# SESSIONS OF THE CONFERENCE

The old "Arkansas Conference" and the "White River Conference" were united in 1914 to form the present "North Arkansas Conference."

The Conference decided that its annual notation should date from the time of the organization of the Arkansas Conference in 1836, instead of following the date fixed by the consolidation of the Arkansas and White River Conferences, when the name was changed to North Arkansas, in 1914.

The Conference session of 1939 voted to maintain, the numerical notation of the Conference as we come into The Methodist Church.

## STANDING RULES

#### OF THE

# North Arkansas Conference

- (1) That all undergraduates be required to report according to the call of the several committee before the opening of the Conference and that no one be allowed to take examination after Conference opening unless providentially hindered.
- (2) That the Conference Treasurer be paid a salary of \$60.00 per month and allowed necessary office expenses with the provision that \$100.00 of this salary be paid out of funds raised for support of District Superintendents.
- (3) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one delegate from each Church in each Pastoral Charge; and, provided further, that when the membership of any church reaches three hundred, it shall be entitled to an additional delegate for each additional three hundred members or major fraction thereof, said delegates to be elected by the Quarterly Conference; provided, further, that no charge shall have fewer than three delegates elected.
- (4.) That figures answering the question: "Members reported last year," be the figure printed in the Journal of the last Annual Conference.
- (5) That the District Superintendents' figures of all apportionments be accepted as the official figures.
- (6) That the apportionments for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer .
- (7) That the gures answering the question: "Amount raised for Missions by Church School," be the figures which represent the amount sent to the Treasurer of the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise.
- (8) That all Statistical Reports be turned in to the Statistical Secretary by the hour of the first session; and that all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer not later than 6 p. m., Thursday, of Conference sessions or else the names of delinquents shall be reported to the Conference.
- (9) When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishop's cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission, or an officer in the Conference administration.
- (10) That the Secretary of the Bishop's cabinet be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's Districts for insertion in the Conference Journal.
- (11) Resolved, that all members of our Annual Conference who attend its annual sessions, except superannuated and supernumerary preachers, be required to pay the church entertaining the Conference one dollar registration fee.

The Committee on Minute Auditing reported that the minutes of the preceding session were correct.

Bishop Charles L. Mead was introduced to the Conference and was invited by Bishop Selecman to a seat on the rostrum.

Dr. James Thomas of the Little Rock Conference, Rev. Chaffin, pastor of the Morrilton Nazarene Church, and Rev. S. J. Patterson, pastor of the Morrilton Presbyterian Church, were introduced to the Conference.

Dr. James Thomas, Superintendent of the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage, read the report of that institution and the report was referred to the Orphanage Board.

Mr. John A. Baskerville, representing the Methodist Publishing House, was introduced to the Conference. He addressed the Conference in behalf of the publishing agents and presented a check for the Conference share of earnings for the fiscal year. The check, in the sum of \$2,581.71, was delivered to the Board of Finance.

stating that the hospital was for the moment clear of debt; but additional buildings are to be launched immediately involving expenditure of \$100,000.00.

The Secretary of the Conference was recognized to state that flowers in the church were placed there by Mrs. Mattie Craig Holloway in memory of the late A. E. Holloway, who had been a beloved pastor of the Morrilton church.

On invitation of Bishop Selecman, Bishop Mead took the chair to preside.

The report of the Board of Christian Education was read. J. Q. Schisler and Sam B. Wiggins spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

Bishop Selecman resumed the chair.

The report of the Rural Work Commission was read and adopted.

Miss Ellen Jensen, rural missionary in the Paragould and the Jonesboro districts, was introduced by H. Lynn Wade, district superintendent of the Paragould district, and addressed the Conference.

The report of the Committee on American Bible Society was read and adopted.

QUESTION No. 6 was called: Who are admitted into full connection?

John J. Clark, Roy Bagley, Lyman T. Barger, Clarence Wienand and Robert E. L. Bearden, Jr., were called to the chancel where they gave satisfactory answers to questions asked them; they were addressed by Bishop Selecman on the life and work of the itinerant ministry of the Methodist Church and, meeting the disciplinary requirements, they were admitted into full connection by vote of the Conference. Bishop Mead led the Conference in prayer.

J. W. Crichlow, of the St. Louis Conference, J. D. Hammons, of the Little Rock Conference, and Vice President of Hendrix College, Guy Ames, and J. L. Dedman, transferred to this Conference since the last session, were introduced to the Conference.

QUESTION No. 13 was called: Who are transferred to other Conferences?

Bishop Selecman announced the transfer of T. E. McKnight and H. C. Henderson to the North Texas Conference, Ben T. Williams to the Colorado Conference, and they were granted leave of absence for the remainder of the session.

Bishop Selecman resigned the chair to E. W. Faulkner, Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs, and the Conference was in Memorial session.

QUESTION No. 14 was called: What preachers have died during the year?

It was announced that Henry Hanesworth, J. M. McAnally and Thomas Wright had died, and that Mrs. G. L. Horton, Mrs. W. H. Dyer and Mrs. D. W. Reid, wives of preachers, had died during the year.

Hymn No. 525 was sung. E. W. Faulkner led in responsive reading No. 11 for the Forty-third Sunday. R. E. L. Bearden led in prayer. The memorial serman was preached by William Sherman.

After announcements, the Conference adjourned to meet at 2:00 o'clock, with the benediction by A. H. Dulaney .

### SECOND DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

The Conference met at 2:00 p. m., with Bishop Selecman presiding.

Hymn No. 245, "O Sometimes the Shadows Are Deep," was sung. The Conference read the Scripture lesson on Peace, at page 594 of the Methodist Hymnal. J. W. Crichlow led in prayer. "In the Sweet By and By" was sung.

Rev. F. B. Brower, representing the General Board of Finance, was introduced to the Conference.

Report No. 1 of the Committee on Conference Relations was read and adopted.

The report of the Board of Missions was read. Dr. O. E. Goddard spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

The report of the Orphanage Board was read and adopted.

Dr. A. W. Wasson, Secretary of the Department of Foreign Work, of the General Board of Missions, addressed the Conference on the misisonary work of the church.

Report No. 1 of the Treasurer was read by Rev. Guy Murphy, Conference Treasurer.

The report of the Committee on Christian Literature was read and adopted.

The report of the Board of Church Extension was read and adopted.

The report of the Committee on District Conference Journals was read and adopted.

The report of the Woman's Missionary Society was presented by the Conference President of the Society, Mrs. Henkely Pewett. The report was adopted.

Rev. J. J. Morgan, of Dallas, Texas, Southwest Secretary of the American Bible Society, addressed the Conference in behalf of that institution.

Report No. 2 of the Board of Christian Education was read and filed for record.

QUESTION No. 24 was resumed. The names of A. E. Goode and J. L. Rowland were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations for the superannuate relation.

The Conference voted to hold the Board of Finance anniversary session at the close of the session on Thursday.

By vote of the Conference the Methodist Church was requested to complete any item of unfinished business that might be found following final adjournment of the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and E. B. Williams and Sam B. Wiggins were appointed to bring in a resolution.

The Conference adjourned for the worship service in which Bishop Mead delivered a stirring and masterly sermon on the text found at Galatians 4:4-6.

## THIRD DAY-MORNING SESSION

The Conference met at 8:30 a. m., with Bishop Selecman presiding.

Hymn No. 370, "O For a Heart to Praise My God," was sung. The responsive reading for the ninth Sunday on "Christ the Life" and "The Blessed Life," were read. Dr. A. W. Wasson led in prayer. Hymn No. 311, "Come O Thou Traveller Unknown," was sung. Bishop Selection read a lesson from the sixth chapter of Acts and delivered an inspiring message on the central place of religion in the life of the church.

The minute auditing committee reported that the minutes of the preceding morning and afternoon session were correct and the minutes were approved.

QUESTION No. 1 was called: Who are admitted on Trial?

Joe William Watson, recommended by the Batesville District Conference; John Kenneth Shamblin, Orr Davis Peters, Benton Bailey, and Wilbur Earl DuBois, all recommended by the Fayetteville District Conference; and William Davenport Bray, recommended by the Jonesboro District Conference, meeting the disciplinary requirements and being recommended by the Committee on Admissions, were admitted on trial by vote of the Conference.

QUESTION No. 2 was called: Who else in the class of the first year? No one.

QUESTION No. 3 was called: "Who remain on trial? William H. Dunlap, Alfred Alexander Knox, Martin Andrew Cherry, having stood an approved examination on the course of study were advanced to the class of the second year.

QUESTION No. 4 was called: Who else in the class of the second year? No one.

QUESTION No. 5 was called: Who are discontinued? No one.

QUESTION No. 7 was called: Who else in the class of the third year? No one.

QUESTION No. 8 was called: Who are readmitted? No one.

QUESTION No. 10 was called: Who are received from other churches as travelling preachers? No one.

QUESTION No. 11 was called: Who are located this year? W. F. Shell was located at his own request.

The presence of Dr. R. C. Thompson, lay delegate from Paris, was noted.

QUESTION No. 12 was called: Who have withdrawn or been expelled? No one.

QUESTION No. 15 was called: Who are deacons of one year? Harry King, having stood an approved examination on the course of study, was advanced to the fourth year.

QUESTION No. 16 was called: Who else in the class of the fourth year? Not having stood an approved examination on the course of study, Raymond Lee Franks was continued in the class of the fourth year.

QUESTION No. 19 was called: What traveling preachers and what local preachers have been elected elders? Lloyd Milton Conyers and Irl Bridenthal having stood an approved examination on the course of study and meeting the disciplinary requirements were elected to elder orders.

QUESTION No. 21: Who have been recommended by a District Conference for recognition of their orders as local deacons or local elders? No one.

Joe A. Goetz, Statistical Secretary, presented his report, answering all questions from 25 to 45.

Guy Murphy read the Treasurer's report. The report was adopted. Bishop Selecman surrendered the chair to Bishop Mead. The following resolution was read and adopted:

# RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Methodist Episcopal Church, and the Methodist Protestant Church, and the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, were, by action of the Uniting Conference of said churches held on May 10th, 1939, in Kansas City, Missouri, united into a single church, to be known as "The Methodist Church," it being understood and agreed that the property of each of said churches should become the property of the united church; and,

Whereas, this being the last annual Conference to be held for the North Arkansas Conference of the said Methodist Episcopal Church, South; now, there-

fore,

Be It Resolved, by this Conference, acting in harmony with the principles of said union, that all right, title and interest which this Conference has, or may appear to have, or which the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has, or may appear to have, within the jurisdiction of this Conference, in or to any property, including real estate, personal property, institutions, equities and trusts of every kind and nature, of whatever description and wherever located, shall be and the same is hereby conveyed to and vested in the North Arkansas Conference of The Methodist Church, as formed by said union, to be held, administered and conveyed by the proper officers, agents and trustees of said Methodist Church, according to the authority vested in them, or that may be vested in them by said church. E. T. Wayland, James A. Anderson, William J. Clark.

Dr. James A. Anderson read the following resolution, which was adopted:

PREAMBLE: This Conference was organized in 1836 as the Arkansas Annual Conference, and this is, therefore, our 104th session. In 1854 the Ouachita Conference was set off for the south part of Arkansas. The name Ouachita was changed in a few years to the "Little Rock" Conference. In 1870 the White River Conference was set off for the northeastern part of the state. In 1914 the line between the White River and the Arkansas Conference was lifted, thus uniting the two, and the Conference took the name of the "North Arkansas Conference."

None of these changes of either name or territory destroyed the corporate identity of this Conference, and so the numerical notation of its sessions continues to this day. We are now uniting, and gladly so, our force with whatever constituency of the former Methodist Episcopal Church and the former Methodist Protestant Church lie within our borders. We see no reason to change the numerical notation of the Conference on this account. There is some dignity attaching to a long history. Therefore,

Be It Resolved, That if it is agreeable to our brethren who are now uniting with us, we shall preserve our notation and when the business of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, in this Conference shall be finished here, we shall go into a continuing session of the 104th session, to adopt our work to the work of the United Conference, and the session a year hence shall be designated as our 105th session.

James A. Anderson, Sam B. Wiggins.

J. M. Workman of the Little Rock Conference was introduced to the Conference.

QUESTION No. 19 was resumed: What travelling preachers and what local preachers have been elected elders? John Jefferson Clark, having been four years a deacon, was elected to elder's orders.

Report No. 2 of the Committee on Conference Relations was read and adopted.

The following resolution was read and adopted:

WHEREAS, The One Hundred and Fourth session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, may not have transacted all the business that should come before it, it hereby delegates to the first session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference of The Methodist Church authority to transact any business left unfinished by said Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

E. B. Williams, Sam B. Wiggins.

The Conference voted that when it adjourn it adjourn sine die.

### THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Your committee on the American Bible Society begs leave to report as follows: First, we are deeply concerned that each of us who constitute the membership of this conference spend more time searching the Scriptures. In the stress and strain of the multiplied demands made upon our time today surely we are all forced to confess that we often are betrayed into neglecting the Bible. If it becomes necessary to read fewer books about the Bible, let us read the Bible the more.

Secondly, as a civilization we are confronted with the unsolved problem of how to save the reading public from the evils of coarse and obscene literature in the field of entertainment; from the evils of books and tracts on atheistic communism in the field of politics, and from the evils of heretical theology in the field of religion. We, your committee, believe that the development of a love for the Bible among general readers will solve this problem. Therefore, we insist that Bibles and New Testaments and portions of the Scriptures must be placed within the reach of all the peoples in all lands, and that means must be discovered to get all readers as far as possible to read the Bible.

That these objectives may be attained we must continue to have a great publishing and distributing agency just such as the American Bible Society is, that the Bible may be published in all languages and distributed to all peoples.

We recommend the widespread observance of Bible Sunday, on December 10th, that our people may be stirred afresh to appreciation of and use of the Bible as the guide of national and personal life. We urge all our churches to sustain the Bible cause generously.

#### CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

#### Report No. 1

The report of the Executive Secretary and the Secretary of Rural Work has been placed in the hands of the members of the Conference. We shall, therefore, refer you to this report for the details of the year's work. You will note the advances in Vacation Schools, Training credits, Church School enrollment, Offerings on the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise and in the offerings for ministerial students.

Hendrix College is having one of the best years in its history. The enrollment is 417 students. Forty of these are ministerial students, twenty-two of whom are from our Conference. There are seventeen ministerial students from this Conference in graduate schools.

One year ago, your Board of Christian Education decided to make an effort to provide some way by which boys with meager financial resources might attend Hendrix College. A Committee was appointed to study the possibility of a Cooperative for boys and to work out plans with the College for such if possible. We are glad to report that this Cooperative is in operation with 19 boys enrolled as members. It is our purpose to extend this effort to provide a way for girls as well as a larger number of boys.

The Board desires to express its appreciation for the untiring and successful work of Rev. Ira A. Brumley, the Executive Secretary, and Rev. G. C. Johnson, Secretary of Rural Work. We desire also to record our appreciation for the efficient services of volunteer workers: Miss Lula Doyle Baird, Conference Director of Children's Work; Dr. J. M. Williams, Conference Director of Adult Work; and Mr. C. D. Metcalf, Conference Board Treasurer, and to the District Superintendents and their District Directors. The fine record of the year would be impossible without the services of these volunteer workers.

Reports on student religious work at State institutions of higher learning were received from our pastors at Conway, Fayetteville, Jonesboro and Russell-ville. These reports show that there are 1200 Methodist students in State schools within the bounds of our Conference. We believe that on the whole, better work is being done by our Church with these students than ever before. The funds available for this work have been wholly inadequate.

We pass on the responsibility for Christian education in North Arkansas to the new Conference of The Methodist Church with a profound conviction that the educational method must be used with increasing skill and effectiveness by the church in all its work. We believe that Christian education, if so used, will strengthen the Church in all its vast and varied efforts to establish the Kingdom of God in the life of individuals and in the social order of our day. To this end, we earnestly ask for the continued interest and prayers of the Conference.

### SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION

The Conference met at 8:30 a. m., with Bishop Selecman presiding. Hymn No. 213, "My Faith Looks Up to Thee," was sung. The Conference read the responsive Scripture lesson at page 595 of the Methodist Hymnal, "The Lord's Day," and offered the Lord's Prayer. Hymn No. 279 was sung, "God of Grace and God of Glory." The Conference recited the Apostles' Creed. R. E. L. Bearden led in prayer. Hymn No. 268, "Are You Able? Saith the Master," was sung Bishop Selecman read a passage from the fifth and sixth chapters of Ephesians and addressed the Conference on "The Spirit of Religion in the Home."

Bishop Selecman baptized the infant son of Rev. and Mrs. Boyd M. Johnson, christened William Sewell.

J. A. Gatlin and S. B. Wilford were elected an auditing committee to examine the minutes and report to the Conference on the correctness of the record.

The Auditing Committee reported that the minutes of the preceding session were correct and the minutes were approved.

Mrs. Dorothy Noxon wasseated in the place of Eagle Thomas who was absent. Mrs. J. W. Moore was seated in the place of C. J. Perry who was absent.

The presence of Guy Graves and Sam Galloway, lay delegates, was noted and they were seated.

The following resolution was adopted:

BE IT RESOLVED: That the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Church abide by Paragraph 848 of the Discipline, except phrase, "unless otherwise provided for," which paragraph deals with the support of the District Superintendents. The paragraph reads as follows: "It shall be the duty of the Commission, unless otherwise provided for, to estimate the amount necessary to furnish a sufficient and equitable support for the District Superintendent of each District in the Conference, including salary, suitable provision for rent, travel, and office expense. It shall report this estimate to the Annual Conference for approval. The Conference Treasurer or District Treasurer, elected by the Annual Conference, shall remit monthly to the several District Superintendents the amounts due them, and with the approval of the Annual Conference may borrow the funds necessary to make this possible."

Cecil R. Culver, Glenn F. Sanford.

The order of the day having been reached, A. W. Martin read the report of the Town and Country Commission. G. C. Johnson, Bates Sturdy, Thomas C. Huff, and others spoke to the report and the report was adopted.

Rev. Fletcher Nelson, of the Western North Carolina Conference; Rev. Thereon McKisson, of the East Oklahoma Conference; Rev. Clem Baker, Rev. H. H. and Mrs. Griffin, Rev. Albea Godbold, Rev. Rex Wilkes, Rev. J. E. Cooper and Rev. C. M. Reves, of the Little Rock Conference, were introduced to the Conference.

Election of delegates to the General Conference and to the Jurisdictional Conference being the order of the day, Bishop Selection instructed the Tellers, read the order of the Church concerning election of delegates and their qualifications. The first ballots for election of clerical and for lay delegates to the General Conference were taken.

An order of the day for selecting the place of meeting of the next Conference had arrived.

QUESTION No. 47 was called: Where shall the next session of the Conference be held?

A. W. Martin, on behalf of the people of the First Church of Jonesboro, invited the Conference to hold the next session in Jonesboro. J. P. Womack, Mrs. Henkel Pewett and Charles Stuck addressed the Conference in emphasis of the invitation. The Conference voted to hold the next session in Jonesboro.

The tellers reported the canvass of the first ballot for lay delegates to General Conference, showing no election. The second ballot was taken.

The tellers reported the first ballot on clerical delegates to the General Conference. A. W. Martin was elected. The second ballot was taken.

Answering Question No. 7, "Who are transferred to other Conferences?" Bishop Selecman announced the transfer of Ben T. Williams to the Colorado Conference.

Bishop Charles L. Mead took the chair at the request of Bishop Selecman.

The report of the Board of Christian Education was read and adopted.

A report on the work of the Southern Methodist University was read and filed with the Secretary.

The tellers reported the second ballot in the election of lay delegates to the General Conference. Charles A. Stuck was elected. The third ballot was taken.

Bishop Selecman resumed the chair.

The tellers reported the second ballot in the election of clerical delegates to the General Conference. J. Q. Schisler was elected. The third ballot was taken.

Report No. 1 of the Commission on World Service and Finance was read and adopted.

The report of the Committee on Objectives was read and adopted. The Conference voted to make the report available for churches and pastors in convenient form.

At the request of J. Q. Schisler, Bishop Selecman explained the Methodist Advance enterprise. At the invitation of Bishop Selecman, Bishop Mead spoke of certain phases of the movement.

The tellers reported the third ballot in the election of clerical delegates to the General Conference. There was no election. The fourth ballot was taken. The tellers reported the third ballot in the election of lay delegates to the General Conference. Mrs. Henkel Pewett was elected. The fourth ballot was taken.

The fourth ballot for election of lay delegates was reported, showing the election of John G. Moore. This completed the delegation.

The Conference voted that when it adjourn that it should be to meet at 2:00 o'clock p. m.

The fourth ballot in the election of clerical delegates to the General Conference was reported, showing the election of Connor Morehead.

The first ballot in the election of delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was taken in both Lay and Clerical membership; and the ballot was ordered to be sealed until the afternoon session of the Conference.

After announcements, the Conference adjourned with the benediction by E. K. Means.

### SECOND DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION

The Conference met at 2:00 p. m., with Bishop Selecman presiding.

Hymn No. 220, "Saviour Thy Dying Love," was sung. O. L. Cole led in prayer.

The tellers reported the first ballot in the election of lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. Joe A. Goetz was elected. The second ballot was taken.

The tellers reported the first ballot in the election of clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. There was no election. The second ballot was taken.

The report of the Board of Christian Literature was read. Dr. A. C. Millar and J. T. Willcoxon spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

Report No. 1 of the Board of Missions and Church Extension was read. Dr. A. W. Wasson spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

The tellers reported the second ballot in the election of clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. A. W. Wasson was elected. The third ballot was taken.

The tellers reported the ballot in the election of lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. C. D. Metcalf was elected. The third ballot was taken.

The report of the Board of Conference Claimants was read and adopted.

The tellers reported the third ballot in the election of clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. There was no election. The fourth ballot was taken.

The tellers reported no election in the ballot for the election of lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference. The fourth ballot was taken.

The Conference voted to seal the Jurisdictional Conference ballots to be reported to the Saturday morning session.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction.

### THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION

The Conference met at 8:30 a. m., with Bishop Selecman presiding.

Hymn No. 244, "Solid Rock," was sung. The Conference used the responsive Scripture lesson entitled, 'Divine Upholding," at page 569 of the Methodist Hymnal. William Sherman led in prayer. Hymn No. 73, "Be Still My Soul" (Finlandia), was sung.

The Auditing Committee reported that the minutes were correct and the journal was approved.

The fourth ballot in the election of clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was reported. Oscar E. Goddard was elected. The fifth ballot was taken.

The fourth ballot in the election of lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was reported. Sam Galloway was elected. The fifth ballot was taken.

Dr. C. N. Hodges was elected a member of the Board of Hospitals and Homes.

Report No. 2 of the Commission on World Service and Finance was read and adopted.

The following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED, That we ask for a Commission on Redistricting the Conference, to be appointed to form the Conference into equitable districts, to report to the next annual session in 1940.—E. K. Sewell, R. S. Hayden, James M. Workman, Cecil Culver, J. P. Womack, J. M. Hughey, A. N. Storey, A. W. Martin, O. E. Goddard, A. W. Wasson.

The fifth ballot in the election of lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was reported. Mrs. Alfred Hathcock was elected. The sixth ballot was taken.

R. S. Hayden was elected Conference Director of Golden Cross, on nomination of the Board of Hospitals and Homes.

The fifth ballot in the election of Clerical Delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was reported. George W. Pyles was elected. The sixth ballot was taken.

On nomination and by vote of the lay delegates, Charles A. Stuck was elected Conference Lay Leader.

On nomination of the District Superintendents, Ethan Dodgen, J. S. Upton and O. L. Cole were elected members of the Committee on Accepted Supply Pastors, in the place of A. T. Mayes, W. A. Patty and Irl Bridenthal.

The following resolution was adopted:

RESOLUTION—Since this Conference requested the writing of this history and since here remain undistributed several hundred copies thereof,

Resolved, That the Conference take immediate steps to finish the distribution of the books.—E. T. Wayland, Sam B. Wiggins.

The members of the Conference purchased 343 copies of the Centennial History of Methodism.

Dr. O. E. Goddard took the chair at the request of Bishop Selecman.

The sixth ballot in the election of lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was reported. A. P. McKeithan and J. P. Womack were elected. The seventh ballot was taken.

The sixth ballot in the election of clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was reported. Sam B. Wiggins was elected. The first ballot for clerical alternate delegates was taken.

The Conference voted to set Golden Cross Week as the second week in May (May 12 to May 19); and directed that five per cent of the funds coming from the Golden Cross Enrollment be retained for expenses incurred by the Conference Director of the Golden Cross; that five per cent be remitted to the General Board of Hospitals and Homes; and that 90 per cent be directed to the use of the Methodist Hospital in Memphis.

The Conference voted to direct the Board of Conference Claimants to place the name of G. A. Burr on its rolls, although he had requested previously that he be not made a pensioner of the funds.

The report of the Commission on Evangelism was read and adopted.

The report of the Committee on the American Bible Society was read and adopted.

Report No. 2 of the Board of Missions and Church Extension was read and adopted.

The Conference voted to pause at the approach of the hour of eleven o'clock and be in silent prayer in commemoration of the ending of the World War in Europe.

A resolution from the Board of Trustees of the Conference, concerning the expense of incorporating the Board of Conference Trustees, was referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance.

The first ballot in the election of alternate clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was reported. Cecil Culver was elected. The second ballot was taken.

The seventh ballot in the election of lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was reported. C. R. Garrison was elected, completing the lay delegation. The first ballot for alternate lay delegates was taken.

The Conference stood in silent prayer, followed by a petition for world peace, which was led by Stanford Hayden, a world war veteran and chaplain of the Division of Arkansas American Legion.

J. S. Upton was granted leave of absence.

Report No. 3 of the Board of World Service and Finance was read and adopted.

W. P. Whaley was granted leave of absence.

The second ballot in the election of alternate clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was reported. E. T. Wayland was elected. The third ballot was taken.

Report No. 2 of the Board of Missions and Church Extension was read and adopted.

The authority to amend certain appropriations in the report of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, amending a report already adopted, was granted by vote of the Conference.

Horace M. Lewis, pastor host, introduced Mrs. Charles C. Selecman, wife of the Bishop, to the Conference.

The report of the Board of Temperance was read and adopted.

Sam M. Yancey reported the work of Western Methodist Assembly.

The report of the third ballot in the election of alternate clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was received. W. V. Womack was elected. This completed the election of Clerical delegates.

The Conference voted to hold sessions of the District Conferences,

The following resolution was adopted:

RESOLVED, That we request the District Stewards of this Conference to use the same method in determining the total askings to charges as was used by the Commission on World Service and Finance in determining the total askings for the Districts.

The "Distributing Committe of Three" (Paragraph 1312) was appointed by Bishop Selecman, William Sherman, A. W. Martin, and Joe A. Goetz.

Bishop Selectman requested time for the appointment of the Commission on Redistricting Conference Territory, and the Conference voted to grant time for his convenience. (See page 20).

The Conference voted to direct the Commission on World Service and Finance to see to it that proper and adequate bonds are furnished by the treasurers of the Conference boards.

The Conference voted to have appointed a committee of three members of the Conference to investigate the desirability of entering the Ministers' Reserve Pension Plan, as described in the Discipline, and to report at the next session of the Conference.

Bishop Selecman appointed G. W. Pyles, Sam B. Wiggins and E. H. Hook to the committee.

Dr. J. H. Reynolds was introduced to the Conference.

Conference voted that adjournment be to meet at 2:00 p. m., Sunday.

After various announcements, the Conference adjourned with the doxology and prayer led by Dr. J. H. Reynolds.

### FOURTH DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION

Conference opened at 2 p. m., with Bishop Charles C. Selecman presiding. Hymn No. 338, "Jesus Lover of My Soul," and Hymn No. 475, "O Zion Haste," were sung. Rev. G. W. Pyles led in prayer.

Rev. A. W. Martin read the following resolution, which was adopted:

RESOLVED, that the Commission on World Service and Finance apportion to the former Methodist Episcopal Churches in this Conference, in lieu of the usual apportionment for Conference benevolences, an amount sufficient to produce \$417.00, the income from which apportionment to be applied on the salary of Rev. I. O. Hall, former District Superintendent of the Methodist Episcopal Churches in Arkansas, and now employed as rural worker in the Southwest Missouri Conference.—Signed: J. A. Gatlin, A. W. Martin.

The committee to audit the minutes reported them to be correct.

S. B. Wilford offered the following amendment to the Commission on World Service and Finance, and it was adopted:

"That in Report No. 2 of the Commission on World Service and Finance the words 'and instructed' be added so as to read "The Conference Treasurer be authorized and instructed" to pay salaries, etc."

- E. T. Wayland, on behalf of the cabinet, offered the following substitutions on boards and comm ssions: A. D. Stewart was named on the Commission on World Service and Finance to take the place of Aubrey Walton; L. L. Evans was named to take the place of H. C. Henderson, and J. M. Hughey to take the place of Allen Stewart on the Board of Education. They were elected by the Conference.
- C. C. Burton read a resolution of thanks, which was adopted by rising vote of the Conference.

Aubrey Walton read a statement to the Conference stating that the apportionment to the Conference for expense of the Jurisdictional Conference would be \$1,094.00, and asked permission for the Commission on World Service and Finance to apportion same to the districts and notify the District Superintendents. The apportionment was accepted and the committee granted the privilege.

QUESTION No. 18 was called: What travelling preachers and what local preachers are ordained deacons? Clarence Henry Wienand, Roy Ishmael Bagley and R. E. L. Bearden, Jr., were called to the chancel and having met the disciplinary requirements were ordained deacons by Bishop Selecman.

QUESTION No. 20 was called: What travelling preachers and what local preachers are ordained elders?

Irl Bridenthal and Lloyd M.lton Conyers were presented at the chancel by William Sherman, having met the disciplinary requirements and having given satisfactory answers to the disciplinary questions were ordained elders. Bishop Selecman was assisted by the District Superintendents, Connor Morehead, E. T. Wayland, W. V. Womack, Warren Johnson, J. L. Dedman, E. W. Potter, H. L. Wade and G. W. Pyles.

Bishop Selecman gave to those ordained their parchments and filed the following certificate of ordination with the secretaries:

## Reports of Boards and Committees

### COMMITTEE ON OBJECTIVES

That the Christian faith offers to men the truth about God and man and the world and that it furthermore offers through Christ salvation from all sin is a fact of increasing significance in the present confused state of the world. As Christians and members of the Church we are soberly aware of the responsibility placed upon organized proponents of the faith in view of the shifting world scene, recalling that the invincible advance of the forces of Christ has always been notable in times of crisis when there have been men of courage and faith to give themselves to the cause.

For those people of us called Methodists this sobering sense of responsibility has been vastly augmented and the spiritual challenge to enlarged tasks made more compellingly evident by the consummation of Methodist union in three great branches of the Church of America. In the light of the present world situation, unification constitutes a summons to a mighty advance.

Believing that fruitful consecration must be always intelligently and purpose-fully directed we realize the need for re-defining objectives and lifting up goals of achievement to inspire our greater effort and meaningfully utilize our energies. Therefore, we, your Committee on Objectives, after prayerful study and earnest work, submit for your consideration the following objectives for the Methodist Church in the North Arkansas Conference during the coming year:

### I. Evangelism and Memberships

- 1. The consistent and purposeful development of the entire church membership in active and intelligent participation in the total program of the united Church.
- 2. A definite period of evangelism in every church, . . . with either the method of visitation or mass evangelism, or both employed, emphasizing the pre-Easter season and Childhood and Youth Week as especially appropriate for this purpose, with the further goal of additions on profession of faith in each church.
  - 3. A ten per cent increase in church membership for the entire conference.
- 4. The development in each church of a program of promotion and training for a continuous group of workers whose purpose it shall be definitely to win people to Christ and to the Church and to keep alive in the entire membership the passion for souls.

### II. Christian Education:

1. The home life to be developed by a more thorough use of Christian literature, emphasizing especially the devotional use of the Bible and that litera-

ture which will aid in its use and understanding, viz. the Upper Room, the Church School literature, the Christian Advocate and the Arkansas Methodist.

2. Enlarge the work of the Church School-

a. By increasing the enrollment and reaching the unreached.

b. By proper observance of special days,—Church School Day, Mis-

sionary Day, College Day, Young People's Day, etc.

- c. By enlisting more people in the leadership training program,—District Training Schools, Epworth Training Conferences, Summer Assemblies and Camps, Pastor's School, Institutes and Local Training Classes.
- 3. The continuation and expansion of the Youth Crusade with its large objectives and features, including the Caravan Program.
- 4. The development of an increasingly active and responsible Board of Education in each local church.

5. The full and active support of Hendrix College-

a. By cooperation in plans for the enlargement and strengthening of the college in student enrollment, buildings and endowments, etc., with a consistent effort being made to send our own young people there.

b. By the adequate observance of College Day as a means of relating the local church and the college, with an increased emphasis upon the

offering for Ministerial Students.

### III. Missions and Church Extension:

- 1. Set up and work the Local Church Council of Missions and Church Extension in each church in accordance with directions given in Paragraphs 1069-1070 of our Discipline.
- 2. Each church participating in the Home and Foreign Missionary Enterprise by the observance of Missionary Sunday with a specific program on missions and with an offering.
- 3. In accordance with the Disciplinary provision given in paragraph 1068, the holding of a bona fide Missionary Institute for the districts which shall be exclusively missionary with all alien matters barred.
- 4. So far as possible a Society of Woman's Christian Service in every church with every woman in the church a member of the society and with each local society carrying out the entire program of the Woman's Division.
- 5. A specific missionary sermon in each pastoral charge at least quarterly with the understanding that on large circuits there shall be at least one such sermon in each church during the year.
- 6. The increased circulation and use of the World Outlook and other missionary publications, circulating as widely as possible among both men and women, young people and adults, the new mission study book by John R. Mott.

7. Specific Church Extension interests—

a. Give special attention to the repair and upkeep of all church property, both in the interest of thrift and economy and in the interests of finer attitudes of worship.

b. Provide adequate insurance on all church property against fire, lightning, hail and storm.

c. Build new churches in needed territory in accordance with sound financial principles and in harmony with the rules of the sound ecclesiastical architecture.

d. Give careful attention to the prompt meeting of payments on church and parsonage debts and the complete liquidation of all such debts where possible in a business-like way.

### IV. Finance:

- 1. The organization of all official boards immediately after conference, the adoption of a worthy financial plan, and the enlistment of the entire membership for financial support of the total church program.
- 2. An early meeting in each district of the pastors and stewards to set goals and lay plans for cooperative advance within the district.
- 3. An increase in acceptance on Benevolences in every church where total askings have not been accepted.
  - 4. An honest effort made to bring all salaries up to a living wage.
  - 5. All church bills to be paid monthly and a quarterly report on all finances.
- V. Rural Work Commission: Appreciating the constructive and far-sighted work already done by our North Arkansas Conference Commission on Rural Work, we shall—
- 1. Perpetuate and promote the work of our Rural Work Commission, harmonizing as best we can with the work outlined for Town and Country Work in our Discipline, Paragraphs 1002-1007.
- 2. Actively promulgate the Financial Plan for rural churches as worked out by our Commission and institute a definite financial system within each rural church, as far as possible based upon the Commission's Financial Plan and adapted to local conditions.

### VI. Lay Activities:

- 1. Support the program of the Board of Lay Activities and define as a definite goal the securing of an active lay leader for each district.
- 2. Emphasis upon the indispensible usefulness of laymen in the educational evangelistic and missionary program of the church.

### VII. The Methodist Advance:

- 1. By the observance of a religious Watch Night Service on December 31,
- 2. By attending the State-wide Methodist Advance meeting in Little Rock February 6, 1940.
- 3. By participation in other phases of this Methodist Advance Movement as outlined by the Bishops.

#### COMMISSION ON WORLD SERVICE AND FINANCE

### Report No. 1

Your Commission on World Service and Finance nominates the Reverend Guy Murphy for Conference Treasurer.

We recommend: First, that the First National Bank of Fort Smith, Arkansas, be designated as the depository for the Conference funds, with the exception that the Twin City Bank of North Little Rock, Arkansas, be designated as the depository for the funds of the Board of Conference Claimants, after these funds have been distributed to them by the Conference Treasurer.

Second, that the Conference Treasurer be instructed to pay \$800 for the printing of the Conference Minutes before dividing the funds for the Conference and General work.

We wish to remind the treasurers of the various Conference Boards of the disciplinary order requiring the filing of a bond annually with the Commission on World Service and Finance before funds can be paid to them by the Conference Treasurer.

### Report No. 2

In compliance with the action of the Conference, your Commission on World Service and Finance recommends that the support of the District Superintendents for this year be fixed at \$3,600 salary and \$600 expenses for each District Superintendent.

We recommend further, that the funds with which to pay these items be provided by a flat apportionment to the various charges of an amount equal to 14 per cent of the pastor's salaries, and that this money be collected in the same manner as the pastors salaries and forwarded as collected, at least monthly (Paragraph 813), to the Conference Treasurer, who shall receive and disburse these funds according to the Discipline and the authority of the Conference.

We recommend also that the Conference Treasurer, in keeping with the Disciplinary provisions, Paragraph 848, be authorized and instructed to pay salaries and expenses to the District Superintendents monthly and, if necessary, to borrow funds with which to do this, provided the amount borrowed does not exceed, at any time, the sum of \$5,000.

### BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

#### Report No. 1

The union of the three Methodisms concentrates in one body a force of 25,000 ministers and eight million members. The new plan of missionary organization brings together in one Board for united thought and planning and action five great related interests which in the past have for the most part been handled separately and independently, namely—Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Church Extension, Woman's Work and General Work. Methodism has mobilized her forces for united action.

Methodism now has the resources and the basic organization for undertaking unitedly the total unfinished task of evangelization in America. It need no

longer limit its efforts to the fragments of cities and fragments of counties now served by churches. Operating from existing congregations as starting points, it can now concentrate upon whole cities and whole counties and the entire country.

During recent years churches and parsonages and mission boards and societies have been largely freed from the incubus of debt. Their energies are released for new tasks. Equipped with skilled agencies of religious instruction, with great theological seminaries, with the tradition of a great ministry, with evangelical doctrines, with evangelistic fervor and great gospel songs, Methodism has the resources and the incentives to devise practical measures for bringing within reach of all the people the best interpretation of the Christian religion which Methodism has achieved. In the uniting sessions of all the Annual Conferences Methodists are praying that "we may fulfill in our time the task put into our hands to do." Surely that task must include carrying the full gospel to the poor and the underprivileged, the ushering in of a day when no lonely heart in America need feed on the husks of strange fantastic doctrines, but all may have access to the heart-warming and mind-satisfying gospel preached by Methodists.

Turning to the overseas work of our church the challenge is even more stirring and commanding. Work is being carried on by American Methodists in forty different lands. This wide distribution equips Methodism for exercising a uniting and reconciling influence upon a divided world. We rejoice at reports that in spite of turmoil and war, the constructive work of Christian missions continued, that more people are attending churches, and that schools and hospitals are serving a larger number of students and patients than ever before. We call attention to the fact that according to the latest published statistics the three uniting churches are supporting in the mission fields 1,457 missionaries of whom 373 are men, 349 are wives, and 735 are single women. This force of missionaries is working in lands where the proportion of church members to the population is as one to 130. In the face of such need, surely a church of eight million members should speedily double the number of its representatives abroad.

# COMMISSION ON TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK

By request of the Commission on Rural Work of the former Methodist Episcopal Church, South, we are presenting herewith two items for consideration and adoption:

- 1. A Financial Plan for the Small Church—This plan has been presented in printed form to most, if not all, the members of the Conference, and is available to any who desire a copy this morning. It is designed as an outline for the guidance of pastors and official boards in improving the financial programs of our smaller churches.
  - 2. A Plan for Supplementing the Salaries of Underpaid Pastors-Under

provisions of Paragraphs 816-819 of the 1939 Discipline we recommend the following:

- (a) That the North Arkansas Conference of The Methodist Church continue in principle the plan for ministerial aid adopted and used last year by the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, which plan provides that the charges which pay and the pastors who receive the better salaries contribute to a Suntentation Fund, from which the salaries of pastors receiving inadequate support shall be supplemented.
- (b) That this Sustentation Fund be raised by apportioning to pastoral charges and effective pastors the amounts equal to the following percentages of salaries paid the pastor:

- (c) That distribution of the receipts from this fund shall be made on a percentage basis to all full time supplies receiving less than \$600.00, and to all full time Conference men receiving less than \$1,000.00.
- (d) That all payments to this fund be sent regularly (monthly or quarterly) to the Conference Treasurer, who shall remit the same to the Board of Missions and Church Extension for distribution.

#### BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Recognizing the pressing claims upon our attention made by degrading literature in the form of books and periodicals, we, your Board of Christian Literature, urge our people to raise the standards of their reading. We call special attention to the wealth of Christian literature available today.

We recommend highly all our Methodist literature, especially our Church School periodicals, The World Outlook, the Nashville Christian Advocate, the Arkansas Methodist, the quarterly Religion in Life, and the books from our Cokesbury press.

The Board commends the faithful work of all our periodical editors, including the editor of our Conference paper, Dr. A. C. Millar. We urge our preachers to press the claims of Christian literature upon the people called Methodists.

We recommend the re-appointment of Dr. A. C. Millar as editor of the Arkansas Methodist; and nominate the following as Arkansas Methodist Commissioners: Rev. H. F. McDonal, Rev. W. A. Lindsey, and Hon. John G. Moore.

We ask the Conference for the assessment of \$3,400.00, to be apportioned as follows: To the salaries of Dr. Millar and his secretary, \$1,270.00; to the Depart-

ment of Town and Country Work, \$500.00, for the circulation of Christian literature. The remaining income to be designated as Arkansas Methodist funds; provided, that the necessary expenses of the Arkansas Methodist Commissioners from this Conference shall be paid from the income of the Board. The January check from the Conference Treasurer, not to exceed \$300.00, shall be turned over to the Department of Town and Country Work; the final settlement to be made at Annual Conference.

In accordance with the suggestion of the editor and commissioners of the Arkansas Methodist, we recommend that Dr. Millar be empowered to appoint a corresponding editor from each Annual Conference if and when he sees fit.

Morgan with us, presenting the work of the American Bible Society, and bringing so vividly to our minds the fact that our people can obtain the whole Bible or any part of it at such a small price that no one should be without a copy, and reminding us of the fact that the word of God will be furnished free to any person who is not able to buy it.

Therefore, be it resolved:

First: That both pastors and laymen use every effort to supply our people with the Bible, and to persuade them to read the Bible, which is the only rule, and the sufficient rule, both of faith and practice."

Second: That we observe Universal Bible Sunday on December 10th, in such way as to create a new interest in the Bible.

# CONFERENCE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

Since repeal of the eighteenth amendment the liquor traffic has become bold and aggressive through expensive advertisement in the daily and weekly press and magazines; through the use of radio advertisement the liquor traffic is seeking to promote the use of alcoholic beverages in ways that beguiles youth and womanhood of our land. When the Eighteenth Amendment was repealed we were assured that prohibition territory would be respected but this has not and is not true. One of the most pitiful results is the employment of young women in the sale of intoxicants, so that we now have bar-maids and respectable people, both

young and old, are led to patronize places where liquor is sold. Also, there is an attempt being made to convince our young people and women that drinking is necessary in high society. According to the most reliable information instead of repeal decreasing bootleg liquor it has increased the sale of such because it is cheaper and more easily obtained.

We now have a General Board of Temperance with headquarters at Washington, D. C. This Board will be glad to furnish an abundance of literature and will cooperate with the Conference Board and we recommend that our people use this literature.

In Arkansas after repeal of the 18th Amendment our legislature repealed all our old prohibition laws. Under the new law there is provision made for local option law but the conditions are so difficult to meet that communities that could and would vote liquor out are embarrassed. The liquor laws of Arkansas are probably the worst of any state because it is not only difficult to use local option laws but the liquor interest have tied up revenue with support of schools, hospitals, and the aged.

Our last general Conference recommended cooperation with the Anti-Saloon League and the Women's Christian Temperance Union, both of these being National organizations. Hitherto we have given these organizations our commendation and some support but in view of the present conditions we feel that they are entitled to fuller support.

We regret to learn of the death of Reverend J. H. Glass who for many years was Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Arkansas Under many difficulties and with feeble body during the last two years he faithfully and loyally

promoted the cause of prohibition.

We are informed that the Anti-Saloon League has elected Mr. Clyde C. Coulton Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Arkansas. He has been six years Assistant of the Mississippi League and comes highly recommended by the officials of both the Mississippi and the National League. We give him a hearty welcome, pledge him our cooperation and recommend that our Churches be open to him whenever and wherever possible. He will not begin work until January 1, 1940, at that time the Board will announce its plans and purposes.

We believe that our local option laws should be so amended that it be possible for our various communities more easily to abolish and control the traffic of intoxicants of all kinds within their bounds. While it is desirable ultimately to have complete prohibition, nevertheless, we recognize the fact that much educational work must be done and we call the attention of our preachers to provisions in discipline. Paragraph 675.

We recognize the Women's Christian Temperance Union as a great and worthy organization and recommend that our preachers and especially our women lend it greater support because it not only attacks liquor traffic but favors nearly

all worthy moral reforms.

Along with evils of liquor traffic there has been tremendous increase in both private and public gambling and betting on horse races and dog races. We urge our people to refrain from these things and urge our legislature to abolish legal gambling and betting.

We insist on importance of educating our people against participating in

evils herein named. The Methodist Church is on record against practically all these things and in our new organization we are even more fully committed to the suppression of all these evils and vices.

We recommend as our representatives on the State Anti-Saloon League Board: S. M. Yancey, Charles A. Stuck, J. M. Barnett, J. A. Gatlin, G. C. Taylor.

- 3. We recommend that the idea of evangelism be lifted up and emphasized in all of the services of the Church, and that every means and method available be used for winning souls to Jesus Christ.
- 4. We request the District Superintendent of each district to appoint a district Director of Evangelism and a committee to work with him in all of the evangelistic plans of the district.
- 5. Since there are increased enrollments in our church schools, we recommend that the church recognize this increase as a larger opportunity and a greater responsibility, and that we set as a goal an increase of ten per cent of our church membership on profession of faith.

#### BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

### 1. Hospitals:

The year ending October 31, 1939, marks the end of an epoch in the history of the Methodist Hospital of Memphis. Eighteen years of service was completed. The debt was lifted.

Plans are now in hand for the build of a one-hundred bed addition and a large office building for doctors in connection with the hospital. Tri-State Methodism will then have one of the finest hospitals in the country, capable of accommodating 300 patients and providing office space for forty or fifty doctors. This will cost \$500,000.00.

### 2. Orphanages:

The object of the Orphanage is to seek homeless orphans, to find Christian homes for them, and to give a great Christ-centered institution for the building of character.

Our group at the home runs from thirty to fifty. This past year twenty were placed out to homes. Finances are in good condition and the home has a good leadership.

### 3. Recommendations:

### A. Hospitals:

- 1. That Rev. William Sherman, Rev. Paul V. Galloway, J. Frank Fogleman (Marion), R. A. Dowdy (Batesville), Dr. C. N. Hodge (Marianna), and Mrs. Tom Tucker (Hughes), be the Trustees for the North Arkansas Conference.
  - 2. That the apportionment of \$2,500.00 be continued.
- 3. That all District Superintendents and pastors help in observing the Golden Cross Week.
- 4. That we encourage our people to go to the Methodist Hospital when they need hospitalization.

### B. Orphanages:

- 1. That Rev. F. E. Dodson, Rev. Sam B. Wiggins, and Rev. Conner Morehead be continued as Trustees of the Orphanage.
  - 2. That the apportionment of \$2,000 be continued.
  - 3. That Christmas offerings be taken in all charges.
- 4. That the Board of Christian Education again sponsor this Christmas Offering.
- 5. That all churches be given more information about our orphanages and that organizations within the churches be encouraged to send more gifts to the home.

# **MEMOIRS**

#### REV. JESSE MONROE McANALLY

Rev. Jesse Monroe McAnally was born September 2, 1858, north of Ozark, Franklin County, Arkansas. He was fortunate in being able to attend school taught by Paul Graham, from whom he received inspiration to go on with his education, which he did in college at Altus, Arkansas.

In his young manhood, he was happily converted and joined the Methodist Church. He was married to Mary Jane McWharter of Ozark, March 3, 1881. They began life together in Scott county, teaching and farming; but the divine urge was so imperative that he entered the Arkansas Conference and gave himself without reservation to the cause of the Master.

For thirty seven years, he was an active minister in the old "Arkansas," and North Arkansas Conference, serving often times very difficult places. He always supplemented his inadequate salary by other work that he could do without neglecting his charge. He began his ministry on Black Fork Mission and served later, Cauthern, Sugar Grove, Hackett, Caulksville, Charleston, East Van Buren, Roark, Scranton, Elm Springs, Prairie Grove, and Conway Circuits and others.

He traveled, for the most part, on horses and in buggy. He prized his horses, but was always ready to part with them if he could make something to aid his growing family, and help to educate his children. He was decidedly Evangelistic. A good singer and a good preacher, he always held his own meetings doing the singing and preaching.

On November 17, 1938, at the age of eighty, he slipped away after an emergency operation at Sparks Memorial Hospital, Fort Smith, Arkansas. A most fitting tribute by Dr. A. C. Millar was written: "A fine singer and revivalist, he had many conversions and added many to the membership of the church. Earnest, consecrated, faithful, tireless, he was one of the best loved and most useful preachers of his day.

His memory is green among the people whom he served. A thoroughly good man has gone to his reward."

### REV. THOMAS H. WRIGHT

Rev. Thomas H. Wright, 64 years old, died suddenly on June 2, 1939, at his home in Gravette, Arkansas, of heart attack.

He was born August 7, 1874, at Church Hill, in Hawkins County, Tenn. At the age of eight years, he moved with his parents to Arkansas, near Morrilton, and lived there until he was 22 years of age. At that age in 1896, he was licensed to preach and entered the itinerate ministry serving charges as a supply at first

and later as a Local Elder until 1925 when he was admitted into full connection in the North Arkansas Conference.

On February 8, 1903, he was married to Jennie Harkey at Morgantown, Arkansas.

From the year of 1896 to the time of his superannuation in 1935 he served the following charges most of which were circuits: St. Paul Mission, Brightwater, Sunny Side Circuit, Tuckerman Circuit, Mountain View, Morgantown, Martinville, Beech Grove, East Side Paragould Circuit, Sulphur Rock and Moorefield, Harrisburg Circuit, Colt, Haynes and Lexa, Widener and Madison, Cotter, Salem, Gravette and Decatur, Elm Springs, and Lincoln. It was while he was serving Lincoln in 1935 that he took the superannuate relation and moved to his home in Gravette, Arkansas.

Bro. Wright was a good student of the Bible and was always glad to impart his knowledge to others. Even in the years of his Superannuation he did not cease his study of the Bible and always invited an opporttunity to serve others through the Church until his death. He preached, when called upon, was teacher of the Men's Bible Class at the time of his death. He had led in Prayer Meeting many times, taught the "Life of Christ," a course for which he was accredited and he was to finish a Bible Course for the ladies of the Missionary Society the evening of his passing. He liked for his pastor to lean on him.

Besides his widow, he is survived by one brother, John H. Wright of Red-

field, Arkansas, and one sister, Sallie Wright of Dover, Arkansas.

Funeral services were conducted at the Methodist Church Monday morning at 90'clock, by Rev. W. V. Womack, Presiding Elder of the Fayetteville District, and Rev. Porter Weaver, Pastor of the local church. Rev. James Workman, Fayetteville; Rev. Glenn F. Sanford, Bentonville; Rev. Irl Bridenthal, Gentry; Rev. W. R. Dalton, Siloam Springs; and Rev. Rider, Sulphur Springs, each gave short talks in tribute to Bro. Wright.

### REV. HENRY HANESWORTH

Rev. Henry Hanesworth was born in Hull, England, November 18, 1847. When he was a small boy the family moved to London, where he spent his boyhood days and obtained his education. Early in life he joined the Methodist Church, the church of his parents. The Hanesworth family was the first family to join the Methodist movement in Hull, England. At the age of seventeen he was licensed to preach in the Methodist Church and as a boy preacher, preached on the streets of London. When he was just 15 years of age his father died, leaving him the responsibility of a widowed mother and three younger children. He discharged this responsibility, carrying the load until he was 25 years of age. Then he came to America, his mother planning to follow him, but the following year she died. On his arrival in America, he went to Nashville, Tennessee, the headquarters of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Remaniing there but a short time he went on into Missouri, where he joined the St. Louis Conference

and served for about a quarter of a century, filling such responsible positions as St. Louis District, Charleston District, Farmington District as Presiding Elder, and New Madrid, Poplar Bluff and Kirkwood, St. Louis, as pastor. He served as Secretary of the St. Louis Conference for many years. In November, 1896, he transferred to the old Arkansas, now the North Arkansas, Conference and was stationed at Fayetteville, succeeding Dr. James A. Anderson, where he remained for four years, building the present Methodist Church in that city. At the end of his pastorate there he was appointed to the Fort Smith District as Presiding Elder, where he served for a quadrennium. He then served such pastoral charges as Bentonville, Clarksville, Paris, Dardanelle, and in 1915 he was sent to Augusta where he served for four years. Then after serving Cabot and Newark he was sent to Bethesda in the Batesville District where he remained for two years and then at the conference held in Paragould, 1926, he took the Superannuate relation and moved back to Augusta where he made his home until called to his home on high. He served very efficiently as Secretary of the Arkansas Conference from November, 1899, to November, 1912, when the Arkansas and White River Conferences united. After coming to Missouri, he was married to Miss Mary Ann Scott, who died in 1884, leaving three children: May, now Mrs. S. P. Knox of Augusta; Harry R. Hanesworth of Detroit, Mich.; and Lucille, now Mrs. Lucille Bartman of St. Louis, Mo. March 31, 1888, he married Miss Beulah Staats of St. Louis, Mo., and to this union one son, Stanley, was born. At 2:30 p. m. Wednesday, March 8, 1939, this "Wayworn Traveler, "old and stricken in years," rested from his labors, and "his work will follow him." The funeral service was held in the Methodist Church at Augusta, by Rev. William Sherman, pastor, assisted by Dr. James A. Anderson, Rev. G. W. Pyles and Rev. O. L. Cole, a number of his ministerial brethren attending the service. Then his body was laid to rest in the cemetery at Augusta.

From young womanhood, her life has been lived as a consistent Christian. Neighbors and business associates respected her judgment and admired the fine art with which she reared her children. She has made a distinct contribution to the church. to see how she gathered her family around her as a tower of strength and never once did she falter even when sorrow overwhelmed her.
