THIRD DAY

Morning Session

Walnut Ridge, Arkansas, November 23, 1923.

The Conference convened at 9 A. M. Bishop Atkins presiding.

George McGlumphy, the Conference Treasurer, made an announcement regarding the closing of his books.

The Minutes of the previous day's session were read, corrected, and approved.

A. N. Evans was placed on the Board of Christian Literature in place of E. K. Sewell.

The following Resolution prepared by the Committee appointed to draft resolutions on the Life and Character of Col. George Thornburgh was read by W. T. Martin.

RESOLUTION

Hon. George Thornburgh was pre-eminent as a citizen, a humanitarian, and a Christian.

For a number of years he was editor of a secular newspaper, always advocating editorially progressive and righteous measures. Later he was business manager and joint owner of the Arkansas Methodist, thus becoming known to nearly all the Methodists in Arkansas, who learned to rely on him as an incorruptible Christian.

For a number of years he was Secretary of the White River Conference, and several times represented his Conference in the General Conference with ability and fidelity.

He was pre-eminently the leader of the Arkansas Anti-Saloon League. He worked, planned, and led, until the saloon was driven from this state.

While engageed in the fight to abolish the legalized saloon in this state, he busied himself in building and managing, purely as a work of love, the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage to care for homeless children, many of whom were made homeless by the saloon he was trying to abolish. One of the greatest and most arresting cartoons of the last thirty years is that representing Col. Thornburgh as shouting, "The saloon must go", while pointing homeless orphans along the road that led to the Methodist Orphanage.

Through the Arkansas Methodist, the Anti-Saloon League, and the Methodist Orphanage he belonged to all of Arkansas. Therefore

Be it resolved, that we hereby express our appreciation of his life and his work; that we feel keenly the loss the state and the church have sustained in his death; that we convey to his wife and children our sympathy in their bereavement and assure them that the whole body of Christian men and women of this state feel with them the sorrow caused by his going away.

FOURTH DAY.

Walnut Ridge, Arkansas, November 24, 1923.

Hymn No. 37 in the Cokesbury Hymnal was sung. Dr. Luther E. Todd, Secretary of the General Board of Finance, led in prayer.

The minutes of the previous day's session were read, corrected, and approved.

Question 1 was resumed:

Oliver, who had completed a quadrennium of service on the Fayetteville District, were called to the chancel by the Bishop, and were presented with a silver meat platter by B. L. Harris in behalf of the preachers of the Fayetteville District. Brother and Sister Oliver each made fitting response.

The Report of the Hospital Board was read.

L. H. Estes and Bishop Atkins spoke to the report and it was adopted. (See Supplement.)

The Conference resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole on Admissions, and voted to recommend for admission into full connection, Alonzo McKelvey, James Franklin Carter and Albert Neill Storey, these brethren not having been before the Committee on Admissions.

On motion of H. L. Wade, the Conference voted to order an assessment of \$200 for Local Preachers who have served as supplies for twenty years or more, and have at this Conference ceased to be active. The order of the Conference was referred to the Commission on Budget.

After sundry announcements the Conference adjourned with the singing of the Doxology, and the benediction was pronounced by J. S. Hackler.

FOURTH DAY.

Afternoon Session.

Walnut Ridge, Arkansas, November 24, 1923.

The Conference reconvened at 3:00 P. M., Bishop Atkins presiding. The congregation sang Hymns Numbers 47 and 82 from the Cokesbury Hymnal.

The Report of the American Bible Society Board was read and adopted. (See Supplement.)

A. T. Galloway took the chair by appointment of the Bishop.

The Report of the Sunday School Board was read and adopted. (See Supplement.)

The name of S. B. Douglas, a Local Preacher who had served as a Supply, was called and it was reported that he had died during the year.

The Report of the Committee on Sabbath Observance was read. Dr. A. C. Millar spoke to the Report, and it was adopted. (See Supplement.)

The Bishop resumed the chair.

James Franklin Bolin, an Elder in the the General Baptist Church, presented his credentials to the Conference, and certified his agreement wis us in doctrine and discipline, was recognized as a local elder in our church.

Reports of Boards and Committees

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The American Bible Society has a history of one hundred and seven very fruitful years. In this period in addition to its work of translation and publication it has distributed one hundred and fifty million copies of the Scriptures in seven hundred and seventy languages and dialects. The demands and needs have not been met. China in particular is calling for Bibles faster than the Society can make them, while the Roman Catholic masses of Central Europe, South America and Mexico are breaking away from their old moorings and are demanding an open Bible. Slowly but surely the people of the earth are turning to the Book which alone reveals the Son of God as the only cure for the world's sin.

The Southwestern Agency, over which Rev. J. J. Morgan presides, distributed last year 112,325 volumes of the Scriptures in thirty one different languages. This Agency, as best it could, has given God's work to those who could not buy it. The blind, the poor, the orphan, the inmates of rescue homes, reform schools, jails, penitentaries, hospitals and a leper colony have been supplied as liberally as funds were allowed. You will be interested in knowing that this Agency spent \$11,000 in the work of the Bible Society in the Southwest last year.

We are pleased to note the success of the Arkansas Depository under the management of D. H. Colquette, a capable and faithful agent, who maintains a Bible depository in Little Rock, Arkansas. His distribution last year ran over 17,000 volumes, and will reach over 30,000 volumes this year. He ministers especially to the poor, the blind, the sick, and the prisoner, preaching the gospel and making donations of Scriptures wherever necessary. The fact is, this institution is one of the most needed in our state. It is doing much but could do immensely more if funds were available.

The total loss of the Bible House in Tokio, Japan, from the September earthquake is not only a sad financial loss to the work of the Society in the Far East, but it is a loss most difficult to replace, since valuable plates for both China and Japan were totally destroyed.

The Society begs your sympathy and prayers to the end that funds to restore these losses may be forthcoming.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

In the latter part of paragraph 71 of the Discipline we find these words relating to this Board, namely, "This Board shall hold an anniversary at some time during the period of the Annual Conference and shall prepare a program therefor." This has not been done in the past. It will be done next year.

Mr. John W. Barton, of the Publishing House, submitted a complete Annual Report which shows that great progress is being made in our publishing interests. This year \$30,000 was added to the superannuate endowment fund from this source. We heartily commend our Agents for this splendid showing, and we urge both the clergy and laity to show their appreciation by larger patronage of our publishing house.

The Arkansas Methodist Commission submitted its report showing that in placing the paper on a cash basis and in cutting down undesirable advertising at the close of the year the paper would be \$5000 in debt. This deficit has been met by a levy on the several Boards using the Arkansas Methodist for publicity, authority for this action being granted by a resolution adopted by this session of the Conference.

Recommendations

First, that every preacher make a special effort to circulate our Church Publications and Sunday School Literature.

Second, that the preachers speak more often of Christian papers from the pulpit.

Third, that the splendid new Song Book, The Cokesbury Hymnal, be generally used in our churches,

Fourth, that the name "Cokesbury Press" be substituted for Methodist Publishing House.

Fifth, that the Arkansas Methodist be put in the budget in every Church where possible.

Sixth, that the month of February be continued as circulation month for the paper.

Seventh, that Dr. A. C. Millar be reelected Editor, and Rev. J. C. Glenn be reelected Associate Editor, and that the old Commission be reelected as follows: F. S. H. Johnson, J. M. Williams, and R. C. Morehead.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

We were pleased to have our General Secretary, Dr. Stonewall Anderson, with us and to present to us the general educational situation and especially that of our church. As he gave to us a view of the forces of Christian Education that are in operation, we were made to feel that our homes, our Church and nation will always be secure. We recommend the following:

- 1. That we pledge our continued support to the Christian Education movement.
- 2. That we sponsor the plans of the General Education Board looking to Christian Education for our State Universities and secondary schools.
- 3. That we commend the plan of the General Board of Education looking toward the establishment of Student Pastorates at Central Church Fayetteville and at First Church, Conway.
- 4. We are glad to recognize the efficient and courteous services of our Conference Secretary of Education, Rev. R. C. Morehead and ask that he be continued in the same relationship.

Report No. 2

The reports from our several schools are optimistic,

SOUTHERN METHODIST UNIVERSITY

Dr. C. C. Selecman, Chancellor of our Southern Methodist University at Dallas, Texas, was present and made a fine impression. We feel that this school is in the care of a safe leader. The most

thorough work is being done in the Academic and Theological Departments. A moral and religius influence pervades the entire University. We recommend that Rev. G. G. Davidson succeed himself as Trustee.

HENDRIX COLLEGE

Hendrix is in the best year of her history. About three hundred and forty two students are in the College and seventy six in the Academy, making a total of four hundred and eighteen. Among these there are forty ministerial students and twelve life service students. Forty received the A. B. Degree last June, a larger number than were bestowed by any other institution in the state.

We rejoice in our completed Stadium, one of the best in the South. Plans are being made by the Alumni Association for the building of a great gymnasium.

The College now has an endowment of \$550,000, including the contribution of the General Board of Education of New York, and is now, through her Trustees in the midst of an effort to secure another \$450,000. We heartly endorse this movement and pledge to the Board our co-operation in securing this additional endowment.

We commend the College authorities for the establishment of the Department of Rural Life. We feel that such a Department is a long step in the process of leadership training for Rural Communities.

We endorse the action of the Summer School for Ministers committing us to a Martin Day Program, which looks toward the erection of a worthy monument to Captain W. W. Martin, father of Greater Hendrix.

We recommend that Mr. Tom Johnson, of Dardanelle succeed himself as Trustee.

SUMMER SCHOOL FOR MINISTERS.

It is a matter of gratification that the Hendrix Summer School for Ministers has become a real school with definite objectives. It now represents the collective counsel of the whole church, as the General Boards of Mission, Education and Sunday Schools joined in working out a policy and programs. Its faculty is of the highest order, and its courses are eminently practical for pastors.

We urge the attendance of all pastors and call upon Pastors and Presiding Elders to attend the entire fifteen days next June. We ask the Presiding Elders to inform Churches and Quarterly Conferences, and secure their co-operation in the attendance of the pastors.

We recommend that the Board of Managers be composed of the President of the College and two representatives from each of the

following Boards of the two Annual Conferences in Arkansas: Education, Sunday School, Missions, and Lay Activities.

We recommend that Rev. R. C. Morehead and Prof. R. E. Womack be elected to membership on the Board of Managers, representing the Board of Education.

GALLOWAY COLLEGE.

This school for girls under the leadership of President J. M. Williams is doing the very highest grade of work. There are 175 students in the college, 82 in the Academy and 20 doing special work making a total of 277. We find a large number of life service students, a fine Christian spirit, and College committed to the making of Christian womanhood. We are glad to note a library of 5600 volumes and a laboratory equipment valued at \$8000. The entire value of the College plant is about \$450.000.

We heartily endorse the plans of the Board which launched an endowment Program to secure \$500,000 and we ask that the Conference give the Board its support. To this end we recommend that Rev. H. H. Griffin be appointed commissioner of Galloway College. We would nominate Rev. R. C. Morehead and J. H. Zellner as Trustees to succeed themselves.

We commend the Alumni Association in organizing its membership throughout the state, looking to the erection of a Science Building.

HENDERSON-BROWN COLLEGE.

At Henderson-Brown we have a student body of 316 filling her buildings to capacity, a large number of young men and young women have volunteered for Christian service and all are actively engaged in some form of service. We find a religious spirit pervading the entire Institution. To her property valuation of \$335,000, has recently been added a three story brick annex to Key Hall, the Fine Arts Building.

The need for \$300,000 endowment is imperative. We heartily endorse the program of the school launched in the meeting of guests and friends last October to secure this amount, and we pledge our support in carrying out the program.

We recommend that Rev. J. J. Galloway be continued as Executive Secretary of Henderson-Brown College.

We also recommend that Rev. J. J. Galloway, Prof. J. P. Womack, and Rev. J. M. Hughey be elected Trustees; Rev. J. M. Hughey to succeed Rev. J. H. O'Bryant, deceased.

WESTERN METHODIST ASSEMBLY AT FAYETTEVILLE, ARK.

We rejoice that this Assembly has so far proved a success and has taken the place among the great Christian Assemblies of the Churches. It is at our door. Let us use it. We commend the Board of Managers in their selection of Mr. J. L. Bond, as Superintendent and commit ourselves to the program that the General Boards are making. Plans for new buildings on the Assembly grounds are being made.

We recommend the election of Rev. F. S. H. Johnston, Hon. G. C. Hardin and Mr. T. L. Hart as Trustees.

ACADEMIC

SLOAN-HENDRIX ACADEMY

We have at Sloan-Hendrix Academy in land and buildings a property valuation of \$40,000, a farm of 130 acres is included in this, and a large residence on this farm which will serve for a girls dormitory. There is an Administration Building in process of erection and funds are needed to complete it.

We have a very fine student body, larger than ever before and most of them are Christians. There is a goodly list of ministerial students. We are doing a good work in furnishing students for Principals of our schools. Twenty-five percent of our graduates enter college. Our students come almost entirely from the farms. It is a very difficult work we are doing but it is heroic and worth while. Professor J. C. Eaton is to be commended and supported in every way possible.

We recommed Rev. J. F. Glover be appointed as part time agent in this field to secure students and much needed funds.

We wish to nominate as Trustees: R. S. Rainwater and J. T. Fortenberry for one year; M. F. Henderson and F. M. Daniel for two years; and W. A. Lindsey and Charles Stuck for three years.

VALLEY SPRINGS ACADEMY.

Prof. M. J. Russell and his faculty are doing an excellent work at Valley Springs, but they are making brick without straw. His buildings are all improvised. It has come to a time that we as a Conference and a Church must make good our promise to furnish money. We pledge ourselves to support a movement to secure \$50,000 for buildings and equipment.

We recommend the following resolution, that the Conference instruct the Board of Trustees of the Training School to put into operation plans in keeping with the general plans of the Conference, that will secure funds necessary for this purpose; that it recommend Rev. W. T. Martin as Financial Secretary for the School.

Let us support this school of the Mountains.

We recommend that the Board of Valley Springs Training School be elected by this Conference. Let it be composed of seven members, three preachers and four laymen, the term of each expiring in rotation. We recommend that the Board of Trustees be as follows:

W. P. Jones, one year, 1924; Mrs. S. G. Smith, two years, 1925; William Sherman, three years, 1926; O. E. Goddard, four years, 1927; A. T. Hudspeth, five years, 1928; H. L. Wade, six years, 1929; J. H. Zellner, seven years, 1930.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED BY THE BOARD

The following resolutions were adopted by the Board:

Rev. C. C. Neal of the C. M. E. Church was before us in behalf of the Educational work of his church. We commend the work he is doing among the colored people, and especially in his efforts to train the young preachers, and suggest that our pastors give their people opportunity to make a free will offering for this work on Inter-racial Sunday which is the second Sunday in February, 1924.

We recommend the adoption of a resolution proposed by Rev. J. F. Glover authorizing the sale of certain property belonging to Sloan-Hendrix Academy at Imboden.

Financial

Balance brought forward, \$154.86.

The total assessment for Education this year was \$20,500.00, on this assessment \$9,130.37 was collected and disbursed as follows:

Hendrix College, \$2150; Henderson-Brown College, \$2150; Galloway College, \$2150; Publishing Committee, \$140; Sloan-Hendrix, \$860; Valley Springs, \$1075; Summer School for Ministers, \$430; Sloan-Hendrix (from last year), \$54.90; Balance carried forward,\$120.47; Total, \$9130.37.

We ask that the following assessment, allowed by the Budget Committee, be placed on the Conference:

Hendrix College, \$5000; Galloway College, \$5000; Henderson-Brown College, \$5000; Valley Springs, \$2500; Sloan-Hendrix, \$2500; Summer School, \$1000; Student Pastor, Central, Fayetteville, \$500; Student Pastor, First Church, Conway, \$500; Total, \$22,000.

EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD

The number of Epworth League Chapters now exceeds the number of pastoral charges, but is less than one-third the number of societies, or organized congregations.

The Epworth Era enjoys the large circulation of 37,500; the Junior Epworthian and the Intermediate Epworthian are both on a

self-supporting basis and have an increasing circulation. A beginning has been made in the publication of Junior and Senior Quarterlies in the Spanish language. The Bible study text book for the year is an admirable study of the fundamental doctrines, based upon the Apostles' Creed, by Prof. Franklin N. Parker. The Central office has been at great pains and expense to provide pamphlet literature, especially in the Department of Missions. The Epworth Era is serving more than ever as a magazine of methods and inspiration. The outstanding feature of the work of the North Arkansas League Conference this year was the Assembly at Searcy last June. This was the crystalizing of a year of activity and faithful service on the part of the district and conference workers. There were 310 paid registrations, with perhaps 150 in more or less regular attendance. There were 22 Life Service Volunteers.

Eleven District Institutes were held during the Summer under the direction of Rev. Noel Chaney, who was in the field for four months. The growth of the League work in numbers and in visible progress, has been gratifying, yet the greatest progress has been in the morale and efficiency of the local chapters. The reports from the pastoral charges show a net increase of 15 chapters and 309 members.

We recommend that Rev. Leland Clegg be elected to fill the vacancy in the Board made by the death of Sid Harris.

The following Resolution was adopted by your Board:

BE IT RESOLVED: That the Epworth Leagues of the M. E. Church, South, of the twelve Conferences participating in the Mt. Sequoyah Assembly erect an Epworth League building at Mt. Sequoyah to cost \$25,000.

- 2. That the project be financed by the Leagues of the twelve participating Conferences on a suggested basis of ten cents a member annually for five years;
- 3. That the Conference Epworth League Cabinet of the participating Conferences each appoint one commissioner to serve as a Board of Managers until a permanent Board can be elected by the Conference Assemblies;
- 4. That this Board of Managers supervise the collection of the funds and plan with the Western Assembly Commission the kind of building to be erected.

Your Epworth League Board recommends the following policy for adoption for League activities for the year:

1. Anniversary Day; Our goal for the year will be to observe Anniversary, or Young People's Day in every congregation on the 2nd Sunday in April and send the freewill offering to be taken on that day for young people's work to Mr. Howard Johnston, Epworth

League Conference Treasurer, Conway, Arkansas. We shall seek to emphasize the responsibility which Christian young people have of winning other young people into the Church and into service in the Church.

- 2. Each member of the Board shall co-operate with the District Secretary in his district in providing visitation to each chapter at least twice each year. We would encourage the formation of District Teams in each district.
- 3. That each member of the Board co-operate with the Conference Officers in holding institutes in all the districts and we shall encourage formation of unions where there are three or more Leagues located in adjacent territory.
- 4. We shall co-operate with the Presiding Elders in presenting the Epworth League work at each District Conference and assist the Presiding Elder in promoting young people's work throughout the districts.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

We have tried as a Committee to do some few things this year. In the first place, we tried early in the year to arrange for every pastor serving a mission charge, to have the best possible help without any cost to him or his people, more than the mere traveling expenses of his helper. We even paid the expenses of such help—when the place was not able to do so.

We wrote hundreds of letters trying to get the proper men to assist the pastors who were serving these mission charges. We feel that some mistakes were made, but that, in the main, some real good was accomplished.

Then, in the second place, your committee went to work several months ago to secure a good inspirational preacher to preach for us each day during our conference session. The great messages brought to us by Dr. H. C. Morrison testify to the wisdom of our selection.

Your committee plans to do even better service next year, profiting by the experiences and mistakes of this year.

We recommend the appointment of W. H. Neal, John B. Andrews and C. N. Guice as General Evangelists. We recommend also, the appointment of Norris Greer, A. H. Dulaney, and R. F. Shinn as Conferences Evangelists; R. F. Shinn to do work especially in our industrial centers.

HOSPITAL BOARD

We had before us a communication from the General Hospital Board and we rejoice over the rapidly spreading interest in Hospital work by our great Church. We are in thorough accord with the Golden Cross Movement and at the proper time will project the same.

We received the report from our Board of Trustees concerning our own Hospital interests. We are glad to know that our Lucy Brinkley Annex is now rated among the Standardized Hospitals of the country. We desire to commend Dr. Henry Hedden for his splendid and efficient management. The service rendered is second to none in the City of Memphis.

Of the 1433 patients admitted during the year ending October 31, 1923, 155 were from our State, 284 from Mississippi, 213 from Tennessee, (outside of Memphis,) 555 from the City of Memphis, and remainder from other States, of these 447 were Methodists, 195 Baptists, 105 Presbyterians, 325 with no Church affiliation, the rest from other denominations.

Ten pastors, or the members of their families, from our Conference received free treatment at our Lucy Brinkley Annex during the year, 13 from the North Mississippi Conference and 16 from the Memphis Conference.

We hail with joy the the letting of the contract for our new Hospital

and that work has started on the same. The Trustees of the Hospital requested our Conference to assume \$100,000.00 as its part of the fund necessary to the erection of a great Hospital. We accept the apportionment of this quota by the Presiding Elders to the different Districts and make it ours as follows: Batesville District \$7,000.00; Booneville District \$5,000.00; Conway District \$10,000.00; Fayetteville District \$5,000.00; Fort Smith District \$8,000.00; Helena District \$25,000.00; Jonesboro District \$25,000.00; Paragould District \$15,000.00; and Searcy District \$10,000.00.

In the light of all the facts as set forth above in this report we present to you the following for your adoption:

Be It Resolved, First: That the solemn responsibility rests alike upon the Bishop, each Presiding Elder, each Pastor, and every member of our Church throughout the bounds of the North Arkansas Conference to do their full part in strengthening the financial foundation and thus enlarging the scope and usefulness of our Hospital.

Second: To this end we collectively and individually pledge to our Trustees, our Board of Managers and our Secretary our full and heartiest co-operation in every phase of the work of securing sufficient funds to complete our assumed quota and in the shortest time possible.

Actual construction has started and actual money will be needed as we desire to open the Hospital free of debt. To help attain this end we will open our pulpits to our Secretary for the presentation of the Hospital work; we will help our Secretary find people, both within and without the membership of our Church, who with the proper cultivation would either make a direct gift, or become interested in a Memorial proposition for some loved one, or purchase an Annuity Bond, or leave a bequest to the Hospital, and, we will help cultivate them where possible; from time to time we will preach upon Hospital work remembering that our Savior said, "Heal the sick."

Third: As we are operating a Standardized Hospital in our Lucy Brinkley Annex, we urge all our people needing Hospital treatment to go to our own Hospital.

We request the election of the following to serve on the Board of Trustees from this Conference, Rev. William Sherman, Rev. J. R. Nelson, T. J. Boston, W. E. Jelks, F. J. Fogleman and Mrs. Preston Hatcher.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

We recommend that in all Districts of the Conference the Lay Organization be perfected in the manner prescribed by the Discipline.

This means that the associate Lay Leaders, Church and Charge Lay Leaders and all Committees be elected or appointed and set to work at once.

The object of the Board of Lay Activities is to assist in promoting all the Program of the Church and to develop the latent resources of the Laity. While we do not wish to be considered a mere collection agency, we desire to put at the disposal of the church all the strength of our organization in promoting such great movements as the Centenary, Christian Education and Superannuate Endowment, and assisting Boards of Stewards in collecting all assessments in full.

To the end that our Lay membership may secure the fullest possible development through active Christian service, we earnestly recommend that all Presiding Elders and Pastors utilize the services of the laymen in filling vacant pulpits, holding Evangelistic services, promoting various forms of social service and carrying the work of the church into undeveloped fields.

The Summer School for ministers is one of the powerful agencies in multiplying the efficiency of the Church. We call upon each District Lay Board to act as a Committee on Summer Schools to co-operate with the Presiding Elders and the Board of Managers of the School to bring out a full attendance of the Pastors from the Districts.

We recommend that T. B. Manny and H. A. Woodward be elected Trustees of the Summer School.

We recommend that R. E. Womack be elected Conference Lay Leader.

As no assessment for the expenses of the Board of Lay Activities was made by the last annual Conference our work has suffered greatly. We therefore recommend an assessment of \$500.00 to cover the expenses of the Board for last year and the ensuing year.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

We have received and read the communication from the Secretary of the General Board of Missions which tells us of unprecedented success which has attended our activities in all of our fields both home and abroad. We note with pleasure the great awakening throughout our fields of labor evidenced by the great ingathering of souls. The information coming to us from our foreign as well as our home land, is to the effect that our religion is forcing its influence upon the attention, in the most vital way, of the nations of the earth.

We recommend that the following plan be used for the Centenary Pay-up Campaign, and the Bishop be asked to appoint each Presiding Elder, Campaign Manager in his own District during this Pay-up period; that all churches be put into four groups: First class group, those churches that have paid in full their pledges. Second class group, those churches that have paid four fifths or more of the total amount of their pledges. Third class group, those churches that have paid between three-fifths and four-fifths of the total amount of their pledges. Fourth class group, those churches that have paid less than three fifths of the total amount of their pledges.

The first class churches should have proper recognition by being published in the Honor Roll of the Conference organ. Second class churches should be urged to pay in full the balance of their pledges by February first 1924, third class churches should pay a minimum of one-half of balance by this date, the fourth class churches pay a minimum of one-third by this date.

Further, that this Board gives its heartiest support to the Pay-up Campaign by holdings in the first days of December its mid-year meeting, calling in the Presiding Elders for Conference on ways and means for carrying out the entire Program of the Centenary Commission for the year.

We recommend that Dr. O. E. Goddard, and Rev. A. E. Holloway be elected members of the Board of Managers of the Summer School that Dr. F. S. H. Johnston be appointed Missionary Secretary without salary, and that Dr. James Thomas be appointed joint Centenary Secretary of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences. That Rev. D. H. Colquette be appointed Missionary to Prisons and Hospitals.

We recommend that the assessment for Conference Missions for the ensuing year be placed at \$14,000.00. We heartly commend the Western Assembly at Mt. Sequoyah to our people, and ask the General Board of Missions to consider the advisibility of erecting a building there similar to the one at Junsluska.

We make the following appropriations:

ORPHANAGE BOARD

We earnestly recommend that our people remember the Methodist Orphanage by bequests in their wills, thus helping the Church in the years to come to take care of the orphan children of our state. Also we recommend that the Sunday Schools take a Christmas offering as they did last year for the Orphanage. This should be done in every Sunday School and congregation in our Conference.

Also that our pastors put the Orphanage in touch with orphan children in their charges and commend the work of this Christ-like institution to all our people. We recommend that the assessment on our Conference be fixed at \$5000, the same as last year.

COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE

We note with pleasure the rising tide of appreciation of the glory and sanctity of the Sacred Day. Many of our people are coming to think of the Sabbath as a Day of Joy and Gladness in the worship of God and the fellowship of His Saints. Multitudes of our people young and old are renouncing all forms of popular recreation on the Sabbath, are relegating them to such hours as do not conflict or interfere with the attendance at church and Sunday School.

We are not oblivious of the fact that much desecration is practised, both in pleasure and in business, we are not unobservant of the prevalence of swimming parties, dining parties, joy riding, picnicing and other indications of a lack of the high regard for the sanctity of all Holy things, the day, the house, and the name of the Lord. Yet we observe with gratification a marked tendency toward a better standard, especially among our own people.

We urge also that there be no relaxation of our diligent efforts to promote the proper observance of the Day everywhere and by all classes.

We suggest and advise methods of direction and inspiration rather than of repression in dealing with our own people especially in the young life of our Church.

There was before your Committee a communication from the Lord's Day Alliance of the United States asking three things: First, our approval of its work; second, the appointment of representatives to its councils; third, the pledge of financial support. We most heartily endorse the work of the Lord's Day Alliance, the purpose of which is to defend and maintain the American Sunday as a day of rest and spiritual opportunity, inherent under the Constitution of the United States and guaranteed under the laws of this state. To unite the Christian citizenship of this State and all others holding to those objectives, in a concerted effort to secure these objects and to abolish all unnecessary Sunday labor.

Recommendations.

We therefore recommend the appointment of two representatives to the Board of Managers of the State Alliance for Arkansas, namely, Rev. J. M. Hughey and Rev. Eli Myers.

We do not see our way at this time to adopt another special day, nor to add another item of assessment to our Conference Budget; yet we do urge our pastors to preach definitely and strongly upon the need of Sabbath observance calling the attention of our people to the Lord's Day Alliance, to the action of our Conference, of the General Conference with regard to it, and also to give each congregation an opportunity to contribute to this work.

We would pledge ourselves as a Conference to a more diligent study of God's word, to a better observance of the Communion in all our country Churches and that our Stations observe the Communion at least once a month and that as Preachers and people we give ourselves afresh for the tremendous task before us in answering the cry of a torn and bleeding world.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Your Sunday School Board reviews the work of the Sunday School in the Conference during the last year with a deep sense of gratitude to Almighty God for the leadership of the Holy Spirit in this work and for the success that has been achieved during the year. The work as a whole has made remarkable growth and in certain directions has not been surpassed by any Conference in Southern Methodism. For this record the Board desires to express its thanks and appreciation to the Conference Superintendent of Sunday School work who has labored day and night for the success of this work, to Mr. and Mrs. Fowler who have rendered such excellent service in their respective fields, to the many volunteer workers who have given freely of their time and to every Presiding Elder and Pastor who has co-operated in the plans and programs of the Board. Only by such splendid co-operation and support could the success of this year's work have been achieved.

REVIEW OF THE YEAR'S WORK:

Orphanage: On a goal of \$1000.00 for the two Arkansas Conferences in the Christmas offering for the Orphanage, \$2500.00 were sent by the Sunday Schools to the Orphanage.

Sunday School Membership: The pastors' reports show an increase in the Sunday School membership of the Conference for this year of 2291. The total Sunday School enrollment in the Conference is 61,301.

Training Work: Ten successful Standard Training Schools, a large number of non-standard training schools, and many training classes have been conducted this year; 132 preachers and local preachers have earned 335 credits this year. This record has not yet been surpassed in any other Annual Conference. The total of credits earned in the Conference during this year is 1483. In this connection we desire to express our appreciation and endorsement of the work being done along this line in our Church Colleges and especially of the excellent report of this work in Galloway College.

Missionary Work: There has been a quickening of interest in the payment of Centenary pledges during the year. The Board of Missions reports that the Centenary work in our Sunday School is in fine shape. A total of \$11,696.00 has been reported by the preachers as raised for missions in the Sunday Schools of the Conference this year.

Organized Classes: The promotion of the organization of Bible classes has resulted in 151 new classes during the year. This Conference leads all others in the number of new classes reported up to November first.

Rural Work: Our rural worker has done extensive work in

five Districts during the year. The Board greatly regrets that its financial condition is such that the services of Brother Fowler cannot be retained for the coming year.

Elementary Work: Mrs. Fowler has given splendid leadership to the elementary workers of the Conference. Elementary Institutes have been held in every District, 275 key women secured, Children's Week and Standard Departments promoted and many schools have introduced graded lessons. The Board desires to express its appreciation of the services of Mrs. Fowler and regrets that she withdraws, voluntarily, from the service of the Board.

Sunday School Day: Much of the work of the Board has been made possible financially by the splendid response on Sunday School Day offerings. The Treasurer of the Board reports \$5664.90 on this account, fifty per cent of which has been returned to the Districts for District work.

Round-Up Campaign: The round-up Campaign, originating in the thought of our Conference Superintendent, has been very successful and has received the commendation of Sunday School workers all over the connection. The results of this great undertaking may be seen from the following report covering eight Districts:

Meetings with District Workers 28, Programs of Work placed during the Campaign 119, Programs of Work now placed in the Conference 251, Number of Seals on these Programs 959, Number of Progressive Schools in the Conference 35, Number of Advanced Schools in the Conference 7, Number of Standard Schools in the Conference 5, Number of Schools reporting observance of Children's Week 37.

RECOMMENDATIONS AND REQUESTS

The Board is requesting the General Sunday School Board to establish at Mount Sequoyah a Leadership Training School for this section of the Church that will measure up to the standard of the Junaluska Leadership School. We urge all our Sunday School workers to take advantage of the opportunity in this school when it is established.

It is the purpose of the Board to return to the District Staff of each District fifty per cent of the offering received on Sunday School Day to be used in approved District work.

We express great appreciation to the Schools of the Conference for the liberal offerings this year and urge them to give the same cooperation in this matter during the coming year.

We urge every pastor and Sunday School Superintendent in the Conference to take a Christmas Offering for the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage, and forward the same to Dr. James Thomas, Exchange Bank Building, Little Rock, Arkansas.

The Board concurs in a resolution coming from the Trustees of Valley Springs Training School, which has been presented to the Conference by the Board of Education. This Board pledges its support to the Valley Springs School by encouraging organized Bible classes to direct their gifts to this School.

We recommend that the Commission on Budget grant the Board an assessment of \$10,000.00 the same as last year.

The Board recommends that the Conference adopt the following resolution:

RESOLUTION

Whereas, representatives of the Western Assembly, the General Sunday School Board, the Little Rock Conference Board, and this Board in a meeting called by the Presiding Bishop during the session of this Conference, are unanimous in agreement that the time has come for the establishment of a Leadership Training School for all the territory west of the Mississippi River at Mount Sequoyah under the direction of the General Sunday School Board, therefore,

Be It Resolved, First, that the Director of Training Work of the General Sunday School Board be requested to call a meeting of the Conference Board Chairmen and the Conference Superintendents of Sunday School work of the Conferences west of the Mississippi River to meet in Nashville, Tennessee, between the ninth and eighteenth of December during the session of the General Sunday School Council to consider plans for the establishment of such Leadership School for said western territory and that a representative of the Western Assembly be invited to sit in council with them.

Second: That the Program Committee of the Western Assembly be requested to invite a representative of each of the General Boards to work out correlation of Programs to be offered at the Western Assembly during 1924.

The Board desires to record its appreciation of the services of C. D. Metcalf, Treasurer, who has brought to the service of the Board the same accuracy in accounting for every penny of the Boards funds which characterizes the work of a banker.

The Board desires to express its appreciation of the many courtesies extended to the Conference Superintendent by the Missouri Pacific and Frisco Railroads during the year.

At the request of the Board of Managers of the Summer School at Hendrix College we nominate H. E. Wheeler, and W. A. Lindsay as the representatives of this Board on the Board of Managers of the Summer School.

We recommend the appointment of H. E. Wheeler as Conference Superintendent of Sunday School work for the ensuing year.

TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

We thank God that the forces of the liquor traffic are pushed and crowded to a last stand. The land is being purged from this awful curse. We bemoan the laxity on the part of some of our State, City, and County officials to conform to and keep their oath of office in the enforcement of all law, particularily the Eighteenth Amendment and the Volstead Act, and we most urgently recommend not only the enforcement of this law but the active prosecution and punishment of those guilty of its violation.

We recognize the need of the church in this crucial hour to move forward as a *solid unit* in order to defeat the liquor element in their contemplated political campaigns, to put such men in office as will pledge themselves to further their interests. The wets are especially active at this time because they know that if they must be successful in staging a reaction against Prohibition, it must be done quickly, as the dry cause is growing in popularity as its benefits are more clearly apparent. The drys themselves will be to blame if through indifference a backward step is taken.

We commend the effective work of the Anti-Saloon League of America and our own state department under the leadership of Brother Paul E. Kemper, Superintendent, and we pledge him our undivided support. We offer him our pulpits; we shall urge the fullest co-operation on the part of our people and thus preserve to the church and to humanity the fruits of Prohibition.

We also commend our good women in the work they are doing through the W. C. T. U., for it was largely through their long years of ceaseless and powerful agitation that the sentiment was created which finally resulted in the elimination of the legalized liquor traffic.

The use of tobacco, especially in the form of cigaretts, is to be deeply regretted, and in order that we may deliver ourselves more effectively upon this evil, we recommend that all our preachers and people abstain from the use of tobacco in all its forms.

REV. BANKS M. BURROW.

Rev. Banks M. Burrow, son of Rev. A. L. and Mrs. E. R. Burrow, was born near Jackson, Tennessee, January 17, 1860. He moved to Arkansas with his parents in 1869. He was educated in Central Institute, Altus, Arkansas, and in Vanderbilt University, receiving a B. D. degree from the latter insti-



tution. He was licensed to preach in 1892, and joined the Arkansas Conference in the fall of the same year. His first charge was the Perryville Circuit. He afterwards filled such stations as Rogers, Springdale, Waldron and Alma. His last charge was Quitman Station, to which he was appointed in 1917.

On April 5, 1918, he was stricken with paralysis and never recovered, being a helpless invalid until his death. He died at the home of his mother in Altus, March 24, 1923, and was buried at Ozark. In 1911 he was married to Miss Jennie Sullivan, who lived only about one year.

Brother Burrow was a devout, good man, extremely careful and conscientious in all things. He was quiet and retiring, which at times caused him to be misunderstood. He was a good preach-

er, especially for the thoughtful and religious. He was a helpful pastor, much loved by the old people and invalids. I have never known a man to be called back to former charges to conduct as many funerals as was Brother Burrow. He was very fond of children and did some of his best work with them.

Thus lived and labored as one of our number, a clean, manly, useful man. Now that he has gone, we feel sure of his place in the House of Many Mansions.

REV. YOUNG ALEXANDER GILMORE.

Rev. Young Alexander Gilmore was born in Vernon, Alabama, November 10, 1858. When about twenty years old, he came to Arkansas. In 1885 he was admitted on trial into the Arkansas Conference. He served numerous circuits and one district during the more than thirty years of his itinerant min-



istry. After his superannuation he served as agent for the Arkansas Children's Home Finding Society. He died April 24, 1923. His remains lie in the cemetery near Rogers, where sleep many of his relatives.

In 1894 he was married to Miss Mattie Blocher. Three sons were born to them. The first-born, Rev. O. T. Gilmore, after graduating from both Hendrix and Southern Methodist University, was sent to Charlottesville, Va., as student pastor. He is now rendering efficient service there. Harlan, the next son, after graduating from Hendrix accepted a position in the Camden public schools, but is preparing for foreign missionary work. Charles, the third son, is a student in Hendrix College, and he is also a steward in the church for college students.

His widow, who stood so faithfully by his side during all the joys and sorrows incident to the life of an itinerant Methodist minister, survives and

still resides in Conway. Brother Gilmore was one preacher who succeeded with his children. These three young men are a credit to their parents.

Brother Gilmore had the Pauline qualifications for an elder or bishop: "One that ruleth well his own house, having his children in subjection with all gravity. For if a man know not how to rule his own house how shall he take care of the church of God?"

Brother Gilmore was neither brilliant nor eloquent, nor was he a scholar, but he was faithful and dependable. He was able to endure hardness as a good soldier of Christ. Men such as he was are needed for the hard places in the Kingdom. How few are they who in seeming obscurity and on meagre salary will uncomplainingly accept the task of preaching the Gospel in the remote places. Such a man was Gilmore. All honor to him and his kind, and may the tribe increase, as we struggle to establish the Kingdom of God in the undeveloped fields. May his life be an inspiration to every one of us whose task is hard and whose remuneration is small.

REV, EDWIN S. HARRIS.

The Rev. Edwin S. Harris was born at Dyersburg, Tennessee, October 25, 1868. He was well born. He was the son of Rev. W. T. Harris, D. D., long one of the leading members of the Memphis Conference, and the grandson of Rev. G. W. D. Harris, D. D., one of the pioneer Methodist preachers

of West Tennessee. He was thus thrown under religious influence which followed him through his whole life.



He inherited not only good blood, but a bright intellect. Deep thought and oratory have been characteristic of his ancestors, and were marked characteristics of his. He knew the doctrines of Christianity and Methodism from his childhood. They were absorbed by him. When he grew to manhood he thought these things through for himself, so that later in life these doctrines were reinforced by a happy conversion and divine change of heart. He believed in experience and testified to it when he came to the crossing.

After he became a minister he met Miss Iva Irion of Paris, Tennessee, a daughter of Dr. and Mrs. J. T. Irion, of precious memory. It was indeed a

happy day for him when Miss Irion became his wife. For a number of years until his health gave way, she was faithful in the itinerancy. She counted it a great joy and honor to be thus privileged. To this union were born seven children, two of whom preceded their father to the glory land.

Brother Harris was courtly in his bearing. He did not know how to be otherwise than kind and gentle to all. In his home life he ingratiated himself into the hearts and lives of his children.

In his relation to his children he was so gentle and devoted that they all loved and honored him. He loved his home; it was to him the dearest of places. When he was called from home on an errand, when his mission was ended he immediately returned home. When away from home he made it a rule to write back home each day. He would write poems to his children. on special days and occasions. No wonder his family adored him.

Naturally he had a strong mind, and he sought diligently to store it with valuable information that greatly helped him in life. He read a great deal and enjoyed it. He knew science, history, law, theology, and all but to his

dying day read, and when he could not read, had others to read to him. Hence he was prepared to converse intelligently upon almost any subject.

He joined the Memphis Conference some twenty-eight years ago, and filled some of its best appointments, to the satisfaction and joy of the congregations.

He was a minister of no mean ability. He brought all his accumulated knowledge and laid it at the feet of our Lord. He had great mental and spiritual grasp on the things that are eternal. His exposition of the Scriptures was illuminating, strengthening and comforting. Not unlike most of God's children, he was called upon to suffer in spirit and body, but these experiences had their refining, transforming influences. Whatever of dross there may have been in him was burned up by the fires of affliction. His friends could more and more see the gentle, tender, humble, patient, submissive spirit that was in our Christ. The North Arkansas Conference, of which he was a member when he died, I dare say, did not know him at his best. While in that Conference he was broken in health and making a desperate struggle to get on his feet physically, but he made the very best contribution in service of which he was capable. On June last, he came back within the bounds of the Memphis Conference to the city of Paris, Tennessee, to live, yea, rather to die, among friends. He evidently knew, or had known, for some time that his stay was brief, and by God's grace he was made fully ready for his departure. Surrounded by his family and friends he gradually slipped away and went home.

The funeral services were held by the writer, assisted by Rev. D. J. Russell, at the First Methodist Church of Paris, Tennessee, and we laid his body to rest in beautiful Maplewood Cemetery, with the floral offerings of friends literally covering his grave.



REV. DAVID J. WEEMS.

Rev. David J. Weems was born at Abbeville, South Carolina, January 4, 1847, and died at Conway, Arkansas, May 21, 1923. Brother Weems was a Confederate soldier. At the close of the war he attended old Emory College and graduated in the class of 1870. He was licensed to preach and joined the North Georgia Conference, M. E. Church, South, in 1870. His first work in this Conference was Waldron Circuit, two years 1881-2, and in 1883 Ozark Station, 1884-7 Van Buren Station, 1888-9 Presiding Elder of Clarksville District, 1890, 1, 2, 3, Presiding Elder of the Morrilton District, 1894, 5, 6 Presiding Elder of the Fort Smith District, 1897 Dardanelle Station, 1898, 9 Prairie Grove Circuit, 1900, 1, 2 Paris Station, 1903, 4, 5 Agent for Galloway College, 1906-1914 Field Editor for the West-

ern Methodist, 1915-23 Agent and District Superintendent for the Arkansas Children's Home at Little Rock.

REV. JOHN SCORE.

The Rev. John Score was born in Skien, Norway, on June 18, 1865, the sixth son of Bishop and Mrs. J. N. Score, of the Established Church of that country. Passing through the usual preparatory schools he graduated with honors from the Royal Frederick University, Christiana, with the M. A. De-



gree, the highest conferred by that great institution. This was in 1884, and for the six following years he acted as Episcopal Secretary for his father and official reporter for one of the Christiana dailies. In 1890 he came to this country, and as soon as legally possible he became a naturalized citizen. After spending some time in other states, in 1892 he went to Lutesville, Bollinger County, Missouri. It so befell that the Rev. J. A. Russell, known as "Uncle Joe," was at that time holding revival services in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, he being pastor of the Marble Hill Circuit. At the altar Brother Score knelt and found peace. In his broken English, with shouts of praise, he gave God the glory, and prayer, the birth of a soul, came from his lips with great power for those who knelt with him, and they shortly entered into

like joy. Realizing that Brother Score's case was no ordinary one, Brother Russell, whose circuit had seventeen appointments, took the convert with him to help him in his protracted meetings. His gifts were so marked that the church recognized his divine call, and at the Fourth Quarterly Conference, held at Gravelly Hill, presided over by Rev. Henry Hanesworth, has was licensed to preach. For two years he served as a supply, and in Sept. 1894, he was admitted on trial in the St. Louis Conference, and appointed to Garfield Circuit. In 1895 he married Miss Marie Ebrachs, and of this union two children were born, John N. Russell, now pastor of the church at Berkesey, California, and Caroline.

In turn he served the following Charges: Bertrand, Caruthersville, Mount Zion, Manchester, Marvin Memorial, Clayton, Kansas City, Kansas; then being transferred to this Conference he served Aubrey, Parkin, West Helena, and was returned for the second year to McCrory, from which little city, where he was so much beloved, he passed on April 11, 1923, to "the City which hath foundations whose builder and maker is God."

As a man, Brother Score was a unique personality, and his uniqueness lent charm to his life. Having convictions, he stood by them, courting no man's favor and fearing no man's frown. Of the stuff of which martyrs are made, the only question with him was, What is the right? That settled, he was ready to do, to dare, to die, if need be. Those who knew him best loved him most. From the beginning of his ministry he was recognized as an evangelistic preacher. His work was with power. His was no barren ministry. Hundreds whom he led to Christ will be the crown of his rejoicing at the final gathering of the saints. As a pastor he was faithful and diligent; he suffered no interest of the church to be neglected. He worked at his task even when suffering as only himself and his God knew how sorely.

The body of our deceased brother was taken to Manchester, Missouri, and laid to rest beside his wife, who passed away in 1912, and there awaits the hour when this mortal shall put on immortality and death be swallowed up in victory.

REV. JAMES H. O'BRYANT.

Rev. James Henry O'Bryant was born in Panola, County Mississippi, on January 9, 1869, and died at Earle, Arkansas, September 16, 1923.

He moved with his parents to Crawford county, Arkansas, about 1882, and grew up on a farm. He attended the poorly equipped, and often poorly



taught country schools, from two to four months a year, until he was grown; then he attended Hendrix, and Hiram Lydia Colleges, at Altus, for two years. He married Fru Anna Southard on September 9, 1891.

Early in life he joined the Methodist church, being an active member from the first. When Jim, as he was known among his friends, was fourteen years old, he was instrumental in organizing a young men's prayer meeting, which continued every Wednesday night for nearly two years and out of which came four preachers, three others following later when the prayer meeting had become community-wide.

During his College life at Altus, in 1890, Brother O'Bryant was licensed to preach, and was sent in the fall of that year as supply on the Van Bu-

ren Circuit, serving one year, and Altus Circuit one year. At Clarksville, in 1893, he was admitted on trial into the Arkansas Conference. He was ordained Deacon December 9, 1894, by Bishop Eugene Hendrix, at Quitman, Arkansas, and Elder on November 19, 1898, by Bishop H. C. Morrison, at Morriton.

Brother O'Bryant, as a member of the Conference, served the following charges: Hartman Circuit one year, Ozark Circuit one year, Fort Smith Circuit three years, Greenwood Circuit two years, Rogers Station two years, Harrison District three years, Russellville one year, Dardanelle District four years, Rogers Station two years, Booneville Station three years, Booneville District two years, Searcy District one year, Commissioner of Galloway College one year, Forest City one year, Paragould two years, and from December until his death, Earle.

Twice he represented his Conference as a member of the General Conference. Brother O'Bryant leaves a wife, a son, Ernest, who now plans to give his life to the service of God in the Methodist ministry; two married daughters, Mrs. R. B. Craig and Mrs. J. K. Fraser, and Miss Eunice, now completing her course in Scarrett Bible and Training School, preparatory to giving her life to the church.

Brother O'Bryant was a man four square. He was honest with friend and foe. No guess was necessary as to where he stood, for he clearly ex-

pressed himself. He was brave, knowing no fear. He was a friend to the fullest, never forsaking one, but, if necessary, fighting harder for a friend than for himself.

From the Arkansas Methodist of September 20, 1923, I read these fitting "Strong physically and mentally, he was always ready for hard work. Deep and tenacious in his convictions he was a loyal friend or a vigorous opponent. Deeply emotional, as well as logical, he was an effective preacher Naturally pugnacious he was also deeply religious and ready to champion every cause which met his approval. He was full of energy and almost tireless."

A strong man, a convincing preacher, and at times a powerful orator, and a noble Christian has gone from us. He was a born leader and his power was feit in the Conference. His vigorous and powerful spirit broke under a weakening body and he died, preferring death to living with a declining body and mind. He lived a busy life, enriching many lives by his ministry. A number of young men in this Conference today remember him as a spiritual father.

The sunset had a radiant glow, the breezes blew soft and the fragrance of the evening was rich. When asked what his parting message to the young was, he replied. "Jesus Christ and Him crucified." For an hour before his death he sat in a chair and talked of the experiences past, the beauty of friendship and the labors of a life. To the writer that hour was an oasis rich. As he lay back in bed, he said, "That is all," and went home. His last effort on earth was to make a sermon on the subject, "Jesus Christ and the Young." May heaven grant him the privilege of making and preaching it through the eternities. J. J. GALLOWAY.

He was changed by his Presiding Elder to Waldron Circuit about April 1st, where he served till his death July 2nd. He had thus spent nearly eleven years as an active Supply on some of our most difficult circuits.

He was a man of herioc mould. At the age of forty-five a laboring man from the ranks of the toilers, supporting his three sisters, and with limited educational qualifications he came into the Ministry and soon developed into one of our strongest gospel preachers.

He was married to Mrs. Cora Russell, December 11, 1916, who labored

faithfully with him in the Master's vineyard.

He was of the prophet type. Honest, sincere and clean in his own life and conduct he had little patience with dishonesty, insincerity and immorality in the life and conduct of others. He would reprove and rebuke with all fearlessness. If it brought loss of place or popularity he cared not but seemed rather to glory in that which caused affiction or persecution for Christ's saks.

Against poverty and lack of training he fought a good fight. In a firm faith in the love of Christ, the authenticity of the Bible and the doctrines of the Methodist church he labored, loved and died. Rounding out more than ten years of sacrificial service as Methodist Supply with never a living wage, with a clean record as a man, a Mason and a Minister he finished his course, and there is henceforth laid up for him a crown of righteousness.
