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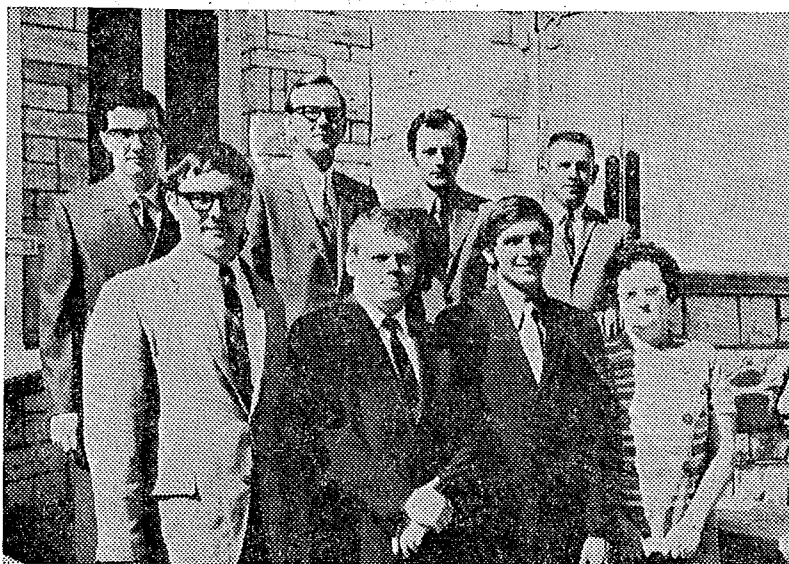

CONFERENCE MINUTES

Monday, May 18, 1970, 4:00 P.M.

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper

The Junior Choir of the First United Methodist Church, Hot Springs, under direction of Fletcher Trotter, sang the Introit. Bishop Galloway announced the opening hymn, "And Are We Yet Alive." Following the singing of the hymn, Bishop Galloway led in prayer. Otto W. Teague read the Scripture Lesson taken from the Revelation of St. John the Divine 3:20; John 6:51; I Corinthians 5:7-8; I Peter 2:24; John 1:29; I Corinthians 2:9-10. He also led the Collect and the Lord's Prayer and the Gloria en excelsis.

Bishop Galloway issued the invitation to the sacrament, Prayer of General Confession, and the Prayer of Humble Access.

Dr. George Ivey, host pastor, read the Scripture Sentences and led the prayer for the whole state of Christ's church.

The Junior Choir then sang the anthem, "Unto Thee, O Lord, Do I Life Up My Soul."

Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for the service of the Junior Choir and its director, Fletcher Trotter. He announced the speakers for the devotional services. He introduced Larry Maxwell, Associate Pastor of Pulaski Heights Methodist Church as the speaker for the service.


Closing of the Conference: Bishop Galloway expressed his gratitude for all the members of the Conference and closed the Conference with prayer and a benediction.



We are grateful to Bishop and Mrs. Paul V. Galloway for their creative, dynamic and brotherly leadership in all areas of the life and work of the Church.

The financial reports for 1969 are commendable in every respect, and most of the apportionments were paid in full.

ARKANSAS/LOUISIANA METHODIST COMMISSION**Recommendations**

The following recommendations are submitted to the Annual Conference from the Arkansas/Louisiana Methodist Commission:

1. That the 1970 circulation campaign be held during the period January 17-24.

2. That the quota for each charge be one subscription for each seven members reported to the 1970 Annual Conference.

3. That the subscription price be \$2.50 per year, with the provision that subscriptions be available at \$2.00 per year when the list from a church equals one-third of the members reported to the 1970 Annual Conference.

4. That each church be asked to name a layman to assume the responsibility for the solicitation during the circulation campaign, and that the importance of such personal solicitation be emphasized by the district superintendents and the district directors.

5. That district superintendents be asked to give serious consideration to the naming of laymen as district directors of the circulation campaign.

6. That local churches be encouraged to give serious consideration to the use of special pledge cards prepared by The Methodist in their Every Member Visitation, asking members to pledge the amount of a subscription in addition to their regular pledge.

7. That the editor and the president (or secretary) of the commission be empowered to borrow money needed for operations from Union National Bank, Little Rock.

8. We wish to express our appreciation to Bishop Aubrey G. Walton and Bishop Paul V. Galloway, and to the district superintendents of their areas for the leadership they have given to the promotion of the papers.

We are also in the debt of the many pastors and laymen who have given themselves unselfishly in the solicitation of subscriptions and who have assisted the papers in many other ways.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Since last report, the Board of Christian Social Concerns . . .

1. Promoted attendance at the Annual Regional Coaching Conference at Mt. Sequoyah by providing scholarships for delegates.

2. Subscribed to "Engage" for all Board Members.

~~3. Helped promote the special offering for "Hurricane Camille Relief" through correspondence to all ministers and articles to the Arkansas Methodist.~~

~~4. Purchased Filmstrip on drugs entitled "You Gotta Even Open Your Eyes" for TRAFECO.~~

5. In January 1970, sent letters to ministers of the Little Rock Conference to help promote anti-gambling provision in the proposed state constitution.

6. The Board Chairman, Louis M. Mulkey, and the Vice Chairman, James B. Gannaway, attended the Consultation on Social Principles at

Dallas, Texas, February 5-6, 1970. This was one of seven such groups being held over the country prior to the writing of a new social creed for the United Methodist Church.

The Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns makes the following recommendations:

1. We recommend and approve the Fund for Reconciliation. We realize that financial assistance is but one manifestation of concern, and we support all efforts at stewardship of time and funds in meeting needs of persons and building bridges of reconciliation.
2. We heartily endorse any effort of the Board of Education toward a program of financial support for Philander Smith College.
3. We recommend that each local church subscribe to "Engage" Magazine for the Work Area Chairman of Social Concerns of The Council on Ministries.
4. We encourage every local church to follow the program of the Church as it is outlined in "The Interpreter" from month to month. We ask that the pastor and the work area chairman on Christian Social Concerns give special attention to the program planning issue for the observance of Special Days of Christian Social Concerns. We request that special attention be given to the observance of World Order Sunday, Commitment Day, and Race Relations Sunday.
5. We recognize the value of the Methodist Social Creed and encourage its wide distribution across the conference.
6. We recommend that the churches of the Little Rock Conference make voluntary financial contributions to the Arkansas Release Guidance Foundation (The New Life House). There is also a need for food, clothing, and bedding, and we recommend that the churches help meet these needs. We request local churches to invite the Reverend Eugene Efird, director, to come and report on this work.
7. We commend the churches and communities which have sponsored Project Misdemeanant and have used the project to strengthen local probation and rehabilitative services. We would hope that the project might be extended to other areas across the state.
8. We advocate attendance at the Christian Social Concerns Briefing Conference on Mt. Sequoyah July 17, 18, and 19. This Conference is for District Secretaries, Board Members, and Local Church Work Area Chairmen.
9. We pledge our support to the cabinet and the Conference Program Council in conducting district workshops to train our people in the program of the United Methodist Church as set-up by the General Conference.
10. Recognizing the moral decline in the standard of many movies being made and shown, we urge interested persons in the local church to survey the type of movies being shown in our communities and in so far as possible take steps to correct this trend. We encourage our people to commend good television programs and complain about programs unsuitable for home viewing through contact with local and national television management.
11. We recommend that local churches establish a program to interpret to young people and parents the dangers involved in the use of drugs, alcohol, and tobacco. Realizing that one of the nation's leading health problems is alcoholism, our Board of Christian Social Concern has voted unanimously in favor of supporting a bill to amend to Communi-

cations Acts of 1934 to prohibit broadcasting of any advertising of alcoholic beverages:

H. R. 8388 — Congressman Richard T. Hanna

Asking his help in getting this Bill out of Committee, and that he give it his support.

12. We recommend support of the Christian Civic Foundation in its efforts to promote the cause of civic righteousness in the areas of alcohol, narcotics, gambling and pornography.

13. Recognizing the educational value derived from the "Great Decisions" program being promoted across the state, we urge local churches to solicit the support of their memberships by organizing groups within their congregations.

14. We recognize the need of concern for the aged. We feel the local churches should take into their future plans special emphasis and interest for these more experienced persons.

15. We highly recommend that each pastor help to organize a Society of St. Stephen in his church. Made up of laymen committed to compassion, this organization adopts an individual or family in desperate need and provides help, of the kind needed, whether it be a job, furniture, food, clothing, home repair, child care, etc., until their goal of being able to help themselves is reached. The society is a self-sustaining organization financially independent of the church as a whole, whose members raise the funds and provide the labor needed for the help offered. Brochures detailing this program are available.

16. We support all efforts now being made toward the conservation of our environmental resources and to stop the pollution of our air and water. We call upon our people to encourage further research and expansion of programs in this vital area of concern, and to accept this cause as a personal responsibility.

17. We recommend that each church and each member begin to work actively toward creating a climate conducive to merger of our Conference with the Southwest Conference.

18. We recommend that the Annual Conference recognize the outstanding work done by the delegates to the Seventh Constitutional Convention of the State of Arkansas; that we recognize that they have acted with courage to prohibit the expansion of legalized gambling in the State by adoption of Article II, Section 17.

We further recommend that the Annual Conference thank the delegates for the work they have done, especially in regards to gambling, and that our people be asked to study the Proposed Constitution and give it their prayerful consideration.

1. The Eagle Methodist Church, declared abandon by the Special Session of the Little Rock Annual Conference, has been disposed of in keeping with the will of the Conference.

2. The Twenty-Eighth Street Methodist Church was sold to the White Memorial United Methodist Church of the Southwest Conference of the United Methodist Church at a nominal price under the guidance of the Superintendent of the Little Rock Conference and Bishop Galloway.

3. The Union Methodist Church property was sold for the sum of \$1,250.00 to the original membership who had withdrawn and had organized another church. The money was turned to the Camden District to be used within the District under the supervision of the District Superintendent and the Church Building and Locations Committee.

4. The Hi-Banks Church property (land) was sold to the highest bidder for the sum of \$500. The money was turned to the District (Camden) to be used in the District under the supervision of the District Superintendent and the District Committee on Church Buildings and Locations to be used within the District.

5. The Mount Vernon United Methodist Church membership has withdrawn and organized a church affiliated with the Southern Methodist Church. Therefore, be it resolved, that the Mount Vernon Church property be declared abandon by this Annual Conference. Be it further resolved that the title be vested in the Conference Board of Trustees with authority to work out the matter in a way that will be amicable to both parties.

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS

We, the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs of the Little Rock Conference, need to establish the guidelines by which our Commission may function and make its recommendations.

Since the world situation is such that the church must present a united front, we feel that special consideration should be given to all areas of endeavors coming under the general head of Ecumenical Affairs; and since there is a growing concern across all of Christendom to find new ways of cooperation and organic union, we should endeavor to give our assistance to this effort; and since there are so many local interest and activities being conducted and initiated, we feel that the United Methodist Church, both on the local level and Conference level, should offer full support to all of these: The Church Women United, City Councils of Churches, State Councils of Churches, the Ministerial Associations, Christian Civic Foundation offer to us the first guidelines and organization for us to fulfill certain responsibilities in keeping with ecumenical programs. Furthermore, we recommend that wherever possible, especially in small communities with several churches, full cooperation be given to all ecumenical activities.

We commend the World Methodist Council which unites the Wesleyans of the world in a cooperative venture of faith. Pastors are urged to present the work of the Council to their congregations. The Methodist participation in the Commission on Church Union offers an opportunity for overtures to other denominations hopefully leading to effective unions in the future. The Christians of the world now comprise a small percentage of the world population and cannot hope to survive if there is division and conflict within the ranks of the followers of Christ.

Since our ecumenical concern is a growing concern, we recommend that local churches participate in District and Conference training programs concerned with ecumenical affairs. We encourage all local churches to organize a Commission on Ecumenical Affairs.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

Conference Program

The Little Rock Conference Board of Education continues to care for the major concerns of education in the Little Rock Conference.

Leadership Training has long been one of those concerns and probably will be for many years to come. However, there are now two important differences: (1) leadership training must now be for the whole Church, rather than for education alone; (2) and we are not now primarily concerned with credits, but rather with giving the assistance needed, regardless of formal credit.

Christian Workers' Schools, Laboratory Enterprises, Local Church Consultations and other time honored means of leadership training are still being used to good advantage. However, we are searching for even more meaningful ways of making leadership training effective.

We, therefore, especially commend the Little Rock District in pioneering with Quarterly Curriculum Workshops in which teachers are given special help by competent leaders in the best use of the material for that age group for the coming quarter. We feel that there is much merit in this type of training and we will furnish the experienced leadership and the honoraria to any district, or sub-district group, which wants to try this type of leadership training.

The manual, "EDUCATION, A Manual for Local Church Ministries," (8443-BC) is excellent. We encourage all churches to make full use of it. Copies can be secured from Service Department, PO Box 871, Nashville, Tennessee 37202; \$1.00 for a single copy, or three copies for \$2.50.

We commend the good work done by the Special Committee to study the Summer Program at Camp Tanako. On the basis of their recommen-

dations we have revamped the youth program at Camp Tanako so that in 1970 it will be based on the following groupings: Junior High, Middle High and Senior High—in accordance with the literature which will be used.

We highly favor the Experimental Junior High Camp at Tanako, August 3-7, 1970, a project for the socially deprived in our Conference. We will contribute \$300 toward the expense of this pioneer project.

We appreciate the excellent work being done by Colonel Claude E. Haswell, Coordinator of Adult Ministry; and we heartily concur in his recommendations: (1) Our local churches need to discover, train and employ more leaders for adult groups. (2) We must plan more leadership training which is designed to upgrade the skills of our adult leaders. (3) The coordinators of adult ministry in all six districts should be urged to attend the workshop at Mt. Sequoyah July 13-17, 1970.

We are pleased with the work being done by our Young Adults. The Young Adult Conference at Camp Tanako last summer was by far the best that we have ever had with over one hundred sixty young adults and their children attending. The Young Adult Conference this year has been set for June 19-21, 1970 at Camp Tanako with a Lay Witness Mission as was held last year.

We approve the following recommendation of the Little Rock Conference Youth Council: "We, as representatives of the Little Rock Conference Youth recognize a definite need for active youth organizations in our Conference. We are striving to involve EVERY youth in the Conference in our activities and earnestly seek the support of EVERY minister in establishing active programs of youth ministry in EVERY local church; furthermore, we ask for ministerial help in coordinating youth functions beyond the local church."

Under the leadership of Mrs. John L. Tucker, our Conference Coordinator of Childrens' Ministry, and Mr. Richard Lines, Chairman of our Music Committee, a very successful Conference Childrens' Choir Festival was held last year with twelve children's choirs participating. Plans are now being made for a similar festival this year. Also a very successful Conference Childrens' Choir Camp was held at Tanako last year with eighty-nine children, twenty counselors, nine church choir directors and one guest director participating. Plans are being made for another camp this summer at Tanako, June 1-3, 1970. We hope that childrens' choirs all over the Conference will participate in these most worthwhile projects. We are putting \$200 in our budget to supplement the Childrens' Choir Program.

Each year the Directors of Religious Education and the Educational Assistants in Arkansas have a two day workshop the week following Easter. Under well known leaders they study the educational ministry of the Church. We highly commend this good work and hope that all churches having paid educational leadership will send their workers to this conference and will care for their expenses.

The church with small membership has long rendered outstanding service to the Church. We rejoice that Miss Jennie Youngblood of the General Board at Nashville has agreed to make the Little Rock Conference a Pilot Project for the next two years for work with churches with small membership. We pledge to her, the District Superintendents, our Conference Staff and all those involved our hearty cooperation and support.

We appreciate the plans to make Confirmation and Church Membership Classes more effective; and we will join with the Conference Board of Evangelism and the District Superintendents in any plans which may be helpful in making church membership more meaningful in our Conference.

For many years Methodism has been vitally concerned with improving all phases of home and family life. This concern was further evidenced by the General Conference of 1968 in putting a Coordinator of Family Ministries on each local church Council on Ministries; and also by making it possible for the church to have a Family Life Committees, if it so desires. We heartily recommend the book, **Family Ministry Through The Church**, by Dr. Leon Smith and Dr. Edward D. Staples, as excellent for the Coordinator of Family Ministries, the Family Life Committee and any person who wishes to better understand the family ministry of the local church.

The former Methodist Church has for many years had a National Family Life Conference each quadrennium. A sixth family life conference and the First Family Life Conference for the United Methodist Church will be held at Chicago October 8-11, 1970, with the theme "**The Christian Family Faces Up.**" We urge each district to send several couples to this Conference.

In view of the above facts, this year special emphasis should be given to home and family life in our Conference in order to give guidance to the Coordinators of Family Ministries and the Family Life Committee in local churches; and also to prepare for the next National Family Life Conference. Competent leadership for these studies will be available to any group on a district, sub-district or local church level.

A team of four persons from our Conference went to Kansas City, Missouri March 4-10, for a Jurisdictional Laboratory on "**The Role of Sex In Christian Living**—A course for Junior High Youth and their Parents." These persons will be available for leading groups of teen-agers and parents in the study of this vital subject.

In spite of the apparent downward trend in enrollment and attendance in most denominations, we believe that both are very important and should be increased if possible. We, therefore, respectfully request the General Board of Education to make available to local churches new literature designed to increase enrollment and attendance; or to make available the best materials previously printed.

However, we recognize that increase in enrollment and attendance primarily should come from improved quality of work in the local church in making available projects and studies which are so interesting and worthwhile that people will want to participate in them. We will, therefore, renew our efforts to upgrade and improve all of the educational ministry of the Little Rock Conference.

Finances:

The Conference Board of Education requests the World Service and Finance Commission to continue the same apportionment granted in 1969-1970, \$4,270.00, and to set \$9,000.00 as a goal for the Christian Education Day.

The Staff:

We wish to name Mrs. John L. Tucker, Coordinator of Children's Ministry; and Colonel Claude E. Haswell, as volunteer Coordinator of Adult Ministry. We also request that the Conference Director of the Program Council also serve as Conference Director of Education; and that the Associate Director of the Program Council serve as Conference Coordinator of Youth Ministry and as Conference Coordinator of Young Adult Ministry.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 3

Wesley Foundation

The Area Committee on Higher Education recommends the following:

1. We recommend to the Area Committee on Higher Education that a study committee be appointed to prepare a statement on the philosophy of the Wesley Foundation Ministry and a Job Analysis for the Director. It is further recommended that this study committee be composed of two ministers, two laymen and two Wesley Foundation Directors.
2. We recommend that a Stabilization Fund be firmly established in the Area by June 1, 1970. Each Conference is requested to advance \$10,000 to be used to underwrite minimum monthly payments to Wesley Foundation Centers with the understanding that these payments be at such level that when collections for the year are complete, that basic Stabilization Fund of \$20,000 may be repaid and kept available for continual use.

COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS

Your Commission On Enlistment For Church Occupations make the following recommendations and requests to the Conference:

1. We seek the support of the Conference in a weekend workshop at Camp Tanako, August 14-15, 1970, on the theme "A Re-investment of Life." This workshop will be for any persons contemplating the re-investment of their lives with church occupations in mind.
2. We recommend that a Pilot Project on Investment of Life in Church-Related Vocations be undertaken in the Careers Day Program in our high schools.
3. We urge local churches to avail themselves of elective units through the church school in making this challenge to answer the call to a church occupation.

4. We respectfully request the appointment in each District of a **district secretary of enlistment for church occupations**.

5. We call upon each local church Committee on Nominations and Personnel to give careful consideration to the nomination of a concerned and qualified **local church secretary of enlistment** as a member of the Administrative Board. (Paragraphs 149 and 152.2, Book of Discipline).

6. We urge every pastor to consider anew his high privilege and awesome responsibility of challenging youth and adults to an investment or to a re-investment of life in the service of our Lord and Savior. We lift up **Ministry Sunday**, September 20, as an excellent time for giving special emphasis to this vital concern.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

For the 1971 calendar year we recommend that the following program of Evangelism be implemented in the Little Rock Conference.

1. That each church make a study of what is happening in its life in the area of evangelistic outreach and place the responsibility for growth with each member making a commitment to witness for Christ. The Board through the District Secretaries will provide guidelines for making this analysis.

2. That there be an overnight Retreat for Ministers in every District where a pastor (using laymen as resource persons) who has been consistently successful in evangelism in his own local church is invited to come in and lead sessions concerning careful preparation for evangelistic thrust in preaching, seeking commitment, workable programs and ways to motivate and provide maximum opportunities for laymen. This Retreat is to be set up and planned by the District Superintendent and the District Secretary of Evangelism.

3. That churches seeking a deeper life of faith be invited to participate in a "Hundred Days of Love." This is an invitation to practice Christian Love in every relationship in life. It is related to the contemporary life of the individuals, the families, the churches and the communities in which the movement comes alive. It is the result of the work of Thomas A. Carruth (Asbury Seminary, Wilmore, Kentucky, 40390) and involves daily scripture reading, prayer, commitment to a specific affirmation and meditation for one hundred days. The Conference Secretary will secure materials for use by the District Secretaries in presenting this program.

4. We recognize that the program of confirmation and membership training is a needed emphasis in our Conference. We believe that the best way to implement it is on the District level. We urge each District Superintendent to provide the necessary training for his District Ministers in order that they may best utilize the material and program in their local church.

5. That we continue to emphasize the need for small groups as a follow-up to the Lay Witness Missions and that we make available persons who are willing to offer help in this area. We recommend the Small Group Study series (Renewal), Action, Intercession, Study, Witness and Outreach) available from Tidings for \$2.50 per set.

6. That each pastor secure a number of **Handbooks For The Local Church Work Area in Evangelism** (M125B from Tidings to be used as a help for discovering needs, setting goals, planning programs, and implementing ideas for involving local churches in mission.

7. That we recognize the need for a spiritual awakening in the midst of our organizational activities. Therefore we recommend that every congregation become a center of renewal prayer life. G. Byron Deshler's book, **Developing the Prayer Life of the Local Church**, is still available and offers a great deal of help in building a dynamic prayer movement within the local church.

8. Finally, we again provide a \$100.00 scholarship for one young minister in his first appointment to attend the National Conference in Nashville in January. This meeting is set up and designed by the staff of the General Board of Evangelism. The person to receive this scholarship will be selected by the Executive Committee of the Board and the Cabinet Representative. Anyone may submit names for consideration. We will request the Arkansas Methodist to run a write-up of this meeting by the person attending and will see that the Cabinet is made aware of his experience for possible usefulness in District work.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

The Board of Health and Welfare Ministries today has a much larger area of concern than was formerly true under the old Hospital and Homes title. Our primary concern then was a ministry through institutions. Today, though continuing in this concern, the primary thrust is for a more complete ministry to the total health and welfare needs of all people.

We Recommend To The Conference:

1. That, due to the absence of a chaplain at the University of Arkansas Medical Center, an institution serving more than 20,000 in-patients and 23,000 out-patients per year and having 600 or more deaths annually, it will authorize the appointment of a committee to study thoroughly the feasibility of providing for the Center a person to serve as chaplain and consultant specialist to patients and staff, and to present its report and recommendations to the 1971 Annual Conference.
2. That it will authorize the appointing of a committee to make an "in-depth" study of the possibilities of developing a Retired Methodist Ministers' Home Complex on the grounds of our Children's Home, to consider rules for operation, financing, et cetera, and to present its report and recommendations to the 1971 Annual Conference.
3. The continuation, in cooperation with the North Arkansas Conference, of our support of the Methodist Children's Home and of the Chaplaincy at the State Sanatorium.
4. That we—the Little Rock Conference—shall work with the N. Ark. Conference in structuring guidelines for providing specific health and welfare ministries such as child-care centers, telephone ministries, counseling services, ministry to unwed mothers, and a ministry to dope addicts.
5. The provision of new opportunities for our ministers to become better informed as to needs and concerns in the area of Health and Welfare Ministries.

We Recommend That Our Districts:

1. Work with the Conference Board of Health and Welfare Ministries in setting up District Workshops and/or other training opportunities to carry out the recommendations listed above.

2. Make the service of Health and Welfare Ministries a definite part of the total District Program, and that a person on the District Staff be given the responsibility of implementing this work.

We Recommend That Our Local Churches:

1. Familiarize themselves with the broader scope of service urgently needed in this area.
2. Appoint or elect a person, sensitive in these areas of need, to participate in the District Workshops and be responsible for developing and implementing a Health and Welfare Ministry Program for the local church.

We hold in sacred memory the compassionate and dedicated ministry of Chaplain Bates Sturdy who for many years served as Chaplain to the State Sanitorium at Booneville.

DBP—Death Benefit Program

The Average Salary for the Little Rock Conference for the Calendar Year 1971 cannot be obtained from the General Board of Pensions at this time. They review salaries each year, and will work them out for the year 1970 by late Fall. Then we can determine the average salary for 1971. The contribution is 2% of the average salary.

This year (1970) we are using the amount of \$131.70 which means that the 60% paid by the church or agency is \$79.02; and the 40% paid by the individual is \$52.68.

The listing of Benefits by Ages for the first five months of 1970 is at the end of this report. There is also a statement of provision for each child for each of four years of College.

Hospitalization

The American Hospital and Life Insurance Company of San Antonio is the carrier for our hospitalization.

Part I—Under 65

Because of the numerous occasions during the past year where a Major Medical coverage would have been such a help to so many Little Rock Conference Ministers and other participating Members, the Insurance Committee has had them add a Major Medical to this hospitalization plan.

Effective Date of Major Medical is July 1st, 1970.

The clause "coordinated benefits" will continue to be in use for all persons under the hospitalization coverage. The deductible does not apply to maternity claims and minor accidents, however.

Arrangements have been made for coverage for Young People in a family contract, from 19-23 years of age, while in full-time attendance at an accredited school or college, and unmarried.

Note: There are extended Maternity Benefits for the Insured, and Benefits which can be obtained for the Dependents, if it is done within thirty days of termination in the Conference. Notify Mrs. Averitt.

Transfers

Ministers transferring into the North Arkansas Conference can be covered at once by their Death Benefit Program and Hospitalization program. They can also be accepted at any time appointments are made becoming eligible on the date of the appointment. Please notify Mrs. Averitt in order for coverage to be continuous.

Part II—Over 65

The Over 65 Group has Hospital Coverage amounting to paying all that Medicare does not pay for each hospital entry. This includes the deductible amount for each Hospitalization and the deductible for the Doctor's part, then the 20% Doctor's bill that Medicare does not pay.

In addition, the following items are covered:

1. \$50.00 deductible plus 80% thereafter for drugs and medicines outside of hospital, but requiring prescription.
2. 80% of the charges for Registered Nurses or Licensed Practical Nurses while in the Hospital.
3. After \$25.00 deductible per year per person, then 80% of charges for Registered Nurses or Licensed Practical Nurses at home will be paid.

The Premium for this Supplemental Coverage offered to the Retired Men and their Wives, and to the Widows, will remain the same.

The Little Rock Conference Board of Pensions will continue to pay one-half of the hospital premium for these persons.

Due to the excellent Hospital Claims experience of the Retired Men and Widows for 1969; a Dividend Check was given to each of them at the Annual Conference Session. This will amount to approximately 50% of their premium for that year.

Special

A check for the amount of Interest on Reserves for 1969 was donated to the Little Rock Conference Board of Pensions for their Reserve Fund.

THE REPORT OF THE INTER-CONFERENCE STUDY COMMITTEE ON MERGER

Pursuant to the Resolution passed in the 1969 Sessions of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences calling for a three stage approach to possible union of the two Conferences, we the Inter-Conference Study Committee on Merger submit the following report:

Stage I: during the past year we have engaged in a fruitful study of considering the advantages and disadvantages of uniting our two Conferences. We are now ready to move into Stage II.

Stage II: the development of a plan of possible union. In the 1970-71 Conference Year all Boards, Agencies, Commissions and Organizations of the two Conferences will be requested to make available information and lend assistance in formulating a plan of union. We will fulfill the obligations of Stage II by submitting this plan to the Annual Conference Sessions of 1971.

Stage III: we remind you, as stated in the original Resolution, calls for this plan of union to be before the Church for one year (May '71 to May '72) for consideration, and the vote on the plan will be at the Annual Conference Sessions of 1972.

BOARD OF THE LAITY

This has been another year of rewarding service with the Conference Board of Laity. Bishop Galloway, all District Superintendents, and the Pastors have been cooperative and most helpful. The Laity has responded cheerfully and effectively at all times.

Workshops were conducted in each district early in the Conference year. All were well attended. Manuals covering the responsibilities of the Church Lay Leader, the Committee on Nominations were presented, and the importance of these responsibilities were emphasized. After the Manuals had been reviewed by the leaders, dialogues were held by the several groups which provoked a great deal of interest and enthusiasm.

During June and July determined effort was made to generate interest of the Laity in the National Conference of United Methodist Men being held at Purdue University, Lafayette, Indiana. Friday, September 11th and continue until noon Sunday, September 13th. The program committee is planning a different type of inspirational services for this year which, we believe, will prove a great blessing to all who attend. We trust that many will make a special effort to be present. More information concerning this program will be given at the District meetings to be held soon after the next Annual Conference.

We were privileged to participate in the Arkansas Area Laity Seminar conducted by members of the General Board of the Laity from Evanston, Illinois, held in Little Rock, February 7-8. The attendance was unusually good and the program very helpful. This is the first Seminar of this kind ever held in this Area. We were given a better understanding of the greatness of our Church and were made aware of our need for further study and research, to qualify us better to serve our Lord and Savior by serving our fellowman.

THE METHODIST FOUNDATION OF ARKANSAS

The responsibilities of the Executive Director of The Methodist Foundation of Arkansas in 1969 included: maintaining of regular contact with all donors and others known to have made wills remembering the church; counseling with three attorneys, at their request, in the preparation of wills remembering the church; counseling with six individuals regarding their wills; conducting four Estate Planning Workshops on district levels; presenting the Foundation's work to a Methodist Men's group, and to a group of church women; attending the National Council on Philanthropy; presiding at an Executive Committee meeting and at a full Board of Directors meeting of the National Association of United Methodist Foundations; attending several meetings of the two Boards of Pensions.

In February of 1969 the Foundation received two deferred gifts, one a gift of four store buildings, the other of one store building, all located in Stuttgart, Arkansas. In exchange the Foundation entered into an annui-

ty contract with each donor, giving each the income from this property as long as he lives. At the death of these donors, this income will be used in the work of the United Methodist Church in Arkansas.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY

Organization

The Commission on Minimum Salary shall be composed of one minister and one layman from each District of the Annual Conference. They shall be nominated by the Cabinet and elected by the Annual Conference, quadrennially. Vacancies shall be filled by the same procedure. The Bishop is requested to appoint one representative from his Cabinet, annually. The Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Committee shall be an ex-officio member of the Commission and administrative officer.

The Commission shall elect quadrennially a chairman, vice chairman, and secretary who, together with the secretary of the Town and Country Committee and the Cabinet representative, shall compose the executive committee. Vacancies in offices shall be filled by the Commission from its elective membership.

The Commission shall meet as often as is required to do its work, and may consign certain responsibilities to the executive committee.

Purpose

The purpose of the Minimum Salary Program is to:

1. Assist charges to pay their pastor the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference.
2. Challenge and enable charges to become self-sustaining. This is not to be thought of, or used, as a continuing mission support.

Finances

Funds for the purpose of the Commission shall be raised by an apportionment annually, to all churches of the Annual Conference of an amount equal to 3% of the base salary paid the pastor.

Program

- I. Charges are eligible for Minimum Salary Assistance provided:
 1. The pastor preaches a minimum of three times each Sunday.
 2. The combined ministerial support paid by the charge (base salary, travel and utilities) is a minimum of \$3,600.00 per year.
 3. Each church submits its budget, in writing to the Commission, through the District Superintendent annually.
 4. Each church conducts an Every Member Visitation, and reports the results to the Commission, through the District Superintendent annually.
 5. Each church pays in full all acceptances to the Conference or District Treasurer annually.
 6. The charge agrees to increase minimum salary annually moving to full support by the charge.
 7. The charge makes application to the Commission annually, on the prescribed form, by action of the Charge Conference.
 8. The charge is served by a resident full time pastor, or ministerial student approved by the Annual Conference.
- II. The Commission will supplement charges meeting these requirements to reach the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference up to the maximum of \$900.00 per year.
- III. The minimum salary for a pastor, approved by the Annual Conference for the conference year beginning June 1, 1970 shall be:

1. Resident, full time	\$5,400.00
2. Resident, student	4,800.00
3. Non-resident, student	4,000.00

Provided that, on mission charges paying less than \$3,600.00 pastoral support and meeting the foregoing requirements shall be eligible for Minimum Salary Assistance up to a maximum of \$900.00 on the following schedule:

1. Resident, full time	\$4,500.00
2. Resident, student	4,000.00
3. Non-resident, student	3,600.00
- IV. In the event of insufficient funds to meet all claims each charge shall share proportionately from the funds available.
- V. The Commission shall report annually in the Conference Journal by districts the amounts paid during the calendar year to each charge.
- VI. Charges served by part time, non-resident, retired pastors, or any pastor not yet approved by Annual Conference are not eligible for Minimum Salary Assistance.
- VII. For each dependent child under 18 or for each child in college under 24, a pastor on Minimum Salary shall receive an additional \$100.00 per year.

VIII. That the above plan of distribution of funds be made effective on June 1, 1970.

LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCE BOARD OF MINISTRY**Policy and Program**

I. The Little Rock Annual Conference Board of Ministry purposes to work strictly within the framework of the current Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church.

II. The elected officers of the board are: chairman, vice chairman, secretary and registrar.

III. The executive committee of the board are the elected officers. They shall have authority in matters committed to them by the board.

IV. The board shall meet prior to the opening of school, at Annual Conference, and on call of the chairman.

V. The board's sources of income shall be:

A. A percentage from conference benevolences.

B. One fourth (25%) of the amount collected from local churches designated for the Ministerial Education Fund.

C. Gifts, bequests, interests and repayment of loans.

VI. The board shall maintain a scholarship loan program for ministerial training as follows:

- A. For those in course of study above the level of license to preach.
 - 1. Assistance in courses of study schools
 - (a) The cost of required text books for each year of the course of study. The enrollees are required to submit to the registrar itemized statements or itemized invoices from Cokesbury for books purchased for use in the pastor's school courses.
 - (b) One round trip per term at 8¢ per mile.
 - 2. Assistance in the correspondence course
 - (a) Payment of fees
 - (b) The cost of required text books for each year of the course of study. The enrollees are to purchase the required books in their own name, to pay for them or have them charged to their own account, and then be re-imbursed by the registrar.

Above assistance repayable: Maximum received in any one year, by one year of service as a full time pastor, either as a ministerial member of the Annual Conference or a full-time lay pastor.

- B. For students from Little Rock Annual Conference churches preparing for the effective ministry in The United Methodist Church and enrolled in a college, university or seminary, approved by University Senate of The United Methodist Church and who:
 - 1. Hold a current license to preach in The United Methodist Church, or are probationary members of the Little Rock Annual Conference, or those students who present to the Annual Conference Board of Ministry, for one year only, in writing, a recommendation from the district Committee on the Ministry.
 - 2. Make application annually to the registrar of the board prior to September 1, giving all information requested and authorizing regular grade reports to this board's registrar from the school's registrar, including a transcript of credits at the end of each semester. Application must be requested.
 - 3. Make a note, properly endorsed, and payable in one of two ways:
 - (a) One full year of service as an effective minister in The United Methodist Church repaying the maximum receivable any one year.
 - (b) In cash with interest at 4% per annum, beginning at the time the recipient terminated his ministry or preparation therefor; schedule of payments to be arranged with the board's registrar.
 - 4. Summer session loans will be granted to one-half the maximum annual allowance.

VII. The board may set a maximum amount of assistance per year per recipient, but assistance will be determined for each individual on the basis of requirements or needs.

VIII. The board shall give assistance in a reasonable amount for physical examinations for men to be admitted as associate, probationary, or full members.

Requests and Recommendations

I. The board, each district superintendent, pastor and local church to hold up to young men the need for ministers and the challenge of the ministry, that may enable them to hear the call.

II. As the first step into the ministry, enrolling for studies for license to preach with the Department of Ministry of the General Board of Education.

III. Each pastor to provide himself with folders on the course of study and with the book for the course on the license to preach.

IV. That when a person has passed the correspondence work on studies for license to preach, or has completed one-fourth of the work for a Bachelor of Divinity Degree (B. D.) in an approved seminary, and in the judgment of the district Committee on the Ministry his gifts and graces commend him for the ministry, the committee license him to preach, subject to the approval of their action and renewal of this license by the District Conference.

V. Wherever possible, men in the course of study shall take their work through the courses of study schools.

VI. We assume our Annual Conference's share of financial responsibility for the Arkansas Pastor's School.

VII. The Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance to grant:

- A. An appropriation of a percentage from conference benevolences based on the board's financial needs that are not met by other sources.
- B. An apportionment to local churches for the Ministerial Education Fund based on 2% of the local budget excluding benevolences, building and debt service.

VIII. We express our appreciation for the support given the ministerial training scholarship loan program by the churches of the Annual Conference. We urge every church to give full cooperation and support to its part of the Ministerial Education Fund for the remainder of this year and in 1971.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

The Board of Missions reports the following items as significant accomplishments in helping the church to be in mission during the year: (1) The Board co-operated in sponsoring the Inter-Conference School of Christian Mission at Hendrix last summer and plans to continue as a co-sponsor; (2) Indian Mission Week was held in November with five Indian Ministers from Oklahoma itinerating in the Conference for 5 days, (3) Rev. David Bauman, a Methodist Missionary assigned to Gujarat, India visited churches during a ten-day period from April 12-24. (4) The Board continues to assist rural charges and new congregations with a salary aid program, as well as providing church extension grants for buildings and parsonages. (5) The Board provided support for the following pilot or continuing mission projects in the Conference: Camp Aldersgate, Lakes Ministry in the Arkadelphia District and the **Contact** ministry in Little Rock.

The Board of Missions has the following plans for 1970-71:

1. We recommend that each local church or charge include a church-wide mission study as a part of the church program. The studies for 1970-71: are: "Communicating the Gospel—How the Word Gets Around" and "The Americas: How Many Words?" The Conference Missionary Secretary and the District secretaries are available as resource persons to help in planning.

2. We recommend that each local church have an "Advance Special" project of mission support and that where possible, local congregations accept a portion of the salary support of individual missionaries of the U.M. Church. The Conference and District Missionary Secretaries can provide additional information.

3. The Board will be searching for new ways to help the church be **in mission** and is eager to help local congregations and districts initiate and support new forms of mission.

4. We recommend that during the remainder of this Quadrennium we direct our General Advance Special Gifts to assist in the building of a pediatric wing of Pfeifer Memorial Hospital in La Paz, Bolivia, where Miss Helen Wilson, a missionary from our Conference, is serving. We know that the churches of our Conference will want to participate in this most worthwhile and vital addition to this Hospital. We urge each church to give this its most prayerful consideration.

Under the organization of the United Methodist Church, the program of Town and Country Ministries is included as the responsibility of this Board and we plan to co-operate fully and work closely with the Program Council and its staff in meeting the needs of Town and Country Churches and providing leadership in this area. We nominate Dr. Alvin C Murray as Conference Missionary Secretary and respectfully request that the Conference elect him and Bishop Paul V. Galloway publicly assign him in this capacity. He will work cooperatively with the Director of the Program Council and his associate(s) and the District Missionary Secretaries in promoting the cause of missions in our Conference.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

Due to the outstanding opportunities for growth in certain strategic churches in the Conference, the Board of Missions recommends that the usual regulation governing the use of Special Church Extension Funds be suspended to permit granting funds to them. These churches represent young and growing congregations, which are now under rather heavy burdens of debt, but which will have better growth opportunities if help can be given them. This is also in view of the fact that there are no new churches expected to request these funds during the current year.

We further recommend that the following monies from Special Church extension be granted: St. Andrews Church, Little Rock, \$10,000; Carr Memorial Church, Pine Bluff, \$5,000; Good Faith Church, Pine Bluff, \$3,000. These funds to be used to assist in relieving indebtedness for building.

REPORT OF BOARD OF PENSIONS

A. Distribution

Fulfilling our responsibility as the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church we have authorized the payment for claims as follows:

To 45 members retired by the Little Rock Annual Conference with a total of 1,354.50 years of approved service.

To 51 widows of former members retired by the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 1,161.00 years of service.

To 3 dependent children of deceased ministers retired by Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on 86.25 years of approved service.

To 13 Special Conference Claimants from the Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 151.25 years of approved service.

To 8 widows of Special Conference Claimants of Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on a total of 134 years of service.

To 2 children of Special Conference Claimants of Little Rock Conference whose pensions are based on 20 years of approved service.

To 37 former members retired by other Conferences with a total of 358 years of approved service.

To 35 widows of former members retired by other annual Conferences whose pensions are based on a total of 242.75 years of service.

To 2 Special Conference Claimants retired by other Conferences with 7.75 years of approved service.

To 1 widow of Special Conference Claimants whose pensions are based on a total of 16.75 years of service.

The Little Rock Conference is responsible for 3,052.94 years of service. This makes an increase of 40.53 years over the report for 1968.

These annuity claims have been paid on the basis of the following rates established by the Annual Conference:

Conference Members (100% of Annuity Rate) \$56 per service year.

Widows of Conference Members (70% of Annuity Rate) \$39.20 per service year.

Dependent children of Conference Members (25% of Annuity Rate) \$14 per service year.

Special Conference Claimants (100% of Annuity Rate) \$56 per service year.

Widows of Special Conference Claimants (70% of Annuity Rate) \$39.20 per service year.

Dependent children of Special Conference Claimants (25% of Annuity Rate) \$14 per service year.

Payment of these annuities are made on the last day of each month due.

B. Other Responsibilities

1. Premiums paid for 112 claimants eligible for Group Hospitalization at a cost of \$4,964.62.

2. Premiums paid for 60 claimants eligible for Death Benefit Program of the Conference Group coverage at an annual premium of \$7,375.20.

3. \$4 voluntary portion of Medicare paid claimants at an annual cost of \$7,288.00.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

C. Recommendations

1. We recommend that the annuity rate be set at \$59.00 per service for both retired members of the conference and special Conference claimants. We further recommend that this annuity rate be made retroactive to January 1, 1970.

2. We recommend that the apportionments to the charges of the annual conference for conference claimants be an amount equal to 25% of the pastors salary provided that 20% of the above 25% shall be used for current distributions and 5% shall be used for a restrictive endowment fund.

3. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1381 Section 5 of the 1968 Discipline that the Sunday following Easter, April 18, 1971 be observed as Retired Ministers Day. Each pastor is urged to acquaint his congregation with the pension program of the conference as part of the observance, and, if possible, to use retired ministers in the worship service.

4. We recommend that the General Board of Pensions continue to write and distribute the monthly payments to our annuitants and that the payments be made on the last day of each month.

5. In keeping with Par. 1379 Section 5 of the 1968 Discipline, we recommend approval by the annual conference that special appointments shall be listed in the conference journal as follows: (1) with annuity claim (a) upon the annual conference, or (b) upon a general board, an institution, or an agency of The United Methodist Church; (2) without annuity claim upon this annual conference.

6. We recommend that the board continue to apportion to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the conference the sum of \$360.00 per year in accord with the 1968 Discipline (Par. 1379 Section 3.a.(3)); and that said apportionments be paid to the treasurer of the Little Rock Board of Pensions not later than 15 days prior to the end of the fiscal year. And that a like amount be assessed upon the office of the District Superintendent and said amount to be paid from the District Superintendent's Fund.

7. We recommend that eligible Conference Claimants and special Conference Claimants will have the Death Benefit Program provided for them with the contribution to be paid by the Conference Board of Pensions in accordance with the program of the Conference Committee on Group Insurance.

8. We recommend that eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants will have $\frac{1}{2}$ of the annual payment of the Conference Group Hospitalization paid by the Conference Board of Pensions. In addition we recommend that the eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants will have the voluntary portion of the Medicare paid by the Conference Board of Pensions.

9. We recommend that all retired ministers who serve appointments under the District Superintendent, and receive less than \$1,000.00 in annual salary and expense from the charge will have their contributions and premiums paid by the Conference Board of Pensions as outlined in Par. 7 and 8 of this report.

10. We recommend that an amount equal to the maximum amount allowed by the Internal Revenue Service for housing be designated housing allowance from the pensions received by the retired ministers.

11. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1380 Section 6 of the 1968 Discipline that there shall be organized from the membership of the Board of Pensions of the Little Rock Conference a committee to compare the records of the amount paid by each pastoral charge for the support of pastors and for pension benefit purposes, computing the proportional distribution thereof and keeping a permanent record of defaults of the ministers in the conference who have failed to observe the provisions in Par. 1380 Section 6 pertaining to proportional payment; and shall render annually to each minister and charge in default a statement of the amounts in default for that and preceding years.

In event of default by any pastoral charge after due notification by the committee, liens shall be filed against future pensions and the names of the churches and ministers along with the amount in default shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

12. We request that the Conference Statistician provide a column in the Conference Journal listing the number of Memorials made through each local church to the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas.

13. We recommend that Earl S. Walker be given credit for an additional three fourth year of service.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE PROGRAM COUNCIL

1. On nomination of the Bishop and the Cabinet, we have elected Everett M. Vinson as Conference Program Director, and request that Bishop Paul V. Galloway appoint him to this office.

2. Since TRAFECO is now a Committee of the Program Council, we recommend a closer cooperation with the Program Council staff in order to effect a complete transition by 1972.

3. And, since the Committee on Publishing Interests is a committee of the Program Council, we urge that it take active leadership in the Council in promoting the use of good literature in every local church.

4. That the Church and Community Committee of the Board of Missions (formerly the Town and Country Commission) become an effective group in devising and planning a vital ministry for small town and open country churches.

5. Program Council staff job analysis.

a. We understand that the Program of the Annual Conference resides in and springs from the Boards and Agencies of the Annual Conference. To implement, co-ordinate, administer this program we have a Program Council. The Executive Secretary of this Council is the Conference Program Director.

b. The Conference Program Director shall have a consultative relationship to the Bishop and Cabinet on Conference Program matters relating to co-ordination, implementation, promotion, and administration of the Conference Program.

c. The Executive Committee will be the co-ordinating agency

of the Council with whom the Program Director will work to delineate areas of responsibility and assignments for himself and the Associate Director(s) and other members of the Conference Staff. We recommend that the Executive Committee meet at least quarterly to assist the Program Director and his Staff in administering the Conference Program.

d. The Program Director and his Staff will work with the Conference Boards and Agencies to initiate, formulate, implement, plan and administer programs of the Boards and Agencies to fulfill the mission of the Church through the Annual Conference.

e. All dates, plans and programs being initiated by any Conference Commission, Committee, organization, agency, or by any local church effecting the Conference, shall be cleared through this office.

f. The Program Director shall lead the Council in fulfilling the functions of the Annual Conference Program Council as set forth in the Discipline, #841.10.

g. The Program Director shall serve as consultant to all committees of the Program Council.

CAMP TANAKO

Camp Tanako, located on beautiful Lake Catherine, continues to serve the Little Rock Conference offering worship, study, Christian fellowship and recreation for all ages.

The program is constantly being improved to meet the changing needs of our Conference. On the basis of a careful study, the summer youth program has been revamped. This summer we will have for youth three Junior High Camps, three Middle High, one Senior High and a Conference Camp. We will also have a pioneer project, our first Experimental Junior High Camp, a special camp for socially deprived young people.

The Conference Children's Choir Camp, a pioneer project last year, was so successful that it will be repeated this year; and as usual we will have the Children's Workers Laboratory Enterprise which always gives excellent guidance to workers with children.

The Young Adults last summer had a Lay Witness Mission at Tanako. Over one hundred sixty young adults and their children attended. It was such a success that it will be repeated this year; and the Layman's Assembly will probably follow the same format.

The physical facilities of the Camp are constantly being improved. One hundred new beds have been purchased for the comfort of our campers; and many other improvements have been made.

In order to continue to serve effectively financial assistance is badly needed to pay off the indebtedness incurred when Milner Hall was built and in order to make the many improvements needed. We, therefore, recommend a continuation of the financial policy currently followed:

1. From Conference Apportionments, \$9,000.00

2. From local church budgets and a free-will offering the fourth Sunday in April
3. Gifts from individuals and special groups

Request for Allocation:

We respectfully request that the World Service and Finance Commission continue to support TRAFCO with an allocation of \$3500, of which amount \$2500 shall be designated for General TRAFCO, and \$1050 shall be designated for Conference TRAFCO, and in recognition of the growing services which are being rendered through our film library, that a strong emphasis be made upon the continued support from the local churches of ten cents per member.

Further Requests:

We further request that the World Service and Finance Commission emphasize the importance of the observance of TRAFCO Sunday, the fourth Sunday in October, with the emphasis upon raising the ten cents per member offering. With this special interest last year, our giving from the local churches doubled.

We further request that the World Service and Finance Commission continue to emphasize the observance of TRAFCO Sunday by including, as in the past under the section, **Special Days and Appeals** this statement: "TRAFCO Sunday, fourth Sunday in October, ten cents per member."

We wish to commend Miss Joana Dean for her faithful, efficient service as Librarian. She now mails to churches of the Conference an average of fifty items monthly.

We call upon the pastors to give full cooperation in returning films to the film library no later than the morning following the showings, in order to prevent cancellation of scheduled showings for other churches.

The new Discipline states in Paragraph 843 that the purpose of our Committee on Television, Radio and Film Communications shall be as follows: "In each Annual Conference Program Council, chosen by it and amenable to it, there shall be a **Committee on Television, Radio and Film Communication**, which in cooperation with the program boards and other agencies in the conference shall have as its purpose the serving of the conference in the field of communication by: (1) Promotion of the principles of good communication. (2) Promotion of the use of mass-communication methods and materials by the local churches. (3) Where necessary, establishment of audio-visual libraries and assistance in training audio-visual librarians. (4) Production and distribution of programs for conference-wide use. (5) Cooperation with the conference Board of Education

and other conference agencies in providing training opportunities for leaders in the use of audio-visual methods and materials. (6) Service to other agencies of the conference and close cooperation with the conference or area public relations office. (7) Cooperation with other agencies in the organization and training of local-church Audio-visual Committees. (8) Cooperation with the Division of Television, Radio, and Film Communication in the promotion and placement of television and radio programs within the conference.

We urge all pastors to give special attention to the moral implications on television, radio, and in motion pictures, giving emphasis to the best possible choices in all of these areas, and also to publish in the weekly letter or bulletin the selections recommended in the bulletin you receive from General Trafco. Each pastor receives this information a period of two months in advance of the showing.

In accord with the General Conference action, we are recommending that this amount, which is representative of the 2% requirement, be apportioned to the local churches by the District Superintendents.

F. Advance Specials: (Apportioned on a percentage basis).

We also recommend that Camp Aldersgate be designated as a Conference Advance Special and supported on a voluntary basis.

G. Hendrix College ----- \$93,000.00

This amount to be apportioned to the local Churches by the District Superintendents.

H. Pastor's Utilities—If a charge does not otherwise provide for a pastor's utilities, then each charge is requested to designate the cost of parsonage utilities as a part of the assessee's salary, thus exempting the cost of the utilities from the income tax claims. It is understood that designation of a part of salary as utilities for tax purposes does not exempt this amount from percentage that would normally be levied against it.

I. Other authorized payments by Conference Treasurer:

Committee on Archives and History—\$1,500.00 from Suspense Fund.

Methodist Foundation of Arkansas—\$1,500.00 from Conference Administration Fund.

Incidental expenses of the Boards and Agencies not receiving appropriations to be paid from Conference Administration Fund.

Annual Conference Host Church be paid any deficit in Conference entertainment expenses upon financial statement to the Treasurer, to be paid from Conference Administration Fund.

J. Conference Benevolences Unrestricted Fund—All unrestricted benevolent fund balances be placed in a central operating balance instead of being retained in the name of the various boards and commissions.

K. We recommend that the District Superintendent adhere as closely as possible to the Decimal in making appropriations to the churches. We also recommend that the apportionments be reviewed periodically in light of the changing characteristics of the local churches in order to make them more equitable.

L. We are in accord with the Board of Christian Social Concerns in recommending that the churches of the Little Rock Annual Conference make voluntary financial contributions to the "Arkansas Release Guidance Foundation."

M. We recommend a supplemental appropriation of \$2,156.00 be made to the Program Council for fiscal year 1970.

N. In order to work toward a more effective ministry on our college campuses, we recommend that the Bishop appoint a joint committee for a thoroughgoing study of the Wesley Foundation program in our state.

O. We recommend a study be made to improve the Joint Treasurer's Office and that a report be made by June 1, 1971.

P. We recommend interest income from investments shall continue to go to the Conference Administration Fund.

Q. We renew our permission to Philander Smith College to seek funds within the bounds of the Little Rock Conference.

WOMEN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCE — 1970

In the 12 month period ending December 31, 1969 the 10,426 Members of the Little Rock Conference Women's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild sent to the Women's Division \$113,114.48. \$106,292.87 as pledge to Missions; Call to Prayer and Self Denial \$5,214.42; Supplementary Giving \$1,607.19. Societies and Guilds raised and spent on the local level \$45,071.31.

Through the Student Loan Fund we assisted our former Church and Community Workers, Miss Judy Atwood and Miss Doris Fair, to return to College for additional study.

In September Mrs. Grace Dwyer was assigned to the Hot Springs Area as Church and Community Worker. We are indeed fortunate to have the quality of experience which Mrs. Dwyer brings to our Conference.

The First Cooperative Inter-Conference School of Christian Mission, held at Hendrix last July, was successful not only in attendance and program but for the first time there was an opportunity for the Women's Societies, Guilds and Boards of Missions of the three Conferences in the Arkansas Area to share in the planning and leadership of a School of Mission as well as the opportunity to study together. We joyfully look forward to the Second Cooperative Inter-Conference School following the same pattern—a Three Day School July 15-17 and the Weekend School July 17-19. Dr. William S. Sparks from St. Pauls School of Theology will conduct a special evening workshop for ministers, Using the Psalms In Preaching and In Worship. A very special guest will be Miss Helen B. Wilson, our own Little Rock Conference girl who is a Missionary to Bolivia.

We are gratified by the response to the Mission Study Materials Library set up by our Conference Chairman of Missionary Education. She has serviced 15 churches with books and materials on a loan basis and acted as resource for other literature and audio visuals concerning the studies. This service will be continued.

The Spring Meetings of the District Societies combined the business of annual meetings with workshops designed to help equip women for leadership as they develop a personal responsibility for the whole task of the church.

The 1970 Annual Meeting of the Conference Wesleyan Service Guild is set for October 4 at Camp Tanako with the Women's Society Annual Meeting at Pulaski Heights on October 7.

Sixty three women from the Little Rock Conference attended the 1970 Assembly May 7-10 in Houston. Bishop Kenneth Copeland welcomed us with these words "Your theme CHOOSE LIFE enunciates the greatest challenge in today's world. It's focused against the backdrop of the changeless message of redemption through the relevant mission of reconciliation." Dr. Cynthia Wedel said to us "To people without faith this is a terrible world. To people with faith—God is moving in His world as a mighty wind. These are times of magnificent challenge. We can go out to this scene with hope, courage, joy and determination to work together with God to make the scene, God's scene." For the women of the Little Rock Conference I say, Hallelujah.

At the 1970 Session of the Annual Conference we will have a display on worship, which may include resource materials, music and parameters.

We have requested funds from the World Service and Finance Commission to help with this project and are discussing with representatives from the North Arkansas Conference Commission on Worship the possibility of having this on an Area basis.

We request each District Superintendent to include in his district staff for the next Conference Year a District Director of Worship to work with the Commission in promoting its work in the districts.

We encourage faithful attendance at the services of worship during the Annual Conference Session.

We appreciate the interest and encouragement of our Bishop, Paul V. Galloway, in our work. He has been most co-operative and helpful.

Memoirs

ANDREW JAY CHRISTIE

Andrew Jay Christie, for more than forty-five years a loyal and beloved member of the Little Rock Conference, and for two years in the North Arkansas Conference, passed to his eternal reward shortly after-



noon on April 22, 1970 in Texarkana, after a long illness. He was born July 4, 1894 at Mt. Pleasant, Texas, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Allen Christie. In childhood he was moved with his parents to the Christie Chapel community in Columbia County, Arkansas. He grew up in that community and joined the Christie Chapel Church. He was licensed to preach by Rev. W. P. Whaley, on July 8, 1915 and the Camden District Conference.

He was a member of the American Expeditionary Force in 1917-18 and spent one year in France.

For two years he taught school in Columbia County. He attended Henderson-Brown College and was graduated from that College, with the A.B. Degree on July 6, 1922. His diploma was reissued by Hendrix College, May 31, 1937. Perhaps the finest thing he ever did was to marry Miss Florence

Wilber of Nashville, Arkansas. This he did on June 4, 1922, Rev Franklin P. Doak, her pastor, performing the ceremony. To this union there was born one son, James Edward. Rev. James Edward Christie, formerly a member of the Little Rock Conference, is now a member of the Louisiana Conference and is pastor of the Bunkie United Methodist Church in the Alexandria District. Rev. and Mrs. James Edward Christie have one son, Kenneth, who was always the pride and joy of his Grandfather.

On December 2, 1921 in the afternoon meeting of the sixty-eighth session of the Little Rock Conference, at First Church, Pine Bluff; Andrew Jay Christie, recommended by the Camden District Conference, was admitted on trial in the Little Rock Conference. Other members of his class were C. D. Cade, Geo. W. Warren, J. C. Glenn, J. H. Crossett, J. H. Cohn, R. L. Long, O. C. Birdwell, and Grover Cleveland Bishop Edmund DuBose Mouzon officiated. He was also ordained a deacon by Bishop Mouzon at that same session of the conference.

Andy Christie was admitted in Full Connection by Bishop James Atkins at First Church, Little Rock on November 30, 1923. He was ordained an Elder by Bishop Sam R. Hay, at Arkadelphia, November 22, 1925.

A. J. Christie served twice as district superintendent, once for the full six year term as District Superintendent of the Texarkana District from November 16, 1941 to November 2, 1947 and then again through the session of the Conference in 1960, acting in the place of Kenneth L. Spore, District Superintendent of the Monticello District who was ill at the time.

For 32 years, A. J. Christie was pastor in the Little Rock Conference at the following places:

He also served in the North Arkansas Conference two years, 1953-55, at Springdale.

He retired at the one hundred and seventh session of the Little Rock Conference at Hot Springs, June 3, 1960, Bishop Paul E. Martin, presiding.

For some four years after retirement he supplied the Garland Methodist Church in the Hope District, from his home at 1913 Laurel Street in Texarkana, Arkansas. He and his lovely wife had acquired this home some years earlier and moved there in June 1960, after retirement. They had almost ten happy years there together.

During the years of his ministry he was afforded the opportunity to serve his conference on a number of Boards and Committees; among them the boards of Education and Missions and the Committee on Conference Relations and investigation. Perhaps his greatest service to the Little Rock Conference along this line was his membership on the Special Committee in 1949 which redistricted the conference, reduced the number of districts and equalized the salaries of the District Superintendents. This committee also set up a minimum salary for the conference. A. J. Christie rendered outstanding service on this special committee. The writer of these lines knows this full well as he was Chairman of this Committee. He was always proud of his membership on the Board of Trustees of Camp Tanako. He was a member of that Board at the time of his retirement. He worked in the youth camps of our Conference, probably longer and with greater effectiveness than almost anyone else in the history of our Conference.

Andrew Christie was a Master Mason and a member of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite of Freemasonry affiliated with the Arkansas Scottish Rite Bodies of Little Rock, Arkansas.

The funeral was held in The First United Methodist Church in Texarkana, Arkansas at 2 p.m., April 23, 1970 with Dr. J. Ralph Hillis in charge and Dr. Francis, A. Buddin, and Dr. Arthur Terry assisting. The burial was in the Ronda Memorial Park, near Texarkana in Miller County, Arkansas.

In addition to his wife and son, he was survived by his sister, Mrs. Kate George and a brother, Arven Christie.

No person ever knew a better man than A. J. Christie. So many people in so many places, over a long and useful life, were blessed so by his good life. The present writer counts it as one of his greatest blessings that he was privileged to be closely associated with Andy Christie part of their ministry.

Surely all who knew him must join with the poet who said:

"More homelike seems the vast unknown,
 Since he has entered there"

SAMUEL LEE DURHAM

Samuel Lee Durham was born in Gardinsville, Georgia (Smith County) on January 29, 1879. He joined the Little Rock Conference in 1918 and was received into full connection and ordained Deacon in 1923. Two years later he was ordained Elder.

The writer knew Brother Durham only slightly. He was living in Winchester, Arkansas during the time the writer was serving his first pastoral charge. I visited him several times, enjoying the fellowship.

Brother Durham served eleven charges during his short ministry. He served the Hope mission for three years 1914-1916. This was his first appointment as an accepted supply. He then served these other charges: Amity Mission, Prescott Circuit, Emmett, Chidester, Benuauist Circuit, Doddridge Circuit, Richmond Circuit, Emerson Circuit, and Mineral Springs.

He retired from the active ministry in 1930, having served for sixteen years. For the last several years he made his home with his daughter, Mrs. Hazel Pogue, in Sulphur Springs, Texas. He passed away on November 22, 1969 in the Sulphur Springs Nursing Home, having lived almost 90 years. He was buried beside his wife in Mt. Moriah Cemetery on the Prescott Circuit.

He is survived by one son, Bill Durham, Wills Point, Texas; two daughters, Mrs. Hazel Pogue, Sulphur Springs, Texas; and Mrs. Eunice Skiles, Bearden, Arkansas. His faithful wife preceeded him in death many years.

THE REVEREND JOHN J. McKNIGHT

The Reverend John J. McKnight was born June 8, 1917 at Success, Arkansas, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Jacob McKnight. He received his public school education in the state of Indiana. He attended Henderson Brown College. He served in the 11th Infantry, Fifth Division of the United States Army during World War II. He was captured and held a prisoner of war for eight and one-half months in Burma.

He and his first wife were married in 1945, and to this union was born a son, John J. McKnight, Jr. Both were killed in an untimely automobile accident.

On February 15, 1956 Brother McKnight and Miss Ollie Ophelia Lowry were married. She is his only survivor.

Brother McKnight began his ministry in the Little Rock Conference as an Approved Supply Pastor in 1958. He was admitted on trial in 1964 and into full connection in 1966, and was ordained Elder the same year. During his ministry he served the following churches:

St. Andrew Methodist Church, Arkadelphia — two years
Dalark Circuit for seventeen months
Huttig — Bolding Charge for four years
Traskwood-Ebenezer Charge for five years

Brother McKnight died in the Veterans' Administration Hospital in Little Rock on March 16, 1970. Funeral services were conducted at the Ebenezer United Methodist Church on Wednesday, March 18 by C. Ray Hozendorf and J. Paul Horton. He is buried in the Ebenezer Cemetery. Paul's statement from II Timothy 4:7-8: "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will award to me on that Day . . ." sums up his life. He began his ministry later than most, but no man ever gave more of himself in serving the Lord's people than he. He was a good pastor and demonstrated it by his constant prayers and visiting of the sick and shut-in.

Life was not always easy for Brother McKnight. He had tragedy,



suffering, sorrow and heartbreak through the years, but he played the game, knowing all the time that the race is not won until the finish line is crossed and he never slackened his effort along the way. By faithful preaching, by example, by prayers and by patient suffering he sought to advance Christ's Cause. His life was a demonstration of the fact that no one will escape the sorrows and disappointments of this life and that everyone can go on with the full knowledge and assurance "that all things works together for good for those who love God."

IRA M. MITCHELL

We are sure the final verdict on Ira Mitchell will be "well done good and faithful servant, thou hast been faithful—enter into the joys of thy Lord." Here was a man who had taken all the he had and "wrapped it in a bundle" with the cause of Christ and His Church.

Ira came late into the ministry of the Church. After he was licensed he hesitated to take an appointment for fear he might not be able to do the work as he thought it should be done. Once committed, however, he put himself whole-heartedly into the work. He had a good mind and he pursued his studies with diligence. He completed each year's study on time. He used his summer vacation time to attend the pastor's school at Southern Methodist University. He kept up his pastoral responsibilities with good conscience. He prepared for his pulpit ministry with care.

One reason he wore himself out was that he had such a high ideal for the work of the ministry of the Church. He found it difficult to accept his own short comings. He wanted his people to be worthy Methodists, the real "people of God." Indifference, carelessness, low living stirred him with righteous indignation.

He was ill before conference last year and was urged to retire. Perhaps he should have. But he loved the work. He was willing to give up some days he might have gained for the service he could render. He really gave "the last full measure of his devotion." He ploughed out "the long furrow" to the end, "content to give."

Ira, son of the late Clayton and Nancy Johnson Mitchell, was born at Rison, Arkansas, February 18, 1901. He and Hazel Ione Dixon were married in December 1919. Mrs. Mitchell survives him. There are two surviving children, Benjamin E., of Memphis, Tennessee, and Ira B., also of Memphis, Tennessee.

He died at Springhill General Hospital, February 1st, and his funeral service was at Pine Bluff, Arkansas, February 3rd. The service was conducted by Dr. Roy Bagley, his District Superintendent. Dr. Arthur Terry and E. Clifton Rule assisted in the service.

He had served as pastor of Little Prairie Circuit, St. Charles and Pleasant Grove, Humphrey and Humnoke, Wilmar, Few Memorial and his last appointment was Welcome.

He never aspired to the charge of the large congregation. But the strength of Christ's Church is not in the large congregations nor in the men who serve them. It comes from the devoted service of an un-named host of men and women, many of whose names we may never hear, who in life and service give their clear witness to Him. And from those who give to the pastoral relation the spirit of the Shepherd, and who give day after day, year after year all they have for the flock committed to them. Ira was one of these. His earthly work done, he abides in eternal habitation. He waits there. As the little child said of Enoch and God, "they walked all day together and when the dark was coming God said to him 'stay here with me,' so it could be said of Ira M. Mitchell, faithful servant of God.

MRS. JANIE HERVEY MONTGOMERY

Mrs. Janie Hervey Montgomery was born September 14, 1884 in Hope, Arkansas, the daughter of J. P. and Emma Black Hervey, pioneer residents of Hempstead County.

She was reared in Hope and attended school there, where her father was a well-known and successful attorney.

On October 21, 1908 she was joined in Holy Matrimony to J. D. Montgomery who was also an outstanding attorney. To them was born one son, James Dee (or "Jim" as he was affectionately called by his friends.)

Jim, too, was a person of unusual ability. For example, some may recall that he was editor of the Hendrix College "Profile" at the time when the Methodists of Arkansas decided to consolidate Galloway, Hendrix, and Henderson-Brown colleges into one institution. It was largely through the influence of Jim's editorials and work that the name "Hendrix" was retained. Jim passed away in California in 1963.

Mr. Montgomery, the lawyer, felt the call to preach and was admitted into the Little Rock Annual Conference in 1925. Through the rich years of his ministry his faithful wife stood by his side, upholding her beloved husband with her work, encouragement and prayers. So valued was their work that the Conference asked them to continue to serve several years after Brother Montgomery's official retirement in 1953.

When health began to fail, Brother and Mrs. Montgomery moved back to their home town of Hope, where they enjoyed the fellowship of their many friends and relatives.

On February 15, 1970, after an extended illness, Mrs. Montgomery was released from her pain and discomfort to find her place in that "House of Many Rooms."

Those of us who knew Mrs. Montgomery will continue to give God praise for the fine way He led her in fulfilling her role as a devoted wife, mother, and servant of God.

MRS. PAUL Q. RORIE

Mrs. Paul Q. Rorie was born in Arkadelphia, Arkansas, February 23, 1887, and was released from her physical body on February 14, 1970 at the Clark County Hospital in Arkadelphia. Her given name, oddly enough, was William Esma Trigg Rorie, she having been given the boy's name by her grandfather, W. A. Trigg, who was sure the expected heir would be a boy. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Peoples Trigg, a pioneer family in Clark County.

Shortly after her grandfather's death, she was married to Paul Q. Rorie, at the age of 18, in 1907. The couple settled in Arkadelphia, where the future preacher began the practice of law. As Dr. J. L. Canon wrote in his memoir of Brother Rorie: "Paul had every qualification that a young man ought to have to make a successful lawyer . . . but a lawyer he was not to be. God intervened in the case . . . and made a prophet out of the young man. In 1909 he was licensed to preach and admitted on trial in the Little Rock Annual Conference in 1912. "The couple went to Emory University where they both were in school, while Paul was working for his B.D. degree. Here Mrs. Rorie studied voice, and later in the pastorate and revivals she was a great help and inspiration to her husband with her voice.

Mrs. Rorie was a good Christian wife and mother, and in the midst of later years, filled with bodily suffering, she had a splendid outlook upon life. She is survived by a daughter, Miss Ruth Rorie of Blytheville, Arkansas, and Paul Q. Rorie, Jr., of Arkadelphia. The service of commemoration was held in Arkadelphia by the writer, with interment in Rosehill Cemetery, Arkadelphia.

X. Miscellaneous

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

1. Nominations. The District Superintendents shall nominate all members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees, except as otherwise provided.

2. Financial and Statistical. (1) The District Superintendents shall furnish the treasurer with all assessments and acceptances of the pastoral charges not less than sixty days before the meeting of the Annual Conference. These figures shall be official. (2) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars, with no column for cents. (3) Each pastor shall report to the Conference Treasurer and turn in his statistical report to the statistician at a date set by the cabinet. The Treasurer's Report from the Pastor will be audited and checked by the Final Data-Processing Print-Out. Where there is discrepancy, the amount recorded on the Print-Out will prevail.

3. Memoirs: There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased clerical member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, names of children, charges served, and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with the memoir. The same shall be done for probationary members, associate members and lay pastors. Like wise, a memoir of wives or widows of the above shall be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Committee on Memoirs the death of any of the above mentioned and be responsible for the submission of Memoirs not later than thirty days after the death occurs. The names of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions, or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. It shall be the duty of the District Superintendents to report to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions the death of any conference claimant that occurs in their respective districts.

4. Administrative Fund. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall recommend an assessment for a Conference Administrative Fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expense of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this Fund. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the Fund. Payments from the Fund shall be made only on vouchers signed by the Secretary of the Conference; provided that this rule does not relate to the salary and expenses of the Treasurer of the Conference.

5. Conference Treasurer. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the Conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer, on recommendation of the World Service Commission, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.

6. Number of Districts: There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Conference.

7. District Fund: The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall

report to the district conference, annually, showing receipts and disbursements.

8. Reports and Resolutions: There shall be a pre-conference report which shall contain reports of all the boards and agencies of the Conference. This report shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Annual Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the pre-conference reports shall be typewritten, in triplicate, on special forms furnished by the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary. In the event editing of a report is deemed necessary by the Conference Secretary and chairman of the board involved, permission is hereby granted.

9. Membership of the Commission on Archives and History: The Commission on Archives and History shall be composed of ten or more members, one of whom shall be the Conference Secretary. In addition to the duties outlined in the Discipline, the Commission shall secure a group picture of each class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal; and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his retirement.

10. Safeguarding Historical Material: (1) Any member of the Little Rock Annual Conference, or layman authorized by a member of the Conference, may examine historical documents within the Headquarters Building. (2) To remove historical documents from the Headquarters Building, a written request signed by the presiding Bishop and Conference Secretary shall be presented to the Custodian. Provided further, historical documents belonging to the Conference Women's Society may be removed from Headquarters Building upon written request signed by the President and Secretary of the Women's Conference. (3) The Custodian of historical documents shall be given a receipt for any material removed from the vault in the Headquarters Building, Little Rock, giving date of removal and name of receiver.

11. District Conference: There may be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline, and one additional member from each pastoral charge, provided however, in charges of more than five hundred members there shall be one additional member for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.

12. Lay Members: Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the pastor-host of the Annual Conference at least fifteen days before the session of the Annual Conference.

13. Board Service. No person may be nominated to serve on the same Conference Board for more than two consecutive quadrenniums, and may not be nominated to serve on more than one board at the same time. District Superintendents may not serve on Conference Boards, except as provided in the Discipline, or by specific conference action. A person failing to attend a board of which he is a member in a quadrennium may be continued only by special board action.

14. Entertainment: The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the retired ministers shall be entertained from the entertainment fund. Certain proceeds from the offerings shall go to the fund. The entertainment fund shall be administered by three men, to be named by the Cabinet, who will be reporting to the next session of the Annual Conference.

15. Conference Expense: Registration fees and the offerings at the public services in the session of the Annual Conference shall be used to

defray the expense of the session, including the expense and/or honorarium of the conference preacher and that any deficit remaining be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund, and the Conference Treasurer shall pay the same.

16. Unsponsored Resolutions: Any resolution not sponsored by a regular board or standing committee of the Conference must lie over for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon, provided, however, immediate debate and action may be ordered by two-thirds vote of the Conference present and voting.

17. Apportionments Based on Pastor's Salary: On all items apportioned to local churches by means of a percentage of the ministers' salary, such percentage shall be understood to apply to all ministerial members of the local church staff serving under the appointment of the Bishop, including ministers in full connection, ministers on trial, and full time Lay Pastors. This rule to be in effect with the 1966-67 Conference Year.

18. Campaigns. All Conference-wide campaigns to raise funds shall be voted on by ballot.

19. Amendments. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing on day before the vote is taken.
