

CONFERENCE MINUTES

Monday Afternoon, May 28, 1973 3:40 P.M.

Pre-Service Concert: Prior to the opening of the Conference, a Brass Choir performed in concert.

Opening Celebration: Bishop Eugene M. Frank called the one hundred twentieth session of the Little Rock Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church to order and announced that there would be a business session following the evening worship service. Bishop Frank then began the worship service with sentences from scripture and continued as the Liturgist, addressing the Conference briefly on the needs and mission of the church and leading the Conference in John Wesley's Covenant Service and Holy Communion. The Lay Reader was John E. Blundell. The Deacons were George W. Martin, Roy I. Bagley, Joe E. Arnold and John H. Thompson. The music was presented by the Girls Choir from First United Methodist Church, Hot Springs. David Aston was Organist and Choirmaster. Vocal solos were offered by Lucy Cabe, Fred Arnold and Mary Smith. The Flutist was Daina Hill.

Monday Evening, May 28

7:00 P.M.

Pre-Service Concert: The St. James Bell Ringers of the St. James United Methodist Church of Little Rock performed in concert for the entertainment of the Conference prior to the opening of the evening worship service.

Worship Service: Donald Nolley served as Worship Leader of the evening. He was assisted by Bishop Frank, Edward B. Hollenbeck and Beeky Rogers. The music was provided by David Aston, organist, and the Choir from Grand Avenue United Methodist Church, Mrs. John Goff, Choir Director and Ruth Broughton, Organist. Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., the Conference Preacher, spoke to the Conference on Hebrews 12:ff. saying the Church needs to release:

- 1. The Brakes of Doubt
- 2. The Brakes of Indifference
- 3. The Brakes of Prejudice
- 4. The Brakes of Extremeism
- 5. The Brakes of Materialism
- 6. The Brakes of Fear

Business Session: Bishop Frank called the Conference to order and recognized James Major, Conference Secretary, who announced that the roll call was being taken at the desk in the Fellowship Hall and urged everyone to register. He then announced his staff: Therral Wilson, Journal Clerk, O. D. Peters, Staff Assistant, Jack Wilson, Dale Diffee, Ray Burrow, Tellers and moved their election. They were elected. Mr. Major then announced the Bar of the Conference in front of the Pillars. This was adopted.

Bishop Frank introduced Walter Hazzard, president of Philander Smith College, who addressed the Conference on behalf of the college.

United Methodist Youth Constitution Progress Report: Bishop Frank recognized Joe Taylor who introduced Roy Smith, youth delegate from Pine Bluff, who gave a progress report on the preparation of a new Constitution for the Conference United Methodist Youth.

The Conference was adjourned by Arthur Terry who pronounced the benediction.

Tuesday Morning, May 29 8:30 A.M.

Worship Service: Fred Haustein led the Conference in worship. C. C. Hall preached on Mark 1:35 saying that we should not forget the morning prayer for:

Standing Rule Study Committee: Bryan Stephens, secretary of the Conference Committee to Study Standing Rule One read the report of the Committee recommending amendments to Standing Rules 1 and 14 to lay on the table for twenty four hours.

Nominations: Roy I. Bagley, Cabinet Secretary, presented the first nominations of the Cabinet for the various boards and agencies of the Little Rock Annual Conference. G. James Washington was elected as co-chairman of the Board of Missions.

Board of the Ministry: John Ross reported that there have been no complaints against the ministers and recommended that their character be passed. It was done.

Alvin Murry moved that the motion be referred to the Commission on Religion and Race. It was done. The Report of the Commission was then adopted.

Board of the Laity: Bill Shepherd, Chairperson of the Board, presented the report of the board. With the addition of the name of the District Lay Leader for the Arkadelphia District it was adopted.

Courtesy: Robert W. Trieschmann presented Harold K. Davis, John Gutherie, Bill Patterson, Matt Ellis, Lee Cate, Earl Hughes, Withers Moore, Francis L. Garrett, Jeff Davis, Rodney Wallace and wife Judy, to the Conference.

Letters of Greetings: The Conference asked the Secretary to send letters of greetings to O. E. Homes, Harold Wilson, Roscoe Walsh, B. T. Fooks, Charles Roe, Leland Clegg, Louis Averitt and P. D. Alston.

Adjournment: The Conference adjourned with the singing of the Doxology.

Steel, presiding in Bishop Frank's absence announced that there would be an open hearing on the proposed Pension Plan, that it would be a purely informative plan, and that no official business would be transacted during this hearing. Sidney Good, Chairperson of the Board of Pensions presented the proposed plan to the Conference for discussion. The Conference expressed its appreciation for the work of the Committee.

Marshall Steel turned the gavel over to Bishop Frank.

United Methodist Women: Tootsie Davenport, past President of the Women's Society of Christian Service, Alice Preston, Lucille Nix, President of United Methodist Women, gave the report of the United Methodist Women.

Board of Evangelism: Carl Beard gave the Board's Report No. 1 and moved the adoption of the report. Fred Arnold spoke to the report. Alvin Murray encouraged the Conference to participate in Key 73 during the rest of the year and to prepare for the Methodist Mission to the World in 1975. Michael McHughey, youth delegate, moved to amend Section 4 of the report to read:

"We would urge more emphasis upon youth evangelism. We recognize the importance of Christian nurture in the camping program, and we feel that the need for evangelism with our youth is deeply necessary. We commend youth evangelism efforts through the General Board of the United Methodist Church's new department of youth evangelism, Wesley Foundations, and local United Methodist Youth Fellowships."

Robert W. Trieschmann, James Argue, and Howard Ritchie spoke against the motion. Sam Albright spoke for the amendment. The amendment failed. The Report was adopted. Carl Beard moved the adoption of Report No. 2, and it was adopted.

This election as a "Life Trustee" to be made by the Board of Trustees upon the recommendation of its Nominating Committee."

Norris Steele moved the election of John Thompson, Edward Matthews, and B. T. Fooks to the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Children's Home. It was done. Norris Steele presented Articles of Incorporation of Methodist Community, Inc., and James Argue presented A Resolution Concerning The Development Of A Retirement Facility At Aldersgate Camp and moved its adoption. It was done. Norris Steele moved the Adoption of the Articles of Incorporation of Methodist Community, Inc. It was done. Norris Steele presented a Supplement to the Board's report dealing with the Golden Cross offering and moved its adoption. It was done.

Methodist Children's Home: J. Edwin Keith, Superintendent of the Home, spoke to the Conference on behalf of the Home.

Standing Rule 14 was amended to read Entertainment: The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the retired ministers shall be entertained from the entertainment fund. Certain proceeds from the offerings shall go to the fund. The entertainment fund shall be administered by three persons, to be named by the cabinet, who will be reporting to the next session of the Annual Conference. All entertainment funds shall be turned over to the Local Church who shall pay per diem directly to the retired ministers. Eligibility shall be determined by the committee of three and shall be paid only for days attended.

Ecumenical Affairs: Robert E. L. Bearden, Chairperson of the Commission, gave the report of the Commission on Ecumenical Affairs. Including nominations to the Board of the State Council of Churches. W. W. Barron and Mouzon Mann reported on the Ecumenical Conference. The Report was adopted.

VI Reports

THE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Director's Report

The most exciting activity within the Council on Ministries during the past year has been the development of the "listening process." From the beginning the Council has sought to determine the needs of local churches, districts, and the conference. Once these needs were determined, we have provided activities designed to meet the needs. But during the past year, the listening process has been sharpened. The District Superintendents, the District Councils, the Conference Council, the Boards, Commissions, Committees and Agencies have all been seeking to determine basic needs. The meeting of the Conference Council immediately following Mid-Year Board Meetings was devoted exclusively to "listening." This is all in keeping with your Council Director's concept of ministry. The staff of your Council on Ministries is committed to determining the needs, and then channelling activities through the District Councils that will meet the needs of the local churches.

During the year the following types of program activity were promoted: (1) Workshops under the leadership of General Board personnel, largely on a conference basis, and (2) Workshops in local churches, sub-districts, or districts under the leadership of Conference personnel. All such program activity has resulted as our response to expressed need.

Mrs. John L. Tucker, Coordinator of Children's Ministries, has done a superb job of implementing program activities in the Children's Age Level. These activities include: Choir Festivals and Choir Camps, Elementary Camps at Tanako, Local, District, and Conference Arts and Crafts Festival, Coaching Conference and Vacation Church School Clinics.

The Rev. Joe E. Arnold, Associate Director, administers a camping program of outstanding significance. The youth activities of the conference are designed not only to utilize the leadership of youth today, but also to enhance the church leadership of the future.

The Rev. John H. Thompson, Associate Director, serves well in any administrative activity assigned to him; but is especially significant in his ministry as a liaison person during this period of merger.

TRAFCO and Publishing Interests are very important committees of the Council on Ministries. On recommendation of the TRAFCO Committee, we request that the Conference Council on Fianance and Administration continue to support TRAFCO with an allocation of \$3,500.00, and that the Council on Finance and Administration emphasize the importance of the observance of TRAFCO Sunday, the fourth Sunday in October, with the emphasis on raising the 10c per member offering. We further request the Council on Finance and Administration to continue to emphasize the observance of TRAFCO Sunday by including as in the past, under the section, Special Days and Appeals, this statement: "TRAFCO Sunday, the fourth Sunday in October, 10c per member."

We recommend that persons in local churches responsible for the use of Audiovisual Resources, make full use of the new catalogue which includes not only those resources available through the Little Rock Conference, but also those available in the North Arkansas Conference.

We recommend that every district director of TRAFCO secure a listing of Audiovisuals owned by local churches in the district, and which they would be willing to lend to other churches of the district, and that such listings be available to the pastors of that district.

Plans are underway now for the Chairman of the TRAFCO Committee, the Librarian, and the Council Director to meet at regular intervals to consider the purchase of new resources.

On recommendation of the Publishing Interests Committee we recommend: (1) That consideration be given to opening a Publishing House Outlet in Little Rock, (2) That our churches give full support to the Arkansas Methodist, (3) That Together and other national church publications be distributed as widely as possible. As a minimum, copies of these periodicals could be included in Church libraries, (4) That our churches purchase and use United Methodist Church School literature. We call particular attention to "Our Living Bible Series" for adults, and the new youth literature — both to be released in the fall, 1973, (5) That all United Methodists purchase books and supplies from the United Methodist Publishing House.

Now a final word: Your Council Director wishes to express sincere appreciation to Bishop Eugene Frank, the Cabinet, the Council Staff, the Council on Ministries, and to every local pastor and church. Without the splendid cooperation we have received, the development of our comprehensive program of activities would be impossible.

JOB ANALYSIS Council Director Little Rock Annual Conference

I. Relationship to the Annual Conference.

A. The Conference Council Director shall have overall supervision of the Conference Staff, and general responsibility to work closely with the Council on Ministries in receiving, refining, planning, and ultimately implementing the entire Conference Program.

B. He shall prepare a Conference Calendar each year, working out adjustments when conflicts arise, and sharing the Calendar with all pastors and other interested persons.

C. He shall give publicity to all Conference affairs through information and articles in the ARKANSAS METHODIST, newspapers and other news media.

D. He shall work closely with the Chairpersons of all Conference Boards, Commissions and Committees, sharing in plans and helping implement the program.

1. He shall give special attention to Evangelism, working closely with the Conference Secretary of Evangelism.

2. As Conference Director of Education, he shall give careful attention to all educational affairs of the Conference.

3. He shall work closely with the Conference Missionary Secre-

- 4. He shall work closely with the Conference Lay Leader, and the Conference Board of Laity, as well as with all District and Local Church Lay Leaders.
- 5. He shall be in charge of office management, and render needed services through the Conference Office.
- Relationship to the Bishop, the District Superintendents, and the II. District Councils on Ministries.
 - A. He shall be for all program matters a functioning member of the Cabinet.
 - B. He shall be a resource person to the District Councils on Ministries, and shall provide for the training of the same.
- Relationship to Training and Leadership Development. III.

A. He shall have general oversight of all the camping program in the Conference. He shall have special responsibility for the physical and financial affairs of Camp Tanako.

B. He shall work closely with the District Superintendents and pastors in setting up Christian Workers Schools, Laboratory Enterprises, Workshops and Local Church Consultations on a district, sub-district and local church basis, training leadership for the whole program of the Church.

C. He shall participate in, recruit leaders for and publicize the many Leadership Training Enterprises at Mt. Sequoyah and at other leadership training centers.

D. He shall keep a record of all Certifications; and solicit additional leaders in all fields of church work.

E. He shall keep an accurate list of and work closely with all Directors of Christian Education and Educational Assistants, encouraging them in further study and training, and helping with their Annual Meeting.

F. He shall work closely with the Conference Coordinator of Adult Work; and with the District and Local Church Coordinators of Adult

Work.

G. He shall give special attention to Family Life Ministry, working closely with Conference, District and Local Church Coordinators of Family Life.

H. He shall serve as a member of the Conference Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry and the Hendrix Board of Trustees; and promote the cause of Higher Education whenever

I. He shall maintain a good working relationship with the Ministers of Music and the Directors of Music, keeping an accurate list in his files and assisting them whenever possible.

JOB ANALYSIS Associate Council Director Little Rock Annual Conference

1. The Associate Conference Council Director shall have responsibilities in the entire Conference Program under the Conference Council Director.

- 2. As Conference Coordinator of Youth Work he shall have special responsibility for all the Youth Program in the Little Rock Conference, including working with the Youth Council, District and subdistrict organizations, district and local church coordinators of youth work, The Conference Camp, the Youth Service Fund, the Fawcett Fund, and other youth related activities of the Conference.
- 3. As Conference Coordinator of Young Adult Work, he shall have responsibility in all the Young Adult Work of the Conference.
- 4. He shall have special responsibility for Wesley Foundations, working closely with campus ministers and Wesley Foundation Boards, and other affairs of college students.
- 5. He shall have special responsibility at Camp Tanako, the camping program and personnel, and may be the Resident Summer Director of Camp Tanako.
- 6. He shall have responsibility as the liaison person between the Conference Staff and the Conference United Methodist Women as it relates to youth work.
- 7. He shall work closely with the District Superintendents in all matters pertaining to youth and young adult ministry, and advise with the Conference Council Director when needed.
- 8. He shall work closely with the Directors of Education and the Educational Assistants, especially as related to youth and young adult ministry, and also for the Annual Meeting of the Directors of Religious Education and Educational Assistants.
- 9. Along with other Council personnel and staff, he shall take on other assignments, as needed, as determined in consultation with the Council Director.

JOB ANALYSIS Associate Council Director The Arkansas Area

- The Area Associate Council Director shall serve as a public relations person.
- 2. He shall aid the Black Churches in and after the period of transition.

- He shall be a liaison person to the Council on Ministries, to the District Superintendents, to the District Councils on Ministries, and to Board, Commission, and Committee Chairpersons.
- 6. He shall aid the Council on Ministries in the office duties.
- 7. Along with other Council personnel and staff, he shall take on other assignments, as needed, as determined in consultation with the Council Director

COMMISSION ON ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

Washington Church Restoration Project

The Commission's main project this conference year has been continuation of the restoration of the church at Washington, Arkansas.

Two meetings have been held at the church. Flooring in the foyer has

been replaced. Bell tower has been shored and corrected. Sanctuary floor has been leveled, sanded, and refinished. Walls have been sanded and refinished. Insurance to the building has been re-instated and provisions have been made for maintenance of the church.

Highway signs at Washington are being erected calling attention to the age of the church with the invitation to worship there.

Plans are also being made to update Anderson's History of Arkansas Methodism.

THE JOINT COMMISSION ON THE ARKANSAS METHODIST AND THE LOUISIANA METHODIST

We make the following recommendations to the Annual Conference:

- 1. That the 1974 Circulation Campaign be conducted during the period of January 13-20.

- 5. That the editor and the president (or secretary) of the commission be empowered to borrow money needed for operations from the Union National Bank, Little Rock.
- 6. We are indebted to Bishop Eugene M. Frank and Bishop Finis A. Crutchfield for the leadership they have given in the promotion of our publications.
- 7. We recognize our debt to the district superintendents and the pastors who give so much of themselves in promoting the circulation campaign and the program of our periodicals. We likewise recognize that an increasing number of dedicated laypeople are involving themselves in the total ministry of the papers, and we express our appreciation to them for what they are doing.

- 3. To promote and carry out in each district of the Annual Conference a workshop for the purpose of encouraging the conduct in every local church in the Conference of a study of the social principles of Methodism in our Social Creed.

B. We also encourage each church in the Little Rock Conference to the following:

- 1. Subscribe to "Engage" for work area chairmen of Christian Social Concerns.
- 2. Follow the program of the United Methodist Church as it is outlined in The Interpreter from month to month, giving special attention to the following significant dates:

The Church & Economic Life Week (Third Sunday in January)
Human Relations Sunday
Rural Life Sunday—Environmental Pollution (May)
United Nations Week and World Order Sunday (October)
Drug & Alcohol Concerns Sunday (November)

- 3. Support by financial contribution and giving of services, of the Arkansas Guidance Foundations, by the churches of the Little Rock Conference.
- 4. Take into both immediate and future plans a special emphasis upon care and provision for the aged citizens of our state and local areas.

Conference Youth Ministry under the leadership of Joe E. Arnold, Conference Coordinator, is involved in many various activities as usual. The UN Tour, which took place during the Thanksgiving holidays, was a tremendous success with 82 youth and ten adults from across the conference participating. Another UN tour is planned for the Thanksgiving holidays in November, 1973. The Conference Youth Council is now preparing for Conference Camp at Tanako in June, 1973. This is the year of merger, and the constitution will be of utmost importance at this year's camp. In 1972, Dust and Ashes of Nashville, Tennessee, and Dr. Joe Taylor of Trinity Church, Little Rock, teamed together to make the Annual Youth Rally an outstanding event at First Church, Little Rock. 650 youth were registered for this exciting day. This year's Rally program will be in the hands of the Howard Hanger Trio, and the date is July 28, 1973. The Rally will be held once again at First Church, Little Rock.

This summer at Tanaki, the third college staff will be put to work. The two previous years have been exciting and interesting, and the camp has shown a slight increase in attendance. We hopefully look toward a continuing increase this year with a new college staff, who will bring us enthusiasm, inspiration, and Christian witness. Once again, the Conference Board of Education has granted our request for \$1,500.00 in scholarships for socially deprived children and youth. We look forward to a great summer at Tanako, and we invite you to visit our lovely camp.

Finances: The Conference Board of Education requests that the Council on Finance and Administration set a goal of \$9,000.00 for Christian Education Sunday.

Report No. 2

Hendrix College

We recommend: (1) that the Conference continue its support of Hendrix College by allocating)111,600.00, and (2) that this amount be apportioned to the local churches by the District Superintendents.

We further recommend that the Conference (1) confirm the election of Dr. J. Edward Dunlap to the Hendrix College Board of Trustees to replace Dr. Robert E. L. Bearden who has been elected a Life Trustee; and (2) confirm the election of Dr. Clint D. Burleson to the Hendrix College Board of Trustees for a second term for which he is eligible.

Report No. 3

Wesley Foundation

The Little Rock Conference Board of Education requests that all avenues of fellowship, sharing, inspiration, etc., between all Wesley Foundations of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences be encouraged on the larger Area basis; but that the financing of all centers be done by their respective Annual Conferences, and that the effective date for this separate financing shall be January 1, 1974. The Conference Board of Education also requests that the Annual Conference drop the Wesley Foundation Repair Fund, that each center in the Little Rock Conference be approved to receive \$13,000.00 on basics for 1974, that the Council on Finance and Administration be asked for \$12,000.00, and that \$50,000.00 be apportioned to the churches of the Annual Conference for 1974.

Each foundation has indicated needs for funds in the following amounts:

We recommend conference approval of these much needed funds. We express our gratitude for the Stabilization Fund, and its continuation is recommended. We also make the following recommendations: (1) That the District Superintendents continue to give their interest now shown in the centers, and (2) That the local churches seek to acquaint all their college youth with the fact of a Wesley Foundation Center on each of the campuses within the bounds of the Conference and urge each to participate in the life of that foundation.

Report of the Special Committee to Study the Wesley Foundations

Last year the World Service Commission asked that a Special Committee to study the ministries of the Wesley Foundations be established and the Annual Conference elected George W. Martin, Therral E. Wilson and Roy I. Bagley to be this committee.

The committee has done its work and has reported its findings and recommendations to the World Service Commission. However, since the Annual Conference elected the committee and further, since this is a matter the entire Conference is concerned about and involved in, we are sharing the heart of our report with the Annual Conference.

The Study Committee finds that the Wesley Foundations in Arkansas provide a valid and effective ministry and are justifiable institutions of the church, in that through the presence of the witness and influence of the Christian minister on the campus:

- lives are being changed for the better and persons are getting their bearings concerning their lives - This point was documented with case histories, "flesh and blood" examples of students whose lives have been profoundly and profitably touched by the Wesley Foundation ministry, in our report to the World Service Commission;

- the attitude of the college community toward the church is be-

coming more affirmative;

- the profile of the campus minister, while differing in style from person to person, reflects the ministry of The United Methodist Church to the students:

 the gap between the college and the larger communities is being bridged;

- and students are finding resourceful help during a critical and for-

mative period of their lives.

This Committee feels that the ministry of the Wesley Foundations should not only be continued, bur should be given increased and sturdy support all the way across the board of our involved connections. The Committee feels that the ministry of the Wesley Foundations could be strengthened in the following ways:

- the present practice of appointing a minister to serve both a Wesley

Foundation and a parish should continue;

— the Boards of Directors should be more involved in program planning in much the same manner of an Administrative Board of a local church;

— the funding of the Foundations in Arkansas should be on a Conference basis;

- the establishing of an Annual Conference Committee on Campus Ministry to which the campus ministers will be related and which will relate the mission of the campus ministry to the Annual Conference through interpretation, budgeting and financing;

- the embarkation of this committee, specified above, on a strong program of interpretation of the Campus Ministry to the local congrega-

tions of the conference;

- and finally, the continuation of the Campus Ministry as a regular appointment in the itinerate system of Methodist ministry and pledge the resources that we have available to provide supportive fellowship, fiscal stability, a deeper sense of ministry and clearer lines of responsibility, to those whom the church chooses to send into this field of Christian labor.

COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR

CHURCH OCCUPATIONS

The Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations is planning a workshop in October for training conference personnel. Leadership for this conference will be provided by the Inter-Board Committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations in Nashville. Persons invited to the conference include: District Superintendents, five persons from each district, campus ministers, and other conference leadership personnel. The workshop is planned for a 24-hour period from noon to noon, to be held in Little Rock, using the facilities of the First United Methodist Church.

We make the following recommendations and requests to the Conference:

- 1. That, in 1974, the Conference participate in a workshop for resources and training in the area of Church Occupations for leadership personnel from Conference, District, and campus ministers.
- 2. That, according to Disciplinary Guide lines, the District Superintendents consider the appointment of a person who has primary responsibilities in the area of Enlistments for Church Occupations.

- 3. That, in the interest of program continuity, the representatives from Conference Boards and agencies to the Commission on Enlistment for Church Occupations serve wherever possible on a quadrennial basis.
- 4. That the Conference continue to support the employment of College Youth for the Tanako Staff.
- 5. That each local church Committee on Nomination and Personnel carefully consider the nomination of a concerned individual as Secretary of Enlistment for Church Occupations.
- 6. That every local church and its pastor provide itself with resources and materials for challenging its youth to a commitment of life in Christian vocation.
- 7. That pastors share their calls and understandings of the ministry with their congregations. We recommend that Ministry Sunday, September 16, 1973, is an excellent time for presenting the many opportunities available for Christian service.
- 8. That the campus ministers in the Annual Conference be nominated as ex-officio members of the Annual Conference committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

For the 1974 calendar year we recommend that the following program of Evangelism be implemented in Little rock Conference.

- 1. One of the very helpful developments in Evangelism has been the Ministers' We Care Mission. We would ask each District in the Conference to have a pilot Mission of this nature. The Conference Board will be glad to assist in any way in planning and carrying out of such a mission.
- 2. That we seek to meet the spiritual needs of ministers, so that they might more effectively assist in meeting the spiritual needs of churches, by providing an enrochment opportunity each year. For 1974 we will cooperate with the Board of Education in having a "Marriage Enrichment Conference" for ministers and spouses. Time and place to be worked out in cooperation with the Conference Council on Ministries. We purpose that such program reach the laity through the ministers.
- 3. We request the Board of Managers of the Pastors' School to offer a course in evangelism, particularly one that will aid in equipping pastors to effectively perform the work of an evangelist.
- 4. We would urge more emphasis upon youth evangelism. While we recognize the importance of Christian nurture in the camping program, we feel that the need for evangelism with our youth is deeply necessary. We commend youth evangelism efforts such as FCA and Young Life which work in this area; also the General Board of the United Methodist Church for the new department of youth evangelism.
- 5. That we have a new emphasis upon the Bible. Recognizing that the study of the Bible is basic to effective evangelism, we recommend that we have Bible conferences, seminars, workshops, etc. We suggest that more churches plan conferences, and that where feasible to unite in such conferences.

- 6. There is evidence of need for special consideration of the membership records of local churches. We would like to call upon each church to make every effort to keep accurate and up-to-date membership rolls. We request each District Superintendent personally to check the efficiency of the rolls kept in each church.
- 7. That we again provide a \$100 scholarship for one young minister in his or her first appointment to attend an evangelistic conference set up and designed by the staff of the General Board of Discipleship. The person to receive this scholarship will be selected by the Executive Committee of the Conference Board and the Cabinet representative. Anyone may submit names for consideration.
- 8. We express appreciation for those great efforts that are being made in Key 73. We urge continued involvement in the opportunities of Key 73 during the remainder of 1973.

Conference Secretary's Report

Most of our efforts this year have been directed toward the promotion of Key 73. We have been heartened by the great Rally which was held at Hot Springs on March 8th. It is our hope that the enthusiasm for this great movement will gain momentum and that a truly evangelistic spirit will emerge in our Conference.

There has been considerable concern about the fact that our Conference has not shown any growth, actually reporting a loss in numerical membership. A careful study of the reports from the churches shows that our additions to the Churches has not declined, but, in many cases, increased. Our problem seems to lie, to a large degree, in the 'correcting of rolls' which has been necessary. If there is any way to emphasize the need for the regular keeping of rolls in an accurate and efficient manner, then we should do it. There should never be a time when a church must clean several hundred members from the rolls in order to make them accurate.

Our Board will face the task of assisting in two priorities in the future; To point toward the conviction that people need Jesus Christ and that the great Commission still sends us forth to make Disciples of all peoples. The greatness of the Church and the churches will be revealed by our prayerful unity in seeking to fulfill this mandate.

- K. We recommend interest income from investments shall continue to go to the Conference Administration Fund.
- L. We are in accord with the Board of Christian Social Concerns in recommending that the churches of the Little Rock Annual Conference make voluntary financial contributions to the "Arkansas Release Guidance Foundation."
- M. We concur with the recommendation of The Board of Pensions to adopt the "Minister's Reserve Pension Plan". And recommend it to The Annual Conference. This campaign to begin January 1, 1974 and continue for eight years.
- N. We recommend that the balance of \$6,644.31 in The Disaster Relief Fund account be sent to the Jonesboro District Superintendent to be used in restoring the damage done by the recent tornado that ravaged the area. This fund to be administered by the District Superintendent and the Methodist ministers of the Jonesboro area.

HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

I. The Methodist Children's Home

We commend the laity and ministers of the Little Rock Conference for their splendid support for the Home this past year. Serious consideration and planning for the upgrading and expanding of its services is in progress.

This will be in two basic areas, residential and non-residential. The Home is finding that more and more, the children coming into care are more damaged and more disturbed. The majority of children come from homes that have broken down because of mental illness, desertion, alcoholism, neglect, or abuse. Some of these children have never known what it is to be loved. Therefore, the need to become more treatment oriented is increasing. Thus, it will become necessary for the Home to become more professional. This is not meaning only the adding of professional staff — psychiatrists, psychologists and social workers (this will be a part of it). It means upgrading the present staff through workshops, in-service training and summer seminars. Emphasis will be placed on rehabilitating the child and its family where possible.

The Home's non-residential services may take the form of a Day-care, Neighborhood Playground Activities, Out-Patient Diagnostic and Counseling Service. The establishing of more group homes over the state similar to the one at Magnolia so that as children coming to the "center" in Little Rock become adjusted and rehabilitated they would be moved to a group home.

We recommend that the Commission on World Service and Finance resume its annual financial support of the Children's Home in the amount of \$4,000.

We recommend that churches and individuals remit all monies for the Home directly to the Home.

II. Other Program Areas

We urge that each District Superintendent appoint district representatives of Health and Welfare Ministries (or their successors according to the new structure) and that these individuals working with the District Superintendent see that of Health and Welfare Ministries be lifted up in each local church. We further urge that these individuals in cooperation with the District Superintendent conduct district or sub-district seminars on hospital visitation.

We recommend that \$600 be made available for continuing our ministry at the Booneville Sanatorium. At present an experiment as a training center for retarded adults is being developed there. We feel that this is a small way to keep the door open to further ministry if the opportunity of ministry grows. If the experiment is discontinued, this ministry would be readjusted accordingly.

We recommend the adoption of Articles of Incorporation of Methodist Community Inc. Copies of these articles will be made available for study by the members of the Little Rock Annual Conference during the coming session for their consideration and action. This corporation shall be amenable to the Little Rock Annual Conference and shall not have the authority to solicit or levee apportionments upon the churches of the conference without the prior permission of such conference. We recommend that \$600 be budgeted to perfect the Articles of Incorporation of Methodist Community Inc.

We recommend that the Little Rock Annual Conference have on its calendar a Golden Cross Sunday with an offering being received. The offering shall be sent to the treasurer of the annual conference to be administered under the direction of the Board of Health and Welfare Ministries according to a program which shall be outlined in a supplement to this report and made available for study and action by members of our conference.

The Golden Cross offering shall be received annually upon the Sunday designated in the Little Rock Conference church calendar.

The offering shall be divided in the following manner:

50% shall be retained by the local church to meet the local health and welfare needs and to be administered in a manner decided upon by either the local church Council on Ministries or the Administrative Board, according to the wishes of the local church.

The remaining 50% shall be sent to the Little Rock Annual Conference Treasurer to be administered by the Little Rock Conference Board of Health and Welfare Ministries or its successor in the following manner:

40% to meet the medical expenses of the active pastors in the Little Rock Conference and their families above and beyond those covered by our current insurance program where sufficient need is shown.

30% to meet the medical expenses of the retired pastors in the Little Rock Conference and their families above and beyond those covered by our current insurance program where sufficient need is shown.

30% paid to Methodist Hospitals who may be ministering to the lay members of the churches of the Little Rock Annual Conference under their (the hospitals) Golden Cross plan.

INSURANCE COMMITTEE

Health and Medical Expense Program

The Little Rock Annual Conference has the Health and Medical Expense Program (HMEP) provided by the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church. The Travelers Insurance Company is the underwriter for this insurance.

Eligibility

The eligible group is composed of the following:

I. Ministers

- 1. All full members of the Conference under appointment with annuity claim upon the Conference, and their dependents.
- 2. All probationary members and their dependents.
- 3. All full-time lay pastors and their dependents.
- 4. All full-time employees of the Annual Conference and their dependents.
- 5. All members who have been granted the retired relation by this Conference with annuity claim, and their dependents.
- 6. All retired full-time approved lay pastors with annuity claim on this Conference and their dependents.
- 7. All widows of deceased ministers with annuity claim on this Conference, and their dependent children.
- 8. Student lay pastors, and their dependents.

Note: Conferences members under special appointment without annuity credit on this Annual Conference are eligible to be enrolled provided they assume responsibility for full payment of the premium. Probationary members appointed to attend school and not serving a conference church are also eligible to be enrolled provided they assume responsibility for full payment of the premium.

II. Local Church Lay Employees

To enroll the eligible lay employees of a particular local church, the following number of employees must elect to participate:

Any local church or institution not qualifying for, or electing to, enroll its full-time lay employees under the above rules on the initial enrollment date set by the Annual Conference may enroll eligible employees under the same rules on any subsequent anniversary of the conference initial enrollment date. (July 1, of any year)

Ministers transferring into the Conference may enroll in HMEP within 90 days of transfer without having to show evidence of insurability. A new lay employee of a participating church or organization may enroll within 90 days of employment without having to show evidence of insurability.

Enrollment applications and cards are available from the Insurance Committee Secretary at the Joint Treasurer's Office.

Recommendations Concerning Premium Payments and Participation

- I. We recommend that each local church provide 60% of the premium cost for either individual or family coverage, whichever is applicable, for those under regular appointment and for eligible local church lay employees.
- II. We recommend that the Conference Board or Agency responsible for their own budget provide 60% of the premium cost for either individual or family coverage, which ever is applicable, for ministers under special appointment with annuity credit on the Annual Conference.
- III. Retired ministers and widows of ministers should refer to the Board of Pensions Report, Recommendations 9 and 10, for information concerning the payment of their insurance premiums for HMEP.
- IV. All persons holding an appointment from the Bishop are required to participate in the HMEP.

Benefits Paid Under HMEP

Under Age 65

Hospital Services— Full payment of first \$500 in each calendar year (with semi-private accommodations), then payment of 80% of the balance of hospital expenses in each calendar year, up to the maximum.

Services of Physicians, Surgeons, and Other Covered Medical Expenses—Payment of 80% of covered expenses up the maximum, after a \$50 calendar year deductible, for all illnesses and accidents, for each covered person.

Maximum Benefit— \$25,000 per individual, for all illnesses, accidents and maternity. Subject to automatic restoration of up to \$1,000 each calendar year.

Maternity Benefits— Covered maternity expenses paid on same basis as charges shown above, if pregnancy commences after coverage begins.

Age 65 and Over

In-Patient Hospital Services— Full payment of each \$72 deductible not paid by Medicare. Full payment of \$18 per day from 61st through 90th day not paid by Medicare. Full payment of semi-private room and board and miscellaneous charges from the 91st through the 120th day, beyond payment made from Medicare Lifetime Reserve days. Payment of 80% of reasonable expenses from the 121st day up to a \$25,000 lifetime maximum.

Extended Care Facility (Nursing Home)— Full payment of the \$9 per day from the 21st through the 100th day not paid by Medicare.

Physicians, Surgeons and Other Medical Services and Supplies (Including Out-Patient Hospital Diagnostic Service)— After Medicare \$50 deductible, then full payment of the 20% of other reasonable charges not paid by Medicare.

Prescribed Drugs (Self Administered) and Private Duty Nursing, Full-Time (RN or LPN)— After a calendar year \$50 deductible, payment of 80% of reasonable charges up to a lifetime maximum of \$25,000.

Disability Insurance

A study of disability insurance for ministers and full-time lay pastors of the Little Rock Annual Conference is being made by the Insurance Committee.

Death Benefit Program

The Little Rock Annual Conference has Plan D. of the Death Benefit Program provided by the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church.

The DBP premium each year is 2% of the average salary of the Conference. The average salary for 1973 is \$7,425.00. The premium for 1973 is \$148.50, with the recommendation being that the church pay 60%, or \$89.10, and the pastor pay 40%, or \$59.40. This premium is due in January of each each, since the full amount must be remitted to the General Board of Pension by February 15 each year.

Retired ministers should refer to the Report of the Board of Pensions, Recommendations 8 and 10, for information concerning payment of their DBP premiums.

Eligibility

The following classes of persons are eligible to be enrolled as members of the Death Benefit Program:

- 1. Ministerial members (including associate and probationary) appointed with pension credit on the Annual Conference.
- 2. Retired ministers having pension claim on the Annual Conference granting the retired relationship, provided there be enrollment prior to retirement, and that such enrollment remain unbroken.
- 3. Those persons rendering direct and full-time service to, or employed by, the participating Annual Conference.
- 4. Ministers in special appointments without pension credit on the conference.
 - 5. Full-time Lay Pastors rendering full-time service.
 - 6. Retired Lay Pastors with pension claim on the conference.
- 7. Ministers retired without pension claim on the Annual Conference granting the retired relationship.
- 8. Those persons covered under (3) above, and subsequently retired with pension claim upon the Annual Conference, provided that enrollment be maintained upon retirement and continue unbroken.*
 - 9. Those in the supernumerary relationship.
 - 10. Student lay pastor.
- *Lay employees of the Little Rock Annual Conference are not eligible to continue in DBP following retirement.

Enrollment Procedure

1. Previously eligible persons who are not currently participating in DBP may apply during the month of January each year.

- 2. Newly eligible persons, whose eligibility results from change of status within the conference, or from transfer in, or employment by a participating Annual Conference, must apply within 90 days of the effective date of change, transfer, or employment.
- 3. Enrollment application cards are available from the Insurance Committee's Secretary at the Joint Treasurer's Office.

Resolution For Annual Conference Adoption To Add Additional Coverage (b) To Plan D Of The Death Benefit Program For The Little Rock Annual Conference

Whereas,

The United Methodist Church, through its General Board of Pensions, has made available additional coverage to its Death Benefit Program, and

It is the considered judgement of the Insurance Committee of the Little Rock Annual Conference that additional coverage (b), added to Plan D, will best serve the total needs of all Conference ministers and eligible lay employees

Be It Resolved:

that the Little Rock Annual Conference add additional coverage (b) to Plan D of the Death Benefit Program, effective January 1, 1974.

Additional coverage (b) will pay, upon the death of the spouse, 20% of the average salary of the Conference, with the additional benefit of 10% of the average salary if dependent children under 21 survive.

The additional premium will be .18% of the annual salary yearly, so that the annual premium for every person enrolled in DBP in the Little Rock Annual Conference will be .0218 of the average salary, instead of the .02 of the average salary which is now the DBP premium.

COMMITTEE ON MEMOIRS

The Committee on Memoirs has two primary functions:

- 1. To plan the Memorial Service for Annual Conference, including the selecting of the preacher for this service and providing leadership in the planning and leading of the services. The committee has asked the Reverend James E. Major to be the preacher for this service this year and he has graciously consented; and, for the fourth year has asked the Conference Commission on Worship to prepare the Order of Service;
- 2. To see that written memoirs are available for inclusion in the Conference Journal for every deceased minister, minister's wife, and minister's widow. Conference Standing Rule Three (3) gives guidance for the writing of a memoir. Three copies of all memoirs are to be sent not later than thirty days after death to the chairman of the Committee on Memoirs, Carr Dee Racop Jr., P.O. Box 495, Ashdown, Arkansas 71822, or to the secretary of the Committee on Memoirs, George G. Meyer, 210 East Shields, Warren, Arkansas 71671.

There has been close co-operation in recent years between the Committee on Memoirs and the Conference Commission on Worship. Therefore, we request, if at all possible, that the Conference Commission on Worship and/or its successor, under the new structure, assume the work of the Committee on Memoirs.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY

Organization

The Commission on Minimum Salary shall be composed of one minister and one layperson from each District of the Annual Conference. They shall be nominated by the Cabinet and elected by the Annual Conference quadrennially. Vacancies shall be filled by the same procedure. The Bishop is requested to appoint one representative from his Cabinet, annually. The chairman of the

Committee on Town and Country shall be an ex-officio member of the Commission and administrative officer.

The Commission shall elect quadrennially a chairman, vice chairman, and secretary who, together with the chairman of the Town and Country Committee and the Cabinet representative, shall compose the executive committee. Vacancies in offices shall be filled by the Commission from its elective membership.

The Commission shall meet as often as is required to do its work, and consign certain responsibilities to the executive committee.

Purpose

The purpose of the Minimum Salary Program is to:

- Assist charges to pay their pastor the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference.
- 2. Challenge and enable charges to become self-sustaining. This is not to be thought of, or used, as a continuing mission support. Each charge in accepting minimum salary assistance does so with the understanding that Pastoral supports will be increased by the local church each year, moving toward total local support.

Finances

Funds for the purpose of the Commission shall be raised by an apportionment annually, to all churches of the Annual Conference of an amount equal to 3% of the base salary paid the pastor.

Program

Minimum salary support for a charge shall be computed on the combined ministerial support paid the pastor by a charge.

- I. Charges are eligible for Minimum Salary Assistance provided:
 - 1. Each church submits its budget, in writing to the Commission, through the District Superintendent annually.
 - 2. Each church conduct an Every Member Visitation, and report the results to the Commission, through the District Superintendent annually.
 - 3. Each church pays in full all acceptances to the Conference or District Treasurer annually.
 - 4. The charge agrees to increase local salary support a minimum of \$100.00 annually, moving toward the goal of total support at the earliest possible date.
 - 5. The charge makes application to the Commission annually, on the prescribed form, by action of the Charge Conference.
 - 6. The charge is served by a full-time pastor, or ministerial student approved by the Annual Conference. By full-time we mean disciplinary meaning of full-time minister.

- II. The Commission will supplement charges meeting these requirements to reach the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference up to the maximum of \$1,500.00 per year computed on the basis total support paid the pastor by the charge including base salary, travel and utilities.
- III. The minimum salary for a pastor, approved by the Annual Conference for the conference year beginning June 1, 1973, shall be:

1.	Full time	\$7,000.00
2.	Resident, student	6,100.00
3.	Non-resident, student	5,500.00

- IV. To encourage charges to reach full Minimum Salary support, a charge will be given credit for any annual increase that is in excess of \$100 (see 4 under Program) in an amount equal to one half of said increase; total support not to exceed \$7,500.00.
- V. We encourage the Cabinet, the local church and the pastors to work toward charge realignment immediately, in order to strengthen the Church and improve ministerial support.
- VI. In the event of insufficient funds to meet all claims each charge shall share proportionately from the funds available.
- VII. The Commission shall report annually in the Conference Journal by district the amounts paid during the calendar year to each charge and minister.
- VIII. That the above palan of distribution of funds be made effective on June 1, 1973.

BOARD OF MINISTRY

Report No. 1

Policy and Program

- I. The Little Rock Annual Conference Board of Ministry purposes to work strictly within the framework of the current Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church.
- II. The elected officers of the board are: chairman, vice-chairman, secretary, and registrar.
- III. The executive committee of the board are the elected officers, Chairperson of the Continuing Education Committee, and Chairperson of the Conference Relations Committee.
- IV. The board shall meet prior to the opening of school, at mid-year and Annual Conference, and on call of the chairman.
 - V. The board's sources of income shall be:

- A. A percentage from conference benevolences.
- B. One fourth (25%) of the amount collected from local churches designated for the Ministerial Education Fund.
- C. Gifts, bequests, interests and repayment of loans.
- VI. The Board shall maintain a scholarship aid fund for ministerial training as follows:
 - A. For those in course of study above the level of license to preach.
 - 1. Assistance in courses of study schools
 - (a) The cost of required text books for each year of the course of study. The enrollees are required submit to the registrar itemized statements or itemized invoices from Cokesbury for books purchased for use in the pastor's school courses.
 - (b) The cost of tuition or registration fees, and of room and board while attending the course of study schools.
 - 2. Assistance in the correspondence course.
 - (a) Payment of fees
 - (b) The cost of required text books for each year of the course of study. The enrollees are to purchase the required books in their own name, to pay for them or have them charged to their own account, and then be reimbursed by the registrar.
 - B. For students from the Little Rock Annual Conference preparing for the effective ministry in the United Methodist Church who:
 - 1. Have satisfactorily completed at least enough semester hours of college credit to qualify for classification as a junior.
 - 2. Are enrolled in a college, university or seminary approved by the University Senate of the United Methodist Church.
 - 3. Hold a current license to preach in the United Methodist Church, or probationary members of the Little Rock Annual Conference.
 - 4. Make application annually to the registrar of the board prior to August 1, giving all information requested and authorizing regular grade reports to this board's registrar from the school's registrar, including a transcript of credits at the end of year. Application must be requested.
 - C. The board may set a maximum amount of scholarship aid per year per recipient, but assistance will be determined for each individual on the basis of requirements or needs.
 - Scholarship aid for summer sessions will be granted one-half of the maximum annual allowance.
 - 2. Additional emergency scholarship aid will be granted at the board's discretion to students in the following categories, requesting and making application, who:
 - (a) Begin preparation for the ministry later in life with pressing financial responsibilities.
 - (b) Have severe health circumstances.
 - (c) Come from disadvantaged economic backgrounds.
 - 3. The maximum amount of emergency scholarship aid per person per year is one-half of the amount of the school's tuition cost.
 - VII. The board shall encourage participation in continuing education

programs by ministers of the Little Rock Annual Conference.

- A. Enrollment is encouraged in the "Group Guided Study Program" of Perkins School of Theology or in a comparable study program of St. Paul School of Theology.
- B. The board will underwrite the total travel expense, and board and room (if any) of a faculty member of cooperating institutions conducting one day seminars for authorized study groups. Arrangements for paying these expenses will be made by the study group through the board's registrar.
- C. Pastors are encouraged to participate in at least one continuing education experience annually. (Refer to Par. 355 of 1968 Discipline.) The following shall serve as policy guidelines:
 - 1. Members of the Conference, participating in continuing education enterprises approved by the Committee on Continuing Education, may receive up to \$100 to cover costs for tuition, board and books. Persons are responsible for their own travel.
 - 2. No person shall be given more than \$100 annually for continuing education.
 - 3. Persons interested in receiving financial assistance for continuing education enterprises should apply to the Committee on Continuing Education, Ed Hollenbeck, Chairman.
 - 4. In hardship cases, ministers can apply to the Committee on Continuing Education, for help to attend Pastor's School. Such help will only be granted after other avenues for aid have been exhausted.
 - 5. No financial aid is available for Minister's Week.

VIII. The board shall give assistance in a reasonable amount for physical examinations for persons to be admitted as associate, probationary, or full members.

Requests and Recommendations

- I. The board, each district superintendent, pastor and local church shall hold up young persons the need for ministers and the challenge of the ministry, that may enable them to hear the call.
- II. As the first step into the ministry, candidates shall enroll for studies for license to preach with the Department of the Ministry, Division of Higher Education, Board of Education of the United Methodist Church.
- III. Each pastor shall obtain folders on the course of study and the books for the course of the license to preach.
- IV. When a person has passed the correspondence work or studies for license to preach, or has completed one-fourth of the work for the appropriate degree in an approved seminary, and in the judgment of the district committee on the ministry his gifts and graces commend him for the ministry, the Committee shall license him/her to preach, subject to the approval of their action and renewal of this license by the District Conference.
- V. Wherever possible, those in the course of study shall take their work through the course of study schools.
- VI. We recommend that our Conference have a "Bishop's Convocation on The Ministry and Other Church Vocation." Such a conference should be organized and implemented by our Board and the Conference Committee on Vocations.

VII. We assume our Conference's share of financial responsibility for the Arkansas Pastor's School.

VIII. The Annual Conference Council on Finance and Administration is requested to grant:

- A. An appropriation of a percentage from conference benevolences based on the board's financial needs that are not met by other sources.
- B. An apportionment to local churches for the Ministerial Education Fund based on 2% of the local church budget excluding benevolences, building and debt-service.
- IX. We express our appreciation for the support given the Ministerial Education Fund by the churches of the Annual Conference. We urge every church to continue to give full cooperation and support to its share of the Ministerial Education Fund for the remainder of this calendar year and in 1974.
- IX. Ministers may be given a minimum of two week's vacation annually and a minimum of one week annually to participate in a continuing education enterprise. (See Par. 355 of 1972 Discipline)

BOARD OF MISSIONS

1. The Board of Missions considers its first priority to be Church Extension and Special Mission Projects which are extensions of a local church, or such other visible or definable body or institution of the church. Other areas of concern are Mission Salary Aid, Parish Development, Missionary Education and Interpretation, and Town and Country concerns.

- 2. In the past Conference year the Board of Missions has met its responsibility in all of the program areas of the Board throughout the Little Rock Annual Conference. Church Extension and Salary Supplementation have been among our more active areas. Details concerning the work of the Board will be reflected in the Conference Missionary Secretary's report.
- 3. The policies of the Board regarding regular and special Church Extension and Mission Salary Aid remain unchanged and are published in the 1972 Journal of the Little Rock Annual Conference. Applications for Church Extension assistance should be made to George Tanner, Extension Secretary.
- 4. We propose in the Conference Year 1973-74 to give our Board's strong support to Church Extension projects and Special Mission projects as defined in paragraph 1. A program area in which we are just beginning to work is that of Parish Development. Through our School of Christian Mission, the work of our Conference Missionary Secretary, supported by the District Missionary Secretaries, it is our intention to offer a variety of opportunities in the field of missionary education.
- 5. Reverend Robert Van Hook II is Chairman of our Town and Country Committee and will file his own report.
- 6. The Board is also sensitive to its responsibility in all efforts to make the work of the church more effective. To this end we pledge our support and cooperation to the Council on Ministries in whatever programs or responsibilities they establish.
- 7. We propose that the Conference Missionary Secretary and the District Missionary Secretaries be empowered to conduct a parish development survey noting the locations, memberships, and such other data as may be pertinent to recommendations for increasing the effectiveness of local churches in their relationships to one another and to their mission.
- 8. We further propose that the Annual Conference adopt as an Advance Special the funding participation of \$3,500 for each of the next two years for the Children's Day Care Center at the St. Paul (Maumelle) in the Little Rock District. These monies to be used for operating expenses of the day care center and as "seed money" for the expanded support of this program through the National Division.

CHURCH EXTENSION AND SPECIAL CHURCH EXTENSION FUNDS

- I. An amount equal to 1/3 of the money received by the Board of Missions from Conference Benevolences is placed in a fund for Church Extension purposes.
 - A. Churches may apply for up to a \$1,000.00 donation from Church Extension for the purpose of improving church sanctuaries; educational facilities; for remodeling existing facilities; and for building of parsonage.
- II. An amount of \$20,000.00 be apportioned to the churches by the District Superintendent for the Board of Missions' Special Church Extension Fund. The apportionments are to be made to the districts on the percentages used for the apportionment of World Service and Conference Benevolences.
 - A. This fund is for the purpose of assisting—the building of new church facilities; purchasing new sites; merging or relocating of churches; churches in areas of expanding population; developing facilities and programs for local-church-related specialized ministries; and a designated conference extension project.

B. It is recommended that the District Board of Missions, with the leadership of the District Superintendent, assume primary responsibility for purchasing new sites. When Special Church Extension Funds are requested to assist in purchasing sites, the following information must be filed with the Conference Board.

1. Actual survey of existing and projected population in the area

- 2. Projected plans of development of the area (including road, proximity to major traffic patterns, and accessibility of property).
- C. When Special Church Extension Funds are requested to assist in the building of a new church, then the information required in paragraph B must be submitted to the Board along with a copy of the proposed building plans.
- III. In allocating any funds to existing churches, proof of the following requirements must be submitted to the Board.
 - A. Acceptance in full and payment in full of conference apportionments for the preceding year.
 - B. An every-member-financial-canvas must have been made within 12 months prior to final approval of the application.
- IV. No one project may receive aid for more than 3 consecutive years in a period of 5 years. No funds will be remitted until the project has been started; however, the application must be submitted to the Board before the beginning of a project in order to qualify for a grant.
- V. The Church or District completing the use of the mobile chapel will be responsible for dismantling it and preparing it for moving. The Church or District receiving the use of the mobile chapel shall bear the expense of moving and re-assembling the unit.
- VI. Church Extension and Special Church Extension Funds shall be administered by the Board of Missions. The Executive Committee of the Board shall function as the Extension Committee with the authorization to make a final decision (approval, disapproval, adjustment) of a request between the regularly scheduled meetings of the Board of Missions. Applications for both funds are available from the Extension Secretary, George A. Tanner, 2603 Mt. Holly Road, Camden, Arkansas 71701.

COMMITTEE ON TOWN AND COUNTRY

MINISTRIES

The Committee on Town and Country Ministries of the Board of Missions desires to offer support to the smaller churches in our conferences. Presently we relate to the Advisory Committee on Church and Community Workers and to the Co-operative Extension Service of the University of Arkansas in an effort to offer opportunities to the smaller church.

We intend to continue to support the Town and Country Seminar at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, for pastors and laypeople with financial aid. Conversations are currently underway with the Town and Country staff of the Board of Global Ministries, representatives of the Louisiana Conference, Texas Conference, and other denominations for an area Economic Development Workshop (similar workshops have just been completed in the Southeastern Jurisdiction).

Past suggestions from Town and Country ought to be pursued. Minimum parsonage standards, charge re-alignment to give each full-time pastor a full-time charge, co-operative relationships between smaller and larger churches are still commendable goals.

We think inventories of surplus items from churches ought to be made available so that churches with limited resources might be able to fulfill some of their needs from this listing. This can be handled through the Council on Ministries office (or its successor).

We would like to propose that smaller churches with work needs submit these needs to the Program Council. In cooperation with the Division of Youth Ministry an attempt would be made to send youth work teams to these churches to help take care of these needs.

In a word, we still want to encourage co-operative efforts to benefit the town and country churches.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

Recommendations

- 1. We recommend that the annuity rate be set at \$62.00 per service year for both retired members of the Conference and Special Conference Claimants.
- 2. We recommend that the apportionments to the charges of the Annual Conference for Conference Claimants be an amount equal to 25% of the pastor's salary provided that 20% of this amount shall be used for current distributions and 5% shall be used for a restrictive endowment fund.
- 3. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1381 Section 5 of the 1968 Discipline that the Sunday following Easter, April 21, 1974, be observed as Retired Ministers Day. Pastors are urged to acquaint their congregations with the pension program of the Conference as part of the observance, and, if possible, to use a retired minister in the Worship Service.
- 4. We recommend that pastors of Local Churches present the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas Memorial Program for Retired Minister's Pension Fund to the members of their congregation and urge their participation in the program.

We request that the Conference Statistician provide a column in the Conference Journal listing the number of Memorials made through the Local Church to the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas.

- 5. We recommend that the General Board of Pensions continue to write and distribute the monthly payments to our annuitants and that the payments be made on the last day of each month.
- 6. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1371 Section 5 of the 1968 Discipline the approval by the Annual Conference that special appointments shall be listed in the Conference Journal as follows: (1) with annuity claim (a) upon the the Annual Conference, or (b) upon a General Board, an institution, or an agency of the United Methodist Church; (2) without annuity claim upon this Annual Conference.
- 7. We recommend that the Board continue to apportion to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the Conference the sum of \$360.00 per year in accord with the 1968 Discipline Par. 1379 Section 3.a (3); and that said apportionments be paid to the treasurer of the Little Rock Board of Pensions not later than 15 days prior to the end of the fiscal year. And that a like amount be assessed upon the office of the District Superintendent and said amount be paid from the District Superintendent's Fund.
- 8. We recommend that eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants have the death benefit program provided for them with the contribution to be paid by the Conference Board of Pensions in accordance with the program of the Conference Committee on Group Insurance.
- 9. We recommend that the Conference Board of Pensions pay 60% of the annual payment of the premium of the Group Hospitalization for all eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants. In addition, we recommend that the eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants have the voluntary portion of the Medicare paid by the Conference Board of Pensions.
- 10. We recommend that all retired ministers who serve appointments under the District Superintendent, and receive less than \$1,000.00 in annual salary and expense from the charge, will have their contributions and premiums paid by the Conference Board of Pensions as outlined in Par. 8 and 9 of this report.

Furthermore, we recommend that the church or charge, served by a retired minister who receives \$1,000.00 or more salary or expense from the charge, will pay the required 60% of the HMEP premium and the retired minister pay the remaining 40%; that the charge pay the required 60% of the Death Benefit Program premium with the Conference Board of Pensions paying the remaining 40% of the premium.

- 11. We recommend that an annual amount of \$1,200.00 from the pensions of each retired minister of the Little Rock Conference be designated as housing allowance.
- 12. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1380 Section 6 of the 1968 Discipline that there shall be organized from the membership of the Board of Pensions of the Little Rock Annual Conference a committee to compare the records of the amount paid by each Pastoral Charge for the support of pastors and for pension benefit purposes, computing the proportional distribution thereof and keeping permanent record of defaults of the ministers in the Conference who have failed to observe the provision in Par. 1380 Section 6 pertaining to proportional payment; and shall render annually to each minister and charge in default a statement of the amounts in default for that and preceding years.

In event of default by any Pastoral Charge after due notification by the committee, liens shall be filed against future pensions and the names of the churches and ministers along with the amount in default shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

- 13. We recommend that all the Service Years of each minister be listed in one column in the Conference Journal and in another column list the number of these years for which he has a pension claim on the Little Rock Conference.
- 14. Since the Little Rock Conference has established a minimum salary considered to meet the needs of a full-time pastor, we recommend that (1) Ministers who receive the minimum salary or more must derive their sole compensation from their charge and/or Conference sources in order to be eligible for pension benefits as a full-time minister.
- (2) If ministers receive less than the Conference minimum salary from church sources, but earns more than 40% of their total compensation from outside employment they are not eleigible for pension credit.
- (3) Regular Students supply time is to be considered as employment aiding one preparing for full-time service as is required to meet minimal standards as a Conference member or certified associate member for actually serving full-time pastorates. The student is not eligible for pension benefits.
- $15.\,\mathrm{In}\,\mathrm{order}\,\mathrm{to}\,\mathrm{meet}\,\mathrm{the}\,\mathrm{future}\,\mathrm{needs}\,\mathrm{of}\,\mathrm{our}\,\mathrm{pension}\,\mathrm{program}\,\mathrm{we}\,\mathrm{recommend}$ that
- (1) We move into the full transition Program of the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund as of January 1, 1974, and our annuity rate be set at \$62.00 per year, as stated in Par. 1, and the current apportionments for Conference Claimants Fund be continued at the present level.
- (2) The Minister's Reserve Pension Fund Program be funded by an apportionment of \$285,000.00 annually for a period of eight years to the churches of the Little Rock Conference.
- (3) A Special Gifts Campaign to raise \$1,000,000.00 to begin immediately after the adjournment of the Annual Conference and be concluded within an eight year period.
- 16. We recommend that annuities credit be continued for the following men on Disability Leave:

REPORT OF COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

Permit me to express my deep appreciation for the direction and cooperation of Bishop Eugene M. Frank and members of his Cabinet, especially District Superintendents D. Mouzon Mann and J. Edward Dunlap.

Attention is called to Paragraphs 1278, 1279, 1280 of the 1972 Discipline of the United Methodist Church which provides for the Commission on Religion and Race.

The Commission on Religion and Race, at the direction of Bishop Frank, was organized at the Winter Board Meetings of the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences with Ed Matthews the Convenor. The organization was effected and a consultation was planned on March 23 and 24, 1973 at the Aldersgate Camp. At this consultation, James Jones, Associate Executive Secretary of the Commission on Religion and Race, was presented and gave direc-

tion to the consultation. The members attending were divided into four Task Forces with each Task Force assigned certain areas of concerns and to recommend plans for the fulfillment of the goals represented by expressed concerns.

Pursuant to the agreements in the Articles provided for in Merger, a close look was taken and recommendations have been made to rectify discrepancies not conformed to because of the lack of needed information.

- "1. Seek to find persons of expertise to work with black churches to help them determine their destiny and ministry. To determine if support is realistic, requiring monetary and/or technical assistance.
- 2. Seek the assistance of the Board of Ministry, Board of Education, Board of Laity in tutoring lay pastors (student pastors) and lay speakers."

In conjunction with the above, if a degree of inclusiveness is to be achieved, a good hard look must be taken at the following:

- 1. The minimum salary which might entail the realignment of certain pastoral charges.
- 2. An individual, from the Commission, who is sensitive to the needs of black ministry, must have access to the Bishop and his Cabinet.
- 3. Black church development giving special attention to program, leadership and facilities.

CAMP TANAKO

During the 1972 season, nearly 2,600 campers participated in the Tanako program, This was an increase of approximately 100 over the 1971 season. Perhaps it is too early yet to say that a trend has been set, but we certainly hope that we see one coming in attendance and participation where Camp Tanako is concerned.

Through the care and concern and the helpful suggestions from many sources, the Tanako program is being changed and renewed every year in order to meet the needs of our changing society, world, and particularly, our church. Perhaps the most significant change for the coming season is the fact that we will not have the individual pastors plan, direct, and initiate the various camps during the summer. This year we are initiating a Pastor-in-Charge for each weekly session. That person will be in charge of all worship training and experiences during the course of his particular week and will do this in connection with a particular theme of the age group ministered to in that week

We have made no particular changes this year in the sessions that will be provided. We have added a session, and that will be a Junior High Choir Camp for eighth and ninth graders in the Fall of 1973. This will be a Conference-wide camp in which we hope there will be a cross section of the youth in attendance. We will continue to have the Conference Elementary Choir Camp, Senior High Assembly, Conference Camp, three Junior High sessions, two Middle High sessions, and the two Elementary sessions, which, in 1972, were such outstanding successes.

With the support and approval of the conference, we will continue our College Staff situation for the year 1973. This year we will have eleven youth, four men and seven women, for the eleven week camping season. Once again, they will serve as counselors, teachers, workshop leaders, recreational leaders, and this, as we have said in the past, will give continuity to the summer program during the season.

The year of 1972 was an extremely fine year, and \$8,000.00 of the camp's indebtedness was retired. It is hoped that we can continue to retire the indebtedness on the camp in this fine way. In order to continue effectively in this manner, however, Tanako needs greater financial assistance from its friends and United Methodists across the conference. We, therefore, recommend a continuation of financial aid in the following ways: (1) From Gifts and Memorials of individuals and special groups across the conference. (2) From local church budgets and free will offerings on Camp Tanako Sunday, August 12, 1973, and we urge a conference-wide support on this day. (3) From Conference Apportionments in the amount of \$9,000.00.

We Recommend:

That the Pump Springs Methodist Episcopal Church property be sold to Billy W. McKee for a minimum of \$1,800.00 with possibility of some increase in the offer - and proceeds turned over to District Board of Missions and Church Extension, or where none exists, to the District Council of Ministries for the use of Church Extension purposes.

That the property in Vimy Ridge Community in Saline County, Arkansas be sold and the proceeds turned over to the District Board of Missions and Church Extension. No church has been there in over fifty years. The lands are to be sold at appraised value.

The Pleasant Hill property near Dalark, Arkansas be sold to International Paper Company if an offer to purchase at appraised value is made and monies turned over to District Board of Missions and Church Extension.

That the Board deed remainder of lands at Ebenezer Methodist Protestant Church, Nevada County, to a local cemetery association, if and when the association has been organized and incorporated.

That negotiations be made with Trustees of First United Methodist at Camden to confirm and ratify the sale to Benjamin Pickens of the property formerly used by black Methodists for church purposes made by former Southwest Conference trustees.

That the Board is empowered to make an immediate inventory of all properties now abandoned in the former Southwest Conference, and that authorization is given to sell said lands at the appraised value and monies be designated to the development of the ministry in the black community.

United Methodist Women

After much prayer, study and with great anticipation, on February 17, 1973 in Benton First United Methodist Church our great organization became a reality with much enthusiasm with over 500 participating in our celebration. Since then, all of the districts and many of the local units had held celebrations; others are still studying and making plans for their celebrations later this year.

The conference mission team has been studying their responsibilities in relationship to the districts and local units, seeking for ways in which we can best serve our women. We have looked at goals and priorities and feel that the most important ones are: (1) to get every local woman involved in the life of her church and community: (2) For every woman to know her worth as a person and that she is important in our organization because she is important in the eyes of God: (3) That every woman be loved and accepted as she is.

On April 4, 1973 some 500 ladies met at Warren to help celebrate the 100th Anniversary of the first Missionary Society organized in Arkansas. This number more than doubled their expectations. To us this shows the enthusiastic attitude of our women. Here we were made to realize that our concepts of missions must be expanded to include mission in our own homes and communities as well as overseas and that the need is just as great.

The conference officers will be attending the West Gulf Regional School of Christian Mission at Mt. Sequoyah June 18-22, 1973 for further study.

"Be ALIVE--not just living" will be the theme for the Enrichment Weekend to be held at Mt. Sequoyah, June 16-17. This week-end experience is for ALL the women and the emphasis is on Christian Personhood leading to the Supportive Community.

The Arkansas School of Christian Mission will meet at Hendrix College in two sessions July 25-27 and July 28-29. This is a great educational opportunity for every local person: clergy and laity alike to become involved in study in

the mission of our church.

Perhaps the highlight of this year will be our United Methodist Womens' Assembly October 4-7, 1973 in Cincinnati, Ohio where some 10,000 Methodists from all over our nation will assemble for information and inspiration. We know that many persons from our conference will want to be present for this as the assembly is for everyone.

Plans are being made for a District Officers' training day on October 20, 1973 which will be followed in November in the districts for local officer training.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

1972 was a year of anticipation for the women of this Conference. We looked forward to the merger of the Southwest and Little Rock Conferences and the bringing together of the Women's Society and Wesleyan Service Guild into one organization to be named United Methodist Women.

The women of the Little Rock Conference pledged \$100,500.00 as undirected pledge to mission and exceeded this amount by \$2,958.13. A total of \$110,227.42 was sent to the Women's Division. \$103,458.13 being credited to the pledge, \$4,880.72 to Call to Prayer and Self Denial and \$1,888.57 to Supplementary Gifts.

The investments of the Taylor Endowment Fund, in the amount of \$43,000.00 was transferred to the Women's Division with the stipulation that the interest earned is to be designated toward the support of a missionary.

For work within the Conference:

\$990.50 was contributed to the Elizabeth Thornberg Workman Fund for Youth and drawing upon a balance held in this fund, \$1,045.00 was disbursed toward these projects: An Exchange Student to attend Camp Tanako, a Mid-Winter Institute, a Conference Youth Rally and Three Delegates to attend the Inter-Conference School of Mission.

\$1,200.00 was sent to Camp Aldersgate.

Local Treasurers reported \$48,687.74 was raised and spent for local Church

and Community work.

A sufficient quantity of the "Guidelines" and "The Steps To Readiness To Becoming United Methodist Women" was purchased for all Pastors and these were distributed through the District Superintendents.

We are bringing all the varieties of gifts and services rendered to the three organizations from which we have come. We are examining them in the light of present day understanding as we build a framework for a new organization committed to mission and our involvement in it.

Not only did we have Women' Society of Christian Service and Guild becoming ONE, but a third factor-- the Southwest Conference women were also a part of the ONENESS. Plans included a proportionate number of Southwest Conference women on all three nominating committees of the conferences as well as representatives in the districts. All planning committees were to reflect Wesleyan Service Guild and Southwest Conference.

February 24, 1973 was the celebration date agreed upon. For circumstantial reasons Little Rock Conference changed to February 18, 1973. This change pleased me very much. It allowed me to participate in the two celebrations in the Arkansas Area. Little Rock Conference and Southwest held in Benton, Arkansas at First United Methodist Church. North Arkansas Conference and Southwest held in Conway, Arkansas at First United Methodist Church.

With much work on the part of the leaders and real cooperation from the total church the celebrations will be remembered as very effective. The Reverend Edward Hollenbeck and the Reverend Ben Jordan and their congregations were so very hospitable. Our deep appreciation to them.

Bishop and Mrs. Eugene Frank challenged us to be the people of God for this age. We will long remember their messages. Bishop Frank's messages were on "Manifestations of Christians... Faith in the Hour of Crisis". Mrs. Wilma Frank did the installation in Conway.

The Conference Commission on Worship continues to seek to give leader-ship in the total area of worship. We will try to do this on the Annual Conference, **Book of Worship** is normative for United Methodist worship. We also highly recommend **Ventures in Worship**, edited by David James Randolph, Volumes 1, 2 and 3.

Further, we recommend experimentation in worship based, of course, on sound theology. And, we encourage the sharing of these experiences with other pastors and churches.

A major project of the Commission for over two years has been work in the area of the funeral. There will be ready for distribution at the Annual Conference Session this year, a "Guidebook for Funerals". Also, there will be available at the Annual Conference Session the revised edition of the "Guidebook for Weddings". Both the wedding and funeral booklets will be printed, and in a smaller, more usable size, than was the original "Guidebook for Weddings".

There will be a display of worship materials at Annual Conference again this year, after a one year's absence. The display will feature materials on

the wedding and the funeral, as well as other items.

We are requesting that the Conference Council on Ministries, in cooperation with the Bishop and his Cabinet, schedule workshops in the districts for the Commission to present materials on the wedding and the funeral.

The Conference Commission on Worship, by request of the Bishop and his Cabinet, and in co-operation with the appropriate boards, agencies, etc. is planning the services of worship for the Annual Conference Session. There will be a variety of worship experiences involving a greater number of people from the Conference, both clergy and laity. We hope to be able to have a worship booklet including all of these services for each one attending the Conference to use, and to carry home with them as a souvenir of this year's Conference Sessions.

The Commission maintains its offer through its individual members to go almost anywhere at anytime to work with local churches, district groups, and other groups in the area of worship. These contacts can be made through the Council on Ministries office in Little Rock or directly with members of the Commission. Or, you may consult with your District Work Area Chairperson

of Worship, listed in the Conference Journal.

We appreciate the enthusiastic reception given our work by the Annual Conference, and the warm and continued support and encouragement of our Bishop, Eugene M. Frank.

When he was convinced of the truth under leadership of the Holy Spirit he stood for it without equivocation. Sometimes this was costly but he followed his Christian conscience without regret.

He was in the Ministry because he believed profoundly in God's call for the ministry. He was in the Methodist ministry because he believed that was where God would have him be. As a minister he sought to win men to faith and commitment Christ. He believed every man needed to know Him in a present and growing experience of His grace. He accepted the moral and spiritual disciplines of the Church, and as a pastor kept these standards before his people with courageous frankness. He was so deeply convinced of the unique blessing of the Christian life that he sometimes was impatient with the slow progress of the Church. Yet he never slackened in his zeal and so long as he had health he gave his best service to the Lord he loved.

He walked upright in the heroic tradition of the Methodist ministry. The works he served were often what we call "hard appointments." Financial support was not high. He gave every place his best. He came into the conference in 1911. In four years he mastered the course of study prescribed by The Methodist Church and had been ordained and was a member of the conference. He worked faithfully to meet every claim of the Church. His record is enviable. He bore hardship without losing confidence. He kept the faith. He finished his course with joy.

Perhaps his Christian character, and that of the superb woman who was his devoted wife, is best illustrated in their home life. Seven children reared, well trained in the strong traits of Christian character and sent out into the world to be good citizens, worthy representatives of the Christian home. One who has known them through the years must note their close devotion each to the other. The children love and respect their parents. And every one of them a good servant of Christ through the Church. To have known them is to have seen the example of how faith sustains in trial and of how love makes the care of the other a blessed privilege.

An older person said: "In the world to come will we know one another?" We believe there is One who welcomed Sidney Mann saying: "Well done good and faithful servant." And we believe that we travel not toward the twilight and dark, but toward the sunrise and morning of the Eternal Day. And we shall know as we are known.

J. D. MONTGOMERY

Rev. J. D. Montgomery was born on a farm near Blevins, Arkansas, August 11, 1879. His parents, James Morris and Virginia Montgomery were pioneer residents of Hempstead county. Brother Montgomery attended school in Hempstead county, Prescott High School and was a Hope Attorney from 1903 to



1927. He was mayor of Hope from 1905 to 1908. While he was mayor the city made great progress and the land was bought for what is now one of the most complete parks in Arkansas. He was elected senator and sat in the Legislative Sessions of 1919-1921.

On October 21, 1908 he was joined in matrimony to Jane Harvey, whose parents were pioneer citizens of Hope. To them was born one son. James Dee. James finished school in Hope and went to Hendrix College. While in Hendrix he was editor of the school paper and was retained after the merger of Galloway, Henderson-Brown and Hendrix College. After he graduated from Hendrix College he was a reporter for the Hope Star; Texarkana Gazette, and the Arkansas Gazette. He joined the armed forces of his country and after the war he was a reporter for the San Diego

Evening Tribune. While in San Diego, James wrote to his father and mother every day and his parents looked forward to his letters even as they looked for the food on the table. James died in 1963.

Brother Montgomery felt the call to preach in 1925, closed his law office and gave his life to a consecrated wonderful ministery in the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church. Throughout his ministery, Mrs. Montgomery was his greatest inspiration. She graced the parsonage with one of the most beautiful spirits that ever lived in a Methodist parsonage. She loved the church, loved the people in the church and worked with great zeal for the Kingdom of God. So valued was the ministry of Brother and Mrs. Montgomery that the conference asked them to continue in the ministry after their official retirement in 1953. For thirty years, they served the following churches: Glenwood, Murfresboro, Portland-Parkdale, Hazen, Lonoke, Rison, Oaklawn, Mablevale, Fairview, Vantrease and Bradley.

When health began to fail, Brother and Mrs. Montgomery moved back to their home town of Hope where they served God in the Hope Methodist Church with their relatives and friends. Brother Montgomery served on the official board and was often called on to preach.

On February 15, 1970, after an extended illness, Mrs. Montgomery was carried by the angels of God to her heavenly home.

On December 2, 1972, after and extended illness Brother Montgomery was also carried by God's angels to his heavenly home, where he stood before the throne of God, where God received him as He said, "Well done, good and faithful servant; Thou hast been faithful over a few things, I will make thee ruler over many things, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

We come this evening in sorrow and also in thankfulness for this great life which has been given in service and love for 93 years.

Survivors include a brother, Monte Montgomery, Hempstead county, a sister, Mrs. Frank Dillard of Texas, nephews and nieces and other relatives.

Funeral services for Brother Montgomery were conducted on December 4th, 1972 at 2:00 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church of Hope, Arkansas by Dr. D. Mouzon Mann, Rev. Norris Steele, and Rev. W. R. Burks.

CARTER LEE WILSON

Carter Lee Watson, son of Frank and Nancy Watson was born at Natural Step, Arkansas, March 11, 1904. He died October 9, 1972 in Fort Smith, Arkansas. Funeral Services were conducted at Mallalieu United Methodist Church, Fort Smith, Arkansas, October 12, 1972, Rev. R. C. Preston, officiating. Burial was in Washington Cemetery at Fort Smith.

Rev. Watson was converted and joined the Methodist Church at an early age. He attended Philander Smith College in Little Rock, Arkansas. He was licensed to preach in the Methodist Church and his first appointment was in 1945 at Van Buren and Danville Ark. He was ordained a Deacon in 1948 and an Elder in 1949.

His Conference appointments are as follows: 1948-49, Van Buren and Springfield, Arkansas; 1950-54, Marmelle, Arkansas; 1955-57, Brown's Chapel, Little Rock, Arkansas and Marmelle Ark.; 1958-62, Murfreesboro and Clow, Arkansas; 1963-64, Fayetteville, Arkansas; 1966-69, Duncan Chapel, Little Rock, Arkansas.

He retired at Duncan Chapel in 1969, due to ill health at the age of 65.

After retirement, he lived in Fort Smith, Arkansas until his death.

During his ministry, He served as Treasurer of the Southwest Conference and Chairman of the Board of Pensions of the Conference.

One of the outstanding qualities of his ministry was his faithful service in the Sunday School and his work with the young people of the church. The lasting influence of his life is shown by the church he built at Marmelle, Arkansas, and the many parishoners who will mourn his loss.

Survivors include his wife, Mildred, two nieces, several nephews, and many other relatives and friends.

MRS. T. A. PREWITT

Mrs. T. A. Prewitt, nee Hughetta Duncan, was born in Drew County Arkan-

sas July 18, 1885, the daughter of Samuel Thomas and Mattie Henry Duncan.

Her early education was in the schools of Drew County, including Drew Normal Institute near Monticello. Later she was a student in Arkadelphia Methodist College. When that institution suffered a fire loss she transferred to what is now Lambuth College in Jackson, Tennessee.

On November 27, 1907, she was united in Holy Matrimony to Taylor Archie Prewitt, a rising young merchant and planter of Tillar, Arkansas where they made their home for over 65 years.

Three children came to bless this home. They are Cathryn Prewitt McDaniel of Little Rock, Taylor Archie Prewitt of McGehee, and C. Rowan Prewitt of Tillar. There are several grand children and twelve great grand children.

The Prewitts celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary in their Tillar home on November 27, 1972.

At the age of 12 Hughetta professed her faith in Christ and united with The Tillar Methodist Episcopal Church, South. She was a life long member of that church where she gave generously of her many talents in serving her Lord. For a total of seven years she served her local church as president of what is now the United Methodist Women. For a total of four years she was District president. Rarely did she miss a District or Annual meeting of The Methodist Women organization.

For well over fifty years she attended the Little Rock Annual Conference with her husband who was a delegate, first from the district and later from the Tillar charge. I doubt there is another woman in Arkasas Methodism with such a record. With her delegate husband she attended a number of General Conferences and every Jurisdictional Conference of the South Central Jurisdiction save the one in 1972.

Besides being a dedicated church person Mrs. Tillar was a poet and a remarkably descriptive prose writer. Much of her works has been published.

Most of her adult life she was practically blind, and since 1951 had not been able to distinguish daylight from dark. But she was never handicapped. So wrapt was her attention, so retentive her memory and so perceptive her spirit that when something was described to her she remembered it more perfectly than those who saw the same thing with their eyes. Thus returning from any of their many tours she could write, or recite, an enthralling account of the wonders and beauties she had "seen". On occasions I have sat, spell-bound, as she recited one of her travelogues.

Miss Hughetta, or "Mammy", as she came to be called by many after the grand children came, managed her own household. She selected furniture, drapes and floor covering and did her own arranging. When there were no servants to be had she not only planned, but prepared and served the meals. She selected her own wardrobes and was always immacutately and fashionably groomed.

On May 14, 1973, after she had waited expectantly for days, the gates of heaven swing open to her and she entered our Father's Hourse of Many mansions. Memorial services were held for her in her beloved Tillar United Methodist Church at 10:00 A.M. on Wednesday, May 16, 1973, conducted by her immediate former pastor, Rev. Larry Williams. Her body rests in the historic Tillar cemetary.

A fitting epitath for her might very well be Proverbs 31:29. "Many daughters have done virtuously, but Thou excellest them all".

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

- 1. Nominations. The District Superintendents shall nominate all members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees, except as otherwise provided, on the basis of qualifications, experience, and dependability. Each District nominating committee will submit in writing to the Annual Conference nominating committee a list of qualified suggested nominations for all members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees for consideration. All nominees shall be consulted regarding their nomination.
- 2. Financial and Statistical. (1) The District Superintendents shall furnish the treasurer with all apportionments to the churches on, or before January I. These figures shall be official. (1) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars, with no column for cents. (3) Each pastor shall report to the Conference Treasurer and turn in a statistical report to the statistician at a date set by the cabinet. The Treasurer's Report from the Pastor will be audited and checked by the Final Data-Processing Print-Out. Where there is discrepancy, the amount recorded on the Print-Out will prevail.
- 3. Memoirs. There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased clerical member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, names of children, charges served, and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with the memoir. The same shall be done for probationary members, associate members and lay pastors. Like wise, a memoir of wives or widows of the above shall be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Committee on Memoirs the death of any of the above mentioned and be responsible for the submission of Memoirs not later than thirty days after the death occurs. The names or memoirs of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions, or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. It shall be the duty of the District Superintendents to report to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions the death of any conference claimant that occurs in their respective districts.
- 4. Administrative Fund. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall recommend an assessment for a Conference Administrative Fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expense of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this Fund. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the Fund. Payments from the Fund shall be made only on vouchers signed by the Secretary of the Conference; provided that this rule does not relate to the salary and expenses of the Treasurer of the Conference.
- 5. Conference Treasurer. The Commission on World Service and Finance shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the Conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer, on recommendation of the World Service Commission, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.
- 6. Number of Districts. There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Conference.

- 7. District Fund. The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall report to the district conference, annually, showing receipts and disbursements.
- 8. Reports and Resolutions. There shall be a pre-conference report which shall contain reports of all the boards and agencies of the Conference. This report shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Annual Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the pre-conference reports shall be typewritten, in triplicate, on special forms furnished by the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary. In the event editing of a report is deemed necessary by the Conference Secretary and chairman of the board involved, permission is hereby granted.
- 9. Membership of the Commission on Archives and History. The Commission on Archives and History shall be composed of ten or more members, one of whom shall be the Conference Secretary. In addition to the duties outlined in the Discipline, the Commission shall secure a group picture of each class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal; and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his retirement.
- 10. Safeguarding Historical Material. (a) Any member of the Little Rock Annual Conference, or layman authorized by a member of the Conference, may examine historical documents within the Headquarters Building. (2) To remove historical documents from the Headquarters Building, a written request signed by the presiding Bishop and Conference Secretary shall be presented to the Custodian. Provided further, historical documents belonging to the Conference Women's Society may be removed from Headquarters Building upon written request signed by the President and Secretary of the women's Conference. (3) The Custodian of historical documents shall be given a receipt for any material removed from the vault in the Headquarters Building, Little Rock, giving date of removal and name of receiver.
- 11. District Conference. There may be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline, and one additional member from each pastoral charge, provided however, in charges of more than five hundred members there shall be one additional member for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.
- 12. Lay Members. Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the pastor-host of the Annual Conference at least fifteen days before the session of the Annual Conference.
- 13. Board Service. No person may be nominated to serve on the same Conference Board for more than two consecutive quadrenniums, and may not be nominated to serve on more than one board at the same time. District Superintendents may not serve on Conference Boards, except as provided in the Discipline, or by specific conference action. A person failing to attend a board of which he is a member in a quadrennium may be continued only by special board action.
- 14. Entertainment. The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the retired ministers shall be entertained from the entertainment fund. Certain proceeds from the offerings shall go to the fund. The entertainment fund shall be administered by three persons, to be named by the Cabinet, who will be reporting to the next session of the Annual Conference. All entertainment funds shall be turned over to the local church who shall pay per

diem directly to the retired ministers. Eligibility shall be determined by the committee of three and shall be paid only for days attended.

- 15. Conference Expense. Registration fees and the offerings at the public services in the session of the Annual Conference shall be used to defray the expense of the session, including the expense and/or honorarium of the conference preacher and that any deficit remaining be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund, and the Conference Treasurer shall pay the same.
- 16. Unsponsored Resolutions: Any resolution not sponsored by a regular board or standing committee of the Conference must lie over for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon, provided, however, immediate debate and action may be ordered by two-thirds vote of the Conference present and voting.
- 17. Apportionments Based on Pastor's Salary: On all items apportioned to local churches by means of a percentage of the ministers' salary, such percentage shall be understood to apply to all ministerial members of the local church staff serving under the appointment of the Bishop, including ministers in full connection, ministers on trial, and full time Lay Pastors. This rule to be in effect with the 1966-67 Conference Year.
- 18. Campaigns. All Conference-wide campaigns to raise funds shall be voted on by ballot.
- 19. Youth Membership. Each District Council of the United Methodist Youth shall elect two youth members of the Annual Conference.
- 20. Amendments. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing on day before the vote is taken.

If we have overlooked such a person or group, we trust they will not regard our oversight as a lack of appreciation for their contribution, but as merely an unintentional oversight.

Bishop and Mrs. Frank, we hope that you have been as favorably impressed with our Conference as we have been with you. Bishop Frank, you have presided over this Conference with an attitude of fairness and openness we all deeply appreciate.

The business sessions of this Conference could not have moved as efficiently as they have without the Pre-Conference Report, which reflects the hard work of all our Conference Boards and Agencies, and particularly of our Conference Secretary, the Reverend James E. Major.

The Conference Commission on Worship, The Reverend Carr Dee Racop, Jr., Chairman, has done a splendid job of providing us with meaningful worship experiences.

The sermons of our Conference Preacher, Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., have been both inspiring and timely.

The Reverend C. C. Hall and Mr. Harold Flowers, preachers for our morning worship services, and the Reverend James E. Major, preacher for the Service of Celebration and Commemoration, all brought inspiring and meaningful messages.

The Pre-Service Concerts by the Brass Choir; the St. James Bell Ringers from St. James United methodist Church, Little Rock; the Philander Smith College Choir, Rochel Guinn, Director; and the Hendrix College Choir, Robert McGill, Director, were outstanding.

The Girls Choir from First United Methodist Church, Hot Springs; the Choir from Grand Avenue United Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Ms. John Goff, Director, and Ms. Ruth Broughton, Organist; the Choir from Oaklawn United Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Ms. Alvin Hardin, Director, and Ms. Letha Swihart, Organist; the Minister's Choir which sang for the Service of Celebration and Commemoration, Ms., Harold Cabe, Director, and Russ Racop, Trumpeter; and David W. RESOLUTION FOR THE PARTICIPATION OF THE LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCE IN THE MINISTERS RESERVE PENSION FUND AND IN THE LAY PASTORS RESERVE PENSION FUND

WHEREAS, The United Methodist Church, through its General Board of Pension, provides for reserve funding of pensions as a far more economical plan than to provide pensions from current income, and one with larger benefits and protection to ministers and their families, and

WHEREAS, facilities for accounting, bookkeeping, reporting, investment, actuarial council, and the actual payment to conference beneficiaries are made available by the General Board of Pensions as it serves as funding agent for the conference through the Reserve Pension Funds, and

WHEREAS, 58 of the 74 presently existing Annual Conferences in the United States are now participating in reserve funding of pensions for their ministers and other conferences are moving in the direction of reserve funding, which has become the basic pension plan of the United Methodist Church, and

WHEREAS, it appears from actuarial projections on pension responsibility that the total annual cost to provide such pensions under the present plan will increase substantially within the next 30 to 35 years for the Little Rock Annual Conference, based on the years of service for which the conference will be obligated to provide pensions to retired ministers and widows; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Pensions of the Little Rock Annual Conference has thoroughly considered cost estimates based on recent actuarial studies, prepared by Huggins and Company, Incorporated, Consulting Actuaries, and provided by the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church, and has carefully considered the possible alternatives, and it appears to the Little Rock Annual Conference Board of Pensions that such studies point to a plan for funding pensions on account of both past and future service through the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund and the Lay Pastors Reserve Pension Fund as a feasible program that is in the best interest of the conference and its ministerial families; and

WHEREAS, there is an accrued and unfunded pension liability on the Little Rock Conference that would eventually require total payments of an estimated \$8,120.217 by the conference to its claimants on account of service rendered prior to January 1, 1974, if paid on the basis of a rate of \$62 per service year, which liability may be funded over a 30 year period; and

WHEREAS, pensions for future service can be funded by providing annual contributions to the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund on behalf of each minister as service is rendered, by providing annual contributions to the Lay Pastors Reserve Pension Fund on behalf of each lay pastor as approved service is rendered, and by providing an annual additional amount to the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund over a 30 year period to provide additional funding when necessary to assure a total pension of no less than an amount equal to years of approved service multiplied by the funded pension rate; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that the Little Rock Conference does hereby elect to enter into a plan of participation of this Annual Conference in the Ministers Reserve Pension fund and the Lay Pastors Reserve Pension Fund effective January 1, 1974 and does authorize and empower the Board of Pensions of the Little Rock Annual Conference to do all things necessary to effect the entry of the Conference into the Plan and to act on behalf of the Conference in all matters related to continued participation, in accordance with the following provisions, or as the same may from time to time be amended by action of this conference in consultation with the General Board of Pensions:

- 1. An initial deposit in the amount of \$1,000,000.00 shall be transferred to the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund from the pension assets of the conference toward the funding of pensions for service rendered prior to January 1, 1974, based on an assumed interest rate of 5% per annum, and the balance of the past service obligation shall be financed by deposits of \$616,200 in 1974, \$617,824 in 1975, \$619,480 in 1976, \$621,170 in 1977, \$372,893 in 1978, \$374,652 in 1979, \$376,445 in 1980, \$378,274 in 1981 and \$3,100 for 22 additional years. By 1981 it is anticipated that the pension rate will be at least \$69 per service year. (It should be noted that this schedule of payments is based on present actuarial estimates, interest rate assumptions, and pension rates. Actual costs will vary as these factors vary. The schedule is therefore subject to periodic review and may be modified from time to time by action of the Annual Conference in consultation with the General Board of Pensions.)
- 2. All ministerial members of the Little Rock Conference, while serving under appointment with pension credit on the conference on or after January 1, 1974; shall be participating members of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund, asnd full time lay pastors serving with pension credit shall be participating members of the Lay Pastors Reserve Pension Fund as such participation in each case is authorized by the Board of Pensions of the Little Rock Conference.
- 3. A conference contribution equal to 9% of the average salary of the conference, as determined from time to time by the General Board of Pensions, shall be made annually by the Little Rock Conference on behalf of each participating member of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund appointed with pension credit on the conference, and a conference contribution equal to the service annuity portion of the conference contribution for ministerial members shall be made annually on behalf of each participating member of the Lay Pastors Reserve Pension Fund under appointment as a lay pastor with pension credit on the conference.
- 4. An annual personal contribution, payable in monthly installments, may be made by each participating member of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund or the Lay Pastors Reserve Pension Fund, such contribution to be equal to 3% of the average salary of the conference; provided, however, that if his or her support is less than the average salary, a member may contribute annually the equivalent of 3% of his or her actual annual support. (A minister or participating lay pastor may pay additional amounts into the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund or the Lay Pastors Reserve Pension Fund so as to provide larger benefits to himself at retirement or to his family upon his death.)
- 5. When a retired member of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund or the Lay Pastors Reserve Pension Fund, or the widow of a deceased member thereof, is eligible to receive a pension based on years of service with responsibility on the conference, the service annuity based on conference contributions as described above shall be regarded as part of the pension provided by the conference under the years times rate formula as specified in the Pension Manual of Rules & Regulations.
- 6. The personal contributions annuity payable to the retired member of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund or of the Lay Pastors Reserve Pension Fund, or the widow of a deceased member thereof, on account of contributions made

by such member while under appointment in the Little Rock Conference on in a predecessor conference shall be in addition to the pension provided by this conference under the years times rate formula, and such options shall be available as are provided by the regulations of the Fund.

- 7. The General Board of Pensions is authorized and requested to establish for the Little Rock Annual Conference a Reserve Pension Fund Conference Account, to which shall be credited the initial deposit and the annual deposits referred to in item 1 above, and to which shall be charged the reserves required under the Rules and Regulations of the Funds, to provide annuities for retired ministers, retired lay pastors, and widows who are claimants as of January 1, 1974 and those who from time to time shall become claimants in these categories.
- 8. Payments of disability benefits, children's benefits, and educational benefits, that are not provided from the Disability and Survivors Benefit Fund under the Rules and Regulations of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund shall be charged each month directly to the Deposit Account of the Conference.
- 9. The General Board of Pensions is requested to establish and maintain for the Little Rock Annual Conference a Deposit Account, and into such account the conference may deposit, from time to time each year, funds that are to be available for the funding as described above and for making other appropriate payments as may from time to time be authorized by the Conference Board of Pensions, and on or before January 1, 1974 any funds standing in the Conference Claimants Distribution Fund, Stabilization Fund, Board of Trustees of Board of Conference Claimants, Reserve for Reserve Pension Fund, and Retired Ministers Endowment Fund, held by the General Board of Pensions, shall be transferred to such Deposit Account.
- 10. The General Board of Pensions is hereby authorized to transfer from the Deposit Account from time to time the amounts required to provide for the funding of pensions for both past and current service, and to provide from this account the amounts required to pay disability, children's, and educational benefits not provided from the Disability and Survivor Benefit Fund, in accordance with the terms of this resolution.
- 11. The General Board of Pensions shall assume the pension obligations only to the extent to which the funding of the same has actually been consummated.
- 12. All provisions contained in this resolution shall be subject to the Rules and Regulations of the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund and the Lay Pastors Reserve Pension Fund.

A RESOLUTION CONCERNING THE DEVELOPMENT OF A RETIREMENT FACILITY AT ALDERSGATE CAMP

WHEREAS there is a need for moderate cost housing for the elderly in the state of Arkansas; and

WHEREAS Aldersgate Camp, an institution owned by the Women's Division and operated by the National Division of the Board of Global Ministries of The United Methodist Church is interested in developing a retirement facility for the elderly on their property in Little Rock, Arkansas;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Little Rock Conference of The United Methodist Church give its approval to such a plan; and further that permission be, and it hereby granted by the conference for the creation of a non-profit corporation to implement such a plan, with the understanding that the affairs of said corporation shall be administered by a board of seventeen trustees consisting of the resident Bishop of the Little Rock Area (as an ex officio member), eight trustees to be elected by the Aldersgate Board from its membership, four trustees from the Little Rock Conference consisting

of the chair person of its Board of Health and Welfare Ministries (as an ex officio member), and the Little Rock District Superintendent (as an ex officio member), and two trustees at large to be elected by the Little Rock Conference upon nomination by its Board of Health and Welfare Ministries and four trustees from the North Arkansas Conference consisting of the chairperson of its Board of Health and Welfare Ministries (as an ex officio member), and Conway District Superintendent (as an ex officio member), and two trustees at large to be elected by the North Arkansas Conference upon nomination by its Board of Health and Welfare Ministries with the understanding that the trustees shall be elected at the beginning of each quadrennium and shall serve for a four year term except in the case of those serving as ex officio members and that elected trustees shall not serve longer than two consecutive quadrennia.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Aldersgate Board Committee for the Development of a Retirement Facility is hereby authorized to do all things necessary and incidental to carry out the purposes of the resolution.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

OF

METHODIST COMMUNITY, INC.

The undersigned incorporators, all being of full legal and lawful age, do hereby associate ourselves for the purpose of forming a nonprofit corporation under Act No. 176 of the Acts of 1963 and for the State of Arkansas and we do hereby proclaim our Articles to be as follows:

ARTICLE I.

The name of the corporation is Methodist Community, Inc.

ARTICLE II.

The existence of the corporation shall be perpetual.

ARTICLE III.

The principal office of the corporation will be located in the Methodist Headquarters Building at 715 Center, Little Rock, Arkansas, 72201 and the resident agent at that address for this corporation shall be the Director of Methodist Community, Inc. and/or his successor in office.

ARTICLE IV.

The purpose for which this corporation is formed, and the business and the object to be carried on and promoted by it, are as follows.

- (a) To provide eligible elderly persons with housing facilities and services especially designed to meet the physical, social and physiological needs of the aged, and to promote their health, security, happiness and usefulness in longer living, and all related needs germane thereto, the charges for such facilities and services to be predicated upon the provision, maintenance and operation thereof on a nonprofit basis.
- (b) This nonprofit corporation is irrevocably distributed to, nor insure to the benefit of, any individual, except such benefits as may insure to all tenants through reduction of monthly charges.

ARTICLE V.

In connection with this operation as a non-profit corporation Methodist Community, Inc. is empowered as follows to-wit:

- (a) To buy, own, sell convey and assign any interest in real estate and to construct, maintain and operate improvements thereon, and to acquire and deal with any personal property necessary or incident to the provision of housing for the elderly on a nonprofit basis.
- (b) To borrow money and issue evidences of indebtedness in futherance of any or all of the objects of its business, and to secure the same by mortgage, pledge or other lien on the corporation's property.
- (c) To do and perform all acts reasonably necessary to accomplish the purposes of the corporation, including the execution of a Regulatory Agreement with the Federal Housing Commissioner and of such other instruments and undertakings as may be necessary to enable the corporation to secure the benefits of financing with the assistance of mortgage insurance under the provisions of the National Housing Act or any act amendatory thereof. Such Regulatory Agreement and other instruments and undertakings shall remain binding upon the corporation, its successors and assigns, so long as a mortgage on the corporation's property is insured or held by the Federal Housing Commissioner.
- (d) In the event of the dissolution of the corporation or the winding up of its affairs, the corporation's property shall not be conveyed or distributed to any individual, or organization created or operated for profit, but shall be conveyed or distributed only to an organization or organizations created and operated for nonprofit purposes similar to those of this corporation; PROVIDED, however, that the corporation shall at all times have the power to convey any or all of its property to the Federal Housing Commissioner or his nominee in the event of default.

ARTICLE VI.

The affairs of the corporation shall be managed by a Board of Trustees consisting of nine (9) members. Three (3) members of the Board of Trustees shall serve for one (1) year; three (3) members shall serve for two (2) years and three (3) members shall serve for three (3) years. Said trustees shall be nominated by the Little Rock Annual Conference Nominating Committee and shall be voted upon and elected by the Little Rock Annual Conference and said election shall be subject to the Parliamentary Rules of the Little Rock Annual Conference.

After completion of the original term each class of trustees shall be elected for a term of three years in the manner described in the preceding paragraph.

The original trustees and the term for which each shall serve are set out below:

The trustees shall elect the officers of the corporation at the annual meeting, for terms of one year and said officers shall serve until their successors are elected and have qualified. The Secretary and Treasurer may be one and the same person, and need not be a member of the Board of Trustees, but all other officers shall be members of said Board.

ARTICLE VII.

The number of members of the corporation and the method by which they shall be elected shall be governed by the By-Laws to be adopted hereinafter.

ARTICLE VIII.

By-Laws of the corporation may be adopted by the Board of Directors of this corporation at any regular meeting or at any special meeting called for that purpose so long as they do not conflict with the provisions of these Articles, provided, however, that so long as a mortgage on the corporation's property is insured or held by the Federal Housing Commissioner, the Commissioner's written approval shall be a requisite to the efficacy of such By-Laws or any amendment thereof.

ARTICLE IX.

So long as a mortgage on the corporation's property is insured or held by the Federal Housing Commissioner, these Articles may not be amended without the prior written approval of the Commissioner.
