FIRST DAY - AFTERNOON SESSION

June 16, 1954

Opening: The One Hundred Nineteenth Session of The North Arkansas Conference of The Methodist Church convened in the First Methodist Church, Batesville, June 16, 1954 at 1:30 p. m. with Bishop Paul E. Martin presiding. Hymn No. 402, "And Are We Yet Alive" was sung. C. N. Guice led the opening prayer. R. E. Connell, on behalf of The Planning Committee moved that the printed schedule be the agenda of the conference and this was voted.

Roll: The roll was taken by Alf A. Eason indicating that there were present for the conference 216 clerical members and 86 lay delegates. The secretary of the conference nominated the following to serve as his staff for the conference: Alf A. Eason, Charls P. McDonald, Jr., O. D. Peters, and Harold D. Womack.

Host Church Greetings: E. G. Kaetzell, host pastor, was presented and he proposed that the bar of the conference be established as the lower floor of the sanctuary. William P. Connell and James Fleming escorted Mrs. Paul E. Martin forward to be presented to the members of the conference. Mayor Roy Row of Batesville presented Bishop Martin with the keys of the city. W. D. Murphy, Jr., extended words of welcome from the host church and Bishop Martin responded.

Pension Representative: J. Wilson Crichlow of the Board of Pensions was presented to the conference and he spoke relative to the program of the church in this field.

Service of Commemoration: Benjamin C. Few presided for the service of commemoration. Hymn No. 372 was sung. The scripture lesson from the fourteenth chapter of John was read by Brother Few. The list of those who have died during the year was read by C. C. Burton, as

follows: Ministers: W. F. Cooley, George A. Freeman, George E. Patchell, James T. Willcoxon, and Robert E. Wilson; Ministers' Wives: Mrs. L. W. Fair, Mrs. A. W. Martin, Mrs. J. R. Nelson, Mrs. William Sherman, and Mrs. E. J. Slaughter. Ethan W. Dodgen delivered the message of commemoration on the theme: "Life is Eternal" After the singing of The Doxology, Bishop Martin led in the service of The Lord's Supper, assisted by the members of the cabinet and the host pastor. A communion offering was taken for mission work.

SECOND DAY - MORNING SESSION

June 17, 1954

Devotional: The conference opened at 8:30 a.m. with Bishop Paul E. Martin presiding. The Hymn No. 382, "Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken" was sung. The morning prayer was led by John A. Womack. Fred G. Roebuck spoke to the conference on his trip to the Holy Land using as his subject: "Where the Saints Have Trod." Hymn No. 227, "Come, We That Love The Lord" was sung.

Journal: Edwin B. Dodson reported for the Committee on Journal the minutes of the first day's session had been read and approved.

Communications: Bishop Martin reported that communications had been received from Grover C. Johnson, Guy C. Murphy, Lester Weaver, Lyman T. Barger and LeRoy Henry, and the secretary was instructed to reply for the conference.

District Superintendents' Report: Robert E. L. Bearden, secretary of the cabinet read the following report from the District Superintendents:

"The Methodist Church is completing with this conference, one hundred and eighteen years of service in Arkansas. Established pastoral charges were in full service before Arkansas became a territory and the Arkansas Conference was organized in this city within the same year that Arkansas was admitted into the union. We feel, therefore, that this is an historic session and that there hovers over us here today the spirits of those noble servants of God who builded our house of faith; Burwell Lee, Robert Gregory, Fountain Brown, Andrew Hunter, and Bishop Thomas A. Morris. In that year, 1836, there were 2465 members of the church in the state and 36 ministers. Bishop Morris came from the session of the Tennessee Conference at Columbus directly to Batesville, traveling on horseback and bringing with him five young transfer ministers, arriving here on November 6, 1836.

In the span of these years since that memorable week many things have come to the church in Arkansas. There have been difficult and near-fruitless years, but there have been far more in which God's grace has labored with man's devotion to bring rich blessings to thousands of people.

Critical needs and problems amounting almost to crisis have been faced. The church has always had many difficulties with which it wrestles both within itself and in the secular society, but it is likely that the church has never faced more critical circumstances than it does today. Our brethren of those long gone years would be amazed by the involved and varied program of this conference. But "new occasions teach new duties" and all the areas of church life mentioned below are vital and give further evidence that the church is making every effort to meet the varying needs of contemporary life.

6293 persons have been received into the churches of the North Arkansas Conference during this conference year, 2695 on profession of faith, 2987 by transfer of church letter, and 611 from other denominations. Church rolls are being cleared and brought up to date, which means that the total membership registers a decrease, but this procedure will serve to make our records accurate and the loss in membership, it is well to note, is more statistical than actual. Our total membership reported at this conference is 97,523, a loss of 1726 from last year.

In the church school membership shows an increase over last year of 1773, for a total of 69,202, and the average attendance at church school has increased 1404 over last year, the total average being 25,303. 10.059 were enrolled in Vacation Church Schools.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service reports 282 organizations with a total membership of 14,222. \$72,426 was sent to the conference and \$12,448 was raised for local work.

In matters of finance, the church has registered steady progress in past years. We rejoice in this, not for its temporal value, but because stewardship is a vital part of the Christian life. During this conference year, \$147,015 was paid to World Service, an increase of \$3,408 over last year. \$685,696 was paid for improvement and building of churches.

Among the special emphases this year, we have considered the Hendrix Endowment Campaign of particular importance. In this effort, \$50,-816 was raised this year. In the Advance Special program, exclusive of conference-initiated specials, \$20,353 was raised as against \$14,670 last year. Other special offerings are not included in this report, but it is worthy to note that the church has shared in all of these, with increases in all but three, Race Relations, Week of Dedication, and World-wide Communion offering.

The evaluation of church buildings, equipment and land reported this year was \$12,987,654 an increase of \$1,099,236 over last year. The evaluation of parsonages, furnishings, and land was \$1,792,146, an increase of \$22,336. The total raised for all purposes this year was \$2,925,647.

We are grateful for all these evidences of advancement in the Kingdom and regard them not as the work of man's hand, but of God's guidance and grace, which have enabled us to accomplish these tasks in His name.

He expressed his appreciation for the work Dr. C. M. Reves, vice-president of Hendrix College is doing. Dr. John O. Gross, Executive Secretary of the Division of Educational Institutions of the General Board of Education, spoke to Report No. 2. Report No. 2 was adopted.

Introductions: Bishop Martin presented Dr. Willis Tate, newly elected president of Southern Methodist University to the conference, and he

spoke briefly.

Publishing House Check: Joe Rogers, of the Kansas City Branch of The Publishing House was introduced and he presented a check for \$5,-127.51, as the share of our conference in the proceeds from the Publishing House. The check was presented by Bishop Martin to the Board of Conference Claimants.

Token: Bishop Martin exhibited to the conference a silver chalice which had come to him and Mrs. Martin as a gift from Dr. and Mrs. Paul V. Galloway of Boston Avenue Methodist Church, Tulsa. He commented that it had special meaning for him since it was ten years ago that he was elected and consecrated bishop in that church.

Town and Country Commission: The report of the Town and Country Commission was presented by Floyd G. Villines, Jr., after having been read by David Conyers, secretary of the commission. Those speaking to the report included: Ken Estes, Conway; Lee Hays, Beebe; J. Albert Gatlin, retiring executive secretary, and A. N. Storey, incoming executive secretary. The report was adopted.

There was a brief intermission after which the conference sang the hymn, "My Faith Looks Up To Thee."

Crusade Scholar: Bishop Martin presented to the conference, G. B. Ezekiel, Crusade Scholar from India, who addressed the conference, expressing appreciation to The Methodist Church for providing his scholarship.

Boards of Hospitals and Homes: Earle Cravens, the board chairman presented the report of his board. Report No. 1 was read by Byron Mc-Spadden, secretary of the board, who moved its adoption. T. T. McNeal, superintendent of the Arkansas Methodist Children's Home, spoke to the report. It was adopted. Report No. 2, dealing with the building campaign for the Methodist Hospital at Memphis was read by the board chairman. Leslie Stratton of Memphis, chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Hospital spoke to the report. J. C. Crews, Administrator of the Hospital presented the members of the Board of Trustees from our conference, all of whom were present—Hubert E. Pearce, John A. Womack, J. Frank Fogelman, James H. Crain, H. K. Barwick, Jr., and Mrs. Tom Tucker.

The following spoke to Report No. 2 — Ira A. Brumley, Hubert Pearce, James Chandler, Leslie Bryant, Bates Sturdy, A. W. Martin, E. B. Williams, O. R. Findley, H. C. Couchman, D. L. Dykes, Jr., and Ray McLester. W. F. O'Donnell, chaplain of the hospital spoke to the report. The chairman, Brother Cravens, asked Harold Eggensperger, Chairman of the Commission on World Service and Finance to make a statement concerning this report. He in turn called upon Harold D. Womack, who read a statement from the Board of Conference Claimants.

W. Henry Goodloe spoke to Report No. 2 and it was adopted, after an amendment by E. H. Hook had been accepted by the board and incorporated in Report No. 2.

Standing Rule Change: Elmo Thomasson, secretary of the Commission on World Service and Finance presented the following resolution from that group:

"Be it resolved that Standing Rule No. 2, which reads: 'That the Conference Treasurer be paid a salary of \$325 per month and such allowance for necessary office supplies and help as shall be approved by the executive committee of the Commission on World Service and Finance' be deleted from the Standing Rules of our conference"

Under the rules for changing a standing rule, this resolution must lie on the table for twenty-four hours.

Visitors: Bishop Martin presented the following visitors to the conference: Dr. and Mrs. Paul Womeldorf, Executive Secretary of the South Central Jurisdiction; Dr. George Robinson, from the General Board of Temperance, and Edwin Keith of Little Rock.

Passage of Character: S. O. Patty, Chairman of the Committee on Conference Relations, reported that he had been before the cabinet and that there the characters of all the preachers had been passed.

The morning session adjourned at 12:30 with the benediction given by Edwin Keith.

SECOND DAY — AFTERNOON SESSION

June 17, 1954

The afternoon session of the conference opened at 2:30 p. m. with C. M. Reves in the chair. Hymn No. 242 was sung after which the conference joined in The Lord's Prayer.

World Peace: The report of the Committee on World Peace was pre-

sented by the chairman, Golder Lawrence, with the secretary, Thurston Masters, reading the report. The report was adopted.

American Bible Society: Bates Sturdy chairman of the committee for The American Bible Society read the report of this committee, after which George McGehey and Dr. Will Mock spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

Bates Sturdy reported to the conference on his work as Methodist

chaplain at the State Sanitorium at Booneville.

Temperance: Thomas R. Whiddon, secretary, read the report of the Board of Temperance. Raymond Dorman the chairman spoke to the report and introduced Clyde Coulter of the Arkansas Temperance League who spoke, especially emphasizing the need for expressing support for the bills pending in Congress to outlaw interstate advertising of alcoholic beverages. The resolution to send a message to congress in support of this bill was adopted and made a part of the board's report.

Christian Literature: W. M. Womack, secretary, read the report of the Board of Christian Literature and filed the report of the Joint Commission for the Arkansas-Louisiana Methodist. Robert Sessions, chairman of the committee, presented Miss Georgia Daly who spoke on Methodist Information and Dr. E. T. Wayland who spoke in the interest of The Arkansas Methodist. Report No. 1 was adopted. R. P. Sessions read Report No. 2 which was adopted.

June 18, 1954

REPORT OF BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS

REPORT OF THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Jesus said, "Let not your heart be troubled; believe in God, believe also in me." The Lord wants faith and not fear to rule our hearts. We have victory over the world through faith. A dynamic faith will produce what fear can never produce. Fear means defeat when given control of heart and life. Fear does not trust the Lord. It is a negative condition.

The Word of God is the Source Book of faith. As men read the Bible, or hear it preached they are aware of God and His promises. When they turn to God they are forgiven and given power to overcome their destructive fears. The Bible is then accepted as the guide of daily life and endeavor. Through its holy teachings men rise above the petty things produced by their fears and lay claim to the higher things of the Spirit by faith. Faith in God sweetens and enriches line.

The American Bible Society provides millions of copies of the Word of God for people of different lands. This is a glorious service for humanity. The Society deserves much credit for carrying on so well its production and distribution of the Scriptures. As New Testaments, Bibles and Portions are placed in the hands of children, youth and adults a greater people are the outcome. Great ideals and holy motives control a Bible-minded generation.

What people read disciplines their thinking for good, or evil. A type of literature which caters to lust and murder and robbery is destructive and helps to create low ideals. Such begets citizens in whose hearts are spiritual darkness. Oftentimes these are enslaved by worldly ambitions and purposes. In their hearts is a famine like the Prophet Amos describes in his message; "Behold, the days come, saith the Lord God, that I will send a famine in the land, not a famine of bread, nor of thrist for water, but of hearing the words of the Lord." Now a good slogan would be: "More Bibles, less darkness."

Therefore we the Committee on the American Bible Society make the following recommendations.

First. That as we use the Bible in the Worship Services, Church Schools, Camps, Retreats and our Private Devotions we seek to sense His Holy Presence and Nearness. That the leader of Worship seek to fully acquaint himself with the portions to be read so as to give the message to those listening. Read the Scriptures carefully, and prayerfully.

That we seek to increase the circulation of the Upper Room, the Sanctuary and the other Guides which are made possible for our enlightenment.

Second. We urge that the Universal Bible Reading from Thanksgiving to Christmas be encouraged in all the Churches. This is a well planned reading which will prove very helpful: The American Bible Society will furnish these guides upon request for them. Ordering them early that they may be placed in the hands of the people is suggested.

Third. We recommend that Universal Bible Sunday, December 12th be observed in all of the Churches throughout Methodism. Also that an offering be received and sent to the American Bible Society, 450 Park Avenue, New York 22, N. Y. That on the Circuits this Bible Sunday be kept as close as possible. We further recommend that Sermons be preached emphasizing the importance of the Bible in private, family and community life. Also we want to suggest the use of Visual Aids in showing films which depict the worth of the Bible through human experiences and efforts.

Fourth. That our people be given opportunity to help place the Bible in areas where it is so badly needed.

Fifth. Let us seek to build up a friendly attitude and appreciation in

the minds and hearts of the people for the work the American Bible Society is doing.

REPORT OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS HISTORICAL COMMISSION

After a search of several years to acquire a complete set of the Journals of the Methodist Protestant Church in Arkansas, the Commission has found that there are enough copies in the conference to make up approximately two complete sets. We feel sure that eventually we will be able to acquire a complete set, and as a starter the Rev. William O. Scroggin is presenting to the Commission this year the copies in his possession for file in the Hendrix College Archives.

This year the Historical Commission received an offer from the Little Rock Conference to build a fire-proof vault, for the storing of records, at the Methodist Children's Home in Little Rock. Feeling sure that the conference would prefer to have its records stored at Hendrix College, where there is a full-time staff to care for them and preserve them, and checking to make certain that Hendrix had both the room and the desire to help the conference in this matter, we tentatively rejected the offer to build a new yault as being a waste of conference funds, and suggested that the Little Rock Conference also continue to use Hendrix College as the repository of its records. Of course, if it is ever discovered that the records cannot be cared for adequately under the present arrangement, and if a way can be seen to raise the necessary funds to build such a vault, we will be glad to cooperate with such an arrangement—suggesting, however, that such a vault be built at Hendrix where there is an adequate staff to provide for the records. The present situation does not seem to justify such expense, though.

Perhaps the most remarkable find of this present year, and perhaps for many a year, was accomplished by one of our pastors, the Rev. Vernon Chalfant. In the home of one of his members, Mrs. W. R. Morgan of 204 S. 3rd St., in Rogers, there is an ancient letter signed by John Wesley, and said to be in their family treasures for generations. We believe this letter to be the original letter that Mr. Wesley sent to the Methodists in America in which he informs them of his ordination of Dr. Coke as Superintendent. Checking with a copy of the letter as found in Sweet's Methodism In American History, we discovered that there were several differences, which it does not seem one would make if he were trying to make a true copy of an original. The letter at Rogers spells the word "distressed" in the old English manner of Wesley's day "distrest," and there are several commas added in Sweet's copy, which the original does not have. Also, several words are capitalized, which Sweet, in our more modern usage, fails to capitalize. Of course, without a more careful check of the handwriting and signature, we could not say for sure if this letter is the original, but it does appear that it might be, and if it is, it is a very rare find. We are thankful to Brother Chalfant who has obtained a photostatic copy of the letter for presentation to the Commission, and for file at Hendrix College.

Due to the lack of sufficient data, the Commission, for the first time in several years, failed to place a historical marker this year. However, the proper data should be forthcoming soon, and we hope to place the

marker then.

Once more we strongly urge every charge to establish a local church Historical Committee for the collection and preservation of local church history, and that all records be kept in fireproof vaults.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Report No. 1

One of the two chief purposes for which the Board of Christian Literature was organized is to receive and disburse the money allotted by our Conference for the support of The Arkansas Methodist, and to represent the Conference in its relationship with the Arkansas Methodist, directly and through representation on the Joint Commission of The Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist. In this capacity we

submit the following report:

1. We commend the editors and staff of The Arkansas Methodist for their part in giving us a fine church paper. Dr. E. T. Wayland and Rev. Ewing T. Wayland are not just editors and administrators; they are in the finest way ministers, serving through the paper the cause of

Christ and the Methodist people of Arkansas and Louisiana.

2. We thank the pastors and laymen of our conference whose efforts make possible the splendid circulation of the Arkansas Methodist. The Methodist is not an end in itself. It is a means through which the great program of our church is strengthened and promoted. An increasing circulation will mean an increasing effectiveness in the word of our Lord and His Church.

3. Our Area Office of Methodist Information, although still in its infancy, is already carrying news of our church and its work to thousands of people in Arkansas and Louisiana, through the pages of the secular press and news programs of radio and television. We are fortunate to secure so capable a director for our Area Office of Methodist Information

as Miss Georgia Daily has proven herself to be.
4. We submit for filing in the Conference Journal a report from P. E. Cooley, Conference Treasurer, showing that your Board has received from World Service \$4,512.31, and disbursed \$4,512.31, leaving on hand

a balance of \$0.

5. We also offer for filing the financial statement of the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist. Any minister or layman having questions about the financial condition or operation of the Methodist may study this statement in the Conference Journal

6. We make a part of our report the Report of the Joint Commission of the Arkansas Methodist and the Louisiana Methodist, and heartily concur in its recommendations.

Report No. 2

The second chief purpose for which the Board of Christian Literature was organized is to emphasize upon the Conference floor and in the Conference Journal the importance of circulating Christian literature among our people. However, the greatest need for promoting Christian literature lies not on the floor of the Annual Conference or in the Conference Journal, but in the local church and in the reading habits of individual members of our local congregations. The work of your Conference Board of Christian Literature becomes effective only as each local pastor examines the spiritual needs of his own congregation, determines the literature which will meet those needs, and works out definite plans for encour-

aging the use of the right literature among his own people.

A wise pastor recognizes that "as a man thinks in his heart, so is he," and a wise pastor knows that the reading habits of his people have much to do with their response to the challenge of Christ and His Church. All too often our members fail to respond to the message of Christ and the mission of His Church because they do not understand the message and because they have no vision of a great Church program beyond the local church. All too often our high purposes fail in the local church because our people are uninformed, or misinformed, or uninspired. On the other hand, that local church moves forward whose members have been taught to choose and use literature that is truly Christian, whose members read that literature which gives them the information and inspiration they need for effective Christian living.

Therefore, to the pastors of our Conference your Board of Christian Literature makes the following two recommendations:

- (1) That the Official Board of each local church, under the leadership of the pastor, set up a Committee on Good Literature as provided for in Paragraph 246, Section 10, of the 1952 Discipline. Among the functions of this committee are: to call attention to the publication of new books of worth in forming and building the Christian life, to arrange for exhibits of books and pamphlets relating to the work of The Methodist Church, to promote the observance of Bible Sunday, to help the pastor in securing subscriptions to the Arkansas Methodist, Christian Advocate, and other church periodicals, to promote the use of approved publications in the church school, and to cultivate The Upper Room, Power (for young people), The Christian Home (for families with Children), and the World Outlook.
- (2) That each pastor preach during the Conference Year ahead one sermon in which he helps his people understand the effect on their and lives of their reading, and in which he guides his people in choosing and using literature that is Christian in content and influence. A good time for such a sermon would be the last Sunday in December or the first or second Sunday in January, as these Sundays immediately precede the Arkansas Methodist campaign. It is further suggested that on this same Sunday there be arranged in the church a display of those books and publications which the pastor thinks his people should know and use.

REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMISSION OF THE ARKANSAS-LOUISIANA METHODIST

The Joint Commission of the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist met at the First Methodist Church, Little Rock, February 17, 1954, with Dr. Aubrey G. Walton, chairman, presiding. Those present included Bishop Paul E. Martin, O. C. Landers, E. Vernon Markham, Charles W. Richards, Fred W. Schwendimann, Aubrey G. Walton, Burney Wilson, R. R. Branton, J. N. Fomby, H. L. Johns, Virgil D. Morris, Joel Cooper, J. G. Moore, R. J. Rice, Robert P. Sessions, J. Frank Warden, J. William Watson, W. M. Womack, Miss Georgia Daily, and Editors E. T. and Ewing T. Wayland.

The Editors made reports dealing with the circulation and financial condition of the two publications, which showed that total subscriptions for each publication are at an all time high and the financial condition is good.

After discussion of various matters of business, the Commission voted to make the following recommendations to the three Annual Conferences of the Area:

- (1) That Dr. E. T. Wayland and Rev. Ewing T. Wayland be appointed with annuity to share jointly the responsibility as Editors and Business Managers of the Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist.
- (2) That there be allowed the Arkansas Methodist the same percentage apportionment from the conference benevolences of the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conferences. The Louisiana Conference has a fixed amount in its conference budget for the support of The Louisiana Methodist during the present quadrennium.
- (3) That the campaign goal for 1955 be 35,000 for the combined publications, with a quota for each pastoral charge of one subscription for each nine members.
- (4) That each conference adopt the same general plan for the Circulation Campaign as used last year, and that the date of the campaign be set for January 9-16, 1955, and that the leadership of the conferences keep this week open, giving priority to the subscription campaign.
- (5) That the individual subscription price be continued at \$2.00, but that a subscription price of \$1.50 be authorized where the Official Board of a church enters into a contract, agreement, or arrangement to send the paper into, as a minimum, the homes of every contributing family of the church; and further that the Editors be authorized to enter into contract, agreement, or arrangement with the Official

Board of a church, or responsible parties of a District or Sub-District, for local publicity on the back page of the publication.

With respect to the Area program of Methodist Information, the Methodist news service of the Area, the Commission reports that Miss Georgia Daly, who has served the past year as Associate Director, has been made the Director of the program, succeeding Rev. Ewing T. Wayland, who was asked to continue in an advisory relationship to the program. The Commission recommends to the annual conferences that the apportionment for this program from each conference be increased from \$1,000 to \$1,500 to insure ample funds for an adequate program.

REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

We are again able to report splendid progress at many points in our program of Christian Education. Fifteen Bible conferences have been held during the year, an increase in Vacation Church Schools, increased offerings on Church School Rally Day, one hundred twelve training enterprises with an enrollment of 4,000 and 2,967 course cards issued, an excellent Coaching Conference with thirty-six persons participating, four area institutes in September on Christian Education with many other local church and sub-district institutes during the year, eight well-attended district-wide institutes on Vacation Church School work, an outstanding Conference-wide Youth Rally held in April, a two-day planning session on youth work held last November, a three-day Camping Conference at Shores Lake with twenty-eight attending, a large number of subdistrict and district youth camps and assemblies along with the Conference-wide Youth Assembly, an emphasis on church school membership and attendance and cooperation in the Spiritual Life Missions, together with many local church, sub-district, and district programs have provided for continuous growth of leadership in Christian Education.

Studies have been made on church and church school membership, church schools not using Methodist literature, and on commitments to full-time service of youth in the Methodist Church.

The North Arkansas Conference was well represented in Jurisdictional programs: Leadership School at Mt. Sequoyah, Youth Conference and Workshop at Mt. Sequoyah, Jurisdictional Convocation of Adults in Tulsa, and the Jurisdictional Recreation Workshop in Norman, Oklahoma.

The June issue of the Christian Education Bulletin carries a detailed

report on the many phases of the Conference cultivation program.

We recommend the following program for the Conference year of 1954-55:

That the month of September be Christian Education Month and that the Youth Emphasis be given special consideration at that time.

That the fall meeting of conference, district, and sub-district youth leadership be held on September 10 and 11, Hendrix College Campus for the promotion of Youth Emphasis.

That each local church be asked to make a prospect list for church school membership, set its own goal for membership increases, and report same to district superintendent by October 1, with statement of total church school membership prospects, and the number of these who are in the youth age; giving goal for youth membership increase, and total church school membership increase. That each church school give a membership report to the Board of Education on November 1, 1954, and March 1, 1955.

That eight area institutes on Christian Education be held, one in each district, during the period of September 13-24, with provisions made for guidance of workers in the various departments of the church school.

That Church School Rally Day be held September 26, with each church making a contribution to the district and conference program of Christian Education.

That each district be provided seventy-five percent of the amount of Church School Rally Day offering of said district, for Christian Education program within the district, under the direction of the District Staff and the Executive Secretary of the Conference Board of Education.

That the period of September 26-October 3 be observed as Christian

Education Week.

That the major emphasis in children's work be: Conference Children's Workers' Meeting; the September district-wide meetings including emphasis on work in four departments of children's work; a district institute on Vacation Church School work in each district; special courses

for workers with children and increasing of children's membership in church schools.

That the major emphasis in adult work be improving the Adult Home Program; encouraging the organization of Young Adult Fellowships, in the local churches and in the sub-district; the sub-district meetings of adult presidents and teachers; the introduction of the new cycle of adult Bible studies; and the promotion of Family Life Conference to be held in Cleveland, Ohio, October 8-10., 1954.

That each district have regular meetings of district staff and that local churches make Commission on Education an effective commission.

That provisions be made for a special coaching period on the one unit plan of camping with Intermediates.

That a Coaching Conference for the preparation for persons for training enterprises be held.

That local churches be encouraged to conduct on e-unit training schools in the early fall on such courses as: How to Teach in the Church School, Ways of Teaching, Christian Education in the Local Church, Educational Work of the Small Church, etc.

That a Conference-wide Youth Rally be held on the Hendrix College Campus, Friday, April 1, 1955.

That the November Special for Ministerial Training and Hendrix College be held the week of October 24-31, 1954.

That local churches seek to enroll the finest high school students in Hendrix College, and that pastors be asked to provide Hendrix College with the names of juniors in high school.

That we seek to decrease the number of church schools in the North Arkansas Conference not now using Methodist Church School materials.

That we continue the emphasis on Bible conference, Vacation Church Schools, Youth Activities Week and Assemblies, Sub-District organizations, Local church and area institutes, local church and area training schools, literature cultivation, and cultivation for special days as designated by the General Conference.

That we cooperate with each of our student centers in urging local churches to cooperate with the pastors and churches at college centers in our conference, both by helping to relate the students to the college church and in sharing financially with those churches.

That we seek to enrich our local church youth program through the development of more adult leaders of youth, through improvement of youth programs in the local church, through strengthening the faith of youth, and through leading our youth to a greater dedication for Christ.

That the Board of Education cooperate with other conference agencies as follows: with the Board of Evangelism in seeking to reach more people; with the Board of Lay Activities in the promotion of special emphasis on Stewardship; with the Board of Missions and the Woman's Society of Christian Service in strengthening the Missionary Cultivation throughout the conference; with the Commission on Vocations in enlisting youth for full time service in the training of our future ministry; with the Town and Country Commission in the total rural and small town educational program.

That a committee be set up by the Annual Conference to study proposals for Wesley Foundation work and to make recommendations to the next Annual Conference concerning a future program for this work; providing that this committee meet separately, on invitation, with a committee representing the college church in each of these college communities: Fayetteville, Russellville, Conway, Jonesboro: for the purpose of studying the specific proposals for such work.

We recommend to the Bishop and the Cabinet the appointment of Ira A. Brumley as the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education for the Conference Year of 1954-55.

Report No. 2A

Hendrix Coilege

The Christian college is receiving increased and encouraging attention in America today. Its excellent work in liberal arts education in a Christian environment is more widely recognized as very valuable to all phases of our life. There is the promise of greater support of these colleges, that they might be helped in producing graduates with the greatest possible assets of intelligence, resourcefulness, and character.

Hendrix is a member of the newly organized Arkansas Foundation of Associated Colleges. In more than thirty states of America church-related and independent colleges are making a united appeal for budget aid. The Arkansas organization has a similar purpose of interpreting to the public the aims, functions, and needs of the seven member colleges. It is believed that the members will receive increased support for operations.

The year at Hendrix has been encouraging. Enrollment reached 466, twelve more than last year, and 80% of the group were Methodists. The class of 1954 numbered 79, and in the group were several seniors who won liberal scholarships for graduate study in the best universities of America. Ministerial students at Hendrix this year totaled 65, and there were 27 other life service students.

The \$600,000 Campaign is moving toward completion. With the valued assistance of Bishop Paul E. Martin, district superintendents, pastors and laymen, we can report cash receipts of \$230,222.39 and a substantial amount payable in pledges this year. This cooperative program for the support of faculty and staff salaries is a challenge to Arkansas Methodists. The General Education Board of New York has promised \$300,000, provided we raise an equal amount by the end of this year. Cash receipts must reach \$300,000 in 1954 if we are to qualify for the liberal grant from the New York agency.

We recommend that the united effort be continued to complete the Campaign. Let every pledge made in good faith be promptly paid; let friends who have not subscribed to this campaign have a chance to do so; let all of us who have made a contribution since the campaign began in 1952 measure our opportunity to "do more in '54."

Arkansas Methodists should provide greater annual support to the Hendrix budget. Expenses of operation continue to rise while budget support has remained about the same for several years. The General Conference of 1952 recommended a minimum goal for each annual conference of 50 cents per church member for schools and colleges. With the increase in membership of our churches, our record of giving shows a lower average. Last year in the North Arkansas Conference the record was 15 cents per member. Already there is evidence that churches will change this report. We urge all of our churches to place Hendrix College in their annual budgets for substantial annual assistance.

We strongly recommend the observance of Methodist Student Day in every church. The number of students at Hendrix who can receive National Methodist Scholarships depends upon collections we send to the department of Scholarships in Nashville. For the last three years only two of these scholarships have been awarded to Hendrix. We should have many more than this number every year. Let our churches give greater support to this worthy cause for the purpose of helping able and consecrated students who are definitely interested in the program of the church.

The November Special, a form of living endowment, has meant much to Hendrix for a number of years. We urge pastors to place greater stress upon this plan of annual giving.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

For the Year 1953-54

Our Annual Conference had a large delegation of 39 persons at the World Methodist Convocation on Evangelism at Philadelphia, June 26-28, 1953. The Board of Evangelism appropriated \$1,600.00 to help defray the expenses of the District delegations to this Convocation.

Mr. Tom Richardson attended the Chicago Work Camp on Evangelism and the Convocation of Evangelism and the Convocation of Evangelism and the convolution of Evangelism and the convol

lism sponsored by the General Board of Evangelism. The work camp consisted of twenty selected youth from over the United States who for a period of one month made an intensive study of Evangelism.

In cooperation with the Arkansas-Louisiana Area and the South Central Jurisdiction we planned and conducted the Church and Church School Attendance Crusade, January 1-April 18, 1954. We helped to promote attendance and the "Give God A Chance Now Rally" at Little Rock, January 6, and tried to give guidance in setting up District Committees. We published at Board expense a detailed guide for the Crusade

and Spiritual Life Mission.

At its 1953 Annual meeting the Annual Conference adopted plans for a Spiritual Life Mission. Responsibility for planning and promoting it was assigned to the Board of Evangelism. In addition to the detailed guide, the Board provided at its expense a Conference training meeting for District Superintendents and District Directors of Evangelism, at Conway, January 19, directed by Dr. Eugene E. Golay. We also provided for every pastor of Conference a copy of Thomas' "The Holy Habits of the Spiritual Life" the Spiritual Life."

It is our conviction that the Attendance Crusade and Spiritual Life Mission stimulated interest and deepened the spiritual life of the membership of our churches. In all this concerted and demanding program we had the complete cooperation of District Superintendents, District Directors, pastors and key laymen.

We made available to the Districts \$1000.00 to be used in evangelistic

work on extension points that could not adequately provide for an evangelist, or for expenses of evangelism within the District not otherwise

provided for. Only \$225.00 of this was used.

BOARD OF HOSPITALS AND HOMES

Report No. 1

The annual reports of the Methodist Hospital and the Methodist Children's Home have been before us. These institutions have been found to be in excellent condition.

The calendar year 1953 saw the Methodist Hospital with an occupancy rate remaining at a very high level. Many people seeking hospitalization were denied this because of crowded conditions. If the capacity is not increased some patients will not receive the necessary or required care or service.

Courtesy discounts have been limited and many classifications of professional discounts have been eliminated entirely. All of the employees of the Methodist Hospital are required to carry Blue Cross or some other type of hospital insurance. Student nurses being admitted to the school this fall are being required to carry their own Blue Cross Insurance.

After a year's operation the new Intern and Resident Training Program with a part time director, we are happy to report that the program is turning out successfully.

Golden Cross offerings have slowly but steadily increased over the past years and we are hopeful that the offerings will increase gradually in the future.

We would like to recommend: (1) that the apportionment for the Hospital be \$3,600.00, (2) that Golden Cross week be the week after the first Sunday in May and that the offering be taken on Mother's Day, (3) that Byron McSpadden be appointed as director and given the authority to appoint two assistants, (4) that all the Golden Cross offering be given to the Methodist Hospital except that which is collected in Paragould.

We recommend the election of the following trustees from this Conference: Clerical: Hubert E. Pearce, John A. Womack; Lay: J. Frank Fogleman, James H. Crain, H. K. Barwick, Jr., and Mrs. Tom Tucker.

T. T. McNeal has led the Methodist Children's home to another successful year. The Home has administered to 61 and at the present have 44 children in residence. Another cottage is under construction and with its completion 12 or 13 more children can be added to the Home.

The Christmas offering was little more than a year ago, but every charge in the State with the exception of two made an offering for the

Home.

In February of this year, our property was taken into the city limits of Little Rock. This should lessen the cost of utilities and make our property more desirable.

We recommend that Alf Eason and Alfred Knox be elected to the Board of the Arkansas Methodist Children's Home for a period of three

years

We should like to recognize and express appreciation for the work of our Chaplains in the Veterans Administration Hospitals of our State, including Gilbert Hyde and Bates Sturdy at the State Sanitorium, recommend their appointment to these positions, of those who belong to our Conference.

"Where There Is No Vision The People Perish"

WHEREAS: for 32 years the Boards of Trustees and Managers of Methodist Hospital in Memphis have conducted and developed the Hospital's facilities to the present capacity of 300 beds-valued conservatively at \$5,000,000; and

WHEREAS: during these thirty-two years the North Arkansas Conference has been called upon only once, 1922, to join efforts with the other owning conferences to provide funds for capital expansion and

development; and

WHEREAS: the hospital facilities for Memphis and the area are so woefully inadequate that daily many scores of people are unable to receive necessary hospital care for maintenance of and restoration to

WHEREAS: the Boards of Trustees and Managers have, at the urgent request of the Hospital's medical staff, given careful study and consideration to a development and expansion program to increase facilities by adding approximately two hundred (200) beds, making it possible to care for at least 30,000 patients annually instead of 18,000 as at present; and

WHEREAS: these Hospital Boards after due consideration and full consultation with the Bishops, Cabinets and Chairmen of the Conference Boards of Hospitals and Homes of the Memphis, North Arkansas and North Mississippi Conferences have unanimously approved the projection of a campaign during the latter part of 1954 and early 1955 to raise a minimum of \$2,500,000 for this expansion and development program provided this campaign be approved by the respective Conferences with the understanding that the amounts to be sought for this purpose in a united appeal will be undertaken on some such basis as the following:

Memphis Conference\$ 750,000North Arkansas Conference400,000North Mississippi Conference350,000 City of Memphis outside of Methodist Circles and other sources 1,000,000

Total \$2,500,000

WHEREAS: the proper authority in the City of Memphis has approved the Hospital's Boards' request for a campaign period in the City of Memphis for January and February 1955; now
THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: that in response to the spirit which prompted the founding of Methodist Hospital in Memphis in 1922, and which has ever since been its dominating motive; namely, to serve suffering and needy humanity in the name of Jesus Christ, we the members of the North Arkansas Conference heartily endorse the proposed

united appeal as previously outlined; and
FURTHERMORE, we pledge our active cooperation and assistance to undertake to secure contributions totaling a minimum of \$400,000 throughout this Conference with the further provision that 50% or \$200,000 become the objective for the Churches of the 8 districts and that \$200,000 become the objective for the Unurches of the 8 districts and that the other 50% or \$200,000 be secured through large gifts, and respectfully recommend and urge all Churches and Charges of this Conference to unite their prayers, efforts and gifts to achieve a great victory for this outstanding institution of our Church in the Mid-South; and FURTHERMORE, we recommend to Bishop Martin that he appoint at an early date a representative Mathediat Hospital Compairs Carry

at an early date a representative Methodist Hospital Campaign Committee for this Conference. We suggest for his consideration that the Committee be composed of at least the District Superintendent, one layman and one woman from each District to cooperate with the Hospital's Boards and Committees and those of the other related Conferences in the organizing, developing and conducting of this campaign; and

IN CONCLUSION, this North Arkansas Conference earnestly requests all its members to remember this great project for God's Kingdom in daily prayer that He will bless and guide it in accordance with His will, that the Methodist Church may seize this great opportunity to meet this outstanding vital challenge in a manner which will glorify His Kingdom and serve in His Name for generations to come.

CONFERENCE BOARD OF LAY ACTIVITIES

June 18, 1954

Report No. 1

The General Conference of 1952 recommended that Stewardship of Possessions be emphasized during this quadrennium, with the tithe as the minimum standard of giving for Methodist people. The General Board of Education, the General Board of Lay Activities, and the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation were given the responsibility of developing

and promoting such a program.

The Stewardship of Possessions program will be one of church-wide The Stewardship of Possessions program will be one of chitch-wide cultivation and promotion. The tithe will be presented as a means of grace and not as a legalistic procedure. The method of calculating the tithe and its manner of distribution will be left up to the individual's enlightened conscience. The tithing covenant will become a covenant between an individual and his God. Exemplary leadership will be in-

dispensable at all levels of the organization.

Each annual conference will have a Conference Director, who will work with the bishop and his cabinet. Each district will have a District Director, who will work with the district superintendent in promoting the District emphasis and in training the local church or charge Directors. Each local church or charge is to have a Local Church Director, a Promotion Chairman, and a Training Chairman.

The Conference Directors will train the District Directors. The District Directors will train the local church Directors, Promotion Chairmen, and Training Chairmen in the local church, and how to train those who will be doing home visiting to secure commitments for tithing.

So that all Methodists of the North Arkansas Conference may be made aware of the Christian concept of stewardship and its expression in the tithe; be it resolved that this Annual Conference endorse and adopt the Stewardship of Possessions program as outlined in the "Handbook of Information," and that all District Superintendents, Pastors, Lay Leaders, Teachers, and Local Church Officials give themselves without stint to the furtherance of the Church's Stewardship program.

Report No. 2

WE RECOMMEND THE FOLLOWING OBJECTIVES FOR LAY-MEN FOR THE YEAR 1954-1955:

- Organize Methodist Men's Clubs in 50 churches. Put the METHODIST LAYMAN magazine into the hands of all our laymen.
- Set up programs in all our clubs which will emphasize;

a. Training for church leadership,

b. The Church's world-wide program and our share in it,

c. Stewardship of possessions,d. Father-son relationships,

e. Community responsibilities as Christian citizens.
Continue the program of Lay Speaking under direction of the District Superintendents. All Lay Speakers promote the full Church program in their services.

The Stewardship emphasis of this conference year is largely our responsibility. We must support this program sincerely and actively

in all our churches.

BOARD OF MISSIONS AND CHURCH EXTENSION

General Recommendations

Because of our growing concern for the development of a program of Missions that will prove challenging and inspiring to every Church

in our Conference, we recommend the following:

A District Missionary Institute, in each of the Eight Districts, and that such promotion be Coordinated into the general program of the District Missionary Secretaries of the several Districts and the Conference Missionary Secretary to provide the following emphasis:

1. We sincerely urge the using of missionary personnel both National and World Missions representatives, who have recently returned from their respective Mission fields.

2. The presentation of the Advance Special program, both General and Conference Specials, seeking to promote at least one "Advance Special" in each of the Districts.

3. To Display and Demonstrate the new Audio-Visual materials for the cultivation of the total missionary task of the Church.

That the Missionary Secretaries (District) be charged with the responsibility of coordinating the program of cultivation for the "World Outlook" in the period immediately following the District Conferences.

III. That Martin Bierbaum be appointed Conference Missionary Secre-

That Golder Lawrence, Fred Roebuck and W. Henry Goodloe be elected as the Sub-Committee to implement the findings of the Urban Life Conference in our Conference. IV.

That Raymond Franks, the Chairman of the Church Extension V. Section, be elected to make Research and Survey of Newton County under the direction of the Town and Country Commission Executive Secretary; and that \$50 plus additional \$100 for Survey Expenses be allocated from the promotional expense of the Board of Missions.

VI. That the Chairman of the Board of Missions be empowered to select

persons to direct Surveys of the Twin Lakes Area of Bull Shoals and Norfolk looking forward to the development of a larger Missions program in this Area.

VII. That the Chairman be empowered to select persons to direct Survey to determine the Urban needs of the developing section of the new

population area of West Memphis.

VIII. That the Board of Missions provide scholarships for the Chairmen of the Commission on Missions in the local churches of the Conference to attend the Jurisdictional Workshop on Missions at Mt. Sequoyah, July 9-11, on the following basis: Fayetteville and Fort Smith Districts, \$5; Other Districts \$10. We further, recommend that the Local Churches provide the additional expense for attending workshop.

We would recognize the growing concern of our Church for the needs of the "displaced persons" who have migrated to our cities and are being left without ministry and without "concern." We call attention to the findings of our first Convocation on Urban life—"All America seems to live on wheels . . . 1 in every 5 of our population changes residence within a year. The city environment is prone to produce 'a hard shell of indifference' and difficult to penetrate and cope with . . . Yet . . . underneath the hard shell of indifference of the 20 to 50 percent of the citydwellers who have no nominal relationship with any church . . ., and of the 'migrant millions on wheels' there is the lonely heart and hungry soul. This, too, constitutes the "Missionary Program" of our Church.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

The accomplishments that I am able to report this year have been made under the leadership of Mrs. Johnnie McClure and we are appreciative of the service she rendered in her years of consecrated service.

With the theme for the year "That the Kingdom of God may be

With the theme for the year "That the Kingdom of God may be Realized," our women were conscious of the fact that they themselves must first draw near with faith and thus the number of our prayer groups was increased with many good results. So many women now have regular prayer times; they are more willing to accept offices; in one society a full-time youth worker was secured, extra worship services in circuit churches have been made possible, several societies have been revitalized and much help was given in the Spiritual Life Missions.

Then, in order that young people might become aware of the needs of the world, four Missionary Project Tours were conducted. This enabled a large number of girls to see the work at first hand, to talk with deaconesses, field workers, Scarritt students, editors at Board of Education, etc. As a direct result of these tours, Sally Engles worked in the Imboden area, until June, and did a good work there. Others of the girls are very definitely deciding to prepare for work in foreign fields and Christian Vocations in the home fields.

There has not been a net increase in membership, even though we do have 1109 new members. In 302 societies and 105 Wesleyan Service

Guilds we have 14,496 members. The total amount of money disbursed was \$78,987.00. This represents in a very tangible way that we want to make the Kingdom of God realized.

Mary Chaffin, our deaconess, doing rural work in Izard County, has worked tirelessly this year. The people in the area love her, and we are

justly proud of the work she is doing.

The women and girls in the Wesleyan Service Guilds surely deserve commendation. Their leisure time is limited, yet they take a good portion of that time to attend and work in the Guild, and this report could not be made without them.

Two Area Training Days were held with 99 of the 114 district officers

attending. Over 2,000 local women attend district training days.

Most of our ministers are very cooperative and appreciative of the work being done in our Woman's Society of Christian Service and we want to pledge to them our cooperation as we enter in to the new year.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

In an age of atomic energy and jet engines, it becomes more evident that men must have a clear and sane mind in order to survive. Scientific and medical reports indicate that the use of alcholic beverages and other narcotics has no place in our society in such an age. Approximately 40,000 people are killed annually on the highways of our nation and police records indicate that at least one fourth of these are the result of the use of alcoholic beverages not to mention the hundreds of thousands who are maimed or injured through their use.

In order to combat the evils of this enemy to Christian living, the Church must seek to strengthen its educational program in this field if it is to help its people form sane and wholesome habits of Christian living. In 1952, our General Conference took steps in this direction by strengthening the work of the Board of Temperance. Dr. Caradine R. Hooton, secretary of the General Board of Temperance, planned and conducted the National Convocation Briefing Conference in Washington, D. C. October 14-16, 1953; and plans have been made to conduct a jurisdictional School of Alcohol Studies and Christian Action to be held at Mt. Sequoyah, August 23-27, 1954.

We commend all who in any way have and are giving leadership in seeking to combat the evils of the uses of alcholic beverages and other narcotics and especially to Bishop Paul E. Martin, the chairman of the General Board of Temperance, Dr. Hooton and his staff; to the editors of our Church papers and church school literature; and to the

pastors and laymen for their cooperation in the work.

Some accomplishments of the Board of Temperance of the conference during the year include sending the chairman of the board and district secretaries to the briefing conference in Washington in October which was an educational and inspirational experience for them and was helpful in promoting a more effective program of temperance education.

Commitment Day was given greater emphasis the past year according to reports. The work of The Arkansas Methodist and the double-page spread it gave preceding Commitment Day was helpful in this cause.

The work of the Board of Temperance was presented in each District

Conference.

The projector and film "Vicious Circle" was used in a large number

churches in the conference.

Dr. George B. Robinson of the General Board was in our conference in March, April and May for a program of narcotic education in the high schools and churches of the Conway, Fayetteville and Fort Smith Districts. He was in 28 high schools and two colleges and presented a great program on the evils of narcotics to the youth of our communities.

The General Board of Temperance is planning to make a long-needed

abstinence film for special showing in churches, schools, clubs and on television. This film is to cost \$225,000. This money is to be raised by private and group solicitations. There are to be no quotas to churches, nor will there be requests for congregational collections. This program has been approved by the General Council on World Service and Finance, the Council of Bishops, and the General Radio and Film Commission of the Methodist Church, and we feel that this film will help solve many problems for youth and family groups.

We recommend:

1. Greater use of the projector and film, "Vicious Circle" and other

visual aids in this field in the churches of our conference.

2. Greater emphasis be given Commitment Day, the 1st Sunday in December; that pastors order materials early and make plans to include the observance of this day in the Church program.

3. That all churches set up a committee on Temperance and put

it to work;

4. That the chairman of the conference board, one district superintendent, and the district secretaries of temperance be sent to the Jurisdictional School of Alcohol Studies at Mount Sequoyah, Aug. 23-27; That these persons work with the secretary of the Conference Board of Éducation to become certified instructors and teach courses in this field in training schools;
5. That the Conference Board of Temperance cooperate with the

Conference Board of Education and share one-half the cost of sending two young people to Delaware, Ohio, to attend the National Methodist School

of Alcohol Studies for Youth, June 28-July 2;
6. That pastor and people unite in the campaign to make "Christmas Christian" by urging people to exclude all alcoholic beverages from use

or gift lists during the Christmas season;

7. That the Conference Board of Temperance promote an essay contest in this field in the youth division of our Church school and that 1st, 2nd and 3rd place winners on a conference level be used in a special program during the next annual conference;

8. That pastors and people note and give support to national legislation in this field, such as the Langor Bill S3294, which will come up

for hearings Monday, June 21, writing their congressman and senators.

9. That the Churches make use of the Chart by Dr. George B. Robinson and that pastors cooperate with the District secretaries of Temperance in the educational work by arranging for assemblies in the high schools of their communities in which the evils of narcotics will be pre-

sented to the youth of our schools.

10. That the conference Board of Temperance be given no less than the 1½% which was allowed last year, for its work during the com-

ing year.

TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION

During the Conference Year of 1953-54, the Town and Country Commission has continued its program of wide-range service with its Excoutive Secretary helping to fill the pulpit of a charge left to be supplied, assisting in preaching missions, giving guidance and assistance in building programs, and helping plan and promote a district-wide simultaneous revival in the Batesville District, and with the Executive Secretary also serving as District Superintendent during the last half of the year.

Our Commission was honored when its Executive Secretary, J. Albert Gatlin, was selected by Emory University and The Progressive

Farmer as the rural minister of the year in the State of Arkansas.

The Commission made a change in its leadership during the year when its Executive Secretary, J. Albert Gatlin, was appointed District Superintendent of the Paragould District and when A. N. Storey was appointed to the double responsibility of Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission and District Superintendent of the Searcy District.

Although Brother Storey has given a major part of his time to the responsibilities of the District, the Commission has continued its pro-

gram in a commendable way.

Some new group ministries have been formed during the year and are functioning effectively, and the Board of Lay Activities has promoted its program of Lay Speaking through these groups.

During the months of April and May, the Commission sponsored

and promoted a series of Stewardship Institute, conducted by J. Edwin Kieth, Director of Stewardship in the Little Rock Conference. At least one institute was conducted in each district over a six-week period. These institutes were very helpful both from the standpoint of preparation for the stewardship emphasis and also in promoting a program of finance for the local church.

As our program for the conference year 1954-55, we make the fol-

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COMMITTEE ON GROUP INSURANCE

Report No 1-Group Life Insurance

Recommendations:

1. Every member of the North Arkansas Conference, except students serving appointments in conferences, which themselves have compulsory insurance programs, every approved supply receiving an appointment, and every fulltime lay employee of the North Arkansas Conference shall participate in the North Arkansas Conference Group In-

surance Plan, subject to its laws and regulation.

2. Annual premiums shall be paid by charges and participants at the premium rate of 50c per thousand per month for participants and

75c per thousand per month for charges.

a. Annual Payments:

Pastors receiving less than \$1,000 salary Charges paying less than \$1,000 salary	9.00
Pastors receiving 1,001-3,000	12.00
Charges paying 1,001-3,000	18.00
Pastors receiving 3,001 and up	18 00

3. Annual premiums shall be paid by participants and charges, and be collected through district organizations.

4. District treasurers of the fund shall send the district reports and premiums to the conference treasurer by February 1, 1955.

5. No man who retired before February 18, 1948, even though he has served as a supply since, shall be eligible for insurance.

6. Members of the conference who retire will have \$1,000 insurance carried for them with the premiums paid by the North Arkansas Conference Group Insurance Fund.

7. Approved supplies whose annuity claims are approved by the conference will have \$1,000 insurance carried for them with the premiums paid by the North Arkansas Conference Insurance Company.

8. Members of the North Arkansas Conference without

appointment to attend school, who do not serve a charge, shall carry \$1,000 insurance and pay the annual premium of \$6.00 and the North Arkansas Conference Group Insurance Plan shall pay the remaining \$9.00

9. Those who are not now participating in our Group Insurance Plan who will be participating under the provisions of this report shall pay % of the annual premium according to above schedules by July 1, 1954.

of the premium.

10. The dividend returned to the North Arkansas Conference by the Metropolitan Insurance Company this past year was \$3,359. The balance in the group insurance fund at the end of the 1953-54 Conference Year is \$16,640.38.

Report No. 2

Hospitalization Insurance

Eight dollars per day available for room and board for 70 days or a maximum of \$500 for each period of hospital confinement due to different causes.

You use the hospital of your choice; benefits good in any hospital in

the United States or Canada.

In addition to room and board, \$160 is available for each different disability for all special services charged for by the hospital. These charges include operating room, ambulance, X-ray, drugs, etc. All services except special nurses.

Însured ministers pay the first \$25 of all hospital charges, both room and board and special services, and insurance plan pays the excess up to the maximum outlined above. This is known as a \$25 deductible plan.

With the exception of maternity, all pre-existing disabilities are

covered, for both ministers and their dependents, provided they enroll on or before the effective date of the plan.

\$200 surgical insurance for any and all operations. Benefits range from \$10 to \$200 depending on the kind of operations. A complete list and the amounts payable will be on the policy.

Maternity benefits consist of a flat payment of \$100 in lieu of all other benefits under the plan. Caesarian sections pay \$150 and miscarriage up to \$50.

No minimum time requirement for hospital benefit for emergency care as result of an accident or for confinement for a surgery. An 18 hour confinement is required in the case of sickness.

Surgical benefits are payable no matter where the operation is performed.—The hospital, the doctor's office or at home.

Identical benefits available for dependents as for the minister.

For insurance purposes dependents are defined as a wife of a male minister and all unmarried children over 14 days and under 19 years of

The plan will become effective after 75% of all eligible ministers have enrolled and dependent benefits will become effective at the same time provided 75% of all ministers have enrolled for their dependents.

No medical examinations for those who enroll on or before the effective date of the plan.

More detailed descriptive material will be sent you at the time of enrollment.

We recommend that each district superintendent appoint an individual or a committee in his district to secure enrollment of pastors in Group Hospital Insurance plan, and work out the details for collection of premium payments.

We recommend that the enrollment period begin immediately and extend 90 days beyond July 1, 1954. The insurance will become effective when 75 per cent of the active conference members, approved supplies serving chargges, and students left without appointment to attend school shall be enrolled.

- 5. That each District Superintendent be paid an annual salary of \$6,000 with \$1,800 for office and travel and promotional expenses, making a total of \$7,800. That each church in our conference pay to the Conference Treasurer for the District Superintendent's Fund an amount equal to 10 per cent of the salary paid the pastor.
- 6. That the working basis of the District Superintendent's Fund remain at the figure \$15,000.
- 7. That the conference take note of the splendid work done again this year by our Conference Treasurer. That Mr. P. E. Cooley be paid \$4,200 this next year. That the Treasurer deduct for Conference expense 2.7 per cent of all General and Conference Benevolences handled by him with the exceptions for the Board of Conference Claimants and November Special, for Hendrix College, and the Children's Home and Church School Rally Day Offerings, and Advance specials, which shall be promoted, handled and directed as in previous years. That the Central Treasurer be Bonded for \$75,000.
- 8. (1) That the Minimum Salary be paid according to the following table:

- (2) Also that \$25 be paid for each dependent child under 18 years of age provided that all suplementary salary received from all other sources be considered in the total salary of any minister beings assisted by the minimum salary plan with the exception of the Pastor's Expense Fund.
- (3) That the Combined Charge program be discontinued except where it is impossible to do so immediately. Otherwise combined charges may draw from the Minimum Salary Fund according to the former

Plan for combined charges for a period not to exceed two years.

(4) That no pastor be eligible to receive Minimum Salary until (4) That no pastor be engine to receive minimum salary until he and the charge which he serves pays the designated percentage according to the schedule of payment into the minimum salary fund. That each person to receive funds shall fill out and sign the Minimum Salary questionnaire which may be secured from the District Superintendent.

(5) That the Conference Treasurer present a mimeographed resistant which the standard of all ministens with reference to this fund he

ginning at the next session of the annual conference.

(6) That we continue payment into the Minimum Salary plan according to the following schedule:

(7) That monies received from the local churches, from the Board of Missions, from the Minimum Salary Fund and from all other sources be considered as a part of the total salary upon which the ministers shall pay the above percentages. Church will also pay the above percent on the basis of the actual salary paid the pastor. However ministers are not expected to pay Minimum Salary on Pastor Expense Fund. It is not expected that churches pay minimum salary on mission appropriations or pastor's expense fund.

(8) That we recognize the necessity of the minimum Salary Program of assistance for churches partially supporting themselves. But that we also recognize that this assistance should not be permanent and furthermore that churches receiving such assistance be strongly encouraged

and guided to become self-supporting.

(9) That we accept as our share in the Methodist Television Ministry the sum of \$2,240. That our conference cooperate in carrying out this program of promotion and cultivation.

(10) That the conference secretary receive an amount up to \$75 for expenses incurred in the Conference Secretary's office at conference.

(11) That in view of the world's needs and demands upon the

- churches for leadership, our conference under the direction of the cabinet, Town and Country Commission and in cooperation with other conference. ence agencies continue to plan to promote a definite financial program in all churches.
- (a) By stressing through preaching and teaching in stewardship of time and talents and possessions and that the tithe be the minimum basis for all giving for all Christians.

 (b) By holding financial clinics in each district wherein meth-

ods, procedures and motives be studied.

(c) By further seeing that local church leaders receive help and encouragement in planning and promoting a sound financial system, preferably the unified budget including necessary specials and that an every member pledge campaign become a regular part of the financial program.

- (12) That the North Arkansas Conference continue to recognize the disciplinary right of pastoral charges to pay pastors an amount not to exceed \$600 for a pastor's expenses, incurred in his work of the parish in accord with Paragraph 829 of the 1952 Discipline. The attention of the Conference is called also to the fact that this enabling act was passed by the General Conference primarily for the purpose of relieving circuit pastors of undue hardship caused by excessive traveling required to cover the extended territory of such charges. It is urged that charges include and report all compensation for pastoral support and expense under column in the Conference Journal headed "Paid for Minister" as done this year.
- (13) That the World Service and Finance Commission further encourages the Board of Education to give special consideration to the need for Wesley Foundation Buildings in our Conference.

(14) That each church in our conference pay to the Conference Treasurer for Conference Claimants an amount equal to 16 per cent of the salary paid to the pastor. The ministers appointed by the conference and serving within the conference shall contribute to the Conference Claimants Fund an amount equal to the following percentages of their salaries:

> \$ 1.00-\$2000 pay ½ per cent 2001.00- 4000 pay 1 per cent 4001.00-and up pay 1½ per cent

(15) That the Commission on Promotion and Advance be encouraged to help people understand the desperate need for increased World Service Giving. That a sum of \$400 from the Conference Expense Fund is available for use by this commission for its work.

(16) That the First National Bank of Blytheville, The Peoples National Bank of Jonesboro, Farmer's Bank and Trust Co., of Blytheville, First National Bank of Batesville, Batesville Federal Savings and Loan Association, and the Cross County Bank of Wynne be the Depositories for all Conference funds.

(17) That the auditing of all Board books and Conference accounts be done at Blytheville by Evans and Johnson C. P. A., and that

such audit be of receipts and disbursements.

(18) That an amount equal to \$50 be used from the District Superintendent Fund for travel and expense of each District Superintendent

to Area meetings.

(19) That in view of the great contribution which Hendrix College is making to our church and state we continue to support its program in every way possible and that the officials of Hendrix under the leadership of President Matt L. Ellis and Dr. C. M. Reeves be authorized to encourage continual support to Hendrix College through special opportunities available in current campaign.

(20) That all annual conference boards and agencies take note of Paragraph 807 of the 1952 Discipline, which reads as follows: "No Annual Conference Board or interest, such as a school, college, university or hospital shall make a special conference-wide appeal to the churches for funds without the approval of the annual conference except in the case of extreme emergency when such approval may be given by two-thirds vote of the District Superintendents and of the conference commission on World Service and Finance acting jointly.

When application is made to the conference for privilege of a special conference wide financial appeal, whether by special collections, campaigns, or otherwise, the application shall be refered to the Commission, on World Service and Finance before final action is taken thereon. The commission shall investigate the application and its possible relation to other obligations of the conference, and in the light of the facts make recommendations to the conference for its action and determination. Such application for privilege of a special appeal may be made directly to the commission for recommendation to the annual conference."

(21) That \$2400 be alloted for the printing and delivering of conference Journals and that an additional \$200 for pre-journal digest.

We report:

1. That the percentage for the Episcopal Fund approved by the

General Conference is an amount equal to 2% of the pastors salary.

2. That the Treasurers handling funds of the Conference, Boards and Commissions have been adequately bonded during the past year by a blanket Bond from the Home Indemnity Company amounting to \$25,-000 and that our Conference Treasurer is Bonded for \$75,000.

(3) That the 1952-53 books of the following treasurers have been audited in June-July 1953 by the Evans and Johnson C. P. A.; P. E. Cooley, Conference Treasurer and Harold Womack, Board of Conference

Claimants.

(4) That we continue to approve action of the annual conference with reference to the recommendation concerning the Board of Temperance and recommend that pastors open their pulpits to representatives of the Temperance League and accept offerings. Furthermore, that special cooperation be given to the Board of Temperance in the producing films that will enhance the program of the Board.

(4) We endorse the plan for the Thousand Club which is being promoted by the Board of Lay Activities. Furthermore, it is urged that full cooperation and support be given to the Stewardship Program

which is being sponsored and conducted by this Board.

(6) We wish to express our appreciation to Mr. P. E. Cooley, our Conference Treasurer, for the wonderful co-operation he has given to the Boards and Commissions during the year and we wish to express our appreciation for the most efficient way he handles the Conference Funds.

Report No. 2

We recommend that the North Arkansas Conference authorize the World Service and Finance Commission call a meeting during the month of February at which all Boards and Agencies shall report on their work and make requests for funds for the ensuing year. These requests to be carefully studied and a mimegraphed report be sent to each pastor two months prior to Conference, containing the recommendations to be presented by the World Service and Finance Commission at the Conference session.

This would enable all laymen and pastors to set up budgets in the

local churches with these financial recommendations in mind.
Furthermore that any request for additional finances or approval of a financial campaign after this February meeting will be considered only upon request of the Bishop and the Cabinet or request from General Commission on World Service and Finance.

STATISTICS—METHODIST HOSPITAL

Methodist Hospital

Bishop Paul E. Martin and Brethren of the North Arkansas Conference:

As you can see from the statistical part of our report, the occupancy at Methodist Hospital remained at a very high level. In fact, we are rated at 300 patients and our average occupancy ran 302. This high rate of occupancy is very well from an income producing standpoint, but it makes it very difficult to serve the patient properly and to keep the plant and equipment in proper operating condition when it is running at its maximum capacity at all times. Many people seeking admission at hospitals were denied this because of the existing conditions in all of the hospitals in Memphis. It is unwise to operate above the rated capacity of an institution for very long because service facilities are designed just to take care of so many patients and when more than this number is crowded in, it means very likely that some patients will not receive the necessary or required care or service.

The year 1954 saw a continued but slight increase in the cost of operation. This gradual but continued rise in the cost of operation has been necessitated an increase of charges to the patient since 1952. We have tried to offset the continued increase in the cost by more efficient operation of the institution and limiting the amount of free and courtesy service that we have been rendering. This does not mean that we are decreasing the amount of service to those individuals who are needy and are not able to pay for the service.

Courtesy discounts have been eliminated entirely. All of the employees of Methodist Hospital are required to carry either Blue Cross or some other type of hospital insurance. The doctors have voluntarily formed a group and are carrying Blue Cross. The new group of student nurses being admitted to the school this Fall are also being required to carry their own Blue Cross hospital insurance, All of these things have added together to help relieve the hospital? Any of these things that are new have problems and usually require several years to

from the members of the Methodist Church is very helpful in aiding the plan of service to those who cannot afford to pay for it, but who are in dire need of it.

REV. JAMES T. WILLCOXON

James T. Willcoxon, son of Dr. Levi and Mary Frances Turpin Willcoxon, was born in Borom, Alabama Nov. 18, 1884. He married Miss Mary Emma Yeaman of Nashville, Tenn., June 16, 1915. There were six children to bless this marriage; four of them survive their father—James T. Jr. of San Diego, Calif., Mrs. Max B. Ostner of Memphis, Tenn., Elmer H. of Greenwood, Miss., and Philipp A. of Ft. Smith, Arkansas. Mrs. Willcoxon survives her husband and resides in Ft. Smith, Ark.

Brother Willcoxon made careful preparation for his ministry. He received his A. B. degree from Birmingham-Southern and his B. D. degree from Vanderbilt University. He did some special work in Chicago University. He joined the Tenn. Conference in 1909 and was admitted into full connection in the White River Conferece in 1911. For two years, 1917-19, he served as chaplain in World War No. 1, serving one year of the time in overseas duty. In 1946 he found it necessary to take the retired relationship because of physical conditions. Later he served as conference treasurer of the North Arkansas Conference for two years. Death came on May 16, 1954 and the funeral service was conducted in the First Methodist Church in Ft. Smith, Arkansas on June 18th. Dr. Fred G. Roebuck, Dr. W. Henry Goodloe, Rev Alfred Knox and the writer participated in the service. Burial was in Nashville, Tenn., on the 19th with Dr. E. P. Anderson conducting the graveside service.

Brother Willcoxon gave 37 years to the active service of his beloved Church. He loved his Church dearly and was deeply devoted to its work. Even after physical infirmities took hold of his body he insisted on carrying on to the best of his ability. He had great convictions and was always courageous and firm in his attitudes. Although he suffered much over a long period of years he never became embittered. His devotion to his family was beautiful to behold. His wife and children bear testimony to his deep consecration and loving care.

REV. ROBERT E. WILSON

The Rev. Robert Elmon Wilson was born near Beebe, Arkansas, February 16, 1886, and died at a Newport, Arkansas, hospital March 27, 1954. Bro. Robert E. Wilson was admitted to the North Arkansas Conference in 1925 and was retired in 1949, thus giving 26 years to the regular ministry and two years as a supply. He served the following charges: Greenbrier, Hackett, St. Johns, Pottsville, Kensett, Hoxie, Griffin Memorial, and Levy.

Illness cut short his work as an active minister but not his love for his fellowman. Bro. Wilson was married to Miss Alberta Freeling who died in 1918. Later he wa united in marriage to Mrs. Beverly Pruitt Thompson. Surviving him are Mrs. Wilson and five children: Juanita Calhoun, Hermon Thompson, Otis, Burl and Paul Wilson.

Bro. Robert E. Wilson was a man of solid basic integrity, of deep and unshakable convictions, a wise counselor, a true friend, a tireless worker, a man who loved his family, his Church and his Christ, and a man who never spared himself in the service of others. Bro. Wilson loved the ministry, he loved people and he delighted to follow the leading of the Holy Spirit.

His funeral service was conducted at the McCrory Methodist Church by Rev. Guy C. Ames and W. M. Womack, March 29, and was buried at McCrory.

REV. GEORGE EDWARD PATCHELL

"There shall be no night there." Rev. 22:5

Rev. George Edward Patchell, the son of Isaac Andrew Patchell and Martha Louisa Sibley Patchell, was born on May 26, 1879 in Independence County, Arkansas about 15 miles west of Batesville. When he was two years of age his father, a recent immigrant from Canada, moved the family to Cleburne County and settled in the Jackson Schoolhouse community. Under the influence of his father who was an active layman and Eunday school teacher and his mother, a devout Christian woman, he grew in the Christian life until at the age of 10 he made his profession of faith in Christ in the little Methodist Church that was meeting in the school house. In 1895 the family moved to a house within sight of Goodloe Chapel, a church on the Quitman charge. At the age of 17 Brother Patchell was licensed to preach and preached his first sermon on August 15, 1896 in Goodloe Chapel.

It was three years later when Brother Patchell took his first pastoral charge, Gravelly Circuit in Yell County. The next year (1900) he was placed on the accepted supply list in the Arkansas Conference but left without appointment to attend school at Hendrix College. In 1901 he was ordained a deacon; in 1906 he was admitted on trial. Two years later he was received into full connection and in 1910 he was ordained an elder.

On May 20, 1902, he was married to Miss Venice Major of Plummerville, Arkansas. The marriage ceremony was performed in Morrilton by

Rev. J. B. Stevenson.

Among his pastorates were the following churches: Berryville Circuit, Plummerville Circuit, Siloam Springs, Dodson Ave. Church (now Goddard Memorial), Hoxie, Brinkley, West Helena, Elaine, Harrisburg, Widner-Madison,-Round Pond. In all Brother Patchell served 14 different charges. He took the superannuate relation at the conference session meeting in Searcy in 1946.

Brother Patchell kept a record of his work, and this record reveals that he had performed over 500 marriage ceremonies, held over 1000 funerals, baptized over 1500 people, preached 5000 sermons and made nearly 50,000 pastoral calls. In addition, he found time for his hobbies, nature

study and poetry writing.

Brother Patchell passed from this life in the home of his daughter in Gurdon, Arkansas and was buried in the Walnut Grove Cemetery at Newport, Arkansas where he had made his home since retirement. His funeral service was conducted by Reverend Guy Ames, assisted by Reverend R. E. Connell. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Venice Major Patchell; two daughters, Mrs. E. W. Lawrence of Gurdon, Arkansas and Mrs. L. J. Lineback of Brinkley, Arkansas; six grandchildren; three brothers and five sisters.—James E. Major

REV. GEORGE A. FREEMAN

Rev. George A. Freeman was born in Vermont March 1, 1887 and came to Kentucky when he was nine years of age. From Kentucky he removed to Conway, Arkansas at the age of 18. He attended Hendrix Col-

lege and was a Veteran of the Spanish American War.

He was married to Stell L. Moore, May 8, 1901. To this union was born three children; George M. Freeman who died at the age of 21; Mrs. Joy Freeman Bates of Little Rock; and Hugh Avery Freeman of Dallas, Texas. Besides these children he is survived by a foster daughter, Mrs. Dorothy Freeman Baker of Memphis, Tenn.

After entering the Methodist Ministry he served as pastor of the Washington Avenue Methodist Church in North Little Rock for eight years. He had served the Methodist Church at Hardy for one year when he was forced to retire because of failing health. With Mrs. Freeman he

moved to his home, Hope Hill, near Quitman.

Just a few months before his last illness he and Mrs. Freeman mov-

ed to Hardy where they planned to make their permanent home.

Placing his membership in the Hardy Methodist Church he became a regular and faithful attendant upon its services until his last illness.

Bro. Freeman was a good man, a faithful servant of God and a scholar. The people of Hardy loved him as did all who ever knew him and he was a friend and source of inspiration to the pastor of the church.

Services were conducted in a church near Quitman, Jan. 31, by Rev. 'Harold Wilson, Rev. A. N. Story and Rev. George L. McGhehey, and he was laid to rest in the church yard nearby.—George T. McGhehey.

REV. WILLIAM FRANK COOLEY

William Frank Cooley, Superintendent of the Fayetteville District at the time of death, was born in Blytheville, Arkansas, October 27, 1910. He attended public schools in Blytheville where he graduated from high school. He received the A. B. degree from Hendrix College in 1931 and the B. D. degree from Duke University at Durham, North Carolina, in 1935. Brother Cooley died in a Clarksville, Arkansas hospital October 17, 1953

of injuries received October 15 in an automobile accident.

He was married to Marie Moon of Blytheville in 1932. They have a son, David, and a daughter, Carol. He entered the Methodist ministry and was admitted on trial in the Western North Carolina Conference in 1932. While attending Duke University he served as pastor at Summerfield and Asheboro Circuit in North Carolina. Transferring back to the North Arkansas Conference, he was admitted into full connection and ordained an elder. He served as pastor at Joiner, Bentonville, Siloam Springs, Harrison, and Russellville. He was appointed superintendent of the Fayetteville District in 1950. He was a reserve delegate to the General Conference of the Methodist Church meeting in San Francisco, California in 1952 and a delegate to the Jurisdictional Conference which met in Wichita, Kansas the same year.

Product of a devout and lovely Christian home, Bro. Cooley was encouraged not only by his parents to give his life to the Methodist ministry, but also by his grandfather, W. W. Hollipeter, who until his death was an active member of First Methodist Church, Blytheville. In this church through the inspiration from ministers, church school teachers, and church through the inspiration from ministers, church school teachers, and he felt and answered the call to preach the gospel. As pastor and district superintendent, he won lasting friends among laymen and ministers alike through his merry nature, generous spirit, and radiant Chritian Faith. His unusual gifts and personal charm marked him as one of the leaders in

the Conference.

Besides his wife, Mrs. Marie Moon Cooley, son David, and daughter Carol, he is survived by his father and mother, Mr. and Mrs. P. E. Cooley, Blytheville, one sister, Mrs. Elstner Beall of Wilson, Arkansas, a grandmother, Mrs. Emma M. Burney and an uncle, the Reverend George H. Cooley, both of Stuarts Draft, Virginia.

Funeral services were held in Central Methodist Church, Fayetteville, Arkansas, Monday morning, October 19, 1953. Dr. D. L. Dykes, Jr., Dr. Ethan W. Dodgen, and the Reverend A. N. Storey officiated. Burial was in Blytheville, Arkansas cemetery with services conducted by Dr. Roy I. Bagley, assisted by the Reverend Paul M. Bumpers. "Be of good cheer

On Saturday, September 26, 1953, Mrs. Margaret Cannon Sherman was laid to rest in the cemetery at Elm Springs, Arkansas. Mrs. Sherman was not only one of the church's most beautiful Christian spirits, but also held the distinction of having been a parsonage lady the longest period of any pastor's wife in the history of Arkansas Methodism. She lived in district parsonages for 21 years, and in pastoral parsonages for 29 years, making a total of 50 years as an active pastor's wife.

These years were filled with unselfish and devoted service, not only as a minister's wife, but also a a leader in her own right in the woman's work, having served as president of the Missionary Society in a number of places where her husband served as pastor or district superintendent.

Mrs. Sherman was born at Goshen, Arkansas, September 2, 1871, the daughter of the late T. M. Cannon and Mrs. Mary Cannon. After attending what was then known as the common schools of Goshen, she attended

Hyram and Lydia College at Altus, Arkansas.

Having completed her formal training, she taught school for several years in her home community of Goshen. It was there she met William Sherman, then pastor at Rogers. They fell in love and were married on December 10, 1891. She moved into the Rogers parsonage and began her

fifty years in Methodist parsonages.

The atmosphere which Mrs. Sherman created in each one of these homes was one of love, understanding and beauty which could be felt by even the most casual visitor. This beautiful spirit carried over into her own home when in 1941 she and Brother Sherman retired to live at 410 Washington Street in Fayetteville. Those of us who had the privilege of visiting occasionally in that home always felt the encouragement and strength of her fine Christian spirit.

She is survived by her husband, two children, S. H. Sherman, superintendent of schools in Statesboro, Georgia, and Mrs. D. D. Ricketts of Little Book, and two grandehildren, Mrs. Alleger de Alleger d

Little Rock, and two grandchildren, Mrs. Arnold Almond of Atlanta, Ga., and Miss Betty Ann Sherman, a stewardess in the U. S. Air Force, stationed in New Orleans, La.

"It has been said that every person is the incarnation of some word. Sallie Martin was my near neighbor for a few years and my dear friend ever after. If any word could fitly describe her, it would need to be a lovely one, for she was essentially lovely

in her life.

There is a description of her in the thirty-first chapter of the Book of Proverbs. All the virtues of the ideal woman mentioned there were hers. 'She looketh well to the ways of her household.' Sallie's home was set like a jewel in her heart and it was her pleasure to share its beauty and comfort with others. 'Her children arise up and call her blessed; and her husband also, and he praiseth her. Sallie's family was her pride and joy; Betty Jane, Mattie Sue and Billy were—to her—a gift from God, a trust to be kept inviolate. 'She openeth her mouth with wisdom; and in her tongue is the law of kindness.' In all the years that I enjoyed her friendship I never heard an unkind word fall from Sallie's lips. 'She stretcheth out her hands to the poor; she reacheth forth her hands to the needy.' Generous to the point of sacrifice, Sallie gave of herself to others, joyously sharing the riches of her life. The Recording Angel must have a long list of her deeds of unselfishness. When suffering became her portion, she bore affliction with steadfast patience and cheerfulness, and those who sought to comfort her found themselves comforted.

Sallie Martin knew God. She loved Him and served Him with

undivided loyalty. As a minister's wife, her life was rich and full. Modest as a flower, she was reluctant to assume the places of leadership to which the Church called her, but she never shirked a responsibility. Young people were her special concern and she was always eager and willing to help them in every possible way. Her oup of happiness was filled to everflowing when sible way. Her cup of happiness was filled to overflowing when her son entered the ministry of the Church she loved so well.

For this she had long prayed.

You may break, you may shatter the vase, if you will, but the scent of roses will cling to it still.' The world is a fairer place because Sallie Martin lived in it for awhile, and the fragrance of the same within her life will linger long in the memory of those who came within the radiant radius of it."

As the pastor to the Hairston family in Conway for five years following my father's four-year pastorate there, we know and loved Mrs. Martin and her entire family, as we met from time to time in our church's fellowship.

I join with Mrs. Potter and many others of our parsonage families in gratitude for the blessings which abide in her friendship-"with one of the finest Christian characters I ever knew."

STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- (I) That each undergraduate, each approved supply pastor, and each candidate for conference membership be required to meet with the Board of Ministerial Training before or during the session of the annual conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his control.
- (2) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one delegate from each church in each Pastoral Charge; provided further, that each station charge shall have three elected delegates.
- (3) That the figures answering the question in the pastor's report to Annual Conference: "Members reported last year" shall in every case be the number of members printed in the statistical tables of the Journal of the last Annual Conference.
- (4) That the District Superintendent's figures of all apportionments be accepted as the official figures.
- (5) That the apportionment for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report: and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- (6) All statistical reports shall be delivered by the district superintendents to the conference statistician seven days before the opening session of the Annual Conference, and all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer by June 1st.
- (7) When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishop's cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission, or an officer in the Conference administration, except members specifically designated by the Discipline.
- (8) That the Secretary of the Bishop's cabinet be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Journal.
- (9) That all members of the Annual Conference who attend its annual session, except superannuated and supernumerary preachers, be required to pay the host church one dollar registration fee.
- (10) At all sessions of the Annual Conference entertainment provided by the host church shall consist of bed and breakfast, except for superannuates, for whom full entertainment shall be provided.
- (11) Every board, commission, and committee receiving any money from conterence funds shall present to the Commission on World Service and Finance annually by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference a detailed financial report including all receipts and expenditures.
- (12) The list of lay delegates elected to Annual Conference shall be compiled by the district superintendents and sent to the host church and to the conference secretary thirty days before the opening of the Annual Conference.
- (13) The District Stewards shall apportion the askings for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and for General Administration Fund, and Jurisdictional Expense, to the several charges in each district on an equitable basis.
- (14) The conference treasurer shall close his books for the Conference Year seven days before the opening of the annual conference, and shall distribute to the several boards and commissions the moneys to which they are entitled by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference, and each board and commission receiving money from conference funds shall close its books on the opening day of annual conference.
- (15) No one shall be nominated for re-election to a board or commission on which he has served more than a quadrennium immediately preceding his election.
- (16) The secretary of the Board of Conference Claimants shall be a member of the secretarial staff of the conference and this person shall be charged with the responsibility of seeing that all records pertaining to service years be made identical.
- (17) Any proposal to change the Standing Rules shall lie on the table overnight, and then its passage shall require a ¾ vote of those present and voting.
- (18) That part of the report of all boards, commissions, committees and other agencies of the conference which provides for changes in policy or makes recommendations shall be mimeographed, printed, or otherwise duplicated and distributed to the membership of the conference prior to the time scheduled for action on said report.

SESSIONS OF THE CONFERENCE

The "Arkansas Conference" and the "White River Conference" were united in 1914 to form the present "North Arkansas Conference."

The Conference determined that its annual notation should date from the time of the organization of the Arkansas Conference in 1836, instead of following the date fixed by the consolidation of the Arkansas and White River Conferences, when the name was changed to North Arkansas Conference in 1914.

The Conference session of 1939 voted to maintain the numerical notation of the Conference in The Methodist Church.
