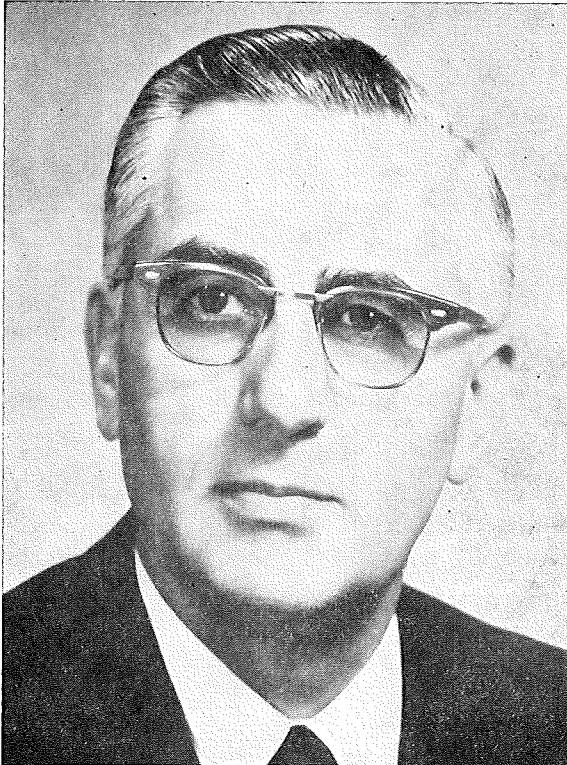

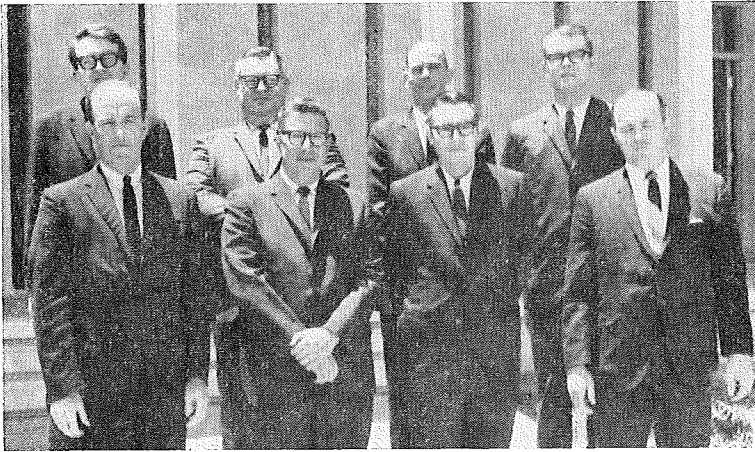

CONFERENCE MINUTES

Monday, May 23, 1966 — 4:30 P.M.

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper: Bishop Paul V. Galloway announced the opening hymn, 402, "And Are We Yet Alive." Following the singing of the hymn he led the Conference in prayer. Bishop Galloway then led the Conference in the ritual for The Administration of the Sacrament of The Lord's Supper, found on page 523 of The Methodist Hymnal. He was assisted by Charles W. Richards and D. Mouzon Mann. Mrs. Trice Ellis, Jr. sang a solo, "Let Us Break Bread Together." She was accompanied by Miss Kay Bell, organist of First Methodist Church. Bishop Galloway then gave the invitation to the Table of The Lord and spoke of its deep meaning in the hearts of Christian men and women: it is a time of recalling and remembering, a time of fresh commitment and a time of new oneness as God's own people. He suggested that next year the conference be concluded instead of being begun with the communion service. The ritual was completed with the officiating ministers kneeling about the table. J. Ralph Clayton, Marshall A. Bridwell, Otto W. Teague and Joe R. Phillips, members of the cabinet, joined in the service by assisting in serving the elements and dismissing the tables. Bishop Galloway invited the Conference to turn to page 535 in The Methodist Hymnal and J. Ralph Clayton led the Conference in the concluding prayers of the Ritual. The Conference stood for the Gloria Patri and Bishop Galloway pronounced the benediction.

Monday, May 23

Evening

Worship Service: Bishop Galloway announced the hymn, 183 in The Methodist Hymnal, "Spirit of Faith Come Down." James E. Major, Vice President of Hendrix College and Secretary of The Conference, led the conference in prayer. The sanctuary choir from First Methodist Church, Arkadelphia, directed by Gene Kyper, sang the anthem. Joe R. Phillips, Secretary of the Cabinet, read the report of the District Superintendents. He noted an increase of 443 over last year's membership. He moved the recommendations be filed for action at a later time. After being duly seconded, it was done. The offering was received as the sanctuary choir of First Methodist Church, Arkadelphia, sang the offertory anthem. After the offering was received the Doxology was sung. Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation to Fred R. Harrison and the host church for their kindnesses to the conference delegates and presented the conference preacher, Bishop Kenneth W. Copeland of the Nebraska Area, who brought the evening message on the theme "God Keeps the Faith." Bishop Galloway announced the closing hymn, 60, "Praise to The Lord", and George Wayne Martin pronounced the benediction.

Tuesday, May 24

Morning

Devotional: Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation to Mrs. John Morris who was at the organ. He announced hymn, 31 in "Selections from The Methodist Hymnal," "Am I a Soldier of the Cross." Bishop Galloway gave the devotional based on the opening verses of Matthew. His theme was "The Meaning of The Annual Conference and the Church."

Welcome: Fred R. Harrison, host pastor, presented Jack Wells, Superintendent of First Methodist Church School, Who gave the welcome to the conference.

Methodist Publishing House: Mr. Bill Wright, representing the Methodist Publishing House, lifted up several new books of interest and presented to the conference a check in the amount of \$5,127.00 for the Board of Pensions.

Pensions: Raymond Franks of Lakeside Methodist Church presented a check in the amount of \$2,000.00 from the Brewster Memorial Fund which was directed to the Board of Pensions.

Historical Society: Harold Sadler presented Stanley Baugh who gave the report of the Society. Robert E. L. Bearden reported on the Bicentennial convention held at Baltimore this year. Harold Sadler presented Bishop Galloway with a gavel, tooled from wood from the site of Old Henry's Chapel near Hope, the first Methodist Church constructed in the bounds of the Little Rock Conference. He also presented a parchment to the Bishop, who in turn presented it to the District Superintendent of the Hope District for the pastor of Washington Church, the oldest congregation in the Little Rock Conference with continuous service. Robert E. L. Bearden presented the Bishop with a picture of the Washington Church which was taken by Bob Moore, Jr. He also called attention to the display of the Historical Society in the basement. The report was adopted.

Roll Call: James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference, called attention to the fact that attendance is being taken at the registration desk in the basement.

Secretarial Staff: James E. Major announced the members of his secretary staff: Journal Clerk: Woodrow W. Smith; Head Teller: Harold K. Davis; Secretary of Minister's Service Records: Kenneth L. Spore; Staff Assistants: O. D. Peters, Gladwin Connell; Tellers: Don Nolley, Sam Jones, Ralph Hale and Larry Nicholson.

Bar of the Conference: James E. Major moved that the bar of the conference be from the archway forward. The motion was adopted.

Telegram: Bishop Galloway read a telegram urging attendance at the forthcoming Family Life Conference.

Nominations: Joe R. Phillips, Secretary of the Cabinet, made the Cabinet nominations. They were adopted.

Personal Privilege: Fred R. Harrison asked John Miles and Bob Trieschmann to present Mrs. Galloway to the Conference. Delegates stood in appreciation.

Area Council Executive Committee: Joel Cooper presented the report of the committee. Bishop Galloway spoke to the recommendation that the Area Executive Secretary not be appointed this year. Question was called and the motion passed.

Clarification: James E. Major asked for instructions on how to carry the report of the Area Council in the Journal. C. Ray Hozendorf moved that the report be published in the Journal as prepared in the Pre-conference Reports. E. Clifton Rule asked that the new action by the conference be included. It was accepted by C. Ray Hozendorf. The motion was seconded by Arthur Terry and passed.

Social Concerns: Charles Ramsey, Chairman of the Board, made the report of the Board. The report was adopted.

Conference Relations: Kenneth L. Spore presented Wendell Hoover who gave report No. 1 of the Committee on Conference Relations and recommended that the character of the ministers be passed. The report was adopted.

Board of Pensions: George Meyer, Chairman, presented Charles Ashcraft, Secretary, who read the report of the Board. George Meyer spoke to the report. Harold Sadler and Charles Richards asked for clarification. Question was called and the report was adopted. Bishop Galloway spoke of his concern regarding the importance of careful study and analysis in the area of pensions and expressed appreciation to the leadership of the Board.

Insurance Commission: Sidney Goode read the report of the Commission. Harold Sadler, Clem Baker, Tom Abney and others asked for clarification. Question was called and the report was adopted. Bishop Galloway encouraged ministers to sign up for the insurance program at the desk in the basement. Clem Baker moved that the conference give Sidney Goode a vote of appreciation for his work. It was done.

Personal Privilege: Bishop Galloway presented Dr. Clem Baker who has attended 65 Annual Conference Sessions. E. Clifton Rule, Stanley Baugh and Leland Clegg, who have attended at least 50 annual conferences were also recognized. Alfred Knox requested a picture of the group be taken.

Courtesies: Robert Trieschmann presented Mrs. Robert Milwee, Bishop Galloway's Secretary, and Clint Burleson to the Conference.

Appreciation: Charles W. Richards expressed appreciation to the Hospitality Committee for their courtesies to the members of the Cabinet.

TRAFCO: Everett Patton, Secretary of the Board, gave the report. Gerald Fincher asked for clarification on the 10¢ per member which is over-and-above the connectional item. Question was called and the report was adopted.

Christian Civic Foundation: Wm. E. Brown, Executive Secretary, gave the report of the Foundation. He noted that for 59 years he has received an appointment from a Bishop and that this will be his last time to speak before the annual conference. The Conference stood in appreciation and Bishop Galloway expressed his gratitude for Bill Brown's leadership and friendship. The report was adopted.

Board of Evangelism: Kenneth L. Spore presented Palmer Garner, Secretary of the Board, who read the report. In the absence of W. D. Golden, Executive secretary, Bishop Galloway spoke to the report with special emphasis on the mobility of our people. He also said evangelism is the Gospel, it is love, it is alive, and it is urgent. The report was adopted.

Christian Vocation: Gerald K. Fincher, Chairman, presented the report. The report was adopted.

Conference Statistician: Gerald K. Fincher, Conference Statistician, gave his report to the conference. He noted that attendance at morning worship services in the conference was 540 more than reported last year. He also noted that giving to the churches was increased by \$90,572.00 over a year ago. The report was adopted. Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for Gerald Fincher's services to the conference.

W. D. Golden: Bishop Galloway presented W. D. Golden to speak to the conference relative to the report of the Board of Evangelism. He called attention to the training opportunities at Mt. Sequoyah.

Mt. Sequoyah: B. T. Fooks represented Western Methodist Assembly at Mt. Sequoyah and brought the report to the conference. He noted that both the Little Rock and the North Arkansas Conferences have met their \$10.00 per charge apportionment in full.

Recess: Bishop Galloway announced a twenty-minute recess before the preaching service. He expressed appreciation for the fine spirit manifested by the conference.

Announcement: Various Board chairman announced the time and meeting places of their boards.

Presentation: Bishop Galloway presented James Argue who has been named a new member of the General Board of Evangelism.

Recess was then called.

Service of Commemoration: Following the organ prelude Charles E. Ramsey, who conducted the service, announced those participating in the service and the opening hymn, 422 in the Methodist Hymnal, "Come, Let Us Join Our Friends Above." Harold K. Davis read the scripture lesson and James Shaddox led the prayer. James E. Major, Secretary of the conference, read the record of remembrance while the congregation stood in prayerful remembrance of Cecil R. Culver, Alfred E. Jacobs and R. E. Simpson, members of the Conference, Ernest F. Pine, J. R. Martin, and W. E. West, Approved Supply; Mrs. R. B. Moore, Jr., Minister's wife, Marion W. Miller gave the commemoration message. The closing hymn, 416 in the Methodist Hymnal, "Blest Be The Tie That Binds." Charles Ramsey pronounced the benediction.

May 24

Afternoon Session

3:30 p.m.

Preaching Service: George Meyer presided over the service. He announced hymn, 381, "The Church's One Foundation" after the singing of which Robert E. L. Bearden led the conference in prayer. George Meyer read the scripture lesson and then announced the hymn, 162, "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing."

Bishop Kenneth W. Copeland brought the message. His theme was "The Renewal of the Church begins with the renewal of our Christology." He answered the question "Whom do you say that I am" by using the words Revelation, Relationship and Redemption. The closing hymn was, 164, "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name." Bishop Copeland pronounced the benediction.

May 24

Evening Session

7:30 p.m.

Evening Worship: Following the prelude, Edward B. Hollenbeck, who presided at the service, announced hymn, 220, "Majestic Sweetness Sits Enthroned." Kenneth L. Spore led the conference in prayer. Edward Hollenbeck announced hymn, 242, "He Leadeth Me" following which the offering was received. Special music was furnished by the Hot Springs Choral Club, directed by Mrs. D. O. Sims. The Doxology was sung upon the presentation of the offering.

Bishop Kenneth W. Copeland expressed appreciation for the choir, and for the role music has played in Methodist history. As a basis for his message Bishop Copeland read Acts 1:1-8. His theme was "The Church" which, he said, has a dual purpose: "to be drawn out of the world to worship and to be driven back out into the world to witness." Edward Hollenbeck announced the hymn of dedication, 60, "Praise to the Lord," after the singing of which he pronounced the benediction.

Wednesday, May 25

Morning Session

Devotional: Following the prelude Bishop Galloway announced the hymn, 53 in "Selections from The Methodist Hymnal," "O For A Thousand Tongues to Sing." The Scripture was John 6:1-11, the story of the boy with five loaves and two fishes, which Bishop Galloway used as the basis of his devotional message. After the message Bishop Galloway led the conference in prayer.

Books: Bishop Galloway lifted up several books for study and recommended their purchase by ministers.

Registration and Roll Call: James E. Major reminded all delegates of the registration and roll call in the basement of the church and encouraged those who have not registered to do so today.

Conference Board of Trustees: Kenneth M. Goode, Chairman, invited O. W. Hoover, Secretary, to read the report of the Board. Joe R. Phillips moved and Charles Richards seconded that the report be approved. It was done. A resolution was presented to the conference relative to property formerly owned by the church in Drew County. Joe R. Phillips spoke to the resolution. Mouzon Mann moved that the resolution be adopted. It was done.

Clarification: James E. Major asked if the articles of incorporation had been approved. Bishop Galloway asked for a vote; it was done, and the articles of incorporation were approved.

Articles of Incorporation: Harold Sadler moved that the Articles of Incorporation be published in the Journal. The motion passed.

Arkansas Methodist Commission: Arthur Terry presented the report of the Commission and then spoke of the fine work done for the Church by **The Arkansas Methodist**. He also noted a 50¢ increase in the subscription price. Words of appreciation were expressed, both by Arthur Terry and Bishop Galloway, for Alfred Knox, editor of the church paper, who then spoke to the conference. Arthur Terry moved the adoption of the report. Tommy Reynolds asked for clarification of the attitude of the Arkansas Methodist relative to the EUB merger as reported in the church paper. Question was called. The report was adopted.

Courtesies: Dr. Dean Joe Quillian, of SMU, Myers Curtis, Hal Sessions, George Stewart, Ethan Dodgen, Frank Ham, Bill Dunker and Wayne Jarvis, Dr. and Mrs. Wayland, Earl Carter and Floyd Villines were presented to the conference by Robert Trieschmann and John Miles.

Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild: Mrs. Edgar Dixon, Conference President, gave the report of the women's work in the Church. The report was accepted.

Episcopal Residence: Bishop Galloway spoke to the report and asked that the report be filed.

Perkins School of Theology: Dean Joe Quillian brought greetings from the Seminary, expressed appreciation for the young men sent from the conference to study at the seminary and brought to the conference a report from the seminary. Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for Dean Quillian and lifted up the possibility of continuing theological education for ministers and laymen in the years immediately ahead.

Presiding Officers: Bishop Galloway invited Bishop Kenneth W. Copeland to preside over the Conference. He noted a letter received from Alva C. Rogers who could not be present and a telegram from the Quapaw Area of Boy Scouts, expressing appreciation to the Church for its cooperation in fostering the Boy Scout program.

Board of Missions: Bishop Kenneth W. Copeland, presiding officer, brought greetings to the Conference from the General Board of Missions and called for the report of the Conference Board. C. Ray Hozendorf, Chairman, presented Edward B. Hollenbeck, Secretary, who read the report regarding policy for the use of Church Extension Funds. Ralph Hale and Bill Barron asked for clarification of a section of the report. The motion for adoption was made and the report was accepted. Edward Hollenbeck then read the Policy of Qualification for Mission Salary Aid recommended by the Board. James E. Major asked for clarification of Section 9. John Miles moved that Section 9 be deleted. It was seconded by Ralph Hale. The motion lost. Wayne Jarvis asked for clarification on Section 3. Question was called and the policy as recommended was adopted. C. Ray Hozendorf presented the report of the Board as recorded in the Pre-conference Reports and moved its adoption. Ferris Norton, Conference Missionary Secretary, spoke to the report. Bishop Galloway was presented to the Conference by Bishop Copeland. He then told the conference of the work and witness of the Dwayne Suters, missionaries to the Philippines, who are to be guests of our conference in July. Mrs. Russell Henderson and Luther Miller, both of whom are members of The General Board of Missions, were recognized. The report in its entirety was adopted.

Missions: Bishop Copeland expressed two vital words about the mission program of The Church: (1) expression of appreciation for Bishop Galloway's sensitivity to missions and his ability to interpret it; (2) a genuine "thanks" for the support of the church to the missionary program. He was especially appreciative of the contribution of the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

Personal Privilege: C. Ray Hozendorf presented a gavel to Bishop Galloway toolled from heart pine timber secured from the chancel of the Methodist Church in Magnolia, constructed in 1908 and demolished to make way for new construction in 1958.

Commission on World Service and Finance: James T. Gooch, Chairman, expressed appreciation for the contribution Bishop Copeland is making to the Conference session. He called attention to the report of the Commission as published in the Pre-conference Reports and asked Edwin B. Dodson, Secretary, to present the report as amended by the Board. He moved the adoption of the report. Arthur Terry called attention to a part of the report that might be mis-interpreted. The report was adopted.

Area Treasurer: Grafton Thomas, Area Treasurer, expressed appreciation to the Conference for their approval of the data processing system that was recommended by the World Service Commission for use in the Treasurer's office. He read his report and expressed appreciation for the services of Thelma Averitt in his office. The report was adopted.

Courtesy: Robert Treischmann presented Ethan Dodgen, Meyers Curtis, Sam Teague, Chaplain Hal R. Sessions, Archie Boyd and Elmer Holifield.

Board of Lay Activities: S. H. Allman, Chairman, gave the report of the board. The report was adopted. He announced the Laymen's Luncheon and invited everyone to attend the Laymen's session at 2:00 p.m. Bishop Galloway encouraged attendance.

Board of Ministerial Training: Joel Cooper, Chairman, presented Louis Mulkey, Secretary, who read report No. 2 of the Board — "Policy and Program."

Conference Relations: Kenneth L. Spore presented Wendell Hoover who gave the second report of the Committee. James E. Major, Henry

Jenske and Marshall A. Bridwell asked for corrections of names on the Retired Ministers roll. The list was approved. The retired approved supply list was read and approved. Those retiring (J. C. Van Horn, W. R. Johnson and Dewey H. Rogers.) were presented and were given an opportunity to speak. (Mr. Rogers was not present) Bishop Galloway called their wives to the front and the Conference stood in appreciation. George Meyer presented them with pins from the Board of Pensions. The report of the Conference Relations Committee was adopted.

Ministerial Training Offering: Joel Cooper spoke to the special Jurisdictional Education Fund and reported that this year we will give over \$6,000 to this fund rather than the \$2,000 as announced by Dean Quillian. Arthur Terry also spoke to this matter to say that the Little Rock Conference is doing its part.

Retirement: Stanley Baugh noted that this is the first year we have had no Effective member of the conference retire.

Minutes: Cagle Fair reported that the minutes had been read and approved.

Minimum Salary Commission: John O. Alston, Chairman, gave the report of the Commission. It was adopted. John Alston expressed appreciation for the services of the retiring secretary of the Board, W. T. Bone. The Conference stood in appreciation of his work.

Board of Hospitals and Homes: W. Braska Savage, Chairman, presented Irl Bridenthal, Secretary, who gave the report of the Board. The report was adopted. Edwin Keith, Superintendent of the Methodist Children's Home, spoke to the conference.

Standing Rule: Monzell Silkwood, lay delegate from St. Paul's Church, El Dorado, presented a standing rule regarding campaigns to the conference. Bishop Galloway requested that the matter be presented to the World Service Commission and the Cabinet before being brought before the Conference.

Camp Tanako: W. Neill Hart, Executive Secretary, gave the report of the Board. He expressed appreciation for the services of Mr. & Mrs. Fred Milner, custodians at the camp, and recognized Mrs. Milner who was present at the conference. The report was adopted.

Announcements: Harold Sadler, Tom Nation, Pryor Cruce and James E. Major made announcements.

Adjournment: Robert B. Moore, Sr. dismissed this session of the Conference.

Wednesday, May 25

Evening Session — 7:30

Preaching Service: Following the prelude, John Lindsey announced hymn, 23, "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing." James Robert Scott led the conference in prayer. John Lindsey announced hymn, 244, "My Hope is Built on Jesus Blood and Righteousness," after the singing of which, he expressed appreciation for the host church and introduced the Conference preacher. The offering was then received, and the offertory anthem was sung by the choir of Oaklawn Methodist Church, directed by Mrs. Bonnie Hardin. Miss Kaye Bell was at the organ. As the offering was received the conference stood for the Doxology. Bishop Kenneth W. Copeland brought the evening message. As a basis for his message Bishop Copeland used Paul's words from the opening verses of his letter to Rome — "Called to be saints." "The Christian," he said, "is called,

commissioned and committed." John Lindsey announced hymn, 287, "A Charge to Keep I Have" after the singing of which he pronounced the benediction.

Thursday, May 26

Morning Session

Devotional: Following the prelude, Bishop Galloway announced the hymn, 21 in The Selections from the Methodist Hymnal, "Holy, Holy, Holy." Dr. J. Otis Young, Associate Publisher of the Methodist Publishing House and personal friend of Bishop Galloway, a member of The Ohio Conference, gave the devotional message. His theme was "God Still Rules the World."

Minutes: John Ross reported that the minutes had been read and approved.

Roll Call and Registration: James E. Major, Conference Secretary, asked all delegates who have not registered to do so at the designated desk in the basement. Bishop Galloway requested that the Secretary register for Marshall T. Steel who on the Bishop's insistence was preaching in Oklahoma.

District Conference Journals: W. Darrell Bone reported that the journals were in order but that one District Journal had not been turned in. Bishop Galloway asked which District and Darrell Bone said, "I'd rather not say." The Bishop encouraged the delinquent to confess.

Headquarters Building: Bishop Galloway made the report and E. Clifton Rule moved that the Headquarter's Commission be continued. It was seconded by Harold Sadler and passed.

Adjournment: Bishop Galloway announced that the business of the Conference could be finished today and that following the ordination service tonight, the appointments would be read and the conference adjourned.

Outlaw, Jr.; Part-time Chaplain Veterans Administration: James W. Workman. Personal Privilege: James E. Major, Conference Secretary, requested that persons making reports to give him two copies of the report to expedite the work in his office.

Personal Privilege: John Miles presented Herbert McConnell. He also announced that Ralph Sewell had been given a high honor: he was elected Chaplain of the La Societe Aumonier National at Kansas City, Mo., in September, 1965. He will open and close all sessions of National Promenade and conduct a memorial service at Baltimore, Md., in September, 1966. The Conference applauded.

Memoirs: Charles Ramsey gave the report of the committee. It was adopted.

Greetings: Ralph Sewell brought greetings from the La Societe of which he is National Chaplain.

Publishing Interests: C. Ray Hozendorf gave the report of the Committee. Dr. J. Otis Young, associate Publisher of the Methodist Publishing House, spoke to the report and it was adopted.

Courtesy: Robert W. Trieschmann presented guests to the conference: Ministers: James Blassengame, Wallace Reniger; special lay delegates from Watson-Kelso Charge: Mrs. F. Zachery (91 years) and Jesse McGehee (89 years). Marshall T. Steel presented Rev. Antonio Rolim from Brazil to the conference. The delegates stood in appreciation. Bishop Galloway asked Rev. Rolim to bring greetings which he did.

Board of Pensions: Charles Ashcraft gave an additional report for the Board of Pensions. It was adopted.

Board of Education: Fred R. Harrison, Chairman, presented William D. Elliott, Secretary, who gave Report No. 1. Neill Hart, Executive Secretary of the Board, spoke to the report. He then presented the members of his staff, Mrs. Marie Tucker and F. Gladwin Connell, both of whom reported on their work. Fred Harrison moved adoption of Report No. 1. George Wayne Martin seconded the motion and it was adopted.

Standing Rule: Monzell Silkwood spoke to his resolution, regarding campaigns, submitted yesterday. When a question concerning parliamentary procedure arose, Bishop Galloway ruled that the matter could be acted upon if so desired. Mr. Silkwood moved that the matter be filed with the Secretary and be considered at the next session of the annual conference. Charles Richards seconded the motion, it was granted, and the resolution was filed without consideration.

St. Paul School of Theology Methodist: Dean William Case reported to the Conference of the work being done at the Seminary.

Joint Commission on Education and Cultivation — Board of Missions: William A. Cheyne, Director of Department of the Advance, spoke regarding the mission of the church in Latin America and Spanish-speaking work. He urged increased support of the Advance Special.

Minutes: James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference, requested permission for the committee on minutes to read and approve the minutes.

Evening Session





Reports

REPORT OF THE AREA COUNCIL OF ARKANSAS METHODISM

I am delighted with the interest and cooperation that we receive from the Boards and their chairmen and executives in the planning of the program of Arkansas Methodism. This year we have had monthly meetings of the paid staff of the field workers in Arkansas. This has enabled us to do some effective planning and to coordinate the program of the churches in the state.

The planning committee or the executive committee of the Area Council has met every other month this Conference year and has given us guidance and help in the work that we try to do. The Area Council has had two meetings this year, and there has been a fine spirit, good planning, and helpful suggestions in showing us how we can implement the program that has been outlined by the various Boards, Commissions, and Committees of the two Conferences. The vision, the well-planned programs, and the willingness on the part of the Boards to promote their programs has made the work of the staff much easier and more effective. I rejoice in the fact that the growing concern of one program in the two Conferences of Arkansas Methodism is more and more being accepted and appreciated by greater numbers of people.

This year at the present time, February 16, we are showing a net increase in church membership. We are showing increased giving in our world service, in our advance specials, national and world, in our ministerial training offerings, and in the other concerns of the church. In 1961-62 we handled a total of \$1,741,169.97 through the Area Treasurer's office. Last year 1964-65 we handled \$1,936,877.00, which makes an increase last year over 1961-62 of \$195,707.12 handled in our Treasurer's office.

A study of the work of Methodism in Arkansas during the past four years reveals that the membership in Arkansas Methodism has grown from a total of 180,734 to 183,023. Our church school membership has grown from a total of 123,199 to 123,622. Our most disappointing statistic reveals that the average attendance in our Sunday School has decreased over the last four years from an average attendance each Sunday of 66,649 to 63,099.

In the new day in Christian education, we hope to be able to share with our people in such a way that this unusual loss will be changed to a wonderful gain. We look to the future with confidence and hope.

In Bishop Galloway, we have a great leader who will guide us on to great achievements. In the District Superintendency, we have capable leaders. In the pastorates, we have trained, efficient, and dedicated men. In the connectional offices, we have outstanding leaders. And in the laity, we have unexcelled leadership which is dedicated to making the Kingdom of this state and this world become the Kingdom of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

3. That — the Area Council be empowered to authorize the expenditure of funds from this program for such items as office rentals, travel for council members, specialized leadership in areas of evangelism, stewardship, missions, education, etc., and other necessary incidentals.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS REPORT

To Bishop Paul V. Galloway and members of the One Hundred Thirtieth session of the Little Rock Annual Conference:

Each Conference Year serves as a convincing demonstration of the concern and service of our Methodist People in the Little Rock Conference. The 379 churches of our Conference have received into the membership of The Methodist Church 4,760 persons. 2,162 of these are "new Methodists", having been received by Profession of Faith and from other communions. Our present membership is 84,422 — an increase of 443 over the previous year. Our pastors have baptized 1,324 persons, and our Preparatory Membership enrolls 5,538 individuals — an increase of 124 over our last report.

Three hundred fifty-five Church Schools enroll a membership of 57,549, with an average attendance each Sunday of 28,127. In our Vacation Church Schools 10,457 children have shared in an intensive and specialized Christian Education experience.

We call your particular attention to Report No. 1 of the Conference Board of Education in which the challenging new program "A New Day In Christian Education" is set before us.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service reports a membership of 11,492. This organization has paid out \$65,946 for local work, and has remitted to District and Conference Treasurers \$124,847. Membership in The Methodist Mens Clubs stands at 2,829 — an increase of 108 when compared with the year preceeding.

In the area of temporal concerns our records show that we hold church properties valued at \$26,370,242. Our parsonages are appraised at \$3,326,240, and we hold other assets valued at \$1,152,840.

The Cabinet has spent much time in considering the total work of the Church in terms of its general effectiveness and the directions taken in specific programs. This consideration has resulted in two recommendations which we submit to the Conference for its action:

1. We recommend that the Conference authorize a Special Committee to be named by the Bishop, to study, in cooperation with the Conference Board of Pensions, the total pension needs and opportunities of our ministers, both Conference Members and Approved Supply Pastors.

2. We recommend that the Little Rock Conference Insurance Committee explore the possibilities of a reciprocal agreement between the insurance companies extending coverage to the two Methodist Conferences in Arkansas, to assure that there be no loss of coverage for men transferring Conferences within the Episcopal Area.

We would be remiss in our duty should we conclude our report without expressing to Bishop Paul V. Galloway our genuine appreciation

for the inspired leadership which he is giving to the Methodist work in Arkansas; — a leadership undertaken and carried out with "a single eye to the glory of God." And, to both Bishop and Mrs. Galloway our gratitude for the warm heart which they have brought to our fellowship and for their unfailing thoughtfulness and understanding spirit which has touched every aspect of the life and work of this Conference.

This has been a good year. We believe that under such leadership the best is yet to come!

REPORT TO JOINT COMMISSION OF ARKANSAS METHODIST, THE LOUISIANA METHODIST

Recommendations to the Annual Conferences

The Joint Commission for The Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist make the following recommendations to the annual conferences:

1. That the dates for the 1967 Circulation Campaign be January 8 to 15.

2. That the goal for the campaign be 41,000 with the quotas for local churches be one subscriber for every seven members reported by that church in the 1966 conference journal.

3. That the subscription price be \$2.50 per year. Where a church sends in a subscription list equal to one for every three members it will become eligible for a rate of \$2 per year.

4. We are grateful for an increasing number of churches using the all-family plan and would like to challenge every district to secure one additional church on this plan. We feel it would be good to give appropriate recognition at the annual conference to the new churches going on this plan each year.

5. We recommend that the Commissions on World Service and Finance of the Louisiana, North Arkansas and Little Rock annual conferences be asked to continue their annual appropriation of \$4,600 each for the support of the papers.

6. That the editor and the chairman of the commission be authorized to sign notes at the Union National Bank, Little Rock, for money that must be borrowed for current operation.

7. That the executive committee be empowered to act for the commission in matters that require attention between meetings of the commission.

8. That the appreciation of the commission be expressed to all those who have made it possible for us to have a good year in 1965. We are especially grateful to Bishop Paul V. Galloway, Bishop Aubrey G. Walton, the 21 district superintendents and the 21 district directors.

We are also indebted to the dozens of people who help us with the thousands of words and the hundreds of pictures which must flow across our desk in a steady stream. If this flow continues, we will continue to give you 50 papers a year in which you will take pride.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

I

We have been involved in the following activities:

1. We promoted attendance at the Annual Regional Coaching Conference at Mt. Sequoyah by providing transportation and registration fees for representatives on the district and local levels.
2. We provided four \$25.00 scholarships to enable members of the Indian Mission Conference and members of the conferences in the Central Jurisdiction to attend the Annual Regional Coaching Conference at Mt. Sequoyah.
3. We cooperated with the Christian Civic Foundation in planning and promoting "Operation Speak-Up", a workshop on alcohol problems for youth.
4. We participated in the area wide program training workshop conducted at Hendrix College and we provided leadership for District Workshops in which the local commission chairmen were instructed in the aims and techniques of the proposed program of Christian Social Concerns in the Little Rock Conference.
5. Reverend Woodrow Smith represented the Board at Conference on Human Relations in New York City and Washington, D. C.
6. Reverend David Hankins represented the Board at Jurisdictional Convocation in Galveston, Texas.
7. We sponsored a United Nations Tour under the leadership of Reverend David Hankins.
8. We held district seminars for pastors on how to help people in trouble, with special emphasis on the moral problems of youth.

II

We recommend the following program and goals for the local church in the year 1966-67:

1. We urge every local church to follow the program of the church as it is outlined in **The Methodist Story** from month to month. We ask that the pastor and chairman of the commission in each local church give special attention to the program planning issue of **The Methodist Story** and make early provision in the church's calendar for the observance of special days of Christian Social Concerns. We request that special attention be given to the observance of **Social Creed Sunday; World Order Sunday, October 23; Commitment Day, November 13; and Race Relations Day, February 12.**
2. We believe that the local church will be greatly benefited by having representation at the **Annual Regional Coaching Conference** at Mt. Sequoyah, and we urge the several district directors to make up car pools to the conference so that expense may be held to a minimum.
3. We request the commissions to work with the Woman's Society of Christian Service in sponsoring and conducting the church-wide study, **Evangelical Faith and Pluralistic Society.**
4. We urge the local church commissions to examine the basic question proposed by the General Board of Christian Social Concerns for this year, "How should the church relate to government?"
5. We commend the "Great Decisions" programs to the Commissions of Christian Social Concern in the local churches as worthy of their support.

III

We propose that the Conference Board actively sponsor and promote the following programs:

1. A foreign policy seminar for Board members and other interested persons.
2. A United Nations tour for youth in cooperation with the Board of Education.
3. To study possible prison reforms and to cooperate with the North Arkansas Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns in establishing a ministry to local and city jails.

We give thanks for the diligent work of the Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas and pledge our cooperation with its activities. We express our deep regret that Dr. William E. Brown who has given the Foundation such excellent leadership, deems it necessary to retire at this time.

REPORT OF

THE CHRISTIAN CIVIC FOUNDATION OF ARKANSAS, INC.

In addition to the Executive Director, the staff is composed of Willard Campbell and Jerry McBride, Educational Assistants, and Mrs. Beverly Williams, Office Secretary.

The Educational Assistants give their time and effort to teaching courses on Alcohol Problems in the Junior and Senior high schools of the state. They have a classroom experience with all students, meeting the English classes. Cooperation from superintendents, principals and teachers is excellent. We find that they are anxious for us to be in their schools. We have reached a total of 190,443 students with a classroom experience.

Two hundred and seventy-six high school seniors from all sections of the state enrolled for our second program of "Operation Speak-Up". Our aim was to prepare them to speak to churches, civic clubs, P.T.A.'s and other organizations. We urge each member of the Conference to open doors in these organizations for their youth who attended.

Legal Control

Local Option elections were held in Poinsett, Ouachita and Calhoun Counties. We have experienced many difficulties. However, we are in the courts in Calhoun County where the wets are challenging our victory at the polls. We lost the election in Poinsett County. We are still in litigation in Ouachita County; however, we have closed down the liquor outlets.

Our greatest problem in the past has been with the Poll Tax qualification for voting. We believe that the new voting law will enable us to have a much better opportunity. It is your Director's opinion that many wet counties can now be voted dry, and we urge the members of this Conference to survey the situation in your local counties and work together with the county organization to reach a decision. Plans should be well under way in March for any Local Option Campaign planned.

We are a member of the American Council on Alcohol Problems which organization is working in the fields of advertising, drinking

on commercial airlines, and endeavoring to have the Department of Education and Welfare make the same survey on alcohol as that on cigarettes.

Finally, more people were killed on our highways during the Christmas and New Year holidays than were killed in Vietnam in 1965. And, scientific surveys credit 54% of these deaths as alcohol related.

Gambling

Probably the outstanding achievement since this organization was formed was the defeat of the Gambling Amendment. CCF set up an organization under the title Churches United Against Gambling. (This organization is still intact with Dr. Cecil R. Culver, Chairman). All of the staff and resources of CCF was placed at the disposal of this Committee. We directed all mailing and the raising of funds. A total of 52 thousand dollars was contributed through the churches of the state and some 15 thousand dollars was raised and expended in the counties.

You know of the controversy surrounding the Garland County Dog Track. Members of the Board deserve thanks for the part they played in bringing about the withdrawal of the franchise.

Your Director has recommended to Churches United Against Gambling that the balance of \$1,875.04 be used to employ a Legislative Secretary to work with the session of the Legislature.

Private Clubs

A great threat to the control of liquor and gambling is contained in the Act introduced by Pulaski County legislators and passed by the Legislature. Our attorney, Mr. James Gannaway, is cooperating with legislators in drawing a substitute to this Act. It will be submitted to all who file for the Legislature for a statement of their position concerning it.

Salacious Literature

We have had a test case from Jefferson County and have been sustained in the Arkansas Supreme Court. The case is now before the U. S. Supreme Court and may possibly point the way for communities throughout the nation.

Pornography presents one of the greatest moral problems of our times. We urge everyone to cooperate with Parent-Teacher organizations as they have a national program.

Conclusion

On June 1, 1966, your Director will have completed seven years of service with the CCF. They have been rewarding years to me in many ways. The fine fellowship and cooperation of the Executive Committee and the members of the Board will always be remembered and treasured.

On October 15, 1965, I reached my seventy-sixth birthday, and I have come to the conclusion that the spirit is willing, but the flesh is weak. Therefore, I have tendered my resignation to the Executive Committee and they will elect a new Director.

Let me express my sincere thanks to all of you who have made this experience possible.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

The choice of life work is one of the three major decisions in life to be faced by a young person. The other two are whether to be a follower of Jesus Christ, and the choice of a life partner.

The principle of vocation as the obedient response to God's will is the first and greatest test of the Christian quality of life work. Work is made holy by what is brought to it in motivation and conduct.

The local church and the home have a crucial responsibility in sounding God's call to life service through the church. Pastors, teachers, and counselors are in strategic positions to discover, encourage and enlist promising persons for service in the church. Parents are never neutral and the home bears a distinct responsibility in the occupational decisions made by young people.

This year the Commission on Christian Vocations has:

1. Placed the "Vocational Guidance Series" filmstrips in the office of each District Superintendent for use within his district.
2. Distributed the "Christian Vocations Packet" to each pastor and each available High School Guidance Counselor throughout the conference.
3. Contacted by letter each Vocational Guidance Counselor in the High Schools in an effort to encourage cooperation between the schools and the local church in the field of Christian Vocations.
4. Had dialogue with the Wesley Foundation directors of the colleges within the Little Rock Conference in an effort to find ways of ministering to the college students in a time when they are genuinely concerned with their choice of life's work.
5. Provided for Wesley Foundation directors copies of the "Occupational Outlook Handbook" as reference material.
6. Cooperated with the District Secretaries in Christian Vocations Workshops held within their districts.
7. Sponsored an observer to the State Vocational Guidance Workshop for high school guidance counselors.
8. Secured an up-dated listing of Full-time Service Volunteers, which list is to be kept in the office of the Conference Director of Youth Work.
9. Cooperated with the District Superintendents in organizing the District Committee on Christian Vocations.
10. A pilot project called "Operation Confrontation" is in progress in the Arkadelphia District for the purpose of confronting young persons with the challenge of the ministry.

For the ensuing year, we recommend the following:

1. Cooperating with the North Arkansas Conference in an Area-wide Conference on the Ministry under the direction of Bishop Paul V. Galloway.
2. Local church leaders seek to cooperate with the High Schools in their "Career Day" programs and other Vocational programs.
3. Provide a "Methodist Church Related Vocations Service Project" booklet for each pastor and urge its wise use.
4. An emphasis upon the role of the local pastor to search out and challenge his youth to Christian Vocations — especially Church-related vocations.

5. That the month of November be designated as Recruitment Month, and that each pastor preach on "The Call To The Ministry".
6. If possible, there be a retreat for Full-time Service Volunteers held at Camp Tanako.
7. That the District Secretaries of Missionary Personnel of the W.S.C.S. and the District Secretaries of Christian Vocations seek ways of working together for the cause of presenting the challenge of God's call to youth to full-time Christian Service.

The Commission also wishes to acknowledge the full cooperation of the Secretary of Missionary Personnel and the Secretary of Campus Ministry of the Woman's Society of Christian Service. They have been most cooperative in all the endeavors of the Commission. We also urge the youth to take advantage of existing scholarships and student loans available through the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

The Little Rock Conference Board of Trustees makes the following report:

1. Pursuant to a resolution adopted by the Little Rock Annual Conference of The Methodist Church, meeting at First Methodist Church in Hot Springs, Arkansas, May 24-27, 1964, that the Conference Board of Trustees be incorporated, the petition for issuance of the Articles of Incorporation has been prepared in accordance with the laws of the State of Arkansas and the 1960 Discipline of The Methodist Church, Par. 711-1.

The Articles of Incorporation have been signed by all the Trustees and is now ready for approval or rejection by the 1966 Session of the Little Rock Annual Conference. If and when approved, the Articles of Incorporation will be filed in Pulaski County.

2. We recommend that a plot of ground at Potter, Arkansas, consisting of one square acre out of the Southwest corner of the Southwest Quarter of the Northwest Quarter (SW $\frac{1}{2}$ NW $\frac{1}{4}$) Section 29, Township 2 South, Range 31 West of the fifth principal meridian in Polk County, Arkansas, be declared abandoned church property by request of the Quarterly Conference of the Mountain View Circuit since there have been no Trustees of this property for a number of years.

We further recommend that this property be sold and the proceeds from sale of said property be used as directed by the District Superintendent of the Hope District in assisting the Mountain View Charge.

3. We further recommend that the following pieces of property in the Pine Bluff District, listed by the District Superintendent as abandoned church property, be declared abandoned church property:

- (1) Tucker Methodist Church, Tucker, Arkansas
- (2) Brewer's Chapel, near Bayou Meto, Arkansas
- (3) Toler's Chapel, between Leola and Malvern

Conference Promotion

Our Church is in the midst of constant and rapid changes that affect every facet of life, so that old methods and ways are no longer adequate. Accordingly The Methodist Church is calling its members to **A New Day In Christian Education**. This call involves a new concept of learning, new literature, new methods, new organization and administration.

Keenly aware of the need, your Conference Board of Education is seeking to better understand the "New Day," interpret it to our churches

and church schools, and to train the leadership needed to make it effective and adequate for the new challenge of today.

Since all of our curriculum will be based on a "life span concept," we will strive for a holistic approach to our task and for greater cooperation between the divisions in the church school.

Our new literature for children, **Christian Studies for Methodist Children**, continues to be enthusiastically received by churches large and small. It is meeting a vital need. We are now preparing for the new literature for adults, **Foundation Studies in Christian Faith**, which will be ready September 1967; and for the new literature for youth, which will be available September 1968.

Since our ministry in Christian Education will strive to be a whole ministry, by the whole congregation, to the whole person, in the whole field of relationships, in the whole world, we feel the need for and shall seek to attain the goal of "a minimum of a hundred hours of high quality group study a year for each member."

While the New Day in Christian Education will occupy a very large place in all of our work, we shall not neglect the features which have long been a prominent part in our Conference program.

1. A continuation of the program of seeking to increase the church school membership and attendance, giving special attention to outpost Sunday schools and the organization of new classes.

2. A year-round emphasis on winning persons for Christ and His Church; and carefully training them in the meaning of the Christian life and church membership.

3. A continued and deep concern for home and Christian family life with full attendance at the National Family Life Conference in Chicago, October 14-16, and a vigorous follow-up program to reach every district and church. We have elected Mr. and Mrs. Winston Faulkner as co-chairmen of our Conference Family Life Committee; and we nominate Mr. Winston Faulkner to our Conference Board of Education, taking the place of Reverend Carl Settle, as a member at large.

4. To improve the quality of teaching for all age groups we hope to achieve two objectives: (1) Each local church to have a long range program for discovering, enlisting and training officers and teachers; (2) to have three or more Christian Workers Schools in each district, these schools to be set up on a sub-district basis with all of the churches in the area co-operating in planning and promoting the school. We are grateful for the fine co-operation of district superintendents, ministers and church school workers which enabled us this year to reach our goal, "A training opportunity with accredited instructors within reach of every church and church school worker in the Little Rock Conference." We hope next year not only to have the opportunity available, but each church to become an active participant in the training program of the conference and district. This year we had 29 accredited training schools within our Conference, with 2,264 persons enrolled and 1,420 credits. Of our 379 organized churches 204 participated in an accredited training school this year.

5. Our Conference Camping Committee is continuing to study our present camping program with a view of making improvements wherever possible. It is also inaugurating this next summer a program of Frontier Camping with a training program for leaders at Camp Tanako August 21-26.

6. We pledge full co-operation with Area and other Conference agencies in all matters of common interest.

7. We also pledge our continued support of our fine Methodist seminaries.

We can use more old Annual Conference Journals, also copies of Dr. Anderson's "Centennial History of Arkansas Methodism," Dr. Horace Jewell's "History of Arkansas Methodism," and Dr. J. H. Riggins' book "Lest We Forget." We will pay cash for these three books.

The Quarterly Magazine "Methodist History," published by Dr. Albea Godbold, Lake Junaluska, N. C., is a valuable magazine. Persons interested in Methodist History will enjoy reading it. Price \$3.00 per year.

We plan a display of Methodist artifacts, books, pictures, etc., at Annual Conference for the second time. Rev. Ralph E. Hale is Chairman of the Committee which handles this matter.

Frequently we furnish Historical material information to many persons both in and out of our State.

This past year we were unable to complete the program of securing a picture of every clerical member of the Annual Conference. We would like to continue this plan for another year hoping to complete it during this coming Conference year.

We elected Dr. Robert E. L. Bearden to represent us in the Historical meeting to be held in Galveston in March this year.

We were pleased that all members of our Society except two, attended our meeting, and they were tied up in other meetings at the same hour.

The following persons represented the Little Rock Conference in the Bi-Centennial meeting in Baltimore last April: Harold D. Sadler, our Chairman, Robert E. L. Bearden, Warren D. Golden, Harold K. Davis, Robert B. Moore, Jr., and O. D. Peters, and a layman, Cooper B. Land.

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

We continue to Emphasize:

1. That each local Church, as directed by the 1964 Discipline, elect a Hospital and Homes Steward, to work with the District Commissioner of the Children's Home, in promoting, in the local Church, the Work, the Services, and the Needs of the Methodist Children's Home.

a. Also, that the District Superintendents furnish to the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes and to the Superintendent of the Methodist Children's Home, the names and addresses of all the Hospitals and Homes Stewards within their Districts.

2. We commend the Superintendent of the Children's Home, the Reverend Edwin Keith, and the District Commissioners, with the co-operation of the District Superintendents, for the splendid results achieved in caring for a constantly increasing number of Children. To do this, there must be a continued contact with the Local Churches, and especially, during the period of the Annual Christmas Offering.

3. We recommend that each District have at least one meeting, sometime before the annual Christmas Offering, in which the District Commissioner will be able to promote the Annual Offering by having together all the Hospital and Homes Stewards from the local Churches.

4. We nominate the following as Trustees of the Methodist Children's Home, for four-year terms expiring in 1970: Mr. J. T. Thompson, Little Rock; Mr. Dick Sturgis, Arkadelphia; Dr. Arthur Terry, Texarkana; and the Reverend Robert B. Moore, Jr., Hope, in place of the late Dr. Cecil Culver.

5. We recommend that the annual support for the Chaplain at the State Sanatorium, for the Conference Year 1966-1967, be \$4,557.00, as follows: \$3,000 for salary; \$600 for travel; \$750 for rent; \$27 for insurance; and \$180 annuity.

6. We recommend that the Children's Home Charter, which was adopted by the 1965 Conference, be published in the Journal.

INSURANCE COMMITTEE

The Little Rock Conference Insurance Committee amends their report printed in the 1965 Journal by announcing that those persons 65 years of age and over (Active and Retired Ministers, Widows, and Lay Employees) will come under another category after July 1, 1966, when Medicare becomes effective.

They will continue to be covered under the present Group Hospitalization Plan. Benefits will be co-ordinated with the Medicare Program to:

Pay the \$40.00 deductible under the Hospital portion, and

Pay the \$50.00 deductible under the Medical portion, and

Pay the 20% left owing the doctor under the Medicare Program.

Other benefits not covered by Medicare will be paid **for the time you are in the hospital.**

The Committee has been informed that the Board of Pensions **will continue to pay** $\frac{1}{2}$ of the Hospital Insurance premium for the Retired Men and Widows and will also **reimburse** them for cost of the Medicare Program.

The new Average Salary for the Little Rock Conference has been obtained from the General Board of Pensions Office, which handles the Death Benefit Program. It is \$6,049.00. Annual contribution is 2% of this, or \$120.98. The church or agency will pay \$72.59 and the ministers and lay employees will each pay \$48.39, which will be due in full June 1, 1966.

Payments can be made and are acceptable immediately for the Death Benefit Plan.

Death Benefit Program:

Average Conference Salary \$6,049

Contribution 2% = \$120.98

Covers one year — (only 9 months last year)

Hospital:

\$300 Surgery Schedule (increase of \$100)

No increase in premium

Persons 65 yrs. of age and over can continue to carry Hospital insurance after Medicare becomes effective. The benefits will supplement Medicare payments.

Board of Pensions will pay \$3 per month per person which Medicare requires, too.

Your insurance Committee unanimously concurs in the suggestion made in the District Superintendent's Report that a study be made of our total insurance program and that the results be reported at the 1967 Annual Conference.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS

Your Committee on Memoirs has two primary functions. First, this Committee selects the preacher to bring the Commemoration Message at Annual Conference, and presents this service to the Annual Conference.

We try to select as the preacher, men of the Conference who know the membership of the Conference, and are able to represent the Methodist Ministry.

We also try to select men of preaching ability in order to make this service an outstanding part of our Annual Conference session. In a real sense this is the "key note" service of the Annual Conference. Our preacher for the 1966 session is Reverend Marion W. Miller.

Our second task is to have written a Memoir for every deceased minister, minister's wife, and widow of a preacher. These Memoirs are printed in the Conference Journal.

The Conference Standing Rules state what is to be included in a Memoir: "Date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, name of children, charges served and place of burial." Follow these instructions and save having a Memoir returned for correction. Three copies of all Memoirs are to be furnished.

Memoirs should be written not later than sixty days after death occurs. Send Memoir to Rev. Harold Davis, First Methodist Church, Smackover, Arkansas.

MINIMUM SALARY COMMISSION

The Commission on Minimum Salary shall be composed of one minister and one layman from each district of the Conference, and including representatives from urban, village and rural churches. This Commission shall elect quadrennially a chairman, vice chairman and secretary to perform the usual duties of such offices. These officers shall compose the Executive Committee of the Commission. Whenever a vacancy occurs on the Commission between sessions of the Annual Conference, the vacancy shall be filled by the District Superintendent of the District involved.

Charges may become eligible to receive salary aid for the pastor from minimum salary fund by meeting the following requirements.

1. Conduct an Every Member Visitation Program following the procedure outlined by the Town and Country Commission.

- (a) If a pastor moves to another charge and has not made a concerted effort to put on the Every Member Visitation Program, he will not be eligible for Minimum Salary Aid.
 - (b) No charge will be eligible to receive Minimum Salary Aid if it has not paid the percentage requested by the Conference for Minimum Salary Fund.
2. File with District Superintendent, The Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission, and the Secretary of the Minimum Salary Commission, a completed application form approved and provided by the Minimum Salary Commission for minimum salary aid.
 3. Each charge shall be asked to increase salary, travel, or utilities \$100.00 each year. There will be no decrease in Minimum Salary Aid on the first \$100.00 and fifty per cent reduction of all increases over \$100.00. No charge shall be eligible to receive salary aid if there is any reduction in salary or travel expense. If there is no increase within three years, the support may be reduced \$100.00 each year.
 4. Plans for a Larger Parish Program shall be presented to the Commission for approval and for funds to be received. Each parish shall have a training course on the Larger Parish.
 5. All pro-rated connectional claims shall be paid by the charge to be eligible to receive minimum salary aid. 1964 Discipline Paragraph 823.
 6. Minimum Salary Charges shall be grouped as follows;
 - Type A. At least four churches with a membership of 300, pastor preaches three times on Sunday, Salary, travel expense mission aid and minimum salary not to exceed \$4,500. Where there are four churches on a charge and they merge to form three churches, they shall qualify for the same amount as a charge with four churches.
 - Type B. At least three churches with salary, travel expense, mission aid and minimum salary aid not to exceed \$4,000. However where there are three churches on a charge and they merge to form two churches or one church they shall qualify for the same amount as a charge with three churches.
 - Type C. Student pastor married, at least three churches, salary, travel expense, mission aid, minimum salary aid not to exceed \$3,000. Student pastor single, at least three churches, salary, travel expense, mission and minimum salary aid not to exceed \$2,400. Minimum Salary Charges must be composed of at least three churches with salary and travel expense as much as \$1,800.

Maximum Schedule Allowances; Student Single ---- \$650
 Student Married ---- 750
 Fulltime ----- 850

Ministers with dependent children eighteen years of age and under may draw \$100.00 for each child without reference to the above Schedule of Allowances and salary level. Each child to continue to draw \$100.00 if attending an accredited college or in training above the high school level.

7. Payments from this fund are made without regard to the amount the pastor receives from pension or educational funds. No part time pastor is eligible to receive minimum salary aid.
8. In the event the income of the fund becomes insufficient to meet the claims upon it, each claimant shall benefit in proportionate share of the available fund.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE

9. If a charge becomes qualified as a minimum salary charge within the first six months of the conference year, the effect becomes retroactive to the beginning of the Conference year.
10. The Minimum Salary Fund shall be raised by an apportionment to all the churches of the Conference in an amount equal to 3% of the cash salary paid the pastor. The Commission would like for the pastor to volunteer to pay through the church treasurer one third of the charge's apportionment, and for the District Superintendents and all other members of the Conference serving in special appointments to volunteer to contribute to the fund an amount equal to 1% of their salary.
11. Death Benefit Program and Hospitalization premiums (Pastors part) to be paid from the Minimum Salary Fund for pastors serving Type C. Churches.
12. The Bishop and District Superintendents, The Town and Country Commission and Commission on Minimum Salary shall work out a pattern of Enlarged Charge arrangements. The Conference and all concerned shall begin immediately to work to achieve these arrangements within the next year.
13. The Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission shall serve in an advisory capacity to the Commission on Minimum Salary.
14. Exceptions to the above requirements may be made by the Commission.
15. The Minimum Salary Commission will grant up to \$500.00 for the Town and Country Seminar as requested by minister's serving minimum salary charges.

Policy and Program

I. The Little Rock Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications proposes to work strictly within the framework of the current Discipline of The Methodist Church.

II. The elected officers of the Board are: Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, Registrars: General, College Students, Seminary Students.

III. The Executive Committee of the Board are the elected officers. They shall have authority in matters committed to them by the Board.

IV. The Board shall meet prior to the opening of school, at Annual Conference, and on call of the Chairman.

V. The Registrar shall arrange meetings at District levels with all men in the Course of Study, just prior to Annual Conference.

VI. The Board's sources of income shall be:

- A. A percentage from Conference Benevolences
- B. A special offering in November for Ministerial Training
- C. Gifts, bequests and interest

VII. The Board shall maintain a Scholarship Loan Program for Ministerial Training as follows:

A. For those in Course of Study above the level of License to Preach

1. Assistance to Courses of Study Schools

- (a) The cost of required text books for each year of the course of study. The books purchased by the student.
- (b) One round trip at 8¢ per mile

2. Assistance in the Correspondence Course

- (a) Payment of fees
- (b) The cost of required text books for each year of the course of study. The books are to be purchased by the student.

Above assistance repayable; Maximum received in any one year, by one year of service as a full time pastor, either as a member On Trial or as a Full Time Approved Supply.

B. For students from Little Rock Conference churches preparing for the Effective Ministry in The Methodist Church and enrolled in a college, university or seminary, approved by the University Senate of The Methodist Church, and who:

- 1. Hold a current Local Preacher's License in The Methodist Church, or are On Trial in the Little Rock Annual Conference, or those students who present to the Conference Board, for one year only, in writing, a recommendation from the District Board of Ministerial Training.
- 2. Make application annually to the proper Registrar of the Board, prior to August 1, giving all information requested and authorizing regular grade reports to this Board Registrar from the school Registrar and a transcript of credits at the end of each semester. Application must be requested.
- 3. Make a note, properly endorsed, and payable in one of two ways:
 - (a) One full year of service as an Effective Minister in The Methodist Church repaying the maximum receivable any one year.

- (b) In cash with interest at 4% per annum, beginning at the time the recipient terminated his ministry or preparation therefore; schedule of payments to be arranged with the Board Registrar.

- 4. Maintain a satisfactory grade average to indicate ability to graduate from his institution.

C. Method of Payment

- 1. No student may receive assistance for more than 8 college semesters and 8 seminary semesters, or the quarterly equivalent.
- 2. Payment will be made relative to the school system — semester or quarterly.

VIII. The Board may set a maximum amount of assistance per year per recipient, but assistance will be determined for each individual on the basis of requirements.

IX. The Board shall give assistance in a reasonable amount for physical examinations for men to be admitted on trial and into full connection.

REQUESTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

I. The Board, each District Superintendent, Pastor and local church to hold up to young men the need for ministers and the challenge of the ministry, that may enable them to hear the call.

II. As the first step into the ministry, enrolling for the studies for License to Preach with the Department of Inservice Training of the General Board of Ministerial Education.

III. Each Pastor to provide himself with folders on the Course of Study and with the book for the course on License to Preach.

IV. That when a person has passed the correspondence work on studies for License to Preach, or has completed one-fourth of the work for a B.D. Degree in an approved seminary, and in the judgment of the District Committee on Ministerial Training and Qualifications his gifts and graces commend him for the ministry, the Committee license him to preach, subject to the approval of their action and renewal of this license by the District Conference.

V. Wherever possible, men shall, in the Course of Study, take their work through the Courses of Study School.

VI. We assume our Conference share of financial responsibility for the Arkansas Pastors' School.

VII. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance to grant:

- A. An appropriation of 4% from Conference Benevolences.

- B. The authorization of a special offering on the third Sunday in November for Ministerial Training.

VIII. We express our appreciation for the support given the Ministerial Training Scholarship Loan Program by the churches of the Conference. In view of our increased load since assuming assistance for seminary students, we require a substantial increase this year.

IX. We recommend that the Little Rock Conference cooperate with the Jurisdictional Program of Ministerial Education in the following ways:

- A. That we hold before our churches the goal of giving to Ministerial Education an amount equal to 1% of the local church's budget, exclusive of monies used for buildings, improvements, and debt service.

- B. That the churches be asked to move toward this goal as rapidly as possible and certainly not slower than $\frac{1}{3}$ of 1% in 1966, $\frac{2}{3}$ of 1% in 1967, and the full 1% in 1968.
- C. That the Little Rock Annual Conference retain for its own work the first \$12,000 it receives from the churches; that the Conference reserve the right to adjust this amount from year to year; and that the remainder be sent to the Jurisdictional treasurer to be apportioned to the seminaries at Dallas and Kansas City.
- D. That the fund for Ministerial Education be promoted through the regular November Special Offering for Ministerial Education.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

The promotion of missionary education is under the direction of Ferris W. Norton, Jr., Conference Missionary Secretary, and the District Missionary Secretaries: Thomas A. Abney, Arkadelphia; Harold K. Davis, Camden; Pryor R. Cruce, Hope; Ed Matthews, Little Rock; James R. Scott, Monticello; and Edgar Outlaw, Pine Bluff.

A Church Wide School of Missions has been conducted in a large percentage of the churches of the Conference using "Witness — the Christian's Mission" as the guide.

A Commission on Missions organizing and functioning in every Methodist church has been the goal.

Advance Specials: Continued emphasis has been given to Advance Specials in the Conference. We express appreciation to those churches who have continued to support both National and World Mission Specials that they have maintained through the years, and also to those who have accepted new specials during the year. The Advance Special Giving is vital to the missionary program of Methodism. Your attention is called to the continuing needs for funds for the Parsonage in Salina, Oklahoma, amounting to \$7,200, and to the special project in Southern Chile for \$10,000.

Board Relations: Since the re-structuring of the Board of Missions, the Conference Board and the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service have been seeking ways of cooperating in the total task of Missionary Education. A Joint meeting of the leadership of the two was held during the year when District Missionary Secretaries and District Secretaries of Missionary Education were brought together to discuss joint responsibilities.

Lydia Patterson Institute: For several years your Board has contributed \$1,000 annually to Lydia Patterson Operations Expense and plans to continue doing so. During the past three years the Board has contributed \$1,000 to Lydia Patterson Capital Funds and this year's payment completes our pledged obligation.

Urban Life Convocation: Five persons participated in the Urban Life Convocation in Chicago, February 15-17. They were Edward B. Hollenbeck, Ed Matthews, Edgar Outlaw, Thomas Nations and Ferris W. Norton, Jr.

Special Church Extension and the Mobile Church: The churches continue to support the **Special Church Extension** program of the Conference so that new church organizations and re-locating churches may have basic funds to help in getting established. The St. Andrews Church has completed its building and the **Mobile Church** has been moved to the Arkadelphia District.

Requests: The following requests are made of the Commission on World Service and Finance:

1. The same amount for 1966-67 as was apportioned from Conference Benevolences: \$31,500 with one third of this going to Church Extension.

2. The amount of \$20,000 to the six districts for Special Church Extension and the re-location of churches and mergers.

3. That the following amounts be allocated to the Districts for National Advance Specials:

(A) Rio Grande Conference — \$3,500

(B) Oklahoma Indian Mission — \$6,000

(C) The Central Jurisdiction — \$1,637

(D) Lydia Patterson Institute Operations Fund — Amounts as voluntarily assumed by local churches.

(E) Salina, Oklahoma, Parsonage (Indian Mission) — \$7,200 (to be voluntarily accepted by local churches)

4. That the following amounts be approved as the goal for a World Advance Special for Training of Laymen in the Pilot Project in Southern Chile — \$10,000, to be accepted voluntarily by local churches.

Policy for the Use of Church Extension Funds:

1. An amount equal to one-third of the monies received by the Board of Missions from Conference Benevolences is placed in a fund for church extension purposes.

2. Churches may apply for donations from this fund for the purpose of erecting and completing church buildings, educational facilities and fellowship halls; for remodeling programs and for other Church Extension uses. Applications may be made for donations to parsonage projects but church building needs will be given priority.

3. Application may be made for any amount up to \$1,000 for one project.

4. Application blanks may be secured from the Secretary of the Board of Missions, and are to be returned to him after completion. (Rev. Edward B. Hollenbeck, 1215 Schiller Avenue, Little Rock, Arkansas 72202)

5. The Executive Committee will serve as the Committee on Donations for Church Extension and present to the Board their recommendation. Applications may be approved, referred to the Special Church Extension Committee, or denied. The amount of the donation may be adjusted from the original amount requested.

6. The Committee will present its recommendations to the regular meetings of the Board at the Mid-year and Annual Conference meetings of the Board. The Executive Committee will act upon applications in the two quarters of the year when the Board does not meet.

Recommendations for action during the 1966-67 Conference year:

1. A District Missionary Emphasis to be planned for March 1967, to lift up the purpose of Missions and to challenge our people to greater giving to Advance Specials. The District Superintendent, the District Missionary Secretaries and the District Secretaries of Missionary Education of the Woman's Society of Christian Service are requested to plan together on the emphasis.

2. **World Service and Conference Benevolences** to be lifted up as the life line of the Church and pastors and Church lay leaders be urged to interpret World Service to the entire membership.

3. **Continuing Emphasis on Advance Specials** to relate the local church with the missionary endeavor and to bring the two closer together. Our Advance Giving should continue on the increase on a voluntary basis.

4. **Alaska Methodist University** continues to need the support of every Church and Advance credit may be received for any gifts made to this outstanding institution.

5. **A Commission on Missions** is vital to every local church, and the smallest and largest churches are urged to use this means of training the people in missions.

6. **A District Missionary Society** is advocated for each of the six districts with the District Superintendent taking the lead in it.

7. **Special Church Extension Funds are available for sites**, new churches, re-locations and merging churches. All churches are urged to participate by giving their proportionate share of these funds.

8. **The Jurisdictional Missionary Conference at Mt. Sequoyah**, August 2-5, is a must for the Chairman, Conference Missionary Secretary, designated Superintendent, the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, the six District Missionary Secretaries, the six District Secretaries of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the six youth chosen by the Districts.

9. **Qualified Missionary Personnel** is needed in National and World programs, and pastors, Vocations Committees and interested persons are urged to lay this claim upon youth and young adults alike that they may respond to this need.

10. **Camp Aldersgate** is being used to advantage in reaching more and more persons for training that might not receive this training in any other way. We urge that Camp Aldersgate be designated as an Advance Special and local churches be asked to give in this manner.

11. Applications for any form of service for the Board of Missions deserve careful consideration by the proper committees and the Board. Those pastors and churches making applications are asked to give adequate time for such consideration and not to ask for hurried approval since all applications will be considered in committee or by the whole Board.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

Policy for the Use of Special Church Extension Funds of

The Little Rock Conference

I. The Special Church Extension Funds shall be administered by the Special Church Extension Committee of the Board of Missions. The Special Church Extension Committee will be nominated by the Chairman of the Board of Missions and elected by the Board. The Chairman of the Board shall serve as Chairman of the Special Committee. This committee has the authority to recommend to the Board — approval, adjustment, or rejection of applications. Final approval of these grants must be made by the Conference Board of Missions or the executive committee of the Board.

II. This fund is for the purpose of:

1. Building new churches
2. Purchasing new sites
3. Purchasing Mobile Chapel units
4. Merger or relocating of churches.

III. The disbursing of Conference funds allocated to special church extension purposes shall be disbursed on the following basis:

A properly completed application form must be submitted to the committee before any funds can be granted. The application forms will

be available from the church extension secretary of the Board of Missions. Funds requested shall be approved by the District Missionary Society and the District Superintendent.

Newly organized churches may apply for a maximum of \$10,000.00 to apply on the building of their first unit.

Churches merging or relocating may apply for a maximum of \$5,000.00.

Existing churches in areas of increasing population at the edge of urban areas may make application for an amount not to exceed \$2,000.00.

A District Board of Missions may apply for an amount not to exceed \$2,500.00 toward the purchase of a new site. The Conference Board of Missions recommends that sites be purchased by the District Board of Missions, freeing these funds for the construction of the first unit.

IV. Expenses of moving Mobile Chapel Units:

The Church completing the use of the Mobile Chapel will be responsible for dismantling it and preparing it for moving. The Church receiving the use of the Unit shall bear the expense of moving and of re-assembling the Unit.

V. The church extension secretary of the Board of Missions will be responsible for investigating the requests.

Qualifications For Mission Salary Aid

It should be kept in mind that Mission Salary Aid from our Conference Board of Missions is from a Mission Board. The primary purpose of our salary aid is (1) to help new church situations get established and self-supporting, (2) to aid in a continuing ministry to smaller churches and circuits (mostly rural), which are unable to pay a living wage to their pastor. With this purpose in mind the following points are established as qualifications governing the use of Mission Salary Aid.

1. Aid to new churches will be on a year to year basis, however, it will be understood that when a new church receives aid it will be on a decreasing basis each year and all aid will cease completely at the end of the fourth year. Exceptions to this rule will be by $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of the entire Board.

2. Salary Aid will not be given in any situation in which the pastor's total income is \$6,000.00 or above. Newly organized churches served by a pastor of an established church, paying \$6,000.00 or above, may not receive salary aid.

3. Salary Aid will not be given to any church or charge which does not conduct an Every Member Visitation yearly and give evidence of such to the Board.

4. Salary Aid request from District Superintendents will be given consideration **ONLY** if the request has been made in writing on the proper form to the Chairman of the Committee on Salary Aid.

5. In established churches or charges where continuing salary aid is necessary, the District Superintendent will be requested to use every means at his disposal to merge or combine churches or circuits in order to decrease Salary Aid.

6. Priority will be given to newly established churches from available funds of the Salary Aid.

7. The maximum amount of salary aid given in any situation for any one year shall be \$1,200.00. Exceptions to this rule will be by $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of the entire Board.

8. In case of an urgent request for salary aid, between meetings of the entire Board, the Executive Committee is empowered to act on such request in accordance with these rules.

9. These rules may be rescinded, amended, or changed in any way at any meeting of the entire board by a $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of the entire Board.

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THE BOARD OF PENSIONS

A. DISTRIBUTION

Fulfilling our responsibility as the Conference Board of Pensions we have authorized the payment for claims as follows:

- To 47 members retired by the Little Rock Conference, with a total of 1349 years of approved service.
- To 43 former members retired by other annual conferences with a total of 349 years of approved service for which the Little Rock Annual Conference is responsible.
- To 50 widows of former members retired by the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 1047 years of approved service.
- To 36 widows of former members retired by other annual conferences whose pensions are based on a total of 243¾ years of approved service for which the Little Rock Conference is responsible.
- To 9 dependent children of deceased ministers retired by the Little Rock Conference and by other conferences whose pensions are based on a total of 206¼ years of approved service.
- To 12 Approved Supply Pastors of the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 186¼ years of approved supply service.
- To 8 widows of Approved Supply Pastors of the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 107¾ years of approved supply service.

The Little Rock Conference in 1965-1966 had the responsibility for 205 claimants with a total of 3488 years of approved service. This represents an increase of 5 claimants and 256 years of approved service over last conference year.

These annuity claims have been paid on the basis of the following rates established by the annual conference:

Conference Members (100% of Annuity Rate) \$55.00 per service year.

Widows of Conference Members (70% of Annuity Rate) — \$38.50 per service year.

Dependent Children of Conference Members (25% of Annuity Rate) — \$13.75 per service year.

Approved Supply Pastors (75% of Annuity Rate) — \$41.25 per service year.

Widows of Approved Supply Pastors (70% of Supply Pastor's Rate) — \$28.88 per service year.

Payment of these annuities is made by the General Board of Pensions as a service to the Annual Conference.

B. RESPONSIBILITIES

Other services rendered by the Board of Pensions include:

1. Premiums paid for 137 claimants eligible for Group Hospitalization Coverage at an annual cost of \$4,700.92.

2. Premiums paid for 59 claimants eligible for the Death Disability Program of the Conference Group coverage at an annual rate of \$7,021.00.

C. RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We recommend that the annuity rate be set at \$56.00 per year of service for retired members of the conference; and that \$42.00 be set for retired approved supply pastors.

2. We recommend that the apportionment to the charges of the annual conference for conference claimants be an amount equal to 15% of the pastor's salary.

3. We recommend in keeping with Par. 296.3b and Par. 1610.6 of the 1964 Discipline that the Conference Board of Lay Activities consider Retired Minister Day as the theme of the annual Layman Day presentation, and that both of these days coincide.

4. We recommend that the General Board of Pensions continue to write and distribute the monthly payments to our annuitants.

5. In keeping with Par. 1618.4 of the 1964 Discipline, we recommend for the approval by the annual conference that special appointments shall be listed in the conference journal as follows: (1) with annuity claim (a) upon this Annual Conference, or (b) upon a general board, an institution, or an agency of The Methodist Church; (2) without annuity claim upon this Annual Conference.

6. That there be apportioned to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the conference the sum of \$360.00 for the conference year 1966-67 and for each year thereafter in accord with the 1964 Discipline (Par. 1623.7); and that the said apportionment be paid to the treasurer of the Little Rock Conference Board of Pensions not later than 15 days prior to the opening of annual conference.

7. We concur in the recommendation of the Conference Insurance Committee with reference to the adoption of the Group Hospitalization program.

8. We recommend that Eligible Conference Claimants and special Conference Claimants will have the Death Benefit Program provided for them with the contribution to be paid by the Conference Board of Pensions in accordance with the program of the Conference Committee on Group Insurance.

9. We recommend that eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants will have ½ of the annual premium of the Con-

ference Group Hospitalization paid by the Conference Board of Pensions. In addition we recommend that the eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants will have the \$3.00 voluntary portion of Medicare paid by the Conference Board of Pensions.

10. All retired ministers who serve appointments under the District Superintendent, and receive less than \$1,000.00 in annual salary and expense from the charge will have their contribution and premiums paid by the Conference Board of Pensions as outlined in Par. 8 and 9 of this report.

11. We recommend that the Conference Board of Pensions continue to move as quickly as possible toward setting the annuity rate for full time approved supply pastors the same as that for ministers in full connection as directed in the last session of the Annual Conference. We feel that this year we have moved in this direction with the increased insurance coverage to be offered under the new plan of the Conference Insurance Committee. This increased coverage is all offered on an equal basis. We feel that as soon as we are able to reach the required disciplinary rate of 1% of the average salary per service year for conference men we will be able to move to this equalized annuity rate for full time approved supply pastors. We also feel that if we can move toward the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund plan for our conference this can become a reality much sooner.

12. We recommend that the Bishop appoint a committee of at least 5 laymen and 3 ministers to study the total program of pensions for the Little Rock Conference.

We further recommend that this committee work in cooperation with the Conference Board of Pensions and report their findings and recommendations to the next session of the Annual Conference.

The Annual Conference Committee on Publishing Interests was created by the General Conference of 1960 to help the Methodist Churches and church members keep abreast of the work of The Methodist Publishing House. Three printings of the new **Book of Worship** brings the total to 100,000 copies, many of which are being used in the home. The circulation of the family magazine, **Together** is increasing. **Focus on Service** for 1965, the Publishing House's annual report to the church, was published in January, and copies are available on request from The Methodist Publishing House in Nashville, Tennessee. Highlights of the year as reported in **Focus** are as follows:

1. For the third consecutive year, \$700,000 was appropriated by the Board of Publication for the support of Conference Claimants. The Little Rock Conference share in this year's appropriation is \$5,127.28.

2. Total net sales of products, used as a measure of service, reach a new high of \$33,157,338.

3. Abingdon Press published 104 books for the year.

4. A third press run of 100,000 copies of the **Young Readers Bible** is being published at this time. This Bible is designed primarily for children but has appeal for all ages.

5. Vacation Church School materials distributed by the Publishing House during the year totaled 1,066, 758 pieces.

6. The 1964 edition of the **Discipline** has enjoyed wide circulation with a total distribution of 152,513 copies for the year.

7. The filmstrip, **"The Methodist Publishing House, What is it? Where is it?"** is still available from Cokesbury in Dallas on a 10-day

free loan basis. We encourage its use as a tool to create greater understanding of the purpose and service of The Methodist Publishing House.

We make the following Recommendations:

1. That the subscription list for **Together** be increased in every church with a goal of 1 subscription for every 25 members in each local church and that November be set as subscription month.

2. That the Committee on Good Literature be organized and that an agent for **Together** be chosen from among the members of this committee to interpret the role of the magazine to the church and promote the magazine in the local church. When **Together** is handled through the church the subscription price is \$2.52 payable quarterly, a savings of 50 per cent over a single subscription price sent in by the individual.

3. That every Methodist Church establish a library to encourage reading and study by church members.

4. That preparation be made for the new Adult curriculum material to be published in 1967 and the new youth material to be available in 1968.

5. That all churches look forward to the purchase of the new **Methodist Hymnal**, which should be off the presses by August. We call your attention to the fact that on March 1, 1966, orders for more than one million copies of the **Hymnal** had been received by Cokesbury. The processing of these orders will take some time after publication and delivery should not be expected for two or three months after the publication date.

CAMP TANAKO

During the 1965 camping season 30 different groups, numbering approximately 2,689 persons, participated in well-planned programs, under the direction of carefully selected, capable leadership. Already the schedule for 1966 is almost filled.

The Camp is planned, and the program set up, to minister to all age groups — children through adults, with activities appropriate for their respective ages. Every care is given to make the camping experience physically safe and morally and spiritually rewarding. The Board is endeavoring to make the entire camping program an increasingly effective force for the developing of Christian character and the training of needed leadership.

We are happy to report that we now have facilities for taking care of approximately two hundred campers at a time; and needed improvements and repairs were made during the year. We still have need for additional class rooms, especially when weather is inclement; and for additional landscaping for preserving and beautifying the property.

The Little Rock Conference Board of Education has appointed a Conference Camping Committee to study the present camping program with a view of making improvements when possible; and also of looking into the possibility of inaugurating a program of Frontier Camping to supplement our present program of Institutional Camping.

We recommend the continuation of the financial policy currently followed:

1. From Conference apportionments, \$9,000.00

2. From local church budgets and a free-will offering Sunday, April 24, 1966

3. Encouragement of gifts from individuals and special groups.

We nominate the following to succeed themselves: terms to expire in 1969: J. Gordon Wilson, Gordon Carlton, J. M. Spicer, Paul R. Fair and Kenneth L. Spore. We also recommend that the chairman of the Conference Board of Education be an Ex-officio member of the Tanako Board.

TELEVISION RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION**I. Organization**

1. That our work be done in cooperation with the efficient leadership of Dr. J. Ralph Clayton, our TRAFCO Consultant, appointed by Bishop Galloway and his Cabinet.

2. That William D. Leavitt be Conference TRAFCO Consultant.

3. That the Executive Committee be the Chairman, the Cabinet Consultant, Vice Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, (the Area Treasurer, acting Treasurer for TRAFCO).

4. That the Executive Committee be given responsibility and authority to act on behalf of our Conference TRAFCO in such ad interim work that may be necessary.

II. Cultivation and Motivation

1. That each pastor in each local church display materials from General TRAFCO, calling attention to the special TV and radio programs announced and sponsored by General TRAFCO.

2. That the district superintendents, district directors, and pastors give special attention to the organizing of the local church Audio-Visual Committee in each church, calling attention to the use of the Audio-Visual Committee Manual.

3. That audio-visual workshops for pastors and local church audio-visual committee members be held in the districts or subdistricts under the direction of the district superintendents and district directors.

4. That an Area TRAFCO Workshop be held at Hendrix College, if not in connection with, at the time of the Arkansas Pastor's School.

III. Program

1. We express appreciation to the television and radio stations located within the bounds of the Little Rock Conference for the time given our churches for the broadcasting of the gospel of Christ through preaching and other devotional services, and that special recognition be given to Chanel 7 for telecasting the "Breakthru" program beginning last September, and that Bill Leavitt be commended for his service in making the placement.

2. That Pulaski Heights Methodist Church be highly commended for televising the 10:55 a.m. Sunday services over Chanel 4, with its own TV cameras, equipment and cameramen.

3. That we commend the churches and pastors for the radio broadcast of Sunday services, and we encourage other churches to join in this larger extension of the Christian gospel.

4. That pastors and district directors schedule local programs on radio and television where possible.

5. That definite consideration be given to providing an Audio-Visual Room in the Methodist Headquarters Building.

6. That the Little Rock Conference TRAFCO in collaboration with the North Arkansas Conference TRAFCO, shall continue to work toward the goal of establishing the Area Film Library in the Audio Visual Room of the Methodist Headquarters Building, with an employed film librarian who shall receive special training; and that an up-to-date film catalog be made available to each church; and that all of this shall be under the direction of the Arkansas Area Council.

7. That each church in our Conference be challenged to accept the responsibility of promoting and raising the world service special gift fund, i. e., the Television-Radio Ministry Fund — (**Discipline**, Par. 762) — a total amount equal to 10¢ per member — 4¢ for General TRAFCO and 6¢ for Conference TRAFCO, and that each church be urged to place this item in the annual church budget. Several churches are to be highly commended for adopting this item as a budget item.

8. That with the approval of the World Service and Finance Commission, the Fourth Sunday in October be designated as TV-Radio Ministry Fund Sunday, using the cultivation materials and offering envelopes provided by General TRAFCO for receiving this special offering, and at the same time lifting up the Conference and General TRAFCO programs.

9. We request that the World Service and Finance Commission continue to support TRAFCO with a minimum allocation of \$3000 — \$2500 for General TRAFCO and \$500 for Conference TRAFCO.

10. It is our plan and purpose as an inter-board Conference Agency, to help supply audio visual aids for our Conference boards and agencies, and to help maintain an up-to-date film catalog for local churches, so far as our funds will permit.

IV. Television and Radio Programming, Scheduling, and Future Goals

1. That we give increasing attention to and support of the vital importance of communicating to thousands of listeners-viewers, the gospel of our Lord and Christ, through the radio and television media, that more and more people will come to make his Way their way.

2. That all of our churches be challenged to sponsor and support such new radio programs as "The Word — and Music," "Man With A Mike," and "When Your Child Asks."

3. That under the direction of TRAFCO, special attention be given to scheduling one or more of the filmed television programs; "Davey and Goliath," "Man and His Problems," "Talk Back," "The Way," and other new programs.

4. That ultimately each and all district directors of TRAFCO, as well as additional ministers and laymen, be fully trained to instruct the course on Audio-Visuals in the Local Church.

5. That all of our ministers be challenged to add to their reading libraries or church libraries, new books in the field of communications in general, and especially in the fields of radio and television programming, preaching and audio-visuals.

THE TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION PROGRAM

1966-1967

1. The Town and Country Commission Meeting and Workshop shall be held in Little Rock, January, 1967. At this time training will be given on the Sacraments, Wedding Ceremonies, funeral services and church administration as needed.

2. We shall continue to promote interest and provide worship services in areas having many tourists and hold workshops where needed.

3. A study shall be made to determine where churches should be merged, and those that should be part of a Larger Parish Program, where new churches should be located, and where there are abandoned church properties. The result of this study shall be filed in the Town and Country Office.

4. We commend the new hymnal to each of our town and country churches, realizing that in the new hymnal many more of our old hymns and gospel songs have been included. Town and Country Field Days shall be held in each district where possible and the Area Director and/or District Director of Town and Country Work shall present to the rural and small town churches the new hymnal and instructions in its use.

5. We request that all rural ministers be informed of the Lending Library at Hendrix College at Conway and that a list of the books be made available to each minister.

6. We shall cooperate with the University of Arkansas in the Rural Seminar, and ask that the Executive Director in cooperation with the Executive Board, select one outstanding Rural Minister in the Conference to attend the Seminar on Church and Community Life which is held at Emory University in the Summer. If the money is available the Town and Country Commission will pay all or a part of the expenses.

7. We request the Commission on Minimum Salary to allow up to \$500 for expenses of pastors on minimum salary to attend the Rural Seminar.

8. The commission shall be responsible for promoting stewardship through the Every Member Visitation program, the Lord's Acre and Lord's Hour program and Tithing and Wills and Legacies program and Methodist Foundation of Arkansas program in cooperation with the Board of Lay Activities.

9. We will request and try to make use of the Lay Speaking program of the Conference Board of Lay Activities. To further develop the goal, we will prepare and recommend to those conducting worship services a uniform Methodist Order of Worship. We urge that everyone conducting such service give an invitation to Christian Discipleship at the close of the service.

10. We shall endeavor to secure a sign on every Methodist Church.

11. The Enlarged Charge Program shall be continued with a goal of at least 300-400 members for every full-time pastor. This goal was approved by each annual conference.

12. We shall work with TRAFICO to make available a filmstrip projector in every Sub-District for the use of small membership churches.

13. The Associate Secretary shall continue to give guidance in building programs when requested by the pastor and district superintendent.

14. We shall seek to get each District Director certified to teach the courses on the Larger Parish and Group Ministry and Town and Country Work.

15. The District Director shall be elected by the Commission at its annual conference after consultation with the Associate Secretary. The Director shall be a member of the Commission representing the District which he serves, and when he is moved out of the District he shall no longer serve as a member of the Commission, unless he is appointed as District Director in the District where he moves. There shall be a training period for the Directors at the beginning of the

Conference year in cooperation with the other boards and commissions in the conference.

16. The Rural Church of the Year Program shall be promoted as outlined in the brochure provided for the Town and Country Workshop.

17. We shall seek to develop cooperative procedures between the church and governmental agencies, the Arkansas Council of Churches, and other denominations.

18. We recommend the Neighborhood-1 Program to help in establishing new congregations, outpost Sunday Schools, and Cluster Groups in the areas where there are no churches.

19. We ask that \$9,000.00 be granted by the Commission on World Service and Finance for the Town and Country Work & Stewardship for this next conference year.

20. The special emphasis in Town and Country Work this year 1966-1967 shall be "A worship service in every church each Sunday."

21. We recommend that two Stewardship revivals be held in the Little Rock Conference this year.

22. We recommend the appointment of W. O. Scroggin, Jr. by the Bishop and the Cabinet as the Director of Town and Country Work and Stewardship, representing the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences for the coming year.

We recommend that the total apportioned to the districts be the same as of last year, \$291,353.00 for both World Service and Con-

ference Benevolences, and that the balance be paid from the Suspense Fund and any overpayments to go to the Suspense Fund. The district apportionments are recommended as follows:

D. Other Apportionments and Recommendations

1. We recommend the sum of \$1,200.00 for Area Expense, concurring in this with a request from the Bishop and his cabinet.

2. We recommend as Joint Treasurer, Mr. Grafton Thomas, at a salary of \$8,300.00 and Mrs. L. W. Averitt, Assistant Treasurer, at a salary of \$5,100.00, and that office rental be \$625.00; office supplies, printing and postage \$1,500.00; telephone, social security, bond insurance and miscellaneous items \$1,500.00; and that the expense of this office be shared on a 50-50 basis by the two Conferences, and that the Joint Executive Committee of Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences be authorized to continue in making necessary adjustments that may be required from time to time. All these items are to come out of the Joint Conference Administration Fund.

3. We recommend that the following items be combined under the head of "Connectional Items"

a. General Administration (including

We further recommend that the amount apportioned to the districts be the same as of last year, \$30,097.00, and that the balance come from the Suspense Fund.

4. District Superintendent's Salary, Expense and Utilities: The District Superintendents shall receive an annual salary of \$9,600.00, \$800.00 of which shall be considered as utilities; and \$3,000.00 travel expense, to be used at the discretion of the individual District Superintendent. Both travel and salary to be paid monthly.

The Commission recommends that an amount equal to 10% of all pastors' cash salaries to be paid to the District Superintendent's Fund, \$4,000.00 of this fund to be credited to Lydia Patterson Institute, El Paso, Texas, Rio Grande Conference, for capital improvement.

5. The amount apportioned for the Episcopal Fund is to be an amount equal to two percent of the cash salaries of the pastors for the current year.

6. We request that an amount equal to three percent of the pastor's salary be assessed against the individual churches for Minimum Salary Fund. We request that the pastor, church, or agencies, pay one-third through the local church or direct to the Conference Treasurer.

7. The Commission recommends that an amount equal to 15% of all pastors' cash salaries be apportioned for the Conference Claimants Fund.

8. We recommend that the Treasurer be authorized to pay \$15.00 for membership of the Methodist Historical Society of the Conference

in the National Methodist Historical Society, and \$100.00 for other expenses.

9. If a charge does not otherwise provide for the pastor's utilities, then each charge is requested to designate the cost of parsonage utilities as a part of the assessee's salary thus exempting the cost of the utilities from the income tax claims. It is understood that a designation of a part of salary as utilities for tax purposes only does not exempt this amount from percentage that would be normally levied against it.

10. We recommend that the Commission on Vocations be allowed \$600.00.

11. We emphasize the importance of Christian wills and legacies. Materials for promotion may be ordered from the Department of Wills, Bequests and Gifts of the Council on World Service and Finance, 1200 Davis Street, Evanston, Illinois.

12. We approve the request of the Conference Board of Missions for permission to promote the raising of the sum of \$3,500.00 for the Rio Grande Conference, and the sum of \$6,000.00 for the Indian Mission, and \$1,637.00 for the Central Jurisdiction during the Conference Year 1965-1966 as Advance Specials, to be apportioned on the regular percentage basis. Your Commission also approves the request of the Board of Missions to raise through Advance Specials, \$5,000.00 per year for the capital improvement of Lydia Patterson Institute. We further approve the raising on a voluntary basis as Advance Specials \$7,200.00 for a parsonage in the Oklahoma Indian Mission and \$10,000.00 for special work in South Chile. We urge that Camp Aldersgate be designated as a Conference Advance Special and that local churches be asked to contribute in this manner.

13. We recommend that, in accordance with a request from the Western Methodist Assembly, an amount not less than \$10.00 per charge be paid this year for the needed building and improvement of the Western Methodist Assembly.

14. We recommend that the Little Rock Conference pay an amount equal to an amount paid through World Service and Finance Commission of the North Arkansas Conference to the support of the Chaplain at Booneville Sanitorium.

15. We recommend that the Conference raise \$85,297.00 for its work of Higher Education at Hendrix College; and for the next three years an additional \$85,297.00 per year be raised. This amount to be apportioned to the Districts and that the District Superintendents and District Stewards make the apportionment to the churches of the District according to their best judgment. The College further requests it be given permission to raise \$250,000 over the next three years from individuals within the churches of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conference who might give to such a fund without affecting their giving to the local church. This amount to be divided between the Conferences and prorated to the Districts on the same basis as the above.

16. We recommend that the apportionment set for Wesley Foundation Operational Fund be on the basis of fifty cents per member.

17. We approve the request of the Little Rock Conference Insurance Committee to be self sustaining in its expense and for the insurance program to pay for the cost of stationery, printing and office help in connection with its work.

18. At the suggestion of the Board of Education, we recommend the fourth Sunday in September as Church School Day, and authorize the Church School Day Askings to be \$9,000.00, and urge all our churches to raise their quotas to meet this need.

19. We urge our churches to continue their support of Camp Tanako. Concurring with the request from the Camp Board we are urging all churches either to include the Camp program in their annual financial budget, or to make the fourth Sunday of April as Camp Sunday, at which time a free-will offering may be made for this project.

20. We recommend the first Sunday in December (Commitment Sunday) as Christian Civic Foundation Day, and authorize a Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas, Inc., offering of \$7,500.00 and urge all our churches to cooperate. This amount to be allocated by the District Superintendents on a percentage basis.

21. We endorse an offering in November, to be known as the Ministerial Training Special Offering, to be used in Ministerial Student Loans and Scholarships, and in the support of the Arkansas Pastors' School.

22. We recommend a grant to pay necessary expenses of Board of Hospitals and Homes and Conference Board of Trustees and other necessary incidental expenses of other Boards and Agencies to conduct their work.

23. We give our endorsement to the plans of the Television, Radio and Film Commission to go before the districts to promote the TRAFCO fund, working toward 10¢ per member for this fund, and we give our approval to a special offering for TRAFCO on the fourth Sunday in October.

24. Your Commission recommends that all surplus funds not under any Board or Commission of the Annual Conference be subject to the direction of the Commission on World Service and Finance.

25. We authorize the Treasurer to cooperate with the First Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas, and to pay the proper official of said church any deficit in Conference entertainment expense following the submission of a financial statement to the Treasurer.

26. We approve a request for \$1,000.00 per year to come from the Conference Administration Fund to be used for promotion of the Wills and Legacies program.

27. We approve the request from the Treasurer's office that we make use of the services of the Union National Bank of Little Rock in keeping the Conference Treasurer's records through IBM data processing equipment. Our net cost of approximately \$250.00 per year would come from the Conference Administration Fund.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Churchill once said; "The longer you can look back, the farther you can look ahead." As members of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guild we have a dramatic past — twenty five years of achievement in the name of our Lord and His Church. We have an exciting present and a most challenging future. Where do we go from here?

This is a changing world. How often we hear these words. Dr. Dow Kirkpatrick, in referring to the changing world in an address at the Convocation of Boards in Galveston in March said, "Adam probably said to Eve as they left the Garden of Eden, 'My dear, we live in a changing world.'" The world of today is moving faster than our habits of thinking. We are experiencing today what has been called "Accelerating acceleration," and this means that the need to adjust to the changes be-

comes more urgent. **Change, challenge and choice** are the key words in today's living and flexibility is our hope.

The women in the Little Rock Conference Woman's Societies and Guilds have been trying to fulfill their mission as Christians during the past year as we have studied, worked and worshipped with a renewed sense of being in mission wherever we are. We have become increasingly aware that the church's mission is the task of all laymen and lay women and that we are all missionaries. We have dared to try new types of programs and new ways of doing some of the same things we were already doing.

All, present at the 26th Annual Meeting of the Conference in Texarkana, were involved in the program and we attempted to make the Woman's Society relevant to the time in which we live. Instead of having officer's training as a part of the Annual Meetings this year — Conference and District — we had full-day training sessions on later dates. The training day for District Officers in Fordyce May 3rd was perhaps one of the best leadership training experiences we have had in recent years. The emphasis of the day was on **United** effort, the value of committee work and the undergirding of one officer by another..

Spiritual Life Cultivation

The self-study on the meaning and basis of membership in the society and guild, as a process of evaluating societies and guilds and discovering new approaches and directions was a most enriching experience for those involved, and I am glad to report that this study was wide spread over the conference and is continuing. It has helped us to discover weaknesses, gain power and find directives for the future. We feel that our Self Study was effective in bringing into focus the fact that we all must take stock of our spiritual needs and try, with God's help, to be and do more of what we believe to be God's will for us.

Missionary Education and Service

Mission: The Christian's Calling has been more than just the theme for the Mission study this year. It has highlighted every part of our work along with the study of the Book of Acts, where we have truly come to know what it means to be the Church 'gathered' and the Church 'scattered'. Last fall a new Committee on Mission Studies in our Annual Conference was begun on a pilot basis and coaching conferences in each district were planned whereby district and local church mission leaders came together to plan for the church-wide studies in the local churches. The committee included both Annual Conference and Woman's Society Missionary Education leadership. In some of the districts this plan was carried out quite successfully. This summer the Jurisdiction Missionary Conference to be held in August at Mt. Sequoyah has been designed to train the leaders from both the Annual Conference and the Conference and District Woman's Society together, and then this fall we will concentrate on training the leaders in the district cooperatively, so that we will be able to hold church-wide studies with a representative committee made up of persons from various areas of the local church, who will plan and execute the plans at the time of the study. This plan was adopted by the Joint Commission of Education and Cultivation at Buck Hill Falls, in January of this year. Since we, in this conference actually got under way in a limited way with this type of program last fall, we expect to do a really good job this year.

For the first time we will be holding an Inter-Conference School of Christian Mission this summer. This will be in cooperation with the North Arkansas and Southwest Conferences and will be held at Mt. Sequoyah, August 8-12. This is another brand new program for us. Co-operative planning has been going on since early fall last year and we are eagerly looking forward to accomplishing a dream we have had for

several years. The inter-Conference School for the Guilds will be held at Camp Tanako August 6-7, 1966.

Campus Ministry

In our Campus Ministry program, in addition to the job of trying to undergird and interpret Methodism's total ministry in the University World in the local societies and on our campuses, we have lifted this area of work at our Conference and District Annual Meetings. Through the programming of panels from our Wesley Foundation Centers in the Conference and one from the Southern Methodist University Campus, we learned from the young people some of the weaknesses in our church's efforts to reach youth, and of an almost total lack of communication between most adults and college young people. With this awareness on our part, troubling as it is, we feel that we do have a little better insight into the kind of climate we must work to establish, with and for our youth.

National Division Projects in Our Conference Church and Community Work:

We are very pleased with the work being done by our Church and Community Worker, Miss Judy Atwood, in Polk County, Hope District. She has received commendation from the Department of Town and Country under which she works at the Division level also. Her reports of activities in the eleven churches she serves are very interesting. She works with Church Schools, Youth Groups, Woman's Societies and Wesleyan Service Guilds, in all the various activities in which they are involved in the churches, plus community programs where she can be of service.

Aldersgate Methodist Camp, also related to the Board of Missions, is as you know the only one of its kind in the nation. It has been for a number of years a part of the larger program of Christian Education in its church camping program.

During the past few years it has extended its program to include mentally and physically handicapped children in its ministry. Last year it served a number of under privileged children who live in congested inter-city neighborhoods, in its campership program. This year the program is to be doubled in the number it will serve.

Town and Country Project — New

A new Church and Community project under the Department of Town and Country, is in the making in the Arkadelphia District in and around Hot Springs. We are quite excited about this new project because it will include new types of services both in the city and in the growing edges of the city to the members of eleven churches. Also in this project will be a program especially planned for senior citizens and will include two Central Jurisdiction churches.

Wesleyan Service Guild

There are 72 Wesleyan Service Guilds in our Conference with a membership of 1,598. The Guilds and Woman's Society members have worked together closely in the self study program this year and the fellowship has been most helpful and enjoyable. As their portion of the total pledge this year they pledged \$20,804.00. At their annual meeting in Arkadelphia in March a new Conference Secretary was elected. She is Mrs. Rubye Lee Jackson of Pine Bluff.

Anniversary Goals:

Since the Twenty-Fifth Anniversary celebration culminated at the Seventh Assembly in Portland, Oregon, May 12-15 we have been working

toward the attainment of the goals set for us all year as best we could. The **Membership Goal** of 25% increase over our 1962-63 membership has not been realized. There are 10,131 in 207 Societies as of May 25, 1966 and 89 District Members and 1,598 in the 72 Guilds, which is a total membership of 11,818.

The **Recruitment Goal** of one full-term missionary, one deaconess, one special term three-year person and one US 2, was partially attained. We did recruit one Special Term missionary who is serving as a teacher at Ewha University in Seoul, Korea, and one US 2 who has been serving at St. Marks Community Center in New Orleans.

In addition to these two we are pleased to have a young lady, Miss Janice Hackman, from the Little Rock District, attending Scarritt College on a partial scholarship grant from our Conference Woman's Society. She will graduate within a year and will go into National Mission Work. She is doing outstanding work at Scarritt.

We are also proud to tell you about Miss Kaye Reaves of Good Hope Church, Monticello District who is attending Centenary College, Shreveport on the Birdwell Scholarship. She intends to go into full-time Missionary service under the Board of Missions.

The **Financial Goal** was a 25% increase over our pledge giving of 1962-63. In dollars and cents this made a total pledge on undesignated giving of \$110,450 which we were trying to reach this year. We did not reach this amount and while we are disappointed we are not discouraged and will accept the same pledge for 1966-67 and try again to reach it. The amount sent to the Division to apply on pledge was \$98,257.25. Cash for Supplies, Call to Prayer and Self-Denial and Supplementary Gifts brought the total remitted to \$113,562.20. The women of our Conference are quite proud to have a part in making it possible for the Woman's Division to furnish 40% of the entire support to Missions in the Methodist Church.

Assembly

Twenty-four Little Rock Conference Methodists have just returned from the Seventh Assembly of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service Guilds, where more than eight thousand women from all over Methodism in our nation and some from overseas, participated in developing the theme: "**Called to Renewal and Service.**" with its special emphasis on (1) the place of women in the ecumenical movement (2) the preparation of women for leadership roles in today's world (3) the opportunities, challenges and involvement of women in the life of the church and the international community today. Not only did we listen to speakers, panels, music, drama, but we participated through the worship experiences and through discussion groups in which every one registered for the meeting were involved.

We have come back home to try to give to our women who did not get to Portland some of the inspiration and information we received there. We realize that we have more responsibility than ever before and that we need preparation for the new roles, which we will humbly and prayerfully seek. We know also that all the same duties and privileges of making a home and ministering to the needs of our families are still ours also, and we do not for one moment expect to neglect this place of service. God grant us the courage, the strength and the ability to fulfill our highest potential as Christians.

The most important way we can serve and carry out the purpose of our organization is to instill within ourselves and in each other an attitude of concern for people. Our concern should not be how many women we can report as members, but how many women we are helping to "Grow in the knowledge and experience of God as revealed in Jesus Christ and challenge them to respond to God's redemptive purpose", because we care.

It is our opinion that the accompanying statements present fairly the results of cash operations under the control of Grafton Thomas, Treasurer, for the period June 1, 1965 through May 31, 1966, and that funds and investments are on hand (Board of Pensions Distributive Fund Excepted) at May 31, 1966 as stated in the exhibits.

CECIL ROY CULVER

The Reverend Dr. Cecil Roy Culver was born at Gainesville, Arkansas, August 6, 1906, the son of Christian Harold and Lillie Wood Culver. He received his education at the University of Arkansas, Southern Methodist University, Garrett Biblical Institute, and Iliff School of Theology.

He was admitted, On Trial, into the North Arkansas Conference in 1928 and received into Full Connection in 1930. He was ordained Deacon in 1930, and Elder in 1932.



On June 1, 1931 he was united in Holy Matrimony with Lillian Bernard. To this union three children were born. Cecil Roy, Jr. (deceased), Wanda Lee (Mrs. Martin McCutcheon) and Joyce Ann.

His pastoral and administrative assignments were: Weldon-Tupelo 1928; Bald Knob 1929-32; Ozark 1932-34; Gardner Memorial, North Little Rock 1934-37; First Church Paragould 1937-41; First Church Conway 1941-42; transferred to East Oklahoma Conference, First Church Muskogee 1942-43; transferred back to North Arkansas Conference First Church Jonesboro 1943-45; Fort Smith District 1945-50; transferred to Little Rock Conference, Winfield, Little Rock 1950-

54; Monticello District 1954-55; First Church El Dorado 1955-60; Pine Bluff District 1960-61; Executive Secretary Arkansas Area Council of The Methodist Church 1961 until his unexpected home going from the golf course at Hope, Arkansas at 4 p.m. Wednesday, March 16, 1966.

Dr. Culver served with distinction the major Boards of the Conferences and as a trustee of both Hendrix College and the Methodist Children's Home. He was a delegate to the General Conference of The Methodist Church in 1964, and to the South Central Jurisdictional Conference in 1956 and 1964. He was Vice-Chairman of the General Board of Evangelism and Chairman of the Jurisdictional Board at the time of his passing. For distinguished service to the church Hendrix College conferred upon him the degree of Doctor of Divinity in 1953.

Large of stature; strong of voice; keen of mind; deep in conviction; loyal in commitment; dedicated in spirit: the Kingdom flourished under his leadership.

In 1951 while pastor at Winfield in Little Rock and serving as Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Evangelism, he led the Arkansas-Louisiana Area in a United Evangelistic Mission which netted an all time high of additions to all three Conferences. At Winfield and at First Church El Dorado he led in extensive fund raising and building programs.

When the Arkansas Area Council of The Methodist Church moved to engage an Executive Secretary his knowledge of both Conferences; his acceptance by the ministers and laymen of both Conferences, and his proven ability as a leader made him the natural choice for the adventures in progress.

On the night of his passing Bishop Paul E. Martin, under whom he worked for 16 years, said: "He was a gifted and great leader. The whole church has suffered a loss." His own Bishop and long time fellow pastor, Paul V. Galloway said: "I need him. The church needs him. We all need him."

We cannot say he "finished the course." There was much work left for him to do. But we knew him well and we know he "fought a good fight," he "kept the faith" and has received his "Crown of Righteousness."

ALFRED EARL JACOBS

The Reverend Alfred Earl Jacobs, was born October 19, 1887 at Tull, Grant County, Arkansas. The son of John Preston, and Gertrude Crowson Jacobs.



At the age of ten Brother Jacobs united with the Ebenezer Methodist at Tull, Arkansas. By the time he was fifteen he was teaching Sunday School and leading prayer meeting in his Church, at the age of eighteen he was licensed to teach school at Sheridan, Arkansas. He began teaching at Tull in 1907.

At the age of twenty one he was married to Miss Mattie Duvall, at Tull, of this marriage six children were born of which three are living. They are James W., Ewell D. and Robert W. Jacobs.

At a District Conference July 1914, he was licensed to preach the gospel of his Lord, at the Annual Conference, December 1914, he was admitted on trial in the Little Rock Conference, and was sent to serve his first charge which was St. Charles Methodist Church, where he served two years. At the Annual Conference of 1916, he was ordained Deacon, and

sent to serve at Humphrey Methodist Church for one year, then he was sent to serve at Rowell Methodist Church, where he was serving when he was ordained Elder in 1919, at the Annual Conference.

Brother Jacobs, went on to serve the following charges: Arkansas and Southern Camp, Watson Chapel, Star City, Strong, Chidester, Hunter Memorial Little Rock, Hazen, Forester, Norphlet, Sherill, and the Traskwood charge, which took up forty-one years of his life.

Brother Jacobs found time also to serve his State Government as well as serving his Church. He was elected to the State House of Representatives from Lincoln County and Star City in 1928 and 1929.

Brother Jacobs was a Mason and a member of the Lodge at Norphlet, Arkansas.

In this forty-one years Brother Jacobs held over three hundred revivals and lead over two thousand souls to Christ, one of the men which came to know Christ under the ministry of Brother Jacobs is well known in the Little Rock Annual Conference. It is the Reverend Kenneth L. Spore, pastor at Altheimer and Wabbaseka, the Reverend Carol Chenault answered the call to the ministry under Brother Jacobs.

After retirement Brother Jacobs came back to his home at Tull, Arkansas to live out his years.

Brother Jacobs was called to the Eternal City of God, January 11, 1966. His funeral was conducted in the Ebenezer Methodist Church, Tull, Arkansas, by his District Superintendent, Dr. J. Ralph Clayton and his pastor Reverend J. J. McKnight. His body was placed to rest in the Ebenezer Cemetery by the Reverend Edwin B. Dodson and the Reverend G. Coleman Akin.

ROBERT EDWARD SIMPSON

Robert Edward Simpson, son of Alonzo and Annie Lee Simpson, was born July 24, 1896, at Bogue Chitto, Mississippi.



He was admitted into the Mississippi Conference 1919. Earned his A.B. Degree from Millsaps College, Jackson, Mississippi, and his B.D. Degree from Perkins School of Theology, Dallas, Texas, in 1924.

He was married on May 28, 1924, to Miss Helen Bower. To this union was born one son, Robert Arris.

After graduation from Southern Methodist University he went to the North Arkansas Conference and transferred to the Little Rock Conference in 1924 and was appointed pastor of Junction City. He then served St. Charles, Hawley Memorial and Carr Memorial in Pine Bluff; Hamburg, England, Portland, Grand Avenue Hot Springs, and Crossett.

In 1946 he was appointed Superintendent of the newly acquired Methodist Hospital in Hot Springs, where he served until the hospital was sold in 1950.

He was then appointed Conference Evangelist for 1950-51. In 1952 he took a sabbatical leave, and in 1953 was located at his own request.

He and Mrs. Simpson went to Vermont where he served as pastor of the Wells Methodist Church from 1951 to 1962. He was also leader of Merrybrook, a retreat center and concentrated on the deepening of the spiritual life and in prayer research.

They came back to Arkansas in 1962 and he was readmitted into the Little Rock Conference, and granted the retired relationship. He and Mrs. Simpson located in Dallas, Texas, to be near their son, Robert Arris, Chaplain of the VA Hospital in Dallas.

E. had been in the hospital, but was home then, but not able to attend Annual Conference. He hoped to attend the 1966 session of the Conference. The next word I had was of his death. It was a shock to me. A good friend has gone to his eternal reward. Burial was in Dallas, Texas.

May the Holy Spirit comfort Mrs. Simpson, Robert, and a host of friends until they are reunited in "that city which hath foundations, whose builder and maker is God."

JAMES R. MARTIN

James R. Martin was born January 20, 1901 at Quitman, Arkansas. While still a child he accepted Christ as his Savior and became a faithful follower of Him.

As a young man he was married to Miss Myrtle Nuckolls of Cabot. To this union were born two sons: Carlos, now a distinguished minister and pastor of the First Methodist Church of Hamburg; the other was Clyde who passed away at the age of six.

During the first fifteen years of his married life he was a farmer near Cabot and a layman in the old Austin Methodist Church. It is said that it was he more than any other who kept the church alive during the early days of the depression. It was here that he felt and answered the call to preach.

It was my privilege to have been a member of one of the Churches on his first Charge . . . the Carlisle Circuit. He immediately impressed me as a man sent from God and his name was Jim.

This humble but powerful man so presented Christ and the world in need of a Savior that I heard for the first time the call of God saying, "Who will go for me?" And I answered as did another in the long ago; "Here am I send me." From the Carlisle Circuit days till the day of his death he rightly called me his preacher.

His first pastorate began in 1936 and his last one ended in 1960. Few people could listen to Brother Martin preach and remain the same. The gospel he preached was like that of the New Testament, sharp, separating the good from the bad. He believed that "today is the day of salvation" and that Christ had died to save whosoever would let him.

Some might soft pedal sinful practices in the Church but not J. R. Martin. He believed with Ezekiel that God had sent him as a watchman to warn people to flee the wrath to come.

Other pastorates served were Hickory Plains twice, Prescott Circuit, Carthage-Tulip, Marysville Circuit, Bryant Circuit, Austin Circuit, De-Valls Bluff Circuit and Bethlehem Circuit twice.

After his retirement in 1960 he and his faithful wife lived in Cabot until God called him home on April 24, 1966. Brother Martin is survived by his wife, Mrs. Myrtle Nuckolls Martin of Cabot and the son, the Rev. Carlos Martin of Hamburg.

His funeral service was held on April 26 in the First Methodist Church of Cabot. In spite of the rainy weather, the house was filled to capacity, including about fifteen ministers, headed by his own District Superintendent, Dr. J. Ralph Clayton. Those ministers officiating were the Rev. John Chapman and the Rev. Luther Beasley and the writer.

His body was laid to rest in the old Austin Cemetery near the place he loved so well. Many will rise up to say the world is better because Brother J. R. Martin passed this way.

ERNEST F. PINE

ERNEST F. PINE was born at Redland, California, on November 19, 1907, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Pine. He passed away at St. Joseph's Hospital, Hot Springs, Arkansas, on November 17, 1965, following a brief illness. At the time of his death, he was pastor of the Piney Grove Methodist Church at Hot Springs.

Reverend Pine was educated in the public schools of Long Beach, California; at Ashland College, Ashland, Ohio, and subsequently graduated from Ashland Seminary of that city. He served his country as a Chaplain for twenty years and retired as a Lieutenant Colonel in the Chaplaincy of the United States Air Force on December 31, 1962. X. Miscellaneous

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

1. Nominations. The District Superintendents shall nominate all members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees except as otherwise provided.

2. Conference Program. There shall be a Conference Council composed of the Presiding Officers of the following boards and agencies: the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the M.Y.F., the Committee on Christian Vocations, Camp Tanako, the Town and Country Commission, the Arkansas Methodist, the Board of Lay Activities, Missions, Social Concerns, Education, Evangelism, Ministerial Training, Pensions, Historical Society, Hospitals and Homes, the Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs, the President of the Ministers' Wives Organization, a representative of the Methodist Student Movement, a Wesley Foundation Director, the Conference Secretary, Conference Treasurer, the employed executive officers of the above named agencies, provided that it shall include all Little Rock Conference members of the Area Council, and other such boards, and officers as the Conference may direct, whose duties shall be:

- (a) To co-operate with the Area Council.
- (b) To plan the program for the Annual Conference Session at least 30 days before the session. The pastor host of the annual session of the Conference shall be deemed a full member of the Conference Council when it is working on the program for the annual session. The Council shall provide for all preaching, inspirational and anniversaries and other services of the Annual Conference Session. The Conference shall pay the expenses thereof out of the Administrative Fund.
- (c) The Council shall meet within 20 days after the close of each Annual Conference Session to prepare the Conference Calendar. Changes in the calendar thus prepared may be changed when found necessary by the Bishop and the Cabinet.
- (d) The Council shall have such other duties as the Conference may from time to time assign to it.

3. Financial and Statistical. (1) The District Superintendents shall furnish the treasurer with all assessments and acceptances of the pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the meeting of the Annual Conference. These figures shall be official. (2) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars, with no column for cents. (3) Each pastor shall report to the Conference Treasurer and turn in his statistical report to the statistician at a date set by the cabinet. This date shall be at least seven (7) days prior to the starting date of Annual Conference. The Pastor's Reports received at this time shall be entered into the Annual Conference Statistical Tables without change. Any unanticipated funds received after the aforesaid date shall be entered in the Journal on a separate page.) (4) The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be June 1st to May 31st, and all salaries and connectional askings of the churches shall be paid on this basis.

4. Memoirs. There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased Clerical Member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, name of children, charges served and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with his memoir. The memoirs of the wives or widows of clerical members of the Conference shall be published in the Journal. The name of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs the passing of any person whose memoir shall appear in the Journal. It shall be the duty of District Superintendents to report to

the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions the death of any conference claimant that occurs in their respective districts.

5. Administrative Fund. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall recommend an assessment for a Conference administrative fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expense of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this fund. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the fund. Payments from the fund shall be made only on vouchers signed by the secretary of the Conference; provided that this rule does not relate to the salary and expenses of the Treasurer of the Conference.

6. Conference Treasurer. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the Conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer on recommendation of the World Service Commission, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.

7. Number of Districts. There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Conference.

8. District Fund. The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall report to the district conference, annually, showing receipts and disbursements.

9. Reports and Resolutions. There shall be a pre-conference report which shall contain reports of all the boards and agencies of the Conference. This report shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Annual Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the pre-conference reports shall be typewritten, in triplicate, on special forms furnished by the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary. In the event editing of a report is deemed necessary by the Conference Secretary and chairman of the board involved, permission is hereby granted.

10. Membership of Historical Society. The Historical Society shall be composed of ten members, one of whom shall be the Conference Secretary. In addition to the duties outlined in the Discipline, the Society shall secure a group picture of each class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal; and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his retirement.

11. Safeguarding Historical Material. (1) Any member of the Little Rock Annual Conference, or layman authorized by a member of the Conference, may examine Historical documents within Headquarters Building. (2) To remove historical documents from Headquarters Building, a written request signed by the presiding Bishop and Conference Secretary shall be presented to the Custodian. Provided further, historical documents belonging to the Conference Woman's Society may be removed from Headquarters Building upon written request signed by the President and Secretary of the Woman's Conference. (3) The Custodian of Historical documents shall be given a receipt for any material removed from the vault in Headquarters Building, Little Rock, giving date of removal and name of receiver.

12. District Conference. There shall be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline and one additional member from each pastoral

charge, provided however, in charges of more than five hundred members there shall be one additional member for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.

13. Lay Members. Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the pastor-host of the Annual Conference at least fifteen days before the session of the Annual Conference.

14. Board Service. No person may be nominated to serve on the same Conference Board for more than two consecutive quadrenniums, and may not be nominated to serve on more than one board at the same time. District Superintendents may not serve on Conference Boards, except as provided in the Discipline or by specific conference action. A person failing to attend a board, of which he is a member in a quadrennium may be continued only by special board action.

15. Entertainment. The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the retired ministers shall be entertained from the entertainment fund. Each member of the Conference, both clerical and lay and supply pastors in attendance shall pay \$1.00 registration fee to the entertainment fund, and all offerings unless otherwise specified shall go to the fund. The entertainment fund shall be administered by a committee composed of the pastor-host and two other persons elected by the Conference Council reporting in the next session of the Annual Conference.

16. Conference Expense. Registration fees and the offerings at the public services in the session of the Annual Conference shall be used to defray the expense of the session including the expense and/or honorarium of the conference preacher and that any deficit remaining be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund, and the Conference Treasurer shall pay the same.

17. Pastor's Traveling Expense. After the Fourth Quarterly Conference of a charge has set the minimum salary of a pastor for the ensuing year, the Quarterly Conference may set the traveling expense fund for the pastor in an amount not to exceed \$1,200.00 per year for each pastor and associate pastor assigned to a pastoral charge, provided, however, that charges of more than one church may allow an additional \$300.00 travel expense per each additional church.

Provided further, that no salary may be lowered to initiate an expense fund or to increase an existing expense fund.

18. Pastor's Utilities. At the Fourth Quarterly Conference after a Charge has set the minimum salary of a pastor for the ensuing year, the Quarterly Conference may so direct that an amount not to exceed \$600 may be paid by the church for parsonage utilities, provided, however, that the pastor's salary and travel allowance is not lowered to do this, and that this money will be used by the church and/or pastor for parsonage utilities only. Further, this amount shall be subject and no apportionment by any group or to pay into any fund. Be it further provided that a church may designate a part of the pastor's salary as utilities for income tax purposes.

19. Unsponsored Resolutions. Any resolution not sponsored by a regular board or standing committee of the Conference must lie over for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon provided, however, immediate debate and action may be ordered by two-thirds vote of the Conference presence and voting.

20. Apportionments Based on Pastor's Salary. On all items apportioned to local churches by means of a percentage of the ministers salary; such percentage shall be understood to apply to all ministerial members of the local church staff, serving under the appointment of the Bishop, including ministers in full connection, ministers on trial, and full time approved supply pastors. This rule to be in effect with the 1966-1967 Conference Year.

21. Amendments. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.

PETITION FOR INCORPORATION

IN THE MATTER OF THE INCORPORATION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN THE ARKANSAS AREA, SOUTH CENTRAL JURISDICTION, OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA

PETITION FOR INCORPORATION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN THE ARKANSAS AREA, SOUTH CENTRAL JURISDICTION, OF THE METHODIST CHURCH IN THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

The undersigned twelve persons, now constituting the Board of Trustees of the Little Rock Annual Conference of The Methodist Church in the Arkansas area, South Central Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church in the United States of America, represent to this Court:

That the Little Rock Annual Conference in the Arkansas Area, South Central Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church in the United States of America, is not incorporated. That the Board of Trustees of said Conference, consisting of the undersigned twelve persons, each above the age of 21 years, six of whom being ministers in effective relation in the Conference and six being members in good standing of local churches within the bounds of the Conference, with their respective addresses as stated, and, being the incorporators, desire for such Board of Trustees to become incorporated under the Arkansas-Non-Profit Corporation Act, (the same being Act No. 176 of the Acts of the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas for the year 1963 (Arkansas Statutes, Section 64-1901 through 64-1921), for any and all lawful purpose or purposes, including without being limited to: charitable, benevolent, eleemosynary, educational and religious purposes.

1.

The name of the Corporation shall be:

The Board of Trustees of the Little Rock Annual Conference of The Methodist Church in the Arkansas Area, South Central Jurisdiction, of The Methodist Church in the United States of America.

2.

The address of the Corporation shall be 1723 Broadway, Little Rock, Arkansas, and the agent for service shall be the Secretary of the Little Rock Conference, and his successors in office.

3.

The period of duration of said Corporation shall be perpetual.

4.

The purpose, or purposes for which the Corporation is organized shall be and is to discharge, perform and execute the functions, duties and powers granted to said Board under the Ecclesiastical law of The Methodist Church in the United States of America as set out in its Doctrines and Discipline adopted, promulgated and published by its General Conference in the year 1964, and as the same may have been or may thereafter be amended, altered, changed, repealed or supplanted, and, all as provided by the laws of the State of Arkansas.

5.

The said Corporation shall receive, collect, and hold in trust for the benefit of the Annual Conference any and all donations, bequests, and devises of any kind or character, real or personal, that may be given, devised, bequeathed, or conveyed to the said Board or to the Annual Conference as such for any benevolent, charitable, or religious purpose, and shall administer the same and the income therefrom in accordance with the directions of the donor, trustor, or testator, and in the interest of the church, society, institution, or agency contemplated by such donor, trustor, or testator, under the direction of the Annual Conference. The Board shall have power to invest, reinvest, buy, sell, transfer, and convey any and all funds and properties which it may hold in trust, subject always to the terms of the legacy, devise, or donation; provided, however, that the foregoing shall not apply to churches, colleges, camps, conference grounds, orphanages, or incorporated Boards. When the use to be made of any such donation, bequest, or devise is not otherwise designated, the same shall be added to and become a part of the "Permanent Fund" of the Annual Conference. Funds committed to this Board may be invested by it only in collateral that is amply secured and after such investments have been approved by the said Board, or its agency or committee charged with such investment, unless otherwise directed by the Annual Conference.

6.

To perform and execute all other duties which may be imposed and delegated to it by the Discipline of The Methodist Church as set forth in its 1964 edition thereof, all of the said duties and responsibilities being incorporated herein by reference as fully as if set forth verbatim.

7.

No membership fees may or shall be collected nor shares of stock or certificates of membership issued.

WHEREFORE, premises considered, said incorporators as such Board of Trustees pray that it be declared a body politic and corporate and that it have all the privileges and powers and be subject to all liabilities as provided by law and that this Court issue an Order approving such incorporation and its Articles of Incorporation and for the original and

duplicate of both, signed and verified, and a copy of the Order of this Court approving said incorporation be transmitted to the Secretary of the State of Arkansas, who shall, when all fees have been paid, file the original of such Articles in his office and issue a Certificate of Incorporation to which he shall affix the other copy of the Articles endorsed with the word, "Filed," and the month, day and year of the filing thereof and return the same to the incorporators or their representative, Kenneth M. Goode, Chairman of the Corporation; and for all other proper and legal relief.

CHARTER METHODIST CHILDRENS HOME

A proposal to bring up to date and to amend Article Seven (7) and Article Nine (9) of the Articles of Incorporation of The Methodist Children's Home, as recommended by the Board of Trustees, in session April 30, 1965.

Be it resolved that Article Seven (7) and Article Nine (9) of the Articles of Incorporation of The Methodist Children's Home, Inc., as recorded in the record of Benevolent Corporations, Book 5, Page 584, in the Circuit Clerk's Office of Pulaski County, Arkansas, which Articles, as of this date, April 30, 1965, read, as follows:

ARTICLE SEVEN (7)

"There shall be a Board of Trustees, consisting of fifteen members, seven of whom shall be elected by the North Arkansas Annual Conference of The Methodist Church of Arkansas, and seven by the Little Rock Annual Conference of said Church. Nominations shall be made by the Conference Board of Hospitals and Homes, or such other agencies as the Conference may direct. The Resident Bishop of the Area, including the two said Annual Conferences, shall be ex-officio, a member of the said Board. Vacancies in the Board shall be filled by the Annual Conference in which they occur; provided that the Board may fill vacancies in the interim, and trustees so elected shall hold office until the next meeting of their respective Annual Conferences. Hereafter, all trustees elected by their Annual Conferences shall be for a term of three years, except when filling the unexpired terms of one whose place has been made vacant. The Board shall hold and administer all property now in their hands, or that may hereafter be acquired by the said Methodist Children's Home, Inc., in trust for the said Methodist Church in Arkansas. Members of the Board and incorporators of the New and Amended Articles of Incorporation were C. M. Reves, Connor Morehead, E. T. Wayland, and R. J. Rice, whose terms expire at the meeting of their respective Annual Conferences in 1946; Harold D. Sadler, J. L. Dedman, Sam B. Wiggins, and E. B. Belshe, whose terms shall expire at the meeting of their Annual Conferences in 1947; T. E. Fuller, Paul V. Galloway, George H. Burden, and Horace M. Lewis, whose terms shall expire at the meeting of their Annual Conferences in 1948."

ARTICLE SEVEN (7)

shall be amended, as follows:

"There shall be a Board of Trustees of thirty members, one of whom shall be ex-officio, the Resident Bishop of the Methodist Church in Arkansas, two of whom shall be ex-officio, the District Superintendents designated to serve as Chairman in the respective Cabinets of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conference, six of whom shall be laymen and six of whom shall be clergymen, elected by the Little Rock Annual Conference of the said Church or its successor, six of whom shall be laymen and six of whom shall be clergymen, elected by the North Arkansas Annual Conference of the said Church or its successor; provided that the terms of office of two laymen and two clergymen from each Annual Conference shall expire annually at the regular sessions of the Annual Conference, beginning in 1966, and thereafter, at the expiration of each Trustees term of office he, or his successor shall be elected for a term to expire at the regular session of his Annual Conference next succeeding three years after his election, or until his successor is elected; provided further, that in case of a vacancy in the elective membership of the Board a new trustee shall be elected for the unexpired term by the Annual Conference in which the vacancy occurred, at the regular session next succeeding the occurring of the vacancy. All of the aforesaid elective trustees shall be nominated by the Conference Board of Hospitals

and Homes of their respective Annual Conference, or by such other agencies as the Annual Conferences may from time to time determine, provided that no person shall be nominated to succeed himself for more than three terms, effective at the Annual Conferences of 1966, and provided further that the Board of Trustees may, at its discretion, elect as many as three additional members at large for such terms as may be determined by the Board on recommendation of its Committee on Nominations. The said Board of Trustees shall hold and administer all property now in their hands and such other property as may hereafter be acquired by the said Methodist Children's Home, Inc., in trust for the said Methodist Church in Arkansas.

Members of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Children's Home, Inc., and incorporators of the New and Amended Articles of Incorporation, as amended in this and the following Article Nine (9) being the members of said Board of Trustees as of this date, April 30, 1965, namely: W. A. Stone, R. B. Newcome, Harold D. Sadler, E. D. Galloway, Homer N. Fulbright, Earl Hughes, James R. Chandler, and A. B. McKeithen, whose terms expire at the session of their Annual Conference in June, 1965. L. E. Drewery, Joe T. Thompson, Arthur Terry, Cecil R. Culver, E. Clay Bumpers, Byron McSpadden, B. Vernon Dennis, and Mrs. Vance Thompson, whose terms expire at the session of their Annual Conference in 1966. L. E. Tennyson, W. Braska Savage, C. Ray Hozendorf, Henry Rainwater, R. J. Rice, Charles Lewis, W. Henry Goodloe, and H. F. Buhler, whose terms expire at the session of their Annual Conference in June, 1967."

ARTICLE NINE (9)

"The Board shall elect annually a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. Eight members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of all business."

ARTICLE NINE (9)

shall be amended, as follows:

"The Board of Trustees shall annually elect a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. A majority of the effective members of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of all business."

RESOLUTIONS OF THE ACTIVE MEMBERSHIP OF ARKANSAS METHODIST FOUNDATION

Upon recommendation of the Board of Directors of Arkansas Methodist Foundation, the active membership of said corporation adopts the following Resolutions:

BE IT RESOLVED that Article First of the Articles of Incorporation of Arkansas Methodist Foundation be and it is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"FIRST: The name of this corporation is

THE METHODIST FOUNDATION OF ARKANSAS."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Article Eighth of the Articles of Incorporation of Arkansas Methodist Foundation be and it is hereby amended so that it shall read as follows:

"EIGHTH: The affairs and business of this corporation shall be controlled and conducted by a board of Directors consisting of such number as may be fixed by the By-laws of this corporation, but in any event shall consist of not less than thirteen (13) nor more than twenty-six (26) directors. Each of the initial directors and their successors shall be for a duration of three years with the initial directors having staggered terms, one of such directors for a period of one year, two of said directors for a period of two years, and two of said directors shall serve for a period of three years and thereafter their successors shall be elected for a term of three years."
