# STANDING RULES

### OF THE

# NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- 1. That the Conference instructs the Commission on Budget, in apportioning assessments to the districts, to use the method laid down in the Discipline for the General Boards in apportioning the assessments to Annual Conferences; provided that said commission shall have power, subject to the approval of the Conference, to reduce the amount apportioned to any District for Conference Work, but the amount thus taken off any such District shall not be added to the apportionment of any other District or Districts.—1928 Journal.
- 2. That all undergraduates be required to report according to the call of the several committees before the opening of the Conference and that not one be allowed to take examination after Conference opening unless providentially hindered,—1914 Journal, page 32.
- 3. That the Conference Treasurer shall be allowed a commission of one per cent on all collections passing through his hands up to \$100,000 as compensation for his service, together with incidental expenses.—1918 Journal, page 30.
- 4. That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one delegate from each Church in each Pastoral Charge; and, provided further, that when the membership of any Church reaches three hundred, it shall be entitled to an additional delegate for each additional three hundred members or major fraction thereof, said delegate to be elected by the Quarterly Conferences; provided, further, that no charge shall have fewer than three delegates elected.
- 5. That the figures answering the question: "Members reported last year," be the figures printed in the Journal of last Annual Conference.
- 6. That the Presiding Elders' figures of all the assessments be accepted as the official figures.
- 7. That the assessments for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- 8. That the figures answering the question: "Amount raised for Missions by Sunday School," be the figures which represented the amount to the Treasurer of the Conference Sunday School Board.—1925 Journal, page 19.
- 9. That all Statistical reports shall be turned in to the Statistical Secretary; and that all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer not later than 6 p. m., Thursday of Conference sessions or else the name of delinquents shall be reported to the Conference.—1916 Journal, page 32.
- 10. That the North Arkansas Annual Conference shall elect its Treasurer quadrennially, by ballot, without nominations, immediately after reading and passing upon the report of the Committee on Nominations; provided, that when a vacancy may occur from any cause, that on nomination of the Presiding Elders the Bishop in charge shall appoint some one to fill said vacancy.—1932 Journal.
- 11. When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishops Cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission or an officer in the Conference administration.—1932 Journal.

# Reports of Boards and Committees

### HOSPITAL BOARD

### GENERAL HOSPITAL

The year just closing has been one of hard work in the field and in the office, with seemingly smaller results to show for the faith, toil and prayer put into the task. Such a situation is not peculiar to hospitals.

The officers of the General Hospital Board have given themselves unreservedly to this work. Cooperation among the officers and members of the

General Hospital Board has been thorough-going and complete.

Our hospitals have been confronted with distressing needs for increased service free to the sick poor, and at the same time have been embarrassed with decreased revenues. They have met this issue in heroic fashion, and the most of them have been running without current deficit. Two of our hospitals, Dallas Methodist, Dallas, Texas, and The Methodist Hospital at Fort Worth, Texas, are in technical default on bond issue obligation, but they continue to operate and hope to work out their obligations. None of them have been closed during the year.

The General Hospital Board has been seeking to find a way to reopen the Memorial Hospital at Montgomery, Alabama, which closed July, 1931, while under operation of the Alabama Annual Conference. The outlook is

favorable for an early reopening of this valuable property.

The General Hospital Board, at its last meeting, had the pleasant duty of conferring the distinction "Knight of the Golden Cross" on Rev. W. C. Sellars, a superannuated minister of our Church, who gave \$5,000.00 to the hospital at Memphis as a memorial to his wife.

### MEMPHIS HOSPITAL

The receipts from patients for the last 12 months is over \$100,00 less than for the same period two years ago. At the same time, we have been heavily taxed to care for a very large number of people who could pay nothing, or very little toward their care. Naturally, it has been necessary to refuse admission to a large number of patients who needed our services for the very reason that

our revenue had declined so sharply.

It has been necessary to practice the strictest economy, and all of the employees of the hospital have taken two sharp reductions in salary. 4,371 patients have been admitted to the hospital, as compared with 4,901 last year. 661 babies were born as compared with 658 last year. For the year just closed, free service amounting to \$78,673.67 has been extended to 1,498 patients. Last year 1935 patients were given free service to the amount of \$89,700.28. Free service amounting to \$8,329.90 was rendered to 208 patients from the confines of the North Arkansas Conference. Of the total number of patients admitted, 315 were from the territory covered by your conference. It was our privilege to care for 29 preachers and dependent members of their families from the North Arkansas Conference during the year.

# TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

### THE ECONOMIC SITUATION

The economic system has been wrong, and the Church has been partly to blame, and the ministry of the Church should declare its opposition to a system so basically evil, and plead for a return to honesty, decency, and fair play.

Religious and moral leadership must face the implications involved in the moral failure of the men who operate the system that has thrust the world into a colossal dilemma.

The Church must recognize this peril and offer the ministry of sympathy and consolation and friendship which growing numbers of distracted people need and must have if their morale is not to suffer a complete breakdown.

While we would emphatically condemn revolutionary violence of every kind, we do stand for free speech and peaceful efforts at reform. We insist that men have a right to work. We declare that all who would enjoy the benefits of social production are under obligation to work.

We believe in the right of all to economic security against unemployment, sickness, and old age.

We denounce the competitive system and the profit motive as unsocial and unchristian.

### **PROHIBITION**

The North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South affirms its attitude toward prohibition and the liquor traffic in the following resolutions:

- 1st. That this Conference declares unreservedly for the maintenance of the Eighteenth Amendment unchanged.
- 2nd. That the Conference opposes nulification in any form either by action of the state in repealing or modifying our state law, or by repeal or modification of the Volstead Act to legalize an increased alcoholic content in permissible alcoholic beverages.
- 3rd. That this Conference respectfully and most earnestly appeals to our representatives in Congress both in the House and in the Senate, to vote against the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment, and against repeal or modification of the Volstead Act so as to permit increase of the alcoholic content of permissible alcoholic beverages.
- 4th. That this Conference appeals to the President of the United States and the Prohibition department to present to Congress the needs of that department so as to secure efficient enforcement, and to provide the money and the men necessary to meet these needs.
- 5th. That this Conference calls upon the Governor of Arkansas and other officers responsible for the enforcement of law to enforce the state prohibition law, and to co-operate actively with the Federal Officers in the enforcement of the prohibition law.
- 6th. That this Conference calls upon all members of the Methodist Episcopal Church South within its bounds and all good citizens to co-operate in every possible way both in the enforcement and the observance of the prohibition law.

### SABBATH OBSERVANCE

Be it resolved that it is the sense of this Conference to condemn the lax attitude of a portion of our membership toward desecrating the Sabbath by attending Sunday baseball, Sunday movies, and taking part in Sunday evening card parties and dances, and that our ministers are urged to preach and teach against these things.

# OTHER MATTTERS

- 1. There is grave danger that the next Legislature will legalize Rack Track Gambling if great pressure is not brought to bear against it. Let us be on our guard and do everything possible to prevent this evil.
- We take our position distinctly against militarism and plead for international peace, condemning armaments and military training.
- 3. It is our conviction that motion pictures are on of the gravest, most subtle and widespread influences working toward the distingration of the moral fiber of the people, and we recommend federal control.

The moving-picture industry has not kept is promise to reform and we urge Congress to take speedy favorable action on bill intended to correct some of the evils of the industry.

- 4. We commend those states which are enacting laws for the better regulation of marriage and we deplore the enactment by our State Legislature of the Ninety-Day Divorce Law.
- 5. We recommend that A. H. DuLaney, T. C. Chambliss, W. E. Hall, George E. Patchell, and J. T. Byrd be elected trustees of the Arkansas Anti-Saloon League of Arkansas for the North Arkansas Conference for the ensuing year.

### BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

In the first place, there was a period of church building running through ten or fifteen years just past during which time many congregations built adequately. In the second place, the present financial conditions make it quite unwise to undertake new buildings. However, the general Board wants to help in saving valuable property which may be heavily involved in debt where the size of the debt and their available funds justify it.

We regret to record the death of the treasury of this board, Rev. W. F. Blevins. He was faithful and efficient as a member of this board.

We appreciated the presence of Dr. T. D. Ellis, Secretary of our General Board, and conference preacher for this session of our Conference.

Our funds have been cut down and we have been unable to do what we would like to do. We have made the best use possible, we think, of the money at our disposal in meeting the various calls that have come to us at this time.

# AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

The Bible is one book for all people. It is one book unique and commanding among all the books of the world, and in the midst of all the literature of

time, because of its unity and universality.

The American Bible Society makes the Scripture available for Missionary use at home and beyond the seas. It provides the Scriptures for the local Church to all classes of people in the church or out in the great world. It is a help to the pastor because as a student he can have the Bible in any language or tongue. It is a help to the poor, the blind, the young and the old.

Owing to economic conditions our distributions last year ran around

10,000,000 copies only. Your committee is afraid that when the year 1932 has passed the distribution will be still smaller. The depositories in Dallas, Texas, and Little Rock, Arkansas, have done their best, under the existing circumstances, to meet the demands for Scriptures.

The law requiring the Bible to be read in all tax-supported schools in this State and the unprecedented depression over the country, have made the demand for Bibles to be donated to homes in which there are no Bibles the greatest in our experience in the Bible work. The depository in Little Rock is meeting these demands.

### RECOMMENDATION

First, That our pastors, Sunday School superintendents and other Christian workers co-operate with the American Bible Society in carrying forward this work by calling attention of their congregations to the fact that the American Bible Society has a depository in Little Rock from which Scriptures are sold at cost of manufacture or donated. Second, That we cooperate with Rev. D. H. Colquette, Agent of the Society, in all of his endeavors in the State of Arkansas, and in his work among the aged, infirm, and poor and imprisoned in the bounds of our Conference.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

### **PROGRESS**

We are glad to report to the Conference definite growth in interest and spiritual life among our laymen during the conference year. Laymen's Day has been widely observed; laymen have interested themselves in stewardship studies, and in many places they have been supplementing the work of regular preachers by holding church services in points not regularly supplied.

### **STEWARDSHIP**

To the Conference we would recommend an increased interest in steward-ship—stewardship of life, of time, of talents, of all means, in short, of every nature with which God supplies us. Such study should be a part of regular Sunday School training Classes. When such schools are held members of boards of stewards, church officials, and all members who can be interested should be urged to take work in courses of stewardship. We recommend the observance of four weeks of April or May 1933, for special emphasis on stewardship and that all churches undertake at that time to carry out the program provided by the Board of Lay Activities.

### RETREATS ·

We recommend an effort by districts under the direction of presiding elders and pastors, to hold lay retreats for a day. Let the laymen under this leadership come together for prayer, consecration, and careful planning of their work. We urge the largest possible attendance of lay leadership at the annual meeting of the District Stewards.

### **BENEVOLENCES**

We urge a continued effort to get a higher church conscience for tull collection of the benevolences. Nothing short of one hundred per cent should satisfy us.

### LAYMEN'S DAY

We recommend that the second Sunday in June, June 11, be designated as Laymen's Day and that the general theme to be used be "The Stewardship Interpretation of Life."

### THE METHODIST LAYMEN

We highly commend the circulation of the Methodist Layman. Not less than five copies should be in every well-organized church.

### LAY LEADERS

We recommend the re-election of J. M. Williams for Conference Lay Leader. We further recommend the election of C. J. Chapin of Jonesboro and Irl G. Bridenthal of Gentry, as Assistant Conference Lay Leaders. Respectfully submitted,

During the year he has made 113 visits to towns, 272 visits to institutions, held 257 services, donated 1859 Scriptures, 1506 books, 6591 papers, 4682 magazines. He has traveled 12,192 miles. His report shows 77 professions and 58 members received into the Church, 24 adults baptized and 13 children baptized. He has visited every jail in the State, many of them often. # REPORT OF THE ORPHANAGE BOARD

We are happy to report enthusiastic cooperation throughout the two Con-

ferences in the matter of caring for our orphan children.

We now have 41 children in the home having received several in the past few weeks. The health of the student-body has been excellent, with no death and no epidemics. On account of the financial conditions with some other Orphan's Homes we have been beseiged with applications to care for children that we could not take. Economic conditions in many homes resulted in another group of applications.

We are glad to report that the Orphanage is absolutely free of debt and

the management highly commended by outstanding business men. Rev. J. W. Moore, Treasurer of the Conference Orphanage Board reports that he has "received from the Conference Treasurer, since last Conference \$1,127.29, and a balance left over from last year of \$88.71 making a total of \$1,216.00. During the year he has paid Dr. James Thomas, Superintendent of the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage \$1,100.00 and to the Metropolitan Casualty Insurance Company \$6.25 for bond Number A-74621, making a total of \$1,106.25. This leaves a balance of \$109.75 on hand."

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON "PREACHERS' LIVING FUND"

When our Lord saw the widow cast in two mites out of her living to help afford a living for the ministry of the Kingdom of God He approved her motive and her method,

We, as brethren of the North Arkansas Conference in the succession of such a spirit and service of stewardship, hereby move the setting up of a voluntary fund to be known as "The Preacher's Living Fund," with the following provisions.

- 1. That every member of the Conference be given an opportunity to contribute through this fund, such part of his own living, as he will.
- 2. Donors shall direct the use of their gifts, if desired. The Presiding Elder of each district shall be ex-officio the medium of communication between the donors and beneficiaries of the gifts.
- 3. The Secretary of the Conference shall collect annually at the Conference session from each Presiding Elder the names of donors to this fund. This list of names only (no amounts to be shown) shall be published as part of annual report of "The Preacher's Living Fund." This record shall be made in the minutes of this annual session.
- 4. That this Committee reporting now shall be discharged, and the matter of "The Preacher's Living Fund" shall be assumed by the Secretary of Conference and the Presiding Elders, we urge our laymen and clergy alike to cooperate in cheerful generosity.
- 5. That we urge the payment in full of assessed amount for support of ministry as the initial resource providing sufficient living for our preachers.
- 6. That we urge all our brethren to carry and pay regularly our group insurance, as an individual service of aid to one another.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Reports from our Publishing House indicate efficiency in the management of our agents. Meeting the demands of the times with reduced prices but with increased quality of service, Lamar and Whitmore have justified the wisdom of the Church in seeking to fill the veins of the Church today with the red blood corpuscles of clean and vital reading matter.

We believe that the Epworth Highroad is the greatest periodical for young people published in America and as a magazine for the Christian family a better than the Church School Magazine is not to be found. We urgently commend these periodicals to our people and likewise heartily endorse the World Outlook and the Christian Advocate as vitamin supplying foods in Christian nutture.

The Arkansas Methodist has had a long and noteworthy history and we are reluctant to abandon it now when we, through it, are facing a crisis. The stringency of the times demands even more than ever we believe the ministry of and effective denominational paper.

Therefore, we, your Board of Christian Literature, commend to you the following recommendations taken from the report of the Arkansas Methodist Commission.

In view of the fact that a thorough, simultaneous circulation campaign has not in recent years been tried, and in order to sustain our paper, we recommend:

- 1. That the Conferences designate January as Arkansas Methodist month and that every pastor pledge himself to put on an intensive campaign that month.
- 2. That Bishop Dobbs be requested to call together at a time designated by the Bishop the Presiding Elders and District Lay Leaders to perfect the plans and prepare for the simultaneous campaign.
- 3. That the Presiding Elders, District Lay Leaders, and District Secretaries of the Woman's Missionary Societies be organized in each District to execute the plans.
- 4. That every church official be requested to take the Arkansas Methodist, or the Christian Advocate, the Methodist Layman, or the World Otulook.
- 5. That every pastor present from his pulpit the subject of Christian Literature with special emphasis on the importance and value of the Conference Organ in every Methodist home.

- 6. That the price of the paper be continued at \$1, but that the manager be authorized to make special rates when any pastor signifies his purpose to meet some special or unusual condition.
- 7. That the Districts be urged to compete with each other and charges in each District be urged to compete.
- 8. That the Conferences be requested to continue the same apportionments.
- 9. That the present commissioners be re-elected, namely: J. M. Williams, Wm. Sherman, and R. C. Morehead.
- 10. That the conference approve the election of A. C. Millar as editor and business manager and the Bishop be requested to re-appoint him, with the understanding that he is to receive no salary.

### BOARD OF MISSIONS

#### REPORT NUMBER 1

Reports from the General Board of Missions reveal three important facts:

- 1. The income of the Board has been greatly decreased. In 1929 the income was \$1,589,349; in 1931 it was \$960,631 and it will be even less in 1932. This is more than a thirty-three and one-third percent decrease within three years. In addition to this the Board has borrowed its limit.
- In spite of this drastic reduction we have been able to keep our missionary forces, both in the home fields and in foreign lands, practically intact.
- 3. Tho it may seem a miracle that our missionaries have been kept in the field, thus far, it is certain this can not go on indefinitely.

Therefore, we most earnestly urge our people and Churches to give, thru the normal channels, sacrificially, to the great cause of missions.

And that we intercede for divine help in these days of peril for the great cause.

Reports from the fields, both home and foreign indicate encouraging results and hopeful signs. Korea, Mexico and Brazil have already justified their privilege of Autonomy. Never were we more certain of divine sanction in our missionary enterprises. And the need of the hour is self-denying service, sacrifical giving and importunate prayer.

We urge the cordial cooperation of our Conference with the proper authorities in celebrating the Fiftieth Anniversary of Paine College in 1933.

The program of home extension, that is, the expansion of pastoral charges, to include neglected territory, deserves hearty commendation as a vital part of missions and this Board hopes for its continuance. We note that many of our

pastors give assistance to evangelistic work to weaker churches and abandoned territory. This we heartily commend.

Our people must be informed. Therefore, we would suggest that every pastor guide his people in their reading and study that they may avail themselves of the great body of missionary literature.

The World Outlook, which took the place of the Missionary Voice occupies a commanding place among missionary periodicals in the United States and deserves to have large circulation among all the people. It is the one organ thru which our missionary cause speaks.

### BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

### REPORT NUMBER 1

Reports from the Executive Secretary, and the Extension Secretary of the Board of Christian Education indicate large progress in unifying the work of Christian Education in our Conference. All phases of the work appear to be well organized, and to be meeting with hearty support from the Church.

Our schools—Valley Springs Training School, Hendrix College and Galloway Woman's College—are functioning effectively even in the face of grave difficulties.

Our unified program for the Colleges has made progress, but our college problems are only partially solved. The situation calls for serious consideration not possible by the present Annual Conference. We recommend, therefore, that this Annual Conference constitute its Board of Christian Education an ad interim committee representing the Conference and authorize it to act in conjunction with the Board of Trustees of Galloway Woman's College and Hendrix College, and the Board of Christian Education of the Little Rock Annual Conference in a thorough study of all the problems involved, and furthermore clothe said Board of Christian Education with the full power of the Conference to act for the Conference in approving and giving validity to any conclusions reached by said joint body looking to a solution of the problems facing Hendrix College and Galloway Woman's College.

We recommend that C. W. Lester be reelected as a member of the Board of Trustees of Valley Springs Training School; that Rev. Wm. Sherman, Mr. Ed McCuistion, and Senator Joe T. Robinson be elected to succeed themselves on the Board of Trustees of the Trinity System; and that Mrs. W. P. McDermott be elected to the Board of Trustees of the Trinity System to fill out the unexpired term of Mrs. Zalinda B. Harrison, removed from the State.

For the support of the work of the Board of Christian Education we request the following Assessments:

For the Pastor's School	900.00

The monies derived from the assessment for schools and Colleges shall be apportioned as follows: 67.5 per cent to Trinity System of Colleges, to be expended as the Finance Committee of the Board of Trustees may direct; 22.5 per cent to Valley Springs Training School; 3.3 per cent to Student Pastor at Fayetteville, Arkansas, and 6.7 per cent for miscellaneous activities.

We recommend the following appointments:

Nathaniel R. Griswold to be Professor in Hendrix College.

Ira A. Brumley to be Executive Secretary of the Board of Christian Education.

- J. S. Seneker to be Professor in Southern Methodist University.
- A. W. Wasson to be Professor in Southern Methodist University.

Pastors are urged to study carefully the whole program of Christian Education in our Conference, and to familiarize themselves thoroughly with the programs and plans which are being projected by the Executive and Extension Secretaries. Details of these plans and projects will be sent to all from the Conference office, and the Conference office staff will be glad to be called on for any needed help or information. Especial attention is called to the necessity for closely studying our Rural situation, carrying forward the Cokesbury and Standard Training Work, cultivation of the Missionary Spirit, a most careful organization of the work of the Local Church in every Department, and the necessity for personal evangelism on the part of all of our workers. In District and Conference Organization work careful coordination of activity is extremely valuable and necessary.

We recommend Mt. Sequoyah to all our people and honestly request the pastors to urge their people to attend the programs offered by the Boards of the Church at the Assembly next Summer.

# RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas, for the year 1854 created by Act of the Iegislature, a corporation under the name of Crawford Institute, whose object and purpose was the establishment of a Methodist Institution of learning or college in Van Buren, Crawford County, Arkansas, which institution was to be under the supervision and control of the Arkansas Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and,

WHEREAS, by Act of the General Assembly, approved January 10, 1857,

the said previous Act was amended so as to change the name of said Institute to Wallace Institute, and,

WHEREAS, it appears that the organizers of said corporation caused it to be organized by an Act of the Legislature for the reason that no other provision for creating a corporation was provided in this State at the time, and,

WHEREAS, the objects and purposes of said corporation were to establish an institution of learning for all intents and purposes belonging to the Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, of this State, and,

'WHEREAS, the purpose of this organization largely failed and that no college or other institution of learning was ever maintained, and,

WHEREAS, however, a considerable sum of money was contributed to the fund for the creation, establishment and maintenance of said institution, and the same was placed in the hands of Trustees, as provided for in said Act creating said Institution, and,

WHEREAS, it now appears that a considerable portion of the assets have been lost or in some manner dissipated, and,

WHEREAS, there remains, however, a substantial sum of money or other property in the hands of persons claiming to be Trustees of said Institution in Van Buren, Crawford County, Arkansas, and,

WHEREAS, it is now evident that no such institution of learning will be or can be created or maintained, and the funds so held are fruitless to the Church or to the Educational interests of the Church, and,

WHEREAS, the Church maintains a system of colleges in the State under the supervision of the North Arkansas Annual Conference, and the Little Rock Annual Conference, known as the Trinity System of Colleges, and,

WHEREAS, it appears that those claiming now to be Trustees for the said Wallace Institute and in charge of and in control of said funds, refuse to report the same to this Conference or to be subject to its orders or recognize the rights of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, thereto, and,

WHEREAS, it appears that the Legislature of the State of Arkansas has power to control and dispose of said fund,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That it is the sense of this Conference that request be made of the next General Assembly of the State of Arkansas, for proper legislation abolishing said Wallace Institute and diverting the funds so held as aforesaid, to the Board of Trustees of the Trinity System.

Be it further resolved, that a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the Little Rock Annual Conference with request that that Conference cooperate with this Conference to the end that proper legislation may be enacted, placing said funds aforesaid to the proper disposal of said Board of Trustees for the Trinity System.

We solicit the others from the libraries of our pastors. The Board of Christian Education bulletin will carry the names of the books needed from time to time.

We thank Dr. J. H. Reynolds, Rev. Ira A. Brumley and the College for this practical help.
