

EldersElders ordained in 1982: David R. Steele, Carlos B. Summers.





III. Daily Proceedings CONFERENCE MINUTES

Sunday Evening, May 30, 1982 — 7:00 p.m.

The one hundred and twenty-ninth session of the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church was convened at First United Methodist Church, Hot Springs, Arkansas, with an Opening Celebration — Commemoration and Communion — prepared by the Conference Council Board of Worship, James Argue, Chairman. The Conference organist was Lynn Baumann. The opening hymn was Charles Wesley's "And Are We Yet Alive?" The liturgists were Carl Matthews and Henry Wilkins, IV. The choir, the Chancel Choir from Pulaski Heights United Methodist Church, Little Rock, directed by Dr. Ned DeJournett, offered the Offertory Anthem "The King of Love My Shepherd Is." The Reverend Michael R. Clayton offered the sermon, "The Church There and the Church Here."

Gerald Fincher, Conference Secretary, called the names of those who had died during the year, and the bell was tolled for each of them, after which the Conference thanked God for them.

The Conference sang "For All the Saints," and then Bishop Hicks served as the celebrant of the Sacrament of Holy Communion. He was assisted by Henry Wilkins, IV, Ed Warren, Don Armstrong, Larry Martinear, Constance Steele, Davis Thompson, Rodney Steele.

The Bishop called on the Secretary for those matters that need to be dealt with in order to organize our Conference business. Gerald Fincher, Secretary of the Conference, made a motion that the bar of the Conference be set as the main floor of the Sanctuary from the marble columns forward. The motion was seconded and passed. All motions, resolutions and amendments shall be submitted in duplicate to the conference secretary's desk at the time of presentation. When granted the privilege of the floor by the presiding officer delegates shall identify themselves by name and the church or district which they represent. Persons who wish to be recognized should first proceed to one of the microphones. The Secretary moved that in order to balance the lay and clergy votes the following persons be granted the laity vote: Diaconal Ministers, Lay Chairpersons of Conference Boards, Committee and Commissions, District Lay Leaders, Youth Delegates, Presidents of the District UMW. The motion was made, seconded and passed that these persons be afforded voice and vote in this session of the Annual Conference.

The Secretary nominated John O. Alston as Journal Clerk, O. D. Peters as Staff Assistant, Patricia Parker, transcriptionist and the following as Tellers: Robert W. Trieschmann, Herb Pekar, Rodney G. Steele, Donald Armstrong, Gerald Myer, and George Rook. The motion was made for these to be elected, with second, the motion passed. The roll call of the Conference is taken as you register in the Fellowship Hall in the basement of the Church. Every member of the Conference, both clerical and lay members, is expected to register his attendance. All retired ministers, all local pastors, all reserve lay delegates, are expected to register. Although it is not required, we will be happy for all who are visitors to register also. It is the hope of the Secretary that you will carefully record your name as you want it printed in the Journal. Please use the new address where you receive your mail, including the zip code if you know it. It is also requested that you record the place where you are staying while in Hot Springs. This is for the purpose of locating you in case of an emergency. It is necessary to register only once during the session. If you fail to do so, there will be an indication in the Conference Journal.

The Secretary moved the adoption of the agenda as presented in the Member's Workbook with the understanding that it may be adjusted as need arises. The second was given and the agenda was adopted.

Dr. George W. Martin, host pastor, introduced Mrs. LaVerne Burton, who gave the

welcome to the Conference from the First United Methodist Church, Hot Springs.

Bob Trieschmann was recognized as chairperson of the Courtesy Committee.

An unsponsored Resolution was presented by Bill Arnold in order to meet the Standing Rule requirement which states that an unsponsored resolution must lay on the table for twenty-four hours before a vote may be taken.

At 9:15 p.m., it was moved to go with the Forum Groups.

Monday Morning, May 31, 1982 — 8:30 a.m.

Morning Worship Service was led by Clayton Harrison. The devotion leader was William C. Gentry. His message was entitled "Reconciled to Be Reconcilers."

The business session was called to order at 9:00 a.m. by Bishop Hicks. Beverly Sawyer who has been in a serious accident, has sent a letter of regret to the Conference which was read by Bishop Hicks. Bishop Hicks reminded the Conference of Beverly Sawyer's book entitled "A Singer of Seasons," a book of prayers, and stated that the book was available or the book table.

Concerns were expressed for the following who were unable to attend the 1982 Annua Conference: Miss Mattie Marrett, Davis Thompson, Marion Miller, Mrs. Roscoe Walsh Mrs. Letha Nell Rushing, Harold and Ruby Sadler, Eugene Cobb, Olive Bolding, Altu-Block, Robert Beasley, Buster and Hazel Poss, Dr. and Mrs. Marshall Steel, William Weaver, Jim and Lola Ford, Jess Taylor, Mrs. Love, Bishop and Mrs. William C. Martin Mr. Burch Adams. A prayer was offered by the Bishop in behalf of these persons.

George Tanner moved the Agenda, seconded and passed.

J. Robert Scott, Dean of the Cabinet, presented the report of the District Superintendents Motion to accept seconded and passed. Bishop Hicks reminded the Conference of the task of the Courtesy Committee and asked the members help in pointing out visitors, etc. The Board of Ordained Ministry Report was presented by Palmer Garner, Chairman. Charle Murry made corrections in the report. Mike Campbell was called to give a report on the Continuing Education portion of this report. Continuing Education funds have already bees spent for 1982. The Continuing Education Committee will keep records of complete transcript forms. Mike Campbell mentioned some of the continuing education facilities available and asked for support from the Conference for the three areas that are available for funding. Fred Haustein, Chairman of the Probationers Committee, gave his report. The Discipline mandates that the Board of Ordained Ministry set up a "Committee of Concerns as a supportive group for probationers."

David Deere presented a network of concern for communication by telephone amon

parsonage families. Refer to Ordained Ministry Report.

Charles Murry moved the adoption of Report #1 of the Board of Ordained Ministry seconded, motion carried.

Palmer Garner asked the Chair for permission to present the Board of Ordained Ministr Report #2 in order that those who have newly joined the Conference will be eligible to vot on the concerns of the Conference. Biff Averitt introduced report #2 with changes. Bisho Hicks reminded this Conference that votes on the ministerial matters are to be voted upo by clergy members.

Sections I, II and III of Report #2 were adopted by vote as the classes were introduced. A the conclusion of the introductions the report was passed by a show of hands vote.

Biff Averitt encouraged the Conference to attend the Ordination Service on Tuesda

Section IV of Report #2 of the Board of Ordained Ministry entitled "Continued or Probation" was presented concerning students and graduates of Schools of Theology. The members of the probation relationship were asked to stand and were greeted by the Conference. John Miles asked that a special recognition be given Marty Nichols who

received three of the five highest awards given in Seminary: Social Action Award, Homiletics Award and the Senior Award.

Motion was made to adopt the Report in its entirety, seconded and passed.

Bishop Hicks announced that D. Mouzon Mann was being transferred, though in a retired relationship, to the Little Rock Conference from the North Arkansas Conference.

The Committee on Nominations report was presented by Dale Booth. He moved the election of the new Conference Nominating Committee with changes noted. The motion was seconded and passed.

It was moved and seconded that the Conference Council on Ministries nominations be approved with the corrections noted. The motion passed.

Howard Woods has been nominated to replace Frank Thompson on the Council on Finance and Administration, Elected.

The Little Rock Conference Boards, Committees, Commissions with changes were nominated and elected.

Dale Booth moved the approval of the District Nominating Committees as shown in the Journal with appropriate changes. Seconded and passed.

The Cooperative Parish Report was called for by Bishop Hicks. Vic Nixon, the Director of Cooperative Parish Ministry presented Biff Averitt to give the report. Cooperative Parish Ministries appointments are found in the Ministerial Appointments section of the Journal. John Walker, District Superintendent of the Hope District, reported on the "History of the Southwest Parish." J. T. Counts and Daisy Cabean of the Southwest Parish spoke about activities in the Parish. Vic Nixon reported two corporate parishes in the North Arkansas Conference are in the process of forming a Cooperative Parish similar to that which is in the Southwest Parish.

Moved the adoption of the Board of Cooperative Parish Ministry. Seconded and passed.

Biff Averitt moved that the history of the Southwest Parish be included in the Journal, seconded and carried.

The chair recognized Bob Trieschmann, Chairperson of the Courtesy Committee, to the Conference. Ann Martin presented a corsage to Mrs. Elaine Hicks who expressed her thanks to the Conference.

Ernie Matkin presented the Board of Pensions report with corrections and changes. John Ross requested that report # 2 & #3 also be approved. John Ross moved the adoption of the report. Bishop Hicks noted that the pension benefits were also for widows of retired ministers. The vote was taken and the report approved.

Bob Trieschmann was called upon by the Chair to recognize guests: Dr. Jim Workman, Dr. Matt Ellis, Wayne Jarvis, Dr. Bryon Brawner and his wife, Sam Teague and his wife, W. T. Bone (who answered his 63rd roll call of the Annual Conference). Clint Burleson and Mrs. T. T. McNeil.

David Wilson gave the report of the Insurance Committee. The insurance rates on January 1, 1983 will be going to the calendar year. We will continue paying our present premium until January 1, 1983. The General Board of Pensions have informed the Conference that there would be an increase of approximately 25% in our insurance rates effective January 1, 1983. The churches in our Conference assume 60% of the insurance cost for the ministers and staff. The ministers and staff pay 40% of the cost.

Members coming into the Conference by transfer, graduation from Seminary are urged to enroll in HMEP program as soon as possible. The General Board of Pensions requests that the Annual Conference enact legislation to cover divorced spouses. If a minister or a lay person in the insurance program experiences a divorce, his or her spouse's coverage is terminated at the time of the divorce decree. (See current report on Committee on Insurance.) It was moved that the Committee on Insurance be empowered to develop guide lines for our Conference concerning divorced spouse protection. The motion was voted on and carried.

Bishop Hicks asked David Wilson to bring a word from St. Paul's Seminary.

The Chair recognized John Hays for the purpose of presenting an unsponsored resolution

as follows:

Recent events have renewed the concern for being able to provide interim pastoral car for churches and/or charges where the pastor suffers a temporary but lengthy disability. am therefore proposing the following legislation:

- (1) When the Bishop and Cabinet, in consultation with the local church, determines that an interim pastor should be assigned because of a prolonged but not permanent disability of the pastor, the District Superintendent shall report such matter to the Joint Disability Committee and negotiate salary and expense arrangements with the Joint Disability Committee to compensate the interim pastor.
- (2) That a fund of up to \$25,000.00 be made available as needed from the unrestricted reserve of the Conference as of June 1, 1982, and that this fund be administered by the Joint Disability Committee.
- (3) That an amount equal to the previous year's use of the fund be added to th Conference Administration apportionment each year.

John Hays moved that the resolution be tabled for further action. The motion passed.

John Ross introduced retirees from the Little Rock Conference: Roy Bagley; Claude Dines and Autrey Sirmon. Roy Bagley was the only retiree present. Bishop Hicks gave words of greeting and recognition. Roy Bagley gave answering acknowledgement an received his certificate of retirement.

Rubye Lee Jackson presented the following motion:

I move that persons who will be delegates to the Annual Conference for purpose of equalizing clergy-lay membership be notified and provided a copy of the Member Handbook prior to District Pre-Conference Workshop each year so that they may be adequately prepared to participate in all actions of the Conference. The motion was seconded and passed.

Roy Smith, Conference Youth Coordinator, introduced the youth delegates to the Conference.

Tom Weir reminded Perkins Alum of the Dutch Treat Luncheon on the Avanelle on June at 12:00 noon.

Dr. Grant Shockley, President of Philander Smith College, reported on that institution.

Sam Albright reported on the Methodist publishing house. The Little Rock Conference was presented with their share of the \$800,000 return from the Methodist publishing house in the form of a check for \$6,892.45.

Bob Trieschmann, Courtesy committee chairman, introduced Helen Wilson wh introduced a friend from Bolivia, Senora Olga Arraya of LaPaz. She is a retired libraria and secretary of the School of Nursing and Methodist Hospital. Senora Arraya extended he thanks from her country to the United Methodist Church of America.

Monday Afternoon, May 31, 1982 — 2:00

Bishop Hicks called the session to order with the singing of a hymn led by Fred H. Arnold. Bishop Hicks called Bill Elliott to offer a prayer.

Mark Morgan, Lisbon United Methodist Church (Camden District) introduced resolution to withdraw from World Council of Churches. It was moved that the resolution lay on the table for 24 hours. Ralph Hale seconded the motion and it passed. Bill Cheyne asket that the resolution be distributed. Ray Hozendorf moved that the names of B. T. Fooks an Frank Thompson be included in the memoirs. Passed. George Martin introduced the report of the Conference Council on Ministries. George Martin moved that the District Council of Ministries reports be accepted. George Tanner spoke to the report lifting up the feature of Evangehism and church growth, heritage, strengthening of the Church School, District Preachers Retreats. The District Council section of the Conference Council on Ministrie was approved by vote. George Martin moved that the report of the Board of Education by

- 2. Camp Tanako
- 3. 200th Anniversary of Methodism

approved. Bill Elliott spoke to the report:

Brenda Norwood introduced an amendment suggesting a link mechanism to insure EMLC representation in planning process.

Scholarship money (youth and adult), Campership monies for Tanako were requested.

John Miles moved that the funding be referred to CFA. Seconded and passed.

George Martin introduced the report of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry. Jeff McIlroy spoke of it. The report was approved by vote.

Howard Williams spoke to the report of the Board of Evangelism. Dale Diffee presented alternate report. Bill Haake seconded the alternate. Norris Steele spoke in opposition to the report. Nick Evans moved previous question. The vote on the substitute report failed and the COM Report was adopted (76 for — 164 against)

Mouzon Mann spoke to urgency of Evangelism expressed by Dale Diffee. Perkins School of Theology report was accepted.

The report of Philander Smith College was accepted.

The Board of Worship report was approved with no debate.

The report of the Stewardship Committee was approved. Gladwin Connell stated that a Seminar was proposed for April 15-16, 1983. This retreat will concentrate on "Life Style" and "Planning Giving."

This report was approved.

The report of the Board of Global Ministries was presented by Nick Evans. The Board requested that objective III be deleted and a substitute objective inserted.

Bill Arnold and Hank Wilkins IV discussed the question of acceptance of "next" session of Annual Conference. John Walker moved that "1983" be inserted back in report. The motion passed. Harold Davis and John Miles also spoke. Maxine Calloway of White Memorial moved that the report be amended by deleting #5 & #6. Her motion was defeated.

Bill Cheyne moved tabling section recommendation concerning Jurisdictional Mission needs — \$5,000 until action by the CFA. Passed. Walter Smith questioned the term "we will" as a matter of information concerning the TV Telethon.

Bill Arnold asked the relationship of CFA to COM. Merle Peterson responded.

The report of the Board of Global Ministries was approved by vote. Don Riggins moved the adoption of the report of the Board of Church and Society. Resolution to halt the nuclear arms race and a resolution on Capital Punishment were presented. The continuing Prison Ministries and the Public School resolution were reaffirmed. A vote was taken on the recommendation of Alcohol and Drug Abuse curriculum. Carried. The second resolution called for the Legislative Awareness Program.

Fay Norwood presented Priority EMLC — Goal #8 of the Board of Education to be approved without the money portion until CFA approves the money request. Bill Haake seconded. The motion passed. Marily Bachofner reported on the Criminal Justice Ministries. Ron Clark reported for World Hunger and new Haiti Goat Production project.

A vote was taken on the report of the Board of Church and Society and the report was approved.

The report of the Conference Communications Committee. Bud Reeves asked if it was feasible to use video equipment in small local churches. Keenan Williams responded that it was possible. The report was approved by a vote of the Conference.

The report of the Status and Roll of Women was adopted.

The report of the Commission on Religion and Race was adopted. It was moved that the Budget Recommendations of the COM be a part of the CFA report instead of being acted upon now. The Conference will wait for the CFA report. The motion passed.

It was pointed out that the Financial Statements for the Conference Council on Ministries appears in the pre-con digest for the information of the Conference.

The recommendations to CFA for funding were voted on as follows: Items 1 through 8, 10 and 11, and Item 13. Voting on Items 9 and 12 will be delayed until the CFA presents their report on Wednesday, June 2.

Item 13 is: "We recommend the 1983 apportionment for Jurisdictional Mission Needs include \$5,000 for the Jurisdictional Office for Volunteers in Mission." The session was adjourned.

Tuesday Morning, June 1, 1982 — 8:30 a.m.

Morning Worship Service as led by John Blundell. The devotion leader was John Shafer His message was entitled "Stand Firm (with the whole armor of God)." The businessession was called to order.

Bill Eason introduced the Area Communications Report. He presented Bob McCord editor of the Arkansas Gazette. Bill moved that we accept the four recommendations of th report. Richard Lancaster "We have had an area committee of communications to look int this last year. Has the Committee addressed the issue of how this would be different — o will it be different from what it was before?" Mr. McCord replied "Yes, we have addresse this question."

Bill Cheyne expressed a strong affirmation of the report and expressed hope that the Conference would approve it.

Mouzon Mann requested the addition of one word in the report to read: "to determine the financing, the content, the format, the frequency." John Hays moved a procedural amendment in the event that our sister conference does not approve the proposal the Little Rock Conference authorizes the committee to proceed with the study on a communication vehicle for the Little Rock Conference.

John Hays motion is amended to read \$3,000 maximum only if this Conference is studying it alone.

The amendment is approved and now becomes a part of the primary motion. Mik Clayton — a question for clarification — amended date to read by "September 15, 1982, instead of "before the end of 1982." The motion is seconded and carries.

The motion is made by Bill Eason that a vote be taken by secret ballot to be sealed and no opened until the North Arkansas Conference has met. There was a second. Bill Eason' motion was defeated. The motion is carried with the changes that were made. Bill Eason moved the adoption of Area Communications (page 18). The motion passed.

Fred Arnold moved that there be a newsletter to the pastors from the Council Office unti January 1, 1983, or until the proposal is worked out, to begin immediately. The motion was seconded. The motion was defeated.

George Martin introduced the Arkansas Christian Civic Foundation report. Georg Tanner spoke to the report. There is a motion from the Council on Ministries that the CCF b permitted to solicit funds from churches within the Conference.

Ralph Hale recommended that the CCF be given continued funding of \$14,500 for 1983. Dr Ed Trice of Texarkana spoke for this amendment. Others spoke on behalf of and against th amendment in an extended discussion. The question is called for. The amendment i defeated. The original motion carries.

The Order of the Day. Bob Trieschmann, Chairman of the Courtesies Committee, escort Mrs. Elaine Hicks before the Conference. Bishop Hicks meets her and the District Superintendents and their wives are invited to come forward. Bishop Hicks calls for Georg Tanner to come forward. He is welcomed by the Bishop to the Cabinet as Little Rock District Superintendent after appointments are read. Gladwin Connell is called an welcomed as Conference COM Director after appointments are read. George and Am Martin are called by the Bishop and recognized as official hosts of this Annual Conference Bishop Hicks expressed his appreciation to Mrs. Hicks before the Conference.

Irl Bridenthal appointed personal privilege. He is celebrating his 50th year as Conference member.

Mrs. Joe Hatcher was recognized by the Conference. Dr. Grant Shockley is recognized by the chair. Dr. Shockley moved that the question of the inclusion of Philander Smith College in the budget of the Annual Conference be referred to the Conference Commission on Higher Education and Campus Ministries and to the CFA in consultation with any other groups that is necessary with the instructions to report back at the 1983 meeting of the Conference. The vote is taken and the motion is approved.

George Martin moves the adoption of the whole report. The report is adopted.

John Hays introduces the unsponsored resolution for Pastoral Disability which has laid on the table for 24 hours. Merle Peterson does not agree with the resolution without a study obligating the Conference to something we know nothing about. Charles Ashcraft spoke in favor of the resolution. Roger Armstrong spoke in favor of the resolution. The motion passes.

The report of the Diaconal Ministries is given by Olive Smith. A motion is made for acceptance of this report. A personal word from John Walker gave praise to Olive Smith for

her work in education and diaconal ministries.

Bill Robinson and Reginald Moore of the Hoover Church share some of the good things that are going on there.

Reginald Moore talked about the ministry of his church (Hoover).

Deke Williams expressed thanks to the Bishop and the Cabinet and to the Board of Global Ministries. He reported there was one black pastor on full appointment at Annual Conference last year and six this year. The motion is made to adopt this report, seconded

and approved.

Richard Parker gave the report on Lydia Patterson Institute. He stated that we are part of what is done at LPI. David Deere, Chairperson of Conference Relations, stated that the District Superintendents reported to the ministers of the Little Rock Annual Conference that there were no charges against their lives and official administrations. The recommendations of the Committee on Conference Relations is approved. Palmer Garner spoke in support of Pastor's School.

Announcements were made. Adjourned.

Mailgram from Bishop Earl Hunt, Jr. in the Florida Annual Conference was read by Bishop Hicks.

Tuesday Afternoon, June 1, 1982 — 1:30 p.m.

Roy Smith introduced the report of the Youth and the report is adopted following a slide presentation of the youth ministry within and through the Little Rock Conference.

United Methodist Foundation report was made by James Argue, Jr. He expressed regrets that Mr. Butler is not able to be present today. Joe Hughes from Little Rock responded to Jim Argue's presentation. Hank Wilkins stated both he and his predecessor wish to compliment Jim Argue on the work that has been done. Black membership on the Board of Directors of United Methodist Foundation is questioned by Hank Wilkins. He also questions how the members of the Board are elected. That is an oversight from the Committee on Nominations. Motion to adopt this report is seconded and the report is approved by vote.

Perkins School of Theology report is presented by Bill Matthews. Plaques were presented to the Pulaski Heights United Methodist Church and the Lakeside United Methodist Church for their having participated in the intern program. PHUMC has had nine years with interns

and Lakeside six years.

Hank Wilkins a point of personal privilege. He introduced the first Minister in Training, Tyrone Borland. It was pointed out that there was a second MIT, Fred Smith.

Dr. Duane Bruce, Executive Secretary of the South Central Jurisdictional Council on Ministries, spoke on frontiers of mission and how they came to be.

Youth Coordinators were presented to complete the report of the youth of the Conference. They are: David Steele, Arkadelphia District; Rodney Steele, Hope District; Eddie Warren, Camden District; Roger Armstrong, Little Rock District; Rocky Starnes, Monticello District and Roy Smith, the Pine Bluff Coordinator.

Werner Trieschmann, President of the Youth of the Conference, reported. Nick Evans presented the Merger Study Committee report. While the study committee does see that it is possible for a merger to occur, it was their feeling that there should be a test of the water to see if persons of the Conference are serious about it. It was moved to adopt the recommendation of the Area Merger Study Committee. Nick Evans moved that we vote by written ballot and that the ballot be sealed and delivered to the Conference Secretary and that the Conference Secretary be ordered to count the ballot on June 6 and give a report on the vote after the NAC has voted at their session. The motion was seconded and carried for the secret ballot.

Gerald Myers presented the Equitable Salaries and Mission Salary supplement.

Corrections are to be made as he directs. These corrections are contained in the Equitable Salary report. On a motion made and seconded the supplement was approved.

Dr. Joe B. Hatcher presented the report from Hendrix College. He stated that Fawcett Hall will be the name of the new Administration Building and that it will be moved into by the Fall of 1983. Mrs. Hatcher was presented to the Conference. The Chair invited Mrs. Clara Shockley before the Conference. She received a hand of appreciation from the Conference.

The report of the Campus Ministries was given by Dan George. He reported that 87% of the apportionment was collected. He presented two main problems of the Wesley Foundation: 1. Recruitment — requested that the District Superintendents at the Charge Conferences or some other way give the names of all students who are attending college;

2. Please pay apportionment in full.

This report was approved.

Dr. Joe Phillips, Jr. presented the Methodist Children's Home report and stated that the Home's license renewal had been renewed under stringent requirements. This report was approved.

Camp Tanako report was presented by Charles Settle. Terry Everitt was introduced as Camp superintendent. He expressed appreciation for the support of Camp Tanako from all groups across the Conference and churches and presented Bishop Hicks with a new Camp Tanako T-shirt. Charles Settle moved the adoption of the report. Seconded and passed. Maxine Calaway, White Memorial asked an information question concerning make-up of the Tanako staff — and if there aren't any minorities that are the recruitment plans being made to include minorities on the staff? Terry Everitt responded that no minorities had applied for staff positions.

Bill Eason stated, "This year we do have blacks on the volunteer staff at Tanako and on the curriculum staff."

John Blundell reported on Camp Aldersgate and the report was adopted. N. Lee Cate gave the report on Mt. Sequoyah and the report was approved. The report of the UMW was presented by Doris Fish. The report was approved.

The resolution from the Lisbon Church, Camden District was presented by Mark Morgan. The Resolution states:

"As followers of the Prince of Peace, we denounce as inconsistent with Christianity and United Methodist Doctrine the World Council of Church's contribution and support of organizations which propagate acts of violence, brutality, repression, and military terrorism throughout the world. In light of these inconsistencies, we petition the General Conference of the United Methodist Church to renounce its membership, and discontinue all support, financial and otherwise, of the World Council of Churches."

Jim Knight offered a substitute motion:

"For we as followers of the Prince of Peace endorse the purposes and principles of the World Council of Churches, we find some practices in funding inconsistent with the Christian law. Therefore, we wish to go on record in support of the moral, responsible stewardship by the Council of its funds and that the UMC reassert its leadership role within that same body."

The motion was made to refer the Resolution to the Christian Unity on Interreligious Concerns and further, that this body report its recommendation to the 1983 Session of the Annual Conference.

Annual Conference.

The Chair ruled that the motion before us had to be referred. Don Wilson questioned "Does the referral have within it the phrase that the results of the study will revert back to the Annual Conference." The answer was "Yes." The motion is approved.

Bill Bryant spoke on behalf of the Peace organization.

Dr. James Christie with the Board of Global Ministries, National Division, was recognized by Bishop Hicks. Negail Riley of the General Board of Global Ministries is recognized as are Mr. and Mrs. Bob Robertson of the NAC.

Bob Trieschmann reported to the members of the Conference that the son of Claude Clark is in very critical condition. Dr. Arthur Terry dismissed the session with a prayer.

Wednesday Morning, June 2, 1982 — 8:30 a.m.

Morning Worship Service was led by D. Ed McCullough. The devotion leader was N. Lee Cate. His message was "To Serve the Present Age." The business session was called to order by Bishop Hicks at 9:05. Davis Thompson gave a report on his daughter's surgery and offered his thanks to the Conference for their concern.

Bishop Hicks referred to selected books from the bookstore. The Conference was apprised of the fact that James Robken had left the Conference for possible gall bladder surgery in Little Rock. The Conference Secretary reported that the minutes have been examined and are found to be in order.

The Conference accepted the report.

Merle Peterson, Chairman of CFA, presented their report. With certain changes, the report was adopted. The Chairman explained the relationship between the program

agencies of the Conference and the funding agencies.

The CFA report referred the request by Brenda Hinson for \$1,500 to be used in scholarships and continuing education to the Committee on Ethnic Minority Local Church. After discussion, the referral prevailed. The Conference Treasurer's report was given by Ann Onstott. She reported that by careful short-term investing of cash flow funds, the Treasurer's office has earned double the amount required to operate the Treasurer's office. The Treasurer's report was approved. Bill Haake presented the Statitician's Report (Total report found in statistical tables printed herein.)

Bill Steele asked that a study be made as to why the statistical numbers were decreasing. Bill Haake moved the approval of the Statistician's report. He was seconded and the

report was approved.

John Miles recommended that the Board of Evangelism accept the spirit of Dale Diffee's presentation. Howard Williams, Chairman of Board of Evangelism, responded to say that the Board is taking this into consideration. The Board will attempt to study five churches that are growing in membership and let these churches give specifics as to what they have done to make possible the gain. The Conference Trustees report was presented by Ralph Hale. Jim Rice moved that the money obtained from the sale of property with the Arkadelphia District go to the Arkadelphia District Board of Mission and Church Extension. It is accepted and is part of the report. A motion made to adopt the report. Passed.

John B. Hays presented the report on the Archives and History. He stated that the 1836 Journal of the Arkansas Conference which is the Journal recording the First Church Conference activities in Arkansas has been found. Churches having copies of Quarterly Conference minutes prior to 1936 are requested to let the Committee on Archives and History make copies. The third matter is that of the Bi-Centennial. Every church is encouraged to organize a bi-centennial committee. The Committee on Archives and History will be prepared to make specific recommendations at the next session of the Annual Conference for the celebration of the bi-centennial.

The Chair noted that Diane Hinkley and Dr. Grant Shockley are on the national committee of the bi-centennial. Dr. Shockley is serving as vice-chairman.

The report on the Archives and History Committee is adopted. The United Methodist Men report was given by T. O. Hammaker. Special attention was given to the 24 hour Watts line 1-800-251-2468 for counseling and prayer. This report was approved.

Larry Ferguson presented the Special Church Extension policy statement. His motion

was seconded and the policies were adopted by vote.

The Committee on Nominations for the United Methodist Foundation submitted to the Conference the following nominations: Carl Young, Maurice Mitchell, Carl Hall, Drexel Howard and Harold Robinson. The Chair ruled that the corporation nominates its own directors. The Conference is confirming but not electing these persons. These were confirmed by vote of the Conference.

The Chaplains present were asked to come down — John Schaffer, Withers Moore,

Thomas Nation.

Robert Trieschmann, Chaplain, Arkansas National Guard, also spoke. The question of where the next regular session of the Annual Conference will be held. George Martin

introduced Gene Harwood who invited the Conference back to Hot Springs. Motion was made to accept the invitation. The motion was adopted unanimously.

The Secretary of the Cabinet, Mike Clayton, moved that moving date be Wednesday, June

9. All charges pay incoming pastor June salary. Seconded and passed.

The Courtesies and Resolutions Committee Report was called for. Ralph Mann moved that this Conference give permission for the resolution to be prepared and placed in proper channels. This was passed. Bishop Hicks called for the District Superintendents to assist in the reading of the Ministerial appointments for 1982-1983. After reading of the appointments, the Conference stood and sang "A Charge to Keep I Have."

Ralph Mann pronounced the benediction.

VI. Reports

District Superintendent's Report To Annual Conference

The Cabinet, imperfect servants of Jesus Christ, appointed to be superintendents responsible for overseeing the total ministry of the church, greet you with Grace and Peace in the Name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

We have sought diligently to carry out the specific responsibilities assigned to us by the Discipline. "We confess that we have left undone those things which we ought to have done, and we have done those things which we ought not to have done," but God in His Mercy

continues to work in and through us to do His Will.

We have carefully endeavored to be in the consultative process in all appointments. All have much to learn in this new way of working with pastors and churches. We affirm the emphasis in the Discipline that this process shall in no way diminish the authority and responsibility of the Bishop in making and fixing all appointments. We believe that the morale of all will be greatly improved, when pastors and churches perceive that we truly seek to be fair in each situation, and strive for the good of the whole church.

This is an exciting and challenging time to be in ministry in Arkansas. We are experiencing a growing sense of trust and cooperation between the Cabinets of the two Conferences and among the Staff across the Area. The spirit of cooperation that reaches out to include every church, regardless of size, is helping to bring new life and work in a

growing number of churches grouped together for service and praise.

We are thankful for the continued support of the Missional Priority, Developing and Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church. Some progress has been made in program, in recruitment, and training of leadership. It is said, however, that we have yet to so put on Christ as to experience that life of faith in which there is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female. We pledge steadfast leadership to move closer to this scriptural goal.

We have faced, together, the challenge and problem represented by hunger throughout the world. In cooperation with other denominations, we have received a generous ingathering of food, clothing, animals and money. This is one of the largest events of its nature in the nation, and yet it is but a small sign pointing to the magnitude and complexity of this worldwide need. We must hear again the words of Jesus spoken in the context of judgment, "In as much as you have done it unto the least of these my brethren, you have done it unto me."

Bishop Hicks has acted with courage and wisdom in calling our attention to the growing threat of nuclear war. Surely, we must do all in our power to work the works of peace. We dare not be contributors to a holocaust offering up the whole family of God on the altars of idols.

We commend our Bishop, and other religious leaders in our area, in their efforts to uphold the principle of the separation of Church and State. These efforts point up the renewed concern of our people about the relationships between religion and science, faith and reason, church and politics, individual and community. This concern is reflected by the interest of our people for serious study of the Bible. We have a great opportunity to teach and preach the Word of God. There is, however, a long-standing gap in our approach to, and our understanding of, Scripture. We must not shy away from the challenge this gap represents. History suggests that renewal of the church is tied directly to serious study of the Bible. The gaps must be exposed and bridged if our efforts are to bear fruit and if we are to know the Truth that sets us free.

We are beginning to see the limits of reason and technology. We are frightened by what we are capable of doing to ourselves and others. The idols of our modern era are crumbling. Self confidence is being replaced with fear and hate. Our people are as sheep without a shepherd. Surely, we who know the Good Shepherd, must make Him manifest in this time of desperate need.

We give God thanks for being alive in this time of great opportunity. The remainder of this Century contains enough challenge to call forth the deepest faith, the highest commitment, and the most ardent work, of any time in Christian History. We are, of all people, most to be pitied if we close our eyes and fold our hands, or even worse, if we fix our eyes on small matters and piddle with insignificant tasks.

We might ask with those of old, "Who sinned that these things have come? They have come that God might manifest Himself in our midst." God makes His Grace, Peace, Mercy, Love, palpable, feelable, believable, as the open palm of your hand. These challenges have come that God might make Himself known to us in Jesus Christ, who became like us, that we might become like Him.

Thanks be to God for all those children, youth, and adults who, as United Methodists, (i.e. Christians in earnest) make Christ manifest by sharing in the total ministry of the People of God within the community of faith and in the world.

Thanks be to God for those in the specialized ministry of Word, Sacrament, and Order.

Thanks be to God for those who are set aside to guide us in the fulfillment of our ministry of service to others.

May the Grace of God enable us to make Him manifest in the midst of the challenges of our time. "Thy Kingdom Come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in Heaven." Amen.

Conference Council On Ministries

February 24-25, 1982

Purpose Statement:

The purpose of the Little Rock Conference, the churches and institutions related to the United Methodist Church within the Conference shall be:

- To communicate the Gospel with the intention of nurturing personal commitment to Jesus Christ and related Christian values.
- 2. To develop support systems and structures which will contribute to the enrichment of life-in-relationship with God, neighbor, family, environment, society, and one's self.
- To enable United Methodist Christians to join with others in alleviating human need in ways which lead to self-development and personal achievement.

To assist the fellowship of people called United Methodists in achieving our purpose, we understand our function as a conference to serve:

- as Partners with the local churches in discovering, interpreting, and proclaiming the gospel of Jesus-Christ; serving as the body of Christ; and performing the mission of Christ in His World.
- as Partners with districts, South Central Jurisdiction, and General Church in offering approaches which will enable the identification and implementation of forms of ministries which offer hope and encouragement for the present and future.
- 3. as Partners with other communions in offering approaches which will enable the identification and implementation of forms of ministries which offer hope and encouragement for the present and future.

Priority — Ethnic Minority Local Church

Purpose:

The purpose of the Little Rock Conference Committee on the Ethnic Minority Local Church is to coordinate the involvement of the Conference in the Missional Priority, "Developing and Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church."

Goal Statements:

- 1. Recruitment and retention of trained ethnic clergy.
- 2. To strengthen the ethnic church through support of Philander Smith College.
- 3. Developing and strengthening stewardship in the ethnic local church.
- 4. To assist local churches in responding to the missional priority.
- 5. To work closely with DCOM's in their implementation of the missional priority.

1983 Program Objectives:

1. To provide salary supplementation in two areas where there is promise for the strengthening of the local church with trained ethnic clergy leadership. It is important that such persons be in residence and full-time. Budget: \$8,000. (two \$4,000 supplements or as best addresses the goal)

To provide \$500 in scholarship aid at Philander Smith College each semester. Priority for this aid will be United Methodist ethnic students, who are enrolled as full-time

students. Budget: \$1,000.

3. To provide an area-wide training program on stewardship for the ethnic local church which is designed to enhance the understanding and nature of Christian stewardship. This is designed as a year long program. Budget: \$1,000.

4. To provide leadership from the EMLC Committee to do interpretive events and staff

the EMLC section of the District "My Job" Workshops. Budget: \$250.

5. To provide the vital link between the Conference EMLC Committee and the DCOM's, we are proposing that one member of the EMLC Committee from each district sit ex officio on the DCOM to assist in the district implementation of this missional priority. Budget: \$250.

Total Budget: \$10,500.00

All of the aforementioned budget comes from the apportioned fund for the missional priority of which the conference retains 30%. This budget assumes a payout rate of about 90% for the conference.

Theressa Hoover United Methodist Church

Report to the Little Rock Annual Conference — 1982

"For whosoever shall do the will of my Father, which is in heaven, the same is my brother, and sister, and mother." Matthew 12:50

Obviously, someone understood what that passage of scripture meant, because the

Theressa Hoover United Methodist Church in Little Rock is in existence today.

In 1974, the Little Rock District Superintendent began a study of changing communities in the District. The study data proved positive in the establishment of a new ministry in the Highland area, which was being vacated by a United Methodist church that at one time had 1.214 members.

At the 1979 Annual Conference, Harry Bass moved that the conference bless the efforts to establish a black Methodist Church in Little Rock. He withdrew the motion. Tom Adkinson supported the idea. John Hays said Highland was considering an offer of \$200,000. Negail Riley suggested that the issue be referred to the Council Board of Global Ministries. Charles Ashcraft moved that the conference authorize the Board of Trustees to purchase Highland Church and mortgage the property to hold for the conference until the Board of Global Ministries had an opportunity to develop its use and this was referred to the Council on Finance and Administration. The CFA reported, "We accept the recommendation of Charles Ashcraft and move that it be referred to the Conference Board of Trustees. Further, we suggest that the Board of Trustees consult with the Conference Board of Global Ministries, the Little Rock District Board of Missions, and the Ethnic Minority Local Church Task Force regarding procedures. We also move that the Special Church Extension Fund be increased in the amount of \$21,000 and receipts be directed to the Conference Board of Trustees for payment of interest on mortgage." Charles Ashcraft moved the Board appoint a study group to study the procedures for handling churches in transition and report back to the Annual Conference. This was carried. I refer you to the 1979 Annual Conference Journal, Page 68.

The 1980 report of the Council on Finance and Administration approved the necessary funds for the Highland project. Thirty-eight thousand, six hundred fifty dollars (38,650) was apportioned. Ray Bagely moved that the capital campaign of \$200,000 for former Highland Church Property be approved. Following discussion, vote by secret ballot was 164 — YES; 36 — NO. John B. Hays moved, "That the Trustees of the Little Rock Annual Conference be and are hereby authorized to enter into a loan agreement for the financing of the property

owned by the Annual Conference at the most favorable terms and interest rates available. "Further, that any two officers of the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to sign any mortgage and other legal documents necessary to complete the loan." This was passed. I refer you to the 1980 Annual Conference Journal, Pages 62 and 101. The Little Rock Conference was letting other conferences see that they were serious about meeting the general church's emphasis on strengthening and developing ethnic minority congregations. This ministry was also to have an active out-reach ministry focus.

William Robinson, Jr. was appointed to lead in the new black congregational development. The church's emphasis was to be on effective evangelism, outreach ministry program development and lay leadership growth. Although the doors of the church were not opened for service until August 10, 1980, William Robinson recognized the need to begin immediately developing and witnessing. Music is a vital part of any church and especially in the black church. It draws people into the church who would otherwise be hesitant. A choir was established focusing in on a broad range of musical selections from the Gothic chants to the modern day Gospel and Contemporary Music. Flyers were passed out in the community letting the community know that a community serving church was opened for service.

The doors of the church were opened officially on August 10, 1980. Approximately fifteen (15) persons showed up for that first service and were challenged to go forth in Jesus' name. The church was renamed Theressa Hoover United Methodist Church in honor of the Associate General Secretary of the Women's Division, a native of Fayetteville, Arkansas. Bishop Kenneth Hicks delivered the chartering address to the first black church to be organized in the Little Rock Conference in the last thirty-five years on December 21, 1980, with twenty-seven members.

The Children's and Sanctuary choir began growing as the church began to take on its call to be in ministry to the community as set forth by the annual conference. United Methodist Youth, United Methodist Men, United Methodist Women, Church School, a working Administrative Council, an Evangelism Team with the aid of R. B. Brown, an active outreach ministry, lay leadership, all began touching the surrounding community and larger community until people began to sit up and say, "there's a church on 13th and Cedar who realizes what the gospel of Jesus Christ means." Articles on the church's ministry have appeared in several Methodist publications nationally, and a representative from the General Council on Ministries has visited the Hoover church, which was one of the churches across the nation selected for surveying as a model for types of assistance needed in new black congregational development versus white congregations.

Requests began pouring into the church, from as far away as Hot Springs First Church, asking, "what can I do to help and support your ministry?" The facilities were quickly being used for a ministry to the community. Those ministries include the following:

BLACK COMMUNITY DEVELOPER'S PROGRAM, this program is one of the missional programs of the General Board of Global Ministries. It allows an individual to be a liaison between the local church and community. Responsibilities include designing programs for the community that brings about a level of positive self-imagery, fighting some of the atrocities that affect our community, and witnessing or evangelizing in the name of Jesus Christ for the Methodist Church.

FOOD AND CLOTHING MINISTRY, this program helps those who for many reasons would have to do without, since poverty is very high in the Highland community. This ministry has helped somewhere around 700 different families over the last year. This ministry has also brought other Methodist churches together in the Little Rock/North Little Rock area in one accord where if this program did not exist it may not have happened. The Little Rock Metro-Ministry uses Hoover as a Clearinghouse to distribute food and clothing to those in real need.

WORK RELEASE PROGRAM FOR FIRST OFFENDERS, this program allows the first offender to come out to the church and community and serve his or her time through work programs and/or assistance.

PARENTING SKILLS WORKSHOP, this program through the Parent Center allows

those who need to strengthen their parenting skills or to develop skills to do just that. The Parent Center recognized the fact that blacks were not utilizing the services that the Parent Center had to offer and after a study was done they found out several reasons:

- 1. The location of their former facility was inaccessible to the black community,
- 2. The cost factor for their programs was geared for the upper class family,
- They lacked minority counselors,
- 4. They lacked knowledge in reaching into the black community.

Interestingly, the Board of Discipleship is planning to implement a Parenting Program for the churches soon. Hoover has already implemented theirs.

EMERGENCY SHELTER, this program is a much needed program for the community anywhere. Many times families lose their homes because of fire, tornado, and other reasons. This program allows a family to utilize a space provided for them on a temporary basis.

CARE FOR THE MENTALLY ILL, this ministry is a counseling and care ministry. So many times we turn our backs on those considered by us as mentally ill, as if we ourselves are immune from ever being declared mentally ill. This program allows the individual to respond, feel loved and cared for, and also helps the individual to take care of their personal business. One individual is learning how to manage his finances.

SUMMER YOUTH ENRICHMENT PROGRAM, this program is through the Neighborhood Arts Program. The Arts Center foresaw a need to put their programs into the community and into an area that needs this type of enrichment. The center was selected because of the types of ministry it was giving to the community. This program allows youth to participate in drama, photography, art, music, modern dance, and geriatrics. A total of 83 youth were serviced last summer through this program.

EDUCATIONAL AND POLITICAL FORUMS, this program brings into the community individuals from the educational and political arena. It's usually done on a community forum style where the community can come face-to-face with those who make the decisions for them and allows extensive dialogue to take place.

TUTORIAL CLASSES, this program allows children, youth, and adults to come to the center for assistance with their educational problems and someone is there to assist them. For children and youth, this provides for them another mechanism for learning and it's a time being wisely used. For adults, it helps them to refresh, regroup, and remember.

SENIOR CITIZEN'S PROGRAM, this program allows for senior citizens in the community to decide what programs they wish to participate in and also allows them to direct their own programs. It gives them an opportunity to utilize the skills and knowledge that they possess in a cooperative spirit of fellowship.

DAY CARE CENTER (PAW PAW'S DAY CARE), from the first time this ministry was offered to the community, the faces of parents lit up. Here was an opportunity to place their child in a licensed center that cared what their child was learning, the child's potential for growth, and that recognized the needs of the individual child. It allowed them not to have to travel across town to a day care that was only concerned about making a profit. That's not the ministry of the church, that is, not at Hoover. This ministry is licensed for 45 children by the State Department of Social Services and has an enrollment of 42. They just graduated 15 this past May 23rd and requests for those slots as well as others are being applied for.

Many of these programs are existing with the aid of those networks already long established so as not to cause any duplication of services.

Programs and ministries continue to be strengthened with the support of the district, conference and general boards and agencies, and by many local churches who believe this ministry is vital to Arkansas Methodism. Here is an example of true sensitivity and response to a community that is saying in the words of Dr. Charles Tindley, "When the storms of life are raging, stand by me." Last night, Mike Clayton said in his sermon, "if we do not think of the future of the church, then the church has no future." That is almost like the story of the man who had a bird in the palm of his hands . . .

Pine Bluff District Council On Ministries — 1983

1983 Program Objectives and Budgets

Our one priority in the Pine Bluff District for 1983 is to implement laity involvement in our two year strategy for growth in the local churches in the Pine Bluff District. Budget: \$800.00 Our plan of action is as follows:

- a. Written information of membership trends in each church in the District over the last 10 years compiled by Spring, 1982.
- b. District Task Force develops an agenda for a pastor's retreat in the Fall of 1982.
- c. Retreat for the Pastor's of the District to develop our own personal and District strategy for growth over next 2 years.
- d. Clergy-Laity dialogues designed to develop local church strategy for growth in the next two years.
- e. Quarterly reviews of the results of progress through 1983. Reviews in summer, fall and winter of 1983.
- f. District-wide conference in the fall of 1983 on the theme: 1984 and more.

On-Going Responsibilities

- a. District-wide program of youth ministries. Budget: \$200.00
- b. Teacher training and Vacation Church School Workshops. Budget: \$250.00
- Leadership development workshops in training local church officers and leaders with skills in their offices. Budget: \$200.00
- d. District-wide sensitivity event on EMLC priority of the whole church. Budget: \$300.00
- e. Follow-up of Family Life Workshop of 1982 with an emphasis on special needs of groups such as elderly, single, handicapped, etc. Budget: \$200.00

Total Budget: \$1,950.00

Board Of Education — 1983

Purpose

To develop and promote a conference program of Christian Education that gives children, youth, young adults and adults a knowledge of and experience in the Christian faith as motivation for Christian service in the Church, the Community, and the world. This will include guidance and training for District leaders responsible for Christian education and for local church chairpersons of the work area and commissions on education, superintendents of the Church School Program, Age-level and Family Life coordinators, Church School teachers, and other leaders in the Educational ministry of Local Churches.

Goals

- To assist the DCOM's in training local church leaders to actually do the work of Christian Education in the local church.
- 2. To work with the Coordinating Committee on Camping to provide quality experience in our Conference Camping Ministry; to expand the scope of the camping ministry by 15% each year during the 1981-84 quadrennium.
- Promote the Little Rock Conference Camping Program at Camp Tanako; and Lal Training Events at Mt. Sequoyah through the DCOM's and local churches.
- 4. To strengthen the local church by developing a strategy which would include:
 - a. Compiling and making available a list of resource people in the area for Christian Education for all age groups, and Family Life.
 - Having workshops for leaders in each age level, and Family Life, including training for leaders in small membership churches, intergenerational settings and open class settings.
- 5. To encourage the observance of the first Sunday of Christian Education Week in each local church as Christian Education Sunday for the purpose of emphasizing the importance of Christian Education and for receiving an offering for the week of Christian Education in the Conference. The offering goal for 1983 is \$12,000.00.
- To encourage and support the development of Family Life Ministry in the Conference District and local churches.
- 7. To have a weekend conference of Young Adults.
- 8. Provide a link mechanism between the Board of Education and EMLC.

Objectives

- To provide a literature display and list of resource leaders in Christian Education a Annual Conference, 1983.
- 2. To design, staff and support the Conference Camping Program at Camp Tanako:
 - a. Children's Choir Camp. Budget: \$1,050.00
 - b. Conference Camp. Budget: \$1,500.00
 - c. Music, Art, Drama. Budget: \$1,250.00
 - d. Camp Curriculum & Volunteer Staff. Budget: \$8,800.00
 - e. Youth Choir Camp. Budget: \$500.00
 - f. Family Weekend. Budget: \$250.00
 - g. Other Camps
 - 1. Elementary Camp I, II, III
 - 2. Junior High Camp I, II
 - 3. Clowning, Puppetry, Mime and Dance
 - h. To insure the inclusion of ethnic minority persons in the planning of these events Resulting in participation in all activities.
 - 1. Provide scholarship monies for this purpose
 - Provide money for an EMLC conference camp for all persons to insure an inter-change of ideas and a sharing experience. The categories would include youth and adults.

Budget \$1,50

- To devise a strategy for developing Christian Education leadership in the Conference Budget: \$2,200.00
 - Compile a list of resource persons with expertise in Christian Education who are in the area.
 - b. Compile an additional list of persons who are potential leaders (with additiona training) in Christian Education.
 - c. Provide training events and funding for persons to attend these and other training events (Mt. Sequoyah, etc.) which are offered.
 - d. Make this list of resource persons available to the Conference.
- 4. To provide Young Adult training and some funding for a Conference Young Adul event. Budget: \$500.00

- 5. To support Conference Family Life Committee objectives:
 - a. To train Family Life Coordinators through "My Job" Workshops in each District. Budget: \$250.00
 - To have a Family Life Weekend at Camp Tanako (funding included under Camps in section 2)
 - c. To hold a quality area event on Parenting. Budget: \$750.00
- 6. To resource a training event for Adult Workers with Youth and to provide a resource booklet twice a year for Youth Work. Budget: \$300.00

Total Budget: \$17,350.00

Recommendations

- It is expected that United Methodist Curriculum shall be the basis for Christian education in the churches of our conference. It is our conviction that the recommended curriculum is the best material available for United Methodist Churches.
- 2. We urge CFA to continue to receive the Christian Education Day offering in the way it is now being received for these reasons:
 - a. It gives high visibility to Christian Education which has been an historic Methodist emphasis. As a designated offering the Minister has a chance to lift up the importance of Christian Education.
 - b. It does not seem wise at this point in the quadrennium to add an offering (although it is being collected under another name) to World Service and Conference Benevolence, even though the total allocated would be the same. No matter how adequate an explanation of the increase in World Service and Conference Benevolence is given, the explanation will be missed or misunderstood by many and will cause problems. Your Education Board feels that a lesser amount will be collected than is now being received unless it is kept as a separate apportionment.
 - c. Permission for receiving the offering is expressly given in the Discipline to the Annual Conference paragraph 270; and 271 E. With this permission, and a day set aside for Christian Education, it seems appropriate to have such an offering.

Perkins School Of Theology

Report to Little Rock Annual Conference — 1983

"Perkins offers superb field education for its students and is conspicuous for its academic excellence." So states Dean James E. Kirby about the School of Theology at Southern Methodist University. Kirby is the first alumnus of Perkins to be appointed its dean, returning to Texas in June, 1982 to take up his post.

The challenges of preparing persons for the decade of the eighties have resulted in a comprehensive curriculum review which has been extended through this year and into the next. A review committee, made up of faculty, students, and alumni/ae has taken a careful look at current degree requirements. Perkins is committed to maintain a curriculum which will not only train persons to think theologically but also to impart skills in such practical areas as church budgeting. The increasing pluralism of the church and the importance of making it evident in the seminary community have caused the dean to institute conversational Spanish classes for faculty and staff.

Under the leadership of the new Director of Development, Joan Ronck, plans and programs are being formulated to make fund raising a high priority. By the beginning of the academic year, a director of recruitment and admissions and a dean of student life will be appointed, as well as a new faculty member in Christian Education.

Student enrollment for 1981-82 school year totalled 423 degree students, of which 326 are United Methodists. Twenty-one other denominations are represented and 15 international students are enrolled. Students come from 37 states and 12 countries. Reflecting recent trends, nearly half of the students enrolled this year did undergraduate work in state institutions rather than in church-related colleges.

Philander Smith College

Report to Little Rock Annual Conference — 1983

Notable progress, new directions, creative program thrusts and retrenchment have characterized the course of events at Philander Smith College — related to United Methodism and Arkansas Methodism for more than a century — during the past annual conference year.

During 1981-82 student enrollment was up slightly for the first time in two years. In the Fall semester 637 were enrolled. First-time entering students numbered 128. Eighty percent of the student body is from Arkansas. Ten percent come from the cities and state surrounding Arkansas while about ten percent are internationals — mostly from Africa but the Caribbean and Middle East as well.

Academic programs have been expanded and enriched through new components in Computer Science, Dance and Psychology. With financial assistance from foundations and government grants, computerized registration and updated business office procedures have been installed. Last Fall the College received a CETA grant of \$197,000 to prepare minority youth for employment in mass communications fields. A grant of \$50,000 has been received from the Fund for the Improvement of Post-Secondary Education (FIPSE) to develop a closer cooperative relationship with neighboring colleges in Little Rock. The Student Union Center is being renovated with a grant of \$150,000 from the Kresge Foundation. Dormitorie approach eighty percent occupancy for the first time since 1978. The College has established a new position in Church Relations for the purpose of cultivation of the eight supporting annual conferences in the Jurisdiction — Kansas East, Kansas West, Little Rock, Missour East, Missouri West, Nebraska, North Arkansas and Oklahoma. During the past year this office has been largely responsible for revitalizing church relations with the College. It has also raised a significant amount of money for the College.

Despite these positive vital signs, the College is in financial difficulty. Government grant to students for tuition payments have decreased and will decrease further in 1982-1983 Enrollment forecasts are negative rather than positive. The cost factors of programs faculty-staff salaries, goods and services have increased almost forty percent in the las five years. Tuition fees cannot be increased to any great extent without becoming unresponsive to the basic mission of the College — to provide the greatest possible access the largest number of disadvantaged youth, especially black youth, as possible.

The College moved in several directions to resolve the situation it faced. A program of stringent retrenchment was put in place including budget reductions, program consolidation, reductions in non-critical and non-essential services and staff reduction—academic and non-academic. A Development/Fund Raising program will be launched in April involving (1) clarification of mission, (2) trustee involvement in fund-raising, (3) the creation of a support advisory board for development, (4) several fund-raising drives, (5) strategy to position the College to seek and gain wider public support and (6) the development of a long range plan of growth.

The annual United Negro College Fund Drive (July-December) included in 1981 for the first time a State-Wide Telethon featuring the famous Lou Rawls Parade of Stars Show More than \$44,000 was pledged in this effort and approximately \$25,000 came in the form of cash

An aggressive and focused recruitment program has been launched. A determined Alumni Association has recommitted itself to a wide range of support activities. Last, but not least, a reorganized and revitalized Collegiate Chorale group of twenty-four mixed voices will tour in the eight supporting annual conferences of the College this Spring.

Board Of Higher Education And Campus Ministry — 1983

One of the primary functions of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry is to present the financial needs for adequate support of all ministries related to higher education. This includes schools, colleges, seminaries, campus ministries, related to our conference. Therefore, we present the following recommendations to the Council of Finance and Administration and to the Annual Conference for their consideration.

- 1. We recommend that an apportionment of \$148,000.00 be made to the churches in the Little Rock Conference for the support of Hendrix College. In addition, we recommend that the "Fair-share" goal of \$93,000.00 be continued in 1983 and that it be designated for endowed scholarships for United Methodist students.
- 2. We recommend that the full apportionment as requested be made to the local churches for the Black College Fund.
- We recommend that the full apportionment as requested be made to the local church for the Ministerial Education Fund.
- 4. We request that an apportionment in the amount of \$119,071.00 be made to the local churches for the support of Campus Ministries in the Little Rock Annual Conference for 1983.
- 5. We request that the first Sunday after Thanksgiving be designated as Methodist Student Day with offering.
- 6. We request permission to raise \$3,500 in the Camden District over the next year for capital improvements for the Wesley Foundation at Southern Arkansas University in Magnolia. These funds to be administered by the Camden District Superintendent.

Board Of Evangelism — 1983

Purpose

Matthew 28:19-20. "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, to the close of the age."

 - b. Using local church newsletters, district newsletters and conference mailings to show that Evangelism and Church Growth is a vital part of ministry in Arkansas Methodism. Budget: \$600.00
 - c. Recommended that Pastor School be devoted to Evangelism and Church Growth.
 - d. Training Events on Evangelism and Church Growth in each District using persons
 - of competence in our Conference. Budget: \$750.00
 e. Send key personnel to Jurisdictional and National events on Evangelism and Church Growth, and/or bring in resource persons from general or jurisdictional level to the Conference. Budget: \$750.00

3. The Conference Board of Evangelism will work with the Conference Committee on Ethnic Minority Local Church in implementing the emphasis on Evangelism and Church Growth in Ethnic Minority Local Church during the Quadrennium.

The first election shall be as hereinafter set forth and all succeeding elections shall be for a term of three (3) years, with the Board electing five (5) Camp Tanako Trustees each year.

Section 2: The following officers of the Little Rock Conference or their appointed representative shall be Ex-Officio members of the Board of Trustees of the Corporation, with the same rights and duties as Camp Tanako Trustees, to serve during their term of office: The Resident Bishop; the Arkadelphia District Superintendent; the Associate Director of the Conference Council on Ministries; the Chairperson of the Board of Education; the President of the United Methodist Women; the President of the United Methodist Youth.

Section 3: Delete section 3 in its entirety and re-number section 4 as section 3 and all succeeding sections accordingly.

Little Rock Conference Board Of Global Ministries

Purpose

To serve as a linkage between local churches, districts, the Annual Conference, the Jurisdictional Council on Ministries, and the General Board of Global Ministries, providing for global ministries functions related to the objectives and scope of the General Board of Global Ministries.

Goals

I. To interpret the nature of and Biblical and theological mandates for global mission, making mission education and cultivation opportunities available to all persons in the Little Rock Annual Conference and enlisting persons in mission. (Committee on Education and Cultivation)

II. To interpret and support Parish and Community Development, increasing total membership, ethnic membership, community service and development, and participation

in Cooperative Parish Ministry. (Parish and Community Development Committee)

III. To interpret and increase financial support of the Missional Priority, Special Programs related to global ministries, and Advance Specials. (Parish and Community Development Committee, World Hunger Committee, Education and Cultivation Committee, Africa Church Growth and Development Committee)

IV. To interpret, increase, and implement financial support of Health and Welfare

Ministries. (Health and Welfare Committee)

1983 Objectives

Objective I: Establish a program of orientation and training for Annual Conference mission leaders.

1. Provide "My Job" training for the Annual Conference BOGM, with special emphasis on the district chairperson of missions. (cost: \$250)

Objective II: Interpret and promote the Africa Church Growth and Development Special Program.

1. Conduct district workshops on the 1983 Central Africa mission study, led by

itinerating missionary personnel. (cost: \$600)

2. Designate a special offering for the Africa Church Growth and Development Advance to be received on Pentecost, providing promotional material to pastors and councils on ministries. (cost: \$75)

Objective III: The Board of Global Ministries recommends the Conference Task Force on Congregational Development evaluate and clarify the Conference's role in the development

of the Hoover United Methodist Church, including:

1. The continued use by the congregation of the Conference owned facility.

2. The congregation's potential for assuming full debt service and maintenance of the facility.

3. The congregation's potential for achieving significant growth and ministry.

In consultation with the congregation, Area EMLC Director, and appropriate Little Rock District agencies, the Task Force shall develop and submit to the 1983 Annual Conference specific recommendations for Hoover in the comprehensive plan for congregational development.

The Board of Global Ministries and Conference Council on Ministries have identified 6 possible courses of action to be considered by the Task Force in preparing a

recommendation:

- 1. Increase congregational membership and stewardship to the level of self-support.
- 2. Develop additional uses for the facility which would assist in debt service and upkeep expenses.
- 3. Continue and increase Annual Conference assistance.
- 4. Some combination of 1-3.
- 5. Sell the facility. Assist the congregation in relocation.

6. Sell the facility. Cease all Conference funding to the congregation.

Objective IV: To increase participation in and contributions to the Golden Cross Fund.

1. Designate May 1, 1983, as "Golden Cross Sunday." Provide promotional material to each pastor and local church council on ministries for the Golden Cross offering (cost: \$100)

On-going Responsibilities

Continued with funding: Area School of Christian Mission, \$2,200; CPM Award Dinner \$300; CPM Training Events, \$3,000; Hunger and Lifestyle Ministries, \$3,750.

Continued without funding: Local church Mission Festivals; Congregationa Development Task Force.

Recommendations to CFA

We recommend the \$40,000 apportionment for Special Church Extension be continued.

We recommend the \$12,000 for Regular Church Extension in Conference Benevolences be continued.

We recommend the Saint Paul School of Theology be allowed to solicit gifts in the Little Rock Annual Conference for the endowment of a chair in Parish Ministries.

We recommend the 1983 apportionment for Jurisdictional Mission Needs include \$5,000 for the Jurisdictional Office for Volunteers in Mission.

We recommend \$50,000 be requested from the churches in "Fair Share" goals for "core costs" at Aldersgate, and that "programatic costs" be continued as a Conference Advance Special.

Area Hunger Task Force

- 1. We will provide the Annual Conference with opportunities to combat World Hunger through advance giving by selecting specific projects as Advance Specials.
- 2. We will continue to review and provide feedback to our Conference as to the accomplishments in the area of our responsibilities (World Hunger).
- 3. We will promote, in cooperation with other religious groups, the State Ingathering held in November of each year.
- 4. In an effort to publicize the Ingathering and reach a larger segment of the State's population, we will produce for T.V. a Telethon with a minimum length of one hour.
 - 5. Ingathering projects selected and approved by the Area Hunger Task Force are:
 - a. Arkansas Nutrition Program for the Elderly For every \$1.00 that we give, the Government gives \$5.60 for food.
 - b. Camp Aldersgate Senior Citizen Program This program provides planned recreation, handicrafts, entertainment, and a good, nutritious meal at noon.
 - c. Goat Production Project in Haiti Arkansas Area UMC, Winrock International, World Christian Relief Foundation, and the Government of Haiti are working together to improve meat, milk, and cheese production in Haiti.
 - d. Soya Production & Research Assoc., Bareilly, India. A self-help educational program to teach farmers to grow soybeans, produce high protein foods, and the distribution of foods.
 - e. World Christian Relief Fund, Inc. Technology, equipment, seeds, etc., are furnished farmers in Bangladesh, India, and Haiti to help the world's needy help themselves.
 - f. Church World Service Blankets, health kits, school kits, etc.
 - g. Rice Rice shipped through UMCOR/CWS provides incentives for participation in educational and training programs for hungry people.
 - h. Heifer Project International Projects selected: Haiti, Family Farm Network in south Arkansas, Native American Cattlemen Assoc. project in South Dakota, The Sheep Fattening Project in West Bank, Israel, and the Dairy Farm Project in Egypt.

Resolution

A Call To Halt The Nuclear Arms Race

Whereas, the escalation of research, production, and deployment of nuclear arms continues to become more deadly and dangerous, with the resulting threat of nuclear war causing unimaginable death and suffering; and

Whereas, global expenditures for arms of \$500 billion annually are drawing the world's resources for development and are diverting desperately needed funds for the alleviation of poverty, hunger, and economic stratification toward equality and justice among the world's people; and

Whereas, the prophetic call of shalom is inherent to the worldwide Judeo-Christian community, the overarching theme of Biblical revelation, and is the human expression of God's will for harmony and wholeness; and

Whereas, God's will and intention for peace is ultimately expressed in the life, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ, who is our peace; and

Whereas, being members of the body of his Church, we are called to be peacemakers, proclaiming a gospel of peace, reconciliation, and repentance; and in the freedom, strength, and forgiveness of the gospel we strive faithfully toward the Biblical vision of peace;

Therefore, be it resolved:

that the Little Rock Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church express its deep concern over the increasing threat of catastrophic nuclear war and join in calling for a halt to the nuclear arms race; and

that the Little Rock Annual Conference affirm the conviction that to improve national and global security, the United States and the Soviet Union, along with Great Britain, France and the People's Republic of China, should adopt and implement a mutual freeze on testing production, and deployment of nuclear weapons; and

that the Little Rock Annual Conference affirm this mutual freeze as an essential verifiable first step toward lessening the risk of nuclear war and reducing the nuclear arsenals and toward the ultimate aim of achieving a worldwide moratorium on nuclear weapons; and

that the Little Rock Annual Conference affirm the United States-Soviet Union arms reduction negotiations in Geneva as crucial in importance and hopeful in their possibilities, and call upon its congregations and others of good will to engage in continuing prayer for the success of these negotiations and for the elimination of nuclear weapons and for enduring peace in our world; and

that the Little Rock Annual Conference call upon its congregations to give high priority toward involving members in appropriate efforts to halt the nuclear arms race, including the availability of Congressional petitions calling for a mutual nuclear arms freeze as a means of personal response to the growing crisis; and

that the Little Rock Annual Conference direct its officials to present copies of this action to the President of the United States, to the Secretaries of State and Defense, and to all representatives of the State of Arkansas in the United States Senate and House of Representatives, urging them to take all available initiatives toward the attainment of these ends.

Little Rock Conference Board of Churches and Society

A Resolution On Capital Punishment

The Board of Church and Society of the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church, in keeping with its stated purpose to show the members of the church and the society that the reconciliation which God effected through Christ involves personal, social and civic righteousness, affirms the following:

WHEREAS the Arkansas Criminal Code still provides capital punishment for certain crimes; and

WHEREAS the Governor of the State of Arkansas is setting execution dates for persons on death row in Arkansas; and

WHEREAS the 1980 Book of Discipline (p. 101) opposes capital punishment and urges its

elimination from the Criminal Code; and WHEREAS the taking of a human life removes forever the possibility for rehabilitation

whereas the taking of a human life removes forever the possibility for rehabilitation and redemption; and

WHEREAS the claim that capital punishment provides a deterrent to crime has not been substantiated or conclusively proven; and

WHEREAS capital punishment is discriminatory in that it is imposed almost exclusively against members of racial minorities, the poor and the uneducated; and

WHEREAS human execution, in whatever form and for whatever reason, compounds the moral dilemma of our political system and involves the people of the state in a violent act of questionable moral behavior:

BE IT RESOLVED:

THAT the Board of Church and Society and the Little Rock Annual Conference affirm the sacred value of all persons, law-abiding and law-breaking alike;

THAT the Board and the Conference extend their concern to the victims of crime as well as its perpetrators;

THAT the Board and the Conference oppose capital punishment as a means of dealing

THAT the Board and the Conference support efforts directed toward rehabilitation and

crime prevention; and

THAT the Board and the Conference call upon the Governor of the State of Arkansas, the Legislature, the Board of Correction, and the people of our State to take the necessary steps for the elimination of capital punishment from the Criminal Code.

Political and Human Rights

Marilyn Bachofner, Executive Director of Criminal Justice Ministries brought the board up to date information on the prison ministries. Budget: \$10,000 (CFA)

Committee On Communications — 1983

Suggested programs for a video ministry for the Little Rock Annual Conference:

a. Conference Video News Program. Each month the office of Communications will produce a 15-20 minute conference news program. This will be a video presentation of religious news from local churches, conference, and national news items, and other religious news of current interest. Such a format will be suitable for local cable systems and local church "in-house" use.

b. Instructional tapes for "My Job Workshops." Several 15 minute tapes will be produced on various church programs and committees that can be used as teaching

aids for "My Job Workshops."

c. Taping Conference Workshops. The Conference will tape certain workshops that are held within the conference and make these available to local churches for instructional viewing. This will enable more people to benefit from the number of workshops held each year.

d. Producing a Video Benevolence Program. At least one 15-30 minute program will be produced on a particular conference benevolence program or Advance Special. This program will be of the quality that will enable it to be aired on a cable system or for

local church "in-house" use.

e. Video Workshop. The conference will sponsor a Basic Video Workshop which will be concerned with the use of basic video equipment and the variety of uses for church programs

Whereas, the United Methodists of Arkansas (and the predecessor denominations) have had a long history with an area newspaper; and

Whereas, we, at the present time, do not have such a communications organ; and

Whereas, the Bishop and members of his Area Leadership Team asked the two Conference Councils on Ministries to form an Area Ad Hoc Newspaper Committee to report recommendations about this matter to the 1982 Annual Conferences;

Now, therefore, be it resolved that the following recommendations are made concerning state-wide United Methodist Communications.

- 1. That an Area Communication Tool must be made available for the United Methodists of Arkansas.
- 2. That the CFA in each Conference appropriate \$2,000.00 immediately so that an independent, professional study can be made (in the summer of 1982) to determine the financing, the format, style, desired frequency, content, etc. of an Area Communication Tool.
 - 3. That the Annual Conference direct the Area Communications Committee to take the

findings of the professional study and design the Area Communications Tool, propose to the CFAs a budget, name the staff, and target January 1, 1983, as the time to begin.

4. That Bishop Kenneth Hicks be requested to call a special session of the Annual Conferences, by Sept. 15, 1982, to hear the proposed plan and vote thereon.

Commission On Religion And Race — 1983

Purpose

Paul said in his letter to the Corinthians, "For the body is not one member but many." (I Cor. 12-14) Just as the human body is advanced by its various parts; so the United Methodist Church can find wholeness and richness in the participation of its many ethnic heritages. As Paul sought to emphasize the wholeness of the "church" in his day, we seek the self-same goal even today in the United Methodist Church.

Goals

- 1. 729.1 of The 1980 Discipline states, "There shall be in each Annual Conference a Conference Commission on Religion and Race..." 729.2 sets forth the guidelines for membership, including provisions for district directors of Religion and Race.
- 2. The disciplinary mandate sets forth a number of responsibilities for the Conference Commission on Religion and Race. We would like to lift up a few of these responsibilities in this report:

It is our duty to resource the local church work area on Religion and Race. We are charged with an important monitoring responsibility. Through the monitoring process, we seek to examine ethnic minority representation on all conference boards, agencies, commissions, committees and related institutions. Our recommendations there reflect the aforementioned examination. The mandate also includes providing programs of sensitization and education at every level of the conference on the nature and meaning of racism — attitudinal, behavioral and institutional.

Priorities

For the year 1983, we seek the following as priority-concerns:

- a. Monitoring the missional priority "Developing and Strengthening the Ethnic Minority Local Church."
- Examination of ethnic representation on boards, agencies, commissions, committees and governing boards of related institutions.
- c. Recommendations designed to make total inclusiveness possible.

The following are recommendations that we believe will greatly enhance the work of the Conference Commission on Religion and Race:

- We are asking the District Superintendents to assist by using a brief instrument at charge conferences for the purposes of statistical analysis and consciousness raising in/of the local church. This brief form will be presented to the Cabinet for review before being finalized.
- 2. That each District Superintendent appoint or reappoint a District Director of Religion and Race. That person then will act as a liaison between the District and the Conference. This will help greatly in the providing of information and coordination for the "My Job" Workshops on Religion and Race during 1983, as well as general coordination of the work of the Commission.

Pastors who are returning from seminary to receive their first appointment as seminary graduates and retiring ministers will receive \$200.00 to help defray the cost of moving. This would be a one-time supplement, and would be in addition to the above rate of compensation. To become effective at the 1982 Annual Conference. The following persons are eligible: pastors, lay pastors, student pastors, after first appointment, district superintendents, persons in conference connectional positions, retiring pastors, persons taking disability leave, and others recommended by the Board of Ministry.

- G. That all unrestricted benevolence funds be placed in a central operating balance.
- H. That "Interest Income" from investments continue to go into the Conference Administration Fund.
- I. That any Conference employee who has, or who desires, a tax sheltered annuity, may direct the Director of Finance & Management to pay this annuity from his regular income following proper guidelines.
- J. That each Board, Commission, Committee, or Agency not be allowed to change a line item in its approved budget which would exceed 10% of the amount without the approval of the Council on Finance & Administration.
- K. That the latest independent audits shall be submitted for review and study by any agency receiving conference funds.
- L. That financial support of the Office of Finance & Management be recommended by the Joint Councils of Finance & Administration and approved by the Annual Conferences.
- XIV. The Job description of the Director of the Office of Finance & Management is on page 120 of the 1979 Journal.
- XV. We recommend that \$38,272 be apportioned to the local churches for Cooperative Parish Ministries.
- XVI. We grant permission to the Wesley Foundation at Southern Arkansas University at Magnolia to hold a capital improvements fund drive in the Camden District over the next year. Goal: \$10,000. Funds will be administered by the Camden District Superintendent.
- XVII. We recommend that the expenses of the Communications Study Committee, an amount up to but not to exceed \$3,000, be taken from the Communications Restricted Fund.
- XVIII. We recommend that the funding for the EMLC Scholarships to Camp Tanako be referred to the Little Rock Conference on EMLC.

Commission On The Status And Role Of Women — 1983

Purpose

The primary purpose of the Little Rock Conference Commission on the Status and Role of Women for the 1981-84 quadrennium shall be to challenge the Annual Conference, including its districts and local churches, to a continued commitment that will insure full and equal participation by women in the total life and mission of the church.

Goals

- Provide training opportunities to develop leadership and communication skills of women.
- 2. Place women in key positions on District Council on Ministries.
- 3. Heighten awareness of local congregations to:
 - A. the prevalence of sexual stereotyping within the conference.
 - B. the potential for contributions by women in the ordained and lay ministry of the church.
 - C. the identity of capable role models which may change attitudes toward women, either as clergy or lay leaders.
- 4. Elect women as delegates to Annual, Jurisdictional and General Conference.

Objectives

- 1. Leadership Development Workshops in 5 districts to develop increased skills of lay women on boards, committees, or agencies in districts and local churches, patterned after the pilot workshop in the Little Rock District in 1982. **Budget: \$1,000.00**
- 2. Place women in key positions on District Councils on Ministries as a continuation of objective added to 1982 Program: Budget: \$100.00

These events are traditionally dominated by male leadership. We challenge local churches and the annual conference to seek female leadership. A resource list will be compiled and made available for local church, district and conference committees by early 1983.
- B. Providing a resource list or talent bank of women with local church leadershi experience who are qualified to fill district and conference level positions, t facilitate increasing female participation. A resource list will be available for local church, district and conference nominating committees in early 1983.
- C. Providing a resource list of films that show the stereotyped position women ar placed in by the media and literature. Local Churches will receive this list in 198 and will be encouraged to use the available resources.

4. To seek women with knowledge and insight about the United Methodist Church wh are willing to represent our Conference as delegates to annual conference jurisdictional conference and general conference, and to work for their election.

United Methodist Foundation Of Arkansas

The United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas is a benevolent, not for profit corporation chartered by the State of Arkansas on October 31, 1963, pursuant to authority granted by the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences. The Foundation is an area service agency of the United Methodist Church in Arkansas in stewardship through bequests wills, trusts, property gifts, life income agreements, life insurance, and other forms current or deferred giving.

The services of the Foundation are mutually beneficial to the institutions and programs the two Annual Conferences and to prospective donors. The Foundation serves the institutions and programs of the Area by representing them with prospective donors. The Foundation serves donors by providing estate and charitable gift planning, counsel, and some instances, by serving as an executor of an estate or as a trustee of a charitable tru

The business of the Foundation is managed by a Corporate Board of Directors, nominate by the resident Bishop of the Arkansas Area of the United Methodist Church, elected by t Corporate Board, and approved by each of the two Annual Conferences. The Board comprised of 24 directors, 12 from each Annual Conference. In addition, the Foundation h 8 ex-officio directors. The Board has 4 active committees; executive, investment, budg and finance, and development.

The Year in Review

The year 1981 was a benchmark year for the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansa The Foundation completed its plans for acquiring a full time executive director a

employed Jim Argue, Jr. Jim joined the Foundation on June 16. On July 15-17, he attended a Robert F. Sha seminar on marketing techniques for development programs. On October 5-7, he attend the National Association of United Methodist Foundations meeting and met with foundation directors from throughout the country. On October 27-30, he attended the Philanthropy To Institute directed by Mr. Conrad Teitell. The Foundation was fortunate in that scholarshi were obtained for Jim to attend these seminars.

In recent months, Jim has conducted seminars throughout the state, and has addressed numerous local congregations and Sunday School Classes. Through these efforts, the awareness of the Foundation has grown substantially.

Progress has also been made in terms of gift development. Although numerous gifts benefiting virtually every United Methodist institution and program in the state have been received, two particular gifts deserve highlighting in this report. A \$25,000.00 seed money gift was obtained to begin the Developing Ministries Endowment Fund. This fund is in effect an undesignated endowment fund. Each year, the Conference Council on Ministries will make recommendations to the Foundation Board for disbursing the income earned on this fund. It presents an exciting giving option to donors, in that they can give today to provide financial support to the future's deserving ministries.

The other gift we would like to highlight here is a \$20,000.00 seed money gift to the Double Duty Endowment Fund. This fund also presents an exciting giving opportunity to our donors, in that by contributing to this fund, they can make their gift dollars work twice. First, the money in this fund can be used to make church extension loans at a favorable rate of interest to new or expanding congregations. Second, the income from these church loans, plus any other investment income earned by this fund, will be used to help support the ministerial pension program. Thus, a gift to this fund serves both church expansion and ministerial pensions.

Financial Highlights

The following financial statement reflects growth in the Foundation of 71% from January 1981 to January 1982.

Basically, the Foundation receives four types of monies. First, gifts of endowments are received. With these funds, only the income is available for the work of the church each year. Second, we receive gifts through life income agreements. With these gifts, the donor retains the income from the gift for his or her lifetime. Third, we receive funds under management agreements. With these funds, the Foundation provides management and investment services to other institutions. Fourth, the Foundation has reserves that are used at the discretion of the Board

Board Of Pensions

- 1. We recommend that the Little Rock Conference participate in the Ministerial Pensic Plan (MPP) and the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) of the General Board Pensions during 1983 on the following basis
 - a. Contribution base shall be the Denominational Average Compensation (DAC)
 - b. Contribution rate shall be MPP, 12% of DAC, and CPP, 4.4% of DAC

 - f. Monthly contributions to MPP/CPP shall be made through the apportionment system
 - g. CPP benefits shall be supplemented with Death Benefit Plan-Plus (DBP-Plus)
 - 300% DAC h. Active participants will contribute to the Death Benefit Program Plus with the
 - Church paying 60% and the participant 40% i. Every Conference member making less than the Equitable Salary can be included
 - the CPP at the rate of 3.4% of DAC
 - j. Probationers at seminary will be provided CPP at 3.4%
- 2. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1706 Section 12e of the 1980 Discipline that the Sunday following Easter be observed as Retired Minister's Day. Each pastor is urged acquaint his or her congregation with the pension program of the Conference as part of the observance, and if possible to use a retired minister in the Worship Service.
- 3. We recommend in keeping with Par. 1706 Section 4h of the 1980 Discipline, the approve of the Annual Conference that Special Appointments shall be listed in the Conference Journal as follows: (1) With Annuity Claim (a) upon the Annual Conference or (b) upon General Board, an Institution, or an Agency of the United Methodist Church; (2) Without Annuity claim upon this Annual Conference.
- 4. We recommend that the Board of Pensions pay the entire insurance premium for or eligible retirees and ministers on Disability both for the Death Benefit Program and the Hospital and Medical Expense Program. The Death Benefit for eligible surviving spouses now a part of the CPP of the new pension program. Benefits remain 10% of the Average

Conference Salary. In addition, we recommend that the eligible Conference and Special Conference Claimants have the voluntary portion of Medicare paid by the Conference Board of Pensions.

- 5. We recommend that an annual amount equal to 100% of the pension and disability payment of each minister of the Little Rock Conference be designated as housing allowance.
- 6. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 726 Section 4 of the 1980 Discipline that there shall be organized from the membership of the Board of Pensions of the Little Rock Conference a committee to compare the records of the amount paid by each pastoral charge for support of pastors and for pension benefit purposes computing the proportional distribution thereof and keeping a permanent record of defaults of the ministers in the Conference who have failed to observe the provision in Par. 726 Section 4 pertaining to proportional payment; and shall render annually to each minister and Charge in default a statement of amounts in default for that and preceding years. In event of default by any Pastoral Charge after the notification of the committee, liens shall be filed against future pensions and the names of the churches and ministers along with the amount in default shall be printed in the Conference Journal.
- 7. We request the Secretary of the Annual Conference to print in the Minister's Service Record in the Journal, one column stating "Years of Pension Claim on the Little Rock Conference," and another stating "Total Service Years in the Ministry."
- 8. The Board of Pensions wishes to thank the members of the churches of the Little Rock Conference for the support given the Minister's Reserve Pension Fund allowing its successful completion.
- 9. A list of annuitants and pension payments for the year 1981 is available in the Conference Treasurer's Office from Earnestine Martin.
- 10. We request the Conference to approve the "Resolution Relating to Rental Housing Allowances for Retired or Disabled Ministers of the Little Rock Conference" and direct the Conference Secretary to include it in the 1982 Journal of The Little Rock Conference.
- 11. We report that special grants have been made to Mayme Marbly, Donna McCammon, and Leroy Wallace.
- 12. The Board of Pensions of The Little Rock Conference wishes to express its deepest appreciation to E. B. Matkin, Jr. for the leadership he has given the Pensions Program of The Little Rock Conference both as a member and as the Chairperson of our Board.

It replaces any previously executed Addendum A and shall be in effect until amended by the Annual Conference in accordance with the provisions of the Ministerial Pension Plan and the Comprehensive Protection Plan.

CONTRIBUTION BASE

The MPP and CPP Contribution Base shall be the Active Participant's Plan Compensation for a Plan Year not to exceed the Denominational Average Compensation. (MPP Section 4.1(c) and CPP Section 4.1(c))

CONTRIBUTION RATE

The MPP Church contribution rate shall be 12% of the Contribution Base of each Active Participant and the CPP Church Contribution rate shall be 4.4% of the Contribution Base of each Active Participant. (MPP Section 4.1(b) and CPP Section 4.1(c))

The Church Contribution shall be made monthly to the Plan by the

Annual Conference in accordance with the Plan document. Such

CONFERENCE REMITTANCE

MPP and CPP Church Contributions shall be transferred monthly from the Deposit Account of the Annual Conference by the Genera Board of Pensions to each Active Participant's account and th Protection Benefit Fund, respectively. The Annual Conference shall maintain an amount in its Deposit Account sufficient t provide for the monthly transfer of the Church Contributions of behalf of its Active Participants. In the event the Deposit Account is overdrawn, an interest charge shall be made by the Genera Board of Pensions. Such charge shall be made at the curren monthly rate of interest credited to the STIRA investment program. (MPP Sections 4.1(a) and 4.2(g), and CPP Section 4.1(b) and 4.2(h))

PAST SERVICE PENSION RATE

On January 1, 1983, the ministerial Pension Rate shall be \$136.00 and the local pastor's Pension Rate shall be \$136.00 (Disciplinar Paragraphs 1706.2b and 1706.7) (MPP Supplemental Section (f))

SPOUSE BENEFIT

SURVIVING

In accordance with paragraph (e)(5) of Supplement One, the Surviving Spouse Benefit shall be 70% of the Participant's Formula Benefit.

CPP SPECIAL ARRANGEMENTS

Each conference ministerial member earning less than the conference equitable salary for his/her category, may elect to participate in CPP. The CPP contribution shall be 3.4% of the D.A.C. (CPP Section 3.2h)

PAST SERVICE **FUNDING** In accordance with paragraph (f) of Supplement One, the unfunde liability as of January 1, 1983, has been actuarially projected to b \$1,867,981. Past service funding deposits are required to fund thi unfunded liability, and shall be in the amounts for the periods a shown below:

These annual deposits shall be made at the end of each calenda

year as required by the General Board of Pensions. The pas service deposits shall be transferred from the Little Rock Annua Conference Deposit Account to the Past Service Funding Accoun on December 31. If the annual cash flow requirement, as determined by the General Board of Pensions, exceeds the combined past service funding deposit amounts, then the cash flow requirement shall become the required past service funding deposit. Little Rock Annual Conference Of The United Methodist Church Resolution Relating To Rental/Housing Allowances For Retired Or Disabled Ministers Of This Conference

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church has and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

WHEREAS, the practice of The United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

WHEREAS, pensions paid to retired ordained or licensed ministers of The United Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service, and disability benefits are considered payments in lieu of compensation for active service; and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the Little Rock Annual Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference; and

WHEREAS, the disabled minister has the same legal relationship to an Annual Conference as does the retired minister and, thus, this Annual Conference is also the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for a disabled ordained or licensed minister who is a member of this Conference;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

- An amount equal to 100% of the pension or any amount in excess of the first \$5,200 of disability payments received during the year of 1982 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance respectively for each retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister of the United Methodist Church who is or was a member of the Little Rock Annual Conference at the time of his or her retirement or disability;
- 2. The pension or disability payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension or disability payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference, General Agency, or institution of The United Methodist Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension or benefit funds of The United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension or disabled minister's benefits.

NOTE:

The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-280, 1971 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities." Since, under current Federal

law, the first \$5,200 of disability benefits received by an individual is excludable from gross income, the housing allowance designation from disability payments is, in the above resolution, designated to be only those payments made which are in excess of the first \$5,200 of disability benefits during any given year.

Committee On Insurance

A. Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program

Little Rock Conference has the Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program, (HMEP), provided by the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church. Travelers Insurance Company is the underwriter. The General Board of Pensions defines policies regarding eligibility and enrollment. These policies are recorded in the 1979 Journal.

Upon receiving an initial full-time appointment in the Conference, a person becomes eligible for HMEP. He/she shall enroll with the Insurance Committee secretary within 90 days. Beyond the 90 day period, proof of insurability is required. The same 90 day requirement applies to full-time lay employees of a participating church or agency who are seeking coverage.

The General Board of Pensions at its March 1982 meeting modified the eligibility for participation specifications of HMEP to include the divorced spouse of an HMEP participant in the category of Eligible Dependents subject to the following conditions:

- 1) Coverage of the divorced spouse will be continuous until the earlier of:
 - a) acquisition of group health coverage from another source, or
 - b) the remarriage of the divorced spouse, or
 - c) two years have elapsed following the date of the divorce decree.
- 2) The participating annual conference will be billed for the premium due on account of the participation of the divorced spouse.
- 3) Following adoption of this eligibility category by an annual conference, it shall be mandatory for the annual conference to enroll all divorced spouses where the divorce date is subsequent to the date of such adoption. Eligibility to participate in HMEP shall not apply to those divorced spouses when the date of the divorce was prior to the date of which the annual conference adopts this provision.
- 4) The spouse must be a participant in HMEP at the time of the divorce.
- 5) In cases where the divorced spouse is totally and permanently disabled at the time of the divorce, coverage would be continued indefinitely beyond the two-year period provided such spouse does not remarry or obtain group coverage elsewhere.

The General Board will go to a calendar year for HMEP premium rates beginning January 1, 1983. Therefore, there will be no increase in premiums until that date.

Benefits paid by HMEP for those under age 65 are outlined in the 1979 Journal, including a resolution about accident coverage, with additional information regarding nursery charges for newborn infants appearing in the 1980 Journal.

Benefits for persons 65 and over change annually according to Medicare guidelines. For 1982, the following is applicable for Medicare enrollees:

In-Patient Hospital Services: Full payment of \$260 Part A Medicare deductible; full payment of \$65 per day from 61st through 90th day; full payment of semi-private and miscellaneous charges from 91st through 120th day beyond payment made from Medicare Lifetime Reserve days; then 80% of reasonable charges from the 121st day up to a \$500,000 lifetime maximum.

Skilled Nursing Facility: Full payment of \$32.50 per day from the 21st through the 100th day.

Physicians and Other Medical Services: 20% of reasonable charges after a \$75 calendar year Medicare Part B deductible. You must pay the \$75 Part B deductible.

Geographical Limits: Worldwide coverage.

Important Information Concerning Medicare Enrollment: Any minister who will reach his 65th birthday when he is still serving in a full-time capacity, and not drawing Social Security, should apply three months before his 65th birthday at his local Social Security office for Medicare. Should a minister's wife reach age 65 before the minister, she should apply for Medicare at the local Social Security office. This applies to those who are eligible and wish to participate in Medicare.

It is each person's responsibility to secure his or her own Medicare coverage.

For those age 65 and older, HMEP provides coverage which complements Medicare.

Should persons have questions regarding insurance payments, after filing a claim, the should contact the secretary, Mrs. Ernestine Martin, at the Office of Finance and Management.

B. Comprehensive Protection Plan and Death Benefit Program

The disability insurance program (equal to 40% of the Denominational Average Compensation, or DAC) and the basic death benefit coverage are included in the Comprehensive Protection Plan portion of the Pension and Benefit Program. Cost of these is included in the pension apportionment to local churches. DAC for 1982 is \$16,776.

The basic death benefit coverage is scaled from 150% of DAC for persons age 46 and under, to 20% of DAC at retirement and beyond.

Our Conference also has Death Benefit Program Plus (DBP+) coverage. This coverage approximately doubles the basic DBP plan.

Educational benefits, and benefits paid on the death of a spouse, child under 18, o surviving spouse, are part of the new pension program.

Lay employees presently covered will continue to be in DBP, but will not be covered by CPP. Their premium payments will continue as they have been.

C. Annual Conference Policies

1. Premium Payments

- a. The local church, or charge, to which a minister is appointed shall provide 60% of the premium cost for individual or family (whichever is applicable) HMEP coverage. Also, the local church or charge shall provide 60% of the DBP+ premium.
- b. The local church, or charge, shall provide 60% of the premium cost for HMEP and DBI for eligible local church lay employees.
- c. The Conference Board or Agency responsible for its own budget will provide 60% of the premium cost for either individual or family coverage, whichever is applicable, for ministers under special appointment, and for lay employees.
- d. The Conference Board of Pensions pays the full HMEP premium and DBP+ premium for Conference Claimants.
- e. All eligible persons holding an appointment from the Bishop are expected to participate in the HMEP and DBP+. When an eligible person is offered HMEP and DBP+, and the person chooses not to participate in either program, he or she shall state this choice in writing to the Committee secretary.
- f. If an enrolled person fails to pay premiums for two consecutive quarters, the secretary shall notify the insured by registered mail that he/she will be terminated within fifteen (15 days of the letter's date unless full payment is received in that fifteen day period. An exceptions to this policy must be approved by the Insurance Committee. A copy of this letter shall be sent to the appropriate District Superintendent as notification that termination is being considered. Should there be a hardship, the District Superintendent should conversuch information to the Insurance Committee. The District Superintendent shall be advised of any considered change in insured's status.

D. Administration of Insurance Program

Administration costs of our insurance program do not come from premium payments That cost is underwritten by receipts from money the Committee has invested. Many Conferences add 2% to 3% to premium costs for administration purposes.

Board Of Ordained Ministry

Report No. 1

Policy And Program

- I. The Little Rock Conference Board of Ordained Ministry proposes to work strictly within the framework of the current Book Of Discipline of the United Methodist Church.
- II. The elected officers of the Board are: chairperson, vice chairperson, secretary registrar, associate registrar, and candidacy registrar.

- III. The Executive Committee of the Board are the elected officers, chairperson of the Continuing Education Committee, chairperson of the Conference Relations Committee, and chairperson of the Probationers Committee.
- IV. The Board is divided into groups of members who will serve through 1984 and members who will serve through 1988.
- V. The Board shall meet prior to the opening of school, at mid-year, and at Annual Conference, and on call of the chairperson.
- VI. The Board shall have representatives on each District Committee of the Ordained Ministry (in accordance with Par. 723.le.) In consultation with the District Superintendents, the chairperson shall appoint a member of the Board to serve on each committee.
- VII. The Board's sources of income shall be:
 - A. A designated amount from the Conference Council On Ministries,
 - B. A designated amount from the Council on Finance and Administration,
 - C. Twenty-five percent of the amount collected from local churches for the Ministerial Education Fund,
 - D. Gifts, bequests, interests, and repayment of loans.
- VIII. The Board shall maintain a scholarship aid fund for ministerial training as follows:
 - A. For those in the course of study above the local pastor's license.
 - 1. Assistance in courses of study schools.
 - a. The cost of required textbooks for each year of the course of study.
 - b. The cost of tuition or registration fees, and of room and board while attending the course of study schools. Because of limited funds, transportation expenses cannot be paid.
 - 2. Assistance in the correspondence course.
 - a. Payment of fees.
 - b. The cost of required textbooks for each course; the enrollees are to purchase the required books and be reimbursed by the registrar.

Before enrolling in the Advanced Course of Study, one shall follow all the steps and fulfill all the requirements as outlined in Par. 416. Furthermore, one shall enter into the Advanced Course of Study work only in consultation with the Board. This procedure must be followed in order to receive support of the Board, including financial support. This will become effective June 1, 1981.

- B. For students from the Little Rock Annual Conference preparing for effective ministry in the United Methodist Church who:
 - 1. Have satisfactorily completed at least enough semester hours of college credit to qualify for classification as a junior.
 - 2. Are enrolled in a college, university, or seminary approved by the University Senate of the United Methodist Church.
 - 3. Shall meet with the Executive Committee of the Conference Board Of Ordained Ministry prior to making their selection of a seminary.
 - 4. Hold a current certificate of candidacy for ministry in the United Methodist Church, be enrolled in a seminary, or be a Probationary Member of the Little Rock Conference.
 - 5. By August 1, make application to the registrar of the Board for the fall semester giving all information requested and authorizing regular grade reports to this Board's registrar from the school's registrar including a transcript of credits at the end of the year. By January 15, make application for the second semester. Applications must be requested.
- C. The Board may set a maximum amount of scholarship aid per year per recipient, but assistance will be determined for each individual on the basis of requirements or needs.
 - Scholarship aid for summer sessions will be granted on the basis of the number of hours taken based on full-time load for semester credit.
 - 2. The maximum scholarship aid for college students shall not exceed two years.

LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE

- Additional emergency scholarship aid will be granted at the Board's discretion to students in the following categories, requesting and making application who:
 - a. Begin preparation for ministry later in life with pressing financia responsibilities.
 - b. Have severe health circumstances.
 - c. Come from disadvantaged economic backgrounds.
- 4. The maximum amount of emergency scholarship aid per person per year shall be equal to one semester's grant for scholarship aid. The Executive Committee must approve the emergency scholarship aid.
- IX. The Board shall encourage participation in continuing education programs by ministers of the Little Rock Conference. Pastors are encouraged to participate in a least one continuing education experience annually (Par. 423.1.) The following shall
 - A. Each eligible individual applicant may receive up to \$150.00 annually, if an equa amount is matched by the church and/or the pastor. These amounts shall include only projected expenses for tuitions, books, room and board. The matching requirement shall be waived for those who receive less than \$4,000.00 above the conference minimum salary.
 - B. Persons seeking financial aid for continuing education shall secure an application form from the chairperson of the Committee on Continuing Education, Mike Campbell. All requests relating to continuing education funds shall be directed to the chairperson of the Committee on Continuing Education. C. No person shall be given more than \$150.00 each calendar year for continuing

 - D. In hardship cases, ministers can apply to the Committee on Continuing Education for help to attend Pastor's School, Such help will be granted only after other avenues for aid have been exhausted.
 - E. No financial aid is available for Ministers' Week.
- X. The Board shall give assistance in a reasonable amount for physical examinations for persons to be admitted as associate, probationary, or full members.
- XI. The Discipline requires two years probation following graduation from seminary before a candidate is admitted into full connection into an annual conference, Supervision of these two years is under the Probationers Committee using retreats and "Committees of Concern."

- I. As a first step to ministry, "inquiring candidates" shall enroll for studies for a certificate of candidacy for ministry (in accordance with Par. 404) with the Department of Ministry, Division Of Ordained Ministry and through Charles Walthall, Candidacy Registrar.
- II. We assume \$1,000.00 (our conference's share of financial responsibility for the Arkansas Pastor's School.)
- III. The Council On Finance And Administration of the Annual Conference is requested to grant: A. An appropriation of a percentage from conference benevolences based on the
 - Board's financial needs that are not met by other sources.
 - B. An apportionment to local churches for the Ministerial Education Fund.
- IV. We express our appreciation for the support given the Ministerial Education Fund by the churches of the Annual Conference. We report to you that the local churches of our conference gave 95% of the amount apportioned for the Ministerial Education Fund in 1981. We urge every church to give full support to the Ministerial Education Fund for
- V. We recommend a minimum of two weeks vacation and a minimum of one week for continuing education during each calendar year for every pastor.
- VI. We request that all churches make available funds for continuing education for their pastors. Such funds should not be considered salary and would be available for use in continuing education only.

- VII. We urge every minister to obtain a copy of the book, The Christian As Minister, by Richard A. Hunt. This resource will prove fruitful for persons who are in the midst of making a decision in regards to professional Christian ministry.
- VIII. For the summer of 1982, the following events are available:
 - A. In cooperation with the North Arkansas Conference, we will sponsor the School for Local Pastor's License on August 1st through 6th at Hendrix College in Conway.
 - B. Pastor's School will be at Hendrix College August 23, 24, and 25. The preacher for the week will be Dr. Ernest P. Campbell, the former pastor of Riverside Church in New York City. The courses scheduled to be taught at Pastor's School are the following:
 - 1. Dr. Romney Mosley from Candler School Of Theology will teach a class on "Faith Development."
 - 2. Dr. David Lowes Watson from Perkins School Of Theology will lead a course on evangelism.
 - 3. Mildred Parker, Director of Christian Education at First United Methodist Church in Houston, Texas, will teach a class on "Improving the Church School.
 - C. A retreat for probationary members of the Little Rock Annual Conference who are serving under full-time appointment will be held June 29 through July 1. Two other experiences are planned. One is in October, and another is in February.
 - D. The Professional Development Planning Retreat will be held in various locations around the conference. This retreat will provide an opportunity for pastors to make a personal, in-depth review of their skills and aptitudes for ministry, and to determine a long-range plan for their own continuing education. Each participant will be able to become more intentional in planning for continuing education based upon their own self perception of interests and needs.

Little Rock Conference Telephone Network

The Board of Ordained Ministry has felt a need for communication between parsonage families concerning major crises, such as life-threatening illness and death. All too often the ministers in the conference find out about a death in the family after the funeral has already occurred. Therefore, we would like to propose the following telephone network as a means of aiding in our caring ministry to one another.

Upon learning of a crisis, one would contact the district superintendent of the affected family. After the superintendent determines that the family does indeed desire that the ministers of the conference be informed, s/he would contact the bishop's office. The bishop would contact all the district superintendents who would then contact the pastors of the churches serving as callers. (These churches are noted on the following list.) The pastor of each of these churches would then call the churches which follow his/her church on the list.

As a back up for the district superintendent, the pastor of the "First Church" in the seat of the district should be contacted. For example, if the superintendent in Little Rock cannot be contacted, the pastor at Little Rock First would be the backup. Also, if any of the contacts made by the district superintendent are unavailable, the superintendent should choose one other from that grouping to complete the calls.

Each minister should then be responsible for calling the ministers holding charge conference membership in a church on his/her charge. (This would include retired ministers and those serving beyond the local church.) Multiple pastor staffs should also communicate the information to one another.

Policy Statement Equitable Salary And Mission Salary Supplement

Equitable Salary Guidelines

All requests for Equitable Salary grants shall be reviewed before grants for mission supplement are considered. Equitable Salary needs shall have prior claim on available funds.

I. The Commission shall recommend to the Annual Conference the amount for Equitable Salary support to begin on January 1st.

The Commission shall recommend the maximum amount of Equitable Salary monies that a charge may receive (Para. 935.10). This amount shall be effective on January 1st.

The maximum amount of Equitable Salary support for 1982-1983 shall be \$2,200.00

- III. Where a charge sets more than the minimum requirement of \$250.00, the pastor will be allowed to receive the benefit of the increase for that year provided total support does not exceed minimum salary. No pastor shall suffer a loss of income through the next session of the Annual Conference due to the failure of the charge to meet the minimum requirements.
- IV. To encourage charges to reach full Equitable Salary support, a charge will be given credit for any annual increase that is in excess of \$250.00, and the pastor shall be allowed to receive an amount equal to one-half of said increase: total support not to exceed the minimum salary set by Annual Conference.
- V. In the event of insufficient funds to meet all claims, each charge shall share proportionately from the funds available.
- VI. The Commission shall report the amounts paid during the fiscal year to each charge and minister.
- VII. The above plan of distribution of funds be made effective June 1982.

VIII. Equitable Salary Applications and Grants

- 1. Every church and/or charge shall submit a proposed budget in writing. Copies to the Commission through the District Superintendent by January 1.
- 2. Each church and/or charge shall conduct a financial campaign and report the results to the Commission through the District Superintendent by January 1.
- 3. Each church and/or charge shall have accepted the apportionments in full for the coming year. Each church and/or charge shall have paid the apportionments in full the preceding year.
- 4. The church and/or charge shall increase the pastoral support at least \$250.00 annually.
- 5. The church and/or charge shall make application to the Commission on the prescribed form by action of the Charge Conference.
- 6. The District Superintendent shall make his/her recommendation to the Commission by the date set by the Commission. The date shall not be later than January 10th.
- 7. Pastoral assignment shall be full time (Para. 438.3 & 3a) except that the Commission shall consider applications whose pastoral supply is appointed in accordance with Para. 438.3b and 437.2.
- 8. In exceptional cases approved by the Cabinet, any requirement above except #7 may be waived by the Commission.
- IX. The Equitable Salary Commission shall be empowered to designate a portion of the Equitable Salary Fund for Mission Salary supplement provided that Mission Salary Supplement shall not exceed the balance anticipated for the year after Equitable Salary grants have been approved.

X. Mission Salary Supplement Applications and Grants

- 1. Every church and/or charge shall present a budget for the year to the Commission through the District Superintendent.
- 2. Each church and/or charge shall conduct a financial campaign and report the results to the Commission through the District Superintendent by January 1.
- 3. Each church and/or charge shall have accepted the apportionments in full for the coming year. Each church and/or charge shall have paid the apportionments in full the preceding year.
- 4. The church and/or charge shall make application to the Commission on the prescribed form by action of the Charge Conference.
- 5. The District Superintendent shall make his/her recommendations to the

- Commission by the date set by the Commission. This date shall not be later than January 10.
- 6. Exceptional cases may be declared by the Commission from the above requirements and waived on recommendation by the District Superintendent provided the District Superintendent shall file in writing the reasons for the exceptional circumstances.
- XI. All grants from Mission Salary Supplement shall be reported by the Commission to the Annual Conference.
- XII. Adjustments may be made by the Commission at the beginning of the fiscal year when such adjustments are necessitated by a change of appointment or realignment of the charge or by a new salary arrangement voted by the Charge Conference.

Cooperative Parish Ministries

The purpose of Cooperative Parish Ministries is to strenghten the mission and ministry of local churches in close geographical proximity through working together. Where cooperation has become the norm for churchmanship this purpose is being realized in congregations, among clergy, and by agencies of the annual conferences.

Through the Office of Cooperative Parish Ministries we propose the following:

I. Goals for 1983

MONTICET LODISTRICT

A. Training and Consultation

- To provide training for directors of parish and probe staffs and for coordinators of exploratory areas;
- ${\bf 2.} \ \ {\bf To} \ provide \ training \ for \ exploratory, \ probe \ and \ parish \ teams \ in \ each \ district;$
- 3. To provide for consultation and training for parish councils;
- To provide funding and/or opportunities for individual staff members to acquire specialized training in cooperative parish ministries at conference, jurisdictional and general church levels;
- 5. To provide training for cabinet and conference personnel in cooperative parish ministries.

B. Interpretation and Communication

- To publish and distribute a brochure on the cooperative parish process and existing service areas;
- To continue publication of Together as a means of sharing news, resources and insights in cooperative parish ministries;
- 3. To produce in cooperation with the Area Director of Communications a filmstrip or slide presentation on CPM in Arkansas;
- 4. To provide for interpretive events in churches that are interested in cooperation;
- 5. To make new resources available to cooperative parishes and staffs.

C. Administration

- 1. To provide for annual evaluation of the Area Director;
- 2. To evaluate yearly the "Arkansas Area Policy on Cooperative Parish Ministries";
- 3. To evaluate cooperative efforts at preparatory, probe and parish levels;
- 4. To continue cooperation with conference and area staff;
- 5. To assist the Bishop and cabinets in site selection, development, and staffing for cooperative parish ministries;
- 6. To work closely with Parish and Community Development committees and other conference agencies for purposes of resourcing, funding and program development in cooperative parish ministries;
- 7. To cooperate with the Office of Town and Country Ministries, National Division,
 Board of Global Ministries:
- 8. To cooperate with the Office of Church and Community Ministries, National Division, Board of Global Ministries, for the purpose of providing workers in

cooperative settings;

9. To cooperate with United Methodist seminaries in order to interpret ministerial training needs and to place seminary interns in cooperative settings.

II. Recommendations

- A. That the word "preparatory," which refers to the initial phase of the cooperative parish process, be replaced with the word "exploratory" wherever it occurs in the Area Policy on Cooperative Parish Ministries;
- B. That the Little Rock and North Arkansas Annual Conferences continue to fund the Office of Cooperative Parish Ministries by apportionment;
- C. That the two annual conferences permit St. Paul School of Theology to solicit funds in Arkansas for the establishment of a chair/center for town and country ministries.

III. Parish Development

Presentation of service areas in exploratory, probe and organized phases will be made at sessions of the annual conferences.

The Constitution And By-Laws

Article I — Name

The name of this organization shall be the Southwest Parish.

Article II — Purpose

This cooperative parish is to administer to all the people within its area by a program that can best be carried on through the cooperation of several congregations.

Article III — Membership

Any congregation within the area may become a member of the cooperative parish when it desires by showing a willingness to do its part in the undertakings of the cooperative parish and upon adoption of the constitution and election of council members to the council.

The originating churches of the parish are: Babel Chapel, Saratoga; Ebenezer, Nashville; Macedonia, Lockesburg; Mt. Carmel, Lockesburg; Mt. Zion, Horatio; New Hope, DeQueen; Wesley Chapel, Centerpoint; Wiley Chapel, Clow.

Article IV — Withdrawal

Any congregation may withdraw from the cooperative parish if it has given notice of said intention three months before the end of the fiscal year to the council.

Article V — The Council

- A. The cooperative council shall be composed of two lay persons elected by each church and its official members with the minister of each church an ex-officio member.
- B. The council officers, to be elected annually, shall consist of President, Vice-President, and Secretary-Treasurer.

Effective in the 1982 conference year the election of officers shall become a part of the Charge Conference.

Article VI — The Staff

The staff shall consist of pastors of each of the cooperative congregations and any personnel employed by the cooperative parish.

Article VII — Finance

The projects of the parish will be funded on a volunteer basis as the need arises.

Article VIII — Committee

- A. The executive committee shall consist of the parish director and the parish officers.
- B. A task force will be appointed as needed.

Article IX — Meetings

- A. The organization shall have monthly meetings.
- B. There should be planned activities at least every three months.

Article X — Amendments

- A. These articles may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the council members present and ratification two-thirds of the member congregations.
- B. By-laws may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the council members present and ratification by the majority of the member congregations.

History Of The Southwest Parish

In early 1981 Victor Nixon, Area Director of Cooperative Parish Ministries, J. W. Lofton, Area Director of Ethnic Minority Local Church, and John F. Walker, Hope District Superintendent, selected the eight black churches of Sevier and Howard counties as a possible cooperative parish. The decision was made based on concerns for cooperative ministries and the priority of the EMLC.

A meeting was then held with the pastors who included J. T. Counts, John Oliver, Perry Lomax, and Charles McAdoo. Plans were made for a Holy Week Revival to give the churches an experience of cooperation.

Lay representatives from each of the churches met in March of 1981. The revival plans were accepted. Since none of the pastors were full-time, the agreement was reached that an organization and officers were needed earlier in the life of the Parish than usual. Richard Garland was elected Chairperson, Carliss Jean Lewis, Vice-Chairperson, and Snowie Brown, Secretary-Treasurer.

On April 15, 1982 the purpose and constitution for the Parish were decided on. The Name "Southwest Parish" was selected. This describes the section of the state the Parish is located in, as well as pointing to historical ties to the Southwest Annual Conference. Each church ratified the constitution and elected two laypersons to serve on the Parish Council.

At Conference that year, the Parish was designated as being in the probe phase. Conference 1982 sees the Parish as operational with J. T. Counts appointed as Parish Director.

The evident need, the many successful activities and outstanding leadership have enabled the Parish to move quickly through the preparatory and probe phases to become operational. The Southwest Cooperative Parish is in ministry in a way that it could not be as individual congregations. The Gospel is proclaimed through the Southwest Parish.

Area Merger Study Committee Report

We, the Area Study Committee, affirm that the merger of the two annual conferences is a possibility and we recommend that the conferences establish a committee appointed by the Conference Nominating Committees to develop a plan for merger and report back to the Annual Conferences for a vote in 1984.

We further recommend that the formula for the present study committee be used.

Little Rock Conference Board Of Trustees

We recommend:

1. That the property known as the "County Line Methodist Church" in the Arkadelphia District be deeded to the "County Line Cemetery Association." This association has been incorporated as a non-profit corporation and the papers were filed with the Secretary of State on April 20, 1982.

- 2. That we make a quitclaim deed to the "Old Mt. Tabor Community Cemetery Association" in the Arkadelphia District for property in Montgomery County which we own adjacent to the cemetery. And, that the Association be required to incorporate prior to this action being taken.
- 3. That an isolated piece of property in the Arkadelphia District, once known as "The Caney Creek Methodist Church South" be declared abandoned, and that with the exception of the cemetery (approximately ¼ to ½ acre) the remainder of the two acre tract be sold to Mr. Gary Goldman for \$500.00. The Little Rock Conference will retain title to the cemetery, which the buyer has agreed to maintain. We request that the money from this sale, less the cost of a survey, be given to the Arkadelphia District Board of Missions & Church Extension.
- 4. That the abandoned property in Union County, known as the "Bolding Church" be sold to James and Louise Seymore for \$500.00. There is approximately one acre of property involved and an old building in very poor condition. The surrounding land is owned by the Seymores and her parents whose ancestors gave the original tract to the church. Mr. Seymore has agreed to construct a permanent marker using the old church bell and a plaque to note the church site. We also recommend that the money be given to the Camden District Board of Missions and Church Extension for use within the District.
- 5. That lots 15 and 16 of Block 56 in Felsenthal (Camden District) be sold to the highest bidder and that the monies received from this sale be given to the Huttig United Methodist Church for use on their parsonage. This assumes that we will be able to provide title to this property which is shown on the 1907 Book in the Union County Courthouse to have been given to the M. E. Church South. These lots are only 25 x 110 feet each.
- 6. That the "Power's Chapel Church" property in Pike County (approximately two acres) less the cemetery, be sold to the highest bidder and that the money be given to the Arkadelphia District Board of Missions and Church Extension.

Little Rock Conference United Methodist Women Annual Conference Report June 1, 1982

From all over this nation they came. Over 10,000 women on a journey to Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, to the 1982 National Assembly of United Methodist Women anticipating a meaningful experience in community and to celebrate over one hundred years in mission

and renewed commitment to Jesus Christ. Sixty five women and one man from the Little Rock Conference made this journey, April 29 through May 30, and received the challenge to look forward with a sense of expectation and excitement as we continue the journey individually and corporately with Christ who is our hope. This was the highlight of the journey that the Little Rock Conference United Methodist Women have been on since my last report to this Annual Conference.

The first step on that journey was the West Gulf Regional School where members of the conference mission team spent five days in study at Southern Methodist University. From there we traveled on to the Arkansas School of Christian Mission at Hendrix College where 127 people from the Little Rock Conference were enrolled. Study is a very important part of this mission journey and as always we urge every one to attend the 1982 school July 30-31 and August 1-5. Rubye Lee Jackson from our Conference is the dean and we hope we can top last year's attendance which was the largest in recent years.

From the schools of Christian Mission we traveled on to a very helpful and inspiring Christian Disciplines workshop by Women's division members Joan Kelsey, Gene Maxwell, and Blanche Powell. This was the first of four quadrennial workshops offered by the women's division and accepted as a conference goal for the Little Rock Conference. Jimmie Lee Stephens, mission coordinator for Christian Personhood, coordinated this workshop, and it was well attended by conference and selected district officers.

We continue on our journey to the First United Methodist Church in Hope, Arkansas, for the eighth annual meeting of the Little Rock Conference United Methodist Women. The Hope United Methodist women reported that 314 people were served lunch on that day. Marilyn Winters, Vice President of the women's division, was the keynote speaker. The theme "World Development Is —" began the study on world development. Marilyn explored the theme from the Biblical imperative for world development to each individual's responsibility to be in mission to the world we live in. She challenged us to study II Cor. as a Biblical basis for world development. Other special guests were Jay Lofton, giving the meditation, and Virginia Starkweather from the jurisdiction core-planning group, who installed officers and brought greetings from the jurisdiction. The special love offering of \$708.78 was shared by the Red Bird Mission School and Missionary support.

The world development workshop continued as the leadership development workshop for district officers met at Camp Tanako with Gene Maxwell, staff from the women's division assigned to the Denver region, leading us in this event.

Many separate journeys were made by the conference officers as we attended all district Fall and Spring meetings. Working to fulfill another of our goals, the goal-setting and program-planning task forces were privileged to share with all districts. The financial interpretation task force has shared with four of the districts. There has been membership interpretation in districts and a task force is presently being formed and will share with the districts as they are invited.

We continued our journey as the Executive committee met in January at Good Faith United Methodist Church in Pine Bluff. We listened to ways we could be in mission in the Criminal Justice ministry, evaluated our goals, conducted our business and began the process of goal planning for the year.

The goal planning was carried over to the leadership development workshop, the second of the quadrennial plan, conducted by women's division members Marilyn Sweet, Linda Hair and Bernice Johnson. This workshop was coordinated by Leona Bonsall and attended by conference and selected district officers. I'm very pleased to see the districts using the skills and catching the vision of the mission of United Methodist Women as presented by the Conference mission team and these workshops.

The Conference met the pledge to the women's division of \$105,525.00. Supplementary gifts amounted to \$13,472.61 making a total of \$118,979.61 sent to the women's division in 1981.

The evaluation reports show a loss in membership but we were unable to get reports from all our units. We will be working hard to increase membership in 1982 and 1983, and have adopted this as one of the goals.

My personal journey included an invitation to attend the Fall meeting of the women's

division in October and the Jurisdiction president's consultation in January.

New officers, Regina Norwood, Gladys Alley and Peggy Mitchell attended new officer's training. Jimmie Lee Stephens attended the IMPACT briefing in Washington, D.C. Rosemary McLarty represented us at a corporate financial workshop and Leona Bonsall is the representative on the West Gulf Regional School planning committee serving as Registrar for the 1982 school.

Camp Aldersgate, Incorporated Report To Little Rock Annual Conference June 1, 1982

As a mission of the United Methodist Church, Camp Aldersgate is at the cutting edge of life where the people are with many needs. Since its inception, more than 25,000 people from across Arkansas and adjoining states have participated in the camp's mission programs.

Aldersgate is more than a place, it is an experience! It is where all who come may know the presence of God in themselves, and in their fellow man. It is in this spirit that we provide:

- 1. Food distribution to the needy;
- 2. Programs for the disadvantaged youth;
- 3. Medical camps for children with handicapping conditions;

- 4. A way for youth in trouble to discover alternative life styles;
- 5. A free health clinic for treatment and diagnosis of medical problems for all who have need; and
- 6. A family relationship in an atmosphere of love for the isolated and lonely senior citizens.

We invite you and your church to become involved with these exciting ministries at Camp Aldersgate. You know, ". . . the Church is not the Church, when it meets and goes home. The Church becomes the Church, when it becomes involved with meeting the needs of others . . ."

Camp property, consisting of approximately 115 acres, is owned by the Women's Division of the Board of Global Ministries. Grants of more than \$50,000 have been received from the Women's Division within the last twenty-four months for improvements of buildings, water, and gas lines. The entire facility is available to both Arkansas Conferences for programmatic purposes, with no built in costs for capital improvements or mortgage and/or lease payments. Therefore, churches, organizations and others have full facility utilization of the Camp available at bare-bones operating costs.

General operating costs (core cost) are received from church groups and interested individuals. These funds support on-going administration, development and maintenance of camp programs and facilities. It is the support of these core services which enables the Camp its day-to-day operation.

The core costs of operating the Camp totals \$148,000 per year. At this time, only \$35,000 of these costs are supplied by all church contributions.

During this time, when government funds are being reduced or eliminated, and keen competition for private donations is upon us, human service needs have increased. It becomes more important that we re-establish a strong connection with the United Methodist Church in Arkansas to meet these needs.

Over the past years in the Little Rock Conference, Aldersgate has been an "Advance Special." This year, in recognition of the need for greater support, the Council on Finance and Administration has also recommended that Camp Aldersgate be designated as a \$50,000 "Fair Share" giving.

We need for your church to accept and meet your apportioned "Fair Share." Now that funding has become so critical, it is necessary for the United Methodist Church to make a more meaningful commitment of support. With this support, together we can continue with a strong mission program. Without it, we will cease to exist. The need is too great for this to happen.

An itinerant farm laborer who was stranded in Little Rock recently was brought to Camp Aldersgate. I was reviewing his situation and said to him, "... here you are, twenty-five years old — you have lost your job, your home, your furniture, your car. All the money you have is 65¢, and all your possessions are here in two small suitcases and a cardboard box. You tell me you have not eaten any hot food in ten days, and your two small babies are sick. Tell me, what makes life worthwhile?" Quickly he responded, "I have the privilege (his word, not mine) of praying to a God who still answers prayer."

I told him that I agreed, and I thought God had sent him to Aldersgate to have his prayers answered!

I thank God there is an Aldersgate, where people can come to have their needs fulfilled. I am proud to be there as your representative, where human needs and workable solutions come together, where faith and works become one, where the Church becomes the Church.

Little Rock Conference Of The United Methodist Church Notes To Financial Statements December 31, 1981

1. Summary Of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting — The Financial Statements of The Little Rock Conference of The United Methodist Church have been prepared on the Cash Basis. The records are held open until the first Wednesday after the first Sunday in January in order to include the

remittances from the churches in the Conference for the last few weeks of the year. This policy is consistent with prior years.

2. Income Taxes

The Conference meets the requirements of Section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code and is therefore exempt from Federal Income Taxes.

3. Cash Investments

All Cash Investments are recorded at cost plus Interest Income as received in the account. Interest on the Savings Accounts is received quarterly. Interest on Dean Witter Intercapital Liquid Asset Fund is received monthly. Interest on all other cash investments is not recognized until maturity.

John Thomas Bolding

John Thomas Bolding was born July 24, 1890 at Bolding, Arkansas, the son of Perry M. and Siddie White Bolding. Between the ages of 30 and 66, he served the citizens of El Dorado as a city postal carrier, a work which would later prepare him for a unique familiarity with the streets and the people of the area which he would use in his personal visitation program from the St. Paul United Methodist Church of that town.

"Bro. John" as he was affectionately known to his friends, was educated in the Bolding schools and furthered his education in ministerial courses of study at the Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University. Having lost his eyesight at the age of 75, he never let this be taken as a handicap, but worked all the more diligently. He credits the Reverend James Ford of the Little Rock Conference for being his roommate and great help while going to seminary in the summers.



He was ordained a deacon in the Little Rock Annual Conference of the United Methodis Church in the year 1959. He served as pastor of the Bethel United Methodist Church and th Centennial United Methodist Church in the Camden District between the years of 1951 an 1959. For nine years, "Bro. John" was the teacher of the Men's Bible Class of the Norphle United Methodist Church.

Due to his love for the ministry in all its facets, he was given the title of Honorary Pasto Emeritus of the St. Paul United Methodist Church in El Dorado where he and his wife, Anni Lee, were faithful members from 1961 until his death. It was in this congregation that honce served as interim pastor for a short time, and led a men's visitation group.

On January 23, 1913, he was united in Holy Matrimony to the former Annie Lee Sinclair of Bolding, Arkansas. For 69 years, their lives blended in a beautiful Christian relationship Besides his wife, he is survived by two sons, Merrill S. Bolding and Perry M. Bolding of E Dorado, and one daughter, Mrs. W. C. Hunter, Jr. of Texas City, Texas.

"Bro. John" expired February 15, 1982 following a lengthy illness. Memorial Services fo him were conducted in the sanctuary of the St. Paul United Methodist Church wit leadership being given by the Reverend F. Gladwin Connell, the Reverend Ralph Hale, th Reverend James Ford, and the writer of this memoir.

During that period of time, Bob felt the call to the ministry. He did not answer that cal immediately, but that call never left him. Even as he served the church as a florist, he somehow knew that he must someday answer that call.

When that call was finally answered, he began his training by attending Southern Methodist University. He was ordained a Deacon in 1964 and an Elder in 1968. He was an Associate Member of the Little Rock Annual Conference. He served churches on the Blevins Circuit, Harmony Grove, Waldo, and Junction City before retiring in 1977. He also served pastorates in East Texas before transferring to the Little Rock Conference in 1968. As his wife, Lee said: "We both said many, many times the happiest part of our life was during our

years in the ministry."

In addition to his wife, Lee, he is survived by his daughter, Joan Olivia, two sisters, and a brother. Bob was laid to rest in Waco, Texas.

Eulis DeWitt Galloway

Rev. Eulis DeWitt Galloway, "Ed," died in his home, "Edswood," in peace and quiet and in the presence of his beloved wife, Sarah, on Wednesday, April 7, 1982. The "Celebration of His Life, Witness, and Homegoing" was held at Highland Valley United Methodist Church on Good Friday at 2:00 p.m. He was laid to rest at Walnut Grove Cemetery, beside one of the churches in his first charge. His colleagues, Larry R. Williams, C. Ray Hozendorf, Robert E. L. Bearden and Otto Teague officiated at the service. In the message, Robert Bearden referred to his death as a "gentle transition" from earth to heaven.

"Ed" Galloway, as his friends all called him, was born in Onton, Kentucky, March 12, 1898, the son of David and Sarah Hancock Galloway. In his early teens, he moved to Arkansas in a covered wagon and was educated in the Prairie County Public Schools, Henderson Brown College, Vanderbilt University and Southern Methodist University.



He was licensed to preach in 1917 and admitted as a probationary member of the Little Rock Conference in 1920. He served for forty-five years. He was married to Sarah White on November 27, 1922. His first charge was the Oak Hill Circuit in Western Pulaski County. He walked this circuit until obtaining a horse. He steadily rose from the ranks, serving small town and rural churches until his value and dedication were fully recognized. He spent the greater part of his ministry in some of the strongest churches in the Conference.

He served Forrest Park, now St. Paul, Henderson and Pulaski Heights in Little Rock Keo-Tomberlin, Grady, Gould, Vantrese Memorial, El Dorado, Hamburg, DeQueen Warren, the Hope District, First Church, Hot Springs. His last appointment was the Little Rock District from which he was retired in 1964. After retirement, he was interim minister at Pride Valley and First Congregational Church, Little Rock. The Galloway Memoria United Methodist Church in Eastern Little Rock is named in his honor.

Dr. Lester was married to Miss Julia Beatrice Smith of Pine Bluff, Arkansas. To this union two sons were born, Woodie D. Lester, Jr. and Julius Bernard Lester. He expired July 31, 1981.


The Reverend John H. Oliver

He served on the following Boards (before reorganization after merger): Stewardship and Finance, Higher Education, Pensions, Evangelism, Education and Missions. He also served as a Trustee of Philander Smith College for a number of years.

John H. Oliver departed this life on September 5th, 1981 at Helena, Arkansas while visiting relatives. Left to mourn his passing are, a brother, Rev. Murphy Walker of Carthage, Arkansas; a sister, Mrs. Isabell Marks of Fordyce, Arkansas; a foster daughter, Mrs. Thelma Woods of Detroit, Michigan; a foster son, Mr. Willie Walker of Cleveland, Ohio; four sisters-in-law, two brothers-in-law, many nieces, nephews, other relatives and friends.

Soon she was to grace some of the stateliest parsonages of Methodism as her talented young minister husband rose rapidly to places of prominence and leadership in the conference, serving as pastor of the first churches at Hot Springs, Camden and Magnolia and as Presiding Elder, or District Superintendent of the Prescott, Monticello, Forrest City, Pine Bluff and Camden Districts. (The latter twice.)

J. L. Dedman did not reach the astronomical ministerial heights by his abilities alone. Martha Frances not only encouraged her husband, she complimented and supplemented his ministries. She sometimes referred to herself as "a lady of the cloth," not that she considered herself a minister but because she identified with her husband's calling. Wherever they served she was active in the program of the local church and served in official capacities at the district and conference levels both in children's work and in what is now the United Methodist Women. Not only that, but the decor of the parsonage and her own personal appearance were such that the parishioners "needeth not to be ashamed," in fact they were always proud of their parsonage and of their parsonette.

She was the mother of two children who distinguished themselves in the civic, professional and religious life of Camden, Mrs. Richard W. (Mabel) Butt, a teacher and Dr. J. L. Dedman Jr., a practicing physician.

When a break in health dictated her husband's retirement they returned to Camden where they had served three different assignments and where their children lived. There they built their modest, but beautifully appointed, retirement home. There Martha Frances involved herself in church and club activities, enjoying her children, grandchildren and many friends.

After an extended illness in Ouachita Hospital, on October 3, 1981, at the age of 86, she went to claim her room in our Father's House of Many Mansions.

The beautiful, triumphant and inspiring memorial service was held in her beloved Firs United Methodist Church of Camden, conducted by her pastor, the Reverend Charles G Ashcraft. Interment was beside her husband in Camden's Memorial Park. It seemed like the end of an era. For her it was the beginning of something far greater than that of which this world dreams.

She departed this life Tuesday, April 13, 1982 in Little


Rock, Arkansas.

Benjamin Tyndale Fooks

With the home-going of B. T. Fooks, the Little Rock Conference lost one of the most outstanding laymen ever to participate in its deliberations. For four decades, Tyndale Fooks was a lay member of the Little Rock Conference participating fully in its fellowship and official actions. His home church, First United Methodist Church, Camden elected him repeatedly as its representative, and the laymen of the conference in turn elected him as a member of the General and Jurisdictional Conference on each of four quadrennia. The wide esteem in which B. T. Fooks was held can be seen by the fact that he served as trustee of Hendrix College, Southern Methodist University, Mt. Sequoyah Assembly, and as a member of the General and Jurisdictional Boards of Missions.

Mr. Fooks did not limit the expression of his Christian faith to the organizations of the church. He was active in state politics, seeking to elect those candidates who he believed would contribute most to the common good. He was also generous in giving his time to many national and state organizations which could contribute to the economic advancement of the people of our state and nation.

Perhaps his greatest achievement was the development of his own business. The Grapette Company of Camden, Arkansas, whose soft drink products were sold throughout the Western Hemisphere and Japan. It was from the activities of this business that he derived the economic base from which he could make generous monetary gifts to this church and her institutions.

It is always with gratitude that the writer recalls that Mr. and Mrs. Fooks were the sole donors of the financial support that he and his wife received during the five years of foreign missionary work for the Methodist Church in the Republic of Chile.

Through more than 80 years of life, Benjamin Tyndale Fooks served his Lord. That life began in Paducah, Kentucky on July 15, 1901, and ended in Camden, Arkansas on September 30, 1981. His funeral service was held in his beloved home church where he had served as lay leader and steward for so long. His pastor, Reverend Charles G. Ashcraft, conducted the service and his body was lain to rest in the Greenwood Cemetery at Camden.

Every pastor dreams of having such an outstanding and dedicated layman in his congregation, one who will serve the church at its broader levels but who is also loyal and supportive in the local church. Tyndale Fooks was just such a layman. The writer can find no better way to close this memoir than to quote a tribute composed by the present Superintendent of the Camden District, Michael R. Clayton. "Tyndale Fooks, through his capacities for self-giving, was an individual who gave strength to many. Mr. Fooks carried out his responsibilities with integrity, loyalty and in the strength of God's love. In his own unique way through the gift of his life, substance became spirit in full capacity."

Frank H. Thompson, Sr.

When Frank H. Thompson, Sr. was born near Stephens on August 9, 1921, he was destined to become an active and prominent layman in Arkansas Methodism. The son of Robert Herbert and Irene Hodge Thompson, he became a successful South Arkansas businessman as owner and operator of Frank Thompson Transport, Inc., of El Dorado.

During World War II, Frank served his country in the U.S. Army with time spent overseas in Italy and the Philippines.

As a civic-minded person, he was active in many local and State affairs including the El Dorado Rotary Chamber of Commerce, Development Council, Chairman of the Union County F.H.A. Committee, President of the Union County Soil and Water Conservation Board, and past-president of the Southwest District of the same. He was also a

Union County member of the Arkansas Bus and Truck Association.

Frank Thompson is best remembered for his work as a committed Christian and as a long-time member of First United Methodist Church of El Dorado. He was a member of the Francis Asbury Sunday School Class and served his church for a number of years as a lay member of the Little Rock Annual Conference and a member of the Administrative Board. He also served as the Camden District Lay Leader.

On the conference level, he was a member of the Committee on Finance and Administration, and the Arkansas Methodist Foundation.

Survivors include his widow, Mrs. Lurline Thompson, one son, Frank H. Thompson, Jr., both of El Dorado; two daughters, Mrs. Celia Janet Haas of Rio de Janerio, Brazil, and Mrs. Carolyn Orr of Bellevue, Nebraska; his step-mother, Mrs. R. H. Thompson of El Dorado; two brothers, Wilfred H. Thompson of Minden, LA, and Hal Jean Thompson of Venezuela; and two grandchildren.

The Memorial service for Frank was held at First United Methodist Church in El Dorado on July 4, 1981, with burial in Arlington Cemetery. This service was conducted by Rev Ralph E. Hale and Rev. Ralph S. Mann. His influence and memory continue to live in the hearts of many and his spirit has returned to God who gave it.

X. Miscellaneous

The organization of the Little Rock Annual Conference is defined in the Statement of the Organizational Structure of the Little Rock Conference as printed in the 1974 Journal.

The Standing Rules are subject to the Discipline of the United Methodist Church and the Organizational Structure of the Little Rock Annual Conference.

THE STANDING RULES

I. Conference Organization

- 1. Number of Districts. There shall be six districts in the Little Rock Annual Conference.
- 2. District Conference. There may be a district conference held annually in each district, composed of those members provided for in the current Discipline, and one additional member from each pastoral charge, provided however, in charges of more than five hundred members there shall be one additional member for each five hundred members or fraction thereof.

3. Nominations.

- (a) The Conference Nominating Committee shall be composed of the District Superintendent and one lay person from each district. The Bishop shall serve as chairman.
- (b) The Conference Nominating Committee shall nominate six members (three lay and three clergy) at large to achieve an equal balance of lay and clergy members, alternating by districts as follows:

Lay Clergy
Arkadelphia Little Rock
Camden Monticello
Hope Pine Bluff

- (c) The Conference Nominating Committee will nominate all members of the Annual Conference quadrennial and annual boards, commissions and committees and Conference Council on Ministry boards, committees and commissions except as otherwise provided. Each District Nominating Committee will complete its list of qualified nominations by December 31. All nominees shall be consulted regarding their nomination.
 - All boards and agencies of the Conference shall be inclusive of ethnic minority representation.
- (d) Terms of office of the Nominating Committee shall be for four years beginning on January 1 following the session of the Annual Conference in the middle of the quadrennium.
- 4. Lay Members. Lay members of the Annual Conference shall be elected annually and their names and addresses shall be sent to the Conference Secretary by the District Superintendent ninety days before the opening day of Annual Conference.
- 5. Youth Membership. Each District Council of the United Methodist Youth shall elect annually two youth members of the Annual Conference, and their names shall be sent to the Conference Secretary by the District Superintendent ninety days before the opening day of Annual Conference.

6. Board Service.

- (a) Membership of the boards, councils, commissions and committees shall be elected for a term of one quadrennium. Eligibility for election for membership on the same board, council, commission, committee shall be limited to two consecutive quadrenniums, excepting ex officio membership on the Conference Council on Ministries. Membership begins upon election.
- (b) There are two types of membership on Annual Conference boards, committees, commissions and councils: at large and ex officio. A person may serve in only one at-large and/or one ex-officio capacity.

- (c) The membership of the Committee on Review and Evaluation; the Committee on Planning and Research; the Committee on the Annual Conference; and the Episcopal Committee shall be exempt from the provisions of (a) and (b) of Review and Evaluation.
- (d) No person from the Little Rock Conference, clerical or lay, shall serve as an elected trustee of more than one United Methodist related institution within the bounds of the Arkansas Area at a time. "Within the bounds of" these United Methodist related institutions are understood to be the following: Hendrix College, Philander Smith College, Aldersgate, Methodist Children's Home, the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas, the Wesley Foundations, Little Rock Conference Camp Tanako, and Mt. Sequoyah Assembly. This is to take effect during the year 1979, as each institution could possibly have its timetable of elections on a different schedule. Trustees presently serving are
- allowed to complete their present terms.
 (e) All Councils, Boards, Committees and Commissions of the Conference shall be made representative. Special consideration shall be given to placing women, youth, and minority persons on the membership of these conference agencies.
- (f) Beginning with the 1984 Quadrennium no member of the Annual Conference shall be eligible for the chairmanship of a board, committee, commission or council of the Annual Conference who has served as chairman of a board, committee, commission or council for the preceding 8 years.

II. Financial Administration

- Fiscal Year. The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall run from January 1 to December 31.
- 2. Financial and Statistical.
 - (a) The District Superintendents shall furnish the treasurer with all apportionments to the churches on, or before January 15. These figures shall be official.

(b) All Conference assessments and reports of collections shall be made in whole dollars; with no column for cents.

- (c) Each pastor shall make a statistical report to the District Superintendent who shall submit the reports to the Conference Statistician. The Pastor's financial report will be audited and checked by the Final Data Processing Print-Out. Where there is discrepancy, the amount recorded on the Print-Out will prevail.
- 3. Administrative Fund. The Council on Finance and Administration shall recommend an assessment for a Conference Administrative Fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the pre-conference report, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of preparing and printing the Worship Booklet for the Annual Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expenses of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this Fund. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of the Fund. Payments for unbudgeted claims on this fund shall be made on vouchers signed by the Chairman of the Council on Finance and Administration or the Conference Secretary.
- 4. Program Budgets. Budgets for expenditures for program for the District and the Conference shall be co-ordinated by the Conference Council on Ministries. The Conference Council on Ministries shall make recommendations to the Council on Finance and Administration which shall make a final recommendation to the Annual Conference.
- 5. Conference Treasurer. The Council on Finance and Administration shall set the salary and provide for the expenses of the Conference Treasurer and make arrangements for paying the same, subject to the action of the Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall assign the duties, responsibilities, and

the headquarters city, of the Conference Treasurer, on recommendation of the Council on Finance and Administration, in keeping with the provisions of the Discipline.

- 6. District Fund. The District Stewards shall estimate and allocate to the several charges an amount necessary for district parsonage and other necessary district expenses. The District Stewards shall elect a treasurer who shall be custodian of this fund and pay it out on order of the District Superintendent. The treasurer of the district fund shall report to the District Stewards annually, showing receipts and disbursements. Funds budgeted by the District Council on Ministries will be paid by the District Treasurer upon action of the District Council on Ministries and the approval of the District Superintendent.
- 7. Apportionments Based on Pastor's Salary. On all items apportioned to local churches by means of a percentage of the minister's salary, such percentage shall be understood to apply to all ministerial members of the local church staff serving under the appointment of the Bishop and District Superintendent, including ministers in full connection, ministers on trial, and full-time Lay Pastors.
- 8. Requests for financial support by the Conference, when not presented to the Conference by the Council on Finance and Administration, shall lay on the table for twenty-four hours prior to a vote being taken. This rule may be suspended by a 3/4 vote of the Conference. It does not preclude a Council on Finance and Administration recommendation being amended.

III. Conference Procedure

- 1. Rules of Order. The Rules of Order shall be Roberts Rules of Order revised.
- 2. Reports and Resolutions. There shall be a pre-conference report which shall contain reports of all the boards and agencies of the Conference. This report shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. All reports, resolutions, and other papers intended for publication in the preconference reports shall be typewritten, in triplicate, on special forms furnished by the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary. In the event editing of a report is deemed necessary by the Conference Secretary and Chairman of the Board involved, permission is hereby granted.

3. Conference Expense Fund.

- (a) Registration fees and offerings taken at the Annual Conference shall be administered by the Conference Treasurer and shall be used to defray the expenses of the session.
- (b) The Conference shall meet on a self-entertainment plan, except that the entertainment of the retired ministers shall be paid from the Conference Expense Fund. The Conference Treasurer shall pay a per diem for days actually in attendance directly to the retired ministers and be reimbursed from the Conference Expense Fund. Eligibility shall be determined by the Conference Board of Pensions.
- (c) Any deficit in the Conference Expense Fund shall be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund.
- (d) The Conference Expense Fund shall be administered by the Committee on the Annual Conference.
- 4. Unsponsored Resolutions. Any resolution not sponsored by a regular board or standing committee of the Conference must lie over for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon, provided, however, immediate debate and action may be ordered by two-thirds vote of the Conference present and voting.
- 5. Memoirs. There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased clerical member of the Conference, containing date and place of birth, date of admission on trial, to whom married and date, names of children, charges served, and place of burial. A picture of the deceased shall be published with the memoir. The same shall be done for probationary members, associate members and lay

pastors. Likewise, a memoir of wives or widows of the above shall be published i the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Sub-committee o Memoirs the death of any of the above mentioned and be responsible for th submission of memoirs not later than thirty days after the death occurs. Th names or memoirs of deceased laymen who have been active in the Conference sessions, or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institution may be published in the Journal. The District Superintendent shall be responsibl for securing the memoirs for laymen whose memoirs shall be published. It shall be the duty of the District Superintendents to report to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions the death of any conference claimant that occurs it their respective districts.

6. Historical Material.

- (a) The Library at Hendrix College shall be the depository for all historica documents and artifacts of the Little Rock Conference. The College Libraria shall be the custodian of these historical materials.
- (b) The Commission on Archives and History shall be responsible for securing group picture of each class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his retirement.
- 7. Unbudgeted Expenditures. When any proposal is submitted to the Annua Conference which involves the expenditure of funds not included in the establishe budget, such a proposal shall be referred for advice and recommendation to th Council on Finance and Administration and brought back to the same session of the Annual Conference for a vote to be taken by the Conference.
- Campaigns. All Conference-wide campaigns to raise funds shall be voted on by secret ballot of the Conference.

IV. Amendments

These rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.
