

CONFERENCE MINUTES

Monday Afternoon, June 14, 1976 2:00 P.M.

The one hundred and twenty-third session of the Little Rock Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church convened at Hot Springs in the First United Methodist Church, with an Opening Celebration prepared by the Conference Commission on Worship, Michael R. Clayton, Chairman. The service opened with an observance of America's Bicentennial. The service opened with Bishop Eugene M. Frank, resident bishop and liturgist for the service, leading the Conference in the service. Gina and Lonny Glover presented the American and Christian flags. A choir composed of persons from churches throughout the Conference offered the anthem "God of Love and God of Power," arranged by Cecil Lapo. R. G. Morris, Jr., was the organist, and Lucy Cabe was the choirmaster for the service. Bishop Frank administered the Sacrament of Holy Communion, and was assisted by David Prothro, Harold Hansford, Nicholas Evans, and H. O. Richardson.

Business Session: Bishop Frank called the session to order. The agenda was adopted.

James Major announced that the Roll Call is being taken at the Registration Desk, and moved that the Bar of the Conference be the part of the Sanctuary in front of the pillars. The motion passed.

James Major nominated his secretarial staff: Therral Wilson, Journal Clerk; O. D. Peters, Staff Assistant; and Tellers, Lloyd Smith, Calvin Mitchell, Travis Langley, and Bennie Ruth.

Ed Mathews presented greetings from Clifton Rule, who is unable to attend due to illness, and announced that Mrs. Harold Flowers is also ill.

Virgil Keeley, Secretary of the Cabinet, moved that the Standing Rule 7.(a) be suspended for the Board of Pensions for this quadrennium. It was adopted. He moved that the District Committee on the District Superintendency be nominated at the 1977 Conference. Ray Hozendorf offered the substitute that the District Nominating Committee make the nominations, and the District Committee on Ministries elect them and that they become effective immediately. The substitute was adopted.

Virgil Keeley moved that the June salaries go to the present pastors. It passed.

Nominations: Lucille Nix, Secretary of the Conference Nominating Committee, gave the Committee's report, and moved the election of the nominations. They were elected. The District nominations were presented and elected.

Lucille Nix nominated James Major as Conference Secretary. He was elected.

Lucille Nix nominated Cagle Fair as Conference Statistician. He was elected.

Welcome: George Ivey, Host Pastor, welcomed the Conference to Hot Springs, First United Methodist Church.

Ministry: R. O. Beck, Chairman of the Conference Board of the Ministry, presented David Wilson, Secretary of the Board, who gave the Board's report. It was adopted. John Ross, Chairperson of the Conference Committee on Conference Relations, reported that all the District Superintendents had examined their pastors and found them faithful.

Welcome: Tom Ellsworth, Mayor of Hot Springs, also extended a welcome to the Conference.

Publishing House: Sam Albright, Cokesbury Manager, extended greetings to the Conference from the Methodist Publishing House, and presented the Conference with a check for \$3,499.39 to be placed in the Conference Pension Fund.

Archives & History: Ray Hozendorf and Fred Smith presented Dr. Walter Vernon, author of The New History of Arkansas Methodism. Fred Smith, Chairman of the Committee on Archives & History, gave this report, which was adopted.

Recess: Following a benediction by Arthur Terry, the Conference adjourned for the afternoon.

Monday Evening, June 14, 1976 7:00 P.M.

A pre-service concert was presented by the Handbell Choir of Lakeside United Methodist Church, Mrs. Pat Matthews, Director.

Worship Service: The evening worship service was led by Alvin Murray, with the assistance of Ray Bagley and Bishop Eugene Frank. The choir of First United Methodist Church of Magnolia, Harold J. Sweitzer, Organist and Choirmaster, offered the anthems "Laudate Dominum" ("Sing Praise to God") by Gordon Young; "I Will Arise," arranged by Susan Byler; and "Prayer for Our Time," arranged by Hal Hopson. Bishop Frank introduced the Conference preacher, Bishop Robert E. Goodrich, Jr.

Bishop Goodrich preached the sermon "A Come and Go Affair," based on Luke 19.

Tuesday Morning, June 15, 1976 8:30 A.M.

Devotional: Don Eubanks was the Worship Leader. J. W. Lofton offered the sermon "The Samaritan Spirit," based on Luke 10:29-37. The world needs to relearn the principle of the Samaritan Spirit.

- 1. We are in danger of thinking of our neighbor as the one next door, but the world has become one big neighborhood.
 - 2. We need to help our neighbor.
 - 3. We find the opportunity to be neighborly in unlikely places.
- 4. There is a need for continuity of caring. Dare enough to be different for Christ's sake. Dare to care till it hurts, Dare to have the Samaritan Spirit.

Norris Steele offered the amendment "That beginning with the year of 1977, and continuing until changed by a later session of the Little Rock Annual Conference, the Arkansas Methodist shall be financed in the Little Rock Annual Conference by the sale of subscriptions and advertisements. The subscription price shall be \$5.00 per year."

Ed Matthews, Chairman of the Board of Managers of the Arkansas Methodist, spoke against the amendment.

Ed Dunlap called for the previous question. The call was accepted. The amendment was defeated

Jack Wilson asked what the percentage of increase of all the items was. Ray Hozendorf answered "It is between 17% and 20%". The Council's report was adopted.

Treasurer: Roy Bagley, Chairman of the Committee on the Treasurer, gave the report, which was adopted as Report No. 2 of the Council on Finance and Administration. Mouzon Mann moved that the Conference express its appreciation to the Council. It was done.

Bishop Frank left the floor briefly. Ed Dunlap presided over the Conference in his absence.

Council on Ministries: Alf Eason, Director of the Council on Ministries, presented the Council's report. Carr Dee Racop, Associate Director of the Council, introduced the new Video-tape system, which the Conference recently purchased. The report was adopted.

Recess: The Conference recessed prior to the service.

Mission: George Tanner, of the Board of Missions, nominated to the Board of Trustees of Lydia Patterson Institute Charles Richards and Martha Faulkner. They were elected. Robert Van Hook, II presented the Reports 1 and 2 of the Board of Missions, which were adopted. He nominated as Trustees of the Methodist Children's Home John Jacobs, Rowe Hill, C. Ray Hozendorf, and Edwin B. Dodson, for three years. They were elected. Ed Keith, Superintendent of the Methodist Children's Home, spoke to the Conference.

Thomas Abney recommended the Conference accept a \$3,000.00 advance goal for the African Medical Program.

Noe Gonzalez, Director of Lydia Patterson Institute, spoke to the Conference and announced that last year's entering class was the largest in the Institute's history.

The entire Report of the Board of Missions was adopted.

Church & Society: John Alston, Vice-Chairman of the Conference Board of Church & Society, presented Trebie Shaw, Secretary of the Board, who gave the Board's Report. John Adkinson spoke to the report.

Alvin Murray spoke on the Ministry to the Deaf, and the need for additional work with the deaf.

The Report of the Board was adopted.

Christian Civic Foundation: Ed Harris, Director of the Christian Civic Foundation, expressed appreciation for William E. Brown, former Director of the Foundation; and for Bishop Frank, John Workman, and Ed Dunlap, for their assistance. He then called the Conference's attention to the action of the Arkansas State Economic Development Study Commission's recommendations that recreational facilities located in dry counties be allowed to

sell alcoholic beverages. John Miles offered a resolution requesting the Governor and the Legislature to reject this recommendation. The resolution passed unanimously.

Osborne White presented the list of Full Time Lay Pastors that are due annuity credit for 1975-76 Conference Year.

The Report was adopted.

Personal Privilege: Otto Teague extended greetings to the Conference from Ed Galloway, who is absent due to illness.

Education: Charles Ashcraft, Chairman of the Board of Education, presented Virgil Bell, Secretary of the Board, who presented the reports of the Board, including the nominations of Harold K. Davis and John B. Hays as Trustees of Hendrix College. They were elected.

Roy B. Shilling, Jr., President of Hendrix College, spoke to the Conference of the financial strengths of the College. Ray Hozendorf presented an autographed copy of the new History of Arkansas Methodism to the Hendrix Library in appreciation for the assistance of the Hendrix Staff and Faculty.

Leroy Howe of Perkins School of Theology, William McElvaney, President of St. Paul School of Theology, and Robert Gentry of Scarritt College, reported on their respective schools.

Warren J. Hartman of the General Board of Discipleship, Division of Education, recognized First United Methodist Church of Little Rock as having one of the twelve (12) most outstanding church schools in the United Methodist Conference, and presented a Certificate of Recognition to Mrs. Charles Robinson, Director of Religious Education; Mrs. Allen Bullard, Chairperson of the Work Area on Education, and Alvin Murray, Pastor. The Board's Report was adopted.

After several announcements, the Conference adjourned.

The Choir was the Genesis Sound Company from Trinity United Methodist Church in Little Rock, directed by Dr. and Mrs. Fallon Davis. The Choir offered the anthems "Raise A Roof," "Day by Day," Dorothy Davis, Soloist. Bill Fuller sang "Mrs. Jones" as a response to the sermon.

The scripture lesson was Matthew 6:1-8, and the sermon was a dramatization of the Lord's Prayer.

Business Session: Bishop Frank called the session to order and called for announcements. Minutes: Dale Diffee reported that "the minutes had been read and corrected." They were adopted.

Religion & Race: Bill Eason, Chairman of the Commission on Religion and Race, gave their report. Ed Dunlap reported on the work that is being done in Urban ministry in the Little Rock metropolitan area. Edwinia Horton, Commission Vice-Chairman, presented a supplement to the Commission's report. The report was adopted

Youth: Fred Haustein, Conference Co-ordinator of Youth Work, presented Michelle Campbell, President of the Conference Youth Council, who gave their report. Charles Settle reported for Fellowship of Adults in Youth Ministry (FAYM), and suggested that each

church purchase for its Youth Counselor a membership in FAYM.

Journal: Tom Abney, Chairman of the Journal Committee, and John Alston, Secretary of the Committee, gave the report. Bill Shepherd spoke for, and Ed Dunlap spoke against the amendment. John Hayes moved to separate the two questions. His motion passed. John Dill spoke for the amendment. The motion to delete No. 3 of the Report failed. The motion to delete No. 8 of the Report failed. Dick Meredith moved all previous questions. His motion passed.

The amended report was adopted.

Review & Evaluation: Bill Cheyne and Bill Elliott gave the Report of the Committee on Review and Evaluation. The Report was adopted with the substitution of the Committee on the Episcopacy for the Committee to welcome the new bishop.

Convening: Bishop Frank announced the Conference would recess so that the Conference

Boards and Committees could organize.

After a recess of forty-five minutes, Bishop Frank reconvened the Conference, and called on Lucille Nix to give the Report of the United Methodist Women.

Edward Matthews gave the Report of the Board of Managers of the Arkansas Methodist. John Workman, Editor of the Arkansas Methodist, spoke to the Report, and presented Jim Lane, Vice-Chairman of the Board of Managers, who amended the Report, and nominated to the Board of Managers James H. Rice, Laity; William Cheyne, Clergy, and Joe Phillips, Cabinet Representative. They were elected.

The Conference was entertained by a concert by the Conference Children's Choir Camp, under the direction of Richard Hunter, Mary Lowry, and Ron Ballard. The Conference ex-

pressed its appreciation to the children with a standing ovation.

Chaplains: Verlin D. Mikesell presented Edward Jones, who brought greetings from the Division of Chaplains, and presented the following chaplains to the Conference: John Schaffer, Bob Diamond, Tom Nation, Eugene Efird, and James Workman.

Adjournment: Bishop Frank called on Mike Mikesell, who pronounced the benediction.

Wednesday Afternoon, June 16, 1976 2:00 P.M.

Bishop Frank opened the Session with prayer.

Resolution: Bishop Frank called for consideration of the unsponsored resolution that had been tabled from Tuesday. Nichols Evans read the resolution, and it was adopted.

Philander Smith: Walter Hazard, President of Philander Smith College, spoke to the Conference.

Lay Worker: Mrs. Ernestine McKinney, Secretary of the Committee on the Lay Worker, gave their report. It was adopted.

Resolutions: Fred Arnold, in order to secure black representation on the Board of Evangelism, nominated J. W. Lofton, and Brenda Norwood to the Board of Evangelism, and moved to suspend the standing rules concerning the number of members on the Board, and the number of Boards on which one may serve, to allow them to serve. The motion passed, and they were elected.

Tom Nation moved to suspend the rules to allow Brenda Norwood and Wilma Storey to serve on the Commission on Religion and Race. It was done.

Negail Riley moved to add a Standing Rule to the Conference which would make all Conference Boards and Agencies inclusive of representatives of ethnic minorities. Edward Dunlap moved to suspend the rule requiring 24 hours on the table for this motion. It was done, and the motion passed.

Laymen: Bill Shepherd, Conference Lay Leader, reported for the Board of Laymen, and recognized the death and loss of Herb Alman, who served the Conference so faithfully for many years as Conference Lay Leader. The report was adopted.

Ministry: R. O. Beck and Gladwin Connell gave Report No. 2 of the Board of Ministry. Recommended for Probationary Membership were William S. Briant, Jr., John D. Darnall,

Thomas M. Haley, Michael C. Mitchell, and Davis E. Thompson. Bishop Frank examined the candidates, and they were elected to Probationary Membership and to Deacon's orders, along with Richard D. Justice, Wayman Mann, Varnell M. Norman and D. Ed McCullouch, Jr.

Recommended for Full Connection were James R. Brown, Travis D. Langley, Robert W. Robertson, Paul R. Barrington, and Paul L. Lyons. Bishop Frank examined the candidates, and they were elected to Full Connection and to Elders Orders.

Recommended for Associate Membership was Carl D. Diffee, who was elected.

The Report was adopted.

John Ross gave Report No. 3 of the Board. It was adopted.

John Ross, Chairman of the Committee on Disability, gave their Report. It was adopted.

O. D. Peters, Ralph S. Mann, A. J. Lightfoot, Leonard Yates, David M. Dunaway, and Earl Mathis were granted the Retired Relationship.

Trustees: George Kerr gave the Report of the Board of Trustees, which was adopted.

W.D. Lester reported on the state of the History of the Former Southwest Conference. It is ready to be typed, but money is needed to complete the project.

Insurance: Thomas P. Williams, Jr., Chairman of the Insurance Committee, gave their report, which was adopted.

Retirements: The Conference recognized the retiring ministers. Bishop Frank thanked the men for their work.

O. D. Peters expressed his appreciation for the United Methodist Church and the Conference for providing him the opportunity of serving his Lord.

Ralph S. Mann introduced his wife, Julia, and noted that he had accomplished his two ambitions — to marry the prettiest girl in his town, and to be a member of the Little Rock Conference.

David M. Dunaway was happy to note that the number of men being admitted was greater than the number retiring. He stated, "The only trouble is, that leaves us short on batons, but I think the Bishop will be able to come up with some extra batons."

Leonard D. Yates spoke passionately in favor of the United Methodist Church, and challenged his brothers to walk faithfully, because "if you can't walk the walk, you can't talk the talk."

Bishop Frank adjourned the session with a benediction.

Worship Service: The worship leader was Charles W. Richards, and the preacher was Bishop Eugene M. Frank. Following the hymn "Spirit of Faith Come Down," Bishop Frank offered the sermon "Guard Your Heritage," based on the passage in II Timothy "Guard That which has been entrusted to you." Bishop Frank urged the Conference to guard its heritage.

John Miles moved to amend the report by increasing by \$300.00 the minimum salary for full time men.

H. O. Richardson and Mouzon Mann spoke against the amendment. The amendment failed. The Report was adopted.

General Conference: George W. Martin began the report of the Conference's delegation to the General Conference.

John Miles reported on the "Pilgrimage of Petitions," saying that the over 23,000 petitions which were sent to the General Conference were listened to, and greatly effected the actions of the General Conference, e.g., the over 6,000 petitions on homosexuality changed the minds of many delegates, so that the General Conference reaffirmed Methodism's traditional stand on this issue.

Ed Dunlap reported on the General Conference's actions on the ministry and spoke positively on the harmonious differences of the General Conference and the United Methodist Church.

Negail Riley reported the General Conference's emphasis on strengthening the ethnic minority local churches, and the General Conference's concern for funding this missional Priority.

John Blundell related the effect of the General Conference in strengthening his loyalty as a layman to the United Methodist Church. He spoke of the General Conference's struggle to work out a program, and a \$61,000,000.00 budget for each year of the next quadrennium. That is \$14,000,000.00 more than was set for the last quadrennium, and \$20,000,000.00 more than was actually collected.

Richard Meredith, a lay delegate of the General Conference, shared his impression, saying he was frustrated, disillusioned, ashamed, proud, encouraged, but above all, impressed by the complete and utter dedication of those who were there, and finally he was convinced that we are a United Methodist Church, working as brothers and sisters under God.

George W. Martin spoke on the theme which the General Conference adopted for the next quadrennium "Committed to Christ — Called to Change."

Richard Meredith reported our General Conference Delegation's endorsement of J. Edward Dunlap for the episcopacy of the United Methodist Church, and moved the adoption of

a Conference resolution to this effect. The Conference indicated its approval and endorsement with a standing ovation.

Edward Dunlap expressed his appreciation for the Conference's action.

Bishop Frank expressed his appreciation for the Conference's Delegation to the General Conference.

Personal Privilege: Fred Haustein expressed the appreciation of the Conference youth for the response of our General Conference Delegation to the input of the youth. Trebie Shaw asked the Conference stand in appreciation of the Delegation. It was done.

Moving Day: Everett Vinson moved that moving day be Wednesday, June 23. It was done. Bill Elliott moved that our Standing Rules be brought into line with the Discipline. It was done.

Tom Abney presented Helen Wilson, Conference Missionary to Bolivia, to the Conference, which stood in appreciation. Miss Wilson brought greetings and love from the church in Bolivia to the Conference.

Resolution: Ray Hozendorf, of the Council on Finance and Administration, nominated Grafton Thomas as Conference Treasurer until his retirement in February 1977. He was elected.

Ray Hozendorf offered a resolution, expressing the Conference's appreciation for the fourteen years of service contributed by Grafton Thomas. The Conference adopted the resolution by giving Grafton and Marie Thomas a standing ovation.

Treasurer: Grafton Thomas expressed his appreciation for the Conference's action, and gave the Treasurer's Report.

Statistician: Cagle Fair, Conference Statistician, gave his report. It was adopted. The Conference applauded in appreciation for his work.

Religion & Race: The Commission on Religion and Race, nominated Ed Harris to the Commission. He was elected.

Courtesies: Bennie Ruth, Chairman of the Committee on Courtesies, reported the attendance yesterday of George W. Harper of the Louisiana Conference, and of R. E. L. Bearden and Harold Eggensburger, of the North Arkansas Conference.

Wilma Frank was presented to the Conference, which gave Bishop and Mrs. Frank a standing ovation in appreciation. The District Superintendents and their wives were presented to the Conference, which expressed its appreciation by singing the Doxology.

Everett Vinson read a statement of love and appreciation for Bishop and Mrs. Frank, for their faith and service in our Conference these four years.

Bishop Frank expressed his appreciation for his Cabinet and recognized the three departing District Superintendents and their wives and the three new District Superintendents and their wives.

Next Session of the Conference: Gene Harwood, Chairman of the Board of Hot Springs First United Methodist Church, invited the Conference back next year. His invitation was accepted.

James Major urged that the Conference never take the First United Methodist Church of Hot Springs for granted, but that we continue to be grateful for their extensive work and faithful service in entertaining the Conference. The Conference applicated in agreement.

Resolution: Charles Settle, Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions gave their Report. The Report was adopted.

Appointments: The pastors stood and received and accepted their appointments. The lay members received and accepted the pastors appointed to their churches.

Adjournment: James Major, Conference Secretary, moved the Conference adjourn. It was done.

Bishop Frank pronounced the Benediction. The Conference closed with the singing of the first and second verses of "A Charge to Keep I Have."

VI. Reports

THE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Director's Report

The program for the Little Rock Conference for 1976 is a strong one! Adopted at the 1975 session of the Annual Conference, the program contains: Purpose, Priorities, and Implementation of Objectives. The specific objectives originated from all parts of the Conference. They came to the Council on Ministries as program input. As these objectives are implemented, the purpose of the Conference and the priorities will have been fulfilled.

Let us look at the implementation of the priorities which is now in progress.

- 1. The new structure is functioning well. At the 1976 session of the Conference we will be aware of the effectiveness of the structure. Perhaps one of its strongest features is Conference-wide representation at every level.
- 2. A fine program of evangelism is being implemented. A Conference Workshop on the "New Life Mission" was conducted. Local churches and districts are developing programs of evangelism which will produce splendid results.
- 3. Numerous leadership training events are being conducted all over the conference. Age-Level Workshops, Bible Conferences, and other types of training enterprises are being called for and provided. The Conference Council Board of Education is happy to meet requests for training.
- 4. The Pension Program is moving forward under the leadership of the Conference Board of Pensions. All levels of leadership both clergy and lay are helping to put this important program over.
- 5. Alleviation of World Hunger is a priority that will be with us for a long time. Numerous efforts have been made throughout the conference to implement this priority. Heifer Project, UMCOR, and other channels have been employed.
- 6. Stewardship is always important. The Conference Council Board of Stewardship is giving excellent leadership. A Workshop on Estate Planning was conducted as a pilot project in the Pine Bluff District. It is anticipated that other districts will request this type of workshop.
- 7. The Conference Board of Lay Men, along with the Conference Lay Leader, is implementing Lay Speaking Training. An important function is being fulfilled in the lives of trained speakers. The service they render throughout the conference is great!
- 8. Progress is being made in the Audio-Visual field. Audio tapes are being used, and we are moving into video-tapes. The speakers at the Holy Spirit Conference were video-taped. The Council on Ministries office now has video-taping equipment. This is a good step forward.
- 9. Curriculum emphasis has been made in many training events, including a Team-Training Event in the Pine Bluff District. A strong effort is being made to revitalize the Church School. Even strong plans are being made for 1977.
 - 10. Some progress is being made in making merger effective. Both the Conference

Council Commission on Religion and Race and the "Blue Ribbon Committee" authorized by the 1975 Conference are working on this important priority.

Proposed Program for 1977: The Proposed Program for 1977 is a challenging one! It includes Purposes, Objectives which help fulfill the purposes, and Priorities. Proposed Priorities are: (1) Alleviation of Hunger by all possible means. (2) A strengthening of the ethnic minority church. (3) A Conference-wide program of Relational Evangelism with emphasis on adding new members and reclaiming inactive members. (4) Interpretation and promotion of the program and askings for the new Quadrennium. (5) A Call to Prayer that ministers and other leaders will be raised up by the Holy Spirit and respond to the call to service. As Council Director, I commend these priorities to you, along with the entire Proposed Program. Now, let me make two other comments: (1) During this current quadrennium, we have been moving toward district programming. Funding for this has been difficult, but we are making real progress. For 1976 each district was allocated a flat \$750.00 for programming. For 1977, we are recommending an amount equal to each district's decimal share of \$10,000.00. If adopted, this will make possible substantial programming in each district. (2) Finally, let me express appreciation to Bishop Frank, the Cabinet, the Council on Ministries, the Council Staff, the District Councils, and to each of you. Without the fine cooperation in our conference, the development and implementation of a strong program would be impossible.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES BOARDS, COMMISSIONS AND COMMITTEES

BOARD OF CHURCH & SOCIETY - 1976

- 1. The Arkansas Guidance Foundation was provided \$150.00.
- 2. The Board funded \$1,800.00 to the continuing ministry to the deaf at First United Methodist Church, Little Rock.

This ministry includes a weekly Sunday School Class at the church, and a regular study group at the Arkansas School for the Blind.

3. Arkansas has a new ethnic minority group who have been uprooted from their homes, some from families, and all from a way of life that was familiar. They have experienced a long journey, temporary location on a military base, and resettlement in Arkansas.

The Board of Church and Society has been sensitive to the needs of these new neighbors. Because of the efforts of the Board, Educational Television (KETS) Channel 2 will offer, beginning in September, a one-year course in English to the Vietnamese who now live in our state.

We recommend that the churches of the Little Rock Conference make voluntary financial contributions through the area treasurer to Vietnamese Literary Program.

1977

- 1. During the next quadrennium, the Board of Church & Society will place emphasis upon functioning as an agency for programs of Social Concerns, and will move away from the functioning as a funding agency.
- 2. The Board shall work closer with the Arkansas Office of Drug Abuse Prevention. Directories containing services available through Arkansas Office of Drug Abuse Prevention Agency and additional educational opportunities will be provided to local churches and ministers through the above office.

3. Directories containing Priorities of Social Concerns within the conference will be provided by the Board. Copies will be sent to each local Church & Society Chairperson, and to each local pastor of the Conference.

Your Conference Council Committee on Communications feels there is a need for better communications between the local church and its connectional agencies in the District and Annual Conference, as well as with the general agencies and the public. The Committee proposes the support of the following priorities:

- 1. Improvement of the audio visual program and development of material for media use;
- 2. Expanded program for education for Missions (emphasizing children's materials and participation);
 - Alleviation of World Hunger UMCOR;
 - Support of World Service;
 - 5. Support of The Arkansas Methodist and other Methodist publications;
- 6. In communications responsibility the Committee if asked will provide assistance at Ánnual Conference sessions for public address facilities, news coverage, and assistance on press releases;
- 7. Your Committee on Communications under directive of the Annual Conference has appointed a study committee to look closely into The Arkansas Methodist.

In the years of 1976 and 1977 we hope to give attention to helping District Directors of Communications and District Superintendents develop skills in and resources of communications. In selected areas, if requested, there will be workshops to help local churches develop their own audio-visual aids by use of cassette recorders and instamatic cameras. In broadcast areas there will be study in the placement and development of radio and television programs. In Districts that request help, there will be workshops for developing newsletters, bulletins, and printed media.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL COMMITTEE ON CAMPUS MINISTRY

With gratitude to the Churches and individuals who make possible our Ministry to Campus communities, we respectfully report the following:

Campus Ministry is the continuing expression of United Methodist concern for maintaining an effective Christian witness and service to those who are grappling with the difficult problems of personal identity, career orientation, ethical development, and value choices. It ministers to students, faculty, and administrative personnel through a multilevel format of: personal counseling, including social, moral, and intellectual matters as well as spiritual guidance; group learning situations, including study, discussion, recreation, and work projects; and, formal religious experience in Chapel services, Bible study sessions, and participation in religious leadership roles in local churches.

The appreciation of our Campus Ministry is characterized by the deepening commitments of both those who benefit from and those who give support to the work. This is to be seen in the growing numbers of our program participants, their enthusiasm for broadening the scope of our work, and the voluntary services and contributions of so many who have aided us in these troublesome financial times.

Your Campus Ministry wants to respond to its task and to its supporters with increasing vigor, to enlarge its catalog of services, to enrich its programs of activity, learning, and worship. In many ways efforts are being made now toward that response, but there are many more ways by which that response can be made creative, helpful, and redemptive . . . ways that are currently out of reach of our resources.

Because of our desire to improve our Campus Ministry and to preserve its places of service, its buildings, and its leadership both lay and clerical, we make the following recommendations:

- 1. That the Annual Conference, recognizing that there has been no increase of support for Campus Ministry in eight years, increase its Wesley Foundation apportionment to \$61,200 annually, \$1,200 of which is directed to the Wesley Foundation of the University of Arkansas at Monticello for the acquisition of housing.
 - 2. That the funding from Conference Benevolences be increased to \$13,500.00 annually.
 - 3. That the Stabilization fund (a revolving fund) be established at \$15,000.00.
- 4. That each Wesley Foundation be funded equally from the above with monthly income of \$1,300.00 for basic operations and an annual division of remaining funds at year's end as such funds are available.
- 5. That a special apportionment of \$1,200.00 annually be approved with the proceeds directed toward acquisition of housing for the Wesley Foundation of The University of Arkansas at Monticello.

Recognizing the impact of these recommendations, the Committee stands ready and willing to explain them in detail being convinced of the usefulness and needfulness of bringing our Campus Ministries into support and service levels comparable to eight years ago as well as to similar ministries by sister Conferences and other denominations. We pray the opportunity to serve and respectfully request the resources to do so.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF ECUMENICAL CONCERNS

The board of Ecumenical Concerns seeks to stimulate the participation of United Methodist members at all levels, from the national to the local, in the development of events of understanding and sharing with other denominations and religious faiths.

We recommend and encourage our Annual Conference to explore and participate in sharing official observers between the United Methodist Church and other Methodists who share our common Wesleyan tradition.

We recommend that our Annual Conference support the work of the Arkansas Council of Churches and that we make the financial support of our Conference a separate line item in the Conference Benevolences. Since the work of the Arkansas Council of Churches is entirely separate from the National or World Councils of Churches, we recommend that we separate the Arkansas Council of Churches from the Interdenominational Fund.

We further recommend that our Annual Conference support the work of ecumenical conferences and seminars on the State, District, Jurisdictional, and National levels. Our Board has set aside scholarship aid for help to persons interested in attending ecumenical meetings. All requests for scholarships should be sent to Rev. Louis L. Averitt, chairman of the Board of Ecumenical Concerns.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

Conference Program

The Conference Council Board of Education accepted the responsibility for implementing objectives assigned to us by the 1976 Program for the Little Rock Annual Conference. The 1976 Objectives and implementation procedures follow:

- 1. Teacher Training for the local church. Numerous Age-Level Workshops have been conducted throughout the conference. Additional ones are now being planned. These workshops provide down-to-earth help for teachers and workers with each age level. Of special interest and significance was the Team-Training Event in the Pine Bluff District. In this enterprise, teams were trained so they would be equipped to go into local churches of the district to help solve problems and develop programs.
- 2. District Bible Conferences. Bible Conferences are being implemented. Among these are: Camden District with Dr. Lycurgus Starkey, Jr., and Little Rock District, in cooperation with First Church, Little Rock, with Dr. William Power of SMU.
- 3. Emphasis on new curriculum material for children. Following the Conference-wide Workshop on Children's Resources, various districts have conducted training on the new curriculum material, using as resource persons the teams trained in the Conference-wide Event. Of course, each Age-Level Workshop included emphasis on the resources available for each age.
- 4. Inter-generational studies for family unity in the church. There is a growing trend to include classes for parents and other adults in the Vacation Church School sessions. This type of enterprise helps adults to bring their children, and to learn during the process.

5. Support for Scarritt College. Bob Gentry of Scarritt College reports that we have made a good beginning on implementing this objective. He asks for the continued support from our conference.

It has been a real pleasure to implement these Objectives. In every case, the event has been planned to meet an expressed need! Our policy is, and has been to plan an event to meet the needs of any requesting group.

We are quite proud of our Conference-wide events: (1) Camping for children, youth, and adults at Tanako, (2) Coaching Conference and Vacation Church School Clinics, (3) Children's Choir Festival, and (4) Arts and Crafts Festival.

The Board of Education is happy to work as one of the cooperating agencies on the Coordinating Committee on Camping. We feel that this is a good approach to adequate planning.

Recommendations:

- 1. Launch an Educational Program called, **Decision Point: Church School**, with the following emphases: (a) Affirm the positive values of the church school, (b) Encourage pastors and church school leaders to assess their church school and to set goals for the quadrennium, (c) Stress the importance of the role of the pastor as teacher/educator, (d) Interpret the factors which contribute to effective church school.
 - 2. A program of Church School Teacher and Leader Training.
 - 3. Workshops in various areas as needed and requested.
 - 4. Age Level Emphases in the districts.
 - 5. Special Consideration of Scarritt College as an Advance Special.

Finally, we urge the use of United Methodist Curriculum Materials in our churches. This material is planned for us, and is constantly being improved.

Finances:

The Board of Education requests that the Council on Finance and Administration designate the fourth Sunday of September as Christian Education Sunday, and that \$11,000.00 be apportioned to the churches for Christian Education Sunday. This amount received by the Board of Education from the churches makes possible the extensive program of Christian Education characteristic of our conference.

Report No. 2

We recommend that the apportionment for Hendrix College be \$130,200.00 or an amount equal to our fair-share decimal.

Report No. 3

We recommend 100% support for the Black College Fund as developed by the General Conference.

Report No. 4

The Board concurs in the nomination of Harold K. Davis and John B. Hays as Trustees of Hendrix College and submits their nominations for election.

BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Conference Year 1975-76

Two important events have been developed by the Board of Evangelism in the year since last Annual Conference. One was the Conference on the Holy Spirit, which was aimed at bridging the gap between various opinions and convictions concerning the work of the Holy Spirit. The Conference was such a success that a number of people had to be denied registrations. We hope that the spirit of this Conference will continue to spread throughout the Annual Conference.

In February of 1976, a three day training for leadership in New Life Missions was conducted for 32 pastors and District Superintendents of our Conference. These ministers are now exceptionally well equipped to lead in this fine method of evangelism.

The Remainder of 1976

It is our goal that a number of Churches and Districts begin plans for holding New Life Missions. An introductory packet may be obtained from Dr. Alvin C. Murray, Coordinator for New Life Missions for the Conference. He may be contacted at 723 Center Street, Little Rock, Arkansas, 72201.

Program for 1977

- 1) A workshop on Relational Evangelism is planned for each of the three areas of the Conference. These will be: Central (Little Rock District and parts of Pine Bluff and Arkadelphia), February 18-20; Southeast (Monticello, Camden, and part of Pine Bluff), February 21-23; Southwest (Hope and Arkadelphia), February 24-26. These will introduce a new type of personal evangelism, led by Mr. Vance Archer of the Board of Discipleship, Nashville, and also the Comprehensive Plan of Evangelism for the Local Church, which is to be adopted by the General Conference.
- 2) We recommend that more churches plan a New Life Mission and that Districts consider planning District-wide New Life Mission events.
- 3) We recommend a Conference-wide emphasis on prayer during 1977. Specific plans will be made later but it is suggested that Pastors and Churches obtain copies of books and planbooks: Living Workbook of Prayer, by Maxie Dunnam, The John Wesley Great Experiment, The Intensive Care Unit, and How To Tell A Church; all of these may be obtained from Tidings, P. O. Box 840, Nashville, Tennessee, 37202.
- 4) We recommend to all Pastors and Churches that they consider the development of a bus ministry. A helpful manual, Church Bus Ministry, by Roy H. Ryan, may be obtained free by any Pastor writing the Conference Council Office.

We further recommend:

- 1) That due to the change in structure, with more emphasis in the Districts and less responsibility on the Conference level, that the position of Conference Secretary of Evangelism be discontinued, with the Chairman of the Conference Board of Evangelism and the Staff of the Conference Council on Ministries assuming responsibilities formerly held by that officer.
- 2) That the Board Officers attend the Council of Evangelism at Des Moines, Iowa, in 1977, and that they along with other representatives, attend the Congress on Evangelism at Tulsa in 1978.
- 3) That Dr. Alvin C. Murray be confirmed as the Conference Co-ordinator for New Life Missions.

Report No. 2

In view of the fact that Evangelism is designated one of three missional priorities for 1976-80, we make the following recommendation:

That each local church in the Little Rock Conference set a goal for a net increase in membership for the calendar year 1977; and that these figures be reported to the District Superintendents and compiled as a conference goal for 1977.

Nineteen and seventy-five (1975) was the year of transition from the Conference Board of Laity, under the previous conference structure to the new Conference Board of Lay Men according to the constitution adopted by the 1975 Annual Conference. (See 1975 Journal.)

District Boards of Lay Men were organized and given specific responsibility for all programs of Lay Men in the districts. District budgets were increased. Local church Lay Men reflected an increased interest in lay work by their greatly increased attendance at the district meetings.

The annual Little Rock Conference Assembly of Lay Men at Camp Tanako had the best attendance for the past six years. Dr. L. Pherigo, from St. Paul Seminary taught a course on The Characteristics of Jesus. Bill Mann led a wonderful music ministry. The other two assembly speakers were Bishop W. C. Martin and District Superintendent George W. Martin of Arkadelphia. It was an inspiring experience.

The year recorded the death of our former Conference Lay Leader, Herb Allman, of Hot Springs. He was a great leader of our lay people.

Lay Men's Day was observed on October 12 in most of the churches of the conference.

Lay Men pledged their efforts to achieve the following emphasis in the year.

- 1. Lay Speaker Training
- 2. Using trained laymen in the Sunday Worship Service
- 3. Assisting local churches in raising their goals to fund our Conference Pension Plan.
- 4. Promotion of adult church school classes to use the Living Bible Series of lessons.
- 5. Help promote Evangelism efforts in all local churches cooperate with the pastor Evangelism Committee. Reports reflect much accomplishment in these efforts.

Local church member stewardship needs to be approached prayerfully. The Christian's obligation to return unto the Lord a tithe of his material gains ought to be accepted by all members as a part of our commitment. It is one of the aims of our conference lay men to stimulate the acceptance of this Christian obligation.

Lay speakers, more and more, are helping to fill pulpits in emergencies. This is one of the purposes of training lay speakers and they should be used when the need exists. Your district chairman of Lay Men will assist in these assignments.

Each church in our conference needs the leadership and support of an active organization of United Methodist Men to help the pastor and the Council on Ministries achieve the local church ministry. The Conference Board is set up to help in the organization of such groups.

In conclusion the Conference Board of Lay Men wishes to express our gratitude to Bishop Frank, the Conference Cabinet and the staff of the Conference Council on Ministries for their understanding and personal support of our efforts during the conference year.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF MISSIONS

Report No. 1

Program and Policy

1. The Board of Missions continues to consider its first priority to be Church Extension and Special Mission Projects. Other priorities are: Parish Development, Missionary Education and Interpretation, Town and Country Ministries, Health and Welfare Ministries, and Ecumenism.

- 2. During this year a special priority shall occupy our concern, the alleviation of hunger in the world, by all means at our disposal.
- 3. We have fulfilled our Conference responsibilities through Church Extension Fund grants and Special Church Extension. The policies of the Board are affirmed to be those found on page 116 of the 1973 Journal of the Little Rock Annual Conference. Application for Church Extension assistance should be made to the Reverend Mr. George Tanner, Extension Secretary.
- 4. Our Conference Missionary Secretary, the Reverend Mr. Thomas A. Abney, and the District Missionary Secretaries are responsible for several areas of interpretation and promotion. Through them the Board is involved in Missionary Education and Interpretation, the co-ordination of itinerating missionaries, support of Town and Country Ministries for the benefit of the smaller churches in our Conference, the promotion of the needs and work of UMCOR, and a continuing concern for Advance specials through cooperation with the Commission on Communications. As a sponsoring agency of the Arkansas School of Christian Mission, the Board offers study in the field of Missionary Education. We recommend the inclusion of children's materials and training of leaders in children's studies as part of the Mission School. The Board, working with the Cooperative Extension Service of the University of Arkansas, offers financial support for persons attending the Town and Country seminar at Fayetteville.
- 5. We have been and will be in active consultation with General Board of Global Ministries seeking, with their help, to make the total program of Missions effective within our Conference. Together we hope to strengthen our program in Ethnic Ministries.
- 6. We recommend the election of the Reverend Mr. Thomas A. Abney as Conference Missionary Secretary.
- 7. We recommend that the Jurisdictional Advance Special project of Rio Grande Conference, Oklahoma Indian Mission Conference, and Lydia Patterson Institute be apportioned to the churches by the District Superintendents.
- 8. We recommend Conference Advance Special giving for Aldersgate Methodist Camp in the Annual Conference without goals.

CONFERENCE MISSIONARY SECRETARY

The support of The Little Rock Conference for the work of Missions has been especially gratifying during the recent economic instability of our region. The basic missional support or World Service continues to be met in full by the Conference, the Conference Advance Specials support has increased, and the Jurisdictional Advance Special causes have begun to catch the attention and support of our people. The great jewel in this crown of achievement is the tremendous increase in support of The United Methodist Committee On Relief, an increase of approximately one-hundred and fifty percent has been recorded for UMCOR.

Our program of education for Missions has included numerous District and sub-District workshops, personal appearances in local churches, regular contact with Regional and General Board of Missions Staff to up-date our information, frequent responses to requests for information and/ or materials from individuals and local churches, and occasional news releases and itineration of Mission Interpreters. In addition we continue to grow in our support of and participation in The Arkansas School of Christian Mission.

To further develop these areas of Mission outreach and understanding, the following proposals are offered:

- 1. To conduct a program of education for Benevolence giving at the Conference level with District programs of similar design to follow.
- 2. To encourage District Councils on Ministries to strengthen the work of District Mission Secretaries, and to strongly recommend to District Nominating Committees the selection of persons as District Mission Secretaries who will participate in Thé School of Missions, the Committee on Education and Cultivation, and District Missionary Institutes.

- 3. To adopt a quadrennial Advance Special project through the World Division in the amount of \$12,000.00 (\$3,000 annually) for the "Special Africa Medical Program."
- 4. To cooperate with the Council on Finance and Administration in the support of the Jurisdictional Advance Specials through the apportionment system.
- 5. To promote Golden Cross objectives by establishing an annual special offering goal of \$3,000.00, the proceeds of which shall be used in relief of medical costs for deserving Methodists through a joint supervision between the Conference Insurance Committee and the Conference Council Board of Missions.
- 6. To expand the program of Mission Interpretation to include at least four itinerations of Missioners each year.
- 7. To promote the visiting of mission installations and mission personnel by persons or groups travelling in the United States or abroad.
- 8. To promote the cultivation of persons for mission service with special emphasis on short-term home mission work, and to encourage the development of leadership within the Districts for strengthening the program of Church-Wide Mission studies.

The attention of the Conference is called to the display of Mission materials and information available for the sessions of the Conference, the dates of The Arkansas School of Christian Mission — July 28 through August 1, the recent additions of slide films on Lydia Patterson Institute for our Conference audio-visual library, the growing interest in Heifer Project International and other hunger relief measures, and what must be the smile of our Father who is lifting our spirits in all these ways and directing our energies to all these tasks.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF STEWARDSHIP

We recognize an almost desperate need for additional persons in the fulltime ministry and other church-related vocations and that local pastors need assistance in carrying out their work and ministry effectively.

- 1. We propose to initiate an emphasis on Career Planning and Counseling, especially the ministry, through area, conference or district workshops on Career Planning or conferences on the ministry.
- 2. We propose to make full use of certified Lay Speakers in the life of the church through assisting pastors in Sunday worship services and for preaching in emergency situations.
- 3. We propose a call to prayer by God's people that ministers and other leaders will be raised up by the Holy Spirit and respond to the call to service, and that the church will recognize and respond to those so called.
 - 4. We propose that throughout our Conference, through District and Local Churches:
 - (a) We continue to sponsor Seminars on Estate Planning.
 - (b) We encourage and promote Every Member Visitation programs in all local churches.

(c) We dramatize and encourage tithing as a minimum standard of giving.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF WORSHIP

During the past year, the Conference Council Board of Worship has:

- Piloted a project in Church Music Clinics designed to assist the needs of local churches. Key resource persons in this project are Dr. and Mrs. Ned DeJournett of Little Rock.
- 2. Planned the services of worship for Pastors School at Hendrix College in conjunction with the North Arkansas Conference Board of Worship.
- Planned and published the worship booklet for the current session of the Little Rock Annual Conference.
- 4. Provided resource persons for local church and district workshops in the area of Christian Worship.

Program goals for 1977 include:

- To make workshops on Church Music available to local churches, sub-districts, or districts in the areas of a) children's, youth, and/ or adult choir clinics, b) the use of the Methodist Hymnal in congregational worship, c) use of music in the services of the church, i.e. weddings, funerals.
- To make available workshops in the areas of Christian Worship such as weddings, funerals, use of the Christian calendar, the sacraments.
- 3. To make available workshops in innovative worship.
- 4. Possible publication of a booklet offering guidelines, theology, and bibliography in a chosen area of Christian Worship such as the Board's previous publications of Guidelines for Weddings and Guidelines for Funerals.
- 5. To be available to assist District Councils on Ministry.
- 6. To assist the Little Rock Annual Conference in worship planning such as at the Annual Conference Session, Pastors School, convocations, rallies, etc.
- 7. To assist local churches in securing music staff persons through working with the Conference Council Office in providing a roster of available church musicians.

ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

For our Bicentennial celebration year, the Commission on Archives and History is jointly, with the North Arkansas Conference, publishing, "A History of Arkansas Methodism 1816-1976."

This book is written by Dr. Walter N. Vernon, and is a treasure for each United Methodist in Arkansas. It is now on sale in the Archives and History booth here at Annual Conference. The cost is now \$9.95 and was sold at a pre-publication price of \$7.95.

There are only 2,500 copies of this publication, and most of them are already sold. We encourage each member of the Annual Conference to buy at least one copy.

The Commission is also working on restoring the old antique organ at Old Washington Church, and we hope to have this project completed by the end of the coming year.

BOARD OF MANAGERS, THE ARKANSAS METHODIST

I - Report

The Arkansas Methodist is in its second year of being financed by the apportionment plan. There is a current circulation of 33,683 at a cost of \$105,526 annually, as compared to 17,448 circulation at a cost of \$95,268 under the previous individual subscription plan. (This represents a 93 per cent increase in circulation at an 11 per cent increase in costs.)

Local churches have responded very positively to paying this apportionment. In 1975 the Little Rock Conference paid 98.59 per cent, and the North Arkansas Conference paid 94.14 per cent. The first two months of 1976 (as this report goes to print) shows an increase in remittances on this apportionment as over against this time a year ago. (The apportionment plan for annual conference publications seems to be meeting with growing acceptance in many annual conferences.)

Response from readers can only be interpreted as an increased readership involvement of Methodists across the Area. The renewed undergirding of an Area newspaper is increasingly necessary as the general church publications cease to be published, and the church's Committee on Communications is looking more and more to regional and Area and annual conference publications to interpret and report the work and mission of The United Methodist Church.

The board has sought expert advice and counsel, and will continually do so. The nominating committees of the two annual conferences have added members to the board with expertise in journalism, advertising and public relations in order that all reasonable economics be practiced in an effort to publish the quality religious newspaper to which Arkansas Methodism is accustomed.

11 - Recommendations

- A. The Board of Managers continue to recommend that the subscription costs for the publication of the Arkansas Methodist be apportioned to local churches. (The Cabinets and the Conference Councils on Finance and Administration are to determine that apportionment schedule.)
- B. The Board of Managers recommends that, commencing January 1, 1977, and for the 1977 to 1980 quadrennium, the apportionment to the two annual conferences of the Area be increased to \$130,300 (or \$65,150 to each annual conference). This increased asking is necessitated by the rapidly accelerating costs in printing and mailing, as well as the norma cost-of-living increases. (This \$130,300 figure represents an average of the estimate budgets of the quadrennium: \$120,803.04 for 1977; \$127,035.95 for 1978; \$133,609.49 for 1975 and \$140.544.80 for 1980.)

The board has compared this cost schedule with other approaches, such as going into the Texas Methodist program, only to find that it would cost \$129,727.10 in 1977 compared to our \$120,803.04 figure, for the same 32,000 circulation plan. (This figure represents \$96,252 to be paid to the Texas Methodist and \$33,475 to maintain the necessary editorial staff in Arkansas to edit and forward the news.) When one considers that we currently control all the news in the Arkansas Methodist and that we would only control one-fourth of the pages under that plan, plus the fact that the publishing of local church and Area news would be 10 days old, while currently we work on less than a 24-hour delay, our present arrangement still seems to hold the more promise.

- C. The plan-of-circulation proposal continues as:
- 1. Those who request it.
 - Pastor(s), Administrative Board and Council on Ministries members; officers of UMW, UMM, UMYF, Church School officials and teachers — at least those who request it.
 - b. All shut-in members who request it.
 - c. Any family who requests it. (We suggest that these requests be made in writing or by phone; not simply a pulpit announcement that unless specifying they do not want the paper, it will be sent them, and that this be repeated annually.)
 - d. New members (who qualify under the above provisions) as they join.

The board and editorial staff are totally dependent upon local church pastors and leaders to see that these guidelines are followed. We urge these local leaders to help avoid waste by not sending subscriptions to those who do not request the paper, yet at the same time encouraging all who will to take it and read it. The board, in conjunction with the Cabinets, plans to ask local churches in July for a midyear update of existing subscription lists.

- 2. Conference-connected persons (where submitted by the appropriate authorities, along with their correct address):
 - a. Retired ministers or their surviving spouse.
 - b. Seminary students.
 - c. Ministers in connectional appointments.
- 3. Churches which wish the paper sent to every member family without the necessity of those families requesting it may choose the Every Family Plan by paying a fee of \$1 per family in addition to their regular apportioned amount. (Example: A church having 75 families would pay \$75 in addition to the amount apportioned by the Annual Conference.)
 - 4. Any subscription not qualifying in any of the three categories above will be \$5 per year.
- 5. The local church "Special Edition" plan: Local churches are invited to consider this plan whereby a local congregation can have the back page for news of their own local church. The cost of this service:
 - a. \$1,250 annually (or \$25 per week for 50 issues). (This figure is subject to revision.) Plus:
 - b. \$1 per family (the "Every Family Plan"), plus:

c. The amount apportioned to your local church by the annual conference. (Example: A church with 500 families, and an apportionment of \$850 will pay \$1,250 plus \$500 plus \$850, which equals \$2,600.)

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE SALARIES

The Equitable salary support for a charge shall be computed on the combined ministerial support paid the pastor by a charge.

- I. Charges are eligible for Minimum Salary Assistance provided:
 - Each church submits its budget, in writing to the Commission, through the District Superintendent annually.
 - 2. Each church conduct an Every Member Visitation, and report the results to the Commission, through the District Superintendent annually.
 - 3. Each church pays in full all acceptances to the Conference or District Treasurer.
 - The charge agrees to increase salary support a minimum of \$100.00 annually, moving toward the goal of total support at the earliest possible date.
 - 5. The charge makes application to the Commission annually, on the prescribed form, by action of the Charge Conference.
 - The charge is served by a full-time pastor, or ministerial student approved by the Annual Conference. By full-time we mean disciplinary meaning of full-time minister.
- II. The Commission will supplement charges meeting these requirements to reach the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference up to a maximum of \$1,500.00 per year computed on the basis of total support paid the pastor by the charge including base salary, travel and utilities.
- III. The minimum salary for a pastor, approved by the Annual Conference for the conference year beginning June 1, 1974, shall be:

Full time	\$7,000.00
Resident, student	6,000.00
Non-resident, student	.5,500.00

IV. To encourage charges to reach full Equitable Salary support, a charge will be given credit for any annual increase that is in excess of \$100 (see 4 under Program) in an amount equal to one half of said increase; total support not to exceed \$7,500.00. Salary supplementation is determined by: 1975 Salary - 1974 Salary - \$100

plus 1975 salary not to exceed a total salary plus supplementation of \$7,500.

V. We encourage the cabinet, the local church and the pastors to work toward charge realignment immediately, in order to strengthen the Church and improve ministerial support.

- VI. Station Churches, except in geographically isolated situations paying less than Equitable Salary, will be given two years to meet minimum standards or undergo charge reorganization. Failure to meet this requirement will result in loss of Equitable Salary assistance.
- VII. In the event of insufficient funds to meet all claims each charge shall share proportionately from the funds available.
- VIII. The Commission shall report annually in the Conference Journal by district the amounts paid during the calendar year to each charge and minister.
- IX. That the above plan of distribution of funds be made effective June 1, 1974.

C. We recommend that \$4,356 be approved for Arkansas Council of Churches and that amount be apportioned to the local churches by the District Superintendents.

V. Other Apportioned Funds:

- A. Black Colleges: We recommend that an amount of \$48,391 be apportioned to the churches by the District Superintendents for the Black College Fund.
- B, Hendrix College: We recommend that an amount of \$130,200 be apportioned to the churches by the District Superintendents for Hendrix College.
- C. Campus Ministries: We recommend that an amount of \$61,200 (\$1,200 of which is to go toward purchase of a parsonage at the University of Arkansas at Monticello) be apportioned to the churches by the District Superintendents for Campus Ministries, and that the Conference Stabilization Fund be set at \$15,000. We also recommend an emergency grant of \$1,200 in 1976 toward the down payment on said parsonage at U.A.M.

- A. Fourth Sunday in January Human Relations Day
- B. Second Sunday in February Philander Smith Scholarship Day

- D. Fourth Sunday in Lent One Great Hour of Sharing
- E. Second Sunday in May Golden Cross Sunday
 F. Second Sunday in June United Methodist Student Day

- H. Fourth Sunday in September Christian Education Day (\$11,000 to be apportioned to the churches by the District Superintendents)
- I. First Sunday in October World Wide Communion Sunday

VIII. Other Recommendations:

A. Pastor's Utilities: If a charge does not otherwise provide for a pastor's utilities, then each charge is requested to designate the cost of parsonage utilities as a part of the pastor's salary, thus exempting the cost of utilities from the income tax claim.

B. Authorized Payments by the Conference Treasurer:

- 1. Methodist Foundation of Arkansas \$1,500 from Conference Administration Fund on a vouchered basis.
- 2. Incidental expenses of the Trustees, Boards and Agencies not receiving appropriations to be paid from Conference Administration Fund on a Vouchered basis.
- 3. The Annual Conference Host Church be paid any deficit in Conference Entertainment expenses upon financial statement to the Area Treasurer from the Conference Administration Fund after approval by the Committee of the Annual Conference.
- C. Conference Benevolences Unrestricted Fund: That all unrestricted benevolent fund balances be placed in a central operating balance with the exception of the Board of Missions which shall transfer all balances to the Special Church Extension Fund (restricted).

- D. Interest Income: That interest income from investments shall continue to go into the Conference Administration Fund.
- E. Honorarium for Conference Preacher: We recommend that the Honorarium for the Conference Preacher be decided upon by the Presiding Bishop and the Chairman of the Council on Finance and Administration and that this amount be paid from Conference Administration Fund.
- F. Minister's Credit Union: We have responded to the Annual Conference request for a committee to be named to study the feasibility of establishing a Credit Union for Ministers. Those on the committee are: Roy Bagley and John Blundell from the Council on Finance and Administration and John B. Hays from the Board of the Ministry.
- G. The Conference Treasurer, Grafton Thomas, will retire in early 1977, and the Little Rock and North Arkansas Councils of Finance and Administration recommend that a Joint Committee be appointed to (1) Draw up a Job Analysis for the Treasurer's Office that would include special emphasis on Stewardship cultivation, office management, and direction of the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas, and (2) That when this is approved by the two Councils, the Annual Conference authorize the employment of the person who can perform within the Guidelines developed until the next sessions of the Annual Conferences.
- H. We recommend that any Conference employee who has, or who desires, a Tax-sheltered Annuity may direct the Joint Treasurer's Office to pay this annuity from his reglar income following proper guidelines.
- We give our approval to the 1977-1980 Quadrennial Advance Specials for World Hunger and Ethnic Minority Churches, and recommend them to the local churches for second-mile giving.

Report No. 2

At a meeting on May 28, held at the United Methodist Center, in Little Rock, the Joint Committee began its work to develop a job analysis for the Office of Area Treasurer of the United Methodist Church in Arkansas, anticipating the changes resulting from the retirement of Mr. Grafton Thomas, effective February 7, 1977.

The following recommendations are submitted after lengthy discussion and careful consideration of the needs of Arkansas Methodism.

- I. We recommend that this office be named The Office of Stewardship and Finance.
- II. We recommend that the work of this office shall include:
 - (a) The keeping of the financial records and accounts of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences, as well as any Area accounts presently being handled by the Office of Area Treasurer.
 - (b) To provide financial services for any agencies of the two Conferences requesting it, with contractual arrangements approved by the joint Council on Finance and Administration.

- (c) To maintain good public relations with the agencies and local churches of the two Conferences.
- (d) To develop and promote a program of stewardship cultivation in both Conferences.
- (e) To be responsible for the promotion of the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas.
- (f) We recommend the employment of a Director of Stewardship and Finance.
- III. We recommend that the Director of Stewardship and Finance:
 - (a) Be a person loyal to Christ and the United Methodist Church.
 - (b) Have a thorough knowledge of accounting principles, and the computer system recently installed in this office.
 - (c) Be responsible for the oversight of the keeping of all financial records and accounts of the two Conferences, as well as all Area accounts assigned to this office.
 - (d) Be responsible for providing up-to-date financial information to the Councils on Finance and Administration, the Bishop, the District Superintendents, Boards and Agencies, and the local churches.
 - (e) Assume responsibility for the supervision of the office, including assignment of duties to the secretaries and oversight of their work.
 - (f) Serve in the capacity of Executive Secretary of the Councils on Finance and Administration of the two Conferences.
 - (g) Provide leadership in the areas of Public Relations, Stewardship Cultivation, and as executive officer of the Arkansas Methodist Foundation.
- IV. We recommend that the public relations function of this office include:
 - (a) Preparation of articles for The Arkansas Methodist, designed to keep the Conferences informed on financial matters.
 - (b) Be available for work in the various districts, in cooperation with the District Superintendent.
 - (c) Tactful handling of local church problems, regarding printouts and other records.
 - (d) Presenting the financial reports to the Annual Conference sessions.
- V. The work of Stewardship Cultivation shall include planning and conducting seminars and workshops in the Area, in cooperation with the Councils on Ministries of the two Conferences, as well as promoting all endeavors planned to strengthen the work of Stewardship and Finance at the local church level.
- VI. As executive officer of the Arkansas Methodist Foundation, the Director shall develop a program of emphasis upon Wills and legacies, including the location of prospective donors, careful contact and cultivation, and identification and promotion of the various causes of United Methodism.

VII. We recommend that financial support of the Director of Stewardship and Finance be at the level of the Executive Directors of the Councils on Ministries of the two Conferences.

INSURANCE COMMITTEE

Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program

The Little Rock Conference has the Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program provided by the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church. The Travelers Insurance Company is the underwriter for this insurance.

Eligibility

Complete eligibility requirements may be found in the 1975 Journal of the Little Rock Annual Conference.

Ministers transferring into the Conference may enroll in HMEP within 90 days of transfer without having to fill out a "Statement of Physical Condition" form. A new lay employee of a participating church or organization may enroll within 90 days of employment without having to submit a "Statement of Physical Condition" form.

Enrollment applications and cards are available from the Insurance Committee Secretary at the Joint Treasurer's Office.

Quarterly Premium Rates

The General Board of Pensions has informed us that the following rates will become effective July 1, 1976, for the Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program.

Recommendations Concerning Payment of Premiums

- I. We recommend that each local church, or charge, provide 60% of the premium cost for either individual or family coverage, whichever is applicable, for those under regular appointment, and for eligible local church lay employees.
- II. We recommend that the Conference Board or Agency responsible for their own budget provide 60% of the premium cost for either individual or family coverage, whichever is applicable, for ministers under special appointment with annuity credit on the Conference.

III. We recommend that the Conference Board of Pensions provide 60% of the premium cost of the HMEP for each Conference Claimant.

Note: Retired ministers serving appointments should refer to the Board of Pensions Report, Recommendations 8 and 9, for information concerning payment of their HMEP premiums.

All persons holding an appointment from the Bishop are required to participate in the Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program.

If a minister has not paid his HMEP premium by the beginning of the quarter following the quarter for which the premium was due, the minister will be removed from the HMEP enrollment. Any hardship case should be communicated by the District Superintendent to the Secretary of the Insurance Committee for review by the Insurance Committee. Any exceptions to this rule must be approved by the Insurance Committee.

Benefits Paid Under HMEP

Under Age 65

Benefits paid under HMEP for those under age 65 may be found in the 1975 Journal of the Little Rock Annual Conference.

Important Information Concerning Medicare Enrollment

Any minister who will reach his 65th birthday when he is still serving in a full-time capacity, and not drawing Social Security, should apply three months before his 65th birthday at his local Social Security office for Medicare. This applies to ministers who are eligible and wish to participate in Medicare.

Any minister who has passed his 65th birthday, and has not applied for Medicare, but wishes to do so, should contact his Social Security office immediately.

Should a minister's wife reach age 65 before the minister, she should apply for Medicare at the local Social Security office.

It is the minister's responsibility to secure his own Medicare coverage.

For those age 65 and older, the HMEP provides supplemental hospitalization and medical expense coverage only.

Age 65 And Over - Complements Medicare

In-Patient Hospital Services: Full payment of each \$104 Part A Medicare deductible; full payment of \$26 per day from 61st through 90th day; full payment of semi-private and miscellaneous charges from 91st through 120th day beyond payment made from Medicare Lifetime Reserve days; then 80% of reasonable charges from the 121st day up to a \$250,000 lifetime maximum.

Skilled-Nursing Facility (Nursing Home): Full payment of \$13 per day from the 21st through the 100th day.

Physicians, Surgeons and Other Medical Services (Including Out-Patient Hospital Diagnostic Services): 20% of reasonable charges after a \$60 calendar year Medicare Part B deductible. You must pay the \$60 Part B deductible.

Prescription Drugs (self Administered), Full-time (RN or LPN) Private Duty Nursing: 80% of reasonable charges after calendar year deductible of \$50, up to a \$250,000 lifetime maximum.

Death Benefit Program

The Little Rock Conference has Plan D of the Death Benefit Program provided by the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church.

Eligibility

Complete eligibility requirements may be found in the 1975 Journal of the Little Rock Annual Conference.

Enrollment Periods

An open enrollment period shall be held each year during the month of December for all persons currently eligible. The effective enrollment date shall be January 1, of the succeeding year.

A limited enrollment period shall be held each year for 90 days following the session of each Annual Conference. Enrollment at this time shall be limited to those persons for whom appointment or change of Conference relationship on or after January 1, has provided new eligibility status in the plan.

Individual enrollment may be requested at any time within 90 days of becoming newly eligible, with the effective date of eligibility as the effective date of coverage.

Enrollment application cards are available from the Insurance Committee Secretary at the Joint Treasurer's Office.

Premium

The DBP premium is 1.82% of the average salary of the Conference, which as of January 1, 1976, is \$10,114.00. The premium for 1976 is \$184.07, minus a \$25.00 refund, or \$159.07. The recommendation is that the church pay 60%, or \$95.44, and the pastor pay 40%, or \$63.63. As long as we do not have heavy claims, we anticipate such a refund yearly, to be distributed as determined by the Insurance Committee.

The 1976 premium was due at the Joint Treasurer's Office December 1, 1975, since premiums for the whole Conference were due at the General Board of Pensions in January, 1976, to avoid a late payment interest charge. This schedule will be in effect again this year.

Retired ministers should refer to the Report of the Board of Pensions, Recommendations 7 and 9, for information concerning payment of their DBP premium.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE CAMP - CAMP TANAKO

The year 1975 proved to be a good year for Camp Tanako. We had 33 groups or events and of these there were 27 Methodist and 6 non-Methodist groups. We had 2143 campers, compared to 1656 in 1974, and with the staff, volunteers and paid, we had a total of 2575 campers.

There were 7098 camper days as compared to 6250 in 1974, and 5694 of these were "Methodist," compared to 5042 in 1974.

The most conservative figure we can arrive at gives us a total of 21,000 plates served and washed in 1975!

During the year of 1975 the camp became debt-free for the first time in many years. However, due to the purchase of a new truck we ended the year 1975 with a \$2,000.00 debt. This debt has already been liquidated.

There is much that needs to be done at the Camp. Routine maintenance and painting is always with us. Also, we are getting into the position of having now to consider replacement of major items of equipment because of age and wear.

We encourage and recommend that all churches include Camp Tanako as a line item in their budgets and, if possible, increase the amounts over previous giving. Further, we recommend that the second Sunday in August be designated as Camp Tanako Sunday and that a special offering be received in churches that do not have the camp in their budgets. We are also asking that the Council on Finance and Administration provide the Camp with \$12,000 from Conference Benevolences for 1977.

We are grateful to the Council on Finance and Administration for their continued support of Tanako. We are also grateful to the Conference Council Board of Education for their support. Further, we appreciate very much the churches and individuals who continue to support us.

Camp Tanako is now open year round for use by churches and groups. This is our camp, owned and operated by our Conference. Let's use it and support it to the fullest!

BOARD OF MINISTRY

Report No. 1

Policy and Program

- I. The Little Rock Conference Board of Ministry purposes to work strictly within the framework of the current Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church.
- II. The elected officers of the board are: chairperson, vice-chairperson, secretary, registrar and associate registrar. The registrar shall be the treasurer.
- III. The executive committee of the board are the elected officers, Chairperson of the Continuing Education Committee, and the Chairperson of the Conference Relations Committee.
- IV. The board shall meet prior to the opening of school, at midyear and Annual Conference, and on call of the Chairperson.
- V. The board shall have representatives on each District Committee of the Ministry (Par. 665.18). In consultation with the district superintendents, the chairperson shall appoint a member of the board to serve on each committee.
- VI. The board's sources of income shall be:
 - A. A percentage of conference benevolences.
 - B. ¼ (25%) of the amount collected from local churches designated for Ministerial Education.
 - C. Gifts, bequests, interests, and repayments of loans.
- VII. The board shall maintain a scholarship aid fund for ministerial training as follows:
 - A. For those in the course of study above the license to preach.
 - 1. Assistance in courses of study schools.
 - a. The cost of required textbooks for each year of the course of study. The enrollees are required to submit to the registrar itemized statements or invoices from Cokesbury for books purchased for use in the pastor's school courses.
 - b. The cost of tuition or registration fees, and of room and board while attending the course of study schools.

- 2. Assistance in the correspondence course.
 - a. Payment of fees.
 - b. The cost of required textbooks for each course; the enrollees are to purchase the required books and then be reimbursed by the registrar.
- B. For students from the Little Rock Annual Conference preparing for the effective ministry in the United Methodist Church who:
 - Have satisfactorily completed at least enough semester hours of college credit to qualify for classification as a junior.
 - 2. Are enrolled in a college, university, or seminary approved by the University Senate of The United Methodist Church.
 - 3. Hold a current license to preach in the United Methodist Church (beginning January 1, 1977, a certificate of candidacy for the ministry), be enrolled in a seminary, or be a Probationary Member of the Little Rock Conference.
 - 4. Make application annually to the registrar of the board prior to August 1, giving all information requested and authorizing regular grade reports to this board's registrar from the school's registrar, including a transcript of credits at the end of the year. Application must be requested.
- C. The board may set a maximum amount of scholarship aid per year per recipient, but assistance will be determined for each individual on the basis of requirements or needs.
 - Scholarship aid for summer sessions will be granted one-half of the maximum annual allowance.
 - The maximum scholarship aid for college students shall not exceed five (5) semesters. The maximum aid for seminary students shall not exceed four years.
 - 3. Additional emergency scholarship aid will be granted at the board's discretion to students in the following categories, requesting and making application, who:
 - a. Begin preparation for the ministry later in life with pressing financial responsibilities.
 - b. Have severe health circumstances.
 - c. Come from disadvantaged economic backgrounds.
 - 4. The maximum amount of emergency scholarship aid per person per year is one-half of the amount of the school's tuition cost.
- VIII. The board shall encourage participation in continuing education programs by ministers of the Little Rock Conference.
 - A. Enrollment is encouraged in the "Group Guided Study Program" of Perkins School of Theology, or in a comparable study program of St. Paul School of Theology.

- B. The board will underwrite the total travel expense and board and room (if any) of a faculty member of cooperating institutions conducting one day seminars for authorized study groups. Arrangements for paying these expenses will be made by the study group through the board's registrar.
- C. Pastors are encouraged to participate in at least one continuing education experience annually (Refer to Par. 355 of the 1972 Disc.). The following shall serve as policy guidelines:
 - Members of the Conference, participating in continuing education enterprises approved by the Committee on Continuing Education, may receive up to \$150 to cover costs for tuition, board and books. Persons are responsible for their own travel.
 - Persons seeking financial aid for continuing education shall secure an application form from the Chairperson of Continuing Education, John Dill.
 - No person shall be given more than \$150 each calendar year for continuing education.
 - 4. In hardship cases, ministers can apply to the continuing education committee for help to attend Pastor's School. Such help will only be granted after other avenues for aid have been exhausted.
 - 5. No financial aid is available for Minister's Week.
- IX. The board shall give assistance in a reasonable amount for physical examination for persons to be admitted as associate, probationary or full members.
- X. Effective with the adjournment of the 1976 Conference, Lay Pastors who are not ordained and, who are appointed to a charge, may administer the Sacraments in the bounds of the charge to which he/she is appointed. (Beginning January 1, 1977, the Discipline will grant this privilege.)

Requests and Recommendations

- The board, each district superintendent, pastor and local church shall hold up to young
 persons the need for ministers and the challenge of the ministry, that may enable them
 to hear the call.
- II. As the first step to the ministry, candidates shall enroll for studies for license to preach with the Department of the Ministry, Division of the Ordained Ministry.
 - (After January 1, 1977, they shall meet the Disciplinary requirements to obtain a certificate of candidacy for the ministry.)
- III. Each pastor shall obtain folders on the course of study and the books for the course of the license to preach.
- IV. We assume our Conference's share of financial responsibility for the Arkansas Pastor's School.
- V. The Annual Conference Council on Finance and Administration is requested to grant:

- A. An appropriation of a percentage from conference benevolences, based on the board's financial needs that are not met by other sources.
- B. An apportionment to local churches for the Ministerial Education Fund based on 2% of the local church budget excluding benevolences, building and debt service.
- VI. We express our appreciation for the support given the Ministerial Education Fund by the churches of the Annual Conference. We urge every church to continue to give full cooperation and support of its share of the Ministerial Education Fund for the remainder of this calendar year and 1977.
- VII. Ministers may be given a minimum of two week's vacation and a minimum of one week annually to participate in a continuing education enterprise. (See Par. 355 of 1972 Discipline).
- VIII. We request room for a filing cabinet in the Conference Headquarter's Building for the purpose of filing official minutes and records of the Board of Ministry.

Committee on Conference Relations

The Committee on Conference Relations of the Board of Ministry is charged with the responsibility of making recommendations to the Conference concerning all proposed changes in Conference Relations. Included are:

- 1. Changes from effective relation to the Superannuate relationship, the Supernumery relationship, Sabbatical leave and locations;
- 2. Return to the effective relationship from another relationship.
- 3. Readmission of those formerly located.

All requests for such changes in Conference Relations and correspondence thereto should be sent to the Chairperson of the Committee on Conference Relations, John Ross.

Pursuant to Paragraph 365 of the 1972 Discipline the Committee on Conference Relations prior to the meeting of the Annual Conference shall receive from all retired ministers "who reside outside the bounds of the Conference" a statement "of their Christian and ministerial conduct, together with an account of the circumstances of their families, signed by the district superintendent or the pastor of the charge within the bounds of which they reside."

BOARD OF PENSIONS

Recommendations

- 1. We recommend that the annuity rate be set at \$69.00 per service year beginning July 1, 1976 for both retired members of the Conference and Special Conference Claimants.
- 2. We recommend that the apportionments to the charges of the Annual Conference for Conference Claimants be an amount equal to 25% of the pastor's salary and that after the cost of the current distribution is paid the remainder be paid into the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund.
- 3. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1261 Section 5 of the 1972 Discipline that the Sunday following Easter, April 17, 1977, be observed as Retired Minister's Day. Each pastor is urged to acquaint his or her congregation with the pension program of the Conference as part of the observance, and if possible, to use a retired minister in the Worship Service.
- 4. We recommend that the pastor of each Local Church present the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas Memorial Program for Retired Minister's Pension Fund to the members of his or her congregation and urge their participation in the program.

We request that the Conference Statistician provide a column in the Conference Journal listing the number of Memorials made through the Local Church to the Methodist Foundation Of Arkansas.

- 5. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1259 Section 5 of the 1972 Discipline the approval of the Annual Conference that Special Appointments shall be listed in the Conference Journal as follows: (1) with annuity claim (a) upon the Annual Conference, or (b) upon a General Board, an institution, or an agency of the United Methodist Church; (2) without annuity claim upon this Annual Conference.
- 6. We recommend that the Board continue to apportion to each agency and institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claims on the Conference the sum of \$360.00 per year in accord with the 1972 Discipline Par. 1259 Section 3. a (3); and that said apportionments be paid to the treasurer of the Little Rock Conference

Board of Pensions not later than 15 days prior to the end of the fiscal year. And that a like amount be assessed upon the office of the District Superintendent and said amount be paid from the District Superintendent's Fund.

- 7. We recommend that eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants have the death benefit program provided for them with the contribution to be paid by the Conference Board of Pensions in accordance with the program of the Conference Committee on Group Insurance.
- 8. We recommend that the Conference Board of Pensions pay 60% of the annual payment of the premium of the Group Hospitalization for all eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants. In addition, we recommend that the eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants have the voluntary portion of the Medicare paid by the Conference Board of Pensions.
- 9. We recommend that all retired Ministers who serve appointments under the District Superintendent, and receive less than \$1,000.00 in Annual salary and expense from the Charge, will have their contributions and premiums paid by the Conference Board of Pensions as outlined in Par. 7 and 8 of this report.

Furthermore, we recommend that the Church or Charge, served by a retired Minister who receives \$1,000.00 or more salary or expense from the Charge, will pay the required 60% of the HMEP premium and the retired minister pay the remaining 40%; that the Charge pay the required 60% of the Death Benefit Program premium with the Conference Board of Pensions paying the remaining 40% of the premium.

- 10. We recommend that an annual amount of \$2,400.00 from the pensions of each retired minister of the Little Rock Conference be designated as housing allowance.
- 11. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1260 Section 6 of the 1972 Discipline that there shall be organized from the membership of the Board of Pensions of the Little Rock Conference a committee to compare the records of the amount paid by each pastoral Charge for support of pastors and for pension benefits purposes, computing the proportional distribution thereof and keeping a permanent record of defaults of the ministers in the Conference who have failed to observe the provision in Par. 1260 Section 6 pertaining to proportional payment; and shall render annually to each minister and Charge in default a statement of the amounts in default for that and preceding years.

In event of default by any Pastoral Charge after the notification by the Committee, liens shall be filed against future pensions and the names of the Churches and Ministers along with the amount in default shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

- 12. We recommend that all the Service Years of each minister be listed in one column in the Conference Journal and in another column list the number of these years for which he or she has a claim on the Little Rock Conference.
- 13. Since the Little Rock Conference has established a Minimum Salary considered to meet the needs of a full-time pastor, we recommend that (1) A minister who received the Minimum Salary or more must derive his or her sole compensation from the Charge and/or Conference sources in order to be eligible for pension benefits as a full-time minister. (2) If a minister receives less than the Conference Minimum Salary from church sources, but earns more than 40% of his or her total compensation from outside employment, he or she is not eligible for pension credit. (3) Student Supply time is to be considered as employment aiding one preparing for full-time service as is required to meet minimal standards as a Conference member or certified associate member for actually serving full-time pastorates. The student is not eligible for pension benefits.

14. By vote of the Annual Conference we entered the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund program as of January 1, 1974. We are now a full partner in this program.

We want to again express our appreciation to all Local Churches of the Little Rock Conference for participation in the additional budget askings for an eight year period.

Our Special Gifts Campaign is continuing until we reach our million dollar goal to supplement the funds mentioned above. As of March 8, 1976 our pledges have reached \$797,359.48.

We are grateful for the generosity of our people in making it possible for us to meet our obligation to the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund in full for 1975. We must continue this good work for the eight year period.

COMMISSION ON RELIGION AND RACE

The Commission on Religion and Race is concerned with effective merger and an effective ministry for the local Black churches of the Conference.

There is a need to focus on the local church. There seems to be little black/white cooperation. There is a need to listen to the people's needs expressed.

There is a need to be exposed more to Black Worship. Suggestions would be joint worship or pulpit exchanges.

A recommended goal is to have consultations in each District on the Black Church. These to be presented by black members. It should be a time of listening to the Black churches. It should be educational — finding areas of mutual ministry. These consultations would also serve to look at possible sites for "new congregations." Each District Council on Ministries would hold these consultations. They would invite ministerial and lay leaders. It would be open to anyone who wished to come, plus specific people such as District Missions chairman, District Evangelism chairman, etc.

A budget of \$1,160 is recommended for 1977 (\$560 for Meetings and Correspondence Expenses, \$200 for Black Youth Coordination, and \$400 for Consultations).

- 1) We continue to support the work groups and task forces that are developing Urban Ministries proposals. We support the present Urban Council and its work.
- 2) We recommend the following guidelines for the District Consultations on the Black Church:

Purpose: To have conversation and interaction between members of the black and white

churches on the Lord's work, to express mutual needs and inspirations, and to trust the Holy Spirit to bring us together.

When: One in each District by June 1, 1977.

Who should attend: Pastors, members of District Council on Ministries, one youth and one adult representative from each church, plus others who wish to attend.

Who should organize and lead: A task force of 6. This should include 3 members of the Commission on Religion and Race, the District Superintendent, the Chairman of the District Council on Ministries, and one other representative from the District (preferably a youth).

COMMITTEE ON REVIEW AND EVALUATION

To annually review and evaluate the work of the Conference Council, boards and agencies; to review the job analysis of our Conference employed staff and make recommendations for changes and to recommend revisions, of our Annual Conference structure is the work of this Committee.

We seek from the Boards and agencies of the Conference ideas and suggestions on structural changes they see, and any other needs of which they are aware.

One decision of the Judicial Council, which was asked by the General Conference for a ruling, needs to be brought before our Conference. The Judicial Council ruled that each Annual Conference is required to have the Boards and Agencies with the titles and functions of Boards and agencies as required by the new Discipline. We believe that most of our new structure and organization meets this requirement but that a committee must see that we do meet this mandate. Since the Structure Committee which proposed the new Conference structure was only charged with the responsibility to bring in the new plan and is no longer constituted, we recommend that the Review and Evaluation Committee plus Dr. George W. Martin, Dr. Ed Dunlap, John Blundel and Don Riggin serve as a committee to see that all the titles and functions of the Boards and Agencies of our Conference are in line with the legislation in the new Discipline.

One concern which has come is a need for evaluating the method of presenting program and budget requests through the Conference Council on Ministries. There is a need for more input from the Districts on goals, programing, budgeting and evaluating for the Conference Council. Also, it would be helpful for the Council members to have advance copies of materials for study before the Conference Council meetings

Change In Standing Rule

The action of General Conference requires that the Nominating Committee membership be an equal number of Clergy and Lay persons.

Therefore, we offer the following Standing Rule Amendment to be presented at this time to "lie on the table for 24 hours" to be recalled for action.

Proposed Change in The Standing Rule

Article I. Conference Organization

Item 4. Nominations.

- (a) The Conference Nominating Committee shall be composed of the District Superintendent and one lay person from each district. The Bishop shall serve as chairman.
- (b) The Conference Nominating Committee shall nominate six members (three lay and three clergy) at large to achieve an equal balance of lay and clergy members, alternating by districts as follows:

Arkadelphia	Little Rock
Camden	Monticello
Норе	Pine Bluff

- (c) The Conference Nominating Committee will nominate all members of the Annual Conference quadrennial and annual boards, commissions and committees and Conference Council on Ministry Boards, committees and commissions except as otherwise provided. Each District Nominating Committee will complete its list of qualified nominations by December 31. All nominees shall be consulted regarding their nomination.
- (d) Terms of office of the Nominating Committee shall be for four years beginning on January 1 following the session of the Annual Conference in the middle of the quadrennium.

There is an additional recommendation on the structure which is needed to make a provision for filling vacancies on the District Council on Ministries.

We recommend that:

- (a) The District Nominating Committees are to fill vacancies on District Council on Ministries during the conference year and they are to be elected by the District Council on Ministries.
- (b) New members of District Council on Ministries take office immediately after election.

An item which has come to our attention and which we have been asked to bring before the Conference is the decision of General Conference that each District must have a District Commission on Religion and Race, and each local church a work area on Religion and Race. We recommend that the chairperson of the Conference Commission on Religion and Race be a member of the Conference Board of Missions.

We recommend that in cooperation with the North Arkansas Conference a state-wide recognition service welcoming and honoring our new Resident Bishop be held. We recommend that the Joint Committee on the Episcopacy be the committee to plan this event.

We have been asked to bring in a policy for Conference lay employment and a job analysis for the Associate Council Director, The Arkansas Area.

Here is the policy we propose for Conference Lay Employment:

- (A) The Conference Council Director has the overall supervision of the Conference staff and shall be in charge of employment of the office staff.
- (B) The lay employees shall receive a base salary, travel expense but no housing allowance.

- (C) The lay employees may participate in the Conference Pension Program, the Death Benefit Fund, and the Hospitalization-insurance program if the Conference Council Director and the lay employees so elect.
- (D) The mandatory retirement age shall be the age set by the General Conference retirement policy for the clergy.
- (E) The Conference Council on Ministries in consultation with the Conference Council Director shall determine the number and job descriptions for lay employees, the salaries and other benefits.

After being asked last year to bring in a job analysis for the Associate Council Director, the Arkansas Area, we found that the North Arkansas Conference did not have a committee to work with us in providing this job description. Therefore, realizing that the position is an Area one but believing that we should bring in a more thorough job analysis than we have, here is what we see as the work of this office.

Job Analysis Associate Council Director The Arkansas Area

- (A) The Associate Council Director shall be an energizer helping to plan specifically for black participation in Conference programs and activities and for fellowship among the blacks of the Conference.
- (B) The Associate Council Director shall work closely with plans from the Commission on Religion and Race.
- (C) The Associate Council Director shall cooperate with the planning and programs of the Urban Ministries Council.
- (D) The Associate Council Director shall work in helping develop pastoral leadership in and for the black churches of the Conference.
- (E) The Associate Council Director shall keep the Conference aware of property needs of the black churches.
- (F) The Associate Council Director shall be a liaison person to the Council on Ministries, to the District Superintendents, to the District Councils on Ministries, and to Boards, Committees, and Commissions. The Associate Council Director shall be available to the Cabinet for consultation and shall preach on invitation anywhere in the Arkansas Area.
- (G) The Associate Council Director shall aid the Council on Ministries in the office duties.
- (H) Along with other Council personnel and staff, the Associate Council Director shall take on other assignments, as needed, as determined in consultation with the Council Director.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Carolina Methodist Church in Nevada County was declared abandoned and offered for sale. We now find that the original deed on the two acres on which the church stands, contained a reversion clause and could not be sold. We now recommend that the conference rescind its previous action and that this property be placed back in the hands of the Hope District. And that the remaining acreage that does not have the revision clause remain in the hands of the Annual Conference Trustees. It is our understanding that interested parties in the district wish to restore this church.

Old Cyprus Church and 4 acres in Dallas County has been abandoned. A cemetery association has been informed and incorporated and we recommend that this property be deeded to them.

The Camden District Conference requested that the Little Rock Annual Conference declare the Wingfield Chapel United Methodist Church in Columbia County abandoned. We ask this conference to now declare this property abandoned and authorize the Conference Trustees to offer it for sale to the highest bidder.

The Annual Conference in 1973 approved the sale of property in the Vimy Ridge Community, the proceeds of which were to be given to the Little Rock District Board of Missions. We now have an offer from Doyle L. Roach for \$500.00. We recommend the sale.

The Friendship Methodist Church located near Cario in Union County has had no services for some time. We recommend that this property be declared abandoned and offered for sale by the Conference Trustees.

Reference to Upchurch Chapel Methodist Church, Route 1, Mabelvale, Arkansas. It is the understanding of this Board that this church was abandoned by the Methodist many years ago. For the record, we now recommend that this conference declare it abandoned and that the property be officially deeded to the Trustees of the Upchurch Methodist Episcopal Church as recommended by Dr. J. Edward Dunlap, District Superintendent of the Little Rock District.

For the conference record, the Zion Methodist Church and Oak Grove Methodist Church both have been sold as recommended by a previous conference.

REACHING OUT IN MISSION!! This is what the United Methodist Women of the Little Rock Conference have been doing this year. Membership has been one of our primary concerns and this has increased this year; total is 9,761 as of December 31, 1975, even more than that now. Four new Units have been organized since this time last year: 2 in the Hope District, 1 in Little Rock and 1 in Pine Bluff for which we are very grateful. All churches without local units have been contacted concerning organization and we will continue to work in this area.

The women have also reached out in mission in the area of finances as we reached our pledge for the first time since our organization in 1973. We sent to the Women's Division \$112,361.57 which included some special giving as well as our pledge. We also continued our support to the Little Rock Conference Youth Program and Aldersgate Inc.

We continue our emphasis in mission by our participation in our Arkansas School of Christian Mission. The school last summer was excellent and well attended. Reports have indicated that more units, as well as the total church, are being involved in studies at the local level than in previous years. We hope that this trend will continue because the better we understand our mission program, the more we CARE & ACT. This summer our school offers great opportunities for both women and men. Special Leadership Training for local officers will be an emphasis during both schools. Dates are July 28-August 1.

Our Second Annual Meeting was another indication of our REACHING OUT IN MISSION when some 400 gathered in El Dorado for a very challenging program. Our theme "Our Oneness in Mission" was carried out in a variety of ways and our special guest speaker was Mrs. C. Jarrett Gray who spoke on "Now is the Time and You are the People." Discussion groups in the afternoon proved to be a very worthy idea. Several women; local, district, and conference have been involved in Division programs this year. There were Legislative Training Workshops, consultation with ERA contact people, Women Division Board Meeting, Planning committee meeting on Communication workshop. Perhaps the focal point of our year was our Jurisdictional Meeting in Kansas City April 2-4. Our conference was well represented there and one of our women, Mrs. Rubye Lee Jackson, Pine Bluff, is a nominee for the Women's Division. Another of our women, Mrs. Donna Pighee, Little Rock, attended a 10 day workshop in the area of programming in New York.

Ms. Joan Clark, our Regional Worker, held workshops in four districts for local women, one for district leadership, and met with our conference team to work on goal-setting.

Several events have been planned for the near future. A communications workshop will be held sometime this fall and a Legislative Seminar Workshop is being planned for January 31-Feb. 1, 1977.

We look forward to the coming year with great anticipation and expectation because our women are concerned and are very involved. WE DO CARE AND WE ARE ACTING IN REACHING OUT IN MISSION.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE JOURNAL

The purpose of this committee is to reduce the size of the Journal, and consequently, the cost of its printing and distribution; and so we make the following recommendations.

- 1. To limit the historical material as follows:
 - a. Listing sessions of the Annual Conference only since 1960.
 - b. Omitting the Chronological Roll.
- To carry a summary of Conference Council Boards and Committees Reports compiled by the Director of the Council on Ministries in place of individual reports by Conference Council Boards and Committees, such being already printed in the Pre-Conference Report, beginning 1977.
- 3. To exclude the listing of local church lay leaders and addresses.
- To list the addresses of lay members of boards and committees in one alphabetical list as an index to membership of boards and committees.
- 5. To request the Insurance Committee to greatly condense and simplify its report.

- To omit job analyses for Director and Associate Directors of the Council on Ministries.
- 7. To exclude the listing of annuitants and the amount each person receives from the Board of Pensions Report.
- 8. To omit the Christian Civic Foundation Report.
- 9. To exclude the Committee on Resolutions Report.
- 10. To request that memoirs be limited to 500 words.

We request authorization for the Conference Secretary to consider and accept the best bid in terms of price, quality and time of delivery for the printing of the Journal.

BLUE RIBBON TASK FORCE ON MERGER

The 1975 Annual Conference voted to "establish a blue-ribbon task force of Ministers and Laymen, Black and White, to work on and to develop a strategy for ministering to the churches of the former Southwest Conference. This task force to be named by the Conference Nominating Committee by September 1, 1975, after receiving suggestions from any person who cares to offer suggestions for personnel, and report on its work at the next session of the Annual Conference." (75 Journal, P.60)

A lengthy list of Nominees was sent to and compiled by the Bishop's office. These were arranged in a ballot form and mailed to members of the Nominating Committee for their selection. The following persons were elected:

The Task Force had two lengthy meetings, Saturday, March 20, and Monday, May 24. Our report is from these meetings and has two sections: Things we "Noted" and things we "Recommend" to the Conference.

I. Notations:

- 1. We note that Blacks are members of all our present Boards and Agencies.
- 2. We note that progress has been made at the Methodist Children's Home toward an inclusive home. We commend this and lift up the need for more ethnic minority representation in the corporate structure of the Board of the Children's Home.

- 3. We note that there are problems related to the matter of appointing a Black District Superintendent. We urge continued awareness of and attention to these problems and the desirability of this goal.
- 4. We note that the 1976 General Conference has now mandated a Commission on Religion and Race on the District level, and a Task Force on Religion and Race in the local church.
- 5. We note the continuing need for Blacks to be a part of the decision-making processes of the Conference, and particularly the process of setting the Annual Conference Agenda.
- 6. We note the serious need for dedicated and qualified pastoral leadership and refer this concern to the local churches, the Cabinet and the Board of Ministry for their concern, attention and implementation.
- 7. We take note of the value of a person in the Conference Council as a liaison and enabling person among the Black Churches on a full-time basis.
- 8. We take note of the loneliness and frustration experienced by many Blacks since Merger. We affirm the need of persons, both Black and White, to belong and to have fellowship with those of longstanding traditions and mutual desires. We recognize the potential dangers of such associations turning into political cliques and pressure groups. But we also see that this does not have to be so, but it can be one way of meeting the valid need for identity and fellowship.

II. Recommendations:

We recommend that -

- The Annual Conference recommit itself to an inclusive church, and that the Commission on Religion and Race act as the structural vehicle leading us in this direction, and that members of the Commission attend meetings of the Boards and Commission to lift up the goal of an inclusive church.
- 2. The present memberships, population trends, evangelistic prospects, and property needs of churches with fifty members or fewer be surveyed and assessed by a Special Task Force to determine the wisdom of investing in major property improvements. If the findings warrant, we would recommend a capital improvement fund in connection with the Ethnic Minority Local Church priority to meet these needs.
- 3. The project resulting from the Urban Renewal Consultation in Little Rock, setting up the United Methodist Urban Ministries under the District Council, receive the moral and financial support of the Conference, and that, wherever possible in our urban areas of the Conference, strong consideration be given to similar property utilization.
- 4. A class for pastors be arranged with Philander Smith College for continuing education and that scholarships be provided for participants to attend.
- 5. A plan be devised for official and legitimate opportunities for fellowship, especially among our Black United Methodists and/or a strong consciousness-raising effort be made to fulfill the need for identity and fellowship at this time in the Conference. We believe this can be done in ways that will not fuel the fires of isolation and hostility, but speed the Conference on the way toward becoming actually an inclusive church.

6. This Task Force be continued one more year to furnish the Conference an additional arena for dealing with the issues and concerns of Merger, and that the Chairperson of the Conference Commission on Religion and Race be added to full membership on the Task Force.

William Edward Brown

Dr. William Edward Brown was born October 15, 1889 at Winslow, Missouri, the son of Lydia Ann Sifers and Joseph Edward Brown. He attended Central College and Missouri Wesleyan College and the University of Chicago. He was awarded the honorary doctor of divinity degree from Morris Harvey College, Charleston, West Virginia, in 1931.

He was licensed to preach at the age of seventeen and was admitted to the Southwest Missouri Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South in 1914.

He was married to Georgia Johnson of Springfield, Missouri, January 1, 1918, and they served

Succeeding appointments were as superintendent of the Baton Rouge (La.) District, superintendent of the Monticello District, pastor of First Church, Texarkana, and First Church, Benton.

In 1959 he organized the Christian Civic Foundation of Arkansas and served eight years as its Executive Director.

He made his home in Pine Bluff after his retirement.

Survivors include his wife, Georgia Johnson Brown; a son, William E. Brown, Jr., of Fullerton, California; two daughters, Mrs. James W. Peavey of Pine Bluff and Mrs. Mary B. Hartzog of Illinois, eleven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. A son, Joseph Robert Brown, preceded him in death.

Funeral services were held at First United Methodist Church, Pine Bluff, with Dr. John Lindsay, Bishop William C. Martin, and Dr. Marshall T. Steel officiating.

Robert Louis Riggin

Robert Louis Riggin was born October 28, 1909 at Crossett, Arkansas (Ashley County). He was the son of Robert Stanhope Riggin and Alice May Mann Riggin. He died December 11, 1975, busy about his Father's business.

Brother Riggin is survived by his wife, Bettie Mae Dillon Riggin, to whom he was wed March 8, 1934. To this union were born four children — Ann Genevieve Riggin (Mrs. Robert L. Ashcraft), Dale Newton Riggin, and Dean Franklin Riggin. Other survivors include eleven grandchildren.

October 26, 1943, Robert Riggin was licensed to preach at Wilmot Methodist Church. He was admitted on Trial in The Little Rock Annual Conference in 1947 and was received into Full Connection and ordained a Deacon in 1949. In 1951, he was ordained an Elder.

Brother Riggin's ministry was marked by a calm dedication to the task at hand, an abiding loyalty to the connectional church, and a careful administration of Methodist programs in Charges assigned to him. He served The Little Rock Annual Conference thirty-three years as pastor of the following Charges: Swan Lake, Drew Circuit, Hermitage Charge, Keo, Humnoke-Tomberlin, Foreman, Bayou Meto-Lodge Corner, Sardis-Bethel, Bearden, Timothy-Westside, Buena Vista, Tillar Charge, Grady-Trinity, Good Faith-Sulphur Springs, and Portland-Wilmot where he was serving in his fourth year at the time of his death. From 1966 to 1969, in addition to his pastoral responsibility, he served as Chaplain for Cummins (Department of Correction for Arkansas).

Robert Riggin held a very high respect for connectional Methodism and served the Little Rock Annual Conference on various boards and committees, including the Board of Evangelism, the Commission on Minimum Salaries, the Board of Ministerial Training, and the Conference Board of Trustees. He also served as District Director of Town and Country Work. With a high concept of the broader objectives of the church, Brother Riggin remained always close to the people and rendered especially effective work in his close pastoral work and community leadership to the Charges to which he was assigned. This quality was recognized when he was chosen Rural Minister Of The Year in 1960 by Emory University and Progressive Farmer.

Near to the heart of Robert Riggin was the work and programs of Camp Tanako. He was a member of the American Camping Association and was a very careful student of youth organizations, such as scouting, United Methodist Youth, and Masonic programs.

His funeral was held December 14, 1975 at the Wilmot United Methodist Church by The Reverend Everett Vinson, Monticello District Superintendent and Joe R. Phillips, Jr.

George Wallace Warren

The Reverend George Wallace Warren, son of the late J. A. Warren, was born June 18, 1896, at D'Loe, Mississippi, and died at Magnolia, Arkansas, May 30, 1976, following a long illness. He is survived by his step-mother, Mrs. J. A. Warren, Sr., of Mendenhall, Mississippi; two daughters, Mrs. Hoyt Davis of El Dorado and Mrs. Grady Greene of Las Vegas, New Mexico; two sons, Howard Warren of Morrilton and J. W. Warren of Magnolia. He is followed in the ministry by a grandson, the Reverend Eddie Warren of Waldo, Arkansas.

On January 13, 1915, George was married to Miss Ellie Upton of Mendenhall, Mississippi, who proved to be a faithful and beloved companion until her death on July 30, 1972, at Magnolia. She was an ideal Methodist minister's wife both in the quality of her family life as wife and mother and as a devoted servant of Christ and the Church. All that was mortal of these consecrated Christians lie side by side in the beautiful Memorial Park near Magnolia.

In the autumn of 1914, I came to know George as a classmate at the Mississippi Conference Training School, a fellow-worker in the chores about the campus, and as a brother minister



when we were both licensed to preach at Newton, Mississippi, October 20, 1914. I detected then the qualities that were to distinguish his long and useful ministry. After a year together, George moved on to Louisiana where he served six years as an Approved Supply Pastor.

George was admitted on trial into the Little Rock Annual Conference on December 2, 1921, at Pine Bluff, Arkansas. He gave thirty-nine years of faithful service and retired in 1960 because of failing health. As he was able, he ministered to small churches near his home at El Dorado until 1964 when he was unable to carry on the work and came to live in Magnolia to be near his devoted son, J. W.

His active ministry in Arkansas was spent largely in the small towns and rural churches where by his zeal and devotion he became one of the most successful ministers to serve in that area of work. He was Chairman of the Town and Country Commission and assisted in many novel projects in that field. He served on many of the other boards and commissions of the Conference. He was a wise and helpful counselor.

As a preacher, George was warm-hearted and evangelistic, conducting many revivals and campmeetings. He was preeminently an expository preacher. He studied and knew the Scriptures and the great doctrines of Methodism. He was motivated by the Christian concept of greatness: "He that would be great among you, let him be the servant of all."

I count it a privilege, as do many, to have known him in the last years when failing health and much suffering never brought an impatient or complaining word nor dimmed his vision of his eternal home. And now, as the marching column of my early comrades is thinning out

with ever-increasing rapidity, I pray that it may be said of me as confidently as I can say of George: "Servant of God, well done . . . "

X. Miscellaneous

The organization of the Little Rock Annual Conference is defined in the Statement of the Organizational Structure of the Little Rock Conference as printed in the 1974 Journal.

The Standing Rules are subject to the Discipline of the United Methodist Church and the Organizational Structure of the Little Rock Annual Conference.

THE STANDING RULES

I. Conference Organization

- Number of Districts, There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Annual Conference.
- District Conference. There may be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline, and one additional member from each pastoral charge, provided however, in charges of more than five hundred members there shall be one additional member for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.
- 3. **District Property.** In districts where no District Conference is held, the District Stewards may authorize the District Board of Trustees to mortgage, sell, or convey property held in trust by the District Board of Trustees.

4. Nominations.

- (a) The Conference Nominating Committee shall be composed of the District Superintendent and one lay person from each district. The Bishop shall serve as chairman.
- (b) The Conference Nominating Committee shall nominate six members (three lay and three clergy) at large to achieve an equal balance of lay and clergy members, alternating by districts as follows:

Lay	Clergy
Arkadelphia	Little Rock
Camden	Monticello
Hope	Pine Bluff

- (c) The Conference Nominating Committee will nominate all members of the Annual Conference quadrennial and annual boards, commissions and committees and Conference Council on Ministry boards, committees and commissions except as otherwise provided. Each District Nominating Committee will complete its list of qualified nominations by December 31. All nominees shall be consulted regarding their nomination.
 - All boards and agencies of the Conference shall be inclusive of ethnic minority representation.
- (d) Terms of office of the Nominating Committee shall be for four years beginning on January 1 following the session of the Annual Conference in the middle of the quadrennium.
- Lay Members. Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the Conference Secretary by the District Superintendent ninety days before the opening day of Annual Conference.
- 6. Youth Membership. Each District Council of the United Methodist Youth shall elect annually two youth members of the Annual Conference, and their names shall be sent to the Conference Secretary by the District Superintendent ninety days before the opening day of Annual Conference.

7. Board Service.

- (a) A membership on the same board, council, committee, or commission shall be limited to two consecutive quadrennia excepting ex-officio membership on the Conference Council on Ministries. Membership begins upon election.
- (b) There are two types of membership on Annual Conference boards, committees, commissions and councils: at large and ex-officio. A person may serve in only one at-large and/or one ex-officio capacity. All officers shall be elected from the at-large portion of each membership.
- (c) The membership of the Committee on Evaluation and Review and the Committee on Planning and Research shall be exempt from the provisions of (a) and (b) above.

II. Financial Administration

 Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall run from January 1 to December 31.

Financial and Statistical.

- (a) The District Superintendents shall furnish the treasurer with all apportionments to the churches on, or before January 15. These figures shall be official.
- (b) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars; with no column for cents.
- (c) Each pastor shall make a statistical report to the District Superintendent who shall submit the reports to the Conference Statistician. The Pastor's financial report will be audited and checked by the Final Data Processing Print-Out. Where there is discrepancy, the amount recorded on the Print-Out will prevail.
- 3. Administrative Fund. The council on Finance and Administration shall recommend an assessment for a Conference Administrative Fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the preconference report, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of preparing and printing the Worship Booklet for the Annual Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expense of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this Fund. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of the Fund. Payments for unbudgeted claims on this fund shall be made on vouchers signed by the Chairman of the Council on Finance and Administration or the Conference Secretary.
- 4. Program Budgets. Budgets for expenditures for program for the District and the Conference shall be co-ordinated by the Conference Council on Ministries. The Conference Council on Ministries shall make recommendations to the Council on Finance and Administration which shall make a final recommendation to the Annual Conference.
- 5. Conference Treasurer. The Council on Finance and Administration shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the Conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer, on recommendation of the Council on Finance and Administration, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.
- District Fund. The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other

necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall report to the District Stewards annually, showing receipts and disbursements. Funds budgeted by the District Council on Ministries will be paid by the District Treasurer upon action of the District Council on Ministries and the approval of the District Superintendent.

7. Apportionments Based on Pastor's Salary. On all items apportioned to local churches by means of a percentage of the minister's salary, such percentage shall be understood to apply to all ministerial members of the local church staff serving under the appointment of the Bishop and District Superintendent, including ministers in full connection, ministers on trial, and full-time Lay Pastors.

III. Conference Procedure

- Rules of Order. The rules of order shall be Roberts Rules of Order revised.
- 2. Reports and Resolutions. There shall be a pre-conference report which shall contain reports of all the boards and agencies of the Conference. This report shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the pre-conference reports shall be typewritten, in triplicate, on special forms furnished by the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary. In the event editing of a report is deemed necessary by the Conference Secretary and Chairman of the Board involved, permission is hereby granted.

3. Conference Expense Fund.

- (a) Registration fees and undesignated offerings taken at the Annual Conference shall be used to defray the expenses of the session including the honorarium and/or expense of the Conference Preacher.
- (b) The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the entertainment of the retired ministers shall be paid from the Conference Expense Fund. The host church shall pay a per diem for days actually in attendance directly to the retired ministers and be reimbursed from the Conference Expense Fund. Eligibility shall be determined by the Conference Board of Pensions.
- (c) Any deficit in the Conference Expense Fund shall be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund.
- (d) The Conference Expense Fund shall be administered by the Committee on the Annual Conference.
- 4. Unsponsored Resolutions. Any resolution not sponsored by a regular board or standing committee of the Conference must lie over for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon, provided, however, immediate debate and action may be ordered by two-thirds vote of the Conference present and voting.
- 5. Memoirs. There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased clerical member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, names of children, charges served, and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with the memoir. The same shall be done for probationary members, associate members and lay pastors. Likewise, a memoir of wives or widows of the above shall be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Sub-committee on Memoirs the death of any of the above mentioned and be responsible for the submission of Memoirs not later than thirty

days after the death occurs. The names or memoirs of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions, or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. The District Superintendent shall be responsible for securing the memoirs for laymen whose memoirs shall be published. It shall be the duty of the District Superintendents to report to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions the death of any conference claimant that occurs in their respective districts.

Historical Material.

- (a) The Library at Hendrix College shall be the depository for all historical documents and artifacts of the Little Rock Conference. The College Librarian shall be the custodian of these historical materials.
- (b) The Commission on Archives and History shall be responsible for securing a group picture of each class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his retirement.
- 7. Campaigns. All Conference-wide campaigns to raise funds shall be voted on by secret ballot of the Conference.

IV. Amendments

These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.

Resolution

In order to strengthen the Conference Council on Ministries and its respective boards and agencies, and in order to exercise more responsible stewardship, and in order to respond to the needs of local churches and districts for guidance from persons possessing expertise in empowering laity and clergy for ministry, I move that the Committee on Review and Evaluation be directed by the Little Rock Annual Conference to study the present tasks of the Conference Council office and make recommendations to the 1977 session of the conference which would:

- Shift as much of the responsibility for coordinating the program of the Annual Conference as possible from the Conference Council Office to the Council on Ministries and its boards and agencies.
- 2. Reduce the size of the Conference Council staff.
- Re-define the basic responsibility of the Conference Council staff in terms of serving as
 resource persons to local churches and districts in areas such as process planning,
 leadership training, Christian Education, and parish development, and revise job
 descriptions accordingly.

Resolution: Re: "Permit Alcohol in Dry Counties"

In view of the newspaper reports of the May 17th meeting of The Arkansas State Economic Development Study Commission, which record the unanimous recommendations to be presented to the Governor and General Assembly on October 1st as follows: "It is recommended that both public and private overnight recreational facilities located in a dry county be declared exempt from the law prohibiting the sale of alcoholic beverages; State laws should be changed so that alcohol can be served at public and private overnight recreational facilities located in dry counties; The change would allow these facilities, including all of the state-owned park lodges, to compete for conventions and business group meetings during the winter to help offset high overhead costs"; we submit the following resolution:

conventions and business group meetings during the winter to help offset high overhead costs"; we submit the following resolution:

"We, the members of The Little Rock Conference of The United Methodist Church,

meeting in its one hundred and twenty-sixth Annual Session, assembled at the First United Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas, on Tuesday. June 15th, respectfully request the Governor of Arkansas, the Honorable David Pryor, the members of The Legislative Council of The General Assembly, the members of The Senate and of the House of Representatives of The General Assembly of Arkansas to oppose as economically unnecessary and morally indefensible any legislative attempts to exempt public or private recreational facilities in dry counties from compliance with the existing Statutes governing Alcoholic Beverages in the State of Arkansas; we further request that all efforts to involve the State of Arkansas in the granting or holding permits for the sale of alcoholic beverages on State-owned or Stateleased property be opposed as attempts to make the State of Arkansas a "Pusher" for the drug called alcohol, recognized generally as the number one drug problem of America; we further request that no legislation be considered that would negate or deny the votes recorded by the citizens of dry counties under Initiated Act Number 1 of 1942, thereby choosing to make 44 counties of Arkansas "Dry"; we further request that alcoholic beverages not be used as "bait" in seeking the "economic development of our state"; we further request that recognition be given to the fact that Tourism in Arkansas has grown in dollar volume until it is the third largest industry in Arkansas, reaching this high goal during the 34 years that 44 of our counties have been officially "Dry",

We, therefore, respectfully request the Governor, The Legislative Council, and the members of The General Assembly to reject that portion of the report of The Arkansas State Economic Development Study Commission which deals with the exemption of State and Private Recreational Facilities in dry counties from present State Laws governing Alcoholic Beverages in the State of Arkansas."

Further, we commend the governor for his statement that the state parks should be primarily family oriented.

Resolution

Whereas, Grafton Thomas has served for fourteen years as area treasurer, during which time he has given dedicated and painstaking attention to the financial affairs of the area and has given of his time far beyond the call of duty in serving the conference, the local churches, the Council On Ministries and the boards and agencies,

Therefore, be it resolved by the Little Rock Annual Conference that we go on record as expressing sincere appreciation for this faithful and dedicated service of Grafton Thomas, and assure him of our prayers for a happy and meaningful retirement.

Articles Of Incorporation Little Rock Conference United Methodist Camp

Article I

The name of this Corporation shall be The Little Rock Conference United Methodist Camp. The Corporation shall be owned and operated by the Membership of the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church.

Article II

The purpose of this corporation shall be to establish and maintain a camp for recreational, educational, evangelistic, inspirational and other uses of the people of the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church, under the direction of the Board of Trustees as herein set forth, and not for profit.

Article III

The period during which this Corporation is to continue is perpetual.

Article IV

The Post Office address of the principal business office of this Corporation is 715 Center Street, Little Rock, Arkansas.

Article V

The name of the Resident Agent of this corporation is to be determined by the Board of Trustees and he shall serve in such capacity until his successor, as agent, is duly elected by the Board of Trustees, and qualified. The resident agent shall serve as Secretary-Treasurer of the Corporation during his term of office.

Article VI

The members of this corporation shall be the members of the Board of Trustees of this corporation, as now and hereafter constituted.

Article VII

The Board of Trustees of this Corporation shall be composed of Camp Trustees, Agency trustees, Ex-Officio Trustees, and trustees at large.

Section 1: The Little Rock Conference Camp Trustees (Not to exceed 9 in number) shall be elected by the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church on nomination of the Board of Trustees.

The Agency Trustees, one each, shall be nominated respectively by the Board of Education, the Board of Missions, the Board of Evangelism, the Board of the Laity, the Conference United Methodist Women, the Conference United Methodist Youth, the Board of the Ministry, and the Arkadelphia District Superintendent.

The first election shall be as hereinafter set forth and all succeeding elections shall be for a term of three (3) years, with the Board of Agency making the nomination whose Trustees the proposed trustee is to succeed.

Section 2: The following officers shall be ex-officio members of the Board of Trustees of this Corporation, with the same rights and duties as other Trustees, to serve during their term of office: The Resident Bishop, the Conference Director of Education, the Conference Secretary of the Board of Evangelism; the Conference Missionary Secretary; the President of the Conference United Methodist Women; the Conference Lay Leader; and the Director of the Council on Ministries along with the Associate Director of the Council on Ministries, if not otherwise named, and the Conference Coordinator of Youth Work.

Section 3: Trustees at large. The Board may nominate and the Conference elect from one to six additional trustees at large to serve for a term of three years, with the same duties and privileges as other trustees.

Section 4: All trustees shall be members of The United Methodist Church, in the Little Rock Conference. The resident Bishop shall for the purpose of these articles be considered a member of the Little Rock Conference.

Section 5: Any vacancy occurring in the Board of Trustees caused by death, resignation, removal from the territory of the Conference, or otherwise, may be filled by a majority of all remaining members of the Board until the next session of the Annual Conference when such vacancy shall be filled, for the unexpired term, in due constitutional manner.

Section 6: The affairs of this Corporation except as herein otherwise provided, shall be managed exclusively by the Board of Trustees.

Section 7: Meetings of the Annual Conference in which action is taken pursuant to these articles may be held anywhere within the bounds of said Conference. Meetings of the Board of Trustees may be held anywhere within the State of Arkansas.

Section 8: No member of this Corporation shall be personally liable for any obligations of the Corporation.

Article VIII

The Board of Trustees shall adopt such by-laws as may be proper and necessary in conducting the affairs of the Corporation and not inconsistent with the provisions of these articles, the laws of the State, or Rules of the Church (as set forth in the current Discipline).

Article IX

The by-laws of the Corporation shall create an Executive Committee, the members of which shall be members of the Board of Trustees. The Executive Committee shall have authority to manage the affairs of the Corporation between meetings of the Board of Trustees within such limits as may be prescribed by the Board from time to time. The Board of Trustees may create other Committees from time to time with such powers and duties as the Board of Trustees shall from time to time prescribe. The Board of Trustees and/or the Executive Committee may from time to time create special Committees composed of any qualified persons whether members of the Corporation or not, with such duties and powers as shall be defined by the Board of Trustees and/or the Executive Committee.

Article X

Section 1: Without limitation upon any power now or hereafter given by law, the Corporation shall have full power and authority to accept, acquire, hold, own, use, sell, convey, lease, transfer, assign, mortgage, and pledge property - of all kinds, gifts, contributions, pledges, subscriptions, donations, legacies, devices, endowments, the income and principal of trusts, and grants, appropriations, donations or contributions made by any governmental or public authority or corporation or any foundation, trust fund, community chest, or organization or institution, incorporated or unincorporated, provided the terms and conditions of any governing instrument of law are not violated; to accept and hold property in trust and to administer and dispose of such property and the income therefrom in accordance with the terms of the instrument creating the trust, and to accept, hold, own and dispose of property of all kinds upon such terms, conditions and promises, including, without limitation thereon, and undertaking of the Corporation to pay an annuity or annuities as the Board of Trustees of the Corporation shall authorize or approve.

Section 2: No member of this Corporation or any other person shall receive any earnings from it, except in payment for services actually rendered.

Article XI

The name and address of each member of the Board of Trustees of this Corporation, both elected and ex-officio, together with the expiration date of the term of office of each and the agency nominating such trustee shall be filed yearly with the Secretary of the Annual Conference.

Article XII

This Corporation shall have authority to enter into such contracts as shall from time to time be deemed necessary by the Board of Trustees to carry out the purpose of the Corporation.

Article XIII

Amendments to these articles may be made from time to time in the same manner in which amendments may be made to the standing rules of the Annual Conference, provided however, such amendments must have approval of the majority of all members of the

Board of Trustees present and voting at a regular meeting of the Board of a called meeting, called for the purpose of considering such proposed amendment.

Article XIV

The property which this Corporation owns, consists of improved and unimproved real estate and tangible and intangible property all having an estimated value, free and clear of all encumbrances of \$500,000.00, as of December 31, 1975.

Article XV

This Corporation shall render such services from time to time as the Board of Trustees shall consider not inconsistent with the purposes of the Corporation. Such services may be rendered to individuals, groups, agencies, etc., as the Board from time to time shall determine to be proper recipients of the same. These services may be rendered free of charge or the Board may make such service charge as the Board shall deem proper, provided that the profit (if any) made on rendering any service be used to extend the facilities for rendering the service for which the Corporation is set up.

Article XVI

Anything herein to the contrary notwithstanding the Board of Trustees shall at all times have the right to refuse to admit to, and to expell from, the premises, any person, group or agency for cause deemed sufficient for such action by the Board of Trustees, or any Committee or officer acting for, and under the authority of, The Board of Trustees.

These Articles of Incorporation were provided at the 10th Session of the Little Rock Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church on October 20-24, 1948.

Permanent By-Laws

Little Rock Conference Camp Corporation

- I. Officers: The Board of Trustees shall elect from its membership at its annual meeting each year the following officers who shall perform the duties usually appertaining to such office and such other duties as the Board may from time to time direct: Chairperson, Vice Chairperson, Treasurer, and Resident Agent. The nominations for these offices shall be made by the nomination committee of the Board.
- II. Annual Meeting: The annual meeting of the Board shall be held on call of the Chairperson or the resident Agent in the spring of the year.
- III. Other Meetings: Called meetings of the Board may be held at any time on call of the Chairperson of the Executive Committee, provided, however, that when five or more members of the Board of Trustees request a meeting of the Board, the Chairperson must call a meeting within thirty days.

IV. Standing Committees:

- 1. Executive Committee: There shall be an Executive Committee composed of the officers of the Board and such other members as the Board shall from time to time elect. Provided, however, that no more than one-third of the membership of the Committee may be elected at a time other than at the annual meeting. This committee shall have such duties as the Board shall delegate to it from time to time and shall report all its actions at the next regular or called meeting of the Board for approval or disapproval.
- 2. Nominating Committee: There shall be a nominating committee elected by ballot without nominations, at each annual meeting to serve until the close of the next Annual Board Meeting. The duties of the nominating committee shall be:
 - (1). To nominate all officers of the Board.
 - (2). To nominate the personnel of all other standing committees.
 - (3). To nominate all employed personnel after consultation with the Chairman of the Board and Resident Agent.
 - (4). To nominate to the Board all Trustees except those nominated by the respective Boards and agencies as listed in Article VII of the Articles of Incorporation.

- (5). To advise with the various agencies nominating trustees concerning when they should nominate proposed trustees, and when requested to do so, to advise with' the said agencies concerning personnel.
- (6). To nominate members of special committees when specifically requested to do so by the Board or Executive Committee.
- 3. Development Committee: There shall be a development committee whose duties it shall be to plan and project the development of the Camp under the general supervision of the Board. Employed personnel in the field of Development shall work under the immediate supervision of the committee.
- 4. Finance Committee: There shall be a Finance Committee whose duty it shall be to
 - (1). Prepare and present to the Board the annual Budget.
 - (2). Develop and execute all plans for raising the necessary funds needed for the project.
 - (3). Make, in behalf of the Board, general contacts likely to be fruitful in obtaining financial assistance for the project.
- 5. Program Committee: The Program Committee's duty shall be to cooperate with the co-ordinating committee on camping of the Board of Education and the Council on Ministries in planning, directing and supervising the program carried on at the camp. Maintenance and program personnel shall be under the immediate supervision of this committee.
- V. Special Committees: Such special committees as the Board or Executive Committee may from time to time direct, may be appointed with such duties as the Board or Executive Committee may direct. In cases of extreme need the Chairperson and the Resident Agent may appoint, from time to time, special committees, subject to action of the Executive Committee or Board at the next meeting of either, whichever meets first.
- VI. Reports: The Chairperson, the Resident Agent, the Treasurer, all employed personnel, and all standing and special committees shall report all actions to the Board for review at the next annual meeting of the Board and shall make such reports to called meetings as they may be asked to make.
- VII. Employed Personnel: The Board may elect, from time to time, such employed personnel as the Board shall deem necessary, with such duties as the Board may prescribe and at such stipend as the Board may determine and provide.
- VIII. Treasurer's Bond: The Treasurer shall be bonded in accordance with the regulations of the Little Rock Conference.
- IX. Changes In By-Laws: Amendments may be made to the By-Laws at annual meetings of the Board and at called meetings of the Board when the proposed changes are indicated when the meeting is called. A majority of all members present and voting shall suffice to change any by-law when previous notice has been given, by mail to their last known address, or otherwise to all members of the Board, provided however, that the By-Laws may be amended at annual meetings of the Board by three-fourths vote of all those present and voting, without previous notice of the proposed changes. Provided, further, all changes in the By-Laws shall be dispatched as soon as possible to all members of the Board.
- X. Minutes: The Secretary of the Board shall faithfully keep all minutes of the Board and the Executive Committee and send mimeographed copies of the same to all Board members within a reasonable time after all meetings of the Board and Executive Committee.
- XI. Quorum: A quorum at all regular and called meetings of the Board shall be declared when a roll call reveals the presence of a majority of all members of the Board of Trustees. When a quorum is present when the roll is called, it will be deemed a legal quorum for that entire meeting, provided those members absenting themselves thereafter be properly excused by the chair, with unanimous consent. Necessary business may be transacted provisionally when a quorum is not present. Such notices shall be reported, without unnecessary delay by mail or otherwise to the absent members. Such provisional business shall be deemed legally transacted business when enough affirmative votes from absent members have been recorded, together with those present at the meeting to constitute a majority of the Board membership.

XII. General Provisions Respecting Membership:

1. The Chairperson and Vice Chairperson of the Board and the Membership of the Executive Committee shall be elected always from the membership of the Board. For the selection of all other personnel the Board need not be limited to its own membership, but careful consideration shall be given to the qualification of persons for all committees and positions, especially when such personnel are not members of the Board.

2. Absences:

- (1). When any agency trustee is absent from all regular called meetings of the Board in any Conference Year the Resident Agent shall notify such agency. If a vacancy is declared it shall be by the agency involved.
- (2). When an ex-official trustee is absent as above, the Board of agency electing such officers shall be notified for any action such agency may deem suitable.
- (3). When trustees at large are absent as above the Board of Trustees may declare the position vacant and proceed to fill said position in regular manner.
- (4). The above provisions concerning absences shall apply also to committees when, in the judgment of the Board, it should.

Enacting Clause: The above by-laws shall be in full force from this date, December 7, 1948, being on said date officially adopted by the Board of Trustee, pursuant to the Articles of Incorporation.
