(The Conference decided that its annual notation should date from the time of the organization of the Arkansas Conference in 1836, instead of following the date fixed by the consolidation of the Arkansas and White River Conferences, when the name was changed to North Arkansas, in 1914).

C. E. Beard, an alternate delegate from the Fort Smith District was seated in place of B. L. Ford.

The presence of A. W. Martin was noted.

Dr. C. C. Neal, President of Haygood Institute, was introduced and addressed the Conference. An offering amounting to \$78.22 was taken and presented to him for the work which he represents.

W. P. Whaley, S. B. Wiggins, S. M. Yancey, O. E. Goddard, H. H. Griffin, Dr. J. M. Williams, J. W. Workman, J. A. Anderson, J. W. Crichlow, Mrs. E. F. Ellis and C. A. Stuck were appointed an advisory board for Haygood Institute.

The Bishop announced that at the opening of the Conference Saturday morning the class will be received into full connection.

FOURTH DAY

QUESTION NO. 47 was called: *Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?*

Conway and Jonesboro were placed in nomination. The Conference voted to meet at Conway in 1935.

The Conference adopted the following resolution:

Resolved, that the Bishop be requested to appoint a committee, composed of one Clerical and one Lay Member from this Conference, acting under the advice and consent of the Bishop, with directions to request the appointment of a like committee of the Little Rock Conference, and that this joint committee be directed to seek the appointment of similar committees from such other religious bodies and social welfare organizations, as are willing to co-operate in a united effort, to resist the tide of lawlessness now so prevalent, resulting, as we believe, from the failure of law enforcement, and to prevent the repeal of our existing laws, the result of years' effort and experience designed for the social and moral betterment of our people.

The mass assault upon the right of franchise shamefully prevalent by means of bribery, theft and other frauds, Sabbath desecration, lotteries, and race-track gambling, in open defiance of the laws of the state, the common and persistent violation of our prohibition law are not only crimes against the state, but inimical to the social and moral progress of humanity.

As always occurs, there is being created around these evils political machines seeking to organize and control law-making bodies and enforcement agencies in a program to legalize these evils by clandestine if not corrupt processes, without the consent of the people, and in defiance of their known will.

We believe that the moral, Christian, law-abiding citizens of this state should co-operate to mobilize and express through appropriate and effective channels an imperative demand that the voice of the people be heard on these questions before these un-social, immoral and pagan ideals of life and governments are again enacted into the laws of our state.

The report of the new Board of Christian Education was read. J. H. Reynolds, J. W. Workman, M. J. Russell, J. S. Seneker and Bishop Moore spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

The tellers reported the result of the ballot taken on the Constitutional Amendment. Present and voting 231. Voting, yes 199; voting no 32.

QUESTION NO. 24 TO 42 inclusive, were called and were answered by the report of the Statistical Secretary.

QUESTION NO. 43 was called: *Who is elected Conference Lay Leader?*

The Conference elected C. A. Stuck.

The name of G. A. Burr was referred to the Committee on Conference Relations.

Announcement was made that Dr. J. M. Williams will deliver the Memorial Address Sunday afternoon.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction pronounced by Rev. B. H. Greathouse of the Texas Conference.

FOURTH DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

The Conference voted to suspend Conference rule No. 11 in order that William Sherman might continue on the Arkansas Methodist Commission.

The report of the Orphanage Board was read and adopted.

The report of the retiring Hospital Board was read and adopted.

W. J. Spicer made a statement regarding the relation of our Church with the Sanatorium at Booneville.

Reports No. 1 and 2 of the Board of Missions were read, O. E. Goddard and Bishop Moore spoke to the reports, and they were adopted.

The Auditing Committee read and filed its report with the Secretary.

The report of the new Board of Finance was read, H. L. Wade spoke to the report.

On motion of L. E. Mann, that part of the report of the Board of Finance relation to group insurance was separated from the regular report. L. E. Mann spoke to that feature of the report. Reports No. 1 and 2 were adopted.

The report of the Committee on the Merger of the Conferences in Arkansas was read and adopted.

The report of the Committee on American Bible Society was read and adopted.

The Centennial Commission of Arkansas Methodism made its report. J. H. Reynolds spoke to the report and it was adopted.

The Orders of I. A. Fox, an Elder in the Methodist Episcopal Church, were recognized by the vote of the Conference.

The report of the Sesqui-Centennial Commission was read and adopted.

The report of the Treasurer was read and filed with the Secretary.

O. E. Goddard read a joint report from the Board of Christian Education, the Board of Missions and the Conference Womens Missionary Society, and it was adopted.

The report of the Committee on District Conference Journals was read and adopted.

The Minutes of the afternoon session were read and adopted.

After various announcements, the Conference adjourned with the singing of the doxology, and the benediction pronounced by Bishop Moore.

STANDING RULES

OF THE

North Arkansas Conference

1. That the Conference instructs the Commission on Budget, in apportioning assessments to the districts, to use the method laid down in the discipline for the General Boards in apportioning the assessments to Annual Conferences; provided, that said commission shall have power, subject to the approval of the Conference, to reduce the amount apportioned to any District for Conference Work, but the amount thus taken off any such District shall not be added to the apportionment of any other District or Districts.—1928 Journal.

2. That all undergraduates be required to report according to the call of the several committees before the opening of the Conference and that not one be allowed to take examination after Conference opening unless providentially hindered.—1914 Journal, page 32.

3. That the Conference Treasurer shall be allowed a commission of one per cent on all collections passing through his hands up to \$100,000 as compensation for his service, together with incidental expenses.—1918 Journal, page 30.

4. That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one delegate from each Church in each Pastoral Charge; and, provided further, that when the membership of any church reaches three hundred, it shall be entitled to an additional delegate for each additional three hundred members or major fraction thereof, said delegate to be elected by the Quarterly Conferences; provided, further, that no charge shall have fewer than three delegates elected.

5. That the figures answering the question: "Members reported last year," be the figures printed in the Journal of last Annual Conference.

6. That the Presiding Elders figures of all the assessments be accepted as the official figures.

7. That the assessments for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.

8. That the figures answering the question: "Amount raised for Missions by Sunday School," be the figures which represented the amount to the Treasurer of the Conference Sunday School Board.—1925 Journal, page 19.

9. That all Statistical reports shall be turned in to the Statistical Secretary; and that all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer not later than 6 p. m., Thursday of Conference sessions or else the name of delinquents shall be reported to the Conference.—1916 Journal, page 32.

10. That the North Arkansas Annual Conference shall elect its Treasurer quadrennially, by ballot, without nominations, immediately after reading and passing upon the report of the Committee on Nominations; provided, that when a vacancy may occur from any cause, that on nomination of the Presiding Elders the Bishop in charge shall appoint some one to fill said vacancy.—1932 Journal.

11. When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishop's Cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission, or an officer in the Conference administration.—1932 Journal.

BOARD OF FINANCE

REPORT NO. 1

SUPERANNUATE ENDOWMENT

To the Bishop and members of the North Arkansas Conference.

Besides the routine work of looking into the needs of our superannuated preachers, widows, and orphans of preachers, we have undertaken under the direction of the General Board of Finance to continue the work of raising Superannuate Endowment.

During the original effort to raise superannuate endowment our Conference pledged \$306,665. On this pledge there was paid \$99,822. When there was a readjustment \$166,223 was charged off the different Church quotas, although many of our churches had paid their original quotas. The question was resubmitted at Quarterly Conferences and \$40,899 was reassumed by the different churches. And on this new quota only \$1,512 had been paid up to March 1934, there remaining \$39,387 due and unpaid from the several churches and charges. We consider this a solemn obligation resting upon the pastors and churches where these quotas have been assumed. Therefore we recommend (1) that the Presiding Elders reassume this obligation from the standpoint of his high office, and that they and the pastors together with the laymen devise ways and means of liquidating this obligation at an early date.

2. We recommend that the official boards include in their budgets the unpaid amount assumed at the time of readjustment.

We recommend the appointment of Rev. H. Lynn Wade as Conference Director.

GROUP INSURANCE

Another matter of Special interest has been the carrying of group insurance by the members of this conference in a voluntary way. Last year adjustments were made as to rates and amounts of insurance carried.

We recommend that this Group Insurance be continued, and that all our members avail themselves of the opportunity of providing for their dependents in case of death and for themselves in case of total disability and of thus assisting their less fortunate brethren who could not secure insurance but for the group.

We submit the report of the Insurance Secretary, L. E. Mann, and request that he be continued in this office with full authority to act as our agent according to our contract with him and the Equitable Life Insurance Co.

REPORT NO. 2

The new Board of Christian Education organized by the election of the following officers:

J. Q. Schisler, Chairman; J. M. Williams, Vice-chairman; F. M. Tolleson, Secretary; C. D. Metcalf, Treasurer.

The Board found the business of the old board in excellent condition as to the work of the Colleges, the Conference wide program and the finances.

The board adopted a program for the education work of the Conference which will be published in the Christian Education Bulletin and sent to all the pastors.

The report of the President of Hendrix College showed gratifying enrollment and excellent financial situation in the light of the present conditions. We want to record our sincere appreciation of the restudy of the purposes and work of the college which is being made at this time by the faculty.

For the purpose of bringing about a closer relation between the local churches and Hendrix College in keeping with General Conference Legislation (Paragraph 389), this Conference authorizes Hendrix College Week to be observed in each local church including a sermon and voluntary offering for the College. In line with successful experience in other Conferences, we

recommend that a mass meeting be held in advance of Hendrix College Week in each district to be addressed by the Bishop, some representative of the College and of the staff of the General Board of Christian Education. The Executive Secretaries, the President of the College and the Bishop are authorized to fix the dates and the program.

The Superintendent of Valley Springs Training School reports an enrollment of 80 which is larger than last year. He is expecting to secure Federal aid. He reports good interest among the students.

The board expresses its appreciation of the Contribution which Hendrix College is making to the Christian home life of our State through the work of Dr. J. M. Williams. We call upon our pastors to open their churches to him.

We urge that the presiding elders and pastors of the Conference attend the Pastors' School at Hendrix College.

While the Western Methodist Assembly is the property of several Conferences west of the river, it is located within the bounds of our Conference. It is appreciated by our people as was evidenced by the large attendance from our Conference last year. We commend the work of Superintendent Yancey and urge our people to attend the program next Summer.

The Board is taking seriously the responsibility placed upon it by the General Conference for education of our people in the evil effects of alcohol. The Board pledges its co-operation to the General Board in carrying out the plans that are being developed in this field.

The Board deplores lynching and lawlessness in any form because they tend to break down the respect of our children and youth for law and order and degrade, if not destroy, their estimate of the human personality which is basic in Christian Education.

The Treasurer's report has been audited and the books found in excellent condition. The Board desires to express appreciation to Mr. Nels Barnett for his faithful service as treasurer.

REPORT NO. 1

The Board of Lay Activities begs leave to submit report number one as follows:

Lay Speaking

We urge that every Board of Stewards have a Committee on Lay Speaking, and that this Committee, in co-operation with the pastor, formulate and carry forward a systematic program of Lay Speaking on the objectives the

General Conference has outlined for us to promote. Preaching services, mid-week services, and adult class sessions offer weekly opportunity for three-minute speeches, and occasional opportunity for full programs.

We recommend the continuance of "Laymen's Day" and designate the second Sunday in June, or the Sunday as near thereto as practicable for the observance of the day. For 1935 we recommend the theme, "WE'RE IN THE FIGHT" for:

1. The Christian Home.
2. A Christian Industrial Order.
3. A Sober Nation.
4. A Warless World.
5. We'll Fight This Fight to the End.

The Church Press

We recommend the merging of the Methodist Layman with the Christian Advocate. We accept the full responsibility of promoting the circulation of this, our new organ, as the Discipline directs. We suggest as our goal: "Every Member of the Board of Stewards a Reader of the Christian Advocate."

We recommend the World Outlook as the missionary organ of our Church for men and women alike, and we wish to encourage a much wider circulation of this excellent magazine.

We recommend the Arkansas Methodist as our state organ and urge every laymen to subscribe thereto.

Men's Work and Evangelism

We suggest the continued organization of Brotherhoods under the direction of the pastor, wherever it is practicable, for fellowship, study, and personal evangelism.

Our Bishops have suggested as a goal for this quadrennium 750,000 new members. A group of twelve persons to win one in twelve months would achieve this goal. Certainly we could not expect the Church to do less. As members and officials let us give ourselves to this primary task of winning recruits for our Lord.

We urge the organization of the Official Board in every charge in the beginning of the new Conference year according to the Discipline, and embodying as far as practicable the suggestions of the General Secretary relative to committees as follows: Executive, Finance, Property and Grounds, Music, Social Welfare, Evangelism, Stewardship, Fellowship, Lay Speaking, Courses of Study.

We direct attention to the necessity for the training of Official Boards. We ask the full co-operation of the Presiding Elders, Pastors, and Lay Leaders in the holding of training classes for Official Boards in every charge, under the direction of the pastor, or some other approved leader. For these classes we recommend the following books: "The Board of Stewards," by G. L. Morelock, and "Financial Recovery for the Local Church," by J. E. Crawford.

Christian Stewardship

We concur heartily in the Church-wide plan for setting aside a definite period in the first quarter of the calendar year for the cultivation and promotion of Christian Stewardship.

We recommend that Stewardship Study Classes be promoted throughout the year in the following ways:

- a. The inclusion of the unit on Stewardship in Standard Training Schools.

b. The use of the Standard Class Plan when a Standard School is not feasible.

c. The study of Stewardship for one quarter instead of the regular uniform lessons, by classes of Young People and Adults, using Dr. Crawford's book, "The Stewardship Life," as a text.

Church Finance

The General Conference has directed the Board of Lay Activities to promote "a sound financial system in every local church." When we recall that many local churches have a very poor financial system or none at all, we recognize the need and possibilities for real service in this field. Fortunately we have an effective tool at hand. Dr. J. E. Crawford, at the instance of our General Board, has written a book on Church Finance. This splendid volume "Financial Recovery for the Local Church," is now available and will be the official guide-book of our Church on finance for this quadrennium. It is *indispensable* to Presiding Elders, Pastors, Lay Leaders, Church Treasurers, and Stewards.

Support of the Ministry

We recognize the fact that a large number of our preachers do not receive an adequate support. They and their families have been forced to bear excessive hardships and to deny themselves many things that would have contributed to their efficiency, usefulness and happiness. Before casting his vote to fix the salary of his pastor, we urge each steward to read Chapter V, of "Financial Recovery for the Local Church" on "The Support of the Ministry." We would insist that every Board of Stewards, after consultation with the pastor as to what is necessary for his support, shall regard the amount fixed as a moral obligation not to be loosely abrogated. We insist, also, that every Board of Stewards, as far as possible, provide for the needs of the pastor on the basis of monthly payments of his salary.

REPORT NO. 2

The Board of Lay Activities of the North Arkansas Conference submits herewith report number two as follows:

We would call attention to the legislation of the last General Conference affecting our objectives and organization. The objectives have been classified, the organization simplified, and additional responsibilities placed upon us, as indicated in Chapter XIII of the new Discipline. We desire to direct particular attention to the fact that the Board of Stewards has full responsibility for the entire program of Lay Activities in the local charge. The Chairman of the Board of Stewards is the Charge Lay Leader. The development of a well organized, wide-awake, active broad-visioned, loyal Board of Stewards in every charge in the Conference is our goal.

We are facing one of the most crucial periods in the history of our Church, the transition from the old to the New Financial Plan. This offers wonderful possibilities of developing in our membership a new vision, a new zeal, a new loyalty, and a new consecration. The wrong attitude would prove disastrous to the whole program of our church.

We would urge every steward and church official to read Chapter VII of the new book, FINANCIAL RECOVERY FOR THE LOCAL CHURCH, on the responsibility of a church for work beyond its own community, before

the first Quarterly Conference is held, and also the pamphlets, "The New Financial Plan" by G. L. Morelock and "Southern Methodism Serving the World" by J. E. Crawford.

We recommend:

1. That the Presiding Elders and District Lay Leaders arrange for district meetings of the stewards, to be held as soon after the Annual Conference as possible, and that these meetings be used to promote information about the New Plan, and to develop inspiration and more loyalty in the great body of our Stewards in regard to our Benevolent Causes.

2. That one half of all Benevolences be paid by Easter, or the session of the District Conference.

3. That proper emphasis on the Benevolences and the New Financial Plan be given at the District Conferences.

Finally, under the New Financial Plan, we stand unequivocally for "no retreat but an advance." We urge that, as a Conference we pledge and commit ourselves to the task of bringing to the local congregations a sense of the new responsibility that now rests upon them.

REPORT NO. 3

The Board of Lay Activities submits report number three on Temperance and Social Welfare as follows:

We feel keenly the responsibility the General Conference has given our Board in charging it with the great task of quickening our people with a deeper consciousness of the social gospel of Jesus. The Social Creed of the Churches, approved by the General Conference and found in the 1934 Discipline in the Chapter on Lay Activities, sets forth sixteen principles which every pastor and layman in our Conference should think through prayerfully until they have become thoroughly imbued with their import and charged with a greater passion for social justice. We recommend that our Pastors, as opportunity may offer, instruct the members of their churches in these principles and lead them to realize that the highest human welfare and adjustment depend on their acceptance and practice. As items of immediate and urgent interest, we call your attention to the following:

Motion Pictures

In view of the immoral and degrading effects of a large number of motion pictures on American citizens, especially our youth, we recommend that our Church cooperate with all other like-minded Christians in an effort to eliminate salacious and other objectionable motion pictures by refraining from attendance on such pictures, and that our people be encouraged to join the League of Decency. We recommend that our pastors in their preachers' meetings call in a group of interested laymen and take such steps as they deem wise in their local communities to achieve this end.

The Family

The deplorable prevalence of divorce and the trend toward a looser sexual relationship among the married and the unmarried, as well as other tendencies toward family disintegration, call for thoughtful and courageous efforts to

undergird family life with the unmistakable teachings of history and of Jesus concerning the necessity, if Christian civilization is to exist, of the practice of the fundamental virtues of family adjustment and individual chastity.

War

There is a growing consciousness against war, of which our Church should take advantage by employing the teachings of Jesus as weapons of education. We recommend a militant campaign of instruction concerning the horrors of war, the appeal to false and cheap patriotism, the exposure of the munition manufacturers' propaganda, and other obvious factors leading to war.

Gambling

Our church is unalterably opposed to all forms of gambling. We urge that the conscience of our people be reawakened to the sin of playing loosely with uncontrollable chance, and that our Churches everywhere take an unalterable stand against legalized gambling in all forms.

Race Relations

The only adequate solution of the problem of race relations is along the lines that Jesus taught, and in the approach of this problem we must lay aside all passion and prejudice and think and counsel and deal as the followers of Jesus. Sociologists are authority for the statement that in America the Negro problem is our greatest social problem. We recommend that our Methodist Churches show sympathy and give encouragement to the churches of the negro race. We urge our people to assume an uncompromising stand against lynching and the brutalities that have attended such disgraceful proceedings in the recent past and we recommend that the principles of Jesus be invoked instead on such occasions.

Temperance

Another problem of immediate and perilous concern is that of the traffic and consumption of alcoholic liquors. This is an old problem with new aspects. Its solution invites the most intelligent study and constructive action. Our lines of battle must be rearranged and our plan of attack must be more carefully restudied. We must be unafraid and militant, but clear-visioned, Christlike. We must arouse our people concerning the evils of the liquor traffic. We recommend that the forces of our Church support heartily all active efforts of any promise in the contest against alcohol; and we call all loyal Methodists to fight against the return of the legalized liquor with all our power.

Economic Life

The recent disastrous years have called marked attention to the suffering and loss of morale occasioned by inadequate distribution of wealth and income, to numerous and deplorable practices in our economic system, to the detriment of the masses especially. People everywhere are seeking a readjustment of our economic life in which, in the midst of plenty, privation, want, and destitution will not exist. The adequate solution can be found only in the teachings of Jesus.

CENTENNIAL COMMISSION OF ARKANSAS METHODISM

This Commission, created by identical resolution passed by the two Annual Conferences of Arkansas Methodism at their meeting in the fall of 1933, was authorized to make plans for the proper celebration of the semi-centennial of Hendrix College in 1934 and the centennial of the organization of Arkansas Methodism in 1936. The Bishop named the following members:

Rev. Wm. Sherman, Rev. G. G. Davidson, Mrs. S. G. Smith, Dr. O. E. Goddard, Dr. J. M. Williams, Dr. James Thomas, Dr. W. C. Watson, Rev. J. M. Hamilton, Mrs. H. K. Wade, J. S. M. Cannon, Dr. J. H. Reynolds.

The Commission itself added the following: Mrs. E. W. Frost, George W. Donaghey, Dr. A. C. Millar, Dr. James A. Anderson, Mrs. W. P. McDermott, Rev. Clem Baker, Rev. Ira Brumley.

It selected as its executive committee the following:

Rev. G. G. Davidson, Rev. Wm. Sherman, Dr. James Thomas, Dr. W. C. Watson, Dr. A. C. Millar, Mrs. W. P. McDermott, Dr. J. H. Reynolds.

The Commission elected J. H. Reynolds, chairman and Clem Baker secretary. The executive committee elected G. G. Davidson chairman and Clem Baker secretary.

The Commission has held two meetings, one at the Albert Pike Hotel, December 28, 1933, and the other at the home of President Reynolds on the Hendrix campus, June 11, 1934.

The executive committee has held meetings as follows: June 8, 1934 and September 7, 1934.

The Commission directly or through the executive committee has taken the following steps:

(1) It has merged the two celebrations and has directed that Hendrix College should as a part of her celebration invite outstanding national figures to address the college and people on the place of the church-related college in our civilization. The College has had a number of notable speakers under this authorization.

(2) Rev. S. T. Baugh and Rev. G. F. Sanford were asked to locate historical spots respectively in the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences and to file information about each with the Commission. The Commission has in mind placing markers at important spots.

(3) The Commission has asked each of the Annual Conferences for an assessment of \$1,000 to be levied at the forthcoming sessions.

(4) Through sub-committees the Commission is planning to have pageants and plays based on the history of Arkansas Methodism, and the young people of the church are making definite plans to share in the objectives of the centennial.

(5) The Commission has arranged with Elmer T. Clark of Nashville, Tennessee to write a brief popular story interpreting the objectives of the centennial and giving the high points in Methodist history to be distributed widely throughout the church.

(6) The Commission has discussed but has not acted upon the publishing of Anderson's history of Arkansas Methodism.

The Commission also recommends that for the next two years the Conferences carry out faithfully the suggestions below and the five objectives listed at the close.

The celebration should bring vividly before the church such events, achievements and history as will generate wisdom, courage and driving power for the future. In order to realize this larger end, the Commission plans three important features:

1. Through literature, addresses, sermons, pageants and plays the Commission will seek to popularize a knowledge of dynamic events, episodes and

personalities in Methodist history and to build in the minds and hearts of the people a conviction of the great spiritual mission of the church.

2. To arrange in communities throughout Arkansas a great day of song and pageantry and sermon, interspersed with eating together, an unforgetably happy day socially and spiritually, re-echoing one of the great old Hebrew feasts, which was prepared for months ahead and brought hundreds of thousands to Jerusalem. These occasions to be designed to inspire a deep spiritual awakening.

3. Great addresses throughout the church designed to stir people to the depths, lift their eyes to the hills, clarify spiritual vision, and give new perspective of life values and new dominant aims.

Near the end of the feast, let each gathering hear a committee report outlining plans and aims in which the new energy generated should take form in progressive steps for the Kingdom in the territory served by the group in harmony with the objectives of the Commission.

The Commission plans to provide for celebrations in each district and where possible in churches somewhat after the pattern of the great central celebration to be held near the close of the Centennial. The Commission plans to have sermons preached everywhere, printed matter broadcasted throughout Arkansas, and in other ways information and inspiration brought to the people.

Objectives of the Centennial Celebration

1. To deepen the prayer and spiritual life of the people, to church the unchurched members of our churches, to magnify the meaning of church membership, and to increase the vital membership by ten per cent a year for the quadrennium.

2. To seek to bring the people of Arkansas in this hour of social stress and strain to restudy the place of the Christian religion in our civilization and its possibility of giving stability and idealism to the social order; to inform the Methodists in particular and the citizenship of the state in general of the contributions of the Methodist Church to the spiritual and cultural life of the state.

3. To restudy the preaching and teaching emphasis, the aims and methods of the church in the light of the changing social order and of the widespread spiritual apathy, to revise methods and to adapt them to the enrichment of life in city, town and open country.

4. To assist the young people in realizing their objectives, an effective young people's organization under the New Plan in every church, a forty per cent increase in membership during the quadrennium and an increase in the attendance at Hendrix College to 500 a year.

5. To review the educational history of the church, to make vital the new program of Christian Education, to bring about a closer relationship between the people and their college, a clearer understanding of the vital place of the church related college in American life, and to increase the resources of Hendrix College that it may render a richer educational and spiritual service to society.

Recommendations

1. That this Commission be directed to carry out the program here outlined.

2. That the Conference levy an assessment of at least one thousand dollars to assist the Commission in carrying forward the celebration.

3. That the Conference request the Commission to consider steps necessary to get Anderson's History of Arkansas Methodism ready for publication and if possible, find means of doing it without committing the Conference financially.

THE ORPHANAGE BOARD

We are happy to report enthusiastic cooperation throughout the two Conferences in the matter of caring for our orphan children, in the face of the most trying financial times.

At the beginning of the year, we had 30 children in the Home. We have received seventeen and have placed and discharged during the year sixteen, and now have thirty one children. Up to the present time, we have placed 532 children in as good homes as we could find in the United States.

Our children all attend Sunday School and church services regularly at Highland church where we have the pastoral over-sight of one of the most sympathetic and helpful pastors that the church has to give in the person of the Reverend Roy E. Fawcett.

Reverend J. W. Moore, Treasurer of the Conference Methodist Orphanage Board, reports that he has received from the Conference Treasurer, since last Conference \$1,401.32, and a balance left over from last year \$45.09, making a total of \$1,446.41.

During the year, the Treasurer, has paid Dr. James Thomas, Superintendent of the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage \$1,200.00, to the Metropolitan Casualty Insurance Company, \$6.25, for renewal of bond number A-74261, and \$0.86, for bank exchange and tax paid on checks, making a total of \$1,207.11. This leaves a balance of \$239.30, on hand.

At the request of Dr. James Thomas, I submit herewith report of the audit of the books and accounts of the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage for the fiscal year ending October 1st, 1934. The receipts as recorded in the books are verified with the deposits as shown by the bank statements. The disbursements are verified and found to be correct. As a whole, the system employed is good and is accurately maintained. In my opinion, all receipts and disbursements are properly recorded.

I hereby certify that the attached statement correctly represents the financial condition of the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

A Joint Report of the Retiring and Incoming Board of
Christian Literature.

We are glad to report that our Publishing House has successfully made its way through the difficulties of the past year. Whereas a year ago we reported a loss of \$14,839.56, this year we have had a profit of \$66,098.47.

We are happy to report that this year our Book Committee has appropriated \$60,000 to the Superannuates.

We wish to call your attention to the high merit of our church school

periodicals. They receive large commendation from educators and Christian workers. Efforts to improve them never cease.

Under the imprint of Cokesbury Press, our Publishing House issues a number of carefully selected books each year. These books are chosen for their spiritual message and are worthy of wide circulation. We especially stress the reading of the Bible as the best of literature.

We urgently commend the Christian Advocate as a superior journal, not surpassed by any denominational paper. Its subscription list, however, falls far short of sustaining it. The diligent endeavors of our pastors is earnestly solicited in its behalf. Our Bishop Moore urges its circulation.

For missionary enlightenment no better publication is printed than the World Outlook which should furnish inspiration and information for the entire membership of the Church.

The recommendations for the circulation of the Arkansas Methodist are as follows:

1. Continue price for single subscription at \$1.00; but make a 50-cent price for 100 per cent clubs.
2. After Conference adjournment begin active campaign for circulation.
3. Ask Bishop and Presiding Elders to plan to co-operate.
4. Request Lay Leaders and Women's Missionary Society Officials to co-operate.
5. Urge that every church official take the paper.
6. Request Conferences to continue apportionments.
7. Request election of same Commissioners and editor.
8. Consider better plan for editor's support.
9. Work for the paper in every home.

We deplore the flagrant headlines of the secular press advertising crime and immorality. We commend the Arkansas Gazette and other state papers that give editorial comments on religious subjects, thus seeking to bring about a better state of society.

We believe in the power of the printing press, we request our pastors and Christian leaders to keep before the people the importance of good reading and that nothing but the best of literature is food for growing Christians.

Rev. Fred Lark was elected Treasurer of the Board. A restricted amount of \$34.66 is in bank by the retiring Treasurer J. J. Galloway. The Commissioners recommended are: Mr. J. M. Williams, Rev. William Sherman, and Rev. R. C. Moorehead. We ask the Conference to approve the election of Dr. A. C. Millar as editor and business manager of the Methodist.

Resolved that the Bishops be requested to appoint a committee composed of one Clerical and one Lay member from this conference acting under the advice and consent of the Bishop, with directions to request the appointment of a like committee of the Little Rock Conference and that this joint committee be directed to seek the appointment of similar committees from such other religious bodies and social welfare organizations as are willing to co-operate in a united effort to resist the tide of lawlessness now so prevalent, resulting, as we believe, from the failure of law enforcement, and to prevent the repeal of our existing laws, the result of year's effort and experience, designed for the social and moral betterment of our people.

The mass assault upon the right of franchise, shamefully prevalent, the

means of bribery, theft, and racetrack gambling, in open defiance of the law of the state, the common and persistent violation of our prohibition law are not only crimes against the state, but inimical to the social and moral progress of humanity.

As always occurs there is being created around these evils political machines seeking to organize and control law-making bodies and enforcement agencies in a program to legalize these evils by clandestine, if not corrupt processes without the consent of the people and

We believe that the moral, Christian, law-abiding citizens of this state should co-operate to mobilize and express through appropriate and effective channels an imperative demand that the voice of the people be heard upon these unsocial, immoral and pagan ideals of life and government are again enacted into the laws of our state.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

In spite of many restrictions placed upon it by reduced income during the past twelve months, the American Bible Society was able to carry on all its activities, and at certain points to make some advances.

1. *Translation.* Due chiefly to the smaller missionary forces of the churches in the foreign fields the Society's share in Scripture translation was somewhat reduced. However, statistics recently compiled show that the entire Bible has been translated into 175 languages and that Scripture translation has occurred in a grand total of 940 languages and dialects.

2. *Publication.* A significant item during the year was the publication of a new series of self-pronouncing Bibles and Testaments produced from new plates with type specially manufactured for the purpose. In this series, a splendid Bible at only 25c, a substantial paper bound new Testament for 5c and large size Gospels at 2c are obtainable. This new series has already proven by its sales that there is a wide demand for a good inexpensive Bible.

3. *Distribution.* During 1933 the Society through its Home and Foreign Agencies issued more than 7,800,000 volumes of Bibles, Testaments and Portions. While these figures are lower than the circulation of pre-depression years certain achievements in the distribution of the Bible occurred that are worthy of notice; especially, that the Society distributed more complete Bibles in Japan than in any preceding year, that in China all Bible distributing agencies put into circulation more complete Bibles than in any year of evangelical effort in China, that the distribution of Scriptures was greater in Mexico in 1933 than in 1932, that in the Upper Andes agency more than twice as many complete Bibles were distributed last year than the year before, and that the number of entire Bibles distributed in Brazil and the Caribbean Agency during the year exceeded the number distributed in 1932. The completion and dedication of two new modern Bible houses in Tokyo and Rio de Janeiro during 1933 augur well for increased interest and efficiency in Scripture distribution in these two important countries.

During the 118 years since its organization in 1816 the American Bible Society has put into circulation approximately 255,000,000 volumes of Scripture—a ministry in the Christian enterprise incapable of being quickly evaluated.

4. *Service to the Blind.* The Society has rendered another year of important service to those who read with their fingers in supplying "embossed" Scriptures at the special 25 cent-a-volume price. From the Bible House at New York, 2,969 volumes in seven different systems were distributed during 1933, making a total of 95,324 volumes distributed from headquarters during the 99 years of such service. A special appropriation for enlarging the work among the blind in foreign agencies was granted during the year, and an additional service was the publication of the Gospels of St. Matthew and St. Mark in the new Standard English Braille, the first portions of the Scriptures to be printed in this system.

Universal Bible Sunday, occurring this year on December 9, will commemorate the four hundredth anniversary of the publication of the translation of Martin Luther's Bible. A scholarly brochure on the significance of Luther's translation, together with other attractive material, will be mailed to Pastors early in November.

The Society is making available to ministers and church groups a new stereopticon lecture entitled "The Book Goes Forth", describing with effective pictures Scripture distribution work both in the United States and abroad. This lecture can be secured with no rental charge from any of the Agencies of the Society, as well as from a number of denominational lantern slide depositories. The Society is always glad to provide pastors with posters, leaflets,

and other information on the Bible for use in lectures, addresses and sermons.

In these days of financial strain the Bible Society looks to the churches of America for financial support in carrying on its indispensable missionary work. All its financial processes are carefully examined annually by an Advisory Council whose representatives are officially appointed by the supporting denominations but like every religious agency its income has been woefully reduced.

Your Committee respectfully presents for adoption the following resolutions:

WHEREAS, The American Bible Society is engaged in a missionary labor indispensable to the whole Christian enterprise, be it resolved:

First: That we heartily endorse the work of the American Bible Society in its encouragement of a wider circulation of the Holy Scriptures:

Second: That inasmuch as December 9, 1934, has been designated as Universal Bible Sunday, the ministers of this body cooperate in emphasizing the importance of the Holy Scriptures:

Third: That this body, recognizing that our denomination has recommended the giving of a percent of its benevolent budget to the American Bible Society, that we give the usual percent ordered by our General Conference.

And in memory of Rev. D. H. Colquette, so long agent for the American Bible Society in our Conference, let us say:

Servant of God, well done!
Thy glorious warfare's past;
The battle's fought, the race is won,
And thou art crowned at last.

MEMOIRS

REV. F. H. CUMMING

Seven generations of Methodist preachers in one family line ended when Rev. F. H. Cumming died in Memphis, Tennessee, November 7, 1933.

Brother Cumming was born in Carthage, Illinois, January 10, 1856.

While studying for a professional musician he was converted at a camp-meeting and soon afterwards began studying for the ministry. He graduated from Illinois Wesleyan University with the highest grade awarded there up to that time. He obtained both the A. M. and Ph. D. degrees from his Alma Mater. However, the work for his Ph. D. was done "in absentia" from Syracuse University, N. Y. Being in the active ministry he was not able to do the required residence work in Syracuse. Hence Illinois Wesleyan conferred this degree upon him, this being the first Ph. D. the institution had awarded. He was then requested to recommend a course for that degree in Moral Philosophy for Illinois Wesleyan.

For more than fifty years he was active in the ministry of the Methodist church. His great grandfather, Rev. Charles Cumming, was the first preacher in Tennessee. His grandfather was sent in 1834 to help organize the Illinois Methodist Conference.

During his ministry Brother Cumming is said to have put through school about twenty young men in their preparation for the ministry and ten or fifteen young women in their training as missionaries.

He was a great student and his sermons revealed a wide range of research. It was his custom to write at least two sermons a week and often more.

He had a collection of five thousand or more sermons catalogued and classified.

Brother Cumming came to the Memphis Conference in 1910 from Carthage, Illinois. Before coming south he had served as president of the Board of Trustees of Northwestern University, also in the same position in the Board of Trustees of Illinois Wesleyan. He filled a number of important pastorates in the Memphis Conferences, two of which were in Memphis. For two years he served as Sunday School Secretary of the Memphis Conference.

In 1927 he transferred to the North Arkansas Conference and because of failing health was superannuated about three years later. He served Hughes and Ozark while in our conference.

He had a triumphant passage to the Father's house of many mansions November 7, 1933, and the next day the funeral services were held at Union Avenue Methodist Church in Memphis.

In addition to his son Orris A. Cumming in Memphis, he leaves another son, John M. Cumming, and a daughter, Miss Margaret E. Cumming, both of Denver.

REV. EDWARD FORREST

Edward Forrest was born in Izard County, Arkansas, December 19, 1871, and passed to his reward from Cabot, Arkansas, October 10, 1934. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Forrest.

At the age of 14 he was converted and joined the Methodist church at Old Philadelphia church in Izard County.

In 1896 he was licensed to preach, and for a number of years remained in the local ranks, during which time he attended Hendrix College for about three years, and in 1905 he joined the Old White River Conference. In 1902 he was ordained Local Deacon, then after joining the Conference he finished his Conference Course of Study and was ordained Traveling Elder in 1909.

He served the following charges in the order named: Knobel, Batesville Central Avenue, West Searcy, Bradford, Beebe, Heber Springs, Gardner Memorial North Little Rock (Where he remained as pastor for six consecutive years), Prairie Grove, Waldron and Cabot, where in closing out his third year he was called home, after suffering an accident in which he sustained a broken hip.

Brother Forrest was thrice married; First, to Miss Mathilda Caroline Mason, who died while he was pastor at North Little Rock; Second, to Miss Gertrude Ledbetter, who died while he was pastor at Prairie Grove; then December 24, 1928, he was married to Miss Minnie Webb, who survives him.

He leaves two daughters: Mrs. O. O. Chappelle of Aubrey, Arkansas, and Miss Willine Forrest of Cabot, Arkansas; two grandchildren, Miss Lavinia and O. O. Chappelle, Jr.; also five brothers and two sisters survive him.

Brother Forrest was one of the best men amongst us, clean in his life, a lover of home and children, devoted to his church, punctual in attending to duty, during the 29 years he was a member of the White River and the North Arkansas Conferences he never missed a roll call and always brought up a good financial report and more than 2000 souls were converted under his ministry.

He was greatly loved by the people of Cabot, the school and all business suspending during the funeral hour.

The services was held in the Methodist Church at Cabot, with his brethren in the ministry, many of whom both from the Conway District and outside the District attended, acting as honorary pallbearers, and the members of the Official Board of his charge active pallbearers.

The service was conducted by the writer, assisted by Revs. F. A. Lark, E. T. Wayland, C. N. Guice and L. O. McCracken, pastor of the Baptist Church at Cabot, and the body was laid to rest in the family burying ground in Searcy, Arkansas.
