The one hundred and twenty-eighth session of the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church was convened at First United Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas, with an Opening Celebration — Commemoration and Communion — prepared by the Conference Council Board of Worship, James Argue, Chairman. The opening hymn was Charles Wesley's "And Are We Yet Alive?" The liturgist was Rogert Regnier. The choir, composed of volunteer ministers from the Conference, directed by Lynn Bauman, offered the anthem "Were You There?" Dr. George W. Martin offered the sermon, "Going Back to Bethel."

Gerald Fincher, Conference Secretary, called the names of those who had died during the year, and the bell was tolled for each of them, after which the Conference thanked God for them.

The Conference sang "For All the Saints," and then Bishop Hicks served as the celebrant of the Sacrament of Holy Communion. He was assisted by Richard Lancaster, Paul Barrington, Varnell Norman and Tom Haley.

Gerald Fincher, Secretary of the Conference, made a motion that the bar of the Conference would be the main floor of the Sanctuary from the columns forward. The motion was seconded and passed. All motions shall be submitted in duplicate to the Conference Secretary's desk at the time of presentation.

When granted the privilege of the floor by presiding officer delegates shall identify themselves by name and the church or district which they represent. Persons who wish to be recognized should first proceed to one of the microphones. The Secretary moved that in light of the imbalance of lay (221) and clergy (265) members the following diaconal ministers be given a vote in the 1981 Little Rock Annual Conference Session on the laity side — Olive Smith, Meredith Cravens, Mike Parker, Marcia Dodd. A member of the Board of Diaconal Ministry spoke saying that the four diaconal ministers that were offered as members (lay members) were recommended by the Board of Diaconal Ministry because they were the ones who said they could be here and could serve in this capacity. After discussion the motion was approved.

The motion was made, seconded and passed that the lay chairpersons of conference boards, committees and commissions be afforded voice and vote in this session of the Annual Conference.

The Secretary moved that the Committee on Review and Evaluation study the problem and recommend a policy equalizing the lay and clergy membership and present it to the 1982 Annual Conference. The motion was seconded and approved after discussion. A suggestion was made that District Lay Leaders be voting members of this Conference. Dale Booth noted that only one district lay leader who was not already a member of the Conference was present. James Major moved that the one district lay leader (Camden District) be given the voice and vote in the Annual Conference in this session. The motion was seconded and passed. Tom Abney moved that the Secretary be empowered to create the balance necessary by whatever means he deems purposeful and proper. The motion was seconded and passed.

Don Riffin moved, and the motion was seconded, that the registrations of the reserve members be examined and those who have registered be given a voice and vote up to the

number 30 to establish a balance of clergy and laity on the floor of the Conference. The motion passed.

The Secretary nominated John O. Alston as Journal Clerk, O. D. Peters as Staff Assistant. The tellers: Robert W. Trieschmann, Herb Pekar, Harold Hansford and Dale Diffiee.

The motion was made for these to be elected, with second, the motion passed. The roll call of the Conference is taken at the time of registration in Fellowship Hall in the basement of the church. Every member of the Conference, both clerical and lay members, is expected to register attendance. All retired ministers, all local pastors, all reserve lay members and lay members are expected to register. Although it is not required, all visitors are welcome to register.

The Secretary moved the adoption of the agenda as presented in the Members Workbook with the understanding that it may be adjusted as need arises. The second was given and the agenda was adopted.

Dr. George W. Martin, host pastor, extended a word of welcome and, in a personal privilege, expressed his appreciation to the Conference for the many expressions of concern that were made to him at the time of Annual Conference last year. Recognition was given to those of First Church, Hot Springs, who had helped in the preparation for the Annual Conference Session. Carlos Martin, David Steele, a new member of the staff of First Church, Missy Black (Mrs. Michael Black), Annual Conference Committee chaired by Col. George and Ruby Lassiter. Gene Harwood was introduced by George W. Martin and he gave a welcome address. The lay members of the Annual Conference from First Church were presented to be available for any assistance they might render — Dr. John Trieschmann and Katherine Freeman.

Bob Trieschmann was recognized as chairperson of the Courtesy Committee. Following the announcements, the Conference divided into two sessions. The laity meeting in Harrison Hall and the clergy in the Sanctuary.

At this point, the Conference adjourned to assemble again in Executive Session for the Laity and Executive Session for the clergy.

Monday Evening, May 25, 1981 — 7:00 p.m.

A worship through music service was presented by "The Genesis Sound" from Trinity United Methodist Church in Little Rock.

Bishop Hicks called the business session to order at 7:45 p.m. Palmer Garner presented the report of the Board of Ordained Ministry. Charles Murry presented report number one which listed the names and progress of candidates for the ministry. Mike Campbell presented the report of the continuing education committee of the Board of Ordained Ministries. Fred Haustein presented an amendment to the Board of Ordained Ministries report as follows:

IX C. Retreat for probationary members of the Little Rock Annual Conference who are serving under a full-time appointment to be held June 30, July 1 and 2 at the Camp Mitchell Retreat Center on Mt. Petit Jean. Members of the Board of Ordained Ministry and other clerical members of our Annual Conference will help the probationers prepare for effective local church ministry in the Little Rock Annual Conference.

Bill Elliott, Chairman, Board of Education presented Dr. Ewart Watt to the Conference. Dr. Watt presented the new Methodist curriculum literature. He also gave the report for the Methodist Publishing House and presented the Board of Pensions a check in the amount of \$6,933.46 from the operation of the Publishing House.

Dr. Watt also presented a complimentary copy of the new Bible study "From Genesis to Revelation" to the Bishop. Bishop Hicks responded by giving a review of the background calling for use of the study.

Dale Booth presented the Conference Nominating Committee report. Corrections were made.

William Haake presented the Statistician's report. He also gave a ten-year study

beginning in 1970 of past trends in the Conference. John Miles moved acceptance of the report. Donald Wilson seconded and the motion passed.

Dr. John Trieschmann presented a resolution asking that area study committees be formed to study the feasibility of uniting the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences. Resolution must lay on the table for a minimum of twenty-four hours.

The Conference divided into multi-issue forum groups.

Ralph Hale dismissed the Conference with prayer.

Tuesday Morning, May 26, 1981 — 8:30 a.m.

Morning Worship Service was led by Melvin Bitter. The devotion leader was Jay Loftin. His message was entitled "Accept the Challenge or Cease to Grow." The business session was called to order. A motion was made, seconded and passed that at 11:00 an order of the day would be a recognition of retirees. John Walker was called upon to make a report from the District Superintendents. A motion was made to accept the report of the District Superintendents, seconded and passed.

A report of the Review and Evaluation Committee was made by Chairman, Bill Keltner. The report was moved and seconded. Rubye Lee Jackson, Chairman of the Commission of Status and Role of Women, made a motion to require that the membership of each District Council on Ministries include a person representing the Status and Role of Women. William Arnold, a layman from Crossett, spoke of a lack of understanding of the Review and Evaluation Committee, particularly in the area of associate director of Ethnic Minority-Local Church. Mr. Arnold moved that this report be tabled until the 1982 Conference. The motion was seconded. A count vote was taken and the motion was defeated.

Fred Haustein noted that Rubye Lee Jackson's motion was a change in structure and thus it would, according to the standing rules, need to lay on the table overnight.

Jay Lofton spoke concerning the Ethnic Minority-Local Church area Associate Director. The sharing of the office would be a 50/50 basis by the two Conferences.

Don Riggins moved that the last paragraph be deleted from the report of the Board of Review and Evaluation Committee as a moot question in light of yesterday's action of the Conference. The motion was seconded and passed.

The report of the Board of Pensions was given by Ernie Matkin and Gene Moore. Mr. Matkin noted that the Little Rock Conference is the only Conference in America to be totally funded at this date.

John Ross was introduced to give the report of the year for the Board of Pensions. He made a motion to change Item 1 i to read: "Every Conference member making less than the Equitable Salary can be included in CPP at the rate of 3.4% of Denominational Average Compensation," and to delete Item 3. Seconded. Spoken to by Gene Moore. The motion passed.

After lengthy discussion Bob Regnier moved that the total amount in the Conference Claimants Fund and Minister's Reserve Pension Fund for 1981 be apportioned for 1982. The motion was seconded. Since this is a matter of funds it would have to lay on the table 24 hours before it could be acted upon. A motion to refer the 1982 apportionment to the CFA for their advice and counsel was called for by the chair. The motion passed.

A call for the question for a vote on the report as a whole was made. The report was adopted which included the change of 1 i and deletion of Item 3 on page 33 of the members workbook.

Doris Fish presented a report of the Committee on Disability.

Kay Norwood was called upon to make a report on the Ethnic Minority-Local Church report. Motion made and seconded to adopt the priority Ethnic Minority-Local Church report. Motion passed.

Bob Trieschmann was called to introduce guests present. They were Dr. Jim Workman, The Rev. Walter Wilson of the AME Church of Arkansas and Oklahoma; Negail Riley, Board of Missions; Ralph Hillis, Russellville; Edgar Outlaw from Illinois; Dr. Fred Roebuck, Fort Smith; Clint Burleson, North Little Rock; and Wayne Jarvis, Ft. Smith. Dr.

Don Haines from St. Paul's Seminary was recognized by the chair. Announcements were given and then the chair stated that we would be proceeding to the order of the day — recognition of the retirees.

John Ross presented the persons going into retired relationship in the Annual Conference. The names of the persons were called: Clinton M. Atchley, Alf A. Eason, Harold W. Flowers, Horace Grogan, Edward W. Harris, who could not be present, Gerald K. Hilton, C. Ray Hozendorf, James E. Major, Dorothy Claiborne Tabor and Ruth A. Wells.

Bishop Hicks spoke words of recognition and acknowledgment of the service of the retirees and their families.

The Bishop acknowledged Dr. Matt Ellis, a former president of Hendrix College.

The insurance report was given by David Wilson. The report was moved for adoption. After discussion the report was adopted.

Dr. Grant Shockley led the closing prayer.

Tuesday Afternoon, May 26, 1981 — 2:00 p.m.

Bishop Hicks called the Conference into session at 2:00 p.m. The Board of Ordained Ministry report was continued. Biff Averitt presented these persons for probationary membership and deacons orders: William B. Leslie, Tom Letchworth, Varnell Norman, LaVon Post, Herb Pekar.

The Conference responded with a welcome to the ordinands.

The following persons were presented to the relationship of full connection and elders orders: Don Armstrong, Vurl Bland, Aultus Block, J. Kenneth Dodd, Beverly Sawyer, Roy P. Smith and Rodney G. Steele. Those elected to elders orders were asked by Bishop Hicks the traditional questions as found within the Discipline. The elders responded affirmatively to all. The Conference gave the elders a standing vote of welcome.

The Board of Diaconal Ministries report was given by Olive Smith. The report as printed in the members workbook was adopted. The following diaconal ministers were recognized: Felix Thompson, Olive Smith, Mike Parker, Marcia Dodd, Meredith Cravens, Martha Lynn Thompson, Ray Tribble, Mary Frances Garrett.

George W. Martin presented the Conference Council on Ministries report. Each section of the report was read and approved individually.

Nick Evans presented an addendum to the Board of Global Ministries report which proposed a process for developing a plan for congregational development in Little Rock Annual Conference. It was adopted.

Nick Evans also proposed that St. Mark United Methodist Church, El Dorado, be made a church extension project and that a grant of \$10,000 be allocated for that purpose. This motion was passed.

Ralph Hale offered the following amendment to the Board of Church and Society Report deleting Items 5 and 6 and substituting as number 5 the following "We recommend that the \$14,500 allocated to the Christian Civic Foundation be continued as a line item." The amendment passed.

George W. Martin moved the report as amended be accepted to the recommended point.

Kenneth Kinard presented the report of the Joint Area sub-committee on the Resource Center. An amendment deleting Item 5 and replacing with the following: (See attached) was offered by Roger Armstrong. The amendment was adopted.

James E. Major presented the report for Higher Education with special emphasis on two projects at Hendrix College: 1. The restoration of Martin Hall, and 2. A Scholarship Endowment Fund.

The Conference Secretary was asked to write a letter of deep appreciation for the significant contribution made to Hendrix College by Dr. Roy Shilling, past President, and James E. Major, past Senior Vice-President.

The Conference Council on Ministries budget recommendations for 1982 were presented by George Tanner. Appropriate changes were made and extensive discussion of the Area Associate Director for Ethnic Minority-Local Church ensued. John Hays moved that "A

vouchered expense account be added for the Executive Director of Conference Council on Ministries and each Associate Director in the amount of \$2,000 each for travel within the bounds of the Annual Conference."

Alvin Murray made a substitute motion to refer to the personnel committee of the Council on Ministries the matter of compensation for Director and Associate Directors for a study and report to Conference next year.

Bill Cheyne made a motion of an amendment to the substitute to defer the salary, housing, utility allowance and travel allowance for the Associate Director for Ethnic Minority-Local Church to the CFA and personnel committee to report back in 24 hours.

John Hays moved to refer to CFA all above motions and amendments to the Conference Council on Ministries budget with the request that CFA consider the actions of the House. This motion passed.

Conference adjourned with a prayer by Palmer Garner.

Tuesday Evening, May 26, 1981 — 7:00 p.m.

A service of worship through music was presented by the Trinity Choir of First United Methodist Church of Camden.

The 7:30 p.m. worship service was led by Eric Parker. The choir of St. Luke United Methodist Church, Pine Bluff, directed by Randy Hamilton presented the music. The worship preacher was Beverly Sawyer.

Wednesday Morning, May 27, 1981 — 8:30 a.m.

The morning worship service was led by Mary Susan Butt. The preacher was Don Riggins whose sermon title was "Committed to Christ, Called to Change."

The Secretary called on H. O. Richardson to give a report of the minutes. He reported that all the minutes except for a small portion of Monday were examined and believed to be correct. This report was accepted by vote of the Conference. Bob Trieschmann gave remembrances from Bro. Bill Crow, Lockesburg; and Bro. Ed Galloway, Little Rock. These are messages of persons asked to be remembered by this Annual Conference. Bro. Bob Beasley called and asked to be remembered.

The Committee on Cooperative Parish Ministries was presented by Biff Averitt and Vic Nixon. Representatives from each of the Preparatory and Probe Phases Parishes spoke of their respective parish. The speakers were: Virginia Machen, John Wesley Parish; Johnnie Coward, SW Metro Parish; Judy Lowrey, Murfreesboro Area; Prentice Garland, Lockesburg; Frank Maples, N. Lonoke; Don Wilson, Cleveland County; Fred L. Arnold, N. Desha-E. Drew Counties; Mike Clayton, Ouachita County.

A motion was made by Maxine Callaway to amend lines 48 and 49 on page 38 of the members workbook to read "All ethnic churches in the Little Rock metropolitan area not previously included in the parish." The motion passed.

The chair recognized Wayne Edward for the Committee on Equitable Salaries report.

Mission salaries supplement — Wayne Edwards presented the report and moved it be accepted. After discussion Nick Evans moved that equitable salary for a full time pastor be set for 1982 at \$12,000. This amendment was seconded and passed.

John Hays made a motion to amend the motion concerning the Equitable Salaries report to read: "The maximum amount that a charge may receive from January 1982 to December 1982 shall be \$2,200."

The report as amended was adopted.

Don Riggins made a motion from the Board of Church and Society to call upon the Arkansas State Legislature in their next session to repeal the Creation-Science Bill Act 590 of 1981. The motion was seconded and passed.

The Rev. Ron Clark spoke on the World Hunger Ingathering and the Prison Ministry (Criminal Justice Ministries).

The motion was made and seconded to accept these reports of Ron Clark. This motion

passed.

The Youth report is called for — Buddy Ratliff, Conference Youth Coordinator, recognized the adult leaders who work in the youth ministry. Lynn Dukes, President of the Youth Council, spoke to the Conference. The report of the Youth Council was accepted by the Conference.

Joe Phillips gave greetings to the Conference from the Methodist Children's Home and expressed thanks and appreciation for the Christmas offering.

Pastors will receive a packet in mid-summer concerning the Children's Home. This will concern the placement of children and will also concern a referral service to the Methodist Children's Home. Dr. Phillips recommended the counseling services was available at the Children's Home not only for children but for others outside the home. The report of the Methodist Children's Home was adopted. Bishop Hicks asked that the Conference record the fact that we are hearing all of these institution reports and are approving and supporting the outline that Dr. Phillips has presented as well as other institutions as they come before the Annual Conference.

Doris Fish presented the report of the UMW to the Annual Conference. Doris Fish quoted from the Scriptures II Timothy — she gave the history of the Methodist Women's work beginning in Ohio and then related it to the Arkansas area beginning with the Warren UMC. For the women in Arkansas it began early in 1873 at the First Methodist Episcopal Church in Warren, Arkansas. She presented the dates and places for the School of Christian Missions in Arkansas as well as in the nation. She stated that the school will move back to Hendrix College in 1981 with a weekend school beginning July 31 through August 2. Weekday school will begin August 3 through 6. The UMW report was adopted by the Conference.

Helen Wilson gave thanks to the women of the Conference for their support through the years.

Dr. Paul McLean, returned missionary from Japan and China was recognized.

Daisy Cabean of Lockesburg, retired deaconess, was acknowledged.

Keenan Williams presented the Arkansas Methodist report.

Lloyd Stone acknowledged the \$1,000 gift by a retired minister recently began an endowment for the Arkansas Methodist.

In the midst of the report the order of the day was called. Ray Hozendorf moved that the order of the day be the recognition of the ministers' wives at this time. Bob Trieschmann, Chairman of Courtesies, presented the wives of the District Superintendents and subsequently the wives of the pastors. Bishop and Mrs. Hicks announced a special donation to "Peace with Justice" had been made in honor of the Cabinet. Bishop Hicks then made a presentation to the two District Superintendents who are leaving the Cabinet, Alf Eason who is retiring, and Charles Ashcraft who is taking another appointment. They received a gift from the Bishop and their wives received a gift from Mrs. Hicks.

Bishop Hicks then made the introduction of Norris and Mrs. Steele, Tom and Mrs. Weil. Norris and Tom were presented as District Superintendents to the Monticello District and to the Arkadelphia District respectively.

The matter of business was again brought to a point of order.

Keenan Williams completed his presentation of the Arkansas Methodist report and moved the report be adopted. Seconded.

Bill Cheyne moved that #3 of the report become the total report and that the rest be deleted. Don Riffin made an amendment to the motion setting the apportionment at \$114,301 instead of the recommended \$124,000. The question was called for vote. The vote on the amendment to the motion is accepted 137 to 82. The vote was taken on the motion as presented by Bill Cheyne resulting in 111 for and 110 against.

A recount was called for. Upon the recount the motion lost 133 to 121. Ray Bates moved that proposal #4 be added "The Arkansas United Methodist Reporter be abolished in its present form."

The amendment was defeated so there will be three proposals to be voted on. A secret ballot was taken.

Dr. H. Bryan Brawner presented the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas report.

A motion was made that the name of the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas be changed to the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas. The motion was seconded and passed.

Don Riffin was called upon to introduce Jim Argue, Jr. as full time executive director of the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas beginning July 1, 1981.

The chair gave thanks to Dr. Brawner for his leadership in moving the Foundation from an almost non-activity to the point that it now is.

Ralph Hale gave the report of the Conference Board of Trustees. A motion was made by Ralph Hale, seconded and passed to accept the report.

Results of the first ballot were received with 255 voting, 4 were invalid. Proposal #1 a total of 112, proposal #2 — 34, proposal #3 — 105. A second secret ballot was taken.

The report of Camp Tanako was given by Charles Settle. The Camp Superintendent, Terry Everitt, was introduced. He reported a new water system is now installed and in operation. Water from Lake Catherine is no longer being used. The Articles of Incorporation, Little Rock Conference, United Methodist Camp Tanako presented before the Conference. The changes are updating and making current the language of the groups in relation to the church. A motion was made by Charles Settle to adopt these changes. The report was adopted. Homer Winstead called for a mention of the United Methodist Men working relationship to Tanako, particularly the walk-in refrigerator that was donated by that group.

The second secret ballot was reported — Proposal #1 becomes the policy of the Arkansas Methodist with 106 votes. Proposal #3 received 96 votes.

Keenan Williams moved the adoption of the whole Arkansas Methodist report. This motion was seconded and passed.

The meeting was adjourned for noon recess.

Wednesday, Afternoon, May 27, 1981 — 2:00 p.m.

The Conference was opened by prayer by Bishop Hicks.

James Major, Hendrix College, presented two of his colleagues, David Gerhart, Vice President for Development, Hendrix and Mackey Yokem, Alumni Director.

Roger Armstrong moved to amend by insertion page 31, line 3, letter F of the members workbook to read: "Seminary graduates returning from Seminary to receive their first appointment be paid an additional \$200 to help defray the costs, in part, of moving the addition distance from Seminary to the Conference. This would be a one-time supplement and would be in addition to the present compensation for which they would be eligible once they were inside the conference boundaries. This would become effective at the 1982 Annual Conference." The motion must lie on the table for 24 hours.

George Tanner introduced Bob Parker, Secretary of the Christian Life Council, Arkansas Southern Baptist Convention. Ronnie Sparks was introduced as the Director of Education of the Christian Civic Foundation.

The motion was made and seconded to receive the report of greetings from Baptist Family Life Convention as part of the minutes. This was approved.

Grant Shockley, President of Philander Smith College, was invited by the chair to address the conference.

Dr. Shockley presented a certificate of recognition to the Conference from the Division of Higher Education, Philander Smith and the other black colleges of the United Methodist Church.

The report was received for the record by a vote of the Conference.

The chair called on Danny George for a report of Campus Ministries. The report for the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministries is found on Page 18 of the members workbook. A motion was made that the apportionment (Item 4) be amended to read \$113,439.00. The motion passed. A motion was made and seconded to approve this report. The motion carried.

A resolution for an area study committee to study the feasibility of uniting the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conference was brought from the table and presented to the

floor of the Conference. We recommend that an area study committee be named by the Conference nominating committees to study the possibility of merger of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences; and that the area study committee be composed of an equal number of clergy and laity:

- 1 representative from each of the 13 districts
- 3 at-large members from the North Arkansas Conference
- 4 at-large members from the Little Rock Conference

Ex-Officio — Resident Bishop, directors of the Council on Ministries. George W. Martin, in the absence of Dr. John Trieschmann, made the presentation. A standing vote was made on the resolution. The count was 124 for the resolution and 84 against. The resolution passed.

The chair called for John Blundell from Camp Aldersgate to make a report. The report for Aldersgate was received by a vote.

Lee Cate from Mt. Sequoyah was recognized by the chair to make a presentation to the Conference. The report was voted acceptance by the Conference.

Noe Gonzales, President of Lydia Patterson Institute, El Paso, Texas was introduced by the chair to the Conference. A motion was made and passed to receive this report in the record of the Conference.

As a matter of personal privilege, Bob Trieschmann presented Mrs. Walton, widow of Bishop Walton.

Jerry Campbell, School of Theology, SMU, made a report which was moved and adopted to be a matter of record for the Conference.

Don Riffin was presented for a matter of some resolutions on the Atlanta situation. This resolution was adopted, Adoption of the "Peace with Justice" resolution was made and it was passed. The motion for the resolution on Capital punishment was moved and seconded. A count vote was called for. The resolution on capital punishment failed by a vote of 84 against and 78 for. A motion was made that the resolution on alcohol be accepted. The resolution was approved. The chair asked that Don Riffin point out the purpose of resolutions and action of the Conference. He stated that the resolutions are used as a reminder to prod our thinking and help us to understand the real dilemma that persons who serve on various boards and agencies face as they struggle through the facets of the faith as a part of the life of the church.

Ruby Lee Jackson was recognized to make a presentation to the Conference concerning a change in the structure of the District Council on Ministries. This motion was approved by the Conference.

The ballots for the proposed constitutional amendments from the 1980 General Conference were presented to the Conference. John Walker explained these proposed amendments. Vote was taken with 166 voting. #1 160 for, 3 against, 1 abstention; #2 160 for, 3 against, 2 abstentions; #3 159 for, 1 against, 4 abstentions; #4 155 for, 2 against, 7 abstentions; #5 154 for, 4 against, 8 abstentions.

Official Certificate Of Action By The Annual Conference

VI. Reports

District Superintendent's Report To Annual Conference

A general during the Civil War named O. O. Howard was a man of deep religious principles. During the course of the war he divided his time pretty equally between fighting and evangelism. Howard's brigade was known all through the army as the Christian brigade, and he was very proud of it.

There was one hardened old sinner in the brigade, however, whose ears were deaf to all exhortations. General Howard was particularly concerned to get this man converted. One day he went down to the teamster's part of the camp where the man was on duty. He talked to him long and earnestly about religion and finally said: "I want to see you converted. Won't you come to the next service?"

The soldier rubbed his head thoughtfully for a moment. Then he replied: "General, I'm plumb willin' to be converted, but if I am, beein' that everyone else in the camp has got religion, who is goin' to drive the mules?"

Perhaps that is the critical question we face. How can one be a Christian and at the same time do the things that need to be done in this world. Perhaps we need to understand that "driving the mules" or getting done what has to be done is where the essence of the church and the Christian life is found. The Dutch scholar Has Kung has written: "The New Testament itself does not begin by laying down a doctrine of the Church which has then to be worked out in practice; it starts with the church as reality, and reflection upon it comes later. The real church is first and foremost a happening, a fact, an historical event."

We as United Methodist are very close to our 200th year as a formally organized church. The church as a whole is rapidly approaching its third millennium. As we go into that millennium we see the future is already upon us. Tremendous achievements have been made in science and technology. The highly industrialized nations spread their knowledge throughout the world, the third world has come alive; the world is becoming one and a single economic unit, a single civilization, perhaps even a single culture is emerging.

And what of the church? What of the United Methodist Church? The church cannot stand apart from this world wide reorientation which heralds a new era. Like all times of transition our age is one of unrest and this unrest affects the church. But let us remember that what looks like a serious crisis may mark the moment of new life; what looks like a sinister threat may in reality be a great opportunity.

Enormous tasks face us if we see ourselves as existing for the world. As United Methodist Christians we must renew, reassemble and revitalize our people. We must preach the Gospel in areas that were once Christian but are now largely pagan. We must play our proper part in solving the world's enormous problems. There are many problems; there are many opportunities. We have to learn how to be Christian and "drive the mules" at the same time.

Our conference has struggled with this issue as has our whole denomination. During the last year we have begun to seek to find what it means to set as our priority the Ethnic Minority Local Church, while also putting into effect the 5 special programs, programs which point us toward evangelism and mission, and at the same time continuing with ongoing ministries. The Cabinets and Staffs of both the Little Rock and North Arkansas conferences have explored what it means to be an Area Leadership Team. The Conference Council on Ministries and the District Councils on Ministries have sought to develop programs and leadership that would enable us to truly be Christians engaged with the world. Cooperative Parish Ministry offers an approach to ministry & mission that capitalizes on our unique connectionalism to move beyond "business as usual" to a genuine missional stance.

A look to the future brings certain questions: Will we remain a connectional church? How do we do that in our age? How will we properly deploy our ministerial leadership? Will we understand that the promise of connectionalism is best fulfilled by an itinerant system of ministerial supply? What does consulation mean? Are the preferences of pastors and

pastor-parish relations committees the final word? Or is the third-party appointing power still to have the final decision? How does evaluation of clergy functions fit into this and what is the place of continuing education for our ministers? Can we provide adequate pensions for our retired ministers?

A related question about connectionalism is, can we truly learn to cooperate? Do we believe that each United Methodist Church is a part of every other United Methodist Church and acknowledge that no one church lives to itself alone? Are we willing to make Cooperative Parish Ministry a normative style of doing ministry rather than just another program?

In this time of declining church membership are we willing to become evangelists? Do we believe the great commission? How can we best communicate the Gospel? What place does the media play? Can we seek to evangelize persons and continue to address the great issues; issues such as hunger, poverty, racism, sexism, war, inflation, etc.; issues that affect persons?

In short, can we be religious and still "drive the mules." Can we be the church in its true essence and at the same time the church in history? We can if we realize the essence of the church is to be in history.

The plans of action that will be presented to us at this annual conference are the result of the effort to do just that. As we consider them may we forget neither concern. May we be God's people doing His work in His world. "Sir, if I get converted, who is going to drive these mules?" The answer, "We are, you and all the rest of us who believe that God sent his Son to save the world."

Our second program objective for 1982 is a District-Wide Family Life Workshop to develop skills in listening, sharing, and communicating more effectively. Spring, 1982.

Management Team — Board Of Education

Purpose

To develop and promote a conference program of Christian education that gives children, youth, young adults, and adults a knowledge of and experience in the Christian faith as motivation for Christian service in the Church, the Community, and the world. This will include guidance and training for District leaders responsible for Christian education and for local church chairpersons of the work area and commissions on education, superintendents of the Church School Program, Age-level educational coordinators, Church School teachers, and other leaders in the Educational ministry of Local Churches.

Goals

1. To assist the DCOM's in training local church leaders to actually do the work of Christian Education in the local church.
2. To work with the Coordinating Committee on Camping to provide quality experiences in our Conference Camping Ministry; to expand the scope of the camping ministry by 15% each year during the 1981-84 quadrennium.
3. Promote the Little Rock Conference Camping Program at Camp Tanako; and Lab Training Events at Mt. Sequoyah through the DCOM's and local churches.
4. To strengthen the church school by having Lab Training Events in each age-level during the 1981-84 quadrennium; and to have 24 certified leaders.
5. To strengthen the church school by having District Workshops for Leaders in each age-level in each District in each year of the 1981-84 quadrennium. To include training for leaders in small membership churches, intergenerational settings, and open class settings.
6. To encourage the observance of the first Sunday of Christian Education Week in each local church as Christian Education Sunday for the purpose of emphasizing the importance of Christian Education and for receiving an offering for the week of Christian Education in the Conference. The offering goal for 1982 is \$12,000.00.
7. To encourage and assist the Family Life Committee in the designing and implementing of Family-Life Ministry events in Christian Sexuality.
8. To cooperate with the State Governmental Agencies in having a seminar to train persons working with older adults, and to encourage local churches to explore expanding their ministry to older adults.

Objectives

1. To provide a literature display at our 1981 Annual Conference.
2. To have a forum group at the 1981 Annual Conference to discuss the United Methodist

curriculum (how it is written and how we use it).

2. We recommend that each District Council on Ministries introduces the new adult, youth, and children curriculum in each District. The training of teams of 5 persons from each District will take place in the Fall of 1981 and Spring of 1982. (Cost: \$1,500.00)

Show membership and attendance growth in each local church and each district.

Objectives

1. Have each Local Church to contact the non-attending members of their congregation and seek to get each person active-in-church again.
 - A. Prepare membership list of non-attending members and organize for systematic visitation by December 31, 1981.
 - B. Implement a systematic visitation to non-attending members seeking to discover their hopes and disappointments no later than February 1, 1982, with first visits of all non-attending members completed by June 1, 1982.
 - C. Involve the non-attending members in the church again at whatever level of involvement seems appropriate to their needs.
2. Strengthen pastoral and lay motivation for evangelizing those outside the church.
 - A. Set aside in each local church, Pentecost (June 7, 1981) and each Pentecost during the Quadrennium as "Making Disciples Day"
 1. A Pastoral Message or Prayer of Commitment from the Bishop will be read in each local church on Pentecost Day.
 2. Using local church newsletters, district newsletters, conference mailing, and Arkansas Methodist, to show that Evangelism and Church Growth is a vital part of ministry in Arkansas Methodism.
 3. Recommend that Pastor School be devoted to Evangelism and Church Growth.
 4. Training events on Evangelism and Church Growth in each District using

- persons of competence in our Conference. (Cost: \$1,000.00)
5. Send key personnel to Jurisdictional and National events on Evangelism and Church Growth. (Cost: \$1,200.00)
 3. Compile statistical information related to Evangelism and Church Growth.
 - A. Using census data compile data for churches in population growth area.
 - B. Design method and instrument for assessing the implementation of the conference emphasis on Evangelism.
 4. The Conference Board of Evangelism will work with the Conference Committee on Ethnic Minority Local Church in implementing the emphasis on Evangelism and Church Growth in Ethnic Minority Local Church during 1982.

We request that each District Superintendent and the appropriate District Committee determine the need for new United Methodist congregations in their districts and to file a report with the cabinet by December, 1982.

Management Team — Board Of Global Ministries

Purpose

We shall provide connectional relationships between the General Board of Global Ministries and the Conference, District, and local church; and provide for global ministries functions related to the objectives and scope of the General BOGM, looking after the tasks of Mission Cultivation and Education, Health and Welfare Ministries, Ecumenical and Interreligious Concerns, Parish and Community Development, Church Extension, as well as UMCOR ministries and disaster needs, and other special ministries.

Goals

1. We shall help persons in the Conference understand the biblical and theological base for Christian mission, the global nature of mission, and the quest for Christian unity by:
 - A. engaging in projects of mission education an interpretation and leadership development of training through Conference-wide Mission Festivals and Area School of Mission and "My Job" training events;
 - B. sharing in interpreting the mission benevolence program of the United Methodist Church and the Little Rock Annual Conference through the CCOM Mailings and articles in the *Arkansas Methodist*;
 - C. developing and fostering the concept of persons in mission and supporting the missionary outreach programs by itinerating mission personnel.
2. We shall promote Parish and Community Development, clarifying the policy procedures and assisting in funding needs.
3. We shall administer the program of Church Extension of the Annual Conference and work toward the creation of new congregations.
4. We shall identify new opportunities for mission in the Annual Conference by (a) identifying needs, (b) defining goals, (c) initiating programs in cooperation with other boards and agencies, and (d) setting strategies for the implementation of those programs.
5. We shall advocate ministries of Health and Welfare as defined by the Annual Conference.

Proposed Process For Developing A Little Rock Conference Plan For Congregational Development

We recommend the 1981 session of the Little Rock Annual Conference establish a conference task force on congregational development. The membership of this task force shall be the Bishop, the Chairpersons of the Conference Council on Ministries, Commission on Equitable Salaries, Board of Global Ministries, Committee on Planning and Research, Committee on Church Extension of the Board of Global Ministries, EMLC Task Force, and Committee on Area Parish Development, and the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries. The task force chairperson shall be named by the Bishop.

1. The Task Force will establish district task forces on congregational development comprised of the District Superintendent, District Representatives of Global Ministries, Equitable Salaries, Religion and Race, Cooperative Parish Ministries, the Chairperson of the District Council on Ministries, the Chairperson of the District Board of Building and Location, and the Chairperson of the District Board of Missions (if available). The chairperson shall be named by the Bishop.
2. The personnel of the Board of Global Ministries National Division will train each district task force to identify and evaluate areas within the district which merit attention in planning for congregational development in the summer of 1981.
3. The district task forces on congregational development will identify areas of growth and/or transition, complete general area and feasibility studies, selected proposed sites and interview existing churches by December 15, 1981.
4. The personnel of the Board of Global Ministries will meet with district task forces to review data, visit sites, and evaluate recommendations by January 15, 1982.
5. The conference committee will collate findings from the districts and develop a 10 year plan for congregational development, including funding methods, by February 15, 1982.
6. The Conference Council on Ministries will receive and take action on the task force report and present recommendations to the 1982 Annual Conference.
7. We further recommend that the St. Mark United Methodist Church, El Dorado, be designated as a Conference Extension Project.

Ministry to the Hearing Impaired

Ministry to the Terminally Ill and Their Families

Our first thinking on this is to develop two brochures in quantity to equip pastors and others to resource families and terminally ill patients. These resources would bear the United Methodist emblem and be theologically sound. Health & Welfare Committee has responsibility.

Ministries To And With The Handicapped

This program will resource local churches as they develop programs and upgrade facilities to better share ministry with persons with handicapping conditions. Brochure, Building Audit, Display at Annual Conference are part of this proposal. Health & Welfare Committee has responsibility.

This is our share of the Area program for world hunger, the Ingathering and similar

activities of the Area Committee on Hunger and Lifestyles.

One hundred dollars for membership in the national Health and Welfare Association, 1982. One hundred dollars for travel and postage, phone calls associated with this committee. Management Team — Board Of Church And Society

Social and Economic Justice

1. We encourage Religion and Race, Status and Role of Women to continue to address all forms of discrimination as it occurs in church, community, state, and nation. We pledge our cooperation and support.
2. We affirm the public school system and recommend that our United Methodist families support the public schools in their cities, towns, and communities.
3. We recommend that the Arkansas Methodist publish the Consumer Alert, prepared by the Attorney General's office.

Political and Human Rights

1. We ask that a position paper on Church and State relations be written dealing with (1) United Methodist beliefs, (2) Rights of Religious Ministries, (3) Religious Practices in Public, and (4) Taxation of Institutions. This paper to be published in October 15, 1981 edition of Arkansas Methodist, and key insights of the paper be printed as a bulletin insert for Sunday, October 18, 1981.
2. We request permission to form a panel of persons to resource the local churches in addressing the issues related to Political and Human Rights. (Patterned after the Panel of Americans)
3. We affirm the United Methodist key involvement in Prison Ministries, and recommend that \$10,000.00 be apportioned to Districts and Local Churches in 1982.
4. We pledge our cooperation to the Conference Council Committee on Family Life, and request they give serious consideration to the following as they design their program — Human Sexuality; Violence; Marriage; and Reproduction Freedoms.
5. We recommend that the \$14,500.00 allocated to the Christian Civic Foundation be continued as a line item.

Peace and World Order

1. In dealing with the issues involved in International Development, we recommend that the local churches utilize the films, materials, and studies of the United Methodist Women in church-wide studies related to the International Development. We recommend that Great Decisions discussion groups be formed in local churches.
2. We request that conscription information be sent to the pastors by the Conference Council.

Resolution

WHEREAS, the American Civil Liberties Union is filing suit in Federal Court, challenging the constitutionality of Arkansas Statute Act #590, commonly referred to as the "creation science law"; and

WHEREAS the American Civil Liberties Union has been joined in the suit by 23 plaintiffs, including our own United Methodist Bishop Kenneth W. Hicks, the presiding bishops of the Episcopal, Roman Catholic, and African Methodist Episcopal diocese or districts of Arkansas, as well as Presbyterian, Baptist, and Jewish leaders; and

WHEREAS we believe this act was an ill-conceived and hasty measure which violates the separation of Church and State,

BE IT RESOLVED that the Little Rock Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church, meeting in Hot Springs, Arkansas, on Wednesday, May 27, express its support of this suit, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we call upon the Arkansas State Legislature in their next session to repeal the Creation-Science Bill, Act 590 of 1981.

Resolution

WHEREAS we live in a world of conflict and strife, where love, peace and justice are the exception rather than the rule. Where hate, anger, mistrust and captivity are realities. These qualities manifest themselves in global wars, racial mistrust, religious intolerance, marital conflict and general social deterioration. Our world is in need of a new "Life Experience, a Life of New Creation."'; and

WHEREAS the Gospel of our Lord commands that we be peacemakers, reconcilers and agents of pastoral sensitivity, recognizing that these qualities are often alien to our nature

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we support the special emphasis entitled "Peace with Justice" in an effort to re-examine our compassion, our level of discipleship, and our theology; not in order to find comfort but to engage that within ourselves and our society which will make visible the real "Peace with Justice."

'Bishop Kenneth W. Hicks — "A Life to Experience," Interpreter (May 1981)

Resolution

WHEREAS, persons everywhere who are sensitive to the value of human life continue to be shocked by the continuing senseless murders of children in the city of Atlanta, and

WHEREAS, families of the deceased children have been caused such anguish, and

WHEREAS, life in a great urban center for other parents and children is almost immobilized by fear that there may yet be other victims, and

WHEREAS, the perpetrator/s of the crimes are as yet unapprehended by law enforcement officials.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Little Rock Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church that an expression of our prayerful concern and sympathy be offered publicly to the families of the victims, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we forward to Mayor Maynard Jackson our expression of prayerful concern for the city corporately that insight might be granted all officials involved in seeking to solve these desperate acts of crime that resolution might be found immediately.

Resolution

WHEREAS alcohol presents a special case of drug abuse because of its widespread social acceptance. We affirm our long-standing conviction and recommendation that abstinence from the use of alcoholic beverages is a faithful witness to God's liberating and redeeming love; and

WHEREAS this witness is especially relevant in a pluralistic society where drinking is so uncritically accepted and practiced; where excessive, harmful, and dangerous drinking patterns are so common; where destructive reasons for drinking are so glamorized that youthful immaturity can be exploited for personal gain; where alcohol contributes to a great proportion of fatal traffic and industrial accidents; where millions of individuals and their families suffer from alcoholism and countless others from various drinking problems; and where alcohol is a factor in many other social problems such as crime, poverty, and family disorder; and

WHEREAS the church recognizes the freedom of the Christian to make responsible decisions and calls upon each member to consider seriously and prayerfully the witness of abstinence as a part of his or her equipment for Christian mission in the world. The understanding of the social forces that influence people either to drink or to abstain must be encouraged. Christian love in human relationships is primary, thereby making abstinence an instrument of love and always subject to the requirements of love. Persons who practice abstinence should avoid attitudes of self-righteousness which express moral superiority and

condemnatory attitudes toward those who do not abstain.

THEREFORE:

1. We urge every local congregation and each member to demonstrate an active concern for alcoholics and their families and for all persons with drinking problems.
2. We urge all legislative bodies and health care systems to focus on and implement measures to meet the special needs of women, racial minorities, juveniles, and the elderly. Basic to this concern is an informed mind and compassionate heart which views the alcoholic without moralism and with empathy.
3. We urge churches to make education about alcohol problems and the value of abstinence an integral part of all drug education efforts.
4. We encourage churches to develop special action programs on alcohol problems which include prevention education in the family, church, and community; utilization of mass media to develop responsible attitudes toward alcohol-related problems; care, treatment, and rehabilitation of problem drinkers; measures to prevent persons from driving while under the influence of alcohol; achievements of appropriate and effective legal controls; and the stimulation of sound empirical research.
5. We favor laws to eliminate the advertising of alcoholic beverages.
6. We urge the health system, especially United Methodist-related hospitals, to accept alcoholism as a medical-social-behavioral problem and to treat the alcoholic person with the same attention and consideration as any other patient.
7. We urge the Federal Trade Commission to develop a health hazard warning statement concerning the use of alcohol as a beverage, and that it be affixed to all alcoholic beverages offered for sale.
8. We urge the Federal Government to coordinate its drug and alcohol abuse efforts in an attempt to alleviate fragmented results in treatment and prevention.

Report Of The Joint Area Sub-Committee On The Resource Center

Bishop Hicks, Members of the Annual Conference, and Guests:

Item A. Due to the reduction in funding for the Resource Center, the Joint Area Sub-Committee on the Resource Center has made certain policies and plans to ensure the good stewardship of the funds, facilities and materials entrusted to the resource center.

1. Allotted time of the secretary is insufficient to allow the proper maintenance of certain items. Thus, the Resource Center will be closed for one week in August to allow resources to be repaired, culled, sorted and in general reorganized.
2. The new resource center catalogue will be recommended to the Joint Area Committee as a budget item for 1983, thus postponing this project.
3. All persons utilizing resource center materials are urged to make the suggested contribution and return this with the resource to the center. An ongoing list of income and expenditures from these funds shall be kept in the center.
4. Conference program groups are encouraged to buy audio-visual resources related to their respective programs from their own funds.
5. The Committee is instructed by the Conference to create a rental scale for such resources so that it may continue to make them available to local church groups, District and Conference groups, and secure compensation for the repair and replacement of such resources.

Item B. In order that local churches may utilize the Resource Center more effectively, the Joint Area Sub-Committee will provide information on new or pertinent resources to the Arkansas Methodist and encourages all Conference program groups to provide similar information when publicizing their programs. This may include quarterly listings by Conference Age Level Co-ordinators of available Audio-Visual materials suitable for use with current curriculum.

Recommendation

The Joint Committee on Communications of the Arkansas Area recommends that a Comprehensive Plan of Communication be developed for 1983. A specialist in Communications will consult with and plan with the Joint Committee.

Arkansas Methodist (sub-committee)

Budget for 1982 \$114,301

An increase of 12% (102,000 for 1981)

After considering the figure of \$114,301, and the prospect of like future increases, and the continued decline in payouts, the Sub-Committee on the Arkansas Methodist (at the request of the Joint Committee) prepared the following recommendation to be present at both Annual Conferences. It is based on the belief that this method provides the best possible way to take a vote of confidence in the support of the paper. It also provides for evaluation by the whole body of the effectiveness of the paper as a media tool. We realize the risks involved in this, but we feel that this will finally force the Annual Conferences to come to grips with the issue of the effectiveness of the tool.

Three proposals will be presented on an equal footing. Rather than taking a position for one or the other, comment by the Committees involved will be limited to information.

The vote will be taken in the following manner: A secret ballot will be issued on which the delegate will be asked to vote for one of the three. If any one of the three receives a majority vote, it will be considered adopted. If after the first ballot there is no majority, the proposal receiving the least number of votes will be dropped. A second ballot will then be taken on the remaining two. Should a third or fourth ballot be necessary to obtain a majority, the same procedure will be followed.

We wish to stress again that the Annual Conferences must buy into this program by choosing for itself. It is understood the Annual Conference may choose different methods of funding.

Three Proposals

1. That the Arkansas Methodist be supported in 1982 by a \$10 per person subscription with a basic minimum of 12,000 subscriptions necessary to print the paper. This would be 6,000 subscriptions per conference and would produce \$120,000 to operate the paper. There would be quotas.

2. That the CFA's of the two conferences be asked to apportion \$60,000 for overhead costs and sell subscriptions at \$6 per person for the printing and mailing. This would be \$30,000 per Conference and would mean there would be no free copies. A minimum of 12,000 subscriptions would be necessary to print the paper. This would produce funds totaling \$132,000. Since all apportionments are not paid in full, it would still produce funds adequate to operate the paper in 1982.

3. That the CFA's of the two conferences be asked to apportion \$114,301 to be divided between the two Annual Conferences at \$57,150 each. That even though the full amount would not be paid, it would cover the actual expenses adequately in 1982.

Management Team — Board Of Higher Education And Campus Ministry

One of the primary functions of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry is to present the financial needs for adequate support of all ministries related to higher education. This includes schools, colleges, seminaries, campus ministries, related to our conference. Therefore, we present the following recommendations to the Council of Finance and Administration and to the Annual Conference for their consideration.

1. We recommend that an apportionment of \$148,000.00 be made to the churches in the Little Rock Conference for the support of Hendrix College. In addition, we recommend that the "Fair-share" goal of \$93,000.00 be continued in 1982 and that it be designated for endowed scholarships for United Methodist students.
2. We recommend that the full apportionment as requested be made to the local churches for the Black College Fund.
3. We recommend that the full apportionment as requested be made to the local church for the Ministerial Education Fund.
4. We request that an apportionment in the amount of \$113,439.00 be made to the local churches for the support of Campus Ministries in the Little Rock Annual Conference for 1982 (\$1,200 of this amount be designated for the Wesley Foundation at Monticello to be applied toward debt retirement on the parsonage).
5. We request that the first Sunday after Thanksgiving be designated as Methodist Student Day with offering.
6. We request permission to raise \$10,000 in the Camden District over the next two years for capitol improvements for the Wesley Foundation at Southern Arkansas University in Magnolia. These funds to be administered by the Camden District Superintendent.

Management Team — Commission On The Status And Role Of Women

Purpose

The primary purpose of the Little Rock Conference Commission on the Status and Role of Women for the 1981-84 Quadrennium shall be to challenge the Annual Conference, including its districts and local churches, to a continued commitment that will ensure full and equal participation by women in the total life and mission of the church, including policy-making positions, as well as those traditionally accorded to women. This calls for action to develop leadership and communications skills of women in the conference. Therefore it is our responsibility to:

1. Increase awareness of roles women fill and have the potential to fill at all levels of church life.
2. Establish clear guidelines within the Conference to ensure full participation of women in the total life of the church.

3. Improve leadership and communication skills of women.
4. Generate interest for a new understanding of theology and biblical history affecting the status of women.
5. Bring before the Annual Conference and its constituency the concerns and issues important to women. (This is an educational/informational program to sensitize United Methodists about these concerns and issues.)
6. Provide a support group for:
 - A. Women who are engaged in church related work (diaconal as well as clergy)
 - B. Women who are employed in administrative and clerical positions of the church.
 - C. Single women, clergy wives, older women, widows.
7. Provide the Annual Conference and District Superintendents with lists of women who are qualified to serve on commissions, committees, boards, and agencies.

Goals

The Commission on the Status and Role of Women will:

1. Encourage women to accept major responsibilities for which they are qualified.
2. Establish District Commissions on the Status and Role of Women and assist in training them for their responsibility.
3. Maintain a talent bank listing women from all districts who are qualified to serve on Conference agencies, boards, commissions, committees, etc. for use by the Conference Nominating Committee.
4. Monitor nominations to assure adequate representation of all parts of the constituency on all the boards, agencies, etc.
5. Work for the election of women as delegates to Annual, Jurisdictional, and General Conferences.
6. Identify and call to the attention of Annual Conference issues of vital concern to women.
7. Collaborate with other conference agencies (Boards of Ordained Ministry, Diaconal Ministry and Church and Society, the Commission on Religion and Race, and United Methodist Women) on matters of mutual concern.
8. Provide a support group to address the needs of women in the professional ministry (diaconal and clergy), single women, widows, older women, clergy wives, etc.

1982 Program Objectives

1. **Leadership Development Workshop** — By February, 1982, a pilot program will be held in the Little Rock District aimed at increasing leadership skills of lay women on boards, committees, or agencies in local churches. (Similar workshops would then be available to other districts in 1983). COST: \$500.00 (which is to cover the expense for resource persons, design team, facilitation of the workshop and the site for the meeting.)
2. **Clergy Spouse Retreat** — By September 1982, provide a retreat for clergy wives that is designed for group support and identification of issues or concerns to be addressed in the future. COST: \$600.00 (for resource persons, design team, facilitation of the retreat and site for the retreat.)
3. **Survey of Clergy Families** — Distribute by January 1982, a survey instrument to be completed by each member of clergy families to identify points of frustration or needs among clergy families. The results of the survey will be the base for designing and implementing an event that addresses the needs identified therein. Surveys are to be returned by June 1, 1982 and analysis completed by September 30, 1982. (The event in 1983 will be resourced by professionals who can help deal with the needs.) COST: \$450.00 (\$250.00 for reproducing forms, postage for mailing and return envelopes, and \$200.00 for statistical assistance in analyzing.)
4. **Organization of District Commissions on the Status and Role of Women** — this objective is being approached from a different perspective and active has been initiated in 1981 to develop a liaison between the Conference and districts and local churches. It should be well on the way to accomplishment by the end of 1981.

TOTAL COSTS: \$1,350.00

Management Team — Board Of Diaconal Ministry

Purpose

The purpose of the Conference Board of Diaconal Ministry is to study the needs and resources of the conference, relative to lay professional careers and to interpret diaconal ministry throughout the conference; to seek to enlist persons of all races and ethnic origins; to guide persons interested in these careers through the process of training, certification and consecration.

Goals

1. To assess the present and potential use of lay professionals in the Annual Conference.
2. To assist both churches and lay employees in moving toward higher levels of professional preparation.
3. To enlist at least five new diaconal ministers in the Annual Conference in this quadrennium, two of which will be of an ethnic minority group.
4. To work with the Director of Parish Ministries toward utilization of minority professional workers in staff positions.
5. To work with local churches and agencies employing diaconal ministers to achieve adequate salary and benefits support systems for diaconal ministers as set forth in the resolution adopted by the Annual Conference in 1978.

1982 Program Objectives

1. Continue the current survey of local churches employing lay staff persons in order to encourage continuing education toward certification and consecration as diaconal ministers.
2. To continue cooperation with the District Superintendents in helping local church Pastoral Parish Relation Committees to understand fully the importance of employing trained United Methodist professional staff and to aid them in upgrading their professional status.
3. To diligently use all forms of media to interpret the Diaconal Ministry to local churches and young people.
4. To bring resource persons from the Division of Diaconal Ministry for a workshop involving members of the Board of Diaconal Ministry and all persons in the process of certification/consecration in the fall of 1982.

Implementation Through

Workshop, resource materials, promotion and continuing education grants.

1. To update the Archives and History Collection at Hendrix College Library, Conway, Arkansas.
2. To obtain a Conference Historian at least on a part-time basis for the Little Rock Conference.
3. To catalogue and organize the Archives and History Collection at Hendrix College Library, Conway, Arkansas.

1982 Objectives

To organize, catalogue, and update the Archives and History Collection of the Little Rock Conference at Hendrix College.

On-Going Responsibilities

1. Assist Local Churches in organizing historical committees.
2. Deposit historical documents relating to the Little Rock Conference in the depository at Hendrix College.

COST: \$2,250.00

Management Team — Commission On Religion And Race

Purpose

The Conference Commission on Religion and Race will examine ethnic minority representation on all the conference boards, agencies, committees, and commissions, as well as the governing boards of related institutions. After such examinations are made, appropriate recommendations for total inclusiveness will be made to the Annual Conference.

Goals

1. To establish a talent bank containing the names of qualified ethnics willing to serve on conference boards, committees, commissions, and related institutions.

The apportionments to the local churches will be based on the 1979 and 1980 statistics. The decimal will be a Conference decimal with each church weighed

against the Conference total.

XI. Advance Specials:

We recommend General Advance Special to local churches for first hand relationships with mission projects and for involvement in mission. We recommend continuing local church budget support for Aldersgate United Methodist Camp as a Conference Advance Special.

XII. Little Rock Urban Ministries:

We recommend that \$38,650 be apportioned for the Little Rock Urban Ministries property and be administered by the Conference Trustees and that the capital campaign of \$200,000 be approved.

XIII. Hendrix College "Fair Share" Endowment:

We recommend that \$93,000 be accepted as the Hendrix College "Fair Share" Four Year Endowment Fund for United Methodist Students (1981-1984).

XIV. Special Days:

We recommend these Special Days with offerings:

Human Relations Day — Second Sunday in February

One Great Hour of Sharing — Fourth Sunday in Lent

Golden Cross Sunday — First Sunday in May with a goal of \$3,000

United Methodist Student Day — Sunday after Thanksgiving

Christian Education Sunday — Last Sunday in September with a goal of \$12,000 to be apportioned to the local churches.

World Communion Sunday — First Sunday in October

United Methodist Children's Home — Second and Third Sundays in December

XV. Other Recommendations:

- A. That Advance Specials for Ethnic Minority Local Churches be accepted by every local church and that 30% of the Missional Priority Fund be retained for use in the Annual Conference. We recommend the World Hunger Goal of \$300,000.
- B. Pastor's Utilities: If no utility allowance is made, we recommend that the local church designate a part of the salary as Parsonage Utilities to exempt the cost of utilities from the income tax claim.
- C. The contract between the Committee on the Annual Conference and First United Methodist Church Hot Springs be approved. The contract sets a flat payment of \$1,800 for the cost of the 1981 session of the Annual Conference.
- D. That the Travel Allowance be set at 20¢ per mile plus 2¢ per mile for each additional person, to encourage car pooling.
- E. That Retired Ministers be paid \$25 per diem for days they attend Annual Conference.
- F. That Pastor's Moving Expense be paid at the rate of \$100 plus 75¢ per mile. The mileage is to be paid from parsonage to parsonage, except when a pastor transfers to or from another Conference, the rate will apply from parsonage to the Little Rock Conference boundary.

Pastors who are returning from seminary to receive their first appointment as seminary graduates, will receive \$200.00 to help defray the cost of moving. This would be a one-time supplement, and would be in addition to the above rate of compensation. To become effective at the 1982 Annual Conference.

The following persons are eligible: pastors, lay pastors, student pastors after first appointment, district superintendents, persons in conference connectional positions, retiring pastors, persons taking disability leave, and others recommended by the Board of the Ministry.

- G. That all unrestricted benevolence funds be placed in a central operating balance.
- H. That "Interest Income" from investments continue to go into the Conference Administration Fund.
- I. That any Conference employee who has, or who desires, a tax sheltered annuity, may direct the Director of Finance & Management to pay this annuity from his regular income following proper guidelines.
- J. That each Board, Commission, Committee or Agency of the Conference prepare and present an annual detailed budget to the Council on Finance & Administration two months before the session of the Annual Conference.
- K. That no Board, Commission, Committee, or Agency be allowed to change a line item in its approved budget which would exceed 10% of the amount without the approval of the Council on Finance & Administration.
- L. That the latest independent audits shall be submitted for review and study by the following: Hendrix College, Philander Smith College, Camp Tanako, Aldersgate, Inc., United Methodist Childrens Home, Mt. Sequoyah and the four Wesley Foundations within the Little Rock Conference.
- M. That financial support of the Office of Finance & Management be recommended by the Joint Councils on Finance & Administration and approved by the Annual Conferences.

XVI. The job description of the Director of the Office of Finance & Management is on page 120 of the 1979 Journal.

XVII. We recommend that \$35,025 be apportioned to the local churches for Parish Development (Cooperative Parish Ministries).

XVIII. We recommend Ann Onstott as Director of the Office of Finance & Management and that the Annual Conference elect her for the 1980-84 Quadrennium.

XIX. We recommend that a Special Offering be held for the Pacific-Southwest Conference and that the date of the offering, set by the Bishop, be announced by the Arkansas Methodist, and that the date of the offering be the same in both conferences.

- XX. We recommend that \$14,500 be apportioned to the local churches for Christian Civic Foundation.
- XXI. We grant permission to the Wesley Foundation at Southern Arkansas University at Magnolia to hold a capitol improvements fund drive in the Camden District over the next two years. Goal: \$10,000. Funds will be administered by the Camden District Superintendent.
- XXII. We recommend that the Arkansas Methodist be supported in 1982 by a \$10 subscription with a basic minimum of 6,000 subscriptions needed in the Conference.

The United Methodist Foundation Of Arkansas

Nineteen eighty was a year in which the Foundation continued its efforts to become more visible as a service area of United Methodism in Arkansas. This emphasis is being continued into 1981. We believe that as more Methodist individuals and local churches become increasingly aware of the services available to them through this Foundation that it can greatly strengthen the work of the United Methodist Church in the Arkansas Area.

During 1980, the Executive Director has attended and participated in workshops in the Paragould, Jonesboro, Conway, Pine Bluff, Little Rock, and Monticello Districts. At each of these workshops, materials concerning the work of the Foundation, particularly those relating to wills and estate planning, have been distributed. Several local church and individual contacts have been very encouraging.

At the semi-annual meeting of the Board of Directors held on May 20, 1980, the following officers for 1980-81 were elected:

President: Mr. Richard C. Butler
Vice President: Dr. Clint D. Burleson
Secretary: Mr. Don Riggin
Treasurer: Ms. Ann Onstott

Since the election last May, Dr. Clint D. Burleson, being a member of the North Arkansas Conference CFA from which the Foundation receives some support, has resigned from the Board and as Vice President in accordance with a rule of the Conference. We regret losing the talent and leadership of Dr. Burleson. Other members of Conference CFAs whose status has been affected by the same Conference rule are: Dr. M. D. Deneke, Winfred Polk, Winston Faulkner. We regret losing each of these leaders who have contributed so much to the work of the Foundation.

At the meeting on May 20, 1980, a Personnel Committee was named to develop a statement of the qualities, skills, and abilities that the Executive Director should possess and to establish a job description of the office. The committee was also authorized to initiate a search for a qualified individual who would become Executive Director of the Foundation on a full-time basis by July 1, 1981.

The annual meeting of the Directors of United Methodist Foundations, representing 63 annual conferences, was held in St. Louis, Missouri October 5-7. Robert F. Sharp, a nationally known and highly respected development authority of the Robert F. Sharp Co. of Memphis, Tennessee, was the principal speaker and resource person for the conference.

Planning is under way to complete in 1981 the organization in each of the districts of the two conferences of a team that would conduct seminars or workshops in the areas of wills and estate planning. Such teams will include a trust officer, accountant, CLU (insurance), and an attorney. Efforts would be made to target in on selected groups in accordance with the objectives of the Foundation. These activities, as planned, would be coordinated with the programs of the District Council on Ministries.

On September 1, 1980, the Foundation was pleased to obtain badly needed office space through the cooperation of the leadership of the Arkansas Methodist. In the twelve months preceding, the work of the Foundation had been conducted from a desk made available by the North Arkansas Conference Council on Ministries. Our new telephone numbers are 374-

4831 or 374-4832. Our address remains the same: P.O. Box 3364, Little Rock, Arkansas 72203.

Funds in custody of the Foundation — cash and investments — plus endowment funds of \$21,646 as of January 31, 1981 — amounted to \$148,742. This represents approximately 150% increase since September 1, 1979. During the same period of time, more than \$50,000 has been distributed to institutions and local churches pursuant to directions of donors, and all operating expenses have been paid.

The leadership of the Foundation is genuinely appreciative of the increased financial support from each of the two Annual Conferences of the area. We believe that as the work of the Foundation becomes better known and the momentum of its activities accelerates, that significant dividends will be available to undergird the ministries of the United Methodist Church in the Arkansas area.

Committee On Planning And Research

Meeting for the first time in the Fall of 1980, the Committee on Planning and Research found itself to be an entirely new group working toward its role identification. The Committee determined a working principle of sound, thorough research prior to offering any planning recommendations, and, it reviewed specific responsibilities assigned by C.C.O.M. apportioning the work to sub-committees as follows:

1. **To cooperate with the Board of Global Ministries in developing a comprehensive plan for establishing new churches:** Dr. Gerald Fisher assigned as liaison with B.O.G.M. Preliminary findings from the General Council on Ministries through Ezra Earl Jones, and from the General Board of Global Ministries through James Davis, Director of Congregational Development are encouraging to the task of this committee. It is estimated that approximately 3,600 new U.M.C. households will appear in the Little Rock Conference by 1990. These new households will be divided about equally between the major urban centers and the small to mid-size cities. However, cautious movement is advised except in those cases where growth and need for new Church establishment is patently obvious.
2. **To Forecast needs for Recruitment and Training of Ministers:** Rev. J. Robert Scott, Rev. Daniel C. George, and Rev. James Shaddox sub-committee members. The Committee expresses its appreciation to Rev. John Hays for a schedule of retirements projected through 2028 when the last of the current complement of Ministers will be retired. Actuarial data has been requested from the General Board of Pensions and information has been gathered on population trends by age and geographical shift (with ethnic detailing). On the basis of this research tentative conclusions are that, we will need an average of six (6) new Ministers per year, and, those Ministers will need a training emphasis on Ministers to an aging population. Because, by 1990 our population group in ages 65 and over will increase by more than 20%.
3. **To compile, and keep current, economic cultural data related to Planning and Research:** Mr. Dale Booth, Mrs. Louise Pate, and Mr. James Jordan are sub-committee members. Information on methodologies for gathering and collating data has been requested from the General Council on Ministries through Alan Waltz. The sub-committee is involved in study of literature related to their work, including Alan Waltz Book, *Images Of The Future*, and William Ramsden's book, *Church In A Changing Society*. Other sources of basic information have been identified in: The Population Reference Bureau, The Census Bureau, The Federal Departments of Housing and Urban Development and of Labor, the Federal Reserve Board, Stanford Research Corp., and Brookings Institute.
4. **To devise listening procedures for Local Church/Annual Conference Communications:** Rev. Alf A. Eason and Rev. Tom Abney are the sub-Committee. Contact with Dr. Robert Wilson and Dr. Jack Carroll (Hartford Seminary) experts in modeling survey and evaluation instruments plus requests for information from G.C.O.M. and several Annual Conferences about procedures and instruments now in use elsewhere should produce some models for presentation at Annual Conference.

The Committee reports general findings that Arkansas will grow about 11% by 1990, perhaps more if the current water shortage across the country worsens and/or if the migration of people to the Sun-belt states continues. Also, we can expect decreases in the 15 to 19 and 20 to 25 age-groups with concomitant increases in the 25 to 45 age-group of about 18%. Children under the age of 10 will increase about 24%, and from the 10 to 15 year olds there will be a slight increase perhaps as much as 2%. These projections indicate a need for heavier planning for children and mature adults in educational, recreational, and space provisions.

The Committee will continue its work of research through a budget of \$500.00 approved by the Council on Ministries for meetings, data reproduction and processing, and expenses of research through governmental and educational agencies. And, the Committee is grateful for its opportunity to serve the Church in this work.

Board Of Pensions

1. We recommend that the Little Rock Conference participate in the Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) and the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) of the General Board of Pensions during 1982 on the following basis —

- a. Contribution base shall be the Denominational Average Compensation (DAC)
- b. Contribution rate shall be MPP, 12% of DAC, and CPP, 4.4% of DAC
- c. Annuity rate for pre-January 1, 1981, service shall be \$118 per service year
- d. Surviving spouse percentage of the formula benefit rate shall be 70%
- e. A 40 year amortization period will be used to pay the unfunded past service liability
- f. Monthly contributions to MPP/CPP shall be made through the apportionment system
- g. CPP benefits shall be supplemented with Death Benefit Plan-Plus (DBP-Plus) to 300% of DAC
- h. Participation will continue to contribute to the Death Benefit Program with the Church paying 60% and the participate 40%
- i. Every Conference member making less than the Equitable Salary can be included in the CPP at the rate of 3.4% of DAC.

2. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1706 Section 12e of the 1980 Discipline that the Sunday following Easter, April 18, 1982, be observed as Retired Minister's Day. Each pastor is urged to acquaint his or her congregation with the pension program of the Conference as part of the observance, and if possible, to use a retired minister in the Worship Service.

3. We recommend in keeping with Par. 1706 Section 4.h of the 1980 Discipline, the approval of the Annual Conference that Special Appointments shall be listed in the Conference Journal as follows: (1) With Annuity Claim (a) upon the Annual Conference or (b) upon a General Board, an Institution, or an Agency of the United Methodist Church; (2) Without Annuity claim upon this Annual Conference.

4. We recommend that the Board of Pensions pay the entire insurance premium for our retirees both for the Death Benefit Program and the Hospital and Medical Expense Program. Also, we recommend the continuance of Insurance Plan "B" which would include a death benefit for widows of ministers in an amount equal to 10% of the Average Conference Salary. In addition, we recommend that the eligible Conference and Special Conference Claimants have the voluntary portion of Medicare paid by the Conference Board of Pensions.

5. We recommend that an annual amount equal to 100% of the pension of each minister of the Little Rock Conference be designated as housing allowance.

6. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 736 Section 4 of the 1980 Discipline that there shall be organized from the membership of the Board of Pensions of the Little Rock Conference a committee to compare the records of the amount paid by each pastoral charge for support of pastors and for pension benefit purposes. Computing the proportional distribution thereof and keeping a permanent record of defaults of the ministers in the

Conference who have failed to observe the provision in Par. 726 Section 4 pertaining to proportional payment; and shall render annually to each minister and Charge in default a statement of amounts in default for that and preceding years. In event of default by any Pastoral Charge after the notification of the committee, liens shall be filed against future pensions and the names of the churches and ministers along with the amount in default shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

7. We request the Secretary of the Annual Conference to print in the Minister's Service Record in the Journal, one column stating "Years of Pension Claim on the Little Rock Conference," and another stating "Total Service Years in the Ministry."

8. The Board of Pensions wishes to thank the members of the churches of the Little Rock Conference for the support given the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund allowing its successful completion this year.

9. A list of annuitants and pension payments for the year 1980 is available in the Conference Treasurer's Office from Earnestine Martin.

Little Rock Annual Conference Of The United Methodist Church North Arkansas Annual Conference Of The United Methodist Church

Joint resolution relating to the priority of the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas:

WHEREAS, the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas was organized pursuant to authority granted by the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences; and

WHEREAS, the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas is a service agency of the United Methodist in Arkansas in stewardship through bequests in wills, trusts, special gifts, annuities, life insurance, memorials and other forms of current or deferred giving; and

WHEREAS, the overwhelming financial need of both conferences now and for some time to come is in the area of pensions; and

WHEREAS, the pension apportionment paid by the churches of both conferences will continue to rise with the rise in denominational salary and/or rise in the past service annuity rate; and

WHEREAS, the only viable way to contain the apportionment or to reduce it is to pay off as much of the unfunded obligation as possible;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

That the board of directors of Methodist Foundation of Arkansas will instruct its executive director to spend a major portion of his time in support of the pension programs of both conferences for two years and will review such directions at the end of two years.

Resolution Relating To Rental/Housing Allowances For Retired Ministers Of This Conference

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church has and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

WHEREAS, the practice of The United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

WHEREAS, pensions paid to retired ordained or licensed ministers of The United Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the Little Rock Annual Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received during the year of 1982 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired ordained or licensed minister of The United Methodist Church who is or was a member of the Little Rock Annual Conference at the time of his or her retirement;
2. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference or institution of The United Methodist Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension.

NOTE:

The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-280, 1971 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a "rental allowance" is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities."

Committee On Insurance

A. Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program

Little Rock Conference has the Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program, (HMEP), provided by the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church. Travelers Insurance Company is the underwriter. The General Board of Pensions defines policies regarding eligibility and enrollment. These policies are recorded in the 1979 Journal.

Premium rates will become effective July 1, 1981, as follows:

Benefits paid by HMEP for those under age 65 are outlined in the 1979 Journal, including a resolution about accident coverage, with additional information regarding nursery charges for newborn infants appearing in the 1980 Journal.

Benefits for persons 65 and over change annually according to Medicare guidelines. Presently the following is applicable for Medicare enrollees:

In-Patient Hospital Services: Full payment of \$204 Part A Medicare deductible; full payment of \$51 per day from 61st through 90th day; full payment of semi-private and miscellaneous charges from 91st through 120th day beyond payment made from Medicare Lifetime Reserve days; then 80% of reasonable charges from the 121st day up to a \$250,000 lifetime maximum.

Skilled Nursing Facility: Full payment of \$25.50 per day from the 21st through the 100th day.

Physicians and Other Medical Services: 20% of reasonable charges after a \$60 calendar year Medicare Part B deductible. You must pay the \$60 Part B deductible.

Prescription Drugs — Full-Time Private Duty Nursing: 80% of reasonable charges after calendar year deductible of \$50, up to a \$250,000 lifetime maximum. You must pay the \$50 deductible.

Geographical Limits: Worldwide coverage.

Important Information Concerning Medicare Enrollment: Any minister who will reach

his 65th birthday when he is still serving in a full-time capacity, and not drawing Social Security, should apply three months before his 65th birthday at his local Social Security office for Medicare. Should a minister's wife reach age 65 before the minister, she should apply for Medicare at the local Social Security office. This applies to those who are eligible and wish to participate in Medicare.

It is each person's responsibility to secure his or her own Medicare coverage.

For those age 65 and older, HMEP provides coverage which complements Medicare.

Should persons have questions regarding insurance payments, after filing a claim, they should contact the secretary, Mrs. Ernestine Martin, at the Office of Finance and Management.

B. Comprehensive Protection Program and Death Benefit Program

Under the benefit plan adopted by the 1980 General Conference, the Death Benefit Program, (DBP), will become a part of the Comprehensive Protection Plan, (CPP), effective January 1, 1982. In CPP, the benefits will be figured using the Denominational Average Compensation, (DAC), instead of the Conference average salary. The following table indicates death benefits in CPP:

The DAC for 1982 is not known presently. However, the General Board of Pensions is expecting it to be approximately \$17,000.

Educational benefits, and benefits paid on the death of a spouse, surviving spouse, or child under 18 will be presented in printed form at the Annual Conference session.

The premium cost for CPP will be included in the Pension and Benefit fund apportionment.

Since the CPP will not give us the death benefit coverage we have presently, we recommend that our Conference adopt what is referred to as DBP Plus, (DBP+). The premium for DBP+ will be paid by the minister and church. It will not be a part of the Pension and Benefit Fund apportionment. DBP+ will increase CPP coverage by 150%. This will increase our present coverage. The premium cost for 1982 will be approximately \$142.

Lay employees presently covered will continue to be in DBP, but will not be covered by CPP. Their premium payments will continue as they have been.

C. Annual Conference Policies

1. Premium Payments

a. The local church, or charge, to which a minister is appointed shall provide 60% of the premium cost for individual or family (whichever is applicable) HMEP coverage. Also, the local church or charge shall provide 60% of the DBP+ premium.

b. The local church, or charge, shall provide 60% of the premium cost for HMEP and DBP for eligible local church lay employees.

c. The Conference Board or Agency responsible for its own budget will provide 60% of the premium cost for either individual or family coverage, whichever is applicable, for ministers under special appointment with annuity credit on the Conference, and for lay

employees.

d. The Conference Board of Pensions pays the full HMEP premium and DBP + premium for Conference Claimants.

e. All eligible persons holding an appointment from the Bishop are expected to participate in the HMEP and DBP +. When an eligible person is offered HMEP and DBP +, and the person chooses not to participate in either program, he or she shall state this choice in writing to the Committee secretary.

f. If an enrolled person fails to pay premiums for two consecutive quarters, the secretary shall notify the insured by registered mail that he/she will be terminated within fifteen (15) days of the letter's date unless full payment is received in that fifteen day period. Any exceptions to this policy must be approved by the Insurance Committee. A copy of this letter shall be sent to the appropriate District Superintendent as notification that termination is being considered. Should there be a hardship, the District Superintendent should convey such information to the Insurance Committee. The District Superintendent shall be advised of any considered change in insured's status.

D. Administration of Insurance Program

Administration costs of our Insurance program do not come from premium payments. That cost is underwritten by receipts from money the Committee has invested. Many Conferences add 2% to 3% to premium costs for administration purposes.

E. Additional Coverage

The Committee has received requests that we examine the possibility of additional HMEP coverage (i.e., dental and annual physicals). The Committee has secured premium rates for the additional coverage and will present them at Annual Conference.

Board Of Ordained Ministry

Report No. 1

Policy And Program

- I. The Little Rock Conference Board Of Ordained Ministry proposes to work strictly within the framework of the current Book Of Discipline of the United Methodist Church.
- II. The elected officers of the Board are: chairperson, vice chairperson, secretary, registrar, associate registrar, and candidacy registrar.
- III. The executive committee of the Board are the elected officers, chairperson of the Continuing Education Committee, and chairperson of the Conference Relations Committee.
- IV. The Board is divided into groups of members who will serve through 1984 and members who will serve through 1988.
- V. The Board shall meet prior to the opening of school, at mid-year, and at Annual Conference, and on call of the chairperson.
- VI. The Board shall have representatives on each District Committee of the Ordained Ministry (in accordance with Par. 723.1e.) In consultation with the district superintendents, the chairperson shall appoint a member of the Board to serve on each committee.
- VII. The Board's sources of income shall be:
 - A. A designated amount from the Conference Council On Ministries.
 - B. A designated amount from the Council On Finance And Administration.
 - C. Twenty-five percent of the amount collected from local churches for the Ministerial Education Fund.
 - D. Gifts, bequests, interests, and repayment of loans.
- VIII. The Board shall maintain a scholarship aid fund for ministerial training as follows:
 - A. For those in the course of study above the local pastor's license.
 1. Assistance in courses of study schools.

- a. The cost of required textbooks for each year of the course of study.
- b. The cost of tuition or registration fees, and of room and board while attending the course of study schools. Because of limited funds, transportation expenses cannot be paid.
- 2. Assistance in the correspondence course.
 - a. Payment of fees.
 - b. The cost of required textbooks for each course; the enrollees are to purchase the required books and be reimbursed by the registrar.

Before enrolling in the Advanced Course of Study, one shall follow all the steps and fulfill all the requirements as outlined in Par. 416. Furthermore, one shall enter into the Advanced Course Of Study work only in consultation with the Board. This procedure must be followed in order to receive the support of the Board, including financial support. This will become effective June 1, 1981.

B. For students from the Little Rock Annual Conference preparing for the effective ministry in the United Methodist Church who:

- 1. Have satisfactorily completed at least enough semester hours of college credit to qualify for classification as a junior.
- 2. Are enrolled in a college, university, or seminary approved by the University Senate of the United Methodist Church.
- 3. Shall meet with the Executive Committee of the Conference Board Of Ordained Ministry prior to making their selection of a seminary.
- 4. Hold a current certificate of candidacy for the ministry in the United Methodist Church, be enrolled in a seminary, or be a Probationary Member of the Little Rock Conference.
- 5. By August 1, make application to the registrar of the Board for the fall semester giving all information requested and authorizing regular grade reports to this Board's registrar from the school's registrar including a transcript of credits at the end of the year. By January 15, make application for second semester. Applications must be requested.

C. The Board may set a maximum amount of scholarship aid per year per recipient, but assistance will be determined for each individual on the basis of requirements or needs.

- 1. Scholarship aid for summer sessions will be granted on the basis of the number of hours taken based on full-time load for full semester credit.
- 2. The maximum scholarship aid for college students shall not exceed two years.
- 3. Additional emergency scholarship aid will be granted at the Board's discretion to students in the following categories, requesting and making application, who:
 - a. Begin preparation for the ministry later in life with pressing financial responsibilities.
 - b. Have severe health circumstances.
 - c. Come from disadvantaged economic backgrounds.
- 4. The maximum amount of emergency scholarship aid per person per year shall be equal to one semester's grant for scholarship aid. The Executive Committee must approve the emergency scholarship aid.

IX. The Board shall encourage participation in continuing education programs by ministers of the Little Rock Conference. Pastors are encouraged to participate in at least one continuing education experience annually (Par. 423.1.) The following shall serve as policy guidelines:

- A. Each eligible individual applicant may receive up to \$150.00 annually, if an equal amount is matched by the church and/or pastor. These amounts shall include only projected expenses for tuitions, books, room and board. The matching requirement shall be waived for those who receive less than \$4,000.00 above the conference minimum salary.
- B. Persons seeking financial aid for continuing education shall secure an application

form from the chairperson of the Committee on Continuing Education, Mike Campbell.

- C. No person shall be given more than \$150.00 each calendar year for continuing education.
- D. In hardship cases, ministers can apply to the continuing education committee for help to attend Pastor's School. Such help will be granted only after other avenues for aid have been exhausted.
- E. No financial aid is available for Ministers' Week.
- F. Requests for continuing education funds shall be directed to the chairperson of the Committee on Continuing Education, Mike Campbell.
- X. The Board shall give assistance in a reasonable amount for physical examinations for persons to be admitted as associate, probationary, or full members.

Requests And Recommendations

- I. As a first step to ministry, **inquiring candidates** shall enroll for studies for a certificate of candidacy for ministry (in accordance with Par. 404) with the Department Of Ministry, Division Of Ordained Ministry and through Charles Walthall, Candidacy Registrar.
- II. We assume our Conference's share of financial responsibility for the Arkansas Pastor's School.
- III. The Council On Finance And Administration of the Annual Conference is requested to grant:
 - A. An appropriation of a percentage from conference benevolences, based on the Board's financial needs that are not met by other sources.
 - B. An apportionment to local churches for the Ministerial Education Fund.
- IV. We express our appreciation for the support given the Ministerial Education Fund by the churches of the Annual Conference. We report to you that the local churches of our conference gave 93% of the amount apportioned for the Ministerial Education Fund in 1980. We urge every church to give full support to the Ministerial Education Fund for the remainder of 1981 and in 1982.
- V. We recommend a minimum of two weeks vacation and a minimum of one week for continuing education during each calendar year for every pastor.
- VI. We request that all churches make available funds for continuing education for their pastors. Such funds should not be considered salary and would be available for use in continuing education only.
- VII. We urge every minister to obtain a copy of the book, **The Christian As Minister**, by Richard A. Hunt. This resource will prove fruitful for persons who are in the midst of making a decision in regards to professional Christian ministry.
- VIII. At least 1980 session of the Annual Conference, the conference referred a study of a code of ethics for ministers to the Board. After careful consideration and discussion in each of the districts of the conference as well as discussion within the Board Of Ordained Ministry, we, the Board, do not feel that a written code of ethics would be advisable.
- IX. For the summer of 1981, the following events are available:
 - A. In cooperation with the North Arkansas Conference, we will sponsor the School for Local Pastor's License. This will be August 3-7 at Hendrix College.
 - B. Pastor's School will be at Hendrix College from August 24 to 27. Dr. Horace Weaver will lead a class on the relation of the Old Testament to the New Testament. Dr. Hilbert Berger is speaking on methods and procedures for Christian stewardship. The third course for Pastors' School will be one by Dr. Shirley Switzer entitled **Crisis Ministry: Women in Crisis**. The pastor of First United Methodist Church of Dallas, Texas, Walker L. Railey will be the preacher for the week.
 - C. Retreat for probationary members of the Little Rock Annual Conference who are serving under a full-time appointment to be held June 30, July 1 and 2 at the Camp Mitchell Retreat Center on Mt. Petit Jean. Members of the Board of Ordained

Ministry and other clerical members of our annual conference will help the probationers prepare for effective local church ministry in the Little Rock Annual Conference.

Cooperative Parish Ministries

Organization and Policy

The Committee on the Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries, authorized and elected by the 1980 Annual Conferences, has been duly organized. The officers are:

Chairperson — Louis (Biff) Averitt

Vice Chairperson — William P. Connell

Secretary — Keenan Williams

The Committee recommends the following revisions in the Arkansas Area Policy on Cooperative Parish Ministries:

1. Section VI. Staff and Appointments, Paragraph B, add number 14 to read "A coordinator shall be designated for preparatory phase efforts."

2. Section IX. Committee on Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries change to "Area Committee on Cooperative Parish Ministries" and thereafter in Section IX wherever the name of the committee appears.

3. Section IX, Paragraph A, Number 6 add "to assist the Area Director in developing a budget for the Area Office of Cooperative Parish Ministries and, as needed . . ." so that the paragraph reads: "to review annually the policy statement relative to the job description of the Area Director, and all other procedures relative to parish development, to assist the Area Director in developing a budget for the Area Office of Cooperative Parish Ministries and, as needed, to make recommendations to the Annual Conferences or their boards and agencies."

The committee requests that the Area policy, as revised, be published in the 1981 Little Rock Conference Journal, and that the revisions to the Area policy be published in the 1981 North Arkansas Conference Journal.

Parish Development

Cooperative Parish Ministries is a developmental process that occurs in phases: preparatory, probe, structuring, operating, and evaluating.

Organized or structured parishes are:

- (1) **The Corning Parish**, consisting of churches at Corning, Knobel, and New Home, in the Paragould District. The Director is Dubois Pettit.
- (2) **The John Wesley Parish**, consisting of Hunter Memorial, Mt. Pleasant and Mark's Chapel United Methodist Churches in Little Rock. Roger Armstrong is the Director and Charlie McAdoo is Assistant Director.

Probe Phase Cooperative Ministries are in process in the following:

- (1) **Three Rivers Cooperative Ministry**: Glenwood, Grant's Chapel, Mt. Ida, Oden, Point Cedar, Norman, Daisey, Langley, and St. Paul United Methodist Churches. Keenan Williams is the Director.
- (2) **Carroll-Madison Probe**: Berryville, Shiloh, Eureka Springs, Green Forest, Huntsville, and Presley Chapel United Methodist Churches; Chris Cooper, Director.

Given our short history, most cooperative ministries in Arkansas are in "Preparatory" phase.

Preparatory phase efforts for 1980-81 involved 166 churches and more than 100 clergy and staff in training, interpretation, and exploring ways in which churches can be strengthened through cooperation.

Seven clusters of churches have decided to move from preparatory into further exploration of cooperation ministries at the probe phase level. Probe phase efforts and directors effective at these sessions of the Annual Conferences are the following:

Cooperative Parish Ministries: Our Style Of Mission And Ministry

As the Area Committee on Cooperative Parish Ministries has listened to the churches in 1979 and in 1980, the definite need we have heard is to move forward with a common theme and sense of direction for the United Methodist Churches in Arkansas. Toward this end, we

offer the following theme as a way to get a handle upon being and doing ministry together effectively:

“Cooperative Parish Ministries: Our Style Of Mission And Ministry”

This is not a new program nor is it a new type of structure, for many of us have this as our style already. The purpose of setting this theme as an area emphasis is to give an intentional focus to working together at all levels of the Church as the norm. The unique strength of Methodism has been and still is its connectional system of unity.

For several years we have found ourselves trying to get a handle on evaluating what we are doing as ministers and churches. We have said and believe that strengthening the local parish church is critical at this time. To help the local churches, at the District and Annual Conference levels, can only take place when we work together cooperatively to provide ways that churches may serve together for growth and service.

By intentionally focusing our attention upon this style and stance of ministry, through cooperation at every level of the Church and its work, we can evaluate our programs and our ministry in terms of how well they move us toward mutual support. Without mutual support, competition and envy occur. The non-cooperative stance, “My ministry and My program,” can become a source of distrust and even conflict. These are negative results brought on by the lack of a sense of direction, and can be removed by the common bond of sharing a caring and cooperative style of ministry and mission.

Cooperation produces a sense of team work and a genuine appreciation for each other as persons of worth with a contribution to make. We seek to support this team building process and to oppose things which would separate and divide us.

The following two-phase approach to working together seeks to demonstrate how we can use our present structure to effect Cooperative Parish Ministries as our style in Mission and ministry.

Cooperative Parish Ministries Policy Statement

I. Introduction

The small membership church is the rule, rather than the exception, of Arkansas United Methodism. Three-fourths of our local churches have memberships of two hundred (200) or less, and half of them have one hundred (100) members or fewer. Most of these churches have never had access to full time pastoral care. The charges of which they are a part are frequently re-aligned. Often, clergy appointed to small membership churches do not remain in that appointment longer than two years. Our small membership churches are often isolated from the program and resources of the annual conference and the general church. This means that three-fourths of the local churches in the Arkansas Area are hindered in fulfilling their ministry and mission.

We must find some way to strengthen our small membership churches, for United Methodism in Arkansas is only as effective a witness to the gospel as its individual congregations. These words from the Book of Discipline express well why it is crucial that small membership churches in the Arkansas Area be strengthened for involvement in mission and ministry in their communities and the world: “The people of God are the Church made visible in the world. It is they who must convince the world of the reality of the gospel or leave it unconvinced. There can be no evasion or delegation of this responsibility; the Church is either faithful as a witnessing and serving community, or it loses its vitality and its impact on an unbelieving world” (para. 106).

The Area Committee on Parish Development was convened in 1977 to find some means of addressing the needs of our small membership churches and to provide every United Methodist Church and every United Methodist person in the Arkansas Area access to full time pastoral leadership and maximum opportunity for involvement in mission and ministry. The Journals of both the North Arkansas and Little Rock Annual Conferences reflect the action supporting cooperative parish development as one way of empowering the Church in Arkansas. Bishop Kenneth W. Hicks has provided creative leadership in this innovative style of ministry of Arkansas.

II. Cooperation: A Study of Ministry

Ministry as a lifestyle of servanthood is a way of relating to persons, to which all Christians are called. Ministry is dependent upon a nurturing community of prayer and celebration, learning and action for its faithfulness to the gospel. In order for ministry to have "vitality and impact on an unbelieving world," our concerns are:

1. To enable the local church to carry out its primary task within the life of the congregation, the community, and the world; and
2. To provide adequate support for a more effective ministry, clergy and lay.

The 1976 *Book of Discipline*, para. 206, provides for the development of cooperative parish ministries:

1. "Local churches, with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, may enhance their witness to each other and to the world by showing forth the love of Christ through forms of mutual cooperation.
2. Annual Conferences shall consider organization of cooperative parish ministries through a program of parish development. Parish development is an intentional process of enabling congregations and church related organizations in a defined geographic area to develop coordinated church program and ministry."

The primary purpose for the formation of cooperative ministries is more effective ministry and mission in the local church. The local church is the basic unit of Christian Faith and, therefore, of primary importance. Effective ministry in the local church means clergy and laity supporting and enabling each other, working together in the community and the world, in the name of Christ our Lord.

Every local church, regardless of size or situation in Arkansas can both receive and give in the parish formation process. Each congregation is a unique variety of persons with strengths that can benefit and enhance the ministry of other congregations and with needs that can benefit and enhance the ministry of other congregations and with needs that can be met through cooperation with nearby communities of faith.

Decisions about involvement in cooperative ministries are finally the decisions of the churches themselves. However, the parish formation process may be initiated from the district or annual conference as well as the local church.

The sole intent of parish development is to assist each congregation to attain its full potential of ministry through voluntary involvement and cooperation of the members of the congregation always being sensitive to the preservation of the identity of the local church. The small membership church, like the larger membership church, in rural or urban setting has much to offer to the whole Church; thus, to strengthen the connection is mutually to strengthen the entire Body of Christ.

III. The Development of Cooperative Parish Ministries

The process of parish formation develops through at least five phases: (1) preparatory, (2) probe, (3) structuring, (4) operating, and (5) evaluation. Such development takes a number of years and involves long-term commitment from clergy and laity to this style of ministry. Without a sufficient period of time, usually a minimum of three years, the parish will not have a chance to develop effectively.

The importance of the Preparatory Phase cannot be overstressed. It is a period of time, usually one year, in which the following considerations are involved:

1. Geographical determinations of "target areas" for potential parish development sites;
2. Demographic studies of population, density, make-up, vital statistics, etc.;
3. Studies of local church membership, needs, finances, etc.;
4. Studies of community needs;
5. Determination of boundaries — school districts, trade areas, municipal and county lines;
6. Involvement of laity and clergy within the target areas at every level of decision-making and action;
7. Intensive interpretation and clarification of cooperative parish ministries to churches involved.

Careful examination of the potential situation and extensive communication among clergy and laity about future possibilities for the mission and ministry of the Church will lay secure foundations upon which cooperative parishes can develop. Hasty or premature decisions and/or actions can result in mistakes that could jeopardize the process.

There are seven forms of cooperative parish ministries which are delineated in the 1976 **Book of Discipline**, para. 206. The particular form which any cooperating group of churches takes will be determined by the churches themselves.

IV. Determination of Parish Composition and Location

There must be a mutual agreement between clergy and laity, based upon careful analysis of the situation, for the cooperative parish to develop. A willingness to continue the process is essential, trusting that more meaningful ministry for all persons can be developed through cooperation. The involvement of the District Superintendent is essential. The consultative services of the Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries shall be used to determine the potential for and development of cooperative ministries.

The Bishop and the District Superintendents in consultation with each local church have the final responsibility to determine which local churches will be encouraged to organize cooperative ministries, since district and charge lines as well as the appointment of pastoral leadership are the responsibilities of the Bishop and Cabinet. (**Discipline**, para. 515.2)

V. An Arkansas Area Cabinet Policy on Parish Development

The members of the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conference Cabinets do hereby commit ourselves in sacred covenant to "shoulder the burdens, share the risks, and celebrate the joys" of all churches within the broader scope of "full ministry" for all persons, and further, this commitment shall find expression through a genuine exercise of a policy of cooperative parish development.

We believe that through a long-range ministry of cooperative parish development we can help all local churches to be more effective, individually and together.

We believe that the unique nature of each congregation, large and small, will enable all potentially to benefit each other in the commonness of our calling and mission.

And, we believe that through cooperative parish development every church in the Conference and in the Area can be related to a full time qualified minister.

We encourage all pastors and all churches of the Little Rock, and North Arkansas Conferences to prayerfully consider their opportunities through present and potential parish arrangement; and, we pledge to support as the Cabinets, a continuity in appointments to Parish arrangements that will undergird both the churches and the pastors who assume responsibility for this vital area of ministry.

VI. Staff and Appointments

A. A parish/probe staff is a group of persons, clergy and lay, who share a common ministry within a defined geographic area characterized by the following ingredients:

1. Working toward agreed upon goals
2. Team ministry
3. Mutual support and accountability
4. Shared skills and interests
5. Appointment to a multiple-charge parish or probe staff
6. Commitment to a minimum of three years in a cooperative parish situation.

B. Given the nature of cooperative team ministries described above, the style of appointment making must be characterized by the following:

1. The type and number of staff persons will be determined by careful study of needs, resources, potential and goals of the cooperative parish situation.
2. The Pastor/Parish Committee or other official parish group will assist in the determination of staff needs.
3. Each cooperative parish ministries staff must have a Director who shall exercise administrative and supervisory responsibilities in addition to his/her local church responsibilities. The Director shall be appointed by the Bishop.

4. Persons shall be appointed by the Bishop to a "staff" or "parish" in addition to a "charge" thus making appointive responsibilities clear.
5. Training for parish staff members in team building, conflict management, program planning, and church administration shall be required. Such training is the responsibility of the Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries.
6. Evaluation of the parish Director and/or staff shall be the responsibility of the District Superintendent in consultation with the Parish Council or other official group.
7. The Director of the parish or probe staff shall be consulted in the selection of all persons on the staff.
8. Prospective staff members shall be consulted prior to staff appointment and shall be given opportunity for examination of expectations and goals; covenanting with the Director, team members, District Superintendent, regarding responsibilities; discussion of working relationship; and arrangement of housing, salary, and other appropriate items.
9. Appointments to cooperative parish situations shall be given priority with respect to both time in the appointive process and personnel. The cooperative parish situations shall be removed from the regular sequence of appointments first and given special consideration, with the right person for the right staff.
10. The local church Pastor/Parish Relations Committee and the Parish Council shall be consulted prior to finalization of appointment.
11. The Cabinet shall coordinate with the Commission on Equitable Salaries, the Board of Global Ministries, the congregation, and other resources in providing funding for parish staff.
12. The need for additions to and changes in parish staff personnel should be communicated to the Cabinet prior to the beginning of the appointive process, not later than February 1.
13. Where feasible, the Cabinet in consultation with the congregations involved, will form cooperative parish ministries that are inclusive according to Disciplinary guidelines.
14. A coordinator shall be designated for preparatory phase efforts.

VII. Procedure: An Important Ingredient

The following steps are important to insure that responsible and accountable cooperative parish ministries will be formed:

1. Choosing the potential parish area carefully.
2. Developing the staff and parish to meet known needs.
3. Implementing a careful planning process:
 - a. Working through an understanding of mission, purpose, and ministry;
 - b. Identifying human needs which emerge in the situation;
 - c. Identifying resources to meet these needs;
 - d. Developing alternate ways of using these resources to meet these needs;
 - e. Deciding which alternative to use;
 - f. Planning in detail;
 - g. Implementing the plan;
 - h. Monitoring, evaluating and revising;
 - i. Praying.

VIII. Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries

- A. The task of the Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries shall include the following responsibilities:

1. Development of Program and Ministry in Cooperating Groups of Churches

Purpose:
To cooperate with Parish staff by enabling cooperating groups of churches to identify, design, resource and actualize the things they wish to do.

To relate to the Conference Committees on Parish/Community

Development Board of Global Ministries for programmatic purposes.

Examples of implementation:

Develop a process to identify what is important to all the churches in cooperating group.

Help churches determine how they can best work together to achieve desired results.

Aid cooperating churches in gathering resources needed for the ministries they plan, e.g. financial grants, resource persons, materials, etc.

2. Consultation and Training Program

Purposes:

To help pastors, district superintendents, and laity understand in detail Cooperative Parish Development and how its principles apply to the geographic area in which cooperating groups of churches minister.

To gain a comprehensive view of areas being served by staff teams.

To devise strategy for the forming of cooperating groups of churches that are centers for mission and ministry.

To build a "team relationship" among all persons professionally involved in the Cooperative Parish Development effort.

4. Site Identification and Selection

Purpose:

To identify sites with reasonable chances for good experiences in working cooperatively and which will enhance the total cooperative parish development effort.

Examples of implementation:

Develop with the cabinets a "time line" for the initiation of additional probe staffs.

Gather and prepare the necessary data (population, growth patterns, etc.) for potential areas for the establishment of cooperating groups of churches.

To define appropriate geographic areas.

Develop procedures for working with appropriate conference structures, bodies, regarding changes in supports, e.g., equitable salaries.

Develop a process to prepare churches for the arrival of probe staff.

5. Strengthening of Ethnic Minority Local Churches

Purpose:

To utilize the tool of consultation and training; parish staff identification; and site identification and selection to enable the ministries of our Ethnic Minority Local Churches.

Examples of implementation:

In consultation with the EMLC Task Forces, develop a time line for appointing probe staffs and identifying sites inclusive of Black churches and ethnic minority persons.

6. Communications Regarding Cooperating Groups of Churches

Purpose:

To inform laity and clergy about what is happening in cooperative parish development and why.

To share the discovery of new strengths with other small membership churches.

Examples of implementation:

Use Arkansas Methodist

Train designated "communicators" in each cooperating group of churches.

Develop presentations and displays at district and annual conferences.

Develop presentations on Cooperative Parish Development to educate persons in potential probe areas.

7. Support Network for Persons Serving in Cooperative Parishes**Purposes:**

- Further the training of staff members.
- Sharing of strategies and successes in operating parishes.
- Discussion of problems, needs, and resources.

Examples of implementation:

- Retreats for new and continuing staff and lay leadership.
- Regular gatherings of those involved in cooperating groups of churches.

8. Evaluation**Purposes:**

- To develop means by which the Cooperative Parish Development process may be annually evaluated.
- To provide methods/instruments for evaluation of cooperative parish ministry personnel.

9. Theological Interpretation**Purpose:**

- To provide theological rationale and interpretation on the nature of the church and its ministry, especially as it relates to Cooperative Parish Ministries.

B. Accountability

1. The Area Director shall be related and responsible to the Bishop's Office for administrative purposes.
2. To the Committee on the Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries.
3. To the Area Network on Cooperative Parish Ministries.

C. Cabinets

1. The Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries shall be a member of the expanded cabinets of the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences.
2. Shall provide information to the cabinets on parish needs, problems, resources, personnel and staff suggestions.
3. Shall work in cooperation with the District Superintendents in the development of cooperative parish ministries and shall always consult with the District Superintendent regarding work in particular churches.
4. Shall be informed of date and nature of all Cabinet meetings.

D. Support Structures

Support structures are necessary to ministry both in and beyond the local church. The following support structures will be available to the Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries:

1. Area Committee on Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries
2. Expanded Cabinets
3. Network of persons with similar job descriptions and interests
4. Area Network on Cooperative Parish Development
 - a. To provide a Human Support Base for persons serving in marginalized or cooperative situations;
 - b. To provide a forum for discussion and exchange of information on factors or issues influencing ministry and mission in small membership churches;
 - c. To provide a means by which long-range planning in ministry and mission can occur;
 - d. To provide a means of advocacy which can influence those structures, churches, leaders, on behalf of more effective and just forms of ministry.
5. Continuing Education

E. Conference Councils on Ministries

The Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries shall be an ex officio member without vote of the two Conference Councils on Ministries for purposes of program development and coordination related to parish development.

F. Location

The Office of Cooperative Parish Ministries shall be located at United Methodist Headquarters, 715 Center Street, Little Rock, AR.

G. Resources

The Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries shall provide resources in the field of parish development for the use of churches, ministers, and parishes of the Arkansas Area. Such resource tools shall include:

1. An Arkansas Area Parish Development newsletter
2. Guidelines in cooperative parish organization
3. Study instruments
4. Evaluation instruments
5. List of resource persons skilled in parish development
6. List of sample models of cooperative ministry parishes for study and on-site visitation
7. Parish development audio-visual resource list
8. Notebook for parish development

IX. Area Committee on Cooperative Parish Ministries

The "Area Committee on Cooperative Parish Ministries" shall oversee, evaluate, assist and support the work of that office. The Committee, adapted from para. 758, 1976 **Book of Discipline**, shall be comprised as follows:

A. Function

The function of the Committee on Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries shall be:

1. To support the Area Committee on Cooperative Parish Ministries in the fulfillment of his/her responsibilities outlined in the policy statement.
2. To be available for counsel
3. To keep the Area Director advised concerning conditions with the Area as they affect relations between the Area Director, the people, the two conferences and their agencies.
4. To establish a clearly understood process for observing the Area Director in his/her ministry with direct evaluation and feedback in an annual consultation and appraisal of work of the Area Director and the Office of Cooperative Ministries. The Committee shall serve in an advisory relationship with the Bishop of the area.
5. To interpret to the people of the Area and to the conference boards and agencies the nature and function of the Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries.
6. To review annually the policy statement, job description of the Area Director, and all other procedures relative to parish development, to assist the Area Director in developing a budget for the Area Office of Cooperative Parish Ministries, and as needed, to make recommendations to the Annual Conference or their boards and agencies.

B. Membership

Attention shall be given to inclusiveness in committee membership with regards to race and sex at least two of the elected members shall be representatives of ethnic minority local church. The Committee shall be composed of:

1. The Arkansas Area Bishop
2. Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries.
3. Two clergy; one from each conference serving in cooperative ministries.
4. Two clergy at large members, one from each conference.
5. One Cabinet representative from each conference.
6. Four lay persons (two from each conference) in cooperative development situations.
7. Four lay persons (two from each conference) from urban and rural churches.
8. One person from each Parish and Community Development Committee

- selected by the conference Board of Global Ministries.
- 9. One advisory member, Office of Town and Country, National Division, Board of Global Ministries.
 - 10. Two seminary faculty members (advisory only) chosen from two of the following: St. Paul School of Theology, Perkins School of Theology, Iliff School of Theology, Candler School of Theology, Duke Divinity School.
 - 11. One representative from each conference commission on Equitable Salaries.
 - 12. Seminary Registrar from each conference Board of Ordained Ministry.
 - 13. Area staff person responsible for the Ethnic Minority Local Church.
- C. Selection
- Except for those persons who hold membership by virtue of office, the members shall be selected by the regular nominating/electing procedure of each Annual Conference. The Committee shall be authorized to utilize advisory members who have expertise in an area of special need.
- D. Meeting
- The Committee shall meet at least annually and upon call of the Area Director and/or the Chairperson of the committee or Bishop of the area.
- E. Officers
- The Committee shall elect a chairperson, vice-chairperson, and a secretary for the quadrennium.
- 1. Executive Committee: These officers and the Director shall constitute the Executive Committee. In the interim between regularly scheduled meetings the Executive Committee shall be authorized to act on behalf of the Area Committee on the Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries.

Review and Evaluation Committee

In accordance with the functions of the committee, we have performed a review and an evaluation of the Conference Council on Ministries, Boards, and Agencies, etc. We noted some weaknesses for consideration:

In the area of "Local Church Stewardship" it was felt that too little was being done which results in inadequate monetary resources for local church and conference programs. The committee recommends a higher priority be given to the promotion of stewardship and in increased funding for the Conference Council Committee on Stewardship.

In the area of "Local Church and Education and Age-Level Ministries," it was noted that attention needs to be devoted to young adult and adult ministries.

The Committee reviewed the job analysis of our conference employed staff and had one recommendation. We recommend that an Area Associate Director of Ethnic Minority Local Church be named by the cabinets of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences with salary and expenses being equally divided and the appointment to be effective at the close of the 1981 sessions.

A report from the Commission on the Status of the Role of Women, dated 4-4-81, was reviewed, and it was the consensus of the Committee that the Annual Conference should move as expeditiously as possible in meeting the mandate of the 1980 General Conference regarding representation on all boards, commissions, and committees on a one-third lay, one-third lay women, and one-third clergy basis.

It is recommended that beginning June 1, 1981, each District Council on Ministries shall have a member from the Commission on the Status and Role of Women as a member of that Council until a formal change of structure can be effected.

A proposal to provide for District Lay Leaders to be members of the Annual Conference was discussed and it was the consensus of the Committee that membership for these persons should be granted immediately following consideration of membership for Diaconal Ministers if additional lay positions are available.

It is recommended that the Review and Evaluation Committee consider the compensation received by the ministers of our Conference to determine the most appropriate method this information might be given in light of the tax laws and recommendations of the General Church. A part of this study should include how the information be reported to the Annual Conference through the salary sheets and work sheets of the District Superintendents.

Policy Statement

Equitable Salary And Mission Salary Supplement

Equitable Salary Guidelines

All requests for Equitable Salary grants shall be reviewed before grants for mission supplement are considered. Equitable Salary needs shall have prior claim on available funds.

- I. The Commission shall recommend to the Annual Conference the amount for Equitable Salary support to begin on January 1st.

The Commission shall recommend the maximum amount of Equitable Salary monies that a charge may receive (Para. 935.10). This amount shall be effective on January 1st.

The maximum amount of Equitable Salary support for:

June, 1981 — December, 1981 shall be \$1,800.00; From January 1982 — December, 1982 shall be \$2,200.00.

- II. The Minimum Salary for a pastor approved by the Annual Conference for the 1981-'82 year shall be:

	June-Dec., 1981	Jan.-Dec., 1982
Full Time	\$11,200.00	\$12,000.00
Resident Student	\$10,000.00	\$10,000.00
Non-Resident Student	\$ 8,000.00	\$ 8,000.00

- III. Where a charge sets more than the minimum requirement of \$250.00, the pastor will be allowed to receive the benefit of the increase for that year provided total support does not exceed minimum salary. No pastor shall suffer a loss of income through the next session of the Annual Conference due to the failure of the charge to meet the minimum requirements.
- IV. To encourage charges to reach full Equitable Salary support, a charge will be given credit for any annual increase that is in excess of \$250.00, and the pastor shall be allowed to receive an amount equal to one-half of said increase: total support not to exceed the minimum salary set by Annual Conference.
- V. In the event of insufficient funds to meet all claims, each charge shall share proportionately from the funds available.
- VI. The Commission shall report the amounts paid during the fiscal year to each charge and minister.
- VII. The above plan of distribution of funds be made effective June 1, 1981.
- VIII. **Equitable Salary Applications and Grants**
 1. Every church and/or charge shall submit a proposed budget in writing. Copies to the Commission through the District Superintendent by January 1.
 2. Each church and/or charge shall conduct a financial campaign and report the results to the Commission through the District Superintendent by January 1.
 3. Each church and/or charge shall have accepted the apportionments in full for the coming year. Each church and/or charge shall have paid the apportionments in full the preceding year.
 4. The church and/or charge shall increase the pastoral support at least \$250.00 annually.
 5. The church and/or charge shall make application to the Commission on the prescribed form by action of the Charge Conference.
 6. The District Superintendent shall make his/her recommendation to the Commission by the date set by the Commission. The date shall not be later than January 10th.
 7. Pastoral assignment shall be full time (Para. 438.3 & 3a) except that the Commission shall consider applications whose pastoral supply is appointed in accordance with Para. 438.3b and 437.2.
 8. In exceptional cases approved by the Cabinet, any requirement above except #7 may be waived by the Commission.

- IX. The Equitable Salary Commission shall be empowered to designate a portion of the Equitable Salary Fund for Mission Salary supplement provided that Mission Salary Supplement shall not exceed the balance anticipated for the year after Equitable Salary grants have been approved.
- X. Mission Salary Supplement Applications and Grants
1. Every church and/or charge shall present a budget for the year to the Commission through the District Superintendent.
 2. Each church and/or charge shall conduct a financial campaign and report the results to the Commission through the District Superintendent by January 1.
 3. Each church and/or charge shall have accepted the apportionments in full for the coming year. Each church and/or charge shall have paid the apportionments in full the preceding year.
 4. The church and/or charge shall make application to the Commission on the prescribed form by action of the Charge Conference.
 5. The District Superintendent shall make his/her recommendation to the Commission by the date set by the Commission. The date shall not be later than January 10.
 6. Exceptional cases may be declared by the Commission from the above requirements and waived on recommendation by the District Superintendent provided the District Superintendent shall file in writing the reasons for the exceptional circumstances.
- XI. All grants from Mission Salary Supplement shall be reported by the Commission to the Annual Conference.
- XII. Adjustments may be made by the Commission at the beginning of the fiscal year when such adjustments are necessitated by a change of appointment or realignment of the charge — or by a new salary arrangement voted by the Charge Conference.

1980-81 was a conference year in which the Foundation continued its efforts to become more visible as a service agency of United Methodism in Arkansas. We believe that as more Methodist individuals and local churches become increasingly aware of the services available to them through the Foundation, that it will greatly strengthen the work of the United Methodist Church.

During 1980, the Executive Director has attended and participated in workshops in the Paragould, Jonesboro, Conway, Pine Bluff, Little Rock, and Monticello Districts. At each of these workshops, materials concerning the work of the Foundation, particularly those relating to wills and estate planning, have been distributed. Several local church and individual contacts have been very encouraging.

At the semi-annual meeting of the Board of Directors held on May 20, 1980, the following

officers for 1980-81 were elected:

President: Mr. Richard C. Butler

Vice-President: Dr. Clint D. Burleson

Secretary: Mr. Don Riffin

Treasurer: Ms. Ann Onstott

The Personnel Committee, consisting of Dr. Ralph Hillis, Chairman, Dr. Earl Carter, Rev. George Tanner, Dr. M. D. Deneke, and Mr. Don Riffin, met on November 18, 1980 and appointed a Sub-committee of Mr. Don Riffin, Chairperson, Rev. George Tanner, and Dr. Earl Carter which was authorized to initiate a search for a qualified individual who would become Executive Director of the Foundation on a full-time basis no later than July 1, 1981.

Prior to initiating a search for a qualified person, the Sub-committee developed the following statement of major duties and responsibilities of the Executive Director together with desired qualifications:

Major Function

Serves as chief staff executive officer to guide and assist the Board of Directors of the Foundation in achieving the goals of the Foundation according to approved policies and procedures.

Major Duties and Responsibilities

Administrative

Recommend and participate in the formation of new policies and programs, and make decisions with existing policies.

Plan, organize, direct and coordinate programs and activities of the Foundation to assure that Foundation objectives are attained, plans fulfilled, and needs met.

Develop and provide leadership to volunteer structures of the Foundation within the Conferences, Districts, Sub-districts, and local churches.

Relate to the Annual Conferences of the United Methodist Church in Arkansas.

Financial Development:

Apply knowledge of appropriate methods and procedures of fund raising in estimating campaign potential, establish campaign goals, analyze campaign progress and evaluate campaign programs.

Work with the Board to develop and direct fund-raising campaigns throughout Arkansas.

Analyze and evaluate fund-raising results as a means of improving future campaigns.

In January 1981, a notice of a job opening was published inviting applications from qualified persons. After reviewing applications received, screening, and interviews with individuals judged to be best qualified, the Sub-committee reported its findings and recommendations to the full committee on May 11, 1981. On the same date, the full committee reported its recommendations to the Board of Directors of the Foundation. The job description as developed was approved together with the recommendation that Mr. James B. Argue, Jr. be elected as Executive Director of the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas. The report was unanimously approved, and Mr. Argue was elected Executive Director to assume the responsibilities of the office on June 15, 1981.

On May 11, 1981, all officers of the Foundation were re-elected.

The Foundation regrets that Mr. Winston Faulkner and Mr. Frank Thompson withdrew as board members of the Foundation during 1980 due to the fact that they were elected as members of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration. We are delighted to welcome to board membership Mrs. Clark Smith of Stuttgart, Mr. Clifton Meador of Dumas, Mr. Sidney Good of Pine Bluff, who is well known across the Conference as the immediate past chairman of the Board of Pensions, and Mr. Maurice Mitchell of Little Rock.

The annual meeting of the Directors of United Methodist Foundations, representing 63 annual conferences, was held in St. Louis, Missouri October 5-7. Robert F. Sharp, a

nationally known and highly respected development authority of the Robert F. Sharp Co. of Memphis, Tennessee, was the principal speaker and resource person for the conference.

Planning is under way to complete in 1981 the organization in each of the districts of the two conferences of a team that would conduct seminars or workshops in the areas of wills and estate planning. Such teams will include a trust officer, accountant, CLU (insurance), and an attorney. Efforts would be made to target in on selected groups in accordance with the objectives of the Foundation. These activities, as planned, would be coordinated with the programs of the District Superintendent and District Council on Ministries.

On September 1, 1980, the Foundation was pleased to obtain badly needed office space through the cooperation of the leadership of the Arkansas Methodist. In the twelve months preceding, the work of the Foundation has been conducted from a desk made available by the North Arkansas Conference Council on Ministries. Our new telephone numbers are 374-4831 or 374-4832. Our address remains the same: P.O. Box 3364, Little Rock, Arkansas 72203.

Funds in custody of the Foundation — cash and investments — plus endowment funds of \$21,646 as of January 31, 1981 — amounted to \$148,742. This represents approximately 150% increase since September 1, 1979. During the same period of time, more than \$50,000 has been distributed to institutions and local churches pursuant to directions of donors, and all operating expenses have been paid. A C.P.A. audit of the accounts of the Foundation has been made and is on file in the Foundation office. The Area Treasurer will provide essential financial information for the Conference Journal.

From the number of inquiries received and requests for materials and consultations that are being received in increasing numbers, we know that our United Methodist constituency is rapidly becoming aware of the importance of the work of the Foundation in the life of the church. Within the last two months, the Executive Director has participated in the drafting of two wills from which institutions, agencies, and programs of the conferences will eventually benefit very substantially — conservatively estimated to exceed one-half million dollars.

The leadership of the Foundation is genuinely appreciative of the increased financial support from each of the two Annual Conferences of the area. We believe that as the work of the Foundation becomes better known and the momentum of its activities accelerates, that significant dividends will be available to undergird the ministries of the United Methodist Church in the Arkansas area.

Articles Of Incorporation Little Rock Conference United Methodist Camp

New Amendments

Article VII

The Board of Trustees of this Corporation shall be composed of Camp Trustees, Agency trustees, Ex-Officio Trustees, and trustees at large.

Section 1: The Little Rock Conference Camp Trustees (Not to exceed 9 in number) shall be elected by the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church on nomination of the Board of Trustees.

The Agency Trustees, one each, shall be nominated respectively by the Board of Education, the Board of Global Ministries, the Board of Evangelism, the Board of the Laity, the Conference United Methodist Women, the Conference United Methodist Youth, the Board of the Ministry, and the Arkadelphia District Superintendent, of their successors.

The first election shall be as hereinafter set forth and all succeeding elections shall be for a term of three (3) years, with the Board or Agency making the nomination whose Trustees the proposed trustee is to succeed.

Section 2: The following officers of conference organizations, or their successor organizations, shall be ex-officio members of the Board of Trustees of this Corporation, with the same rights and duties as other Trustees, to serve during their term of office: The Resident Bishop; the Conference Director of Education; the Conference Secretary of the Board of Evangelism; the President of the Conference United Methodist Women; the Conference Lay Leader; the Conference Coordinator of Youth Work; and the Director of the Council on Ministries, along with the Associate Director of the Council on Ministries, if not otherwise named.

Changes Recommended For Articles — And The Rationale For Changes:

1. **Article VII, Section 1:** The name of the "Board of Missions" is changed to the current name "Board of Global Ministries." The reason for the name change is obvious.
The words "or their successors." is added at the end of the third paragraph. By adding these words we are making our document much stronger in a legal sense.
2. **Article VII, Section 2:** The following words are added after officers "of Conference organizations, or their successor organizations." Again, this makes our document much stronger in a legal sense.

Delete "Conference Missionary Secretary" as an ex-officio member of the Board of Trustees. This is because our Annual Conference no longer provides for this position.

Camp Aldersgate

A minister friend of mine recently commented that Aldersgate was the best kept secret in the Little Rock Annual Conference. Unfortunately, this is true, but it is not by intent nor design. We are correcting this and letting the people know who we are, how we are funded and something about the exciting ministries at Aldersgate.

From its very formative days, until the present, Aldersgate has always managed to do what no one else is doing; that is, meeting the unique needs of unique circumstances in a unique way. Aldersgate is more than a place, it is an experience. It is where all who come may know the presence of God in themselves and in their fellow man.

It was in this spirit that we took in the embattered women of Gaines House who, when their home was destroyed by fire, found refuge at Aldersgate. It was the Cuban refugee who proclaimed, "I want very much for myself eternal life!" It is the group of Baptists from Memphis, Tennessee, after spending a weekend retreat, who stated, "Aldersgate is the most beautiful example of New Testament Christianity that we have ever seen." It is the handicapped children who come and experience the presence of God in nature. It is the senior citizens who have established a family relationship in an atmosphere of love. It is the delinquent youth in trouble who learn to relate in an atmosphere of love and acceptance and discover for the very first time there is an alternative life style.

Our ministry is an exciting ministry, which covers such a broad spectrum of service to so many people. I am proud to be there as your representative, meeting these unique needs of unique circumstances in new and unique ways.

Aldersgate operates on a budget of \$475,000. In round figures, we receive \$10,000 from the Little Rock Annual Conference as an Advance Special, \$10,000 as a line item apportionment from the North Arkansas Conference and \$10,000 from the Women's Division, Board of Global Ministries. Sixty percent of our funds come from the government and only twelve percent from the Methodist Church. The balance comes from private contributions and grants.

Because of government cut-back and reduction in spending for social services, we can expect less revenue from this source. This year, we have already lost \$200,000 for our ministry to the senior citizens. When the government spends this kind of money, they want to control, and their concepts of control do not always agree with that of the church. Since we are a part of the Methodist Church, we don't need this kind of control. We must have control of our own ministries and our own programs.

Aldersgate will survive and it will continue its ministry of service, but we can do so only if

the Methodist Church will assume a much greater share of the funding. We ask for your help and support on this. We also encourage your local church to become more involved and discover the spirit and ministries of Aldersgate. Some churches are now doing this, but we need more to do so. For example, Highland Park United Methodist Church from Dallas, Texas will have a work detail of 40 youth and 10 adults who will be with us the first week of June building, painting and repairing at the Camp. Already they have committed to raise funds and come back next year and build a much needed chapel on our grounds. This great church in Dallas has discovered the worthwhileness of our ministry and our missions; surely, our local churches can do no less.

We reach and touch the lives of so many people from all over the state and from other areas. The people we serve are too precious to ignore. We serve a God that is too great to deny, and we have a mission that is too exciting to miss. Come and join with us in fulfilling this mission.

Board Of Trustees

The Little Rock Conference Board of Trustees met on April 22, 1981. Rev. Charles Ashcraft presented a request that we sell 1.61 acres of land located in Section 25 Township 9S Range 19W in the Arkadelphia District to Potlatch Forest.

This property was deeded to the church in 1891 for use as a church site at that location but has never been used for that purpose and has been abandoned for 90 years.

Several lumber companies have claimed ownership and Potlatch is now willing to pay the church the amount of \$1,610.00 to settle the title to the property.

We recommend that this property be sold to Potlatch for this amount and that the proceeds be turned over to the Arkadelphia District for use in projects within the District.

United Methodist Women

Reading from the Scriptures 2 Timothy 1:7 For God did not give us a spirit of timidity but a spirit of power and love and self-control, Ruth Daugherty, president of the Women's Division of United Methodist Women began her address to the 8th annual meeting of the Little Rock Conference United Methodist Women. The story of United Methodist Women demonstrates this spirit of power, love and control. It is like reading a continued story in a magazine. In Dayton, Ohio, November 4, 1875, over a hundred years ago, the story began. For the women in Arkansas it began earlier in 1873 at the First Methodist Episcopal Church in Warren, Ark. The mission work of United Methodist Women has a rich heritage and today the story continues to fulfill the purpose with Worship, Study and Action.

Every time United Methodist Women meet from the local unit group meeting to the national division, there is or should be an act of worship seeking God and His message through Jesus Christ. Seeking to determine what our mission today is in the light of Biblical understandings. In order to find this, we must study.

It has been said that United Methodist Women are the best educated women in the world. This is what we want for our women and it is a matter of concern that study does not seem to be as important in the local church as it should be. We need the help and support of the local pastor and the whole church community to support mission study. Most of the conference executive committee attends the Regional School of Christian Mission. The school was held in Lincoln Nebraska, in 1980 and will be held in Dallas at Southern Methodist University in 1981. The Arkansas School of Christian Mission was held in Arkadelphia at Henderson State University with 280 people from the Little Rock and North Arkansas conferences attending. The school will move back to Hendrix college in 1981 with the weekend school beginning July 31 thru August 2. Weekday school will begin August 3 thru 6. We will again place major

emphasis on involving young people by providing mission school classes for the children. Provisions for caring for all children will be provided. Youth attendance is, also, encouraged. United Methodist Women of the Little Rock Conference will provide a scholarship for a youth from each district to attend. The district organization of United Methodist Women will select the youth to attend. The conference cooperates with the North Arkansas Conference United Methodist Women and the two Boards of Global Ministries to finance and operate the school, by contributing \$2,000.00 to the school.

Each year a Spiritual growth study is prepared by the Women's division and many women participated in the Interior Life study recommended for 1980. A Christian Disciples workshop has been scheduled for the executive committee and selected district officers for September 18-20, 1981, to provide for deeper spiritual growth. The program resource book and Response magazine are planned to promote study and action.

In February, the conference sent Elizabeth Welch, Jimmie Lee Stephens, Snowie Brown, and me to a World Development Conference in San Antonio, Texas. For four days we studied the forces in our world that promote or impede development all over the world. Kaye Evans, Zenobia Waters and Rubye Lee Jackson from our conference were on the team and conducted individual workshops for participants. The Conference provided us with the theme for the 1981 annual meeting, World Development is . . . , and we will continue this study in an extended two day officer training workshop in November.

Three women, Audrey Powell, Betty West, and I attended the Jurisdiction Legislative Training event. These events provide Biblical interpretation for action to support efforts to improve society in the light of Jesus commandments to feed the hungry, set at liberty those who feel oppression and improve the quality of life for all people. We seek to learn about actions and legislation that speaks to these concerns.

Mary Granderson has recently attended a consultation for consumers representing the Little Rock Conference and she will be ready to share her knowledge with groups requesting programs.

Rosemary McLarty has just returned from a corporate responsibility workshop in New York city and will be able to interpret actions of the women's division in corporate responsibility.

Four women attended new officer training in New York. They were Jimmie Lee Stephens, Merlyn Watson, Snowie Brown and Leona Bonsall. A new office, Secretary of Publicity and Public Relations has been added and Peggy Mitchell has been elected by the executive committee to fill this office. Letha Nell Rushing attended the training for nominating committee chairpersons held in Cincinnati, Ohio.

The undirected pledge to missions sent to the Women's division in 1980 was \$105,525.00. This represents an increase of 5% over 1979. Designated giving, including a \$1,500.00 gift to Aldersgate from the Little Rock conference, was \$13,472.61 making a total of \$118,997.61. The Elizabeth Thornburg Workman fund for youth contribution was \$1,600.00. This was sent to the conference youth organization.

In 1980 the women's division sent \$4,588,475.00 to the Board of Global Ministries for national division work and the same amount for world division work. \$760,898.00 was sent to the education and cultivation division and \$4,768,000.00 was retained in the women's division for their mission and cultivation.

The Little Rock conference evaluation reports from local units showed 185 units of United Methodist Women. Out of 142 units responding to the reports, we show a membership of 8,231 women.

The annual meeting was held at First United Methodist church in Benton, October 4, 1980. Using the theme "Love Made Visible . . . in our Continuing story," the speaker, Ruth Daugherty, president of the women's division challenged us to recognize our heritage and move forward in mission with courage and commitment. Special mission recognition was given to former missionaries Norene Robkin, Daisey Cabean, Helen Wilson, Adele Phillips and Pearl McCain for making love visible through the years. Outgoing officers were presented special mission recognition gifts to mission with Helene Blakley, the beloved outgoing president, receiving the highest mission recognition available.

On October 8-9, 1980, the district officer training was held at Camp Tanako with 52 people attending. Rubye Lee Jackson and Mary Ryan, regional staff of the women's division, led the workshop in identifying the work and mission of the women's division. At this meeting the conference organization began to identify the concerns and prioritize the program emphasis for the quadrennium. This process was continued as the district presidents met with the conference president to identify district and local unit concerns. At the executive committee in January the following goals were set.

1. To participate in the Quadrennial design plan of the women's division to have four workshops in each conference in a six year period.
2. To develop conference teams who will present programs to local and/or district units on specific areas of
 1. Goal setting
 2. Program development
 3. Inclusiveness
 4. Financial interpretation
 5. Membership

These teams will be ready by July 15.

3. To work toward implementing the Charter of Racial Justice.
4. To encourage involvement of more women in the organization of United Methodist Women and be a supportive community to all women.
5. To enlarge our involvement in mission in community activities relating to advocacy for children, families, aging and handicapped persons, women in crises, and any persons with special needs.

As you can see we are well on our way to achieving these goals. In addition to those already mentioned in this report, we are intentionally involving our ethnic minorities in programs and training events. We will have our 1982 annual meeting at Philander Smith college. We made a contribution to ERArkansas and Arkansas Advocates for Families and Children. We helped to secure speakers for the speakers bureau and have offered to help in other ways. We continue to support Church Women United in Arkansas. This work can only be done through the district and local units, and we especially encourage the pastor to meet with the executive committee as they plan their program.

And thus the story of United Methodist Women continues as we seek to find and obey the message of God given to us through Jesus Christ in the mission He calls us to do.

Notes To Financial Statements
December 31, 1980

1. Summary Of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of Accounting — The financial statements of the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church have been prepared on the cash basis. The records are held open for fifteen days after the end of the fiscal year in order to include the remittances from the churches in the conference for the last few weeks of the year. This policy is consistent with prior years.

2. Income Taxes

The conference meets the requirements of Section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code and is therefore exempt from federal income taxes.

3. Cash Investments

All cash investments are recorded at cost plus interest income as received in the account. Interest on the savings accounts is received quarterly. Interest on Dean Witter Intercapital Liquid Asset Fund is received monthly. Interest on all other cash investments is not recognized until maturity.

Reverend Willie Henry Piggee, was born September 4, 1906 to the late Mark and Julia Chatman Piggee in Little Rock, Arkansas.

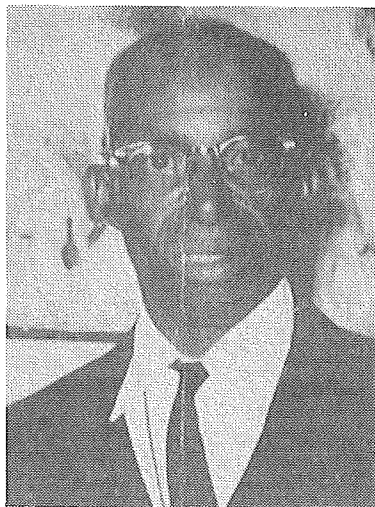
At an early age he professed a hope in Christ, and united with The Marks Chapel United Methodist Church.

In 1925 he was united in holy matrimony to Miss Hazel Walton, and to this union two children were born, one child preceding him in eternal sleep. He later married the late Miss Lucreacy Jackson thus becoming the stepfather of three daughters. On December 22, 1968 he married Miss Roberta Marshall, and remained a loyal and devoted husband.

He departed this life October 11, 1980, 10:30 p.m. at St. Vincent Infirmary.

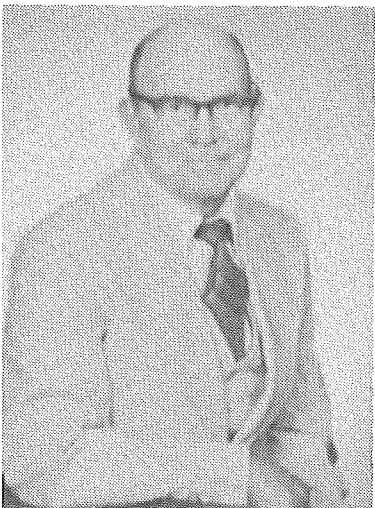

James F. Richardson

James Franklin Richardson began life on August 30, 1921 in Sunflower County, Mississippi. Following High School completion at Linn Consolidated in 1938, he served in the United States Military until 1945. James was then occupied as a farmer until he was licensed to preach in 1948, at which time he began his Pastoral work. Among those earlier years, which included several Student Appointments, in 1946 James was joined in marriage by Sarah Roberts, "Dena" to her friends, and their home was blessed by three daughters; Dianne, Jean, and Susan, and a son; James, Jr.

Having received the B.A. Degree from Millsaps College, James became a Probationary Member of the North Mississippi Conference where he entered into Full Connection and was Ordained as Deacon in 1953. Years of fruitful Ministry at Ethel, Myrtle, Glenfield-Bethlehem, and Shuqualak Charges deferred his completion of The M. Div. Degree which he received



from Vanderbilt Divinity School in 1964. That same year, the Richardsons transferred into the Little Rock Conference where in 1965 he was Ordained an Elder. One of his contemporaries has said so accurately, "he loved the brethren."

The gracious, faithful work of his Pastoral Ministry has blessed a half-dozen Charges in the Little Rock Conference: Sparkman-Macedonia, Murfreesboro-Japan, Gillet-Campshed, Gurdon-Mt. Zion, First Church Hot Springs (Associateship), and Village United Methodist Church in Hot Springs Village. During his last Appointment a new congregation was formed and developed into one of the larger Churches of the Conference. The vital, prospering membership and beautiful facilities are a crowning consummation of James Richardson's years of Ministry.

The hand of illness, already clutching at him during his Ministry at the Village Church, grasped him inexorably in the Summer of 1979. Physically disabled, he left his beloved work, returning to residence at Murfreesboro, Arkansas until his death, November 13, 1980. As uncomplaining in his affliction as he was humble in his achievements, James served the Lord, the Church, and his fellow-man Faithfully, with great good humor, and with profound effect. It should surprise no one to find James Richardson in the forefront of the Church Invisible and Eternal.

Everett Moseley Vinson

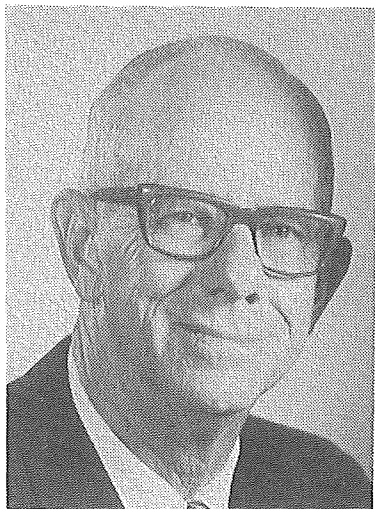
He did his work so thoroughly and yet so quietly that when his Master's "Well done" came his closest friends were amazed to learn that he had given 44 years of ministerial service to the Little Rock Annual Conference. His reports were always in full. His promotions came slowly but surely. They were always well deserved.

Everett Moseley Vinson was born November 14, 1916 in Pine Bluff, Arkansas, the son of James Holt and Charlotte Rainey Vinson. In his teen years he became a leader in the Methodist youth program at the local church, district and conference levels. While still a student in High School he was licensed to preach by the Pine Bluff District on June 17, 1934. The journey ended November 19, 1980.

His supply appointments in the Little Rock Conference were Magnolia Circuit, Hatfield Circuit, Rowel Circuit and Good Faith in Pine Bluff. He was admitted on trial into the Little Rock Annual Conference in November 1946, admitted into full connection and ordained Deacon in 1948 and ordained Elder in 1949.

On graduation from seminary he returned to the Little Rock Annual Conference and served with distinction the following appointments: Gillett, Lake Village, Hunter Memorial in Little Rock, Nashville, St. Paul's in Little Rock, First Church Hope, Conference Council Director, Monticello District Superintendent, First Church Crossett and First Church Smackover.

On March 28, 1947 he was united in Holy Matrimony to the former Anne Bobo of Pine Bluff. Their life together was one of constant love and beautiful service. Besides his wife he is survived by a son, James Paul of Little Rock and two lovely daughters, Suzanne Dunn of Fort Smith and Mrs. Sara Short of Little Rock.



The impressive memorial service was held in the inspiring sanctuary of the imposing First United Methodist Church at Smackover under the leadership of his District Superintendent The Reverend Michael R. Sister Jacobs served her Lord side by side with her husband in the forty-one years and fourteen charges of his ministry. She was a Sunday School teacher, song leader, church organist, a member of the missionary society and helpmate to her preacher husband in all of his pastoral work.

When Brother Jacobs retired from the ministry, Sister Jacobs returned to Tull with him, where she completed her four score and ten years on earth. On March 26, 1981, Sister Jacobs faithfully followed her Lord and Shepherd King through the valley of the shadow of death to green pastures and still waters to the mansion which He had prepared for her. Her funeral service was conducted at the Ebenezer United Methodist Church by her pastor, Reverend D. Ed McCulloch, Jr., and Reverend Conrad Glover. Her earthly temple was placed to rest in the Ebenezer Cemetery.

She is survived by three sons, James W., Ewel D., and Robert W. Jacobs, five grandchildren, and eight great-grandchildren.

Rosa Lee Nabors

Rosa Lee Jerry was born June 11, 1898 in the vicinity of Lawson, Arkansas at a place called Easy. She was the daughter of William Thomas and Mary Elizabeth Church Jerry. She received her education in the schools of the area. In the same vicinity there was a young man by the name of Howard Ross Nabors. On December 26, 1916 she became his bride.

Brother Nabors pursued his higher education from what is now the University of Central Arkansas, presumably with the intention of teaching. The call to the ministry prevailed and he qualified for ministerial membership in the Little Rock Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. By the time he was ordained Elder and admitted into full connection Mrs. Nabors became very uncomfortable moving on short notice to strange communities. Brother Nabors asked for and received location. They made their home in Chidester, Arkansas where Brother Nabors taught school and later became Postmaster.

Throughout all these years as a Local Elder, Brother Nabors served, as what was then called "Part Time Supply Pastor" churches in the area. It is this writer's knowledge that no pastor ever had more loyal support in his ministry than that which he received from Mrs. Nabors. She accompanied him regularly to his preaching appointments and on pastoral calls and was dearly loved by the people whom he served.

For a total of eleven years, on three separate appointments, they served Westside in Camden. During this time the sanctuary was built, the education building, named for them, was completed and a lovely parsonage almost finished when death came unexpectedly to Brother Nabors. Mrs. Nabors continued to live in Chidester but retained her membership in Westside where she upheld her church by her prayers, her presence, her gifts and her service and where she was dearly loved by all the membership of the church.

Finally, when physical infirmities dictated that she needed to be near her devoted daughter, Mary Bartee, reluctantly she disposed of her home and moved to Dallas, Texas.

Not only was she a woman of undying devotion to persons and causes she loved but she was a person of strong determination. Just a few days before her death she got up from her sick-bed to attend the wedding of her granddaughter.

On July 29, 1980 the end came. Memorial services were held on August 1, 1980 in her beloved Westside and the interment was beside her husband in the Lawson cemetery. She is survived by her daughter Mary Bartee of Richardson, Texas, a grandson and a granddaughter and a host of friends who loved her.

X. Miscellaneous

The organization of the Little Rock Annual Conference is defined in the Statement of the Organizational Structure of the Little Rock Conference as printed in the 1974 Journal.

The Standing Rules are subject to the Discipline of the United Methodist Church and the Organizational Structure of the Little Rock Annual Conference.

THE STANDING RULES

I. Conference Organization

1. **Number of Districts.** There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Annual Conference.
2. **District Conference.** There may be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline, and one additional member from each pastoral charge, provided however, in charges of more than five hundred members there shall be one additional member for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.
3. **Nominations.**
 - (a) The Conference Nominating Committee shall be composed of the District Superintendent and one lay person from each district. The Bishop shall serve as chairman.
 - (b) The Conference Nominating Committee shall nominate six members (three lay and three clergy) at large to achieve an equal balance of lay and clergy members, alternating by districts as follows:

Camden	Monticello
Hope	Pine Bluff
 - (c) The Conference Nominating Committee will nominate all members of the Annual Conference quadrennial and annual boards, commissions and committees and Conference Council on Ministry boards, committees and commissions except as otherwise provided. Each District Nominating Committee will complete its list of qualified nominations by December 31. All nominees shall be consulted regarding their nomination. All boards and agencies of the Conference shall be inclusive of ethnic minority representation.
 - (d) Terms of office of the Nominating Committee shall be for four years beginning on January 1 following the session of the Annual Conference in the middle of the quadrennium.
4. **Lay Members.** Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the Conference Secretary by the District Superintendent ninety days before the opening day of Annual Conference.
5. **Youth Membership.** Each District Council of the United Methodist Youth shall elect annually two youth members of the Annual Conference, and their names shall be sent to the Conference Secretary by the District Superintendent ninety days before the opening day of Annual Conference.
6. **Board Service.**
 - (a) Membership to the boards, councils, commissions and committees shall be elected for a term of one quadrennium. Eligibility for election for membership on the same board, council, commission, committee shall be limited to two consecutive quadrenniums, excepting ex-officio membership on the Conference Council on Ministries. Membership begins upon election.

Beginning with the 1984 Quadrennium no member of the Annual Conference shall be eligible for the chairmanship of a board, committee, commission or council of the Annual Conference who has served as chairman of a board, committee, commission, or council for the preceding 8 years.

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- (b) There are two types of membership on Annual Conference boards, committees, commissions and councils: at large and ex-officio. A person may serve in only one at-large and/or one ex-officio capacity.
- (c) The membership of the Committee on Review and Evaluation; the Committee on Planning and Research; the Committee on the Annual Conference; and the Episcopal Committee shall be exempt from the provisions of (a) and (b) of Review and Evaluation.
- (d) No person from the Little Rock Conference, clerical or lay, shall serve as an elected trustee of more than one United Methodist related institution within the bounds of the Arkansas Area at a time. "Within the bounds of" these United Methodist related institutions are understood to be the following: Hendrix College, Philander Smith College, Aldersgate, Methodist Children's Home, the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas, the Wesley Foundations, Little Rock Conference Camp Tanako, and Mt. Sequoyah Assembly. This is to take effect during the year 1979, as each institution could possibly have its timetable of elections on a different schedule. Trustees presently serving are allowed to complete their present terms.
- (e) All Councils, Boards, Committees and Commissions of the Conference shall be made representative. Special consideration shall be given to placing women, youth, and minority persons on the membership of these conference agencies.
- (f) Beginning with the 1984 Quadrennium no member of the Annual Conference shall be eligible for the chairmanship of a board, committee, commission or council of the Annual Conference who has served as chairman of a board, committee, commission or council for the preceding 8 years.

II. Financial Administration

1. **Fiscal Year.** The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall run from January 1 to December 31.
2. **Financial and Statistical.**
 - (a) The District Superintendents shall furnish the treasurer with all apportionments to the churches on, or before January 15. These figures shall be official.
 - (b) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars; with no column for cents.
 - (c) Each pastor shall make a statistical report to the District Superintendent who shall submit the reports to the Conference Statistician. The Pastor's financial report will be audited and checked by the Final Data Processing Print-Out. Where there is discrepancy, the amount recorded on the Print-Out will prevail.
3. **Administrative Fund.** The Council on Finance and Administration shall recommend an assessment for a Conference Administrative Fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the pre-conference report, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of preparing and printing the Worship Booklet for the Annual Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expenses of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this Fund. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of the Fund. Payments for unbudgeted claims on this fund shall be made on vouchers signed by the Chairman of the Council on Finance and Administration or the Conference Secretary.
4. **Program Budgets.** Budgets for expenditures for program for the District and the Conference shall be co-ordinated by the Conference Council on Ministries. The Conference Council on Ministries shall make recommendations to the Council on Finance and Administration which shall make a final recommendation to the Annual Conference.
5. **Conference Treasurer.** The Council on Finance and Administration shall set the

salary and provide for the expenses of the Conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall assign the duties, responsibilities, and the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer, on recommendation of the Council on Finance and Administration, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.

6. **District Fund.** The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall report to the District Stewards annually, showing receipts and disbursements. Funds budgeted by the District Council on Ministries will be paid by the District Treasurer upon action of the District Council on Ministries and the approval of the District Superintendent.
7. **Apportionments Based on Pastor's Salary.** On all items apportioned to local churches by means of a percentage of the minister's salary, such percentage shall be understood to apply to all ministerial members of the local church staff serving under the appointment of the Bishop and District Superintendent, including ministers in full connection, ministers on trial, and full-time Lay Pastors.
8. Requests for financial support by the Conference, when not presented to the Conference by the Council on Finance and Administration, shall lay on the table for twenty-four hours prior to a vote being taken. This rule may be suspended by a 3/4 vote of the Conference. It does not preclude a Council on Finance and Administration recommendation being amended.

III. Conference Procedure

1. **Rules of Order.** The Rules of Order shall be Roberts Rules of Order revised.
2. **Reports and Resolutions.** There shall be a pre-conference report which shall contain reports of all the boards and agencies of the Conference. This report shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the pre-conference reports shall be typewritten, in triplicate, on special forms furnished by the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary. In the event editing of a report is deemed necessary by the Conference Secretary and Chairman of the Board involved, permission is hereby granted.
3. **Conference Expense Fund.**
 - (a) Registration fees and offerings taken at the Annual Conference shall be administered by the Conference Treasurer and shall be used to defray the expenses of the session.
 - (b) The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the entertainment of the retired ministers shall be paid from the Conference Expense Fund. The Conference Treasurer shall pay a per diem for days actually in attendance directly to the retired ministers and be reimbursed from the Conference Expense Fund. Eligibility shall be determined by the Conference Board of Pensions.
 - (c) Any deficit in the Conference Expense Fund shall be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund.
 - (d) The Conference Expense Fund shall be administered by the Committee on the Annual Conference.
4. **Un-sponsored Resolutions.** Any resolution not sponsored by a regular board or standing committee of the Conference must lie over for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon, provided, however, immediate debate and action may be ordered by two-thirds vote of the Conference present and voting.
5. **Memoirs.** There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased clerical member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of

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admission on trial, to whom married and date, names of children, charges served, and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with the memoir. The same shall be done for probationary members, associate members and lay pastors. Likewise, a memoir of wives or widows of the above shall be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Sub-committee on Memoirs the death of any of the above mentioned and be responsible for the submission of Memoirs not later than thirty days after the death occurs. The names or memoirs of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions, or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. The District Superintendent shall be responsible for securing the memoirs for laymen whose memoirs shall be published. It shall be the duty of the District Superintendents to report to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions the death of any conference claimant that occurs in their respective districts.

6. Historical Material.

- (a) The Library at Hendrix College shall be the depository for all historical documents and artifacts of the Little Rock Conference. The College Librarian shall be the custodian of these historical materials.
- (b) The Commission on Archives and History shall be responsible for securing a group picture of each class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his retirement.

7. Unbudgeted Expenditures. When any proposal is submitted to the Annual Conference which involves the expenditure of funds not included in the established budget, such a proposal shall be referred for advice and recommendation to the Council on Finance and Administration and brought back to the same session of the Annual Conference for a vote to be taken by the Conference.

8. Campaigns. All Conference-wide campaigns to raise funds shall be voted on by secret ballot of the Conference.

IV. Amendments

These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.
