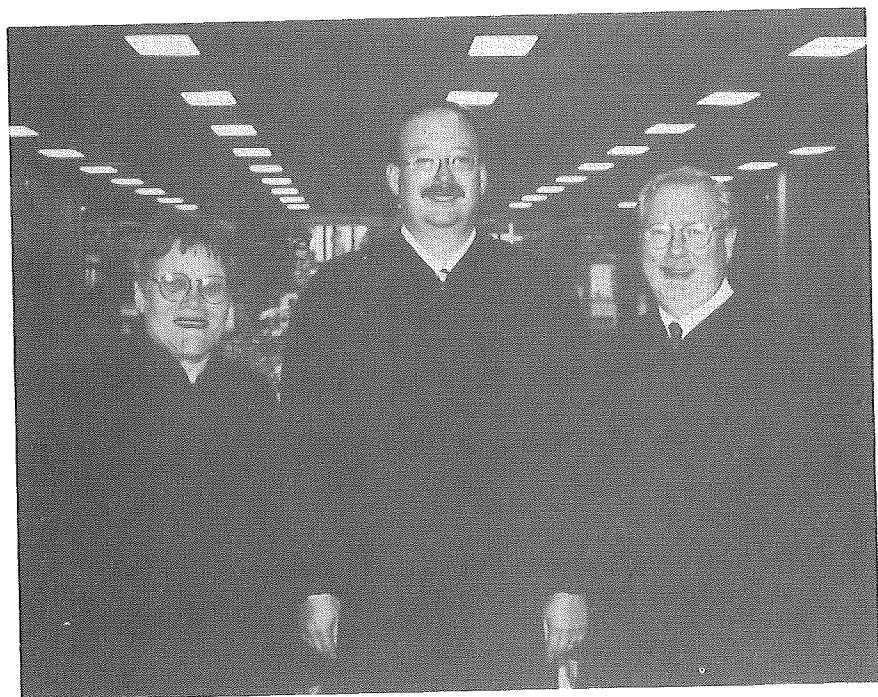

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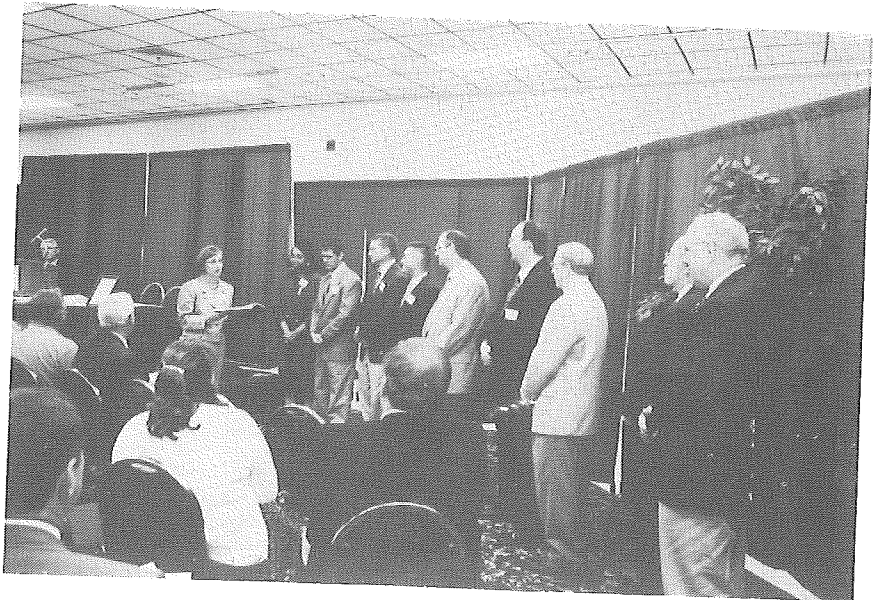

IV. MINUTES OF THE 1999 CONFERENCE

A. Minutes of the Annual Conference, June 9-12, 1999

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON, JUNE 9, 1999

EXECUTIVE SESSION:

An executive session of the clergy was held at the Pine Bluff Convention Center, Banquet Room 3 in Pine Bluff, at 4 p.m., on Wednesday, June 9, 1999, and the Report of the Board of Ordained Ministry of the Little Rock Annual Conference, dated June 9, 1999, was approved. (See Board or Ordained Ministry Report.)

WEDNESDAY EVENING, JUNE 9, 1999

The Celebrant was Janice Riggle Huie, resident bishop of the Arkansas Area of the United Methodist Church; the preacher was Dr. Billy Abraham, Albert C. Outler Professor of Wesley Studies at Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University; the lay reader was Taylor James, Vice-President of the Little Rock Conference Council on Youth Ministries; the liturgist was Dr. Charles Donaldson; the conference organist was Diane Snider, organist at First United Methodist Church, Pine Bluff; the Massed Choir was conducted by Jim Maase, organist at Pulaski Heights United Methodist Church, Little Rock; the Massed Choir included members from the choirs of First UMC, Henderson UMC, Pulaski Heights UMC, and Winfield UMC, all of Little Rock; the brass ensemble included Eugene King, Lorie Sheppard, Denis Winter, and David Carter.

THURSDAY MORNING, JUNE 10, 1999

LAITY SESSION:

The Laity session was held at the Pine Bluff Convention Center auditorium in Pine Bluff, at 8 a.m. on Thursday, June 10, 1999.

CALL TO ORDER:

Bishop Janice Riggle Huie called the 146th Session of the Little Rock Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church to order at 9:35 a.m. by asking Greg Taylor to lead the Conference in singing, "And Are We Yet Alive?" Bishop Huie made her opening remarks, referring to Colossians 3, and asked the group to break into small groups and share their dreams about the conference and pray together. She then called on Bill Waddell, Little Rock Conference Lay Leader, to open the conference with prayer.

BEGINNING MOTIONS AND OPENING REMARKS FOR THE 1999 SESSION OF THE LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCE:

Bob Hager, Conference Secretary, presented the following motions and procedures: I welcome you to the 146th Session of the Little Rock Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church. I move the following recommendations and nominations:

1.I move that the Bar of the Conference shall be Rows A through T of the Pine Bluff Convention Center Auditorium. Members desiring to have a voice and vote must be seated within the bar. Visitors will be given the privilege of sitting within the Bar of the Conference, but without vote. Color coded identification badges will be given to all voting delegates and shall be worn at all times as an indication of voting privileges.

2.I move that the Agenda for the Little Rock Annual Conference meeting June 9-12, 1999, will be the agenda printed in the Pre-Conference Journal, with the provision that it may be adjusted as the need arises.

5.The Official Roll will be taken from the registration cards. This information will be used to record names, addresses, and attendance at the 1999 session of the Little Rock Annual Conference, and will be printed in the 1999 Conference Journal.

6.The Policy Statements found on pages 285-300 of the 1998 Little Rock Conference Journal (The Church Extension Funding Policy, the Equitable Compensation Policy, the Parsonage Guidelines, the Moving expense policy, the Rental/Housing Allowances Policy, the Sexual Harassment Policy, the Ministerial Assistance Fund Policy, and the Vacation Guidelines Policy) shall be adopted as printed unless amended by this Conference during the report of the sponsoring agency.

GENERAL PROCESS:

Anyone desiring the floor of the Conference shall be within the Bar of the Conference and upon recognition by the Chair, shall move to a microphone stating name, local church or area of responsibility.

All motions, resolutions, reports, or amendments not already submitted shall be submitted in duplicate to the Conference Secretary's desk before the time of presentation. All motions and resolutions made on the floor of Annual Conference shall be legibly written and signed on forms supplied by the Conference Secretary and shall be in the hands of the Secretary and Presiding officer before any action or vote can be taken by the Conference.

Debate on each motion or resolution shall be limited to three two-minute speeches for the motion or resolution and three two-minute speeches against the same (excluding persons rising for points of order, amendments, or final summations.)

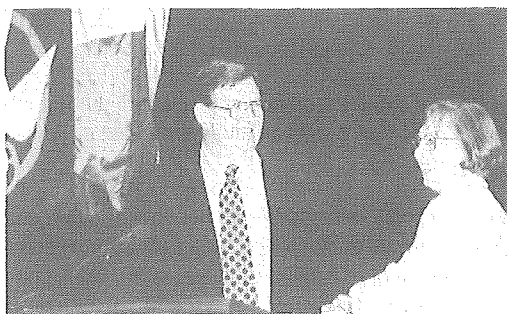
All resolutions not printed in the Pre-Conference Journal must be distributed in writing to the delegates and lay on the table for 24 hours before being debated and acted upon. If the floor resolution calls for a change in the structure or standing rules of the Conference, it must be submitted to a review by the Committee of Review which will recommend concurrence or non-concurrence.

All items for general distribution shall be prepared and distributed by the sponsoring person or agency at their own expense.

All copy for the Journal shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary not later than the close of the Annual Conference session. All material to be published in the journal which does not meet this deadline shall be excluded unless specific permission for delay is granted by the Annual Conference. The Conference Secretary shall be authorized to edit all reports for printing in the Journal. Addresses delivered to the Conference, except for the Episcopal Address and Conference Lay Leader=s Report, shall not be printed in the Journal unless clear instruction to do so is given by the Annual Conference to the Conference Secretary. The Annual Conference sessions shall be governed by the Standing Rules (printed in the Pre-Conference Journal); otherwise, Roberts Rules of Order; all of which shall comply with the Discipline of the United Methodist Church.

WELCOME TO PINE BLUFF:

Mrs. Bettie Pierce introduced Mr. Bill Brummett, City Councilman, who welcomed the Conference to Pine Bluff, and provided information about Pine Bluff and told of points of interest in Pine Bluff.

INTRODUCTION OF BOB HUIE:

Rev. Therral Wilson introduced Rev. Bob Huie, spouse of Bishop Huie. The Conference received him warmly. Rev. Huie addressed the Conference with humor.

COMMISSION ON EQUITABLE COMPENSATION:

Mr. Stark Ligon, Chair of the Commission on Equitable Compensation, presented the report (See Reports). Mr. Ligon made the motion to increase the minimum base compensation for full time-full connection \$23,500; full-time associate, \$22,500; full-time local pastor, \$21,500. The motion was seconded and passed. The full report was before the Conference. The Conference received the report.

BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY:

Rev. Charles Settle, Chair of the Board of Ordained Ministry introduced those who are receiving Permanent Deacons Orders: Vicki Jo Reagan, James Scott Moore, and James R. Rusty Johnson. Then he introduced those who are being elected and ordained Elders in Full Connection under the 1992 Discipline: Maxine Allen, John Jeffery Jones, Randall Hundley Jones, Charles Lee Sigman, and Todd-Paul Ryan Taulbee. Those who will be commissioned as Probationary Members under the 1996 Discipline: Robert David Jones and Randall Reddin. Randall Reddin's orders were received from the American Baptist Church. David Andrew Moore was elected as an Associate Member. Bishop Huie held a brief commissioning service for David Jones and Randall Reddin. Rev. Settle invited everyone to the reception honoring these persons in the foyer of the Convention Center following the Friday evening worship service. The full report was before the Conference. The Conference approved the adoption of the report.

EPISCOPAL ADDRESS:

Bishop Janice Riggle Huie gave her State of the Church address (See Reports). Her report included interaction with the Conference participants. Bishop Huie expressed special appreciation to the Board of Global Ministries for help the two conferences have received throughout the last year.

She then called on Lewis See to speak about the Area Ministry. As Area Director of Ministry, he introduced a video which described the Area Staff and their work.

Rev. C. E. McAdoo then came forward to speak about the Arkansas Initiative to Strengthen the Black Church in the 21st Century.

The Conference received her report enthusiastically.

COMMITTEE ON EPISCOPACY:

David Wilson, Chair of the Committee on Episcopacy, presented the report (See Reports), and commented on the arctic temperature in the auditorium (received enthusiastically). The report was adopted by the Conference.

AREA PERSONNEL COMMITTEE:

Roy Smith, Chair of the Area Personnel Committee, presented the report (See Reports). He moved the following:: "The Area Personnel Committee commends the outstanding job of the current Area Staff members. Their work in core areas of ministry is exemplary. The Committee affirms that the areas of ministry being addressed are making a difference helping local churches better make disciples for Jesus Christ. In an effort to continue and to strengthen the work that has already begun, the Area Personnel Committee offers the following proposal for addressing the re-evaluation of ministry priorities.

In the fall of 1997, an in-depth analysis and review of priorities for the ministry offices in the Area Ministry Office was conducted. This analysis involved local churches, District Councils on Ministry, and the Conference Councils on Ministry. The report was approved at the called session of the Annual Conferences on February 7, 1998.

The Area Personnel Committee recommends an in-depth review and prioritizing of ministry areas be conducted every four years. If a new priority area of ministry, and/or replacement priority arises during the four years an analysis of such need can be undertaken. The Area Personnel Committee would be authorized to conduct such an analysis involving input from local churches, District Councils on Ministry, Conference Councils on Ministry, relevant Boards and Agencies and officials of the Annual Conference. Under this plan the next in-depth analysis of priorities would be presented to the Annual Conferences in 2002.

The motion was before the Conference. The motion was passed unanimously.

CLERGY AND LAY BALLOT NO. 1:

Bishop Huie called for the first ballot by asking Bob Hager to give election instructions to the body. He made the following motion: I move that on the first ballot only, only the names of those persons be read who receive two or more votes, and on all the following ballots only the names of those persons receiving five or more votes will be read. The Order of the Day was the introduction of those retiring and the service of worship. 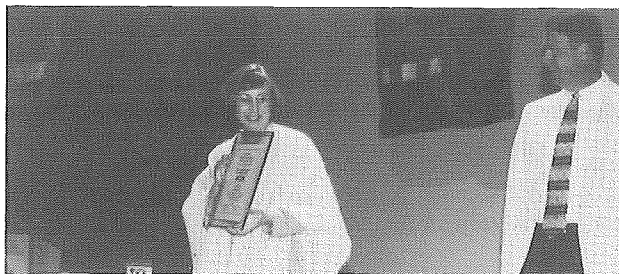

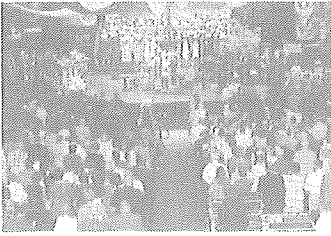

Bishop Huie called for clergy and lay ballot #13 by asking Rev. Kissa Hamilton to offer a pre-ballot prayer.

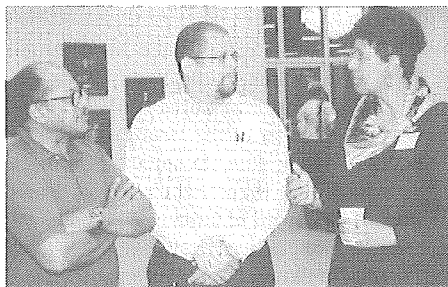
ANNOUNCEMENTS:

HONORABLE ORDER OF JERUSALEM:

Bishop Huie presented the Honorable Order of Jerusalem from the World Methodist Council to Dr. Bennie Warner, Camden District superintendent and former bishop of Liberia. The Conference gave him a standing ovation.

The proclamation read: "Be it hereby known, Dr. Bennie Warner, having faithfully served on the Presidium of the World Methodist Council, 1976-1981, and in recognition of the singular contribution you made in the international service of its life, you, Bennie Warner,

Sarah Spencer, Executive Director of Camp Aldersgate, presented a resolution to make Camp Aldersgate a United Methodist Historic Site. The Conference passed the resolution unanimously.

HENDRIX COLLEGE:

Dr. Ann Die, President of Hendrix College, presented the report with the assistance of Rev. Wayne Clark, Associate Chaplain, Rev. Rock Jones, Chaplain and Vice President, Rev. Jack Wilson, and students, Amy Swesey and Mark Holland.

Rev. Jack Wilson, from the Hendrix Board of Trustees, proposed two amendments to the charter of Hendrix College. These read as follows:

ARTICLE II, SECTION 1 – pertains to Board of Trustees membership.

Paragraph 1(f): change title to conform with Arkansas Area restructuring: The Area Director on Ministries of the Arkansas Area, or such other person or persons holding substantially similar offices as may be designated by Conferences in the Area.

ARTICLE II, SECTION 3 – pertains to length of terms for Trustees.

Add the following: In unusual cases, the Board of Trustees may elect to extend a trustee's term for up to an additional six years for trustee membership for exceptional service and leadership when it is considered to be in the best interest of the College. Any recommendation for such action will originate in the Committee on Trustees and be approved by the Executive Committee and the Board of Trustees. Any trustee whose term is extended under this provision will be eligible to serve on any committee or in any office.

The Conference approved the amendments.

CLERGY BALLOT #13:

There were 105 ballots cast; 102 were valid. Needed for election – 52. There was one election: Charles Settle with 52 votes. Other ballots cast were: Paulette O'Dell, 45; Jeanie Burton, 36; Bill Robinson, 23; Roy Smith, 13; Bruce Bennett, 6; Rebekah Miles, 5.

LAY BALLOT #13:

There were 115 ballots cast; 111 were valid. Needed for election – 56. There was one election: Bill Waddell with 81 votes. Other ballots cast were: Mattie Mae Rice, 22.

CLERGY AND LAY BALLOT #14:

Bishop Huie called for Clergy and Lay Ballot #14 by calling on Jimmy Boyd to lead the pre-ballot prayer. The clergy will be voting one delegate to Jurisdictional Conference. The laity will be voting on two reserve delegates to Jurisdictional Conference.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION:

Dr. Marvin Loyd, Chair of the Council on Finance and Administration, and Mr. Joe Eason, Area Treasurer, presented the report (See Reports).

AMENDMENT TO THE REPORT:

David Leach offered the following amendment: That "Camp Tanako" be added to the Conference Advance Specials. There was some discussion. The amendment passed.

COUNCIL ON FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION:

The full report was before the Conference. There is an editorial change on page 42, line 34, change to "Catch the Vision: and line 22 add the words "following notice of CFA approval." On line 14 it should be "First" Sunday. The Conference adopted the full report. Dr. Loyd thanked the members of the CFA for all of their hard and dedicated work.

BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES RESOLUTION I: STUDY PROPOSAL

Whereas, the Board of Global Ministries of the Little Rock Annual Conference in cooperation with the Committee on Parish and Community Development of the North Arkansas Conference and the Area Task Force on Congregational Development is seeking to promote as the first priority of the annual conferences the resourcing of local churches in order to make disciples of Jesus Christ;

And whereas, the funding of new faith communities that target making disciples through new ministries (in existing congregations, or in relocation of existing congregations, or in new church starts) is an indispensable element in resourcing local churches;

Therefore, be it resolved that the Annual Conference ask Bishop Janice Riggle Huie (serving as Chairperson) to meet with leadership of the annual conference (see list below) to review that part of the apportionments related to the conference budget and adopted by the annual conference.

Whereas, the General Commission on Archives and History of the United Methodist Church provides for a process of nominations for Registration of United Methodist Historic Sites as recommended by each Annual, Central, or Jurisdictional Conference; and,

Whereas, Camp Aldersgate, whose site is owned by the Women’s Division of the General Board of Global Ministries of the United Methodist Church, was founded in 1947 in Arkansas as one of the first racially integrated sites in the South; and

Whereas, because of its purpose, its board members and staff experienced hardship in creating a haven for persons of all races and conditions, but held firm to their purpose, and

Whereas, Camp Aldersgate hosted some of the nation’s first programs and meetings in support of integration, including one described as the first such conference ever held in the South (a meeting of the National Association of Intergroup Relations Officials, which hosted speakers such as Marion A. Wright and C. Vann Woodward), and played a role during the Central High School crisis of 1957, and

Whereas, Camp Aldersgate continued to develop unique programs designed to include persons of various disabilities and has received national recognition for its programs, some of which are the only ones of their kind in Arkansas, and

Whereas, Camp Aldersgate located in the center of Little Rock, Arkansas, is now one of only a few camps in the nation located in the center of a metropolitan area; and

Whereas, Camp Aldersgate was described as having weathered the racial tensions of earlier times by the comment, “Through it all, Aldersgate stood as a beacon and safe haven, shining proof of what could be achieved through human trust, compassion and resolve,”

Be it therefore resolved, that Camp Aldersgate, located in Little Rock, Arkansas should be approved as a United Methodist Historic Site by the Little Rock Annual Conference.

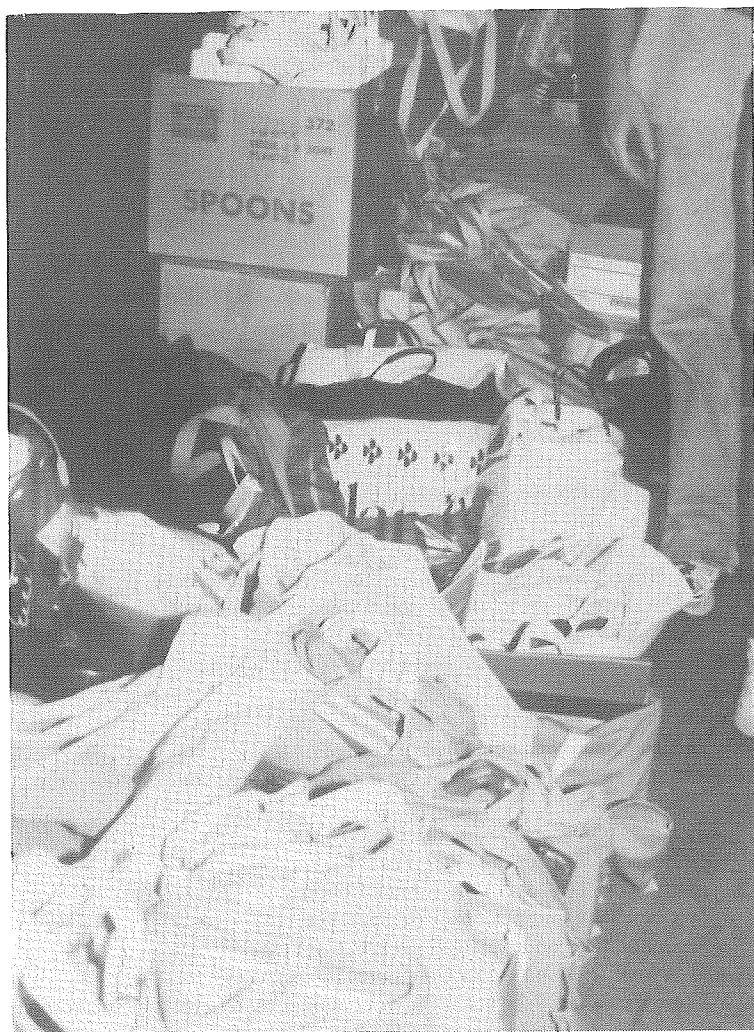

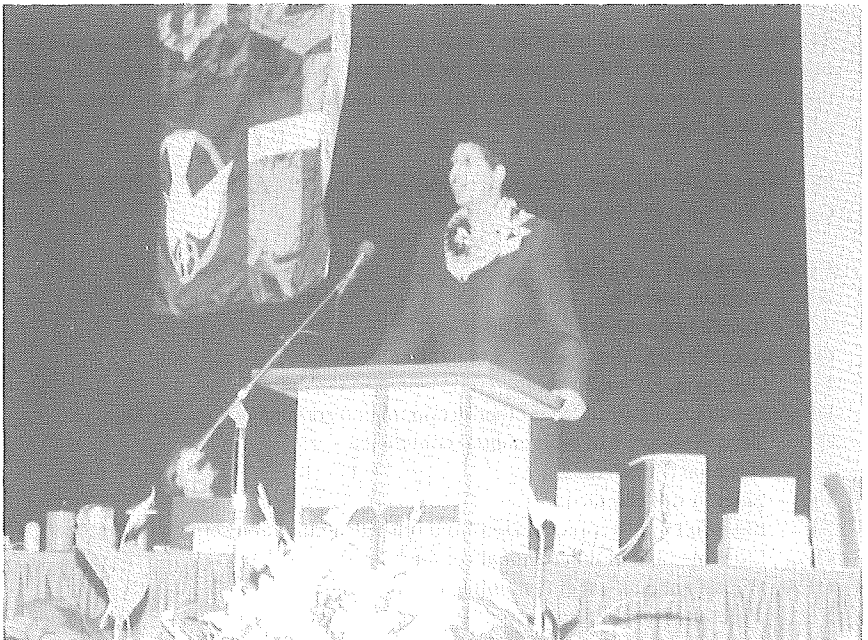

VII. REPORTS

A. 1999 Episcopal Address



Good morning. God is good. All the time. Once again I have the privilege of standing before you to offer my observations and direction about God's beloved United Methodist Church in the State of Arkansas. When I was a young pastor facing appointment season every year and filled with all the anxiety that appointment season brings to pastors and congregations, I would often plead with God and say, "I guess I'll go where the

bishop sends me. But please, God, please help the bishop send me somewhere where people want their lives to make a difference in the world."

One of the reasons that I am grateful to be in Arkansas is that so many pastors and so many laypersons want to make a difference in our communities, in our State and in the world on behalf of the gospel of Jesus Christ. It is an honor to be your bishop, and "I thank God every time I remember you, constantly praying with joy for you. I am confident that the one who began a good work among [us] will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ." (Philippians 1:3-4)

This annual conference session is our last annual conference in this century. In fact, this annual conference session is our last annual conference session in this millennium. Perhaps the question that Jesus asked at the conclusion of the parable of the widow and the unjust judge is an appropriate one for our reflection today, "When the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?" (Luke 18:8) The witness we United Methodists make today and the practices we embody now are setting the direction for how that question will be answered in the early part of the 21st century. The North Star for guiding our direction is mission, mission, mission.

Over and over again we have talked about the mission of the church. I believe with all my heart and soul that God in Christ through the power of the Holy Spirit calls the church to be in mission to the world. That mission is to make disciples for Jesus Christ. The vision toward which we are drawn is God's reign on earth as it is in heaven. The primary paths are the intertwining ministries of evangelism, justice and mercy. To say it another way, we United Methodists are in the business of transformation—the transformation of the earth to become as it is in heaven. If we're not about the business of changed lives and changed communities, we're not about gospel business.

When John the Baptist was in prison, he sent his disciples to ask Jesus if he was the one to come or should they wait for another. How will you know when there is faith on earth? Do you remember what Jesus said? It wasn't a lecture on transformation or even salvation. Do you remember? He said, "Go tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them." (Matthew 11:2-5) When we ask ourselves, "Are we being faithful to making disciples for Jesus," we need to look and listen to what is happening in the lives of people in our communities and in our congregations.

I want to share some brief images and stories. Any one of them by itself is like a single word or phrase sitting out all alone on a sheet of paper. All of them together plus the stories that you can tell, just might, by the grace of God, form some of the sentences of the story of salvation. They might, by the grace of God, be part of a larger story of making disciples for Jesus Christ in this part of God's garden we call Arkansas.

I want to report on two of our "vital sign" indicators in making disciples for Jesus Christ. The bad news is that worship attendance decreased by 171 persons in the Little Rock Conference. This downward turn is particularly disappointing because the Little Rock Conference had made small gains in worship attendance for the three previous years. The good news is that worship attendance increased by 1,296 in the North Arkansas Conference. This increase is the second substantial increase for the North Arkansas Conference. Overall, it is good news for United Methodists in the state.

Our apportionments are a reflection of our priorities to reach out to human beings beyond our local churches, beyond Arkansas, beyond the US and include the whole world. Looking at the conferences' apportionment pay out is like looking at your family's checkbook to discover what are your actual family priorities. For the second consecutive year, the pay out of both conferences increased. NAC increased by just over 2%. We're at 91.7% there. LRC increased by almost 3%. We're at 93.3% there. We've come up over 4% in two years. God is good.

If you are a member of a congregation that paid 100% of its apportionments, would you please raise your hand? Yes. Would all of you join one another in a round of applause? I hope you are celebrating the ministries that money represents in your churches. I want to invite those of you who are members of congregations that are still working toward 100% to talk to your friends in these other congregations and learn from each other. You can see the direction we're going. We're all in this ministry together. Our congregations have all the money they need to reach 100% of these budgets. It's our job, clergy and lay leaders, to help our people discover the virtues of generosity. God is good.

More of our congregations are beginning weekday ministries with children in their communities. We don't have hard numbers here, but two examples—one from each annual conference-- give a glimpse of the picture.

In July of last year, after annual conference, the Dewitt congregation named a task force to begin a weekday ministry to children. Dewitt is a church that worshipped about 120 people.

It is located in southeast Arkansas in the Monticello district. Their pastor is Reverend Lavon Post. In September he and the lay leaders in Dewitt began a weekday ministry based on a ministry already operating at First UMC in Nashville where Jim Polk is pastor. There is a similar ministry at Stephens. They call this ministry, Wacky Wednesday. Every Wednesday they pick children up from school and teach crafts, Bible study, choir and recreation. They average about 70 children per week. Approximately 45-50 of those children are from unchurched families in the community. Five of those families are now visiting the church. God is good.

Gillett UMC is not far away, and they heard what was going on at Dewitt, and they called in Linda Fox. Their pastor Russell Bailey and a group of lay ministers began a similar ministry with community children in January. Gillette is a smaller congregation in a smaller community. Would you believe that Gillett now has over a hundred children participating in its weekday ministry? In both these churches, neighborhood children include African American children attending a weekday ministry in a United Methodist Church.

The same pattern is emerging in North Arkansas too. Mansfield United Methodist church in the Ft Smith District is a small church of 120 members in a town of about 1000 people. The church had only a handful of children who attended sporadically. The pastor, Reverend Sammye Rink and church lay leaders stepped outside the congregation to find the children. They are called the God Squad. 171 children are participating in the weekday ministry, and neighborhood families including Hispanic and African American families are visiting the church. God is good.

Imagine what it would be like if four congregations in each district in this state left these annual conferences and went home and developed some kind of weekday ministry with children. Assume that each ministry only reached out to fifty neighborhood children. That would mean that United Methodists touched the lives of over 2,000 more children in this state in one year. Wow.

There are approximately 375,000 African American persons in this state; less than one-half of one percent are on our membership rolls. The Arkansas Initiative for Strengthening the Black Church Task Force has conducted three leadership-training events, including one in the Mississippi Delta, for pastors and laity to improve their effectiveness in making disciples for Jesus Christ. Approximately 225 people have participated in these daylong training events. United Methodists have a story to tell and a ministry to share. God is good.

Arkansas United Methodists are increasingly involved in ministries of compassion and evangelization in the global community. This year the Arkansas Area signed a partnership agreement with the United Methodist Church in Russia. Sixteen Arkansas churches have signed on as participating congregations. Since last annual conference, there have been two trips by Arkansans to Russia, and we are hosting eleven children and three adults from the Church of the Return in Ekaterinberg for three weeks this summer. Dr. Marvin Loyd led another group to Haiti. Don Weeks took groups to Haiti and Juarez. Thanks to the leadership of Bill Waddell, the Cabinet and fifteen laity participated in a week-long VIM house-building experience in Juarez, Mexico. Bob and I have traveled to Angola and Mozambique to visit our United Methodist neighbors there. Katy Whitney, one of our high

school students, and I have traveled to Liberia where I preached at their Annual Conference. Hundreds of our churches have prepared school kits to send to Mozambique. We will dedicate them tomorrow. We have so much to learn and so much to share with our neighbors around the world. God is good.

There have been two new churches started in Arkansas since last we met. One is at West Fork near Fayetteville. The other is Mountainside UMC in Hot Springs Village. They are both actively seeking persons who have not yet experienced Christ's saving grace in their lives, and they are succeeding. God is good.

Now it is your turn. I'm confident that the Holy Spirit is at work in your congregation too. Would you take just a moment to reflect on some of the ways that God is working in your congregation to make disciples for the transformation of your community and your world. What comes to your mind? The transformed life of a particular person who experienced the saving power of Christ in your congregation. Someone hungry who was fed. Someone whose house was damaged or destroyed in one the storms that passed through this state who received a better place to live. Someone who was in prison who was visited. A child who had been going home to an empty house after school who is now in the presence of caring adults in your church. Someone who was unloved, and through the ministries of your congregation was offered the love of Jesus Christ. I invite you to turn to your neighbor and tell that story—just a couple of sentences. Begin your story with "I thank God that..." and end it with "God is good."

Sharing stories of faith

Do you believe that there might be a pattern of transformation emerging here in Arkansas? It's not maintenance; it might be ministry. It's not about consuming ministry ourselves; it might be about providing ministry to others. It is not just individual and private; it is also social and global. Do you believe that God might be transforming us again? Do you think we might be being transformed in the shape of mission?

I want to give thanks for the work of the General Agencies of the UMC at work in Arkansas. The General Board of Global Ministries has given us a major grant for strengthening historically African American congregations. They are providing two church and community workers in the Delta—one in each conference. They are also providing an additional large grant to work with us in developing a prototype process for training pastoral leadership for the twenty-first century. . When tornadoes struck again this year in Little Rock and the Batesville District, UMCOR was on the ground the next day with their staff and services. Most recently, GBGM has funded an alcohol and drug prevention ministry sponsored by the Wesley Foundation at UALR and UALR. In addition, the General Board of Global Ministries has given us hundreds of hours of consultation time. We United Methodists are so privileged to be a part of something larger than we are. We give and we receive. We receive and we give. We are part of a fabric of faith that is stronger, more durable and more beautiful than any single thread or fragment. God is good.

There are two particular areas of ministry in this state that are new this year, and I want to you to know more about them from the people most directly involved.

Arkansas Area Staff-----Reverend Lewis See

Arkansas Initiative for Strengthening the Black Church----Rev. C.E. McAdoo

You have just heard the work of two new Area Ministry Teams. The two Cabinets are functioning as an Area Team. Several of our conference boards and agencies are beginning to network with their counterparts on the other side of the River. This bishop wants to make an observation to you. It is my perception that Arkansas Methodism is able to be more effective in accomplishing its mission when our two conferences work together as an Area than when they work separately as conferences. An Area approach maximizes leadership resources. It is good stewardship of time and money. We avoid duplication. Simply put, I think you are more effective in making disciples for Jesus Christ. That is all for now. It is a simple observation.

Let's talk now about the next steps on our journey of making disciples. Our congregations need a steady stream of strong, faithful clergy and lay leaders. In nearly every circle in which I move, I hear people asking for leaders. They decry the lack of leaders. Pastor parish committees have their "wish list" for pastors. Pastors have their "specification list" for lay leaders. Both groups have clear ideas about the qualities and skills that you wish you could get in your bishop and district superintendents.

I have good news and bad news. Here's the bad news. In all my travels, I haven't seen a Moses or Miriam or Paul or Magdalene wandering around these parts. Here's the good news. God always raises up leaders to do God's work. God always gives God's people everything they need in order to be faithful. Leaders come in all kinds of shapes and sizes. Some of God's strongest leaders have been the most unlikely characters. Moses stuttered. David failed the course in sexual ethics. Peter denied Christ, and the Apostle Paul was an accomplice in the martyrdom of Stephen. God has blessed Arkansas Methodists with clergy and lay leaders. You can take that to the bank. They may or may not be in positions of leadership. Part of our task—those of us who hold positions of leadership--is to call out our next generation of leaders and empower them and train them and hold them accountable.

I believe effective United Methodist leaders must possess four major attributes: call, character, competency, and a commitment to be in covenant. Leaders must be called by God to lead. Leaders must possess the character of a person of God. Leaders must demonstrate a certain group of competencies that represent leadership. Leaders must be committed to be in covenant with God, with the UMC and with the congregation.

Dr. Charles Barna notes that there are different kinds of leaders: directing leaders, strategic leaders, team building leaders, and operational leaders. No one person has all these gifts. Even the most gifted leaders are really good at only one or maybe two of those functions. In other words, "superstars" don't build churches. Teams of people with varieties of gifts build churches. That means clergy and laity leaders must work together as a team to enable our congregations to become more effective in making disciples for Jesus Christ. Except in

a few special circumstances, most of the leadership in congregations will come from laity. My friend Bishop W. T. Handy used to remind us “young ones” that there are 30,000 United Methodist clergy and 9 million United Methodist laity. “Now you tell me where to look for the greatest quantity of leadership,” he would say.

During this next year your bishop is going to be working with the Cabinet and clergy and laity teams in identifying, empowering, training, deploying and holding accountable spiritual leaders. I’ll be meeting with clergy and laity in each district. AISBC has leadership development as one of its two major priorities. The Congregational Development Task force has made leadership development one of its highest priorities. One of the great qualities of United Methodists is that most of us are teachable. Most of us like to learn. By the grace of God and our effort, we will learn our way into leading the church into the twenty-first century.

Every one of us pastors over 40 years old should be praying daily to God to help us identify our replacements. The UMC needs a whole new generation of pastors. It takes nearly 10 years from call to full membership and ordination as an elder. Who are your best and brightest young women and men that God might be calling forth as pastors?

Our congregations have been blessed by the faithful leadership of the saints among our laity. As they join the cloud of witnesses, who is God raising up to take their places? Those new leaders might not even be members of the church today. Remember that St. Augustine was baptized in 387, ordained in 491 and made a bishop four years later. God will raise up the leaders God needs for the salvation of the world. “Even the very stones could cry out.” If the United Methodist Church is going to place an active role in God’s plan of salvation, we who hold positions of leadership in the church need to work with God in identifying the next generation of leaders.

Friends, when January 1, 2000 arrives, will the Son of Man find faith on earth among the United Methodists of Arkansas? How will he know?

I hope Jesus will say, “Look at those Methodists. They have opened their eyes to the thousands of people in their communities who are longing for their lives to be transformed in love by the grace of God. They spot those folks a mile away and they walk with them into a new way of life. Thank God for the Methodists.”

I hope Jesus will say, “Look at those Methodists. They have opened their ears to the cries of the children. They are taking the children in their arms and blessing them just like I did. The State of Arkansas is now the safest, most loving place in the world for a child to grow up.” Thank God for the Methodists.

I hope Jesus will say, “Look at the Methodists. They are immersed in a culture of racism and hate and violence, and they have been cleansed—been made whole. Their congregations and their ministries include African Americans and Hispanics and Asians and European Americans all together. Thank God for the Methodists.”

I hope Jesus will say, "Look at the Methodists. People who were as good as dead—drug addicts, people in prison, mentally retarded, nursing home residents, mentally ill—are being loved and cared for and raised up to new life. Thank God for the Methodists."

I hope Jesus will say, "Look at the Methodists. They are so eager to share the abundance of their resources with people all over God's earth that God's reign is coming on earth as it is in heaven, and it started in Arkansas. Thank God for the Methodists."

Come, Lord Jesus, come quickly. Amen.

B.1999 Laity Address***“FREEING THE CHURCH FOR THE FUTURE”***

Introduction

You have elected me to lead. While I feel most comfortable leading a volunteer in mission team, I am called to do more. As your lay leader, particularly one who is charged with representing my generation and leading for the future, I believe it is important that I help us to look at our faith in different ways.

Last year I gave you my vision for the church. I believe our next step is to reexamine the way we portray our faith to each other and to the world. What I speak to you about today is more a matter of focus, attitude and strength than substantive change, but it is something which must be evident in our thoughts, words and deeds.

Freedom is a state we all desire. Consider for a moment the sense of freedom you have felt in certain circumstances in the past: the last day of school; the first time you were allowed to drive the car; unexpected leisure time due to snow. Other times of freedom are bittersweet but also affect us in significant ways: when the children leave home; when we leave one job for another; when we end an abusive relationship. Each one of us has experienced unforgettable states of freedom and we know the energy and perspective which accompanies those times.

When those who are not Christians look at the global church and synthesize all of the messages the church sends to the world, I suspect they do not sense freedom; rather, they often hear and sense a message of constriction. Yet the essence of Christianity is freedom. Without it, I believe we disregard an essential element of the character of our faith and we come dangerously close to becoming irrelevant to the unchurched. Thankfully, the United Methodist Church has spent time studying our relevance for today and our focus for the future, and we are reconfiguring to allow us to be in the best position to make disciples for Jesus Christ.

As we approach a new year, a new century and a new millennium, many of us are reflecting on the past as well as the future. My own reflections began with the vital role which the United Methodist Church (in its various forms) has played for so many years. I have considered the unchanging freedoms which I believe were the key to the effectiveness of the church.

I speak to you today about three of those freedoms which I believe are essential for the growth and continued effectiveness of the church in the future. They are *freedom from the lie, freedom from legalism and freedom from fear*.

Imagine with me for a moment a group of people. Some are old; some are young. Some are female; some are male. Some are poor; some are wealthy. They are of all races and nationalities. Some have status; others do not. Some are disabled; most are not. Some are valued by society; some are not. Flowing upward from each of them and from one to another is an essence which is sometimes difficult to see unless they are close together, but it is unmistakably there. This group is the church.

Imagine also, however, that there are three chains which encircle the group. The chains are snug against the outside of the group. They prevent the group from disbursing and some members have the feeling that they cannot breathe, much less move around freely. The chains also allow little space for others to join the group. The chains are the lie, legalism and fear.

The keys to unlock these chains are truth, grace and courage from the Holy Spirit. We hold the keys.

FREEDOM FROM THE LIE

Scripture is replete with verses which describe how we enchain ourselves by living a lie:

Romans 1:25

They exchanged the truth of God for a lie, and worshiped and served created things rather than the Creator

1 John 1:6

*If we claim to have fellowship with him yet walk in the darkness,
we lie and do not live by the truth.*

The Bible is also clear that the truth will make us free. (*John 8:32*).

Truth is a central theme in all religions. That is so for a good reason. No one wants to commit his or her life to a false religion. Jesus said, "I am the way, the truth, and the life." (*John 14:6*) As United Methodists we believe Jesus is the truth. We give witness to that truth in many ways each day. Your faithfulness to those in need gives strong witness to the truth. Your stands on issues of injustice, racism and class witness the truth. Yes, the United Methodists of the Little Rock Conference, if called to testify, could give many personal accounts of the truth as seen in Jesus Christ. Those we have helped would corroborate those accounts.

Perhaps we have used truth to loosen the chain of the lie, but I am afraid we still are not free. The freedom of which I speak is not partial. It is complete and unmistakable. It is so apparent to those who are not Christians that they cannot help but choose to seek it also. This freedom is measured by the familiar verse, "*Seek first the kingdom of God*" (*Matthew 6:33*).

When people see us in the daily routine of life, do our words and actions give witness to this truth or do they give witness to a lie? Do they see that we seek God first in everything we do or do they see, as Paul said to the Romans, that we have exchanged this truth for a lie and worship things of this world?

Simply put, our culture of faith must be clear and unequivocal to the world. It must be genuinely rooted in the truth of Jesus Christ as evidenced by the actions of each of us in putting God's kingdom above all else. When the chain of the lie is broken, the freedom we experience as a church will translate into the type of focused vision we must have to be effective today and in the future.

FREEDOM FROM LEGALISM

With the chain of the lie removed, the church may experience additional room to breathe, but it is not yet free. In fact, with a renewed focus on the truth, the chain of legalism may be drawn tighter. We need only look at the history of the church to see how legalism has often stifled Christianity and has enchained us.

When I refer to legalism, I do not mean that we should abandon orthodoxy or not adhere to our basic beliefs. What I refer to is the institutionalizing of our faith to the point that the institution and not our faith receives the most emphasis - that man-made rules begin to trump the gift of grace - that control and judgment become more important than the never-ending love of Jesus Christ. Some factions within our church are perilously close to legalism. The hope for our future is not more committees, more pronouncements, more rules, more buildings or reorganized church structures. Our hope for the future lies in the power of God

working through the hearts of people. The hearts of people are changed when they realize that their salvation is by grace (*Ephesians 2:8*).

John described Jesus as “full of grace and truth.” (*John 1:14*). When we ignore the essential ingredient of grace in the make-up of Jesus, the result is often that we become like Pharisees, self-important and bound by the impossible standards we set for ourselves. In speaking of these standards and their relative unimportance, Paul condemned legalism many times, stating in *Galatians 5:1* that “[it is for freedom that Christ has set us free.”

If we are honest, we must admit that people do not need more rules. Instead, they need compassion and a witness that God loves them and offers them a new and eternal life. Some may say that message doesn't fully represent our faith, but John Miles built a church preaching only that. The unchurched as well as the churchd responded.

Many of you give witness to the love and grace of Christ. At times, I have been moved to tears this last year as I have seen your faithfulness and your self-less actions in the name of Jesus. Can you imagine how persuasive our witness would be if each United Methodist adopted an attitude of grace in everything he or she did - if those who do not know Christ could not look upon us without understanding that we are different because we are full of grace?

We really have no alternative. The chain of legalism will do nothing but lead to a slow death.

FREEDOM FROM FEAR

Even if we were to achieve a perfect balance of truth and grace, I am convinced that the church still would not succeed unless we remove the chain of fear. God has given me a great deal of understanding about fear this past year, and I have observed how it enslaves many people in the church. My observations tell me that fear, whatever its cause, kills our power to share the message of Jesus Christ. Whether the fear be fear of failure, fear of the unknown or fear of our perceived foes, we all allow ourselves to be gripped by different fears.

If we are truly honest with ourselves, we could all name at least one fear which prevents us from giving our energy to God's callings for our lives. These fears not only bind us like chains, they often effectively shut off the heart of the church.

A rather amusing example of how fears manifest themselves and then are overcome is the Juarez, Mexico mission. I cannot begin to tell you all of the fears that are expressed to me before every trip. They usually come in the form of questions. One of the first is usually, “Can I drink the water?” “I have stomach problems; will we be eating their food?” “What about the bathroom facilities?” “Are we safe?” “Are you sure we can do this for \$400?” “Do you think I can even be of any help in building a house?” The list goes on and on.

As we approach the end of a week centered on Jesus Christ and loving our neighbors in Mexico, the question usually becomes, “Why did I worry about those things?” It might

also be, "What more can I do?" or "How can I keep this feeling when I go home?" As we consider the relationship many of us have with Christy Jessica Flores of Juarez, we have to ask, "Where would she be today if I had not answered the call to serve as a volunteer in mission in Mexico?" "Who didn't make it because of my fears?"

The key to freedom from fear is the power of the Holy Spirit. As Paul said, "Now the Lord is the Spirit, and where the Spirit of the Lord is, there is freedom." (2 Cor. 3:17) With the Holy Spirit as our stronghold and courage, we have nothing to fear. (Psalm 27:1).

Consider what we as United Methodists might do if we had no fear.

CONCLUSION

The chains from which the church has been freed must not be tossed aside and forgotten. Like the cross, they are important reminders of that which kept us from being free. We are all familiar with the Jewish traditions which are continued so that succeeding generations will never forget what their ancestors experienced as well as God's deliverance from those experiences. I say these three freedoms of which I speak are equally important to be remembered by the church today, and we United Methodists are in the position to proclaim them to the world.

As we leave this place, may our focus be truth, may our attitude be one of grace, may our courage be of the Holy Spirit, and may we claim the freedoms brought to us by Jesus Christ. The world will change and our hearts will be filled with joy. Amen.

VI. APPORTIONMENTS AND ASKINGS:

- A. World Service and Conference Benevolences:** We recommend that the General Conference apportionments of \$516,673 for World Service be accepted and that an amount of \$1,187,386 be apportioned for Conference Benevolences for 2000 for a total apportionment of \$1,704,059. Further, we recommend that the monies received for World Service and Conference Benevolences be distributed on a basis of 30.32% for World Service and 69.68% for Conference Benevolences.
- B. Ministerial Support:** We recommend that the Ministerial Support apportionment of \$2,660,116 be accepted in full by the Annual Conference and that it be apportioned to the local churches.
- C. Other Apportioned Funds:** We recommend that the Annual Conference accept in full the askings listed below and they be apportioned to the local churches.

VII. Apportionment Formula

We recommend that the formula used by the Conference be a two year average of the most recent years' statistics: 1/3 based on Church Membership and 2/3 based on Church Financial Data

Financial data includes the following items:

1. Current program expense
2. Current operating expense
3. Pastors salary
4. Associate salary
5. Utilities and allowances
6. Travel Allowances
7. Diaconal Ministry compensation
8. Other staff compensation
9. Apportionment Assigned.
10. Other Cash Allowances

The 2000 decimal is calculated using the average of years 1997 and 1998. All data is taken from the statistical tables in the Conference Journals.

VIII. Salary and Expenses of District Superintendents' total compensation package for 2000 will be \$77,270. This figure shall include salary, utilities and appurtenances, and travel expense.

We recommend a vouchered expense pool for the District Superintendents in the amount of \$24,000.00 for meetings (Cabinet, CCOM, and out of state) with the stipulation that no district, board, or agency make any payment for the purpose indicated above.

We recommend that \$54,822 be used to pay the six District Superintendents Health Insurance premiums for 2000.

IX. Advance Specials

We recommend General Advance Specials to local churches for firsthand relationships with mission projects and involvement in mission. We further recommend that Lydia Patterson Institute be named a Conference Advance Special and promoted by the Board of Global Ministries and the local churches. We give approval to all Advance Specials as listed in the Council on Ministries report.

X. Special Days (with offerings)

We recommend these Special Days with offerings:

- * Human Relations Day - During Epiphany on the Sunday before the observance of Martin Luther King's birthday.
- * One Great Hour of Sharing - Fourth Sunday in Lent

- * United Methodist Student Day - Sunday after Thanksgiving.
- * World Communion Sunday - First Sunday in October
- * Peace with Justice - First Sunday after Pentecost
- * United Methodist Children's Home - Second and Third Sundays in December
- * Native American Awareness Sunday
- * Christian Education Sunday
- * Golden Cross Sunday - First Sunday in May

XI. We request that the Annual Conference concur with the CFA that the following agencies and institutions be granted approval to solicit funds within the Little Rock Annual Conference following notice of cfa approval.

- A. Board of Trustees of Camp Tanako, Inc.
- B. Camp Aldersgate, Inc., to seek individual donors.
- C. United Methodist Foundation to seek individual donors.
- D. The five Wesley Foundations to raise additional funds through the "Friends of Wesley" program.
- E. United Methodist Children's Home. Additionally the second and third Sundays in December be designated for receiving of the Children's Home annual Christmas offering.
- F. Hendrix College.
- G. Philander Smith College.
- H. Volunteers in Mission.
- I. Catch the Vision.
- J. Mount Sequoyah.
- K. Homeless Housing Board of the Arkadelphia District.

XII. *"Fair Share" Goals:*

- A. **Oklahoma Indian Missionary Conference** - We recommend that \$7,500 be requested from the local churches in *"Fair Share"* goals for the Oklahoma Indian Missionary Conference in 2000.
- B. **Rio Grande Conference** - We recommend that \$6,500 be requested from the local churches in *"Fair Share"* goals for the Rio Grande Conference in 2000.
- C. **Lydia Patterson Endowment Fund** - We recommend that \$5,000 be requested from the local churches in *"Fair Share"* goals for the Lydia Patterson Institute Endowment Fund in 2000 (year 2 of 3).

LRC CFA OTHER RECOMMENDATIONS

- I. Pastor's Utilities and Appurtenances: If no utility allowance is made, we recommend that the local churches designate a part of the compensation as parsonage utilities and appurtenances.
- II. The travel allowance remain at \$.20 per mile plus \$.02 per mile for each additional person, to encourage car pooling.
- III. Retired and disabled ministers be paid \$40 per diem for days they attend Annual Conference.

Pastors' moving expense be paid at the rate of \$400 plus \$.75 per mile. The mileage is to be paid from parsonage to parsonage, with one exception. When transferring from another conference, the rate will apply from parsonage to the Little Rock Conference boundary. The following persons are eligible: pastors, lay pastors, student pastors, after first appointment, district superintendents, persons in conference connectional positions, retiring pastors, persons taking disability leave, and others recommended by the Board of Ministry.

All unrestricted benevolence funds be placed in a central operating balance.

- I. Balances remaining in the Conference Benevolence Fund and the Conference Administration Fund at year-end are transferred to the Reserve Fund.
- II. Any Conference employee who has, or who desires a tax-sheltered annuity, may direct the Director of Finance and Management to pay his annuity from his regular income following proper guidelines.
- III. Each board, commission, committee or agency not be allowed to change a line item in its approved budget which would exceed 10% of the amount without approval of the Council on Finance and Administration.
- IV. All agencies receiving conference funds shall submit their latest independent audits to the Conference Council on Finance and Administration.
- V. Wesley Foundations may solicit funds within their supporting districts after approval is given by the District Council on Ministries.
- VI. Local church administrative boards consider paying all conference life and health insurance premiums directly (above salary) in order to provide tax savings for pastors and other church employees. If necessary or desirable, the salary may be reduced by the same amount. This policy must be consistently applied to all employees.
- VII. Participation by the conference in Area programs must not exceed 50% of the cost of that program, with the exceptions approved by the Council on Finance and Administration.
- VIII. The management and investment of all the monies off/from all those boards and agencies which receive monies from the Conference or line item apportionments must be handled by the area treasurer's office.
- IX. Permission be granted to the area treasurer to borrow funds (on a short-term basis) from the Arkansas Area account if Little Rock Conference funds are not sufficient to meet current needs. Both Council on Finance and Administration presidents must approve the loan before it is transacted. Interest on such loan will be paid at the current money market rate.

- X. The Conference provide fidelity bonding insurance in compliance with Paragraph 615.1 of the 1996 Book of Discipline.
- XI. The following be adopted, as a guide for the investment and care of all Conference Funds:

The Area Treasurer is charged with the responsibility, for managing all Conference funds in a manner that will provide :

- A. The maximum income from the investment of all funds, while simultaneously insuring
- B. Adequate liquidity to meet the day-to-day operational needs of the Treasurer's Office and
- C. The safety and soundness of all funds. To accomplish this, all funds should be
 - (1) deposited in Arkansas institutions in a fully insured status on a short-term basis, generally ninety days, but up to six months with the approval of the Investment Committee or CFA, or
 - (2) invested in direct U.S. Government obligations for terms up to six months, or
 - (3) invested with the General Board of Pension of the United Methodist Church.

Longer term investments may be made from time to time, but these are generally discouraged, because of the uncertainty of the need for funds and the volatility of interest rates. The Area Treasurer is encouraged to consult with a majority of the Investment Committee or the CFA, when he is uncertain about an investment. This policy is intended to be flexible in its application, in order to meet rapidly changing economic conditions. While income is desirable, the primary emphasis should continue to be the maintenance of adequate funds and the avoidance of speculative investments.

This policy may be amended from time to time to meet changing conditions and to enhance the income of the Conference.

- XVII. That the South Central Jurisdiction VOLUNTEERS IN MISSION be given authority to solicit "volunteer" contributions from individuals, districts, and the Annual Conference for the purpose of funding the administrative work of this program. That these contributions be kept as a line item in reporting to the Jurisdiction Council on Finance and Administration and that such be a part of the audit report of the jurisdictional budget.

All contributions to this fund must go directly to the Little Rock Conference Treasurer's Office.

- XVII. The Conference gives the Conference Council on Finance and Administration the authority to fund extraordinary needs relating to the life and ministry of the Annual Conference. These needs shall be funded from unrestricted funds and reserve funds. This authority shall not be used, nor is it intended, to replace or circumvent normal funding procedures of the Little Rock Annual Conference. Actions on such requests shall be reported to the next regular session of the Annual Conference. (This recommendation is in reference to paragraph 608.6 of the 1996 Book of Discipline.

- XIX. The Conference CFA recommends that Joe Eason be elected to the Office of Conference Treasurer for the 1997-2000 quadrennium.
- XX. We express our appreciation to Joe Eason and his staff, Todd Burris, Cheryl Beck, Mary Lois Stanfield and Tammy Childs, for the excellent service they perform for the Conference.

We have audited the accompanying statement of assets, liabilities and fund balances - cash basis of the Little Rock Conference of The United Methodist Church as of December 31, 1998 and 1997, and the related statement of changes in fund balances - cash basis for the year ended December 31, 1998. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Conference's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits.

We conducted our audits in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audits to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audits provide a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As described in Note 1, the Conference's policy is to prepare its financial statements on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements, which is a comprehensive basis of accounting other than generally accepted accounting principles. Consequently, certain receipts and the related assets were recognized when received rather than when earned, and certain disbursements were recognized when paid rather than when the obligation was incurred.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above presently fairly, in all material respects, the assets, liabilities and fund balances - cash basis of the Little Rock Conference of the United Methodist Church as of December 31, 1998 and 1997, and the changes in fund balances - cash basis for the year ended December 31, 1998, on the basis of accounting described in Note 1.

Notes to Financial Statements – Cash Basis

December 31, 1998, 1997

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting - The financial statements of the Little Rock Conference of The United Methodist Church have been prepared on the cash basis. In connection with the utilization of the cash basis of accounting, the Conference has neither capitalized its fixed assets nor recorded the related depreciation.

The records are held open after year-end in order to include the remittances from the churches in the Conference for the last few weeks of the year. This policy is consistent with prior years.

Income Taxes

The Conference meets the requirements of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and is therefore exempt from federal income taxes.

Cash Investments

Checking account interest is received and recognized monthly, whereas interest on all cash investments is not recognized until maturity. Interest earned on cash and cash investments during 1998 and 1997 was \$16,077 and \$17,102, respectively.

Short-term cash investments consist of two certificates of deposit issued by two financial institutions. Interest rates relating to these investments were 5.25% and 5.30% at December 31, 1998.

The aggregate market value of short term cash investments at December 31, 1998 and 1997 was \$200,000 and \$100,000, respectively. There were no unrealized gains or losses on investments.

Pension Plans

Substantially all conference employees are covered under one of two defined contribution pension plans as follows:

Ministerial employees - All ministerial employees, including the Bishop, are covered under a defined contribution pension plan whereby the participant contributes 3% and the church or conference contributes 10% to 12% of the participants' annual contribution base (compensation) based on the conference average compensation as computed by the General Board of Pensions.

Lay personnel - All lay employees are covered under a defined contribution pension plan whereby the participant contributes 3% and the conference contributes 8% of the participants' annual contribution base (compensation).

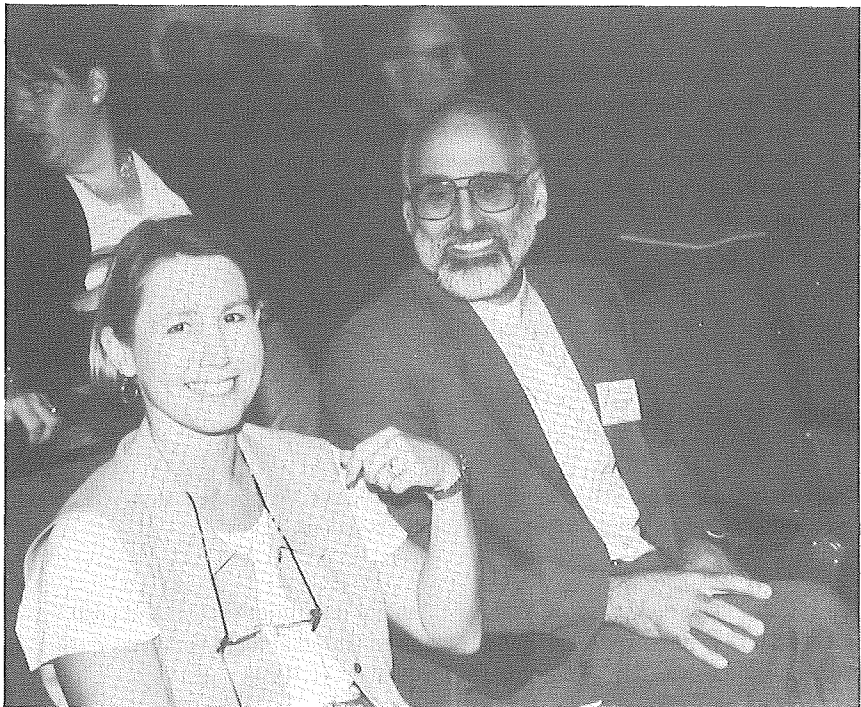
Both of the aforementioned plans provide benefits upon retirement based on converting accumulated contributions for that participant to an annuity or an actuarially equivalent basis. Both plans are multi-employer plans by which all contributed assets of participating employers are commingled and are not segregated by employer. This commingling of assets prevents a matching of individual employer's plan assets to plan liabilities.

Total pension cost for the years ended December 31, 1998 and 1997 were \$899,659 and \$845,915, respectively.

Concentrations of Risk

The Conference receives remittances from churches located within the State of Arkansas and is dependent on these contributions for its operations.

The Conference maintains, at various financial institutions, cash and cash investments which may exceed the federally insured amounts at times during the year and did exceed these amounts at December 31, 1998 and 1997.



AREA PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

On February 7, 1998 a new era in Arkansas United Methodism began. In the joint session of the Little Rock Annual Conference and North Arkansas Annual Conference the "Plan To Organize and Implement an Arkansas Area Staff" was approved and the Arkansas Area Ministry Office was formed. The Conferences' action also created for the first time a distinct Area Personnel Committee to oversee the work of all the Area Ministry Office staff.

We believe we have an outstanding staff team in the Area Ministry Office. We are grateful as a committee for the opportunity to work with and on behalf of Lewis See, Linda Fox, Kissa Hamilton, C. E. McAdoo, Carole Teague, Jane Dennis, Don Weeks, Guy Whitney, LouAnn Walker, Toni Kaminar, Laura Organ, Melissa Sanders, Gloria Caldwell and Sam Wells. Their work in the first year of our new era has been exemplary. The work they have begun with local churches is making and will continue to make a positive difference. In many ways the key to continued effectiveness for the Area Staff depends in large part on local churches asking for the help the staff can share. The entire Area Ministry Staff stands ready to help you.

In the initial “Plan To Organize and Implement an Arkansas Area Staff” the mission of the Area Office was stated clearly:

The mission of the Area Staff is to assist congregations to be effective in making disciples for Jesus Christ.

ARKANSAS AREA MINISTRIES

Rev. Lewis T. See Jr., "Area Director of Ministries."

"To Make Disciples of Jesus Christ." Both the Bible and the Book of Discipline affirm that this is the primary task of the local church. Therefore, the single focus of the area staff is to assist local churches in accomplishing their mission of "making disciples of Jesus Christ."

During our first year together, the Area ministers have made significant impact through on-site visits to local churches in every district and numerous district, conference and area events. Through preaching, workshops, consultations and support networks, we are equipping lay people and clergy to share the Gospel in ways that invite unchurched persons to become disciples.

We are a team. Each member contributes specific skills in a particular area of ministry. Our staff was chosen in response to the ministry needs of local churches in the two annual conferences. Your apportionment dollars make this ministry possible at no additional cost to local churches.

Working together our team can provide a local church with a total picture of how to reach children, youth, and adults in new and creative ways. We want to help your church make new disciples. My hope is that your area ministry team will be a reminder of our covenant together as United Methodist Christians.

Making Disciples for Jesus Christ - that's what we're all about.

Rev. Linda P. Fox, "Area Minister with Children and Families."

When a person is baptized, you and I, as Christians, promise the support and nurture needed for growth in faith as disciples of Christ. The church has a responsibility to find ways to support and nurture children and their families. The remarkable thing is that in nurturing the child, we discover that children can lead and teach and share their gifts, in ways that bless us all and build the faith community more completely.

When the local church's ministry to children and families is a priority, we can hear the call of Christ through children, or feel the Holy Spirit in their enthusiasm, and our eyes are opened to the prospect of a church that is blessed with their presence.

My responsibility is to assist the local church in the nurture of their own children and to assist them in exploring new and innovative ways to reach outside the church doors to the children of our communities and world.

The exciting news is that the United Methodist churches of Arkansas are reaching out and opening the doors of the church with weekday care for children, before-and after-school care, tutoring programs, expanded Sunday activities, mentoring programs and programs that partner with existing secular support agencies.

We have a way to go, but Arkansas United Methodist churches are making a difference in the lives of children.

Rev. Kissa Hamilton, "Area Minister with Youth and Young Adults:"

Martin Luther King was told by one of his mentors, "I have the feeling that the Lord has laid his hands on you, and that is a dangerous, dangerous thing." In youth ministry we are looking teenagers square in the eye and sharing with them that God has laid his hands on them.

We help them experience God's awesome touch on their lives, provide ways for them to share how that has changed them and show them how to let God shape their life. In a society that scrawls crude graffiti on the self-image of most teenagers, youth ministry offers kids a vision of who they are in Christ.

I believe that God has begun a revival. This great spiritual awakening is happening in the lives of our young people. I meet youth everyday who are brimming over with the love of God, who want their friends to know who Christ is and who have a passion for the faith that I've not seen in a long time.

Through local church youth groups, district events and conference activities, we are reaching kids and we are making new disciples for Jesus Christ. We are preparing them to run the race of their life and to finish in the faith.

Do you need a little spiritual pick-me-up? Take a few moments to look into the eyes of a young person. That's right, look past the earring in their nose, the crazy clothes and the wacky hair to hear their faith story. Ask them to talk about what God has done in their life. Then just sit back and listen as they share a profound, powerful witness of this great, life-giving, loving, compassionate, outrageous God we worship. I promise that you will be encouraged about your own faith and the future of our church.

Rev. Guy Whitney Jr., "Area Minister for Evangelism:"

Does love grow here? Traveling across the state this year, I have witnessed positive change where love is growing and new disciples are being made for Jesus Christ.

Ron and Debbie Newberry are helping form a new congregation in the small town of West Fork in the Fayetteville District. They began by going house to house and sharing their enthusiasm about ministry. They talked about "New Beginnings," and by January 1999, 35 people showed serious commitment to help form a church.

Lyndol and Joni Lloyd moved to Hot Springs Village in the Arkadelphia District to begin the third United Methodist Church in the village. Lyndol writes a by-weekly column in a Village newspaper and he and Joni teach a Sunday School class in the Village Church as ways to birth Mountainside, a United Methodist congregation on the east side of the village.

The Weiner Church in the Forrest City District has exploded with growth over the past 7 years in a community where population has declined. Tommy Toombs was a student and pastor during these years. Tommy and his wife, Charlise, didn't know they COULDN'T love a church back to health.

District Superintendent Therral Wilson and lay and clergy leaders of the Hope District have designed and are implementing a strategic plan to reach out to a growing Hispanic population in Southwest Arkansas. This effort is the next step in developing an Arkansas Area Hispanic initiative.

Sammy Rink, pastor of the Mansfield Church in the Fort Smith District, began her first pastorate two years ago at age 65. In 1998 Mansfield received more than 50 new members and has developed a weekly outreach program that now numbers some 150 children in this small community. Circumstance and age didn't seem to be negative factors where faithful living and loving have been at work.

My goal for this year was to resource as many local congregations as possible through encouraging new vision and willingness to change.

Our greatest potential is our people. Love grows in new faith communities which means not only new church starts, but also new small group ministries, and worship experiences in existing congregations.

Jane Dennis, “Area Director of Communications.”

Communication is indeed a ministry of the church. Without the sharing, openness and interaction that comes from good communication, our churches would be isolated and alone, cut off from one another, unaware. Communication is a building block for our United Methodist connection.

Communication takes many forms. We have the Arkansas United Methodist newspaper at the heart of our efforts. We also communicate through a host of print materials supportive of the mission and ministry of our United Methodist Church.

We continue to develop Internet web pages that have the potential of reaching millions of people around the world. We utilize an electronic mail network of United Methodists, and are finding new and exciting ways to use radio and television to tell the church’s story.

Jesus Christ was the “great communicator” and how important it is that we follow suit using all the technology and innovations at our disposal, to identify and reach disciples for Christ

As church’s and individuals, we learn from each other. God sends us examples and teachers in many forms. Through sharing information, ideas, and yes, even opinions, we are strengthened for this journey and we can better understand our own faith.

The bottom line is: we are better equipped to share the good news and make disciples for Jesus Christ.

Communication is a ministry that touches and involves us all.

Don Weeks, “Area Coordinator of Volunteers in Mission.”

From the beginning of the church, our Jesus called on volunteers to spread the “good news”. Today, one of the most effective means for volunteers to be in service is through the Volunteers in Mission program. VIM affords everyone the opportunity to serve, to offer time, money and talents, and to spread the “good news” and make disciples of Jesus Christ.

Consider these great Volunteers in Mission:

* Gary Lunsford of Fayetteville spends many weeks each year hosting work teams to South and Central America;

* Dr. Bill Scurlock of ElDorado uses his expertise as a surgeon helping hospital medical staffs in Bolivia;

* Retiree Ralph Jones of Hot Springs Village spends many days in mission in Mexico and in the United States;

* Dr. Marvin Lloyd of Lake Village holds dental clinics in Haiti and helps develop dental clinics there;

* Bill Waddell and Brenda Weeks of Little Rock and Buddy Waddell of West Helena are experts in leading teams to Juarez, Mexico, to build concrete block houses;

* hundreds of volunteers have teamed up and helped paint dorm rooms at Philander Smith College;

* Dick Reid of North Little Rock, a retiree, spent his summer helping build an addition to the Keo United Methodist Church and helped with fishing tournaments during the Med Camps at Camp Aldersgate.

These volunteers and hundreds like them are responding to Jesus' call in Matt. 25:40. "Truly, I tell you, just as you did it to one of these least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me."

Each one of these volunteers will tell you what they received - much, much more from the mission than they gave. It is truly a blessing to be a volunteer in mission for Jesus Christ.

Carole Teague, "Area Minister for Mission and Outreach."

We are commanded by Christ to be in mission. We can do no less. We follow the example of people like John Wesley. A church in mission is a growing church.

Arkansas United Methodist churches are very involved in mission and outreach. Any church that pays its apportionments is in mission. And then there is second-mite giving such as The Advance. Many congregations support missionaries both inside and outside our own country by being in a covenant relationship.

A partnership signed by Bishop Huie and the District Superintendent of the Ural-Siberia District of the Russian United Methodist Church, Elena Stepenova, brings our area into a new ministry with this huge district in Russia. Groups exchange trips, get to know each other, and work together.



Active Shalom Communities at Hoover in Little Rock and McCabe Chapel in North Little Rock continue to serve their neighborhoods with after-school programs, clinics, alcohol and drug abuse programs, and other services. Osceola and Pine Bluff are in the midst of training and planning in their Shalom Communities.

Our 1998 Ingathering brought in more than \$1.7 million dollars in cash donations and in-kind gifts and services provided by local churches. This was the largest total in the history of the Ingathering.

Sharing churches are growing churches. Because of Jesus we share. Because we are a connectional church, our gifts for mission multiply. We should do no less.

Like the ever changing nature of rainbows, our ethnic local church ministry in Arkansas is a vital ministry in progress.

Look around your community. Should not our churches reflect our communities? God calls us to be an inclusive church, yet, 11 o'clock on Sunday morning is the most segregated hour of the week

In Galatians, we are told "There is no longer Jew or Greek, no longer slave or free, there is no longer male or female - for all are one in Christ Jesus."

With the continued growth of the ethnic church in Arkansas, God's presence is stronger than ever. There are faces of children full of hope despite their circumstances. There are willing hands of fellow workers in the vineyard still making bricks with limited straw.

There are the sounds of hope heard in our churches of the powerful word of God from the pulpit as well as the choir loft in song, and on bended knees in prayer.

God is calling the church to be more. We are not attempting to correct all wrongs or challenge all rights of the past and the present, but rather forge a new future for ethnic people in the United Methodist Church.

We are moving ahead, reaching toward a transforming God into the future, ready to hear God say to each of us: “Well done, my servant.”

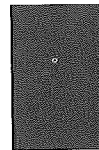
AREA COMMITTEE ON COMMUNICATIONS

With the reorganization of Arkansas Area ministries implemented in June 1998, there's a new look to communication ministries for the United Methodist Church in Arkansas. For the first time, all communication functions are now operated under a single "umbrella" called Arkansas Area Communications. Jane Dennis, editor of the Arkansas United Methodist newspaper for the past 11 years, serves as Area Director of Communications.

The Arkansas United Methodist remains at the center of our church's communication efforts. This historic publication dates to 1881. Currently, it goes out to more than 11,500 subscribers twice monthly and features an array of insightful and informative news, features and opinions. A complete redesign of the publication was introduced in January 1999. Bishop Janice Riggle Huie writes a regular column. Readers also get news about local church happenings, church leaders, vital programs and developments in ministry across the Area, jurisdiction and throughout the church. Jane Dennis continues as editor.

The Arkansas Area Media Center, located at 715 Center St., Room 202, received a major update and renovation in 1998, including the installation of new carpet and shelving and a fresh coat of paint. The center's extensive videotape collection is being reorganized for improved and easy access. United Methodist clergy, laity, church leaders, groups and individuals are encouraged to take advantage of the economical rental of the Center's videos to enhance ministries of the church. Gloria Caldwell serves as Media Center librarian.

United Methodist Printing Services, also located at the United Methodist Center, 715 Center St., functions as a "print shop" supportive of Arkansas Area and conference ministries, as well as local churches and individuals. UM Printing Services produces printed materials (brochures, flyers, stationery, business cards, etc.) at a very economical price. Creative design services are also offered. Laura Organ is manager of UM Printing Services.



Ministries utilizing electronic media -- including television, radio and the Internet -- are expanding in the Arkansas Area. Thirty-second television spots promoting the denomination were aired in central Arkansas in 1998 as part of a TV campaign test market by United Methodist Communications (UMCom), Nashville, Tenn., and more TV ad placements may be forthcoming in 1999. These spots are also available to local churches to air on local cable and network stations. Local churches across Arkansas also utilizing a whole host of UMCom-produced radio spots on a variety of topics and in an array of musical styles and formats.

The area also maintains two websites-www.gbgm-umc.org/arkansas (Arkansas Area), and www.gbgm-umc.org/arkansasnews (Arkansas United Methodist newspaper.)

These sites contain current news and information about late-breaking developments and ministries of the United Methodist Church in Arkansas. In addition, more than 500 persons with e-mail are currently connected through the United Methodist E-mail Network, which is maintained by volunteer coordinator James W. "Jim" Lane of Sherwood. (To find out more, e-mail him at JimLane@swbell.net.)

Communication is a key and vital ministry for the United Methodist Church in Arkansas. It must not be taken for granted, but recognized as essential to our "connection" and our calling to make disciples for Jesus Christ. We sincerely appreciate the continued support for Arkansas Area Communication ministries shown by United Methodist clergy and laity across the state.

Church Extension Funding

Listed under LRC Policy Statements

The mission of the Little Rock Conference Board of Higher Education & Campus Ministry (BHECM) is to involve all individuals related to higher education (i.e., students, faculty, administration, support staff, campus ministers, parents, local churches, local campus ministry boards) and to influence the direction of institutions and ministries. Such influences may take many forms, including speaking the prophetic word.

Since all life is sacred, the mission involves the whole person, body, mind, spirit and their relation to one another and all the rest of God's creation. Toward this end, the final goal of United Methodist involvement in higher education is the transformation of persons and society into God's image.

The BHECM continues to receive the self-evaluations of individual ministries and evaluations of programs from each Wesley Foundation director and each campus ministry. This is an ongoing formal evaluation process that takes place annually. We hope that these evaluations will help improve the ministries on the college campuses we serve. Along with this evaluation process we are continuing a program of strategic planning. It is our belief that this strategic planning will assist Wesley Foundations in strengthening its ministry.

Two very special initiatives that the Wesley Foundations will be involved in during the 1999-2000 academic year will involve pilot programs sponsored by the General Board of Global Ministries. One program will be to establish Shalom Zones at Hendrix College, Philander Smith College, the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff, and the University of Arkansas at Little Rock. Special emphasis will be placed on developing a community in which the Wesley Foundations will work with the communities surrounding their campuses to empower leaders and residents to plan their community's future and to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ. The second initiative involves a pilot program with UALR Wesley Foundation and the University of Arkansas at Little Rock. This program will be centered around developing a pilot program involving the faith community and the prevention of drug and alcohol abuse on the college campus.

Ministries of our Wesley Foundation and campus ministries are making a difference in the lives of college students in the Little Rock Conference. Due to the growing programs at Wesley Foundations & campus ministries, the BHECM recommends an apportionment of \$301,359 for the Wesley Foundations, which is an 8% increase over the 1999 amount. The amount is divided equally among the five Wesley Foundations. The BHECM recommends an apportionment of \$220,769 for Hendrix College, which represents a 3% increase, and an apportionment of \$69,943 for Philander Smith College, which represents a 5% increase from the 1999 amount.

It is the belief of the BHECM that Wesley Foundations and campus ministries are making disciples of Jesus Christ by offering college students an opportunity to be in service, to worship together as a part of the body of Christ, to study and grow in their faith.

Further, we are happy to report that a representative of the Commission took part in the winter meeting of the Annual Conference Chairpersons of Religion and Race (South Central Jurisdiction) at Dallas, Texas. We were represented also during the retirement celebration of past General Secretary of Religion and Race, Barbara Ricks Thompson in Washington, D.C., last Fall.

The primary purpose of the Conference Commission on Religion and Race is to challenge in a spiritual way, the agencies, institutions and other connectional structures of the Conference, to a full and equal participation of the racial and ethnic constituency in the total life and mission of the Conference through advocacy, and by reviewing and monitoring the practices of the Conference so as to further insure racial inclusiveness. ***The Book of Discipline, Para. 640.***

During the next year, the Commission will continue to carry out its charge, while at the same time, availing ourselves in a more direct way, to assist any person(s), agencies, institutions, local churches, districts or other entities that might need help in making disciples of Jesus Christ and making real the "Vision of the Inclusive Church." We encourage calls for our assistance, and we will be delighted to come to any of the districts. We are a resource to be utilized.

Lest we forget, there is still need for the Conference to develop **A Program to Emphasize Inclusiveness in All Dimensions of the Church** in keeping with the Resolution found on page 356 of ***The Book of Resolutions, 1996***. Such program would include strategies for a conference-wide enlistment and recruitment program that seeks clergy and laity who will give themselves to cross-racial, and cross-cultural appointments, and much more.

Policy Statement on Misconduct of a Sexual Nature

The United Methodist church affirms the 1996 Book of Resolutions, Sexual Abuse Within the Ministerial Relationship and Sexual Harassment Within the church, which states that sexual abuse within the ministerial relationship and sexual harassment within the church as incompatible with biblical teachings of hospitality, justice and healing. In accordance with the 1996 *Book of Discipline*, ¶ 65.F, all human beings, both male and female, are created in the image of God, and thus have been made equal in Christ. As the promise of Galatians 3:26-29, states all are one in Christ, we support equity among all persons without regard to ethnicity, situation, or gender.

Sexual abuse within the ministerial relationship occurs when a person within a ministerial role of leadership (pastor, educator, counselor, youth leader or other position of leadership) engages in sexual contact or sexualized behavior with a congregant, client, employee, student, staff member, co-worker or volunteer.

Sexual harassment is any unwanted sexual advance or demand, either verbal or physical, that is reasonably perceived by the recipient as demeaning, intimidating, or coercive. Sexual harassment includes, but is not limited to, the creation of a hostile or abusive working environment resulting from discrimination on the basis of gender (the *Book of Discipline* ¶ 65.I).



Sexual abuse within the ministerial relationship involves a betrayal of sacred trust, a violation of the ministerial role and exploitation of those who are vulnerable. Similarly, sexual harassment must be understood as an exploitation of a power relationship rather than as an exclusively sexual issue.

Misconduct of a sexual nature within the life of the church interferes with its moral mission. United Methodist Church stands in opposition to the sin of misconduct of a sexual nature in the Church and society at large and commits itself to fair and expedient investigation of any charge of sexual misconduct within the church and to take action deemed appropriate and in compliance with the *Book of Discipline*. Further, the United Methodist Church bears affirmative responsibility to create an environment of hospitality for all persons, male or female, which is free of misconduct of a sexual nature and encourages respect, equality and kinship in Christ.

Some instances of sexual harassment can be resolved easily and informally between the parties. In all other instances, misconduct of a sexual nature should be reported to the chair of the Staff-Parish Relations Committee and the pastor in charge. If the conduct involves a clergy person, it should be reported to the district superintendent or the presiding bishop.

Little Rock Conference Commission on Status and Role of Women
A Checklist for Church Response to
Professional and Pastoral Sexual Abuse

Listed below are a variety of suggestions for churches to use when responding to pastoral and professional abuse. Primarily focused on pastoral sexual abuse, they are divided into four sections: prevention, policies and procedures, practical suggestions for responding to victims, offenders, and the congregation, and general congregational education. The is a beginning outline: adapt it and add to it as appropriate.

VII. Prevention

- A. Have in place clear policies/ethical guidelines/expectations as part of seminary training, and ordination and call processes.
- B. Find ways to promote and support individual clergy health (personal and professional.)
 - 1. Give clergy sufficient time off and continuing education opportunities to reduce risk of burnout or isolation.
 - 2. Be reasonable in expectations for pastor’s workload, giving consideration to personal/familial relationships.
 - 3. Give funding and support for collegial consultation and supervision from outside the congregation.
 - a. This may include consultation with professional care givers when needed.
 - b. Peer support groups for pastors exist in some cluster areas.
 - 4. Encourage clergy to make appropriate counseling referrals. Some church policies limit the number of sessions clergy will counsel a person before referring to another professional.
- C. Attend to the health of the institution (congregation, denomination, or organization).
 - 1. Ensure an open system; one which has a clear, accessible complaint process.

2. Ascertain clear expectation between pastor and congregation, during the ordination and call processes.
3. Establish an active pastoral relations committee to provide accountability for the pastor.
4. Share leadership among laity and pastor.
5. Openly state reasonable expectations of clergy's workload and skill.
6. Include education on sexual violence in worship services or special events.
(See Section IV below.)

VIII. Policies and Procedures: Clear, thorough policies and procedures include:

- A. Introduction/preface to policy, explaining why it is needed. May include assumptions, underlying principles, definitions, standards of conduct.
- B. Clear mechanism for reporting the abuse including to whom and where.
 1. One option is to create national or regional "sexual misconduct response teams."
 2. Include assurance of due process in the assessment of complaints:
 - a. If invalid, restoration of the pastor's or professional's credibility.
 - b. If valid, discipline of the pastor or professional as outline below, in order to:
 - (1) Protect and restore victim(s).
 - (2) Restore the integrity of the profession.
 - (3) Restore the congregation or organization.
 - (4) Restore the offending person to professional health if possible.
- C. Response to the offending pastor, which may include:
 1. Disciplinary action, such as handling of credentialing.
 2. Therapeutic evaluation and/or treatment.
- D. Response to victim(s), which may include:
 1. Caring support with sensitivity.
 2. Appointment of advocate/support person.
 3. Therapy referral if desired by victim(s).
 4. Opportunity given for victims to meet together.
- E. Response to congregation or agency, which may include:
 1. Denominational leader meeting with affected congregation.
 2. Notifying members in writing of charges and action taken.
 3. Making available trained resource person(s) to assist in congregational healing process.
- F. Issues related to wider community, such as:
 1. Releasing information to media.
 2. Handling legal issues.
 3. Putting in place denominational mechanism to ensure appropriate information regarding professional standing follows relocation of the professional to other district/congregation or organization.

IX. Responding to Victims, Offenders, and the Congregation: Practical Suggestions

- A. Responding to victims:
 1. Believe the victim's story. Support the victim in "breaking the silence."
 2. If the abuse involves a child, notify the local Family and Children Services.
 3. Support the victim in doing whatever is necessary to stop the abuse.
 4. Offer support to the victim's family. Do not withdraw. Treat this as you would other crises, offering practical as well as emotional support.
 5. Offer to pay for counseling.
 6. Form special support groups around the victim(s).
- B. Responding to offenders:

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1. Know that the offender will require therapy to overcome his/her tendency to abuse. Insist on professional treatment.
 2. Offer the offender a place to sort out spiritual issues of sin, guilt, repentance, forgiveness.
 3. Form support groups around the offender and around the non-offending spouse.
- C. Congregational Processing:
1. Church leadership must declare themselves to be firmly opposed to sexual violence of all kinds.
 2. Invite other survivors to declare themselves, and offer support to them.
 3. As a professional to lead an information meeting.
 4. Provide clear, direct information to people it concerns most. Provide opportunities for people to talk safely, ask questions, be educated. (See "Trauma Debriefing" in Spring 1991 issue of *Conciliation Quarterly*, pp. 12-13.)
 5. Guard against premature reconciliation, or easy forgiveness. Justice-making requires a remorseful recognition of wrongdoing by the offender, a genuine desire to make amends, and a commitment to changed behavior.
 6. Consider a time for storytelling by key parties to the congregation as part of the healing process for everyone.
 7. Interact with community resources.
 - a. Work with the criminal justice system to assist in justice-making where criminal charges have been brought.
 - b. Use the expertise of the counseling profession to aid the healing of individuals and the congregation.
 8. Prepare yourselves for a long, complex, wearying process. Know that truth telling, justice-making, support and God's gracious love hold the keys for healing.
- X. General Congregational Education on Sexual Violence
- A. Plan a sermon or series of sermons on the topic.
 - B. Offer a Sunday School/Christian Education elective.
 - C. Include topic in children's time.
 - D. Design a special event, utilizing expertise of an outside professional.
 - E. Add library resources, such as books and packets on sexual abuse.
 - F. Publicize community resources such as women's shelter, rape crisis centers, counseling services.
 - G. Educate clergy and lay leaders to take note of warning signs of professional and pastoral abuse, and to follow their concerns with caring, open interest.
 - H. Hold seminars on human sexuality and relationships in general.

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LITTLE ROCK ANNUAL CONFERENCE
SEXUAL HARASSMENT POLICY

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Because the church's mission relates to the call in Christ to be a church for all persons, a safe place where each can receive and give ministry with the gifts God freely bestows; because the will of the General Conference as recorded in the *Discipline* and the Resolutions is to be a church of justice and mercy; and because we trust that God's grace is at work;

THEREFORE, this policy of the Little Rock/North Arkansas Annual Conference addresses the conduct of the clergy and church professionals (consecrated and certified) in order:

- 1) to provide for the safety of parishioners and clergy/church professionals,
- 2) to protect the unique relationships which clergy/church professionals have with peers and parishioners in all settings,
- 3) to ensure the health, authenticity, and integrity of the church.

This policy is submitted to the Annual Conference in faithfulness to the call to Equality in Christ (Galatians 3:28) and to the mandate of the General Conference as recorded in the Social Principles and the 1992 General Conference resolution, "Sexual Harassment in the United Methodist Church."

Sexual harassment is an unwanted behavior with a sexual connotation. It is any sexually related behavior that is unwelcome, offensive, depersonalizing, or which fails to respect the rights and feelings of others. It may be verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature. Such behaviors create an intimidating, hostile, and offensive environment.

This policy is based upon an understanding that protects all persons and which acknowledges the clergy/church professionals' inherent position of power and total responsibility -- moral, ethical, and professional -- for maintaining conduct worthy of the sacred trust and power placed in them.

This policy is intended to provide an additional informal process for the resolution of grievances within the North Arkansas/Little Rock Annual Conference. It is not intended to supplant or substitute for the formal grievance process and its attendant fair process protections in *The Book of Discipline*. It is intended to assist persons to reach resolution or reconciliation prior to moving into the formality of the Disciplinary grievances. Failure to utilize or follow any of the procedures herein is not a chargeable offense, nor can it be used as grounds for an appeal of a formal grievance, complaint, review, investigation, or trial process.

Local churches are encouraged to utilize this policy in the formulation of policies for all their employees.

PROCEDURES

A. If you experience what you consider to be inappropriate behavior, keep a written record of your experiences including dates, times, places, and witnesses. Keep any written material you may have received from the person.

You may wish to confront the person with the inappropriate behavior and demand that it cease.

If you choose not to confront the person alone, you may ask someone to accompany you to confront the person and seek reconciliation.

If you choose not to confront the person, or if the behavior continues, report the incident to the chair of the person's appropriate evaluating committee (e.g., a pastor or church staff member would be reported to the chair of the staff/pariah relations committee; a district superintendent to the chair of the committee on superintendency; a bishop to the chair of the committee on episcopacy).

If the conflict is not resolved to your satisfaction, the committee chair shall convene the entire committee to meet with the accused, the person bringing the accusations, and each supporting person.

If the situation is not resolved satisfactorily following these efforts, then follow the discipline's procedures for grievances, complaints, and charges.

B. If you are confronted by someone who has experienced or observed inappropriate behavior on your part, listen to the accusation and agree to change the behavior or otherwise resolve the situation and reconcile the relationship.

If you are unable to resolve the situation with your accuser, contact the chair of your appropriate evaluating committee. Ask to meet with your accuser and the committee chair to resolve the conflict. The accused and the person bringing the accusation each has the right to bring a supportive person to this meeting.

If the conflict remains unresolved, the committee chair shall convene the entire committee to meet with the accused, the person bringing the accusations, and each supporting person.

C. If you receive a report of inappropriate behavior, listen seriously and objectively. Help the person follow the steps outlined above.

If you are a clergy/church professional in a paid supervisory position in the local church or a conference agency, and an employee is being harassed, you should immediately take corrective or preventative action.

According to Arkansas law, any person receiving a report from a child under age 18, indicating sexual abuse of that child, is required to report the abuse to the proper authorities.

IMPLEMENTATION

Following initial training for all clergy/church professionals in March 1994, they should receive training periodically, provided or approved by the Board of Ordained Ministry/Board of Diaconal Ministry on a regular basis for persons being appointed for the first time in the Annual Conference.

Local churches are urged to participate in educational opportunities on sexual ethics and conduct. Agencies and affiliated institutions are strongly encouraged to provide educational opportunities on sexual ethics and conduct.

1998 was a good year for adult ministry in the Little Rock Annual Conference. Working through the Education and Camping Committees, we sponsored *The Grandparent Connection* Camp in October for the third year with approximately 70 grandchildren and grandparents in attendance

Again working with the Education Committee, a design team has been actively planning and promoting an event to train and nurture teachers of adults. This conference event, called *Been There Done That. What Next*, will be offered March 13, 1999 at Camp Tanako. The attendance goal for this event is 200 participants. Dr. Ellsworth Kalas, Biblical scholar, seminary professor, and author, will be the keynote speaker. Dr. Kalas is the author of *Parables from the Backside, Ten Commandments from the Back Side, The Grand Sweep*, and many other books and United Methodist curriculum pieces. In addition to Dr. Kalas’ two convocations, the following workshops will be offered at this training event:

The Little Rock Annual Conference will celebrate the International Year of Older Persons at the Laity Lunch with Dr. Elbert Cole of Kansas City, Founder of the Shepherd Centers, and a retired United Methodist pastor, as speaker.

Remember—the Age Wave is coming—the Baby Boomers are coming of age. Next year, 2000, 50% of the UMC will be 60 and older Please help us make 1999 a time of addressing the independence, care, participation and dignity of older persons.

SINGLE ADULT MINISTRIES

Upon acceptance of the position of Single Adult Ministries in 1997, Coordinators Rusty Johnson and Laurie Commer, developed the following goals for the ministry. The following is a review of those goals and the status of the ministry:

Long Range Goals for Little Rock Conference Singles

- To offer training to representatives from local churches on the mechanics of singles ministry by:
 - Developing resources
 - Bibliography/reading list
 - Mentoring team
- To cultivate persons who can come into leadership roles of singles ministry to

promote and support training events on jurisdictional and national levels.

- To hold a conference-wide event with guest speaker Harold Ivan Smith; to possibly follow an Annual Conference.

Objectives and Tasks

- Promote and participate in the Jurisdictional Single Adult Leadership event held at Mount Sequoyah in October.
 - Offer and promote monetary scholarships for participants on district, conference and local church levels.
 - Little Rock Annual Conference (LRAC) was represented at the 1998 jurisdictional event with less than 10 participants. Seventeen (17) persons from the LRAC participated in the 1998 event. Some participants received district and conference funding.
- Support to single parents; to convey that single parents are a vital part of Christ's community. The cost of the event would be less than \$20.00 per family. Scholarship monies available to persons in need.
 - Offer a one-day event for single parents and their children, ages 10 and under.

1999 Little Rock Annual Conference

- - Representatives from LRAC met with the Singles Coordinator of North Arkansas Conference and agreed to offer this event as a statewide event.
 - Plans and preparations were carried out for an event in 1997. However, the event had few registrations and was not offered.
 - Another event was organized and planned for September 1998 (again with North Arkansas Conference). 9 adults and 16 children registered for the event and the event was held at Camp Tanako.
- Increase the support of Divorce Recovery through local churches by sponsoring a training event for potential leaders of divorce recovery groups.
 - Working with North Arkansas Conference, offer a Divorce Recovery workshop for potential workshop leaders within the local church. Sandra Scott, Disciple Resources author to be asked to lead the workshop. Workshop to be offered in Little Rock area.
 - Jurisdictional, conference and district funding to be sought for this event. Scholarship monies available to persons in need.
 - Statewide advertising of event by annual conference packets, The *Arkansas Methodist*, Conference Connections, district newsletters, local church newsletters and mass mailings.

NATIVE AMERICAN MINISTRY

The committee met March 15, 1999, to plan for the work for this year. Two persons from this committee will attend a national meeting, April 30-May 2, in Tulsa, Oklahoma to submit our plan and learn from other presentations how to better operate as a committee.

- Interpretive material will be provided at annual conference.
- We will connect with VIM to encourage VIM trips to the Oklahoma Indian Missionary Conference.
 - We will continue to explore the possibility of meeting as a Area-Wide committeein the future.
 - Native American Awareness Sunday receipts are divided equally between the Conference and the National Committees. Conference receipts were \$960.23 and National receipts were \$960.23.

The Conference Fair Share Apportionment is \$7,500.00 and the 1998 receipts were \$4,098.85. We still have work to do here.

Indigenous people all over the world are the least cared for people in the countries of their origin. Jesus said, "When you have done it to the least of these you have done it to me." Let us take that admonition to heart and support the mission to minister to the Native Americans in our midst.

1999 Little Rock Annual Conference
BOARD OF ORDAINED MINISTRY
1998 Policy Statement
(1996 Discipline References)

SECTION I: BOARD OPERATION

- A. The Little Rock Conference Board of Ordained Ministry proposes to work within the framework of the current Discipline of The United Methodist Church.
- B. The officers elected by the Board are: Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Secretary, and Division Chairs. Other officers shall be appointed by the Chairperson.
- C. The Executive Committee is the elected officers, Chair of the Order of Elders, Chair of the Order of Deacons, and the Cabinet representative(s).
- D. The Board is divided into classes who may serve a maximum of three consecutive four year terms. The Executive Committee is responsible for reporting expired terms to the Bishop who shall consult with the Board Chairperson and the Cabinet in making nominations to the Annual Conference [¶633.a].
- E. The Board shall meet at least in the fall, in the spring, and on call of the Chairperson.
- F. The Board shall have a representative on each District Committee on Ordained Ministry [¶ 633.1f]. In consultation with the District Superintendent, the Chairperson shall appoint a member to serve on each District Committee.
- G. The Board's sources of income shall be:
 - 1. A designated amount from the Conference Council on Administration for administrative costs.
 - 2. Twenty-five percent of the amount remitted by local churches to the Ministerial Education Fund.
 - 3. Gifts, bequests, interest on notes, and repayment of loans.
- H. The Board's policy statement shall be reviewed annually and revised as needed by a committee appointed by the Chairperson of the Board.
- I. Policy statements of the Board shall be presented to the Annual Conference for approval or amendment, provided that all policies shall be in accordance with the current Discipline.

SECTION II: CANDIDACY

- A. The first step into the ordained ministry of The United Methodist Church is to consult with one's pastor concerning a personal "call to ministry." If after the consultation, one desires to inquire into the ministry process, he/she will participate in the Ministry Inquiry Process with a Guide. After completing the Inquiry Process to explore ordained ministry he/she shall write to the Superintendent of his/her District requesting to be enrolled in Candidacy Studies. The District Superintendent will provide an enrollment form and appoint a Candidacy Mentor.
- B. The Guide in the Ministry Inquiry Process can be any committed Christian - lay, diaconal, deacon in full connection, or elder -- who has already experienced God's call and responded by seeking guidance and discernment in her or his own life through this or other similar programs.
- C. The Board shall maintain a list of qualified Candidacy Mentors. This list shall be mailed to District Superintendents annually. Candidacy Mentors

shall be selected by the Candidacy Registrar and approved by the District Superintendents and the Board.

- D. All Candidacy Mentors, and those nominated to become Candidacy Mentors, shall attend training events to be scheduled by the Candidacy Registrar and Board as needed.

SECTION III: LOCAL PASTOR'S LICENSE

A. Local Pastor's License School

1. An annual School for persons seeking a Local Pastor's License shall be held jointly with the Board of Ordained Ministry of the North Arkansas Conference.
2. The School's Planning Committee shall be: The Local Pastor Registrars of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences, with consultation by the Boards of Ordained Ministry of the two Conferences.
3. In agreement with the North Arkansas Conference Board, the Little Rock Conference Board shall:
 - a. Provide one-half of the administrative costs of the School.
 - b. Provide two faculty members.
 - c. Provide the Dean as negotiated with the North Arkansas Conference.
 - d. Provide a Registrar for Little Rock Conference students.
 - e. Pay room, board and travel for the two faculty members and the Dean [when the Dean is from the Little Rock Conference], plus an honorarium of \$200.00 for each faculty member and Dean.
 - f. Provide all but \$225.00 of the expenses for room and board for each student. Books will be provided. This applies only to those students successfully completing the school.
 - g. All persons attending Local Pastor's License School must have written recommendations from the District Superintendent.
4. An evaluation of each student shall be forwarded to the Local Pastor Registrar, the Candidacy Registrar, and the student's District Superintendent.
5. The Local Pastor's License School requirement is waived for the following:
 - a. Those who have completed at least one-half of the requirements for a M.Div. or equivalent degree at an approved seminary.
 - b. Those United Methodist pastors in Full Connection who transfer to the Little Rock Conference.
 - c. Those who have completed an approved Local Pastor's License School in another Annual Conference.

- B. All persons receiving a Local Pastor's License shall be a certified candidate for ministry, have completed the entire Local Pastor's License School, shall have completed a psychological evaluation and a background check by the Board of Ordained Ministry, shall have been named to an appointment, and assigned a local pastor mentor.

SECTION IV: COURSE OF STUDY AND ADVANCED COURSE OF STUDY

- A. Persons desiring to enter the Basic Course of Study shall:
 - 1. Be recommended by their District Superintendent.
 - 2. Forward to the Local Pastor Registrar a registration form annually by March 15.
- B. Persons desiring to enter the Advanced Course of Study shall:
 - 1. Apply to Local Pastor Registrar by March 15.
 - 2. Appear before the Board requesting permission to enroll.
 - a. Permission is based on a person's exceptional promise for ordained ministry.
 - b. Completion of the Advanced Course of Study does not imply recommendation for Probationary Membership.
 - 3. Meet all disciplinary [¶315.6] and Board requirements.
- C. Financial assistance from the Board, for persons under appointment, shall include:
 - 1. 80% of tuition, registration fees, room, and board for the Basic Course of Study.
 - 2. 100 % of tuition only for those enrolled in correspondence Courses.
 - 3. Reimbursement of up to \$135 for each completed course in the Advanced Course of Study.

SECTION V: RELATIONSHIP TO SEMINARY STUDENTS

- A. Persons planning to enter seminary and expecting to serve in the Little Rock Conference should meet with the District Board of Ordained Ministry, prior to enrolling in a seminary.
- B. Those desiring to receive financial aid from the Board while attending seminary shall:
 - 1. Prior to requesting assistance, meet with the District Board of Ordained Ministry.
 - 2. Complete all requirements for "Candidacy for Ministry" [¶ 306]
 - 3. Complete a baccalaureate degree from a college/university listed by the University Senate; or a competency equivalence through an external degree program at a college/university listed by the University Senate.
 - 4. Maintain a grade point average sufficient to insure graduation.
 - 5. Maintain a current mailing address with the District Board of Ordained Ministry or District Superintendent.
- C. Financial assistance is provided through the Ministerial Education Fund.
 - 1. Financial assistance is in the form of "service loans" which are repaid through service in United Methodist ministry. The recipient must repay the "service loan" by serving five years in the connection in appointments approved by the Bishop. [¶ 821.1a] . In case of less than 5 years of service, the amount due is reduced by 20% for each year of service given after seminary graduation.
 - 2. The loan is secured by a legally binding note signed by those receiving financial assistance. In the event that the student does not enter United Methodist ministry, or serve long enough to repay the loan, the loan shall become due and interest from the date of issuance shall be applied. A repayment schedule shall begin within

six months.

- D. The financial application process shall be:
1. Request from the District Superintendent the application and note forms.
 2. Forward the completed forms to the Chair of Educational Funding of the respective division for approval. The registrar of the respective division will return your form to your district Superintendent.
 3. Release and mail to your Chair of Educational Funding of the respective division official grade reports for the previous semester.
 4. Applications must be received by September 1 for the fall semester; January 15 for the spring semester; and June 15 for the summer term (s).
- E. Additional guidelines for receiving financial assistance:
1. Assistance is available for students in the basic seminary degree program, or in completion of History, Doctrine and Polity Courses. Advanced seminary degree programs are excluded.
 2. Full assistance is available to full-time students. Part-time students may receive aid on a pro-rata basis.
 3. Assistance may be received for four academic years only.
 4. Courses not completed require the student to refund to the Board the portion of assistance received for that course(s). Additional assistance may not be granted until this requirement is met.
 5. Assistance for summer terms will be based on the number of academic hours taken in comparison with a regular semester's full-time academic load.
- F. Amount of financial assistance available shall be:
1. The Board shall review annually the maximum amount of assistance available, based on a percentage of the seminary's tuition cost.
 2. The current assistance is up to thirty percent (30%) of the tuition cost.
 3. Financial assistance shall not exceed \$7,000 annually to any seminarian.
 4. Grants for United Methodist History, Doctrine, and Polity courses may not exceed \$200 [See Section IX; 2.b(4)].
- G. Emergency Aid:
1. Additional aid for emergency situations may be granted to seminary students when requested: for health reasons, or for those having critical personal or family needs.
 2. The Executive Committee must approve the request for emergency aid in an amount not to exceed \$400. Emergency grants beyond this amount shall be considered by the Board.

SECTION VI: PSYCHOLOGICAL EVALUATIONS

- A. A psychological evaluation is required for all persons who are to be certified as candidates. Anyone coming into a permanent relationship with the Annual Conference must have had a psychological assessment (with exceptions to be made for those transferring in from the North Arkansas Conference.)
1. Those who may apply for readmission to ministerial appointment shall receive an additional psychological evaluation, as mandated by the Discipline.
 2. An additional psychological evaluation may be required during the ordination process if deemed advisable by the Board.

- B. The psychologist(s) shall be selected by the Board.
- C. The cost of the evaluation shall be paid by the Board except for persons seeking readmission.
- D. The procedure for seeking an evaluation, and receiving the report of the evaluation, is as follows:
1. The respective District Board of Ordained Ministry will provide information on psychological assessments to those persons seeking to be certified as candidates.
 2. The candidate will contact the psychologist to schedule an appointment.
 3. The psychologist will forward a copy of the report to the Chair of Psychological Evaluations and to the District Superintendent of the respective DBOM.
 4. The chair will forward a copy of the report to the BOM representative on the respective DBOM.
 5. If a psychological evaluation is requested/mandated at other times than candidacy,
 - a. Information on psychological assessment will be given by the Chair of Psychological Evaluations
 - b. Persons will contact the psychologist directly to schedule an appointment.
 - c. Psychologist will forward a copy of the report to the Chair of Psychological Evaluations.
- E. The evaluation shall include:
1. A minimum of two personal interviews.
 - a) An introductory interview will be prior to the psychologist's reading of test results.
 - b) A second interview will follow the testing to interpret results.
 2. If additional interviews are recommended by the psychologist, the cost will be paid by the candidate.
- F. On receipt of a signed release by the candidate, the psychologist will present a written evaluation of the candidate to the Chair of the Evaluation Committee of the Board, and to the respective District BOM, care of the District Superintendent. Deadlines for receiving such reports shall be October 1 and February 15.
1. The Evaluation Committee shall consist of the Chair of Psychological Evaluations and representatives from the District Committees on Ordained Ministry.
 2. The Evaluation Committee's recommendation shall be communicated to the appropriate District Superintendent (for candidates) or the Board (for persons seeking readmission or for whom an additional evaluation is requested).
 3. The Board shall only have access to the full results of a person's psychological evaluation when deemed necessary by the Evaluation Committee.
 4. Candidates unwilling to sign a form to release results of their evaluation will be discontinued.
- G. The permission form to release a psychological evaluation reads:
- I (Candidate's Name), do hereby grant permission to (Psychologist's Name) to release his/her evaluation of my test scores and interviews to members of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry, and the appropriate District Board of Ordained Ministry, of the Little Rock Annual

Conference. I understand this evaluation may be used in the application process for admission into the Little Rock Annual Conference. I further understand that the Boards of Ordained Ministry have the right to discontinue my application should I refuse to make this evaluation available to them.

I also understand this permission to release this written evaluation grants permission to the Boards of Ordained Ministry to use this information in the interview process. I do also give my permission to (Psychologist's Name) to use this evaluation without reference to my name for the purpose of research only. No other use of this evaluation may be made without my express written consent.

- H. Written evaluations become the joint property of the Board, held in administrative confidence by the Evaluation Committee and the psychologist(s), and of the individuals. Results of the evaluation may not be released to anyone else without the express written consent of the candidate. The evaluations shall be held in the possession of the psychologist for a period of time not to exceed three years following admission of the candidate to membership in the Conference. After the three year period, the written evaluations may be destroyed or converted to a protected anonymous status for the purpose of research only.
- I. Any candidate who is denied ordination or admission into the Annual Conference may request permission of the Board to obtain a second opinion from a psychiatric or psychological professional mutually agreeable to the candidate and the Board. Costs of a second evaluation shall be borne by the candidate. The Board will consider evaluations from a second professional as part of the total application process for the candidate.

SECTION VII: BACKGROUND CHECKS

- A. A background check is required for all persons who are to be certified as candidates. Anyone coming into a permanent relationship with the Annual Conference must have had a background check (with exceptions to be made for those transferring in from the North Arkansas Conference.)
1. Those who may apply for readmission to ministerial appointment shall receive an additional background check.
 2. An additional background check may be required during the ordination process if deemed advisable by the Board.
- B. The cost of the background check shall be paid by the Board except for persons seeking readmission.
- C. The procedure for seeking a background check and receiving a report of the check is as follows:
1. The respective District Board of Ordained Ministry will provide information on background checks to those persons seeking to be certified as candidates.

2.

The candidate will complete the form, have it notarized, and return it to the DBOM, who will then forward the information for the appropriate check.
3.

The completed results of the background check will be forwarded to the Conference Chair of Evaluations.
4.

The chair will forward a copy of the report to the District Superintendent on the respective DBOM.
5.

The Board shall only have access to the full results of a person's - background check when deemed necessary by the Evaluation Committee.
6.

Candidates unwilling to sign a form to release results of their background check will be discontinued.
- D.

Results of the background checks become the joint property of the Board, held in administrative confidence by the Evaluation Committee and of the individuals. Results of the background check may not be released to anyone else without the express written consent of the candidate. The background check shall be held in the possession of the BOM for a period of time not to exceed ten years following admission of the candidate to membership in the Conference.
- E.

SECTION VIII: PROBATIONARY PROCESS

- A. Candidates who have completed all educational requirements, are serving a full-time appointment, and are applicants for admission into full membership and ordination, shall enter into a probationary process for a period of not less than three years.
- B. This process shall be coordinated and supervised by the Probationary Chairs for the Division of Deacons and Division of Elders of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry and shall be in full accordance with the disciplinary

requirements and such other requirements as deemed necessary by the Annual Conference [¶¶ 317-318, 321, 326].

- C. The purpose of the probationary process is to support each probationary member with caring groups. These groups are invited to explore with the probationer the possibilities and challenges of ordained ministry and his/her growth in ministry.
- D. Basic to the caring process is the establishment of a local Committee of Concern which is the official committee on the local level representing the probationary process of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry. The Committee of Concern functions in the following ways:
 - 1. To help the probationer meet the requirements for full conference membership.
 - 2. To enable the probationer to make transitions into the ministry with support and guidance.
 - 3. To encourage the probationer to examine the issues of effectiveness in ministry with regard to his/her own performance.
 - 4. To give opportunity for each committee member to grow in ministry and self understanding.
- E. The Committee of Concern shall be composed of the following persons:
 - 1. The probationer.
 - 2. An elder or deacon, chosen by the probationer.
 - 3. Four lay persons [two men and two women, if possible] chosen by the probationer, after consultation with the Chairperson of the Committee of Concern.
 - 4. The Chairperson [an elder or deacon appointed by the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry]
- F. The concept of the Committee of Concern presupposes a sense of covenant with one another in the group, with Christ, and with the Church. The mutual counseling relationship of the Committee is of paramount importance.
- G. In consultation with the District Superintendent, Chairperson of the Committee of Concern, the Committee and others, the probationer will develop a "Growth Covenant" stating his/her goals for personal and professional growth during the process.
- H. The Probationer's Committee will design a three-year program of growth opportunities, seminars, evaluations, retreats, and other requirements which must be completed in total by the probationer. Either the probationer or the Board may recommend the extension of the three year process if deemed advisable.
- I. By February 1st of the third year of probation, the probationer shall present to the Registrar of the respective division, Committee of Concern, and to the Probationary Chairperson of the respective division the written requirements for full member/ordination as deacon [321] or full member/ordination as elder [326]. Other work may also be required.
- J. The probationer may be required to complete an additional health and/or psychological exam and/or background check if deemed advisable by the Board.

SECTION IX: CONTINUING EDUCATION

A. Clergy Continuing Education - Rights and Obligations

- 1. Definitions
 - a. Clergy: refers to all ordained elders and deacons
 - b. Continuing education: equates to what is herein referred to as "continuing formation and spiritual growth".
 - 1. Continuing formation and spiritual growth involves both the intentional effort to learn something new, as well as a periodical

revisiting of an already accomplished learning with the intention to refresh it, improve it, or rethink its validity.

2. Continuing formation and spiritual growth often involve supervised or leader-directed activities. It can include self-directed activities.

2. Continuing Formation and Spiritual Growth (348)

- a. Clergy member's continuing formation and spiritual growth program should allow for such leaves of at least one week each year and at least one month during one year of each quadrennium. Such leaves shall not be considered as part of the minister's vacations.
- b. Clergy members who have held full-time appointments for at least five years may request a formational and spiritual growth leave of up to six months while continuing to hold a pastoral appointment. Such a leave shall be with the approval of the committee on pastor-parish relations, the church council, and the district superintendent.

B. Clergy Continuing Education - Policy for grants from the Board of Ordained Ministry

1. Elders in full connection and deacons in associate membership who are serving full-time appointments may receive grants from the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry of up to \$200 annually. This amount shall include only projected expenses for tuition, books, fees, room and board. Travel cannot be included as a projected expense. Persons seeking a grant shall secure an application form from the Chairperson of Educational Funding of the Division of Elders of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry. All requests for continuing education funds shall be forwarded to said Chairperson.
2. Deacons in full connection (i.e., former diaconal ministers) who are serving full-time appointments may receive grants from the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry of up to \$200 annually. This amount shall include only projected expenses for tuition, books, fees, room, and board. Travel cannot be included as a projected expense. Persons seeking a grant shall secure an application form from the Chairperson of Educational Funding of the Division of Deacons of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry. All requests for continuing education funds shall be forwarded to said Chairperson.
3. For hardship cases, scholarships are available to clergy and local pastors to attend the Conference on Leadership and Ministry. Such help is granted (a) upon the recommendation of the District Superintendent and (b) after all other avenues for aid have been exhausted.
4. No financial aid is available for Minister's Week at any seminary.

C. Diaconal Continuing Education - Policy for grants from the Board of Ordained Ministry

1. Scholarships are available for persons in certification and candidacy studies. Applicants may receive funds from the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry of up to \$200 annually. This amount shall include only projected expenses for tuition, books, fees, room, and

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board. Travel cannot be included as a projected expense.
2. Diaconal ministers may receive continuing education grants from the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry of up to \$200 annually. This amount shall include only projected expenses for tuition, books, fees, room, and board. Travel cannot be included as a projected expense. Persons seeking a grant shall secure an application form from the Chairperson of Educational Funding of the Division of Deacons of the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry. All requests for continuing education funds shall be forwarded to said Chairperson.

**SECTION X: ENTRY, EXIT, READMISSION TO CONFERENCE
RELATIONSHIP**

- A. Entry
- 1. Request for Conference Membership and Ordination
 - a. For probationary membership and commissioning, the candidate shall make application through his/her District Board on Ordained Ministry. The District Committees shall forward its recommendation to the registrar of the respective division by October 1 of each year.
 - b. For full membership and deacon's or elder's ordination, application shall be made to the registrar of the respective division by the candidate by October 1.
 - c. All requests for Conference membership shall be on file with the registrar of the respective division at least nine months prior to the session of Annual Conference.
 - d. Psychological testing and a background check by the Board of Ordained Ministry shall be required for any person seeking their first relationship with the Conference [see Section VI]. (Full members of the North Arkansas Conference are excluded from this requirement.)
 - e. A medical examination may be required for any person seeking a first time relationship with the Conference. The examination is to be on a prescribed form. The Board will reimburse the applicant up to \$200 for the examination. Any additional expenses [i.e. special tests] will be the responsibility of the applicant.
 - 2. Entry from Other Denominations
 - a. The Board shall follow specifically the provisions of ¶338.3 of the Discipline.
 - b. Ordained clergy or ordained elders from other denominations seeking entry into United Methodist ministry shall:
 - (1) Make no change in denominational or church affiliation prior to an interview with the Board.
 - (2) Serve under appointment for not less than twelve months with their present credentials before any Conference relationship may be recommended by the Board.
 - (3) Complete the Local Pastor's License School within twelve months of service under United Methodist appointment.
 - (4) Complete courses in United Methodist history,

doctrine, and polity within twenty-four months of service in The United Methodist Church. An amount, not to exceed \$200 may be granted the person upon completion of these studies.

- (5) Meet at least quarterly with a Probationary Mentor assigned by the Board for guidance and counsel concerning the conduct of United Methodist Ministry.

- (6) Attend New Pastor Orientation.

3. Upon becoming a probationary member, one shall enter and satisfactorily complete the three year probationary process [See Section VII].

B. Exiting

1. Whenever, and for whatever reason, a person related to the Annual Conference with a ministerial relationship leaves that relationship, the exiting shall be reviewed and approved by the Board of Ordained Ministry per requirements of the Discipline.
2. The Secretary of the Board shall record in the Board minutes the stated reason(s) for the exiting. The Registrar of the respective division shall enter into the person's record the stated reason(s) for his/her exiting. Additional statements shall be recorded from the Cabinet and the person who has exited.
3. Disciplinary procedures shall be followed as listed in the following paragraphs of the Discipline:
 - a. Discontinuance from Probationary Membership [¶358.3c]
 - b. Leave of Absence [¶ 322.4c, 351]
 - c. Family Leave [¶ 352]
 - d. Maternity/Paternity Leave [¶ 353]
 - e. Disability Leave [¶354]
 - f. Retirement [¶ 345.5, 355]
 - g. Honorable Location [¶ 356]
 - h. Withdrawal to Unite with Another Denomination [¶ 357.1]
 - i. Surrender of the Ordained Ministerial Office [¶ 357.2]
 - j. Withdrawal under Complaints or Charges [¶ 357.3]
 - k. Trial [¶ 358]
 - l. Administrative Location [¶ 358.3a-b]

C. Readmission to Conference Relationship

1. All requests for readmission to the Annual Conference for an appointment shall be presented to the Board of Ordained Ministry ninety days prior to the beginning session of the Annual Conference, unless stated otherwise in the Discipline.
2. The Board shall review all files and statements kept by the Board Secretary and Registrar of the respective division at the time of exiting.
3. All persons requesting readmission to a Conference relationship are required to submit to a psychological evaluation as prescribed in Section VI. The cost of this evaluation shall be borne by the person seeking readmission. A person returning from a Leave of Absence may have this requirement waived by the Chairperson and Registrar of the respective division of the Board of Ordained Ministry.
4. The following disciplinary procedures will be followed by the Conference for persons seeking readmission:

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a.

Return from Leave of Absence [¶ 351]

Return from Disability Leave [¶ 354]

c.

Readmission to Probationary Membership [¶359]

d.

Readmission after Honorable Location or Administrative Location [¶360]

Readmission after Surrender of the Ministerial Office 361

g.

After involuntary retirement [¶363]
5.

A person seeking readmission after having received Honorable Location, Administrative Location, or who surrendered the Ministerial Office shall serve a minimum of two years as a Local Pastor prior to receiving Conference relationship and credentials previously held.

Board of Ministry matters are decided in the Clergy Session.

Report No. 1

1.

We recommend that the Little Rock Conference participate in the Ministerial Pension (MPP) and the Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP) of the General Board of Pensions during 2000 on the following basis:
- a.

Contribution base shall be limited to each minister's plan compensation not to exceed the denominational average compensation.
- b.

Contribution rate shall be MPP, 12% of each minister's contribution base, and CPP, 4.4% of each minister's contribution base.
- c.

Annuity rate for pre-January 1, 1982 service shall be raised from \$405 to \$450 Per service year.
- d.

Surviving spouse percentage of the formula benefit rate shall be 70%.
- e.

A 10 year amortization period shall be used to pay the unfunded past service liability.
- f.

Monthly contributions to MPP/CPP shall be made through the apportionment system.
- g.

CPP death benefits will be supplemented by participation in Basic Protection Plan (BPP) at the discretion of each participant.
- h.

Every Conference member earning less than 60% of DAC from his/her primary salary paying unit may be included in CPP at the rate of 4.4% of his/her contribution base.
- i.

Probationers at seminary may participate in CPP at 4.4% - participant will pay.
- j.

Those on leave of absence may participate in CPP at the rate of 4.4%. The participant will pay the full 4.4%.

2. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 1506, Section 12.(2)e) of the 1996 Discipline that the Sunday following Easter be observed as Retired Minister's Day. Each Pastor is urged to acquaint his or her congregation with the pension program of the Conference as part of the observation, and if possible to use a retired minister in the Worship Service.
3. We recommend in keeping with Par. 1506, Section 4.h) of the 1996 Discipline line, the approval of the Annual Conference that Special appointments shall be listed in the Conference Journal as follows: (1) with pension responsibilities, (a) upon the Annual Conference, or (b) upon a General Board, an Institution, or an Agency of the United Methodist Church.
4. We recommend the following pertaining to the health insurance program of the Conference:
 - a. Board of Pensions pay 100% of the premium for our eligible retirees, surviving spouses, and ministers on disability for the Hospital and Medical Expense Program.
 - b. Conference Claimants: If a retired minister and/or spouse desires to have the premium for their Conference Hospitalization and Medical Insurance Program paid by the Board of Pensions, the minister must have been enrolled in the program prior to his/her 65th birthday. Likewise, if the spouse is to have the premium for the Program paid by the Conference, he/she must have been enrolled in the program for a minimum of one year prior to his/her 65th birthday or one year prior to the minister's retirement. If a minister's spouse is under the age of 65 at the time of that minister's retirement, the Board of Pensions will pay for that spouse an amount equal to the premium for a spouse over 65, plus 3% of the premium per each year of service by the said spouse in the Arkansas area, up to a total of 80% of the spouse's premium. (The words 'spouse' always refers to the same person.)
 - c. Spouses of Deceased Ministers: In the case of a deceased minister whose spouse is under the age of 65, the Board of Pensions will pay the dependent's insurance premium for five (5) years following the death of the minister. In the event of extenuating circumstances, an extension of payments may be requested by the dependent. Payment automatically ends with the remarriage of the dependent. Each case will be reviewed annually.
5. We recommend that an annual amount equal to 100% of the pension and disability payment of each minister of the Little Rock Conference be designated as housing allowance.
6. We recommend that in keeping with Par. 637, Section 4 of the 1996 Discipline that there shall be organized from the membership of the Board of Pensions of the Little Rock Conference a committee to compare the records of the amount paid by each pastoral charge for support of pastors: and for pension benefit purposes computing the proportional distribution thereof and keeping a permanent record of defaults of the ministers in the Conference who have failed to observe the provision in Par. 637, Section 4 pertaining to proportional payment, and shall render annually to each minister and charge in default a statement of amounts in default for the current year and preceding

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- years. In event of default by any pastoral charge the amount in default for the current year only may be printed in the Conference Journal.
7. We request the Secretary of the Annual Conference to print in the Minister's Service Record in the Journal, one column stating "Years of Pensions Claim on the Little Rock Conference, " and another stating "Total Service Years in the Ministry."
8. A list of annuitants and pensions payments for the year 1998 is available in the Conference Treasurer's Office from Mary Stanfield.

Addendum A To The Ministerial Pension Plan (MPP) and The Comprehensive Protection Plan (CPP)
(MPP Supplement Paragraph © for the Year 2000.)

This 2000 Adoption Agreement is applicable to the Little Rock Annual Conference and is effective as of January 1, 2000. It replaces any previously executed Adoption Agreement and shall be in effect until amended by the Annual Conference in accordance with the provisions of the Ministerial Pension Plan and the Comprehensive Protection Plan.

Contribution Base The MPP and CPP Contribution Base shall be the Active Participant's Plan Compensation for a Plan Year not to exceed the Denominational Average Compensation. (MPP Section 2.17 (a) and CPP Section 2.07.)

Contribution Rate The MPP Church Contribution Rate shall be 12% of the Contribution Base of each active Participant and the CPP Church Contribution rate shall be 4.4% of the Contribution Base of each Active Participant. (MPP Section 4.01 (a) and CPP Section 4.01 (a)).

Contribution Method The Church Contribution shall be made monthly to the Plan by the Annual Conference in accordance with the Plan-Document. Such MPP and CPP Church Contributions shall be transferred monthly from the Deposit Account of the Annual Conference by the General Board of Pensions to each Active Participant's account and the Protection Benefit Fund, respectively. The Annual Conference shall maintain an amount in its Deposit Account sufficient to provide for the monthly transfer of the Church Contributions on behalf of its Active Participants. In the event the Deposit Account is overdrawn, an interest charge shall be made by the General Board of Pensions. Such charge shall be made at the monthly rate of interest credited to the Diversified Fund (6 1/2% per annum) "or the current monthly rate of interest credited to the STIRA investment program, whichever is greater. (MPP Section 4.01(e) and 4.2(g), and CPP Section 4.02 (h)).

Past Service Pension Rate On January 1,2000, the ministerial Pension Rate shall be \$450 and the local pastor's Pension Rate shall be \$450. [Disciplinary Paragraphs 1506.2b and 1506.7 and Supplement One (f)]. In accordance with paragraph (e) (5) of Supplement One, the Surviving Spouse Benefit shall be 70% of the Participant's Formula Benefit.

Special Arrangements The Little Rock Annual Conference Board of Pensions is hereby authorized, at its discretion, to arrange with the General Board of Pensions for active participation in the MPP and/or CPP by persons who are eligible under special rules but not automatically included as Active Participants.(MPP and CPP Sections 3.2).

Liability and Deposits In accordance with paragraph (f) of Supplement One, the unfunded liability as of January 1, 2000 has been actuarial projected to be \$1,866,698. Past service funding deposits are required to fund this unfunded liability, and shall be in the amounts and for the periods as shown below:

Amount Deposited = \$253,624

Period of Deposits = 10 years.

These annual deposits shall be made at the end of each calendar year as required by the General Board of Pensions. The past service deposits shall be transferred from the Little Rock Conference Deposit Account to the Past Service Funding Account on December 31. If the annual cash flow requirement, as determined by the General Board of Pensions, exceeds the combined past service funding deposit amounts, then the cash flow requirement shall become the required past service funding deposit. (MPP Supplement One (f)).

ARCHIVES AND HISTORY

The Archives and History Commission continues to preserve the written and tangible history of our Church located within the bounds of the Little Rock Annual Conference. Written and Oral History is collected and preserved at the Conference Archives located in the library of Hendrix College. More tangible items are preserved in the growing museum at Quapaw United Methodist Church. Both of these endeavors are done through the Joint Commission for both Conferences.

Together we are developing a Historical Trail of Arkansas Methodism by means of a brochure which will provide directions to visit our shrines and landmarks in the state-six of which exist now.

Further, the Conference Commission takes a concerned interest in our one designated Historic Shrine--Washington United Methodist Church, Washington Arkansas. We are working on nominating the marked site of Henry's Chapel as a Historic Landmark. Other sites are under consideration. Since our task includes marking and preserving such sites we offer the following petitions to the General Conference from the Conference Archives and History Commission and the Joint Commission on Archives and History. We urge the Little Rock Conference to see the need for these disciplinary changes and add their approval to the petitions.

1. Paragraph 2548.3--Amend by adding the following at the end of Paragraph 2548.3 as follows: "As early as possible in the process of plans for abandoning a church, the trustees shall notify the chair of the conference commission on archives and history of such plan, providing as much detail as is possible. This will enable the order transfer of the materials suggested in Paragraph 2548.4."

Rationale: Very often the first information that the conference commission on archives and history has about abandoned property is the all too brief report the conference trustees make to the annual conference. By adding and implementing the additional phrase, the conference commission of archives and history can be pro-active in fulfilling its disciplinary responsibility in receiving the essential records for safe-keeping.

2. Paragraph 638.1--Amend by adding a new sentence following the sentence, " to provide for the ownership of real property and to receive gifts and bequests" as follows: "to nominate to the General Commission on Archives and History buildings, locations; or structure within the annual conference for designation as historic sites or heritage landmarks." Rationale: This important function is not currently listed as a part of the duties of the conference commission on archives and history. It is implied in Section xi with the material for the General Commission on Archives and History. It certainly needs to be listed as a duty and responsibility of the conference commission on archives and history.

3. Paragraph 2512.7--Amend by adding the phrase "after consultation with the conference commission on archives and history, or alternate structure," so that the new sentence would read as follow. "The board, after consultation with the conference commission on archives and history, or alternate structure, shall develop a policy for an annual conference response, on behalf of any local church, church-related agency, or district or annual conference board of trustees located within the bounds of the annual conference, to any governmental effort to designate a property held in trust for the benefit of the United Methodist Church (Paragraph 2503) by any such board of trustees as a cultural, historical, or architectural landmark."

Rationale: The annual conference commission on archives and history already has the responsibility of recommending historic sites and heritage landmarks (Paragraph 1712,a,c) and has considerable information and research available to help develop policies for an Annual conference. Certainly the work of the conference trustees ought to be in concert with the conference commission on archives and history regarding a policy statement for the annual conference.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EPISCOPACY

United Methodists from Arkansas, Africa and other places continue to speak highly about Bishop Janice Riggle Huie. United Methodists who keep their ears and eyes open to what's happening in society at large, and in our church family at large, know that our bishops are experiencing a high level of stress during this time. Happenings in Nebraska, California, Iowa, Washington D.C. and other places overflow into streams that carry all kinds of emotions and actions! They are powerful streams, and they have flowed into Arkansas. Some have cleansed; some have eroded; some have uprooted. Persons in leadership positions have to stand where the current is the strongest and it isn't always easy to keep one's footing. Bishop Huie has kept her footing! We commend her for addressing the various church and society issues in the spirit she has witnessed. Also, we ask that you pray for her daily.

Knowing that we are in a time when conflict and anger seem to be around every corner, the Committee on Episcopacy, in a November 1998 meeting, by consensus, suggested to the two Annual Conferences that efforts be made to conduct seminars or workshops to help pastors and laity deal with conflict. Since our committee isn't a program body, letters were mailed to persons in both conferences who are charged with program responsibilities.

Also, the committee looked to 2000 and talked about a celebration of United Methodism sometime during the year. If you have thoughts about such a celebration, talk with a member of the committee.

Ms. Stanfield sends a form to the General Board of Pensions. The General Board of Pensions makes these payments a priority, getting them out as soon as possible.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

In 1998 there were 158 UMW units in the Little Rock Conference with a total membership of 6,457. Sadly, we lost 164 members by death; however, we are able to show an increase in membership in the conference 1) because of better reporting by local units, 2) because of a number of new units, and 3) because of increased interest of younger women in UMW.

In 1998 the Little Rock Conference UMW had a total income of \$241,950.11. Of this amount, \$155,990.59 was sent to Women's Division to be used in mission throughout the world.

From monies collected through the Elizabeth Thornburg Workman Fund, UMW gave \$2,030.70 to the LRCCOM to be used for youth work in the conference. A like sum was earmarked for scholarships for children, youth and women to attend the Arkansas Area School of Christian Mission.

United Methodist Women continued in prison ministry through their contribution of personal grooming articles to incarcerated women. In 1999 UMW will expand their participation in the MIWATCH program to provide books that will be used for children of incarcerated women.

One of the most satisfying experiences of the year was "Christmas at Camp Aldersgate." At this event handmade Christmas tree ornaments were offered for sale. Happy children who are served by Camp Aldersgate attended the event. Their presence brought a special blessing to all.

The greatest effort of the year went into making disaster kits that were used in many places around the world for relief for disaster victims. UMW will continue that project in 1999.

Hands on mission at the local level included everything from working at Wesley Foundations to visiting nursing homes, mentoring and providing school supplies for needy children.

UMW continue their racial justice emphasis by presenting programs in local units and by insisting upon diversity among officers at the local, district and conference level.

The highlight of the year for one bus load of women in the conference was the trip to Orlando, Florida, to participate in the quadrennial Assembly of United Methodist women, an event which brought together over 10,000 women from all over the world.

What a joy it is to work through UMW for a more “abundant life” for many of God’s children.

E. OTHER UNITED METHODIST MINISTRIES

Camp Aldersgate, Inc.

Camp Aldersgate, the Arkansas mission agency whose property is owned by the United Methodist Women and whose programs are supported by the Arkansas Area United Methodist churches, enjoyed one of its most successful years in 1998. Its mission of providing life enrichment opportunities in a natural setting led to the expansion of its current programs and the start of new services.

The summer Med Camps program provided 315 children and youth from 110 cities and 60 counties in Arkansas with eight weeks of camp, including the state’s first camp for persons who use augmentative communication devices. Camps were held for children with muscular dystrophy, Spina Bifida, cerebral palsy, arthritis, hemophilia, epilepsy, kidney disorders, asthma, Down Syndrome, cancer, amputations, and other conditions.

A new Community Swim Program for children in daycare centers was piloted in the summer, and was so successful that it will be doubled in the summer of 1999.

The Weekend Respite Care program offered rest to 61 families who have children with severe developmental disabilities. In 1998, the program offered 41 weekends of service to families living in 18 cities and 12 counties in Arkansas. It is the only weekend respite camp of its kind in Arkansas.

During 1998, the weekly Seniors Day Out program met regularly, offering 56 persons arts and craft activities, musical entertainment, Bible studies, educational seminars and nutritious meals. Services are currently being expanded to include seniors living in the John Barrow community of Little Rock which is adjacent to the camp.

The Youth Initiative Project program provided positive activities for 41 youth who are at risk for gang involvement. Enhanced activities included tutoring, conflict resolution training, CPR and First Aid training, gang intervention sessions and community service projects.

Volunteers came from seven states (Arkansas, Texas, Alabama, Missouri, Kansas, Minnesota and Illinois) to participate in the Camp Aldersgate Mission Experience program. 183 campers completed home-improvement projects at 26 different sites, including Philander Smith College. A new partnership with the City of Little Rock expanded the repair projects to homes in the downtown and east side of the city.

Volunteers continue to be the foundation for success at Camp Aldersgate. In the Youth Volunteer Program, 150 youth and young adults donated over 27,000 hours of service in the Med Camps and Respite Care programs. Adult volunteers donated thousands of hours of service in projects benefitting the camp.

Volunteers from Arkansas churches completed major work projects at the camp. These groups included volunteers from the Little Rock Conference led by Rev. LaVon Post and teams from the North Arkansas Conference led by Dr. Bob Burnham. Camp Aldersgate continues to partner with the Volunteers in Mission program to provide a variety of services for the community and the Camp, including renovation projects at Philander Smith College.

Besides its own programs, the camp provided space year-round to Catholic Social Services for the Westside Free Medical Clinic and to Centers for Youth and Families for the Woodlawn Therapeutic Children’s Center.

The facilities were also made available for short-term use for such groups as the Arkansas Area UMC Young Adults, the Ryan White Center, tornado relief workers from Michigan, and others.

The camp’s annual operational budget has grown to \$896,000. Total church support for operations provides 20% of the annual budget. With the continued support of the United Methodist Church, this unique Arkansas resource will continue to positively change the lives of hundreds of children and adults through its unduplicated combination of social service programs for Arkansas and the nation.

CAMP TANAKO

In 1998 Camp Tanako had a great year as the religious camp of the Little Rock Conference. In 1998 Camp Tanako served a record 1,539 campers, a 3% increase for 1997 and a 28% increase over 1996. Your camp also served a record number of events for day groups and meetings that are not included in these numbers. Financially for the first time in the history of your camp we are debt free and all bills are paid. Last year through the support of Methodists from throughout the conference we had two very successful fund raisers. Twice, Arkansas United Methodists were asked to respond through our Christmas letter in December and our Phantom Dinner that was held in June of last year. Because of the success of these events your camp in 1999 has budgeted over \$25,000 for the repair of the camp. For years your camp has been concerned with trying to pay the daily operating bills as your camp could only do the most basic maintenance and repairs. The board will continue to emphasize repair and maintenance until the camp is in perfect condition.

Besides placing a large emphasis on repairs, last year the camp also opened a new camp infirmary, replaced the equipment in the canteen, purchased a new commercial dishwasher that we had in the past had to lease. The camp also replaced some of our lake equipment and replaced our computer system.

In 1998, the Horace C. Cabe Tanako Life Center was continually used for conference events and Christian education. In 1999, more events are booked than ever before. In the year 2000, Tanako will become the annual meeting place for the UMW's annual retreat. Another first for Tanako in 1998 was a large number of our camps were full and we had to turn campers away. It's a great problem to have but a problem that as a board we are addressing. The board has added a second camp for Senior Highs in 1999 to accommodate the large numbers that we had to turn away in 1998. The board in 1999 will begin studying the next stages for development and expansion of our programs. The board is also working to change the camp's structure to become aligned with the new structure of the conference.

As you can see, your camp made major progress in 1998. This progress was made possible by the hard work of the staff of Tanako, the support of the conference and the large number of United Methodists in Arkansas that have supported the camp through their prayers, their time and their great response to our special fund raisers. You as Arkansas Methodists deserve the best Christian Camp in America. The goal is to give you the best. Our goal is to repair, rebuild and expand your camp to be the best. In closing, let us thank you for your support and ask you as Arkansas Methodists to please respond when you receive our letters asking for financial assistance. It takes money to maintain and build a perfect camp. Our goal is to be the best. Our goal is to use Camp Tanako in its beautiful setting in nature to be a vehicle to bring people to Jesus Christ.

Duke President Nannerl O. Keohane appointed five new members to the Divinity School Board of Visitors: Carla C. Badgett of Houston, Tex.; J. Keith Kennedy of Falls Church, Va.; Charles H. Mercer, Jr. of Raleigh, N.C.; Mary A. Stevens of Greensboro, N.C.; and William Vann York of High Point, N.C. The chair of the board is Harold J. Wallace, special assistant for minority affairs at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. The Rev. Dr. Norman E. Neaves, pastor of Church of the Servant, Oklahoma City, Okla., received the 1998 Distinguished Alumni Award. Convocation and Pastors' School will be held Oct. 11-13 and feature Richard Mouw, Abuna Elias Shacour, and Barbara Lundblad.

Through a comprehensive treatment-oriented program, these young women are given positive alternatives, education, and hope. Our purpose is to focus on them immediate care through counseling and training, as we work with them on their long-range goals through programs specifically designed to address the needs of these young women and their families.

Florence Crittenton Services stresses the importance of personal responsibility. We want to help these young girls develop into self-sufficient young adults with the capabilities, confidence and determination to have a better life for themselves.

RESIDENTIAL

The Residential Program has changed over the years and provides an array of services for adolescent girls under the age of 18. Most of our referrals are from the Department of Human Services and court orders. We also accept referrals from social service, medical, and psychiatric agencies, and family members. During their stay these young women are given a thorough medical evaluation by a local physician. Staff are on duty to address any medical needs. All residents receive classes in nutrition, health, pregnancy prevention, and parenting. Our pregnant teens also receive prepared childbirth classes and adoption counseling is available through local agencies.

EDUCATION

The residents are able to continue their education through our on-site school that is accredited by the state. An educational assessment is completed upon admission and discharge. The goal is to provide them with the assistance needed to continue or improve their present educational level so they do not leave them behind. They are also given vocational courses in business, clerical, computers, and career orientation. For those who qualify, we provide them with the opportunity to attend college.

young women who wish to remain in the House of Hope. For those young women who have the maturity and determination to lead positive lives, they may remain in the House of Hope for up to two years.

PREGNANCY PREVENTION

Our Pregnancy Prevention Program reaches adolescents in schools, churches, and youth groups through an educational program. By providing guidance and needed information to our youth at a critical time in their development we can stop the cycle of unwanted pregnancies. Age-specific videos, booklets and questionnaires are ways we can help these teenagers make responsible decisions.

HOPELINE

Trained staff are available 24 hours a day to respond to incoming HOPELINE calls. This 1-800 number can be accessed by anyone in the state. Our personnel have the experience to handle any problem, answer any question or just be a good listener. The challenge is not to intervene, not to condemn or condone, but to assist them during a time of crisis and confusion.

HARVEST OF HOPE

There were 63 United Methodist Churches that participated in the 13th Annual Harvest of Hope. This year there was \$6,548 in cans, bottles, and packages of food, and cleaning items; and \$5,652 in cash contributions. This is the largest amount ever given and we hope it will continue to increase.

"What kind of full-time mission work does the United Methodist Church have?" "How do you know what God wants you to do with your life?" "I am thinking about going to seminary. In their latest edition of "Best College Values," Money Magazine has again ranked Hendrix as one of the twenty-five best values in all of American higher education. Affirming its relationship with the United Methodist Church, Hendrix ranks among the top United Methodist related colleges and universities in terms of the percentage of its students who are United Methodist.

Reverend Burrow's dreams are fulfilled as students find support in dealing with life's questions through a variety of campus ministry programs. Under the direction of the Reverends Rock Jones and J. Wayne Clark, students have numerous opportunities to explore and grow in their faith. Wednesday evening chapel services continue to attract a significant number of students. Each service is planned, organized, and led by a student organization or residence hall. Three students have preached in chapel this year. The College hosts a monthly Catholic mass, which attracts between twenty and forty students. Formal worship opportunities continuing on campus are the weekly communion service offered on Wednesday at 11:10 a.m. and the Sunday evening prayer service.

Student volunteerism and community involvement continue to be a vital part of the Hendrix experience. Nearly eighty percent of all Hendrix students participate in some type of volunteerism while at Hendrix. These service opportunities are most visible through the weekly "Service Saturdays." Examples include students cleaning up litter, volunteering at a women's shelter, or taking children on a field trip. Longer opportunities this year included the mission trip to Russia, the Alternative Spring Break service trip, and the mission trip to Haiti.

Engagement Weekend for couples who are engaged to be married or considering engagement. The grant also brought to campus a Christian Marriage Counselor, Dr. Tom Conran, who spoke on "An Ethics for Marriage in the 21st Century: Scripturally Informed Partnerships."

The annual Hendrix preaching workshop brings to campus a nationally-known preacher who spends two days with clergy who have been recommended by Bishop Huie and her cabinet. This year's workshop leader was Dr. Norman Neaves, senior pastor of the Church of the Servant United Methodist Church in Oklahoma City. In addition to Dr. Neaves' workshop, Hendrix brought Dr. Walter Brueggemann to campus to speak at the Willson/Steel Hendrix lecture. The lecture attracted over two hundred people.

This fall, Hendrix and Perkins School of Theology will work together to offer a Doctor of Ministry program on the Hendrix campus. Faculty from Perkins will instruct the D.Min. classes. This will allow Arkansas clergy to earn a Doctor of Ministry from Perkins without having to travel to Dallas on a regular basis.

For the fourth year, Hendrix hosted a UMYF Day in February. Games, fellowship, music, small groups led by Hendrix students, and a worship rally were all part of the day-long event. The keynote speaker was the Reverend Kissa Hamilton, Arkansas Area Director of Ministries with Youth and Young Adult Ministries. Celia Whittler of Nashville, Tennessee, led the music.

In the fall, Hendrix invited United Methodist Clergy to bring high school juniors and seniors to campus for an official Hendrix visit. Students visited classes, toured the campus, and met with members of the Hendrix faculty. Clergy attended sessions sponsored by the Chaplain's office and the Religious Life Council.

Hendrix continues its campaign, A Time To Lead. The campaign has provided funding for renovation of Greene Chapel and the installation of a new pipe organ in the chapel, construction of two new science facilities, construction of six new residence houses, renovation of Trieschmann Fine Arts Building, construction of a new intramural playing field, and construction of a new soccer field. The campaign includes a Church Division that is working with individuals and congregations to fund endowed scholarships for United Methodist students at Hendrix and to provide endowed funds to support the UMYF Leadership Scholars program in perpetuity. MOUNT SEQUOYAH

Developing New role As Effective Institution of the UMC

A unique learning environment is under cultivation at Mount Sequoyah, which in 1998 became the Older Adult Program Center for the South Central Jurisdiction.

Mount Sequoyah's goal is to create programs that effectively combine intellectual and spiritual elements. The recent growth of Mount Sequoyah's Older Adult Programs is largely attributable to program content.

In 1998, "The Mountain," as many affectionately refer to the Center, served 228 groups including 9,145 persons, setting a record for participation and marking a second year of

The latest addition to creative programs is a new computer lab enabling older persons to become active participants on the information highway. Classes opened in the fall of 1998 with capacity booking. The grand opening in April of 1999 brought recognition and attention from the Senior Net national staff.

In its tradition of hosting 'partnership' events, Mount Sequoyah leadership is particularly excited with plans for Weekend '99 (June 25-27, 1999), a program building on the rich tradition of Bishops Week and now to involve lay and clergy leaders from across the South Central Jurisdiction.

In partnership with the Jurisdictional Office, Mountain Quest '98, a program of single adult ministries, and JYMO, a Jurisdictional youth training event, both set participation records in 1998. Along with these traditional groups, 1998 brought the Upper Room program, Academy for Spiritual Formation, to The Mountain.

As an extension of our ministry, Mount Sequoyah offers Christian hospitality to many churches and other non-profit organizations during the times when it is not conducting its own programs. In this way Mount Sequoyah is able to extend the use of its special learning environment to others and contribute to their success while generating revenue that enables Mount Sequoyah to be solvent and innovative.

As Mount Sequoyah programs continue to expand, progress is also being made with facility renovation. The Louisiana Cottage was beautifully renovated in 1998 in the style of the Oklahoma and Edwards cottages in 1997. The Texas Lodge will be remodeled in November 1999. Arkansas, Kansas, Nebraska and Barnett Cottage renovations are in progress and planning is underway for Missouri. The work is being financed by annual

conferences and individual contributors, with much of the work being accomplished through the United Methodist Volunteers in Missions program. The College of Bishops has supported a major remodeling of Bishops Cottage, which was completed in April 1999.

PERKINS SCHOOL OF THEOLOGY

The past year has been a time of continued growth for Perkins School of Theology as we respond to the needs of the local church in preparing women and men for effective leadership in the church.

The Perkins South program in Houston/Galveston continues to respond to the demand for quality theological education beyond our traditional campus programs. Now in its fourth academic year, the program currently has 65 students. About 120 students have begun their work at Perkins through the program. The program has been fully accredited by the Association of Theological Schools and the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, and has been approved by the University Senate of The United Methodist Church. Last year Associate Dean Jouette Bassler was able to pioneer at Perkins South the use of interactive video in the classroom, teaching New Testament Greek from the Dallas campus to Houston students. Such innovations will be of great benefit as we extend the reach of both our degree and continuing education programs.

We have also been working to make our programs more accessible financially to students seeking quality education for ministry. Beginning with funds provided by Charles and Elizabeth Perkins Prothro of Wichita Falls, Texas, we have been working with organizations throughout the Jurisdiction to establish scholarship funds that will help make a Perkins education affordable for promising ministerial candidates from the region.

We were also pleased to receive notice of a grant of \$1.5 million from the Lilly Endowment which will help us maintain and enhance our leadership in recruiting and training leaders, while engaging in theological reflection on the church's faith, life and mission in the world. We will use these funds to develop regional teaching congregations as part of our intern program, expand resources for worship training and spiritual formation, and upgrade our capabilities for interactive video conferencing.

Beyond our efforts to better utilize technology, we continue to build our faculty. Two new faculty joined Perkins during the past year - Dr. Evelyn Parker, assistant professor of Christian Education, and Dr. Edwin Aponte, assistant professor of Hispanic Christianity and Culture - and we currently are in process of bringing additional faculty so that we may continue to offer superior education and formation opportunities to the emerging leaders of The United Methodist Church.

Through her new theme of "Building Traditions of Excellence," she recognizes the past legacy and signals the "raising of the bar" for academic excellence. Focusing on increased scholarship, service learning, and leadership development, "Building Traditions of Excellence" is a way of demonstrating to the wider community that Philander Smith College is preparing leaders for the new millennium. Since her arrival, declining enrollments have turned to rapid growth in numbers and quality of students.

Through Dr. Reed's leadership the college has launched the nation's first Black Family

STUDENT CENTERED

United Methodist student scholarships have increased by 90% over 1998-99 school year with twenty-one students receiving scholarships from Philander Smith College. With the naming of Mr. Rupert Thomas as the 1999-2000 Lina McCord Scholar, we have three students on our campus with this distinction.

Other students are Ms. Tarnisha Admas (1998-99) and Mr. Joseph Jones (1997-98). Mr. Terrell Starr and Mr. James Williams, III are summer interns with the General Board of Global Ministries. Mr. Williams worked for GBOGM last summer in Detroit as a youth worker.

The college has launched a student internship program with local business and community organizations. Arkansas Childrens Hospital has provided 14 paid internships for Philander Smith College students. There is much excitement with expansion of the internship programs under Career Planning and Placement Officer, Glean Wilson.

MISSION FOCUSED

Cooperative mission participation has been our watchword this year. Area Minister of Mission, Don Weeks, has been instrumental in assisting with the implementation of Philander Smith College Dormitory Project. Local churches and congregations have adopted rooms in both male and female dormitories. More than 650 persons have given time to give the residence halls a much needed face lift. The college owes a debt of gratitude to these committed individuals.

Each of our 121 freshman student participated in community service projects throughout the Little Rock metropolitan area. Students have provided service to such groups as Theresa Hoover and McCabe United Methodist Churches and Watershed. VISION VALIDATOR PROGRAM

To target grass root participation a new concept for fund raising, the President's Vision Validator Program has been established. A team of well-respected community leaders have been involved in implementing the Vision Validators² project. Through this program, as individuals support the new vision of the College, they will help to identify other donors. The concept is built on the premise that if Philander Smith had one million friends who contributed \$10.00 each, the College would have \$10 million dollars to validate the college's vision. Persons participating in the Vision Validator program include alumni, friends, and students of the college. The concept has been instrumental in raising over \$46,000 in donations since its inception.

Dr. Sherman Tate, Trustee Chairperson, named an impressive Business Advisory Board to support the mission of our institution. This Board is composed of prominent business leaders and professionals in the state of Arkansas. This Board has met three times and has developed a mission statement. The college has already benefited from the participation of several of these members.

An Institutional Profile has been developed to assist in sharing pertinent information about the college with community leaders, foundations representatives, and prospective donors. The succinct overview is especially helpful in reviewing the college's academic programs and fiscal stability.

ELIJAH PITTS PEACE WALK

In May of 1999, a candlelight memorial service was held to dedicate a gas light and the Peace Walk to the memory of Mr. Pitts. The college will be taking donations to assist in raising funds to complete the Peace Walk memorial.

Philander Smith College is headed into the new millennium with increased enrollment, enhanced scholarship, determined to continue its goal of "Building Traditions of Excellence" under the leadership Dr. Trudie Kibbe Reed.

LIBRARY NEEDS ASSESSED

According to formulas in the 1995 edition of the Standards for College Libraries, for an "A" rating, Philander Smith should have 109,170 equivalent volumes in its library and 10,917 square feet of shelf space. The 40 year old Harris Library Building is too small to hold therecommended increase in equivalent volumes. It contains 8,677 square feet or 80% of the recommended shelf space. Furthermore, recent duct work for the HVAC system makes some shelves inaccessible and wooden shelves in the Reference Section are termite-infested. PSC has 46,405 equivalent volumes. The library staff culled severely outdated materials and removed reference to any missing materials for the catalogues. Many of the remaining volumes should be replaced with more recent publications. The need for replacement is shown in the science and mathematics collections where the average publishing dateis 1955.

PSC patrons visited the existing library 25,000 times and the technology center 5,000

Our new academic dean, Dr. Nancy R. Howell, was selected after an extensive national search conducted throughout the past academic year. Her commitment to the church, distinguished scholarship, and skilled teaching make her an ideal academic dean.

Faculty retirements mark times of transition for a seminary. Dr. Tex Sample, the Robert B. and Kathleen Rogers Professor of Church and Society, will retire in June after 32 years on the faculty. Dr. Eugene L. Lowry, William K. McElvaney Professor of Preaching, retired last year but continues to do some teaching.

Major renovation of the Kresge Chapel organ has begun. When the project is completed, we will have an organ with twenty ranks, up from eight, and a new console.

Last fall we sponsored a Wesley Studies Conference for students, clergy, and laity. The theme was "The New Creation." The featured lecturer was Dr. Theodore H. Runyon of Candler School of Theology. Four Saint Paul faculty also made presentations. The date for the 1999 Wesley Studies Conference is November 3-4, with Dr. Geoffrey Wainwright from Duke Divinity School as the main lecturer.

Saint Paul has received a grant from the Lilly Endowment of \$1.2 million over five years to fund "A Church and Seminary Partnership to Improve Congregational Ministry." The project will focus on 1) identifying, encouraging, and enlisting leadership of the highest quality, 2) the quality of seminary preparation with special attention to those dimensions of management, administration, and finance about which many clergy feel unprepared, and 3) work with those who have completed seminary.

Please know how much your interest, prayers, and support mean to our students and to our mission of preparing leaders and reformers for a new century. We seek to prepare leaders who, faithful to the Wesleyan spirit, know God, proclaim Christ, and seek justice. Let us all hope, pray, and work for renewal and revitalization in all of our churches.

1. Gifts totaling \$3 million will establish an endowed scholarship fund at Perkins School of Theology for students from the Texas Annual Conference. The scholarship fund will be made up of \$1 million from the Permanent Endowment Fund of the Moody Memorial United Methodist Church in Galveston, \$1 million from the Texas Conference and \$1 million in matching funds previously provided by Charles and Elizabeth Perkins Prothro of Wichita Falls. These combined gifts will serve as a model for other conferences within the South Central Jurisdiction to participate in the SMU campaign through gifts matched by the Prothro scholarship funds.

2. Perkins School of Theology was the recipient of a \$1.5 million grant from the Lilly Endowment Inc. to develop regional teaching congregations as part of its intern program.

3. The Meadows Foundation of Texas has pledged a total of \$20 million for a new Meadows Museum at SMU which will double exhibition space for the most comprehensive collections of Spanish art outside of Spain.

General

- SMU's graduation rate of 70 percent was the second highest of Texas universities.

- SMU was named to the 1997-98 Honor Roll for Character-Building Colleges by the John Templeton Foundation and was selected as one of 93 schools to appear in the Student Guide to America's Best College Scholarships.

- The Edwin L. Cox School of Business is nationally recognized for its undergraduate, graduate and executive development programs. Both the school's full-time M.B.A. program and the Executive M.B.A. are ranked among the nation's best by Business Week. The London Financial Times ranks the Cox School's undergraduate program 24th in the nation and U.S. News & World Report ranks it and SMU's fall 1998 enrollment of 10,038 was the largest since 1975. Minority enrollment was at an

● Since Perkins School of Theology began its Houston/Galveston program in 1995, more than 120 students have enrolled in classes offered in both cities, which lead to master's degrees and professional certification.

I am also pleased to note that our United Campus Ministry Program, funded by the South Central Jurisdiction, continues to grow both in numbers and programs. The ministry is guided by an able board led by Bishop Oden and the campus minister is Creighton Alexander in his first year from Asbury Seminary. We continue to highly value the Jurisdiction support of this important United Methodist program at SMU.

METHODIST CHILDREN'S HOME, INC.

Celebrating 100 years Of Continuous service to Children and Families of Arkansas

We invite you to participate with us in the Celebration of our 100 years of Service on October 23, 1999 on the Campus here in Little Rock. It will be a time of gathering and remembering the care of children. You can help us by sharing with us information you may have about former residents of the home. We are in the process of notifying each of them as we find additional addresses. Further information with details of the Celebration will be mailed to each church in the State and shared with each Conference. Let me share with you some of the History of the Home and interesting events.

Beginnings

At the Little Rock Annual Conference held at Pine Bluff, November 1897, J. R. Cason, T. H. Ware and J. R. Moore were appointed a committee to inquire into the advisability of erecting orphans' home. At the Conference held in Winfield Methodist Church, Little Rock, November 1898, the committee reported as follows:

"We, your committee appointed to inquire into the advisability of adopting preliminary measures looking to the raising of a permanent fund for the better care and support of

A joint committee of the committees from the Little Rock and White River Conferences was held at the office of the Arkansas Methodist in Little Rock on February 8, 1899. There were present J. R. Cason, James Thomas, George Thornburgh, M. M. Smith and W. B. Ricks. Rev. E. A. Tabor, of the Arkansas Conference, being present, was invited to confer with the committee.

J. R. Cason was elected president and George Thornburgh secretary of the joint committee. It was resolved to proceed at once to organize and incorporate an orphanage, and George Thornburgh, W. B. Ricks and E. A. Tabor were appointed to secure the incorporation.

On May 3, 1899, another meeting of the joint committee was held at the same place, when the committee on Incorporation reported that they had caused the orphanage to be incorporated on March 18, 1899, in the Second Division of the Pulaski Circuit Court,

Judge Joseph W. Martin presiding.

Under the constitution, the board elected the following named officers: Rev. J. R. Cason, President; Rev. W. B. Ricks, Secretary; George Thornburgh, Treasurer.

At the annual meeting held October 25, 1899, the undersigned were appointed to prepare and submit to the three conferences a statement of what had been done by the board.

The action of the board was reported to the three conferences of 1899, and by unanimous vote each approved.

At the annual meeting of the board, October 25, 1900, the orphanage was located at Little Rock at 1622 Commerce Street. Mrs. Brinkley, widow of Rev. C. B. Brinkley, was named as matron. Rev. J. R. Cason was elected agent.

In 1991 the Home took measures to move from a child-centered campus based program to a family centered, community based approach. With Homes now located in Fayetteville, Springdale, Batesville, Searcy, Magnolia and Little Rock parents can be involved in treatment as well as the child.

Moments from the Past

Let me share with you some highlights of the 1906 Annual Report.

MATRON'S REPORT

"The past year we received thirty children into the "Home" and placed 27 in Christian families. We had requests for, perhaps, seventy-five half orphans to be taken into the Home, but as the institution is an orphanage, and not a boarding house, we had to decline them.

We picked up four little neglected babies and placed them in good homes. One of them we named for Mrs. Thornburgh. Brother Gibson christened it at the home. It was a beautiful service.

Two orphans received by us were found to be children of a Baptist preacher and we, and the Board, thought it proper to turn them over to the Baptist Orphanage, which we did. The Baptist Orphanage during the year turned over to us two children of a deceased Methodist preacher which made us even, and beautifully exemplified the brotherly spirit of the two organizations.

We also received into the Home two children of a deceased minister of the Christian church. Rev. J. N. Jessup, pastor of the Christian Church in this city, interested himself in them and finally procured places for them in a home of that denomination.

We have bought for the Home 13 shades, 8 mattresses, 2 bedsteads, one heating stove, carpets for three rooms, 6 table cloths, 4 counterpanes, 3 hoes, 2 rakes, axe, saw and other articles. One hundred new garments were made and remodeled. We paid \$6.50 for help in sewing. The two parlors and dining room have been papered. The health of the

VIII. STRUCTURE AND POLICY STATEMENTS

A. LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE STRUCTURE

I. CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Book of Discipline: Para. 726

Responsible to Annual Conference

Responsibilities:

The Annual Conference Council on Ministries may facilitate the church's program in the Annual Conference. The council will be responsible for the development and administration of the program of the Annual Conference and to encourage, coordinate, and support the conference agencies, districts, and local churches in their ministry and various programs.

Membership:

- a. The membership shall consist of the presiding Bishop; the District Superintendents; The chairperson of each conference Program Area, Task Force, Advocacy Group, and District Council on Ministries and the Chairperson of the Coordinating Committee on Professional Ministries, Conference Secretary of Global Ministries, Conference Secretary, two representatives of the Conference Council on Youth Ministries; two representatives of the Conference UMW, one of which shall be President; two representatives of the Conference UMM, one of which shall be President; the Conference Lay Leader; Conference Age Level, Conference Family Life and Conference Camping Coordinators; two young adults; and one lay person from each district.

- c. There shall be an Executive Committee consisting of the officers, the Bishop, one District Superintendent, the Conference Lay Leader, the Conference Council Director, and the elected representative of the General Council on Ministries. In the event that none of these persons is ethnic, then an ethnic person shall be named to the Executive Committee of the Conference Council on Ministries by the Executive Committee. One half of the members of the Committee shall be lay persons. The Conference Council Executive Committee shall also serve as the Personnel Committee. The Executive Committee shall meet upon call of the Chairperson and/or Director. The Executive Committee shall have the authority to act on behalf of the Conference Council on Ministries between regular meetings.

Meetings:

The Conference Council on Ministries shall have a minimum of two regular meetings annually. Special meetings shall convene upon the call of the Chairperson, Bishop, and/or Council Director.

Divisions:

The Conference Council on Ministries shall be structured in four departments: (1)Discipleship; (2)Outreach; (3)Coordinated Ministry; (4)Advocacy.

A. DISCIPLESHIP**1. CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF EDUCATION**

Book of Discipline: Para. 729.2

Responsible to the Conference Council on Ministries

There shall be a standing Conference Council Board of Christian Education.

Responsibilities:

First, to direct a plan of Christian Education that encourages an

Coordinator from each of the six districts nominated by the District Superintendent; and a Conference Camping Coordinator to be the Chairperson of the Coordinating Committee to be nominated by the Conference nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference. The Conference Camping Coordinator will serve as ex-officio member of the Camp Tanako Board of Trustees. Each local church shall elect a Local Church Camping Coordinator who shall have major responsibility to coordinate and promote camping among the congregation. The Board of Trustees of Camp Tanako shall have charge of all property matters, physical care, and paid personnel employed to maintain and operate Camp Tanako.

- c. Assist the District Councils in their ministry.

Membership:

A Chairperson for the Conference Council Board of Education shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference. One lay and one clergy representative from each district, nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference; Conference Age-Level Coordinators; one representative from the UMY, UMW, UMM (selected by their respective groups); one District Superintendent; and the Associate Director of the Conference Council in charge of camping.

2. CONFERENCE WORK AREA ON STEWARDSHIP

Book of Discipline: Para. 729.5

Responsible to the Conference Council on Ministries

A Chairperson for the Work Area of Stewardship shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

A Task Force shall be appointed, as needed, by the Conference Council on Ministries and/or the Executive Committee of the Conference Council on

A Chairperson for the Work Area on Evangelism shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

A Task Force shall be appointed, as needed, by the Conference Council on Ministries in consultation with the Chairperson of the Work Area on Evangelism and the Conference Council Director.

5. CONFERENCE BOARD OF LAITY

Book of Discipline: Para. 730.1-5

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries and the Annual Conference

- a. The Conference Board of Laity shall be chaired by the Conference Lay Leader.
- b. A Conference Board shall be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.
- c. The Conference United Methodist Women President, the Conference United Methodist Men President, Conference Youth President or designated representative, the District Lay Leader from each district, the Conference Coordinator of Lay Speaking, a Cabinet Representative, Conference Council Director, the Bishop, three lay women and three lay men, representative from Single Adult Ministries.

6. COMMITTEE ON ETHNIC LOCAL CHURCH CONCERNS

Book of Discipline: Para. 726.5a

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

Membership:

- a. There shall be a chairperson nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee, elected by the Annual Conference.
- b. One District Superintendent

B. OUTREACH

1. CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF GLOBAL MINISTRIES

Book of Discipline: Para. 731

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

There shall be a standing Conference Council Board of Global Ministries.

Responsibilities:

The Board shall be divided into two major Committees: Missionary Education and Cultivation, and Parish and Community Development.

- a. Missionary Education and Cultivation shall be responsible for the following areas of work: World Hunger, Health and Welfare Ministries, Missionary Itineration, Mission Fairs, School of Missions, Advance Specials, and such other areas of mission as the Board shall give to it.
- b. Parish and Community Development Committee shall be responsible for the following areas of work: Church Extension, Cooperative Parish Ministries, United Methodist Town and Country Awards, Church and Community Workers, and such other areas of mission as the Board shall give to it.

The Board of Global Ministries shall establish a Volunteers in Mission Task Force whose responsibility shall be to coordinate the short term Volunteers in Mission ministries of the Annual Conference. The Task Force is authorized to work with the North Arkansas Annual Conference Task Force as an Area Task Force on Volunteers in Mission.

Membership:

A Chairperson for the Conference Council Board of Global Ministries shall

- c. Approve the purchase or sale of property, and the plans for any new building, including a parsonage, proposed by the Campus Ministry Unit and the financial program covering the liquidation of its cost. Approval is also required by the District Committee on Church Location Building.
- d. Cooperate in interpretation of the intercollegiate campus Christian movement.

Membership:

- a. A Chairperson for the Conference Council Board of Higher Education and Campus Ministry shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.
- b. A District Superintendent; one staff member from the Conference Council on Ministries.
- c. One representative from each of the six districts of the Annual Conference.
- d. The chairperson or designee of each of the local Boards of the five Wesley Foundations.
- e. One student from each of the five Wesley Foundations.
- f. All Campus Ministers shall be members without vote.

3. CONFERENCE COUNCIL BOARD OF CHURCH AND SOCIETY

Book of Discipline: Para. 728

- d. Shall develop programs which provide education and action on issues confronting the Church consistent with the Social Principles and the policies adopted by the General Conference

Membership:

- a. The Chairperson for the Conference Council Board of Church and Society shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference
- b. UMW Chairperson for Mission Social Action.
- c. One representative from each of the six districts of the Annual Conference
- d. Council Staff Representative
- e. Cabinet Representative

4. CONFERENCE COUNCIL WORK AREA ON CHRISTIAN UNITY AND INTERRELIGIOUS CONCERNS

Book of Discipline: Para.739

Responsible to Conference Council on Ministries

A Chairperson for the Work Area on Christian Unity and Interreligious Concerns shall be nominated by the Annual Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

A Task Force shall be appointed, as needed, by the Chairperson in consultation with the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries.

- d One person from each District who shall serve as the District Disaster Preparedness and Response Coordinator, named by the District Superintendent.
- e The Coordinators of Volunteers In Mission for both Annual Conferences.
- f The UMCOR representative(s) residing in the Arkansas Area.
- g All District Superintendents.

Responsibilities:

The Disaster Response Committee shall meet at least semi-annually for administrative and training purposes. It will also:

- a. Develop policies and procedures for disaster relief within the bounds of the Arkansas Area.
- b. Conduct disaster response training and develop materials for the Arkansas Area.
- c. Coordinate the Arkansas Area Response to UMCOR requests for assistance to areas outside the Arkansas Area.
- d. Advise the resident bishop on the extent of any current disaster, and assist in the publishing of episcopal appeals for aid.
- e. Coordinate with UMCOR to provide monetary assistance, training, and administrative assistance to local relief initiatives.
- f. Coordinate relief efforts of the Arkansas Area with other judicatories, interfaith agencies, government, and secular organizations.
- g. Coordinate with other agencies of the two annual conferences in the Arkansas Area to provide direct assistance during a disaster, and transition of responsibilities for long term recovery where and when appropriate.
- h. Provide adequate publicity about the work of disaster response.

Financial Support and Responsibilities

- a. The Area Disaster Response Committee will receive equal funding

- d. A \$50,000 Reserve Fund shall be established as soon as is practicable and shall be used to initiate disaster relief efforts. Expended funds shall be replenished by those collected in response to episcopal appeals. The Reserve Fund shall not be used unless an episcopal appeal has been approved.

C. COORDINATED MINISTRY

1. UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

Book of Discipline: Para. 743

Responsible to Annual Conference and Conference Council on Ministries

Membership:

Refer to Para. 743 of the **Book of Discipline**.

2. UNITED METHODIST MEN

Book of Discipline: Para. 744

Responsible to Annual Conference and Conference Council on Ministries

Responsibilities:

- a. Assist the Annual Conference and the local churches in programs to recruit and utilize the laity of the conference in effective ministry.
- b. Organize and support local church United Methodist Men's Organizations.

Membership:

Refer to Constitution of the Board of United Methodist Men.

3. CONFERENCE COUNCIL ON YOUTH MINISTRY

Book of Discipline: Para. 745

Responsible to Annual Conference and Conference Council on Ministries

- b. Promote and supervise the ARKANSAS UNITED METHODIST and other approved publications of the United Methodist Church.
- c. Provide training for the local churches, the districts, and the Annual Conference.

Membership:

- a. The Conference Director of Communications may be the chairperson.
- b. District Chairpersons of Communications, one District Superintendent, Conference Director of Communications, and three at-large members.
- c. The Editor and Assistant Editor of the ARKANSAS UNITED METHODIST shall be ex-officio members **without vote**.
- d. The Chairperson shall designate representatives to the Area Committee.

5. COMMITTEE ON TEEN CRISIS

Book of Discipline: None

Responsible to Annual Conference

Area Responsibilities:

- j: The North Arkansas Conference provides equal financial support.
- b. The Task Force shall be composed of the task forces of the two annual conferences. Officers of the committee shall be: chair, vice-chair and secretary. Officers shall be elected annually, with the chair to rotate between the two conferences.
- c. The Area Committee shall report annually to the respective Conference Council on Ministries and Annual Conference.

D. ADVOCACY

1. COMMISSION ON STATUS AND ROLE OF WOMEN

Book of Discipline: Para. 740

Responsible to Annual Conference

Membership:

- a. Six At-Large Members
- b. One representative from each district (740.2)
- c. One District Superintendent
- d. The majority of the membership shall be of ethnic minorities.
- e. The Chairperson shall be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee.
- f. One representative from Black Methodists for Church Renewal.

II. ADMINISTRATION

2. Nominations to all program agencies except those dealing with ministerial orders and qualifications may include Full-Time Local Pastors.

Membership:

- a. The Chairperson shall be elected from the membership of the committee and may serve a maximum of four years.
- b. There shall be one lay person from each district, nominated by the District Nominating Committee, who may serve a maximum of four consecutive years.

- a. The Dean of the Cabinet or his/her designee shall serve as chairperson.
- b. Bishop, Director of the Conference Council on Ministries, Host District Superintendent, Host Pastor(s), two Lay persons from the host church, Director of Finance and Management, the Conference Secretary, Conference Lay Leader, and Chairperson of Conference Council Work Area on Worship.
- c. Additional members, as needed, to carry out the task assigned.

Archives and History. This Joint Commission shall be jointly chaired by the Chairpersons of the two constituent Commissions on Archives and History. Among the responsibilities of the Arkansas Area Joint Commission on Archives and History shall be the administering of the United Methodist (and its predecessor bodies) Archives in the Arkansas Room of the Hendrix College Library; and to carry out Resolution No. 2 of the November 8, 1986 Arkansas Area Sesquicentennial Conference, which instructed both Annual Conference Commissions on Archives and History to establish a suitable historical and archival depository for the United Methodist Churches in Arkansas.

- d. Members may not be in debt to the General Board of Pensions and Health Benefits or receiving a pension from the General Board of Pensions and Health Benefits.

E. COMMITTEE ON INSURANCE

Book of Discipline: None
Responsible to Annual Conference

Responsibilities:

- a. Administer the Conference Insurance Program.

Membership:

- a. The Chairperson shall be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee.
- b. One District Superintendent named by the Cabinet shall be a member.
- c. Nine persons, six of whom shall be laity and three shall be clergy nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

F. STANDING TASK FORCES

(To serve only upon call)

1. JOINT COMMITTEE ON DISABILITY

Book of Discipline: Para. 746
Responsible to Annual Conference

Two members from the Board of Ordained Ministry and two members from the Board of Pensions elected by the respective Boards, and one District Superintendent appointed by the Bishop.

2. COMMITTEE ON INVESTIGATIONS

Responsibilities:

Coordinate the program development and the running of Conference on Leadership in Ministry along with Representatives of the North Arkansas Annual Conference Boards and Agencies.

4. ADMINISTRATIVE REVIEW COMMITTEE

Book of Discipline: Para. 454.36

Responsible to Executive Session of Clergy Members in Full Connection with the Annual Conference.

Three members and one alternate in full connection who are not members of the Cabinet, Board of Ordained Ministry, or Joint Review Committee. This committee shall be nominated by the bishop and elected quadrennially by the executive session of clergy members.

IV. DISTRICT STRUCTURE

A. DISTRICT COUNCIL ON MINISTRIES

Book of Discipline: Para. 752

Responsible to the Annual Conference, the Annual Conference Council on Ministries, and the Churches within the District.

Membership:

- a. **Membership** may include: the Chairperson; District Superintendent; District Lay Leader; District President of United Methodist Women; District President of United Methodist Men; District President of United Methodist Youth; and a maximum of six at-large members; a Conference Council Staff person.

- b. Additional **Membership** may include as needed:

1. Work Area Chairpersons of Education; Stewardship;

- e. Shall meet on call of the Chairperson and/or the District Superintendent.
- f. Committees and Task Forces may be formed as needed.
- g. **Membership** is nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.

B. ADMINISTRATION

1. DISTRICT NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Book of Discipline: None

Responsible to the Annual Conference, Annual Conference Nominating Committee, and the District Stewards.

Responsibilities:

- a. The Committee shall nominate annually the following:
 - 1. One lay member of the Conference Nominating Committee to be elected by the Annual Conference.
 - 2. Members of the Committee on District Superintendency as prescribed by the **Discipline** (Para. 754) to be elected by the Annual Conference.
 - 3. Chairperson and a maximum of six at-large members of the District Council on Ministries to be elected by the Annual Conference.
 - 4. Additional members of the District Council on Ministries as may be prescribed by district or conference structure; district representatives to conference boards,

- c. The term of office for elected members shall be three years in rotation. No elected member may serve two consecutive terms.

2. DISTRICT BOARD OF STEWARDS

Responsibilities:

- a. Shall meet at least annually on call of the District Superintendent.
- b. To receive from the District Superintendents and Conference Council Staff the program and financial requirements adopted at the previous Annual Conference Session and report to the local church Committee on Finance, Council on Ministries/Administrative Board or Administrative Council.
- c. Elect District Trustees, Members of the District Committee on Church Location & Building; the District Treasurer; and other district officers as needed.
- d. Elect members of the District Nominating Committee by nomination from the floor.
- e. Adopt the District Administration Fund Budget; and approve any other funds which relate to financial needs or programs within the district.
- f. Recommend apportionments to the churches for all district funds as needed.

Membership:

- a. The Chairperson shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the District Board of Stewards.
- b. Three to nine lay persons nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the District Board of Stewards.

4. **DISTRICT BOARD ON CHURCH LOCATION AND BUILDING**

Book of Discipline: Para. 2519-2523

Responsible to Annual Conference

Responsibilities:

Report annually to the District Board of Stewards.

Membership:

- a. The District Superintendent who shall be the Chairperson.
- b. Six persons to include three lay and three clergy members. Nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the District Board of Stewards.

C. MINISTRY

1. **DISTRICT COMMITTEE ON ORDAINED MINISTRY**

Book of Discipline: Para. 756

Responsible to the Conference Board of Ordained Ministry.

Membership:

- a. The District Superintendent and at least five other members in full connection in the district, including women and ethnic clergy, whenever possible, nominated annually by the District Superintendent in consultation with the Chairperson or Executive Committee of the Board of Ordained Ministry and approved by the Annual Conference. Interim vacancies may be filled by the District Superintendent.
- b. The District Superintendent shall not be the Chairperson (Para. 756).
- c. One representative named by the Conference Board of Ministry, who may serve as Chairperson.

2. **COMMITTEE ON DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENCY**

Book of Discipline: Para. 759

Responsible to the Annual Conference.

Membership:

- a. The Chairperson shall be nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the District Board of Stewards.

- b. The District Lay Leader, two laywomen, two laymen, two clergy, and two at-large members nominated by the District Nominating Committee and elected by the Annual Conference.
- c. Two additional persons appointed by the District Superintendent.
- d. There shall be at least three clergy members and at least seven lay members.

THE STANDING RULES

A. ANNUAL CONFERENCE

1. ANNUAL CONFERENCE MEMBERSHIP:

The voting membership of the Annual Conference shall be composed of clergy and laity in equal number.

- a. Clergy members include: Elders in Full Connection, Deacons in Full Connection, Probationary Members, Associate Members, and Full-Time Local Pastors. Elders and Associate members in the retired relationship continue as voting members of the Annual Conference.
- b. Lay members include: (1) persons elected as lay member by each charge conference. One lay member shall be elected to correspond to each clergy appointed to the charge. (2) Two youth members elected annually by each District Council of the United Methodist Youth. (3) Conference President of United Methodist Women, Conference President of United Methodist Men. (4) Conference Lay Leader. (5) Each District Lay Leader. (6) Diaconal Ministers (7) One representative from each Wesley Foundation/Campus Ministry Unit (8) Lay Chairpersons of Conference Boards, Committees, and Commissions, (9) Delegates to General & Jurisdictional Conference for the quadrennium following their election.
- c. The formula for balancing the Conference shall be: (1) An equal number of "at large" delegates from each district selected by the District Nominating Committee. These "at large" delegates shall be from Churches with membership of less than 200. After the balance has been determined, the Council office shall notify these persons in writing of their delegate status at least 60 days prior to the Annual Conference.
- d. The names and addresses of all members of the Annual Conference shall be reported to the Conference Secretary at least ninety days prior to the opening day of the Annual Conference.

2. BOARD SERVICE:

- a. Elective membership on any specific board, agency, committee of the Little Rock Annual Conference may not exceed eight consecutive years, excepting ex-officio membership on the Conference Council on Ministries. **Membership** begins upon election with the date noted in the Conference Journal.
- b. There are two types of membership on Annual Conference boards, committees, commissions and councils; at large and ex-officio. A person may serve in only one at large and one ex-officio capacity.
- c. The membership of the Committee on Review; the Committee on the Annual Conference; the Committee on Episcopacy, the Conference Nominating Committee and members of the Cabinet & Conference Staff shall be exempt from the provisions of (a) and (b).
- d. No person from the Little Rock Conference, clergy or lay, shall serve as an elected trustee of more than one United Methodist related institution within the bounds of the Arkansas Area at a time. "Within the bounds of" these United Methodist related institutions are understood to be the following: Hendrix College, Philander Smith College, Aldersgate, Methodist Children's Home, the Methodist Foundation of Arkansas, the Wesley Foundations, Little Rock Conference Camp Tanako, and Mt. Sequoyah Assembly.
- e. Any person (s) serving on a General or Jurisdictional Board or Agency shall be a member with vote on the corresponding Board or Agency of the Annual Conference.
- f. No person serving on the Conference Council on Finance and Administration shall serve on any Annual Conference Board or Agency receiving funds from the Council on Finance and Administration.

3. TASK FORCE SERVICE:

- a. **Membership** on Task Forces shall be inclusive of ethnic minorities and persons from small membership churches. A balance of laymen, laywomen, and clergy shall be the norm.
- b. The norm of Task Force membership shall be a broad base of participation from throughout the Conference.
- c. Persons are limited to membership on one Conference task force at a given time. Emphasis shall be given to non-consecutive membership from one conference task force to another conference task force.

B. FINANCIAL ADMINISTRATION**1. FISCAL YEAR**

The fiscal year of the Annual Conference shall be from January 1 to December 31.

2. FINANCIAL AND STATISTICAL

- a. All reporting of Conference funds shall be made in whole dollars.
- b. Each pastor shall make an annual statistical and financial report to the District Superintendent who shall submit the reports to the Conference Statistician.

3. ADMINISTRATIVE FUND

The Council on Finance and Administration shall recommend an apportionment for a Conference Administrative Fund. All clerical work of the Conference, the expense of publishing the pre-conference report, the expense of publishing the Journal and preserving the records of the Conference, the expense of preparing and printing the Worship Booklet for the Annual Conference, the expense of auditing the accounts of the several boards, the expenses of the Conference Secretary and Statistician, the expenses of committees raised by the Conference shall be paid from this Fund. The Conference Treasurer shall be the custodian of the Fund. Payments for unbudgeted claims on this fund shall be made on vouchers signed by the Chairman of the Council on Finance and Administration or the Conference Secretary.

4. PROGRAM BUDGETS

Budgets for expenditures for program for the District and the Conference shall be coordinated by the Conference Council on Ministries. The Conference Council on Ministries shall make recommendations to the Council on Finance and Administration which shall make a final recommendation to the Annual Conference.

C. CONFERENCE PROCEDURE**1. RULES OF ORDER**

The Rules of Order shall be the Roberts Rules of Order revised.

2. PRE-CONFERENCE REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS.

There shall be a Pre-Conference Journal which shall contain reports and resolutions of all program agencies of the Conference. This Pre-Conference Journal shall be mailed to each member of the Little Rock Conference at least 30 days before the annual session. The Conference Secretary shall be the editor of this publication. The pre-conference reports submitted for inclusion in the Pre-Conference Journal shall be submitted to the Conference Secretary typewritten or on disk no later than March 15 of each year. Non-sponsored resolutions or petitions, as well as those sponsored by any regular board or standing committee or task force of the Conference, may be included in the Pre-Conference Journal with the approval of the Executive Committee of the Council on Ministries.

3. COPY FOR THE JOURNAL

All copy for the Journal shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary not later than the close of the Annual Conference session. All material to be published in the journal which does not meet this deadline shall be excluded unless specific permission for delay is granted by the Annual Conference. The Conference Secretary shall be authorized to edit all reports for printing in

the Journal. Addresses delivered to the Conference, except for the Episcopal Address and the Laity Address, shall not be printed in the journal.

4. FLOOR RESOLUTIONS

Any resolution or petition not printed in the Pre-Conference Journal must be distributed in writing to the delegates and lay on the table for twenty-four hours before being debated and acted upon. If the floor resolution calls for a change in the structure or standing rules, it must be submitted to a review by the Committee on Review which will recommend concurrence or non-concurrence.

5. MOTIONS AND DEBATES

All motions and resolutions made on the floor of Annual Conference shall be legibly written on forms supplied by the Conference Secretary and shall be in the hands of the Conference Secretary and Presiding Officer before any action or vote can be taken by the Conference. Debate on each motion or resolution shall be limited to three two-minute speeches for the motion or resolution and three two-minute speeches against the same (excluding persons rising to points of order, amendments or final summation).

6. CONFERENCE EXPENSE FUND

- a. Registration fees and offerings taken at the Annual Conference shall be administered by the Conference Treasurer and shall be used to defray expenses of the session.
- b. The Conference Treasurer shall pay a per diem to retired ministers for days actually in attendance at Annual Conference and be reimbursed from the Conference Expense Fund. Eligibility shall be determined by the Conference Board of Pensions
- c. Any deficit in the Conference Expense Fund shall be made up from the Conference Administrative Fund.
- d. The Conference Expense Fund shall be administered by the Committee on the Annual Conference.

7. UNBUDGETED EXPENDITURES

When any proposal is submitted to the Annual Conference which involves the expenditure of funds not included in the Council on Finance and Administration report, such a proposal shall be referred for advice and recommendation to the Council on Finance and Administration and brought back to the same session of the Annual Conference for a vote to be taken by the Conference. No unbudgeted expenditures shall be submitted within the last twenty four hours of a Conference Session.

8. CAMPAIGNS

All Conference-wide campaigns to raise funds shall be voted on by written ballot of the Conference.

9. MEMOIRS

There shall be published in the Journal a memoir of each deceased clerical member of the Conference. A picture of the deceased shall be published with the memoir. The same shall be done for probationary members, associate members and local pastors. Likewise, a memoir of spouses of the above shall be published in the Journal. The District Superintendents shall report to the Conference Secretary the death of any of the above mentioned and be responsible for the submission of memoirs not later than thirty days after the death occurs. The names or memoirs of deceased lay persons who have been active in the Conference sessions, or served on Conference Boards or as officials of Conference institutions may be published in the Journal. It shall be the duty of the District Superintendents to report to the Chairman of the Conference Board of Pensions the death of any conference claimant that occurs in their respective districts.

10. HISTORICAL MATERIAL

- a. The Library at Hendrix College shall be the depository for all historical documents and artifacts of the Little Rock Conference. The College Librarian shall be the custodian of these historical materials.
- b. The Editor of the ARKANSAS UNITED METHODIST shall submit to the Commission on Archives and History a group picture of the class admitted into full connection for publication in the Journal and also two small pictures of each clerical member at the time of his/her retirement.

11. CONFERENCE STRUCTURE

- a. At the beginning of each quadrennium the Conference Structure shall be reviewed.
- b. The Conference Structure shall be reprinted each year in the Conference Journal with any changes made during the preceding Annual Conference.

12. DISTRIBUTION OF CONFERENCE JOURNALS

The Conference secretary shall mail a copy of the Conference Journal to active and retired clergy, seminarians, all probationary members, lay members of the Annual Conference, and chairpersons of conference boards, committees, and agencies.

13. TELLERS

- a. Floor Tellers for each Annual Conference shall be nominated by the District Superintendents, one from each district. Each must be a member of the Annual Conference. The Head Floor Teller shall be nominated by the Conference Secretary.
- b. The Annual Conference host District Superintendent shall nominate laity from the host district who shall not be members of the Annual Conference to serve as Laity Election Tellers. The cabinet shall be responsible to nominate local pastors from the Annual Conference to serve as Clergy election tellers. The head laity election teller and head clergy election teller shall be nominated by the cabinet.

- d. All tellers shall be presented for election during the opening of the Annual Conference by the Conference Secretary.

14. JOURNAL CORRECTIONS

Persons discovering possible errors in the minutes of the Annual Conference as printed in the Conference Journal shall report them in writing to the Conference Secretary. The Conference Secretary, Dean of the Cabinet, and the Minutes Auditor will meet with that person, within a period of thirty days after receipt of the complaint, to hear his or her concern and to take appropriate action.

D. AMENDMENTS

The Conference Structure and these rules may be repealed or amended by a majority vote of those present and voting in any annual session of the Conference, provided the proposed change is presented to the Conference in writing one day before the vote is taken.

C. LITTLE ROCK CONFERENCE POLICY STATEMENTS

CHURCH EXTENSION FUNDING POLICY **Little Rock Conference**

I. THE PURPOSE OF CHURCH EXTENSION FUNDS:

- A. Church Extension funds of the Conference Council Board of Global Ministries (CBOGM) are to be used to assist District Committees on Building and Location in purchasing new sites for churches, constructing buildings, remodeling parsonages or church facilities, or developing programs and facilities for specialized ministries or designated Conference extension projects.
- B. Church Extension funds are to be distributed in a manner which acknowledges the Little Rock Conference's priorities and programs.
- C. "REGULAR" CHURCH EXTENSION FUNDS
The funds received by the CBOGM designated as "Regular Church Extension Funds" are to be used as grants and shall be limited to \$1,500 or 25% of the estimated project cost, whichever is the lesser amount. These grants can be used for any church facility, but will be limited to one grant per project in any five-year period.
- D. "SPECIAL" CHURCH EXTENSION FUNDS
The funds received by the CBOGM designated "Special Church Extension Funds" will be managed by the Council on Ministries and may be granted for the following:
 - 1. Assistance to District Committees on Building and Location for the purchase of new church sites.
 - 2. Construction of church facilities for new congregations.
 - 3. The merger or relocation of churches.

4. Assistance in the development of specialized ministries, with priority consideration being given to smaller membership and ethnic minority congregations.
5. Designated Conference Church Extension projects.

II. THE APPLICATION PROCESS

Application forms for each fund are to be obtained from the District Superintendent or from the Committee on Church Extension.

- A. Each application must have the approval of the District Superintendent, the Pastor, and the District Board of Missions or its Executive Committee and/or equivalent body. These persons, along with the District Committee on Building and Location, shall have the primary responsibility for reviewing all plans for remodeling and purchasing church sites within the district.
- B. Where more than one project is recommended for Special Church Extension Funds within a given district within a given year, the District Board of Missions or its Executive Committee or its equivalent body shall rank each project according to priority for consideration in funding.
- C. ALL APPLICATIONS SHALL INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING:
 1. Signatures of approval by the District Superintendent, Pastor, and Chairperson of the District Board of Missions or its Executive Committee or its equivalent body.
 2. Evidence of a thorough Every Member Commitment Program for the current year and demonstration of a sound financial base for operations, debt, service, and payments of all Conference apportionments.
 3. Certification from the District Superintendent that these apportionments have been accepted in full for the current year.
 4. Detailed plans for the project, including 5-year goals and objectives for the next program year. A goal for each project shall be to become self-supporting.
 5. Evidence of a feasibility study including the evaluation of existing programs, projects, needs, and relevant demographic information.
 6. Barrier free accessibility for the physically challenged must be a part of any new construction or renovation projects.
- D. Unless the application is to be reviewed by another body, completed applications shall be submitted directly to the Church Extension Secretary of the Conference Board of Global Ministries who will be responsible for processing applications in compliance with procedures outlined by the Conference BOGM and this policy.

III. CONFERENCE BOGM POLICY FOR CHURCH EXTENSION FUNDS

- A. All applications for Regular or Special Church Extension Funds are to be submitted to the Church Extension Secretary who shall be responsible for seeing that the applications have been properly completed before processing the applications.

- B. Applications for projects related to strengthening ethnic minority local churches shall be submitted to the Conference EMLC Task Force for review and approval before being forwarded to the Church Extension Secretary. When more than one application is approved by the Committee within a given year, each will be given a priority ranking.
- C. Applications for projects related to Cooperative Parishes and Parish Development are to be submitted to the BOGM Parish and Community Development Committee for review and approval before being forwarded to the Church Extension Secretary. When more than one application within a given year is approved by the Committee, each will be given a priority ranking.
- D. Applications are to be presented by the Church Extension Secretary first to the Committee on Parish and Community Development for review and then to the Board of Global Ministries or its Executive Committee, which may approve or deny applications and authorize the release of funds in compliance with Little Rock Conference BOGM policy and procedures.
- E. Applications for the relocation of existing churches are to be presented to the Committee on Parish and Community Development for review and evaluation. (See V. below).
- F. Applications for Special Church Extension Funds must be approved by all required persons and groups and be ready for presentation to the BOGM or its Executive Committee prior to APRIL 1st for funding in the following program year of the Annual Conference.
- G. Applications for Regular Church Extension Funding may be submitted at any time and will be processed and acted upon at Annual Conference, in October, and at mid-year BOGM meetings. (See section on emergencies).
- H. The District Superintendent shall be notified of the time and place of the meetings of the Parish & Community Development Committee to consider applications for funding and may attend these meetings and invite representatives from the local church who desire to speak as their application is considered.
- I. The Church Extension Secretary shall notify the District Superintendents in writing of actions taken on applications from their districts. It is the responsibility of the District Superintendent to notify applicants of actions.

IV. REQUESTS TO THE BOGM, NATIONAL DIVISION

All requests for funding from the BOGM, National Division, must be forwarded to the Church Extension Secretary and presented to the Conference BOGM or its Executive Committee for approval and priority ranking. Applications for grants, loans, and donations from the National Division may be obtained from the District Superintendent or the Church Extension Secretary.

V. CHURCH RELOCATIONS

All applications for funding the relocation of churches shall contain an explanation of plans for continuing ministry to the community from which the church is relocating and must be reviewed by the Committee on

Community and Parish Development of the Conference Board of Global Ministries. Other groups may also be asked to review these plans.

VI. WHEN CHURCHES HAVE COMBINED THEIR EFFORTS

Applications from multi-point charges, cooperative parishes, and other cooperative configurations for ministry, will be considered on a priority basis. The priority is set by the District Missions Committee or its equivalent body, and reviewed by the Parish and Community Development Committee. The P & CD Committee will assign priorities when applications from more than one District are received.

VII. GRANTS IN EMERGENCY SITUATIONS

- A. Forms can be obtained from the Church Extension Secretary.
- B. No funding will be approved for the current Conference year unless an emergency exists. The District Superintendent for that district and the Executive Committee of the Conference BOGM will determine if an emergency exists after hearing from the requesting group.
- C. In the case where an emergency has been determined to exist, funding will be granted only after all other approved grants have been funded, or it has been determined that other funding will be available for those requests which have already been approved.
- D. All forms will be completed and two copies made of the original. Each copy will be signed by the District Superintendent and other parties requesting funding. Each represented church or party must indicate its level of financial support of the project in dollars. The District Board of Missions of the requesting district must indicate its financial support toward these combined projects.

VIII. SPECIAL CHURCH EXTENSION FUNDING FOR PERIODS EXCEEDING ONE YEAR

When Special Church Extension Funding is committed to a particular project for periods exceeding one year, the following policies prevail.

- A. An annual report must be submitted to the Conference BOGM of progress made toward reaching the goal of self-support and listing specific objectives for the next year. The honoring of the commitment to continue will be based upon an evaluation of the annual report. If no report is filed, funding will be terminated.
- B. No project may receive aid for more than three consecutive years in any five-year period without approval by the action of the Annual Conference, as requested by the Committee on Church Extension, CBOGM. No project shall receive funding from Special Church Extension funds beyond the five- year period.

IX. RELEASE OF FUNDS

- A. The Church Extension Secretary, in consultation with the District Superintendent, the Conference Treasurer, and the Director of the Conference Council on Ministries will arrange a schedule for the release of Special Church Extension grants.

- B. No funds will be released until the District Superintendent notifies the Church Extension Secretary in writing that work on the project has begun.
- C. No funds will be remitted to a project until the District Superintendent has written the Secretary of the Committee on Church Extension certifying that work has begun.
- D. The District Superintendent shall file with the Church Extension Secretary an audit form certifying that funds have been expended for the purposes approved by the BOGM.

X THE "PIONEER FUND"

The Board of Global Ministries and its Committee on Parish and Community Development has administered the Fund for New Church Development under the guidelines of the 1985 journal. This fund has been referred to as the "Breaking New Ground" and the "Pioneer Fund" in the past. Since there is only one fund it will be referred to as the "Pioneer Fund." There are two ways we will use this fund. (1) We will make loans from the principal of this fund. (2) We will make grants from the interest this fund generates.

XI. PURPOSE OF THE PIONEER FUND

This fund will be utilized to make grants and loans only for the development of new congregations that have been designated and approved as being in areas with growth potential and/or for the redevelopment of existing congregations that have been approved as strategic growth congregations in growth potential areas.

A. GRANTS

- 1. Grants may be made from the interest generated by the Pioneer Fund. Any local Church/District, Trustees/District Board of Missions may apply for a grant with the consent of the District Superintendent. Every application for a grant to establish a new congregation or to redevelop an existing congregation must be made on forms supplied by the Church Extension Secretary.
- 2. Prior to any new or existing congregation being authorized a grant from this fund, approval must be received from the following:
 - a. District Superintendent
 - b. The Little Rock Conference Cabinet
 - c. District Committee on Building & Location
 - d. LRC Parish & Community Development Committee, BOGM
 - e. LRC Board of Global Ministries
- 3. The Parish and Community Development Committee will set the date for the grant to be released and will notify the District Superintendent and the local congregation.
- 4. No church or newly developed congregation may receive more than one grant from the Pioneer Fund. If there is overwhelming evidence that an additional grant is needed to insure success of a congregation and there are no other remedies available to said church or new congregation, an additional grant may be approved after the request and

reasons are presented at and approved by the Little Rock Annual Conference at its annual session.

B. LOANS

1. ELIGIBILITY AND LOAN LIMITS

Loans may be made from the principal of the Pioneer Fund. Any church or district may apply for a loan through the Church Extension Secretary of the Little Rock Conference Board of Global Ministries. The maximum amount of any loan will be two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000). No church or district may apply for more than one loan at a time. All outstanding loans must be repaid in full before any additional applications for the church or district will be accepted.

2. INTEREST RATES

The interest on these loans will normally be lower than interest a church or district could secure on a loan in the local market. The maximum amount of interest that may be charged on any loan will be the Little Rock prime rate at the time the loan is issued. The interest will be established by the Parish and Community Development Committee after consultation with the Conference Treasurer or the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas.

3. REPAYMENT SCHEDULE

The repayment of the loan will be arranged between the Parish and Community Development Committee and the church or district and will include both the principal and interest. Early repayment of the loan is recommended and urged. Only in the most severe cases will loans be extended. In these instances readjustment of the principal and interest is mandatory.

4. A loan may never be converted to a grant.

5. APPROVAL AND NOTIFICATION

All applications for loans must have the approval of the District Superintendent and be submitted on forms supplied by the Little Rock Conference Church Extension Secretary. When a loan is approved, the Church Extension Secretary will notify the applicant when the funds will be available.

6. GUARANTEES

There must be Performance Bonds and insurance coverage to insure the completion of the project to which the loan is given. This requirement is for projects of \$10,000.00 or more.

EQUITABLE COMPENSATION POLICY

I. PREAMBLE

1. The primary responsibility for payment of pastoral base compensation remains with individual pastoral charges (DP 722.4)

2. A local church exists to serve, not to be served. All churches should be motivated to a larger sense of ministry. Churches whose pastors receive salary subsidy should be open to linkage with other churches, in order to provide full -time ministerial conference members with a minimum workload goal of around 200 members, or at least three (3) churches, which the Commission believes to be those necessary to support a full- time minister. Smaller churches should be encouraged to accept couplings with each other to reduce the need for salary supplement over a reasonable time period.
3. Equitable/appropriate salary levels can best be met when appointments are open to all ministerial members without regard to sex or race.
4. Growth in stewardship should be achieved by all below-minimum remuneration churches. Evidence of stewardship education and growth should be provided, when salary subsidy is sought.

II. EQUITABLE SALARY

1. The Equitable Compensation Fund shall be used to provide each pastor who receives less than the minimum base compensation (MBC) with an additional amount sufficient to make the base compensation approved by the pastoral charge plus the supplemental aid or income from other sources equal to the MBC approved by the conference. (DP 722.8)
2. The minimum base compensation for a pastor approved by the Annual Conference for 1998 shall be:
 - A. Full -time Full Member -\$22,000
 - B. Full -time Associate Member or Probationary Member -\$21,000
 - C. Full -time Local Pastor -\$20,000
3. All requests for Equitable Salary Grants (ESG) shall be received and acted upon each year before Mission Salary requests are considered. Equitable Salary needs shall have prior claim on available funds.
4. Equitable Salary grants shall have prior claim over Mission Salary grants in the event of insufficient funds.
5. In the event of insufficient funds to pay all Equitable Salary grants in a year, each ESG shall share proportionately from the available funds.
6. Churches/charges with associate pastor(s) shall not be eligible to receive Equitable Salary grants.
7. The Commission on Equitable Compensation will work with District Superintendents to help churches achieve minimum base compensation for pastors, and will consider requests for continuation of Commission aid once minimum base compensation is attained.
8. A church/charge shall make application for Equitable Salary grant to the Commission through the District Superintendent no later than January 10.
9. A church/charge receiving an Equitable Salary grant shall accept in full its annual conference apportionments for the coming year, and shall be expected to pay its conference apportionments in full.

10. The District Superintendent shall work with each church/charge receiving Equitable Salary grant to develop a sound financial policy and goals, including a yearly budget and every- member financial campaign. The Commission may request written proof and reports on such efforts before considering or granting any request for Equitable Salary funds.
11. The Commission shall report the amount of Equitable Salary Grant paid during the fiscal year to each church, charge and pastor prior to Charge Conference, and the District Superintendent shall also report the same information at the Charge Conference for the church..
12. The Commission shall recommend to Annual Conference the amount for Equitable Salary grants. The Commission shall also then recommend the maximum amount of such grant a church/charge may receive (DP722.8).
13. In exceptional cases approved by the Cabinet, any of requirements 6. -12. above may be waived by vote of the Commission.
14. Pastoral assignment shall be full- time (DP 441 & 441.1) except that the Commission shall consider applications whose pastoral supply is appointed in accordance with DP 441.2 & 437.2. Based on current MBC, less -than- full- time appointments of ordained ministers shall be paid as:

MEMBERS:	FULL (\$22,000)	ASSOCIATE/ PROBATIONARY (\$21,000)
1/4 Time	\$ 5,500	5,250
1/2 Time	11,000	10,500
3/4 Time	16,500	15,750
15. This policy of fund distribution shall be effective in June of 1994, if approved by the Annual Conference.

III. MISSION SALARY

1. Mission Salary grants are not specifically defined in the Book of Discipline, but shall be any pastoral salary supplement grant that is not for the purpose of complying with the minimum base compensation requirement (II. above). Examples of Mission Salary grants might be: (1) "new church" or "missional" development situations, (2) cooperative parish ministries, (3) inner city ministries, (4) rural ministries, (5) cross- racial appointments, or (6) other specialized ministries.
2. The Commission may designate a portion of the Equitable Compensation Fund (ECF) for Mission Salary grants (MSG), provided the total of the annual Mission Salary Grants added to the total of Equitable salary grants (ESG) for the same year shall leave a balance in the Equitable Salary Fund of not less than 75% of the total of ESG + MSG for the year, it being the policy that a "reserve" equal to 75% of the current year's funding needs shall be maintained.
3. Mission Salary Grants (MSG) may be (1) in addition to Equitable Salary Grants (ESG), or (2) independent of ESG.
4. The District Superintendent shall work with each church/charge seeking a MSG to develop a sound fiscal policy, which shall include a yearly budget and financial campaign. The Commission

- may request a written report from the District Superintendent and church before making such a grant.
5. Requests for MSG shall be made in the same manner and time as ESG requests.
 6. In exceptional cases, on recommendation from the District Superintendent, the Commission may waive No. 4 of this section.
 7. All MSG shall be reported to the church/charge and to the Annual Conference.

IV. ADJUSTMENTS

1. Adjustments to ESG and MSG may be made by the Executive Committee of the Commission (Chair, Vice-Chair, and Secretary) at the beginning of the fiscal year, or when appointments are made, or when such adjustments are necessitated by change of pastor or realignment of church or charge, or when a new salary arrangement is voted by a Charge Conference, upon written request from the District Superintendent to the Commission Chair and the Arkansas Area Treasurer.

PARSONAGE GUIDELINES

The Little Rock Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church Adopted 1993

The Book of Discipline is clear concerning the Annual Conference's role in setting guidelines for parsonages and the use of parsonages. (For reference in the 1996 Book of Discipline, refer to paragraphs 262.2f(4), 807.4, 2503.2-.4, 2508, 2517, 2522, 2527.1 & .4, 2543, and 2544.) It is suggested that each Pastor-Parish Relations Committee (PPRC) review annually these guidelines to insure adequate housing for all clergy and their families.

It is important for local churches across the conference to follow these guidelines to the best of their ability to reduce the differences in quality, size, and equipment from parsonage to parsonage. Furthermore, these guidelines should be considered when a congregation is in the process of building, buying, or remodeling a parsonage.

Guidelines

1. **Bedrooms.** There should be at least three bedrooms of standard size with ample closet space in each. It is recommended that one room on the main floor of any two story parsonage be adaptable for use as a bedroom.
2. **Bathrooms.** A parsonage should have at least two bathrooms. One could be with a shower only, and the one on the main floor should be a combination tub and shower.
3. **Kitchen.** The minimum kitchen should include: adequate cabinet and counter space, sink, stove, refrigerator with frozen food storage, garbage disposal (if sewer lines and septic tanks do not make this impossible,) dishwasher, good lighting, and adequate electrical outlets. A breakfast area is

desirable. Other appliances shall include a washing machine and clothes dryer. An adequate supply of hot water shall be provided.

4. Living/Dining Areas. An adequate living area for family life and entertaining guests must be provided. Depending upon the needs of the setting, this could be a combination of the following rooms/areas: living room, family room, dining room, or great room.

5. Study. It is preferable for the pastor's office to be in the church buildings. However, the parsonage may be equipped with space for a study. Every parsonage should have adequate bookshelves.

6. Closets. Adequate closet and storage space should be provided throughout the house.

7. Garage. A two car garage or carport with storage for tools and yard equipment should be provided.

8. Energy Efficiency. It is recommended that conservation of energy be considered when purchasing appliances, when re-modeling, and when purchasing a new parsonage.

9. Heating/Cooling. A central heating/cooling system with the capacity to properly heat/cool the entire habitable part of the house and the proper thermostatic controls should be provided. The pastor shall be responsible for changing furnace filters to insure the safe and efficient operation of the system. The church shall provide all other maintenance of the heating and cooling system.

10. Window Coverings. Appropriate and tasteful curtains, drapes, shades, or other window coverings shall be provided for all rooms of the parsonage. Safe storage of unused window coverings shall be provided by the pastor.

11. Utilities. The cost of all utilities shall be the responsibility of the pastor residing in the parsonage. At least two phone outlets shall be provided.

12. Insurance. The church is responsible for payment of insurance for the property. It should include home-owner type coverage, and the insurance shall cover at least 80% of the replacement cost of the parsonage, related structures, and church-owned furnishings. It is recommended that the pastor obtain additional coverage to insure personal belongings and furnishings.

13. Parsonage Furnishings and Equipment. The Little Rock Annual Conference defines "*adequate housing*" as a house comparable to the average homes of the congregation in condition and size, including furnishings and other equipment. However, it is suggested that one bedroom be left unfurnished in all parsonages. As applicable, the local church shall furnish a breakfast table, formal living room furniture, formal dining room furniture, den/family room furniture, bedroom furniture (except as noted above), sufficient lighting, and floor covering. It is expected that the minister shall provide nonessential items such as a t.v., microwave oven, pictures, and accessories. It is permissible, and even encouraged, for the pastor to provide personal furnishings, as this is their home. The Pastor shall work with the Parsonage Committee to provide for safe storage of unused local church parsonage furniture.

Parsonage Maintenance

14. Local Church Responsibilities. The local church's Board of Trustees shall properly maintain an adequate and comfortable home in good condition

for the pastor and his/her family. At the convenience of the pastor's family, the chairperson of the Trustees and the chairperson of the Pastor-Parish Relations Committee shall inspect the home annually to determine maintenance needs, to up-grade the parsonage to comply with these guidelines, and to establish any improvements to meet the needs of the pastor and his/her family. Also, the church shall provide for termite and pest control.

Each year the local church budget should include money for the maintenance, redecoration, and landscaping of the parsonage. A record of all appliance instruction books, warranties, cutoff valves, meters, water and sewer lines, and other similar materials shall be filed with the church's records. An inventory of all church owned furnishings shall be maintained. The local church shall inform the pastor of who has keys to the parsonage.

15. Pastor's Responsibilities. The pastor and her/his family should care for the parsonage as a good steward of the property. Families shall exercise care so that the parsonage is not abused; this includes professional pest control for parasites from pets. The pastor is responsible for any damage caused by pets, personal guests, and family members. The pastor is responsible for cleaning the parsonage when moving out, including costs for cleaning residual tobacco smoke.

16. Parsonage Grounds. The yard and lawn around the house shall be well drained. The yard shall be tended by the pastor and her/his family. If the lawn is unusually large or requires a great amount of time to maintain, the church should assist the pastor. Landscaping and exterior care of the parsonage is the church's responsibility.

17. Mutual Responsibility Covenant. It is recommended that the Trustees and/or the Pastor Parish Relations Committee create a written covenant with the pastor spelling out the responsibilities of each. The covenant can be reviewed and updated yearly. The covenant should include provisions for restoration of personalized decorating. Redecorating should be done regularly with full consultation with the pastor.

18. Barrier Free Concerns. It is recommended that all parsonages built or remodeled in the future consider the needs of physically challenged persons.

19. Safety. All safety related factors should be considered. The church shall supply each parsonage with at least two operable fire extinguisher. Smoke detectors shall be installed on each floor of the house, including the basement.

Administration of the Guidelines

20. Time. These guidelines become effective immediately upon adoption by the conference.

21. Sub-standard Parsonages. All churches are urged to move toward full compliance with these guidelines. District Superintendents shall keep a record of parsonages that are not meeting these guidelines.

22. Parsonage Committee. A local church may appoint a Parsonage Committee to lead the congregation in implementing these guidelines, and for the on-going maintenance of the parsonage. Membership of a Parsonage Committee shall include the chairs of Trustees and PPRC as ex-officio members with vote, and a minimum of three at-large members elected by the Charge Conference and divided into three year terms in classes. The at-large members may not succeed themselves. The pastor and her/his spouse shall complete the committee's membership.

23. Pastoral Changes. When there is a pastoral change, the house shall be reviewed by the chairpersons of Trustees and PPRC with the pastor to make a list of needed repairs. The local church shall make provisions to complete all repairs before the succeeding pastor moves into the house. When moving day arrives, a final "walk through" conducted by the pastor with the chairpersons of Trustees and PPRC shall occur for a final assessment. (A form signed by the persons doing the assessment will be provided by the district superintendent; one copy will be referred to the district superintendent and the other will be given to the parsonage committee/trustees for action.**per 1996 conference action.*) Before a move, the departing pastor shall invite the incoming pastor to see the parsonage. Any redecorating should include the incoming pastor's consultation.

24. Housing Allowances. In certain and limited situations, a housing allowance is permissible. A decision to exercise this option shall be made with approval of the Pastor Parish Relations Committee, the Board of Trustees, and the Pastor. The District Superintendent shall be informed of the church's consideration of this option before any action is taken.

25. Publicity of Guidelines. The conference shall make copies of the guidelines available to all churches and pastors upon adoption, and the Conference Journal shall publish the guidelines once each quadrennium.

26. Charge Conference. The District Superintendent shall ask questions concerning the parsonage and its compliance with the guidelines annually at the Charge Conference.

PASTOR'S MOVING EXPENSE POLICY

The Pastor's Moving expense Conditions of eligibility are as follows:

- G. The Following persons shall be eligible:
 - 1. Full Time Pastors
 - 2. Student Local pastors
 - 3. District Superintendents
 - 4. Persons in conference connectional positions
 - 5. Retiring Pastors
 - 6. Pastors on disability leave
 - 7. Any other person recommended by the Board of Ordained Ministry

- B. The following amounts shall be paid:
 - 1. \$400.00 per pastor plus
 - 2. \$0.75 per mile from parsonage to parsonage, with one exception. When transferring from another conference, the rate will apply from parsonage to the Little Rock Conference boundary.

- C. Monies shall be paid by the Conference Treasurer upon presentation of a voucher of mileage signed by the District Superintendent and the pastor that is moving.

RENTAL/ HOUSING ALLOWANCES POLICY FOR RETIRED MINISTERS

WHEREAS, the religious denomination known as The United Methodist Church has and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

WHEREAS, the practice of The United Methodist Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

WHEREAS, pensions paid to retired and disabled ordained or license minister of The United Methodist Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service, and

WHEREAS, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that the Little Rock Annual Conference is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired and disable ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED:

1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received during the year of 1997 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister of the United Methodist Church who is or was a member of the Little Rock Conference at the time of his or her retirement;
2. This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relation or placed on disability leave by the Little Rock Conference and whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the Journal of the Little Rock Conference and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.
3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference or institution of The United Methodist Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The United Methodist Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The United Methodist Church for such retired minister's pension.

NOTE:

The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul 71-290 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a "rental

allowance" is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities."

SEXUAL HARASSMENT POLICY

Because the church's mission relates to the call in Christ to be a church for all persons, a safe place where each can receive and give ministry with the gifts God freely bestows; because the will of the General Conference as recorded in the *Discipline* and the Resolutions is to be a church of justice and mercy; and because we trust that God's grace is at work;

THEREFORE, this policy of the Little Rock/North Arkansas Annual Conference addresses the conduct of the clergy and church professionals (consecrated and certified) in order:

- 1) to provide for the safety of parishioners and clergy/church professionals,
- 2) to protect the unique relationships which clergy/church professionals have with peers and parishioners in all settings,
- 3) to ensure the health, authenticity, and integrity of the church.

This policy is submitted to the Annual Conference in faithfulness to the call to Equality in Christ (Galatians 3 :28) and to the mandate of the General Conference as recorded in the Social Principles and the 1992 General Conference resolution, "Sexual Harassment in the United Methodist Church."

Sexual harassment is an unwanted behavior with a sexual connotation. It is any sexually related behavior that is unwelcome, offensive, depersonalizing, or which fails to respect the rights and feelings of others. It may be verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature. Such behaviors create an intimidating, hostile, and offensive environment.

This policy is based upon an understanding that protects all persons and which acknowledges the clergy/church professionals' inherent position of power and total responsibility-- moral, ethical, and professional-- for maintaining conduct worthy of the sacred trust and power placed in them.

This policy is intended to provide an additional informal process for the resolution of grievances within the North Arkansas/Little Rock Annual Conference. It is not intended to supplant or substitute for the formal grievance process and its attendant fair process protections in *The Book of Discipline*. It is intended to assist persons to reach resolution or reconciliation prior to moving into the formality of the Disciplinary grievances. Failure to utilize or follow any of the procedures herein is not a chargeable offense, nor can it be used as grounds for an appeal of a formal grievance, complain, review, investigation, or trial process.

Local churches are encouraged to utilize this policy in the formulation of policies for all their employees.

PROCEDURES

A. If you experience what you consider to be inappropriate behavior, keep a written record of your experiences including dates, times, places, and witnesses. Keep any written material you may have received from the person.

You may wish to confront the person with the inappropriate behavior and demand that it cease.

If you choose not to confront the person alone, you may ask someone to accompany you to confront the person and seek reconciliation.

If you choose not to confront the person, or if the behavior continues, report the incident to the chair of the person's appropriate evaluating committee (e. g. , a pastor or church staff member would be reported to the chair of the staff/pariah relations committee; a district superintendent to the chair of the committee on superintendency; a bishop to the chair of the committee on episcopacy).

If the conflict is not resolved to your satisfaction, the committee chair shall convene the entire committee to meet with the accused, the person bringing the accusations, and each supporting person.

If the situation is not resolved satisfactorily following these efforts, then follow the Discipline's procedures for grievances, complaints, and charges.

B. If you are confronted by someone who has experienced or observed inappropriate behavior on your part, listen to the accusation and agree to change the behavior or otherwise resolve the situation and reconcile the relationship.

If you are unable to resolve the situation with your accuser, contact the chair of your appropriate evaluating committee. Ask to meet with your accuser and the committee chair to resolve the conflict. The accused and the person bringing the accusation each has the right to bring a supportive person to this meeting.

If the conflict remains unresolved, the committee chair shall convene the entire committee to meet with the accused, the person bringing the accusations, and each supporting person.

C. If you receive a report of inappropriate behavior, listen seriously and objectively. Help the person follow the steps outlined above.

If you are a clergy/church professional in a paid supervisory position in the local church or a conference agency, and an employee is being harassed, you should immediately take corrective or preventative action.

According to Arkansas law, any person receiving a report from a child under age 18, indicating sexual abuse of that child, is required to report the abuse to the proper authorities.

IMPLEMENTATION

Following initial training for all clergy/church professionals in March 1994, they should receive training periodically, provided or approved by the Board of Ordained Ministry or Board of Diaconal Ministry. Training will be provided by the Board of Ordained Ministry/Board of Diaconal Ministry on a regular basis for persons being appointed for the first time in the Annual Conference.

Local churches are urged to participate in educational opportunities on sexual ethics and conduct. Agencies and affiliated institutions are strongly encouraged to provide educational opportunities on sexual ethics and conduct.

MINISTERIAL ASSISTANCE FUND POLICY

I. Purpose: The Ministerial Assistance Fund of the Little Rock Annual Conference is a collegial act of the pastors of the conference to provide financial aid for those who need emergency assistance.

- II. Resources:** The Ministerial Assistance Fund will be funded primarily by voluntary contributions from the pastors. (A recommendation guideline is one-fourth of one percent of a pastor's annual base salary.) Memorial and other gifts will be gratefully received.

III. Management:

- A.** The Ministerial Assistance Fund will be managed by the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas. As custodian, the Foundation will be responsible for all deposits, investments, and disbursements. This service is provided by the Foundation without fee to the Annual Conference or the Ministerial Assistance Fund.
- B.** The Foundation shall present an annual report of all fund activity to the Board of Ordained Ministry.
- C.** The Foundation, through an annual mailing, will provide each pastor the opportunity to contribute to the fund. Each contribution will be acknowledged to the donor.
- D.** The Council on Ministries shall provide through the pre-registration mailing for Annual Conference a reminder of the opportunity for clergy to consider making a volunteer contribution to the Conference's "Ministerial Assistance Fund" as they return their Conference registration fee. Upon receipt of the contribution by the Conference Council, those monies would be forwarded to the Area Treasurer for deposit with the Arkansas United Methodist Foundation. *(This paragraph approved at the 1994 Conference Session)*
- E.** Gifts are to be sent to the United Methodist Foundation of Arkansas, 5905 Forest Place, #210, Little Rock, Arkansas 72207.

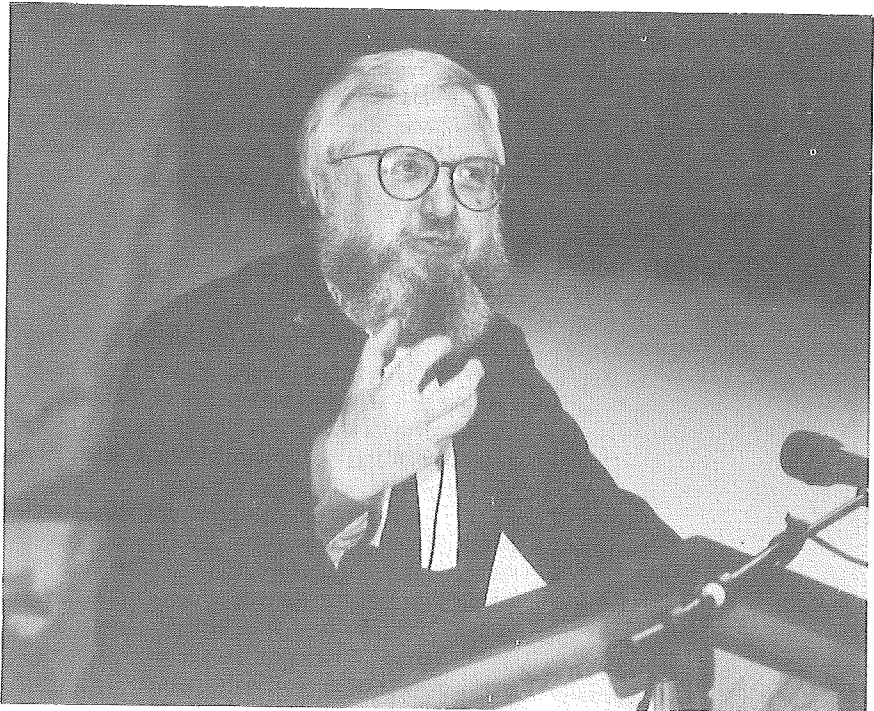
IV. Supervision and Grants

- A.** The Board of Ordained Ministry shall supervise the Ministerial Assistance Fund and provide an annual report to the Executive Session of the pastors at the Annual Conference Session.
- B.** The Board of Ordained Ministry, acting through its Executive Committee, has direct responsibility for receiving requests and approving grants.
 - 1.** Conference Members, Local Pastors, Diaconal Ministers, Seminary Students, Retired Pastors, and family members are eligible to receive assistance.
 - a.** Requests may be made through a member of the Board of Ordained Ministry or a District Superintendent and shall be in writing.

- b. All requests shall be forwarded to the Chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry for appropriate action.
2. The Chairperson of the Board of Ordained Ministry has discretionary authority to make one-time grants not to exceed \$200.00.
3. The maximum annual grant per individual or family is \$500.00

VACATION GUIDELINES FOR APPOINTED PERSONNEL

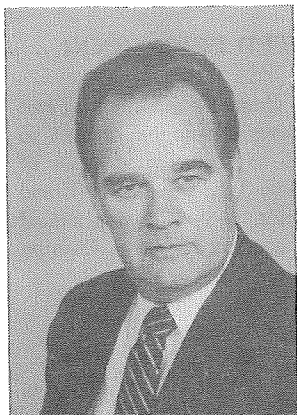
We recommend that all appointed personnel be granted a minimum of two weeks vacation annually and that additional vacation time should be granted to appointed personnel with due consideration being given to accumulated years of service. Time for continuing education which is required by THE DISCIPLINE and time for district and conference leadership responsibilities such as attending annual conference and working in the camping program should not be counted as vacation time.

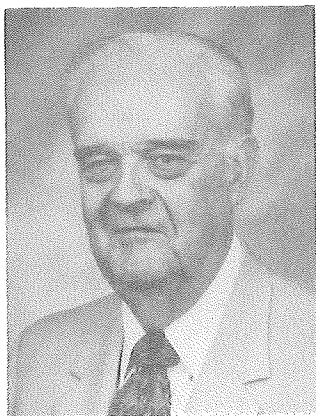

REV. WINSLOW E. BROWN



Winslow E. Brown was born July 8, 1923, at Centerton, AR., to Leslie N. and Frances W. Brown. He was Pastor Emeritus of Piney Grove United Methodist Church, a retired Army Chaplain, a member of the Hot Springs Amateur Radio club and the Retired Officer's Association.

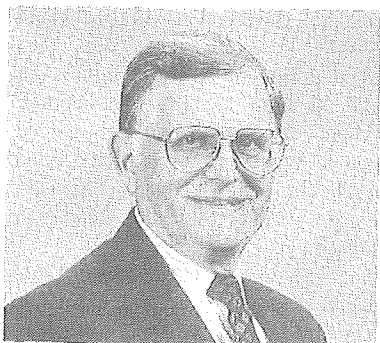

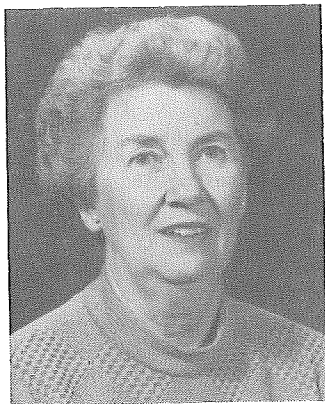

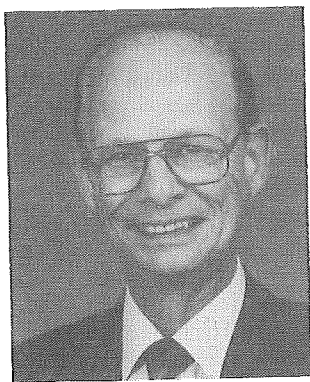
He and Mary Evelyn Ward Franks were married in Morrilton, Arkansas on August 31, 1931.

FONDEL BURLESON

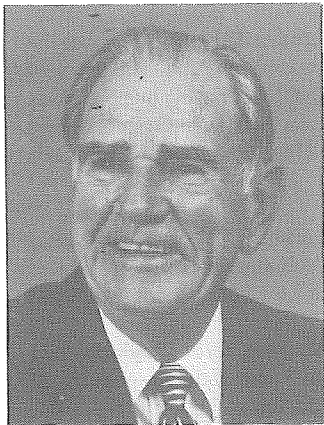

AUTREY JAY SIRMON



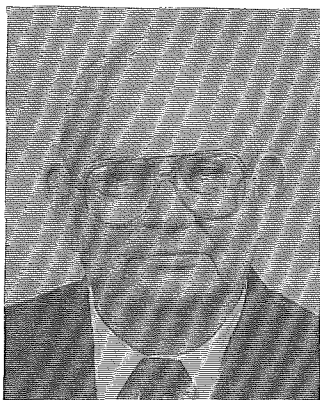

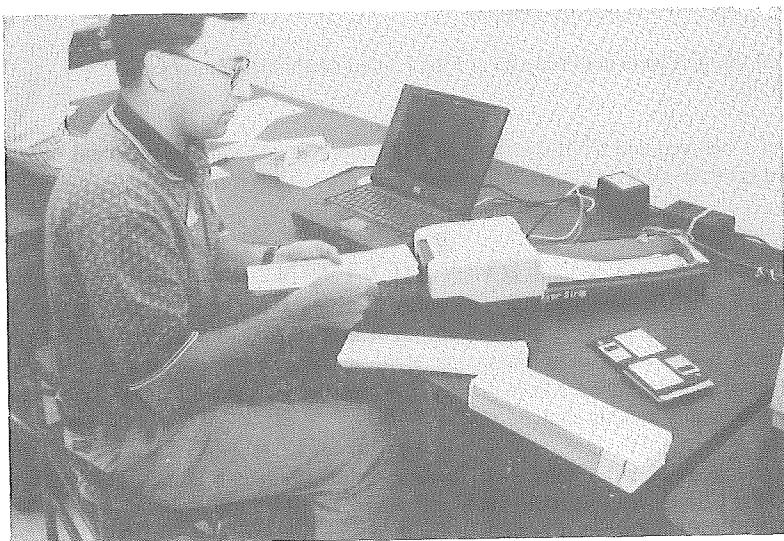
