



CONFERENCE MINUTES

Tuesday Afternoon, May 28, 1974 2:00 P.M.

The one hundred and twenty-first session of the Little Rock Annual Conference began with an Opening Celebration prepared by the Commission on Worship, Carr Dee Racop, Chairman. It included a Prelude, Reflections on the theme "And Are We Yet Alive?", the singing of the hymn, number 336, "And Are We Yet Alive?".

Bishop Eugene M. Frank then led the Gathering Prayer after which he made a statement urging the members of the Conference to use and read the Bible, seek Christ in all things and be true to the traditions of the Methodist Church. He also said that we have an uneasy Christian conscience that makes us realize that we have not done all we could, but there is no limit to what can be done.

He also said that a new structure for the Annual Conference can work only as it releases the power of God's spirit in our lives.

Secondly he spoke of the Pension program that will be successful only as the people of the Church make great sacrifices.

Thirdly, he spoke of the need for the District Council on Ministries to become enablers for the local Church Council on Ministries which in turn will be enablers for the local Church membership. But what needs to happen is a release of God's power in and through our lives. The Book of Discipline was Wesley's efforts to channel God's power by four things; the Bible, Christian Experience, Christian tradition, and Reason.

After his statement Bishop Frank conducted John Wesley's Covenant Service and Holy Communion which began with the singing of hymn number 508 "Come, Let Us Use the Grace Divine".

The Bishop was assisted in the service by Ed Wincherly who read the Scripture Lesson (John 13:1-8) and the following elders who helped distribute the elements: Arthur Terry, Dorothy M. Claiborne, William Robinson, Jr. and Ralph Hemund.

The service was concluded by the singing of hymn number 327, "Here, O My Lord, I See Thee," and the benediction.

Robert Copeland was the organist, Lucy Cabe the Choirmaster and the Choir was composed of persons from Churches throughout the Conference.

Music from "Rejoice!" was used as responses in the Service.

Business Session: Bishop Eugene M. Frank called the Conference to order. He called on Alf Eason to present the Agenda.

Agenda: Alf Eason moved that the printed agenda be the agenda for the Conference. It was adopted.

Bishop Frank recognized James E. Major, Conference Secretary, who announced that the roll call was being taken at the desk of the Fellowship Hall and urged everyone to register. He then announced his staff: Therral Wilson, Journal Clerk, O. D. Peters, Staff Assistant, Claude Barron, Robin McConathy, Donald L. Eubanks, David F. Prothro, Tellers and moved their election. They were elected. Mr. Major then announced the Bar of the Conference would be the part of the sanctuary in front of the Pillars. This was adopted.

Nominations were made. J. Edward Dunlap, Secretary of Cabinet speaking for the Cabinet.

Cagle Fair was elected Conference Statistician.

Bishop Frank recognized George W. Martin for the purpose of presenting a proposal for restructuring the Conference.

Tellers distributed three pieces of material concerning the Conference structure.

Moved and seconded that report of Conference Structure lie on the table for twenty-four hours before discussion.

Welcome: Bishop Frank recognized George Ivey, Host minister, for words of welcome, who extended to ministers and delegates a most gracious welcome.

Chairman of the Administrative Board Gordon Martin, extended a further welcome.

Mayor Tom Ellsworth also joined in extending a warm welcome to the City of Hot Springs.

Col. and Mrs. (Col.) George Lassiter, co-Chairpersons of the Conference Planning Committee were recognized.

Publishing House: Bishop Frank recognized Samuel L. Albright from the Publishing House, who high-lighted some books and presented Bishop Frank a check for \$3823.00 for use by the Board of Pensions.

St. Paul's Seminary: Bishop Frank presented Dr. William McElvaney from St. Paul's Seminary, Kansas City, who gave a brief report of St. Paul's School of Theology.

Insurance: Bishop Frank recognized James Walton, who represents the Frank B. Hall Insurance Agency that offers fire and casualty insurance coverage for our Church insurance program.

Board of Ministry: Report No. 1 of the Board of the Ministry. R. O. Beck, Chairman, called on David Wilson, Secretary, who gave the Report. Report No. 1 was adopted.

Robert Van Hook presented check for \$500.00 (a memorial for E. F. Price) to Board of Ministry for non-interest bearing loans for ministerial students.

John B. Ross, Chairman of the Boards Committee on Ministerial Relations, reported that the ministers were found blameless in their life and official administration. The report was adopted.

Camp Tanako: Ralph Hale presented Camp Tanako report and moved its adoption. The report was adopted.

R. O. Beck spoke to the report.

Bishop Frank presented visiting Clergymen:

Rev. Harry Kalas from Scaritt College, who spoke briefly about the work of Scaritt.

Announcements: Announcements were made and the Doxology was sung to close the session.

Tuesday Evening, May 28

7:30 P.M.

Worship Service: James Robert Scott served as worship leader, with Bishop Eugene Frank in charge of the service.

The choirs from St. Luke's United Methodist Church, Little Rock, under the direction of Ned R. DeJournett, Director of Music, and Sue C. DeJournett, Director of Children's and Youth's Choirs, furnished the special music.

The hymn number 1, "O For a Thousand Tongues" was sung.

Bishop Frank brought a word of greeting and welcome to members and friends of the Conference, following which he presented the Conference Preacher, Dr. Virgil Sexton.

The sermon, "Some Items for the Agenda of the Church" was preached by the Conference Preacher.

The Hymn of Commitment number 470, "God of Grace and God of Glory" was sung.

The prayer and benediction were given by M. E. Scott.

Wednesday Morning, May 29

8:30 A.M.

Worship Service: The Hymn of Praise number 23, "Come, Let Us Tune Our Loftiest Song," was sung.

William A. Eason led the Conference in Worship. He read Luke 15:11-16 for the Scripture lesson, then led in prayer.

The devotional preacher was John Hazle Thompson, whose topic was "Why Jesus Came":

- 1. "I came to seek and to save that which was lost."
- 2. "I came that they might have life and have it more abundantly."
- 3. "I came not to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved."

The closing hymn number 250, "Soldiers of Christ, Arise," was sung.

The benediction was pronounced by William A. Eason.

Business Session: Bishop Eugene Frank called the Conference to order, and presented the guest preacher, Dr. Virgil Sexton for the address of the morning:

Address: Principles of Process Planning — Dr. Virgil Sexton.

Bishop Frank responded praising Dr. Sexton.

Bishop Frank read a correspondence from Helen B. Wilson, a missionary to Bolivia.

Board of Trustees: O. W. Hoover made the report on the Board of Trustees. The report was adopted without change.

E. Clifton moved to reply to Helen Wilson with appreciation.

Episcopal Residence: Bishop Frank presented Mr. Jim Hall, Chairman of the Episcopal Residence Committee, who made the report on the Episcopal Residence.

The Episcopal Residence Committee recommended to sell the Residence at \$50,833.50 if the resident Bishop does not buy. If the Frank's desire to purchase the sale price will be \$46,766.00.

C. Ray Hozendorf moved that the Episcopal Residence Committee be authorized to sell the Episcopal Residence and that the Little Rock Conference share of the proceeds be directed to the Ministers Reserve Pension Fund. The motion carried.

United Methodist Women: Bishop Frank recognized Mrs. Lucille Nix, President of the Conference United Methodist Women, who made the report for the United Methodist Women.

Presentations: Dr. Bryan Brawner, Dr. Brooks Jones, were presented by Bishop Frank.

Dr. Brooks Jones from Perkins Seminary spoke briefly for the Seminary.

Dr. Bryan Brawner, from the Council on Finance and Administration,

spoke in appreciation of our Conference having paid the full apportionment on World Service.

Bishop Frank presented Dr. Charles Richards, as the new Superintendent of the Camden District.

Presentation of Chaplains: Chaplain Douglas Blair from the Commission on Chaplains was presented by Bishop Frank and spoke briefly on the Chaplain ministry in the United Methodist Church and presented the Chaplains in the Conference: Winslow Brown, John Shafer, Ashley Poe, Thomas Nation, Carl Beard, James W. Workman and Verlin E. Mikesell.

Service of Commemoration: Bishop Frank recognized Mouzon Mann who moved that the Secretary send message to retired ministers who are absent from the Conference session.

He called the names of retired members of the Conference who had served as District Superintendents and asked them to stand.

Philander Smith College: Bishop Frank recognized Dr. and Mrs. Walter Hazard. Dr. Hazard asked Trustees of Philander Smith to stand and join with him in bringing greetings from Philander Smith College, and a brief report.

Courtesy Committee: Mrs. Eugene Frank was presented to the Conference by Bob Trieschmann. Mrs. Trieschmann presented Mrs. Frank with an orchid corsage.

After Announcements, Bishop Frank declared a recess.

Resolution: Bishop Frank called for the report of the District Study Committee, which was made by Tom Abney in the form of a resolution. (See Section on Resolutions).

Mouzon Mann spoke to the resolution and it was adopted.

Board of Pensions: Bishop Frank recognized Sidney Good for the Board of Pensions report. Mr. Good gave special recognition to all the District Superintendents and members of the Board of Pensions for their cooperative work.

Sidney Good read the following names for pension credit: (See Disciplinary Question number 22.)

Mr. Good recognized Virgil Keeley for a statement of the good work done in the Pine Bluff District in raising the district quota for the pension fund drive.

Bishop Frank praised the laymen who are giving their leadership to the raising of the first half of the millions dollars in the pension program.

Mr. Good moved the adoption of the report of the Board. It was adopted.

Structure Committee: Bishop Frank recognized George Wayne Martin and his Committee for the report of the Structure Committee. He again moved the adoption of the report, after reporting several changes.

Carr Dee Racop, Jr. spoke against the report.

Bob Van Hook spoke against the report at various points, particularly at the point of the powers and responsibilities of the agencies of the Annual Conference, turning such power and responsibilities to the Conference Council on Ministries. He offered as an alternative the present program.

George Wayne Martin spoke in support of the structure proposal.

Jim Argue raised the question of probable increase in funding the new structure.

Ray Hazendorf raised questions. He concluded that he was against the proposed structure.

David Wilson spoke in support of the structure proposal.

Tom Abney raised question of the doubling up of committee representation.

David Wilson spoke to this, stating that such doubling of representation were liaison persons.

Clint Burleson called attention to Board of Education has no "at large" members. The Committee accepted his suggested change.

Alvin Murray questioned whether under the proposed structure will call for using more man hours.

George Wayne Martin stated that it will take more time, but meetings will be closer home on district level.

Fred Haustein spoke in support of the proposed structure.

In regard to time spent Fred Haustein stated that more time will be spent on the district level.

Robert Regnier spoke against the proposed structure.

Ed Dunlap spoke, following the adoption of the previous question, in favor of the proposed structure.

Vote: 112 for and 87 against the proposed structure.

Ed Dunlap presented an enabling resolution. It was adopted.

George W. Martin moved that the proposed structure be printed in the $1974\ Journal$. Motion carried.

James E. Major moved that the Standing Rules be amended in keeping with

the proposed structure to be done by called session of the Conference. Motion carried.

Bishop Frank spoke in support of the proposed structure, emphasizing that the Conference can make it work, because it has more possibilities of listening to the local Church.

Bishop Frank recognized Carr Dee Racop, who spoke in appreciation of the work of the Committee and asked for a standing vote of appreciation.

Closing: James Major presented a letter from J. Ralph Hillis to the Conference reporting on the use of \$6641.31 the Conference sent for relief of the destruction from a tornado in Jonesboro and speaking words of appreciation.

Session closed with the Fellowship Benediction led by Bishop Frank.

Wednesday Evening, May 29

7:30 P.M.

Worship Service: The worship leader for this evening was George A. Tanner. Assisting were William C. Gentry and Carlos E. Martin. Furnishing the special music were The Share Singers of First United Methodist Church, Camden, under the direction of Mr. and Mrs. Max Cruthirds.

The hymn number 38, "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee," was sung.

The sermon "Does the Changing World Change Our Ministry?" was preached by the Conference Preacher, Dr. Virgil W. Sexton.

The closing hymn number 165, "Lord, Dismiss Us with Thy Blessing," was sung.

The benediction was pronounced by Carlos Martin.

Thursday Morning, May 30

Robert Van Hook rose to point of order and suggested that the matter be postponed rather than tabled.

Harold Sadler called attention that it will take a two-thirds vote to take the matter off the table.

J. B. Argue then changed his motion to change from "table" to postpone until the called session.

Ralph Mann spoke against the postponing of consideration.

The motion to postpone was adopted.

Ed Dunlap moved that the cabinet study the grass roots to see what the mind of the Church is about the Arkansas Methodist. Motion adopted.

Mrs. Shaw spoke in praise of the Arkansas Methodist.

Report of Arkansas Methodist in Pre-Conference Report was adopted.

Mt. Sequoyah: Bishop Frank recognized Lee Cate, Superintendent of Mt. Sequoyah. He stated that last year Sequoyah celebrated the 50th anniversary, and spoke of the work and program of Sequoyah.

Bishop Frank emphasized the \$10.00 per year for Church.

New Constitution for the U.M.Y.: Joe Southerland, President of the Little Rock Conference Youth Council, presented the new Constitution for adoption. It was adopted.

The Secretary asked whether the new Constitution is to be printed in the Journal. It was agreed that it should be.

Council on Ministries: Bishop Frank recognized Alf Eason for the Council on Ministries Report, who in turn called for his staff to join him.

George Wayne Martin, Chairman of the Review Committee made his report. The report was adopted.

Alf Eason moved that the report in the Pre-Conference Report be adopted. It was adopted. He spoke to the report, calling attention to the new A. V. Catalog.

R. O. Beck spoke of the United Methodist Today with praise and recommended our reading.

The new Conference program was presented by means of slides. This part of the report was adopted.

Alf Eason called upon George Tanner, Pastor of Fairview, Camden, to speak to the program of the District Council on Ministries training enterprise conducted in the Camden District.

The report as a whole adopted.

Recess: Bishop Frank called Conference to order after recess.

Bishop Frank called attention to some unfinished business relating to the history of the Southwest Conference and referred the Commission to W. D. Lester.

A letter from the General Conference Commission was referred to the Commission which had to do with the Church's part in the Bicentennial Celebration.

Miscellaneous Matters: John Miles asked for a personal privilege and called attention to Conference Arts and Crafts exhibit.

Bishop Frank called the Conference to stand in a prayer of thanks giving for peace in the Near East.

Board of the Laity: William M. Shepherd gave the report. It was adopted.

Courtesy: Bob Trieschmann requested all ministers' wives present to stand.

Board of the Ministry: R. O. Beck and Gladwin Connell presented the report of the Board of the Ministry. R. O. Beck spoke words of commendation for the work done by Gladwin Connell and John Ross.

The names of those to be elected Probationary Members were called. They were asked to come forward and present themselves:

Elders: Those elected to Elders orders were: William A. Eason, Don L. Eubanks, R. T. Jarrell, W. Shelton Kilgore, Gerald F. Myers, Larry W. Pearce, Harold G. Rogers, Charles T. Settle, Larry R. Williams.

It was finally agreed to adopt the report and to publish the recommendations with the Conference Commission's response in the Journal.

Health and Welfare: Bishop Frank recognized Norris Steele for the report on Health and Welfare. Mrs. Alice Preston, Co-Chairperson, made the report.

Norris Steele spoke to the report and lifted up the work of the Aldersgate Retirement Center.

Edwin Keith reported on the Methodist Children's Home.

Norris Steele moved the adoption of the report. It was adopted.

Hendrix College: Bishop Frank recognized Dr. Roy B. Shilling, President of Hendrix College for a word of greeting.

Ecumenical Concerns: Bishop Frank recognized Robert E. L. Bearden for the report and he called upon Louis Averitt to make the report.

Robert Bearden called upon Mrs. Frances Wood, Secretary of the Arkansas Council of Churches, to make a report on the Council, urging Christian unity for the State of Arkansas.

The report of Ecumenical Concerns was adopted.

Missions: Bishop Frank called upon Joe Phillips to present the report of the Board of Missions.

Mrs. E. T. Davenport gave the report.

Attention was called to the Salary Aid Requests handed out at Conference.

Tom Abney, Conference Missionary Secretary gave his report.

Mrs. Davenport moved the adoption of the report, It was adopted.

Motion: Alf Eason moved that the three remaining reports be the first reports to be given in the morning. George Wayne Martin seconded the motion. Motion adopted.

Carl Beard spoke against amnesty.

The Committee on Minutes reported the minutes were in order.

Closed afternoon session with singing of one stanza of, "Lord Jesus, I Love Thee," and benediction by the Bishop.

VI. Reports

THE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Director's Report

The 1973 session of the Little Rock Annual Conference adopted a program for 1974 on the recommendation of the Council on Ministries. During the year, your Council Director has been privileged to assist in implementing these goals. Much progress has been made in bringing into reality the goals adopted by our conference. During 1974, we feel that the concept of "process planning" has become much clearer. Your Director and the Council on Ministries are committed to this process. We feel that it is the best method devised to date to determine the needs of the local churches, the districts, and the conference as a whole. We further feel that once the needs have been determined they can be met. Implementation of the goals provides this meeting of needs. The final step in "process planning" is Evaluation. The Executive Committee of the Council on Ministries has served as the Evaluation Committee. Five recommendations resulted from evaluation: (1) Secure input from the District Councils on Ministries prior to preparation of goals by the Annual Conference Boards, (2) Seek to group all goals under the seven work areas, (3) Each goal should be stated so that its attainment is measurable, (4) Goals should be designed to fulfill the purposes of the Annual Conference, and (5) There should be a time designation on priorities.

In planning for 1975, the "process" continues. Needs have come before the Council on Ministries from many sources: the Bishop, the Cabinet, the District Councils, the Program Boards, and individuals. The expression of these needs is the culmination of a long and thorough process of "listening". Once the input was received, the Council Staff sought to coordinate, refine, and eliminate repetition. The "working paper" was then taken before the Executive Committee, the Cabinet, and other groups for further refinement and possible amendment. The amended and revised set of goals was then presented to the Council on Ministries for final approval. The "Goals for 1975" are the result of this total process. They are recommended to you by the Council on Ministries. After the goals are adopted by the Annual Conference, implementation will begin. Evaluation will follow later in the year.

On recommendation of the TRAFCO Committee, we request: (1) That the Council on Finance and Administration continue to support TRAFCO with an allocation of \$3500.00, (2) That persons in local churches responsible for the use of Audio-Visual Resources, make full use of the new catalogue, as well as the supplemental pages sent to each church this year, (3) That District Directors secure a listing of Audio-Visuals owned by local churches in the district, which they would be willing to lend to other churches of the district, and that such listings be available to the pastors of that district, and (4) That the Chairman of the TRAFCO Committee, the Librarian, and the Council Director meet at regular intervals to consider the purchase of new resources.

Finally, your Council Director wishes to express appreciation to Bishop Eugene M. Frank, the Cabinet, the Council on Ministries, the Council Staff, the District Councils, and to every local pastor and church. Without the excellent cooperation which we experience from each of these, the development and implementation of our conference program would be an impossibility.

BOARD OF MANAGERS, THE ARKANSAS METHODIST

Our 93rd year finds the paper at a crucial turning point in its history, one with factors which will significantly effect the future course of this historic institution of Arkansas Methodism.

The loss, after a 25-year partnership, of THE LOUISIANA METHODIST, meant the loss of one-third of our income. This, plus increased expenses (typesetting, printing and postage) has left the paper with a \$20,000 differential in anticipated income and expenditures for 1974. This has necessitated our requesting emergency funding for this year and for the perfecting of a completely new system of financing the paper for the years ahead.

While our problems are many we are confident that the paper will continue the rich heritage of the past and have an ever-growing usefulness and service to the church in Arkansas.

We have proposed a plan to the Councils on Finance and Administration of the two Annual Conferences which would provide the paper to every United Methodist in the state who desires it. This plan would place the paper among the benevolent causes of the Conferences, becoming an apportioned item to the local churches.

Such a proposal is at this date pending before the two Councils and their recommendations will be presented to the Annual Conferences. Because of the pending status of those recommendations this report will not contain the usual recommendations regarding circulation campaign, etc., as the proposed plan would not necessitate such a campaign. Complete details of the proposals will be presented to the Conference sessions with whatever amendments may be made necessary by the Councils' recommendations.

Concerning the Circulation Campaign of 1974, our report to date shows an increase of 599 subscriptions over the same period last year. We are most grateful to pastors and lay persons for their hard work in achieving this figure and to the bishop and his cabinets for their continuing support of the paper.

We are pleased with the reader interest in the paper as indicated by the 569 communications received in response to our trial size-change during January and February.

During this first year that the Board of Manager's concept has been in operation we have held three full Board meetings, one Executive Committee meeting and have held a staff and Board workshop with outside resource persons, the purpose of which was to aid in up-dating aspects of the paper. We are giving particular attention to matters of finance, striving to operate as economically as possible. We are a "working Board," and are pleased with this concept.

We, with all the staff of the ARKANSAS METHODIST, are committed to continuing growth in achieving the finest paper possible in the service of the church.

We recommend that the churches of the Little Rock Conference make voluntary financial contributions to the Arkansas Guidance Foundations and that the First Sunday in Lent be set as the suggested date for this offering. We recommend that Rev. Eugene Efrid, the director, come and report on this work.
- 8. We commend the church and communities which have sponsored Project Misdemeanant and have used the project to strengthen local probation and rehabilitative services.
- 9. We pledge our support to the Cabinet and the Conference Program Council in conducting district workshops to train our people in the program of the United Methodist Church as set up by the General Conference.
- 10. We recommend support of the Christian Civic Foundation in its efforts to promote the cause of civic righteousness in the areas of alcohol and other drugs, gambling, and pornography. We request our people to make use of our Public Law No. 91375 to prevent pornography from coming into the home.
- 11. We recognize the need of concern for the aged. We feel the local churches should take into their future plans special emphasis and interest for those more experienced persons.

12. We commend those churches involved in the "Contact" ministry and suggest that other churches and communities study the possibilities of similar ministries.

CHRISTIAN CIVIC FOUNDATION OF ARKANSAS, INC.

The staff of the Christian Civic Foundation is composed of the Executive Director, Rev. Edward W. Harris, the Educational Assistant, Mr. Paul Ramsey, and the Office Secretary, Mrs. Beverly Williams.

Finances: To complete the 1971-72 financial year, emergency funds from Baptist and Methodist supporters were required. In 1973, the fiscal year and the calendar year coincided. For the first time in many years, we were able to operate without emergency funds. We received \$138.44 more income than we disbursed. Even then, we spent only \$34,855.63 on a \$37,910.00 budget. 1973 saw increased Baptist giving: (Convention, from \$6,000 to \$10,000 and local churches from \$6,370.36 to \$7,243.61). Baptist giving lacked \$2,756.39 of reaching the total goal of \$20,000, yet this marked a new high in Baptist giving. Giving by Methodist churches fell short of the goal of \$16,000. The North Arkansas Conference reached its goal of \$8,000, but the Little Rock Conference fell short of its goal of \$8,000 by \$1,049.35. The giving of the North Arkansas Conference Women was significant, equalling one-eighth of the total giving by the Conference churches. Individual gifts for 1973 totaled \$2,015.

The new 1974 budget of \$39,971 represents \$2,061 in essential increases. Goals for Baptist giving for 1974 are: Convention, \$10,000, and Churches, \$12,000, a total of \$22,000. Methodist goals are: North Arkansas \$10,000, and Little Rock, \$10,000, a total of \$20,000. All of this will be needed, if the new budget is to be met. We are indeed grateful for the giving by all of our supporters.

The Educational PROGRAM: During the 1973-74 school year, 117 appointments were made for the presentation of the Alcohol-Narcotics Education Program of the Christian Civic Foundation in the public schools. We anticipate reaching an approximate total of 55,000 students in this vital phase of our work. Everywhere, our Educational Assistant, Mr. Paul Ramsey, was received enthusiastically, and we have found all doors open to our approach. We feel that this is due to two things: (1) The quality of leadership and materials we present; (2) The fact that our non-sectarian approach does not violate the constitutional separation of Church and State. The cost of carrying on this work has risen sharply, with the rise in the cost of fuel, food, lodging, etc., all of which is paid directly out of the worker's expense account. Thus far, the fuel crisis has not caused any cancellations, and we are hopeful that the program can be completed as planned.

Mr. Ramsey presented the program to 21 camp groups last summer, more than doubling the number reached in the past, spending one day in most camps. He also appeared before 17 church groups and 13 civic clubs and other groups. He attended a drug abuse workshop at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, last March.

The Drug Scene: The over-all national specter of hard-drug usage has abated to some extent, chiefly due to reduced availability of hard drugs, resulting from tightening of legal controls. Another national trend is the shift by youth from hard drugs to alcohol, also to marijuana in many areas.

If statistics can be trusted, drug abuse, ranging from marijuana to heroin, is on the rise in Arkansas, especially in Central Arkansas. Serious attempts to legalize Marijuana can be expected between now and the next session of the State Legislature. All of our people should be alerted to oppose all efforts to legalize what must be considered a "dangerous drug." Most significant among national reports was that of the President's Commission on Marijuana and Drug Abuse, which recognized Alcohol as the number one "Drug Abuse Problem" in the United States.

Local Option Activity: At the present time, there are 44 "Dry" counties in Arkansas, accounting for the lower volume of alcohol consumption in Arkansas, as compared with wholly "Wet" states. At the last General Election in 1972, two elections were held, in Baxter and Stone Counties, both won by "Dry Forces". Threats of elections in Cleburne, Newton, Montgomery and Pike Counties did not materialize, due to failures in the attempts to gain signatures on petitions. All citizens in "Dry" counties, and especially those in resort areas, should be alert to catch the first rumors of activity that might indicate possible Local Option Elections in the forthcoming General Election, November 5.

Legislative Activity: Both houses of the 69th General Assembly met January 14, 1974, and, after a brief session adjourned sine die. It seems highly probable that there will be no session of the State Legislature before January of 1975, unless a serious emergency arises. At that time, several items of particular concern to the Christian Civic Foundation will be as follows:

- (1) The Lowering of the Majority Age From 21 to 18. In the 69th General Assembly, six bills were introduced, and all died in Committee. We are almost certain to see similar bills introduced at the regular session in 1975. A majority of states, 43 at present, have dropped the age of legal adulthood from 21 to 18 or 19 years. Today these young citizens can vote, serve on juries, make contracts, marry, and in 33 states, order alcoholic beverages. Arkansas is one of only seven states who have not changed the age limit for any purpose. Ten other states lowered the age limits, but excluded the privilege of alcoholic beverages, making a total of 17 states who still prohibit those under 21 years of age from buying or consuming alcoholic beverages. With 1974 elections behind them, Legislators will need strong expressions from their constituents, if they are to resist the great pressures that will be exerted by the liquor industry to lower the drinking age in 1975.
- (2) The Arkansas Statute On "Obscenity". A favorable ruling by the United States Supreme Court on June 21, 1973, in the case of Miller vs. California, gave Prosecutors and Judges new hope in dealing with "hard core pornography". In Pulaski County, the exhibitors of the pornographic film "Deep Throat" were successfully prosecuted. A ruling by the Arkansas Supreme Court in a case from Garland County declared the Arkansas obscenity statute to be constitutional. Although this was encouraging to Enforcement officers, most Arkansas lawyers feel that new legislation should be presented at the next session of the General Assembly, to strengthen the present statute and to clarify existing terminology. Although we are not a Legislative organization, we are intensely interested in the field of obscenity and any form of legislation that is proposed. We have done exhaustive study in this area since last June. Before we recommend support for any proposed legislation, we must be certain that it defines clearly hard core pornography and related obscene materials, and, at the same time, provides constitutional guarantees that the First Amendment was meant to secure.

Other legislative proposals we can anticipate include some form of the

"Wine Bill" which would enable grocery stores to obtain wine permits without possessing a beer or liquor permit; attempts to weaken Act 189, which stiffened the requirements for beer and liquor permits; further amendment of Act 186 (Controlled Substances Act or Drug Abuse Bill) to strengthen certain phases of enforcement; another attempt to repeal the State Sunday Closing Law; and possible attempts to legalize the sale of alcoholic beverages on Sunday.

In the National Congress, House Bill HR11106, by Representative Brown of California, is essentially a bill to amend the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 to provide that advertising of alcoholic beverages is not a deductible expense. This bill was introduced on October 25, 1973, and was referred to the Committee on Ways and Means. A letter to Mr. Wilbur D. Mills, Chairman, and one to your own congressman would do much to insure a hearing before the committee and its ultimate passage.

The New Quarterly Bulletin: June 11, 1973, we obtained a Bulk Rate Mailing Permit, and a permit for printing out imprint. We used this permit in mailing "The Christian Citizen" newsletter in the fall of 1973 to all Board members and to all Methodist and Baptist pastors, a total of 1,680. It is our hope to continue this informational mailing to our people on a quarterly basis.

The Executive Director: The Executive Director has preached forty times in churches, attended the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church, the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, attended public hearings before the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board as requested by local communities, attended eighty-nine days of the Legislative session and spent more than forty hours in Legislative Committee meetings, attended the Tane-Baylor University Workshop on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, and given supervision to all phases of the policy, program, and staff activities of the Christian Civic Foundation. New duties assumed during the past year included that of full time Legislative Consultant and Editor of the new quarterly bulletin. It is anticipated that 1975 will again require some two or three months of intensive day-to-day activity in the 70th General Assembly, beginning January, 1975.

COMMISSION ON ECUMENICAL CONCERNS

The Commission on Ecumenical Concerns has been assigned one of the goals by the Program Council, the Bishop's Call for Peace and Self-Development.

We will seek to implement this goal by developing small local church peace seeking communities of faith, which will be urged to study the needs of disadvantaged nations and work for world peace. We recommend the resource kit provided for this purpose, which may be ordered from the Service Department for \$10.00.

We send delegates every year to the National Workshop on Ecumenical Concerns, the Arkansas Ecumenical Institute, Conference on the World Mission, and similar meetings. We recommend the work of the Arkansas Council of Churches and we recommend that \$3,630 be allowed the council from the Little Rock Conference.

The Commission will present this resolution to the Annual Conference: We call upon the Consultation on Church Union to abandon the current plan which has been studied for several years. We urge, however, the COCU

continue to function and to explore new avenues for developing inter-faith action and understanding among the denominations represented at all levels.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

Conference Program

The Program for the Little Rock Conference, adopted at the 1973 session of the conference, assigned six goals to the Board of Education. Following you will find the implementation procedures applied to these goals:

Basic Priority I-3: "The development of a program of Christian Education involving the training of teams from each district in a conference-wide coaching conference—the district teams to train leaders in the local churches." The efforts of the Board of Education included a conference-wide workshop, and district workshops on "Our Living Bible Series" for adults. Significant also was a workshop on "Fundamentals of Christian Education" conducted in the Camden District by Miss Margie McCarty. The Board of Education helped finance the attendance by leaders from other districts to this training event.

Basic Priority III-1: "A study of the theological position of Methodism-Doctrinal Standards". Studies of this sort have been conducted in a number of local churches — in some cases assisted by the Council Staff. However, we will continue this goal in our recommendations.

Basic Priority III-2: "The setting up of Bible Conferences, Seminars, and other learning experiences." Numerous training enterprises have been set up and implemented for local churches and districts. Additional emphasis needs to be made on Bible Conferences.

Ministry Priority IV-1: "Strengthened Youth Ministry." A strong program of youth ministry is being implemented. The Conference Youth Council is submitting a new constitution to the 1974 session of the Annual Conference. The Conference Youth Rally was splendid. The program of camping for children and youth at Tanako for 1974 will be of the same high quality. Other youth activities included a trip to New York, and interesting points in Washington, D.C.

Ministry Priority IV-3: "Marriage Enrichment Programs." A joint committee from the Boards of Education and Evangelism has implemented this goal. The Marriage Enrichment Program for the conference was conducted at St. John's Seminary in Little Rock during March, 1974.

Ministry Priority IV-4: "Continuing Education." Implementation of this goal has been accomplished largely through individual grants for various ministers desiring to attend a particular event. Our recommendations will include a more specific goal in this field.

Recommendations: The Board of Education recommends the following "Goals for 1975":

(1) Workshops on Youth Curriculum Materials.

- (2) Encouragement of continuing education study groups under the sponsorship of our seminaries.
- (3) Encouragement and promotion of Bible Conferences.
- (4) A study of the theological position of Methodism Doctrinal Standards.

The general policy of the Board of Education is, and has been, to implement training events to meet specific needs as indicated by requests from local churches, sub-districts, districts, or on the conference level. We want every unit of the annual conference to know that any type training event can be set up through the conference office.

Finally, we urge the use of Methodist Curriculum Materials in United Methodist Churches. This material is planned for United Methodists and is excellent material.

Finances: The Board of Education requests that the Council on Finance and Administration designate the 4th Sunday of September as Christian Education Sunday, and that \$9,000 be apportioned to the churches for Christian Education Sunday. This amount received by the Board of Education from the churches makes possible the extensive program of Christian Education characteristic of our conference.

The Staff: We request that the Conference Director of the Council on Ministries serve as Conference Director of Education. We request that the Conference Associate Director of the Council on Ministries serve as Conference Coordinator of Youth Ministries and Conference Coordinator of Young Adult Ministries. We request that Mrs. John L. Tucker serve as Conference Coordinator of Children's Ministries. We request that the following persons serve on a volunteer basis; William A. Stewart, Jr., as Conference Coordinator of Adult Ministries; William D. Elliott as Conference Coordinator of Family Life Ministries.

Report No. 2

Hendrix College

We recommend: (1) that the Conference continue its support of Hendrix College by allocating \$111,600. and (2) that this amount be apportioned to the local churches by the District Superintendents.

We recommend that the Conference confirm the election of Edward G. Matthews to the Hendrix College Board of Trustees to replace George W. Martin who is completing his term of service and is ineligible for reelection.

Report No. 3

Commission on Higher Education

We recommend the continuation of the policy concerning Wesley Foundation in the Little Rock Conference as stated in the 1973 Journal, to wit: the Council on Finance and Administration to include \$12,000. in the Conference Benevolent Budget and that \$50,000. be apportioned to the churches of the Annual Conference for 1975. We also recommend the continuation of the Stabilization Fund so that equal payments may be made during the course of the year.

We recommend that each Center be approved for a basic grant of \$13,000. to be paid on a monthly basis, and that at the close of the fiscal year all funds collected for that year be divided equally between the four Centers in the Little Rock Conference.

Report No. 4

Philander Smith College

We recommended that \$46,146. be apportioned to the churches in accord with the General Conference for the Black College Fund. It is understood that 75% of the total amount paid will be returned to Philander Smith College. We also recommend that the District Superintendents, pastors, and churches make every effort to pay this apportionment in full.

COMMISSION ON ENLISTMENT FOR CHURCH OCCUPATIONS

Ongoing Program

- 1. The Commission on Enlistment held a workshop, October 11-12, 1973, for training persons for each district in enlistment for church occupations. Approximately 40 persons, including pastors, laymen, and District Superintendents, attended the workshop, led by Dr. Richard Bauer, executive secretary of the Office of Personnel of the Board of Higher Education and Ministry in Nashville. At the workshop, plans were made for enlisting youth for church occupations in each district.
- 2. A letter and the booklet, Church Occupations and Voluntary Service, has been mailed to all public school guidance counselors in the state. The letter was composed and signed jointly by the chairmen of the two annual conference Commissions on Enlistment in the state.
- 3. A brochure is in the process of being prepared for use by local church Secretaries of Enlistment to be distributed during the summer of 1974. The brochure will provide guidelines, practical suggestions, and resources for challenging persons in the local church for church occupations.
- 4. Copies of the major resource book in enlistment, Occupations in the United Methodist Church, are being purchased for each district secretary of enlistment and for the Conference Commission Chairman.
- 5. The Commission is co-operating with the two Conference Councils on Ministry and the North Arkansas Commission on Enlistment in securing and training college youth as summer workers, and in placing them in local churches who request them.

Recommendations

The Commission on Enlistment recommends:

1. That workshops be held in each district in the late summer or early fall

of 1974 for pastors and local church Secretaries of Enlistment in order to assist them in developing local church programs. The Commission is prepared to supply persons to conduct these workshops.

- 2. That each local church committee on nominations and personnel carefully consider the nomination of a concerned individual as Secretary of Enlistment for church occupations.
- 3. That every local church and its pastor provide itself with resources and materials challenging its youth to a commitment of life in Christian vocation.
- 4. That pastors share their calls and understandings of the ministry with their congregations. We recommend that Ministry Sunday, September 15, 1974, is an excellent time for presenting the many opportunities available for Christian service.
- 5. That the conference continue to support the employment of college youth for the Tanako Staff.

Goals for 1975

During the calendar year 1975 the Commission on Enlistment intends to develop the following goals and objectives:

- 1. To develop and provide worship resources for Ministry Sunday, September 21, 1975, for use in local churches, emphasizing the importance and challenge of church occupations.
- 2. To develop and train resource persons and teams to go into district meetings and local churches when invited for assistance in the area of enlistment for church occupations.
- 3. To encourage in public schools through the guidance counselors an opportunity for local churches to participate in their "Career Day" educational programs along with representatives from other occupations and professions.
- 4. To establish a system of keeping accurate records of persons who have indicated an interest in church occupations from the time of their first commitment until they are appointed to full work in the Church, or until such time as responsibility for them is accepted by the proper conference board or commission. Our purpose is to encourage these persons in their choice, and to put them in touch with persons and resources that can help them pursue their desire.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

In keeping with the teachings of the Bible and our great Methodist historical teachings, we deem the following to be the **priorities** of the Church:

- 1. Winning people to Jesus Christ wherever they may be.
- 2. Training persons to be effective disciples of Christ.
- 3. Developing a Christ-centered, spiritually alive Church.
- 4. Equipping Christians to be intellectually and Biblically grounded in the faith.
- 5. Sending Christians out into the world to serve human need.

IMPLEMENTATION OF PRIORITIES

Beginning with Annual Conference 1974

To implement these priorities, beginning with the Conference Year of 1974,

these steps will be taken to increase the evangelistic outreach of our churches. During the coming Summer and Fall we encourage pastors and churches to enter into the following:

- 1. Each pastor, district superintendent, all other ministers, and local church leaders joining in making "The Evangelism Covenant." This Covenant will be a personal dedication to talk individually to some person about his or her personal relationship to Christ each week.
- 2. If you have not already done so, have a Bible study in your Church on "Jesus Christ for Today," using the text book Jesus Christ For Today by Dr. William Barclay (available from Tidings, P.O. Box 840, Nashville, Tennessee, 37203). After you have done this, continue with other Bible studies.
- 3. Prepare for the Methodist Mission to the World in 1975 by planning and implementing the following:
 - (a) Development of small groups which will explore and capture the values of the historic Wesleyan "class meetings."
 - (b) Prepare a list of 'prospects' for Christ and the Church.
 - (c) Plan for a congregational Covenant Sunday on the first Sunday of 1975.
- 4. Enlist a group in your church that will meet and pray about those who are away from Christ and the Church. Train this group and lead them in witnessing to individuals. (Please note the fine help that has been given in this with the new materials: Four Great Emphases of United Methodism; a guidebook and witnessing booklet. Available from Tidings.)
- 5. That we endorse and support a "Ministers' We Care Mission" at First Church in Hope.

The Program Year of 1975

1. Plan for full participation in the World Methodist Mission, with the theme "For the World . . . Christ."

The Conference Board will produce suggestive materials which will give ideas of effective programs of evangelism within the local church.

- 2. We recommend to each Church that they prayerfully develop a program of evangelism over the next two years, which may include some of the following tested undertakings:
 - (a) A Lay Witness Mission (for churches which have had a LWM it is possible to have a LWM II)
 - (b) "A Ministers' We Care Mission"
 - (c) Pulpit evangelism, using such possibilities as "New Life Mission," Revivals, preaching missions, etc.
 - (d) The John Wesley Great Experiment
 - (e) Visitation evangelism, with emphasis on pastoral visitation and developing lay visitation programs. (A new program of lay visitation is "The Oak Lane Story" plan.)
- 3. We strongly recommend that every church have a Confirmation Class at least once each year. Materials are available from The Methodist Publishing House. (Adult Confirmation course: Inquiry, A Search for Faith; Youth Confirmation course: Discipleship.) A set of materials with film strip and workbooks entitled A New Adventure in the Meaning of United Methodist Membership, is also available from Tidings.
- 4. We commend to each pastor a renewed emphasis upon evangelism in the Worship Services of the Church. That the District Secretary in each District, in cooperation with the District Superintendent, have a briefing on "How to give

an evangelistic invitation in a worship service." This could be done as a small part of a pastors' meeting in the District. We urge that all opportunities in worship services be made evangelistic: preaching, singing, prayers, and baptisms.

- 5. We urge every church to plan for the following in the local church, devising a program that will meet the needs of that particular church:
 - (a) Training members in churchmanship and in historic Methodist doctrines.
 - (b) Assimilating new members and reactivating inactive members.
 - (c) Bible studies to be led by the pastor.
 - (d) Spiritual enrichment for laymen (prayer groups, marriage enrichment, involvement in growth seminars).
 - 6. As a Board we propose the following:
 - (a) That a special emphasis on the Holy Spirit be conducted in the Conference in 1975.
 - (b) That we again provide a \$100 scholarship for a young minister; not more than five years out of seminary, to attend a meeting on evangelism.
 - (c) That we give support to the National Council on Evangelism in its work.
 - (d) That we encourage attendance at the World Methodist Conference on Evangelism at Jerusalem, November 16-23, 1974.
 - (e) That we as a Board stand ready to assist all churches in implementing evangelism.
 - (f) That a Conference Secretary of Evangelism be designated each year and that Alvin C. Murray is elected to serve for the Conference year 1974-75.
 - (g) That the task force studying the Confirmation Service be continued.
 - (h) We recommend careful correction of Church Rolls, in strict accord with the Discipline.

VII. Other Recommendations:

A. Pastor's Utilities: If a charge does not otherwise provide for a pastor's utilities, then each charge is requested to designate the cost of parsonage utilities as a part of the pastor's salary, thus exempting the cost of utilities from the income tax claim. It is understood that designation of part of salary as utilities for tax purposes does not exempt this amount from the percentages that would normally be levied against it by the Conference.

B. Authorized Payments by the Conference Treasurer:

- 1. Methodist Foundation of Arkansas \$1,500 from Conference Administration Fund on a vouchered basis.
- 2. Incidental expenses of the Trustees, Boards and Agencies not receiving appropriations to be paid from Conference Administration Fund on a vouchered basis.
- 3. Annual Conference Host Church be paid any deficit in Conference Entertainment expenses upon financial statement to the Area Treasurer from the Conference Administration Fund.
- 4. The Arkansas Methodist be granted \$2,500 Emergency Relief for the year 1974 to be paid from Conference Benevolences Unrestricted Fund.
- 5. Board of Health & Welfare a loan of up to \$4,000 @ 7½% interest to be used as "earnest money" toward the purchase of 20 acres of land from the Women's Division of the United Methodist Church to be used by Aldersgate United Methodist Retirement Center, Inc. for a retirement home. This money to come from Unrestricted Benevolences.
- C. Conference Benevolences Unrestricted Fund: That the balances of all Program Boards, Councils, Commissions, Committees, etc... be placed in a central operating balance, with the exception of the Board of Missions which shall transfer all balances to the Special Church Extension Fund (restricted).
- D. Interest Income: That interest income from investments shall continue to go into the Conference Administration Fund.
- E. Cost of Living Study: The Council on Finance & Administration has carefully studied the relationship between the rate of rise in the Cost of Living and the rate of raises in Pastor's Salaries for the years 1971-1974. We find that in most cases, the salaries have failed to keep pace with inflation. We, therefore, recommend that this study be publicized in the Arkansas Methodist, distributed by the District Superintendents to local Pastors and to local Pastor-Parish Relationship Committees, and implemented to the best advantage through the local Charge Conferences. We further recommend that each local Charge Conference consider a minimum "Cost of Living" raise of 10% for its Pastor.
- F. That all ministers prayerfully consider the tithe of their salaries as a minimum standard for giving to the church.

HEALTH AND WELFARE MINISTRIES

I. The Methodist Children's Home

Each and every district in the Little Rock Conference showed an increase in their support to The Methodist Children's Home this year. We want to commend the members of the churches in the Little Rock Conference for their continued interest, love and support for the Methodist Children's Home.

We would like to urge each and every district and each and every charge to elect a Health and Welfare Steward who would have, along with the duties spelled out in the discipline, a specific responsibility for promotion of the cause of the Methodist Children's Home.

We would like to commend The Methodist Children's Home, not only for its traditionally good job in its area of concern, but for its new program such as the day care center which it now has, and for the continued program of building extension homes in some of the cities and towns throughout our state. We recognize and give God thanks for the efforts which made possible the extension home opened this past year at Searcy, and we urge continued effort to enlarge this program even in other areas.

We recommend that churches and individuals remit all monies for the Home directly to the Home.

II. Other Program Areas

We urge that each District Superintendent appoint district representatives of Health and Welfare Ministries (or their successors according to the new structure) and that these individuals working with the District Superintendent see that Health and Welfare Ministries be lifted up in each local church. We further urge that these individuals in cooperation with the District Superintendent conduct district or sub-district seminars on hospital visitation.

III. Trustee Nominations

We submit the following nominations for Trustees of the Methodist Children's Home, terms to expire in 1977; Ed Matthews, Richard J. Pierce, Jr., R. B. Newcomb, and Joe R. Phillips, Jr.

IV. Report

- 1. We would like to report the incorporation of "Methodist Community, Inc.". These articles of incorporation have been approved by the courts and filed with the Secretary of State. This gives the Little Rock Conference a legal vehicle to move forward on in any venture in the area of retirement homes for the aged that the Little Rock Conference feels is not being met already in a related way.
- 2. We would like to report the progress being made on a related venture in the field of retirement homes for the aged within the bounds of Little Rock Conference. This is a joint effort by the Little Rock Conference, North Arkansas Conference and the Camp Aldersgate Board. The institution will be known as the Aldersgate United Methodist Retirement Center, Inc. It will be located on land now owned by the Women's Division of the United Methodist Church at the Camp Aldersgate site.

The Council on Finance and Administration voted on request from the Board of Health and Welfare, to loan the Trustees of Aldersgate United Methodist Retirement Center, Inc. an amount up to \$4,000.00 to be used as earnest money toward the purchase of twenty acres of the above mentioned land with an option on twenty more. This money was required as a gesture of "good faith" before the owners of the said property would negotiate any further.

The Board of Trustees of Aldersgate United Methodist Retirement Center, Inc. has been organized and articles of incorporation with regulations and by-laws being drawn up at this time. We commend this effort and urge the fullest cooperation by all other agencies, boards and institutions of the United Church in helping to bring about its fruitation.

INSURANCE COMMITTEE

Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program

The Little Rock Conference has the Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program provided by the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church. The Travelers Insurance Company is the underwriter for this insurance.

Eligibility

- A. All full members of the Conference under appointment with annuity claim upon the Conference, and their dependents.
- B. All probationary members and their dependents.
- C. All full-time lay pastors and their dependents.
- D. All full-time lay employees of the Annual Conference and their dependents.
- E. All members who have been granted the retired relation by this Conference with annuity claim, and their dependents.
- F. All retired full-time approved lay pastors with annuity claim on this Conference and their dependents.
- G. All widows of deceased ministers with annuity claim on this Conference, and their dependent children.
- H. Student lay pastors, and their dependents.

Note: Any Conference member under special appointment without annuity credit on this Annual Conference is eligible to be enrolled provided he assumes responsibility for full payment of the premium. Probationary members appointed to attend school and not serving a Conference church are also eligible to be enrolled provided they assume responsibility for full payment of the premium.

To enroll the eligible lay employees of a particular church, the following number of employees must elect to participate:

Note: Any local church or institution not qualifying for, or electing to enroll its full-time employees under the above rules on the initial enroll-

ment date set by the Annual Conference (July 1, 1972), may enroll eligible employees under the same rules on any subsequent anniversary of the Conference initial enrollment date.

Ministers transferring into the Conference may enroll in HMEP within 90 days of transfer without having to fill out a "Statement of Physical Condition" form. A new lay employee of a participating church or organization may enroll within 90 days of employment without having to submit a "Statement of Physical Condition" form.

Enrollment applications and cards are available from the Insurance Committee Secretary at the Joint Treasurer's Office.

Recommendations Concerning Payment of Premiums

- I. We recommend that each local church provide 60% of the premium cost for either individual or family coverage, which ever is applicable, for those under regular appointment and for eligible local church lay employees.
- II. We recommend that the Conference Board or Agency responsible for their own budget provide 60% of the premium cost for either individual or family coverage, which ever is applicable, for ministers under special appointment with annuity credit on the Annual Conference.
- III. We recommend that the Annual Conference Board of Pensions provide 60% of the premium cost of the HMEP for each Conference Claimant.

Note: Retired ministers serving appointments should refer to the Board of Pensions Report, Recommendations 9, for information concerning payment of their insurance premiums for HMEP.

All persons holding an appointment from the Bishop are required to participate in the Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program.

Benefits Paid Under HMEP

Under Age 65

Hospital Services — Full payment of first \$500 in each calendar year (with semi-private accommodations), then payment of 80% of the balance of hospital expenses in each calendar year, up to the maximum.

Services of Physicians, Surgeons and Other Covered Medical Expenses — Payment of 80% of covered expenses up to the maximum, after a \$50 calendar year deductible for all illnesses and accidents, for each covered person.

Maximum Benefit — \$250,000 per individual, for all illnesses, accidents and maternity. Subject to automatic restoration of up to \$1,000 each calendar year.

Maternity Benefits — Covered maternity expenses paid on same basis as charges shown above, if pregnancy commences after coverage begins.

Age 65 and Over - Complements Medicare

In-Patient Hospital Services — Full payment of each \$84 Medicare Deductible. Full payment of \$21 per day from 61st through 90th day. Full payment of semi-private and miscellaneous charges from 91st through 120th day beyond payment made from Medicare Lifetime Reserve days. 80% of reasonable charges from the 121st day up to a \$250,000 lifetime maximum.

Extended Care Facility — Full payment of \$10.50 per day from the 21st through the 100th day.

Physicians, Surgeons and Other Medical Services — After the Medicare \$60 deductible, full payment of 20% of other reasonable charges not paid by Medicare.

Prescription Drugs — Full-time Private Duty Nursing — 80% of reasonable charges after calendar year deductible of \$50 up to a \$250,000 lifetime maximum.

Death Benefit Program

The Little Rock Conference has Plan D, with additional option b, of the Death Benefit Program provided by the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church.

Premium

The DBP premium is 2.18% of the average salary of the Conference, which as of January 1, 1974, is \$7,709.00. The premium for 1974 is \$168.08, minus a \$15.00 refund, or \$153.06. The recommendation is that the church pay 60%, or \$91.84, and the pastor pay 40%, or \$61.22. As long as we do not have heavy claims, we may hope for such a refund yearly, to be distributed as determined by the Insurance Committee. DBP Premium for 1975 will be 1.80 per cent of the average salary.

The 1974 premium was due to the Joint Treasurer's Office December 1, 1973, since premiums for the whole Conference were due at the General Board of Pensions before January 1, 1974, to avoid a late payment interest charge. This schedule will be in effect again this year.

Retired ministers should refer to the Report of the Board of Pensions, Recommendations 7 and 9, for information concerning payment of their DBP premium.

Eligibility

The following classes of persons are eligible to be enrolled as members of the Death Benefit Program:

- A. Ministerial Members (including associate and probationary) appointed with pension credit on the Annual Conference.
- B. Retired ministers having pension claim on the Annual Conference granting the retired relationship provided there be enrollment prior to retirement, and that such enrollment remain unbroken.
- C. Those persons rendering direct and full-time service to, or employed by, the participating Annual Conference.
- D. Ministers in special appointments without pension credit on the Conference.
- E. Full-time Lay Pastors rendering full-time service.
- F. Retired Lay Pastors with pension claim on the Conference.
- G. Ministers retired without pension claim on the Annual Conference granting the retired relationship.
- H. Those persons covered under (C) above, and subsequently retired with pension claim upon the Annual Conference, provided that enrollment be maintained upon retirement and continue unbroken.

- I. Those in the supernumerary relationship.
- J. Student Lay Pastors.

Note: Lay employees of local churches are no longer allowed to enroll in DBP. Lay employees of local churches already enrolled in DBP are permitted to remain in the program following retirement if that employee is receiving any United Methodist Church related pension, such as from a local church, agency or Conference.

Enrollment Procedure

Previously eligible persons who are not currently participating in DBP may enroll between November 15 - December 15, each year.

Newly eligible persons, whose eligibility results from change of status in the Conference, or from transfer in, or employment by a participating Annual Conference, must apply within 90 days of the effective date of change, transfer, or employment.

Enrollment application cards are available from the Insurance Committee Secretary at the Joint Treasurer's Office.

BOARD OF LAITY

The Conference Board of Laity set for itself seven emphasis priorities for the past church year:

- 1. Training schools for lay speakers
- 2. Special efforts to organize more groups of United Methodist Men
- 3. Lay participation in the Sunday Worship Service
- 4. Emphasize new Living Bible Series for all adult church school study
- 5. Support local church stewardship and the Special Pension Fund program of our conference
- 6. Organize a good group to attend the Quadrennial Laymen's Conference at Purdue
- 7. Laymen's Day to be held in all local churches

Under the leadership of the District Lay Leaders and their associates, and the conference associates and Directors, we have made great progress towards the development of these objectives.

Lay Speakers Training schools have been held in the Hope, Arkadelphia and Monticello Districts with the final certification of 36 new lay speakers. Other schools will be held before the end of the year.

Our efforts to organize more Methodist Men's groups have been slow but a number of clubs have been organized and reorganized. We now have 62 groups in the conference.

Lay speakers are regularly filling the vacant pulpits in nearly all districts and more and more pastors are using laymen to assist with the Sunday worship service where there is no associate pastor.

The laymen of the conference are enthusiastic about the wonderful new Living Bible Series studies in the Church School, Not all classes are using it, but it will become almost universal within the next three years.

Generally the financial condition of the churches in the conference is good. Laymen are proud to have had a part in the development of the Every Member Canvas as a part of the annual program of the local church. We are proud to help the Little Rock Conference accomplish the payment in full of its World Service Apportionment.

Our laymen have served on committees, made speeches and have collected funds to help bring to completion our conference effort to fund our Retired Ministers Pension Plan and will continue to do so until the job is done.

In July the Board of Laity chartered a bus to take a group of 35 laymen and spouses to The Purdue Laymen's Conference. Four more went by cars and the total group represented 15 churches of the conference. The three day conference dedicated to "Commitment in Community" was excellent and provided great spiritual uplift for our people. A special thanks to Ken Ross and Charles Stuck for their efforts in organizing the trip.

The Tanako Laymen's Conference retreat in August was an outstanding event in our church year. There were 122 laymen in attendance and the two days were packed with fellowship inspiring messages, singing and prayer all built around the theme: "New Commitment and New Life". The 1974 conference is set for August 17th and 18th.

The Board of Laity wishes to express appreciation to Bishop Frank and his cabinet for their excellent support and cooperation throughout the year.

COMMISSION ON MINIMUM SALARY

Organization

The Commission on Minimum Salary shall be composed of one minister and one layperson from each District of the Annual Conference. They shall be nominated by the Cabinet and elected by the Annual Conference quadrennially. Vacancies shall be filled by the same procedure. The Bishop is requested to appoint one representative from his Cabinet, annually. The chairman of the Committee on Town and Country shall be an ex-officio member of the Commission and administrative officer.

The Commission shall elect quadrennially a chairman, vice chairman, and secretary who, together with the chairman of the Town and Country Committee and the Cabinet representative, shall compose the executive committee. Vacancies in offices shall be filled by the Commission from its elective membership.

The Commission shall meet as often as is required to do its work, and consign certain responsibilities to the executive committee.

Purpose

The purpose of the Minimum Salary Program is to:

- 1. Assist charges to pay their pastor the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference.
- 2. Challenge and enable charges to become self-sustaining. This is not to be thought of, or used, as a continuing mission support. Each charge in accepting minimum salary assistance does so with the understanding that Pastoral supports will be increased by the local church each year, moving toward total local support.

Finances

Funds for the purpose of the Commission shall be raised by an apportionment annually, to all churches of the Annual Conference of an amount equal to 3% of the base salary paid the pastor.

Program

Minimum salary support for a charge shall be computed on the combined ministerial support paid the pastor by a charge.

- I. Charges are eligible for Minimum Salary Assistance provided:
 - 1. Each church submits its budget, in writing to the Commission, through the District Superintendent annually.
 - 2. Each church conduct an Every Member Visitation, and report the results to the Commission, through the District Superintendent annually.
 - 3. Each church pays in full all acceptances to the Conference or District Treasurer.

- 4. The charge agrees to increase local salary support a minimum of \$100.00 annually, moving toward the goal of total support at the earliest possible date.
- 5. The charge makes application to the Commission annually, on the prescribed form, by action of the Charge Conference.
- 6. The charge is served by a full-time pastor, or ministerial student approved by the Annual Conference. By full-time we mean disciplinary meaning of full-time minister.
- II. The Commission will supplement charges meeting these requirements to reach the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference up to the maximum of \$1,500.00 per year computed on the basis of total support paid the pastor by the charge including base salary, travel and utilities.
- III. The minimum salary for a pastor, approved by the Annual Conference for the conference year beginning June 1, 1973, shall be:
- IV. to encourage charges to reach full Minimum Salary support, a charge will be given credit for any annual increase that is in excess of \$100 (see 4 under Program) in an amount equal to one half of said increase; total support not to exceed \$7,500.00. Salary supplementation is determined by:

 1974 Salary 1973 Salary \$100
 plus 1974 salary not to exceed a total salary plus supplementation of \$7500.
- V. We encourage the cabinet, the local church and the pastors to work toward charge realignment immediately, in order to strengthen the Church and improve ministerial support.
- VI. Station Churches, except in geographically isolated situations paying less than Minimum Salary, will be given two years to meet minimum standards or undergo charge reorganization. Failure to meet this requirement will result in loss of Minimum Salary assistance.
- VII. In the event of insufficient funds to meet all claims each charge shall share proportionately from the funds available.
- VIII. The Commission shall report annually in the Conference Journal by district the amounts paid during the calendar year to each charge and minister.
 - IX. That the above plan of distribution of funds be made effective June 1, 1973.

BOARD OF MINISTRY Report No. 1

Policy and Program

I. The Little Rock Conference Board of Ministry purposes to work strictly within the framework of the current Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church.

- II. The elected officers of the board are: chairperson, vice-chairperson, secretary, and registrar. The registrar shall be the treasurer.
- III. The executive committee of the board are the elected officers, Chairperson of the Continuing Education Committee, and the Chairperson of the Conference Relations Committee.
- IV. The board shall meet prior to the opening of school, at midyear and Annual Conference, and on call of the chairperson.
- V. The board shall have representation on each District Committee of the Ministry (Par. 665.18). In consultation with the district superintendents, the chairperson shall appoint a member of the board to serve on each committee.
- VI. The board's sources of income shall be:
 - A. A percentage from the conference benevolences.
 - B. One fourth (25%) of the amount collected from local churches designated for the Ministerial Education Fund.
 - C. Gifts, bequests, interests and repayment of loans.
- VII. The board shall maintain a scholarship aid fund for ministerial training as follows:
 - A. For those in course of study above the level of license to preach.
 - 1. Assistance in courses of study schools.
 - (a) The cost of required textbooks for each year of the course of study. The enrollees are required to submit to the registrar itemized statements or itemized invoices from Cokesbury for books purchased for use in the pastor's school courses.
 - (b) The cost of tuition or registration fees, and of room and board while attending the course of study schools.
 - 2. Assistance in the corresponding course.
 - (a) Payment of fees.
 - (b) The cost of required textbooks for each year of the course of study. The enrollees are to purchase the required books in their own name, to pay for them or have them charged to their own account, and then be reimbursed by the registrar.
 - B. For students from the Little Rock Annual Conference preparing for the effective ministry in the United Methodist Church who:
 - 1. Have satisfactorily completed at least enough semester hours of college credit to qualify for classification as a junior.
 - 2. Are enrolled in a college, university, or seminary approved by the University Senate of the United Methodist Church.
 - 3. Hold a current license to preach in the United Methodist Church, be enrolled in a seminary, or be probationary members of the Little Rock Conference.
 - 4. Make application annually to the registrar of the board prior to August 1, giving all information requested and authorizing regular grade reports to this board's registrar from the school's registrar, including a transcript of credits at the end of the year. Application must be requested.
 - C. The board may set a maximum amount of scholarship aid per year per recipient, but assistance will be determined for each individual on the basis of requirements or needs.

- Scholarship aid for summer sessions will be granted one-half of the maximum annual allowance.
- 2. The maximum scholarship aid for college students shall not exceed five (5) semesters. The maximum aid for seminary students shall not exceed four (4) years.
- 3. Additional emergency scholarship aid will be granted at the board's discretion to students in the following categories, requesting and making application, who:
 - (a) Begin preparation for the ministry later in life with pressing financial responsibilities.
 - (b) Have severe health circumstances.
 - (c) Come from disadvantaged economic backgrounds.
- The maximum amount of emergency scholarship aid per person per year is one-half of the amount of the school's tuition cost.
- VIII. The board shall encourage participation in continuing education programs by ministers of the Little Rock Conference.
 - A. Enrollment is encouraged in the "Group Guided Study Program" of Perkins School of Theology or in a comparable study program of St. Paul School of Theology.
 - B. The board will underwrite the total travel expense, and board and room (if any) of a faculty member of cooperating institutions conducting one day seminars for authorized study groups. Arrangements for paying these expenses will be made by the study group through the board's registrar.
 - C. Pastors are encouraged to participate in at least one continuing education experience annually (Refer to Par. 355 of the 1972 Discipline). The following shall serve as policy guidelines:
 - 1. Members of the Conference, participating in continuing education enterprises approved by the Committee on Continuing Education, may receive up to \$100 to cover costs for tuition, board and books. Persons are responsible for their own travel.
 - 2. Persons seeking financial aid for continuing education shall secure an application form from the chairperson of continuing education, Ed Hollenbeck.
 - No person shall be given more than \$100 each calendar year for continuing education.
 - 4. In hardship cases, ministers can apply to the Committee on Continuing Education, for help to attend Pastor's School. Such help will only be granted after other avenues for aid have been exhausted.
 - 5. No financial aid is available for Minister's Week.
- IX. The board shall give assistance in a reasonable amount for physical examinations for persons to be admitted as associate, probationary or full members.

Requests and Recommendations

I. The board, each district superintendent, pastor and local church shall hold up to young persons the need for ministers and the challenge of the ministry, that may enable them to hear the call.

- II. As the first step into the ministry, candidates shall enroll for studies for license to preach with the Department of the Ministry, Division of the Ordained Ministry.
- III. Each pastor shall obtain folders on the course of study and the books for the course of the license to preach.
- IV. We recommend that our Conference have a "Bishop's Convocation on the Ministry and Other Church Vocations." Such a convocation should be organized and implemented by our Board and the Conference Committee on Vocations.
- V. We assume our Conference's share of financial responsibility for the Arkansas Pastor's School.
- VI. The Annual Conference Council on Finance and Administration is requested to grant:
 - A. An appropriation of a percentage from conference benevolences based on the board's financial needs that are not met by other sources.
 - B. An apportionment to local churches for the Ministerial Education Fund based on 2% of the local church budget excluding benevolences, building and debt service.
- VII. We express our appreciation for the support given the Ministerial Education Fund by the churches of the Annual Conference. We urge every church to continue to give full cooperation and support of its share of the Ministerial Education Fund for the remainder of this calendar year and in 1975.
- VIII. Ministers may be given a minimum of two week's vacation annually and a minimum of one week annually to participate in a continuing education enterprise. (See par. 355 of 1972 Discipline)

Resolution

I. Resolved: THAT the Board of the Ministry be charged with the task of relating in a responsibility-line directly to the Local Church through the District Board of Ministry and the Local Church Pastor-Parish Committee.

THAT the Pastor-Parish Committee be the contact in the Local Church for the implementing of program and concern for the ministry,

THAT in the Arkansas Area the concern of the Pastor-Parish Committee is for the total parish ministry: in cooperation with the Secretary of Enlistment recruitment of the finest persons for the ministry, promotion of the financial support of theological education through the Ministerial Education Fund, encouraging opportunities for continuing education and re-tooling for their own pastor and others in terms of what the need is and what opportunities are available;

THAT the process of planning and implementation of Ministry program include the Pastor-Parish Committee.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

1. The Board of Missions continues to consider its first priority to be Church Extension and Special Mission Projects. Others being Mission Salary Aid, Parish Development, Missionary Education and Interpretation and Town and Country concerns.

- 2. We have fulfilled our Conference responsibilities through Church Extension Fund grants and Special Church Extension. The policies of the Board remain unchanged and may be found on page 116 of the 1973 Journal of the Little Rock Annual Conference. Applications for Church Extension assistance should be made to the Reverend George Tanner, Extension Secretary.
- 3. The Mission Salary Aid Program will be sustained either through the Board of Missions or through such agency as new structure may designate. Schedule of Salary Aid for Conference Year 1974-75 will be distributed to Conference prior to action and approval.
- 4. An active effort will be made to serve the Churches better in New Ways of Operation in the Church through Parish Development.
- 5. Missionary Education and Interpretation is promoted by the work of our Conference Missionary Secretary, The Reverend Thomas Abney, and the District Missionary Secretaries. As a sponsoring agency of the Arkansas School of Christian Mission, the Board offers study in the field of Missionary Education. We propose a Mission Tour to give Local Church Mission Leaders a look at the Church in Mission in our own region.
- 6. The concerns of Town and Country are being carried out by a Special Committee on Town and Country and will be included in the report of the chairman, the Reverend Robert Van Hook II.
- 7. We are seeking aid from both General and Jurisdiction Boards as our role is changing.
- 8. Working with the South Central Jurisdiction Task Force on Urban Ministries we are preparing a study of the changing neighborhoods in Little Rock, from which could come some recommendations as to more effective use of existing facilities and personnel to make the Church more visible in these areas.
- 9. We understand that study for an entirely new approach to the financial needs of Aldersgate Camp is being made. We endorse the work of Aldersgate and look forward with interest to the approach that is being developed.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

The report of the Town and Country section and of the administration of salary supplements and Church Extension reflect our concern for and our activity in the local Church and Annual Conference areas of Mission. These involvements close to home are essential and productive and we are able to note immediately their effect in improved pastoral leadership and expanded worship or educational facilities. Indeed, few Annual Conferences can match our supportive and developmental work in Local Mission. And that work is growing as assistance in relocation of churches and new site purchases for future growth are gathered up in our concern. One new evidence of the responding spirit of this Annual Conference to the missional needs among us is the appointment of a task group within the Conference Board of Missions for the purpose of identifying and coordinating the resources available to strengthen our black churches that they may move into the fulness of their potential.

Nevertheless our Lord urges us on and sets before us the challenge of ministering in Mission to special needs in the community around us. I sense a questioning expression on His face regarding our response to opportunities we recognized and embraced in this Sanctuary last year, and we too must question whether we have really cared for the Day Care Center at St. Paul's in Maumelle where only one contribution of less than \$200.00 has been received against a goal of \$3,500.00, we must question whether we have really cared about the work of Aldersgate Camp as it seeks to expand its valuable services to the handicapped, the aged, and the less privileged of God's children. And, question again the measure of our support of Spanish speaking work in the Rio Grande Conference, Lydia Patterson Institute, and the Oklahoma Indian Mission which we accepted as sharing privileges and then left unfulfilled by reaching barely half our goal for giving simply because these Jurisdictional needs were no longer under the discipline of apportionment but left instead to the voluntary charities of our sometimes forgetful hearts. — The Lord loves a cheerful giver but it appears we must be better informed of the joys of giving to these on the doorsteps of our churches and our state. And so, following this Conference an emphasis will be placed on our Advance Special work in this area and in the Jurisdiction — and for now I set before you this proposal; that we renew our pledge of concern and support for these mission needs as follows:

St. Paul's Day Care Center at Maumelle; the goal of \$3,500.00

Lydia Patterson Institute; the goal of \$9,000.00

Oklahoma Indian Mission; the goal of \$9,000.00

Rio Grande Conference; the goal of \$8,000.00

Camp Aldersgate; all that the goodness of our hearts can supply and to complete the accepted support of the Boy's School in Nepal.

To help us appreciate these mission areas we are further proposing a tour of Mission Projects in Arkansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Louisiana, and Mississippi. The tour, to be conducted in the Fall of this year, will cover more than 1,000 miles, touch on a variety of Mission enterprises in ours and surrounding states, and afford us a first-hand experience of why we are called to respond. The details of the tour will be publicized as soon as they are available.

There are some other informational helps for our understanding and appreciation of more extended ministries in Mission. These include the display table located in the Fellowship Hall below us and a preview of worthwhile audio-visuals in room 214 immediately following this session of the Conference. Further down the line will come the itineration of missionaries in local churches: James Bullard from Algeria in June — Sadish Gyan from India (a missionary to the Kentucky Conference) in Warren and Hamburg on June 16th, Clifton Ackerman from the Navaho mission in July — and others later in the

year as their availability may permit. And then, our own Arkansas School of Christian Mission at Hendrix in July will lay the foundation for local Church Mission Studies that the hearts of our people may be opened as channels for an even greater outreach. Details of the School of Mission are available in brochure form at our display downstairs, but an emphasis needs to be made on scholarships to the School for those who need to attend but are financially hindered. There will be available to each District two School of Missions scholarships to be provided by the School for those young persons recommended by the District Superintendent and the District Mission Secretary. Much more could be said of learning opportunities through Summer work-Camps for young people in Mission sites, through Mission festivals in Districts or local churches, through the use of free fourth Sunday World Service bulletins and dozens of other mediums that I can channel to you on request.

We need to know the need because when we do know we respond. I rejoice in the substance of that claim as reflected in the higher mark of Mission giving achieved this year — a year which saw us meet our World Service share in full, in which we increased our National Advance giving and our giving to U.M.C.O.R.. A year in which we almost fully subscribed our part of the support of the Nepal Boys School and in which our per capita giving for Advance Specials rose to achieve the rank of eighth place among the seventeen Conferences of this Jurisdiction. So, let us learn — let us learn so that the decline of missionary personnel support may never be known among us, so that those who look to us may ever look in trusting hope rather than anxious uncertainty, and that for our part the world's darkness may turn to dawning, and Christ's great Kingdom come on earth.

BOARD OF PENSIONS

Recommendations

- 1. We recommend that the annuity rate be set at \$63.00 per service year beginning January 1, 1975 for both retired members of the Conference and Special Conference Claimants.
- 2. We recommend that the apportionments to the charges of the Annual Conference for Conference Claimants be an amount equal to 25% of the pastor's salary and that after the cost of the current distribution is paid the remainder be paid into the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund.
- 3. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1261 Section 5 of the 1972 Discipline that the Sunday following Easter, Apri' 6, 1975, be observed as Retired Ministers Day. Each pastor is urged to acquaint his congregation with the pension program of the Conference as part of the observance, and, if possible, to use a retired minister in the Worship Service.
- 4. We recommend that the pastor of each Local Church present the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas Memorial Program for Retired Minister's Pension Fund to the Members of his congregation and urge their participation in the program.

We request that the Conference Statistician provide a column in the Conference Journal listing the number of Memorials made through the Local Church to the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas.

- 5. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1259 Section 5 of the 1972 Discipline the approval by the Annual Conference that special appointments shall be listed in the Conference Journal as follows: (1) with annuity claim (a) upon the Annual Conference, or (b) upon a General Board, an institution, or an agency of the United Methodist Church; (2) without annuity claim upon this Annual Conference.
- 6. We recommend that the Board continue to apportion to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claim on the Conference the sum of \$360.00 per year in accord with the 1972 Discipline Par. 1259 Section 3.a(3); and that said apportionments be paid to

the treasurer of the Little Rock Conference Board of Pensions not later than 15 days prior to the end of the fiscal year. And that a like amount be assessed upon the office of the District Superintendent and said amount be paid from the District Superintendent's Fund.

- 7. We recommend that eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants have the death benefit program provided for them with the contribution to be paid by the Conference Board of Pensions in accordance with the program of the Conference Committee on Group Insurance.
- 8. We recommend that the Conference Board of Pensions pay 60% of the annual payment of the premium of the Group Hospitalization for all eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants. In addition, we recommend that the eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants have the voluntary portion of the Medicare paid by the Conference Board of Pensions.
- 9. We recommend that all retired ministers who serve appointments under the District Superintendent, and receive less than \$1,000.00 in Annual salary and expense from the Charge, will have their contributions and premiums paid by the Conference Board of Pensions as outlined in Par. 7 and 8 of this report.

Furthermore, we recommend that the Church or Charge, served by a retired minister who receives \$1,000.00 or more salary or expense from the Charge, will pay the required 60% of the HMEP premium and the retired minister pay the remaining 40%; that the Charge pay the required 60% of the Death Benefit Program premium with the Conference Board of Pensions paying the remaining 40% of the premium.

- 10. We recommend that an annual amount of \$1,200.00 from the pensions of each retired minister of the Little Rock Conference be designated as housing allowance.
- 11. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1260 Section 6 of the 1972 Discipline that there shall be organized from the membership of the Board of Pensions of the Little Rock Conference a committee to compare the records of the amount paid by each pastoral Charge for the support of pastors and for pension benefit purposes, computing the proportional distribution thereof and keeping a permanent record of defaults of the ministers in the conference who have failed to observe the provision in Par. 1260 Section 6 pertaining to proportional payment; and shall render annually to each minister and charge in default a statement of the amounts in default for that and preceding years.

In event of default by any Pastoral Charge after due notification by the committee, liens shall be filed against future pensions and the names of the churches and ministers along with the amount in default shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

- 12. We recommend that all the Service Years of each minister be listed in one column in the Conference Journal and in another column list the number of these years for which he has a claim on the Little Rock Conference.
- 13. Since the Little Rock Conference has established a minimum Salary considered to meet the needs of a full-time pastor, we recommend that (1) A minister who receives the minimum salary or more must derive his sole compensation from his Charge and/or Conference sources in order to be eligible for pension benefits as a full-time minister. (2) If a minister receives less than the Conference minimum salary from church sources, but earns more than 40% of his total compensation from outside employment, he is not eligible for pension credit. (3) Student supply time is to be considered as employment aiding one preparing for full-time service as is required to meet minimal standards as a Conference member or certified associate member for actually serving full-time pastorates. The student is not eligible for pension benefits.

14. By vote of the Annual Conference we entered the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund program as of January 1, 1974. We are now a full partner in this program.

We want to express our appreciation to all Local Churches of the Little Rock Conference for their participation in the additional budget askings for an eight year period.

We are now engaged in a Special Gifts Campaign to raise one million dollars to supplement the funds mentioned above.

15. In the last Conference Journal we erroneously listed Everett C. Patton on Disability leave. He was not eligible to be placed in this category because he had 40 plus of years Service.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

"The United Methodist Church has provided that it shall be a denomination which is racially inclusive. By action of the 1972 General Conference, all racial structures shall be terminated by July 1, 1973. This historic action was a long time in the making. When one considers that the history of black Methodist can be traced to the first Methodist 'congregation' of five people organized in the home of Philip Embury in 1766, it is somewhat ironic to admit the existence of the many walls which have separated black and white Christians in The United Methodist Church.

"Those walls, however, have been crumbling ever since their erection! The last structural walls have been decreed by General Conference to come down not later than July 1, 1973. This is significant, as well as consistent with the gospel we proclaim.

"However, there are other 'walls'; walls which are not structural, they are, nonetheless, as demonic as the segregated structures. They are walls of prejudice, insensitivity, and apathy. It could be tragic indeed, if we were successful in eliminating the structures of segregation and discrimination, and fail to replace them with the structure and spirit of Christian community."

Goals

- 1. Re-examination of merger.
- 2. Complete publication of Review Committee's Evaluation. (Review

Committee from National Commission on Religion and Race met January 25, 1974.)

- 3. Move to implement the recommendations of the evaluation through District Consultations and Conversations.
- 4. Evaluate the results of 1973 report to Annual Conference.
- 5. Recruitment and adequate pay of ministers.
- 6. Concern that there be a black District Superintendent in the Conference.
- 7. Evangelism complete inclusiveness to deepen and widen concept of Evangelism.

We elected the Reverend William H. Robinson as a consultant to the Commission.

RECOMMENDATIONS

COMING FROM THE MERGER REVIEW AND EVALUATION COMMITTEE, THE GENERAL COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE:

The following recommendations are offered as actions necessary to enhance inclusiveness within the Annual Conferences:

- 1. The Annual Conference Commission on Religion and Race create a special Task Force to review the situation at the Children's Home. A report on its findings and recommendations, should be made to the Board of Trustees of the Home, the Annual Conference, the Conference Council on Ministries, and the Bishop. A copy of the report should be made available to the General Commission on Religion and Race, and the Division of Health and Welfare Ministries of the General Board of Global Ministries.
- The appointment of a Black District Superintendent in each of the Annual Conferences.
- Efforts should be made to strengthen the composition, image and role of the Commission on Religion and Race in each Conference.
- The Little Rock Conference should develop a strategy and policy for churches in racially changing communities.
- 5. The Conference should develop a program of recruitment for both Black lay and ministerial leadership.
- 6. The appointment or securing of a Black youth coordinator should have strong consideration.
- 7. The Conference Commission on Religion and Race cooperate with all the appropriate groups in the Annual Conferences in the implementation of these recommendations, and make progress reports to the Annual Conference and the General Commission on Religion and Race.

DR. J. E. LOWERY, Chairman MRS. THELMA BARNES REV. DUNCAN HUNTER MR. RHETT JACKSON The following is the Conference Commission's initial response to the above recommendations.

- 1. A special task force has been named, to be at work immediately.
- 2. We take the position that the Bishop will always consider the appointment of a Black District Superintendent until one is appointed.
- 3. We propose that members of the commission will act as liaison to Boards and Agencies. We will work within the new structure.
- 4. We propose the development of an Urban Ministry project in the city of Little Rock as an Annual Conference model to challenge the support of the Board of Ministry, Board of Missions and District Superintendents of the Little Rock Conference.
- 5. We will continue to study ways to carry out this recommendation.
- 6. We recommend that the Little Rock Conference secure a Black Youth Coordinator.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE CAMP TANAKO

The Little Rock Conference is extremely fortunate in having Camp Tanako as one of its assets. The facility comprises 286 acres of land and near a half million dollars in buildings and equipment. It is debt-free except for \$2,000.00 owed the Arkansas Bank and Trust Company of Hot Springs, \$6,000.00 owed the Little Rock Conference, and \$5,000.00 plus interest owed to the Board of Ministry.

The indebtedness was reduced \$4,000.00 plus interest in 1973. Many improvements were made. Mr. Billy Callison, the Superintendent, is keeping the buildings and grounds in excellent condition. Hopefully, the indebtedness can be liquidated in the next few years. The property was surveyed in 1973 by Thomas Abney and Dan George who made a map of the whole area. The deeds and titles are kept in the vault at Methodist Headquarters.

There were 2,250 children, youth, and adult campers during the eleven-week camping season during 1973. The staff was made up of college students and a permanent staff. Mrs. Billy Callison was Supervisor of the kitchen. Mr. Paul Hankins served as Program Director and he will serve in the same position this summer. Ministers of the Conference will serve as Pastors in each session as last year.

Due to the increased cost of food and other supplies, your Board of Trustees authorized the raising of the fees this year one dollar per day. We feel that this will offset increased costs.

Camp Tanako also needs to replace old and out-worn equipment and build an incinerator to take care of disposable material. These items will be of considerable expense and your Board of Trustees feels that they need to be done immediately.

We are grateful to all churches and individuals for their support. We feel that again this year we will have another fine camping season.

We, therefore, recommend (1) that churches and individuals continue their financial support through their budgets and by special gifts, (2) that the second Sunday in August, the 11th, be designated as Camp Tanako Sunday, and a special offering be taken, and (3) that the Council on Finance and Administration continue the apportionment for Camp Tanako at \$9,000.00.

DESCRIPTION OF PROPERTY LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE CAMP

The South Half (S½) of the South Half (S½); the North Half (N½) of the Southeast Quarter (SE¼); the Northeast Quarter (NE¼) of the Southwest Quarter (SW¼); and the Southeast Quarter (SE¼) of the Northwest Quarter (NW¼), all lying above the extreme flood water line of Lake Catherine, which Lake is formed and created by the erection of Remmel Dam on Ouachita River except about one (1) acre or less in the Northeast corner of the Northeast Quarter (NE¼) of the Southeast Quarter (SE½) lying East of Cooper Creek to the East line of said forty (40) acre tract and running South between said Creek and Highway to a point on said Creek where the concrete ford crossing is erected, all of the above property being in Section 31, Township 3 South, Range 18 West, Garland County, Arkansas, and containing 285 acres, more or less.

Note: The above property was mortgaged to First Federal Savings and Loan Association in Malvern, Arkansas, on Feb. 17, 1955. This mortgage was repaid and the Deed was released and said release was duly recorded in the Circuit Clerk's Office in Garland County, Arkansas, Book 470 Page 111.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

We recommend that the two acres of land in Hot Spring County, the site of the Clear Creek Methodist Church, be sold to Shirley B. Bailey for the sum of \$500.00 which is above two different appraisal prices. Money received to be turned over to the District Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Arkadelphia District.

We recommend that the Wesley's Chapel Methodist Church building in Union County (abandoned) to be given to the Longview Baptist Church congregation (Black). The building is rapidly deteriorating. The removal of the building will entail no cost to the Little Rock Conference.

We recommend that the three acres of land, the site of the Oak Grove Methodist Church, in Saline County be sold for \$450.00. Proceeds to be turned to the District Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Little Rock District.

We recommend that the Pleasant Hill Church property located in Saline County be given to the Cemetary Association Incorporated. This property would involve at least two legal court decisions to determine ownership of part of the land. We respectfully suggest that we give the Cemetary Association a Quit Claim Deed to all equity we may have in the property.

We have had a request that we deed a plot of ground at Roland, Arkansas, once the church site of a Methodist Church, in the Southwest Conference, to Senior Citizen's Group for a mobile home site for an activity center. We respectfully suggest that we grant them permission to use said site until further information is obtained.

We recommend that the Mt. Vernon Methodist Church and land be sold to the Southern Methodist Congregation, deed being made to the present Trustees and their successors. Proceeds turned over to the District Board of Missions and Church Extension of the Camden District.

Uniting Methodist women has continued to be our number one priority this year on the local, district, and conference level. We are striving to become an all inclusive organization of which our purpose speaks. As our National Assembly theme "Many Gifts — One Spirit" has enriched our lives, we hope to enrich the

Our six districts report a total membership of 9,100 with \$95,851.33 being sent to the Womens Division on pledge giving. An additional \$4,467.44 was given to specific projects through our Call to Prayer and Self Denial Offering and \$2,349.09 was given in Supplementary gifts.

We continue to be interested in the Youth Ministry of our Little Rock Conference and contributed \$1,100. from our Elizabeth Thornberg Workman Fund for this ministry. \$150.00 was given to Philander Smith College in scholarships.

Aldersgate Camp has been of special interest to our women this year with its expanded mission emphasis. Our conference sent \$1,500 to this mission project along with many contributions from the local units.

Our conference mission team responded to the desires for a leadership training event for the district officers in Pine Bluff in October. 78% of all the district officers were present for this training. From there all districts held workshops for the local units in which members of the conference team were available for interpreting the program of leadership responsibilities.

October 4-7, 1973 was an exciting time in the life of our organization, when our first National Assembly was held in Cincinnati, Ohio and was attended by 53 ladies from our conference. As mentioned earlier, the theme of this meeting was "Many Gifts — One Spirit". The highlight of this meeting was the communion service on Sunday morning being administered by all United Methodist Women Ministers.

"Are YOU Listening?" is the theme for our Arkansas School of Christian Mission scheduled for July 24-28 at Hendrix College in Conway. Dr. Lindsey Pherigo will be teaching the Bible Study on Jonah "Rather Die than Live". Other studies are "Our Faith in the Midst of Pluralism" and "Education for Global Consciousness". We are hoping that many of our women, men, and youth will take part in this educational opportunity.

Our First Annual Meeting will be held October 19 in First United Methodist Church in Warren with our Jurisdiction President, Mrs. E. L. Ferris, as our guest speaker. The Warren Unit and I are extending a special invitation to each of you to be present for this great occasion.

Goals for the Conference Executive Committee are:

- (1) To provide opportunities for interpreting and understanding the program of United Methodist Women.
- (2) Through the use of an information letter, the chairman of the Conference Nominating Committee will inform District and Local Nominating Committees about the importance of knowing job responsibilities.
- (3) Provide leadership opportunities for District Mission Teams for Friday afternoon, July 26 at Hendrix College, Conway, Ark.
- (4) Provide a Spiritual Enrichment Weekend for local, district, and conference women in the Spring of 1975.
- (5) By 1976, strive to have every organized church represented, either by a local unit of United Methodist Women or a representative.

May our Motto be "Each One get One" and then our organization will continue to grow both spiritually and numerically. Our membership is a responsibility of each of us.

VII. Memoirs

WILLARD R. BURKS

The Rev. Willard Reppard Burks, born June 8, 1897 in Deckerd, Tennessee died April 30, 1974 in a Texarkana hospital. He had lived at Hope after superannuation with Jewell Crumpler Burks, whom he married August 29, 1932.

He is survived by his wife; a son, Willard R. Burks, Jr., of Pine Bluff; a

daughter, Mrs. Jack L. Royal of Texarkana; a sister, Mrs. H. A. Poindexter of Tennessee, and six grandchildren.

Pastor Burks attended the University of the South at Sewanee and graduated from Chattanooga University. He attended Perkins School of Theology. He was admitted on trial to the Little Rock ANNUAL Conference in 1924.

He served the following pastorates: Forrest Park, Buena Vista, Junction City, Tillar, Dermott, Vantrease (El Dorado), Smackover, 28th Street in Little Rock, Prescott and Lonoke. After his superannuation in 1962, he served Hinton and Sardis and was minister of visitation at First Church, Hope. He was a former state chaplain of the Masons and a World War I veteran.

He was buried from First Church, Hope, May 3rd by the Reverends Norris Steele and D. Mouzon Mann and interred in the Memory Gardens of Hope.

Willard was undiluted in his dedication to the ministry of our Lord Jesus Christ in the United Methodist Church and to his family. He held the two, ministry and family, in delicate balance: the call of one didn't hamper the life of the other.

Evidently, early, he conquered ministerial status anxieties for he never showed any burden of envy of others or worry about his own place. Beautifully, he was confident of that place and was freed for fuller service.

His family didn't suffer because of his commitment to the ministry. Indeed, the role he played in each area aided and abetted his labor in the other.

Birth is a radical, earth shaking event. So is death. Willard spoke to his son in the last days of the enormity of the crossing.

But God gave him blessed peace. The One sufficient in his birth and subsequently was more than equal to the ultimate moment of death.

"Death (was) swallowed up in victory."

ALVA C. ROGERS

Rev. Alva Claude Rogers was born May 16, 1882 at Kingsland, Arkansas, the son of Spiraus Jefferson and Alice Irene Johnson Rogers. On August 13, 1905 he was united in Holy matrimony to Adelia Viola Mitchell at Kingsland, Arkansas. On June 2, 1962, after almost 57 years of life together, she went to her



eternal reward. On May 4, 1963 he was again united in marriage, this time to Mrs. Bulah Gen Langrell Goodall of Pine Bluff. The ceremony was performed by his long time friend, the Rev. Dr. Clem Baker. This was a most rewarding marriage for both of them. She, being a registered nurse, cared for him tenderly in his declining years. He had no children, but her children accepted him graciously.

On February 6, 1974 he entered our Father's house of many mansions from his home in Pine Bluff. He was almost 92 years of age. Memorial services were held for him in Robinson's Funeral Chapel in Pine Bluff, Arkansas by his pastor, Rev. Carl V. Matthew, assisted by Dr. Arthur Terry, a long time friend. Interment was in Belwood cemetery in Pine Bluff.

Brother Rogers was educated in the schools of Kingsland and Hendrix College. On July 14, 1910 he was granted a Local Preachers License by the Camden District Conference. In November of 1913 he was admitted on trial as a probationer in the Little Rock Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. He pursued the Conference Course of Study and was ordained Deacon and admitted into full connection at the session of the Annual Conference at Monticello, Arkansas, in November 1915, Bishop H. C. Morrison presiding. Two years later, in November 1917, he was ordained Elder by Bishop Edwin D. Mouson at the session of the Annual Conference in Arkadelphia, Arkansas.

At the session of the Annual Conference in June 1952, at Hot Springs, he was granted the retired relationship, Bishop Paul E. Martin, presiding. He had 39 years of effective service. For ten years after that he served as a Retired Supply, and then for five more years he had a regular preaching appointment once a month at Trinity on the Grady charge. His appointments were as follows:

1913-14 Chidester Circuit; 1914-17 Strong Circuit; 1917-19 Mount Pleasant Circuit in Drew County; 1919-22 Wilmot; 1922-24 Altheimer-Wabbaseka; 1924-25 Humphrey; 1925-26 Wesson, a mill town in Union County; 1926-27 Keo-Tomberlin; 1927-28 Bearden; 1928-30 Foreman; 1930-32 Dierks; 1932-36 Emmet Circuit; 1936-37 Lake Village; 1937-38 Henderson in Little Rock; 1938-39 Murfreesboro; 1939-42 Lockesburg; 1942-44 Norphlet; 1944-46 Okolona; 1946-47 Star City; 1947-48 Sherrill-Tucker; 1947-52 Des Arc; Then as a Retired Supply, 1952-55 Mountain View and Markham; 1955-57 St. Charles and Pleasant Grove; 1957-62 Sulphur Springs near Pine Bluff.

Brother Rogers ministry can be characterized by this statement: The fervor of an evangelist in the pulpit. The compassion of a shepherd in the parish.

VERNON BRYAN STEPHENS

Vernon Bryan Stephens was born in Gurdon, Arkansas on February 1, 1919, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Stephens. He attended Gurdon High School and Hendrix College receiving his A.B. degree in 1942. He completed his seminary training at Perkins School of Theology, S.M.U. and returned to the Little Rock



Conference and was received on trial and ordained deacon in 1945. The Conference received him into full connection and ordained him an Elder in 1947. He served twenty-nine years in the itenerate ministry and one year as a supply preacher.

While attending seminary in Dallas, Bryan met and married Miss Juanita (Nita) Fogleman. Their wedding ceremony was performed in the University Park Methodist Church on June 23, 1944. Three children were born into the home, namely, Mark, Roger and Mary Anita.

Bryan was a splendid preacher of the gospel. The writer knew him for thirty-seven years of his life, and his main concern in all these years was to be a good pastor to his people and a competent preacher of the

good news of Jesus Christ.

Those who knew him well, knew that he stayed close to his church and sought few outside diversions. More than most he stayed away from unnecessary meetings and kept himself from pre-occupations that might turn him aside from the thing to which he had dedicated his life. He had a magnificent obsession about being a devoted pastor and an intelligent proclaimer of the gospel.

The charges he served so ably were: Almyra, Rison, Sheridan, Stephens, St. Luke (Little Rock), England, McGehee, Highland (Little Rock), and First

Church, Stuttgart.

He did accept several positions of high responsibility on important boards and agencies of our Annual Conference. He served on the Board of Evangelism, the Board of Education, and was its chairman and vice chairman. He also served ably on the Committee on Insurance and was at the time of his passing the Conference Statistician.

By his passing the Little Rock Conference has lost one of its splendid

preachers and pastors and one of its most loyal minister-servants.

Bryan passed from this life on April 18, 1974. His funeral service was held in First United Methodist Church, Stuttgart. Dr. Virgil Keeley, Dr. J. Edward Dunlap and James E. Major conducted the service. The interment was in Lone Tree Cemetery in Stuttgart.

ROSCOE C. WALSH

Reverend Roscoe C. Walsh, son of M. P. Walsh and Rittie Stephens Walsh, was born on February 25, 1882 in the DeGray Community near Arkadelphia, Arkansas. He died on July 25, 1973 and the funeral service was held at Murry-Ruggles Funeral Home in Arkadelphia on July 27. They were conducted by Dr.



John P. Miles, his Pastor and the Reverend J. M. Hamilton, his long-time friend and former District Superintendent. His body was laid to rest in Ebenezer Cemetery. He was survived by his wife, Era Cates Walsh. They had been married 63 years.

Brother Roscoe was one of 12 children. His was a rough and hard life that produced one of the greatest spirits to ever come out of Arkansas Methodism. The stories told to the young men coming into the Conference about Roscoe have made him a legend in his own time. He was called to preach early in life, but he resisted that call and farmed and did carpenter work instead. He married Miss Fannie Smart and to them was born two daughters who died together in early childhood, and soon after the mother was buried by

their side. Brother Roscoe later married Miss Era Cates, his lifelong and devoted companion. No sweeter woman ever graced the parsonages of Arkansas Methodism.

Not too many years after their marriage, Brother Roscoe surrendered to the Ministry at the age of 35. He had no formal education so he entered grammar school at Friendship, Arkansas. Roscoe was about 6'5'', 250 pounds, sitting behind a desk with the 3rd and 4th graders. Those children who are now in their sixties remember teasing him and how he just smiled and told them a funny story that soon had all of them on his side. The next year he graduated and went to Henderson-Brown Academy for his High School training. He took the gold medal for the top student. Roscoe took a year in Henderson-Brown College and was admitted to the Annual Conference in 1922 and was ordained a deacon and came into full connection and ordained an Elder in 1924. His churches were never the large, prestigious appointments, — never the high steepled churches in the city, but rather the circuits and the small towns in the hills that he loved so dearly. The following are his appointments: Friendship, Traskwood, Hampton, Humphrey, Mineral Springs, Bingen, Hampton, Horatio, Dierks, Sparkman, Carthage, St. Charles, Ark. City, Bearden, Forester, Okalona.

These bare facts can not do justice to this giant of a man. To me he was like the tall virgin timber of my childhood that once cut can never be replaced by second growth. To those of you who did not know him, let me give you an idea of whom he was by sharing with you his funeral and a few stories of his life.

Not too long before his death, Roscoe called me to talk with him. He said, "John, you're a good young man and I know everyone brags on your short funeral services. But, Boy, let me tell you something — when I die you keep them there for a full hour at my funeral, that's the last time them folks are going to gather around Roscoe, so don't you be in no hurry to let them go!" Then he told me what he wanted done and said, "If at the end you run out of steam, just have some of my brothers stand up and testify what great times we had with the Lord." Well, Brother Jess and I did what he said. The Men's Bible Class sang 'Amazing Grace', the congregation sang a few of the old songs together, I told some of the stories that are classic about Roscoe. We cried a while and laughed a while, especially about the stories involving his quick wit. The classic one being the time a seminary Professor was making fun of him at Pastor's school because he was so old and bald. He kept calling him Father Abraham. One day he called out loudly in the cafeteria when Roscoe came in, "Lo, here comes Father

Abraham." Roscoe drew himself up slowly and said, "I am neither Abraham nor Isaac nor Jacob. Rather I am Saul, the son of Kish, and I have been out looking for my father's asses and lo, I think I have just found one!" The story about the barber and what he said to Fred Harrison in church one Sunday morning, the story of the Model-T Ford in Amity, his burning all the mattresses at Sparkman in the back yard; the joy of life that he had was in all of our minds when we buried him that day.

After we had kept them there the full time, all the ministers came up and gathered around his casket and Brother Jess told about how he was there when they read his first appointment: FRIENDSHIP — R. C. WALSH, and he called them, all to memory while we stood and listened. He said, "Now, my brother, I'll call his final appointment for I am as certain of it as I am of the rest: HEAVEN — R. C. WALSH." And then we sang "A Charge to Keep I Have" as we have at

every Annual Conference after the appointments are read.

Brother Roscoe asked that we drive him out by the Davidson Camp Ground for he had not missed a camp meeting since the day it was established and he wanted to go by one more time and let them know that Roscoe was still with them in spirit. From there we went out to his family cemetery at Ebeneezer down a little country lane to a shady hill filled with his beloved dead. And so we buried him on that hill overlooking his fishing pond where he had caught his big bass and we came away from the cemetery rejoicing that we had known a man like Brother Roscoe who loved the Lord in both life and death. Never a man has served this Conference with a keener wit or a more determined and dedicated spirit than Roscoe did.

As for me, I thank God that I knew him and that I was able to be his Pastor, and share for a few years in the utter joy of his spirit.

CURTIS W. WILLIAMS

Reverend Curtis W. Williams was born May 29, 1899, in Hot Springs, Arkansas, but at the age of six weeks moved to Benton. At the age of nine, he professed his faith in Christ and united with the Salem United Methodist Church (Saline County).



He was licensed to preach in 1917 and entered Hendrix Academy and subsequently Hendrix College. With meager financial resources, he worked his way through school washing dishes, serving tables, and later chopping wood and milking cows for a preacher's widow.

After completing his education at Hendrix, he was employed as a deputy clerk in the Pulaski County Sheriff's and County Clerk's offices and later as a supervisor of the WPA. During this period he served the church primarily in the area of music which remained a great love of his until his death. He organized and directed a community band in Mabelvale and an orchestra in the Sweet Home Community, and was director of Asbury United Methodist Church choir for

approximately four years. He also led singing in revivals across the conference. In 1927 he married the former Ruth Morton of Little Rock. To this union were born two daughters, Carolyn Ruth and Nancy June.

In 1937 he agreed to serve as supply pastor of the Douglassville-Geyer Springs charge for one year. He continued serving that pastorate until November, 1944, during which time he completed his studies for the ministry and was admitted to Full Connection in the Litte Rock Conference in 1940.

Following the seven-year pastorate at Douglassville (now Western Hills)-Geyer Springs, he also served these appointments: Pullman Heights, Hot Springs, Dumas, District and Conference evangelist (1948-49); Carlisle, DeWitt, Nashville, Hunter Memorial, Little Rock, and Primrose.

After his retirement from the Conference in 1965, he moved to Benton where he served for seven years as minister of visitation and a teacher of the

Men's Bible Class of First United Methodist Church of Benton.

Brother Williams died Thursday, October 11, 1973, at the age of seventy-four years. The funeral service was held at the First United Methodist Church of Benton by Dr. Edward Hollenbeck and burial was at Forest Hills Cemetery. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ruth Morton Williams; two daughters, Mrs. Carolyn Baker of Enid, OKLAHOMA AND Mrs. June Price of Benton; two sisters, Mrs. Lilla Harrison of Benton and Miss Gladys Williams of Little Rock; four grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

He was a "consecrated Christian and minister, true to his God, his church, his wife, his family, and his fellowmen. The world is richer because he lived,

served, and died in faith."

GEORGE R. TOWNSEND

The Rev. George Raymond Townsend was born near Center Point, Howard County, Arkansas in 1884. He died May 3, 1973, at his home near Dierks, Arkansas. Mr. Townsend was a life-long resident of Howard County. He was married to Miss Annie Katie Walls in 1904, and they celebrated their 69th



wedding aniversary. Mrs. Townsend died January 1, 1972. Mr. Townsend was licensed to preach April 26, 1926, and ordained a deacon November 13, 1932. He served 48 years as a local Methodist minister serving several circuits in the surrounding communities including Umpire, Langley, and New Hope.

One of the outstanding qualities his ministry was his personal relationship with all the people with whom he came in contact. The influence that he shed was shown by the number of people attending his funeral and many telling what he had done for them and the guidance he had given them.

MRS. W. NEILL HART, SR.

In II Kings 4:8 we read: "Elisha passed to Shunem, where was a great woman." Subsequent verses in the story provide enough information about this woman to fully justify her being called great. Jerrine Oates Hart was such a woman, whose greatness was much the same as the greatness of the woman of Shunem — the greatness of service.

Mrs. Hart, born Jerrine Elzabeth Oates, February 25, 1905, in Pine Bluff, Arkansas, was married to W. Neill Hart, Sr. on June 5, 1926, in Pine Bluff, and died in a Litle Rock Hospital, October 20, 1973. Dr. Hart survives, along with their three children: Mrs. Ed Hilliard, Dallas, Texas; Mrs. Richard Burns, Niles, Ohio; and W. Neill Hart, Jr., Little Rock, and twelve grand-children, and one great grand-son.

Jerrine majored in family life. Her first love was her home and her family, and it was a beautiful family life. Her deep interest and concern for the family flowered out into the local Church and community and in the Church at large. She served as District Director and Conference Director of Children's Work. For eight years she was Director of Children's Work for the South Central Jurisdiction of the United Methodist Church. In 1951, Mrs. Hart was a delegate from Arkansas to the White House Conference on Children and Youth. She was a member of the Inner-Board Council of the Church, and for twelve years served on the Family Life Committee of the United Methodist Church. She taught family life courses in many states, as well as in the National Family Conference of our Church in Chicago. Mrs. Hart was likewise active in civic and community organizations in each place she lived.

Jerrine's life was marked by a deep sense of commitment. As a child she committed her life to Christ. Her loyalty, love and devotion to Him never wavered. Graduating from the Pine Bluff High School at the age of sixteen, she began teaching — of children. She was the remarkable wife of one of our outstanding ministers. She was a gracious hostess, and entertained guests with grace and dignity. Jerrine confessed that she felt a sense of being called to be a minister's wife. She mastered the fine art of being a good listener, which enabled her to be a good counselor. Mrs. Hart complemented the work of her husband, and she and Neill together formed an unusual team, as they served together in DeWitt, Carlisle, Dermott; Pulaski Heights, Asbury and St. Paul Churches in Little Rock; the First Church in Camden, Magnolia and El Dorado; the Pine Bluff and the Camden Districts, the Little Rock Program Council, and since their retirement, Pride Valley United Methodist Church near Little Rock.

One of the fine ingredients that made Jerrine's life great was her sincere interest in and love for people — people as persons, regardless of age, creed or color. Underlying all this she possessed a fine sense of wholesome humor and fun, and keen repartee.

Jerrine never lost her zest for living. She was a great reader until her eyesight dimmed. She always appreciated the finer things of life. Nothing

escaped her that would aid in cultural development, through uplifting worship, great music, art and the drama. She could bring spiritually helpful and uplifting messages. Jerrine loved the great outdoors, the trails, the birds. What Roselle Mercier Montgomery wrote in her poem about a friend of hers, Jerrine's friends could likewise say of her: "You took life, tip-toe, to the very last; it never lost for you its lovely look. You kept your interest in its thrilling book."

This sketch is enough to show that hers was a great life. Dag Hammarskjold wrote: "Do not seek death — death will find you. But seek the road which makes death a fulfillment." That road Jerrine Hart walked on all the days of her life.

X. Miscellaneous

CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

- 1. Nominations. The District Superintendents shall nominate all members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees, except as otherwise provided, on the basis of qualifications, experience, and dependability. Each District nominating committee will submit in writing to the Annual Conference nominating committee a list of qualified suggested nominations for all members of quadrennial and annual boards, commissions, and committees for consideration. All nominees shall be consulted regarding their nomination.
- 2. Financial and Statistical. (1) The District Superintendents shall furnish the treasurer with all apportionments to the churches on, or before January 1. These figures shall be official. (1) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars, with no column for cents. (3) Each pastor shall report to the Conference Treasurer and turn in a statistical report to the statistician at a date set by the cabinet. The Treasurer's Report from the Pastor will be audited and checked by the Final Data-Processing Print-Out. Where there is discrepancy, the amount recorded on the Print-Out will prevail.
- 3. Memoirs. There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased clerical member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, names of children, charges served, and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with the memoir. The same shall be done for probationary members, associate members and lay pastors. Like wise, a memoir of wives or widows of the above shall be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Committee on Memoirs the death of any of the above mentioned and be responsible for the submission of Memoirs not later than thirty days after the death occurs. The names or memoirs of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions, or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. It shall be the duty of the District Superintendents to report to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions the death of any conference claimant that occurs in their respective districts.
- 4. Administrative Fund. The Council on Finance and Administration shall recommend an assessment for a Conference Administrative Fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expense of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this Fund. The Treasurer shall be the custodian of the Fund. Payments from the Fund shall be made on vouchers signed by the Secretary of the Conference; provided that this rule does not relate to the salary and expenses of the Treasurer of the Conference.
- 5. Conference Treasurer. The Council on Finance and Administration shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the Conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer, on recommendation of the Council, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.
- 6. Number of Districts. There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Conference.
- 7. District Fund. The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer

who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall report to the district conference, annually, showing receipts and disbursements.

- 8. Reports and Resolutions. There shall be a pre-conference report which shall contain reports of all the boards and agencies of the Conference. This report shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Annual Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the pre-conference reports shall be typewritten, in triplicate, on special forms furnished by the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary. In the event editing of a report is deemed necessary by the Conference Secretary and chairman of the board involved, permission is hereby granted.
- 9. Membership of the Commission on Archives and History. The Commission on Archives and History shall be composed of ten or more members, one of whom shall be the Conference Secretary. In addition to the duties outlined in the Discipline, the Commission shall secure a group picture of each class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal; and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his retirement.
- 10. Safeguarding Historical Material. (a) Any member of the Little Rock Annual Conference, or layman authorized by a member of the Conference, may examine historical documents within the Headquarters Building. (2) To remove historical documents from the Headquarters Building, a written request signed by the presiding Bishop and Conference Secretary shall be presented to the Custodian. Provided further, historical documents belonging to the Conference Women's Society may be removed from Headquarters Building upon written request signed by the President and Secretary of the women's Conference. (3) The Custodian of historical documents shall be given a receipt for any material removed from the vault in the Headquarters Building, Little Rock, giving date of removal and name of receiver.
- 11. District Conference. There may be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline, and one additional member from each pastoral charge, provided however, in charges of more than five hundred members there shall be one additional member for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.
- 12. Lay Members. Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the pastor-host of the Annual Conference at least fifteen days before the session of the Annual Conference.
- 13. Board Service. No person may be nominated to serve on the same Conference Board for more than two consecutive quadrenniums, and may not be nominated to serve on more than one board at the same time. District Superintendents may not serve on Conference Boards, except as provided in the Discipline, or by specific conference action. A person failing to attend a board of which he is a member in a quadrennium may be continued only by special board action.
- 14. Entertainment. The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the retired ministers shall be entertained from the entertainment fund. Certain proceeds from the offerings shall go to the fund. The entertainment fund shall be administered by three persons, to be named by the Cabinet, who will be reporting to the next session of the Annual Conference. All entertainment funds shall be turned over to the local church who shall pay per diem directly to the retired ministers. Eligibility shall be determined by the committee of three and shall be paid only for days attended.

- 15. Conference Expense. Registration fees and the offerings at the public services in the service of the Annual Conference shall be used to defray the expense of the session, including the expense and/or honorarium of the conference preacher and that any deficit remaining be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund, and the Conference Treasurer shall pay the same.
- 16. Unsponsored Resolutions: Any resolution not sponsored by a regular board or standing committee of the Conference must lie over for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon, provided, however, immediate debate and action may be ordered by two-thirds vote of the Conference present and voting.
- 17. Apportionments Based on Pastor's Salary: On all items apportioned to local churches by means of a percentage of the ministers' salary, such percentage shall be understood to apply to all ministerial members of the local church staff serving under the appointment of the Bishop, including ministers in full connection, ministers on trial, and full time Lay Pastors. This rule to be in effect with the 1966-67 Conference Year.
- 18. Campaigns. All Conference-wide campaigns to raise funds shall be voted on by ballot.
- 19. Youth Membership. Each District Council of the United Methodist Youth shall elect two youth members of the Annual Conference.
- 20. Amendments. These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing on day before the vote is taken.

- 4. The effective date for taking of offices and positions shall be January 1, 1975.
- In the transition period present structure and persons serving in all capacities shall be continued.

CONSTITUTION FOR THE UNITED METHODIST YOUTH OF THE LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCE ADOPTED 6/21/73 CONFERENCE CAMP

ARTICLE I. NAME AND SPONSORSHIP

- This organization shall be known as the Little Rock Annual Conference of United Methodist Youth.
- 2. It is the official conference for youth of the United Methodist Church of the Little Rock Annual Conference.
- 3. It is under the sponsorship of the Little Rock Conference and the Board of Discipleship.

ARTICLE II. PURPOSE

1. The purpose of this organization shall make possible conference, district, and sub-district sponsored opportunities for youth and adult workers with youth to grow in their understanding of what it means to be The Church and to respond to that understanding.

ARTICLE III. FUNCTIONS

- 1. To co-operate with all church boards and agencies in matters of common interest with which youth are concerned.
- 2. To co-operate with the total ministry of The Church when needed in order to strengthen the total youth ministry of The United Methodist Church.
- 3. To recommend to initiate and support special plans and projects which help to fulfill the Purpose.

- 4. To provide for the free expression of the convictions of the United Methodists on issues vital to them.
- 5. To call together its membership in an annual assembly known as the Conference Camp to consider youth's participation in the life and mission of the Church. The annual assembly shall be composed of twenty-one delegates per district. Each District should strive to include at least seven black youth. Although it is desirous to achieve maximum attendance, non-attendance by delegates does not constitute grounds for cancellation of Conference Camp.
- 6. All youth in attendance at Conference Camp must be Mid-High to Senior-High age level.
- 7. In addition to the above 21 persons per district, the council and council elect, district and conference co-ordinators of youth ministry shall be delegates to Conference Camp.
- 8. To provide participation in the ecumenical youth ministry of The Church.
- 9. To serve the local church through the conference, district, and subdistrict programs.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP OF THE LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF UNITED METHODIST YOUTH

- 1. The youth members shall be any youth who are members of the United Methodist Church and are in the junior high through senior high age level.
- 2. The adult members shall be those adults who are related directly to Youth Ministry at local, sub-district, district or annual conference level.
- 3. Only youth delegates may vote; whereas, adults may have all privileges of membership, except voting.

ARTICLE V. CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRY

- 1. Membership
 - A. Youth—voting members
 - (1) 18 elected
 - (2) Editor of Conference Newsletter
 - (3) Special appointees approved by Conference Council.
 - B. Adults-non-voting members
 - (1) District Co-ordinators of Youth Ministry
 - (2) Conference Co-ordinators of Youth Ministry
 - (3) Immediate Past President of Conference Youth Council

2. Officers

- A. Individual responsibilities shall be determined by the Council according to its needs.
- B. Any officers of the Council shall be officers of the Little Rock Annual Conference of the United Methodist Youth.
- C. President shall be a senior in high school.
- 3. The provisions of the election of youth members of the council shall be as follows:

- A. Each district shall elect three youths, and should strive for at least one black delegate, to represent it on the council.
- B. Members must be present at the Conference Camp and shall be encouraged to be a delegate to the South Central Regional United Methodist Youth Enterprise.
- C. Members shall be elected for one year terms only, but may be re-elected if they are within age range of the Mid-High to Sr.-High United Methodist Youth at the time they would serve.
- D. Members must be members of the United Methodist Church.
- E. Vacancies shall be filled by special election in the district in which the vacancy has occurred.
- F. The editor of the Conference Newsletter, THE LITTLE ROCK, shall be elected by the Conference Youth Council from recommendations of the Conference Youth Co-ordinator.
- G. Special appointments may be made by the Conference Youth co-ordinator with the approval of the Council.
- 4. The duties of the council shall be:
 - A. To function as a team in planning and carrying out the program of youth ministry in the Little Rock Conference.
 - B. To plan and conduct meetings of the conference youth.
 - C. To implement recommendations of the National Conference on Youth Ministry.
 - D. To implement recommendations of the Little Rock Annual Conference of the United Methodist Youth, Such implementation may be by:
 - (1) assignment to a conference board or agency of the United Methodist Church,
 - (2) employed Conference Staff.
 - (3) Conference, District and Sub-District Councils on Youth Ministry.
 - E. To designate representatives to the boards and agencies where youth are affected.
 - F. To make recommendations about the life of the United Methodist Church to the Little Rock Annual Conference and appropriate staff and conference boards and agencies of the Church.
 - G. To plan and supervise the budget of the youth conference and to report to the Conference Camp Annually and other times as needed.
 - H. To express itself on issues vital to the youth of the Little Rock Conference.

ARTICLE VI. PROJECT REVIEW COMMITTEE

- 1. The purpose of the Project Review Committee shall be to make recommendations to the Youth Council concerning projects to be financed by money from the Youth Service Fund. This committee will make recommendations to Conference Camp on the use of the money for projects inside and outside the Conference.
- 2. Interested parties will present an application to the Project Review Committee. The Project Review Committee will investigate as well as go out and seek people and organizations that need help or aid. Any member of the United Methodist Youth can recommend projects to the Project Review Committee. Application forms will be available

- from the Little Rock Conference Council on Ministries Office and any District Co-ordinator.
- 3. The Project Review Committee will be chosen by the Conference Youth Council in their fall meeting with one-year terms running from January to January. The members will be Mid-High to Sr.-High age level and each district will submit names from which the Conference Council will select members for the Project Review Committee
- 4. The project Review Committee will be composed of:
 - A. Two delegates from each district for a total of 12 delegates. These youth cannot be from the Conference Youth Council. It would be desirous for at least 3 of these delegates to come from minority groups.
 - B. The following ex-officio, non-voting members.
 - (1) Conference Youth co-ordinator
 - (2) President of Conference Youth Council
- 5. The steps for a project to acquire funds will be:
 - A. They must fill out an application form.
 - B. The Project Review Committee will review applications before Conference Camp and submit their priorities to the United Methodist Youth at Conference Camp to be voted on.
 - (1) Application forms must be returned to the Council on Ministries Office by March 1.
 - (2) Copies of these forms will be sent to each voting Project Review Committee member and each member will number his top five priorities.
 - (3) Each project of the top five will present their project to the Conference Camp.
 - (4) An authorized voting session of the Conference Camp will decide the projects to receive money and how much.
- 6. Checks will be mailed quarterly June-June. Members of the Project Review Committee will investigate projects quarterly (including actual visits) and written reports from projects will be necessary quarterly. If these reports are not received, funding will be ceased. The fate of the project must be determined yearly at the Conference Camp.

ARTICLE VII. FINANCE

- The finances of the Little Rock Conference UMY shall be provided by the Youth Service Fund turnback, Conference Boards, and other sources acceptable to the council.
- 2. The treasurer of the Conference UMY shall be the Youth co-ordinator of the Little Rock Annual Conference.
- 3. There shall be an annual review of the reports on finances by the Treasurer and the Youth Council to the Conference Camp.

ARTICLE VIII. MEETINGS

- 1. Any parliamentary procedure shall be in accordance with Roberts Rules of Order, Revised.
- 2. A quorum shall be two-thirds of the members registered during any official meeting of the UMY.
- 3. Council members are expected to be present for all official meetings of that body. The council shall meet two times during the year in addition to Conference Camp.

ARTICLE IX. RATIFICATION AND AMENDMENT

- The Constitution shall require a two-thirds majority vote of delegates registered at Conference Camp and shall be presented to the Little Rock Annual Conference in session for inclusion in the journal thereof.
- 2. This constitution may be amended by a business session of the Conference Camp by a three-fourth vote of those present authorized to vote; provided that when presented to the meeting the amendment shall be accompanied by a written report concerning it from the council.
- 3. This Constitution shall be amended in accordance with changes made in the Discipline of the United Methodist Church relative to Youth Ministry.

FORWARD LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCE STRUCTURE PROPOSAL May, 1974

An appropriate question to consider before becoming involved in all the concerns related to re-structuring our Annual Conference would be, "Why do we need a new structure at all?". Several reasons might be listed.

First of all, the 1972 General Conference of our Church made broad changes in the structure of the United Methodist Church. Along with these changes came the need for the Annual Conferences to modernize their structures so that they might better facilitate communication with the new structures of the general church.

Secondly, we are constantly interested in providing a better way for the local churches of our Conference to carry out their function. As part of this procedure, we are also interested in making for a better means by which local churches can be heard by the whole church. Thus, more efficient communication among all agencies and ministries of our Church is a primary concern in our restructure proposal.

One of the major proposals of this structure originated in 1968, when the idea of a program agency that had all programmatic functions of the church located in one Program Council was adopted. In 1972, the General Conference attempted to refine this concept through its broad structural changes and the initiation of the Council on Ministries.

The concept of the Council on Ministries is not yet perfect, but it is a quite workable concept offering a more co-ordinated and efficient way to assist our Conference in the administration of our program concerns than ever before. It is also true that this process makes for a more organized way to assist and listen to the local churches of our Conference.

Many Annual Conferences have already adopted new structures. Some are still at the job as we are. A great diversity of approach may be seen in the various structures adopted by different Annual Conferences. Our restructuring proposal is intended to follow the intent and letter of the Discipline wherever it is explicit. A great deal of freedom is given and encouraged in our 1972 Discipline; and thus, we have attempted to use this freedom in a creative way so that the unique offerings of our Conference may not be stifled, but rather further encouraged.

As you may expect, it was no small task to search out all the obligations of the Discipline and incorporate them in our structure without conflict. A Sub-

Committee of the Structure Committee, called the Rationale Committee, was given the responsibility to take the main decisions of the Structure Committee and draw up a rationale statement covering each entity of the Annual Conference Structure.

Perhaps the simplest way to describe the new structure would be to say it places the greatest importance upon the local church and it greatly strengthens the District Council on Ministries. A broadening of responsibility and grass roots participation is intended by the incorporation of nominating committees on both District and Conference levels.

A distinction between "program" and "administrative" agencies is intended throughout the structural proposal. All "program" functions are relegated to the Council on Ministries; other concerns more appropriately are a function of the Annual Conference itself.

Under the new structure the Conference Council Boards, Commissions, and Committees will be made up of membership that is both at-large and ex-officio. On each appropriate Conference Council agency the persons responsible for that program area in the District is now given membership.

We trust through this structure proposal that a coordination throughout our Conference may be set up that has never existed before. The document before you is the result of many refinements. First before the representative Structure Committee, then before the scrutiny of the Rationale Committee, through the Conference Council on Ministries, each District in our Annual Conference, and then a final comprehensive treatment by the Structure Committee and the Conference Council.

We now highly recommend to your consideration this document that is before you for your consideration, amendment, and adoption.

ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE OF THE LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The structure of the Little Rock Annual Conference is purposed to outline and define the functions and relationships of our Conference, i.e., to strengthen local, national, and worldwide forms of ministry. This structure will flow from the local setting to the Annual Conference and back to the local church or institution. There are five basic principles:

- 1) It is the purpose of the Conference to enable the local church or institution to better fulfill its mission.
- 2) The Conference structure is paralleled to the structure of the local church.
- 3) Task forces may be utilized by any organizational entity. Members of task forces may be recruited from any level of church leadership.
 - 4) This structure is not purposed to be a limiting or restrictive proposal.

A priority is placed on flexibility and accountability which encourages creativity and freedom.

5) Connectionalism is a strength and asset for ministry, because connectionalism is always purposed to strengthen local ministries.

BASIC UNDERSTANDINGS

- 1) It is intended that we have a 50-50 ratio of lay and clergy membership on Boards, Committees, Commissions, etc., unless otherwise determined by the Discipline.
- 2) The Discipline shall be our model in defining voting and non-voting members of Councils, Boards, Committees, Commissions, etc.
- 3) It is recommended that youth, young adults, and ethnic minorities be represented in the membership of each organizational entity.
- 4) The program year of the Districts and Conference shall be January 1 December 31.
- 5) Unless otherwise prescribed by the Discipline, nominations may be accepted from the floor.
- 6) The term of elected membership for the Conference Council on Ministries' and the Annual Conference's Boards, Commissions, Committees, Councils, etc., shall be the quadrennium. No person, excluding the Conference treasurer and Conference Secretary, shall serve on any one Board, Commission, Committee, or Council for more than eight consecutive years.
- 7) Those standing rules of the Little Rock Annual Conference in conflict with this structure, upon adoption of this structure, will thereby be amended to be in consonance with this structure.
- 8) The Little Rock Annual Conference structure shall be amended by the same procedure and majority as required to amend the standing rules of the Conference.

DISTRICT STRUCTURE

DISTRICT NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Responsible to Annual Conference

Functions:

- 1) Annually, this committee shall nominate the following:
- a) Up to six members at-large of the District Council on Ministries.
- b) Members of the District Nominating Committee.
- c) Members of the Conference Nominating Committee. (The first year a lay person and a clerical member shall be nominated to serve on the Conference Nominating Committee. Thereafter, the Committee shall nominate one person each year for a two year term alternating between lay and clerical.)
- d) Other persons as prescribed by the Discipline, District and Conference structure and those deemed necessary by the District and/or Conference.
- 2) Receive suggested nominees from the local churches of their District as possible candidates for District offices.

Membership:

- 1) Eight persons plus the District Superintendent.
- 2) The District Superintendent shall be an ex-officio member, with vote, and serve as chairperson of this committee.
- 3) The term of office for elected members shall be two years in rotation. (The first year, the District Superintendent shall select the Nominating Committee. The members shall draw for one and two year terms. Thereafter, persons shall be nominated and elected to fill the vacancies caused by rotation,

moving, etc.). No member, except the District Superintendent, may serve two consecutive terms of office on the District Nominating Committee.

DISTRICT BOARD OF STEWARDS

Disciplinary reference: Par. 872, 1413.2

Functions:

- 1) Recommend apportionments to the churches in the District.
- 2) May elect District Trustees.
- 3) Approve District budget as it relates to the District fund.

Membership:

- 1) District Superintendent who shall serve as chairperson and call the meetings.
 - 2) District treasurer.
 - 3) One lay person from each church in the District.

DISTRICT TRUSTEES

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1413

Functions:

1) Fulfill the requirements of the Discipline.

Membership:

1) Three-to-nine persons nominated by the District Superintendent and elected by the District Stewards or the Annual Conference.

DISTRICT COMMITTEE ON THE MINISTRY

Disciplinary reference: Par. 665.18

Responsible to Conference Board on the Ministry

Functions:

- 1) Examine all persons who apply in writing for a license to preach or for a renewal of such license. Where there is evidence that their gifts, graces, and usefulness warrant, and that they meet the requirements of the **Discipline**, the Committee shall recommend licensing or renewal of license.
- 2) Recommend to the Conference Board on the Ministry suitable candidates for acceptance or continuance as lay pastors, for Conference membership and for restoration of credentials. Such recommendations should be submitted to the Conference Registrar in writing before April 15 of each year.
- 3) The vote of the Committee in licensing matters shall be by individual written ballot, and a three-fourths majority vote of the Committee shall be required for license or approval.

Membership:

- 1) The District Superintendent who shall serve as chairperson.
- 2) Five travelling pastors in the District and a representative from and appointed by the Conference Board of Ministry. These persons shall be nominated by the District Superintendent and elected by the Annual Conference.

DISTRICT COMMITTEE ON CHURCH BUILDINGS AND LOCATIONS

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1414-1418 Responsible to Annual Conference

Functions:

1) Fulfill the requirements of the Discipline.

Membership:

- 1) The District Superintendent who shall serve as chairperson.
- 2) Three pastors and three lay persons nominated by the District Superintendent and elected annually by the Annual Conference.

DISTRICT COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Disciplinary reference: Par. 835

Responsible to Annual Conference and Annual Conference Council on Ministries.

Functions:

- 1) The purpose of the District Council on Ministries shall be to assist local churches to minister more effectively; to serve as a channel of communication between the local churches, the Annual Conference Council on Ministries, and the general agencies of the Church; to initiate programs for the District; and to help the Annual Conference Council on Ministries in the performance of its functions.
- 2) The District Council on Ministries shall report to the Annual Conference Council on Ministries annually stating its progress during the present year and plans for the coming year (s).
- 3) The District Council on Ministries shall annually prepare a budget request for the program year that is forthcoming and submit this request to the Annual Conference through the Conference Council on Ministries.
- 4) The following functions shall serve as guidelines for the work of the District Council on Ministries:
- a) Study the needs of the local churches in the district and help them establish and provide more effective ministry in and through the churches.
- b) Keep local churches informed on the work of the whole Church and challenge each church to full participation.
- c) Encourage local churches to engage in creative, innovative approaches to ministry.
- d) Serve as a two-way channel of communication between the local churches and the Annual Conference and assist local churches in communication with each other.
- e) Study the needs of the District and establish priorities for District action.
 - f) Develop experimental types of ministry within the District.
 - g) Provide leadership training events for local church leaders.
- h) Relate the Annual Conference Council on Ministries and its staff to local church needs.
- i) Make program and other recommendations to the Annual Conference Council on Ministries.
- j) Assist in the implementation of the program of the Annual Conference.
 - k) Cooperate in ecumenical programs and events on the District level.
 - l) Plan and conduct inspirational events.
- m) Provide training sessions for lay and clerical members of the Annual Conference concerning issues facing sessions of the Annual Conference.

5) These functions may be accomplished through the use of task forces. It is recommended that these task forces be composed of persons from local churches working under the leadership of the District Council on Ministries.

Provisions and Membership:

- 1) There shall be a chairperson, vice-chairperson, secretary and treasurer. The chairperson shall not be the District Superintendent. The treasurer shall be the district treasurer.
- 2) The chairperson shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference. The Council shall elect the vice-chairperson, secretary, and treasurer.
- 3) The Council shall meet upon call of the chairperson and/or District Superintendent. It is recommended that the Council meet a minimum of four times annually.
 - 4) The District Superintendent shall be the chief executive staff officer.
- 5) There shall be a chairperson for each district committee and other such members as the District Council may determine.
- 6) The members of the Council shall be the chairperson, District Superintendent, seven work area chairpersons, district missionary secretary, four age-level coordinators (children, youth, young adult, adult), family coordinator, chairperson of Committee on Communications, district leader of Lay Men and one other representative of Lay Men, up to six at-large members, deaconnesses in the district, UMW president and one other UMW representative, UMY president and one other UMY representative, and other persons as determined by the Council. These persons (except the District Superintendent, Lay Men, UMW and UMY chairpersons, representatives, and deaconnesses) shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

DISTRICT WORK AREA ON MISSIONS

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1186-1188

Responsible to District Council on Ministries

Functions:

- 1) The District Work Area on Missions shall keep the District Council aware of the purpose and needs of programs and institutions supported by the Church in the nation and around the world. It shall keep the Council aware of the need for study and action in the areas of health and general welfare. In keeping with the standards and guidance material supplied by the Board of Global Ministries, and the Annual Conference Board of Missions, it shall provide resources to be used in the study program of the Church.
- 2) Provide information and resources, including leadership, for local church mission studies.
 - 3) Fulfill the requirements of the Discipline.
- 4) Initiate and develop programs that answer calls to mission and church extension.

Provisions and Membership:

1) There shall be a District Missionary Secretary in each District, appointed by the District Superintendent after consultation with the Conference Missionary Secretary and publicly assigned by the Bishop. A vacancy in this office during the conference year may be filled by appointment by the District Superintendent. This Secretary shall work in cooperation with the District Superintendent and Conference Missionary Secretary.

2) The District Nominating Committee shall nominate the chairperson of the District Work Area on Missions. The chairperson shall be elected by the Annual Conference.

DISTRICT WORK AREA ON CHURCH AND SOCIETY

Disciplinary reference: Par. 979

Responsible to District Council on Ministries

Functions:

1) Keep the Council on Ministries aware of the need for study and action in the areas of peace and world order, human relations, and political and economic affairs. In keeping with standards and guidance materials supplied by the General Board of Church and Society and the Annual Conference Board of Church and Society, it shall recommend to the Council on Ministries study/action projects in the field of social concerns.

Provisions and Membership:

- 1) The District Superintendent, in consultation with the Conference Board of Church and Society and the District Nominating Committee, shall appoint the chairperson of this work area.
- 2) The Missions Coordinator for Church Social Environment of the district United Methodist Women shall be an ex-officio member.

DISTRICT WORK AREA ON EDUCATION

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1041

Responsible to District Council on Ministries

Functions:

- 1) Working with the age-level coordinators in the District, assist local churches in their educational ministries.
 - 2) Fulfill the requirements of the Discipline.

Provisions and Membership:

1) The District Superintendent, in consultation with the chairperson of the Conference Board of Education and the District Nominating Committee, shall appoint the chairperson of this work area. District Chairpersons will be confirmed by the Conference Board of Education.

DISTRICT WORK AREA ON STEWARDSHIP

No disciplinary reference

Responsible to District Council on Ministries

Functions:

- 1) Assist local churches in developing a stewardship program of prayers, attendance, gifts and service.
 - 2) Work closely with the Conference Board of Stewardship.
- 3) Establish and work through a Sub-Committee on Enlistment and Church Occupations.

Provisions and Membership:

1) The District Nominating Committee shall nominate a chairperson on stewardship. The Annual Conference will elect.

DISTRICT WORK AREA ON ECUMENICAL CONCERNS

No disciplinary reference

Responsible to District Council on Ministries

Functions:

 Cooperate with the Conference Board of Ecumenical Concerns in assisting local churches in their understanding and participation in ecumenical endeavors.

Provisions and Membership:

1) The District Nominating Committee shall nominate a chairperson of Ecumenical Concerns. The Annual Conference will elect.

DISTRICT WORK AREA ON EVANGELISM

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1045

Responsible to District Council on Ministries

Functions:

- 1) Assist local churches in developing and implementing ministries for membership care.
- 2) Assist local churches in developing and implementing ministries for outreach.
- 3) Keep before the churches the importance of keeping membership rolls and reporting in order.
 - 4) Encourage the development of spiritual life and holy habits.

Provisions and Membership:

1) The District Nominating Committee shall nominate a chairperson of Evangelism. The Annual Conference will elect.

DISTRICT WORK AREA ON WORSHIP

Disciplinary reference: None

Responsible to District Council on Ministries

Functions:

- 1) Cultivate the fullest possible meaning in the worship and celebration experiences of the Church, both corporately and personally, including the use of music, the arts, and drama.
- Assist local church musicians, ushers, etc., in understanding their responsibilities and taking advantage of their educational opportunities.
- Assist pastors and laity in finding and understanding resources related to worship.

Provisions and Membership:

1) The District Nominating Committee shall nominate a chairperson. The Annual Conference will elect.

DISTRICT COMMITTEE ON COMMUNICATIONS

Disciplinary reference: None

Responsible to District Council on Ministries

Functions:

- 1) Cooperate with the Conference Committee on Communications and the boards, agencies, etc., in communicating news, opportunities, and needs to persons in local churches.
 - 2) Promote the ARKANSAS METHODIST and other church periodicals.

Provisions and Membership:

1) The District Nominating Committee shall nominate a chairperson. The Annual Conference will elect.

DISTRICT AGE-LEVEL AND FAMILY COORDINATORS

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1041.6

Responsible to District Council on Ministries

Functions:

- 1) The four age-level coordinators (children, youth, young adult, adult), and family coordinator shall be responsible for representing their respective concerns in every area of the church's program.
- 2) The district chairperson of education and the age-level coordinators shall serve as an education committee to assist local churches (or to make recommendations to the district Council on Ministries) in designing a program of Christian education, developing leadership, interpreting resources, evaluating present programs and assessing needs.

Provisions and Membership:

1) The District Nominating Committee shall nominate the five coordinators provided that consultation shall occur with the District Council on Youth Ministry for the nomination of the youth coordinator. The Annual Conference will elect.

DISTRICT ORGANIZATIONS

There may be a United Methodist Women's organization, United Methodist Lay Men's organization, and a United Methodist Youth organization in each District. Such organizations will abide by their respective constitutions and by-laws and the Discipline. The District organizations shall work closely with the Conference organizations.

ANNUAL CONFERENCE STRUCTURE

CONFERENCE NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Disciplinary reference: Par. 663.3, 665.1, .2, .3

Functions

- 1) Nominate all members of the Annual Conference and Annual Conference Council on Ministries Committees, Boards, Commissions, Councils, etc., except where other nominating procedures are provided for in the Discipline or by action of the Conference.
- 2) Make an effort to place all Conference ministers in the membership of an appropriate Conference agency.
 - 3) Nominate the Conference lay leader. (Par. 1051)
- 4) Nominate all Conference representatives to inter-Conference Boards and agencies and make other nominations, as required.

Provisions and Membership:

- 1) Cabinet
- 2) One lay person and one pastor from each District.
- 3) Terms of office shall be for four years; from the middle of the quadrennium.

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1410-1412 Responsible to Annual Conference

Functions:

1) Administer the responsibilities as set forth in the Discipline.

Membership:

1) Refer to par. 1410.

CONFERENCE BOARD ON THE MINISTRY

Disciplinary references: Par. 665.4-17; 663.5, .6

Responsible to Annual Conference

Functions:

1) Administer functions as set forth in the Discipline.

Membership:

1) Not fewer than six ministers in full connection in the Conference, nominated by the presiding Bishop after consultation with the chairperson of the board of the previous quadrennium, or with a committee of the board, and with the Cabinet.

CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON INVESTIGATION

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1540-1560 Responsible to Annual Conference

Functions:

1) Administer the functions as set forth in the Discipline.

Membership:

1) Each Annual Conference at each Annual session, upon nomination of the presiding Bishop, shall elect five itinerant elders, persons of experience and sound judgment in the affairs of the Church, who shall be known as the Committee on Investigation, and five reserves chosen in like manner to serve in the absence or disqualification of the principals.

CONFERENCE JOINT COMMITTEE ON DISABILITY

Disciplinary reference: Par. 665.25 Responsible to Annual Conference

Functions:

1) Fulfill the requirements as set forth in the Discipline.

Membership:

1) Prescribed in the Discipline.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF PENSIONS

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1259-1262 Responsible to Annual Conference

Functions:

1) Administer functions according to the Discipline.

Membership:

1) Prescribed in Discipline. (Par. 1260.2)

CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE

Disciplinary reference: None Responsible to Annual Conference

Functions:

1) Administer the insurance program of the Conference.

Membership:

1) Six persons nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

Disciplinary reference: Par. 866-886 Responsible to Annual Conference

Functions:

- 1) The Council shall nominate, following each General Conference, a Conference Treasurer. The Annual Conference will elect the treasurer to serve for the quadrennium. If any vacancy should occur during the quadrennium, the Council shall fill the vacancy until the next session of the Annual Conference. The Council shall have authority and supervision over the treasurer. (See par. 877)
- 2) Administer the functions of the Discipline and matters pertaining to the Conference organization.

Membership:

- 1) Five pastors and six laity nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.
- 2) No member or employee of any conference board, committee, council, or commission, etc., and no employee, trustee, or director of any agency or institution participating in the funds of the conference benevolence budget shall be eligible for membership on the Council on Finance and Administration.

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1277 Responsible to Annual Conference

Functions:

1) Fulfill the requirements of the Discipline.

Membership:

1) A minimum of nine and up to fifteen persons nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

CONFERENCE COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

Disciplinary reference: Par. 892-893 Responsible to Annual Conference

Functions:

- 1) Administer all salary supplementation funds of the Conference.
- 2) Administer functions as defined by the Discipline.

Membership:

- 1) The Cabinet shall be ex-officio members (without votes).
- 2) Two persons from each district (one lay and one clerical) nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.
 - 3) Up to six at-large members.

CONFERENCE LAY LEADER

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1051 Responsible to Annual Conference

Functions:

- 1) Serve as the designated leader of the Conference laity, with responsibility for becoming increasingly aware of the work of the laity in achieving the mission of the Church.
 - 2) Represent the laity on boards, agencies, etc., when designated.
 - 3) Present a written report annually to the Annual Conference.
 - 4) Be seated in the Annual Conference as a voting member.

Provision:

1) The Conference lay leader shall be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON THE LAY WORKER

Disciplinary reference: Par. 667

Responsible to Annual Conference

Functions:

1) Administer the functions of the Discipline.

Membership:

1) No fewer than six nor more than fifteen members, of whom 2/3 shall be laity. It shall include one representative from the Board on the Ministry. The committee shall be nominated by the Bishop and elected by the Annual Conference on a quadrennial basis with due consideration to the boards and agencies related to the occupations for which the Church has established standards.

CONFERENCE COMMITTEE ON REVIEW AND EVALUATION

Disciplinary reference: None

Responsible to Annual Conference

Functions:

1) Annually, review and evaluate the work of the Conference Council on Ministries, the boards, agencies, etc.

- 2) Review the job analysis of our conference employed staff and make recommendations for changes.
- 3) Recommend revisions of the Annual Conference structure so as to align the structure with changes in the **Discipline** of the church or to facilitate the program of the Annual Conference.

Membership:

- 1) An officer of the Cabinet.
- 2) A chairperson and five others, three of whom shall be from the laity. These persons shall be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

COMMITTEE ON THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

Disciplinary references: Par. 664.1 - .6 Responsible to Annual Conference

Functions:

- 1) Fulfill the requirements of the Discipline and the Conference.
- 2) The Committee on the Annual Conference shall have five sub-committees: Courtesies, Minutes, Resolutions, Journal, and Memoirs.

Membership:

- 1) The Conference Nominating Committee shall nominate a minimum of fifteen persons to serve on the Committee on the Annual Conference.
- 2) The secretary of the Conference shall be an ex-officio member (with vote) of the Committee on the Annual Conference.
- 3) The Conference Statistician shall be an ex-officio member (with vote) of the Committee on the Annual Conference.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Disciplinary reference: Par. 831 Responsible to Annual Conference

Purpose and Functions:

- 1) The purpose of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries shall be (a) to receive program recommendations from the local churches, the District agencies, the Annual Conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Councils on Ministries; (b) to develop these recommendations into a coordinate program to be recommended to the Annual Conference for consideration, amendment, and adoption as the Annual Conference program; and (c) to provide implementation for and administration of the coordinated program as adopted by the Conference.
 - 2) The functions of this Council are:
- a) To receive program recommendations from local churches, the District and Annual Conference agencies, and the Jurisdictional and General Councils on Ministries; to evaluate these recommendations; and to formulate program priorities for consideration, amendment, and adoption by the Annual Conference.
- b) To study the mission of the Annual Conference and the local churches of the Conference and to determine program emphases which will assist the Conference and the local churches to perform their mission.
 - c) To describe, coordinate, and organize opportunities to serve within

the mission.

- d) To provide for implementation and administration of the program adopted by the Conference through the District Council on Ministries.
- e) To provide program resources and assistance in program planning and implementation for local churches.
- f) To provide staff personnel for implementing and administrating the District and Conference program.
- g) To provide channels of communication between Annual Conference agencies and local churches.
- h) To do research and long-range planning for the Conference and to cooperate with other research and planning agencies.
- i) To cooperate in ecumenical projects and events which have been approved by the Conference.
- j) To study and coordinate the budget asking of the Conference agencies and the District Councils on Ministries as they relate to the Conference program and to make recommendations regarding the same to the Council on Finance and Administration.
- k) To interpret, in cooperation with the District Council on Ministries, the Conference program to the local churches with a view toward gaining the financial support needed in order to implement that program.

Provisions:

- 1) The officers shall be a chairperson, a vice-chairperson, a secretary and a treasurer (who shall be the Conference treasurer). They (except the treasurer) shall be elected by the Council at the first meeting of the Conference year. The Bishop shall not be the chairperson. Two of the officers shall be lay persons.
- 2) At the end of each Conference year, the chairperson of the Council shall appoint a Nominating Committee of four persons to present nominations of the officers at the first meeting of the Conference Council in the new year.
- 3) There may be an Executive Committee consisting of the officers, Bishop, two District Superintendents chosen by the Cabinet, the Director and Associate Director(s) of the Council (without vote), the chairpersons of each District Council on Ministries, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference chairwoman of the UMW, Conference chairman of the Board of Lay Men, the Conference UMY president, and up-to-three persons at-large to preserve clergy-laity balance. The at-large persons, when needed, shall be nominated and elected by the Council.
- .4) The Conference Council shall have a minimum of two regular meetings annually. Special meetings shall convene upon call of the chairperson, Bishop, and/or Council Director. The Executive Committee shall meet upon call of the Chairperson and/or Director.
- 5) The Council shall elect, upon nomination by the Bishop and District Superintendents, an executive officer to be known as the Conference Council director. The Director shall be in a consultative relationship to the Conference Cabinet on matters relating to coordination, implementation, and administration of the Conference program. The director shall be the chief executive officer of the Council.
- 6) All employed Council staff persons shall be employed by, directed by, and amenable to the Annual Conference Council on Ministries. Ordained ministers on the staff are subject to being appointed by the presiding Bishop. The maximum tenure for the Conference Council Director and the Associate Council

Director (s) shall be eight consecutive years.

- 7) The Council shall have the following relationships, including the amenabilities indicated:
- a) All Annual Conference program boards and agencies shall cooperate with and be amenable to the Conference Council on Ministries in matters relating to the development, implementation, and administration of the program.
- b) The Council shall be responsible, in cooperation with the District Superintendents, for the implementation of the Conference program.

Membership:

- 1) The voting membership of the Council shall consist of the presiding Bishop; the District Superintendents; the Conference secretary; the Conference UMY chairperson and one other UMY representative; the Conference UMW chairwoman and one other UMW representative; the Conference chairman of the Board of Lay Men and one other Board of Lay Men representative; the Conference Lay Leader; one lay person and one minister from each District (one of whom shall be the chairperson of the District COM); the chairpersons of the age-level (children, youth, young adult, adult) and family departments; the person (s) serving as a member (s) of the General Council on Ministries; the chairpersons of Missions, Church and Society, Education, Stewardship, Ecumenical Concerns, Evangelism, Worship, Communications, Religion and Race, Campus Ministry, Board of Ministry, and Planning and Research.
- 2) The following shall be ex-officio members of the Council without vote: salaried and volunteer elected Annual Conference staff; Conference Missionary Secretary; Conference Secretary of Evangelism; Conference Secretary of Education; Conference treasurer; the chairperson of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration and one other CFA representative; and the Editor of the ARKANSAS METHODIST.
- 3) The term of membership for the Conference Council on Ministries' Boards, Commissions, Committees, etc., shall be the quadrennium. No person, excluding the Conference treasurer and Conference Secretary, shall serve on any one agency for more than eight consecutive years.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF MISSIONS

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1181, 1183

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

Functions:

- 1) Be responsible for the Conference program on home missions, church extension, Conference participation in global ministries, and church and community work.
- 2) Develop and promote programs of Health and Welfare (par. 1109, 1110) and concerns relating to the Methodist Children's Home of Arkansas.
 - 3) Assist the District Councils in their work.
 - 4) A subcommittee on Health and Welfare shall be constituted.

Membership:

1) Each District chairperson of Missions and one other person from each District (one representative shall be lay and the other clerical. The second person shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.); Conference Missionary Secretary (par. 1178.2); one representative from the UMW, UMY, and the Board of Lay Men (these representatives shall be elected by their respective groups.); two trustees from the

Methodist Children's Home (elected by their trustees); one representative from the Cabinet; and up to fifteen members at-large.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

Disciplinary reference: Par. 978

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

Functions

- 1) Develop and promote programs on Christian social concerns.
- 2) Assist the District Councils in their work.

Membership:

1) Each District chairperson on Church and Society and one other person from each District (one representative shall be lay and the other from the clergy. The second person shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference); one representative from the UMW, UMY, and the Board of Lay Men (these representatives shall be elected by their respective groups); one District Superintendent; and up to ten at-large members.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF EDUCATION

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1031-1040

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

Functions:

- 1) Foster and direct a plan of Christian education that encourages an experience of Christ and the development of a well-rounded Christian character, that gives children, youth, young adults, and older adults a knowledge of and experience in the Christian ministry and other church occupations. It shall promote church school extension, the program of Christian education, the use of United Methodist church school literature, Christian vocations, Camp Tanako, Hendrix College, and Philander Smith College.
- 2) Oversee the Conference camping ministry. A Coordinating Committee on Camping shall be established and shall be responsible to plan the camping program of the Conference in conjunction with the appropriate Conference and District Coordinators. The Committee shall be composed of the Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of Camp Tanako, the Director and Associate Director of the Council on Ministries, the Resident Agent of Camp Tanako, and the Chairperson and Secretary of the Conference Council Board of Education. The chairmanship of the Committee shall alternate yearly between the Chairperson of the Conference Council Board of Education and the Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of Camp Tanako. The Board of Trustees of Camp Tanako shall have charge of all property matters, physical care, and paid personnel relating to Camp Tanako."
 - 3) Assist the District Councils in their work.
 - 4) Confirm the District Chairpersons of Education (Par. 1041.1)
- 5) The Conference Board of Education may elect a Conference Secretary of Education, if they so desire.

Membership:

1) Each District chairperson of Education and one other person from each District (one representative shall be lay and the other clerical. The second person shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected

by the Annual Conference); one representative from the UMW, UMY, and the Board of Lay Men (these representatives shall be elected by their respective groups); one District Superintendent; and two trustees from Hendrix, Tanako, and Philander Smith (they shall be elected by their respective groups), Conference lay leader, the Associate Director of the Conference Council in charge of camping, and one campus minister (elected by the Conference Committee on Campus Ministry), and up to ten at-large members.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

Disciplinary reference: Refer to par. 1022 and paragraph 666.

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

Functions:

- 1) Promote the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas.
- 2) Be responsible for leadership and resource development.
- 3) Assist local churches and District Councils on Ministries in developing a stewardship program of prayers, attendance, gifts, and service.
- 4) Maintain a permanent record of all persons who have achieved certification in leadership training enterprises. Boards and agencies conducting leadership training will be responsible for reporting certifications to the Conference chairperson of Stewardship. The records of certification must be maintained in the Conference Council on Ministries' office.
- 5) Provide a subcommittee on Enlistment for Church Occupations and cooperate with the Board of Ministry in fulfilling the functions as stated in the Discipline. Refer to par. 666.

Membership:

1) Each district chairperson of Stewardship and one other person from each District (one representative shall be lay and the other from the clergy. The second person shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference); one District Superintendent; two representatives from the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas trustees; one representative each from the UMW, UMY, and the Board of Lay Men (these representatives shall be elected by their respective groups.); Conference lay leader, and up to ten at-large members.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF ECUMENICAL CONCERNS

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1101

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

Functions:

1) Administer the disciplinary functions and those directed by our Conference.

Membership:

1) Each District chairperson of Ecumenical Concerns and one other person from each District (one representative shall be lay and the other from the clergy. The second person shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference); one representative each from the UMW, UMY, and the Board of Lay Men (these persons shall be elected by their respective groups.); one District Superintendent; and five at-large members. Any member of the Division of Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns shall be an ex-officio member.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1043

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

Functions:

- 1) Fulfill the requirements as set forth in the Discipline.
- 2) Assist the District Councils in their work.
- 3) The Conference Board of Evangelism may elect a Conference Secretary of Evangelism.

Membership:

1) Each District chairperson of Evangelism and one other person from each District (one representative shall be lay and the other clerical. The second person shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference); one representative each from the UMW, UMY, and the Board of Lay Men (these persons shall be elected by their respective groups); one District Superintendent; Conference lay leader; and up to ten at-large members.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF WORSHIP

Disciplinary reference: Par. 1066

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

Functions:

- 1) Administer the functions prescribed in the Discipline.
- 2) Assist District Councils in their work.

Membership:

1) Each District chairperson of Worship and one other person from each district (one representative shall be lay and the other clerical. The second person shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference); one District Superintendent; up to ten at-large members (two of whom shall be youth).

CONFERENCE COUNCIL COMMITTEE ON COMMUNICATIONS

Disciplinary reference: Par. 832-833

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

Functions:

- 1) Promote the program of World Service and other general benevolence causes in the pastoral charges of the Conference.
- 2) Coordinate communication of the Annual Conference program and work to the local level and promote concerns relating to the work of the Joint Communications Commission of the General Church.
- 3) Promote the ARKANSAS METHODIST and other approved publications of the United Methodist Church.
- 4) Provide communication training opportunities for leaders in the Annual Conference and the local churches.
 - 5) Assist the District Councils in their work.

Membership:

1) Each District chairperson of Communications and one other person from

each District (One representative shall be lay and the other clerical. The second person shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference); one District Superintendent; up to five at-large members; Conference lay leader and two directors of the ARKANSAS METHODIST (These two persons shall be elected by the Directors).

CONFERENCE COUNCIL AGE-LEVEL (CHILDREN, YOUTH, YOUNG ADULT, ADULT AND FAMILY COORDINATORS

Disciplinary reference: Par. 831.6

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

Functions:

- 1) Assist the District Councils in their work.
- 2) Represent on the Council on Ministries the concerns of age-level organizations when they are not otherwise represented.
- 3) The Family Coordinator shall keep the Council aware of resources and activities to be used in planning family activities in the church and home, in the guidance of families in Christian living in the home, in the preparation of youth for marriage, and in helping families find opportunities for service in the community and the world.

Membership:

1) The Children, Youth, Young Adult, Adult, and Family Coordinators shall be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF THE MINISTRY

Disciplinary reference: Par. 665.4, .12

Note: The Board of Ministry is listed elsewhere as being responsible to the Annual Conference. It is listed here because some of its work relates to the Council on Ministries.

Functions:

- 1) Refer to the Board of Ministry as described before.
- 2) Cooperate with other Conference agencies and the Division of Ordained Ministry to provide continuing education and other career support services for ministers.
- 3) Work with the Division of the Ordained Ministry to promote the observance of Ministry Sunday.
- 4) In cooperation with the Committee on Enlistment for Church Occupations (par. 666), with the Bishop, District Superintendents, Pastors, and Lay Members of the Conference, and with the Division of the Ordained Ministry and the United Methodist Schools of Theology interpret the ministry as a vocation for the purpose of enlisting suitable persons. It shall seek in every way practicable to provide guidance and counsel to them in their training and preparation for the ministry, recommending colleges and Schools of Theology accredited or approved by the University Senate. It shall cooperate with our Schools of Theology by recommending from the Annual Conference students with definite ministerial promise.
 - 5) Help in providing support services for the minister's career develop-

ment, including personal and career counseling, continuing education, assistance in preparation for retirement, and all matters pertaining to ministerial morale. In these it shall consult and cooperate with the Bishop and Cabinet and the Division of the Ordained Ministry.

6) Cooperate with the Annual Conference Council on Ministries in order that its program emphasis may be integrated into the total unified program of the Council. It shall promote the total program of the Church or aspects of it which are particularly related to the Board as it may be directed by the Council on Ministries. Field work plans which relate to the promotion of program in the Annual Conference or the local church shall be cleared through the Council on Ministries.

1) Work with the District organizations and the local units of United Methodist Women in developing programs to meet the needs and interests of women and the concerns and responsibilities of the global Church; to encourage and support spiritual growth, missionary outreach, and Christian social action; and to promote the plans and responsibilities of the Women's Division.

Membership:

- 1) Refer to par. 1154.4, 5, 6 of the Discipline.
- 2) Resident Bishop.
- 3) Conference Lay Leader.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF LAY MEN

Disciplinary reference: None

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

Functions:

1) Interpret and spread through the Conference all the rich meanings of the universal priesthood of believers, of Christian avocation and of the ministry of lay men of the Conference. It shall help the Annual Conference and the local churches in programs which will recruit and utilize the lay men of the Conference in the widest and most effective possible ministry.

- 2) Organize lay speaking workshops and certify lay speakers for the Conference.
- 3) Organize and support local church United Methodist Men's organizations.
- 4) In cooperation with the Board of Stewardship, work to develop the stewardship resources within the Conference.

Membership:

- 1) Refer to Constitution of the Board of Lay Men.

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

Functions:

Membership:

- 1) Two persons from each district (one shall be a lay person and the other from the clergy. These persons shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference).
 - 2) One District Superintendent.
- 3) One representative each from the UMW, UMY, and Board of Lay Men. (These persons shall be appointed by their respective groups.)
 - 4) Five at-large members.
- 5) Refer to Par. 1280.2 for recommendations concerning ethnic, age, and sexual constituency of this Commission.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL COMMITTEE ON CAMPUS MINISTRY

Disciplinary reference: None

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

Functions:

- 1) Annually evaluate the campus ministries within the Conference and report its evaluation to the Council. (Also, refer to par. 1252.4c,d)
- 2) Recommend improvements in facilities, program, finance, and personnel.
- 3) Approve the purchase or sale of property and the plans for any new building, including a parsonage, proposed by the Wesley Foundation and the financial program covering the liquidation of its cost. Such shall be approved by the District Board of Buildings and Locations.
- 4) Cooperate in interpretation of the intercollegiate campus Christian movement.

Membership:

1) Campus ministers, board chairpersons, and one student from each Wesley Foundation campus ministry.

- 2) One District Superintendent appointed by the Cabinet.
- 3) Up to six at-large members.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL COMMITTEE ON PLANNING AND RESEARCH

Disciplinary reference: Par. 834
