JOURNAL

FIRST DAY_AFTERNOON SESSION

Opening. The One Hundred-Tenth Session of the North Arkansas Conference of The Methodist Church convened at the Walnut Ridge Methodist Church in Walnut Ridge, Arkansas, at 2 p. m., October 25, 1945, with Bishop Paul E. Martin presiding.

After an organ prelude by Mrs. Henry Rainwater, the National Anthem was sung. Hymn Number 402, "And Are We Yet Alive," was sung as the opening hymn of the Conference. Jefferson Sherman led in prayer. Bishop Martin read the Eighty-fourth Psalm. The secretary made announcement concerning the method of checking the attendance of lay and clerical members of the Conference. A check on the attendance record showed 158 clerical, 43 accepted supplies, and 93 delegates present.

Organization. James S. Upton was elected Secretary. James T. Randle, Ewing T. Wayland, and Elmer J. Holifield were elected Assistant Secretaries. Joe A. Goetz was elected Statistician.

On the motion of R. E. L. Bearden, Jr., it was voted to make the bar of the Conference the lower floor and the center section of the balcony, and to follow the plan suggested for the Conference by the Planning Commission.

The host pastor, R. E. L. Bearden, Jr., introduced Henry and Terry Rainwater, who spoke words of welcome to the Conference on behalf of the local church and city. The Rainwaters are descendents of Rev. Riley Rainwater, one of the pioneer preachers on old Spring River Circuit, the oldest circuit in the state of Arkansas. Bishop Martin responded for the Conference.

Report of the District Superintendents. Question No. 6 was called. What are the reports of the District Superintendents? The report of the District Superintendents was read by Sam B. Wiggins, Secretary of the Cabinet, as follows:

We, your District Superintendents, present the following report of the eight districts of the North Arkansas Conference. When you analyze the composite report you will agree that this conference year has been a year of unusual achievement. Local churches and their ministers are to be commended for making this report possible.

24 ministers have been licensed during the year. 705 infants have been baptized and 5,533 persons have been received into the church. 2,759 of these have come on profession of their faith and 2,778 have come by transfer.

The 502 church schools show an enrollment of 57,477, an increase of 1,408, while Vacation Church Schools have had 5,947 enrolled for the year, an increase of 671. The Woman's Society of Christian Service reports 9,334 members, which represents a substantial increase.

The churches and parsonage of the conference represent \$4,607,120 invested. \$161,706 has been spent during the year in new buildings and improvement on the others. \$39,425 was raised on church debts. New parsonages have been built or bought at Cotter, in the Batesville District, Huntsville and Lincoln in the Fayetteville District, 5th Street in the Fort Smith District, St. John's Circuit in the Jonesboro District and Pangburn in the Searcy District.

New churches have been built at Goshen and Piney in the Fayetteville District, 5th Street in the Fort Smith District, West Memphis in the Helena District at a cost of \$86,000 and one at Shilo bought and is worth \$3,000. Churches under construction are at Mount Olive on the Lamar charge in the Conway District, an educational building to the Bethel Methodist Church in Fayetteville District, Delfore in the Jonesboro District, and Botkinburg in the Searcy District.

Many churches during the year have been built. Centerville and Birta on the Ola Charge, Cato on the Bethel-Cato Charge in the Conway District; Decatur, Lincoln, Falling Springs in the Fayetteville District and many others not reported. Quite a few new Sunday Schools are reported this year. Among them are Palestine and Stone School House in the Batesville District. In the Conway District Birta on the Ola Circuit, Bethlehem and Gordon Chapel on the Morrilton Circuit No. 1. Piney on the Alpena Circuit in the Fayetteville District has been organized. The Fort Smith District reports Fifth Street in Fort Smith, Victoria, Spear Lake and Flat Lake have been organized and reported this year in the Jonesboro District. Ravenden and Harvey's Chapel are reported from the Paragould District. The Searcy District reports Botkinburg, Rupert and 16th Section. 17 new Church schools are thus reported.

Stone School House in the Batesville District; Birta on the Ola Circuit, Bethlehem and Gordon Chapel on the Morrilton Circuit No. 1, in the Conway District; Piney in the Fayetteville District; Fifth Street in the Fort Smith District; Choctaw and Ebenezer in the Helena District; Louise Chapel, Delfore, Spear Lake, Victoria and Flat Lake in the Jonesboro District; Friendship and Ravenden in the Paragould District; Botkinburg, Rupert and Everton in the Searcy District. This is a total of 18 new preaching points.

One of the thrilling reports will be found in the response of the church to World Service and Conference Benevolences. On a total apportionment of \$81,242, the conference for the first time in its history overpaid its apportionment, when they reported \$82,287, a gain of \$7,957 over the previous year.

We have one church, Batesville First Church, that stands second in the Jurisdiction in Benevolent giving. The Batesville, Conway, Fayetteville, Helena and Jonesboro Districts accepted their whole askings and paid them with a surplus.

On a quota of \$234,625 for the Crusade for Christ the churches have paid in to date some \$241,194 or \$6,569 above the apportionment, with several thousands of dollars to be collected on pledges. In addition some \$4,357 was paid on World Communion Day to the Fellowship of Suffering and Service.

This response on the Crusade carries every district save two beyond its quota in cash. We predict a 100% collection on pledges before January 31st, 1946. This marvellous work on the part of the preachers and the laymen speak well for the other phases of the Crusade and assures us that this coming year will be a year of great spiritual advancement. We face it eagerly.

Our hearts were made heavy over and over again through the year as sons of our preachers were reported killed in the service of their country. We pause in our report to express our deepest sympathy and sincere love to these homes. Their names will be given the conference at a suitable time. (Jefferson Sherman, Jr., Turner Jerome Howard, Irvin Martin, William Eugene Johnston). We wish it were possible to list the names of the young men who fell in service, coming from the homes of our laymen. To all we wish to let you know that you have been constantly in our prayers.

Our heartfelt sympathy is extended to members of the parsonage homes where preachers and minister's wives have died during the year. In our great brotherhood your sorrows are shared by your brethern.

Among outstanding items that should be reported are in special fields. The young people in the First Methodist Church have rendered signal service to the conference. They met with other Methodist Youth Fellowships in the Jonesboro area and helped plan their work. They sent 12 young people on teams to 9 churches to promote the Crusade for Christ. They assisted in promotion of City-wide Youth Week which was attended by over 200 young people from the various churches. In the consecration service 9 of the First Methodist youth gave themselves to full time Christian service. Three of the young people went on Caravans. One taught two weeks in the Assembly at Conway. They trained three teams of young people and sent them to 15 churches in the conference for the promotion of work with young people. During the summer the young people gave over 400 days of service in thirty other churches. The outstanding building program for the year is to be found at West Memphis where a beautiful and adequate new church has been erected at a cost of \$86,000, with only \$20,500 debt involved, for which provision has been made.

The outstanding debt reducing program is found at Goddard Memorial Church where \$12,000 was paid on the indebtedness and permitted Bishop Martin to dedicate this beautiful structure on Oct. 14th.

The outstanding work in evangelism was done in the Jonesboro District, which reported 655 on profession of faith.

Probably the most far reaching achievement for the future of Methodism in Arkansas is the buying of an Episcopal Residence for our presiding Bishop. This will insure our having the leadership and close supervision of our chief pastor. We now have a very fine Episcopal Residence, well furnished and ideally located.

Nominations were made for annual committees and vacancies on existing committees. According to Paragraph 1498 of the Discipline, District and Associate District Lay Leaders were elected.

Christian Literature. The Report of the Board of Christian Literature was read by Ray L. McLester. E. T. Wayland spoke to the report. He reported more than 17,000 subscribers to the Arkansas Methodist. The report was adopted.

Ray L. McLester presented the following:

RESOLUTION

"Be it resolved that the North Arkansas Conference representatives on the Arkansas Methodist Commission, be and they are hereby authorized and directed to cooperate in necessary steps to incorporate the Arkansas Methodist under the laws of the State of Arkansas when and if a similar authorization is adopted by the Little Rock Conference of the Methodist Church."

Episcopal Residence. A. W. Martin read the report of the Episcopal Residence Committee. It was filed with the Secretary. On the suggestion of the chairman the following were elected to continue on the Episcopal Residence Committee: A. W. Martin, R. J. Rice, J. F. Warden. The Conference expressed appreciation for the work of this committee on motion of Benjamin C. Few.

Chaplains. Chaplain Alfred A. Knox, who served in the Southwest Pacific Area; Chaplain Ray D. Seals, who served in the European Theatre; and Chaplain John G. Gieck, who has served as chaplain in the army camps in the United States, and as chaplain to prisoners of war, spoke briefly to the Conference of their work.

Announcements were made. Bishop John Calvin Broomfield was introduced by Bishop Martin as the Conference preacher. It was announced that he would preach at 4 o'clock.

J. M. Hughey pronounced the benediction.

FIRST DAY_EVENING SESSION

Commemoration. With Bishop Paul E. Martin in charge, a service of commemoration was held for members of the Conference and wives, for widows of Ministers, and for Sons of Ministers who have made the supreme sacrifice for their country during the War. Jason W. Moore, secretary of the committee on memoirs, read the following names of those who had died during the year: Thomas E. McKnight, who was a member of the North Arkansas Conference; Mrs. A. T. Galloway and Mrs. A. E. Holloway, who were widows of Ministers; Mrs. Guy Murphy, wife of Guy Murphy; and the following sons of Ministers, Eugene Johnson, son of the Rev. and Mrs. Mack N. Johnson, West Memphis; Thomas E. McKnight, son of the Rev. and Mrs. B. A. McKnight, Bellville; Jefferson Sherman, Jr., son of the Rev. and Mrs. Jefferson Sherman, Newport; Ervin Wood Martin, son of the Rev. and Mrs. C. L. Martin, Waldron; Elbert Wall, son of the Rev. and Mrs. A. Wall, Greenbrier; Turner Jerome Howard, son of the Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Howard, Newport. Mention was also made of sons of members of all our Churches, who died in the service of the Armed Forces of our Nation.

The commemoration sermon was preached by Allen D. Stewart, who in words of deep meaning, spoke on the Christian Faith in God and the hope of eternal life as is revealed in Jesus Christ. Others who assisted in the commemoration service were Bishop John Calvin Broomfield, and R. E. L. Bearden, Jr.

Communion. As a fitting climax to the commemoration service the District Superintendents assisted Bishop Paul E. Martin in the observance of the Lord's supper.

SECOND DAY_MORNING SESSION

Devotional. The Conference opened in a service of Worship, under the leadership of Bishop Paul E. Martin, with the singing of Hymn No. 12, "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee." W. V. Womack led in prayer. Bishop Martin read from the 14th chapter of Deuteronomy, after which he gave an inspiring talk on the theme, "Thou Shalt Not Offend Life's Highest Delicacies." Hymn 299, "I Want a Principal Within," was sung. Class on Trial. The order of the day having arrived and the classes

Martin it was requested that the Special Policy Committee of the Board of Ministerial Training, together with a Special Committee appointed by the Board of Conference Claimants, study thoroughly the problem of health requirements for admissions into the Annual Conference and bring recommendations on the same to the 1946 session of the Annual Conference.

A. W. Martin resigned as a member of the board of Trustees of the Southern Methodist University. Bishop Martin spoke words of appreciation of his service to the University and to the Annual Conference.

Board of Education. Harold Eggensperger read report No. 1 of the Board of Education. Ira A. Brumley, executive secretary of the Board, spoke to the report. It was adopted.

Harold Eggensperger read report No. 2 of the Board of Education. High tribute was paid to Dr. John Hugh Reynolds, retiring president of Hendrix College, for his contribution to Christian Education in Arkansas.

Hendrix College, for his contribution to Christian Education in Arkansas. Report No. 3 of the Board of Education was read. Dr. Matt L. Ellis, the new President of Hendrix College, spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

J. Q. Schisler of the General Board of Education, Local Church Division, and C. N. McPherson, of the General Board of Education, College Division, addressed the Conference.

Courtesy Committee. The courtesy committee introduced the following visitors to the Conference: M. LaFayette Harris, Chaplain and Mrs. Lyman T. Barger, Fred Roebuck, Arthur and Mrs. Evanson, L. L. Johnson, F. L. Johnson, Chaplain and Mrs. William J. Reid.

Retired Ministers. Question No. 40 was called: What ministers have been retired this year? A. H. Dulaney, Norris Greer, J. W. Howard, Don Holman, F. A. Lark, W. J. LeRoy, and F. M. Sweet.

Bishop Martin paid tribute to these men for the two hundred and fiftynine years of service that they have rendered in the Christian Ministry. Those present told of their love for the Methodist Ministry and of their anticipation <u>of</u> a happy experience in the new relationship.

Transfers Announced. Bishop Martin announced the transfer of Arthur Evanson from the East Oklahoma Conference and of A. H. Dulaney from the Little Rock Conference to the North Arkansas Conference.

Check for Retired Ministers. George F. Rossaman, representative of the Methodist Publishing House, spoke of the successful year that the Publishing House has had and presented to Bishop Martin a check for \$3,453.51 to be used by the Conference Board of Conference Claimants for retired ministers.

Announcements were made and the Bishop pronounced the benediction.

SECOND DAY_AFTERNOON SESSION

Devotional. Bishop Martin opened the afternoon session by having the Conference learn the Crusade for Christ Hymn, "Set Us Afire Lord," written by Bishop Ralph S. Cushman. C. Norman Guice, the Conference song leader, led in the singing.

Elected Deacons. Question No. 26 was resumed: Who have been elected Deacons? Maurice Lanier.

Dr. M. LaFayette Harris of Philander Smith College spoke on the work of the College and of its place in a development of a Christian leadership for the negroes of Arkansas.

Resolution. The following resolution was adopted by the Conference:

A RESOLUTION

Whereas during the past four years this nation has been engaged in a global war, and

Whereas the manpower needs of the nation have been so great that it has been the policy of the government to call into service a great many young men out of our schools and colleges for military service, and

Whereas we are facing a great shortage of trained leaders in every field of activity,

Therefore, be it resolved: That the North Arkansas Conference in session at Walnut Ridge, Arkansas, October 25th, 1945, petition the President of the United States and the Congress of the United States to proceed as rapidly as possible in the discharge of young men who were taken from the schools to military service, and all other young men provided they can show good cause that it is their purpose and desire to return to school to finish their training; and that the drafting of men for Military Service be ended; and that we express ourselves as being opposed to any universal program of Military training for the youth of this land.

That a copy of this Resolution be sent to the President of the United States, to the Congressional Delegation, and to the Senators from Arkansas.

Courtesy Committee. The courtesy committee presented to the Conference the following young women who have been acting as pages for the Conference: Muriel Murray, Alice Moore, and Norma Lee Floyd.

H. H. Griffin assumed the chair at the request of the Bishop.

Committee on Ministerial Training. Report No. 1 of the Special Committee on Ministerial Training was read by E. W. Harris. The Conference adopted the report.

The report of the treasurer of the Board of Ministerial Training was read by E. J. Holifield. The report was adopted.

Report No. 2 of the Special Committee on Ministerial Training was read by E. W. Harris. It was adopted.

Bishop Paul E. Martin resumed the chair.

Recruiting Committee. On the motion of S. B. Wilford, the Conference voted to set up a committee for recruiting persons for full time Christian Service. The following persons who have served on the Special Committee on Ministerial Training: H. M. Lewis, W. H. Goodloe, Ira A. Brumley, Earle Cravens, James S. Upton, E. W. Harris, and representatives from the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Board of Missions and Church Extension are to be the members of the committee.

It was moved by J. J. Decker, and the Conference voted to continue, the Special Committee on Ministerial Training for another year.

Constitution for Orphanage. Paul V. Galloway read the constitution of the Methodist Children's Home. The constitution was adopted by the Conference for the Home.

Hospitals and Homes. The report of the Board of Hospitals and Homes was read by C. N. Guice. J. S. M. Cannon, Superintendent of the Arkansas Methodist Children's Home, spoke to the report. It was adopted.

World Service and Finance. The report of the Commission on World Service and Finance was read by J. Kenneth Shamblin. Dr. B. L. Schubel, representative of the Board of Pensions, spoke to the report. It was adopted.

representative of the Board of Pensions, spoke to the report. It was adopted. Courtesy Committee. The Courtesy Committee introduced the following to the Conference: Dr. R. E. Womack, John M. McCormack, H. O. Bolin, and K. K. Carrithers.

After the benediction by H. Lynn Wade the Conference adjourned.

THIRD DAY_MORNING SESSION

Devotional. The Conference opened with the singing of Hymn No. 20, "We Gather Together To Ask the Lord's Blessing." The Devotional for the morning was given by Bishop Martin and was based on the story of the Good Samaritan found in Luke's Gospel, the tenth chapter. Hymn No. 249, "I Love To Tell the Story," was sung.

Sympathy. The Conference voted to send words of sympathy to Rev. B. A. McKnight, whose wife is seriously ill.

Character of Ministers Passed. The names of the ministers were called, there was no objection to any of them, and their characters were passed.

The character of Boyd Johnson, a local Deacon, was passed.

Transfer Announced. Bishop Martin announced the transfer of J. O. Whitworth to the East Oklahoma Conference. World Service and Finance. The Report of the Commission on World

World Service and Finance. The Report of the Commission on World Service and Finance was resumed on the recommendation of the Commission. Standing rule No. 14 was amended to read as follows:

(14) That the District Steward's meetings shall apportion the askings for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and for General Administration Fund, and for Jurisdictional Expense, to the several Charges in each District on an equitable basis.

Rule No. 6 Suspended. On the motion of Sam B. Wiggins standing rule No. 6 was suspended for this Conference year. By a vote of the Conference the Commission on World Service and Finance was asked to study this rule and report back to the Conference.

Town and Country Commission. W. J. Spicer read Report No. 1 of the Town and Country Commission. I. L. Claud read Report No. 2 of the Commission dealing of the Sustentation Fund. Glenn F. Sanford, Executive Secretary of the Commission, spoke to the report. Miss Estelle McIntosh and Thomas C. Huff spoke to the Lord's Acre Plan being used in Scott and Newton County respectively. J. Kermit VanZant told of the new Conference project in Madison County.

The Conference discussed the way of reporting the Sustentation Fund in the Journal. The matter was referred to the Commission on World Service and Finance for study.

Introductions. C. L. Martin, Miss Oldham and J. M. Harrison of the Scott County Ministry were introduced.

By a vote of the Conference the expression of appreciation was made of the work of I. L. Claud at the Arkansas State Sanatorium.

Rule No. 16. The Conference voted to add the following to the Standing Rules as Rule No. 16:

(16) Be it resolved that the Secretary of the North Arkansas Annual Conference shall be nominated by the Cabinet when their report on nominations is made. Be it further resolved that the Secretary of the Annual Conference shall continue in office in the next Annual session of the Conference.

Missions and Church Extension. The Board of Missions and Church Extension Report was read by S. B. Wilford. Mrs. R. E. Connell, President of the Conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, gave a supplementary report of the work of the women. Miss Estelle McIntosh read a supplementary report from the Conference Board of Deaconesses. The report was adopted.

Conference to Meet at Searcy. Question No. 47 was called: Where will the next session of the Conference be held? On the invitation of C. N. Guice, B. L. Oliver, and B. R. Johnson, the Conference was invited to Searcy. On the invitation of Golder Lawrence and Arthur Smith, the Conference was invited to Forrest City. The invitation to meet at Searcy was accepted by a vote of 99 to 60.

Appreciation. Bishop Martin expressed appreciation for the service of Bishop John Calvin Broomfield, who has brought such inspiring messages as Conference preacher.

Lay Activities. The Report of the Board of Lay Activities was read by Joe A. Goetz. Dr. James W. Workman, Associate Secretary of the General Board of Lay Activities, spoke on the work of Laymen in the Church.

Gift to Lay Leader. On behalf of the Laymen of the Conference, J. W. Hull presented to E. W. Martin a Bible and expressed appreciation for his work as Conference Lay Leader for the past four years.

Courtesy Committee. The Courtesy Committee presented the following to the Conference: Blake Westmoreland, Rev. Palmer, E. R. White, L. E. and Mrs. L. E. Mann. Appreciation was expressed for the work of C. C. Burton of Hoxie for help given in the entertainment of the Conference.

Crusade Hour. The time having arrived for the Crusade Hour, Garland C. Taylor, Conference Director of Evangelism, led in the service. The Crusade for Christ Hymn, "Set Us Afire Lord," was sung. George E. Stewart read the report of the Board of Evangelism. Ira A. Brumley spoke to the report. The Conference adopted the report. John M. McCormack, director of Evangelism of the Little Rock Conference, delivered the message of the hour, using as his scripture the Sixth chapter of Isaiah. Bishop John Calvin Broomfield led in the prayer of Consecration.

The Conference adjourned to meet again at two o'clock.

THIRD DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION

Devotional. The afternoon session opened with Allen D. Stewart as chairman. Hymn No. 268, "Are Ye Able Said the Master," was sung. R. E. L. Bearden, Sr., led in prayer.

Conference Claimants. J. J. Decker read report No. 1 of the Board of Conference Claimants. Elmer H. Hook read report No. 2 of the Board. The reports were adopted.

The Secretary read messages to the Conference from Chaplain Archie

N. Boyd and Paul D. Womeldorf. World Peace. Miss Estelle McIntosh read the report of the Commission on World Peace. The report was adopted.

The Chairman appointed John Womack to instruct those who were to be ordained Elders and to prepare for the Ordination Service. W. V. Womack was appointed to instruct those who were to be ordained Deacons and to prepare them for the Ordination Service.

After the singing of the Doxology the Benediction was pronounced by Elmer H. Hook.

FOURTH DAY-MORNING SESSION

The members of the Conference attended and conducted worship services in the various churches of Walnut Ridge. Bishop Paul E. Martin brought the message at the Worship Service of the host church.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The Conference opened with H. Lynn Wade as chairman. Hymn No. 208, "Amazing Grace, How Sweet the Sound," was sung. Floyd G. Villines lead in prayer.

The report of the audit committee on the Journal was read by Joe A. Goetz.

Temperance. H. J. Couchman read the report of the Board of Temperance. H. J. Couchman and J. J. Decker spoke to the report. It was adopted unanimously.

Play—The Criminal. The chairman introduced Rev. Hayward Johnson, who presented a temperance play, "The Criminal." Following the play, Clyde C. Coulter, Secretary of the Arkansas Anti-Saloon League, was introduced. An offering was taken for the work of the General Board of Temperance of the Methodist church.

Guy Ames dismissed the session with prayer.

EVENING SESSION

The evening session opened with the singing of Hymn No. 12, "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee." Bishop Paul E. Martin was in charge of the service.

Ordination Service. Dr. Albert W. Martin, Professor of the Perkins School of Theology of Southern Methodist University, preached the ordination sermon using the words of St. Paul found in Ephesians 3:7, "I was made a minister," as the theme of his message. With the assistance of the District Superintendents and Hoy M. Lewis, father of Charles W. Lewis, and Allen D. Stewart, father of George E. Stewart, the following were ordained Deacons:

FIFTH DAY_MORNING SESSION

Devotional. The Conference opened with the singing of Hymn No. 220, "Majestic Sweetness Sits Enthroned Upon the Savior's Brow." Guy Murphy led in prayer after which the devotional message was given by Bishop Martin. Hymn No. 238, "Blessed Assurance," was sung.

Greetings. On the motion of Benjamin C. Few the secretary was asked to send messages from the Conference to B. A. McKnight whose wife is seriously ill, to Mrs. H. H. Griffin, wife of H. H. Griffin, who is ill, and to the following superannuates who are ill and unable to attend Conference: E. W. Potter, Rex. B. Wilkes, W. J. Williams, James A. Anderson, and O. E. Goddard. A special message was to be sent to Rev. and Mrs. William Sherman who for 55 years have received appointments in the North Arkansas Conference, the longest record of any other man in the Conference.

District Conference Journals. Alfred Eason read the report of the committee on District Conference Journals. Bishop Martin spoke to the report. It was adopted.

Statistician's Report. Joe A. Goetz read the report of the statistician. It was approved by the Conference.

Treasurer's Report. Guy A. Murphy read the report of the Conference treasurer. It was filed with the Secretary for publication. Work Appreciated. The Conference voted its appreciation for the ef-

ficient work and brotherly spirit of Guy Murphy who retires this year as Conference treasurer.

Greetings to Chaplains. The Conference asked the secretary to send a message to all chaplains, who are members of the Conference, and not present.

Special Committee on Chaplains. The report of the special committee on work of chaplains returning to the Conference during the year was read by W. F. Cooley. It was adopted.

Clearing House Committee. The Conference set up the following committee as a clearing house group for setting dates and places for all meeting of boards and commissions during the following year: The District Superintendent of the Conway District, the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education, the Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commis-

sion, and the Business Manager of Hendrix College. Date of Annual Conference. The planning commission brought in the recommendation, and a motion was made, that the date of annual conference be changed to the last week in August or the first week in September. The motion was tabled.

Special Pensions Committee. On the recommendation of the Board of Conference Claimants a special committee on a pension plan for the Con-ference was set up. The chairman appointed the following members on the committee: J. J. Decker, Jefferson Sherman, Allan Stewart, Harold Eggensperger, and W. J. Spicer.

Board of Education. Report No. 4 of the Board of Education was read by Harold Eggensperger. It was adopted.

REPORT NO. 1

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND SUPPLY

Report of Joint Committee from Board of Ministerial Training, Board of Education, and Conference Cabinet, authorized by Policy Committee on Ministerial Training. SUBJECT: "MINISTERIAL SUPPLY AND PLANS FOR ENLISTMENT."

At the 1944 session of the North Arkansas Annual Conference, a special Committee on Policy of Ministerial Training was authorized. Early in the new year, this committee undertook the task of outlining the basic features of a sound policy for the Conference as it faces the future program of Ministerial Training. At every point the committee found itself face to face with a persistent and unpleasant fact, namely, an acute shortage in ministerial supply. Careful study reveals that the problem is not peculiar to the North Arkansas Conference, but is common to large areas of American Methodism. A careful analysis of the situation reveals that it is not simply a wartime emergency. Had there been no war, Methodism was facing a serious shortage in Ministerial Supply. At present, there are few encouraging facts that point to a change in the trend. The most optimistic hopes for additions from the armed forces to the ministry cannot envision a sufficient supply for immediate replacement needs in the civilian ministry. Facing these sobering facts, the Policy Committee recommended that a joint committee from the Board of Ministerial Training, the Board of Education, the Conference Cabinet be charged with the task of outlining specific steps which the Conference, as a whole, could take to remedy this critical shortage in ministerial supply.

We are assuming that this Conference wishes to pursue its recognized policy of the past, which is to produce its basic needs in leadership and to help supply other neighboring areas in Methodism. In assuming that we wish to continue this policy, we wish also to record our disapproval of those conferences which encourage their District Superintendents to entice Theological students to abandon their original loyalties and inspirations for the more remunerative positions in other sections of the country. It is our conviction that every other conference should look to its own resources and face seriously the ministerial supply problem for their own area. We recommend that the whole question of ministerial shortage and the solution of the problem be laid where we think it should properly belong, on the heart of the ministry and laity in three specific areas of our conference life: (1) The Methodist Homes, from which our ministry comes; (2) The Local Church, where the Ministry is presented by precept and example; (3) The College Campus, where the faculty and student leadership has intimate contact with those lay students who must furnish material for the ministry.

1. The Contribution of the Ministry Itself to the Problem

A. We recommend that the Annual Conference seriously consider plans for an "Older Boys' Conference," similar to that held by the Southwest Texas Annual Conference annually. Each charge would send one of its more mature boys, often those who are prospects for the ministry. A special program planned for them would run parallel to conference sessions. For many of the conference business sessions, these boys would be guests and witness the church and its ministry in action. Such themes as "The Church," "The Ministry," "The Layman" would be discussed by outstanding speakers. A "Pal" service, in which the minister and the delegate sat together could furnish the background for the discussion of the theme of the call to the ministry. Reports from such experiments indicate that many of our finest boys respond to the challenge of the ministry under this direct influence of the ministry in conference sessions.

B. We recommend that the "February Special," the annual offering taken for Hendrix College and Ministerial Education be broadened to in-

clude an emphasis upon enlistment for the ministry. During the week given to the collection of funds for these causes, it is our belief that we can use this time profitably for the cause by preaching and talking to our people on the theme of giving their money and their sons and daughters to the Church of God and its service. Sermons, literature, and personal conversations will be like seed cast upon soil already cultivated through the offering taken.

C. We recommend that a sermon on the call to preach be given in each local pulpit during the year, in each District Conference, and in each Revival Meeting held during the year. D. We recommend that the challenge to the ministry be given a prom-

inent place in the service of consecration and in the discussion groups and inspirational messages of our Camps, Assemblies, and all educational programs under the direction of the Board of Education. We recommend that the Board of Education forward to the Conference Board of Ministerial Training copies of records of decisions which they send to Nashville. We give our hearty commendation and support to the program of enlistment for full time service which our General Board of Education has planned for our Youth and we urge every pastor to familiarize himself with the materials and records of such decisions.

E. We recommend that each pastor in each local church keep a permanent file of prospects and candidates for the ministry. Materials for such a file can be secured from the General Board of Education. We also recommend that a similar file for each District, covering every charge, be kept by each District Superintendent and transmitted to their successor.

F We recommend that each pastor use the new pamphlets, furnished by the General Commission on Ministerial Training, on the themes related

to the call to the Ministery. Among these pamphlets, are the following: 1. "Dr. I. Q. Tells Why He Intends to Enter the Ministry," \$1 per 100. 2. "What It Takes," \$3 per 100 — 50c dozen. These pamphlets can be placed in the hand of prospective candidates, and

left for him to study and to ponder their meanings.

G. We recommend that every pastor send to the Registrar of the Board of Ministerial Training, Mr. Ethan Dodgen, the name, age, address, educational background of every boy who indicates interest in the ministry or who becomes a candidate for the ministry. The Board of Ministerial Training, we believe, should supply such a youth with additional material, and begin careful study of his qualifications for the ministry.

H. We recommend that the homes of the congregation be looked upon by each pastor as the soil from which ministers come. We believe that it is even more righteous to "covet for the Lord" the boys of a home than the wealth of a home. By conversation, prayer, by direct and indirect influence, we recommend that each pastor give to this matter a prominent place in his pastoral visitation.

I. We recommend that the Crusade for Christ, in its Evangelistic emphasis, be used as an opportunity to remind our people that 500 new churches means 500 new ministers, or 500 vacant churches. We urge our pastors to look among the new converts won for new prospects for the ministry.

2. Contribution of Hendrix College to the Problem

We recommend that the Conference, through its Board of Ministerial Training, place before Hendrix College, the following requests for specific

support in the program of Ministerial Enlistment. 1. That the challenge of the Christian Ministry be presented, as the administration shall see fit, in the various public convocations throughout

the year, such as chapel periods or religious emphasis weeks. 2. That counseling of those interested youth who give promise of future leadership, either in the laity or ministry, be given the attention and leadership of the most capable faculty members.

3. That the classroom be considered the soil in which an interest in the ministry and in full time Christian Service could grow and develop into an ultimate commitment of life.

4. That the Department of Religion be given the supervision of the purchase of and distribution of those materials and literature that will cultivate an interest in the Christian ministry.

5. That ministerial students be made available for occasional appearances at District, Conference, and local church services, where they can give personal testimonies on the challenge to the ministry.

6. That the college consider the enlistment and training of candidates for the Christian Ministry as one of its most important contributions to the Methodist Church.

3. The Contribution of the Methodist Home

In speaking of the contribution of the Ministry and the College to this problem of enlistment of candidates for the ministry, we have assumed that their efforts are aimed at the home of our Methodist laity. In dealing with the Methodist Home, we face the greatest contribution of all, namely:

1. Pray for complete consecration of the life of the home, that God may be able to find and use its human resources.

2. Magnify the calling of the Ministry in the minds of the children and youth in the home, else all that others do will fail to influence them to heed such a call.

3. Let the hearts of Methodist parents be committed to doing the will of God as it is revealed to them. In other words, let them prepare themselves to give their children and youth to such a calling, if God chooses their home for his work. This will mean opening their doors to the influences of the ministry, the church, the college, and placing no stumbling blocks in the path of God's will.

4. The Contribution of God to the Problem

In all of our efforts, in the church, the college, the home, we believe that God must work and call. We believe in a God-Called Ministry. None other will serve the needs of Methodism. Therefore, we call our conference to a season of ceaseless prayer, until a widespread revival of vital religion comes in church, home, and college, else we believe that the voice of God which calls to youth today will fall upon deaf ears.

REPORT NO. 3 OF

BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING AND SUPPLY

SUMMARY OF DIRECTIONS TO BOARD OF MINISTERIAL TRAINING BY SPECIAL POLICY COMMITTEE

I. Aid For Ministerial Students in College and Working Toward the A. B. Degree

1. A maximum of \$100.00 per month will be allowed on college fees and expenses for service rendered in the North Arkansas Conference for the summer of 1945. Half of the total amount earned to be applied on the first semester and the balance on the second semester. Such fees, usually known as "Basic Fees," are to be allowed. The Board shall determine such fees according to this suggestion.

In cases of special need and emergency, a maximum of \$100.00 additional may be allowed a student serving during the summer, if, in the judgment of the Board, the case can be so classified.

No funds will be advanced to Freshmen, under this provision for summer work.

2. Other Ministerial Students: All other ministerial students not included in the above will be allowed their college fees. These students are required to sign a note for the amount involved, which note will be cancelled when the student has completed his training and entered the active ministry of the North Arkansas Conference, with the understanding that students serving a charge will be required to sign a note for the amount of such fees as were charged for the time during which they were serving in the conference pastorates.

3. The District Superintendent is expected to furnish a written statement to the Committee handling the assignment of student pastors to summer work. The statement should give a list of the places where men are wanted, the nature of work to be done, and the type of student desired. The Superintendent of each student expecting to receive payment of fees should certify his name to the Board of Ministerial Training and indicate whether he should be required to sign a note for the amount.

II. Aid to Accepted Supply Pastors-

\$1,500.00 was appropriated out of the Ministerial Training Funds for the training of supply pastors. Out of this amount the expenses of the Training School for Accepted Supplies, at Hendrix College, March 12-22, were met. Room and board for those attending the school were provided.

III. Promotion of "February Special" and Distribution of Funds

The Board of Education was given the responsibility for the promotion and cultivation of the "February Special." The cost of such publicity to be deducted from the total funds collected, before the net balance of that portion to be used for Ministerial Training is turned over to the Treasurer of the Board of Ministerial Training, for administration by the Board. The Board's share equals three-eighths of the total.

IV. Special Committee for Suggesting Plans for Recruiting Ministers

It was recommended that there should be a committee set up as follows: two members of the Board of Ministerial Training, two members of the Board of Education, and two members of the Conference Cabinet, to study the matter of ministerial supply and recommend plans for the enlistment of ministerial candidates.

V. Recommendation to Board of Ministerial Training

The Special Policy Committee recommended that the Board of Ministerial Training consider the matter of printing a guide for candidates for admission into the conference outlining steps to be followed as required by the 1944 Discipline.

VI. Correspondence School Fees and Scholarship Fund At S. M. U.

The Board of Ministerial Training will continue to pay all fees for enrollment for correspondence courses at S. M. U. upon the completion of the work required. The Board will continue the policy of cooperation with S. M. U. in the matter of providing an annual scholarship for a ministerial student attending school, from this conference. Also provide a \$400 scholarship to S. M. U. to be administered by the University.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE FOR THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

During periods of stress and strain and fear through which the peoples of the world have passed during the days of War, the American Bible Society has made its great contribution by furnishing Bibles and Testaments to the men and women of the Armed Forces. In the days immediately ahead of us, as the evangelization and reeducation tasks loom large, we shall need its services no less than in the years that have just passed.

The American Bible Society desires the privilege of serving; but it can serve only to the extent that we, and others, make it financially possible to print and place these copies of the Bible over the face of the earth.

The American Bible Society asks us to remember it both in our prayers and in our gifts. Therefore, we recommend that we observe Universal Bible Sunday, December 9, in each local church of this Conference and to enter whole-heartedly into co-operation with the American Bible Society in the promotion of its World-Wide Bible Reading program from Thanksgiving to Christmas.

COMMITTEE ON EPISCOPAL RESIDENCE

Dear Brethren:

Your Committee appointed in 1944 to secure an Episcopal Residence for the Louisiana-Arkansas Area, wishes to make the following report:

After considerable search we found what we believe was the most suitable house on the market at the time and within the limits of our Budget. It is a two story structure, on a nice lot at 205 Colonial Street, Little Rock. It is located in a very nice section, near a Grammar and Junior High School, and within reasonable distance of Car and Bus lines and a Shopping Center.

The fine manner in which everyone concerned co-operated made this assignment a privilege rather than a chore. The District Superintendents and the Churches over the State were prompt and generous in supplying the \$8,500 or 1-3 the maximum covered by the Joint Resolution of the Conferences. The Trustees of the two Conferences borrowed \$13,500 from the Board of Church Extension to complete payments on the home, its repairs and furnishings.

The home was rented to Bishop Paul E. Martin on April 1st, 1945, at \$150.00 per month which amount is being paid on mortgage and interest regularly as the checks are received from the fund for rental of Episcopal residences.

Bishop Martin and his gracious wife seem to be comfortable and happy there and it is a source of inward satisfaction to each of us to feel that we had a small part in realizing such an ambition.

We feel that Brother Murphy knows what is best; and we accept his decision to retire from the office of Conference Treasurer. Our love and our best wishes and our prayers go with Brother Murphy as he retires from active service.

(2) We recommend:

That the Conference pay to Reverend Guy Murphy as a bonus the sum of \$300.00.

(3) We recommend:

That C. D. Metcalf be elected as our Conference Treasurer for the rest of this quadrennium.

(4) That Standing Rule No. 2 be amended to read as follows: That the Conference Treasurer be paid a salary of \$100.00 per month and allowed necessary office supplies with the provision that \$100.00 of this salary be paid out of the funds raised for the support of District Superintendents. \$100.00 additional shall be paid to the Conference Treasurer for employing extra help in emergencies.

Part XII

We recommend:

(1) That the Conference Treasurer and the Treasurers of the Conference Boards and Commissions have their books ready to be audited by the Conference Auditor not later than November 10, 1945.

(2) That each Board and each Commission pay the Auditor for auditing its own books.

(3) That Joe Bond, Certified Public Accountant of Little Rock, Arkan-sas, be employed as the Conference Auditor to audit the books of the Conference Treasurer and of the Treasurers of the Boards and Commissions.

REPORT OF THE TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION The Sustentation Fund

Section I

Organization and Administration

The conference treasurer shall be the treasurer of the Sustentation 1. fund.

The Town and Country Commission shall nominate and the Annual $\mathbf{2}$. Conference shall elect each year, a committee of three which shall be responsible for administering the fund.

3. The Town and Country Commission shall be responsible for the promotion of the sustentation fund.

4. The conference treasurer shall transmit all sustentation funds to the treasurer of the Board of Missions and Church Extension who shall issue all checks on order of the committee elected to administer the funds.

5. District superintendents are urged to inquire at the fourth quarterly conference whether the sustentation funds for the year have been paid by the pastor and his charge.

6. District superintendents shall report to the committee responsible for administering the funds not later than the first day of the session of the annual conference the names of all pastors eligible for participation in said funds together with complete information of income including salary and those items 2, 3, and 4, listed in section III of this report.

7. The distribution of the sustentiation fund shall be made to the proper persons on the basis of anticipated income, one fourth each on February 1, May 1, and August 1, reserving the last payment until the final compu-tation of the amount due at the session of the annual conference.

8. Expenses incidental to the administration of the fund shall be paid on order of the Town and Country Commission from the fund before distribution is made to the claimants.

Section II

2. Schedule of payments by charges to the sustentation fund: Each pastoral charge shall pay an amount equal to the payment scheduled for the pastor of said charge.

Section III

Distribution of Sustentation Fund

1. Payments shall be made from the Sustentation fund to the pastors receiving less than \$1,200.00 salary on a percentage basis. The maximum deficit which shall be considered in computing payments shall be \$400.00.

2. Pension payments to retired ministers serving charges shall be counted as part of the salary.

3. Missionary appropriations to charges shall be counted as part of the salary.

4. Income from other sources such as teaching school, farming, real estate business, and any other activities not in direct connection with the work of the church shall be counted as part of the salary of those who are to benefit from the Sustentation fund.

5. Student pastors, on account of the part time nature of their service to the pastoral charge, shall participate to the extent of fifty per cent only of the amount payable on the full-time basis.

6. Scholarship aid to students serving as pastors shall not be counted as part of their salary.

7. No pastor serving a station charge shall be eligible for Sustentation benefits unless passed upon by the committee administering the funds or the Town and Country Commission.

8. A pastor serving less than a full conference year shall participate in the Sustentation fund only in proportion to the time served.

9. No pastor shall receive more than an amount equal to 100 per cent of his deficit.

Recommendations

The Town and Country Commission Recommends:

1. That Rev. I. L. Claud, Rev. Hubert Pierce and Rev. T. C. Huff be appointed as the committee to administer the Sustentation Funds.

2. That the Board of Education, the Board of Missions and Church Extension, the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the Board of Lay Activities continue their financial co-operation for the coming year.

3. That Glenn F. Sanford be continued as Executive Secretary of the Commission.

Special Emphasis for 1945-1946

1. The Group Ministry plan of work will be made the major interest of the Commission for the coming year.

2. The Commission will cooperate in the establishing of new churches to meet both rural and urban needs in the Conference.

3. The Commission will cooperate with the Board of Education in an ever expanding program of camping designed to meet the needs of intermediates in the small church.

4. The executive secretary should give the necessary time to see that the work on the "Mobile Chapel" is properly promoted.

5. The Commission expects to cooperate fully with the work of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Board of Lay Activities.

REPORT NO. 3 OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS ANNUAL CONFERENCE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Hendrix College has done a great work in Christian education and we can point with pride to her achievement. She has had great administrative leadership, effective business executives, and a faculty equipped by training and experience to give rich service to her students. The continuing work of Hendrix is essential to Methodism in Arkansas.

of Hendrix is essential to Methodism in Arkansas. Physical needs keenly felt for a long while at the college are now made more clear. We believe that Arkansas Methodists and their friends will respond to an appeal to help expand the physical plant and the productive endowment of Hendrix.

We recommend:

1. That the North Arkansas and Little Rock Conferences designate September 1946 to September 1947 as Hendrix College Year, during which time through a well organized financial campaign an appeal will be made to the friends of Hendrix for \$1,000,000 for the college.

2. That a planning committee be named on which there will be six members from each Conference named by the Conference, on recommendation of the Board of Education, to meet with the Building and Finance Committees of the Board of Trustees to plan this campaign.

3. That the building plan include:

- (a) Religion and Arts building to cost approximately \$200,000. This building will contain a beautifully appointed chapel, a larger auditorium for general convocations, some rooms for classes in religion and fine arts, and some fine arts studios.
- (b) Commons building to cost approximately \$75,000, containing a dining room, a kitchen, and student union.
- (c) A woman's dormitory to cost approximately \$150,000.
- (d) Gymnasium to cost approximately \$75,000.

4. That \$500,000 be added to the Hendrix endowment.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

On the whole question of the liquor traffic the stand and program of the Methodist Church needs no clarification other than that given in the Discipline. (See paragraphs 2013; 235, 236, and 148, line 3.)

"Especially now does the call arise for the Church like a plumed knight to take the lists in an effort to purify life. For seldom has the liquor traffic ever shown such an *effrontery* more brazen than that of the present moment. On billboard, over the air, in motion picture, by way of the pages of newspaper and magazine, people are urged with all the guiles of art to employ deceiving beverages as a means to make the party lively, the spirit happy, and set conduct in step with the smartness of current custom." "Society almost always stands utterly unprotected in the faces of in-

"Society almost always stands utterly unprotected in the faces of iniquity until the Church of Christ takes the initiative against it. To expect the average citizen to lead is to expect too much. But the Church, by the purity of its Founder, the nobility of its precepts and the purposes of its program, now as always has the compulsion on its soul to lead THE CRU-SADE against beverage alcohol and its destructive consequences."

"In this hour Methodism accepts its responsibility and calls all of its members to join the fight. We must continue to press toward the goals of total *abstinence* for the individual and legal prohibition by the state." "The Methodist Church does not retreat in this trying hour. It has

"The Methodist Church does not retreat in this trying hour. It has accepted no discharge in the war for a nation free from the domination of legalized liquor. We do not bind ourselves to the trail of moral wreckage across the ages of repeal. Increased crime, social drinking, the open saloon under new dress and name, depressed morals, wrecked homes, debauched youth, mounting traffic tolls, broken pledges, and other glaring evils almost without number shout the call for a reawakened conscience that will meet this crisis. We look to Almighty God for strength to meet the issue."

"Strong phrases of opposition will not achieve salutary ends. Long resolutions will not accomplish saving goals. Great language will never drive demons from the earth. What is needed is not feather dusters but steam shovels. Devoted people, aroused in the interests of humanity and following in the paths of well-formed plans, though pursuing their course for decades without desired results, yet at last will gain their ends, if they faint not."

Let us as Methodists of Arkansas carry on an intelligent and militant program of education in the scientific truths about alcohol and in aggressive action against its vicious hold upon our people.

sive action against its vicious hold upon our people. I. We recommend the carrying out of the Discipline to the full extent of its purpose by organizing a temperance committee in each local church. (See paragraph 148, line 3)

II. We recommend the reading by each pastor to his congregation the article on "Temperance" pages 562-565 in the Discipline of the Methodist Church on World Temperance Sunday or other suitable times.

III. We heartily endorse the work of the Anti-Saloon League in Arkansas and recommend continued cooperation in this work by organizing for local option votes in counties and state. We recommend a contribution of \$350 to said League from the funds alloted to the conference board of temperance.

IV. We call attention to the fact that in Arkansas gambling in various forms is an increasing menace to public and private morals and we urge the same vigorous and planned opportunity for its outlawry as the liquor traffic.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

The statement of the supreme aim of missions as found in the Methodist Dicipline is as follows:

"The supreme aim of missions is to make the Lord Jesus Christ known to all peoples in all lands as their divine Savior, to persuade them to become his disciples, and to gather these disciples into Christian Churches; to enlist them in the building of the Kingdom of God; to co-operate with these churches; to promote world Christian fellowship; and to bring to bear on all human life the spirit and principles of Christ."

It has been the intention and purpose of this Board during the past year to carry out these aims and to extend help from both the Missions appropriations and the Church Extension appropriations; to every field from which requests have come where we believed a real need existed. In following through this procedure we have extended aid from the Missions Fund to 38 pastoral charges where there was not sufficient local support to carry on our program. We have extended aid from the Extension Fund to eleven projects where new buildings or repairs are being made. Through a procedure whereby the Executive Committee of the Board has some three or four extra meetings during the year, it has been possible to extend aid to building projects at the time when they were needed, and in some instances appropriations have been made to missionary projects where the need was acute. We believe this to be a good procedure, in view of the fact that many repairs and building projects for both parsonages and churches receive added stimulus when the Board extends aid to such projects.

Your Board expresses deep appreciation for the fine missionary spirit that exists throughout the Conference, and we are anxious especially to compliment those churches, and groups of churches and districts, that have set up special funds to do specific missionary work in their territory. Of special interest to the Conference is the City Board of Missions which has been set up in the City of Ft. Smith, and which is now employing a full time missionary and his wife, and has already bought property and established work in at least one new point. The work which is being carried on in the Jonesboro District through a fund derived from a district fund assessment, seems to be making splendid progress in developing new territory in that District. There are two projects in our Conference which are sponsored and financed largely through the General Board of Missions and Church Extension, namely: —The Newton County project, which also assists with a part of the mission program in Boone County; and the Madison County project which has been established this year with headquarters at Huntsville. These two fields are wide open and we shall watch with great interest their development.

The missionary project which has been carried on at Jacksonville as a Conference supported program, to meet the need of a large number of war workers that have been concentrated there, has made a good contribution to the religious life of people from all over the state. It is notable that the local church under the impetus of the assistance that has been given from our Board, has increased its program and its financial ability in such a way that it promises very shortly to become a self sustaining and progressive charge.

In all the districts there is interest on the part of larger churches in going out and reorganizing abandoned churches, and organizing new communities where there is Methodist constituency.

We offer the following recommendations:

1. That where pastors or district superintendents are planning to go into new communities or sections to establish mission work, that the expert service of the Rev. Glenn Sanford, of the Town and Country Commission be used to help survey the needs of the communities, and to adapt programs that will meet those needs. 2. We recommend that where new buildings are to be erected, or new points established, that the District Committee on Church Location be used according to the Discipline to help establish the best possible location for such buildings.

3. We recommend that all church buildings and improvement projects which anticipate asking the Conference or General Board for financial assistance shall submit to the Committee on Plans of the Board, simple sketches and specifications of the proposed work, and in cases of remodeling, a kodak picture of the present building with sketches to indicate the proposed remodeling.

4. We recommend that charges making application for missionary appropriations shall be governed by the principles governing the Sustentation Fund, and that as far as possible the Sustentation Fund shall carry the responsibility of paying the minimum salary, and that mission funds shall be appropriated to those distinctly missionary projects.

5. We recommend that the entire church co-operate to the fullest in the evangelistic phase of the Crusade for Christ in which we are at present engaged.

6. We recommend that every pastoral charge make a special effort to accept a minimum of the asking for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and that all churches that possibly can, make their acceptance larger than the asking.

General Recommendations

1. That the present arrangement on Town and Country Work be continued, and that Rev. Glenn F. Sanford be appointed as Executive Secretary of Town and Country Commission.

2. That Rev. W. F. Cooley be appointed Conference Missionary Secretary.

3. That each church conduct a carefully planned School of Missions, using Christ and Our Country as the text.

4. That the following committee be named to work with a committee from the W. S. C. S. to study the feasibility of conducting a Conference School of Missions and to conduct such school if they think advisable: Jefferson Sherman, W. F. Cooley, and Charles Stuck.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON CHAPLAINS

Upon the recommendation of the District Superintendents, and the approval of the Planning Commission, it was moved that a date be set early in the Conference year when the church will raise a fund out of which returning chaplains may draw funds for special services. The following are nominated to administer this fund: The chairman of the Board of Evangelism, the chairman of the Board of Education, the chairman of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, the chairman of the Town and Country Commission and one member of the Cabinet. The goal of the fund is to be \$5,000.00, and the apportionments are to be made for the districts by the District Superintendents and the Bishop, without any thought of pressure being exerted in any church. The date suggested for the raising of the Fund is Sunday, November 11. By consent of the Commission, the recommendation was amended as follows: (1) The Conference Treasurer shall be the receiver and disburser of the fund. (2) The date shall be as near to November 11 as is convenient.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

We are now in the period of Evangelism as designated in the Crusade for Christ. Our Church is giving evangelism the same place that John Wesley's heart-warming experience gave it in Methodism's early days. We recommend: I. That all schools for Christian workers, both Conference and local,

Pastors' schools, youth assemblies, emphasize evengelism with definite cour-ses of study and that field work be undertaken where possible. 1. That the Board of Managers of the Arkansas Pastors' School in-

clude a course of evangelism in the ensuing session.

II. That every District set up a District Committee of Evangelism as early as possible in the Conference year, which Committee shall function in co-operation with the Conference and General Boards.

1. That the responsibility for District Schools rest upon this Committee.

2.That District Rallies be held as follows: Jonesboro District, November 26, 10:00 a.m.; Paragould District, November 26, 2:00 p.m.; Batesville District, November 27, 10:00 a. m.; Helena District, November 27, 7:00 p. m.; Searcy District, November 28, 10:00 a.m.; Conway District, November 28, 3:00 p. m.; Fayetteville District, November 30, 10:00 a. m.; Fort Smith District, November 30, 7:00 p. m.

3. That District Schools be held in the month of January in each District in the Conference.

4. That the District Committee promote an Annual Survey in each Church to create and to maintain a workable prospect list.

5. That the District Committee give special attention and assistance to Churches not receiving any members on profession of faith.

III. That every District Superintendent make a careful study of his District for possibilities of organizing new Churches.

Recognizing that the success of evangelism rests in the hands of the local pastor, we further recommend:

IV. That the Committee on Evangelism be organized in each local Church and encouraged to function.

V. That every pastor attend his District School of Evangelism.

VI. That, since one of the greatest evangelistic fields is in the group of inactive membership, each pastor be urged to seek to re-enlist all those residing within the bounds of his parish.

VII. That each pastor follow the requirements of the Discipline in the instruction and training of children, youth, and adults for Church membership.

VIII. We recommend the appointment of G. C. Taylor as Conference Director of Evangelism for the ensuing year.

IX. That the World Service Commission appropriate the same percentage for the expenses of this Board.

X. Recognizing that the success of the whole program of evangelism will be a direct answer to prayer we hereby recommend to each pastor that he organize and promote Prayer Circles within each Church.

We wish to express our sincere appreciation to Bishop J. C. Broomfield for the great spiritual messages which he is bringing to us.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

In view of the fact that no annual meeting of the Woman's Society of Christian Service was held this year, and that other meetings were few and

brief, the work has shown satisfactory progress. Six new societies were organized in 1945 making a total of 236, with 8122 members and with a Wesleyan Guild membership of 1122. We are working for a 10% increase in 1946.

The pledge to the Woman's Division of \$22,000, will be paid in full. Various projects carried on through Missionary Education and Service, Supplies, and Christian Social Relations, are over and above this pledge. The Esther Case Scholarship, for study grants at Scarritt College,

The Esther Case Scholarship, for study grants at Scarritt College, amounting to \$10,000, has been completed. The Grace Stone Scholarship, a project of the Ft. Smith District, supports a young woman in the National Training School in Kansas City.

Four young women from the North Arkansas Conference are in Training for full time service at Scarritt College, and one at the National Training School, while other recruits are doing preparatory work in high school and college.

Within the year the eight districts of the conference have become fully organized, thereby training more women for leadership and improving the quality of work done.

The Woman's Society has co-operated in the financial phase of the Crusade for Christ, and is in readiness to assist in the objective of Evangelism, and the others that will follow.

ARKANSAS HISTORICAL COMMISSION

It often happens that much of interest and of intrinsic value in the growth and development of a people and their institutions is lost because of the failure of people at the time to recognize or appreciate the significance of the current events.

Methodism in Arkansas has a history as old as the history of Arkansas itself. Methodist ministers and lay members of the Methodist Church were among the pioneer settlers of the state.

It is our feeling that our generation would have a larger appreciation of the growth and development of our church in Arkansas if it were more familiar with the many human interest stories and incidents and many other matters of interest incident to the building of Methodism in Arkansas.

The interest our generation has in these matters will be multiplied many fold in the life of succeeding generations. The opportunity of these later generations, however, to secure authentic, historical records of early Methodism in Arkansas will be quite limited as compared to our own.

We owe it to ourselves and to generations unborn to carefully gather and preserve the records of the tears and triumphs and unselfish sacrifices of our fathers and mothers who laid so well the foundations of the Methodist Church in our state. Saddle bags, letters, old records, pictures, Bibles, hymnals and a thousand and one other matters of historical interest and value should be preserved for the future.

To that end we recommend:

That ministers and lay members of our church join hands in the gathering together the many things that have historical significance and value in their relationship to early Arkansas Methodism. This can be done better now than any succeeding generation can do it.

2. That Miss Ethel Millar, of Conway, Arkansas, a member of the Commission, be made the custodian of this historical collection, and that all such material be sent to her at Conway, Arkansas.

3. That space be provided, if possible, in some room or section of a room in one of the buildings on the campus of Hendrix College for the display of the materials so collected. 4. That R. E. L. Bearden, Jr., be added to the Commission.

COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

At the conclusion of the signing of the surrender document on the battleship Missouri, General MacArthur said at least two things of great importance:

1. "A new era is upon us Military alliance, balance of power, League of Nations, all in turn failed, leaving the only path to be by way of the crucible of war. The utter destructiveness of war now blots out this alternative. We have had our last chance. If we do not now devise some greater and more equitable system, Armageddon will be at our door.

2. "The problem basically is theological and envolves a spiritual re-crudescence and improvement of human character that will synchronize with our almost matchless advance in science, art, literature and all material and cultural developments of the past two thousand years. It must be of the spirit if we are to save the flesh."

Since the Methodist Church accepts the above thesis and believes that world peace will be a continuing process purchased at the price of eternal vigilance, we suggest that each church provides for the continued study of the principles underlying world law and order.

We recommend:

1. That the committee on world peace distribute materials provided by the Commission On World Peace. 2. Three minute talks by the lay leader or other lay workers at the

regular preaching services.

3. Have a forum for discussing the most important issues relating to world peace.

4. Try to get a minimum of ten subscriptions to the World News Letter.

5. Provide for talks on world peace at community meetings.

Place instructive pictures on the church bulletin board. 6.

7. Co-operate with the district superintendent in expressing a distinct opinion to our senators and congressmen.

8. For background reading we suggest the following books:

REPORT OF THE ARKANSAS METHODIST COMMISSION

To The Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences:

The Arkansas Methodist Commission, comprising equal membership from the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences, submits the follow-ing report (See Financial Statement from October 15, 1944 to October 15, 1945) and makes the following recommendations for the ensuing year, in according with designed worked in the annual methods for the Little Comaccordance with decisions reached in the annual meeting of the Joint Commission on October 19, 1945:

1. That we again record our sincere thanks to Dr. E. T. Wayland for his services as Editor and Business Manager and to the helpful staff of assistants working with him. 2. That Dr. E. T. Wayland be re-elected as Editor and Business Man-

ager of the Arkansas Methodist. 3. That there be allowed, for the Arkansas Methodist, by the Com-mission on World Service and Finance, the same apportionments for the ensuing year as were granted by the Conferences during the year now closing.

4. That the Annual Conferences adopt as their plan for the Annual Circulation Campaign for the Arkansas Methodist the same general plan Journals, and that January 6th through January 13th be fixed as the date for the Annual Circulation Campaign this conference year. 5. That the subscription price of the Arkansas Methodist be \$1.25, the

same as for the past three years.

The Commission desires to commend the business management of the property owned by the Arkansas Methodist at 1018 Scott Street. Under the present management, the property has been cleared of all indebtedness

and is now producing a substantial income for the paper. The floor space in the building, formerly used as the office of the Ar-kansas Methodist is now renting for \$45 per month, which amount practically pays the rent on the downtown office which the Arkansas Methodist oc-cupies in the Donaghey Building. The downstairs floor space, formerly occupied by the editor of the Arkansas Methodist as living quarters has been converted into apartments which are now renting for seventy-five dollars per month, while the present editor provides his own home with a rent allowance of forty dollars per month.

If we add to the net cash receipts from the building, as shown in the financial report submitted for record, the §240 rent allowance made to the assistant editor on salary, and subtract from expenditures two-thirds of the amount paid for insurance policies which run three years, we have a net profit of \$1,684.53 from the operation of the building this year. That amount will pay for the downtown office of the Arkansas Methodist and the rent allowance for the editor's home and still leave a net profit of \$604.53 to the paper.

It is the feeling of the Joint Commission, after careful study of the matter on different occasions, that the property, as now administered, is a decided asset to the Arkansas Methodist.

## MEMOIRS

#### CAPTAIN THOMAS E. McKNIGHT

### 1909 - 1945

Thomas E. McKnight, was born October twentieth, 1909, at Paris, Missouri, where his parents, the Rev. and Mrs. B. A. McKnight, were serving the Paris station in the Missouri Conference. He died February fourteenth, 1945, while serving on Luzon. He met with death while carrying a wounded private to a place of safety. He is buried in the American Armed Service Cemetery at Balarma, Philippine Islands.

He was educated at John Brown University; Henderson-Brown and Henderson State Teachers College of Arkadelphia, Arkansas, from which he was graduated with the A. B. Degree. He also attended Emory University of Atlanta, Georgia, and Southern Methodist University of Dallas, Texas, from which he was graduated with the B. D. Degree.

from which he was graduated with the B. D. Degree. Brother McKnight, was converted early in life, and joined the Methodist Church. He was licensed to preach at the age of sixteen years, and served the Scotland, Valley Springs, Judsonia, and Widener and Madison from which charge he was transferred to the North Texas Conference and served the Anna Charge while studying in Southern Methodist University. After receiving his degree, Brother McKnight, enlisted in the Chaplain

After receiving his degree, Brother McKnight, enlisted in the Chaplain Corps of the United States Army, and received training for Chaplaincy at Yale and Washington Universities. He served as Chaplain with the rank of Captain under General Douglas MacArthur in the South Pacific. He saw service in three hard campaigns, the Admiralty, Leyte, and Luzon. In one of his last letters home, he told his parents, "The going is tough. If the worst comes to me, I shall look down from heaven watching my parents, seven brothers and three sisters—and shall be waiting to meet them one by one as you enter the gates of heaven."

His superior officers from General MacArthur down and his fellow chaplains testify to his fearlessness, and devotion to duty. He had three brothers in the service, and there are four ministers in the family. Brother McKnight, was married to Miss Fern N. Nichols, of Arkadel-

Brother McKnight, was married to Miss Fern N. Nichols, of Arkadelphia, who, with their daughter, aged twelve, live in Stockton, California. Besides these, he is survived by his parents, the Rev. and Mrs. B. A. McKnight, seven brothers, and three sisters.

Mrs. Guy Murphy, nee Ada May Riggin, daughter of Dr. John H. and Mrs. Lula Riggin, was born at Warren, Arkansas. on November 12, 1881, and died at Conway, Arkansas, on June 19, 1945. Burial was at Clarendon in the family burial lot on June 20. She was married to Guy Murphy on October 26, 1905, at Camden. Five children were born to them, two sons and three daughters, three of whom died in infancy. Two daughters survive, Rachel—Mrs. W. S. Edwards, Jr., of New Madrid, Missouri, and Marian— Mrs. O. H. Ball of Walnut Ridge, Arkansas. Three grandchildren also survive. Funeral services were conducted in the Murphy home in Conway by District Superintendent H. M. Lewis, Rev. Edward Harris, the pastor, and the writer.

Mrs. Murphy was educated in the public schools, Henderson-Brown and Hendrix College. She was an unusual woman, unusual in her knowledge of the Bible, unusual in her familiarity with Methodist history, doctrine, and policy, unusual in her avidious reading, and most unusual in her unique personality.

Her service to her church was joyous and abiding. Especially was her work in the Woman's Society of Christian Service and the Church School of great efficiency. Her many talents made her of larger service and brought to her an honored and appreciated place in every community in which she lived. The following tribute from the Woman's Society of Christian Service, Circle No. 5, of Conway, of which she was a devoted and greatly

beloved member, was read and unanimously adopted: "We pause reverently this afternoon to pay tribute to our beloved, departed member, Mrs. Guy Murphy.

No meed of praise from us could add to her unsullied character or brighten her untarnished reputation.

Her life was an open book, known and read by each one of us. She needs no defense, commendation, or ecomium from us. A fulsome eulogy would not be in keeping with her expressed wish, but because of our deep love for her we desire to place on record this humble tribute to her sacred memory.

Mrs. Murphy left us a record rarely attained in devotion to her church in all of its activities. She was an example of wise choosing and investing of time, opportunity, talents, and possessions. Her stewardship of every Godgiven privilege was such as we may emulate.

We were often impressed with her knowledge and interpretation of the Bible as she taught as 'one having authority.' Methodism was to her a profound and unceasing challenge to the best

in human development of life and freedom.

She was born and reared in a Methodist parsonage, then in married life she was the wife of our beloved Rev. Guy Murphy. True she was the daughter of a distinguished family, her father famed and honored for his great ability as a Bible scholar, but many women of like fortunate Christian environment in youth and adult life have not thus utilized these rare opportunities.

Mrs. Murphy was a positive character. She had definite convictions and defended them ably. 'She walked in the highway of her own integrity and kept company with her self-respect."

She read widely, discriminatingly, and profitably. Her love of the beautiful in nature, art, and music was characteristic, but to us her love and devotion to the ideals and program of her church were paramount.

To her loved ones we extend our prayerful and appreciative love and sympathy and among ourselves we mourn our loss of a most valued and dear member who 'left us not without record in that she went about doing good'."

Mrs. Catherine Laney Galloway was born in 1864 at Alexandria, La. She married the late Rev. A. T. Galloway November 20, 1883.

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## SESSIONS OF THE CONFERENCE

The "Arkansas Conference" and the "White River Conference" were united in 1914 to form the present "North Arkansas Conference."

The Conference determined that its annual notation should date from the time of the organization of the Arkansas Conference in 1836, instead of following the date fixed by the consolidation of the Arkansas and White River Conferences, when the name was changed to North Arkansas Conference in 1914.

The Conference session of 1939 voted to maintain the numerical notation of the Conference in The Methodist Church.

### STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

(1) That each undergraduate be required to report according to the call of the several committees before the opening of the Conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his control.

(2) That the Conference Treasurer be paid a salary of \$80.00 per month and allowed necessary office expenses with the provision that \$100.00 of this salary be paid out of funds raised for support of district superintendents. \$100.00 additional shall be paid to the Conference Treasurer for employing extra help in emergencies.

(3) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one delegate from each church in each Pastoral Charge; provided further, that each station charge shall have three elected delegates.

(4) That figures answering the question: "Members reported last year," be the total of the active and inactive members as printed in the Journal of the last Annual Conference.

(5) That the District Superintendent's figures of all apportionments be accepted as the official figures.

(6) That the apportionments for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.

(7) That all Statistical Reports be turned in to the Statistical Secretary by the hour of the first session; and that all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer not later than 2:00 p. m on the opening day of the Conference session; and that the names of all delinquents shall be reported to the Conference.

(8) When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishop's cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission, or an officer in the Conference administration, except members specifically designated by the Discipline.

(9) That the Secretary of the Bishop's cabinet be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Jounal.

(10) That all members of our Annual Conference who attend its annual sessions, except superannuated and supernumerary preachers, be required to pay the church entertaining the Conference one dollar registration fee.

(11) That at all future sessions of the Conference entertainment be provided on the Harvard plan (bed and breakfast) except for superannuated ministers and pastors whose salaries are less than \$1,200.00, for whom full entertainment shall be furnished.

(12) All Boards that receive money from the Annual Conference shall make a detailed report of all expenditures to that Conference, and said reports shall be reported in the Conference Minutes.

(13) The list of Lay Delegates elected by the charge conferences shall be completed and their names given to the host church and Conference Secretary thirty days before the date of the Annual Conference.

(14) That the District Stewards' meetings shall apportion the askings for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and for General Administration Fund, and for Jurisdictional Expense, to the several Charges in each District on an equitable basis,

(15) Annuity payments to retired accepted supply preachers shall be the minimum payments specified in paragraph 1633 of the 1944 Discipline. When such a local preacher is given this relationship he shall be paid the same retirement honorarium as if he were a member of the Conference.

(16) The Secretary of the North Arkansas Annual Conference shall be nominated by the Cabinet when their report on nominations is made. Be it further resolved that the Secretary of the Annual Conference shall continue in office in the next Annual session of the Conference.
