ONE HUNDRED-SEVENTH SESSION OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH

FIRST DAY

The One Hundred-Seventh Session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference of The Methodist Church met at the First Methodist Church in Batesville, Arkansas, at 8:00 p. m., November 4, 1942, with Bishop Charles C. Selecman presiding.

Using The Methodist Hymnal the Conference sang Hymn No. 402, "And Are We Yet Alive." Bishop Selection led the Conference in the Responsive Reading "The Armor of God" and Dr. E. W. Potter led in prayer. Hymn No. 520, "Abide With Me," was sung. Bishop Selection addressed the Conference concerning The Church in the Present Emergency.

Benjamin C. Few was elected Secretary.

On nomination by the Secretary, James S. Upton, Ewing T. Wayland and Mrs. Lamar C. Ratcliffe were elected Journal Secretaries and Earle Cravens was elected Personnel Secretary.

The Secretary nominated Joe A. Goetz as Statistician and he was elected, as were the following District Auditors: J. H. Hoggard, J. J. Clark, E. J. Holifield, H. J. Couchman, Luther K. Wilson, Floyd G. Villines, Jr., Martin Bierbaum, J. M. Barnett, L. F. LaFevers, Raymond Dorman, A. W. Harris, Raymond L. Franks, R. E. L. Bearden, Jr., J. F. Glover and S. O. Patty.

The Secretary distributed attendance cards for the convenience of the members in registering their presence. A check of these registrations showed the attendance of 180 clerical members, 83 lay delegates, two Deaconesses and 32 Accepted Supply Pastors.

The auditorium of the church forward of the pillars was made the bar of the Conference.

Question No. 9 (1*) was called: What are the reports of the District Superintendents as to the status of the work within their Districts?

W. V. Womack, Secretary of the Cabinet read the following report:

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

Out of a year of many complications we bring the following report: World conditions have made work very difficult in some directions. But in the midst of all the problems there has been the assurance that God has been in our lives as we have tried to go forward with his work. Our Conference has furnished two to the chaplaincy of the army and navythis year and others are getting ready for this work. Two of our active pastors have died during the year, Rev. F. E. Dodson and Rev. J. W. Johnston. Death has claimed the comnapions of two of our pastors—Mrs. Horace M. Lewis and Mrs. E. H. Hook.

There have been added to the membership of the Church 6,072 this year, 2,950 on profession of faith and 3,122 by certificate and otherwise.

There have been ten new churches built during the year. Twenty churches have been dedicated. They are at Hartman, Midland, Central Avenue in Batesville, Viola, Mt. Tabor, Cleveland, Gardner Memorial in North Little Rock, Beech Grove, Cache Lake, Elnora, Piggott Walnut Ridge, Bald Knob and Russell.

Church indebtedness has been reduced by the payment of \$64,656. The payment on Benevolences has totaled \$56,277, on District Superintendents' salary fund \$37,391 and pastors' salaries \$276,035.

The Church School enrollment this year is 63,655. The Conference has paid on Church School Rally Day fund \$2,989, and there have been 5,996 enrolled in Vacation Bible Schools.

The Women have 266 Societies of Christian Service with a membership of 10,208.

Sam B. Wiggins, Superintendent of the Fayetteville District, stated that every church debt had been paid in the Fayetteville District this year except \$100 on the Berryville church where plans had been disrupted by a tornado which had destroyed vast property, killed 28 people and injured a large number.

At the invitation of Bishop Selecman, H. A. Stroup, pastor at Berryville, told of the tragedy as it touched the Church in suffering and in the opportunity to serve the community.

At the suggestion of H. H. Griffin, an offering was made by the Conference to pay the debt of \$100 on the Berryville church. On motion of Sewell B. Wilford the Conference voted to direct any part of the offering in excess of \$100, to be paid to H. A. Stroup to be used in relief of distress among the victims of the storm. The offering amounted to \$168.61.

Dr. F. W. Mueller, representing the General Board of Missions and Church Extension, was introduced and spoke in the interest of that cause.

As a matter of special privilege, Sewell B. Wilford called Dr. Eugene W. Potter to the chancel and on behalf of the Preachers in the Jonesboro District presented to Dr. and Mrs. Potter a war bond for \$100 as a token of love and appreciation to mark the bond of their fellowship in the six-year tenure of Dr. Potter as Superintendent of the District. Dr. Potter spoke tenderly of the bonds of work in this association.

Sam M. Yancey, Superintendent of the Western Methodist Assembly at Mt. Sequoyah, spoke on the Assembly.

The following resolution was read by W. V. Womack, Secretary of the Cabinet and adopted by the Conference:

RESOLUTION

Whereas, the emergency of the war is calling a number of our pastors to the chaplaincy in both the Army and the Navy, thus necessitating filling ad-interim vacancies while at the same time giving us concern as to the ultimate problem of the re-appointment of chaplains when they return, therefore be it

Resolved, That we assure the men who are nobly volunteering their services for the chaplaincy that they go with our sincere approval and our earnest prayers to the vital task of giving spiritual service to the men in uniform; that we assure them that when they return we shall use every effort to place them in appointments in keeping with the type and grade of charges which they relinquished, it being understood, of course, that this assurance may be modified by the financial situation of the country at the close of the war. Be it further

Resolved, That we affirm it as our conviction that all our preachers should accept it as a duty which the claims of the historic brotherhood of our itinerant ministry impose upon us that we shall readily accept necessary adjustments in appointments so as not to penalize any man who has answered the call of duty and service with our men in uniform.

We further express the opinion that when unusual promotions may come to preachers because of vacancies due to the call to the chaplaincy that the men thus promoted should fully understand that at the end of the emergency, adjustments must be made which may mean a reduction for some in the grade of appointment held, and

Finally, we would point out that we can not make good on the assurance given those who enter the chaplaincy unless our churches loyally cooperate with the appointing power, and we therefore request our laity to give every assistance to our Bishop and District Superintendents to this end.

The following telegram was read by Bishop Selecman:

Bishop Charles C. Selecman Methodist Church, Batesville, Ark.

Please remind North Arkansas Conference that the plan sponsored by the Council of Bishops for the Fellowship of Suffering and Service included not only Worldwide Communion Sunday but Sharing all Communion Offerings throughout the year. Needs of Overseas Relief and Camp Service both pressing. Also four hundred additional Methodist Chaplains called for by Army and Navy this year. Greetings.

The Conference adjourned with the Benediction pronounced by Dr. Starkey.

SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION

The Conference met at 8:30 a. m. with Bishop Selecman presiding. The Hymn No. 245 "O Sometimes The Shadows Are Deep" was sung. Bishop Selecman led the Conference in the Responsive Reading "God Strengthens The Heart" after which J. M. Hughey led in prayer. The Hymn No. 268 "Are Ye Able" was sung.

The minutes of the previous session were read and after minor corrections were appproved.

The Order of The Day for hearing the report of the Board of Education was changed from Thursday 10:30 a.m. until 11:00 a.m.

The Order of the Day for voting on two proposed Constitutional Amendments was set at 10:30 a.m. Thursday.

By vote of the Conference the District Superintendents were given the authority to grant leaves of absences to the men of their respective Districts.

Question No. 10 (2) was called: Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration? The names of all the active preachers excepting H. J. Harger and W. B. Shultz, were called and their character passed.

Question No. 14 (6) was called: Who have withdrawn or been expelled? H. Lynn Wade, District Superintendent of the Paragould District announced that Harold J. Harger had surrendered his credentials and had withdrawn from the ministry and membership in The Methodist Church under charges of unministerial and immoral conducts.

Question No. 12 (4) was called: Who are discontinued?

R. S. Hayden, District Superintendent of the Conway District, presented the name of Wilson B. Shultz, and announced that he had discontinued the work of a Preacher on trial in the traveling connection and that the case had been dealt with according to the requirements of the Discipline for a member on trial.

Dr. John Q. Schisler, representing The Methodist Publishing House, presented to the Board of Conference Claimants a check for \$1,566.87 as the share of this Conference in an appropriation of \$200,000 out of the profits of the Publishing House to the Retired Ministers.

Question No. 10 (2) was resumed.

The names of all the retired Preachers were called and their character passed.

A letter from E. K. Sewell and a telegram from James B. Evans were read by the Secretary.

The Conference voted to send a wire of affectionate greeting and sympathy to W. T. Martin who was reported to be in a hospital in a serious condition as a result of an accident. Dr. O. E. Goddard announced that the offering to be made at the evening service would be used to apply on hospital and other expense made necessary by the injury.

Sam Wiggins reported on the health of all the retired Preachers in the Fayetteville District who were not present at the session, and brought greetings from them.

Bishop Selecman led the Conference in singing "I Love to Tell The Story" and called on James W. Workman to lead a prayer of thanksgiving for the life and service of the retired Preachers and a petition for their well being.

- W. V. Womack, Secretary of the Cabinet, nominated the following Committee on District Conference Journals which was elected: W. W. Allbright, Brady Cook, W. A. Downum, Hubert E. Pearce, John G. Gieck, Lloyd Conyers, J. Kenneth Shamblin and Jesse Lee Johnston.
- J. W. Workman introduced Morris F. Dodson as the representative of The Methodist Publishing House.

The Order of the Day was to consider proposed Constitutional Amendments. Bishop Selecman asked the Secretary to read proposed Amendment No. 1. Dr. A. W. Martin, Dr. James A. Anderson, Dr. J. W. Workman, Paul V. Galloway, J. J. Galloway, and Dr. A. G. Henderson spoke concerning the proposed amendment.

The total vote cast was 149. Aye, 73; No, 76.

The Secretary read the proposed Constitutional Amendment No. 2. Bishop Selection made a brief statement concerning the nature of the proposed amendment. The vote showed 148 affirmative votes and no negative votes were cast.

The Order of the Day having arrived for hearing the report of the Board of Education, Harry King read the report.

A. W. Martin was asked to assume the chair.

Dr. J. Q. Schisler, representing the General Board of Education, Division of The Local Church, and Ira Brumley, Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education spoke to the report. Earle Cravens, newly elected chairman of the Conference Board of Education, was introduced, and he spoke briefly concerning the future work of the Board. The report was adopted.

James T. Randle, one of the host pastors, introduced F. W. Langham, of the American Bible Society, and the following ministers of the city of Batesville: Dr. W. D. Edward of First Baptist Church, Dr. J. S. Sleeper of The Presbyterian Church; Rev. C. P. Lewis, St. Paul's Episcopal Church; and Rev. Clarence Cutral, West Batesville Baptist Church.

F. W. Langham spoke in the interest of the American Bible Society. Bishop Selecman resumed the chair.

E. J. Reeves from the East Oklahoma Conference was introduced.

After various announcements were made, the time for adjournment was extended in order to hear Dr. H. W. McPherson, Secretary of Division of Educational Institutions, General Board of Education. Dr. McPherson was introduced and he addressed the Conference in the interest of the Educational program of the Church.

The Conference adjourned with singing of the doxology, and the benediction pronounced by Dr. McPherson.

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION

The Conference met at 8:30 a.m. with Bishop Selecman presiding.

Hymns No. 245, "O Sometimes The Shadows Are Deep" and No. 533, "O, God, Our Help," were sung. Bishop Selecman led the Conference in two responsive readings, "The Way of Holiness" and "Prince of Peace." Dr. Charles Nixon, Superintendent of the Muskogee District of the East Oklahoma Conference, led in prayer. The Conference sang Hymn No. 514, "Lead Kindly Light."

Chaplain Lyman T. Barger of Camp Gruber, Oklahoma, was introduced by Bishop Selecman and he spoke to the Conference concerning his work as a chaplain.

The Minutes of the preceding session were read and approved.

Question No. 19 (11) was called: Who are admitted on Trial?

Jesse Lee Johnson, recommended by the Batesville District Conference, James Ralph Hillis, Thomas C. Huff and Alfred A. Eason, recommended by the Conway District Conference, James Ransford Chandler, recommended by the Fort Smith District Conference, Harold D. Womack and Charles W. Lewis, recommended by the Jonesboro District Conference, and Byron C. Cravens, recommended by the Helena District Conference, and having the recommendation of the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications, were admitted on trial by vote of the Conference.

Question No. 25 (17) was called: Who are admitted into Full Connec-

Donaghey W. Duran, LeRoy Henry, and Ewing T. Wayland, having the recommendation of the Committee on Ministerial Qualifications and Ministerial Qualifications, and meeting all other disciplinary requirements, were called to the chancel and addressed by Bishop Selecman on the call and life of the Christian ministry. They were asked disciplinary questions which they answered satisfactorily and were admitted into Full Connection by vote of the Conference.

The order of the day was hearing the report of the Board of Missions and Church Extension. Jefferson Sherman read the report. Mrs. R. E. Connell was presented by Bishop Selecman and she gave a report as President of the Conference organization of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, stressing the relationship between the Board of Missions and Church Extension and the Woman's Society of Christian Service. A. W. Martin and W. P. Whaley spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

Mrs. Nell Naylor, Winslow, a returned missionary from India, was introduced, and she spoke of her work in India.

E. C. Nash, Business Manager of the "Christian Advocate," was intro-

duced to the Conference, and he spoke in the interest of the "Christian Advocate."

The Hymn "Saviour More Than Life To Me" was sung.

The order of the day having arrived for hearing the report of the Board of World Service and Finance, H. M. Lewis read the report. James W. Workman, represented the General Board of Lay Activities. E. W. Martin, Conference Lay Leader, and Bishop Selecman spoke to the report.

The report was amended and adopted.

The Conference voted that when it adjourned it be to meet at 2:30 p. m.

The Conference adjourned with the benediction pronounced by Dr. O.
E. Rice.

THIRD DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION

The Conference met at 2:00 p. m. with Bishop Selecman presiding.

The Hymn "I Need Thee Every Hour" was sung and Charles Franklin led in prayer. The Hymn "I Am So Glad That Jesus Loves Me" was sung.

The Minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

Question No. 19 (11) was resumed.

H. Masters, and James Clarence Wilcox, recommended by the Batesville Conference, having met the disciplinary requirements were received on trial by vote of the Conference.

Question No. 25 (17) was resumed.

Virgil Glenn Hanks having been recommended by the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications, and meeting other disciplinary qualifications was called to chancel, where he answered satisfactorily the disciplinary questions, and was received into full connection by vote of the Conference.

Question No. 23 (15) was called: Who have completed their studies?

- (a) In the class of the first year: Floyd G. Villines, Jr., Pharis Holifield, William Glen Brunner, Robert Lee Main had finished their studies and were advanced to the class of the second year.
- (b) In the class of the second year: LeRoy Henry, Virgil G. Hanks, Donaghey W. Duran, Ewing Tatum Wayland had finished their studies and were advanced to the class of the third year.
- (c) In the class of the third year: J. Kenneth Shamblin, Joe William Watson had finished their studies and were advanced to the class of the fourth year.
- (d) In the class of the fourth year: Alfred Knox had finished his studies of the fourth year.

Question No. 24 (16) was called: Who are continued in their studies? T. Poe Williams, a student in Southern Methodist University, was continued in the Studies of the First Year.

O. D. Peters and Wilmer Earl DuBois were continued in the Studies of the Third Year.

Marvin A. Cherry was continued in the Studies of the Fourth Year.

Question No. 26 (18) was called: What Traveling Preachers and what Local Preachers have been elected Deacons?

Virgil G. Hanks and LeRoy Henry, James Ralph Hillis, Alfred A. Eason, James R. Chandler, Traveling Preachers, and Wlliam W. Warrington, a Local Preacher, were elected Deacons.

Question No. 27 (20) was called: What Traveling Preachers and what Local Preachers are elected Elders?

Ewing T. Wayland and John Kenneth Shamblin were elected Elders.

Bishop Selecman appointed R. E. L. Bearden, W. P. Whaley and Charles Franklin sponsors for the Deacons-elect and Dr. E. K. Means, Dr. James A. Anderson, and J. M. Hughey sponsors for the Elders-elect and directed the sponsors to meet with the classes in quiet devotion for spiritual preparation for the ordination for a half-hour immediately before the evening service.

The report of the Committee on Objectives was read and adopted.

The Conference voted to request E. T. Wayland, Editor, to have the report of the Committee on Objectives published in the next issue of the Arkansas Methodist.

The Sub-Committee of the Conference Planning Committee, to whom was referred the matter of Time, Place and Duration of the Annual Conference the following report which was adopted:

"We recommend:-

- "1. That we continue to seek entertainment for the Conference in the various towns and cities of our Conference, according to the present plan;
- "2. That we continue the present plan of opening the Conference on Wednesday evening and closing Sunday afternoon;
- "3. That the time for holding the Conference be the first week in November."
- J. M. Harrison read the report of the Board of Temperance. Clyde C. Coulter, Superintendent of the Arkansas Anti-Saloon League and Sam Yancey spoke to the report. An offering of \$163 was taken for the Anti-Saloon League. The report was adopted.
- J. W. Moore, colored, Pastor of the Wesley Chapel in Little Rock, spoke in the interest of the Harry Hoozier Memorial enterprise. An offering for this cause amounting to \$43.18 was made.
- Dr. Harris, President of Philander Smith College, Little Rock, was introduced and made a brief statement concerning the work of the college. A sextette of student singers rendered several numbers.

Adjournment was taken for the preaching hour.

THIRD DAY—EVENING SESSION

The Conference met at 8:00 p. m., for the ordination of Deacons and Elders.

Hymn No. 256, "Faith of Our Fathers" was sung. Dr. Jas. A. Anderson led in prayer. The Conference sang Hymn No. 249, "I Love To Tell The Story."

Bishop Selecman addressed the Conference on the Calling and Life of the Christian Ministry.

Having been elected Deacons at an earlier session Virgil G. Hanks, LeRoy Henry, James R. Hillis, Alfred A. Eason, James R. Chandler, and William W. Warrington were presented by R. E. L. Bearden for ordination. These were ordained deacons by Bishop Selectman with the assistance of the District Superintendents.

Ewing T. Wayland and John Kenneth Shamblin were presented by Dr. E. K. Means for ordination as Elders, following their election to that office in an earlier session of the Conference. These were ordained Elders by Bishop Selecman who had the assistance fo the District Superintendents and E. T. Wayland in the service.

The Conference sang Hymn No. 278, "Lead On O King Eternal," and adjourned with the benediction by Dr. E. K. Means.

FOURTH DAY-MORNING SESSION

The Conference met at 8:30 with Bishop Selecman presiding.

The Hymn No. 213, "My Faith Looks Up To Thee," and No. 244, "My Hope Is Built On Nothing Less," were sung. Bishop Selectman led the Conference in the first and second readings of "Church Anniversary," after which R. E. L. Beraden led in prayer. The Hymn 284, "Near The Cross," was sung.

Mr. Joe A. Goetz read the report of The Board of Lay Activities. The report was adopted.

Question No. 17 (9) was called: Who are retired?

The names of R. A. Robertson and L. E. Mann were referred to the committee of Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications for retirement.

The Conference voted to authorize the Secretary to secure a personnel record of the preachers of the Conference to perfect the Service Record of the Preachers.

The Conference voted to request that the appointments be read at the close of the morning worship service of Sunday.

Question No. 32 was called: Where shall the next ssesion of the Annual Conference be held?

On the invitation of E. B. Williams, representing the Church of the City of Russellvllie, the Conference voted to meet in Russellville, Arkansas, for its next session.

The Conference voted to refer to the Cabinet for study and recommendation the proposal that the fiscal year of the Conference be made to coincide with the fiscal year of the General Commission on World Service and Finance.

At the request of Bishop Selecman, Dr. A. W. Martin took the chair.

R. E. L. Bearden, Jr., read the report of the Board of Hospitals and Homes. Paul V. Galloway and Sam B. Wiggins spoke ot the report. The report was adopted.

The Memorial Session being the order of the day, Dr. Martin yielded the chair to Everett W. Faulkner, Chairman of the Committee on Memoirs.

Question No. 11 (3) was called: What Preachers have died during the year?

Jason W. Moore read the names of the preachers who had died during the year: J. F. Jernigan, F. E. Dodson, W. C. Davidson, J. W. Johnston, and J. F. Carter; and of Mrs. Birdie Blackwell, Mrs. John P. Wheeler, Mrs. Alice Eleanor Dixon Noe, Mrs. F. S. F. Johnston, Mrs. Anna Martin Lewis, and Mrs. E. H. Hook, wives of preachers, who had died during the year, and of Mrs. Mary Bell Wallis, wife of a preacher, who had died the previous year but whose memoirs had not been available for the memorial session at the last Conference. It was stated that memoirs will appear in the Annual Conference Journal.

Hymn No. 521, "It Singeth Low," was sung. R. E. L. Beraden led in prayer of thanksgiving and appreciation for the lives of those who had died. The Responsvie Reading for Memorial Services was led by E. W. Faulkner. Hymn No. 204, "Rock of Ages," was sung. Dr. James A. Anderson preached a memorial sermon. The Conference sang Hymn No. 362, "Nearer My God to Thee." The service was concluded with a prayer led by Bishop Selecman.

Bishop Selecman resumed the chair.

Question No. 36 (29) was called: What is the report of the Conference Statatician?

Joe A. Goetz read the report of the Conference Statistician, which was filed for the record.

Anna Martin Lewis, daughter of the host pastor, was introduced to the Conference.

As the order of the day, J. A. Gatlin read the report of The Town and Country Commission. I. L. Claud made a brief statement concerning the sustentation fund. Glenn Sanford, executive secretary of the Town and Country Commission, Miss Estelle McIntosh, Deaconess of Scott County, Man Viele Nethern Product Description of Vell Country and Country Lohn Mrs. Viola Nethery Beadles, Deaconess of Yell County, and Grover Johnson, spoke to the report. J. A. Gatlin, Judge J. G. Moore, Dr. James A. Anderson, A. W. Martin, Irl Bridenthal, and Bishop Selecman, spoke concerning the importance of rural work. The report was adopted.

Conference voted to adjourn to meet at 2:00 p. m.

After various announcements the benediction was pronounced by J. J. Galloway.

FOURTH DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION

The Conference met at 2:00 p. m., with Bishop Selecman presiding. Hymn No. 233, "Jesus Calls Us," was sung. R. E. Connell led in prayer. Guy Murphy, Conference Treasurer, read the report of the Treasurer

and the report was filed for record.

The report of the Commission on World Peace was read and adopted. The report of the Committee on American Bible Society was read and adopted.

Report No. 2 of the Board of Education was read and adopted. Allen D. Stewart read the apportionments of the Commission on World Service and Finance, which had not been available when the report of that Commission had been read at an earlier session.

Question No. 3 was called: What officers handling funds of the Conference have been bonded, and in what amounts?

The answer was: Guy Murphy, Conference Treasurer, \$25,000; E. Wainright Martin, Tresaurer of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, \$10,000; E. H. Hook, Treasurer of the Board of Conference Claimants, \$10,000; C. D. Metcalf, Treasurer of the Board of Education, \$10,000; H. F. McDonal, Treasurer of the Board of Christian Literature, \$2,000; Joe A. Goetz, Treasurer of the Board of Lay Activities, \$2,000; J. F. Fogleman, Treasurer of the Board of Hospitals and Homes, \$2,000.

The Conference voted to increase from \$100 to \$200 the sum to be paid to each preacher at the time of his retirement .

Report No. 1 of the Board of Conference Claimants was read and adopted.

The Conference voted to direct the Conference Treasurer to file his report not later than 8:00 o'clock on Friday morning of the Conference session and to make his remittance to the Board of Conference Claimants at that time in order to make it possible to make apportionments to the Conference Claimants during the session of the Conference,

James T. Randle read the report of the Commission on Evangelism. Dr. O. E. Goddard spoke to the report. At the request of Bishop Selecman, Paul V. Galloway told of his work in outdoor evangelistic services in which he employed a public address system mounted on a trailer. The report was

The following resolution was adopted.

RESOLUTION

We, realizing the evils of gambling and the additional evil, added by horse and dog racing legalized by the State do request the State Legislature to repeal all laws or parts of laws allowing dog and horse racing in the State. (Signed)

Question No. 4 was called: Are the records of the Secretary, Treasurer and Statistician kept according to the forms prescribed by the laws of the Church?

The answer was yes.

Question No. 5 was called: Is this Annual Conference incorporated? It is not.

Question No. 6 was called: What date is determined for White Cross and Golden Cross enrollment?

May 9 (Week of May 2-9).

Question No. 7 was called: What is the schedule for Minimum Support for Pastors?

The minimum salary set for Traveling Preachers is \$1,000; for Accepted Supply Pastors, \$800; with Sustentation Fund administered by the Board of Missions and Church Extension.

Question No. 8 was called: What method is approved to provide for the salary of the District Superintendents?

An apportionment of a sum equal to 14 per cent of the amount paid the pastor is asked of every Pastoral Charge; the fund administered by the Conference Treasurer; each District Superintendent to receive \$4,200 the year, paid in equal monthly amounts.

The Conference elected the following Committee on Memorials: H. L. Wade, Sam B. Wiggins, A. W. Martin, W. Henry Goodloe, E. Wainright Martin and Mrs. R. E. Connell.

The report of the Committee on District Conference Journals was read and filed, showing all the District Conference Journals in excellent shape.

The report of the Committee on Accepted Supply Pastors was read and adopted.

A. W. O'Bryant, Accepted Supply Pastor at Plainview, was introduced as having four sons and two sons-in-law already in the armed forces of the nation and he was asked to make a statement about his family in relation to the war. He stated that two of his daughters are registered nurses and expect to enter the service soon and that yet another son will be drafted into the army after the minimum age limit is lowered to 18 years.

Bishop Selecman asked all members of the Conference who had members of their families in the armed service to stand. A large number stood, and two stanzas of the hymn "America" were sung. J. J. Galloway led the Conference in a prayer for all these soldiers, sailors, marines, nurses and chaplains in the camps and armed organizations of the nation.

On motion concerning the need for additional Pastors, which might claim for the pastorate those members of the Conference normally assigned to Special Appointments, the Conference voted to request the Bishop in charge to appoint to special posts only those men whose selection had the approval of the Cabinet.

The Conference voted to request Bishop Selecman to read the Appointments immediately following the preaching service Sunday.

Adjournment was taken with the benediction pronounced by Bishop Selecman.

FIFTH DAY

The Conference met at 10:30 a.m., for worship with a sermon by Bishop Selecman. The host pastor, Horace M. Lewis, was assisted in the Methodist order of worship by the combined choirs of First Church and Central Avenue Church and by the District Superintendents. Bishop Selecman delivered a sermon on "The Kingdom of God," using the text, "Thy kingdom come," and invoking the gospel of Christ as a moral substitute for war in stimulation to alert and abundant living.

The Conference voted to make the First National Bank of Fort Smith the official depository for funds of the Board of Conference Claimants.

Edward W. Harris was made af member of the Board of Missions in the place of J. A. Gatlin.

Earl S. Walker and Kenneth Shamblin were made members of the Commission on World Service and Finance in the places of Cecil Culver and E. B. Williams.

- (2) That each and every Church and Charge in our Conference pay into the District Superintendents' Fund an amount equal to fourteen per cent (14%) of the Pastor's salary paid by that Church or that Charge; and that each Pastor or Church Treasurer remit these funds to the District Superintendent prior to the 10th of each month; and that the District Superintendent remit promptly to the Conference Treasurer, who shall pay the salaries of the District Superintendents.
- (3) That our Conference Treasurer be authorized and instructed to pay to the District Superintendents their salaries monthly, and, if necessary, to borrow funds with which to do this, provided the principal amount borrowed shall not exceed the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00), and that all moneys borrowed and the interest thereon shall be repaid within the Conference Year.

Part V

We recommend:

- (1) That the First National Bank of Fort Smith, Arkansas, be designated as the depository for Conference Funds.
- (2) That the Citizens Bank and Trust Company of Batesville, Arkansas, be designated as the temporary depository for Conference Funds during the sessions of the Annual Conference.
- (3) That the First National Bank of Ft. Smith, Arkansas, be designated as the depository for the funds of the Board of Conference Claimants.
- (4) That the First National Bank of Conway, Arkansas, be designated as the depository for the funds of the Board of Missions and Church Extension.
- (5) That the Citizens Bank and Trust Company of Batesville, Arkansas, be designated as the depository for the funds of the Board of Education.

Part VI

We recommend:

- (1) That our Treasurer, before dividing any funds, shall pay:
 - 1. Not to exceed \$800.00 for the printing of the Minutes;
 - 2. Not to exceed \$75.00 for statistical help;
 - Not to exceed \$75.00 for the auditing of the books of the Conference and Board Treasurers;
 - 4. Not to exceed \$25.00 to Guy Murphy for statistical help.

Part VII

We recommend:

(1) That R. J. Rice be elected as a member of the Commission on World Service and Finance to take the place left vacant by the death of Joe M. Gray.

Part VIII

We recommend:

(1) That the Town and Country Commission work out a set of percentages for the Sustentation Fund which shall produce a sum not less than the amount paid this year for said Fund and that said percentages be in conformity with the provisions of Paragraph 559 of 1940 Discipline;

(2) And that the new percentages shall be reported to the 1943 session of our Conference and used thereafter as a basis for the payment of Sustentation Funds.

Part IX

We commend:

Our District Superintendents and Pastors and Officials and People for the excellent work they have done this year in taking care of the financial interests of Methodism in our Conference.

TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

The commission recommends the following:

1. That, for members of the Conference, the computing of the Sustentation Fund be made on a standard salary of \$1,000.00 or less provided that no account be taken of deficits under \$600.00.

of our Foreign Mission territory by the military forces of the enemy together with the necessary withdrawal of most if not all of our missionaries from Japan, Korea, occupied areas of China, Burma, Philippines, and Malay states, these factors and many others growing out of the war situation, combine to lay upon the heart and mind of the Methodist Church in America the heaviest responsibility it has ever faced.

Our prayer is that we as pastors and laymen may meet and carry these responsibilities as good soliders of him who said, "Go ye into all the world

and make disciples of every nation."

We rejoice in the increased giving to world service. We sincerely hope that our people will respond generously and sacrifically to the week of Dedication offering.

We rejoice also in the large number of churches which have paid debts

against property this year.

Dr. F. W. Mueller of the General Board met with our Conference Board and rendered invaluable assistance in our deliberations.

## Woman's Society of Christian Service

The Board rejoices in the success of the 1942 February Special for Hendrix College and Ministerial Education, which you have noted from our treasurer's report, exceeded its goal by approximately \$3,000.00.

Since the financial needs of both Hendrix College and Ministerial Education will be as vital next year as they have been this year, we recommend that, in addition to the present Conference budget allocation by its commission on World Service and Finance, each of the two Conferences make provisions for the continuation of this Special in February, 1943, with a minimum goal of \$8,000.00 per Conference, to be divided on the basis of \$5,000.00 for the college and \$3,000.00 for Mniisterial Education.

For the promotion of this Special we recommend:

- 1. That each annual Conference provide for a conference directing commission composed of the chairman and executive secretary of its board of education, together with a representative district superintendent, a representative pastor, a representative layman, a representative young person, and a representative member of the Woman's Society of Christian Service to be elected by the Conference upon nomination of the Board of Education.
  - 2. That each annual Conference commission elect a director.
- 3. That the two commissions constitute a joint commission to coordinate the cultivation program throughout the state.
- 4. That this February Special be given large emphasis in such setup meetings or planning conferences, as may be held in each district, following the annual conferences.
- 5. That on the second Sunday in February the causes represented in this Special be presented to each charge, pastors exchanging pulpits when practicable and using alumni and lay speakers where needed; that collections be taken on the third Sunday; that the proceeds of the collection be reported to the treasurer of the fund in each conference not later than Monday following the fourth Sunday.

- 6. We wish to express sincere appreciation of the support which Bishop Selecman has given to this cause, and recommend that he be requested to again give us a portion of his time in February, 1943.
- 7. That the following be the Directing Committee chosen as members from the North Arkansas Conference: R. S. Hayden, W. Henry Goodloe, Earle Cravens, Ira A. Brumley, Mrs. R. E. Connell, J. G. Moore, and Alvin Murray.

We also recommend that a special effort be extended to secure a fine student body for the coming year as this is vital to the continuation of the good work of the College.

## BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

Since the report of the Conference Board of Temperance last year gave the plan of the Genreal Board of Temperance of the entire Church for definite activities in legislation and education, we reaffirm that Conference report, and add:

We rejoice that Initiated Act No. 1 seems to have carried in Arkansas. This has been done through a continuous process through six years, thus indicating what education and work will do. Now since we may initiate a local option bill by securing only 15 per cent of the legal voters we should go forward and clean up a large part of Arkansas by voting out legalized intoxicants. To do this we would urge that each pastor, with the aid of his people observe World Temperance Sunday. That each church appoint a temperanc ecommittee, observe regularly, quarterly temperance lessons and distribute temperance literature as much as possible. In this way we may use printed matter as an educational force, for temperance is promoted by education and understanding. We suggest that this is no time to rest on our oars or to sit at ease, but we should go forward against the sale and use of liquor, one of the worst enemies to the welfare of humanity.

Since we are advancing against the sale and use of strong drink let us also oppose its accompanying evils, namely: gambling, immorality as it concerns social purity. Especially is this now urgent in many communities where soldier camps and defense plants are located in our state. We should use every means possible to make the communities about these camps and

defense plants clean. That we may thus save our men. Let us make a strong effort to suppress salicious literature, degrading amusements, lotteries wish clubs and other public evils

teries, night clubs and other public evils.

We commend the Anti-Saloon League, The Women's Christian Temperance Union with many of our leading men and women throughout the state who have continuously placed their influence for temperance. We also commend The Arkansas Methodist, The Arkansas Baptist, The Arkansas Gazette and other periodicals for standing on the moral side of this issue.

### LAY ACTIVITIES

We recommend that Layman's Day be held Sunday, February 21, 1943, and that it be made a special feature in the preparation for the Week of Dedication.

We heartily commend "The Methodist Layman" and recommend that the charge lay leader be designated as the person primarily responsible for its circulation in he charge. Subscription rates are: Single subscriptions, 50c a year; Clubs of 5 or more mailed to one address, 25c per year.

We recommend that each church follow its men who go into the Armed Services with letters, intercessary prayer and personal contact.

We further recommend that our Lay Leaders and lay speakers help fill the pulpits of churches made vacant as the result of preachers entering the chaplaincy of the armed forces of the nation.

We commend to every charge the thoughtful and prayerful consideration of the financial support of the ministry.

We urge that each charge lay leader and District Steward fully discharge his responsibility of seeing that the world service and benevolent program is thoroughly presented to the congregation before the quarterly conference which sets the acceptance for world service and conference benevolences. We recommend that each charge give prayerful consideration to the request of the commission on world service for a material increase in the acceptances.

We urge the laymen of this Conference to dedicate themselves in an unusual degree in the worship, educational and missionary programs of the Church, to the end that we may develop a major effort and a broad sweeping movement to make The Methodist Church genuinely and effectively:

A Worshiping Church A Fellowship Church An Evangelistic Church A Stewardship Church A Missionary Church

We recommend the appointment of Dr. James W. Workman as associate secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities.

We nominate E. Wainright Martin as Conference lay leader for next

year.

## BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Methodist Hospital, Memphis, Tennessee November 1, 1942

Bishop C. C. Selecman and Brethren of the North Arkansas Conference:
During the conference year just closed your hospital at Memphis has experienced the greatest year in its history. More patients have been

admitted and more work done than in any previous year. In common with all other institutions and enterprises, this work has been accomplished under increasingly difficult conditions. A large number of our best physicians and surgeons have gone into the Army and Navy and our nurses are with the Armed Forces wherever they serve in all quarters of the globe. Supplies are increasingly difficult to obtain and equipment practically impossible, but we were fortunate in having obtained as much new equipment as we did before shortages set in. It is not surprising in view of the great improvement in employment conditions, that the number of patients who have been cared for free of charge has decreased for the first time in the history of the hospital and the amount of free service furnished these patients decreased by \$9,700.00.

Present conditions have increased greatly the interest, for example, in Nursing Education and there appears to be at present no shoratge of desirable candidates for our Nursing School. However, we still ask all members of your conference to call to the attention of suitable young women the advantages of Nursing Education at Methodist Hospital. There is a growing shortage of techincally trained graduates in all fields and we have lost a number of key employees. With the shortage of doctors, it is going to

be necessary to confine medical service to the essentials.

Steady progress is being made in the retirement of the debt on the hospital, but a long way remains to go as the balance of the mortgage indebtedness at the time of writing this report stands at \$555,000.00 and will

be reduced to \$540,000.00 on November 27th.

It will be noted there was an increase of 747 in the total number of admissions and an increase of 375 in the number of births occuring in the hospital. During the last three months this latter work has grown to unprecedented proportions and during the month of October, more than 200 births occured.

Again the importance of the Golden Cross Enrollment is respectfully urged to your attention. The cultivation of the Golden Cross in this area is still being directed from your hospital in Memphis because no adequate provision is made in the General offices for the promotion of this work.

Again your attention is respectfully called to our Charter requirements that your Conference elect six Trustees this year, two of them should be ministers, one a woman, and three laymen.

# COMMISSION ON EVANGELISM

Therefore the Home Visitation plan offers us perhaps the best approach for such a time as this.

We are therefore planning to try to give every preacher and every member of our church a chance to get training and experience in Visitation Evangelism.

Dr. Guy Black will have a school on Visitation Evangelism in Little Rock on March 8 to 13. It has been agreed in the Cabinet that each District Superintendent will send to the Guy Black School at least four preachers who, on their return shall hold Visitation Evangelism Schools supposedly in reach of every pastor. Then each pastor is requested to hold a school of Visitation Evangelism immediately following the adjournment of the subdistrict schools, thus each pastor and every layman and laywoman in the church will have the chance to attend a school of Visitation Evangelism.

We suggest the following allocation of Evangelistic responsibility for the ensuing year:

- 1. The Annual Conference Commission on Evangelism shall be recognized as the legal corpus to conserve, coordinate, promote, and supervise the Evangelistic work in the Conference.
- 2. The Board of Christian Education shall conduct the Pre-Easter Revival Campaign. The Executive Secretary shall make full reports of the campaign to the Commission on Evangelism, as soon as possible after Easter.
- 3. To the Board of Missions and Church Extension, to the District Superintendent and his District Organization shall be committed the Missionary and Evangelistic work of the District.

We suggest the following Evangelistic Goals for the year:

- 1. Immense increase at public worship services.
- 2. The Upper Room in every home and daily family worship.
- 3. That we endeavor to reach at least five thousand on profession of faith, or each Church add 8 per cent on profession of faith.
- 4. That special Evangelistic services be held in each church, in addition to the Pre-Easter Campaign.
- 5. That Evangelism be made the dominant note in our preaching and services.

In such preparation we know nothing more valuable than the great book of Herbert Hoover and Hugh Gibson, published by Doubleday Doran and Co., New York, entitled, 'The Problems of Lasting Peace.' With full recognition of the economic aspects of the world struggle it is also deeply concerned with the spiritual aspects and meets them with frankness and honesty.'

Let us pray for this spirit of peace in our own hearts, homes, schools,

churches, business places and communities.

1. We commend the elective course in our church school magazine on peace.

2. We would encourage our people to read such reports as the Delaware Conference submitted as a basis for a just and durable peace, and others of like import.

3. Let us cooperate with our Commission on World Peace, in supporting the peace efforts of our church throughout the connection.

# COMMITTEE ON THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

We, your Committee on the American Bible Society, beg leave to make the following report:

It has been said that the Bible Society is never without a war or a revolution somewhere in its work. But never before has it faced so many affected areas, that are in a condition of chaos.

At home and abroad the call for Scriptures has recently exceeded the ability of the Society to supply. In China, the Philippines, Africa, Europe, Latin America, the Near East, our own America—everywhere the Scriptures were known at all, the cry for them has arisen. The terrible peril of the hour is that, just when this sense of need is so acute and so universal, the very processes whereby men can get the Bible-inadequate even in normal times—are now breaking down. American Christians do not generally realize it, but all Asia, Africa, and Latin America are dependent on the Bible societies for the Bible, and within Europe and North America there are millions of people who will not have the Bible unless it is brought to them by the Bible Societies. This must be done by the Societies as a missionary duty, because millions of people have no facilities for getting books, millions more cannot pay the full costs, so low is their living scale. Still more are unaware that there is this answer to their hunger.

Conscious of humanity's deepened sense of need for secure spiritual foundations, believing that the Bible contains the one sufficient answer to the world's distress, and convinced that it must now be far more widely spread throughout the world by our American churches in view of the limitations of the war upon the Bible-loving people of other nations, the Committee of the American Bible Society urges the North Arkansas Conference to

recommend to all its churches and people:

1. That they remind themselves anew of the precious and indispensable character of the Word of God;

That they seek afresh the guidance which it provides;

3. That they pray for its spread throughout the world and for open hearts in all men to receive it;

4. That they join heartily in the support of the American Bible Society

and the observance of Universal Bible Sunday, December 13;

5. That in each church the people be informed of their participation in the support of the Society through World Service and through the Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief.

The Board of Conference Claimants apportioned to the Claimants the funds available on the basis of eight dollars per service year to the superannuates, and an equal amount on adjusted service years to widows; with some additional amounts and adjustments paid to certain ones of the superannuates and widows from the emergency fund.

We recommend that the Conference appropriate for the next conference year for the claimants fund an amount equal to seven per cent of the amount paid for pastor's salaries.

We further recommend that the funds collected be divided as one-half of one per cent for repairs and upkeep of superannuate homes, and that five per cent of the balance be set up for superannuate and burial fund, and

that the balance of the remaining part be apportioned to the claimants on the basis of 80 per cent for service years and 20 per cent for emergency.

# MEMOIRS

#### REV. JAMES F. JERNIGAN

Rev. James F. Jernigan, son of Rev. W. H. and Dicey Jernigan, was born in Henry County, Tenn., May 18, 1851, and died December 6, 1941, having passed his 90th birthday. When a mere lad, his parents moved with him to Arkansas and settled in Independence County, where he grew to manhood. At the age of 17 he was converted and joined the church at old

Walnut Grove Church, near Sulphur Rock.
In his 24th year, he was licensed to prech, and the same year joined old White River Conference, which met that year at Searcy. He spent 49 years of active service, traveling hard circuits and missions, preaching and organizing and building churches, during the pioneer days of Methodism in North-

east Arkansas.

He also filled some of what are now considered the best stations in the North Arkansas Conference. Six years he was presiding elder, four

on the Batesville District, and two on the Jonesboro District.

Brother Jernigan's style of preaching was that of the old time evangelistic zeal, and hundreds were converted under his ministry. An untiring song leader, and knowing most of the old hymns "by heart," his services were much sought in revivals.

On August 15, 1895, he was married to Miss Fannie Irene Rosa, of Mountain View, Arkansas. She died six years later, leaving a son and daughter, who still survive their parents. They are Paul D. Jernigan of Little Rock,

and Mrs. Fannie McKennon of Scranton.

Funeral service was held at Sulphur Rock, December 8. At Brother Jernigan's request before he died, Rev. H. Lynn Wade conducted tthe funeral, assisted by Rev. E. H. Hook and the writer. A host of relatives and friends mourn his death. Burial was at Moorefield, Ark.

### REV. W. C. DAVIDSON

Fifty years as a Methodist preacher in Arkansas and seventy-four years of life ended for William Chapman Davidson before the dawn of January 11, 1942, in Arkadelphia, where it had begun, and where his years of retirement had been spent. He was born of pioneer Methodist parents who had come from Tennessee before the Civil War. His father, William Franklin Davidson, had been a gunner in the artillery of the Confederate Army, and had married Mary Emmaline Williams after the war and raised his family on a farm in Bethlehem community east of Arkadelphia. He worked his way into and through two years at Altus Institute, later Hendrix College, after which in 1889 he went to Wheatley to teach school. Here he met and married Joanna Hall, the companion of his entire ministry and the mother

of their four children.

In December, 1892, at Batesville, where his father had joined the army, he joined the White River Conference and began his career as an itinerant Methodist preacher. He served one year at LaGrange and Spring Creek; four years at Beebe; one year as presiding elder of the Jonesboro District; three years at Forrest City; four years as presiding elder of the Helena District, living at Forrest City; four years at First Church, Jonesboro; transferred to the Little Rock Conference in 1909, he served three years at First Church, Pine Bluff; two years at Crossett; four years as presiding elder of the Monticello District; four years at Asbury Memorail Church, ender of the Monticello District; four years at Asbury Memorail Church, Little Rock; four years at First Church, Hope; transferred to the North Arkansas Conference in 1926, he served First Church, Batesville, three years; First Church, Paragould, four years; First Church, Searcy, two years, after which he voluntarily ended his active ministry and retired, in 1935.

The next few years were divided between his farm on the Ouachita river near Arkadelphia regular duties as a toucher of the Arkadelphia Markadelphia.

river, near Arkadelphia, regular duties as a teacher of the Arkadelphia Men's Bible Class of his church, and occasional visits to his children. He was very

lonely. Late in August, 1941, he married Mrs. Alma Fiemster.

On December 23, 1941, he became ill and died January 11, 1942. Funeral services were held in the Methodist Church, Arkadelphia, on the following afternoon, by the pastor and presiding elder. Ltaer in the afternoon he was laid to rest in Rose Hill Cemetery. He was survived by four children: William Paul Davidson and Mrs. Warren H. Hull, of San Antonio, Texas; Mrs. John P. Vesey, of Hope, Arkansas; and Chapman Hall Davidson, of Hugo, Oklahoma. Six grandchildren and one great-grand child survived him also, as did his wife of four months.

W. C. Davidson was, first of all, a dutiful pastor to his congregation, and was invariably the highest contributor to its support. He was at all times a leading figure in the long fight against the liquor traffic in his state, and against other forms of evil and vice. He was deeply concerned for Christian education, and was a trustee of Hendrix College and of Henderson-

Brown College.

My father loved a good joke, and a comedy that would make him laugh. In his later years he enjoyed the circus. He liked fried chicken and watermelon, and a walk through the woods. He was deeply attached to the community where he was born and spent his youth, and was ever thoughtful of his many relatives who lived there. He was orderly in his habits. He was serious in mind and never read fiction. It did not occur to him to escape from life vicariously, even for a moment. Like a true Christian, he did not fear death and passed away in quiet and peace. William Paul Davidson

#### JAMES WALTER JOHNSTON

The Reverend James Walter Johnston was born at Ponder, Missouri, July 23, 1886, and died in a Batesville hospital, Sunday, March 1, 1942. He had undergone a minor operation and was believed on the road to recovery until Sunday morning when he suffered a heart attack from which he never rallied.

Brother Johnston was converted and joined the Methodist Church early in life. In 1908 at Morehouse, Missouri, he was licensed to preach as a local minister, and from that time until the North Arkansas Conference met at Batesville in 1914 he taught school, and attended Marvin College at Fredericktown, Missouri. In 1914 he was admitted on trial to the North Arkansas Conference and ordained deacon in 1915, and elder in 1918. During his twenty-eight years in the ministry he spent twenty-seven of them in the Batesville District as follows: Evening Shade, eight years; Mountain View, five years; Bexar, four years; Melbourne, three years; Bethesda and Cushman, two years; Sulphur Rock, one year; Swifton and Alicia, one year. He was one year at Hackett, in the Fort Smith District, and was in his third year at Calico Rock and Norfork Charge at his death.

Brother Johnston was universally popular and enjoyed the utmost esteem and confidence of all who knew him. He never was found lagging in his life's work, and was ever ready to minister to those in every walk of life. He loved the church, its services and fellowship. He loved its hymns and its worship. He loved to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ which was the

power of God unto salvation.

Brother Johnston is survived by his widow, Mrs. J. W. Johnston of Batesville; four daughters, Mrs. Fred Dobbs of Mount Pleasant, Mrs. Lyndell Norton and Miss Ruth Johnston both of Mountain Home, and Miss Lillian Johnston of Batesville; three sons, Carl Johnston of Batesville, Paul Johnston of Mountain View, and William Johnston of Detroit, Michigan; his father, J. P. Johnston of Doniphan, Missouri, and several half-brothers and sisters.

The funeral services were held Tuesday morning, March 3, in the First Methodist Church in Batesville, with the Rev. Grover C. Johnson, the district superintendent, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Horace M. Lewis, pastor of the church, and the Rev. Jefferson Sherman, pastor of the Methodist Church at Newport. Interment was in Oaklawn Cemetery, Batesville.

#### ALICE ELEANOR DIXON NOE

Alice Eleanor Dixon was born November 14, 1854, in Memphis, Shelby County, Tennessee. Her parents were Lemuel Montague Dixon and Eliza Catherine Harrell Dixon. Her father was an "old time" Methodist class leader. Her mother was a quiet, unassuming Christian. Her home was one where peace and love dwelled.

In keeping with this background, Alice Eleanor was baptized when a

baby, and joined the church when a mere girl.

During the war between the States, she moved with her parents and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Hester, to their plantation at Cuba, Tennessee, near Memphis. While her family owned many slaves, she came to inherit her father's belief that, "it was not right for one man to own another," and never forgot that we have a duty to the American Negro.

As a young lady of twenty-two years, she moved in December, 1876, with her parents and grandparents to Maxwell, Sharp County, Arkansas, traveling to Batesville by boat. Her oldest brohter died, and the boat was

stopped long enough for his burial at Augusta, Arkansas.

Arriving among the quiet hills of this Sharp County village, Miss Alice, as she was long and affectionately remembered, nursed her invalid grandmother, and taught school. Her students later became teachers, doctors, farmers, and a Congressman—citizens all.

It was here that on October 18, 1883, she married Reverend Franklin Randolph Noe of the White River Conference. Her husband preceded her in death on October 19, 1906, while serving the Auvergne and Weldon charge.

Among Mother's papers is the following notation: "I was a charter member of the first Missionary Society organized in the White River Conference, I think, in 1884, and was elected its corresponding secretary. I, also, helped to organize and was a charter member of the first Missionary Society at Salem, Arkansas."

The family moved to Conway in 1905, to place the children in public

school and Hendrix College.

In 1973, Mother moved with her two sons, Paul and Palmore, to Seminole, Oklahoma, where they lived until the first World War in 1917. Then she lived, alternately, with her son, Paul, and her daughter, Mrs. J. R. Barton.

During the past ten years she made her home with her son in Seminole, Oklahoma

She greatly rejoiced when our churches united, and was happy to be a charter member, with her daughters and granddaughter, of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, of The Methodist Church of Seminole, Okla.

She had been visiting with her daughter, Mrs. J. R. (Neill) Barton, and

her family in Portland, Oregon, for several months, and was planning her trip home, when on January 22, she fell and sustained serious injury.

In November following, he was Admitted on Trial in the old Arkansas Annual Conference, in session in Fayetteville, Bishop Charles B. Galloway, presiding. His first appointment was Waldron Circuit, including the town of Waldron.

* He is survived by his wife, Virginia, and Samuel, and several grand-children, nephews, and nieces, and three brothers: the Rev. D. N. Weaver, of Fort Smith, a retired Methodist preacher; Dr. E. R. Weaver, of Bristow, Oklahoma; and John R. Weaver, of Vesta, Arkansas.

## MEMOIRS

### REV. GEORGE WENDELL PYLES

Our Conference suffered an inexpressable loss at the passing of our friend and brother, George Pyles, who died at the District Parsonage in Searcy on Monday, October 5th, 1941, after an illness of a month.

George Wendell Pyles was born July 12, 1886, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hugh M. Pyles of Troy, Tennessee. He was educated in the schools of Obion County Tennessee, and attended Obion College. His family later moved to Gravette, Arkansas, and he entered the grocery business in Blytheville. Here he was married to Ida Mae Cross. It was in Blytheville in 1916 that he heeded the call to the Christian ministry and was licensed to preach. He was admitted on trial into the North Arkansas Conference at the session of 1916 meeting at Searcy.

For twenty-five years in the Methodist ministry he was a brave soldier, his was a courageous soul. During his ministry he forged his way through Hendrix College where his scholastic record has been seldom equalled and rarely excelled. He received the Bachelor of Divinity degree from Emory Univeristy. His pastorates included Lake City, Crawfordsville, Plummerville, Parkin, Clarendon, Dodson Ave., Ft. Smith, Paragould, and Clarksville. At his death he was closing his third successful year as District Superintendent of the Searcy District. He was looking forward to serving as host District Superintendent for this session of the Annual Conference.

In his early ministry he showed his true spirit when the floods came to Clarendon. Property was destroyed, people were homeless, disease was widespread, but George Pyles poured out his life for his friends—and greater love hath no man than this. During his ministry at Dodson Avenue, that magnificient church building was planned and erected as the depression came and brought heart-breaking financial burdens and worries. Next, while at Paragould, a debt of \$60,000 was retired. For the final three years of his ministry he served in the Cabinet with an unbroken record of leadership and usefulness.

He served his church in many ways. For a number of years he was chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Hospital in Memphis. He served as a reserve delegate to the 1940 General Conference in Atlantic City, and was a member of the Jurisdictional Conference of 1940 in Oklahoma City.

As I have thought of George Pyles and have tried to find a few words which would sum up briefly my estimate of his life and friendship, these expressions have been constantly in my mind: a compassionate heart, a courageous soul, a faithful devotion. I have never known a man more genuinely interested in helping the underpaid brethren of the ministry, and his interest was not mere talk. He delighted in their fellowship. He was the charming guest of their humble homes. He was the champion of their rights.

He was always thinking of others, and through the years, his devotion to his wife, his thoughtfulness, his graciousness have been one of the rare attainments of domestic felicity—so rare as to become almost ideal.

There was about the life of this man the power of a great devotion. He was motivated by an unswerving and faithful devotion to Christ and His Church. A faithful devotion—faithful through temptations; faithful through successes; faithful to the very end.

His favorite hymn, sung so beautifully at the funeral by Mrs. Ray Meriweather of Paragould, was:

"One sweetly solemn thought Comes to me o'er and o'er Nearer my home today am I Than e'er I've been before,

Nearer My Father's house Where many mansions be; Nearer today the Great White Throne Nearer the crystal sea.

Nearer the bound of life Where burdens are laid down Nearer to leave the heavy cross Nearer to gain the Crown.

Father perfect my trust Strengthen my power of faith Nor let me stand at last alone Upon the shore of death."

Funeral services were conducted at the First Methodist Church, Searcy, in the presence of more than one hundred fellow ministers, by Rev. Warren Johnston, Rev. Connor Morehead and Rev. R. E. Connell. Burial was in Blytheville.

In 1886 he was licensed to preach. Admitted on trial into the Memphis

Conference in 1888, ordained Deacon 1890 and Elder in 1892.

After serving charges in the Memphis Conterence for seventeen years, he transferred to the old White River Conference in 1905 and was appointed to the Crawfordsville-Marion Circuit, which covered almost the whole of Crittenden County, and which he traveled by foot, on train and with horse and buggy.

While here he organized and built the Church at Earle, and at the close of three years, three separate charges: Crawfordsville, Earle, and Marion were made. He was then sent to Wynne where he built the present church building, and then went to Newport where he completed and dedicated the

church.

He then served the following charges in succession: McCrory, Cotton Plant, Eureka Springs, Gentry, Leachville, Jonesboro, Fisher Street, Lamar and Plummerville. In some of these places he stayed for four years. At Eureka Springs, five.

At the Conerence held at Batesville, in 1936, he asked for and was granted the Superannnuate relation, having given forty-eight years to the

itinerate ministry never having missed a roll call.

Brother Harris was good, safe and sound gospel preacher, very able in prayer, loved children and was loved by them, had a deep understanding of young people and was revered by them, sympathetic with the problems of the middle aged class and tender with the old people.

He loved his church, gave liberally of his means to promote its interests. He was a great lover of flowers, they seemed to bloom in profusion in his garden. He would frequently sit with the flowers and robins about him

and make his sermons.

He lived well, grew sweeter as age and infirmity came on and at last went home to the Father's house at 5 p. m., Sunday, February 23, 1941, and on Tuesday the 25th the funeral was held in the Methodist Church in Conway, by Rev. R. S. Hayden, Rev. E. T. Wayland, Rev. Guy Murphy and the writer, and his body was laid to rest in the Conway Cemetery.

#### STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

(1) That all undergraduates be required to report according to the call of the several committees before the opening of the Conference and that no one be allowed to take examination after Conference opening unless providentially hindered.

(3) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one delegate from each Church in ecah Pastoral Charge; and, provided further, that when the membership of any church reaches three hundred, it shall be entitled to an additional delegate for each additional three hundred members or major fraction thereof, said delegates to be elected by the Quarterly Conference; providd, furthr, that no charge shall have fewer than three delegates elected.

(4) That figures answering the question: "Members reported last year,"

be the figure printed in the Journal of the last Annual Conference.

(5) That the District Superintendents' figures of all apportionments be

accepted as the official figures.

(6) That the apportionments for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amount paid be the figures

- of the Conference Treasurer.

  (7) That all Statistical Reports be turned in to the Statistical Secretary by the hour of the first session; and that all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer not later than 2:00 p.m., on Thursday of the Conference session; and that the names of all delinquents shall be reported to the Conference.
- (8) When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishop's cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrinial board, committee, commission, or an officer in the Conference administration.
- (9) That the Secretary of the Bishop's cabinet be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's Districts for insertion in the Conference Journal.

(11) That at all future sessions of the Conference entertainment be provided on the Harvard plane (bed and breakfast) except for superannuated ministers and pastors whose salaries are less than \$1,200.00, for whom full

entertainment shall be furnished.
(12) All Boards that receive money from the Annual Conference shall make a detailed report of all expenditures to that Conference, and said re-

ports shall be reported in the Conference minutes.

(13) The list of Lay Delegates elected by the quarterly conferences shall be completed and their names given to the host church thirty days

That the Methodist Church may serve as adequatley as possible our men who are in the armed service of our country, their families, and the civilians connected with the war work program we recommend the following:

1. That each Church in the Conference prepare and keep up to date a Service Roll of all men from the Church and Church School Membership who are in the armed service of our country.

2. That a secretary for this Service Men's Roll be elected in every

Church by the first Quarterly Conference.

3. That the local churches give each man entering the service a Bible, or New Testament.

4. That Church Bulletins and such devotional booklets as the "Upper Room" and "Service" be forwarded to the men regularly.

5. That definite plans be worked out in each Church for writing the men frequently—at least once a quarter.

6. That especially in larger churches informal groups of "Army Wives and Parents" be organized.
7. That our Conference Board of Missions and Church Extension be requested to assist the local community in the Jacksonville Defense Area to provide a full time pastor.

8. That our Churches in War Work Areas join in local community efforts to provide nursery facilities for the children of war plant workers.

9. That pastors of all churches losing members to the war industries seek to keep in contact with these members in somewhat the same manner as with men in the armed forces, requesting them to become "affiliate members" of the church in the war plant area.

#### EDUCATION Nos. 2, 3, 4, and 8

We recommend:

1. That the United Christian Education Advance be promoted through the following activities: Careful study of the community to find persons to be reached; develop nursery departments; develop home departments, organize extension classes and schools; follow-up absentees, keep accurate records, and train present leadership and persons to be future leaders.

2. That ministers and laymen cooperate with other agencies in an effort to provide Bible study and other forms of Christian Education in the

public school.

3. That youth work be promoted through the organization of the Methodist Youth Fellowship in each local church; through area meetings for youth with special emphasis on Christian Adventure Institutes, Epworth Training Conference, summer assemblies and camps. That the Caravan and like activities be promoted throughout the Conference.

4. That local churches cooperate with churches of college centers in

the development of Wesley Foundation Work.

5. That all agencies in the Conference cooperate in promoting effective education in the evil effects of alcohol,

6. That Christian literature, and how to use it as well as secure it,

be made a primary consideration of our Conference.
7. That missionary mindedness be developed through a better promotion of missionary education for children and youth and through the Fourth

Sunday Church School World Service programs.
8. That Christian workers be developed through the following agencies: Arkansas Pastors' School; youth assemblies, camps, institutes, youth week caravan activities, and area meetings; Christian workers' training schools, classes and home study courses; Leadership Schools; sub-district and local church institutes; and vacation church schools.

9. That evangelism be strengthened through preparation of leaders of church schools and the careful planning and carrying out of a special period

of evangelism in each church school during January, February, and March.

10. That the "February Special Cultivation" program for Ministerial Education and Hendrix College be given chief place in February of 1943. That pastors and local churches cooperate with Hendrix College in securing

We recommend:

1. That every pastor in our Conference secure from the Joint Division of Education and Cultivation, Board of Missions and Church Extension, 150 Fifth Avenue, New York, definite information about the causes to which we contribute under the head of World Service; that they study this information until they are thoroughly familiar with the urgent needs in the different departments and fields of service; that they first give to their official members this information which they have acquired; and that the pastor and the officials undertake to inform the entire membership about these needs in such a way that their people shall be inspired and moved to increase their acceptance and payments on World Service and Benevolences to the end that the urgent needs of the cause of Christ throughout the world may be adequately provided for.

2. That the pastors and officials endeavor to cultivate every member of every Church and manifest such a genuine interest in each one that his heart will be strangely warmed and he will have a desire to share in the

neart will be strangely warmed and ne will have a desire to share in the largest possible way in all of the work of our Lord Jesus Christ.

3. That every department in every Church School be urged to make the fourth Sunday in each month as vitally interesting and as definitely helpful as possible; that they use the fourth Sunday materials provided by the General and Conference Boards of Education: and that every child, every young person and every adult be so thoroughly informed in these services that they shall with great joy make liberal contributions all of which shall that they shall with great joy make liberal contributions, all of which shall be applied to the payment of World Service and Conference Benevolences.

#### EVANGELISM No. 6

We recommend:

1. That the Annual Conference Commission on Evangelism shall be recognized as the legal corpus to conserve, coordinate, promote, and supervise the evangelistic program of the Conference.

2. That the Board of Christian Education direct the pre-Easter revival campaign. The Executive Secretary is requested to make reports of the

campaign to the Commission on Evangelism as soon as possible.

3. That to the Board of Missions and Church Extension, and to the District Superintendent, and his District organization shall be committed the missionary and evangelistic work of the District. It is suggested that when it seems advisable, a district missionary be employed.

4. That following the Guy Black school in Little Rock, March 7-13, it is recommended that the Superintendents arrange to hold immediately as many sub-district schools as will be necessary for each pastor to be within

easy reach of a school.

4. (cont.) That each pastor should hold a school for his church or churches so that each lay man and woman shall have a chance to attend a school on "visitation evangelism." It is suggested that these schools run for four days, beginning Sunday afternoon and closing Wednesday.

Evangelistic Goals:

1. Immense increase at public worship services.

2. That we endeavor to reach at least 5,000 on profession of faith, or each church add 8 per cent increase on profession of faith. That the Upper Room be placed in every home and every home

have daily family worship.

That each church have special revival services in addition to the pre-Easter campaign.

That evangelism be the dominant note in our ministry during this year.

## HOME MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION No. 7

1. Cooperation with the War Work emphasis as outlined under Point

No. 1. Cooperation with the other Boards and agencies of the Conference thru the Commission on Town and Country in a constructive program of strengthening the total life of the rural church. page C

3. Mission study groups in every local church.

4. Every pastor and pastoral charge assuming responsibility for at least one extension Church School and preaching appointment.

5. Each District with a definite program for establishing a Methodist

Church in new territory.

6. Appropriations limited as nearly as possible to opening up new situations.

## TOWN AND COUNTRY

We recommend:

1. That the Conference through its several Agencies, continue the work of the Town and Country Commission by providing the necessary

funds for the employment of a conference secretary.

2. That the "Group Ministry Plan" of work be promoted in each "Natural Area" in the conference where interest and cooperation can be secured. The secretary should give full cooperation to the work of this council.

3. That the church be called upon to put forth a special effort to

discover and use local preachers.

4. That the Commission cooperate with all the agencies of the church

in reaching and building the church in rural areas.

- 5. That the commission cooperate with all other agencies working in the rural areas of the conference which have as their purpose the building of a better life.
- 6. That the district as a whole be used as a unit to meet situations too large for any single local church or area council. That the conference as a whole be used as a unit in meeting situations too large for the district. That the General Boards be informed of needs too large to be met by the conference.

7. That we urge Hendrix College to give every possible effort in the training of young ministers and all other young men and women for work in the rural areas.

8. That we express our appreciation for the state and federal agencies which have given full cooperation to our work. That we give full recognition and approval to the work of the W. S. C. S. for the work which is being done by Mrs. Vioa Beadles in Yell County and by Miss Estelle McIntosh in Scott County.

#### LOCAL CHURCH ORGANIZATION No. 9

We call upon our District Superintendents and Pastors to press to completion all the organization within the local church which will contribute to more effective work within and by our Church. Especially do we urge that the following local church organization be perfected: the Official Board, the Church Board of Education, the Church Board of Missions and Church Extension, a Committee on Hospitals and Homes, an active Layman's organization, the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the Methodist Youth Fellowship. These organizations, if they are at all active, will increase the effectiveness of all our efforts at promoting the work of the Kingdom of God.

## PUBLICITY AND PROMOTION

That each Conference give careful attention to plans for publicity and promotion including the use of the radio, Conference and National Organs, the publicity of our Boards, posters and bulletins, and audio-visual education.
