



An executive Session of the Clergy was held at Central Baptist Church at 4:00 p.m., Sunday, June 11, 1989, and the report of the Ordained Ministry of the Little Rock Annual Conference, dated June 11, 1989, was approved. (See reports.)

III. Daily Proceedings

Sunday Evening, June 11, 1989 — 7:30 p.m. The Opening Celebration Holy Communion

The Communion Service was prepared by the Little Rock Conference Board of Worship in cooperation with the appropriate boards and agencies. The Conference organist was Carolyn Appling. The liturgist was Roger Armstrong and the celebrant was Bishop Richard Wilke. The preacher was Dr. Joe Harding. The elements were distributed by David Moore, John Blundell, Charles McDonald, Tara Everitt, Maxine Waller, Roger Armstrong, Robert Moore, Jr., Mort Cox. The Choir, directed by David Bridger, was from the Asbury United Methodist Church, Little Rock.

The Celebration Of The Word Monday Morning, June 12, 1989 — 8:15 a.m.

The preacher was Dr. John P. Miles, senior minister of St. James United Methodist Church in Little Rock. The organist was Carolyn Appling of the First United Methodist

Church, Hot Springs.

Bishop Wilke called the one hundred and thirty-sixth session of the Little Rock Annual Conference to order on June 12, 1989, at 9:00 a.m. Bishop Wilke expressed appreciation for the services Sunday evening and Monday morning. Bishop Wilke called on John O. Alston, Secretary of the Conference, to organize the Conference. John O. Alston moved the agenda be adopted as mailed with the Pre-Conference Workbook with the provision that it may be adjusted as the need arose. The Secretary nominated the following persons as tellers for the Conference session: Robert W. Trieschmann, Head Teller; Stan McKinnon, C. D. Womack, Britt Skarda, Paulette O'Dell, James Polk and Vincent Harris. He nominated Roger E. Armstrong, Journal Clerk and Patricia Parker, Transcriptionist.

The Secretary stated the official roll will be taken from the registration cards. The information contained on the cards will be used to record name, address, and attendance at

Conference and will be printed in the 1989 Journal.

The Secretary moved the bar of the Conference be the entire Sanctuary. Visitors were given the privilege to sit within the Bar of the Conference without vote. Identification badges were to be worn at all times. It was an indication of the right to vote. The Secretary further stated that forms were available on which to record any motion, amendment, substitute motion or resolution. These forms must be used to record said information either before the action was proposed or immediately following the proposal being made or acted upon. The form is then delivered to the Secretary for inclusion in the Journal. This is the only form the Conference Secretary will accept for the official record and minutes and until the Secretary has received the written form, it will not be acknowledged by the Secretary. It was the wish of the Secretary that each minister's service record be accurate. The 1988 Journal was available at the Secretary's desk for reference. The Secretary should be informed of any corrections that should be made. Persons transferring into the Little Rock Conference from another Conference, or those whose status is changed at this Conference — newly elected elders, deacons, new diaconal minister, etc. need to report to the Secretary. The bulletin board in the Sanctuary was to be used for emergency messages and the board in Fellowship Hall was used to post or receive messages. He asked that the boards be checked periodically during Conference. The offerings received during the services of worship were used toward the expenses incurred by the Annual Conference in hosting the Conference.

The Secretary made a motion that the agenda, the tellers, the Secretary's Staff and the recommendations be accepted. The motion was seconded and passed.

The Bishop asked the Secretary to send greetings of the Conference to Arthur Terry, Marion Miller, Clyde Swift, James B. Argue and Varnell Norman.

John B. Hays, Pastor of the First United Methodist Church, extended greetings to the Conference from the host church. Dr. Martin Koehn, Lay Leader of First United Methodist Church, welcomed the Conference to Hot Springs.

Dean of the Cabinet, Norman Carter, presented to the Conference Mrs. Julia Wilke who received a standing ovation. Rosemary Hays presented a corsage to Mrs. Wilke. Mrs. Kitchen, Mrs. Wilke's mother, was recognized by the Conference.

The Conference Nominating Committee report was given by Jay Lofton. Merle Peterson made a motion that the Insurance Committee chairperson be a ex-officio member of the Pension Board and referred the request to the Committee on Review.

Jo Ann Miles moved to defer the nomination of chairperson of COSROW until such person can found and the Conference can elect that person. The motion was seconded and passed.

The report of the Nominating Committee was to lay on the table until later and was to be brought back for approval. Corrections and changes in the report were made. (See report.)

Maxine Waller asked about the composition of the boards and agencies in regard to race, sex (male/female) ratio and persons with handicapping conditions. Jay Lofton replied that as near as can be the composition is in conformity with the 1988 Discipline.

Mike Clayton read new transfers into the Conference: Mark Lasater, George Wayne Martin, W. Edgar Outlaw, Muriel Peters, Lewis See, Jr., Thomas E. Weir, Stephen Wingo. He also read the list of those who had been approved for deacon's orders, elder's orders and as probationary members. (See reports.)

The Bishop announced adjournment for fifteen minutes.

When the Conference reconvened, Mike Clayton led in singing "Joy to the World."

Bishop Wilke introduced his Executive Secretary, Margaret Ault, who was recognized.

Bishop Wilke delivered the Episcopal Address. (See reports.)

Katie Rice gave the report of Archives and History, which was accepted. (See reports.) Merle Peterson gave the Board of Pensions report which included the Order of the Day and presented those receiving retirement relationships: Robert B. Moore, Jr., Withers M. Moore, Ray Tribble, Clyde Swift, John Blundell, Dr. John Lindsay. These were received, recognized and spoke to the Conference.

Merle Peterson presented the budget work sheet. This report moved the pension rate to \$250 per year annuity level.

Allen Hilliard moved an amendment to read: "If a minister's spouse is under the age of 65 at the time of that minister's retirement, the Board of Pensions will pay for the spouse 3% of the premium balance per year of service by the spouse in the Arkansas Area up to a total of 60% of the spouse's premium."

Alvin Murray moved that this amendment motion be referred to the Board of Pensions for study and brought back to the 1990 Conference session for action; the motion passed.

The Board of Pensions report was approved. (See reports.)

The Bishop called on Bob Trieschmann for courtesies and Treasurer Joe Eason, Harold Eggensberger from North Arkansas Conference and Delos and Hazel McCauley, missionaries, were recognized.

Dr. John Lindsay closed the session with a prayer.

Monday Afternoon, June 12, 1989 — 1:30 p.m.

Bishop Wilke called the afternoon session to order at 1:30 p.m.

Mike Clayton presented the Board of Ordained Ministries policy. It was adopted. H also presented a proposal for establishing Little Rock Conference Ministerial Emergenc Fund, which was adopted. (See reports).

Kurt Boggan presented the report of the Committee on Review including an amend

ment submitted to the Board of Education. (See reports.)

This report was to be on the table overnight.

Maxine Waller presented the report of the Commission on Religion and Race and included the presentation of an audio visual.

Marilynn Loyd made a motion to delete a number 4 of the Commission on Religio and Race resolution. John Walker made a substitute motion to delete all but the following, which would read "That the Little Rock Annual Conference shall adopt an Affirmative Action Policy with regard to all boards and agencies." The substitute motion carried (See reports.)

The full report was adopted as amended.

Deborah Bowles, representative from Perkins School of Theology, SMU, expressed ap

preciation to the Conference for its support of the Ministerial Education Fund.

LaVerne Keahey gave the report for Conference Priority for 1988-89 on youth ministries. Don Armstrong, Nancy McSpadden and LaVerne Keahey led the Conference is singing a youth oriented song followed by an audio visual presentation recapping the Conference year and their youth emphasis priority activities for 1988-89. The youth

group from Crossett presented Bishop Wilke with a T-shirt.

The Conference priority for 1989-90 is "Children's Ministries" and a procession of children from Piney Grove United Methodist Church carrying banners they had mad was led by Donna Flenniken from Piney Grove. Music was by the Children's Priorit team. Sue Crutchfield was the Conference Children's Coordinator. A presentation was made by Pat Parette outlining activities for the coming year. Pat Parette moved the adoption of the report prioritizing Children's Ministry for the next year. The motion carried.

The Conference Youth Council made a report. Tara Everitt, the Conference Youth President, spoke recapping the year's youth events. Two youth, Tiffany Givens from Little Rock and Mark Dill from Warren, who are on the YSF projects review committee presented a sheet included in the packet showing where the YSF money goes. A total budget was \$6,429.80. Corssett raised \$638.02 which was the largest contribution from any youth group. The England youth group was honored for having raised the largest amount per capita. It was also reported our Conference is 26th among all the UMC Conferences in funds raised for YSF.

Fred Haustein and David Prothro gave Committee on Finance and Administration report #1. They used a dramatic presentation — the placing of a wreath and a eulog mourning the demise of the Little Rock Conference in 1995 should nothing change. The Conference then voted to receive the report without amendments.

Courtesies were extended to visitors from other Conferences.

The Conference adjourned for the trip to Camp Tanako for Barbeque and a tour of th improvements. Bishop Wilke closed the session with prayer.

A musical presentation was given by the children's choirs from representative United Methodist Churches across the Little Rock Conference.

Order Of Evening Worship Monday, June 12, 1989 — 7:30 p.m.

The Order of Service was compiled by the Fellowship of United Methodists in Worship, Music and Other Arts. The preacher was Dr. Joe Harding. The liturgist was Jeanie Burton. The Fellowship Choir was composed of musicians and choir directors from the Annual Conference. The Jubilation Handbell Choir was from First United Methodist Church, Hot Springs. The organist was Carolyn Appling and the Choir Director was Darrell Horton.

Tuesday Morning, June 13, 1989 — 8:15 a.m.

For the Morning Worship, William "Bud" Reeves gave the message and Vincent Harris was the liturgist. Carolyn Appling was the organist.

The session of the Conference was called to order by Bishop Wilke at 9:00 a.m.

Charles Ashcraft presented a rose to the Bishop to help Conference remember the "Year of the Rose" at Mt. Sequoyah.

C. D. Womack reported the minutes had been read and were in order.

Joe Eason, Conference Treasurer and Statistician, presented the statistician's report for 1988. (See Statistical Tables.) The Conference voted to receive his report.

A motion of personal privilege was granted Marty Cash-Burless. She spoke in support of the African University emphasis and presented Bishop Wilke with an African University T-shirt. Richard Lancaster moved to amend the standing rules regarding Conference Structure relating to the membership of the Nominating Committee of the Conference. The motion to amend was accepted to be laid on the table overnight.

The Conference Council on Ministries began its report. Chairperson, Robin Wynn, spoke briefly and called on Tom Letchworth who read the report from the EMLC Task Force.

The Church and Society report was given by Rubye Lee Jackson, who also presented four resolutions which were adopted. (See reports.)

The Global Ministries report was given by Chester Jones. He called on Martha Faulker, Conference Mission Secretary, who spoke of the need for new missionaries and support and recruitment of them. She called on Delos and Hazel McCauley, missionaries to Nepal, who brought greetings from the church in Nepal and spoke about their experiences there. They stated they would be on leave for two years, living in Pine Bluff and available for consultation.

The World Hunger report was given by Loyd Perry, Conference World Hunger Coordinator. He said the United Methodist Church in Arkansas had sent 230 thousand pounds of rice to the hurricane victims in Nicaragua.

Chester Jones spoke in support of increased support for Aldersgate, Church Extension work, and One Great Hour of Sharing in every church. He moved the adoption of the resolution celebrating the fiftieth anniversary of UMCOR, which was adopted.

Kurt Boggan announced on behalf of the Worship Area the formation of a team which will conduct training events in the uses of the new hymnal in early 1990. Team members are: Roger Armstrong, Rebecca Boggan, Edgar Thompson, Jeannie Burton, David Glaze and Adolphus Whitten. They will be trained in a workshop this fall in Nashville and then will form teams to go out and conduct District level workshops.

The Ecumenical Affairs and Interreligious Concerns report was presented by Tom Abney. He also moved the adoption of a proposal for the covenanting in churches, which was passed.

The Bishop called the order of the day and Mrs. Wilke presented the spouses of the District Superintendents to the Conference. The spouses of the ministers of the Conference were recognized. Bishop Wilke then presented Mrs. Aubrey Walton who spoke to the Conference and received a standing ovation.

Dr. Joe Hatcher presented the report of Hendrix College. He presented an audio slide presentation about the college and made a summary of special events at the college.

The Hendrix report was accepted.

Jim Argue, Jr. gave the report of the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas. He stated that over the eight years of their existence they have grown from under \$100,000 to more than \$6,000,000 in assets. He spoke of the successful creation of the Bishop's Club which consists of 55 persons who will contribute \$1,000 a year to the operation of the United Methodist Foundation. This provides 35% of their annual budget. He stated 100% of the interest paid out goes to some United Methodist purpose. The report was accepted.

Max Marble, director of the South Central Jurisdiction Volunteers in Mission, addressed the Conference, noting that last year more than 500 from our Jurisdiction went

somewhere to do volunteers in mission work. (See reports.)

David Bush moved that the CFA consider the per diem for retired ministers be raised from \$35 to \$50 per day. This was approved for consideration by CFA and was to be vot ed on later.

Jim Wilson, chairperson of the Camp Tanako Board presented a report of the Camp including a request for an apportionment for Tanako. (See reports.) The funding was ap proved subject to the final approval of the CFA.

David Wilson on point of personal privilege shared with the Conference the fact tha Jim Wilson is going off the Tanako Board after serving his term as chairperson with out

standing distinction and the Conference gave Jim Wilson a standing ovation.

Courtesies were extended to Wesley Brown from Duke Divinity School, Ewing Way land, Neil Blair from St. Paul School of Theology and Jim Beal from the North Arkansa Conference.

Dr. Alvin Murray offered the closing prayer and conference adjourned.

Tuesday Afternoon — June 13, 1989 — 2:00 p.m.

Bishop Wilke called the Conference in order at 2:00 p.m. The Conference sang "Stand Up for Jesus"

Chaplain Bob Howerton of the Methodist Health Systems, spoke for the Task Force studying alternate housing needs for the elderly in Arkansas. The Task Force requester \$500 to continue promotion and cultivation of the mission and program of United Methodist Senior Services of Arkansas, Inc. Jim Aruge, Jr. told the Conference the United

Methodist Foundation of Arkansas would provide the \$500. The motion was made b John Miles to accept the offer and approve the report. The motion carried.

Constance Waddell gave a report of Mt. Sequoyah, highlighting special and new

events. (See reports.)

Bob Orr brought the United Methodist Children's Home report. (See reports.) He stated the need for the Home to move from traditional campus based housing to community based housing. He recommended the changes approved by the Home's Board of Trust ees. (See report.)

After discussion the report was adopted.

Sam Albright presented the United Methodist Publishing House report. He stated th Arkansas Cokesbury store was number one nationwide in the sale of new hymnals. H lifted up several publications authored by Arkansas Methodists. He presented a check to the Board of Pensions from the publishing house in the amount of \$8,074.49.

Dr. Joe Clark presented the report on Higher Education and Campus Ministry. (See re ports.) The Wesley Foundation reports were given by Dr. Gary Anderson, HSU; Dr John Barnes, Pine Bluff; Fay Pounds, UAM; Ralph Hale, SAU.

Fred Hunter made a motion that the Little Rock Conference petition the next Genera

Conference to: "Rename the Wesley Foundations to the United Methodist Student Center, with the cross and flame included in all signs and identifiable markings plus the old name 'Wesley Foundation' to be included in all signs and markings but not in predominate status."

John P. Miles moved to delete I c (making all Wesley Foundation Directorships full-

time appointments). The motion was approved.

David Wilson moved that "The Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry report be tabled until the 1990 session of Annual Conference; that between the 1989-1990 sessions BHECM, the Wesley Foundations and the UAPB Campus Ministry groups study the consultant's report; and that specific recommendations be presented to the 1990 Annual Conference by the BHECM."

A count vote was moved by Bill Robinson. The count vote on the tabling question was 189 for and 54 against.

John Blundell presented the Aldersgate report which was accepted. (See reports.)

Gladwin Connell moved the adoption of the Board of Trustees, United Methodist Church Center report. The motion carried.

Marilynn Loyd presented the COSROW report for adoption. The report was adopted.

The agenda was, by common consent, extended until 5:00 p.m.

John Walker presented the report of the Insurance Committee. (See reports.) He thanked members of the Committee and Mary Stanfield, Secretary of the Insurance Committee and Secretary of the Board of Pensions, for her work during the year. The report was accepted.

John Walker introduced Cecil Polk, who reported that a study committee in both Conferences had been, and would continue to be, exploring the possibility of a joint insurance program. (See reports.)

Fred Haustein had a moment of personal privilege and asked that the Conference express appreciation for the fine way in which Insurance and CFA worked together.

John Walker read the Judicial Council Ruling on the Insurance Committee funds, (See reports.) Dr. Marvin Loyd gave the report of Equitable Salaries, which was accepted. (See reports.)

Charles Ashcraft called on John Ross to give the report of the Board of Trustees, which

was adopted. (See reports.)

VI. Reports

Episcopal Address Little Rock Annual Conference June 11-14, 1989

An Annual Conference is a unique critter. We are not a convention; we're not an assembly, not a church legislature. In many respects we're a family.

The preachers have no local church membership, but belong to the Annual Conference — offering in return their joy in service wherever they are appointed. It is their spiritual home. Laity represent local churches as spiritual advisors, friends, with a willingness to receive their appointed pastors. So it's a very special group of people who come together.

Our business is to see what we can do collectively that we cannot do individually. Since we are family, the strong help the weak, in establishing new congregations, providing minimum support to modest congregations, helping each other with insurance, preach-

ers, pensions, and emergency aid.

Together we support our institutions: Arkansas can be extremely grateful for splendid colleges under the brilliant leadership of Dr. Joe Hatcher at Hendrix and Dr. Myer Titus at Philander Smith. They are literally leading the way in the education field in the United Methodist Church. SMU, under Dr. Kenneth Pye, is refreshingly alive and vibrant. The Children's Home, headed by Reverend Bob Orr, is ministering to troubled youth in changing times. Mr. John Blundell draws national attention to Aldersgate and its work with ill, handicapped, and/or abused children and youth. Mt. Sequoyah has doubled its participation and dramatically improved its facilities under Don and Constance Waddell. Camp Tanako, with Terry Everitt's leadership, is having a wonderful program and is rebuilding the facilities.

Together we can do great things. Time would not allow us to look at our world participation in United Methodist ministries. But a symbol of world wide connection is the new United Methodist University in Zimbabwe. The African bishops are ecstatic. They say it will impact South Central Africa and will impact the future as ministers, doctors, and business people, civil servants, and teachers come out of that University.

So we are together as family — soul brothers and sisters in the Wesleyan heritage, knitted together by our vows and commitments, our history and heritage, and, perhaps most important of all, our dreams of ministry and service in the days ahead. We have one driving question. "Together, how much can we do for God?"

Part I — Discipleship

I want to focus on three areas of church life this morning. Discipleship — the itinerancy, our professional ministry — and the issues of our society.

First, our obedience to the command of our Lord to make disciples, baptizing and

teaching. How are we doing?

Pastors are relearning how to reach the unchurched. Lay Christians are rediscovering how to witness, how to invite, how to teach. The **Disciple** Bible Study is a powerful tool for renewal. I respectively ask each congregation to enter into the **Disciple** plan within the next two years as a dramatic way of rediscovering the Word of God amid the intimacy of Christian fellowship. Churches that are really alive are including several unchurched people in the **Disciple** groups.

This foundation undergirds the Sunday School, the pre-schools, the Vacation Bible Schools, the Youth programs, the adult classes. You cannot have good church schools

without good teachers, and you need Biblical, theological and practical training.

We're on the brink! Lab schools are filling up again. So are teacher training workshops. District Superintendents are offering themselves as resources. So is the Conference staff. What we are striving for is a revitalized Christian Education. With the spiritual vacuum in our schools, with the breakdown of our homes, we must do everything we can to see

that every Christian from six weeks to ninety-six years is in some form of Christian education.

Twenty-six churches were Five Star Churches.

Pastors expecting advancement of responsibility must have lay leadership development and vital Sunday Schools.

Our statistics can be read in different ways. My Dad used to say figures don't lie, but liars can figure.

On one hand we baptized 941 people — this was 70 less than the previous year. On the other hand, we buried 1122 people; that's 181 more than we baptized.

Our Sunday School declined nearly 949 in average attendance, but our constituency rolls were up by 1064.

Total membership declined by 882.

Let me appeal to you laity —

Get out of your mind the worldly values — we want a bigger church. We want to be as

big as the Baptists. We need more members to help pay our bills.

Put into your minds the Godly values. Is every child receiving Christian training? Has every man and woman been invited to our fellowship? Do we have new ministries that would attract the unchurched? Are we praying daily for converts? Can we help begin a new congregation? Does our pastor need help in confirmation training? How can we reach youth for Jesus Christ?

We will not be satisfied until every church has a conversion. We will not let up until we baptize more souls than we bury. We will be unrelenting that we open our doors to the poor, the disenfranchised, the black, the young, the newcomer within our gates.

During my ministry in Arkansas, I dream of a resurgence of enthusiasm, a growing church school, a youth ministry, and an expanding membership of our churches.

Part II — The Appointment Making Process

For better or worse, we live under an appointive style of ministry. I am assigned, and every United Methodist pastor is assigned. The bishop, with the advice of the cabinet, hearing through a consultative process with pastors and staff or Pastor Parish Committees, annually assign each member of the Conference and each local pastor to her or his

Across the years, the process has evolved. In early days, young men on horseback were assigned by the bishop to whole territories — Kentucky — or Missouri — or Arkansas. When preachers were ineffective or became worn out, tired, or sick, they were located. So were they if they got married, for they were encumbered by a family and considered unable to itinerate. There was no shortage of settlements in which to preach.

Now things are different. Ministers, both men and women, often have strings tied to their appointments: the job of a spouse, the education of children, the care of parents, the health and welfare of a family member - all are legitimate concerns, but they restrict freedom to itinerate. An oft unspoken restriction is the reluctance to receive a drop in salary.

The laity, on the other hand, are becoming increasingly involved. They are properly consulting by way of the Pastor Parish Committees through the district superintendent. For several years now we have been receiving large numbers of members from other denominations. Some of these fine Christians expect congregational votes, or church-wide meetings to discuss the pastor. Or they would like to send a group of people to visit with the superintendent or bishop. That action violates our Discipline and our proper process. Help your people know that our consultation is only and always through the Pastor Parish Relations Committee. The Lay Member of the Conference is a member of that committee, hopefully, also, so is the lay leader, providing excellent linkage.

More and more, through the consultative process, committees are properly encouraging their pastor throughout the year, making and achieving mutual goals, affirming strengths, pointing out weaknesses, helping the pastor receive additional training, rest, or spiritual enrichment. More and more committees are developing a profile of expectation when a change of pastors seems appropriate.

This year was the best ever for consultation. We were able to have 20% fewer move and most moves went smoothly.

Two or three hitches occurred, however.

In some committees, a vote was taken, and it was felt that that vote was determinative— in other words, for example, a 5 to 4 vote or a 6 to 3 vote for the pastor to move of stay, thinking that decided the matter. We do not recommend a vote at all, for it is judgment call that should try to read both the will of God and the mood of the Church But, whether a consensus or a vote, the action is still advisory; the Bishop with the advict of the cabinet must finally decide what seems to be in the best interests of the church and the pastor.

In the same manner, it is an unwise pastor who says in the Spring — "I'm moving," o "I'm staying." A Methodist pastor has more appropriate words to say, such as "I am requesting to stay" or "I'm under evaluation." Some pastors burn their bridges, forgettin there may be no place for them to go.

The hardest thing to explain is both our glory and our difficulty. When I read the appointments for the North Arkansas Conference and the Little Rock Conference (incider tally, we are forced more and more to think of the entire state — and beyond — i appointment matters) — When the appointments are read, every church, every church no matter how small, will have a pastor. Several people are asking for ministry — elder from other states, pastors from other denominations, lay persons wishing to be local pastors — and we do not, this year, have room for them.

Recently I talked with a Presbyterian executive who said his system works only whe 10% to 20% of their church are without a pastor — it allows the system to call and respond.

Our system is more like musical chairs — and every chair is full. A pastor cannot movuntil a church is open and a church is not open until a pastor moves. The informal kitch en cabinet cannot understand this because they usually leave someone out, making thing a lot easier. To make our system work we sometimes need a pastor who should not move that upsets everybody, including me. But to use a simple, hypothetical illustration:

Here is a pastor with responsibility for 600 souls, who, after 8 years, is moving. Here i a pastor of 200 souls, who, after 6 years, is ready for a new challenge. But the responsibility jump is great, maybe too great, the salary increase is large, the morale of the conference is shaken. What to do? Here is a pastor right in between — 400 souls, with good experience — the salary in between — but who is in her or his third year — a unanimou vote of the P.P.R. Committee requests no move — has assumed he or she will stay.

This year, more than ever before, P.P.R. Committees objected when that change wa made, even though it never was done without the pastor's approval.

So, to modify our system even more, we are going to:

- a) avoid such situations as often as we can, moving pastors with longer tenure even if i means significantly larger churches.
- b) notify immediately the P.P.R. Committee if an unexpected move is being considered, and
- c) allowing the P.P.R. Committee more time to reflect and prepare a profile of thein eds before a new appointment is made.

All this is difficult, because often a series of appointments — 10 or 12 — must all be made together. To paraphrase Benjamin Franklin — "They hang together" or fall togeth er. But we are determined to try.

No conference has ever been blessed with finer, more caring superintendents.

During the coming year, I'm asking them to do two things specifically. Spend more time with the pastors, less time in committee meetings; more time with the churches, listening, and less time preaching. Like the Conference Staff, I want them to be available to you, to help you start a Fisherman's Club, carry teachers to a Sunday School training workshop; study a city to dream in a new congregation. Their goal will be to help every

pastor succeed, every appointment to work well, and every church to flourish.

And second, and this I want to say very heavily to the pastors, I'm asking superintendents to form cluster groups of all pastors. We have worked alone too long. We have walked lonely vigils too long. It is time we became a fellowship once again, to meet regularly for prayer, for Bible Study — not just to hand out mimeograph sheets (I've been on both sides of that), but to have a time of sharing and fellowship.

Do you realize it is a precious gift of Christ that we would have not only the strength from the scriptures and the sacraments, but that we would have each other. Please, please, help us to do that. Satan is destroying a minister here, a minister there, tearing up a family, driving competitive wedges within the fellowship, causing pride and jealousy — who's serving what church — and that has to be overcome by a sweet spirit of cooperation. Homes are at stake, spiritual morale is involved, and fellowship is essential.

Help us build a ministry with the same type of Koinonia we covet for every Christian.

A word about women in ministry. Folks, it's here. No longer is it coming. It is here! No longer is it acceptable for a church to say, "Don't send us a woman preacher."

I haven't done what one of my bishop friends has done. He said to the Pastor Parish committee, "If you make that request, please put that in writing so that the civil suit will be directed to you."

I believe with all my heart that God needs all God's people. The work is so huge. The task of Kingdom building is so great, we need us all, and the Lord needs us all. One third of all of our seminary students in the United Methodist seminaries are women; half in my own seminary. We have been asked by the Episcopal Committee, and actually I am more eager than they, to have a woman superintendent as soon as possible.

We need women pastors in our larger churches and in the superintendency. We're having some of our strongest and finest leadership given by women. Each of you go back to your home church, and you are on your Pastor-Parish. Men and women are called by God to preach. I feel so strongly because our two daughters are in a form of ministry, and believe you me, God gave them some special gifts that are reaching people for Christ and the Church. Women are in ministry, and they will be in every level of our denomination.

Part III — The Issues Of Our Society

A word about the hymnal. We are going to have the greatest liturgical renewal that our Church has seen in a half of a century. The new hymnal is so exciting! You can sing "We're Climbing Jacob's Ladder" or "A Mighty Fortress is Our God" or "There's A Sweet, Sweet Spirit In This Place" or "Precious Lord, Take My Hand." It's all there! And you can sing and sing and sing and sing. And I hope that some of you will blow the three hymns and a prayer right out of the saddle.

Sing, sing, and sing again. And I hope you will start singing on Sunday nights, and I hope you will start singing around the piano, and I hope you'll sing in your homes. I hope the young people will sing, and I hope the children will sing, and I hope the Methodists will once again be a "singing people."

The morning news reminds us that we are in a changing world. China is struggling with democracy; when Russia is referring to God and passing out Bibles — when Koreans are sending missionaries all over the world.

A renewal of the things we hold deepest is happening all over the world. Christianity and Christian principals are swelling up. Every person is a child of God. People believe that. Freedom comes when Christ breaks the sin-hold on a human life. Life has meaning when it's shared. And so, how do we live out our faith?

I can't get a better handle on it than to think of our own discipleship and our own intensity. In your pre-schools, teach as much of the Gospel as you can. Don't farm that out to somebody down the street. In your Mom's Day Out, teach your little ones as much as you can. In your Vacation Church Schools, laugh and play and help young people know that Christ came to give the abundant life. And ask everybody to come to your Vacation Bible School — the greatest way for the small and the rural church to reach the unchurched.

Open your church for tutoring. The library in your church for young people to reactive Volunteers in the jail to do tutoring. Both **Trinity** and **Disciple** are moving into some of the prisons.

Pray for better schools in Arkansas. The critical issue in Arkansas in the public sector is schools. Pray for the schools, pay for the schools. Let the Methodist Church deman higher pay for teachers — better classrooms — better colleges — stronger education! An we don't need a lottery to do it!

Now this final word about children and young people. Most of you are not dying of legal drugs. Few alcoholics are in this room. Many of you have been saved from disease chemical abuse, alcohol, tobacco usage because when you were twelve years old, someor told you that the body is the Temple of the Holy Spirit — Somebody shared with you that Jesus Christ could lead you into an abundant life where you did not need alcohol tobacco or — we didn't know so much about drugs in those days, but now we do.

Who's going to tell our twelve-year olds if you don't tell them? Who's going to show the way if you do not abstain? Who is going to offer to the youth of America a sober, clear traditionally Methodist life, free from alcohol, tobacco and chemical abuse if you do not do it?

Who is going to proclaim it, publicly and personally? Should the surgeon general of the United States be more excited than the Methodist preacher? Should we have to look and I praise God for him — for him to be the evangelist to our society on drunk driving An advertising of alcohol where, as he put it, the athletes and the movie stars teach or young people that it is sexually and socially wise and prominent to drink.

I ask your churches to take as a great mission field the youth of America. Not the your of your church — that's not big enough. The youth of your town — the youth of you community — the youth as far as you can count them. Put some money in it; hire som youth workers; bring some college kids back for the summer and help your youth program. Take your finest lay people off your administrative board, off your Pastor Paris Committee, and have them become youth workers and teachers.

Every Methodist preacher ought to be working in a youth camp. Where did we get the idea that once you're 35 you no longer have an impact on young people. I don't kno how many teen-agers there are in this Conference, but every one of them needs Jest Christ

And if the people called Methodist can't do it, then we ought to go out of business.

Report #1 — Council On Finance And Administration

If you were in business and you saw your business statistics going downhill, what would you do? Would you ignore it? Would you say it is simply bad times? Would you seek to do something about it in a forthright and progressive way? Hopefully, you would seek to do the latter, especially if you loved that business and had given your life to it. Well, our business is the church and in particular the United Methodist Church in the Little Rock Conference.

Your Conference CFA has been given the responsibility to handle the business end of the conference work. This means we must, sometimes to our dismay, look at the finances. Here is what we are seeing at present: In 1978 our conference paid 98% of its apportionments. In 1978 we paid 97% of World Service. Since that time, we have gone steadily downhill. In 1988, we paid 86% of apportionments. We paid 80% of World Service. This simply means that many programs and ministries of the church suffered. Your CFA has met with Bishop Wilke and we discussed at length the problems in our conference as they relate to apportionments. As a result, the Council on Finance and Administration (CFA) recommends the following for adoption by the Little Rock Annual Conference:

- 1. That the Annual Conference require District Superintendents to work with churches to create support and develop plans to pay 100% of apportionments. A reasonable time-line should be applied and the plan filed annually with the CFA.
- 2. A list of pastors and churches paying their apportionments in full be published in the ARKANSAS UNITED METHODIST.
- 3. That the Bishop and CFA go on record as asking the Cabinet to appropriately apply the appointive process to assure full payment of apportionments.
- 4. That churches considering building programs give serious consideration to paying apportionments in full, or devising a plan to do so, before undertaking major capital expenditures.

FINAL COMMENT: If we do not turn this problem around in the next two years, we can anticipate such a massive deficit in apportionments as to make it impossible to maintain present programs and ministries. Everyone will be hurt.

A. World Service and Conference Benevolences: We recommend that the General Conference apportionment of \$423,326 for World Service be accepted and that an amount of \$871,365 be apportioned for Conference Benevolences for 1990; for a total apportionment of \$1,294,691. Further, we recommend that the monies received for World Service and Conference Benevolences be distributed on a basis of 32.70% for World Service and 67.30% for Conference Benevolences.

B. Ministerial Support: We recommend that the Ministerial Support apportionment of \$1,786,106 be accepted in full by the Annual Conference and that it be apportioned to the local churches.

C. Other Apportioned Funds: We recommend that the Annual Conference accept in full the askings listed below and they be apportioned to the local churches.

VII. Apportionment Formula

We recommend that the formula used by the Conference be a two year average of the most recent years' statistics: ½ based on membership (column 9) and ½ based on financial data, consisting of local church expenditures (columns 35, 36, 38, 39, 40, and 41) and that year's apportionments. The decimal will be a Conference decimal, with each church weighed against the conference total.

VIII. Salary and Expenses of District Superintendents and Council on Ministries Director:

We recommend the District Superintendents' total compensation package for 1990 be \$58,558.26. This figure shall include salary, utilities and appurtenances, and travel expense.

We recommend a vouchered expense pool for the District Superintendents in the amount of \$21,000 for meetings (Cabinet, CCOM, and out of state) with the stipulation that no district, board, or agency make any payment for the purpose indicated above.

We recommend that the Director of the Council on Ministries' salary and expense be the same as the District Superintendents'.

IX. Advance Specials

We recommend General Advance Specials to local churches for firsthand relationships with mission projects and involvement in mission.

X. Special Days

We recommend these Special Days with offerings:

Human Relations Day — During Epiphany on the Sunday before the observance of Martin Luther King's birthday.

One Great Hour of Sharing — Fourth Sunday in Lent

United Methodist Student Day — Sunday after Thanksgiving

World Communion Sunday — First Sunday in October

Peace with Justice — Second Sunday after Pentecost

United Methodist Children's Home — Second and Third Sundays in December

Native American Awareness Sunday — April 29

Tanako Offering — September 10

Golden Cross Sunday — First Sunday in May

XI. "Fair Share" Goals:

- A. Aldersgate Camp We recommend \$50,000 be requested from the churches in "Fair Share goals for core costs" at Aldersgate, and that "programmatic costs" be continued as a Conference Advance Special.
- B. Christian Civic Foundation We recommend \$12,500 be requested from the local churches in "Fair Share" goals for the Christian Civic Foundation in 1990.
- C. Perkins/St. Paul We recommend \$63,060 be requested from the local churches in "Fair Share" goals for the Perkins/St. Paul campaign may be paid only after the Ministerial Education Fund apportionment is paid in full.
- D. U.A.M.S Hospital Chaplains Fund We recommend \$6,000 be requested from the local churches in "Fair Share" goals for the Pastoral Care program.

Council On Finance And Administration Report #3

Other Recommendations

- I. Pastor's Utilities and Appurtenances: If no utility allowance is made, we recommend that the local churches designate a part of the compensation as parsonage utilities and appurtenances to exempt those costs from income taxes.
- The travel allowance remain at \$.20 per mile plus \$.02 per mile for each additional person, to encourage car pooling.
- III. Retired ministers be paid \$35 per diem for days they attend Annual Conference.
- IV. Pastors' moving expense be paid at the rate of \$300 plus \$.75 per mile. The mileage is to be paid from parsonage to parsonage, with one exception. When transferring from another conference, the rate will apply from parsonage to the Little Rock Conference boundary. The policies for application for Pastors' Moving Expenses Funds are listed in the 1982 JOURNAL, page 127, Section 12II(F).
- V. All unrestricted benevolence funds be placed in a central operating balance.
- VI. "Interest Income" from investments (estimated 1990 income: \$40,000), with the exception of the income earned from Church Development Funds, be deposited in the Conference Administration Fund.
- VII. Balances remaining in the Conference Benevolence Fund and the Conference Administration Fund at year end be transferred to the Contingency Fund.
- VIII. Any Conference employee who has, or who desires a tax sheltered annuity may direct the Director of Finance & Management to pay this annuity from his regular income following proper guidelines.
 - IX. Housing allowances (for persons receiving such funds) be set at the estimated actual expense as reported to the conference or local church. This information should be reported at the beginning of each calendar year. This will result in reallocation in the funds paid to such persons and will not increase the total amount paid.
 - X. Each board, commission, committee or agency not be allowed to change a line item in its approved budget which would exceed 10% of the amount without approval of the Council on Finance & Administration.
- XI. All agencies receiving conference funds shall submit their latest independent audits to the Conference Council on Finance & Administration for their review and study.
- XII. Wesley Foundations may solicit funds within their supporting districts after approval is given by the District Council on Ministries.
- XIII. Local church administrative boards consider paying all conference life and health insurance (DBP & HMEP) premiums directly (above salary) in order to provide tax savings for pastors and other church employees. If necessary or desirable, the salary may be reduced by the same amount. This policy must be consistently applied to all employees.
- XIV. Participation by the conference in Area programs must not exceed 50% of the cost of that program, with the exceptions approved by the Council on Finance and Administration.
- XV. The management and investment of all the monies of/from all those boards and agencies which receive monies from the Conference or line item apportionments must be handled by the area treasurer's office.
- XVI. Any capital lease or purchase over \$1,500 must be approved by the Council on Finance and Administration prior to lease or purchase, even if that budget has been previously approved.
- XVII. Permission be granted to the area treasurer to borrow funds (on a short-term basis) from the Arkansas Area account if Little Rock Conference funds are not sufficient to meet current needs. Both Council on Finance and Administration

presidents must approve the loan before it is transacted. Interest on such loan will be paid at the current money market rate.

- XVIII. The Conference provide fidelity bonding insurance for all local churches in compliance with Paragraph 714.1.
 - XIX. A uniform percentage of 5% will be added to all 1990 apportionments.
 - XX. The following be adopted, as a guide for the investment and care of all Conference Funds:

The Area Treasurer is charged with the responsibility for managing all Conference funds in a manner that will provide:

- A. The maximum income from the investment of all funds, while simultaneously insuring
- B. Adequate liquidity to meet the day-to-day operational needs of the Treasurer's Office and
- C. The safety and soundness of all funds. To accomplish this, all funds should be
 - (1) deposited in Arkansas institutions in a fully insured status on a shortterm basis, generally ninety days, but up to six months with the approval of the Investment Committee or CFA, or
 - (2) invested in direct U. S. Government obligations for terms up to six months, or
 - (3) invested with the General Board of Pensions of the United Methodist Church.

Longer term investments may be made from time to time, but these are generally discouraged, because of the uncertainty of the need for funds and the volatility of interest rates. The Area Treasurer is encouraged to consult with a majority of the Investment Committee or the CFA, when he is uncertain about an investment. This policy is intended to be flexible in its application, in order to meet rapidly changing economic conditions. While income is desirable, the primary emphasis should continue to be the maintenance of adequate funds and the avoidance of speculative investments.

This policy may be amended from time to time to meet changing conditions and to enhance the income of the Conference.

XXI. That the South Central Jurisdiction VOLUNTEERS IN MISSION be given authority to solicit "volunteer" contributions from individuals, districts, and the Annual Conference for the purpose of funding the administrative work of this program. That these contributions be kept as a line item in reporting to the Jurisdictional Council on Finance and Administration and that such be a part of the audit report of the jurisdictional budget.

All contributions to this fund must go directly to the Little Rock Conference Treasurer's Office.

- XXII. The Conference gives the Conference Council on Finance and Administration the authority to fund extraordinary needs relating to the life and ministry of the annual conference. These needs shall be funded from unrestricted funds and contingency funds. This authority shall not be used, nor is it intended, to replace or circumvent normal funding procedures of the Little Rock Annual Conference. Actions on such requests shall be reported to the next regular session of the Annual Conference. (This recommendation is in reference to paragraph 709.6 of the 1988 BOOK OF DISCIPLINE)
- XXIII. The Conference Council on Finance and Administration recommends the purchase of computers and software for each District Office. Based on a proposal given to the CFA by the Joint Cabinet the computer systems would cost \$4,500 each. Funding for these computers would come from the Conference contingency funds. This would be a total expenditure of \$27,000. The CFA approved the purchase of these computer systems subject to a vote of the Annual Conference.

- XXIV. THE BOOK OF DISCIPLINE authorizes the Conference CFA to convene representatives of various conference agencies when there are matters of mutual concern. It has been brought to our attention that several conferences have begun programs of property insurance coverage for the various local churches and agencies of their conference. As a result, significant savings in premium costs have been realized by those participating. In order to look into this possibility, the CFA has organized a group of lay and clergy persons from around our conference to study this program and to bring any recommendations they might deem advisable to the 1990 annual conference, through the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.
- XXV. The Conference CFA recommends that Joe Eason be elected to the Office of Conference Treasurer for the 1989-1992 quadrennium.
- XXVI. We express our appreciation to Joe Eason and his staff, Barbara Skiles, Cheryl Beck, Alvin Burks, and Mary Lois Stanfield, for the excellent service they perform for the Conference.

DECISION NO. 614

IN RE: Custody and Management of Refund from the Medical Expense Program of the General Board of Pensions.

DIGEST

Employee benefits are not subject to the investment policies of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.

STATEMENT OF FACTS

The Insurance Committee and the Conference Council on Finance and Administration have received differing opinions as relates to whether funds paid by subscribers to the Health and Medical Expense Plan of the Conference are funds which fall under the purview of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, and thus, subject to the investment policies of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration, or are employee benefits which would make them subject to the investment policies of the Board of Pensions, and thus, fall under the purview of the Conference Insurance Committee. The Conference voted to ask the Judicial Council for a declaratory Decision regarding same.

Appearing at an oral hearing on April 20, 1989 in Dallas, Texas were Dr. Fred Haustein, representing the Little Rock Conference Council on Finance and Administration, and the Rev. John F. Walker and Dr. F. Gladwin Connell, representing the Insurance Committee of the Little Rock Annual Conference.

Jurisdiction

The Judicial Council has jurisdiction under ¶2615 of the Discipline.

Analysis

The issue here is whether funds held by the Conference Insurance Committee are "Conference funds," and thus subject to the investment policies of the Conference Council on Finance and

In cooperation with the General Council on Finance and Administration, related Annual Conference agencies and institutions, and local churches, to make recommendations to the Annual Conference regarding the development, promotion and review of a broad general program of insurance protection and risk management, except for employee benefit programs (emphasis added).

The funds in question have been held in trust by the Insurance Committee for forty-one years.

Sections 104 and 106 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 exclude from gross income compensation to employees received from health and accident insurance, thus implying that health and accident insurance is an employee benefit. Generally, in business circles, accident and health insurance coverage is considered to be a benefit to the employee.

The Health and Medical Expense Program of the Little Rock Annual Conference is a program which provides an employee benefit. The monies held by the Insurance Committee of the Little Rock Annual Conference under ¶709.13 of the **Discipline** are excluded from those funds made available to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration for investment purposes.

Decision

The funds currently held and invested by the Insurance Committee of the Little Rock Annual Conference are funds intended to be utilized as benefits to the employees. These funds, therefore, under the provision of ¶709.13 of the **Discipline** are excluded from the purview of the Conference Council on Finance and Administration's investment policies.

Committee On Insurance HOSPITALIZATION AND MEDICAL EXPENSE PROGRAM

The Little Rock Conference has the Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program provided by the General Board of Pensions of United Methodist Church. The Travelers Insurance Company is underwriter for this insurance.

ELIGIBILITY

FOR HOSPITALIZATION AND MEDICAL EXPENSE PROGRAM

- A. Ministers and Full-time Local Pastors
 - 1. All full members of the Conference under appointment with annuity claim upon the Conference and their dependents.
 - 2. All probationary members and their dependents.
 - 3. All full-time local pastors and their dependents.
 - 4. All full-time lay employees of the Annual Conference and their dependents.
 - 5. All members who have been granted the retired relation by this Conference with annuity claim and their dependents.
 - All retired full-time local pastors with annuity claim on this Conference and their dependents.
 - 7. All widows of deceased ministers or full-time local pastors with annuity claim on this Conference and their dependent children.
 - 8. Student local pastors and their dependents.
 - Ministers on leave of absence for up to one year following the appointment to leave of absence.

NOTE: Any Conference member under special appointment without annuity credit on this Conference is eligible to be enrolled provided he/she assumes responsibility for full payment of the premium. Probationary members appointed to attend school and not serving a charge in the Annual Conference are also eligible to be enrolled provided they assume responsibility for full payment of the premium.

B. Local Church Full-time Lay Employees and Full-time Diaconal Ministers

1. To enroll the eligible lay employees of a particular church, the following number of employees must elect to participate:

2. Any local church or institution not qualifying for or electing to enroll its full-time employees under the above rules on the initial enrollment date (July 1, 1972), may enroll eligible employees under the same rules on any subsequent anniversary of

- 3. Ministers transferring into the Conference may enroll in HMEP within 90 days of transfer without having to fill out a "Statement of Physical Condition" form. new lay employee of a participating church or organization may enroll within 9 days of employment without having to submit a "Statement of Physical Condition" form.
- Enrollment applications are available from the Insurance Committee Office an Records Coordinator, Mary Stanfield, at the Office of Finance and Managemen P.O. Box 3364, Little Rock, Arkansas, 72203.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION CONCERNING MEDICARE ENROLLMENT

Any minister who will reach his/her 65th birthday when he/she is still serving in a ful time capacity and not drawing Social Security, should apply three months before his/he 65th birthday at the local Social Security office for Medicare. Any minister who ha passed his/her 65th birthday and has not applied for Medicare, should contact the Social Security office immediately. This applies to those who are eligible and wish to participate in Medicare.

Should a minister's spouse reach age 65 before the minister, he/she should apply for Medicare at the local Social Security office.

It is each person's responsibility to secure his or her own Medicare coverage. For mospersons age 65 or over, HMEP coverage complements Medicare.

Because of the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act, a minister or lay employe who is age 65, but under age 70 and is still serving in an active status, is required to pa the HMEP premium of a person under age 65. For a person in this situation, Travelers i the primary payor and Medicare is the secondary payor.

THE DEATH BENEFIT PROGRAM

The Death Benefit Program is in three parts. Part I is included in the Ministerial Pension Plan/Comprehensive Protection Plan (MMP/CPP). Part II is an elective additional coverage called DBP-PLUS. Part III is a carry over from the past, available to clergy no covered by CPP.

CLAIMS PROCEDURES

1. Hospitalization and Medical Expense Program:

NOTE: To file a claim, send a First Notice of Claim Form, (one per person per year) to the Claims Department, Travelers Insurance Company, P.O. Box 105312 Atlanta, Georgia 30048. The toll free number is 1-800-792-7729. Follow the instructions on the First Notice Claim Form.

- A. First Notice of Claim Forms are available from the Office and Records Coordina tor or Travelers Insurance Company.
- B. Prescriptions must have the doctor's diagnosis for the first prescription only, bu not for refills.
- C. Full and complete itemized details of all tests and medical expenses are required and should be included in the claim.
- D. Claims for the calendar year 1988 must be submitted to Travelers by April 1, 1989.
- 2. Death Benefit Program:
 - A. The death of a participant, (minister or lay employee), should be reported to the appropriate District Superintendent and/or the Office and Records Coordinator.

INSURANCE COMMITTEE POLICIES

- 1. Premium notices are sent out every quarter at least two weeks before the due date.
- 2. When the premium is 30 days past due, a second notice will be sent to the participant.
- 3. When a premium is 60 days past due, a past due notice will be sent to the District Superintendent as well as to the participant and the participant's charge.
- 4. If an enrolled person fails to pay premiums for two consecutive quarters, the secretary shall notify the insured by registered mail that he/she will be terminated within fifteen

- (15) days of the letter's date unless full payment is received in that fifteen day period. Any exceptions to this policy must be approved by the Insurance Committee. A copy of this letter shall be sent to the appropriate District Superintendent as notification that termination is being considered. Should there be a hardship, the District Superintendent should convey such information to the Insurance Committee. The District Superintendent shall be advised of any considered change in the insured's status.
- 5. When coverage is terminated, reinstatement requires proof of insurability and approval of the Little Rock Conference Insurance Committee.

Board Of Pensions

Since 1982 the Board of Pensions has been able to raise the rate for past service from \$118.00 to \$237.00 (1988). At the same time, the period of years projected to pay the unfunded liability has decreased from 40 to 20 years. This has been possible by the rate of apportionment received from the local churches and the good investment yields at the General Board of Pensions.

Report No. 1

- 1. We recommend that the Little Rock Conference participate in the Ministerial Pension (MPP) and the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) of the General Board of Pensions during 1990 on the following basis:
 - a. Contribution base shall be limited to each minister's plan compensation not to exceed the denominational average compensation.
 - b. Contribution rate shall be MPP, 12\(\tilde{W}\) of each minister's contribution base, and CPP, 4.4% of each minister's contribution base.
 - c. Annuity rate for pre-January 1, 1982 service shall be raised from \$237 to \$250 per service year.

- d. Surviving spouse percentage of the formula benefit rate shall be 70%.
- A 20 year amortization period shall be used to pay the unfunded past service liability.
- f. Monthly contributions to MPP/CPP shall be made through the apportionment system.
- g. CPP benefits shall be supplemented with Death Benefit Plan-Plus (DBP-Plus) to 300% DAC.
- h. Active participants will contribute to the Death Benefit Program Plus with the church paying 60% and the participant 40%.
- Every Conference member earning less than the Equitable Salary from his/her primary salary paying unit can be included in CPP at the rate of 3.4% of his/her contribution base.
- j. Probationers at seminary will be provided CPP at 3.4%.
- k. Those on leave of absence may participate in CPP at the rate of 3.4%. The participant will pay the full 3.4%.
- 2. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1606, Section 12e of the 1988 Discipline that the Sunday following Easter be observed as Retired Minister's Day. Each Pastor is urged to acquaint his or her congregation with the pension program of the Conference as part of the observation, and if possible to use a retired minister in the Worship Service.
- 3. We recommend in keeping with Par. 1606, Section 4h of the 1988 Discipline, the approval of the Annual Conference that Special Appointments shall be listed in the Conference Journal as follows: (1) with Annuity claim, (a) upon the Annual Conference, or (b) upon a General Board, an Institution, or an Agency of the United Methodist Church; (2) without Annuity claim upon this Annual Conference.
- 4. We recommend the following pertaining to the health insurance program of the Conference:
 - a. Board of Pensions pay 100% of the premium for our eligible retirees, surviving spouses, and ministers on disability for the Hospital and Medical Expense Program.
 - b. Conference Claimants: If a retired minister and/or spouse desires to have the premium for their Conference Hospitalization and Medical Insurance Program paid by the Board of Pensions, the minister must have been enrolled in the program prior to his/her 65th birthday. Likewise, if the spouse is to have the premium for the Program paid by the Conference, he/she must have been enrolled in the program for a minimum of one year prior to his/her 65th birthday or one year prior to the
 - minister's retirement.

 c. Spouses of Deceased and Retired Ministers: In the case of a deceased minister whose spouse is under the age of 65, the Board of Pensions will pay the dependent's insurance premium for five (5) years following the death of the minister. In the event of extenuating circumstances, an extension of payments may be requested by the dependent. Payment automatically ends with the remarriage of the dependent Each case will be reviewed annually. If a minister's spouse is under the age of 65 at
- the time of that minister's retirement, the Board of Pensions will pay only the portion of the Conference Hospitalization and Medical Insurance Program premium equal to the amount of the premium of the retired minister.

In event of default by any Pastoral Charge and after the notification of the committee, liens shall be filed against future pensions and the names of the churches and ministers along with the amount in default shall be printed in the Conference Journal.

7. We request the Secretary of the Annual Conference to print in the minister's Service Record in the Journal, one column stating "Years of Pensions Claim on the Little Rock Conference," and another stating "Total Service Years in the Ministry."

8. A list of annuitants and pensions payments for the year 1988 is available in the Conference Treasurer's Office from Mary Stanfield.

Resolution Relating to Rental/Housing Allowances For Retired or Disabled Ministers of This Conference

Whereas, the religious denomination known as the United Methodist Church has functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

Whereas, the practice of the United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers, and

Whereas, pensions paid to retired ordained or licensed ministers of the United Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service, and disability benefits are considered payments in lieu of compensation for active service; and

Whereas, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the Little Rock Annual Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/allowance for retired ordained or licensed ministers who are members of the Conference; and

Whereas, the disabled minister has the same legal relationship to the Annual Conference as does the retired minister and, thus this Annual Conference is also the appropriate organization to designate a housing/allowance for a disabled ordained or licensed minister who is a member of this Conference:

Now Therefore Be It Resolved:

- 1. An amount equal to 100% of the pensions payments received by a retired minister, or 100% of the disability benefit payments received by a disabled minister, during the year 1990 be and is hereby designated as a rental/allowance respectively for each retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister of the United Methodist Church who is or was a member of the Little Rock Annual Conference at the time of his/her retirement or disability;
- 2. The pension or disability payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension or disability payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference, General Agency, or institution of the United Methodist Church or any former denomination that is now a part of the United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension or benefit funds of the United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension or disabled minister's benefits.

The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-280, 1971 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107 (2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities."

Beginning in 1984, there is no longer a sick pay or disability income exclusion available with respect to disability benefit payments. Therefore, the full amount disability benefit payments will be taxable income to the recipient beginning in 1984.

Addendum A To The Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) and The Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP)

(MPP Supplement Paragraph (c) for the Year 1990)

This Addendum A is applicable to the Little Rock Annual Conference and is effective as of January 1, 1990. It replaces any previously executed Addendum A and shall be in effect until amended by the Annual Conference in accordance with the provisions of the Ministerial

Pension Plan and the Comprehensive Protection Plan.

Contribution Base

The MPP and CPP Contribution Base shall be the Active Participant's Plan Compensation for a Plan Year not to exceed the Denominational Average Compensation.

(MPP Section 2.1 (e) and CPP Section 2.1 (e)).

Contribution Rate

The MPP Church Contribution Rate shall be 12% of the Contribution Base of each Active Participant and the CPP Church Contribution rate shall be 4.4% of the Contribution Base of each Active Partici-

pant. (MPP Section 4.1 (a) and CPP Section 4.1 (a)).

Contribution Method

The Church Contribution shall be made monthly to the Plan by the Annual Conference in accordance with the Plan Document, Such MPP and CPP Church Contributions shall be transferred monthly from the Deposit Account of the Annual Conference by the General Board of Pensions to each Active Participant's account and the Protection Benefit Fund, respectively. The Annual Conference shall maintain an amount in its Deposit Account sufficient to provide for the monthly transfer of the Church Contributions on behalf of its Active Participants. In the event the Deposit Account is overdrawn, an interest charge shall be made by the General Board of Pensions. Such charge shall be made at the monthly rate of interest credited to the Diversified Fund (6 1/2% per annum) or the current monthly rate of interest credited to the STIRA investment program, whichever is greater. (MPP Section 4.1(a) and 4.2(g), and CPP Section 4.1(b) and 4.2(h)).

Past Service **Pension Rate**

On January 1, 1990, the ministerial Pension Rate shall be \$250, and the local pastor's Pension Rate shall be \$250. (Disciplinary Para-

graphs 1606.2b and 1606.7 and Supplement One (f)).

In accordance with paragraph (e) (5) of Supplement One, the Surviving Spouse Benefit shall be 70% of the Participant's Formula Benefit.

Special Arrangements

The Little Rock Annual Conference Board of Pensions is hereby authorized, at its discretion, to arrange with the General Board of Pensions for active participation in the MPP and/or CPP by persons who are eligible under special rules but not automatically included as Active Participants. (MPP and CPP Sections 3.2).

Liability and **Deposits**

In accordance with paragraph (f) of Supplement One, the unfunded liability as of January 1, 1990 has been actuarially projected to be \$2,420,363. Past service funding deposits are required to fund this unfunded liability, and shall be in the amounts for the periods as shown below:

> Amount \$272,800.00

Period of Deposits 20 Years

These annual deposits shall be made at the end of each calendar year as required by the General Board of Pensions. The past service deposits shall be transferred from the Little Rock Conference Deposit Account to the Past Service Funding Account on December 31. If the annual cash flow requirement, as determined by the General Board of Pensions, exceeds the combined past service funding deposit amounts, then the cash flow requirement shall become the required past service funding deposit. (MPP Supplement One (f)).

I. FOCUS ON FAITH DEVELOPMENT

Bimonthly the Arkansas United Methodist and Conference mailings will include a page to be duplicated and placed in the hands of each child by the local churches. Specifically for children, parents, grandparents and care givers of children, it will include guides for family worship, steps in nurturing a child's faith, and helps for effective parenting.

II. CONFERENCE FOR MINISTRIES WITH CHILDREN

A fall conference-wide day event will sharpen our visions and build our skills for working with ALL children — those in our homes, congregations, and those in our communities. A noted speaker in United Methodist Children ministries and conference leaders will address the needs of pastors, local church coordinators and teachers, parents and professional care givers.

III. DISTRICT CHILDREN'S FAIR

An invitation will be given to local churches to create a project giving children an opportunity to share their faith through music, art, drama, or other medium. These projects will be shared at District Children's Fairs scheduled for Spring of 1990. Hands-on learning opportunities for parents, teachers and children will also be available at the event.

Note: Limited scholarships will be offered to participants in Focus '89. This is a United Methodist Conference on Ministries with Children in Nashville, Tennessee, July 31-August 4.

Board Of Education

The vision of the Little Rock Conference Board of Education is effective Christian education for all people as perhaps the most important activity, opportunity and challenge in our society, which will unite our people as Christians and bring us all to a knowledge of and right relationship with each other and with our God. Toward that end the Board covenants to strive continuously toward that perfection in Christian education using a broad-based, ongoing, and ever-expanding program of action to meet that goal.

During recent years the Board has carried out a conference on in-depth study of the Bible through study seminars scattered over the conference, climaxed by a series "From Information to Transformation." With this work as our foundation and taking a cue from the vision statement that effective Christian education is perhaps the most important challenge to meet the needs of society today, the Board adopted the following areas for goal development.

- 1. To increase the effectiveness of Christian education in local congregations the Board will develop a comprehensive plan of teacher development and training.
 - A. The plan goal is to include at least one event in each district each year that focuses on teacher **development**. (Development is concerned with the longer term process of helping teachers gain increased knowledge of the Bible and the faith and continuing personal spiritual growth.)
 - B. The plan goal is to include the holding of at least one event in each district each year with focus on teacher training. (Training is concerned with lesson planning, teaching skills and methods, discipline, etc.)
 - C. Consider holding at least one lab school each year. Small membership church lab schools will be emphasized.
- Provide support and training for the unique role of clergy and professional Christian educators in Christian education in the local congregation by holding at least one conference event for them.
- 3. To increase the effective use of approved United Methodist curriculum the Board will hold cluster training events each year.

In addition, local church consultants and curriculum resources will be provided in congregations who want to explore using United Methodist curriculum. Persons will be encouraged to call Curric-U-Phone (1-800-251-8591) for information about curriculum.

- 4. To reach more persons so that they will become more faithful disciples the Board will provide a training event on each district to help local congregations reach for the unchurched, baby boomers, etc., by starting new classes or groups in new settings.
- 5. Emphasize mission education in training events, and through resources to help persons know about and be involved in mission. Local congregations will be made aware of mission study resources for all ages, the Children's Fund for Christian Mission, the Youth Service Fund and the funds of the General Board of Global Ministries.
- 6. In order for human sexuality education to become an integral and ongoing part of the Christian education program of local congregations at least one training event per year will be provided for leaders of children, youth, and adults.
- 7. Provide resources to assist local congregations in carrying out the responsibility of providing confirmation training (children, youth, and adults), through conference, district, or cluster training events.
- 8. Consult and cooperate with other groups in the Annual Conference who have responsibility for church extension to interpret, encourage and seek resources for starting new Sunday Schools.
- 9. Encourage the observance of Christian Education Week and Christian Education Sunday, which shall be observed on the third Sunday in September and shall be the first day of the full week for observing Christian Education Week.

As broad and ambitious as this program may appear, it is important to recognize it as a four to five year program, and the Board is resolved to develop and implement strategies to achieve the goals through the use of task forces and committees and by keeping the strategies focused around single purposes. Quality of events and/or resources will be top priority. Insofar as feasible, events will be held close to congregations, especially for small membership congregations. The Conference Coordinating Committee on Camping, as a part of the Christian Education Program at Camp Tanako, shall present a lesson series on Christian Vocations and the call to Christian Ministries. This curriculum shall be presented before the end of the 1991 camping season, be evaluated and revised as needed, and be made a regular feature of the camping program.

The Conference Program priority is currently in the midst of a great program of Ministry with Youth. For 1989-90 the priority is "The Year of the Child." The Board of Education recommends beginning 1990-91 the conference priority be "Reach Out," with emphasis on outreach and ministry with the unchurched, with major emphasis on reaching for the baby boomers.

Board Of Higher Education And Campus Ministry I. WESLEY FOUNDATION CONSULTATION

The 1988 session of the Little Rock Annual Conference approved the proposal of the Conference Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry to evaluate the structure, program and effectiveness of the Wesley Foundation Campus Ministries within the Conference and the ecumenical United Campus Ministry at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff. In order to fulfill the intention of the Annual Conference, the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry (herein referred to as BHECM) retained Donald S. Manes, AICP, Planning and Management Consultant with offices in Little Rock, to prepare the study and to report his findings through written recommendations. The consultant's evaluation evolved through examining the activities and programs being undertaken in the various Wesley Foundation student centers, perceiving the revealed roles and ministries of the directors, considering the work and structure of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry, investigating the budgeting process and the current system of financial and program accountability, and inquiring about the assistance being offered on the staff level by the Conference Council on Ministries and the National Division of

The charge to the consultant, as spread in the Conference journal, was to study all aspects and installations of campus ministry in the Conference with the idea of providing recommendations to the next Annual Conference as to the need, form, staffing and purpose of each campus ministry. The study's emphasis thus resolved was upon each campus ministry, individually, recognizing that there is no single form or format that should be, or even could be, applied to each campus ministry. In declaring that, 'The effect of this proposal would be to inform ourselves as to the best strategies for campus ministry,' BHECM offered an eight-point rationale that was printed in the 1988 Conference journal for undertaking the study whose results are summarized herein.

A. UNIVERSITY OF ARKANSAS AT PINE BLUFF AS A SPECIAL MINISTRY

Higher Education and Campus Ministry.

The 1988 session of the Annual Conference approved the report of the Study Committee on UAPB Wesley Foundation, expressing the will of the Annual Conference that the campus ministry at UAPB be designated as a Wesley Foundation; the UAPB Wesley Foundation receive equal funding as other campus ministries supported by the Little Rock Conference; and that the Annual Conference take steps to insure that additional funding to the UAPB ministry not adversely affect the funding at the present Wesley Foundations in the Conference. BHECM has adopted a resolution authorizing the UAPB campus ministry and seeking funding for the establishment thereof as a complete Wesley Foundation in 1990.

The Consultant, on the other hand, believes that the ministry at UAPB might become a special ministry, not following traditional Wesley Foundation lines, but rather fashioned on the strength of the highly ecumenical campus ministry the Reverend C. E. McAdoo undertook at UAPB until his recent appointment to the Wesley Chapel United Methodist Church in Little Rock. The United Campus Ministry at UAPB is only partially funded by the United Methodist Church, namely \$5,745 from the 1988 Annual Conference as a portion of the overall annual budget of approximately \$16,000. Other churches provide the majority of the budget, the principal being Presbyterian Church, USA; Episcopal; African Methodist Episcopal; Christian Church (Disciples of Christ); and African Methodist Episcopal Zion. The 13 member board of directors of United Campus Ministry — UAPB, includes representation from each of these sponsoring churches, but only two of whom are representatives from the United Methodist Church namely Dr. John Lindsay and Reverend John Walker.

The Consultant believes that with the increased infusion of United Methodist monies, the ecumenically based board of directors should be expanded to increase representation from the United Methodist Church, while retaining its ecumenical character. While the UAPB campus ministry should be a Wesley Foundation with all of the Church's tradition of commitment to ministry in higher education and expected

performance in light of the missional goals of the General Church, it should retain its ecumenical identity in order to build upon the strong foundation and cooperative arrangement already established at UAPB.

The mission of the campus director, who initially will also pastor the St. James United Methodist Church in Pine Bluff, should be viewed not as a chaplaincy but rather as a missionary or evangelistic ministry.

Accordingly, the Consultant has recommended to BHECM that the new campus minister be given a significant increase in budget over prior years, that funding be increased annually as the director demonstrates success in expanding the quality of campus ministry and the penetration of the United Methodist Church at UAPB and in the larger black community of Pine Bluff, that the number of United Methodists on the United Campus Ministry Board of Directors be increased as the Church's share of the budget increases but never to become a majority of the board until such time as the United Methodist Church contributes the majority of funds to the annual budget, and that the UAPB campus minister's appointment become a full-time Wesley Foundation (without pastoring a local church) within four years.

As indicated, these are the Consultant's recommendations. BHECM does not revise or alter its earlier resolution as described above.

B. BHECM DEVELOPMENT OF POLICY STATEMENTS

Continuing with the Consultant's recommendations, the Conference Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry should develop two policy statements that would be designed to further the missional goals of the General Church. These two statements are:

- Statement of Mission that is a statement of purpose and policies concerning the work and programs of campus ministries, emphasizing objectives to be accomplished.
- 2. Statement of qualifications for persons to be appointed Wesley Foundation Directors, focusing on education, experience and other pertinent requirements.

The statement of required qualifications is to be used by the Bishop and the Cabinet in making future Wesley Foundation appointments.

C. DIRECTORS BECOME FULL-TIME APPOINTMENTS

The missional work of the Wesley Foundations is serious business and requires the full-time devotion of energies and mental commitment from the campus minister. Freeing the directors from local church pastoral responsibilities would permit them to heighten the visibility of and increase the awareness of the Wesley Foundation through their making presentations in the churches of the Districts and to the many church-based groups having a natural interest in young persons. Thus, the Wesley Foundation directorships should be made full-time appointments.

Recognizing that the cost to the Conference of converting to full-time directorships will be substantial, it is proposed that the following target dates be established for the conversion to full-time directorships: Henderson State University within two years, University of Arkansas at Little Rock within three years, University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff within four years, University of Arkansas at Monticello within five years, and Southern Arkansas University at Magnolia within six years. Within six years after the 1989 Annual Conference, the five Wesley Foundations should be operating with full-time directors. The staged conversion to full-time directorships would allow the Annual Conference, the six Districts and the local Wesley Foundation Boards of Directors a sufficient time schedule to make an orderly adjustment to higher spending levels.

D. ACCOUNTABILITY AND RESPONSIVENESS TO MISSION

In recognizing that increased accountability would tend to encourage the development of new and innovative programs and activities among the campus ministers, there are several proposed revisions in the structure and organization of participating entities and in communications between staff, BHECM, the District Superintendents and the Wesley Foundation Directors.

One, while the roles of CCOM and BHECM are clearly described in the Discipline, the District Superintendents should become more closely involved in campus ministry. They have an innate responsibility for the witness and worship of the church; and the local campus minister needs to be responsive to the District Superintendent's pastoral guidance.

Two, the director should submit periodic written reports to CCOM staff and BHECM with copies to the designated District Superintendent(s). These reports would describe their activities and programs, relate changes in the student population, summarize presentations and interpretive meetings with local churches, identify new funding sources, assess budget performance and provide other basic information on

the work and witness of the Wesley Foundation.

Additionally, the five District Superintendents who have campus ministries within their District should meet quarterly with their respective Wesley Foundation Directors to discuss the ministries, review the written reports to be submitted as described above, review budget requests and discuss expenses, and permit the District Superintendent to have more hands-on opportunity for guiding campus ministries. District Superintendents sit on each of the Wesley Foundation Boards, (most of which meet only once or sometimes twice a year), but this one-on-one meeting between the District Superintendent and the Wesley Foundation Director would serve to elevate the sense of accountability and responsiveness to mission.

Finally, the Wesley Foundation Directors should meet as a group on a quarterly basis to share their experiences, discuss their programs, seek guidance and support, and develop a unity of expression as to the witness of the Church on the university campuses in the Little Rock Conference.

E. COHERENT GOVERNANCE

The Consultant's recommendations are directed toward both BHECM and the local Wesley Foundation Boards of Directors.

The BHECM should meet at least six times a year in response to the expansion of its activities instead of the present schedule of two or three meetings a year. Three committees should be formed to provide specialization and closer scrutiny of the goals and objectives of BHECM, namely Finance, Evaluation and Program/Policy. The Evaluation Committee should review and evaluate the Directors' performance on an annual basis.

Given the proposed expansion of the workload of BHECM, it is recommended that its membership be expanded to twelve voting members in the near future, and increased to fourteen by 1992. Instead of continuing the election of at-large members at the Annual Conference, it is felt that the election of voting members of the board at district level would enhance the support of Wesley Foundations among local churches and within each District's governance. After removing the current prohibition in the structure against a local Wesley Foundation board member serving on BHECM, improved allegiance to campus ministry should be achieved through the election of voting members to BHECM as follows:

1. Chairperson elected by the Annual Conference for a quadrennial term (current

practice retained).

2. One representative from each of the six Districts in the Conference, nominated by the District Committee on Nominations and ratified by the Annual Conference. Serving one year terms, the District members may serve up to four successive

3. The Chairperson of each Wesley Foundation Board of Directors elected locally and ratified by the Annual Conference, each of these to serve two year terms on

BHECM and as the local chairperson.

4. By 1992, add two students from Wesley Foundations, one candidate being nominated by each Wesley Foundation Director to comprise five candidates and the two student representatives on the Board being elected in the fall by the other voting members of the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry. The two elected students would serve one year terms.

Under this arrangement, BHECM would ultimately have 14 voting members. The current structure of having nine ex-officio members is worthy of retention, as it involves the five Wesley Foundation Directors, one District Superintendent representing the Cabinet, one CCOM Staff, and the Presidents (or appointed representatives of same) of Hendrix College and Philander Smith College.

It is further recommended that BHECM elect the local Wesley Foundation Boards of Directors from rosters provided by local nominating committees. Imbuing local Wesley Foundation Board Members with a sense of obligation to a higher authority should serve to intensify their interest in and commitment to the work of their respec-

tive campus ministries.

The size and composition of each Wesley Foundation Board of Directors should be determined locally and in light of the style of campus ministry that will be under their stewardship. Basic principles which should be observed would restructure Wesley Foundation Boards to reduce the number of clergy, be certain that students are included, and strive to appoint a selected portion of board members because of their proven fund-raising capabilities and high visibility in their community, as well as in the District. The chairpersons should serve two year terms in order to provide stability and continuity among members on the revamped BHECM and to provide them ample time to be effective Wesley Foundation Chairpersons. Wesley Foundation Boards of Directors should have four committees: Executive, Policy/Program, Finance and Personnel. The Executive Committee should meet monthly, and the other three should meet quarterly. One of the responsibilities of the Personnel Committee would be to evaluate the program performance of the Campus Minister on an annual basis. The Finance Committee would be the principle fund-raising body, the supporter of program (not incremental) budgets and the watch-dog over expenses. The Policy/Program Committee would be responsible for oversight of the policies and objectives of the campus ministry. The District Superintendent should be not only on the Wesley Foundation Board of Directors but also on its Executive Committee.

F. TOWARD REALISTIC AND SECURE FUNDING

The budget process should be revised to make it a programmatic budget rather than one involving automatic increases that are keyed to a cost-of-living index. Often times referred to as zero-base budgeting, each year is to be viewed as a new enterprise in which the budget is constructed from the ground up. This approach would make budgeting better related to the real financial needs of Wesley Foundations instead of tailoring the ministry to fit the available budget.

Inasmuch as the campus ministries would convert to full-time directorships over a staggered schedule, it is recognized and should be readily accepted that Wesley Foundations of the future will have unequal annual funding support from the Annual Conference. The Conference's interval increases in funding would be tied to the schedule of converting specific Wesley Foundations to full-time appointments. Equal funding

would return after the fifth campus ministry is converted.

In order to share the financial burden with the annual conference and to strengthen locally based loyalties, each Wesley Foundation Board of Directors should have as a goal the raising of a significant portion of the annual operating budget of the campus ministry. It is possible, and even desirable that the Districts will include increased spending in their respective budgets for the support of campus ministries in the Little Rock Conference.

Furthermore, it is recommended that a special fund drive be instituted by the Little Rock Conference within two years to establish an endowment fund for the perpetual maintenance and upkeep of the physical plant of Wesley Foundation, namely student centers and parsonages. Fund raising would be outside the church apportionment system, and a period of three years should be allowed to raise a sufficient endowment to provide an income from investments adequate to maintain the physical facilities. An annual expenditure of a range of 2.5% to 4.0% of the estimated value of the physical

facilities should be the target. Subject to the determination of a task force to be appointed by the Bishop or the annual conference to determine the amount of corpus required, the Consultant has estimated that an endowment fund of \$550,000 would be required. Once established, the endowment fund would be administered by BHECM.

Until investment income from the endowment becomes available to the extent needed for annual upkeep and maintenance, it is recommended that successive Annual Conferences include a line item in the Wesley Foundation budget of approximately \$20,000 for annual maintenance and upkeep of the parsonages and student centers. This line item amount would decrease incrementally as endowment fund income increases. These funds would be administered by BHECM.

Recognizing the problems from overdue maintenance on parsonages and student centers, the Annual Conference is requested to approve line item expenditures for capital improvements and maintenance on individual Wesley Foundations as presented below.

G. HEIGHTENED VISIBILITY

Making Wesley Foundation directors full-time appointments without local church pastoral responsibilities would serve to increase the frequency of their presentations to local churches. While interpretation should be the primary emphasis, the need for increased funding of campus ministry operations should be made very plain to local churches and church-related groups. There should be ample publicity in advance of the fund-raising drive to establish an endowment fund. BHECM has voted to ask the Annual Conference to designate the second Sunday in October as Wesley Foundation Day. This would be a day on which information is distributed through local churches to church members throughout the Little Rock Conference. This effort would not include a request for contributions or funds but would rather spread the message about Wesley Foundation. The pamphlet to be prepared for October 1990 could be expanded and revised for 1991 distribution at which time the fund-raising appeal should be initiated. The "Focus on Wesley Foundation" campaign should be placed under the direction of a skilled professional in the field of advertising and public relations.

These are the recommendations on improved strategies for campus ministries that evolved through the consultation by Donald S. Manes, CCOM Staff, the campus ministers, and the Board on Higher Education and Campus Ministry.

H. REQUESTED FUNDING FOR HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

Board Of Higher Education And Campus Ministry

The Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry is charged with presenting the financial needs for support of all ministries related to higher education. That responsibility includes Schools, Colleges, Seminaries, Campus Ministries, and Wesley Foundations related to the Little Rock Annual Conference. Therefore, we present the following recommendations to the Council on Finance and Administration and to the Annual Conference.

- 1. That \$187,424 for Hendrix College be apportioned to the Churches for 1990.
- That \$176,936 for four Wesley Foundations be apportioned to the churches for 1990. This supports Wesley Foundations at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock, the University of Arkansas at Monticello, Henderson State University, and Southern Arkansas University.
- 3. That \$16,800 for the Wesley Foundation at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff be apportioned to the churches for 1990.
- 4. That \$50,000 be apportioned to the Churches for support of Philander Smith College for 1990.
- 5. That full apportionment as requested for the Black College Fund (United Methodist related colleges) be apportioned to the Churches for 1990.
- That full apportionment as requested for the Ministerial Education Fund be apportioned to the Churches for 1990.
- 7. That \$20,000 for annual maintenance and upkeep of parsonages and student cen-

ters at Wesley Foundations to be administered by the Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry be apportioned to the churches for 1990.

Southern Methodist University 1989 Report

This has been an important year of self-study, transition, and progress in the life of the University. The academic mission of SMU is being refined and clarified through a series of internal committees and the work of a Task Force on Academic Priorities. A Task Force on Financial Feasibility and one on Diversity will also report this Spring. Based upon these deliberations, I shall make recommendations to the faculty and ultimately to the Board of Trustees this Fall. I can assure you that our mission, and my vision, will be in tandem with our fiscal ability to make our plan a reality. SMU is a strong university that must continue to do well what it can do best, namely, teach undergraduate students through a broad-based program of education in a personalized living and learning environment. At the same time, we must continue the outstanding tradition of the Perkins School of Theology and the School of Law, as well as a limited number of graduate programs.

The Board of Trustees, elected in July 1988, has functioned superbly. The Board has proved to be a hard working, hands-on governing body. Its committee structure provides members with a broad understanding of policies and procedures, the opportunity for meaningful discussion, and with those, a real sense of responsibility for and to the institution. As chairperson of the Board, Ray Hunt continues to provide outstanding service

and leadership.

Several initiatives have been set in motion this year that should, over the next few years, strengthen our important United Methodist ties. For example, we have increased our involvement with TUMCA by participating in its new brochure, as well as hosting a "Day at SMU" for chairpersons of the Boards of Higher Education and Ministry. We have produced for the first time at SMU a poster with tear-off forms requesting more information, which has been sent to all episcopal appointments in the South Central Jurisdiction. SMU will be the host institution for the 1990 Jurisdictional Youth Rally, in which some 2,000 United Methodist young people from throughout the Jurisdiction will be on the SMU campus July 13-19, 1990.

The Task Force on Church Relatedness, which I appointed in the fall of 1988, has made its report, which reinforces the importance of SMU's United Methodist connec-

tions and reaffirms the positive steps we are taking.

I would be remiss if I did not talk about athletics. I have been very pleased at the direction in which Athletics Director Doug Single is moving our overall program. In particular, I believe we are on the right track in renewing our football program with integrity and in a manner that is consistent with the mission of the University.

After almost two years as SMU's president, I am pleased to report that we continue to make progress in meeting our current challenges, and we pursue with increased vitality our quest toward excellence as an outstanding United Methodist institution of higher

learning.

Perkins School Of Theology

Concern over the effect on seminary education of the increasing number of "second career" students was raised during the year with the observation that this population now represents 65% of enrollments. This involves more part-time students who choose courses for convenience as much as content. Previous life experiences are difficult to credit for these persons. Broader interpretations by the church of study requirements for ministerial qualification burdens seminaries with responding to these factors with integ-

rity, while aiding the church in meeting increasing demands to train persons adequatel for ministry.

Student enrollment this year maintained a balance with last year, with 271 in the Master of Divinity degree program and distribution among other degrees totalling 417 for the fall, with a small rise to 423 in the spring. Women constitute 38% of the students in all programs and the combination of Asian Americans, African American, Hispanic students reaching a total of 63, with 31 internationals. The ages of students showed the largest segment in ages 25-34, though a significant number are in the 40-49 age range.

Renewal of a sort other than theological has been the norm this year as the Perkin Chapel and the Bridwell Library have undergone redecoration and major renovation. The Chapel received its regular face-lift, with general painting and clean-up accommodate.

plished during December and January.

The Bridwell Library has functioned "in exile" for almost the whole year, while tota renovation of the building has been accomplished. Circulating collections were shifted to a dormitory basement, while staff dispersed to other office locations. With the reopening in March, services of the library for students and researchers will be vastly improved Carefully designed reading rooms, private study carrels, conservation facilities, galleries and archival storage will constitute one of the foremost research and knowledge facilities in this part of the world.

Emphasis on the Ministerial Education Fund remains crucial as the annual base of lo cal church support for ministerial studies in the seminary. The Jurisdictional "Fair Share Goal" campaign continues for Perkins as we seek to improve the endowment that is es sential to the perpetuity of support for student financial assistance, the Intern program and other important facets of education for ministers in training. Several significant es tate gifts were gratefully received, including \$65,000 for the Fern Woodhull-Oden Me morial Scholarship Fund, \$500,000 for a lectureship on the arts as interpreters o religious faiths and practices, and \$160,000 for the Faculty Development Program fund ed jointly by the Lilly Endowment. A new program, Partners With Perkins, seeks specia gifts with an emphasis on International students and general scholarship support from persons able and interested in this type of investment.

New faculty this year include Dr. Thomas William Spann and the Rev. Marilyn Spurrell Atkins in the Intern Program; Dr. Yap Kim Hao of Malaysia and Singapore has beer Visiting Professor of World Christianity. Bishop James S. Thomas retired from the East Ohio Conference and came as Distinguished Visiting Professor of Practical Theology Bishop John Wesley Hardt became Bishop in Residence upon retirement from the Oklahoma Conference. Dr. Ruth Tiffany Barnhouse retires this year. We were saddened by the death of Bishop W. McFerrin Store, who had served eight years as Bishop in Residence, following retirement from the episcopacy.

Search committees for five faculty positions that are coming open due to retirements began early in 1989, driven by inspiring visions that Perkins may equip itself and its students to meet the challenges of ministry in the 21st Century.

Saint Paul School Of Theology

Saint Paul School of Theology serves the Little Rock Annual Conference by preparing persons for effective leadership in the church.

Throughout our first thirty years of service our focus has been squarely on the local church. In a survey of laity and clergy, when asked what word or phrase first came to their minds when they heard the name of Saint Paul School of Theology, the overwhelming response was "local church." That has been our past; it is also our future.

The effectiveness of Saint Paul and your other seminaries cannot be separated from the commitment and capabilities of those in the church who respond to God's call to ministry. Seminaries and churches together have the responsibility of consistently lifting before persons the challenge to respond to God's invitation to serve. The challenges fac-

ing the church in the years ahead demand the very best leadership possible. This will be particularly true in the United Methodist Church in the coming decade when the number of retirements of pastors will increase dramatically over the past decade.

We at Saint Paul thank you for your generous support of theological education at Saint Paul and the other United Methodist seminaries. The thirteen United Methodist seminaries comprise perhaps the finest family of denominational seminaries in the United States. You can be proud of all thirteen. We work together very well and want to make it possible for every United Methodist student to be able to attend a United Methodist seminary.

In our thirtieth academic year, many significant events occurred. Dr. Eleanor Scott Meyers came to Saint Paul from Union Theological Seminary in New York City as our third Academic Dean. Harold C. Washington joined our faculty in Old Testament. Two faculty members announced their retirements, Dr. Carl Bangs, Professor of Historical Theology, and Dr. Gilbert Ferrell, Associate Professor of Church Administration.

The William K. McElvaney Chair in Preaching was established in September with Dr. Eugene L. Lowry named as the first occupant. A major curriculum revision took place. It keeps the integrated, interdisciplinary approach to theological education but is much more flexible, making it easier for students who find it necessary to go part-time. Last year we did a survey of 10,000 lay persons and 300 clergy leaders of the church asking what they felt to be most important in the preparation of pastors and leaders. The survey has been extremely helpful in focusing areas of curricular need and priority.

We appreciate your support and seek your involvement. We at Saint Paul can do our work well only when we stay in close and ongoing dialogue and relationship with those of you in the churches who brought us into being, who have supported us through the years, and for whom we are preparing a new generation of leaders in the Wesleyan tradition.

Hendrix College

It is a privilege for Hendrix College to report to the United Methodist Church of Arkansas, for it was that church which gave birth to the college a little more than 100 years ago. The church has faithfully continued its support of the college across the years. Hendrix has not forgotten her origins.

It is deep in the nature of Hendrix to be concerned about the spiritual goodness, character, human thriving, and the good life.

The college holds fast to the church's expectation that it strive to be the best educational institution possible. In every way Hendrix seeks to prepare students with rigorous academic studies, to develop written and oral communication skills, and to provide opportunities for culturally relevant liberal education within the context of the Judeo-Christian heritage.

The Hendrix report to the conferences last year ended with a commitment to look for ways to strengthen the college's relationship to the church and "to demonstrate our appreciation for the support the church has given Hendrix." We have taken several steps.

Hendrix Fellowship Teams. This year the college has reinstituted a program known as Fellowship Teams. Groups of four to six students and a staff advisor go (on invitation) into local United Methodist Churches where team members teach a class of young people, serve as liturgists in worship, give a children's sermon, sing a solo, preach, direct recreation, give 2-minute talks on Hendrix, show videos on Hendrix, and lead discussion groups. Hendrix wants the impact of this program to be a genuine "thank you" to the church and a presentation of the college to the local church. The program is also very meaningful to our students. We have made six visits and will do three more spring term. The teams have had three times as many invitations from churches as they have been able to fill.

Preaching Workshop. There will be a pastor's preaching workshop at Hendrix October

12-14, 1989. All the plans have not yet been completed, but we believe it will be a helpful session.

Recognition Of Church Leaders. Hendrix continues a program established as part of her centennial celebration, that annually recognizes selected church leaders who have distinguished themselves in the fields of Christian Education and Social Awareness. These awards were established in memory of Mary and Ira Brumley (Education) and Ethel K. Millar (Social Awareness).

Religious Studies. Year after year the college makes its facilities available for church functions. Under the auspices of the Marshall T. Steel Center for the Study of Religion and Philosophy, Hendrix continues to bring to campus programs designed to enrich the lives of United Methodist laity and clergy. The Hendrix library houses a growing historical center for Arkansas Methodism. Faculty and staff members are available to give lectures, preach, and teach Sunday School in local churches. Students interested in the professional ministry are organized and have a staff counselor. They meet regularly to give each other support and to study matters of current interest.

State Of The College. The \$16.8 million Campaign for Hendrix will draw to a close in just a few months. On March 20, 1989, the college had collected \$14.9 million in cash and pledges. Money is also being raised to refurbish Raney Hall, a women's residence hall. Part of the campaign's success results from the support of United Methodists who went considerably beyond their goal (\$425,000) of providing seating for Staples Auditorium. Also, for the first time in history the churches of Arkansas Methodism contributed more than \$300,000 to the annual fund in 1988 which is also part of the campaign.

Enrollment. Hendrix began the 1988-89 school year with 1,029 students, 46 percent men and 54 percent women. Methodists make up 35 percent of the enrollment. There are 5 percent black students and 1 percent international. Eighty-five percent live in college housing, and 87 percent of the students are from Arkansas.

Financial Assistance. Sixty-nine percent of all students receive some form of financial aid. Dependents of United Methodist ministers and ministerial students receive an automatic one-half tuition scholarship from the college. Dependents of ministers of other denominations also receive special scholarship assistance. Grants of this nature total \$140,000 for 1988-89.

Financial Aid. The college believes financial conditions should not be the deciding factor on whether a student chooses Hendrix. The college works with students and families to develop a financial aid package designed to meet the demonstrated need of that student.

Miscellaneous Statistics. There are 67 full-time equivalent faculty members at Hendrix. Seventy-seven percent hold doctorates and 92 percent have appropriate terminal degrees. Sixty-four percent are tenured. The faculty-student ratio is 15 to 1, and the average class during the winter term was 19.

The market value of the college's endowment fund was about \$43 million on July 31, 1988. The total operating budget of the college in 1988-89 is \$12.225 million. The college continues to have a strong fiscal history and anticipates balancing its budget for the 32nd consecutive year on July 31, 1989.

Hendrix Highlights. The college was named in THE FISKE GUIDE TO COLLEGES as "something this side of remarkable . . ." It was listed in PETERSON'S GUIDE TO COMPETITIVE COLLEGES and was recognized in GOOD HOUSEKEEPING magazine's October, 1988, issue as one of the 50 best educational values in the nation. Hendrix students have received Watson Fellows for five consecutive years. The college again has been listed in THE BEST BUYS IN COLLEGE EDUCATION. It was recognized in CHANGING TIMES magazine as one of the 50 best buys in education and has been described by North Central Association as one of the outstanding, small liberal arts colleges in the country.

Our commitment to the church is this: Hendrix will continue to strive to equip her graduates for service in God's creation.

Philander Smith College Little Rock, Arkansas

Philander Smith College made significant improvements in its endeavors during the past year under the capable leadership of Dr. Myer L. Titus, President, who completed his first year as CEO February 1, 1989.

Student headcount enrollment is up 8% for the 1988 Fall Term over the 1987 Fall Term — 594 and 550 students respectively. The physical environment of the campus has been improved. Improvements include renovations in the Administration Building, the College Cafeteria and Snack Bar. Campus lighting has been improved and campus security has been strengthened.

Undergirded by the ideals of Christianity in the great tradition of The United Methodist Church, the faculty continues to maintain excellence in teaching, learning and research. With regard to research, in 1989 a faculty member visited South Africa on grant funds pursuant to the scientific research he conducts at the College designed to impact on the economic and social welfare of Third World people.

For the first time in recent years, Philander Smith College was represented at all United Methodist Annual Conferences assigned to it to visit in 1988 in interest of the Black College Fund (BCF) and the College. President Titus visited Annual Conferences in Arkansas, Missouri, and Kansas.

The College's alumni is showing increased interest in supporting their Alma Mater. During its Annual Convention in 1988, the National Alumni Association awarded the College \$25,000. The Association also pledged to buy the College a heavy duty commercial bus. During the President's Inauguration in October, 1988, an alumnus did a fundraiser which netted the College approximately \$11,000.

The Commission on Black Colleges, Nashville, Tennessee, approved the College for continued funding from the Black College Fund after the Commission's on-site visit to the campus November, 1988. The North Central Association of Colleges and Schools approved the College's annual report showing its progress on student recruitment, fiscal management, fund-raising and the endowment.

Sound fiscal management continues to be practiced at the College. It finished the fiscal year, 1987-88, in the black; and its annual audit by professionals was received with only minor exceptions. Significant improvements were made in the insurance benefits to college personnel. The faculty received a 15% increase in salary and the staff received 8%.

Fund-raising continues to be a high priority, inasmuch as additional financial support to the College is critical. Proposals amounting to \$392,388 have been submitted to various agencies. The College raised \$54,148 in cash and pledges during the 1988 United Negro College Fund (UNCF) campaign and the UNCF Telethon aired on television December, 1988. Funds from a proposal submitted to Federal, State, and other agencies have been received in the amount of \$1,667,193 to support various education programs.

The intercollegiate basketball teams (Men and Women) and the Collegiate Choir continue to play important roles in the positive morale of our students as well as serve as ambassadors for the College.

The College is optimistic about its future as a viable United Methodist institution of higher education.

We are especially grateful to these churches for their commitment to YSF.

One of the highlights of our year was participation by 62 youth and adults in Youth '88 in Macomb, Illinois last August. Funds from Warren First UMC and Grand Avenue UMC, Hot Springs, along with some conference monies helped sponsor three delegate from Sierra Leone, West Africa and one from West Germany. This international flavo to our caravan was an educational and spirit-filled experience that will always be remem bered. Jason Phillips, Roderick Thompson and Tara Everitt are delegates from our An nual Conference selected to participated in a South Central Jurisdictional sponsored "Mission of Peace" to the Soviet Union and Poland in July.

The CCYM appreciates the continued support of the conference.

Lydia Patterson Institute

The year 1988 has been an exciting one for the Administration, Faculty, Staff and Stu-

dent Body at Lydia Patterson Institute.

This year marked our 75th Anniversary, and was highlighted by numerous activities which included a full week of Homecoming Activities, a vigorous Diamond Jubilee Financial Campaign in which many alumni and friends participated and a highly successful Christmas Matching Fund Campaign. We have experienced an unprecedented level of renewed alumni interest in Lydia Patterson.

Our enrollment has grown by 21% and has climbed to 350. This has necessitated new classes and additional staff. The turnover rate in our teaching staff was only one this year. This fact bespeaks the commitment that our teachers have to the purposes for

which Lydia Patterson Institute has traditionally stood.

L.P.I.'s personnel are committed to an uncompromised academic standard that is demanding, and will enable our graduates to compete at the collegiate level. We undergird these high academic standards by very intentional spiritual nurture that will challenge our student body not only to acknowledge Christ in their life but to adopt His standards in their lives.

Our financial circumstances have varied, month by month, from stable to critical. We are, however, grateful for the commitment of many individuals and congregations from across the entire Jurisdiction whose regular support have enabled us to fulfill our ministry and to meet our obligations . . . at times under considerable stress. It has been nothing short of amazing to see how God has provided for all our needs, and how the connectionalism of our South Central Jurisdiction has come into play with blessed consistency.

The Mission for which God brought Lydia Patterson Institute into being in 1913 con-

tinues to be our mandate today. It is:

A. To represent the Christian faith as understood by the United Methodist Church;

B. To provide quality bi-lingual, cross-cultural, academic education;

C. To provide a center where local church leaders, clergy and lay, may receive training and experience in effecting Christian witness and ministry with persons of other ethnic and racial backgrounds; and

D. To develop leadership skills in persons interested in cross-cultural and international

positions in Christian Ministry.

I trust that even as our friends from across the Jurisdiction and around the world faithfully remember us in their daily prayer and with the financial resources, that they will plan to visit us and see the fruit of their trust in the Ministry that is being lived out each day at Lydia Patterson Institute.

Board Of Ordained Ministry Policy Statement [1988 Discipline References]

SECTION I: BOARD OPERATION

A. The Little Rock Conference Board of Ordained Ministry proposes to work within the framework of the current Discipline of The United Methodist Church.

B. The officers elected by the Board are: Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Secretary, Registrar, Associate Registrar and Candidacy Registrar. Other officers shall be appointed

by the Chairperson.

C. The Executive Committee is the elected officers, the Chairperson of the Conference Relations Committee, the Chairperson of the Probationer's Committee, the Chairperson of the Evaluation Committee, the Chairperson of Continuing Education and the Cabinet representative(s).

- D. The Board is divided into classes who may serve a maximum of eight years. The Executive Committee is responsible for reporting expired terms to the Bishop who shall consult with the Board Chairperson and the Cabinet in making nominations to the Annual Conference [Par. 733,a].
- E. The Board shall meet in the fall, at mid-year, and on call of the Chairperson.
- F. The Board shall have a representative on each District Committee on Ordained Ministry [Par. 752.1]. In consultation with the District Superintendent, the Chairperson shall appoint a member to serve on each District Committee.
- G. The Board's sources of income shall be:
 - A designated amount from the Conference Council on Administration for administrative costs.
 - Twenty-five percent of the amount remitted by local churches to the Ministerial Education Fund.
 - 3. Gifts, bequests, interest on notes, and repayment of loans.
- H. The Board's policy statement shall be reviewed annually and revised as needed by a committee appointed by the Chairperson of the Board.
- Policy statements of the Board shall be presented to the Annual Conference for approval or amendment, provided that all policies shall be in accordance with the current Discipline.

SECTION II: CANDIDACY

- A. The first step into the ordained ministry of The United Methodist Church is to consult with one's pastor concerning a personal "call to ministry." If after the consultation, one desires to explore ordained ministry, he/she shall write to the Superintendent of his/her District requesting to be enrolled in Candidacy Studies. The District Superintendent will provide an enrollment form and appoint a Supervising Pastor. A booklet, "Steps to Ordained Ministry The Little Rock Conference" will be given to each person as a guideline to be followed.
- B. The Board shall maintain a list of qualified Supervising Pastors. This list shall be mailed to District Superintendents annually. Supervising Pastors shall be selected by the Candidacy Registrar and approved by the District Superintendents and the Board.
- C. All Supervising Pastors, and those nominated to become Supervising Pastors, shall attend training events to be scheduled by the Board as needed.

SECTION III: LOCAL PASTOR'S LICENSE

A. Local Pastor's License School

- An annual School for persons seeking a Local Pastor's License shall be held jointly with the Board of Ordained Ministry of the North Arkansas Conference.
- 2. The School's Planning Committee shall be: The Chairperson, the Associate Registrar, and the Candidacy Registrar.
- In agreement with the North Arkansas Conference Board, the Little Rock Conference Board shall:
 - a. Provide one-half of the administrative costs of the School.
 - b. Provide two faculty members.
 - c. Provide the Dean for the first two years of each quadrennium.
 - d. Provide a Registrar for Little Rock Conference students.
 - e. Pay room, board and travel for the two faculty members and the Dean [when the Dean is from the Little Rock Conference], plus an honorarium of \$100 for each faculty member and Dean.
 - f. Reimburse the cost of books, room, and board for Little Rock Conference students who successfully complete the School.
- 4. An evaluation of each student shall be forwarded to the Associate Registrar, the Candidacy Registrar, and the student's District Superintendent by the Dean.
- 5. The Local Pastor's License School requirement is waived for the following:
 - a. Those who have completed at least one-half of the requirements for a seminary

- degree at an approved seminary.
- b. Those United Methodist pastors in Full Connection who transfer to the Little Rock Conference.
- Those who have completed an approved Local Pastor's License School in another Annual Conference.
- B. All persons receiving a Local Pastor's License shall have completed a psychological evaluation [See Section VI] and shall have been named to an appointment.

SECTION IV: COURSE OF STUDY AND ADVANCED COURSE OF STUDY

- A. Persons desiring to enter the five-year Course of Study shall:
 - 1. Be recommended by their District Superintendent.
 - 2. Forward to the Associate Registrar a registration form annually by March 15.
- B. Persons desiring to enter the Advanced Course of Study shall:
 - 1. Apply to Associate Registrar by March 15.
 - 2. Appear before the Board requesting permission to enroll.
 - a. Permission is based on a person's exceptional promise for ordained ministry.
 - b. Completion of the Advanced Course of Study does not imply recommendation for Probationary Membership.
 - 3. Meet all disciplinary [Par. 416] and Board requirements.
- C. Financial assistance from the Board includes:
 - Tuition, registration fees, room, and board each year for the five-year Course of Study.
 - 2. Tuition only for those enrolled in correspondence courses.
 - 3. Reimbursement of up to \$135 for each completed course in the Advanced Course of Study.

SECTION V: RELATIONSHIP TO SEMINARY STUDENTS

- A. Persons planning to enter seminary and expect to serve in the Little Rock Conference must meet with the Board prior to enrolling in a seminary.
- B. Those desiring to receive financial aid from the Board while attending seminary shall:
 - 1. Meet with the Board prior to requesting assistance.
 - 2. Complete all requirements for "Candidacy for Ministry" [Par. 404].
 - 3. Complete a baccalaureate degree from a college/university listed by the University Senate; or a competency equivalence through an external degree program at a college/university listed by the University Senate.
 - 4. Maintain a grade point average sufficient to insure graduation.
 - 5. Maintain a current mailing address with the Registrar.
- C. Financial assistance is provided through the Ministerial Education Fund.
 - 1. Financial assistance is in the form of a loan which may be repaid through service in United Methodist ministry at the rate of one year of service for each year of financial assistance received, following seminary graduation.
 - 2. The loan is secured by a legally binding note signed by those receiving financial assistance. In the event that the student does not enter United Methodist ministry, or serve long enough to repay the loan, the loan shall become due and interest from the date of issuance shall be applied. A repayment schedule shall begin within six months.
- D. The financial application process shall be:
 - 1. Request from the Registrar the application and note forms.
 - 2. Forward the completed forms to your District Superintendent for approval. The District Superintendent will return your form to the Registrar.
 - 3. Release and mail to the Registrar grade reports and/or transcripts for the previous semester.
 - 4. Applications must be received by September 1 for the fall semester; January 15 for the spring semester; and June 15 for the summer term(s).
- E. Additional guidelines for receiving financial assistance:

- 1. Assistance is available for students in the basic seminary degree program, or in completion of History, Doctrine and Polity Courses. Advanced seminary degree programs are excluded.
- 2. Full assistance is available to full-time students. Part-time students may receive aid on a pro-rata basis.
- 3. Assistance may be received for four academic years only.
- 4. Courses not completed require the student to refund to the Board the portion of assistance received for that course(s). Additional assistance may not be granted until this requirement is met.
- 5. Assistance for summer terms will be based on the number of academic hours taken in comparison with a regular semester's full-time academic load.
- F. Amount of financial assistance available shall be:
 - 1. The Board shall review annually the maximum amount of assistance available, based on a percentage of the seminary's tuition cost.
 - 2. The current assistance is up to thirty percent (30%) of the tuition cost.
 - 3. Financial assistance shall not exceed \$7,000 annually to any seminarian.
 - 4. Grants for United Methodist History, Doctrine, and Polity courses may not exceed \$250 [See Section IX; 2.b].
- G. Emergency Aid:
 - 1. Additional aid for emergency situations may be granted to seminary students when requested: for health reasons, or for those having critical personal or family needs.
 - The Executive Committee must approve the request for emergency aid in an amount not to exceed \$400. Emergency grants beyond this amount shall be considered by the Board.

SECTION VI: PSYCHOLOGICAL EVALUATIONS

- A. A one-time psychological evaluation is required for all persons to be eligible for an appointment in the Little Rock Conference.
 - 1. Those who may apply for readmission to ministerial appointment will receive an additional psychological evaluation.
 - 2. An additional psychological evaluation may be required during the ordination process if deemed advisable by the Board.
- B. The psychologist(s) shall be selected by the Board.
- C. The cost of the evaluation shall be paid by the Board except for persons seeking readmission.
- D. The evaluation procedure is as follows:
 - 1. Names of persons to be appointed with a Local Pastor's License shall be reported to the Associate Registrar by the District Superintendent.
 - 2. The Registrar shall report to the Associate Registrar those who are candidate for Probationary Membership, Associate Membership, Readmission, or Recognition of Orders from other denominations.
 - 3. The Associate Registrar shall submit the full list of those approved for an evaluation to the psychologist(s).
 - 4. The candidate will contact the psychologist to schedule an appointment.
- E. The evaluation shall include:
 - 1. A minimum of two personal interviews.
 - a) An introductory interview will be prior to the psychologist's reading of test results.
 - b) A second interview will follow the testing to interpret results.
 - 2. If additional interviews are recommended by the psychologist, the cost will be paid by the candidate.
- F. On receipt of a signed release by the candidate, the psychologist will present a written evaluation of the candidate to the Evaluation Committee of the Board. Deadlines for receiving such reports shall be October 1 and March 1.
 - 1. The Evaluation Committee's recommendation shall be communicated to the ap-

propriate District Superintendent when a candidate is seeking the Local Pastor's License. Recommendations for all other persons shall be communicated to the

2. The Board shall only have access to the full results of a person's psychological evaluation when deemed necessary by the Evaluation Committee.

3. Candidates unwilling to sign a form to release results of their evaluation will be discontinued.

G. The permission form to release a psychological evaluation reads:

I (Candidate's Name), do hereby grant permission to (Psychologist's Name), to release his/her evaluation of my test scores and interviews to members of the Board of Ordained Ministry of the Little Rock Annual Conference. I understand this evaluation may be used in the application process for admission into the Little Rock Annual Conference. I further understand that the Board of Ordained Ministry has the right to discontinue my application should I refuse to make this evaluation available to them.

I also understand this permission to release this written evaluation grants permission to the Board of Ordained Ministry to use this information in the interview process. I do also give my permission to (Psychologist's Name) to use this evaluation without reference to my name for the purpose of research only. No other use of this evaluation may be made without my express written consent.

H. Written evaluations become the joint property of the Board, held in administrative confidence by the Evaluation Committee and the psychologist(s), and of the individuals. Results of the evaluation may not be released to anyone else without the express written consent of the candidate. The evaluations shall be held in the possession of the psychologist for a period of time not to exceed three years following admission of the candidate to membership in the Conference, whether in full connection or as an associate member. After the three year period, the written evaluations may be destroyed or converted to a protected anonymous status for the purpose of research only.

I. Any candidate who is denied ordination or admission into the Annual Conference may request permission of the Board to obtain a second opinion from a psychiatric or psychological professional mutually agreeable to the candidate and the Board. Costs of a second evaluation shall be borne by the candidate. The Board will consider evaluations from a second professional as part of the total application process for the candi-

date.

SECTION VII: PROBATIONARY PROCESS

A. Candidates who have completed all educational requirements are serving a full-time appointment, and are applicants for admission into full membership and ordination, shall enter into a probationary process for a period of not less than two years.

B. This process shall be coordinated and supervised by the Probationer's Committee of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry and shall be in full accordance with the disciplinary requirements and such other requirements as deemed necessary by the Annual Conference [Pars. 413-416].

C. The purpose of the probationary process is to support each probationary members with caring groups. These groups are invited to explore with the probationer the possi-

bilities and challenges of ordained ministry and his/her growth in ministry.

D. Basic to the caring process is the establishment of a local Committee of Concern which is the official committee on the local level representing the Probationer's Committee of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry. The Committee of Concern functions in the following ways:

1. To help the probationer meet the requirements for full conference membership.

- 2. To enable the probationer to make transitions into the ministry with support and guidance.
- 3. To encourage the probationer to examine the issues of effectiveness in ministry with regard to his/her own performance.
- 4. To give opportunity for each committee member to grow in ministry and self understanding.
- E. The Committee of Concern shall be composed of the following persons:
 - 1. The probationer.
 - 2. An elder, chosen by the probationer.
 - 3. Four lay persons [two men and two women, if possible] chosen by the probationer, after consultation with the Chairperson of the Committee of Concern.
 - 4. The Chairperson [an elder appointed by the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry].
- F. The concept of the Committee of Concern presupposes a sense of covenant with one another in the group, with Christ, and with the Church. The mutual counselling relationship of the Committee is of paramount importance.
- G. In consultation with the District Superintendent, Chairperson of the Committee of Concern, the Committee and others, the probationer will develop a "Growth Covenant" stating his/her personal goals for growth as a person and pastor during the process.
- H. The Probationer's Committee will design a two-year program of growth opportunities, seminars, evaluations, retreats, and other requirements which must be completed in total by the probationer. Either the probationer or the Board may recommend the extension of the two year process if deemed advisable.
- I. By February 1st of the second year of probation, the probationer shall present to the Committee of Concern and to the Chairperson of the Probationer's Committee a written sermon, a teaching outline of a book of the Bible [the book will be assigned by the Probationer's Committee], and answers to the doctrinal questions required for Conference membership [Par. 414]. Other work may also be required.
- J. The probationer shall be required to complete a health and psychological exam in keeping with the provisions of the **Discipline** [Par. 414.4].

SECTION VIII: CONTINUING EDUCATION

- A. Pastors are encouraged to earn at least two continuing education units per year. A continuing education unit is ten hours of instruction.
- B. Following is the policy for continuing education grants from the Board:
 - 1. Full-time pastors may receive up to \$150 annually, if an equal amount is provided by the church and/or the applicant. This amount shall include only projected expenses for tuition, books, fees, room and board. This matching requirement may be waived for those who receive less than \$4,000 above Equitable Salary.
 - 2. Persons seeking a grant shall secure an application form from the Chairperson of Continuing Education. All requests relating to continuing education funds shall be directed to the Chairperson of the said committee.
 - 3. In hardship cases: a) Pastors can apply for a grant to attend Pastor's School. Such help will be granted only after other avenues for aid have been exhausted; b) Pastors may apply for an amount not to exceed \$300 annually.
 - 4. No financial aid is available for Minister's Week at any seminary.

SECTION IX: ENTRY, EXIT, READMISSION TO CONFERENCE RELATIONSHIP

A. Entry

- 1. Requests for Conference Membership and Ordination
 - a. For associate and probationary membership, and/or deacon's orders, the candidate shall make application through their District Committee on Ordained Ministry. The District Committee shall forward their recommendations to the Registrar of the Board by October 1 of each year.
 - b. For full membership, and/or elder's orders, application shall be made to the Registrar of the Board by the candidate by October 1.
 - c. All requests for Conference membership shall be on file with the Registrar at least nine months prior to the session of Annual Conference.
 - d. Psychological testing is required for all persons seeking their first relationship with the Conference, except for elders in full connection transferring into the Conference [see Section VI].
 - e. A medical examination is required for all persons seeking a first time relationship with the Conference, except full members transferring into the Conference. The examination is to be on a prescribed form. The Board will reimburse the applicant up to \$40 for the examination. Any additional expenses [i.e. special tests] will be the responsibility of the applicant.
- 2. Entry from Other Denominations
 - a. The Board shall follow specifically the provisions of Pars. 426.2 and 427.2-5 of the **Discipline**.
 - b. Ministers from other denominations seeking entry into United Methodist ministry shall:
 - ... Make no change in denominational or church affiliation prior to an interview with the Board.
 - ... Serve under appointment for not less than twenty-four months with their present credentials before any Conference relationship may be recommended by the Board.
 - ... Complete the Local Pastor's License School within twelve months of service under United Methodist appointment.
 - ... Complete courses in United Methodist history, doctrine and polity within twenty-four months of service in The United Methodist Church. An amount, not to exceed \$250, may be granted the person upon completion of these studies.
 - ... Meet at least quarterly with a Counseling Elder assigned by the Board for guidance and counsel concerning the conduct of United Methodist ministry.
- 3. Upon becoming a probationary member, one shall enter and satisfactorily complete the probationary process [See Section VII].
- 4. Upon applying for membership as a probationary, associate or full member, one shall complete all requirements of the Board, including the supplying of transcripts of educational records, a health examination, a psychological evaluation, written materials [biographical statement, sermon and responses to disciplinary questions and work], and a recommendation from one's seminary, where applicable. Instructions for all of the above are provided by the Board.

B. Exiting

- Whenever, and for whatever reason, a person related to the Annual Conference with a ministerial relationship leaves that relationship the exiting shall be reviewed and approved by the Board of Ordained Ministry per requirements of the Discipline.
- 2. The Secretary of the Board shall record in the Board minutes the stated reason(s) for him/her exiting. Additional statements shall be recorded from the Cabinet and the person who has exited.

3. Disciplinary procedures shall be followed as listed in the following paragraphs of the **Discipline**:

a. Discontinuance from Probationary Membership [Par. 418]

- b. Leave of Absence [Par. 448]
- c. Maternity/Paternity Leave [Par. 449]
- d. Disability Leave [Par. 450]
- e. Retirement [Par. 451]
- f. Honorable Location [Par. 452.1]
- g. Withdrawal to United with Another Denomination [Par. 452.2]
- h. Surrender of the Ordained Ministerial Office [Par. 452.3]
- i. Withdrawal under Complaints or Charges [Par. 452.4]
- j. Trial [Par. 453.2]
- k. Administrative Location [Par. 453.3]
- C. Readmission to Conference Relationship
 - 1. All requests for readmission to the Annual Conference for an appointment shall be presented to the Board of Ordained Ministry ninety days prior to the beginning session of the Annual Conference, unless stated otherwise in the **Discipline**.

2. The Board shall review all files and statements kept by the Board Secretary and

Registrar at the time of exiting.

3. All persons requesting readmission to a Conference relationship are required to submit to a psychological evaluation as prescribed in Section VI. The cost of this evaluation shall be borne by the person seeking readmission. A person returning from a Leave of Absence may have this requirement waived by the Chairperson and Registrar of the Board of Ordained Ministry.

4. The following disciplinary procedures will be followed by the Conference for per-

sons seeking readmission:

- a. Return from Leave of Absence [Par. 448]
- b. Return from Disability Leave [Par. 450.3]
- c. Readmission to Probationary Membership [Par. 454]
- d. Readmission after Honorable Location or Administrative Location [Par. 455]
- e. Readmission after Surrender of the Ministerial Office [Par. 456]
- f. Readmission after Termination by Action of the Annual Conference [Par. 457]
- 5. A person seeking readmission after having received Honorable Location, Administrative Location, or who surrendered the Ministerial Office shall serve a minimum of one year as a Local Pastor prior to receiving Conference relationship and credentials previously held.

Board Of Diaconal Ministry

Purpose

The purpose of the Conference Board of Diaconal Ministry is to study the needs and resources of the Conference, relative to professional ministry careers and to interpret Diaconal Ministry throughout the conference, to seek to enlist persons of all races and ethnic origins; to guide persons interested in these careers through the process of training, certification, and consecration. The Board shall also assist in the personal/professional growth of certified and consecrated professionals in the church.

Goals

The goals of the Board for the 1988-92 quadrennium are

- 1. Improve administration of records and maintenance of standards for certification and consecration.
- 2. Recruit persons in various forms of diaconal ministry.
- 3. Interpret diaconal ministry and the certification process
 - a) through networks established in the conference, such as United Methodist Women, district youth coordinators, and camps and colleges
 - b) by developing visuals and publicity instruments.
- 4. Expand Arkansas' settings for lay professional ministry by
 - a) developing a model for ethnic churches to employ or share a diaconal minister
 - b) facilitating use of lay professionals in cooperative parishes, small membership churches, and denominational positions
 - c) recruiting and encouraging persons in diaconal forms of ministry in ethnic churches in our conference
 - d) establishing a clearinghouse for churches seeking staff and persons seeking professional positions.
- 5. Improve support systems for persons in forms of diaconal ministry through
 - a) retreats and covenant groups
 - b) inclusion and recognition of retired diaconal ministers
 - c) becoming informed about insurance and benefits available and accessed by lay professionals.

Policy Statement

The minimum starting salary and benefits of persons who are certified by the United Methodist Church and/or Diaconal Ministers serving full-time in a United Methodist Church shall be commensurate with those of a beginning ordained minister.

Scholarship Fund

The Board of Diaconal Ministry shall maintain a scholarship fund for candidates preparing for Diaconal Ministry as follows:

- 1. For those fulfilling candidacy requirements through a master's degree at the theological or graduate school approved by the University Senate of the UMC.
- 2. For those fulfilling candidacy requirements through the UM Foundational Studies
- 3. Each applicant may receive up to \$275 per year. Aid will be granted on the basis of need and availability of funds. Due to limited funds, transportation is not covered. Candidates may apply for the balance of tuition/expense cost from the General Board of Diaconal Ministry and/or the local church. In the last quarter of the year, according to availability of unspent funds, additional or emergency aid may be granted.
- 4. Candidates may make application for financial aid to the Committee on Scholarship and Continuing Education. Send applications to the Vice Chairperson of the Board. Diaconal Ministers are required to earn 1 continuing education unit or 10 contact

hours in equivalent study each year. Financial aid is available for continuing education. The following shall serve as policy guidelines:

- 1. Each Diaconal Minister may apply for \$150 annually, if an equal amount is matched by the local church and/or minister. The matching requirement may be waived at the discretion of the Committee on Scholarship. CE funds shall be used for tuition, room, and board. Aid will be granted based upon the date of application and availability of funds.
- 2. Persons seeking financial aid for CE shall secure an application from the Vice Chairperson of the Board.
- 3. The Committee on Scholarship and CE shall review applications by Jan. 31 and June 30 of each year.

Commission On Equitable Salary And Mission Salary Supplement **Policy Statement**

All requests for Equitable Salary grants shall be received before grants for mission salary supplement are considered. Equitable Salary needs shall have prior claim on available funds.

The Commission shall recommend to Annual Conference the amount for Equita-

ble Salary to begin on January 1st. The Commission shall recommend the maximum amount of Equitable Salary monies that a charge may receive (Para. 722.8 This amount shall be effective on January 1st.

П. The Minimum Salary for a pastor approved by the Annual Conference for 1990 vear shall be:

> Full-Time Full Member \$20,000 Full-Time Associate Member or Probationary \$19,000 Full-Time Local Pastor\$18,000

In a church and/or charge which salary is below the Equitable Salary minimum all III. salary increases, up to the minimum, will not result in a reduction in the church and/or charge receiving the support. All increases over the minimum will result inn 1/2 the amount being deducted from the church and/or charge Equitable Salary

When a pastoral charge is made, an adjustment will be made in the church and/or charge Equitable Salary support so that the church and/or charge does not receive Equitable Salary support above the minimum.

IV. In the event of insufficient funds to meet all claims, each charge shall share proportionately from the funds available.

Equitable Salary Support shall have prior claim over Mission Salary Supplement V. in the event of insufficient funds.

VI. Church and/or charge with associate pastors will not receive Equitable Salary Support. VII. The Commission shall report the amount paid during the fiscal year to each

charge and minister. VIII.

The above plan of distribution of funds be made effective June of 1989.

IX. Equitable Salary Grants

1. The District Superintendent shall work with each church and/or charge within his/her District to develop a sound financial policy for each church, which shall include a yearly budget and financial campaign. The Commission may request a written report from said Superintendent before granting salary support for a church and/or charge.

2. A church and/or charge receiving Equitable Salary shall make a reasonable

effort to pay their apportionments in full.

3. The church and/or charge shall make application to the Commission through their respective District Superintendent no later than January 20.

4. Pastoral assignment shall be full-time (Para. 441 & 441.1) except that the Commission shall consider applications whose pastoral supply is appointed in accordance with para 441.2 & 437.2.

5. In exceptional cases approved by the Cabinet, any requirements above except #4 may be waived by the Commission.

The Equitable Salary Commission shall be empowered to designate a portion of the Equitable Salary Fund for Mission Salary Supplement provided that Mission Salary Supplement shall not exceed the balance anticipated for the year after Equitable Salary grants have been approved.

XI. Mission Salary Supplement Grants

1. The District Superintendent shall work with each church and/or charge within his/her District to develop a sound financial policy for each church, which shall include a yearly budget and financial campaign. The Commission may request a written report from said Superintendent before granting salary support for a church and/or charge.

2. The church and/or charge shall make application to the Commission through their respective District Superintendent no later than January 20.

3. Exceptional cases may be declared by the Commission from the above requirements and waived on recommendation by the District Superintendent provided the Commission may request in writing, from the District Superintendent in whose District the church and/or charge resides, the reasons for the exceptional circumstances.

XII. All grants from Mission Salary Supplement shall be reported by the Commission to the Annual Conference.

XIII. Adjustments may be made by the Commission at the beginning of the fiscal year when such adjustments are necessitated by a change of appointment or realignment of the charge — or by a new salary arrangement voted by the Charge Conference.

Camp Tanako: Report To Annual Conference: 1989 FROM: CAMP TANAKO BOARD

Camp Tanako was organized in 1948 and all of the buildings now in use were built between that time and 1952. Therefore, all of our buildings are approaching 40 years old. In the meantime, we have been able to afford only minimal repairs and rehabilitation due to limited budget.

In the early 1980's, it became obvious that we had to look at the overall camp, facilities and programs, to see what the camp should now be and what it should become.

Our Master Planning process began in 1983 and the Master Plan was completed in 1986. We have delayed asking for any special apportionment for three years due to other programs which were in process.

Last year at Annual Conference, the Tanako Board asked for and got Conference approval to raise money on our own for Phase I. At that Conference, we told you that we would be back during Annual Conference of 1989 to request special apportionment items for the completion of Phase I and Phase II. We have worked very hard within the past year and are proud to report that without a Conference-wide program, we have raised over \$325,000 in cash and pledges to underwrite four of the eight cabin complexes. Three are now completed.

We are very pleased with this progress and are very pleased to find that we have such loyal support all over the conference.

Earlier this spring, the Tanako Board asked for CCOM approval for a special apportionment totaling \$1,500,000 of construction dollars to complete Phase I and build Phase II.

Completion of Phase I includes the final four cabin complexes, including all utilities, furniture, and street and parking improvements in the cabin area itself.

Phase II is the gymatorium which includes a large open air meeting hall, heated and air conditioned meeting rooms, all utilities, furniture, parking lot, two new tennis courts and swimming pool improvements.

The total cost of the two phases if built in the fall and winter of this year, 1989, will be \$1.500,000.00.

After several discussions with CCOM, CFA, the Cabinet and Laity over the Conference, we have modified our request to the proposal below, which we feel is very attainable for the Conference and the local churches.

The Goal:

- 1. That Camp Tanako be established as a development priority and build the needed facilities, as defined below.
- 2. Secure \$570,000 for the construction of four new cabin complexes, sewer work, road work, and interest over a period of two years 1990 and 1991. This amount shall be raised as follows:
- A. \$165,000 shall be apportioned to the churches each year, 1990 and 1991, as a separate line item, upon adoption by the Conference. The line item shall be called "Camp Tanako Development Priority."
- B. A Minimum of \$120,000 shall be raised by special solicitations each year. The Proposal:
- 1. The Camp Tanako Board requests the 1989 session of Annual Conference, after receiving approval of the Cabinet and the Council on Finance and Administration, to accept a \$165,000 apportionment for two years, beginning in 1990.
- 2. We request a continuation of the permission to the Tanako Board of Trustees to contact individuals, foundations and corporations seeking gifts to further develop Tanako.
- 3. Upon acceptance of the apportionment by the Annual Conference, the Tanako Board of Trustees shall be authorized to borrow funds, for a period of two and one-half years, to build new cabins and do site work and road improvements. The maximum the Trustees shall be authorized to borrow shall be \$250,000 without the permission of the Executive Committee of CFA.
- 4. As soon as the sufficient funds are assured to build additional facilities, the Tanako Board of Trustees shall be authorized to sign the necessary contracts, including borrowing additional funds.
- 5. Designate Sunday, September 10, 1989 as "Camp Tanako Sunday." Provide a brochure to churches noting...
 - ... cabins already built, and how funds were raised.
- ... summer camping experiences and availability of the camp to churches and church groups throughout the year. Emphasize that the cabins are winterized.
 - ... pictures of people in camps.
- ... at least two testimonials concerning what the camp has meant to persons. Suggestion: One testimonial from a youth who attended a summer 1989 session, and one from an adult who attended the camp as a youth.

Observe Sunday, September 9, 1990 as "Tanako Sunday" and provide a different brochure, noting development progress.

6. The Tanako Board of Trustees and the Camping Committee shall work diligently to schedule camps throughout the year, and provide leadership to create excitement about the Camp.

The Camp Tanako Board of Trustees urges your prayerful consideration of this proposal. We hope that yesterday you were as pleased with the progress at the camp as we have been.

Report To The Annual Conference On

Long Range Planning Of The United Methodist Children's Home

IN 1897 a group of concerned church leaders approached the conference about a need to effectively relate to orphans in our state. That concern culminated with the State of Arkansas granting a charter for the Methodist Orphanage in 1899.

The Orphanage received its first orphan in February, 1902. No one knows how many orphans found good homes because of the work of the Methodist Orphanage.

IN 1907 it was determined that the original house on Commerce Street in Little Rock was no longer filling the need. Land was purchased and a more suitable facility was erected at 16th and Elm. The move was completed in 1910.

IN THE MID-1940's the rambling, single structure at 16th & Elm was deemed less than adequate and the child care facility was relocated on the northeast corner of the recently purchased 80 acre tract of land that was bounded by 20th Street, 28th Street, Fillmore Street and Hays Street (University).

When the Home moved to the Fillmore location (in 1947) the needs of children being served had so changed that the mission and name of the Home was changed from "orphanage" to "The Methodist Children's Home."

CHANGE! It has been said that "the only thing that is constant, is change."

The crying need of today's children is not that of finding adoptive parents for orphaned children; nor is "bed and breakfast" the most pressing issue.

The term most often heard today is the "at-risk" child. It is not a baby without a crib, it is teenagers on streets that are filled with drug/smut peddlers. It is children whose natural parents either don't care, or are not capable of helping their children through the terrible maze of growing up to be healthy, wholesome adults.

These kids need a stable base in a well-rounded society. They don't (so much) need to be isolated from society in an institution. They really need to be integrated as a functioning part of a strong, healthy society. They don't need a peer group made up predominately of other youths like themselves. They need to be nurtured in a setting where acceptable role models can be observed and with whom they can naturally interact.

More than 18 months ago the Trustees of UMCH made the decision to take an indepth look at who we were and what it was we were trying to do; to see where we were and what we were really doing in serving the needs of "at-risk" children. They voted (in November, 1987) to retain a professional consulting firm to do this study for us. In doing this study, the planners sorted through every aspect of the Home. They also delved into the entire community of professional child care as well as identifying some areas of need in the juvenile population. They left no stones unturned, either inside or outside our agency.

Just over one year ago (May 1988) the consultants made their report to our Trustees. The Trustees, recognizing the value of this study, authorized the Chairperson to appoint a Long Range Planning Committee to receive this report. That Committee was charged with the task of taking the planning and management study; digesting, researching and bringing back to the Board their findings and recommendations for the future of the Home.

That Committee and those chosen as resource persons to the Committee consisted of: four clergy members of the Board (all of whom are, or have served as District Superintendents), one lay member of the Board (the Executive Director of the Arkansas Methodist Foundation), one qualified and certified researcher for studies, one licensed social worker (our Director of Children & Family Services), and one Ph.D. in Psychology (our Director of Professional Services).

The Committee chose Dr. C. Ray Hozendorf to chair the Committee. Dr. Hozendorf, in his systematic and dedicated manner, led the Committee to a conclusive end. I want you to listen closely as he walks you swiftly through this year long study that has resulted in some daring radical changes that should open a whole new world of exciting service to

children/youth whose future may well rest in our hands. Dr. Hozendorf.

Bishop Wilke and members of the Little Rock Annual Conference, thank you for the privilege of speaking to you on behalf of the United Methodist Children's Home and the exciting changes the Board of Directors has approved. The change of direction from campus oriented to community based group homes is one of the most exciting things that has happened.

Every member of the Long Range Planning Committee has worked diligently to study the need, to understand the situation under which we have been operating, to discover the alternatives and to recommend a plan that would allow the Children's Home to fulfill its mission and purpose, which is "to develop each child to his fullest potential physically, mentally, and spiritually, to provide a decent home life, adequate food and clothes, and an opportunity for an education and an environment conducive to spiritual growth. This is to be done through a program of child care which shall effectively meet the needs of the children served, without regard to race, creed, or national origin, and through residential care, foster home care, group home services, etc."

Various members of the Committee visited the Louisiana Children's Home, the Texas Children's Home and the North Carolina Conference Children's Home. On other occasions members met with the deputy director of the Arkansas Department of Human Services, with Bishop Wilke and with others to secure insights and knowledge of human service needs and policies. After gathering as much information as we could the Committee formulated its recommendations.

The statement of purpose includes the phrase: "to have an environment conducive to spiritual growth." As the Committee considered this aspect of our mission we determined that our experience with the Magnolia and Searcy group homes was much more stable and far more conducive to the atmosphere for spiritual growth, such neighborhoods being more community and church oriented.

The following changes in strategy of the UMCH were unanimously approved by the Board of Directors on May 16.

1. That additional community based group homes be established with properly equipped, trained and funded teaching parents. The community would be asked to be involved in a supportive manner and committed to this relationship on a continuous basis. The group home system would emphasize the teaching of basic values, morals and ethics in a supportive family style environment. The community based group home has proven to be a superior approach for teaching social, academic, maintenance and self help skills in a supportive family relationship.

2. Develop the Independent Living Program approved by the Directors some eighteen months ago for older youth, aged 18-21, and move forward in this program as rapidly as possible.

3. Foster Home Care is the number one placement of children by Human Service. The United Methodist Children's Home is capable of promoting, locating, training personnel, and maintaining a network of foster homes. The Home will pursue this strategy enthusiastically and with commitment of personnel and financial resources.

4. When all the children who are under our care have been cared for adequately, and each staff member given individual and proper concern, the 27.7 acres on S. Fillmore may be offered for sale. The appraisal and the land use study which has been approved and are approaching completion will be of inestimable value in determining the future use of the property.

5. The plan is that the administrative offices remain in Little Rock, with the professional staff relating to the community based group homes. You may ask, are you going to have a home in Little Rock or North Little Rock? Any county in the state can have a home. It will depend on meeting the supportive conditions mentioned previously.

What will you do with the proceeds of any possible sale? We would like to place all proceeds received in the endowment fund, if and when such sale should occur. We only have \$1,427,000.00 in the endowment now. Some of the money may have to be used in establishing homes, but we hope the communities will help with the actual buildings.

Will we ever need this campus again? It was the considered judgment of the study committee that if the present trends of the area continue that the campus would become less acceptable as a sight for a human services location with the passing of time.

We used to have other group homes at Fort Smith and Arkadelphia, but abandoned them, why are we going back to them? We were fifteen years ahead of the times on the Fort Smith home. The two homes in Arkadelphia were never United Methodist Children's Homes. They were Clark County owned. UMCH provided personnel and funding for the residents.

The plans we have presented are long range plans. It will take about two years to provide for the present group of children. The process of securing a location for future community based group homes and finding foster homes and training foster parents will be developing over a ten year period.

Through the ninety year history of the Children's Home you have trusted your trustees and supported the Home generously. Today we ask for your continued trust and support. It has been said that troubled children come from troubled homes. This plan offers United Methodists of Arkansas the opportunity to minister to troubled youth and troubled families. You are asked to (1) give of your interest and time to help secure community based group homes; (2) continue to give generously to the Christmas Offering and through your memorials, wills and bequests; and (3) pray for the Children's Home and for the guidance of the Holy Spirit as we seek to minister to troubled children and troubled families.

United Methodist Women

The United Methodist Women of the Little Rock Conference are a varied group. We are married, single, divorced, widowed, single parents, grandmothers, housewives, gainfully employed, retired, young, old, black and white. We are different shapes and sizes as well as colors. But we have a common denominator. We are concerned about God's children and because of that we are in Mission. We work within our organization and throughout the whole Church.

More than 200 of us gathered at Camp Tanako on September 15, 1988 for a conference wide day apart where we considered "Dimension of Prayer." There was also a district retreat in each of the districts during the year. The 1989 day apart will again be at Tanako on Saturday, September 23rd.

The Annual Meeting was held at Pulaski Heights United Methodist Church, in Little Rock, on October 22nd with the theme Children of God — Hope for the World. Our speaker, Mary Lou Blakeman, a psychologist working with children in schools in the New Orleans area and the wife of a District Superintendent reminded us that we have a long tradition as women who care. God gives us whatever is necessary to do the task. We must listen to God's love and get up each morning ready to do the task. It was my personal privilege at this meeting to present the retiring president, Leona Bonsall, with a full complement of Special Membership Recognition pins — one of every denomination available. This was made possible by gifts from units and individuals in every district who gave more that \$3,350.00 to mission to show their love and appreciation for Leona.

Women's Division has asked every conference to increase its pledge-undesignated giving for each of the years 1988, 1989, and 1990. We increased our pledge \$8,000.00 for 1988 and paid it in full — \$128,000.00. We sent just over \$22,000.00, a large part for Aldersgate, in supplemental gifts making over \$150,000.00 sent to the Women's Division for Mission in 1988 and much more was spent in our local churches and communities Our pledge for 1989 is increased to \$140,000.00.

We appreciate the support of Bishop Wilke and all the local ministers who gave over the Morning Worship service to the United Methodist Women on January 29th or an alternate Sunday. The reports we've had have been good ones. Many women had the responsibility and opportunity to participate in varying ways that were new to them and their congregations. If you missed the January Sunday, it isn't too late to choose another

date. United Methodist Women's Sunday will be an annual event and we hope that every church will participate in 1990. Both clergy and laity (men and women) have said they learned things they didn't know about United Methodist Women through these services.

Our districts have taken the boundary changes in stride and for the most part made the necessary adjustments. In addition to the retreats mentioned previously, each district has

had some informative and inspirational programs and training sessions.

While United Methodist Women have a zest for Mission, it seems that this zest did not extend to evaluation reports this year. Fewer members were reported for this year but only 76% of our units reported. All other indications deny a membership loss — especially increased giving.

The past year, our women have studied "Ruth and Esther," "Faces of Poverty in our Midst," and "South Africa." This year, with annual Conference later than usual, our Conference Officers have a schedule conflict, in that they are due in Oklahoma City for the start of West Gulf Regional School at noon, Tuesday, June 13th. In addition to update instruction for officers, at Oklahoma City University, and again at Arkansas Area School of Mission in August, this year we will study "Psalms," "The World of Islam," and "The Philippines."

Two Women's Division staff members and three directors will present a leadership development workshop for our Conference Officers, Nominating Committee, and District

Presidents at Aldersgate the weekend of April 7-9.

A five year campaign for children began in 1988. Many local units were already involved in projects to help children. All units are asked to assess the needs in their area, and work either with existing groups or start new projects to meet children's needs.

While 1988's annual meeting topic was children, in 1989 our theme will be "Youth Our Responsibility of Today — Our Investment in Tomorrow." This annual meeting

will be at First United Methodist Church, Malvern October 7, 1989.

Several units in our conference have been saving Campbell soup labels to be used to buy equipment for McCurdy or other schools. Any units supporting other schools may continue to do so, and all others are asked to save labels from all Campbell products. McCurdy School, in Espanola, New Mexico, is one of our National Division projects.

The Conference Executive Committee voted to ask the local units to participate in a second new project Conference wide — the Women's Watchcare Network. They will be monitoring and reporting the activities of hate groups and also reporting abuse of women

and children. I feel that awareness can be a powerful motivator.

When the Executive Committee met in February, May of 1990 seemed far in the future. It's getting closer for the United Methodist Women's Assembly in Kansas City, MO, May 3-6. With it being 8-10 hours away we anticipate the need to charter a bus or busses to go. We will give a \$200.00 scholarship to attend the Assembly (which is the program meeting of the Quadrennium).

So you can see that United Methodist Women have been productive, are staying active, and plan to continue to be a vital part of both receiving and giving God's love and

care in the Little Rock Conference.

Report Of Work Area On Church And Society

In response to the action of the Annual Conference last year, a Task Group was set up to determine a course of action that would provide education and direction for the Little Rock Conference in AIDS ministry. The following actions were taken by that Task Group:

- (1) Appropriate informational material was secured and distributed in our conference
- (2) A high priority was set on providing training for clergy and others who are likely to be called upon to counsel persons with AIDS and related conditions, or their families. It

was determined that this should be an area event so the Task Group was enlarged to include representatives of the North Arkansas Conference. Dr. Ronald H. Sunderland, a Research Fellow at the Institute of Religion in Houston and the co-author of three books related to AIDS Ministry and the Religious Community was selected as the leader. This event — "Can You Face AIDS in Your Congregation?" — was held at Pulaski Heights UMC on February 28th with 70 persons participating, representing 10 denominations and 2 institutions. Dr. Sunderland defined three major actions the church can take to fight the AIDS epidemic — focus on education, establish ministries as an example to the community, and establish or join ecumenical caretaking programs to assist AIDS patients. He warned "how we respond to this crisis may determine the integrity of the religious community as conveyors of the Gospel."

(3) We supported the Arkansas AIDS foundation through a monetary gift to the operational fund and through the service of several United Methodists on the Religious Advisory Committee currently chaired by Dr. Tyler Thompson of Pulaski Heights UMC. Because of the interest generated in our community following our training event, we were contacted by the Associated Catholic Charities of New Orleans with an offer to fund a part time director for AIDS Ministry in Arkansas. They were seeking an ecumenical sponsor so the Advisory Committee is working with them to make this come about. Funding will be by ACC from a grant they received to assist local churches in educational

and training programs for ministry.

A second Task Group was formed to define priorities for the Work Area. District representatives on Church and Society as well as representatives of United Methodist Women, the Commission on the Status and Role of Women and the Commission on Religion and Race were asked to participate. The following concerns were identified as priorities

among many concerns proposed:

(1) It is a primary responsibility to work with district and local representatives to clarify and interpret the position of the Church as passed by General Conference and stated in our Social Principles and the Book of Resolutions and to explore the responsibilities of the Church and Society representative. To this end we recommend that districts specify Church and Society as one facet of "My Job Workshops" or similar training programs. Further, assistance will be provided, on request, to help local churches understand our responsibilities.

(2) Since most of the programs of Church and Society related to the compassionate ministries of Christ to all humanity, but particularly to those who cannot be their own advocates, a training event will be sponsored by Church and Society to develop advocacy

skills in our membership.

(3) In the area of AIDS Ministry the Task Group recommended that we continue intensive education and ministry. We will assemble training tools that are appropriate for various age levels and make them available to districts and local churches. Requests will be made to the Board of Managers of Pastors School and the Planning Team for the Area School of Christian Mission to include a significant segment of AIDS training in those schools in 1990. It is further recommended that an AIDS Awareness Day be observed by the conference in 1990. Dr. Thomson and the Reverend Norwood Jones of St. James UMC will be the Coordinators of our AIDS Ministry.

(4) While a number of environmental and ecological concerns were identified, for the present we would like to recommend to our churches that they use paper products in lieu of styrofoam/plastic products, which are non-biodegradable. This would be of economic

as well as ecological benefit to our part of the state.

The other major action we plan for 1989-1990 is in the area of Peace With Justice. Because of the funds that have been collected on Peace With Justice Sunday the last few years we have funds available for work in this area. We hope to have a United Nations related event in the fall and a "Parenting for Peace" seminar next spring. We encourage the churches to participate in "Trick or Treat for UNICEF" in October.

I am pleased to announce that Mr. Jim Wohlleb of First United Methodist Church,

Little Rock, will be our Peace With Justice Coordinator.

In keeping with our Conference Priorities for this year and the next, we have a deep concern about many issues that relate to children and youth such as in education and health care. We are particularly concerned about the rise in the numbers of youth who experience teenage pregnancies, substance abuse and suicides. Therefore we recommend the establishment of an Area Committee to research statistics and data for Arkansas and to determine a recommended course of action which would address these problems.

With the numerous issues that face our church and our society, we have a full agenda before us. It takes commitment and enormous courage to deal with many of them, but we certainly are going to undertake the journey!

We have four sponsored resolutions to present.

Work Area On Church And Society Resolution: Against Institution Of A Lottery In Arkansas

WHEREAS: there are forces at work in our state which are proposing the institution of a lottery in Arkansas to raise money for schools and/or other purposes, and

WHEREAS: the United Methodist Church historically has stood in opposition to gambling "as a menace to society, deadly to the best interests of moral, social, economic, and spiritual life and destructive of good government,"

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

that the Little Rock Conference express our opposition to a lottery in Arkansas and that this opposition be conveyed to our Governor and to the members of the Arkansas Legislature.

Resolution: Ku Klux Klan And Other Hate Groups In The U.S.A.

WHEREAS, The United Methodist Church has expressed its opposition to all forms of racism and anti-semitism in the past, and

WHEREAS, In recent months an Arkansan has been elected to the leadership of the National Ku Klux Klan and increased activity may be expected in the future, and activities of other hate groups in Arkansas continue to take place,

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED:

That the Little Rock Conference reaffirm its opposition to the Ku Klux Klan and all other hate groups and that we continue to educate our members as to the insidiousness of these groups, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

That we call upon our government and its agencies to assure that law enforcement personnel take necessary steps to maintain accurate records on racist violence and bring to justice the perpetrators of such violence and intimidation.

Resolution: Commendation Of Dr. Jocelyn Elders, Director Of Arkansas State Health Department

WHEREAS, there is clear evidence that many Arkansas children do not receive even the most basic health care, and

WHEREAS, Arkansas continues to be among the highest states in the nation in terms of teenage pregnancies, and

WHEREAS, it is felt that school based health clinics could be a first step in addressing these crises, and

WHEREAS, Dr. Jocelyn Elders has been unstinting in her crusade for improved health care for the underprivileged children in Arkansas and her actions have been clearly consistent with the Social Principles of The United Methodist Church,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

That the Little Rock Annual Conference commend Dr. Elders for her courageous witness and support her proposal for school-based health clinics in the State of Arkansas.

Resolution On "The Charter For Racial Justice Policies In An Interdependent Global Community"

WHEREAS, the central message of the New Testament is the reconciling love of God through his Son, Jesus Christ, and

WHEREAS, we are called to live together as one through Christ who has reconciled us and has called us to be peace makers in the world, and

WHEREAS, racism is wrong and is sinful, and

WHEREAS, the General Conference in 1980 through the adoptions of A CHARTER FOR RACIAL JUSTICE POLICIES IN AN INTERDEPENDENT GLOBAL COMMUNITY, among other things, called upon the Church to:

"... Create opportunities in local churches to deal honestly with the existing racist attitudes and social distance between members, deepening the Christian commitment to be the Church where all racial groups and economic classes come together;

"... Create workshops and seminars in local churches to study, understand, and appreciate the historical and cultural contributions of each race to the Church and com-

munity;

"... Increase local churches' awareness of the continuing needs for equal education, housing, employment and medical care for all members of the community and to create opportunities to work for these things across racial lines ..."

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

That the Little Rock Conference, beginning this year call upon its local churches to institute studies, seminars, workshops, or other learning experiences based on The Charter for Racial Justice Policies in an Interdependent Global Community, and thus provide our membership with an understanding of what we must become if the Church is to become truly instruments of change.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

that a report of study sessions held be included in the Pastor's Report to the Charge Conference each year.

Commission On Religion And Race Report

The 1988-89 year has been a transitional period for the Little Rock Conference Commission. Our primary accomplishment has been to lay the groundwork for the task before us. This has been achieved through assessing our current status; prayerful recommitment on the part of the current Commission members; and by establishing achievable goals and realistic timetables.

To insure that the work of the Commission on Religion and Race is implemented at the grass roots level of the Little Rock Annual Conference, an aggressive training schedule has been adopted:

Chairperson Training — March 1-4, 1989

Area Wide Training — Fall 1989

Commission Members, District Coordinators and the Cabinet

District Training Events — 1990

Local Church Religion and Race Chairpersons

The Conference Commission by working through the Committee on Nominations will be setting the standard for inclusiveness by insuring that the populations identified by **Discipline** are represented in its membership. This will enhance the Commission on Religion and Race in its monitoring efforts with other Conference Committees and Commissions as this is a primary component (inclusiveness) that will be considered when evaluating groups within the Annual Conference.

The Commission will be monitoring the small groupings which resulted from the Jurisdictional Convocation on Racism, the Conference Priority and the implementation of the Wesley Foundation at the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff. The Commission will assist with mainstreaming EMLC as it relates to the new Conference Taskforce on the Ethnic Church. The Commission will serve as a resource point for other Conference Committees and Commissions upon their request.

Much work confronts us as we go forth into the quadrennium. Without strong leadership, adequate training, open hearts and minds, we will fall short of the Wesleyan tenet of "going on to perfection." To paraphrase Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., until we look at the "content of a man's character rather than the color of a man's skin" we cannot say that our goals have been achieved.

Resolution on the 1972 Merger Agreement Between the Little Rock Annual Conference and the Southwest Annual Conference

Whereas 1992 will be the twentieth anniversary of the 1972 Merger Agreement between the Little Rock Annual Conference and the Southwest Annual Conference;

And whereas, since merger, Black churches of the former Southwest Annual Conference have suffered alarming losses in laity and clergy;

And whereas, in 1989, 3 of the 24 positions on the Little Rock Annual Conference Council of Ministries are held by Blacks;

And whereas the Little Rock Annual Conference has not appointed a Black person to the office of the Superintendency since the 1972 merger;

And whereas, in 1989, in the Little Rock Annual Conference, 7 of 23 Conference Boards and Agencies do not have Black representatives;

And whereas, in 1989, only two Black clergy persons, whose salary package is derived from serving a single local congregation, are paid at a level above minimum salary;

And whereas in 1989, there are no Black lay persons serving in a full time professional capacity in any White United Methodist local church within the Little Rock Annual Conference;

Be it hereby resolved that the Little Rock Annual Conference reaffirm the contents of the 1972 Merger Agreement, and in preparation for the twentieth anniversary of said agreement hereby covenant to adopt the following goals to be accomplished by 1992;

1. A Black Clergy person be elected to the office of the Superintendency to serve in the Little Rock Annual Conference by 1992;

 That aggressive recruitment be undertaken by the Cabinet to fill pulpits for Black churches with full-time ordained clergy persons, where feasible. This recruitment process shall be in consultation with existing Black lay and clergy leadership to insure persons will be retained once recruited; 3. That full open itineracy be encouraged throughout the connectional system within the Little Rock Annual Conference. This should include encouragement by the Cabinet of pulpit exchanges; placement of Black clergy as pastors; and encouragement to hire Black laity in professional staff positions within White United Methodist Churches;

4. That the Little Rock Annual Conference shall adopt an Affirmative Action Policy

with regard to all boards and agencies.

And finally, that this resolution be read annually until the 1992 session of the Little Rock Annual Conference to celebrate the progress toward these goals.

Committee On Ethnic Minority Local Church

The 1988 General Conference approved the incorporation of the EMLC into the ongo

ing life of the church at all levels during the 1989-1992 quadrennium.

To assist in accomplishing the goals as outlined in the comprehensive plan, seven sub committee assignments have been grouped into three committees. They include:

A. Leadership Development

Structural Involvement

B. Church Growth

Outreach/Witness

Discipleship

C. Liturgy/Worship

Facilities/Buildings

Committee members have been assigned to implement strategies identified in the comprehensive plan. Special effort is being made to empower ethnic minority local churche to assess funds that have now been mainstreamed into the budgets of agencies and boards.

Proposed Organization For Area Communication

The Committees on Communications of the two Annual Conferences shall administer Arkansas Area Communications Program

This program covers three main areas:

1. Arkansas United Methodist Newspaper

2. Arkansas Area Resource Center

3. Arkansas Area Production Center

The Little Rock Conference has a full-time staff person in communications with up to 1/4 time being shared on an area basis. That person is the Associate Director for Communications of the Little Rock Conference.

We recommend that the following lines of accountability be established.

1. The Area Committee of Communications made up of the joint Committees on Communications of the two Annual Conferences shall supervise the work of the area statin communications. This shall include the Managing Editor of the Arkansas Unite Methodist Newspaper, the Assistant to the Editor, the Resource Librarian, the Production Center Supervisor. It shall also supervise the Associate Director of Communications only to the extent of that person's supervision of Area personnel and program


2. The Area Committee on Communications shall review, update, and manage the policies of the Resource Center, Production center, and the Newspaper. They shall mon

tor the budgets and approve any significant changes.

- 3. The lines of accountability and responsibility shall be for the purpose of carrying out the approved policies and administering the appropriate budgets.
 - a. The Managing Editor of the Arkansas United Methodist Newspaper shall oversee the production of the newspaper and supervise the Assistant. The Editor shall report directly and regularly to the Area Committee.
 - b. The Associate Director of Communications of the Little Rock Conference shall oversee the work of the Production Center and the Resource Center as part of the area duties within their job description.

The day to day operations will be the responsibility of the Production Supervisor and the Resource Librarian. However, purchases above \$100 and any budget changes must be approved prior to funds being spent. Any questions about policy and jobs should be directed first to the Associate Director of Communication and then to the Area Committee. The Associate Director of Communications shall report directly and regularly to the Area Committee on Communications.

Christian Unity And Inter-Religious Concerns

"That they may all be one," is the prayer of Jesus for his followers, (John 17:21). Two significant current steps toward Christian unity are; The United Methodist/Lutheran statement on Episcopacy, and, the Consultation on Church Union Covenanting Proposal.

The statement on Episcopacy is available from the Service Center, 7820 Reading Road, Cincinnati, Ohio — 45222-1800 — and is recommended as part of the ongoing effort by participating communions to clarify our mind and practice regarding this important Office of the Church.

The Covenanting Proposal of the Consultation on Church Union recommends that "Covenanting Councils" be established at national, regional and local levels. Such Councils would provide for inter-denominational representation at Ordinations, common acceptability of Ministers among covenanting churches, and a visible, if not organic, form of unity before the world. This document is available from the Consultation on Church Union, 151 Wall Street, Princeton, New Jersey — 08540-1514.

It is recommended that the Little Rock Annual Conference adopt the following timeline relative to the Covenanting Proposal: 1989-1990 a year for studying the Proposal throughout the Annual Conference; 1990-1991 for the encouragement and formulation of petitions to General Conference, reflecting the sense of the Annual Conference; 1991-1992 for promoting the Annual Conference perspective through General Conference representations.

In addition, two helpful perspectives on the movement toward Christian Unity are in recently released video-tapes entitled, "Tapestry" which portrays the work of the National Council of Churches, and, "One World" which highlights the work of the World Council of Churches emphasizing the Worship and spiritual life at the center of the Council. These video-tapes are available from the Arkansas Area Resource Center, 715 Center Street, Little Rock, Arkansas — 72201.

Finally, for those who can take advantage of them, the National Council of Churches Ecumenical Travel Seminars (NETS) provide cross-cultural learning experiences in the Christian Faith. Near future seminars include U.S.S.R. II (July 31-August 17), Brazil (September 3-19) and distant seminars include Pacific Regions (1990) and Australia (1991). Detailed information on the travel seminars is available from the National Council of Churches, 475 Riverside Drive, Room 851, New York, New York — 10115-0050.

Archives And History Commission

The Little Rock Conference Archives and History Commission has continued to organize the material in the Methodist Archives at Hendrix College. The accomplishments for 1988-1989 have been: (1) the creation of additional space for materials and for the display of three-dimensional objects; (2) the purchase of a new filing cabinet, a new portable typewriter, and the necessary acid-free materials needed; (3) the completion of the photocopying of the Stanley Baugh collection of photographs of early 20th century Little Rock Conference rural churches and the attendance cataloging information.

An exhibit of photographs and biographies of laypersons of the Little Rock Conference (deceased), which was requested by the Jurisdictional Conference committee for display at the meeting in New Orleans, was displayed at Conference time in 1988, as well as an exhibit on Methodist campgrounds. The exhibit for the 1989 Conference will refer to information regarding the 50th anniversary of the reunification of the Methodist churches in 1939.

The Commission met with the North Arkansas Commission on Archives and History in March, 1989 to implement the working together as a joint conference. This was a very productive meeting with much accomplished which will benefit the archives work in both conferences.

The Thirteenth Session of the South Central Jurisdictional Conference was held July 12-15, 1988 in New Orleans, LA. Three new bishops were elected: William B. Oden Bruce P. Blake and Dan E. Solomon. Sequoyah and Southern Methodist University were revised and trustees were elected to the Boards of those two institutions and to the Board of Lydia Patterson Institute. The Jurisdictional Council on Ministries approved twenty-four programs for 1988 — including two lab schools and seminars, seven retiree events, an ethnic ministry church development consultation, youth ministry, volunteers in mission workshop, town and

country ministry consultation and several other events.

Two new positions were added to the Jurisdictional staff: Volunteers in Mission Coordinator with Rev. Max Marble of the Missouri East Conference; and Korean Mission Director with Rev. The Jurisdictional Convocation on Racism/Joint Training Event was held Novembe 30-December 1 & 2 in Dallas, TX with over 350 persons in attendance. The Consultation focused on the evils and remedy of individual and institutional racism and provided skil

training and information for annual conference leaders.

Report On Korean Mission In South Central Jurisdiction

1. Korean Mission work in South Central Jurisdiction was started on February 15, 1989. Its primary purpose is to enable congregational development among the growing Korean immigrant communities. The key concept of MISSION is to enable new congregational birthing and incubation which is described in the DISCIPLINE (P. 663-664). Until the new congregations have been chartered (the Organization of the Charge Conference) within the Annual conference and District, the proceeding conditions call for much closer relationship between the Korean Mission and Annual Conferences and Districts which the work is carried on.

2. The mission work is a facilitating and coordinating for the development of Korean-American ministries and new church development, especially consultation for rede-

veloping the designated Korean churches.

3. The mission projects presently carried on are six congregations: Springdale-Hanmaum (N. Arkansas), Wichita-Sarang (Kansas W.), Jacksonville (N. Arkansas), Copperas Cove (C. Texas) Waco (C. Texas), Enid (Oklahoma), and ongoing projects are five: Irving (N. Texas), Kansas City (Kansas E.), Corpus Christi (S.W. Texas), Waynesville (Missouri E.), Ft. Smith (N. Arkansas), and in surveying projects are follows: Houston Second (Texas), Shreveport (Louisiana), College Station (Texas), Abilene (N.W. Texas), Lake Charles (Louisiana), Laredo (S.W. Texas), Topeka (Kansas E.), Omaha (Nebraska), Denton (N. Texas).

4. The mission leadership development is very important for the new church development and nurturing with the Korean churches, especially recruitment and training of

mission pastors.

- 4. The Doyle property (near Nashville) be deeded to the Doyle Cemetery Association upon their incorporation with the State of Arkansas. If the Doyle Cemetery Associa tion should cease to exist, the property will revert to the Little Rock Conference. 5. The Ozan property (Hempstead County) be appraised and sold at the direction of the

Hope District Superintendent. The church marker will be moved to Washington. 6. The Davis Chapel property (Hope) be sold at minimum cost to Willie Branden. The

Hope District Superintendent will handle the sale.

7. The Sylvernio property (between Texarkana and Fouke) be transferred to the Fev Church if Sylvernio trustees are alive. If Sylvernio trustees are not alive, the Board recommends that the property be appraised and sold to the highest bidder.

8. The Silver Hill property (Union County) be deeded to the Silver Hill Cemetery Asso ciation.

William Arnold has prepared a recommended procedure to form a nonprofit corpora tion to operate cemeteries. Copies of this procedure have been sent each District Super intendent.

Wilke to appoint a task force to study alter nate elderly housing needs in the state of Arkansas. This task force is made up of five persons from the North Arkansas Annual Conference, five persons from the Little Roc Annual Conference and five persons from Methodist Health Systems. They include the following people: Robert B. Howerton, Jr., Chairperson (Methodist Health Systems); D James Argue, Sr. (Little Rock); Rev. Jim Beal (Methodist Health Systems); Mr. Johnn Brannon (Little Rock); Rev. J. W. Carroll (Methodist Health Systems); Ms. Gina Cowa (North Arkansas); Rev. Paul Eubanks (Methodist Health Systems); Ms. Pat Freemy (North Arkansas); Mrs. Shirley Garison (Little Rock); Mr. Fred Garritson (Little Rock Rev. Ed Matthews (North Arkansas); Ms. Ann Schulze (Methodist Health Systems); Mr. Mary Truitt (North Arkansas); Rev. Joe Wilkerson (Little Rock); and, Dr. Larry Wrigi (North Arkansas).

This task force has met several times during the year and has used as a consultant, M Donovan Gardner, of the Program Department of Health & Welfare Ministries, Gener

Board of Global Ministries, New York City.

Based on the results of the meetings and the data gathered, we are attaching three do uments for your information: the Bylaws of United Methodist Senior Services of Arka sas, Inc.; the Covenant Relationship Statement between the two annual conferences ar United Methodist Senior Services of Arkansas, Inc.; and thirdly, a proposed budget an implementation plan.

It is recommended that the proposal to establish United Methodist Senior Services Arkansas, Inc. be approved by the two annual conferences at their annual sessions June, 1989, and that January 1, 1991 be established as the beginning date of Unit Methodist Senior Services of Arkansas, Inc. It is further recommended that the task for be continued to do promotion and cultivation of the mission and program of United Methodist Senior Services of Arkansas, Inc. and that each annual conference allocate \$500 during 1990 to underwrite the expenses of the task force.

Episcopacy Committee

Bishop and Members of the Annual Conference:

I appreciate the opportunity to make this report on behalf of the Conference Committee on Episcopacy.

In compliance with the disciplinary requirements, the Bishop convened this Committee November 19, 1988, and the Committee elected the officers, named an Executive Committee and began its work.

To orient the Committee to its functions, the secretary included paragraph 735 from the **Discipline** in the mailed minutes of our meeting. Briefly these are:

- to support the Bishop in the oversight of spiritual and temporal affairs of the church
- to be available to the Bishop for counsel
- to assist in determining the Area Episcopal needs and make recommendations to appropriate bodies
- to keep him advised concerning conditions within the area that affect relationships between him and the people of the conference agencies
- to interpret to the people and conference agencies the nature and functions of the Episcopal agencies
- have annual consultations and appraisal of the Bishop's work with respect to inclusiveness of all persons and understanding and implementing the consultation process in appointment making
- to report needs for Episcopal leadership to the Jurisdictional Committee on Episcopacy through the elected conference members of that committee. John Miles and I are the members from our conference.

The Jurisdictional Committee, recognizing that there was no uniform procedure for conference committees to guide their work, worked on and developed some guideline questions for the committees to consider.

The Executive Committee met, reviewed these questions and agreed that these should be sent to the Committee members prior to the full Committee meeting to guide us in our discussion and work. The questions were developed to help us fulfill the functions assigned us in the **Discipline**.

At the April 15 meeting at Camp Tamako, the members had looked at the agenda and guideline questions, and we were able to have some good dialogue around the strengths and perceived weaknesses of the Episcopacy.

Under the function to assist in determining the Episcopal area needs, we raised again the feasibility of making a study to merge the two conferences in the Arkansas Area. While the merger was not supported by all our members, we did have and passed a motion to make this recommendation at the combined meeting of the two Episcopal Committees. A study committee would be appointed by the Bishop. When this was discussed at the Area meeting, we decided that this was not the best time to do this.

The North Arkansas Committee had met prior to an invitation by the Bishop to have a combined meeting at the Episcopal residence May 7 making it possible for us to come together and share the results of each committee's work.

As one of our functions is to keep the Area advised concerning conditions that affect relationships between the Bishop and the people in the Conference agencies, and to interpret to you and to Conference agencies the nature and function of the Episcopal office, we invite you to keep us informed. This is the only way we can do our work. You should understand the consultation process set out in the **Discipline** and explained by the Bishop

in his address. You need to pay careful attention to the Finance and Administration Committee to understand the apportionments and see to the spiritual and administrative need of the Conference.

Most of our functions depend on the initiation of the Bishop or the people and conference agencies — to support — to be available — to assist — to interpret — the last two are initialed by the Committee to have consultations and to report to the Jurisdiction.

We're trying to be conscientious about the work you've given us to do. We want to be available and sensitive to the needs of the church in this Conference.

The Executive Committee is composed of Doris Fish, Chair; Tom Williams, Secretary; Kurt Bogan, John Miles and John Walker.

AND WHEREAS, the institution as a daughter of the State has continued to meet educational needs of the people of the Little Rock Conference and has continued to provide Arkansas Methodism with ministers and lay leaders;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Little Rock Annual Conference of The United Methodist Church extend congratulations to that University affectionately known as "Henderson" as she enters her centennial year and that the Conference ask the blessings of Almighty God on Henderson State University as she enters her second century of continuous service.

Independent Auditor's Report

We have audited the statements of assets, liabilities and fund balances — cash basis of the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church as of December 31, 1988 and 1987, and the related statement of changes in fund balances — cash basis for the years then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the church's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audits in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audits to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, the organization's policy is to prepare its financial statements on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements. Consequently, certain receipts and the related assets were recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain disbursements were recognized when paid rather than when the obligation was incurred. In addition, expenditures for capital assets were reflected as disbursements and are not shown as assets of the organization. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statements are not intended to be presented in conformity with generally accepted auditing principles.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities and fund balances of the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church as of December 31, 1988 and 1987, and changes in fund balances for the years then ended, on the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

Little Rock Conference Of The United Methodist Church Notes To Financial Statements December 31, 1988 And 1987

1. Summary Of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting — the financial statements of the Little Rock Conference of th United Methodist Church have been prepared on the cash basis. The records are hel open for approximately two weeks after year-end in order to include the remittance from the churches in the conference for the last few weeks of the year. This policy consistent with prior years.

2. Income Taxes

The Conference meets the requirements of section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenu Code and is therefore exempt from federal income taxes.

3. Cash Investments

All cash investments are recorded at cost plus interest income as received in the account. These balances approximate current market value of the particular investments. Due to the current nature of some of these investments, market quotations are not available.

Interest on the savings accounts is received quarterly. Interest on Dean Witter Intercapital Liquid Asset Fund and Fidelity Cash Reserves are received monthly. Interest

on all other cash investments is not recognized until maturity.

Interest earned on investments during 1988 was \$62,228.

The aggregate market value of short term cash investments was \$559,143 at December 31, 1988. Net unrealized losses amounted to \$6,348 which are considered immaterial and temporary in nature and will be reflected when realized.

4. Pension Plans

Substantially all conference employees are covered under one of the two defined contribution pension plans.

- a. Ministerial employees all ministerial employees, including the bishop, are covered under a defined contribution pension plan whereby the participant contributes 3% and the church or conference contributes 10% to 12% of the participants' annual contribution base (compensation) based on the conference average compensation as computed by the General Board of Pensions.
- b. Lay personnel all lay employees are covered under a defined contribution pension plan whereby the participant contributes 3% and the conference contributes 6% of the participants' annual contribution base (compensation).

Both of the aforementioned plans provide benefits upon retirement based on converting accumulated contributions for that participant to an annuity or an actuarily equivalent basis.

Both plans are multi-employer plans by which all contributed assets of participating employers are commingled and are not segregated by employer. This commingling of assets prevents a matching of individual employer's plan assets to plan liabilities.

Total pension cost for the years ended December 31, 1988 and 1987 were \$563,004 and \$540,697, respectively.

Dr. Marshall T. Steel

Dr. Marshall Turrentine Steel died in the Trinity Medical Center, Pine Bluff, on January 20, 1989. Dr. Steel had moved back to Pine Bluff where he had spent his teen age years while his father was pastor of the First United Methodist Church there. He was the son of the late Reverend Edward and Kate Steel.

After graduating from the Pine Bluff High School, Dr. Steel graduated, with honors, from Hendrix College. He earned the Bachelor of divinity degree from Union Theological Seminary. He received an honorary doctor of divinity degree from Hendrix College and an honorary doctor of laws degree from Southern Methodist University.

After serving the Methodist Churches in Bauxite, Carlisle and Monticello he was appointed to the Winfield United Methodist Church in Little Rock. Later, he was appointed to the Highland Park United Methodist Church in Dallas, Texas. Under his ministry the church quadrupled in membership to 8,600 and became the largest church in Methodism.

As a member of the United Methodist Church's National Board of Global Ministries, he visited mission stations worldwide.

Dr. Steel served on the board of directors of Arkansas Power and Light Company, Arkansas Bank and Trust Company, Hot Springs, Union National Bank in Little Rock, Southern Methodist University and Hendrix College.

He became the sixth president of Hendrix College. During his presidency Hendrix became one of the most prestigious liberal arts colleges in America.

In 1930 Dr. Steel married Ouita Burroughs who died in 1984. He later married Clara McConnell Stone of Pine Bluff, who survives him. Other survivors are a son, Dr. William E. Steel, Costa Mesa, Calif., a daughter, Sara Hill of Dallas; a stepson, Donald Stone of Jonesboro, 13 grandchildren and two great grandchildren. A son, Robert Steel preceeded him in death.

Funeral services were held in the First United Methodist Church of Pine Bluff by Fred H. Arnold, John W. Lindsay and William McElvaney. The service of committal was held in Graceland Cemetery with Bishop Paul Galloway officiating.





Otto W. Teague was born at Hollywood, Arkansas on October 2, 1900 and died October 22, 1988. A memorial service was held October 25 at First United Methodist Church in Beebe and burial was at Meadow Creek Cemetery in Beebe.

Annual Conference Structure

I. CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Book of Discipline: Para. 726

Responsible to Annual Conference

Responsibilities:

The Annual Conference Council on Ministries shall facilitate the church's program in the Annual Conference. The council will be responsible for the development and administration of the program of the Annual Conference and to encourage, coordinate, and support the conference agencies, districts, and local churches in their ministry and various programs.

Membership:

- 1. The membership shall consist of the presiding Bishop; the District Superintendents; The chairperson of each conference Program Area, Task Force, Advocacy Group, and District Council on Ministries and the Chairperson of the Coordinating Committee on Professional Ministries; one representative of the UMY; the President of the Conference UMW; the President of the Conference UMM; the Conference Lay Leader; Age Level and Family Life Coordinators; and one lay person from each district.
- 2. The person or persons serving as members of the General and Jurisdictional Council on Ministries shall be a member(s) of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries.
- The following are members of the Council without vote: salaried and volunteer Annual Conference (or Area) staff; and one member of the Council on Finance and Administration.

Officers:

- 1. The officers shall be a Chairperson, a Vice-Chairperson, and a Secretary. The Conference Treasurer shall be the treasurer of the Annual Conference Council on Ministries. The officers shall be elected by the Council.
- At the end of the quadrennium, or when a vacancy occurs, the Chairperson shall appoint a Nominating Committee of four persons to present nominations of new officers to the Council at their next regular stated meeting.
- 3. There shall be an Executive Committee consisting of the officers, the Bishop, one District Superintendent, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference Council Director, and the elected representative of the General Council on Ministries. One half of the members of the Committee shall be lay persons. The Conference Council Executive Committee shall also serve as the Personnel Committee. The Executive Committee shall meet upon call of the Chairperson and/or Director. The Executive Committee shall have the authority to act on behalf of the Conference Council on Ministries between regular meetings.
- 4. The Council shall elect, upon nomination by the Bishop and District Superintendents, an executive officer to be known as the Conference Council Director. The Director shall be the chief executive officer of the Council.

Meetings:

The Conference Council on Ministries shall have a minimum of two regular meetings annually. Special meetings shall convene upon the call of the Chairperson, Bishop, and/or Council Director.

Staff:

All employed Conference Council staff persons shall be employed by and responsible to the Conference Council Director and/or the Conference Council on Ministries. Ordained Ministers on the staff are subject to appointment by the presiding Bishop. The maximum tenure for the Conference Council Director and the Associate Council Director(s) shall be eight consecutive years.

Divisions:

The Conference Council on Ministries shall be structured in four departments: (1) Discipleship; (2) Outreach; (3) Coordinated Ministry; (4) Advocacy.

A. Discipleship

1. CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF EDUCATION

Book of Discipline: Para. 729.2

Responsible to the Conference Council on Ministries

There shall be a standing Conference Council Board of Christian Education.

Responsibilities

- A. Foster and direct a plan of Christian Education that encourages an experience in Christ and the development of a well-rounded Christian character, that gives children youth, young adults, and older adults a knowledge of and experience in the Christian ministry and other church occupations. It shall promote church school extension, the program of Christian Education, the use of United Methodist church school literature, Christian vocations, Camp Tanako, and fulfill other responsibilities as listed in Paragraph 729.2 of the 1988 Book of Discipline.
- B. Oversee the Conference Camping Ministry. A Coordinating Committee on Camping shall be established and shall be responsible to plan the camping program of the conference in conjunction with the appropriate conference and district coordinators. The Committee shall be composed of the Chairperson of the Camp Tanako Board of Trustees and one additional member of the Board nominated by the Board; the Director and Associate Director of the CCOM; the Resident Agent of Camp Tanako; the Chairperson of the Conference Council Board of Education and one additional member of the Board nominated by the Board; a District Camping Coordinator from each of the six districts nominated by the District Superintendent; and a Conference Camping Coordinator to be the Chairperson of the Coordinating Committee to be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference. Each local church shall elect a Local Church Camping Coordinator who shall have major responsibility to coordinate and promote camping among the congregation. The Board of Trustees of Camp Tanako shall have charge of all property matters, physical care, and paid personnel employed to maintain and operate
- C. Assist the District Councils in their ministry.

Membership:

Camp Tanako.

A Chairperson for the Conference Council Board of Education shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference. Each District Chairperson of Education and one other person from each District (one representative shall be lay and the other clergy) nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference; Conference Age-Level Coordinators; one representative from the UMY, UMW, UMM (selected by their respective groups); one District Superintendent; and the Associate Director of the Conference Council in charge of camping.

2. CONFERENCE WORK AREA ON STEWARDSHIP

Book of Discipline: Para. 729.5

Responsible to the Conference Council on Ministries

A Chairperson for the Work Area of Stewardship shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

A Task Force shall be appointed, as needed, by the Conference Council on Ministries and/or the Executive Committee of the Conference Council on Ministries in consultation with the Chairperson of the Work Area on Stewardship and the Conference Council Director.

3. CONFERENCE COUNCIL WORK AREA ON WORSHIP

Book of Discipline: Para. 729.4

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

A Chairperson for the Work Area on Worship shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

A Task Force shall be appointed, as needed, by the Conference Council on Ministries and/or the Executive Committee of the Conference Council on Ministries in consultation with the Chairperson of the Work Area on Worship and the Conference Council Director.

. CONFERENCE COUNCIL WORK AREA ON EVANGELISM

Book of Discipline: Para. 729.3

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

A Chairperson for the Work Area on Evangelism shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

A Task Force shall be appointed, as needed, by the Conference Council on Ministries in consultation with the Chairperson of the Work Area on Evangelism and the Conference Council Director.

6. CONFERENCE TASK FORCE ON LAITY

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

The Task Force on Laity shall be chaired by the Conference Lay Leader.

A Task Force shall be appointed, as needed, by the Conference Council on Ministries and/or the Executive Committee of the Conference Council on Ministries in consultation with the Conference Lay Leader and the Conference Council Director, giving due reference to paragraph 706, 1988 Book of Discipline and Section V.A.3 of the Standing Rules of the Annual Conference.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

There shall be a standing Conference Council Board of Global Ministries. Responsibilities:

The Board shall be divided into two major Committees: Missionary Education and Cultivation, and Parish and Community Development.

District Chairpersons of Global Ministries; Conference Secretary of Global Ministries (1987); Conference Coordinator for Christian Global Concerns for the UMW; a District Superintendent; and eight members at large, one of which shall be elected by the Board as the Volunteers in Missions Coordinator.

CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF HIGHER EDUCATION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

There shall be a standing Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry. esponsibilities:

Receive annually reports from the Campus Ministry Units, Philander Smith College and Hendrix College.

Recommend improvements in facilities, program, finance and personnel for campus ministry units.

Approve the purchase or sale of property, and the plans for any new building, includ-C. ing a parsonage, proposed by the Campus Ministry Unit and the financial program covering the liquidation of its cost. Approval is also required by the District Committee on Church Location Building.

 In addition to the Chairperson, a vice-Chairperson and Secretary shall be elected from among the members of the committee.

B. Board Of Ordained Ministry

Book Of Discipline: Para. 733

Responsible to Annual Conference

Membership:

No less than six clergy in full connection. They shall be nominated by the Bishop after consultation with the Chairperson, the Executive Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry, and the Cabinet.

Membership may include a retired clergy in full connection. 2.

Membership shall include women, persons of ethnic minority, and one person in an 3. appointment beyond the local church. Two thirds of the Board shall be graduates of seminaries approved by the University Senate.

The board shall select from its own membership an official representative to serve 4. on each District Committee on Ordained Ministry, preferably from within said dis-

trict.

5. Two District Superintendents without vote.

Officers shall be elected by the membership.

C. Board Of Diaconal Ministry

Book of Discipline: Para. 734

Responsible to Annual Conference

Membership:

No less than nine persons of whom at least one third shall be in Diaconal Ministry. They shall be nominated by the Bishop after consultation with the Executive Committee of the Board.

2. A District Superintendent.

3. Officers shall be elected from the membership.

D. Committee On Episcopacy

Book of Discipline: Para, 735

Responsible to Annual Conference

Membership:

The members shall consist of three laywomen, three laymen, three clergy, and three at-large members. These persons shall be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

Three additional members shall be appointed by the Bishop. 2.

3. Five members shall be clergy.

One of the lay members shall be the Conference Lay Leader. One of the lay members shall be a member of the Jurisdictional Episcopacy Committee. One of the clergy members shall be a member of the Jurisdictional Episcopacy Committee.

E. Board Of Pensions

Book of Discipline: Para. 737

Responsible to Annual Conference

Membership:

- The Chairperson shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee.
- 2. No less than twelve persons nominated by Conference Nominating Committee. Membership shall include one third laywomen, one third laymen, and one third clergy. The Chairperson of the Committee on Insurance shall serve as ex-officio member to the Board of Pensions, without vote.
- 3. The person serving as a member of the General Board of Pensions shall be a member of the Annual Conference Board of Pensions.
- Members may not be in debt to the General Board of Pensions or receiving a pen-4. sion from the General Board of Pensions.
- 5. One District Superintendent.

F. Commission On Equitable Salaries

Book of Discipline: Para. 722

Responsible to Annual Conference

Membership:

- 1. The Chairperson shall be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee.
- 2. There shall be twelve members, nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee, to include six clergy and six laity. The laity members shall be comprised of one person from each district.
- 3. A District Superintendent.
- One lay member and one clergy shall represent churches of fewer than two hundred members.

G. Committee On Insurance

Book of Discipline: None

Responsible to Annual Conference

Responsibilities:

1. Administer the Conference Insurance Program

Membership:

- The Chairperson shall be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee.
- 2. One District Superintendent named by the Cabinet shall be a member.
- Six persons nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

H. Standing Task Forces

(To serve only upon call)

1. JOINT COMMITTEE ON DISABILITY

Book of Discipline: Para.744

Responsible to Annual Conference

Two members from the Board of Ordained Ministry and two members from the Board of Pensions elected by the respective Boards, and one District Superintendent appointed by the Bishop.

2. COMMITTEE ON INVESTIGATIONS

Book of Discipline: Para. 2623.3. Responsible to Annual Conference

Seven elders in Full Connection and three reserves nominated by the Bishop. None shall be members of the Joint Review Committee or the Board of Ordained Ministry.

3. JOINT REVIEW COMMITTEE

Book of Discipline: Para. 455.lc. Responsible to Annual Conference

Two District Superintendents appointed by the Bishop; two Board of Ordained Ministry members appointed by the Chairperson of the Board; and two non-cabinet, non-Board members in full connection, one nominated by the Bishop and Cabinet, the other by the Board of Ordained Ministry. An alternate for all three categories shall be named and shall not be a member of the Cabinet or Board and shall be nominated by the Bishop

and Cabinet.
4. BOARD OF MANAGERS, ARKANSAS' PASTOR'S SCHOOL

Book of Discipline: None

Responsible to Annual Conference Chairperson of Board of Ministry Chairperson of Board of Education Director of Conference Council on Ministries Chairperson of Board of Diaconal Ministry Two At-Large Board of Ministry Members Staff Representative of Hendrix College

Responsibilities:

Coordinate the program development and the running of Pastor's School along with Representatives of the North Arkansas Annual Conference Boards and Agencies.

IV. DISTRICT STRUCTURE A. District Council On Ministries

Book of Discipline: Para. 749

Responsible to Annual Conference, the Annual Conference Council on Ministries, and the Churches within the District.

Membership:

- 1. Membership shall include: the Chairperson; District Superintendent; District Lay Leader; District President of United Methodist Women; District President of United Methodist Youth; and a maximum of six at-large members; a Conference Council Staff person.
- 2. Additional Membership may include as needed:
 - a. Work Area Chairpersons of Education; Stewardship; Worship; Global Ministries; Higher Education & Campus Ministry; Church & Society; Christian Unity & Interreligious Concerns; and Communications.
 - b. Age Level Coordinators for Children; Youth; Young Adults; Older Adults; and Family.
 - Representatives from the advocacy groups of Status & Role of Women; and Religion and Race.
- 3. The Chairperson shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference. The Council shall elect the Vice-Chairperson and Secretary from within its elected membership.
- 4. The District Superintendent, not eligible to serve as Chairperson, is the Council's executive officer, and shall be responsible for implementation of program.
- 5. Shall meet on call of the Chairperson and/or the District Superintendent.
- 6. Committees and Task Forces may be formed as needed.
- Membership is nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

B. Administration

1. DISTRICT NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Book of Discipline: None

Responsible to Annual Conference, Annual Conference Nominating Committee, and the District Stewards.

Responsibilities:

- A. The Committee shall nominate annually the following:
 - 1. One lay member of the Conference Nominating Committee to be elected by the Annual Conference.
 - 2. Members of the Committee on District Superintendency as prescribed by the **Discipline** (Para. 754) to be elected by the Annual Conference.
 - 3. Chairperson and a maximum of six at-large members of the District Council on Ministries to be elected by the Annual Conference.
 - 4. Additional members of the District Council on Ministries as may be prescribed by district or conference structure; district representatives to conference boards, commissions, and committees, as needed; and other offices deemed necessary by the district or conference structure. Election by the Annual Conference.
 - 5. District Trustees, members of the District Board on Church Location & Building, District Treasurer, and other district officers as needed. Election by the District Board of Stewards.

- B. Annually request from local churches the names of persons who may be considered for nomination.
- C. Vacancies may be filled by appointment of the District Superintendent until the next election.

Membership:

- A. The District Superintendent shall be the chairperson with vote.
- Six persons to include three lay and three clergy members.
- The term of office for elected members shall be three years in rotation. No elected C. member may serve two consecutive terms.
- The District Superintendent be granted the authority to appoint an ethnic represen-D. tative to serve on the committee if ethnic representation is not present.
- DISTRICT BOARD OF STEWARDS 2.

Responsibilities:

- A. Shall meet at least annually on call of the District Superintendent.
- To receive from the District Superintendents and Conference Council Staff the program and financial requirements adopted at the previous Annual Conference Session and report to the local church Committee on Finance, Council on Ministries/ Administrative Board or Administrative Council.
- Elect District Trustees, Members of the District Committee on Church Location & Building; the District Treasurer; and other district officers as needed.
- D. Elect members of the District Nominating Committee by nomination from the floor.
- Adopt the District Administration Fund Budget; and approve any other funds which relate to financial needs or programs within the district.
- Recommend apportionments to the churches for all district funds as needed.

Membership:

- The District Superintendent shall be the Chairperson.
- B. One lay person from each Church within the district elected by the Charge Conference.
- C. The District Treasurer.
- 3. DISTRICT BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Book of Discipline: Para. 2517.2

Responsible to Annual Conference

Responsibilities:

Report annually to the District Board of Stewards concerning the state of the district parsonage and any other properties held in trust by the District Board of Trustees Membership:

- The Chairperson shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the District Board of Stewards.
- Three to nine lay persons nominated by the District Nominating Committee and В. elected by the District Board of Stewards.
- DISTRICT BOARD ON CHURCH LOCATION AND BUILDING

Book of Discipline: Para. 2518-2523

Responsible to Annual Conference

Responsibilities:

Report annually to the District Board of Stewards

Membership:

- The District Superintendent who shall be the Chairperson.
- Six persons to include three lay and three clergy members. Nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the District Board of Stewards.

C. Ministry

DISTRICT COMMITTEE ON ORDAINED MINISTRY

Book of Discipline: Para. 752

Responsible to the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry.

Membership:

- The District Superintendent and at least five other members in full connection in the district, including women and ethnic clergy, whenever possible, nominated annually by the District Superintendent in consultation with the Chairperson or Executive Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry and approved by the Annual Conference. Interim vacancies may be filled by the District Superintendent. В.
 - The District Superintendent shall not be the Chairperson (Para. 521.2).
- C. One representative named by the Conference Board of Ministry, who may serve as Chairperson.

COMMITTEE ON DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENCY

Book of Discipline: Para. 754

Responsible to the Annual Conference.

Membership:

- The Chairperson shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the District Board of Stewards.
- The District Lay Leader, two laywomen, two laymen, two clergy, and two at-large В. members nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.
- Two additional persons appointed by the District Superintendent.
- There shall be at least three clergy members and at least seven lay members.

V. THE STANDING RULES

A. Annual Conference

- 1. Annual Conference Membership: The voting membership of the Annual Conference shall be composed of clergy and laity in equal number.
- a. Clergy members include: Elders in Full Connection; Probationary Members; Associate Members; and Full-Time Local Pastors. Elders and Associate members in the retired relationship continue as voting members of the Annual Conference.
- b. Lay members include: (1) persons elected as lay member by each charge conference. One lay member shall be elected to correspond to each clergy appointed to the charge. (2) Two youth members elected annually by each District Council of the United Methodist Youth. (3) Conference President of United Methodist Women, Conference President of United Methodist Men. (4) Conference Lay Leader. (5) Each District Lay Leader. (6) Diaconal Ministers. (7) Lay Chairpersons of Conference Boards, Committees, and Commissions. (8) Delegates to General & Jurisdictional Conference for the quadrennium following their election.
- c. The formula for balancing the Conference shall be: (1) An equal number of "at large" delegates from each district selected by the District Nominating Committee. These "at large" delegates shall be from Churches with membership of less than 200. After the balance has been determined, the Council office shall notify these persons in writing of their delegate status at least 60 days prior to the Annual Conference.
- d. The names and addresses of all members of the Annual Conference shall be reported to the Conference Secretary at least ninety days prior to the opening day of the Annual Conference.

BOARD SERVICE:

- a. Elective membership on any specific board, agency, committee of the Little Rock Annual Conference may not exceed eight consecutive years, excepting ex-officio membership on the Conference Council on Ministries. Membership begins upon election with the date noted in the Conference Journal.
- b. There are two types of membership on Annual Conference boards, committees, commissions and councils; at large and ex-officio. A person may serve in only one

at-large and one ex-officio capacity.

- c. The membership of the Committee on Review; the Committee on the Annual Conference; the Committee on Episcopacy, the Conference Nominating Committee and members of the Cabinet & Conference Staff shall be exempt from the provisions of (a) and (b).
- d. No person from the Little Rock Conference, clergy or lay, shall serve as an elected trustee of more than one United Methodist related institution within the bounds of the Arkansas Area at a time. "Within the bounds of" these United Methodist related institutions are understood to be the following: Hendrix College, Philander Smith College, Aldersgate, Methodist Children's Home, the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas, the Wesley Foundations, Little Rock Conference Camp Tanako, and Mt. Sequoyah Assembly.
- e. Any person(s) serving on a General or Jurisdictional Board or Agency shall be a member with vote on the corresponding Board or Agency of the Annual Conference
- f. No person serving on the Conference Council on Finance and Administration shall serve on any Annual Conference Board or Agency receiving funds from the Council on Finance and Administration.

3. TASK FORCE SERVICE:

- a. Membership on Task Forces shall be inclusive of ethnic minorities and persons from small membership churches. A balance of laymen, laywomen and clergy shall be the norm.
- b. The norm of Task Force membership shall be a broad base of participation from throughout the Conference.
- c. Persons are limited to membership on one Conference task force at a given time. Emphasis shall be given to non-consecutive membership from one conference task force to another conference task force.

B. Financial Administration

- 1. FISCAL YEAR. The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from January 1 to December 31.
- 2. FINANCIAL AND STATISTICAL.
 - a. All reporting of Conference funds shall be made in whole dollars.
 - b. Each pastor shall make an annual statistical and financial report to the District Superintendent who shall submit the reports to the Conference Statistician.
- 3. ADMINISTRATIVE FUND. The Council on Finance and Administration shall recommend an apportionment for a Conference Administrative Fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the pre-conference report, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of preparing and printing the Worship Booklet for the Annual Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expenses of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this Fund. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of the Fund. Payments for unbudgeted claims on this fund shall be made on vouchers signed by the Chairman of the Council on Finance and Administration or the Conference Secretary.
- 4. PROGRAM BUDGETS. Budgets for expenditures for program for the District and the Conference shall be coordinated by the Conference Council on Ministries. The Conference Council on Ministries shall make recommendations to the Council on Finance and Administration which shall make a final recommendation to the Annual Conference.

C. Conference Procedure

- RULES OF ORDER. The Rules of Order shall be Robert's Rules of Order revised. 1.
- PRE-CONFERENCE REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS. There shall be a pre-conference report which shall contain reports of all program boards and agencies of the Conference. This report shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. The pre-conference reports shall be typewritten, in triplicate, on special forms furnished by the Conference and obtained from the Conference Secretary. In the event editing of a report is deemed necessary by the Conference Secretary and Chairperson of the Board involved, permission is hereby granted.
- FLOOR RESOLUTIONS. Any resolution not sponsored by a regular board or 3. standing committee or Task Force of the Conference must lay on the table for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon, provided, however, immediate debate and action may be ordered by two-thirds vote of the Conference present and voting. If the floor resolution calls for a change in the structure or standing rules, it must be submitted to a review by the Committee on Review which will recommend concurrence or non-concurrence.
- 4. CONFERENCE EXPENSE FUND.
 - a. Registration fees and offerings taken at the Annual Conference shall be administered by the Conference Treasurer and shall be used to defray the expenses of the session.
 - b. The Conference Treasurer shall pay a per diem to retired ministers for days actually in attendance at Annual Conference and be reimbursed from the Conference Expense Fund. Eligibility shall be determined by the Conference Board of Pensions.
 - c. Any deficit in the Conference Expense Fund shall be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund.
 - d. The Conference Expense Fund shall be administered by the Committee on the Annual Conference.
- UNBUDGETED EXPENDITURES. When any proposal is submitted to the Annual Conference which involves the expenditure of funds not included in the Council on Finance and Administration report, such a proposal shall be referred for advice and recommendation to the Council on Finance and Administration and brought back to the same session of the Annual Conference for a vote to be taken by the Conference. No unbudgeted expenditures shall be submitted within the last twenty-four hours of a Conference Session. 6.
 - CAMPAIGNS. All Conference-wide campaigns to raise funds shall be voted on by written ballot of the Conference.
 - MEMOIRS. There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased clerical member of the Conference. A picture of the deceased shall be published with the memoir. The same shall be done for probationary members, associate members and local pastors. Likewise, a memoir of spouses of the above shall be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Conference Secretary the death of any of the above mentioned and be responsible for the submission of memoirs not later than thirty days after the death occurs. The names or memoirs of deceased laypersons who have been active in the Conference sessions, or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. It shall be the duty of the District Superintendents to report to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions the death of any conference claimant that occurs in their respective districts. HISTORICAL MATERIAL.
 - - a. The Library at Hendrix College shall be the depository for all historical documents and artifacts of the Little Rock Conference. The College Librarian shall be

the custodian of these historical materials.

b.) The Editor of the ARKANSAS UNITED METHODIST shall submit to the Commission on Archives and History a group picture of the class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his/her retirement.

9. CONFERENCE STRUCTURE

a. At the beginning of each quadrennium the Conference Structure shall be reviewed.

b. The first year of each quadrennium the Conference Structure shall be published in the Conference Journal. In each succeeding year of the quadrennium any changes in the structure shall be published in the Conference Journal immediately following the Standing Rules.

10. DISTRIBUTION OF CONFERENCE JOURNALS. The Conference secretary shall mail a copy of the Conference Journal to active and retired clergy, seminarians, all probationary members, lay members of the Annual Conference and chairpersons of conference boards, committees and agencies.

D. Amendments

The Conference Structure and these rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.


