FIRST DAY.

Clarksville, Arkansas, November 20, 1918.

The Fifth Session of the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, met in the Methodist Church at Clarksville, Arkansas, November 20, 1918, Bishop E. D. Mouzon presiding.

The Secretary read a memorial from the Clarksville Missionary Society to the Conference. On motion of J. A. Anderson, action was deferred until the vote on constitutional questions handed down by the General Conference should be taken.

The Conference fixed 10 o'clock Friday as order of the day for considering these constitutional questions.

The Secretary read communications from F. M. Daniel, Secretary of the last Conference, and Z. T. Bennett and W. B. Johnsey, Superannuates.

The Missionary Centenary was made the special order of the day for ten o'clock Thursday.

Judge Hugh Basham and Hon. Jesse Reynolds were introduced and welcomed the members of the Conference to Clarksville, and the Bishop made a fitting response.

On motion of J. A. Anderson, the District Lay Leaders were instructed by the Conference to consider the matter of Conference Lay Leader and make a nomination.

The following visitors were introduced to the Conference: C. G. Houndshell, Educational Secretary of the Board of Missions, and Chairman of the Conference Centenary Team; John C. Hawk, Missionary to China; Hon. Minor Wallace, of the Anti-Saloon League of America; Dr. A. C. Millar, Editor of the Arkansas Methodist; Mr. G. L. McNish, of the Publishing House, and Dr. James Thomas, of the Little Rock Conference.

Dr. A. C. Millar made announcements concerning the Methodist, Dr. Thomas made a brief statement concerning the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage, and Mr. McNish made announcements concerning the Publishing House at Nashville.

Question 6 was called. Who are received by transfer from other conferences?

The Committee on Public Worship announced that J. B. Andrews would preach at 3 p. m., and that Rev. C. G. Hounshell would deliver the Centenary Address at the evening hour, to be followed by the Centenary pictures.

After various other announcements, the Conference adjourned with the Doxology and the benediction was pronounced by Dr. A. C. Millar.

SECOND DAY.

Clarksville, Arkansas, November 21, 1918.

The Conference met at 8:30 a.m., Bishop Mouzon presiding.

After singing Hymn No. 334, Rev. D. L. Coale led in prayer, and the Bishop read Isaiah 42:1-4, and addressed the members of the Conference on the "Equipment, the Method and the Victory of the Prophet."

Clay; A. P. Jones, an Alternate Delegate from the Fort Smith District was seated in place of W. E. Williams; Alvis L. Malone, an Alternate Delegate from the Jonesboro District was seated in the place of E. D. Ferguson.

14 MINUTES NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

On motion of Dr. J. A. Anderson, a committee consisting of William Sherman, J. B. Stevenson, and F. S. H. Johnston, was elected to consider the matter of Conference Treasurer, and make nomination.

The following visitors were introduced to the Conference:

On motion of Dr. F. S. H. Johnston the Conference voted to assemble at 3 p. m. this afternoon in regular session for the continuation of the Centenary program, as provided for by the General Conference.

Question 1 was called. Who are admitted on trial?

Troy C. Roddy, recommended by the Batesville District, and William J. Jordan, recommended by the Fayetteville District, passed an approved examination on the Course of Study, but not having the Disciplinary requirements of an English education, were, upon recommendation of the Committee on Admissions and by a two-thirds vote of the Conference, admitted on trial into the traveling connection.

Hiram Allen Tucker was recommended by the Booneville District, passed an approved examination on the Course of Study, but could not meet the disciplinary requirements of an English education. The Bishop suggested that a loan fund for the help of worthy students in Hendrix College be started, and took subscriptions amounting to \$2,500. On motion of Dr. J. A. Anderson, it was voted that this fund should be known as the North Arkansas Conference Loan Fund with the instruction to the Treasurer of Hendrix College that \$300 from this fund should be loaned to Brother Tucker.

CENTENARY PROGRAM.

The special order of the day having arrived, Bishop Mouzon opened the Centenary program by a brief address, and introduced Rev. C. G. Hounshell, who spoke on the subject of Intercession.

- Rev. J. C. Hawk, Missionary to China, addressed the Conference on China.
- Dr. F. S. H. Johnston spoke on the subject: "The Centenary: What it will mean to the Conference."
- Dr. A. L. Dietrich spoke in the interest of the part that the Sunday School would take in the Centenary Movement.

Bishop Mouzon delivered a very informing address on Latin America.

ANNOUNCEMENTS

The Committee on Public Worship announced that the Educational Anniversary would be held tonight, at which time Bishop Mouzon would address the Conference on Christian Education, and that Dr. J. H. Reynolds, President of Hendrix College, and Mr. J. M. Williams, President of Galloway College, would speak.

After various announcements the Conference adjourned with the singing of the Doxology, and the benediction was pronounced by W. F. Evans.

SECOND DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

Clarksville, Arkansas, November 21, 1918.

The Conference re-convened at 3 p. m., Dr. F. S. H. Johnston presiding, by appointment of the Bishop.

Dr. A. F. Ward, of the South Georgia Conference, led the devotional service.

CENTENARY PROGRAM-Continued.

Dr. A. C. Millar addressed the Conference on "Stewardship."

Rev. C. G. Hounshell and H. E. Wheeler explained the details of the Centenary work.

On motion of J. F. Glover the Conference voted to take \$1,000,000 as its allotment in the Centenary Campaign. After three or four brief speeches, the Conference, by a rising vote, amid scenes of great emotion, unanimously adopted the allotment.

The Conference then adjourned with the singing of the Doxology, and the benediction was pronounced by C. G. Hounshell.

THIRD DAY.

Clarksville, Arkansas, November 22, 1918.

The Conference convenced at 8:30 o'clock, Bishop Mouzon presiding. Hymn No. 208 was sung, and Rev. C. N. Guice led the devotional exercises. The Bishop read the 53rd chapter of Isaiah and gave an inspiring address on "Vicarious Suffering."

The Minutes of the sessions of the previous day were read and approved.

A communication from Mr. Thomas King and L. H. Sherrod regarding the Methodist Hospital in Memphis was read by the Secretary, which by vote of the Conference, was referred to the Hospital Commission.

The Secretary was instructed to send a telegram to Rev. B. M. Burrow conveying the sympathy of the Conference in his affliction.

Question 1 was resumed.

Silas Walter Adams and Lundy Hughes Ward, recommended by the Fort Smith District, having passed an approved examination on the Course of Study, and being recommended by the Committee on Admissions, were admitted on trial into the Conference.

John G: Ditterline, recommended by the Fayetteville District, Hiram A. Tucker, recommended by the Booneville District, and Oliver Mack Campbell, recommended by the Fort Smith District, passed an examination on the Course of Study, but not having met the disciplinary requirements of an English education, on recommendation of the Committee on Admissions, and by a two-thirds vote of the Conference, were admitted into the traveling connection.

Question 9 was resumed. Who are the Deacons of one year?

George Pierce Fikes passed an examination of character, but not having been before the Committee on the Course of Study, was continued in the Class of the Third Year.

Question 2 was called. Who remain on trial?

RESOLUTION.

Whereas, A glorious victory has been won for civilization by the armed forces of the United States and the allied nations; and $\dot{}$

Whereas, The aftermath of that victory shows Central Europe to be on the verge of anarchy, which is brought about by insufficent food supply; and

Whereas, The War Council at Versailles pledged the nations affiliated in the war against the Central Powers to feed those whose sword had previously been drawn against them, and to see that the starving residents of the allied countries had ample food supply; and

Whereas, The United States is the storehouse of the world, richly blessed by God, and, occupying the position in the great war of seeking no selfish gains, must open the doors of its storehouses and take therefrom the food that is now so badly needed by millions in order that the civilization established and guaranteed as a result of the war shall not be overthrown by the anarchy given birth by hunger; and

Whereas, The United States Food Administration has set aside the week of December 1 to 7, to be known as "Food Conservation Week for World Relief," during which special messages will be heard from our great and honored President, Woodrow Wilson, and the Hon. Herbert Hoover, Food Administrator of the United States; when every one interested in the Christian life of the nation; in the educational, fraternal and social spheres, when the men, women and children of our Government will be mobilized for distinctive and valuable service in humanity's cause; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we officially endorse "Food Conservation Week for World Relief," and do hereby pledge ourselves to assist in making that most necessary campaign a success by being willing participants in that movement, and also by most faithfully carrying out such requests to save food, eliminate waste, and assist the Government in such conservation as may come to us from its authorized representatives in the State and National Food Administration.

FOURTH DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

Clarksville, Arkansas, November 23, 1918.

The Conference convened at 2:30 p.m., Bishop Mouzon presiding. Hymn No. 180 was sung, and Dr. James A. Anderson led in prayer. Psalm No. 103 was read responsively.

The Minutes of the morning session were read, corrected, and approved.

The following resolution was adopted:

RESOLUTION.

Whereas, Under Government control, the railroad fare in Arkansas has been advanced from two cents per mile to three cents. And

Whereas, The preachers of the State are among the few who have received no profit from the war prices, but on the contrary have suffered financial loss from the unusual conditions, therefore be it

Resolved, First, That the North Arkansas Conference now in Session at Clarksville, Arkansas, do most respectfully petition the Honorable William G. McAdoo, Director of Railroads, to grant the preachers of Arkansas and Oklahoma the courtesy of receiving clergy permits granting half fare to all preachers exclusively engaged in the work of the ministry.

Second, That the Bishop appoint a committee of three to take this matter up with the said Honorable William G. McAdoo to secure such courtesies,

Third, That this committee make proper efforts to secure the co-operation of the other churches in above territory for the obtaining of this courtesy.

A WORD FROM THE SECRETARY.

The Journal of the Fifth Session of the North Arkansas Conference is, in its make-up, the result of not a little care and effort upon the part of the Secretary and his assistants. Our ambition has been to record faithfully the work of the Conference, and present it in attractive type, and facilitate its use in the arrangement of its matter.

We ask your candid criticism, and urge that any errors, however insignificant, be reported at once.

We have consulted the best edited Journals of our Annual Conferences for suggestions, and we have adopted the forms used as being the simplest and most practical that we could find or devise.

We call attention to the Index on the last page, the use of black faced type for minute questions as called in the daily sessions of the Conference, which questions are printed in full when first called, and if called again, are followed by the phrase "was resumed," to the addresses furnished both for the Local Preachers and Lay Leaders, to the printing of the Statistical Table in horizontal form, to the addresses of all officers of Conference Boards and Committees, to the strict alphabetical arrangement of all rolls of members, classes, etc. The Reports of Boards and Committees are also in alphabetical order.

Particular attention is called to a digest of the new financial plan of the church in which the assessments for the Districts are calculated.

When all the General and Conference Interests are put in one budget it will be seen that 48 per cent. of the total collected is to be appropriated to the first and 52 per cent. to the second, and the distribution of each fund will be made by the Conference Treasurer on the basis shown in the tables. (See pp. 71-73.)

In the Report of the Board of Education (No. 2, p. 58) the assessment should be \$18,082 instead of \$16,332, but the total for Conference Interests as shown in the Report of the Finance Commission is \$12,000 and this is the total of the last four items in the Report of the Board of Education, which are all Conference Interests. Unless this fact is observed the Report, as it stands, will be perplexing.

Some errors in the Statistical Tables were corrected while passing them through the press, and some changes in figures were made at the request of the brethren too late, in most cases, to run the corrections through all the "totals" which were affected. The Statistical Secretaries deserve mention for their painstaking work.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

To the Bishop and Members of the North Arkansas Conference:

Your Committee is pleased to report that the Society is receiving generous support from the Church. During the past year the distribution of the Scriptures has been large. In the Southwestern agency, which includes Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana, 14 colporteurs were employed, who traveled approximately 30,000 miles; visited 27,921 families, and distributed 221,431 Bibles or parts of Scriptures, translated into 30 languages. Of this number 15,831 volumes were donated. The Society has distributed among the soldiers 1,200,000 Testaments, and a second million has been published for the same purpose.

The report for Arkansas alone is as follows. Number of volumes sold, 18,340; donated, 5,395. The Arkansas Depository has distributed 12,652 volumes up to November 1, and the number will reach 25,000 this year. We have raised in Arkansas over \$10,000 for the Army and Navy Testament Fund since November, 1917. We appreciate having the Depository in our own State, and the large patronage which it is receiving.

We make an appropriation of \$35 for printing the Minutes.

We recommend that D. H. Colquette be re-appointed Field Agent for the American Bible Society for the ensuing year.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Report No. 1.

To the Bishop and Members of the North Arkansas Conference:

We are glad to report that our schools are rapidly recovering from the paralyzing effects of the war. Sloan-Hendrix Academy, which suffered most perhaps by the call to the colors, is regaining its accustomed strength. Galloway College has been obliged to refuse admittance to an unprecedented number of girls, because it could not house them. The building of a splendid dormitory, now under way, will abundantly take care of that situation in the future. Hendrix College has a record-breaking attendance. It has 225 students in the Students' Army Training Corps, besides an unusually large attendance of civilian students.

We recommend the election of J. H. Zellner and R. C. Morehead to succed themselves on the Board of Trustees for Galloway College, and the appointment of J. H. O'Bryant and J. J.

Galloway as Associate Commissioners.

We recommend the election of J. B. Stevenson to succeed $himself_{\eta}$ and the election of Will Pyle to succed H. G. Stevens on the Board of Trustees for Hendrix College. We recommend that F. S. H. Johnston and James Thomas be retained as Commissioners for Hendrix College, without salary, to close up the Endowment Fund Campaign.

We recommend that the following appointments be made: J. S. Seneker, student in Union Theological Seminary; George W. Pyle, student in Emory University; Olen L. Cole and J. H. Crichlow, students in Southern Methodist University; Troy C. Roddy and Hiram A. Tucker, students in Hendrix College.

In view of the fact that the evident will of the Church, as expressed in statutory enactment by the General Conference, is being thwarted by an appeal to the two-thirds rule, your Board recommends that undergraduates who fail two years in succession to bring up their Conference Course shall be discontinued or located.



Your Board strongly disapproves the action of District Conferences in recommending for admission on trial candidates who lack the disciplinary requirements of an English education.

BOARD OF MISSIONS.

To the Bishop and Members of the North Arkansas Conference:

We rejoice in the fact that in spite of distracting and burdensome war conditions, the past year was our best missionary year.

The income from all departments was \$1,523,531.00, an increase of \$258,172.00 over the previous year, this being not only the largest income, but also the largest increase, and all departments, home and foreign, general work and woman's work, have shared in the increase.

The reports show that in our own Conference the collections have exceeded those of last year.

Reports from the mission fields are encouraging. The doors are all open, and the cry comes from every field: "Come over and help us." The Church is facing her greatest challenge, her greatest test. We must go forward or surrender.

In the providence of God our Missionary Centenary has come at the crucial hour of the world's history. The Methodists of America are called upon to shoulder their responsibility, and to face the task of taking the world for Christ in this Century.

The General Conference has by unanimous vote authorized and provided for a celebration of this great event in keeping with the importance of the cause that we represent, and sets for us a task worthy of our great Church, a task that challenges our courage and our faith and demands our full strength in Christ.

The aims set forth in this Centenary Movement are the deepening of the spiritual life of the Church, the enlisting of a million intercessors, the creation of a conscience for Christian stewardship, the cultivation of a habit of systematic and proportionate giving, and the increase of the missionary income.

We rejoice that our Conference so generously and enthusiastically accepted not only its apportionment of the \$35,000,000.00 handed down to us by the General Board, but increased this amount from \$925,534.35 to \$1,000,000.00, thus making the amount to be raised, \$200,000 annually. We have the means and we have the will. By God's help it shall be done.

We recommend the appointment of Dr. F. S. H. Johnston as Conference Secretary, on full time.

We urge the Presiding Elders and Pastors to co-operate with him in carrying out the Centenary Program as outlined by the Commission for this campaign.

We would also call attention to the great opportunity afforded in creating a missionary spirit and raising missionary funds through specials, and urge that we create specials in our Sunday Schools, Leagues and congregations.

We present the following Committee on Egangelism: A. F. Skinner, Elisher Dyer, B. C. Few, W. T. Martin, F. G. Villines, Norris Greer.

We recommend the appointment of W. H. Neel for Conference Evangelist.

There being \$2,087.72 collected for the War Fund, we recommend that this sum be applied to the Centenary Fund for our War Work.

We recommend an assessment of \$16,492 for Home and Conference Missions.

ORPHANAGE BOARD.

To the Bishop and Members of the North Arkansas Conference:

The Methodist Orphanage Board respectfully reports that the past year has been one of alternating cloud and sunshine, and while we have had much sickness, there has been no death in the Home. We had fifteen cases of influenza at one time.

During the extremely cold weather, we faced a fuel famine which came near driving us from the Home, but thanks to Our Heavenly Father and friends of the Home, we secured fuel and came through without serious results.

At the close of last year, we had in the Home thirty-five children. We have received twenty, and placed twenty-one during the year, leaving thirty-four in the Home on September 30. Since the establishment of the Orphanage we have placed 330 children. We have refused applications for children, but have not refused admission to any orphan child.

Special gifts in money were received by Brother Thornburgh to the amount of \$1,240, making \$39,540 that he has collected and invested in the property, besides the amounts contributed annually by the Conference.

It will be seen that the receipts were less than the disbursements by \$1,480, which sum was borrowed, and is still owing.

We regret to say that the payments from the Conferences have fallen twenty-five per cent below the amounts promised. With the increasing cost of living it will take all that is assessed for the Orphanage to meet current expenses, leaving nothing with which to pay the debt. Nothing has been paid on the fund assumed by the Conferences for building or furnishings, and even repairs have to be paid out of the special fund.

Believing that the Orphanage is a sacred trust, the Board asks that each Conference accepts an assessment of \$5,000 for its support.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

To the Bishop and Members of the North Arkansas Conference:

Your committee is constrained to report that the tendency to desecrate the Sabbath is increasing. Our people are using God's day more as a day of pleasure than a day of prayer and worship. This may in some degree be explained by conditions which have arisen during the war, but two of the most noticeable evils, namely, the Sunday automobile and the picture show, are largely responsible for a loss of interest in the ideals for which the Church stands. There are far too many vacant pews in the Church, and far too many picnics in the woods on Sunday.

In view of these facts your committee would recommend:

1. That our Conference go on record as being opposed to all forms of Sabbath desecration, and as commending with caution all those pastimes which tend to wean the people of God from the service of the Sanctuary.

2. That our preachers give diligence to preach on this question, and to urge our people in private as well, to refrain from all pursuits and pleasures not justified in the Scriptures and appropriate to a holy Sabbath.

3. That our laymen, especially those identified with the active work of the Church, be urged to cooperate heartily with our pastors in their effort to accomplish these ends.

While we deprecate the liquor menace to the state and stand committed to the abolition of the liquor traffic there is no cause for discouragement, and there has been no relaxation of effort on the part of the temperance forces.

The Anti-Saloon League of the state has put forth strong efforts and with much success, to apprehend those guilty of violating our prohibition laws, and we urge upon the Legislature, to convene in January next, to enact such legislation as is necessary

to protect our interests.

We call attention to the fact that the proposed new Constitution, to be submitted to the people on the 14th day of December next, carries a prohibition article, satisfactory to all prohibitionists. The prohibition amendment to the Constitution of the United States will also come before our Legislature, and we are pleased to believe is practically sure of ratification.

In the nation, rapid progress has been made, and we have every reason to expect that ratification of the National Constitutional Amendment will be one of the blessing which the year

1919 will bring.

We are gratified to note, that the Anti-Saloon League of America has added world-prohibition to its program, and called a convention of world temperance forces which is now in session at Columbus, Ohio.

To the Anti-Saloon League of America and the Convention, we convey greetings, recognizing in the movement for a dry America and a dry world, a reinforcement of the great Centenary Program of the church.

THE NEW FINANCIAL PLAN.

The present law of the Church as adopted by the last General Conference provides that all the assessments on the Church for various general interests endorsed by the General Conference shall be aggregated and assessed in a single sum.

The amount assessed shall be apportioned to the several Annual Conferences by the Commission on Finance, and the ratio for our Conference is .0270. The budget for the whole Church is \$1,700,000.00; hence the allotment for the North Arkansas Conference is \$45,900.00.

These general interests are shown in the following table, in which the percentages are calculated for our Conference.

(Note. The remaining three per cent. is in all probability the amount prorated to the American Bible Society, which was one of the General assessments, and in some way was omitted in the published list. This would amount to \$1,377.00 and complete the budget.)

The Annual Conference Commission on Finance fixes the ratio for the Districts, and the Report of this Commission as published on pages 53, 54, shows what this is to be. The Conference Com-

mission is composed of five ministers and five laymen, none of whom shall be a member of an Annual Conference Board, together with the chairmen of the Conference Boards. All collections must be remitted to the Conference Treasurer who must divide among the several interests the amount received on the agreed percentage basis, making monthly settlements with the treasurers of the Boards.

All Conference interests must be referred to the Conference Commission on Finance, and its recommendation as to the amount which shall be assessed for them must be ratified by the Conference. The Conference has chosen to distribute these interests among the several districts on the same ratio which applies to the General Interests.

The Conference Treasurer and all Conference Board Treasurers must be secured by an adequate and solvent surety company bond. The Conference Treasurer must make monthly settlement with the several Conference Treasurers on the ratio fixed by the Conference Commission.

The Conference assessments as published in the Report of the Commission amount to \$49,650.00. Hence the total assessment for General and Conference interests amount to \$95,550.00. The distribution of both assessments is here shown.

H. T. GREGORY.

Rev. H. T. Gregory was born in South Carolina, September 12, 1838, and died in Searcy, Arkansas, March 28, 1918, after a long illness.

In childhood he removed to Missouri and after a few years came to Pocahontas, Arkansas, and lived at Pocahontas until he entered the Confederate Army in 1862. He was converted early in life and was a faithful, consecrated Christian to the end of his long and useful life. Brother Gregory was for thirtynine years an effective preacher. He was a diligent, thoughtful student of the Bible, and in exegesis was clever and forceful. He was a strong believer in our articles of religion. The doctrines of the new birth and the witness of the Spirit he claimed as a personal experience and earnestly preached them to the people. To our whole doctrinal system and church polity he was loyal and true. He accepted his appointments as coming from the Lord, and went gladly to every work to which he was assigned. His Christian life was not only above reproach, but was beautiful in its simplicity, and influential in its sincerity. Through storm or sunshine, through heat or cold he went to discharge his ministerial When told that no one would go through the cold or the slush to meet him at the stated services, he would reply, "Well, I will be there." He kept a record of every church visited and every sermon preached, and a list of the official members present at the quarterly conferences of his whole ministerial life.

During his long illness he was patient and kind. He suffered greatly at times, but never a word of complaint came from his lips. His faith in God was strong and his sky was unclouded. He was resigned to God's will, was ready to suffer and die, if it must be. His last days were painless, and on the 28th of March he fell asleep in Jesus.
