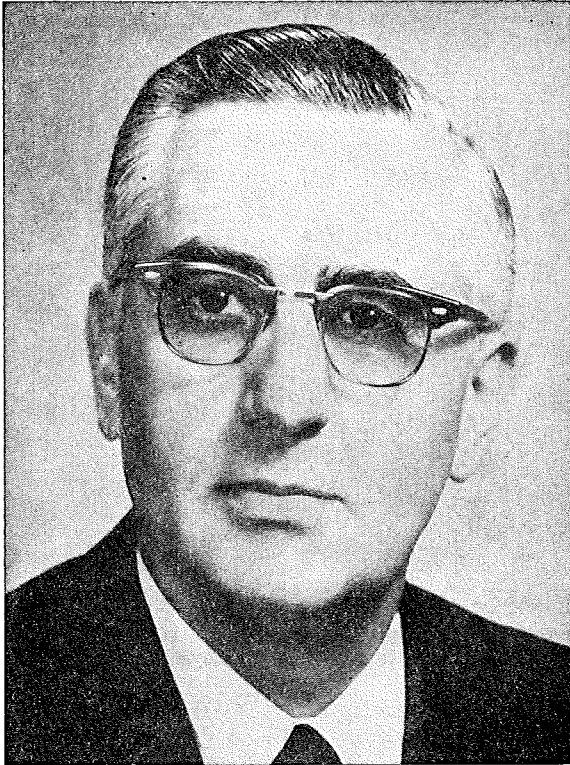

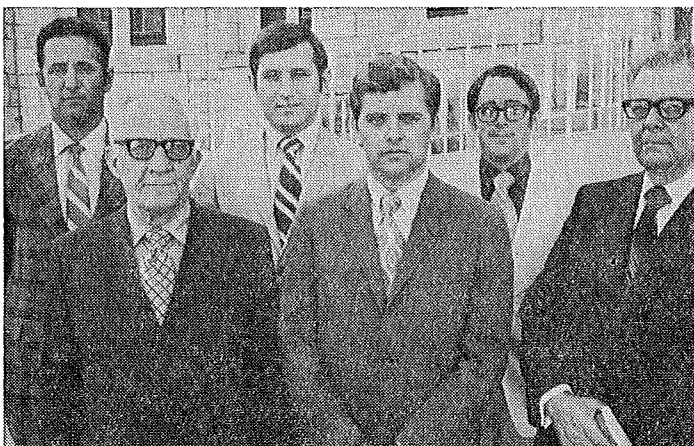

CONFERENCE MINUTES

Monday, May 24, 1971, 3:30 P.M.

Sacrament of the Lord's Supper

The one hundred eighteenth session of the Little Rock Annual Conference was called to order by Bishop Paul V. Galloway, who then made certain relevant announcements and introduced Dr. Walter Hazzard, Preacher for the service. Bishop Galloway announced the opening hymn, "And Are We Yet Alive."

Following singing of the hymn, George W. Martin read the opening verses of Scripture from the ritual of Holy Communion and led the opening prayer. Bishop Galloway led in the Gloria in Excelsis, the Prayer of Confession, and the Prayer for Pardon. George Ivey read the Scriptural Words of Assurance and led in the prayer for the whole state of Christ's church.

The Children's Junior Choir of the First United Methodist Church of Hot Springs, under direction of David Aston, offered the anthem.

Dr. Walter Hazzard, President of Philander Smith College, thanked the Conference for its support of Philander Smith. He then addressed the Conference on "A Christian's Progress", based on the fourteenth chapter of Paul's letter to the Philippians.

Bishop Galloway continued the ritual and led the Conference in the Sanctus, the Prayer of Consecration, the Prayer of Humble Access, and the Angus Dei.

Dr. Ivey, Dr. Hazzard, and the six District Superintendents, Alf A. Eason, Roy I. Bagley, C. Ray Hozendorf, Raymond L. Franks, and Arthur Terry, knelt at the first table and were served by Bishop Galloway. They in turn served the sacrament first to the Choir, then to the Conference. The Choir offered a selection of hymns during the serving of the Sacrament.

Following serving of the Sacrament, Bishop Galloway led the Conference in the Prayer of Thanksgiving and Dedication, then announced the closing hymn, "My Soul, Be On Thy Guard." Following singing of the hymn, Bishop Galloway pronounced the Benediction.

Monday Evening, May 24

7:30 P.M.

Worship Service: Bishop Paul V. Galloway, presiding at the evening Worship Service, announced the opening hymn, "There Is A Fountain Filled With Blood." He then led the Conference in the responsive reading of Psalm 119, "Teach Me Thy Statutes", then led the Conference in Prayer.

The Grand Avenue United Methodist Church Choir of Hot Springs offered the anthem, "Great Is The Lord."

Cabinet Report: Bishop Galloway called on C. Ray Hozendorf, Cabinet Secretary, to deliver the report of the District Superintendents. Dr. Hozendorf read the report. Bishop Galloway received the report, expressing his appreciation for the Cabinet.

Bishop Galloway called for the offering, which was received. The Grand Avenue, Hot Springs, Choir presented the offertory anthem, "God Is Love."

Introduction: Bishop Galloway introduced Bishop Ralph Taylor Alton, Conference Preacher, who, following congregational singing of the hymn, "Talk With Us, Lord", brought the message based on John

Wesley's account of his Aldersgate conversion, experienced two hundred thirty-three years ago this evening.

Following singing of "Blessed Assurance" by the congregation, George Ivey pronounced the Benediction.

Tuesday, May 25

8:30 A.M.

Devotional: Bishop Galloway expressed appreciation for David Aston and his service at the organ, then announced the hymn, "When We Walk With the Lord." Following singing of the hymn, Bishop Galloway read from the seventeenth chapter of Matthew and led the Conference in its morning devotional.

Welcome: Bishop Galloway presented Dr. John Treischman of the host church, who welcomed the Conference.

Roll Call: James E. Major, Conference Secretary, announced the Roll Call, and said it was being effected at the registration desk in Fellowship Hall.

Bar of the Conference: James E. Major moved that the Bar of the Conference be from the pillars of the church forward toward the chancel. It was done.

Secretarial Staff: James E. Major announced that Therral Wilson would be the Journal Clerk, and that O. D. Peters would be an additional member of the Secretarial Staff.

Tellers: James E. Major read the list of the Tellers, and Bishop Galloway appointed them. Lay tellers were, Carl Hall, Chairman, E. Glen Sweeney, E. P. Young, B. T. Fooks, Ralph Wilson, Glen Teeter. Clergy tellers were R. O. Beck, Chairman, O. W. Hoover, David Wilson, Robert A. Regnier, John Ross, Ed Matthews.

Presentation: Bennie G. Ruth presented Bishop Galloway with a gavel made from timbers from the old Des Arc Church.

Personal Privilege: Arthur Terry relayed to the Conference greetings from Dr. Clem Baker now residing in Clovis, New Mexico, and from Alva C. Rogers of Pine Bluff, who is celebrating his eighty-ninth birthday. Arthur Terry moved that we send greetings to these men. Greetings were sent to these and other retired men who were unable to be present.

Board of Ministry: J. Ralph Hillis expressed gratitude for Tom Abney, Registrar of the Board, who read the recommendations of the Board concerning men to be admitted into full connection with the Conference. These men were received and presented to the Conference, replied to the disciplinary questions, and then each was personally greeted by Bishop Galloway. The Conference stood in appreciation.

Announcement: James E. Major asked the men to meet with Alfred Knox, Editor of the Arkansas Methodist, in the foyer to have their picture taken after the first ballot.

First Ballot: The tellers distributed ballots, James E. Major and Bishop Galloway instructed the Conference, and the vote was taken with the ministers voting first.

Amendments Presented: C. Ray Hozendorf presented an amendment to Standing Rule #2, to lay on the desk for twenty-four hours.

Miss Jan Roseberry, President of the Little Rock Conference United Methodist Youth, spoke to Proposed Constitutional Amendments Nos. 5 and 6, having to do with electing youth representatives to the Annual Conference. A vote was taken in which Amendment No. 5 was passed, followed by a vote passing Amendment No. 6.

Merger Study: C. Ray Hozendorf presented the report of the Merger Study Committee, having to do with merger of the Southwest Conference with the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences. Norris Steele spoke against one point of the proposed merger as not "fair and equal"

to the black United Methodists, and was opposed to the merger. Robert E. L. Bearden spoke in favor of it. Marshall Steel spoke against it. A vote was taken in which the merger was defeated by a vote of 176 against and 25 for.

C. Ray Hozendorf called on Ed Matthews, who presented the following motion: I move that, since the 1968 action of the Little Rock Conference favors merger with the Southwest Conference, and, since the present resolution of merger has been rejected, yet with expressed desire to negotiate further, that (1) the Chair appoint a new committee of six persons to study and negotiate anew terms for merger with the Southwest Conference, (2) that this committee meet as soon as possible to formulate new terms and conditions for merger, (3) and that a special session of the Annual Conference be called to act upon their report to consummate and effect a negotiated merger before the 1972 mandatory date for such a merger set by the General Conference.

Minimum Salary: Harould Scott presented the report of the Commission on Minimum Salary, saying that it remains as presented in the Pre-Conference Reports. He then moved for its approval. It was done.

Archives and History: Harold D. Sadler, Chairman, presented Micheal Clayton, who gave the report of the Commissions, as shown on page 10 of the Pre-Conference Reports, then moved its approval. It was done.

Publishing House: C. Ray Hozendorf presented J. E. Bain of the Cokesbury Book Store in Dallas, who extended greetings to the Conference and called attention to a number of books offered for sale in Fellowship Hall during Conference. He then presented the Conference a check for \$7,740.89, which George Meyer accepted on behalf of the Conference.

Thornton Fowler of the Cokesbury Book Store was presented to the Conference by Dr. Hozendorf. Mr. Fowler spoke to the Board of Publications, recommended that those interested read "A History of the Publishing House" by Pilkins.

Courtesy: Bishop Galloway recognized Robert Trieschman who presented a guest, Reverend Jeff Sherman who gave Bishop Galloway his first appointment.

Ballot: James E. Major gave the report of the first lay ballot.

Enlistment for Church Vocations: Cagle E. Fair reported that this report stands as given on page 18 of the Pre-Conference Reports, and moved its adoption. It was done.

Pensions: George Meyer, Chairman, reported that this report stands as shown in the Pre-Conference Report, and moved its adoption. It was done.

Minutes: The Conference Secretary, James E. Major, announced the committee to read the Minutes as Cagle E. Fair, Charles O. Walthall, and John B. Ross.

Memoirs: Carr Dee Racop, Jr., Chairman, reported that this Committee's report stands as shown in the Pre-Conference Reports, page 24, and moved its adoption. It was done.

Worship: Carr Dee Racop, Jr., Chairman, said this Commission's report stands as shown in the Pre-Conference Reports, page 44, and moved its adoption. It was done. He called attention to the worship display, and "Guidebook for Weddings" and "Companion to the Book of Worship" were recommended.

Tanako: Joe E. Arnold, Secretary-Agent said that this report stands as shown on page 40 of the Pre-Conference Report, with the addition to item 2 that Camp Tanako Sunday will be the second Sunday in August.

Ballot: C. Ray Hozendorf was elected on Clerical Ballot #3. Clerical Ballot #4 was then cast.

Nominations by Cabinet: Bishop Galloway called on C. Ray Hozen-dorf to present the nominations of the Cabinet. They were presented and accepted by the Conference.

Ballot: Gordon Carlton and Mrs. E. T. Davenport were elected on the second Lay Ballot. The third Lay Ballot was then cast.

Dismissal: Bishop Galloway called on Bishop Alton to lead in prayer dismissing the Conference for Recess before the Memorial Service.

Service of Celebration and Commemoration

The Service of Celebration and Commemoration was led by Carr Dee Racop, Jr., Chairman of the Worship Committee. For the processional hymn, #9, "I'll Praise My Maker", was sung, Fred H. Haustein read the Old Testament Lesson. The Anthem was sung by the Choir of Ministers. James Robert Scott read the New Testament Lesson. The pastoral prayer was led by Dr. Fred R. Harrison. The sermon was given by Joe R. Phillips, Jr. James E. Major, Conference Secretary, read the names of those who died during the year: C. R. Andrews and Mrs. James A. Simpson.

Tuesday afternoon, May 25

2:15 P.M.

Bishop Galloway called the Conference to order and asked if there were any matters of Personal Privilege. The Conference voted to send greetings to Mrs. Louis W. Averitt, C. E. Larrison, and Dr. James Argue.

Evangelism: Ralph Sewell presented the Report of the Board of Evangelism, moving its adoption. It was done.

Teller's Report: No layman was elected on the third ballot. A fourth ballot was taken.

Evangelism: Ralph Sewell presented Ralph Hale, Secretary of the Board of Evangelism, to speak to that Board's report. Ralph Hale also introduced "Key 73", a program of evangelism to the Conference. The report was adopted.

Courtesy: Bishop Galloway presented Mr. and Mrs. H. F. Buhler to the Conference.

Ballot: No election on Clerical Ballot #4.

Insurance: Sidney Good, Chairman of the Conference Committee on Insurance, expressed his appreciation for Mrs. Louis W. Averitt who retired this past year as head of the insurance program for the Conference, and presented the report of that Committee, moving its adoption. Richard Poss questioned the annual raise in premiums and asked if any other company had been considered. Louis L. Averitt asked about the possibility of increased room coverage. Joseph Taylor asked about coverage of a child over eighteen but ineligible for college due to being incapacitated. The report was adopted.

Ballot: No election on the fourth lay ballot. No election on the fifth clerical ballot.

Personal Privilege: Bishop Galloway recognized Roland Shelton for his forty consecutive years at Annual Conference.

Ministry: Tom Abney presented the men for election to Associate Membership. They were elected and greeted by Bishop Galloway. The Conference stood in appreciation and welcome.

Treasurer: Grafton Thomas, Conference Treasurer, presented the Treasurer's report and moved the adoption of the report. It was done.

Ballot: No election on the fifth lay ballot. George Wayne Martin was elected on the sixth clerical ballot.

Statistical: Bryan Stephens presented the Statistical Report, moving its adoption. It was done.

Personal Privilege: Bishop Galloway recognized Mrs. Pauline Whitacre of the Methodist Children's Home, and welcomed her.

Conference Calendar: Everett M. Vinson, Director, Conference Program Council, presented the Conference Calendar prepared by his office.

Ballot: Elected on the sixth lay ballot was Carl Hall. No election on the seventh clerical ballot. Robert E. L. Bearden was elected on the eighth clerical ballot. A ninth clerical ballot was taken to elect four delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. The ballots were frozen with the Secretary of the Conference until 7:45 A.M. Wednesday.

Recess: Bishop Galloway declared a ten-minute recess until the 3:30 preaching service.

Worship Service: Howard Williams presiding, led the Conference in a prayer for the church and announced the hymn, "Spirit of Faith Descend on My Heart." He then presented Bishop Alton to the Conference.

Bishop Alton read two passages of scripture, one from Romans, one from John, as the basis of his message, "The Unity of the Church Which We Seek."

Howard Williams announced the hymn, "Spirit of Faith Come Down." He then pronounced the benediction.

Tuesday, May 25

7:30 P.M.

Worship Service: Following the organ prelude, Joe E. Arnold, presiding, announced the hymn, "Come Christians, Join to Sing." He then led the Conference in the responsive reading of Psalm 126, "Peace Be With You."

John B. Ross read the Scripture and led the Conference in prayer. The choir from Oaklawn United Methodist Church, under direction of David Hall, offered the anthem, "All Glory, Laud, and Honor." Reverend Arnold called for the offering, which was received during the offertory, "Song of Gratitude and Praise." Joe Arnold introduced the choir and complimented them on the two beautiful presentations.

Following the hymn, "I've Found a Friend", Bishop Ralph T. Alton addressed the Conference on the subject, "Eyes that Hear, and Ears That See."

After singing of the hymn, "Holy Ghost, Dispel Our Sadness" by the Conference, Joe Arnold pronounced the benediction.

Wednesday, May 26

8:30 A.M.

Devotional: Bishop Galloway announced the hymn, "Ask Ye What Great Thing I Know." The Conference joined in the reading of the Psalm, "Bless the Lord, O My Soul."

Announcement: James E. Major called attention to the sale of tickets to the ministers' wives luncheon in the Book Room.

Ballot: Clerical ballot number nine shows Alvin Murray, Roy I. Bagley, and Ralph Hale elected.

S. H. Allman was elected on the eighth lay ballot. Clerical ballot number ten was cast, and lay ballot number nine was cast.

Mt. Sequoyah: This report was given by N. Lee Cate, Superintendent, who moved its adoption. It was done.

Ballot: No election on tenth clerical ballot. Arthur Terry moved that after the election of the seventh clerical delegate the three highest be elected as reserve delegates. It was carried.

W.S.C.S.: Mrs. E. T. Davenport gave the report, moving that it be adopted. It was done.

Resolution: Bishop Galloway recognized John P. Miles who presented a resolution to withdraw from the plan of union with C.O.C.U. Ralph Hale spoke to the resolution. Bishop Galloway recognized Alvin Murray, who spoke against the resolution. John Miles spoke in rebuttal. Mike Clayton spoke against the resolution. Fred Haustein and Robert E. L. Bearden spoke against the resolution. Joe R. Phillips spoke for the resolution in general, and asked John Miles to withdraw his resolution for the present. Carl Beard spoke for the resolution. Robert Scott spoke against it. Robert Van Hook and James Gannaway spoke against the resolution. Virgil Bell moved that the motion be tabled. One hundred ten for, seventy-seven against. It was carried.

Ballot: No election on the twelfth clerical ballot. The thirteenth ballot was cast. William M. Shepherd was elected on the ninth lay ballot.

Arkansas Methodist: This report, presented by J. Ralph Hillis, called attention to the blanks to be filled in in the Pre-Conference Reports, page 11, item 3, thus: "That the subscription price be \$3.00 per year, with the provision that subscriptions be available at \$2.50 per year when the paper is sent to every family. The report was adopted.

Robert E. L. Bearden spoke to the report, calling attention to this addition to the Pre-Conference Report, page 13, item #1: "... except that the Commission offers to be a clearing house for further study." The report was adopted.

Ballot: James E. Major was elected on the thirteenth clerical ballot.

Personal Privilege: Bishop Galloway recognized C. Ray Hozendorf who expressed the Conference's sympathy and love for Robert S. Beasley, whose wife, Dorothy, died last night.

Ballot: No election on the tenth lay ballot.

Courtesy: Bishop Galloway recognized guests Dr. Joe Quillian, Dr. Roy B. Shilling, Jr., and Dr. Donald C. Houts.

Education: Hendrix College Roy Shilling, President, spoke in appreciation of support Bishop Galloway is giving to the college. He recognized Dr. Marshall Steel, past president of the college, and commended James E. Major, Vice President of the college, for his excellent work. He then recognized Mrs. Paul V. Galloway for the literacy program in Little Rock, expressed his appreciation for the Board of Trustees, and called attention to the fact that Hendrix is operating on a balanced budget. The report was adopted.

St. Paul Seminary: Dr. Donald Houts expressed thanks for support of Ministerial Education Fund, and for the young men who come from Arkansas to attend St. Paul Seminary.

Perkins School of Theology: Dr. Joe Quillian expressed appreciation for cooperation in support of Perkins and of the Ministerial Education Fund, and for Hendrix College as one of our authentic church colleges.

Ballot: On the fourteenth clerical ballot those elected were J. Edward Dunlap, Edward Matthews, Arthur Terry.

Ballot: Raymond Hillis and Dale Booth were elected on the eleventh lay ballot.

Motion: E. P. Price moved that the three highest be elected. It was carried.

Laity: S. H. Allman, Chairman, gave the report as shown on page 22 of the Pre-Conference Reports. He expressed appreciation for Bishop Galloway, for the spirit of the Conference, and for the sermons of Dr. Hazzard and Bishop Alton. The report was adopted.

Reading of Appointments: Appointments were read by Bishop Galloway, after which he addressed the laymen, commending the ministers to

them, and then commending the church and laymen to the ministers. He closed the reading of appointments with prayer.

Ballot: Report of the twelfth lay ballot shows John Simpson, Frank Thompson, and B. T. Fooks.

Conference Relations: O. W. Hoover, Secretary, recommended that Claude Clark, Kenneth M. Goode, and James R. Sewell be added to the role of retired ministers. Albert Richard Moore's request for voluntary location was granted. Bishop Galloway recognized Mrs. Clark and Mrs. Sewell and asked them to come forward and join their husbands in the retirement.

Missions: Edward B. Hollenbeck, Chairman, called on Robert Van Hook, Secretary, to present the Report #3 as found in the Pre-Conference Reports on page 36. He called attention to the guidelines for awards on page 38, and then presented awards of Church of the Year to Grady United Methodist Church, Harold Hansford, pastor, and Pride Valley United Methodist Church of Little Rock, W. Neill Hart, pastor. The report was adopted.

Conference Trustees: O. W. Hoover, Secretary gave the report, recommending that the Conference retain title to Galena, to Mourton Cemetery, two acres of land in Lonsdale, three acres in Pleasant Hill, the sale of Rogers Chapel for \$500.00, proceeds to be given to the Board of Missions. Consent was given.

He then announced a meeting of the Board of Trustees for the purpose of reorganization.

Committee on Minutes: Cagle E. Fair reported that the minutes have been read and approved.

Health and Welfare: Charles O. Walthall, Secretary, gave the report. It was adopted.

Cagle E. Fair, Chairman, called on Edwin Keith, Superintendent of the Methodist Children's Home, to speak. He reported that offerings for the Home show a 22% increase over last year.

Cagle E. Fair advised the Conference that a new filmstrip on Health and Welfare Ministries entitled, "A New Way to Care", would soon be available through the Conference Program Council office.

Wednesday, May 26

Afternoon

Bishop Galloway appointed Marshall T. Steel to preside during his absence from the afternoon session. The opening prayer was led by E. Clifton Rule.

Missions: Report No. 1 was given by Edward B. Hollenbeck, Chairman, with certain changes. It was adopted. Report No. 2 was presented by George Tanner. It was adopted.

Announcement: Bishop Galloway announced the Ordination Service for 7:30, and the following morning's session to begin at 8:30 A.M. He then called on E. Clifton Rule to dismiss the Conference with prayer.

Wednesday, May 26

Evening

Ordination Service: The choir of the First United Methodist Church, Hot Springs, under direction of David Aston, provided music for the service. After the opening voluntary, "Allelujah," by the choir, Bishop Galloway offered the Invocation, then announced the hymn, "Let Zion's Watchmen All Awake." Following the hymn, he led the Conference in the responsive reading taken from Isaiah 61.

The Choir presented special music, following which Bishop Galloway called for the offering. The choir sang the Offertory arrangement of "Fairest Lord Jesus."

Bishop Galloway expressed his appreciation for Bishop and Mrs. Alton for their presence among us, to the people of Hot Springs First Church, to Dr. Ivey and his staff for their hospitality to the Conference.

Following the offering, the Ordination Hymn, "Spirit of God Descending Upon My Heart", Bishop Alton brought the Ordination Sermon, based on II Corinthians 4, taking the text, "But we have this treasure in earthen vessels."

Arnold Simpson presented the Deacons to be ordained. Bishop Galloway gave the Collect. Alf Eason read the Epistle I Timothy 3: 8a, 9, 13; Ephesians 5:15-16a, 17, 18b, 20-31; Ephesians 6:10-18. The Chairman then called attention to Mr. McCullough, who is serving as Chaplain at Tucker Prison.

Program Council: The report was presented by C. Ray Hozendorf, who called on Everett M. Vinson, Director, and Ed Matthews to join him in making the report. He called attention to the report of the executive committee, which had been filed with the Conference Secretary.

Ed Matthews made the report. Everett M. Vinson spoke to the report, calling attention to the guidelines in the Director's Report in the Pre-Conference Report, page 7. The report was adopted.

Appreciation: The Conference Secretary expressed his appreciation to O. D. Peters for taking the place of Therral Wilson, Journal Clerk, who had become ill and returned home.

Pensions: This report was made by George Meyer, Chairman. It was adopted.

World Service and Finance: The report was presented by the Chairman, J. Edward Dunlap, who called upon the secretary, Gerald K. Fincher to call attention to the changes in the report as found in the Pre-Conference Report, beginning on page 40. The report was adopted.

Resolutions: Report of this Committee was given by Howard S. Ritchie, secretary, who moved its adoption. It was done.

1972 session: Robert E. L. Bearden, pastor, presented Ed Baxley, Chairman of the Board of First United Methodist Church, Little Rock, who gave the invitation for the Conference to meet there for the 1972 session. Dr. Bearden then presented Carl Hall, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, who further extended the invitation.

George Ivey, pastor of the host church for this year's session, addressed the Conference, giving deference and seconding the invitation, but with a welcome to return to Hot Springs First Church in 1973.







VI Reports

District Superintendents' Report

To Bishop Paul V. Galloway and members of the One Hundred and Eighteenth Session of the Little Rock Annual Conference:

Your District Superintendents are appreciative of the cooperation, loyalty, and understanding of the pastors and laymen in the total life and work of The Church and their involvement in the planning and projecting of its ministry and mission. United with one common purpose the Conference has moved forward in all areas of its program.

The Program Council Office, under the leadership of the Conference Program Director and Associate Director, has given productive leadership and direction to the program of the Conference in cooperation with all the Boards, Commissions and Committees. The use of the District Program Council as a functioning group, involving team work on the part of pastors and laymen, has brought increased vitality to each of the six districts within the bounds of the Conference.

One of the effective ministries of 1970-71 was to Small Membership Churches. Members from the General Board of Education, the District Superintendents, and Program Council Staff made extensive visits to local churches, giving training to a large number of leaders in each church. Emphasis was placed on evaluating, planning, training, creative teaching and evangelism. As a result many small membership churches are experiencing a definite renewal. This emphasis is to continue.

Evangelism: Four of the six districts show a net increase in membership for 1970. Of vital importance is the deepening of the spiritual life of members through Revivals, Evangelistic Missions, Lay Witness Missions, Prayer Groups plus involvement in the life and mission of the Church. Such efforts have brought about a new depth of understanding and a deeper commitment to Christ.

Education: The aim of the Districts in Education has been to provide new opportunities for leadership training in the Church School, for specific tasks in the local church and to provide skills in evaluating, initiating, planning and carrying out ministries in the local church and the community. This was done through Training Schools, Workshops and Seminars. Many persons have been challenged to fulfill their responsibilities as Christian churchmen more effectively.

Missions and Church Extension: Church-Wide Schools of Missions were held in most of the local churches of the Conference. Emphasis was given to the mission of the church in the local community. More and more churches and individuals have become concerned and are participating in fulfilling this mission. The world mission of the church was lifted up and the challenge made to become involved in that mission through service in the mission field and through support of World Service and Advance Projects.

The Districts have been involved in Church Extension through new buildings, in promoting existing projects in fast growing areas, and in providing ministerial leadership where needed.

Social Ministries: The Conference is more and more concerned with its ministry to the social needs of persons. The Contact Telephone Ministry, in two districts, reaches thousands of people for crisis counseling. The Day Care Centers provide much needed care, training and wholesome environment for children of low-income working mothers. The Arkansas Guidance Foundation is initiating new projects of counseling and guidance for persons returning to society from imprisonment, as well as counseling first offenders. The people called Methodists have a growing

concern for relating the Church to changing times and changing communities, and to developing new methods that will serve the present generation.

Stewardship: The emphasis on stewardship, with the theme "Total Life Commitment", met with a good response. The financial goals established by the local churches were paid in full with only a few exceptions.

Church properties: New church buildings have been begun at First Church, Hope, at Des Arc and at Rison. New parsonages are being constructed, or bought, at Ashdown and Grand Avenue, Hot Springs. Keith Memorial, Malvern, and Sheridan have completed new parsonages. The church at Daisy, New Salem and the educational building at Hazen were dedicated by Bishop Paul V. Galloway during the year. Carr Memorial, Pine Bluff, consecrated its new Fellowship Hall. St. James, Little Rock, consecrated its new building in November and began construction on additional educational space in April. St. Andrew Church, Little Rock has completed all arrangements for its new educational building and construction should begin by May 31.

Fund for Reconciliation: During 1969-70 the churches of the Little Rock Conference contributed \$58,967.00 to the Fund for Reconciliation. One-half of this fund went to the National projects. The other one-half remained in the bounds of the Conference, and was directed to Day Care Centers, Scholarships for Nurses, Scholarships to Philander Smith College for deprived students, and to other projects as chosen by the local church. Each local church is urged to continue its support that the total goal of \$175,000.00 may be reached by the end of the quadrennium.

Colleges and Seminaries: In 1971 the churches were presented with the apportionments for Ministerial Training. The reports of the District Superintendents indicate that the \$60,000.00 apportionment has been accepted. These funds for Ministerial Training provide help for college and seminary students, as well as supporting Perkins School of Theology and St. Paul School of Theology, Methodist. Hendrix College continues to give quality education in the name of Arkansas Methodism. Support through the Annual Conference is growing and additional funds are needed. Philander Smith College, owned by the General Board of Education and supported by the state of Arkansas, Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Oklahoma, as well as the general church, continues to render valuable service to a student body of 639. The response of the churches in the Little Rock Conference to the \$25,000 Operating Fund and \$55,000 Capital Funds Campaign for 1971 is gratifying. Continued support will help give the College the stability it needs.

The District Superintendents take this opportunity to express appreciation to Mrs. Paul V. Galloway for her indefatigable efforts and enthusiastic leadership in the Literacy Program in Arkansas. Because of her earnest concern, minister's wives and many interested individuals have attended Workshops on the Laubach method of "Each One Teach One" and are now busily engaged in teaching persons to read. At the present time over 100 persons - men and women - are qualified teachers. Mrs. Galloway has devoted many hours to this project and as a result the Greater Little Rock Literacy Council was formed. We also express appreciation to Mrs. Galloway for her gracious spirit and the contribution she makes to the life and work of Methodism in Arkansas.

Bishop Paul V. Galloway has given forceful leadership to the Arkansas area for seven years. During the past year he has worked with ceaseless interest for all causes of Methodism. In addition to his duties for Methodist Churches in Arkansas, many general church responsibilities demand his time and energy. The District Superintendents express gratitude for Bishop Galloway's brotherly concern for every charge and

every pastor, and the time that he devotes in making sure that due consideration is given in each instance.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE PROGRAM COUNCIL

The Program Council Office, the Board of Education and the Board of Missions has cooperated in a ministry of planning for Small Membership Churches through workshops and visitation to local churches which as been profitable. We commend the Committee on Town and Country for its emphasis on the rural church, and encourage continued concern for the small membership church by the entire Conference.

We recommend the adoption of the program of Confirmation Training for Pastors at Camp Tanako in September, 1971, which will be promoted through the Program Council.

We recommend the adoption of the Conference on Family Enrichment for the summer of 1972 which will be scheduled, planned and promoted through the Program Council.

When the Conference Program Director of the Associate Director is elected Director of Christian Education, he becomes the executive officer of the Board of Education.

On nomination of the Bishop and the Cabinet, we have elected Alf A. Eason as Conference Program Director, and request Bishop Paul V. Galloway to appoint him to this office.

A Budget for 1972 has been approved, and the Commission on World Service and Finance is requested to provide adequate funds for the program.

The following recommendations were made by a special committee, brought before the Executive Committee, amended, and are presented to you for your consideration:

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR THE PROGRAM COUNCIL

- I. The Program Council is the agency through which the Boards, Commissions, Committees and Agencies of the Little Rock Annual Conference initiate, coordinate, and implement the Annual Conference Program.
- II. The Program Council Staff shall consist of a Program Director and such other personnel as the Program Council may recommend and the Annual Conference approve. All Staff personnel shall be administratively responsible to the Program Director.
- III. The Program Council Director shall prepare and distribute a Conference Calendar of events to be presented at the Annual Conference. All programs and dates for Conference and District Programs are to be cleared through the Program Council office before being publicized.
- IV. Communications from Program Council office:
 1. A Master Mailing List of Pastors, District Superintendents, and District Program Councils shall be maintained in the Program Council office.
 2. All Conference mailings of the Boards and Agencies shall be cleared through, and may be processed through, the Program Council Office, on letterheads that identify the Board or Agency.
 3. In the event of multiple mailings in the same envelope, the enclosures will be placed in alphabetical order.

4. The Program Director shall be available to the Boards and Agencies to consider and schedule the processing of communications. All mailings shall be under the direction and supervision of the Program Director.
- V. Initiating, coordinating and implementing the Conference Programs:
 1. Prior to September 1, following the session of Annual Conference, the Program Director shall schedule consultations with each Board, Commission, Committee and Agency chairman and executive secretary (or Conference Director) to implement the program adopted by the Annual Conference.
 2. By mid-October the Program Director and Board, Commission, committee and Agency chairmen, Executive Secretaries (or directors), and the Cabinet shall meet to initiate the program for the succeeding year.
 3. The Program Director shall receive all proposals from all sources and shall confer with all Board chairmen, executive secretaries (program directors) to coordinate the Conference program.
 4. Prior to January 1 the Boards, Commissions, Committees and Agencies shall have met to firm their proposals for the succeeding year.
 5. Prior to February 15 the Program Council shall have met to compile and coordinate the Conference Program for publication in the pre-Conference Journal.
- VI. The Program Director shall have responsibility for coordinating and implementing the entire Conference program.
- VII. The Executive Committee shall meet at least quarterly.
- VIII. There shall be a Review Committee which shall, in consultation with the Program Director, meet annually to:
 - a. Review the Program Director's job analysis in keeping with the Discipline and as prescribed by the Program Council and the Annual Conference.
 - b. Review and determine Job Analysis for all staff.
 - c. Evaluate the work of the Council for the preceding year.
 - d. Review lay personnel.
 - e. Determine vacation time, sick leave, and group insurance for lay personnel.

THE PROGRAM COUNCIL

Director's Report

Accomplishments: Since taking office June 1, 1970, your Program Council Director has spent as much time as possible in learning of his duties and discovering ways to fulfill his obligations. Valued advice and assistance have been obtained from Bishop Paul V. Galloway, the District Superintendents, the Chairman of the Executive Committee, Dr. C. Ray Hozendorf, Program Directors of other conferences, and from attending national and jurisdictional meetings.

Admittedly, more knowledge and experience are greatly needed; therefore, your Program Director will continue to take advantage of every opportunity to equip himself better for the tasks at hand. For example, plans are already under way to attend two jurisdictional meet-

ings in Oklahoma City, one in April, the other in May. Then, in December we are to have a National Fellowship of Program Directors meeting at Dayton, Ohio.

In addition to attending meetings from which he hopes to gain a better insight relative to his role, your Program Director pledges to this Conference his sincere efforts to lend an ear, have an open mind, and ever be ready to expend his efforts with ministers, laity, and local churches in their work of the Kingdom of God.

One section of the job analysis for the Program Director states that he "will work with the Conference boards and agencies to initiate, formulate, implement, plan and administer programs . . . to fulfill the mission of the church . . ." An endeavor to accomplish this charge is being made; therefore much of your Director's work is automatically embodied in the reports of many of the boards and agencies.

We now have District Councils on Ministries which are functioning in an effective manner and showing a splendid cooperation with the Conference Program Council in implementing the general program.

The transition of TRAFICO to the Program Council office has been made in an economical, orderly fashion. Our film library and the work of TRAFICO continues to function without loss of efficiency.

A job analysis has been drawn up and accepted by each person in the Program Council office. The entire Staff works efficiently, cooperatively, and politely.

Recommendations: Until we are more knowledgeable of our tasks and directions, we cherish your understanding, patience, advice and prayers.

So that we might create a good, wholesome "feed-back" situation in which we can formulate a more effective program, we recommend that our District Councils on Ministries continue to open their doors to our Conference officers with their proposals and, at the same time, maintain an awareness of the needs of local churches of all sizes. Only in this manner can we formulate a program to meet the needs at home, in the District, in the conference, and throughout the entire church.

We would also recommend that our local churches make themselves aware of the "New Resource System for the Local Church Council on Ministries." In connection with this, we hope to have one or two teams from the Conference which will be composed of persons who have been selected to represent each of the positions in the local church Council on Ministries, to attend a training session at Mt. Sequoyah, July 12-16. These conference teams of twenty-one persons each will then be able to provide training in districts and local churches.

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

Washington Church Restoration Project

The Commission plans to begin the actual work on the project to restore the old Washington Church in 1971-72. A complete investigation and recommendation for restoration has been made by Mr. Bruce Anderson, Little Rock architect and member of Winfield UMC. The Commission, in cooperation with all other responsible parties, will follow the guidelines and priorities established by Mr. Anderson, and proceed to the extent of available funds. The total estimated cost of the restoration is \$76,000.00. The Commission has \$6,486.30 in a savings account in the First National Bank of Magnolia with which to begin the project. We urge the continued

support of the Little Rock Conference for this worthwhile project which will dramatize the rich history of Arkansas Methodism.

Photographs of Retired Ministers

In accordance with conference standing rules, two 4 x 5 glossy prints must be obtained from every retired minister. Dr. Alfred Knox will make these prints at the session of the Annual Conference. The cooperation of each retiring minister is urged to keep files current.

Conference Historical Display

The First United Methodist Church of Little Rock will supply the 1971 Historical Display at the Annual Conference.

International Meeting

The International Methodist Historical Society, which meets once in five years, will meet in Denver, Colorado, August 17-18, 1971. The Commission will provide \$200.00 each to two delegates from our conference.

Records

The historical records of the Little Rock Conference have, during the past year, been placed in the Hendrix College Library. The Commission requests your continued help in locating and preserving historical data of Arkansas Methodism.

Recommendations

The following recommendations are submitted to the Annual Conference from the Arkansas/Louisiana Methodist Commission.

1. That the 1972 circulation campaign be conducted during the period of January 16-23.
2. That the quota for each charge be one subscription for each seven members.
3. That the subscription price be \$3.00 per year, with the provision that subscriptions be available at \$2.50 per year when the paper is sent to every family.
4. That each church be asked to name a layman who will assume the responsibility for the circulation campaign, and that a period of training be planned for these workers and for the district directors.
5. That the editor and the president (or secretary) of the commission be empowered to borrow money needed for operations from the Union National Bank, Little Rock.

6. That the commission express its appreciation to Bishop Paul V. Galloway and to Bishop Aubrey G. Walton, and to the district superintendents and the district directors for the able leadership they have given in the promotion of the publications.

7. That we also recognize our debt to the many pastors and laymen who give themselves so unselfishly during the circulation campaign and help us so many other ways during the rest of the year.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN SOCIAL CONCERNS

Since last report, the **Board Of Christian Social Concerns . . .**

1. Promoted attendance at the Annual Regional Coaching Conference at Mt. Sequoyah by providing scholarships for delegates.

2. Subscribed to "**Engage**" for all Board Members.

3. The Board Chairman, Louis M. Mulkey, and the Vice Chairman, James B. Gannaway, attended the **Social Principles Study Conference** in Dallas, in January of 1971.

4. The Board Chairman, Louis M. Mulkey and Ed Matthews, of the State Council of Churches attended the Emergency Convocation of the War in Southeast Asia, in May of 1970.

5. Published and distributed to each local church a Workbook of Christian Social Concerns Recommendations.

6. Selected ten churches to work on a Social Principles Study for the formation of the new Social Creed of the United Methodist Church.

The Conference Board of Christian Social Concerns makes the following recommendations:

1. We recommend and approve the **Fund for Reconciliation**. We realize that financial assistance is one manifestation of concern, and we support all efforts at stewardship of time and funds in meeting needs of persons and building bridges of reconciliation. We recommend that the Sunday following Thanksgiving, (Sunday, November 28, 1971) be set aside as Fund for Reconciliation Sunday. We further recommend that a special offering be received this day in an effort to successfully complete the financial support of this worthy ministry.

2. We heartily endorse any effort of the Board of Education toward a program of financial support for **Philander Smith College**. We especially urge the support of the current **Capital Funds Campaign** for the College.

3. We recommend that each local church subscribe to "**Engage**" **Magazine** for the Work Area Chairman of Social Concerns of the Council on Ministries.

4. We encourage every local church to follow the program of the Church as it is outlined in "**The Interpreter**" from month to month. We ask that the pastor and the work area chairman on Christian Social Concerns give special attention to the program planning issue for the observance of Special Days of Christian Social Concerns. We direct attention to:

Church and Economic Life Week — Population Explosion and Hunger. (third Sunday in January)

Race Relations Sunday — White Racism and Black Revolution. (second Sunday in February)

Rural Life Sunday — Environmental Pollution. (second Sunday in May)

Labor Sunday — Economic Exploitation. (Sunday preceding Labor Day)

United Nations Week and World Order Sunday — World Peace and Wars. (Sunday preceding U.N. Day, October 24)

Drug and Alcohol Concerns Sunday — Meaning, Value and Life Style. (second Sunday in November)

Reconciliation Sunday (November 28, 1971) Special Offering for Fund for Reconciliation.

5. We recognize the value of the **Methodist Social Creed** and encourage its wide distribution across the conference.

6. We recommend that the churches of the Little Rock Conference make voluntary financial contributions to the **Arkansas Release Guidance Foundation** (The New Life House.) There is also need for food, clothing, and bedding, and we recommend that the churches help meet these needs. We request local churches to invite the Reverend Eugene Efird, director, to come and report on this work.

7. We commend the churches and communities which have sponsored **Project Misdemeanant** and have used the project to strengthen local probation and rehabilitative services. We would hope that the project might be extended to other areas across the state.

8. We pledge our support to the cabinet and the Conference Program Council in conducting district workshops to train our people in the program of the United Methodist Church as set-up by the General Conference.

9. Recognizing the moral decline in the standard of many movies being made and shown. We urge interested persons in the local church to survey the type of movies being shown in our communities, and in so far as possible take steps to correct this trend. We encourage our people to commend good television programs and complain about programs unsuitable for home viewing through contact with local and national television management.

10. We recommend that local churches establish a program to interpret to young people and parents the dangers involved in the use of **drugs, alcohol, and tobacco**.

11. We recommend support of the **Christian Civic Foundation** in its effort to promote the cause of civic righteousness in the areas of alcohol, narcotics, gambling and pornography. We request our people to make use of Public Law #91375, to prevent pornography from coming into the home.

12. We recognize the educational value derived from the "**Great Decisions**" Program being promoted across the state; we urge local churches to solicit the support of their membership by organizing groups within their congregations.

13. We recognize the need of **concern for the aged**. We feel the local churches should take into their future plans special emphasis and interest for these more experienced persons.

14. We support all efforts now being made toward the conservation of our environmental resources and to stop the pollution of our air, water and soil. We call upon our people to encourage further research and expansion of programs in this vital area of concern, and to accept this cause as a personal responsibility.

15. We recommend that our local churches become aware of, and study the problems of, potential overpopulation of the earth.

16. We recommend that each church and each member begin to work actively toward creating a climate conducive to merger of our Conference with the Southwest Conference.

17. We are deeply concerned about World Peace. We recognize the tragic situation now existing in Indo-China. As concerned Christians, followers of the Prince of Peace, we most urgently request the President and other national leaders to move expeditiously in every area toward a just and lasting peace.

18. In as much as the Discipline of The United Methodist Church (Paragraph 326, 3-F) asks of those who are becoming probationary members of the Annual Conference . . . "Are you willing to relate yourself in ministry to all persons without regard to color or national origin, including receiving them into the membership and fellowship of the church?" . . . we recommend that this principle of an all-inclusive ministry become a reality in the work of each pastor, and that henceforth, he be encouraged to offer his ministry, and the church's ministry, without regard to color or national origin.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

1. Galena Church property located in Howard County. This property contains three acres of land, almost one-half now a cemetery. We recommend that the Trustees retain the title to this property with the understanding that the cemetery be allowed to expand as necessary. (Records up to date.)

2. Church property known as Mourton Cemetery located in Howard County. This property contains two acres of land, almost one-half being a cemetery. We recommend the Trustees retain title to this property.

3. Lonsdale Church property located in Garland County. The records are up to date. Warranty deed with a trust clause. Property contains two lots (9 and 10) in Town of Lonsdale. We recommend the Trustees retain title to this property.

4. Pleasant Hill Church property near Dalark. This property consists of three acres, one acre containing a cemetery no longer expanding. We recommend the Trustees retain title to this property.

5. Rogers' Chapel property near Hazen. Records are up to date. The Conference authorized the sale of this property, 1951. This sale has been consummated. We recommend the proceeds (\$500.00) be turned over to the Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Little Rock District.

COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL AFFAIRS

The Commission on Ecumenical Affairs wishes to refer the following recommendations to the Little Rock Annual Conference:

1. That the Commission on Church Union plan be studied and discussed by local churches as recommended by the General Conference. The Commission makes no further recommendations, however, concerning COCU, except the Commission offers to be a clearing house for further study and suggestions and to counsel in preparing any proposed petitions to the Annual Conference.
2. That the column on Ecumenical Affairs in the *Interpreter* be read by all pastors and officials. We offer our services to other boards and agencies of the Annual Conference concerned with any phase of Christian Unity especially the Board of Evangelism. We recommend further that all efforts at inter-

faith understanding and cooperation be encouraged by local churches and pastors.

3. That the Annual Conference take note of the fact that the quinquennial session of the World Methodist Conference will meet in Denver, Colorado, August 18-25. This offers a rare opportunity for visitors and delegates since it is closer than it has been in many years. We note with satisfaction that several delegates have been appointed by our Bishop and urge visitors to plan to attend.

Delegates from our Conference Commission will attend the National Workshop on Christian Unity in March, 1971.

The Commission offers its assistance to all agencies concerned with Christian Unity including the Church Women United, City Councils of Churches, The Arkansas State Council of Churches, Ministerial Associations, Christian Civic Foundations and other inter-faith concerns. We note the increased number of local church Commissions on Ecumenical Affairs and urge all churches to organize a Commission and in smaller churches to name at least one person to this office.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

Conference Program

Church School membership and attendance declined this year in the Little Rock Conference. Membership declined 1,396 and average attendance, 734. Ways must be found to reverse this trend. We make the following suggestions: (1) We must take a look at where we are, and where we are going; (2) We must develop leadership; (3) We must be motivated to reach others; (4) We must develop in the local church a kind of educational program that has not yet been thought about.

An intensive survey was made in the Nashville area by the General Board of Education. Laymen were asked what they thought the church should be doing. They said almost unanimously that Christian Education for children is the most important thing the church can be doing. The second thing was the Christian Education of youth. The third thing was worship. Fourth was the training of adults and church school leaders. Another survey was made among inactive members who were asked what might motivate them to return to the church. Almost all said, "friendliness".

The following things contribute **most** to the growth of the church school: congregational interest and concern, curriculum resources, dedicated and capable teachers, effective adult education programs, innovative and experimental methods, opportunity for relevant discussion, orderly plan for recruiting and training teachers, parental and home support, a sense of fellowship and concern among students, a strong Biblical emphasis and pastoral support.

We must ask ourselves what things we should be doing. What things should we be doing better, and what things should we stop?

For the past several years requests for credit training schools have been few. However, according to national trends, we expect these requests to increase in the Conference. The Board of Education is ready to

assist in the planning and promotion of credit training schools. On the other hand, non-credit training enterprises by District Councils are encouraged. We especially commend the Little Rock District for pioneering in this field. We are ready to help with planning and financing these projects as far as funds allow.

District age-level coordinators were sent to Mt. Sequoyah in July. They have returned to do more effective work in the Districts. Several couples attended the Family Life Conference in Chicago in October.

Reverend Edward Hollenbeck was our representative to the Marriage Communications Lab, Yokefellow Institute, Richmond, Indiana, February 15-19.

Churches wishing a church-wide Bible study will be interested in the new course, "The Life and Teachings of Jesus", now available from Cokesbury.

Under the direction of Mrs. John L. Tucker, Little Rock Conference Coordinator of Children's Ministry, with the invaluable leadership of Mr. and Mrs. Felix Thompson and Mr. Richard Lines, a most successful program of music for Elementary Children has been held. Statistics reflect: May 3, second annual Choir Festival, sixteen participating churches with two hundred forty-five children; Choir Camp, one hundred fifty children, forty-five adults (directors and counselors).

In anticipation of an enlarged program for the third annual Festival and Choir Camp: May 2, 1971, the Choir Festival and Workshop, pre-enrollment is three hundred fifty children, with twenty-three participating churches. Mr. Eugene Kuyper, Professor of Voice, Henderson State College, Clinician and Director; June 7-11, Choir Camp, Camp Tanako, two hundred three children enrolled from twenty-three participating churches. Mrs. John Kemp of The Choristers' Guild, Dallas, Texas, will be Clinician.

We rejoice in the progress made by Churches of Small Membership. All Districts have participated, the itinerary scheduled by the District Superintendents.

We have been most fortunate in the leadership provided by the General Board of Education, Nashville, Tennessee, namely, Dr. Wayne Lindecker, Jr., Director of Services to Designated Leadership, and Miss Jennie Youngblood, Director to Churches of Small Membership, Nashville, Tennessee. The philosophy of the General Board is that almost without exception a congregation limited in membership has the potential within itself when properly motivated to provide a meaningful ministry.

We pledge our support of this worthwhile project in the next step in planning and promotion of Churches of Small Membership.

We will contribute \$150.00 for scholarships to the Lab-Enterprise for Churches of Small Membership, this summer.

The Youth Ministry of the Little Rock Conference has moved forward in a fine way with an enthusiastic group of youth comprising the Conference Council.

Again this year we are planning the Second Camp for Socially Deprived at Tanako. The Board of Education will contribute \$300.00 toward this enterprise.

Also, the Board will contribute \$1,000.00 to our second Conference enterprise on Sex Education for Junior Highs and their parents. This will be conducted at First United Methodist Church, Hot Springs, March 11-15.

\$400.00 has been appropriated to support the Senior High Assembly at Hendrix College in Conway. This is a new venture and we have asked Reverend Allen Bonsall of Magnolia to direct the Assembly. We ask not only the financial support, but a verbal and spiritual support from our pastors and friends across the Conference.

The Annual Mid-Winter Institute was conducted at First United Methodist Church, Magnolia, in December, 1970. Reverend Melvin West of the Office of Creative Ministries, Columbia, Missouri, was Primary Leader. He did an outstanding job, and the institute was an outstanding success, with sixty youth in attendance.

The Conference Youth Rally will be held again this year at Hall High School, Little Rock, July 31. The theme will be "Youth and Evangelism". "The Light Company", a musical trio of ordained United Methodist ministers under sponsorship of the General Board of Evangelism, will be the program. Dr. James Argue, a member of the General Board, will be the inspirational speaker.

Then, under direction of Ted Callaway, President of the Conference Young Adults, that particular program is moving along in fine fashion, with another great weekend planned at Tanako this Summer of 1971. We covet your support in this endeavor.

Finances: The Conference Board of Education requests the World Service and Finance Commission to continue the same apportionment granted for 1971, \$4,200.00, and to set \$9,000.00 as a goal for Christian Education Day.

The Staff: We wish to name Mrs. John L. Tucker, Coordinator of Children's Ministry; and Colonel Claude E. Haswell, as volunteer Coordinator of Adult Ministry. We also request that the Conference Director of the Program Council serve as Conference Director of Education; and that the Associate Director of the Program Council serve as Conference Coordinator of Youth Ministry and as Conference Coordinator of Young Adult Ministry.

Report No. 3

Wesley Foundation

An Area Special Study Committee called for by our Arkansas Area Committee on Higher Education was appointed in January 1970. This Special Study Committee was given the specific task of taking "a look" at all the Wesley Foundation situations in the State of Arkansas; (1) prepare a statement on the philosophy of the Wesley Foundation ministry; (2) write a job analysis for a campus minister; (3) and make other recommendations that might be called for from this study which will strengthen the Wesley Foundation ministry in our State. Committee members are: Fred Arnold, Bill Baker, Allen B. Bonsall, Myers B. Curtis, Chairman, Winston Faulkner, John B. Hays, C. Ray Hozendorf, Wayne C. Jarvis, Secretary.

The Area Special Study Committee has met on a number of occasions. Much of the time of the meetings has been devoted to preliminary ground work of the Study. Since each Annual Conference, "Little Rock and North Arkansas", did separate studies, these two studies were mimeographed and given to each committee member to read, and become familiar with their content. Much of the "separate" studies has been helpful to this Area Study Committee. In order to get before each Annual Conference Board of Education, the Area Special Study Committee is asking that this material be included in the Pre-Conference Digest of each Annual Conference (Board of Education Report). The Committee fully realizes that the Study is not complete. We ask that what has come out of the Area Special Study Committee thus far be included in the Digest and that it be adopted by the Board of Education of each Conference for approval; and that it come before each Annual Conference (Little Rock and North Arkansas) as a proper part of each Board of Education's report.

(1) We recognize the complexity of the roles a campus minister must fill in order to fulfill his responsibility. His role is defined by the fact that "on our campuses many students are found who have left the sheltering roofs of home and church for the first time. During these decisive years they face unforeseen perplexities, difficulties and pressures. They need mature counselors — counselors who are at home in the atmosphere of the modern college. They need the support of a friendly Christian community. So the Wesley Foundation is on campus involving itself in the hopes and commitments and the troubles and joys of students." (Little Rock Study Committee Report.) In addition, it is time to look at the foundation as an agent of reconciliation. This does not mean that the foundation is to abandon a position, but, in reality, to assert that as the church on the campus and, therefore, a witness to the gospel, it does have a **place to stand** and a **word to speak** to a college or university which is seeking its own meaning and life. This word must be spoken in Christian love in all of the actions and words of the foundation and its Director. It is not our task to bring wrath to the campus, but a Love which allows men to come together without threats or the need to be defensive, and to provide a ministry in which healing can take place." (North Arkansas Study Committee Report.)

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE

(2) The key to the success of our campus ministry, generally, always, has been and will be found in the kind of person appointed to fill this position. It is hoped that local boards of directors may be so responsible that they may enter in a more constructive way into selection of campus ministers and the guiding of the ministry of each foundation. The selection and appointment of any campus minister is, certainly, to be left to the Bishop and to the Cabinets of the Conferences.

(3) We emphasize the necessity of the annual conferences of the Arkansas Area working together in an area program as regards the campus ministry. The nature of higher education in the State and its transcending conference lines makes it imperative that one program be coordinated for the entire area.

(4) We urge that whatever philosophy of campus ministry is adopted, or whatever means of financing is used that the two conferences come to agreement on general principles, means, and ends. This consensus must, at the same time, take into consideration the uniqueness of each campus, and must make allowances for their individual differences.

(5) We recommend that the North Arkansas Annual Conference and the Little Rock Annual Conference each advance \$10,000.00 to be used to underwrite minimum monthly payments to the Wesley Foundation Centers (a Stabilization Fund of \$20,000.00) with the understanding that these payments be at such level that when collections for the fiscal year are complete, this basic Stabilization Fund of \$20,000.00 may be repaid from the apportionments for Wesley Foundation operations and kept available for continued use. (Note: the Committee recognized that the Little Rock Conference took this action in 1969. The North Arkansas Conference has not. We ask that each Conference make available \$10,000.00 from each Conference for a Stabilization Fund (\$20,000.00) for Wesley Foundation Operations. This Stabilization Fund is especially needed at the beginning of the Fiscal Year when "collections" are slow. This money will come out of apportionments for Wesley Foundation Operations. This will not increase the apportionments. In case each Conference does not make this available, each Conference will handle the matter in its own way.)

(6) That the matter of a state coordinator, appointed by the Bishop and the Cabinets, be tabled, that continued study in the future be given this by the Area Committee on Higher Education.

COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS

We make the following recommendations and requests to the Conference:

1. That we participate in a Pilot Project with the North Arkansas Conference dealing with a program of education and preparation for those college youth of the Area who are being hired as Summer Youth Directors out in the local church.

2. That the Session Directors for Camp Tanako consider and present the opportunities and needs relating to Church Vocations in the planning and implementation of their camps.

3. We urge local churches to avail themselves of elective units through the church school in making this challenge to answer the call to a church occupation.

4. We respectfully request the appointment in each District of a **district secretary of enlistment for church occupations.**

5. We call upon each local church Committee on Nominations and Personnel to give careful consideration to the nomination of a concerned and qualified **local church secretary of enlistment** as a member of the Administrative Board. (Paragraphs 149 and 152.2, Book of Discipline).

6. We urge every pastor to consider anew his high privilege and awesome responsibility of challenging youth and adults to an investment or to a re-investment of life in the service of our Lord and Saviour. We lift up **Ministry Sunday**, September 19, as an excellent time for giving special emphasis to this vital concern.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

For the 1972 Calendar year we recommend that the following program of Evangelism be implemented in the Little Rock Conference:

1. That every church be concerned about its evangelism mission and consciously seek to win persons to Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord and help them to grow spiritually by God's grace. To this end we will determine to bring the total stewardship of a person's abilities, resources, time and effort into focus as an arm of evangelism.

2. That each congregation in the conference consider carrying out "The John Wesley Great Experiment" (Wanted: "Ten Brave Christians") as a means of putting God first in a way that they will never be the same again. Resources for this program may be secured by writing to Spiritual

Life Publishers, Incorporated, 159 Forest Avenue, N.E., Atlanta, Georgia 30303.

3. That churches which have had a Lay Witness Mission be acquainted with the experiment in Discipline and Discovery as a possible follow-up in the local congregation. This is a church centered challenge which is based on five simple disciplines of the Christian life being followed by persons committed to put God first. Hopefully it results in a movement from personal commitment to personal mission in the world. Full information may be secured from The Institute of Church Renewal, P. O. Box 49066, 1610 La Vista Road, N.E., Atlanta, Georgia 30329.

4. That under the direction of the Conference Board there be a pilot project in the Camden District called "A Venture in Commitment and Communion," which will seek to bring a new life in faithful commitment to the churches which participate.

5. That there be a greater effort among churches organizing small groups to see that meaningful direction be given to them in order that the local church may be strengthened as a result. Our Board will provide help, both lay and clerical, to churches in need of assistance at this point. This help will come from persons who have received training as small group leaders at the Mission to Ministers and the Laymen's Spiritual Life Weekend at Lake Murray.

6. That we schedule a Family Enrichment Conference under the direction of Mrs. Virginia Law, Director of the Family Worship Department of the Upper Room. This General Board of Evangelism program involves "increasing your awareness of your own resources for loving, giving, and sharing with each other," and also will be a means of providing leadership for local churches desiring help in this area. For this we will work very closely with the Conference Board of Education and the Program Council.

7. That we join an effort in cooperative evangelism called "Key '73" in which we as United Methodists along with other Christians seek a new birth of vital Christianity in this turbulent world. This will be an ecumenical witness with the broadest possible scope of evangelistic concern and activity.

8. That we again provide a \$100.00 scholarship for one young minister in his first appointment to attend an evangelistic conference set up and designed by the staff of the General Board of Evangelism. The person to receive this scholarship will be selected by the Executive Committee of the Conference Board and the Cabinet representative. Anyone may submit names for consideration.

9. That this Board, through the District Secretaries, make available to every church the latest and most up to date resources available for use in evangelistic outreach.

10. Finally, that the Board of Evangelism in conjunction with the Board of Education help provide the support and financing for District Workshops to give leadership training for the best use of confirmation resources and materials, and that this program be set up and implemented through the Program Council.

Report Number 2

We want to express appreciation to the Rev. James R. Sewell who is retiring this year and who for the past 3 years has served as Chairman

of this Board in such a fine way, and who has also ably represented our conference as a member of the Jurisdictional Board of Evangelism.

BOARD OF HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

I. The Methodist Children's Home

1. We commend the laymen, District Superintendents and ministers of the Little Rock Conference for the 20% increase in their financial support of the Home this year over last year.

2. We commend the Trustees of the Home upon the completion of the extension home — The Magale Manor — in Magnolia.

3. We commend Mr. and Mrs. John Magale for their compassionate and Christ-like concern for children and for their generosity which made the Magale Manor possible.

4. We recommend that the "extension home" approach to Methodist institutional child-care in Arkansas be continued and that further exploration of needs and possibilities in this area be made.

5. We recommend that the Commission on World Service and Finance continue its annual financial support of the Children's Home in the amount of \$4,098.00.

6. In order to equalize representation between the Conferences, the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Children's Home requests the following change in their Articles of Incorporation.

The Articles of Incorporation presently provide that "the Board of Trustees may, at its discretion, elect as many as three additional members at large for such terms as may be determined by the Board on recommendation of its Committee on Nomination."

After the clause "Elect as many as three additional members at large", insert the words "**from each conference**", so that the amended statement will read: "The Board of Trustees may, at its discretion, elect as many as three additional members at large from each conference, for such terms as may be determined by the Board on recommendation of its Committee on Nomination." The Conference Board of Health and Welfare concurs in this request and recommends it to you.

II. Health and Welfare Ministries District and Local Programs

1. We recommend that the District Superintendents appoint District Representatives of Health and Welfare Ministries and see that each church or charge have Health and Welfare Representatives who will carry out the work of this Board on the local level.

2. We recommend that local and district representatives look into the matter of conducting seminars on hospital visitation and crisis visitation.

3. We recommend that our Conference, in cooperation with the North Arkansas Conference, continue support of the Chaplaincy needs of the State Sanitarium at Booneville, Arkansas.

4. In compliance with the instruction of the Annual Conference of 1970, the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries of both conferences conducted a survey among the ministers. A questionnaire was mailed to approximately 400 ministers in Arkansas. We received 302 replies, which is far above average. There were 218 in favor of the Methodist Church owning and operating a retirement home; 72 opposed and 12 were uncertain because of the lack of information. Of the 302 replying, 96 expressed an interest in living in a retirement village.

In view of this overwhelming interest, we recommend the continuation of the present study committee with instruction to secure additional data, such as possible location, cost of construction, rent fees, present trends nationally in a retirement home with a thorough investigation of problems encountered by many ventures of this nature. This committee, after thorough investigation will bring to the Conference of 1972 its findings and recommendations, and proposed Articles of Incorporation if this project is deemed feasible.

Be it further resolved that those individuals desiring to make gifts to such a project be encouraged to do so by placing their gifts in trust, in a place of their choosing, with a time stipulation for disposition of the gifts if such a project is not started by the Methodist Church.

Pursuant to this study there will be a meeting on June 24th, at The Methodist Children's Home, of our Board, the North Arkansas Conference Board, and the Board of Trustees of The Methodist Children's Home. The Reverend John A. Murdock of the General Board Staff, & Director, Department of Ministries to the Aging, will be our resource person.

5. We wish to report that the in-depth study on the need for a Staff Level Chaplain at the Medical Center in Little Rock has been ended. In consultation with Bishop Galloway, who assisted by making personal contacts in behalf of the study, we have concluded that, at present, the project is not now feasible.

DBP-Death Benefit Program

The Average Salary for the Little Rock Conference for the Calendar Year 1972 cannot be obtained from the General Board of Pensions at this time. They review salaries each year, and will work them out in the late fall. The contribution is 2% of the average salary.

Hospitalization

The American Hospital and Life Insurance Company of San Antonio is the carrier for our hospitalization.

Part I-Under 65

Coverage consists of two portions. Basic Hospital Plan and Major Medical.

Base Hospital Plan

70 days per entry

\$500.00 Miscellaneous charges and 75% of the next \$5,000.00

\$300.00 Surgery Schedule, or \$5.00 per day Medical Service

 After deductible the Company pays 80% of total charges

The Committee thinks it wise to raise the premium rate a small amount due to our experience under Major Medical.

This change in rate will be effective July 1st, 1971.

We further recommend that, effective January 1, 1972, the Hospitalization Insurance be put on a 60%-40% basis, with the church paying 60% and the pastor paying 40%.

The clause "coordinated benefits" will continue to be in use for all persons under the hospitalization coverage.

Arrangements have been made for coverage for Young People in a family contract, from 19-23 years of age, while in fulltime attendance at an accredited school or college, and unmarried.

Note: There are extended Maternity Benefits for the Insured, and Benefits which can be obtained for the Dependents, if it is done within thirty days of termination in the Conference. Notify Mrs. Rhoades.

Transfers

Ministers transferring into the North Arkansas Conference can be covered at once by their Death Benefit Program and Hospitalization program. They can also be accepted at any time appointments are made becoming eligible on the date of the appointment. Please notify Mrs. Rhoades in order for coverage to be continuous.

Part II-Over 65

The Over 65 Group has Hospital Coverage amounting to paying all that Medicare does not pay for each hospital entry. This includes the deductible amount for each Hospitalization and the deductible for the Doctor's part, then the 20% Doctor's bill that Medicare does not pay.

In addition, the following items are covered:

1. After \$50.00 deductible, your Insurance pays 80% thereafter for drugs and medicines outside of hospital, but requiring prescription.
2. 80% of the charges for Registered Nurses or Licensed Practical Nurses while in the hospital.
3. After \$25.00 deductible per year per person, then 80% of charges for Registered Nurses or Licensed Practical Nurses at home will be paid.

The Premium for this Suuplemental Coverage offered to the Retired Men and their Wives, and to the Widows, will remain the same.

The Little Rock Conference Board of Pensions will continue to pay one-half of the hospital premium for these persons.

BOARD OF THE LAITY

The third year of the present Quadrennium has come to a close and many changes have taken place. Circumstances, conditions and everyday experiences differ greatly from those of previous years. During the year we have concentrated principally on the individual role of the Layman in his church, and much emphasis has been placed on the group effort such as the Lay Witness Mission and the small group fellowship.

At the beginning of the year we arranged meetings in the Districts which had participated in a Lay Witness Program; in consultation with the District Superintendent, the Pastors, and a number of Lay Leaders within the districts. As a result of these meetings we were convinced that the Lay Witness type of program was to be desired. This was scheduled for our annual Assembly at Camp Tanako in September.

Our Conference Committee for the Assembly spent many hours in arranging the program and in securing qualified people to lead in the Lay Witness Mission. Dedicated Laymen from many different states, each at

his own expense, came to take part in this Adventure. We have received many reports, both written and verbal, of the program and all praised the meeting highly and expressed their gratitude for the opportunity of being a part of this great service.

Plans are being formulated for the Camp Tanako Annual Assembly in 1971 which will begin on Saturday September 11 and conclude with noon lunch September 12. We will have a number of outstanding speakers and a part of the program will be devoted the theme of Small Group Fellowship which is an outgrowth of last year's program.

Several District Workshop and Lay Speaker Classes have been held during the year. COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY

Organization

The Commission on Minimum Salary shall be composed of one minister and one layman from each District of the Annual Conference. They shall be nominated by the Cabinet and elected by the Annual Conference, quadrennially. Vacancies shall be filled by the same procedure. The Bishop is requested to appoint one representative from his Cabinet,

annually. The executive Secretary of the Town and Country Committee shall be an ex-officio member of the Commission and administrative officer.

The Commission shall elect quadrennially a chairman, vice chairman, and secretary who, together with the secretary of the Town and Country Committee and the Cabinet representative, shall compose the executive committee. Vacancies in offices shall be filled by the Commission from its elective membership.

The Commission shall meet as often as is required to do its work, and consign certain responsibilities to the executive committee.

Purpose

The purpose of the Minimum Salary Program is to:

1. Assist charges to pay their pastor the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference.
2. Challenge and enable charges to become selfsustaining. This is not to be thought of, or used, as a continuing mission support.

Finances

Funds for the purpose of the Commission shall be raised by an apportionment annually, to all churches of the Annual Conference of an amount equal to 3% of the base salary paid the pastor.

Program

- I. Charges are eligible for Minimum Salary Assistance provided:
 1. The combined ministerial support paid by the charge (base salary, travel and utilities) is a minimum of \$3,600.00 per year.
 2. Each church submits its budget, in writing to the Commission, through the District Superintendent annually.
 3. Each church conducts an Every Member Visitation, and reports the results to the Commission, through the District Superintendent annually.
 4. Each church pays in full all acceptances to the Conference or District Treasurer annually.
 5. The charge agrees to increase minimum salary annually moving to full support by the charge.
 6. The charge makes application to the Commission annually, on the prescribed form, by action of the Charge Conference.
 7. The charge is served by a resident full time pastor, or ministerial student approved by the Annual Conference.
- II. The Commission will supplement charges meeting these requirements to reach the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference up to the maximum of \$1,000.00 per year.
- III. The minimum salary for a pastor, approved by the Annual Conference for the conference year beginning June 1, 1971 shall be:
 1. Resident, full time ----- \$5,400.00
 2. Resident, student ----- 4,800.00

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE

3. Non-resident, student ----- 4,000.00

Provided that, on mission charges paying less than \$3,600.00 pastoral support and meeting the foregoing requirements shall be eligible for Minimum Salary Assistance up to a maximum of \$1,000.00 on the following schedule:

1. Resident, full time ----- \$4,500.00

2. Resident, student ----- 4,000.00

3. Non-resident, student ----- 3,600.00

IV. In the event of insufficient funds to meet all claims each charge shall share proportionately from the funds available.

V. The Commission shall report annually in the Conference Journal by districts the amounts paid during the calendar year to each charge.

VI. Charges served by part time, non-resident, retired pastors, or any pastor not yet approved by Annual Conference are not eligible for Minimum Salary Assistance.

VII. For each dependent child under 18 or for each child in college under 24, a pastor on Minimum Salary shall receive an additional \$100.00 per year.

VIII. That the above plan of distribution of funds be made effective on June 1, 1971.

LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCE BOARD OF MINISTRY

Policy and Program

I. The Little Rock Annual Conference Board of Ministry purposes to work strictly within the framework of the current Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church.

II. The elected officers of the board are: chairman, vice chairman, secretary and registrar.

III. The executive committee of the board are the elected officers. They shall have authority in matters committed to them by the board.

IV. The board shall meet prior to the opening of school, at Annual Conference, and on call of the chairman.

V. The board's sources of income shall be:

- A. A percentage from conference benevolences.
- B. One fourth (25%) of the amount collected from local churches designated for the Ministerial Education Fund.
- C. Gifts, bequests, interests and repayment of loans.

VI. The board shall maintain a scholarship loan program for ministerial training as follows:

- A. For those in course of study above the level of license to preach.
 - 1. Assistance in courses of study schools
 - (a) The cost of required text books for each year of the course of study. The enrollees are required to

submit to the registrar itemized statements or itemized invoices from Cokesbury for books purchased for use in the pastor's school courses.

- (b) The cost of tuition or registration fees, and of room and board while attending the course of study schools.
- 2. Assistance in the correspondence course
 - (a) Payment of fees
 - (b) The cost of required text books for each year of study. The enrollees are to purchase the required books in their own name, to pay for them or have them charged to their own account, and then be reimbursed by the registrar.
- 3. Above assistance repayable: Maximum received in any one year, by one year of service as a full time pastor, either as a ministerial member of the Annual Conference or a full-time lay pastor.
- B. For students from Little Rock Annual Conference churches preparing for the effective ministry in The United Methodist Church and enrolled in a college, university or seminary, approved by University Senate of the United Methodist Church and who:
 - 1. Hold a current license to preach in The United Methodist Church, or are probationary members of the Little Rock Annual Conference.
 - 2. Make application annually to the registrar of the board prior to September 1, giving all information requested and authorizing regular grade reports to this board's registrar from the school's registrar, including a transcript of credits at the end of each semester. Application must be requested.
 - 3. Make a note, properly endorsed, and payable in one of two ways.
 - (a) One full year of service as an effective minister in The United Methodist Church repaying the maximum receivable any one year:
 - (b) In cash with interest at 4% per annum, beginning at the time the recipient terminated his ministry or preparation therefor; schedule of payments to be arranged with the board's registrar.
 - 4. Summer session loans will be granted to one-half the maximum annual allowance.

VII. The board may set a maximum amount of assistance per year per recipient, but assistance will be determined for each individual on the basis of requirements or needs.

VIII. The board shall give assistance in a reasonable amount for physical examinations for men to be admitted as associate, probationary, or full members.

Requests and Recommendations

I. The board, each district superintendent, pastor and local church to hold up to young men the need for ministers and the challenge of the ministry, that may enable them to hear the call.

II. As the first step into the ministry, enrolling for studies for license to preach with the Department of Ministry of the General Board of Education.

III. Each pastor to provide himself with folders on the course of study and with the book for the course of the license to preach.

IV. That when a person has passed the correspondence work on studies for license to preach, or has completed one-fourth of the work for a Bachelor of Divinity Degree (B.D.) in an approved seminary, and in the judgment of the district Committee on the Ministry his gifts and graces commend him for the ministry, the committee license him to preach, subject to the approval of their action and renewal of this license by the District Conference.

V. Wherever possible, men in the course of study shall take their work through the courses of study schools.

VI. We assume our Annual Conference's share of financial responsibility for the Arkansas Pastor's School.

VII. The Annual Conference Commission on World Service and Finance to grant:

- A. An appropriation of a percentage from conference benevolences based on the board's financial needs that are not met by other sources.
- B. An apportionment to local churches for the Ministerial Education Fund based on 2% of the local budget excluding benevolences, building and debt service.

VIII. We express our appreciation for the support given the Ministerial Education Fund by the churches of the Annual Conference. We urge every church to continue to give full cooperation and support to its part of the Ministerial Education Fund for the remainder of this calendar year and in 1972.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

The local Church has the primary role in Christian Mission. The task of discovering mission and developing programs is now placed squarely on the shoulders of each local church Council on Ministries and Administrative Board. The Conference Program Council, the Board of Missions and the District Missionary Secretary are trained, ready and available to help each local church or charge who request it. The Chairman of Missions is the key person representing this area in the local church and a Work-Area Commission on Missions is needed in many churches.

We recommend that each local church consider the following in developing programs and objectives:

(1) Plan and carry out a Church-wide Mission Study using one of the three recommended studies for 1972:

Africa: "The New Generation In Africa"

"New Machines and the New Humanity"

Bible Study: "The Invitation — Matthew on Mission"

Leadership training to teach these studies is available in the Inter-Conference Co-operative School of Christian Mission at Hendrix College, July 14-16 and the weekend School at Hendrix July 16-18. Several of the Districts have Mission Study Conferences each fall to prepare leaders.

(2) Help your church establish a personal relationship with a United Methodist Missionary. Names of missionaries and their location are available upon request and regular missionary news letters are mailed to those who request them. Two suggested couples are Rev. and Mrs. William Elder, missionaries to Okinawa, who are from Little Rock and Mr. and Mrs. Delos McCauley, P. O. Box 126, United Mission to Nepal, Kathmandu, Nepal. Mr. McCauley is a native of Dierks and Mrs. McCauley is from Gillett.

(3) Local churches may provide financial support for specific missionaries in any amount. Churches which contribute as much as \$150.00 toward salary are designated "supporting" churches and receive a visit from that missionary when he is home on furlough. For additional information about helping support a missionary, contact the Conference Missionary Secretary.

(4) Local churches may become involved in missions in their own communities by taking steps to proclaim the Good News by meeting human needs. Some funds are available to churches who begin new forms of missions and for pilot projects.

(5) Local churches are challenged to accept and remit their apportionment for World Service and Conference Benevolences and reach the goals for National Advance and Special Church Extension. You are requested to help raise \$12,500 to provide a pediatric wing at the Pfeiffer Methodist Hospital in La Paz, Bolivia where our own missionary, Miss Helen Wilson served from 1953-1969. Support is also needed by Camp Aldersgate in its ministry.

Conference Responsibilities: The Board of Missions continued to fulfill its Conference responsibility by providing salary supplementation for ministers in Mission situations by providing Church Extension and building donations and administering the Special Church Extension Fund. Encouragement by financial grants has been given the Arkansas Release Guidance Foundation, the Lakes Ministry Program including a new Program, Millwood Reservoir, **Contact** and Aldersgate Camp.

The following requests are made of the Commission on World Service and Finance for 1971 and 1972:

(1) The amount of \$30,500 for the Board of Missions for our Conference Program, which includes Mission Salary Aid and Church Extension, as well as the Town and Country Work.

(2) The amount of \$20,000.00 to the Board of Missions to be allocated to the six districts for Special Church Extension, relocation and mergers.

(3) We request that the following amounts be allocated to the districts for National Advance Specials:

- (a) Spanish Speaking Work ----- \$ 7,000.00
- (b) Oklahoma Indian Mission ----- \$11,000.00
- (c) Negro Work ----- \$ 1,260.00

(4) We recommend that Camp Aldersgate be designated as a Conference Advance Special and that our churches be urged to support the camp.

We nominate Dr. Alvin C. Murray as Conference Missionary Secretary and respectfully request Bishop Paul V. Galloway to assign him in that capacity.

Policy For The Use Of Special Church Extension Funds

(Proposed Revision)

- I. The Special Church Extension Fund shall be administered by the Board of Missions. The Executive Committee of the Board shall function as the Special Church Extension Committee. Recommendations of projects to the Annual Conference shall rest with the Board of Missions. The Board may authorize the Executive Committee to make a final decision (approval, disapproval, adjustment of a project) between the regularly scheduled meetings of the Board of Missions.
- II. The Fund is for the purpose of assisting—
 1. building of new churches.
 2. purchasing of new sites;
 3. merging or relocating of churches;
 4. churches in areas of expanding population;
 5. developing facilities for local-church-related specialized ministries;
 6. a designated Conference Extension Project.
- III. We recommend that the District Board of Missions shall assume primary financial responsibility for purchasing new sites. If Special Church Extension Funds are requested to assist in purchasing sites the following principles apply—
 1. evidence of an actual survey of existing and projected population in the area must be presented to the Board,
 2. projected plans of development of the area (including roads, proximity to major traffic patterns, and accessibility of property) must be presented to the Board.
- IV. If Special Church Extension Funds are requested to assist in the building of a new church, then the principles of paragraph III apply.
- V. In allocating funds to existing churches consideration shall be given to:

1. acceptance in full and payment in full of conference apportionments for the preceding year;
 2. an every-member-financial-canvas must have been made within 12 months prior to final approval of application.
- VI. No one project may receive aid for more than three (3) consecutive years in a period of five (5) years.
- VII. The Church or District completing the use of the Mobile Chapel will be responsible for dismantling it and preparing it for moving. The Church or District receiving the use of the Mobile Chapel shall bear the expense of moving and re-assembling the unit.
- VIII. The application forms are available from the Special Church Extension Secretary of the Board of Missions. The Executive Committee will be responsible for having an investigation of each request for funds.

Qualifications For Mission Salary Aid

It should be kept in mind that Mission Salary Aid from our Conference Board of Missions is from a Mission Board. The primary purpose of our salary aid is (1) to help new church situations get established and self-supporting, (2) to aid in a continuing ministry to smaller churches and circuits (mostly rural), which are unable to pay a living wage to

their pastor. With this purpose in mind the following points are established as qualifications governing the use of Mission Salary Aid.

1. Aid to new churches will be on a year to year basis, however, it will be understood that when a new church receives aid it will be on a decreasing basis each year and all aid will cease completely at the end of the fourth year. Exceptions to this rule will be by 2/3 vote of the entire Board.

2. Salary Aid will not be given in any situation in which the pastor's total income is \$6,000.00 or above. Newly organized churches served by a pastor of an established church, paying \$6,000.00 or above, may not receive salary aid.

3. Salary Aid will not be given to any church or charge which does not conduct an Every Member Visitation yearly and give evidence of such to the Board.

4. Salary Aid request from District Superintendents will be given proper consideration **ONLY** if the request has been made in writing on the proper form to the Chairman of the Committee on Salary Aid.

5. In established churches or charges where continuing salary aid is necessary, the District Superintendent will be requested to use every means at his disposal to merge or combine churches or circuits in order to decrease Salary Aid.

6. Priority will be given to newly established churches from available funds of the Salary Aid.

7. The maximum amount of salary aid given in any situation for any one year shall be \$1,200.00. Exceptions to this rule will be by 2/3 vote of the entire Board.

8. In case of an urgent request for salary aid, between meetings of the entire Board, the Executive Committee is empowered to act on such request in accordance with these rules.

9. These rules may be rescinded, amended, or changed in any way at any meeting of the entire board by a 2/3 vote of the entire Board.

Policy For The Use Of Church Extension Funds

1. An amount equal to one-third of the money received by the Board of Missions from Conference Benevolences is placed in a fund for church extension purposes.

2. Churches may apply for donations from this fund for the purpose of erecting and completing church buildings, educational facilities and fellowship halls; for remodeling programs and for other Church Extension uses. Applications may be made for donations for parsonage projects but church building needs will be given priority.

3. Application may be made for any amount up to \$1,000 for one project.

4. Application blanks may be secured from the Secretary of the Board of Missions and are to be returned to him after completion. Rev. George Tanner, P. O. Box 192, Lake Village, Arkansas 71653.

5. A Committee on Donations will consider the applications and present to the Board their recommendation. Applications may be approved, referred to the Special Church Extension Committee, or denied. The amount of the donation may be adjusted by the committee from the original amount requested.

6. The Committee will present its recommendations to the regular meetings of the Board of Missions at the fall, mid-year and the Annual Conference meetings of the Board. The Executive Committee may act upon applications in emergency situations.

7. Approved applications will be kept on file for three years from the date of application and if funds are not requested in that period, the approved money will be released and a new application required.

Report No. 3

Committee on Town and Country

The Committee on Town and Country is part of the work of The Board of Missions under the new structure of The United Methodist Church. This does not mean that this area of concern has been terminated by the Church, it has been re-ordered. Much of the work of the former Commission on Town and Country Work needs to be continued because of its merit. Other new areas of concern need to be explored.

The Award for the Rural Church of the Year and the Town Church of the Year should be made. A report outline will be drawn up and presented to the District Directors of Town and Country Work for use in determining the winner of these awards. The District Superintendent and the District Director of Town and Country Work should submit the nomination from each district to the Chairman of the Committee on Town and Country at least one month prior to the beginning of the Session of the Annual Conference. At the beginning of Annual Conference, the Committee shall choose the winner from the nominees, and the awards will be presented during the session of the Annual Conference.

As the work of the District Director of Town and Country work is seen as essential for the work of this Committee, we recommend that the cabinet appoint a District director of Town and Country work in each district. We further request that the District Director be made a member of the District Council on Ministries.

We believe that training in the specialized area of Town and Country Work should be made available in the most helpful way to the churches and districts. Thus, we request that funds be made available for one person in each district to attend the Town and Country Church Seminary at the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville. We feel that up to \$100 ought to be paid to each person attending. At least one person ought to attend the Seminar on Church and Community Life, held at Emory University in the summer. \$300 should be allowed for this expense.

The key word in our work ought to be cooperation. If this Committee is to have any value in assisting the Town and Country Church, it will need to cooperate with other Boards and Agencies in the Annual Conference, and it will need their cooperation. We will further need the cooperation of District Superintendents and the local churches in each district.

For example, not all churches can afford nor should they own all the equipment needed from time to time in audio-visual programming. Therefore, each district ought either to purchase such equipment as needed to be used cooperatively, or to inventory the equipment owned by churches in the district and available for occasional cooperative loan to other churches within the immediate area.

This committee would encourage that the long-standing concept of at least 300-400 members for each full-time pastor receive more attention. We think that significant charge re-alignment could help in achieving this goal.

We urge that considerable thought be given to some new concept of cooperative church relationship. Churches of widely divergent size and background could explore cooperative ventures which might be advantageous to all parties in the cooperative venture. We do not spell out any concept in particular in hopes that creative thinking might go into finding these relationships.

We believe that the program of the church ought to be for all churches. Therefore, we feel that this committee should initiate a study of the total program of the church to see if it is helpful to the Town and Country Church. We need to know where it is helpful and ought to be re-enforced. We need to know where it is useless. And we would like to know the unique needs of the smaller churches.

The goal of this study would be the accumulation and assimilation of information about structure and program that would enable us to make some recommendation to the Structure Commission of the United Methodist Church.

BOARD OF PENSIONS**Recommendations**

1. We recommend that the annuity rate be set at \$61.00 per service year for both retired members of the Conference and Special Conference Claimants. We further recommend that this annuity rate become effective January 1, 1972.

2. We recommend that the apportionments to the charges of the Annual Conference for Conference Claimants be an amount equal to 25% of the pastor's salary provided that 20% of this amount shall be used for current distributions and 5% shall be used for a restrictive endowment fund.

3. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1381 Section 5 of the 1968 Discipline that the Sunday following Easter, April 9, 1972, be observed as Retired Ministers Day. Each pastor is urged to acquaint his congregation with the pension program of the Conference as part of the observance, and, if possible, to use retired ministers in the Worship Service.

4. We recommend that the pastor of each Local Church present the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas Memorial Program for Retired Minister's Pension fund to the members of his congregation and urge their participation in this program.

5. We recommend that the General Board of Pensions continue to write and distribute the monthly payments to our annuitants and that the payments be made on the last day of each month.

6. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1379 Section 5 of the 1968 Discipline the approval by the Annual Conference that special appointments shall be listed in the Conference Journal as follows: (1) with annuity claim (a) upon the Annual Conference, or (b) upon a General Board, an institution, or an agency of The United Methodist Church; (2) without annuity claim upon this Annual Conference.

7. We recommend that the Board continue to apportion to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the Conference the sum of \$360.00 per year in accord with the 1968 Discipline Par. 1379 Section 3. a. (3); and that said apportionments be paid to the treasurer of the Little Rock Conference Board of Pensions not later than 15 days prior to the end of the fiscal year. And that a like amount be assessed upon the office of the District Superintendent and said amount be paid from the District Superintendent's Fund.

8. We recommend that eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants have the death benefit program provided for them with the contribution to be paid by the Conference Board of Pensions in accordance with the program of the Conference Committee on Group Insurance.

9. We recommend that the Conference Board of Pensions pay $\frac{1}{2}$ of the annual payment of the premium of the Group Hospitalization for all eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants. In addition, we recommend that the eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants have the voluntary portion of the Medicare paid by the Conference Board of Pensions.

10. We recommend that all retired ministers who serve appointments under the District Superintendent, and receive less than \$1,000.00 in annual salary and expense from the charge, will have their contributions

and premiums paid by the Conference Board of Pensions as outlined in Par. 8 and 9 of this report.

11. We recommend that an amount equal to the maximum amount allowed by the Internal Revenue Service for housing be designated housing allowance from the Pensions received by the retired ministers.

12. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1380 Section 6 of the 1968 Discipline that there shall be organized from the membership of the Board of Pensions of the Little Rock Annual Conference a committee to compare the records of the amount paid by each Pastoral Charge for the support of pastors and for pension benefit purposes, computing the proportional distribution thereof and keeping a permanent record of defaults of the ministers in the conference who have failed to observed the provisions in Par. 1380 Section 6 pertaining to proportional payment; and shall render annually to each minister and charge in default a statement of the amounts in default for that and preceding years.

In event of default by any pastoral charge after due notification by the committee, liens shall be filed against future pensions and the names of the churches and ministers along with the amount in default shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

13. We request that the Conference Statistician provide a column in the Conference Journal listing the number of Memorials made through the Local Church to the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas.

14. We recommend that Rev. Ralph Clayton be granted 1½ additional annuity years served in the former Methodist Protestant Church, provided that he was not a student pastor at the time of this service.

We also recommend that Mrs. Ona E. Kelley, widow of Rev. J. D. Kelley, be granted 5 annuity years of credit with payments retroactive to January 1, 1971.

CAMP TANAKO

Over 2500 campers participated in the Tanako program during the 1970 season. The program is constantly being improved to meet the changing needs of our conference. In many instances it will remain the same, with the exception of date changes for various sessions. We will continue to have the Conference Choir Camp, Conference Lab School, Conference Camp, Camp for Socially Deprived, Young Adult Week-end Conference, Junior and Middle High Sessions at Tanako. At the present we are planning the Senior High Assembly to be held at Hendrix College in Conway.

Also this year we are planning a permanent staff situation, hiring 10 college youth — 4 men, 6 women — for the eleven week camping season. They will serve as Counselors, Workshop Leaders, Recreation Leaders, etc., and this will reduce a past problem of securing staff by the session Directors as well as give continuity to the Program during the 1971 season.

Mr. Milner, Camp Superintendent, is serving Tanako in an extremely fine way, continuing to improve the facilities with a minimum of time and cost.

However, in order to continue to serve effectively the camp needs greater financial assistance from its friends and United Methodist across the Conference. We therefore, recommend a continuation of the financial policy as follows:

1. From Conference Apportionments, \$9,000.00
2. From local church budgets and a free-will offering on Camp Tanako Sunday, which will be the second Sunday in August.
3. From gifts and Memorials of individuals and special groups.

In the askings on apportionments of World Service and Conference Benevolences for the next quadrennium to the various churches, there are obvious and quite significant inequities. In many instances a church may be paying more for pastor's salaries than another church in another district and yet be paying far less for World Service. Illustrations of this kind of inequities are numerous. We, therefore, recommend that a formula for local churches be devised on a conference basis and the askings be made according to this formula.

Christian Civic Foundation Sunday — First Sunday in December (\$7,500 is authorized to be apportioned by the District Superintendents to the churches).

Mt. Sequoyah (Western Methodist Assembly) — at least \$10.00 per charge to the apportioned to the districts).

Wesley Foundation Operations — an amount of \$50,000.00 to be apportioned to the churches by the District Superintendents. We renew our offer to set up a Stabilization Fund with the Little Rock Conference and the North Arkansas Conference advancing \$10,000 each to be used to underwrite minimum monthly payments to Wesley Foundation Centers. This money is to be repaid as revenues will allow so that the original amount of \$20,000 will be available at the beginning of each year. If this plan is unacceptable to the North Arkansas Conference, we will advance \$10,000 to be used as foretated for Wesley Foundations within the bounds of the Little Rock Annual Conference.

Special Church Extension — an amount of \$20,000 be apportioned to the churches by the District Superintendents.

E. Board of the Ministry \$59,349.00

In accord with the General Conference action, we are recommending that this amount, which is representative of the 2% requirement, be apportioned to the local churches by the District Superintendents.

F. Advance Specials (Apportioned on a percentage basis).

For the new quadrennium, we do not intend to approve any apportionment to the churches for an Advance Special because of the voluntary nature of the Advance Special program.

We do recommend that Camp Aldersgate be designated as a Conference Advance Special and supported on a voluntary basis.

G. Hendrix College \$93,000.00

This amount to be apportioned to the local Churches by the District Superintendents.

H. Pastor's Utilities — If a charge does not otherwise provide for a pastor's utilities, then each charge is requested to designate the cost of parsonage utilities as a part of the assessee's salary, thus exempting the cost of the utilities from the income tax claims. It is understood that designation of a part of salary as utilities for tax purposes does not exempt this amount from percentage that would normally be levied against it.

I. Other authorized payments by Conference Treasurer:

Methodist Foundation of Arkansas — \$1,500.00 from Conference

Administration Fund.

Incidental expenses of the Boards and Agencies not receiving appropriations to be paid from Conference Administration Fund.

Annual Conference Host Church be paid any deficit in Conference entertainment expenses upon financial statement to the Treasurer, to be paid from Conference Administration Fund.

Board of Evangelism be allowed up to \$500 of voucher expense from Conference Administration Fund.

J. Conference Benevolences Unrestricted Fund — All unrestricted benevolent fund balances be placed in a central operating balance instead of being retained in the name of the various boards and commissions.

K. We recommend that the District Superintendents adhere as closely as possible to the Decimal in making apportionments to the churches. We also recommend that the apportionments be reviewed very soon in light of the changing characteristics of the local churches in order to make the apportionments more equitable.

L. We are in accord with the Board of Christian Social Concerns in recommending that the churches of the Little Rock Annual Conference make voluntary financial contributions to the "Arkansas Release Guidance Foundation."

M. Due to the increasing financial burden of the Wesley Foundation and the increasing shortage of funds available, we strongly recommend a continued study of this program by the Joint Committee appointed by the Bishop. A re-evaluation of the entire program may be in order for the new quadrennium.

N. We recommend interest income from investments shall continue to go to the Conference Administration Fund.

O. We concur with the Board of Education of the Little Rock Conference in commending the Capitol Funds Campaign of Philander Smith

College and the fair share goal accepted by the Annual Conference of \$55,000 per year for each of two years. We further recommend that the conference accept a goal of \$25,000 for the Race Relations Day offering which is used for scholarships and other operating expenses. This amount is in line with the request of the General Conference.

REPORT OF THE WOMEN'S SOCIETY AND WESLEYAN SERVICE GUILD TO THE LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCE

May 24 - 27, 1971

The opening statement of our PURPOSE reads — "The Purpose of the Women's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild shall be to help women grow in the knowledge and experience of God as revealed in Jesus Christ . . ." Offering new opportunity for growth, three new guilds and one new society have been organized in this conference since the last Annual Conference.

The report of the treasurer reveals \$112,219.99 was sent to the Women's Division by the Societies and Guilds in 1970. \$105,202.15 was credited on Pledge to Missions, Call to Prayer and Self Denial \$3,868.16, Supplementary Gifts \$1,782.50, and the Special Offering for the 1970 Assembly \$1,367.18. Local Societies and Guilds reported \$50,654.09 raised and spent at the local church and community level.

The Elizabeth Thornburg Workman Fund giving for 1970 was \$765.63. Drawing on a cash balance from the ETW Fund giving in 1969 we were able to spend \$990.00 on the Little Rock Conference Youth Ministry, a Camp for disadvantaged Junior High Youth, a Mid-Winter Youth Seminar and a car pool of Camp Tanako.

Membership of local societies and guilds, reported to the Conference Statistician, was 10,228. This being a decrease of 198 from 1969.

The 1970 Annual Meetings of both the Conference Women's Society and the Guild were held in October. This was the first year for fall meetings and also the first year for "one day" annual meetings. The District Societies and Guilds have set fall dates for their 1971 annual meetings, bringing the districts and conference in line with the officer/program/fiscal calendar year of the local societies and guilds.

The Task Group on Merger with the Southwest Conference continues to seek ways for the women of the two conferences to work cooperatively.

Two new Task Groups were recommended by the executive committee and approved by the annual meeting:

The Task Group to Study Investment Funds held by the conference brought forth a recommendation, which was accepted by the executive committee, to cancel the outstanding loans made to four young women from the Holt Student Loan Fund and to contribute \$1,800.00 from this Fund to Philander Smith College. Study of the Birdwell Fund is still in progress. Interest from the investments of the John F. and Lyda D. Taylor Endowment Fund continues to go to partial support of Miss Helen Wilson. \$2,515.36 was sent through the Women's Division in 1970.

The first report has been received from the Task Group to Study Membership. The Southwest Conference will participate in the study. A training team made up of two from the Southwest Conference, two

from the Little Rock Conference Women's Society and two from the Guild will plan training for district teams to conduct a special study of pilot groups of women in the church and community.

An Officer Development Event was held in February. The concerns and needs of the local churches in the districts were assessed by conference and district officers, priorities examined and new ventures planned.

Members of the conference Women's Society and Guild continue to serve on the Advisory Committee for Church and Community Work. Mrs. Grace Dwyer has been re-appointed by the National Division to serve in the Hot Springs area and Miss Masheetta Lindsey has been re-appointed to serve in the Southwestern part of Arkansas, assigned to the Southwest Conference and related to the Little Rock Conference Advisory Committee. This is a unique situation in that the committee is made up jointly of members of the two conferences, with the district superintendents and council members of the districts served.

We are looking forward to the Third Cooperative Inter-Conference School of Christian Mission meeting at Hendrix College July 14-16 for the Three Day School and July 16-18 for the Weekend School. The steering committee for this school is made up of members of the three Arkansas Area Conferences, Boards of Mission, Program Councils, Women's Societies and Guilds. Anyone interested in and concerned about the mission of the church is invited to attend.

United Methodist women in Arkansas were immensely proud to learn in January that Miss Theresa Hoover, the Associate General Secretary of the Women's Division, from Arkansas and the Southwest Conference, had been named among the 75 Most Important Women in America by The Ladies Home Journal Magazine.

The women of this conference are aware of a new understanding of the Mission of the Church. We see a newness in the meaning of the "Mission Field". We accept this to mean ourselves as well as our communities and all the world. The heart of the gospel is people and the concern for people, because Jesus said "Love thy neighbor as thyself."

COMMISSION ON WORSHIP

The Conference Commission on Worship has sought, during these early days of existence, to give leadership in the areas of liturgics, worship settings, and specific services (such as weddings, etc.) Our display at Annual Conference, we feel, is a fair example of what we can do when called upon. (Over 1,000 copies of the paper "The Christian Year," by Mike Clayton, have been distributed).

This year, at Annual Conference we will, again, have a display on worship, which may include resource materials, music and paraments. The "Guidelines For Weddings," being prepared by the Commission, will also be available there.

We also hope to have available for those who would like to attend several experimental services of worship at times when the actual sessions of the Conference are not being held.

We maintain our offer to go into the Districts and/or local churches with seminars or training sessions on the Christian wedding and Christian funeral. (A "Guidelines For Christian Funerals will follow the "Guidelines For Weddings" mentioned above)

We encourage each pastor to make full use of **The Book of Worship** in planning and leading his people in worship. The services in **The Book**

of Worship are normative and may provide stimulus for individual creativity. We encourage "rigid flexibility" and a good balance between liturgy and preaching. **Ventures In Worship**, Volumes 1 and 2 (Abingdon Press) are excellent helps for contemporary services.

We further encourage each local church Council on Ministries to include a Work Area Chairman on Worship as an active member of the Council.

We again request each District Superintendent to include in his District Staff for the next Conference Year a District Director of Worship to work with the Commission in promoting its work in the Districts.

We encourage faithful attendance at the services of worship during the Annual Conference Session, and offer our assistance, whenever called upon, to help in the preparation and conducting of these services.

We appreciate the continued interest and encouragement of our Bishop, Paul V. Galloway, in our work.

CLAUDE RUFUS ANDREWS

MEMOIR FOR CONFERENCE JOURNAL

Claude Rufus Andrews was born at Cypert near Marvell, Arkansas on January 2, 1889. He died at a Little Rock Hospital on April 18, 1971 at the age of 82 years. He attended school at Little Rock and Hendrix College.



At a District Conference meeting in Hazen, Arkansas in May of 1917 he was licensed to preach. During his long ministry he served the following charges: Forrest Park in Little Rock, Carlisle Circuit, Glenwood, Atlanta, Buckner, Holly Springs, Center Point, Fouke, Traskwood, Sheridan, Bayou Meta, Princeton, Roe Circuit, New Edinburg, Huttig, and Leola.

He was married to Miss Anna Jessup of Carlisle on November 16, 1921 and to this union one son, Jessup, was born. He retired in 1958 and moved to Carlisle to make his home. He served as teacher of the Men's Bible Class in the Carlisle Church for 11 years.

A passage of scripture from the prophet Malachi (Malachi 2:5-7) is most fitting for this dear pastor. "... says the Lord of hosts, My covenant with him

was a covenant of life and peace, and I gave them to him, that he might fear; and he fears me, he stood in awe of my name. True instruction was in his mouth, and no wrong was found on his lips. He walked with me in peace and uprightness, and he turned many from iniquity. For the lips of a priest should guard knowledge, and men should seek instruction from his mouth, for he is the messenger of the Lord of hosts."

His career of Christian witness characterized by patience, love, sacrifice, dedication, concern, discipline, scholarship, faithfulness, and unselfishness. Like Abraham, he went where he was called, and was faithful in all things. At an early age he felt God's call to the ministry and in 1920 he joined the Little Rock Annual Conference on trial. From that time on until his retirement 39 years later he served faithfully. There was something unique about his service. Appointments and climbing the ladder meant very little to him. He was always more concerned about serving where he could. In fact, he was happy to take a small circuit of churches which might otherwise have found it difficult to have a minister. He did this not because he was lacking in ability, but because he loved people and wanted to serve God as best he could. And like Moses, he led so many people away from their doubts and fears to confidence in the face of their difficulties. Like Jonathen he met so many who were discouraged along life's way and he cheered them by telling them the good news of God. Like David, he sang the church to victory and shouted on the battle of triumph. Like the prophet Isaiah, he constantly pointed the church to brighter days and better things in the future. Like Daniel, he was a man of solid convictions from which he never wavered. Like John, the Baptist, he delighted to preach to the people saying, "Behold the lamb of God taketh away the sins of the world." Like John, he believed with all his being that Jesus was the Son of God and the Savior of the world. Like Peter, he rejoiced that Jesus died for him and all men, and he did his

best to let the world know this blessed truth. Like Paul, he believed that the good news of the Gospel should be carried to all the world and Christ lifted up. Yes, like Jesus, his Divine master, whom he daily followed, he went about doing good.

He was a consecrated Christian minister, true to his God, his church, his wife, his family, and his fellowman. He was the kind of a minister of which the Methodist Church can be proud. He stood in that endless line of splendor and by his own life and ministry he added lustre and light to that splendor. The world is richer because C. R. Andrews lived, served, and died in the faith. And when he died there was only one place he could go and that was to be with God. And there he could sing the hymn he loved so much, "O for a Thousand Tongues to sing my great Redeemers praise."

Funeral services were conducted in the Carlisle United Methodist Church on April 20, 1971, by Rev. Carlos E. Martin, Dr. C. Ray Hozen-dorf, and Rev. John Workman. He was buried in the Carlisle Cemetery.

He is survived by his wife, Anna, who lives in Carlisle, and one son, Jessup, who lived in Little Rock.

X. Miscellaneous

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

1. Nominations. The District Superintendents shall nominate all members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees, except as otherwise provided.

2. Financial and Statistical. (1) The District Superintendents shall furnish the treasurer with all apportionments to the churches on, or before January 1. These figures shall be official. (2) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars, with no column for cents. (3) Each pastor shall report to the Conference Treasurer and turn in his statistical report to the statistician at a date set by the cabinet. The Treasurer's Report from the Pastor will be audited and checked by the Final Data-Processing Print-Out. Where there is discrepancy, the amount recorded on the Print-Out will prevail.

3. Memoirs: There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased clerical member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, names of children, charges served, and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with the memoir. The same shall be done for probationary members, associate members and lay pastors. Like wise, a memoir of wives or widows of the above shall be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Committee on Memoirs the death of any of the above mentioned and be responsible for the submission of Memoirs not later than thirty days after the death occurs. The names of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions, or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. It shall be the duty of the District Superintendents to report to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions the death of any conference claimant that occurs in their respective districts.

4. Administrative Fund. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall recommend an assessment for a Conference Administrative Fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expense of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this Fund. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the Fund. Payments from the Fund shall be made only on vouchers signed by the Secretary of the Conference; provided that this rule does not relate to the salary and expenses of the Treasurer of the Conference.

5. Conference Treasurer. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the Conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer, on recommendation of the World Service Commission, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.

6. Number of Districts: There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Conference.

7. District Fund: The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall

report to the district conference, annually, showing receipts and disbursements.

8. Reports and Resolutions: There shall be a pre-conference report which shall contain reports of all the boards and agencies of the Conference. This report shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Annual Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the pre-conference reports shall be typewritten, in triplicate, on special forms furnished by the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary. In the event editing of a report is deemed necessary by the Conference Secretary and chairman of the board involved, permission is hereby granted.

9. Membership of the Commission on Archives and History: The Commission on Archives and History shall be composed of ten or more members, one of whom shall be the Conference Secretary. In addition to the duties outlined in the Discipline, the Commission shall secure a group picture of each class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal; and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his retirement.

10. Safeguarding Historical Material: (1) Any member of the Little Rock Annual Conference, or layman authorized by a member of the Conference, may examine historical documents within the Headquarters Building. (2) To remove historical documents from the Headquarters Building, a written request signed by the presiding Bishop and Conference Secretary shall be presented to the Custodian. Provided further, historical documents belonging to the Conference Women's Society may be removed from Headquarters Building upon written request signed by the President and Secretary of the Women's Conference. (3) The Custodian of historical documents shall be given a receipt for any material removed from the vault in the Headquarters Building, Little Rock, giving date of removal and name of receiver.

11. District Conference: There may be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline, and one additional member from each pastoral charge, provided however, in charges of more than five hundred members there shall be one additional member for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.

12. Lay Members: Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the pastor-host of the Annual Conference at least fifteen days before the session of the Annual Conference.

13. Board Service. No person may be nominated to serve on the same Conference Board for more than two consecutive quadrenniums, and may not be nominated to serve on more than one board at the same time. District Superintendents may not serve on Conference Boards, except as provided in the Discipline, or by specific conference action. A person failing to attend a board of which he is a member in a quadrennium may be continued only by special board action.

14. Entertainment: The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the retired ministers shall be entertained from the entertainment fund. Certain proceeds from the offerings shall go to the fund. The entertainment fund shall be administered by three men, to be named by the Cabinet, who will be reporting to the next session of the Annual Conference.

15. Conference Expense: Registration fees and the offerings at the public services in the session of the Annual Conference shall be used to

defray the expense of the session, including the expense and/or honorarium of the conference preacher and that any deficit remaining be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund, and the Conference Treasurer shall pay the same.

16. Un-sponsored Resolutions: Any resolution not sponsored by a regular board or standing committee of the Conference must lie over for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon, provided, however, immediate debate and action may be ordered by two-thirds vote of the Conference present and voting.

17. Apportionments Based on Pastor's Salary: On all items apportioned to local churches by means of a percentage of the ministers' salary, such percentage shall be understood to apply to all ministerial members of the local church staff serving under the appointment of the Bishop, including ministers in full connection, ministers on trial, and full time Lay Pastors. This rule to be in effect with the 1966-67 Conference Year.

18. Campaigns. All Conference-wide campaigns to raise funds shall be voted on by ballot.

19. Amendments. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing on day before the vote is taken.

REPORT OF THE INTER-CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON MERGER

Whereas, the chief concern of the United Methodist Church in Arkansas is to structure its life for the most effective promotion of its work in every church and at every level, and

Whereas, the witness of a United Methodist Church in Arkansas has tremendous possibility by its impact upon the communications media, political and social structures of the State, and

Whereas, the people called Methodists function at other levels within the structure of a single state system, and

Whereas, experience has taught the Methodist people that the best interests of such endeavors as higher education, child care and church press are best served by joint responsibility under single boards, and

Whereas, the general efficiency of our work would be enhanced by elimination of overlapping, and sometimes conflicting interests where separate conferences seek to work in the same area of concern, and

Whereas, the wise stewardship of our funds demands the greatest good at the least possible expense, and

Whereas, it is often necessary in fitting churches and ministers in the making of pastoral appointments to transfer ministers from one Conference to another, and whereas, laymen often move from one Conference to another which entails a period of adjustment and often loss of leadership of clergy and laity working to the disadvantage of both, and

Whereas, a larger conference would broaden the base of appointments making available more varieties of appointments thus lending itself to the creative matching of men and situations plus more varieties of challenges and types of ministry available to candidates for conference membership, and

Whereas, the merger of the two Conferences would lend itself to a realistic realignment of the several districts, promoting both economy and efficiency, and

Whereas, the representation of the merged Conference would be proportionally larger as well as one unit in the General and Jurisdictional Conferences of the Church, thus giving to the Methodists of Arkansas a larger voice in the decision making processes of the church, and

Whereas, the Inter-Conference Committee of Merger of the North Arkansas and the Little Rock Conferences of the United Methodist Church has conducted a two year study and found that the two Conferences are closer

together in program than at any time in the past, and that no insurmountable barriers exist to forming a workable and equitable union; be it therefore:

Resolved, That the North Arkansas and the Little Rock Conferences merge to form The Arkansas Conference of The United Methodist Church;

Resolved, That the North Arkansas and the Little Rock Conferences petition the South Central Jurisdictional Conference in its 1972 Session to grant permission for such merger.

Resolved, That the following guidelines govern the effecting of the said Merger:

1. All property rights shall be protected and trusteeships continued as recommended by the Special Study Committee. All rights and privileges of local churches, ministers and laymen within the State of Arkansas shall be protected as provided for in the Discipline of The United Methodist Church.
2. The Boards, Commissions and Committees of the Arkansas Conference will be constituted according to the Discipline of The United Methodist Church and where possible, within the guidelines of the Discipline, the new Boards, Commissions and Committees will represent all geographical areas of the State.
3. It is recommended that the Program Council be administered by a Director and two Associate Directors, and such other secretarial staff as the Program Council and World Service and Finance Commission approves.
4. All other programs administered by separate Boards, Commission or Committees, including the Women's Society of Christian Service, Conference Youth Councils and the Wesleyan Service Guild will be merged.
5. Programs and institutions now administered by joint Boards, Commissions or Committees will be continued.
6. No pensions are to be reduced by reason of merger, and the plans of the merging Conferences with the goal of increasing annuity rate shall be continued.
7. The Minimum Salary Commission of the Arkansas Conference will make such adjustments as necessary to harmonize the programs of the merging Conferences so that no pastor's salary shall be reduced by merger.
8. The present group insurance shall be continued until the Arkansas Conference will have opportunity to choose its own coverage.
9. It is respectfully requested that as a part of the merger, the presiding Bishop appoint a special committee to study the number and boundaries of the Districts and recommend the most effective organization as to the number and boundary of the said Districts.
10. It is respectfully requested that the Presiding Bishop call into session the new Arkansas Conference not later than September 15, 1972 for the purposes of organization, election of Boards, Commissions, Committees and Agencies, to adopt Standing Rules, and for any other business necessary. Delegates to the 1972 Sessions of the North Arkansas and the Little Rock Conferences shall constitute the membership of the 1972 Session of the Arkansas Conference.
