JOURNAL

FIRST DAY-EVENING SESSION

The One Hundred Ninth Session of the North Arkansas Conference of The Methodist Church convened at the First Methodist Church in Morrilton, Arkansas, at 7:30 p. m., October 31, 1944, with Bishop Paul E. Martin presiding.

After an organ prelude by J. Glenn Metcalf, of the Music Department of Hendrix College, the National Anthem was sung. Hymn No. 402, "And Are We Yet Alive," was sung as the opening hymn of the Conference. J. Albert Gatlin, District Superintendent of the Jonesboro District, led in prayer.

The Secretary made announcement concerning the method of checking the attendance of lay and clerical members of the Conference. A check on the attendance records showed 143 clerical, 32 accepted supplies, and 83

lay delegates present.

James Upton was elected Secretary. James T. Randle and Ewing T. Wayland were elected Assistant Secretaries, and Joe A. Goetz was elected Conference Statistician.

Upon the vote of the Conference, the Chairman appointed an Auditing Committee to audit the minutes of the Conference and report to the Conference at each session. The following Committee was appointed: Edward W. Harris, W. V. Womack, and C. N. Guice.

By order of the Conference the main Sanctuary and the north wing was fixed as the bar of the Conference and the hour for the opening of the morning sessions was fixed at 8:30 A. M. and the hour for the closing of the morning session was fixed at 12:15 P. M.

An address of welcome was made by Judge John G. Moore, Chairman of the Official Board of the host church. Appropriate words of response were

made by Bishop Martin.

Bishop Martin announced that the gavel being used to call this session to order was a special gift of friends in Wichita Falls, Texas. The gavel was made from the door jam of the first Methodist Church built west of the Allegheny Mountains. This church was built in 1784 and dedicated in 1786 by Bishop Francis Asbury.

MEMORIAL SERVICE

E. W. Faulkner, chairman of the Committee on Memoirs, at the request of Bishop Martin, took the chair. The Hymn 521, It Singeth Low In Every Heart, was sung. Jefferson Sherman led in prayer, after which an appropriate Responsive Reading was read. The Hendrix Choristers sang an anthem. Irl Bridenthal read selected portions of the fourteenth chapter of the Gospel of John, and Jason W. Moore secretary of the Committee on Memoirs read the list of those who had died since the last Annual Conference. The following names were read: J. W. Dew, Eli N. Bickley, R. S. Hayden, Mrs. L. E. Mann, and Mrs. J. C. Shipp. G. G. Davidson preached the Memorial Sermon. The Doxology was sung.

COMMUNION SERVICE

Bishop Martin, assisted by the District Superintendents, led the Conference in the observance of the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. during the Communion Service was under the direction of J. Glenn Metcalf and the Hendrix Choristers. Bishop Martin pronounced the benediction and the conference adjourned.

SECOND DAY

MORNING SESSION

The Conference met at 8:30 with Bishop Martin presiding. The Hymn No. 23, "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing" was sung after which James W. Workman led in prayer. The Chairman appointed C. N. Guice as song leader for the Conference. Bishop Martin read selected verses from the eighth chapter of the Book of Romans and brought a spiritual message on "The Christian Responses to Life." Hymn No. 213, "My Faith Looks Up To e," concluded the morning devotion.

E. W. Harris read the report of the Audit Committee of the minutes of

the previous session. On the recommendation of the committee the minutes

were approved.

The report of the Planning Committee was presented by Ira A. Brumley,

Chairman of the Planning Committee. This report was adopted.

J. Albert Gatlin asked for a point of privilege and presented to Bishop Martin a Gavel, a gift from J. W. Moore and E. G. Kaetzell. The gavel was made from a piece of wood taken from Old Louise Chapel, the oldest Methodist Church in Mississippi County. Bishop Martin responded with words of appreciation for the gift.

The Chairman appointed the following to serve as a Courtsey Committee:

James W. Workman, Elmer H. Hook, and R. E. Connell.

Announcements were made by the Secretary in regard to corrections to be made of inistakes in last year's Journal. Those who had not filled out attendance cards were asked to do so.

H. Lynn Wade presented Dr. A. G. Henderson, Layman of Imboden, to th Conference. It was noted that Dr. Henderson had attended more sessions of this Annual Conference than any other layman present.

Question No. 6 was called: What are the reports of the District Superintendents as to the status of the work within their Districts?

Wiggins, Secretary of the Cabinet, read the report, as follows:

We, your district superintendents, are quite happy to bring before this conference a report of the eight districts of the North Arkansas Conference. We feel that you will agree that this has been a year of sacrificial living, untiring devotion and heroic work on the part of both pastors and laymen.

A total of 5,946 persons have been received into the church during the year with 2,890 of them upon profession of faith. 3,052 were received by transfer of membership. The Jonesboro District leads in the work of evangelism with 1,141 additions with 645 of this number on profession of faith. This

is an overall increase of 43% over the previous year.

18 young men were licensed to preach. 8 were licensed under the leadership of Rev. H. Lynn Wade, in the Paragould District. Seven young men were recommended to this annual conference for admission on trial. 9 of our ministers have been recommended for ordination as elders and 5 are before us for deacon's orders. From reports of the district superintendents it appears that 8 of our preachers will ask to be retired.

Your reports indicate some 510 Church Schools with a total enrollment of 56,037. Pastor's report show 14,870 in the children's division, a gain of 21; 13,473 in the youth division, a loss of 1,057; and 18,243 in the adult

division or a gain of 48.

129 Vacation Church Schools enrolled 4,439 persons, while 2,247 were lled in accredited Leadership Schools and classes. This also shows a enrolled in accredited Leadership Schools and classes.

gain over 1943.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service reported 262 units of organiz-

ation, with a total membership of 8,693.

The valuation of the church property of the conference is \$5,111,436 with indebtedness of only \$47,330. Pastors report payments on indebtedness totaling \$38,095. Churches and parsonages have been improved during the year by \$189,282. Churches have been constructed at Ravenden Springs, and New Liberty and one at Fourth Street Rector is under construction, all

in the Paragould District. In the Jonesboro District on the Joiner charge, an old building, perhaps the oldest church in Mississippi County, has been torn down and a very attractive chapel built in its place. Under the District Missionary program three church buildings have been secured. In the Helena District one of the most beautiful churches in the state is nearing completion at West Memphis, at a cost of approximately \$84,000. In the Searcy District a new church is under constriction at Jasper and a parsonage at Pangburn. In the Conway District a new parsonage has been bought at Washington Avenue. In the Fayetteville District the Bethel Church in South Fayetteville has been completed and the church at Goshen is under construction. Work has begun on the parsonage at Huntsville. A splendid parsonage has been bought at Siloam Springs.

The indebtedness in the Fort Smith District has been decreased materially. This includes \$7,000 at Goddard Memorial, \$19,800 at First Church Fort Smith, \$1,100 at Charleston, \$100 at Ozark and \$107 at Altus. Parsonages all over the conference have undergone extensive repairs and improvements. The Searcy District reports such at Harrison, Searcy, Kensett, Judsonia, Augusta, McCrory, Clinton, Leslie, Marshall, Heber Springs and Valley Springs. The Fayetteville District reports extensive improvements at

Fayetteville, Prairie Grove, Springdale and Green Forest.

Building funds are on hand at Blytheville, Osceola, and Dell for new churches and at Marked Tree for a new parsonage.

The high point on World Service and Conference Benevolences will be found in the Helena District. They paid their full apportionment, which represents 30% over last year. Batesville First Church is the only church in the conference paying more on benevolences than they pay on salary. They were apportioned \$1,500, accepted \$2,300 and paid over \$3,600. The fine response on benevolences throughout the conference has been most gratify-The conference assumed \$72,381 and paid \$75,000. In addition you contributed to the Week of Dedication, Overseas Relief and World Communion a total of \$11,232. To the orphanage you gave \$5,396 and to the February Special \$10,496. As your District Superintendents we desire to express our sincere gratitude for the growing interest and concern among our people toward the sacred interests of our church.

The parsonage homes have contributed 121 young men and women to the service of our country and our conference has sent nine of its finest young men into the chaplaincy. Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Howard have seven sons in

the service and one of them is reported missing.

Shortly after the last annual conference Rev. E. H. Hook brought to

the Goddard Memorial parsonage a charming bride.

The District Superintendents would like to take this opportunity to share with you our own personal loss in the transfer to the skies of our beloved co-worker Rev. R. S. Hayden. We found him to be sincere and true, a trusted counsellor, a friend to every man in the conference, a wise and unselfish leader and a conscientious and devoted Christian.

We would also like to take this method of expressing our great appreciation of the fine work done by Rev. Ira A. Brumley in leading the district to a happy culmination of the work of the year. Rev. Brumley carried on this work in addition to his work as Executive Secretary of Education. His fine spirit, his untiring work and his excellent leadership is all appreciated by the entire conference.

Other parsonage homes have felt the loss of loved ones and their lives and contribution to the church were beautifully commemorated in the service last evening.

"Isn't it funny how a baby, Not as big as half a minute, Can turn a life just upside down And put such gladness in it."

Eight homes have experienced the thrill of new arrivals in parsonages this year and to each we extend hearty congratulations.

We share with this conference and the entire Episcopal Area the great joy and thrill of anticipation of what lies ahead of us under the leadership of our new leader, Bishop Paul E. Martin. He has shown such rare ability in all our cabinet sessions in understanding men and situations, in seeking all possible light in each case before making decisions, and in his general leadership of the conference. He has won us all by his gracious manner, his deep scholarship, his spirit of brotherliness, and his great concern for every interest of the church. We pledge to him our unswerving loyalty and unstinted cooperation.

Martin spoke on the place of the Minister in the Crusade for Christ. After a period of dedication in prayer, and the singing of Hymn No. 278, the Conference was adjourned with the Benediction by H. Lynn Wade.

REPORTS OF BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

COMMITTEE ON OBJECTIVES FOR THE CONFERENCE YEAR 1944-1945

The Conference Committee on Objectives makes the following recommendations under these specified heads:

General

That the Conference set as an objective the organization of at least one new church and the reestablishment of at least one abandoned church in each District each year of the Quadrennium.

War Work

1. That each church in the Conference prepare and keep up to date a Service Roll of all men from the Church and Church School membership who are in the armed service of our country.

That a secretary for this Service Men's Roll be continued in each

local church.

3. That local churches give each man entering the service a Bible, New Testament, or some such book as "Strength for Service to God and Country" or "Abundant Living."

4. That church bulletins and such devotional booklets as the "Upper Room" be sent to the men regularly.
5. That definite plans be made in each church for writing service men and women at least once a quarter.

6. That, especially in larger churches, informal groups of "Army Wives and Parents" be organized.

7. That pastors of all churches losing resident members to war industries seek to keep in contact with these members in somewhat the same manner as with men in the armed forces, requesting them to become "affiliate members" of the church in the war plant area.

Education

1. That we cooperate with all other agencies in the Crusade For Christ,

and in the program of the Town and Country Commission.

2. That two major emphases be made throughout the year: increased effort to increase the enrollment and attendance in the activities of the church school; and a continuous effort to improve the qualit of the teaching program.

3. That we promote a series of activities to encourage our youth to give

themselves for part-time or full-time service in the church.

4. That we seek to enlist or re-enlsit the adult life of the church for a

greater educational program.

5. That a Conference-wide cultivation program for church school superintendents be carried out during 1944-1945.

Finances

1. That each Church, which has not heretofore accepted and paid in full the askings for World Service and Conference Benevolences, accept and pay at least ten per cent more than it accepted for the year 1943-1944; and that each Church, which accepted and paid the askings in full, accept and pay not less than it did for the year 1943-1944.

2. That at least every station charge observe the Fourth Sunday in each month with a special cultivation program, and take a special offering for World Service and Conference Benevolences which shall be paid in ad-

dition to the amount accepted by the Quarterly Conference.

3. That the District Superintendents and Pastors and lay leaders regularly give our people information which shall enable them to know and appreciate the great and tragic needs of the people of the world for that which our Christ and His Church alone can give them, and that will cause them to be glad to accept and pay in full the askings for World Service and Conference Benevolences.

4. That we do our best to raise our apportionments in the Crusade for

Christ.

Evangelism

1. That three special evangelistic campaigns be held in each church during this year: a home visitation campaign, a pre-Easter campaign, and a mass evangelism campaign.

2. Tht the Board of Evangelism look forward to the placing in the

field a Conference Director of Evangelism.

Women's Work

1. That we seek to develop an increasing awareness of God's presence and guidance in the lives of the individual members of the Woman's Society.

2. That we give full cooperation in the objectives of the Crusade for

Christ.

3. That we promote educational development of members through monthly programs, study courses, and the reading of Christian Literature.

4. That we assist in the enlistment of business women in the Wesleyan

Service Guild.

That we promote missionary education of students, youth and children,

6. That we encourage increased sharing of time, abilities and material resources, through church and community activities.

Home Missions and Church Extension

That every church cooperate with the Town and Country Commission in its constructive program of strengthening the total life of the rural church.

2. That every local church organize mission study groups.

3. That every pastor and pastoral charge assume responsibility for at least one extension Church School and preaching appointment.

That each District have a definite program for establishing a Metho-

dist Church in new territory.

5. That appropriations be directed toward encouraging the repair of churches and parsonages and the opening up of new territory.

Rural Work

That all the agencies of the Conference cooperate with the Town and Country Commission in its program for improving the work of the church in rural areas, especially as follows:

1. By entering and establishing the work of the church in neglected

areas.

2. By uniting all churches in a "Natural area" in a cooperative effort

to meet the total needs of the area.

3. By undertaking to build a Conference-wide program which will become the policy of the conference in dealing with the work of the church in rural areas.

4. By cooperating in an expanded youth program for rural churches.5. By cooperating in an expanded educational program for pastors of town and country churches.

6. By urging all churches to observe Rural Life Sunday.

Orphanage and Hospital

1. That the Arkansas Methodist Home for children be presented to every congregation in December for a special offering and throughout the year to classes, departments and other organizations in every local church.

That our Methodist Hospital in Memphis be brought to the attention of every congregation during the second week in May and the Golden Cross Offering be taken at that time.

The Bible

That every pastor cooperate with the American Bible Society in a special effort to get our people to read as much as possible in the Bible during the period from Thanksgiving to Christmas.

2. That we observe Universal Bible Sunday in December.

3. That we offer our people the opportunity of assisting The American Bible Society financially.

Lay Activities

1. That our laymen give full support to the entire program of the Church.

In addition to the recommendations to the Committee on Objectives, the Planning Committee as a whole makes the following recommendations to the Annual Conference:

1. That the Annual Conference instruct the old Boards, Commissions, and Committees to carry on their work until the end of the Annual Conference session, the new Boards, Commissions and Committees to meet for organization only.

2. That a committee appointed by the chairman of the Planning Committee submit a special report to the Annual Conference on the Standing Rules of the Conference. (Rev. W. Henry Goodloe, Rev. E. B. Williams and

Mr. E. Wainwright Martin were named as this committee.)

3. That the Conference Treasurer close his books for the year at Monday noon, October 30, making distribution of all funds in the hand at that time; funds coming in later to be carried over into the following year.

4. That the date for the Arkansas Methodist Circulation Campaign be December 31, 1944-January 7, 1945 (this date moved ahead for the sake of

the Crusade for Christ).

5. That the Hendrix Special, ordinarily emphasized during the month of February, be given emphasis on the first Sunday in June for this conference year, in order that the Crusade for Christ be given right-of-way in February.

6. That the Arkansas Methodist Orphanage Offering be emphasized and taken in every church during the month of December, rather than be

restricted to the Sunday before Christmas.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND SUPPLY TO THE NORTH ARKANSAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE, NOVEMBER 2, 1944

The Conference is aware of the difficulties under which the Board of Ministerial Training and Supply tried to meet its responsibilities during the past quadrennium. In this process of transition from our former system there has been much confusion, uncertainty and some embarrassment. We regret this and express our sincere appreciation for the patience of the Conference and the ministers who were involved.

The Board has followed the plan of directing all study through the Correspondence School of Southern Methodist University and the courses

offered in the Arkansas Pastor's School.

In addition to the regular work of the undergraduates who followed the course of study leading to admission in the Annual Conference, our records show that forty-five of our Accepted Supply pastors have been taking training. Thirty-one of the Accepted Supply pastors have failed to

take any course in this training program.

Through cooperation of the Board of Education we have been able to pay the tuition fees in the Correspondence School for those who were working on their course of study. Three hundred dollars has been received by the Treasurer of our Board from the Board of Education and used for this purpose.

An alternate course of study is now available to the Accepted Supply pastors and we recommend that the Conference authorize the Board of Ministerial Training and Supply to adopt and use this simple plan where desired.

the Conference Board of Ministerial Training.

That the following Boards and agencies be requested to appoint two representatives each to a joint Committee which should be given authority to develop a policy of Ministerial Training in the Conference and determine how this policy shall be administered: 1, Board of Ministerial Training; 2, Board of Education; 3, The Cabinet; 4, Hendrix College.

3. That Bishop Martin be requested to convene the Committee and act

as a member of the Committee.

4. We request that various groups in the Conference present their ideas and plans on ministerial training to this Committee.

REPORT OF THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY COMMITTEE

The American Bible Society, as the agent of the Protestant Churches of America has completed 128 years of heroic service in the publication and distribution of Bibles, Testaments, and portions of the Scriptures. It is now publishing the Scriptures in more than 1,000 tongues and dialects. It still craves a place in our prayers and a share of our gifts that it may more

effectually meet the need arising from the present crisis.

The American Bible Society is now adding to its work of publishing and distributing the Scriptures, the new work of trying to get the indifferent to read the Bible. From Thanksgiving to Christmas there will be a special effort made to get a large number of civilians at home to unite with as many men and women in the armed forces as possible in the reading of outstanding chapters in the Bible—reading one chapter a day. Our own church along with 31 other denominations is formally committed to this program.

The committee on The American Bible Society requests this conference to go on record as entering wholeheartedly into an effort to make the nationwide Bible reading season from Thanksgiving to Christmas a great success.

REPORT OF THE TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

In accordance with the order of the Annual Conference in session at Russellville, Arkansas, November 3-7, 1943, the Town and Country Commission brings the following report on the Sustentation Fund for adoption by the Annual Conference:

Section I

Organization and Administration

- 1. The Conference Treasurer shall be the treasurer of the Sustentation fund.
- The Town and Country Commission shall nominate and the Annual Conference shall elect, a committee of three which shall be responsible for administering the Sustentation fund,

3. The Town and Country Commission shall be responsible for the pro-

motion of the Sustentation fund.

4. The Conference Treasurer shall transmit all Sustentation funds to the treasurer of the Board of Missions and Church Extension who shall issue all checks on order of the committee elected to administer the funds.

5. District Superintendents are urged to inquire at the fourth quarterly conference whether the Sustentation funds for the year have been paid by

the pastor and his charge.

6. District Superintendents shall report to the committee responsible for administering the funds not later than the first day of the Annual Conference session the names of all pastors eligible for participation in said fund together with complete information of income including salary and those items; 2, 3, and 4, listed in section III of this report.

7. Distribution of the Sustentation fund shall be made to the proper

persons sometime during the session of the annual conference.

8. Expenses incidental to the administration of the fund shall be paid on order of the Town and Country Commission from the fund before distribution is made to the claimants.

Section III

Distribution of Sustentation Fund

Basis of Participation:

1. Payments shall be made from the sustentation fund to the pastors receiving less than \$1,000.00 salary on a percentage basis. The maximum deficit which shall be considered in computing payments shall be \$400.00.

2. Pension payments to retired ministers serving charges shall be count-

ed as part of the salary.

3. Missionary appropriations to charges shall be counted as part of

the salary.

- 4. Income from other sources such as teaching school, farming, real estate business, and any other activities not in direct connection with the work of the church shall be counted as part of the salary of those who are to benefit from the sustentation fund.
- 5. Student pastors, on account of the part time nature of their service to the pastoral charge, shall participate to the extent of fifty per cent only of

the amount payable on the full-time basis.

6. Scholarship aid to students serving as pastors shall not be counted

as part of their salary.

7. No pastor serving a station charge shall be eligible for sustentation benefits unless passed upon by the committee administering the funds or the Town and Country Commission.

8. A pastor serving less than a full conference year shall participate

in the sustentation fund only in proportion to time served.

9. No pastor shall receive more than an amount equal to 100 percent of his deficit.

The Town and Country Commission Recommends,

That the work of the commission be continued and that Rev. Glenn F.

Sanford be appointed as Executive Secretary.

That the Board of Education, the Board of Missions and Church Extension, the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the Board of Lay Activities continue their financial cooperation for the coming year.

That from the Sustentation funds made available for distribution at this conference session no pastor shall receive more than 100% of his deficit.

That the work of the Commission place emphases on the following phases of work:

1. By entering and establishing the church in neglected areas.

2. By promoting the "group ministry" type of work in the "natural areas."

3. By cooperating in a youth program especially adapted to the small rural church.

4. By cooperating in an expanded program for pastors in Town and Country. The work to be in the field of practical methods.

5. By undertaking to build a conference-wide program which will become the policy of the conference in reaching and serving rural areas.

6. By giving help in an expanded Lay-program.

7. By urging all local churches to observe RURAL Life Sunday.

The spirit of cooperation between the Boards, the Woman's Society of Christian Service has made the work of the Commission possible.

We ask the following budget be adopted: Salary \$3,300.00; House rent \$400.00, Travel expense \$300.00, Office rent and supplies \$300.00.

We wish to express appreciation to Mr. E. Wainright Martin for his fine service as Treasurer of the Commission.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERENCE

- 1. Drunkenness is steadily increasing in Arkansas and throughout America wherever liquors are sold openly. The liquor "termites" are weakening the very foundations of homes, churches, and the nation itself. Drs. Haggard and Jellinek, of the Yale University School of Alcohol Studies state in their book "Alcohol Explored," there are now 13,000,000 women and 27,000,000 men drinking liquors in America—40,000,000 total. Among these are approximately 2,500,000 CHRONIC ALCOHOLICS—hopeless drunkards; and to the ranks of these victims of alcohol are being added 40,000 to 60,000 each year. The situation is indeed tragic—a menace to every phase of American life.
- 2. One of the great PUBLIC HEALTH problems in America now, is ALCOHOLISM. When the SOURCE of some dread disease is discovered, immediate action is taken to destroy the source. Alcoholism is a disease—a HORRIBLE disease—which destroys body, mind and soul. The Christian conscience DEMANDS the complete extermination of the foul disease-breeding traffic in alcoholic liquors. Every Christian should feel a burning hatred against it and help to destroy it.
- 3. Both juvenile and adult delinquency have reached an alarming stage throughout the nation including Arkansas. Crime is increasing, and MUCH of the crime is caused by liquors. And J. Edgar Hoover, Director of the

F. B. I., states that "-a creeping rot of moral disintegration is eating into our nation." What a challenge to every decent man and woman especially

to Christians!

4. Drinkers in America spent for liquors last year SIX BILLION DOL-LARS—\$46.00 for each man, woman and child in the country—\$16,438,00—for each day in the year. CRIME caused by liquors cost America SIX BIL-LION MORE. These enormous sums stagger the imagination. At \$1,000,000 per year, it would require 12,000 years to pay what the booze racket cost America in one year—1943. And we sing "God Bless America"!

5. Drinkers in Arkansas spent for liquors last year, nearly \$29,000,000

and AUTO accidents caused by liquors cost the state \$1,500,000 plus. CRIME caused by liquors cost the state \$30,700,000 plus. These three items alone total more than \$60,000,000. The WETS "holler" much about the REVENUE

they pay. Each \$1.00 of "revenue" from liquors costs above \$19.00.

6. We urgently recommend that our pastors preach against drinking and against the entire "booze racket." We urge all members of our churches to abstain from drinking beer, whiskey, wine, etc., and from buying it or selling it, and from renting property for the manufacture or sale of it. We urge them to prayerfully work for the extermination of the traffic in beverage alcohol, for it is an enemy to the individual, the home, the church, the NATION, the Divine Kingdom.

7. We recommend that our pastors and people cooperate vigorously in local option election campaigns in their counties, etc. Local leaders who want to start such campaigns should write to the Anti-Saloon League of Arkansas, Donaghey Building, Little Rock, who will furnish petitions, helps,

etc., and work with them in planning and carrying through the campaigns.

8. Twenty county-wide local option elections have been held already since Act No. 1 became effective, Jan. 1, 1943, and 15 of them voted DRY. Others are now in preparation. We request that \$400.00 be appropriated to this board.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

"The supreme aim of missions is to make the Lord Jesus Christ known to all peoples in all lands as their divine Savior, to persuade them to become his disciples, and to gather these disciples into Christian Churches; to enlist them in the building of the Kingdom of God; to co-operate with these churches; to promote world Christian fellowship; and to bring to bear on all human life the spirit and principles of Christ." (Discipline)

To this end, your conference board is trying to carry on. We are glad to believe that the church as a whole is also keeping step in the stupendous undertaking before us. Never before perhaps, has there been such confusion in the world. Every phase of life has been touched and many plans confused but not thwarted. Men who have served in the places remote from our home bases have dared to move on whenever possible. Even home forces

have had to contend against the stress and strain of war.

While we recognize the presence of difficulties, we are glad to report that there is every evidence of real heroism in the work of Missions and Church Extension within the borders of our conference. Increased liberality is apparent. A greater number of churches have accepted the askings and have paid them. This has not all been done by the ministers in charge, but many of our lay members have accepted the challenge and have made this procedure possible.

In the field of churches and parsonages, there has been much in the way of building and repairing even with great restrictions; funds have been made available for a general building program as soon as conditions warrant; and debts, some of them of long standing, have been cleared away. With

all of this, we take courage and move on to greater things.

We urge each church to enter wholeheartedly and enthusiastically into the Crusade for Christ with its five goals: Increase in church-school enrollment and attendance; the contribution of \$25,000,000 for post war reconstruction; the Church-Wide Program of Evangelism; teaching the practice of Christian Stewardship, continuing the crusade for a New World Order.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON EVANGELISM

A new day for Evangelism has dawned upon American Methodism. The last General Conference was the most distinctively Evangelistic in spirit ever held on this Continent. The Methodist Church now gives Evangelism an honored place such as it should have had from the beginning. In the great Crusade for Christ during the ensuing quadrennium Evangelism has a most conspicuous place, and a large opportunity. Mass evangelism is coming back in a saner form than hitherto. The mobile condition of our population now offers a challenge for Mass Evangelism such as we have not had for half a century. Home Visitation Evangelism is winning its thousands for Christ. The Pre-Easter Campaign is to be made more effective than ever before. Let us thank God and take courage, and rejoice that Evangelism is coming into its own. The main task of the Church is still the winning of the lost to Christ, the conversion of the world, and Evangelism by any Christian method is the carrying forward of the work.

We recommend:

I. That a complete survey or religious census be made in every charge for use in Visitation Work and as a guide in all evangelistic efforts.

II. That three Evangelistic Campaigns be held in Every Church during the year.

A Home Visitation Campaign.
 A Pre-Easter Campaign.
 A Mass Evangelistic Campaign.

We suggest also that a Church Loyalty Campaign put on in the Fall from World Communion Sunday to the First in November, called Family Sunday, may be used effectively to reach indifferent Church Members.

We recommend that our Pastors suggest and promote the reading of

the Bible, using the daily readings printed by the American Bible Society

for use from Thanksgiving till Christmas.

III. We recommend if practicable that the Conference employ a Conference Evangelist, and that the District Superintendents, with the Chairman of the Conference Board of Evangelism be made a steering committee to fix his dates and otherwise direct his activities. We are grateful to Mr. Homer Pierce of Morrilton for his generous offer to assist in supporting this project.

IV. We recommend the appointment of G. C. Taylor as Conference

Director of Evangelism for the ensuing year.

That the World Service Commission appropriate the same percent-

age as formerly for the expenses of this Board.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

We believe that the Conference Society is a strong and forward-moving organization of the church. It sometimes seems otherwise because infrequent and inadequate reports from some sections, obscure the view. too, disturbed family life—moving from place to place, mothers at work outside the home—and other factors, have further clouded the picture.

There are some facts which reveal the direction of the movement of the Woman's Society, and register its momentum. Fourteen new societies have been organized in 1944, while at the same time nine have ceased to send reports and are presumed to be dead. Two hundred fifty-five societies are alive and functioning. The 8,198 members enrolled, have pledged \$23,590 which will be paid by the end of the year. They are also completing the Esther Case Scholarship Fund of \$10,000 at Scarritt College, which was started in 1943.

Three young women are preparing to enter Scarritt College for training in 1945, while others are completing their preparatory work. Ministerial members of this conference have been helpful in encouraging recruits. Two of the three who expect to go to Scarritt are from Minister's homes-Miss Ruth Sutherland, and Miss Betty Jane Claud. Another recruit is Miss Marilyn Hindman whose father and mother are both members (ministers) of this conference. Miss Dorothy Daughtery of Walnut Ridge was helped in making her decision for life service, by her pastor and the District Superin-

Ministers have also given assistance in securing funds for the Scarritt Scholarship, more than one district having emphasized this at the spring

meetings.

The members of the Woman's Society of Christian Service have accomplished much of a local character. They have taken over some of the responsibility formerly carried by men in church and civic life, and this at a time when they have been hard-pressed by extra duties in the home.

We believe that the extra effort put forth has resulted in a stronger

Society whose look is outward and upward.

and Mrs. Lane has also done a good year's work.

A. Hospital: 1. That J. Frank Fogleman (Marion), Mrs. Tom Tucker (Hughes), J. H. Crain (Wilson), H. K. Barwick (Wynne), Rev. J. A. Womack and Rev. Paul V. Galloway be Trustees of the Hospital from the North Arkansas Conference. 2. That the apportionment of \$2,700 be given. 3. That Golden Cross Week be May 13-20 and that Rev. Cecil R. Culver be Golden Cross Director assisted by Rev. Kenneth Shamblin and Rev. H. Lynn Wade; and that the funds be sent to the Methodist Hospital where 90% will be used by the Golden Cross and 10% be turned over to this Board for Cultiva-

tion and expense of this Campaign.

B. Homes: 1. That December be Orphanage month; the offering taking as near to Christmas as convenient and that all churches take this offering. 2. That Rev. Sam B. Wiggins, Rev. H. M. Lewis, Rev. E. T. Wayland, Rev. Paul V. Galloway, E. B. Belshe, and R. J. Rice be the Orphanage Trustees. 3. That the apportionment of \$2,000 be given.

C. Reports: This Board of Hospitals and Homes has examined the reports of the Hospital and the Home for Children and find them accurate

and good; and further that we recommend that they be published in The Arkansas Methodist.

Bishop Paul E. Martin and brethren of the North Arkansas Conference:

During the past 12 months we have admitted 12,794 patients, an increase of 429 over last year. There was an increase of 5,462 days' treatment, the average daily occupancy for the year just closing being 290, an increase of eleven. There was a slight decline in the number of births. In addition, 3,030 patients were admitted to the Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Hospital and 10,382 patients received treatment in the Out-patient Department alone. The Eye, Ear, Nose and Throat Hospital, under our ownership and management has received splendid patronage and it is becoming necessary to give serious thought to the future expansion of this facility.

A year ago the outstanding mortgage indebtedness on the two hospitals amounted to \$562,000.00; as of November 27, this indebtedness will be reduced

to \$382,000.00.

Our School of Nursing has 244 students, all but 25 of whom are members of the United States Cadet Nurse Corps. The total number of nurses in training is about 50 greater than we have housing accommodations for, so these students are being housed and taught at Memphis State College. The hospital is seriously handicapped in its services by the absence in the Armed Services of many of our Staff physicians and surgeons.

The Golden Cross Enrollment for the year just closing again shows a

considerable increase over last year, due to the enthusiastic and wholehearted support given this movement by all the ministers in the Conference. It is hoped that plans will be laid for the Enrollment in the forthcoming year. We expect that the legislation adopted by the General Conference of 1944 will result in active promotion of the Golden Cross by the Board of Hospitals and Homes from their Chicago office.

Our charter requires that six Trustees from your Conference be elected to the Board of Trustees of the Hospital annually. The present Trustees

are:

2. We commend the study of the peace principles of the Deleware Conference, The Princeton Conference, The Six Pillars of Peace, and the Seven Point Statement of Interfaith. Summaries of these may be secured from the Methodist Peace Commission, 740 Rush Street, Chicago (11), Illinois.

3. We also urge the study of Paragraph 2015-2022 of the 1944 Discipline, dealing with Condition of Peace, The Christian Church and War, The Support of Conscientious Objectors and Their Service, Post War Conscription, Overseas Relief, and The Church and Economics.
4. That we pledge ourselves to the full observance of World Peace

Sunday, November 12, 1944.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

The Board of Christian Literature of the North Arkansas Conference is organized for two chief purposes: First, to emphasize upon the floor of the Conference and in the Conference Journal the importance of circulating Christian Literature among our people; and second, to receive and disburse the money alloted for the support of the Arkansas Methodist and certain functions connected with its publication. We submit the following report:

1. We call the attention of the Methodists of the North Arkansas Con-

ference to the two weekly periodicals which should be found in their homes: The Arkansas Methodist, and The Christian Advocate. The editorial policy of each of these papers is of the very highest type. We commend to our people the plans of Dr. E. T. Wayland and The Arkansas Methodist Commissioners for the circulation of The Arkansas Methodist, and call upon pastors and people to give their hearty cooperation. We recommend that every Methodist congregation form a "Christian Advocate Club," enabling subscribers to have the official organ of Methodism for \$1.50 a year.

We express our appreciation to the Editorial Board of our Church; to the Commission on Evangelism, publishers of The Upper Room and much other helpful literature; and to the other agencies of the Church which give us such fine material for use in our Church Schools, Schools of Missions, Woman's Societies and other agencies. We urge pastors and people

to make the fullest use of this material.

3. We ask the Conference for a yearly allotment of \$2,940.17 for disbursement by this Board; this amount to be used for the support of The Arkansas Methodist, provided that the expense of the treasurer's bond and traveling expenses of the Arkansas Methodist Commissioners be paid out of this fund.

4. We submit herewith a condensed statement from Rev. H. F. Mc-

REPORT OF THE ARKANSAS METHODIST COMMISSION

To The Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences:

The Arkansas Methodist Commission, comprising equal membership from the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences, submits the following report (See Financial Statement from November 1, 1943 to October 15, 1944) and makes the following recommendations for the ensuing year, in accordance with decisions reached in the annual meeting of the Joint Commission on October 19, 1944:

That we again record our sincere thanks to Dr. E. T. Wayland 1. REV. ELI N. BICKLEY

The Rev. Eli N. Bickley, was born in Cross County, Arkansas, January 12, 1863, and died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Jack Blain, in Pensacola,

Florida, April 9, 1944.

Brother Bickley, was converted early in life, and joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, at Pleasant Valley in Poinsett County in 1882, and was licensed to preach by the same Church in 1887. He joined the White River Conference in 1890, and was ordained deacon in 1891 and elder in 1893. Some of the charges he served are as follows: Marmaduke, Harrisburg, Piggot and Rector, North Jonesboro, Lorado Charge, Pocahontas, Welden and Tupelo, Marshall, Beebe, and Mammoth Spring, here he superannuated in 1920, due to ill health and age.

Brother Bickley said of himself, "I have had about one thousand conversions under my ministry while serving regular appointments in the Con ference, and since I was superannuated I have continued in the work as I was able around Mammoth Spring, and have preached at various places in the country where there has been about fifty conversions and additions to the

Methodist Church."

A TRIBUTE TO THE REVEREND RANSOM S. HAYDEN By Allen D. Stewart

Jesus once said: "Whosoever will be great among you shall be your minister; and whosoever of you will be the chiefest, shall be servant of all. For even the Son of Man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister and to give His life a ransom for many." The everyday life of Jesus demonstrated the fact that this is true. Someone has said that the most beautiful picture of Jesus is that painted by Peter in five words: "Jesus went about doing good." Fortunately there have been those who have loved Jesus with such a wonderful devotion that their lives have shown that true greatness does come through service to others.

This was certainly true in the life and service of Brother R. S. Hayden. He was a student in Hendrix College when our nation entered World War I, and he could not be satisfied to continue in college while others fought to make the world safe for democracy. He felt that he must give himself in the service of our nation and help to win what we all hoped was the war to end all wars. Bishop W. C. Martin was also a student in Hendrix College at that time. Hayden and Martin talked the matter out thoroughly, and decided to enlist in the Army. They went across with a determination to do their full

share in that great struggle, even if it should cost their lives.

After the close of the war, Brother Hayden re-entered Hendrix College and graduated with honors. He joined the North Arkansas Conference, and began his ministry at Eureka Springs. His second charge was Bentonville, which is the county seat of Benton County. There he served for six years through the period which we call the "Depression." If my memory serves me correctly, every bank in the county was closed. There were tragic and pitiful situations on every hand. In many quarters there was much poverty and great distress. Relief was then on a very different basis. Because of the depth of his understanding, and because of his splendid executive and administrative ability, Brother Hayden found himself carrying a large share of the burden of the relief program in his county.

When the bankers and business men were trying to work out of their financial difficulties, they asked Brother Hayden to be chairman of their meetings. He was the adviser and counselor for the rich and the poor, for the high and the low, for the learned and the unlearned, for the young and the old. Once he laughingly said to me, "I am the 'flunky' for the whole county." He was the minister and the servant of all. Therefore, he was the greatest of all. He loved people and they loved him, and everybody had confidence in,

and respect and admiration for him.

When he was about to begin a series of services in his church, he said: "I am praying for and expecting just one thing, and that is that my people shall love one another again." His prayers were answered, and his expectations were fulfilled. There were glorious scenes at the altar of his church,

and his joy knew no bounds.

After serving six years as pastor at Forrest City. Brother Havden was appointed as pastor of First Church, Conway. Later he was appointed District Superintendent of the Conway District, which office he held at the time of his tragic death. In Conway Brother Hayden was constantly in contact with the leaders of Arkansas Methodism. Through these contacts our leaders were quick to discover that he had a marvelous combination of genuine, whole-

some, sane religion, and that rare and unusual thing which we call "common sense." Those who have been fortunate enough to be associated with Brother Hayden have quickly learned that he loved God and that he loved the Church and loved and understood people. Wherever he has been there have been those who gladly and wholeheartedly cooperated with him in all the work committed to his care. Under his leadership the Conway District was making remarkable progress. If the program which he started is carried through according to his plans, we shall make a record in the building of God's kingdom which will not be surpassed anywhere.

Brother Hayden was always so quiet and unassuming that only those who had the privilege of working with him knew and appreciated his marvelous leadership abilities. He encouraged and inspired and helped those who were trying to do right. With love and kindness and absolute frankness, he

counseled those who were wrong to change their ways.

Measured by the standards of Jesus, Brother Hayden was one of the greatest among us. He was a minister and a servant of all. Although his life has been suddenly cut short, he has lived abundantly and has accomplished an untold amount of good. I am sure that we can say of Brother Hayden as Peter said of Jesus, "He went about doing good."

MRS. LUTHER E. MANN

Mrs. Alice Bailey Mann was born in Nelson County, Virginia, on March 16, 1862. She was one of twelve children of Hugh H. and Sarah Wallace Hall and outlived all the others. She was a Christian from youth, but did not become a member of the Methodist church until 1898. She was received into the Methodist church by Rev. L. E. Mann whom she later married and to whom she became a most worthy companion and co-worker. Mrs. Mann loved the church and it was her chief joy to have in her home the ministers of the church and their families. She was especially glad to have the Presiding Elders or District Superintendents in her home. It was a very rare thing for her to miss an Annual or District Conference of which her husband was a member. Mrs. Mann was a sweet spirited and sympathetic Christian and was loved by all who knew her. In 1917 Brother and Mrs. Mann came to the North Arkansas Conference and for twenty-five years served actively in the Conference. In 1942 Brother Mann retired but served as a supply at Leslie and at the close of the conference year came to Cabot where they had served some years before. They were gladly received here. In April Mrs. Mann fell and hurt herself and was in the Baptist Hospital at Little Rock for several weeks. After returning home she was constantly under the care of friends from Corning, Walnut Ridge, Cabot and other places where they had served. The Conference session of 1939 voted to maintain the numerical notation of the Conference in The Methodist Church.

STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- (1) That each undergraduate be required to report according to the call of the several committees before the opening of the Conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his control.
- (2) That the Conference Treasurer be paid a salary of \$80.00 per month and allowed ncessary office expenses with the provision that \$100.00 of this salary be paid out of funds raised for support of district superintendents, \$100.00 additional shall be paid to the Conference Treasurer for employing, extra help in emergencies.
- (8) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one delegate from each church in each Pastoral Charge; provided further, that each station charge shall have three elected delegates.
- (4) That figures answering the question: "Members reported last year," be the total of the active and inactive members as printed in the Journal of the last Annual Conference.
- (5) That the District Superintendent's figures of all apportionments be accepted as the official figures.
- (6) That the apportionments for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- (7) That all Statistical Reports be turned in to the Statistical Secretary by the hour of the first session; and that all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer not later than 2:00 p. m. on the opening day of the Conference session; and that the names of all delinquents shall be reported to the Conference.
- (8) When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishop's cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission, or an officer in the Conference administration, except members specifically designated by the Discipline.
- (9) That the Secretary of the Bishop's cabinet be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Jounal.
- (10) That all members of our Annual Conference who attend its annual sessions, except superannuated and supernumerary preachers, be required to pay the church entertaining the Conference one dollar registation fee.
- (11) That at all future sessions of the Conference entertainment be provided on the Harvard plan (bed and breakfast) except for superannuated ministers and pastors whose salaries are less than \$1,200.00, for whom full entertainment shall be furnished.
- (12) All Boards that receive money from the Annual Conference shall make a detailed report of all expenditures to that Conference, and said reports shall be reported in the Conference Minutes.
- (13) The list of Lay Delegates elected by the charge conferences shall be completed and thir names given to the host church and Conference Secretary thirty days before the date of the Annual Conference.
- (14) That the District Stewards' meetings shall apportion the askings for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and for General Administration Fund, and for Jurisdictional Expense, to the several Charges in each District on an equitable basis, having regard to the number of members in each Pastoral Charge, as the first factor, and the amounts paid to the Pastors as salaries, as the second factor. The median of the two fractions thus attained for any Pastoral Charge shall constitute the fractional part of each of these several askings to be apportioned to it.
- (15) Annuity payments to retired accepted supply preachers shall be the minimum payments specified in paragraph 1633 of the 1944 Discipline. When such a local preacher is given this relationship he shall be paid the same retirement honorarium as if he were a member of the Conference.
