Rev. J. M. Hughey made a motion that the report of the Commission on Education as amended be adopted as a whole It was unanimously adopted.

Rev. W. L. Oliver offered a resolution touching on the expenses of the Educational Commission and it was adopted.

RESOLUTION

RESOLVED: 1. That the Board of Education of North Arkansas Conference, is hereby authorized to pay one-half of the total traveling and other necessary expenses of the Educational Commission.

2. That the President and Secretary of the Commission are requested to send to the Treasurer of the Board of Education an itemized statement of the expenses of the several Commissioners showing the amount to be paid to each.

REPORT OF EDUCATIONAL COMMISSION AS AMANDED AND ADOPTED

To The Members of the North Arkansas Conference:

About forty years ago when our Church projected three colleges in Arkansas, there were no standardizing bodies and the cost of maintaining colleges was small. In recent years the cost of operating colleges has so enormously increased as to change conditions fundamentally, and to make it impossible for the Church to carry out the policy of three standard senior colleges as now constituted in Arkansas. No other State in Southern Methodism is maintaining three senior colleges, and some of these States have twice our Church membership and population and four times our wealth.

Changed conditions therefore force the Church to readjust her educational policy. She has no alternative. Your Commission has consulted the best judgment of the Church and has studied all suggestions promising results. Naturally there are differences of views and conflicting interests.

Our central problems are lack of financial support and unnecessary duplication. All suggestions revolve around these. Merging and relocation herein proposed are merely means to an end—to solve our financial problem.

In considering the proposal the public should bear in mind that the Church has a perfect moral and legal right to modify her policy, to merge institutions, or even to change location where altered conditions require it. It s a fundamental priciple in the administration of a trust when conditions arise that make it impossible to carry out the specific object of the trust, it may be administered in such a way as to accomplish as nearly as possible the object. The principle applies here. The main object of these institutions is to serve the highest educational interests of Christian education as fostered by the Methodist Church in Arkansas.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Accordingly, your Commission recommends:

1. That it is the policy of the Methodist Episcopal

Church, South, in Arkansas, to correlate and unify her educational work.

2. That we unify under one Board of Trustees Hendrix College, Henderson-Brown College and Galloway Woman's College.

That the first Board of Trustees for the united institutions shall consist of thirty members.

Twenty-four members shall be nominated by the Presidents of the three colleges and the Chairman of the Boards of Trustees of the three colleges acting 'ogether, and elected by the Boards of Education of the two Annual Conferences acting together. Eight of these shall be suggested by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees and the President of each college, and from these suggestions nominations shall be made as stated above, naming twelve members from the North Arkansas Conference and twelve members from the Little Rock Conference. The remaining six members shall be nominated by the twenty-four members from the State at large and elected by the Boards of Education of the two Annual Conferences acting together. The Board thus constituted shall serve until their successors are elected.

- 3. That Galloway Woman's College shall be maintained as a standard senior woman's college and it shall be the policy of the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences to foster the life and influence of Galloway Woman's College by assisting this institution to attain standards in harmony with the educatonal classifying agencies of the United States; and it shall share in any state-wide intensive campaign for funds for educational purposes or plans looking toward educational reorganization, and in the total askings of such efforts or campaigns a reasonable amount shall be included for Galloway Woman's College.
- 4. That we consolidate Hendrix and Henderson-Brown Colleges at Arkadelphia or Conway and that we request the Board of Trustees as above constituted to give immediate and serious study to this problem and that they be authorized to effect this consolidation at the earliest date possible, consistent with wisdom.

Provided, however, that after careful consideration of the properties of both institutions and the cost of maintaining units at both Arkadelphia and Conway and the educational needs and possibilities of the whole state and the relation of the Church to the State. If the Board deems it practible, for

the sake of all interests involved, to maintain at each location, but under one management, different units, which may, if desired, retain the names above, for the purpose of doing different and distinct types of work, such as emphasizing liberal arts at one and emphaizing industial arts and teacher-training at the other, the Board may, at its discretion, so decide.

- 5. That all the powers and duties belonging to the Board of Trustees of Henderson-Brown College and all the powers and duties belonging to the Board of Trustees of Hendrix College, and all the powers and duties belonging to the Board of Trustees of Galloway Woman's College shall be transferred to the Board of Trustees of the united institutions.
- 6. That the Board of Trustees of the united institutions shall draw up or cause to be drawn up a charter or charters necessary to carry into effect the foregoing provisions in harmony with the laws of the State and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and they shall submit the same to the next regular sessions of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences for their consideration and adoption.
- 7. That the Board of Trustees of Henderson-Brown College, of Hendrix College, and of Galloway Woman's College are hereby instructed to transfer to the Board of Trustees of the united institutions as soon as it shall be constituted as herein provided all powers, duties, assets, and liabilites of said Boards.
- 8. That the Board of Trustees in merging Hendrix and Henderson-Brown Colleges shall as far as practicable employ in the consolidated institution the officers and teachers of the two Colleges in the event the two institutions are consolidated.
- 9. That the Board of Trustees herein constituted shall have full power to take such steps to meet the financial needs of the institutions as in their judgment is wise.
- 10. That the Board of Trustees of the institutions when constituted, is hereby appointed and shall serve as the agent of the Little Rock Conference and of the North Arkansas Conference, and as such agent is clothed with full authority, to carry out all provisions of these resolutions as fully and freely as the said Annual Conferences themselves.
- 11. That while the Board shall conduct the united institution in two or more units, the funds of any unit shall not be

used to conduct any other unit; nor, shall the assets of any unit be liable for the obligations of any other unit.

SECOND DAY

Jonesboro, Arkansas, November 22, 1928.

STANDING RULES FOR NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- 1. That the Conference instructs the Commission on Budget, in apportioning assessments to the districts, to use the method laid down in the Discipline for the General Boards in apportioning the assessments to Annual Conferences; provided, that said commission shall have power, subject to the approval of the Conference, to reduce the amount apportioned to any District for Conference Work, but the amount thus taken off any such District shall not be added to the apportionment of any other District or Districts.—1928 Journal.
- 2. That all undergraduates be required to report according to the call of the several committees before the opening of the Conference and that not one be allowed to take examination after Conference opens unless providentially hindered.—1914 Journal, page 32.
- 3. That the Conference Treasurer shall be allowed a commission of one per cent on all collections passing through his hands up to \$100,000 as compensation for his service, together with incidental expenses.—1918 Journal, page 30.
- 4. That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided by the Discipline, shall consist of two delegates from each pastorial charge to be elected by the Quarterly Conference.—1922 Journal, page 37.
- 5. That the figures answering the questions: "Members reported last year," be the figures printed in the Journal of last Annual Conference.
- 6. That the Presiding Elders' figures of all the assessments be accepted as the official figures.
- 7. That the assessments for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- 8. That the figures answering the question: "Amount raised for Missions by Sunday School," be the figures which represented the amount to the Treasurer of the Conference Sunday School Board.—1925 Journal, page 19.
- 9. That all Statistical reports shall be turned in to the Statistical Secretary; and that all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer not later than 6 p. m., Thursday of Conference session or else the name of delinquents shall be reported to the Conference.—1916 Journal, page 32.
- 10. That the North Arkansas Annual Conference shall elect its Treasurer quadrennially, by ballot, without nominations, immediately after reading and passing upon the report of the Committee on Nominations.—1926 Journal.

Reports of Board and Committees

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

We report for the American Bible Society another year of substantial progress in its threefold service of translation, publication and distribution of the Holy Scriptures without note or comment and without profit.

Officials of the Bible Society are jubilant over the fact that in 1927 the number of volumes distributed went beyond the ten million mark. When it is remembered that this vast sowing of the Word of God is done in co-operation with the Home and Foreign Mission Boards of the Protestant Churches of America, the worth of the American Bible Society in the evangelization of the world is immeasurable.

In Latin America, in the Hawaiian and Phillipine Islands, in the Far East, as well as the Near East, doors are more and more opening to the entrance of God's Word. Some have feared that the New China now emerging from civil strife would revolt against the Christian religion, but not so. China is calling for our Bibles faster than we can make them.

The most striking event of the year in the homeland has been the supply of Mississippi flood sufferers with Scriptures. A major portion of this noteworthy service fell to the lot of the Southwestern Agency, of which your conference is a part. In the flood area of Arkansas and Louisiana we distributed to flood sufferers 2,500 Bibles, 7,141 Testaments and 28,026 Gospels. These books were outright donations, for they went to people who had not only lost their Bibles but nearly everything they possessed. This work was highly appreciated by state and county officials, as well as by the pastors and members of the churches involved. A significant fact in connection with this event is that numerous Roman Catholics who had never before read the Bible gladly received and appreciated the Book.

We beg that pastors preach a sermon each year upon the Bible, calling attention to the work of the American Bible Society. There is a general feeling throughout the church that there is need for a genuine revival of religion. It will come through a prayerful searching of the Holy Scriptures.

We recommend that our pastors join in giving one Sunday to the interest of the American Bible Society reminding all our people that the Bible is a most suitable gift for Christmas or any other special season. We recommend that all our pastors co-operate with our agencies in the fullest distribution of the society's publications.

That our conference heartily endorse the work of Rev. D. H. Colquette as agent for the American Bible Society and pledge to him our assistance in carrying forward this work in distributing the Holy Scriptures.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

To the Bishop and Members of the North Arkansas Conference:

We, your Board on Christian Literature, respectfully submit the following report:

The total sales of our Publishing House, the past year, were \$1,980,588, showing a net profit of \$130,586, an increase of \$12,194 over the previous year. Of this net profit the Book Committee has appropriated \$75,000, for the Conference claimants. Should this rate of profit be maintained another year, the amount paid this quadrennium to superannuates will be fifty thousand more than that of any other similar period.

The circulation of the Christian Advocate and the Quarterly Review remains about the same as last year. Dr. Millar reports about 1,000 gain in the Arkansas Methodist, the circulation now being more than 12,000.

In view of the fact that the enemies of christianity and the church are so zealously trying to poison the minds of our people with atheistic and degrading publications, we feel that we should redouble our efforts toward getting our homes amply supplied with our various periodicals.

To stimulate greater loyalty and devotion among our constituency we should co-operate with our Department of Tract Literature. That department is offering for free distribution an abundance of rich tracts on the doctrines of Methodism, History and Polity of the church, Evangelistic Work, and Christian Stewardship.

We recommend:

1. That the purchase of the property on 11th and Scott Streets in Little Rock as a home for the Methodist be approved and that the commissioners be authorized to raise funds for payment in such manner as they deem best.

- 2. That \$3,800 be assessed against the Conference for the Maintenance of the Methodist.
- 3. That the general editorial policy of Dr. A. C. Millar be approved and that he be reappointed editor and business manager.
- 4. That we pledge ourselves as pastors to put a vigorous circulating campaign at such time as may be agreed upon between each pastor and the manager with a view of putting the paper in every home in Arkansas Methodism.
- 5. That the pastors present from the pulpit the importance of reading christian literature so as to cultivate the habit of reading the best literature among our people that they may be sufficiently informed to co-operate with the church in carrying her programs.
- 6. That William Sherman, R. C. Morehead and J. M. Williams be re-elected commissioners of the Arkansas Methodist.

BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

To the Bishop and Members of the North Arkansas Conference: Brethren:

The report of the General Board of Church Extension to our Conference Board shows that that Board has met the unusual conditions due to the disasters in the flooded districts of last year with heroism. Many such churches have been aided.

In our own Conference this year there has been much activity in church building. We are gratified to know this. We are helping to the limit of our ability, churches which are asking for assistance. Our Conference loan fund is not being used as much as it should be. We have on hand more than two thousand dollars of this fund unasked for at the present. We believe more of the churches that need help and ask for donations, should ask for the kind help which our loan fund makes possible. While the Board feels that we should help churches that really need the help we can give, we also feel

that a congregation which makes little or no effort to pay its Conference claims, is for that reason, not entitled to much consideration when aid is asked. With our reduced assessment for Conference work for the ensuing year, it will be necessary for us to collect 100 per cent if we have our usual income.

COMMISSION ON BUDGET

No. 1

Whereas, we are no longer willing to let the North Arkansas Conference dollar represent only 51 cents; and,

Whereas, we are no longer willing for the North Arkansas Conference to rank third from the bottom in the list of Conferences arranged according to their payment of Conference Claims; therefore,

Be it resolved by this Annual Conference, that we take as our slogan:

"Conference Claims in Full—Every Church and Every District One Hundred Cents on the Dollar."

Be it Futher Resolved, First, That Conference Boards be requested to assume that all Conference Assessments will be paid in full, and to make their askings to the Committee on Budget accordingly.

Second. That Conference Rule "1" be amended by adding the following provision:

"Provided, that said commission shall have power, subject to the approval of the Conference, to reduce the amount appropriated to any District for Conference Work, but the amount thus taken off any such District shall not be added to the apportionment of any other District or Districts."

The rule as amended will read:

"That the Conference instructs the Commission on Budget, in apportioning assessments to the districts, to use the method laid down in the Discipline for the General Boards in apportioning the assessments to Annual Conferences; provided, that said commission shall have power, subject of the approval of the Conference, to reduce the amount apportioned to any District for Conference Work, but the amount thus taken off any such District shall not be added to the apportionment of any other District or Districts."

Third. That District Stewards be requested to apportion Conference Assessments to the various charges according to the plan laid down in the Discipline, the ability of each charge to pay:

"... they (the District Stewards) shall estimate and apportion among the several charges of the District, according to their ability to pay, the salary and traveling expenses of the Presiding Elder, together with the collections ordered by

the Annual Conference and assigned to the Districts by the Conference Commission on Budget. ... No. 219.

Fourth. That every member of this Conference, lay as well as clerical, pledge his time, his talents, and his money for the furtherance of this important work.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

No. 1

The Board of Education has given careful consideration to the report of the Board of Thirty referred to us by the Conference. Representatives of the Board of Thirty appeared before us and stated that the large gifts thus far offered for the location of the Central Institution at Little Rock were so conditioned that they guaranteed a minimum of \$2,000,000.00, and an adequate site of at least five hundred acres. Certainly this is small enough, and if possible, should be larger.

Accordingly, your board recommends the approval of the paper without amendment in order to show our solidarity with the Little Rock Conference in this important educational movement, but with the following solemn declaration and recommendation:

In approving the report of the Board of Thirty, the North Arkansas Conference records its strong conviction that the Board of Thirty should not consider any proposition to relocate the consolidated institution in Little Rock or any other place than Arkadelphia or Conway unless such proposition offers free of cost or obligation to the Board of Thirty a minimum of:

First. An adequate site of at least five hundred acres of land acceptable to the Board with light, water, sewer, and street car connections with the city.

Second. Money in the sum of \$2,500,000.00 or bona fide subscriptions guaranteed by financially responsible persons or institutions in such sums that the Board at any time that it may need the money can realize \$2,500,000.00 in cash from them. This sum is over and above any resources of the existing institutions, and should be paid within three years from the time the Board declares the location of the consolidated institution.

We also recommend that the question of re-location in some other city than Arkadelphia or Conway be settled on or before April 1, 1929.

Report of the Joint Board of Trustees of the Methodist Colleges in Arkansas to the

Little Rock and North Arkansas Conference

The Joint Board of Trustees has given much time and thought to the problem of Methodist education in Arkansas. Presidents Reynolds, Williams and Workman have given us whole-hearted and valuable assistance. Particular attention has been concentrated on the problem of Henderson-Brown and Hendrix College. Through sub-committees we have considered consolidation, differentiation of function and economies in administration. The reports of Presidents Reynolds and Workman on Park and Antioch Colleges are illuminating and helpful. At our request, the General Board at Nashville, Tennessee, through Dr. H. H. Sherman, Executive Secretary, had Dr. B. Warren Brown, of Chicago, an expert in making college surveys, conduct a survey of our three colleges and make

recommendations touching the vital problem before us.

As a result of these studies, the Joint Board of Trustees by a vote of 23 to 3 submits the following recommendations for the approval of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences:

- 1. That Hendrix and Henderson-Brown Colleges be merged into one senior college at one place.
- 2. That the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences remove the restrictions as to location of the consolidated institution, and authorize the Joint Board to study the whole situation and locate the merged institution wherever in its judgment the best interests of our whole educational program would be served.
- 3. That the Board shall determine the location of the consolidated senior institution on or before May 1, 1929. Until said consolidation has been settled and the location of the senior college finally determined, the old Boards shall continue to administer the three colleges.
- 4. That when the Board has fixed the location of the merged institution, it shall make up a budget of the needs of the several colleges under its control and conduct a Statewide campaign for funds to meet the needs of these institutions.
- 5. That if Little Rock or other new places should be selected as the location of the senior college, it is hereby made the duty of the Board to deal generously with Arkadelphia and Conway, to collaborate freely with the citizens of each of these two cities in working out a wise disposition or use of the college property and assets in each of the two towns, and to consider sympathetically the wishes of these communities, including the possible sale of the property for town or other school purposes, or the maintenance by the Board of a junior college or colleges as an integral part of the Board's system of schools.
- 6. That all of the provisions of the paper adopted by the Conferences February 28, 1928, except as modified herein, shall stand as law governing the consolidated Board.
- 7. When the Board has fixed the location of the senior co-educational college and the status of the other schools, they will have a charter prepared and when the same has been approved by a two-thirds vote of the Board of Education of the two Annual Conferences, it shall become binding on all parties.
 - I. THE FIRST RECOMMENDATION IS MADE BECAUSE:

First. After careful study no plan of differentiation has been found that would justify the separate maintenance of the two institutions. Every type of work suggested as a basis for differentiation could, we believe, be done as well or better in the merged institution and at a lower cost. The self-help plan, as clearly shown by the report of President Reynolds and Workman on their visit to Antioch and Park Colleges, is more expensive to maintain than a regular Standard A Grade College, and hence the economy of operation of the merged institution would release more money for the use of deserving students.

Second. On the basis of the actual figures available, it is conservatively estimated that the economy in operation of such a merged institution would save us \$30,000.00 a year. This is equivalent to six per cent on half a million dollars. In addition to this saving in operating expense, there would be a saving in capital investment with the one merged institution as against the two separately operated, which would in a period of ten years, it is estimated amount to a million and a half dollars.

Third. We do not see why any of of the spiritual values which give purpose and value to our whole educational program would be lost in such a merger. On the contrary, we believe that such a unity of spirit would result from merging two separate loyalties into one larger loyalty, that the real ends of our program of Christian Education would be promoted.

Fourth. While there are meritorious and valid reasons that can be advanced against the merging of the two institutions, the reasons that make the merger desirable seem to be conclusive.

The first Commission, created by the Conferences in November, 1926, reached the conclusion that it was unwise for us to attempt to maintain three senior colleges, and recommended as a solution juniorizing our three present colleges and the development of one central senior institution at Little Rock.

The second enlarged Commission, created by the Conferences of November, 1927, reached the conclusion that we could not maintain three senior colleges and recommended as a solution the consolidation of Henderson-Brown and Hendrix Colleges at Conway or Arkadelphia.

The Annual Conferences in special joint session, February 28, 1928, after debate lasting throughout the day and into the night, approved this same conclusion and recommendation

but added a provision that the Board should also consider the feasibility of differentiating the function of Henderson-Brown and Hendrix.

Dr. B. Warren Brown, an expert in college surveys and a man absolutely independent and disinterested, after a careful survey of our situation, reached the same conclusion and gives an array of facts to support his views.

Your present Board has done its best to make a fair and impartial study of the situation and, in view of all the facts in the case, we recommend that Hendrix and Henderson-Brown Colleges should be merged into one Senior College at one place.

II. THE SECOND RECOMMENDATION, NAMELY, that the Annual Conferences should be asked to remove any restrictions as to the location of the consolidated institutions, IS MADE BECAUSE

First. We are not sure that the merged institution should be located at either Arkadelphia or Conway, and under the act of the Conferences of February 28, 1928, the location is restricted to one of these two places.

Second. We believe that the Joint Board should be free to consider the desirability of Little Rock or any other city in our State as a possible location, and should be free to locate the merged institution in whatever place the Joint Board is convinced would best promote the interests and conserve the ideals of our educational program.

The remaining recommendations are self-explanatory.

JOINT BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE METHODIST COLLEGES IN ARKANSAS,

BE IT RESOLVED, That the acts and things done by the Board of Trustees of Henderson-Brown College on the 20th day of June, 1928, in adopting resolutions, borrowing for and in the name of Henderson-Brown College the sum of \$90,000.00, and executing notes or bonds of Henderson-Brown College therefor, payable to bearer, and in executing for and in the name of Henderson-Brown College, the deed of trust to the Bankers Trust Company, Trustee, on the properties of Henderson-Brown College, to secure the same, be in all things approved and confirmed.

Report No. 2, Board of Education

The following recommendations are made to the Conference:

That Christian Education Day be property and impressively observed in every Pastoral Charge.

That an Assessment of \$1,000.00 be levied on the Conference for the support of the Summer School for Pastors.

That the new law requiring two years of college work for Admission on Trial be carefully observed.

That Rev. R. C. Morehead be appointed Conference Secretary of Education.

That Rev. Horace M. Lewis succeed Rev. J. E. Cooper on Board of Education.

That the General Board of Education be asked to appropriate \$1,000.00 for the support of Solan-Hendrix Academy and the same amount for the support of Valley Springs Training School.

That Rev. J. B. Evans, Rev. F. M. Tolleson, Senator Joe T. Robinson, and J. W. Rogers be confirmed as members of the Board of Trustees for Henderson Brown College, to act until the affairs of the College are taken over by the united Board.

That the present Board of Trustees of Sloan-Hendrix Academy be reconfirmed for another year.

That the General Board of Education continue to aid in the support of our Student Pastor at Fayetteville, Arkansas.

That the \$90,000.00 bond issue of Henderson-Brown College for the purpose of funding their entire indebtedness be approved.

That we levy for the ensuing Conference year an educational assessment of \$12,250.00, to be distributed as follows:

Henderson-Brown College 22 1-2 per cecnt; Hendrix College 22 1-2 per cent; Galloway Woman's College 22 1-2 per cent; Valley Springs Training School 11.25 per cent; Sloan Academy 11.25 per cent; Student Pastor, First Church Fayetteville, 3.3 per cent; miscellaneous appropriations and expenses, including printing of Conference minutes, 6.7 per cent.

That C. W. Lester and Homer Pierce be confirmed as Trustees of Valley Springs Training School.

That the Board of Trustees of Sloan-Hendrix be given authority to sell or liquidate their properties at any time such action should be deemed wise by them. That we approve the plan of S. M. U. to ask for \$200.00 from each Presiding Elder's District for use of the Theological Students in S. M. U.

JOINT BOARD OF FINANCE

Your Board of Finance respectfully reports as follows:

We are happy over the increase in finances from the different sources which has made it possible for us to distribute to our claimants the largest amount in the history of our conference.

We are glad to report that the collections on balance of quotas for superannuate endowment are more than a thousand dollars in excess of last year. Many of the churches have paid the entire five quotas and other churches are assuming the entire amount divided into three equal parts, making arrangements to pay in full by the convening of the next general conference, 1930.

We urge upon all our pastors and people that they continue their plans for the payment of these pledges to this most worthy cause until the ten million dollar goal set by the general board be realized.

We would most respectfully urge our preachers and churches to remember that March, April and May have been set apart as a period when special effort to collect these unpaid balances should be made.

Group Insurance

A year ago this board sponsored the inauguration of a plan whereby our preachers are securing group insurance.

The monthly rate per thousand for all, regardless of age or physical condition, being only \$1.21. We are glad to report that there were 173 written up in the group, and that there has been only one lapse and one death. We are assured of a dividend on this first year of upwards of one thousand dollars. We recommend that this be applied in payment of expense for management, which is fixed by the original resolution, and that the balance of said dividend be applied to our Conference Superannuate Endowment Fund.

HOSPITAL BOARD

We, your Hospital Board, beg leave to submit the following report:

We have had before us, Dr. C. C. Jarrell, Secretary of the General Hospital Board, and his report showed the following items of special interest:

- 1. We now have eleven hospitals, an increase of three over last year's report. Value of these hospitals, \$8,000,000.
- 2. Value of new Duke Hospital and Medical College, \$10,000,000.
- 3. Value of free work done in all the hospitals of Southern Methodism, \$350,000.

4. Amount raised by Golden Cross, the whole church, \$50,000. Leading in the work is the North Georgia Conference with \$9,400, and Texas Conference with \$9,070.

Our Methodist Hospital at Memphis

During the year the Hospital has cared for 616 outright free patients; 148 preachers or their dependents to whom a discount of all of the room and board was extended, amounting to \$9,228.93. Special concessions, rebates and discounts were given to 228 others, amounting to \$6,070.22. The total amount for free work for the last twelve months has been \$67,208.45, this being a thirteen per cent increase over last year.

When it is considered that the entire amount of money received by the Hospital from the three supporting Conferences is only equal to twenty-three per cent of the amount of money spent by the Hospital in non-pay work, it must be admitted that our Hospital is making an excellent return to the Conferences for the money contributed.

Recommendations

The Board makes the following recommendations:

- 1. That we faithfully represent the Golden Cross Society by appointing the director and a special time to represent this matter before each congregation remembering that money collected for this cause may be credited by the Conference Treasurer on Conference claims.
- 2. Rev. F. E. Dodson has been chosen by the Board to represent it at the next meeting of the Southern Methodist Hospital Association to be held at New Orleans in the Spring.
 - 3. That we request an assessment for this Board of \$4,000.
- 4. That the following members of this conference be elected as trustees of the Memphis Hospital; Rev. William Sher-

man; Rev. J. R. Nelson; R. A. Scott, Earle, Arkansas; J. F. Fogleman, Marion; W. E. Jelks, McCrory and Mrs. W. L. Oliver.

Whereas this Board has received a communication from the Board of Stewards of our church at Bentonville, Arkansas, concerning the probability of securing land and assets for a Methodist Hospital at that famous health center and whereas, this Board has heard with interest the statement of Rev. W. T. Thompson, the pastor there, Dr. J. H. Lindsey and D. H. Breadlove of Bentonville in reference to the same proposition and whereas, this Board feels that this offer contains possibilities of such a character that we are not willing to let it pass, therefore we ask this Conference to request Bishop Boaz to appoint a commission to be composed of four preachers and three laymen who shall organize as soon as convenient and shall notify the trustees of the profit assets that they are authorized to act for the North Arkansas Conference in all negotiations concerning the proposed hospital provided that final action in the case shall be subject to review and approval by the North Arkansas Conference in session assembled.

We are glad to report that the Arkansas Methodist Home for Orphans is reaching our people more generally than at any other time. All of our preachers are taking more interest than ever before.

We had at the beginning of the year, 39 children. We have received during the year, 12, and placed in good homes, 15.

We have lost by death, two noble Christian boys this year in the Home. Up to date we have placed 474 children in the very best homes that we could procure. We now have 34 children in the home, our expenses have been unusually heavy this year, but the expenses have all been met and we come to the close of the year free of debt. Our efficient Superintendent, Dr. James Thomas, made us glad in his report that we are absolutely free of debt. No better managed institution can be found.

We recommend:

First. That the Conference through its Sunday Schools, Leagues and Womans Missionary Societies be asked to make a Christmas offering worthy of our Methodism and help the Methodist Home for Orphans to do a larger work.

Second. We ask an assessment of \$3,025.00 for this year.

- 2. That we recognize that our people must be led into a reinterpretation of the place of the Sabbath in their own lives, and that we pledge ourselves anew to that task.
- 3. That we reaffirm our faith in the value of the existing laws protecting the Sabbath, and
- 4. That we, as preachers and laymen give our utmost encouragement and support to those officers whose duty it is to enforce the laws.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

We are glad to report that progress has been made along all lines of our work during the year now closing. Of the 3,147 additions to the church on profession of faith, 2,500 came through the Sunday School. We report also a deepening interest and conviction in our mission enterprise due to the cultivation being systematically carried on through our schools. More of our schools are now sending in missionary offerings than ever before.

We recognize Valley Springs Training School as a missionary agency in religious education. We ask our people throughout the Conference to give this school prayerful consideration and liberal support.

The interest in training work is constantly growing. The number of credits taken in our standard work is larger than last year. Also the number of Cokesbury credits exceed those of last year and our efforts in this field are limited by our available teaching force.

The report of Mrs. Bessie Carpenter, Elementary Superintendent to our board shows increased interest and substantial gains in the elementary division.

Recommendations

- 1. We recommend that a Christmas offering be taken for the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage at Little Rock, and same be sent to Dr. James Thomas, Exchange Bank Building, Little Rock.
- 2. We recommend that our workers attend the leadership school at Mt. Sequoyah and the pastors' school at Hendrix College, and the Little Rock Training School.
- 3. We recommend the appointment of G. G. Davidson as Conference superintendent and Glenn Sanford as extension secretary, for the ensuing year.
- 4. We request the Commission on Budget to grant the Board an assessment of \$5,750.

5. We endorse the unified program of Evangelism as entered into by the various boards and recommend the cooperation of all our people in this program. We have appointed Ira Brumley and C. E. Gray as a Committee to represent this board with Rev. G. S. Davidson, ex-officio.

We have elected G. G. Davidson and Ira Brumley as members of the Board of Managers of the Pastors' School at Hendrix College.

TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

Dear Brethren:

We, your Committee on Temperence and Social Service report as follows:

Taking a casual review of the field, it seems that our people are becoming more and more intemperate; in dress, in food, in amusements and in their habits of life generally.

In many communities drinking and drunkenness are in evidence as has not been the case in many years. This, however, is caused largely by the laxity of enforcement of our Prohibition Laws.

But when we look beneath the surface and see conditions as they really are, we feel encouraged at the progress we have made and are more determined to continue our fight for Temperance not only in our nation, but extend the battle line to the ends of the earth.

We therefore recommend that our people not only use their suffrage to elect dry men to office, but co-operate with our enforcement officers and the courts in their efforts to uphold and rigidly enforce our Temperance laws so that no cause can be had for evil doers to make a plea for modification or repeal of any Prohibition law now existing.

We further recommend that we petition the Governor and Legislators of our state to write in our statutes a law making it a penalty to buy as well as sell intoxicants in any form.

We recommend that a school of Temperance be held next summer at Mt. Sequoyah.

Lastly, we recommend that B. L. Wilford, E. W. Faulkner, A. H. DuLaney, M. N. Johnston and D. L. Ford be elected trustees of the Arkansas Anti-Saloon League from the North Arkansas Conference for the ensuing year.

WESTERN METHODIST ASSEMBLY

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

The sixth year of the Western Methodist Assembly at Mount Sequoyah, Fayetteville, Arkansas, is the best we have known.

The Assembly grounds open early in June and will continue open until October first. Aside from the work of the Assembly proper in the different schools many persons from the southland knowing the beauties of the Ozarks and the numerous places for rest and recreation come to Mr. Sequoyah and engage a cottage for weeks or the entire summer season.

Many substantial cottages are now owned by Methodist from the patronizing conferences who spend the summer in fellowship and rest with the assembly multitudes.

The Assembly program began with an open forum and parliament by the Board of Temperance and Social Service and great was the enthusiasm in their sessions. There followed in rapid succession the schools of Missions, Evangelism, Sunday Schools, the Woman's Missionary Council regional meeting and the Epworth League Assembly.

Several of these programs were attended by the largest number of persons seeking training and inspiration in church work we have known. The approximate attendance during the Assembly season was 16,500. Our property values now aggregate \$106,299.34, with unsold lots estimated at \$89,475.00, making a total of \$195,774.34.

The Epworth League Building now advanced towards completion is worth \$20,000 and the beautiful Woman's Building erected by the Woman's Missionary Societies is worth \$33,000.

If the private holdings be added to these amounts, our assembly grounds and all buildings and improvements conservatively estimated would be worth \$250,000.00.

The Assembly serves a large constituency for training in Christian service and living. No denomination in the West has such beautiful and well equipped grounds. Every convenence, comfort and attraction is provided. A strong program already in preparation is promised for the next season.

We ask the co-operation of the preachers and people of the conference in promoting the Assembly and in co-operation by attendance and otherwise on the various programs.

Mr. G. C. Hardin, Rev. R. C. Morehead, and Mr. T. L. Hart, are now the trustees from your conference. If consistent with conference service and good will we would suggest their reappointment.

The Assembly Board earnestly requests that each Conference adopt the following resolution, or its equivalent:

In view of the fact that the Assembly is rendering the different Boards of our church very valuable service and at a strategic point and an opportune time, and that, without costing our Conference a dollar of regular funds, it has accumulated as a permanent asset of the church over \$250,000, and the further fact that its unexpectedly rapid growth and increased demands make it impossible for the Assembly to render the fullest and best service without financial aid other than it now has; therefore,

Be It Resolved That, without assuming assessment or specific obligation, we request our pastors, wherever possible, to arrange, with the advice and co-operation of the Assembly Superintendent, to have a Mt. Sequoyah service or program at which time the value and needs of the Assembly may be presented and a freewill offering taken and sent to the superintendent to be used for the improvement and maintenance of the Assembly; and, further, that our people be urged to consider large gifts to the Assembly for endowment, buildings and equipment.

The Conference year just closed has not been a very fruitful year in the matter of soul-winning, if we are to judge from

the reports of the pastors. Many pastors report only a very few additions on profession of faith and only a few report any considerable number.

We trust that the passion for soul winning has not departed from our church. Next year we are to study, as a part of our Missionary Cultivation Program, the great book on "Methodist Evangelism," by our own Dr. Goddard.

Then a plan has been worked out in our Conference by which we are to try hereafter to have a Unified Program of Evangelism in all our churches. That is, Epworth League, Sunday School, Women's Missionary Society and Lay Activities Committee shall all be represented on the Committee on Evangelism in the local church, and shall all be urged to co-operate in bringing about a great Church-Wide Revival.

We wish to voice our appreciation of the help that Dr. C. C. Selecman has given us by his great soul stirring messages which he has brought us during this Conference session.

We recommend, (1) That all our churches take up the study of Dr. Goddard's book, "Methodist Evangelism," early in the year as a preparation for a Church-Wide Revival. (2) That all our Pastors endeavor to have a real revival in every church in the Conference this year. (3) That Rev. B. L. Wilford be appointed Conference Missionary Evangelist.

We, your Board on Hospital and Prison Mission work, beg leave to submit the following report:

This is our initial report to the conference, as our Board was organized in December, 1927. We rejoice in the splendid achievements of the first year in this needy field of worthy endeavor. The Board employed Rev. Drury H. Colquette as Superintendent of the work. His report is indicative of this being a fruitful field of labor. During the year he visited 101 towns and made 114 visits to prisons, hospitals and alms houses; attended 12 conferences, speaking briefly of his work; attended 11 funerals; distributed 5,800 scripture portions, New Testa-

ments and Bibles; distributed 900 good periodicals, 600 song books and 500 tracts, traveling in all, 13,250 miles. As a result of this splendid work 55 persons made a profession of religion and many others manifested special interest. Our field is large and the people needy.

The aim of the Hospital Prison Mission Board is to minister to these 5,072 inmates of state institutions, as well as to the inmates of detention homes, county jails, alms houses and private institutions.

The Board makes the following recommendations:

- 1. That each pastor pledge himself to co-operate in a whole-hearted way with the Board and the Superintendent in making this work a greater success during the coming year.
- 2. That each district assume a quota of \$100 to further the work, said sum to be raised as the district deems best.
- 3. That this Conference give its endorsement to the appointment of Rev. D. H. Colquette as Superintendent of this work.

MISSIONARY MAINTENANCE PROGRAM

Director of Missionary Maintenance Program:

The first task was the planning and holding of the Missionary Institutes in each district. These institutes were attended by a large number of the pastors and missionary workers but we hope an even larger attendance will be had during the coming year. The missionary program of our church was ably presented at these Missionary Institutes by R. E. L. Bearden in a most effective way. I wish here to give credit to Brother Bearden for his wonderful assistance in this missionary cultivation period.

Then followed the cultural period in the local churches. A larger number of study books were sold than ever before. More people studied missions in the North Arkansas Conference this year than perhaps ever before. Many pastors reported the most helpful schools of mission ever held in their pastorates. This January-February mission study period has formed a permanent place in the calendar of a large number of churches. I predict that the cultural period will be an even greater success and blessing to our people next year than it has been this year. The book to be studied is written by our own Dr. O. E. Goddard. It is a book on evangelism, a field in which Dr. Goddard is especially qualified to write. A prayerful study of this book by preachers and people will be the means of awakening new evangelistic zeal in all our hearts.

The financial return on the Freewill offering were not as large as we had hoped. It it hardly to be expected that an offering coming from so many different units would be the same from year to year. I am of the opinion that some of the pastors in their zeal to emphasize the freewill nature of the offering left the impression that it did not matter much whether one made an offering or not. We perhaps need to recall in this connection one of Wesley's injunctions that we are to trample "under foot that enthusiastic doctrine that we are not to do good unless our hearts be free to it." There are seventy-two charges that have paid more on the offering than last year. Two districts, the Batesville, H. K. King, P. E. and the Fayetteville, Dr. F. M. Tolleson, P. E., have made larger offerings this year than the same districts made last year. An offering has been received from every charge in the following districts: Batesville, Paragould, Jonesboro, and Searcy.

The amount received by districts is as follows: Batesville, \$2,012.14; Booneville, \$997.28; Conway, \$1,273.07

Fayetteville, \$1,377.37; Ft. Smith, \$872.32; Helena, \$1,852,52; Jonesboro, \$1,624.23; Paragould, \$1,980.64; Searcy, \$1,747.80. Total, \$13,737.33.

The expense on the part of the North Arkansas Conference is as follows:

Office rent, \$172.25; Stenographic help, \$190.00; traveling, postage, printing, etc., \$204.81, and salary, \$2,000.00, making a total of \$2,567.06, which happens to be \$20.00 less than last year.

I wish to thank every presiding elder, pastor, and lay worker who has co-operated with Brother Bearden and myself in this particular missionary work of our church. The co-operation of the presiding elders is very essential in this work if the largest results are to be obtained. We are looking forward to next year's missionary program with a great deal of joyful anticipation.

Sequoyah Day and that the the morning service each pastor present the opportunities and needs of this assembly to his people and ask that they make a freewill offering, this amount to be sent to S. M. Yancy, Superintendent of Mt. Sequoyah, Fayetteville, Arkansas.

We also ask that the following be re-elected as trustees of our Western Methodist Assembly for the coming year: Dr. A. C. Millar, G. C. Hardin and R. C. Morehead.

We request that the Mt. Sequoyah Advisory Committee be made a permanent Committee to look after the interest of this Conference regarding our Western Methodist Assembly.

I., who is religious counsellor in Brown University; Harlan, doing graduate work in Vanderbilt University in Nashville; Charles, principal of High School, Searcy, Arkansas.

The religious life of this good woman had its beginning when she was yet a girl of twelve years. At that time she joined the Church and remained a faithful and consecrated member till the time of her death. As the wife of an itinerant Methodist preacher, she ranked well. REV. JOHN S. HACKLER

Brother Hackler, came into the Methodist ministry by the route frequently traveled by the old-time Methodist preachers. First, he was licensed as an exhorter by Rev. George A. Dannely, in the year 1881; then he was licensed to preach in 1883 by Rev. John H. Dye, as presiding elder.

It is not necessary to say to those who knew Brother Hackler, that he made full proof of his ministry. He loved his Bible, and had a very high regard for the fundamental doctrines of his church. He preached in a fearless manner the things which he believed and as a result many souls were born into the Kingdom of God.

The list of pastorates which he served, we find for mosst part that they were hard circuits. They gave very little remuneration, but this servant of the church kept right on and was not heard to complain of his earthly lot. During his last illness all his daughters, except one, and an only living son, remained for several days at his bedside, and I found to the great comfort of my own soul that each had the greatest reverence for their father, both as a man and a minister; and their testimony was to the effect that they had neither heard him murmur nor complain.

Brother Hackler, remained useful in his church right up to the time of his departure. He was superintendent of the Home Department in our Sunday School, which place he filled very acceptably. As long as any strength remained, he was found in his place at each service through the week. When he became aware that the end was near, and that he could no longer go to the House of God, he asked me to come to his room and let him partake of the elements once more of the broken body and the shed blood of our Lord and Saviour.

The end came on July 11th. We carried his body, first to the church in Rogers, and then to the home of his daughter in Fort Smith, where the funeral was held. We shall walk and serve for a time without him, but in "The Land Where We'll Never Grow Old," we shall meet him again.

He joined the old White River Conference at Helena in 1905 and served the following charges: Marked Tree, Auvergne and Weldon, La-Grange Circuit, Holly Grove-Marvell, West Searcy-Higginson, Monette-Macy, Crawfordsville, Vanndale-Cherry Valley, Bono Circuit, Marmaduke, Black Rock-Porita, Peach Orchard-Knobel, Stanford, Hardy-Williford, and Jelks Circuit.

His health failed in July and he was forced to give up his work. At the 1927 session of the Conference at Searcy, at his own request, he was given the superannuate relation. He and his good wife then made their home with their daughter, Mrs. Harry L. Kelly in Holly Grove.

A short time ebfore his death, in referring to his active ministry, re remarked that those twenty-three years had been years of pleasant service and good fellowship and was rejoicing that he had witnessed over 3,000 convrsions, and had received over 3,500 into the church, and had baptized more than 2,000 adults and infants. Again he was heard to remark, "While my superannuation leaves me sad, not having a charge to serve, no people to shepherd, as I face the future it seems that my sojourn will only be for a short time and I will exchange the cross for a crown. I am happy in Jesus, and all is well with my soul. There seems nothing left for me to do but to enjoy my religion, my children, and my friends, and this I am resolved to do. If I am gone when the North Arkansas Conference meets, tell the brethren that they know where to find me, that I have answered the roll call in heaven, that I have kept the faith and finished my course. I have endeavored to be true to my conference and to my Lord."

Brother Barrentine was truly a great and good man. He was one of God's noblemen. He gave his best to the church and the Lord. His life was a blessing to those who knew him. He was interested in the church to the last. He was a sympathetic and cheerful superamuate, always ready to help his pastor. He knew whom he had believed and was persuaded that He was able to keep that which he had committed unto Him against that day. He is resting from his labors and his works will follow him.

REV. ZACHARY TAYLOR BENNETT

Rev. Zachary Taylor Bennett, D. D. passed from labor to reward at his home in Fort Smith, January 10, 1928. His was a long life of diligent labor and useful Christian service.

Born at Somerville, Tennessee, June 30, 1849, he came as a child with his parents to Arkansas. In this early manhood, he was converted, and united with the Methodist Church, becoming at once an earnest worker therein.

He chose the profession of law in which his talent and ability must have scored a high mark, when came the call to preach. Of this momentous event in his life, he has left it recorded: "The call came to me so clear and unmistakeable one evening about sunset, as I started home after a busy day in Searcy ,that I got off my horse and knelt in the shade of a tree by the roadside and gave myself wholly to God and his service, to go where he wanted me to go."

With the courage of his convictions, and the eagerness always characteristic of him, he made ready at once for his life work. In 1974, at Searcy, he was admitted on trial into the Old White River Conference.

He was a man of many rare religious, social, and intellectual gifts, and he used all of them in the service of his Lord.

In 1888 he became editor of "The Arkansas Methodist," and gave the church a paper that has never been surpassed. He had unusual business acumen and made the paper self-supporting and financially strong, with the largest circulation of any paper in the state, not excepting "The Arkansas Gazette." Hand in hand with this work, he traveled much, preached in some pulpit every Sunday, usually both morning and night, urging better churches, better schools and no saloons. He carried his message into the remotest bamlets, and farthest countryside, summoning the people to a

vision of a fuller life for their children and succeeding generations. He was beloved wherever he went, and became one of the most widely known men in the state.

He continued as editor of "The Arkansas Methodist" for seven years, re-entering the pastorate in 1895.

Thereafter he was paster of our churches at Marianna, Paragould and Batesville, and presiding elder of the Paragould and Helena Districts for four years each.

Dr. Bennett was a strong gospel preacher. He was secretary of the White River Conference for many years and was recognized as being most careful and accurate in that office. He was a trustee of both Hendrix and Galloway Colleges and was twice elected delegate to the General Conference. He had a wonderful memory for names, faces and facts, and with a fine logical faculty was easily one of the ablest debators on the floor of the Conference.

In March 1910, on a day of bitter cold, he faced a snow-storm to keep an appointment at one of the churches in his (the Helena) district, and was stricken away from home with inflammatory rheumatism in the right knee. After more than a year's confinement to his bed, suffering intense agony that left him permanently disabled, he asked for the superannuate relation.

But even in the long seventeen years of his superannuation, his zeal for the work, his interest in every phase of the Churches' activity, never lagged.

More than half the years of his life were a physical martyrdom, beginning before forty years of age, and he went up pand down the highways and byways in his service of God and humanity, carrying a burden of pain that the world knew knot of. But no word of complaint ever passed his lips because of the stern affliction, the bitter trial, that bore down upon him.

For several months before his passing, it was realized that he was failing rapidly, and on the evining of January 10th, when the sky was gold with a winter's sunset, he seemed just to fall "asleep in Jesus," and his triumphant spirit sped home to God.

The writer was called to preach his funeral; and in the beautiful and sweetly solemn service held in his home, was assisted by his pastor, Bro. Dawson, and by Bros. Wade, Hook, McGlumphy, and Cline. He was laid to rest in Forest Park Cemetery.

An inspiring life is ended; an heroic spirit has passed from us. His works abode, the heritage of those who come after.
