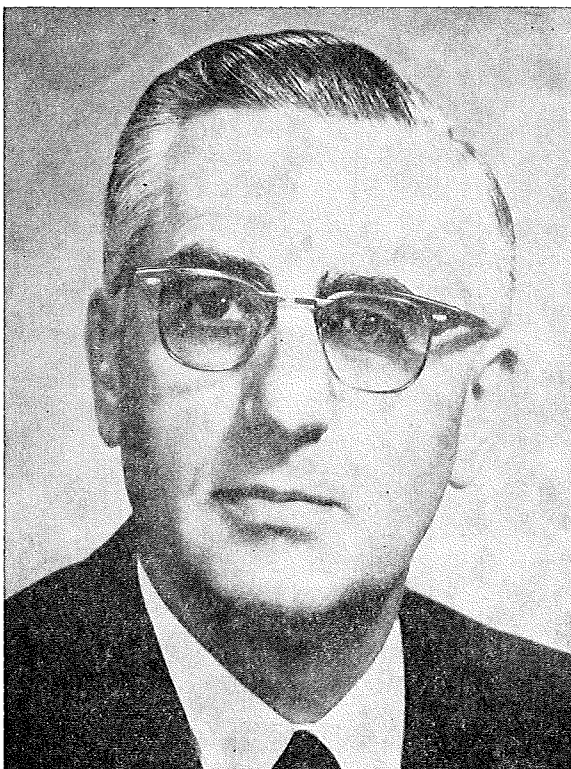

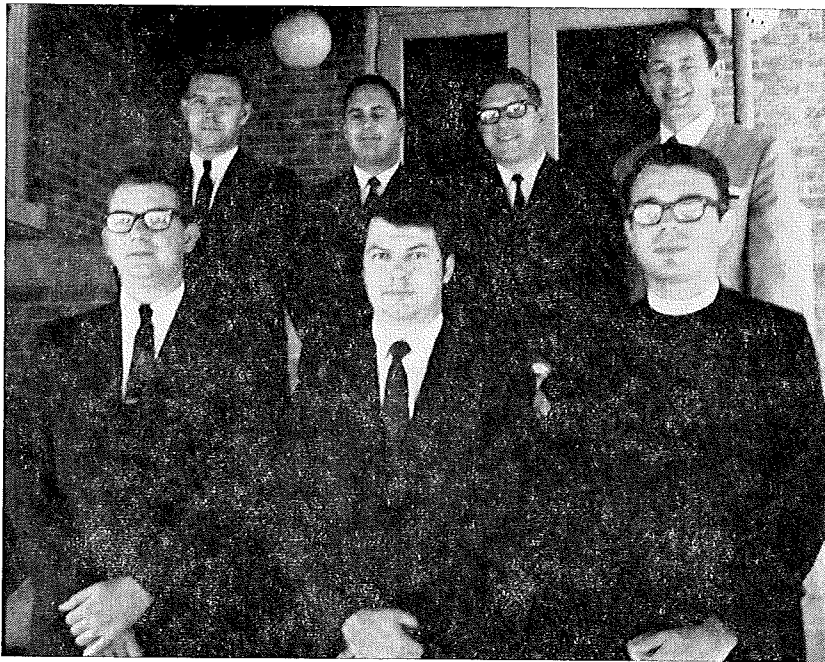

CONFERENCE MINUTES

Monday, May 20, 1968, 4:00 P.M.

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper

In absence of Bishop Galloway, Arthur Terry announced the opening hymn, No. 336, "And Are We Yet Alive". Following the singing of the hymn, Otto W. Teague led the Conference in prayer. The prayer was concluded with The Lord's Prayer. Mrs. Wm. R. Rice of Magnolia sang I Corinthians 13 as a solo. Arthur Terry asked the Conference to turn to the ritual for the administration of the Sacrament of The Lord's Supper (the brief form). Then he presented Alfred H. Freeman, a former pastor of First Methodist Church, El Dorado, and the Conference Preacher, who led the service. He was joined by Alvin Murray, Host Pastor, and the Cabinet: C. Ray Hozendorf, Otto W. Teague, J. Edward Dunlap, Alf A. Eason, Joe R. Phillips, and Arthur Terry, who assisted at the service. Melvin M. Ballard was at the organ. Welcome: Alvin Murray, host pastor, welcomed the Conference and introduced the conference preacher, D. Alfred H. Freeman, who twenty-five years ago welcomed the Annual Conference to El Dorado as pastor of First Methodist Church. Mrs. Freeman was asked to stand and be presented to the Conference.

Message: Dr. Alfred H. Freeman addressed the Conference, expressing appreciation for First Methodist Church's contribution to his personal life, recalling some of his experiences here. Following prayer, he spoke on "God's Blueprints For His World". God, he said, is the Master Architect, but man has torn up the plans.

Closing: The hymn, "Blessed Assurance" was sung by the Conference. Alvin Murray, at Dr. Freeman's request, asked all the ministers to sing the last stanza a cappella. Dr. Alf Eason pronounced the benediction.

Tuesday, May 21st

8:30 A.M.

Devotional: Dr. Fred R. Harrison announced the hymn, "Dear Lord and Father of Mankind". He then read the scripture lesson, Romans, 12, after which he led the Conference in prayer.

Appreciation: Bishop Galloway thanked Dr. Harrison for leading the devotional service.

Roll Call: James E. Major announced that the roll call is being taken at the registration desks in fellowship hall.

Bar of the Conference: James E. Major moved that the bar of the Conference be the lower floor of the Sanctuary. It was done.

Welcome: Alvin Murray, host pastor, presented James H. Nobles, Jr., Chairman of the First United Methodist Church Official Board, and President of MacFarlane Oil Company, who extended the formal welcome of the Conference to El Dorado. The Conference stood in appreciation and Bishop Galloway responded.

Nominations: Dr. Hozendorf nominated James E. Major as Secretary of the Conference. He was elected.

Secretary nominations: James E. Major presented the following nominations: Journal Clerk, Woodrow W. Smith; Secretary of Ministers' Service Records, Kenneth L. Spore; Head Teller, Harold K. Davis; Staff Assistants, O. D. Peters; Tellers: Robert W. Van Hook II, Sam Jones, Mike Clayton, David Wilson.

Committee on Conference Relations: Kenneth L. Spore presented O. Wendell Hoover who gave Report No. 1 of the Committee approving the character of the ministers. It was passed.

Resolution: Woodrow W. Smith presented a Resolution to the Conference regarding opposition to the mixed-drink bill currently before the General Assembly. Robert Regnier requested an amendment to include a statement relative to defining the nature of private clubs. It was accepted. William M. Shepherd asked that the words "flaunting the law" be deleted. The Resolution was adopted with these changes.

Christian Civic Foundation: W. Henry Goodloe spoke to the Conference regarding his work in The Christian Civic Foundation.

Courtesy: Robert W. Treischmann presented Mrs. Paul V. Galloway to the Conference. Delegates stood in appreciation.

Personal Privilege: Robert M. Van Hook spoke to the conference on a personal matter, and Bishop Galloway responded with appreciation.

Greetings: James E. Major read greetings from two retired ministers: John Hoover and H. A. F. Ault, Kenneth L. Spore added the name of Claude Roy, Arthur Terry added the name of Alva C. Rogers, Harold K. Davis added the name of O. E. Holmes, all of whom wish to be remembered by the Conference.

Joe R. Phillips requested that Norris Steele be excused from the Conference because of illness in the family. It was granted.

Otto W. Teague requested that George Ivey be excused from the Conference session today for a funeral. Permission was granted, with understanding.

Layman: S. H. Allman joined with Bishop Galloway in concurring with plans for Wednesday afternoon sessions of the Conference. There will be no conflict with the layman's meeting.

Appreciation: Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for the spirit of the Arkansas Conferences.

Cabinet Nominations: Joe R. Phillips Jr., Secretary of the Cabinet, read the nominations. They were elected as read.

Organizations: Joe R. Phillips, Jr., requested that all new boards meet in the afternoon for organizations. He read names of the conveners.

Robert E. L. Bearden asked if a new Study Committee on Pensions was to be named. The reply was, "Not at this time."

Joe R. Phillips, Jr., moved that the Cabinet be empowered to name the District Committees on Ministerial Qualifications, Church Build-and Church Buildings and Location after the conference session. Motion passed.

Bishop Galloway noted that the World Service and Finance Commission would not organize this afternoon, as the present board will act throughout the present conference.

Alvin Murray announced that the place of meeting and the names of all boards will be placed on the bulletin board in fellowship hall.

James E. Major requested that those convening the boards report all elections to him.

Cokesbury: Bill Wright representing the Cokesbury Book Store presented some new books and requested delegates to visit their display in fellowship hall also presented Bishop Galloway with a check for \$6,324.43 for the Pension Fund. Raymond Franks presented a check of \$2,000.00 to Bishop Galloway for the Pension Fund from the Garland A. Brewster Trust Fund from Lakeside Church in Pine Bluff. Otto W. Teague moved that the Conference express appreciation to them for their support of the Pension Program. It was done. Bishop Galloway announced receipt of a check for \$125.00 from the Chartered Fund Account for the Pension Fund.

Historical Society: Harold Sadler gave the report of the Society. It was approved.

Arkansas Methodist Commission: R. B. Moore, Jr. presented Alfred Knox, Editor, who addressed the Conference. The report as appears in the Pre-Conference reports was approved.

Board of Christian Social Concerns: Woodrow W. Smith asked for adoption of the report as it appears in the Pre-Conference Report. It was done. Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for the work of this Board.

Commission on Christian Vocations: Gerald K. Fincher presented the report. Bishop Galloway called for concerted effort in this field during the next quadrennium. The report was adopted.

Standing Rule: Gerald K. Fincher requested a change in Standing Rule No. 3. It was placed on the table for twenty-four hours. Joe R. Phillips, Jr., spoke to the amendment.

Trustees: Kenneth Goode requested additional time to make a supplemental report.

Evangelism: Kenneth L. Spore presented Palmer Garner who presented the report of the Board.

Reports: Alvin Murray, at the request of Bishop Galloway, said he would have copies of the Pre-Conference Report distributed to delegates who do not have them.

Ralph Hale, Executive Secretary of The Board of Evangelism, spoke to the report. He lifted up the special Lay Witness program, and Bishop Galloway responded. The report was adopted.

Personal Privilege: Kenneth L. Spore told the Conference he was closing fifteen years as Chairman of this Board, and expressed his continued concern for evangelism.

Southwest Conference: Bishop Galloway presented Marshall Steel, who presented a matter to set in motion the legislation of the General Conference held in Dallas relative to the dissolution of the Southwest Conference. The motion was carried. Bishop Galloway spoke to the matter, telling the Conference something of the concern of the Study Committee and the work of assimilation as it is progressing. He will serve as Bishop of the Southwest Conference, which includes a portion of Oklahoma. He intimated that, this being the case, many of the current rumors will be true.

Board of Education: Dr. Fred R. Harrison, Chairman of the Board, presented William D. Elliott, Secretary, who gave the Report No. 1 Gladwin Connell spoke to the report. He lifted up the new resources that are to be used in the Youth Division beginning in September, and announced the orientation session at Camp Tanako in June. Report No. 1 of the Board was adopted.

Hendrix College: William D. Elliott presented Marshall T. Steel, who spoke to the Report No. 2 of the Board of Education. He referred specifically to the new rotating system for Trustees being recommended, a recommendation requiring certain changes in the Charter of Hendrix College. This part of Report No. 2, of the Board was adopted. George W. Martin was nominated by the Board of Education as a Trustee of Hendrix College. He was elected.

Marshall Steel reported on progress of the Ford Foundation Grant: Three and one-quarter million of the three and three-quarter million dollars has been raised, either in cash or in pledges.

Fred R. Harrison moved that Report No. 2 be adopted in full. It was done.

William D. Elliott requested that Report No. 3 of the Board be adopted without reading. It was done. He read additional nominations of the Board as Boards of Directors of Wesley Foundations. They were elected.

Announcement: William D. Elliott announced the Ministers' Wives luncheon to be held at St. Paul Methodist Church.

Courtesy: John Miles presented the Conference Preacher, Dr. Freeman. Robert W. Trieschmann presented additional guests: Dr. Paul Stevenson, I. L. Claude, Reverend and Mrs. G. E. Blakely, Larry Maxwell, Lynell Carter, and Joe McClain.

Resolution: Bishop Paul V. Galloway called for a vote on a resolution dealing with change of Jurisdictional boundaries. James E. Major instructed the Tellers to count the vote. The Resolution passed by a vote of 146 for, 0 against.

Courtesy: John Miles presented Chaplain Winslow Brown to the Conference. Bishop Galloway, John Miles and Chaplain Brown posed for a picture, taken by Alfred Knox. Bishop Galloway expressed great appreciation for the work and ministry of the chaplains.

Arthur Terry reported that Chaplain Withers Moore, a member of this Conference, could not attend, and requested that he be excused.

Interboard Council: George W. Martin, Chairman, presented W. Neill Hart, Executive Secretary, who gave the oral report of the Council. Mimeographed copies of the Interboard Council were distributed to delegates.

Resolution: George W. Martin read a resolution regarding the creation of a central office or headquarters for both the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conference Interboard Councils. Dr. Hart spoke to the report. John Miles questioned the commitment to the use of the proposed facilities at First Methodist Church in Little Rock. Carr Dee Racop, Jr.,

asked if North Arkansas had concurred in this. Bishop Galloway spoke to this matter and clarified the issue, assuring the Conference that the vote on the resolution does not state the place of this facility. The resolution passed.

Study Committee: Dr. C. Ray Hozendorf gave the report of the Review Committee of the Interboard Council. He moved its adoption. John P. Miles moved an amendment item 14 remain the same. It was seconded and John Miles spoke to the amendment. Robert Van Hook spoke against the amendment and in favor of the Study Committee's proposal. Carr Dee Racop offered an amendment to the amendment which would allow a Board to be free to choose whether or not the Executive Secretary of the Interboard Council would become its Executive Secretary. It was seconded. Bishop Galloway ruled that action on the matter be delayed until tomorrow.

Announcements: Various board chairmen and others made announcements.

Clarification: John Miles asked for clarification relative to organizing the quadrennial boards in lieu of the matter that has not yet been settled. Joe R. Phillips Jr. asked that organization of the Boards be allowed to proceed. Bishop Galloway so ruled.

Recognition: Dr. Clem Baker was recognized by Bishop Galloway. This is his fifty-ninth year to be in attendance at the Conference.

Committee on Memoirs: Charles Ramsay read the report of the Committee. It was adopted.

Memorial Service: Charles Ramsay conducted the Service, announcing the hymn, "Come Let Us Join Our Friends Above". Following this, the Conference affirmed its faith, reciting the Apostle's Creed. The Gloria Patri was sung. Harold K. Davis read the Scripture lesson, I Corinthians 13. James R. Scott gave the prayer. Charles Ramsay led the Litany of Commemoration. James E. Major, Conference Secretary, read the record of remembrance. Those memorialized are: Roy E. Fawcett, Cleveland H. Gilliam, H. R. Nabors, James C. Van Horn, Mrs. Clem Baker, Mrs. Robert Owen Beck, Mrs. L. E. N. Hundley, Mrs. James W. Thomas, Mrs. Leonard Westphal, and Mrs. Doyle Wilcox. The Conference stood during the reading of the names. M. E. Scott gave the commemoration message, "I Believe in the Resurrection of The Dead". The closing hymn was "Blest Be The Tie That Binds". Charles Ramsay pronounced the Benediction.

Tuesday, May 21

Afternoon

Following the organ prelude, Ralph Hale announced the hymn, "Lead On, O King Eternal". Fred H. Arnold led the Conference in prayer. Ralph Hale presented Alva Waddell, who sang "He That Hath Clean Hands and A Pure Heart". Dr. Freeman, Conference Preacher, then brought the message, "What Would You Like To Be Remembered For?" Ralph Hale announced the hymn, "A Charge To Keep I Have". Then he pronounced the benediction.

Tuesday, May 21

Evening

Following the organ prelude, Robert M. Van Hook II, Presiding Officer, announced the hymn, "O For A Thousand Tongues To Sing". He announced the order of worship on page six in the front of the Hymnal, and the Conference followed him in the ritual. The Psalter was "Out of The Depths". The Gloria Patri was sung. The anthem was presented by

the choir of First Methodist Church, Magnolia, under the direction of Mr. Harold Sweitzer, with Mr. Sweitzer at the organ. Robert M. Van Hook read the scripture lesson: Isaiah 52:1-2 and Mark 12:28-34a. He then led the Conference in offering the Christian faith, using the historic Apostles' Creed. C. Ray Hozendorf led in the pastoral prayer. Robert M. Van Hook expressed appreciation to Alvin Murray for asking him to be Presiding Officer for this service, especially in light of the fact that First Church, El Dorado is his home church. The offering was then received. The Doxology was sung, and then Robert M. Van Hook announced the hymn, "Savior, More Than Life To Me." Following the singing of the hymn, Alfred H. Freeman, Conference Preacher, brought the message, "A Faith That Will Hold In Spite of A Storm." Robert M. Van Hook announced the hymn, "My Faith Looks Up To Thee". Then he pronounced the benediction.

Wednesday, May 22, 1968

Morning

Devotional: Following the organ prelude, Carr Dee Racop, Jr. announced the hymn, "Holy, Holy, Holy". After the hymn was sung, he read the scripture lesson, Romans 5:1-11, then led the Conference in prayer.

Overview: Bishop Galloway gave an overview of the reports to be heard during the day.

Interboard Council: C. Ray Horzendorf gave a review of the matter under debate, number fourteen under the report. John Miles moved that the item not be changed, then spoke to his amendment. Gordon Hartwick, representing the Board of Evangelism, spoke to the amendment. He felt that a change would seriously hamper the work of the Board, and was in favor of the amendment. The amendment passed. Dr. Hozendorf moved that the Executive Secretary of the various boards be members of the Interboard Council. It was done. Bishop Galloway spoke about the action taken by the Conference, saying that the recommendation of the Interboard Council had nothing to do with a "power-block" or centralization of authority, and expressed his hope that there would be no effort to accuse anyone of this.

Conference Trustees: Kenneth M. Goode, Chairman, presented O. W. Hoover, who gave the report of the Trustees. It was done. Kenneth Goode encouraged use of the Trust Clause in all property owned by the church, and requested pastors and district superintendents to check the matter.

TRAFCO: O. D. Peters, Chairman, presented C. Everett Patton, Secretary, who gave the report. Two changes were recommended from the report as it appears in the Pre-Conference Report. The report was adopted. O. D. Peters expressed appreciation for cooperation given the commission, and for the efficient work of Miss Joana Dean, film librarian.

Committee on Publishing Interests: Alvin C. Murray gave the report of the Committee, lifting up the place, role, and importance of The Methodist Publishing House as an organ of the church's ministry. The report was adopted.

St. Paul Seminary, Methodist: Dr. Charles Baughman, Associate Professor at St. Paul Seminary, spoke to the Conference, bringing an encouraging message on the work of the Seminary.

Committee on Minutes: Cagle E. Fair reported that the Minutes have been read, and are in order. The report was adopted.

District Conference Journals: W. Darrel Bone reported that the District Conference Journals are in order, but that two of these Journals are missing.

Standing Rule: Gerald K. Fincher presented the recommended change in Standing Rule No. 3. Alvin C. Murray asked about the effect of the fiscal year. There is no effect. The change was adopted.

Fiscal Year: C. Ray Hozendorf moved a change in Standing Rule No. 3, changing the fiscal year from May to January, in keeping with the action of the General Conference. The Rule was placed on the table for for twenty-four hours.

Insurance: Robert B. Moore Jr. presented Sidney Good, who gave the report of the Commission. He noted no change in rates, but an increase in benefits. He moved adoption of the report. James E. Major asked if there is any change from that appearing in the Pre-Conference Report. Mr. Good said there is. The mimeographed report, as distributed to the Conference, was adopted.

Organization: Arthur Terry asked members of the Insurance Commission to report immediately to the designated room for purposes of organization.

Courtesy: Robert W. Treischmann presented the following guests: Mouzon Mann, Gerald Hammet, Louis Earnest, E. F. Kaylor, W. Braska Savage, and Joe Purcell.

Pages: Alvin C. Murray presented the Pages who are working to help the Conference: Mrs. Joe Taylor, Mrs. Perrin Jones, Mrs. Glenn Dobb, Mrs. Bob Gaskill.

Philander Smith College: Bishop Galloway presented Dr. Ernest Dixon, President of the College, to the Conference.

Hospitals and Homes: N. Lee Cate presented Irl Bridenthal, who gave the report. The report was adopted. J. Edwin Keith, Superintendent of The Methodist Children's Home, addressed the Conference, expressing his appreciation for the support of the church in the Christmas offering. He noted the availability of a sixteen millimeter sound film this next year on the work of the Home, and the policy of the Board which now permits them to de-centralize the Home's facilities, building single units in various communities across the State. Lee Cate reported on the work of Chaplain Sturgess at the TB Sanatorium, and also noted the filmstrip, "Jericho Road" has been placed in the TRAFICO office for general use by the Conference.

Philander Smith College: Dr. Ernest Dixon, President, addressed the Conference, presenting a proposal for raising funds to support the college, mimeographed copies of which have been distributed to the Conference. Dr. Marshall T. Steel moved that we request the Bishop and Cabinet to appoint a committee to work with like committees or leaders of other conferences supporting Philander Smith to study their problems and ways in which we can help with the operating budget. This committee shall report with specific suggestions to the 1969 Conference. He then spoke to the motion. Carl Matthew asked for clarification. Question was called and the motion carried to seek the best way to help with the support of Philander Smith College through the appointment of a study committee. The Conference applauded Dr. Dixon.

Conference Relations: Kenneth L. Spore presented O. Wendell Hoover, who gave the report of the Board. It was adopted. M. E. Scott and Marion Miller were added to the Retired Roll, and C. E. Messer to the list of Retired Approved Supply Ministers. Marion Miller and M. E. Scott spoke to the Conference, and the Conference stood in appreciation. Bishop Galloway came forward and asked the families of the retired men to stand. James E. Major and Charles Ashcraft presented their retirement pens and parchments. Alfred Knox took their pictures. Kenneth Spore

concluded the report by noting that he is now the senior active member of the Little Rock Conference.

Courtesy: Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for the presence of the following guests: Rufus Sorrels, Harold Eggensperger, Earl Carter, and Chaplain VanLandingham.

Pensions: George Meyer, Robert E. Lee Bearden, Jr., and Sidney Good presented the report, with special emphasis on the proposed ten percent increase to the Conference Claimants Fund. A layman and Robert M. Van Hook and James Argue asked questions of the Committee. Dr. Clarence Hoyt, General Secretary of the General Board of Pensions, spoke to the report. Raymond Franks asked for clarification of an item. Ralph Mann asked for an amendment to No. 6 under Section C of the report. His amendment was accepted by the board chairman. J. Edward Dunlap reported to the Conference. John Miles and Alvin Murray also noted action of the North Arkansas Conference relative to the matter. Robert M. Van Hook II offered an amendment to No. 2 under Section C of the report. The amendment died when he failed to get a second to his motion. Question was called and the vote taken. The report of the Pensions Committee was adopted.

Lay Activities: S. H. Allman, Conference Lay Leader, called attention to the report of the Board as found in the Pre-Conference Report, page 21. He moved the adoption of the report. Bishop Galloway asked all laymen in attendance to stand. Joe R. Phillips, Jr. asked permission to submit a revised list of lay leaders for the Little Rock District office after Conference, since he and Bill Shepherd were in process of restructuring their district. It was granted and the report adopted.

Announcements: James E. Major announced the ministers' wives' luncheon, saying that it will be at 12:30 o'clock at St. Paul's church, with a nursery provided at the church and rides available from here, if needed. C. Ray Hozendorf gave instructions on how to reach St. Paul. Thomas J. Nation announced the Town and Country Dinner at Vantrease Church for this evening.

World Service and Finance: James T. Gooch, Chairman, presented Edwin B. Dodson, who presented the report of the Commission. He noted several changes from their report on page 40 of the Pre-Conference Report. G. Wayne Martin asked for guidelines on Item B-4. Robert M. Van Hook II asked two questions of the Chairman about the report. Joe R. Phillips, Jr. spoke to the matter of the Interdenominational Cooperation Fund and the State Council of Churches. James R. Scott asked about the procedures of boards needing extra funds to secure such from the board, since all surplus funds are to be put into a contingency fund. The report of the Commission was adopted.

Courtesy: John P. Miles presented the wives of the host churches of the Conference: Mrs. Alvin C. Murray, Mrs. Ralph Hale, Mrs. Jack Wilson, and Mrs. Noel Cross. Wives of the District Superintendents were asked to stand and be recognized: Mrs. J. Edward Dunlap, Mrs. Alf A. Eason, Mrs. Arthur Terry, Mrs. Otto W. Teague, and Mrs. C. Ray Hozendorf. Mrs. Joe R. Phillips Jr. was not on the Conference floor.

Board of Ministerial Training: George W. Martin, Chairman, presented Tom Abney, Registrar of the Board, who made the report. Question No. 21 was asked and the vote taken. It was approved. Arthur Terry noted that one name had been read, but omitted from the report. However, it was noted that the name, that of Elmer Beck, was on the list, just out of alphabetical order. Ralph C. Hemund was recommended for admission on trial through the Course of Study. Otto W. Teague, his District Superintendent, spoke in his behalf to the Conference. He was admitted. Louis L. Averitt, George E. Butchee III, John T. Dill, Dorothy M. Claiborne, David F. Prothro, Justin W. Tull, Jerry Keith Yarbrough were

admitted On Trial. They were presented to the Conference with the exception of Louis Averitt and Jerry Yarbrough. Bishop Galloway noted that arrangements had been made to ordain these later in the summer. He then proceeded to receive this class into the Conference on trial and welcomed each one personally. He posed with them for a picture and then presented the class to the Conference, who stood in appreciation.

Question 26: A. L. Chaffin noted that his name was omitted. G. Wayne Martin clarified the issue, assuring him that his name was in the proper order and that he was in good standing. The question was approved as reported by the Board.

Question 28: Robert Edward Allen, Leland Gary Goldman, George Larry Maxwell, James H. Sewell, Darrel Van Smith, Jack A. Wilson, Therral E. Wilson were admitted into the Conference in full connection. Bishop Galloway conducted the Service of Admission. He then greeted each one personally, presenting them to the Conference, who stood in appreciation. The class was instructed to retire for a picture to be taken.

Question 29: Those recommended for Deacon's orders are as follows: Louis L. Averitt, George E. Butchee III, Dorothy M. Claiborne, John T. Dill, Billy W. A. McLean, Bun Gantz, David F. Prothro, Justin W. Tull, Jess Willard Taylor, and Jerry K. Yarbrough. They were elected to Deacon's orders.

Question 31: Those recommended for Elder's Orders are: Robert E. Allen, Robert C. Ekberg, Leland Gary Goldman, Ralph A. Hemund, George L. Maxwell, James H. Sewell, Darrel Van Smith, James B. Swain, Jack A. Wilson, and Therral E. Wilson. They were elected to Elder's Orders. Bishop Galloway called for an announcement regarding the Ordination Service. Marshall Steel noted that those directly involved were having their picture taken, and suggested the announcement be delayed until their return. It was accepted.

Those eligible to administer the Sacraments were read by the Board. The report was adopted.

Announcement: George W. Martin announced the Ordination Service and requested help of the delegates for cooperation in the supply of Disciplines and/or Books of Worship for use in the Service.

Policy Report of Board of Ministerial Training: George W. Martin moved adoption of the report as recorded in the Pre-Conference Report.

Courtesy: Robert W. Trieschmann and John P. Miles presented the wives of all ministers. Bishop Galloway asked Mrs. Alfred Freeman, wife of the Conference Preacher, to stand.

W. S. C. S.: Mrs. Edgar Dixon gave the report of The Woman's Society of Christian Service. She presented Mrs. E. T. Davenport, the newly elected President of the Conference W.S.C.S. The Conference received the report with applause.

Announcements: Marshall T. Steel announced the Laymen's Luncheon at the Oaks Restaurant. Tommy Reynolds gave directions to the restaurant. Edward Hollenbeck and Fred R. Harrison called meetings of their Boards.

Adjournment: Bishop Galloway adjourned the Conference, asking Sidney Mann to dismiss the delegates with a prayer.

Wednesday, May 22

Evening

Ordination Service: Bishop Paul V. Galloway announced the hymn, "For the Beauty of the Earth". Following the singing of the hymn, he led the Conference in prayer. The choir of First United Methodist Church,

El Dorado, under direction of Melvin Ballard, sang "The Last Words of David" as the anthem. Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation to the choir, the host pastor, and all who contributed to making the Conference a pleasant experience. He called for the offering, requesting that we take up a "collection" to help defray the expenses of the Conference. As the collection was presented the Conference stood and sang the doxology. Bishop Galloway said that the congregation looked good to him, and he liked the way they sang. He expressed appreciation for the presence and preaching of Dr. Alfred Freeman, the Conference Preacher who brought the ordination message. His text was from Romans: "For I am not ashamed of the Gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone that believes." Bishop Galloway then conducted the ordination services. First, the deacons: Don Nolley and David M. Hankins, Jr., presented the Class, George E. Butchee III, Dorothy M. Claiborne, John T. Dill, Billy W. A. McLean, David F. Prothro, Justin W. Tull, and Jess Willard Taylor. Bishop Galloway requested the reading of the names of those recommended for Deacon's orders who are absent: Louis L. Averitt, Bun Gantz, and Jerry K. Yarbrough. He assured the Conference that these would be ordained by him later in the summer in the local churches from which they come. Dr. Freeman and Alvin Murray assisted Bishop Galloway in this service. Members of the Class were greeted personally by Bishop Galloway. James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference, delivered the parchments. Secondly, the Elders: Sam Jones and Louis Mulkey, presented the Class: Robert E. Allen, Robert C. Ekberg, Leland Gary Goldman, Ralph E. Hemund, George L. Maxwell, James H. Sewell, Darrell Van Smith, James B. Swain, Jack A. Wilson, and Therral E. Wilson. Dr. Freeman, members of The Cabinet, Dr. Murray, and other Elders chosen by the candidates themselves participated in the Service of Ordination. Louis M. Mulkey called the names. James E. Major, Conference Secretary, presented the parchments. Bishop Galloway spoke highly of the members of this new class of Elders, commending them for their commitment. He called for the class of deacons to come and stand at the chancel with the elders. Tom Abney, representing the Board of Ministerial Training, and Dr. Murray presented them with new copies of The Book of Worship. Bishop Galloway called for the wives and husband of the members of the Class to come to stand with their spouses. The Conference stood to sing two stanzas of the hymn, "The Church's One Foundation". Following the singing of the hymn, Bishop Galloway pronounced the benediction.

Thursday, May 23

Morning

Devotional: William E. Brown began the service by reading a scriptural introtit, then announced the hymn, "How Great Thou Art". Following the singing of the hymn, he read the Scripture Lesson, Romans 12, then asked the Conference to join together in the prayer for the church from the Hymnal. Dr. Brown closed the service with a prayer.

Families: Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for the presence in the Conference of so many families. He asked the Carl Matthew family stand to be recognized.

Minutes: Cagle Fair presented Charles O. Walthall, who noted that the minutes had been read and found in order. The report was accepted. He further moved that the Committee be given authority to read and approve the minutes after the adjournment of Conference. Permission was granted by the Conference.

Conference Meeting Place: George Ivey presented Gene Harwood, Chairman of the First United Methodist Church, who invited the Conference to Hot Springs in 1969. The invitation was accepted.

Announcement: Alvin Murray announced that sandwiches have been prepared in Fellowship Hall and are available before delegates leave.

Standing Rule: C. Ray Hozendorf presented the proposed change in Standing Rule No. 3. It was changed as presented.

Town and Country Commission: Thomas J. Nation gave the report of the Commission, noting the winners of the awards offered by the Commission: Small Town Church of the Year, Leola United Methodist Church, Pine Bluff District, George Bailey, Pastor; Open Country Church of the Year, Friendship United Methodist Church, Hope District, James B. Swain, Pastor. Certificates of Recognition were awarded: The New Era United Methodist Church and The Huttig United Methodist Church, Camden District; The Wilmot United Methodist Church and The Parkdale United Methodist Church, Monticello District. Pastors and members of these churches were asked to stand, and the Conference expressed appreciation by applause. Thomas J. Nation moved adoption of the report as it appears in the Pre-Conference Report, omitting Item XII. It was done. William O. Scroggin, Jr., Executive Director, spoke to the report.

Methodist Foundation: William O. Scroggin, Jr., Executive Director of the Foundation, gave the report and read nominations to the Board of Directors. The report was received and the Board Members elected.

Lydia Patterson Institute: Bishop Galloway presented Reverend Guyton from the Institute, who spoke to the Conference. The Conference responded with applause.

Camp Tanako: F. Gladwin Connell presented the report of the Board as it appears in the Pre-Conference Report. It was adopted.

Western Methodist Assembly: In the absence of Mr. Kaetzel, Bishop Galloway brought a report of the work at Mt. Sequoyah.

Board of Missions: Carlos Martin gave the report of the Board as found in the Pre-Conference Report, with some additions made since February. The report was adopted.

Evangelism: Harold K. Davis made a supplemental report of the Board, expressing appreciation for the leadership of Ralph Hale.

Arkansas Release Guidance Foundation: Woodrow W. Smith presented a Resolution to the Conference expressing appreciation for the work of this agency and seeking the endorsement of this work by the Conference. It was done.

Education: Fred R. Harrison gave the supplemental report of the Board of Education, Report Number 3. It was accepted.

Courtesy: Robert W. Treischmann presented Reverend and Mrs. Charles Richards to the Conference.

Arkansas State Council of Churches: Edward Matthews gave a report of the work of the Council.

Admonition: Bishop Galloway encouraged the ministers to blend with one another's leadership, especially in worship, adding that it was neither courteous nor worshipful for one to read faster than the leader.

Statistician: Gerald K. Fincher reported that the church has shown an increase in membership of 336. Average attendance has increased by 133. The Church School membership dropped by 1626, and average attendance decreased by 1306. The report was adopted with the understanding that these figures be placed in the Journal.

Treasurer: Grafton Thomas gave the report of the Treasurer, noting that the Conference is in sound financial condition. He noted that they

would receive money through May 31st, and asked permission to record the official figures in the Journal. It was accepted.

Committee on Resolutions: Thurston Masters presented Don Nolley, who read this report. It was adopted by the Conference.

Appreciation: Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation to James E. Major, Conference Secretary, and his Staff for their efficient work.

Moving Day: Ralph Sewell moved that moving day be June 5. Bishop Galloway ruled him out of order, stating that this motion is out of keeping with the procedure of The Methodist Church. He suggested Wednesday, May 29 as the moving day. Arthur Terry so moved, seconded by Edward Dunlap. It was done.

Nominations: Joe R. Phillips, Jr. made some additional Cabinet nominations. They were elected.

Announcement: Joe R. Phillips, Jr. announced that the new World Service and Finance Commission would meet in Room 202 immediately after adjournment for purposes of organization.

Reading of the Appointments: Bishop Galloway, after brief remarks concerning them, read the Appointments, with Joe R. Phillips, Jr. standing at his side.



DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To Bishop Paul V. Galloway and members of the One Hundred Fifteenth session of The Little Rock Annual Conference:

It is not the desire of the Cabinet to belabor this Conference with a long recitation of figures and statistics. The reports of the Conference Treasurer and the Conference Statistician will give you a detailed picture of our year's work in this respect. We do wish to take a brief look at certain areas of concern as they relate to the current Conference Year and the ensuing Conference Year.

1. We believe that the first year's operation of the Interboard Council has shown us the potential of this kind of cooperative effort. We commend the work of this agency of the Conference. We believe that the Interboard Council can be made even more effective should the Executive Secretary of that agency be named to serve as Conference Missionary Secretary, Executive Secretary of the Board of Evangelism and of the Conference Board of Education and of the other Conference Boards as needs may indicate. We recommend this course to the Conference.

2. We call your special attention to the Hendrix Capital Funds Campaign. It is imperative that each church meet its responsibility in full if we are to meet our goal. Response and support have been excellent. We urge that there be no relaxing of effort in this final year of our campaign.

3. We commend the Conference Board of Pensions and the Special Committee of Pension Studies for their diligent and painstaking work. We recommend their report to you and solicit your careful hearing of their presentation. In the further study of this matter, we recommend that a larger number of laymen knowledgeable in this field be included.

4. In the report of the Executive Secretary of the Interboard Council you will receive a report initiated by the Interboard Council of the North Arkansas Conference recommending that the agencies of the North Arkansas Conference and the Little Rock Conference be headquartered in a common location. We report to you our concurrence in this recommendation.

5. There are other causes outside the proprietary concern of this Conference which we consider deserving of your prayerful support. These are Philander Smith College and Aldersgate Methodist Camp. When these concerns are set before you consider them with open minds and open hearts, joining with the other supporting Conferences of the Jurisdiction and the General Boards of The Church.

6. We agree that the Resolution merging the Southwest Conference with its geographical counterparts should be passed and that the merger be completed by 1970.

We express our special appreciation for, and gratitude to, the dedicated pastors and laymen who, through their mission and loyalty, cause Little Rock Conference Methodism to be a creative and redeeming force in the lives of people here at home and around the world.

Our report from the District Superintendents would be incomplete without an acknowledgement of the splendid and inspiring leadership given us by Bishop Paul V. Galloway. His genuine concern for the people under his pastoral care - ministers and laymen; his patient understanding for all with whom he works; and his persevering spirit, in the face of the difficult circumstances, continually encourage us all.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE

Bishop and Mrs. Galloway have brought a magnificent Christian spirit to every phase of our work. We say to each of them, "We appreciate you, and are grateful that you are in our midst. We look forward to a continuation of this happy and fruitful fellowship."

**REPORT OF THE ARKANSAS/LOUISIANA METHODIST
COMMISSION****Recommendations**

The Arkansas/Louisiana Methodist Commission makes the following recommendations to the 1968 annual conference:

1. That the dates for the 1969 Circulation Campaign be January 5-12.

2. That the quotas for each local church be set as one subscriber for every seven members reported by that church to the 1968 annual conference.

3. That the subscription price be \$2.50 per year. Churches can become eligible for a \$2.00 subscription price when they send in a list of subscribers equal to one for every three members reported to the 1968 annual conference.

4. That we again challenge district superintendents and district directors to find one additional church that will include the paper in their budget and send it to every family on their mailing list. That each district be asked to face its quota for 1969 as one of its major emphases during the first year of the new quadrennium.

5. That the commission on World Service and Finance of the Louisiana, Little Rock and North Arkansas annual conferences be asked to continue their annual apportionment of \$4,600 each for the support of the papers.

6. That the editor and either the chairman or secretary of the commission be authorized to sign notes at the Union National Bank, Little Rock, for money which might need to be borrowed for current operations.

7. That the executive committee be empowered to act for the commission in matters that require attention between meetings of the commission.

8. That we express appreciation to Bishop Paul V. Galloway and Bishop Aubrey G. Walton for the undergirding support which they give the commission and the papers.

9. That we express appreciation to the district superintendents, the district directors, the pastors and the laymen who worked so diligently to promote the publications.

10. We express gratitude to the hundreds of people who channel the news to us and furnish us with their reactions concerning the directions being followed by the papers and their staff.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

During the year 1967-1968 the Board of Christian Social Concerns . . .

1. Promoted attendance at the Annual Regional Coaching Conference at Mt. Sequoyah by providing scholarships for delegates (not only for members of the board but also for leaders on both the district and local level).

2. Conducted a leadership training program in each of the six districts.

3. Added the new filmstrip, **ALCOHOL: A DILEMMA FOR YOUTH**, to the TRAFICO film library.

4. Sent David M. Hankins, Louis Mulkey, and Woodrow Smith to the Seminar on Human Rights sponsored by the General Board of Christian Social Concerns at the United Nations.

5. Formally requested the General Conference to maintain the Methodist position on total abstinence as part of our church policy.

6. Approved the **Capital Funds Campaign for Philander Smith** as outlined in the amended proposal.

7. Undergirded "Project Misdemeanant" by helping Mrs. Glenn Taylor of Arkadelphia visit the work in Denver, Colorado.

We make the following recommendations for the 1968-1969 year:

1. We urge every local church to follow the program of the Church as it is outlined in **The Methodist Story** from month to month. We ask that the pastor give special attention to the program planning issue of the publication and make every provision in the church's calendar for the observance of Special Days of Christian Social Concerns. We request that special attention be given to the observance of **World Order Sunday, Commitment Day, and Race Relations Sunday**.

2. We recognize the value of the **Methodist Social Creed** and encourage its wide distribution across the conference.

3. We express our appreciation to those within the church and especially the State Council of Churches for their Development of a voluntary correctional service agency including the New Life House for released prisoners, and pledge to the **Arkansas Release Guidance Foundation** our complete support in the amount of \$500.00.

4. In cooperation with the National Conference of the Methodist Youth Fellowship and the Little Rock Conference Board of Education, we endorse the **United Methodist Legislative Affairs Project** for youth and agree to support the training of a Project Coordinator from the LR Conference MYF in the amount of \$250.00.

5. We commend the churches and communities which have sponsored **Project Misdemeanant** and have used the project to strengthen their probation and rehabilitative services. We would hope that this project might be extended to other areas across the state.

6. Recognizing the fact the General Conference has made significant changes in both the program and structure of the church, we commend the Jurisdictional office for setting up a special leadership school at Mt. Sequoyah July 8-13 and 14-19. This conference is in addition to and should not interfere with the 1968 Sequoyah Christian Social Concerns Briefing Conference July 5-7. It will be the policy of the board to offer full scholarships to all members of the Conference Board, including District Directors, and to any local commission chairmen who will attend either or both of these conferences.

7. We pledge our support to the cabinet and the Inter-board Council in conducting district workshops to train our people in the structure program of the United Methodist Church as set-up by the General Conference.

8. We recognize the problem of the local pastor in locating materials in the area of Social Concerns and urge him to utilize the following sources:

COMMISSION ON CHRISTIAN VOCATIONS

One of the most frequently misunderstood and misused words in the English language is the word "Vocation". The **New World Dictionary** gives three possible meanings for this word; 1. A call, summons, or impulsion to perform a certain function or enter a certain career, especially a religious one; 2. The function or career toward which one believes himself to be called; 3. Any trade, profession, or occupation.

The misuse and misunderstanding of this word are borne out further in conversation with people. Ask your friend or fellow Church member, "What is your vocation?" You will probably be told what the person does to earn a living. The emphasis will be upon doing and not upon being.

The confusion arises because most people have equated vocation with daily occupations or kinds of work. It is seen in terms of salary, hours of work, vacation and pension benefits. For all too many persons, vocation means job.

Thus, we in the Church need to give serious consideration to the Doctrine of Christian Vocations. The Bible is the great sourcebook for a study of vocation. It informs us that "God does not desire something from us—he desires us, ourselves; not our day's work but our personalities, our wills and our hearts." God summons us to serve Him and therefore to serve His world. This service means going out of oneself, being free from anxiety about oneself, being free for others.

This concept must be conveyed to our people, especially our youth. They are asking, "How do I decide what work I'm supposed to do?" This is still a legitimate question since it is clearly evident that some people are better equipped for some jobs than others. One may begin to answer this question in this way: granted my abilities, what work will afford me the greatest opportunity for meeting my neighbors in need? A second question often asked by youth is, "May I answer God's call in any job?" To be sure, all work, all means of fulfilling the Christian Vocations, must be tested by the demand for love and justice. It may be that one will renounce the hidden things of dishonesty by rejecting some jobs altogether. Generally speaking, however, all love-encounter with the neighbor is considered in the Protestant tradition as of equal value and potential holiness as a means of fulfilling the Christian calling.

With this in mind, we, your Commission on Christian Vocations, recommend the following course of action for the ensuing year:

1. We offer our continued support of the Wesley Foundation Program Committees as they present the cause of Christian Vocations on their campuses.

2. We encourage our Camp Directors at Tanako to use every possible opportunity to present the cause of Christian Vocations to our youth as a part of their prepared programs.

3. We recommend to the Conference Youth Council that they carefully consider having a Mid-winter Seminar on "The Church—its validity and importance in today's society." We pledge our full support.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE

4. We would encourage local churches to use an Elective Unit relating to Christian Vocations as MYF programs, Church School studies, or other appropriate times. Some such units are: "You and Your Life Work," "A Christian Choice For Youth," and "When You Leave Home."

5. We would emphasize the role of the local pastor in seeking out and challenging his youth to the vital need of Christian Vocations—especially Church-related vocations.

6. We urge the wise and wide use of the booklet, "Methodist Church Related Occupations and Short Term Projects, 1968". A copy of which has been furnished each pastor by the Commission.

7. We recommend that in the month of November, each pastor preach on the "Call To The Ministry" in connection with the November Special Offering for Ministerial Training.

8. We recommend that the District Secretaries of Missionary Education of the WSCS, the District Secretaries of Christian Vocations, and the District Directors of Youth Work, seek ways of working together for the cause of presenting the challenge of God's call to youth in Full-time Christian Service.

9. We urge youth to take advantage of the many loans that the Conference WSCS has made available through its fine program.

10. We urge the District Superintendents to make a concerted effort to organize a Local Church Committee on Christian Vocations and we urge the Pastors to see that it is an active committee.

11. We recommend a High School Guidance Counselor Consultation be held in the Greater Little Rock Area in cooperation with the North Arkansas Conference Commission on Christian Vocations.

1967-68 REPORT

1. We were keenly disappointed that the proposed "Seminar on Church-Related Vocations" could not be held. We think the idea is a sound one and hope that it can become a reality sometime in the future.

2. The Commission has cooperated and financially supported the Wesley Foundation Program Committees as they have attempted to present the cause of Christian Vocations to the College Community within their individual framework.

3. The Commission has made available two copies of the "Job Data Book" listing all occupations in the Methodist Church. This book will be updated bi-monthly. One copy will be in the Interboard Office and a second copy at Camp Tanako.

4. We have supplied each Pastor and Director of Christian Education with a copy of the "Methodist Church Related Occupations and Short Term Projects, 1967."

5. We have placed two filmstrips on Christian Vocations in the Conference Office. They are: "First Things First" and "Careers That Matter". They have been found very useful.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

Conference Program

While the Church continues its effort to bring about **A New Day In Christian Education** with new literature, new designs and new settings, your Conference Board of Education continues its effort to keep abreast of the latest developments in this field.

The new adult literature, **Foundation Studies in Christian Faith**, was introduced in September 1967. Thorough preparation was made on conference, district, sub-district and local church levels. Approximately twenty persons attended the five day Adult Laboratory Enterprise at Camp Tanako last summer, studying the first unit, "Man's Search For A Meaningful Faith." These persons helped throughout the Conference in district workshops, Christian Workers Schools, and local church consultations. A second Adult Laboratory Enterprise will be held at Camp Tanako July 1-5, 1968.

While many adult classes prefer to continue the time-honored International Lesson Series, hundreds of classes are finding the new adult literature interesting, exciting and challenging. Perhaps more serious study is going on in adult classes, with more persons involved, than ever before in the history of our Conference.

We wish to commend Colonel Claude E. Haswell, Conference Director of Adult Work, for his fine leadership; and especially for the excellent Lesson Plan which appears weekly in **The Arkansas Methodist**, giving help to teachers and pupils throughout Arkansas and Louisiana.

The new curriculum for youth will be available for all church school classes in September. New settings are being planned for Junior High (7th and 8th Grades) Middle High (9th and 10th grades) and Senior High (11th and 12th grades). It is recommended that all churches take advantage of the various settings being prepared. The five settings are: (1) Weekly Classes; (2) School of Religion; (3) Week-end Setting; (4) Informal Group Settings and (5) Outdoor Setting. A team from our Conference will attend a National Orientation on the New Youth Materials in Nashville May 13-16. This team will then provide leadership for a Conference-wide Orientation to be held at Camp Tanako June 14-15. Local churches are urged to have representatives at this Orientation. A second training opportunity related to the New Youth Materials will be the Annual Youth Assembly at Tanako June 24-28. Thirdly, there will be a laboratory enterprises for Junior High and Senior High youth workers at Tanako July 1-5. Urge your youth workers to take advantage of as many of these opportunities as possible.

The Board initiated a Young Adult Project last fall. The emphasis of the project is given to the area of leadership. A problem confronting the majority of the churches in our Conference is what many have called "the generation gap." This gap is evident verbally in expressed feelings and leadership responsibilities. In most of our churches this gap

causes misunderstanding among young adults and older adults. In order to alleviate this misunderstanding, the Conference leadership team on young adult work recommends the following for the churches in the conference year 1968-1969:

"Your Conference team on young adult work recommends the following for the churches in our Conference in the church year 1968-69: (a) 80% of conference churches have 10% of young adults accept one new leadership responsibility such as official board, teaching, commission membership, etc. (b) 40% of conference churches initiate one additional activity for young adults, such as drama, music, related community service agency projects, home study groups, prayer groups, classes in churchmanship, etc. (c) 40% of conference churches achieve a 10% increase in the active involvement of presently enrolled young adults, and a 10% increase in the number enrolled. (d) 50% of conference churches have young adult representation at the Arkansas Area Family Life Conference in April. (e) 10% of conference churches have young adult representation at the Young Adult Week-end at Camp Tanako in June."

We encourage our local churches to have representatives at the Annual Young Adult Conference June 21-23 at Camp Tanako. The theme for this year is "Moral Values In A Changing World." Dr. Jay Allen, S.M.U. professor, will be the resource person.

Under the leadership of our Conference Director of Children's Work, Mrs. John L. Tucker, continued emphasis is being given to a full on-going program to provide the best possible Christian nurture for children. Last year the special emphasis in our Conference was **Church Libraries**. This year the special emphasis has been on **Music in Christian Education**. To this end a workshop was held in each district in connection with the Vacation Church School Institutes, with Miss Evelyn Andre, the chief resource person. It is hoped that additional choirs for children will be organized; and that Musical Festivals will be held in each district, if practical. Teaching the children to sing the great hymns of the Church with meaning and understanding will not only be helpful to their Christian development, but will eventually give us trained, dedicated choir members for the Church of tomorrow. The special emphasis for next year will be **Churches of Small Membership**. Miss Jeannie Youngblood, Director of Services to Churches of Small Membership, will assist in our Conference Program.

We rejoice in the good work being done in the field of Family Life under the direction of Mr. and Mrs. Winston Faulkner. The first Arkansas Area Family Life Conference was held in Little Rock April 5-6. There were addresses by nationally known speakers, fifteen workshops on family interests and concerns, a family play, special music, a book display room and many other interesting and helpful features. We urge all local churches to organize a Family Life Committee and to plan a well-rounded program for families, using the many excellent resources available today.

Recognizing that Education and Evangelism must work hand in hand, our Conference Board of Education is working closely with our Conference Board of Evangelism. As a joint project between the two boards, district workshops were held this year, giving assistance to ministers for their Church Membership Classes for Children, Youth and Adults. The Boards will also work together reactivating members, winning persons to Christ and guiding them in the full meaning of the Christian Life.

Our Conference Board of Education desires to continue to work with all Conference Boards and Agencies to bring about a well-rounded, co-ordinated Conference Program to the end that we all may achieve the **Objective of the Church**: "That all persons be aware of and grow in their understanding of God, especially of His redeeming love as revealed

in Jesus Christ, and that they respond in faith and love — to the end that they may know who they are and what their human situation means, increasingly identify themselves as sons of God and members of the Christian community, live in the spirit of God in every relationship, fulfill their common discipleship in the world, and abide in the Christian hope." (See **Manuals:** Official Board, Evangelism, Missions, Education, Christian Social Concerns and Stewardship and Finance.)

To this end we will be well represented at the Jurisdictional Leadership School at Mt. Sequoyah, July 8-13 and 14-19, when coaching conferences will be held on the major phases of the work of the church. We will also share in the follow-up program in district workshops, Christian Workers Schools, and local church consultations so that all churches in the Little Rock Conference may understand the organization of the United Methodist Church; and be skilled in carrying out its program.

We have checked Miss Carolyn Hardin's application for certification and find that she has met all the requirements. All recommendations are excellent. We suggest that the Board of Education certify her as a Director of Christian Education.

BOARD OF EDUCATION**Report No. 3****Wesley Foundation**

We recommend that the following changes, adopted by the Inter-Conference Commission on College and University Religious Life, be made in the financial policy of our Wesley Foundation:

1. The Base Allotment of (a) Student Centers serving situations where the primary institution has no resident student body will receive a Base Allotment of \$10,500 and will not share in additional distribution based on student enrollment. (b) Student Centers serving institutions with resident student bodies and having an enrollment in the institution of less than 500 students shall receive a base allotment of \$11,500. (c) Student Centers serving institutions with resident student bodies and having an enrollment in the institution of more than 5,000 students, shall receive a base allotment of \$12,500.

2. Request the Little Rock Conference for \$45,000 to be apportioned to the districts on the World Service decimal. To further request the Little Rock Conference to appropriate from Conference Benevolences \$10,000 for operation and to further request the Little Rock Conference to appropriate \$2,500 a year for two years to establish a reserve fund.

3. We recommend that an additional appropriation be given each Student Center serving a situation where the primary institution served has a resident student body an amount equal to \$1.30 for each student over 2,000 enrolled.

4. That a salary schedule for directors of Wesley Foundation be set by the Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundation based on the income and the need.

5. We reaffirm the action of the 1967 Annual Conference which set the "Ground Rules" for Wesley Foundation Campus Ministry.

We move that the Inter-Conference Committee on College and University Religious Life continue its work, and that it make a thorough study of the program of the Wesley Foundation in Arkansas and endeavor to find ways to strengthen this program wherever possible and report to the Annual Conference next year.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

For the 1968-69 Conference year we suggest that the following program be implemented in each local church.

1. Our primary emphasis this year will be a **Mission to Members**. This will be an organized effort to make a visit to every Methodist family within the bounds of our conference to talk with them about regular attendance at worship. Teams of two will schedule the visit at a time when all members of the family can be present. A flip-chart entitled "Mission to Members" which will be available at a nominal cost to the churches will be provided by the Little Rock Conference Board of Evangelism. It is the feeling of our Board that this should be done in the early fall.

2. One of the greatest things that has happened in evangelism in recent months is the **Lay Witness Mission**. This is not a program or a plan, rather it is an experience in renewal and witnessing. Our age is experiencing an awakening within the church. It is not that which is outlined and forced upon the Christian Church, but a movement that grows as God moves through men. This is a lay-centered awakening which allows the Holy Spirit to freely spread within the lives of His people. The Lay Witness Mission demonstrates:

- A. the practical reality of prayer
- B. the power of group experience
- C. the effectiveness of personal witness
- D. the way in which God uses spiritually sensitive laymen

3. The Board of Evangelism will send two suitable persons to the Coaching Conference at Mt. Sequoyah in July to receive certification in the Council of Ministries and its various areas of interest (commissions) in the field of Evangelism. These men will be responsible for giving leadership in **Christian Worker's Training Schools** in every district during the calendar years, 1968-1969. We ask each church to see that every layman with responsibility in evangelism participate in this training in the work of the new United Methodist Church.

4. Recognizing the need to provide adequate opportunities for all Christians to express their faith through personal witness, we recommend that the plan for lay-visitation evangelism (Fire or Failure) which was begun in our conference last year be continued in every local church.

5. Also, we feel that every pastor in the conference should seek to make his ministry evangelistic by precept and example and to cultivate a deeper **challenge to an evangelistic witness** within the membership, especially those in places of leadership in the Church School (see Evangelism Packet 8408 B which may be obtained from the General Board of Education in Nashville, Tennessee.)

6. Finally, we call your attention to the following opportunities to help leaders in evangelism have a comprehensive understanding of their total responsibilities and also to provide inspiration and challenge in developing a program that will meet the needs of members and prospective members of the church.

DBP — Death Benefit Program

The new Average Salary for the Little Rock Conference has been obtained from the General Board of Pensions office, which handles the Death Benefit Program. This Salary is \$6,144.00. The Annual Contribution (1968-69) is 2% of this Salary or \$122.88. The Church or Agency will pay 60% of this amount or \$73.73; the Ministers and Lay Employees will each pay 40% or \$49.15. The total amount (\$122.88) will be due June 1, 1968 for the ensuing year.

The Board of Pensions will continue to pay the DBP Contribution for all the Little Rock Conference Retired Men who are eligible.

A new schedule for DBP follows.

Hospitalization

Several changes have been made in the Hospitalization program. All changes will become completely effective on the anniversary date of the contract, which will be June 8, 1968.

1. In-Hospital Medical Service will be increased from \$3.00 to \$5.00 per day.

2. For Retired Men and Widows only: Coverage will be provided of \$5.00 per call to the doctor's office, **after the first two calls**. This will be coordinated with Medicare. Thus we would more quickly pay the \$50 deductible, and then would pay the 20% Medicare does not pay.

The Rates remain the same as they are now for this group.

The clause "co-ordinated benefits" will continue to be in use for all persons under the hospital coverage.

The Board of Pensions will continue to pay one-half of the hospital premiums for the Retired Men and the Widows, and they will also pay \$3.00 per person per month for all Claimants and their wives (for Medicare). The Insurance Committee will pay the other \$1.00 per month per person for all claimants and their wives for Medicare cost.

Arrangements have also been made for coverage for Young People in a family contract from 19-23 years of age, while in full time attendance at an accredited school or college, and un-married.

Note: There are Extended Maternity Benefits for the Insured, and Benefits which can be obtained for the Dependents, if it is done within 30 days of termination in the Conference. Notify Mrs. Averitt.

Transfers

Ministers who are to be transferred to the North Arkansas Conference should notify Mrs. Averitt in order to be continuously covered by DBP and Hospital Insurance while being transferred.

Special arrangements have been made by the North Arkansas Conference Insurance Committee for the Little Rock Conference Ministers to be covered without any of the waiting periods which will be imposed on later transferees. This applies only to transfers at Annual Conference time.

Do Not Send Them To The Company!

Co-ordinated Benefits: This clause has been added this Conference year — most major insurance companies have done so.

This means, if you have another **hospital group** policy, the primary carrier pays first, and the other company pays (as far as its liability) on the balance.

Medicare is a group. It is the primary carrier, if you have its coverage. The amount of their payment must be known before our Conference Group can make payment.

This clause applies to both Hospital and Doctor bills. One of the questions asked in Part I (which the Claimant fills out) is whether he (or she) has another **group** policy. **Be sure** to answer this and all other questions.

An individual policy is **not** involved in the co-ordinated clause.

Service: Speedier service can be obtained in processing your claim, if you will:

1. Request claim forms as soon as the need arises.
2. Fill out Part I, answering **all** questions, and sign the form.
3. Give both Hospital and Doctor Mrs. Averitt's address and instructions.
4. Prepare a **set of forms** for Medicare or any other group company, and the Conference group company.
5. **Medicare** claimants — ask Hospital for an estimate of Medicare's payment on the hospital bill, and include it with the forms you send to Mrs. Averitt.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON INTER-BOARD STRUCTURE

It has been apparent to many for a long time that some plan should be devised to correlate the Annual Conference program and to provide staff representation for all the Boards and Agencies who do programming on the Conference level. It is obvious that full time staff representatives could not be provided for each Board and Agency desiring such. However, there is no reason why adequate promotional facilities and staff cannot be made available to the Boards and Agencies needing such.

It is the conviction of this committee that the solution lies in a flexible Conference Administrative Staff serving the needs of the Conference as a whole. While each Staff member would have a primary relationship to certain Boards and Agencies, it is understood that the responsibilities of each member of the Staff may be adjusted as needed at the initiative and under the direction of the Bishop and the Executive Committee of the Council.

It is imperative that the Conference Boards and Agencies maintain their autonomy and responsibility for establishing policies and initiating programs. It is also imperative that the Boards and Agencies exercise the greatest degree of co-operation with the Conference Council in the development of a co-ordinated Conference program. It is understood that the Conference Council Staff shall be the servant of the Conference Boards and Agencies and shall in no way infringe upon the authority of these Boards and Agencies.

The Committee on Inter-Board Structure makes the following recommendations:

1. That the Little Rock Annual Conference continue a Conference Council.
2. That its membership be composed as follows:
 - a. The Bishop and the Cabinet
 - b. The Chairman or Head of the following:
 - 1) **Boards**—Education, Evangelism, Hospitals and Homes, Lay Activities, Ministerial Training and Qualifications, Missions, Pensions, Social Concerns

- 2) **Commissions**—Christian Vocations, Minimum Salary, Town & Country, TRAFCO
- 3) **Agencies**—Editor of the Arkansas Methodist, President of Hendrix College, President of the Little Rock Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, President of The Methodist Foundation, Secretary of the Little Rock Annual Conference, Superintendent of the Methodist Children's Home. The head of any agency who is not a member of the Conference will serve as an ex-officio member without vote.
- c. At Large — A layman from each district to be appointed by the Bishop and the Cabinet.
- d. Conference Council Staff — The Conference Council Staff shall be members of the Council without vote
- e. Chairman of the World Service Commission — The Chairman of World Service shall sit with the Council in an advisory capacity.
3. The Council shall have the following Officers:
 - a. The Bishop shall be its Chairman
 - b. A Vice Chairman who shall be Chairman of the Executive Committee
 - c. A Secretary
 - d. The Area Treasurer will serve as Interboard Council Treasurer.
4. The Council shall have an Executive Committee as follows:
 - a. The Bishop
 - b. Vice Chairman of the Council who shall be its Chairman
 - c. Other elective officers of the Council
 - d. Two members of the Cabinet chosen by the Cabinet
 - e. Five members elected by the Council
 - f. The Executive Secretary shall be a member without vote.
5. The Council shall have the following Staff:
 - a. An Executive Secretary
 - b. An Associate Secretary
 - c. The Area Director of Town & Country Work and The Methodist Foundation
6. Salaries and Expense Funds of Staff — The salaries and expenses of the Interboard Council Staff shall be recommended annually by the Review and Budget Committee.
7. The Tenure of the Conference Staff personnel shall not exceed eight consecutive years
8. The Executive Committee shall serve as a Steering Committee for the program of the Council. It shall meet as soon after the session of the Annual Conference as practical, but not later than September 15, and as often as needed to counsel with the Staff and give creative leadership to the program of the Council. It may meet on call of the Bishop, the Executive Secretary, or the Chairman of the Executive Committee.
9. The Executive Committee shall meet as soon after the session of the Annual Conference as practical, but not later than September 15, and on call of the Executive Secretary, the Bishop, or the Chairman of the Executive Committee.
10. The Council shall review all plans, programs and proposed legislation; and shall make recommendations to the Annual Conference relevant to the formulation of a co-ordinated, total program for the Annual Conference. The Council may initiate or propose any phase of the Conference program with the consent and approval of the Board or Agency involved.

11. The Program adopted by the Annual Conference shall be administered by the Board Chairmen and the District Superintendents, their District Staffs, working in conjunction with the Conference Administrative Staff, the Conference Secretary of Evangelism, the Conference Missionary Secretary, the Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education, and the Conference Lay Leader.
12. The Conference Council or its Executive Committee shall establish and distribute a Conference Calendar. This shall be done immediately upon the closing session of the Annual Conference or as soon thereafter as possible.
13. Any Program that emerges from or through any Board or Agency during the year that has not been adopted by the Annual Conference must be approved by the Executive Committee of the Council.
14. The Executive Secretary shall be responsible to the Bishop and to the Executive Committee for the co-ordination of the work of the Staff in carrying out the programs and policies of the various Boards and Agencies.
15. In the discharge of his responsibilities within the Little Rock Conference the Area Director of Town & Country Work shall be related to the Conference Council and the Executive Secretary in the same way as the Associate Secretary.
16. The Staff shall work closely with the Area Treasurer, the Editor of the Arkansas Methodist, Hendrix College, The Methodist Children's Home.
17. The responsibilities of the Council Staff may be reviewed and altered from time to time as the program of the Conference warrants.
18. The Conference Council shall co-operate with the Area Council.
19. We request the Commission on World Service and Finance to grant \$40,850.00 for the work of the Interboard Council for 1968-69.
20. We recommend that the Bishop and Cabinet nominate a Committee annually to the Annual Conference, to be known as the Review and Budget Committee on Interboard Council. Suggestions from the Conference shall be directed to this committee. We recommend that this committee be nominated at the time other nominations are made to the Annual Conference.
21. The Job Analyses for the Executive Secretary and the Associate Secretary appear on page 87, 1867 Journal of the Little Rock Conference.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

The Board of Lay Activities of the South Central Jurisdiction conducted a workshop at Mt. Sequoyah July 1-4, 1967 and the Little Rock Conference was represented by one District Lay Leader and the Conference Lay Leader. Valuable information was gained and brought back to the laymen at their respective District Conference which was held in each District, with the exception of one District which failed to provide the Laymen a District Conference this year.

It was necessary for us to appoint three new District Lay Leaders during the year due to the former District Lay Leaders moving from the district and other circumstances beyond control. Details of this outstanding event will be discussed at the District Meetings.

The committee for our annual Laymen's Assembly at Camp Tanako, is already working and we are indeed happy to announce that Dr. Harry Denman will be with us again this year. This meeting, as usual, was well attended last year and we are looking forward to another wonderful experience this year.

Several Methodist Men's groups have been organized during the year. We trust that Lay Leaders throughout the Conference will use these groups to assist in generating interest in the Policy of The United Methodist Church. We trust it will be accepted enthusiastically.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS

Your Committee on Memoirs has two primary functions. First, this Committee selects the preacher to bring the Commemoration Message at Annual Conference, and presents this service to the Annual Conference.

We try to select as the preacher, men of the Conference who know the membership of the Conference, and are able to represent the Methodist Ministry.

We also try to select men of preaching ability in order to make this service an outstanding part of our Annual Conference session. In a real sense this is the "key note" service of the Annual Conference. Our preacher for the 1968 session is Reverend M. E. Scott.

Our second task is to have written a Memoir for every deceased minister, minister's wife, and widow of a preacher. These Memoirs are printed in the Conference Journal.

The Conference Standing Rules state what is to be included in a Memoir: "Date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, name of children, charges served and place of burial." Follow these instructions and save having a Memoir returned for correction. Three copies of all Memoirs are to be furnished.

Memoirs should be written not later than sixty days after death occurs. Send Memoir to Reverend Harold Davis, First Methodist Church, Monticello, Arkansas.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY**Organization**

The Commission on Minimum Salary shall be composed of one minister and one layman from each District of the Annual Conference. They shall be nominated by the Cabinet and elected by the Annual Conference, quadrennially. Vacancies shall be filled by the same procedure. The Bishop is requested to appoint one representative from his Cabinet, annually. The Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission shall be an ex-officio member of the Commission and administrative officer.

The Commission shall elect quadrennially a chairman, vice chairman, and secretary who, together with the Secretary of the Town and Country Commission and the Cabinet representative, shall compose the executive committee. Vacancies in offices shall be filled by the Commission from its elective membership.

The Commission shall meet as often as is required to do its work, and may consign certain responsibilities to the executive committee.

Purpose

The purpose of the Minimum Salary Program is to:

1. Assist charges to pay their pastor the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference.
2. Challenge and enable charges to become self-sustaining. This is not to be thought of, or used, as a continuing mission support.

Finances

Funds for the purpose of the Commission shall be raised by an apportionment annually, to all churches of the Annual Conference of an amount equal to 3% of the base salary paid the pastor.

The Program

1. Charges are eligible to receive Minimum Salary Assistance whose combined pastoral support (base salary, travel, and utilities) is less than the minimum set by the Annual Conference, provided that:
 - (a) The pastor preaches a minimum of three times per Sunday; is resident full time or a Student Approved Supply.
 - (b) Each church conducts an Every Member Visitation annually acceptable to the Town and Country Commission, the District Superintendent, and the Commission on Minimum Salary.
 - (c) The charge agrees to increase ministerial support annually, moving toward assuming full support.
 - (d) Each church pays all prorated claims and percentages to the Conference and District Treasurers annually.
2. Application for assistance shall be made annually through the District Superintendent on a form provided by the Commission.
3. The Minimum Salary for this year shall be:

(a) Resident, full time	\$4500.00
(b) Student Approved Supply, married	4000.00
(c) Student Approved Supply, single	3000.00

Provided that:
 - (d) For each dependent child under 18, or for each child in college under 24, a pastor on Minimum Salary shall receive an additional \$100.00 per year.
 - (e) On Minimum Salary charges of more than three churches, a pastor shall receive an additional \$100.00 for each church above three that pays \$300.00 or more total pastoral support.
 - (f) The pastor's part of Death Benefit and Hospital Insurance premium in the Conference Group Insurance Program shall be paid by the Minimum Salary Commission for Student Ap-

proved Supply Pastors serving charges receiving Minimum Salary Assistance.

Provided further that:

- (g) These funds, together with educational fund, pension, Conference and District Boards of Mission aid, shall be exempt in computing Minimum Salary.
- (h) The charge shall agree to move toward absorbing child dependency and extra church exemption as soon as possible after reaching self support.
4. The maximum amount of assistance a charge may receive from the Minimum Salary Commission, exclusive of child dependency and extra church bonus, shall be \$900.00 per year.
5. In the event of insufficient funds to meet all claims, each charge shall share proportionately from the funds available.
6. The report of this Commission in the Conference Journal each year shall include a list of charges receiving Minimum Salary aid, and the amount received.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING**Policy and Program**

I. The Little Rock Conference Board of Ministerial Training and Qualifications proposes to work strictly within the framework of the current Discipline of The Methodist Church.

II. The elected officers of the Board are: Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, Registrars: General, College Students, Seminary Students.

III. The Executive Committee of the Board are the elected officers. They shall have authority in matters committed to them by the Board.

IV. The Board shall meet prior to the opening of school, at Annual Conference, and on call of the Chairman.

V. The Registrar shall arrange meetings at District levels with all men in the Course of Study, just prior to Annual Conference.

VI. The Board's sources of income shall be:

- A. A percentage from Conference Benevolences
- B. A special offering in November for Ministerial Training
- C. Gifts, bequests and interest

VII. The Board shall maintain a Scholarship Loan Program for Ministerial Training as follows:

- A. For those in Course of Study above the level of License to Preach.

1. Assistance to Courses of Study Schools
 - (a) The cost of required text books for each year of the course of study. The enrollees are required to submit itemized statements or itemized invoices from Cokesbury for books purchased for use in the Pastor's School Courses.
 - (b) One round trip per term at 8¢ per mile
2. Assistance in the Correspondence Course
 - (a) Payment of fees
 - (b) The cost of required text books for each year of the course of study. The enrollees are to purchase the required books in their own name, to pay for them or have them charged to their own account, and then be re-imbursed.

Above assistance repayable: Maximum received in any one year, by one year of service as a full time pastor, either as a member On Trial or as a Full Time Approved Supply.

- B. For students from Little Rock Conference churches preparing for the Effective Ministry in The Methodist Church and enrolled in a college, university or seminary, approved by University Senate of The Methodist Church, and who:
 1. Hold a current Local Preacher's License in The Methodist Church, or are On Trial in the Little Rock Annual Conference, or those students who present to the Conference Board, for one year only, in writing, a recommendation from the District Board of Ministerial Training.
 2. Make application annually to the proper Registrar of the Board, prior to September 1, giving all information requested and authorizing regular grade reports to this Board Registrar from the School Registrar, and a transcript of credits at the end of each semester. Application must be requested.
 3. Make a note, properly endorsed, and payable in one of two ways:
 - (a) One full year of service as an Effective Minister in The Methodist Church repaying the maximum receivable any one year:
 - (b) In cash with interest at 4% annum, beginning at the time the recipient terminated his ministry or preparation therefor; schedule of payments to be arranged with the Board Registrar.
 4. Summer session loans will be granted to one-half the maximum annual allowance.

VIII. The Board may set a maximum amount of assistance per year per recipient, but assistance will be determined for each individual on the basis of requirements.

IX. The Board shall give assistance in a reasonable amount for physical examinations for men to be admitted on trial and into full connection.

REQUESTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

I. The Board, each District Superintendent, Pastor and local church to hold up to young men the need for ministers and the challenge of the ministry, that may enable them to hear the call.

II. As the first step into the ministry, enrolling for the studies for License to Preach with the Department of Inservice Training of the General Board of Ministerial Education.

III. Each Pastor to provide himself with folders on the Course of Study and with the book for the course on License to Preach.

IV. That when a person has passed the correspondence work on studies for License to Preach, or has completed one-fourth of the work for a B.D. Degree in an approved seminary, and in the judgment of the District Committee on Ministerial Training and Qualifications his gifts and graces commend him for the ministry, the Committee license him to preach, subject to the approval of their action and renewal of this license by the District Conference.

V. Wherever possible, men shall, in the Course of Study, take their work through the Courses of Study School.

VI. We assume our Conference share of financial responsibility for the Arkansas Pastors' School.

VII. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance to grant:

- A. An appropriation of 4% from Conference Benevolences.
- B. The authorization of a special offering on the third Sunday in November for Ministerial Training.

VIII. We express our appreciation for the support given the Ministerial Training Scholarship Loan Program by the churches of the Conference. In view of our increased load since assuming assistance for seminary students, we require a substantial increase this year.

IX. We recommend that the Little Rock Conference cooperate with the Jurisdictional Program of Ministerial Education in the following ways:

- A. That we hold before our churches the goal of giving to Ministerial Education an amount equal to 1% of the local church's budget, exclusive of monies used for buildings, improvements, and debt service.
- B. That the churches be asked to move toward this goal as rapidly as possible, and certainly not slower than the full 1% in 1968.
- C. That from the money received from the churches, the Little Rock Annual Conference retain for its own work the amount it needs to fulfill its obligation without dipping into its reserve fund; that the Conference reserve the right to adjust this situation from year to year; and that the remainder be sent to the Jurisdictional treasurer to be apportioned to the seminaries at Dallas and Kansas City.
- D. That the fund for Ministerial Education be promoted through the regular November Special Offering for Ministerial Education.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

The promotion of missionary education is under the direction of Ferris W. Norton, Conference Missionary Secretary and the District Secretaries: Woodrow Smith, Arkadelphia; Alvin C. Murray, Camden; Pryor R. Cruce, Hope; James R. Scott, Little Rock; Ed Matthews, Monticello; and Edgar Outlaw, Pine Bluff,

A church-wide school of missions has been conducted in a large percentage of our churches of the conference using the two themes, **Christ and the Faiths of Men** and **Ecumenism**.

ADVANCE SPECIALS: We urge continued emphasis on Advance Special giving. We express our appreciation to those churches who have contributed to the support of both National and World Mission specials. The Advance Special giving is vital to the missionary program of Methodism. Your attention is called to the fact that the Jurisdictional

Conference will probably give approval to increased askings in advance special giving to the Oklahoma Indian Mission, Spanish Speaking Work, and Lydia Patterson Institute.

FALL MISSION STUDY CONFERENCES: We are pleased to report that under the leadership of our conference missionary secretary and our district secretaries, a fall mission study conference was held in each of the districts this year. The record shows that we had a total of 800 in attendance at these six meetings compared with a total of 492 last year. Of this number, 327 were men, and 106 were pastors. These conferences proved most helpful in training our people to teach in the local church study.

REQUESTS: The following requests are made of the Commission on World Service and Finance:

1. The amount of \$29,000.00 to our Board for Conference Year 1968-1969, with \$8,000.00 of this amount going to church extension.
2. The amount of \$20,000.00 to be allocated to the six districts for Special Church Extension, re-location and mergers.
3. That the following amounts be allocated to the districts for National Advance Specials:

(a) Spanish Speaking Work -----	\$ 7,000.00
(b) Oklahoma Indian Mission -----	11,000.00
(c) Negro Work -----	1,260.00
(d) Lydia Patterson -----	7,000.00

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR CONFERENCE YEAR, 1968-1969:

1. That a Fall Mission Study Conference be held in each District sometime during September, the date to be worked out and placed on the conference calender.
2. We urge our churches to accept their askings in World Service as given by the General Conference, recognizing that World Service is the life-line of missions.
3. That Camp Aldersgate be designated as a Conference Advance Special and our churches be urged to support this camp. This camp is no longer a project of the Woman's Division, but is under the supervision of the National Division of our General Board. We recommend that our conference board give an amount of \$1,000.00 to Camp Aldersgate this conference year.
4. A District Missionary Society is advocated for each of the districts with the District Superintendent taking the lead in forming such society.
5. We recommend to the Annual Conference that an amount of \$20,000.00 be set aside from Special Church Extension funds for the start of a new church in the Pleasant Valley addition in Little Rock, said church to be organized in 1969. All churches are urged to participate in the Special Church Extension fund by giving their proportionate share to this fund.
6. We recommend that two persons from our board, preferably the Board Chairman and the Conference Missionary Secretary, attend the Coaching Conference at Mt. Sequoyah on either July 8-13 or July 14-19, expenses to be paid by our board.
7. We urge that the Board Chairman, Conference Missionary Secretary, the District Missionary Secretaries and the Chairman of Program Area on Missionary Education of the WSCS, along with the six youth chosen by the Districts, attend the Missionary conference at Mt. Sequoyah, June 24-27th.
8. We recommend that the Mobile Church trailer be given to the Daisy church in the Arkadelphia District for use during this Conference Year.

9. We commend to the Conference the work of the following missionaries from our conference and urge the support of their work with your prayers and gifts: Mr. & Mrs. Richard Blakney in Hong Kong, Rev. & Mrs. William Elder, Okinawa; Miss Helen Wilson, Bolivia, and Rev. & Mrs. George Workman in Moradabad. All of these are receiving full support from our conference with the exception of Rev. & Mrs. Workman. We hope some church or churches will assume \$2,000.00 for the Workmans, giving us full support for all our missionaries.

10. Applications for any form of service from the board deserves careful consideration by the proper committee and the board. All request for salary aid, donations, and loans must be submitted in writing on the proper form, before they will be considered. We request that pastors and district superintendents not ask for hurried approval of applications, except in emergency, since these applications must be considered by the proper committee and the board.

Policy for the Use of Church Extension Funds:

1. An amount equal to one-third of the monies received by the Board of Missions from Conference Benevolences is placed in a fund for church extension purposes.

2. Churches may apply for donations from this fund for the purpose of erecting and completing church buildings, educational facilities and fellowship halls; for remodeling programs and for other Church Extension uses. Applications may be made for donations to parsonage projects but church building needs will be given priority.

3. Application may be made for any amount up to \$1,000 for one project.

4. Application blanks may be secured from the Secretary of the Board of Missions, and are to be returned to him after completion. (Rev. Edward B. Hollenbeck, 1215 Schiller Avenue, Little Rock, Arkansas 72202)

5. The Executive Committee will serve as the Committee on Donations for Church Extension and present to the Board their recommendation. Applications may be approved, referred to the Special Church Extension Committee, or denied. The amount of the donation may be adjusted from the original amount requested.

6. The Committee will present its recommendations to the regular meetings of the Board at the Mid-year and Annual Conference meetings of the Board. The Executive Committee will act upon applications in the two quarters of the year when the Board does not meet.

Policy for the Use of Special Church Extension Funds:

I. The Special Church Extension Funds shall be administered by the Special Church Extension Committee of the Board of Missions. The Special Church Extension Committee will be nominated by the Chairman of the Board of Missions and elected by the Board. The Chairman of the Board shall serve as Chairman of the Special Committee. This committee has the authority to recommend to the Board — approval, adjustment, or rejection of applications. Final approval of these grants must be made by the Conference Board of Missions or the executive committee of the Board.

II. This fund is for the purpose of:

1. Building new churches
2. Purchasing new sites
3. Purchasing Mobile Chapel units
4. Merger or relocating of churches.

III. The disbursing of Conference funds allocated to special church extension purposes shall be disbursed on the following basis:

A properly completed application form must be submitted to the committee before any funds can be granted. The application forms will be available from the church extension secretary of the Board of Missions. Funds requested shall be approved by the District Missionary Society and the District Superintendent.

Newly organized churches may apply for a maximum of \$10,000.00 to apply on the building of their first unit.

Churches merging or relocating may apply for a maximum of \$5,000.00.

Existing churches in areas of increasing population at the edge of urban areas may make application for an amount not to exceed \$2,000.00.

A District Board of Missions may apply for an amount not to exceed \$2,500.00 toward the purchase of a new site. The Conference Board of Missions recommends that sites be purchased by the District Board of Missions, freeing these funds for the construction of the first unit.

IV. Expenses of moving Mobile Chapel Units:

The Church completing the use of the Mobile Chapel will be responsible for dismantling it and preparing it for moving. The Church receiving the use of the Unit shall bear the expense of moving and of re-assembling the Unit.

V. The church extension secretary of the Board of Missions will be responsible for investigating the requests.

Policy for Selecting and Financing of Youth Delegates to the Jurisdictional Missionary Conference:

I. Selection of Delegates

1. Attendance from our Conference shall be on the basis of one young person per district. **No Exceptions.**
2. This youth delegate must be a Junior or Senior in High School or a first year college student. They must have some interest in missions and have been active in the youth program of their local church. Preference shall be given to any young person contemplating service in the field of missions as a vocation.
3. The selection of the delegate from each District shall be made by a District Committee composed of six persons as follows:
 District Youth Director—Chairman
 District Missionary Secretary
 District President, WSCS
 District Secretary of Vocations
 District Secretary of Missionary Personnel, WSCS
 District Superintendent

The Chairman shall be responsible for convening the committee. Each District Committee **MUST HAVE** the name of their delegate selected and in the hands of the Conference Youth Director **Not Later Than June 15th of Each Year.**

II. Financing:

1. It is recommended that the money allowable to each youth delegate be raised from the present \$25 to \$36.
2. The cost of each delegate to be divided equally by the Conference Board of Missions, The Conference or District WSCS, and the District Youth Program. Each of these agencies will send their money to the Conference Youth Director **Not Later Than June 15th of Each Year.** Each youth will then be reimbursed through the office of the Conference Youth Director.

Qualifications For Mission Salary Aid

It should be kept in mind that Mission Salary Aid from our Conference Board of Missions is from a Mission Board. The primary purpose of our salary aid is (1) to help new church situations get established and self-supporting, (2) to aid in a continuing ministry to smaller churches and circuits (mostly rural), which are unable to pay a living wage to their pastor. With this purpose in mind the following points are established as qualifications governing the use of Mission Salary Aid.

1. Aid to new churches will be on a year to year basis, however, it will be understood that when a new church receives aid it will be on a decreasing basis each year and all aid will cease completely at the end of the fourth year. Exceptions to this rule will be by $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of the entire Board.
2. Salary Aid will not be given in any situation in which the pastor's total income is \$6,000.00 or above. Newly organized churches served by a pastor of an established church, paying \$6,000.00 or above, may not receive salary aid.
3. Salary Aid will not be given to any church or charge which does not conduct an Every Member Visitation yearly and give evidence of such to the Board.
4. Salary Aid request from District Superintendents will be given consideration **ONLY** if the request has been made in writing on the proper form to the Chairman of the Committee on Salary Aid.
5. In established churches or charges where continuing salary aid is necessary, the District Superintendent will be requested to use every means at his disposal to merge or combine churches or circuits in order to decrease Salary Aid.
6. Priority will be given to newly established churches from available funds of the Salary Aid.
7. The maximum amount of salary aid given in any situation for any one year shall be \$1,200.00. Exceptions to this rule will be by $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of the entire Board.
8. In case of an urgent request for salary aid, between meetings of the entire Board, the Executive Committee is empowered to act on such request in accordance with these rules.
9. These rules may be rescinded, amended, or changed in any way at any meeting of the entire board by a $\frac{2}{3}$ vote of the entire Board.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

A. DISTRIBUTION

Fulfilling our responsibility as the Conference Board of Pensions we have authorized the payment for claims as follows:

- To 41 members retired by the Little Rock Conference with a total of 1238 years of approved service.
- To 43 former members retired by other annual conferences with a total of 377 years of approved service for which the Little Rock Conference is responsible.
- To 55 widows of former members retired by the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 1242½ years of approved service.
- To 38 widows of former members retired by other annual conferences whose pensions are based on a total of 251½ years of approved service for which the Little Rock Conference is responsible.

To 6 dependent children of deceased ministers retired by the Little Rock Conference and by other conferences whose pensions are based on a total of 151¼ years of approved service.

To 12 Approved Supply Pastors of the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 189½ years of approved supply service.

To 2 Approved Supply Pastors retired by other conferences with 7¾ years.

To 9 widows of Approved Supply Pastors of the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 157 years of approved service.

To 3 dependent children of deceased Approved Supply Pastors whose pensions are based on 30 years of approved supply service.

The Little Rock Conference in 1967-68 had the responsibility for 209 claimants with a total of 3697 years of approved service. This represents an increase of 1 claimant and 42 years of approved service over last conference year.

These annuity claims have been paid on the basis of the following rates established by the annual conference:

Conference Members (100% of Annuity Rate) \$56.00 per service year.

Widows of Conference Members (70% of Annuity Rate) \$39.20 per service year.

Dependent Children of Conference Members (25% of Annuity Rate) \$14.00 per service year.

Approved Supply Pastors (75% of Annuity Rate) \$42.00 per service year.

Widows of Approved Supply Pastors (70% of Supply Pastor Rate) \$29.40 per service year.

Children of Approved Supply Pastors (25% of Supply Pastor Rate) \$10.50 per service year.

Payment of these annuities is made by the General Board of Pensions as a service to the Annual Conference.

B. OTHER RESPONSIBILITIES

Other services rendered by the Conference Board of Pensions include:

1. Premiums paid for 106 claimants eligible for Group Hospitalization Coverage at an annual cost of \$5,208.32.

2. Premiums paid for 56 claimants eligible for the Death Benefit Program of the conference group coverage at an annual premium of \$6,838.60.

3. \$3.00 voluntary portion of Medicare paid to claimants at an annual cost of \$5,544.00.

C. RECOMMENDATIONS

1. We recommend that the annuity rate be set at \$56.00 per service year for retired members of the conference; and that \$47.60 be set for the retired approved supply pastors.

2. We recommend that the apportionment to the charges of the annual conference for conference claimants be an amount equal to 25% of the pastor's salary provided that twenty percent of the above twenty-five percent shall be used for current distributions and five percent shall be used for a restrictive endowment fund.

3. We recommend in keeping with Par. 296.3b and Par. 1610.6 of the 1964 Discipline that the Sunday following Easter, April 13, 1969 be observed as Retired Ministers Day.

4. We recommend that the General Board of Pensions continue to write and distribute the monthly payments to our annuitants and that the payments be made on the last day of each month.

5. In keeping with Par. 1618.4 of the 1964 Discipline, we recommend for the approval by the annual conference that special appointments shall be listed in the conference journal as follows: (1) with annuity claim (a) upon this Annual Conference, or (b) upon a general board, an institution, or an agency of the Methodist Church; (2) without annuity claim upon this Annual Conference.

6. That we continue to apportion to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the conference the sum of \$360.00 per year in accord with the 1964 Discipline (Par. 1623.7); and that said apportionment be paid to the treasurer of the Little Rock Conference Board of Pensions not later than 15 days prior to the opening of annual conference. And that a like amount be assessed upon the office of the District Superintendent and said amount to be paid from the District Superintendent's Fund.

7. We recommend that Eligible Conference Claimants and special Conference Claimants will have the Death Benefit Program provided for them with the contribution to be paid by the Conference Board of Pensions in accordance with the program of the Conference Committee on Group Insurance.

8. We recommend that eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants will have $\frac{1}{2}$ of the annual payment of the Conference Group Hospitalization paid by the Conference Board of Pensions. In addition we recommend that the eligible Conference Claimants and special Conference Claimants will have \$3.00 of the \$4.00 voluntary portion of Medicare paid by the Conference Board of Pensions.

9. All retired ministers who serve appointments under the District Superintendent, and receive less than \$1,000.00 in annual salary and expense from the charge will have their contribution and premiums paid by the Conference Board of Pensions as outlined in Par. 7 and 8 of this report.

10. We express our thanks and appreciation to the Pension Study Committee for their work during the 1966-67 and 1967-68 conference years.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

The accomplishment of the union which has created The United Methodist Church has also joined the two former publishing interests of the two former denominations. Our Methodist Publishing House is now on the threshold of a new day of increased service to eleven million United Methodists. For Publishing House administrators, the year was a year of planning and preparation to put the House in the best possible position to carry forward its responsibilities in the new church.

The achievements of our Publishing House during the past year are not paralleled in any other year in Methodist Publishing House history, even though comparisons with other years be on percentage basis. In consideration of the year's success and prospects for the future, the Board of Publication increased the annual appropriation to the conference claimants to \$800,000. Of this amount the Little Rock Conference receives \$6,324.43.

The church's reception of the new **Methodist Hymnal**, published in July, 1966, has exceeded all expectations. As this report is written, more than 3,300,000 copies of the Hymnal have been ordered and delivered.

The new and quite different adult literature, "Man's Search for a Meaningful Faith," was ready for fall, 1967, distribution. Plans for new youth materials in 1968 were concluded. Plans for additional adult materials in 1969 were crystalized and feasibility checks are now being made.

During the year, circulation of **Together**, the general periodical for Methodist families, decreased from 636,893 to 589,914. Significant circulation increases were realized in several annual conferences and episcopal areas, however, as a result of special subscription campaigns. Within the Little Rock Conference our record has something to be desired. Only 1,845 paid subscriptions are delivered, along with 588 free subscriptions. Which is a ratio of one subscription for every seventy-five members as compared with a ratio of one for every eighteen nation-wide.

Once again, we recommend that each church organize a Committee on Good Literature and elect a **Together** agent to interpret, promote and secure subscriptions to **Together** magazine. We suggest a goal of one subscription for every twenty-five members.

We further recommend that churches and members purchase literature, books and materials from the Cokesbury Regional Service Center at Dallas to help provide additional contributions to the Pension Fund for retired ministers.

CAMP TANAKO

Camp Tanako, located on beautiful Lake Catherine, has long been of service to the Little Rock Conference, offering worship, study, Christian fellowship and recreation for all ages. During the 1967 season 26 different groups, numbering approximately 2336 persons, participated in well-planned programs under the direction of carefully selected, capable leaders. Plans are now being made to make Tanako of even greater service.

Milner Hall

Under the direction of the building committee, J. Gordon Wilson, chairman, a lovely new building has been erected as an addition to the present dining room-kitchen. This structure is of matching brick with 3,022 square feet of floor space.

This new building meets several urgent needs. There is a large all-purpose assembly room which will enable large groups to view visual aids day or night. It also offers space for indoor recreation, worship and study regardless of weather. In addition to the all-purpose room, there are four large classrooms. With the present building, this will make six large rooms, which can be used for classes or workshop groups, the year around.

This new building has been named Milner Hall in honor of Mr. & Mrs. Fred Milner. They have served as resident supervisors at Tanako for many years. The new annex cost approximately \$35,000. This is the largest building project that has been undertaken at Tanako in a number of years, so it is hoped that whenever possible local churches will substantially increase their offering for Tanako.

Fawcett Chapel

The Chapel at Tanako has been named in honor of Dr. Roy E. Fawcett. Dr. Fawcett was instrumental in securing the location and served as Agent from 1945-1964.

Frontier Camping

One of the important trends in the church today is the movement toward Frontier Camping or Wilderness Camping. Here young people and adults live out in the open, sleep in tents, cook their own meals, and get very close to nature. A feeling of being near to God and near to one another is experienced in a remarkable way.

Frontier Camping will offer much to the members of the Little Rock Conference and will in no way detract from the fine program of Institutional Camping which has long been a vital part of Camp Tanako, and which will continue for many years.

Year Around Program

Camp Tanako has been serving in a fine manner the Little Rock Conference from late Spring to early Fall, but has not been used during the cold winter months. The new building will be a year-around structure, air conditioned for the summer and heated for the winter. Many of the cabins are already winterized. Plans are being made to complete this work so that Camp Tanako will be able to accommodate all groups, large or small, the year around.

We recommend the continuation of the financial policy currently followed:

1. From Conference Apportionments, \$9,000.00.
2. From local Church budgets and a free-will offering, Sunday, April 27, 1969.
3. Encouragement of gifts from individuals and special groups.

ARKANSAS AREA TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

PROGRAM 1968-1969

I. Special emphasis will be given during the coming Conference Year in providing assistance to Town and Country Churches who are considering a building program.

The Area Director will be available for guidance and council, during the earlier stages of planning, to any church, pastor, or District Superintendent. The purpose of his services in this area of work will be to help improve the looks, quality, and function of the church building that is to be built.

He will provide information concerning the guidelines required by the General and Conference Boards of Missions to churches that expect to ask for grants or loans to assist them in building. He will present to proper local church boards, committees and congregations many architect plans for sanctuaries and educational buildings. These plans will reflect the outside appearances and floor space arrangements. They will vary in size, appearance, and arrangement of rooms, quality of construction. Construction costs will vary from \$10,000 to \$100,000. These are only preliminary plans, and are not for use in the actual construction. Rather, they are to give the congregation ideas of basic design, appearance, and arrangement of floor space. Once a plan is chosen, it can be laid before a certified architect or qualified draftsman or engineer for complete drawing of plans.

The Area Director will attempt to create a consciousness on the part of the local church regarding the Stewardship of Building. This emphasis will include programs of sound finance in building and paying for church construction. He will point out many economy measures in construction which will enable a church to obtain a better quality building, or more building for the money. In addition, he will point out tax saving incentives offered by the Federal Government which enable some donors to make larger gifts at a smaller "out of the pocket" cost.

II. We recommended to the incoming Town and Country Commission that they adopt the above-mentioned Building Program for its "special emphasis" during the new quadrennium.

III. We recommend that the Conference Board of Missions set up a special committee to work with the Area Director of Town and Country work in establishing some guidelines and procedures regarding building programs by local churches who plan to ask for grants or loans to assist them in their building.

IV. The Area Town and Country Workshop will be held on Monday of the same week designated for the Annual Mid-year meetings of the Two Conferences in 1969.

V. The Area Town and Country Workshop will feature "The objectives and Ideas in Church Construction" as its program next year.

VI. We recommend the holding of divine worship services in each church every week, wherever practical or possible.

VII. We recommend that every Methodist Church in Arkansas have an appropriate sign designating it as a Methodist Church. We also recommend churches putting up new signs to designate the building as "The United Methodist Church."

VIII. We shall continue to promote interest in holding worship services in the recreational areas of our State.

IX. When requested by the District Superintendent, the Commission will be willing to assist him in a study regarding the Larger Parish Programs, new church locations and the abandonment of church properties.

X. We shall cooperate with the University of Arkansas and The Council of Churches in the Town and Country Church Seminar, which is held annually on the campus of the University. The Seminar program this year will deal with cooperative ideas and procedures between churches of all denominations in the small towns and rural areas which may strengthen the influence and activity of such church communities.

XI. The Executive Director, in cooperation with the Executive Committee, shall select one rural minister in each Conference to attend the Seminar on Church and Community Life, which is held at Emory University in the summer. We will pay up to \$100.00 on the expenses of those attending this Seminar.

XII. The Commission shall be responsible for promoting stewardship through the Every Member Visitation, Tithing, Wills, Legacies, The Methodist Foundation of Arkansas, and The Lord's Acre-The Lord's Hour Plan.

XIII. The Commission will also inform all Methodist Churches in Arkansas of the "Financial Crusades," a service made available by the General Board of Missions through the Department of Finance and Field Services. Their Directors are ordained Methodist ministers who have been highly successful in church fund-raising and offer their services at a fraction of the cost of secular professional stewardship directors.

XIV. We will request and try to make use of the Lay Speaking Program of the Conference Board of Lay Activities. To further develop the goal, we will prepare and recommend to those conducting worship services a uniform Methodist Order of Worship. We urge that everyone conducting such services give an invitation to Christian Discipleship at the close of the service.

XV. The Enlarged Charge Program shall be continued with a goal of at least 300-400 members for every full-time pastor.

XVI. We shall work with TRAFICO in offering to make available films and filmstrips to be used by the Districts and local churches.

XVII. A District Director of Town and Country Work may be elected for each district by the Conference Commission on Town and Country Work on nomination by the District Superintendent after consultation with the Executive Committee of the Commission. He shall work in close cooperation with the Executive Director of the Commission in all phases of the town and country program. His chief functions shall be to expedite all program aspects in his district, to assist the district superintendent in implementing the program, and to serve as liaison between the district and conference programs.

XVIII. The Rural Church of the Year Awards shall be promoted according to the guidelines developed by the special committee on the Rural Church of the Year.

XIX. We shall seek to develop cooperative procedures between the church and governmental agencies, the Arkansas Council of Churches, and other denominations.

XX. We shall cooperate with the Cabinet, the Boards of Missions, Evangelism, and Education in establishing new congregations and out-post Sunday Schools.

XXI. The Town and Country Commission is of the conviction that there is a direct relationship between the general interest in a local church and the financial strength of a local church as compared with the existence and systematic activity of the following church groups: The Methodist Youth Fellowship, The Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Methodist Men, and the Official Board. Therefore, our program this year will include the working out of a plan that will encourage the organization and activity of a Methodist Youth Fellowship, A Woman's Society of Christian Service, a Methodist Men's Club, and an Official Board in every local church. When this plan has been conceived, the Area Director will be available to assist any pastor and local church requesting his services to organize and set in motion any one of these, or all of these, important local church organizations.

XXII. All of the ministers belonging to the Southwest Conference and serving in the Arkansas Area will be informed as to the above-mentioned program of the Area Town and Country Commission. They will be offered the services of its Area Director and invited to participate in its program.

XXIII. We ask that \$9,000.00 be granted by the Commission of World Service and Finance for the Town and Country Work and Stewardship Promotion for this next conference year.

XXIV. We commend Reverend W. O. Scroggin, Jr., for the work he has done the past three years as the Area Director of Town and Country Work and Stewardship, and request the Bishop and the Cabinet to reappoint him as the Area Director of Town and Country Work and Stewardship, representing the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences for the coming year.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

AND

WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD

The main concern of Woman's Societies and Guilds, local, district and conference is always the total program of the church. One of the emphases this year has been Ecumenism which has prompted studies and many one-session meetings with women of other denominations and has stimulated interest in inviting speakers of other denominations in cooperation with various groups in the church, such as the Commissions, the Methodist Men, etc. The Uniting Conference in Dallas this month endorsed continued Methodist participation in the Consultation on Church Union and urged the widest possible process of education in ecumenism throughout the church. It is already in the plans of the Woman's Society to assist in this effort.

World Understanding Workshops, Race and the Methodist Church, the war in Vietnam, Human Rights Year plans, election issues and responsibilities in 1968 have been areas of study and activity in our local societies this past year. We must help remold and redirect public opinion on the major social issues of our time. The actions of the Uniting Conference in the creation of the Commission on Religion and Race, the Adoption of the Quadrennium Program, that will include in its first year a Bishop's Fund for Reconciliation which will seek 20 million dollars from United Methodists, Resolutions and Statements on the United Methodist Church and Peace, the war in Vietnam, Church-Government Relations, Project Equality, are all avenues to which and through which we will

be directing our interest and work in the new church year. Our women will be endeavoring to do these things as involved, responding and responsible citizens and Christians.

We are glad to report that a greater number of adults and youth participated in Mission Study classes than ever before, but there is still a great need for educating for Mission. We will emphasize the Inter-Conference Schools of Christian Mission as never before. It is hoped that "A Weekend of Christian Mission" can be planned with the Conference Board of Missions so that more laymen, and especially couples can attend.

Encouraging the reading of books on practical theology, so that women would think through what they themselves actually believe as Christians, has been an area of concentration. This was more easily advanced because of the confusion from the "God is Dead" theories. The study of worship principles and practices, including participation in worship services of other denominations and faiths led to enrichment of religious experiences, as well as a broadening of understanding, and was a step in ecumenicity.

Christian Vocations presents a great challenge in our church today. As we become a part of the World Community in Mission we need many trained and dedicated workers in every field and on every front. Three funds as you know help young people to secure their education and preparation for this work. Of the five young women in colleges now, one has already been accepted by the Board of Missions for work as an U.S. 2 and will enter her new duties this summer. Others will soon go into other areas of Mission work.

The historic count of the Woman's Society records 9891 which indicates an increase of 168 as compared with this same date last year. The Wesleyan Service Guild has had a gain both in local units and membership. They now have 1555 in 72 local Guilds. Combined total 11,446.

Our Conference sent to the Woman's Division sent to the Woman's Division for pledge to Missions this year \$113,150.00; Call to Prayer and Self Denial \$4,930.00; Supplementary Giving \$2,100.00.

The reports show that \$43,000.00 was raised by the Societies and Guilds and spent at the local church level.

The plan of union consummated at the Uniting Conference brings about the following changes: (1) We will be known as **The Women's Society of Christian Service**. The change will take place in October when we will celebrate Charter month. (2) a slight change in the wording of the statement of **Purpose**. (3) The officer program year will now begin September 1st and end August 31st. (4) The new structure will provide for fewer officers and for more freedom and opportunity for initiative on the part of the local society and guild whether large or small.

What shall we share as the women of the Methodist Church and the women of the Evangelical United Brethren Churches come together in one Society? In the words of Mrs. Dwight Grove, president of the EUB Women's Division, "Openness is perhaps the greatest gift in union — openness, implying a readiness for change, a willingness to listen and learn, an eagerness for the guidance of God, and a joy in the anticipation of tomorrow. — Everywhere there is interest and excitement"

Even though we in the Little Rock Conference have no Evangelical United Brethren churches we are affected by the changes in the total Women's Organization. We too, are looking forward with joy and anticipation to joining the gifts of the 109,000 members of the Women's Society of the EUB Church with those of the 1,600,000 members of the Woman's Society and Wesleyan Service Guild of the Methodist Church to "Unite women in Christian fellowship to make Christ known throughout the world; and to develop a **personal** responsibility for the **whole task of the church**."

ROY E. FAWCETT

"He walked through the days of the week what he preached from the pulpit on Sunday." A member of this man's church said that of him. Through the bounds of the Little Rock Conference many knew him as good pastor, discerning counselor, trusted friend. They would say the judgment was well earned. He was an upright man, a good churchman, a worthy friend, a good minister of Jesus Christ.



He was born in the Bethlehem community of Lonoke County. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Fawcett. He graduated from Cabot High School, earned his bachelor of arts degree at Hendrix, attended Emory University, and graduated from Southern Methodist School of Theology in 1921. He was licensed to preach in 1914. He was admitted to the Little Rock Conference in 1917 and was admitted to full connection in 1921. His appointments were Bradley, Pilot Grove (North Texas), Dumas, Crossett, Nashville, Highland in Little Rock, Arkadelphia District, Magnolia First Church, Executive Secretary of The Little Rock Conference Board of Education. He took the retired relation in 1964. After retiring he served as education director for Trinity in Little Rock.

In 1925 he was married to Miss Mildred Riggan. For forty-three years they walked together as good servants of Jesus Christ. They made their home "a haven of blessing and a place of peace." They cared for loved ones, friends enjoyed their hospitality, young people found warmth and understanding and encouragement.

Dr. Fawcett died in Little Rock March 4, 1968. His funeral service was conducted by his pastor and co-worker, The Reverend George Wayne Martin. His theme was "a Prince is fallen in Israel." His body was laid to rest in Rose Lawn Cemetery in Little Rock.

He is survived by his wife, Mildred; his sisters, Mrs. Nannie Jackson and Mrs. Vernon Coulter of Lonoke, and a brother Hubert of Lonoke.

He promoted the acquisition of land and the building of Camp Tanako, and the chapel is named for him. The youth he worked with established a college loan fund in his honor. He pioneered, in company with others, the establishment of the headquarters building in Little Rock. He led in building the church at Dumas. In recognition of his service the Trinity Church named the new education building in his honor. His college, Hendrix, conferred on him the honorary Doctor of Divinity degree in 1955. He was a trustee of Hendrix and of Camp Tanako, and was a member of The Board of Education of South Central Jurisdiction.

Dr. Fawcett brought to his pulpit ministry a well disciplined intellect and a consistent earnestness together with great warmth of heart. He spoke of the deep issues of life. He held up high the Christ whom he knew and loved. Not many were so gifted in public prayer as he. His humility of spirit, his genuineness of feeling, his wide sympathy for the human condition, his spiritual insights gave him greatness in expression. Both his spoken and written word carried the influence of a great teacher. For four years he was in the class room with C. J. Greene at Hendrix. And like so many of this man's students he bore the marks of his teaching in a rare clarity, an excellence in

expression, a beauty of form, and a preciseness of phrase that marked him out.

He exercised great gifts as a pastor. He cared for people. He understood the struggles, the temptations, the fears, the hopes, the weakness, the strength of men. He spent many an hour seeking to help those who needed a pastor. When other men played or rested he would often be found in a hospital waiting room with some lonely, anxious family. Not many of us touched so many lives for good as he and Mildred. Thinking of him brings to mind Arnold's lines:

"Therefore to thee it was given
Many to save with thyself.
And at the end of the day,
O faithful shepherd! to come
Bringing thy sheep in thy hand."

He loved the members of his family, and was always grateful for those who cared for him and gave him opportunity. His home was a happy home. He was a generous and devoted friend. He loved his Church with a deep passion. He trusted in God known in Christ and was grateful for the privilege of being His minister. The world is a better place because he lived.

His health had been failing for a number of years, but he con-

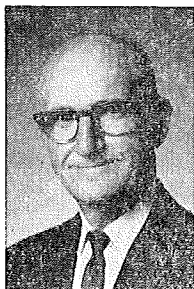

In November 1946, having acquired a home in Pine Bluff, the Hundleys moved to that city where they had served with distinction the great Lakeside Church for four years, and where they would be near their doctor son and better medical care.

On October 30, 1947 her beloved husband passed away. She continued to make her home in Pine Bluff among many friends and near her son and his wife and their two lovely daughters. X. Miscellaneous

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

1. Nominations. The District Superintendents shall nominate all members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees except as otherwise provided.

2. Conference Council. There shall be a Conference Council composed of the Bishop and the Cabinet; the chairmen of the following Boards and Commissions: Education, Evangelism, Hospitals and Homes, Lay Activities, Ministerial Training and Qualifications, Missions, Pensions, Social Concerns, Christian Vocations, Minimum Salary, Town and Country and TRAFICO; the Editor of The Arkansas Methodist, the President of Hendrix College, Superintendent of the Methodist Children's Home, President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, the President of the Methodist Foundation, the Secretary of the Annual Conference, a layman from each district to be appointed by the Bishop and Cabinet. The Conference Staff shall be members of the Council without vote and the Chairman of World Service and Finance Commission shall sit with the Council in an advisory capacity. The head of any agency who is not a member of the Conference will serve as ex-officio member without vote.

- (a) The Council shall have such duties and responsibilities as the Annual Conference may assign to it.
- (b) The Executive Committee of the Council is to confer with the Bishop regarding program and promotional plans.
- (c) The Executive Committee of the Council shall meet within 30 days after the close of each Annual Conference Session to prepare the Conference Calendar. Changes in the calendar thus prepared may be changed when found necessary by the Bishop and the Cabinet.

3. Financial and Statistical. (1) The District Superintendents shall furnish the treasurer with all assessments and acceptances of the pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the meeting of the Annual Conference. These figures shall be official. (2) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars, with no column for cents. (3) Each pastor shall report to the Conference Treasurer and turn in his statistical report to the statistician at a date set by the cabinet. The Treasurer's Report from the Pastor will be audited and checked by the Final Data-Processing Print-Out. Where there is discrepancy, the amount recorded on the Print-Out will prevail.

4. Memoirs. There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased Clerical Member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, name of children, charges served and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with his memoir. The memoirs of the wives or widows of clerical members of the Conference shall be published in the Journal. The name of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs the passing of any person whose memoir shall appear in the Journal. It shall be the duty of District Superintendents to report to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions the death of any conference claimant that occurs in their respective districts.

5. Administrative Fund. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall recommend an assessment for a Conference administrative fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of

auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expense of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this fund. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the fund. Payments from the fund shall be made only on vouchers signed by the secretary of the Conference; provided that this rule does not relate to the salary and expenses of the Treasurer of the Conference.

6. Conference Treasurer. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the Conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer on recommendation of the World Service Commission, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.

7. Number of Districts. There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Conference.

8. District Fund. The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall report to the district conference, annually, showing receipts and disbursements.

9. Reports and Resolutions. There shall be a pre-conference report which shall contain reports of all the boards and agencies of the Conference. This report shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Annual Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the pre-conference reports shall be typewritten, in triplicate, on special forms furnished by the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary. In the event editing of a report is deemed necessary by the Conference Secretary and chairman of the board involved, permission is hereby granted.

10. Membership of Historical Society. The Historical Society shall be composed of ten or more members, one of whom shall be the Conference Secretary. In addition to the duties outlined in the Discipline, the Society shall secure a group picture of each class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal; and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his retirement.

11. Safeguarding Historical Material. (1) Any member of the Little Rock Annual Conference, or layman authorized by a member of the Conference, may examine Historical documents within Headquarters Building. (2) To remove historical documents from Headquarters Building, a written request signed by the presiding Bishop and Conference Secretary shall be presented to the Custodian. Provided further, historical documents belonging to the Conference Woman's Society may be removed from Headquarters Building upon written request signed by the President and Secretary of the Woman's Conference. (3) The Custodian of Historical documents shall be given a receipt for any material removed from the vault in Headquarters Building, Little Rock, giving date of removal and name of receiver.

12. District Conference. There shall be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline and one additional member from each pastoral charge, provided however, in charges of more than five hundred members there shall be one additional member for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.

13. Lay Members. Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the pastor-host of the Annual Conference at least fifteen days before the session of the Annual Conference.

14. Board Service. No person may be nominated to serve on the same Conference Board for more than two consecutive quadrenniums, and may not be nominated to serve on more than one board at the same time. District Superintendents may not serve on Conference Boards, except as provided in the Discipline or by specific conference action. A person failing to attend a board, of which he is a member in a quadrennium may be continued only by special board action.

15. Entertainment. The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the retired ministers shall be entertained from the entertainment fund. Certain proceeds from the offerings shall go to the fund. The entertainment fund shall be administered by three men, to be named by the Cabinet, who will be reporting to the next session of the Annual Conference.

16. Conference Expense. Registration fees and the offerings at the public services in the session of the Annual Conference shall be used to defray the expense of the session including the expense and/or honorarium of the conference preacher and that any deficit remaining be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund, and the Conference Treasurer shall pay the same.

17. Pastor's Traveling Expense. After the Fourth Quarterly Conference of a charge has set the minimum salary of a pastor for the ensuing year, the Quarterly Conference may set the traveling expense fund for the pastor in an amount not to exceed \$1,200.00 per year for each pastor and associate pastor assigned to a pastoral charge, provided, however, that charges of more than one church may allow an additional \$300.00 travel expense per each additional church.

Provided further, that no salary may be lowered to initiate an expense fund or to increase an existing expense fund.

18. Pastor's Utilities. At the Fourth Quarterly Conference after a Charge has set the minimum salary of a pastor for the ensuing year, the Quarterly Conference may so direct that an amount not to exceed \$600 may be paid by the church for parsonage utilities, provided, however, that the pastor's salary and travel allowance is not lowered to do this, and that this money will be used by the church and/or pastor for parsonage utilities only. Further, this amount shall be subject and no apportionment by any group or to pay into any fund. Be it further provided that a church may designate a part of the pastor's salary as utilities for income tax purposes.

19. Unsponsored Resolutions. Any resolution not sponsored by a regular board or standing committee of the Conference must lie over for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon provided, however, immediate debate and action may be ordered by two-thirds vote of the Conference presence and voting.

20. Apportionments Based on Pastor's Salary. On all items apportioned to local churches by means of a percentage of the ministers salary; such percentage shall be understood to apply to all ministerial members of the local church staff, serving under the appointment of the Bishop, including ministers in full connection, ministers on trial, and full time approved supply pastors. This rule to be in effect with the 1966-1967 Conference Year.

21. Campaigns. All Conference-wide campaigns to raise funds shall be voted on by ballot.

22. Amendments. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

As we come to the close of the One-hundred and fifteenth session of the Little Rock Conference, we cannot but feel that this has been one of the greatest in a long succession of great annual conferences. Many different persons and groups have worked together to make this possible.

We especially mention the following:

Bishop Paul V. Galloway for his efficient and personable leadership in presiding over the conference, and Mrs. Galloway whose presence in our midst has added much in the way of charm and friendship.

Dr. Alfred H. Freeman, our conference preacher, whose warm sermons have searched our hearts and challenged our minds, and Mrs. Freeman whose presence has graced the session.

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Southwest Annual Conference overlaps the Oklahoma, the North Arkansas and the Little Rock Conferences, and

WHEREAS the General Conference has ordered the Annual Conferences to eliminate these overlapping situations as rapidly as possible,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we ask Bishop Galloway and The Cabinet to appoint a Committee to work with like committees from other Annual Conferences involved to:

- 1) assemble full information about finances and other aspects of the merger of the Little Rock Conference with that portion of the Southwest Conference which lies within our boundaries,
- 2) report such findings to the Conference not later than our regular meeting in 1969, and
- 3) suggest plans and procedures that would lead to the merger not later than our regular session in 1970.

RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED by the Little Rock Conference of The United Methodist Church now in session on this 21st day of May, 1968:

We deplore the inclusion of a mixed drink bill in the Governor's call for the second session of the extraordinary session of the General Assembly of Arkansas.

We call upon our elected legislators to stand firm in their opposition to the enactment of any laws making the serving of liquor more permissive than present laws allow and to resist all efforts of the administration to force through the legislature a mixed drink bill.

We also urge our legislators to enact laws that will strengthen the control of the Private Club Law in our State, so as to give law enforcement officers more control and enforcement of present and future laws of our state.

RESOLUTION

Inasmuch as the Board of Christian Social Concerns has previously endorsed the work of the Arkansas Release Guidance Foundation, under the Christian leadership of Reverend Eugene Efird, an effective minister and member of the Little Rock Annual Conference, we now wish to encourage the membership of this Annual Conference, local churches, church school classes, individuals and organizations, to support the Arkansas Release Guidance Foundation in every possible way, including prayer, gifts, service, and study.

We therefore ask the Little Rock Annual Conference to adopt this Resolution, that this vital area of our church's ministry to the world may receive the endorsement of this body and the encouragement of its members, and that copies of the Resolution and information about this ministry may be publicized through the news media, including the **Arkansas Methodist**.

RESOLUTION

We recommend that the Little Rock Annual Conference adopt the resolution prepared by the North Arkansas Conference Council Staff and approved by the North Arkansas Conference Interboard Council and the North Arkansas Conference as follows:

"Therefore, BE IT RESOLVED that:

1. the housing of the Interboard "Council Staff of the North Arkansas Conference and the Staff of the Little Rock Conference be at the same location, and

2. a building committee be composed of one member and the Executive Secretary from each of the Interboard Councils of the Area; and the Chairman of the World Service and Finance Commission from each Conference; furthermore, that this Committee work closely with the Headquarters Building Committee to select a suitable location at the earliest possible date. When selected, the staffs shall make arrangements to move to the location and seek to render a greater and more effective ministry to all of Arkansas Methodism."

The Executive Committee of the Little Rock Conference Interboard Council and Cabinet of the Little Rock Conference have voted unanimous approval.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CHARTER OF HENDRIX COLLEGE

Article II, as amended on September 10, 1956, of the Amended Charter of Hendrix College is hereby amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE II**TRUSTEES**

Section 1. The Board of Trustees of Hendrix College shall be composed of the following members:

- (a) The President of Hendrix College.
- (b) The presiding Bishop or the presiding Bishops of the North Arkansas Conference and the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church.
- (c) Five ministers elected by the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church.
- (d) Five ministers elected by the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Church.
- (e) Twenty-four persons as Trustees-at-Large to be elected by the Board of Trustees of Hendrix College.
- (f) The secretaries of the Inter-Board Council of the North Arkansas Conference and of the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church or such other person or persons holding substantially similar offices as may be designated by said Conferences.
- (g) The persons designated "Life Trustees", who have been elected as Life Trustees by the Board of Trustees and who as of the 1968 Annual Conference of the North Arkansas Conference and the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church shall have served for not less than eighteen (18) years as Trustees of Hendrix College. No person shall be elected a Life Trustee until the expiration of his current term of office as a Trustee. No person shall be elected a Life Trustee who does not meet the requirements of eighteen (18) years previous service as a Trustee as set out herein.

Section 2. The Board of Trustees of Hendrix College shall at all times be composed of the following members:

- (a) Not less than sixty percent of the members of the Board of Trustees shall be alumni or alumnae of Hendrix College as defined by Article II, Section 1 of the Amended Charter of the College.
- (b) Not less than six members shall, at the time of their election, be ministers in full connection with the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Church.
- (c) Not less than six members shall be, at the time of their election, ministers in full connection with the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church.

Section 3. The term of each member of the Board of Trustees shall be six years, or until his successor is duly elected.

Section 4. Each person who as of the date of the adoption of this Amendment to Article II has been duly elected and qualified as a Trustee shall serve as a Trustee for the term for which he has been elected. Following the term for which he has been elected and is now serving no minister (other than a minister serving by

virtue of his office of Bishop or Secretary to the Inter-Board Council or President of the College) shall serve as Trustee for longer than one term of six years and no layman shall serve for longer than two terms of six years each; provided, after an absence of not less than three successive years from membership on the Board of Trustees a person shall be eligible to serve as a Trustee for an additional term or terms subject to the limitations set out in this Section. The provisions of this Section shall not apply to Life Trustees designated pursuant to Article II, Section (g).

Section 5. Nominations for the office of Trustee shall be made by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees. In the event the electing body shall fail to elect a trustee from the names submitted by the nominating committee additional nominations shall be submitted. Nominations made by the Executive Committee shall conform to the requirements of membership on the Board of Trustees set out in Article II, Section 2, and due consideration shall be given by the Executive Committee to the geographical distribution of the Trustees-at-Large.

Section 6. Vacancies in the Board of Trustees occasioned by death, disability or resignation shall be filled by election by the Board of Trustees to be held at the next meeting of the Board.

Section 7. The Board of Trustees shall have the powers, duties and responsibilities traditionally vested in Boards of Trustees of institutions of higher education, said powers, duties and responsibilities to include but not be limited to the following:

- (a) To hold, manage, invest and reinvest all of the property, endowments and assets of Hendrix College.
- (b) To elect a President and such other officers of the College as the Board shall deem necessary or appropriate;
- (c) To contract and to be contracted with; to sue and to be sued; to borrow money and to give security therefor; to make and use a common seal and to alter the same; to buy, sell, mortgage and otherwise deal in property, real, personal and mixed, and to take and hold property by gift, conveyance, demise or bequest; to enter into cooperative relations with other educational institutions; to lend its funds, to buy and sell stocks, bonds, debentures and other securities; to erect buildings and equip same; to receive money subject to annuity; to operate and maintain said institution or institutions of learning and to do all things necessary for efficient management;
- (d) to confer customary degrees and honorary degrees;
- (e) To establish, acquire and manage other schools, departments or colleges subject to the approval of the North Arkansas Conference and the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church;
- (f) To exercise in a fiduciary capacity any powers now or hereafter granted to Boards of Directors of a business corporation by the Statutes of Arkansas;
- (g) To exercise in a fiduciary capacity all powers now or hereafter granted a business corporation or a nonprofit corporation by the Statutes of Arkansas.

Section 8. The Board of Trustees shall be charged with the government of Hendrix College and with the appointment of its officers and instructors and with fixing their compensation, but the Board may delegate such powers as it sees fit to the President or to the faculty.

Section 9. The Board of Trustees shall designate an Executive Committee and such other committees as may be necessary or appropriate. When the Board of Trustees is not in session the Executive Committee shall exercise the powers granted to the Board of Trustees, subject to any specific limitations imposed by the Charter of By-Laws or by action of the full Board of Trustees. The Board of Trustees shall have the power to delegate the powers, duties and responsibilities which it exercises to the President of the College or to a committee of the Board of Trustees other than the Executive Committee.

Section 10. The Board of Trustees shall adopt by-laws to govern the business and affairs of Hendrix College.

Article V of the Amended Charter of Hendrix College is hereby amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE V

OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of the Board of Trustees shall be a Chairman and a Vice Chairman who shall be members of the Board and a Secretary-Treasurer who shall not be required to be a member of the Board and such other officers and committee chairmen as the board may from time to time designate.

Section 2. The term of office for each officer of the Board shall be three years, provided, an officer shall serve until his successor is duly elected and qualified.

Section 3. The officers of the Board shall perform the customary duties of such offices and such other duties as the Board may designate.

Section 3, Article VI of the Amended Charter of Hendrix College is hereby amended to read as follows:

ARTICLE VI

Section 3. Any change or amendment to the Charter of Hendrix College shall conform to the laws of the State of Arkansas.
