The Conference voted to make the Mercantile Bank the official depository for Conference funds during the session of the Conference.

Amendment to Group Insurance Policy

"The Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States.

"Attached to and made part of Group Life Insurance Policy No. 2250.

Issued to North Arkansas Annual Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South—the Employer, effective as of _________IT IS HEREBY AGREED THAT THE PLAN of Insurance under the above numbered Group Life Policy is amended by the addition of the following provision:

"The insurance of each member, either active or retired on pension, who has attained his 60th birthday on or before the effective date of this amendment who is then insured for \$2000 or more shall be reduced to \$1000 on arrival of policy next after said date, and the insurance of each such member who is then insured for \$1000 shall be reduced to \$500 as of said date.

THE ORPHANAGE BOARD

We are happy to report enthusiastic cooperation throughout the two Conferences in the matter of caring for our orphan children, in the face of the most trying financial times.

We now have thirty children in the Home. We have placed, up to this date, 526 children in good homes. We have received 9 children this year and have placed 13 in homes. We have lost one little girl, Carolyn Fitzhugh, by death. In addition to receiving and placing children, our Orphanage is a clearing house for looking after orphans that we do not receive.

Reverend J. W. Moore, Treasurer of the Conference Orphanage Board, reports that he has received from Conference Treasurer, since last Conference \$991.61, and a balance left over from last year \$109.75, making a total of \$1,101.36. During the year, he has paid Dr. James Thomas, Superintendent of the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage \$1,050.00, to the Metropolitan Casualty Insurance Company, \$6.25, for renewal of bond number A-74261, and \$0.02, tax paid on check, making a total of \$1,056.27. This leaves a balance of \$45.09 on hand.

CHURCH EXTENSION

The general, prevailing financial condition makes this a very trying period in the church. Conditions within the church are vitally affected by the general conditions outside the church. Many congregations, like many individuals, have found themselves in almost hopeless debt. All churches which have received loans from the Board of Church Extension during this entire period, and prior, should meet these obligations as speedily as possible. These congregations should receive sympathetic cooperation in the handling of all these matters of debt. Our funds are limited and we have not been able to do in every case what we would like to have done. We have made the best possible use of the money at our disposal in meeting the various calls that have come to us at this time.

The Treasurer's report of our Board shows the following: Balance on hand Nov. 8, 1932, \$2,608.08; received from the Conference Treasurer during the year, \$342.22, total \$2,950.30. Paid out during the year for all purposes, \$1,611.27. That leaves \$1,339.03. Received at Conference from the Conference Treasurer \$660.01. Balance on hand Nov. 3, 1933 \$1,999.04.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

We have reason to be proud of the Methodist Publishing House, as to its output, financial management and general success. The books are the best, the christian education material is not only very fine, but outstanding in literary and religious value; at the same time it is cheaper than that from all other leading church publishing houses. With a small loss this last year, of \$14,839.56, they were able to draw on a reserve fund and pay to the superannuates, \$50,000.00.

The Arkansas Methodist has surprised us this year in getting through, and yet our liabilities are less by \$2,540 than last year. We have decreased the original purchase debt by \$2,000. Counting the rental on the residence and the \$1,000 on the business house, gives us an approximate income of 7 per cent on the whole property.

While the Arkansas Methodist has been coming to us with only eight pages most of the time, yet it has been a most valuable sheet, in holding before our people high ideals, and keeping us in touch with the great movements of the church. If there ever was a time when we could let down on the distribution and use of Christian Literature, it is not now. Our needs now are imperative.

The plans of our Arkansas Methodist Commission for maintaining the Arkansas Methodist are sound and it seems that they are altogether workable.

In brief, the plans are as follows: The editor is to be paid through plans worked out by the presiding elders, and the money paid through the Conferences will be used in the elimination of the debt and some other necessary occurring expenses. The income from advertising has been approximately \$2,000, and should be more during the next year.

It is recommended that the price of the paper continue at \$1.00 a year for single subscriptions. But it is urged that every church send in a 100 per cent subscription list, which may be had for only 50c for each subscription. To find your 100 per cent list, divide your living roll by 6, and that will give you the number of subscribers that should be secured. To secure the 100 per cent list, we pledge ourselves to put on in January a vigorous circulation campaign in every charge.

We are glad to express our appreciation to the editorial department of the Arkansas Gazette for its strong stand on all moral issues, and especially so against intoxicating liquors.

During this period he has had donations as follows: Scripture portions 3,500; books 207; papers 3,655; magazines 919; tracts 3,831. In his activities he has visited 71 towns and 306 institutions. He has held 350 religious services. As a result of his work there have been 204 professions of faith with 100 additions to the church. He has baptized 51 adults and 5 infants. During the year he has traveled 11,167 miles. The following contributions have been made to support the work:

REPORT OF METHODIST HOSPITAL

Dear Brethren:

The Conference year ending October 31st, 1933, has seen your Hospital at Memphis operating under the most difficult conditions yet experienced. A further curtailment of \$25,000 in income from paying patients added to the decrease of \$100,000 reported last year, has cut our budget to about one-half its former amount. To enable us to meet this situation, further economics were effected, and salaries of employees were more drastically reduced with a result that it has been possible to continue work of the Hospital, caring for almost as many patients as during the preceding year.

The burden of the care of the sick poor has been heavy; 1,663 free patients were cared for, and nearly as many more who applied were rejected, owing to our utter inability to carry any greater load. For the first time in the history of the Hospital, we are in default on our mortgage payments; \$6,000 in bonds maturing May 1st, 1933, remain unpaid, and the interest due at that time was only paid on October 31st, and that by obtaining a loan, anticipating receipts

from the Conferences this month. We are again in default on both principal and interest, due November 1st, the total amount now in default being \$19,687.50. As you are aware, a special effort was made last spring to stimulate interest in the Golden Cross enrollment in the hope that enough money would be sent in to enable us to prevent the default of May 1st. Results from this special effort were very disappointing, and we were able to pay only \$1,400 on the interest then due.

Four thousand, four hundred and thirty-eight patients have been admitted in the last 12 months, as compared with 4,371 last year. Six hundred and twenty-eight babies were born, compared with 661 last year. For the year just closed, free service amounting to \$86,035.72 was extended to 1,663 patients. Last year, 1,498 patients received free treatmeent, amounting to \$78,673.67.

Free service amounting to \$8,496.05 was given to 140 patients from the confines of the North Arkansas Conference. Of the total number of patients admitted, 390 were from the territory covered by your Conference. It was our pleasure and privilege to extend our service to 24 preachers and members of their families from your Conference.

Owing to the method used during past years for the distribution of Golden Cross funds, some confusion has arisen. Your Board of Trustees respectfully requests that Paragraph 550 of the 1930 Discipline be followed, which directs that all funds raised in the Golden Cross Enrollment "Shall be used for the erection, endowment, or support of Hospitals having connection with patronizing annual Conferences;" and further that these funds be remitted to the Conference Treasurer and marked "Golden Cross Funds", as provided for in Paragraph 560, 1930 Discipline.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Reports from the Executive Secretary, and the Extension Secretary of the Board of Christian Education indicate large progress in unifying the work of Christian Education in our Conference. All phases of the work appear to be well organized, and to be meeting with hearty support from the Church.

Our schools—Valley Springs Training School and Hendrix College are functioning effectively even in the face of grave difficulties.

Our unified program for the college has been making progress, but our college problems are only partially solved. The Galloway situation calls for serious consideration, not possible by the present Annual Conference session.

We, therefore, make the following recommendations:

That this Annual Conference approve all the steps taken by this Board of Christian Education during the past year concerning Galloway Woman's College.

That this Annual Conference hereby direct the Board of Trustees of Galloway Woman's College to make a special study of the whole problem, including the possibilities of its reopening, the conditions under which it may be reopened with assurance of success and large service to the church, the advisability of undertaking its reopening; it being the judgment of this Conference that said Board should not reopen the college without adequate funds and reasonable certainity of large usefulness.

That the Conference authorize and instruct the Board of Trustees, if they find reopening impracticable and unadvisable, to take steps looking to the liquidation of this College and to paying off its debts.

In carrying out this resolution the Conference directs that the Trustees of the college first offer the buildings, grounds and equipments of the college at Searcy to the citizens of Searcy before they take any other steps looking to disposing of the physical properties; provided that the citizens of Searcy in taking over the college assume all debts and financial obligations against the college. If the people of Searcy accept the college and assume all debts and liabilities of the institution, the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized by this Conference to execute all necessary deeds and conveyances. If, on the other hand, the citizens of Searcy decline said offer, the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized to take any other steps necessary to liquidate the college, to pay its debts, and to this end it is authorized to execute all deeds and conveyances

necessary in carrying out these instructions; provided buildings and grounds are not liquidated without the consent of the Conference Board of Christian Education.

This Conference hereby gives its Board of Christian Education the full power of the Conference to act for it when its advise, approval or authority is sought by the Board of Trustees of Galloway Woman's College in carrying out the instructions of this Conference; provided that the Conference is in no way to be obligated financially by the action of the Board of Trustees.

That Dana Dawson and Mr. W. R. Stuck be elected trustees for Galloway Woman's College and Hendrix College to succeed themselves; and that John Erskine be elected trustee to succeed Dr. Paul Quillian, and that Mr. Lynn Smith of Texarkana be elected trustee to succeed R. E. Lee Wilson, deceased, to fill unexpired term ending 1935.

That the entire college assessments be directed to Hendrix College.

That the Conference approve and authorize retreats for the college, the college and Executive Secretary to work out the details with the Presiding Elder.

That the Conference consider and take appropriate action on the question of joint celebration of the centennial of organized Arkansas Methodism and the semi-centennial of Hendrix College; and that a joint committee with the Little Rock Conference be appointed by the Bishop and his cabinet to work out plans for this celebration.

We recommend:

That the plan of selecting trustees for Valley Springs Training School be so changed that the Presiding Elder of the Searcy District and the pastors of Harrison Station and Batesville First Church automatically become the ministerial members of the Board on their annual appointment.

That the money which was appropriated for the pastors' school for year 1933 be transferred to the extension fund of the Board of Christian Education.

That Sunday School Day and Young People's Anniversary Day be observed on the same day in 1934 (date to be fixed), with programs and offering.

That the work of the Extension Secretary is to be: (a) Leading in developing definite plans for reaching the unreached persons for Christ. (b) Assisting in developing needed materials for reaching the unreached. The administration of Cokesbury training work is to be unified with standard work under the direction of the Executive Secretary.

That a Conference-wide meeting of the Conference and District Staffs of Christian Education be held soon after Conference.

For the support of the work of the Board of Christian Education we request the following assessments:

For the Pastor's School \$900.00
For Schools and Colleges 11,850.00
For Conf. Work (work of Executive Secretary, Training Work, etc) 6,500.00

The monies derived from the assessment for schools and colleges shall be apportioned as follows: 67.5 per cent to Hendrix Collgee, to be expended as the Finance Committee of the Board of Trustees may direct; 22.5 per cent

to Valley Springs Training School; 3.3 per cent to Student Pastor at Fayetteville, Arkansas, and 6.7 per cent for miscellaneous activities.

We recommend that Ira Brumley be appointed Executive Secretary and that Glenn F. Sanford be appointed as Extension Secretary of the Board of Christian Education; that J. Q. Schisler and A. W. Martin be appointed to the General Board Staff of Christian Education; that Nat. R. Griswold be appointed professor in Hendrix College; that A. W. Wasson, J. S. Seneker be appointed as professors in the Southern Methodist University; H. M. Alsey, student College of the Ozarks; John McCormick, student S. M. U.; W. T. Cooley, student Duke University; Morris Dodson, student Vanderbilt, and Boyd W. Johnson, teacher in Valley Springs Training School.

We commend the work of Dr. J. M. Williams, Extension Professor of Hendrix College, in his labors for our youth and our homes. We request our pastors to talk with him about his work and make the largest use possible of his time in this important work for which he is so well qualified.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Your committee on the American Bible Society would respectfully direct your attention to the accomplishments achieved by the Society as it faced the unusual problems and the added responsibilities of Scripture distribution during the twelve months of 1932, the 117th years of its significant service.

Translation statistics now indicate that through the efforts of all interested organizations the Scriptures have appeared in 933 different languages and dialects, nine new languages having been added during the year to this constantly increasing total. The entire Bible, it will be interesting to note, has been translated into 173 different languages, one new language having been added to this list during the year.

Publication: Turning from translation to publication, your committee reports that the Society is now publishing a fresh series of self-pronouncing Bibles from new plates, making available a splendid Bible in bold-face type at fifty cents and a similar volume in smaller type at only twenty five cents. A New Testament in the same series with a strong paper cover now available at five cents will serve many needs where economy is necessary.

There is no purpose of profit in the American Bible Society's activity in the field of Scripture publishing. The Scriptures are sold at cost and frequently in order to meet express needs the selling price is below cost. The Society aims to meet at as low a cost as possible every Scripture need.

Distribution: During 1932 the Society through its agencies in the United States and abroad issued more than 8,067,156 volumes of Bibles, Testaments and Portions. This figure, while lower than the figure of the year earlier, represents a real achievement in view of the paralyzing effects felt everywhere from the economic situation. Despite a smaller total circulation than usual there is encouraging word from several Agencies. From China comes the cheering word that more entire Bibles were put into circulation than in any preceding year of evangelistical effort in China. Both in Mexico and in the agency serving the Argentine, Chile, Uruguay, and Paraguay more Scriptures

were distributed than in 1931. Among the colored high school and college students of Georgia and Florida fresh interest in the Bible was developed, resulting in a decided increase in Scripture distribution among the negroes of those two states.

Your Committee would call attention to Universal Bible Sunday promoted annually by the American Bible Society. This year the date falls on December 10, the second Sunday in December. The theme will be "The Light Shineth in Darkness." Attractive material will be mailed to every pastor and will include suggestions for churches and Sunday Schools caring to include a pageant or dramatic exercises.

Your Committee respectfully presents for adoption the following resolutions:

WHEREAS, The American Bible Society in carrying on its work of increasing the circulation of the Scriptures is engaged in a task essential to the whole Christian enterprise, be it resolved:

First: That we heartily endorse the efforts of the American Bible Society in its program of encouraging a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures;

Second: That inasmuch as Sunday, December 10, 1933, has been designated as Universal Bible Sunday, the ministers of this body cooperate in directing the attention of their congregations on that day to the important place in the Christian faith which the Holy Scripures occupy:

Third: That our Conference heartily endorse the work of Rev. D. H. Colquette as Agent for the American Bible Society and pledge to him our assistance in carrying forward this work in distributing the Holy Scriptures, and in his work among the aged, infirm, poor and imprisoned in the bounds of our Conference.

TEMPERANCE AND SOCIAL SERVICE

THE GREATEST TASK OF THE CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Rethinking the social teachings of Jesus and their application to our troubled world constitute the greatest task facing the Christian Church today.

The Church must convince its millions of earnest followers that the priceless water of life cannot be drunk alone in solitude, but must be given to a thirsty humanity: that salvation is for civilization as well as for persons, for industry and nations as well as for individual workers and citizens; that Christlike men and a Christ-like world comprise the Kingdom of God and the goal of the Gospel.

A vital application of the social significance of the religion of our Master is necessary to save us from the ethical blindness and insensitiveness to human needs which bring reproach upon the Church, rendering it powerless to meet the crisis of this hour.

We rejoice in the awakening and growth of this appreciation and understanding in the lives of an increasing number of ministers and laymen who are committed to the conviction that the law of love is the law of life in all its relationships.

In the light of these principles we offer the following recommendations:

WORLD PEACE

Believing that war cannot be reconciled with our belief in the sacredness of human personality, the supremacy of human and spiritual values, and the power of love, we repudiate war as a means of settling international controversies. The Kingdom of God cannot be built upon bloodshed and violence.

Realizing that competitive armaments lead to warfare, we are unalterably opposed to the present building programme of our navy as a waste of money, and an ineffective means of national security.

We favor the discontinuance of military training in our schools and colleges, and of the Citizens' Military Camps. We favor the abolition of armaments and military forces, except those which may be necessary for police purposes.

We believe in the commemoration of Memorial Day, Independence Day, and Armistice Day as opportunities for the spread of the peace ideal rather than for the glorification of past wars.

PROHIBITION

Believing that the liquor traffic is destructive of human and spiritual values, that it violates the principle of the sacredness of human personality and impedes the progress of the Kingdom of God, we condemn it as anti-Christian, and we shall continue to fight against it as an enemy of God and man.

We must teach our people that the governmental revenues derived from the sale of intoxicating liquors is but a small percentage of the tribute money paid by our citizens to the liquor traffic.

Realizing that the repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment is imminent one must endeavor to preserve those statutes of states which in a degree safeguard us from the liquor interests.

We must educate our children and youth in the true meaning of temperance, with inceasing endeavor, until the liquor traffic is banished from the earth.

THE RESPONSIBILITY AND DUTY OF THE CHURCH

Under the present difficult conditions, what is the responsibility and duty of the Church? Her Lord and Master, when He stood before Pilate declared, "For this cause came I into the world that I might bear witness to the Truth." To the Truth He bore witness all through his three years of glorious ministry. They crucified Him. That Truth for which he gave his life has come down through the centuries and still stands unchanged and unchanging—the foundation of all real hope here and hereafter.

And, today, the only question the Church of Jesus Christ has to decide is: Where lies the Truth? What is Truth? What is right? What is wrong? So, on this the greatest question before the world today, the Church must make declaration of the Truth.

First, the Church must continue to declare, to emphasize, the basic truth, which no political action can change—the fact that alcohol is a narcotic poison

which incapacitates men for citizenship, making them a menace to society, and especially to their own families. The Church must continue to stand for the local, state, and national prohibition of this body and soul destroying traffic and evidently one of the works of the Devil, which the Son of God was manifested to destroy. The Church must record her unchanged conviction that whatever may be proposed as a substitute, will fail, that the final solution for this national evil must be National Prohibition. We must work to save everything possible in our present local, state, and national prohibition legislation.

In this time of unprecedented stress and strain when the very foundations seem shaken, the Church of Jesus Christ, regardless of public clamor, or political threats, or legislative action, must continue steadfastly to bear witness to the Truth that the Legislation of the Liquor Traffic is a crime against society and the Law of God.

We wish to commend Governor Futrell for his stand in refusing to include liquor legislation should he call a special session of the Arkansas legislature.

SOCIAL SERVICE

We desire to express our appreciation for the work of Rev. D. H. Colquette in visiting and conducting services in our penal, industrial, and elemosynary institutions, and pledge him our cooperation whenever practicable.

We recommend that A. H. DuLaney, T. C. Chambliss, George E. Patchell, and J. T. Byrd be elected trustees of the Arkansas Anti-Saloon League of Arkansas for the North Arkansas Conference for the ensuing year.

RESOLUTION

BE IT RESOLVED, By the North Arkansas Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, that whereas, by an act of the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas, approved the 18th of December, 1854, a corporation was formed under the name of Crawford Institute, to be located at Van Buren, Arkansas, or some nearby town, under the auspices of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, and

Whereas, by an act of the General Assembly for the State of Arkansas, approved January 10th, 1857, the name of said Institute was changed to Wallace Institute, and

Whereas, said institution of learning had not been in operation since the year 1862, and the majority of its original trustees had died, and

Whereas, by Act No. 67 of the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas, approved March 8th, 1883, certain persons therein named were, by the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas, appointed as Trustees of said Wallace Institute and were constituted a body corporate and politic, under the care and patronage of the Arkansas Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in the State of Arkansas, one being the Little Rock Annual of the original act of incorporation, and

Whereas, at the time of the passage of the act which was approved December 18, 1854, there were two annual conferences of the Methodist Episcopal Church South, in the State of Arkansas, one being the Littl eRock Annual Conference and the other the Arkansas Annual Conference and

Whereas, in the year 1854, the city of Van Buren was within the territorial jurisdiction of the Arkansas Annual Conference, and

Whereas, in 1869, a portion of said Arkansas Annual Conference was cut off to constitute White River Annual Conference for said church, created in said year, and

Whereas, the portion cut off did not include the territory where the city of Van Buren is located and whereas, in the year 1914 the Arkansas Annual Conference and the White River Annual Conference were combined and given the name of North Arkansas Conference and

Whereas, said North Arkansas Conference now comprises and has jurisdic-

tion over the territory formerly within the jurisdiction of both the Arkansas and White River Annual Conferences, of said Methodist Episcopal Church South, in Arkansas and the territory in which is located the city of Van Buren aforesaid, and

Whereas, said corporation and its trustees failed to carry out the objects and purposes of the original act creating the same and

Whereas, the present Board of Trustees has in its hands a substantial sum, approximating \$25,000.00 in lands and securities belonging to said Wallace Institute, and

Whereas, by virtue of said several acts of the Legislature said funds in the hands of the present Board of Trustees are subject to the control and direction of this conference, which is the legal successor of the Arkansas Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and

Whereas, said Board of Trustees have failed and refused to recognize and still refuse to recognize the authority of this Conference to direct and handle, or to control the direction and handling of said funds, and there is no reasonable possibility that said funds will be used or can be used for the exact purposes set forth in said original act, and subsequent acts of the Legislature for the State of Arkansas, and

Whereas, it is necessary that some procedure be taken by which said funds in the hands of said Board of Trustees may be devoted to some purpose as near like the purpose originally designated, set up and intended, for the use of the funds of said Wallace Institute, as is possible under the circumstances.

Now, therefore, be it resolved by the North Arkansas Annual Conference for the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, that it is the sense of this Conference that said funds now in the hands of the persons who are or claim to be trustees of the Wallace Institute, are subject to the control of this Conference, and that this Conference has the legal right to demand the delivery of said funds to it or its agents, and hereby makes demand upon the trustees of Wallace Institute or such persons as claim to be Trustees thereof, for the delivery of all monies, bonds, securities and all real estate in their hands belonging to said Wallace Institute, and the legal and equitable title to same which is held by said Board of Trustees for said Wallace Institute and this Conference hereby designates and appoints Rev. A. L. Cline, a member of this Conference, as its agent and attorney in fact, in its name to demand and sue for said amount from said Wallace Institute and from said Board of Trustees thereof, or from any individual member of said Board of Trustees, and for all monies, bonds, mortgages and securities and all real estate, the title to which in law and equity belongs to, and is held by said Wallace Institute or Board of Trustees thereof, and said agent or attorney in fact, is directed to employ legal counsel and to file and prosecute such suits, and take such other proceedings as may be necessary to recover and such monies, bands, mortgages, securities and real estate as may be in the hands of said corporation known as Wallace Institute or the Board of Trustees thereof, as such or individually, to the end that all such monies, bonds, mortgages, real estate and other securities may be obtained and used for the purposes set forth in said original Act or some purpose akin thereto, as equity may authorize.

Said Agent or Attorney in Fact is further authorized, if in his judgment such action may be wise, to compromise or settle by the acceptance of a less amount than the whole amount in the hands of said corporation or the trustees thereof, if by such procedure, in his judgment, the interests of this Conference and the purposes for which said Institute was created, may be best served; and for the purposes herein set forth, said agent, and attorney in fact, may employ

legal counsel, and agree upon the terms of the compensation therefore, provided that this act is in no wise to involve the North Arkansas Conference financially and provided that ample bond is to be made by Rev. A. L. Cline when suit is contemplated.

RESOLUTION OF THANKS

WHEREAS, The beautiful city of Jonesboro, through its hospitable citizenship has entertained our Conference in such bounteous manner and made our stay so pleasant that we will carry memories of the city throughout the future.

BE IT RESOLVED that we tender our hosts collectively and individually our heartfelt thanks and pray God's continued rich blessings upon them.

REV. WALTON EDGAR HALL

A throng of friends from towns and rural communities in the northern part of the state attended the funeral services of the late Rev. W. E. Hall at the Hoxie Methodist Church, Tuesday afternoon, December 6. Many ministers of the Methodist Church were among the number. A choir made up of members of Church choirs where Bro. Hall had served as pastor, sang hymns and rendered special selections.

REV. JAMES BAXTER STEVENSON

Rev. James Baxter Stevenson was born at Richmond, Little River County, Arkansas, Ocotber 24, 1860. Six years were spent there, thirteen in Tennessee, and then he moved with his parents to Booneville, Logan County, Arkansas, where, in the old academy building, he was licensed to preach, September 21, 1881. After preaching and teaching for two years, and serving the Booneville Circuit, his first appointment, as a supply, he joined the Arkansas Conference at Clarksville, in November, 1883, and was appointed to Gravelly Circuit. Here he met and, on May 14, 1895, married Miss Loula Briggs. Four years he served on circuits, thirty-seven years on station ,eight years he was a presiding elder, and two years a sweet-spirited superannuate.

To Arkansas, his native state, Brother Stevenson gave nearly 50 years of faithful service, interrupted only by a short but interesting pastorate in Oklahoma. Bishop Hendrix appointed him to Oklahoma City, where he held one of the first revivals ever conducted in that city. After this he was stationed at Guthrie, the capital, a thriving young city of about ten thousand inhabitants, where he built a church, served as chaplain in the first Senate, and became

chaplain of the first Grand Lodge of Masons in Oklahoma.

On the death of his father he returned to Arkansas in order to care for his father's orphan children, and was stationed at Central Church, Ft. Smith. Later he served Morrilton, Batesville, Paris, Conway, Conway District, Fayetteville District, Russellville, Atkins and other leading appointments. While he always served the best charges, at the close of his ministry he was able to say, that he had never asked a Bishop for an appointment or an official board for a salary.

In the Conference he served on many important boards and committees, but none did he value more than the Orphanage Board, of which he was chairman in the old Arkansas Conference and then in the North Arkansas Conference, from the date of its formation until his superannuation. Likewise, he believed in higher education served for years on the Board of Trustees of Hendrix College, and sacrificed to see this college, from which he proudly saw his children graduate, firmly established in the State.

As a pastor, Brother Stevenson had few equals. He loved people and they

An interesting feature of this romance was the bridal tour upon which the young people embarked the day after the wedding. STANDING RULES

OF THE

North Arkansas Conference

- 1. That the Conference instructs the Commission on Budget, in apportioning assessments to the districts, to use the method laid down in the discipline for the General Boards in apportioning the assessments to Annual Conferences; provided that said commission shall have power, subject to the approval of the Conference, to reduce the amount apportioned to any District for Conference Work, but the amount thus taken off any such District shall not be added to the apportionment of any other District or Districts.—1928 Journal.
- 2. That all undergraduates be required to report according to the call of the several committees before the opening of the Conference and that not one be allowed to take examination after Conference opening unless providentially hindered.—1914 Journal, page 32.
- 3. That the Conference Treasurer shall be allowed a commission of one per cent on all collections passing through his hands up to \$100,000 as compensation for his servcie, together with incidental expenses.—1918 Journal, page 30.
- 4. That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one delegate from each Church in each Pastoral Charge; and, provided further, that when the membership of any church reaches three hundred, it shall be entitled to an additional delegate for each additional three hundred members or major fraction thereof, said delegate to be elected by the Quarterly Conferences; provided, further, that no charge shall have fewer than three delegates elected.
- 5. That the figures answering the question: "Members reported last year," be the figures printed in the Journal of last Annual Conference.
- 6. That the Presiding Elders' figures of all the assessments be accepted as the official figures.
- 7. That the assessments for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- 8. That the figures answering the question: "Amount raised for Missions by Sunday School," be the figures which represented the amount to the Treasurer of the Conference Sunday School Board.—1925 Journal, page 19.
- 9. That all Statistical reports shall be turned in to the Statistical Secretary; and that all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer not later than 6 p. m., Thursday of Conference sessions or else the name of delinquents shall be reported to the Conference.—1916 Journal, page 32.
- 10. That the North Arkansas Annual Conference shall elect its Treasurer quadrennially, by ballot, without nominations, immediately after reading and passing upon the report of the Committee on Nominations; provided, that when a vacancy may occur from any cause, that on nomination of the Presiding Elders the Bishop in charge shall appoint some one to fill said vacancy.—1932 Iournal.
- 11. When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishops Cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission, or an officer in the Conference administration.—1932 Journal.
