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MINUTES

Special Session, The North Arkansas Conference, Oct. 6, 1955

The North Arkansas Conference met in special called session in Gardner Memorial Methodist Church, North Little Rock, on October 6, 1955 at 10:30 a. m. with Bishop Paul E. Martin presiding. Hymn 382, "Glorious Things of Thee Are Spoken" was sung. The Apostles Creed was led by Bishop Martin after which he called on Arthur Terry, district superintendent of the Pine Bluff District to lead in prayer. The Responsive Reading selection was the First Reading for the 42nd Sunday, p. 609. Hymn 293, "Work for the Night is Coming" was sung. Bishop Martin then read verses from the 15th chapter of John and the 28th chapter of Matthew for the Scripture Reading.

Bishop Martin then outlined the purpose for the calling of the special session—stating called at request of cabinet and representatives of Arkansas Methodist Commission outlining members - lay members, those elected for last annual conference. Secretary took the roll with the help of the following tellers: Arnold Simpson, Earl Hughes, Sam Auslam, James Chandler, Pryor Cruce, Charles Lewis and Robert Simpson. The roll when taken indicated the presence of 102 clerical delegates and 24 lay delegates.

During the completion of the roll, the following visitors were presented to the conference: Dr. and Mrs. Cecil Culver, S. T. Baugh, H. M. Lewis, Connor Morehead, Aubrey G. Walton, Arthur Terry, and H. L. Johns.

Bishop Martin spoke words of appreciation for the entertainment of this special session by Gardner Memorial Church. E. B. Williams, pastor host, spoke words of welcome to the conference. Bishop Martin read communications from George Ivey and Harold Eggensperger stating the reasons for their absences from the conference.

Bishop Martin introduced the matter of the report of the special committee named during pastor's school to work out the necessary resolution concerning the participation of the Arkansas Methodist Commission in the proposed building of a Methodist Headquarters building in Little Rock. Judge J. G. Moore presented the following resolution which was adopted by the conference after its adoption had been moved by Judge Moore and seconded by W. Henry Goodloe:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the Arkansas Methodist Commission has, for several years, been seeking suitable housing without success, and

WHEREAS, it was learned that certain agencies of the Little Rock Conference were also desiring suitable headquarters, it was, therefore, suggested that the Arkansas Methodist Commission and the agencies of the Little Rock Conference combine their efforts to secure such housing, and

WHEREAS, the Little Rock Conference, at its session at Arkadelphia, June 11, 1955, passed a resolution agreeing to invest \$15,000.00 and secured a promise of a long-time loan from the Insurance Committee of the Little Rock Conference, in the amount of \$15,000.00, and

WHEREAS, the Arkansas Methodist Commission has a balance from the sale of the property at 1018 Scott Street in the amount of \$15,000.00 which could be invested; and with this amount of capital, sufficient funds can be borrowed to build a suitable building on a desirable location, which over a period of years would amortize itself from accured rental,

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the North Arkansas Conference authorize the Arkansas Methodist Commission to enter into the formation of a corporation, jointly with the Little Rock Conference,

for the purpose of acquiring and owning of lots and a headquarters building, and,

THAT we further authorize the Arkansas Methodist Commission to appoint three members of its commission to serve jointly with three persons from the Little Rock Conference in forming such a corporation, and

THAT, the Arkansas Methodist Commission is hereby authorized to invest \$15,000.00 in such a corporation and,

THAT, when such Methodist Headquarters Building is so constructed, it is to be under the management and general control of such headquarters corporation and

THAT the proposed Methodist Headquarters Corporation be and is hereby authorized by this Conference to borrow money, but to secure the repayment of such loan or loans only by mortgaging or pledging its own assets, and

THAT the agents, representatives or trustees who act for this conference in the formation of said Methodist Headquarters Corporation cause said corporation to have kept an exact, true, and correct account of all funds or moneys contributed, loaned, or invested in said corporation to the end that the assets of said corporation may be ascertained, which said assets shall be equally owned in the exact proportions to the amounts invested in its cost by the the two cooperating conferences, their agencies or trustees.

Judge Moore spoke to the resolution, as did the other members of the conference: H. W. Jinske, Alfred A. Knox, S. B. Wilford. The Resolution was unanimously adopted.

Bishop Martin spoke on the resolution which had been adopted. Aubrey G. Walton spoke to the conference concerning the location of the property which is under option.

Ewing T. Wayland, chairman of the Board of Social and Economic Relations was granted the floor for the presentation of the following resolution from his board. Charles P. McDonald, Jr., secretary of the board read the resolution:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, in our historic position we have followed Christ in laboring to bring the whole of life in conformity with the Will of God; and

WHEREAS, we believe that personality possesses the highest value, and we believe that we should live to fulfill our obligation to help save men from sin and every influence which would harm or destroy him, and

WHEREAS, we believe that gambling coarsens and degrades the minds and souls of men, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the members of the North Arkansas Conference of The Methodist Church, representing ninety-seven thousand Methodists in the northern half of Arkansas, meeting in session on October 6, 1955, go on record as being heartily opposed to pari-mutual betting in any expressed form; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we most respectfully request the Governor of the State of Arkansas and the Arkansas State Racing Commission to oppose the granting of a permit for the operation of a Greyhound Race Track in Crittenden County, Arkansas.

Board of Social and Economic Relations Ewing T. Wayland, Chairman Charles P. McDonald, Jr., Secretary

Charles P. McDonald, Jr. moved the adoption of the resolution, seconded by Alfred A. Knox.

The following spoke to this resolution: Ralph Hillis, pastor of First Methodist church, West Memphis. Ewing Wayland spoke words of appreciation for Brother Hillis in this matter. Henry Rickey suggested that we should look forward to making some changes in the law regarding this matter, Roy I. Bagley suggested that copies of the resolution be sent to Gov. Faubus and the Chairman of the Racing Commission. Resolution adopted. Bishop Martin spoke words suggesting that individuals continue to register individual feelings in this matter, and spoke words of hope that all parimutual gambling will be voted out.

W. Henry Goodloe recognized for a privileged matter concerning the illness of President Dwight D. Eisenhower, and moved that the secretary of the conference be instructed to send to President Eisenhower the assurance of our continuing prayers for his full recovery, seconded by Ewing Wayland. This motion carried. Dr. Fred G. Roebuck led in a word of prayer for the president.

Bishop Martin announced a meeting of the Conference Radio and Film Commission met briefly for the purpose of organization and election of officers.

The following spoke to the conference before adjournment: Dr. Connor Morehead, Superintendent of the Arkansas Methodist Children's Home, Dr. E. T. Wayland of The Arkansas Methodist, Dr. Matt. Ellis of Hendrix College, and Dr. H. L. Johns, of the Board of Mission speaking in the interest of the Methodist College for Alaska project.

An offering was taken for the purpose of honoring Dr. E. T. Wayland by placing a new chair in the new Methodist offices in the new building. Dr. Wayland spoke words of appreciation.

E. B. Williams, host pastor, presented Mrs. Paul E. Martin to the conference. David Conyers made an announcement concerning the showing of the film "Martin Luther" in our conference. Ethan Dodgen asked for a brief meeting of all general and jurisdiction conference delegates. J. Albert Gatlin made an announcement.

The conference sang the "Doxology" and was led in the closing prayer by Benjamin C. Few.

FIRST DAY-MORNING SESSION

June 13, 1956

Opening: The One Hundred Twenty-first Session of the North Arkansas Conference of The Methodist Church convened in First Methodist Church, Conway, June 13, 1956 at 10:30 a. m. with Bishop Paul E. Martin presiding. Hymn No. 402, "And Are We Yet Alive" was sung. Dr. Lud Estes, secretary of The General Conference was introduced and led in the opening prayer.

Roll: The roll was taken by Alf A. Eason. The roll indicated that 206 Clerical and 114 Lay delegates were present.

Planning Committee: Henry Rickey, host district superintendent presented the report of the Planning Committee and it was adopted. The main floor of the auditorium was fixed as the bar of the conference.

Nominations for Secretary: Alfred A. Knox who has served as secretary of the conference for five years, nominated Alf A. Eason to serve as secretary for the new quadrennium. He was elected. The secretary then named the following assistants for this session: Alf A. Eason, Charles P. McDonald, Jr., James R. Chandler, and Harold D. Womack.

Resolution: Roy I. Bagley, secretary of the Cabinet offered the following resolution, which was adopted.

WHEREAS, we are closing a quadrennium and

WHEREAS Rev. Alfred A. Knox, Conference Secretary and his staff, Chaplain Lyman T. Barger, Rev. Alf A. Eason, Rev. Charles P. McDonald, Jr., Rev. O. D. Peters, and Rev. Harold D. Womack have rendered such outstanding service to our Annual Conference in keeping the minutes of the Conference Sessions and the great amount of extra work that has gone into the mimeographing of the Pre-Journal Digest and the Pre-Conference Reports; and

WHEREAS, Rev. William A. Stewart, Jr., has given such efficient service as Conference Statistician in that the recapitulation sheets have been available at the opening session of the Annual Conference, thereby helping us to get a clear picture of the closing year's work and plan for a new year;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that the North Arkansas Annual Conference go on record and spread in the 1956 Journal our gratitude and appreciation for the splendid work done by each one of these men.

ROY I BAGLEY, Secretary of the Cabinet

Statistician: Roy I. Bagley, secretary of the cabinet nominated Harold D. Womack to be Conference Statistician for the next quadrennium, and he was elected.

Welcome: Henry Rickey, host district superintendent, Joel Cooper, host pastor, and James Ligon, chairman of The Official Board of the host church spoke words of welcome to the conference. Bishop Martin responded for the conference.

Letter Read: Bishop Martin read to the conference a letter from Raymond Hillis of Malvern, brother of Ralph Hillis, in which he included a gift of \$50 for the Conway church. The conference expressed appreciation for this letter and its gift.

Communications From Absent Members: Communications were presented the conference from the following conference members, and the secretary was instructed to send the greeting of the conference in reply:

B. L. Wilford, A. W. Martin, Lyman Barger, Eric Reaves, Guy Murphy, J. S. Seneker, J. J. Decker, Lester Weaver, and W. W. Allbright.

Nominations for Quadrennial Boards: Roy I. Bagley secretary of the Cabinet read the nominations from the cabinet for membership on the quadrennial boards, commissions, and committees. They were elected as nominated and their names appear in the directory in the front of the Journal.

Resolutions: Ira A. Brumley offered the following resolutions which were adopted by the conference:

"It is recommended that the Conference Board of Education in addition to one minister and one layman from each district nominated by members of the Conference Cabinet, and the four youth members as designated by General Conference legislation, may be composed of six additional members, one of whom is to be a worker with children, to be nominated by the Board of Education and elected by the conference"

and

"It is recommended that the Board of Managers of The Arkansas Pastors School shall be composed of the following representation from the North Arkansas Conference: The Registrar of the Board of Ministerial Training and one additional member elected by the Board of Ministerial Training; the Executive Secretary of the Board of Education and one additional member elected by the Board of Education; one member each from the Board of Evangelism and the Board of Missions to be elected by the respective boards; and one member of the cabinet selected by the cabinet"

The following visitors were introduced to the conference during the morning: Gilbert Hyde, Lud Estes, Jim Workman, Glenn Sanford, Conner Morehead, Bates Sturdy, Wesley Clark and Tom Carruth.

THE SERVICE OF COMMEMORATION

Benjamin C. Few presided for the Service of Commemoration. Hymn No. 372, "Love Divine" was sung. Brother Few led the Call to Worship. Bishop Martin led in the Invocation and collect. Hymn No. 516, "Lord, It Belongs Not to Thy Care" was sung. Benjamin C. Few led in the "Canticle of Comfort". Alvin C. Murray read the Scripture Lesson, and Brother Few led in The Affirmation of Faith. C. C. Burton presented the "Record of Remembrance" for the following who have died during the year: W. L. Diggs, John A. Womack, W. C. Holman, C. E. Gray, Mrs. E. M. Peters, Mrs. J. M. Kitchens.

The Message of Remembrance was brought by Robert E. L. Bearden using as his theme "The Builders of Monuments". The Doxology was sung and the Sacrament of The Lord's Supper was administered by Bishop Martin and the Cabinet, assisted by Joel Cooper, host pastor. After appropriate announcements the service was dismissed.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION

Opening Devotions: The conference opened at 8:30 a.m. with Bishop Martin presiding. The Hymn No. 244, "On Christ the Solid Rock I Stand" was sung and then the congregation joined in unison prayer. Bishop Martin then spoke to the conference basing his message on the story of Joseph in Egypt. Hymn No. 73, "Be Still My Soul" was sung.

Journal: Earl Hughes reported for the Committee on Journal that the minutes of the first day's session had been read and approved.

Roll Completed: The conference secretary gave opportunity for those who had not previously registered their attendance to do so.

District Superintendent's Report: Roy I. Bagley, secretary of the cabinet presented the following district superintendent's report:

THE METHODIST CHURCH

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS

Bishop Martin, Members of the North Arkansas Annual Conference, and Friends:

It is a privilege to make our report to this session of the annual Conference. By "Our report" I mean the more than 96,000 members of the local churches comprising 258 pastoral charges; the 272 ministers who are on trial, effective, retired and supernumerated; the more than 68 Approved Supply pastors without whose faithful service the ministry of our churches in the North Arkansas Annual Conference would be seriously handicapped; those faithful and devoted wives of the parsonage homes who have also shared in the successes and failures of their husbands; and last but not least Bishop and Mrs. Martin whose keen interest in each problem and whose devotion to each charge and minister have been a constant source of inspiration and guidance. In our imagination we can see this host of persons standing firmly in their respective places, giving loyal and devoted leadership. We can also see that other number who, though members of the Church have never been challenged to invest their time, talents and money in the work of the Kingdom. Can we use a little holy imagination and try to visualize what new strength would be ours if we could but capture their lives for Christ and His Church: the failures that are reflected in this report may very well be traced partially to our lack of dedication and vision, but these who took the vows of the Church and straightway forgot, must also share in the shortcoming we may be painfully conscious of this year.

With the singing of the traditional hymn, "And Are We Yet Alive," we close an outstanding quadrennium in our Church and turn the key in the door to a new quadrennium. The quadrennium 1952-56 is recorded history and we cannot go back and change it, but we can be penitent over our mistakes; we cannot live on the successes of these past four years, but in them we can find inspiration to move forward for Christ and His Church. No greater hour has ever confronted the Church and never has the General Conference of the Methodist Church spoken with a more decisive voice than the session which has just closed.

What shall we say about our program of evangelism for this Conference year? We have won on profession of faith 2,973; by transfer from other Methodist Churches 3,106; from other Churches 668; making a total of 6,747. Despite this number received, we regret to say that we show a loss of 439 members this year. We did not reach the goal we so enthusiastically set at the session of the Annual Conference last year. Many factors contributed to this failure. It was inevitable that with the legislation of the General Conference of 1952 doing away with an inactive roll, that churches would clear their rolls of those members. Perhaps our membership is more realistic than it has been for a long time. Further, in some sections there has been a sharp decline in population. Let us not use these factors as excuses to hide behind. The fields are "still white unto harvest." In the light of that goal we failed. On the ofher hand, in what has been accomplished we have grounds for rejoicing and gratitude to God. We are not a little group of people off in some corner. We are a great Church and when awakened, we can make a real contribution to the Spiritual, moral and social life of the State of Arkansas.

May we be so bold as to urge every pastor and layman present to catch the Spiritual significance of the Prayer Vigil in our Conference? Lift it above the deadening plans of mechanics and find in it a life-lifting power for our own individual lives and the life of the Church. May God help us if we have forgotten the true joy of spiritual discipline.

The reports to Annual Conference during this quadrennium just closing will reveal that there has been an increase in pastor's salaries. Still in many of the charges the salary is still below the minimum scale set by our annual Conference. Some of this may be due to a poor financial system in the local church, but a great part of it is because there is a need for continued em-

phasis on stewardship of possessions. We urge every charge to seek an improved financial system and urge that Rev. A. N. Storey, our executive secretary of the Town and Country Commission be requested, by charges needing his assistance, to help in setting up an adequate financial plan. The recent Stewardship Emphasis gave us a wealth of material. We urge that this material be used in a continuing emphasis on stewardship of time, talents, and money.

This past quadrennium shows an increase in World Service giving over the preceding one. Our Church is making its greatest call for World Service giving during this quadrennium. We believe that this call is made in order that a greater world-wide ministry might be made more effective through our church. We feel that the askings on World Service are a real challenge but that we will meet this challenge in every charge.

We have paid \$14,145 for General Advance Specials, and \$19,596 for Conference Advance Specials. This means that there has been an added ministry for our church in places where otherwise it would have been impossible for the Board of Missions to go. One of the thrilling specials of this year has been the call for the Methodist College in Alaska. We urge that Sunday School classes and individuals choose a personal project in the mission field and that the opportunity for Mission specials be lifted in every congregation.

If we attempted to mention all who have done outstanding work this year, the list would be much longer than you would want to listen to. There have been some charges that deserve special mention.

In the Batesville District, Newport First Church has just completed a lovely new parsonage. Oil Trough-Newark charge has completed a new stone educational building valued at ten thousand dollars. Cave City has completed a new stone veneer parsonage at a cost of ten thousand dollars. Corinth-Evening Shade Charge has a new stone veneer church valued at eight thousand dollars. Concord has a new educational building valued at five thousand dollars. Viola has a new four thousand dollar educational building. Cotter-Cedar Grove has done extensive remodeling on their church and educational building. Yellville reports a new parsonage valued at ten thousand dollars. Central Avenue paid off the indebtedness on their educational building four years ahead of schedule and installed air conditioning. Tuckerman has air conditioned their church at a cost of seven thousand dollars. Oak Ridge and Sharpe of the Charlotte Charge paid off the indebtedness and dedicated their new church buildings.

The Conway District superintendent reports that the rearrangement of circuits to comply with minimum salary standards is working out very satisfactorily. Minimum salary expenditures have been reduced to \$3100 as compared with \$8025 last year. The Lakewood Church in North Little Rock has gotten off to a good start. They are using an elementary school building for temporary quarters. A suitable lot has been purchased with the first unit of a building project to start this fall. Average attendance in Church School, since the opening of the Church, is 178. That is probably a record for a new church in this conference. A start has been made on a new church at Amboy in North Little Rock with services being held in a home. A lot has been secured and partial payment has been made. Russellville First Church has agreed to sponsor a new church in Russellville, paying most of the salary and all the parsonage rent for the first year, and as long as necessary to help the new church get started. Gardner Memorial has completed its building program which gives it a fine plant. A parsonage was secured during the year for Wesley Church in Conway. A new church has been built at Pisgah on the Dardanelle Circuit. Rose City has completed its building program. Levy has completed its educational building. Sylvan Hills has a new parsonage and educational building under construction.

The Fayetteville District reports some fine building programs. Sulphur Springs has completed work on a new educational building valued at twelve

thousand dollars. Gravette has completed the educational building at a cost of eight thousand dollars. Gentry has a modern educational plant which was opened last December with the cost of building and fixtures of twenty-five thousand dollars. Decatur has started a new educational building which will be the first unit of a complete new church plant. The educational building will be in use in the near future. Siloam Springs has purchased an old dwelling and done a fine job in converting it into a very practical youth center. Berryville is completing an addition to its educational plant that will increase their floor space to give them adequate facilities. Wiggins Memoral has purchased additional space which for the present will be used as a parking lot for their church and can be used later for expansion of their building. Green Forrest will have a new parsonage ready for occupancy by their new pastor right after conference. Wesley in Springdale has completed their educational plant but have already started planning for additional space. Springdale has bought and furnished a lovely new parsonage.

The Forrest City District reports \$2,830 spent for repair and remodeling on the District parsonage including an air conditioning unit for the office of the District Superintendent. The new church at West Memphis is organized and on Charter Sunday, June 3, has 125 members. Two charges go off minimum salary. They are Cherry Valley and Colt Circuit. Simultaneous Stewardship revivals were held at Forrest City and West Memphis with pastors exchanging leadership. This effort resulted in a 40% increase in budget support. Hughes is completing a new educational Building at a cost of \$48,000. Marianna's new educational building and air conditioning is nearing completion at a cost of \$70,000. West Helena has launched the construction of a new educational building which will cost \$45,000. The new church at Madison is being completed debt free at a cost of \$15,000. Forrest Chapel on the Colt Circuit has finished new church school rooms and redecorated the sanctuary at a cost of \$3,000. The churches at Earle and Wheatley have been redecorated. Clarendon is starting a new parsonage when completed will cost around \$25,000. Crawfordsville has let the contract for a new educational building with the cost estimated at \$30,000. Five new chartered Methodist Men's Clubs have been organized. There have been salary raised in ten of the pastoral charges for next year.

The Fort Smith District reports that approximately one half million dollars have been invested in church and parsonage building programs this year. Clarksville has brought to completion their beautiful air-conditioned sanctuary as a climax to the extensive building achievements over the past few years. First Church Fort Smith has installed air-conditioning and completed the third major educational addition which combines added classroom space with the long-dreamed of ground floor chapel. St. Luke and Massard have added new educational facilities to double floor space in each church and Massard has purchased additional lots for further expansion. Grand Avenue has purchased three acres of land in a perfectly situated relocation project. The land and the buildings are valued at \$15,000. It is hoped that the congregation will be transferred to the new site within a few months. St. Paul has purchased a new parsonage and the lot occupied by the old parsonage has been cleared away to construct a new educational building for which the plans have been drawn and the financial program is well underway. Goddard Memorial has completed transaction for additional lots which will be used in a further expansion program. Van Buren First Church has completed a new educational building during the year. St. John in Van Buren has completely air-conditioned their sanctuary. Greenwood has one of the most exquisite chapels built to match the remodelled sanctuary, Extensive remodeling has been done at Charleston, Hartman, Mulberry and Glover Memorial. Magazine has completed a modern parsonage. Midland Heights in Fort Smith has \$30,000 in cash toward the new sanctuary which will be the third unit of a modern church plant. Ozark has \$20,000 in hand with a new educational plant to be started in January. Paris and Booneville have substantial funds in hand which assures them of additional buildings in the near future.

The Jonesboro District reports that in cooperation with the Paragould and Forrest City Districts a project has been initiated to build a Methodist Student Center at Arkansas State College, Jonesboro. First Church Jonesboro has completed payment on their new parsonage. Huntington Avenue has completed payment on their educational building. Mt. Carmel has paid for their new church. Keiser has built a new Fellowship Hall and plans are well underway for new churches at Truman and Nettleton. Monette is planning a new educational building and Tyronza has plans for a new parsonage. A new church has been started in Jonesboro with the aid of the Thousand Club and now has sixty new members. Perhaps the outstanding single achievement of the District has been a \$75,000 pledge on the Methodist Hospital Building campaign and regular payments are being made. Joiner has completed payment on a new educational building.

Paragould District reports improvements on the churches at Beech Grove, Black Rock, Imboden, Macedonia, Mammoth Springs, Camp, Paragould First Church, Griffin Memorial, Piggott, Oak Grove, Ramer's Chapel, Cummins Chapel, Biggers, Ravendon Springs, Paragould First Church, Sedgwick all report extensive improvements on the parsonages. Lynn has a new \$3000 church. Boydsville has a new parsonage valued at \$7500. Hoxie has a new \$5000 educational building. Smithville has a new \$3000 educational building. Walnut Ridge has a new educational building valued at \$95,000. A new District parsonage has been built at a cost for building and grounds at \$35,000. Green County has an organized and functioning Group Ministry. There are 36 certified lay speakers.

Grace Methodist Church in Searcy tops the list of achievements in the Searcy District. Grace Church was built with the help of the Thousand Club and First Church Searcy. It is completely furnished and the total cost of building and furnishings is \$11,000. A new parsonage has also been purchased for the pastor and completely furnished. Beebe has built a lovely new parsonage and furnished it with new furniture. Clinton has built a new educational building at a cost of \$45,000. First Church Searcy has purchased new property to enlarge their educational facilities at a cost of approximately \$50,000. Jacksonville and Cabot are ready to launch a building program. A new church has been built at Fitzhugh on the DeView Circuit. Pangburn has completely remodeled their church and rock-veneered the outside.

To sum up our achievements in buildings and improvements, we are informed by our Conference Statistician that we have paid this year on indebtedness \$270,204 and that we have spent on building and improvements \$873,773. Both of these items show an increase over last year of more than \$130,000. We commend our charges for their interest in the House of God and in the homes of the preacher families.

Other activities of the Church are worthy of note such as the work of the Church School, the Woman's Society of Christian Service, and the Methodist Men's Clubs. We feel that each interest of the church has received attention during this year and that we can say that it has been a good year.

We affirm our faith in the leadership of the Methodist Church. There has never been a greater day of challenge for Christian patience and courage than the day we face. We believe that the great days of the church are before us and pray that we may find strength for our tasks and courage to meet the challenge.

Privileged Matter: Henry Rickey, host district superintendent was recognized on a privileged matter and presented the following ladies to the conference: Mrs. Paul E. "Resolved, that Standing Rule No. 9 be amended to read: "That all members of the annual conference who attend the session be required to pay the host church \$2.00 registration fee with the following exceptions: (1) Delegates from minimum salary charges be required to pay only \$1.00 (2) Superannuated and supernumerary preachers be exempt entirely from paying a registration fee. That offerings received at the preaching services be given to the host church for expenses incurred in the entertainment of the conference, and that the honorarium for the visiting preacher be paid from the Annual Conference Expense Fund."

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report No. 1

Forty years ago The North Arkansas Conference began a field program of Christian Education, then called Sunday School work. During these forty years this program has expanded into a field program of cultivation that is a great factor in the total program of the conference. Thus we are this year making the fortieth report on this program of work. This is the twenty-fifth report under the leadership of the present Executive Secretary.

We are happy to report that in most of the work we show splendid

progress this year.

Our Wesley Foundation work has made good progress this year. We have workers in the four centers where four-year state colleges are located. The program at Russellville has been given standard approval this year. The Fayetteville center is moving in that direction, being conditionally approved. The other two centers, Conway and Jonesboro, have done good work. Jonesboro is moving toward a student center building. We regret that Dr. James S. Upton found it necessary to resign as State Director of Student Work and Conference Director of Youth Work. We desire to express our appreciation of the great service Dr. Upton has rendered in these programs. We are happy to report that Rev. Frank Jones of Fayetteville has made a good beginning as State Student Director, and Rev. Pryor R. Cruce of Newport as Conference Director of Youth Work.

The report on children's work indicates the best Children's Workers' Conference this year and good work in other phases of children's work. The Conference Youth Rally was the best yet. This has been an all-time high in training work both in the schools held and in new certification of leadership. The program of Missionary Education was given special emphasis with excellent results. The youth program, especially in the summer activities, has been very good.

We are glad to report that only about 2% of our church school membership is in schools not using Methodist literature.

Our program of Christian Education was recognized this year by the Editorial Division of the General Board of Education in the January CHURCH SCHOOL.

A detailed report of the year's work can be found in the June issue of the CHRISTIAN EDUCATION BULLETIN.

We recommend that the program of Children's Work, Youth Work, Adult Work, training schools, vacation church schools, camps, coaching conferences, literature cultivation, promotion of Wesley Foundation work, promotion of Hendrix College, and all other general conference cultivation in terms of Christian Education be continued as of the past year.

That the church school superintendents and members of local church Commissions on Christian Education be elected at the Fourth Quarterly Conference to take office at the beginning of the conference year, but that we continue beginning our church school year with the first Sunday in October until the church at large makes a change in date.

That the month of September be Christian Education month; that a series of district Christian Education Institutes be held the week of September 16-23; that Church School Rally Day be observed on September 23; and that September 23-30 be Christian Education Week.

That we continue the policy of using seventy-five per cent of Church School Rally Day offerings for district Christian Education cultivation.

That the month of September be a special period for promoting Church School Rally Day offerings for district Christian Education cultivation.

That a conference-wide youth rally be held on the Hendrix College campus on April 5, 1957.

That the Conference Children's Workers Conference be held March 5-7, 1957.

That the North Arkansas Conference cooperate with the Little Rock and Louisiana Conferences in promoting the Area Adult Convocation in Little Rock, January 4-6, 1957; that we underwrite six hundred dollars to provide funds for promoting the Convocation.

That we cooperate with the Conference Women's Society of Christian Service in giving special promotion to the Bible study on Paul's Letters to the Local Churches, by conducting coaching conferences on this course.

That we provide twenty scholarships in the Arkansas Pastor's School for carefully chosen persons who will take the course on THE USE OF CHURCH SCHOOL MATERIALS and work toward certification in this course.

That larger emphasis be given in local churches to the November Special for Ministerial Training and Hendrix College; and that November 11-18, 1956 be designated as the period for the November Special.

That in cooperation with the Commission on Christian Vocations we plan a conference meeting on Church Vocations.

That we request the World Service Commission to make an appropriation of nine thousand dollars for Wesley Foundation work; and that these funds be apportioned to the four centers where there are four-year state schools, the funds to be used only for the purpose of providing leadership, leaving the local groups the responsibility of raising their own funds for program.

That summer or fall meetings of conference councils be held to plan the program of Christian education for the various age groups in the conference.

That we encourage local churches to continue and expand the plan of planning and conducting local church formal training enterprises, but requesting that all applications be in the conference office at least thirty days in advance of the date of the schools.

We recommend to the Bishop and his cabinet that Ira A. Brumley be appointed as Executive Secretary for the conference year of 1956-1957.

REPORT NO 2A

Hendrix College

To the Board of Education

This is a very significant year for Methodist colleges in America, for in 1956 was launched "The Higher Education Emphasis" a quadrennial plan designed to expand the educational program of The Methodist Church and "strengthen our institutions of learning for more effective service". During the quadrennium 1956-60 the Church will undoubtedly so undergird its colleges that "their efficiency, academic standards, permanence and support of Christian ideals shall be assured".

The proposal from the Coordinating Council adopted enthusiastically by the General Conference makes this strong appeal to all Methodists: "It is highly important that we develop in our whole constituency a conscience concerning the continuing support of our institutions and that a procedure be established in all of our conferences by which our people would contribute not less than an average of \$1.00 annually per member for the support of institutions."

We at Hendrix are deeply interested in both the "conscience" and the "procedure". We urge pastors to help all our people understand that the church college is an essential need of the church and of society. The Joint Committee of the North Arkansas and the Little Rock Conferences will make its recommendation to each conference regarding procedure by which Arkansas Methodists may make larger annual contributions for the support of Hendrix College.

Hendrix faces increasing budget demands while at the same time some budget aid is being withdrawn. Recent contributions from The Fund for the Advancement of Education, a Ford Agency, were \$35,000 in 1954-55, and \$24,900 in 1955-56; for 1956-57 the amount from this source will be only \$4,347. To make up this loss, Hendrix is counting on substantial increases in budget support from Methodists of Arkansas. We urge the conference to approve the recommendation which the Joint Committee will make at this session.

Some aid will also come through the Arkansas Foundation of Associated Colleges. Established in 1954, this agency closed the first fiscal year August 31, 1955. We are now in the second year and it is gratifying that most earlier contributors are renewing their contribution and we are finding many new donors. This broadened base of the structure of our annual program will, we believe, be of great benefit through the years.

We are delighted that Hendrix was included among 615 colleges and universities to which the Ford Foundation announced last December grants totaling \$210,000,000. Hendrix will receive \$125,900, in two equal installments—one by July 1, 1956 and the other within the following twelve months. This is endowment money, the income from which "may be used only in increasing faculty salaries".

A new dormitory for men was finished last March and will be occupied in September, 1956. The application for an additional loan to build a residence hall for women is now being processed and we confidently expect that this building will be ready for use by September, 1957. Both of these structures will be financed through loans from the Housing and Home Finance Agency of the federal government.

The recent General Conference approved again the second Sunday in June as Student Day. On this day a special offering will support the National Methodist Scholarship Program. Hendrix now receives two scholarships per year. We urge churches to give larger support to this important program so that many more worthy students may have an opportunity for a college education.

The report and recommendation of the Joint Committee named last year to study Hendrix budget needs will be Report 2C.

COMMITTEE ON WORLD PEACE

I. ACTIVITIES

The Conference Committee on World Peace, aware of its responsibility, within the bounds of the North Arkansas Conference, for creating "through educational means" the mind and will to World Peace and Order "under God", has diligently sought to do so. We have been limited only by time, effort, and money. And we respectfully submit the following report:

- 1. By mailing of peace literature we have sought to inform the preachers-in-charge and the laity of the conference on national legislation concerning world order and peace, on the domestic and international levels. Also we have channeled such information as the committee has received from the General Board of World Peace, Chicago; and the Jurisdictional Board of World Peace, Oklahoma City; and from other board-approved sources of information such as The United Nations, the Department of State of the United States and certain committees of the Congress.
- 2. By delegation this conference participated in the United Nations Seminar, New York City, October, 1955 and held under the auspices of the General Board of World Peace. Our delegates were Rev. Thurston Masters, secretary of the Committee; Rev. Henry W. Jinske, Promotion Secretary; and Rev. and Mrs. Charles Lewis of the committee. Through speaking engagements before district conferences, congregations, women's societies.

service clubs and youth groups throughout the year, the delegates to the United Nations Seminar furthered the Peace Cause and committee objective.

3. The most recent and we believe the most promising venture of the committee was the organization and training under the auspices of Hendrix College of a deputation peace team to work within the bounds of the conference. This team has had weekly engagements since the first of April, appearing before Methodist Youth Fellowships and Methodist Men's Clubs and Church congregations. The activities of the team was brought to a close on May 8 (for this conference year) with a 15 minute program over the local Conway radio station. The leader of this year's deputation team is John Alston, senior at Hendrix, and for the coming conference year the leader will be Miss Ann Eubanks, a freshman from Fort Smith and a member of this year's team. All reports reaching the chairman have been most favorable, and the team has already proved its worth. The committee is grateful to Hendrix College, the team's faculty sponsors and the members of the team for the contribution to the committee's work and objective.

II. COMMITTEE POSITIONS

The Committee's position or stands on war and peace and international affairs are those of the General Conference of The Methodist Church. We, too, recognize that "there are difficult problems" facing the nations of the world; and that "much educational work needs to be done before peace becomes a reality". Furthermore, "before peace becomes a reality a new morality must become the standard by which the acts of nations are judged". And to this end, as Bishop Fred P. Corson stated in The Episcopal Address before the General Conference, 1956,

The church must promote peace, and the attainment of enduring peace is primarily a matter of knowledge and spirit. The United Nations and its agencies must be understood and supported, not as an instrument of propoganda for one point of view, but as the media through which, by conference, differences may be settled without resort to arms. Disarmament must be considered as a multilateral project of primary importance. The horror of war in an age of nuclear power should increase the efforts to guarantee the use of atomic energy for nonmilitary activities."

III. RATING

The conference committee is pleased to learn, and we believe those who receive and read this report will also be pleased to learn that the North Arkansas Conference Committee on World Peace, by its work and leadership, has earned a place among the "high ten" of the 105 annual conferences of the United States, its territories and possessions.

THE BOARD OF EVANGELISM

Recommendations for 1956 - 1957

I. GOAL:

- 1. We recommend that the North Arkansas Conference accept the challenge of winning enough persons for Christ and His Church to make the membership of the North Arkansas Conference 100,000 by June of 1957.
- II. PROGRAM SUGGESTIONS: Conference Suggestions:

1. We recommend that the ministers of each district participate in a Conference on Evangelism for the purpose of receiving inspiration, information, and planning opportunities that will create a definite program of evangelism within each district. We recommend that the Conferences on Evangelism have the following features:

(a) The District Superintendent will direct the conference with the assistance of the District Director of Evangelism

and the other pastors of his district.

(b) Conference Locations:

1. Paragould, Jonesboro, Batesville Districts

......Wayland Springs Camp

2. Searcy and Forrest City Districts

Ethan Dodgen Camp 3. Fort Smith, Conway and Fayetteville Districts

Shores Lake Camp

(c) Conference Dates:

Ethan Dodgen Camp—July 19-20
 Wayland Springs Camp—July 17-18

3. Shores Lake Camp—July 16-17

- (e) Cost of Conference: The Conference Board of Evangelism will pay the cost of the conference, allowing \$5.00 per man, and will pay the expenses of the inspirational speaker. Each minister will pay \$1.00 registration fee.
- 2. We recommend the following schedule for participation in the Arkansas all-year Prayer Vigil.

Fayetteville District......June 30 (midnight)—July 23 Noon Forrest City District.....July 23 Noon—August 15 Noon Paragould District.....August 15 Noon—September 7 Noon Batesville District....September 7 Noon—September 30 Noon Fort Smith District......September 30 Noon—October 23 Noon Searcy District......October 23 Noon—November 15 Noon Conway District......November 15 Noon—December 8 Noon Jonesboro District....December 8 Noon—December 31 Midnight

District Suggestions:

- 1. We recommend that each district be appropriated a sum of \$100.00 to be used for the program of evangelism when recommended by the district superintendent,
- 2. We recommend that the District Superintendent of Evangelism counsel with local churches on the local and sub-district level for the purpose of strengthening the work of the local church Commission on Membership and Evangelism and that each District Director be allowed an expense account of \$50.00 for this work.
- 3. We recommend that one district (Searcy) have an all effort simultaneous revival program with local church selecting and providing for the evangelist preacher, song leader and youth worker, cottage prayer services, and other necessities.
- 4. We recommend that four Advance Teams, composed of ministers and laymen be sent to localities where the evangelistic opportunity is urgent and demanding and that each participating District Superintendent shall received \$150.00 to assist with expenses.

Local Church Suggestions:

 In co-operation with the Quadrennial Emphasis on the local church, we recommend that careful attention be given to the organization, personnel, and program of the local church Commission on Member-ship and Evangelism, and that each church shall seek to win everincreasing members for Christ and His Church.

THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

In an age of materialism and power devices is a tendency to overlook spiritual needs. Man does not live by gadgets and modern conveniences alone. He still must have "Every Word that proceeds from the mouth of God". Tis true that we live more comfortably because of the time and energy saving mechanisms, but there is the announcement of the Prophet Amos: "Woe to those who are at ease in Zion". The Lord wants that men live a well balanced life. There is need that we do not emphasize matter above spirit. This is seen in the admonition of Paul in his letter to the Colossians. He wrote: "Set your mind on things that are above, not on things that are on earth". We are to keep our feet on the ground at all times.

There is another danger point which we must guard; even that of the unused Bible. In this book is found the Way of Life. It is the writing about which the Psalmist wrote: "Thy Word is a lamp unto my feet and a light unto my path". The guide book to live abundantly under all conditions. The open Bible affords us inspiration and information we must have to face our age as men of God. Without its holy teachings, men walk in the darkness of ignorance. So let the use of the Bible be a constant aid in life and conduct. Paul in his letter to Timothy declared: "All Scripture is inspired of God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work". Wisely use the Scripture always.

The American Bible Society offers substantial support to every earnest minded seeker after the enduring things of life; as it produces millions of copies of the Scriptures. These Bibles, New Testaments and portions are used by numerous ones in many lands. It is interesting to note that two hundred sixty television stations broadcast the one-minute Bible Readings from Thanksgiving to Christmas. One of the things the American Bible Society planned for 1956 was to expand its program of translation, publication and distribution of the Scriptures in all the world. This required the greatest budget of its history. With this challenge of the Bible Society, we the committee on the American Bible Society make some recommendations:

First, that the Bible be used more and more in every Worship experience of the people. That in congregational worship in the sanctuary, or classes in the Church School, or the Youth meetings and Camping programs, Radio and Television presentations, or in Daily Vacation Church Schools, Family Altars or Private Devotions the Bible be used by our people increasingly.

Second, we urge a larger use of the Universal Bible Readings from Thanksgiving to Christmas. Upon request the Bible Society will furnish the book marks to any pastor. An early ordering of this material is recommended,

Third, we further recommend that Universal Bible Sunday be observed in all the churches on or near December 9, and that an offering be taken and sent to The American Bible Society, 450 Park Avenue, New York 22, N.Y. Also that sermons be preached and Visual Aids be used to emphasize the importance of Bible reading. We also recommend an appointment of one to represent the Bible Society in each district.

Fourth, we commend the wide use of The Upper Room throughout the church, in army camps, hospitals, the Sanatorium, and other institutions. May its distribution increase. Also the use of The Sanctuary and other available materials by our people.

COMMITTEE ON GROUP INSURANCE

1. Every member of The North Arkansas Conference, except students serving appointments in conferences which themselves have compulsory insurance programs, every approved supply receiving an appointment, and

every fulltime lay employee of the North Arkansas Conference shall participate in the North Arkansas Conference Group Life Insurance Plan, subject to its laws and regulations.

2. Annual premiums shall be paid by charges and participants at the premium rate of 50c per thousand per month for participants and 75c per thousand per months for charges:

Charges paying less than \$1,000 salary	9.00
Pastors receiving \$1.001 - 3.000	12.00

- 3. Annual premiums shall be paid by participants and charges and be collected through district organizations.
- 4. District treasurers of the fund shall send the district reports and premiums to the Conference Treasurer by February 1, 1957.
- 5. No man who retired before February 18, 1948, even though he has served as a supply since, shall be eligible for insurance.
- 6. Members of the conference who retire will have \$1,000 insurance carried for them with the premiums paid by the North Arkansas Conference Group Insurance Fund.

7. Approved supplies whose annuity claims are approved by the conference will have \$1,000 carried for them with the premium paid by the North Arkansas Conference Insurance Group.

- 8. Members of the North Arkansas Conference who are left without appointment to attend school, who do not serve a charge, shall carry \$1,000 insurance and pay the annual premium of \$6.00 and the North Arkansas Conference Group Insurance Plan will pay the remaining \$9.00.
- 9. Those who are not now participating in our Group Insurance Plan who will be participating under the provisions of this report shall pay 2/3 of the annual premium according to the above schedule by July 1, 1956.
- 10. The dividend returned to the North Arkansas Conference Insurance Plan by the Metropolitan Insurance Company this past year was \$2,352.00. The balance in the group insurance fund at the end of the 1955-56 Conference Year is approximately \$14,000.

Note:—We now have \$612,000 of insurance in force. The decrease in amount of the insurance fund has been effected by the increase of premium rates. The premium rates have increased because of the rising average age of our policy holders. We are not recommending that increased assessments be passed to pastors and churches, but if the trend continues, an increase may be necessary for the 1957-58 conference year.

BOARD OF MISSIONS

I. MISSIONS SECTION

During the Conference Year, 1955-56, the Board of Missions was allowed 21.86% of the total receipts from World Service, with an anticipated income of \$15,984. During the year (to Feb. 14) the total disbursements have been more than \$1200 above the receipts from World Service.

We recommend that the same percentage (21.86) be continued during the Conference Year 1956-57 for the following reasons:

1. With the increasing demands for support of "new" churches in the conference, we find that the demands for Mission funds exceed each year the amount of funds that are being received from World Service.

2. We expect that the demands will be increased for churches that have been and are being, supported by General Board funds in the early stages of their organization. Although some "Mission" projects are rapidly becoming self-supporting, and "Reduction" schedules have been arranged for all churches receiving Mission appropriations, extremely heavy loads must be carried by the Board in these early stages of growth in these new churches.

II. CHURCH EXTENSION PROGRAM

The requests for "Donations" to the Church Extension Sections of the Board of Missions exceed the income each year. The needs for Church Extension in our conference cannot be provided through World Service alone.

We recommend a supplementary program which will provide opportunity for Conference and District Projects through the following "Special" program for Church Extension:

- 1. That the North Arkansas Conference provide for two "New" churches each year during the 1956-60 Quadrennium;
 - a. That local churches, and organizations of local churches, be given an opportunity to help finance these approved churches by the purchase of \$10 shares helping to meet District Quotas;
 - b. We recommend that quotas to the districts be assigned on the basis of "membership and amount paid pastors", which gives the following base figure to raise \$20,000 in the Conference each year in the Quadrennium:

- c. All funds raised in excess of the District Quota in each of the Districts may be used for Church Extension "Projects" in the bounds of that District.
- 2. That this program of the Annual Conference be carried through the regular channels of the District programs with each District Superintendent responsible for the program in his own District.
- 3. That the Board of Missions certify the projects on the basis of the following:

a. Urgency of need

b. Recognized Potential Growth

c. Resources of community in which the project is located

4. The "First" half of the District Quotas be used for the Conference Church Extension Projects.

Wesley Foundation Fund: That \$9,600.00 be allocated to the Board of Education (as mentioned above on percentage basis) to be apportioned to the Charges where Wesley Foundation centers are located as follows: University of Arkansas, Fayetteville; Arkansas Polytechnic College, Russellville; Arkansas State Teachers College, Conway; and Arkansas State College, Jonesboro; and other student work as directed by the Board of Education. - 6. That each District Superintendent be paid an annual salary of \$6,600.00 with \$2,000.00 for office, travel, and promotional expense; making a total of \$8,600.00. That each church in our Conference pay to the Conference Treasurer for the District Superintendents Fund an amount equal to 10 per cent of the salary paid the pastor.
- 7. That the working basis of the District Superintendent's Fund remain at the figure of \$15,000.00.
- 8. That the Conference take note of the splendid work done again this year by our Conference Treasurer. That Mr. P. E. Cooley continue to be paid \$4,200.00 this next year. That the Treasurer deduct for Conference expense 2.7 per cent of all General and Conference Benevolences handled by him with the exception for the Board of Conference Claimants, November

Special, Hendrix College, The Children's Home, Church School Rally Day offerings, and Advance Specials, which shall be promoted, handled, and directed as in previous years. That the Central Treasurer be bonded for \$100,000,00.

- 9. That pastors and Charges become eligible to receive Minimum Salary by complying with the following regulations:
- A. Submit a budget planned by the Commission on Finance, and adopted by the Official Board to the District Superintendent, Executive Secretary of the Town & Country Commission, and the World Service and Finance Commission.
- B. Conduct an every-member canvass, using the procedure approved by the District Superintendent, Executive Secretary of the Town & Country Commission, and the World Service and Finance Commission.
- C. Submit to the District Superintendents and Conference Treasurer copies of the questionaire for pastors concerning their earnings. That ministers whose husband or wife earns as much as \$600.00 per year shall be paid according to the scale for single ministers.
- D. Pay a basic salary equal to or above the following: \$1,100.00 for a student pastor and \$1,400.00 for a full time pastor.
- E. Charges must be composed of at least three churches, and therefore Stations and two point circuits are not eligible to receive Minimum Salary assistance, except as item 9(M) herein directs.
- F. That Charges seek to become self-supporting by increasing their support to the pastor by not less than \$100.00 per year over the previous years' figure. That Charges reaching the self-supporting level be given special recognition by the Town & Country Commission.
- G. That the Minimum Salary be paid according to the following table:

- H. That all supplementary salary received from all other sources be considered in the total salary of any minister being assisted by the Minimum Salary Plan with the exception of the Pastor's Expense Fund.
- I. That no pastor be eligible to receive Minimum Salary until he and the Charge which he serves pays the designated percentages according to the schedule of payment into the Minimum Salary Fund.
- J. That the Conference Treasurer present a mimeographed report showing the standing of all ministers with reference to this fund, at each session of the Annual Conference.
- K. That we continue payment into the Minimum Salary Plan according to the following schedule:

L. That monies received from the local churches, from the Board of Missions, from the Minimum Salary Fund and from any other church source be considered as a part of the total salary upon which the ministers shall pay the above percentages. Churches will also pay the above percent on the basis of the actual salary paid the pastor. However, ministers are not expected to pay Minimum Salary on Pastor's Expense Fund. Neither is it expected that churches pay Minimum Salary on mission appropriation or Pastor's Expense Fund.

- M. That exceptions be allowed in the application of these rules provided that the District Superintendent involved state the nature of the exception in writing to the Conference Commission on World Service and Finance, that such exceptional cases shall be subject to the review and approval of the World Service and Finance Commission each year; and furthermore, that the total spent from the Minimum Salary Fund shall not exceed the total revenue for this purpose for the year in question.
- 10. That in view of the world's needs and demands upon the churches for leadership, our Conference under the direction of the Cabinet, Town & Country Commission, and in cooperation with other Conference Agencies, continue to plan to promote a definite financial program in all churches.
- (a). By stressing through preaching and teaching in stewardship of time and talents and possessions and that the tithes be the minimum basis for all giving for all Christians.
- (b). By holding financial clinics in each district wherein methods, procedures, and motives be studied.
- (c). By further seeing that local church leaders receive help and encouragement in planning and promoting a sound financial system, preferably the unified budget including necessary specials and that an every member pledge campaign become a regular part of the financial program.
- 11. That the North Arkansas Conference continue to recognize the disciplinary right of the pastoral charges to pay pastors an amount not to exceed \$600.00 on pastor's expense, incurred in his work of the parish in accord with paragraph 829 of the 1952 Discipline. It is urged that Charges include and report all compensation for pastoral support and expense under column in the Conference Journal headed "Paid for Ministers" as done this year.
- 12. That each church in our Conference pay to the Conference Treasurer for Conference Claimants an amount equal to 17 per cent of the salary paid to the pastor. The ministers appointed by the Conference and serving within the Conference shall contribute to the Conference Claimants Fund an amount equal to the following percentage of their salaries:
 - \$ 1.00—\$2,000.00 pay ½ per cent 2001.00— 4,000.00 pay 1 per cent 4001.00 and Up—pay 1½ per cent
- 13. That the First National Bank of Blytheville, The Peoples National Bank of Jonesboro, Farmer's Bank and Trust Co. of Blytheville, First National Bank of Batesville, Batesville Federal Savings and Loan Association, Blytheville Federal Savings and Loan Association and the American National Bank of Rogers be the depositories for all Conference funds.
- 14. That the auditing of all Board books and Conference accounts be done at Blytheville by Evans and Johnson, C.P.A., and that such audit be of receipts and disbursements.
- 15. That an amount equal to \$50.00 be used from the District Superintendent's Fund for travel and expense of each District Superintendent to Area meetings.
- 16. That the officials of Hendrix College, under the leadership of President Matt L. Ellis and Dr. C. M. Reves, be authorized to encourage continued support to Hendrix College. That wherever possible churches either place in the budget an item for the support of Hendrix College or that the churches increase the amount paid on the November Special. The goal set by the General Conference was \$1.00 per church member for colleges and schools. We urge all churches to move toward this goal.
- 17. That the Conference secretary see that all reports from pastors and churches be included in the regular statistical tables except such special list as are approved by the World Service and Finance Commission or by direct action of the Annual Conference. That \$300.00 be paid the Conference secretary for travel and other expenses in publishing Conference Journal.

That the actual expense for the following items be paid: Printing and mailing Conference Journal . . (not to exceed).... \$ 2,250.00 Printing expenses Conference programs, roll call blanks, 150.00 300.00 ference reports, etc. (not to exceed) TOTAL \$ 2,700.00

18. That an amount up to \$300.00 be made available to the Committee of Promotion and Cultivation and an amount of \$350.00 be apportioned for the Visiting Conference Preacher from the Conference Expense Fund.

19. A. That the sum of \$500.00 be apportioned for the State Council of Churches.

B. That an amount up to \$100.00 be made available for the Deaconess Board, and

C. That an amount up to \$75.00 be apportioned to the co-ordinating council for mimeographing and mailing of conference calendars, from the Contingent Fund.

We report:

1. That the percentage for the Episcopal Fund approved by the General

Conference is an amount equal to 2% of the pastor's salary.

2. That the Treasurer handling funds of the Conference, Boards, and Commissions have been adequately bonded during the past year by a blanket bond from the Home Indemnity Company amounting to \$35,000.00, and that our Conference Treasurer is bonded for \$100,000.00.

3. That the 1954-1955 books of the following treasurers have been audited in June-July 1955 by Evans and Johnson, C.P.A.; P. E. Cooley, Conference treasurer, and Harold Womack, Board of Conference Claimants.

4. That we continue to approve action of the Annual Conference with reference to the recommendation concerning the Board of Temperance and recommend that pastors open their pulpits to representatives of the Temperance League, and accept offerings. Furthermore, that special cooperation be given to the General Board of Temperance in the showing of the film, "Far From Alone".

Report No. 3

We recommend that the North Arkansas Conference authorize the World Service and Finance Commission to call a meeting during the month of February at which time all Boards and Agencies shall report on their work and make requests for funds for the ensuing year. These requests to be carefully studied and a mimeographed report be sent to each pastor two months prior to Conference, containing the recommendations to be presented by the World Service and Finance Commission at the Conference session.

This would enable all laymen and pastors to set up budgets in the local churches with these financial recommendations in mind.

Furthermore that any request for additional finances or approval of a financial campaign after this February meeting will be considered only upon request of the Bishop and the Cabinet or request from General Commission on World Service and Finance.

THE METHODIST CHURCH

Conference Board of Lay Activities North Arkansas Conference Annual Report, June 16, 1956

Lay Activities in the North Arkansas Conference have closed another gratifying year. Of course, we are a great distance from our ambitions and dreams, but our progress during the past 12 months is marked by steps which have carried the work to encouraging levels. Here are some of the phases of the work accomplished during the year just closed.

Methodist Men

During the year, the number of clubs has grown from 63 to 78. Our assigned goal is 106 clubs, and at the present rate we should reach that number in about two years. Our clubs of Methodist Men constitute the best possible channel through which men may learn more of the Church, of Christianity, and of their Christian duty in everyday life. We must continue to organize new clubs because of their value to our men and to the church.

Laymen's Day

Laymen's Day was observed on or near to October 16th by over 95 per cent of all the churches. This is a fine record, since it is worth much more than the mere fact that it was observed. Through Laymen's Day we constantly help men to pray in public, to witness, and to appreciate the task of the pastor as he preaches to his congregation. Laymen's Day this year will be October 21st. The subject to be discussed will be "Your Church and You." Let us try to observe it in every church in the Conference.

Lay Speaking

Since our Conference has been doing this type of witnessing longer than any other conference in the United States, we naturally are leading all other conferences in the consistent good work that our laymen are doing in the small churches. At present approximately 175 lay persons are working actively in this field. We are in need of more materials, but we feel that the Conference Committee on Lay Speaking will help us in this need. In all probability there will be a handbook issued this year by the General Board of Lay Activities to assist laymen who feel a need of suggestions and helps for carrying on services in a manner that will be helpful.

Conference-wide Retreat

Our first Conference-wide retreat was held last October 8 and 9. There were 125 in attendance. We were very much encouraged by the interest of those who attended. The presence of Bishop Paul E. Martin was also a blessing. Bishop Martin brought us the final message and thrilled the men with his encouragement and his challenge. Plans are underway for another Conference-wide retreat on July 21 and 22.

In addition to this meeting at the conference level, there have been District training sessions or retreats in three of the districts. These have been very worthwhile. The Conference Lay Leader is encouraging such action. We all hope that we can have at least one such session in every district in the coming year.

National Town & Country Conference Bloomington, Indiana, July 22-25

About 35 laymen were present at this nation-wide meeting and made a large contribution from their own experiences. Our study of the need and challenge of the small church was carried on by many persons who spoke out of actual experience. We all felt that the study was profitable.

The Conference Lay Leader

Your Conference Lay Leader has visited 7 of the 8 districts during the past year. He led a discussion group at the National Town & Country meeting in Bloomington. He has spoken at Methodist meetings in 41 of our churches, which included groups from over 100 congregations in the Conference. He has worked with Alcoholics Anonymous, and has visited the state penitentiary and one city jail. This job that my church has given me has been a means of finding more joyful experiences than I have ever had. I should like to serve as your Conference Lay Leader for another year.

Recommendations

For the year 1956-57 we recommend the following goals:

1. Thirty-five new chartered clubs of Methodist Men. This would meet our present goals set by the General Board of Lay Activities.

- 2. A laymen's training session or retreat in every District.
- 3. Increased emphasis on tithing as a means of spiritual growth.
- 4. An attendance of at least 150 men at our conference retreat.
- 5. Recruit 25 more men into the Lay Speaking Program.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Mrs. E. G. Kaetzell, President

The quadrennium with its emphasis on Discipleship has brought our women into a new spiritual awareness of the privileges as well as the responsibilities that are a part of membership in the Woman's Society of Christian Service. Interpreting the goals, under the theme "That the Kingdom of God May be Realized" has been a challenge and a thrilling adventure in re-dedication for individuals and societies.

Consecrated effort and creative thinking have built a progressive record in the North Arkansas Conference.

We observed our fifteenth anniversary this year. This had a two-fold value. It gave us an opportunity to look backward to the accomplishments of the past and to look forward to the hopes for the future.

There are many evidences of spiritual growth throughout the Conference shown in an increasing demand for religious and devotional reading materials and the desire for the establishment of book shelves for spiritual Life materials; a deeper concern for the shut-in group and their needs; larger numbers observing the annual Week of Prayer and Self Denial and the World Day of Prayer; increased interest in Prayer Groups and participation in Prayer Vigils.

Miss Mary Chaffin, our deaconess, has completed another year of good work in the Melbourne area and Miss Iris Bell, our US-2, has worked faithfully in the Imboden area.

We now have 297 societies and 110 Guild units with a total membership of 15,436 women. Assuming that few pastors read the Report of our Annual Meeting, some financial report by districts might prove interesting. This is the amount received by the Conference treasurer from each district:

Batesville\$ 8,098	Fayetteville 11,508	Ft. Smith 15,773
Conway 10,546	Forrest City 12,807	Jonesboro 12,072

In addition to the \$73,160 sent to the Woman's Division for Missions, we gave \$400 to help pay the Chaplain's salary at Boonville and \$100 to a fund for him to use in what he terms "Sunshine Fund." \$1000 was contributed to the salary of the Alcohol and Narcotic Education worker in the state. We have a \$350 Scholarship at Hendrix, used each year by a selected worthy student. We cooperated with the Board of Education in a training workshop,

paying \$300 toward it.

Financial reports cannot reveal the good work done by the officers and members in the local, district and conference. Nor does it reveal the help and cooperation of pastors and district superintendents. A speaker at General Conference said "The world decides how important our religion is by the way we put it into practice. We must witness that God not only lives in us but works through us." I feel that truly God has worked through the Woman's Society of Christian Service this year!

RADIO AND FILM COMMISSION

Your Radio and Film Commission was formally organized at North Little Rock at the time of the special session of the annual conference last fall, and immediately entered its first project—that of the purchase and distribution through the conference of the film MARTIN LUTHER. Distributed on a free will offering basis, this film has already repaid the purchase price and more than \$75 is now in the treasury.

We are recommending that the MARTIN LUTHER film be placed in the hands of the district directors of Television, Radio and Films for a month's use in each district on the free will offering basis, and that each district director be responsible for the circulation of the film in his own district and for forwarding it to the next district on schedule. We suggest the following schedule: Ft. Smith District—July; Conway District August; Searcy District—September; Batesville District—October; Paragould District—November; Jonesboro District—December; Forrest City District—January; Fayetteville District—February.

We call attention of the Conference to the continuing program of the General Television, Radio and Film Commission in cultivation of special gifts for production, and express our gratitude to our Conference World Service and Finance Commission for including the TV Ministry in benevolent giving on the same basis on which it was included the last quadrennium.

We remind all of our members and churches of the current television programming of the series THE WAY, which is now being shown in stations which cover practically every section of our conference. Pastors are urged to get the promotional materials and keep alert to the possibilities of promoting and utilizing this outstanding series produced by our church.

We make the following recommendations:

- 1) That Samuel P. Auslam be elected a representative from our conference to attend the International Workshop on Visual Education in Los Angeles, Calif. in August and that \$100 be paid on his expenses there.
- 2) That a workshop in Television, Radio and Film be conducted in the afternoon periods of the Arkansas Pastors School, with the suggestion that Brother Auslam share his resources from the Los Angeles workshop in these periods, and that the new commission invite the Little Rock Conference Commission to share with them in this project during Pastor's School.
- 3) That district directors be urged to attend the Workshop in Memphis, Tenn. conducted by the Broadcasting and Film Commission of the National Council on November 11-16, and that ten dollars be paid on the expenses of any district directors who will attend.
- 4) That the new commission in taking over the ownership of film MARTIN LUTHER give careful consideration to the matter of the purchase and distribution of any other suitable material, which seems to merit such a plan of ownership and distribution.
- 5) That districts give consideration to the plan which some are already following of a district-pool of audio-visual materials and equipment, espe-

cially since every district has already received many free materials from promotional agencies of the church and likely will continue so to do.

PROMOTION AND CULTIVATION

The committee on Promotion and Cultivation has cooperated with the General Board of Missions during this conference year in presenting the cause of missions, Advance Specials and World Service Giving in our Annual Conference. We have undertaken to keep these causes before the churches of our Conference and to report all Advance Special giving to the Board of Missions.

We urge our people to remember the increased place Advance Specials has in our total missionary program and to support this vital effort in this new quadrennium. Three areas of Advance Specials will be before us again (1) World Missions (2) National Missions and (3) Conference Initiated Specials.

We commend those churches which have continued their Advance Special program in the world mission field. We recommend that our Churches designate the new Alaska College as their National Advance Special project. We pledge our support to the Extension Shares program for new churches in the conference, and recommend that all contributions to this program be accredited as Conference Advance Specials.

Your Committee urges that all charges accept the challenge of the General Conference and accept the 35% increase in World Service giving this

year.

We invite all pastors and laymen to write the chairman of Promotion and Cultivation for any material or information concerning the cause represented in this report.

BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

Since the North Arkansas Conference Board of Social and Economic Relations is less than a quadrennium old, its members feel that it is important to lift up again the purposes and work of this board.

It is Board's responsibility to encourage the organizing of a Committee on Social and Economic Relations in each church;

To encourage the study of the basic documents of the Church, especially the Social Creed; to promote the planning of Christian Social Relations Sunday, on which the pastor is encouraged to preach on the Social Creed and distribute copies of this stated social position of Methodism to the congregation; and to sponsor discussion groups and studies dealing with race relations, industrial relations, social welfare, community life, political and international life.

The General Board of Social and Economic Relations is doing a splendid work in providing materials for these activities in local churches. The General Board is planning conference and jurisdictional seminars dealing with the various phases of social and economic relations. The Board has recently published a social "primer", THE MODERN SAMARITAN by Clair M. Cook, which is intended to help local church groups survey the entire field of social and economic relations. We highly recommend this book for local church usage. Also, the General Conference statement on Race Relations will be published at an early date by the General Board and made available for local churches and individuals. We hope that each church will secure copies of this statement. Many other helpful materials are available for local church from the General Board office at 740 Rush Street, Chicago, Ill.

The Methodist Church is entering a new quadrennium in which it is committed by action of The General Conference, to an emphasis on the local church and institutions of higher learning. We have an imperative responsibility of implementing, with reasonable speed, the action of The General Conference concerning the elemination of all racial discrimination. We urge that this responsibility be fulfilled by the trustees of Methodist institutions in Arkansas.

We are in complete agreement with the recommendation of the General Conference in the matter of unifying the conference Boards of World Peace, Temperance, and Social and Economic Relations.

We urge the prayerful consideration of all social and economic problems of our day. Under the leadership of our Lord, let us move forward in the building of God's kingdom which is a Kingdom of love for all men.

The county organizations have been perfected for the circulating of the Anti-Racing petitions and we should make ourselves available to circulate and sign these petitions. In the follow up program, before the election, we should give our whole hearted support in securing votes and voting for the amendment,

TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION REPORT

This has been a very gratifying year in the work of the Town and Country Commission. The main activities and items of interest in the year's work are as follows:

- 1. Our conference had fine representation at the National Town and Country Conference held at Bloomington, Indiana, July 22-25, 1956. Our excellent attendance of forty-two persons from our conference was primarily the result of the splendid cooperation of the district superintendents. Each district provided one car for the transportation of delegates to the conference, and a total of nine cars from our conference made the trip to Bloomington. It was an outstanding conference and we believe our conference will profit from having this number in attendance.
- 2. Our Executive Secretary, Reverend A. N. Storey, has devoted a major part of his time to stewardship and finance in the local churches, working with churches upon the invitation of the district superintendent, pastor, and official board. We have forty churches that have made good response to the "every member canvass". Brother Storey has been in each of these churches from one to four services each. A number of these churches have increased pastor's salary and other items of the budget. Others have organized their financial program in a better way.

The plan for the "every member canvass" has been presented in eighteen other churches. These eighteen churches, twelve of which are on minimum salary charges, have not responded as yet.

Assistance in building programs has been given to twelve churches. In some of these our executive Secretary helped to direct fund-raising campaigns and had very satisfactory response in this field. In three of the largest of these campaigns a total of approximately \$125,000 was pledged and payments on the pledges are coming in on schedule. In other churches, help was given in plans for new buildings, and in others help was given in remodeling programs. At the request of one local church and of the Board of Missions, construction of a new church building was supervised by our Executive Secretary. All of these churches were visited from two to twelve times each, and about ten other churches have been visited in the interest of various causes such as presenting the need for new churches, counseling with district superintendents, pastor and official boards as to the needs for Larger Parish Plans, Group Ministry, etc.

- 3. Our Executive Secretary served as Program Chairman for the Rural Seminar of the University of Arkansas. This seminar for all Protestant ministers of the state, held February 14-17, 1956, was the second seminar sponsored by the University of Arkansas and is now to become an annual affair. It is expected that the State Council of Churches will sponsor the seminar in cooperation with the University of Arkansas. One hundred one persons, thirty-six of whom were Methodist, attended. We should have more Methodists next year.
- 4. Our Executive Secretary accepted an invitation to serve on the State Advisory Committee as set up by the State Extension Service.
- 5. A Town and Country Convocation was held March 12, 1956 at the Salem Church near Conway. Mr. C. A. Vines and Mr. Karl F. Munson, both of the State Extension Service, Reverend C. Ray Hozendorf of the Little Rock Conference, Rev. J. M. Talkington, Rev. Porter Weaver, and Dr. Earl D. C. Brewer of Emory University and Bishop Paul E. Martin were on the program of this convocation which was planned to present the problems of the Town and Country Church as we look ahead for the next twenty-five years.

- 6. On March 31, 1956, the Town and Country Commission held a joint meeting with the Board of Missions on the campus of Hendrix College. At this meeting we reviewed the work of the five new churches of our conference, four of which have been organized and are functioning for the first time this year. We found that all five are doing well. Dr. Roy A. Sturm of the Department of Research and Survey, who had been with the Executive Secretary for a four-day tour of the conference, presented the challenge of our need for new churches. Bishop Martin was with us again and made a real contribution to our meeting.
- 7. We have held one rural life conference which was for Marion and Baxter Counties and was held at the Cedar Grove Church near Yellville.
- 8. The Workshop Program for student pastors at Hendrix College has been continued.
- 9. We have continued to emphasize the Group Ministry and the Larger Parish Plan.

Plans, which we believe will mature, are in the making for a Group Ministry in three new situations. These are: (1) Baxter County, Marion County and the Calico Rock area in Izard County; (2) The Forrest City Area of St. Francis County; and (3) The Batesville Area of Independence County.

County.

10. The observance of Rural Life Sunday has been emphasized and material for help in planning this observance has been distributed. We believe that more churches have observed this day than in former years.

For our work for the coming year we recommend a continuation of our work in all of these fields of service, our continued cooperation with other agencies and programs with which we have worked, and that A. N. Storey be reappointed Executive Secretary of the Town and Country Commission to direct this work.

ARKANSAS HISTORICAL COMMISSION

During the greater portion of the last two quadrenniums the main project of the Historical Commission has been to set up historical markers at certain sites about the Conference. It has been suggested by the World Service and Finance Commission that our report this year include a listing of all markers which have been placed. These are:

- 1. Historical marker on Highway 62 at its junction with Highway 45, two miles east of Lincoln. This marker commemorates the first annual conference held in Arkansas near Cane Hill in 1833.
 - 2. Historical marker on Hendrix College Campus, Conway
- 3. Historical marker on Highway 59 at City Heights Methodist Church, Van Buren. This marker commemorates the home of Rev. John Harrell, appointed by Bishop Roberts to serve Western Arkansas and Indian Territory
- 4. Historical marker on Highway 117 in the town of Jessup. This marker commemorate the life of Rev. Eli Lindsey who was the first preacher of Methodism in Arkansas and who lived on Strawberry River. The Jessup Church was renamed the Eli Lindsey Memorial Methodist Church.
- 5. Historical marker in memory of Rev. Isaac Brookfield, pioneer preacher who was appointed by Bishop Asbury to preach to whites and Indians in Arkansas in 1819. This marker has not been placed due to highway construction near Harrisburg.

The Commission has not bought nor placed a marker this year. Lack of sufficient data concerning the exact location of the grave has kept us from placing a marker in memory of the Rev. Thomas Tennant, the oldest Methodist preacher who ever lived, and the first pastor of the Arkansas Circuit. It has also been suggested that a marker be placed at Mt. Zion, near Vanndale to commemorate the first session of the White River Annual Conference. We believe that both of these markers can be placed in the year ahead.

We urge that every Charge establish a local church Historical Commission for the purpose of preserving documents of local history, and that all such records be kept in fireproof vaults.

BOARD OF CHRISTIAN LITERATURE

Your Conference Board of Christian Literature has two purposes: (1) to emphasize the importance of the reading of Christian literature by our people, and (2) to represent the Conference in its relations with The Arkansas Methodist. Our report is divided into two parts to deal with these two purposes.

Part A

To stimulate the use of Christian literature by our people, your Conference Board proposes a "Project of the Year in Christian Literature." We suggest that the month of January, 1957, be observed in the churches of our conference as "Good Literature Month." For carrying out this project in our local churches, we make the following three recommendations:

- (1) That to plan and promote "Good Literature Month" there be set up in each local church a Committee on Good Literature, appointed by the Official Board under the leadership of the pastor, as provided for in Paragraph 246, Section 10, of the 1952 Discipline. This committee can assist the pastor in many other ways—by securing subscriptions to The Arkansas Methodist; by promoting the new church-wide family monthly magazine, Together, and other church periodicals; by calling attention to the publication of new books of worth in forming and building the Christian life; by arranging for exhibits of books and pamphlets relating to the work of The Methodist Church; by promoting the observance of Bible Sunday; by furthering the use of approved publications in the Church School; and by cultivating the reading of such excellent materials as The Upper Room, Power, The Christian Home, and The World Outlook.
- (2) That at the Sunday morning worship service during "Good Literature Month" lay members give three-minute "inspiration talks" according to the following schedule:

January 6—The Bible and The Upper Room.

January 13-The Arkansas Methodist.

January 20—Together.

January 27—The Christian Home and Mature Years.

(3) That on one Sunday during "Good Literature Month" the pastor preach a sermon in which he guides his people in choosing and using literature that is Christian in content and influence, and in which he helps his people understand the effect on their lives of their reading. A good time for this sermon would be the first or second Sunday in January, since these Sundays immediately precede the Arkansas Methodist campaign. It is further suggested that on this Sunday there be arranged in the church a display of those books and publications which the pastor thinks his people should know and use.

Part B

This part of our report deals with The Arkansas Methodist and Methodist Information.

- 1. We are proud to report that the circulation of The Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist is at an all-time high, and that the percentage of renewals this year was the greatest in recent years. These reflect the high quality of our paper and the service it is rendering to Methodism.
- 2. Our church paper is made possible by the encouragement of our Bishop, by the leadership of the editors and staff, and by the cooperation of

district superintendents, pastors, and laymen. It is with regret that we report that one of the members of the staff this year has discontinued her official relationship to the paper. She is Mrs. E. T. Wayland, whose years of service have been a labor of love, done with very little financial remuneration. We speak for all the Methodists of Arkansas and Louisiana in saying, "Thank you, Mrs. Wayland, for the unselfish service you have given to Christ and His Church through our church paper."

3. We congratulate the editors of The Arkansas Methodist on changes of format which have resulted in a greater emphasis on news content. We are pleased to report that in the near future The Methodist will be the subject of an objective analysis and evaluation service by one of the foremost schools of journalism in America—Syracuse University. The paper will be surveyed objectively for general acceptability, make-up, feature and editorial content, and literary style. Arkansas already has one of the better church papers in Methodism, and one of the marks of a truly great paper is its efforts continually to improve.

4. We would call to the attention of our ministers two special arrangements which can be made by a local church with The Arkansas Methodist. One is the special rate of \$1.50 per subscription where a church sends a list representing 1/3 of the members reported to the last session of the Annual Conference. The other is a special service now used by three churches of the Little Rock Conference, whereby the back page of The Methodist is used for local church news—on a cost basis.

5. Our Area Office of Methodist Information is now in its fourth year, and under the able leadership of Mrs. Georgia McDonald is doing an increasingly good job of carrying the story of the church to the general public through newspapers, radio, television, and national magazines. We congratulate Mrs. McDonald on her fine work, and suggest that ministers notify her of any unusual events of interest beyond the local church.

6. We submit for filing in the Conference Journal a report from P. E. Cooley, our Conference Treasurer, and the financial statements of The Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist and Methodist Information.

7. We make a part of our report the Report of the Joint Commission of The Arkansas Methodist and The Louisiana Methodist, and concur in its recommendations.

REPORT OF THE JOINT COMMISSION

The Joint Commission of the Arkansas Methodist and the Louisiana Methodist met at the First Methodist Church, Little Rock, February 14, 1956, with Dr. Aubrey G. Walton, Chairman, presiding. Those present included Bishop Paul E. Martin, Dr. E. T. Wayland, Rev. Ewing Wayland, Burney Wilson, Rev. Bill Pomeroy, Mrs. Georgia McDonald, J. Frank Warden, Rev. R. R. Branton, Dr. Virgil Morris, Rev. C. Ray Hozendorf, O. C. Landers, Dr. Arthur Terry, Rev. William Watson, Judge J. G. Moore, Dr. James Matthews, and Rev. Bob Sessions.

After discussion of various matters of business, the Commission voted to make the following recommendations to the three Annual Conferences of the Area:

(1) That the circulation campaign for 1957 be January 13-20, and that the same general plan of circulation that has been used be employed.

(2) That the campaign goal for 1957 be 40,000 for the combined publications with a quota for each charge of one subscription for each 9 members.

(3) That the subscription price for each publication be continued at \$2.00 with the provision that a \$1.50 rate be available to those churches that submit subscription lists which equal or exceed in number one-third of the church's active members reported to the last session of the annual conference.

- (4) That the Little Rock and North Arkansas Conference's Commission on World Service be requested to appropriate the same amount for the Arkansas Methodist as was apportioned during the past quadrennium, and that the Louisiana Conference World Service Commission be requested to appropriate \$4,000 annually to the Louisiana Methodist, this being the amount which was agreed upon in 1951 for the beginning of the 1956 year; and that representation before the three Commissions be determined.
- (5) That the staff be authorized to proceed to complete arrangements with the Syracuse University to have the Arkansas Methodist evaluated by the service which it offers in this field.
- (6) That the Commission express its appreciation to those who have contributed service to the publications during the past year, the Bishop, pastors, district superintendents, district directors, Rev. H. O. Bolin, Charles S. Stuck, W. W. Reid, Rev. J. Daniel Barron, Mrs. Ewing T. Wayland, Miss Annie Winburne, and Mrs. Georgia McDonald, all who contributed without remuneration except Rev. Mr. Bolin who writes the Sunday School lessons and Mrs. McDonald of Methodist Information.
- (7) That the back page arrangement be continued on the same basis as at present, with the understanding that contracts with other churches be assumed as staff and printing facilities allow.

WINFRED LEE DIGGS

Winfred Lee Diggs was born on a farm at Woods Chapel near Paragould, September 25, 1917. His death came December 30, 1955 in a car-train crash near Osceola. His father, Ben Diggs, had died at an early age, leaving a large family to win their way in the world. In the atmosphere of the farm, Winfred grew up with a high sense of appreciation for the simple things of life. The active Christian faith of his mother and the stalwart Christian character of his father left an indelible impression on his life.

At Paragould, he met and married Jennell Sisk. Two fine sons came to bless their marriage. They are Ronny, age fourteen, and Mark, age eight.

During the depression years the Diggs family lived in Chicago. It was here that a religious pamphlet handed out by an old man in front of a church one snowy Christmas night marked the turning point in Winfred's life. He thrust the pamphlet deep in his overcoat pocket refraining from reading it, yet not daring to throw it away. He carried it until the tract was completely worn out. Later Ronnie took desperately ill, and an emergency operation was necessary. The doctors were not too encouraging and the boy's father sent a telegram: "Mom, pray, Ronnie bad. Going for operation". Riding up the elevator to the operating room Winfred told his wife: "When Ronnie gets well, you are going to have a preacher husband".

He returned to Arkansas in 1943 and was licensed to preach by H. Lynn Wade at Woods Chapel. That fall he was assigned to the Brookland Circuit. Later he served Mount Carmel and Forest Home. During this time he was doing his college work at Arkansas State College. In September, 1947 he moved to Maud, Texas and enrolled in Perkins School of Theology. He also served at Howe, while in Texas.

After graduation from Perkins in June, 1951 he went to St. Louis as assistant pastor to Dr. Albea Godbold at St. Johns Methodist Church. In June, 1952 he returned to the North Arkansas Conference and was appointed to Cotter. He served for two years here during which time he took an active part in a campaign to take legalized liquor out of Cotter and Baxter County. His last appointment was at Luxora where he had served for a year and a half at the time of his death.

With the exception of preaching, his first love was singing. I have heard men with greater voices than Brother Diggs, but I have never witnessed a

man that could inspire a congregation to sing like he could. He loved to sing for the sheer joy of singing. It was contagious. During revivals congregations came back night after night and sang like I am sure the Methodists must have sung during the days of the Wesleys!

His funeral was conducted at Paragould by E. J. Holifield, Eugene Hall, J. Albert Gatlin, W. O. Scroggin, and G. A. McKelvey. A fine tribute to his life, faith, and ministry was voiced by one of the speakers who said: "And he wants this to be our finest hour and not our darkest hour". The full congregation stood smiling through tears while the choir sang: The Hallelujah Chorus". We followed his body to Linwood Cemetery, and when the last "Amen" was spoken, sang "The Doxology".

CHARLES EDWARD GRAY

Charles Edward Gray was born May 31, 1877 near Altus in Franklin County, Arkansas. He was the son of James I. and Dean Smith Gray. He was married to Miss Olive M. Forbes, January 21, 1898. With his loyal and devoted wife he began his itinerant ministry at London, Arkansas and then followed pastorates at Ola, Mulberry, Charleston, Swifton, Pocahontas, Rector, Holly Grove, Harrisburg, Lepanto, Imboden, Marshall, Quitman and Marmaduke. He retired in 1949 after 41½ years of service. He then served 3½ as a supply at Stanford, making a total of 45 years of service as an itinerant Methodist preacher. He was a lifelong student and a reader of the latest and best books. He was an able and fluent speaker and was considered a man's man. His hobby was nature study and he specialized in the study of native birds.

He was numbered among that class of self-made ministers who were willing and ready to take whatever was offered in the way of a place to serve. He was a Mason and a Past Patron of the Eastern Star.

He passed away February 11, 1956 at Pocahontas, Ark. The funeral service was held in First Methodist Church, Rector, by James R. Chandler, assisted by J. Albert Gatlin and Y. D. Whitehurst. Burial was in Rector cemetery.

Besides the daughters mentioned above, he is survived by his widow who resides with her daughter, Mrs. Lee See at Rector.

JOHN ALEXANDER WOMACK

John Alexander Womack was born February 3, 1878 just north of the present town of Centerton, Benton County, at a time when that section was just emerging from the difficult period of reconstruction following the Civil War. His life spanned one of the most significant periods of Methodist in Arkansas.

He was the fifth child and second son of James Wilson and Elizabeth Jane Gamble Womack. There were in the family four sons and four daughters. One brother died in infancy, while the others each attained high degrees of success in their chosen fields. J. P. and R. E. were prominent as educators and college presidents. W. Vance, a younger brother, is a prominent member of the North Arkansas Conference, and a sister, Stella, was for many years a deaconess in The Methodist Church. The children were fortunate in having received a Christian heritage from their parents. His father became a member of the old Center Point Methodist Church when he was seventeen, and his mother was a Presbyterian, joining The Methodist Church when the last of her children was about to become a member.

He was licensed to preach in 1896, but did not become a member of the conference until 1902. Like all the young preachers of that period he became a circuit rider and had many thrilling experiences as such. On one occasion he was almost washed away while trying to ford the flooded War Eagle River near Huntsville. He was married August 23, 1903 to Elizabeth Coley of Centerton. Not until the last four years of his ministry did his salary reach as much as three hundred dollars a month, yet he and "Aunt Sallie" managed to educate three boys: Carlos, who became a Methodist preacher in North Carolina, John of Little Rock, and Joe of Van Buren.

During his 47½ years of service in the North Arkansas Conference almost 500 persons professed their faith in Christ under his pastorate. Nearly half of these professions came during the sixteen years he served as pastor of the church at Marked Tree. This long pastorate appears to be the longest regular and continued pastorate ever held by one man in the North Arkansas Conference. The other appointments he served were: Winslow, St. Paul, Huntsville, Leslie, Marshall, Berry, Yellville, Harrison, Russellville, Marianna, Fayetteville, Fayetteville District, Rogers, Dardanelle, and Van Buren.

The total of these years represents the work of a lifetime of a devoted servant of God, of his church, and of his fellowmen. His good deeds would suffice to fill the pages of a very large volume. He spent his years here well. Somewhere he continues to serve in God's plan, doing good deeds he began while here on earth.

STANDING RULES OF THE NORTH ARKANSAS CONFERENCE

- (1) That each undergraduate, each approved supply pastor, and each candidate for conference membership be required to meet with the Board of Ministerial Training before or during the session of the annual conference unless hindered by circumstances beyond his control.
- i(2) That the lay members of the District Conference, in addition to the lay members provided for by the Discipline, shall consist of one delegate from each church in each Pastoral Charge; provided further, that each station charge shall have three elected delegates.
- (3) That the figures answering the question the pastor's report to Annual Conference: "Members reported last year" shall in every case be the number of members printed in the statistical tables of the Journal of the last Annual Conference.
- (4) That the District Superintendent's figures of all apportionments be accepted as the official figures.
- (5) That the apportionment for Conference and General Work be combined in the statistical report: and, that the amount paid be the figures of the Conference Treasurer.
- (6) All statistical reports shall be delivered by the district superintendents to the conference statistician seven days before the opening session of the Annual Conference, and all settlements shall be made with the Conference Treasurer by June 1st.
- (7) When a member of this Conference becomes a member of the Bishop's cabinet he shall automatically become ineligible to serve on any quadrennial board, committee, commission, or an officer in the Conference administration, except members specifically designated by the Discipline.
- '(8) That the Secretary of the Bishop's cabinet be instructed to provide the Secretary of the Annual Conference a record of any changes in Boundaries of Pastoral Charges or District Superintendent's District for insertion in the Conference Journal.
- (9) That all members of the conference who attend the annual sessions shall pay the host church two dollars registration fee, with the following exceptions: 1) Men from minimum salary charges shall pay one dollar; 2) Retired men and supernumeraries shall pay no registration fee. The offerings in the public worship services shall go to the host church, and the honorarium from the conference preacher shall be paid from the conference expense fund.
- (10) At all sessions of the Annual Conference entertainment provided by the host church shall consist of bed and breakfast, except for superannuates, for whom full entertainment shall be provided.
- (11) Every board, commission, and committee receiving any money from conference funds shall present to the Commission on World Service and Finance annually by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference a detailed financial report including all receipts and expenditures.
- (12) The list of lay delegates elected to Annual Conference shall be compiled by the district superintendents and sent to the host church and to the conference secretary thirty days before the opening of the Annual Conference.
- (13) The District Stewards shall apportion the askings for World Service and Conference Benevolences, and for General Administration Fund, and Jurisdictional Expense, to the several charges in each district on an equitable basis.
- (14) The conference treasurer shall close his books for the Conference Year seven days before the opening of the annual conference, and shall distribute to the several boards and commissions the moneys to which they are entitled by the time of the opening of the Annual Conference, and each board and commission receiving money from conference funds shall close its books on the opening day of annual conference.
- (15) No one shall be nominated for re-election to a board or commission on which he has served more than a quadrennium immediately preceding his election.
- |(16) The secretary of the Board of Conference Claimants shall be a member of the secretarial staff of the conference and this person shall be charged with the responsibility of seeing that all records pertaining to service years be made identical.
- (17) Any proposal to change the Standing Rules shall lie on the table overnight, and then its passage shall require a $\frac{3}{4}$ vote of those present and voting.
- (18) That part of the report of all boards, commissions, committees and other agencies of the conference which provides for changes in policy or makes recommendations shall be mimeographed, printed, or otherwise duplicated and distributed to the membership of the conference prior to the time scheduled for action on said report.
- (19) All churches employing more than one member of an annual conference shall pay all percentages based on pastor's salary on the salaries of all ministers so employed.

The "Arkansas Conference" and the "White River Conference" were united in 1914 to form the present "North Arkansas Conference."

The Conference determined that its annual notation should date from the time of the organization of the Arkansas Conference in 1836, instead of following the date fixed by the consolidation of the Arkansas and White River Conferences, when the name was changed to North Arkansas Conference in 1914.

The Conference session of 1939 voted to maintain the numerical notation of the Conference in The Methodist Church.
