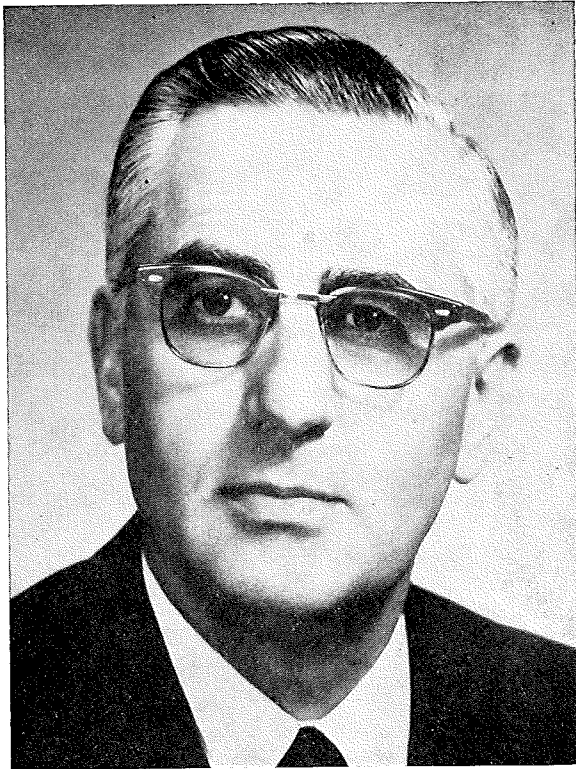

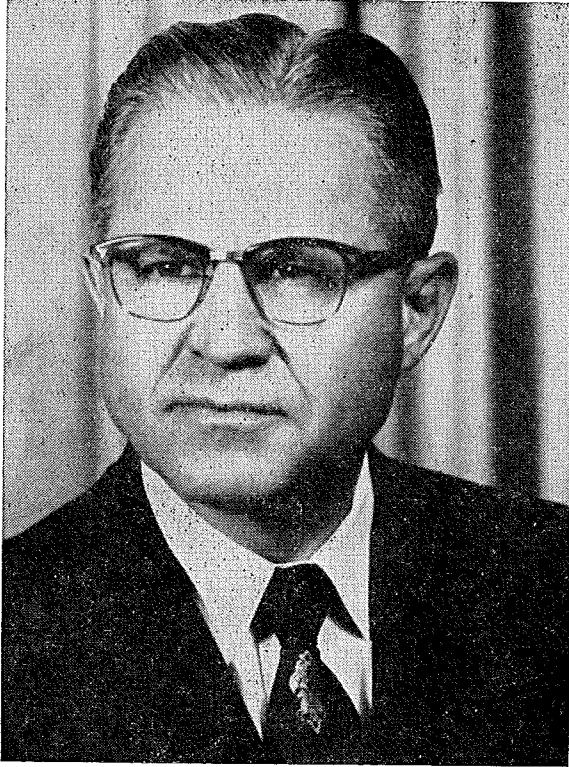

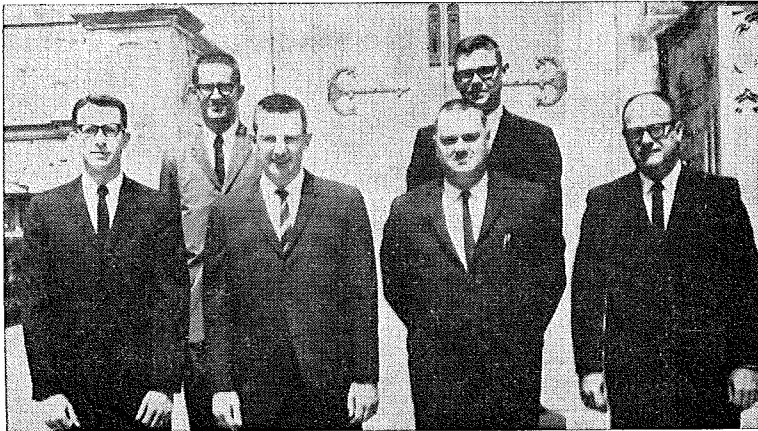


BISHOP PAUL V. GALLOWAY, D.D.

CONFERENCE MINUTES

Monday, 4:30 p.m. — May 25, 1964

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper: Bishop W. Kenneth Pope convened the Conference by announcing the Communion Service. The opening hymn was hymn number 81, "The Church's One Foundation", after which Bishop Pope led the Conference in the Ritual for the Administration of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper, page 523. Horace Grogan, Wendell Hoover, Marion Miller, and H. D. Ginther assisted in the service by serving the elements and dismissing the tables. The closing hymn was hymn number 416, "Blest Be The Tie That Binds Our Hearts In Christian Love". Bishop Pope announced the opening business session of the Conference that is to begin at 7:15 p.m. He then pronounced the benediction.

Monday, May 25

Evening

Bishop Pope called the Conference to order and announced the hymn "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing" (number 186) after which he led the Conference in prayer.

Welcome: Fred R. Harrison, host pastor, was presented to the Conference. He expressed regret that the new educational facility was not completed but expressed appreciation for the cooperation of the boards and agencies meeting under rather crowded conditions. He introduced Dr. Gerald Fisher, Chairman of the Official Board of First Methodist Church, Hot Springs, who gave the formal welcome to the Conference.

Roll Call: James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference, announced that the Roll Call would be affected through the registration.

Conference Relations: George W. Martin, Secretary of the Committee, reported that the committee had passed on the character of the members of the Conference and moved the adoption of the report. It was done.

Personal Privilege: Joe Phillips asked that Guy Ames be remembered by the Conference. He is seriously ill. The Conference asked that a letter be sent to assure him of our love and affection and prayers. The names of James Shaddox and A. E. Jacobs were added to this list and similar letters were requested to be sent to them.

Cabinet Nominations: Mouzon Mann, Secretary of the Cabinet read the nominations and moved their adoption. It was done. He also nominated James E. Major as Secretary of the Conference for the quadrennium. He was elected.

Standing Rule: Mouzon Mann presented a resolution relative to the Standing Rule having to do with nominations. It was before the Conference and laid on the table for consideration later.

Study Committee: E. D. Galloway presented Ed Hollenbeck, Secretary of the Board, who read the report. E. D. Galloway moved the adoption of the report. John Miles requested that it be voted on paragraph by paragraph. Bishop Pope accepted the request. E. D. Galloway spoke to the report. Paragraphs 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6 were passed without objection.

Stanley T. Baugh presented an amendment to Paragraph 7 requesting its deletion from the report. After receiving a second he spoke to the amendment. Bishop Pope expressed appreciation for Stanley Baugh and the retired members of the Conference.

There followed a lengthy debate on the amendment. Speaking for the amendment were: E. Clifton Rule, John P. Miles, Roland Shelton, Clem Baker, John Hefley. Speaking against the amendment were: S. H. Allman, Edward B. Hollenbeck, Arthur Terry, Charles E. Ramsay, Marshall T. Steel, and B. T. Fooks. Although during the debate the previous question was moved by Carr Dee Racop his motion did not carry and the debate continued. E. D. Galloway was given a final opportunity to speak to the report. He requested a statement from Bishop Pope who, in response, refused to exert episcopal pressure upon the issue. He congratulated the Conference for a healthy debate and then clarified the issue to be voted on.

Roland Shelton moved that the vote be secret ballot. After a second, it was so ordered. Bishop Pope stated that only members of the Conference were allowed to vote. All others were asked to retire beyond the bar of the Conference.

James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference, asked that the tellers — Harold K. Davis, Robert Regnier, Dr. W. H. Richardson, Ferris Norton, R. B. Moore, Jr. — to pass out the ballots.

The ballot was taken and the tellers retired for counting. Bishop Pope suspended action on remainder of the Study Committee Report until the vote was announced.

New Headquarters Building Committee: Paul M. Bumpers, Chairman, presented the report of the Committee. George W. Martin and Bill Elliott passed mimeographed copies of the resolution to members of the Conference. After reading the resolution, moving its adoption and receiving a second Jim Wiseman, a layman from the North Arkansas Conference and a member of the Committee was asked to speak. Carl Hall also spoke to the report. Stanley T. Baugh, David Hankins, Charles Ashcraft asked for clarification regarding ownership of the Headquarters Building. The question was called. It was ordered. The resolution was adopted.

Ballot Report: The amendment to the Conference Study Committee report carried 168 - 83. Paragraph Number 7 will be deleted from the Study Committee report.

Amendment: William M. Shepherd moved that Bishop Pope be authorized to appoint a committee to continue a study of the uniting of the conferences and that a plan be presented to the Conference. Also, that funds from the Conference Administration Fund be authorized to support it. Mouzon Mann, James E. Major spoke on the amendment. A voice vote failed to give a clear cut response. A standing vote was taken. A count was called for by Harold Sadler. It was done and the amendment carried. William E. Brown moved that the Study Committee report be adopted as amended. It was seconded and done.

Area Secretary: Cecil R. Culver made the report of the Area Council. It was adopted by the Conference.

District Superintendent: With the District Superintendents standing in the platform, each in turn gave his report to the Conference.

Pensions: Charles Richards introduced J. William Watson to the Conference who in turn presented to Luther L. Miller, Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions, a check for \$3000 from the Brewster Foundation in Pine Bluff.

Bishop Pope announced that Roy I. Bagley, Superintendent of the Hope District, was excused from the Conference to be at Hope attending the graduation of his daughter from high school.

Marshall T. Steel moved that the Conference be adjourned. Bishop Pope asked for permission to hear William E. Brown. With this consent given, Dr. Brown made his report.

Christian Civic Foundation: William E. Brown read the report of the Foundation. The report was adopted.

Bishop Pope announced the morning session at 8:30 a.m. and then dismissed the Conference with the benediction.

Tuesday, May 26, 1964

Morning

Conference Opened: Bishop Pope called the Conference to order and asked delegates to take their seats. He introduced Stanley T. Baugh who conducted the Commemoration Service. The opening hymn was announced — hymn number 422 "Come, Let Us Join Our Friends Above".

The record of Remembrance was read by James E. Major, Conference Secretary: Ministers — W. S. Cazort, J. Wayne Mann, Lee R. Sparks, Doyle Wilcox, Harold Eugene Wright; Wives & Widows of ministers — Mrs. S. K. Burnett, Mrs. C. B. Davis, Mrs. H. H. McGuire, Mrs. W. H. Sanders, Mrs. J. Wayne Mann, Mrs. Ben Fitzhugh, Mrs. Giles B. Pixley; Laymen — Homer M. Adkins and Fred Gantt. Other names were presented from the Conference floor: Mrs. W. W. West, Grover Cleveland Craig and Mrs. Alice M. Riggins, Mrs. Eunice Burson, Mrs. Mabel Howell. The message of commemoration was given by Osborne E. White.

The closing hymn was hymn number 416 "Blest Be The Tie That Binds".

Minutes: Cagle E. Fair, Chairman of the Committee, reported that the minutes had been read and were in order. They were approved.

Conference Secretary: James E. Major named his staff — Journal Clerk, Woodrow W. Smith; Secretary of Minister's Service Records, Kenneth L. Spore; Head Teller, Harold K. Davis; Tellers, W. D. Fiser, Robert A. Regnier, Ralph Hale, Tom Nation, Howard Childs.

Announcements: Fred R. Harrison announced that the pastors of the Arkadelphia District will have a breakfast together Wednesday morning and announced, too, that the Conference will be blessed with a musical program by the Madrigal Singers of Henderson State Teachers College at 7:00 p.m.

Presentation: Bishop Pope presented Roberto Pedraza, president of Lydia Patterson Institute, to the Conference. The Conference stood in appreciation.

Hospitals and Homes: Maurice Webb, Chairman of the Board, presented Omma L. Daniel, Secretary, who read the report of the Board. J. Edwin Keith, Superintendent of the Methodist Children's Home, spoke to the Conference and reported 92 children being cared for in the Home. Charles Richards asked a question about the joint ownership of a Nursing Home in Fort Smith. Adoption of the report includes this statement. The report was adopted.

Standing Rule: Gerald K. Fincher presented a change in Standing Rule regarding the receiving and reporting of funds to the Conference Treasurer. It was left on the table for 24 hours.

Publishing House: Bill Wright of the Methodist Publishing House was presented to the Conference. He recommended several new books and presented a check for the Board of Pensions in the amount of \$5,076.79.

Resolution: John P. Miles presented a resolution to the Conference regarding the recording in the Journal of the service records of pastors serving full time as local deacons and elders. It was placed on the table for 24 hours.

Announcement: James E. Major announced the Ministers' Wives Luncheon and requested that tickets be purchased today.

Christian Social Concerns: James Robert Scott, Chairman of the Board, spoke to the report. George W. Martin requested that a delegate from the General Conference be allowed to interpret for the Conference what happened in Pittsburgh relative to this area of concern. Roy Bagley reported that the cabinet has planned this to be done on a district level. The report of the Board of Social Concerns was adopted.

Board of Ministerial Training: Clint Burleson requested that both sections of the report be allowed to be presented at the same time on Wednesday morning. Permission was granted.

Board of Lay Activities: Roland M. Shelton, Conference Lay Leader, gave the report of the Board and introduced S. H. Allman, new Conference Lay Leader, who spoke to the Conference. The report was adopted. Cecil R. Culver requested that the Conference give Roland Shelton a standing vote of appreciation for his service to the church. It was done.

Board of Pensions: Luther L. Miller, Chairman, presented George Kerr, Secretary, who read the report of the Board. Sam Auslem, representative from the General Board of Pensions, and Mr. Miller spoke to the report. George Kerr read proposed changes in standing rule regarding their area of concern. They will remain on the table for 24 hours before adoption. George Kerr read a resolution expressing appreciation for the leadership of Luther L. Miller to the Board. The Conference stood in acceptance of the report and in appreciation of Mr. Miller.

D. Mouzon Mann moved an addition to the report to the effect that the Study Committee approved by the Conference be requested to review the pension program with the view of a forthcoming merger of the two conferences and the possibility of an increase in pension payments. The committee accepted the motion as a part of their report.

Minimum Salary: Osborne White requested permission not to read the report since it appears in the pre-conference reports. He asked for questions and without discussion the report was adopted.

Methodist Builders Club: Cecil R. Culver reported that the Club will be dissolved this year if the new proposals of the Board of Missions is adopted by the Conference. The report was accepted.

Radio, Television, and Film Commission: C. Everette Patton read the report of the Commission. It was adopted.

Special Privilege: Ed Kaetzel, Superintendent of Mt. Sequoyah, was presented to the Conference by Bishop Pope who announced that Arkansas was paying its asking to the Western Methodist Assembly on Mt. Sequoyah in full. Mr. Kaetzel expressed appreciation to the Bishop and to the Conference for their support.

Board of Missions: C. Ray Hozendorf, Chairman of the Board, spoke to the report as recorded in the pre-conference reports. He presented John Lindsay, the Conference Missionary Secretary, who introduced J. B. Master of the Gujarat Conference in India. Rev. Master presented Bishop Pope with lei addressed the Conference. The report of the Board was adopted.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. Edgar Dixon, president of the Conference Society, read the report for the W.S.C.S. The report was received and adopted by the Conference.

Announcement: Bishop Pope announced transfers into the Little Rock Conference: Joe W. McClain, James F. Richardson, Norman Carter, John Thomas Adkinson, Lloyd Conyers, Marshall Bridwell, and Ed Matthews. They were presented to the Conference by Bishop Pope.

Courtesies: Fred R. Harrison presented Mrs. W. Kenneth Pope to the Conference. The Conference stood in appreciation. David Hankins presented visitors to the Conference: Dr. and Mrs. E. T. Wayland, Rev. and Mrs. R. F. Sorrells, Elmo Thomason, J. Ralph Hillis, Mrs. J. Edward Dunlap, Mrs. Caldwell Watson, Dr. J. Cammel English, Rev. Davis, Rev. O. L. Huffman, A. W. Martin, Dr. Fred Roebuck, Rev. C. N. Guice, S. B. Wilford, Allan Hilliard, Clyde Parson, Myers Curtis, Virgil Keeley, Harold Eggensperger.

Announcement: Fred R. Harrison announced that there is a bulletin board in the basement where all telephone calls will be received and also announced the laymen's luncheon and the concert at 7:00.

Adjournment: Bishop Pope adjourned the Conference for a recess preceding the preaching service.

Preaching Service: At 11:45 Bishop Pope began the preaching service by announcing the hymn "Ask Ye What Great Thing I Know" (hymn no. 147). Robert E. L. Bearden led the Conference in prayer. Bishop Pope introduced Theodore Gill, the Conference preacher, who brought the message. The closing hymn was hymn number 259, "O Master Let Me Walk With Thee". Bishop Pope pronounced the benediction.

Tuesday, May 26

Afternoon

Bishop W. Kenneth Pope convened the afternoon session of the Conference at 2:00 o'clock and urged delegates to take their seats.

Education: Robert Owen Beck, Chairman of the Board, presented George W. Martin, Secretary, who read report No. 1. It was adopted. Roy E. Fawcett, Executive Secretary of the Board, was presented to the Conference. He, in turn, presented the members of his staff, each of whom spoke to the Conference about her work: Marie Tucker, Director of Children's Work, and Joan Wilson, Conference Director of Youth Work. Sara Bagley, Conference President of the M.Y.F., was presented to the Conference. She brought greetings to the Conference and reported on the work of the Little Rock Conference youth. Roy Fawcett expressed appreciation for the volunteer service of Col. Haswell, Conference Director of Adult Work, who was absent from the session of the Conference. Being his final report as Executive Secretary of the Board, Roy Fawcett expressed his appreciation for the opportunity given him to serve the church through this area of work and labor and for those who have worked with him in the office. He then presented his successor to the Conference — W. Neill Hart. The Conference stood in appreciation for the leadership of Roy E. Fawcett. The new Executive Secretary of the Board, Neill Hart, addressed the Conference. Bishop Pope expressed appreciation for Roy E. Fawcett and also for the future leadership to be given the Board by Neill Hart. George Wayne Martin read report No. 2 of the Board's report. Marshall T. Steel spoke to the report relative to the support of the Conference to Hendrix College. Dr. T. D. Scott spoke to the report relative to Philander Smith College. Bishop Pope expressed appreciation for Philander Smith College and Hendrix College.

Dr. Charles Baughman, representing for St. Paul School of Theology Methodist at Kansas City, spoke to the Conference about the progress of the School in its five years of existence. Bishop Pope emphasized the Ministry Sunday to be held next November the funds of which will go to our Theological Seminaries. Report No. 2 was adopted by the Conference. George W. Martin read report No. 3 of the Board. George Tanner, director of the Wesley Foundation at Southern State College, spoke to the report. Jim Loudermilk of the Wesley Foundation at the University

of Arkansas, also spoke to the report. Bishop Pope expressed appreciation for the leadership given to this area of our church's ministry saying that Arkansas Methodism has made a splendid beginning in this work.

Arthur Terry asked that the other Wesley Foundation directors present be introduced to the Conference. Harould Scott, Morgan P. Groves, William C. Gentry, and A. W. Martin were presented to the Conference.

Report No. 3 was adopted.

George W. Martin read a resolution from the Board expressing appreciation for the leadership of Roy E. Fawcett, Executive Secretary of the Board. It was adopted by a standing vote of the Conference.

Methodist Headquarters Corporation: Roy E. Fawcett made the report of the Corporation. It was adopted.

Camp Tanako: Roy E. Fawcett, Secretary of the Board, presented the report of the Board. It was adopted.

Bishop Pope asked that all boards designate places for their organizational meetings. Announcements regarding these meeting places and conveners were made. He lifted up the importance of this organizational work.

Arthur Terry suggested that those boards and committees not having a good representation wait until tomorrow to elect their officers. Cecil R. Culver recommended the use of a nominating committee. John Miles spoke against this recommendation. Bishop Pope encouraged the procedure.

Announcement: Luther Miller announced the Retired Ministers' Banquet to be held at 5:30.

Education: Owen Beck made two more nominations for the Board of Education. Bishop Pope instructed that they be given to Mouzon Mann and thus be included in the cabinet nominations.

Announcement: Clint Burleson made an announcement regarding the Board of Ministerial Training.

Telegram: Bishop Pope read a telegram from Carl Welch and Niles Montgomery of the Boy Scouts expressing appreciation to the church for its cooperation.

Personal Privilege: Clem Baker requested a letter to be sent to C. M. Reves who has been ill. The Conference instructed the Secretary to send a letter of remembrance to him.

Adjournment: Dr. A. W. Martin pronounced the benediction.

May 26, 1964

Evening Session

7:15

Ferris Norton, pastor of First Methodist Church, Arkadelphia, presented the Madrigal Singers of Henderson State Teachers College, directed by Eugene Kuyper, who presented a concert prior to the evening preaching service.

Bishop W. Kenneth Pope opened the evening service with the announcement of hymn number 4, "O Worship The King". He then led the conference in the Responsive Reading found on page 572 entitled

"Christ The Life". Joel Cooper, pastor of Winfield Methodist Church, led in the evening prayer.

Bishop Pope expressed appreciation for the Madrigal Singers and then received the evening offering. The Madrigal Singers presented two special numbers. Bishop Pope introduced the conference preacher, Dr. Gill, and then announced the hymn of preparation, hymn number 324, "God Is My Strong Salvation". Dr. Theodore A. Gill brought the evening message — "The Lord Giveth, The Lord Taketh, Blessed Be The Name of the Lord". The closing hymn was announced as hymn number 256 "Faith of Our Fathers". Bishop Pope pronounced the benediction.

Wednesday, May 27

Morning

Conference Opened: Bishop Pope opened the Conference with a devotional service. He announced the hymn "Amazing Grace" (hymn number 209). The responsive reading was on page 591, the selection entitled "The Law of Christ". Rev. J. William Watson, pastor of Lakeside Methodist Church, Pine Bluff, led in the morning prayer.

Minutes: Rayford L. Diffie reported that the minutes were in order. They were approved.

Christian Vocations: John Lindsay, Chairman of the Committee, spoke to the report. The report was adopted. Bishop Pope lifted up the importance of appealing to our people for support of our ministerial students. H. W. Jinske spoke from the Conference floor relative to the significance of guiding young men into pastoral responsibility.

Evangelism: Kenneth L. Spore, Chairman, presented Palmer Garner, Secretary, who read report No. 1 of the Board. Warren D. Golden, Executive Secretary of the Board, spoke to the report. Palmer Garner read report No. 2 of the Board. Mouzon Mann, speaking from the floor, lifted up the idea that while our statistical report reflects a loss in membership the fact of the matter is only numbers have been deleted. The truth is we are showing a gain in membership. The Conference Statistician, Gerald K. Fincher, gave the actual report of membership as compared with last year's report. Bishop Pope admonished pastors about the importance of accurate church records. Charles Baughman addressed the Bishop as to the integrity of keeping numbers accurate. John Miles, Ralph Sewell, and Irl Bridenthal also spoke on this matter. The question was called and the report of the Board of Evangelism was adopted.

Personal Privilege: W. D. Golden presented a resolution expressing appreciation for the leadership of Roy E. Fawcett in the development of Camp Tanako. It was adopted. He also read a resolution expressing appreciation to Lee Franklin who has served as Chairman of the Camp Tanako Board. It was adopted.

Membership Rolls: Marshall T. Steel spoke to the matter of dropping names from rolls of the churches and requested the cabinet to consider the matter, set up a standard and make this available to the districts. Arthur Terry spoke about the importance of balancing our church records every day. Bishop Pope responded to the suggestion by stating this matter had been considered by the Area Council and a definite plan of action had been taken. The next three years had been given to help churches correct their rolls so that it would not come all at once and show a drastic loss. John Hefley reported his experience at Lakeside Church in Pine Bluff.

Ministerial Training: Arthur Terry, Chairman of the Board, presented Clint Burleson, registrar of the Board, who read the report. Con-

ference action was taken individually and by classes. Arthur Terry requested the class for admission on trial step outside for a photograph. Arthur Terry requested those elected to deacon's orders to come to the church this afternoon at 4:00 o'clock for the purpose of being fitted with a robe and rehearsal. Bishop Pope conducted the service for admission into full connection into the Little Rock Conference. Six candidates were admitted by a standing vote of the Conference: Harold Wilson Brent, William Carroll Chenault, Morgan Patteson Groves, George Samuel Jones, Donald Fay Nolley, Robert Matthew Van Hook, II. Bishop Pope spoke to the class about the importance of little things in the ministry and extended them greetings. Stanley T. Baugh requested that the class thus admitted step outside for a picture.

Personal Privilege: Clint Burleson expressed appreciation to those who have cooperated with him in carrying out the work of the registrar.

Ministerial Training: Arthur Terry spoke to the importance of lifting up the November Special and the recruitment of new Methodist preachers.

Appreciation: Bishop Pope expressed appreciation for the service of this board and the splendid leadership of Arthur Terry and Clint Burleson. The Conference applauded them in appreciation.

Announcement: James E. Major, Conference Secretary, announced the importance of registering at the desk in the basement. This must be done if delegates are to be counted present.

Explanation: John Hefley explained to the Conference that our vote on names was an expression of confidence in the study and work of the Board of Ministerial Training.

Board of Town and Country Commission: John Lindsay, Chairman of the Board, presented E. J. Holifield, Executive Secretary, who spoke to the report. It was adopted. Bishop Pope spoke about the importance of this program in a receding rural population such as we have in Arkansas.

Conference Relations: Maurice Webb, Chairman, presented George W. Martin who read the report of the Committee. The report was adopted. The men retiring from the Conference came to the platform to make their final speech before the Conference: E. D. Galloway, Roy E. Fawcett, W. T. Bone, H. W. Jinske, and W. H. Watson. Myron C. Pearce and Vernon E. Chalfant were absent because of illness. Bishop Pope expressed appreciation for their 196 years of service. The Conference stood in appreciation. At the suggestion of E. D. Galloway, the wives of the retiring men were requested to come before the Conference. They were thus presented. James E. Major, Conference Secretary, presented the retirement parchments and L. L. Miller presented buttons from the Board of Pensions.

Personal Privilege: Roy E. Fawcett presented Fred Milner, Supt. of Construction and Maintenance at Camp Tanako, who has been responsible for much of the work at Camp Tanako.

Publishing Interests: E. Clifton Rule read the report and spoke to it. It was adopted.

Arkansas Methodist and Methodist Information: J. Ralph Clayton moved the adoption of the report as recorded in the Pre-Conference Reports. Alfred A. Knox, editor of **The Arkansas Methodist**, spoke to the report. William D. Leavitt of Methodist Information presented an informative report of the work of his office. The Conference appreciated his effective use of charts to describe his office. The report was adopted.

Insurance: Sidney Good, Chairman, read the report of the Committee. The report was adopted.

Time Extension: Bishop Pope noted we were within 4 minutes of adjournment time. He stated that if the adjournment time was delayed for 30 minutes the Conference would not have to reconvene in the afternoon. It was so moved, seconded, and passed.

World Service: Otto W. Teague, Chairman, presented Edwin B. Dodson, Secretary, who read the report of the Board. It was adopted.

Conference Treasurer: Grafton Thomas, Area Treasurer, made his report to the Conference. It was adopted.

Conference Statistician: Gerald K. Fincher, Conference Statistician, gave his report to the Conference. It was adopted.

Standing Rule Change: Gerald K. Fincher presented an amendment to Standing Rule #3. It was adopted.

District Conference Journals: Darrell Bone made the report of the committee. It was adopted.

Conference Trustees: W. Braska Savage, Chairman, presented George E. Reutz, Secretary, who read the report of the Board. It was adopted.

Historical Society: Harold D. Sadler, Chairman of the Society, gave the report. It was adopted.

Arkansas Council of Churches: Sam Allen, Executive Secretary of the Council, being absent from the Conference since the time of presentation had been changed was spoken well of by Bishop Pope. He encouraged support of this fine organization. Robert Regnier reported that Sam Allen's family had united with Pulaski Heights Methodist Church and that he was an affiliate member with intention later to become a part of The Methodist Church.

Amendment: George Kerr asked James E. Major, Conference Secretary, to read the change in Standing Rule No. 4. It was adopted.

Resolution: John P. Miles presented an unsponsored resolution regarding the listing in the Journal of the service records of full time local deacons and elders. It was adopted.

Standing Rule: James E. Major, Conference Secretary read a changing rule to Standing Rule #1. Joe Phillips spoke against the proposed change. It was defeated.

Board of Pensions: Rev. J. D. Baker spoke to the report of the Board. Bishop Pope assured him his suggestion would be taken under advisement by the Board.

Sabbatical Leave: Roy I. Bagley read a request for sabbatical leave from Claud D. Hines. It was granted.

Moving Date: Carr Dee Racop moved that moving day for members of the Little Rock Conference be Wednesday of next week with any necessary exceptions being acceptable. It was adopted.

Announcement: William E. Brown announced that the Christian Civic Foundation had literature on display in the basement.

Announcements: James E. Major announced that the Ministers Wives Luncheon will be held at the Round Table. Charles Ramsay announced that the Commission on Social Concerns will have a brief meeting after the preaching service.

Next Session of the Conference: William E. Brown moved that the Bishop and the Cabinet make these arrangements. John Miles spoke to the report against the motion. The question was called. The motion

failed. Fred R. Harrison invited the Conference to return to Hot Springs next year. Elbert B. Jean expressed appreciation for the hosting church and moved that we accept the invitation. It was done.

Announcement: Bishop Pope announced the death of Prime Minister Nehru of India and spoke briefly of his greatness. He stated that Kenneth L. Spore would lead the Conference in prayer in his behalf during the morning worship service.

Visitors: Bishop Pope presented Rev. & Mrs. Marshall Bridwell and Lloyd Conyers to the Conference, who are transferring to the Conference. The Conference stood to welcome them.

Recess: Bishop Pope dismissed the Conference for a 3-minute recess before the preaching service.

Preaching Service: Bishop Pope announced hymn number 372 "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling". Kenneth L. Spore led the Conference in prayer during which he lifted the name of just deceased Prime Minister Nehru, his country, his family before God. Bishop Pope announced that the Ordination Service will be held tonight at 7:30 promptly. Theodore Gill delivered the message on the text "I Believe, Help Thou Mine Unbelief". The closing hymn was hymn number 213 "My Faith Looks Up To Thee". Bishop Pope pronounced the benediction.

Wednesday, May 27

Evening Worship

7:30 p.m.

The candidates and leaders in the Service of Ordination proceeded into the sanctuary and took their place. Bishop Pope announced the opening hymn, Hymn 315, "How Firm a Foundation." Bishop Pope asked the congregation to turn in the hymnal to page 515, "The Prayer for the Church" which was read as the evening prayer. The responsive reading was found on page 613, the reading entitled "God's Messenger." The congregation stood for the reading and remained standing for The Gloria Patri. The offering was received during which the choir from Grand Avenue Methodist Church presented a special anthem.

Bishop Pope expressed appreciation for the music ministry of the Grand Avenue Choir and gave a special expression to the Conference preacher, Dr. Theodore A. Gill. He announced the hymn number 401, "Lord of the Living Harvest." After the singing of the hymn Dr. Gill brought the Ordination message based on the text "The Bible"—the whole Bible. Being too long to read in entirety he simply read how it begins and how it ends—the subject was "Healing and Reconciliation."

H. D. Ginther and Edward B. Hollenbeck, members of the Board of Ministerial Training, presented the candidates for Deacon's Orders for the Ordination Service which was conducted by Bishop Pope: Robert Edward Allen, Jr., Herman Glenn Bonds, George Robert Cleary, Harold Dean Hansford, Herbert Joyner, Asa Richard Poss, Thomas Gaston Poss, Sidney Royce Savage, Jack Sidney Singleton, LeRoy C. Wax, David Ben Wilson. They were ordained by Bishop Pope. James E. Major, Conference Secretary, presented the parchments and gave to each new deacon a copy of J. B. Phillips Translation of the New Testament.

Fred H. Arnold and Clint Burleson, members of the Board of Ministerial Training, presented the candidates for Elder's Orders for the Ordination Service which was conducted by Bishop Pope: Harold Wilson Brent, William Payne Fiser, Morgan Patteson Groves, Elmo Albert Knoch, Jr., George Samuel Jones, Donald Fay Nolley, Weldon Rye, Robert Matthew Van Hook, II. They were ordained with members of the

Personal Privilege: Marshall T. Steel spoke to the Conference in appreciation of the leadership of Bishop Pope. He said to him for the Conference how much we love both he and his gracious wife. The Conference stood in appreciation with spontaneous applause. Bishop Pope responded graciously.


Reading of the Appointments: At 9:15 p.m. Bishop Pope called the District Superintendents to the platform for the reading of the appointments.

Conference Opened

The Little Rock Conference met in a special session in the First Methodist Church, Little Rock, Arkansas, at 9:00 a.m. on February 26, 1964. The session was held jointly with the North Arkansas Conference.

Bishop W. Kenneth Pope led the devotional. Hymn No. 147, "Ask Ye What Great Thing I Know," was sung. The Responsive Reading on Page 613, entitled "God's Messenger" was read. Bishop Pope then lead the prayer concluding with the Lord's Prayer.

After requesting that members of the Little Rock Conference sit on the south side of the sanctuary and the North Arkansas Conference members sit on the north side, Bishop Pope called the session to order.

Purpose of the Session

Bishop Pope stated that the purpose of the Conference was to hear and act on a resolution concerning the sale of the Methodist Headquarters Building property and to act on a resolution from the Methodist Headquarters Study Commission.

Roll Call

Bishop Pope called upon the two conference secretaries to perfect the roll. This was done with the help of tellers. There were present 122 clerical members, 29 lay delegates, 4 members on trial, 11 reserve lay delegates, 9 approved supply pastors, 7 visitors.

Resolution

Roy E. Fawcett, secretary of the Methodist Headquarters Coporation, presented the following resolution:

METHODIST HEADQUARTERS RESOLUTION**NO. 1****BE IT RESOLVED:**

1. Whereas, the last annual conference of the North Arkansas Conference and the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church authorized the relocation of Methodist Headquarters in the city of Little Rock, Arkansas, and directed the sale of the present building at and for a minimum sum of \$110,000.00; and
2. Whereas, the Board of Directors of said Methodist Headquarters Corporation made efforts to sell the lands belonging to said Corporation as trustee for Arkansas Methodist Commission Corporation, North Arkansas Conference and the Little Rock Conference; said lands being The South 40 feet of Lot 4, and all of Lots 5 and 6, Block 203, The Original City of Little Rock, Pulaski County, Arkansas, being property known as 1723 Broaway, improved with a 1-story brick office building.

3. Whereas, said Corporation has been able to obtain a cash offer of \$100,000.00 for said lands and building but nothing more; and

4. Whereas, the Board of Directors of said Methodist Headquarters Corporation in its meeting on February 4th, 1964, recommended to the owners of the property that said Corporation be authorized to sell said lands at and for the sum of \$100,000.00.

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the Little Rock Conference in session on the 26th day of February, 1964 authorize said Headquarters Corporation and the Directors thereof to sell the above lands and building for \$100,000.00, that said Corporation be authorized to use the proceeds of said sale to defray the expense of said sale and to liquidate or pay the indebtedness owed by said Corporation; that the remainder of the said purchase price be applied toward the construction of a new Methodist Headquarters Building to be held in trust by said Methodist Headquarters Corporation whose Board of Directors shall hereafter be:

Roy E. Fawcett moved the adoption of the resolution. It was seconded.

Discussion

In order to answer several questions from the floor, a mimeographed sheet containing a financial statement was distributed. It was mutually agreed that the second resolution concerning the location, building and cost of the new building be presented for information. Paul M. Bumpers presented this resolution along with other pertinent information. Carl Hall, Cecil Culver, Arthur Terry, Roy Fawcett and others assisted in supplying helpful information to answer questions from the floor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH:

That the Building Committee for New Methodist Headquarters Building be and it is hereby authorized and empowered to select and engage the services of a professional architect to prepare and draft plans, drawings, and specifications for a Methodist Headquarters Building. That said Building Committee for New Methodist Headquarters Building be and it is hereby further authorized and empowered to direct the architect so selected to request construction bids from various contractors and/or sub-contractors for the construction of the Headquarters Building; all such bids submitted to be presented to the Regular Session of the 1964 Conference for further consideration and action.





VI. Reports

AREA COUNCIL OF ARKANSAS

Arkansas Methodism has made some significant forward steps this year. We have sponsored two pilot evangelistic missions this year under the guidance of the Reverend Charles Whittle of the General Board of Evangelism. These two missions have proven of inestimable value in inspiring us in our evangelistic outlook and program Mr. Whittle has challenged us with his enticing and thrilling phrase, "Our Business is People". He has caused us to want people, to find people, to love people, to win people and to accept people.

In Little Rock and Jonesboro we made telephone surveys to find people. We believe that we have learned some fine lessons about how to make a survey in our towns and cities. We hope to model our evangelistic program in the next few years after those used in the Jonesboro and Little Rock districts this year.

As a result of these two pilot mission projects, the Little Rock District shows a gain in membership of 403 and the Jonesboro District shows a net increase of 115 persons. In the Little Rock Conference, 1827 persons were received on profession of faith; 542 by transfer from other denominations and 2,538 by transfer from other Methodist Churches. The net loss in membership is 178. In the North Arkansas Conference 2,029 persons were received on profession of faith; 573 were received from other denominations and 2,891 were received by transfer from other Methodist Churches. There was a net gain in membership of 854 persons, and a net state gain of 676.

In our Wesley Foundation work we have shown real progress. Last year we voted to finance our Wesley Foundation Maintenance program on a state basis just as we had promoted our Capitol Funds Campaign. The state has responded wonderfully to our challenge.

The remarkable increase in giving to the cause of the operation of Wesley Foundation work has made it possible for us to meet our obligations in full to the eight Wesley Foundations in the State of Arkansas. The Little Rock Conference increased its giving over last year to the fund more than \$13,000, and the North Arkansas Conference more than \$17,000. This gives us a total income, including the amount received in the program of World Service and Conference Benevolences of \$99,052. It is my judgment that our Directors are better satisfied now than they have been and that we are doing the best work we have done on the state college campuses.

Our effort to share a greater percentage of the cost of each student at Hendrix above what the student pays has met with success. Our reports show that our churches are contributing more to Hendrix than ever before. The Little Rock Conference paid a total of \$78,663 through the churches to the college, which is an increase of \$15,860 over last year, and the North Arkansas Conference contributed a total of \$88,104, which is an increase of \$13,939.

Our Boards of Ministerial Training have done fine work in assisting our undergraduate and theological students preparing for the ministry. A committee composed of the Executive Committee of these two boards has made a study of our needs for ministerial training and plans for raising adequate funds. These boards are recommending to our two Annual Conferences that we set aside November as a time for promotion of this cause and the receiving of a special offering from every church, (if the offering is not included in the budget).

The Commissions on Christian Vocations are sponsoring some fine vocational clinics and we believe we are going to see fine results in the near future from their labors as more of our youth dedicate themselves to full time Christian Service.

Our stewardship program under the guidance of the Boards of Lay Activities, the Commissions on World Service and Finance, and the leadership of the Reverend Elmer Holifield, is bearing fruit. According to our Area Treasurer's reports, our giving this year shows a nice increase over last year. Arkansas Methodism has shown an increase in its World Service and Advance giving as reported by the General Treasurer of The Methodist Church. Several times this year the General Treasurer has marked in pen on the copy of the report mailed to me, "Excellent" — "Good" — "Very Good".

In the Little Rock Conference, which accepted its askings in full according to the decimal system used, \$7,536 more than the askings was contributed to World Service. In the North Arkansas Conference \$4,368 more than the askings was paid. In General Advance giving the Little Rock Conference increased its giving over last year to General Advance Specials \$6,726, giving a total of \$59,904 to Advance Gifts. The North Arkansas Conference shows an increase in its General Advance Specials Giving over last year of \$20,412, giving a total of \$62,873. In the Little Rock Conference the Oklahoma Indian Mission, Spanish Speaking Mission and Central Jurisdiction has raised a total of \$21,104, or an increase of \$7,843 over last year. Increases in both Conferences were also noted in our giving to the One Great Hour of Sharing and to the Fellowship of Suffering and Service.

The Boards of Education have worked faithfully and well, I know of no other state that has planned better for the change to the new literature than have the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences. The continuous program of training carried on by our educational forces is providing for us some of Methodism's finest officers and teachers. We salute the great army of Church School officers and teachers in our state.

There is a net loss in enrollment in the Little Rock Conference of 627 in Church School enrollment and a loss of 327 in average Sunday School attendance. In North Arkansas there is a loss of 1,703 in Church School enrollment and a loss of 524 in average Sunday School attendance. We are not happy with the figures we show but we look forward to a better year.

This year we began a program of training for district leaders in every field of our activity. More than one hundred leaders from the thirteen districts of our state came together at Camp Tanako and spent part of two days learning how to train local church workers to do their work more effectively. Following our workshop at Tanako, workshops were held on district and sub-district levels all over the state. Reports indicate that these workshops were very helpful. We are recommending that this type of training continue and that we plan along with the workshops for leaders in the various fields of service, an orientation program for District Superintendents. The tentative date for this meeting is July 9-10, and the meeting place will be Conway, Arkansas.

This past year we have purchased nine parcels of land to be used for future churches and we have begun five new churches. A new interest is being manifested in starting new churches, merging churches and in the purchase of land for churches to be established in the future. A study of the needs for reaching our people in recreational centers and promoting unconventional evangelism has been made. It seems to the study committee that there is a need in Arkansas for at least two mobile church units to be used for multiple purposes; that is unconventional evangelism and the establishing of new churches.

Every board, commission and committee has functioned effectively this year. The Boards of Social Concerns are awakening us to our opportunities and responsibilities. Fruitful efforts are being made in taking salacious literature from the news stands; gambling is being attacked with deadly blows; the liquor industry is being fought courageously. The cause of peace is being held high and our people are appreciating more and more every agency that works for peace.

The Boards of Pensions are studying carefully our Pension Programs and looking for better ways to take care of our retired personnel.

Our Commissions on Minimum Salary keep careful watch over our minimum salary program, ever working to see that our ministers receive a living wage.

Our Commissions on Television, Radio and Films are awaking us more and more to our opportunities in the use of visual aids.

Our Boards of Hospitals and Homes are doing a great work. The Children's Home in Little Rock has shown a startling growth. We are ministering to 98 children at the present time. We have approximately 50% more children in the home today than we had two years ago.

The Nursing Home in Fort Smith is one of our finest institutions. This year a new wing has been added, greatly increasing the capacity of the home. Every bed in the home is taken and there is a waiting list. It is gratifying that the home is operating in the black.

We are indebted to the Reverend Bates Sturdy for his fine work as Chaplain of the Sanatorium at Booneville.

We commend our lay people for their dedication of time, talents and money. Our Boards of Lay Activities are most active. Our Women's Societies of Christian Service and our Wesleyan Service Guilds continue to lead us in developing a great missionary spirit. All glory and praise to our laity. They are the Church. Any report that I might make is their report.

I close with a word of gratitude. I am eternally indebted to Bishop Pope. He always gives me a listening ear, understanding mind and warm heart. He doesn't always agree with me but I always feel he has the best interest of The Kingdom at heart and that he loves me. I admire him, respect him and love him. My deepest appreciation goes to the thirteen District Superintendents. They are great leaders. I am grateful to the other connectional men in Arkansas Methodism for their outstanding leadership and their splendid cooperation. How fine they are! To the Arkansas Methodist and Methodist Information we are deeply indebted. We receive most valuable help from these two agencies. Finally, to the ministers and every member of our church we say with deep love — Thank you!

It has been a good year. We believe next year can be better. Let each of us dedicate ourselves over to the glorious task of making Christ more real to more people.

RECOMMENDATIONS TO THE AREA COUNCIL
BY JOINT STUDY COMMITTEE
FROM
THE LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE
AND
THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

I. We recommend that the Bishop, the Executive Secretary of the Area Council, the Executive Secretary of Town and Country Commissions, the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education of each Annual Conference, the Director of Methodist Information, and a representative of each Cabinet hold regular monthly meetings: (1) To frame and announce an Area calendar and (2) To plan for the promoting and executing of the programs adopted by each Annual Conference; that the Bishop shall preside at these meetings when possible, and that, from meeting to meeting, the Executive Committees of the various Boards and Commissions of each Annual Conference shall be invited in for consultation.

II. We recommend that the Executive Secretary of the Area Council shall serve in advisory capacity to every Board and Commission of each Annual Conference where it is not contrary to the **Discipline**, that he be given the privilege of the floor but not to vote, and that he receive notice of each meeting and the minutes of same.

III. We recommend that the Executive Secretary of the Area Council be available to become by request of the Board or Agency involved the Executive Secretary of each Board or Commission which does not have one, but in no way to assume the privileges or responsibilities of any other officer of said body, such as Conference Secretaries of Evangelism and Missions. We further recommend that, in all our plans, we carefully continue to recognize the autonomy of the various Boards, Commissions, Committees, and Agencies, as is now being done.

IV. We recommend that the Area Council meet semi-annually, the first meeting to be as soon as practical but not more than six months after the adjournment of the second Annual Conference; that in connection with this meeting there be conducted a workshop for District Superintendents, Board Chairmen, and other key personnel of Conference and Area for the purpose of orienting them in their respective responsibilities; and that the second meeting be held in February to consider the programs proposed by the Boards and Commissions of each Annual Conference.

V. We recommend that the Executive Committee of the Area Council meet in September, November, January, March, and May, and on call by the Bishop; and that the Secretary of Evangelism and Missionary Secretary of each Annual Conference and Area Director of Methodist Information be added to the membership of the Committee.

VI. We recommend that the Executive Secretary of the Area Council share in the responsibility for the promotion of the organization of new Methodist Churches in respective Annual Conferences, in co-

operation with the Boards of Missions and Evangelism and under the supervision of the District Superintendents of the Districts involved.

VII. We recommend that the Bishop be requested to appoint a new joint study committee from the two annual conferences to make a further study of the matter of the union of the two conferences. The expenses of the Little Rock Conference's portion of the expenses of this committee shall be paid for from the Conference Administration.

VIII. Since the plan of limiting service to one Board, Commission, or Agency to eight consecutive years has proved successful, we recommend that the Boards and their executive officers of the institutions in the Annual Conference consider limiting Board membership to eight or twelve years so that the creative abilities of all members of the Conference may be used to greatest advantage.

JOINT COMMISSION OF THE ARKANSAS METHODIST AND THE LOUISIANA METHODIST RECOMMENDATIONS

We make the following recommendations for action by the annual conferences:

1. That the Circulation Campaign for 1965 be held during the period of January 3 to 10.
2. That the campaign goal for 1965 be 41,000 with the quotas for the local churches based on one subscription for each seven members reported by the local church in the 1964 Annual Conference Journal.
3. That the subscription be continued at \$2.00 with \$1.50 rate offered to all churches that reach a figure of one subscription for each three members.
4. That an intensive campaign of cultivation be projected in the districts, utilizing the services of the district directors, to the end that an increasing number of local churches plan to include the paper in their budgets and send it to every church family. When this is done payment may be made monthly or quarterly if desired.
5. That churches sending the paper to every family on their constituency rolls be invited to use the back page for their local news, with the actual cost of typesetting and press charges borne by the church involved.
6. That the North Arkansas, Little Rock and Louisiana Annual Conferences be asked to continue the same appropriation of \$4,600 each per year from conference benevolences for the support of the papers.
7. That the Executive Committee be authorized to act for the Commission in matters which seem to require attention between meetings of the Commission.
8. That the editor and the chairman of the commission be authorized to sign notes at the Union National Bank, Little Rock, for money that must be borrowed for current operation.
9. That our appreciation be expressed to the many persons who make possible the continued progress of your papers. This includes Bishop W. Kenneth Pope, Bishop Aubrey G. Walton, the 21 district superintendents of Arkansas and Louisiana, the 21 district directors, and the pastors and their faithful laymen who have worked so diligently in our circulation campaign and in channeling news and pictures to us throughout the year.

We would also express appreciation to William D. Leavitt, director of Methodist Information for Arkansas, and Mrs. Thomas W. Wilson, director of Methodist Information for Louisiana, and to the following regular contributors: Dr. Ira A. Brumley, Dr. J. Henry Bowdon, Thomas A. Pitt, the Rev. K. G. Rorie, the Rev. E. J. Holifield, Dr. Cecil R. Culver, Dr. E. T. Wayland, Dr. and Mrs. Roy I. Bagley, Charles Stuck and many others.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

We have been involved in the following activities:

1. Provided training for new District Directors, Rev. Sam Jones and Rev. Lee Cate, in the Briefing Conference, Mt. Sequoyah.
2. Sent Representatives to the Human Relations Conference at Chicago; Mrs. Edgar Dixon and Rev. James Robert Scott.
3. Actively cooperated in organizing and in giving leadership to the Conference on Religion and Human Relations in its program of Interfaith study and action in the area of religion and race.
4. Participated in the program training workshop at Camp Tanako, followed by District Workshops in which local commission chairmen and members were instructed in the aims and techniques of Social Concerns.
5. Two tours of the United Nations was conducted by Rev. David Hankins. Tour personnel included seventy-five persons from the Little Rock Conference.

We recommend that every local church observe the following special Sundays: **Social Creed, August 30; World Order, October 25; Commitment Sunday, December 6; Race Relations, February 14.**

We encourage each local church to continue studies in the areas of; **Race for Peace; The Methodist Church and Race; and Moral Man — Moral Society.**

We urge our churches to explore and examine the basic question, **'By what authority does the church involve itself in Social Action?'**

We call the churches to a concentrated attack upon unemployment, under-employment, and the evils of gambling, and request that this be the issue of our special concern and action. We urge cooperation with the North Arkansas Conference in a **Workshop on Gambling**, set for September 15 and 16. The May issue of **The Methodist Story** will suggest resource materials for this emphasis.

We request the local commissions on Christian Social Concerns to work with the Woman's Society of Christian Service in a church-wide study of **The United States and New Nations.**

We give thanks for the diligent work of the Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas and pledge our cooperation in its activities. Whereas, Dr. William E. Brown continues to give the Foundation excellent leadership, we respectfully request that Bishop W. Kenneth Pope reappoint him as its executive director.

In view of the recent government findings connecting lung cancer to cigarette smoking, as reported by the Surgeon General and his staff, we make the following recommendations:

1. That the church become vitally concerned about the health hazard arising out of the use of tobacco.
2. That from time to time the church cooperate in clinics or workshops on the dangers involved in the use of tobacco.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

This year your Commission on Christian Vocations has worked in conjunction with the WSCS in sponsoring vocational rallies in each District for youth and workers with youth. Seven hundred and fifteen persons were present at the rallies. The rallies were a combination type workshop including discussion groups and an inspirational address. Results are now being seen from the rallies in that a number of youth in the local churches throughout the Conference have indicated their response to the call of full time Christian service.

We are indebted to the Conference WSCS for the financial assistance given to help in the rallies. In particular, we are thankful for the excellent leadership and direction given by the Missionary Personnel Committee from the WSCS.

The Commission Recommends for the Coming year:

1. That each pastor give to the library or the guidance counselor in their high school one of the Christian Vocation packets which can be secured from the Commission.

2. That each camp session at Camp Tanako include a vocational emphasis which will lift up the need for life service volunteers in the church and challenge the campers to a commitment to life service work in the church. We urge the director of the camp to send a list of the names and addresses of young people making commitments to the local pastor immediately following camp. We also urge the Conference Director of Youth Work to send a list of life service volunteers to this commission so that contact can be kept with them during the year and pertinent vocational material be sent to them.

3. That a special vocational emphasis be directed to young adults in the churches. We recommend that in all activities next year, a special effort be made to reach young adults for full time Christian service.

4. That the Commission cooperate with the WSCS and Wesley Foundations in planning a special vocational weekend for college students during the coming year.

In the closing year of the quadrennium, the Conference Board of Education has followed the leadership of the General Board in its basic emphasis. We have worked cooperatively with other Conference and Area agencies in matters of common interest, and with these have sustained a pleasant and happy relationship. The statistical record of the year's work will be found in pastor's reports printed in the Conference Journal.

We recommend for the consideration of the new Board the following emphases for the 1964-65 Conference year:

During the past year we have been given some important pictures. Among these is a large picture of the members of the Little Rock Conference made in 1900. Very few of these important pictures remain, and we are fortunate to get one for our records.

There is a growing demand for making a picture of every member of the Conference, and probably another large one like the 1900 picture. We are looking into this matter. The foremost question before us is how to finance such an undertaking.

Since the only conference rooms in the Headquarters building have been rented we have removed from the walls the picture of the General Conference of 1858 and stored it. This picture and the 1900 Annual Conference picture should be on display for visitors to see. They are of great historic value.

Persons having important documents and pictures of historic value should send them to Dr. Roy E. Fawcett, assistant custodian, for filing in our cabinets.

The quarterly Magazine METHODIST HISTORY, published at Lake Junaluska, Dr. Albea Godbold Editor, is a valuable magazine and persons interested in Methodist History will enjoy reading it. The price is \$2.00 per year.

We have under consideration the marking of other historic spots in the bounds of the Little Rock Conference.

We have requested Dr. Kenneth L. Spore to gather material and write a History of Arkansas Methodism for the period 1936 down to the present date, covering a period of approximately thirty years by the time it is completed.

We have examined the statements of cash receipts and disbursements of Methodist Children's Home for the year ended April 30, 1964. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, and accordingly included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. As to contributions and gifts received, it was impractical because of their nature to extend the examination beyond accounting for the receipts as recorded.

In our opinion, the accompanying statements of cash receipts and disbursements present fairly the recorded cash transactions of Methodist Children's Home for the year ended April 30, 1964, on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

INSURANCE COMMITTEE

All Ministers of the Little Rock Conference receiving appointments from the Bishop, and all Employees of the Churches and Methodist boards and agencies of the Little Rock Conference (who work a minimum of 32 hours per week) are eligible to participate in this Group Life and Hospital Insurance plan, subject to its regulations.

The Plan, as accepted by the Annual Conference, shall be mandatory for the persons serving under appointment by the Bishop (provided that Students, otherwise covered, shall be exempt).

This coverage is the same for Ministers and Lay persons, except retired lay employees will not be covered by either life or hospital benefits.

To avoid showing evidence of insurability, those Ministers newly-assigned at the Annual Conference are given 30 days to sign up. Lay Employees are eligible for coverage six months following the date of their employment, and they then have 30 days in which to sign.

The premiums shall be billed quarterly, in advance, shall be due on the 10th of the month, and 30 days grace shall be allowed from the date the premium is due.

The premium payment shall not be accepted for a shorter period of time than three months, while we earnestly urge the payment of a full year's premium in advance, where possible.

The Conference Treasurer shall be Treasurer of the Group. All premium payments shall be made payable to him.

We respectfully request each of the District Superintendents to consider the premium payments of this insurance as part of the normal allocations to the churches over which they have jurisdiction, and that they make every effort to have the churches meet their part for both ministers and lay employees.

LIFE INSURANCE

Life Insurance coverage shall continue to be with the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company of New York City.

1. The premium shall be \$1.73 per month per thousand dollars worth of insurance. This premium includes payment for double indemnity in case of accident. Of this amount, the Church served by the insured shall pay \$1.03, while the insured shall, under present law, pay a maximum of \$.70.

2. Salary and travel allowance, as reported by the District Superintendents, shall be the basis for determining the amount of Life Insurance each minister carries. Total salary shall decide the amount for Lay Persons. Exception: students are required to carry only \$1,000.00.

3. The Board of Pensions of the Little Rock Conference will carry \$1,000 worth of life insurance on each retired minister, who was carrying this group insurance at the time of his retirement, paying the full amount of the premium for him.

Hospital Insurance coverage shall continue to be with the American Hospital and Life Insurance Company of San Antonio, Texas.

2. Benefits shall be:

- Room \$15.00 per day; time 1 to 35 days each entry.

- Doctor's medical care in hospital \$3.00 per day.
- Maternity benefits up to \$150.00 for hospital; \$50.00 for doctor.
- Other benefits as listed in policy.

3. There will be \$25.00 deductible from each claim except surgery, maternity or minor accidents.

4. As a minister retires he may keep his hospital insurance at the same rate as under the group plan. The Board of Pensions will pay that part of the premium formerly paid by the Church.

We strongly recommend that every minister insure his family.

All churches, too, we feel, will benefit by having all full-time employees covered by this group plan.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The Conference Board of Lay Activities has been diligent in its efforts, throughout the year to accomplish the aims and purposes of the lay activities program as set forth in the Discipline.

Special attention has been given to Stewardship and Finance. Training sessions have been held in almost every district to assure greater participation in the Every Member Visitation program. Reports thus far indicate the plan is widely used and with success.

Benevolences: Due to the ever-increasing need for World Service and other benevolent giving, the Board voted unanimously as favoring a 17% increase for World Service and other benevolent purposes, and will use its best efforts to inform the Methodist Membership of the church needs.

Methodist Men: Although we have not reached our goal — a Methodist Men's club in every church — we have made progress during the Conference year. Our plans are to continue trying to organize and maintain a Methodist Men's organization in every church that will be helpful in every phase of the Church program for which it is responsible.

The development of Lay Leadership this Conference year has been the most successful of any previous year, accomplished through the cooperation of District Superintendents, District Associates, Church Lay Leaders and others, all interested in the developing of additional leadership.

Lay Speaking: Training programs have been held in almost every district, and as a result we have more trained lay speakers in the Conference than ever before.

Laymen's Day was observed in most of the churches in the Conference and a good number of laymen are occupying pulpits where ministers are not available.

Training of Official Board has proven to be one of our most desired training programs and plans are to enlarge on it so as to acquaint the officers and members of the local board with its full responsibilities.

The Conference Laymen's Assembly at Camp Tanako was an outstanding event well attended and the program was very inspirational.

MINIMUM SALARY COMMISSION

The Commission on Minimum Salary shall be composed of one minister and one laymen from each district of the Conference, and including representatives from urban, village and rural churches. This Commission shall elect quadrennially a chairman, vice-chairman and secretary to perform the usual duties of such offices. These officers shall also compose the Executive Committee of the Commission. Whenever a vacancy occurs on the Commission between sessions of the Annual Conference, the vacancy shall be filled by the District Superintendent of the District involved.

Charges may become eligible to receive salary aid for the pastor from minimum salary fund by meeting the following requirements:

1. Conduct an Every Member Visitation Program following the procedure outlined by the Town and Country Commission.
 - a. If a pastor moves to another charge and has not made an effort to put on the Every Member Visitation Program, he will not be eligible for Minimum Salary Aid.
 - b. No charge will be eligible to receive Minimum Salary Aid if it has not paid the percentage requested by the Conference for Minimum Salary Fund.
2. File with District Superintendent, the Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission, and the Secretary of Minimum Salary Commission:
 - a. A report of the Every Member Visitation Program.
 - b. A copy of the budget approved by the Official Board of each church.
 - c. An application for minimum salary assistance.
3. Each charge shall be encouraged to increase the salary, travel expense or utilities \$100.00 a year. No charge shall be eligible to receive salary aid if there is any reduction in salary or travel expense.
4. Plans for a Larger Parish Program shall be presented to the Commission for approval and for funds to be received.
5. All pro-rated connectional claims shall be paid by the charge to be eligible to receive minimum salary aid. 1960 Discipline, Paragraph 823.
6. Minimum Salary Charges shall be grouped as follows:
 - Type A. At least four churches with a membership of 300, pastor preaches three times on Sunday. Salary, travel expense mission aid and minimum salary not to exceed \$4,500. Where there are four churches on a charge and they merge to form three churches, they shall qualify for the same amount as a charge with four churches.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE

Type B. At least three churches with salary, travel expense, mission aid minimum salary aid not to exceed \$4,000. However, where there are three churches on a charge and they merge to form two churches or one church, they shall qualify for the same amount as a charge with three churches.

Type C. Student pastors married, at least three churches, salary, travel expense, mission aid and Minimum salary aid not to exceed \$3,000. Student Pastor single, at least three churches, salary, travel expense, mission and minimum salary aid not to exceed \$2,400. Minimum Salary Charges must be composed of at least three churches with salary and travel expense as much as \$1,800.

Maximum Schedule Allowances:	Student Single -----	\$650
	Student Married -----	750
	Fulltime -----	850

Ministers with dependent children eighteen years of age and under may draw \$100.00 for each child without reference to the above Schedule of Allowances and Salary level. Each child to continue to draw \$100.00 if attending an accredited college or in training above the high school level.

7. Payment from this fund are made without regard to the amount the pastor receives from pension or educational funds. No part-time pastor is eligible to receive minimum salary aid.
8. In the event the income of the fund becomes insufficient to meet the claims upon it, each claimant shall benefit in his proportionate share of the available fund.
9. If a charge becomes qualified as a minimum salary charge within the first six months of the conference year, the effect becomes retroactive to the beginning of the Conference year.
10. The Minimum Salary Fund shall be raised by an apportionment to all the churches of the Conference in an amount equal to 3% of the cash salary paid the pastor. The Commission would like for the pastor to volunteer and pay through the church treasurer one-third of the charge's apportionment, and for the District Superintendents and all other members of the Conference serving in special appointments, to volunteer to contribute to the fund an amount equal to 1% of their salary.
11. Group Life Insurance, and Hospitalization, premiums pastors part, to be paid from the Minimum Salary Fund, for pastors serving Type C. Churches.
12. The Bishop and District Superintendents, The Town and Country Commission and Commission on Minimum Salary, shall work out a pattern of Enlarged Charge arrangements. The Conference and all concerned shall begin immediately to work to achieve these arrangements within the next three years.
13. The Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission shall serve in an advisory capacity to the Commission on Minimum Salary 1960 Discipline Paragraph 123.1.
14. Exceptions to the above requirements may be made by the Commission.

Report No. 2 of the Little Rock Conference Board of Ministerial Training

To the 111th Session of the Little Rock Annual Conference

May 25-27, 1964

POLICY AND PROGRAM

I. The Little Rock Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications proposes to work strictly within the framework of the current Discipline of The Methodist Church.

II. The elected officers of the Board are:

Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, Registrars: General, College Students, Seminary Students.

III. The Executive Committee of the Board are the elected officers. They shall have authority in matters committed to them by the Board.

IV. The Board shall meet prior to the opening of school, at Annual Conference, and on call of the Chairman.

V. The Registrar shall arrange meetings at District levels with all men in the Course of Study, just prior to Annual Conference.

VI. The Board's sources of income shall be:

- (a) A percentage from Conference Benevolences
- (b) A special offering in November for Ministerial Training
- (c) Gifts, bequests and interest

VII. The Board shall maintain a Scholarship Loan Program for Ministerial Training as follows:

A. For those in Course of Study

- 1. Assistance to Courses of Study Schools
 - (a) A maximum of \$35.00 for books and supplies
 - (b) One round trip at 6¢ per mile
- 2. Assistance in the Correspondence Course
 - (a) Payment of fees
 - (b) A maximum of \$35.00 for books

Above assistance repayable: Maximum received in any one year, by one year of service as a full time pastor, either as a member On Trial or as a Full Time Approved Supply.

B. For students from Little Rock Conference churches preparing for the Effective Ministry in The Methodist Church and enrolled in a college, university or seminary, approved by the university Senate of The Methodist Church, and who:

- 1. Hold a current Local Preacher's License in The Methodist Church, or are On Trial in the Little Rock Annual Conference.
- 2. Make application annually to the proper Registrar of the Board, prior to August 1, giving all information requested, and authorizing regular grade reports to this Board Registrar from the school Registrar and a transcript of credits at the end of each semester. Application must be requested.

3. Make a note, properly endorsed, and payable in one of

two ways:

- (a) One full year of service as an Effective Minister in The Methodist Church repaying the maximum receivable any one year.
- (b) In cash with interest at 4% per annum, beginning at the time the recipient terminated his ministry or preparation therefor; schedule of payments to be arranged with the Board Registrar.
- 4. Maintain a satisfactory grade average to indicate ability to graduate from his institution.
- 5. No student may receive assistance for more than 8 college semesters and 6 seminary semesters, or the quarterly equivalent.

VIII. The Board may set a maximum amount of assistance per year, per recipient, but assistance will be determined for each individual on the basis of requirements.

IX. The Board shall maintain a scholarship of \$400.00 per year to Perkins School of Theology.

REQUESTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

I. The Board, each District Superintendent, pastor and local church to hold up to young men the need for ministers and the challenge of the Ministry, that may enable them to hear the call.

II. As the first step into the Ministry, enrolling for the studies for License to Preach with the department of Inservice Training of the General Board of Ministerial Education.

III. Each pastor to provide himself with folders on the Course of Study and with the book for the course on License to Preach.

IV. That when a person has passed the correspondence work on studies for License to Preach, or has completed one-fourth of the work for a B. D. Degree in an approved seminary, and in the judgment of the District Committee on Ministerial Training and Qualifications his gifts and graces commend him for the Ministry, the Committee license him to preach, subject to the approval of their action and renewal of this license by the District Conference.

V. Wherever possible, that men in the Course of Study take their work through the Courses of Study School.

VI. We assume our conference share of financial responsibility for the Arkansas Pastors School.

VII. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance to grant:

1. An appropriation of 4% from Conference Benevolences
2. The authorization of a special offering on November 18 for Ministerial Training.

VIII. We express our appreciation for the support given the Ministerial Training Scholarship Loan Program by the churches of the Conference. In view of our increased load since assuming assistance for seminary students, we require a substantial increase this year.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

1. **World Service and Conference Benevolences:** We recommend that each local church continue to keep the membership informed on the way World Service and Conference Benevolence money is used. The twenty percent increase for the new quadrennium is vitally needed, and all churches are urged to accept the askings in full. According to reports from the District Superintendents nine new churches should be organized in the Conference during the next four years. Additional funds will be needed by this Board if this is to be done.

2. **General Advance Specials:** We recommend that all local churches continue to give generous support to general Advance Specials, and that the goal of every church having an Advance Special be realized. The personal interest generated through Advance Specials brings new life

to the church. We especially commend the work of **Bill Elder in Japan** and request your support.

3. National Advance Specials: We recommend that the Conference keep the work of the Rio Grande Conference \$3,500, the Indian Mission Conference \$6,000, the Central Jurisdiction \$1,637, Lydia Patterson Operation Funds (No fixed amount) and Lydia Patterson Capital Funds Drive \$10,068 (\$5,064 through the districts) on the priority list for the coming year, and the amounts be apportioned to the districts on the same basis as last year.

4. World Outlook: We recommend that October be designated as **World Outlook Month** for the purpose of increasing the circulation of this general missionary education publication

5. Jurisdictional Missionary Training: We recommend that the six District Missionary Secretaries, along with other designated personnel, be sent to the Jurisdictional Missionary Conference at Mt Sequoyah, August 3-6, and that \$25 be paid on expense of one young person from each District, and that the Chairman of each local church Commission on Missions attend the Missions Workshop for Local Church Chairmen at Mt. Sequoyah, July 31-August 2.

6. District Board of Missions: We recommend that a District Board of Missions be organized in each District.

7. Need of Missionary Personnel: We recommend that the need of the mission field be brought before our people, and that our young people and young adults be challenged to give their lives to one of the world or national fields of service. The local church Commission on Missions and the Committee on Christian Vocations can cooperate in providing literature, films and brochures that inform persons of the need for consecrated leaders.

8. Necessity of Every Member Visitation: We recommend that the Every Member Visitation be made in every charge, and that no charge receive salary supplementary funds without the approval of the District Superintendent that this has been done

9. Forms for Aid: We request the District Superintendents to complete the form supplied by the Board of Missions for each charge asking for aid, and that after the Board has acted on these requests, shifting of these funds may be done only after conferring with the Board and with their approval.

10. Church Extension: We urge every District Superintendent to promote the organization of **new churches** in places where present and anticipated growth warrants it. We commend the work of the special committee on new churches and its proposal for the **Special Church Extension Program** calling for a \$20,000 a year during the quadrennium for new churches, mergers and relocating of churches. We call upon the Conference, the Six Districts and the local churches to meet the goals so that we may respond to our responsibility in this field. We remind the Conference that if this Board meets its responsibility in the area of Church Extension additional funds will be needed for this purpose.

11. We urge the Commission on Missions in the local church be organized and function actively in keeping our Methodist people informed on all missionary needs and endeavors, the use of World Service and Conference Benevolences, and Advance Specials.

12. Alaska Methodist College: The college needs our continuing help, and each local church is asked to adopt some special for its use.

13. Our Mission Today: Reports coming from the Conference indicates that **Our Mission Today** study book by Tracy K. Jones met with universal appeal, and that there is a new missionary interest.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE

14. **Ed Matthews Visitation:** During the month of January Ed Matthews, Missionary to the Congo, was in the six districts of the Conference and made a lasting impression with his vivid portrayal of the work and of the need in Africa.

15. **Mobile Ministry:** We highly commend the Mobile Ministry recommended by the special committee on its study and pledge our support in the light of forthcoming developments.

16. We request the Commission on World Service and Finance to grant the Board of Missions the minimum amount of \$31,500 during 1964-65, and pledge our best judgment in using these for missionary purposes.

BOARD OF PENSIONS**Report No. 1**

The Board of Pensions recommends that the annuity rates for the Conference year 1964-1965 shall be established as follows:

Retired Ministers shall receive \$54.00 per service year.

Retired Ministers' widows shall receive \$38.00 per service year.

Special Conference Claimants shall receive \$38.00 per service year.

Special Conference Claimants' widows shall receive \$26.60 per service year.

Dependent children of deceased members of the Conference shall receive \$13.50 per conference year.

Dependent children of deceased Special Conference Claimants shall receive \$9.50 per service year.

The pension payments shall be made monthly, on or before the first day of the succeeding month.

We recommend that the apportionment to the churches for the support of our retired ministers, their widows, dependent children, and the Special Conference Claimants, their widows, and dependent children, shall be an amount equal to fifteen (15) per cent of the cash salary, or salaries paid to the pastor, or pastors of each charge.

We recommend that Sunday, March 21, 1965, be observed as Retired Minister's Day and that all churches honor the retired ministers and their widows on that day by special recognition and the receiving of an offering for necessitous relief for Conference Claimants.

The present annuity rates lack stability because they depend entirely on the current income. A few years of depression could play havoc with the current income. To us, the only hope for stability appears to be in entry into the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund. We recommend that the MRPF New Entrant program be seriously considered by the Annual Conference, and that the Bishop and the Cabinet be requested to set up such district or sub-district meetings as may be necessary to acquaint the ministers and laymen within the bounds of the Conference with the details of the MRPF New Entrant program.

We recommend the adoption of a Conference Standing Rule placing the responsibility on each District Superintendent for informing the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions of the death of any claimant of the Board which occurs in his district.

We recommend that the General Board of Pensions continue to write and distribute the monthly payments to our annuitants.

We request that the study committee to be appointed by the Bishop according to paragraph 7 of the report of the Area Council's Study Committee adopted by the Conference May 25, 1964 be directed to study Pension Programs in relation to any possible merger to the end that the security of Little Rock Conference pensioners be safeguarded and if possible provide an increase in pensions if and when a merger occurs.

We regret the deaths of these retired members of the Conference and widows of retired members: W. S. Cazort, J. Wayne Mann, Lee R. Sparks, Doyle Wilcox, Mrs. S. K. Burnett, Mrs. C. B. Davis, Mrs. H. H. McGuire, Mrs. W. H. Sanders, Mrs. J. Wayne Mann, Mrs. Ben Fitzhugh, Mrs. Giles B. Pixley.

Your Conference Board of Pensions, the Little Rock Conference, and the state of Arkansas suffered a great loss in the death of the Hon. Homer M. Adkins. Mr. Adkins, an ex-governor of the state of Arkansas, was vice-chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions at the time of his death. He was a good churchman, a loyal citizen, a kind husband and father and a dedicated public servant.

We request that the Conference renew its invitation to Cokesbury to locate an outlet in Little Rock for the convenience of the Methodists of Arkansas.

It is the wish of your Conference Board of Pensions to increase the amount per service year paid to our annuitants just as rapidly as possible. At present our income from all sources does not justify an increase. We invite your attention to our financial statement as it will appear in the 1964 Journal. We suggest to the new Board of Pensions that a brief mimeographed statement of receipts and expenditures for conference year 1963-64 be mailed to all annuitants with the July 1 mailings of their checks.

On behalf of all members of your Board of Pensions, let me say, it has been a pleasure to serve.

COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

This is an important year in our publishing work. Five years after The Methodist Church was organized in 1784 the Book Concern was organized. For 175 years this work has grown and prospered. The Publishing House is marking this anniversary with an invitation to our people to become customers. They offer service through mail orders to those of us who have no house near enough to serve us. And they would like it known that our people may open credit accounts with them on the same basis as credit is extended by other retail establishments.

One feature of this anniversary year will be an effort on the part of The Methodist Publishing House to help our people become better acquainted with the house and its work. To that end a film strip, "The Methodist Publishing House — Where Is It? What Is It?", together with a 33½ rpm record is made available on a ten day loan basis. The film may be secured from the store at 1910 Main Street, Dallas, Texas.

The Publishing House last year did more than \$21,000,000 in business and appropriated the profits, \$700,000, to the retired ministers of the church, their widows and orphaned children.

We call attention to the significant success of "Together" Magazine and suggest that if in each district there should be appointed a representative it would go into a greater number of our homes.

The work of printing the new children's curriculum is on time and will be ready for our churches by September 1st. The "get acquainted" material will be available June 1st for those who have ordered it.

CAMP TANAKO

During the 1963 camping season 35 different groups, numbering almost 3000 campers, participated in well-planned programs under direction of carefully selected, capable, leadership. Already the schedule is almost filled for the 1964 season.

The Camp is planned, and the program set up, to minister to all age groups — children through adults, with activities appropriate for these respective ages. Every care is given to making the camping experience physically safe and morally and spiritually rewarding. The Board is endeavoring to make the entire camping program an increasingly effective force for the developing of Christian character and the training of needed leadership.

We are happy to report progress in material and physical construction. During the present Conference year, two new cottages have been built, bringing the total capacity to 200; also a storage shelter has been constructed for the housing of tools and equipment. Landscaping is needed both for the conservation and the beauty of the campus and surroundings.

We recommended the continuation of the financial policy currently followed:

1. From Conference apportionments, \$9,000.00
2. The privilege of a free-will offering, Sunday, April 25, 1965
3. Encouragement of gifts from individuals and special groups.

TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

1. We commend Bishop W. Kenneth Pope, Bill Leavitt of Methodist Information, the churches, choirs and pastors of Little Rock for the Television Program, "The Methodist Hour in Arkansas," on Sunday mornings, and Television Station KATV for this service to Arkansas Methodism.

2. We express appreciation to the television stations and the Radio stations located within the bounds of the Little Rock Conference for the time given to our churches for the preaching of the Word.

3. We recommend that an **Area Workshop on Audio-Visuals** be planned jointly with the North Arkansas Conference for the purpose of training local church workers in the use of audio-visuals and give instruction on available resources.

4. We recommend that pastors and District Directors of TRAFCO schedule local programs on radio and television where possible.

5. We recommend that consideration be given to providing an **Audio-Visual Room** in the Methodist Headquarters Building to make accessible all resources within the Conference.

6. We request the Commission on World Service and Finance to apportion \$3,000 for TRAFCO to be used as follows: \$2,500 for General TRAFCO, and \$500 for Conference TRAFCO. This amount to be raised through the Connectional Items.

THE TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

1. The Town and Country Commission Meeting and Workshop shall be held in Little Rock, January 14-15, 1965.

2. We shall continue to promote interest and provide worship services in areas having many tourists and hold workshops where needed.

3. In static and declining population areas churches with very few members shall study under the leadership of the District Superintendent, and the Executive Secretary of Town and Country Work, their potential in the areas they serve, to determine whether or not they shall continue as organized churches or plan to relocate and merge with other congregations, or to maintain their church as a chapel, especially, if there is a cemetery.

4. We shall cooperate with the University of Arkansas in promoting the Rural Seminar.

5. The Commission shall be responsible for promoting stewardship through the Every Member Visitation Program, the Lord's Acre and the Lord's Hour Program and tithing program in District and Sub-District Workshops in cooperation with the Board of Lay Activities; and the Wills and Legacies Program in cooperation with any other committee or agency in the Conference having responsibility for cultivation in this area of stewardship.

6. The Every Member Visitation Program shall be mandatory for churches receiving minimum salary aid, if it is made a requirement by the Commission on Minimum Salary.

7. We shall endeavor to secure a sign on every Methodist Church.

8. The Enlarged Charge Program shall be continued with a goal of at least 300 members for every full-time pastor; and the Larger Parish Program shall be expanded in areas where it is possible of attainment.

9. Charge Councils shall be organized where feasible.

10. Workshops for ministers on the sacraments, performing wedding ceremonies, holding funeral services, and administering the work of

the church shall be held when requested by the District Superintendent.

11. The Executive Secretary shall continue to give guidance in building programs when requested by the pastor and District Superintendent.

12. We shall seek to get each District Director certified to teach the course on Town and Country Work.

13. The District Director shall be appointed by the District Superintendent after consultation with the Executive Secretary. The Director shall be a member of the Commission representing the District in which he serves, and when he is moved out of the District he shall no longer serve as a member of the Commission, unless he is appointed as District Director in the District where he moves. There shall be a training period for the Directors.

14. The Harvest Festival and Rural Life Programs shall be promoted.

15. The Rural Church of the Year Program shall be promoted as outlined in the brochure for the Rural Church of the Year Program with the exception of the District Winners receiving a certificate of recognition and no cash award.

16. We shall seek to develop cooperative procedures between the church and governmental agencies, the State Council of Churches, and other denominations.

17. We ask that \$9,000.00 be granted by the Conference for the Work of the Town and Country Commission.

18. We ask that E. J. Holfield be appointed by the Bishop and the Cabinet as the Executive Secretary of the Commission for 1964-1965.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

"Growth in understanding of our Christian Commitment and growth in spiritual power. Increase in knowledge of the needs of the world. Sharing through witness and service in the outreach of the church." These are the goals as stated in our new statement of purpose of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild. In evaluating the work of the Little Rock Conference for the past year, and in the light of these goals we find progress has been made in many phases, as this report covering the last year of our immediate past president, Mrs. Alvin Stone's most able administration, will reflect.

Early this year we formally launched the observation of the 25th anniversary of the founding of our organizations, and we gratefully acknowledge the very fine recognition and assistance given us by the pastors of our churches in this launching. The Woman's Division has challenged the Conferences to accept as major goals in this observance the following increases: an increase in membership of 25% by May 1966; an increase of 25% in pledge giving by 1966; and the recruitment of at least four women; (1) one Deaconess (2) one US-2 (3) one overseas regular missionary (4) one short-term overseas missionary. The implementation of plans toward these goals has already begun.

The total adult membership in our conference is 12,130 in 222 Woman's Societies and 74 Guilds. We have three districts that are 100% organized, which means either every church has a Woman's Society or has one or more District Members. We have one district (Camden) that has three churches that are 100% organized. These deserve a great deal of credit and should be encouraging to us as we work toward our 25% increase in membership. The eight new societies organized this year were Camden District 2; Monticello 3; Little Rock 1; Pine Bluff 1. We express appreciation to all the District Superintendents for their loyal cooperation and assistance.

In the area of Spiritual Life there has been increased and effective cooperation in the local churches on the part of the pastors and Commissions on Evangelism with the Secretaries of Spiritual Life of the

Woman's Societies and Guild. On the district and conference levels prayer retreats and Day Apart meetings were held which have helped to strengthen the spiritual growth of our members.

The Conference School of Missions was again held at the Arkansas School for the Blind with a total attendance of 220. 182 were enrolled as students with 170 of these receiving credit cards. 73 churches were represented. The Youth Section which was added to the School for the first time, enrolled 25 students. This section will again be a part of the school this year. 147 registered for Conference Guild Weekend and their records show that 39 Jurisdiction Recognition credits were received with 427 students enrolled in local church classes during the year.

All six districts held Children's Seminars and the Conference Secretary of Children's Work took leadership training both at the Tanako Laboratory School and at the Vacation School Institute. There has been such perfect cooperation between the Children's Workers in the Woman's Society and the Board of Education that we believe that there will not be much transition difficulty when the structural change in this work is put into effect.

The Missionary Personnel Committees are trying to meet the challenge of the goal of four commissioned workers from this conference by placing emphasis on recruitment in varying ways: active and enthusiastic committees on Christian Vocations in every church; special local and district workshops for training and inspiration of adults; prayer-vocation weekends for junior and senior high school students; W.S.C.S. section of School of Missions. Our Secretary of Student Work has developed close contacts with both students and directors in the Wesley Foundation Centers. Emphasis has been placed this year on education, training and inspiration for local student secretaries in the form of our "Day on Campus" projects. We are continuing our project of providing books through our Wesley Foundation Library Fund and our contribution of \$131.25 to the United Southern Christian Fellowship chapter for leadership training at Arkansas A.M.&N. College at Pine Bluff. Our conference sent one young woman to the Christian Vocations Weekend at National College in Kansas City, last October. We also sent one young man from Philander Smith College to the National Inter-Faith Student Conference on Religion and Race in Washington, D. C. last November.

Some of the areas of study and service participated in through the department of Christian Social Relations included the study of national issues and the sending of letters and telegrams to our senators and congressmen asking their support of the Civil Rights Bill and other measures of major interest to the church. We have presented President Johnson's letter on Racial policies and our Bishop's pronouncements on Methodist Beliefs on these issues. We continue to urge districts and local societies to study and work toward the ratification of the new Racial Charter. The United Nations has received emphasis both locally and district wide. Many societies have had good programs on the United Nations. The study "The Christian Family and It's Money" has been presented church wide and district wide by guilds and local societies with very good reports. The Secretary of Christian Social Relations has shared with the Conference her wonderful experiences from attendance at the National Seminar on "Women in a New Age" in Tacoma, Washington, and her seminar at the United Nations.

The total sent to the Woman's Division on Pledge for the year 1963-1964 was \$92,773.42. The pledge was \$88,000.00 and the giving was a 5% increase over the giving last year. The financial goal for our 25th Anniversary observation is a 25% increase over the giving in 1962-63. Our pledge for the Division for 1964-65 is \$100,000.00. The giving from Children's Service Fund was \$118.13 and \$3,136.99 was credited at the Division from the MYFund which makes the total on Appropriations \$96,028.54. The total sent to the Division was \$106,460.70. This includes cash for Supply Askings, Call to Prayer and Self Denial Offerings, Division Cultivation, and Supplementary gifts. Total that will be credited

including the MYFund will be \$109,597.69. The total sent in by the Districts was \$116,714.86 and report for Local church and community work was \$46,137.85. We continue the support of Miss Helen Wilson and Mrs. Adele Phillips — our two missionaries in Bolivia.

The Conference Woman's Society and Guild have been represented at the Jurisdiction School of Missions at Mt. Sequoyah, at the Missionary Conference and Jurisdictional Board of Missions at Mt. Sequoyah, at the Executive Council of Jurisdiction Woman's Society in Lincoln, Nebraska, at the Jurisdiction Woman's Society Annual Meeting in Wichita, Kansas, and by the President and the Treasurer at the fall Board Meeting of the Woman's Division.

God is calling us as Methodist women to meet challenges such as women have never before been asked to meet. We believe that our women are facing these challenges realistically but very hopefully, and we believe we can meet them successfully if we truly give ourselves to new plans, new programs, new dollars, new personnel, and above all, new commitment of our lives to Jesus Christ and His Mission for us and all mankind.

D. Other Apportionments and Recommendations

1. We recommend the sum of \$750.00 for Area Expense, concurring in this with a request from the Bishop and his cabinet.

2. We recommend as Joint Treasurer, Mr. Grafton Thomas, at a salary of \$7,800.00 and Mrs. L. W. Averitt, Assistant Treasurer, at a salary of \$4,800.00, and that office rental be \$625.00; office supplies, printing and postage \$1,500.00; telephone, social security, bond insurance, and miscellaneous items \$1,000.00; and that the expense of this office be shared on a 50-50 basis by the two Conferences, and that the Joint Executive Committee of Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences be authorized to continue in making necessary adjustments that may be required from time to time. All these items are to come out of the Joint Conference Administration Fund.

3. We recommend that the following items be combined under the head of "Connectional Items" and be divided among the six Districts by the District Superintendents:

4. District Superintendent's Salary, Expense and Utilities: The District Superintendents shall receive an annual salary of \$9,000.00, \$800.00 of which shall be considered as utilities; and \$3,000.00 travel expense, to be used at the discretion of the individual District Superintendent. Both travel and salary to be paid monthly.

The Commission recommends that an amount equal to 10% of all pastors' cash salaries be paid to the District Superintendents' Fund, \$4,000.00 of this fund to be directed to Lydia Patterson Institute, El Paso, Texas, Rio Grande Conference, for capital improvement.

5. The amount apportioned for the Episcopal Fund is to be an amount equal to two percent of the cash salaries of the pastors for the current year.

6. We request that an amount equal to three percent of the pastor's salary be assessed against the individual churches for Minimum Salary Fund. We request that the pastor, church, or agencies, pay one-third through the local church or direct to the Conference Treasurer.

7. The Commission recommends that an amount equal to 15% of all pastors' cash salaries be apportioned for the Conference Claimants Fund.

8. We recommend that the Treasurer be authorized to pay \$15.00 for membership of the Methodist Historical Society of the Conference in the National Methodist Historical Society, and \$100.00 for other expenses.

9. We recommend a charge of three percent of all funds handled by the Conference Treasurer, except the Conference Claimants, Superannuate Endowment, World Service, Advance Specials, TRAFCO, and Mt. Sequoyah, and this money derived from these charges to be set up as a Conference Administrative Fund, in accordance with the Conference standing rule.

10. Utilities for pastors: Each charge is requested to designate the cost of parsonage utilities as a part of assessee's salary, thus exempting the cost of the utilities from the income tax claims. It is understood that this amount, the total salary, is subject to the percentage levied against pastors' salaries.

11. We recommend that the Commission on Vocations be allowed \$600.00.

12. We emphasize the importance of Christian wills and legacies. Materials for promotion may be ordered from the Department of Wills, Bequests and Gifts of the Council on World Service and Finance, 1200 Davis Street, Evanston, Illinois.

13. We approve the request of the Conference Board of Missions for permission to promote the raising of the sum of \$3,500.00 for the Rio Grande Conference, and the sum of \$6,000.00 for the Indian Mission, and \$1,637.00 for the Central Jurisdiction during the Conference Year 1964-1965 as Advance Specials, to be apportioned on the regular percentage basis. Your Commission also approves the request of the Board of Missions to raise through Advance Specials \$5,000.00 per year for the capital improvement of Lydia Patterson Institute.

14. We recommend that, in accordance with a request from the Western Methodist Assembly, an amount not less than \$10.00 per charge be paid this year for the needed building and improvement of the Western Methodist Assembly.

15. We recommend that the Little Rock Conference pay an amount equal to an amount paid through World Service and Finance Commission of the North Arkansas Conference to the support of the Chaplain at Booneville Sanitorium.

16. We recommend that the Conference raise \$84,651.00 for its work of Higher Education at Hendrix College; this amount to be apportioned to the Districts and that the District Superintendents and District Stewards make the apportionment to the churches of the District according to their best judgment.

17. We recommend that the apportionment set for Wesley Foundation Operational Fund be on the basis of fifty cents per member.

18. We recommend an extension of one year on the program of Capital Improvement of Wesley Foundation to those churches not having reached their goal.

19. At the suggestion of the Board of Education, we recommend the fourth Sunday in September as Church School Day, and authorize the Church School Day Askings to be \$9,000.00, and urge all our churches to raise their quotas to meet this need.

20. We urge our churches to continue their support of Camp Tanako. Concurring with the request from the Camp Board we are urging all churches either to include the Camp program in their annual financial budget, or to make the fourth Sunday of April as Camp Sunday, at which time a free-will offering may be made for this project.

21. We recommend the first Sunday in December (Commitment Sunday) as Christian Civic Foundation Day, and authorize a Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas, Inc., offering of \$7,500.00 and urge all our churches to cooperate. This amount to be allocated by the District Superintendents on a percentage basis.

22. We endorse an offering in November, to be known as the Ministerial Training Special Offering, to be used in Ministerial Student Loans and Scholarships, and in the support of the Arkansas Pastors' School.

23. We recommend the third Sunday in March be observed as Retired Ministers' Day, with an offering as requested by the Board of Pensions.

24. We recommend a grant to pay necessary expenses of Board of Hospitals and Homes and Conference Board of Trustees and other necessary incidental expenses of other Boards and Agencies to conduct their work.

25. We recommend payment of \$2,000.00 to the Methodist Center in Washington D. C., for the ensuing year.

26. Your Commission recommends that all surplus funds not under any Board or Commission of the Annual Conference be subject to the direction of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

27. We authorize the Treasurer to cooperate with the First Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas, and to pay the proper official of said church any deficit in Conference entertainment expense following the submission of a financial statement to the Treasurer.

Gentlemen:

The attached statements present cash receipts and disbursements for the period June 1, 1963 through May 31, 1964.

My examination of the treasurer's records was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and included such tests and checks as I considered necessary in the circumstances including verification by correspondence with depositories and physical inspection of notes and other assets. Cash receipts were traced into the bank accounts and were examined as to credit in the proper amounts into the proper funds. Cash disbursements were verified against canceled checks and a test check of authorized requisitions.

The conference periodically transmits sizeable sums to the Board of Pensions Distribution Fund in Evanston, Illinois out of which the treasurer at Evanston pays monthly pensions etc., and at all times the Evanston treasurer has a cash balance on hand belonging to the Little Rock Conference. My examination did not consider this cash balance in the Distribution Fund at Evanston as it is no longer under control of Grafton Thomas, Little Rock Conference Treasurer, after it is sent from Little Rock to Evanston. As of May 28, 1964 I am advised that there was close to \$70,000.00 in the distribution fund at Evanston in the name of the Little Rock conference.

It is my opinion that the accompanying statements present fairly the results of cash operations under the control of Grafton Thomas, treasurer, for the period June 1, 1963 through May 31, 1964, and that funds and investments are on hand at May 28, 1964 as stated in the exhibits.

Memoirs**W. S. CAZORT**

Reverend William S. Cazort, who was born at Lamar, Arkansas on October 15, 1881, passed from this life, as a result of an automobile accident, near Lamar, on September 14, 1963, lacking only one month of his eighty-second birthday.



Brother Cazort joined the church at Altus, Arkansas in 1890, and was licensed to preach in November, 1940 in the Prescott District. J. D. Baker was the District Superintendent. He was admitted on trial in November 1942, ordained a deacon in 1943, and an elder in 1945. He served for ten years in his first appointment at Mt. Ida, 1940-50, after which he served four years at Keith Memorial in Malvern, 1950-54. He reached compulsory, official retirement age on June 10, 1954 even though he was able to continue, and wanted to continue, under the law of our church he had to move and was moved to St. Luke's El Dorado as a supply, at the Conference session in 1954. He supplied St. Luke's church in El Dorado until the Annual Conference session in 1961. After Conference in 1961, he, having gone to Pocahontas to be near his daughter, was assigned to work the Maynard Charge

in the Paragould District in the North Arkansas Conference where he was serving when he went away.

Brother Cazort married Ida Madalin Ringgold on December 25, 1907, who survives him. To this union there was born a son, William S. Cazort, Jr. and a daughter, Dorothy May (now Mrs. Marvin Thaxton Wells) of Pocahontas. He is also survived by three brothers: Dr. Alan G. Cazort of Little Rock, John H. Cazort of Glendale and W. A. Cazort of Texas; three sisters: Mrs. Mathew Patterson of Oklahoma, Mrs. G. I. McLurkin of Morrilton, and Mrs. Marvin Hamilton of Pine Bluff; and four grand children.

The funeral was conducted by Reverend Carl Mathews, Pastor at Lamar in Lamar Methodist Church, September 17, 1963. Reverend C. N. Guice, retired member of the North Arkansas Conference of Conway, long time friend of the family, delivered a beautiful tribute to Brother Cazort. Burial was in the Cazort family cemetery near Lamar, Johnson County, Arkansas.

W. S. Cazort was a graduate of Hendrix College, having entered Hendrix while it was still at Altus, but had to drop out because of typhoid. He graduated in the class of 1929, in the same class with his son.

Bill Cazort, or "Brother Bill" as he liked for people to call him had innumerable friends. He usually greeted his preacher friends with a hearty "My friend and brother." Perhaps the secret of his success in the ministry, which he entered at age 58 is that he felt a friendliness for his fellow-man. When someone asked a favor of him, his usual response would be "I'll do it or have it done". And then, he usually did it!

He loved poetry and much of it found a way into his sermons. He was a good preacher and one who wore well, as attested by one ten-year pastorate and another for seven years. He had only one four-year pastorate and that was cut short by the law of the church. He had only one pastorate for less than four years, and that was his last, cut short by death.

Brother Cazort lacked only four years being as old as my father, yet I served on the committee which recommended him to the Annual

Conference for admission on trial. I remember that I had a feeling then, that the best years were ahead; that he was just entering the high noon of his life. It was only fourteen years to the end of his active relationship to the Conference, but it was almost a quarter of a century to the end of his ministry. Where is there another man entering the ministry at 58 and serving twenty-four years in only four churches?

So many people are so much better because Brother Bill gave those twenty-four years to be a preacher, as he so often said, "in my humble way."

JOHN WAYNE MANN

The Reverend John Wayne Mann was born on May 28, 1886, near Cabot, Arkansas. He died at his home in Lewisville, Arkansas, on November 27, 1963. He was one of four children. He is survived by two sisters: Mrs. R. E. Garlington of Searcy, Arkansas; and Mrs. B. A. Lynch of Blytheville, Arkansas.



Brother Mann went to schools in and near Cabot and finished High School at Cabot. Early in his youth he felt the call to the ministry. He began preparing himself for the ministry and obtained his B.A. degree from Henderson College in Arkadelphia, Arkansas, in 1908. In that same year at a meeting of the Little Rock Annual Conference in Arkadelphia, he was admitted On Trial to the Little Rock Annual Conference. Bishop E. R. Hendrix was the presiding Bishop. Brother Mann took his first appointment in 1909, serving the DeWitt circuit. The following year he was transferred to the Texarkana Circuit where he served one year. He was then transferred to Bauxite, Arkansas, where he served one year. He was then transferred to the Twenty-Eighth Street Church in Little Rock in 1913. It was here that he met and married Miss Gussie Jones.

After serving Twenty-Eighth Street Church for one year they were transferred to Carlisle. It was at Carlisle that their first child, a daughter named Lenora, was born. From Carlisle they went to Lewisville where they welcomed the birth of twin boys, John Wayne Jr., and Clifford Jordan. They then served churches at McGehee, Tillar, and Lonoke. Brother Mann was made a Presiding Elder after leaving the church at Lonoke and was placed over the Arkadelphia District for four years. He then went to Warren for four years. From Warren they moved to Prescott where Brother Mann was the Presiding Elder for one year. From the Prescott District they were transferred to the Texarkana District for five years. From the Texarkana District they went to Nashville for four years; thence to Stamps for three years; thence to Waldo for three years. It was at Waldo that Brother Mann decided that the time had come for him to retire. At the session of the Little Rock Conference in 1951 he took the retired relationship, having served forty-three years as an active minister in this conference. Brother Mann found, however, that he could not really retire and so he took the Richmond Circuit which he served for six years. Finally, because of failing health he and Mrs. Mann decided that they should give up their work. They had such fond memories of their pastorate at Lewisville and liked the people so well that they decided to build their home there.

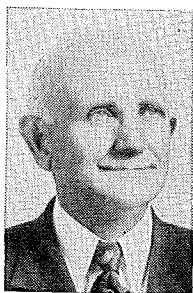

He was faithful in his retirement always willing to help but never getting in the pastor's way. He loved his family, the church, and preachers never losing compassion for those that did not know the Lord.

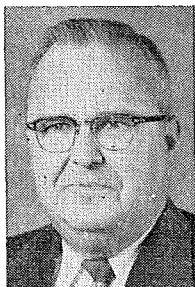

HOMER MARTIN ADKINS

Homer Martin Adkins, Governor of Arkansas, from 1941 to 1945, died at a hospital in Malvern on February the 26th, 1964, at the age of 73. His had been a life of varied interests, of intense activity and of far-reaching influence.

He was born on a farm near Jacksonville, Arkansas, October 15, 1890. When he was ten years of age his family moved to Little Rock. He studied pharmacy at Little Rock College of Pharmacy and passed the State Board examination before he was 21.

When the first world war broke out he enlisted as a private, and was stationed at Camp Beauregard in Louisiana. Here he met Miss Estelle E. Smith of Natchez, Mississippi, a Red Cross Nurse. They were both sent overseas and assigned to the same station. In France he was advanced to Captain of the Medical Corps. After returning to America he and Miss Smith were married. They came to Little Rock to live and he entered immediately upon his political career. He served as Sheriff and Collector of Pulaski County from 1919 to 1923. He was elected Governor in 1941, serving two terms. Because of his untiring efforts some \$300,000,000 worth of defense plants and installations were located in Arkansas, many of which have been purchased by private interests and continue to operate. In all of his responsibilities he never shirked a duty or failed a friend or cause.

As a Churchman the true spirit of the man found its noblest expression. In Little Rock he was a member of the Asbury Church. He served on its Official Board and was at one time president of the Board. He was a Lay Member of several sessions of the Annual Conference, and was a delegate to the Jurisdictional Conferences of 1940 and 1944. He was a member of the General Board of Missions from 1940-1948.

For the last twelve years he was superintendent of the Social Hill Methodist Church School in the community where he and Mrs. Adkins had made their home for many years.

X. Miscellaneous

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

1. Nominations. The District Superintendents shall nominate all members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees except as otherwise provided.

2. Conference Program. There shall be a Conference Council composed of the Presiding Officers of the following boards and agencies: the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the M.Y.F., the Committee on Christian Vocations, Camp Tanako, the Town and Country Commission, the Arkansas Methodist, the Board of Lay Activities, Missions, Social Concerns, Education, Evangelism, Ministerial Training, Pensions, Historical Society, Hospitals and Homes, the Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs, the President of the Ministers' Wives Organization, a representative of the Methodist Student Movement, a Wesley Foundation Director, the Conference Secretary, Conference Treasurer, the employed executive officers of the above named agencies, provided that it shall include all Little Rock Conference members of the Area Council, and other such boards, and officers as the Conference may direct, whose duties shall be:

- (a) To co-operate with the Area Council.
- (b) To plan the program for the Annual Conference Session at least 30 days before the session. The pastor host of the annual session of the Conference shall be deemed a full member of the Conference Council when it is working on the program for the annual session. The Council shall provide for all preaching, inspirational and anniversaries and other services of the Annual Conference Session. The Conference shall pay the expenses thereof out of the Administrative Fund.
- (c) The Council shall meet within 20 days after the close of each Annual Conference Session to prepare the Conference Calendar. Changes in the calendar thus prepared may be changed when found necessary by the Bishop and the Cabinet.
- (d) The Council shall have such other duties as the Conference may from time to time assign to it.

3. Financial and Statistical. (1) The District Superintendents shall furnish the treasurer with all assessments and acceptances of the pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the meeting of the Annual Conference. These figures shall be official. (2) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars, with no column for cents. (3) Each pastor shall report to the Conference Treasurer and turn in his statistical report to the statistician at a date set by the cabinet. This date shall be at least seven (7) days prior to the starting date of Annual Conference. The Pastor's Reports received at this time shall be entered into the Annual Conference Statistical Tables without change. Any unanticipated funds received after the aforesaid date shall be entered in the Journal on a separate page.) (4) The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be June 1st to May 31st, and all salaries and connectional askings of the churches shall be paid on this basis.

4. Memoirs. There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased Clerical Member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, name of children, charges served and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with his memoir. The memoirs of the wives or widows of clerical members of the Conference shall be published in the Journal. The name of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs the passing of any person whose memoir shall appear in the Journal. It shall be the duty of District Superintendents to report to

the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions the death of any conference claimant that occurs in their respective districts.

5. Administrative Fund. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall recommend an assessment for a Conference administrative fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expense of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this fund. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the fund. Payments from the fund shall be made only on vouchers signed by the secretary of the Conference; provided that this rule does not relate to the salary and expenses of the Treasurer of the Conference.

6. Conference Treasurer. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the Conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer on recommendation of the World Service Commission, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.

7. Number of Districts. There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Conference.

8. District Fund. The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall report to the district conference, annually, showing receipts and disbursements.

9. Reports and Resolutions. There shall be a pre-conference report which shall contain reports of all the boards and agencies of the Conference. This report shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Annual Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the pre-conference reports shall be typewritten, in triplicate, on special forms furnished by the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary. In the event editing of a report is deemed necessary by the Conference Secretary and chairman of the board involved, permission is hereby granted.

10. Membership of Historical Society. The Historical Society shall be composed of ten members, one of whom shall be the Conference Secretary. In addition to the duties outlined in the Discipline, the Society shall secure a group picture of each class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal; and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his retirement.

11. Safeguarding Historical Material. (1) Any member of the Little Rock Annual Conference, or layman authorized by a member of the Conference, may examine Historical documents within Headquarters Building. (2) To remove historical documents from Headquarters Building, a written request signed by the presiding Bishop and Conference Secretary shall be presented to the Custodian. Provided further, historical documents belonging to the Conference Woman's Society may be removed from Headquarters Building upon written request signed by the President and Secretary of the Woman's Conference. (3) The Custodian of Historical documents shall be given a receipt for any material removed from the vault in Headquarters Building, Little Rock, giving date of removal and name of receiver.

12. District Conference. There shall be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline and one additional member from each pastoral charge, provided, however, in charges of more than five hundred mem-

bers there shall be one additional member for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.

13. Lay Members. Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the pastor-host of the Annual Conference at least fifteen days before the session of the Annual Conference.

14. Board Service. No person may be nominated to serve on the same Conference Board for more than two consecutive quadrenniums, and may not be nominated to serve on more than one board at the same time. District Superintendents may not serve on Conference Boards, except as provided in the Discipline or by specific conference action. A person failing to attend a board, of which he is a member in a quadrennium may be continued only by special board action.

15. Entertainment. The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the retired ministers shall be entertained from the entertainment fund. Each member of the Conference, both clerical and lay and supply pastors in attendance shall pay \$1.00 registration fee to the entertainment fund, and all offerings unless otherwise specified shall go to the fund. The entertainment fund shall be administered by a committee composed of the pastor-host and two other persons elected by the Conference Council reporting in the next session of the Annual Conference.

16. Conference Expense. Registration fees and the offerings at the public services in the session of the Annual Conference shall be used to defray the expense of the session including the expense and/or honorarium of the conference preacher and that any deficit remaining be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund, and the Conference Treasurer shall pay the same.

17. Pastor's Traveling Expense. After the Fourth Quarterly Conference of a charge has set the minimum salary of a pastor for the ensuing year, the Quarterly Conference may set the traveling expense fund for the pastor in an amount not to exceed \$1,200.00 per year for each pastor and associate pastor assigned to a pastoral charge, provided, however, that charges of more than one church may allow an additional \$300.00 travel expense per each additional church.

Provided further, that no salary may be lowered to initiate an expense fund or to increase an existing expense fund.

18. At the Fourth Quarterly Conference after a Charge has set the minimum salary of a pastor for the ensuing year, the Quarterly Conference may so direct that an amount not to exceed \$600 may be paid by the church for parsonage utilities, provided, however, that the pastor's salary and travel allowance is not lowered to do this, and that this money will be used by the church and/or pastor for parsonage utilities only. Further, this amount shall be subject to no apportionment by any group or to pay into any fund. Be it further provided that a church may designate a part of the pastor's salary as utilities for income tax purposes.

19. Un-sponsored Resolutions. Any resolution not sponsored by a regular board or standing committee of the Conference must lie over for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon provided, however, immediate debate and action may be ordered by two-thirds vote of the Conference presence and voting.

20. Amendments. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.
