



Sacrament of The Lord's Supper: Bishop Paul V. Galloway announced the opening hymn, No. 336, "And Are We Yet Alive." Following the singing of the hymn, Fred R. Harrison, host pastor, led the Con-

ference in prayer.

Bishop Galloway welcomed the delegates and called for special prayer for Reverend and Mrs. P. D. Alston and Reverend L. W. Fair, who are in the St. Joseph Hospital. He then spoke to the Conference relative to the structure of the Church as it relates to the larger church of Christ and reflected the feelings of the Council of Bishops in regard to the Methodist position. He also lifted up the EUB merger and The Central Jurisdiction as matters to be considered by this session of the Conference. He admonishd the delegates to learn how to share their pastors and then concluded his remarks by leading the Conference in prayer. He announced The Order for the Administration of The Lord's Supper, No. 832 in The Hymnal. He was assisted in reading the ritual by Reverend James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference. The Cabinet, Otto W. Teague, C. Ray Hozendorf, J. Edward Dunlap, Joe R. Phillips, Alf A. Eason, and Arthur Terry, joined James E. Major and Fred R. Harrison in serving the elements. Bishop Galloway dismissed the tables.

After the last group had been served Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation to Mrs. DuBois of the First Presbyterian Church for her service at the organ, and announced the closing hymn, No. 142, "Oh, For a Faith That Will Not Shrink." Dr. W. E. Brown, answering his sixtieth roll call at a Methodist Annual Conference, pronounced the

benediction.

Monday, May 22nd Evening

Worship Service: Bishop Galloway announced the opening hymn, No. 279, "I Want A Principle Within," and following the singing of it led the Conference in prayer. The choir of Grand Avenue Methodist Church sang the anthem, "Fear Not, O Israel." Joe R. Phillips, Secretary of the Cabinet, read the report of the District Superintendents. A motion to receive the report was made and seconded. Bishop Galloway announced hymn No. 223, "When We Walk With The Lord." Bishop Galloway then expressed appreciation for the special music provided by the Grand Avenue Choir. He announced a reception in the Activity Room after the service for Miss Judy Atwood, deaconess, and invited the congregation to attend. The offering was received and the choir sang an offertory number, "Arise, O Lord."

Bishop Galloway presented the Conference preacher, Bishop John Owen Smith of Atlanta, Georgia. The scripture read was Matthew 12: 8-16, and the message was based on the "withered arm." Bishop Galloway and Bishop Smith conducted the commissioning service for Miss Judy Atwood, a deaconess in The Methodist Church, serving in the Hope District. The closing hymn was announced, No. 207, "Be Not Dismayed." M. E. Scott, pastor of the Mena Church and a close associate of Judy

Atwood, gave the benediction.

Tuesday, May 23 Morning

Devotional: Bishop Galloway announced the hymn No. 124, "Ask Ye What Great Thing I Know." After the singing of the hymn, Bishop Galloway informed the Conference of the death of L. W. Fair, a North

Arkansas Conference minister, then read the scripture lesson from Hebrews and Psalms. He concluded the devotional with a prayer.

Board of Ministerial Training: George W. Martin, Chairman of the Board, presented Tom Abney, Registrar, who in turn presented the class for admission into full connection: James McIver, Jr., Will Spiller Milton, Joe E. Arnold. John Thomas Adkinson, Allen B. Bonsall, Howell Odom Richardson, James B. Swaim, Charles Olson Walthall. Bishop Galloway received them into full connection.

Picture: Alfred Knox, Editor of The Arkansas Methodist, requested a picture of the class received into full connection. Bishop Galloway called for it to be done after the first ballot.

Nominations: Joe R. Phillips, Secretary of the Cabinet, made the Cabinet nominations. The slate was elected.

Tellers: Lay: Carl Hall, Chairman, E. B. Matkin, Dale Booth, Paul Jones, Earl O'Neal, R. B. Newcome, Horace Fisher. Reserves: Ralph Wilson, Frank Thompson, J. C. Cabe, Clerical: Harold Scott, Chairman, Carr Dee Racop, R. O. Beck, John B. Ross, Robert Regnier, Harold Davis. Reserves: John O. Alston, James Shaddox, and N. Lee Cate.

Roll Call: James E. Major announced the Roll Call being taken at the registration desk in the fellowship hall downstairs, and encouraged all delegates to register.

Bar of the Conference: James E. Major moved that the Bar of the Conference be from the pillars forward in the Sanctuary. It was done.

Personal Privilege: Marshall T. Steel made a moving address requesting the Conference to withhold his name from the ballot, and expressed appreciation to the Conference for their kindness to him across the years. Stanley Baugh requested the Conference to vote for him anyway, but Dr. Steel replied that he was embarrassed by this, and Bishop Galloway concurred.

Transfer: Bishop Galloway announced the transfer of T. T. McNeal to the Conference, and welcomed him to the Little Rock Conference.

Ballot Books: The Tellers were instructed to distribute the ballot books.

Gavel: Bishop Galloway announced that the gavel he was using today was made by Bill Shepherd out of the wood used in making the beautiful cross which hangs over the altar in the new Mabelvale Sanctuary, a cross which Mr. Shepherd hewed out of an oak tree from his homeplace.

Ballot No. 1: James E. Major announced that the ministers are to vote for three delegates to General Conference. The ministers' vote was taken. The laymen were then given the privilege of voting for three lay delegates. The tellers retired for the count.

Personal Privilege: Fred R. Harrison presented John Miles and Bob Trieschmann of the courtesy committee who escorted Mrs. Paul V. Galloway to the front of the church. The Conference stood in appreciation of Arkansas Methodism's First Lady.

Welcome: Melvin Sossaman, the new Chairman of the Board of the First Methodist Church of Hot Springs, extended a gracious welcome to the Conference.

Flowers: Bishop Galloway informed the Conference that the flowers in the Sanctuary today are in memory of J. D. Baker and John B. Hefley.

Remembrances: Bishop Galloway asked the Conference to remember in prayer the following persons absent from the Conference: Reverend and Mrs. P. D. Alston, Mrs. Clem Baker, and Mrs. Anthony Webster.

Book Store: Mr. Wright of Cokesbury invited the delegates to visit the book store located in the basement. He lifted up recent publications of interest to pastors and concerned laity. He presented a check for the retired ministers to Bishop Galloway from Cokesbury.

Pensions: Raymond Franks of Lakeside Church, Pine Bluff, also presented a check to the Pension Board from the Brewster Trust Fund, in the amount of \$2,000.00.

Courtesy: Bob Trieschmann and John Miles presented guests to the Conference: Dr. and Mrs. T. T. McNeal, Reverend John McCormack, Clyde Crosier, Withers Moore, Norman Hammett, Dr. and Mrs. Fred Roebuck, John Chapman, Gerald Hammett, Howard Miller of the General Board of Pensions, and C. C. Hall.

Funeral: Wayne C. Jarvis announced the funeral of L. W. Fair to be at 2:00 P.M., Wednesday at Gardner Church.

Conference Relations: Kenneth Spore, Chairman, presented Wendell O. Hoover, Secretary, who read Report No. 1 of the Committee. The character of the ministers in the Conference was approved. They requested the names of James Beck and Robert E. Carney be removed from the rolls of the conference, this action to be taken at their request. It was done.

Historical Society: Stanley T. Baugh, Secretary, represented the report of the Society. It was adopted. Harold Sadler read a resolution requesting the Conference to designate the Washington Church as a Methodist landmark. The resolution was adopted. Stanley Baugh announced that this would be his last time to appear before the Conference as Secretary of the Historical Society, after having served in this capacity for twenty-three years. He has been a member of the Society for thirty-nine years.

Sixty sessions: John L. Hoover was presented to the Conference, and the delegates stood in appreciation of his sixty years of service to the church.

Historical Society: Stanley Baugh presented the book "Methodism's Gateway to the Southwest," and informed the Conference that copies are available at the chancel for all delegates.

Standing Rules: Kenneth L. Spore presented a proposed change in Standing Rule 10, and Otto W. Teague presented a proposed change in Standing Rule 15. C. R. Hozendorf presented a proposed change in Standing Rule 2. By disciplinary requirement these proposed changes in Standing Rules were ordered to lie on the table for twenty-four hours before action can be taken.

EUB merger: Marshall T. Steel presented the proposal as it comes to us from the General Conference and moved approval of the constitutional amendment. Harold Sadler asked about EUB representation on our boards. B. T. Fooks inquired about the pension, insurance and other programs under the merger. Robert E. L. Bearden asked if an EUB Bishop will be assigned to the South Central Jurisdiction. (The answer is "yes.") Winston Hudnall spoke to the Conference relative to the Central Jurisdiction as related to the EUB merger. Robert Van Hook II asked why there are to be two statements of faith under the New Church, Marshall Steel responded to the questions. The question was called and the vote was taken, 167 in favor and 43 against.

Report from the Tellers: Otto W. Teague was elected to head the ministerial delegation. There was no lay election.

Ballot No. 2: The ministers were instructed to vote for two, the lay delegates for three, and the ballots were taken.

Announcement: Fred R. Harrison announced that the deadline for securing tickets to the Ministers Wives luncheon is noon today.

Personal Privilege: Monzell Silkwood presented a proposed standing rule requiring all financial campaigns be approved by ballot. It is to remain on the floor twenty-four hours before consideration by the Conference.

Minimum Salary: John O. Alston, Chairman, presented Osborne White, Secretary, who read the report. John Alston then spoke to the report.

Clifton Rule asked if a person who is not a member of the Annual Conference can be a member of a board or agency within the conference. Bishop Galloway said yes, but **without** voting privileges, and this change is to be made in the report. The report was adopted.

Announcement: Bishop Galloway reminded the delegates of a session of the Conference this afternoon at 2:00 o'clock, and gave the schedule of the conference, which is to conclude with the Thursday session, or before or later, if time is needed.

Pensions: George Meyer, Chairman, presented Wayne C. Jarvis who read the report and moved its adoption. Ralph Mann spoke to the report from the floor of the Conference. Robert E. L. Bearden reported from the Pension Study Committee. He stated that the Pension Program of the Conference is currently on a hand-to-mouth basis, and that it needs immediate and serious attention He assured the conference that this committee will be diligent and faithful in pursuing its study. Additional reports from the Board were distributed to the Conference. Charles Ashcraft, Secretary of the Board, spoke to these reports. The report of the Board of Pensions was adopted.

Report from the Tellers: There was no election among the ministers. S. H. Allman was elected by the Laymen to head their delegation to the General Conference.

Ballot No. 3: The Third Ballot was taken.

Announcement: Wayne Jarvis announced the Retired Ministers' dinner at Grand Avenue Methodist Church tonight at 5:30.

Courtesy: Bob Trieschmann presented guests to the Conference: D. Mouzon Mann, Dr. A. W. Martin, Bates Sturdy, Reverend and Mrs. John Workman, Reverend and Mrs. James Meadors, Mrs. Robert Milwee, secretary to Bishop Galloway, Claude Hall, and Harold Hansford.

Announcement: Ralph Mann announced a dinner at the Travelier for all Supply Ministers tonight at 5:30.

Committee on Memoirs: Charles Ramsey read the report. Marshall Steel asked if it might be adopted without reading. Bishop Galloway ruled that since the report does not appear in the Pre-Conference Journal it must be read. Charles Ramsey moved the adoption of the report. It was done.

Announcements: Tom Nation announced the Town and Country Dinner to be held at Grand Avenue Methodist Church May 24th. John Alston and John Miles also made announcements.

Recess: Bishop Galloway called for a ten-minute recess before the Service of Commemoration.

Service of Commemoration: Harold K. Davis announced the opening hymn No. 302, "Come, Let Us Join Our Friends Above." After the singing of the hymn he led the Conference in the historic affirmation of faith, "The Apostles' Creed." The Gloria Patri was sung. Kirvin A. Hale read the Scripture lesson: Hebrews, the eleventh chapter. James Shaddox gave the prayer. Harold K. Davis led the Litany of Commemoration. The Conference stood as Reverend James E. Major read the names of those being memorialized: J. D. Baker, Herman Ginther, John B. Hefley, E. T. McAfee, George E. Reutz, Mrs. James M. Cannon, Mrs. Herbert Joyner, and Mrs. C. C. Van Zant. Kenneth L. Spore preached the memorial sermon. Harold K. Davis announced the closing hymn No. 306, "Blest Be The Tie That Binds," and Stanley T. Baugh pronounced the benediction.

Tuesday, May 23

Afternoon

Correspondence: James E. Major noted letters received from Dr. Clem Baker, Claude R. Roy, and R. M. Crain, expressing regrets that they could not be present for the conference, and expressing their love to the brethren. C. Ray Hozendorf also noted a letter received from G. B. Pixley of Shongaloo, Louisiana.

Western Methodist Assembly. E. G. Kaetzel brought a report from Mt. Sequoyah and expressed appreciation for the support received from the conference through the \$10.00 per charge program.

Report from the Tellers: No election for either the ministers or the laymen. Both groups were instructed to prepare their ballots for two. Ballot No. 4 was then taken and the tellers retired for the counting.

 $\mbox{\bf Presentation:}$ Bishop Galloway invited Bishop J. O. Smith, Conference Preacher, to the platform.

Board of Ministerial Training: George W. Martin presented Tom Abney, Registrar of the Board, to present the candidates for admission on trial: Fred Haustein, John Shafer, Rodney Wallace, Don Alfred, George R. Cleary. They were admitted. Bishop Galloway led in the service receiving those named into Admission on Trial. The Conference stood in appreciation.

Tom Abney, representing the Board, recommended the following for Deacon's Orders: William T. Dunker, Daniel C. George, Thomas Hatcher, Fred Haustein, Robert Irvin, John W. Shafer, Rodney Wallace, Leonard D. Yates. For Elders Orders: Joe E. Arnold, John Thomas Adkinson, Leo Lonnie Beck, Allen B. Bonsall, Dale L. Diffee, Will Spiller Milton, Howell Odom Richardson, James McIver Speights, Jr., and Earl S. Wager. They were approved.

Report from the Tellers: Bishop Galloway interrupted the Board of Ministerial Training to give a report from the tellers. There was no election, either for the ministers or the laymen. The delegates, lay and ministerial, were asked to prepare their ballots for two names. Ballot number five was taken and the tellers retired for the counting.

Board of Ministerial Training: Tom Abney continued with the report of the Board of Ministerial Training.

Election: Bishop Galloway requested James E. Major to ask the tellers if they would be able to report within the next ten minutes. He checked, and they said they could.

Board of Ministerial Training: Tom Abney continued with the presentation of the Board's report. Upon completing the report he moved its adoption. It was done. Bishop Galloway commended George W.

Martin, Tom Abney, and the Board for their splendid work. George W. Martin expressed appreciation to Tom Abney, and to the members of the Cabinet for their help in expediting the work of this Board.

Christian Vocations: Gerald Fincher, Chairman of the Commission, referred to the report appearing in the Pre-Conference Journal on pages 11 and 12, moved its adoption, and then spoke to the report. The report was accepted.

Report from the Tellers: C. Ray Hozendorf was elected to the General Conference delegation among the ministers. The ministers were instructed for one. The laymen had no election and were instructed to vote for two. The ballots were prepared and collected. James E. Major was instructed to seal the ballots for the tellers to count in the morning at 8:10.

Conference Board of Trustees: Kenneth Goode, Chairman, presented O. W. Hoover, Secretary, who presented the report of the Trustees. It was approved. A second report of the Trustees was also read and approved.

Recess: Bishop Galloway called an eight-minute recess before the afternoon preaching session.

Preaching Service: Gerald K. Fincher, Presiding Officer, announced the opening hymn, No. 1, "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing." Harold Sadler led the Conference in prayer. The offering was then received. C. Ray Hozendorf, Palmer Garner, Wayne C. Jarvis, Bryan Stephens and Harold Sewell, serving as ushers. Gerald Fincher announced Hymn 217, "He Leadeth Me." After the singing of the hymn Bishop J. O. Smith, the Conference Preacher, brought the message. The Scripture lesson was taken from the gospels regarding Jesus' last minutes on the cross. The sermon topic was "An Interpretation of Salvation." Gerald Fincher announced the closing hymn No. 174, "Rise Up, O Men of God." Following the singing of the hymn, he pronounced the benediction.

Tuesday, May 23 Evening

Worship Service: J. Ralph Hillis, presiding minister, announced the opening hymn, No. 14, "All That Dwell Below The Skies." Following the singing of the hymn, George W. Martin led the evening prayer. The anthem was sung by the Oaklawn Methodist Church Choir. J. Ralph Hillis expressed appreciation to the Chancel Choir for their contribution to the service and made an announcement—a phone call for Irl Lancaster. The offering was received. Ralph Hillis announced hymn No. 45, "This Is My Father's World." Following the singing of the hymn, Bishop John Owen Smith, Conference Preacher, brought the message: "What Sort of a World Without God"? Ralph Hillis announced the closing hymn, No. 28, "O God Our Help in Ages Past." Following the singing of the hymn he pronounced the benediction.

Wednesday, May 24

Morning

Devotional: Following the organ prelude, Bishop Galloway announced the opening hymn No. 251, "Jesus, I My Cross Have Taken."

After the singing of the hymn, he read the Scripture lesson from Paul's letters to the Church at Corinth, and then led the Conference in prayer.

Report of the Tellers: The ministers had no election, and were instructed to vote for two. The laymen elected two: Dale Booth and Mrs. Edgar Dixon, completing the General Conference delegation. They were instructed to vote for three, beginning the election for their Jurisdictional delegation. The eighth ballot was taken and the tellers retired for the count.

Announcement: James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference, reminded the delegates about registration in the basement and encouraged everyone to pay his \$1.00 registration fee.

Resolution: The Resolution for the Elimination of Racial Structure and the Development of Greater Understanding and Brotherhood in The Methodist Church was distributed to the Conference. Consideration of the Resolution was delayed for a few minutes.

Education: Fred R. Harrison, Chairman, presented William D. Elliott, who in turn read Report No. 1 of the Board. Gladwin Connell, Conference Youth Director, spoke to the report. Fred Harrison moved the adoption of the report. It was done. William D. Elliott read Report No. 2. Fred Harrison asked Marshall T. Steel to speak to the Report. He requested that a report from the tellers be given before he made his speech. The request was granted.

Report from the Tellers: There was no election for the ministers. The eighth ballot was taken, and the tellers retired for the count.

Hendrix College: Marshall T. Steel spoke to Report No. 2 of the Board of Education relative to the College. He expressed appreciation to the Conference for its grand support of the College, and reported that \$2,800,000 has been raised toward the goal of \$3,750,000 in the capital improvement program to receive the Ford Foundation grant of \$1,500,000. He announced that Mc George Bundy of the Ford Foundation has accepted the invitation to dedicate the new Library next October, and invited the Conference to join the Faculty and students in this great day on the campus.

Appreciation: Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation to Dr. Steel for his leadership at the College. The Conference stood to express gratitude for his outstanding leadership.

Perkins School of Theology: Dr. Joe Quillian brought greetings from SMU and Perkins School of Theology, and made his report to the Conference. He noted that chapel attendance by the students this year has been the best in his thirteen years of association with the Seminary. He especially mentioned the continuing education program of the Seminary, and said it was mushrooming.

Report of the Tellers: There was no election among the ministers. The ministers were instructed to vote for only one. Ballot No. 9 was taken, and the tellers retired for the count. There was one election for the laymen on this Jurisdictional delegation: Raymond Hillis. They were instructed to vote for two. Ballot No. 8 was taken, and the tellers retired for the count.

St. Paul's School of Theology Methodist: Dr. Charles W. Baughman, a member of our Conference now on the faculty at St. Paul's, spoke relative to the work of the Seminary. Fred R. Harrison moved the adoption of Report No. 2 of the Board of Education regarding Higher Education. It was seconded and passed.

Personal Privilege: Bishop Galloway presented Reverend Guyton of Lydia Patterson Institute who spoke to the Conterence. He brought greetings and expressed appreciation for the concern and support given the school by the State of Arkansas. Bishop Galloway spoke to the Conference about Lydia Patterson and encouraged continued support of the Institute.

Report of the Tellers: Robert E. L. Bearden was elected by the ministers completing their General Conference delegation. They were instructed to vote for three, beginning their election of Jurisdictional delegates. Ballot No. 10 was taken, and the tellers retired for counting. There was no election for the laymen. They were instructed to vote for two. Ballot No. 9 was taken and the tellers retired for counting.

Board of Education: Fred R. Harrison, Chairman, presented William D. Elliott, Secretary, who read Report No. 3 of the Board, regarding Wesley Foundation campus ministry. Fred R. Harrison moved the adoption of the report. It was done.

Appreciation: Fred R. Harrison presented Mrs. Marie Tucker, Conference Director of Children's Work, and W. Neill Hart, Executive Secretary of the Board to the Conference, and expressed appreciation for their services.

Resolution: Marshall T. Steel spoke to the Resolution for the Elimination of Racial Structure and the Development of Greater Understanding and Brotherhood in The Methodist Church as amended and adopted by The General Conference of The Methodist Church in its special session, November 10, 1966, in Chicago, Illinois. The Resolution as printed is being presented to all annual conferences within the church for consideration. Marshall Steel moved adoption of the Resolution. Arthur Terry seconded the motion. Harold Sadler asked for clarification. Robert E. L. Bearden gave some statistical information regarding Central Jurisdiction churches within our Conference. Stanley T. Baugh asked for information relative to pension provisions under the Resolution. Ralph Sewell asked how the churches within the Central Jurisdiction voted on the issue. Harold Sadler asked why only the South Central and South Eastern Jurisdictions are voting on the Resolution. Question was called and the vote was taken. The Lay tellers, under the direction of Carl Hall, were instructed to take the count. James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference, announced the count as 110 for and 58 against.

American Bible Society: Theodore R. Van Der Veer, Regional Distribution Secretary for the Society, reported to the Conference.

Committee on Minutes: Cagle Fair reported the minutes have been read and approved. The report was adopted. Harold Sadler moved that the Committee be authorized to read and approve minutes after the Conference sessions are over. It was done.

Reporte from the Tellers: Roland Shelton was elected. The laymen were instructed to vote for only one. Ballot No. 10 was taken, and the tellers retired for the counting.

Conference Relations: Kenneth L. Spore, Chairman, presented Wendell Hoover who read the report of the Committee. They recommended that R. B. Moore Sr., and T. T. McNeal be added to the Retired Ministers Roll, and that DeWitt Harbeson and Charlie Elon Lawrence be added to the Approved Supply Retirement Roll. These men spoke to the Conference. The Committee recommended that W. C. Chenault and J. Charles Dunn be located, at their own request. The committee's report was adopted.

Report from the Tellers: Joe Phillips and Arthur Terry were elected. The ministers were instructed to prepare their ballots for one, Ballot No. 11 was taken and the tellers retired for counting. The laymen had no election. They were instructed to vote for one, Ballot No. 11 was taken and the tellers retired for the counting.

Voting Privilege for Tellers: Marshall T. Steel requested permission for the clerical tellers who were out of the room to vote on the Resolution regarding the Central Jurisdiction. It was granted and the vote was taken. The vote was six for and one against. This vote will be added to that taken previously. There was some discussion regarding the lay tellers' privilege of voting on the issue. Bishop Galloway ruled that since they were on the floor of the Conference at the time of the vote, they should not be given a second chance.

Episcopal Residence: Bishop Galloway reported on the Episcopal residence, saying that \$2000.00 had been borrowed. The amount is to be repaid from the Bishop's rental allowance.

Family Life Committee: Martha and Winston Faulkner of First Methodist Church in Little Rock and delegates to the National Family Life Conference, spoke to the Conference. They announced a Family Life Conference to be held April 5-6, 1968, with Bishop Hazen G. Werner as principal speaker and made a very impressive presentation, drawing attention to the Family Life Program of the Church.

Courtesy: Bob Trieschmann presented the following to the Conference: Reverend and Mrs. Roland Darrow, Mrs. George Moon (Office Secretary of the Board of Education), Allan Hilliard, Charles Richards, Paul Lanier, Reverend O. L. Huffman from the Indiana Conference, Archie Boyd, John B. Hays, Reverend and Mrs. Frank Atkins, Elmer Holifield and Walter A. Hearn of Philander Smith College. All of the wives of ministers present were asked to come forward that they might be presented to the Conference delegates, who stood in appreciation.

Resolution: Marshall Steel reported that the Conference lacked two-thirds of a vote passing by a two-thirds majority the Central Jurisdiction Resolution.

Insurance Committee: R. B. Moore, Jr. presented Sidney Good, Chairman, who gave the report of the Committee. He moved its adoption. It was done.

Lay Activities: S. H. Allman, Conference Lay Leader, spoke to the Conference. He encouraged attendance at the Layman's Session to be held at 2:00 o'clock this afternoon. Hale for his work in preparing the program "Fire or Failure," which is to be the Evangelism program for 1967-1968.

Deaconess Board: Mrs. Edgar Dixon informed Bishop Galloway that there is no Deaconess Board in the Conference, but that it is to be formed, since Miss Judith Atwood had just been commissioned as a Deaconess, she being the only Deaconess within the Conference.

Social Concerns: Woodrow W. Smith gave the report of the Board. It was adopted. He presented Ed Matthews, who read a Resolution to memorialize the General Conference regarding structure of the Church. The Resolution was adopted.

Christian Civic Foundation: W. Henry Goodloe spoke in behalf of the Foundation.

Report of the Tellers: William M. Shepherd, and L. L. Miller were elected as reserves by the laymen in this order.

Announcements: Carl Hall announced that the Jurisdictional Conference is to be held in Oklahoma, July 24-28, 1968. The General Conference will be in Dallas, Texas, April 21 - May 4, 1968.

Martin announced the rehearsal for the Ordination Service, and made a plea for help in securing rituals for the service, since the printed forms have not arrived.

Benediction: Reverend Hall of New Haven Church in Hot Springs of the Central Jurisdiction pronounced the benediction.

Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation to this church, its pastor, and to all of those in Hot Springs who have helped to make this a meaningful week. The offering was received. Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation to Bishop J. O. Smith for his inspirational messages. After the singing of the hymn No. 335, "Let Zion's Watchmen All Awake," Bishop Smith brought the Ordination Message, "What Do You Think The Church Needs To Do More Than Anything Else"? Bishop Galloway led the Service of Ordination. Louis M. Mulkey presented those to be ordained Deacon: William Thomas Dunker, Daniel Cecil George, Thomas Leon Hatcher, Fred Haustein, William Robert Irvin, John Wendell Shafer, Leonard Daniel Yates, David M. Hankins, Jr. joined Louis Mulkey in standing at the altar with the candidates. Bishop Smith shared with Bishop Galloway in conducting the Service. Thomas Abney, Registrar of the Board of Ministerial Training, held the Bible upon which candidates placed their hands. James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference presented the replacement. of the Conference, presented the parchments, and Tom Abney, Registrar for the Board of Ministerial Training, presented Books of Worship to the new Deacons. James Robert Scott presented those to be ordained Elder: Joe Edward Arnold, John Thomas Adkisson, Jr., Leo Lonnie Beck, Allen Bruce Bonsall, Dale Luther Diffee, William Spillar Milton, Howell Odom Richardson, James McIver Speights, Jr., and Earl Stanley Wagner. Ben Hines joined James Robert Scott in standing at the altar with the candidates. Bishops Galloway and Smith shared in conducting the Service of Ordination. The members of the Cabinet and special ministerial friends were invited to join the Bishops in the Laying On of the Hands. George W. Martin, Chairman of the Board of Ministerial Training, helped in the service by holding the Bible upon which candidates laid their hands. James E. Major presented the new Elders with their parchments, and George W. Martin, Chairman, of the Board, presented them with gift certificates for New Methodist Hymnals. Both classes were invited to stand at the altar facing the congregation. Bishop Galloway asked the families of those ordained to stand where they are and expressed appreciation to them. Thursday, May 25, 1967 Morning Session

Devotional: Following the organ prelude Bishop Galloway announced the opening hymn No. 174, "Rise Up, O Men of God." After the singing of the hymn Bishop Galloway read the Scripture lesson and then led the conference in prayer.

Minutes: Cagle Fair reported the minutes had been read and were in order.

Greetings: James E. Major announced greetings received from the Quapaw Area of the Boy Scouts of America. Bishop Galloway reported a letter received from Alva Rogers.

Committee on Interboard Structure: C. Ray Hozendorf, Chairman, gave the report of the study committee. E. Clifton Rule moved an amendment to the report. Item 2C shall include a layman from each

district to be nominated by the Bishop in cooperation with the District Superintendents. It was seconded by Wayne Jarvis. The amendment was accepted. James E. Major suggested that all connectional men and/or board or agency heads be members of the Council unless they are members of another annual conference. Then, they are to be accepted as ex-officio members without vote of the council. The suggestion was accepted by the study committee and will be included in the report. Wayne Jarvis asked about budget matters and job analysis relative to associates. W. O. Scroggin clarified the roll of the Town and Country budget in the structure. Question was called and the report was adopted as amended. Neill Hart, the new executive secretary of the Interboard Council, then spoke to the conference, and assured the delegates of his enthusiasm for the new structure and pledged his support to the total program of the church. The conference responded with applause.

Standing rule: C. Ray Hozendorf presented a change in Sanding Rule 2 relative to the Interboard structure. He moved the adoption. James Major asked for clarification of the conference calendar, saying a waiting period of 30 days would greatly delay publication of the Journal. Bishop Galloway assured the Secretary that the calendar would be prepared and then approved by the Council. He did not want the Journal publication delayed.

Arkansas Methodist: Robert M. Moore, Jr., Secretary of the Commission, presented the report as found in the Pre-conference Reports on page 9. He moved its adoption. Alfred Knox, editor of our church paper, spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

District Conference Journals: Darrel Bone moved the adoption of the report saying the journals were in order. It was done.

Publishing Interests: Edwin Dodson moved the adoption of the report as found on page 38 of the Pre-conference Reports. Dr. Ewing Wayland, a native son and editor of the TOGETHER-CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE, spoke to the report. The report was adopted. Bishop Galloway lifted up some very fine articles which he is reading in some of our church publications and spoke highly of the publishing interests of the church.

Missions: Carlos Martin, Chairman, referred to the report found in the Pre-conference Reports on pages 32 and following and moved adoption of the report. He noted a decrease in the giving to Advance Specials. Ferris Norton, Conference Missionary Secretary, spoke to this matter of Advance Specials and addressed himself primarily to the project of building a parsonage in Salina, Oklahoma, and our work at Lydia Patterson, saying an emergency fund of \$3,000.00 must be raised for this cause by August 1st. Bill Cheyne, representing the Spanish-speaking ministry of the church, spoke to the report. Bishop Galloway spoke to the emergency needs of Lydia Patterson's Institute and requested help in meeting our \$3,000.00 goal. Ed Matthews spoke in behalf of Camp Aldersgate. The report was adopted.

WSCS: Mrs. Edgar Dixon gave the report of the Women's Society of Christian Service.

State Council of Churches: Ed Matthews, President of the Council, addressed the conference relative to the work of the state council composed of ten member bodies.

Hospitals and Homes: Braska Savage, Chairman, presented Irl Bridenthal, Secretary, who read the report of the Board. He moved its adoption. Braska Savage spoke concerning the workshop at Mt. Sequoyah and Edwin Keith, Superintendent of the Methodist Children's Home, addressed the conference relative to the work of the Home. He expressed

appreciation for the fine support given by all of the districts to the Christmas offering. The report was adopted.

Cabinet Nominations: Joe R. Phillips made some nominations for the cabinet and they were elected. Permission to make certain nominations after the appointments were read was asked and it was granted.

Moving Day: Joe R. Phillips moved that moving day be Thursday, June 1st. It was so ordered.

Headquarters Commission: Joe R. Phillips reported to the conference relative to the status of a new Headquarters Building, stating that the Commission hoped to have a more specific report within the next 12 months. The report was adopted.

Courtesy: Bob Trieschman presented the following guests to the conference: Rev. J. M. Blassingame of Cotrell Chapel Christian Methodist Church in Hot Springs, Dr. Ewing T. Wayland, Bill Cheyne and Roy E. Farr, retired minister residing in Hot Springs.

Standing Rule: Monzel Silkwood spoke to the new standing rule proposed concerning the voting by the conference on all church-wide financial campaigns. The proposal recommends voting by secret ballot on these matters. He moved its adoption. Bishop Galloway explained the place of the standing rule in the conference, Question was called. The vote was so close Bishop Galloway called for a standing vote. H. E. Scott, O. Wendell Hoover asked questions relative to the rule. The vote was 110 for and 62 against. The standing rule prevailed and now becomes effective in the conference.

Memorial: Roland Shelton presented a resolution to send a memorial on to the general conference asking that supply pastors be included in the count when delegates to the general conference are elected. The resolution passed.

Standing Rule: Otto W. Teague read the proposed change in the standing rule relative to entertainment of the conference. Fred R. Harrison asked about entertainment of the retired ministers, James E. Major asked about sources of income for entertainment. John Miles wanted to know the advantages of the change. James E. Major reported that most of the delegates do register for the conference, Question was called and the change carried.

Board of Ministerial Training: George W. Martin, Chairman, presented Louis Mulkey, Secretary, who noted report No. 2 of the Board, found on page 30 of the Pre-conference Reports. George W. Martin spoke to the report. It was adopted.

TRAFCO: O. D. Peters, Chairman, presented Everette Patton, Secretary of the Commission, who read portions of the report as found on page 39-40 of the pre-conference digest relative to the establishment of a central audio-visual library in the office of the Town and Country executive secretary. O. D. Peters spoke to the report lifting up the enlarged outreach of the church through the television ministry at Pulaski Heights Methodist in Little Rock, Arkansas. Neill Hart and W. O. Scroggin spoke to the report relative to the establishment of the central library for audio-visual resources, John Miles asked for clarification regarding hiring of a librarian. The report was adopted.

Resolution: O. D. Peters read a resolution relative to the moral impact of television viewing that comes into our homes, and requested that November of 1967 be designated as Television Evaluation Month. O. D. Peters spoke to the resolution saying the proposal is a recommendation of the general TRAFCO Board with materials being provided by the Commissions. The resolution was adopted.

Town and Country: Tom Nation, Chairman of the Commission, referred to the report as found on pages 41-42 of the Pre-conference Reports. He noted two changes to be made in the report and moved its adoption as altered. W. O. Scroggin, Jr., Executive Secretary of the Board, spoke to the report. He noted the Lockesburg church in the Hope District as winner of the small town church of the year, the New Salem Church in the Arkadelphia District as winner of the Open Country Church of the Year. J. R. Callicott and Tom Nation, pastors of these churches, were asked to stand and Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for their work. C. Ray Hozendorf requested the names of these churches be included in the report. The Commission accepted this. The report was adopted.

Tanako: Neill Hart reported for the Tanako Trustees. He referred to the mimeographed sheets distributed to the delegates. He moved the adoption of the report. It was done.

Motion: Arthur Terry moved that the conference continue until all items were complete. It was seconded by Otto W. Teague and carried.

Statistician: Gerald K, Fincher gave the report noting that 794 persons have been removed by Quarterly Conference action. We have lost 293 members yet attendance this year showed an increase of 482. Sunday School continuing a small decline. He noted that we have an evaluation of \$27,242,476.00 in church plants, \$3,325,553.00 in parsonages, and \$1,693,559 in other assets. He moved the adoption of the report.

Treasurer: Grafton Thomas, Area Treasurer, gave the report. He noted the office collected a million and eighty-three dollars as of the date of the report. This is the largest amount ever received during the same period of time. He moved the adoption of the report. It was done.

World Service Commission: James Argue, Chairman, presented Edwin Dodson who gave the report noting a few changes in the Preconference Reports. The report was accepted as revised,

Appreciation: Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation to James E. Major for his fine work as Secretary of the conference. The conference expressed appreciation with applause. James Major named his staff: Woodrow W. Smith as Journal Clerk, Joana Dean as Secretary in the office, O. D. Peters who prepared the parchments, Kenneth L. Spore as Secretary of Service Records, and Harold K. Davis and Wayne Jarvis as Staff Assistants.

Conference Invitation: Gerald Fisher and Mel Sassamon of Hot Springs invited the conference to return to First Church, Hot Springs. Alvin Murry extended an invitation to El Dorado. He asked his fellow ministers from El Dorado to join him in extending the invitation — Ralph Hale, Noel Cross and David Wilson, Associate at First Church. Noel Cross asked if those behind the bar of the conference might be permitted to come into the bar of the conference to vote. The conference voted to go to El Dorado for the 1968 session. The delegates stood to accept the invitation to return to Hot Springs, First Church, in 1969.

Reading of the Appoints: Joe R. Phillips, Secretary of the Cabinet stood beside Bishop Galloway during the reading of the appointments. Bishop Galloway read the names of Donald A. Lau, Grover Zinn, Jr., and Frank V. Hilliard who have appointments to institutions not related to the Methodist Church and stated that the discipline required a % vote of the conference on these appointments. The vote was taken and the matter carried. Bishop Galloway continued with the reading of the appointments. Following the appointments, Bishop Galloway asked the conference to stand and sing the first stanza of "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" and then led the conference in a closing prayer and benediction.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To Bishop Paul V. Galloway and members of the One Hundred Fourteenth session of the Little Rock Annual Conference:

The report of the Conference Statistician will reflect certain gains in our over all program which are of singular significance. Each Sunday morning the Methodist churches of the Little Rock Conference minister to an average of 28,933 persons, an increase of 482 over last Conference Year. Indicative of the emerging new energy of our Christian Education program has been the increased use of additional sessions for children. An average of 2,969 Methodist children are receiving a program of enrichment through additional sessions of the Church School. Our program of Lay Activities continues to improve with membership in our Methodist Men's groups increasing approximately 10% this year.

The marked vitality of our Dictrict program has been a source of much encouragement. A brief summary of our District work will show the following:

1. Arkadelphia District.

Much creative work has been done through a program of Charge re-arrangement which is bringing a more consistent and a more effective ministry to all of the Methodist folk of this District. An outgrowth of this program has been the creation of a new station charge in the District.

2. Camden District.

The Hendrix College Special Gifts Campaign exceeded its quota. A special emphasis was placed upon the Children's Home Offering and this cause enjoyed a fine gain in the District. Two new parsonages have been completed and ground broken for another. Lots have been purchased for two other parsonages and one parsonage has been dedicated. One church has retired its indebtedness on its Educational Building.

3. Hope District.

The churches of this District have shown much strength in the enthusiastic acceptance of their connectional responsibilities. The District exceeded its quota for special gifts for Hendrix College. A Vacation Church School Clinic and Library Clinic was held with both lay workers and pastors participating. Extensive improvement and re-decoration on the District parsonage is underway.

4. Little Rock District.

A new program of Continuing Education for the Ministry has been initiated, and plans are being made to establish this program on a sustained basis. The Hendrix College Special Gifts Campaign met with fine success with the District going beyond its quota. Giving to the Methodist Children's Home in the Little Rock District increased 50% this Conference Year.

5. Monticello District.

The Hendrix College Special Gifts Campaign has been oversubscribed by 50%. The Children's Home offering in the District shows an increase of over 40%. Extensive building activity has been underway in all sections of the District, with both new churches and new parsonages having been completed this Conference Year.

6. Pine Bluff District.

The Superintendent of this District reports that an outstanding rapport exists between pastors and church members in the Pine

Bluff District. No church requested a change in pastors, and no pastor requested a move. A very fine response has been made to the Hendrix College Capital Fund Campaign, This District led the state in the Small Gifts Division of the campaign, Careful and extensive preparation has been made for the new Adult literature. Five acres of land has been purchased for a new Church site in the Union Community in south Pine Bluff.

The Cabinet expresses its gratitude and appreciation to the Boards, Commissions and Committees of the Annual Conference. The Pre-Conference Report reflects sound and creative work on the part of each responsible group in the Little Rock Annual Conference.

The Cabinet respectfully calls the attention of the Conference to two reports which it feels are of strategic importance for the strengthening of the Methodist work within the bounds of our Annual Conference.

1. Report #3 of the Board of Education. (Page 15, Pre-Conference Report). This report sets forth the recommendations of the Conference Board of Education in regard to our Wesley Foundation Campus Ministry. We believe this report to be sound, constructive, and thoroughly consistent with our Methodist heritage and polity. The Cabinet gives its strong commendation to the Board of Education as it presents this report.

2. Report of the Committee on Interboard Structure (Page 19, Pre-

Conference Report).

The recommendations contained in this report made by the special committee offers to the Annual Conference an operating and administrative structure which should strengthen the program of every Conference Board and make the most efficient use of our administrative personnel. We commend the Committee on Interboard Structure for its diligence and thoroughness in the preparation of this report, and endorse the same to this session of the Annual Conference.

The Little Rock Conference Cabinet expresses its genuine appreciation to Bishop Paul V. Galloway for his untiring labors, his bigness of concept, and his abiding concern for the welfare of the churches and ministers of this Annual Conference. We are deeply appreciative of the warm spirit and helpful interest that both Bishop and Mrs. Galloway bring to the life and work of this Annual Conference. Thoughtful and understanding and always patient, they bring the brotherhood ever closer together.

We believe that the achievements of this current Conference Year are an out-growth of the Episcopal leadership given the work. We are convinced that great things are ahead for the Church — that we have "only begun to see the Glory of God."

JOINT COMMISSION FOR THE ARKANSAS METHODIST AND THE LOUISIANA METHODIST

The Arkansas/Louisiana Methodist Commission makes the following recommendations to the 1967 Little Rock Annual Conference.

- 1. That the dates for the 1968 Circulation Campaign be January 7-14.
- 2. That the goal for the campaign be 40,000 with the quotas for the local church being set as one subscriber for every seven members reported by that church to the 1967 annual conference.
- 3. That the subscription price be \$2.50 per year, and that churches with a subscription list equal to one for every three members reported to the 1967 annual conference be eligible for a \$2 subscription rate.
- 4. That district superintendents and district directors be urged to accept the goal of one new church in each district that will include the paper in their budgets and send it to every family on their mailing list.
- 5. That the commissions on World Service and Finance of the Louisiana, Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences be asked to continue their annual appropriations of \$4,600 each per year for the support of the papers.
- 6. That the editor and either the chairman or secretary of the commission be authorized to sign notes at the Union National Bank, Little Rock, for money that must be borrowed for current operations.
- 7. That the executive committee be empowered to act for the commission in matters that require attention between meetings of the commission.
- 8. That we express our appreciation for all who have made our past year such a good one and for all who have helped us to have a successful circulation campaign in 1967. We are especially grateful to Bishops Paul V. Galloway and Aubrey G. Walton and to the 21 district superintendents and 21 district directors who help us to reach our goals.
- 9. We also want to thank all the hundreds of persons who help to supply the words and pictures necessary to keep 50 issues of your paper filled and interesting.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

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During the year 1966-1967, your Board of Christian Social Concerns has engaged in the following activities:

- 1. We promoted attendance at the Annual Regional Coaching Conference at Mount Sequoyah, by providing scholarships for representatives from both the district and local level.
- 2. We shared in the MYF United Nations Tour by providing \$250.00 from our Board.
- 3. We helped promote the Church-wide mission study, "Affluence and Poverty The Christian's Dilemma", by: (a) participating in the Conference and District Mission Study Conference Committees (b) purchase and circulation of related audio-visual resources 1 copy of "The Captive", a 16 mm film presentation, and 6 copies of the filmstrip, "How

Things Hide People", (c) making the services of Gordon Hartrick, a member of the Board with unusual insight into the study, available to local churches at Board expense.

- 4. We have made "The Legislative Information Bulletin", produced by the State Council of Churches, available to all the ministers of the Conference.
- 5. We sponsored jointly with the North Arkansas Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns a training program on "The Jail Ministry", the planning and carrying out of which resulted in a most successful session.
- 6. Reverend David M. Hankins, Jr., and Reverend Woodrow W. Smith represented the Board at the Washington Churchmen's Seminar, January 30th-February 3rd.
- 7. Mental Health Clinics have been held in several districts and sub-districts under the leadership of George Ivy.
- 8. We encourage letters be written to our legislature, Senators and Congressmen, relative to peace in Vietnam, capital punishment, alcohol, and other issues relative to social concerns.
- 9. The Board played a significant role in influencing Governor Rockefeller to veto the bill that would legalize gambling in Hot Springs.

The Board makes the following recommendation for the year 1967-1968:

- 1. We urge every local church to follow the program of the Church as it is outlined in THE METHODIST STORY from month to month. We ask that the pastor and chairman of the Commission in each local church give special attention to the program planning issue of THE METHODIST STORY and make early provision in the church's calendar for the observance of Special Days of Christian Social Concerns. We request that special attention be given to the observance of SOCIAL CREED SUNDAY, WORLD ORDER SUNDAY, October 22nd; COMMITMENT DAY, November 12th; and RACE RELATIONS SUNDAY, February 11th.
- 2. We believe that the local church will be greatly benefited by having representation at the Annual Regional Coaching Conference at Mount Sequoyah and we urge the several district directors to promote attendance. It will be the policy of the board to offer full scholarships to all members of the Conference Board, including District Directors, and to any local commission chairman who will attend.
- 3. We join the TRAFCO committee in requesting that plans be developed for a properly organized and staffed conference film library and agree to support the project with funds from our Board.
- 4. Recognizing the educational value derived from the "Great Decisions" program being promoted throughout the state, we urge local churches to solicit the support of their memberships by organizing groups within their congregations.
- 5. We express our appreciation to Dr. W. Henry Goodloe and the Christian Civic Foundation for their labors in behalf of high morality and Christian Social standards and pledge them our continued support.
- 6. We endorse a Washington Seminar for college youth and agree to underwrite such a program in an amount of \$375.00.

7. We express our appreciation to those within the church and the State Council of Churches for their interest in the development of a half-way house for released prisoners.

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

All Christians have been called into a ministry of reconciliation. This is the vocation of every Christian. However, there are those persons in every local congregation who possess the innate gifts for Church-related vocations. The Commission, through its district directors, local church secretaries, and local pastors, desires to help every church discover and encourage those whom God may call to full-time Christian service. No one, save God, can issue the "call" to any form of Christian service. Nevertheless, we do believe pastors and laymen can make that call more intelligible by being mindful of the need for Christian servants and by confronting men and women with the possibilities in the varied fields of Church-related vocations.

The need is great. Over the long run, the total number of ministers needed by the Methodist churches will increase as a result of the expected growth in population and in the number of congregations. The urge to specialize on the part of ministers has percipitated a growing crisis in the local parish ministry. We must come to a new appreciation of the value and work of the local parish minister as he moves among his people giving spiritual guidance in every walk of life and at every hour of the day. There is no more challenging, frustrating, satisfying, discouraging, and joyful task on the face of the earth.

With these thoughts in mind, we, your Commission on Christin Vocations, recommend the following course of action for the ensuing year:

- 1. We recommend that there be a Church-related Vocations Seminar to be held at Camp Tanako during the first week in July, 1967. The Seminar is to contain sections on: The Ministry, Christian Education, Missions, and Ministry of Music. The Seminar is designed to reach persons in the last two grades of High School, College Students, and certain other persons that the Local Pastor shall select. This is to be an in-depth dialogue on all facets of the selected vocations.
- 2. We would encourage local churches to use an Elective Unit relating to Christian Vocations as MYF programs, Church School studies,

or other appropriate times. Some such units are: "You and Your Life Work," "A Christian Choice For Youth," and "When You Leave Home."

- 3. We recommend that the Commission look into the possibility of sponsoring a Guidance Consultation with the High School Guidance Counselors, pastors, and teachers. The purpose will be to find ways of assisting one another in counseling the youth of the community in choosing a life work.
- 4. We would emphasize the role of the local pastor in seeking out and challenging his youth to the vital need of Christian Vocations especially Church-related vocations.
- 5. We would encourage local church leaders to seek ways in which the cause of Christian Vocations could be presented to the "Career Day" program in the local schools.
- 6. We urge the wise and wide use of the booklet, "Methodist Church Related Occupations and Short Term Projects, 1967". A copy of which has been furnished each pastor by the Commission.
- 7. We recommend that in the month of November, each pastor preach on the "Call To The Ministry" in connection with the November Special Offering for Ministeral Education.
- 8. We recommend that the District Secretaries of Missionary Personnel of the WSCS, the District Secretaries of Christian Vocations, and the District Directors of Youth Work, seek ways of working together for the cause of presenting the challenge of God's call to youth to Fulltime Christian Service.
- 9 We urge youth to take advantage of the many loans that the Conference WSCS has made available through its fine program.
- 10. We recommend the use of lay-persons in the local church as staff personnel whenever feasible.
- 11. We urge that the District Superintendents make a concerted effort to organize a Local Church Committee on Christian Vocations and we urge the pastors to see that it is an active committee.

Be it further resolved, as the Board of Trustees does not have any funds allocated for any such expense as may be it incurred, we respectfully recommend that this expense be paid out of Conference Administration Fund, or as the Conference may authorize.

We respectfully request that the abandoned church property located at East ½ of Block No. Two (2) in town of Gifford, recorded in Book 52, page 99, Deed made September 8, 1928, filed January 19, 1929, Circuit's Clerk's Office in Hot Springs County, Malvern, Arkansas be sold and the proceeds therefrom be directed to the St. Pauls' Parish, Malvern, Arkansas. We recommend this property not be sold, due to the fact that a flakeboard plant is being built just east of the town of Gifford.

The Quarterly Conference of the Dalark Circuit, November 10, 1966 requests the Conference Board of Trustees to authorize sale of the Manning Church property to the Manning Extension Homemakers Club. We recommend that this property not be sold, but permission be granted to the Manning Extension Homemakers Club to use the building as long as they will maintain the building in good order.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

Conference Promotion

Our Church is in the midst of constant and rapid changes that affect every facet of life, so that old methods and ways are no longer adequate. Accordingly, The Methodist Church is calling its members to A New Day In Christian Education. This call involves a new concept of learning, new literature, new methods, new organization and administration.

Keenly aware of the need, your Conference Board of Education is seeking to understand better the "New Day," interpret it to our churches and church schools, and to train the leadership needed to make it effective

and adequate for the new challenge of today.

Our new literature for children, Christian Studies for Methodist Children, continues to be enthusiastically received by churches large and small. We are now looking eagerly for the new literature for adults, Foundation Studies In Christian Faith, which will begin in September 1967. We urge all churches to use this new literature in existing adult classes, organize new classes for adults, and to plan one or more classes using this new literature which will meet on a week-night so that Sunday School teachers and others who may not be able to attend on Sunday morning may have this basic study. We hope that all Methodist adults will take this important course at some time within the next two years.

In order to make these classes effective we urge all District Superintendents and District Directors of Adult Work to plan one or more workshops in the summer — or either a district or sub-district basis so that teachers of adults and class officers can be well informed about

this new literature and skilled in its use.

The new curriculum for youth will be available in September 1968. New settings are being planned for three suggested groupings: junior high, middle high and senior high. It is recommended that all churches take advantage of the various settings being prepared. The five settings are: (1) Weekly Classes; (2) School of Religion; (3) Week-end Setting; (4) Informal Group Setting and (5) Outdoor Setting. We strongly urge local churches to begin serious study regarding the necessary changes

in their youth ministry if this "New Day" is truly to take on flesh in the local church.

While the New Day in Christian Education will occupy a very large place in all of our work, we shall not neglect the features which have long been a prominent part in our Conference program.

- 1. A continuation of the program of seeking to increase the church school membership and attendance, giving special attention to outpost Sunday schools and the organization of new classes.
- 2. A year-round emphasis on winning persons for Christ and His Church; and carefully training them in the meaning of the Christian life and church membership; using the materials and methods taught at the Church Membership Laboratory held in Dallas February 20-23, 1967.

In order that our ministers may become skilled in the use of these methods and materials we join with the Board of Evangelism in requesting each District Superintendent to have a District Workshop for ministers, using, as instructors, those persons who attended the Church Membership Laboratory at Dallas.

- 3. The Christian home is still one of our most vital concerns. We rejoice in the good work being done by our Conference Family Life Committee, under the leadership of Mr. and Mrs. Winston Faulkner. Forty persons from our Conference attended the Fifth National Family Life Conference last October, by far the largest delegation we have ever had. As a follow-up of this conference a very successful Family Life Workshop was held March 2 in order to get family life committees of the local churches organized and active. We are now planning the Arkansas Area Family Life Conference which will be held April 5-6, 1968 and modeled after the National Family Life Conference.
- 4. To improve the quality of teaching for all age groups we hope to achieve two objectives: (1) Each local church to have a long range program for discovering, enlisting and training officers and teachers; (2) to have three or more Christian Workers Schools in each Distict, these schools to be set up on a sub-district basis with all of the churches in the area co-operating in planning and promoting the school. We are grateful for the fine co-operation of district superintendents, ministers and church school workers which enabled us again to reach our goal, "A training opportunity with accredited instructors within reach of every church and church school worker in the Little Rock Conference."
- 5. Our Conference Camping Committee is continuing to study our present camping program with a view of making improvements wherever possible. The Frontier Camping Program which was begun last summer was very successful. We plan to expand that program this coming year.
- 6. We pledge our continued co-operation with Area and other Conference agencies in all matters of common interest.
- 7. We also pledge our continued support of our fine Methodist Seminaries.

Finances: The Board of Education requests the World Service Commission to grant an apportionment of \$30,070.00; and to set \$9,000.00 as a goal for Christian Education Day offering.

The Staff: Dr. W. Neill Hart has been nominated Executive Secretary and we request the Bishop to appoint him to this office. Reverend F. Gladwin Connell has been nominated as Conference Director of Youth Work, and we request the Bishop to appoint him to this office. Mrs.

John L. Tucker has been named Conference Director of Children's Work; and Colonel Claude E. Haswell, as volunteer director of Adult Work, and B. F. Allbright, Associate Director of Adult Work.

Wesley Foundation

Inter-Conference Commission on College and University Religious Life: Mrs. J. Russell Henderson, Dr. Joe Clerk, Mrs. Cecil L. Kelly, Joe R. Phillips, Jr., W. Neill Hart, F. Gladwin Connell and William D. Elliott.

We concur in the action of the Inter-Conference Commission on College and University Religious Life that we continue the present financial policy as outlined in the 1966 Little Rock Conference Journal:

- 1. That an apportionment be given to the Annual Conference of 50¢ per member for Wesley Foundation Operation Expense, amount to be apportioned to the district on the decimal basis, and apportioned to the charges by the district superintendent and the district stewards.
- 2. That the salary scale for directors of Wesley Foundation adopted in 1963 be discontinued and the salary be set by the Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundation, based on the income and the need.
- 3. That the base allotment of each Wesley Foundation be \$11,500.00 with an additional \$5.00 for each Methodist student above five hundred Methodist students, amount to be determined by the enrollment for the second semester of the previous year. It was understood, however, that each Wesley Foundation should base its proposed budget on the present income until assurance be given of an increase.

We also concur in the action of the Inter-Conference Commission on College and University Religious Life in regard to the Wesley Foun-

dation Campus Ministry:

On the basis of experience in providing Wesley Foundation Ministers; in keeping with current practices; and in accordance with provisions in the Discipline; it is suggested that the Wesley Foundation Campus Ministers' "Ground Rules" for both Annual Conference in Arkansas be altered to include the following:

- 1. The appointment of a clerical member of an Annual Conference as a Wesley Foundation Campus Minister is the responsibility of the Bishop and his Cabinet in keeping with "principles inherent in the Methodist appointive system." (Judicial Decision 175 (1).). The Personnel Committee of a local Wesley Foundation Board of Directors acts in the same capacity as a Pastoral Relations Committee of a Local Church.
- 2. A clerical member of an Annual Conference serving as a Campus Minister of a Wesley Foundation, under the appointment of the Bishop and his Cabinet, shall bear the same relationship to the District Superintendent, in whose District he serves, as any other pastor in the District. The Board of Directors of a Wesley Foundation, with respect to the Wesley Foundation Campus Minister, shall function in the same capacity as an Official Board of a Local Church.
- 3. A clerical member of an Annual Conference serving as a Wesley Foundation Campus Minister, under appointment of the Bishop and his Cabinet, may teach in a related college or university, only at the discretion, and with the written consent of the District Superintendent, who shall have conferred with the Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundation, or its Personnel Committee; the President and/ or the Dean of the institution; and with the Wesley Foundation Campus Minister. The District Superintendent's written consent is given, preferably to meet an emergency and as a special favor to the institution. It is understood that any income the Wesley Foundation Campus Minister may derive from such teaching will in no way effect his income as a Wesley Foundation Campus Minister.

- 4. The District Superintendent, after conferring with the Wesley Foundation Campus Minister, the Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundation, or its Personnel Committee, and with the knowledge and consent of the Bishop, may appoint that Wesley Foundation Campus Minister as a part time pastor of a church, or churches, or to do occasional interim, or emergency preaching. It is understood that any income the Wesley Foundation Campus Minister may derive from such appointment will in no way effect his income as a Wesley Foundation Campus Minister.
- 5. The above may be amended from time to time to keep these procedures in harmony with the policies of the General Church.

We request that \$10,000.00 of the World Service Commission from the Conference Apportionments be continued.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

For the final year of this quadrenium we recommend that the following program be implemented in each local church.

- 1. A Plan for Lay-Visitation Evangelism. This is a detailed plan for lay-visitation which will involve every church member who has a desire to witness and is willing to prepare himself for this task. By following the suggested steps in this plan, the church which dares to use it will experience depth-renewal. It opens doors for witness in the areas of Cultivation, Commitment, Assimilation, and Activation.
- 2. Recognizing the value of proper training in what it means to be a Christian, we plan to cooperate with the Board of Education in offering leadership on a conference-wide basis for training pastors to become more effective in the area of Church Membership Classes. Twelve men from our conference attended the Labratory School in Dallas this past February so that they might give direction to this program. We request the Cabinet, after consultation with the District Secretaries of Evangelism, to set up workshops in each district for local church pastors to receive this orientation.
- 3. We suggest that each church be aware of the disciplinary directives concerning the care of church members, with special reference to inactive and non-resident members, and keeping complete and accurate rolls (1964 Discipline par. 126 and 127).
- 4. Since there is an obvious shortage of Directors and Ministers of Evangelism in The Methodist Church today, we give this information with regard to an opportunity which is now being offered by Scarritt College. They now include in their curriculum a Master of Arts Degree in Evangelism which requires 52 graduate hours, 18 of which will be counted from those having a Bachelor of Divinity Degree. They also offer an Advanced Two-year Evangelism Program and a Special Student Program in Evangelism which will be in the form of Summer Workshops beginning this year. BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

We continue to urge:

- 1. That each local Church, as directed by the Discipline of 1964, recognize the importance of electing a Hospitals and Homes Steward, or Committee, to work with the District Commissioner, the District Superintendent, and others, in promoting the work, the services, and the needs of the Children's Home.
- 2. We commend the Superintendent of the Home, the Rev. J. Edwin Keith, the District Commissioners, and the District Superintendents, for a very effective program during the past year. Special gratitude is expressed to Mr. Charles Meyer, Jr., and to Mr. Dick Sturgis, for their untiring efforts toward helping all the churches to promote the Annual Christmas Offerings. We are glad to note that all Districts in the Conference made progress.

- 3. We recommend that Bishop Paul V. Galloway appoint a Committee for study of a Child-Care Program, looking toward the Future Plans and Organization of the Methodist Children's Home.
- 4. We want to emphasize the importance of the Workshop at Mt. Sequoyah, July 21-23, and urge the attendance of the District Commissioners and the Hospitals and Homes Stewards from the local churches.
- 5. We nominate the Rev. Joe R. Phillips as a Trustee of the Methodist Children's Home, to fill the unexpired term of Dr. J. Ralph Clayton, who was transferred to North Arkansas, the term to expire in 1968. Also nominated as Trustees of the Methodist Children's Home for three-year terms, expiring in 1970: L. E. Tennyson, Smackover; H. F. Buhler, Little Rock; Rev. W. Braska Savage; Dr. C. Ray Hozendorf.
- 6. We recommend that the Annual Support for the Chaplain at the State Sanitorium, Booneville, be, for 1967-1967, the same as the past year, \$4,557, as follows: \$3,000 for Salary; \$600 for Travel; \$750 for Rent; \$27 for Insurance, and \$180 Annuity. To be effective in all these plans, we respectfully request that the Commission on World Service and Finance continue, as it has done in the past, giving its support to the work of this Board.

INSURANCE COMMITTEE

DBP — Death Benefit Program

The new Average Salary for the Little Rock Conference has been obtained from the General Board of Pensions office, which handles the Death Benefit Program. This Salary is \$6,115.00. The Annual Contribution (1967-1968) is 2% of this Salary or \$122.30. The Church or Agency will pay 60% of this amount or \$73.38; the Ministers and Lay Employees will each pay 40% or \$48.92. The total amount (\$122.30) will be due June 1st, 1967 for the ensuing year.

The Board of Pensions will continue to pay the DBP Contribution for all the Little Rock Conference Retired Men who are eligible.

Hospitalization

Recognizing the very high cost of even a semi-private room in the hospitals at this time, the Insurance Committee has made arrangements to increase the **Room and Board** allowance from \$15.00 a day to \$20.00 a day. The Miscellaneous Charges paid will then be \$400.00 rather than \$300.00, and Maternity Benefits will go to \$200.00 for the hospital.

For this increased coverage a new rate will be necessary. It is:

The increased Room Rate does not apply to the Retired Men and Widows. Their Rate will remain the same, and their coverage will continue to be complete.

This new hospital coverage will then be:

\$20.00 a day

70 days per entry

\$400.00 Miscellaneous charges, and 75% of the next \$5,000.00

\$300.00 Surgery schedule

\$200.00 Maternity for hospital.

The clause "co-ordinated benefits" will continue to be in use for

all persons under the hospital coverage.

The Board of Pensions will continue to pay one-half of the hospital premiums for the Retired Men and the Widows, and they will also pay the \$3.00 per person per month for all Claimants and their wives (for Medicare).

Arrangements have also been made for coverage for Young People in a family contract from 19-23 years of age, while in full time attendance at an accredited school or college, and un-married. It will cost 21ϕ per month per family.

Note: There are Extended Maternity Benefits for the Insured, and Benefits which can be obtained for the Dependents, if it is done within

30 days of termination in the Conference, Notify Mrs. Averitt.

Transfers

Ministers who are to be transferred to the North Arkansas Conference should notify Mrs. Averitt in order to be continuously covered by DBP and Hospital Insurance while being transferred.

Special arrangements have been made by the North Arkansas Conference Insurance Committee for the Little Rock Conference Ministers to be covered without any of the waiting periods which will be imposed on later transferees. This applies only to transfers at Annual Conference time.

Claims On Hospital Insurance

Forms: There are two forms — Hospital and Doctor.

Do Not Send Them To The Company!

Co-ordinated Benefits: This clause has been added this Conference year — most major insurance companies have done so.

This means, if you have another hospital group policy, the primary carrier pays first, and the other company pays (as far as its liability) on the balance.

Medicare is a group. It is the primary carrier, if you have its coverage. The amount of their payment must be known before our Conference Group can make payment.

This clause applies to both Hospital and Doctor bills. One of the questions asked in Part I (which the Claimant fills out) is whether he (or she) has another **group** policy. **Be sure** to answer this and all other questions.

An individual policy is not involved in the co-ordinated clause.

Service: Speedier service can be obtained in processing your claim, if you will:

- 1. Request claim forms as soon as the need arises.
- 2. Fill out Part I, answering all questions, and sign the form.
- 3. Give both Hospital and Doctor Mrs. Averitt's address and instructions.
- Prepare a set of forms for Medicare or any other group company, and the Conference group company.
- 5. Medicare claimants ask Hospital for an estimate of Medicare's payment on the hospital bill, and include it with the forms you send to Mrs. Averitt.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INTER-BOARD STRUCTURE

It has been apparent to many for a long time that some plan should be devised to correlate the Annual Conference program and to provide staff representation for all the Boards and Agencies who do programming

on the Conference level. It is obvious that full time staff representatives could not be provided for each Board and Agency desiring such. However, there is no reason why adequate promotional facilities and staff cannot be made available to the Boards and Agencies needing such.

It is the conviction of this committee that the solution lies in a flexible Conference Administrative Staff serving the needs of the Conference as a whole. While each Staff mmeber would have a primary relationship to certain Boards and Agencies, it is understood that the responsibilities of each member of the Staff may be adjusted as needed at the initiative and under the direction of the Bishop and the Executive Committee of the Council.

It is imperative that the Conference Boards and Agencies maintain their autonomy and responsibility for establishing policies and initiating programs. It is also imperative that the Boards and Agencies exercise the greatest degree of co-operation with the Conference Council in the development of a co-ordinated Conference program. It is understood that the Conference Council Staff shall be the servant of the Conference Boards and Agencies and shall in no way infringe upon the authority of these Boards and Agencies.

The Committee on Inter-Board Structure makes the following recommendations:

- That the Little Rock Annual Conference move to establish a Conference Council.
- 2. That its membership be composed as follows:

The Bishop and the Cabinet

The Chairman or Head of the following:

1) Boards—Education, Evangelism, Hospitals and Homes, Lay Activities, Ministerial Training and Qualifications, Missions, Pensions, Social Concerns Commissions—Christian Vocations, Minimum Salary, Town

2)

 & Country, TRAFCO
 3) Agencies—Editor of the Arkansas Methodist, President of Hendrix College, President of the Little Rock Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, President of The Methodist Foundation, Secretary of the Little Rock Annual Conference, Superintendent of the Methodist Children's Home The best of services are the intent of the Methodist of the Methodist Children's Home. The head of any agency who is not a member of the Conference will serve as an ex-officio member without vote.

At Large — A layman from each district to be appointed by the Bishop and the Cabinet.

d. Conference Council Staff — The Conference Council Staff shall be members of the Council without vote

e. Chairman of the World Service Commission - The Chairman of World Service shall sit with the Council in an advisory capacity.

3. The Council shall have the following Officers:

The Bishop shall be its Chairman

- A Vice Chairman who shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee
- A Secretary
- The Council shall have an Executive Committee as follows:
 - The Bishop a.
 - Vice Chairman of the Council who shall be its Chairman
 - Other elective officers of the Council
 - d. Two members of the Cabinet chosen by the Cabinet
 - e. Five members elected by the Council
 - f. The Executive Secretary shall be a member without vote.

- 5. The Council shall have the following Staff:
 - a. An Executive Secretary
 - b. An Associate Secretary
 - c. The Area Director of Town & Country Work and The Methodist Foundation
- The Salaries of the Staff shall be:
 - a. Executive Secretary equivalent to the District Superintendents
 - Associate Secretary recommended annually by the Executive Committee
- 7. The Tenure of the Conference Staff personnel shall not exceed eight consecutive years
- 8. The Conference Council shall meet within three weeks following the Mid Year Meeting of the Boards and Agencies, and on call of the Executive Committee or the Chairman of the Council. All Boards and Agencies shall submit ample copies of their reports to the Council for reivew.
- 9. The Executive Committee shall meet as soon after the session of the Annual Conference as practical, but not later than September 15, and on call of the Executive Secretary, the Bishop, or the Chairman of the Executive Committee.
- 10. The Council shall review all plans, programs and proposed legislation; and shall make recommendations to the Annual Conference relevant to the formulation of a co-ordinated, total program for the Annual Conference. The Council may initiate or propose any phase of the Conference program with the consent and approval of the Board or Agency involved.
- 11. The Program adopted by the Annual Conference shall be administered by the Board Chairmen and the District Superintendents, their District Staffs, working in conjunction with the Conference Administrative Staff, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism, the Conference Missionary Secretary, the Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education, and the Conference Lay Leader.
- 12. The Conference Council or its Executive Committee shall establish and distribute a Conference Calendar. This shall be done immediately upon the closing session of the Annual Conference or as soon thereafter as possible.
- 13. Any Program that emerges from or through any Board or Agency during the year that has not been adopted by the Annual Conference must be approved by the Executive Committee of the Council.
- 14. The Executive Secretary shall be responsible to the Bishop and to the Executive Committee for the co-ordination of the work of the Staff in carrying out the programs and policies of the various Boards and Agencies.
- 15. In the discharge of his responsibilities within the Little Rock Conference the Area Director of Town & Country Work shall be related to the Conference Council and the Executive Secretary in the same way as the Associate Secretary.
- 16. The Staff shall work closely with the Area Treasurer, the Editor of the Arkansas Methodist, Hendrix College, The Methodist Children's Home.
- 17. The responsibilities of the Council Staff may be reviewed and altered from time to time as the program of the Conference warrants.
- 18. The Conference Council shall co-operate with the Area Council.

- 19. We request the Commission on World Service and Finance to make such adjustments as are necessary to provide funds for the budget of the Conference Council.
- 20. The Committee recommends that the Bishop appoint a Committee annually to review the work of the Conference Council and to make recommendations for more effective administration of the Conference Program.
- 21. This Committee recommends that this program be fully implemented at the May, 1967, Session of the Little Rock Annual Conference.

The following is a JOB ANALYSIS for the EXECUTIVE SECRETARY:

- He shall co-ordinate and promote plans and programs of the Conference Boards and Agencies, including management of a central office for mailing all promotional and cultivation materials for the Boards and Agencies, for a literature and film library, supervision of a Conference Calendar, emphasis upon special days, special Conference emphases, and all other matters related to a united and correlated Conference Program.
- 2. He shall be responsible to the Bishop for the co-ordinated work of the total program of the Conference in carrying out the policies and programs of the Boards and Agencies.
- 3. He shall work with the District Superintendents in interpreting the General and Annual Conference programs for the local church through District planning Workshops, Conferences and Meetings.
- 4. He shall seek to promote all publications, literature, and the general program of the Church.
- 5. He shall be appointed by the Bishop and the Cabinet after consultation with the Executive Committee of the Council,

The following is a JOB ANALYSIS for the ASSOCIATE SECRETARY:

- He shall be responsible to the Executive Secretary for the promotion of the phases of the program of the Conference as designated by the Conference Council,
- 2. He shall, at the direction of the Executive Committee, relate himself to any Board or Agency and promote its work over a given period of time.
- 3. He shall be appointed by the Bishop and the Cabinet after consultation with the Executive Committee.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The highlight for Laymen of the Little Rock Annual Conference in 1966 was the "Layman's Session" on Wednesday afternoon. The program presented dealt with the Layman, his duties and responsibilities in his Church. The presentation was well received and it is hoped that a session of this nature will become a regular part of the Conference program. Since this experience, we feel there is deeper interest and

greater intensity of effort manifested on the part of the laity.

During the first part of the conference year a meeting was held in each district which was attended by the Pastor and Lay Leader of each charge. The meetings were under the direction of the respective District Lay Leader and District Superintendent, with Reverend W. O. Scroggin representing the Area Council. Information and guidance were given in making plans for laymen's work on the local and district level. These plans have been carried out effectively, resulting in better understanding and a closer working relationship between clergy and laity.

The Methodist Men's Clubs are functioning enthusiastically and well. In several churches laymen are assisting in the worship service and, under the direction of the Pastor in charge, are assuming greater

responsibilities in the work of the church.

The annual Layman's Assembly held at Camp Tanako seems to grow larger in attendance and better each year. The influence of this gathering is far-reaching in its effect. printed in the Conference Journal,

The Conference Standing Rules state what is to be included in a Memoir: "Date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, name of children, charges served and place of burial." Follow these instructions and save having a Memoir returned for

correction. Three copies of all Memoirs are to be furnished.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY

Organization

The Commision on Minimum Salary shall be composed of one minister and one layman from each District of the Annual Conference. They shall be nominated by the Cabinet and elected by the Annual Conference, quadrennially. Vacancies shall be filled by the same procedure. The Bishop is requested to appoint one representative from his Cabinet, annually. The Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission shall be an ex-officio member of the Commission and administrative officer.

The Commission shall elect quadrennially a chairman, vice chairman, and secretary who, together with the Secretary of the Town and Country Commission and the Cabinet representative, shall compose the executive committee. Vacancies in offices shall be filled by the Commission from its elective membership.

The Commission shall meet as often as is required to do its work, and may consign certain responsibilities to the executive committee.

Purpose

The purpose of the Minimum Salary Program is to:

1. Assist charges to pay their pastor the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference,

2. Challenge and enable charges to become self-sustaining. This is not to be thought of, or used, as a continuing mission support.

Finances

Funds for the purpose of the Commission shall be raised by an apportionment annually, to all churches of the Annual Conference of an amout equal to 3% of the base salary paid the pastor.

The Program

- Charges are eligible to receive Minimum Salary Assistance whose combined pastoral support (base salary, travel, and utilities) is less than the minimum set by the Annual Conference, provided that:
 - (a) The pastor preaches a minimum of three times per Sunday; is resident full time or a Student Approved Supply.
 - (b) Each church conducts an Every Member Visitation annually acceptable to the Town and Country Commission, the District Superintendent, and the Commission on Minimum Salary.
 - (c) The charge agrees to increase ministerial support annually, moving toward assuming full support.
 - (d) Each church pays all prorated claims and percentages to the Conference and District Treasurers annually.
- 2. Application for assistance shall be made annually through the District Superntendent on a form provided by the Commission.
- 3. The Minimum Salary for this year shall be:
 - (a) Resident, full time

\$4500.00

- (b) Student Approved Supply, married
- 4000.00
- (c) Student Approved Supply, single

3000.00

- Provided that:
- (d) For each dependent child under 18, or for each child in college under 24, a pastor on Minimum Salary shall receive an additional \$100.00 per year.
- (e) On Minimum Salary charges of more than three churches, a pastor shall receive an additional \$100.00 for each church above three that pays \$300.00 or more total pastoral support.
- (f) The pastor's part of Death Benefit and Hospital Insurance premium in the Conference Group Insurance Program shall be paid by the Minimum Salary Commission for Student Approved Supply Pastors serving charges receiving Minimum Salary Assistance.

Provided further that:

- (g) These funds, together with educational fund, pension, Conference and District Boards of Mission aid, shall be exempt in computing Minimum Salary.
- (h) The charge shall agree to move toward absorbing child dependency and extra church exemption as soon as possible after reaching self support.
- 4. The maximum amount of assistance a charge may receive from the Minimum Salary Commission, exclusive of child dependency and extra church bonus, shall be \$900.00 per year.
- 5. In the event of insufficient funds to meet all claims, each charge shall share proportionately from the funds available.
- 6. The report of this Commission in the Conference Journal each year shall include a list of charges receiving Minimum Salary aid, and the amount received. Exceptions to the above can be made by the Commission only during the 1967-68 Conference Year, transition period from the former policies to full compliance with those above.

Policy And Program

- I. The Little Rock Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications proposes to work strictly within the framework of the current Discipline of The Methodist Church.
- II. The elected officers of the Board are: Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, Registrars: General, College Students, Seminary Students.
- III. The Executive Committee of the Board are the elected officers. They shall have authority in matters committed to them by the Board.
- IV. The Board shall meet prior to the opening of school, at Annual Conference, and on call of the Chairman.
- V. The Registrar shall arrange meetings at District levels with all men in the Course of Study, just prior to Annual Conference.
 - VI. The Board's sources of income shall be:
 - A. A percentage from Conference Benevolences
 - B. A special offering in November for Ministerial Training
 - C. Gifts, bequests and interest
- VII. The Board shall maintain a Scholarship Loan Program for Ministerial Training as follows:
 - A. For those in Course of Study above the level of License to Preach.
 - 1. Assistance to Courses of Study Schools
 - (a) The cost of required text books for each year of the course of study. The books purchased by the student.
 - (b) One round trip per term at 8¢ per mile
 - 2. Assistance in the Correspondence Course
 - (a) Payment of fees
 - (b) The cost of required text books for each year of the course of study. The books are to be purchased by the student.

Above assistance repayable: Maximum received in any one year, by one year of service as a full time pastor, either as a member On Trial or as a Full Time Approved Supply.

- B. For students from Little Rock Conference churches preparing for the Effective Ministry in The Methodist Church and enrolled in a college, university or seminary, approved by the University Senate of The Methodist Church, and who:
 - 1. Hold a current Local Preacher's License in The Methodist Church, or are On Trial in the Little Rock Annual Conference, or those students who present to the Conference Board, for one year only, in writing, a recommendation from the District Board of Ministerial Training.
 - Make application annually to the proper Registrar of the Board, prior to September 1, giving all information requested and authorizing regular grade reports to this Board Registrar from the School Registrar, and a transcript of credits at the end of each semester. Application must be requested.

- 3. Make a note, properly endorsed, and payable in one of two ways:
 - (a) One full year of service as an Effective Minister in The Methodist Church repaying the miximum receivable any one year.
 - (b) In cash with interest at 4% per annum, beginning at the time the recipient terminated his ministry or preparation therefore; schedule of payments to be arranged with the Board Registrar.
- 4. Semester session will be considered to be one-half of allowance.
- VIII. The Board may set a maximum amount of assistance per year per recipient, but assistance will be determined for each individual on the basis of requirements.
- IX. The Board shall give assistance in a reasonable amount for physical examinations for men to be admitted on trial and into full connection.

REQUESTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- I. The Board, each District Superintendent, Pastor and local church to hold up to young men the need for ministers and the challenge of the ministry, that may enable them to hear the call.
- II. As the first step into the ministry, enrolling for the studies for License to Preach with the Department of Inservice Training of the General Board of Ministerial Education.
- III. Each Pastor to provide himself with folders on the Course of Study and with the book for the course on License to Preach.
- IV. That when a person has passed the correspondence work on studies for License to Preach, or has completed one-fourth of the work for a B.D. Degree in an approved seminary, and in the judgment of the District Committee on Ministerial Training and Qualifications his gifts and graces commend him for the ministry, the Committee license him to preach, subject to the approval of their action and renewal of this license by the District Conference.
- V. Wherever possible, men shall, in the Course of Study, take their work through the Courses of Study School.
- VI. We assume our Conference share of financial responsibility for the Arkansas Pastors' School,
- VII. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance to grant:
 - A. An appropriation of 4% from Conference Benevolences.
 - B. The authorization of a special offering on the third Sunday in November for Ministerial Training.
- VIII. We express our appreciation for the support given the Ministerial Training Scholarship Loan Program by the churches of the Conference. In view of our increased load since assuming assistance for seminary students, we require a substantial increase this year.
- IX. We recommend that the Little Rock Conference cooperate with the Jurisdictional Program of Ministerial Education in the following ways:
 - A. That we hold before our churches the goal of giving to Ministerial Education an amount equal to 1% of the local church's budget, exclusive of monies used for buildings, improvements, and debt service.

- B. That the churches be asked to move toward this goal as rapidly as possible, and certainly not slower than 2/3 of 1% in 1967, and the full 1% in 1968.
- C. That the Little Rock Annual Conference retain for its own work the first \$12,000 it receives from the churches; that the Conference reserve the right to adjust this amount from year to year; and that the remainder be sent to the Jurisdictional treasurer to be apportioned to the seminaries at Dallas and Kansas City.
- D. That the fund for Ministerial Education be promoted through the regular November Special Offering for Ministerial Education

A Church Wide School of Missions has been conducted in a large percentage of the churches of the Conference using "Afluence and Poverty" as the guide.

A Commission on Missions organized and functioning in every Methodist Church is our goal.

Advance Specials: Continued emphasis is being given to Advance Specials in the Conference. We express appreciation to those churches who have contributed to support of both National and World Mission Specials. The Advance Special Giving is vital to the missionary program of Methodism. Your attention is called to the continuing needs for funds for the Parsonage in Salina, Oklahoma amounting to \$7,200.00; the special project in Chile for \$10,000; and the support of Camp Aldersgate and Lydia Patterson Institute.

Lydia Patterson Institute: For several years your board has contributed \$1,000 annually to Lydia Patterson operations and plans to do so this year. Your board completed its obligation of \$1,000 annually to Lydia Patterson Capital Fund this year.

Urban Life Consultation: Two persons from your board participated in an Urban Life Consultation at Dallas, Texas, February 20-21. They were Carlos E. Martin and Dr. Alvin C. Murray, Chairman of the Urban Life Committee of our Board.

Special Church Extension: The churches continue to support the Special Church Extension program of the Conference so that new churches may be organized, others re-located or merged. The Mobile Church unit has been in the Arkadelphia District this past year at the St. Phillips Church in Hot Springs and will continue there this next year.

Fall Mission Study Conferences: A Fall Mission Study Conference was held in four of the Districts. These proved to be most helpful in preparing leaders in the local church to teacher in the Church Wide Study.

Requests: The following requests are made of the Commission on World Service and Finance:

1. The same amount for 1967-68 as was apportioned from Conference Benevolences: \$31,500, with one third of this going to Church Extension.

2. The amount of \$20,000 to the six districts for Special Church Extension and the re-location or churchs and mergers.

3. That the following amounts be allocated to the Districts for

National Advance Specials:

(A) Rio Grande Conference — \$3,500
(B) Oklahoma Indian Mission — \$6,000
(C) The Central Jurisdiction — \$1,637

(D) Lydia Patterson Institute Operations — Amounts as voluntarily assumed by local churches.

(E) Salina, Oklahoma, Parsonage (Indian Mission) — \$7,200 (to

be voluntarily accepted by local churches)
(F) Pilot Project for Training Laymen in Southern Chile —
\$10,000. (to be voluntarily accepted by local churches)

Recommendations for action during the 1967-68 Conference Year:

- 1. That a Fall Mission Study Conference be held in each District sometime during the two week period of September 18-30, with the District Missionary Secretary and the District Superintendent responsible for the planning and preparation for such conference.
- 2. World Service and Conference Benevolences to be lifted up as the life line of the Church and that pastors and Lay Leaders be urged to interpret World Service to the entire membership.
- 3. Camp Aldersgate is being used to good advantage for varied kinds of training activities. We urge that Camp Aldersgate be continued as a Conference Advance Special, and that local churches assume this as a voluntary Advance Special. We recommend that your Conference Board make a contribution of \$500 to Camp Aldersgate for this next Conference Year.
- 4. Advance Specials are vital to the missionary endeavor and we urge local churches to assume voluntarily some amount for the Parsonage at Salina, Oklahoma, and/or the Training Project for Laymen in Southern Chile. We also urge our churches to continue their giving to Lydia Patterson Institute and where possible to increase this as it is badly needed at this time. It is recommended that your board give \$500 to the Salina Parsonage in the Indian Mission.
- 5. A District Missionary Society is advocated for each of the Districts with the District Superintendent taking the lead in it.
- 6. Special Church Extension Funds are available for the purchase of property for new churches, starting new church buildings, re-locating and merging of churches. All churches are urged to participate by giving their proportionate share of these funds.
- 7. The Jurisdictional Missionary Conference at Mt. Sequoyah, July 31 to August 2, is a must for the Chairman, Conference Missionary Secretary, designated Superintendent, the President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, the six District Missionary Secretaries. the six District Secretaries of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the six youth chosen by the Districts.
- 8. Qualified Missionary Personnel is needed in National and World programs, and pastors, Vocations Committees and interested persons are urged to lay this claim upon youth and young adults that they may respond to this need.
- 9. **Vietnam** is a critical point of need at the present time. We urge our churches to give to MCOR to help meet these emergency needs in Vietnam. A film strip on "Vietnam" is available from the Conference Missionary Secretary.
- 10. Applications for any form of service from the Board of Missions deserves careful consideration by the proper committee and the Board.

Pastors and churches making application for these services are requested to give adequate time for such consideration and not to ask for hurried approval, since all applications will be considered in the proper committee or by the entire Board.

Policy for the Use of Church Extension Funds:

- 1. An amount equal to one-third of the monies received by the Board of Missions from Conference Benevolences is placed in a fund for church extension purposes.
- 2. Churches may apply for donations from this fund for the purpose of erecting and completing church buildings, educational facilities and fellowship halls; for remodeling programs and for other Church Extension uses. Applications may be made for donations to parsonage projects but church building needs will be given priority.
- 3. Application may be made for any amount up to \$1,000 for one project.
- 4. Application blanks may be secured from the Secretary of the Board of Missions, and are to be returned to him after completion. (Rev. Edward B. Hollenbeck, 1215 Schiller Avenue, Little Rock, Arkansas 72202)
- 5. The Executive Committee will serve as the Committee on Donations for Church Extension and present to the Board their recommendation. Applications may be approved, referred to the Special Church Extension Committee, or denied. The amount of the donation may be adjusted from the original amount requested.
- 6. The Committee will present its recommendations to the regular meetings of the Board at the Mid-year and Annual Conference meetings of the Board. The Executive Committee will act upon applications in the two quarters of the year when the Board does not meet.

Policy for the Use of Special Church Extension Funds:

- I. The Special Church Extension Funds shall be administered by the Special Church Extension Committee of the Board of Missions. The Special Church Extension Committee will be nominated by the Chairman of the Board of Missions and elected by the Board. The Chairman of the Board shall serve as Chairman of the Special Committee. This committee has the authority to recommend to the Board approval, adjustment, or rejection of applications. Final approval of these grants must be made by the Conference Board of Missions or the executive committee of the Board.
 - II. This fund is for the purpose of:
 - 1. Building new churches
 - 2. Purchasing new sites
 - 3. Purchasing Mobile Chapel units
 - 4. Merger or relocating of churches.
- III. The disbursing of Conference funds allocated to special church extension purposes shall be disbursed on the following basis:
- A properly completed application form must be submitted to the committee before any funds can be granted. The application forms will be available from the church extension secretary of the Board of Missions. Funds requested shall be approved by the District Missionary Society and the District Superintendent.

Newly organized churches may apply for a maximum of \$10,000.00 to apply on the building of their first unit.

Churches merging or relocating may apply for a maximum of \$5,000.00.

Existing churches in areas of increasing population at the edge of urban areas may make application for an amount not to exceed \$2,000.00.

A District Board of Missions may apply for an amount not to exceed \$2,500.00 toward the purchase of a new site. The Conference Board of Missions recommends that sites be purchased by the District Board of Missions, freeing these funds for the construction of the first unit.

IV. Expenses of moving Mobile Chapel Units:

The Church completing the use of the Mobile Chapel will be responsible for dismantling it and preparing it for moving. The Church receiving the use of the Unit shall bear the expense of moving and of reassembling the Unit.

V. The church extension secretary of the Board of Missions will be responsible for investigating the requests.

Policy for Selecting and Financing of Youth Delegates to the Jurisdictional Missionary Conference:

I. Selection of Delegates

- 1. Attendance from our Conference shall be on the basis of one young person per district. No Exceptions.
- 2. This youth delegate must be a Junior or Senior in High School or a first year college student. They must have some interest in missions and have been active in the youth program of their local church. Preference shall be given to any young person contemplating service in the field of missions as a vocation.
- 3. The selection of the delegate from each District shall be made by a District Committee composed of six persons as follows:

District Youth Director—Chairman

District Missionary Secretary

District President, WSCS

District Secretary of Vocations

District Secretary of Missionary Personnel, WSCS

District Superintendent

The Chairman shall be responsible for convening the committee. Each District Committee MUST HAVE the name of their delegate selected and in the hands of the Conference Youth Director Not Later Than June 15th of Each Year.

II. Financing:

1. It is recommended that the money allowable to each youth delegate be raised from the present \$25 to \$36.

2. The cost of each delegate to be divided equally by the Conference Board of Missions. The Conference or District WSCS, and the District Youth Program. Each of these agencies will send their money to the Conference Youth Director Not Later Than June 15th of Each Year. Each youth will then be reimbursed through the office of the Conference Youth Director.

Qualifications For Mission Salary Aid

It should be kept in mind that Mission Salary Aid from our Conference Board of Missions is from a Mission Board. The primary purpose of our salary aid is (1) to help new church situations get established and self-supporting, (2) to aid in a continuing ministry to smaller churches and circuits (mostly rural), which are unable to pay a living wage to

their pastor. With this purpose in mind the following points are established as qualifications governing the use of Mission Salary Aid.

- 1. Aid to new churches will be on a year to year basis, however, it will be understood that when a new church receives aid it will be on a decreasing basis each year and all aid will cease completely at the end of the fourth year. Exceptions to this rule will be by ½ vote of the entire Board.
- 2. Salary Aid will not be given in any situation in which the pastor's total income is \$6,000.00 or above. Newly organized churches served by a pastor of an established church, paying \$6,000.00 or above, may not receive salary aid.
- 3. Salary Aid will not be given to any church or charge which does not conduct an Every Member Visitation yearly and give evidence of such to the Board.
- 4. Salary Aid request from District Superintendents will be given consideration **ONLY** if the request has been made in writing on the proper form to the Chairman of the Committee on Salary Aid.
- 5. In established churches or charges where continuing salary aid is necessary, the District Superintendent will be requested to use every means at his disposal to merge or combine churches or circuits in order to decrease Salary Aid.
- 6. Priority will be given to newly established churches from available funds of the Salary Aid.
- 7. The maximum amount of salary aid given in any situation for any one year shall be \$1,200.00. Exceptions to this rule will be by % vote of the entire Board.
- 8. In case of an urgent request for salary aid, between meetings of the entire Board, the Executive Committee is empowered to act on such request in accordance with these rules.
- 9. These rules may be rescinded, amended, or changed in any way at any meeting of the entire board by a % vote of the entire Board.

A. DISTRIBUTION

Fulfilling our responsibility as the Conference Board of Pensions we have authorized the payment for claims as follows;

To 44 members retired by the Little Rock Conference with a total of 1337 years of approved service.

To 43 former members retired by other annual conferences with a total of 379½ years of approved service for which the Little Rock Conference is responsible.

- To 53 widows of former members retired by the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are pased on a total of 1171 years of approved service.
- To 33 widows of former members retired by other annual conferences whose pensions are based on a total of 229% years of approved service for which the Little Rock Conference is responsible.
- To 8 dependent children of deceased ministers retired by the Little Rock Conference and by other conferences whose pensions are based on a total of 202½ years of approved service.
- sions are based on a total of 202½ years of approved service. To 12 Approved Supply Pastors of the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 177½ years of approved supply service.
- To 9 widows of Approved Supply Pastors of the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 1173/4 years of approved service.
- To 4 dependent children of deceased Approved Supply Pastors whose pensions are based on 40 years of approved supply service.

The Little Rock Conference in 1966-67 had the responsibility for 208 claimants with a total of 3655 years of approved service. This represents an increase of 3 claimants and 167 years of approved service over last conference year.

These annuity claims have been paid on the basis of the following rates established by the annual conference:

Conference Members (100% of Annuity Rate) \$56.00 per service

Widows of Conference Members (70% of Annuity Rate) \$39.20 per service year.

Dependent Children of Conference Members (25% of Annuity Rate) \$14.00 per service year.

Approved Supply Pastors (75% of Annuity Rate) \$42.00 per service year.

Widows of Approved Supply Pastors (70% of Supply Pastor Rate) \$29.40 per service year.

Children of Approved Supply Pastors (25% of Supply Pastor Rate) \$10.50 per service year.

Payment of these annuities is made by the General Board of Pensions as a service to the Annual Conference.

B. OTHER RESPONSIBILITIES

Other services rendered by the Conference Board of Pensions include:

- 1. Premiums paid for 101 claimants eligible for Group Hospitalization Coverage at an annual cost of \$4,715.86.
- 2. Premiums paid for 56 claimants eligible for the Death Benefit Pogram of the conference group coverage at an annual premium of \$6,543.01.
- 3. \$3.00 voluntary portion of Medicare paid to claimants at an annual cost of \$5,635.20.

C. RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. We recommend that the annuity rate be set at \$56.00 per service year for retired members of the conference; and that \$42.00 be set for the retired approved supply pastors.
- 2. We recommend that the apportionment to the charges of the annual conference for conference claimants be an amount equal to 15% of the pastor's salary.
- 3. We recommend in keeping with Par. 296.3b and Par. 1610.6 of the 1964 Discipline that the Sunday following Easter, April 21, 1968, be observed as Retired Ministers Day.

- 4. We recommend that the General Board of Pensions continue to write and distribute the monthly payments to our annuitants and that the payments be made on the last day of each month.
- 5. In keeping with Par. 1618.4 of the 1964 Discipline, we recommend for the approval by the annual conference that special appointments shall be listed in the conference journal as follows: (1) with annuity claim (a) upon this Annual Conference, or (b) upon a general board, an institution, or an agency of the Methodist Church; (2) without annuity claim upon this Annual Conference.
- 6. That we continue to apportion to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the conference the sum of \$360.00 per year in accord with the 1964 Discipline (Par. 1623.7); and that said apportionment be paid to the treasurer of the Little Rock Conference Board of Pensions not later than 15 days prior to the opening of annual conference.
- 7. We concur in the recommendation of the Conference Insurance Committee with reference to the adoption of the Group Hospitalization program.
- 8. We recommend that Eligible Conference Claimants and special Conference Claimants will have the Death Benefit Pogram provided for them with the contribution to be paid by the Conference Board of Pensions in accordance with the program of the Conference Committee on Group Insurance.
- 9. We recommend that eligible Conference Claimants and special Conference Claimants will have ½ of the annual premium of the Conference Group Hospitalization paid by the Conference Board of Pensions. In addition we recommend that the eligible Conference Claimants and special Conference Claimants will have the \$3.00 voluntary portion of Medicare paid by the Conference Board of Pensions.
- 10. All retired ministers who serve appointments under the District Superintendent, and receive less than \$1,000.00 in annual salary and expense from the charge will have their contribution and premiums paid by the Conference Board of Pensions as outlined in Par. 8 and 9 of this report.
- 11. We express our appreciation to Bishop Paul V. Galloway for the appointment of the Pension Study Committee and we recommend its continuation.

THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

The Methodist Publishing House makes its annual report available to the Church through the printing of Focus On Service 1966. The two printing plants, located in Cincinnati, Ohio, and Nashville, Tennessee, provide the printing for the Church through the use of the new and

modern ten color web offset press.

The publishing of the 1966 edition of The Methodist Hymnal marks the eleventh complete revision of the Hymnal since the church issued the first collection of hymns for Methodists in 1780. By December 31, 1966, the Cokesbury Regional Service Centers had received orders for 2,650,000 copies of The Methodist Hymnal, and estimates are that

approximately three million hymnals will be shipped by August 1, 1967.

Abingdon Press printed 105 book titles during 1966, including twenty one scholarly works and sixteen books for children. 'Together, the Church's monthly publication for Methodist families, is now in its eleventh year of publication and has a circulation of 691,730. The Arkansas Area News Edition appears monthly as a supplement in

Together.

The new Children's Literature has been received well in the churches. There is a growing interest in the new adult literature, "A New Day in Christian Education," due off the press before September 1, 1967, and the new Youth Literature to be printed in September 1968.

Total net sales of products by the Methodist Publishing House, used as a measure of service, reached a new high in 1966 of \$33,827,441. Of the net profits, \$700,000 was apportioned to Conference Claimants, and approximately \$5,000 of this amount will be given to the Little Rock Conference.

We make the following recommendations:

1. That every church in the Conference use the new Adult Curriculum Material beginning in September, 1967, and that adequate preparation of adult teachers and leaders be made to take advantage of the literature for depth study on the part of adults.

2. That Youth Leaders prepare for the publication of the new Youth Curriculum Materials that sound theological training be given to

our young people.

3. That, where practical, our churches purchase The Methodist Hymnal and The Book of Worship for use in the Sunday morning

service of worship.

- 4. That each church organize the Committee on Good Literature and elect a Together Agent to interpret, promote and secure subscriptions to Together magazine. We recommend a goal of one subscription for every twenty five membes and that November be set as the month to secure these subscriptions. Subscriptions sent in through the church are at the rate of \$2.52.
- 5. That local churches and members purchase literature and books from the Cokesbury Regional Service Center at Dallas to help provide additional contributions to the Pension Fund for retired Ministers.

CAMP TANAKO

Camp Tanako, located on beautiful Lake Catherine, has long been of service to the Little Rock Conference, offering worship, study, Christian fellowship and recreation for all ages. During the 1966 season 33 different groups, numbering approximately 2790 persons, participated in well-planned programs under the direction of carefully selected, capable leaders. Plans are now being made to make Camp Tanako of even greater service.

MAJOR CONSTRUCTION

Under the direction of the building committee, J. Gordon Wilson, chairman, a lovely new building is now being erected as an addition to the present dining room-kitchen. This structure will be of matching

brick with 3,022 square feet of floor space.

The new building will meet several urgent needs. There will be a large all-purpose assembly room, 30 x 40 feet, which will enable large groups to view visual aids day or night. These aids can be shown now only at night. It will also offer space for indoor recreation, worship and study regardless of weather. In addition to the all-purpose room, there will be four large classrooms which are badly needed. With the present building, this will make six large rooms, which can be used for classes, or workshop groups, the year around.

The new annex will cost approximately \$35,000. This is the largest building project that has been undertaken at Tanako in a number of years, so it is hoped that whenever possible local churches will substantially increase their offering for Tanako next year.

FRONTIER CAMPING

One of the important trends in the church today is the movement toward Frontier Camping or Wilderness Camping. Here young people and adults live out in the open, sleep in tents, cook their own meals, and get very "close to Nature." A feeling of being near to God and near to one another is experienced in a remarkable way.

With its 286 acres of lake front, hills, streams, woods and pastures, Camp Tanako offers an ideal setting for this type of camping experience.

A beginning was made in the summer of 1966 when, with borrowed equipment, a group of 14 adults camped for a week at Tanako and received excellent training under the leadership of the Reverend Woodrow Smith, a veteran camper, and Miss Louise Sharp of New Orleans. All were enthusiastic about this type of camping and feel that it has great possibilities for the future.

Equipment has been purchased for two units, accommodating approximately 20 persons. Two Frontier Camps are planned for the summer of 1967: one to train additional adult leaders; and the other a frontier camp for a small group of key high school young people from over the Conference. The program will be expanded in 1968 as additional leadership is trained.

Frontier Camping will offer much to members of the Little Rock Conference and will in no way detract from the fine program of Institutional Camping which has long been a vital part of Camp Tanako, and which will continue for many years.

YEAR AROUND PROGRAM

Camp Tanako has been well served the Little Rock Conference from late Spring until early Fall, but has not been used during the cold winter months. The new building will be a year-around structure, air conditioned for the Summer and heated for the Winter. Many of the cabins are already winterized. Plans are being made to complete this work so that Camp Tanako will be able to accommodate all groups, large or small, the year around.

We recommend the continuation of the financial policy currently followed:

- 1. From Conference apportionments, \$9,000.00
- 2. From local church budgets and a free-will offering, Sunday, April 28, 1968
- 3. Encouragement of gifts from individuals and special groups

We nominate the following to succeed themselves, term to expire in 1970: Mrs. H. L. Kennedy, T. A. Prewitt, Woodrow W. Smith, and Mrs. Pratt Remmel. We nominate Dr. John Balay to succeed Mr. T. E. Maddox, term to expire in 1970.

TELEVISION RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

I. Organization

- 1. That William D. Leavitt be Conference TRAFCO Consultant.
- 2. That the Executive Committee be the Chairman, the Cabinet Consultant, Vice Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer, (the Area Treasurer, acting Treasurer for TRAFCO).
- 3. That the Executive Committee be given responsibility and authority to act on behalf of our Conference TRAFCO in such ad interim work that may be necessary.

II. Cultivation and Motivation

- 1. That in collaboration with the North Arkansas Conference TRAFCO, an Area TRAFCO Workshop be held at Hendrix College, if not in connection with, at the same time of the Arkansas Pastor's School
- That audio-visual workshops for pastors and local church audiovisual committee members be held in the districts or subdistricts under the direction of the district superintendents and district directors of TRAFCO.

III, Program

- 1. That the Conference Film Library, in cooperation with all the Conference boards and agencies, be established in the Area Town and Country Office, and that the secretary of that Office be the Conference Film Librarian, with TRAFCO sharing in financial support.
- 2. That in cooperation with the Conference boards and agencies, a film catalog be made available for the local churches.
- 3. That in the building of the new Methodist Headquarters Building, consideration be given to providing an Audio-Visual Room.
- 4. That the Little Rock Conference TRAFCO in collaboration with the North Arkansas Conference TRAFCO, shall continue to work toward the goal of establishing the Area Film Library in an Audio-Visual Room of the Methodist Headquarters Building, with an employed film librarian who shall receive special training; and an up-to-date catalog be maintained for the local churches; and that all of this shall be under the direction of the Area Council.
- 5. That each church in our Conference accept the responsibility of promoting and raising the world service special gift fund, i. e., the Television-Radio Ministry Fund (Discipline, Par 762) a total amount equal to 10¢ per member 4¢ for General TRAFCO and 6¢ for Conference TRAFCO, and that each church be urged to place this item in the annual church budget. An increasing number of churches have adopted this item as a budget item, under the leadership of the district superintendents, and are to be commended for doing so.
- 6. That with the approval of the World Service and Finance Commission, the Fourth Sunday in October be designated as TV-Radio Ministry Fund Sunday, using the cultivation materials and offering envelopes provided by General TRAFCO for receiving this special offering,

and at the same time lifting up the Conference and General TRAFCO programs.

7. That the World Service and Finance Commission continue to support TRAFCO with an allocation of \$3000 — \$2500 for General TRAFCO and \$500 for Conference TRAFCO.

IV. Television and Radio Programming, Scheduling and Future Goals

- 1. That Pulaski Heights Methodist Church be highly commended for televising their 11:00 a.m. Sunday services, with their own personnel and TV equipment, and that other local churches in cities with television stations consider a similar program.
- 2. That we commend the churches and pastors for the radio broadcast of Sunday services, and we encourage other churches and pastors to join in this larger extension of the Christian gospel.
- 3. That professional radio and/or television personnel be asked to serve as Associate District Directors of TRAFCO to assist in placement of available TRAFCO series on both radio and also assist in each district training program.
- 4. That an annual meeting be held in the Fall with the associate district directors of TRAFCO and Commission members to consider distribution and use of films, etc., for broadcast possible coverage the next calendar year within the Conference. From this a calendar will be developed and distributed to all local churches listing stations and carrying certain programs, at what time, etc.
- 5. That our Commission work continually with the professional radio/TV people in obtaining the best use of local time by local churches.
- 6. That we shall cooperate with the Conference boards and agencies in obtaining and maintaining the desired and necessary films, film strips, etc.

THE TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION PROGRAM 1966-67

- 1. The Town and Country Commission nominates the following officers, the cabinet representative, the members of the commission's executive committee, and the district directors, as delegates to attend The National Consultation on Church and Community Life, which will be held in Columbus, Ohio, on September 5-8, 1967, and will allow each of these nominees \$125 to cover their expenses. Our Bishop and the Area Director are also delegates by virtue of their office.
- 2. The Town and Country Commission's Annual Meeting and the Town and Country Workshop shall be held in Little Rock, at Aldersgate Camp, on January 15 and 16, 1968. The program for the workshop will be in the field of Stewardship featuring small church finance and emphasizing The Lord's Acre-Lord's Hour Plan.
- 3. We recommend the holding of divine worship services in each church every week, wherever practical or possible.
- 4. We recommend that every Methodist Church in Arkansas have an appropriate sign designating it as a Methodist Church.
- 5. We shall continue to promote interest in holding worship services in the recreational areas of our state.
- 6. When asked by the District Superintendent, the Commission will be willing to assist him in a study regarding the Larger Parish Programs, new church locations, and the abandonment of church properties.

- 7. We request the District Directors of Town and Country Work to inform all town and country ministers of the lending library at Hendrix College in Conway.
- 8. We shall cooperate with the University of Arkansas and The Council of Churches in the Rural Church Seminar, which is held annually on the campus of the University.
- 9. The Executive Director, in co-operation with the Executive Committee, select one rural minister in each Conference to attend the Seminar on Church and Community Life, which is held at Emory University in the summer. We will pay up to \$100 on the expense of those who attend this Seminar.
- 10. We request the Commission on Minimum Salary to allow up to \$500 for expenses of pastors on minimum salary to attend the Ruarl Seminar.
- 11. The Commission shall be responsible for promoting stewardship through the Every Member Visit, Tithing, Wills, Legacies, and The Methodist Foundation of Arkansas Programs.
- 12. We will request and try to make use of the Lay Speaking Program of the Conference Board of Lay Activities. To further develop the goal, we will prepare and recommend to those conducting worship services a uniform Methodist Order of Worship. We urge that everyone conducting such services give an invitation to Christian Discipleship at the close of the service.
- 13. The Enlarged Charge Program shall be continued with a goal of at least 300-400 members for every full-time pastor.
- 14. We shall work with TRAFCO in offering to make available films, filmstrips, and projectors to be used by the Districts and local Churches.
- 15. The State Director shall continue to give guidance in building programs when requested by the pastor and District Superintendents.
- 16. The District Directors may be elected by the Commission at the Annual Conference session after consultation with the District Superintendent. The State Director shall notify the District Directors as to their responsibilities regarding their work in their District at the beginning of the Conference Year.
- 17. The Rural Church of the Year Awards shall be promoted according to the guidelines developed by the special committee on the Rural Church of the Year.
- 18. We shall seek to develop cooperative procedures between the church and governmental agencies, the Arkansas Council of Churches, and other denominations.
- 19. We recommend the Neighborhood-1 Program and believe it to be helpful in establishing new congregations outpost Sunday Schools, and cluster groups in areas where there are no churches.
- 20. The special emphasis in the Town and Country Work this year will be The Lord's Acre-Lord's Hour Plan.
- 21. We ask that \$9,00.00 be granted by the Commission on World Service and Finance for the Town and Country Work and Stewardship Promotion for this next conference year.
- 22. We commend Reverend W. O. Scroggin, Jr. for the work that he has done the past two years as the Area Director of Town and Country Work and Stewardship and request the Bishop and the Cabinet to reappoint him as the Director of Town and Country Work and Stewardship, representing the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences for the coming year.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

"The present Woman's Division is becoming a new creature. It was inevitable of course. Under the new structure changes the administration of "Mission" projects at home and overseas went to other Divisions the Woman's Division itself is moving from an institution-centered body to an opinion body, a body attempting to use its influence to change the climate." I have been quoting from the Report of the Woman's Division in the 1966 Report of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Church, The report also points out that while the Woman's Division is still meeting its obligations to the institutions we are asking in our meetings: Are there institutions for this day? We are not content to be a donating and interpreting body. Already certain monies are being set aside for our work both in ecumenical work affecting women and in ventures involving women in local situations. This can have peril, but it also can be of great advantage to the Board of Missions as a whole. The mission program itself is at a crossroads. It is quite possible that we the women can become a new expression of the mission of the church, Our Woman's Societies and Guilds represent thousands upon thousands of organized women. We have access to them through program, schools of Mission and through their office responsibilities. Since the Assembly held in May 1966 the malaise that followed the reorganization of the Board seems to have gone. Eight thousand women met and recognized each other as co-partners in the great mission movement. The two emphases that showed most clearly were the necessity of working across denominational lines and the necessity that the work must be done in great part at the local level. Again and again in the Assembly and during the past summer when members of the Woman's Societies joined other units around the world at the meeting of the World Federation of Methodist Women, the question that came up was: How Do We Use Our Strength as an Organized Group to Change the World Into a Good and Righteous World? This is also the question of the women in the Little Rock Conference Woman's Societies and Guilds. What will happen one cannot say, but we know that these are crucial years in the growth and life of our organization. Let us look briefly at some of the areas of emphasis in our work during the past year.

Program and Education for Christian Mission

The varied interests of our many groups in Woman's Societies and Guilds have been kept in mind throughout all our program materials. Mission emphasis took a big place (including a new approach to other religions), spiritual growth was provided for and opportunities for social action were presented. Evaluation reports from the 208 vice-presidents under whose direction the Committee on Program in the local society is carried out, reveal their appreciation of and creative use of this year's Program Book, Dialogue and Design. A decided increase was noted in the number of cooperative studies and programs with other societies and with women of other denominations also an increase in the number of societies participating in all the special observances of the Councils of Church Women United.

Our first Inter-Conference School of Christian Mission was held August 6-12, 1966, and we feel that it was an outstandingly successful venture. The 1967 Inter-Conference School is planned for July 17-21 with the Guilds preceding on July 15-16, on the Hendrix College Campus. We are eagerly looking forward to our second year together. The theme of the 1966 School and Bible Study was Christian Being and Doing based on James and I Peter. It supported the unified study theme of Affluence and Poverty: Dilemma for Christians to an amazing degree. The interrelatedness of the studies matched their timeliness, and enabled government, church, and community leaders to be invited as special participants in our schools, District Missionary Conferences, and in our local church-wide mission studies. Much cooperative planning was done in the districts for the fall Mission Study Conferences by those who have the responsibility in mission study namely: the Woman's Society, Board of Missions, Wesleyan Service Guild, Board of Education and the District Superintendents. The purpose of these Mission Study conferences is to offer training for missionary education to leaders in the local churches. Four districts held these conferences and 319 persons attended last fall. We feel sure that all six districts will offer the training this adults enrolled in classes studying Affluence and Poverty and the Bible Study during January and February in the churchwide and Woman's Society and Guild classes. The local impact of these studies will not come from the organized sessions, but from the follow-up, involvement and new avenues of service which emerge as a result of self-scrutiny of attitudes and local conditions.

Miss Norene Robkin, one of our own missionaries recently returned from the mission field in Luluabourg, Africa, was itinerated in all the Districts for the Annual Meetings during April of this year and she was

received most enthusiastically.

These years hold great challenges and opportunities for intensive churchwide planning directed toward the education and creative involvement of Methodists in the growing ecumenical movement of our times. The basic text. **That the World May Believe** by Dr. Albert C. Outler, will be part of the curriculum for all participants in the 1967 schools of Christian Mission.

Christian Social Relations

Information, understanding, Action—these are necessary ingredients in order for us to work effectively as Christians in our church, community, nation and world. We continue to involve ourselves and others with the social issues which are ever with us. Especially at this time we are concerned with the United Nations and its part in World peace, China, the war in Viet Nam, racial justice, poverty and affluence, and our local concerns which were acted upon in our State Legislature this year regarding Casino gambling and the Mixed Drink Bills as well as others. World

Understanding Workshops in "Hub" cities over the country, based on the World Understanding Workship in Africa held last September in which for the first time American women went to another country to participate, have been held this spring. Our own Secretary of Christian Social Relations and others from our Conference participated in the one closest to us at Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Other workshops will be held over the United States in the year ahead. One is already planned to be held in El Dorado later this year. Others will follow we hope.

Wesleyan Service Guild

The 71 local units of the Little Rock Conference Wesleyan Service Guild afforded the 1547 members opportunities of sharing in a program of spiritual enrichment, personal development, missionary outreach and social concern for our local, national and world community. This has been accomplished by participation in the Inter-Conference Mission Week-end at Camp Tanako last summer, a Spiritual Life Enrichment Week-end Retreat at Aldersgate Camp in September at the Conference level, and by at least two meetings in each of the six districts. An attempt is being made to streamline the program and make it geared to the needs of the working women in our area. Its success is reflected in the lives of the informed, concerned women who are dedicated to the task that is ours—to be God's witness in the world as we share our gifts of time, talents and money.

Mission Giving

The 11,257 Woman's Society and Guild members of our Conference sent to the Division in undirected pledge to Missions this year \$100,642.00, Cash for Supply Work \$8,997.00, Call to Pray and Self Denial \$4,384.00, Supplementary Gifts \$2,653.00. You will be interested to know that of this last amount, \$1,200.00 went to Aldersgate and \$1,000.00 to our new Hot Springs Church and Community Project. Our Conference has a special fund known as the Elizabeth Thornburgh Workman Fund which is budgeted for and spent in our conference for our work with youth. This amount for this year totals \$885.00. This too, is a part of the total amount sent in by the districts. The reports show also that \$44,990.00 was raised by the Societies and spent at the local church level.

Mission Projects Within the Conference

Aldersgate Camp which is directed by Reverend Ray Tribble is related to the National Division of the Board of Missions. The Camp has had recognition come to it because of the excellence of the camping program as well as the Christian Leadership Development Program it affords. A representative from the United States Children's Bureau visited the Camp very recently to make a survey. Aldersgate had been selected as one of two projects in this area recommended by the Regional Director, because of its program for children of different cultures. A much expanded program is planned for the Camp in the months ahead.

Our two Church and Community Projects located in Polk and Garland Counties are doing fine work under the direction of Miss Judy Atwood and Miss Doris Fair, respectively. Miss Atwood has been directing the work in the eleven churches assigned to her since September 1964 and Miss Fair began her duties October 1, 1966, in the eleven churches assigned to her. The District Superintendents and pastors as well as the membership in these churches report progress and satisfaction with their work and the workers.

Campus Ministry and Missionary Personnel

The Woman's Society cooperated with the Board of Christian Social Concerns and the Board of Education to sponsor an eleven day United

Nations-Washington, D.C. study tour in November 1966. Thirty persons from the L. R. Conference participated in this project. The group also toured certain mission projects of the Methodist Church in addition to touring places of interest in New York and Washington, We have also worked with the Board of Education and the Methodist Student Movement in an effort to establish a more effective ministry at our campus centers. This has been accomplished through "A Day on Campus" programs and also through group study with the Wesley Foundation Directors, Conference Secretaries of Missionary Personnel and Campus Ministry, and the Conference Director of M.S.M. The Woman's Society is also working with the Board of Education and Commission on Christian Vecetions in planning for a seminar for Church-related vocations tian Vocations in planning for a seminar for Church-related vocations to be held at Camp Tanako, July 5-8. An excellent staff has been secured to lead the workshop and involvement groups. We are again bringing a National student to each youth camp at Tanako. This year Mr. James Wong of Sarawak and Mr. Florante P. Tangonan from the Phillipines will be our guests. These students render an invaluable service in making the missions.

Leadership Training

Our Conference officers have just come from a Jurisdiction meeting at Mt. Sequoyah where we had a new experience called Leadership Performance where we not only listened to someone tell us how to go about our leadership tasks in our churches, church schools, woman's societies and Guilds, etc., but we were instructed in the IBEX system where we actually performed in the several roles as a leadership team. Our hope now is that we will be able to begin to put this new skill to work being

the very best Christian leaders we can possibly be.

Our Conference, District and local officers appreciate the cooperation of the Annual Conference officers and the District Superintendents. We are glad to be a part of the membership on the Boards and Agencies where the Discipline indicates that we have corresponding officers who should serve with you. It is a joy to serve in any way that we can. I would like to say a special word of thanks to the Bishop, the District Superintendents and the pastors for the encouragement you have given us this year. It was gratifying to have so many of you present in our Annual Meeting at Lakeside, Pine Bluff in March. We appreciated also the Pine Bluff District Superintendent calling a meeting of his ministers on the same day and the same town in which the Woman's Society District Annual Meeting was being held and then asking them all to be present for a part of the Women's Meeting before convening his own meeting. This gave the women of this district a sense of being appreciated and of being a part of the District Church Program.

And now I have a short message to the District Superintendents from our Conference Secretary of Membership Cultivation. She respectfully asks your cooperation in impressing the local pastors with the importance of having Woman's Societies and Guilds in every church. When this is not possible we try to get a District Member in each unorganized church.

All women are important and we want them to know of our concern. We are "people seekers" not just member seekers to increase our rolls. Our purpose is to help women to grow in understanding and spiritual power; increase their knowledge of needs in the world; and share in the witness, service, and outreach of the church.

ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT

World Service and Finance Commission Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church 1723 Broadway Little Rock, Arkansas

The attached statements present cash receipts and disbursements for

the period June 1, 1966 through May 31, 1967.

Our examination of the treasurer's records was made in accordance Our examination of the treasurer's records was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and included such tests as we considered necessary in the circumstances including verification by correspondence with depositories. Cash receipts were traced into the bank accounts and were examined as to credit in the proper amounts into various funds. Cash disbursements were verified against canceled

checks and a test check of authorized requisitions.

Our examination did not extend to the Board of Pensions, and we recommend a separate audit of this fund as there seems to be a lack of communication between Evanston, Illinois and the Little Rock Conference Treasurer. The conference treasurer shows investments of \$184,031.50 with Evanston, but our correspondence with Evanston indicates a total balance of \$690,666.91 at May 31, 1967 in four funds. We believe most of this difference represents monies on hand at Evanston prior to the creation of a joint treasurer's office for the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences, and that no entry was made on the Little Rock books when the Little Rock records were installed. Other differences arose because Evanston credits interest to the accounts and a contra entry was not made on the Little Rock books.

It is our opinion that the accompanying statements present fairly the results of cash operations under the control of Grafton Thomas, treasurer, for the period June 1, 1966 through May 31, 1967, Board of Pensions excepted, and that funds and investments are on hand, Board of Pensions excepted, at May 31, 1966 and May 31, 1967 as stated in

the exhibits.

JOHN DHOT BAKER

Rev. John Dhot Baker was born at Rock Creek, Pike County, Arkansas, February 8, 1882, and passed to his eternal home on Wednesday, August 17, 1966, in Hot Springs, Arkansas. His funeral service was held in Grand Avenue Methodist Church, Hot Springs, at 2:00 p.m. Friday, August 19, 1966, by Woodrow W. Smith, his pastor; Otto W. Teague, his District Superintendent; and



August 19, 1966, by Woodrow W. Smith, his pastor; Otto W. Teague, his District Superintendent; and Kenneth L. Spore, his friend for more than fifty-six years. He was buried in Ozan Cementary, Bingen, Arkansas. The Caruth Funeral Service of Hot Springs was in charge with Brother Smith and Dr. Spore attending.

John Dhot Baker was the second son of Joseph A. and Emma Sale Baker. The family moved to west Texas when he was nine years old. He acquired his grammar school and high school education in west Texas and joined the church at Uvalde, Texas in 1891. He returned to Pike County, Arkansas, about 1900 and he always felt that his real conversion and religious experience came at Pike City, Pike County, Arkansas on July 4, 1901.

He was licensed to preach at Columbus, Arkansas in August 1903; the Presiding Elder was R. R. Moore, the pastor was S. K. Burnett, and the Secretary of the Prescott District Conference at that time was W. D. Lee of Center Point. He entered the Hendrix Academy in the fall of 1903 and remained a student there until the school was closed in 1904 or 1905 by the General Board of Education. After this time and until the summer of 1909, there was a period of time, four or five years, when he was fighting the call to the ministry he traveled through a good part of the West, and was in California about a year, before returning to Arkansas and the public school profession, teaching in several schools in Polk County, including Mena. He finally surrendered his life to the Methodist Ministry on what he recalled was "one of the greatest days" in his life. He joined the Little Rock Conference, on trial at Arkadelphia on November 25, 1909. Bishop E. R. Hendrix was the Presiding Bishop. Other members of that class of 1909 were: Luther C. Beasley, Ivan Lee Holt, B. F. Christmas, Clem Baker, G. T. Traylor, J. Wayne Mann, and James Wesley Williams. At the Conference of 1909 he was appointed to the DeWitt Circuit, which was composed of a large part of southern Arkansas County, exclusive of the the town of DeWitt. In 1909 there was a rearrangement of the work in south Arkansas County and his appointment was the St. Charles Circuit composed of most of the eastern part of the county and centered in St. Charles. It was while he was pastor of the St. Charles Circuit that he first saw two boys, quite small then, who were later to be Methodist preachers, and both served under him when he was District Superintendent of the Prescott District. These boys were Arthur Terry and Kenneth L. Spore.

In the fall of 1911 he entered the School of Religion of Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tennessee where he completed the full three year course, returning to the Little Rock Conference in 1914. During his first year in Vanderbilt, he worked at various jobs about the University to

"make his way," including being as he said, a "telephone girl" for a time.

In the summer of 1912 he was "District Evangelist" in the Fayetteville District of the North Arkansas Conference, Paul Stephenson, Presiding Elder. In 1912-14, he supplied a mission charge in the Murfreesboro District of the Tennessee Conference, where he "received many spiritual benefits and made many friendships which will last through the eternities."

In the fall of 1914 he returned to the Little Rock Conference. The pastorates served in the Little Rock Conference were as follows:

The six years (1936-42) between his Benton and Crossett pastorates, he was the last Presiding Elder and the first District Superintendent of the Prescott District.

He retired at the Conference of 1946, in Hot Springs, as all our sessions, except three, have been, since 1942. Bishop Paul E. Martin was the Bishop. Brother Baker was only 64 at the time. He was forced to retire as he said, "because of bodily ailments." After a year of complete rest and treatment he was able to supply small charges around Hot Springs, while he lived at 1400 Central Avenue, Hot Springs. Gardner, Piney Grove, Jones Mill, and Fountain Lake were the churches he served. During his pastorate at Jones Mill, five years, he lead in the organization of the Shorewood Hills Church, and in the building of a beautiful \$35,000 building. R. B. Moore Sr. was the District Superintendent at the time.

One of the great days in his life, as he put it, was the day, November 17, 1963, when he was privileged to assist Bishop W. Kenneth Pope, District Superintendent, D. Mouzon Mann, and Pastor William R. Johnson in the dedication of the beautiful church at Shorewood Hills, Jones Mill, near Malvern.

In the summer of 1953, J. M. Hamilton, District Superintendent, appointed him to his last charge, Fountain Lake, near Hot Springs. He served from August to December 31, 1953, when he had a severe heart attack while preaching.

The people and the District Superintendent wouldn't let him "resign" until February, 1954, however. After his "resignation" as pastor at Fountain Lake in February 1954, he put his quarterly conference membership at Grand Avenue, the last church he had served before retirement. Soon, thereafter, that fine church elected him Pastor Emeritus, which honored position he had until his death. After retiring to Grand Avenue, as Pastor Emeritus, he continued "to help where he could," mostly "encouraging young preachers." He "took pains" not to "get in the way of a pastor" but "to help him" to uphold his hands, to pray for him, and all the brethern at all times."

At our annual conference of 1938, Brother Baker was elected a reserve delegate to the History-Making Uniting Conference which met in Kansas City, Missouri, in 1939. On May 3, 1939, he was seated as regular delegate in that conference. He was always proud of that and

considered it a great honor. The writer of this memoir has always considered it a great honor and has been proud of it, too; because he had something to do with bringing it about, and, of course, considers it an honor justly bestowed.

John Dhot Baker was one of the great evangelistic preachers of the long and illustrious history of the Little Rock Conference. He always felt that the business of the church, as an agency of the Kingdom of God, was to save the souls of men, and that if a man was fully dedicated to that work, the Holy Spirit would lead the way and give him a deep and abiding passion for the souls of men. Hence, over a long ministry, he preached in almost 150 revival meetings, received almost 2,000 persons into the various churches he served as pastor, on profession of faith. It has been estimated that perhaps 10,000 people responded to his invitation to accept Jesus Christ as Savior during his long and effective ministry. The present writer, having heard him in two revivals when he was a teenager, regarded him as a great preacher. He is not sure yet whether he has ever heard a greater. There are some who will read these words who heard J. D. Baker in his prime, and they will know that J. D. Baker in his prime had no superior and few equals as a stirring conscientious and dedicated proclaimer of the unsearchable riches of the Gospel of Jesus Christ our Lord.

Brother Baker served two quadreniams as Conference Director of Evangelism. He appointed the present writer as District Director of Evangelism before the General Conference provided for that office. He was often called on to preach at the churches of other denominations at the seat of our conference when the conference was in session on Sunday.

He was chaplain of the State Senate, while he was pastor at Shorewood Hills, after his retirement. This was during the administration of Governor Sid McMath.

He was a member in good standing of Industrial Lodge #751, Free and Accepted Masons, at Shorewood Hills, at the time of his death. He had been a Mason many years.

While he was a pastor at Mineral Springs, Arkansas, he met Miss Nona Catherine Wolff, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. J. R. Wolff of Bingen, Hempstead County. They were married November 23, 1919. This fine union of two excellent people improved the lot and increased the happiness of each, immeasurably. This union was blest with two sons, John Dhot, Jr., who at the time of his father's passing was a Lt. Col. in the U. S. Air Force and stationed at Wichita Falls, Texas; and Joseph Rufus who is an architect and in 1966 was with the Bruce Anderson Company in Little Rock. He was survived also by one brother, Joseph C. Baker, one sister, Mrs. S. M. McGhee, and four grandchildren.

Brother Baker was a man who believed the words of our Lord when he said, "No man can serve two masters." And he didn't try-he was, during the fifty-six years I knew him, fully dedicated to ONE MASTER.

Herman Daniel Ginther, son of Charles Edwin and Nellie Susan Ginther, was born in Edwards County, Illinois, February 25, 1901. In his early childhood, his family moved to the Sylvania community near Cabot, Arkansas, where he grew to young manhood.

On October 2, 1921, he was married to Miss Hattie Hays, to which union were born two children, Daniel of Houston, Texas and Mary Lou of Warrensburg, Missouri.



His early education was in the public schools of Lonoke County. Following his decision to enter the ministry, he attended Southern State College at Magnolia. However, he remained a student throughout the years of his active service, reading good periodicals and books, and always a regular and faithful attendant on the Arkansas Pastors School.

In early manhood he evidenced an interest in active Christian service, serving as Church School Superintendent and in other capacities in the ongoing program of the local church. Feeling the call to the full-time Christian ministry, he applied

His appointments were as follows: Carlisle Circuit, Taylor Circuit, Austin Circuit, Fairview (Camden), Gillett, Eudora, Secretary of Rural Work for the Monticello District, Primrose, Ashdown, Fairview (Texarkana), Vantrease, Mena and Fordyce. But his services extended beyond the local church to include membership on some of the most important Conference commissions and boards, among them the Commission on Ministerial Sustentation, the Board of Evangelism and the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications.

He was justly proud of his financial record in that he did not serve a charge that failed to pay everything in full each year. But his ministry cannot be measured solely by figures in the statistical table at the close of the Conference year. Always kind and gentle in his personal relationships, he was quietly aggressive in his attention to all phases of a well-rounded ministry of preaching, teaching, pastoral visitation and administrative oversight. One of the most faithful and conscientous ministers among us, he neglected no part of the local church program for which he was responsible.

After a brief illness his earthly journey came to an end at Fordyce, October 9, 1966. Following the memorial service conducted by his District Superintendent, Rev. J. E. Dunlap, he was buried at Sylvania, his childhood home where other members of his faimly had been laid to rest.

JOHN BELL HEFLEY

John Bell Hefley was an individualist in the best Christian meaning of the word. That does not mean he was ever satisfied with himself. He believed no man is ever really himself except in terms of growing Christian spirit and action. He appeared always pressing on toward the



Christian mind. It was if he had to explore deeper meanings of the self in Christ, seeking the profounder truth, reaching after the better, acquiring greater art and skill in expressing his faith. Here was a man of Christian integrity, always free to become.

John often spoke of the hard beginnings of his life in the rocky foot hills of his home. He had little of what we call advantages. He made his way by self-discipline and unswerving determination. He graduated from high school in Texarkana; he earned his degree at Henderson-Brown college; then he went on to receive his Bachelor of Divinity degree from the School of Theology at Southern Methodist. By the same spirit he continued to discipline himself in study as long as he lived.

He never appeared to be physically robust. Many of his days he had to bear some physical limitation. But his work did not lessen. And again his dogged strength of character gave him the strength to carry through. So, it was that before his last illness he appeared to have gained a greater physical strength than he had before.

In his work as a minister he walked the high line. He was open and honest. He was devoted to his calling, he toiled long hours. He cared for his people, and many today are greatful that in some time of need he stood with them. He was a pulpit man whose sincerity of purpose, keen intellect and command of good english made his work effective to spiritual growth in his people. He was an administrator whose skill in organization always left a church stronger for his leadership.

He was a conference man, constructively interested in the affairs of the Church beyond his parish. As much as any man he is responsible for the development of our Wesley Foundation program. He was a teacher and as a teacher he contributed greatly to the conference educational program. The night before he died he completed an application for a new course of study.

John Bell Hefley was born near Hollis, in Perry County, Arkansas, March 26th, 1900. His parents were John Bell Hefley and Frankie Lynch Hefley. On January 31st, 1933, he was married to Miss Mary Lucille Rodgers of Little Rock. Indicative of the true union in that marriage is the habit many of us had saying "John and Lucille." Of the two God made one. And for all the years of their ministry they worked together at a task they both loved.

His pastoral assignments were Forest Park, Little Rock; Rison; First Church, McGehee; Highland, Little Rock; Grand Avenue, Stuttgart; First Church, Arkadelphia; University Church, Lake Charles, Louisiana; First Church, Crossett; Lakeside. Pine Bluff. While a student at Henderson-Brown he supplied Friendship Circuit. He retired because of ill health in 1963. His last service was as a member of the staff of St. Paul, Little Rock.

He died at his home in Little Rock, January 6th, 1967. Funeral

services were held in St. Paul Church. Bishop Paul Galloway conducted the service, and was assisted by the Reverend Joe Phillips, his super-intendent, and The Reverend Everett Vinson, his pastor. He rests in Pine Crest Cemetery, near Little Rock.

X. Miscellaneous

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

- 1. Nominations. The District Superintendents shall nominate all members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees except as otherwise provided.
- 2. Conference Council. There shall be a Conference Council composed of the Bishop and the Cabinet; the chairmen of the following Boards and Commissions: Education, Evangelism, Hospitals and Homes, Lay Activities, Ministerial Training and Qualifications, Missions, Pensions, Social Concerns, Christian Vocations, Minimum Salary, Town and Country and TRAFCO; the Editor of The Arkansas Methodist, the President of Hendrix College, Superintendent of the Methodist Children's Home, President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, the President of the Methodist Foundation, the Secretary of the Annual Conference, a layman from each district to be appointed by the Bishop and Cabinet. The Conference Staff shall be members of the Council without vote and the Chairman of World Service and Finance Commission shall sit with the Council in an advisory capacity. The head of any agency who is not a member of the Conference will serve as ex-officio member without vote.
 - (a) The Council shall have such duties and responsibilities as the Annual Conference may assign to it.
 - b) The Executive Committee of the Council is to confer with the Bishop regarding program and promotional plans.
 - (c) The Executive Committee of the Council shall meet within 30 days after the close of each Annual Conference Session to prepare the Conference Calendar. Changes in the calendar thus prepared may be changed when found necessary by the Bishop and the Cabinet.
- 3. Financial and Statistical. (1) The District Superintendents shall furnish the treasurer with all assessments and acceptances of the pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the meeting of the Annual Conference. These figures shall be official. (2) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars, with no column for cents. (3) Each pastor shall report to the Conference Treasurer and turn in his statistical report to the statistician at a date set by the cabinet. This date shall be at least seven (7) days prior to the starting date of Annual Conference. The Pastor's Reports received at this time shall be entered into the Annual Conference Statistical Tables without change. Any unanticipated funds received after the aforesaid date shall be entered in the Journal on a separate page.) (4) The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be June 1st to May 31st, and all salaries and connectional askings of the churches shall be paid on this basis.
- 4. Memoirs. There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased Clerical Member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, name of children, charges served and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with his memoir. The memoirs of the wives or widows of clerical members of the Conference shall be published in the Journal. The name of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs the passing of any person whose memoir shall appear in the Journal. It shall be the duty of District Superintendents to report to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions the death of any conference claimant that occurs in their respective districts.

- 5. Administrative Fund. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall recommend an assessment for a Conference administrative fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expenses of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expense of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this fund. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the fund. Payments from the fund shall be made only on vouchers signed by the secretary of the Conference; provided that this rule does not relate to the salary and expenses of the Treasurer of the Conference.
- 6. Conference Treasurer. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the Conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Anual Conference shall assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer on recommendation of the World Service Commission, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.
- 7. Number of Districts. There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Conference.
- 8. District Fund. The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall report to the district conference, annually, showing receipts and disbursements.
- 9. Reports and Resolutions. There shall be a pre-conference report which shall contain reports of all the boards and agencies of the Conference. This report shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Annual Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the pre-conference reports shall be typewritten, in triplicate, on special forms furnished by the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary. In the event editing of a report is deemed necessary by the Conference Secretary and chairman of the board involved, permission is hereby granted.
- 10. Membership of Historical Society. The Historical Society shall be composed of ten or more members, one of whom shall be the Conference Secretary. In addition to the duties outlined in the Discipline, the Society shall secure a group picture of each class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal; and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his retirement.
- 11. Safeguarding Historical Material. (1) Any member of the Little Rock Annual Conference, or layman authorized by a member of the Conference, may examine Historical documents within Headquarters Building. (2) To remove historical documents from Headquarters Building, a written request signed by the presiding Bishop and Conference Secretary shall be presented to the Custodian. Provided further, historial documents belonging to the Conference Woman's Society may be removed from Headquarters Building upon written request signed by the President and Secretary of the Woman's Conference. (3) The Custodian of Historical documents shall be given a receipt for any material removed from the vault in Headquarters Building, Little Rock, giving date of removal and name of receiver.
- 12. District Conference. There shall be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline and one additional member from each pastoral

charge, provided however, in charges of more than five hundred members there shall be one additional member for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.

- 13. Lay Members. Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the pastor-host of the Annual Conference at least fifteen days before the session of the Annual Conference.
- 14. Board Service. No person may be nominated to serve on the same Conference Board for more than two consecutive quadrenniums, and may not be nominated to serve on more than one board at the same time. District Superintendents may not serve on Conference Boards, except as provided in the Discipline or by specific conference action. A person failing to attend a board, of which he is a member in a quadrennium may be continued only by special board action.
- 15. Entertainment. The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the retired ministers shall be entertained from the entertainment fund. Certain proceeds from the offerings shall go to the fund. The entertainment fund shall be administered by three men, to be named by the Cabinet, who will be reporting to the next session of the Annual Conference.
- 16. Conference Expense. Registration fees and the offerings at the public services in the session of the Annual Conference shall be used to defray the expense of the session including the expense and/or honorarium of the conference preacher and that any deficit remaining be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund, and the Conference Treasurer shall pay the same.
- 17. Pastor's Traveling Expense. After the Fourth Quarterly Conference of a charge has set the minimum salary of a pastor for the ensuing year, the Quarterly Conference may set the traveling expense fund for the pastor in an amount not to exceed \$1,200.00 per year for each pastor and associate pastor assigned to a pastoral charge, provided, however, that charges of more than one church may allow an additional \$300.00 travel expense per each additional church.

Provided further, that no salary may be lowered to initiate an expense fund or to increase an existing expense fund.

- 18. Pastor's Utilities. At the Fourth Quarterly Conference after a Charge has set the minimum salary of a pastor for the ensuing year, the Quarterly Conference may so direct that an amount not to exceed \$600 may be paid by the church for parsonage utilities, provided, however, that the pastor's salary and travel allowance is not lowered to do this, and that this money will be used by the church and/or pastor for parsonage utilities only. Further, this amount shall be subject and no apportionment by any group or to pay into any fund. Be it further provided that a church may designate a part of the pastor's salary as utilities for income tax purposes.
- 19. Unsponsored Resolutions. Any resolution not sponsored by a regular board or standing committee of the Conference must lie over for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon provided, however, immediate debate and action may be ordered by two-thirds vote of the Conference presence and voting.
- 20. Apportionments Based on Pastor's Salary. On all items apportioned to local churches by means of a percentage of the ministers salary; such percentage shall be understood to apply to all ministerial members of the local church staff, serving under the appointment of the Bishop, including ministers in full connection, ministers on trial, and full time approved supply pastors. This rule to be in effect with the 1966-1967 Conference Year.
- 21. Campaigns. All Conference-wide campaigns to raise funds shall be voted on by ballot.

22. Amendments. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.
