

CONFERENCE MINUTES

Monday, May 19, 1969, 4:00 P.M.

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper

The Junior Choir of First United Methodist Church, Hot Springs, under direction of Fletcher Trotter, sang the Introit. Bishop Galloway announced the opening hymn, "And Are We Yet Alive". Followink the singing of the hymn, Bishop Galloway noted that the expressions on the faces of delegates as they sang was a true declaration of Christian fellowship. He then read Hebrews 10:22-25 and portions of the Fourth Chapter of James. After the reading of the Lesson from the Scriptures, he led the Conference in prayer. The choir sang as the anthem, "Cold Was the Room". Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation to Dr. Ivey, host pastor, and Fletcher Trotter and the boys and girls in the choir for the special music. He then brought the message on the themes of confession, repentance, and forgiveness, holding fast to the faith, the importance of all human relationships being grounded in Christ, these themes being taken from the scriptures read previously. He concluded the message with prayer. Assisted by George Ivey, host pastor, Bishop Galloway led the Conference in the ritual for the Sacrament of The Lord's Supper, using the short form in The Hymnal. Six members of the Cabinet knelt at the chancel during the service, Arthur Terry, Raymond Franks, Alf A. Eason, Otto W. Teague, C. Ray Hozendorf, and Joe R. Phillips. Bishop Galloway served the first table. Then the Cabinet served the elements to the Conference. The choir sang, "Let Us Break Bread Together" and other hymns, during the serving of the elements. Ushers for the service were Nick Kekich, Tommy Dodson, Fred Blagl, and Carl Johnson. The closing hymn, "Breathe On Me, Breath of God", was announced. Bishop Galloway pronounced the benediction.

Monday evening, May 19 7:30 P.M.

Worship Service: Bishop Galloway announced the opening hymn, "Spirit of Faith, Come Down". Following the singing of the hymn, Bishop Galloway led the Conference in prayer.

Cabinet Report: Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for his District Superintendents and their fine spirit. He said they had the concern of both their churches and their ministers in their hearts, and that they had done their work well. Joe R. Phillips, Jr., Secretary of the Cabinet, read the combined report of the District Superintendents.

Program: Bishop Galloway noted that on Tuesday morning the report of the Board of Ministerial Training will be heard, so those to be received into the Conference might be able to vote. He also noted some dstinguished visitors who will speak, and that the Hendrix College report will be heard. Also, the Memorial Service will be held Tuesday morning.

Introductions: Bishop Galloway announced that the choir from the Grand Avenue United Methodist Church would present the anthem for the service, and introduced Bishop Earl G. Hunt, Jr., The Conference Preacher, who, following the offertory, brought the message, which was based on the Psalmist's cry, "I will wake the dawn", the subject being, "Making Sunrises". The anthem was, "Man Shall Not Live By Bread Alone", Mrs. Larry Broughton, Choir Director, and Ruth Broughton, Organist. Ushers for the service were Earnest Housley, Floyd Massey, Dewey Thomason, Bill Lueben, Gene Harwood, and Milton Ricket. The Organist for the service was Richard Morris. Bishop Galloway announced the closing hymn, "Jesus Calls Us". After the singing of the hymn, Bishop Hunt pronounced the benediction. The Grand Avenue Choir sang the choral "Amen".

Tuesday, May 20 8:30 A.M.

Devotional: Bishop Galloway announced the hymn, "He Leadeth Me: O Blessed Thought." He then expressed appreciation to Fletcher Trotter for his services on the organ, and to the children's choir which he directed as they sang for the Communion service yesterday. Bishop Galloway then read Luke 24:1-8, and commented on the meaning of the resurrection story in our life today. James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference, led in the morning prayer.

Mood of the Conference: Bishop Galloway called for the Conference to be one not only of enrichment and fellowship, but that all sessions be permeated with a spirit of love. He assured the delegates that anyone who might show unkindness or belligerence would be called out of order.

Welcome: Dr. George Ivey, host pastor, extended to the Conference a welcome to First United Methodist Church, and presented Gene Harwood, Chairman of the Administrative Board, who gave the formal welcome. The Conference responded with applause.

Bar of the Conference: James E. Major, Conference Secretary, moved that the bar of the Conference be from the pillars of the church forward toward the chancels.

Roll Call: James E. Major announced the Roll Call, and said it was being effected at the registration desk in fellowship hall.

Secretary's Staff: James E. Major announced his secretarial staff: Journal Clerk, Woodrow W. Smith; Secretary of Ministers' Service Records, Harold K. Davis; Secretarial Assistant, O. D. Peters; Tellers, Carl Matthews, Harold Brent, James F. Richardson, Curtis E. Monroe.

Bishop Galloway asked the Conference to approve all of the items mentioned by James E. Major. It was done.

Appreciation: Bishop Galloway asekd Kenneth L. Spore to stand in appreciation of his service to the Conference as Secretary of Ministers' Service Records. The Conference responded with applause.

Publishing House: William F. Wright, a representative of the Cokesbury Book Store, called attention to the Book Store display in fellowship hall, and lifted up several current books of interest. He then gave Bishop Galloway a check for \$7,348.00. Charles Ramsay noted that a check for \$223.14 had been given by the General Board of Pensions. Bishop Galloway then lifted up several books he felt to be of special interest.

Cabinet Nominations: Joe R. Phillips, Jr. moved that the District Superintendents be given the authority to name the District Boards on the Ministry and Church Buildings and Location after the adjournment of the Conference. It was done. He then moved that the Board of Ecumenical Affairs be exempt from the Conference rule on dual membership. It was granted. The Cabinet then made their nominations. Joe R. Phillips, Jr., Secretary of the Cabinet, read the nominations. They were accepted by the Conference.

Statistician: The name of Bryan Stephens was submitted to complete the unexpired term of Edgar Outlaw as Statistician. He was elected.

Standing Rule: Arthur Terry presented the following changes in the Standing Rules: (1) Rewrite all Standing Rules to conform to the new phraseology, (2) Delete Standing Rule 2, inasmuch as this is disciplinary, (3) Standing Rule 12, first line, change "shall" to "may", so that the Rule reads, "There may be a dstrict conference held in each district." (4) Delete Standing Rules 17 and 18, inasmuch as Judicial Council Decision 252 renders these Rules out of order. It was moved that they be placed on the table twenty-four hours, so that the Conference might discuss and act on them. It was done.

Mount Sequoyah: N. Lee Cate, newly appointed Superintendent of the Assembly at Fayetteville, expressed appreciation for the work of the Kaetzels, and encouraged the churches to keep the \$10.00 apportionment in their budgets.

Health and Welfare Ministries: N. Lee Cate, Chairman of the Board, asked for his report to be presented. The Bishop requested that it be given later.

Christian Civic Foundation: W. Henry Goodloe gave the report of the Foundation.

Courtesy: Robert W. Trieschmann presented Mrs. Paul Galloway. The Conference stood in appreciation and applauded. Other guests were presented: Mouzon Mann, Gerald Hammett, Braska Savage, James Martin, and Bob Edwards.

Board of the Ministry: George W. Martin was asked to present that portion of his report which would give men voting privileges. Bishop Galloway interrupted the presentation to act on the Conference Relations report.

Conference Relations: Kenneth L. Spore moved that the characters of all the ministers be passed. It was done.

Full Connection: Thomas A. Abney, Registrar of the Board of Ministerial Training, read the names of those to be received into full connection, and recommended their acceptance by the Conference: George R. Cleary, Claude E. Barron, Don R. Williams, and John W. Shafer. They were elected. George W. Martin read from the Discipline and assured the Conference that these men had fulfilled all requirements. They came forward, and Bishop Galloway led the service to receive these men into full connection. Bishop Galloway greeted these men personally and presented them to the Conference. The delegates stood in appreciation.

Associate Members: George W. Martin noted this was a new Conference relationship, and said it was an historic movement in the life of the church to receive this class. Thomas A. Abney, Regstrar, read the names of those recommended for associate membership, and they came forward to be received: Bruce H. Bean, Leo L. Beck, J. R. Callicott, Anthony L. Chaffin, Claude Clark, Robert C. Eckberg, James T. Ford, Robert H. Jackson, A. J. Lightfoot, Dewey McCauley, Calvin Miller, Ira Mitchell, Asa R. Poss, Thomas G. Poss, Earl S. Wagner. Bishop Galloway conducted the service to admit these men into this new Conference relationship. Bishop Galloway asked delegates to stand if they would receive these men. It was done.

Picture: Alfred Knox requested the men to be excused for a picture.

Microphone: An adjustment was made with the microphone so that delegates at the rear of the Sanctuary could hear.

TRAFCO: O. D. Peters, Chairman of the Committee, called attention to the report on page 38 of the Pre-Conference Reports. He noted that an average of fifty film items per week is being mailed from the office, and asked for special consideration of the churches of the 10ϕ per member asking. He moved the adoption of the report. It was done.

Historical Society: Harold Sadler moved adoption of the report as found on page 18 of the Pre-Conference Reports. It was done.

Hospital: It was noted that Allan Berry was in the hospital in Little Rock. Joe R. Phillips, Jr. moved that the Secretary of the Conference send him a telegram. It was done.

Greetings: Dr. Clem Baker in Arizona and Reverend Alva Rogers in Little Rock had sent greetings to the Conference.

J. Ralph Hillis noted the absence of Andrew J. Christie, Fred R. Harrison, that of C. D. Cade, Harold Sadler that of John Hoover, and C. Ray Hozendorf of S. B. Mann at Norphlet. It was requested that greetings be sent to all these men. It was done.

Gus Remmel noted that Eugene Efird's mother is in the hospital in

Little Rock, and requested that she also be remembered.

Mount Sequoyah: Bishop Galloway requested that the \$10.00 per church be sent to Mount Sequoyah during July.

Lydia Patterson: Bishop Galloway presented Reverend Francisco Gaytan, who brought greetings to the Conference from the Institute, and reported on the work at the school. He expressed appreciation for the continued support of the Conference.

Conference Board of Trustees: Kenneth M. Goode, Chairman, asked that the report be adopted as it appears in the Pre-Conference Reports with the exception of Paragraph 3. O. W. Hoover, Secretary, read the report. The report was approved. He moved that several additions to the report be adopted, and that these reports be included in the Journal. Upon being read, each of these recommendations of the Board was approved.

Personal Appreciation: Bishop Galloway presented Vernon Hook, Rowe Hill, Cliff Peck, who are from the new St. James United Methodist Church in Little Rock. He took time to lift up this fine new congregation, noting that every single family has made a pledge to the budget.

Insurance Committee: Sidney Good, Chairman, presented Bryan Stephens, a member of this Committee, who expressed appreciation for the leadership being given this Committee by its Chairman. Sidney Good then gave new figures under the plan beng presented to the Conference for adopton. He moved its adoption. It was done. He presented George Meyer of the Board of Pensions a check for \$1,475.00, proceeds from the rental of the Garland A. Brewster Trust Fund of Pine Bluff.

Health and Welfare Ministries: N. Lee Cate, Chairman of the Board, asked Charles O. Walthall, Secretary, to read the report as found on page 17 of the Pre-Conference Reports, plus a supplement prepared by the Board. The report was adopted. J. Edwin Keith, Superintendent of the Children's Home, spoke to the Conference about the work of the Home and expressed appreciation to the churches for their financial support during the Christmas offering.

Personal Privilege: Bishop Galloway asked Marshall Steel to preside while he was called out of the Conference. Dr. Steel assumed the Chair.

Courtesy: John Miles and Robert Trieschmann presented guests to the Conference: Norman Carter, Bates Sturdy, S. B. Wilford, E. J. Holified, Bill Watson, James Keith, Leonard Byers, and Bob Orr.

Interboard Council Structure Committee: C. Ray Hozendorf presented the report of the Committee. He moved the adoption of the report. Palmer Garner asked for a change in Section 2, #3: add after "Chairman", and the executive officers". The report was adopted.

Program Council: W. Neill Hart, Executive Secretary of the Interboard Council, presented the report, a coordinated program and calendar as prepared and given to all Conference delegates. He moved that the report be adopted. It was done.

Evangelism: J. Ralph Sewell, Chairman, moved the adoption of the report as found in the Pre-Conference Reports, page 17. He then presented Ralph Hale, Executive Secretary of the Board, who spoke to the report. The report was approved.

Chairman: Marshall T. Steel returned the Chair to Bishop Galloway.

Committee on Publishing Interests: Edwin Dodson asked that the report be adopted as it stands in the Pre-Conference Reports. It was done.

Statistician: Edgar Outlaw was called to give the report. Bishop Galloway noted that Edgar would soon be leaving for the chaplaincy, and expressed appreciation for the service rendered by those in this ministry. Edgar Outlaw then gave the report. Marshall T. Steel, who again assumed the chair of the Conference, asked for the adoption of the report. It was done.

Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations: Cagle E. Fair gave the report. It was adopted.

Board of Pensions: George Meyer, Chairman, gave the report. It was adopted.

Adjournment: Marshall T. Steel called for a recess of ten minutes. The Conference was adjourned.

During the recess it was reported to the Secretary by Raymond Franks that Bishop Galloway had excused George Cleary from the Conference to be with his mother, who was being rushed to the hospital.

Announcements: Bishop Galloway called the Conference to order and asked for announcements: Board of Education meeting at 1:30; Committee on Worship, 2:30; Committee on Ecumenical Affairs, 3:00; Supply Pastors to meet at Tigert for dinner at 5:30; Retired Ministers at Grand Avenue Church at 5:30.

Courtesy: Dr. and Mrs. Roebuck and Reverend and Mrs. Lloyd Conyers were presented to the Conference.

Methodist Headquarters Building: Carl Hall gave the report of the Board's finances. The report was adopted for filing.

Memorial Service: Harold K. Davis announced the opening hymn, "Come, Let Us Join Our Friends Above", and after the singing of this hymn, led the Conference in the Affirmation of Faith, "The Apostles' Creed". The Gloria Patri was sung. Carr Dee Racop, Jr. read the one hundred twenty-first Psalm and portions of Hebrews 11. James Shaddox offered the prayer. Harold K. Davis led the litany of commemoration. James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference, read the Record of Remembrance, the Conference standing in their memory: Ministers in full connection, William C. Lewis, S. W. Mooty; Widows of Ministers, Mrs. James A. Ginnings, Sr., Mrs. Rena Merch, Mrs. Camille P. Watson, Mrs. Ella Martin Whittington. Harold K. Davis introduced Marshall T. Steel who deliviered the Commemoration message. Harold K. Davis announced the closing hymn, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds". After the singing of the hymn, Dr. Steel pronounced the benediction.

Tuesday, May 20

Afternoon

Following the organ prelude, Woodrow W. Smith announced the hymn, "Come Christians, Join to Sing". Darrell Van Smith led the Conference in prayer. The Choir Director, Fletcher Trotter, asked the congregation to participate in the singing of the anthem based on Psalm 23. The choir was the Junior Choir of the First United Methodist Church of Hot Springs.

Woodrow Smith expressed appreciation for the Junior Choir. He made some announcements, and then presented the Conference Preacher, Bishop Earl G. Hunt. Following the offering and Offertory by the Junior Choir, the Doxology was sung. The Junior Choir then sang an anthem.

Bishop Hunt then brought the message based on Philippians 1:21, "For me to live is Christ and to die is gain.", and which he entitled, "The Majesty of A Mighty Motive."

Woodrow Smith announced the hymn, "Hope of the World". After the singing of the hymn, he then pronounced the benedication.

Ushers for this service were: Glen Sweeney, Roy Burton, Gen. E. B. Whisner, Larry Maxwell, John O. Alston, H. O. Richardson.

Tuesday, May 20

Evening

Worship: The Introit was sung by Oaklawn United Methodist Church Choir under the direction of Miss Virginia Queen. Raymond Franks announced the hymn, "Once To Every Man and Nation". After the singing of the hymn he presented Edward Matthews, who led the Conference in prayer. Raymond Franks presented the Oaklawn United Methodist Church Choir, and introduced the Conference Preacher, Bishop Earl G. Hunt, Jr. The offering was received, ushers being Glen Sweeney, Don Bone, Conrad Strickland, J. R. Cambell, Floyd Massey, and Gene Harwood. The Doxology was sung as the offering was presented at the altar. Following the anthem, "Jesus Shall Reign Where'er the Sun", Bishop Hunt brought the message. Before giving the message, he paid high tribute to Marshall T. Steel for his Christian statesmanship, but more especially for his great preaching ability. As a text he read Matthew 27:24. His subject was "Pilate's Washbowl". Raymond Franks announced the closing hymn, "God of Grace and God of Glory." Following the singing of the hymn, Raymond Franks pronounced the benedication.

Wednesday, May 21

Morning, 8:30 a.m.

Devotional: Bishop Galloway announced the hymn, "I Love to Tell the Story". After the singing of the hymn, Bishop Galloway requested delegates not to be reading while he read from the Scriptures. He then read from the first chapter of Isaiah, and commented on it, saying that today we desperately need to hear the voice of God saying, "... prepare ye the way . . ." He then led the Conference in prayer.

Minutes: Cagle E. Fair reported that the minutes have been read and approved.

Minimum Salary: Edgar Outlaw noted that the report of the Committee is on page twenty-six of the Pre-Conference Reports, and moved its adoption. John P. Miles asked how long it had been since the minimum salary was increased, and requested the Committee study the matter of raising the minimum salary. The report was adopted.

Agenda: Bishop Galloway noted some of the items for the agenda today. George W. Martin noted that 10:30 or 11:00 as a report time would be helpful to his Committee. Kenneth L. Spore said his Committee was ready to report, but Bishop Galloway asked it to be delayed.

The Arkansas Methodist Commission: J. Ralph Hillis moved the adoption of the report as found on page ten of the Pre-Conference Reports. Alfred Knox spoke to the report, expressing appreciation to the churches for their support. He noted that they are now printing pledge cards for use by churches, and that the circulation campaign will be later this year, as requested by the Conference.

The Methodist Foundation: W. O. Scroggin, Jr. offered the report, copies of which were distributed to the delegates. It was moved by a Little Rock Conference member that the report be accepted, and that the nominations be elected. Dr. Scroggin called attention to the Town and

Country dinner, to be held at Oaklawn United Methodist Church. Bishop Galloway announced the Ministers' Wives Luncheon.

Methodist Headquarters Building: Arthur Terry called the names of the Committee and presented them to the Conference. He then gave a brief statement regarding the history of the building and the work of the Committee. He then stated that, after careful re-consideration by the Committee, the Committee re-affirms its recommendation that the Conference accept the offer of First United Methodist, Little Rock for conference accept the offer of First United Medicals, Little Rock for housing of the Headquarters Building. He moved the adoption of the report. John P. Miles asked the Conference to defeat the motion, and spoke to the report in favor of building our own structure. Carl Hall spoke in favor of the motion, encouraging the Conference to go to First Church. Milton English spoke against the motion. James Hall spoke in favor or the motion. Charles Ashcraft spoke against the motion. Robert E. L. Bearden, pastor, spoke in terms of the interests of First United Methodist Church in having the Headquarters Building. He asked John Miles if he knew whether or not the North Arkansas Conference would concur with his Committee's plans. John Miles replied that he understood they would follow the direction of the Little Rock Conference. Norris Steele spoke against the motion, but noted that the spirit of the Conference should be honorable. B. T. Fooks spoke in favor of the motion. Carr Dee Racop Jr. asked Mr. Fooks for clarification, John Miles also asked Mr. Fooks for a point of clarification. Question was called. John W. Stevens of the Oak Forest United Methodist Church made a motion that the vote be taken by secret ballot. The motion carried, James E. Major, Conference Secretary, requested the tellers to come forward. Bishop Galloway noted that in order to vote, delegates must be within the bar of the Conference. The Chairman of the Committee was granted the opportunity to make the last statement. Dr. Terry said he would decline this privilege. Bishop Galloway then instructed the Conference for voting. Irl Bridenthal asked for clarification as to what could happen if the motion should be defeated. All delegates were asked to stand and tellers were requested to distribute the ballots. The vote was taken. The Bishop called the Conference to order and the tellers retired for the counting. Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for the fine spirit in which the matter was handled, and noted that, in any case, he would still be the Bishop of this area, and happily so.

Conference Relations: Kenneth L. Spore, Chairman of the Committee, presented Wendell Hoover, Secretary, who gave the report. Report No. 1 was adopted. Report No. 2 was passed. The Committee asked the Conference for any information on Claude Hines. Alf Eason said they had had no correspondence with him. The report No. 3 was adopted. The Committee recommended that Fred L. Arnold, Robert S. Beasley, Kenneth L. Spore, and Marshall T. Steel be added to the Retirement Rolls. The Committee recommended that James R. Sudder be located at his own request. The reports were approved. Kenneth L. Spore noted this to be the first time in the Conference's history that the Chairman of the Conference Relations Committee would recommend his own retirement. In alphabetical order, the men taking their retirement addressed the Conference. Fred L. Arnold closed his statement by asking the Conference to sing Fanny Crosby's hymn, "Blessed Assurance". The delegates stood and followed his leading. Bishop Galloway asked the men and their wives to come forward. James E. Major, Conference Secretary, presented the parchments. The Bishop greeted them personally. Alfred Knox took their picture, and the Conference stood in appreciation, and applauded.

Courtesy: John P. Miles and Robert Trieschmann asked all of the ministers' wives to stand and be recognized. The Conference applauded. Other guests were presented, among them Reverend Charles A. Nowlan of The General Board of Missions, working with the new St. James United Methodist Church in Little Rock.

Ballot: Of the two hundred fifty-two votes cast, one was irregular, one hundred twenty-nine were "yes", and one hundred twenty-two were "no", hence the motion regarding the Methodist Headquarters Building carried.

Board of Lay Activities: S. H. Allman, Conference Lay Leader, called attention to the report as it appears on page twenty-two of the Pre-Conference Reports, and noted changes in personnel in the various leadership positions. B. F. Allbright and William M. Shepherd were presented to the Conference. He moved the adoption of his report. It was done,

Telegram: Bishop Galloway read a telegram from Miss Helen Wilson, Missionary to Bolivia from the Little Rock Conference, and requested the Secretary to send greetings.

Hendrix College: Marshall T. Steel gave the report of the College, noting the successful conclusion of the Ford Foundation funds-matching campaign, and expressing appreciation to the church for its part in this magnificent effort. The Conference received his report with applause.

Extra Session: Otto W. Teague moved that the Conference have an extra session at 2:30. It was seconded, and passed.

Personal Privilege: John Miles presented Alfred Doss, a former member of the Little Rock Conference.

Board of the Ministry: George W. Martin, Chairman, presented Thomas A. Abney, Registrar, who gave the report. Fred H. Haustein, Frank V. Hilliard, Rodney C. Wallace, and Robert L. Moore were elected to full connection, and Bishop Galloway conducted the service to receive them. He greeted them personally and presented them to the Conference, who stood in appreciation. George W. Martin asked that they and other members of the class admitted into full connection retire for a class picture.

Herman G. Bonds was received by a two-thirds vote of the Conference, as a probationary member. Robert A. Boyd Clanton, Don Eubanks, Milton O. Outlaw, Robert W. Robertson, Billy Boyd Smith, and Leslie Gordon Smith, Jr. were elected to probationary membership in the Conference.

Dorsie T. Caldwell, Veo E. Green, Harold Rogers, Robert A. Boyd, Clanton, Don Eubanks, Milton O. Outlaw, Robert W. Robertson, Billy Boyd Smith, and Leslie Gordon Smith, Jr. were elected to Deacon's orders.

Fred H. Haustein, Frank V. Hilliard, John W. Shafer, Rodney C. Wallace, Don R. Williams, Claude E. Barron, and Robert L. Moore were elected to Elder's orders.

George W. Martin explained many of the changes in terminology especially related to the Lay Ministry. John P. Miles asked for clarification of the rights and privileges of Lay Pastors, and was assured that any man who had previously been ordained could not be denied any of his rights and privileges as a minister. Thomas A. Abney read the report of the Board relative to those in the various capacities of Lay Pastors. The report was received.

Announcement: Thomas A. Abney announced a rehearsal for the ordination this afternoon at 3:30 in Room 202 of the Educational Building. He also noted that there would be a reserved section for the families of the ordinees.

George W. Martin asked that the entire report be accepted. Sam Jones noted that Section 5 on page 30 of the Pre-Conference Journal be deleted. The Board has agreed that this be done. The entire report was accepted.

Announcements: Christian Social Concerns will meet in Room 5-C at 2:30. The Laymen's Luncheon will be at 12:30. The Board of Health and

Welfare Ministries will be meet at 2:00 for organization. The film, "These Four Cozy Walls", will be shown in the Activities Building at 4:00. S. H. Allman stated that the Laymen's Luncheon will be at the Avanelle at 12:30. All tickets have been sold. George Ivey noted that all boards should remove their literature, else it will be thrown out after the Conference.

Personal Privilege: Charles Ashcraft stated that, since the Head-quarters Building will be located at the First United Methodist Church, Little Rock, he wanted the Conference to know that he and his associates would back this move one hundred per cent.

Benediction: Bishop Galloway adjourned this session of the Conference with a benediction.

Wednesday, May 21

Afternoon

Prayer: Bishop Galloway convened the Conference promptly at 2:30, and called upon Norris Steele to lead in the opening prayer.

Tanako: Gladwin Connell noted that the report is found on page thirty-seven of the Pre-Conference Reports. He nominated additional Trustees. Bishop Galloway requested the Board to check into the legality of electing a retired member of the Conference to the Board. He said they should be in an advisory capacity. This suggestion was accepted, and the report was adopted.

Board of Education: Fred R. Harrison, Chairman, presented William D. Elliott, Secretary, who gave the report of the Board. Fred L. Arnold, a member of the Board, spoke to the report. As a personal privilege, he told the Conference that, since his name was attached to the report brought to the Conference in favor of constructing a new Methodist Headquarters Building, he wanted the Conference to know he was proud of his vote, and unashamed of his part in the debate, but that, like Charles Ashcraft, he was with the Conference one hundred percent, and would whole-heartedly support the action of the Conference. Fred R. Harrison moved the adoption of this report No. 1. It was done.

Youth: Bishop Galloway noted a conversation with a busload of youth from Detroit, Texas, one of them being a youth delegate to his own United Methodist annual conference.

Board of Education: William D. Elliott, Secretary, read Report No. 2 of the Board. It was adopted by the Conference. He then read Report No. 3, noting that it differs from that appearing in the Pre-Conference Reports, Dr. Harrison moved its adoption, and then spoke to the report. Charles Ramsay asked if the report gave the World Service Commission the right to make apportionments to the districts without approval of the Annual Conference. J. Edward Dunlap, Chairman of the Commission, answered the question, noting that the full Commission has not acted on the matter, and that they are perfectly willing to follow the direction of the Annual Conference. If the report is adopted, he said, the Commission would make the apportionments beginning 1970. Charles Ramsay said the report gave them a blanket account, and he felt that this could not be done. Bishop Galloway ruled that the Board must ask for a specific amount, or place a limit on the request. Ralph Mann spoke to the report. Bishop Galloway asked the Board of Education to re-consider and bring the matter before the World Service Commission. J. Edward Dunlap called a meeting of the Commission immediately after adjournment. This matter of the Wesley Foundation support was deferred to later session of the Conference.

Nominations: William D. Elliott called attention to the nominations and changes as requested by Joe R. Phillips, Jr. with regard to the Board

of Education and asked their election. Mimeographed sheets were distributed to the Conference. They were elected.

Retirement: James Argue requested the Conference to express appreciation to Mrs. V. B. Story of Pulaski Heights United Methodist, Little Rock, who is retiring after twenty-five years of service. Fred R. Harrison noted that the Board had acted on this matter, also with regard to Mrs. A. J. (Margaret) Davis of First Methodist Church, Texarkana, who is retiring after eighteen years of service. It was done.

Board of Social Concerns: Louis Mulkey, Chairman, presented Robert Trieschmann, who gave the report from page ten of the Pre-Conference Reports. Eugene Efird spoke to the Conference about the work and witness of the New Life House in Little Rock, and expressed appreciation to Bishop Galloway and the churches of the Conference for their support.

Illness: Bishop Galloway noted that Eugene Efird's mother is in the hospital, and expressed concern for her health.

Adoption: The report of the Board of Christian Social Concerns was adopted by the Conference.

Memoirs: Harold K. Davis, Chairman, asked for instructions as to who should follow up the deaths of members by writing their memoirs. He noted that he understood that the District Superintendents should do this, and give these memoirs to Carr Dee Racop, Jr. The report of the Committee was accepted by the Conference.

Personal Privilege: Robert M. Van Hook II presented a Resolution to the Annual Conference relative to the electing of a Committee to study the merger of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences. He moved that the rules of the Conference be suspended so that the Conference might act on the Resolution. Second was given and permission was granted. Norris Steele asked for a point of clarification. J. Ralph Hillis offered an amendment to the Resolution to the effect that, instead of the members being elected by the Conference, they be appointed by the Bishop and his Cabinet. The amendment passed. Question was called. The vote was taken and the resolution adopted.

Board of Missions: Edward B. Hollenbeck, Chairman of the Board, noted the report of the Board on page thirty-two of the Pre-Conference Reports. He announced a literature display prepared by Woodrow W. Smith in Fellowship Hall, and encouraged the delegates to pick up some materials to take home. He also encouraged attendance at the showing of "These Four Cozy Walls", a movie. He moved the adoption of the report. It was accepted.

District Conference Journals: Darrel Bone, Chairman, reported that four district conference journals were in order, and the remaining two had not been turned in to him. He made a motion that this portion of his report be adopted, and it was passed. Bishop Galloway stated that he would see that the other two were made available to the Committee.

Arkansas Council of Churches: Edward Matthews spoke in behalf of the Ecumenical Affairs Commission and the work of the State Council of Churches.

Courtesy: John P. Miles presented Reverend C. C. Hall, pastor of the Haven United Methodist Church, and Mrs. C. C. Preston, President of the Southwest Conference of the Women's Society of Christian Service, who were in the Conference session. He also presented W. D. Golden and Stanley Reed as guests of the Conference.

Personal Privilege: John P. Miles made a resolution to the effect that

the Building Committee of The First United Methodist Church, Little Rock, be assured of the love and cooperation of the entire Conference. It had been signed by Charles Ashcraft, Norris Steele, Fred H. Arnold and Robert M. Van Hook II. It passed.

Announcement: Harold D. Sadler announced a meeting of the Archives and History Committee after adjournment.

Adjournment: James E. Major pronounced the benediction at 3:25 P. M.

Wednesday, May 21

Evening

Ordination Service: The choir of First United Methodist Church sang the Introit, "This place was made by God into a priceless sacrament and is now holy," under direction of Fletcher Trotter, organist and choir director. Bishop Galloway offered the Invocation, then expressed appreciation to First United Methodist Church and to all who have made this a good week. He announced the opening hymn, "Let Zion's Watchmen All Awake." After the singing of the hymn, Bishop Galloway asked the Conference to remain standing for the Responsive Reading taken from Isaiah 61. Then followed the Gloria Patri. Bishop Galloway asked the ushers to come forward to receive the evening offering. Ushers for the service were Conrad Strickland, Ernest Housley, Floyd Massey, Gene Harwood, Dewey Doss, and S. Herbert Allman. As the Offertory, the choir sang, "He Comes to Us." As the offering was presented at the altar, the congregation stood and sang the Doxology, after which Bishop Galloway announced the hymn, "God Hath Spoken by His Prophets". After the singing of the hymn he presented with high appreciation Bishop Earl G. Hunt, Jr. who delivered the ordination message. Bishop Hunt read as his text John 1:29, and preached on the subject, "Gentlemen, the King."

Following the message, Bishop Galloway called for the presentation of the candidates for deacon's orders. Robert O. Beck presented the following candidates: Deacons: Dorsie T. Caldwell, Robert A. Boyd Clanton, Donald L. Eubanks, Veo E. Green, Milton Oliver Outlaw, Robert Wilson Robertson, Harold Gene Rogers, William Boyd Smith, Leslie Gordon Smith, Jr. Joe E. Arnold also accompanied the class to the altar. Bishops Galloway and Hunt conducted the Ordination Service. The new deacons were personally greeted by the Bishops, presented parchments by James E. Major, Conference Secretary, and given Methodist Hymnals by George W. Martin, Chairman of the Board of Ministeries.

Bishop Galloway announced the hymn, "Spirit of Faith, Come Down." Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for the singing of the Conference, then called for the candidates for Elders Orders to be presented. J. Ralph Hillis presented the candidates: Claude Edward Barron, Fred H. Haustein, Frank V. Hilliard, Robert Louis Moore, John Wendell Shafer, Rodney Carrol Wallace, Don Russell Williams. Arnold Simpson also accompanied the class to the altar. Bishops Galloway and Hunt conducted the Service of Ordination. During this Service the choir sang, "To Thee, O Jesu". All Cabinet members joined in the laying of the hands, as did several other traveling elders invited by individual candidates, as their sponsors. The Bishops greeted the new Elders personally. James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference, presented parchments, and George W. Martin, Chairman of the Board of Ministeries, presented them with Books of Worship. Bishop Galloway called the new Deacons to join the Elders at the chancel, then presented the classes to the Conference. As the delegates stood, he pronounced the benediction. The First United Methodist Church Choir sang, "God Be in My Head", as the response afte the benediction.

Thursday, May 22

Morning

Devotional: Bishop Galloway announced the hymn, "O For A Thousand Tongues to Sing". After the singing of the hymn, Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation to Fletcher Trotter for his contribution to the music ministry at the Conference, also to the Staff of First United Methodist Church for their many courtesies. He then read the Scripture, portions of Ephesians 3. He interpreted the Word as it was read, with pertinent statements of faith and purpose. His special emphasis was on "Love".

Minutes: Charles O. Walthall reported that the Minutes had been read and approved. He asked the Conference for permission to read the minutes after the session today. It was granted.

Organization: Ralph Sewell called an immediate meeting of the Board of Evangelism for the purpose of organization.

Nominations: Joe R. Phillips, Jr. read some additional cabinet appointments. They were elected.

Pensions: George Meyer gave the report of the Board on Disciplinary Question No. 23. Otto W. Teague and Arthur Terry offered corrections to the report. It was adopted.

Women's Society of Christian Service: Mrs. E. T. Davenport, Conference President, asked for a point of personal privilege: She requested that all members of the W.S.C.S. present at the Conference stand to be recognized. It was granted, and the Conference applauded the ladies. She then read her report. The report was adopted. Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation to Doris Fair and Judy Atwood, who will be leaving the Conference to continue their education this September.

Constitutional Amendments: Otto W. Teague and Raymond Franks presented the changes: Constitutional Amendment No. 1, James E. Major instructed the tellers to count the vote of those standing, one hundred twenty-five in favor, none against; Constitutional Amendment No. 3, vote taken by standing, one hundred ten for, none against; Constitutional Amendment No. 2, vote taken by standing, one hundred eighteen for, none against; Constitutional Amendment No. 4, vote taken by standing. Palmer Garner asked for clarification of this Amendment. None for ,one hundred twenty-eight against.

Moving Day: Bishop Galloway announced that moving day will be Thursday, May 29th.

Standing Rules: Arthur Terry presented the changes in the Standing Rules, They were presented separately and adopted in order of presentation.

Treasurer: Grafton Thomas presented the report for the seven-month period ending December 31, 1968. He moved its approval by the Conference. It was done.

Reconciliation: Bishop Galloway spoke to the Reconciliation Fund item. In response to Harold Sadler's question, he noted that good book-keeping would be demanded.

Town and Country: W. O. Scroggin, Jr., Executive Secretary of the Commission, presented Connie Robbins, who noted some editorial changes in the report as it appears in the Pre-Conference Journal, pages thirtynine and forty. He stated that the new budget of the Commission was mimeographed and placed in the pews. He moved the adoption of the report. It was done. W. O. Scroggin, Jr. announced the winners of the

Church of the Year Awards: Small Town Church of the Year, Horatio United Methodist Church. A. J. Lightfoot, pastor; Open Country Church of the Year, Springhill United Methodist Church, Connie A. Robbins, pastor. James E. Major noted that Connie Robbins has been pastor of three different churches that have won this award. The Conference applauded as he was presented by the Bishop. Winston Hudnall, Chairman, made a further report. It was adopted.

Secretary of the Conference: James E. Major called the attention of the Conference to a new joint committee regarding disability of ministers required by the new Discipline. Bishop Galloway asked the Board of Pensions, The Board of the Ministries and the Cabinet to elect proper members of this committee.

Conference Meeting Place: Dr. George Ivey presented Gene Harwood, Chairman of the Official Board, First United Methodist Church, Hot Springs, who extended an invitation for the Conference to meet here again in 1970. The Conference stood and applauded in acceptance of this invitation.

Chaplains: Bishop Galloway asked that all of the men who have served as Chaplins at Cummins Prison stand, noting that this ministry has been discontinued. He requested a letter be written the State officials, indicating our continued interest in this institution and the work of rehabilitation. Mrs. A. J. Christie asked why this ministry had been discontinued. Bishop Galloway responded by noting that it had been a decision of the State officials.

Wesley Foundation: Fred R. Harrison read the report of the Wesley Foundations. He moved the adoption of the report, then spoke to the report. It was approved.

Young Adult Conference: Fred R. Harrison presented F. Gladwin Connell, who announced the Young Adult Conference at Camp Tanako, June 20-22, noting that this year it will be patterned after the Lay Witness Mission movement.

World Service Commission: J. Edward Dunlap presented Gerald Fincher, Secretary, who gave the report, noting some changes from the report as it appears in the Pre-Conference Reports, pages forty-one through forty-three. The report was adopted.

Resolutions: Carr Dee Racop read the report of the Committee. It was adopted. Bishop Galloway noted that it was one of the finest such reports he had ever heard.

Appreciation Committee: Bishop Galloway expressed high appreciation to the Conference for its good spirit.

The Reading of the Appointments: Bishop Galloway called the Secretary of the Conference, James E. Major, and the Secretary of the Cabinet, Joe R. Phillips, Jr. to stand with him as he read the Appointments. Those named needing a two-thirds vote of the Conference were given this vote, and the Bishop then read the Appointments for 1969-1970.

Closing of the Conference: Bishop Galloway asked the Conference to stand and sing the hymn, "A Charge to Keep I Have". At Bishop Galloway's invitation William E. Brown, who has attended sixty-two annual conference sessions, came forward and pronounced the Benediction.

Daily Proceedings Conference Minutes

Special Session

Wednesday, January 22, 1969, 9:30 A. M.

Winfield United Methodist Church

Opening Worship: Arthur Terry announced the hymn, "And Are We Yet Alive". Following the singing of the hymn the prayer was led by C. G. Tillman, Superintendent of the Little Rock District of the Southwest Conference.

Presentation: Dr. Terry announced that our own beloved Bishop, Paul V. Galloway, is presiding over the North Arkansas Conference, meeting at the same time as ours. He then presented Bishop Paul E, Martin, former episcopal leader of the Arkansas-Louisiana Area, as the presiding bishop for our Conference session today. The Conference stood and applauded in appreciation of Bishop Martin. Bishop Martin brought greetings from his wife, Mildred, and expressed appreciation for the privilege extended him to be back home.

Roll Call: Bishop Martin called on James E. Major, Secretary of the Conference, to perfect the roll. David Wilson, Darrel Smith, Donald Nolley and Therral Wilson were named as Tellers, and the roll was perfected.

Bar of the Conference: James E. Major moved that the bar of the Conference be the downstairs of the sanctuary, except the section to the far right. It was done.

R. E. L. Bearden noted that Maurice Webb has requested that he be excused from the Conference meeting today, as he is out of the city. It was granted.

Courtesy: John P. Miles asked that the members of the Southwest Conference come forward to be presented to the Conference: Reverend and Mrs. C. G. Tillman, Reverend and Mrs. G. S. Troupe, Reverend and Mrs. J. H. Oliver, Reverend and Mrs. C. C. Hall, Reverend G. W. Harper, Reverend Amos Womble, Reverend Wayne White, Mrs. Ida Bell Douglas, and Mrs. Lula Brown.

Welcome: J. Edward Dunlap, host pastor, extended the formal welcome to the Conference and announced the luncheon that has been prepared in Fellowship Hall between the sessions of the Conference.

Greetings: It was moved by E. Clifton Rule that greetings be extended to Bishop Galloway and the North Arkansas Conference, and that the Secretary of the Conference be asked to make this telephone call. It was seconded by Arthur Terry and passed.

Cabinet: Joe R. Phillips Jr., Chairman of the Cabinet, presented a progress report of the Conference. He named the committee to deal with the problems of merging the Conferences. Marshall T. Steel moved its adoption. John P. Miles questioned the function of the committee relative to the merger of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences. It was ruled that such merger with the North Arkansas Conference must have the approval of the Jurisdictional Conference. They were elected. Joe R. Phillips reported the work of the committee to review the Reconciliation Fund to be spent within our own Conference, as named by Bishop Galloway: forty per cent to Philander Smith College, twenty per cent to Aldersgate, twenty per cent to the districts in which funds are raised, and ten per cent to the contingency fund.

He further moved alterations in Journal prepartion necessitated by

the change in the fiscal year. John P. Miles spoke to the matter from the floor of the Conference. Ralph Hale asked about matters affecting Board monies. E. Clifton Rule noted that this might be a consideration of the change of annual conference. Question was called and the motion to adopt the full report as presented by Dr. Phillips was adopted. Bishop Martin spoke to the report and assured the Conference that the transition will be made with no injury to any board.

Headquarters Building: Carl Hall presented the report of the Commission. He moved that the invitation of First United Methodist Church, Little Rock, to house the Headquarters Building be accepted. C. Ray Hozendorf seconded the motion. Alvin C. Murray asked that those offices to be included and funds to defray rental costs be given. Dr. Phillips complied. John P. Miles inquired as to the tenure of the lease. O. D. Peters noted that TRAFCO will also be included. Harold K. Davis asked about the property given to the Commission by the Methodist Children's Home. Dr. Phillips said that the property had never been given. Harold D. Sadler noted that the Board of the Home had voted to deed the land. Arthur Terry said the transaction was never completed. Dick Merredith from Crossett also spoke to the report. Carl Hall read the current financial condition of the Commission, stating a current net balance of about \$40,000. Fred R. Harrison asked for clarification of our present lease. Robert Van Hook II moved that the matter of the Headquarters building be referred back to committee, that we might consider all the options at the regular session of the annual conference, with the provision that these options be presented the Pre-Conference Journal, in accord with Rule Nine of The Standing Rules. Harold D. Sadler seconded the motion. Robert Van Hook then spoke to the Conference concerning his motion to refer the matter back to committee, Ralph Mann spoke against the motion to refer. Edward B. Hollenbeck asked to speak against the referral. Norris Steele spoke in favor of the motion, then Bishop Martin allowed Edward B. Hollenbeek to speak against it. R. P. Meredith spokein favor of referral. C. Ray Hozendorf spoke against referral. Mr. English asked why a report was not given members of the Conference prior to the convening of the Conference. Dr. Phillips replied that the facts have been for some time in the hands of the District Superintendents for any interested person to study. Harold D. Sadler asked if a vault would be included in the Headquarters Building plan. Marshall Steel asked for permission to speak against the motion to refer. It was granted and he addressed the Conference. Stanley T. Baugh spoke in favor of building our own Headquarters Building. John P. Miles moved the question for everything that is before us. James E. Major read the motion to refer, so that the Conference might be clear on the matter before them. Clarification: C. Ray Hozendorf spoke to the Conference, saying that the land given by the Home to the Conference was under option to the University of Arkansas. Harold D. Sadler replied that the University failed to take up the option, so the Trustees of the Home are under no obligation. Thomas J. Nation, Ralph S. Mann and John P. Miles asked about voting privileges. Carr Dee Racop asked Bishop Martin to rule that approved supply ministers not be asked to vote. There was discussion on the the matter. John P. Miles moved that the Conference permit the approved supply pastors to vote. C. Ray Hozendorf seconded it. The vote was taken and the approved supply pastors were extended permission to vote on the matter. A standing vote on motion to refer was taken. For, one hundred seventy-seven, against, sixty-one. The motion prevails and the matter will be referred.

Greetings: Bishop Martin read a note of greeting from the North Arkansas Conference, stating that by unanimous standing vote the North Arkansas Conference looks forward to sharing a Headquarters Building with the Little Rock Conference at the First United Methodist Church, Little Rock.

Conference Trustees: Kenneth Goode presented Wendell Hoover, Secretary of the Trustees, who read the report of the Board. The Report Number One was adopted. Report Number Two was read. Harold D. Sadler spoke to the report, as did Reverend C. C. Hall. Marshall Steel moved that we refer Report Number Two to the regular session of the Conference. Joe R. Phillips, Jr. seconded the motion. Harold Sadler and Dr. Phillips spoke to the motion. The motion to refer carried. Report Number Three was presented to the Conference. Harold Sadler asked a question about the report. The report was adopted.

Pensions: George G. Meyer moved that \$1200.00 of pension money paid to retired ministers of the Little Rock Conference of The United Methodist Church shall be designated as housing allowance. It was done.

Board of Ministerial Training: George W. Martin had the Tellers distribute material to members of the Conference and addressed the Conference on new legislation relative to Associate Members of the Annual Conference. He moved the adoption of the report. It was seconded and passed. Thomas A. Abney, Registrar of the Board, recommended Alfred L. Chaffin for election to elders orders, He was so elected.

Conference Secretary: James E. Major moved that the Committee on Minutes be empowered to read and approve the minutes. It was done.

Ordination: Bishop Martin and the Cabinet led in the Service of Ordination of Alfred L. Chaffin to the office of Elder. The Conference stood in appreciation of this new Elder.

Appreciation: Bishop Martin expressed appreciation to Bishop Galloway for permitting him the privilege of leading in this ordination service. He also expressed appreciation to the Conference for receiving him so graciously.

Announcements: J. Edward Dunlap offered a message to Carl Hall. He then gave instructions for reaching the serving tables in Fellowship Hall for the luncheon. Bishop Martin reminded the Conference of the 1:30 P. M. meeting on Reconciliation and then led the Conference in the Doxology. After asking the Conference to express appreciation for Bishop Martin's service today by saying, "Amen", E. Clifton Rule gave the benediction.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORT

To Bishop Paul V. Galloway and members of the One Hundred Sixteenth session of The Little Rock Annual Conference:

The Conference Year now closing has seen our Conference move from a fiscal year corresponding to the Conference Year to one coinciding with the Calendar Year. This transition has resulted in an interim report of seven months. Although we have no basis for a comparison with a similar period, we do find the fiscal health of the Conference sound and the spiritual life vibrant.

We point to the following:

- 1. The Board of Evangelism has given dynamic leadership to two significant programs this year. First, The Mission to Members has brought about an organized effort to visit every United Methodist family in the Little Rock Conference. Secondly, The Lay Witness Movement has made a deep impression on the spiritual life of our people. Over twelve of these Missions have been conducted, and the fruit of the Missions mark this movement as one of the most life changing forces in the Church of our day.
- 2. The Bishops' Fund for Reconciliation continues to grow in acceptance. With a goal of \$175,000 for this movement, approximately \$161,000 has been committed to date. Growing out of this movement has been an increased sensitivity to our need for reconciliation at every level of human relationshipone to one; group to group; reconciliation with our neighbor afar off, and reconciliation with our brother near at hand; reconciliation one with another, and reconciliation of us all to God our Father.
- 3. As a result of the new and more flexible structure of the local church, we see in many places the emergence of new direction in service and witness; directions creative in nature and redemptive in spirit.

We pay tribute to the dedicated pastors of this Conference for their loyalty, concern and unremitting effort to see the work of the Kingdom done. It is with deep gratitude that we acknowledge the splendid leadership of the laity. This energy, vision, and commitment exemplifies Christian discipleship in its finest sense.

The members of the Cabinet, individually and collectively, express genuine appreciation to Bishop Paul V. Galloway for his brotherly leadership of the total effort of the Church. His concern for the persons under his pastoral care, both ministers and laymen, in the hallmark of his leadership.

To Mrs. Galloway we offer our deep respect for the unselfish gift of herself in every concern of the Church.

To each ministerial and lay member of the Conference we say, "Thank you for your faithful support and your unfailing care each for the other within the bond of Christian brotherhood."

- 7. That the editor and president/or secretary of the commission be impowered to borrow money needed for operation from the Union National Bank, Little Rock. (Form prescribed by the bank for this resolution was adopted by the commission at its annual
- 8. That we express our appreciation to Bishop Paul V. Galloway and Bishop Aubrey G. Walton and to the district superintendents of their areas for the leadership they have given in the Circulation Campaign. We note with appreciation that the district superintendents of the former Central Jurisdiction Annual conferences have promoted the paper this year. We would also underscore the work done by the pastors and laymen they have asked to help in this year's campaign. We would note that some of the most outstanding reports come from churches where laymen have worked unselfishly in soliciting subscriptions.

- 5. Conducted leadership training in four district workshops, Arkadelphia, Hope, Camden, and Pine Bluff, and one sub-district workshop in Malvern.

Executive Committee took action authorizing a) a statement, from the Board (in conjunction with the North Arkansas Conference Board) against proposed mixed drink legislation, which was a) a stateplaced on the legislator's desks; b) a questionaire to candidates regarding their position on gambling and mixed drinks; c) a fact sheet about alcohol to all members of the legislature and all Methodist Ministers in Arkansas; d) a letter promoting attendance at the Open Hearing for HB113 and HB125.

 The Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns makes the fol-

lowing recommendations:

- 1. We recommend and approve the Bishop's Fund for Reconciliation. We realize that financial assistance is but one manifestation of concern, and we support all efforts at stewardship of time and funds in meeting needs of persons and building bridges of reconciliation.
 - We urge support to Philander Smith College.
- 3. We recommend each local church subscribe to "Engage Magazine" for the Work Area Chairman of The Council on Ministries.
- 4. We urge every local church to follow the program of the Church as it is outlined in "The Interpreter" from month to month. We ask that the pastor give special attention to the program planning issue of the publication and make every provision in the church's calendar for the observance of Special Days of Christian Social Concerns. We request that special attention be given to the observance of World Order Sunday, Commitment Day, and Race Relations Sunday.
- 5. We recognize the value of the Methodist Social Creed and encourage its wide distribution across the conference.
- 6. We recommend that the churches of the Little Rock Conference make voluntary financial contributions to the Arkansas Release Guidance Foundation (The New Life House). There is also a need for food, clothing, and bedding, and we recommend that the churches help meet these needs.
- 7. In cooperation with the National Conference of the Methodist Youth Fellowship and the Little Rock Conference Board of Education we endorse the United Methodist Legislative Affairs Project for youth and agree to support the training of a Project Coordinator from the Little Rock Conference UMY in the amount of \$250.00.
- 8. We commend the churches and communities which have sponsored Project Misdemeanant and have used the project to strengthen their probation and rehabilitative services. We would hope that the project might be extended to other areas across the state.
- 9. We advocate attendance at the Christian Social Concerns Briefing Conference on Mt. Seguoyah July 18, 19 and 20. This Conference is for District Secretaries, Board Members, and Local Church Work Area Chairmen.
- 10. We pledge our support to the cabinet and the Inter-board Council in conducting district workshops to train our people in the program of the United Methodist Church as set-up by the General Conference.
- 11. Recognizing the moral decline in many picture shows we urge interested persons in the local church to survey the type of movies being shown in our communities and where possible take necessary steps to correct this trend.
- 12. Recognizing the educational value derived from the "Great Decisions" program being promoted across the state, we urge local churches to solicit the support of their memberships by organizing groups within their congregation.
- 13. We recommend support of the Christian Civic Foundation in its efforts to promote the cause of civic righteousness in the areas of alcohol and narcotics, gambling, and pornography.
- 14. We recognize the need of concern for the aged. We feel the local churches might well take into their future plan special emphasis and interest for these more experienced persons.

15. We recommend that the commission on World Service and Finance make a contribution of \$2,000 to the Tucker Prison Chapel Building Fund. This amount to be contributed from the Suspense Fund.

- 6. We pledge our support of District, Sub-District, and local efforts to present the cause of Christian Vocations.

cription of all effective church property, churches, parsonages, buildings and land by districts and counties with Record Book Number and Page where recorded. Such information is to be furnished by Local Trustees' reports.

For as much as the Twenty Eighth Street United Methodist Church ceases to be used as a place of divine worship; Therefore be it resolved that it be declared abandoned, and Conference Board of Trustees be authorized to make equitable disposition of said property.

The Union United Methodist Church in Union County has ceased to be used as a place of divine worship by a United Methodist Church, and upon recommendation of the District Superintendent of the Camden District; Be it therefore resolved that the property be declared abandoned by the Little Rock Annual Conference and such funds as are derived from the disposal of said property be given to Camden District Board of Mission to be used for church extension.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1 Conference Program

A New Church For A New World is not only the theme for this quadrennium but your Conference Board of Education is trying to help make it a reality. One of our major thrusts this conference year has been training leaders in Conference, District and Local churches so that they may understand the needs of this new world; and also the structure of our new United Methodist Church that will enable them to meet those needs. Our concern has not been education alone, but the whole Church with all its many varied ministries. We are trying to give such assistance that each local church may understand its unique situation; and through its Council on Ministries and its Administrative Board may make plans that will not only meet its needs, but will enable it to become a vital force in ministering to the world through Education, Evangelism, Missions, Christian Social Concerns, Christian Stewardship and all form of ministry.

We have often heard the statement, "Any organization of the Church will be as strong, or as weak, as its adult leadership." While there may be exceptions, in general this statement is true; so your Conference Board of Education is carefully studying its whole training program seeking ways that it may better train persons who will be equipped to give effective leadership in the local church, the district and the Conference. We are not primarily concerned with credits or records, but we hope to give adequate guidance to our leaders through the many kinds of training enterprises: Week-end Workshops, Laboratory Schools, Christian Workers Schools, Local Church Consultations and all forms of leadership training. The quality of teaching and of service will be our major concern.

Ministry with Children:

Under the leadership of our Conference Director of Children's Work, Mrs. John L. Tucker, special emphasis has been made this year on quality teaching, especially in churches with small membership. Miss Jennie Youngblood, a very capable resource leader of the General Board at Nashville, assisted Mrs. Tucker in a series of workshops on Churches with Small Membership. These workshops proved to be very effective.

Since music is a vital part of Christian education with children, special emphasis has been placed here this year, resulting in upgrading the quality of organized choirs for children, and in the formation of new ones. After much careful planning A Choir Festival was held March 9 at First United Methodist Church, Little Rock, with children's choirs and directors from twelve churches participating. The program was built around the church calendar year and consisted of hymns and anthems, interspersed with appropriate scriptures.

A Choir Camp for Elementary Children and Directors will be held

at Camp Tanako June 29 - July 1, 1969.

We encourage continued participation in the Annual Laboratory Enterprise for Leaders and Children which will be held at Camp Tanako June 16-20. We also recommend that the Conference Board of Education provide scholarships for one minister from each district to be selected by the District Superintendent. This minister will then work closely with conference and district coordinators; and will serve as a liaison person to the ministers in the district.

Ministry with Youth:

A thorough job of preparing our churches for the new youth material was accomplished under the leadership of our Conference Director of Youth, the Reverend F. Gladwin Connell. The response to these new curriculum resources has been favorable in the majority of our Church Schools. Beginning this summer these new materials will be used in all phases of our youth ministry.

We recommend a thorough study be made of our camping program to determine if our present groupings are the most effective means of reaching persons for Christ through the camping ministry of our Conference.

Ministry with Young Adults:

We are grateful that many of our local churches are placing young adults in positions of leadership; and we sincerely hope that this present trend will continue.

We encourage our local churches to have representatives at the Annual Young Adult Conference June 20 - 22 at Camp Tanako. The program this year will be "Lay Witness Mission." We also encourage our churches to share generously in the expense of these young adults so that more of them can attend.

Ministry with Adults:

We are grateful for the new adult literature, Foundation Studies in Christian Faith. While many adult classes prefer to continue the time-honored International Lesson Series, hundreds of classes are finding the new adult literature interesting, exciting and challenging. Perhaps more serious study is going on in adult classes, with more persons involved, than ever before in the history of our Conference. We will make careful preparation for the next adult series, The Christian Faith in Life Series, which will begin in September, 1969.

We wish to commend most highly Colonel Claude E. Haswell, Conference Director of Adults, for his fine leadership; and especially for his excellent Lesson Plan which not only appears weekly in The Arkansas Methodist, but is now being used by persons in many different states.

Ministry with Families:

We rejoice that the importance of the family is being recognized more and more in Methodism. The coordinator for Family on the Council of Ministries offers a unique opportunity for service to families. Special attention will be given next year to all age-level coordinators; and under the leadership of Mr. and Mrs. Winston Faulkner we hope to have the most effective family life program in local churches we have ever had.

Finances:

The Conference Board of Education requests the World Service Commission to continue the same apportionment granted in 1968-1969, \$4,270.00, and to set \$9,000.00 as a goal for the Christian Education Day offering.

The Staff:

We wish to name Mrs. John L. Tucker, Director of Children's Work; and Colonel Claude E. Haswell, as volunteer Director of Adult Work. We also request that the Executive Secretary of the Interboard Council also serve as Executive Secretary of the Board of Education; and that the Associate Secretary of the Interboard Council serve as Conference Director of Youth Work and as Conference Director of Young Adult Work.

Ministry with Youth:

We, the Little Rock Conference Council on Youth Ministry, recommend to the Board of Education of the Little Rock Conference that a study be made concerning the structure and organization of the Youth Ministry beyond the local church. We further recommend that the committee be composed of the following: Two District Superintendents, one Interboard representative, two Board of Education respresentatives, two District Directors of Youth Ministry, one youth from each district, and the President of the Little Rock Conference United Methodist Youth Fellowship.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

For the 1970 calendar year we recommend that the following program be implemented in the Little Rock Conference.

- 1. That the Conference Board provide for each pastor a Planbook of Local Church Evangelistic Opportunities. This will be an effort in "Breakthrough Evangelism for 1970" and will make available for our people what is happening across the church in the area of evangelism. It will conform to the new structure and will include a suggested agenda for monthly meetings, responsibilities of the Work Area Chairman and special committees, the present needs and future goals of the local church, an "idea" sheet for implementing goals found in the six areas of evangelistic concern (Finding People, Witnessing, Increasing Attendance, Care of Membership, Deepened Spiritual Life, and Keeping Membership Rolls), year round and long range planning in evangelism guidance material and resources available from Tidings, sources of program helps from the General Board, and a copy of our Conference Recommendations for 1970.
- 2. That a Lay Witness Council be established in our conference to aid churches desiring to deepen their spiritual life by having a Lay Witness Mission. We highly recommend this as one of the most dynamic movements in the United Methodist Church today and suggest that any church interested contact Dr. A. Clark Stancil (14 Pine Manor Dr., Little Rock, phone MOhawk 3-6153) who will serve as Chairman of this Council. Additional information may be obtained from Dr. Walter Albritton, head of the Department of Koinonia Ministries at the General Board of Evangelism in Nashville, Tennessee.
- 3. That any church planning a series of preaching services carefully consider the New Life concept which involves a two-month period of preparation for local church renewal. A New Life Mission is the result of many hours of action and research by the Department of New Life Ministries of the General Board over the past nine years. These Missions are closely tied to the local church through preparation, proclamation and penetration, and help prepare, equip and motivate churches for mission in today's world. Persons interested should write to Dr. David Randolph, head of the Department of New Life Ministries, 1908 Grand Avenue, Nashville, Tennessee, 37203.
- 4. That where community patterns permit, the United Methodist Church of the Little Rock Annual Conference take the intiative in instituting an ecumenical focus on community evangelism. This may take the form of study groups across denominational lines, planned meetings with such components of community life as Service Clubs, Professional Groups, Mental Health and Family Services, Law Enforcement Agencies, etc. and in some instances an Ecumenical Proclamation of the Word.
- 5. That our Board provide a \$100.00 scholarship each year for one young minister and his wife to attend the Christmas Conference, and that they be selected by the Executive Committee and the Cabinet Representative to the Board of Evangelism.
- 6. That our local churches be encourgaed to institute small groups of members which may be used as working units to discuss such questions as the real mission of the church, evangelism, how I can serve as an agent of reconciliation and many other vital issues that concern both pastor and people. These small groups may be brought together for prayer, study, witness, sharing, fellowship, and action. Further information about such groups may be secured from the Department of Koinonia Ministries of the General Board.
- 7. Finally, we call upon our pastors and laymen to plan and carry through new, creative and resourceful ways of serving Christ and human need within the church and world by taking advantage of the many opportunities to express our faith in Christ. We seek to make 1970 a year of "Breakthrough Evangelism" in the Little Rock Conference.

DBP - Death Benefit Program

The Average Salary for the Little Rock Conference for the Calendar Year 1970 cannot be obtained from the General Board of Pensions at this time.

The Average Salary for the 7 months' period of June 1st, 1969 through December 31st, 1969 is \$6,403.00. Since the DBP Contribution is 2% of this, it amounts to \$74.70 for this period of time. The Individual pays 40% or \$29.88, and the Church or Agency pays 60% or \$44.82.

The amount for 1970 Contribution may be figured on this basis, but

for a full twelve months.

Recently the General Board of Pensions increased by 20% the amount of Educational Benefits. The Little Rock Conference amount then is \$1,440.00 per year per child for each of four college years.

The listing on Benefits by Age is at the end of this report.

Hospitalization

For clarification of terms, we will use "Over 65" and "Under 65" Groups rather than Retired, etc.

Hospital Insurance claims were quite high for the "Under 65" Group for the 7 months of 1968. The usual payment to the Insurance Company had to be supplemented by funds other than the premiums.

Part I - Under 65

Due to the rising costs for hospitalization, New Benefits will be put into effect, which are as follows:

New Effective Rate:

\$25.00 per day Room Rate, rather than \$20.00 \$500.00 Miscellaneous charges, rather than \$400.00 \$250.00 Maternity, rather than \$200.00

For these Benefits there will be a slight increase in cost, which will be as follows:

The hospital coverage will then be:

\$300.00 Surgery Schedule, or \$ 5.00 per day Medical Service \$ 25.00 deductible each entry

\$250.00 Maternity for Hospital

Effective Date: July 1st, 1969.

The clause "coordinated benefits" will continue to be in use for all persons under the hospitalization coverage. The deductible does not apply to maternity claims and minor accidents, however.

A Reduction in premiums paid by Effective Ministers and Lay Persons, who are part of the "Over 65" Group, wll be lowered to that of the rest of the Group, beginning July 1st, 1969.

Arrangements have been made for coverage for Young People in a

family contract, from 19-23 years of age, while in full-time attendance at

an accredited school or college, and unmarried.

Note: There are extended Maternity Benefits for the Insured, and Benefits which can be obtained for the Dependents, if it is done within thirty days of termination in the Conference. Notify Mrs. Averitt.

Transfers

Transfers can be made into the North Arkansas Conference at conference time, or at any quarterly anniversary date. Call Mrs. Averitt in order that coverage will not be discontinued before then.

Part II — Over 65

Increased Benefits: The Insurance Company will pay
1. \$50.00 deductible plus 80% thereafter for drugs and medicines outside of hospital, but requiring prescription.

2. 80% of the charges for Registered Nurses or Licensed Practical Nurses while in the Hospital.

3. After \$25 deductible per year per person, then 80% of charges for Registered Nurses or Licensed Practical Nurses at home.

The Premium for the Supplemental Coverage offered to the Retired Men and their Wives, and to the Widows, will remain the same.

The Little Rock Conference Board of Pensions will continue to pay

one-half of the premium for these persons.

Due to the excellent experience with the Retired Men and Widows in their hospitalization coverage for the seven months (from June 1, 1968) through December 31, 1968), the vote was that a fifty percent Dividend of the premiums for this period be returned to them. This Dividend to be paid by check to each person.

A check for the amount of interest on Reserves for the 7 months of 1968 was donated to the Little Rock Conference Board of Pensions

THE LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE INTERBOARD COUNCIL

We rejoice in our United Methodist Church with its new organization and program, emphasizing flexibility and initiative on the part of each local congregation. We also rejoice that this same flexibility and local initiative is expected of the annual conference program.

In the last two years much progress has been made through the Little Rock Conference Interboard Council. Its organization makes possible coordination and cooperation among all the boards and agencies. Perhaps it is remarkable that this structure adopted by the Little Rock Conference so nearly corresponds with that which was adopted for every Annual Conference Program Council by the last General Conference. The differences are very slight and minor.

In order to bring our Little Rock Conference structure in conformity with the provisions of the Annual Conference Program Council as outlined in the 1968 Discipline, and in harmony with the structure of our sister Conference in the Arkansas Area, we make the following recommendations from our Executive Committee:

- I. The name of the Conference organization shall be "Little Rock Conference Program Council."
- II. Membership shall include:
 - 1. The presiding Bishop, who shall serve as Chairman 2. The District Superintendents

 - 3. The Chairman and executive officers of the following Conference Boards, Commissions or Committees

Boards: Christian Social Concerns, Deaconesses, Education, Evangelism, Health and Welfare (Hospitals and Homes), Laity (Lay Activities), Ministries (Ministeral Training), Missions, Pensions, and Trustees of Annual Conference.

Commissions: Achives and History, Ecumenical Affairs, Enlistment for Church Occupations (Christian Vocations), Minimum Salary, World Service and Finance (Chairman, Secretary without vote), and worship.

Committees: Group Insurance and Publishing Interests

4. The Conference Secretary

- 5. Conference Treasurer (without vote)6. Two representatives of Conference Youth organization (President and one other representative chosen by the Youth Council)
- 7. Two representatives of Conference Women's Society of Christian Service (President and Chairman of Program Area on Missionary Education)

8. The Conference Lav Leader

9. One layman from each District (named by the Cabinet)

- 10. Additional members of the Annual Conference (One member, clerical or lay, from each District named by the District Superintendent.)
- 11. Conference Secretary of Evangelism, Conference Missionary Secretary, President of the Methodist Foundation, Conference Director of Education

12. Salaried and Volunteer Annual Conference and Area Staff

(without vote)

13. Area leaders as follows: Editor of The Arkansas Methodist, President of Hendrix College, Superintendent of Methodist Children's Home

14. The Program Council Director (without vote)

- 15. The Program Council Associate Directors (without vote)
- III. Officers: Chairman, the presiding Bishop, Vice Chairman, Secretary, Treasurer (The Area Treasurer shall serve in this capacity)
- IV. Tenure The officers shall be elected annually.

V. Executive Committee shall be composed of:

1. The officers of the Council. At the direction of the Bishop, the vice chairman may serve as Chairman of the Executive Committee.

2. Two District Superintendents chosen by the Cabinet.

3. The Chairman of the following Conference Boards Education, Evangelism, Missions, Christian Social Concerns, Laity

4. Director and Associate Directors (without vote)

 Additional nominations may be made to bring the member-ship of the Executive Committee to one-half laity and onehalf clergy.

VI. Mandatory Committees

1. Committee on Interpretation

Committee on Television, Radio and Film Communications
 Committee on Publishing Interests

VII. Optional Committees

1. Committee on Research and Planning

2. Other Committees as needed may be organized. (The Executive Committee shall be charged with the responsibility of program coordination.)

VIII. Functions (Discipline 841; Paragraphs 1 - 11)

- 1. "To study the mission of the Annual Conference and the local churches of the conference and to determine program emphases which will assist the conference and the local churches to perform their mission.
- 2. To describe, coordinate and organize opportunities to serve within the mission.
- 3. To receive program recommendations from the local churches, the district and annual conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Program Councils; to evaluate these recommendations; and to formulate a coordinated conference program to be presented to the Annual Conference for consideration.

- Develop and distribute a Conference Calendar.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

Among them were the messages given by one of our favorite Laymen, Dr. Harry Denman. An unusual and deeply appreciated message was brought by a young Layman from Hope District, namely, Jimmy Turner, a student at Hendrix College. He related some of his experiences in working in Ghettos in in Indianapolis and Chicago. This was indeed a revelation in many ways. Jimmy has been in demand as a speaker for many groups and local observations in the his table to the Assemble. churches since his talk to the Assembly.

Preparations are under way for the 1969 Assembly on September 6 and 7. Kenneth Ross, the Registrar for the National Conference of Methodist Men to be held at Purdue University, is untiring in his efforts to make certain we have as many as 80 registrations cleared before the

registrations close for the 1969 Conference.

At the request of the General Board of Lay Activities, a Conference Director of Lay Life and Work, and a Conference Director of Methodist Men are being appointed. These Laymen will be thoroughly trained and well qualified to direct the work on the District and Local Church level. Workshops for each District are being arranged under the direction of these Laymen. If our Church is to go forward and become worthy of the title, "A New Church in a New World," it must begin with the local Church. We solicit your interest and determination to make this the most successful year of Methodism in our Conference.

Recommendations for workshops are: as soon after Annual Conference as feasible, a meeting in each District to be held on Saturdays; two teams working simultaneously, hence, completing the assignment in three weekends. No workshop will be conducted on the weekend of July 12-13 to avoid a conflict with the Conference at Purdue.

The Annual Luncheon for Lay Delegates to the Annual Conference is set up for Wednesday, May 21. We are anticipating a fine Conference and District Meetings to follow.

COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS

Your Committee on Memoirs has two primary functions. First, this Committee selects the preacher to bring the Commemoration Message at Annual Conference, and presents this service to the Annual Conference

We try to select as the preacher, men of the Conference who know the membership of the Conference, and are able to represent the Methodist Ministry.

We also try to select men of preaching ability in order to make this service an outstanding part of our Annual Conference session. In a real sense this is the "key note" service of the Annual Conference. Our preacher for the 1969 session is Dr. Marshall Steel.

Our second task is to have written a Memoir for every deceased minister, minister's wife, and widow of a preacher. These Memoirs are printed in the Conference Journal.

The Conference Standing Rules state what is to be included in a Memoir: "Date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, name of children, charges served and place of burial." Follow these instructions and save having a Memoir returned for correction. Three copies of all memoirs are to be furnished.

Memoirs should be written not later than sixty days after death occurs. Send Memoir to Reverend Carr Dee Racop, Jr., P. O. Box 15, Portland, Arkansas.

THE METHODIST FOUNDATION OF ARKANSAS

June 1, 1968 - June 1, 1969

During the past twelve months the Executive Director (1) worked with and cultivated ten people regarding Deferred Gifts, three of whom have made gifts, one a deferred gift of \$5,000, another a gift of four store buildings, and the third, a gift of one store building. (All buildings located in Stuttgart. We have three appraisals on the five buildings, the lowest being \$92,250, another \$100,000, and the highest \$111,000. The Foundation's financial statement (attached) conservatively lists the buildings at \$80,000. The donors are to receive a lifetime income from these gifts), (2) talked with three people about sizable outright gifts, (3) counselled with eleven people about wills (one new executed copy of a will has been added to those in our files), (4) preached fifty sermons on "The Stewardship of Accumulated Possessions" and "The Importance of Making A Will," presented the Foundation's program to a local church ladies' group, a men's group, and four district preachers' meetings. (5) The Director has also discovered eight additional wills of which he had no previous knowledge. (6) He has visited in the home or office of fourteen of the twenty-two Directors of the Foundation. (7) The Foundation office has sent out five mailings to each Director, (8) Christmas and birthday cards and many personal letters to our donors and prospects, (9) has kept a prospect file and file on all donors. (Every effort is made to keep these files to date, and several names have been added.) (10) The Director always tries to contact, or have an informal visit with, donors, when he is in their hometown. (11) The Arkansas Methodist has run an ad for us on numerous occasions, without charge, and has printed four interesting feature articles. (12) The Executive Director attended the American Academy of Fund-Raising Science, and the annual meeting of the National Association of United Methodist Foundations, at his own expense.

Memorials Program

A beautiful memorial altar will be placed in the Methodist Headquarters Building, or in the office of The Methodist Foundation of Arkansas. It will hold nine Books of Remembrance, one open on the altar, eight inside the glass case in the base. Each book will have space for about 4800 names. Each line will show the one memorialized, date of death, and name of donor. We propose memorial gifts of five dollars each.

There will be a Methodist Foundation of Arkansas Memorials Fund in the name of each Conference, which will be invested. The annual earnings, less expense of handling, will be given to the beneficiary named in each Conference. Eventually the principal accumulated may be given to the named beneficiary, or kept at work for the beneficiary, according to the desires of said beneficiary and/or agreements between the Foundation Board of Directors and the beneficiary. Should the beneficiary elect to receive cash, a new beneficiary will be named.

We will ask that each donor make his contribution through his local church, which will forward it to the Foundation. Each gift will be credited to the Conference and church through which it is sent. A column in the Journals of the Annual Conferences will be requested so that each church may be credited with the total contributions made each year.

The Foundation will mail an acknowledgement to the family of the one memorialized and to the donor. It will also acknowledge the total gifts from each church, and send a composite report to each District Superintendent, and to the Conference Beneficiary's Treasurer.

We propose that the program be presented to each annual conference by the Beneficiary Group named, for official approval. We recommend that two pieces of promotional material be created. Mr. William D. Leavitt, President of the Leavitt Agency, has agreed to create and produce these materials at the actual cost, plus a normal fee for his services. This service fee will be refunded to the Foundation and returned to the Beneficiary paying for the promotional matertials and services.

The first of these materials will be twelve copies of a five-minute color sound filmstrip for each conference. While the filmstrips for each conference will be basically the same, they will differ in persons and voices related to each conference. One copy of each will be placed with each District Superintendent. Each minister will be asked to show the filmstrip to his congregation on some Sunday when large attendance is expected, also to show the film to the various groups meeting in his church.

The second piece of promotional material will be one hundred thousand letter-size, four-color folders to be mailed by the local church to each family on its mailing list. This should be accompanied by a brief letter from the pastor, appealing for support of the program by the members.

We propose that the beneficiary groups challenge the conferences with this goal: "Every Methodist make at least one memorial gift, or more, to the Foundation each year." With this as a goal, we hope to achieve at least 25%-30% participation. With 30% of our 184,000 Methodists supporting this program, we could easily raise \$267,000 each year. This voluntary memorial gift should not place a strain on anyone, and should be easily accomplished with a good promotional program and the support of the Bishop, his Cabinet, our lay leaders and every local pastor. Once begun, it should gain in momentum with a little extra promotion on "Retired Ministers Sunday" each year.

On April 16, 1969, the Foundation's Board of Directors named the Boards of Pensions of the two Annual Conferences the Beneficiaries of this Memorial Fund Program.

Finances

The Foundation reports its assets at \$117,061.07, with no current liabilities. Our income from the assets exceeds our annuity commitments, thus conserving one hundred percent of its assets for use by the church at a future date, plus small additional earnings to be added to the total assets at regular intervals.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY

Organization

The Commission on Minimum Salary shall be composed of one minister and one layman from each District of the Annual Conference. They shall be nominated by the Cabinet and elected by the Annual Conference, quadrennially. Vacancies shall be filled by the same procedure. The Bishop is requested to appoint one representative from his Cabinet, annually. The Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission shall be an ex-officio member of the Commission and administrative officer.

The Commission shall elect quadrennially a chairman, vice chairman, and secretary who, together with the Secretary of the Town and Country Commission and the Cabinet representative, shall compose the executive committee. Vacancies in offices shall be filled by the Commission from its elective membership.

The Commission shall meet as often as is required to do its work, and may consign certain responsibilities to the executive committee.

Purpose

The purpose of the Minimum Salary Program is to:

- 1. Assist charges to pay their pastor the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference.
- 2. Challenge and enable charges to become self-sustaining. This is not to be thought of, or used, as a continuing mission support.

Finances

Funds for the purpose of the Commission shall be raised by an apportionment annually, to all churches of the Annual Conference of an amount equal to 3% of the base salary paid the pastor.

The Program

1. Charges are eligible to receive Minimum Salary Assistance whose combined pastoral support (base salary, travel, and utilities) is less than the minimum set by the Annual Conference, provided that:

(a) The pastor preaches a minimum of three times per Sunday; is resident full time or a Student Approved Supply.
(b) Each church conducts an Every Member Visitation annually acceptable to the Town and Country Commission, the District Superintendent, and the Commission on Minimum Salary.

(c) The charge agrees to increase ministerial support annually,

moving toward assuming full support.

(d) Each church pays all prorated claims and percentages to the Conference and District Treasurers annually.

- 2. Application for assistance shall be made annually through the District Superintendent on a form provided by the Commission.
- 3. The Minimum Salary for this year shall be:

\$4500.00 (a) Resident, full time

4000.00 (b) Student Approved Supply, married

3000.00 (c) Student Approved Supply, single

Provided that:

- (d) For each dependent child under 18, or for each child in college under 24, a pastor on Minimum Salary shall receive an additional \$100.00 per year.
- (e) On Minimum Salary charges of more than three churches, a pastor shall receive an additional \$100.00 for each church above three that pays \$300.00 or more total pastoral support.
- (f) The pastor's part of Death Benefit and Hospital Insurance premium in the Conference Group Insurance Program shall be paid by the Minimum Salary Commission for Student Approved Supply Pastors serving charges receiving Minimum Salary Assistance.

Provided further that:

- (g) These funds, together with educational fund, pension, Conference and District Boards of Mission aid, shall be exempt in computing Minimum Salary.
- (h) The charge shall agree to move toward absorbing child de-pendency and extra church exemption as soon as possible after reaching self support.
- 4. The maximum amount of assistance a charge may receive from the Minimum Salary Commission, exclusive of child dependency and extra church bonus, shall be \$900.00 per year.
- 5. In the event of insufficient funds to meet all claims, each charge shall share proportionately from the funds available.

6. The report of this Commission in the Conference Journal each year shall include a list of charges receiving Minimum Salary aid, and the amount received.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE BOARD OF MINISTRY

Policy and Program

- I. The Little Rock Conference Board of Ministry porposes to work strictly within the framework of the current Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church.
- II. The elected officers of the Board are: Chairman, Vice Chairman, Secretary, and Registrar.
- III. The Executive Committee of the Board are the elected officers. They shall have authority in matters committed to them by the Board.
- IV. The Board shall meet prior to the opening of school, at Annual Conference, and on call of the chairman.
 - V. The Board's sources of income shall be:
 - A. A percentage from Conference Benevolences.
 - B. A special offering in November for ministerial training.
 - C. Gifts, bequests and interests.
- VI. The Board shall maintain a scholarship loan program for ministerial training as follows:
 - A. For those in course of study above the level of license to

 - 1. Assistance in courses of study schools
 (a) The cost of required text books for each year of the course of study. The enrollees are required to submit to the registrar itemized statements or itemized invoices from Cokesbury for books purchased for use in the pastor's school courses.
 - (b) One round trip per term at 8¢ per mile 2. Assistance in the correspondence course
 - - (a) Payment of fees
 - (b) The cost of required text books for each year of the course of study. The enrollees are to purchase the required books in their own name, to pay for them or have them charged to their own account, and then be

re-imbursed by the registrar.

Above assistance repayable: Maximum received in any one year, by one year of service as a full time pastor, either as a ministerial member of the Annual Conference or a full time

lay pastor.

B. For students from Little Rock Conference churches preparing for the effective ministry in The United Methodist Church and enrolled in a college, university or seminary, approved by University Senate of The United Methodist Church and who:

1. Hold a current license to preach in The United Methodist Church, or are probationary members of the Little Rock Annual Conference, or those students who present to the Conference Board of Ministry, for one year only, in writing, a recommendation from the District Board of Ministry.

2. Make application annually to the registrar of the Board prior to September 1, giving all information requested and authorizing regular grade reports to this Board registrar from the school registrar, and a transcript of credits at the end of each semester. Application must be requested.

3. Make a note, properly endorsed, and payable in one of two

ways:

(a) One full year of service as an effective minister in The United Methodist Church repaying the maximum re-

ceivable any one year:

(b) In cash with interest at 4% annum, beginning at the time the recipient terminated his ministry or preparation therefor: schedule of payments to be arranged with the Board's registrar.

4. Summer session loans will be granted to one-half the maxi-

mum annual allowance.

VII. The Board may set a maximum amount of assistance per year per recipient, but assistence will be determined for each individual on the basis of requirements.

VIII. The Board shall give assistance in a reasonable amount for physical examinations for men to be admitted as associate, probationary,

or full members.

REQUESTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

I. The Board, each district superintendent, pastor and local church to hold up to young men the need for ministers and the challenge of the ministry, that may enable them to hear the call.

II. As the first step into the ministry, enrolling for studies for license to preach with the Department of Ministerial Education of the General

Board of Education.

III. Each Pastor to provide himself with folders on the course of study and with the book for the course on the license to preach.

IV. That when a person has passed the correspondence work on studies for license to preach, or has completed one-fourth of the work for a B. D. Degree in an approved seminary, and in the judgment of the District Committee on Ministry his gifts and graces commend him for the ministry, the Committee license him to preach, subject to the approval of their action and renewal of this license by the District Conference.

V. Wherever possible, men in the course of study shall take their work through the courses of study schools.

VI. We assume our Conference's share of financial responsibility for the Arkansas Pastor's School.

VII. The Conference Commission on World Service and Finance to grant:

A. An appropriation of 4% from Conference Benevolences. The authorization of a special offering on the third Sunday in November for ministerial training.

VIII. We express our appreciation for the support given the ministerial training scholarship loan program by the churches of the Conference. In view of our increased load we require a substantial increase this year.

IX. We recommend that the Little Rock Conference cooperate with the jurisdictional and general church programs of ministerial education in the following ways:

A. That local churches set the goal of a full 1% of the current budget, excluding building, improvement and debt service for the fiscal year 1969, cooperating with the jurisdictional seminary assistance program.

B. That full cooperation and support be given to the Ministerial Education Fund of the general church, beginning with the fiscal year 1970. We urge all local churches to accept their full askings for the support of ministerial education.

C. That in 1969 the fund for ministerial education be promoted through the regular November special offering for ministerial

education.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

The United Methodist Emphasis this Quadrennium is "A New Church for a New World". The Board of Missions recommends the following means for each local church to fulfill its mission in the world.

A Church in Mission Will Be a Church With the Word.

Each local church Council on Ministries will plan for a church-wide Mission Study using one of the two recommended themes for 1969-1970: "Reconcilation in a Broken World" or "Toward Understanding China and the Chinese People". Each church should provide materials that educate her members to be "in Mission" and the yearly program should include at least one missionary speaker to the entire congregation. It is recommended that the Pastor preach on this theme bringing to the local church the Biblical basis of "Mission".

A Church in Mission Will be a Church at Work.

We recommend that each church elect a Chairman of Missions and that this person become an active member of the Council on Ministries and the Administrative Board.

The Council on Ministries will appoint a Task Group on Missions Studies and will seek to involve the membership in a regular program of study and service. Each church can be at work in supporting World Service and Conference Benevolences and become a direct participant in Mission through National Advance Specials, Missionary Support Projects and Special Advance opportunities.

A Church in Mission Will be a Church in the World.

We recommend that each church support the "Fund For Reconciliation" and be informed of its use. The Council on Ministries will inquire into the greatest unmet need in the community and recommend steps to meet it. The Church will be in the World, as individual members recognize that each is "in Mission" every day wherever he is. Each church can support a World Mission Project through a General Advance Special and correspond with a World Division Missionary.

The following District Missionary Secretaries are available to provide council and information for the local church: **Arkadelphia**: Rev. Woodrow W. Smith, **Camden**: Dr. Alvin C. Murray, **Hope**: Rev. Pryor R. Cruce, **Little Rock**: Rev. Palmer Garner, **Monticello**: Rev. Ed Matthews, **Pine Bluff**: Rev. George Tanner.

Conference Program

We recommend the following be included in the Conference Program:

- 1. That we co-operate in the Co-operative Inter-Conference School of Christian Mission, July 23-25 at Hendrix College and encourage attendance by both Pastors and laymen.
- 2. That a Fall Mission Study Conference be held in each District to train local church leaders for presenting the Church-Wide Mission Studies.
- 3. That a week be set aside as Indian Mission Week and that six Pastors from the Indian Mission Conference in Oklahoma itinerate the six Districts as scheduled by the District Secretaries.

We are happy to report the organization of a New Church in the Little Rock District in the Pleasant Valley area of the city of Little Rock. The church was organized under the direction of an organizing pastor as part of the program of the Department of New Church Development of the General Board of Missions. The able and dedicated pastor assigned to this project was the Rev. Charles A. Nowlen. We recommend to District Missionary Societies the consideration of this approach in the establishment of new churches.

Requests: The following requests are made of the Commission on World Service and Finance for 1970.

- 1. The amount of \$29,000 to the Board of Missions for our Conference Program which includes Mission Salary Aid and church extension.
- 2. The amount of \$20,000.00 to be allocated to the six districts for Special Extension, re-location and mergers.
- 3. That the following amounts be allocated to the districts for National Advance Specials:
 - (a) Spanish Speaking Work
 \$7,000.00

 (b) Oklahoma Indian Mission
 11,000.00

 (c) Negro Work
 1,260.00

 (d) Lydia Patterson
 7,000.00
- 4. We recommend that Camp Aldersgate be designated as a Conference Advance Special and our churches be urged to support the camp.

Policy For The Use Of Church Extension Funds

- 1. An amount equal to one-third of the money received by the Board of Missions from Conference Benevolences is placed in a fund for church extension purposes.
- 2. Churches may apply for donations from this fund for the purpose of erecting and completing church buildings, educational facilities and fellowship halls; for remodeling programs and for other Church Extension uses. Applications may be made for donations for parsonage projects but church building needs will be given priority.
- 3. Application may be made for any amount up to \$1,000 for one project.
- 4. Application blanks may be secured from the Secretary of the Board of Missions and are to be returned to him after completion. Dr. Alvin C. Murray, 201 S. Hill, El Dorado, Ark. 71730.
- 5. A Committee on Donations will consider the applications and present to the Board their recommendation. Applications may be approved, referred to the Special Church Extension Committee, or denied. The amount of the donation may be adjusted by the committee from the original amount requested.

- The Committee will present its recommendations to the regular meetings of the Board of Missions at the fall, mid-year and Annual Conference meetings of the Board. The Executive Committee may act upon applications in emergency situations.
- 7. Approved applications will be kept on file for three years from the date of application and if funds are not requested in that period, the approved money will be released and a new application required.

POLICY FOR THE USE OF SPECIAL CHURCH EXTENSION FUNDS OF THE LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE

- The Special Church Extension funds shall be administrated by the Special Church Extension Committee of the Board of Missions. This committee has the authority to recommend to the Board approval, adjustment, or rejection of applications. Final approval of these grants must be made by the Conference Board of Missions or the executive committee of the Board.
- II. This fund is for the purpose of:
 - 1. Building new churches

2. Purchasing new sites

- 3. Purchasing Mobile Chapel units Merger or relocating of churches.
- III. The disbursing of Conference funds allocated to special church extension purposes shall be disbursed on the following basis: A properly completed application form must be submitted to the committee before any funds can be granted. The application forms will be available from the church extension secretary of the Boards of Missions. Funds requested shall be approved by the District Missionary Society and the District Superintendent. Newly organized churches may apply for a maximum of \$10,000.00 to apply on the building of their first unit. Churches merging or relocating may apply for a maximum of Existing churches in areas of increasing population at the edge of

urban areas may make application for an amount not to exceed \$2,000.00.

- A District Board of Missions may apply for an amount not to exceed \$2,500.00 toward the purchase of a new site. The Conference Board of Missions recommends that sites be purchased by the District Board of Missions, freeing these funds for the construction of the first unit.
- IV. Expenses of moving Mobile Chapel Units: The Church completing the use of the Mobile Chapel will be responsible for dismantling it and preparing it for moving. The Church receiving the use of the Unit shall bear the expense of moving and of re-assembling the Unit.
- The church extension secretary of the Board of Missions will be responsible for investigating the requests.

Qualifications For Mission Salary Aid

It should be kept in mind that Mission Salary Aid from our Conference Board of Missions is from a Mission Board. The primary purpose of our salary aid is (1) to help new church situations get established and self-supporting, (2) to aid in a continuing ministry to smaller churches and circuits (mostly rural), which are unable to pay a living wage to their pastor. With this purpose in mind the following points are established as qualifications governing the use of Mission Salary Aid.

1. Aid to new churches will be on a year to year basis, however, it will be understood that when a new church receives aid it will be on a decreasing basis each year and all aid will cease completely at the end of the fourth year. Exceptions to this rule will be by $\frac{3}{3}$ vote of the entire Board.

- 2. Salary Aid will not be given in any situation in which the pastor's total income is \$6,000.00 or above. Newly organized churches served by a pastor of an established church, paying \$6,000.00 or above, may not receive salary aid.
- 3. Salary Aid will not be given to any church or charge which does not conduct an Every Member Visitation yearly and give evidence of such to the Board.
- 4. Salary Aid request from District Superintendents will be given consideration ONLY if the request has been made in writing on the proper form to the Chairman of the Committee on Salary Aid.
- 5. In established churches or charges where continuing salary aid is necessary, the District Superintendent will be requested to use every means at his disposal to merge or combine churches or circuits in order to decrease Salary Aid.
- 6. Priority will be given to newly established churches from available funds of the Salary Aid.
- 7. The maximum amount of salary aid given in any situation for any one year shall be \$1,200.00. Exceptions to this rule will be by % vote of the entire Board.
- 8. In case of an urgent request for salary aid, between meetings of the entire Board, the Executive Committee is empowered to act on such request in accordance with these rules.
- 9. These rules may be rescinded, amended, or changed in any way at any meeting of the entire board by a 3 vote of the entire Board.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

A. DISTRIBUTION

Fulfilling our responsibility as the Conference Board of Pensions

we have authorized the payment for claims as follows:

To 44 members retired by the Little Rock Annual Conference with a total of 1290.50 years of approved service.

To 41 former members retired by other conferences with a total of 336.50 years of approved service.

To 50 widows of former members retired by the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 1,143.25 years of approved service.

To 37 widows of former members retired by other annual conferences whose pensions are based on a total of 246.75 years of service.

To 6 dependent children of deceased ministers retired by the Little Rock Conference and by other conferences whose pensions are based on a total of 151.25 years of approved supply service.

To 12 Approved Supply Pastors of the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 189.50 years of approved supply service. To 2 Approved Supply Pastors retired by other conferences with 7.75

To 8 widows of Approved Supply Pastors of the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 134 years of approved service.

To 3 dependent children of deceased Approved Supply Pastors whose

pensions are based on 30 years of approved service.

The Little Rock Conference according to the 1968 Annual Report of The Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church was responsible for 3012.41 years of service. This makes an increase of 123.30 years over the report for 1967.

These annuity claims have been paid on the basis of the following rates established by the annual conference:

Conference Members (100% of Annuity Rate) \$56 per service year. Widows of Conference Members (70% of Annuity Rate) \$39.20 per service year.

Dependent Children of Conference Members (25% of Annuity Rate) \$14 per service year.

Approved Supply Pastors (85% of Annuity Rate) \$47.60 per service

Widows of Approved Supply Pastors (70% of Approved Supply Annuity Rate) \$33.32 per service year.

Dependent Children of Approved Supply Pastors (25% of Annuity Rate of Supply Pastors) \$11.90 per service year.

Payment of these annuities are made on the last day of each month due.

B. OTHER RESPONSIBILITIES

Premiums paid for 105 claimants eligible for Group Hospitalization at a cost of \$2,846.04. This represents a seven months coverage.
 Premiums paid for 57 claimants eligible for the Death Benefit

2. Premiums paid for 57 claimants eligible for the Death Benefit Program of the conference group coverage at an annual premium of \$7.004.16.

3. \$4 voluntary portion of Medicare paid claimants at an annual cost of \$5.544.00.

C. RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. We recommend that the annuity rate be set at \$56.00 per service year for retired members of the conference; and that \$56.00 per service year be set for retired approved supply pastors.
- 2. We recommend that the apportionment to the charges of the annual conference for conference claimants be an amount equal to 25% of the pastors salary provided that 20% of the above 25% shall be used for current distributions and 5% shall be used for a restrictive endowment fund.
- 3. We recommend in keeping with Par. 296.3b and Par. 1610.6 of the 1964 Discipline that the Sunday following Easter, April 5, 1970 be observed as Retired Ministers Day. Each pastor is urged to acquaint his congregation with the pension program of the conference as part of this observance, and, if possible, to use retired ministers in the Worship service.
- 4. We recommand that the General Board of Pensions continue to write and distribute the monthly payments to our annuitants and that the payments be made on the last day of each month.
- 5. In keeping with Par. 1618.4 of the 1964 Discipline, we recommend for the approval by the annual conference that special appointments shall be listed in the conference journal as follows: (1) with annuity claim (a) upon this annual conference, or (b) upon a general board, an institution, or an agency of The United Methodist Church; (2) without annuity claim upon this Annual Conference.
- 6. That we continue to apportion to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the conference the sum of \$360.00 per year in accord with the 1964 Discipline (Par. 1623.7); and that said apportionment be paid to the treasurer of the Little Rock Conference Board of Pensions not later than 15 days prior to the opening of annual conference. And that a like amount be assessed upon the office of the District Superintendent and said amount to be paid from the District Superintendent's Fund.
- 7. We recommend that eligible Conference Claimants and special Conference Claimants will have the Death Benefit Program provided for them with the contribution to be paid by the Conference Board of Pensions in accordance with the program of the Conference Committee on Group Insurance.
- 8. We recommend that eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants will have ½ of the annual payment of the Conference Group Hospitalization paid by the Conference Board of Pensions. In addition we recommend that the eligible Conference Claimants and special Conference Claimants will have the \$4.00 voluntary portion of Medicare paid by the Conference Board of Pensions.
- 9. All retired ministers who serve appointments under the District Superintendent, and receive less than \$1,000.00 in annual salary and expense from the charge will have their contribution and premiums paid by the Conference Board of Pensions as outlined in Par. 7 and 8 of this report.

10. We recommend that an amount equal to the maximum amount allowed by the Internal Revenue Service for housing be designated housing allowance from the pensions received by the retired ministers.

COMMITTEE ON PUBLISHING INTERESTS

Union of the Methodist Church and the Evangelical United Brethren Church in April, 1968, and the subsequent combining of operations and personnel of the publishing interests of the two former churches has brought our Methodist Publishing House to a new day of increased service to eleven million United Methodists.

The Publishing House is able to report that General Conference directives with respect to personnel have been met and that the transition to a revised organizational structure is progressing smoothly, enhancing the House's ability to provide good service to churches, individuals, and agencies of United Methodism.

In spite of a general downward trend in church school enrollment and attendance, circulation of church school curriculum materials, published under the imprint of Graded Press, showed an increase. A completely new youth curriculum for youth was introduced in United Methodist Church schools in the fall of 1968. Work is progressing on the second series of materials for adults, scheduled for use in church schools in the fall of 1969.

We recommend that the churches of our conference keep before our families the general church periodical, **Together.** Every home might well take advantage of this opportunity for family enrichment.

CAMP TANAKO

Camp Tanako, located on beautiful Lake Catherine, has long been of service to the Little Rock Conference, offering worship, study, Christian fellowship and recreation for all ages. The campsite lends itself admirably to the purpose for which it has been planned and developed, which is to provide leadership training for youth and adults and to make available opportunities for Christian fellowship in an out-of-doors setting. The camp is easily accessible over paved roads to within a short distance of the site. The rugged terrain provides scenic beauty with abundant opportunities for hiking and nature study. It is well suited for the new program in Frontier camping.

The camp now has facilities for a camping program for all age groups. It has a capacity of 200 campers, plus leaders and the staff in charge of summer operations.

The camp continues to be the center of Conference summer activities. There is an increasing demand for dates for summer activities for adults, as well as youth. One of the most important training enterprises for children's workers is the laboratory school, for which adequate facilities and equipment have been provided. During the last season the camp served over thirty different groups in attendance from one to five days, and totalling over 2,000 campers. More and more facilities are being winterized so that week-end camping may be started in the spring and continued through the fall months.

Summer operations are under the supervision of the most capable staff available. Every care is given to make the camping experience physically safe and morally and spiritully rewarding. The entire camping

program is becoming an increasingly effective force in the life of youth and adults.

The summer program at Tanako includes nine youth camps, one laboratory enterprise, a young adult conference, and many local church

One of the important trends in the church today is the movement toward Frontier camping. Here young people and adults live out in the open, sleep in tents, cook their own meals, and get very close to nature. A feeling of being near to God and near to one another is experienced in a remarkable way. With its 286 acres of lake front, hills, streams, woods and pastures, Camp Tanako offers an ideal setting for this type of camping experience.

Equipment has been purchased for two units, accomodating approximately 20 persons. Frontier camps are being planned now for the summer of 1969. Frontier Camping will offer much to members of the Little Rock Conference and will in no way detract from the fine program of Institutional Camping which has long been a vital part of Camp Tanako, and which will continue for many years to come. Camp Tanako has a current indebtedness of \$19,000. Additional funds are needed now

perhaps more than ever before.

There are four sources from which all expenses must be met, including building and maintenance, ground supervision throughout the year, summer operations, and all other expenses. They are (1) from Conference summer operations, and all other expenses. They are (1) from Conference apportionments; (2) from local churches. A free-will offering if the Camp is not supported in the local church budget, taken on Camp Tanako Sunday, April 27; (3) from institutional earnings. Each camper using the facilities pays a set fee for meals and lodging, plus a small ground fee. Any surplus which may accrue from camp operations is used for maintenance and expense of the camp facilities; (4) from contributions from individuals and organizations interested in the various phases of the camping program phases of the camping program.

ARKANSAS AREA TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

Program 1969-1970

Special emphasis will be given to providing assistance to Town

and Country Churches considering a building program.

2. We recommend that the Conference Boards of Missions set up a special committee to work with the Area Director of Town and Country work in establishing guidlines and procedures regarding building programs by local churches who plan to ask for grants or loans to assist them in their building.

3. The Area Town and Country Workshop will be held the day preceding the Annual Mid-Year Meetings of the two Conferences in 1970.

4. We recommend the holding of divine worship services in each

church every week, wherever practical or possible.

- 5. We recommend that every United Methodist Church in Arkansas have an appropriate sign designating it as "The United Methodist Church" and that every church set up directional signs at the proper road intersections.
- 6. We shall continue to promote interest in holding worship services in the recreational areas of our State.
- 7. When requested by the District Superintendent, the Commission will assist him in a study regarding the Larger Parish Programs, new church locations, and the abandonment of church properties.
- 8. We shall cooperate with the University of Arkansas and the Arkansas Council of Churches in the Town and Country Church Seminar held annually on the Campus of the University, and will cooperate with all government programs that might be beneficial to people in Town and Country areas.
- 9. The Cabinet, in consultation with the Area Director, will select one outstanding rural minister from each Conference to attend the Seminar on Church and Community Life, held at Emory University each summer. The Commission will pay up to \$200.00 of the expenses of those attending.

We request the Commission on Minimum Salary to allow up to \$500.00 for expenses of pastors on minimum salary to attend the Town

and Country Church Seminar held at the University of Arkansas.

- 11. The Commission shall be responsible for promoting stewardship through the Every Member Commitment, Tithing, Wills, Legacies. The Methodist Foundation of Arkansas, and the Lord's Acre-Lord's Hour Plan.
- 12. We will also inform all United Methodist Churches in Arkansas of the "Financial Crusades", a service made available by the General Board of Missions through the Department of Finance and Field Services.

- 13. We will request and try to make use of the Lay Speaking Program of the Conference Board of Lay Activities. To further develop the goal, we will prepare and recommend to those conducting worship services a uniform United Methodist Order of Worship. We urge that everyone conducting such services give an invitation to Christian Discipleship at the close of the service.
- 14. The Enlarged Charge Program shall be continued with a goal of at least 300-400 members for every full-time pastor.
- 15. We shall work with TRAFCO in offering to make available films and filmstrips to be used by the Districts and local churches.
- 16. A District Director of Town and Country Work may be elected for each district by the Conference Commission on Town and Country Work on nomination by the District Superintendent after consultation with the Executive Committee of the Commission. He shall work in close cooperation with the Executive Director of the Commission in all phases of the Town and Country Program. His chief function shall be to expedite all program aspects in his district, to assist the District Superintendent in implementing the program, and to serve as liaison between the district and conference programs.
- 17. The Rural Church of the Year Awards shall be promoted according to the guidelines developed by the special committee on the Rural Church of the Year.
- 18. We shall seek to develop cooperative procedures between the church and governmental agencies, the Arkansas Council of Churches, and other denominations.
- 19. We shall cooperate with the Cabinet, Boards of Missions, Evangelism, and Education in establishing new congregations and outpost Sunday Schools.
- 20. The Town and Country Commission is of the conviction that there is a direct relationship between the general interest in a local church and the financial strength of a local church, as compared with the existence and systematic activity of the following church groups: The United Methodist Men, The Women's Society of Christian Service, United Methodist Youth, and The Official Board. Therefore, our program this year will include the working out of a plan to encourage organization and activity of a United Methodist Youth, a Women's Society of Christian Service, a United Methodist Men, and an Administrative Board in every local church. The Area Director will be available to assist any pastor and local church requesting his services to organize and set in motion any one, or all, of these important local church organizations.
- 21. All of the ministers belonging to the Southwest Conference and serving in the Arkansas Area will be informed as to the above-mentioned program of the Area Town and Country Commission. They will be offered the services of its Area Director, and invited to participate in the Town and Country Commission program.
- 22. We recommend that the salary of the office secretary of the Area Town and Country Commission be increased by the sum of \$300.00 in our budget.
- 23. We ask that \$9,000.00 be granted by the Commission on World Service and Finance for the Town and Country Work and Stewardship Promotion for this next Conference Year.
- 24. We commend W. O. Scroggin, Jr., for the work he has done for the past four years as Area Director of Town and Country Work and Stewardship, and request the Bishop and the Cabinet to reappoint him as Area Director of Town and Country Work and Stewardship, representing the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences for the coming year.

ARKANSAS AREA TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

June 1, 1968 to June 1, 1969

The Area Town and Country and Stewardship work can be broken

down into five areas:

First, the actual work related to the Town and Country Program: (1) The Area Executive has preached sixty-two times in fifty-four different churches (2) has spoken to a Methodist Men's Club (3) served as evangelist in two revival meetings, (4) met with and assisted five local church building committees, (5) met four times with the two Conferences' Rural Advisory Committee, (6) assisted with study groups on two new church locations, (7) served as Director of the Annual Town and Country Seminorations, (7) served as Director of the Annual Town and Country Senf-nar held at the University of Arkansas last June, with sixty-seven Metho-dists and their wives in attendance last year, (8) set up and conducted the Annual Area Town and Country Workshop, attended by seventy-eight persons, (9) attended the Jurisdictional Church and Community Convocation at Kansas City, Missouri. (10) The Town and Country office has placed twelve new church signs.

Second, the general area of Stewardship: The Executive Secretary (1) attended the Local Church Laboratory School at Mt. Sequoyah to prepare himself to teach in the District and Local Church Workshops, and taught a course on Stewardship in six of these workshops, (2) attended the National Stewardship Workshop at Chicago, (3) directed nine Every Member Commitment Workshops. The office (1) has kept a supply of the current catalogs of Stewardship Materials for use of ministers and laymen, on request, (2) supplied local churches with stewardship materials and films.

Third, the Methodist Headquarters Corporation: Here the major responsibility has been on our office secretary. My assistance here is only when a major problem arises, and as advisor. At the request of the Methodist Headquarters Corporation, we are turning this job over to the Program Council. Since the Headquarters was primarily built by, and belongs primarily to, the Little Rock Conference, Dr. Hart, on behalf of the Program Council, has agreed to take over this responsibility on June 1, 1969.

Fourth, cooperation with the Little Rock Conference Television, Radio and Film Commission: Our office has served as this Commission's warehouse and distributing center. Our office secretary, Miss Joana Dean, is in complete charge of this program. My relationship is in an advisory capacity. Records indicate that she has sent out approximately six hundred audio-visual items this conference year.

Fifth, the work of The Methodist Foundation of Arkansas. (See

separate report.)

According to the new structure of our church, the Town and Country Commission will cease to exist. Its work is to be carried on by a committee under the Conference Board of Missions, known as the Church and Community Committee.

Through the office of its executives the Commission has made many contributions to the church across the years. We want to call your attention to two of these which we believe are worth perpetuating: (1) The "Every Member Commitment" program, and (2) The Methodist Foundation of Arkansas. We feel that we have had a major part in introducing and establishing these programs.

Therefore, it is our desire and suggestion that, upon the elimination of the Area Town and Country office during the 1970 session of the Little Rock Annual Conference, The Methodist Foundation office continue, and that its executive be responsible for the area Stewardship program. We further suggest that the funds now allowed us be made available to that office.

Wesley foundation Operational Fund: We agree to set up a stabilization fund with the North Arkansas Conference by each Conference, advancing \$10,000 to be used to underwrite minimum monthly payments to Wesley Foundation Centers with the understanding that these payments be at such a level that when collections for the year are complete, that basic Stabilization Fund of \$20,000 may be repaid and kept available for continual use.

We recommend that \$50,000 be apportioned to the Districts for Wesley Foundation Operations and that the **full** amount be apportioned to

the churches.

E. We take note of the \$59,349.00 asked by the General Conference for Seminary training. This is 2% of the local budget, less building and debt payment. We recommend \$30,000 be apportioned to the churches by the District Superintendents. We also recommend an increase of \$4,171.00 to the Board of Ministry from the Conference Benevolences. We recommend for the first year we assume 1% and move toward the goal of 2% as we can. We recommend deleting the November Special Offering.

K. We recommend that the District Superintendents adhere as closely as possible to the decimal in making appropriations to the churches.

- L. We are in accord with the Board of Christian Social Concerns in recommending that the churches of the Little Rock Annual Conference make voluntary financial contributions to the "Arkansas Release Guidance Foundation" (The New Life House). We also recommend that \$2,000 be granted to the "Tucker Prison Chapel Fund."
- M. We recommend that the Commission on Worship and the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs be granted \$750.00 each from the Contingency Fund.

REPORT OF THE WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE TO THE LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCE, MAY 19-22, 1969

An old Chinese proverb states "When the roots are deep there is no need to fear the wind." The women of the Little Rock Conference have deep roots. We are seeking ways to use the knowledge and experience of

the past to climb into the present where the winds of change are blowing.

The Women's Society of Christian Service and the Wesleyan Service
Guilds have brought their Constitution and By-Laws into harmony with
the 1968 Edition of the Constitution and By-Laws of the Women's Division. Working under the new structure on all levels, the women are moving into the total church program as outlined in the new Discipline, with the officer-program year beginning in September and the fiscal year now being the calendar year.

For the seven month period ending December 31, 1968 the Conference sent to the Women's Division \$64,618.64 which covered \$58,732.62 as pledge to Missions; \$4,598.32 Call to Prayer and Self-Denial; Supplementary giving \$287.70 and a Bequest of \$1,000.00 made by a member and sent to the Women's Division for Missions. \$27,670.47 was raised by Societies and Guilds and spent at the local church level

cieties and Guilds and spent at the local church level.

The latest available figures recorded 9,891 members of the Women's

Society and 1,555 members of the Wesleyan Service Guild.

We are pleased to announce that one of the young women receiving help from the Birdwell Fund will go to Bolivia this summer for two months on a study-service project of Laos.

The First Cooperative Inter-Conference School of Christian Mission

for Arkansas has been planned by a Steering Committee made up of

members of the Women's Societies, the Wesleyan Service Guilds and the Boards of Missions of the Little Rock, North Arkansas and Southwest Conferences. This is an entirely new plan which offers a Three Day School and a Weekend School for anyone interested and concerned about the Mission of the church - Pastors, laymen and laywomen. Arrangements have been made for couples to attend.

Two important Task Groups have been appointed: (1) to study plans for future Annual Meetings in the light of the new officer-program and fiscal year. (2) To study plans for merger of the Little Rock and Southwest Conferences, with equal representation from two Conferences. Members have shared in District and Conference Meetings.

Both Church and Community Workers assigned to our Conference will be returning to college in September. Miss Judy Atwood to St. Paul's School of Theology and Miss Doris Fair to Scarritt College for Christian Workers. The Advisory Committee for Church and Community Work for Town and Country has made a request for a worker in Polk County and the Hot Springs area.

Miss Theressa Hoover, the new Associate General Secretary of the Women's Division has said that the Women's Society and Wesleyan Service Guild combine into one of the most potentially creative involvements of lay women in the total mission of the Church. We hope that God is in the midst of movements toward change in society and that he is giving direction toward changing concepts of the Church, its Mission and our roles in it.

WILLIAM CLARENCE LEWIS

The Revered William Clarence Lewis, age 90 years, of Nashville, Arkansas, a Methodist minister in Arkansas for more than fifty years, died February 1, 1969 at a Nashville hospital following a long illness.



Brother Lewis was a pioneer in the Methodist ministry in Arkansas, having started his long career as a circuit rider traveling by horseback and also by horse and buggy, often making long journeys to reach the govern churches. journeys to reach the several churches he was

serving, and members who were ill.

He was licensed to serve as a minister at Keener Camp Grounds, Arkansas, July, 1907 and admitted on trial in 1911. His tenure as a minister included appointments in Watson, Hermitage, Crossett, Warren, Mill Camps, Eudora, Hampton, Arkansas City, Richmond, Humphrey, Doddridge, Horatio, Mineral Springs, Mena, Mountain View, Roe, Washington and Center Point, all in Arkansas.

During his tenure as minister, the congregations built new churches at Mountain View, Roe, and parsonages at Hermitage, Hampton, Doddridge,

Horatio, Mena, and Roe.

He was born January 26, 1879, in Choctaw County, Mississippi, and married Miss Georgia Cone on September 12, 1906, who died June 18, 1948. On June 7, 1953, he married a widow, Mrs. Ruth Timberlake.

Brother Lewis retired from the ministry in 1959, and was an active member of The First Methodist Church of Nashville at the time of his death. He was a Mason and past master of his lodge.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Ruth Timberlake Lewis of Nashville, Arkansas, one son, Eugene L. Lewis, Sr., of Little Rock, Arkansas, two grandchildren, and one great-grandchild.

Funeral service was held at the First United Methodist Church, Nashville, Arkansas by Reverend Alfred DeBlack, Commital service was at Snyder Cemetery by Reverend Clyde Swift.

Brother Lewis was blessed with a sanguine and cheerful disposition. He looked on the brighter side of life, and was always hopeful. He never became soured on life.

He was vital and energetic, for this writer has heard him say that three preaching appointments on Sunday never tired him, even up until his old age. He believed in the potential greatness of every man.

Most of his appointments were among the less affluent people, where he received a small salary. In spite of this, he served for his love of the people and the good he could do.

Brother Lewis exerted a good influence on the life of this writer, for it was under his ministry on the Horatio-Gillham Circuit that he was licensed to preach, and he is grateful for his friendship and encouragement in the decisive years of his younger life.

And, like Enoch, "... he was not, for God took him."

X. Miscellaneous

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

- 1. Nominations. The District Superintendents shall nominate all members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees, except as otherwise provided.
- 2. Financial and Statistical. (1) The District Superintendents shall furnish the treasurer with all assessments and acceptances of the pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the meeting of the Annual Conference. These figures shall be official. (2) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars, with no column for cents. (3) Each pastor shall report to the Conference Treasurer and turn in his statistical report to the statistician at a date set by the cabinet. The Treasurer's Report from the Pastor will be audited and checked by the Final Data-Processing Print-Out. Where there is discrepancy, the amount recorded on the Print-Out will prevail.
- 3. Memoirs. There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased Clerical Member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, name of children, charges served and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with his memoir. The memoirs of the wives or widows of clerical members of the Conference shall be published in the Journal. The name of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs the passing of any person whose memoir shall appear in the Journal. It shall be the duty of the District Superintendents to report to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions the death of any conference claimant that occurs in their respective districts.
- 4. Administrative Fund. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall recommend an assessment for a Conference Administrative Fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expense of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this Fund. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the Fund. Payments from the Fund shall be made only on vouchers signed by the Secretary of the Conference; provided that this rule does not relate to the salary and expenses of the Treasurer of the Conference.
- 5. Conference Treasurer. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the Conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer, on recommendation of the World Service Commission, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.
- 6. Number of Districts: There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Conference.
- 7. District Fund: The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall report to the district conference, annually, showing receipts and disbursements.

- 8. Reports and Resolutions: There shall be a pre-conference report which shall contain reports of all the boards and agencies of the Conference. This report shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Annual Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the pre-conference reports shall be typewritten, in triplicate, on special forms furnished by the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary. In the event editing of a report is deemed necessary by the Conference Secretary and chairman of the board involved, permission is hereby granted.
- 9. Membership of the Commission on Archives and History: The Commission on Archives and History shall be composed of ten or more members, one of whom shall be the Conference Secretary. In addition to the duties outlined in the Discipline, the Commission shall secure a group picture of each class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal; and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his retirement.
- 10. Safeguarding Historical Material: (1) Any member of the Little Rock Annual Conference, or layman authorized by a member of the Conference, may examine historical documents within the Headquarters Building. (2) To remove historical documents from the Headquarters Building, a written request signed by the presiding Bishop and Conference Secretary shall be presented to the Custodian. Provided further, historical documents belonging to the Conference Women's Society may be removed from Headquarters Building upon written request signed by the President and Secretary of the Women's Conference. (3) The Custodian of historical documents shall be given a receipt for any material removed from the vault in the Headquarters Building, Little Rock, giving date of removal and name of receiver.
- 11. District Conference: There may be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline, and one additional member from each pastoral charge, provided however, in charges of more than five hundred members there shall be one additional member for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.
- 12. Lay Members: Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the pastor-host of the Annual Conference at least fifteen days before the session of the Annual Conference.
- 13. Board Service. No person may be nominated to serve on the same Conference Board for more than two consecutive quadrenniums, and may not be nominated to serve on more than one board at the same time. District Superintendents may not serve on Conference Boards, except as provided in the Discipline, or by specific conference action. A person failing to attend a board of which he is a member in a quadrennium may be continued only by special board action.
- 14. Entertainment: The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the retired ministers shall be entertained from the entertainment fund. Certain proceeds from the offerings shall go to the fund. The entertainment fund shall be administered by three men, to be named by the Cabinet, who will be reporting to the next session of the Annual Conference.
- 15. Conference Expense: Registration fees and the offerings at the public services in the session of the Annual Conference shall be used to defray the expense of the session, including the expense and/or honorarium of the conference preacher and that any deficit remaining be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund, and the Conference Treasurer shall pay the same.

- 16. Unsponsored Resolutions: Any resolution not sponsored by a regular board or standing committee of the Conference must lie over for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon, provided, however, immediate debate and action may be ordered by two-thirds vote of the Conference present and voting.
- 17. Apportionments Based on Pastor's Salary: On all items apportioned to local churches by means of a percentage of the ministers' salary, such percentage shall be understood to apply to all ministerial members of the local church staff serving under the appointment of the Bishop, including ministers in full connection, ministers on trial, and full time Lay Pastors. This rule to be in effect with the 1966-67 Conference Year.
- 18. Campaigns. All Conference-wide campaigns to raise funds shall be voted on by ballot.
- 19. Amendments. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing on day before the vote is taken.

RESOLUTION

1. Studying the existing structure and program of the two Annual Conferences

To determine the strengths and weaknesses of the present dual

To note the instances of duplication of effort and activity.

To list noteworthy operations existing in one, but not the other, Annual Conference.

To ascertain what changes and savings in organizational structure might be effected by a merger of the two Annual Conferences.

To ascertain any changes in the appointive system which might be effected by a merger of the two Annual Conferences.

To consider any benefits or distresses that might accrue to the people, the churches, and the clergy in the event of a merger of the two Annual Conferences.

2. Reporting their conclusions to the regular sessions of the Annual Conferences in 1970.

If it be concluded by the committee that a merger of the two Annual Conferences would be advantageous, the committee shall prepare a detailed plan of union for submission to the Annual Conferences at the regular sessions to be held in 1971. A plan or union thus submitted shall be considered for one year, and no vote shall be taken until the regular sessions of the Annual Conferences to be held in 1972.
