FIRST DAY - AFTERNOON SESSION

The One Hundred Seventeenth Session of the North Arkansas Conference of the Methodist Church opened in the beautiful new sanctuary of First Methodist Church, Blytheville, June 11, 1952, at 1:30 p. m., with Bishop Paul E. Martin presiding.

The Hymn No. 402 "And Are We Yet Alive" was sung, after which

the opening prayer of the Conference was led by Bishop Chas. C. Selecman.

Bishop Martin asked that the secretary elected for the new qua irernium, the Rev. Alfred A. Knox, come forward and name the men to assist him in the Conference roll call of lay and clerical members present. A check of the attendance showed that the following were present: 196 Clerical Delegates; 89 Lay Delegates; 49 Approved Supplies.

Bishop Martin introduced Bishop J. Wascom Pickett, presiding Bishop of the Delhi (India) Area, and stated that Bishop Pickett would bring messages to the Conference on the evening and twice on Thursday.

Announcments were made concerning the Board sessions in the afternoon so as not to interfere with the Communion Service.

Mrs. Paul E. Martin was introduced to the Conference by the host pastor, Roy I. Bagley.

Brumley being the speaker for the morning. The Hymn No. 162 "O For A Thousand Tongues to Sing" was sung after which D. L. Dykes led the morning prayer. Rev. Brumley spoke on "The Lift of John Wesley" sharing with us the many places of interest in England dear to the hearts of Methodists.

Report of the District Superintendents

June 12,1952

Recently an issue of our Arkansas Methodist, received into over 11,000 homes of our conference, carried an editorial under the caption, GENERAL CONFERENCE GIVES EVANGELISM TOP PRIORITY.

A quotation from the report referred to, and adopted by the General Conference as charting our task for the coming years, invited repeated

emphasis:

"Every available resource should be used, our total manpower drafted, every energy and intelligence employed, to win our world to Christ. Only He can save us. Nothing else we do is as important as leading men to love and obey Him.

No one can be Christian without being evangelistic. Nothing could be more untrue than the notion that evangelism is merely a part of our church program, a separate activity to be carried on sporadically by a select few. The whole business of the church is to save souls. Its entire program has the single goal of bringing persons into a Christlike life. Education and evangelism, nurture and conversion, administration and admonition, worship and social service, are dynamic, inseparable elements of one passion and purpose."

This clear interpretation of our task for the coming quadrennium has long been exemplified in the ideals, emphasis and program of our conference, but at no time in our history has this conception of the full and unified Christian purpose been more thrillingly put into practice than during the past conference year. Truly we have reaped an abundant harvest and we are reverently aware that the fruits we have garnered have been made possible by the vision and labors of those going before us as well as by the prayers and zealous works of our immediate company of fellow Methodists.

During this year, our pastors have received into the membership of our churches 7,671 persons. Of this total number, 3,564 have been received on profession of faith and by vows. All the agencies and energies

of our fellowship have been directed toward the major goal of winning the world for Christ, and our inspirations have been drawn from this central purpose. The 66,000 members of our Church Schools with their consecrated and faithful officers and teachers working through 527 separate Sunday Schools have had their part. The 15,000 members of our official women's groups, organized and functioning through 300 local societies, with their programs of prayer and study and unending deeds of love and service have had a vital share in the achievements totalled from every area of our church life, while at the same time these devoted women have raised through their organizd groups \$183,558.00. Thousands of laymen, working through official boards, Men's Brotherhood groups and evangelistic visitation teams have experienced a new joy in the service of Christ and have pooled their labors with that of their pastors to bring the recorded achievements in which we rejoice today. From hundreds of the churches come testimony of renewed faith and dedication registered in more devoted attendance upon the services of worship and in increased response to the underlying stewardship appeal of a vitally evangelistic gospel. Our total membership now stands at 99,304 and that mythical group previously referred to as "inactive members" not only ceases to be a statistical fact from here on, but gives evidence of feeling the fires of a new consecration which will replenish the altars of their own hearts and refill the pews and coffers of many a local congregation.

On the apportionment of \$108,322.00 given to our churches to raise for World Service and Conference Benevolences this year, a total of \$114,982.00 has been contributed as an expression of our people's zeal and faith. In addition to this, \$51,873.00 has been dedicated in Advance Specials. At the beginning of the Advance program, four years ago, our conference was asked to set as a goal in Advance giving the sum of \$180,382.00, for the quadrennium. Already a total of \$205,519.00 is reported, with other amounts yet to come. Hendrix College and Ministerial Training and Church School Rally Day have brought offerings of \$15,382.00 and generous contributions are recorded for Wesley Foundation work. Our hearts have been mindful of the cry of the orphan child in our midst as witnessed by the special gifts to our Arkansas Methodist Children's Home, reaching a total this year of \$22,502.00 as compared with \$18,556.00 the year before and some \$16,000.00 the year preceeding that.

At no one place has the basically evangelistic zeal of our Church been more eloquently expressed than in the area of new church and parsonage building. A total of \$1,012,717.00 has been raised for building projects, including the retirement of building debts. These offerings have resulted this year in the completion of 33 new units, with 17 of these being churches, 8 new educational plants and 8 new parsonages. There are 25 additional units in process in building, 12 of these being churches, 9 educational buildings, and 4 new parsonages. Twenty-seven structures have this year become debt free and are now ready for official dedication. Fourteen of this number are churches, five are educational buildings and eight are parsonages.

Golden Cross, Race Relations Day offerings, Kansas Flood Relief, aid for Arkansas tornado victims and many other causes have elicited a compassionate response from the people called Methodists in the North Arkansas Conference.

In all these victories and advances our loyal pastors and faithful people everywhere are seeing a vision of yet greater things to come. Truly He goeth before us and points us to fields that are white unto harvest. In His name, we shall continue to go about all the cities and villages, teaching the things that belong to our peace, preaching the gospel of the Kingdom and in His name healing every manner of sickness and disease among the people. We, with Him as never before, are seeing the multitudes and are moved with compassion upon them because they faint and are scattered abroad as sheep without a shepherd. We, too, remember those

disciples of old, whom, in the face of their task, the Master invited to prayer and re-dedication, and then He gave unto them power. Unto Him be glory and praise. Amen.

Albert Gatlin spoke for the amendment that the Boards are not the hiring institutions, but the Conference is and should be liable for this

annuity claim.

Ewing T. Wayland made an amendment to the amendment that the editors of the Arkansas Methodist be placed in the category of the executive secretaries and that their annuity be reduced by 1/3. The motion was seconded by J. W. Workman.

Spicer and S. B. Wilford spoke against the amendment. Alfred Knox read the disciple paragraph which was pertinent to the

The amendment to the amendment by Ewing T. Wayland that annuity responsibility be reduced by 1/3 was called to a vote and failed to pass

Ray McLester and H. W. Jinske spoke for the original amendment. The amendment by Ira Brumley was brought to a vote and passed. Roy Bagley presented Dr. Enoch Brown and Harvey Kidd, both local

pastors of churches in Blytheville, to the Conference.

Eric J. Reaves made an amendment to the amendment that the Conference Evangelists be appointed with annuity claim.

Raymond Franks and Brady Cook spoke against the report.

The amendment to the amendment by Eric J. Reaves was

brought to a vote and failed to pass.

Dr. J. W. Workman made another amendment to the original amendment that the chaplains for the V. A. be given annuity providing it is not against the recent new legislation of the General Conference.

Raymond Franks spoke against the amendment and J. M. Workman withdrew his amendment. W. J. Spicer suggested that a study be made

of the situation.

Olin Finley spoke on accepted supplies — to see if they are covered in this annuity and asked that the Board of Conference Claimants study the report with this in mind. W. J. Spicer stated that this would be done with J. Wilson Critchlow.

Olin Finley then spoke on the relationship of accepted supplies and was of the opinion that there was discrimination. S. B. Wilford was recognized by the Bishop and gave a very fine picture of the accepted

supplies and the great work they are rendering.

Bishop Martin stated that the discussion had strayed from the original report. W. J. Spicer, Chairman of the Committee, asked that the report be considered. A vote was called for and the report was passed. with the amendment added.

Report No. 2 was filed by a vote of the Conference.

Secretary Knox asked that the attendance roll be brought up to date and names be turned in to the roll secretary, Alf Eason.

The report on the Town and Country Commission was read by N.

Lee Cate and filed with the secretary.

Floyd G. Villines, Chairman of the Commission spoke to the report and introduced Lester Hutchins of Van Buren County who spoke to the report as a layman, and a leader in the lay preaching program in his county.

Coy E. Whitten spoke to the report, giving a challenge to rural lay

leadership to follow the program of Lester Hutchins.

Floyd G. Villines called upon three of the rural preachers to speak briefly concerning the work in their parishes. Those who were called upon to report were: John Richardson, Vanndale; Fred Thompson, Branch Ct.; and Ray Burrow, Pleasant Plains.

Albert Gatlin spoke to the report, giving praise to all who contribut-

ed to the success of the program.

Ira A. Brumley spoke to the report offering the following amendment: Be it resolved, that the report be amended to read that in cooperating with other agencies involved that the Supply School be held in connection with the Arkansas Pastor's School, if possible. Albert Gatlin accepted the amendment and the entire report was voted on and passed.

Report No. 1 was adopted by unanimous vote and filed.

Report No. 2A on Hendrix College was read by Dr. Dykes and passed

by unanimous vote and filed with the secretary.

Dr. Matt Ellis introduced two new members of the Hendrix College Board of Trustees, Rev. Ethan Dodgen and Mr. Noble Gill.

Dr. George Baker, representative of S. M. U. spoke on the progress of the University, especially the School of Theology. 300 new theological students have applied for admission this next fall. Many of these will have to be rejected.

The report on Evangelism was read by Harold Spence, secretary and

was adopted by unanimous vote.

Bishop Pickett asked that John Bayliss present the report of the Board of Christian Literature. Glenn Brunner, secretary read the report. He also read the report of the joint commission of the Ark.-La. Methodist.

Dr. E. T. Wayland spoke to the report expressing appreciation for the

cooperation of all in support of the Arkansas Methodist. He stated that

there are 30,000 plus subscribers to the Ark.-La. Methodist.

Ray McLester spoke of the need of unifying the spirit of the paper by having one heading — Arkansas Louisiana Methodist. He asked that an amendment be made to give the commission authority to change the name if it is thought wise.

John Bayliss asked permission to bring a supplemental report later to name the members to the joint Commission on The Arkansas Metho-

dist. The reports were accepted by unanimous vote and filed.

Bishop Pickett returned the authority and responsibility to Bishop Martin with a personal word concerning his parents who were brought up within this Episcopal Area and Jurisdiction.

The report of the Committee on World Peace was called for and read

by Thurston Masters.

John McCormack spoke to the report read after first announcing that First Church, Jonesboro, was entertaining the superannuate ministers of the Conference and their wives and cabinet members with the noon luncheon.

The report was adopted by unanimous vote and filed.

The committee on Courtesies — introduced to the Conference Chaplain Leroy Henry and Dr. J. Wilson Critchlow.

Alfred Knox, Secretary, read paragraph 810 of the Discipline which states that all members of the Conference are requird to giv to the Conference Secretary the amount of salaries earned during the year.

After announcements the session adjourned at 2:40 with the singing

of the Doxology and prayer by Dr. George Baker.

THIRD DAY - MORNING SESSION

The Conference convened at 8:30 a.m. with Bishop Paul E. Martin presiding. The Hymn No. 311, "Come Thou Traveler Unknown," was sung. The morning prayer was led by James Meadors, pastor of the Mansfield Methodist Church. Robert E. L. Bearden spoke on "Methodism in Britain". Bishop Martin spoke briefly conferning his trip to the Ecumenical Conference last summer.

Uriah Smith reported for the Committee on Journal that the Journal

The report praised the work being done by Bates Sturdy as chaplain of the State Sanatorium at Booneville and recommended that this work be continued. Chaplain W. F. The report of the Board of Lay Activities was presented by J. Frank Warden, Jr., secretary of the Board. The report of the Committee on Group Insurance was presented by Raymond L. Franks, secretary. S. B. Wilford spoke to the report. A. W. The

This was voted by the conference. The Committee on Conference Relations voted that the following six ministers be addd to the list of superannuates, having reached the disciplinary age: E. W. This relationship was voted, after which each was given an opportunity to say a few words to the conference, and then presented a parchment, symbolic of the years of service rendered. Ben C. The secretary of the conference added an additional word of appreciation for Brother Guice, under whose evangelistic ministry he was converted. Harold D. Womack of the Board of Conference Claimants presented buttons to the new group of superannuates.

J. Clarence Wilcox spoke to a matter of personal privilege, praising the two men retiring from the Batesville District, E. W. Faulkner and M. A. Graves. He then presented a gift from the ministers of the Batesville District to their district superintendent, S. B. Wilford and wife,

who are completing six years of service on this district. Brother and

Mrs. Wilford both spoke words of appreciation.

The question was called, "Where shall the next session of the Annual Conference be held?" D. L. Dykes, Jr., pastor of Central Church, Fayetteville, presented Virgil Blossom, Superintendent of Schools in Fayetteville and chairman of the Official Board, who extended an invitation on behalf of Central Church. E. G. Kaetzell presented George M. Evans who extended the conference an invitation to come to Batesville. J. Ralph Hillis presented J. H. Wiseman of First Church, Searcy, who invited to conference to meet there. A vote was taken on the three invitations and it was decided that Central Church, Fayetteville, will be in place of meeting for the next Annual Conference.

Report No. 2 of the Board of Education was read by D. L. Dykes, Jr. Dr. Matt Ellis spoke to the report and brought out the urgent need to strengthen the resources of Hendrix College. The report was adopted.

Bishop Martin announced that E. T. Wayland would preside at the

afternoon session of the conference.

The order of the day having arrived, the matter of the discussion of the program of the church for the next quadrennium was presented. Dr. Matt Ellis, Ethan Dodgen, and W. Henry Goodloe, three of our conference delegation to the General Conference spoke on the following themes, "The Democracy of the General Conference", "Our Program for the next Four Years", and "Our World-Wide Program". Bishop Martin spoke concerning the great achievements of The Advance for Christ and His Church, and the program for the new quadrennum.

The morning session adjourned with the benediction by J. W. Moore.

THIRD DAY - AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session of the conference opened at 2:15 with at. T. Wayland, editor of The Arkansas Methodist, presiding. Hymr No. 249, "I Love to Tell the Story" was sung and J. W. Workman led the conference in prayer.

The report of The Western Methodist Assembly was presented by

E. H. Hook, superintendent of the assembly.

J. W. Critchlow, associate secretary of the Board of Pensions spoke concerning the advance which had been made in the pension program of the church in the past five years and of the needs remaining for further advances.

Dr. M. Lafayette Harris, president of Philander Smith College was introduced to the conference by the presiding officer and he spoke con-

cerning the work of his institution.

Report No. 2 of the Board of Missions was presented by Martin A. Bierbaum, secretary of the Board, and the financial report of the Board was filed without reading. A. W. Martin spoke to the report stressing the new lelegislation and the great need for new churches in congested areas. Mrs. Johnnie McClure, president of the conference Woman's Society of Christian Service, spoke to the report and presented the report of her organization to the conference. The report was adopted.

The report of the Board of Temperance was read by Luther K. Wilson, secretary of the board. J. Albert Gatlin then introduced Dr. K. O. White, pastor of First Baptist Church, Little Rock, and president of the Arkansas Temperance League, who brought a stirring address in speaking to

Allen D. Stewart presented a supplemental report from the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification. The secretary called the attention of the conference to the fact that several committees had no yet been organized according to the Discipline.

The host pastor, Roy I. Bagley made announcements concerning the worship services on Sunday morning. He also introduced J. Allen Webb, retired minister of the St. Louis Conference.

Chaplain Archie N. Boyd spoke to the conference representing D. Stewart Patterson, secretary of the Methodist Commission on Chaplains. He brought greetings from all the chaplains in the armed services and stressed the need for additional Methodist chaplains.

Report No. 3 of the Board of Education was presented by the chairman, Horace M. Lewis, who moved its adoption. Ira A. Brumley spoke to the report stressing the plans which had been made for the enlargement of the training program during the coming year and the need to enlarge church school enrollment. Roy Bagley spoke on the part the Board of

Evangelism would have in carrying out the program of the new quadrennium. Martin Bierbaum, conference Missionary Secretary, spoke on the part the Board of Missions would have in this program. The report was adopted.

Brother Brumley presented the report of the Board of Education which nominated district directors for his staff. They were elected by the conference, with the provision that Brother Brumley should make such changes as would be made necessary by changes in the appointments.

Ira A. Brumley offered the following resolution which had been signed by the chairman of all the boards concerned, and which was adopted by the conference:

BE IT RESOLVED, that the North Arkansas Conference have a Coordinating Council, composed of one District Superintendent, selected by the Cabinet; the Conference Secretary of Evangelism and one other member of the Board of Evangelism; the Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission and one other member of the Conference Missionary Secretary and one other member of the Board of Missions; the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education and one other member of the Board of Education; and the Conference Lay Leader and one other member of the Board of Lay Activities.

C. M. Reves, district superintendent of the Conway District, spoke words of appreciation for James S. Upton, who is prevented from attending this conference by teaching duties at Perkins School of Theology. Bishop Martin added words of praise for the work Brother Upton is doing at Hendrix College. Ray McLester spoke words of appreciation from the men of the Conway District for the work done by Dr. Reves.

Report No. 2 of the Board of Evangelism was presented by Harold Spence, and it was adopted.

W. Henry Goodloe, secretary of the Cabinet offered the following resolution on abandonment of church properties.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the following church properties be declared abandoned and that these properties be placed under the direction of the respective district boards of Church Building and Location: Louise Chapel, Jonesboro District; Clark's Chapel, Fort Smith District; Ford's Chapel, Conway District; Pace' Chapel, Osage Church, Fayette-ville District; Union Grove, Oak Grove in Greene County, and Shiloh in Lawrence County, all in the Paragould District; Forrest Grove in Monroe County in Forrest City District; Delaware in Yell County and Old Batesville Methodist Church (near Martinsville) both in Conway District.

Report No. 2 of the Board of Lay Activities was read by Joe Pierce, including the election of Charles A. Stuck as conference Lay Leader, and the various District Lay Leaders and their associates. The report was adopted.

The Board of Christian Literature brought in their report recommending members to the Joint Arkansas Methodist Commission. The report was adopted and the following elected to this commission: Robert P. Session, W. M. Womack, J. William Watson, Joel Cooper, J. G. Moore, R. J. Rice, and J. Frank Warden.

The following resolution was presented by J. William Watson and adopted by the conference:

WHEREAS, one of the recognized needs of the Arkansas-Louisiana area is an organized department of public relations with special responsibility in the field of gathering and dissemination of church news;

WHEREAS, the Commissions on World Service of the

Louisiana, Little Rock and North Arkansas Conference have under consideration ways and means for providing financial support for such a program;

WHEREAS, the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist serve the Arkansas-Louisiana Area, and the joint Commission of The Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist is representative of the whole of the

WHEREAS, the public relations office could most economically and efficiently be administered by the office

of the Area publications;
THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by this Annual Conference that is request the Joint Commission of The Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist to assume responsibility for directing this program and for effecting such relationship with the General Commission on Public Information (Methodist Information) as will best serve the interest of the area.

P. E. Cooley, conference treasurer, made his report and it was adopted

The report of the Commission on World Service and Finance was read by the secretary, Elmo Thomason, and explained by the chairman, Harold Eggensperger. The new item on Interdenominational Expense was explained.

A motion was made by J. Albert Gatlin, seconded and passed by the conference that a committee work during the coming year to study the whole problem of combining charges under the minimum salary condiwhose problem of combining charges under the infinitum salary contains set forth in the report. Frank Shell made the amendment, which was accepted by the commission, that in referring to payments to the minimum salary fund that the word "church" be substituted for the word "charge". The report was adopted.

Part 2 of the report was presented by the secretary, and the chairman, Brother Eggensperger spoke, stressing the need for increased world service giving. The report was adopted unanimously.

A. W. Martin presented the following resolution, which was adopted after Ewing T. Wayland had spoken to it:

WITTENESS the 1059 General Conference adopted as a conference of the co

WHEREAS, the 1952 General Conference adopted as a section of the report of The Quadrennial Committee of

twenty-eight the following paragraph:

"We believe it to be wise to release the creative powers of the areas, the conferences, and the churches. Therefore instead of following the pattern of the past two quadrenniums, in which the General Conference outlined a quadrennial program with particular emphasis and united action, we recommend that the local church, the annual conference, and the area consider their primary needs and opportunities and upon their own initiative take such steps as are necessary to meet these needs and to capitalize upon these opportunities". p. 109, Daily Christian Advocate

BE IT RESOLVED, that the North Arkansas Conference request the bishop and his cabinet to give serious consideration to calling a special session of the conference some time in the autumn of this year, after the meeting of the Area Council, for the purpose of giving mature consideration to the major phases of a carefully planned conference program for the quadrennium.

Report No. 3 of the Board of Ministerial Training and Qualification was presented by Lloyd Conyers. The report was adopted.

An additional report was presented by the Board of Education and it was adopted.

J. Clarence Wilcox read the report of the special committee set up last year to place a memorial to Chaplain Thomas B. McKnight in the new chapel at Hendrix College. The report stated that the committee had chosen as the memorial the beautiful stained glass window above the altar. The secretary of the conference read a letter from the McKnight family expressing their appreciation for this memorial.

Report No. 2 of the Board of Conference Claimants was presented by the secretary, Harold D. Womack. The question of the status of reserve chaplains was raised for discussion by Archie N. Boyd. Dr. Critchlow of the Board of Pensions made some clarification of the recent legislation. It was moved by A. W. Martin, seconded and passed that until further clarification of this matter all reserve chaplains shall be appointed "with annuity claim on the conference."

On motion of Harold D. Womack the conference voted that in answer to Question 43, "What other personal notation should be made?" that the name of Alvin C. Murray be made to be "with annuity claim on the conference" during the period of his service as chaplain.

William M. Wilder head the report of the Arkansas Historical Commission and it was adopted. Hubert Pearce presented the Commission with an old copy of the minutes of the Board of Missions of the White River Conference dated in 1880..

The report of the Committee on the American Bible Society was read by Woodrow Woods, secretary, who made the motion that the report be adopted. Miss Fern Cook then spoke to the report and it was adopted.

Frank Shell read the report of the Committee on District Conference Journals and it was adopted.

Joel Cooper offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted by the conference, with the secretary presiding for the vote.

WHEREAS, this is the last Annual Conference before the Jurisdictional Conference at which bishops are assigned for the new quadrennium and,

WHEREAS, the program of Methodism in this area and in our conference has made the greatest progress in its history under the leadership of Bishop Paul E. Martin and

WHEREAS, we not only think of Bishop and Mrs. Martin in terms of profound respect for their ability as our leaders, but also in terms of deep personal devotion to them as our friends,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the North Arkansas Annual Conference in session at Blytheville, on this fourteenth of June, 1952, that we sincerely request the return of Bishop and Mrs. Paul E. Martin to the Ar-

kansas-Louisiana Area for the ensuing quadrennium.

The Conference met at 8:30 a.m. for the Sunday morning worship service with Roy I. Bagley, host pastor, leading the service. The Invocation and The Words of Assurance were led by E. B. Williams. W. F. Cooley led the Responsive Reading and the Affirmation of Faith. S. B. Wilford led in the morning prayer. Brother Bagley presented Bishop Martin to the congregation, and before bringing his message he spoke words of appreciation for the Blytheville people and their entertainment of the conference. Bishop Martin then brought his message on the theme: "Obedience to the Vision". At the conclusion of the service Bishop Martin proceded with the concluding business of the conference.

Bishop Martin read a request from George McGehey for a Sabbatical Year and by the vote of the conference this was granted. S. B. Wilford moved that the conference grant permission for the appointment of Harry King to Arkansas College and this was voted. W. Henry Goodloe for the Cabinet nominated Paul Bumpers to the Board of Evangelism and Ray McLester to the Board of Hospitals and Homes. S. B. Wilford was nominated for membership on the Commission on World Service and Finance in the place of R. E. Connell.

The Commission on World Service and Finance recommended that

the Cross County Bank of Wynne be made depository for the funds of the Board of Conference Claimants instead of the Planters National Bank

of Hughes. This was voted by the conference.

Statistics for 1951 reveal the American Bible Society distribution of Bibles, Testaments and Portions 8,574,044 in the United States and 3,425,788 in Foreign lands; and also furnished money and materials to Bible Societies in Japan, Korea and Germany which produced approximately 4,674,344 copies. The grand total for 1951 was 16,674,176. This was an increase over the year before.

Due to the prevalence of hurtful literature in our nation some very bad situations are created. What one reads can be suggestive of evil and vicious thoughts and attitudes. A reading matter which awakens daring and crime in the heart and mind threatens the security of a home, com-

munity or a nation.

Therefore we the members of the American Bible Society Committee

wish to make the following recommendations.

First, That great care and emphasis be placed on reading well chosen portions of the Bible in the regular worship services in the morning and evening hours. Let it be borne in mind that God speaks from the sacred page to children and youth. Teachers and workers in the Church Schools have a great opportunity to help boys and girls every Sunday. We wish to urge the use of the Upper Room and the Sanctuary and other helps with the Bible in personal and family worship.

Second, We want to emphasize the world-wide reading of the scriptures from Thanksgiving to Christmas. Material for this Universal Reading should be secured early in October and placed in reach of the

people throughout the Church.

Third. That Bible Sunday, December 14th, be observed in all the Church and an offering taken and sent to the American Bible Society, 450 Park Avenue, New York 22, N. Y. Let this Bible Sunday date be observed as near the day as possible on circuits. Sermons on the worth of reading the Bible preached on Bible Sunday will encourage the people to a greater use of the Bible.

Fourth, We want to further recommend that our people be given the opportunity to help place the Scriptures in Hospitals, Sanatoriums and

Homes for the use and benefit of those in these Institutions.

Fifth, We exhort that there be an appreciative attitude in the Church for the work the American Bible Society is doing.

REPORT OF ARKANSAS METHODIST HISTORICAL COMMISSION

The Historical Commission has completed its second year of a long term plan to mark every historic site of interest to Methodists within the bounds of the North Arkansas Conference. During this year two markers were erected; one on the Hendrix College Campus and one at City Heights Church, Van Buren.

The Hendrix market relates briefly the history of the College and

greets the visitor to the campus with information about the founding and growth of the institution. The sign placed near City Heights Church commemorates the site of the home of Rev. John Harrell, the first Methodist minister assigned to Western Arkansas and Indian Territory. The pioneer preacher's home, built in 1844, still stands just behind the church.

These markers will be placed, one each year, until all historic Methodist sites are honored. Future plans include placques at the Jessup Church, in honor of Rev. Eli Lindsey, and at Harrisburg near the grave of

Rev. Isaac Brookfield.

During the year the Commission came into the possession of papers from the old Central Church in Fort Smith. Some valuable documents were sent to Miss Ethel Miller at the Hendrix College for the archives room. A large picture of the members of the Arkansas Conference in 1900 was framed and given to the Hendrix Library.

We believe that valuable historical documents and relics should be kept in a safe and central place where they may be preserved for us in the future. We have such a depository at Hendrix College and any persons or churches having such material are invited to place them in the college

for posterity.

We urge that every charge establish a local church Historical Committee for the collection and preservation of local church history and

that all records be kept in fireproof vaults.

We recommend that the chronology of the sessions of the White River Conference be included in the Annual Conference Journal parallel to the chronology of the sessions of the Arkansas Conference.

REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMISSION OF THE ARKANSAS METHODIST - - - THE LOUISIAN METHODIST

The Joint Commission of the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist met at the home of Rev. and Mrs. Ewing T. Wayland May 16, 1952, Dr. Aubrey G. Walton, chairman, presiding. In the absence of Joe Pierce, John Bayliss served as secretary Other members of the Commission present were, Rev. Glenn Bruner, Rev. I. L. Claud, O. C. Landers, John Moore, R. J. Rice, Rev. Charles Richards, and Rev. John Bayliss. Others present included Bishop Paul E. Martin, Rev. Virgil D. Morris, Alexandria, Louisiana member of the Louisiana Conference Publishing Committee, and the publications' Editors, Dr. E. T. Wayland and Rev. Ewing T. Wayland.

E. T. Wayland and Ewing T. Wayland presented the report of the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist and the financial report for the year 1951. These reports were filed for reference.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

Your Board of Education wishes to express to you our sincere appreciation for the splendid way in which you have responded to the program of Christian Education presented by the board during the past year. Your response has been especially noted in Bible Conferences, Training Schools, Coaching Conferences, Vacation Church Schools, Workshop Fellowship teams and Literature cultivation.

The Training program for the North Arkansas Conference surpasses by far any in recent years there having been 2,307 Training Credits issued

within the bounds of the Conference.

The number of young men studying for the Ministry in our Colleges and Universities continues to remain at at usually big level. There are 87 ministerial students from the North Arkansas Conference now in Colleges or Seminaries. There were nine of these students in the graduating class at Hendrix College this year.

Reports from the recent State Youth Assembly indicate that in number and results it was the finest in the history of the program on a State wide

basis.

Rally Day Offering for the Conference reached the highest total in our history and was participated in by the largest number of Churches.

The State Conference held at the University of Arkansas was attended this year for the first time by representatives from every College in the State with the largest number in attendance since its beginning.

The Adult Division and Children Division of the Church School showed a gain. The only dark spot in the accumulative picture is the loss in enrollment in the Youth Division which has been persistant in these last few years. Your Board wishes to urge that you give special attention to this division during the coming year to change this trend.

We wish to express appreciation for the splendid support given to Student work by each local Church and especially for your gifts to the new Student Center at the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville. We note the large number of churches and several districts have paid their apportionments in full.

We wish as a board to express publicly our sincere appreciation for the splendid work continually done by Dr. Ira A. Brumley. We honestly feel that the superior work done in this field in our Conference is due largely to his leadership. We wish to recommend Dr. Brumley for the position of Executive Secretary for his twenty-first year.

Report No. 2B

Many will remember the 68th year of Hendrix College for two outstanding reasons: the Grand Opening of the new Chapel and Auditorium and the announcement of an appropriation of \$300,000 to the college by the General Education Board of New York. The first of these was a dream come true and the realization of a long-felt need; the other, given for the purpose of making some needed adjustments in faculty and staff salaries, was a further recognition of the college and an endorsement of its program.

The new building, put in use last November, is a very big addition to the physical plant at Conway. Friends who helped make possible this beautiful chapel and auditorium are finding great satisfaction in seeing

the realization of excellent plans.

Many memorials have been placed in the Chapel and in the Prayer Room. The 21 small windows have been bought by relatives and friends of loved ones. The large Gothic window above the altar was given by the North Arkansas Conference through its Chaplain's fund in memory of Rev. Thomas E. McKnight, the only Arkansas Methodist chaplain who was killed in World War II. Many other items—the pulpit, the altar table, the altar set, the pulpit Bible, several pews, and 150 hymnals in the Chapel; the altar table, the altar set, the pews, a picture and a table in the Prayer Room—have been provided by friends, and all of these things will be appropriately marked when name plates can be secured.

Other materials should be be added to the building equipment. In the Chapel are several pews which have not been taken. A new grand piano is needed for the Auditorium. Other needs include arm chairs for the stage and aisle runners for both halls. Eventually a new pipe organ will be placed in the Auditorium as a memorial to some family whose name will be used on every printed program at Hendrix

for many many years.

Hendrix now faces a peculiar situation with an operational deficit on the one hand and a compelling necessity to increase salaries on the other. It is probable that never in the history of Methodism have schools and colleges faced so great a crisis. Enrollment has suffered a heavy loss; at Hendrix the number of registrants in 1951-52 was 15 percent lower than in the preceding year. This means loss in revenue, reflected in a serious deficit in the year's operation. At the same time we must provide more salary budget if we are to hold our professors. Fortunately,

the General Education Board of New York has come to our assistance in a wonderful way. Last December this agency made an appropriation of \$300,000 to Hendrix on condition that the college match it by the end of 1954 with an equal amount. The money will be used in this way: \$500,000 endowment for the benefit of a better salary schedule; \$100,000 operating fund to be used during the three-year period of the campaign, allowing immediately some greatly needed salary adjustments.

Never before has the college had such a liberal grant, to be matched on a one-for one ratio. We appeal to Arkansas Methodists to help meet the conditions of this grant. Hendrix must have stronger support from

the Church.

The General Conference at San Francisco recommended as a minimum goal for each Annual Conference 50 cents per church member for schools and colleges. We urgently ask that our Conference move toward this objective. The record for last year (Conference benevolences, November special, and Race Relations Sunday) was 26 cents per active member in the North Arkansas Conference. For moving toward this goal we have an excellent method ready at hand. The November 'Special, a form of Living Endowment, offers great possibilities, if properly promoted, for the future of Hendrix College. We urge our pastors to lay much greater stress upon this plan of annual giving and we recommend that November 23 be the day of special emphasis in 1952.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Report No. 1

We feel that the past conference year has witnessed one of the richest experiences in the field of evangelism which our church has known. The United Evangelistic Mission has given us a new sense of God's

presence, and of the still-working powers of the Holy Spirit.

We wish to emphasize the importance of legislation enacted at General Conference 1952. "Inasmuch as the fundamental task of the Church is individual and social salvation and the present civilization is sick and tottering, waiting for the healing hand of God upon the individual and this tormented world, be it hereby resolved that in keeping with the action of the World Methodist Council calling all branches of Methodism to a world-wide program of Evangelism and in response to the challenge of the Episcopal Address which revealed the sobering fact that in the United States of America alone there are 18 million homes that do not have a single member in any church, we do adopt the following program of evangelism for the quadrennium 1952-56:

- 1. A. Every local church participation in the Worldwide mission of Evangelism:
 - Through intensive evangelistic preparation from Worldwide Com-1. munion Sunday October 5, 1952 to Watch Night Service December 31, 1952.
 - Cooperation during 1953 in the year of Worldwide Evangelism. with one of the high points of emphasis being Pentecost Sunday, May 24, which in the year 1953 is also Aldersgate Sunday.

В. Every local church implement its program throughout the quad-

rennium as follows:

A Spiritual Life Mission in every local church, annually, to activate the inactive and to deepen the spiritual life of all members.

A systematic visitation of all members in the local church.

A prayer group in every local church, and the cultivation of a prayer movement.

Family prayer in every home, including grace at meals.

Making and keping an up-to-date prospect and constituency roll. In each local church a group organized for regular and systematic lay Visitation Evangelism, with every member of the local church a "witness and personal worker."

Every new member trained in church membership and the

Christian life.

- Every member taking his place for Christ in the community life and activities.
- Every local church cooperating with District or City Board of Missions in organizing new churches and reclaiming abandoned churches.

II. Every District Cooperating through:

- A United Evangelistic Mission conducted on a District or Inter-District level.
- A Spiritual Life Mission for preachers and laymen in every District.

III. Every Conference cooperating through:

Seeking to secure at least a ten per cent net gain in member-

ship during the quadrennium."

We wish to follow suit to the General Conference by recommending the four following commissions to be elected annually in each or charge nominated by the Committee on Nominations, or the pastor if there is no such committee:

Commission on Membership and Evangelism

Commission on Education

3. Commission on Missions

Commission on Finance

At the beginning of each conference year the pastor shall call together the members of the Commission of Membership and Evangelism for organization. The committee shall elect a chairman, secretary, and such other officers and committees as may be determined

The Board of Evangelism wholeheartedly supports the following resolution which is to be placed before this annual conference:

"Be it Resolved, that the North Arkansas Conference have a Coordinating Council, composed of one District Superintendent selected by the cabinet; Conference Secretary of Evangelism and one other member of the Board of Evangelism; Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission and one member of the Commission; Executive Secretary of the Board of Missions and one other member of the Board of Missions; Executive Secretary of the Board of Education and one member of the Board; Conference Lay Leader and one other member of the Board of Lay Activities."

We endorse the following standards for approved evangelists set

by the General Board of Evangelism:

The individual should believe that he feels a divine calling to this branch of the ministry.

His adaptability to this field must be recognized to be satis-

faction of the Conference Board of Evangelism.

He should be in full harmony with the teachings of the Holy Scriptures as expounded in Methodist doctrine; with the rules and regulations of the Methodist Church; and uphold the pastor with whom he is working.

He should have had at least four years of pastoral experience. This requirement may be disregarded where the individual has exceptional ability and talent for the field of evangelism.

He should present annually to the Conference Board of Evangelism a written recommendation from one District Superintendent and three pastors who have had opportunity to know him or observe his work.

He should evidence his acceptability as an evangelist by holding not less than six revivals, or missions, in a conference year, barring the interference of sickness or some serious handicap.

At the close of each conference year the Approved Evangelist should present to the Conference Board of Evangelism a written report, upon a blank furnished by the General Board of Evangelism. His report should include:

Number of meetings held for purpose of mass, visitation or

educational evangelism.
Estimate of tangible results; such as new professions of faith, restorations, additions to the church, family altars, tithers, or any other encouraging results.

The evangelists's total income and gifts from his evangelistic

services for the conference year.

He cannot go outside his Annual Conference to hold evangelistic

services without permission of his Bishop."

We request that the Reverend Eric J. Reaves, who has served well during the past year, be given, again, the appointment as General Evangelist upon the recommendation of Bishop Paul E. Martin, to the General Board of Evangelism. We request that the Reverend Brady Cook, also, be again recommended for appointment as General Evangelist, to be assisted by his devoted and helpful sister, Irene Cook.

We recommend the Reverend Paul Bumpers for appointment to the

office of Conference Secretary of Evangelism.

REPORT OF BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

The annual reports of the Methodist Hospitals and the Methodist Children's Home have been before us. These institutions are in excellent condition.

During the last year the hospital in Memphis operated at a very high level of occupancy. This is very important in view of the continued rise in the cost of operation.

New and revolutionary methods of diagnosis and treatment have been developed. These have in recent years shortened the average hospital stay from 12 days to 6 days per patient. While they mean the saving of lives, they also necessitate much expensive equipment and medications and require a highly trained personnel. Our Memphis Hospital has been keeping up with these. It now employs approximately 600 people.

The Ear, Eye, Nose, and Throat hospital has become an important part of our program. It is being increasingly used for all this type of work.

The Community Hospital in Paragould has just completed its second full year of operation. It has a staff of 26 doctors and 5 dentists. It had an increase of 1500 patient days over the previous year, making a total of 10,924.

On November 15 the Crittenden Memorial Hospital, in West Memphis. was opened as an 'affiliate' Methodist Hospital. This is a 3-story brick and concrete structure costing \$1,300,000. It is one of the finest in our state and has access access to the services of the best doctors in Memphis. Although it is of 100 bed capacity, only 50 beds have been in use. It is hoped that we will advertise it and that it may be soon increased to full capacity.

One problem is of special concern. In 1951 our Memphis hospital did \$200,000 worth of charity work. The total Golden Cross offerings were about \$13,000. The hospital has sent an urgent request that this be increased to about \$50,000. The Memphis conference has set its goal at \$18,666 and the North Mississippi Conference has assessed its churches an amount of from 1% to 2%. We do not feel that we can take such measures, but we do strongly recommend that the Conference and District Golden

Cross directors plan an extensive campaign to raise our part of this fund.
We should like to recommend: (1) that the apportionment for the
hospital be \$3,600, (2) that Golden Cross Week be the week following the first Sunday in May and the offering be taken on Mother's Day.
(3) that H. J. Couchman be Golden Cross Director with authority to appoint two assistants, (4) that the whole amount of the Golden Cross be given to the Memphis Hospital except that collected in Paragould.

We recommend the election of the following trustees from this conference: Mrs. Tom Tucker, J. Frank Fogleman, James H. Crain, H. K. Barwick, John A Womack, and Hubert E. Pearce.

The Methodist Children's Home has had a very successful year under the direction of its new superintendent, Rev. Ted McNeal. It is con-

tinuing its program of expansion with an aim to care for one hundred fifty children.

A new home for the Director's family has just been completed and is ready for occupancy. Other buildings are planned in the near future.

During 1951-52 the Home cared for 47 children

We should like to recommend the continued emphasis on the need of our Children's Home, and that the Christmas Offering be made as large as possible.

We recommend the election of R. J. Rice and Dr. C. M. Reves as

trustees from this conference.

We should like to recognize and express appreciation for the work of our chaplains in the Veteron Administration hospitals of our state, J. W. Workman, James Burris, and Gilbert Hyde, and recommend their appointment to these positions, of those who belong to our conference.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

In the North Arkansas Conference an increasing number of consecrated laymen are expressing their interest in the total program of Methodism. During this past year our men have done outstanding service, especially in la y speaking and in visitation evangelism; they have also promoted missionary specials, Christian education and stewardship. Conference reports for the year reflect great teamwork and we rejoice that many able and interested workers have been discovered in all districts. We are eager to continue this mobilization and realize a larger measure of our potentialty.

We emphasize again our deep conviction that the best method to follow in progressing toward this goal is through Methodist Men. The number of chartered units of this organization is growing, but too slowly. In churches all over our country it has been found that this is the most effective way to promote every worthwhile church project which needs the interest and support of men.

Our laymen have appreciated opportunities to participate in the United Evangelistic Mission this year and many found the experience richly rewarding. Few conferences can report better programs of lay speaking than we have in several North Arkansas districts, where a large number of men take part regularly in these worthwhile activities.

At the close of a great quadrennium we rejoice in the service rendered by God-guided men of our conference during these four years. As a new quadrennium opens, we look forward eagerly to the experiences we are sure to have in evangelism, in stewardship, and in Christian education. We pledge again to our pastors, district superintendents, and to our bishop our full cooperation and support.

We nominate Charles A. Stuck as Conference Lay Leader and as our

representative on the Town and Country Commission for 1952-53.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

As we face a new quadrennium, we would record our achievements for this quadrennium. The program of the Advance For Christ and His Church brought a new sense of responsibility for the missionary enter-

prise at home and abroad.

Advance Specials have brought in more than \$12,000,000.00. The Week of Dedication has not only proved a glorious spiritual experience but has brought in more than additional \$2,500,000.00. World Service giving has also shown a very healthy increase. The Advance has also provided 38% of the funds administered by the Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief.

During this conference year we have had four representatives from the Mission Field in India. Rev. C. H. Conley was in our Conference for a series of District missionary rallies in February and Bishop John Subhan another series in May. Dr. W. F. Pledger also spoke in two of our churches. And our Conference Preacher, Bishop J. Waskom Pickett. Their appearances and witness have contributed immeasurably to the missionary outlook of our Conference.

Methodism is represented in 58 different lands, using at least 74

languages and dialects.

We have 1,536 missionaries cooperating with many times that number of pastors, Bible women, and other workers, they are spread across the world in your name and in the name of Jesus, bearing witness to the saving power of the gospel of Christ. Two hundred and twenty-five new missionaries have gone out during the last two years.

Our World Service program is so vitally important now that we call

your attention to a statement in the Episcopal Address:

"World Service is Methodism in action. Its program is pivotal and its support is the base line of our benevolent giving. If that line moves forward all the causes of the Church move with it; if it retreats, it brings disaster to every agency carrying the work of Methodism at home and abroad."

The General Conference adopted an annual budget for all World Service Agencies totalling \$9,660,000.00. This will be an increase in askings varying from about 10% to 35% in conferences; and to this it is hoped to add (or continue) about \$4,000,000.00 for special missionary projects. (This does not include the \$7,000,000.00 per year given for benevolences and missions by the Woman's Division of Christian Service.)

The General Conference gave renewed emphasis to the missionary Advance program. The pattern for giving in the Methodist Church now becomes two-fold: apportionment to World Service and annual conference benevolences without designation; second, Advance Special projects for

an area, conference, district, or local church with the assurance that

these may be designated.

Ratasvilla District:

We are faced with a challenge of following Methodist people as they move into our cities of 10,000 and over. Two-thirds of the strength of Methodism is in communities of less than 10,000 — but shockingly 53% of our population now live in cities of 10,000 and over.

Without relaxing our efforts in behalf of the welfare of the rural church, we are challenged with our home missionary responsibility,

namely that of establishing new congregations and building new churches. We have not grasped our opportunities to deploy our forces and claim new territory into which large numbers of our families have moved. This calls for a new strategy on the Annual Conference level. The General Board is asking each annual Conference to initiate church extension projects in its own territory. Let us rise to this great opportunity and challenge as we face the new quadrennium with great faith and high courage.

General Recommendations

We offer the following recommendations:
1. That Rev. Martin Bierbaum be appointed Conference Missionary Secretary.

That the two weeks following the District Conferences be set

aside as a period for World Outlook Cultivation.

That we recommend the appointment of Rev. Glenn Sanford as Superintendent of the Department of Town and Country Work, Division of Home Missions and Church Extension of the General Board of Missions and Church Extension.

That we urge each charge to have a school of missions using the

current study book in cooperation with the W.S.C.S.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Credit for this splendid report that I am privileged to give you goes first to the "key personnel," the individuals who are most responsible for it — those active, loyal, local members of the Woman's Society of Christian Service and Wesleyan Service Guild, the local officers and workers in each local church; to you loyal ministers that help guide them in their Christian activities of the church; to the wonderful enthusiastic and energetic corp of district officers that has served so faithfully and efficiently; and then last but certainly not least to the devoted group of Christian leaders that makes up our Conference Executive Board. It could not have happened if any one of these groups had failed to do it's share. It is an honor and I deeply appreciate the privilege of being able to make the report for this group.

We have at the present time, 306 societies—27 being newly organized this year; and 106 Wesleyan Service Guild units—15 being newly organized this year, with a total membership of 12,483 in the W.S.C.S.

and 2,624 in the W.S.G.—a total of 15,107 of which 1,893 are new members.

The total budget for the year 1951-52 was \$73,524.50. Of this amount the total of \$55,389.15 was sent to Division, of which \$10,244.83 was paid by the Wesleyan Service Guild. For Supplies we sent \$7,207.42, an increase of over \$\$1500. \$1,000 to the Narcotic Education Fund, \$850 to the Town and County Commission and Conference Youth Work, \$600 to help pay salary of Rev. Bates Sturdy, and \$75 for supplies for his work. Reported spent locally totaled \$46,529.94—thus making a grand total of \$120,054.44— \$3,000 more than last year.

Our women as a conference not only pledged to increase our giving by 15% last year, and did so, but they were ever busy seeking through study to be better informed women on the activities of the entire church at home and abroad. Subscriptions to the Methodist Woman total 2,229; and 937 subscribe to The World Outlook. Enrollment in Study Courses

totaled 6,887, with 1,939 enrolled in approved study courses.

We are maintaining four missionaries in the foreign field and two deaconesses, Miss Mary Chaffin and Miss Betty Letzig, Rural Workers in our Conference. We have one young lady in National College for Christian Workers, Miss Emma Nell Wayland, and Olivia Patton from Ft. Smith at Scarritt College for Christian Workers, in training for full time Christian Service. Two young ladies are going soon to work in India. Miss Naomi Whiteley, Siloam Springs, going as a medical missionary, since so recently marrying a young minister, will go under the Board of Missions. Miss Marjorie Bowden from Swifton is going as an I-3.

Our new Quadrennial Theme and Emphasis are very challenging. Our theme. "That The Kingdom of God May Be Realized"-our six emphases: Spiritual Growth, Widening Fellowship, A World Church, Peace, Missions—and undergirding it all, Discipleship. We will accept the price of Christian Discipleship. Some of our groups are all ready into their area meetings presenting this program, and Fayetteville District has completed its program. This plan goes beyond our plan of progressive visitation where the women sought to gt every woman of the church into the Woman's Society: They will now seek to find the unchurched women and gain them for the church and the W.S.C.S.

Our special offering for Cash Supplies for Miss Edith Martin to use for her literature project in Africa is approximately \$1,000.

Our Mission School was a very successful one. It was our first venture alone, having co-operated heretofore with the women of Little Rock Conference. It was the first time our school came out without finding itself in the red. This could happen only because our women taught the classes and made every effort to support the summer school committee in every way possible. All credit for this goes to the committee and other members of the Executive Board for, as you know, the president was on her way to Europe and the Ecumenical Meeting in Oxford. Plans are completed for another one that will open June 23 on Hendrix campus.

It is impossible to put down on paper all that has been done this year. Certainly all that could have been was not, but we have gone forward. I wish every woman in our church could know the privilege, the deep satisfaction, of serving in helping build God's Kingdom through helping in this great organization and that every pastor could have the encouragement, the inspiration, and the support of a real alive W.S.C.S. and W.S.G. as we each seek to better serve in our wonderful Methodist Church in the new year "That The Kingdom of God May Be Realized."

GROUP INSURANCE

Recommendations:

Every member of the North Arkansas Conference, except students serving appointments in conference which themselves have compulsomy insurance legislation, every approved supply receiving an appointment, and every full-time lay-employee of the North Arknsas Conference shall participate in the North Arknsas Conference Group Insurance Plan, subject to the laws and regulations of the Group Insurance Plan.

Annual premiums shall be paid by charges and participants at the premium rate of 50c per thousand per month for participants

and 75c per thousand per month for charges.

Annual premiums shall be paid by charges and participants. Premiums shall be collected through district organizations.

District treasurers of this fund shall send the district reports and premiums to the conference treasurer by February 1, 1953.

No man who was retired before February 18, 1948, even though he has served as a supply since then, is eligible for insurance.

Members of the Conference who retire will have \$1,000 insurance carried for them with the premiums paid by the North Arkansas Conference Group Insurance Fund.

Approved Supplies whose annuity claims are approved by the Conference will have \$1,000 insurance carried for them with the premiums paid by the North Arkansas Conference Group Insurance Group.

Members of the North Arkansas Conference who are left without appointment to attend school, who do not serve a charge, shall carry \$1,000 insurance and pay the annual premium of \$6.00, and the North Arkansas Conference Group Insurance Fund shall pay the remaining \$9.00 of the annual premium.

Those who are not now participating in our Group Insurance Plan who will be participating under the provisions of this report shall pay % of the annual premium according to above schedules by July 1, 1952.

The dividend returned to the North Arkansas Conference by the Metropolitan Insurance Company was \$7,832.00. The balance in the Group Insurance Fund at the end of 1951-52 Conference Year is \$16,717.71.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

To the Bishop and Members of the North Arkansas Conference, In session at Blytheville, Arkansas, June 13, 1952:

We the Board of Temperance wish to submit the following report:

We commend the work of the General Board of Temperance, under the capable direction of Bishop Paul E. Martin, Chairman, and Dr. Caradine R. Hooton, Executive Secretary. We appreciate especially the contribution which it has made through the "Clip Sheet," the "Voice of Temperance" and its meetings and institutes, which have helped to better acquaint our people with the dangers of alcoholic beverages.

We commend the Arkansas Methodist, the Christian Advocate, and the Division of Publications of the Board of Education, for publishing

articles which support the cause of temperance.

We commend Alcoholics Anonymous and our Government Hospitals, for their work in reclaiming alcoholics to soberity and citizenship, and ask that our Churches cooperate with such clubs and institutions wherever possible.

We commend the Woman's Christian Temperance Union for its

splendid work in the State and Nation.

We commend the Arkansas Temperance League for its work in keeping the cause of Temperance before the people of our State, and recommend that our pastors open their pulpits to representatives of the League, and accept offerings, whenever possible for said league. We also recommend that the Bishop and his Cabinet appoint the directors of the Arkansas Temperance League, who are appointed to their office by this Conference, as ex-officio members of this Board, provided that they are not regular members.

We recommend that the Chairman of the Board attend such meetings of officers of Conference Boards, as the General Board may call, and that if possible other officers of the Board be authorized to attend. We suggest that the Bishop and the Chairman of the Board of Temperance, select persons to attend Schools of Alcoholic Education that the General Board may arrange.

We urge that our Churches observe Commitment Day, on the first Sunday of Lent, and that our people have the opportunity to sign pledge

cards, in all of our Churches.

We recommend that the Conference appropriate and use the following funds to promote the cause of temperance within its bounds:

The Arkansas Temperance League to carry on its work \$500.00
 Traveling expenses for officers and others selected to attend

institutes, meetings, and schools, called by the General Board \$300.00

3. A Motion Picture Rental pool fund, to rent films to be used

in our Conference in the interest of Temperance, which fund is to be kept alive by offerings which will be received whenever the pictures are shows

ever the pictures are shows \$150.00

4. For the purchase of a projector and screen to be used in the Conference for the cause of Temperance \$600.00

Conference for the cause of Temperance \$600.00 5. Posters, Pamphlets, and other Literature \$100.00

In order that this program may be carried out in an efficient way, we are asking that each District Superintendent, appoint a Director of Temperance in his district, which Director will work with the President and Secretary of the Conference Board of Temperance, in securing Literature, Films, and other promotional material, and see that they are used in his district.

TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMMISSION

1. Continuation of a program of promoting cooperation among boards and agencies in the conference.

2. Promotion of Rural Life Conferences on conference wide basis,

bringing in persons and agencies representing community interests.

3. That continued emphasis be given to the Lay Speaking Program.
4. Hold annual fall meeting with the Hendrix Pre-Theology Association.

- 5. Continue Pilot Charge emphasis with one charge in each district.
- 6. Emphasize a better financial system for rural churches with a greater stress placed upon the Lord's Acre Plan and Harvest Festivals.
- 7. Encourage remodeling and redecoration of buildings and parsonages and the marking of churches properly.
- 8. Give added encouragement to the strengthening of the Church Schools.

9. Urge the organization of Woman's Society of Christian Service units either on church or chargeg wide basis.

10. Encourage the cooperative program among churches in natural areas, with each district organized as to county or sub-district areas.

12. Continue bulletin service for the student pastors at Hendrix. Also urge each pastor to open his church office to the rural pastors about in the rural churches for this service where possible.

13. Have a Town and Country Committee in each district, with

district Town and Country Institutes conducted each year.

14. We recommend that the Exec. Sec'y. of the Town and Country Commission be given the official responsibility of directing and counselling field work of ministerial students and supply pastors of charges

paying less than the minimum salary.

15. The Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission, representing the Board of Ministerial Training and the Cabinet, should be the Liason man between the seminaries and a clearing house through which they can be contacted for student appointments when they go to seminary. This contact to be continued while they are in seminary and until they return to the conference.

16. We recommend to the Board of Ministerial Training and the Board Education that the School for Supply Pastors be held at Hendrix College in conjunction with the Pastor's School and that all supply pastors, student and otherwise be urged to attend in order to create a closer conference spirit. The Supply School should begin in midweek before the regular Pastors' School in order that the proper accreditation on courses might be given.

17. We recommend that J. Albert Gatlin be appointed Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission for the 1952-53 Con-

ference Year.

COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

We the members of the Committee on World Peace make the follow-

ing recommendations:

(1) That this Conference maintain it stand as being opposed to Compulsory Military Training. We feel that Compulsory Military Training is unnecessary, impractical, undemocratic, and unchristian.

We believe that a wholesome Christian character can best be developed in terms of normal social relationships, and are convinced, from experience, that the effort to place all young men in the decidedly abnormal atmosphere of training camps for any period of time is morally dangerous.

We believe in freedom and democracy as valid ideals for America, and are convinced, from experience, that the enactment of Universal Military Training here will jeopardize both.

We believe in the possibility of world peace, and are convinced that the enactment of Universal Training by the United States will endanger

its achievement.

Adoption of UMT will not provide more trained soldiers for the present emergency. The Selective Service Act already furnishes the machinery to draft all the men needed by the armed services for as long as the emergency lasts. Putting UMT into effect actually would reduce the effectiveness of the regular army, since scores of thousands of men would have to be withdrawn from the army to furnish the training units. To quote top-ranking military expert Hanson Baldwin: "It is unlikely that UMT would be invoked by the President for some time to come, for to start it now in the midst of our present emergency would greatly complicate our preparedness program."

Therefore UMT is not emergency legislation at all. Its proponents are simply using emergency psychology to fasten permanent peacetime con-

scription on all American youth.

UMT-trained men would not be available for immediate service in the event of war. They would have to undergo an intensive period of retraining; hence there is no real point in interrupting the life of every young man to waste six months (plus portions of another seven and one

half years) in training that will have to be redone anyway.

UMT would not reduce casualties in a future war. On the contrary ten thousand or more casualties a year could be expected from UMT itself. Even the Pentagon estimates there would be a two per cent casualty rate in UMT. Which means that if a million men a year went through UMT, there would be 20,000 casualties a year. This does not include the psycho-neurotic casualties. During the last war four out of every ten medical discharges were for nervous or mental illnesses, and 60 per cent of these never saw combat.

Furthermore, UMT would not eliminate the need for a large standing It would not improve the national health. It would mean military domination of each man's life for a total of eight years. It would be installing a dictatorial system in America from which millions of our

fathers left Europe to escape.

(2) We recommend that this conference go on record as expressing its approval and appreciation to the Commission on World Peace of the Methodist Church, and to the American Friends Service Committee for their vigorous leadership against UMT.

(3). We also recommend that the local churches of the conference place more emphasis on the program of world peace during the coming year through observation of World Brotherhood Week, Race Relations Sunday, and United Nations Day.

6. That the working basis of the District Superintendent's Fund

Cooley be elected for the insuing Quadrennium, and that he be paid a salary of \$3,900.00 for the coming year. That the Central Treasurer deduct for Conference expenses 4% ((Four percent) of all Conference Benevolence handled by him except funds for the Board of Conference Claimants and with the additional exceptions of the November Special for Hendrix College, the Children's Home and the Church School Rally Day Offerings, which shall be promoted, handled and directed as in previous years, and monies paid by General Boards for specific projects and purposes. That the Central

Treasurer be bonded for \$75,000.00.

8. (1) That the Minimum salary be \$1500.00 for a single man; \$1800.00 for a married man, and \$25.00 for each dependent child under

18 years of age.

(2) That the maximum from the minimum salary fund be \$400.00 for a single minister and \$500.00 for a married minister and \$25.00 for each dependent child, provided that all supplementary salary received from all other sources be considered in the total salary of any minister being assisted by the minimum salary plan, with the exception of the Pastor's Expense Fund as provided in Item No. 9.

(3) That, where advisable, the District Superintendents be

encouraged to combine charges, one or more of which may be a minimum salary charge and that such combined charges shall be eligible to receive from the minimum salary fund up to 75% of the former amount of minimum salary which went to the separate charge or charges before being combined. Charges arranged on this basis shall not be eligible for minimum salary for more than a quadrennium. Such combined charges shall not be eligible for assistance from the Board of Missions, and as-

sistance from the minimum salary fund the same year or years.

(4) That charges paying less than \$1,000.00 be referred to the Board of Missions and Church Extension for approval to receive assistance from the Board of Missions to the extent of its ability to assume this added financial responsibility, with the following exception herein applied: If the Mission Appropriation Funds are not sufficient to bring the charge up to the minimum salary, the case is to be adjusted by a joint committee composed of the chairman of the appropriations committee of the Board of Missions and Church Extensions, the chairman of the World Service Council and the District Superintendent of the District in which the charge is located. If this joint committee approves the case as worthy of immediate assistance, such money as is needed shall be used from the minimum salary fund.

(5) That we continue the following schedule of payment into the

minimum salary fund:

(7) That in view of the world needs and demands upon the churches for leadership, our conference under the direction of the cabinet, the Town and Country Commission, and in cooperation with other conference agencies, cortinue to plan and promote a definite financial program in all churches,

(a) by stressing through preaching and teaching in stewardship

of time, talents, and possessions, and that the tithe be the minimum basis for all giving among Christians.

(b) by holding financial clinics in each district wherein methods,

procedures, and motives be studied.

(c) by further seeing that local church leaders receive help and encouragement in planning and promoting a sound financial system, preferably the unified budget including necessary specials, and that an every member pledge campaign become a regular part of the financial program.

9. "No Annual Conference board or interest, such as a school, college, university or hospital, shall make a special conference-wide appeal to the churches for funds without the approval of the Annual Conference, except in case of extreme emergency when such approval may be given by a two-thirds vote of the District Superintendents and of the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, acting jointly.

When application is made to the conference the privilege of a special conference wide financial appeal, whether by special collections, campaigns, or otherwise, the application shall be referred to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance before final action is taken thereon. The commission shall investigate the application and its possible relation to other obligations of the conference, and in the light of the facts make recommendations to the conference for its action and determination. Such application for privilege of a special appeal may be made directly to the commission for recommendation to the Annual Conference."

Part 2

We Report:

- 1. That the percentage for the Episcopal Fund approved by the General Conference is an amount equal to one and three-fourths percent (1¾%) of each pastor's salary.
- 2. That the treasurers handling funds of the Conference and Boards and Commissions have been adequately bonded during the past year by a blanket bond from the Home indemnity Company amounting to \$25,000 and that our Conference Treasurer is bonded for \$75,000.
- 3. That the 1950-51 books of the Treasurers have been audited in June-July, 1951 by Joe Evans and Company: P. E. Cooly, Conference

Treasurer; Raymond Franks Board of Conference Claimants.

4. That we continue to approve the action of the conference in reference to the recommendation concerning of the board of Temperance, and recommend that pastors open their pulpits to representatives of the League and accept offerings for the Arkansas Temperance League.

5 That we continue to approve the action of the conference in reference to the recommendation concerning the apportionment of an additional sum of \$75.00 to the Board of Missions to cover the expenses of a ministerial representative to the Jurisdictional Deaconess Board

meeting.

6 That the Conference Secretary's request for \$2400 for the print-

ing of the Conference Journals has been approved.

7 That the Commission on World Service and Finance recognizes the splendid work that has been done by pastors and laymen in encouraging World Service Giving. A substantial increase has been received this year. That a good record has been made in the Advance for Christ. That we strongly urge all church leaders to emphasize and support and continue Advance Specials. Also that we urge all our church leaders to emphasize and support each phase of our total church program. In this way we shall strengthen the local church, which in turn will be able to enlarge the witness for Christ at home and abroad. That we are keenly aware of, and deeply grateful for the great leadership of Bishop Paul E. Martin and all the District Superintendents, and the excellent work of the pastors.

8. This Commission wishes to express its appreciation to First Methodist Church, Blytheville, for the office space which they have made

REV. GEORGE G. DAVIDSON

Rev. George Davidson was born July 3, 1868 near Batesville. He received his education in Quitman College and Hendrix College.

He was married to Miss Zova Bryant in 1897. To this union two children were born: Dr. Bryant Davidson of Shreveport, La., and Mrs. Ray O. Beck of Berryville, Ark. Mrs. Davidson died in 1943. He was married to Mrs. Jennie Wright in 1948.

He joined the White River Conference in 1895 at Searcy and retired from the active ministry in 1941, thus having spent forty six years in the active ministry of the Methodist Church in Arkansas. He served the following charges: Bald Knob, Osceola, Greenwood, Harrison, Russellville, Fort Smith, First Church, Forrest City, Blytheville, Jonesboro, Fayetteville District, Fort Smith District, Helena District, Paris, Eureka Springs. One of his greatest contributions to the Church came as Executive Secretary of the Board of Education. He served seven years in this position, leading his Conference to new achievements in this field. The cause of Christian Education was dear to his heart. After retirement he supplied two charges, Umstead Memorial and Goshen. He was a member of the Board of Trustees of Hendrix College and Southern Methodist University.

REV. SAMUAL MARVIN YANCEY

Rev. Samual Marvin Yancey, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Yancey, was born in a farm home near Millington, Tennessee, March 22, 1878 and after a short illness of only 10 days, passed to his reward in Fayetteville, Arkansas, June 7, 1952.

He was the youngest member of a family of 15 children, 13 of whom grew to maturity. Only one, Mrs. J. W. McCormack of Memphis, Tennessee,

is now living.

He attended school in the community, College at Marvin College in Kentucky, Columbia College, Fayette, Missouri, and Moody Bible Institute, Chicago, Illinois.

October 29, 1913 he was married to Miss Rachel Johnston, who survives him. To them were born three children, one son Col. William Yancey, now stationed at Maxwell Air Force Base, Montgomery, Alabama; two daughters, Ruth, now Mrs. John B. Winstead, of Fayetteville, Arkansas, Sammy Jean, now Mrs. Will J. Harper of McAllen, Texas. Also he is survived by 5 grandsons.

In early life he was converted and joined the Methodist Church and

was licensed to preach in that church.

In 1911 he was admitted on trial into the Memphis Annual Conference and immediately transferred to the White River Conference in Arkansas. In 1914 he was received into full connection and ordained Deacon and in 1916 was ordained Elder.

He retired in 1950 after having given the Conference 39 service years. His appointments were as follows: Parkin Station, McCrory Station, Rogers Central church, Morrilton First Church, Forrest City First Church, Clarksville First Church and at the Conference meeting in Fayetteville in 1924 he was appointed Conference Evangelist and moved to Conway where he lived and served in this capacity until the fall of 1927 when he was appointed Superintendent of The Methodist Assembly located on Mt. Sequoyah, Fayetteville, here he served for 23 years, doing an out-

standing piece of work.

When he took charge of the assembly there had been but little improvement made, a few poorly constructed cottages, a Superintendents

home, a small Auditorium, and there was an outstanding debt.

During his years of service, he remodeled the Superintendents Home, built an Administration Building, new Dining Hall, the Clapp Memorial Auditorium, many modern cottages, liquidated the debt and left the Assembly in a solid financial condition.

He left the Assembly a place of beauty, a place of religious education, of Christian Culture and a thing of which the South Central Jurisdiction

is justly proud.

On retirement in 1950 he moved to his home in Fayetteville and Rev.

E. H. Hook was appointed to succeed him.

In addition to being a good preacher and pastor Brother Yancey was deeply interested in Evangelistic work, often holding great meetings in his own chargn and assisting his Brethren in meetings and after becoming Superintendent of Mt. Sequoyah he held meeting allowing the free will offerings to go to help build the Assembly

He was a man of strong convictions and always had the courage to defend those convictions. The moral forces in the town where he lived knew where he stood and looked to him for leadership. The evil element

always dreaded him.

He hated political corruption and the liquor traffic and was for many years President of the State Anti-Saloon League in Arkansas.

He retired at the age of 72, but for the past 10 months has been serving Goshen station preaching twice each Sunday and preached his last sermon here May 25, and the following Wednesday morning was stricken with a heart attack, carried to the Hospital where on Saturday, June 7th, at

10:30 a. m. he slipped away after having seen a beautiful vision of the

life beyond.

On the morning of June 9th, a great congregation assembled in Central Methodist Church where a service was held by Rev. William F. Cooley, E. H. Hook, D. L. Dykes and the writer. Brother Dykes paid a loving tribute to him, and his body was laid to rest in Fairview Cemetery, Fayetteville.

WILLIAM EDWARD BISHOP

William Edward Bishop, son of the late Zachariah and Mary Hayes Bishop, was born in Izard County, Arkansas, February 5, 1868, and died at his home in Bentonville, Arkansas, March 28, 1952.

He spent his early life and attended school in the vicinities of Mountain View and Melbourne, Arkansas, where he was converted and joined the Methodist Church. He was licensed to preach in his eighteenth

year, and appointed as junior preacher on the El Paso Circuit.

On February 17, 1891, he was united in marriage to Miss Fannie Register,, a Methodist preacher's daughter. She survives him. The Bishops celebrated their Fiftieth Wedding Anniversary at their home in Bentonville in 1951. Six children were born to them, three of whom survive: two daughters, Mrs. Mary Sumner and Mrs. Ella Mae Brown, and one son, Taylor Bishop, all of Bentonville, Arkansas. He is survived also by two brothers, two sisters, six grandchildren and nine great grandchildren.

Brother Bishop joined the White River Conference in the fall of 1888, and was appointed to the Mountain View Circuit. In 1901 he located at his own request, to do contracting work and be assistant manager of a plantation near Conway, Arkansas, where he remained until the fall of 1905, when he was appointed as supply pastor at Danville. In the fall of 1906 he was re-admitted to the Conference and re-appointed to Danville. At the Annual Conference meeting in Searcy in 1927, owing to physical infirmity, he asked for and was granted the Superannuate relationship.

During his thirty years of active service he served the following circuits: Mountain View, LaGrange, Jacksonport, Mammoth Spring Station, Pecan Point in Mississippi County where he traveled by boat, Calamine, Evening Shade, Neburg, LaCrosse, Desha, Camp, Cherry Valley (all in the old White River Conference).

In the Arkansas and North Arkansas Conference he served: Danville, Dover, Houston-Perry, Prairie View, Branche, Belleville, Booneville Circuit, Rover, South Fort Smith, Elm Springs, and Pea Ridge.

No more faithful man has ever worked among us in this Conference. Always loyal to his church, serving wherever appointed, living on small salaries ranging from \$200 to \$600 per annum, going was hard, but uncomplainingly h went to his charge and served faithfully.

He was one of the best posted men it has been my privilege to know, especially in the field of theology. He reveled in reading books like Watson's Institutes, Rolston's Elements of Divinity, and Wesley's Sermons. Even in old age, when owing to deafness he could not engage in conversation, you could go to his home any day and find him reading some of the great books, both old and new.

For a number of years he had been completely shut in, but he waited patiently for the coming of his Lord and when on the afternoon of March 28th He came, Brother Bishop was ready to say, "I have finished the work which Thou gavest me to do," and to hear the: "Well done, thou good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

WILLIAM JASPER LeROY

William Jasper LeRoy was born at Gainesville, Arkansas, Dec. 21, 1876, and died in Ft. Smith, Arkansas, on April 3, 1952, after serving for more than 39 years in the travelling connection of The Methodist Church,

having retired from the active ministry in 1945.

Brother LeRoy was brought up in a Christian home and was religious from childhood. From the time he joined the Church until he entered the ministry, he was interested in the Master's work and proved himself to be an effective servant of the Lord. The work of the Kingdom, therefore, was not new to him when he heard and answered the call to preach. After teaching school for several years, he was given a license to preach, and in 1906 he was admitted on trial into the White River Conference. Long and faithful has been his service to the cause which he loved so dearly.

During his years in the White River Conference he served for six years as the conference treasurer and rendered effective service in this office. No conference in Methodism ever had a more faithful member than he was. The sessions were a source of great inspiration and joy to him, and he was always on hand for roll call.

Following is a list of the appointments which he served: Maynard 1904-1906, Black Rock 1906-1909, Pocahontas 1909-1913, Earl 1913-1917, Ozark 1917-1919, Greenwood 1919-1922, Centerton 1921-1925, Clinton 1925-1927, Beebe 1927-1930, Bald Knob 1930-1932, Blytheville 1932-1937, Truman 1937-1939, Lepanto 1939-1941, Crawfordsville 1941-1942, Manila 1942-1943, Massard 1943-1948.

Since his retirement he had made his home on Highway 22 near Ft. Smith and had spent his time in such service as he could render, never losing his interest in the work of the ministry nor his love for the cause of Christ. He reported at the last Q. C. that he had preached 14 times

during the year.

In 1893 Bro. LeRoy was married to Nellie Douglas at Gainesville, and of this union were born two children, Rhea who died at the age of six, and Ruth who is now Mrs. Harold Nance, wife of Rev. Harold Nance of West Plains, Mo. On Jan. 5, 1900 his wife passed away and on March 23, 1902 he married Emma Elizabeth Jacobs of Marmaduke, Ark. who has been his faithful companion and effective co-laborer through all the years of his ministry. He is survived by his wife, his daughter Ruth, one brother, Frank, of Paragould, one sister, Mrs. Otha Newsom of Ft. Smith, two grandchildren of Blytheville and Columbia, Mo., two great grandchildren, his nephews and a niece.

Bro. LeRoy is worthy to be remembered as a faithful servant of God and a successful minister of the gospel. He was a man of deep religious convictions and possessed character that was deeply rooted in the Christion virtues, so that he brought to the ministry those assets which assure usefulness and effectiveness in the preacher's life. Fundamental in his successful ministry were his deep appreciation of his high calling, his faith in the gospel which he preached, and his love for the people to whom he ministered.

He was a good preacher and had the heart of a true pastor. In his early years as an itinerant he was known for the great revivals which he had, and he never lost out of his preaching the evangelistic note. It was his joy to call men to repentance and to see them brought into the kingdom of God. Many will rise up in the last day to call him blessed because of the gospel which he preached to the salvation of their souls. No man has lived in vain who has written such a record of service as has this "good minister of Jesus Christ."

The funeral service was held at Massard by Rev. Fred G. Roebuck and other Methodist ministers of Ft. Smith and the body was laid to rest

in Forest Park Cemetery.

Graduating from Hendrix College, he joined the old White River Conference. In addition to some smaller charges in this Conference, he served on the Jonesboro District for four years. After the merger of the White River and Arkansas Conferences in 1914, he served several charges such as Van Buren, the Batesville District, the Fayetteville District, Marianna, Wynne, Harrison, McCrory and Heber Springs, retiring

Brother Oliver was twice married; first in 1901 to Miss Effie Hamilton of Humboldt, Tenn., who passed away in 1946. In 1948, he was married

to Mrs. Preston Hatcher of Fort Smith. She survives him.

His passing to a heavenly home came after several months of inactivity, occasioned by a severe stroke. All medical skill and careful nursing by his wife and nurse were of little avail. He died at our Methodist Hospital in Memphis, an institution which he loved and to which he gave the first thousand dollars towards erecting a chapel.

Brother Oliver had many friends. Some who had been greatly helped by his ministry sent messages of love to him after he was stricken. Personally, I loved him. He was my District Superintendent for three years and through the years we had sweet fellowship together. The "house not made with hands" has another occupant.

JAMES THOMAS RANDLE

James Thomas Randle, son of Richmond Randle and Martha Heath Randle was born in Memphis, Tennessee, April 30, 1903. In January, 1926, he was appointed to supply the Heth - Round Pond charge in the Helena District, under the superintendency of Dr. James A. Anderson. Arkansas Annual Conference, and was reappointed to the same charge

In November of that same year he was admitted on trial into the North

which he served three additional years.

In 1929 he was appointed to Weiner. Here, still under the sponsorship of his sponsor and mentor, Dr. Anderson, he continued an eventful and fateful ministry; for it was within this quadrennium that he was graduated from Southwestern College, a Presbyterian institution of Memphis, was ordained a deacon by Bishop Hoyt M. Dobbs and married Miss Lillian Bibb, of Booneville, Arkansas, a lovely product of a Christian home and a graduate of Galloway College. It was at the close of this pastorate, also, that he was ordained an elder.

Appointed to Joiner for two years, followed by three years at Luxora and three years at Clarendon, he came down to the year 1941 without leaving the delta section of the Conference. This writer was neighbor to Brother Randle during most of these years and found delight in the keep interest and the marketed pride displayed in him by his "presiding elder", Dr. Anderson. After three years pastorate at Central Avenue Church, Batesville, Brother Randle was appointed to Central Church, Rogers, in 1944 and remained there in fruitful ministry and deeply entrenched in the esteem and honor of the people for a ministry of seven

years.

In June, 1951, he was appointed to Marianna, returning to his first love of the St. Francis Basin and Crowley's Ridge. Despite a warning attack of heart malady which had struck him in his pastorate early at Rogers, Brother Randle was so deeply challenged by the opportunity of his new field that he ignored the call to rest and was stricken again. Two days before his death Brother Randle's friend and chairman of the official Board at Marianna had written these words in a letter to Bishop Martin: "He has served our chuch in a devoted manner during the year, having carried on all services with dignity and reverence, and has spent much time in visiting the sick and comforting the afflicted and assuring the bereaved. By his unassuming spirit of humility he has led the Church through a year which we feel has wittnessed good accomplishments; and it is the opinion of the congregation that the best interest of the Conference would be served if he be returned to carry on the work here for another year."

Brother Randle died suddenly on June 5, 1952. Funeral services were held in the church at Marianna by Rev. Ethan W. Dodgen, District Superintendent, who accompanied the family to Booneville for interment service which was led by Rev. W. J. Spicer, minister to the church of the

family.

Brother Randle is survived by his widow and their two sons, James Thomas Randle, Jr., and Joseph Paul Randle. He gave 26 years of full service to the ministry of the Church and her Christ. His talents and his energies were those of a superior person. His friendships were many and warm and his devotion to the loved tasks were unflagging. He was a casualty to his devotion more than to the malady credited with taking his life, for he would not be restrained, and he has earned a hero's reward.

STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- (1) That each undergraduate be required to report according to the call of the several committees before the opening of the Conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his control.
- (2) That the Conference Treasurer be paid a salary of \$325.00 per month and such an allowance for necessary office supplies and help as shall be approved by the Executive Committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance.
- (3) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one delegate from each church in each Pastoral Charge; provided further, that each station charge shall have three elected delegates.
- (4) That figures answering the question: "Members reported last year," be the total of the active and inactive members as printed in the Journal of the last Annual Conference.
- (5) That the District Superintendent's figures of all apportionments be accepted as the official figures.
- (6) That the apportionment for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report; and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- (7) That all Statistical Reports be turned in to the Statistical Secretary by the hour of the first session; and that all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer not later than 2:00 p. m. on the opening day of the Conference session; and that the names of all delinquents shall be reported to the Conference.
- (8) When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishop's cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission, or an officer in the Conference administration, except members specifically designated by the Discipline.
- (9) That the Secretary of the Bishop's cabinet be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Journal.
- (10) That all members of our Annual Conference who attend its annual sessions, except superannuated and supernumerary preachers, be required to pay the church entertaining the Conference one dollar registration fee.
- (11) That at all future sessions of the Conference entertainment be provided on the Harvard plan (bed and breakfast) except for superannuated ministers and pastors whose salaries are less than \$1,200.00, for whom full entertainment shall be furnished.
- (12) Every board and commission receiving any money from the Conference shall give to the Commission on World Service and Finance annually by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference a detailed financial report including all receipts and expenditures.
- (13) The list of Lay Delegates elected by the charge conferences shall be completed and their names given to the host church and Conference Secretary thirty days before the date of the Annual Conference.
- (14) That the District Stewards' meetings shall apportion the askings for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and for General Administration Fund, and for Jurisdictional Expense, to the several Charges in each District on an equitable basis.
- (15) The Secretary of the North Arkansas Annual Conference shall be nominated by the Cabinet when their report on nominations is made.
- (16) The Conference Treasurer shall close his books for the Conference Year seven days before the opening of Annual Conference; and he shall distribute to the several Boards and Commissions the moneys to which they are entitled by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference; and that each Board or Commission receiving money from the Conference close its books on the opening day of Conference.
- (17) The treasurers of all Conference Boards and Commissions shall close their books for the Conference year by the time the Annual Conference adjourns; and all moneys received by them shall be accounted for in the annual audit made by the Conference Auditor.
- (18) No one shall be nominated for re-election to a board or commission on which he has served more than a quadrennium.

SESSIONS OF THE CONFERENCE

The "Arkansas Conference" and the "White River Conference" were united in 1914 to form the present "North Arkansas Conference."

The Conference determined that its annual notation should date from the time of the organization of the Arkansas Conference in 1836, instead of following the date fixed by the consolidation of the Arkansas and White River Conferences, when the name was changed to North Arkansas Conference in 1914.

The Conference session of 1939 voted to maintain the numerical notation of the Conference in The Methodist Church.
