CONFERENCE MINUTES

Monday Afternoon, May 28, 1979 - 2:00 P.M.

The one hundred and twenty-sixth session of the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church was convened at First United Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas, with an Opening Celebration prepared by the Conference Council Board of Worship, William A. Eason, Chairman. The service opened with a greeting by Carlos Martin, the liturgist. The opening hymn was Charles Wesley's "And Are We Yet Alive?" The choir, composed of persons from churches throughout the Conference, with Lynn Bauman as organist-director, offered the anthem. Bishop Hicks, in his meditation, proclaimed "There is the vine and the branches, and in it is the reality of our Lord working through his humble servants." Bishop Hicks was the celebrant of the Sacrament of Holy Communion. He was assisted by W. Ed Eagle, Henry A. Ratliff, Jr., David M. Hankins, Jr., and J. Michael Campbell.

Business Session: Bishop Hicks called the session to order and called on the Secretary, James E. Major, who moved that the printed agenda be adopted with certain changes. Passed. The Secretary announced the Roll Call was being taken at the Registration Desk.

Nominations: The Secretary nominated his staff: Therral Wilson, Journal Clerk; O. D. Peters, Secretarial Assistant. They were elected. James Major nominated the following Tellers: Clergy — Tom Weir, Chairman, David Deere, Benny Ruth, R. T. Jarell, Elmo A. Thomason, Dale L. Diffee; Laity — Tom Williams, Chairman, David Orr, Hubert McKeown, E. E. Thompson, Fred Borgerdrus, Irwin Wilson. Additional Tellers nominated and elected were Robert Trieschmann, H. O. Richardson and James Shaddox. The Secretary moved that the Bar of the Conference be inside the pillars. It was done.

Welcome: George Martin, host Pastor, and Gene Harwood, host Lay Member, welcomed the Conference and introduced the Church Staff, Carlos Martin, Clarence Holland, Lottie Mae Brown, Lynn Bauman, organist, Mr. and Mrs. George Lassiter, coordinators of the Conference Committee.

Courtesy: Robert Trieschmann presented the Bishop's wife, Elaine, to the Conference which stood and applauded in appreciation.

Relations: John Ross gave the report of the Conference Relations Committee, stating that the District Superintendents have examined the pastors and have found them blameless in the life and moved the adoption of this report.

Ministry: William D. Elliott, Chairman of the Board of Ordained Ministry, introduced John F. Walker, Jr., the Registrar of the Board, who reported to the Conference the Board's recommendation of J. Guy Downing and Varnell Norman, Sr., for Associate Membership in the Annual Conference. They were elected. The Registrar reported to the Conference the Board's recommendation of Glen David Deere, John R. Grigsby, George W. McCoy, Eric W. Parker, Davis E. Thompson, Donald M. Wilson and Ellis Lloyd Posey for Membership in Full Connection. They were elected.

Ralph Hale moved to amend the report by adding the name of David E. Swift. Seconded.

John Walker reported that David Swift was being recommended for continuance on probation due to his refusal to agree to vote to accept any candidate for Conference membership who did not accept his theological position. This is not a reflection on his character or ability.

Bishop Hicks then called for an Executive Session of the Conference and excused the laity. **Reconvened:** Bishop Hicks examined those elected to Associate Membership and Full Connection asking the Historic questions.

Administrative Study Committee: Bill Keltner, Chairperson, reported that the

Committee is working and asked for suggestions.

Diaconal Ministry: Ernestine McKinney, Chairperson, gave the report of the Board of Diaconal Ministry. Meredith Cravens was elected a Diaconal Minister. Len D. Bobo was transferred into the Conference.

Nominations: Merle Peterson nominated the following lay members for the 1979 Annual Conference to achieve clergy-laity balance: Meredith Cravens, Len Bobo, Mary Frances Garrett, Olive Smith, Felix Thompson, Martha Thompson, Ray Tribble. They were elected.

First Ballot: The Secretary called for the delegates to vote for four. The ballot was sealed until the morning.

St. Paul School of Theology: Shrum Burton of St. Paul School of Theology announced that President Bill McElvaney could not be with the Conference due to the death of his mother, Mrs. Eugene McElvaney. The Conference paused in prayer for the McElvaney family. Shrum Burton spoke to the Conference for St. Paul School.

Communications: Keenan Williams of the Task Force on Communications presented a proposed change in the Conference structure.

Greetings: The Conference voted to send greetings to Chaplain Billy Howard Cox who is recovering from a heart attack.

Monday Evening, May 28, 1979 - 7:00 P.M.

A pre-service concert was presented by the Children's Choir of St. Paul United Methodist Church, Little Rock.

Worship Service: The evening worship service was led by Don Nolley. Oris Baldwin led the congregational singing. The choir of Crossett First United Methodist Church, directed by J. C. Gunnels offered the anthems, "Go Not Far From Me, O God" and "Bethlehem . . . Galilee . . . Gethsemane." The Conference Preacher, William Holmes, pastor of Metropolitan Memorial United Methodist Church, Washington, D.C., preached on I Corinthians 15:16. He said, "We postpone the resurrection by refusing God" and called for us to raise Christ by making our peace with God, neighbor, and self.

Tuesday Morning, May 29, 1979 - 8:30 A.M.

Devotional: Yasha West was the worship leader. Bishop Hicks, speaking on the parable of the sower, said that our task is to enable people to receive the seed, to hear the word, and to experience God in the midst of their crosses so that God may bring forth new creation in the garden of life.

Business Session: Bishop Hicks called the Conference to order and the Secretary announced the results of the first lay ballot for General Conference delegates. There were 122 ballots cast. One was defective. Sixty-two were needed to elect. Don Riggin was elected with 86 votes. David Cheairs - 43, Ray Tribble - 36, Helen Deane - 27.

A second lay ballot was taken, voting for three.

The Secretary announced the results of the first clerical ballot for General Conference delegates. There were 133 ballots cast. Three were defective. Sixty-six were needed to elect and there was no election. George Wayne Martin -57, John B. Hays -45, Bob Scott -29, John Miles -26.

A second clerical ballot was taken voting for four.

Review and Evaluation: Dale Booth gave the committee's report to lay on the table overnight.

State of the Church: Alfred A. Eason, Dean of the Cabinet, gave the Cabinet's State of the Church Address lifting up the various "instruments in the symphony of the church and its music." The address was adopted by the Conference.

Forum Groups: Fred Haustein gave instructions for the Forum Groups and the Conference divided.

Tuesday Morning, May 29, 1979 - 11:00 A.M.

Service of Celebration and Commemoration: The worship leaders were Gerald Fincher and Howard Ritchie. The choir, composed of members of the Amity, Gardner, Glenwood, Mt. Ida, Pine Grove, and Pullman Heights Churches, offered the anthem, "Morning Has Broken."

John Walker offered the sermon "Thanks for the Memories," based on Leviticus 2:1-2, saying:

It is important to remember those who have gone before us because

- 1. It makes them and our past a part of our present.
- 2. It makes our present more significant in that it enables us to make right and consecrated use of their sacrifice.
- 3. It can redirect our future so that we can pass on their love. Then we can truly say, "Thanks for the Memories."

James E. Major, Conference Secretary, called the names of those who died during the year, and as the bell tolled for them, the Conference thanked God for them. Ministers

Ballot: The Secretary read the results of the second ballot. Harold Davis moved that the Secretary read all receiving at least six votes. Carried. George Wayne Martin was elected with 67 votes. Other leading candidates were: John Hays — 51, Bob Scott — 51, John Miles — 28.

On the laity ballot 101 votes were cast. There was no election. Leading candidates were Helen Deane -30, David Cheairs -26, Ray Tribble -25.

Henry Bass reminded the Conference that in the merger of the two Conferences the blacks had been promised representation in both the General and Jurisdictional Conferences. He called for the Conference to allow the blacks to select their own representative.

A third ballot was taken, voting for three.

Parish Development: Harold Davis presented the report of the Arkansas Area Committee on Cooperative Parish Development and moved its adoption. John Walker, convener of the forum group on parish development introduced Jim Knight, group recorder, who gave the group's report indicating that the group was split equally on this report. Tom DeBlack moved to amend the main report "To delete from Report on Parish Development the paragraph dealing with the establishment of and funding for the Office of Area Superintendent." Page 42, lines 45-51 of the Pre-Conference Reports.

John Miles spoke in favor. Harold Davis spoke against. Carr D. Racop spoke for. Ray Hozendorf spoke against. J. W. Lofton spoke against. George Stewart spoke for.

The question was called for. Carried.

John Miles called for a secret ballot on the amendment. Carried 138-123. The amendment carried 218-108. The Committee withdrew the report.

Ballot: James E. Major read the results of the third clerical ballot. There was no election. Leading candidates were Bob Scott — 57, John Hays — 52, Ralph Hale — 32, John Miles — 31. There was also no election on the lay ballot. Leading candidates were Helen Deane — 47, Ray Tribble — 42, Zenobia Waters — 39, David Cheairs — 32.

A third ballot was taken.

Ray Hozendorf moved that the report be referred back to the Area Task Force. Carried.

Tanako: Don Riggin, Chairman, gave the report of the Board of Trustees of Camp Tanako and nominated the Trustees for new terms. Elected to the Board were Lucille Nix, Louis L. Averitt, Don Riggin, Robert Trieschmann, and James Washington whose terms expire in 1980; Mrs. Harold Clem, Charles Settle, John Trieschmann, Robert Lee, Don West whose terms expire in 1981; and David Prothro, Eugene Cobb, Jim Wilson, Diane Gunn, and Mike Clayton whose terms expire in 1982.

Terry Everitt, Resident Agent, spoke to the Conference.

Don Riggin moved that the second Sunday in August be designated as Camp Tanako Sunday. Passed.

Men: Dale Booth, President of the Conference Methodist Men reported to the Conference. Women: Helen Blakely, President of Conference United Methodist Women, reported to the Conference.

Courtesy: Robert Trieschmann presented to the Conference Bishop Hick's daughter, Debbi. The Conference stood and applauded in appreciation.

Youth: Mackey Yokem, Conference Coordinator of Youth, introduced the youth delegates Lori Smith, Susan Lancaster, Amy Jenkins, Gail Austin, Judy Fish, Vicki Nicholas, Mona Braswell, Dan Pearson, and Wayne Clark. The Conference stood and applauded in appreciation. Nancy Alagood, Conference Youth President, gave the report of the youth. The report was adopted.

Ballot: James Major read the results of the fourth ballot. There was no election on the laity ballot. On the clerical ballot Bob Scott was elected with 78 votes.

A fifth ballot was taken.

Diaconal Ministry: Ernestine McKinney, Chairperson of the Board of Diaconal Ministry, gave the report and moved its adoption. Carried. She then presented Meredith Cravens, a newly elected Diaconal Minister, who was consecrated by Bishop Hicks. All the Diaconal Ministers were presented to the Conference.

Nominations: Merle Peterson gave the report of the Conference Committee on Nominations for the new committee to begin office June 1. They were elected. Nominations to other boards and agencies were elected.

Bill Cheyne asked why the Nominating Committee had not nominated a Board of Lay-Life and Work or a Board of Laity as the Discipline requires. Fred Haustein stated that last year the Conference reconstituted the United Methodist Men into a Board of Laity.

Ballot: James Major announced that on the fifth clerical ballot no one was elected, but that on the lay ballot Helen Deane was elected.

A sixth ballot was taken.

Pensions: Sidney Good, Chairman of the Board of Pensions, presented Gerald Fincher, Board Secretary, who gave the Board's report. Carried.

Perkins: J. B. Holt of Perkins School of Theology spoke to the Conference.

Retirees: Harold Davis moved to elect the retired persons and hear their personal statements tomorrow. Carried.

Ballot: James Major announced that on the sixth ballot Ray Tribble and Zenobia Waters

were elected and on the clerical ballot John Hays was elected.

A seventh clerical ballot was taken and sealed until morning.

Conference Relations: John Ross, Chairman of Conference Relations Committee presented and recommended William A. Stewart, Rayford L. Diffee, W.W. Barron, and W. Harry Bass for the Retired Relationship. It was done. The Secretary presented their certificates.

John Ross offered the dismissal prayer.

Tuesday Evening, May 29, 1979 - 7:00 P.M.

The evening began with a pre-service concert by the Children's Choir from Duncan United Methodist Church, Little Rock.

At 7:30 P.M., the evening worship service began. The worship leader was Joe Arnold. Oris Baldwin led the congregational singing. The Fairview United Methodist Church of Camden offered an anthem. Lynn Bauman was the organist. Bishop Hicks presented the Conference preacher William A. Holmes, who preached on John 1:1-14, saying:

- 1. Today, we are increasingly encapsulated in a mechanistic society and the whole of creation is standing on tip-toe to see if we are the peril or promise of the society.
- 2. Many are moving back to a simple life style.
- 3. God calls us to a third alternative careful planning of humane communities in which "the Word is made flesh made tool and filled with grace and truth."

Wednesday Morning, May 30, 1979-8:30 A.M.

Devotional: Guy J. Downing was the worship leader. Oris Baldwin led the singing. The Scripture Lesson was Mark 16:9-20. Bishop Hicks began his devotional by announcing that Hazel Pekar had died during the night and that Herb Pekar had said that he would be in the Conference Thursday morning because the Conference is his Church. Bishop Hicks suggested that we make sure Herb finds the Church here when he arrives.

Bishop Hicks spoke to the Conference saying that the Gospel of Mark says, in effect, to its readers, "If you believe this, act on it." He challenged the Conference to do the same.

Retirees: The retiring pastors addressed the Conference.

William Barron said, "I have had a great time in the ministry. However, people have not always done what I asked. Once I asked the congregation to remain seated while we stand up and sing."

Rayford Diffee said, "You don't know my name. For years I was Brother J. R. Diffee's son. Now I am Carl and Dale's father." He said that he was a part of 267 years of unbroken ministry in his family and that "God has been good to us, and I pray that he will give me only more thing — a grateful heart."

Bill Stewart spoke of the good years of ministry and his appreciation for his wife whom he introduced to the Conference and who said, "It's been a great life and it isn't over. It's just a new beginning."

Harry Bass spoke of the active years of ministry and his struggle for equality for black people. "You Methodists who want an all inclusive church have the only system that can work. Work it."

Chaplains: Jeff Davis presented John Shafer who addressed the Conference and introduced a fellow Chaplain, Rodney Wallace.

Caucus: James Rice moved that the lay delegation caucus to meet the candidates for election. Carried.

Ballot: The Secretary announced that there was no election on the seventh clerical ballot. John Miles asked that his name be withdrawn from consideration for both General Conference and Jurisdictional Conference. An eighth clerical ballot was taken.

Minutes: H. O. Richardson reported that the minutes of Monday's session had been read and approved. The report was adopted.

Archives and History: Ralph Hale gave the Commission's report and moved its adoption. He then introduced W. D. Lester and announced that his history of the Southwest Conference had been sent to the printer. W. D. Lester spoke to the Conference of his appreciation for those who helped him make his book a reality.

Ballot: The first lay Jurisdictional ballot was taken, voting for four.

Conference Relations: John Ross, Chairman, gave the committee's report on those to be discontinued, located, and withdrawn. The report was adopted.

Parish Development: Mike Campbell presented a revised report from the Task Force on Parish Development, changing the Area Superintendent to Area Director, changing the Conference's support to a special gift campaign, and limiting our involvement to four years ending in 1983.

Bishop Hicks said that this proposal is not his work but is to stand on its own merit.

Ralph Mann expressed disagreement with this proposal and asked if it could be considered since it was referred back to the Task Force. He then spoke against the proposal.

Alvin Murray spoke for the proposal. Charles Murry spoke for the proposal. W. A. Geddie spoke against the proposal. Carr D. Racop asked whether a report that had been adopted by the North Arkansas Conference and revised by the Little Rock Conference could work. Harold Davis said there was a provision in the proposal for negotiations. Carr D. Racop asked if the revised proposal was acceptable to Bishop Hicks. Bishop Hicks said, "Yes." Carr D. Racop moved the previous question.

Arthur Terry asked if we could consider this proposal as it has been referred and if so are we voting on the amendments or the whole report. Bishop Hicks stated that we are voting on the amended report.

The proposal carried.

Charles Ashcraft moved that we apportion the funding to the churches. Failed,

Ballot: James Major announced that there was no election on the ninth clerical ballot or on the first lay ballot.

A tenth clerical ballot and a second lay ballot was taken.

Harry Bass asked why the salaries of the two Council Associate Directors were not equal.

T. Nichols Evans stated that this was in order to establish the order of authority.

Council on Ministries: George W. Martin gave the Conference Council on Ministries report and moved its adoption section by section. Fred Arnold spoke to the section on Local Church and Evangelism. That section was adopted.

Ballot: James Major announced that Ed Dunlap was elected on the tenth clerical ballot with 70 votes.

The first Jurisdictional clerical ballot was taken.

Council on Ministries: Loyd Perry spoke to the section on Local Church and Society, adding an item on alcoholics. The section was adopted.

The section on Mission was adopted.

The section on Clergy/Diaconal Leadership was adopted.

The section on Stewardship was adopted.

The section on Educational and Age Level Ministries was adopted.

The section on Worship was adopted.

Carr D. Racop asked that the name of the Wesley Foundation at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock be changed to Wesley Foundation at Little Rock. He was asked to write out his request and present it.

The section on Ethnic Minorities was adopted.

The section on Communication was presented. Norris Steele spoke to the report, presenting the thirty second television spot. The Conference expressed its appreciation to Dick Story for producing the spot. The section on Communication was adopted.

George Tanner presented the section on Council on Ministries Budget for 1980. Carr D. Racop moved to amend the report to equalize the salaries of the Associate Directors. The amendment failed 80-74. The Budget was adopted.

George W. Martin moved that the Council on Ministries continue its report in the afternoon at 1:30. Carried.

University of Arkansas at Little Rock: James Major presented Carr D. Racop's resolution that "the Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundation at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock be authorized by the Little Rock Annual Conference to change its name to "The Wesley Foundation at Little Rock." Carried.

Ballot: James Major announced that David Orr and Kelsey Caplinger were elected on the second lay ballot. A third ballot was taken.

Jay Lofton was elected on the first ballot. A second ballot was taken.

Carlos Martin offered the prayer of dismissal.

Wednesday Afternoon, May 30, 1979 - 1:30 P.M.

Business Session: James Workman opened with prayer.

Ballot: James Major read the results of the third lay ballot. There was no election.

A fourth lay ballot was cast.

Area Staff: The Conference adopted the report of the Conference Council Staff on an area basis.

Ordained Ministry: William D. Elliott, Chairman, presented Report No. 1. The report was adopted.

John Walker gave Report No. 2. The following were elected to Probationary Membership: James Richard Adkins, Ray Henry Bates, James Kenneth Dodd, John P. Miles, II, W. Martin Nicholas, Beverly J. Sawyer, Owen Talley, Sr., Vurl E. Bland, Altus M. Block.

The following were elected to Deacons Orders: James E. Fairweather, Byzie Lee Parr, James Richard Adkins, Ray Henry Bates, James Kenneth Dodd, John P. Miles, II, W. Martin Nicholas, Beverly J. Sawyer, Owen Talley, Sr.

The following were elected to Elders Orders: George W. McCoy, Ellis Loyd Posey, Davis E. Thompson, Glen David Deere, David E. Swift, John R. Grigsby, Eric W. Parker, Donald N. Wilson.

Windell R. Miller's Orders were recognized as Deacon's Orders.

The entire report was adopted.

John Hays presented petitions to the General Conference concerning local pastors. They were endorsed.

David Wilson presented three General Conference petitions calling for the removal of credentials and termination of Conference membership of homosexuals.

Disability: David Wilson recommended the following to be continued on Disability: Horace Grogan, Calvin Miller, and Jess Taylor. It was done.

Ballot: There was no election on the second clerical ballot. Lori Smith was elected on the fourth lay ballot.

A fifth ballot was taken.

Equitable Salaries: Gene Harwood, Chairman, gave the Commission's report. Don Nolley read the recommendations of the forum group asking the Conference (1) to petition the General Conference to ascertain whether a Conference could standardize salaries, and (2) to continue the study of standardized salaries. The forum group's recommendations were accepted. The entire report was adopted.

Courtesy: The Conference greeted visitors Matt L. Ellis, Bob Orr, and Leonard Byers.

Roy Shilling, President of Hendrix College presented a Distinguished Alumnus Award to William A. Holmes. The Conference stood in agreement. Dr. Holmes expressed his gratitude for the award and shared it with Professor George Avants, who was very significant to his pilgrimage while at Hendrix.

Norris Steele spoke against the motion. Fred Haustein spoke against. Bob Regnier spoke for. Benny Ruth asked for examples of number of papers received. Fred Haustein and Mackey Yokem provided examples. Jim Rice spoke for the substitute. George Tanner spoke against the substitute. Bill Briant spoke against the substitute. John Dill said, "We have to determine whether we are beating a dead horse. If we are not, let's at least feed it enough so it can plod on down the road."

Jim Argue moved the previous question. Carried.

The substitute failed.

Harold Davis moved the previous question. Carried.

The main motion on the revised proposal carried by 147-60.

Kelsey Caplinger called for the Little Rock Conference to meet prior to the North Arkansas Conference next year so that we won't be on the spot. Bishop Hicks said we would try to arrange it for both Conferences to meet prior to each other.

Courtesy: Bishop Hicks presented Lillie Major, the wife of our Secretary, and then presented James Major with a token of the Conference's appreciation. The Conference stood and applauded in appreciation.

Robert Trieschmann presented the wives of the District Superintendents. The Conference stood and applauded in appreciation. The wives of other ministers were presented and the Conference expressed its appreciation.

Petition: John Miles presented a petition to the General Conference.

Ballot: The Secretary announced that John Walker was elected on the third clerical ballot.

A fourth clerical ballot was taken.

Children's Home: Joe Phillips, Administrator of the Methodist Children's Home spoke to the Conference and introduced Bert Allain of the Home.

Hendrix College: Roy Shilling, President of Hendrix College, spoke to the Conference.

Review and Evaluation: Dale Booth, Chairman, presented the Committee's report. Carried.

Institutions: The Conference heard the following: Noe Gonzales of Lydia Patterson Institute, Ray Tribble of Aldersgate, N. Lee Cate of Mt. Sequoyah, Mrs. Wendell Barbaree of Scarritt College.

Bishop Hicks presented Jerry Canada, new editor of the Arkansas Methodist to the Conference.

John Ross presented a petition from the Monticello District Committee on the Ordained Ministry calling for the District Committee to have the authority to determine the high school equivalency. It was endorsed.

Ballot: The Secretary announced that there was no election on the fourth ballot. Arthur Terry moved that the results of the ballot be sealed. Failed.

A fifth ballot was taken and sealed.

Hunger: Fred Haustein and the Area Task Force on Hunger reviewed a slide presentation on the results of the Hunger Ingathering. Loyd Perry announced that this year we would be joined by several other denominations.

Wednesday Evening, May 30, 1979 - 7:30 P.M.

The Service of Ordination

William Elliott, Chairman of the Board of Ordained Ministry, was the Worship Leader. Other ministers assisting were Mike Clayton, Assistant Registrar of the Board, James Major, Conference Secretary, and the District Superintendents. Marshals were Wayne Edwards, John Miles, Connie Steele, and Mackey Yokem. Lynn Bauman was the organist. The choir was from First United Methodist Church, Hot Springs. Wendy Boyeskie,

representing the children of the Conference, read the scripture lesson, Ephesians 4:1-8. William Holmes, in his sermon based on Ezekiel 33:1-7, said:

I. Ministers are called to keep the watch for the people and sound the alarm where there is danger.

II. Keeping the watch is a theological, prophetic, and caring assignment.

Thursday Morning, May 31, 1979-8:30 A.M.

Devotional: Ken Kinard was the worship leader. The scripture lesson was Ephesians 4:1-16. Bishop Hicks spoke about ministry through leadership. He referred to the Discipline's outline of the duties of a minister. In addition to preaching the gospel, a minister must help a congregation decide upon its purpose and lead them to realize it, that we may grow up in Christ and experience his second coming.

Business Session: Bishop Hicks called the session to order.

Ballot: There was no election on the fifth clerical ballot. A sixth ballot was taken.

Greeting: Bishop Hicks presented John Workman, who is moving from the office of Editor of the Arkansas Methodist to Religious Editor of the Arkansas Gazette. The Conference greeted John and expressed its appreciation.

Council on Ministries: George W. Martin and Fred Haustein gave the Council's Recommendations to the Conference. They were adopted. The entire report of the Council on Ministries' report was adopted.

A seventh ballot was cast.

Finance and Administration: Ray Hozendorf and Roy Bagley gave the Council's report. The Conference expressed its appreciation for retiring Area Treasurer, Bryan Brawner. Ray Hozendorf introduced Ann Onstott, new Area Treasurer, who gave her report. Harold Davis called for the Conference's expression of appreciation for her work. The Conference responded. The entire report was adopted.

Ballot: James Major announced the results of the eighteenth and final ballot. Ralph Hale, Charles Ashcraft, and George Tanner were elected as alternates to Jurisdictional Conference.

Trustees: Jeff Davis and George Meyer gave the report of the Board of Trustees. It was adopted.

Harry Bass moved the Conference bless the effort to establish a black Methodist Church in the Highland Church in Little Rock. He withdrew his motion. Tom Adkinson supported the idea. John Hays said Highland was considering an offer of \$200,000.00. Negail R. Riley suggested that this issue be referred to the Council Board of Global Ministries. Charles Ashcraft moved that the Conference authorize the Board of Trustees to purchase the Highland Church and mortgage the property, to hold for the Conference until the Board of Global Ministries has an opportunity to develop its use, and this to be referred to the Council on Finance and Administration.

1980 Conference Location: Joe Cauffman, Chairman of the Administrative Board, invited the Conference to Hot Springs First United Methodist Church for 1980. The invitation was adopted.

Petitions: David Cheairs presented a petition to the General Conference calling for the privilege of designated giving for the churches. Wayne Edwards spoke against the motion. James Major did not support the petition but agreed that something is wrong with the Board of Global Ministries. George Tanner spoke against the petition. Negail R. Riley spoke against the petition. The petition failed.

John Miles presented a petition to the General Conference calling for all pensions to be funded on the same level. Jim Argue spoke against the petition. It failed.

George Tanner presented petitions from the Board of Church and Society asking that the Discipline's wording on sexuality and funding be retained. They were endorsed.

George Tanner moved that the Conference authorize the Nominating Committee to fill vacancies. Passed.

The delegation to Jurisdictional Conference moved that the first person elected in each delegation be our representative on the Jurisidictional Committee on Episcopacy — Clergy: George W. Martin, Lay: Don Riggin.

Council on Finance and Administration reported. "We accept the recommendation of Charles Ashcraft and move that it be referred to the Conference Board of Trustees. Further, we suggest that the Board of Trustees consult with the Conference Board of Global Ministries, the Little Rock District Board of Missions, and the Ethnic Minority Local Church Task Force regarding procedures. We also move that the Special Church Extension Fund be increased in the amount of \$21,000.00 and receipts be directed to the Conference Board of Trustees for payment of interest on mortgage.

Harold Davis moved to amend, "that funds be found elsewhere." Failed.

Charles Ashcraft moved the Board appoint a study group to study the procedures for handling churches in transition and report back to the Annual Conference. Carried.

Homer Winstead spoke of his availability as Conference Prayer Chairman to travel at his own expense to any church to speak on setting up prayer groups.

Ralph Mann spoke of his appreciation of Bishop Hicks' courageous leadership and judgment. The Conference stood and applauded in agreement.

Resolutions: Charles Settle, Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, gave the committee's report. The report was adopted.

Alf Eason moved that Wednesday, June 6, be moving day. Passed.

Alf Eason stated that salaries for June will be paid by the Church to which the ministers are appointed for the new year.

Appointments: Bishop Hicks, with the assistance of the District Superintendents, read the ministerial appointments.

Closing: The one hundred and twenty-sixth session of the Little Rock Annual Conference adjourned with the singing of the hymn "A Charge to Keep."

James E. Major offered the closing prayer.

LOCAL CHURCH AND COMMUNICATIONS - \$12,035.00

Purpose: The purpose of the Arkansas Area Program of Communications is nothing less than the Gospel itself; to communicate in multiple ways the Good News of God's Grace in Jesus Christ, as it is proclaimed through the United Methodist Church of Arkansas.

Administration: The Arkansas Area Communications Program shall work under the guidance and direction of the Arkansas Area Director of Communications and the two Conference Council Committees on Communication.

- I. United Methodist News Service: No cost until study is completed.
 - A. The Editor of the Arkansas Methodist newspaper shall serve as the United Methodist News Officer for the Arkansas Area and shall be responsible for the following areas of communication:
 - 1. Internal News:

To assist our "in house" offices and agencies — such as the Bishop's office, the Council on Ministries offices, any boards, commissions, etc. — by funneling news to our internal channels (such as the Arkansas Methodist, Council on Ministries mailings, and agency publications, etc.)

- 2. External News:
 - a. To channel news to the secular press (newspapers, wire services, TV and radio) relating to the United Methodist Church in Arkansas.
 - b. To be the initial contact person in the church for the secular media in regard to news items relating to the two Conferences and the Area. (If this United Methodist News officer did not have the information requested, or if the matter needed further comment by an appropriate official, he or she would refer the caller to that person or office.)
 - c. To arrange press conferences or interviews in regard to major events or personalities.
 - d. To issue press releases to the secular media concerning major events in the two Annual Conferences and the Area.
 - e. To issue releases and otherwise be in touch with the media during the sessions of the Annual Conferences.
 - f. To be in touch with the media to recommend possible feature items for their development.
 - g. To contact the media for coverage on major Conference or Area events.

II. Interpretation, Promotion, and Public Relations:

- A. Interpretation: To help United Methodists understand our church and our various programs, including our benevolent program.
 - 1. Offer thirteen (13) District opportunities (one per district) in the benevolent and missional program of the United Methodist Church to be explained by representatives of United Methodist Communications and Conference leadership. Theme: "Where Does All That Money Go?" Local church persons invited shall include Pastors, Chairpersons of Administrative Boards, Finance, Missions, and Communications.

Cost: \$750.00 - for expenses of workshops.

- 2. Develop filmstrip/slide show in conjunction with United Methodist Communications on the benevolent program of our church, with special highlight on Conference benevolences. Copies will be made available to District Superintendents and local churches for their use in 1980 Charge Conferences, etc. Cost: \$1,200.00
- 3. Provide information materials and formats for local churches to utilize "Mission Minutes" in the morning worship services once a month. Various lay persons will be asked by the local church Coordinator of Communications to speak for one minute concerning one element of our benevolent or missional program. Cost: \$350.00 for printing and mailing.
- 4. Production of Area pamphlet on projects and programs supported by benevolent program of the Area. One copy to Pastors, Lay Leaders,

Chairpersons of Administrative Boards, Chairpersons of Committee on Finance, and Chairpersons of Communications Work Area. Cost: \$750.00 for production.

- 5. Production of twelve (12) posters showing photographs and brief descriptions of various aspects of the missional program of the United Methodist Church around theme: "Because you gave . . . (this child can eat more than roots)." One poster a month to each local church. Cost: \$750.00
- B. Promotion: To facilitate the successful completion of specific tasks we are involved in.
 - 1. Provide consultation to agencies and churches of the Arkansas Area in the development of their plan to promote the programs and activities they are responsible for. This would include assisting in the development of an overall plan for promotional pieces, serving as liaison with Conference and Area Communication systems, and assisting in forwarding appropriate information to external news media. Cost: none
- C. **Public Relations:** To build an honest and positive image of the United Methodist Church before society.
 - 1. The development and production of two thirty-second television spots interpreting United Methodist faith and life. Each spot will be presented on prime-time at various places over the entire state for a three-month period. Cost: \$2,000.00 for production and \$6,500.00 for purchase of air time.
 - 2. Production of two thirty-second radio spots interpreting the faith and life of the United Methodist Church. Local churches may receive these spots at no charge and purchase air time on local radio stations for their broadcasting. A "five-second tag" will be provided at the end of each spot for each church to add its own local message. Cost: \$250.00
 - 3. Serving as channel by which religious issues of special interest to local and national publicity may be clarified and interpreted through internal and external news channels of the Area. Cost: none
- III. Area Resource Center: This is for the collection of films, filmstrips, tapes, games, equipment, etc., and making resource people available for use by United Methodists.
 - A. Publish Catalog Updates. Cost: \$150.00 (Conference office will continue present responsibilities for upkeep, repair, and mailing.)
 - B. Coordinate purchases of new resources for Area Resource Center, thus, eliminating needless duplication of purchases and assuring a wide variety of acquisitions. Cost: none.
 - C. Engage in a study of ways to strengthen the administration, usage, and financing of the Area Resource Center. Recommendations to be presented at the next regular sessions of the Annual Conferences. Cost: none
- IV. Area Production Center: A facility to reproduce materials and resources for use in the programs and activities of the Arkansas Area.
 - A. An Arkansas Area Production Assistant shall be employed under the supervision and direction of the Arkansas Area Director of Communications. Job responsibilities of the Assistant shall include:
 - 1. Operation, maintenance, and cleaning of offset press and other equipment in Council on Ministries workroom.

- 2. Maintenance of all printing supplies and materials.
- 3. Organization of work room,
- 4. Maintenance of records on repair, usage, etc. of all reproduction equipment.
- Production of all materials needed to accomplish adopted Council on Ministries programs of the Arkansas Area, and other agencies or local churches of the Annual Conferences, as time allows. Since funding for this position comes through the two Council on Ministries' budgets, the charge for Council on Ministries office work shall only be for materials and supplies used. Production costs of jobs done for other agencies shall be kept to a minimum in order to assist in making these costs as economical as possible.

 - Cost: Hourly rate of skilled technician up to \$5.00 per hour

Recommendations To The 1979 Little Rock Annual Conference From The Conference Council On Ministries

- 1. We recommend that the \$8,000.00 apportionment for Regular Church Extension be continued for 1980.
- 2. We recommend that the \$40,000.00 apportionment for Special Church Extension be continued for 1980.
- 3. We recommend that a goal of \$3,000.00 be established for the annual Golden Cross Sunday offering and that offering be taken on the first Sunday in May in 1980.
- 4. At its meeting in November, 1977, the Advance Committee of the General Church voted the following change regarding the Ethnic Minority General Advance project:
 - "By an affirmative vote, an annual conference may act to combine for purposes of promotion, the General Advance and the Conference Advance Specials related to the Ethnic Minority Local Churches, with monies received for Ethnic Minority Local Church Advance Specials to be divided between the General Advance and the Annual Conference Advance Specials, provided that the monies retained within the Annual Conference shall be expended only for Ethnic Minority Local Church Advance Specials approved by said Annual Conference, and provided also that such monies retained shall not exceed more than fifty percent of the total monies raised, and that fifty percent or more of said monies shall be remitted to the General Council on Finance and Administration for the Ethnic Minority Local Church Missional Priority General Advance Special Project."

This action was on the recommendation of the Council of Bishops and has been endorsed by the General Council on Ministries and the General Council on Finance and Administration.

We recommend that one-half $(\frac{1}{2})$ of monies received on the General Advance Special relating to the Ethnic Minority Local Church be retained for use within the Little Rock Annual Conference, and these funds be administered for Ethnic Minority Local Church approved projects in the Little Rock Annual Conference.

- 5. We recommend that the Annual Conference establish a \$3,600.00 Operations Budget Area Committee on Parish Development for 1980 from the Conference Administration Board Expense Line Item (54700-5).
- 6. We recommend that the Education (Board of Education-Church School Day) offering goal be set at \$11,000.00 for 1980.
- 7. We recommend the following Conference Policy concerning the Golden Cross offering:
 - A. Introduction

Golden Cross Sunday, and the Golden Cross offering, have had little attention in recent years, perhaps due to a lack of clarity as to the purpose and need of the program.

Yet, hospital and other medical costs are increasing at an alarming rate. United Methodist ministers and their families, even covered under our conference HMEP, could be subject to substantial medical bills. Others in our churches may have inadequate, or no health insurance at all.

We believe that our conference needs an active Golden Cross program to assist persons in need. To this end, we submit the following background information and recommended program.

B. Disciplinary Requirements

1. The United Methodist Discipline (Paragraph 269, 1c) states that Golden Cross Sunday is one of six special days that shall be observed with an offering. It further states that Golden Cross Sunday shall be observed on the first Sunday in May or the Sunday before Christmas.

2. Paragraph 1525.9 of the Discipline states the purpose of the Golden Cross is "... to promote the work of health and welfare ministries and to collect monies and provide other material assistance in providing care for the sick, older persons, children, and youth, with special emphasis being given to supporting those ministries which provide direct financial assistance to persons unable to pay for the cost of care."

This paragraph also stipulates that "... this offering shall be used as determined by the Annual Conference on recommendation of its Health & Welfare Division or other designated unit."

3. Finally, both of these above paragraphs stipulate that if there is no Annual Conference Golden Cross program, the specific use of the money may be determined by the local church.

2. An annual goal of \$3,000.00 for Golden Cross has been established for the past several years. In the 1978 and 1977 Journals, there is no statement as to the use of these funds. In the 1976 Journal, it stated that this fund "... shall be used in relief of medical costs for deserving Methodists through a joint supervision between the Conference Insurance Committee and the Conference Council Board of Missions."

D. A Recommended Program for 1980

1. That Golden Cross Sunday be observed by our churches, on or about the first Sunday of May, and that an offering be received.

2. That one-half of the local church's "Golden Cross" offering may be retained by the local church for Golden Cross ministries in the community. Attention should be given to the purpose of Golden Cross, as indicated in Paragraph 1525.0, and to the priorities for assistance as established by the conference. (See below.)

3. That an annual goal of \$3,000.00 for Golden Cross in Little Rock Conference fund be continued.

4. That the priorities for persons eligible for assistance be as follows:

A. Ministers (active or retired), wives, and dependent children

B. Other members of the United Methodist Church

C. Others

5. That guidelines in applying for, and granting assistance from, Conference Golden Cross funds be as follows:

A. Amount of Grant.

(1) Grants shall be no more than \$100 in each individual case towards the payment of current medical expense, except, in unusual circumstances, in which case up to \$200 may be granted.

(2) Grants may be given to cover any hospital or medical expense, or hospital insurance premiums.

B. Procedure in Applying.

(1)All requests shall be made by, or cleared with, the local pastor, to the district superintendent.

(2)The district superintendent shall make the request for aid to the Conference Health & Welfare Representative.

(3)The Conference Health and Welfare Representative shall authorize the remittance of funds, in accordance with the provisions of this program.

The Conference Council Board of Global Ministries recommends the following Conference policy be adopted for Church Extension:

I. Purpose of Church Extension Funds

A. Church extension funds of the Conference Council Board of Global Ministries (CBGOM) are to be used to assist District Committees on Building and Locations in purchasing new sites for churches, buildings, or remodeling parsonages or church facilities, developing program and facilities for specialized ministries, and designated Conference Extension projects.

B. Church extension funds are to be distributed in a manner which acknowledges the Little Rock Annual Conference's priorities of Parish Development and Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church.

C. Regular Church Extension*

An amount equal to $\frac{1}{3}$ of the money received by the Council Board of Global Ministries for church extension is to be designated Regular Church Extension Funds. Grants from these funds shall be limited to \$1,000.00 and used for remodeling church facilities and parsonages or constructing new parsonages.

D. Special Church Extension

An amount equal to $\frac{1}{3}$'s of the money received by the Council Board of Global Ministries for church extension is to be designated Special Church Extension Funds. These funds, managed by the Council Board of Global Ministries, may be granted for the following:

1. Assistance to District Committees on Building and Locations in purchasing church sites.

8.

- 2. Construction of new church facilities.
- 3. Merger or relocation of churches.
- 4. Assistance in the development of specialized ministry, with consideration being given to small membership and ethnic minority churches.
- 5. Designated Conference Extension projects.
- * Effective January 1, 1981.

II. Procedure for Making Application

A. Application forms can be obtained from the district superintendents or chairpersons of the Committee on Church Extension.

B. Applications must have the approval of the district superintendent, pastor, and the District Board of Missions or its executive committee and/or equivalent, who, with the District Committee on Building and Locations, shall have primary responsibility for reviewing all plans for remodeling, building, and purchasing church sites within the district. Wherein more than one project is recommended for Special Church Extension Funds from a district within a given year, the District Board of Missions or its executive committee and/or equivalent shall rank each project according to priority for consideration in funding.

C. All applications shall include:

1. Signatures of approval by the district superintendent, pastor, and District Board of Missions or its executive committee and/or equivalent.

2. Evidence of a thorough Every Member Commitment Program for the current year and demonstration of a sound financial base for operations, debt service, and the following apportionments: Conference Claimants; Episcopal Fund; Equitable Salaries; Ministerial Education; World Service and Conference Benevolences; and District Superintendents Fund.

3. Certification from the district superintendent that the above mentioned apportionments have been accepted in full for the current year.

4. Detailed plans for the project, including 5 year goals and objectives for the next program year. A goal for each project shall be to obtain self support.

5. Evidence of a feasibility study, including the evaluation of existing programs, project needs, and relevant demographic information.

- D. Completed application forms shall be submitted directly to the chairperson of the Committee on Church Extension who will be responsible for processing applications in compliance with procedures outlined by the Council Board of Global Ministries.
- E. All applications for relocation of churches shall contain an explanation of plans for continuing ministry to the community from which the church is relocating and be reviewed by the Little Rock Annual Conference Task Forces on Parish Development and Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church.

III. Special Church Extension Funding For Periods Exceeding One Year

When Special Church Extension Funds are committed to a particular project for periods exceeding one year, the following policies shall prevail:

A. An annual report must be submitted to the Council Board of Global Ministries of progress made towards reaching the goal of self support and specific objectives for the next year. The honoring of the commitment to continued funding will be based upon an evaluation of the annual report. If no report is filed, funding will be terminated. B. No project may receive aid for more than three consecutive years in any five year period without approval by action of the Annual Conference.

IV. The Following General Policies Shall Prevail

A. No funds will be remitted to a project until the district superintendent has written the chairperson of the Committee on Church Extension, certifying that work has begun.

B. Funds shall be released on a schedule developed by the Chairperson of the Committee on Church Extension in consultation with the district superintendent and Director of Stewardship and Finance.

C. The district superintendent shall file with the chairperson of the Committee on Church Extension an audit form certifying that funds have been expended for the purpose which they were granted.

V. Requests to the Board of Global Ministries, National Division

All requests for funding from the Board of Global Ministries, National Division, must be forwarded to the chairperson of the Committee on Church Extension and presented to the Council Board of Global Ministries or its executive committee for approval and priority ranking. Applications for grants, loans, and donations from the National Division may be obtained from the district superintendents or chairpersons of the Committee on Church Extension.

VI. Use of the Conference-Owned Mobile Chapel

A. The church or district completing use of the chapel shall be responsible for dismantling and preparing it for moving.

B. The church or district receiving the chapel shall be responsible for moving and re-assembling the chapel, including all expenses involved and shall be responsible for providing fire and extended coverage insurance on the mobile chapel, sending a copy of the insurance policy to the chairperson of the Committee on Church Extension.

C. The chairperson of the Committee on Church Extension and the Trustees of the church completing use of the chapel shall conduct an inventory of the chapel, noting damage and deterioration. The church completing use of the chapel shall have the responsibility to repair the chapel to the condition it was in when received.

D. The chairperson of the Committee on Church Extension and the Trustees receiving the chapel shall make an inventory of the condition of the chapel when received. The church or district receiving the chapel will be required to make a \$500 deposit for damage to be refunded when it completes use of the chapel and after damage and deterioration to the chapel while in use has been repaired.

E. Any church or district receiving the chapel is assured of having a minimum of 24 months use of the chapel and 12 months notice prior to being required to release the chapel for other use.

Inner Board Policy for Church Extension

I. Processing Applications

A. All applications for Regular or Special Church Extension are to be submitted to the Chairperson of the Committee on Church Extension, who shall be responsible for seeing that the applications have been properly completed and processing the applications.

B. Applications for projects related to Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church shall be submitted to the Task Force on Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church for approval. Where more than one application is approved by the Task Force in a given year, projects are to be ranked according to priority.

C. Applications for projects related to Parish Development are to be submitted to the Task Force on Parish Development for approval. Where more than one application is approved by the Task Force in any given year, projects are to be stanked according to priority.

D. Applications for relocation of existing churches are to be presented to the Task Forces on Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church and Parish Development for review and evaluation.

E. Applications are to be presented by the Chairperson of the Committee on Church Extension to the Committee on Church Extension and to the Board of Global Ministries and/or its executive committee, which may approve or deny applications and authorize the release of funds in compliance with conference policy and procedures.

F. Applications for Special Church Extension funds must be approved by all required persons and groups and ready for presentation to the Board of Global Ministries or its executive committee prior to May 15, for funding in the following program year of the Annual Conference.

G. Applications for Regular Church Extension Funds may be submitted at any time and will be processed at Annual Conference, in October, and at mid-year board meetings.

H. The district superintendents shall be notified of the time and place of meetings of the Committee on Church Extension to consider application for Church Extension funding and may attend these meetings and invite representatives from the district or local church who desire to speak to an application to be present.

I. The chairperson of the Committee on Church Extension shall notify the district superintendent in writing of actions taken on applications from their district. It is the responsibility of the district superintendent to notify applicants of action taken.

II. Release of Funds

A. The chairperson of the Committee on Church Extension, in consultation with the superintendents, Director of Stewardship and Finance, and Director of the Conference Council on Ministries, will arrange a schedule for the release of Special Church Extension grants by January 15.

B. No funds will be released until the district superintendent notifies the chairperson on Church Extension that work on the project has begun.

MODEL FOR STAFF ASSIGNMENT

Little Rock and North Arkansas Conference Council On Ministries

Preface

The purpose of the Conference Councils on Ministries and their Council on Ministries staff is to assist local churches in ministry to people by giving leadership in the programs approved by the Annual Conference. This involves securing input from local churches, District Councils on Ministries, Conference Boards, Juridsdictional and General Church levels, and then initiating, coordinating, and/or monitoring the implementation of the adopted programs.

The final test of the Conference Council on Ministries and its staff is whether or not it facilitates vital ministry, and whether or not it helps the Church accomplish its objectives and fulfill its mission.

Present Staff Assignments

Currently, staff assignments and responsibilities in both Annual Conferences are defined and delineated along structural or organizational lines. This is clearly indicated by the staff responsibilities of the two Conference Staffs which are as follows:

Additional Model for Staff Assignments

In the past few years, several programs have been attempted jointly by the two Conference Council on Ministries. One notable success has been the World Hunger Emphasis. In the administration of these programs, leaders in both Conferences have seen the benefit of working together in programs of common concern.

The addition of a second setting for our current staff seems advantageous for each of the two separate Annual Conferences and their work. This second setting would in no way relieve the staff of current assignments, except in areas where the two Annual Conference both agree to work cooperatively.

Under this second setting, staff responsibilities would be defined along functional lines and the plan would consist of the following:

- a) The Bishop shall be Chairman of the Area Staff. This does not mean that the Bishop shall be merely a "presider" or "convener." Nor does it imply that the Area Staff shall be "under the thumb" of the Bishop. Rather, the Bishop shall have a key role in the Area Staff consulting, initiating, counseling, enabling, facilitating, making input, and providing guidance.
- b) An Area Steering Committee, composed of the Bishop, and the Chairpersons, Vice-Chairpersons, Secretaries, and Cabinet representatives of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conference Councils on Ministries, meeting jointly with the two Conference Council on Ministries' staffs, shall annually evaluate and assign the work of the Directors in their Area responsibilities.
- c) Budget for the accomplishment of Area responsibilities shall be set up on an Area basis by joint planning and contribution from the budgets of the two Conference Councils on Ministries. Each Director shall be the manager for his/her area of responsibility, working under the guidelines set by the appropriate Area group. All incurred expenses in Area programs shall be dispersed from the appropriate Area funds.
- d) In their Area of responsibility, the Directors shall assume leadership roles in both Annual Conferences and shall work through the appropriate structures there.
- e) Currently, the Little Rock Conference Council on Ministries supports three professional staff persons; and the North Arkansas Conference supports two professional staff persons. The difference in financial outlay for professional staff in the two Conferences this year amounts to \$13,665.00.

It is estimated that the work load for each staff member under the new Area alignment will be as follows:

¹/₂ time — in Conference responsibilities

¹/₂ time — in Area responsibilities (¹/₄ time in each Conference)

Since the Little Rock Conference will be putting three persons into the Area Staff Setting and the North Arkansas Conference will be putting only two persons here, there exists a basic inequality of financial input to the Area program.

In order to equalize the financial input of both Conferences into the Area Staff program, we recommend that \$4,800.00 be contributed by the North Arkansas Conference Council on Ministries to the Little Rock Conference Council on Ministries during the year of 1980.

Features of the Model

- 1) Wiser use of resources (financial and other) through the elimination of duplication of efforts.
- 2) A more competent and prepared staff since each person will be able to specialize more.
- 3) Conservation of time and expense of sending leaders to national seminars and meetings.
- 4) A greater flexibility of administration since each year major staff responsibilities will be determined by the Annual Conference, through the Area Steering Committee and two Conference Council on Ministries.
- 5) Staff members will be freed to devote more time to research, study, and training in specific areas.
- 6) Local Churches, Districts, etc., will have better understanding of specific assistance available to them by Conference Council offices.
- 7) Area approach enhances availability of General Church funding for Area programs and projects.

Is This a Veiled Attempt to Merge the Two Conferences?

We think not. In fact, it may well be that by cooperating in this way, merger between the two Conferences may be even less likely because this plan offers some of the best benefits of merger (economy, joint planning, etc.) without ever calling for actual physical merger.

Time-Table

- 1) January, 1979: Perfecting of working paper on model of area staff by the staffs of the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conference Councils on Ministries.
- 2) February 22-23: Presentation of Model to Little Rock Conference Council on Ministries.
- 3) February 23-24: Presentation of Model to North Arkansas Conference Council on Ministries.
- 4) February 28: Staffs meet with Robert Paul to negotiate differences, modifications, or amendments arising out of February meetings of the two Councils on Ministries.
- 5) March: Staff meets with North Arkansas and Little Rock Councils on Finance and Administration for any matters related to funding (if needed or required).
- 6) May: Staff meets with District Pre-Conference meetings to explain, discuss, listen, and answer questions related to Area Staff.
- 7) May 22-26: Model presented to North Arkansas Annual Conference.
- 8) May 28-31: Model presented to Little Rock Annual Conference.
- 9) June 22: Area Steering Committee, meeting jointly with the two Conference Council on Ministries staffs, negotiates amendments or changes in the model made by either or both Conferences (if needed) and assign Area responsibilities.
- 10) June 25-29: Two staffs meet to implement model.
- 11) July 2: Implementation of model begins
- 12) January 10, 1980: Area Steering Committee, meeting jointly with Area Staff, evaluates the model and the implementation of the model. Make recommendations and report to next meetings of the two Councils.

Authorization of Negotiation

The Area Steering Committee (Bishop and Chairpersons, Vice-Chairpersons, Secretaries, and Cabinet Representatives of the two Conference Council on Ministries) meeting jointly with the two Conference Council on Ministries staffs, shall be authorized by the respective Annual Conferences to meet jointly following the sessions of the two Annual Conferences and negotiate amendments or changes in the model made by either or both Annual Conferences (if needed). In the event either of the two Annual Conferences makes a major change in the proposed model, the Annual Conference may direct that the model be tabled or returned to the two Conference staffs for further study and presentation at future sessions of the two Annual Conferences.

Commission On Archives And History

We will begin a program of acquiring photographs and reproducing ones already in our files under Archival conditions to prevent loss from poorly processed prints.

Our continued support of the Washington United Methodist Church will be directed toward further renovation.

We call attention to the critical repair work currently being done at the Old Rectory in Epworth, England, home of the Wesleys. Anyone with an interest in making an "over and above" gift to this work may do so through the World Methodist Council (Lake Junaluska, N.C. 28745).

This year the church providing the Historical Display for Annual Conference is the Haven United Methodist Church of Hot Springs.

Finally, with the publication of the History of the Negro in Methodism: Arkansas and Oklahoma (1838-1972), by Dr. W. D. Lester, we offer full cooperation in promoting this first Black History of our area.

REPORT AND RECOMMENDATIONS Of The Area Task Force On Communications To The

1979 Little Rock And North Arkansas Annual Conferences

In the last few years there has been a renewal of interest and appreciation in the importance of communications by the United Methodist Church. The 1976 General Conference authorized bold new ventures into Mass Communications that are proving to be helpful to the United Methodist people, and in reaching out to others. Never before has the call been so clear and timely for us to interpret and share the work of the church both internally to our own members, and externally to those outside the church. As Jesus so often reminded us, what was sufficient in the past is not always adequate for the present or for the future. A modest appraisal is that our church is twenty years behind the times in communications. "New wineskins" are required to hold the "new wine" of today!

For several months, the Executive Committees of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Communication Committees, the Executive Committee of the Board of Managers of the **Arkansas Methodist**, and our Conference Staffs have been working on a comprehensive program of communication for presentation to our two 1979 Annual Conferences. The scope of the work has been awesome. Many plans and suggestions have been discussed and developed at length, but we share with you here the very best proposal we can develop to begin to move us into the 1980's with a comprehensive communications program.

Structure

To begin with, a structure must be developed to carry the program that is needed. Presently, our various communication structures are neither well coordinated, clarified, nor adequately linked. Thus, we recommend "that the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conference structures be amended to include the following, and that any articles presently in the Annual Conference Structure that are in conflict with the following be deleted:

"A Joint Committee on Communications shall be established and made up of the total membership of the Little Rock Conference Council Committee on Communications and the North Arkansas Committee on Communications and Publishing Interests. The Joint Committee shall be jointly chaired by the two Chairpersons of the two constituent Communication Committees. The Joint Committee shall administer the adopted Area Communication Program of the Arkansas Area. Standing Sub-Committees of the Joint Committee on Communication shall include a Sub-Committee on the Arkansas Methodist, which shall act as the Board of Managers for the Arkansas Methodist, and a Sub-Committee on the Arkansas Area Resource Center, All standing Sub-Committees shall be nominated by the Joint Committee on Communications to the two Conference Committees on Nominations and elected by the respective Annual Conferences. Nominees may include persons who are not members of the Joint Committee on Communications. Other Sub-Committees may be established in order to accomplish the Area Program and may include Sub-Committees on Media Outreach, Interpretation and Promotion, etc. All standing Sub-Committees shall be composed of three lay persons and three clergy persons from each Annual Conference divided into three classes of two persons each (one lay, one clergy) with each class serving a three-year term. The joint chairpersons of the Joint Committee on Communications shall be ex-officio members with vote on all standing Sub-Committees."

Comprehensive Program of Communication

For any program of communication to be comprehensive, it must include a wide variety of elements. The Area Communication Proposal for 1980 is spelled out in the Pre-Conference Report to the North Arkansas Conference and in the printed supplement of the Little Rock Conference's Member's Workbook. Professional persons with expertise in the media, national United Methodist Communication staff, and Arkansas clergy and lay persons have worked together to develop this Area Communication Program.

Elements included are the Arkansas Methodist, a United Methodist News Service, programs of interpretation, promotion, public relations, Area Resource Center, Area Production Center, and training opportunities for communication skill development. The results expected are:

- 1) a strong weekly Arkansas Methodist newspaper,
- 2) a better contact with and use of the media,
- 3) an increased visibility of our church at work,

- 4) an awareness and appreciation of the connectional United Methodist Church,
- 5) an understanding of our benevolent funds and the ministry they support,
- 6) a supportive Area Resource Center,
- 7) better quality in make-up and printing of promotional materials, and
- 8) training of persons in communication skill development.

The important fact to keep in mind in the whole proposal is that we are now moving towards a comprehensive program of communication. We are now creating "a new creature"; we are now turning a new corner and we have had nothing in our past with which we can compare.

Recommendations

- 1. That we publish a weekly Arkansas Methodist using the facilities of the United Methodist Reporter.
- 2. That we publish at least 12,000 copies of the Arkansas Methodist each week. Twelve issues (once a month) will have a total of six pages each (including 3 pages of local news) and forty issues will have a total of four pages each (including one page of local news.) It should be noted that one page printed by the United Methodist Reporter is the equivalent of two of our current pages.
- 3. That the Distribution Schedule of the Arkansas Methodist be as follows:
 - a. Each Church shall receive a minimum of five copies.
 - b. Churches will then receive additional copies, as determined by the decimal figures (used in establishing apportionments for each local church).
 - c. A suggested priority list will be provided for churches to use in the distribution of their allotment of papers. Local churches may determine another distribution plan if they so desire.
 - d. All retired ministers, widows of ministers, seminary students, etc., will receive the paper at no charge.
 - e. Additional subscriptions will be available at a standard subscription fee (around \$5.00 in 1980) for other persons who desire to receive the paper.
- 4. That the budget for this Arkansas Methodist be as follows:

Staff Support	39,315
Office Expenses	18,600
Printing & mailing of paper	48,500
	\$106,415

5. That each Annual Conference cut its present apportionment for the Arkansas Methodist from \$56,100 (total of \$112,200) to \$53,500 (total of \$107,000). It is further recommended that each Annual Conference fund the total communications program (as described below):

Total Cost of Area Communication Plan for 1980:

\$107,000 (53,500 per Conference)

Remaining Area Communication plan
(see Pre-Conference Workbooks)

Arkansas Methodist

22,070 (11,035 per Conference)

\$129,070

NOTE: In the Little Rock Annual Conference, the \$11,035 figure is already included in the Conference Council on Ministries budget. In the North Arkansas Annual Conference, the \$11,035 figure is to be funded through an increase in the Mass Communications apportionment.

- 6. That the administrative structure for the Area Communication Program be as follows:
 - a. Area Director of Communications
 - who is a member of Area Council on Ministries Staff (as assigned by the Area Steering Committee)
 - have overall supervision of total communications program and staff
 - work with the Joint Committee on Communications in the accomplishment of the Area Communications Program
 - b. Editor of Arkansas Methodist
 - work under supervision of Area Director of Communication
 - publish Arkansas Methodist
 - serve as United Methodist News Officer for Arkansas Area (see Area Communication Program in Pre-Conference Report)
 - c. Associate Editor (to serve until retirement in July, 1980)
 - d. Secretary to the Editor and A-V Librarian for Area Resource Center
 - **NOTE:** The other employee now working in the Arkansas Methodist may be employed as the Area Production Assistant as described in the Area Communication Program (see Pre-Conference Report).
- 7. That the Joint Committee of Communications and Area Director of Communications be authorized by the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences to meet following the sessions of the 1979 Annual Conference to negotiate any changes made by either or both of the Annual Conferences that are not substantial changes. It is understood that substantial disagreement in the plans adopted by the two Annual Conferences would be non-negotiable and thus, a Comprehensive Area Communications Program not a possibility.
- 8. That the Joint Committee on Communications be asked to evaluate each element of the adopted Area Communication Program within one year of its inception and make any recommended changes or amendments to the plan to subsequent sessions of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences for their consideration and action.

Benefits of the Area Communication Plan

- 1. The development of a viable Comprehensive Arkansas Communication system.
- 2. Better utilization of staff personnel with more flexibility and higher output level due to better job analysis and accountability.
- 3. Provides better resourcing and promotion of local church, District, and Annual Conference programs and interests.
- 4. Definite financial economy in publishing a weekly Arkansas Methodist.
- 5. Greatly enhances Arkansas Methodist outreach and witness to our state through the use of media and other forms of communication.
- 6. By using the facilities of the United Methodist Reporter to publish the Arkansas Methodist, the following additional benefits may be seen:
 - a. A high emphasis on Arkansas news will be retained and an even more comprehensive coverage of national news will be achieved.
 - b. Our Arkansas Methodist will return to a weekly newspaper and many local churches may choose to purchase their own "church page" for their own publicity and news.
 - c. Better financial planning may occur since printing and mailing costs are guaranteed by the United Methodist Reporter before budgets are adopted by the Annual Conference. This will eliminate the necessity of coming back in the middle of the year for additional funding due to unexpected increases in mailing or production costs.

- d. Low subscription rates may be continued. Presently, the United Methodist Reporter has the lowest per-unit subscription rate of any 52-issue church news publication in the country.
- e. Using the facility of the United Methodist Reporter to publish our Arkansas Methodist allows us to realign staff time and responsibilities so as to present a more comprehensive communication program.

Conclusion

We appreciate your consideration of these concerns and ask for your best judgment and support as we embark on a comprehensive venture in Communications in Arkansas.

Commission On Equitable Salaries

The Equitable salary support for a charge shall be computed on the combined ministerial support paid the pastor by a charge.

- Charges are eligible for Equitable Salary Assistance provided:
 - 1. Each church submits its budget, in writing to the Commission, through the District Superintendent annually.
 - 2. Each church conduct an Every Member Visitation, and report the results to the Commission, through the District Superintendent annually.
 - 3. Each church pays in full all acceptances to the Conference or District Treasurer.
 - 4. The charge agrees to increase salary support a minimum of \$100.00 annually, moving toward the goal of total support at the earliest possible date.
 - 5. The charge makes application to the Commission annually, on the prescribed form, by action of the Charge Conference through the District Superintendent.
 - 6. The charge is served by a full-time pastor, or ministerial student approved by the Annual Conference. By full-time we mean disciplinary meaning of full-time minister.
- II. The Commission will supplement charges meeting these requirements to reach the minimum salary set by the Annual Conference up to a maximum of \$1,750.00 per year computed on the basis of total support paid the pastor by the charge including base salary, travel and utilities.
- III. The minimum Salary for a pastor, approved by the Annual Conference for the conference year beginning June 1, 1979, shall be:

Full-time	\$ 10,000.00
Resident, student	\$ 9,000.00
Non-resident, student	\$ 7,500.00

- IV. To encourage charges to reach full Equitable Salary support, a charge will be given credit for any annual increase that is in excess of \$100 (see 4 under Program) in an amount equal to one-half of said increase: total support not to exceed \$10,000.00.
- V. We encourage the cabinet, the local church and the pastors to work toward charge realignment immediately, in order to strengthen the Church and improve ministerial support.
- VI. Station Churches, except in geographically isolated situations paying less than Equitable Salary, will be given two years to meet minimum standards or undergo charge reorganization. Failure to meet this requirement will result in loss of Equitable Salary assistance.

- VII. In the event of insufficient funds to meet all claims each charge shall share proportionately from the funds available.
- VIII. The Commission shall report annually in the Conference Journal by district the amounts paid during the conference year to each charge and minister.
- IX. That the above plan of distribution of funds be made effective June 1, 1979.
- X. Feasibility of Standardizing Salaries in the Little Rock Annual Conference.

The question of standardizing salaries is not new. Despite the studies that have been made by several conferences, no annual conference has ever proceeded further than some type of basic minimum salary guide or scale.

Any study group or action task force should be very careful not to compromise existing systems that have been developed and still function to the advantage and favor of many. For example, the longstanding principle and system of acceptability, availability, appointability of pastor to appointment by the bishop and cabinet. There could be many delicate problems related to a program where the ministerial salaries are determined by the minister's place within a salary scale rather than by the location of the ministry. This takes the responsibility away from the local church of setting the pastor's salary when in reality we need to develop additional responsibility in that area. Any program causing ministerial salaries to be paid from sources other than the local church could develop unfavorable consequences. Does it encourage initiative or mediocrity?

The committee recognizes that the efforts to consider standardized salaries have certain recognized positive and negative points. Any further recommendations and/or actions taken by any group or body should have objectives and action plans that nest within the total framework of the conference ministry by objective and stay in concert with developments involved with parish development charge missionary programs, etc. This study should be continued by this commission.

The committee recommends continued efforts be made to direct thrust toward raising low salaries and at the same time provide new effective leadership for small churches and more adequate support for all clergy. The real challenge is to encourage the minister, the Pastor Parish Relations Committee, the District Superintendent and others to join together to determine realistic, appropriate total funding and salary programs for the ministry and to help the congregation develop sensitivity toward the necessity to provide adequate ministerial salaries as a part of the total adequate support for the clergy.

We feel that the work being done with the Pastor Parish Relations Committee will provide a platform for identifying appropriate working goals and to encourage a better relationship and understanding between conference, District Superintendent, local church and pastor,

We recommend to the Annual Conference that it memorialize General Conference to allow any Annual Conference who wishes to set up standardized salaries be allowed to do so.

We recommend that the study on the feasibility of standardizing salaries in the conference be continued by the commission on Equitable Salaries.

IX. Advance Specials:

We recommend General Advance Specials to local churches for first hand relationships with mission projects and for involvement in mission.

We recommend the Africa Medical Program as a World Advance Special with a goal of \$3,000.

We recommend continuing local church budget support for Aldersgate Methodist Camp and St. Paul (Maumelle) Methodist Day Care Center as Conference Advance Specials.

X. We recommend that the following Special Days be observed with offerings: Human Relations Day — Second Sunday in February One Great Hour of Sharing — Fourth Sunday in Lent Golden Cross Sunday — First Sunday in May with goal of \$3,000 United Methodist Student Day — Second Sunday in June Camp Tanako Day — Second Sunday in August with goal of \$8,000 Christian Education Sunday — Last Sunday in September with a goal of \$11,000 to be apportioned to the local churches. World Communion Sunday — First Sunday in October. United Methodist Children's Home Offering — Second & Third Sundays in December.

XI. We commend the Ecumenical Retirement Center, Inc., for having repaid the full loan of \$37,500.

XII. Other Recommendations:

That Advance Specials for World Hunger and Ethnic Minority Local Churches be accepted by every local church as second mile giving, and that one-half $(\frac{1}{2})$ the monies received as General Advance Specials for Ethnic Minority Local Church be retained for use within the Little Rock Conference. We approve and endorse the World Hunger goal of \$300,000 in 1979.

The Council on Finance and Administration viewed with concern the "Unrestricted Benevolence Fund." It was approved unanimously that Council on Ministries, Boards, Agencies and Committees be advised that they will receive only the amount apportioned.

XIII. Recommendations:

A. Pastor's Utilities: If a charge does not otherwise provide for a pastor's utilities, then each charge is requested to designate the cost of parsonage utilities as a part of the pastor's salary, thus exempting the cost of utilities from the income tax claim.

B. Authorized Payments by the Director of Finance and Management:

- 1. Methodist Foundation of Arkansas \$1,500 on a vouchered basis.
- 2. That the Committee on the Annual Conference in cooperation with the Office of Finance and Management and the Host Church prepare a budget for Conference Entertainment Expense, and after Annual Conference recommend the payment of any deficit that needs to be paid to the Host Church.
- 3. Travel Allowances set at 15¢ per mile.
- 4. Retired Ministers attending Annual Conference, \$25 per Diem.
- 5. Pastor's Moving Expense at the rate of \$100 plus 75¢ per mile, except that no "expenses" will be paid in 1979. (See section J for those who qualify.)

C. Conference Benevolences Unrestricted Fund: That all unrestricted benevolent fund balances be placed in a central operating balance.

D. Interest Income: That interest income from investments shall continue to go into the Conference Administration Fund.

E. Honorarium for Conference Preacher: We recommend that the Honorarium for the Conference Preacher be decided by the Presiding Bishop and the Chairperson of Committee on Annual Conference and this expense be paid from Line Item "Expense of Annual Conference."

F. We recommend that any Conference employee who has, or who desires, a Taxsheltered Annuity, may direct the Director of Stewardship and Finance to pay this annuity from his regular income following proper guidelines.

G. We recommend second-mile giving through Advance Specials for World Hunger and Ethnic Minority Churches for every local church. We approve and endorse the World Hunger goals of \$300,000 in 1979.

H. Policy Statement on Budgets

- 1. We recommend that each Board, Commission, Committee, or other agency of the Little Rock Annual Conference prepare and present an annual detailed budget to the Council on Finance and Administration two months before the session of the Annual Conference.
- 2. We further recommend that no Board, Commission, Committee or other agency be allowed to change a line in their approved budget which would exceed 10% of the amount without the approval of the CFA.

I. The latest independent audits shall be submitted for review and study by the following: Hendrix College, Philander Smith College, Camp Tanako, Aldersgate, Inc., The United Methodist Children's Home, The Arkansas Methodist, The Methodist Foundation of Arkansas, Mt. Sequoyah, The Christian Civic Foundation, and the four Wesley Foundations within the Little Rock Conference.

J. We recommend that a "Pastor's Moving Expense" be established and that \$12,500 be apportioned to the local churches in 1980 for this purpose. We further recommend that no "claims" be paid from this fund until after the Annual Conference of 1980.

- 1. That the rate of reimbursable moving expense for Pastors' be set at \$100 plus 75¢ per mile from parsonage to parsonage except when a Pastor shall transfer to or from another Conference, the rate will apply from parsonage to the Little Rock Annual Conference boundary.
- 2. The following persons shall be eligible:
 - a. Pastors
 - b. Lay Pastors
 - c. Student pastors after first appointment
 - d. District Superintendents
 - e. Persons in Conference Connectional positions
 - f. Retiring Pastors
 - g. Persons taking disability leave
 - h. Other persons recommended by the Board of Ministry

K. We recommend that \$1,500 be set aside in 1978, 1979, and 1980 from Conference -Benevolences Unrestricted Funds to help defray the expense of the Jurisdictional Conference meeting in Little Rock in 1980.

L. We recommend that local churches be apportioned an additional \$20,000 for Special Church Extension for a two year period, 1979-1980 and that all these monies be placed in a "Stabilization Fund," and that no funds or interest accruing to this account may be used until the end of this two year period.

M. We have elected Ann Onstott as Director of Finance and Management and recommend that the Annual Conference elect her for the remainder of the present Quadrennium.

Addendum To CFA Report

1. We recommend the collection of \$25,000.00 from individuals and Churches for the Area Director of Parish Development in accord with the action of the Annual Conference.

2. We recommend that the Board of Evangelism be granted permission to solicit funds from individuals and Churches for the purpose of securing Alan Walker for a special mission.

3. We recommend that the first reserve, both laity and clergy, be paid expenses on the basis of the per diem and travel for General and Jurisdictional Conferences from Conference Administration funds.

4. We recommend that the Alumni of Henderson State University in Arkadelphia be granted the privilege of soliciting funds for The Bishop Paul V. Galloway Scholarship Fund.

5. The annual audit is now in process. It will be an in-depth audit.

Job Description

Office Of Finance And Management

- A. The office shall be named the Office of Finance and Management. The chief officer shall be the Treasurer.
- B. The office shall be guided by the provisions of Par. 707, 717-722 of the 1976 Discipline.
- C. The treasurer shall:
 - 1. Be a person loyal to the United Methodist Church.
 - 2. Have a knowledge of the principles of accounting and investments, knowledge of electronic data processing, and knowledge of conference and general church funding, managerial experience, and a Bachelors degree or equivalent.
- D. The work of the office shall include:
 - 1. The keeping of the financial records and accounts of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences and the Arkansas area, and such additional accounts as determined by the Councils on Finance and Administration.
 - 2. The provision of financial services for any agency of the two annual conferences requesting such services, with contractual arrangements approved jointly by the Councils on Finance and Administration.
 - 3. The provision of current financial information to the CFA's, the Bishop, the District Superintendents, the Councils on Ministries, boards and agencies, and local churches.
 - 4. The interpretation of the benevolence program of the United Methodist Church to the local churches, districts, and annual conferences, using the Arkansas Methodist and other means for this purpose.
 - 5. The supervision of the management of funds of area and conference offices and agencies.
 - 6. The employment and direction of the staff of the Office of Finance and Management.
 - 7. A relationship to the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas, including:
 - a. Serving as the Treasurer of the Foundation;
 - b. Providing resources on wills and legacies and various causes of United Methodism in Arkansas.
 - 8. The authority and responsibility for the investment of funds of the Arkansas Area in order to maximize their earnings. This shall be done under guidelines established by the two CFA's.
 - 9. Such additional responsibilities as determined by the Councils on Finance and Administration.
- E. The treasurer shall serve as:
 - 1. An ex-officio member (w/o vote) of the Conference Councils on Ministries.
 - 2. An ex-officio member (w/o vote) of the Conference Councils on Finance and Administration.
- F. The financial support of the office shall be recommended by the Councils on Finance and Administration and approved by the annual conferences.

Insurance Committee

Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program

The Little Rock Conference has the Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program provided by the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church. The Travelers Insurance Company is the underwriter for this insurance.

Eligible Groups

A. Ministers and Full-Time Local Pastors

- 1. All full members of the Conference under appointment with annuity claim upon the Conference, and their dependents.
- 2. All probationary members, and their dependents.
- 3. All full-time local pastors, and their dependents.
- 4. All full-time lay employees of the Annual Conference, and their dependents.
- 5. All members who have been granted the retired relation by this Conference with annuity claim, and their dependents.
- 6. All retired full-time local pastors with annuity claim on this Conference, and their dependents.
- 7. All widows of deceased ministers or full-time local pastors with annuity claim on this Conference, and their dependent children.
- 8. Student local pastors, and their dependents.
- 9. Ministers on leave-of-absence for up to one year following the appointment to leave-of-absence.

Note: Any Conference member under special appointment without annuity credit on this Conference is eligible to be enrolled provided he assumes responsibility for full payment of the premium. Probationary members appointed to attend school and not serving a Conference church are also eligible to be enrolled provided they assume responsibility for full payment of the premium.

B. Local Church Full-Time Lay Employees and Full-Time Diaconal Ministers

To enroll the eligible lay employees of a particular church, the following number of employees must elect to participate:

Any local church or institution not qualifying for, or electing to enroll its full-time employees under the above rules on the initial enrollment date (July 1, 1972), may enroll eligible employees under the same rules on any subsequent anniversary of the Conference initial enrollment date.

Ministers transferring into the Conference may enroll in HMEP within 90 days of transfer without having to fill out a "Statement of Physical Condition" form. A new lay employee or a participating church or organization may enroll within 90 days of employment without having to submit a "Statement of Physical Condition" form.

Enrollment applications and cards are available from the Insurance Committee Secretary at the Office of Finance and Management.

Benefits Paid Under HMEP

Under Age 65

Hospital Services: After a \$50 deductible, full hospital expenses up to \$500 each calendar year (with semi-private accomodations), then 80% of the balance.

Services of a Physican, Nurse, and all other covered charges: 80% of reasonable charges after calendar year deductible of \$50. Covered charges for treatment of mental or nervous disorders limited to \$50 per visit and 50 visits per calendar year.

Out-of-Pocket Feature: After \$500 paid "out-of-pocket" per person, or three members of one family accumulate \$500 each during a calendar year, then 100% of balance covered. Charges for treatment of non-confined mental and nervous not included.

Maximum Benefit: \$250,000 per individual, with automatic restoration of up to \$1,000 each calendar year.

Maternity: Covered maternity expenses paid on same basis as charges above.

Geographical Limits: Worldwide coverage.

Age 65 and Over - Complements Medicare

In-Patient Hospital Services: Full payment of each \$160 Part A Medicare deductible; full payment of \$40 per day from 61st through 90th day; full payment of semi-private and miscellaneous charges from 91st - 120th day beyond payment made from Medicare Lifetime Reserve days; then 80% of reasonable charges from the 121st day up to a \$250,000 lifetime maximum.

Skilled-Nursing Facility: Full payment of \$20 per day from the 21st through the 100th day.

Physicians and Other Medical Services: 20% of reasonable charges after a \$60 calendar year Medicare Part B deductible. You must pay the \$60 Part B deductible.

Prescription Drugs — Full-Time Private Duty Nursing: 80% of reasonable charges after calendar year deductible of \$50, up to a \$250,000 lifetime maximum.

Geographical Limits: Worldwide coverage.

Important Information Concerning Medicare Enrollment

Any minister who will reach his 65th birthday when he is still serving in full-time capacity, and not drawing Social Security, should apply three months before his 65th birthday at his local Social Security office for Medicare. Any minister who has passed his 65th birthday, and has not applied for Medicare, should contact his Social Security office immediately.

Should a minister's wife reach age 65 before the minister, she should apply for Medicare at the local Social Security office.

It is each person's reponsibility to secure his or her own Medicare coverage. Age 65 and over HMEP coverage complements Medicare.

Payment of Premiums

Each local church, or charge, will provide 60% of the premium cost for either individual or family coverage, whichever is applicable, for those under regular appointment, and for eligible local church lay employees.

The Conference Board or Agency responsible for its own budget will provide 60% of the premium cost for either individual or family coverage, whichever is applicable, for ministers under special appointment with annuity credit on the Conference.

The Conference Board of Pensions is paying the full HMEP premium for Conference Claimants.

All eligible persons holding an appointment from the Bishop are required to participate in the Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program.

If a minister has not paid his HMEP premium by the beginning of the quarter following the quarter for which the premium was due, the minister will be removed from the HMEP enrollment. Any hardship case should be communicated by the District Superintendent to the Secretary of the Insurance Committee for review and action by the Insurance Committee. Any exceptions to this rule must be approved by the Insurance Committee.

Death Benefit Program

The Little Rock Conference has Plan D, with optional alternate E3 of the Death Benefit Program provided by the General Board of Pensions of The United Methodist Church.

Eligible Groups

A. Ministers

- 1. Ministerial members (including associate and probationary) appointed with pension credit on the Conference.
- 2. Retired ministers having pension claim on the Annual Conference granting the retired relationship, provided there be enrollment upon retirement, and that such enrollment remain unbroken.

- B. Additional Groups
 - 1. Those persons rendering direct and full-time service to, or employed by, the participating Annual Conference.
 - 2. Ministers in special appointments without pension credit on the Conference.
 - 3. Full-time local pastors rendering full-time service.
 - 4. Retired local pastors with pension claim on the Conference.
 - 5. Ministers refired without pension claim on the Conference granting the retired relationship.
 - 6. Those persons covered under Additional Groups 1 and 3 above, and subsequently retired with pension claim on the Conference.
 - 7. Those in the leave of absence relationship.
 - 8. Student local pastors.

Except for 3 and 8, enrollment must be elected upon becoming eligible and maintained without break.

Enrollment Periods

An open enrollment period shall be held each year during the month of December for all persons currently eligible. The effective enrollment date shall be January 1 of the succeeding year.

A limited enrollment period shall be held each year for 90 days following the session of Annual Conference. Enrollment at this time shall be limited to those persons for whom appointment or change of Conference relationship on or after January 1, has provided new eligibility status in the plan.

Individual enrollment may be requested at any time within 90 days of becoming newly eligible, with the effective date of eligibility as the effective date of coverage.

Enrollment application cards are available from the Insurance Committee Secretary at the Office of Finance and Management.

Premium

The DBP premium is 1.82% of the average salary of the Conference, which, for 1979, is \$11,855. The premium for 1979 is \$215.76, minus a \$25 refund, or \$190.76. The church pays 60%, or \$114.46, and the minister pays 40%, or \$76.30. As long as we do not have heavy claims, we anticipate such a refund yearly, to be distributed as determined by the Insurance Committee.

The 1979 premium was due at the Office of Finance and Management December 1, 1978, since premiums for the whole Conference were due at the General Board of Pensions in January, 1979, to avoid a late payment interest charge. This schedule will be in effect again this year.

DBP premiums for ministers and full-time local pastors retired with pension claim by this Conference are paid by the Little Rock Conference Board of Pensions.

Participation

All eligible persons holding an appointment from the Bishop are required to participate in the Death Benefit Program.

Educational Benefits: \$1,680 yearly for four years of college for each child up to age 25.

Benefit payable upon death of spouse: 20% of average salary, or \$2,371.00, plus additional benefit of 10% of average salary, or \$1,185.50, when there is at least one surviving child under age 21.

DBP Coverage for Surviving Spouses

Little Rock Conference has Death Benefit Program coverage for surviving spouses of Little Rock Conference ministers and Little Rock Conference full-time local pastors, provided such spouse is receiving a surviving spouse benefit on account of service in the Little Rock Conference. The benefit paid is 10% of the average salary. The benefit in 1979 is \$1,185.50. The full premium is paid by the Conference Board of Pensions. Surviving spouses have Plan B, DBP.

Resolution For Annual Conference Adoption To Enable Extension of Death Benefit Program To Diaconal Ministers, and To Add Supplemental Accident Coverage to the HMEP Program.

Whereas,

The DBP Rules and Regulations were amended by the General Board of Pensions so as to enable participating Annual Conferences to enroll diaconal ministers, as a group, in the program, and

Whereas,

There is a definite need for supplemental accident insurance in the HMEP program, and the cost is minimal

Be it Resolved:

1. That the Little Rock Conference extend Death Benefit Program coverage to diaconal ministers rendering full-time service in the Annual Conference provided, however, that 75% of the eligible group as determined by the Annual Conference must be enrolled and, provided further that premiums be paid in the same proportion between the diaconal minister and the employer as between ministers and churches.

2. That \$300 supplemental accident coverage be provided in the Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program. There will be no deductible or co-insurance. The coverage will become effective July 1, 1979, at the following additional premium rates:

Minister or Employee Employee and Spouse, with or without Children, (family coverage) Surviving Spouse, under age 65 Children of Surviving Spouse, or Spouse age 65 or older \$1.05 quarterly

Board Of Ordained Ministry

Report No. 1

Policy and Program

- I. The Little Rock Conference Board of Ordained Ministry proposes to work strictly within the framework of the current Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church.
- II. The elected officers of the Board are: chairperson, vice-chairperson, secretary, registrar, and associate registrar. The chairman shall be the treasurer.
- III. The executive committee of the Board are elected officers, Chairperson of the Continuing Education Committee, and the Chairperson of the Conference Relations Committee.
- IV. The Board shall meet prior to the opening of school, at mid-year, and Annual Conference, and on the call of the chairperson.
- V. The Board shall have representatives on Each District Committee of the Ordained Ministry (Par. 731.1e). In consultation with the district superintendents, the chairperson shall appoint a member of the Board to serve on each committee.
- VI. The Board's sources of income shall be:
 - A. A percentage of conference benevolences.
 - B. 1/4 (25%) of the amount collected from local churches designated for Ministerial Education.
 - C. Gifts, bequests, interests, and repayments of loans.
- VII. The Board shall maintain a scholarship aid fund for ministerial training as follows:
 - A. For those in the course of study above the local pastor's license.
 - 1. Assistance in courses of study schools.
 - a. The cost of required textbooks for each year of the course of study.
 - b. The cost of tuition or registration fees, and of room and board while attending the course of study schools. Because of limited funds transportation cannot be paid.
 - 2. Assistance in the correspondence course.
 - a. Payment of fees.
 - b. The cost of required textbooks for each course; the enrollees are to purchase the required books and then be reimbursed by the registrar.
 - B. For students from the Little Rock Annual Conference preparing for the effective ministry in the United Methodist Church who:
 - 1. Have satisfactorily completed at least enough semester hours of college credit to qualify for classification as a junior.
 - 2. Are enrolled in a college, university, or seminary approved by the University Senate of the United Methodist Church.
 - 3. Hold a current certificate of candidacy for the ministry in the United Methodist Church, be enrolled in a seminary, or be a Probationary Member of the Little Rock Conference.

- 4. By August 1 make application to the registrar of the Board for the fall semester giving all information requested and authorizing regular grade reports to this Board's registrar from the school's registrar, including a transcript of credits at the end of the year. By January 15 make application for second semester. Application must be requested.
- C. The Board may set a maximum amount of scholarship aid per year per recipient, but assistance will be determined for each individual on the basis of requirements or needs.
 - 1. Scholarship aid for summer sessions will be granted on the basis of the number of hours taken based on full-time load for full semester credit.
 - 2. The maximum scholarship aid for college students shall not exceed two years.
 - 3. Additional emergency scholarship aid will be granted at the Board's discretion to students in the following categories, requesting and making application, who:
 - a. Begin preparation for the ministry later in life with pressing financial responsibilities.
 - b. Have severe health circumstances.
 - c. Come from disadvantaged economic backgrounds.
 - 4. The maximum amount of emergency scholarship aid per person per year shall be equal to one semester's grant for scholarship aid. Executive committee must approve the emergency scholarship aid.
- VIII. The Board shall encourage participation in continuing education programs by ministers of the Little Rock Conference. Pastors are encouraged to participate in at least one continuing education experience annually (Par. 424). The following shall serve as policy guidelines:
 - A. Members of the Conference, participating in continuing education experiences approved by the Committee on Continuing Education, may receive up to \$300 to cover costs for tuition, board, and books. Persons are responsible for their own travel.
 - B. Persons seeking financial aid for continuing education shall secure an application form from the Chairperson of Continuing Education.
 - C. No Person shall be given more than \$300 each calendar year for continuing education.
 - D. In hardship cases, ministers can apply to the continuing education committee for help to attend Pastor's School. Such help will only be granted after other avenues for aid have been exhausted.
 - E. No financial aid is available for Minister's Week.
 - F. Requests for the continuing education funds shall be directed to Board of Ordained Ministry, Chairman, Bill Elliott.
 - IX. The Board shall give assistance in a reasonable amount for physical examination for persons to be admitted as associate, probationary or full members.

Requests and Recommendations

- I. As the first step to the ministry, candidates shall enroll for studies for certificate of candidacy for ministry with the Department of the Ministry, Division of the Ordained Ministry.
- II. We assume our Conference's share of financial responsibility for the Arkansas Pastor's School.
- III. The Annual Conference Council on Finance and Administration is requested to grant:
 - A. An appropriation of a percentage from conference benevolences, based on the Board's financial needs that are not met by other sources.
 - B. An apportionment to local churches for the Ministerial Education Fund.
- IV. We express our appreciation for the support given the Ministerial Education Fund by the churches of the Annual Conference. We urge every church to continue to give full cooperation and support of its share of the Ministerial Education Fund for the remainder of the calendar year and 1980.
- V. Ministers may be given a minimum of two weeks' vacation and a minimum of one week annually to participate in a continuing education enterprise (Par. 424).
- VI. The Board recommends the establishment of a Course of Basic United Methodist Policy, History, and Tradition that would be a prerequisite for any person receiving a local pastor's license and for persons entering ministry in the United Methodist Church from other denominations.
- VII. For this summer the Board has planned two special orientation-training events. In cooperation with the North Arkansas Conference we will sponsor the School for the Local Pastor's License in July at Hendrix. Also, we have planned an orientation training in August and support system for recent seminary graduates and persons entering the Methodist ministry from other denominations.

The Arkansas Area Committee On Cooperative Parish Development Report To The Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences 1979

Introduction

The small membership church is the rule, rather than the exception, of Arkansas United Methodism. Three-fourths of our local churches have memberships of two-hundred (200) or less, and half of them have one-hundred (100) members or fewer. Most of these churches have never had access to full time pastoral care. The charges of which they are a part are frequently re-aligned. Often, clergy appointed to small membership churches do not remain in that appointment longer than two years. Our small membership churches are often isolated from the program and resources of the annual conference and the general church. This means that three-fourths of the local churches in the Arkansas Area are hindered in fulfilling their ministry and mission.

We must find some way to strengthen our small membership churches, for United Methodism in Arkansas is only as effective a witness to the gospel as its individual congregations. These words from the **Book of Discipline** express well why it is crucial that small membership churches in Arkansas Area be strengthened for involvement in mission and ministry in their communities and the world: "The people of God are the Church made visible in the world. It is they who must convince the world of the reality of the gospel or leave it unconvinced. There can be no evasion or delegation of this responsibility; the Church is either faithful as a witness and serving community, or it loses its vitality and its impact on an unbelieving world" (par. 106).

The Work of the Area Committee

The Area Committee on Parish Development was convened by Bishop Hicks in 1977, to find some means of addressing the needs of our small membership churches and so provide every United Methodist Church and every United Methodist person in the Arkansas Area access to full time pastoral leadership and maximum opportunity for involvement in mission and ministry. In August, 1977, leaders from both Annual Conferences participated in a workshop staffed by Ms. Gladys Campbell and Rev. Jerry Chapman of the Office of Town and Country Ministries, The National Division, Board of Global Ministries and Dr. Harold McSwain, faculty member of United and METHESCO seminaries in Ohio. The purpose of the workshop was to acquaint these leaders with current understandings and models of Cooperative Parish Development.

The committee began its work in September, 1977, and continued to explore Cooperative Parish Development in detail. Jerry Chapman and Harold McSwain have worked closely with the group, helping members clarify their understandings of concepts and training them in the development of policy and strategy for Cooperative Parish Development. As a result of these efforts, an Area Cabinet Policy has been developed by the district superintendents and an Area Parish Development Policy was approved by the annual conferences in 1978.

In April, 1978, six members of the committee made an itineration of cooperative parishes in Florida, Ohio, and Kansas. The Office of Town and Country Ministries provided funding for the itineration. Those who made the trip have been valuable resources to the committee as it has developed the strategy outlined in this report. Three major training events were part of the committee's work this spring. In March, six district superintendents and three Conference Council on Ministries staff persons from the area attended a Cooperative Parish Development training event at Hinton Rural Life Center in Hayesville, North Carolina. Bishop Hicks was part of the leadership team for this workshop. April 29 - May 4, members of the committee assisted Bishop Hicks with a series of consultations on Cooperative Parish Development and to familiarize them with a proposed area parish development plan. In May, a training session was conducted for those persons who will be appointed to probe staffs this June and potential staff members. The teams learned about the areas they will serve, worked carefully on Cooperative Parish Development concepts (especially those regarding the probe stage), and gained skills in team building and in working with lay leadership.

The committee has been working to lay a foundation for Cooperative Parish Development in the Arkansas Area, and it views the proposals in this report as aspects of a plan which offers new and exciting potential for our small membership churches.

What Is Cooperative Parish Development?

Cooperative Parish Development is an intentional process which enables churches in a given geographic area to develop coordinated church programs and ministry. For example, several churches may work together to have a youth program that none could support alone.

What Happens Next?

The committee proposes that in designated areas in each annual conference probe staffs be appointed in June, 1979, to selected groups of churches. It is not the committee's intention that any church, or pastor, be required to participate in a cooperative venture against their will. Additional probe staffs will be considered by the bishop and cabinets at appropriate intervals until all those churches for which Cooperative Parish Development is feasible are involved.

A probe staff is a group of pastors who are appointed to serve charges within a defined geographic area. These pastors are intentional about finding ways to work together themselves and about helping the churches they serve explore the possibilities for cooperation in developing improved ministries. Each charge in a probe area has "its own" pastor and also relates to all the other persons on the staff, benefiting from their special skills. For example, one member of the staff might be skilled in teaching and another in music. These skills could be used in all of the churches served by the probe staff rather than only in the charges they serve.

Fundamental to the work of the probe staff is the principle that it exists to enable laity in the work and worship of the church. Probe staffs work closely with laity, and decisions about involvement in cooperative programs of ministry are finally the decisions of the churches themselves.

What Will It Take to Make Cooperative Parish Development A Reality in Arkansas?

Local churches, pastors and the annual conferences all have responsibility for the realization of the cooperative parish development effort proposed by this committee.

To fulfill their responsibilities, local churches must be:

- 1) Willing to be involved;
- 2) Open to working with other churches in their immediate area;
- 3) Motivated to be more in ministry to both persons within the congregation and the community than is currently the case;
- 4) Willing to work with pastors of near-by churches in specialized areas of ministry.

Pastors fulfill their responsibilities by:

- 1) Developing skills that enable them to work with other pastors;
- 2) Remaining in an appointment long enough to establish a meaningful ministry (a minimum of 3-5 years);
- 3) Accepting a special responsibility in a program of ministry in which several churches participate.

Annual Conferences must assume the responsibility:

- 1) To identify and appoint pastors who are willing and skilled to work with cooperating groups of churches:
- 2) To train pastors for work in teams which serve cooperating groups of churches;
- 3) To guide churches as they plan ways of working together;
- To help cooperating groups of churches locate and secure resources, i.e., persons, finances and materials necessary to implement the programs of ministry they plan;
- 5) To help cooperating groups of churches share with other cooperating groups of new found strengths, so that all can benefit from the experiences of each other;
- 6) To help cooperating groups of churches work with community agencies to determine the needs of people in the community and roles the churches might play in responding to those needs.

What Is the Most Adequate Administrative Approach Our Annual Conferences Can Take Toward Cooperative Parish Development?

After study, thought and discussion, our committee has reached the conclusion that if the cooperative parish development effort we envision is to succeed, a person is needed to oversee, guide, motivate and resource this process. We propose to the annual conferences the establishment of the office of Area Superintendent of Parish Development. This person would work alongside the district superintendents, pastors and laity participating in the cooperative parish development effort. And, as Bishop Hicks put it in a memo to the Councils on Finance and Administration, he or she would "relate to the Bishop and Cabinets and the local churches as a Cabinet participant and enabler in matters pertaining to the multiple Church appointment situation." The following outline describes the kinds of activities of an Area Superintendent of Parish Development and the purposes these activities fulfill.

- 1) Consultation and Training Program
 - **Purposes:** To help pastors, district superintendents, and laity understand in detail Cooperative Parish Development and how its principles apply to the geographic area in which cooperating groups of churches minister.

To gain a comprehensive view of areas being served by staff teams.

To devise strategy for the forming of cooperating groups of churches that are centers for mission and ministry.

To build a "team relationship" among all persons professionally involved in the Cooperative Parish Development effort.

How? Regular training events for staff and potential staff

Staff participation in training events outside the Arkansas Area, e.g., events at Hinton Rural Life Center

Regular training events for parish lay councils and other lay leaders

Training events designed around specific concerns, e.g., Vacation Church School, Sunday School teaching, etc.

Regular events to inform any persons in the annual conferences who want to know more about Cooperative Parish Development

2) Identification of Potential Staff

Purpose: To assist the Bishop and the cabinets in identifying the appointments to be made by the Bishop and District Superintendents as prescribed by the **Discipline**.

To identify staff persons for appointment to probe staff teams.

How? Develop a system for identifying those persons who are possible members of probe staff

Develop a covenant with the cabinets and potential parish appointees

Devise "feeder programs" which guide persons into staff teams (for example, seminary interns)

3) Site Identification and Selection

- **Purpose:** To identify sites with reasonable chances for good experiences in working cooperatively and which will enhance the total cooperative parish development effort.
 - How? Develop with the cabinets a "time line" for the initiation of additional probestaffs

Gather and prepare the necessary data (population, growth patterns, etc.) for potential areas for the establishment of cooperating groups of churches

To define appropriate geographic areas

Develop procedures for working with appropriate conference structures, bodies, regarding changes in supports, e.g., equitable salaries

Develop a process to prepare churches for the arrival of probe staff

4) Development of Program and Ministry in Cooperating Groups of Churches Purpose: To enable cooperating groups of churches to identify, design,

- resource and actualize the things they wish to do.
 - How? Develop a process to identify what is important to all the churches in a cooperating group

Help churches determine how they can best work together to achieve desired results

Aid cooperating churches in gathering resources needed for the ministries they plan, e.g., financial grants, resource persons, materials, etc.

5) Communications Regarding Cooperating Groups of Churches

Purpose: To inform laity and clergy about what is happening in Cooperative Parish Development and why.

To share the discovery of new strengths with other small membership churches.

How? Use Arkansas Methodist

Train designated "communicators" in each cooperating group of churches.

Develop presentations and displays at district and annual Conferences.

Develop presentations on Cooperative Parish Development to educate persons in potential probe areas.

6) Support Network for Persons Serving in Cooperative Parishes Purposes: Further the training of staff members.

Sharing of strategies and successes in operating parishes.

Discussion of problems, needs, and resources.

How? Retreats for new and continuing staff persons.

Training events for probe staffs and lay leadership.

Regular gatherings of those involved in cooperating groups of churches.

The establishment of the office of the Area Director is crucial from the beginning of a cooperative parish development effort like ours. The effects of mistakes made in staffing or organizing cooperating groups of churches in this early stage of the effort will be felt for a long time. Likewise, visible success and progress in these first days will be helpful as the effort progresses. Therefore, the committee proposes that funding for the position begin in January, 1980.

What Advantages Does Cooperative Parish Development Offer United Methodism in Arkansas?

Advantages for local churches

- 1) Churches find it possible to plan and implement ministries together that none could do alone.
- 2) Churches are freed to move from a pre-occupation with "just surviving" to a real involvement in mission and ministry.
- 3) It becomes possible for pastors to remain in an appointment long enough to develop an effective ministry.
- 4) Ministry in each of the churches in a cooperating group is well-rounded, since each has access to pastors with various skills and abilities.

Advantages for pastors

- 1) Provides an opportunity to use and develop better skills and abilities.
- 2) Provides an opportunity for less experienced pastors to work with and learn from pastors who are more experienced.
- 3) Provides a setting in which Local Pastors may perform ministry within the boundaries of their skills and time.

Advantages for annual conferences

- 1) Relates a full time, fully trained pastor to every church in cooperating groups of churches.
- 2) Provides a support/learning team for less experienced pastors.
- 3) Provides a setting for "on the job training" for student pastors that allows them to perform ministry effectively without having to carry the total responsibility of a charge.
- 4) Engages the small membership church in the program of the district and annual conference.
- 5) Lengthens the stay of pastors and so reduces the yearly appointment change load of the bishop and cabinet.

** This amount to be shared equally by the North Arkansas and the Little Rock Annual Conferences. The cost to be shared by the Little Rock Conference shall be permitted to be raised through the efforts of special giving.

The Little Rock Conference shall participate in the Parish Development Program for a period of four years, ending in 1983. At such time we commit ourselves to re-examine our program to determine our continued envolvement.

Conclusion

The committee is of the opinion that the Cooperative Parish Development effort outlined in this report is a response to the needs of our local churches, pastors and annual conferences. Further, it must be said that the proposal regarding the Area Director of Parish Development is that pivotal part of the plan upon which any real success depends. Quoting again from Bishop Hicks' February 8, 1979, memo to the Councils on Finance and Administration: "To move with less than the complete design might result in some success here and there. Where Parish Development is attempted and fails, however, it usually means years before the heart and memory have been healed. In fact, the risks are too high to work with Parish Development with less than the best approach we can formulate. The nature of success in this enterprise, however, is a hope to be treasured."

Parish Development

The 1977 sessions of both the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences designated three priorities in addition to the three general church Missional Priorities. Among these was **Parish Development**. (Cf. Journal, Little Rock Conference, 1977,p.73; Journal, North Arkansas Conference, 1977,p.77.)

Kenneth Hicks, Bishop of the Arkansas Area, prepared and presented to concerned persons a position paper, "Parish Development," in which he described some hopes for parish development in the area, including that of "providing every United Methodist Church and every United Methodist person access to full ministry for Christian nurture, discipleship enablement, and the opportunity to be in mission as Christian persons and as congregations." This paper and the concepts it embodied provided the needed stimulus for an intentional program in parish development which encompassed both annual conferences.

Toward implementation of the parish development goals adopted by conferences, several subsequent events have occurred:

(1) An Area Parish Development Workshop, August 18-19, 1977, at Methodist Headquarters, Little Rock, which included clergy and lay representatives from both conferences, the Bishop and respective Cabinets, and members of the following boards, committees or agencies: Ordained Ministry, Global Ministries, Church and Society, Equitable Salaries, Town and Country, Missions, and Ethnic Minority Local Churches. The workshop was led by Gladys Campbell, Jerry Chapman, and Harold McSwain of the Office of Town and Country Ministries, Board of Global Ministries.

(2) From the persons attending the above workshop, an Area Task Force on Parish Development was called together September 16, 1977, to discuss and plan the future of parish development of "The Bishop's Committee on Parish Development," which included rural and urban district superintendents, rural lay persons, representatives from the Board of Ordained Ministry, Town and Country or Board of Global Ministries, Ethnic Minority Local Churches (clergy and lay), Equitable Salaries, and Council on Ministry staff persons.

In addition, the task force outlined eight components of parish development: (1) cabinet policy, (2) conference policy, (3) staff development, (4) training for staff, cabinets, and leaders, (5) parish superintendent or developer, (6) equitable salary and funding, (7) biblical and theological guidelines, (8) identification of local settings for parish development. These components became the agenda for the committee.

(3) On November 28, 1977, the first meeting of the Bishop's Committee on Parish Development was held. The Committee is composed of the following: Little Rock Conference: Harold Davis, Hope District Superintendent John B. Hays, Little Rock District Superintendent Mrs. Jennings Shaw, Rural Lay Person John F. Walker, Jr., Ordained Ministry George Martin, Equitable Salary J. W. Lofton, Ethnic Minority Local Church, Associate Director, Conference Council on Ministries Thomas Abney, Global Ministries Palmer Garner, Planning and Research Marie Watkins, United Methodist Women Representative **Conference Council on Ministries Staff** North Arkansas Conference: Ben Jordan, Paragould District Superintendent Paul Bumpers, Conway District Superintendent Jim Pledger, Rural Lav Person Phil Hathcock, Ordained Ministry Frank Clemmons, Equitable Salary W. H. Williams, Lay Person, Ethnic Minority Local Church Jerry Nichols, Town and Country, Board of Global Ministries Kathy Fadick, Clergywoman, Rural Charge **Conference Council on Ministries Staff**

Organization was effected at this meeting: Chairperson, Ben Jordan; Vice-Chairperson, Harold Davis; Secretary, Kathy Fadick. Task groups were formed to work on cabinet and conference policy and the components of each were designated.

The Little Rock and North Arkansas Conference cabinets adopted the following area policy on parish development:

An Arkansas Area Cabinet Policy on Parish Development, January, 1978

WHEREAS, the goal of Christian mission in the Arkansas Area should include that of providing every United Methodist Church and every United Methodist person access to full ministry for Christian nurture, discipleship, enablement, and the opportunity to be in mission as Christian persons and as congregations, and,

WHEREAS, seventy-five (75) percent of the churches in the Arkansas Area are limited in the realization of this goal because of a membership of 200 or less and, fifty percent of the churches are even more limited with a membership of 100 or less.

AND WHEREAS, it is extremely difficult for churches of this size membership to individually have a full-time ordained (or unordained) ministerial leadership.

NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY MUTUALLY AGREED AS FOLLOWS: The members of the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conference Cabinets do hereby commit ourselves in sacred covenant to "shoulder the burdens, share the risks, and celebrate the joys"¹ of all these churches within the broader scope of "full ministry" for all persons, and further, this commitment shall find expression through a genuine exercise of a policy of Parish Development.

We believe that through a long-range program of Parish Development we can help all local churches that relate to such a program to be more effective, individually and together.

We believe that the unique nature of each congregation, large and small, will enable all potentially to benefit the other in the commonness of our calling and mission.

And, we believe that through a long-range program of Parish Development every church in the Conference and in the Area can be related to a full-time ordained minister.

We encourage all pastors and all churches of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences to consider prayerfully their opportunities through present and potential parish arrangement; and, we pledge to support as the Cabinets, a continuity in appointments to Parish arrangements that will undergird both the churches and the pastors who assume responsibility for this vital area of ministry.

Our thanks to the Division of Town and Country, Board of Global Ministries, for a \$6,000 grant that made possible two programs critical to the initiation of parish development in Arkansas: (1) Consultations on Parish Development under the leadership of Dr. Harold McSwain, Rural Ministries Training Program, Columbus, Ohio, and (2) a Parish Itineration Project that enabled members of the committee to visit parish development models in Florida, Ohio, and Kansas.

Our main objective in 1979 is the implementation of a survey of the Arkansas Area that will assist the United Methodist people of Arkansas in deciding where and how various patterns of parish development might be carried out at a projected cost of \$3,600.00.

We hope to have in every district a survey of every church to be carried out through cooperation and consultation with the District Superintendents and the District Councils on Ministries. We plan a follow-up to pinpoint potential sites in each district.

We respectfully request that this Annual Conference consider and approve an Arkańsas Area policy on Parish Development. We submit the following statement for your consideration in this regard:

Arkansas Area Policy On Parish Development

Recognizing that 75% of the United Methodist churches in Arkansas have less than 200 members, and that 50% have memberships of 100 or less; and that historically those small membership churches were the major strength of Methodism in our state, we acknowledge

that many of these same churches are at times experiencing the following hurts: hopelessness, powerlessness, lack of continuity of effective professional leadership, lack of vision as well as unrealized dreams, lack of meaningful involvement, and all too often, an absence of a vital sense of belonging.

BECAUSE WE BELIEVE MINISTRY IS:

(1) a lifestyle of servanthood, which is a way of relating to persons, to which all Christians are called:

(2) dependent upon a nurturing community of prayer and celebration, learning and action for its faithfulness to the gospel, and so for its "vitality and impact on an unbelieving world" (See Discipline, par. 106);

Our concerns in parish development are to enable:

(1) small congregations to become ministry oriented rather than survival oriented;

(2) clergy, diaconal ministers, and lay professionals to understand themselves as "enablers of ministry" rather than "doers of program";

(3) an openness to the variety of structures the relationship between churches may take (See Discipline, par. 206.)

206.1 Local churches ("large and small"), with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, may enhance their witness to each other and to the world by showing forth the love of Jesus Christ through forms of mutual cooperation.

We of the Arkansas Area, through parish development, covenant to accomplish the following:

(1) Enable small churches to be in mission in the community and the world.

(2) Enable small churches to have access to full-time pastoral coverage.

(3) Enable small churches to have access to support structures that will enable the members of every church to engage in opportunities for nurture, training, and outreach.

(4) Enable pastors and others serving persons to be members of a support team that will maximize the productiveness and morale of each pastor or serving person.

(5) Attention to the special needs represented in ethnic minority local churches, and any other group or cluster of small churches shall be given due consideration.

(6) The Parish Development program shall be planned and administered by the two Annual Conferences through an Area Parish Development Committee appointed by the Bishop. At such time the Area Committee has completed its assigned tasks, the responsibilities of Parish Development shall be reverted to the responsible committees of the Boards of Global Ministries of the two Annual Conferences.

(7) The task of the Bishop's Committee on Parish Development is to plan and recommend to the Conference Council on Ministries objectives related to (1), (2), (3), (4). The Committee shall be closely related to the Town and Country Ministries of the General Board of Global Ministries for consultation, resourcing and leadership. The

Committee shall provide the opportunity for direct involvement with members of the two Cabinets and related District Council on Ministries in Parish Development.

(8) The Committee shall be cognizant of the variety forms the relationship between churches may take as described in the Discipline in Paragraph 206, and, the awareness of a two-way sense of mission that can exist among large and small churches so that through a working relationship there may emerge some things that each have to offer the other.

The sole intent of parish development is to assist each congregation to attain its full potential of ministry through voluntary involvement and cooperation of the members of the congregation always being sensitive to the preservation of the identity of the local church. We hasten to further affirm that the small church often has such to offer to the whole church; thus, to strengthen the linkage is to mutually strengthen the entire Body of Christ.

Board of Pensions

1. We recommend that the Annuity rate be set at \$81.00 per service year beginning January 1, 1980 for both retired members of the Conference and Special Conference Claimants.

2. We recommend that the apportionments to the charges of the Annual Conference for Conference Claimants Fund be an amount of no less than 25% of the base Pastor's Salary for the conference, and that after the cost of current distribution is paid, the remainder be paid into the minister's Reserve Pension Fund.

3. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1706 Section 12e of 1976 Discipline that the Sunday following Easter, April 13, 1980, be observed as Retired Minister's Day. Each pastor is urged to acquaint his or her congregation with the pension program of the Conference as part of the observance, and, if possible, to use a retired minister in the Worship Service.

4. We recommend that the pastor of each Local Church present the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas, "Memorial Program for Retired Ministers Pension Fund," to the members of his or her congregation and urge their participation in the program. We further request that the Conference Statistician provide a column in the Conference Journal listing the number of Memorials made through the Local Church to the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas.

5. We recommend, in keeping with Par. 1706 Section 5 of the 1976 Discipline, the approval of the Annual Conference that Special Appointments shall be listed in the Conference Journal as follows: (1) With Annuity Claim (a) upon the Annual Conference, or (b) upon a General Board, an Institution, or an Agency of the United Methodist Church; (2) Without Annuity claim upon this Annual Conference.

6. We recommend that the Board continue to apportion to each Agency and Institution served by a ministerial member under special appointment with annuity claims on the Conference, the sum of \$960.00 ($12 \times$ Annuity rate) per year in accord with the 1976 Discipline Par. 1706 Section 3.a (3); and that said apportionments be paid to the Little Rock Conference Treasurer for the Board of Pensions not later than 15 days prior to the end of the fiscal year. These shall include: the office of the District Superintendent; the Executive Director and the Associate Directors of the Conference Council on Ministries; the Directors of the Methodist Children's Home, Western Methodist Assembly, and Christian Civic Foundation. The District Superintendents' amount to be paid from the District Superintendent.

dent's Fund. When a minister is appointed to a Wesley Foundation, and also is appointed to a church or churches, the Foundation will be required to pay \$360 annuity.

7. We recommend that the Board of Pensions pay the entire insurance premium for our retirees both for the Death Benefit Program and the Hospital and Medical Expense Program. Also, we recommend continuance of Insurance Plan "B" which would include a death benefit for Widows of ministers in an amount equal to 10% of the Average Conference salary. In addition, we recommend that the eligible Conference Claimants and Special Conference Claimants have the voluntary portion of Medicare paid by the Conference Board of Pensions.

8. We recommend that an annual amount of \$2,400 from the pensions of each retired minister of the Little Rock Conference be designated as housing allowance.

9. We request of the Council on Finance and Administration an amount of \$285,000 to be apportioned to the Local Churches for 1980, the Seventh year of the Eight year MRPF campaign.

10. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 734 Section 4 of the 1976 Discipline that there shall be organized from the membership of the Board of Pensions of the Little Rock Conference a committee to compare the records of the amount paid by each pastoral charge for support of pastors and for pension benefit purposes, computing the proportional distribution thereof and keeping a permanent record of defaults of the ministers in the Conference who have failed to observe the provision in Par. 1260 Section 6 pertaining to proportional payment; and shall render annually to each minister and Charge in default a statement of the amounts in default for that and preceding years.

In event of default by any Pastoral Charge after the notification by the Committee, liens shall be filed against future pensions and the names of the churches and ministers along with the amount in default shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

11. We request the Secretary of the Annual Conference to print in the Ministers' Service Record in the Journal, one column stating "Years of Pension Claim on the Little Rock Annual Conference," and another stating "Total Service Years in the Ministry."

12. We recommend that in accordance with Par. 1706.14a of the 1976 Discipline, Robert M. Van Hook II be granted 80% vested pension rights for 16 full years of service at the 1979 per service year rate (\$75.00) upon reaching the age of 65 years.

13. Since the Little Rock Conference has established a Minimum Salary considered to meet the needs of a full-time pastor, we recommend that (1) A minister who received the minimum salary or more must derive his or her sole compensation from the Charge and/or Conference sources in order to be eligible for pension benefits as a full-time minister. (2) If a minister receives less than the Conference minimum salary from church sources, but earns more than 40% of his or her total compensation from outside employment, he or she is not eligible for pension credit. (3) Student Supply time is to be considered as employment aiding the student preparing for full-time service as is required to meet minimal standards as a Conference Member or certified Associate Member, for actually serving full-time pastorates. The student is not eligible for pension benefits.

14. By vote of the Annual Conference we entered into the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund program as of January 1, 1974. We are now a full partner in this program. We want to again express our appreciation to all local Churches of the Little Rock Conference for participation in the additional budget askings for an eight-year period.

We want to emphasize the importance of our Special Gifts Campaign until we reach our Million Dollar Goal to supplement the funds mentioned above. As of March 1, 1979, our

pledges and cash contributions have reached the \$843,433 figure. Inflation has steadily eaten away at the buying power of pension benefits for our retirees. This makes it even more urgent that we continue to raise their benefits through raising the annuity rate. A continued emphasis on Special Gifts is very important to our program in order that we might better meet the needs of our retirees.

We are grateful for the generosity of our people in making it possible for us to meet our obligation to the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund in full for 1974-75-76-77-78. We must continue this good work for the eight-year period.

Committee On Review And Evaluation Preface

The 1979 Annual Conference asked the Committee on Review and Evaluation to update the Conference structure and print it in booklet form for use by the lay persons and ministers of our Conference. In accordance with this request, the **Discipline** and minutes of the Annual Conferences since 1974, have been researched, and all approved changes incorporated into our structure. Copies of this document are available in the Conference Council on Ministries office.

While undergoing this research, it became obvious to the Committee that numerous other changes in the structure were yet called for. Below you find a list of the recommended changes we present for your consideration.

It is the intent of the Committee to print adequate copies of the Little Rock Conference Structure immediately following the 1980 session, incorporating whatever changes enacted this year. This procedure seems to be in the best interest of stewardship of our financial resources and would provide an accurate structural statement for your use.

Recommended Changes to the Little Rock Annual Conference Structure

1. Amend District Work Area on Church and Society Provisions and membership 1):

Current standing: '1) The District Superintendent, in consultation with the Conference Board of Church and Society and the District Nominating Committee, shall appoint the chairperson of this work area.''

Recommended change: '1) The District Nominating Committee shall nominate the chairperson of the District Work Area on Church and Society. The chairperson shall be elected by the Annual Conference.''

Rationale: The standing procedure was prescribed in the 1972 **Discipline**, but was dropped in the 1976 **Discipline**. The recommended change would bring this procedure in line with the nominating procedures of our Conference.

2.a. Amend District Work Area on Education Provisions and Membership 1).

Current standing: "1) The District Superintendent, in consultation with the Chairperson of the Conference Board of Education and the District Nominating Committee, shall appoint the chairperson of this work area. District chairpersons will be confirmed by the Conference Council Board of Education."

Recommended change: "1) The District Nominating Committee shall nominate the chairperson of the District Work Area on Education. The Chairperson shall be elected by the Annual Conference."

b. Annual Conference Council Board of Education Functions 4): "Confirm the District Chairpersons of Education."

Rationale: The standing procedure was prescribed in the 1972 **Discipline**, but was dropped in the 1976 **Discipline**. The recommended change would bring this procedure in line with the nominating procedures of our Conference.

3. Delete District Work Area of Missions Provisions and Membership 1).

1) There shall be a District Missionary Secretary in each District, appointed by the District Superintendent after consultation with the Conference Missionary Secretary and publicly assigned by the Bishop. A vacancy in this office during the conference year may be filled by appointment by the District Superintendent. This Secretary shall work in cooperation with the District Superintendent and Conference Missionary Secretary.

Rationale: The 1972 **Discipline** required this procedure, but the 1976 **Discipline** contains no such requirement. In our Conference structure these activities and responsibilities are handled by the District Chairperson of Missions, thus a District Missionary Secretary is no longer needed.

4. Delete Conference Council Board of Education Functions 4).

Current standing: "4) Confirm the District Chairpersons of Education (par. 104.1)."

Rationale: This was required in the 1972 **Discipline**, but was dropped in the 1976 **Discipline**. Our structure provides other ways for this person to be elected.

5. Amend District Work Area on Church and Society Provisions and Membership 1).

Current standing: "1) The District Superintendent, in consultation with the Conference Board of Church and Society and the District Nominating Committee, shall appoint the chairperson of this work area."

Recommended change: The District Nominating Committee shall nominate a chairperson on Church and Society. The Annual Conference will elect.

Rationale: The standing procedure was required by the 1972 **Discipline**, but the 1976 **Discipline** deleted this restriction. Changing this procedure will align this area with the nominating procedure of our Annual Conference.

6. Amend Conference Council Board of Church and Society Functions by adding the following:

"3) Administer the functions as prescribed in the Discipline."

Rationale: The Discipline now goes into more detail as to the work of this group.

Amend Conference Council Board of Education Functions by adding the following:
"6) Administer the functions as prescribed in the Discipline."

Rationale: Functions of this group have changed often by action of the General Conference. By referring to the **Discipline**, rather than delineating functions in more detail here, we do not have to change our structure as often.

8. Amend Conference Council Board of Stewardship Functions by adding the following:

"6) Administer the functions as prescribed in the Discipline."

Rationale: To cover new functions required by the Discipline.

9.a. Effective at the beginning of the new Quadrennium, delete the Conference Council Board of Evangelism Functions 3).

Current standing: ''3) The Conference Board of Evangelism may elect a Conference Secretary of Evangelism.''

b. Effective at the beginning of the new Quadrennium, delete from Conference Council on Ministries Membership 2) the following: "Conference Secretary of Evangelism."

Rationale: This person is no longer required by the **Discipline**, and these functions are handled in other ways by our Conference structure.

10.a. Effective at the beginning of the new Quadrennium, delete from Conference Council Board of Global Ministries Membership 1) the following: "Conference Missionary Secretary."

b. Effective at the beginning of the new Quadrennium, delete from Conference Council on Ministries Membership 2) the following: "Conference Missionary Secretary."

Rationale: This person is no longer required by the **Discipline**, and these functions are handled in other ways by our Conference structure.

11. Amend Conference Council Board of Global Ministries Functions 3) to read as follows:

"3) Committees on Health and Welfare, Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Concerns, Parish and Community Development, Church Extension, Education and Cultivation, and Special Ministries shall be constituted."

Rationale: This change comes as a request from this Council Board in order to facilitate better their work through the addition of standing Committee on Education and Cultivation, Church Extension, and Special Ministries.

12. Amend Conference Council Board of Global Ministries Membership 1) to read as follows:

"1) Each District Chairperson of Missions and one other person from each District (one representative shall be lay and the other clerical); each District Chairperson of Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Concerns and one other person from each District (one representative shall be lay and the other clerical), the second person so named shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference; Chairperson on Conference Commission on Religion and Race; one representative each from UMW, UMY, and UMM (these representatives shall be elected by their respective groups); two trustees from the Methodist Children's Home (elected by their trustees); one representative from the Cabinet; and up to three members at-large."

Rationale: Due to a recent structure change in our Annual Conference, the Conference Council Work Area on Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Concerns has become a part of this Council Board. In order for the Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Concerns area to have representation in this new arrangement, twelve of the fifteen at-large members of this Council Board are now assigned to the Ecumenical Concerns and Inter-Religious area under this recommended change.

13. Amend Conference Council Board of Education Functions 2) to read as follows: (portion included in parentheses is addition)

^(*2) Oversee the Conference camping ministry. A Coordinating Committee on Camping shall be established and shall be responsible to plan the camping program of the Conference, in conjunction with the appropriate Conference and District Coordinators. The Committee shall be composed of chairperson and Vice-Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of Camp Tanako, the Director and Associate Director of the Council on Ministries, the Resident Agent of Camp Tanako, and the Chairperson and Secretary of the Conference Council Board of Education (the Conference Children's Coordinator, Conference Youth Coordinator, Conference Young Adult Coordinator, Conference Adult Coordinator, and the Conference Family Coordinator). The chairmanship of the Committee shall alternate yearly between the Chairperson of the Conference Council Board of Education and the Chairperson of the Board of Trustees of Camp Tanako. The Board of Trustees of Camp Tanako shall have charge of all property matters, physical care, and paid personnel relating to Camp Tanako."

Rationale: The addition of these persons allows for more coordination and intentional planning for our camping ministry.

14. Delete District Work Area of Missions Provisions and Membership 1).

Current standing: "1) There shall be District Missionary Secretary in each District, appointed by the District Superintendent after consultation with the Conference Missionary Secretary and publicly assigned by the Bishop. A vacancy in this office during the Conference year may be filled by appointment by the District Superintendent. This Secretary shall work in cooperation with the District Superintendent and the Conference Missionary Secretary."

Rationale: This person had been required in the 1972 **Discipline**, but is no longer required in the 1976 **Discipline**. In our structure, the District Chairperson of Missions carries the responsibilities assigned to the old District Missionary Secretary. By deleting this person we are eliminating the duplication of effort and responsibility.

15. Delete District Age-Level and Family Coordinators Functions 2).

Current standing: "2) The District Chairperson of Education and the Age-Level Coordinators shall serve as an education committee to assist local churches (or make recommendations to the District Council on Ministries) in designing a program of Christian education, developing leadership, interpreting resources, evaluating present programs, and assessing needs."

Rationale: The 1972 **Discipline** prescribed this procedure, but the 1976 **Discipline** dropped this prescription. Districts in our Conference go about this in various ways; many use task forces or even fill out their District Work Area on Education to do this work. This change would free up many ways to do the same job.

16. Amend Conference Council on Ministries Provisions 4) to include the following: "4) The Personnel Committee shall consult with the Bishop and Cabinet concerning the appointment of ordained ministers to the staff of the Council. The Personnel Committee shall recommend policies concerning personnel matters to the Council, They may recommend salary, expenses, and housing allowance to the Council for their action. The Director may consult with the Personnel Committee in matters relating to lay employees."

Rationale: This addition further clarifies the work of the Personnel Committee.

17. Amend the Conference Council on Ministries Membership 1) to include the following: "the Chairperson of the Conference Council on Ministries Personnel Committee."

Rationale: This person needs to be a member of the Conference Council on Ministries in order to function in his/her capacity as Chairperson of the Personnel Committee.

18. To add the following to become 5) under Conference Council on Ministries Provisions and re-number all items that follow appropriately:

"5) There shall be a Conference Council on Ministries Budget Committee nominated by the Conference Council on Ministries Nominating Committee and elected by the Council at the first meeting of the new quadrennium. The Committee shall be composed of the chairperson and six elected members representative of the Districts of the Conference, and clergy/laity balance. The Conference Council staff, the Chairperson of the Council on Finance and Administration and the Area Treasurer are to be non-voting members of the Committee. The term of office for elected members shall be the quadrennium. No elected person may serve for more than eight (8) consecutive years. The chairperson shall be nominated by the Conference Council on Ministries Nominating Committee and elected by the Council at the first meeting

of the new quadrennium. The Budget Committee shall work with the Conference Council on Ministries staff in 1) the preparation of the proposed Conference Council on Ministries budget, and 2) the presentation of the proposed budget to the Conference Council on Ministries, to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, and to the Annual Conference."

Rationale: This addition provides the structure for budgetary procedures within the Conference Council on Ministries.

19. Amend Conference Council Board of Worship Membership to read as follows:

"1) Each District Chairperson of Worship and one other person from each district (one representative shall be lay and the other clerical. The second person shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference); one District Superintendent; one representative each from the UMW, UMY, and UMM; Conference Lay Leader; up to seven (7) at-large members (one of whom shall be a youth)."

Rationale: This change brings the membership of this Council Board in line with other Conference Council Boards by including membership from the UMM, UMW, and UMY groups. In order to accomplish this, the number of at-large members is being reduced from the present ten (10) to seven (7).

20. Amend Conference Council Committee on Communications Membership to read as follows:

"1) Each District Chairperson of Communications and one other person from each District (one representative shall be lay and the other clerical. The second person shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference); one District Superintendent; Conference Lay Leader; two directors of the Arkansas Methodist (elected by directors); one representative each from the UMW, UMY, and UMM, and up to ten (10) at-large members."

Rationale: This change brings membership of this Council Board in line with other Conference Council Boards by including membership from UMM, UMY, and UMW groups and enlarges the committee from five to ten at-large members in order to include persons of special expertise in media.

- 21. To change the structure, effective at the beginning of the 1981 quadrennium, to create a Conference Council Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry by amending the following:
 - A. Conference Committee on Campus Ministry:
 - 1) Change name to "Conference Council Committee on Higher Education and Campus Ministry."
 - 2) Add Disciplinary reference: "Par. 730."
 - 3) Functions: Add a new "1) To administer the functions as prescribed in the **Discipline**." and re-number subsequent functions.
 - 4) Amend membership to read:
 - "a) Campus Ministers, Board Chairpersons, and one student from each Wesley Foundation campus ministry.
 - b) President and two trustees from Hendrix College and President and two trustees from Philander Smith College (to be elected by their boards).
 - c) One District Superintendent appointed by the Cabinet.

- d) Each District Young Adult Coordinator.
- e) Associate Director of Conference Council on Ministries.
- f) May have up to six (6) at-large members."
- B. Conference Council Board of Education:
 - 1) Functions 1) delete "Hendrix College, and Philander Smith College."
 - Membership 1) delete "two trustees from Hendrix" and Philander Smith..."
 - 3) Membership 1) change name reference to "Conference Council on Higher Education and Campus Ministry."

Rationale: This change is recommended in order to enhance the work of the Committee on Campus Ministry along guidelines provided in the 1976 **Discipline**, and provide an avenue for better developing our ministry of Higher Education and Campus Ministry. In our current structure, representatives from our institutions of higher learning are related to our Conference Council Board of Higher Education. This change relates these persons now to the newly constituted Conference Council Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry.

22. Delete Basic Understandings 6).

Current Standing: "6) The term of elected membership for Conference Council on Ministries and the Annual Conference's Boards, Commissions, Committees, Councils, etc., shall be the quadrennium. No person, excluding the Conference Treasurer, Conference Secretary, and ex-officio members of the Conference Council on Ministries, shall serve on any one Board, Commission, Committee or Council for more than eight consecutive years."

Rationale: Since the adoption of this structure this same issue has been reconsidered and expanded through our Standing Rules. Since the Standing Rules represent more recent and thorough thought, the recommendation is to delete this section in our structure and refer to the Standing Rules for more explicit delineation. Enclosed below is the current Standing Rule number 6 that speaks to this issue.

Current Standing: Standing Rule Number 6: "Board Service."

a) A membership on the same board, council, committee, or commission shall be limited to two consecutive quadrennia excepting ex-officio membership on the Conference Council on Ministries. Membership begins upon election.

b) There are two types of membership on Annual Conference boards, committees, commissions, and councils: at-large and ex-officio. A person may serve in only one atlarge and/or one ex-officio capacity.

c) The membership of the Committee on Review and Evaluation and the Committee on Planning and Research shall be exempt from the provision of a) and b) above.

d) No person from the Little Rock Conference, clerical or lay, shall serve as an elected trustee of more than one United Methodist related institution within the bounds of the Arkansas Area at one time. "Within bounds of" these United Methodist related institutions are understood to be the following: Hendrix College, Philander Smith College, Aldersgate, Methodist Children's Home, the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas, the Wesley Foundations, Little Rock Conference Camp Tanako, and Mt. Sequoyah Assembly. This is to take effect during the year 1979, as each institution could possibly have its timetable of elections on a different schedule. Trustees presently serving are allowed to complete their present terms.

e) All Councils, Boards, Committees and Commissions of the Conference shall be made representative. Special consideration shall be given to placing women, youth, and minority persons on the membership of these conference agencies.

A. Amend District Board of Stewards Membership 2) to read as follows:
"2) District Treasurer, who is elected by the District Board of Stewards upon the recommendation of the District Superintendent."

B. Amend District Council on Ministries Provisions and Membership 2) by deleting the words and treasurer."

Rationale: This change would move the election of the District Treasurer from the responsibility of the District Council on Ministries to that of the District Stewards.

- 24. Amend the structure at the following places to read "Annual Conference shall elect" instead of "Annual Conference will elect."
 - a) District Work Area on Stewardship Provisions and Membership 1).
 - b) District Work Area on Ecumenical and Inter-Religious Concerns and Membership 1).
 - c) District Work Area on Evangelism Provisions and Membership 1).
 - d) District Work Area on Worship Provisions and Membership 1).
 - e) District Committee on Communications Provisions and Membership 1).
 - f) District Age-Level and Family Coordinators Provisions and Membership 1).

Rationale: To be more specific about the election of these persons.

25. Change the name of the Conference Council Board of Laity to "Conference Council Board of Lay Life and Work."

Rationale: This change brings our wording in line with that of the General Church and emphasizes that the work of this Council Board includes all laypersons no matter their age or sex.

- 26. The Conference Nominating Committee shall be authorized by the Annual Conference to nominate the chairperson of Annual Conference and Conference Council Board, Commissions and Committees and the Annual Conference shall elect the chairperson. The right to nominate from the floor shall not be abridged.
- 27. We recommend that a procedure be established by the Conference Nominating Committee to make provisions for recommendations from Local Church Charge Conferences to the District and Conference nominating committees of qualified and available persons for membership on District and Conference Boards, Commissions, Committees and Councils. This procedure is to be effective by September 1, 1979.

We further recommend that forms for use in implementing the above procedure, previously accumulated by the Review & Evaluation Committee, be furnished the Committee on Nominations for their consideration.

28. We recommend that the Conference assign to the Review and Evaluation Committee the task of defining the relationship of the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas to the Conference Council Committee on Stewardship and report back to the 1980 Conference.

Commission On Status And Role Of Women

The Little Rock Conference Commission on the Status and Role of Women was established by the 1977 Annual Conference under the mandate of the 1976 General Conference. The organizational meeting of the Commission was not held until October 1977, so we were not functional until 1978. The stated role of the Commission is to be: an Advocate on behalf of all women, special groups of women, and individual women; a Catalyst to identify special concerns of women and to call these to the attention of the Annual Conference; and a Monitor of the utilization of women in leadership roles of the church.

The primary purpose of the Little Rock Conference Commission for this quadrennium is to challenge the Annual Conference, including its districts and local churches, to a continued commitment that will ensure full and equal participation by women in the total life and mission of the church, including policy-making and power positions as well as those traditionally assigned to women. This calls for establishment of guidelines for action by the Annual Conference and the development of leadership and communication skills of women.

In addition, the Commission will work to identify issues and concerns of interest to women and will bring these to the attention of the Annual Conference. It will provide a support group for all women who are engaged in church related work — both clergy and lay women. Finally, a major function will be to provide the Nominating Committee (Conference and District) with lists of qualified women to serve on commissions, committees, boards and agencies.

In preparing the Commission for its responsibilities, an Area Training Event was held in September 1978 in cooperation with the North Arkansas Conference, with Mrs. Nancy Grissom Self of the General Commission on Status and Role of Women as the leader. We had representation at two training events in January 1979: — Mrs. Jackson attended the Clergy Women Consultation in Dallas and along with Mrs. Peggy Mitchell participated in a Regional Training Event co-sponsored by General Commission on Status and Role of Women and United Methodist Women.

The Commission recommends the following:

1. That additional members be named to the Commission so that each District will have a minimum of two representatives, and so that balance is obtained in the various categories of membership.

2. That with reference to Standing Rule I 6 (e) the Committee on Personnel and Nominations be asked to give special consideration to the categories of women, youth and minority persons when filling vacancies on boards, commissions and agencies occurring during the remainder of this quadrennium.

3. That District Commissions on Status and Role of Women be established in the six districts to be functional by 1980, as provided for in the 1976 Discipline.

Camp Tanako

Camp Tanako is on the move. The year 1978 was a year of much progress. The Wilson Memorial Conference Center was completed giving our camping program another dimension. We now have the facilities for small groups to meet and prepare their own meals at a nominal cost. New roofs have been placed on seven cabins. New tables and chairs have been secured for the dining hall. Nine buildings have been painted and spruced up. A new grill, stove and vent hood have been installed in the kitchen. We are now in the process of working on receiving site accreditation from the American Camping Association. The Trustees are negotiating a timber management agreement of selective cutting on the property.

The number of campers increased significantly in 1978 over 1977. More local churches used the facilities for weekend sessions, retreats and seminars. The 1979 season is fast approaching with all camp directors and deans recruited. Mailings on the camping programs went to all local churches in early February. The weekend calendar is also filling at a rapid pace. The budget for the operation of the camp for 1979 is \$86,250.00.

Our thanks to the Committee on Finance and Administration, the laymen of the Conference, local churches, the Conference Council and interested laity for their financial support. This is your camp. We hope you support it financially and use it.

Board Of Trustees

The Little Rock Conference Board of Trustees in a meeting at the First United Methodist Church, Malvern, Arkansas, October 17, 1978 unanimously adopted the following resolution after a careful study and advice of several attorneys at law:

RESOLUTION

Be it Resolved that Article 12 of the Articles of Incorporation of The United Methodist Children's Home, Incorporated, be, and it is, hereby amended to read as follows:

"ARTICLE 12: The period of existence of this corporation shall be perpetual. Upon the dissolution of this corporation, by resolution of its Board of Trustees or otherwise, the Board of Trustees shall, upon the dissolution of the corporation, after paying or making provision for the payment of all of the liabilities of this corporation, dispose of all of the assets of this corporation exclusively for the purposes of this corporation in such manner, or to such charitable, educational, religious, literary or scientific purposes as shall at the time qualify as an exempt organization or organizations described in Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 (26 U.S.C. S501 (c):(3)), or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law, as the Board of Trustees shall determine. Any such assets not so disposed of by the Circuit Court of Pulaski County, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations, as said court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes. In making the disposition, the Pulaski Circuit Court shall give preference in the distribution of assets not otherwise

restricted to The United Methodist Church, its institutions and organizations, or institutions and organizations affiliated with The United Methodist Church."

This action was requested by the 1978 Annual Conference.

Board Of Trustees

The Little Rock Conference Board of Trustees met in a special session May 29, 1979.

Rev. Harold Davis, District Superintendent of the Hope District, presented a proposal from the Dallas Community Center Association requesting that the United Methodist Church transfer the property of the Methodist Church, located near Mena, to the Association upon the following conditions:

- (1) The Association will maintain the building and preserve it as a community center and historical site, and cannot be sold.
- (2) The transfer deal would provide that in the event that the Association became defunct or was unable to preserve the site, the land and building would revert to the First Methodist Church in Mena, Arkansas, or to the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church, whichever is designated.

The members of the Board of Trustees recommended that the property be deeded to the Dallas Community Center Association, with the stipulation that in the event that it became necessary to return the property that it be returned to the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church. The motion passed.

Rev. Charles Richards, District Superintendent of the Camden District, presented the Board of Trustees a resolution adopted by the six remaining members of the Liberty United Methodist Church. The resolution requested the Board to deed the property of the Liberty United Methodist Church to the Liberty Cemetery Association. A motion was made by the Board of Trustees requesting the Liberty United Methodist Church to give a quit claim deed to the Liberty Cemetery Association, provided the congregation of the Liberty United Methodist Church have full privilege for divine worship as long as that need exists. Motion passed.

United Methodist Women

Mrs. Roberts Newman, Vice President of the Women's Division, closed her address at the annual meeting of the Little Rock Conference, United Methodist Women with these words. "The living water of Jesus Christ is what we must have to fill our wells. We must constantly go to him to be nurtured, to become whole persons through Jesus Christ. A United Methodist Woman has a vibrant faith that cannot be put down, a whole person through Jesus Christ, a woman organized for mission who seeks to know God daily, and a volunteer committed to service. We are challenged to be women in Mission and Ministry. So long as there are women and children in the world who suffer, so long as there is racial injustice anywhere, the hungry, sick, impoverished, there will be women who are dedicated to the will of God in service. We are challenged to be Christ's hands while we as United Methodist Women seek to reach out to heal a bruised and broken world through the love of Jesus Christ. Let us continue to work that we are not only a new people but a new age in God's world."

Soon after Annual Conference last year all conference officers attended the West Gulf Regional School of Christian Mission at Mt. Sequoyah. Mrs. R. V. Welch represents our conference on the planning committee for this school and was elected treasurer and business manager for 1979. The school will be held on the campus of SMU in June, 1979.

Arkansas School of Christian Mission had its weekend and week day schools on the campus of Hendrix College in July. Our executive board held a meeting during this time. The New Charter For Racial Justice Policy was studied and discussed by board members. After prayerful consideration each member signed a Pledge to Action which was mailed to Mrs. Mai Gray, Women's Division president. Implementation of this action will take place through the District Executive Committees and the local units.

Our Annual Meeting at First Church, Texarkana was an enriching experience. A New **People for a New Age** was the theme. Special emphasis was given to human rights issues. Mrs. Newman and Mrs. Rubye Lee Jackson, a member of the Women's Division and the Board of Global Ministries, discussed at length the New Charter for Racial Justice. Mrs. Joe Magee, president of the local unit, and her committee contributed much in making this an outstanding meeting.

For several years plans have been discussed for a two day District Officer Training. Such an event was held at Camp Tanako in November, 1978. All six districts were well represented. Along with the training sessions, issues and policies of United Methodist Women were discussed. Mrs. Marilyn Winters from the Women's Division deserves much of the credit for the inspiration, learning and sharing that went into this training program.

In January, 1979, the Little Rock Conference and North Arkansas Conference of United Methodist Women held a joint Legislative Training Event at St. John's Catholic Center in Little Rock.

Mission Coordinators of Christian Social Involvement, Mrs. Othella Peters from the North Arkansas Conference and Mrs. Kaye Evans from the Little Rock Conference were cochairpersons for this workshop which dealt with human rights issues. The purpose of the workshop was to educate women in ways that they as Christians can bring about political, social, and economic changes through the legislative process.

In February, Mrs. Louis Fish who just ended a 4 year term as Treasurer of the Conference, along with Mrs. James Guthrie, Associate Treasurer, and Mrs. J. H. McLarty, Conference Treasurer were in charge of a Financial Workshop at St. John's Catholic Center. Ms. Barbara Campbell, a staff member from the Women's Division, Mrs. George W. Gordon and Mrs. Rubye Lee Jackson, Women's Division Members led the sessions. The Women's Division provided the funds for this event.

Two program emphases in which United Methodist Women are currently engaged are The New Charter for Racial Justice Policies and the International Year of the Child. The former is a Women's Division originated program, the latter that of the United Nations. Mrs. Terry Rasco a member of First Church, Little Rock, is the conference coordinator for Child Advocacy. She has recently attended a seminar on Human Rights at the United Nations Building in New York. She will be working in our conference to promote Child Advocacy.

One of the most exciting things to happen to United Methodist Women in our conference is the publishing of a quarterly newsletter with the title of **The Rocket**. This publication makes one of our long range goals a reality. Mrs. Louise Pate is the editor and Mrs. Louis Fish the associate editor. Both are from Little Rock. Appreciation goes to the Program Council Office for the printing with special thanks to Rev. J. W. Lofton.

Through the efforts of Mrs. Nick Evans, The Women's Center for Battered Women at Pine Bluff has been given a grant of \$7,500.00 by the Women's Division. Funds were made possible by the love offering taken at the National Assembly in Louisville in 1978.

Little Rock Conference, United Methodist Women paid its 1978 pledge of \$105,000.00 to the Women's Division. An additional \$13,894.23 was sent in supplementary gifts. The annual gift of \$1,500 was paid to Aldersgate, Inc. \$1,950 went to the Arkansas School of Christian Mission and \$1,200 to the Elizabeth Thornberg Workman Fund for Youth in the Little Rock Conference.

Several Conference officers have attended all meetings in the 6 districts and have been impressed with the fine programs and workshops that have taken place. All districts have fine leadership. The enthusiasm and interest displayed at all levels, local, district and conference makes us aware of the fact that our organization is one that is vibrant and alive and fulfilling the mission for which it was intended. The basic challenges to us as Christian Women is always the same:

To witness to God's love and grace in us and through us.

Committee On Church And Community Ministry

From the minutes of the Executive Committee Meeting Oct. 6, 1978:

Mrs. James Nix submitted the following report from the Committee on Church and Community Ministry:

At the last meeting of the Little Rock Conference Advisory Committee on Church and Community Ministry (September 25, 1973), it was voted to give the Executive Committee of United Methodist Women the authority to dispose of funds and equipment at the end of a five year period.

A committee was appointed in 1977 for this task, composed of Mrs. James Nix, chairman, Mrs. Louis Fish, and Mrs. Hubert Blakley.

On November 30, 1977 the committee visited Gardner Memorial United Methodist Church, Hot Springs, where the equipment has been stored during this period and discovered that the church had had a fire which destroyed many of the pieces of equipment.

After being in contact with Ralph Nicols, Executive Secretary of Church and Community Ministry (his statement is attached to this report) the committee decided to give some of the equipment to the local church (Gardner Memorial) as it had a great need for it and the remainder was taken to the Little Rock Program Council Office, 715 Center Street to be used as they see fit. The funds in the amount of \$720.84 have been sent through the Conference United Methodist Women's Division on undirected pledge.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN: This is to certify that the items of equipment belonging to the Church and Community Ministry program and located in the Little Rock Conference, may be disposed of at the discretion of Mrs. Lucille Nix and her committee. Mrs. Nix and her Committee are representing the National Division in this matter and have our full authorization to dispose of these items as they see fit. Harold Scott Botteron


Archie Clarke Carraway

The Reverend Archie Clarke Carraway, son of The Reverend Archie Evans and Agnes Clarke Carraway was born October 6, 1895 at Comanche, Texas, He graduated from Taylor, Texas High School and received the A.B. and B.D. degrees from Southern Methodist University in 1918 and 1923, respectively,

On May 24, 1922 he was united in Holy Matrimony to Martha Butler at Corsicana, Texas. Mrs. Carraway preceded him in death on May 2, 1977. A memorial service was held for her at First United Methodist Church in Garland, Texas where they were living at the time and interment was in Corsicana, Texas. Two children blessed this union. Anita Dorcas (Mrs. Harris Hill) currently a Texas State Representative from Garland and Paul Milton a petroleum engineer in Bakersfield, California, Both are active in the program of their local churches.

Brother Carraway was admitted on trial in the East Oklahoma Conference in 1919 and ordained Deacon in 1921 and Elder in 1923. Before transferring to the Little Rock Conference in 1933 he served at Chatfield and Corsicana in the Central Texas Conference and at Walsenburg in the Rocky Mountain Conference. His appointments in the Little Rock Conference were as follows: Benton 1933-35; DeWitt 1935-38; Gurdon 1938-40; Dumas 1940-42; Chaplain (Major) U.S. Army in South Africa and Italy 1942-45; Capitol View, Little Rock 1945-49; Smackover 1949-52; First, Stuttgart 1952-54; Dermott 1954-58; Ashdown 1958-61. In 1961 he was granted the retired relationship and for a time served as minister of visitation at First Church Magnolia and for twelve years thereafter was Chief Probation Officer for a five county Judicial Circuit in South Arkansas.

In 1976 Brother and Mrs. Carraway moved to Garland, Texas to be near their daughter,



Anita Dorcas. He departed this life February 13, 1979 at Goldthwaite, Texas. Memorial services were held in First United Methodist Church, Corsicana and interment was in that city.

Brother Carraway was a diligent and energetic pastor and preacher. He loved people and sought every honorable means to relate to them and serve them. He was active in civic clubs, such as Rotary and Lions and in the Veterans of Foreign Wars, serving for a time as State Chaplain in the latter organization. The Rev. Alfred I. Doss was born July 23, 1908 at Hot Springs, Arkansas. He was married to Cecil Fritts in 1932, at Hot Springs. They have three children, a little son who preceded his father in death, and two lovely daughters.

At the time of his retirement in 1974, Brother Doss had served as a conference member for 42 years. He served appointments in the Little Rock Conference from 1930 to 1961, at which time he transferred to the Texas Conference. He returned to Arkansas in 1974 and was active as minister of visitation at Grand Avenue in Hot Springs until last September when illness necessitated his discontinuing those duties.

Pastoral appointments served by Brother Doss in Arkansas were: Tigert Memorial in Hot Springs, the Magnolia, Buckner, Hampton and Strong Circuits, Altheimer-Wabbaseka, Henderson in Little Rock,

Stephens, De Queen, Grand Avenue in Hot Springs, and First Church in Arkadelphia. He served many years on the Conference Board of Evangelism, which took him into most of the churches in the conference and throughout the nation.

Brother Doss loved the Methodist Church and gave his utmost to every part of the ministry. He did not just pick the programs he liked but considered every phase important. He was particularly sensitive to the youth and music programs of the church and each charge he served he left it much stronger in those two fields. The young people loved and appreciated him where ever he went.

For several years Brother Doss was a member of the Little Rock Conference Quartet. This group sang all over the state and was something at the Annual Conference Sessions.

It was this writer's joy and pleasure to know Alfred Doss for over forty years. I found him to be not only a great pastor and minister but one of the greatest Christians I have ever known. In all my relationship with him he was one who loved his church members, his brothers in the ministry, his family, but most of all his Master.

Brother Doss died March 26, 1979 in Hot Springs. He is survived by his wife, Cecil; his two daughters, Mrs. Charles Woodruff of Jonesboro, and Mrs. David Keyper of Hot Springs; a brother, Otis Doss of Lawton, Oklahoma; two sisters, Mrs. Jim Brooks and Mrs. James McMillan, both of Hot Springs, and seven grandchildren.

The funeral was March 28 at Grand Avenue United Methodist Church with the Rev. Palmer Garner and the writer officiating. Burial was at Morning Star Cemetery.

Brother Rushing was Licensed to Preach in 1931. He was Admitted On Trial into the Little Rock Annual Conference in 1932; Admitted into Full Connection and Ordained Deacon in 1936 and Ordained Elder in 1939. His Pastoral Appointments are as follows: De Queen Circuit 1932; Roland 1933; Doddridge 1935; Hatfield 1936; Little Prairie (Arkansas County) 1938; Roe 1940; St. Charles 1943; Dierks 1946; Emmet 1951; Watson 1954; Glenwood 1957; Shorewood Hills (Hot Springs County) 1959; Junction City 1962; St. Luke in El Dorado 1964; Buckner 1967; Blevins 1969.

He retired in 1972, in poor health, but from his home in Emmet supplied historic Washington Circuit for seven years. On May 17 he entered the hospital in Prescott. X. Miscellaneous

The organization of the Little Rock Annual Conference is defined in the Statement of the Organizational Structure of the Little Rock Conference as printed in the 1974 Journal.

The Standing Rules are subject to the Discipline of the United Methodist Church and the Organizational Structure of the Little Rock Annual Conference.

THE STANDING RULES

- I. Conference Organization
 - 1. Number of Districts. There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Annual Conference.
 - 2. District Conference. There may be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline, and one additional member from each pastoral charge, provided however, in charges of more than five hundred members there shall be one additional member for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.
 - 3. Nominations.
 - (a) The Conference Nominating Committee shall be composed of the District Superintendent and one lay person from each district. The Bishop shall serve as chairman.
 - (b) The Conference Nominating Committee shall nominate six members (three lay and three clergy) at large to achieve an equal balance of lay and clergy members, alternating by districts as follows:

(c) The Conference Nominating Committee will nominate all members of the Annual Conference quadrennial and annual boards, commissions and committees and Conference Council on Ministry boards, committees and commissions except as otherwise provided. Each District Nominating Committee will complete its list of qualified nominations by December 31. All nominees shall be consulted regarding their nomination.

All boards and agencies of the Conference shall be inclusive of ethnic minority representation.

- (d) Terms of office of the Nominating Committee shall be for four years beginning on January 1 following the session of the Annual Conference in the middle of the quadrennium.
- 4. Lay Members. Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the Conference Secretary by the District Superintendent ninety days before the opening day of Annual Conference.
- 5. Youth Membership. Each District Council of the United Methodist Youth shall elect annually two youth members of the Annual Conference, and their names shall be sent to the Conference Secretary by the District Superintendent ninety days before the opening day of Annual Conference.
- 6. Board Service.
 - (a) A membership on the same board, council, committee, or commission shall be limited to two consecutive quadrennia excepting ex-officio membership on the Conference Council on Ministries. Membership begins upon election.
 - (b) There are two types of membership on Annual Conference boards, committees, commissions and councils: at large and ex-officio. A person may serve in only one at-large and/or one ex-officio capacity.
 - (c) The membership of the Committee on Evaluation and Review and the

Committee on Planning and Research shall be exempt from the provisions of (a) and (b) above.

- (d) No person from the Little Rock Conference, clerical or lay, shall serve as an elected trustee of more than one United Methodist related institution within the bounds of the Arkansas Area at a time. "Within the bounds of" these United Methodist related institutions are understood to be the following: Hendrix College, Philander Smith College, Aldersgate, Methodist Children's Home, the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas, the Wesley Foundations, Little Rock Conference Camp Tanako, and Mt. Sequoyah Assembly. This is to take effect during the year 1979, as each institution could possibly have its timetable of elections on a different schedule. Trustees presently serving are allowed to complete their present terms.
- (e) All Councils, Boards, Committees and Commissions of the Conference shall be made representative. Special consideration shall be given to placing women, youth, and minority persons on the membership of these conference agencies.
 II. Financial Administration
 - 1. Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall run from January 1 to December 31.
 - 2. Financial and Statistical.
 - (a) The District Superintendents shall furnish the treasurer with all apportionments to the churches on, or before January 15. These figures shall be official.
 - (b) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars; with no column for cents.
 - (c) Each pastor shall make a statistical report to the District Superintendent who shall submit the reports to the Conference Statistician. The Pastor's financial report will be audited and checked by the Final Data Processing Print-Out. Where there is discrepancy, the amount recorded on the Print-Out will prevail.
 - 3. Administrative Fund. The Council on Finance and Administration shall recommend an assessment for a Conference Administrative Fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the pre-conference report, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of preparing and printing the Worship Booklet for the Annual Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expenses of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this Fund. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of the Fund. Payments for unbudgeted claims on this fund shall be made on vouchers signed by the Chairman of the Council on Finance and Administration or the Conference Secretary.
 - 4. **Program Budgets.** Budgets for expenditures for program for the District and the Conference shall be co-ordinated by the Conference Council on Ministries. The Conference Council on Ministries shall make recommendations to the Council on Finance and Administration which shall make a final recommendation to the Annual Conference.
 - 5. Conference Treasurer. The Council on Finance and Administration shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the Conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer, on recommendation of the Council on Finance and Administration, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.
 - 6. District Fund. The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district

expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall report to the District Stewards annually, showing receipts and disbursements. Funds budgeted by the District Council on Ministries will be paid by the District Treasurer upon action of the District Council on Ministries and the approval of the District Superintendent.

- 7. Apportionments Based on Pastor's Salary. On all items apportioned to local churches by means of a percentage of the minister's salary, such percentage shall be understood to apply to all ministerial members of the local church staff serving under the appointment of the Bishop and District Superintendent, including ministers in full connection, ministers on trial, and full-time Lay Pastors.
- III. Conference Procedure
 - 1. Rules of Order. The Rules of Order shall be Roberts Rules of Order revised.
 - 2. Reports and Resolutions. There shall be a pre-conference report which shall contain reports of all the boards and agencies of the Conference. This report shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the pre-conference reports shall be typewritten, in triplicate, on special forms furnished by the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary. In the event editing of a report is deemed necessary by the Conference Secretary and Chairman of the Board involved, permission is hereby granted.
 - 3. Conference Expense Fund.
 - (a) Registration fees and offerings taken at the Annual Conference shall be administered by the Conference Treasure and shall be used to defray the expenses of the session.
 - (b) The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the entertainment of the retired ministers shall be paid from the Conference Expense Fund. The Conference Treasurer shall pay a per diem for days actually in attendance directly to the retired ministers and be reimbursed from the Conference Expense Fund. Eligibility shall be determined by the Conference Board of Pensions.
 - (c) Any deficit in the Conference Expense Fund shall be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund.
 - (d) The Conference Expense Fund shall be administered by the Committee on the Annual Conference.
 - 4. Unsponsored Resolutions. Any resolution not sponsored by a regular board or standing committee of the Conference must lie over for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon, provided, however, immediate debate and action may be ordered by two-thirds vote of the Conference present and voting.
 - 5. Memoirs. There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased clerical member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, names of children, charges served, and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with the memoir. The same shall be done for probationary members, associate members and lay pastors. Likewise, a memoir of wives or widows of the above shall be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Sub-committee on Memoirs the death of any of the above mentioned and be responsible for the submission of Memoirs not later than thirty days after the death occurs. The names or memoirs of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions, or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. The District Superintendent shall be responsible for securing the memoirs for laymen whose memoirs shall be published. It shall be the duty of the District Superintendents to report to the Chairman of the

Conference Board of Pensions the death of any conference claimant that occurs in their respective districts.

- 6. Historical Material.
 - (a) The Library at Hendrix College shall be the depository for all historical documents and artifacts of the Little Rock Conference. The College Librarian shall be the custodian of these historical materials.
 - (b) The Commission on Archives and History shall be responsible for securing a group picture of each class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his retirement.
- 7. Unbudgeted Expenditures. When any proposal is submitted to the Annual Conference which involves the expenditure of funds not included in the established budget, such a proposal shall be referred for advice and recommendation to the Council on Finance and Administration and brought back to the same session of the Annual Conference for a vote to be taken by the Conference.
- 8. Campaigns. All Conference-wide campaigns to raise funds shall be voted on by secret ballot of the Conference.
- IV. Amendments

These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.

Resolution

Be it resolved that: The Board of Directors of the Wesley Foundation at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock be authorized by the Little Rock Annual Conference to change its name to The Wesley Foundation at Little Rock.

Adopted. May 30, 1979.
