FIRST DAY

Time Extended: The hour of adjournment having arrived, the Conference voted to extend the time to hear the result of the first, and take a second ballot, in the election of delegates to the General Conference.

Question 44 was called: Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?

Helena was placed in nomination by P. Q. Rorie and was unanimously selected as the place of the meeting of the next session of the Conference.

STANDING RULES FOR NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

That the Conference instructs the Commission on Budget, in apportioning assessments to the districts, to use the method laid down in the Discipline for the General Boards in apportioning the assessments to Annual Conferences; provided, that said commission shall have power, subject to the aproval of the Conference, to reduce the amount apportioned to any District for Conference Work, but the amount thus taken off any such District shall not be added to the apportionment of any other District or Districts.—1928 Journal.

That all undergraduates be required to report according to the call of the several committees before the opening of the Conference and that not one be allowed to take examination after Conference openings unless providentially hindered.

3. That the Conference Treasurer shall be allowed a commission of one per cent on all collections passing through his hands up to \$100,000 as compensation for his service, together with incidental expenses.—1918 Journal, page 30.

4. That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided by the Discipline, shall consist of two delegates from each pastorial charge to be elected by the Quarterly Conference.—1922 Journal, page 37.

5. That the figures answering the questions: "Members reported last year," be the figures printed in the Journal of

last Annual Conference.

6. That the Presiding Elders' figures of all the assessments be accepted as the official figures.

7. That the assessments for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.

8. That the figures answering the question: "Amount raised for Missions by Sunday School," be the figures which represented the amount to the Treasurer of the Conference Sunday School Board.—1925 Journal, page 19.

9. That all Statistical reports shall be turned in to the Statistical Secretary; and that all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer not later than 6 p. m., Thursday of Conference session or else the name of delinquents shall be reported to the Conference.—1916 Journal, page 32.

10. That the North Arkansas Annual Conference shall elect its Treasurer quadrennially, by ballot, without nominations, immediately after reading and passing upon the report

of the Committee on Nominations.—1926 Journal.

Reports of Board Committees

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The work of the American Bible Society is fundamental in all of our missionary operations. The great service rendered us in the translation of the Bible into languages where our Board of Mission operates is alone sufficient to warrant our support. The Holy Scriptures are available in 850 languages.

Next in importance is distribution. This is done without profit, the book being sold at factory cost or donated to those who cannot buy. The 1928 circulation of Scriptures by the Society reached the astounding total of more than eleven million volumes, the highest on record.

It is particularly gratifying to note that in China the Bible is more in demand than ever before. The distribution in China last year reached the high mark of 4,674,123 volumes. Latin America is also more open to the reception of God's Word.

Scriptures for the Blind is an important phase of the Society's work. American Braille, New York Point and other systems are supplied either by donation or at a nominal charge.

Universal Bible Sunday occurs the Second Sunday in December. We recommend that pastors preach a sermon on the Bible and direct the attention of their people to the important place in the Christian faith which the Holy Scriptures occupy, as well as the translation, publication and distribution of the Holy Scriptures carried on through the American

We recommend:

- 1. That our churches observe one Sunday in the year as Bible Sunday.
- 2. That we cooperate with Rev. D. H. Colquette, agent of the Society, who runs the Depository in Little Rock, in reaching our people with the Word of God.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Our publishing agents, Lamar and Whitmore, report for the year just closed total sales of \$1,966,927, with a net profit of \$105,000. Of this amount the Book Committee appropriated \$3,234 to the worn-out veterans of our Conference.

Since the superannuates and their dependents are the sole beneficiaries of the profits from the publishing house it is the judgment of your Board that our constituency should give their support and patronage whenever possible to our own publishing house.

During this quadrennium \$300,000 in net profits has been realized and distributed among the claimants, the largest amount from any similar period.

We would call attention to the Nashville Christian Advocate, our general organ, The Methodist Layman, The Quarterly Review, The Missionary Voice, and our own Conference paper, The Arkansas Methodist.

That we may have an informed membership it behoves us, as pastors and officials of the Church, to use our utmost diligence in an effort to increase the circulation and reading of these valuable periodicals.

With reference to the Arkansas Methodist, we find, from the reports of the Commission, the Editor, and the Commissioner, that this has been a difficult year for our paper. The Editor and the Commissioner have worked hard and we wish to commend their faithfulness and their personal sacrifices.

The circulation of 12,000 which was reported a year ago has been maintained. Many of these are now delinquent because of the delay in the campaign in many of the charges. Rev. J. J. Galloway, the Commissioner, worked hard on the circulation, also giving attention to the debt. He has secured pledges amounting to \$9,000. To take care of the balance due on the building and other indebtedness approximately \$20,000 is needed in additional funds.

We submit the following recommendations:

- 1. We approve the editorial work and management of Dr. A. C. Millar and recommend his re-appointment.
- 2. The paper needs the funds secured by the assessments, both to maintain The Methodist and to help liquidate the debt on the building purchased, therefore, we ask for the

continuance of the assessments and larger assessments, if possible.

3. We recommend the re-appointment of Dr. J. M. Williams, Rev. William Sherman and Rev. R. C. Morehead as Commissioners.

We further recommend that Rev. J. J. Galloway be appointed a member of this Board in place of Rev. J. B. Evans and elected Treasurer.

Appreciating the work of Rev. J. J. Galloway as Commissioner, we recommend his re-appointment to serve in connection with a regular pastoral appointment. We believe he can render valuable assistance in this way to the Methodist Headquarters with little extra expense.

4. In view of the fact that during these intervening months till the General Conference meets next May a number of vital issues will be discussed in the colums of the paper and that the membership of the Church may inform themselves on these issues, we earnestly request that the pastors pledge themselves to put on a vigorous circulation campaign during the months of January, February and March. By an early campaign losses such as were suffered last year will be avoided.

We further request that each pastor preach during the campaign a sermon on the value of Christian literature, urging our people to place one or more of our periodicals in every home.

- 5. The regular price of the paper will be continued at \$2.00 with a Club rate of \$1.50 for ten or more subscriptions. Pastors are authorized to give as a premium with each subscription the Arkansas Farmer, a sixteen page, twice-a-month agricultural journal for a year. A Travel Accident Policy for an additional payment of 75c with every subscription of \$2.00 or 90c when the subscription price is less than \$2.00. This policy in the Continental Life Insurance Company pays \$10,000 for death of the insured under certain circumstances, and is good for one year. Dangers of travel are increasing, hence everyone should carry protection. Persons not crippled can secure this policy from 10 to 70 years of age.
- 6. That we adopt the policy of cash in advance for subscriptions.

BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

The report of the General Board of Church Extension to our Conference Board shows that the Board has been severely taxed in trying to meet the needs caused by so many disasters in certain sections of our Church, While the Board has been unable to render the aid needed in every place, we are glad to réport that they have aided in most cases where Churches have suffered from these disasters.

We are happy to note that in our own Conference there has been considerable activity in church building. We are helping to the limit of our ability churches which are asking for aid.

We hope more of our needy places will avail themselves of the opportunity of using our loan fund. We have on hands more than \$2,500.00 in this fund.

While the Board feels that we should help Churches really needing a donation, we also feel that a congregation making little or no effort to pay its Conference claims is, for that reason, not entitled to much consideration when aid is asked. With our reduction in assessments for Conference work, we need a 100 per cent collection if we shall carry on as in the past.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

No. 1

Little Rock, Arkansas, November 15, 1929.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF THIRTY

To the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences. Dear Brethren:

For the purpose of carrying out your instructions given a year ago looking to a unified educational program, we held meetings in Little Rock, December 31, 1928, January 18, March 12, April 25, and October 21, 1929.

We carried out faithfully your instructions. You directed us to maintain Galloway as a standard Woman's College and to merge Hendrix and Henderson-Brown College into one College at one place. We interpreted your actions as instructions to secure unity, simplicity, economy and efficiency in our higher educational work. You also directed us to keep the two colleges entirely separate and distinct in their finances and educational tasks.

We considered Arkadelphia, Conway and Little Rock as possible locations for the merged institution. Being unable to secure the minimum sum required by conference action for locating the college in Little Rock, we accepted the \$250,000 offer of Conway and located the merged college there March 12 under the name Hendrix-Henderson College.

In keeping with the instruction of the Annual Conference to deal generously with either or both Arkadelphia and Conway, from which we might withdraw, the Board directed that the physical properties at Arkadelphia be deeded to the City of Arkadelphia free of debt. This has been done and the property is used for a State Teachers College created last winter by the Legislature.

The Board and the Administration have done everything possible to make your instructions to merge Hendrix and Henderson-Brown College a reality.

- a. We merged the names of the two colleges. The name of the athletes has been changed to Warriors and that of the paper to College Profile.
- b. We brought representations of both institutions into the faculty of the merged college by offering exactly the same opportunities to the members of Henderson-Brown faculty that we offered to members of the Hendrix faculty to become members of the Hendrix-Henderson faculty. Four alumni and two former members of the Henderson-Brown faculty are officers of the merged college.
- c. The Board aided the alumni of Hendrix-Henderson College in employing Superintendent W. T. Rowland, an alumnus of Henderson-Brown College, as Alumni Secretary of the Alumni Association of the College. The President, Executive Secretary and Corresponding Secretary of this Association and one-third of its members are Henderson-Brown Alumni.
- d. A seal appropriately symbolizing the merger is in use and official publications of the College are showing the same consideration for the history, traditions and founders of Henderson-Brown that is shown to those of Hendrix College.

On April 25th, the Board adopted a charter, the Annual Conference Boards of Education ratified the same, and the State Board of Education issued the Charter. The Board has been incorporated under the name "Arkansas Methodist Educational Corporation." (See copy of Charter hereto attached as Exhibit A).

Our unified educational program may be briefly defined as follows:

First. To provide Galloway with such resources as will qualify her for membership in the North Central Association at the earliest possible date and to meet the needs of a strong woman's college.

Second. To provide Hendrix-Henderson with such resources as will be needed to qualify her to meet the growing demands of a strong co-educational college.

Now that we have settled upon this as our educational program, the Conference should set the stage for a forward movement that will not only solve our educational problem, but will also mean a spiritual uplift for the entire Church in the State. We should signalize our achievement of educational unity with the realization of spiritual power.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

The time for discussion $h_{n,s}$ passed and the time for action is here. All recognize that we have a great program around which all may rally. That we may realize the largest possible fruits of this unified program we recommend:

- 1. That in order to help qualify Galloway for immedommend that beginning with the Fall of 1930 from funds col-Conference, and \$5,000.00 be given by the North Arkansas Conference to Galloway Woman's College. Provided the Galloway shall receive one-half of the money collected on the assessment for college aid, but in no case shall the appropriation for Galloway Woman's College be less than a total of \$10,000 from the two conferences.
- 2. That the remainder of such funds as may be raised by the two Conferences through assessments for College aid be given to Hendrix-Henderson College.
- 3. That in order to secure the funds needed for Galloway Woman's College and Hendrix-Henderson College, the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conference authorize the Board of Trustees to conduct a campaign for such sums as the Board may deem adequate to meet the needs of both Collegs,

to fix the time for the campaign, to organize it, to employ workers, and to provide for the financing of the same. These Colleges will need a minimum of a million dollars if they are to meet fully the demands of the Church upon them. February, March and April will constitute the active period of the campaign.

- 4. Feeling that it is necessary in initiating our common educational program that there be bodies empowered to act for the Annual Conferences, we request each annual Conference to give its Board of Education as an ad interim committee full power to act for the conference on any recommendation or request of the Board of Thirty involving any legal, charter or other steps or changes necessary to carry out the policy of the Conference touching our unified Educational Program.
- 5. That the Conference request the Churches to release for such time as may be needed, such pastors as the Board may need for field work during the campaign. This campaign will be under the direction of a committee of which Bishop H. A. Boaz, Harvey C. Couch, J. J. Harrison, J. M. Williams and J. H. Reynolds will constitute the nucleus; other names will be added. In addition there will be a large state committee.
- 6. Deeming these steps necessary in order to carry out the instructions stated and implied as given by your bodies at recent sessions, we now ask the Conference to join us in calling upon all alumnae and alumni of our colleges to assist in bringing our plans to a successful conclusion. To effect such a united effort, and to gain right of way for our program with assured success, we ask the help and leadership of our Bishop with that of all pastors and presiding elders, and we pray the cooperation of the entire Church. While the Board does not plan a popular campaign involving an every member canvass, they do expect the whole machinery, power and influence of the church to be unreservedly and whole-heartedly given to the campaign.

Looking toward these things that are before us with the help of Almighty God, with one heart and a common purpose in union and in strength, let us provide for our youth in Arkansas so as to assure them of educational efficiency and assure our Church of a leadership equipped for every good word and work,

CHARTER OF THE

ARKANSAS METHODIST EDUCATIONAL CORPORATION

Know All Men By These Presents:

That Jake Bateman, W. R. Boney, James A. Buchanan, R. H. Cannon, Charles T. Coleman, H. C. Couch, W. C. Davidson, J. J. Galloway, Mrs. James Graham, J. D. Hammons, J. J. Harrison, Mrs. F. V. Holmes, R. W. Huie, George W. James, L. B. Leigh, W. H. Matthews, R. C. Morehead, Paul W. Quillman, W. C. Ribenack, Paul Q. Rorie, Joe T. Robinson, Wyatt Sanford, William Sherman, S. G. Smith, E. R. Steel, W. R. Stuck, James Thomas, Charles L. Thompson, F. M. Tolleson and R. E. Lee Wilson, as trustees of the Little Rock Annual Conference and the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, have associated themselves together for the purpose of founding and maintaining institutions of learning in the State of Arkansas, and have adopted the following articles of association:

Article 1. The name of the corporation shall be the Arkansas Methodist Educational Corporation.

Article 2. The legal status and principal office of the corporation shall be in Little Rock, in Pulaski County, Arkansas.

Article 3. The purpose of the corporation shall be the advancement of Christian education in the State of Arkansas under the direction and control of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

Article 4. The corporation shall be under the direction and control of a board of thirty trustees, whose election shall be in conformity with the disciplinary requirements of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, as to church membership. The regular term of a trustee shall be six years. The persons named above shall constitute the first board of trustees, and shall serve until January 1, 1930, and until their successors are appointed as follows:

The North Arkansas Conference upon the nomination of the executive committee of the Board of Thirty, shall elect nine trustees, who shall reside within the bounds of the North Arkansas Conference, three to serve two years, three for four years, and three for six years from January 1, 1930; likewise the Little Rock Conference, upon the nomination of the executive committee of the Board of Thirty, shall elect nine trustees, who shall reside within the bounds of the Little Rock Conference, three to serve for one year, three to serve three yars, and three to serve five years.

"The Alumnae Association of Galloway Woman's College shall nominate two trustees to serve for two years; the Alumni Association of Henderson-Brown College shall nominate two trustees to serve for four years, and the Alumni Association of Hendrix College shall nominate two trustees to serve for six years. The names of these trustees shall be submitted to the two Annual Conferences meeting in November, 1929, for election. The 24 trustees above will select six trustees at large, two to serve for one year, two for three years and two for five years. These six trustees shall serve until the fall of 1930, when their names to be submitted to the two Annual Conferences for election.

Thereafter, vacancies will be filled as follows:

Vacancies in the Alumni trustees at regular biennial intervals shall be nominated and elected in like manner as above. Vacancies in the Alumni trustees group occurring at other times shall be filled upon the nomination of the Alumni Association, of which the retiring trustee was a member.

Trustees at large and Conference trustees shall be nominated by the Board of Thirty.

Each Annual Conference shall elect its own trustees and both Conferences shall elect all Alumni trustees and all trustees at large. Trustees shall serve until their successors are nominated and elected.

If an Annual Conference declines to elect a conference trustee as above mentioned, it shall be the duty of the Conference Board of Education to send in other nominations until elected. If an Annual Conference declines to elect a trustee at large or an Alumni trustee, it shall be the duty of the respective nominating authorities as above provided to submit other nominations until elected.

Article 5. The Board of Trustees shall manage and control the affairs of the corporation. The Board shall select one of its members as president, one as vice president, and shall also select a secretary and a treasurer, neither of whom need be a member of the Board. The Board shall have power to adopt by-laws to govern its actions, and may change them at pleasure. The Board of Trustees may fix the place of its meetings, and 16 members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article 6. The Board of Trustees snall be charged with the government of the institution established by its agency, or under its control, and shall appoint all officers and instructors thereof, and fix their salaries or compensations; but the Board may delegate their powers of government to the president and faculty of any such institution.

Article 7. The Board of Trustees may appoint an executive committee to serve during the interim between the meetings of the Board, and may delegate to the committee such powers as the Board may deen, advisable.

Article 8. The corporation shall have power to acquire, establish, merge, control and manage institutions of learning, including universities, colleges and academies, and branches thereof, and may locate them at such places in the State of Arkansas as the Board of Trustees, under the advice and subject to the approval of the Conferences, may determine. The corporation shall have the power to confer honors, degrees, diplomas and certificates in the names of the respective institutions.

Article 9. The Board of Trustees shall proceed as expeditiously as practicable to carry into effect the action of the two Annual Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in Arkansas, taken on the 28th day of February, 1928, and the action of the Board of Thirty appointed by said An-

nual Conferences to acquire the properties and the control of the institutions of Hendrix College, Henderson-Brown College and Galloway Woman's College, and to consolidate at the present site of Hendrix College, in Conway, Arkansas, Henderson-Brown College and Hendrix College as one coeducational collegiate institution of learning under the name of Hendrix-Henderson College, and to continue under its present name, Galloway Woman's College as a college for women; and the Board is hereby empowered to do and perform all acts and things necessary to accomplish the will and action of said Conferences with respect to unify the ownership and control of said institution.

Article 10. The corporation shall have power to sue and be sued; to contract and be contracted with; to make and use a common seal, and to alter the name at pleasure; to buy and sell property, real, personal and mixed and to take and hold property by gift, conveyance, devise or bequest; and it shall have the power to enter into co-operative relations with other educational institutions for the establishment and maintenance of such departments or schools as they may agree to correlate, and to make rules for the government of such departments and schools.

Article 11. The corporation shall have power to borrow money and to give securities therefor. It shall also have power, for investment purposes, to loan its funds, on such security as the Board of Trustees may deem sufficient, and to buy and sell stocks, bonds, debentures and other securities.

Article 12. If the corporation, through its Board of Trustees, shall merge two or more institutions of learning, the Board of Trustees shall designate the name of the merged institution. The Alumni of the respective institutions shall be the Alumni of the merged institution.

Article 13. This corporation shall be deemed in law, as it is in fact, the legal successor of Henderson-Brown College, Hendrix College, and of Galloway Woman's College, and of any college, academy or institution of learning it may acquire.

We urge our pastors and people to give careful consideration to the cause of Christian Education, by observing Education Day in the local church, presenting the cause of Christian Education from the pulpit, and stressing the Conference on Religious Education to be held at Junaluska.

We recommend:

That the General Board of Education appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars for the support of Sloan-Hendrix Academy; and the sum of One Thousand Dollars for the support of Valley Springs Training School;

That the memorial concerning the cause of Religious Education hereto appended be adopted. (See Appendix A.)

That Rev. R. C. Morehead be appointed Conference Secretary of Education;

That Rev. H. L. Wade be elected to succeed himself as a member of the Board of Trustees of Valley Springs Training School;

That the Board of Trustees of Sloan-Hendrix Academy be re-elected;

That the proceeds from the assessment for Education in general be applied as follows:

67.5% for College work, \$5,000.00 of this amount to go to Galloway Woman's College, and the remainder to Hendrix-Henderson College.

11.25% for Valley Springs Training School.

11.25% for Sloan Hendrix Academy.

3.3% for Student Pastor at Fayetteville.

6.7% for Miscellaneous purposes.

We recommend:

That the Board of Trustees of Valley Springs Training School be given full power to act in all matters pertaining to property of said institution.

That we commend most highly the very successful cooperation that is being manifested between the State Educational Department and our two secondary schools.

Appreciating the value of the work being done by our Student Pastor at Fayetteville, the Board of Education appropriates out of any available funds which it may have on hand the sum of \$500.00 additional for the support of that work, said money to be paid on or before the close of the Conference year 1929-1930.

Memorial to the General Conference, Dallas, Texas, in Session, 1930, Touching the Matter of the Establishment of an "Education Day."

Whereas, many colleges owned and controlled by the Conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, are maintaining Departments of Bible and Religious Education wherein they are training general Christian workers and special workers for Sunday School, Epworth Leagues and Missions, and are supplying most of the ministerial leadership for our Conferences; and,

Whereas, at this time neither the colleges nor these departments have any point of direct contact with the local church wherein their interest may be advanced, or their maintenance provided for; therefore,

Be it resolved, by the North Arkansas Conference in session at Russellville, Arkansas, November 27, 1929, that we memorialize the General Conferences in session at Dallas, Texas, 1930, requesting that body:

First. To set apart one fifth Sunday in the Conference year as Education Day.

Second. To arrange on this day for the cause of Christian Education to be presented to the local congregations, the Sunday Schools and the Epworth Leagues.

Third. To give an opportunity to each congregation, to each Sunday School, and to each Epworth League to make an offering for the maintenance and advancement of College Departments of Bible and Religious Education under their conference jurisdiction.

Fourth. To have such contributions as shall be made sent by the pastor or church treasurer to the Treasurer of the Conference Board of Education, that he may dispense the same as the Conference may direct.

We, your Epworth League Board have made the following appropriations: \$25.00 for the use of the president of the board; \$500.00 to carry on the conference program of the league; \$100.00 for the Epworth League building at Mt. Sequoyah, and \$200.00 to the district secretaries.

We are delighted with the great work that is being done in our assemblies at Galloway College and at Mt. Sequoyah. Our young people who attend these assemblies are greatly benefited and go back home with greater vision for their work in the church. We urge our pastors to see that each League have representatives at these assemblies.

We make the following recommendations:

First, that the local chapters of the Epworth Leagues have charge of the evening services on conference night, in the absence of the pastors, and that an offering be made to apply on the conference Epworth League program.

Second, the election of E. B. Williams and E. E. Stevenson to the Epworth League Board to take the places of Roy M. Black and R. A. Teeter.

JOINT BOARD OF FINANCE

Group Insurance

The report of the Rev. H. Lynn Wade as manager of our Group Insurance shows that 169 of our men are carrying insurance to the amount of \$292,000.00 with the Equitable Life Assurance Society of New York.

All of the men coming into our conference by transfer or admission are entitled to this insurance as follows, regardless of age or physical condition:

Those receiving \$1,000 salary or less, \$1,000 insurance.

Those receiving from \$1,000 to \$3,00, \$2,000 insurance.

Those receiving \$3,000 salary or over, \$3,000 insurance.

We are glad to note that there have been no losses by death, and we are assured that the premium dividend will be sufficient to cover the slight increase in premiums for the coming year as well as the expense of management, and we recommend that the Annual Premium Dividend be used in that way or such amount of it as will be necessary for said purpose; the balance of said premium to be held in reserve.

Conference Board Incorporated

In compliance with the request of the Conference last year our Conference Board has been incorporated under the corporate title, "Conference Board of Finance, North Arkansas Methodist Episcopal Church, South." We are now authorized under the above name, by the laws of the State of Arkansas to hold in trust property, lands or funds for the benefit of our Conference Claimants. And we urge our preachers and people to advocate and encourage donations to this Board for the above mentioned purpose, and also the custom of mentioning this cause in the making of wills and bequests.

North Arkansas Conference Superannuate Fund

We are happy to announce that our own Conference Superannuate to Endowment Fund, having been added to by various collections and donations in the past, and the \$500 gift from our Group Insurance dividend now amounts to \$5,518.50. This fund is held and administered by our General Board of Finance at St. Louis under the supervision of Dr. L. E. Todd, the general secreetary. The total amount received by him as interest this year is \$2,753.13, which will be distributed to our North Arkansas Conference Claimants.

Special Effort Campaign

We, your Conference Board of Finance, appreciate very much the effort put forth by our pastors, presiding elders and churches for the Cause of Superannuate Endowment this past year, yet we are far from the completion of our goal on this worthy cause in our conference.

The report from the General Board is encouraging, and we urge all our forces to push forward till the final \$10,000.00 goal is reached.

We appreciated very much the visit of Dr. Luther E. Todd, the general secretary, with our Board and the Conference. We have profited by his wise council and his unique leadership.

We want to congratulate the more than tweny charges which paid their five-year quotas. We recommend that they continue to assist in this matter along with those who are yet behind, by placing a definite amount in their budgets for this cause wherever it is practicable.

We recommend that the month of April, one of the three months set aside by the General Conference for Special Effort Campaign to collect Superannuate Endowment, be made and extra time for this purpose when this cause shall have full sway in all our charges.

We further recommend and request that the Presiding Elders in arranging their District Conference programs, make a place for the discussion of this worthy cause.

Your Conference Board recommends the appointment of Rev. H. Lynn Wade as Conference Director of Superannuate Endowment to serve in connection with his regular itinerant work.

HOSPITAL BOARD

We, your Hospital Board, wish to make the following report for current year, 1929:

General Hospital Board Report: Dr. C. C. Jarrell of the Board addressed the conference and his report showed the following interesting facts: (1) Twenty-three years ago our church had not a single hospital in the United States. (2) There are now eleven Southern Methodist Hospitals, nine of which have been built in the last years. (3) Our hospitals now have 1,701 patient beds, treating annually 32,275 patients, including \$400,000 worth of free service in 1928. (4) We have a total hospital valuation of \$19,500,000. (5) The Golden Cross raised \$66,000 in 1928 which was an increase for the whole church over 1927 of \$16,000.

Our Methodist Hospital at Memphis: This hospital admitted 5,357 patients this year, of whom 1,023 received free treatment to the amount of \$86,213.14. From the territory of this Conference came 399 patients to the Hospital and 122 of these received free treatment to the amount of \$13,517.15. Included in this number were 19 pastors, or their dependents, who received free service to the amount of \$2,267.35. At this hospital is maintained a school of nursing which is one of the best in the South.

This is our second report to the North Arkansas Annual Conference, as our Board was formally organized in December, 1927. We rejoice in the good work of our Superintendent in this needy field. The Board employed Rev. D. H. Colquette to give as much time as possible to this work. During the year he has visited prisons, almshouses, hospitals, and

State farms; attended many District Conferences and meetings and has held religious services in the various institutions to which he went.

Brother Colquette has started libraries in several of our penal institutions and a number of books and helpful literature has been added.

While our Church is a pioneer in this phase of work, yet the labors of our Superintendent are well known throughout the Conference.

In view of the great opportunity and the wonderful response with which this field of work has been received, we recommend the following:

- 1. That each pastor pledge to cooperate in every way with this Board, by personally visiting the jails and almshouses within the bounds of his charge and also by cooperation with Bro. Colquette.
- 2. That this Conference hereby approve in the appointment of Rev. D. H. Colquette as Superintendent of the Joint Board of the two Arkansas Conferences and that each District make suitable provision for his maintenance, approximately \$50 for District.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

It enabled us to send out a corps of new missionaries to fill up the ranks which had been depleted. It saved our missionary work in the hour of seeming disaster. At the same time it has stimulated the missionary spirit and increased the missionary knowledge of the church in a remarkable degree.

We are grateful to Almighty God for the success of the missionary cultivation movement during the past three years and we congratulate and thank the Presiding Elders, Pastors, and People, whose self-sacrificing work made such success possible.

We believe that the study of evangelism during the cultivation period the past year proved a spiritual blessing to our church.

We pledge our hearty support to this movement during the coming year, pledging ourselves to work heartily for the success of the study period and endeavor to raise the full share of our conference askings in the free will offering, making our goal an offering from each pastoral charge in the bounds of the North Arkansas Conference.

We respectfully ask our Presiding Elders to hold their missionary institutes, provided for in the discipline, early in January, to make them wholly and distinctively missionary, and to name the exact dates and places for these institutes before the adjournment of this conference.

We rejoice in the fact that our conference shows a gain in collections on benevolences this year, both in amount and percentage. While we are not realizing as much for Conference missions as under the old plan of assessments, yet we are receiving more for missions in general. A large number of our charges paid in full this year than ever before. We urge our brethren to press toward the goal: "Every charge 100% on conference claims."

ORPHANAGE BOARD

We are glad to report that the Arkansas Methodist Home for Orphans is reaching our people more generally than at any other time. All our preachers are taking more interst, than ever before.

We were glad to have with us in our Conference, Dr. James Thomas, Mrs. Steed, Rev. H. D. Sadler and a number of the boys and girls from the home.

We had at the beginning of the year 34 children; we have received during the year 18, and placed in good Christian homes 8. We have lost by death one bright little girl.

Up to date we have placed 482 children in the very best homes that we could procure. We have now in the home 43 children.

Our expenses have been unusually heavy this year, but all the expenses have been met, and we come to the end of the year free of debt.

Our Superintendent, Dr. James Thomas, made us glad in his report, that we were absolutely free of debt. No better managed institution can be found.

We recommend:

First. That the Conference through it's Sunday Schools, Leagues, and Missionary Societies together with the congregations be asked to make a Christmas offering worthy of our Methodism and help the Methodist Home for Orphans to do a larger work.

Second. We ask the same assessment as last year, \$3,025.

ARKANSAS METHODIST ORPHANAGE

We, your Board of Control, hand you, through the Superintendent, Dr. James Thomas, our annual report for the year closing October 1st, 1929. The year has been a successful one, wrought with some sorrow and disappointment, but upon a whole, it has been satisfactory. We lost our bright little girl, Nellie Kooper, by death in August. We did everything possible for her, securing all of the medical aid that our good physician, Dr. Barrier, suggested and finally sent her to the hospital where she died. Of course, with a family as large as ours, and getting children from all kinds of environment, it is wonderful that we have such a low death rate.

We had in the beginning of the year, 34 children, and we have placed in what we believe to be good homes, 8 children, these together with the death already referred to, make 9 who have gone from the Home. We have received during the year 18 children and now have a colony of 43. Up to the present time, we have placed 482 children in the best homes that we could procure.

You will observe from the financial statement that our Christmas Offering, which is so absolutely necessary to the on-going of our Home, does not seem to appeal to the brethren of the North Arkansas Conference as it does to the brethren of the Little Rock Conference. Why this is true, we cannot tell. We hope the brethren on the Board from that Conference will do what they can to popularize this great institution.

We have one girl to finish the high school last June. Also one girl to finish the junior high school. All of our children are in school and are getting along well in their studies. We have two pupils in junior college here in Little Rock.

The Reverend H. D. Sadler is the pastor of our church for the Home, Highland, and our Orphanage family love him very much. They are all at work in the Sunday School and Church.

On account of the sickness and death of our little girl which we have already mentioned, our expenses have been heavy as the financial statement will reveal. Another thing that adds to our expense is an electric refrigerator. When it became necessary last Spring to change the refrigerating system at the Home, the Board authorized the Superintendent to install a Frigidaire. This was done and the electric refrigerator is giving immense satisfaction and within a few years will pay for itself in the saving of ice.

You will see at once that but for the increasing liberality of our people in their Christmas Offerings that we could not run without debt as we do and yet, our Conferences do not pay one-fourth of what the Carolina, Georgia and other Conference pay, though I thank God that our people, especially in the Little Rock Conference, are increasing their gifts. We therefore recommend that you ask the Conferences for a Christmas offering, running through the Sunday School and all of the auxiliaries as well as the public congregations on Sunday, December 22nd.

We further recommend that you give us the same assessment as heretofore, to-wit—\$5,000.00, from each of the two Conferences.

We have no over-head expenses for a traveling collector. Our preachers and heads of departments only represent us. For the reason that we are never in debt and in no way troubling our people, we fear sometimes that many overlook

us and our humble opinion is that it is the greatest institution that belongs to the Church.

Your Superintendent and Board of Trustees feel sure that if the brethren of the ministry and Sunday School Superintendents and teachers and all other leaders would get this matter on their hearts and unequivocally present it to our people, they will increase their Christmas offerings and thus make it possible for us to increase our plan.

TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

As we survey our field of operations we thank God and take courage. While conditions are far from ideal and the goals reached not at all satisfactory, we are quite sure that much progress has been made toward the true objective.

We rejoice in the fact that increased activities are everywhere manifested, on the part of officials and people to enforce our Prohibition laws. We, therefore, recommend that as a church we stand solidly behind all law enforcement officers in their efforts to uphold and enforce all laws, especially those pertaining to the 18th Amendment and the Christian Sabbath.

We desire to go on record as being unalterably opposed to the Race Track Gambling Bill passed by our last State Legislature and hearitly commend Governor Parnell in his promptly vetoing the same.

We condemn the Sunday Baseball Law for Pulaski County which is a long step toward the descration and breaking down of our Christian Sabbath, not only for Little Rock and vicinity but for the entire State. God made the Sabbath for man to use for the development of his spiritual nature and rest from physical toil.

We further recommend that we give our support to the Shepard Bill now before Congress which makes the buyer equally guilty with the seller.

We commend work done by Superintendent W. J. Losinger of the Anti-Saloon League and recommend that our Pastors invite him into their pulpits to present the cause of Temperance to our people.

We further recommend that B. L. Wilford, E. W. Faulkner, A. H. DuLaney, M. N. Johnson and D. L. Ford be elected trustees of the Arkansas Anti-Saloon League from the North Arkansas Conference for the ensuing year.

MT. SEQUOYAH ADVISORY COMMITTEE

We are glad to report that progress is being made at Mount Sequoyah. We feel that our Western Assembly is getting an increasing grip upon the leaders of the patronizing conferences. The interests of our church which are being served at this training center are, The Sunday School, The Epworth League, The Mission Boards, Lay Activities, and Temperance and Social Service. The needs for training the masses of our leadership in these phases of our church's activities make the Western Assembly indispensable to the Conferences in this territory.

The Western Assembly grounds are valued at \$200,000.00. The Epworth League Board and the Women's Missionary Society have each built substantial building valued at \$90,000.00. The friends of the Assembly in Arkansas have built a library and reading room, which will be known as the Arkansas Building, which meets a great need in the work of the different organizations carry forward their program of training.

The Assembly now has an indebtedness of \$36,000.00. For the liquidation of this indebtedness and for further develop-

ment of the equipment of the plant we must look to the patronizing conferences for funds. Therefore in recognition of the cooperation of the other conferences we recommend that the first Sunday in April be set aside as Mount Sequoyah Day. We ask that the Presiding Elders call attention of the pastors to this matter in the beginning of the year so that it may be recognized and placed in the calendar of the year's work. We request also that our pastors bring our Western Assembly forcefully before our congregations and that an offering be taken for its support. We recommend also that a goal of \$200.00 be raised in each district for this purpose, the same to be sent to Rev. S. M. Yancey, Fayetteville, Ark.

We recommend that G. C. Hardin, Tom Hart and Rev. R. C. Morehead be reappointed as trustees.

We would like to emphasize his statement with reference to the proper preparation for a revival, by the use of the survey and the enlistment of personal workers before the meeting begins.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. A. H. Dulaney and B. L. Wilford, as Conference Evangelists and the recognition of Rev. H. C. Hankins, as Conference Evangelist.

MISSIONARY MAINTENANCE PROGRAM

The Missionary Institutes were held in all the districts with great enthusiasm and permanent results. Most of the pastors and large delegations of lay workers attended these meetings. The presiding elders took a healthy interest in these institutes. Without the co-operation of the presiding elders neither the cultural nor the financial part of the program can succeed. The essential financial part of the program can succeed. The essential need and the effectiveness of the presiding eldership is thrown in bold relief in such a program as we have.

The mission study classes were helpful. The pastors ordered 400 copies of the mission study book, "The Methodist Evangel," by Dr. Goddard. This part of the work strikes at the real heart of the need of our Church. The mountain of missionary ignorance and indifference among our people is yet to be blasted by missionary information. This is a slow process but in the end large and permanent results will be had.

A larger number of courses in Stewardship and Missions have been given in training schools than ever before. We feel that the demand for mission courses is on the increase which is a healthy sign. A larger number of credits were issued from my office in the Local Church Department of the Enlarged Plan of Missionary Education. The first school of missions in the Leadership Department by any pastor was conducted this year in Gardner Memorial church with Rev. Ira A. Brumley as instructor with good results.

We had hoped to have an offering from every charge in the Conference. There are 27 charges from which no offering has been received. We are glad to report that there are 84 charges with a larger offering than last year. There are four charges with an offering the same as last year. The following districts have an offering from every charge: Conway, Helena, Booneville, Paragould. The following districts have a total offering larger than the total last year: Booneville, Conway, Jonesboro.

Rev. J. J. Galloway, commissioner, worked faithfully on circulation and debt. When the influence of the political campaign is considered, the circulation is good. During the last two months he has secured in pledges about \$9,000. Bishop Boaz has shown great interest and has helped to plan for the campaign. As all debts amount to approximately \$28,000, it will be necessary to raise about \$20,00 more. Bro. Galloway will submit his plan, approved by Bishop Boaz for raising the balance.

The present moral condition of our country and the influence of the secular press are such that more than ever before do we need our church papers. Unless our people read our church papers they will not understand nor appreciate the great programs of our Church. It is therefore highly important that all pastors create a deeper interest in the reading of genuinely Christian literature. If the pastors fail in this it will not only be done and moral decline will inveitably follow. Without appreciating the activities of the Church the next generation will lack royalty. We implore the pastors to do their whole duty to cultivate the reading habit among their people. Let us lay emphasis on the circulation of the denominational paper and other Christian literature.

During the past year the paper lost heavily by the postponement of the circulation by the pastors. Having tried the Club rate of \$1 with meager results we recommend that it be discontinued. A clubbing proposition with the Arkansas Farmer, a fine agricultural paper, offers inducements for subscribing.

We submit the following recommendation:

1. We approve of the editorial work and management of Dr. A. C. Millar, and recommend his re-appointment.

- 2. Appreciating the work of Rev. J. J. Galloway as commissioner and complying with his request that he be given a pastoral appointment, we recommend that he be re-appointed commissioner to serve in connection with a regular pastoral appointment. We believe that he can in that connection accomplish the necessary work for the paper and the Methodist Headquarters.
- 3. We need the funds provided by the assessments not merely to maintain the paper, but to help meet the purchase price of the real estate; hence we ask for the continuance of the assessments, and their increase if possible.
- 4. We request the appointment of Rev. W. C. Martin of Little Rock Conference to take the place of Rev. E. R. Steel, whose ill health makes it impossible for him to render active service.
- 5. We recognize the good work done by many of our pastors and in view of the fact that only the pastors can successfully promote the circulation and the further fact that the campaign should be made early in the year in order that the church may get the full benefit of its influence, we earnestly request that the pastors pledge themselves to put on a vigorous campaign for the circulation of the paper during January, February and March, and endeavor to complete the same by May. Last year the paper suffered severly because of the postponement of the campaign. We ask that during the campaign period each pastor preach on the Value of Christian Literature, and urge their people to put the denominational paper into every home. Our goal should be, "The Arkansas Methodist in Every Methodist Home in Arkansas." That would give a circulation of about 30,000, and with that circulation the problems of the paper would be solved.
- 6. We have fixed the regular price of the paper at \$2, and \$1.50 in clubs of ten or more and we authorize pastors to give as a premium with every subscription the Arkansas Farmer, a 16-page, twice-a-month agricultural journal, for a year. We also still offer as a premium the Travel-Accident Policy for an additional payment of 75 cents with every subscription at \$2, or 90 cents when the subscription prise is less than \$2. This policy in the Continental Life Insurance Co. pays \$10,000 for death of insured under certain circumstances and is good for one year. Every one should have it, because the danger of accident is now very great and this is a fine policy at a low price. It can be had for all persons between 10 and 70 years of age who are not blind or crippled.

Let us unite to solve our paper problem this year, raise the funds to pay all debts, and have a \$20,000 piece of property on which to erect, when we are ready, a fine Headquarters Building for Arkansas Methodism.

REV. J. H. STURDY

Rev. John Henry Sturdy was born in Missouri, October 23, 1850. Deceased January 7, 1929, at his home at Brightwater, near Rogers, Arkansas. Brother Sturdy was a preacher for about forty-five years, a while as a local preacher and for a good many years as an itinerant. He never served many places that might be called high places; yet he served well the appointments assigned him, and, after all, that is as high an appointment as any man can serve.

He was a plain preacher, going about all the time doing good and serving the church with the best of his ability. He was not a noted preacher, but he was a good, sound Gospel preacher, who stayed by the fundamental teachings of the Holy Scriptures. He served in the day when it was a pioneering undertaking in many places, going on horseback, on foot and running the risk of life many times to meet appointments, yet never murmured.

The type of service that this good and faithful man has rendered is the kind that lives after the body has long decayed.

Since Brother Sturdy superannuated he served the War Eagle Circuit, which was one of the hardest appointments in the Fayetteville District, and did a good work, and the people loved him.

Brother Sturdy was twice married, Mrs. Eliza Sturdy surviving him. He is also survived by his sons, Dave, Floyd, Lee, and J. H. Jr., and his daughter, Mrs. Will S. P. Nance.

The Church has lost a good man and a useful man, whom all the community in which he spent his last days will greatly miss, and whom Heaven will gladly honor.

Funeral services were conducted first at the new church at Bright-water and then at Elm Springs, by his pastor, Rev. W. C. Hutton, and his presiding elder, Rev. F. M. Tolleson. The remains were laid beside his first wife to await the last great call.

REV. BASCOM MONK

At his home in Cabot, Sunday morning, at the age of seventy-one, Rev. Bascom Monk, a superannuate member of the North Arkansas Conference, passed away, following a week's illness from influenza. Reared in Arkansas, he was admitted into the Arkansas Conference in full connection in 1877, and after eighteen years of faithful service was obliged to take the superannuate relation on account of the condition of his eyes. For many years he lived near the Mt. Tabor Church on Austin Circuit, but a few years ago he moved to Cabot. A man of beautiful christian character, a good preacher, thoroughly acquainted with the doctrine and policy of the church, loved by all who knew him, often preaching in the local church when his health would permit, he was useful and helpful, although deprived of the privilege of serving in the field for many long years. He is survived by two brothers and a sister, and three sons, D. D. Monk of Cabot, Olin Monk of Holly Grove and Rev. Marion Monk of Dillard, Oklahoma. His older brother, Dr. Alonzo Monk, had passed away only a few days before.

With his fine little family, he occupied the nicely kept parsonage and was distinguished for his splendid preaching and special efficiency in revival work. His skill also in handling domestic interests was unusual. On small pay he could live in good form, and bring more people to Christ than any man of his territory. And few of his Conference could excel him in "putting over a great work for his charge,

His delight was a big circuit, and plenty of revivals. He was "called of God," to seek the lost, and was a well instructed student, easily competent for any place to which assigned by his Church. When he was in the pulpit no one grew weary, and always the M. E. Church, South, and his pastoral charge was honored by his ministrations. His blindness was the trouble. A great future was naturally before him, except for this one distress. No preacher was ever more patient under trying conditions. Even unto the finish of his active career he was brave and true, and eminently useful. And finally compelled by his failing sight to retire from the pastorate, he was a caged eagle and a chained lion. His heart endowments and fine attainments gave profound concern to do more in valiant service. Compeling restrictions, however, could only be heeded. He was greatly admired by the people who knew him best, and few men of his Conference were richer in sincere friendship.

Such men are "the salt of the earth" and "the light of the world". As a consequence of his presence in a given community the entire people lived nearer God. They protested when he was assigned another charge.

And now that he is transferred to the Universal Metropolis, thousands will say, "We have lost a friend," and a "good man and minister of Christ has entered Heaven".

Multitudes, also, will pray that the Angel of Peace, and the care of God, shall be about the small company who linger at the home.

REV. M. M. SMITH

Rev. Matthew Monroe Smith was born in Hardin County, Middle, Tenn., January 10, 1849, and died at Paragould, Arkansas, March 14, 1929, at the age of eighty years. He came to Arkansas in 1869, was licensed to preach at the first quarterly conference at Newport, March 27, 1975, and joined the White River Conference, serving eight years on Circuits, eight years on stations, and twenty-three years as presiding elder on six different districts. Much of his time was spent in Jonesboro and Paragould March 23, 1871, he was married to Miss Mary L. Chandler of Jackson County, who died about two years ago. His dear companion, after a long illness, went to glory April 27, 1926. After her death he made his home with his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Ross Ford. He superannuated in 1916.

He was thoroughly versed in the doctrines and polity of our Church, and his preaching was substantial and edifying. He was a good man and so lived that he had the confidence of all the people who knew him. He was distinguished for his lack of pretense, for his utter faithfulness, and his dependability. Without any ostentation or effort to promote himself, Brother Smith was the real leader of Old White River Conference for many years.

Brother Smith rendered a long and faithful service. His church honored and trusted him. He represented his Conference three times; in St. Louis, May, 1890; in Memphis, 1894; in Oklahoma City, May, 1914. He was for many years a trustee of Hendrix College. He was wise in his counsel and trustworthy in every place of responsibility.

He was best of all, a great saint. No man among us has had the love and esteem of all the people more than he. In Paragould, where he spent the closing days of his life, he was loved and revered by all the people. His presence among them was a great benediction.

He was deeply devoted to his children. In the diary which he kept, he often expressed a wish and a prayer that God would keep them and help them to be true to him.

He often spoke of the approaching end of his life, and looked for his call home every day. He seemed to feel that he would be called suddenly. He went to bed only a few hours before the call came. His daughter did not know that he was seriously ill. A peculiar sound of suffering was heard and they hurried to his bedside. His spirit had gone to God. Without a struggle he went home to be with the wife and children he loved. His funeral was held in the First Methodist church by the pastor, assisted by Brother Jernigan, Castleberry and Harrison.

REV. C. H. NELSON

Rev. Chas. H. Nelson was born near Tupelo, Mississippi, October 8, 1863, he married Miss Sarah See on November 23, 1886. A few days after their marriage, he and his bride came to Arkansas and settled on a farm near Cabot. He was licensed to preach in 1889, and ordained deacon in 1895. He moved to Conway in 1891 and entered Hendrix College. Not having early educational advantages, and having a family to support, he felt that it would require determination and a hard effort to secure an education to prepare for efficient service in the itinerant ministry. But he had the determination, and by an indomitable energy and preseverance he succeeded. One thing among others, that impelled him to give his life to the ministry, no doubt, was the fact that his father and grand_ father were ministers. He was received on trial in the Arkansas Conference in the fall of 1893. After traveling some years his health failed and he was forced to take a superannumerary, he remained in that relation until his death. During the years that they lived in Conway his wife and son, Claude attended Hendrix College, where Claude received his degree, and a Rhodes Scholarship, and a degree in Oxford, England. Their son, Donald was also a Hendrix students. During the years that Brother Nelson was not able to preach he conducted a drug business in Conway.

He had not been as well as usual for a few days and about 4 o clock in the afternoon of March 4, 1929, while sitting at his home, he quietly passed away. His funeral was conducted by Dr. C. J. Greene of Hendrix College. His remains ware laid to rest in Conway Cemetery. He leaves his sorrowing wife and son, Claude, of Dallas, Texas who is engaged in the Y. M. C. A. work, his son Donald and three brothers. Brother Nelson lived the gospel which he preached to others, and found his comfort in its promises of afflications when they came. He was a loyal citizen, and a consistent christian. He was a student of the important public questions of the day, and had a strong conviction of right and wrong. For years he had to fight disease in order to maintain sufficient physical strength to do his work. He left for his children the example of godly life. His work is ended, and he has gone to reap his reward.

The Methodist Church has lost a true minister of the gospel; Conway a good citizen; his friends a congenial fellowship; and his family a devoted father and husband. But it may be said of him as af Enoch of old, "He walked with God and is not, for God took him."
