

#### **CONFERENCE MINUTES**

#### Monday, 4:30 p.m. - May 24, 1965

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper: Bishop Paul V. Galloway announced the opening hymn 402, "And Are We Yet Alive." Following the singing of the hymn he led the conference in prayer and read a portion of Psalm 51. Mrs. Gerald Fisher sang a solo, "Let Us Break Bread Together." She was accompanied by Robert Ellis of Henderson State Teachers College. Bishop Galloway led the conference in the Ritual for the Administration of the Lord's Supper. He was assisted by Fred R. Harrison and D. Mouzon Mann. J. Ralph Clayton, Marshall A. Bridwell, Otto W. Teague, Charles W. Richards, Joe R. Phillips joined in the service by assisting in serving the elements. Bishop Galloway dismissed the tables. The hymn was number 326, "Children of the Heavenly King." Joe R. Phillips, Secretary of the Cabinet, dismissed the congregation with the benediction.

#### Monday, May 24

#### Evening

Bishop Galloway announced the hymn 372, "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling." Marshall T. Steel, president of Hendrix College, led the conference in prayer. The choir from Grand Avenue Methodist Church sang the anthem, "Holy Lord of All." Ruth Braughton was at the organ and Helen Lyons directed the choir. Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for the oneness of the conference especially of the cabinet. Joe R. Phillips, Secretary of the Cabinet, read the composite report of the district superintendents. The report was adopted. Bishop Galloway announced the hymn, "Amazing Grace," number 209, after the singing of which the offering was received and the doxology sung. The message was given by Dr. Ernest T. Dixon, president of the Philander Smith College, Little Rock. His theme was "Recapturing the Spirit of Aldersgate." Bishop Galloway announced the closing hymn "I Want A Principle Within," number 299, Dr. Clem Baker gave the benediction.

#### Tuesday, May 25

#### Morning

**Devotional:** Bishop Galloway announced the hymn "Stand Up, Stand Up For Jesus," number 12 in The Methodist Hymnal Sampler, furnished by the Methodist Publishing House. The responsive reading was "The Glory of God," number 45, after which was sung "Lord, Speak To Me," number 8. Bishop Galloway read the scripture lesson from the Book of Nehemiah after which he led the conference in prayer. O. D. Peters led the singing and Mrs. J. D. Baker was at the organ.

Roll Call: James E. Major, the Secretary of the Conference, announced the roll call is being perfected at the registration desk in the basement.

Secretarial Staff: James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference, named as his staff: Journal Clerk, Woodrow W. Smith; Head Teller, Harold K. Davis; Secretary of Ministers' Service Records, Kenneth L. Spore; Staff Assistant, O. D. Peters and Gladwin Connell; Tellers, Edward Matthews, Thomas Abney, Ben G. Hines, and Joe Harris White.

**Recognition:** John Hoover and Clem Baker were recognized before the conference and others who have been in attendance at annual conference sessions more than 50 years were introduced.

Methodist Publishing House: Mr. William Wright of the Methodist Publishing House presented a check for \$4,983.86 to the Bishop for the retired ministers of the conference.

**Board of Pensions:** Bill Watson presented a check from the Abe Brewster Fund in the amount of \$2,000.00 to Bishop Galloway to be directed toward the retired ministers fund.

Christian Civic Foundation: William E. Brown, Executive Director of the Foundation, presented his report to the conference. He made special mention of the defeat of Amendment 55 (against gambling) in the general election in the fall of 1964. He also urged attendance at a training program for youth, "Operation Speak-up", in Little Rock November 26 and 27, the program being designed especially for youth.

**Personal Privilege:** E. Clifton Rule offered a resolution assuring Dr. Brown and his family of the love and prayers for the recovery of their son. It was done.

Bar of the Conference: The Secretary of the Conference moved that the bar of the conference be from the arch forward. It was done.

Books: Bishop Galloway lifted up some very helpful books and encouraged the ministers to read.

**Communication:** Stanley Baugh announced communication from absentee members of the conference, J. D. Montgomery and R. E. Simpson. Bishop Galloway instructed the Secretary to acknowledge these letters.

Bar of Conference: Ralph Mann asked clarification for seating within the bar of the conference. He was assured that all persons are welcome. It simply means that votes cast will not be counted if made outside the designated area.

Communication: Bishop Galloway read a letter from the Commission on Chaplains and asked the Secretary to record those within our conference who are related to the armed forces. He certified the list: Army — Winslow E. Brown, Billy H. Cox, Gerald C. Dean, Gerald K. Hilton; Navy — Withers M. Moore, Hal R. Sessions; Air Force — Jefferson E. Davis, Ralph V. Vanlandingham; Reserve Status — Ferris W. Norton, Jr., William E. Outlaw, Jr., Robert W. Trieschman and James W. Workman, part-time chaplain with the Veterans Administration.

Welcome: Fred R. Harrison presented Mr. William L. Bundy of First Methodist Church who gave the official welcome to Hot Springs and First Methodist Church.

Amendments: Marshall T. Steel presented the five amendments adopted by the General Conference and passed down to the Annual Conferences for their official action.

Amendment 13 having to do with the simultaneous meeting of the Jurisdictional Conferences. It was defeated by a vote of 179 to 2.

Amendment 14 having to do with the mechanics of transferring bishops between jurisdictions: Wendell Hoover and Charles E. Ramsey asked for clarification. It was defeated by a vote of 187 to 0.

Amendment 15 having to do with the adding of additional members to the annual conference namely the conference lay leader and the conference president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service. Charles E. Ramsey spoke against the amendment. Morgan Groves asked for further clarification on the amendment. John Miles also spoke against the

amendment. Robert W. Trieschman asked for clarification. Ralph Mann, Luther Miller, H. W. Jinske and a layman spoke in favor of the amendment. John Newsom asked for clarification and then spoke in behalf of the amendment. Winston Hudnall, Tom Nation, and W. D. Golden also spoke to the amendment. Question was called and the vote taken. The Amendment passed with a vote of 153 to 36.

Amendment 16 having to do with membership in the Annual Conference namely making it permissable for a charge to elect as many lay delegates as it has full time ministers serving in full connection. Carr D. Racop, Claude Clark, John Miles, and Ralph Mann spoke to the amendment, the latter two being in opposition to it. Luther Miller spoke in favor of the amendment. Clem Baker, and Robert M. Van Hook, II, asked for clarification. Question was called and the amendment passed by a vote of 179 to 15.

Amendment 17, to perfect and clarify amendment 9 which was passed 8 years ago, was presented and passed by a vote of 178 to 4.

Conference Committee on Inter-Jurisdictional Relations: Marshall T. Steel presented a resolution prepared by the Jurisdictional Committee on Inter-Jurisdictional Relations having to do with the transfer of the Central Jurisdiction Conferences to the South Central Jurisdiction. Mimeographed copies were made available. He encouraged the conference to take positive action. Wendell Hoover, Richard Poss, David Hankins, Tom Abney and a layman asked for clarification. Question was called and the resolution passed by a vote of 147 to 44.

Missouri Conferences: The Little Rock Conference has been asked to vote on the resolution for the transfer and merger of the Central West Conference to the South Central Jurisdiction and Geographic Conferences of the South Central Jurisdiction. It was passed by a vote of 184 to 1.

Resolution: D. Mouzon Mann moved that the Conference express appreciation to Marshall T. Steel for his service in the matter of Jurisdictional problems and his presentation of the constitutional amendment before the conference today. It was done.

Insurance: Sidney Good, chairman of the Insurance Committee, presented the Death Benefit Program and the Hospital Insurance program to the conference. He moved its adoption. Carlos Martin asked for clarification, W. P. Fiser, C. Ray Hozendorf, Clint Atchley, Ed Hollenbeck asked for further clarification. Question was called. Bryan Stephens was asked by Mr. Good to speak to the committee's report. Clem Baker asked a question regarding the program. The report passed. Sam Auslam of the General Board of Pensions was presented to the conference. Mr. Good requested that registration for the new insurance program be effected immediately. Marie Harris will be in the basement for this purpose.

Correspondence: Bishop Galloway read a letter from Bishop W. Kenneth Pope who asked to be remembered to the conference.

**Personal Privilege:** E. Clifton Rule moved that the Secretary be instructed to write a letter to Bishop Pope expressing appreciation for his thoughtfulness in remembering the conference.

Board of Education: Fred R. Harrison, chairman of the Board, presented William E. Elliott, Secretary of the Board, who read report No. 2. James E. Major spoke to the report. It was adopted.

Conference Relations: Kenneth L. Spore presented Wendell Hoover who read the report of the Committee on Conference Relations. The character of all the ministers was passed.

Christian Social Concerns: Charles Ramsey presented the report of the board as found on page 10 of the Pre-Conference Reports noting one change regarding the Poverty Program. He moved the adoption of the report as changed and spoke to it.

Amendment: D. Mouzon Mann moved that the report of the Board of Christian Social Concerns be amended to commend Norman Carter for his clear stand on the gambling issue. The report was accepted as amended.

Announcements: Harold Sadler announced a meeting of the Historical Society at 4:30 p.m. and called attention to the display of the Society in the basement.

Braska Savage asked the Conference Trustees to meet at 2:00 p.m. Ralph Mann called for a meeting of the Approved Supply Pastors. Stanley Baugh called for a meeting of the Committee on Memoirs.

**Break:** Bishop Galloway adjourned the conference for a five-minute break before the Commemoration Service.

The Service of Commemoration was begun by singing "Come, Let Us Join Our Friends Above," number 422. Stanley T. Baugh conducted the service. He was assisted by Clem Baker and Robert B. Moore, Jr.

The record of remembrance was read by James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference: Ministers — G. B. Ames, T. P. Clark, W. H. Sanders, A. N. Stonecipher; Approved Supply — Earl DeVasier; Wives and Widows — Mrs. P. D. Alston, Mrs. John Bryant, Mrs. Marion Miller, Mrs. W. I. Small.

Arthur Terry brought the commemoration message.

The concluding hymn was "Blest Be The Tie That Binds," number 416. Bishop Galloway pronounced the benediction.

#### Tuesday, May 25

#### Evening

Worship Service: The call to worship was sung by the Hot Springs Choral Club. James Argue announced the hymn of praise, "Joyful, Joyful We Adore Thee," number 12, after which he read the Scripture lesson, Romans 12:1-11. W. Maurice Mitchell, layman from Little Rock, led the conference in the evening prayer. Reverend Argue offered a prayer and called for the offering whereupon the ushers waited upon the congregation. The doxology was sung as the offertory prayer. The anthem was sung by the Hot Springs Choral Club led by Elizabeth Bowe Sims with Richard G. Morris at the organ. Bishop Galloway presented Bishop William C. Martin who was in attendance at the service. He then formally introduced the conference preacher, Bishop Paul N. Garber, who brought the evening message. His theme was "Our Methodist Church" and for a text referred to Numbers 23:23 — "Our Heavenly Father hath wrought wonderful things. . " James Argue announced the hymn of dedication, "A Charge To Keep I Have," number 287 after which he pronounced the benediction.

#### Wednesday, May 26

#### Morning

Devotional: Bishop Galloway announced the hymn, "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing," number 23 after the singing of which he read the lesson from the Holy Scripture, Nehemiah 2. Bishop William C. Martin led the conference in prayer. It was concluded with the Lord's Prayer.

Cabinet: Joe R. Phillips, secretary of the cabinet, presented a standing rule having to do with the apportionments based on pastor's salary.

It was filed with the secretary to remain on the table 24 hours before discussion. He also read the cabinet nominations. They were elected.

Presentations: D. Mouzon Mann presented the transfers into the conference: Allan Bonsall, deacon on trial from the Texas Conference; and Thomas Hatcher, approved supply.

Bishop Galloway presented Chaplain and Mrs. Ralph Vanlandingham

to the conference.

Roll Call: James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference, reminded the members of the conference to register at the desk in the basement. The roll is being perfected this way. He also announced the ministers' wives luncheon at 1:00 p.m. Thursday instead of 12:30 as previously announced.

Town and Country Commission: Tom Nation, chairman of the commission, read the report. E. Eugene Efird, Otto W. Teague, Robert W. Johnson, and Charles W. Richards spoke to the report concerning the work at the Penal Farm, the Jurisdictional Workshop at Mt. Sequoyah, the Town and Country Workshop, and the Every Member Visitation respectively. Elmer Holifield, Executive Secretary of the Commission, presented his report. Tom Nation noted several changes in the report as found in the Pre-Conference Reports pages 34 and 35. He moved the adoption of the report as changed. It was done.

Woman's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. Edgar Dixon, president of the conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, gave the report of the women's work. It was adopted. Judy Atwood, church and community worker, was presented to the conference.

World Service and Finance Commission: James T. Gooch, chairman, presented the report as found on pages 36 through 39 of the Pre-Conference Reports report. Edwin B. Dodson, secretary, read the amendments. He moved the adoption of the report as changed. Winston H. Hudnall asked for clarification of the matter of utilities. Joe R. Phillips gave an explanation. Carr D. Racop moved to amend statement No. 10 of the report to add the words "If the charge does not otherwise provide for utilities." His amendment was accepted by the Commission Chairman. Raymond Franks and John Miles also spoke to the report. Question was called and the report was adopted.

Seminaries: Bishop William C. Martin, representing Southern Methodist University and Perkins School of Theology, was presented to the conference. He brought greetings from Texas and spoke in behalf of Southern Methodist University. Significant in his report was his request for recruiting more young ministers. Dr. Charles Baughman, representing St. Paul School of Theology, Methodist, addressed the conference.

Board of Lay Activities: Herb Allman, Conference Lay Leader, made the report for the board. T. B. Nichols, Secretary, spoke to the report as found in the Pre-Conference Report, pages 17 through 19. He moved the adoption of the report. It was done.

Conference Relations: Kenneth L. Spore presented Wendell Hoover who read report Number 2 of the committee. The report was accepted. E. Clifton Rule and Curtis Williams and W. C. Onstead addressed the conference as their retirement speeches. Their wives were formally presented to the conference. Kenneth L. Spore spoke in behalf of Robert S. Beasley who was absent from the conference but who was also taking the retirement relationship. The conference stood in appreciation after each one spoke. Ross Nabors was recommended by the committee for re-admittance into the conference. Arthur Terry told the conference that for 20 years he had served as a supply pastor. Bishop Galloway presented Reverend Nabors to the conference. The report of the committee was

adopted and the certificates were presented by the Secretary of the Conference. Pins were also given by George Meyer.

**Personal Privilege:** Bishop Galloway introduced to the conference his wife's mother, Mrs. W. R. Boney.

Headquarters Building: Jim Wiseman presented Archie Boyd, secretary of the commission, who read the report. Arthur Terry moved the adoption of the report. Robert E. L. Bearden spoke to the report. It was adopted.

**Episcopal Residence:** Joe Thompson suggested that the report of the episcopal residence commission be filed with the secretary. Arthur Terry so moved and it was done.

Additional Session: Bishop Galloway announced an additional business session of the conference this afternoon at 2 o'clock.

**Treasurer:** Grafton Thomas, conference treasurer, made his report. He moved its adoption. It was done.

**Presiding Officer:** Bishop Galloway turned the chair of the conference over to Bishop William C. Martin who presided during the reading of the Board of Education report.

Board of Education: Fred R. Harrison, chairman, presented William E. Elliott, secretary, who read report No. 1 of the board. He moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted. Fred R. Harrison presented W. Neill Hart, executive secretary of the board, who spoke to the conference. He made a special plea for trained and qualified teachers. He presented the members of his staff who also spoke to the conference regarding their particular areas of responsibility: Mrs. John L. Tucker, Children's Work. Larry Pierce, Conference President of the Methodist Youth Fellowship, was presented to the conference. William Elliott requested that Section 3 of the board's report not be read but filed with the Secretary. It was so ordered. As a final section of the report, William Elliott read a solution expressing appreciation for Dr. E. Clifton Rule. The total report of the Board of Education was adopted.

**Request:** Fred R. Harrison, host pastor, requested help from delegates to the conference in parking on the lots in such a fashion as to better facilitate the use of this facility.

**Personal Privilege:** Bishop Martin explained the absence of his wife and expressed appreciation for being in the conference.

Resolution: Arthur Terry moved that we instruct the secretary to send our love to Mrs. William C. Martin,

Insurance: Bishop Galloway encouraged registration for new insurance in the basement and requested ministers to see Mrs. Harris.

Announcements: Harold Sadler, Joel Cooper, James E. Major, Raymond Hillis, and John Rushing made announcements.

Adjournment: Bishop William C. Martin pronounced the benediction.

# May 26 Afternoon Session 2:00 p.m.

Conference Convened: Bishop Galloway convened the afternoon session of the Conference at 2:00 p.m. Marion W. Miller led the opening prayer.

Board of Hospitals and Homes: Braska Savage, Chairman, called on Irl Bridenthal, secretary of the Board, to present the report. The report was submitted and adopted. J. Edwin Keith, superintendent of the Children's Home in Little Rock, spoke to the report concerning the work of the church in the Children's Home. Bishop Galloway emphasized the importance of taking our lay people to visit the home.

The Board also asked the Conference to approve the amended articles of incorporation for the Methodist Children's Home, increasing membership on its Board and limiting tenure to twelve years. It was done.

Western Methodist Assembly: Ed Kaetzel, superintendent of the Assembly, reported on the work being done at Mt. Sequoyah. Property evaluation there is now approaching three quarters of a million dollars.

**Presentation**: Mrs. Milwee, secretary in the Bishop's office, was presented to the conference by Bishop Galloway.

**Resolution:** Charles Ramsay, speaking in behalf of William E. Brown of the Christian Civic Foundation, presented a resolution opposing legislation introduced in the special session of the Arkansas legislature establishing a state lottery and sale of alcohol by the drink. It was adopted.

**Presiding Officer:** Bishop Galloway invited Bishop Paul N. Garber, the conference preacher, to preside over this segment of the conference session.

Conference Board of Trustees: Braska Savage, Chairman, called on Herston Holland, secretary, to read the report of the Board. It was adopted.

Board of Evangelism: Kenneth L. Spore, chairman, called on Palmer Garner, secretary, to read the report of the board. He moved the adoption of the report. W. D. Golden, Executive Secretary of the Board, spoke to the report. He lifted up the importance of organizing groups of "The Twelve." Palmer Garner read a resolution expressing appreciation for W. D. Golden as Executive Secretary and asked the conference to elect him to this office. The reports of the Board were adopted.

**Telegram:** Reverend and Mrs. Edward Harris remembered the conference with a telegram. Bishop Galloway instructed the Secretary to acknowledge this correspondence.

**Presentation:** Mrs. W. C. Watson was presented to the conference by Bishop Galloway.

Minimum Salary Commission: John Alston, chairman, called on W. T. Bone, secretary, to read the report of the Board. He moved its adoption and it was done.

District Conference Journals: W. Darrel Bone read the report of the committee. They were found in order. The report was adopted.

**Telegram:** Bishop Galloway read a telegram from Bishop W. Kenneth Pope and expressed appreciation to William C. Martin for being in the Little Rock Conference.

**Break:** Bishop Galloway adjourned the conference for five minutes for a break before the preaching service.

Preaching Service: Charles Ramsay, presiding over the service, announced the hymn, "O For A Thousand Tongues to Sing," number 162 after which he led in the responsive reading "The Lord Reigneth" on page 567, the fourth Sunday, the second reading, Following the singing of the Gloria Patri, Gordon Hartrick, active layman from Hamburg, led

the conference in prayer. Charles Ramsay read the scripture lession from Romans 12. The hymn of preparation was "Ask Ye What Great Thing I Know," number 147. Bishop Garber brought the message on the theme "The Homelitical Heritage of Methodism." Charles Ramsay announced the closing hymn, "Soldiers of Christ, Arise," number 282 after which he pronounced the benediction.

# Wednesday, May 26 Evening Worship 7:30 p.m.

C. Ray Hozendorf led the conference in a call to worship and announced the hymn, "O Worship The King," number 4 after the singing of which he read the lesson from God's Holy Word, Romans 12. Colonel Claude Haswell, a layman from El Dorado, led the conference in prayer. Reverend Hozendorf reminded all delegates to check the bulletin board for phone calls and asked delegates not to block the driveways in the parking areas. The ushers came forward and received the offering. The choir from Oaklawn Methodist Church directed by Mrs. Alvin Harder sang the offertory anthem. Mrs. George Sherman was at the organ. The congregation stood for the Doxology. The hymn of preparation was "My Hope Is Built on Nothing Less Than Jesus' Blood and Righteousness," number 244. C. Ray Hozendorf presented the conference preacher, Bishop Paul N. Garber, who brought the evening message on the theme "Our Friend," using Francis Asbury as a basis for his sermon. The hymn of dedication was "What A Friend We Have in Jesus," number 240. Bishop Galloway led the benediction.

#### Thursday, May 27

#### Morning

**Devotional:** Bishop Galloway announced the hymn, "How Great Thou Art," number 4 in the Methodist Hymnal. Sampler furnished by the Methodist Publishing House, after the singing of which he read as the scripture lesson the fourth chapter of Nehemiah. He then led the conference in the morning prayer.

**Books:** Bishop Galloway encouraged the purchase of books on the part of the laity and the clergy alike and lifted up several titles for consideration.

Minutes: Cagle Fair, chairman of the committee, reported the minutes are in order.

Cabinet: Joe R. Phillips, secretary of the cabinet, presented four matters: (1) nominations. Those names were elected; (2) the cabinet asked permission to name district committees after the appointments are read. It was granted. (3) The Standing Rule that was placed on the table yesterday was read and approved. (4) Personal Privilege: Joe R. Phillips formally presented James Argue and Anthony Webster — transfers into the conference during the year — to the conference. Also Thomas Hatcher was presented as was Chaplain Hilton. Rev. and Mrs. Bonsell were asked to stand. They are coming to us from the Texas Conference.

Courtesy Committee: Bishop Galloway asked that John Miles and Robert W. Trieschman help with this committee.

Instruction: Bishop Galloway asked the preachers to reserve a parking place for the visiting preacher who comes to visit in their church.

**Telegram:** Bishop W. Kenneth Pope send a telegram offering greetings to Bishop Galloway and to the Conference.

Arkansas Methodist and Methodist Information: Arthur Terry called on Alfred Knox, editor of the church paper, to give the report. It is found on page 10 of the Pre-Conference Reports. Dr. Terry moved its adoption and Alfred Knox spoke to it. William D. Leavitt of Methodist Information also spoke to the report. Bishop Galloway emphasized the value of this fine newspaper and stressed the importance of having dialogue on vital matters. We need to be "big" people who are concerned about "big" issues and the Arkansas Methodist is helping us do this. The report was adopted.

Presentation: Bishop Galloway presented Mr. T. W. Stone of Hot Springs' First Methodist Church who spoke to the conference. Mr. Stone is chairman of the Building Committee and chairman of the Board of Trustees. He expressed appreciation for the conference coming to Hot Springs and extended an invitation for the conference to return next year. It was done. The conference stood in appreciation of First Church and its leadership for their graciousness in being so wonderful hosts.

Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for historical matters and his desire for gavels from wood of great historical sites. E. Clifton Rule requested Stanley Baugh to secure some wood from the old Henry Chapel, the first Methodist Church in the bounds of the Little Rock Conference so that a fitting gavel might be made from it. Brother Baugh accepted this responsibility. The report of the Society was adopted.

Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification: Joel Cooper, chairman, called on Louis Mulkey who presented Section 1 of the Board's report. He moved its adoption and it was done. George Wayne Martin read Section 2 of the report. It was adopted. The third section was read and approved. The fourth section was read and approved. Nominated for admission into the conference on trial were Leland Gary Goldman, Robert Louis Moore, Rodney W. Nicholson, James Harold Sewell, Don Russell Williams, Jack Albert Wilson, Therral Edward Wilson, Howell Odom Richardson, Charles Olson Walthall, and William Payne Fiser. Marshall A. Bridwell spoke to the conference recommending H. O. Richardson and C. O. Walthall for Admission on Trial. D. Mouzon Mann spoke to the conference recommending W. P. Fiser for Admission on Trial. They were so admitted. Bishop Galloway called the members of the class forward to the chancel, conducted the service of admission and presented them to the conference. The conference stood in appreciation. Question 26 was read and approved. Question 29 was read and approved. Nominations for admission into the conference in, full connection were James Walter Beck, Dale Luther Diffee, John Charles Dunn, William Arthur Lea, Larry Stephens Nicholson, James Robert Scudder, Carl Edward Settle, John F. Walker, Jr. They were so elected. Joel Cooper, chairman of the board, presented them at the chancel and Bishop Galloway conducted the service of admission. They were presented to the conference and the conference stood in appreciation. Stanley Baugh requested their absence for a few minutes that a picture of the journal might be taken. Additions to Question 26 were read by G. W. Martin. They were adopted. Nominated for elders orders were John Charles Dunn, Larry Stephens Nicholson, James F. Richardson, James Robert Scudder, Carl Edward Settle, John F. Walker, Jr.; by seminary rule - Welcome Russell Burleson; Arthur James Lightfoot, Calvin Linzy Miller, Marta Stephanie Rye, Charles Olson Walthall — approved supply pastors. They were so elected. George W. Martin read the section on those eligible to administer the Sacraments. It was adopted. He reported those who have been licensed to preach this year. He then moved the adoption of the full report. It was done.

Announcement: G. W. Martin announced rehearsal for the Ordination Service this afternoon at 2:00 o'clock.

**Personal Privilege:** Bishop Galloway called Bishop Garber to the platform and asked him to sit with him during the session of the conference.

Board of Missions: C. Ray Hozendorf, chairman, called Edward B. Hollenbeck, secretary, to read some alterations to their report found on page 28 of the Pre-Conference Reports. He moved its adoption. Ferris Norton, conference missionary secretary, spoke to the report. He called the names of the district secretaries of missions and had them stand in their places that they might be recognized. C. Ray Hozendorf also spoke to the report. The report was adopted. Bishop Galloway stressed the importance of churches sharing in the missionary program.

**Presentation:** Bishop Galloway presented Dr. and Mrs. Robert B. Moore, Sr. to the conference.

**Presentations:** Bishop Galloway asked Bishop Garber to present the wives of pastors to the conference who, in presenting them, said that they are in historic succession to Susannah Wesley. They stood and the men responded by standing in their honor.

**Announcement:** James E. Major announced the Ministers' Wives Luncheon at 1:00 o'clock at the Velda Rose.

**Presentation:** Miss Adelle Phillips, missionary, was presented to the conference by Bishop Galloway.

Board of Education: W. Neill Hart explained the absence of Paul Fair, chairman of the Camp Tanako Trustees, and gave Report No. 3 of the Board of Education having to do with Wesley Foundation. The report was adopted.

Camp Tanako: W. Neill Hart referred to the report as found in the Pre-Conference Reports. The report was adopted.

Board of Pensions: George Meyer, chairman, called on Charles Ashcraft, secretary, to read the report of the Board. George Meyer spoke to the report saying the goal toward which the Board is moving is \$59 per service year. Arthur Terry asked for clarification of a section of the Board's report as also did James E. Major. Cecil R. Culver asked a question about the report. C. Ray Hozendorf amended the report for the section dealing with institutions and agencies to read "to become effective June 1, 1966." The Board accepted this amendment as a part of their report. Ralph Mann spoke to the report, in respect to equalizing pension payments for Approved Supply Pastors and conference members. He proposed the following amendment to the report relative to this matter: referred to as Section (a) to part 1 of Division C titled "Recommendations of the Board of Pensions Report": A full-time approved supply pastor who retires with 15 or more years of continuous service shall have his annuity rate set at the same base as conference members. The effective date of this amendment shall be the conference year 1966-1967." Kenneth L. Spore seconded the Motion. There was a technicality as to whether or not Ralph Mann was qualified to present an amendment. Carr Dee Racop and John Miles so asked for clarification. To clarify the matter Dr. Spore moved that the amendment be properly before the conference and Charles Ramsay seconded the motion. Ralph Mann then spoke too the amendment. Luther Miller spoke in favor of the amendment. Joe R. Phil-

lips asked for clarification relative to the matter of it applying to full-time Approved Supply.

Dr. Arthur Terry spoke against the report suggesting that action be delayed until next year. Charles Ashcraft spoke from the Board's point of view saying income simply will not allow such a program to be effective. He asked that the amendment be amended to read "as speedily as possible" and to include "all" pastors not just those who have served more than 15 years. Ralph Mann accepted this change. Kenneth L. Spore and Charles Ramsay also accepted the change so the report included the amendment as changed. D. Mouzon Mann spoke to the conference stating that full-connection in the conference is open to all men who are willing to pay the price. Question was called and the report was adopted.

Courtesies: John Miles presented Sam Teague, John Workman, Dr. and Mrs. Robert B. Moore, Sr., Ed Dunlap to the conference.

**TRAFCO:** O. D. Peters, chairman, called on C. Everette Patton, secretary, who presented the report of the Commission as found on page 33 of the Pre-Conference Reports with several amendments. Bill Leavitt spoke to the report. Robert E. L. Bearden recommended Ralph Stoody's book, "Handbook on Christian Public Relations," as a part of the report. The report was adopted.

**Christian Vocations:** Gerald K. Fincher referred to the report as found on page 12 of the Pre-Conference Report. He moved its adoption and then spoke to the report. It was done.

Conference Statistician: Gerald K. Fincher, Conference Statistician, gave his report to the conference. He noted that Arkansas Methodist pastors preach to 27,000 persons or ¼ of their full membership week-byweek. He noted, too, that the per-capita giving this year is \$59.00 or an increase of \$7.00. The report was adopted.

Memoirs Committee: Stanley Baugh referred to the report as found on page 20 of the Pre-Conference Reports and moved its adoption. It was done.

The Methodist Publishing House: C. R. Hozendorf referred to the report as found on page 32 of the Pre-Conference Digest and moved its adoption. It was done.

Adjournment: Bishop Paul N. Garber pronounced the benediction.

## Thursday, May 27

#### Evening

#### 7:30 p.m.

Ordination Service: The candidates and leaders in the Service of Ordination processed into the sanctuary and took their place. Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for being in First Methodist Church and for the leadership in the music ministry during this service. The choir was under the direction of Mrs. Trice Ellis and Mr. Bob Ellis was at the organ. The opening hymn was "Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken," number 382. Bishop Galloway then read as the Scripture lesson portions of the fourth chapter of Luke after which he led the congregation in prayer. The choir of First Methodist Church, Hot Springs, sang the anthem, "Give Thanks Unto Thee" — Mrs. Trice Ellis, soloist. Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for the choirs and then acknowledged the presence of Dr. Roberto Pedrazo of Lydia Patterson Institute and had him

stand. He announced that the appointments would be read shortly after 9:00 a.m. Friday. The offering was received. After the reading of the appointments, Bishop Galloway announced the closing hymn, "Lord, Speak To Me," number 8 in the Sampler after the singing of which he led the conference in prayer. The conference was adjourned.

### VI. Reports

#### DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS REPORT

To Bishop Paul V. Galloway and members of the One Hundred and Twelfth session of the Little Rock Annual Conference:

It is with grateful recognition of the abiding loyalty of the Methodist People within the bounds of The Little Rock Annual Conference that we report to you concerning the work and witness of the Church in the year now closing. The 383 churches of our Conference have added to their rolls 1,564 persons on Profession of Faith, 2,513 persons by transfer from other Methodist Churches, and 514 persons from other denominations. Our present number of full members is 84,155. Our pastors have baptized 665 infants and 826 children, youth, and adults. We carry on our Preparatory Rolls 5,414 persons.

Our major program emphas's this year has been the first phase of the Quadrenniel Program, "One Witness in One World." Reports from each District indicate that our people have received this program as a serious challenge to self-evaluation and the adoption of those procedures and decisions which will strengthen us where we are weak and which will take full advantage of our strong points.

This special emphasis has been given strong undergirding by the Conference Board of Evangelism as they have led in effective United Evangelistic Missions in three Districts — Arkadelphia, Camden, and Pive Bluff. Similar missions will be undertaken in the remaining Districts of the Conference in the year soon beginning. The Town and Country Commission, under the able leadership of the Rev. Elmer J. Holifield, has used the Every Member Visitation Program to further implement our "One Witness in One World."

Our work of Christian Education is being carried out in an excellent manner by the 389 Church Schools in our Conference, enrolling in their membership 5,598 officers and teachers, and with a total enrollment of 57,622. The materials of the New Curriculum have been received with commendation by our Church School workers, and Methodist Approved literature is now being used in 2,761 Church School classes.

The vitality of the lay witness in our Conference is demonstrated in the work of The Woman's Society and of The Methodist Mens Clubs. The Woman's Society now enrolls 11,863 persons and the Methodist Mens Club enroll 2,721.

A look at the temporal concerns of the Church show that we hold church properties valued at \$25.713,420.: parsonage properties valued at \$3,200,225.; and, other assets valued at \$1,074,508.

A brief look at the work in each of the six Districts of the Conference gives an indication of the militant faith and fruitful service of the Methodist People.

1. ARKADELPHIA DISTRICT: A new church has been organized at Daisy, and a second new church is to be organized on the Malvern Road in Hot Springs. The District will provide worship services for campers at six sites on the lakes and in the parks of the District. It is estimated that a minimum of 5,000 persons will serve God through these services during the summer months. Pastors and laymen of the Hot Springs area gave courageous leadership in the Churches United Against Gambling campaign. They deserve the commendation and encouragement of Methodist everywhere.

Plant expansions and renovations have been carried out at Oaklawn, Hot Springs; Amity; Tigert Memorial, Hot Springs; Gurdon; New Salam; Gardner; Magnet Cove: Oden: and Social Hill. New parsonages have been provided at Delight and Gardner. At First Church, Hot

Springs, there is a new education building which carries on its east facade an exterior mosiac of Christ as the great teacher.

- 2. CAMDEN DISTRICT: Every Charge in the Camden District participated in the Mission to People program. 1,290 persons attended the District Rally in Magnolia, Fairview Church sent \$9,000. in medicines and drugs to our over seas mission stations. Air conditioning projects have been completed at Bradley and Timothy. Remodeling and/or redecoration projects have been completed at Huttig, Strong, and Waldo. New parsonages have been provided at Stamps and Pleasant Grove. Debts have been totally liquidated at Lewisville and Marysville. A new church plant has been completed at Smackover. A new church site has been purchased in Magnolia looking toward the organization of a new church in that city. A new parsonage is under construction for the Wesley Foundation Student Center in Magnolia.
- 3. HOPE: This District, embracing seven southwest Arkansas Counties carries on a fruitful work through its 28 pastoral charges, and 83 churches with an active membership. In addition to these, we have 14 Extension Churches in the Hope District. Work has been done, and is continuing, for the regrouping and rearranging of churches and charges in order that a more effective ministry may be carried out in this District.

A new church at Midway has been constructed, paid for, and dedicated. A Fellowship Hall has been built at Pleasant Hill. New churches are under construction at Mena and Hatfield. Church buildings are being planned and contracted for at Dierks and Mineral Springs. Additional properties have been purchased by First Methodist, Texarkana.

4. LITTLE ROCK: One new church has been organized this year, Smyrna in Lonoke County and one is in its first year of full time operation, St. Andrews in Little Rock. New sanctuaries have been completed at Mabalvale and St. Luke. New educational facilities have been completed, or, are near completion at Asbury, Primrose, Hamilton, and Pride Valley. The churches at Carlisle and Des Arc, have undergone extensive remodeling. New projects underway, or ready to be launched are: an Educational Unit at Sardis; Sanctuary and Educational Unit at Devalls Bluff; First unit of permanent facilities at Markham; and Educational unit at St. Paul; and, the first unit of construction at St. Andrew.

Sites for new churches are being secured in the Pleasant Valley Development and in the West 12th Street area. A new Charge has been organized and is designated as the Woodlawn Ct.

- 5. MONTICELLO: A new church plant has been constructed at Gould, and is nearing completion. Plans for new plant construction at Dumas are well advanced. First Church, McGehee is planning the construction of a new parsonage and of a new Educational Unit. The Star City Church is being relocated. The new site has been purchased, and the construction of the new plant is expected to be underway in the near future. Air conditioning projects have been completed in the Hamburg church and parsonage. A new parsonage is to be built at Thornton. The Monticello Church has purchased a site for the erection of a new parsonage. The remodeling and redecorating program at Fordyce has been completed and paid for. Sites in Crossett are now being studied, looking toward the organization of a new church in that city. The Green Hill Church has been remodeled and redecorated. Extensive property improvements have been made at Tillar. Plans are being studied for a new educational unit at Wilmot. Redecorating and remodeling of the Rock Springs Church is near completion.
- 6. PINE BLUFF: Almyra has been given the Small Town Church of the Year, and Moore's Chapel has been given the Rural Church of the Year award. Every church in the District is credited with making a contribution to the Methodist Childrens Home, with the District's total gift amounting to \$12,537.

The District Board of Missions has authorized the purchase of two sites for future churches — one in Pine Bluff and one in Stuttgart. Parsonages have been dedicated at England, Good Faith, Rison, and First Church Stuttgart. New church buildings at Carr Memorial, Almyra, and Moores Chapel have been consecrated. Educational buildings have been constructed at Roe, Pleasant Grove, and Mt. Olivet. Lakeside in Pine Bluff has liquidated its educational building indebtedness. \$11,414. has been raised in Advance Specials.

It would be improper and ungrateful, were we to conclude our report to the Conference without expressing our genuine love and appreciation to Bishop Paul V. Galloway for his brotherly and decisive leadership of the total work of the Church in Arkansas. On him is cast the care of all the churches. This care and responsibility he has assumed with a pastors heart and a prophets vision. In this his first year as Resident Bishop of Arkansas, we have seen his ministry and leadership among us, summon forth in us the spirit of unity, oneness of purpose, and a work and witness undertaken with a single eye to the glory of God. To him we say, "We are glad that you have come our way. We are the stronger for it."

#### AREA COUNCIL OF ARKANSAS

I would like to think with you about the program and work ahead of us in Arkansas Methodism.

Our program will fit into the Quadrennial emphasis of The Methodist Church, "One Witness in One World." Isn't that a thrilling statement, —"One Witness in One World!" We want this catchy statement to become a household word in every Methodist home.

Already I have met with the preachers in 12 of our 13 districts, and we have discussed this program. We hope each church will make the Self-Analysis. We believe that if every church will make a real evalation of itself to discover its strength and to understand its weaknesses, it can become a much more efficient instrument in the hands of God. Our office and all members of the Area Staff are willing and eager to help local churches in this self-analysis.

The other three phases of the Quadrennial program deal with action. I do like action among Christians, and our planning calls for action on the part of us all.

On the local church level, we will be working with the Boards of Education in continuing to try to enlist more people in the Church School program, to increase the average attendance of the Sunday School, and to provide even better teaching. All the statistics that we have reveal that our best opportunity to win people for Christ comes through enlisting people in the Church School. I hope that our Commissions on Education and Evangelism will work together in such a way that the visitation evangelism set-up in the local church will also share in the recruiting of people for the Church School.

In the local church, we will be working under the guidance of the Boards of Evangelism in recruiting laymen to become witnesses for Christ. If we could have five or six thousand trained laymen to witness for Christ at the coffee table, in the office, at the factory, in the homes of our state, we could, in the next few years, take Arkansas for Christ. We will also be promoting Visitation Evangelism, sending our lay people in teams of two to invite people to come with them to Christ and His Church.

We will continue to promote our lay preaching program. We want a preaching service in every Methodist Church every Sunday, and we can have it if competent lay speakers will be willing to take the training necessary for this kind of work.

The Boards of Evangelism and Lay Activities of the North Arkansas Conference are recommending to you an evangelistic rally this fall, and

I hope you share in the program.

In the local church, through the leadership of the Boards of Social Concerns, we propose "to lead the churches in action on the basis of what has been said and what must of necessity continue to be said." In the local churches we want to come to grips with social, moral, and racial problems in such a way that we will assume and fulfill or responsibility as a Christian church, and as Christian individuals.

Since 1966 is the 150th Anniversary of the American Bible Society, we want to place added stress on Bible reading the next conference year. Since 1966 is also the 200th anniversary of the beginning of Methodist preaching in the U.S., we want to place great emphasis on evangelistic preaching in 1966. I can think of no finer program than that which calls for Bible reading from the laity and great biblical and evangelistic preaching from the ministry.

The second action program of the quadrennial emphasis calls for

action on the part of the Annual Conference,

We plan to continue to help the Conference and Districts to buy land for future churches and to establish new churches.

We will continue to challenge our churches and charges to merge churches where one church can serve two or more congregations, and to encourage the establishment of "enlarged charges."

We plan a program of stewardship for the State that will encourage every church to develop its conception of Christian stewardship. We hope that our people will respond to the opportunity which will be laid before them to remember the church in their wills and legacies.

The third action of the Quadrennial emphasis is world action. We do want Arkansas Methodism to have a world outreach. We want to continue to overpay our goal for World Service. We want our conferences to take some World Advance Specials that can be promoted as a Conference. In this way we can make an effective impact on some community somewhere in the world. We plan to encourage our people to share in the Bishop's Fund, which will be used by Bishop Galloway to meet great needs with which he comes in contact in his travels.

We are concerned about recruiting workers who will become fulltime workers for Christ in foreign countries and at home.

We have had a great conference. The future is before us. We can share in making it glorious. To fulfill our mission, we plan to do much training in district meetings, area workshops, rallies, etc. We also intend to use a great amount of space in The Arkansas Methodist to tell the story of our work. I have never taken a story to the Arkansas Methodist but that it has been accepted gladly. We want to have a wider use of the daily newspaper, audio-visual aids, radio, and television. I believe that the church must present the gospel to more people more often.

Our episcopal leadership, for which we are truly grateful, has challenged us with two main objectives: first, to develop a greater sense of bigness and, secondly, to develop brotherliness among the laity and the clergy. The connectional men have been fine and cooperative. The District Superintendents are capable and dedicated men. The pastors are ready and eager to move forward. The laymen are on their toes, filled with great vision. I would like, as we come to the close of this conference, to re-dedicate our lives to making Arkansas a real power in God's hand for the saving of our world.

# JOINT COMMISSION FOR THE ARKANSAS METHODIST AND LOUISIANA METHODIST RECOMMENDATIONS

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That the dates for the 1966 Circulation Campaign be January 9 to 16.
- 2. That the campaign goal for the 1966 Circulation Campaign be 41,000 with the quotas for the local churches to be one subscriber for every seven members reported by the local church in the 1965 annual conference journal.
- 3. That the subscription price be \$2 per year, with churches to be eligible for the \$1.50 per year rate if their list equals one subscriber for every three members reported.
- 4. That an intensive campaign be conducted by the editor, working with the district directors and district superintendents, looking to the addition of one all-family church in each district.
- 5. That the World Service and Finance Commissions of the North Arkansas, Little Rock and Louisiana Annual Conferences be requested to continue and annual appropriation of \$4,600 each for the support of the papers.
- 6. That the Executive Committee be empowered to act for the Commission in matters that might require attention between meetings of the full commission.
- 7. That the editor and the chairman of the Commission be authorized to sign notes at Union National Bank, Little Rock, for money that must be borrowed for current operation.
- 8. That the appreciation of this Commission be expressed to all who have made it possible to have such a successful year of operation. We are especially indebted to Bishop Paul V. Galloway, Bishop Aubrey G. Walton and to the 21 district superintendents of Arkansas and Louisiana; to the 21 district directors and the pastors and laymen who worked so diligently to make the 1965 Circulation Campaign such a success.

To all of the members of the staff of the publications and to the many devoted persons throughout our three annual conferences who contribute regularly to the papers and those who send the news to us making it possible to publicize all that the Methodist Church is doing throughout Arkansas and Louisiana, we express our sincere thanks.

#### BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

We have been involved in the following activities:

- 1. In cooperation with the Christian Civic Foundation and the Board of Christian Social Concerns of the North Arkansas Conference we sponsored a state-wide and interdenominational Workshop on Gambling.
- 2. In cooperation with the Churches United Against Gambling we participated in the successful attempt to defeat proposed Amendment 55 which would have legalized casino gambling in Garland County.
- 3. We participated in the area wide program training workshop conducted at Hendrix College and we provided leadership for District Workshops in which the local commission chairmen were instructed in the aims and techniques of the proposed program of Christian Social Concerns in the Little Rock Conference.
- 4. In cooperation with the General Board of Christian Social Concerns we provided information and leadership for special concerns of the church as designated by the General Conference.

5. We sent three representatives to the National Convocation in Washington, D.C.: Rev. David Hankins, Rev. Woodrow Smith and Rev. Charles Ramsay.

We recommend the following program and goals for the local

church in the year 1965-66:

- 1. We urge every local church to follow the program of the church as it is outlined in **The Methodist Story** from month to month. We ask that the pastor and chairman of the commission in each local church give special attention to the program planning issue of **The Methodist Story** and make early provision in the church's calendar for the observance of special days of Christian Social Concern. We request that special attention be given to the observance of **Social Creed Sunday**; **World Order Sunday**, **October 24**; **Commitment Day**, **November 14**; and **Race Relations Day**, **February 13**.
- 2. We recommend that each local church obtain for the members of the local commission copies of the new Manual for the Commission on Christian Social Concerns and obtain for the use of the commission the new film strip, Your Church Christian Social Concerns.
- 3. We believe that the local church will be greatly benefited by having representation at the **Annual Regional Coaching Conference** at Mt. Sequoyah, August 6-8, and we urge the several district directors to make up car pools to the conference so that expense may be held to a minimum.
- 4. We request the commissions to work with the Woman's Society of Christian Service in sponsoring and conducting the church-wide study, Mission The Christian's Calling.

We propose that the Conference Board actively sponsor and promote the following programs:

- 1. We plan to conduct seminars in each district of the conference for the purpose of examining the basic question, 'Who Speaks for the Church in Social Action?' Local church leaders will be given the opportunity to explore thoroughly the role of the agencies of the church in social change.
- 2. We recognize that the war on poverty and the **Economic Opportunity Program** are of vital importance and concern to all and that it should be implemented to its fullest. However we feel that machinery is now available through other agencies for the implementation of the program and The Methodist Church of the Little Rock Conference stands ready to assist in this program in any manner.

3. We propose to cooperate with the Christian Civic Foundation in the state-wide promotion of Operation Speak-Up, November 26-27.

We give thanks for the diligent work of the Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas and pledge our cooperation with its activities. Whereas Dr. William E. Brown continues to give the Foundation excellent leadership, we respectfully request that Bishop Paul V. Galloway reappoint him as its executive director.

#### COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

For the Christian Disciple, the idea of Vocation is central. It always means that the individual is being "called," and that he must answer, if he is to become what he potentially is, and if he is to fulfill his destiny in the world.

While the word "vocation" appears only once in the New Testament, the idea of calling and reference to God's activity of calling is woven into the warp and woof of the Old and the New Testaments. This is the idea that a person cannot be a Christian in isolation. There

must be a community of the called. In other words, the Church in action throughout the world.

In light of our responsibility in this area of Vocations in the Little Rock Conference, we as the Commission on Vocations recommend for the coming year, the following:

- 1. An emphasis on Church-related vocations for college students by; (a.) itinerating a vocations resource person to each college campus in the state, and (b.) sponsoring a vocations seminar in order that students interested in church-related vocations might pursue this more in depth. Both suggestions should be worked out in cooperation with the Arkansas Methodist Student Movement and the Woman's Society of Christian Service.
- 2. A week-end Church-related Vocations Seminar at Camp Tanako for senior high school students working in cooperation with the Board of Education and the Woman's Society of Christian Service.
- 3. That each District Superintendent be urged to organize and activate the District Committee on Christian Vocations and that Church-related Vocations be emphasized in the districts through rallys, workshops, etc...
- 4. That the Conference Commission on Christian Vocations study the Vocational Intern Program carried on in other conferences for the possibility of setting up such a program in the Little Rock Conference. The program would be two-fold: (a.) to allow a church which so desires, to have a summer worker and (b.) to provide an opportunity for youth to receive "in-service, supervised training" in Church-related vocations.
  - 5. That the Conference on the Ministry be held again this year.
- 6. That the Christian Vocations Packet be given wide distribution and that it be used to its fullest extent.
- 7. That the Month of November be designated as Recruitment Month, and that each pastor preach on the "Call to the Ministry."
- 8. That the pastor of the Local Church notify the Conference Director of Youth Work and the Commission on Christian Vocations when one of his youth makes a commitment to full-time Christian Service. This will enable us to have an accurate list of such commitments.
- 9. That the Christian Vocations filmstrip series be given wider use throughout the districts and local churches.
- 10. That each Local Church elect a Secretary of Christian Vocations as required by the 1964 **Discipline** as a minimum step in recruitment, and that all churches which can, be urged to elect a Commission on Christian Vocations in the Local Church.
- 11. That local church leaders seek to cooperate with the high schools in their "Career Day" programs.
- 12. That the Little Rock and the North Arkansas Conference Commissions on Christian Vocations take part in the Area Program Training Workshops meeting at Conway in June, 1965.

Mnisters and laymen are encouraged to cooperate in recruitment for church-related vocations. In every local congregation, there are young men and women (as well as some more mature) who need guidance from dedicated leaders to properly interpret and answer God's call. Qualified prospects must be made aware of the world's great need and their ability to serve Christ's cause if they are willing to respond to the Divine summons.

#### **Conference Promotion**

The Little Rock Conference has long had a good program of Christian Education. It is comprehensive and effective. We shall continue to work along these fundamental lines, striving for greater efficiency and effectiveness; and adding new features as occasions arise.

With a few additions the following have long been among our chief objectives and will continue to command our best efforts:

1. A continuation of the program of seeking to increase the church school membership and attendance, giving special attention to outpost Sunday schools and the organization of new classes.

- 2. A year-around emphasis on winning persons for Christ and His Church; and carefully training them in the meaning of the Christian life and church membership.
- 3. We believe that the new Program of Evangelism for Youth is sound so that it will also have our careful consideration and active support.
- 4. To improve the quality of teaching for all age groups we hope to achieve two objectives: (1) Each local church to have a long range program for discovering, enlisting and training officers and teachers; (2) to have three or more Christian Workers' Schools in each district, these schools to be set up on a sub-district basis with all churches in the area co-operating in planning and promoting the school. Thus we hope to have one or more training opportunities with accredited instructors available for every church and church school worker in the Little Rock Conference.
- 5. A Conference Camping Committee to study our present camping program with a view of making improvements; and looking especially toward adding Frontier Camping to our present program.
- 6. Our new literature for children, Christian studies for Methodist Children, has been enthusiastically received by churches large and small. We are now looking forward to and planning for the new literature for youth and for adults which we hope to have by September 1967.
- 7. Stewardship Emphasis for Children and Youth through the regular channels of our church; and a special study of stewardship at our Junior High Camps at Tanako this summer.
- 8. A continued and deep concern for the home and for Christian family life, with special emphasis on: the organization of active Family Life Committees; the observance of Children's Day and National Family Week, the promotion of the Young Parent's Study Plan; and with close co-operation between home and church throughout the year.
- 9. Full co-operation with Area and other Conference agencies in all matters of common interests.
- 10. We pledge our continued support to our fine Methodist seminaries.

#### DEATH BENEFIT PROGRAM

#### The Planning

The Little Rock Conference Insurance Committee met with numerous groups in study, preparation, and planning to be able to offer the Death Benefit Program (DBP) to the members of the Little Rock Conference. These groups included the Executive Secretary of the Area Council, members of the Cabinet, Board of Pension members, and a representative from the General Board of Pensions, The Methodist Church. From this study is presented the Plan D program, outlined here, of the General Board of Pensions.

#### Participation and Cost

All Effective Ministers, all Approved Supply Ministers, and all Retired Ministers of the Little Rock Conference may have this protection.

Lay members presently covered by Group Life Insurance will be eligible. The contribution is the same for all participants.

Plan D, which is the one offered, is based on the average salary in this Conference which is \$5,944. The annual contribution will be two per cent (2%) of this average salary, or \$118.88. The effective date will be Sept. 1, 1965.

#### **Death Benefits**

#### **Educational Benefits**

Also provided through Plan D is \$1,200 per academic year for each of four years beyond high school that a deceased minister's child is in full attendance at a college or university. The maximum payable per child is \$4,800.

## The Committee Recommends:

1. The Little Rock Annual Conference, in session May 24-28, 1965, adopts Plan D of participation in the Death Benefit Program of the General Board of Pensions.

2. The annual contribution for each member enrolled be made in advance on a joint-contributory basis as follows:

Forty per cent (40%) by the Pastor and sixty per cent (60%) by the Charge he serves;

One hundred per cent (100%) by the Conference Board of Pensions for the Retired Ministers;

Ministers in Special Appointments may contribute the full amount or jointly with the agency or institution to which they are appointed.

All contributions be remitted to the Conference Treasurer.

4. The initial period be September 1, 1965-May 31, 1966, and subsequent annual periods be June 1-May 31; and contributions for the initial period be in proportion to the time covered. These initial amounts are: Church — \$53.50; Pastor — \$35.66.

## HOSPITAL INSURANCE

Hospital Insurance will continue to be with the American Hospital and Life Insurance Company of San Antonio, Texas.

We are offering an increase in hospitalization coverage which will change the number of days per entry from 35 to 70.

Coverage will then be:

\$15.00 per day — 70 days per entry \$300 miscellaneous charges (less \$25.00 deductible)

75% of next \$5000

\$200 surgery schedule

Maternity benefits: \$150 for hospital and \$50 for doctor.

All Retired Men and Widows are eligible, also. The Board of Pensions will pay one-half  $(\frac{1}{2})$  for them.

The deductible amount is not due for maternity, minor surgery, minor accidents.

We strongly urge every minister to insure his family and that every full-time lay employee of the church be covered.

We respectfully request each of the District Superintendents to consider the premium payments of this insurance as part of the normal allocations to the churches over which they have jurisdiction, and that they make every effort to have the churches meet their part for both ministers and lay employees.

#### **BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES**

The Board of Lay Activities has directed its efforts toward a better understanding of those programs concerning Benevolences, Methodist Men and Lay Speaking. Its purpose has been this year to inform better and encourage stronger support and more determined efforts by the Laymen of this conference.

To better advise the Charge Lay Leader of the importance of his office and his role in the program of the Local Church-The Board provided for each charge a copy of the manual "The Charge Lay Leader." The Laymen's Assembly for the Conference was held at Camp Tanako in September. An inspirational program was presented to a near record group in attendance.

Layman's Day was observed as in past years by most of the churches in the conference. A large number of Laymen are filling the pulpits of churches that are served only part time by their pastor.

To increase interest in Methodist Men it was proposed at the February Board meeting that a number of Laymen from each district of the conference be encouraged to attend the National Conference of Methodist Men at Perdue University in July. A bus was chartered and the seats were allocated by districts. All seats have been reserved and reservations completed for a record number of our laymen to attend this conference.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS

Your Committee on Memoirs has two primary functions. First, this Committee selects the preacher to bring the Commemoration Message at Annual Conference, and presents this service to the Annual Conference.

We try to select as the preacher, men of the Conference who know the membership of the Conference, and are able to represent the Methodist Ministry.

We also try to select men of preaching ability in order to make this service an outstanding part of our Annual Conference session. In a real sense this is the "key note" service of the Annual Conference. We have had many compliments on our efforts. Our preacher for the 1965 session is Dr. Arthur Terry.

Our second task is to have written a Memoir for every deceased minister, minister's wife, and widow of a preacher. These Memoirs are printed in the Conference Journal.

The Conference Standing Rules state what is to be included in a Memoir: "Date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, name of children, charges served and place of burial." Follow these instructions and save having a Memoir returned for correction. Three copies of all Memoirs are to be furnished.

Memoirs should be written not later than sixty days after death occurs. Send Memoir to Rev. Robert B. Moore, Jr., Secretary, First Methodist Church, Hope, Arkansas.

#### Methodist Headquarters Building Committee Report

The Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences, in session in May and June 1964, authorized and empowered the Building Committee for the New Methodist Headquarters Building to proceed with the construction of a Headquarters Building for Arkansas at the corner of University Avenue at 28th Street, Little Rock, Arkansas; the building to be jointly owned and held by the North Arkansas and Little Rock Annual Conferences. The committee was authorized to expend the approximate sum of \$150,000 for such building.

The committee proceeded as instructed and asked for bids through the architect that had previously been employed. However, the bids far exceeded the amount of money authorized by the Annual Conferences and exceeded the ability to pay for the building of an amortization plan without charging excessive rent.

A committee was appointed to work with the architect to see if the cost could be reduced sufficiently to meet the approved funds without reducing the size and appearance of the building to the point where it would be unacceptable. After some time, the architect said he was not able to reduce the cost sufficiently. Then, the committee began to turn in other directions to find a suitable building. It was learned that the Rector Building, owned by Hendrix College, had some space to rent but parking presented a problem. Also, the information was obtained that the First Methodist Church of Little Rock was giving some consideration to erecting a building on their property or remodeling present facilities to rent or lease as a Headquarters Building. These two possibilities, along with the location on University Avenue and 28th Street, are being explored by the committee and they will also consider other possibilities. There are considerations, if they develop, which would make a very desirable headquarters for Arkansas Methodists. We have been assured by the owners of the present building that they are in no hurry to occupy the building.

The committee feels keenly that the selection or erection of a Headquarters Building for Arkansas Methodism is a serious matter and should not be rushed into but all reasonable possibilities should be explored.

The committee has met many times and the expense has been born by each individual, but each one has been glad to bear this expense and has been faithful in attending meetings and trying to provide a Headquarters for Arkansas Methodism that all Methodists would be proud of.

It is the recommendation of the New Headquarters Building Committee that a committee be continued for the purpose of negotiating for or erecting a Headquarters Building and authorize Bishop Paul V. Galloway to appoint the personnel of such a committee.

#### MINIMUM SALARY COMMISSION

The Commission on Minimum Salary shall be composed of one minister and one layman from each district of the Conference, and including one representatives from urban, village and rural churches. This Commission shall elect quadrennially a chairman, vice chairman and secretary to perform the usual duties of such offices. These officers shall compose the Executive Committee of the Commission. Whenever a vacancy occurs on the Commission between sessions of the Annual Conference, the vacancy shall be filled by the District Superintendent of the District involved.

Charges may become eligible to receive salary aid for the pastor from minimum salary fund by meeting the following requirements.

 Conduct an Every Member Visitation Program following the procedure outlined by the Town and Country Commission.
 a. If a pastor moves to another charge and has not made a con-

a. If a pastor moves to another charge and has not made a concerted effort to put on the Every Member Visitation Program, he will not be eligible for Minimum Salary Aid.

b. No charge will be eligible to receive Minimum Salary Aid if it has not paid the percentage requested by the Conference for

Minimum Salary Fund.

- File with District Superintendent, The Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission, and the Secretary of the Minimum Salary Commission, A completed application form approved and provided by the Minimum Salary Commission for minimum salary aid.
- 3. Each charge shall be asked to increase salary, travel, or utilities \$100.00 each year. There will be no decrease in Minimum Salary Aid on the first \$100.00 and fifty per cent reduction of all increase over \$100.00, No charge shall be eligible to receive salary aid if there is any reduction in salary or travel expense. If there is no increase within three years, the support may be reduced \$100.00 each year.
- 4. Plans for a Larger Parish Program shall be presented to the commission for approval and for funds to be received. Each parish shall have a training course on the Larger Parish.
- All pro-rated connectional claims shall be paid by the charge to be eligible to receive minimum salary aid, 1964 Discipline Paragraph 823.

6. Minimum Salary Charges shall be grouped as follows;

Type A. At least four churches with a membership of 300, pastor preaches three times on Sunday. Salary, travel expense mission aid and minimum salary not to exceed \$4,500. Where there are four churches on a charge and they merge to form three churches, they shall qualify for the same amount as a charge with four churches.

Type B. At least three churches with salary, travel expense, mission aid minimum salary aid not to exceed \$4,000. However, where there are three churches on a charge and they merge to form two churches or one church, they shall qualify for the same amount as a charge with three

churches.

Type C. Student pastors married, at least three churches, salary, travel expense, mission aid, minimum salary aid not to exceed \$3,000. Student Pastor single, at least three churches, salary, travel expense, mission and minimum salary aid not to exceed \$2,400. Minimum Salary Charges must be composed of at least three churches with salary and travel expense as much as \$1,800.

Ministers with dependent children eighteen years of age and under may draw \$100.00 for each child without reference to the above Schedule of Allowances and salary level. Each child to continue to draw \$100.00 if attending an accredited college or in training above the high school level.

- 7. Payment from this fund are made without regard to the amount the pastor receives from pension or educational funds. No part time pastor is eligible to receive minimum salary aid.
- 8. In the event the income of the fund becomes insufficient to meet the claims upon it, each claimant shall benefit in his proportionate share of the available fund.
- 9. If a charge becomes qualified as a minimum salary charge within the first six months of the conference year, the effect becomes retroactive to the beginning of the Conference year.
- 10. The Minimum Salary Fund shall be raised by an apportionment to all the churches of the Conference in an amount equal to 3% of the cash salary paid the pastor. The Commission would like for the pastor to volunteer to pay through the church treasurer one-third of the charge's apportionment, and for the District Super-intendents and all other members of the Conference serving in special appointments to volunteer to contribute to the fund an amount equal to 1% of their salary.
- 11. Group Life Insurance, and Hospitalization, premiums pastors part, to be paid from the Minimum Salary Fund, for pastors serving Type C. Churches.
- 12. The Bishop and District Superintendents, The Town and Country Commission and Commission on Minimum Salary, shall work out a pattern of Enlarged Charge arrangements. The Conference and all concerned shall begin immediately to work to achieve these arrangements within the next two years.
- 13. The Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission shall serve in an advisory capacity to the Commission on Minimum Salary.
- Exceptions to the above requirements may be made by the Commission.
- 15. The Minimum Salary Commission will grant up to \$500.00 for the Town and Country Seminar, as requested by minister's serving minimum salary charges.

#### POLICY AND PROGRAM

- I. The Little Rock Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications proposes to work strictly within the framework of the current Discipline of The Methodist Church.
  - II. The elected officers of the Board are:

Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, Registrars: General, College Students, Seminary Students.

III. The Executive Committee of the Board are the elected officers. They shall have authority in matters committed to them by the Board.

- IV. The Board shall meet prior to the opening of school, at Annual Conference, and on call of the Chairman.
- V. The Registrar shall arrange matters at District levels with all men in the Course of Study, just prior to Annual Conference.
  - VI. The Board's sources of income shall be:
    - A. A percentage from Conference Benevolences
    - B. A special offering in November for Ministerial Training
    - C. Gifts, bequests and interest

VII. The Board shall maintain a Scholarship Loan Program for Ministerial Training as follows:

A. For those in Course of Study

1. Assistance to Courses of Study Schools

(a) A maximum of \$40.00 for books and supplies

(b) One round trip at 6c per mile

2. Assistance in the Correspondence Course

(a) Payment of fees

(b) A maximum of \$40.00 for books

Above assistance repayable: Maximum received in any one year, by one year of service as a full time pastor, either as a member On Trial or as a Full Time Approved Supply.

B. For students from Little Rock Conference churches preparing for the Effective Ministry in The Methodist Church and enrolled in a college, university or seminary, approved by the University Senate of The Methodist Church, and who:

1. Hold a current Local Preacher's License in The Metho-

i. Hold a current Local Preacher's License in The Methodist Church, or are On Trial in the Little Rock Annual Conference.

 Make application annually to the proper Registrar of the Board, prior to August 1, giving all information requested, and authorizing regular grade reports to this Board Registrar from the school Registrar and a transcript of credits at the end of each semester. Application must be requested.

Make a note, properly endorsed, and payable in one of two ways:

(a) One full year of service as an Effective Minister in The Methodist Church repaying the maximum receivable any one year.

(b) In cash with interest at 4% per annum, beginning at the time the recipient terminated his ministry or preparation therefore; schedule of payments to be arranged with the Board Registrar.

4. Maintain a satisfactory grade average to indicate ability to graduate from his institution.

C. Method of Payment

No student may receive assistance for more than 8 college semesters and 8 seminary semesters, or the quarterly equivalent.

Payment will be made relative to the school system semester or quarterly.

VIII. The Board may set a maximum amount of assistance per year, per recipient, but assistance will be determined for each individual on the basis of requirements.

IX. The board shall give assistance in a reasonable amount for physical examinations for men to be admitted on trial and into full connection.

X. The Board shall maintain a scholarship of \$400.00 per year to Perkins School of Theology.

## REQUESTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

I. The Board, each District Superintendent, pastor and local church to hold up to young men the need for ministers and the challenge of the Ministry, that may enable them to hear the call.

II. As the first step into the Ministry, enrolling for the studies for License to Preach with the department of Inservice Training of the Gen-

eral Board of Ministerial Education.

III. Each pastor to provide himself with folders on the Course of Study and with the book for the course on License to Preach.

IV. That when a person has passed the correspondence work on studies for License to Preach, or has completed one-fourth of the work for a B. D. Degree in an approved seminary, and in the judgment of the District Committee on Ministerial Training and Qualifications his gifts and graces commend him for the Ministry, the Committee license him to preach, subject to the approval of their action and renewal of this license by the District Conference.

V. Wherever possible, men shall, in the Course of Study, take their

work through the Courses of Study School.

VI. We assume our conference share of financial responsibility for the Arkansas Pastors' School.

VII.. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance to grant:

A. An appropriation of 4% from Conference Benevolences.

B. The authorization of a special offering on the third Sunday in November for Ministerial Training.

VIII. We express our appreciation for the support given the Ministerial Training Scholarship Loan Program by the churches of the Conference. In view of our increased load since assuming assistance for seminary students, we require a substantial increase this year.

IX. We recommend that the Little Rock Conference cooperate with

the Jurisdictional Program of Ministerial Education in the following

ways:

A. That we hold before our churches the goal of giving to Ministerial Education an amount equal to 1% of the local church's budget, exclusive of monies used for buildings, improvements, and debt service.

B. That the churches be asked to move toward this goal as rapidly as possible and certainly not slower than 1/3 of 1% in 1966,

2/3 of 1% in 1967, and the full 1% in 1968.

C. That the Little Rock Annual Conference retain for its own work the first \$12,000 it receives from the churches; that the Conference reserve the right to adjust this amount from year to year; and that the remainder be sent to the Jurisdictional treasurer to be apportioned to the seminaries at Dallas and Kansas City.

D. That the fund for Ministerial Education be promoted through the regular November Special Offering for Ministerial Edu-

cation.

#### BOARD OF MISSIONS

REPORT ON PROMOTION DURING 1964-65
REV. I. V. MASTERS TOUR: Arranged for the iteneration of Rev. I. V. Maters, District Superintendent from India during June and July during which he spoke to several thousand people in the six districts.

RIO GRANDE CONFERENCE WEEK: Six representatives from the Rio Grande Conference spent a week in the Conference speaking to local churches and sub-district groups. Dr. C. W. Lokey also spent one Sunday in the Conference.

CHURCH WIDE SCHOOLS OF MISSIONS: Promoted the idea of a School of Missions in each local church using the study book, "Spanish Doorways.

MEN AND MISSIONS DINNER: Sponsored the "Men and Missions Dinner" in Malvern on November 19 with 240 laymen and preachers in attendance.

MOBILE CHURCH: Through Special Church Extension Funds purchased the "Mobile Church" which is in use by the St. Andrew Church in Little Rock.

PROMOTION OF ADVANCE SPECIALS: Promoted all the existing Advance Specials in National and World Divisions and recommended the promotion of Special in Oklahoma Indian Missions for \$7,200 for a parsonage in Salina an \$10,000 for a pilot project in Southern Chile for the training of Laymen.

LOCAL CHURCH COMMISSIONS: Urged the organization of a functioning Commission in each local Church in the Conference.

SPECIAL CHURCH EXTENSION FUNDS in the amount of \$17,-376.33 were raised and \$5,000 grants were made to St. Andrew's Church, Little Rock District; Daisy, Arkadelphia District; and Union, Pine Bluff

APPRECIATION: This work has been done by the Conference Missionary Secretary, Ferris Norton; and the District Missionary Secretaries: Thomas A. Abney, Arkadelphia; John P. Miles, Camden; Pryor R. Cruce, Hope; Ed Matthews, Little Rock; James R. Scott, Monticello; Charles P. McDonald, Jr., Pine Bluff.

#### REQUESTS:

We make the following requests from the Commission on World we make the following requests from the Commission on World Service and Finance: 1. Advance Specials - National: That the following amounts be allocated to the Districts for (1) Rio Grande Conference, \$3,500; (2) Oklahoma Indian Mission, \$6,000; (3) Central Jurisdiction, \$1,637; (4) Lydia Patterson Institute for Capital Funds, \$5,064; (5) Lydia Patterson Institute Operations Fund, amounts acceptable by the local churches For Indian Mission at Salina Oklahoma \$7,200 to be accepted. churches. For Indian Mission at Salina, Oklahoma, \$7,200, to be accepted by Advance Specials in local churches.

World Division: \$10,000 for Pilot Project in Southern Chile for the training of laymen. That all churches with Advance Specials be encouraged to continue them with a closer tie with the mission field.

We request the same amount of money for 1965-66 as was allocated in 1964-65: \$31,500, one third of which will be used for Church Extension. We request the Commission to allocate \$20,000 to the six districts for Special Church Extension for the purchase of new sites, building new

churches and re-location of churches, and merger of churches.

# RECOMMENDATIONS FOR 1965-66:

That a District Missionary Institute be held in each district with the District Superintendent and District Missonary Secretary working to-

That continuing information be given on World Service and Confer-

ence Benevolences with the aim of paying the full askings each year.

That World Division and National Division Advance Specials be lifted up throughout the year in order to lead local churches to increased acceptances.

That every local church have a functioning Commission on Missions. That the claim upon the individual for vocational Christian service

be made upon youth and young adults throughout the year.

That we participate in the Jurisdictional Missionary Conference at Mt. Sequoyah August 2-5 by sending the District Missionary Secretaries and one youth from each district.

That each District have a functioning Board of Missions for the purpose of purchasing sites, organizing new churches, and aiding the building and staffing of new churches, and re-locating churches.

That new Churches be organized and new sites purchased where wise

study and survey indicates they are or will be needed in future.

That Special Church Extension Funds be used wisely in promoting the organizations of new churches, purchasing sites, and re-locating churches that maximum results will be achieved.

That the Mobile Church be loaned to the situation in greatest need just as soon as it is released by St. Andrew Church in Little Rock, and that the future needs of this type of service be studied to see if an additional unit will be needed.

That the Urban Convocation in February 1966 be promoted throughout the Conference that maximum use of its findings may be made available

to our cities.

That a study be made of every city and town where a new church might be needed with the view of planning for the future growth of Methodism.

That Larger Parishes or Group Ministeries be developed where needed,

and the Board of Mission pledges cooperation in this area.

That Aldersgate Camp be used to the greatest advantage in the program of missions and that local churches, districts and the Conference assume interest and support in its usefulness.

# THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

# A. DISTRIBUTION

Fulfilling our responsibility as the Conference Board of Pensions, we have authorized the payment of claims as follows:

- To 48 members retired by the Little Rock Conference, with a total of 1315½ years of approved service.
- To 42 former members retired by other annual conferences with a total of 313¼ years of approved service for which the Little Rock Conference is responsible.
- To 50 widows of members retired by the Little Rock Conference who pensions are based on a total of 921½ years of approved service.
- To 33 widows of former members retired by other annual conferences whose pensions are based on a total of 209½ years of approved service for which the Little Rock Conference is responsible.
- To 9 dependent children of deceased ministers retired by the Little Rock Conference and by other conferences whose pensions are based on a total of 206¼ years of approved service.
- To 12 Approved Supply Pastors of the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 167¾ years of approved supply service.
- To 6 widows of Approved Supply Pastors of the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 98¾ years of approved supply service.

The Little Rock Conference in 1964-1965 had the responsibility for

200 claimants with a total of 3232½ years of approved service.

These annuity claims have been paid on the basis of the following

rates establishes by the annual conference:

Conference Members (100% of Annuity Rate) \$54.00 Per service year.

Widows of Conference Members (70% of Annuity Rate)

#### B. RESPONSIBILITIES

(For the period of June 1, 1964 to Feb. 1, 1965)

Other services rendered by the Board of Pensions:

1. Four necessitous allowance grants. Total \$455.00.

- 2. Premiums in the amount of \$872.26 for claimants eligible for Group Hospitalization Insurance Coverage. Cover the first two quarters of the conference year.
- 3. Premiums to be paid when due for the remainder of the conference year.

#### C. RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. We recommend that the annuity rate be set at \$55.00 per year of service for retired members of the conference; and that \$41.25 be set for retired approved supply pastors.
- 2. We recommend that the apportionment to the charges of the annual conference for conference claimants be an amount equal to 15% of the pastor's salary.
- 3. In keeping with Par. 296.3b and Par. 1610.6 of the 1964 Discipline. We recommend that Sunday, March 20, 1966, be observed as Retired Ministers Day.
- 4. We recommend that the General Board of Pensions continue to write and distribute the monthly payments to our annuitants.
- 5. In keeping with Par. 1618.4 of the 1964 Discipline, we recommend for the approval by the annual conference that special appointments shall be listed in the conference journal as follows: (1) with annuity claim (a) upon this Annual Conference, or (b) upon a general board, an institution, or an agency of The Methodist Church; (2) without annuity claim upon this Annual Conference.
- 6. That there be apportioned to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the conference the sum of \$360.00 for the conference year 1966-67 in accord with the 1964 Discipline (Par. 1623.7); and that the said apportionment be paid to the treasurer of the Little Rock Conference Board of Pensions not later than 15 days prior to the opening of annual conference.
- 7. We concur in the recommendation of the Conference Insurance Committee with reference to the adoption of the Death Benefit Program of the General Board of Pensions and the Group Hospitalization program.
- 8. We recommend that Eligible Conference Claimants and special Conference Claimants will have the Death Benefit Program provided for them with the contribution to be paid by the Conference Board of Pensions in accordance with the program of the Conference Committee on Group Insurance.

- 9. We recommend that eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants will have  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the annual premium of the Conference Group Hospitalization paid by the Conference Board of Pensions.
- 10. All retired ministers who serve appointments under the District Superintendent, and receives less than \$1,000.00 in salary and expense from the charge will have their contribution and premiums paid by the Conference Board of Pensions as outlined in Par. 8 and 9 of this report.
- 11. We recommend that the Board of Pensions move as quickly as possible toward setting the annuity rate for full time approved supply pastors the same as that for ministers in full connection.

Would it be too much to expect that in every Methodist Home there be a Bible, a current Discipline, a Hymnal and, or, a Book of Worship, and the family magazine Together?

#### CAMP TANAKO

During the 1964 camping season 30 different groups, numbering approximately 2500 persons, participated in well-planned programs under the direction of carefully selected, capable leadership. Already the schedule for 1965 is almost filled.

The Camp is planned, and the program set up, to minister to all age groups - children through adults, with activities appropriate for their respective ages. Every care is given to make the camping experience physically safe and morally and spiritually rewarding. The Board is endeavoring to make the entire camping program an increasingly effective force for the developing of Christian character and the training of needed leadership.

We are happy to report that we now have facilities for taking care of approximately two hundred campers at a time; and needed improvements and repairs were made during the year. We still have need for

additional class rooms, especially when weather is inclement; and for additional landscaping for preserving and beautifying the property.

The Little Rock Conference Board of Education has appointed a Conference Camping Committee to study the present camping program with a view of making improvements when possible; and also of looking into the possibility of inaugurating a program of Frontier Camping to supplement our present program of Institutional Camping - if this is found to be advisable.

We recommend the continuation of the financial policy currently followed:

- 1. From Conference apportionments, \$9,000.00.
- 2. The privilege of a free-will offering Sunday, April 24, 1966.
- 3. Encouragement of gifts from individuals and special groups.

We transmit the following nominations to membership on the Board of Trustees, all terms to expire in 1968.

#### TELEVISION, RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

#### I. Organization

- 1. That the Reverend Charles W. Richards, be re-appointed as Cabinet Representative, with our commendation for the fine work and interest that he shares with our TRAFCO.
  - 2. That William D. Leavitt be Conference Director of TRAFCO.
- 3. That the district directors of TRAFCO be members of our Conference TRAFCO.
- 4. That the Executive Committee be the Chairman, the Cabinet Representative, Vice-Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, (Mr. Grafton Thomas, Area Treasurer, acting Treasurer for TRAFCO).
- 5. That the Executive Committee be given responsibility and authority to act on behalf of our Conference TRAFCO in such an interim work that may become necessary.
- 6. That the names of the Executive Committee be printed in the Journal with and separate from the Conference TRAFCO personnel.
- 7. That the Audio-Visual Committee be the executive secretaries of the Area Council, the Board of Education, and the Area Town and Country Commission.
  - 8. That the Finance Committee be the Vice-Chairman, Cabinet Rep-
- 9. That the Finance Committee be the TV-Radio Ministry Fund Committee.
- 10. That the Radio-TV Committee be the Conference Director and the district directors.
- 11. That the Radio-TV Committee be the Conference Director and the district directors.
- 11. That the district superintendents, district directors, and pastors give special attention to the organizing of the local church Audio-Visual Committee in each church, calling attention to the use of the Audio-Visual Committee Manual.

#### II. Cultivation and Motivation

1. That each pastor in each local church display materials from General TRAFCO, calling attention to the special TV and radio programs announced and sponsored by General TRAFCO.

- 2. That each church in our Conference be challenged under the direction of our Bishop, the district superintendents, and the pastors, to accept the responsibility of promoting and raising the world service special gift fund, i. e., the Television-Radio Ministry Fund, a total amount equal to 10c per member 4c for General TRAFCO, and 6c for Conference TRAFCO. (Discipline, Paragraph 762).
- 3. That with the approval of the World Service and Finance Commission, the Fourth Sunday in October be designated as TV-Radio Ministry Fund Sunday, using the cultivation materials and offering envelopes provided by General TRAFCO for receiving this special offering.
- 4. That each district superintendent and district director give encouragement to the direction of the TRAFCO program in each district.
- 5. That audio-visual workshops for pastors and local church audiovisual committee members be held in the districts or subdistricts under the direction of the district superintendents and district directors.
- 6. That our district directors give leadership in securing speakers for radio and television broadcast where public service time is offered.
- 7. That an Area TRAFCO Communications Seminar be held at Hendrix College in the Fall of 1965.

#### III. Program

- 1. We express appreciation to the television and radio stations located within the bounds of the Little Rock Conference for the time given our churches for the broadcasting of the gospel of Christ through preaching and other devotional services.
- 2. That we commend the churches and pastors for the radio broadcast of Sunday services, and we encourage other churches to join them in providing this larger extension of the Christian gospel.
- 3. That pastors and district directors schedule local programs on radio and television where possible.
- 4. That definite consideration be given to providing an **Audio-Visual** Room in the Methodist Headquarters Building.
- 5. That the Little Rock Conference TRAFCO in collaboration with the North Arkansas Conference TRAFCO, shall continue to work toward the goal of establishing the Area Film Library in the Audio-Visual Room of the Methodist Headquarters Building, with an employed film librarian who shall receive special training; and that an up-to-date film catalog be made available to each church; and that all of this shall be under the direction of the Arkansas Area Council.
- 6. We request that the World Service and Finance Commission continue to support TRAFCO with a minimum allocation of \$3000 \$2500 for General TRAFCO and \$500 for Conference TRAFCO.

# IV. Television and Radio Programming, Scheduling, and Future Goals

- 1. That we give increasing attention to and support of the vital importance of communicating to thousands of listeners-viewers, the gospel of our Lord and Christ, through the radio and television media, that more and more people will come to make his Way their way.
- 2. That we continue creative, television programming and scheduling comparable with that done in 1963, when the special Christmas program, "The Birth of the Christ Child," and the weekly program, "The Methodist Hour in Arkansas," were televised, with William D. Leavitt, of Methodist Information, as Producer.
- 3. That all of our churches be challenged to sponsor and support such new radio programs as "Word and Music," "Nightline," "Man With a Mike," and "When Your Child Asks."
- 4. That under the direction of TRAFCO, special attention be given to scheduling one or more of the filmed television programs: "Breakthru,"

"Talk Back," "The Way," and other new programs, with this significant observation, that we are soon to have a TV Station in Arkansas, with the tallest antenna in the world, which will make available State-wide television coverage.

- 5. That ultimately each and all district directors of TRAFCO, as well as additional ministers and laymen, be fully trained to instruct the course on Audio-Visuals in the Local Church, taking advantage of such training opportunities like that offered this year by General TRAFCO, in the Communications Audio-Visual Seminar, Mt. Sequoyah, July 12-23, 1965, and that four \$50 scholarships be granted for such training opportunities.
- 6. That ultimately there be at least one trained person in audio-visuals in each local church in our Conference.
- 7. That all of our ministers be challenged to add to their reading libraries or church libraries, new books in the field of communications in general, and especially in the fields of radio and television programming, preaching and audio-visuals.

# THE TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION PROGRAM 1965-1966

- 1. The Town and Country Commission Meeting and Workshop shall be held in Little Rock, January 17-18, 1966.
- 2. We shall continue to promote interest and provide worship services in areas having many tourists and hold workshops where needed.
- 3. A study shall be made to determine where churches should be merged, and those that should be part of a Larger Parish Program, where new churches should be located, and where there are abandoned church properties. The result of this study shall be filed in the Town and Country Office.
- 4. Town and Country Field Days shall be held upon request of the District Superintendent.
- 5. Tours of our church institutions, and state agencies may be conducted by the Associate Secretary of the Area Council in the field of Town & Country Work and Stewardship for pastors serving their first Charge.
- 6. We shall cooperate with the University of Arkansas in the Rural Seminar.
- 7. The Commission shall be responsible for promoting stewardship through the Every Member Visitation Program, the Lord's Acre and the Lord's Hour Program and Tithing and Wills and Legacies Programs in Workshops in cooperation with the Board of Lay Activities. The special emphasis this year on stewardship will be for children and youth, stewardship on the job, and stewardship and the family budget.
- 8. We request the Commission on Minimum Salary to allow up to \$500 for expenses of pastors on minimum salary to attend the Rural Seminar.
  - 9. We shall endeavor to secure a sign on every Methodist Church.
- 10. The Enlarged Charge Program shall be continued with a goal of at least 300-400 members for every full-time pastor. This goal was approved by each annual conference.
- 11. We shall work with TRAFCO to make available a film strip projector in every Sub-District for the use of small membership churches.
- 12. Charge Councils and Charge Commissions shall be organized where feasible.

- 13. Workshops on the Sacraments, wedding ceremonies, funeral services, and church administration shall be held when requested by the District Superintendent.
- 14. The Associate Secretary shall continue to give guidance in building programs when requested by the pastor and district suprintendent.
- 15. We shall seek to get each District Director certified to teach the courses on the Larger Parish and Group Ministry and Town and Country Work.
- 16. The District Director shall be elected by the Commission at its annual conference after consultation with the Associate Secretary. The annual conference after consultation with the Executive Secretary. The Director shall be a member of the Commission representing the District which he serves, and when he is moved out of the District he shall no longer serve as a member of the Commission, unless he is appointed as District Director in the District where he moves. There shall be a training period for the Directors at the beginning of the Conference year in cooperation with the other boards and commissions in the conference.
  - 17. The Harvest Festival and Rural Life Programs shall be promoted.
- 18. The Rural Church of the Year Program shall be promoted as outlined in the brochure provided for the Town and Country Workshop.
- 19. We shall seek to develop cooperative procedures between the church and governmental agencies, the Arkansas Council of Churches, and other denominations.
- 20. We shall promote the Neighborhood-1 Program to help in establishing new congregations, outpost Sunday Schools, and Cluster Groups in the areas where there are no churches.
- 21. We ask that \$9,000.00 be granted by the Commission on World Service and Finance for the Town and Country Work & Stewardship for this next conference year.
- 22. We request the appointment of W. O. Scroggin by the Bishop and the Cabinet as the Associate Secretary of the Area Council in the field of Town & Country Work and Stewardship.

The Town and Country Commission of the Little Rock Conference wishes to extend to Rev. E. J. Holifield their deep appreciation for his leadership for the past four years.

He has given time and attention to the Town and Country Work of our Conference as part of his ministry to the entire Arkansas Episcopal Area of The Methodist Church.

His spirit, his dedication, and his Christian love have won our love and appreciation as he served our Conference in its need for an effective ministry like his has been.

# WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Miss Mary Lou Barnwell, a staff member of the National Division of the Board of Missions told this story at Buck Hill Falls in January this year. "A congregation in a certain community wanted to build a new church. The men raised one half of the money — the women raised the rest. They needed a new parsonage — the men raised a little of the money — the women the rest. They needed a new pipe organ. The men raised a little of the money — the women the rest. They all died and went to heaven. The men were put to work — the women got the rest."

It is a fact that formal church leadership in the past has counted on women to raise money in whatever ways they could; to do good works for the entire church; to keep themselves occupied in their organizations and out of the sessions where the real decisions concerning the church were made. But now we are grateful that the new structural changes in our church and in our Board of Missions recognizes the changing role of women in the world today and more particularly their changing role in the church.

During the transition year through which we have just come, we have tried to acquaint ourselves with some of the changes and prepare ourselves to assume new roles in a new age. We hope and we feel that many of our women have grown spiritually as individuals and that our organization has made progress toward a more relavant relationship to the entire church and to Christ.

We began this 1964-65 year with some challenging and specific goals and honestly worked toward their attainment, but we fell far short on some and gained but little on others. One of the most disappointing aspects is that of membership. Despite the fact that the membership goal of 25% has been reached in only a few places over the entire Woman's Division, this does not make us feel any better when we must report to you a net loss of 78 members, five small societies and one Guild since last May. Our total adult membership as of May 15th this year is 11,838 in 211 societies and 72 guilds. The districts report 540 new Woman's Society members and 120 new Guild members, but this is off set by the losses.

This seems to be a significant statistic from our reports. Of 192 societies reporting, 143 reported that the majority of their members were in the age group between 35 and 55, 45 in the age group over 55 and only 4 in the age group under 35. This shows a "generational gap" in women's groups in the church. We are concerned about where the necessary new leadership will come from. Our Woman's Division leaders are aware of this and have already launched daring and novel plans, the first of which will be taking place in our 1965 Regional and Conference Schools of Christian Mission all over Methodism. These are designed to attract and challenge younger women in our churches — and yes, even unchurched young women leaders in the community to find their places of service to and in the church.

While numbers are still important, membership has taken on a new dimension. We are at the present time engaged in a self-study on the meaning and basis of membership in the Society and Guild, and its relation to motivation for membership cultivation. On May 15th Conference and Conference Guild leaders spent a day of self-study before God realizing that renewal must come to our individual lives if the organization is to challenge other women to respond to God's redemptive purpose. This same type of self-study will be conducted on the district level in the late summer and in the local societies and guilds in October and November.

Our Christian Social Relations emphasis has been directed toward several areas this year. We cooperated throughout the Conference preceding the General Election with the Churches United Against Gambling in working to defeat the legislation which would have permitted legislated casino gambling in Garland County. We have supported and participated in the program of the Christian Civic Foundation in its continuing efforts to educate against the evils of liquor, gambling and salacious literature. The Charter of Racial Policies of the Methodist Church was ratified at our Annual Meeting at Benton in March 1965. It has since been ratified by the Arkadelphia and Hope District at their annual district meetings. Other districts are working toward ratification. This is an important step we have taken. The Conference Secretary of Christian Social Relations is working with Rev. Rodney Shaw and Christian Social Concerns representatives of both Arkansas conferences on our Church's responsibility in the Poverty Program.

There have been most pleasant and rewarding experiences in Christian fellowship as the Wesleyan Service Guild and Woman's Society mem-

bers have planned and worked together on common goals this year. They too, are disappointed at not reaching some of their goals but not discouraged. The Conference Guild lost a beloved member and early leader during the year, Miss Hanna Kelly. A beautiful and fitting memorial is being given to Aldersgate Camp in her memory.

One of the newest and most challenging departures from the former ways of doing our work has been in our Mission Study program. No longer will the women be conducting three or four mission studies just for themselves each year. In the new program a unified approach will be used in the local church with the Commissions on Missions Christian Social Concerns, Education, The Methodist Men, the Wesleyan Service Guild and the Woman's Society all having representatives on a committee to plan and present the Mission Study program in two churchwide studies which will be all inclusive studies embodying all the areas of missions that we have formerly studied in separate study units, plus a Bible Study. We are quite excited too about the prospect of having the opportunity as conference and district leaders in Missionary Education in the Woman's Society and the Annual Conference of planning together and receiving our training together for our Missionary Education program. Several Annual Conference and Woman's Society Conference groups are already conducting joint pilot programs of training leaders this summer in their schools of Christian Mission. We want to start our planning early enough next year to include both our groups of leaders and perhaps some of the Commission Chairmen in the local churches. Our School of Christian Mission will be held at Hendrix College this summer for the first time in many years. We are looking forward to meeting in this perfect classroom setting and enjoy the cool comfort of the newly air conditioned facilities Dr. Marshall Steel offers us.

The financial goal for our 25th Anniversary observance is a 25% increase by May 1966, based on the pledge giving of 1962-63. The amount we have remitted to the Woman's Division on pledge for 1964-65 is \$96,584.95 which is an increase of 9.31%. The giving to the Children's Service Fund was \$218.72 and \$2,641.93 was credited at the Division from the MYFund, which makes a total on appropriations of \$99,445.60. The total amount sent to the Division was \$116,469.20 which includes Cash for Supply Askings, Call to Prayer and Self Denial offerings, Division Cultivation and Supplementary Gifts. A part of the supplementary gift from our conference came from a bequest to the Warren Society of \$2,582.80 by the late Mrs. V. O. Buck, who had been a member of that society and a Monticello District officer for many years. The total moneys sent in by the districts was \$125,115.30. They report spent for local church and community work \$47,181.45. The Societies are not required to report their local expenditures, but some do and this much was reported. We are sure that more was spent. We continue to support Miss Helen Wilson as we have in the past and Mrs. Adele Phillips. Miss Wilson is in Bolivia and Mrs. Phillips is at present home on furlough. She went out from our Conference in 1961 as a Special Term Missionary for three years, but she will be returning to the field late this year as a regular missionary. We are very pleased about this.

The most important phase of our work and one which undergirds every thing else we do is Spiritual Life Cultivation, and this cannot be evaluated on a report blank very well. We do know that our Conference, district and local leaders have tried to help us grow in the knowledge and experience of God by providing opportunities such as prayer retreats, quiet days, small prayer groups, encouraging the use of the Prayer Calendar, the new Book of Worship of our Church and good devotional reading along with more Bible study in depth. It is our belief that the Self-study plans that are being made will meet with eager response on the part of many women who are searching for more meaning and purpose for their lives.

This year's Annual Meeting observed our 25th Anniversary in ways that we consider interesting, historical, unique and delightfully entertaining. A careful record has been made of this observance for those who will follow us.

The president would like to express for the Conference Woman's Society and Wesleyan Service Guild our appreciation to Bishop Paul Galloway. Dr. Cecil Culver, the District Superintendents, the ministers in our churches and the various staff people on all levels. You have cooperated with us and encouraged us in our efforts and you have made us feel that we are needed and that our opinions count. As lay women of the Methodist Church we sincerely want to add our witness to yours as we try to work for "One Witness in One World."

We further recommend that the amount apportioned to the districts be the same as of last year, \$30,097.00, and that the balance come from the Suspense Fund.

4. District Superintendent's Salary, Expense and Utilities: The District Superintendents shall receive an annual salary of \$9,000.00, \$800.00 of which shall be considered as utilities; and \$3,000.00 travel expense, to be used at the discretion of the individual District Superintendent. Both travel and salary to be paid monthly.

The Commission recommends that an amount equal to 10% of all pastors' cash salaries be paid to the District Superintendent's Fund, \$4,000.00 of this fund to be credited to Lydia Patterson Institute, El Paso, Texas, Rio Grande Conference, for capital improvement.

- 5. The amount apportioned for the Episcopal Fund is to be an amount equal to two percent of the cash salaries of the pastors for the current year.
- 6. We request that an amount equal to three percent of the pastor's salary be assessed against the individual churches for Minimum Salary Fund. We request that the pastor, church, or agencies, pay one-third through the local church or direct to the Conference Treasurer.
- 7. The Commission recommends that an amount equal to 15% of all pastors' cash salaries be apportioned for the Conference Claimants Fund.
- 8. We recommend that the Treasurer be authorzied to pay \$15.00 for membership of the Methodist Historical Society of the Conference in the National Methodist Historical Society, and \$100.00 for other expenses.
- 9. We recommend a charge of three percent of all funds handled by the Conference Treasurer, except the Conference Claimants, Superannuate Endowment, World Service, Advance Specials, Connectional Items, and Mt. Sequoyah, and this money derived from these charges to be set up as a Conference Administrative Fund, in accordance with the Conference standing rule.
- 10. If a charge does not otherwise provide for the pastor's utilities, then each charge is requested to designate the cost of parsonage utilities as a part of the assessee's salary thus exempting the cost of the utilities from the income tax claims. It is understood that a designation of a part of salary as utilities for tax purposes only does not exempt this amount from percentage that would be normally levied against it.
- 11. We recommend that the Commission on Vocations be allowed \$600.00.

- 12. We emphasize the importance of Christian wills and legacies. Materials for promotion may be ordered from the Department of Wills, Bequests and Gifts of the Council on World Service and Finance, 1200 Davis Street, Evanston, Illinois.
- 13. We approve the request of the Conference Board of Missions for permission to promote the raising of the sum of \$3,500.00 for the Rio Grande Conference, and the sum of \$6,000.00 for the Indian Mission, and \$1,637.00 for the Central Jurisdiction during the Conference Year 1964-1965 as Advance Specials, to be apportioned on the regular percentage basis. Your Commission also approves the request of the Board of Missions to raise through Advance Specials, \$5,000.00 per year for the capital improvement of Lydia Patterson Institute. We further approve the raising on a voluntary basis as Advance Specials \$7,200.00 for a parsonage in the Oklahoma Indian Mission and \$10,000.00 for special work in South Chile.
- 14.We recommend that, in accordance with a request from the Western Methodist Assembly, an amount not less than \$10.00 per charge be paid this year for the needed building and improvement of the Western Methodist Assembly.
- 15. We recommend that the Little Rock Conference pay an amount equal to an amount paid through World Service and Finance Commission of the North Arkansas Conference to the support of the Chaplain at Booneville Sanitorium.
- 16. We recommend that the Conference raise \$85,297.00 for its work of Higher Education at Hendrix College; this amount to be apportioned to the Districts and that the District Superintendents and District Stewards make the apportionment to the churches of the District according to their best judgment.
- 17. We recommend that the apportionment set for Wesley Foundation Operational Fund be on the basis of fifty cents per member.
- 18. We recommend an extension of one year on the program of Capital Improvement of Wesley Foundation to those churches not having reached their goal.
- 19. At the suggestion of the Board of Education, we recommend the fourth Sunday in September as Church School Day, and authorize the Church School Day Askings to be \$9,000.00, and urge all our churches to raise their quotas to meet this need.
- 20. We urge our churches to continue their support of Camp Tanako. Concurring with the request from the Camp Board we are urging all churches either to include the Camp program in their annual financial budget, or to make the fourth Sunday of April as Camp Sunday, at which time a free-will offering may be made for this project.
- 21. We recommend the first Sunday in December (Commitment Sunday) as Christian Civic Foundation Day, and authorize a Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas, Inc., offering of \$7,500.00 and urge all our churches to cooperate. This amount to be allocated by the District Superintendents on a percentage basis.
- 22. We endorse an offering in November, to be known as the Ministerial Training Special Offering, to be used in Ministerial Student Loans and Scholarships, and in the support of the Arkansas Pastors' School.
- 23. We recommend a grant to pay necessary expenses of Board of Hospitals and Homes and Conference Board of Trustees and other necessary incidental expenses of other Boards and Agencies to conduct their work.
- 25. We give our endorsement to the plans of the Television, Radio and Film Commission to go before the districts to promote the TRAFCO fund, working toward 10c per member for this fund, and we give our approval to a special offering for TRAFCO on the fourth Sunday in October.

- 26. Your Commission recommends that all surplus funds not under any Board or Commission of the Annual Conference be subject to the direction of the Commission on World Service and Finance.
- 27. We authorize the Treasurer to cooperate with the First Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas, and to pay the proper official of said church any deficit in Conference entertainment expense following the submission of a financial statement to the Treasurer.
- 28. We respectfully request the Bishop to appoint a committee to study the interboard structure for conference administration. Said committee to cooperate with a similar committee from the North Arkansas Conference to study a joint interboard structure for conference administration of Arkansas Methodism.

The attached statements present cash receipts and disbursements for the period June 1, 1964 through May 31, 1965.

My examination of the treasurer's records was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and included such tests and checks as I considered necessary in the circumstances including verification by correspondence with depositories and physical inspection of notes and other assets. Cash receipts were traced into the bank accounts and were examined as to credit in the proper amounts into the proper funds. Cash disbursements were verified against canceled checks and a test check of authorized requisitions.

My examination did not extend to the Board of Pensions Distribution Fund at Evanston, Illinois. At all times there is a balance in this account which is not reflected on the books of the Little Rock Conference Treasurer, and this balance is not reflected in this audit report. The Little Rock treasurer sends funds to Evanston ahead of time for payment of pensions.

It is my opinion that the accompanying statements present fairly the results of cash operations under the control of Grafton Thomas, treasurer for the period June 1, 1964 through May 31, 1965, and that funds and investments are on hand (Board of Pensions Distribution Fund excepted) at May 31, 1965 as stated in the exhibits.

# Memoirs

### **GUY CHETWOOD AMES**

Guy Chetwood Ames, son of General Beaugard and Frances Elizabeth Ames, was born in Hempstead County, Arkansas, September 6, 1898. Before the Civil War, his father, an Ohioan, had married an Alabama girl. When the War started, his wife was with her parents in Alabama. There he joined her and they moved to Hempstead County.



As a young man, Guy Chetwood Ames joined the U.S. Navy. As a sailor, he saw much of the world. He was in active service during World War I and afterwards received his honorable discharge.

terwards received his honorable discharge.

In the Methodist Church at Antoine, Arkansas, July 2, 1921 he married Lillie Belle Davis, daughter of the late Rev. W. J. Davis and Martha Carrie Davis. The late Rev. Jesse Galloway officiated at the ceremony. For many years, Mrs. Ames' father was a member of the Little Rock Conference and at that time was pastor at Delight.

Of that marriage, three children were born, namely: Rev. Guy C. Ames, Jr., now pastor of Asbury Methodist Church, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; Rev. G. B. Ames, now pastor of the First Methodist Church, Morrilton, Arkansas; and Mrs. Irma Ames Velchoff, El Dorado, Arkansas.

After an unusual experience in the spiritual presence of God through Christ in whom he so devoutly believed, Guy Chetwood Ames was called into the ministry of the Methodist Church. In 1922 he was admitted on trial in the Little Rock Conference. From that time until he retired in June, 1963, at its annual Conference in Hot Springs, Arkansas, he was a zealous and dedicated servant of his Lord.

Shortly after his admission, he was transferred to the Oklahoma Conference. In that state he served many churches with distinction. In 1938 he was transferred back to the North Arkansas Conference, where he held pastorates in the First Methodist Churches at Clarksville, Paragould and Newport. In 1954 he was returned to the Little Rock Conference and assigned to Highland Methodist Church, Little Rock. His last pastorates were in Warren, Hamburg and Lake Village.

After his retirement, Bro. Ames chose Lake Village, Arkansas, for his residence. At that time he was ill and thereafter suffered much until his death on July 7, 1964, in Union Memorial Hospital at El Dorado, Arkansas. On July 9, 1964, he was buried there in Arlington Cemetery. His funeral services were conducted in the First Methodist Church, El Dorado, by its pastor, the Rev. C. Ray Hozendorf. The Rev. Joel Cooper, pastor of Winfield Methodist Church, Little Rock, assisted.

He was survived by his wife, three children and ten grandchildren; also, by a brother, W. D. Ames, Santa Rosa, Texas, and two sisters, Mrs. Ruth Ames Bryant of Camden and Mrs. Mattie Lee Ames Luce, then teaching in Africa.

The pattern of the life of a man creates in others an image of him by his appearance, his conduct, his words and his actions.

"Brother Guy," as he liked to be called, was physically attractive and dressed immaculately. He was courageous, individualistic and realistic. His personality radiated an aura of magnificence. His candor, sincerity and compassion were distinctive. He loved people.

He had that rare talent of sensing the needs of his fellowmen. To the weak and heavy ladened, he was given to extend his hand. Whether their needs were financial, physical or spiritual, sacrificially and without regard to personal loss, he shared of that which he had without regard to age, race, creed or color. In addition, he always gave to them the key "that unlocks the door into the Kingdom of God." Because Guy Chetwood Ames put his hands on the shoulders of so many "in a friendly sort of way" as his Lord and Master had done, thousands whom he met along the way in the forty years of his Christian Ministry will long mourn his loss and look to join him someday in that happy Eternal Land of Tomorrow.

### T. P. CLARK

The Reverend Thomas Powell Clark was born July 2, 1867, at Calico Rock, Ark. He departed this life December 23, 1964. He retired from the Little Rock Conference in 1924 because of ill health and the last eight years he had been bed fast.



He attended McCoulley Teachers at Madisonville, Ky. and Marvin College at Clinton, Ky. He did graduate work at the University of Chicago. He was admitted into the Memphis Conference in 1892. Ark., in whose home he spent the last years of his life.


Bro. Clark lived and did his work in a time when the Church needed an apologist. Bro. Clark prepared himself for this task and was known as the best in this field.

Mrs. Miller was a diligent student, effective teacher and a faithful worker in every church which her husband served. She was active in the Woman's Society of Christian Service and in every phase of the work of the church. Her specialty, however, was children's work. She was one of the first in the Little Rock Conference to receive the coveted "Blue Seal Diploma" for teacher training. For ten years she served as Director of Children's Work in the Monticello District; and she was either a division or a department superintendent in the children's division on practically every church her husband served. At the time of her death she was the Conference Secretary of Childrens' Work for the Womans' Society of Christian Service; and had just accepted the position of District Director of Childrens' Work for the Camden District.

Working with children she ever kept the inquisitive mind, the buoyant spirit and the bright optimism of a child — about whom we recall Jesus said, "Of such is the kingdom of heaven." She was ever growing and learning. When asked about retirement she would always say, "There is no time to quit in the Lord's work — and who wants to dry up anyway?"

The work of the Lord came first with her, but next to her Church the chief interest of her life was her home. She was a loving wife and helpmate, sharing all the cares and responsibilities of the ministry with her husband. She was also a devoted and wise mother and grandmother; and a very effective homemaker.

She loved flowers and won many awards for her flower arrangements. Two of these appeared in the 1964 and the 1965 Engagement Calendar of the Arkansas Federation of Garden Clubs.

She was loved by many friends she had made and her family. On this particular trip back to Arkansas, after visiting their family, she and her husband had stayed over night with a family at Columbus, before leaving early the morning of February 17, 1965, when they met with the traffic accident at Fulton, Arkansas, that brought her untimely death and seriously injured her husband. Her contribution to the Kingdom is not written in books, but in the hearts of many people.

She was born November 4, 1989, in Arkansas. Age 66.

# X. Miscellaneous

# CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

1. Nominations. The District Superintendents shall nominate all members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees

members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees except as otherwise provided.

2. Conference Program. There shall be a Conference Council composed of the Presiding Officers of the following boards and agencies: the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the M.Y.F., the Committee on Christian Vocations, Camp Tanako, the Town and Country Commission, the Arkansas Methodist, the Board of Lay Activities, Missions, Social Concerns, Education, Evangelism, Ministerial Training, Pensions, Historical Society, Hospitals and Homes, the Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs, the President of the Ministers' Wive's Organization, a representative of the Methodist Student Movement, a Wesley Foundation Director, the Conference Secretary, Conference Treasurer, the employed executor, the Conference Secretary, Conference Treasurer, the employed executive officers of the above named agencies, provided that it shall include all Little Rock Conference members of the Area Council, and other such boards, and officers as the Conference may direct, whose duties shall be:

To co-operate with the Area Council.
To plan the program for the Annual Conference Session at least 30 days before the session. The pastor host of the annual session of the Conference shall be deemed a full member of the Conference Council when it is working on the program for the annual session. The Council shall provide for all preaching, inspirational and anniversaries and other services of the Annual Conference Session. The Conference shall pay the expenses thereof out of the Administrative Fund.

The Council shall meet within 20 days after the close of each Annual Conference Session to prepare the Conference Calendar. Changes in the calendar thus prepared may be changed when found necessary by the Bishop and the Cabinet.

The Council shall have such other duties as the Conference

may from time to time assign to it.

3. Financial and Statistical. (1) The District Superintendents shall furnish the treasurer with all assessments and acceptances of the pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the meeting of the Annual Conference. These figures shall be official. (2) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars, with no column for cents. (3) Each pastor shall report to the Conference Treasurer and turn in his statistical report to the statistician at a date set by urer and turn in his statistical report to the statistician at a date set by the cabinet. This date shall be at least seven (7) days prior to the starting date of Annual Conference. The Pastor's Reports received at this time shall be entered into the Annual Conference Statistical Tables without change. Any unanticipated funds received after the aforesaid date shall be entered in the Journal on a separate page.) (4) The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be June 1st to May 31st, and all salaries and connectional askings of the churches shall be paid on this basis basis.

Memoirs. There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased Clerical Member of the Conference, containing date and place of hirth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, name of children, charges served and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with his memoir. The memoirs of the wives or widows of clerical members of the Conference shall be published in the Journal. The name of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs the passing of any person whose memoir shall appear in the Journal. It shall be the duty of District Superintendents to report to

the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions the death of any

conference claimant that occurs in their respective districts.

5. Administrative Fund. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall recommend an assessment for a Conference administrative fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expense of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this fund. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the fund. Payments from the fund shall be made only on vouchers signed by the secretary of the Conference; provided that this rule does not relate to the salary and expenses of the Treasurer of the Conference.

6. Conference Treasurer. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the Conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Anual Conference shall assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer on recommendation of the World Service Commission, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.

7. Number of Districts. There shall be six districts in the Little

Rock Conference.

8. District Fund. The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall report to the district conference, annually, showing receipts and disbursements.

9. Reports and Resolutions. There shall be a pre-conference report which shall contain reports of all the boards and agencies of the Conference. This report shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Annual Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the preconference reports shall be typewritten, in triplicate, on special forms of the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary shall be typewritten. furnished by the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary. In the event editing of a report is deemed necessary by the Conference Secretary and chairman of the board involved, permission is hereby granted.

10. Membership of Historical Society. The Historical Society shall be composed of ten members, one of whom shall be the Conference Secretary. In addition to the duties outlined in the Discipline, the Society shall secure a group picture of each class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal; and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his retirement.

- 11. Safeguarding Historical Material. (1) Any member of the Little Rock Annual Conference, or layman authorized by a member of the Conference, may examine Historical documents within Headquarters Building. (2) To remove historical documents from Headquarters Building, a written request signed by the presiding Bishop and Conference Secretary shall be presented to the Custodian. Provided further, historial documents belonging to the Conference Woman's Society may be removed from Headquarters Building upon written request signed by the President and Secretary of the Woman's Conference. (3) The Custodian of Historical documents shall be given a receipt for any management of the world in the world in the conference. terial removed from the vault in Headquarters Building, Little Rock, giving date of removal and name of receiver.
- 12. District Conference. There shall be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline and one additional member from each pastoral charge, provided, however, in charges of more than five hundred mem-

bers there shall be one additional member for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.

13. Lay Members. Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the pastor-host of the Annual Conference at least fifteen days before the

session of the Annual Conference.

14. Board Service. No person may be nominated to serve on the same Conference Board for more than two consecutive quadrenniums, and may not be nominated to serve on more than one board at the same time. District Superintendents may not serve on Conference Boards, except as provided in the Discipline or by specific conference action. A person failing to attend a board, of which he is a member in a quadrennium may be continued only by special board action.

15. Entertainment. The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the retired ministers shall be entertained from the entertainment fund. Each member of the Conference, both clerical and lay and supply pastors in attendance shall pay \$1.00 registration fee to the entertainment fund, and all offerings unless otherwise specified shall go to the fund. The entertainment fund shall be administered by a committee composed of the pastor-host and two other persons elected by the Conference Council reporting in the next session of the Annual Conference.

16. Conference Expense. Registration fees and the offerings at the public services in the session of the Annual Conference shall be used to defray the expense of the session including the expense and/or honorarium of the conference preacher and that any deficit remaining be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund, and the Conference

Treasurer shall pay the same.

17. Pastor's Traveling Expense. After the Fourth Quarterly Conference of a charge has set the minimum salary of a pastor for the ensuing year, the Quarterly Conference may set the traveling expense fund for the pastor in an amount not to exceed \$1,200.00 per year for each pastor and associate pastor assigned to a pastoral charge, provided, however, that charges of more than one church may allow an additional \$300.00 travel expense per each additional church.

Provided further, that no salary may be lowered to initiate an ex-

pense fund or to increase an existing expense fund.

- 18. Pastor's Utilities. At the Fourth Quarterly Conference after a Charge has set the minimum salary of a pastor for the ensuing year, the Quarterly Conference may so direct that an amount not to exceed \$600 may be paid by the church for parsonage utilities, provided, however, that the pastor's salary and travel allowance is not lowered to do this, and that this money will be used by the church and/or pastor for parsonage utilities only. Further, this amount shall be subject and no apportionment by any group or to pay into any fund. Be it further provided that a church may designate a part of the pastor's salary as utilities for income tax purposes.
- 19. Unsponsored Resolutions. Any resolution not sponsored by a regular board or standing committee of the Conference must lie over for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon provided, however, immediate debate and action may be ordered by two-thirds vote of the Conference presence and voting.
- 20. Apportionments Based on Pastor's Salary. On all items apportioned to local churches by means of a percentage of the ministers salary; such percentage shall be understood to apply to all ministerial members of the local church staff, serving under the appointment of the Bishop, including ministers in full connection, ministers on trial, and full time approved supply pastors. This rule to be in effect with the 1966-1967 Conference Year.
- 21. Amendments. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the

Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.
