PROCEEDINGS

The Forty-Ninth Session of the Arkansas Annual Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church convened in the Pleasant Grove Methodist Protestant Church, Boydsville Circuit, Rector, Arkansas, Rev. J. W. York, Pastor, November 9th to 12th inclusive, 1928 at 10:00 a m

The Conference was called together by the President who conducted the devotional service as follows:

Hymn: "Blessed Be the Name."

Scripture Lesson: 3rd Chapter of Philippians.

Prayer: By the President.

Hymn: "How Firm A Foundation."

The roll was called and those present and absent noted. Rev. G. O. McMillan, D. D., President of Westminster College, Tehuacana, Texas, and President of the Texas Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church, was introduced to the Conference and invited to a seat.

By motion of Rev. J. T. Goldsmith the bar of the conference was fixed to include the third window from the pulpit, and all members of the conference were invited to take seats within the bar.

The Programme as outlined by the President was distributed and the Conference adopted it as an outline of work for the conference provided that each succeeding item should become the order of business regardless to the time if there was nothing before the house

By motion the conference took recess for preaching at 11 o'clock.

Evangelistic Services

The Conference Sermon was preached by Rev. W. O. Tisdale, pastor of Lydesdale Circuit. He read the thirteenth chapter of First Corinthians, and used for a text the 13th verse of the said chapter. And using for his theme, "The Greatest Thing In the World." "LOVE." The service was very inspirational. At the conclusion of the sermon the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper was observed. Rev. J. M. Stephenson, Rev. W. A. House, Rev. J. T. Goldsmith and Rev. D. W. McGinnis being in charge. The Benediction was pronounced by Rev. D. W. McGinnis.

Noon

The good ladies of the community spread a bountiful dinner for the Conference on the Church lawn.

Afternoon Session First Day

The Conference reconvened promptly at 1.30 o'clock. Rev. I. A. Love conducted the devotional service which was as follows:

Song: "He Whispers His Love To Me."

Quartette: "The Old Rugged Cross."

Rev. J. A. Wade, Rev. E. L. Hogue,

Rev. S. S. Ware and Rev. A. V. Savage.

Scripture Lesson: The 23rd Psalm.

Prayer: Rev. I. A. Love,

The Committee on Credentials made its report which was adopted as read. (See Report No. 1.)

The President asked the Secretary to occupy the chair while he made his report which was adopted as read. (See Report No. 2)

The hour having arrived for the election of officers, the President appointed Rev. E. L. Hogue, Mr. Fuller Bond and Rev. J. T. Goldsmith as tellers:

By motion of Rev. J. T. Goldsmith the Secretary was authorized to cast the unanimous ballot of the conference for the re-election of Rev. W. R. Clower as President of the Conference. And after his election the Rev. Clower made some timely remarks.

My motion the President of the Conference was authorized to cast the unanimous vote of the Conference for the re-election of J. A. Wade for Secretary and Treasurer of the Conference.

Rev. J. M. Stephenson, Rev. W. O. Tisdale, were elected to succeed themselves as members of the Committee on Itinerancy and Orders.

By motion Rev. J. T G.oldsmith, Rev. G. A. Mouser, Rev. W. A. House, and Mr. J. R. Holifield, Mr. C. M. Vincent, and Mr. R. A. Cossey were elected as the Standing District Committee.

By motion the members of the Board of Church Eextention were re-elected which are as follows: Rev. J. A. Wade, Rev. J. M. Stephenson Rev. W. R. Clower, Mr. J. U. Wells and Mr. J. H. Hearne.

By motion Ralph Clayton, Horace Wilson and Mrs. Fred Stewart were elected to complete the Board of Young Peoples Work.

By motion Rev. W. A. Ward was given a transfer to the Michigan Conference of the Methodist Protestant Church he having requested the same.

The Committee on Itinerancy and Orders made a partial report recommending that Rev. S. N. Adam's transfer from the Louisiana Conference be received. A vote was taken and Brother Adams was admitted into the conference.

The Secretary read a letter from Rev. H. C. Palmer requesting that his name be transferred from the Superannuate list to the Supernumerary list. The letter was handed over to the Committee on Superannuates.

Rev. F. L. Gibbs, Assistant Secretary of the Board of Young Peoples Work having arrived was introduced to the Conference and invited to a seat. There being nothing before the Conference at this time he asked the privilege of presenting the greetings from the Mississippi Conference also from Dr. Broomfield, President of the General Conference, and Dr. Jas. H. Straughan, Secretary of Promotional Work of the Methodist Protestant Church, Rev. G. W. Daddaway, D. D., Secretary of the Board of Missions, Dr. Frank Stephenson, Executive Secretary of the Board of Education, and Rev. Lawrence Little, Executive Secretary of the Board of Young Peoples Work of Religious Education.

The Secretary read a letter from Rev. Little asking for an appropriation from the Conference to assist in bearing the expenses of the President of the Young Peoples Work to a meeting of the Presidents and Deans of the different conference Boards which is to meet in Cambridge Ohio, from Nov. 20-23, 1928. The letter was referred to the committee on Young Peoples Work.

Dr. G. O. McMillan asked for the privilege of speaking a few words to express the greeting from the Louisiana Conference.

A motion prevailed to recess till 8:30 o'clock Friday morning.

Evening Evangelistic Service

By agreement of the conference the evangelistic services were dispensed with and the hour given to Rev. G. O. McMillan and Rev. F. L. Gibbs. The Rev. McMillan brought a beautiful message to the conference in the form of a prophecy. Predicting what we might have in the future if our educational institutions are properly supported. The Rev. Gibbs gave in his address a detailed report of some of the Young Peoples Summer Conferences in which he had worked. And stressed the importance of them to our Church.

PROCEEDING FOR THE SECOND DAY, SATURDAY

Morning Session

The Conference convened promptly at 8:30 o'clock A. M. Rev. J. E. Hughes conducted the devotional exercises which were as follows:

Hymn: "All Hail The Power of Jesus' Name."

Scripture Lesson: 139th Psalm.

Prayer, J. E. Hughes.

The roll was called and those present and absent noted. The minutes of the previous day's session read and adopted.

The Secretary began reading the pastor's reports giving each pastor an opportunity to comment on the same. Many timely suggestions were made by the President and other members of the conference as the different reports were read.

The hour having arrived for preaching, the conference took recess till 1:30 P. M.

Evangelistic Services

Rev. A. V. Savage, pastor of Rector Station, brought the message for the hour, using for his theme: "Knowing Christ." His sermon was timely and full of inspiration. The benediction was pronounced by Rev. F. L. Gibbs. After which the ladies spread another bountiful dinner.

Afternoon Session

The conference was called together promptly at 1:30 P. M. The devotional service was conducted by Rev. G. C. Chambers, Reading the 12th chapter of Romans and offering prayer.

By order of the Conference the reading of the pastors reports was postponed and the report of committees were made the order of the day.

The Board of Young Peoples Work made its report which was referred to the Committee on Young Peoples Work, (See report No. 3)

Rev. F. L. Gibbs at this time made mention of the conference of Deans and Presidents of Annual Conference Young People Boards which the Executive Secretary is calling for November 20-23 at Cambridge, Ohio.

The Secretary read the Memorials sent down from the General Conference which were adopted. (See Memorials from General Conference.)

The paper of Dr. Jas. H. Straughan, Treasurer of the General Conference, and Secretary of Promotional work, was read and adopted. And the Conference set up a "New Century Service Commission." And elected Rev. J. A. Wade, Rev. W. R. Clower, and Mr. W. D. Wingfield as members.

Rev. G. O. McMillan was called to the platform by the President and asked to make an explanation to the conference of the Consolidation of the different General Boards which took place at the General Conference. His explanation was very satisfactory and much appreciated by the conference.

Rev. F. L. Gibbs, being desirous of leaving for his home was given an opportunity to speak a word of appreciation to the conference. At the conclusion of which he asked the Rev. W. A. House, Rev. J. M. Stephenson, and Mr. J. D. Templeton, three of our most honored, beloved, and aged brethren to be escorted to the platform and paid a very beautiful tribute to them. A song was sung and the conference gave them a hand shake. It was a most blessed hour. And the kind Heavenly Father blessed the congregation abundantly.

The Secretary was then ordered to finish reading the reports of the pastors.

A letter from Rev. W. H. Pate giving a summary of his years work was read by the Secretary.

The Secretary of the Centennial Gratitude Gift made his report which was adopted. (See report No. 4).

The Church Extension Board made its report which was adopted as read. (See report No. 5).

The Committee on Itinerancy and Orders made its report which was adopted as read. (See report No. 6.)

Resolutions calling for the next Annual Conference were called for. Two were presented which had lain on the table the required length of time. One from Prescott Circuit, Morning Star church, and one from Magnolia church Magnolia Station. The conference adopted the resolution calling for the conference to convene with the Magnolia church. (See resolutions Nos. 1 and 2.)

The committee on Education made its report which was adopted as read after a timely talk by Dr. McMillan. (See report No. 7.)

By motion the conference took recess till Monday morning at 8:30 o'clock.

Saturday Evening Evangelistic Services

The Saturday evening evangelistic services were in charge of Rev. J. M. Stephenson, who brought a very timely message from the text: "Follow Me." Using for his subject the last words of Christ. Showing the dependence of the Spiritual life upon the close walk and communion with Christ and that it brings the greatest satisfaction in Christian service.

THIRD DAY, SUNDAY

The Conference met promptly at 10:00 A. M. for Sunday School. Rev. W. O. Tisdale gave an exposition of the lesson which was greatly enjoyed by all.

The 11 o'clock hour having arrived Rev. J. A. Wade, pastor of Magnolia Station delivered the Ordination sermon. Using for his theme the "Preparation and Anointing of the High Priest for Serv-

ice." After the sermon the following were presented by the Secretary for Ordination:

Rev. I. A. Love.

Rev. A. V. Savage.

Rev. D. J. Roberts.

Rev. W. R. Clower, Rev. D. W. McGinnis and Rev. W. O. Tisdale officiating

The evangelistic services for the afternoon were in charge of Rev. N. B. Blackman. He brought an inspirational message from the 13th chapter of St. John. Using for his theme the contrast and comparison of Judas Iscariot and St. John.

The evening evangelistic services were in charge of Rev. G. O. McMillan, who brought a very instructive message showing forth the necessity of giving our young men an opportunity to attend school.

FOURTH DAY, MONDAY

Morning Session

The conference was called together promptly at 8:30 o'clock. The Rev. S. N. Adams was in charge of the Devotional service which was as follows:

And after a brief comment, the Apostles' Creed was recited in concert.

"Amazing Grace," was lined and sung in the old fashioned way.

The Committee on Boundaries made its report which was adopted. (See report No. 8).

By motion the Conference took recess till 10:40 A. M.

FOURTH DAY

The conference was called together promptly at 10:40 A. M. The Committee on Young Peoples Work made its report which was adopted as read. (See report No. 9.)

The Committee on Superannuates made its report which was amended and adopted. (See report No. 10.)

The Treasurer made his report which was adopted as read. (See report No. 11. A, B, C, D and E.)

The Finance Committee made its report which was adopted as read. (See report No. 12).

By motion the conference took recess for lunch.

Noon

The ladies of the community spread another bountiful dinner on the church lawn.

Afternoon Session

The Conference was called together promptly at 1:30 P. M.

The President called attention to the Centennial Memorial Edition prepared by Dr. Lewis, and the entire allotment was placed with the members of the Conference, remittance to be made later.

The Secretary called attention to the General Conference Minutes and several copies were sold.

The Committee on Church Extension made its report which was adopted as read. (See report No. 13.)

Committee on Missions reported; which was adopted as read. (See report No. 15 B.)

Rev. W. A. House, Conference Evangelistic, made his report which was adopted. (See Report No. 14.)

The Committee on Resolutions and Fraternal Relations, made its report which was adopted. (See report No. 15.)

By motion of the conference Rev. N. B. Blackman was delegated as Fraternal messenger to the North Arkansas Conference of the Southern Methodist Church which is to convene in Jonesboro, Arkansas, Nov. 21. Rev. J. A. Wade was elected as Fraternal Messenger to the Little Rock Conference of the Southern Methodist Church which is to convene in Little Rock, Arkansas, November 14th.

The Committee on Official Relations made its report which was adopted. (See report No. 16.)

The Secretary read a report from Haynesville Church, Claiborne Charge, which had been received through the mail.

By consent of the Conference the Secretary was ordered to provide space in Pastor's Report Blanks room for reporting disceased members, and infant baptisms,

The Conference authorized the Secretary to have 1000 copies of the Minutes published, and draw on the Treasurer for money to pay for the same.

By motion the Secretary was ordered to send the minutes C.

Grove Church, November 9-12, 1928. Dear Brethren:

As you come up from the various fields of labor to compile statistics and give an account of your stewardship, and to plan for the future prosperity of our Church, I greet you in the name of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

God has been good to us, no one has fallen, our ranks are unbroken, and as we think of His providential care and protection, we are made to exclaim: "Bless the Lord, O my soul; and all that is within me, bless His holy name. Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits."

Official Acts

Early after conference I received Rev. S. N. Adams' transfer from the Louisiana Conference, which has been turned over to the committee on Itinerancy and Orders.

In January I appointed Rev. B. Y. Findley to Caddo Circuit. Revs. W. O. Tisdale, E. Mitchell and J. R. Bland were appointed to Village Circuit.

The Budget

I do not have sufficient information to give anything like an accurate report. However, as most of our churches are rural, and crops were short over the entire state, I am sure that the amount collected on budget this year will be less than last year. But when we add the Gratitude Gift to the amount collected we will have raised more money this year than ever before in any one year.

Survey and Outlook

In my itineration among the churches I find that both pastor and people are willing to cooperate and go forward. But at the same time, I believe we are facing a real crisis in the Arkansas Conference. Good roads and consolidated schools have isolated many of our churches, and they must be relocated or we will lose them. Mt. Carmal, Hot Springs Circuit, should be moved to Hot Springs at once. Welcome, near Springhill, should be moved to Springhill, and we should begin in El Dorado at once, and if we cannot begin in a large way, we should begin in a small way.

Recommendations

FIRST—That our pastors urge the use of our own Sunday School literature, and that our Church paper be placed in every

home, if possible.

SECOND—That we unite as a Conference, during the month of February, in a Stewardship Campaign, and each pastor be required to preach three sermons on some phase of Stewardship to each congregation. Also that each pastor in the last of these services, undertake to secure tithing pledges.

THIRD—That the Budget System be adopted in every church and the "Every-Member-Canvass" made.

FOURTH—That all of the Special Days be observed and the program put out by the Board of Missions be used. But in case it is not possible to use the program, the pastor shall take an offering on his regular appointment and forward it to the Conference Treasurer.

Summary

During the year I have preached 201 times, lectured to high schools, preached several funerals, mailed out 510 letters, held 24 quarterly conferences, taught Stewardship in the Young People's Conference and visited every church in the entire conference from one to four times.

I have tried to the best of my ability to do the work you intrusted to me at our last Annual Conference, keeping in mind the interest of the Church as well as the interest of our ministers.

I have enjoyed the work, and the fellowship with both ministers and laymen, and for the many kindnesses and courtesies received in my travels over the district, I am profoundly thankful.

For health and strength and the preservation of life in all my travels this year, and for spiritual strength as well, I am indeed grateful to God; for our sufficiency is in Him.

May the Lord Jesus Christ, the Head of the Church, bless this Conference to our good and His glory.

May our work and fellowship together be pleasant, and may the Holy Spirit direct us as we plan our work for another year.

The Grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the Communion of the Holy Ghost be with you all. Amen.

REPORT NO. 3.

Report Of The Board Of Young Peoples Work

Your Eoard of Young Peoples Work wishes to make the following report:

We held our summer conference for young people at Warnock Springs July 23-29, and had a very good school. We had 38 young people who attended and took the required work for certificates. We had a number of visitors in attendance every day throughout the conference. Our instructors were: Rev. F. L. Gibbs, Assistant Secretary to our Executive Secretary of Young Peoples Work, Rev. C. M. Lippencot, pastor of our church at Haynesville, La., Rev. W. R. Clower, President of our Conference, and myself. We offered six courses and classes were enrolled for five. Two Standard Courses were offered and Four Young Peoples Training courses. The inspirational services each evening were well attended and seem to have been profitable. Free entertainment was provided through your Board for all those who came and took the work. The young people expressed themselves as having a most delightful time.

On the last day of the school we held our election and all of the old members of the Board were re-elected with the exception of Mrs. J. H. Hearne, it was thought best not to continue her on the board on account of her health.

The Conference sends up the following recommendation to our annual conference:

- 1. That this conference elect Ralph Clayton, Horace Wilson and Mrs. Fred Stewart, members of this Board.
- 2. That each Sunday School of the conference be asked to raise and pay over to our Treasurer \$3.00, and that the Sunday School at Magnolia, and Haynesville, be asked to raise \$5.00 each.
- 3. That each Christian Endeavor Society be asked to raise and pay over to our Treasurer the sum of \$3.00 each.
- 4. That the Board of Young Peoples Work meet within 30 days after the sitting of this annual conference for the purpose of deciding upon the time and place of the next summer conference.

In addition to these recommendations the Board wishes to make the following recommendations:

- 1. That our Sunday Schools and C. E. Societies cooperate with our Executive Secretary in carrying out the outlined programme for the coming quadrinnium. That we take advantage of the revised and standardized and graded Sunday School literature.
- 2. That the pastors of the different charges cooperate in arranging for special training classes for the Sunday School teachers and Christian workers.
- 3. That wherever possible Vacation and Week-day Bible schools be organized to give our people training through the vacation period.
- 4. That our pastors take advantage and advise their people to do so, of the Reading courses offered by the Board of Young Peoples Work. Also of the Circulating Library.
 - 5. That our Special Days be observed in every church if pos-

sible.

6. In conclusion we would like to ask that the same percentage be given the Board another year as heretofore. This to be in addition to the special assessments upon the Sunday Schools and C. E. Societies.

REPORT NO. 6.

Report Of The Church Extension Board

As President of your Church Extension Board we beg to submit the following report:

On December 30th, 1927 we met for the purpose of acting upon a proposition we had with reference to the disposition of the church lot at Junction City. We had been offered \$300.00 for the lot provided we could make a clear deed to the property. And after some discussion we decided to sell the property and appropriate the proceeds toward building a parsonage at Summerfield for the Junction City Circuit, upon condition that the circuit raised a specified amount and erect a creditable building. But after quite a bit of correspondence and several trips to Junction City we discovered that the lot had been so entangled that we could not have a deed in time to be of service for which the purchaser desired. The property there had been advertised for taxes and sold and one of the citizens of the town had bought it in and he did not propose to release claims without renumeration. We proceeded to secure a lawyer to clear up the matter and after investigation we employed Mr. Fields of Farmersville, La., to do the legal work. He had us secure an abstract and after passing upon it he advised that the property might be cleared up by going into court and setting up a claim that it had been unlegally sold for the taxes. But this attorney was so slow in rendering his decision that we made further investigation and found that he had been previously employed for the other party. We therefore, dismissed the matter for the present.

We had an offer to buy the timber on the forty acres of land. which the Board holds near Mt. Vernon Church on Mt. Vernon circuit. But the party would not make specific offer and we could not close the deal. We were informed that the timber would not amount to more than \$25.00 or \$30.00 and that an estimator would

cost at least \$10.00 to estimate it, so we dismissed this from our slate.

We had an offer for one of our old churches on Camden circuit, and would have sold the property, but we did not feel that we should sell it unless we could get to see it, and the cost of going and looking over the property would cost us nearly as much as it would bring so we did not dispose of that.

We had an inquiry about the property at Vandervoort, Ark., which was deeded to our Board by Bro. Dill, but the offer was not enough to consider, so we passed that up. But have since learned from our President that the property is not worth very much any way.

With reference to new ventures in other fields, we would not make any recommendations unless we had a fund sufficient to operate or carry on the work. We have a number of very important places where there are good prospects of locating and building Methodist Protestant Churches. But, brethren, with our present method of doing things, we need not undertake the venture.

It is a pity that five thousand Methodist Protestants cannot do a single thing for the advancement of their beloved Church in this great State of unlimited opportunity for our church. Our vision is too dim and narrow. With only \$1.00 per member we could build a good frame church and with \$2.00 per member per annum, we could build a creditable brick veneer, and with \$3.00 per member per annum we could erect a substantial brick church every year.

It seems to me that the wise thing to do if we are to advance our Church in this State, would be to appoint some one with the ability to carry on and place him at the head of the Church Extension Board with authority to go into our field and solicit funds from men who have means and begin to erect substantial buildings here and there in the State. We can never hope to grow till we go into our towns and cities. We are willing to raise funds for other enterprises outside of our own Conference why not undertake something worth while in our Conference. With the limited funds that come into the hands of your Board, and no other provision for increasing them, there is practically no use of continuing the Board.

REPORT NO. 16.

Committee on Official Relations

We, your committee on Official Relations, wish to make the following report:

This being a new committee requested by the last General Conference in which an investigation is to be made of the official acts of the ministers and preachers of the Annual Conference necessitated our examination of the pastors and evangelists' reports:

We find upon examination of the Pastors' reports to the Annual Conference that some have not carried out the plans as outlined by our last Annual Session of the conference, in putting forth special efforts to collect the Annual and General Conferences claims. Some pastors have collected in full all of the claims, some have collected pastors salary and left president's salary and claims in arrears. Some have collected very little if any claims at all.

Now, in order to make the Arkansas Annul Conference stronger and have a better system for doing business we recommend:

1. That all claims be placed in budget with Pastor's and

President's salaries, and that those collected all in full shall be placed in Honor A First Class.

- 2. Those paying assessments in part but distributing what is collected proportionately on a percentage basis, be classed as B. Good.
- 3. That those not complying with this arrangements be placed in C. Doubtful. And that both pastor and delegate from the said charge be asked to appear before the committee on Official Relations at our next annual conference and be asked to give a reason why this act has not been complied with. And that they shall be dealt with according to the provision of the Discipline.
- 4. And for a second offense in failing to try to collect the said claims if the pastor shall be found in fault he shall be made to appear before the Stationing Committee and may be left without work. And if the church or circuit be in fault, it shall be subject to the same rule.
