



#### REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS.

To the President and Members of the North Arkansas Conference:

We, your Board of Missions, desire to report that, while the earth trembles and many nations are being convulsed to their very centers by the awful cataclysm of war, the call of the Pagan World for the Gospel of our Lord was never more pathetic. As the treasuries of the Mission Boards of the belligerent nations are becoming depleted more and more as the world-war proceeds, the cry of the heathen becomes more insistent upon us. The fields in the Far East, Japan, Korea and China were never riper for the harvest. They want increased leadership and are looking to us for it. No generation has ever faced such an opportunity as that now before us. If we fail to enter these wide open doors, they may close against us.

The reports from all branches of our missionary work are very gratifying. There has been progress in the Mexican work in Texas, among the Indians, the Italians, the French and the Germans within our border. Great strides have been made in Cuba and Africa. We rejoice to report that conditions are improving in Mexico from the standpoint of our missionary work.

Under the very efficient leadership of Dr. John M. Moore, Home Missionary Secretary, the church has been making special effort to reach, within our own land, those places of religious destitution among the great masses in some sections in the city and the country.

Splendid reports have been received from some of our mission charges within the conference. Several have been placed on a self sustaining basis, but other new territory is being entered. Therefore, we recommend the same assessment as last year for Conference Missions, \$9,384 00. Our assessments fixed by the general board are for foreign missions, \$13,800.00, for home missions, \$4,416.00. All three of these items combined give us only the paltry sum of 46 cents a member. It is exceedingly urgent that we raise the missionary assessments early in the year.

# REPORT ON BOOKS AND PERIODICALS. Report No. 2.

DEAR BRETHREN—From its inception Methodism has continually regarded the press as the companion factor of the pulpit, in carrying her message to a waiting world. The founder of Methodism went about with good literature in hand and saddle-pocket, seeking to provide, and create a love for such reading matter as was of permanent and abiding influence for Christ. The spoken word is often received "with joy," but not infrequently is soon forgotten, at least in part. Good books, tracts and periodicals may be made perennial in their presence and preachments.

In these last days when we are surfeited with literature of every description, we suffer incalculable loss as a church if we do not place great emphasis on Christian literature. Not infrequently we find that the Bible is buried beneath an avalanche of market reports and worldly literature, which stifles and often cunningly undermines the fundamental teachings of Jesus Christ. Furthermore, certain damaging and definitely heretical literature has been and is now being widely distributed by denominations and sects that are the more pernicious in influence, because these societies profess to be Christian. We submit that Methodism must meet this dread enemy on her own ground. The spreading abroad of the literature of any cause generally marks the unfolding and enlarging of the cause advocated. It is not sufficient for us to denounce and oppose the confessedly harmful, we must recommend, and as far as possible, be instrumental in providing good books, tracts, papers, etc., that are truly Christian in spirit and teaching. As shepherds of the flock of Christ, we watch over this phase of our trust, "as they that shall give account."

We note with gladness the increasing success of the Publishing House, and urgently request both preachers and people to patronize our own institution in the purchase of all literature,

including Sunday school supplies. The Nashville Christian Advocate, the Missionary Voice, our own Sunday school literature and the Western Methodist should be in every home. The Epworth Era should be in every home where there are young people. The Methodist Review, with her triumphant past, promises, if possible, even greater things under its new editor, to both preachers and laymen.

We commend most joyfully our conference organ, the Western Methodist, which under the able editorship of Dr. A. C. Millar, is not only superior to its former high standards, but stands front rank among the conference organs of Southern Methodism. We trust that it may soon be owned by Arkansas Methodism. We recommend the election of F. S. H. Johnston, J. K. Farris and J. M. Williams as Western Methodist Commissioners.

## REPORT OF BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION.

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN—Your Board of Church Extension in presenting this Report for your consideration, realizing fully the almost supreme importance of the charge committed to it, would be recreant to its high trust did it fail to use this opportunity to forcefully stress the need of increased contributions to this cause.

For the present year our Conference has only paid 53 per cent of the assessment. With 156 churchless churches, surely there is a loud call for larger liberality on the part of our membership. The Apostle says "How shall they hear without a preacher?" We may ask "How shall they preach without a place in which to preach?" The right arm of missionary work is Church Extension, and only in so far as it is sustained, can the results of missionary work be conserved. With a determination to create a conscience on this subject, it is the intention of the board not only to represent the work before the several District Conferences, asking the presiding elders to set aside a special hour for its discussion, but also, by utilizing members of the board, inaugurate a campaign in the pastoral charges as opportunity may be afforded

We would also call attention to the fact, as revealed in our Conference Minutes, that in certain instances there seems to be a discrimination against this claim. We believe that where a preacher fails to raise assessments in full, the only equitable thing to do is to make a pro rata distribution of the amount raised.

From the Hand Book of Church Extension, which is a unique and attractive publication, we gather many facts which would be profitable for the church at large to become acquainted with. The literature sent out on request, "without money, and without price," by the Parent Board, should be sown broadcast among our membership. Nothing would be more helpful than the spreading of intelligence of what is needed and what is doing in this sphere of Christian endeavor.

The General Board and Conference Loan Fund should not be overlooked. Oftentimes a loan to a needy church or parsonage project is more helpful than a donation, as it helps people to help themselves, tides over difficult situations, and when repaid is ready to start out on a new mission of usefulness. Let our ministers be diligent in counselling our people to avail themselves of this means of doing perpetual good in the upbuilding of our Zion, by their generous gifts to this interest.

Dr. W. F. McMurry, our General Secretary, sends us cheering notes of progress, the last year being the best so far, in the history of Church Extension. We suggest that as a Conference we renew our pledge to further, so far as we are able, the plans which he outlines, while we rejoice with him in what has been already accomplished in this important work for Christ and the church.

We nominate J. M. Hughey as delegate, and W. F. Walker as alternate, to attend the meeting of representatives of conference boards at Louisville, Ky., next May.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION .-- NO. 1.

To the Bishop and Members of the North Arkansas Conference:

DEAR BRETHREN—The Board of Education submits the following report:

#### HENDRIX COLLEGE.

The report of the president contains many encouraging things in regard to the condition of the affairs of Hendrix College. During the year substantial repairs have been made upon the buildings of the college, putting these in excellent condition. In spite of several adverse influences, the enrollment this year will be the largest in the history of the college. Already as many students have been enrolled as were enrolled all of last year. The student body is made up of as fine young men and as fine young women as are to be found anywhere. Among those enrolled are thirty ministerial students and thirty-one children of ministers. Both students and faculty are doing a class of work that is highly satisfactory and is equal in quality to that done by any institution in the South.

But notwithstanding all of these encouraging features of the college's work, for all of which we are very grateful, there are

some pressing needs which must be met by Arkansas Methodism, if Hendrix College is to take the highest rank among institutions of learning and to render the largest service that a church school is capable of rendering. There must be better physical equipment, adequate provision for the education of young men who feel called to preach but are not able to prepare themselves for their life's work, endowment for a department of Bible and Religious Education, larger salaries by which the most experienced faculty may be commanded, and an endowment sufficiently large to ensure the future of the institution.

We make the following recommendations:

- 1. That Presiding Elders and Examining Committees insist upon young men securing a college education before they begin the regular work of the ministry.
- 2. That we begin at once to build up a loan fund which shall be used in helping needy young men who feel called to preach in securing proper equipment for their work.
- 3. That, pending the raising of this loan fund, churches and Sunday schools be urged to undertake the education of these young men.
- 4. That a College Day program be held at least quarterly in all of our Sunday schools, Epworth Leagues, or young people's missionary societies and that a voluntary offering be taken on these days which shall be used to endow a chair of Bible and Religious Education in Hendrix College.
- 5. That Dr. James Thomas be released from pastoral duties that he may devote his entire time to the leadership of the campaign for the \$400,000 endowment for Hendrix College.
- 6. That the following be elected Trustees of Hendrix College for the term indicated, the same having been nominated by the Board:

#### THE SUMMER SCHOOL.

The second Summer School for Ministers which was held at Hendrix College last June was a success in every respect. Perhaps no investment which the church is making is productive of more good than this. Over one hundred and twenty-five ministers were in attendance, coming from all parts of the state. Not only were the lectures beneficial in inspiring the ministers and in broadening their vision, but the work done by the undergraduates in the course of study proved especially helpful. It is the plan of those who have the school in charge to make next summer's ses-

sion even more successful than either of the former sessions have been. Already they are gathering material for the next program, and it is their purpose to secure the attendance of every Methodist preacher in Arkansas.

The Board of Education makes the following recommenda-

- 1. That undergraduates take one half of their work in the Correspondence School and the other half in the Summer School.
- 2. That an assessment of \$500 be placed upon the Conference for the support of the Summer School.

#### GALLOWAY COLLEGE.

The work of Galloway College for the last year has been marked by pronounced success. This college has suffered along with all other colleges as a result of the disturbed conditions at home and abroad, and yet, in spite of these, it has an attendance that is taxing the capacity of the buildings. The Freshman class this year is the largest in the history of the school, although the curriculum was raised last year to the fourteen unit standard. Both departments of the college have been advanced to hour periods of recitation, and the character of work that is now being done is reported to be as good as that which is done in any institution. The religious developments of the students is one of the most gratifying things in connection with the progress of the college. In the Y. M. C. A., of which all the young ladies and teachers are members, through the instruction given on the Bible and in Sunday school work, and by means of the various activities of the school, the students are being fitted for practical Christian service.

We would lay upon your hearts the supreme importance of making this institution one of the strongest in all the South. Here are being trained the women who are going some day to type the womanhood of Arkansas. Let us look well to it that these young women have thrown about them every influence that will tend to develop them into the highest type of Christian women. With the sane, intellectual, broad-visioned and consecrated leadership which the college now has, we may, with the proper investment of our prayers and means, make this institution second to none in its influence upon the womanhood of Southern Methodism.

We make the following recommendations for the college:

1. That a state-wide educational campaign be undertaken which shall look toward placing Galloway College upon such a financial basis as will enable her to take the rank of which she is so worthy.

- 2. That Rev. W. C. Watson be appointed as Commissioner of Education for the College.
- 3. That Rev. F. S. H. Johnston and F. M. Daniel be appointed trustees to succeed themselves, and that Rev. C. M. Reves be appointed to fill out the unexpired term of Rev. L. M. Broyles, who has resigned.
- 4. That our pastors be urged to do all within their power to get our Methodist girls to attend Galloway College.

#### SLOAN-HENDRIX ACADEMY.

We heartily commend the excellent work that is being done by Sloan-Hendrix Academy under the direction of Prof. J. C. Eaton. This school is making itself felt over a large section of the North Arkansas Conference, and the character of the work that it is doing furnishes sufficient justification of the wisdom of the action of the General Board of Education in making a generous appropriation for the support of the school. We recommend this institution as being worthy of a large patronage from the section in which it is located.

We respectfully recommend:

- 1. That the General Board of Education continue to make an appropriation of \$1,000 a year for the support of Sloan-Hendrix Academy.
- 2. That the North Arkansas Conference appropriate \$500 for the support of the institution.

#### GENERAL SECRETARY'S REPORT.

We heartily endorse the views of our General Secretary on educational matters and we approve his plans which look toward increasing the efficiency of our ministry. In connection with his work we make the following recommendations:

- 1. That our conference assessment be divided proportionately by the preachers.
- 2. That for each of our colleges, Galloway and Hendrix, the assessment be increased \$500 over last year's assessment.
- 3. That the expenses of the Conference Secretary of Education be paid out of the Conference assessment for education.
- 4. That J. P. Womack be appointed a committee of one to work out a plan by which credit may be given by the public schools for work done in the Sunday schools.
- 5. That the fifth Sunday in January be adopted as a day of prayer for our educational institutions.

#### MINISTERIAL SUPPLY AND TRAINING.

We appreciate the faithful work of our Department of Ministerial Supply and Training and we are in full sympathy with the views of the Secretary of this Department, which, if worked out, will furnish the church a better trained and equipped ministerial leadership.

In its desire to have the North Arkansas Conference cooperate with the Secretary of Ministerial Supply and Training in its work, the Conference Board of Education makes the following recommendations:

- 1. That all undergraduates be urged to take the course of study by correspondence.
- 2. That we pay the expenses of undergraduates taking the correspondence course, where, in the opinion of their Presiding Elder, such undergraduates are not able to pay the fee.
- 3. That an assessment equal to that made for the expenses of delegates to the General Conference be made two years in each quadrennium for the purpose of creating a loan fund to be used in the education of ministerial students.
- 4. That it is the sense of this Board that provision be made through our Correspondence School for the training of our preachers' wives, especially of the undergraduates. We urge the General Board to take this matter up at the earliest date possible.

#### REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL COMMISSION.

We express our thanks to the Educational Commission of the General Conference for their efforts in behalf of the interest of education throughout the connection, and we express the hope that they will be able to carry forward their plans to give the church two great universities, one east and one west of the Mississippi River, which shall meet the educational needs of Southern Methodism.

#### SOUTHERN METHODIST UNIVERSITY.

Your Board of Education has heard with pleasure Dr. Caspar S. Wright, representing Southern Methodist University To the proposition brought by him that this conference ratify a proposed charter of Southern Methodist University and elect one trustee to said institution, we have given careful and prayerful consideration. We present our recommendations thereon:

a. That we are in hearty sympathy with the policy of the General Conference and of the Commission to maintain two coordinate connectional universities, one east and the other west of the Mississippi river.

- b. That we endorse the action of the commission in selecting Southern Methodist University for the connectional institution and to serve the territory west of the Mississippi river, and that we shall gladly direct all genuine university patronage within our bounds to that institution.
- c. That we do not see our way clear to ratify the proposed charter of Southern Methodist University, nor to elect one trustee of said institution, because;

1st, the proposed charter seems to us to be an attempt to make the Southern Methodist University a local conference institution and a connectional university at one and the same time. Some trustees represent only conferences; three trustees alone, the general church. Whereas, in a truly connectional institution, every trustee represents the whole church. Such a plan promises to breed confusion. Our Methodist institutions are either local or connectional; they cannot be both. There is no safe middle ground. We note with pleasure that the charter of Emory University relates that institution alike to all the conferences so that it is owned and controlled entirely and directly by the General Conference. Such in our judgment should be the case with Southern Methodist University.

2. The proposed charter introduces a dangerous principle. By it our conference would be compelled to become a patronizing conference, independent of what it may wish in the premises.

#### GENERAL RECOMMENDATIONS.

The Board makes the following recommendations:

- 1. That Rev. W. T. Thompson be appointed Conference Secretary of Education.
- 2. That W. B. Hubbell be appointed Business Manager for Hendrix College.
- 3. That O. D. Langston and J. Q. Schisler be appointed students in Emory University; that J. W. Moore be appointed student in Hendrix College, and that A. L. Platt be appointed student in Southern Training School.
- 4. That Rev. W. L Oliver be elected Alumni Trustee of Hendrix College for a term of six years.
- 5. That the Trustees of Galloway College take steps as soon as possible toward establishing a Chair of Religious Education and Sunday School Pedagogy, and the creation of a Sustentation Loan Fund for worthy girls who desire to take a course in Galloway College. Also that steps be taken to establish a Business College Department in connection with the college.

#### REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

To the Bishop and Members of the North Arkansas Conference:

DEAR BRETHREN—The reports this year show the following: Number of Sunday schools, 542; officers and teachers, 4,350; scholars, 51,028; Wesley Bible classes, 141; Sunday school pupils joining the church, 2,776; amount raised for missions: (1) specials, \$914.00; (2) on assessment, \$4,000.00; amount of Children's Day Fund, \$707.12; for Sunday school supplies, \$16,252.00; for other projects, \$5,173.00; grand total, \$26,912.00. These reports are encouraging, showing progress in many ways over last year.

The annual report of our General Sunday School Board in our hands shows an increase in our Sunday school periodicals. This report sets forth the plans of the General Board with which we are happy to co-operate, both in the matter of district organization and also in the matter of promoting Sunday school Institute work. We had with us Judge A. L. Hutchins of Augusta,

Ark., a member of the General Board, and also Mr. A. L. Dietrch, Divisional Field Secretary for the Gulf Division, which division includes our annual Conference. Their services in counsel with the Board as well as in public addresses were exceedingly helpful.

We wish to express our high appreciation of the faithful and valuable work of our Field Secretary, Rev. W. A. Lindsey, during the year. We most heartily recommend his re-appointment to this work for the coming year, commending him to all our pastors and people.

We urge the importance of Children's Day. To fail to observe it is to fail to do what the Discipline directs to be done, and such failure cuts off the only regular source of the Board's finances. The Board will furnish programs for Children's Day for all Sunday schools, provided application be made by the pastor to the Treasurer of this Board and provided further, that such schools shall take an offering for Children's Day Fund and send same to C. W. Lester, Treasurer of the Board.

We wish to urge that all our schools move up to the Standard of Efficiency as rapidly as possible; that particular efforts be made to get men and women into the Wesley Bible classes; that, inasmuch as the General Board and the General Board of Missions have selected China as the field for our Sunday school mission specials, we co-operate with them by thus directing our specials for missions during the year.

We recommend: (1) The re-appointment of Rev. W. A. Lindsey as Sunday School Field Secretary of the North Arkansas Conference; (2) that in each charge where Children's Day is not observed the pastor shall collect an amount equal to one per cent of his salary and send it in on Children's Day Fund; (3) that an assessment of \$1,800.00 be made upon the Sunday schools of the Conference for the support of the Field Secretary, which amount shall be distributed to the districts, \$200.00 to each district, the same to be apportioned to the Sunday schools of each district as the Presiding Elder and preachers of each shall deem equitable, said assessment not to be included in the general budget of conference claims.

With due appreciation for all the benefits conferred upon us through his divine institution, let us give diligence to make it effective throughout the world.

## REPORT OF ORPHANAGE BOARD.

We beg leave to submit the following report:

The work of the past year has been very gratifying, both as to its character and extent. We had no deaths and very little serious sickness.

For several years there has been a gradual but steady growth in the number of children cared for, and this year finds a little increase over last. At the close of the fiscal year, September 30, 1914, we had in the orphanage, 34 children. Twenty-three were admitted and 26 placed in homes during the year, leaving in the home, October 1, 1915, 31 children. We have placed all told 227.

If we had kept them all in the orphanage, under the old orphans' home plan, we would now have 258.

Each year confirms the wisdom of placing children when proper homes can be found for them.

Bro. Thornburg received, during the year, special contributions to the amount of \$1,166.45, which was spent on the building and sewerage connection. He has raised a total of \$35,001.81, of which approximately \$32,000.00 has been expended on the building and grounds and the remainder for furnishings.

A E. Holloway was elected a trustee to fill a vacancy.

We commend the orphanage to the love and care of our people and urge them to support our own institution instead of an outside institution.

Our pastors should look after the orphan children in their charges and report same to Bro. Thornburg at Little Rock, also apply to him for children when good Christian homes are open to receive orphan children.

We urge early and full collections for next year. Also that our orphans be remembered on Christmas and Thanksgiving occasions. It is a shame to put off old worn-out clothing on our orphans, as some have done.

We received an assessment of \$2,500.00 to be apportioned as follows: (See table of assessments.)

#### REPORT OF HOSPITAL COMMITTEE.

To the President and Members of the North Arkansas Conference:

DEAR FATHERS AND BRETHREN—We your committee beg to submit the following report:

We feel that Arkansas Methodism cannot afford to delay longer the prosecution of the work of building a hospital. One year ago we voted to join in a movement to raise \$30,000. But we did not get behind the movement with our usual zeal, and instead of raising \$30,000, we turned in a scant \$4,000.

Not only did we not succeed in money raising, our failure has hurt the cause in another way. Much of the money secured for the hospital from private sources does not become available until we have raised our part—until the hospital is in actual operation. Every day we delay means a loss of enthusiasm, a diminishing subscription list, and a longer postponement of the realization of our plans.

We therefore submit the following recommendations:

- 1. That we get behind this movement and make an honest effort to raise our part of the fund pledged.
- 2. That we observe the fourth Sunday in January as Hospital Day, at which time we shall present the claim of the hospital cause and receive subscriptions therefor.

3. That the following be named as trustees of the hospital: J. K. Farris, J. R. Nelson, Geo. Lamb, Ed Hamilton and T. J. Boston.

## REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

To the Bishop and Members of the North Arkansas Conference:

DEAR BRETHREN—In their report, your committee wishes to say that the temperance forces of our great country have wrought long and well against the liquor traffic and its attendant evils.

The magnitude of the victories won by these temperance forces is emphasized by the fact that only a few decades ago these forces comprised only a band of devout women, a few fearless preachers and wise laymen. But now practically all the preachers of all the evangelical churches, and all the church papers, and a majority of the secular papers of the country are out-spoken against the liquor traffic as being evil and intrinsically evil in all its ways. And as a result, we have a mighty army of prohibition workers in the Woman's Christian Temperance Union and the Anti-Saloon League of the Republic and the states. And now we can rejoice that "Sixty million of the people of the United States live under prohibition and that eighty per cent of its territory is free from the legalized liquor traffic; that a majority of the members of the Lower House of Congress voted in favor of submitting a prohibitary amendment to the several states, and that all the members of Congress from Arkansas voted for it."

We especially rejoice at the signal victories won in our own state of Arkansas. We first gained local option prohibition by the township, then local option by the county. These were great victories for the times, but under the operations of the local option laws, we were kept under a continued confusion of political contests, and worried by the political schemes and trickery of evil and liquor politicians. But now we have a state-wide prohibition law which takes effect the first day of January, 1916.

Now the great work for us Christian and temperance people, is to make this law both permanent and effective. We should be prayerfully careful as to whom we elect to certain offices, and we

should stand by the Anti-Saloon League with our influence, and with our money, if need be, in the operation of its detective agency.

# REPORT OF BIBLE CAUSE.

To the President and Members of the North Arkansas Conference: We submit the following report:

The American Bible Society is pleased herewith to greet you with its report for the ninety-ninth year of service and to make an announcement of its coming centennial.

The past year was the best in the history of the society—the total circulation of scriptures being nearly six and a half million volumes. The demand was far greater than the supply, or rather greater than the funds to carry on the work.

The Southwestern agency, which includes the North Arkansas Conference, reports an advance in its work. The distribution of scriptures was 93,314 volumes, an advance of more than three thousand volumes. The great need for work here in the home land is evident from the number of Bibleless homes found by the twenty colportures employed. Out of 65,000 homes visited more than 16,000 had no Bible. Over 15,000 volumes were donated.

Great is the need of this society for money to carry on its work, and we rejoice in the generous provision that the General Conference has made for the support of this cause. As indicated at the beginning of this report, it is desired in a suitable manner to celebrate the completion of one hundred years of the society's service. It is pleasing to note the universal co-operation of Protestantism in planning for the great event. The date is the month of May, 1916, and we earnestly recommend that May 7th, or as near that time as is practicable, be observed as Bible Day and that all our pastors and laymen arrange for special sermons or lectures on the Bible and emphasize the work that is being done by the American Bible Society.

The spirit of the Lord was so powerful that more than 23 of our young people gave themselves for definite service, making more than fifty who have given themselves in the past two years.

The League is one of the greatest organizations for the young people of the church. It is very necessary for the training of the young life of the church.

We especially commend the Epworth Era to all the members of the League, and urge them to subscribe for and read it; also, we commend the Western Methodist, and express our gratitude to its editor for the space in its pages.

The Epworth League Anniversary Day, ordered by the General Conference (the second Sunday in May) not having been fully observed in our conference, we again call attention to it, and

urge that our pastors and Epworth League Presidents make note of it.

After due consideration, we believe that it is necessary for the Epworth Leagues to have an annual assembly, which will be a training school for work and leadership among our young

people.

Therefore, we recommend that since Hendrix College has invited and proffered us the use of the campus and buildings, that such an assembly be held at Hendrix College, Conway, Ark., immediately after the close of the Rural Conference, such action not to interfere with the Newport Conference of this year, so that the Leaguers may get the benefit of the Rural Conference if they desire. The Epworth League Board also recommend that the following commission be appointed, viz: Rev. J. J. Galloway, Rev. F. E. Dobson and Rev. H. C. Hoy, said commission to be authorized to co-operate at once with Epworth League Conference officers for the arrangement of a program for such an assembly.

We respectfully ask that the Little Rock Conference make similar recommendations, and that their Epworth League Board, and conference officers co-operate with these of our own, in order to make the assembly state wide.

Christians are stewards of God, and will be held to give a strict account for all the money and other property given under their control; that at least one tenth of all their increase belongs to the Lord. For he has truly spoken through his servant Malachi, "Ye have robbed me in tithes and offerings."

We also recommend that our preachers, both from the pulpit, and in their pastoral work among the people, insist on the importance of establishing a family altar in every home.

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM.

We also recommend that there be a simultaneous campaign in evangelism, beginning the first of March, 1916, and continuing till Easter; that the Presiding Elders meet with the Committee on Evangelism January 25, 1916, at First church, Argenta, to plan ways and means for conducting this campaign.

That we respectfully ask the Little Rock Conference to join with us in this campaign that it may be general throughout the

state.

# WESTERN METHODIST COMMISSION. REPORT NO. 1.

To the North Arkansas Conference Assembled at Conway, Arkansas, November 23rd.

DEAR BRETHREN—Your Commission on the Western Methodist appointed by the last Annual Conference begs leave to submit its report as follows:

1st. This Commission recommends to the North Arkansas and the Little Rock Conferences that the conditional contract, made by the Commission with the owners of the Western Methodist, be made absolute; said contract being in substance as follows:

That the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences buy the Western Methodist for the church, assuming therefor certain indebtednesses to be named, to the amount of \$8,000, including interest, and taking over for the church everything pertaining to the paper as well as all stock owned by Dr. A. C. Millar, W. B. Hays, Frank Barrett and L. F. Blankenship in the capital stock company.

#### Exhibit A.

2nd. THAT this Commission be continued with new members or the same members re-elected by the Conference.

3rd. THAT the Commission be authorized to conclude the trade with all its details and all matters pertaining thereto directly and indirectly.

4th. THAT the Commission be authorized to select the Ed-

itor. If he be a member of either the North Arkansas or the Little Rock Conferences his election shall be approved by the Conference to which he belongs and the presiding bishop.

5th. THAT the Commission shall have authority to fill any vacancy in the editorship during the interim of the conferences.

6th. The Commission shall be authorized upon a vote of twothirds of the members thereof to remove the Editor, if, in their judgment, there is sufficient cause; and the Commission may fill the vacancy thereby created until the regular time of the election of an Editor.

7th. The Commission shall be authorized to employ a Business Manager whenever in their judgment it shall become necessary and they shall be authorized to discharge any such Manager for any cause which may appear to them sufficient.

8th. The North Arkansas and the Little Rock Conferences each shall assume one-half each of the eight thousand dollars indebtedness, which shall be paid in two years. Two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) a year for two years shall be assessed upon the charges of each Conference for the payment of said debt to be apportioned by the Joint Board upon the basis of the assessment for missions, which assessment shall be preferred money.

9th. The Commission shall have general control and management of the paper without embarrassing the Editor and Manager in the detailed work of their departments.

10th. THAT Dr. A. C. Millar be elected Editor for the ensuing year, provided the Conference enter into this agreement.

11th. THAT as soon as it can be legally done, the name of the Western Methodist be changed to the ARKANSAS METH-ODIST.

# **Memoirs**

#### REV. W. T. LOCKE.

The Rev. W. T. Locke, son of the Rev. H. C. and Pauline Locke, was born in Fayette County, Tennessee, December 25, 1850; was converted and joined the M. E. Church, South, in 1862; was licensed to preach at Bethel, his home church, Springdale Circuit, Memphis District, 1875. By the same Quarterly Conference he was recommended for admission on trial in the Memphis Conference, which met one week later at Paducah, Ky. He was received and assigned to Shelby Mission. In 1876 Shelby Mission was consolidated with Macon Circuit, and he went forth joyously as junior preacher the remainder of the year with Thos. L. Boswell as preacher in charge. He served some important charges while he was in Tennessee. In 1889 he answered the bishop's call for volunteer preachers for Arkansas. Since that time he had gone to every charge to which he had been assigned without murmur or complaint until he could go in and out no more in his loved employ. His was a successful ministry, numbers being brought to Christ thereby. He quietly fell asleep at his home in Batesville, Ark., June 29, 1915. He is not lost, but only gone before. We confidently expect to see him again where sickness, sorrow, pain and death are felt and feared no F. M. SMITH. more.

# REV. JOHN M'KELVEY.

Rev. John McKelvey, son of J. K. P. and Sister F. A. McKelvey, was born in West Tennessee, August 1, 1869, came to Arkansas with his parents when a small boy, and settled in Greene county, where he grew to manhood, worked on the farm, and when grown occasionally taught school.

Reared in a good Christian home, Brother McKelvey was converted in early life and at once joined the Methodist church, in

which he lived a faithful and loyal member until he went away to his home above, July 26, 1915, at 8:30 p. m.

It was his desire, so expressed to his father, to die at his post. This he was permitted to do. On Sunday, July 25, he started to his appointment in the old Methodist style-horseback. Cotter was the charge he was serving. On his way, riding over the rocks, his horse stumbled and fell, throwing him over his head and hurting an old wound which he sustained several years ago, when his horse threw him on the steel horn of his saddle. He got up, felt that his hurt was not serious, went on to his appointment, and was possibly half through his sermon when he had to sit down, and in that posture he finished his discourse, was carried home, grew worse until the next day at 8:30 p. m., when he passed away. All that medical aid, willing hands and loving hearts could do was done for him, but could not save his life. Before becoming unconscious he gave directions about his funeral and burial. The funeral services were held in First Church, Paragould, July 29, conducted by the writer, assisted by Rev. C. M. Reves and A. C. Griffin.

#### REV. JOHN C. SHIPP.

Rev. John C. Shipp was born in Holmes County, Mississippi, January 15, 1839; died January 15, 1915, at Belleville, Ark. Brother Shipp moved with his parents from Mississippi to West Tennessee in 1845, and there was reared to manhood. He professed faith in Christ and joined the M. E. Church, South, in his nineteenth year. He became a Confederate soldier in August, 1861, and served his country until the end of the unhappy conflict. He was licensed to preach May 20, 1869, by Rev. W. H. Lee, presiding elder of the Jackson District, Memphis Conference. He was ordained deacon by Bishop Wightman in 1872, at Somerville, Tenn., and was ordained elder by Bishop Keener in 1876. He joined the Arkansas Conference in 1889 at Conway, and was given superannuate relation at the conference in 1912. His diary shows that 2,100 have confessed Christ under his ministry. He was a strong and forceful preacher, never moved by any "wind of doctrine," but ever contending earnestly for the fundamentals of our holy religion. No man could be more helpful to his pastor. He was always present, if possible, at all the services of the church, especially the preaching service and prayer meeting. Many will never forget some occasions when Brother Shipp led the congregation in prayer. He was a man of prayer. This good man has passed to his reward, but there are many who call him blessed. The end came peacefully; not a struggle. Death had lost its sting.

# REV. T. B. WILLIAMSON.

Rev. T. B. Williamson was born near Clarksville, Tenn., January 3, 1844. He moved with his parents to Missouri, near Windsor, where his father died. Brother Williamson professed saving faith in Christ in 1866, was licensed to preach in the Western Conference in Kansas, August 18, 1873. He came to Arkansas in 1874, and was admitted into the White River Annual Conference at Helena, Ark., December, 1885, elected traveling deacon at Paragould, December, 1888, and having been ordained local deacon by Bishop H. N. McTyeire at Beebe, 1881, he was ordained elder at Helena, December 13, 1885, by Bishop J. C. Granberry. He departed this life from his home near Paragould at 5:30 p. m., May 6, 1915.

Brother Williamson had been very feeble for over a year. He gave me the data in this sketch before our last annual conference, to be used when the time came. Feeling then that he would not be able to attend conference, he said: "Tell the brethren I was ready when the time came." So he was. He was a man of strong faith in God and true and loyal devotion to his church. He loved the church. He was a man of very strong convictions and undaunted courage, and had no hesitancy in positively standing for the right as he understood it. His devotion to his family was beautiful. The testimony of a friend was, "The best man in his family I ever knew." The Lord comfort the bereaved family.

#### REV. G. W. EVANS.

The man whose name appears above was one of the oldest members of what is now the North Arkansas Conference. He was born April 28, 1830, in the Dominion of Canada. In 1852 he moved to Louisiana, and one year later was licensed to preach in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and joined the Louisiana Conference. In 1860 he came to Arkansas, and in 1864 joined the Ouachita Conference, and from that time until he died, in Booneville, Ark., December 14, 1914, he had been a member of one of the conferences in this state, except two years which he spent in the Western Conference. Forty-two years ago, at Bentonville, he became a member of the Arkansas Conference. During all these years among us he has lived as well as preached the gospel of our risen Lord. His active ministry was filled with sacrifices and hardships that we of a later day know little about. During most of his active life his horse, saddle bags, Bible and hymn book were his chief equipment. Despite all this, Brother Evans was a man He knew something about nearly remarkably well informed everything. For many years he was a constant reader and kept in close touch both with political and religious affairs. This is especially true as to matters pertaining to his own church. Above all, he was a close student of the Bible. One who was perhaps better acquainted with him than any other said of him: "He was a constant student of the Bible and of all the books that would help him understand it. He often bought books when he needed the money with which to buy bread. His library was carefully selected and he was acquainted with the contents of its principal volumes." But after all, it was his saintly life, the faithfulness with which he followed in the steps of the Master, the unyielding devotion to high ideals and the high and holy purpose that filled his life-these sacred elements combined in the heart and brain of this good man-have served to mark him out as a man of distinction among us. His faith in God was mighty and unswerving. He had no doubt as to the final triumph of God's kingdom on earth. His life was pure and clear and honest as the love of truth, honor and chastity could make it. One who was very close to him said: "Those who were nearest to him not only never knew him to speak falsely, but never knew him to equivocate or dissemble. No human being ever heard him speak an unchaste word nor laugh at an unclean jest." In the town of Booneville, where he lived for many years, he had, as completely as any man could have, the absolute confidence of all the people. He died in great peace, breathing out blessings upon all who were near him. A few minutes before he passed away, he said to his pastor: "God bless you, dear brother, in your ministry. And all my brethren, God bless them all; they have always been good and kind to me." Thus passed away one of God's noblemen. "Servant of God, well done. Rest from thy loved employ."
