And, that each ballot shall contain the exact number of eligible names to be voted upon at that particular time, otherwise the ballot shall be declared invalid by the tellers.

"That no ballot shall be taken up after the president has ordered the tellers

to retire and count the ballots.

"That, the tellers shall report the number of ballots cast, the number invalid, the number that were valid and the number of votes cast for each person receiving votes and those who are elected, if any.

"Further, that the number of alternates elected shall be five clerical and five lay, and that the same rules govern the election of alternates as are used in the election of delegates. And,

"That Thursday morning from 11 to 11:45 be set aside for the Board of Lay Activities and the Woman's Missionary Society; and,

"That the memorial service be held Saturday afternoon, beginning at 2:00 o'clock; and,

"That the ordination service for deacons and elders be held Sunday afternoon, beginning at 2:30 o'clock; and,

"That the appointments be read immediately following the ordination service."

Bishop Selecman called attention to the Conference of the necessity of the preachers' reports being in the hands of the statistical secretary by the opening of the first session of the Conference.

Dr. A. W. Wasson addressed the Conference in the interest of the General Board of Missions. Bishop Selectman spoke on the conditions in the mission fields of China and the appeal of the missionary opportunity.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction by H. Lynn Wade.

SECOND DAY

Dr. Anderson announced that there would be no challenge of the committee members named and that the defense was ready for trial.

Bishop Selecman appointed the hour of 7:30 Thursday evening for the trial and appointed H. H. Griffin to preside in his stead for any time he might not be able to preside at the trial.

The presence of Hoy Merriweather Lewis, J. S. Seneker and B. E. Robertson was noted.

The report of the ballot for alternate clerical delegates to the Uniting Conference showed the election of W. V. Womack and A. G. Walton. A ballot for two alternate clerical delegates was taken.

C. C. Neal, president of Haygood Industrial Institute, a school of the Colored Methodist Church, at Pine Bluff, was introduced. The Conference voted to hear the report of this work and to make the customary contribution to the school, on condition that there should be filed with the Conference Board of Christian Education a financial statement showing the use of moneys coming to the school through voluntary offerings in the several annual conferences. Dr. Neal spoke to the Conference and was given a purse of \$57.42 for the school.

The tellers reported no election in the ballot on alternate clerical delegates to the Uniting Conference. Another ballot was taken.

On motion of the Secretary, J. W. Moore was elected Honor Roll Secretary.

The Conference voted to refer the correction or approval of the minutes to an auditing committee. Bishop Selection appointed S. B. Wilford, J. A. Gatlin and James S. Upton to constitute this committee.

The roster of the Board of Missions as newly organized was filed with the Secretary.

E. H. Hook reported the work in the Searcy District.

The tellers reported the ballot, in the election of alternate clerical delegates to the Uniting Conference, had elected R. S. Hayden. A ballot was taken for one alternate clerical delegate.

On behalf of the preachers in the Searcy District, F. E. Dodson presented to E. H. Hook, who had served four years as presiding elder of that district, a check for the purchase of formal ministerial clothes, in expression of the love and appreciation of the pastors with whom he had worked.

E. H. Hook expressed cordial and appropriate thanks for the gift, with tender reference to the fellowship.

The tellers reported no election on the ballot for clerical alternate delegates to the Uniting Conference and another ballot was taken.

The hour for the special order of the day having been reached, the Conference sang Hymn No. 249, Bishop Selecman called Charles Stuck, Conference Lay Leader, and Mrs. Henkel Pewett, Conference President of the Woman's Missionray Conference, to the platform. Charles Stuck addressed the Conference in the interest of Lay Activities. On his motion the Conference voted to send expressions of appreciation to the editors of the Ladies' Home Journal for the attitude advertised in the current issue, refusing to accept liquor advertisements for the pages of that magazine.

Mrs. Henkel Pewett addressed the Conference in the interest of the Woman's Missionary Society, giving a report of the woman's work in the Conference.

The ballot for alternate clerical delegates to the Uniting Conference showed the election of E. B. Williams, completing the election.

Dr. J. W. Armstrong, presiding elder of the Chickasha District in the Oklahoma Conference; Rev. W. L. Myers, of Caruthersville, Missouri; and Rev. G. L. Ellis, of Hornersville, Missouri, were introduced to the Conference.

It was announced that Dr. W. B. Selah, of Memphis, would preach at 3:00 o'clock in the afternoon, and at 7:30 o'clock in the evening.

The Conference adjourned with the doxology and the benediction by $Dr.\ J.\ W.\ Armstrong.$

THIRD DAY

The Conference met at 8:30 o'clock a. m., with Bishop Charles C. Selecman presiding.

Hymns No. 250 and No. 255 were sung. The Conference read the responsive scripture lesson on "Peace," in the Methodist Hymnal. J. J. Galloway led in prayer. "America" was sung, with the first stanza of the hymn, "God Bless Our Native

Land." Bishop Selecman read a passage from the first chapter of the Gospel of St. John, beginning at the 35th verse, and addressed the Conference on personal evangelism. Hymn No. 245 was sung.

The Journal Committee reported that the minutes of the preceding day's session were correct, and they were approved.

The report No. 1 of the Commission on Budget was read and adopted.

OUESTION No. 15 was resumed.

Irl Bridenthal, having stood an approved examination on the course of study, was advanced to the class of the fourth year.

- E. B. Williams reported on the work in the Paragould District.
- J. L. Rowland, acting for the pastors of the Paragould District, presented an overcoat to E. B. Williams, retiring from the cabinet after a quadrennium of service. E. B. Williams responded to the presentation with expressions of love and appreciation.
 - Dr. E. W. Potter reported the work in the Jonesboro District.
- A. W. Martin reported the work in the Helena District. G. C. Johnson reported a reception and beautiful service held recently within the district to mark the appreciation of the pastors and workers in the Helena District of the leadership and faithful service of A. W. Martin who is retiring from the cabinet after a quadrennium.

Warren Johnston reported the work in the Fort Smith District; W. V. Womack, the Fayetteville District; E. T. Wayland, the Conway District; and Connor Morehead, the Batesville District.

The Conference, on motion, stood a moment in silent prayer in commemoration of the coming of peace in the world war, it being 11:00 o'clock, the hour of the armistice, twenty years ago. The Conference sang, "The Kingdom is Coming."

Miss Juanita Hill, rural worker in the Batesville District, was introduced to the Conference.

L. K. Brown, an alternate delegate from the Helena District, was seated in the place of Miss Marie Holmstead.

The following Commission on Evangelism was nominated by the Board of Missions, and elected by the Conference: Charles A. Stuck, C. N. Guice, G. C. Johnson, C. W. Lester, Mrs. Fred Stone, E. H. Hook, and John W. Glover.

The order of the day having been reached, Report No. 3 of the Board of Christian Education was read. A. W. Martin, Warren Johnston, O. E. Goddard, A. C. Millar, William Sherman, J. M. Williams, J. Q. Schisler, I. A. Brumley, and Clem Baker, respresenting the Little Rock Conference, spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

QUESTION No. 13 was called: Who are transferred to other Conferences?

Bishop Selecman announced the transfer of Griffin Hamilton to the Oklahoma Conference and his appointment to the Cloud Chief Circuit in the Chickasha District.

The Secretary read the report of the Trial Committee in the case of H. M. Fikes, showing the finding that he was not guilty of the charges laid against him.

Clem Baker and J. L. Tucker of the Little Rock Conference, A. C. Johnson and Hugh Isbell of the St. Louis Conference, were introduced to the Conference.

It was announced that Dr. W. B. Selah would preach at 3:00 and 7:30 p. m. The Conference adjourned with benediction by J. Sehorn Seneker.

FOURTH DAY—MORNING SESSION

The Conference met at 8:30 o'clock a. m., with Bishop Charles C. Selecman presiding.

Hymn No. 162 ("O for a Thousand Tongues") and No. 267 ("Rise Up O Men of God") were sung. Bishop Selectman led the Conference in reading the responsive scripture lesson, "The Lord's Day," at page 597 of the Methodist Hymnal. J. W. Workman led in prayer. Hymn No. 315 was sung. Bishop Selectman led in an earnest discussion on evangelism, calling on J. Q. Schisler, A. G. Walton and others to speak on various phases of the subject.

The Committee to Review the Minutes reported that the Journal was correct.

QUESTION No. 17 was called: What traveling preachers and what local preachers have been elected deacons?

Lyman Tilden Barger, recommended by the Jonesboro District, recommended by the Examining Committee and meeting the disciplinary requirements, was elected a local deacon.

QUESTION No. 19 was called: What traveling preachers and what local preachers have been elected elders?

James S. Upton, Boyd W. Johnston, William F. Cooley, C. Everett Patton and Hubert Pearce, having stood an approved examination on the course of study and having traveled two years as deacons, being recommended by the Examining Committee, were elected elders.

Bishop Selecman called to the chancel those elected to deacons and elders orders, instructed them in preparation for the service of ordination, calling on the Conference likewise to set aside all secular and personal interests and be spiritually ready for this holy service on the Lord's Day. The Conference stood and William Sherman led in prayer. The Conference sang Hymn No. 400 ("Jesus, the Name H'gh Over All").

The Conference Treasurer's report was read. It was disclosed that payments on benevolences lacked \$131.12 of the entire sum of the acceptances. A spontaneous and voluntary offering was taken, which more than covered the deficit. The report was amended and filed with the Secretary.

The report of the Auditing Committee was read and filed.

The report of the Statistical Secretary was read, answering questions No. 25 and 45.

QUESTION No. 2 was called: Who else is in the class of the First Year? No one.

QUESTION No. 4 was called: Who else is in the class of the second year? No one.

QUESTION No. 7 was called: Who else is in the class of the third year? No one.

QUESTION No. 12 was called: Who have withdrawn or been expelled? No one.

QUESTION No. 21 was called: Who have been recommended by a District Conference for recognition of their orders as local deacons or elders? No one.

Report No. 2 of the Commission on Budget was read and adopted.

Report No. 3 of the Board of Christian Education was read and adopted.

The Conference voted to extend the time of the session to receive reports.

The report of the Orphanage Board was read and adopted.

The report of the Board of Lay Activities was read and adopted.

J. Wilson Crichlow, H. E. Ryan and Don E. Schooler of the St. Louis Conference, and J. H. Glass of the Little Rock Conference, were introduced to the Conference.

The Conference adjourned to meet in memorial service at 2:00 p. m., with the benediction by J. Wilson Crichlow.

MEMORIAL SESSION

The Conference met at 2:00 o'clock p. m., with Fred A. Lark presiding. Hymn No. 315 was sung.

QUESTION No. 14 was called: What preachers have died during the year?

The Committee on Memoirs reported that A. E. Holloway, Thomas A. Bowen, Julian E. Lark, and V. B. Utley, and Mrs. J. H. Cummins, wife of a preacher, had died during the year.

J. W. Moore read passages of scripture in the 39th Psalm and the Second Epistle to Timothy, in the third chapter. James T. Randle sang, "I Will Sing You a Song?" Dr. O. E. Goddard preached the Memorial Sermon. Hymn No. 204 was sung.

Fred A. Lark, A. C. Millar and others paid tribute to the memory of those who had died.

BUSINESS SESSION

Bishop Selecman resumed the chair. The Conference sang, "O Think of the Home Over There."

The Committee to Review the Minutes reported that the minutes of the morning session are correct.

J. H. Glass and Dr. A. C. Millar addressed the Conference in the interest of temperance.

An offering was taken for the Anti-Saloon League, amounting to \$46.25.

The report of the Committee on Conference Relations was read and adopted.

The report of the Board of Finance was read and adopted.

The report of the Committee on Minister's Aid Fund was read and filed with the Secretary.

The report of the Rural Life Commission was read and adopted.

The report of the Committee on American Bible Society was read and adopted.

Reports No. 1 and No. 2 of the Board of Missions were read and adopted.

Reports No. 1 and 2 of the Board of Christian Literature were read and adopted.

The report of the Board of Extension was read and adopted.

The report of the Committee on District Conference Journals was read and adopted.

The Conference elected Mrs. E. T. Wayland to membership on the Board of Christian Education.

A resolution concerning Southern Methodist University was presented by Cecil Culver and adopted by the Conference. (See report.)

QUESTION No. 46 was called: Who is elected Conference Lay Leader? C. A. Stuck was elected Conference Lay Leader.

QUESTION No. 47 was called: Where shall the next session of the Conference be held? The Conference voted to accept the invitation of the Morrilton Church to meet in Morrilton in 1939.

Bishop Selecman called all the superannuated preachers who were present to the chancel and paid high tribute to them as the builders of the church. The Conference sang several hymns while the members shook hands with these superannuated members and gave expression of their love and appreciation to them.

The Conference adjourned to meet Sunday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, with the benediction by James F. Jernigan.

FIFTH DAY

Conference convened at 2:30 p. m., Bishop Charles C. Selecman presiding. The congregation sang Hymn No. 209, "Amazing Grace."

QUESTION No. 18 was called: What traveling preachers and what local preachers are ordained deacons?

Lyman Tilden Barger, presented by William Sherman, was called to the chancel and ordained deacon by Bishop Selecman.

QUESTION No. 20 was called: What traveling preachers and what local preachers are ordained elders?

Meeting the disciplinary requirements, Hubert Edward Pearce, James Southerland Upton, Boyd William Johnson, Clarence Everette Patton, William Frank Cooley were presented at the chancel by Dr. James A. Anderson and were ordained Elders by Bishop Selecman, assisted by the Presiding Elders, Connor Morehead, E. T. Wayland, W. V. Womack, Warren Johnston, A. W. Martin, E. W. Potter, E. B. Williams, and E. H. Hook, and by James A. Anderson, Sam B. Wiggins and William Sherman.

Bishop Selecman gave to those ordained their parchments and filed the following certificate of ordination with the secretaries:

STANDING RULES

OF THE

North Arkansas Conference

- 1. That the Conference instructs the Commission on Budget, in apportioning assessments to the districts, to use the method laid down in the discipline for the General Boards in apportioning the assessments to Annual Conferences; provided, that said commission shall have power, subject to the approval of the Conference, to reduce the amount apportioned to any District for Conference Work, but the amount thus taken off any such District shall not be added to the apportionment of any other District or Districts.—1928 Journal.
- 2. That all undergraduates be required to report according to the call of the several committees before the opening of the Conference and that no one be allowed to take examination after Conference opening unless providentially hindered.—1914 Journal, page 32.
- 4. That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one delegate from each Church in each Pastoral Charge; and, provided further, that when the membership of any church reaches three hundred, it shall be entitled to an additional delegate for each additional three hundred members or major fraction thereof, said delegates to be elected by the Quarterly Conference; provided, further, that no charge shall have fewer than three delegates elected.
- 5. That the figures answering the question: "Members reported last year," be the figures printed in the Journal of last Annual Conference.
- 6. That the Presiding Elders figures of all the assessments be accepted as the official figures.
- 7. That the assessments for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amiunt paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- 8. That the figures answering the question: "Amount raised for Missions by Sunday School," be the figures which represented the amount to the Treasurer of the Conference Sunday School Board.—1925 Journal, page 19.
- 9. That all Statistical reports be turned in to the Statistical Secretary; and that all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer not later than 6 p. m., Thursday of Conference sessions or else the name of delinquents shall be reported to the Conference.—1916 Journal, page 32.
- 10. When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishop's cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission, or an officer in the Conference administration.—1932 Journal.
- 11. That the Secretary of the Bishop's Cabinet be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any and all changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or Presiding Elders Districts for insertion in the Conference Journal.—1936 Journal.
- 12. Resolved, that all members of our Annual Conference who attend its annual sessions, except superannuated and supernumerary preachers, be required to pay the church entertaining the Conference one dollar registration fee.—1937 Journal.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Report No. 2

The Board of Christian Literature presents the following report of Dr. A. C.

Millar to the Arkansas Methodist Commission:

"The subscriptions still stand at about 10,000. Collections are slightly less than last year. Few are in arrears. Many have been dropped. During the year there has been no criticism. We majored on General Conference, Bishops' Crusade, Aldergate and Evangelism. There will be no change in papers until General Conference meets. It is important that we be ready for change,"

The board recommends that in accordance with Dr. Millar's suggestion the subscription price be continued at \$1.00, with a 50-cent club rate, and that all

pastors and officials be encouraged to increase the circulation of the paper.

From the Conference we ask the assessment of \$3,000.00, to be apportioned as To the salaries of Dr. Millar and his assistant secretary, \$1,270.00; one-sixth of the income of the board shall be paid into the hands of the Rural Work Commission as a fund for the circulation of Christian Literature. The January check from the Conference Treasurer, not to exceed \$300.00, shall be turned over to the Rural Work Commission, and the balance of the agreed amount paid at Annual Conference. Necessary expense of the Commissioners of the Arkansas Methodist shall be paid. The remaining income shall be designated as Arkansas Methodist Funds.

The reappointment of Dr. A. C. Millar as editor, is recommended, and also the election of Revs. H. F. McDonal, W. A. Lindsey, and J. Lloyd Shouse, as

CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Report No. 1

We come to the close of the quadrennium with gratitude to God for the results which have been achieved in our Conference in the field of Christian Education. The detailed report of the Executive Secretary has been placed in the hands of the members of the Conference. This report shows an advance over the previous year in the offerings on the home and foreign missionary enterprise, in training credits, in attendance in Young People's Assembly in Church School enrollment, in the number and enrollment in vacation schools and in other phases of work.

We heard with interest and appreciation of the excellent work with Methodist students at the State University and in Conway, and express it as our conviction that this work should receive increasing attention and support from the Conference and from the General Board.

We approve the recommendation of the Rural Work Commission in its plans

for rural work in the Conference. We believe that this plan holds great possibilities for the Conference.

The board unanimously adopted a resolution of commendation of the work of our Executive Secretary, who has served with great energy and devotion during

he past year.

We are pleased to report that the board is out of debt and the finances of the board are in excellent order, due to the faithful services of our treasurer, C. D. Metcalf. We recommend that the treasurer of the Conference be instructed to turn over to the treasurer of this board the additional funds which have come to him from the Centennial Commission, in accordance with the action of the Conference last year.

We are encouraged by the report of increased enrollment at Hendrix College. We are particularly gratified that the plan of support for ministerial students which was inaugurated by this board in 1935 has brought good results and that our Conference now has 49 ministerial students in training in Hendrix, in S. M. U.

and other institutions.

We have unanimously adopted a resolution extending our felicitations to Dr. John Hugh Reynolds upon completion of twenty-five years of distinguished service as President of Hendrix College, and upon the signal honor which has come to him in the meeting of the American Association of Colleges in his honor at Hendrix College this year.

We have not seen the report of the special committee appointed by Bishop Selecman to work out plans for larger financial support for the College. We express it as our conviction that this is a matter of major concern to the Conference and that this report should receive the most serious consideration of the Conference.

The board gratefully records its appreciation to Miss Lula Doyle Baird, Dr. J. M. Williams, and Prof. Nat R. Griswald, who have served as volunteer Conference Directors during the year; to the district directors; to the presiding elders who, without exception, have provided excellent leadership for this work in their districts; and to the pastors, for their interest and co-operation.

We hand over this work to the new board to be constituted at this Conference with a deep conviction that education is an instrument which the church must use with increasing power and skill if we are to combat the forces of evil which are using every means at their command to ensnare our children and youth. We believe, furthermore, that the only kind of education that will help to save the individual and society is an education which is genuinely Christian.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Report No. 3

During last summer, Bishop Selecman called together a group of ten members of North Arkansas and the Little Rock Annual Conferences to confer with him and President Reynolds on the financial needs of Hendrix College. The discussion in this group to the appointment of a smaller committee which was instructed to give further study to bring recommendations to the two conferences this fall.

The recommendations of this committee were referred to the Conference

Board of Christian Education.

We, therefore, recommend that the Conference adopt the following as its college policy for the ensuing year:

1. That we again record our sincere appreciation of Dr. John Hugh Reynolds, president of Hendrix CoCllege, the faculty, all administrative officers, and the trustees. All these have put us under great obligation because of their faithful and effective work in building up the resources of the college and in extending its services.

2. That we express our deep appreciation of the generous gifts made by the

General Education Board and other foundations to the college.

3. That the executive secretaries of the two conference boards of Christian Education and the officials of the college work out definite plans for bringing groups of our members and friends into closer contact with students and faculty; for district and sub-district meetings in the interest of the college; for discussion groups composed of pastors, laymen and faculty members; and for the use of ministerial students from the college as supply pastors in the absence of the regular pastors; for the use of both lay and ministerial students in the regular church services on stated occasions; and for a wider and more consistent use of the radio and newspapers in keeping the work and purpose of the school consistently before the people.

4. That the alumni of the college be requested to continue their efforts to secure funds through what is known as the "living endowment" and bequest pro-

gram.

5. That we continue the program of aiding ministerial students through scholarships provided by offerings in the local churches and that we begin as rapidly as possible to make similar provision for aid to worthy students who otherwise could not attend Hendrix College. In this connection, we respectfully recommend that such of our churches as may be able and willing be encouraged to put into their regular budgets an annual contribution to the current operating expenses of the college.

6. In view of the imperative need for additional buildings on the campus, a campaign for funds to build a woman's dormitory and a chapel, be initiated as early in the conference year as plans can be matured. While it is not the thought of the committee that this compaign be conducted along the usual high pressure lines, with quotas assigned to local churches and pastoral charges, yet it will be necessary for all our ministers not only to open their pulpits for the presentation of these objectives, but to give unselfishly of their services and their means and to cooperate in every possible way. The committee recommends that a full time worker, preferably a minister, be employed to assist the Board of Trustees in raising funds for the purpose outlined above, and that an advisory committee composed of three

persons from each conference, nominated jointly by the annual conferences, by the Bishop and chairman of the Conference Board of Christian Education, together with a similar committee from the Board of Trustees, be empowered to decide upon

campaign methods, specific objectives, etc.

7. That by the adoption of these recommendations we, the ministers of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences, pledge ourselves to co-operate whole-heartedly in these and other plans that may be adopted by the annual conferences to make Hendrix College all it ought to be.

these amounts and above, together with their pastors, each paying an equal amount, to pay an amount equal to the following percentage of the pastor's salary:

REPORT OF ARKANSAS METHODIST ORPHANAGE

This year has been a hectic one with us in that we have had to make extensive repairs, and our matron was seriously ill for four months. We felt that we could not spare her and rejoice that she is again back at her work. In spite of all handicaps we close the year free of debt.

In the beginning of the year we had 37 children in the home. During the fiscal year closing October 1st, we received four. Since that time we have received

several more, which will be reported next year. Our children attend services at Highland church and constitute a large part of our Sunday school there.

The returns from endowment, while not amounting to much, will in a few

years begin to return dividends.

Recommendations:

- 1. We recommend that F. E. Dodson be confirmed as a member of the Board of Trustees in the place of H. H. Hunt, and that Connor Morehead be confirmed a member of the Board of Trustees in the place of A. E. Holloway, deceased.
 - 2. We request that the Conference give us an apportionment of \$3,000.00.
- 3. We ask that the Conference continue the Christmas offerings for our orphanage and that the offering be taken an Sunday, December 25, or as near thereto as possible, and that the Board of Christian Education accept this undertaking as they have done in the past.
- 4. We also recommend that our brethren keep the orphanage in mind for increased endowment, in order that the institution may render the greatest possible service.

Your Conference Commission stands ready to cooperate with the boards and Presiding Elders as well as the pastors in promoting

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Your Committee on the American Bible Society makes the following report:

The Society is nearing a century and a quarter of uninterrupted service in distributing the Scriptures and report a splendid progress during the past year.

An announcement being received with world-wide interest is the fact that the number of languages in which the Scriptures have been published has now passed the one thousand mark. In this achievement there has been hearty and sympathetic cooperation between the Bible societies, the mission boards, and many individuals, missionary groups. At the end of 1937 the whole Bible had been published in 179 languages, the New Testament in 213, portions as selections in 616 more, so that the Scriptures have been published in 1,008 languages and dialects.

While the distribution of the Scriptures in 1937 fell somewhat below the previous year the Society has distributed more than one-third million copies of

Bibles, Testaments, Gospels and portions throughout the world.

Plans were made whereby this program would be sponsored for the current year.

Now that the General Conference has enacted legislation whereby this whole issue has been placed in the hands of the Rural Work Committee in each annual

conference, this committee asks to be discontinued.

REV. A. E. HOLLOWAY

Rev. Alfred Elliott Holloway, son of Mr. and Mrs. Quinton Holloway, was born May 16, 1868, at Water Valley, Mississippi, and died at Morrilton, Ar-

kansas, December 29, 1937.

He came to Arkansas with his parents at the age of seven years, and settled at Holly Grove. He grew to young manhood on his father's farm and attained such schooling as the rural sections of Monroe county afforded. He entered Hendrix College while that institution was located at Altus, and finished with "Magna Cum Laude" honors after the College had been moved to Conway in 1897. In the same year he married Miss Mattie Craig of Conway, and to this union were born three children.

Surviving loved ones include his widow, Mattie Craig and Elliott of Morrilton, and Rev. Fred Holloway of Rutherford, New Jersey, and two grandchildren, A. E. Holloway III, and Dianne Elizabeth Holloway, four sisters, Mrs. Sue Adams of Hodge, La., Mrs. Sallie Brown of Clarendon, Mrs. Maggie Glass of Conway,

REV. THOMAS ARMSTRONG BOWEN

Thomas Armstrong Bowen, son of Thomas Abner and Martha Gaither Bowen, was born near Imboden, Lawrence county, Arkansas, on July 24, 1854. Died September 9, 1938, at the Methodist Hospital in Memphis, Tenn., thus having attained the ripe age of 84 years.

Brother Bowen spent some years of his early life on the farm and was a success in this field of labor, but the call of God to the ministry could not be set aside. In the fall of 1891 he was received on trial into the White River Conference. Among the charges he served were, Siloam Circuit, Black Rock, Imboden, Pocahontas, Melbourne, Fisher Street Jonesboro, Nettleton, Walnut Ridge, Har-

risburg, Piggott, Rector and Freeman.

During these forty-seven years that he walked among us as a member of our Conference, he served many difficult charges, but he did it cheerfully. He never was the self-seeking kind and accepted his appointments, with all their hardships, in a spirit of resignation. To him the command of the church was the voice of providence and he went to hard places with the purpose to make them better and richer in the things of God. He could serve twice the same pastorate. He served Nettleton twice and Fisher Street Church Jonesboro, twice. One thing about him that set him apart from many of us was his cheerfulness and his great spirit of hopefulness. No matter what the odds might be against him, he was willing to do his best and never gave up till the opportunity was clearly past.

His last charge was Brookland Circuit. While serving that charge in the year 1925 his tired body fell a victim to a lingering illness, which he could not overcome, and at the session of the Conference at Conway, Arkansas, he was granted the superannuate relation. He held this relation for twelve years. A few days before he passed to his reward he was taken to the Methodist Hospital in Mem-

phis, where he died.

A brother good and true has gone out from among us. He did his work well and we shall cheerish his memory. We thank God for his great life and the

benediction he was to us.

His body was brought to Jonesboro and funeral services were held in the First Methodist Church, September 12, by the Rev. H. H. Griffin, pastor of First Church; assisted by the Rev. F. M. Tolleson, Brinkley; the Rev. R. E. L. Bearden, Russellville; the Rev. A. W. Martin, Forrest City, and Dr. E. W. Potter, Jonesboro. His body was laid to rest in the West Lawn Cemetery, Jonesboro, by the grave of his wife.
