediate approach to

specific problems may differ,

We, therefore, commend to the local churches through their Commission on Christian Social Concern, the following principles of action: 1. Let us re-examine all our attitudes toward other persons in the light of the teaching of Jesus' and God's demonstrated love for us.

2. Let us seek to implement within our Church a climate of love

and understanding wherein freedom of expression and study are

encouraged, especially in areas of disagreement and tension.

3. Let us endeavor to know each other better across dividing lines by working together toward the solution of common problems, such as housing, education, employment, health, recreation and juvenile delinquency.

4. Let us come together in a Conference on Human Relations with Methodists from a variety of backgrouds to face prayerfully, objectively, and concretely the perplexing issues of race relations through Biblical and theological study, sound sociological analysis, exchange with experts, group discussion, able addresses and spiritual enrichment.

5. We recognize Methodism's program for the observance of Race Relations Sunday and urge all churches in the Little Rock Conference to

enter into its observance.

In the Area of Temperance we give thanks that more and more of our people are becoming aware of the mounting dangers of drinking, alcoholism, smoking, and salacious literature. We urge that local churches seek not only to work in the prevention and limitation of these dangers but also seek to bring the redeeming power of Christ to bear upon those youth and adults who have already fallen into this sin. We commend the Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas for its progress in organization and positive education. We pledge our continuing cooperation to this worthy organization.

During the Conference Year 1959-1960, the Board participated in the

following projects:
1. Provided registration for eight persons attending the National

School of Alcohol Studies at Aldersgate.

2. Sent two delegates to the National School of Alcohol Studies at Aldersgate with all expenses paid.

3. Sent the Chairman to the Mt. Sequoyah Briefing Conference. 4. Sent the Chairman to the Methodist Conference on Human Relations in Dallas.

5. Assisted in the support of the Hope, Arkadelphia, Little Rock,

Camden and Monticello District Schools of Alcohol Studies.

6. Sent one person to the National Seminar on Alcohol and Gambling Legislation, Washington, D. C.
7. Cooperated with the Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas in

the development of its program of positive education.

We recommend the appointment of Dr. William E. Brown as the Executive Director of the Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas.

Whereas we have repeatedly affirmed our support of a general, suitable and efficient system of free schools in Arkansas, and whereas we have repeatedly affirmed our support of the separation of Church and State, and whereas Amendment No. 52 to the Constitution of the State of Arkansas would remove our present constitutional guarantee that "the State shall ever maintain a general, suitable and efficient system of free schools," and whereas it makes provision for the disbursement of public funds in the form of student education financial aid to all resident students with no exception of those attending parochial or private schools, and whereas the Amendment would add innumerable technical difficulties to the efficient operation of our schools, we therefore voice our opposition to the proposed Amendment No. 52 and call upon our people to carefully and prayerfully study this proposed Amendment that all might recognize the real threat to the principle of the separation of Church and State and to our entire system of Free Public Schools in the State of Arkansas.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

During the conference year the emphasis of the Commission has been to provide guidance and inspiration for adult workers with youth. To this end, clinics were held in each district during the week of September 20-24, 1959.

The District Superintendents gave splendid cooperation to this project and our total attendance was about 350. Dr. Roy E. Fawcett, Conference Executive Secretary, gave valuable assistance.

We were particularly fortunate in having top leadership to present the program. Dr. Marcus J. Birrell, executive secretary of the Interboard Committee on Christian Vocations, set the high standard of the clinics in our first one held at Monticello. (It can be reported here that in October, Methodism lost a great leader in the untimely death of Dr. Birrell when he suffered a heart attack).

Rev. Porter Anderson, Jr., associate secretary of the Interboard Committee, was the able leader for the other clinics. With these two dedicated and outstanding leaders inspiring us, we felt the clinics were among the finest meetings our Commission has sponsored during the quadrennium. The adults felt they had a better understanding of the program of recruitment and guidance.

Our Commission makes the following urgent recommendation:

- $1. \;$ All pastors and adult workers be alert to guide youth into full-time Christian vocations.
- 2. Let each church organize and activate the local Church Committee on Christian Vocations. The 1960 General Conference provides for two additional members: a representative from the Methodist men, and the superintendent or a representative from the adult division of the Church School. We request the District Superintendent to ask the question "Who are members of the Committee on Christian Vocations?" at the Quarterly Conference.
- 3. Continued and wider use of **Methodist Service Projects.** These splendid booklets provide basic vocational information of The Methodist Church.
 - 4. Need more accurate system of records of life-service volunteers.
- 5. We urge each church to plan and use the Sunday preceding Higher Education Week as Christian Vocations Day in local church and request that this day be placed in the Conference Calendar.
- 6. We commend the project of the W. S. C. S. to sponsor a tour of Methodist Projects during the fall. We urge our ministers to cooperate so that our youth may have this opportunity.
- 7. A Life Service Volunteers' Retreat has been planned at Camp Tanako for August 19-20 with Mrs. Milton Teague as director.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Conference Promotion

In the closing year of the quadrennium, the Conference Board of Education has followed the leadership of the General Board in its basic emphases, viz, the building of membership and attendance, and the enlistment and training of the needed leadership, not only for the Church School, but also for the other areas of church opportunity and responsibility.

Pastors' reports indicate a total enrollment of $58,\!321$ and an average attendance of $30,\!698$.

According to our records, we have held 31 training enterprises, offering 96 different units of study, with a total enrollment of 2,804, with 1,854 receiving credit. However, much of our most effective training has been done on a non-credit basis in informal workshops and clinics. We have been represented at the Arkansas Pastors' School, Mt. Sequoyah Leadership School, and at other state and Jurisdictional enterprises.

It has been our privilege to join with other Conference and State agencies, with which we have sustained a pleasant and happy relationship, among them being the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Commission on Town and Country Work, the Commission on Vocations, and the Wesley Foundation Commission for the State.

As far as funds would permit, we have shared in the work both at the University of Arkansas and at State Teachers College

Resources have been increased through a growing response to the 30¢ per member, combined with Conference apportionments and support from local and area groups. For the continued support of the program, we request of the World Service Commission the maximum

amount available for the support of this program.

While the campaign for capital funds has not gotten underway, the interest to date has been encouraging. We feel that our people are going to meet this need in the same fine way they are responding to program and leadership needs. On the whole, we are much encouraged by the prospect for providing a "church-away-from-home" for the hundreds of Methodist students in State-supported schools.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Your Conference Board of Evangelism wishes to make the following report of its activities for the 1959-60 Conference year:

1. The Executive Officers of the Board, along with the District Secretaries, attended the Jurisdictional Conference on Evangelism at Mt. Sequoyah last August and were inspired to draw up and distribute to the ministers of the Conference the brochure of the suggested Program of Evangelism for the remaining months of the Conference Year. The Conference Secretary and Chairman of the Board visited every District in the Conference and met with the District Superintendents and Pastors and introduced to them the suggested Program. In December we attended each District Conference and attempted to lift up the highlights of the program.

Goals for the year were:

a. A working Commission on Membership and Evangelism in every local church.

b. Persuasive pulpit and personal evangelism.

c. Total Enlistment — of self, of church members, of youth, and of the unreached persons.

Depth Evangelism — Practicing the Holy Habits.

d. Depth Evangelism — Practicing the Holy Habits.
e. Fellowship Evangelism — and assimilation of new members.
f. No barren Churches in our Conference.

We have no way of knowing just how much this program has accomplished in the life of our Churches and our people, but reports from the District Secretaries have indicated that in the Churches where the suggested program was carried out there is evidence of new enthusiasm in the total cause of Jesus Christ.

2. Another phase of the program was the Attendance Crusade which ran from the first Sunday in February through Easter. Many pastors learned that where the suggested plan was used, attendance was

up in all areas of the church life.

3. Statistics will probably show that many of our churches have lost in membership this year, but this is not the true picture. We are encouraging all pastors to persist in the work of finding non-resident members and instead of dismissing them, encouraging them to join and become active in The Methodist Church where they reside. We would like very much to show a decided increase in our membership, especially of first commitment, but we cannot have a true picture of the work that is being done today unless we clear our records and correct the errors of past years.

4. Another goal was to have a well organized and working Committee on Evangelism in each District within the Conference. Some gains have been made in this field, but we hope to have more strength in this

area in the coming year.

II.

NEW LEGISLATION:

We feel that your Board of Evangelism should bring to your attention some of the new legislation which was passed at the recent session

of the General Conference.

1. A Membership Secretary, which under the 1956 Discipline could be elected by the Official Board "When deemed desirable" (see Par. 212) will no longer be optional. This Membership Secretary will be elected by the Quarterly Conference annually (preferably the 4th) and he or she will be a member of the Commission on Membership and Evangelism. The duties of this Secretary shall be, under the direction of the pastor. to keep accurate records of all membership rolls as provided in Paragraphs 131 and 132.

2. A new section will be added to Par. 221 in the Discipline which allows a church to have a Minister of Evangelism to be appointed by the Bishop on recommendation of the Quarterly Conference and the District Superintendent; or a layman as Director of Evangelism, who shall be employed by the Official Board on recommendation of the pastor and

Commission on Membership and Evangelism.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE COMING YEAR:

 We recommend that each District and local church in the Conference enter into the Program of "Decade of Dynamic Discipleship" as outlined by the General Board of Evangelism for the Decade 1960-1970.

2. We recommend that each District plan and direct a program of evangelism that will give the local churches and pastors a frame-work upon which to organize their own program of evangelism. We do not mean to dictate, but we feel that there is strength in unity.

3. We recommend that our Annual Conference give full cooperation to the program of "Quadrennium of Prayer" as adopted by the General

Conference and

a. That our Bishop, as presiding officer of this Conference, follow the procedure of the General Conference and open the Quadrennium with a prayer for peace, brotherhood, and for personal commitment to God and His Church.

We call upon every Methodist Church to give major emphasis to prayer and call its people to prayer in prayer groups, prayer meetings, and individual and family devotions.

- c. We respectfully request each pastor to urge every Methodist in our area to cultivate the "Prayer-Habit" by purposefully praying daily, even many times daily, until prayer becomes natural, until it becomes the form and habit of the soul.
- 4. Your Board of Evangelism has selected the Reverend Alfred I. Doss to lead and promote the "Prayer Partner" movement in our Conference, and we recommend that each Pastor and Commission on Membership and Evangelism include this movement in their program for the quadrennium.
- 5. The General Conference adopted a slogan for the quadrennium, "Jesus Christ is Lord", and your Conference Board of Evangelism urges the use of this slogan at every practicable opportunity until it becomes a part of the life of our people in their daily living.
- 6. We respectfully request the Cabinet, at their earliest convenience, to set dates and places for District Prayer Institutes to be held in each District some time in late September or early October, at which time the General Board of Evangelism will furnish the necessary leadership.
- 7. In accordance with the action of the General Conference which expressed the hope that during the quadrennium the Council of Bishops will lead in a Simultaneous Evangelistic Mission promoted by each Bishop in his own Area and involving every Methodist Church in the United States, we respectfully request our Bishop to lead us in such a program.
- 8. We urge each local church to send a delegate who is vitally interested in the Local Church Program of Evangelism to the Jurisdictional Conference on Evangelism to be held at Mt. Sequoyah, August 15-18 of this year, and that the Board of Evangelism pay the expenses of the elected Conference Officers and allocate \$150.00 to each District to help with the expenses of the District Superintendent, the District Secretary of Evangelism and the layman who is to be the vice chairman of the District Commission of Evangelism, and that we allocate \$50.00 for each member of the Jurisdictional Board who resides within this Conference, plus another \$50.00 for one young person from each district who attends the Jurisdictional Conference on Evangelism.
- 9. That each church set a goal for reaching new converts on Profession of Faith; and that every church, regardless of size, make every effort to reach at least one person on Profession of Faith during the conference year and show a net increase in membership.
- 10. That we offer our services and funds where needed, and when available, to the Town and Country Commission for the surveying of situations looking to the establishment of new churches. The funds to be approved by the Board Chairman, Executive Secretary, and the Board Secretary.
- 11. That the "Hour of Evangelism" be continued as a part of our Annual Conference Program, and that the Bishop, the Executive Secretary and Chairman of the Board of Evangelism work together to select the singer and preacher for this program.
- 12. That the Commission on World Service and Finance be requested to grant the Board the same amount for the coming year as was appropriated for the past year.
- 13. We want to commend the Directors of the Arkansas Pastor's School for their wisdom in providing, at its session this year, a course on the cause of Evangelism. We urge our pastors to take advantage of this most vital service.

The Board of Evangelism wishes to express our deepest appreciation to our Executive Secretary, the Reverend Howard Williams, for his excellent and devoted leadership to the cause of Evangelism in our Conference this past year. We feel that he is needed in this office for another year. Therefore, we have elected him to serve as Executive

Secretary for the coming year, and respectfully request Bishop Paul E. Martin to appoint him to this office.

COMMISSION ON HIGHER EDUCATION

Four years ago the General Conference authorized the Annual Conferences to set up a Commission on Higher Education to direct a program to obtain support of all Conference-related institutions of higher education, and Wesley Foundation activities within the Conference. That Commission was authorized to endeavor to obtain an amount equal to \$1.00 per member for the support of its educational institutions, and an amount equal to 30 cents per member for Wesley Foundation work.
Your Bi-Conference Commission on Higher Education submits the

following report:

During the Conference year preceding the beginning of this quadrennium, the Methodist Churches of Arkansas contributed approximately \$25,000.00 for the support of Hendrix College and ministerial education. During the Conference Year now closing, the Methodist Churches of Arkansas have contributed approximately \$125,000.00 for Hendrix College. The Little Rock Conference has raised \$19,334.00 for Wesley Foundation work.

We heartily endorse the Bi-Conference program to raise funds with which to erect Wesley Foundation buildings on or near the campus of every State college and the University.

We must remind our people that an enlarged program of work at Hendrix will necessitate an increase in expense of operation. The same thing is true concerning our Wesley Foundation program. Once we have Wesley Foundation buildings connected with our State colleges we will have to provide funds with which to carry on the program of work.

Your Commission concludes its work by recommending that our Conferences adopt the recommendation of the General Conference: that a minimum goal be set of an amount equal to \$1.00 per member annually for the support of Hendrix College, and 30 cents per member annually for Wesley Foundation Work, and urge the Annual Conference to increase this goal as rapidly as possible to a minimum of \$1.50 per member annually for Hendrix, and 50 cents per member annually for Wesley Foundation Work.

In another place is this statement: "Rucker Tanner did six years work and dropped out." A newspaper man of Nashville has marked this grave and plans to print an article about it using the information we furnished. and plans to print an article about it using the information we furnished.

We plan to erect a pyramid at the place where stood Old Henry's

Chapel, placing the marker there on top of it.

We only ask that our ministers inform our people of the ministry offered by our Home to homeless children and give them the opportunity to give. We know that informed people will give generously to this work of love. The Home appreciates the visits of pastors and lay people. We urge our people to visit the Children's Home.

Dr. and Mrs. Connor Morehead and staff continue to offer a loving

and creative ministry to our boys and girls in the Home.

The books of the Children's Home have been audited by R. A. Lile
Co. and copies of the audit are published in the Conference Journal.

We offer the following nominations for trustees, terms to expire in 1963: L. E. Drewrey, J. T. Thompson, Arthur Terry.

Chaplain Bates Sturdy offers a concecrated and fruitful ministry at the State Sanitarium. We recommend that support of Chaplain Sturdy be \$3,000 annually plus assessed annuity.

We recommend Rayford Diffee as Golden Cross Director. It is help-

ful for each district to have a Director of Golden Cross and that each church be urged to take an annual offering for the aid of the sick and

distressed.

The Board recognizes the fact that our Conference offers in no organized way a ministry to our aged. Some officials describe the need for nursing home beds as acute in many of the counties of our State. One study made of general hospitals indicated that one out of seven patients needs special care of a geriatric hospital. We urge each local church to evaluate its ministry to these senior citizens who number some 16,000,000 in the United States.

We commend the interest of our Board of Trustees of the Children's Home for their study of a possible ministry to the aged. We respectfully request that this committee of this Board continue its study and report its findings and recommendations to the Annual Conference of 1961 as to the use of the present property in a ministry that will aid in meeting

the mounting needs of our senior citizens.

GROUP INSURANCE COMMITTEE Report No. 1

We, your Committee on Group Insurance offer the following recommendations for the ensuing year:

- 1. The policy shall remain with the same company, the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company.
- 2. The premium shall be \$1.63 per month, per thousand dollars of insurance. This premium includes payment for double indemnity in case of accidental death. Of this amount the church served by the insured shall pay \$1.03, while the insured shall pay \$60.
- 3. The premium payments shall not be accepted for a shorter period of time than three months, while we earnestly urge the payment of a full year's premium in advance where possible.
- 4. The period of grace for non-payment of premium shall be thirty (30) days pass the date of the premium due.
 - 5. The Conference Treasurer shall be the treasurer for the group.
- 6. We commend the Conference Board of Conference Claimants for the way they have paid the premiums for each year for a \$1,000 policy for each member of our Conference who is in the retired relationship. We urge them to continue this gracious gesture.
- 7. We respectfully urge the District Superintendents of the various districts to consider the premium payments of this insurance as part of the normal allocations to the churches over which they have jurisdiction, and that they make every effort to have the churches meet their part of the premium payment.

8. The plan as accepted by the Annual Conference shall be mandatory for the persons serving under appointment of the Bishop.

GROUP INSURANCE COMMITTEE

Report No. 2

We, your Group Insurance Committee, do recommend that the American Hospital and Life Insurance Company be retained as the insurors for our Annual Conference. We recommend the following plan to be accepted for the ensuing year:

I. Benefits

- Room \$10.00 per day; 1-35 days each entry.
 Incidental expense up to \$200.00 per entry, plus 75% of next \$5,000.
 - Surgery up to \$200.00 per entry. 3.
 - 4. Maternity benefits of \$150.00.
 - 5. Other benefits as listed in policy.

II. Premiums

- 1. Payable quarterly in advance to the conference treasurer, with payments for full year urged where possible.
- Grace period for payment of premiums, 31 days.
 Premiums shall be: Minister \$31.92; Minister and Dependent - \$83.16; Minister and two or more Dependents - \$113.88 per year.

III. Particulars

 All ministers serving appointment under the Bishop are eligible.
 This insurance shall be mandatory for the minister and optional for the family.

IV. Recommendations

1. We strongly urge that every minister where possible shall include his family in this plan.

2. We urge all churches to cooperate with their ministers in the payment of the premiums of this insurance, and suggest that they pay at least 50% of the premiums. We urge the district superintendents to encourage the churches to do their part in caring for these premiums.

3. The Conference Treasurer shall be Treasurer to handle the funds

of this Committee.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The Conference Board of Lay Activities has worked steadily throughout the year to accomplish the aims and purposes set forth by the General Board, especially in programs of Christian Stewardship Evangelism, Lay Speaking and Methodist Men.

The heart of our whole program in lay activities is Christian Stewardship. It is the heart of our religious life and spiritual growth. It involves the use we make of our time, talents and material possessions.

We are strongly in favor of the Methodist Builders Club and urge you when called upon to become a member so that our need for new churches may be met within the Conference. We also urge continued cooperation in the Every Member Canvass.

The Lay speaking program, due to the cooperation of the District Superintendents and the District Lay Leaders, is well organized and lay speakers are available when needed.

Layman's Day was observed in many churches this year; the par-

ticipation was considerably more than in past years.

The organization of Methodist Men clubs has shown a marked improvement, and our goal remains one in every church. Pastors and laymen alike are giving more attention to this phase of our lay program and we feel a notable increase will be shown within the next year.

The Hope District again gave two \$400.00 scholarships to young Methodists who reside within the District and have offered themselves for full time Christian service to The Methodist Church. These scholarships are furnished by voluntary contributions from Member Clubs

amounting to \$2.00 for each active member.

The Conference Laymen's Assembly at Camp Tanako, September 26-27, was one of the most notable events of the year. Dr. Robert G. Mayfield, Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities, spoke on the first objectives of Methodist Men. Rev. J. Albert Gatlin challenged the men to the preservation of the resources of their heritage. Bishop Paul E. Martin attended the entire assembly, directed the sunrise Communion service, and preached at 11:00 A. M. Sunday, calling upon laymen to stress the good life, to be generous, open to the truth, free of envy and to serve as lay Christian evangelists. His participation was most inspiring and his presence added much to the success of the Assembly. Those who attended were enthusiastic in their response and unanimously requested that the Assembly be made an annual affair.

The Laymen of the Little Rock Conference will continue to support

the entire work of the Church during the coming year.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARIES

We, your Commission on Minimum Salary, present the following as the Minimum Salary Program for our Annual Conference:

- 1. That the Commission on Minimum Salary be composed of one minister and one layman from each district of the Conference, and including representatives for city, urban, village, and rural churches. Such Commission shall elect annually a president, vice-president and secretary to perform the usual duties of such offices. These officers shall also compose the executive committee of the Commission. The Conference Treasurer shall serve as the treasurer of this business. The expense of this Commission shall be a priority claim upon the fund. Whenever a vacancy occurs on the Commission between sessions of the Annual Conference, the vacancy shall be filled by the Superintendent of the district involved.
- That the minimum salary of the pastors of this Conference be set at \$2,700.00 for married men and \$2,100.00 for single men. There shall be no distinction made between conference members and full-time approved supplies in the benefits of this fund. That only approved pastors or supplies enrolled in approved Supply Courses who are accepted as such by this or some other Annual Conference shall be eligible as claimants on this Fund; provided further that in the case where both a man and his wife serve as pastors in this Conference, whether on the same charge or otherwise, the provision of the 1956 Discipline, Par. 1618-3b, with respect to years of service for our pension program, shall apply.

(b) That if a charge now receiving Minimum Salary aid increases the support of its pastor, the Commission will continue the amount of aid it now gives until the total support from the Charge and the Com-

mission reaches \$3,000.00.

3. That the minimum salaries as herein set forth shall include all funds received by the pastor except missionary and education funds. No claimant shall receive from this fund more than \$900.00 in any one Conference Year, except in clearly necessitous cases as hereinafter provided.

4. A Charge whose Pastor receives Minimum Salary Funds may have a Travel Expense Fund for the Pastor; provided, that the Charge does not reduce the salary now being paid the pastor, and provided that the Charge's Travel Expense Fund does not exceed at any time 50% of the pastor's salary.

5. There shall be set aside an amount equal to 10% of the previous year's receipts by the Commission to be used for necessitous cases arising during the current year. Any amount of the 10% remaining at the close of the Conference Year will revert to the general funds of the Com-

The District Superintendent of any person seeking assistance as a necessitous case shall make application in writing to the Commission, giving the reasons in detail as to why the applicant is a necessitous case.

No man shall be eligible for assistance as a necessitous case who is not at the time eligible for assistance from the minimum salary fund.

No man shall receive, as a necessitous case, more than 25% of the total amount set aside for necessitous cases for that year.

- 6. That the Commission herein constituted shall make an apporo. That the Commission herein constituted shall make an apportionment to all charges of the Conference an amount equal to 3% of such cash salary, provided that the pastor in each charge shall be required to assume one-third of his charge's apportionment. The District Superintendent and all other members of the Conference serving in special appointments within the United States shall also be required to contribute to the Fund an amount equal to 1% of their cash salaries. In contribute to the Fund an amount equal to 1% of their cash salaries. In the case of a pastor or special appointee where no parsonage or living quarters are provided, a 15% exemption from his salary shall be allowed in computing his salary level through the provisions of this plan.
 - 7. That the apportionment to the charges shall be regarded as on

a par with, and shall be paid proportionately with, the other items of ministerial support as required in Par. 823 of the 1956 Discipline. Payments shall be made to the Conference Treasurer and receipts issued therefore. The funds shall be kept in a bank approved by the Conference. The records of payments to this fund shall be published annually in the

Conference Journal.

That the Commission shall make a distribution of funds monthly, with the exceptions below (line II), provided, however, that no payments shall be made to any pastor except with the written approval of his District Superintendent; and further that no distribution shall be made to any pastor who has failed to pro-rate the various ministerial claims, as per Par. 823 of the 1956 Discipline, or whose charge has failed to make the Every Member Canvass for ministerial support as per the Disciplinary plan; and provided further that nothing shall be distributed to cover the failure of any Church to meet its own salary estimate, excepting in emergency cases as may be deemed by the Commission.

When and if any charge benefiting from this fund proposes to reduce its pastor's salary below the claim as given in the Statistician's report for the year immediately preceeding it, the charge shall consult with the Commission via the District Superintendent concerned; otherwise, its pastor will be rendered ineligible to receive any benefits

under the provisions of this plan.

In the event that any charge fails or declines to set a definite figure for pastoral support, as required in Par. 824 of the 1956 Discipline, such charge shall thereby be disqualified for receiving aid from this Fund.

The Disciplinary requirements, as to the Conference Course of Study for approved supplies, as set forth in Par. 320 of the 1956 Discipline, shall be considered as prerequisite for participation in the benefits of this plan for full-time accepted supplies.

9. Pastors and churches to become eligible to receive Minimum Salary Aid must meet the following requirements:

a. Submit a budget planned by the Commission on Stewardship and Finance of said charge, or by the Official Board of said charge, to be adopted by the Official Board; such budget to be sent to the District Superintendent before Conference.

b. Conduct an Every Member Canvass, such Every Member Canvass to be fully approved by the Conference Director of the Every Mem-

ber Canvass.

c. Each church and pastor must contribute to the Minimum Salary Fund according to the scheduled percentages.

d. Charges must seek to become self-supporting and required to

- increase the support of their pastors by not less than \$100.00 per year.

 The District Superintendents must send to the Secretary of the Minimum Salary Commission the following information concerning each Minimum Salary charge immediately on adjournment of Annual Con-
- a. A certified list of such pastors with earnings and requested aid. b. A copy of the proposed budget adopted by these respective charges or churches with total pledge secured.
- c. Information as to whether these respective charges and churches have complied with the requirement of taking an Every Member Canvass, fully endorsed by the Director of the Every Member Canvass.

Any exceptions to these requirements must be recommended by the Bishop and the Cabinet.

- 10. That in the event that the income of the Fund shall be insufficient to meet the claims upon it, as determined in Par. 2 of this plan, each claimant upon the Fund shall benefit in his proportional share of the available net income.
- 11. That it hereby be made a part of this plan that our Conference cooperate to eliminate the various factors contributing to inadequate salaries and ministerial inefficiency, in the following ways:

a. By combining churches into circuits or by constituting "larger parishes" where advisable so that each pastor will receive the minimum support.

b. Using more lay preachers who earn the major portion of their

livelihood from an occupation.

c. By encouraging charges to bring their level of support to the

established minimum.

d. By kindly applying the action of the General Conference in Paragraphs 377, 378, 379 of the 1956 Discipline, which recognizes the inter-relationship of ministerial support and ministerial efficiency.

e. By using the utmost care in licensing persons to preach, in admitting candidates to the status of approved supply, and in maintaining high standards of qualifications for admission into the Conference.

12 That District Superintendants and pastors shall be charged with

12. That District Superintendents and pastors shall be charged with the responsibility of bringing this program to the attention of Official Boards, Quarterly Conferences, and District Conferences throughout the coming year.

responsibility of supporting the Latin-American and Indian Mission Conference work. We ask the Conference to accept the goal set by our Jurisdictional Conference for the support of the Rio Grande Conference and for the Indian Mission Conference for the Conference Year of 1960-61. Further, let the churches and individuals of our Conference be as liberal as possible with their support of Lydia Patterson Institute in El Paso, Texas, through scholarships and other direct gifts. The Conference Board of Missions is giving the sum of \$500.00 to this Institute for the year of 1960-61.

That every charge plan and have a church-wide school of missions within the charge or local church, promoted by the local Commission on Missions with the cooperation of the local Woman's Society of Christian Service. The study book this year is **Stumbling Block** by Douglas Jackson. It is a most timely study of Alcohol and Christian Responsibility and is prepared through the cooperation agencies of the General Boards of Missions, Temperance, and Education, and the Woman's Division of Christian Service. We heartily recommend its use and suggest the month of January for Conference-wide study.

6. That the month of October be designated a World Outlook Month with the purpose of increasing the number of subscriptions to this

general missionary education magazine.
7. That the Commission on Missions on the local church level be organized of missionary-minded personnel with the most effective person available as its chairman. Let each church send the local chairman to the workshop for local chairmen at Mt. Sequoyah, August 26-28. Surely it would be a worthwhile investment if the local church would finance this

8. That every District Missionary Secretary along with other designated personnel attend the Jurisdictional Missionary Conference on Mt. Sequoyah, August 23-26. That one youth from each district attend this Conference, preferably the District Chairman of Christian Outreach. The Conference Board of Missions will supply \$25 scholarships for each of

these youth attending.

9. That the Every Member Canvass be continued on an Area-wide, simultaneous basis under the direction of the Bishop and District Superintendents, with the Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission as our Conference Director. We further recommend that no salary supplementation funds be granted from our funds to any charge that does not have the acknowledgement of this Director that their Every Member Canvass has been properly made. That every reasonable effort be made to help and encourage the individual charges to increase their salaries so that more missionary funds may be directed to the building of new churches where needed.

10. We offer the full support and cooperation of the Board of Missions with the program being launched by the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation, namely "The Methodist Builders' Club". Since this program is to augment the work formerly done by the "1000 Club", we strongly urge its support for promoting the building of new churches

within the Conference.

- We strongly urge the organization in each District of a District Board of Missions, or such other organization as can best help to meet its financial needs. Thus, under the direction of the District Superintendent, and with the cooperation of the Conference Board of Missions, each District will strive to meet as much of their financial needs as possible, thus releasing missionary funds for the building of new churches where needed.
- Since we have been informed that there must be a new church organized across Methodism every twenty-two hours if we are to keep pace with our anticipated growth, we strongly recommend the establishing of second or additional churches in our towns and cities.
 - 13. That the challenge and need of the missionary fields be lifted up

before our people at all times. That our young people and young adults, who are already trained in their chosen vocations, be properly informed of the opportunities of service in the National and World Mission Fields on a limited tenure of service basis, as well as life-time service. We urge local Commissions on Missions to assume responsibility for keeping before the youth and young adults the need for trained and dedicated personnel. Brochures, pamphlets, books, films and many other sources of information are available to all who will inquire, and we urge the use of this material within the local churches.

of this material within the local churches.

14. We recommend that the District Superintendent of each District complete the form supplied by the Board of Missions for each charge for which he is asking aid. That these applications be considered by the Executive Committee of the Board of Missions meeting with the Cabinet at least thirty days before the meeting of the Annual Conference. That after the Board acts on these requests for aid that shifting of these funds from one charge to another be made only after confering with designated

personnel of the Board and with their approval.

15. We recommend that a Seminar be held in every District to help prepare local church membership for the Church-wide study on Alcohol and Christian Responsibility, and that we accept the generous offer of the Chairman of the Christian Civic Foundation to provide adequate membership for these Seminars.

16. We earnestly and respectfully request the Commission on World Service and Finance to give the Board of Missions every possible consideration in making available financial support to carry on the missionary program of the Conference. We pledge ourselves to do the best we can to place these funds where they will do the greatest good toward building the Kingdom. The disposition which we have made of the funds entrusted to us is attached hereto and is a part of this report.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

The Board of Pensions recommends that the annuity rates for the Conference Year 1950-1961 shall be established as follows:

Retired Ministers shall receive \$50.00 per service year.

Retired Minister's Widows shall receive \$35.00 per service year.

Retired Accepted Supply Pastors (Special Conference Claimants): shall receive \$35.00 per service year.

Retired Accepted Supply Pastor's Widows shall receive \$24.50 per service year.

Dependent children of deceased members shall receive \$12.50 per service year.

The rates of annuity payments are in conformity with the 1956 Discipline, paragraphs 1619, 1620, 1621, and 1631. The annuity shall be paid monthly, beginning July 1, 1960.

The Board of Pensions recommends that the apportionment to the churches for the support of our retired ministers, their widows, dependent children, and Special Conference Claimants shall be an amount equal to fifteen (15) per cent of the current cash salary, or salaries, paid to the pastor, or pastors, of each charge.

The Board of Pensions recommends that the premiums on the life insurance policies held by the retired ministers be paid from the funds of the Board.

The Board of Pensions recommends that Sunday, March 19, 1961 be observed as Retired Ministers Day and that all churches participate in honoring this day with the cause of the Retired Ministers being presented from the pulpit, an opportunity be given for an offering or special bequests to be received, and, if possible, a retired minister being presented to the church during this service of worship. (Discipline 1956: P. 296:3B; 1610:6).

The Board of Pensions recommends that the report of the participation of the churches in Retired Ministers Day be printed in the report of the Board.

The Board of Pensions is viewing the future with some misgiving. Our pension load will increase sharply as more ministers retire at age 65 and in a very few years we shall have to add more than eight hundred service years to the responsibility we are now carrying. If we continue to pay at the rate we have now established, \$50.00 per service year, it will be necessary to raise an additional \$40,000.00 to bring our pension payments to about \$170,000.00, or more, each year.

Our pension load for this coming year will be approximately \$124,000.00. Our possible income from the churches will be approximately \$103,000.00, plus about \$20,000.00 from our endowment returns. This does not allow any funds for necessitous cases. We must depend upon receipts from Retired Ministers Day and the income from the Brewster Trust Fund in Pine Bluff. This year we did not receive any money from this Brewster Trust Fund.

Our only hope seems to be in the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund and your Board is exploring that possibility so that our retired personnel shall be a part of a plan which shall give them guaranteed rights.

COMMISSION ON PROMOTION AND CULTIVATION

We your Commission on Promotion and Cultivation report as follows: 1. We, as a Commission, and through the boards and agencies we represent have endeavored to promote all programs of the conference, such as World Service and Conference Benevolences, World-wide Communion, Week of Dedication, General Advance Specials, Camp Tanako, Camp Keener, the 1000 Club, Hendrix College and Wesley Foundation. Achievements in these undertakings will be shown in other reports to this conference, and need not be repeated here.

2. Only one call was made on the 1000 Club this conference year. \$5,000.00 has been raised by that means and paid to Trinity Church,

Warren.

3. The Commission, during the year, sponsored a study of World Service giving over the past several years and published in quantity the results of that study and distributed the same widely throughout the conference.

The Commission made an extensive study of the 1000 Club program and as a result of that study we recommend to this conference for

its consideration the following new plan:

- (1) That the Little Rock Conference in the 1960-64 Quadrennium, give special attention to Church Extension, in which an emphasis will be on establishing new congregations where needed, on promoting the merger of churches or charges in areas of declining or shifting population, on development of enlarged parishes or group ministry programs where advisable.
- (2) That the Conference Board of Missions and the Town and Country Commission be given responsibility for approving designated areas of opportunity for investing leadership and financial aid. That, in general, the following principles be followed in reaching these conclusions:
 - Possibility of growth indicated by competent survey of area involved.
 - Probability of enlarging the area of service or increasing the fruitfulness of the church in other than new situations;

The state or preparation for the project;

The attitude of the local leadership;

- The resources of the community;
 The ability and will of the local leadership to become selfsupporting.
- That to provide the necessary funds for establishing new congregations and carrying out the aims stated in Item One, the Conference Board of Missions be asked to set aside a certain part of its funds on which these designated projects are to have priority, and that we change the name of the "One Thousand Club" to the "Methodist Builder's Club" and use the following plan:
 - That three calls be made each year, on September 1st, December 1st, and March 1st,
 - That the allocation of district responsibility be made on the basis of 600 shares of \$10.00 each for each call, and that each district's share be determined on the same percentage basis as the allocation of World Service.

That the District Superintendent of each district, together with his district committee or boards of missions, be responsible for making requests and for promoting the acceptance and promotion of collections within the district. Such shares, in denominations of \$10.00 each, to be provided either by a church or an individual subscription, or by both. A group or

individual may take as many shares as they wish. That all funds be remitted to the Conference Treasurer, as are other conference items, and disbursed on order of the group named in Item 2, or their designated representatives.

(4) After a district has reached its quota, it may seek additional shares of \$10.00 each in the same manner. Any amounts above the assigned quota may be kept within the district, to be used for church extension purposes, including the purchase of future church sites, approved by the District Superintendent and the District Board or Committee on Missions.

(5) Money other than sums secured in Districts by sale of additional shares, held for what the directing group deems reasonable time without a suitable project available, may be re-directed, according to the judgment of the group named in Item Two. This group will also have the authority to suspend the call for collections when this is deemed advis-

It is understood that the work of the Methodist Builders Club is in no way intended to interfere with the work of a District Board of

Missions.

5. We recommend the continuation of the Every Member Canvass and the Month of Stewarship observance and request James E. Major to serve as Conference Director of Stewardship.

TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

Report No. 1

The Town and Country Commission is grateful for the interest and support given by the Conference to its program during the past year. As we move into a new quadrennium, we do so in the assurance that our mission is one that can bring a brighter future to Methodists who

live in the rural areas of our Conference.

The Town and Country Commission is an interboard agency with representation from various boards and agencies of the Conference. Its members are therefore anxious to see every aspect of the church's work prosper. Although the Commission is doing some things that no other Conference Agency is doing, it is aware that its main purpose is to help the churches in town and country witness to the fact that "Jesus Christ is Lord." Wherever it can serve to that end, it will put its strength.

The following is a brief report of the work done by your Town and

Country Commission during the year.

1. A delegation of thirty people from the Little Rock Conference attended the National Methodist Town and Country Conference in Wichita, Kansas, in July.
2. Cooperated with the Conference Woman's Society of Christian

Service in presenting the study, "The Church's Mission in Town and

Country.'

- A Rural Church of the Year Program was conducted. The following churches participated in the program this year: St. Andrews, Arkadelphia; Fountain Lake, Garland County; St. Paul, Malvern; First Church, Murfreesboro; Oma Methodist Church, Pearcy; Rushing Memorial, Chidester; Harmony, Magnolia; Parker's Chapel, Union County; Pleasant Grove, Union County; Bryant Methodist Church, Bryant; Pride Valley, Pulaski County; Leola Methodist Church, Sherrill Methodist Church; Grand Avenue, Stuttgart; Tomberlin Methodist Church, and Tucker Methodist Church.
- 4. A conference-wide Simultaneous Every Member Canvass was conducted, under the leadership of the Executive Secretary. At the invitation of the Commission and the Cabinet, Dr. Edwin T. Briggs, Director of the Department of Stewarship, General Board of Lay Activities, presented the Month of Stewarship Emphasis in every district.

5. Seventeen ministers aftended the Town and Country Church

Seminar at the University of Arkansas.

6. A Town Church Conference was held in the Hope District, led

by the Reverend Glenn F. Sanford, Director of the Department of Town and Country, Division of Home Missions.

- 7. A survey was made in the northwest section of Hope, Arkansas, to determine the possibilities for a new church.
- 8. Aided in growth of cooperative efforts between town and country churches. A County Methodist Council has been organized in Saline County.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. That the "Survey of Methodism" in the Little Rock Conference, published in 1956, be revised, in the light of the 1960 census and these facts made available to the the Conference.
- 2. That the "Rural Church of the Year" program be continued and more churches be encouraged to participate in it.
- 3. That the In-Service Training Program for rural ministers be expanded to include scholarships to Church and Community Workshop at Emory University.
- 4. That the Executive Secretary of the Commission work with the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation and the Conference Board of Missions in their plans for church extension.
- 5. That Christian Stewardship be encouraged through the Simultaneous E.M.C., the Lord's Acre-Lord's Hour plans.
- 6. That a Pilot Larger Parish be established in order to demonstrate the value of this plan for ministering to the rural areas of the Conference.
- 7. That a special effort be made to establish second churches in the towns which are experiencing population growth.
- 8. That a study be made of ways to finance new church construction, especially for those younger churches that are facing difficulty in securing loans or must pay unusually high interest to secure them.

In order to finance this program, we request the Commission on World Service and Finance to grant a total of \$15,000.00, and the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service to grant a total of \$1,000.00.

The Commission has elected James E. Major as Executive Secretary and we request Bishop Paul E. Martin to appoint him to this office.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE CAMP

Camp Tanako

Camp Tanako is continuing to be the center of the summer activities of the Conference program. Interest has grown until there is a greater demand for dates than the time limit permits. Last season the camp served twenty-five groups, totaling approximately twenty-five hundred, principally youth and adults.

For the past several years, a skilled school administrator and his wife have been in charge of the summer operations. They, and their competent staff, are always on the alert to serve the best interests of

campers and guests.

Under the direction of an efficient and dependable supervisor of building and maintenance, the Camp continues to grow in accordance with the over-all plan under which improvements were begun. During the year, a director's cottage has been built and valuable equipment has been added for the more adequate care of the grounds and the efficient operation of the program.

Progress has been made in the conserving and beautifying of the grounds, but much landscaping remains to be done before the campus is brought to its fullest possibilities in terms of convenience and beauty.

We are indebted to the youth of the Conference and their adult leaders for the raising of funds for a craft house which will be next on the building schedule, and ready for use a year hence.

The winterizing of the kitchen and a few of the cottages will make

possible the extension of the season for at least week-end groups, follow-

ing the regular summer season.

We are happy to announce that Highway 171 from Malvern to the State Park is now being hard-surfaced to within a mile of the Camp. We regret that it will not be ready for use until the current season is over, but we are glad to wait for the added convenience it will bring for later use.

A word of appreciation is in order for the splendid board that directs the program of the Camp. No board has a membership more willing to share of time and service than those who direct the affairs of the Camp.

Again, you are extended a cordial invitation to visit the Camp and

to make full use of its facilities.

As a financial policy we recommend as follows:

1. The same percentage from Conference apportionments as last year (7.9).

Where practical, the Camp be included in the local church budget, and if not, that a free-will offering be taken on the 4th Sunday in April, or as near thereto as practical.

The continued encouragement of special gifts, from churches,

groups, and individuals.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

The members of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Little Rock Conference are always mindful of the fact that we are first members of the Methodist Church and, as such, have our responsibilities toward the total program of the church. As an avenue of service we

work through the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

The Methodist Church at its General Conference of 1940 brought into being an organization designed to challenge all women of the church in Christian living and service. When the Little Rock Conference Society was organized on October 3, 1940 at First Methodist Church, Little Rock, there were 188 charter societies and no units of the Wesleyan Service Guild. There was a membership of 8,888. That first year the societies paid to the conference budget \$21,550.62. Total receipts for the year amounted to \$23,147.08. The pledge of \$19,100 was paid in full.

In the opening moments of the Annual Meeting this spring in Pine Bluff we were led in a Service of Thanksgiving by the past presidents. We were thanking God for twenty years of work and growth in our Woman's Society of Christian Service. Today we have grown until we have 217 societies and 70 Wesleyan Service Guilds. We now have only 60 unorganized churches. Our total adult membership is around 13,000. The exact figures for this year will not be available until next month. Our purpose says we shall unite all women of the church in Christian living and service. We are continually striving toward this goal.

At the end of the first twenty years our financial report shows how much we have progressed. The Woman's Society and Wesleyan Service Guild pledges to missions for the past year were a total of \$79,500.00. We have paid \$84,472.82, overpaying our pledge by \$4,972.82. Our appropriations, which include youth and children's funds, are \$88,598.55. The total sent the Division was \$99,456.64. For local church and community work we have had reported \$43,048.81. The total received from the Districts was \$108,419.07. The Woman's Division of Christian Service has requested an increase in salary support of missionaries from \$2100 to \$3000 per year. The Little Rock Conference Woman's Society and Wesleyan Service Guild have pledged this increase in the salaries of Helen Wilson in Bolivia and Norene Robkin in Africa. The Conference Society also pledged the salary support of a new missionary to Latin America, Mrs. Adele Phillips, making our total pledge for 1960-61—\$84,000. Mrs. Phillips has been accepted for Special Term, Latin America, and is preparing to go for a three-year term under the Woman's Division.

How real is the Prayer Life in the Little Rock Conference Woman's Society? We are seeking to make this our first effort in our Christian experience. We ask that we become vessels through which God's work can be done. Jesus' tools were Love - Concern - Great Understanding. From hands folded in prayer we must go out to work. The progress of these last twenty years is due to the local women who have given their devotion and dedication to the work. Each person needs to give full-time service to God in whatever capacity she can. The important thing is "Do it Now!"

Mrs. Charles W. Mead of Omaha, Nebraska, a member of the Women's Division, in speaking at the Jurisdiction Meeting in San Antonio said: "We need to use our hours to best advantage to study and think. 5% of the people think, 5% think they think, and 90% would rather die than think." We do not believe this is true in the Little Rock Conference Woman's Society. The Conference School of Missions held at the Arkansas School for the Blind last July had an enrollment of 180. This is the largest school we have ever had. The studies for the year were: Africa, The Church's Mission in Town and Country, The Gospel of Luke, and The Role of the United Nations in World Affairs. More and more local societies are having these studies. There is a very definite increase in the use of our wonderful literature. Through our Christian Social Relations our women are becoming better informed Christian citizens.

lations our women are becoming better informed Christian citizens.

The Woman's Society also seeks to enlist students, youth, and children in this Christian fellowship. We have cooperated with the Wesley Foundations on the campuses of our colleges. A set of books was given to the Wesley Foundation at Southern State in honor of one of our retiring officers, and a gift of \$50.00 was given to the Wesley Foundation at Arkadelphia. In our work with youth and children we emphasize that a mission course be taught in each local church for children and youth, and we cooperate with the Board of Education in providing a national for the summer camps. We need to stress recruitment more than ever before. Seven hundred and ninty-eight new missionaries are needed now. You can take the temperature of your church by finding out how many boys in your church have gone out as ministers and how many girls as missionaries.

Our rural worker in Columbia County in the Camden District, Mary Joyce Horton, is continuing her good work in this area. We are most grateful for her work. We could use other workers in our conference.

grateful for her work. We could use other workers in our conference. At the end of this quadrennium we ask that we keep souls and minds and spirits sweet and serene because everything could not be done this quadrennium. Our hats are off to the past, but our coats are off to the future which we view with hope and certainty. No area of life is excluded from the Gospel of God. This Gospel has been put in our hands. We are called upon to let God's light shine. A lot of people glisten on the outside, but people who are doing things for God glow on the inside. Light shines on from age to age through us. With dedicated and willing hearts the women of the Little Rock Conference Woman's Society say "Here am I, use me."

COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE Report No. 1

We, your Commission on World Service and Finance, submit the following report:

1. The amount apportioned to this Annual Conference by the General Commission on World Service and Finance is \$127,872.00.

2. The amount apportioned for Conference Work is the same

amount, \$127,872.00

3. Combining these apportionments for General and Annual Con-

ference Work, we have a total of \$255,744.00.
4. We recommend the sum of \$750.00 for Area Expense, concurring

in this with a request from the Bishop and his Cabinet.

5. The amount apportioned for the Little Rock Conference for the General Administration and the South Central Jurisdictional Annual Budget is \$11,964.00, General Administration — \$7,202.00; the South Central Jurisdiction — \$4,762.00.

6. The amount apportioned for the Episcopal Fund is to be an amount equal to two percent of the cash salaries of the pastors for the

current year.
7. We recommend that the Treasurer be authorized to pay \$15.00 for membership in the Methodist Historical Society of the Conference and the National Methodist Historical Society, also that the Treasurer pay the expense for securing the photos of the class received in Full

Connection and of each minister who retires.

8. We authorize the Treasurer to cooperate with the First Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas, and to pay the proper official of said Church any deficit in Conference entertainment expense following

the submission of a financial statement to the Treasurer.

9. At the suggestion of the Board of Education, we recommend the Fourth Sunday in September as Church School Day and authorize the Church School Day askings of \$7,000.00 and urge all our churches to cooperate.

10. We recommend the First Sunday in December (Committment Sunday) as Christian Civic Foundation Day and authorize a Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas, Inc. offering of \$4,000.00 and urge all our churches to cooperate.

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We endorse an offering in November, tto be known as the Ministerial Training Special Offering, to be used in ministerial student loans and scholarships, and in the support of the Arkansas Pastor's School, We urge every church to make a generous response. We, furthermore, urge all the churches to respond to the program as outlined by the General Conference to increase the contribution to at least \$1.00 per member for the cause of Higher Education, and 30 cents per member for Wesley Foundation.

12. The Commission recommends that the percent of 15% of all pastor's cash salaries be apportioned for the Conference Claimants Fund. Concurring with the request of the board of Pensions, we recommend that Veterans Day be observed with an offering by all churches on Sunday, March 19th.

13. We urge our churches to continue their support of Camp Tanako. Concurring with the request from the Camp Board, we are urging all churches to either include the Camp Program in their Annual Financial Budget, or to make the fourth Sunday of April as Camp Sunday, at which

time a free-will offering may be made for this project.

14. Your Commission nominates Rev. Louis W. Averitt as Conference Treasurer and recommends that his salary be set at \$6,600.00, to be paid out of the Conference Administration Fund. Also, we recommend \$1,500.00 for office and secretarial help, \$625.00 for office rent, \$1,200.00 for house rent, and \$600.00 for utilities, all of these items to come out of the Conference Administration Fund except \$900.00 which will come from the Conference Group Insurance Fund.

15. We recommend a charge of 3% of all funds handled by the Conference Treasurer, excepting the Conference Claimants and Superannuate Endowment and World Service and Conference Benevolences, and this money derived from these charges to be set up as a Conference Administration Fund, in accordance with the Conference Standing Rule.

16. The amount apportioned to the Annual Conference for the inter-

denominational Co-operation Fund is \$4,501.00.

- 17. The Commission recommends that the percent of 10% of all pastor's cash salaries be apportioned for the District Superintendent's Fund.
- 18. Upon the suggestion of the Conference Statistician and the Conference Treasurer, and with the approval of the Bishop and his Cabinet, the Commission recommends that the following items: Episcopal Area Expense, Methodist Information, Inter-denominational Co-operation, General Administration Fund, the Arkansas Council of Churches, and Jurisdictional Fund be combined in the Conference Reports under the head of Connectional Items.
- 19. The Commission recommends that the following payments be made out of the Emergency Fund as set up in our Conference Apportionments:

- 20. District Superintendents' Salaries and Expense and Utilities: The District Superintendents shall receive an annual salary of \$8,500.00 paid monthly. For travel expense they shall receive an additional amount of \$2,500.00 paid monthly to the Superintendents to be used at the discretion of the Superintendents, individually; also, an amount of \$800.00 for utilities which is included in the salary.
- 21. Utilities For Pastors: Each charge is requested to designate the cost of the parsonage utilities as a part of the assessed salary, thus exempting the cost of the utilities from the income tax claims. It is understood that this amount, the total salary, is subject to the percentage levied against pasors' salaries.
- 22. We called to your attention the matter of Christian Wills Promotion and urge that both District Superintendents and Pastors make this program known to our people. This is an opportunity to extend one's influence and Christian Service to the evangelizing of the World down through the ages. Materials may be ordered from the Department of Wills, Bequests, and Gifts of the Council on World Service and Finance, 740 Rush Street, Chicago 11, Illinois.
- 23. We approve the request of the Conference Board of Missions for permission to promote the raising of the sum f \$5,000.00 for the Rio Grande Conference, and the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Indian Mission Conference during the Conference Year 1960-61.

WILLIS RICHARD BOYD

Willis Richard Boyd was born in Clark County, February 28, 1885. He joined the Little Rock Conference in 1922. He was ordained Deacon and was admitted into Full Connection in 1925. He was ordained Elder in 1927. He was a valuable member of the Conference and served for thirtyfive years until his retirement, after which he moved to Arkadelphia where his presence was an inspiration to his friends.

During his thirty-five years of service he served New Edinburg, Hermitage, Sheridan, Carlisle, Stephens, Ashdown, Dermott, Hazen, Jackson Street in Magnolia, Lewisville, Rison and Eudora.

Brother Boyd is survived by his wife, Mrs. Daisey McCarroll Boyd, a brother, Mason Boyd of Hot Springs, and three sisters, Mrs. Henry Nutt of Amity, Mrs. Felix Adams, Arkadelphia, and Mrs. Tessie Stumon of New Mexico.

The quiet and confident Christian faith of Brother Boyd was an inspiration to all who knew him. He was a man whose wise counsel and understanding Christian spirit attracted persons who needed the help of a good Pastor. Friends that he had made from former days, joined with the friends of his present home to pay tribute to the life of this good man.

As was his custom, Brother Boyd was in Church on Sunday before his being called to his eternal home on Monday. The last words of the sermon that day were, "So live the life of a good Steward, that when the Master's summons come to give an account of thy Stewardship, you may hear these welcome words, 'Well done, good and faithful servant! Enter Thou into the joy of thy Lord'." These words typify the manner of life of this servant of God.

Funeral services were conducted in Arkadelphia by his wife's Pastor, the Reverend J. E. Dunlap, the District Superintendent, the Reverend T. T. McNeal; and the Reverend J. M. Hamilton. Burial was in Rose

Hill Cemetary in Arkadelphia.

WILLIAM ROY JORDAN

BIRTH AND CHILDHOOD—William Roy Jordan was born in Owensville, Indiana, June 5, 1893. He was reared partly by a step-father

and saw the rough and seamy side of life.

HIS EDUCATION—He came to Arkansas when very young and after feeling that he had been divinely called to preach the glorious gospel of Christ, he attended the former Henderson-Brown College at Arkadelphia to prepare himself for this great calling. He served some of the circuits and small churches near Arkadelphia and Malvern while attending school.

HIS MARRIAGE—While serving as pastor of the Magnet Cove Methodist Church near Malvern, he met a beautiful, dedicated and consecrated





girl, Miss Edna Miller of Malvern, who at that time was a school teacher. They were married in the Magnet Cove Church on August 14, 1917.

AS A SOLDIER—Soon after America's entrance into World War I, he enlisted as a private in the army and was soon promoted to a sergeant. He spent most of his enlisted time at Tulane University in Louisiana, After his discharge he returned to the Little Rock Conference into which he had been admitted on trial in the year 1914. He served the Hickory Plains Circuit two years, after which he was assigned to the Mabelvale-Primrose Charge in the year 1920. It was that same year that he was fully ordained into the Methodist ministry.

HE AND THIS WRITER—This writer was a member of the Mabelvale Church at that time. Although

I was attending Hendrix College, we were together most constantly during the summer. He served the Mabelvale church almost six years. I feel that I knew Roy Jordan better than any other minister. I assisted him in more revival meetings than any other minister. We were together often on fishing trips, swimming parties and young people's outings. I found him living on a high spiritual level and a refreshing companion,

HIS ITINERACY—Most of his ministry was within what was then the Little Rock District. His itineracy was as follows: Hickory Plains, Mabelvale-Primrose, Hazen, Sherrill-Tucker, Hamburg, Carr Memorial, Pine Bluff, Capitol View in Little Rock, England, Sherrill-Tucker a second time, Norphlet, Des Arc, Salem-Congo, and Mountain View which

he was serving at the time of his death.

SABBATICAL LEAVE—For personal reasons Brother Jordan asked the 1942 Annual Conference for a year's Sabbatical leave which was granted. After taking some ten years of volunteer location, he returned to the pastorate in 1955 and was assigned to the Des Arc Church which he served for one year. He was then assigned to the Salem-Congo charge which he served for three years until his retirement at the 1959 Annual Conference. After his retirement he agreed to be assigned to the Mountain View Charge which he served ten months before his sudden passing.

HIS CHARACTERISTICS—Roy Jordan was for the most part healthy, robust and most energetic. He retired early, arose early, and worked hard. He was a plain man with a plain message. He preached the gospel fearlessly. He jestingly warned people not to stir up his "Irish". He had enough Irish in him to give him the courage to do the thing he felt should be done even at the cost of incurring the enmity of some. Nevertheless, he brought lots of sunshine to the people he served and they loved him. He was no politician nor a fence-straddler; you always knew where Roy Jordan stood on any subject.

AS A BUILDER—Brother Jordan was a builder. While serving the Mabelvale-Primrose charge, he drilled a well and provided the parsonage with its first water; he remodeled and enlarged the Mabelvale church; he built a beautiful brick church at Primrose; organized the Church at Geyer Springs and built a large building, doing much of the work with his own hands. A new sanctuary was almost completed at Mountain View at the time of his passing. This pastor assisted in the organization of the Geyer Springs Church when services were held under a tree.

CIVIC INTERESTS—Brother Jordan had a wide community interest. He was civic-minded and interested in all things that were for the betterment of the community. He and his wife played instruments in a community band which this writer organized.

HIS HEALTH BREAKS—About seven years ago he acquired a bad heart condition. Doctors cautioned him against over-exertion but he paid them little mind. He was very active, not only in the pastorate, but also

in manual labor. He preferred to wear out rather than to rust out.

HIS DEATH—Roy Jordan died the way he would have chosen—with his boots on. On Thursday, March 31st, fairly early in the morning as he was preparing to do some fishing in the White River, near Hazen,

Arkansas, the end suddenly came — a heart attack.

HIS FUNERAL—It was with deep regret on the part of his friends and the family that the sanctuary at the Mountain View Church was not quite completed so his funeral could be held in the church where he was serving and where he was so happy. His funeral service was held in the Healy and Roth Funeral Parlors in Little Rock, Arkansas, Saturday afternoon, April 2, 1960. The large chapel was filled to overflowing by his many friends who came from far and near. A most beautiful service was conducted by his district superintendent, Rev. E. D. Galloway, District Superintendent of the Little Rock District. One touching scene about that final service was to see the old people, many stooped and gray, some almost blind, coming to the service to bid farewell and pay final tribute to the man who forty years ago served them, comforted them in their sorrows, and gave spiritual guidance to them and their children. They loved him then, and their love had not waned through those forty years. His body was laid to rest in Pine Crest Memorial Park in Saline County.

SURVIVORS—He is survived by his loving wife, Edna Miller Jordan, who resides at #5 Alpine Court, Little Rock, Arkansas; also by a daughter, Miss Mary Elizabeth Jordan, who resides at the same address, and teaches in the Little Rock school system; also a son, William Roy Jr., employed in the Government forestry service in Madison, Wisconsin, and Robert Jordan who is a band director and teacher in the Texarkana school system — three fine children who have risen up in nobleness to

call Roy Jordan blessed.

FAREWELL—Knowing Roy Jordan as I did, I feel that I discovered a fineness and a greatness about him which many never took time to discover. He said God called him to be a fisherman. He meant that in the highest sense. But Roy Jordan liked to fish and roam the fishing streams. It was on the 31st day of March on the waters of the White River, sitting in a boat which was anchored to the shore while his soul was anchored to God, as he was preparing to "launch out into the deep", that his soul suddenly took its flight to realms of endless day. I think now of the words in a song which we used to sing together in a quartet: "I've anchored my soul in the Haven of Rest, I'll sail the wide seas

no more;

The tempest may sweep o'er the wild, stormy deep, In Jesus I'm safe evermore.'

REVEREND ORRIE L THOMPSON

Orrie L. Thompson was born in the Fairview Community, Lonoke County, Arkansas, May 17, 1912. He was the son of Orren L. and Mary Alice Thompson. He died in Little Rock, Arkansas while serving as pastor of Capitol View Methodist Church on November 7, 1959.

In 1919, at the age of seven, he accepted Christ as his Lord and Saviour and united with the Smyrna Methodist Church on the Austin

Circuit.

Orrie, as he was familiarly known, attended grade school at Fairview. He graduated from high school at Beebe and later attended Henderson State Teachers College at Arkadelphia.

Brother Thompson was licensed to preach in the spring of 1938. He

was admitted on trial into the Little Rock Conference in 1942; he was ordained deacon and admitted into full connection in 1944, and ordained elder in 1946.

The appointments he served are: Hickory Plains Circuit, Hot Springs



Circuit, Malvern Circuit, Dalark Circuit, Des Arc, Bauxite, Douglassville, Sparkman and Capitol View Funeral services were conducted in the beautiful new sanctuary at Capitol View by his District Superintendent, E. D. Galloway, assisted by Roy Fawcett, Louis Averitt and Alfred DeBlack. The sanctuary was built under Brother Thompson's leadership and

it speaks most emphatically of his hard work and

devotion.

A graveside service was conducted by Brother Galloway in the Fairview Cemetery for the benefit of scores of life-long friends who could not attend the services at the Church.

He is survived by his wife, Pauline Holt Thompson, whom he married on January 13, 1931; one son, John; two daughters, Mrs. Dale Mize and Mrs. Charles Cash; two brothers, Alfred Thompson of Cabot and W. J. Thompson of Little Rock.

Orrie had one of the most pleasing personalities the writer has ever known. He had a keen wit; he knew how to smile and be happy from the heart, and he had an unusual way of passing that pleasantness on to others with whom he came in contact. The rich and poor alike felt at

ease in his presence.

Brother Thompson was a dynamic minister, strong and effective in the discharge of his duties. He was greatly beloved by his people who followed his leadership with ususual loyalty and confidence. His untimely death left his congregation stunned and depressed but their love for Orrie found large expression in the thoughtful and attentive ministry to Mrs. Thompson and the three children.

A life of great usefulness was cut short by his going, but the brief record he leaves is one of the consecration of fine powers to the highest calling known to mankind. The contribution he has made and the memory

of his life and spirit will continue to inspire all who knew him.

JUNIUS ALLEN WADE

On August 20, 1959, the efficient Methodist pastor, Dr. Junius Allen Wade of the Little Rock Conference, The Methodist Church, laid aside his ministerial mantle and took his departure of this life.

Dr. Wade, the son of David Allen and Martha Elizabeth Maddry Wade, was born on a farm near Homer, Louisiana, December 21, 1886.

At the age of 12 he became a member of the church. At 18 he felt the call to the ministry, and began the long road of preparation for his chosen profession.

He first attended school at Nashville, Tennessee and later received his A.B. at Westminster College, Tehuacana, Texas. Following graduation from Westminster he taught school for some years. He also served in the pastorate more than a decade before entering the Dallas Theological Seminary at Dallas, Texas. In the spring of 1934 the Seminary conferred on him the degree of Doctor of Theology. Dr. Wade's was a long active life in the ministry. He was admitted on trial into the Louisiana Conference of the former M. P. Church in

1908; and was ordained an elder November 19, 1914. Mrs. Wade, the former Miss Ira Nettie Torbet, who became his wife May 12, 1912, and who was the mother of his children, faithfully stood by him, and encouraged him in his work as a minister.

Mrs. Wade went home to be with God several years ago, while her husband was pastor of the Oaklawn Methodist Church of Hot Springs, Arkansas.

Dr. Wade, before his retirement, served some of the larger churches in the Southwest of the former M. P. Church; the Stamps, Arkansas Church, the Oaklawn Church, and the Fountain Lake Church of Hot Springs, in the Little Rock Conference of The Methodist Church. After retiring he served the Glenwood Charge of the Little Rock Conference as an accepted supply.

He kept a record of much of his work. In the address he gave to the Little Rock Conference at the time of his retirement in June 1953, he said in part: "During the 44½ years of my ministry, I have preached 9,282 sermons — an average of 4 plus for each week of my ministry. These sermons do not include funeral talks, prayer meetings and special occasion messages, etc. In addition to these I have taught 33 Bible courses of 13 lessons each; worked in 19 V.B.S.'s of two weeks each and a few of five days each. I have buried people in 46 different cemeteries and held 207 revival meetings. Thirtysix ministers have gone out from under my preaching. During this time I haven't neglected my studies. I have read extensively from 25 to 300 books a year. I have read through the Old Testament 14 times and the New Testament 34 times. I have read the N. T. through once in Greek and many of the Epistles many times in Greek. This year I have read 30 books of an average of 346 pages, the O. T. twice, and the N. T. three times."

On May 24, 1952 he was married to his second wife, the former Miss Blanche McKinnon of El Dorado who, before her marriage taught school more than 30 years.

Following his pastorate at Glenwood, Dr. Wade's health began to fail. He and his wife built a beautiful country home on Wesson Road a few miles west of El Dorado, Arkansas where they and their son, Milvean, lived happily until Dr. Wade's death.

His funeral was held August 22, 1959 in the Jackson Street Methodist Church of Magnolia, Arkansas where he had served as pastor for nearly a quarter of a century. Enterment was in the Magnolia cementary.

The funeral services were conducted by the Reverend Noel Cross, the family's pastor; who was assisted in the services by the Reverends W. R. Clower, J. W. Lindsay, and the writer.

He is survived by his widow, three sons and a daughter. The children in the order of their ages are: Maj. Gen. Horace M. Wade, Commander of the 4310th Air Division, stationed in Morocco, N. Africa; Captain J. Edwin Wade, stationed at Wright-Patterson A.F.B., Dayton, Ohio; Mrs. Junette Wade Arcus, Kingston, New York; and Milvean T. Wade, El Dorado, Arkansas. In addition to these he is survived by three grandchildren: Silvia Louis Wade, Sara Elizabeth Wade, and David Allen Arcus; one brother, Ed Wade, Homer, Louisiana; and four sisters of Homer, Louisiana; Mrs. Lena Hollenshead, Mrs. J. G. Smith, Mrs. C. Q. Hollenshead, and Mrs. J. C. Smith.

MRS. ARTYE HANNA ANDREWS

Mrs. Artye Hanna Andrews was born in Pike County, Arkansas, December 16, 1886. She was married to Rev. E. D. Hanna on December 4, 1904, and in 1921 went with her husband into the Methodist ministry. For eleven years they served in the Little Rock Conference retiring in 1931 because of Brother Hanna's poor health. Brother Hanna died in

1951 because of Brother Hanna's poor hearth. Brother Hanna died in 1953 and in 1957 Mrs. Hanna married Mr. W. J. Andrews.

On December 16, 1959, Mrs. Andrews passed from this life leaving her husband, a daughter, Mrs. James H. Webb and a son, S. D. Hanna, all

of Hot Springs.

Funeral services were conducted in Hot Springs, Arkansas by Dr. Fred R. Harrison and Rev. E. Farr. She was buried in Greenwood Cemetary in Hot Springs, Arkansas.

X. Miscellaneous

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

- 1. Nominations. The District Superintendents shall nominate all members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees except as otherwise provided.
- 2. Conference Program. The program for the session of the Annual Conference shall be arranged by a Planning Committee at least thirty days before the convening of the session and published in advance of the session, This committee shall be composed of the Bishop, the Secretary of the Conference, the Statistician, the Treasurer, the District Superintendents, the Pastor-host, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference President of the W. S. C. S., the Conference President of the M. Y. F., the Chairman of all Boards, Conference Corporations, Commissions and Committees, and the executive officers of all boards or commissions having such officers, and anyone else whom, in the judgment of the Bishop, should be called in, in any year. This Committee shall provide for all preaching, inspiration and anniversary services, of the Annual Conference sessions. The program thus arranged, may be revised by Conference action.
- 3. Financial and Statistical. (1) The District Superintendents shall furnish the statistician with all assessments and acceptances of the pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the meeting of the Annual Conference. These figures shall be official. (2) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars, with no column for cents. (3) Each pastor shall report to the Conference Treasurer and turn in his statistical report to the statistician at a date set by the cabinet. (4) The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be June 1st to May 31st, and all salaries and connectional askings of the Churches shall be paid on this basis."
- 4. Memoirs. There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased Clerical Member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, name of children, charges served and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with his memoir. The memoirs of the wives or widows of clerical members of the Conference shall be published in the Journal. The names of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs the passing of any person whose memoir should appear in the Journal.
- 5. Administrative Fund. The Commission of World Service and Finance shall recommend an assessment for a Conference administrative fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expense of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this fund. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the fund. Payments from the fund shall be made only on vouchers signed by the secretary of the Conference; provided that this rule does not relate to the salary and expenses of the Treasurer of the Conference.
- 6. Conference Treasurer. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall

assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer on recommendation of the World Service Commission, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.

- 7. Number of Districts. There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Conference.
- 8. District Fund. The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall report to the district conference, annually, showing receipts and disbursements.
- 9. Reports and Resolutions. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the Journal shall be typewritten in triplicate on special forms furnished by the Conference, and obtained from the Conference Secretary or Statistician.
- 10. Membership of Historical Society. The Historical Society shall be composed of ten members, one of whom shall be the Conference Secretary. In addition to the duties outlined in the Discipline, the Society shall secure a group picture of each class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal; and also two small pictures of each clerical members at the time of his retirement.
- 11. Safeguarding Historical Material: (1) Any member of the Little Rock Annual Conference, or layman authorized by a member of the Conference, may examine Historical documents within Headquarters Building. (2) To removed Historical documents from Headquarters Building a written request signed by the Presiding Bishop and Conference Secretary shall be presented to the Custodian. Provided further, Historical documents belonging to the Conference Woman's Society may be removed from Headquarters Building upon written request signed by the President and Secretary of the Woman's Conference. (3) The Custodian of Historical documents shall be given a receipt for any material removed from the vault in Headquarters Building, Little Rock, giving date of removal and name of receiver.
- 12. District Conference. There shall be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline and one additional members from each pastoral charge, provided, however, in charges of more than five hundred members there shall be one additional members for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.
- 13. Lay Members. Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the Pastor-host of the Annual Conference at least fifteen days before the session of the Annual Conference.
- 14. Board Service. No person may be nominated to serve on the same conference board for more than two consecutive quadrenniums, and may not be nominated to serve on more than one board at the same time. District Superintendents may not serve on Conference Boards, except as provided in the Discipline or by specific conference action. A person failing to attend a board of which he is a member, in a quadrennium may be continued only by special board action. The rule applies to the following boards: Educations, Missions, Temperance, Evangelism, Ministerial Training, Hospital and Home, Christian Literature, The Bible Board, and such other boards as the Annual Conference may direct.
 - 15. Inter-Board Committee. There shall be an Inter-board Commit-

tee composed of the Presiding Officers of the following boards and agencies: the W.S.C.S., the M.Y.F., the Committee on Christian Vocations, Camp Tanako, the Town and Country Commission, the Arkansas Methodist, the Board of Lay Acivities, Missions, Temperance, Education, Evangelism, Ministerial Training, Conference Claimants, Hospital and Homes, and other such boards, and officers as the Conference may direct to have such duties as the Annual Conference may from time to time prescribe.

- 16. Entertainment. The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the retired ministers shall be entertained from the entertainment fund. Each member of the Conference, both clerical and lay, in attendance shall pay \$1.00 registration fee to the entertainment fund, and all offering unless otherwise specified shall go to the fund. The entertainment fund shall be administered by the Pastor-host or such person or persons as he may appoint, reporting in the next session of the Annual Conference.
- 17. Conference Expense. Registration fees and the offerings at the public services in the session of the Annual Conference shall be used to defray the expense of the session, and that any deficit remaining be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund, and the Conference Treasurer shall pay the same.
- 18. Pastor's Traveling Expense. After the Fourth Quarterly Conference of a charge has set the minimum salary of a pastor for the ensuing year, the Quarterly Conference may set the traveling expense fund for the pastor in an amount not to exceed \$1,200.00 per year for each pastor and associate pastor assigned to a pastoral charge; provided, however, that charges of more than one church may allow an additional \$300.00 travel expense per each additional church. Provided further that ministers receiving travel expense shall pay into the Conference Claimants

Funds as per this schedule:

Provided, further, that no salary may be lowered to initiate an expense fund or to increase an existing expense fund.

- 19. Copies of Reports for District Superintendents. Upon adjournment of each Annual Conference, each Board and Commission shall provide each member of the cabinet with a copy of the report adopted by the Annual Conference.
- 20. Amendments. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.
