ference, viz: "Increased revenue for the benevolencies, not by

raising the assessments, but by paying them in full."

Second: That we adopt as our goal the pledging of the entire budget for meeting the benevolencies in the North Arkansas Conference by the time of the meeting of our District Conferences, and that we further make an honest effort to secure the payment of at least one half of this amount by that time.

Third: That the North Arkansas Conference constitute an Annual Conference Commission on Benevolencies, consisting of the Presidents of all the Conference Boards, which Boards shall be advisory and shall cooperate with the Conference Board of Lay Activities in working out plans for the promotion of Christian Stewardship and the full payment of the benevolencies.

MEMORIAL

To His Excellency, President Calvin Coolidge, Washington, D. C. Dear Mr. President:

The North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, representing a constitutency of about a quarter of a million people, being in session in Paragould, Arkansas, on Thanksgiving Day, takes occasion to suggest to Excellency that the Government of the United States ought in Your Excellency that the Government of the United States ought in all fairness and equity materially to modify its attitude on the war debt we hold against our recent allies in the World War.

Your Excellency is familiar with the facts. When all

facts are considered, it is very doubtful whether a copper is due the United States on these accounts, save on the basis of the mere technical fact that our Allies signed these obligations. But the obligations themselves cannot possibly be considered mere commercial transactions. There were, and there are now, values involved on both sides which no money can measure, deep spiritual values that cannot be ignored. In this respect the war was from the very beginning a common cause for us and for our Allies. We are asking that the debt settlements be considered from this angle. Had this been done from the beginning our relations to all the nations of the world would have been far better than they now are, and the moral leadership of the earth would have been in the hands of the United States.

A MEMORIAL

To the Committe on Blank Forms, Appointed by the General Conference:

Dear Brethren:

The North Arkansas Conference, now in session, would most respectfully represent to you its clear conviction that the benevolence funds of the whole church can be very materially increased if our statistical tables are made to show what each particular church in a charge pays, instead of simply showing the aggregate paid by all the churches of a charge, as we have been accustomed to do. You will understand, of course, that this applies only to charges composed of more than one church. But these are precisely the churches in which we most need help in the direction indicated. The only burden this will impose is, that it will call for enlarged statistical tables, a little more work, and a little more printing, but the returns will pay us, we believe, a hundred fold.

The General Conference put the matter of blank forms in

your hands, without any specific instructions, and you are therefore left to your devices. We beg that the blanks make provision for this change, so that every church in our Methodism shall henceforth stand on its own rating.

Second, That the Executive Committee of the New Hospital Board be requested to investigate the very generous offer of the citizens of Paragould, to the General Hospital Board of the Dickson Memorial Hospital, at a very nominal sum. This plant, valued at approximately \$50,000.00 may be had for about \$8000.00.

Reports of Boards and Committees

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

At an average of fourteen Bibles per minute the American Bible Society, the accredited agency of the Protestant Churches in America, is sending out the Word of God to the ends of the earth. The total distribution last year in round numbers amounted to more than nine million volumes of Scriptures in Japan, and four million copies in China last year. The work is carried on through ten home agencies and twelve foreign agencies at a cost of a million and quarter dollars per year.

The Southwestern Agency, managed by Rev. J. J. Morgan, included Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana. in this territory we distribute more than 338,000 volumes of Scripture in thirty-three languages. As far as our funds would permit we have co-operated liberally with mission churches and Sunday Schools, and have supplied jails, hospitals, rescue homes and other charitable institutions either at cost or donation. The American Bible Society never sells a Bible for profit. The Arkansas Depository, managed by Rev. D. H. Colquette, made the greatest record of its history last year. The distribution reached over 72,000 volumes and Brother Colquette was diligent in ministering unto shut-ins in penitentiaries, hospitals, jails, poor houses and other like places all over the State.

We cannot over emphasize the importance of circulating the Word of God among all the people. The American Bible Society is the main source of Bible supply for all Protestant denominations in the home lands, second, only, to one other, if any, in foreign lands and is therefore worthy of our hearty support.

We recommend:

- 1. That we as pastors co-operate with our agencies in the distribution of Scriptures.
- 2. That we observe the first Sunday in December, or as near thereto as practicable, as Bible Sunday.
 - 3. That our Conference heartily endorse the work of Bro.

Colquette and pledge ourselves to assist him in carrying forward this fundamental work in Christian Religion.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

The general publishing interest of our church show a continued gratifying increase in the net value of the publishing houses and in the sales. During the past quadrennium \$220,000.00 was added to the endowment fund while only an increase of \$80,200.00 was registered for the previous quadrennium.

In the expanding educational program to which our great church is definitely committed the church publications are making distinctive educational contribution. The Arkansas Methodist is taking its proper place in this scheme of things and should be placed as soon as possible on a sound financial basis. In view of the following facts, namely that the Arkansas Methodist is considered a church necessity, and that it compares most favorable with any of our other church papers, and that since 1920 it has had a yearly accumulated indebtedness which at the close of this year amounts to between \$5000 and \$6000, the board makes the following recommendations.

First: That the budget committe levy an assessment of \$2,000 to help maintain the paper and partially retire its indebtedness.

Second: That in conjunction with the Little Rock Conference we reserve the month of March as Arkansas Methodist month and make a special effort to "paperize" every Methodist home in Arkansas.

Third: That authorization be given to secure a building in Little Rock to be used to house the Arkansas Methodist and to serve as the Methodist headquarters, and also that a quiet campaign for an endowment fund be initiated and conducted so as not to interfere with other church interests.

Fourth: That Dr. A. C. Miller be re-elected as editor and business manager and that Dr. F. S. H. Johnston, R. C. Morehead, and J. M. Williams be re-elected as Commissioners.

BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

We had the report of the General Board of Church Extension in our hands. It is a gratifying report. It shows that the

Loan Fund Capital increased \$687,170.98 during the quadrennium just closing, bringing the present total of this Loan Fund up to \$2,638,114.72. Out of their funds for donation the General Board aided in the erection of 464 more church buildings than during the previous quadrennium. The Architectural Department of the General Board is rendering a great service to the Church, both in furnishing better plans for church buildings and also in its educational work.

In our own Conference the reports of the pastors show quite a number of new buildings recently finished or now in course of construction, both of parsonages and church buildings. We are sorry that our funds were too limited to meet the askings in the applications in our hands. We feel that increased emphasis must be placed upon the collection of this Church Extension fund along with all of the other financial claims of the Church, until we shall be able to report 100 per cent collected.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Section No. 1.

Your board had before it the reports of our General Board of Education, Southern Methodist University and the two Secondary Schools of our own Conference and our three Colleges.

We note with pleasure the increasing activity of our General Board and its broadening field of usefulness, and take pleasure in commending the work of Southern Methodist University, and approve their effort to increase the number of scholarships available to students in the School of Theology, and in view of the fact that we have at present five students in this Department we urge our people and pastors to give what aid they can to this work.

We point with pride to the work of our Colleges and secondary schools, knowing that they are making every possible effort to give the very best of intellectual and spiritual training to the young people who come to them. All these institutions are severely hampered by their lack of resources, and are earnestly endeavoring to increase their equipment and endowment that they may be enabled to render a larger service.

Our Secondary schools, Sloan Hendrix and Valley Springs Training School, fill a real need, and these two schools should be given more liberal support by the church or their usefulness will be largely curtailed, or perhaps the schools will be compelled to cease functioning.

In order to further the work of Christian Education within the bounds of our Conference we make the following recommendations:

- 1. That Rev. R. C. Morehead be appointed Conference Secretary of Education, and that the North Arkansas Conference cooperate with the General Board of Education in all their plans for the enlargement of the educational work of our Church.
- 2. That Rev. Harry King and Rev. R. C. Morehead be chosen to represent the Board of Education on the Board of Managers of your Pastor's School.
- 3. That Rev. J. J. Galloway be reappointed Executive Secretary of Henderson-Brown College, and that J. P. Womack, Rev. J. J. Galloway, Fred Dierks, Finis Pharr, and Leslie Goodloe be confirmed as members of the Board of Trustees of that Institution.
- 4. That Rev. Wm. Sherman succeed himself as member of the Board of Trustees of Valley Springs Training School and that Homer Pierce succeed Dr. O. E. Goddard, resigned.
- 5. That A. W. Lindsay and M. F. Henderson succeed themselves as members of the Board of Trustees of Sloan-Hendrix Academy. That Rev. J. F. Glover be re-appointed Superintendent of Sloan-Hendrix Academy.
- 6. That we commend the work of our Student Pastor's among the students in tax supported schools, and note with increasing pleasure the centering of the work around the Church the efforts at Fayetteville to stress the Bible teaching work, and to work out an interdenominational Bible Teaching movement.

- 7. That Rev. R. C. Morehead be appointed Endowment Secretary for Galloway Woman's College, and that J. H. Zellner and R. C. Morehead succeed themselves as members of the Board of Trustees of Galoway Woman's College, and that Rev. J. W. Crichlow succeed Rev. W. C. House who has removed from the bounds of this Conference.
- 8. That the Board of Trustees of each of our schools and colleges adopt such measurers as in its judgment are wise to secure the funds necessary to meet the pressing needs of its particular school or college.
- 9. That Rev. W. V. Womack represent the North Arkansas Annual Conference Board of Education at the Methodist Educational Association in Memphis in February, and that Rev. Harry King be the alternate delegate to this convention.
- 10. That the General Conference Board of Education be asked to make the following appropriations: \$1.500 for Valley Springs Training School; \$1,500 for Sloan-Hendrix Academy; \$1,500 for the work of the Student Pastor at First Church Fayetteville; and \$1,200 for the work of the Student Pastor at First Church, Conway.
- 11. That an assessment of \$1,500 be levied for the support of the Pastor's School at Hendrix College.
- 12. That Rev. Wm. Sherman and Col. J. E. Little succeed themselves on the Board of Trustees of Hendrix College.

Section No. 2

We recommend that for the ensuing Conference year an assessment of \$21,000.00 be laid on the North Arkansas Annual Conference for educational purposes, to be distributed as follows: Henderson-Brown College 22.5 per cent; Hendrix College 22.5 per cent; Galoway Woman's College 22.5 per cent; Valley Springs Training School 11.25 per cent; Sloan-Hendrix Academy 11.25 per cent Student Pastor, First Church, Fayetteville 3.3 per cent; Student Pastor, First Church, Conway, 2.85 per cent; miscellaneous appropriations and expenses, including printing of Conference minutes, 3.85 per cent.

We recommend the election of H. K. King and B. C. Few members of the Board of Managers of the Hendrix Summer School for Ministers.

We urge that the pastors co-operate with the Conference Epworth League Vice President in promoting Epworth League Anniversary Day and securing collection.

HOSPITAL BOARD

We have had before us the reports of the General Hospital Board and the Trustees of our own Hospital, located at Memphis, Tenn. We rejoice that our beloved Southern Methodism is awakening to the command of the Great Physician, who not only said preach but "heal the sick." Throughout

the length and breadth of our great Church this command is being heeded more and more. We have entered into this field to do our part, and by the grace of God, we will do it.

In the operation of our great Hospital at Memphis we are doing a work very near to the heart of the Master. During the twelve months ending October 31, 1926, 3,301 patients were admitted; 273 babies were born, making a total of 3,754 patients.

The following denominations were represented: Methodist 2118, Baptist 371, Presbyterians 322, Episcopalians 202, Disciples 161, Jews 191, Catholics 78, no church affiliation 381, children under 10 years of age with no church membership 411. Twelve other faiths were represented.

The patients came from the following localities: 305 from the territory of the North Arkansas Conference, 434 from the territory of the North Mississippi Conference, 578 from the territory of the Memphis Conference outside the city of Memphis, 2120 from the City of Memphis.

We desire to call your attention to the free service rendered by our Hospital. Of the 3301 patients admitted, 572 received free service to the amount of \$42,400.00. Seventy percent of this free service was given to the patients coming from outside the City of Memphis, thirty per cent to those coming from the city. Of the 305 patients admitted from our territory 74 received free service to the amount of \$9,298.00. Among the patients receiving free service from our territory were 23 of our pastors, their wives or dependent children.

We record, without comment, that while the patients going from our territory to our Hospital during the past twelve months received free service to the amount of \$9,298.00, our entire Conference contributed the sum of \$377.33 for the support of our Hospital for the same period.

Our Hospital is second to none in the entire South, being most admirably located and thoroughly equipped for serving suffering humanity. The value of our property is \$900,000.00. There is a bonded indebtedness of \$350,000.00 and a floating indebtedness of \$70,000.00. The capacity of the Hospital is 170 adult beds and 30 in the nursery. The new Lucy Brinkley Pavilion, opened on the 15th of this month gives us a much needed addition.

In accordance with paragraph 550 of the Discipline of 1926 we ask the Conference to set aside and designate as Hospital Week, May 8-15, 1927, and urge every pastor to observe it in every particular.

We nominate as the Trustees for this Conference for the

ensuing year Rev. William Sherman, Rev. J. R. Nelson, T. J. Boston, W. E. Jelks, J. F. Fogleman and Mrs. Preston Hatcher and request their confirmation.

LAY ACTIVITIES

It is with pleasure and satisfaction that we report substantial progress made in the lay activity work during the past year, but we earnestly urge that the lay organization be perfected in the entire Conference as speedily as possible along the lines prescribed by the Discipline.

In pursuance of the legislation enacted by the General Conference pertaining to the laymen's work, and in keeping with the program of work as recommended by the General Board of Lay Activities, the Conference Board of Lay Activities has adopted for the coming year the following objectives:

I. Christian Stewardship.

Paragraph 561, 1926 Discipline, provides that "The General Board of Lay Activities shall be charged with the cultivation and promotion of Christian Stewardship. It shall initiate plans, develop literature and perfect organizations to utilize effectively in the work of the Church and in the development of Christian character this fundamental doctrine of Christian faith and practice, and for this purpose it should correlate the various educational and administrative agencies of the Church."

By action of the Conference in the passage of the resolution offered on Thursday morning, November 25, it is hoped that proper correlation in this work may be effected and plans worked out to the end that a sentiment for the practice of Christian stewardship among the entire membership of the Church may become general rather than the exception, and that such sentiment may lead to a united effort on the part of all, both clergy and laity, to bring up in the future the general and conference collections to one hundred per cent.

II. Organization Wesley Brotherhoods.

Paragraph 563, 1926 Discipline, provides that '|The men of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, are hereby authorized to organize for fellowship and larger service in the work of the Church, and The Wesley Brotherhood of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, shall be the duly authorized organization for this purpose."

III. Promoting the Collection of the Benevolencies.

Under the new constitution of the Board of Lay Activities, the General Board has been charged with the promotion of the collection of the benevolent assessments of the Church. Paragraph 570 of the Discipline provides that "The Conference Board, together with the Bishop in Charge, shall be responsible for promoting the Every Member Canvass in the Annual Conference, and shall have the cooperation of the other Conference Boards."

We rejoice in the creation by vote of this Conference of an Annual Conference Commission on Benevolencies, consisting of the Presidents of the various Conference Boards, which Commission shall cooperate with the Annal Conference Board of Lay Activities in working out plans and methods by which the Every Member Canvass shall be made throughout the Conference and the benevolent claims shall be paid in full.

We would urge that due attention be given to the promotion and collection of the benevolencies; that the entire budget of the Churches of the Conference be pledged by the time of the District Conferences, and that, if possible, one-half of the amount of the benevolent claims be secured in cash by that time.

Surely there is no more important matter in carrying out the program of the Church than that of bringing up the collection of the benevolencies to one hundred per cent; otherwise the entire program of the Kingdom will be seriously handicapped.

IV. Circulation Methodist Layman.

The Methodist Layman is the official organ of the laymen's work—it is a splendid journal and will greatly stimulate our laymen and give them much needed information in their work. We will deeply appreciate the influence and assistance of the Presiding Elders and Pastors in extending its circulation.

V. Cooperation With Special Movements.

Your Conference Board of Lay Activities desires to express its genuine interest in, and pledge its cooperation in behalf of the special effort to secure funds to meet the needs of our expanding missionary program, the completion of the Christian Education Movement and the raising of the Superannuate Endowment Fund.

With gratitude to Almighty God and to the leaders of our great Church for an enlarging opportunity for the laymen to invest their lives in the extension of the Kingdom of Christ through the world-wide program of Methodism, we hereby pledge ourselves anew to the service of Christ and to the program of the Church, and we firmly believe that under the leadership of our great Bishop and the consecrated Presiding Elders and Pastors of the Conference, the laymen of North Arkansas Conference shall be able to make a worth-while contribution to our beloved Methodism during the next quadrennium.

VI. Conference Lay Leader.

The Conference Board nominates for Conference Lay Leader, Prof. J. L. Bond, of Fayetteville, Arkansas, and recommends that the Conference elect him to this office for the coming year.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

Section No. 1

The General Conference has declared that "during the months of January and February a special missionary cultivation campaign shall be conducted throughout the whole church in every congregation, during which each member of the Church shall be given an opportunity to make a free-will offering for the maintaining of the general work of the Board, which free-will offering shall be over and above the missionary assessment for the year and shall not include the income from Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues; provided that all moneys so raised shall be directed to the Board of Missions. Section of General Work."

As to the method of carrying out this campaign of cultivation and of taking the free will offering from our people, the General Conference declared that "the Missionary Committee shall conduct an every member canvass in every congregation to secure a free-will offering for Missions," and, further, that the goal, in this special appeal shall be to secure at least one million dollars over and above the income for assessments, Sunday Schools, and Epworth Leagues, for the Maintenance each year during the quadrennium. Since this is now the law of our Church, utmost cooperation becomes a duty, but we do not regard our work of extending the Kingdom entirely in this light. It is also a high privilege and an opportunity in which we rejoice. The world calls for Christ as never before; the world needs Christ as never before. In no moment of history have more critical consequences hinged upon our giving Christ to the nations. In every land on earth the leven of Bolshevistic atheism is working; it is being assiduously propagated by powerful proponents. The issue is not now between our religion and a heathen religion, a higher and a lower faith. It is between Christ and Anti-Christ, between God and an absolute atheism and all that atheism means to the world and the future.

No discriminatory Christian can look out over the world today without being stirried by the call which this dread situation brings to him. To falter now would not only be dis-

loyalty-not only sin-but it would mean certain disaster to

the whole structure of society.

RESOLVED, therefore, that this annual conference hereby pledge its hearty and energetic support to the plan outlined by the General Conference and that we enter heartily into every feature of the campaign of Missionary cultivation during the month of January and February.

RESOLVED, that we accept our share of the million dollars asked by the General Conference for Missions and agree to an every-member canvass for the free-will offering to raise it.

RESOLVED, that we heartily commend the election of Rev. J. F. Simmons as Missionary Secretary for the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences and assure him of our hearty co-operation.

RESOLVED, that we gladly accept our apportionment of the million dollar special for the North Arkansas Conference which is \$34,500.00.

RESOLVED, that we elect Rev. R. E. L. Bearden as director of this movement in our Conference, to assist Bro. Simmons in every way possible, and assure him of our earnest co-operation.

RESOLVED, that we request the Presiding Elders to fix the dates and places for their district missionary institutes as provided in the Discipline, (before the adjournment of this session of the Conference.)

Section No. 2.

We desire to congratulate the North Arkansas Conference on the splendid showing made this past year for missionary special.

We rejoice in the work that is being done at Valley Springs and heartily commend M. J. Russell and his cause to our people. We rejoice in the work that is being done at the State University under the direction of Rev. James W. Workman and assure him of our prayers and our co-operation.

We hereby urge our Presiding Elders and Pastors to see that a missionary committee is appointed that will function in each congregation in the North Arkansas Conference through which the Every-Member Campaign for the special shall be made and through which the Every-Member Campaign may likewise be made for the securing of the benevolences for the church. Especially is this important because this committee, under the new law, is now auxiliary to the Annual Conference Board.

We recommend the election of Rev. A. E. Holloway and

Jefferson Sherman Board of Directors of Summer School for Pastors at Hendrix College.

We urge the Presiding Elders to relate themselves to the Board of Missions in every possible way to help us put over the program of the church.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Training Work: The number of credits earned in Standard Course is 1821; an increase of 508 over last year. The number of credits in the Cokesbury Course is 655. Eleven Standard Training Schools, sixteen Junior Training Schools, and forty-two Cokesbury Schools have been conducted besides many training classes.

Evangelism and Membership: Many schools under the

leadership of the pastor report successful evangelist campaigns. There is need for greater accuracy in Sunday School records and reports but the indication is that the membership is increasing.

Missionary Education and Cultivation: The Board has sent out much literature on this work and is receiving a hearty response. The amount contributed to Extension program is approximately \$8,300; one-half of which has been used in the Korean Mission, and forty-two and one half per cent for the Conference Extension program. Approximately \$1,000 has been contributed by the Sunday Schools to Valley Springs Training School, besides the amounts paid out of this fund for other purposes. The Board has requested the privilege of changing from Korea to Europe as our foreign Special, in order to bring our Conference in line with the Sunday School Special of the church at large.

Eelementory Work: The report of Mrs. Bessie Carpenter to the Board reveals progress in this phase of the work. The Board has re-elected Mrs. Carpenter as Conference Elementary Superintendent for the ensuing Conference year.

Extension Secretary: The report of the Extension Secretary shows remarkable progress in this new and important phase of the work.

Voluntary Workers: The Board desires to record its appreciation of the large amount of voluntary work which has been done in the several districts by district officers, Cokesbury instructors and approved checkers. We desire to thank the Jonesboro District workers for checking every school in the district in the Check-up Campaign without expense to the Conference Board. We mention with gratitude the large and efficient voluntary service of our treasurer Mr. C. D. Metcalf.

Conference Leadership: The Board has been fortunate in the constructive leadership and outstanding service of the Conference Superintendent and hearty co-operation of the Presiding Elders.

The Board has adopted standards for an approved district program and proposes to return to the districts which put on such a program 50 per cent of the Sunday School Day offerings and urges liberal support of the work through these offerings. Sunday School offerings should be sent to Conference Sunday School Board, Conway, Ark.
- 2. We request pastors or superintendents to take a Christmas Offering for the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage and send same to Dr. James Thomas, Exchange Band Bldg., Little Rock,

Ark. We suggest that the offering be taken on the Sunday preceeding Christmas.

- In view of the critical missionary situation at home and abroad and the importance of missionary education, we urge all Sunday Schools to observe Missionary Sunday each month with offerings which should be sent to Conference Sunday School Board, Conway, Ark.
- The Board pledges its support to the Valley Springs Training School by urging Bible Clsases to make gifts to the school.
- We recommend that our workers attend the Leadership 5. School of the Sunday School Board at Mt. Sequoyah and the Pastor's School at Hendrix College.
- The Board has adopted the following as the major lines of activities during the ensuing year; (1) Evangelism. (2) Training work. (3) Missionary Education. (4) Conference Federation of Wesley Classes. New details of these activities to be worked out by the Conference Staff and the District Staffs.
- 7. The Board recommends that the General Sunday School Editor give careful consideration to the possibilities of including in the graded lessons now being revised, and in the group uniform lessons now in use, a course, or courses, in the work and doctrines of the Methodist Church.
- We recommend the re-appointment of G. G. Davidson, as Conference Superintendent and of A. W. Martin as Extension Secretary for the ensuing year.
- We request the Commission on Budget to grant the Board an assessment of \$10,000.00, the same as last year.
- 10. We re-affirm our conviction that the religious education of the masses is one of the supreme responsibilities of the church and under that convictiaon we solicit the same sympathetic co-operation of Presiding Elders and Pastors, which has been generously given in the past. We renew our pledge of allegiance to Jesus Christ as the saving power in education, as in all life, and declare that it is the purpose of this Board to make more effective a training for our people which shall be at once sound educationally and vitally religious, and which shall therefore make Christ supreme in all human relationships.

We have elected W. A. Lindsey and G. G. Davidson as members of the board of managers of the Pastor's School at Hen-

drix College.

TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

We your Committees on Social Service make the following recommendations:

- 1. Inasmuch as there appears to be a wide spread spirit of lawlessness in our land, which amounts, almost, to contempt for all laws, both divine and human, we, therefore urge our people to set a worthy example of law observance, that we may not bring reproach upon ourselves in those things which we allow.
- 2. That we lend every aid possible, both moral and financial, to our officers in their crusade against law-violators, especially those laws relating to prohibition, race-track gambling, and our Holy Sabbath Day.
- 3. That we stand unalterably opposed to any modification of the 18th Amendment or of the Volstead Act; but, on the other hand, we favor a large increase in the government appropriation to enforce our prhoibition laws.
- 4. That we strive, with all our powers, to resist the insidious propaganda that is being carried on in our state, to permit Sunday baseball and Sunday movies.
- 5. That we ring true on the evils of the use of tobacco, especially the cigarette.
- 6. That the following be elected as trustees of the Arkansas Anti-Saloon League, from the North Arkansas Conference, for the ensuing year: B. L. Wilford, D. L. Ford, A. L. Hutchins, J. M. Williams and Eli Myers.

SABBATH OBSERVANCE

We deplore exceedingly that there is a tendency on the part of the American people to forget God, and on the Sabboth Day attend places of amusement, buy and sell goods, and engage in other business week-day activities, all of which sap the life of spiritual blessings and hinder the work of the church in extending the kingdom of God on earth, therefore be it resolved:

First: That the preachers of the North Arkansas Conference preach oftener on the sacredness of the Sabbath and observance of same.

Second: That every church through the channel of the Board of Stewards or Lay Activities send resolutions to the State Legislature, which meets in January, urging this law-

making body to make no retrenchments in its effort to check Sabbath desecration in Arkansas.

Third: That definite appeal be made to town and city councils through the channel of a committee from the churches, to enforce the state law regarding buying and selling on the Sabbath Day.

Fourth: That the North Arkansas Conference co-operate with the Tennesee Conference by adopting the following report of that conference and appointing proposed committee.

"Our government with its wondrous liberty and wealth, can't survive without God's Sabbath, honored and kept. Strict Sabbath observance was a prime and vital factor in our nation's growth to greatness, and that virtue we must preserve or our nation will fall to ruin, even as Nehemiah witnessed that Israel fell. There is no safety without religion and no religion without a Sabbath.

Amidst the many evils that menace our country, Sabbath descreation is pre-eminent. It is an alarming truth that Sabbath descration permeates our national or interstate commerce, the greatest commerce in the world.

The profit-making business of our great railroads, express, telegraph, telephone, mails and most daily newspapers run right on, every day and Sunday too, as if they knew not God's commandment. And Washington City, our national capital, that was once ideal in Sabbath observance, now permits all forms of Sabbath-breaking business and amusements on Sunday. All this mighty tide of evil is deluging and infecting every state, county and town, teaching our children Sabbath desecration in every form, encouraging and establishing Sabbath-breaking in every hamlet.

We protest and warn all against this menacing condition. We must all work and pray against this vice. We know full well that public law is a nullity without a supporting public sentiment. We call upon our public officials, in church and state, our legislators, governors, mayors, Congressmen, President and all God-fearing people to aid in suppressing this dangerous evil.

We hereby nominate William Sherman, W. L. Oliver, F. R. Hamilton to represent us in co-operating with the Tennesee Methodist Conference Sabbath Crusade Committee, and others like-minded, in asking our Congress and President, on the third Wednesday in January, 1927, and other suitable days, to enact a righteous Sunday observance law for the District of Columbia, and to provide for a Sabbath day's rest in our national commerce, and we direct this committee to likewise

cooperate in securing with God's help, an agreement among newspaper publishers to discontinue all work and all printing, shipping, mailing and selling of newspapers on Sunday. We believe that God meant for all workers, even newspaper and railroad workers and newsboys to have a Sabbath day, and we know we cannot expect a continuance of God's mercies nor can we abide in Jesus, "Lord of the Sabbath," unless we rest from labor on the Sabbath day, and help all others to rest likewise.

WESTERN METHODIST ASSEMBLY

We have had for our consideration the report of the Western Methodist Assembly Board for 1926 presented to us by Dr. A. C. Millar, Chairman of the Board. We note with great gratification that the scope of work which was carried on at the Assembly this past season, which included programs on Evangelism, Temperance and Social Service, Sunday School Leadership School, Missions, Young Peoples Leadership, Lay Activities, Epworth Leagues, Regional Missionary Conference, Education, and Patriotic Programs. The records show that there were sixteen thousand five hundred admissions, with some three thousand spending a night on the grounds. The total receipts were \$14,000.00, making a net profit for the summer of some \$2100.00, but this does not quite meet the expenses of the year, such as taxes and upkeep. The Woman's Misionary Societies have laid the foundation of their fine \$35,000.00 building, and purpose having it ready for use next summer. The Epworth League Hall is not yet completed, but the Leaguers at their recent Assembly, took steps to finance and finish the hall this year. Plans are developing for the completion of recreational facilities. Owing to the failure of health of manager of the Improvement Company the sale of stock for the fire-proof Hotel was delayed, but a new manager has been engaged and arrangements made to push the sale of the stock. As revenue for expenses and reduction of debt is derived from sale of lots, friends are urged to buy these lots and build homes upon them. The debts of the Assembly, which were made in getting ready for work amount to \$25,000.00.

The Assembly, which has become the best known and most popular institution of its kind in the Southwest, needs \$500,000.00 for equipment and endowment. We express our great appreciation of the faithful and successful work of Superintendent and Mrs. J. L. Bond. We recommend that the Con-

ference elect Rev. F. S. H. Johnston, G. C. Hardin, and T. L. Hart as trustees, approve the work of the Assembly, and pledge the Board our most cordial cooperation. Let all correspondence concerning the Assembly be directed to Superintendent J. L. Bond, Western Methodist Assembly, on Mount Sequoyah, Fayetteville, Arkansas.

REV. RILEY JONES

Rev. Riley Jones, a superannuate of the North Arkansas Conference, was borned March 27, 1886, in Louisville, Ky., and "fell asleep" at 10:30 Tuesday night, January 19, 1926. He was pronounced incurable at Booneville. So friends brought him to Baer Memorial Hospital to make his last days as comfortable as possible.

My first acquaintance with Riley Jones was when I was presiding elder on Paragould District in 1914-15. He was admitted on trial in 1912. After a two years location he was re-admitted in 1924. He was limited in his equipment; had no advantages in the way of education, as a boy, but, after his conversion, after mature manhood had come, he felt the divine urge to preach. After a hard struggle to equip himself sufficently to be admitted on trial, he was admitted. He enrolled in the Correspondence School, and, under greatest difficulties, completed his four years course. The work he had when I first met him, was in the bottoms beyond Paragould. It was disorganized and difficult, but he held successful meetings, good Sunday Schools, and prayer meetings were organized. He raised more on Conference collections than any one who had served the charge. He kept up his record till his health failed and he went to Booneville Sanatorium. He was unusually successful as an evangelist in country churches.

A good man has gone to his reward. He was well equipped for this admission.

Sister Ramsey was cultured, industrious and economical, consecrating time, talent and means to the Lord. As manager of the Paragould Sanatarium she had occasion to administer to the sick and suffering and was always sympathetic and helpful. She was a humble woman with pure and high ideals, cheerful but devout. She admired the beauties of this world, but "looked for a city whose builder and maker is God." She appreciated the pleasures, friendships and associations of this life, but was "crucified with Christ," and could say, "The life I now live in the flesh I live by the faith of the son of God."
