Question 14 was called. *What preachers have died during the year?*

After various announcements the Conference adjourned with the singing of the Doxology and benediction pronounced by Dr. A. C. Millar.

SECOND DAY

Conway, Arkansas, November 26, 1925.

The Conference met at 8:30 a. m., Bishop Hay presiding. Hymn No. 312 was sung. Dr. A. C. Millar led in prayer. The Conference sang Hymn No. 334.

Rev. Arthur Moore, pastor of Travis Park Church, San Antonio, Texas, gave an instructive and inspiring message on the "Personality of the Holy Spirit."

The Conference adjourned with singing the Doxology and prayer by Bro. Moore.

THIRD DAY

Conway, Arkansas, November 27, 1925.

The Conference convened at 8:30, Bishop Hay presiding. Hymn No. 334 was sung. J. F. Jernigan led in prayer. The Conference sang Hymn No. 317. Arthur Moore preached on the "Witness of the Spirit." The Bishop briefly addressed the Conference.

Reports of Boards and Committees

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The American Bible Society reports a year of great blessings and wonderful achievements. The distribution last year reached some seven million volumes, while the number of languages reached seven hundred and seventy-eight. The Southwestern Agency, with headquarters in Dallas, Texas, with Rev. J. J. Morgan as Agency Secretary, had a marvelous distribution, reaching a grand total of two hundred and ninety-three thousand seven hundred and twenty-nine volumes. A large increase over any previous year. The distribution consisted of forty-two different languages, among the one hundred thousand Indians in Oklahoma, the two hundred fifty thousand French and sixty thousand Italians of Louisiana and the many thousands of Mexicans in Texas.

Of this distribution, Rev. D. H. Colquette, who maintains a depository in Little Rock, Arkansas, reports a distribution of sixty-two thousand one hundred and seventy-five last year, which will be increased to seventy-five thousand by the close of the present year. To accomplish this he has traveled ten thousand miles and finished visiting some one hundred jails, hospitals, and eleemosynary institutions in the state, preaching the Gospel and trying to help the many hundred people who are inmates in these places.

We recommend,

1. That our Conference heartily endorse the work of Bro. Colquette and pledge ourselves to assist him in carrying forward this fundamental work in Christian Religion.

2. That in commemoration of the four hundredth anniversary of the first English Bible translated by William Tyndale, the first Sabbath in December, be used in co-operation with other Protestant peoples as Bible Sunday.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

There is scarcely any arm of the church so necessary as

the making and distribution of Christian Literature. Our publishing interests have a right to expect our heartiest cooperation. We should not embarrass them and cripple our great church by failing in this matter.

The report from Lamar and Barton, our publishing agents, shows the following interesting facts:

First: \$122,000 sales increase for the past year.

Second: \$100,000 added to the superannuate fund against \$60,000 last year, and this in spite of the fact that \$785,000 have been spent for improvement and new buildings, and the business is on a cash basis.

Third: The one sad item of the report was that the Christian Advocate does not have as large a subscription list as last year. We believe that this paper is as good now or better than it has been in the past and a special effort should be put forth to place it in at least the home of every church official.

We wish to urge that every member of this Conference appoint himself as seller of good books, that his ministry may be a full one. The board makes the following recommendations:

First: That suggestions contained in the supplementary report be adopted in order that our own paper, The Arkansas Methodist, may fulfill its mission to Arkansas Methodism.

Second: That Dr. A. C. Millar be continued as Editor and Rev. J. C. Glenn as Associate Editor, and we wish to commend in the highest terms both the editorial policy and the financial status of the paper as being perhaps the most unusual in all of Southern Methodism.

Third: That F. S. H. Johnston, R. C. Morehead and J. M. Williams be continued as commissioners of the Arkansas Methodist.

Fourth: That the commissioners be empowered to purchase a building for the housing of the plant if in their judgment it can be done without incurring undue obligations.

Fifth: That we recommend all our church periodicals, Missionary Voice, Methodist Review, Epworth Era, and Laymen's Magazine and urge that members of this conference enlarge the several subscription lists of these papers as much as possible.

Sixth: That the Board of Finance allot \$2000.00 for the Arkansas Methodist.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

The presidents of the three colleges and the secondary schools were before us and have impressed us with the imperative need for larger resources for these colleges. Larger resources are clearly necessary if they are to continue their present work. Therefore we recommend that Henderson-Brown College, Galloway College, and Hendrix College, Sloan Hendrix and Valley Springs be authorized to enter the field for such funds as they may need for buildings, equipment and endowment, and that this Conference pledge the loyal support of the Church within its bounds in the execution of such plans for securing needed funds as the Trustees of the College may adopt.

Christian Education Pledges.

Having heard from the Rev. R. C. Morehead, Secretary-Treasurer of the Christian Education Movement, the matters submitted to your Board, we respectfully submit the following:

1. We beg to call attention to the fact that this is the fifth year for collecting the Christian Education pledges, and that it is supremely important to press the collection of these pledges now or our schools will suffer large losses.

2. Whereas, there has been a special agreement between the Board of Missions and the Board of Education through

their representatives, Dr. R. H. Ruff for the Board of Missions and Dr. H. H. Sherman for the Board of Education, which agreement is as follows:

"After conference between representatives of the Board of Missions and the Board of Education, it has been mutually agreed that the pastors and local congregations will not be expected to take up the special plan of the Board of Missions to meet the emergency upon it until they first have made an earnest and vigorous effort to collect the pledges to the Christian Education Movement."

Therefore, be it resolved that the North Arkansas Conference concurs in the above agreement and that the months of November and December shall be devoted to **most earnest** efforts to secure the payment of the pledges to the Christian Education Movement.

Report No. 2

The report of our General Board of Education was before us. It shows that there has been a great expansion in the work of the General Board throughout the Church. The educational pledge for our Conference was \$460,521.00 and we have paid only \$174,691.00. The balance is urgently needed.

We recommend that Rev. R. C. Morehead be reappointed Secretary-Treasurer of the Christian Education Movement for our Conference, that we continue to make the Life Service appeal in our own congregations, that we keep up our Ministerial Aid Fund and add to it by gifts or bequests, and we consider carefully the question of Religious Education in tax-supported institutions, and that we make application to the General Board for any help needed in such work.

That Rev. Harry King represent the North Arkansas Conference Board of Education at the Methodist Educational Conference in Memphis.

SOUTHERN METHODIST UNIVERSITY

Southern Methodist University continues to enjoy healthy growth. Their endowment is increasing, and they plan to increase it still further. We urge all young people, especially the young ministers, to avail themselves of the opportunities offered by Southern Methodist University.

GALLOWAY WOMAN'S COLLEGE

Galloway College reports a steady growth in enrollment, building and endowment. The new Science Building erected by the Alumnae under the able leadership of Miss Hayes is completed and occupied. There is no better building and equip-

ment in the state. We commend the work of Miss Hayes, and the work of Rev. H. H. Griffin. We also recommend that Rev. H. H. Griffin be reappointed as Financial Commissioner of the College. We further recommend that Rev. Vance Womack and Mr. Jake Bateman be elected to the Board of Trustees to take the places of Rev. F. S. H. Johnston and Mr. F. M. Daniel, whose terms are expiring, and that Mrs. W. D. Polk of Corning be elected to membership on the Board to fill the place created by the New Charter giving women a place on the Board.

HENDERSON-BROWN COLLEGE

Henderson-Brown reports a large increase in library endowment and loan fund, and good progress in the endowment for the Foster Bible Chair. We commend them in this work, and note with extreme pleasure the high plane on which they are placing their work.

We recommend:

That Rev. J. J. Galloway be re-appointed Executive Secretary for the College; that the Board of Trustees be permitted to increase its number to twenty-one, and that Rev. J. M. Hughey and D. L. Ford be elected to succeed themselves as members of the Board, and that Mr. Van A. R. Moores be elected to succeed Mr. W. P. Jones, resigned; and that pastors and people give careful consideration to the needs of this College.

HENDRIX COLLEGE

Hendrix is enjoying a phenomenal growth in numbers and in the quality of work being done. Hendrix finds herself embarrassed by lack of equipment and teaching and library space but is working earnestly to overcome this.

The Department of Rural Life has had a phenomenal growth. It is doing a constructive piece of Home Mission and Educational work and deserves our hearty support. We recommend that one Sunday in the year be set aside as Rural Life Sunday; that the Methodist Commission on Rural Life in Arkansas fix the date, distribute appropriate literature, that the work of the Rural Life Department be explained in the churches on that day, and that a voluntary offering be taken for the support of the Department. There should be raised in the Conference about \$3,000.00 for this work. We further recommend that Dr. F. S. H. Johnston be elected to succeed himself on the Board of Trustees.

SLOAN-HENDRIX ACADEMY

The past year Sloan-Hendrix has had a steady growth. Her new plant is largely completed. Several thousands of dollars worth of equipment has been added, the number of students has increased, the alumni have built and equipped a five thousand dollar gymnasium. This is a most excellent report. We commend this school to our people, and recommend that they be given the privilege of going before the people to raise the money needed to fully equip their school. We must either adequately support or abandon our Secondary schools. We further recommend that Charles R. Stuck and F. M. Daniel be elected to succeed themselves on the Board of Trustees, and that Rev. J. F. Glover be appointed Superintendent of the school to succeed Prof. R. C. Eaton, resigned. We wish to commend most heartily the noble and lasting work done by Prof. Eaton, the retiring principal.

VALLEY SPRNGS TRAINING SCHOOL

This school shows marvelous growth and development in spite of its youth, its limited resources and equipment. The new building is partially completed and they need funds to complete the work. We commend this cause to our people, and urge that Valley Springs Training School be given permission to go before the people to raise the amount needed.

Prof and Mrs. M. J. Russell are doing a magnificent work at great personal sacrifice, and we beseech for them the prayers and support of our church.

We recommend that Mrs. S. G. Smith be elected to succeed herself on the Board of Trustees.

Report No. 3

Assessments

For the ensuing Conference we recommend that the following assessments be levied: Hendrix College, \$5,000.00; Henderson-Brown College, \$5000.00; Galloway Woman's College, \$5000.00; Valley Springs Training School, \$2,500.00; Sloan-Hendrix Academy, \$2,500.00; Pastor's School at Hendrix College, \$1,500.00; Student Pastor, Central Church, Fayetteville, \$500.00; Student Pastor, First Church, Conway, \$500.00.

We recommend that the General Board of Education appropriate \$1,500.00 for Valley Springs Training School; \$1,500.00 for Sloan-Hendrix Academy; \$1,000.00 for the Student Pastor at Central Church, Fayetteville, and \$600.00 for the Student Pastor, First Church, Conway.

THE EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD

1. Your Epworth League Board is gratified to note the large progress which has been made in the development of the League program throughout the Conference.

2. The North Arkansas Conference continues in first place in Southern Methodist Leaguedom in that it has thirty per cent more gold seal chapters than any other Conference in the connection.

3. We note with pleasure that the Leaguers at our summer Assembly at Galloway College earned 30 per cent more credits this year than the year before in spite of a small decrease in attendance. This indicates a greater sincerity of purpose and a higher quality of work on the part of the young people.

4. Your Conference Epworth League Board is continuing its cooperation with other League Boards in the completion of the Epworth League Building Program at Mount Sequoyah. We urge on pastors to encourage the young people of their churches to attend the Epworth League Summer School at Mount Sequoyah.

5. We heartily commend the plans for the Methodist Young People's Convention to be held at Memphis, December 31 to January 3rd, and urge our pastors to secure its maximum value to the church by encouraging a general interest and seeing to it that the full quota allowed each church is in attendance.

6. The Board has adopted for its policy in 1926, the following:

a. That the Conference Epworth League Board endorse and seek to cooperate with the plans of our General Epworth League Board and with the staff officers of our own Conference.

b. That the Board promote a Conference wide campaign for the observance of Epworth League Anniversary Day, the

fourth Sunday in March in all our Chapters and that an offering be made which shall be sent to the Treasurer of the Conference Board; and that where there is no League the pastor be urged to observe Young Peoples Day.

c. That the Conference Board under the leadership of its chairman present the League Program clearly at each of the District Conferences.

d. That the members of the Conference Board stand ready to serve the cabinet officers in promoting inter-group meetings of League Chapters.

e. That the Conference Board cooperate with the Methodist Commission on Rural Church Life in Arkansas to develop a joint program of work for the rural church.

7. Recommendations:

a. That A. B. Barry be elected to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of W. C. Johnston.

b. That S. B. Wiggins be elected to fill the vacancy made by the transfer of Leland Clegg.

c. That S. B. Wiggins be elected to serve with G. E. Patchel as our representatives on the Board of Managers of the Hendrix Pastors' School.

d. That B. C. Few be elected as our representative on the Methodist Commission on Rural Church Life in Arkansas.

e. That the Conference allow this Board an Assessment of \$2,000, the same as last year.

HOSPITAL BOARD

Your Hospital, located in the City of Memphis, has been a busy institution during the past year. There were 3148 admissions and 297 babies born, making a total of 3445 patients. Of these 1813 came from the city of Memphis, 470 from Tennessee, 465 from Mississippi, 297 from Arkansas, 50 from Missouri, the rest from other states. Of the 297 babies born, 270 were from Memphis, 14 from Tennessee, 6 from Arkansas, 4 from Mississippi, the rest from other states:

The following denominations were represented: Methodist 1291, Baptists 391, Presbyterians 390, Episcopalians 191, Disciples 139, Catholics 119, no church affiliations 251, the rest from other faiths.

We desire to call your attention to the free work done by your Hospital. For the past twelve months the actual cost of this work was \$40,000.00. 17 pastors, or the dependent members of their families, from the North Arkansas Conference, 21

from the North Mississippi Conference, and 33 from the Memphis Conference, received free service.

Every Methodist should point with pride to the beautiful setting, the splendid buildings and unexcelled equipment of our Hospital. And all should gratefully appreciate the wonderful service rendered to the sick and suffering. We venture there is no other similar institution in the land, unless it be privately endowed or State supported, which does so large a percentage of free work.

The Hospital is practically always crowded to its limit, and many are being turned away because there is no room. In view of the great need of this kind of service, and our ability to supply the need, it is a reproach to us that the Hospital is not already two or three times as large as it is. There can be no hopeful contemplation of enlargement until the \$300,000.00 debt has been paid. With \$18,000.00 to pay yearly in interest, it will not be possible to continue the great record of free service unless we shall make provision for paying this debt. Without this free service the Hospital would not in the full sense be a Christian Institution, and it would only in part fulfill the mission for which it was founded. Nor would it be in harmony with the appeal which we have hitherto made for its support.

Our Conference has repeatedly committed itself to a full share in providing the Hospital's financial need. Every year for a great many we have raised thousands of dollars for this purpose by resolutions. At the same time we have put a pitifully small amount of money into the treasury. Your Hospital Board feels that its work will be futile unless we can get the Conference to take some action which will give to the Hospital a good measure of the support which we have so freely and repeatedly promised in the past.

To this end we request the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. Resolved, That we commit this Conference as a body and ourselves as individuals to a faithful effort to raise this year, 1925-1926, for the Hospital an amount from each charge equal to at least 50c per member. As pastors we agree to faithfully and clearly put this matter before our people and we hereby request the Boards of Stewards and the Woman's Missionary Societies of all the Churches to cooperate with the pastors in an earnest effort to secure this money.

We are glad to note that the Memphis and North Mississippi Conferences have adopted the above policy and we join with them gladly.

We have had the report of the General Hospital Board before us, and in accordance with their suggestion we hereby request the General Conference at its next session.

1st. To adopt a Hospital Policy that will grandly obey the command of Jesus to "heal the sick," and that will worthily represent our Church.

2nd. To relate the Golden Cross Movement and enrollment to the work-calendar of the local church in a wise and effective way.

3rd. To make such financial provisions for the General Hospital Board as will enable it to promote this ministry of healing.

We recommend the election of the following as Trustees for this Conference: Rev. Wm. Sherman, Rev. J. R. Nelson, W. E. Jelks, T. J. Boston, J. F. Fogleman and Mrs. Preston Hatcher.

BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

We are pleased to report substantial progress made in the lay activity work during the past year, but we earnestly urge that the Lay Organization in the entire Conference be perfected as speedily as possible along the lines prescribed by the Discipline.

In pursuance of the plan of work as recommended by the General Board of Lay Activities, your Committee has adopted for the coming year the same objectives for the work of lay-

men as those upon which we centered our work the past year, with special stress and emphasis to be placed upon:

- (1) Stewardship circulation.
- (2) Wesley Brotherhood Organization.

We heartily approve of the plan of work of the Methodist Commission on Rural Church Life in Arkansas, and appoint the Conference Lay Leader as the representative of our Board in this work.

We shall undertake to raise by plans to be worked out at a state meeting soon to be held of the district and associate district lay leaders an appointment of \$512 to aid the General Board in the enlarged program of work as worked out at the last meeting of the General Board, held at Lake Junaluska in August 1925. It was also decided to pledge 500 subscribers from our Conference for the Methodist Layman, and in addition efforts will be put forth in all the districts to add large numbers of subscribers to the Methodist Layman to the end that both laymen and preachers may be informed through this periodical of the plans and work of the Board of Lay Activities.

We earnestly pledge our best efforts to the Arkansas Methodist in its plan to put the Methodist under the "Club Subscription Plan" in the hands of every Methodist family in the Conference.

We urge that each District Lay Board act as a committee to secure as large attendance as possible at the Pastors' Summer School at Hendrix College.

We recommend that an assessment of \$1000.00 be made for the support of the Lay Activity work for the coming year.

We recommend that J. L. Bond be elected Conference Lay Leader.

We wish to acknowledge the help rendered by Mr. G. L. Morelock, General Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities who attended our meeting.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

Report No. 1

In report number one your Conference Board of Missions brings to your attention certain outstanding facts in our general missionary situation and proposes a plan by which the situation created can be met.

1. We are well past the Centennary period as originally set by the General Conference in the missionary work of our

Church. This practically doubled the scale of our work both in the home and foreign field. Money now coming from centenary collections must be used to pay off indebtedness incurred because of the tardiness of subscribers in paying these pledges, so cannot be used on current maintenance.

2. The present income from assessments will cover less than one-half the amount needed to maintain the present program of work even when the most drastic cuts in appropriations have been made that it is possible to make without inviting disaster in both home and foreign work.

3. Before relief from General Conference action can possibly reach them the General Board of Missions for its budget for 1926 must have \$750,000.00 or heavily retrench.

4. The time is inopportune for even considering a very considerable increase in assessments even for so great a cause as Christian missions.

5. The General Board in its May meeting did not vote a budget of appropriations for 1926 but is awaiting the outcome of this referendum to the annual conference before making this budget.

Now, therefore, in the light of these appalling facts and as an expression of our abiding interest in this great cause and its present great program throughout the world, be it resolved:

1. That the North Arkansas Conference favors a hearty, prompt and vigorous effort to secure at least its share of the needed \$750,000.00 or \$26,000.00 necessary to maintaining our work without retrenchment or retreat;

2. That in order to raise this additional amount we frankly accept our share, \$26,000.00; That we make a Conference-wide appeal for Missionary Specials both to churches and to individuals; That this situation along with the merits of the cause of missions be faithfully presented from each pulpit and an every-member canvass be made, giving everyone the privilege of coming to the rescue of our great cause in the hour of its need; and that the first Sunday in February be fixed as a date for making the appeal.

3. That we pledge ourselves not only to a loyal participation in the plan directed by the Conference, but to a diligent and urgent use of all the spiritual resources needed to achieve a purpose so gracious and so high.

Report No. 2

We are deeply grateful to the Almighty God for the movement of His Spirit which led our church into the Centenary Missionary Movement which has enriched the spirit of our people and inaugurated a new era of progress and advance of

the work of the Board of Missions. In this perilous hour we cannot for one moment think of entrenching. We must maintain our work and go forward. Therefore, the call comes for a courageous heroic leadership that the church may be brought through prayer and intercession to renewal of concentration and making of its spiritual life that its very soul may be awakened anew with the passion of Jesus Christ and a lost world. We recommend therefore,

First: That our people liquidate and settle up the Centenary in every congregation as soon as possible.

Second: That a district organization be set up in each Presiding Elder's District and that the every member canvass be made earlier in February to raise the \$26,000 the North Arkansas Conference share of the \$750,000 necessary to carry on our work.

Third: That Dr. O. E. Goddard, chairman of your Board of Missions be conference director and that each presiding elder be the director for his district.

Fourth: That a missionary institute be held in each presiding elder's district between January 15th, and the first Sunday in February when the appeal is to be made.

Fifth: That our pastors and officers see that the collections for mission is taken one Sunday in each month in every Sunday School and sent regularly to the Conference Treasurer of the Sunday School Board.

Sixth: We hereby express to bishop Hay our appreciation of the interest he has manifested in the matter of fuller collections and for his wise and sound administration touching this great interest of our church. We urge that our pastors and officials stress the importance of these collections being paid in full.

Seventh: Your Board of Missions gives hearty approval to the advanced position taken by Hendrix College in establishing a Rural Department looking to the education of our ministry and to the importance of our country work and that H. H. Griffin was selected as the representative of the Board of Missions to work with the representatives of other Boards of the Conference and Prof. Manny in this work.

Eighth: That we nominate as provided by the discipline to the Board of Missions of the next General Conference the following names from which to choose the members of the general board to-wit: Dr. O. E. Goddard, D. D., Clergyman, and Mrs. S. G. Smith, Layman.

Ninth: That Dr. F. S. H. Johnson be appointed Missionary Secretary without salary.

Tenth: We rejoice in the work that is being done by Prof. M. J. Russell at Valley Springs and commend him and the school to our people.

We recommend that the following be appointed Conference Evangelists: Rev. Norris Greer, Rev. S. M. Yancey, Rev. A. H. Dulaney, Rev. C. F. Hively and Rev. J. E. Snell.

We ask an assessment of \$13,500 be levied for our work the ensuing year.

Report of Centenary Secretary

This has been a year of adjustment and collection. Many changes have taken place in the local congregations since the pledges were made. Many have moved, some have died, others had become financially unable, and many others virtually refused to pay their pledges. Much of my time until April was consumed in eliminating these subscribers from the lists in the churches. While this adjustment did some good in relieving the churches of a large amount of impossible collections, it did not secure a very large amount of money. This, however, was not the immediate object of the adjustment work.

District meetings were held in all the districts to bring again the message of the Centenary to the church leaders and also the need of the mission fields of our Christ. I wish here to record officially and permanently my sincere thanks to all the preachers, Centenary Treasurers, and other lay workers for all the cooperation given me during this year.

The grand total collected in the North Arkansas Conference to December 1, 1925 is \$417,948.36.

It is the desire and plan of the Centenary Commission to urge all to pay who possibly can between now and next May—the end of the quadrennium. All who cannot pay in full will be given an opportunity to say when they can pay. The church cannot afford to keep up the Centenary organization for people who have subscribed and have not paid and will not say when they can pay.

The Centenary Commission proposes to close out the Centenary accounts as far as the local churches are concerned by April 1, 1926. We will not scrap these accounts but will use every method possible to collect the unpaid pledges, but will definitely relieve the local church of any further responsibility. All the Centenary cards and accounts of the local church treasurers will be brought to my office from which collection will be made. After this further relationship will be with the individual subscriber, except where special agreements or settlements have otherwise been arranged.

There should be a clear understanding by the Conference as to the relationship of the Centenary Commission to the debt of the Board of Missions. Confusion at this point should be avoided. The Board of Missions at its May meeting decided to apply its portion of all further Centenary receipts on the debt. This, of course, is the right and privilege of the Board. It should be understood that the Centenary Commission does not undertake the responsibility of paying the "mission debt."

The Centenary Secretaries and the Central Office can only do their best to secure payments on unpaid pledges and pay to each participating agency its share of the receipts. When this is done the Centenary obligations are discharged. The Centenary Commission did not create the debt of the Board of Missions and are not responsible for its payment. With these interpretations and understandings in mind the Centenary forces will cooperate in every possible way to bring relief to our great missionary cause. Such is the clear and willing understanding between the Centenary Commission and the Board of Missions.

COMMITTEE ON EVANGELISM

We have striven to encourage every movement in the church looking towards genuine Evangelism. As in previous years we have tried to cooperate with the men in mission charges in getting men to assist them in their Revivals who would be a real help.

We regret the disposition on the part of some of the brethren to discredit the Revival, and that in so many instances no attempt to hold a meeting has been made. Methodism is the product of a Revival, and is in danger when Revival fires cease to burn.

Our opportunity today is unlimited, and the condition without and within make a genuine work difficult, that is all the more reason we should make a more strenuous effort than we have ever made along these lines.

With the question of Unification settled, at least for a time, we exhort the members of the North Arkansas Conference to make this the greatest Evangelistic year in our history.

The reports from our Conference Evangelists indicate a successful year.

For three years now we have brought distinguished men with Evangelistic gifts and fervor to our Conference—whose presence and messages have been an inspiration to us through the entire year. Arthur Moore's presence and heart-searching messages ought to type the work that we do through the new Conference year. We urge our pastors to use only our accredited Evangelists, Conference and General, and that the pastors assist each other as far as they can.

We recommend as Conference Evangelists the following: Norris Greer, S. M. Yancey, A. H. Dulaney, C. F. Hively and J. E. Snell.

COMMITTEE ON SABBATH OBSERVANCE

The Commandment, Remember the Sabbath Day and Keep it Holy, is still a command of God and should be kept before the people as never before.

The time has come for every minister to cry out against the indifference even of Christians to the sacredness of the day. There is a tendency on the part of the American people to forget God, and on Sunday attend places of amusement, base ball games, Sunday parties and picnics. All of which sap our life of spiritual blessings and hinder the work of the church.

First, it is therefore resolved, that on the first Sunday in April 1926 all ministers of the North Arkansas Conference preach a sermon on the sacredness of the sabbath.

Second, we deplore the widespread sabbath breaking so general over our country. We urge our members and fellow citizens to awaken to all its dangers. We warn all of the calamities that are certain to fall on sabbath breakers whether the men, cities, states or unions. Our nations should not license or condone sabbath breaking. We commend our State and Federal Courts, Legislatures and Congress for their Godly habits of resting on Sunday, but as guardians of our national safety, should also see to it that all interstate business should stop on Sunday, excepting always emergencies, instances of necessity and charity. Such a law for the District of Columbia is a duty we owe to God and country. It would be of infinite benefit to every home, city and state in America.

We recommend that a Committee composed of G. G. Davidson, H. L. Wade and J. W. Moore be elected by the adoption of this report to confer with other committees appointed for promoting sabbath observance and to urge Congress on the third Wednesday in January, 1926, the wisdom of enacting a Sunday Observance law for the District of Columbia.

ORPHANAGE BOARD

We have had before us a detailed report on our Methodist Orphanage and its work during the past year. This report is in every way encouraging. We have received from the two Conferences \$5,540.95. From the two Conference Sunday School Christmas offerings \$4,697.23. Money received from all other resources \$2,181.43. A total of \$12,419.60.

But for the liberality of our Sunday Schools and other fine gifts, we should not have sufficient funds to meet the needs of our orphanage.

Thanking our Sunday School leaders for the splendid help in the past, we respectfully ask them to take the usual Christmas Offering in all our Sunday Schools and earnestly recommend that the amount be increased.

We recommend also that our assessment on the Conference be the same as last year, \$5,000.00.

SPIRITUAL STATE OF THE CHURCH

If the payment on Conference Claims can be taken as a true index to the spiritual state of the church, most of our people are mere babies in Christ—few have learned to place “Christ on the Throne, and Self on the Cross.” It was easy for the Master to say to the paralytic, “Thy sins be forgiven thee.” The real demonstration of His power came when he said, “Arise and Walk.” It is easy for the church to say, “Lord, Lord.” A real demonstration of its spiritual life will come when it takes money—the symbol of personal energy, ability, and interest, and uses it to advance the Master’s cause. This is the cheapest service. When a church withholds its money it usually withholds everything else.

We have no record of the number of family altars in our homes, but we do have a report on the number of infants that have been dedicated to God by baptism, and their number is pitifully small. For a great Conference like ours to report only 789 infants baptized shows that something is radically wrong. Our people are refusing to dedicate their children to God, or their pastors are not giving them a sufficient opportunity to do so.

We fear, too, that the spiritual life of the baptized children is not receiving proper care. We submit that it is an important for a church and its minister to know the baptized children of the congregation as it is to know the adult members, but we doubt if there is a church in the Conference that can give a complete roll of these children who have not assumed church vows. The same Christ who said, "Feed my Sheep," did not forget to say, "Feed my Lambs."

Let us, therefore, build again the altars of our fathers, and place on them ourselves, our children, our material resources, our all.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

With gratitude to Almighty God for His leadership in our work and to the presiding elders, pastors and district organizations for their cooperation, we report the work of the Sunday schools of the conference for 1925 and make our recommendations for 1926.

Review of the Year's Work

Training: Seven Standard Training Schools have been conducted, offering 31 courses, enrolling 510 students, awarding 422 credits. 491 credits were earned otherwise, making a total of 1213 for the year in the conference. Of this number, 231 were earned by preachers.

Seventeen Cokesbury Training Schools have been held and have awarded 478 credits, our conference leading the entire Church in this work.

Check-up: The check-up campaign was successful showing 102 ranking schools: 63 progressive, 27 advanced, 12 standard. We have in the conference 37 "B" type schools and 301 "C" type schools.

Sunday School Day: The change of superintendents came in the midst of the campaign for the observance of Sunday School Day but the results are good. 227 schools observed the day making an offering amounting to \$5,043.50.

Centenary and Dual Special: Your Board, at its last session, appointed Rev. J. Q. Schisler to carry on negotiations with the Centenary Commission looking to the adjustment of the Sunday School pledges in the conference. The plan of adjustment worked out for this conference was adopted by the Centenary Commission for the Church at large. This board accepted the plan and began operation under it in February. 165 schools have accepted the adjustment plan and have paid a total of \$4,472.43, forty-two and one-half per cent of which is retained in the conference for the support of the Rural Extension Program. Rev. A. W. Martin was elected to the position of Extension Secretary in July and has prosecuted his work with vigor, enthusiasm and success.

Elementary Work: Mrs. Bessie Carpenter of Van Buren has rendered a most valuable service as Conference Elementary Superintendent as was shown in her report to the Board. She has done her work on a voluntary basis. The Board has re-elected her to this position for the ensuing year.

Conference Superintendent: In March, the superintendent of Sunday School work in this conference resigned, and Rev. G. G. Davidson was elected by the Board and appointed by the Bishop to the position. He brings to this work knowledge of the program, interest and enthusiasm for the work, rare organizing ability and a commanding place in the respect and affection of the conference. The work has shown no break and great progress under his leadership this year.

Recommendations

1. It is the purpose of the Board to continue its policy with reference to district organization and refunding one-half of the Sunday School Day offerings to districts which put on an approved program and make reports of same at close of the year to this Board, provided further, that all monies coming to the treasurer after October 1st will not be divided.

2. We urge liberal support of the Conference work by all Sunday schools of the conference in Sunday school day offering.

3. We request pastors or superintendents to take a Christmas offering for the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage, sending same to Dr. James Thomas, Exchange Bank Building, Little Rock, Arkansas.

4. It is the purpose of the Board to promote a standard training school in each district and an approved Cokesbury school within reach of each "C" type Sunday school.

5. For purposes of economy and to expedite handling of funds, Sunday schools are urged to send Sunday School Day offerings and Fourth Sunday Missionary offerings to the office

of the Conference Sunday School Board, Conway, Arkansas, rather than to the treasurer.

6. The Board pledges its support to the Valley Springs Training School by urging Bible classes to make gifts to the school.

7. We recommend the attendance of our people in the Leadership School conducted annually at Mt. Sequoyah by the General Sunday School Board and of the pastors in the Pastors' School at Hendrix College.

8. The Board has voted \$500.00 to the Arkansas Methodist as requested by the Arkansas Methodist Commission but desires to go on record as believing that a different method of financing the Methodist should be worked out by the Commission.

9. We recommend the appointment of G. G. Davidson as conference Superintendent of Sunday School work and of A. W. Martin as Rural Extension Secretary for the ensuing year.

10. We request the Commission on Finance to grant the Board an assessment of \$10,000.00 the same as last year.

TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

It is a matter of grave concern to us when we consider that, probably, at no other time since the adoption of the 18th Amendment and the passage of the Volstead Act has there been so determined an effort to discredit and destroy prohibition in our beloved land, as at this time; for not only are the liquor forces of America thoroughly organized, but the great wine and beer interests of England, France and Germany aroused by fear of the contagion of American prohibition, are pouring their money by millions of dollars, into our country as a "missionary" contribution, in order to endeavor to save their nefarious business.

Great newspapers have been subdued; enforcement officers have been corrupted; and a fund of \$1500 is being placed in every congressional district in the country in order to elect "safe" congressmen.

We recognize the fact, therefore, that this is no time for relaxation. "Eternal vigilance" must be the price of a dry nation, if we are to have one.

We commend very highly, the courageous stand of our great president for law enforcement. We register our approval of all other men and means by whom and by which law-enforcement is being aided. Especially do we commend the

Anti-Saloon League, National and State, for its invaluable service towards sobriety and respect for law.

We recommend, therefore:

1. That we, as a great conference, use every means in our power to aid in the enforcement of, and respect for, our laws, moral and statutory.

2. That we lend every aid possible to Dr. Paul E. Kemper, and the Anti-Saloon League of Arkansas, in the heroic and self-sacrificing work they are doing in our state; that we extend him a welcome into our churches; that he may present this great cause to our people; and that we consider the needs of the League when we make up our budget of contributions for the year.

3. That the following be elected as trustees of the Arkansas Anti-Saloon League for the ensuinig year: B. L. Wilford, D. L. Ford, A. L. Hutchins, J. M. Williams, and Eli Myers.

THE WESTERN METHODIST ASSEMBLY

From information obtained from personal visitations, from the written report of the Board for 1925 and from a report made in person by the President of the Board, we are sure that the Assembly season for 1925 has been the best in the history of the institution. From a deficit two years ago, and an even break financially last year, this season had a net profit of \$3,100.00 which was nearly enough to cover the expenses of the year.

Besides the numerous smaller group meetings, there were five larger group meetings as follows: The Sunday School Board, Board of Missions, Temperanace and Social Service, Epworth League and County Superintendents of Arkansas. We suggest that as soon as convenient all of our general group meetings be held at Mt. Sequoyah.

Some 16,000 people visited the grounds during the season and 2,500 spent one or more nights on the grounds. The Assembly programs were of a high order, generally pleasing and well attended. No doubt Mt. Sequoyah is more generally and more favorably known than ever before.

Our property there is now worth above \$200,000 with a debt of only \$27,000. Up to this time the Board has asked no financial assistance from the Conference.

The golf course, the lake, the beautifying of the grounds, Epworth Hall, the Hall for the Women's Missionary Societies

and the Girls' Camp are partially completed or enterprises planned.

We approve the contract for a modern hotel to be built by the Southern Builders Inc., of Memphis—a very much needed improvement. The plan calls for a \$300,000 fire-proof building to be built from the sale of lots. The Assembly will sell \$75,000.00 worth of lots which should clear the Assembly of all debt and make it possible to go forward with other plans.

We cannot praise too highly the excellent management of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Bond, the wisdom of the Board of Trustees and the hearty support given by the many friends of the Assembly.

We recommend the appointment of the following as Trustees: F. S. H. Johnston, T. L. Hart and G. C. Hardin.

Memoirs

REV. S. F. BROWN

Rev. S. F. Brown was born near Wytheville, Virginia, June 26, 1854. His father was a farmer and a man of splendid Christian faith; as a result very early in life Bro. Brown was converted and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, the church he loved and served until the day of his death. Finishing high school with honors he went to Weaverville College, North Carolina, and took up the study of medicine; but after a while he felt so strongly the call to preach that he turned his attention to theology and at an early day was licensed to preach. He graduated from Weaverville College in 1877. Shortly after his graduation he met Eugenia F. Brown to whom he was married Sept. 30, 1879. To this union two children were born, Ernest H. Brown, deceased, and Mrs. Eula L. Woodward of Gentry, Ark. Also reared an orphan boy, S. C. Brown now of Osceola, Ark.

After spending some ten years in the local ranks Bro. Brown moved to Arkansas in 1887 and immediately was admitted on trial in what was the old White River Conference. His first appointment was Wheatley and he served with credit the following charges: Osceola, Luxora, Marion, West Searcy, Parkin, Beebe, Monette, Manila, Reyno and Biggers, Black Rock, Gentry, Springtown and Decatur.

Because of failing health he asked and was granted the supernumerary relation, hoping in a short time to regain his health and take regular work. Three years later, when it was found that his health continued to fail, he was granted the superannuate relation.

His was a long and useful life, some thirty-eight years in the ministry. Hundreds of sinners heard his message and accepted his Christ. His sermons were all prepared with great care, were food to the children of God. As his pastor I found him a source of great help. He was not a shallow thinker, but a man that went at once to the bottom of things. A man of splendid habits, early in his ministry he formed the habit of spending the morning hour in his study and until the day of his serious illness he never violated this custom. You could often hear him rehearsing his message to an imaginary audience.

Brother Brown has gone home. On the early morning of March 25, God called for him. "He walked with God and is not because God took him." His going was like the blending of the day with the shadows of the evening, peace and quiet inspired by his wonderful faith in the Christ.

REV. J. E. WOODRUFF

Joseph Eugene Woodruff, son of W. W. and Emma Woodruff, was born in Polk County Georgia, on February 22, 1867, moved to Arkansas with his parents who located at Lavaca, 1871.

He passed to his home on high August 9, 1925. He professed religion and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in early life and lived a devoted Christian.

On January 1, 1895, he was married to Miss Rena Coker and to this union there were four children born. The oldest, a little girl, died in infancy. The second, Montie, a lovely daughter, lived to be six years old. Ralph and Roy and their mother survive him.

Brother Woodruff had high ideals and lived for his Lord and ever realized his dependence upon Him. He was licensed to preach at Eureka, on the Fort Smith Circuit, March 25, 1895, Rev. D. J. Weems, presiding elder, and Rev. W. H. Matheney, preacher in charge. Was admitted on trial in Arkansas Annual Conference November 1897 at Ozark and served the following charges: Hackett Circuit 1904; Dover and Gravelly Circuit 1905; Dardanelle Circuit 1906-1907; Prairie View Circuit 1908. After serving these eleven years, his health began to fail and he was given the superannuate relation during 1909-10-11 and 12; then, given the supernumerary relation during 1913-21; then, placed back on the superannuate list 1923-24; which relation he held until his death.

During his superannuate and supernumerary relations he taught school until he developed consumption and was confined in the Baer Memorial Hospital, Fort Smith. As that dreaded disease preyed upon his physical frame from day to day, his soul yearned to go and be with the Lord. He said that the way was bright and the Comforter was with him. Once, while suffering so intensely, he said: "My Master is hugged up with me."

Brother Woodruff was a good man and loved everybody; and in his pastoral work, visited all alike and, more especially the aged and the infirm. He was a good preacher; not an orator nor a great theologian, but a spiritual preacher, one who fed the souls of people and created in them a desire to do better. He was never satisfied with his religious experience; and, always felt he should be a better man and a better preacher. But, knowing him as I did, I feel like he was one of the most humble and consecrated men I ever associated with. But he is gone now; we shall see him no more in the flesh; but we know where to find him. Rest to his suffering frame has come, but eternal rest and joy that await the finally faithful, and the Crown of Righteousness, are his forever more.
