JOURNAL

FIRST DAY

The One Hundred-Eighth Session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference of The Methodist Church convened at The Methodist Church in Russellville, Arkansas, at 4:00 P. M., November 3rd, 1943 with Bishop Charles C.

Selection presiding.

Hymn No. 211, "Arise, My Soul, Arise," and Hymn No. 278, "Lead On the opening as the opening as the opening. O King Eternal," from the Methodist Hymnal, were sung as the opening hymns of the Conference. Bishop Selecman read the second chapter of I Peter with an appeal that this Conference be dominated by the presence of the spirit of God. Dr. O. E. Goddard, at the request of the chairman, made a statement of the plans for Evangelism in this session of the Conference, and emphasized the place that Evangelism was to have in the Conference during the year. Hymn No. 402, "And Are We Yet Alive" was sung. Bishop Selecman, assisted by the District Superintendents, led the Conference in the

observance of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper.

James S. Upton was elected Secretary. On the nomination of the Secretary Ewing T. Wayland and James T. Randle were elected assistant secretaries; Joe A. Goetz, Conference Statistician; and the following District Auditors: J. J. Clark, E. J. Holifield, Ray D. Seals, Martin Bierbaum, J. Kenneth Shamblin, E. G. Kaetzell, Raymond Franks, and S. C. Patty. C. N. Guice

led the conference as song leader.

The Secretary made announcement concerning the method of checking the attendance of lay and clerical members of the Conference. A check on the attendance records showed 171 clerical, 37 accepted supplies, and 74 lay delegates present.

Question No. 22 was called: Who are received by Transfer from other Conferences? Bishop Selecman announced the transfer of Thomas R. Whiddon, an elder from the Tennessee Conference, to the North Arkansas Conference. He was called to the chancel and introduced to the Conference.

Question No. 10 was called: Are all the preachers blameless in their life and official administration? The characters of all the active preachers were passed. The names of all the retired preachers were called and their characters passed.

H. Lynn Wade, being granted a point of personal privilege, presented Dr. James A. Anderson, retired, and Dr. A. G. Henderson, Lay Delegate from Imboden, to the Conference. It was made known that Dr. Anderson had attended 65 sessions and Dr. Henderson 48 sessions of this Conference.

The Conference gave a standing vote of thanks to Ben C. Few for his work as secretary of the Conference.

On motion of Ben Few the conference voted to order the Secretary to send the greetings of the conference to J. B. Evans who was pastor at Russellville when the present building was erected.

The host pastor, E. B. Williams, made appropriate announcements, and, after the benediction by J. Q. Schisler, the conference was adjourned.

SECOND DAY

MORNING SESSION

The Conference met at 8:30 A. M. with Bishop Selecman presiding. The Hymns, No. 256, "Faith of Our Fathers" and No. 267, "Rise Up, O Men of God," were sung. Bishop Selecman led in the Responsive Readings "Social Justice" and "Citizenship." After a brief period of silent meditation the Conference was led in prayer by L. M. Starkey.

Bishop Selecman introduced Glenn Sanford and T. C. Huff, after which Glenn Sanford spoke to the Conference on the need of the Rural areas and the hope of the church in these sections.

District Superintendents and pastors who have had a part in outstanding rural projects were mentioned. The Hymn No. 491, "America the Beautiful,"

was sung after which T. C. Huff led in prayer.

The minutes of the opening session were approved as read. On motion of James W. Workman the conference voted that a committee be appointed to audit the conference minutes. The chairman appointed the following to the Committee: C. N. Guice, Edward W. Harris, and L. M. Starkey.

On motion of Ben Few the Conference voted to have the Secretary call

the roll of the lay delegates of the conference. This was done.

Question No. 9 was called: What are the reports of the District Superintendents as to the status of the work within their Districts? W. Vance Womack, Secretary of the Cabinet, read the report which summarized the year's work. The District Superintendents pointed out the outstanding phases of the church work within their respective districts.

DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS' REPORT

As we come today to make our report to you of the work done in the eight districts of the North Arkansas Conference for the year 1942-43, we wish to express our grateful thanks to Almighty God for the privilege we have had of working another year for our Lord and Master through the Church. We make our report of work that has been done under great stress. The statistics will show decreases along some lines, increases in others. We can give only a few of the items of work that have occupied our time during the year just closing.

The fine work done by our laymen, under the leadership of the Conference, District and Charge Lay Leaders, has been very encouraging. Their work in the field of Stewardship, Visitation Evangelism and the development

of rural work has been gratifying.

There have been 2,739 accessions to the Church on profession of faith and 2,762 by certificate,—a total of 5,661. Subscribers to the Christian Advocate total 550; the Arkansas Methodist 5,931. The number of Vacation Schools held number 121 with an enrollment of 5,678. The total enrollment in the Church School is 58,041. There have been 13 persons licensed to preach this year. The women have 256 Societies of Christian Service with a membership of 9,821. During the year 1,560 training credits have been issued, and \$3,011 raised for Church School Day purposes. The Church raised \$11,403 for Week of Dedication and World Communion Day causes. For the upkeep and improvement of churches and parsonages \$86,091 was raised and there was paid on church debts \$113,194. There have been 6 new churches built, and one parsonage bought. The 8 districts accepted \$61,265 for Benevolence, an amount equal to 63 per cent of the askings. Paid for Benevolences \$6,298 or 102 per cent of the acceptances. The Conference raised \$9,514 for Hendrir College and Ministerial Training.

of increasing and paying acceptances on World Service.

Morehead, and W. T. Martin. The following names of preacher's wives who have died during the past year were also referred to the Committee on Memoirs: Mrs. G. G. Davidson, Mrs. James A. Anderson, Mrs. W. J. Powers. It was mentioned that J. A. Zinn, for twenty-five years a supply pastor, had died during the year.

Question No. 17 was called: Who are retired? The Roll of the Districts were called and the following names were referred to the Committee on Conference Relations: Rex B. Wilkes and W. A. Patty. The name of J. C. Cofer, an accepted supply was referred to the Board of Conference Claimants.

Question No. 16 was called: Who are Supernumerary? The name of

Norris Greer was referred to the Committee on Conference Relation for the

Supernumerary relation.

Question No. 25 was called: Who are admitted into Full Connection? William Glen Grunner, Floyd Galloway Villines, Jr., and Pharis Jerome Holifield, having been recommended by the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications, and meeting other disciplinary qualifications were called to the chancel, where they answered satisfactorily the disciplinary questions, and were received into full connection by vote of the Conference.

The order of the day having arrived for election of delegates to the General Conference, the following lay tellers were elected: A. P. McKiethan, H. P. Couchman, Carroll Watson, E. E. Rankin; and the following clerical tellers were elected: J. M. Barnett, Jefferson Sherman, Kenneth Shamblin, Harold O. Eggensperger, J. T. Byrd, William F. Cooley, Elmus C. Brown,

W. A. Downum.

H. E. Pierce was elected Secretary of the lay tellers, and O. M. Campbell, Secretary for the clerical tellers. On motion of the pastor the bar of the Conference was set, and Bishop Selecman instructed the voters in the casting of ballots, and the tellers and secretaries in the counting and reporting of the votes. A motion was made that defective ballots be voided. The motion carried. The first ballot for General Conference delegates was

Dr. Sidney H. Babcock was introduced as the representative of the General Board of Pensions. He addressed the conference concerning the work

of that Board.

The order of the day having arrived for hearing the report of the Conference Board of Education, Earle Cravens, Chairman of the Board, presented Ira A. Brumley, Executive Secretary of the Board of Education, who lead in the presentation of the report. Those who participated in the presentation of the report included: R. S. Hayden, Sam B. Wiggins, Gaither Mc-Kelvey, Clarence Wilcox, and Glenn Sanford.

The report of the first ballot taken for clerical delegates to the General Conference was read. A. W. Martin, having received a majority of the votes, was declared elected. By order of the Conference the results of the second ballot were to be kept secret until the afternoon session. The second ballot

was taken.

Written report No. 1 of the Board of Education was read by Harry King. Report No. 2 of the Conference Board of Education was read by Harry King

The report of the first ballot taken for lay delegates to the General Conference was read. No one having received a majority of the votes cast, the chairman declared that no delegates had been elected. A second ballot was taken and the results were ordered to be kept secret until the afternoon session.

Bishop Selecman announced that Eugene Johnston, son of the Rev. and Mrs. M. N. Johnston, Keiser, who had previously been reported missing was now officially declared killed in action in the service of his country. The Bishop expressed the sympathy of the conference to the family.

Announcements were made by the host pastor.

Chaplain Joe A. Gray, a member of the North Georgia Conference and stationed at Camp Robinson, was introduced to the conference and he pronounced the benediction.

The Bishop called attention to several recent books and to the Publish-

ing House display in the Educational Building.

The report of the Board of Education was continued. J. Q. Schisler and R. S. Hayden spoke to the report. The report of the Board of Education was adopted.

Lester Weaver read the report of the American Bible Society and the

report was adopted.

The report of the first ballot of the election of clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was read. S. B. Wiggins, having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared elected.

The report of the first ballot taken for the election of lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was read. Nels Barnett, having received a

majority of the votes cast, was declared elected.

J. J. Galloway read the report of the Board of Temperance. The report was adopted. An offering amounting to \$100.00 was taken for the Arkansas Anti-Saloon League.

On the motion of R. S. Hayden the Conference voted to make the order of the day immediately following the devotional Friday morning the recep-

tion of the class on Trial.

The presence of Chaplain John G. Geick, a member of this Conference and stationed at Fort Knox, was noted. The Conference was adjourned with the benediction by Chaplain Geick.

THIRD DAY __MORNING SESSION

The Conference met at 8:30 with J. Q. Schisler presiding, at the request of Bishop Selecman. The Hymn No. 4, "O Worship the King," was sung and the Conference was led in prayer by Ben Few. The Hymn No. 144, "Beneath the Cross of Jesus," was sung.

The chairman presented T. C. Huff, pastor of the Jasper Methodist Church, who made a talk on the work of the Board of Missions and Church Extension in Newton County. Mrs. Huff was introduced to the Conference.

The auditing committee reported that they had read the minutes of the

previous day's session and found that they were in good order.

The result of the second clerical ballot taken for Jurisdictional conference delegates which had been taken at the close of the previous day's session was read and it showed no election. A third clerical ballot was taken.

The result of the second lay ballot taken for lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference which had been taken at the close of the previous day's session was read. The returns showed that Judge A. L. Hutchins had rereived a majority of the votes cast and he was declared elected. A third lay ballot was taken.

On nomination of the secretary the following additional lay tellers were elected: Roy Green, T. L. Hunt, George Stilwell, and Robert Killiam. Nels Raynett was elected secretary for the lay tellers.

On nomination of R. S. Hayden the Conference voted to instruct the

On motion of R. E. L. Bearden, Jr., the Conference voted to instruct the Secretary to send a fraternal message from the Conference to the Colored Methodist Episcopal Arkansas Conference, Bishop James A. Bragg presiding, in session at Wynne, Arkansas.

Dr. James W. Workman spoke to the Conference on the work of the Gen-

eral Board of Lay Activities.

The results of the third lay ballot for delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was read, and J. W. Hull, having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared elected. A fourth ballot was taken.

The results of the third clerical ballot for delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was read, and Ira A. Brumley, having received a majority of the

votes cast, was declared elected. A fourth ballot was taken.

By common consent of the Conference the name of Pharis Jerome Holifield was removed from the list of those who had been received into full connection and it was announced that he would be received at a later date.

Question No. 19 was called: Who are admitted on trial? James Harmon Holt was admitted on trial as a special case, under the rule of the church which allows such admissions on a two-thirds vote of the conference, being recommended by the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial

Qualifications, and the Paragould District.

William Rodney Shaw, recommended by the Conway District; Elmo Andrew Thomasson, recommended by the Searcy District; Joel Aubrey Cooper, recommended by the Paragould District; David Paxton Conyers, recommended by the Batesville District; George Edward Stewart, recommended by the Conway District; and John Kermit VanZant, recommended by the Conway District; and having the recommendation of the Committee on Conference Relations and Ministerial Qualifications, were admitted on trial by vote of the Conference.

The results of the fourth ballot for lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was read. E. Wainright Martin having received a majority of the votes cast was declared elected. A ballot was taken for three alternate

lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference.

The results of the fourth ballot for clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was read, and W. Vance Womack, having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared elected. The fifth ballot was taken for Jurisdictional Conference delegates.

The report of the Commission on Evangelism was read by James T.

Randle. The report was adopted.

The report of the Board of Missions and Church Extension was made with A. W. Martin leading in the presentation. He presented Mrs. R. E. Connell, Conference president of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, who spoke briefly of the work of the women during the past year. Mrs. Connell introduced Misses Dorothy Few and Estelle McIntosh, Deaconesses, who spoke briefly of their work.

The results of the fourth clerical ballot for delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was read, and since no one had received a majority of the votes

cast, there was no election. The fifth ballot was taken.

Jefferson Sherman read Report No. 1 of the Board of Missions and Church Extension and Dr. Howard Orborn, representing the General Board of Missions and Church Extension, spoke to the report.

Glenn Sanford reported for the Town and Country Commission, and in

the course of his report he presented the following resolution:

Be it recommended that the same policy of sustentation work be continued in our Conference as it is now stated on Page 28 of the 1942 North Arkansas Conference Journal.

The resolution was adopted. The report of the Board of Missions and

Reynolds spoke of the close relationships maintained between Hendrix College and Philander Smith College. The Conference voted to make the District Superintendents a committee to visit Philander Smith Conference in behalf of the Conference.

The results of the first ballot taken for lay alternate delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was read. T. L. Hunt and Mrs. A. P. Patton, having received a majority of the votes cast, were declared elected. A second ballot for an alternate lay delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

The results of the fifth ballot taken for clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was read. E. B. Williams, having received a majority of the votes cast, was declared elected. The first ballot for three alternate clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was taken.

Miss Frances Hutchinson, of the Kansas City Training School, was introduced and she spoke to the Conference of the work of that school.

The World Service and Finance Committee report was read by Horace Lewis. J. Q. Schisler spoke to the report. Bishop Selecman spoke concerning the Bishop's Crusade for the New World Order. The report was adopted. The report of the Commission on World Peace was filed with the Secre-

Question 26 was called: Who have been elected and ordained deacons? Floyd Galloway Villines, Jr., William Glen Brunner, and Joel Aubrey Cooper, traveling preachers, and Clarence Howard Stewart, a local preacher, were

elected deacons.

Question No. 27 was called: Who have been elected and ordained Elders? Marvin Andrew Cherry, Joe William Watson, Harold Ordway Eggensperger, and Orr David Peters, and Wilmer Earl DuBois, traveling preachers, were elected elders. The Bishop announced that the ordination service would be held at the evening session and he appointed Allen Stewart and H. M. Lewis to act as sponsors for the elders and Dr. E. W. Potter and J. J. Galloway as sponsors for the deacons.

I. L. Claud read the report dealing with the Sustentation Fund, and the

report was adopted.

Honorable Homer M. Adkins, Governor of the State of Arkansas, was introduced to the Conference and it was announced that he would speak at the Christian Citizenship Session in the afternoon.

The result of the second ballot taken for lay delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was read. C. D. Metcalf, having received a majority of

the votes cast, was declared elected.

The results of the first ballot taken for alternate clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference were read. J. A. Gatlin and E. T. Wayland, having received a majority of the votes cast, were declared elected. The second ballot was taken.

Chaplain John G. Geick spoke to the Conference concerning the need for

additional Chaplains.

After various announcements Dr. E. W. Potter pronounced the benediction and the Conference was adjourned until the afternoon session.

THIRD DAY_AFTERNOON SESSION

The Conference met at 2:00 P. M. with Bishop Selecman presiding. The Hymn, "Onward, Christian Soldiers," was sung and J. J. Galloway led in prayer.

The following resolution was presented for Conference action by the

Secretary of the Conference:

The Bishop and Cabinet of the North Arkansas Conference recommend that each pastor conduct a class in the Discipline of the Methodist Church in each Church on his charge during the coming year, and that special effort be made to enlist all church officials in this class. W. V. Womack, Secretary of the Cabinet.

The resolution was adopted by the Conference.

The following resolution was presented to the Conference for its action: Resolved, That the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conference respectively make application to the next session of South Central Jurisdictional Conference for an enabling act under paragraph 15, Article 5, Subdivision 4, of the Discipline of 1940, to read as follows:

"The Little Rock Conference and the North Arkansas Conference are hereby granted permission to merge and form a new Annual Conference of the Methodist Church which shall be known as "The Arkansas

Conference."

"When this act has been duly authorized by the South Central Jurisdictional Conference, the merger shall be affected by a majority vote in the respective annual conferences above-mentioned, subject to agreements regarding organization of the new conference, the distribution of Conference Claimants' funds, property, and any other matters requiring agreement.

"As soon as possible after favorable vote on merger and after consultation with the District Superintendents, the Bishop in charge of the Area in which the state of Arkansas is located shall issue a call for a meeting of the members of the respective Annual Conferences involved herein, for the purpose of organizing the new Annual Conference and the various corporations, boards, commissions, and committees necessary to carry on its work, and taking any other steps which may be needful to provide for the operation of all its affairs."

The resolution was adopted by the Conference.

W. A. Lindsay announced that word had just been received that Mrs. T. A. Hillis, Conference Vice-President of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and mother of Rev. Ralph Hillis, had died. A prayer was offered by the chairman for the bereaved family.

The hymn "America" was sung by the Conference.

Bishop Selecman spoke briefly concerning the theme of "Good Citizenship" and presented Governor Homer M. Adkins who addressed the Conference on Citizenship.

Judge J. E. Moore, Morrilton, addressed the Conference on the "Steward-

ship of the Ballot."

Clyde C. Coulter spoke to the Conference on the work of the Anti-Saloon

League in Arkansas.

The results of ballot number three taken for alternate clerical delegates to the Jurisdictional Conference was read. No one having received a majority of the votes cast, no one was elected. Ballot No. Four was taken.

F. M. Tolleson pronounced the benediction.

EVENING SESSION

The Conference met at 7:30 P. M. with Bishop Selecman presiding. The Hymn No. 149, "In the Cross of Christ I Glory," was sung, after which J. A. Gatlin, District Superintendent of the Jonesboro District, led in prayer. The Hymn No. 400, "Jesus the Name High Over All," was sung. The evening offering was taken, Bishop Selecman offering the offertory prayer. A solo, "Open the Gates," was sung by Mrs. T. N. Bragg of the Russellville Church.

After a message by Harry Dennan, Bishop Selecman, assisted by the

District Superintendents, ordained the following as Deacons:

Question No. 42 was called: Where shall the next session of the Annual Conference be held? R. E. Connell invited the Conference to Morrilton, and the Conference unanimously accepted the invitation.

Miss Lucy Clark, former missionary to China and Cuba, and a member

of the host church, was introduced to the Conference.

The Committee on Worship made announcements concerning the services

in the local churches Sunday.

After various announcements the benediction was pronounced by Ben Few, and the Conference was adjourned till the afternoon session.

REPORTS OF BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

REPORT OF THE PLANNING COMMITTEE

OBJECTIVES

The Conference Committee on Objectives for the Conference year, 1943-1944 makes the following recommendations:

War Work

1. That each Church in the Conference prepare and keep up to date a Service Roll of all men from the Church and Church School Membership who are in the armed service of our country.

2. That a secretary for this Service Men's Roll be continued in each

local church.

3. That the local churches give each man entering the service a Bible. or New Testament.

4. That Church Bulletins and such devotional booklets as the "Upper

Room" and "Service" be sent to the men regularly.

5. That definite plans be worked out in each Church for writing each man at least once a quarter.

6. That especially in larger churches informal groups of "Army Wives

and Parents" be organized.

7. That pastors of all churches losing resident members to the war industries seek to keep in contact with these members in somewhat the same manner as with men in the armed forces, requesting them to become "affiliate members" of the church in the war plant area.

Education

1. That we continue the program of Christian Education along the lines of recent years: Training work; camps and assemblies; institutes; vacation schools; February Special for Hendrix College and Ministerial Training; literature cultivation; Bible Conferences; cooperation in Christian Advance; observance of Special Days, such as Orphanage Day, Race Relations Day, Easter, Church School Day, Methodist Student Day, and Promotion Day.

2. That two major emphases be made throughout the year; increased effort to increase church school membership and attendance, and continuous

effort to improve the teaching program in our church schools.

3. That we cooperate with other boards and agencies in the Bishop's Crusade for a New World Order, and in the work of the Town and Country Commission.

Finance

1. That a Stewardship Committee be elected in every Church, and that this Committee and the Pastor develop and carry on systematicaly a program of Christian Stewardship. Valuable help may be obtained from the little book entitled, "An Adventure in Stewardship," by Doctor G. Ernest Thomas, which may be secured from the General Board of Lay Activities, 740 Rush Street, Chicago, Illinois.
2. That every department in every Church School observe the Fourth

Sunday with a vital and helpful program and with a special offering for World Service and Conference Benevolence.

3. That our Churches continue to increase their acceptances and payments for World Service and Conference Benevolences until they are equal to the apportionments.

Evangelism

That the major campaign of this year be on Visitation Evangelism, including:

1. A simultaneous district-wide Visitation Campaign in each district.

 A Visitation Campaign in each local church.
 Every pastor, not hitherto trained in the technique of Visitation Evangelism, to get the training this year.

Women's Work

- 1. A program of Missionary Education in all age groups leading to Christian action with special emphasis on challenging young people for life service, cooperating with the Youth Department and the Board of Education in the local church.
- 2. Intensive study of Christian literature furnished Woman's Society. That women be willing to accept wider responsibility on church 3.

boards. 4. Increased giving through emphasis on Stewardship.

Home Missions and Church Extension

Cooperation with the War Work emphasis as outlined above.

Cooperation with the other Boards and agencies of the Conference through the Commission on Town and Country Work in a constructive program of strengthening the total life of the rural church.

3. Mission study groups in every local church.

4. Every pastor and pastoral charge assuming responsibility for at least one extension Church School and preaching appointment.

5. Each District with a definite program for establishing a Methodist

Church in new territory.

6. Appropriations directed toward encouraging the repairing of churches and parsonages and the opening up of new territory.

Rural Work

1. Full cooperation will be given to the promotion of the common interests of all the cooperating boards and commissions in the Conference, to the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and to Hendrix College which have to do with the work of the church in rural areas.

The Group Ministry plan of work will be promoted in as many places 2.

as possible.

3. Full cooperation will be given to a more extensive use of the lay

membership of the church and local preachers.

Orphanage and Hospital

1. The Orphanage should be presented Christmas as a Special-and throughout the year to classes, departments, and various organizations of each church.

2. Our Methodist Hospital in Memphis asks that all churches present the claims of the Golden Cross during the second week in May.

The Bible

Each pastor should emphasize throughout the year the very great importance of the Bible:

1. By encouraging daily, prayerful reading of the Scriptures; 2. By observing Universal Bible Sunday, December 12;

3. Preceding Palm Sunday by emphasizing the use of the Bible in Evangelism;

4. By providing individuals with the Bible, or portions of the Scriptures, through the local church.

Lay Activities

We recommend that the district and charge Lay leaders encourage the practice of the Christian Stewardship of time, thought, talent and treasure.

SPECIAL REPORT TO THE TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

At the last Annual Conference the Town and Country Commission was requested "to work out a set of percentages for the Sustentation Fund which shall produce a sum not less than the amount paid this year for said fund, and that said percentages be in conformity with the provisions of Paragraph 559 of the 1940 Discipline.'

Their report is as follows: "The committee has made considerable study of the Fund and are ready to report, but find that in the light of some possible changes in the law governing this fund, at the next General Conference which would require another change in the plan at next Annual Conference, we request that the same plan as has been used this year be continued through next year."

We are living in a time that tests the faith of men. Our men are being called upon for much greater sacrifices during the year to come. Many of our mission fields have been overrun by our enemies, some of our missionaries have been withdrawn, some are in prison. Those who remain are faced by unparalled difficulties. Never before have Methodist missionary leaders at home and abroad faced a situation so full of difficulty and testing.

But nowhere has our work broken down or collapsed. Even in Germany and Japan, as well as occupied China, Belgium, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Bur-

ma, Malaya, and all the rest, Methodism still marches on.

Here in the home field we have emphasized, during the year, the payment of debts on churches and parsonages. The rebuilding of the church and providing of a full time pastor for Jacksonville; and the establishment of the Newton County Mission are some of the endeavors of the Board.

We have supported the work of the Town and Country Commission and rejoice in the splendid cooperating program now being carried forward

through that agency.

We rejoice in the increased giving to World Service.

Dr. Howard Oborn of Paris, Ill., and Missionary Secretary for the Illinois Conference representing the General Board, rendered valuable assistance in our deliberations.

Of the \$10,479.25 there is \$4,288.67 of Ministerial Training Funds and some money not yet apportioned to Arkansas Pastor's School and Hendrix College.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

We should realize the importance of every effort made in the interest of temperance at all times, and especially now, on account of the war situation. We should endeavor to protect both our civilians and our men and women in the armed services of the country. The alcoholic liquor traffic continues its devastating march across this state and the nation. It is taking an increasingly heavy toll physically, mentally, economically and spiritually. Juvenile delinquency is increasing at an alarming rate, and much of it is caused by beer, whisky, etc. And many of the places where alcoholic liquors are sold are breeding-places of immorality and crime, including drunkenness, prostitution and murder. And many of the so-called "legal" sellers are BOOTLEGGERS. The State Revenue Commissioner, as reported in the Arkansas Gazette September 29, 1943, page 15, said: "It is alarming, the number of complaints this department is receiving relative to the amount of legal liquor that is reaching the hands of bootleggers . . .", etc.

The liquor crowd are trying continually to tell the people that the state needs the revenue from the nefarious business. Clyde C. Coulter, Superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League of Arkansas, is authority for the following figures: The per capita revenue to Arkansas from all alcoholic liquors in 1942 was \$1.93—a total of \$3,800,000.00 plus. The money spent by drinkers in Arkansas for such liquors was \$16.93 per capita—a total of \$33,800,000.00 plus. This means a total loss of \$15.00 per capita, (\$30,000,000.00), over and above the revenue. Added to this enormous total must be cost of automobile accidents and crime caused by liquors, which was, for 1942, for Arkansas, \$33,600,000.00 plus. It will be seen from the above that our state suffered a NET LOSS, caused by liquors, last year, of more than \$63,000,000.00 over and above the revenue received.

As great as the economic loss is, the moral and spiritual loss is incalculably greater. (No drunkard shall inherit the kingdom of God.)

It is now clearly seen that the beer-whisky-wine crowd are, with increasing boldness, and IN DESPERATION, trying to contravene the will of the people of Arkansas, (as they are doing in other states), and break down the law. They are chasing all over the state, trying to prevent the holding of local option elections, regardless of how great the number of voters who sign petitions for them. But in spite of the "smart" tricks of the liquor lawyers, nine county-wide local option elections have been held, and ALL of them voted DRY by BIG majorities—some of them, TEN to ONE. Eighteen townships have voted, sixteen of them voting DRY, most of them by large majorities, and ONE of them, 118 to NONE. Ten towns have voted, seven of them voting DRY. The wets have won two townships, three towns and three PRECINCTS. A total of FORTY local option elections held to date, under Act No. 1, and thirty-two of them, including ALL the COUNTY-WIDE campaigns, have been won by the DRYS. We pause just here to give humble thanks to GOD for these successes. All credit and all praise to HIM!

NOW, the "wets see the handwriting on the wall," and they are, as usual, turning to DIRTY tactics—they are trying to bring Act No. 1 before the Supreme Court, claiming that the Act is "UNCONSTITUTIONAL," etc. In this it is confidently believed they will FAIL. Let every Christian pray that they MAY fail.

Because of the above-mentioned facts concerning liquor and the conditions it produces, we do, with all possible stress, denounce and condemn the nefarious business in its entirety. It is a vicious enemy of our homes, churches, schools, and the NATION. It is RIGHT NOW SABOTAGING THE WAR

EFFORT. It is making beer, whisky, etc., from materials that are sorely needed in the prosecution of the war. Truly the liquor traffic is PUBLIC ENEMY No. 1.

WE RECOMMEND:

1. That we continue to give support to all local option election efforts and campaigns.

2. That our pastors frequently, at their own discretion, speak on the evils of alcoholic beverages, and that they urge their people to abstain from drinking them; and we urge constant warfare against the traffic in them.

We recommend the Anti-Saloon League of Arkansas and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and urge our pastors and people to cooperate with these two great Christian organizations in all the phases of their work. We commend the Arkansas Baptist, The Arkansas Methodist, and also the Arkansas Gazette for their support of the TEMPERANCE CAUSE.

4. We again most heartly commend and thank our Governor for his

efforts to have all laws enforced in this state.

5. We recommend that as usual, an offering be taken at this time for

the Anti-Saloon League.

6. We nominate the following-named from North Arkansas Methodist Conference, for re-election to membership on the Board of Directors of the Anti-Saloon League: Rev. Sam M. Yancey, Rev. J. A. Gatlin and Mr. Charles A. Stuck. We nominate, in addition, Mrs. Nels Barnett as a member of that Board.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON EVANGELISM

We recommend that during the ensuing year the Conference major on Visitation Evangelism. It is understood that we do not in any way wish to discredit mass evangelism, or any other effective method of reaching men. The Visitation method is sane, scriptural, and successful. It seems the only method that is making inroads into that vast and ever-increasing non-church population found everywhere. We believe it can be used as well to reach indifferent and irregular members of the church as it can to reach the unchurched people in our communities.

In a meeting during the Arkansas Pastors' School, the Bishop and District Superintendents present, it was agreed that each District should put on a simultaneous district-wide Visitation Campaign. To this end we recommend that each District Superintendent teach or have taught the technique of Visitation Evangelism to all who have not been previously trained, that this be done as soon as possible after the Annual Conference, so that each Pastor may be able to conduct his own campaigns. Where churches are on circuits provision could be made for leaders beside the pastor, or a campaign held later.

These recommendations carefully carried out will give us a conference in which all the pastors are trained in Visitation Evangelism, and will result in each Church having an annual visitation campaign and a continuing program of Evangelism. We believe that these recommendations conscientiously carried out will reach more people and bring them into the church on profession of faith, than have ever been reached before.

We recommend the appointment of Dr. O. E. Goddard as Conference Director of Evangelism. That March 26 be observed as a Day of Consecration in all our churches.

COMMISSION ON PEACE

War and Peace

Dear Brethren:

Christians begin to realize that the cost of a just and enduring peace will compare with the cost of total, global war and demobilization. We pray that the peace may be won as a necessary sequel to armed victory and to this end of a just and enduring peace we enlist the total dedication of our conference.

The Peace Commission

We pledge our support to carry out the present disciplinary program of our church's General Conference's Commission on World Peace.

Memorial for Stronger Peace Legislation

We hereby memorialize the coming General Conference to strengthen this work of the Commission with increasing support and effectiveness commensurate with that given to other World Service Boards and Commissions.

The Bishop's Crusade

We pledge our unanimous cooperation as ministers, laymen and churches of the North Arkansas conference to the full support of the membership of our Bishop in the Crusade For a Christian World Order January 9-23, 1944.

Oriental Immigration

We commend the efforts now being made in our National Congress to give to China an immigration quota of approximately 100 per year. We also endorse the movement led by returned missionary, Dr. Walter Judd, now in Congress, to place all orientals on an immigration quota. In this we support our church's press and Missionary leadership.

Fellowship With Japanese-American Methodists

We record our vicarious sufferings with American citizens of Japanese ancestry in government relocation camps, and pledge our unbroken fellowship with our Methodist ministers and laymen in the camps.

We grieve with these citizens and fellow Christians in the rare legislative action and overt discrimination occasionally taking place and pledge our "all out" Christian attitudes and communication of accurate facts in the face of such inequities.

Methodist Conscientious Objectors

We approve and commend our churches throughout the conference in making voluntary, special contributions to support Methodist Conscientious objectors to armed service, who are now in Civilian Public Service Camps. Our conference is aware that such objectors and camps are in keeping with the General Conference legislation and the government's Selective Service program. Each Conscientious objector is charged with his own responsibility for \$35.00 monthly expenses while in camp.

Reconciliation Midst Racial Tensions

We agree with the Oxford conference statement, that "Distinctions of race are a part of God's purpose to enrich mankind with a diversity of gifts. Against racial pride or race antagonism the church must set its face implacably as rebellion against God."

We assume that our first responsibility is to demonstrate within our own church fellowship the reality of the Christian community as God intends it. In Christ there is "neither Jew nor Greek, bond nor free; for ye are all one in Christ."

We determine to put down unfounded rumors of racial discriminations and social uprisings. We will use every possible means to check the truth of such reports. Thus can the church help to interpret community relationships in ways consistent with Christian fellowship.

We commend churches in arranging informal gatherings of white and colored Christian leaders for mutual exchange of information and viewpoints, for the building of increasing understanding, cooperation and community welfare.

The Christian Mind for Peace

We unite our minds for peace in behalf of our political leaders throughout the world, especially those of our own nation, and pledge a copy of these resolutions to be sent to our state Governor, to our congressmen and to the President of the United States of America.

COMMITTEE ON THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

We, your committee on the American Bible Society, beg leave to make the

following report:

Inexpensive BIBLES and TESTAMENTS are necessary in all our missionary work both at home and abroad. Only the American Bible Society furnishes us these inexpensive BIBLES and TESTAMENTS. We easily grow eloquent in eulogizing the BIBLE as a book and also in praising the American Bible Society for publishing it in a thousand tongues and dialects, and at a nominal cost within the reach of all. But when it comes to doing something about this matter in a realistic way, it is tragically little that we actually do

If you wish to know how little we read the BIBLE, ask the next crowd you are in just a few simple questions with reference to the BIBLE. If you wish to know how little financial support we are giving the American Bible Society, just remember that the average Methodist Church is contributing to the American Bible Society only \$1.20 a year. The entire Methodist Church gave through its regular channels to the American Bible Society last year \$51,813, or a little more than six-tenths of a cent per member. All this in spite of the fact of the American Bible Society's appalling need for funds today with which to carry on in the midst of the higher cost of everything.

Because of this lack of funds the American Bible Society is unable to furnish with BIBLES many people who are calling for copies of the Scriptures. With these disturbing facts in mind we make only two recommenda-

tions:

1. That we ourselves begin now to read the BIBLE much more than we have been reading it.

2. That we begin at once to pray daily for the American Bible Society till there is born in our souls a conscience on supporting it with our means.

4. That the Pastor and a Church Director, appointed by him, direct the campaign in the local church, and that a complete canvass of the homes of the membership of our church be made during Arkansas Methodist Week for new subscriptions and renewal of subscriptions to The Arkansas Methodist.

5. That the Circulation Campaign in the local church be completed within the eight days set by the Annual Conference for that work, where at all

 6. That each Pastor, on blanks to be furnished, make a report to the District Superintendent and to the office of The Arkansas Methodist on Monday, January 17th, of the results of the Campaign in his charge.
- 7. That The Arkansas Methodist, in the last week of January, as for the last two years, carry a full report by Districts and Charges of the results of the Campaign throughout the state, with additional reports in following weeks to include the results of any follow-up work necessary to complete the Campaign in the local church.
- 8. That a quota of one subscription for each seven active members be assigned to the Districts, and that this total accepted by the District be apportioned to the Charges of the District, on the same basis, at the post-conference Set-up Meetings.
- 9. That the subscription price of The Arkansas Methodist remain at one dollar and twenty-five cents per year.

BOARD OF CONFERENCE CLAIMANTS

From the funds on hand the Board of Conference Claimants apportioned the amount of eight dollars and fifty cents per service year to the superannuates, and the same amount on the basis of adjusted service years to widows; with additional amounts and adjustments to some from the emergency fund.

It has been reported to this board that eighteen conferences have increased their apportionment a total of twelve per cent over the previous year which emphasizes the fact that we are far lower than other conferences adjoining us, and with the full realization that the amount we pay is entirely inadequate for anything like a reasonable support for these worthy claimants it is apparent that there can be no better time for us to do more for them. Therefore, we urge that this conference appropriate for the next conference year an amount equal to ten per cent of the amount to be paid for pastor's salaries.

filed as a part of this report.

We also request the conference to authorize and empower the Board of Conference Claimants to file articles of incorporation with the secretary of state for the purpose of incorporation as provided by the laws of the State of Arkansas.
